IMF URGES FURTHER SUBSIDY REFORMS

KUWAIT: Kuwait must enact further subsidy reforms to trim its budget deficit resulting from low oil prices despite political sensitivity, the International Monetary Fund has said. Posting its first budget shortfall of \$15 billion last fiscal year following 16 years of surpluses, OPEC member Kuwait has adopted a series of austerity measures raising the prices of fuel, power and water. The state liberalized diesel and kerosene prices last year and recently hiked the cost of petrol, causing a political crisis that led to parliament being dissolved and calls for a snap election.

But even with these measures, Kuwait will need a massive KD 35 billion (\$116 billion) to finance its deficit over the next six years, the IMF said in a report released late Tuesday. In spite of the government reform measures, Kuwait's "fiscal and external accounts have deteriorated markedly", it said. "Further subsidy reform is critical."

The report encouraged "the authorities to move ahead with their plans to further rationalize energy subsidies", estimated at close to \$7 billion in last year's budget. It also called for controls on the wage bill and for raising non-oil revenues. Earlier this year, Cabinet approved a comprehensive plan aimed at subsidy reforms, economic diversification and controlling the wage bill, which accounts for almost half of public spending.

KUWAIT: The government is planning to impose taxes on expats' remittances and companies, and privatize healthcare and education. According to informed government sources, a special ministerial committee has already prepared a package of economic and financial reform legislations to be presented by the new Cabinet and referred to the new parliament in mid-December.

The sources explained that the government aims to start executing its economic reform plan early and that it expects fierce confrontation in this regard with the new parliament. But it insists on pushing ahead with economic reform as the most important topic on the government's agenda, along with security and the GCC security pact.

The sources stressed that the government believes that privatizing education and healthcare is a must, while the opposition considers this as unconstitutional. The sources also emphasized that the health sector's privatization is inevitable and that hospital management would be offered to international specialized companies, starting with Jaber Hospital. The sources added that school privatization would experimentally start with one school per educational area.

Moreover, the sources said the government will also propose cancelling the current form of subsidies and direct them only to those with limited income. "The agenda also includes imposing a 10 percent tax on companies and a 5 percent tax on expats' money transfers," the sources concluded.

Separately, the administrative court yesterday rejected a petition claiming that the formation of the election committee was illegal and urged the court to abolish it. **Continued on Page 13**

GCC LABOR MINISTERS TO **UNIFY LABOR MARKET: SUBAIH**

Social development strategy approved

and Social Development Ministers discussed unification of GCC labor market and creation of job opportunities for GCC citizens, a Kuwaiti minister said yesterday. Kuwaiti Minister of Social Affairs and Labor and Minister of State for Planning and Development Affairs Hind Al-Subaih said, at the conclusion of the Ministers' 33rd meeting, that teams of experts were to be formed: one to find means of naturalizing foreign laborers, while the second to tackle unifying domestic labor regulations among the GCC countries.

The meeting also pointed out that vocational training and education should be subordinate to labor markets' requirements, Subaih said. In addition, the meeting discussed the possibility for having new laborers to sit written and skill examinations before entering fore work. All these discussions to setting up a joint labor market should be realized within the next three years, with regular meetings every month, the minister pointed out.

The GCC social and labor ministers have endorsed during their meeting a social development strategy to give new impetus to social development action in the region, Subaih had affirmed late Tuesday. These initiatives were distributed to the GCC member states to be a roadmap, she said. RIYADH: The GCC joint defense council discussed Tuesday the latest developments in the region, including the challenges facing Gulf countries. The council also stressed, in a conclusion of the 15th GCC defense ministerial meeting in Riyadh, the importance of boosting the joint action, and accelerating the completion of various defense integration requirements in order to live up to future challenges and threats.

The council's members also expressed their appreciation and gratitude to the sponsorship of the GCC joint action by member-countries, particularly Saudi Arabia and King Salman bin Abdulaziz's presidency of the council's current term, which had a great impact on enhancing the march of Gulf joint action.

Major-General Khalifa Al-Kaabi, assistant secretary-general of military affairs, mentioned that the council has reviewed the steps taken to implement the unified military commandership and its affiliated unites, in addition to completion of its required facilities and equipment.

The members also discussed the strategic dialogue and cooperation between GCC countries and the United States in line with the outcomes of the Camp David meeting, which include promoting and enhancing the military and defense strategic partnership with Washington to ensure stability in the Gulf region.

127,408 ELIGIBLE VOTERS IN 4TH CONSTITUENCY

KUWAIT: The total electorate for the upcoming elections due on November 26 stands at 483,186, including 230,430 males and 252,756 females. The number of eligible voters in the fourth constituency had reached 127,408 with 67,914 females. The current figure is an increase by 13.723 voters which is around 2.84 percent from the numbers registered in the previous elections in July of 2016. The fourth constituency represent 26.36 percent of the total number of voters nationwide.

Voters of this constituency are residents of 18 areas: Farwaniya with 5,346 (including 2,253 females), Al-Ferdous with 17,643 (including 8,900 females), Al-Omariya with 5,225 (including 2,652 females), Al-Rabiya with 5,750 (including 2,941 females), Al-Rigaie and Al-Andalous with 8,197 (with 4,846 including females), and Jleeb Al-Shuyoukh with 4,922 (including 2,244 females).

The constituency also consists of Sabah Al-Nasser with 7,679 (including 4, 643 females), Al-Rehab with 1,677 (including 4,107 females), Al-Adhailiya with 20 male voters only, Al-Aradhiya with 13,468 (with 7,544 females), Ishbilya with 1,488 (including 738 females), Abdullah Al-Mubarak with 4,014 (including 1,754 females), new Jahra area with 23,857 (including 13,304 females), Al-Sulaibiva and government housing areas with 2,061 (including 1,842 females), Saad Al-Abdullah city with 4,416 (including 1,742 females), and Jahra and Al-Bar with 19.215 (including 10.081 females). No voters were registered in Al-Shidadiya and Saihad Al-Awazim.

Education

Candidates of the fourth constituency for the National Assembly elections for the 15th legislative term, slated for 26 November 2016, are predominantly have high levels of education. About 48 percent of them 40-49 years old. Out of the total 116 nominees of the constituency, as the registration ended for the race, there are 68 (58.62 percent) with university degrees; nineteen (16.37 percent) carry diplomas; eighteen (15.51 percent) are high school graduates, and ten (8.62 percent) completed the intermediate school.

Among the 68 nominees with academic degrees, 11 have PhDs in education, law, family medicine, accounting, business administration, political science, and teaching methodology. Twelve nominees have MAs in military sciences, economy, law, libraries, information documents, Islamic studies, strategic management, environmental engineering, and psychological and educational guidance.

Forty-five BA holding nominees studied history, aviation science, law, social work, electronic engineering, electrical engineering, architectural engineering, surgery, economic geography, accounting and political sciences. The 19 candidates with diplomas are specialized in business administration, electronic engineering, military sciences, police science, or studied at the Religious Institute.

As for the candidates of the fourth constituency in the 2013 parliamentary elections, they were 114; Fiftyfive of them (48-24 percent) had university degrees; Twenty (17.45 percent) had diplomas; Thirty-one (27.19 percent) were high school graduates, and seven (6.14 percent) candidates completed the intermediate school. Among the 55 nominees with university degrees, 10 had PhDs in e-government, modern history, Figh (Islamic jurisprudence), strategic philosophy, philosophy of business administration, education, political science, economy and oral and dental surgery.

Thirteen candidates with MAs were qualified in management, public law, international and diplomatic relations, project management, military sciences, Islamic studies, fundamentals of education, and business administration.

BA nominees, 32, were specialized in in physical education, medicine, surgery, law, science, Sharia, education, sociology, business administration, social work, law, and civil engineering. The twenty diploma candidates studied fire science, military sciences, police science, electronics, business administration, engineering, civilian aircraft maintenance, medical emergencies, and aviation science.

2012 elections

In the 2012 elections, candidates of the Fourth Constituency were 97. Nominees with university degrees hit 44 (45.36 percent), the same figure of the ones with diplomas and the high school graduates together, 22 candidates (22.68 percent) and 23 (23.71 percent) respectively. Predominantly, most candidates were 40-49 years old. Eight candidates (8.24 percent) completed the intermediate school.

Nine of the 44 nominees with academic degrees had PhDs in economy, business administration, information management, distance learning, philosophy, mechanical engineering, medicine, leadership, education policies, and sociology. Nine nominees studied law, teaching methodology, quality management, military sciences, public law, and international relations.

Twenty-six BA holding candidates were qualified in the Arabic language, law, education, Sharia, political science, economy, business administration, accounting, commerce, social work and industrial engineering.

The 22 nominees with diplomas had were specialized in military sciences, management, secretarial work, health sciences, mechanical engineering, electronics, medical emergencies, social work, technology, safety and security, and accounting, or studied at the Teachers' Institute.

Age

In terms of age, 56 of the Fourth Constituency nominees for the 2016 elections are 40-49 years old, 48.27 percent of the total candidates. Forty-seven (40.5 percent) were 50 years old or over, and 13 (11.20 percent) were 30-39 years old.

In the 2013 elections, 53 candidates (46.49 percent) were 40-49 years old; 46 ones (40.35 percent) were 50 vears old or over; fifteen nominees (13.15 percent) were 30-39 years old. Candidates for the 2012 elections. included 50 nominees (51.54 percent) were 40-49 years old; 26 ones (26.80 percent) were 50 years old or over; and twenty-one nominees (21.64 percent) were 30-39 years old. — KUNA

THE 'SILENT MAJORITY': A **TRUMP CARD IN ELECTIONS**

KUWAIT: It is interesting to see with every parliamentary elections that there are some people who are 'silent' and not interested in voting for candidates, and if they do vote they would surely turn some tables. Candidates try their best to bring those silent people and lure them to vote and exercise their right for the upcoming parliamentary elections of November 26 in order to determine the nature of the next parliament through adoption of numerous realistic programs that cope with the current pressing regional, domestic and international issues, besides meeting ambitions of this segment.

Such group of people are called differently in every country, where some call them the 'Silent Majority', 'Hesitant or Negative' and in Egypt they are called the 'Couch Party'. This category of silent people are estimated between 10-50 percent according to semi-official statistics as their participation is linked to their mood, timing of the elections and to the nature of issues being addressed on the political and media arenas.

Nonexistent

Political researcher and academician Dr Ayed Al-Mannaa said that the silent majority in its political approach does not exist in Kuwait, however, there is a large number of people who have no interest in politics or in elections, but can make a change in the elections. He added that such group is also found in the rest of the world and is becoming a target for candidates once they decided to break their silence and take part in presidential or parliamentary elections' process.

Manaa attributed their rejection to take part to psychological, political and religious matters or to the failure of politicians to reach out for them and lure them into participating. He said that such hesitant or silent group could heavily impact the elections and determine the identity of the next parliament should they decide to go ahead and vote. He pointed out that the single-vote system has given a big incentive for the voter, a matter that prompted candidates to seriously think of snatching votes of all with no exception.

Negative

Meanwhile, Professor of Political Sociology Dr Mohammad Al-Rumaihi said that the concept of silent majority has a negative consequence on the entire society and on the political reality in particular, saying such a group has no interest in politics and does not want to contribute to it. He asserted the role of the individual to actively take part in the development of the country, chiefly in the political process, calling for selecting the best candidate. —KUNA

KFSD ON ALERT TO GUARANTEE SMOOTH PARLIAMENT ELECTIONS

KUWAIT: The Kuwait Fire Service Directorate (KFSD) has that they had issued 120 licenses for electoral headquarters, made all arrangements and preparations for the National Assembly (parliament) elections due on November 26. Head of the Hawalli Fire Department Brigadier Mohammad Al-Mahmeed, who is also KFSD's General Coordinator for the National Assembly Elections, told KUNA that all precautions are taken to supervise the democratic process with cooperation with all concerned bodies.

The KFSD will distribute its fire engines on schools used as ballot stations since they open early in the morning until the official results are announced, Mahmeed said yesterday. He stressed that they are always on alert and have made maximum preparations to deal with any emergencies, around the clock. He also hoped that the elections would proceed smoothly, urging all parties to cooperate with the Directorate's staff to provide due protection for all.

Meanwhile, Deputy Director General for Prevention Sector at the KFSD, Brigadier Khalid Abdullah Fahad, said

Ramadan added that following a period of dry weather since October, the Wasm rainfall would exceed 30 mm and would help annual desert plants bloom. Ramadan forecast western, eastern and central Saudi areas, Kuwait, Bahrain, Qatar, UAE and Iraq will receive rain from Nov 23 until Nov 28 or 29, sometimes accompanied by thunder.

Housing units

Statistics issued by the Public Authority for Housing Welfare (PAHW) yesterday said the total number of housing units distributed since the beginning of the government-provided housing scheme is 128,639, including 60,608 houses, 66,563 residential land plots and

1,468 apartments. Statistics also showed that the total number of units distributed in the Mutlaa residential project so far is 11,338.

Investigation

Kuwait Nursing Association secretary Sami Obaid Al-Mutairi urged Health Minister Dr Ali Al-Obaidi to refer the head of the nursing staff at the chest diseases hospital to investigation over the growing number of complaints filed against him by nurses, accusing him of injustice and abuse. Mutairi said that the head nurse was very partial in terms of night shifts and off days. He added he also listed certain female nurses on overtime lists while they were actually dispatched on official missions, while others who really deserve overtime were deprived of it. "He only favors his nearest and dearest," said Mutairi, calling for officially investigating the matter.

AFRICA ACTION SUMMIT KICKS OFF IN MARRAKESH

MARRAKESH: The Africa Action Summit kicked off in Marrakesh, Morocco, yesterday, on the sidelines of the 22nd session of the Conference of the Parties (COP 22) to the UN Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC).

First Deputy Prime Minister and Foreign Minister Sheikh Sabah Al-Khaled Al-Hamad Al-Sabah is attending the summit as Representative of His Highness the Amir Sheikh Sabah Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah. The summit, hosted at the Royal Palace in Marrakesh, was called for by Moroccan King Mohammed VI, and is attended by several country leaders and heads of state.

It adds the momentum to the structural initiatives and projects seeking an effective confrontation of the impact of climate change on the continent, in addition to developing a model for sustainable development that responds to the expectations of the African peoples.

During an African tour last week, the Moroccan Monarch called in the Senegalese capital of Dakar for a summit on the fringe of COP 22 to crystalize a vision for defending the demands of the continent, focusing on financing and transfer of technology. Africa has been among the world regions worst-hit by the effects of climate change, the Monarch said, vowing to develop the COP 22 (Marrakesh, November 7-18) as a conference for the continent. Addressing the COP 22 on Tuesday, His Highness the Amir reiterated Kuwait's commitment to joining in supporting the efforts exerted by the UN to combat climate change. Kuwait has voluntarily put well-studied plans, based on scientific and economic research, within its available possibilities, to rehabilitate its oil installations, as its oil sector seeks to adopt a new strategy, founded on scientific and economic grounds, that aim to limit emissions, His Highness the Amir added. His Highness the Amir stressed that Kuwait is about to complete the constitutional procedures for the ratification of the Paris Agreement on Climate Change. —KUNA

DECISIONS ON TEACHER'S ALLOWANCES: OFFICIAL

KUWAIT: The Ministry of Education (MoE) is committed to paying the rent allowance difference to female expat teachers retroactively as per a Civil Service Commission (CSC) decision, MOE's Assistant Undersecretary for Financial Affairs Yousif Al-Najjar stressed. "MoE is an executive body and the ruling made by the constitutional court is mandatory and unquestionable," he said, strongly denying that the ministry is manipulating teachers. He was referring to a court ruling which ordered the ministry to pay female expatriate teachers the same allowance paid to male teachers.

"We have a decision from the CSC on adjusting expat female teachers' rent allowance from KD 90 to KD 150 retroactively at a total cost of KD 47 million," he explained, noting that MoE has asked the finance ministry to provide the sum but has not received any response yet. "The due sums will be paid sooner or later," he added, further indicated that if not paid this year, they would be paid next year after the new budget is approved in April. "This decision has nothing to do with reducing the rent allowance to KD 60," he remarked, referring to the CSC's recent decision this year to cut the monthly allowance back by KD 90.

Najjar said that the amount would be paid as soon as the money arrives from the finance ministry and that the teachers should not sue the ministry or be abused by law firms urging them to do so and waste their money, as their rights are protected by law. "MoE was not a party in the case filed by a teacher against the CSC decision, who later got a constitutional court ruling annulling it, and accordingly, CSC decided paying the difference to all expat female teachers retroactively since 2011," he explained, promising expat female teachers will get their rights in full.

FIVE MEN ARRESTED FOR 'ILLEGAL' WASTE DISPOSAL

KUWAIT: Criminal detectives arrested five persons who appeared in video footage posted online while dumping trash in the stables area, which is a crime punishable by law. The suspects, four Egyptians and one Syrian, were sent to concerned authorities for further legal action.

Separately, the public cleanliness and road occupancy department at Jahra Municipality branch removed all camps that were pitched in off limits areas in Sulaibiya. The public relations department said in a statement that tours by the Municipality continue to take such actions, as 101 camps have been removed so far.

Meanwhile, the vegetable market municipality center carried out several inspection campaigns in Shuwaikh that included stores, butcher shops, supermarkets and co-ops, resulting in issuing 49 citations that varied between selling food items without health certificates, working in restaurants without health licenses and employing a worker before receiving a health certificate.

n the early 1980s, my son Mohammed was preparing for his master's degree in the US, so I visited him in Colorado to check how his studies were going. It was Ramadan and we were fasting. "A female classmate is going to cook iftar for us today. Would you like to come along?" my son asked me, and I replied "Of course," because I was getting fed up of restaurant meals. "What is your colleague's name," I asked, and he told me Maasouma Al-Mubarak.

We went over after sunset and found that she had cooked a purely Kuwaiti meal including pudding, dumplings and stew with dried black lemon on top. "Where did you get the dried lemon from in America?" I asked. She told me that there was even a greater surprise. "The meat you are eating is a young lamb that we slaughtered to eat for iftar," she told me. We enjoyed the taste of Maasouma's sheep and thanked her warmly.

Years after that evening, she called me here in Kuwait. "I am Maasuoma. Do you remember me?" she asked, and I instantly said yes. "How can I forget you after eating your sheep in America?" I said, and she giggled for long, before asking me to introduce her to the then minister of social affairs and labor, the late Hamad Al-Rujaib. I took her to his office and made her wait until I saw him first. In his office, the minister forgot his position and started recalling our past memories together, when we used to act onstage together. "Do you remember when I asked you what you had for lunch and you told me that you had bread and rice?" he asked me.

Our meeting went on for long, before I told him that a citizen outside wished to meet him. She was ushered in and discussed what she wanted, and we both left happily. Several years later, she became a minister, and I paid her a visit in her office to congratulate her and give her a present on the occasion. We too reminisced about our memories in the US and the sheep we ate.

Getting up to leave, she insisted on seeing me off till the front door despite my protests that I was merely a citizen and she was a minister. "You are more important than a minister," she told me. Maasouma in fact followed the Prophet's (PBUH) hadith, when he said that Allah had chosen Islam for us and asked us to fully observe good manners and be generous to make it complete. She did display good manners by seeing me out and was generous when she fed me a sheep for iftar in the US. —*Translated by Kuwait Times*



Medical facilities have regularly been hit, and sometimes completely destroyed, in the government's fight against rebels, though Damascus and Moscow deny they have targeted hospitals. The Observatory also reported strikes in Idlib province, in northwestern Syria, where six people were killed in the village of Kafr Jalis on Tuesday night.

Food aid runs out in Aleppo

"We worked through the night to lift the debris and remove the martyrs and surviving civilians, and now we're trying to remove the rubble blocking the roads," said Yahya Arja from the White Helmets civil defense in the province.

The bombardment ended a period of relative respite, particularly in eastern Aleppo, where Moscow halted air strikes on October 18 ahead of a series of brief ceasefires. The ceasefires were intended to encourage residents and

Authorities were eager to show off what they describe as democracy "with Chinese characteristics", with officials ushering dozens of reporters into a polling station in Xingfu, in central Beijing. Voters filled out their pink ballot papers in front of officials, ignoring a screened-off area labeled "Secret Balloting Place".

Chinese law states that anyone over 18, who has not been stripped of their political rights, can stand for election and vote. "Ethnicity, gender, party, residence, economic situation, there are no limits," crowed Liu Xiancai, who heads the Xingfu election office. But Ye's experience was different. Candidates must be backed by 10 people or nominated by their workplace to stand. But official elec-

BEIJING: When Chinese voters go to tion committees ultimately decide who gets on the ballot. "The government can't let someone like me be a candidate," Ye said. "I would express my own thoughts. When the people's congress opens session, I would cast an opposition ballot."

Tightening control

Ye's platform was simple: better controls on traffic, more elder care facilities, and making it easier for constituents to contact their delegates. But her seemingly innocuous ideas provoked a strong reaction from local police, who closely monitored her behavior and prevented her meeting foreign media. The authorities' response to Ye indicates how China is tightening controls on even anodyne political expression, said Yaxue Cao of Chinachange.org, a US-based website advocating for increased democracy.

A key meeting of top Communist leadership in October called for increased ideological discipline and warned ruling party members against criticizing the official line. In a pyramidal system, the elected local representatives choose municipal delegates, who choose provincial legislators, who in turn select members of the national parliamentwhich is widely expected to hand Communist party General Secretary Xi Jinping a second term as president in 2018. — AFP

Once Syria's economic powerhouse, Aleppo has been ravaged by the war that has killed more than 300,000 people across the country since it started in March 2011 with anti-government protests. Assad ally Russia intervened in September last year in a bid to bolster the government, and on Tuesday said its forces were launching a "major operation" in Idlib and central Homs province, targeting IS and former Al-Qaeda affiliate Fateh al-Sham Front.

But the bombardment has been criticized by both the UN and Washington, with the General Assembly's human rights committee voting overwhelmingly on Tuesday to condemn escalating attacks on civilians. Washington said it had received reports that the latest bombing raids had damaged civilian infrastructure in rebel areas. "We strongly condemn the resumption of air strikes in Syria by the Russians as well as the Syrian regime," State Department spokeswoman Elizabeth Trudeau told reporters. "The most recent reported attacks are on five hospitals and one mobile clinic in Syria. We believe it's a violation of international law.

Assad open to Trump alliance

Washington was an early backer of the uprising against Assad, and has supported the rebels fighting his government. But that could change under the next administration, with Assad telling Portugal's RTP state television on Tuesday that he welcomed Trump's campaign comments suggesting Washington's involvement in Syria should be focused exclusively on fighting jihadists.

We cannot tell anything about what he's going to do, but if ... he is going to fight the terrorists, of course we are going to be ally, natural ally in that regard with the Russian, with the Iranian, with many other countries," Assad said. Washington already leads an international coalition carrying out strikes against IS in Syria and Iraq, but it does not coordinate with Damascus and Assad's government has condemned it as ineffective.

The coalition is supporting an operation by the Kurdish-Arab alliance known as the Syrian Democratic Forces to capture the IS bastion of Raga. "We are advancing even though IS is mining the villages as they flee," SDF commander Rodi Derik told AFP yesterday in the village of Tuwaylaa, recently captured from IS. — AFP

ISRAEL GIVES INITIAL BACKING TO BILL TO LEGALIZE SETTLER HOMES

JERUSALEM: The Israeli parliament gave initial approval yesterday to a bill to legalize thousands of West Bank settler homes, a measure drawing international anger and posing the government's biggest test since 2015 polls.

The measure, which would apply to an estimated 2,000 to 3,000 Jewish homes in the occupied West Bank, requires three more full parliamentary votes to become law. There have been reports that a behind-the-scenes compromise could see the bill now stall. The vote in the Knesset, or parliament, was 58-50. Prime Minister Beniamin Netanyahu initially opposed the bill, fearing an international backlash and legal implications, but voted in favor vesterday.

Netanyahu faces pressure to hold his right-wing coalition together and not be seen as moving against the powerful settler movement. There has been speculation that the bill could even cause the government to collapse-though a number of analysts caution that a compromise seems more likely for now.

The bill has been pushed by hardline members of Netanyahu's coalition who defied his pleas not to move forward, while the country's attorney general says it will never hold up in court. But those who support it say the move is urgently needed to protect a Jewish outpost in the occupied West Bank called Amona.

The outpost, where some 40 families live, is under a high court order to be demolished by December 25 because it was built on private Palestinian land. The bill however goes far beyond legalizing Amona and would allow an estimated 2,000 to 3,000 Jewish homes in the West Bank built on Palestinian land to be legalized.

Palestinian landowners would be offered compensation in exchange, but Attorney General Avichai Mandelblit says the move would undermine private property laws. US President Barack Obama's administration says it is "deeply concerned." "This would represent an unprecedented and troubling step that's inconsistent with prior Israeli legal opinion and also break longstanding Israeli policy of not building on private Palestinian land," State Department spokeswoman Elizabeth Trudeau said.

The international community considers all Israeli settlements in Israeli-annexed east Jerusalem and the West Bank to be illegal, whether they are authorized by the government or not. The Israeli government differentiates between those it has approved and those it has not. The progress of the bill, approved earlier by a committee of ministers on behalf of the government, has demonstrated the power of the settler movement.

Netanyahu's government is seen as the most right-wing in Israeli history, and key

members of his coalition advocate annexing most of the West Bank while openly opposing the idea of a Palestinian state.

Opposition leader Isaac Herzog, who heads the Labor party, said the bill contravened Israeli and international law while justifying "theft."

Hardliner 'dictated agenda'

Education Minister Naftali Bennett, who heads the hardline Jewish Home party and has been the driving force behind the bill, has made no secret of his position. Last week after the election of Donald Trump as president in the United States, he called for the end of the idea of a two-state solution to the Israeli-Palestinian conflict, the basis of years of negotiations.

He said "the era of a Palestinian state is over." Netanyahu's government currently controls 66 of the 120 seats in parliament. Finance minister Moshe Kahlon, whose centre-right Kulanu party holds 10 seats,

has been key and had initially threatened not to vote. In the end, he voted for Wednesday's initial backing but said he would withdraw support in the future if it "harms" the country's high court.

The statement was a reference to Amona and the high court ruling against it signaling that the bill could stall in the future if the outpost is not removed from it.

Some Israeli analysts have spoken of the outsized power Bennett has accumulated with the help of the settler movement, saying it could seem Netanyahu was serving in his cabinet rather than the other way around. Bennett's party has only eight seats in parliament. But both men have little interest in new elections for now, a number of analysts said. "Bennett knows that it will be difficult to have a government more right-wing than the current one," a government official told AFP on condition of anonymity. —AFP

IRAN'S TOP LEADERS MOVE TO CALM **CONCERNS OVER TRUMP ELECTION**

TEHRAN: Iran's two top leaders - its president and the country's supreme leader both sought yesterday to calm concerns in Iran over the future of Tehran's nuclear deal with world powers in the wake of Donald Trump's election for US president

President Hassan Rouhani said the country will remain committed and loyal to the deal, regardless of the outcome of the US election. Supreme Leader Ayatollah Ali Khamenei said Iran was indifferent to the result of the US vote, insisting the Iranian nation was "not worried" about the future and was ready for any fallout from the US election.

Trump's much publicized criticism of the nuclear deal and his campaign vows to renegotiate the terms and increase enforcement of the deal that put off the threat of Tehran developing atomic weapons has sent jitters across Iran. "If a president is changed here and there, it has no impact on the will of Iran," Rouhani said in a speech broadcast live on state TV from the city of Karaj, where he was visiting. "Based on the deal, we implement our commitment."

World is not controlled by one entity

Without mentioning Trump by name, Rouhani said that "the world is not under the will of a single individual and party. The reality of the world will impose many things on extremists." "Nobody should imagine it is possible to play with Iran," he added. The deal, which went into effect in January, forced Iran to pull back from the brink of nuclear weapons capacity in exchange for an end to many of the US and

European sanctions that crippled Iran's economy.

Iran has denied that the sanctions affected its economy in any way. It has been largely respected despite undiminished US-Iranian tensions throughout the Middle East, including their support for rival sides in Syria and Yemen's civil wars.

Trump's exact plans on the nuclear deal are vague but any renegotiation would be difficult - Iran has no incentive to reopen talks over a deal it is satisfied with. And none of the other countries in the sevennation accord has expressed interest in picking apart an understanding that took more than a decade of stop-and-go diplomacy and almost two full years of negotiations to complete.

Iran's supreme leader, who has final say on all state matters in Iran, said in remarks on state TV that Iran was indifferent to Trump's election victory. "We neither mourn nor cheer because it makes no difference to us. We do not have any judgment on the election," Khamenei said. "We are also not worried. And we are ready for any possible incident."

'The Unites States is the same country and over the past 37 years any of the US major parties that came to power brought us no good, while their evil was always directed toward the Iranian nation, Khamenei added.

Iran and the US have had no diplomatic relations since 1979, when militant students stormed the US Embassy in Tehran, took 52 Americans hostage and held them for 444 days after Washington refused to hand over Iran's toppled shah, Mohammad Reza Pahlavi, for trial in Iran. —AP



MOUNTING CASUALTIES IN TORN CITY

MOSUL: Foreign medics are helping Iragi special forces personnel treat a growing number of children wounded by intense urban warfare inside the jihadist-held city of Mosul. Car bombs, sniper fire and booby traps have led to mounting casualties in the east of the city, where advancing Iraqi troops are battling Islamic State group fighters.

Three foreign medics working with the Academy of Emergency Medicine, a Slovakian charity, have teamed up with more than a dozen Iraqi special forces medical personnel to treat wounded civilians and soldiers. Their sparsely equipped field clinic is set up in an open courtyard on the only route out for fleeing civilians.

Fewer than a dozen green cots are organized into rows, flanked by two ambulances and several crates of gauze, intravenous drips, and other medical supplies purchased with donations to AEM. Slovakian medic Marek Adamik says most of the casualties he has treated have been from makeshift bombs or sniper fire-some "directly targeted with head shots."

The charity's country manager, Peter Reed, has just finished tending to the first civilian casualty of the day, a young girl in pink pyjamas with a shrapnel wound to her riaht lea.

Sporting a thick, strawberryblond beard, the former US Marine says he came to Iraq in 2015 to join the fight against IS. But after months without seeing combat, Reed began treating wounded Kurdish peshmerga fighters before "realizing there's a need for civilian treatment on the front lines."

'Kids are the worst'

In the space of just three days this week, AEM and Iraqi medics treated a 12-year-old whose right leg was nearly blown off by a mortar round, a scrawny boy hurt when he picked up a mine, and a girl Derek Coleman, 27, guzzle down wounded in a car bombing that killed her entire family.

"Kids. Kids are the worst," Reed says, shaking his head. "Adults and small children stay inside. Kidsespecially boys-like to go outside and be adventurous." Wounded civilians are brought to the field clinic in the back of pick-up trucks or on the hoods of armored Humvees. It is still too dangerous for their few ambulances to make the one-kilometer journey to the front line.


AEM staff and Iraqi paramedics work together to stop bleeding or dress wounds, with Reed often barking orders in English that a stocky Iraqi man translates to his colleagues. Urgent cases-like the young mortar fire victim-are transported by ambulance to hospital in Arbil, the Kurdish regional capital, some 80 kilometers to the east.

To relax after treating patients, Reed and fellow American medic

energy drinks and munch on chocolate. "I ended up here as a foreign fighter, and then I saw there was a need for medical (work)," Coleman, from New Jersey, says.

Lifting his grey baseball cap to pat down his messy chestnut hair, he tells AFP he is bracing himself for a wave of civilian casualties as Iragi troops push deeper into Mosul. "Also, if there's no fighting to keep Daesh busy, they may have more opportunity to target civilians," he adds, using an Arabic acronym for IS that its members consider pejorative.

Reed, Coleman, and Adamik spend all day with Iraqi first aiders, then bed down with them in a nearby abandoned home to the sound of intermittent gunfire or shelling. Even on slow days, they look worn out by the afternoon. "Less patients mean you remember certain ones much more vividly,"

jihadist-held Mosul and recaptured neighborhoods inside the city, but a month into their offensive, there are still weeks or more of potentially heavy fighting ahead.

Iraq launched the massive operation to recapture Mosul, which has been held by the Islamic State group since 2014, on October 17, advancing on the city from the north, east and south. Iraq's elite Counter-Terrorism Service and regular army soldiers have retaken areas on its eastern side from IS, but forces on other fronts have yet to enter the city. "Fighting inside of the city is likely to grow increasingly more difficult as the (Iraqi forces) progress through Mosul's more modern eastern neighborhoods towards its older, denser centre," said Patrick Martin, an Iraq analyst at the Institute for the Study of War.

The jihadists' "use of tunnels, human shields, suicide car bombs, and other attack capabilities will become harder to counter as fighters are forced into closer quarters by the nature of the city's geography," Martin said.

But Michael Knights of the Washington Institute for Near East Policy cautioned that the nature of IS defenses deeper in the city remains unclear. "We don't know if the current fighting represents the most heavily fortified (and) defended neighborhoods or a precursor to the toughest fighting" in the old

BAGHDAD: Iraqi forces have broken into city, Knights said. "We could be fighting through a hard crust with a soft inside, or it could be all hard," he said.

Third of eastern Mosul retaken

The United States has said that hundreds of IS fighters have been killed since the offensive began, but those figures cannot be independently confirmed. Iraqi forces have not released information about their casualties. Interior ministry spokesman Saad Maan has said that more than a third of eastern Mosul has been retaken, but that would still leave a significant part of the east and all of the west-which is expected to put up the toughest resistance-in IS hands.

Iraqi Kurdish forces played a role in the early days of the Mosul operation, but said after recapturing the town of Bashiga to the city's east that their offensive participation in the battle is over. Interior ministry forces, including the elite Rapid Response Division, as well as soldiers on the southern front have had the longest way to go to reach Mosul, but they are now nearing the airport on its southern outskirts.

A US-led coalition is carrying out air and artillery strikes in support of Iraqi forces, and said it has targeted the jihadists with thousands of bombs, missiles, rockets and shells. —AFP

IS TIGHTENS GRIP IN SYRIA BASTION RAQA AS ASSAULT NEARS

BEIRUT: Internet cafes closed down, travel bans and new checkpoints: residents say jihadists are trying to tighten their grip on power in Raga as US-backed forces near the Islamic State group's Syrian bastion.

A Kurdish-Arab alliance called the Syrian Democratic Forces (SDF) began an operation to recapture the northern city on November 5. Since then, residents say IS has tried to seal its stronghold off from the outside world, imposing a media blackout on the city's population of more than 300,000.

The flow of information into and out of Raga had already been restricted since January 2014, when IS seized the city from rebels who had captured it from regime forces in March 2013. Since the jihadist group took over the provincial capital, only a handful of outsiders have been able to maintain contact with Raqa residents.

They include Britain-based monitor the Syrian Observatory for Human Rights and activist group Raqa is Being Slaughtered Silently (RBSS). RBSS formed secretly in April 2014 to show the world what was happening inside the city, and has documented life there despite a terrifying backlash from IS, which has murdered its activists in Raga and even in Turkey.

Through RBSS, AFP made contact with several people still inside Raqa, who spoke under pseudonyms and described an atmosphere of growing paranoia among the city's jihadist rulers. Musa, 31, said IS was carefully controlling access to news on the US-backed campaign to oust the jihadist group from Raga.

"Because of the heavy restrictions imposed by Daesh on the internet and satellite dishes, it's very difficult to find out what's happening in the battle for Raqa," Musa said, using an Arabic acronym for IS.

"We rely on what we're told by people who do manage to follow the news online-but that is very difficult to do, and very dangerous."

Close surveillance

It is risky to even discuss the battle, he said. IS only allows "rumors that they are advancing and inflicting losses on the other side, who will fail to enter Raga, as they put it", said Musa.

Any discussion of IS losses could result in arrest and even execution by the jihadists, he said. IS has long restricted access to the internet in territory under its control, banning private routers and allowing only a handful of internet cafes to function under close surveillance.

Residents say even permitted cafes are frequently raided to prevent customers accessing banned content. Since the SDF assault began, IS has closed several internet cafes in the city and erected new checkpoints, 22-year-old activist Ahmed said. "I go online now and then and surf on certain pages-but very, very carefully because of the restrictions Daesh puts on internet cafes," he said. Meanwhile, IS produces a steady stream of victorious propaganda, saying "they are killing and blowing up the Kurds".

IS has imposed an extreme interpretation of Islam

on Raqa, executing those who break the group's rules. The jihadists' de facto Syrian capital has been the scene of some of the group's most horrifying acts of violence, as well as a hub for foreign fighters it has attracted from around the world.

Trying to escape

Residents have long been prevented from leaving Raga without IS permission, but in recent months it has become impossible, said Abu Mohamed, another activist with RBSS who spoke from outside the city. Abu Mohamed said many residents want to flee. "But if their plans are discovered, they are arrested and their money is confiscated, and the smugglers trying to help them will be executed," he said.

He described two families who recently tried to escape with their children, terrified of intensifying USled coalition air strikes and the jihadists' growing paranoia, but were captured shortly after leaving. The men were imprisoned and the families' money and identity documents were confiscated, he said. Analysts say the fight for Raqa is likely to be long and complicated.

The SDF says it will involve two phases: the first to besiege the city, and the second to enter and recapture it. But tensions over which forces will lead the final battle and the risk of civilian casualties are likely to hinder progress. Musa said he was waiting impatiently to be rid of IS's "occupation". "Liberation is the dream of all the free people of Raga," he said. —AFP

MAVERICK MACRON ENTERS FRENCH PRESIDENTIAL RACE

PARIS: Political outsider Emmanuel Macron joined the increasingly unpredictable race for France's presidency yesterday, vowing to take on "the same men and the same ideas" that dominate national politics.

Macron, a 38-year-old former economy minister, announced as widely expected that he will stand as an independent in next year's vote, backed by his centrist movement "En Marche" ("On the Move"). Never elected and "neither of the left or the right" in his own words, the pro-business and techsavvy former investment banker is hoping to shake up a race dominated by older, more familiar faces. "We have entered a new era," Macron declared yesterday, referring to a crisis for Western democracies as well as the dangers of global warming and growing inequality. "We can't respond with the same men and the same ideas," he added at a news conference held symbolically at a jobs training centre in a gritty Parisian suburb.

The centre-right Republicans party is tipped to win the two-stage election in April and May. But some analysts are questioning such assumptions after Donald Trump's stunning upset in the United States.

Macron's entry adds another element of uncertainty, with the Republicans and ruling Socialist parties yet to nominate their candidates less than six months before the voting. The resurgent far-right National Front under leader Marine Le Pen, who announced her slogan "In the name of the people" yesterday, is seeking new momentum after Trump's win.

Dismissing Macron as "a candidate of the banks", she said yesterday that "there is undeniably a new world emerging and there is an old order that is collapsing in on itself." Her new campaign headquarters are close to the presidential palace on one of Paris' most expensive streets, leading her to joke about having to travel "only 1.7 kilome71-year-old former prime minister with one of the longest CVs in French politics.

Juppe is favored over ex-president Nicolas Sarkozy and former prime minister Francois Fillon for the Republicans' nomination, but polls are tightening ahead of primary voting this Sunday and next. Macron has a mere two years' experience in government, serving as a sometimes rebellious economy minister from 2014-2016 and as an economic advisor to his one-time mentor. President Francois Hollande. "I believe that the French people won't put their destiny in the hands of someone with no experience," Fillon said yesterday.

But Macron believes youth and inexperience are assets in a country weary of a political class blamed for years of low growth, high unemployment and mounting government debt. "Our political system is blocked," said the high-flying graduate of elite universities who wrote a thesis on Machiavelli, the famously scheming Italian political theorist.

Macron, who quit Hollande's government in August, threw new barbs at his ex-boss vesterday. "I've seen the emptiness of our political system from the inside," he said. Macron is left-wing on social issues, pledging to bring jobs to deprived areas and a defender of public services, but also probusiness, notably as a vocal critic of France's strict labour laws. A maverick in politics as well as in his private life, the accomplished pianist is married to his former schoolteacher, a divorcee with three children who is some 20 years his senior.

Unpopular president

President Hollande, who has yet to announce whether he will run in next year's election, is reportedly furious at what he sees as betrayal by his one-time protege. The president called Tuesday for "cohesion" and "uniting" in the divided Socialist party. Hollande is one of the most unpopular pres idents since World War II after a five-year term marked by multiple terror attacks, stubbornly high unemployment and Uturns on key policies. He was widely panned, even by his own prime minister, after agreeing to collaborate for a tell-all book published in October in which he criticised ministers, judges and the national football team. —AFP

DITCH CLASS TO PROTEST TRUMP FIGHTING TO THE END

STUDENTS IN WASHINGTON, NY

WASHINGTON: Hundreds of students in Washington ditched school Tuesday to protest against US President-elect Donald Trump, marching through the heart of the US capital before descending on the White House.

They joined youth across the country who have staged similar walkouts since Trump's shock victory on November 8, carrying signs with messages like "spread love," "my black is beautiful" and "make America gay again." The young protesters marched across the Mall, the grassy esplanade that runs from the Capitol to the Lincoln Memorial.

Anna, a 17-year-old immigrant from El Salvador, said she was "uncertain about my future." "I'm worried that when this man gets into office we won't be safe on the streets anymore." Trump has pledged to end Barack Obama's Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals policy protecting youth like Anna who arrived in the country illegally as children. But the presidentelect has not indicated whether ending the program would result in the deportation of those already enrolled.

"Even if we don't make a difference, we'll know that we fought to the end," she said.

Wearing a shirt with the phrase "Nasty Woman"-a nod to Trump's "such a nasty woman" dig aimed at Clinton during the final presidential debate-Nell called Trump "an extremely dangerous man in an extremely powerful position." "There's so much anger and frustration because it's not fair-almost everyone here who's protesting can't vote," the 13-year-old said.

"This is their way of showing that there needs to be a change and that things aren't right."

'Get out of my swamp'

Eva, 16, said the protests gave hope for the future. "You're looking at it," she said, motioning to the hundreds of rallying students as they marched toward the White House, Trump's future residence. She hoisted a poster that said "Get out of my swamp"-a reference to Trump's vow to drain Washington of corruption.

She said candidates in the next election need "to do a better job of actually talking to people who are disaffected, who are upset. "There needs to be more work in small towns." Hundreds of high school students also demonstrated in New York Tuesday morning outside Trump Tower, protesting in the pouring rain as the president-elect huddled inside with Vice presidentelect Mike Pence to nail down cabinet appointments. "No Ku Klux Klan, no fascists, no racists" the students

shouted in turn, alternating their cries with: "Say it loud, say it clear, refugees are welcome here."

Some in the crowd shouted "My body my choice," giving voice to concerns about reverses on women's rights to abortion under Trump, who has vowed to put prolife justices on the nation's high court. POLICE SEARCH FOR MOTIVE IN KILLING OF AIRPORT WORKER

OKLAHOMA CITY: Oklahoma City police are investigating why a man waited to gun down an airline employee outside Will Rogers World Airport in a deadly ambush that forced hundreds of travelers to take shelter and prompted authorities to shut down the state's busiest airport for hours.

Later Tuesday, police discovered the suspected shooter dead from an apparently self-inflicted gunshot wound inside a pickup truck in a parking garage near where they believe he waited, watching airport employees come and go before shooting and killing Michael Winchester, 52, a Southwest Airlines employee. "We do believe this was a premeditated act against the victim," said Oklahoma City Police Capt. Paco Balderrama. "This was not random, and obviously the investigation is ongoing."

scramble at the airport, with police immediately closing the sprawling complex and asking passengers inside to seek cover.

They diverted incoming flights and refused to give already-loaded aircraft permission to leave. There were concerns the gunman might have entered the terminal and mingled among passengers or employees. "We have a heightened level of security all the time. These people have access to aircraft so we're very concerned about that," airport spokeswoman Karen Carney said.

Winchester - whose address is listed as Washington, Oklahoma, about 35 miles south of the airport - was a former University of Oklahoma football player whose son James is a player for the Kansas City Chiefs. The NFL team tweeted Tuesday night: "Our love and support is with James and the entire Winchester family Southwest Airlines canceled flights out of the city for the remainder of the day even though the rest of the terminal reopened. Hundreds of people were stranded inside the terminal for more than three hours before officers began letting them leave slowly. Carney said about 300 people were held on aircraft away from the terminal after their planes landed ahead of a ground stop. Police found the suspect's red pickup truck on the second floor of a public parking garage about

three hours after the shooting and used a robot to determine the suspect was dead, then gave an allclear. The airport handles between 7,000 and 8,000 passengers daily for Alaska, Delta, Southwest and United airlines and has a separate terminal that serves as a transfer center for federal inmates. A jet carrying inmates to the transfer site was allowed to land while the rest of the airport was shuttered.

Video from a television station helicopter showed what appeared to be a pool of blood about 100 feet from the airport's employee parking area - and about 100 yards from the airport's ticket counters and departure area.

While airports have high security, Balderrama said he didn't know whether surveillance cameras might show the shooting. Balderrama initially said police had received reports of a possible second victim but no one was found. Michael Winchester was a punter on the University of Oklahoma's 1985 national championship team. "Our hearts are truly heavy for the entire Winchester Family. Mike was a former Sooner student athlete as was his son James/daughter Carolyn," the school's athletic director, Joe Castiglione, tweeted Tuesday afternoon. He added "daughter Becca was also a student athlete. Please keep this beautiful family in your prayers" in a later tweet. —AP

OBAMA URGES 'COURSE CORRECTION' ON GLOBALIZATION

ATHENS: Globalization has brought many economic benefits to the world but needs a "course correction" to address growing inequality, US President Barack Obama said yesterday on his European farewell tour.

Obama spoke during a visit originally planned as a valedictory lap, but which has become focused on reassuring jittery allies after the shock election victory by Donald Trump, a staunch critic of free trade agreements. "The global path of globalization demands a course correction," Obama said in an eagerly-awaited speech in Athens, before continuing his journey to Berlin. "When we see people, global elites, wealthy corporations seemingly living by a different set of rules, avoiding taxes, manipulating loopholes... this feeds a profound sense of injustice," he added.

During the trip, the outgoing president has repeatedly referred to the anger that lately brought success to populist movements in Europe and the United States, such as the Brexit referendum and Trump's shock victory last week.

In comments Tuesday Obama cautioned the world must guard against "a rise in a crude sort of nationalism or ethnic identity or tribalism that is built around an 'us' and a 'them". European governments, especially eastern countries close to Russia's orbit, have been shaken after Trump appeared to call into question Washington's near 70-year security guarantee by saying he would only help NATO allies if they paid their way. Trump welcomed Britain's shock vote in June to leave the European Union (EU) and has been a critic of global free trade agreements.

However, Obama was at pains to stress that Europe-and NATO-would remain the

cornerstone of US foreign policy. The USled NATO grouping is "absolutely vital" to US interests and a strong, unified Europe was good for America and the world, Obama said in comments aimed at reassuring old partners. "We know what happens when Europeans start dividing themselves up... the 20th century was a bloodbath," he said pointedly on Tuesday.

Following his speech, the president will head to Germany to visit Chancellor Angela Merkel, whom he has described as "probably... my closest international partner these last eight years." During his time in Berlin, he will also huddle with the leaders of Britain, France and Italy, as Europe desperately seeks clues to future US policy in a Trump world. While Obama has generally been welcomed in Greece, there were some who came out onto the streets in protest. —AFP

SOUTH AFRICANS PROTEST AGAINST RACISM IN COFFIN ASSAULT CASE

MIDDELBURG, SOUTH AFRICA: Two The video shows a man cowering and white South Africans accused of forcing a black man into a coffin and threatening to set him on fire appeared before a judge yesterday as demonstrators protested against racism outside the courthouse.

Members of the ruling African National Congress party and opposition parties gathered outside the court in Middelburg in Mpumalanga province, where the judge postponed the case against the two detained farmers until Jan. 25. The two men said they did not apply for bail because they would fear for their lives if released, the African News Agency reported.

A video showing the racially charged incident has circulated on social media, intensifying debate about South Africa's legacy of white minority rule, which ended in 1994.

moaning in a coffin as a tormentor pushes part of the lid over his head and upper body. A man is also heard threatening to pour gasoline in the coffin. Another threat is to put a snake in the coffin.

The assaulted man, Victor Rethabile Mlotshwa, said the two men accused him of trespassing on their farm after he used a footpath in the area. "The next thing, there was a grave and then a coffin. There was nothing I could do because the other man had a gun," Mlotshwa said, according to the News24 media organization.

Protesters at the courthouse included members of the Economic Freedom Fighters, an opposition party that wants land held by the white minority to be redistributed to poor blacks. "They still benefit out of a crime, a crime against humanity," Mbuyiseni

Ndlozi, a spokesman for the opposition group, said of the white minority. He said it was wrong to forgive whites after apartheid but "still keep them in a position of dominance."

South Africa won praise for reconciliation efforts among racial groups when apartheid ended, but many black South Africans express frustration that they have failed to reap the economic benefits they expected from democracy. The income of the average white household is six times that of a black household, according to 2011 census data.

The foundation of F.W. de Klerk, South Africa's last apartheid-era president, said the assault on Mlotshwa was dehumanizing and humiliating. "We hope the justice system will reach an outcome that restores a measure of dignity to Mr. Mlotshwa," the foundation said. —AP

BALKAN WEAPONS TRAFFICKED WEST STILL A 'MAJOR PROBLEM'

MICRO-TRAFFICKING AT ITS BEST

BELGRADE: A year after jihadists used weapons manufactured in Serbia to gun down victims in Paris, Balkan countries are struggling to end the scourge of illegal arms trafficking. The killers who opened fire at the Bataclan theatre, cafes and restaurants in the French capital last November used Yugoslav-era assault rifles produced by Serbia's Zastava Arms.

Months earlier the Kouachi brothers, behind the deadly assault on the Charlie Hebdo magazine offices, carried a rocket launcher from the Balkans, a region littered with weapons since the wars of the 1990s. According to a top French magistrate, Robert Gelli, Serbian citizens come up in nearly a third of international arms trafficking probes carried out in France. "The weapons getting through to western Europe and the effects they have is still a major problem," said Ivan Zverzhanovski, who leads a UN Development Program project in the Balkans to help combat illegal

arms trafficking. The international monitoring project Small Arms Survey said in late 2014 that an estimated 3.6 million to 6.2 million firearms were in the hands of civilians in the Western Balkans, a region home to less than 25 million people.

In Serbia alone there are between 200,000 and 900,000 unregistered weapons, according to authorities, despite various amnesty campaigns launched since the assassination of reformist prime minister Zoran Djindjic in 2003. yesterday, the interior ministry announced its biggest weapons haul in at least 16 years, which led to the arrests of 10 people. Police in Serbia's northwest seized arms including 111 hand grenades, 12 anti-tank grenades, two rocket launchers, 10 rifle grenades, 10 automatic or semi-automatic rifles, six pistols, 6,000 bullets and dozens of kilos of explosives.

In neighboring Bosnia, "it is a fact that... there are weapons that are not under control and traffickers buy these weapons," Security Minister Dragan Mektic told news portal Klix.ba recently, stressing that the problem existed across the region.

Micro-trafficking

Zverzhanovski told AFP that, based on information from law enforcement agencies, a gun bought for 250 to 500 Euros on the Balkan black market could sell for 3.000 to 5,000 Euros in a country such as Sweden.

The weapons are rarely transported by the truck-load but a few at a time, in private cars or the countless buses that link the Balkans with western Europe. Some are sent in pieces to be reassembled later and some are even sent by post, experts say. Smuggling on this micro-scale makes the problem difficult to tackle. "Until now, no serious groups of arms traffickers have been dismantled in Bosnia," said Jasmin Ahic, an analyst from

Sarajevo's faculty of criminology. The arms have their roots in communist Yugoslavia, where large stockpiles were kept across the federation for use by civilianstaffed "territorial defense" units, designed to defend against a surprise foreign attack.

They ended up deployed in inter-ethnic civil war as the federation collapsed, while more weapons were smuggled into the region to build up armies in the face of international sanctions.

'Turning point'

Such arms went untracked in the chaos of conflict until resurfacing again on the streets of Aachen, Stockholm or Paris, where 130 people were killed in the attacks on November 13, 2015. "The Paris attacks were a turning point on many levels," said Zverzhanovski, referring to growing cooperation within the EU and between Balkan law enforcement agencies.

Serbian and French officials signed an accord in October to form joint teams to investigate arms smuggling, and Belgrade's prosecutor for organized crime Mladen Nenadic said "determination and clarity" were needed to tackle the problem.

KENYA DELAYS CLOSURE OF DADAAB **REFUGEE CAMP BY SIX MONTHS**

NAIROBI: Kenya said yesterday it will delay by six months the closure of the Dadaab refugee camp, the world's largest, after calls by the UN and aid groups to postpone it on humanitarian grounds.

Interior minister Joseph Nkaissery said the move follows a request from the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR) to delay the dismantling of the camp, originally planned for this month. It has now been pushed back to May. "I wish to announce that the government has accepted the request to extend the deadline for the completion of the repatriation of Somali refugees and the eventual closure of Dadaab refugee complex by six months," he told a news conference. Nkaissery said a comprehensive repatriation programme would be rolled out next month at the camp, which is home to hundreds of thousands of mostly Somali refugees. "The repatriation will continue to be carried out in a humane, safe and dignified manner," he said. The government announced in May that the vast Dadaab camp in north-east Kenya would be shut down, citing security concerns. Since sending troops into neighbouring Somalia in 2011, Kenya has come under repeated attack from Shabaab, East Africa's longtime branch of Al-Qaeda.

"Delaying the closure of the camp by six months is certainly better than deporting the refugees in two weeks. But with the new date ... the refugees will continue to feel that they must leave," said Gerry Simpson, a researcher at rights group Human Rights Watch (HRW).

In April, 5,000 police officers were mobilized in all former Yugoslav republics in a 48-hour Interpol-led operation-but it resulted in the seizure of just 40 firearms and six kilos of explosives, along with 22 arrests, according to Bosnian police.

According to Zverzhanovski, efforts are "still relatively ad hoc, case-based," and the EU needs to help to build the capacity of Balkan police forces, along with plying political pressure on the region to deal with illegal possession. "This is the moment to tackle it, before these countries come into the EU," he said, noting that Croatia's efforts on firearms dropped off significantly once it joined the bloc. —AFP

'Forcible returns are illegal'

Nairobi has taken a hardline position, claiming Dadaab acts as a terrorist training ground for Shabaab Islamists, and has

end its threats to close Dadaab and the UNHCR and donors must press Kenya to publicly reassure the Somali refugees and tell them that they are welcome in Kenya until they are able to return home safely."

In September HRW warned in a report that the repatriation of Somalis from the sprawling Dadaab camp violated international standards and that refugees were returning home involuntarily only to face persecution and hunger. The Kenyan government dismissed the report. Refugees will be returning to a country that already has over one million people displaced from their homes, where five million lack enough food and where African and Somali forces are still fighting Al-Qaedaaligned Shabaab militants.

An estimated 18,000 have returned this year — 10,000 since the announcement of the camp's closure. The vast majority of residents of the Dadaab complex of camps close to the Kenya-Somalia border fled Somalia's more than two-decade-long conflict. Many remain fearful of returning to a country where insecurity remains rife. — AFP

PUTIN WITHDRAWS RUSSIA FROM **INTERNATIONAL CRIMINAL COURT**

MOSCOW: Russian President Vladimir Putin signed a decree yesterday to withdraw Russia from the International Criminal Court, which rules on such grave charges as genocide and crimes against humanity.

Russia in 2000 signed the Rome treaty that established the Hague-based court but never ratified it. Putin's decree, published on the Kremlin's website, comes a day after the UN General Assembly's human rights committee approved a resolution condemning Russia's "temporary occupation of Crimea" and blamed Russia for rights abuses such as discrimination against some Crimean residents, such as Tatars.

Russia annexed Crimea in March 2014 from Ukraine following a hastily called referendum, a move that led to crippling Western sanctions. A separatist insurgency erupted in eastern Ukraine the following month, backed by Russia.

The ICC on Monday issued a preliminary report where it described what happened in

Crimea as "an international armed conflict between Ukraine and the Russian Federation." His spokesman, Dmitry Peskov, explained the withdrawal by "national interests" and argued

that since Russia never ratified it Wednesday's decree was just a formality. Peskov also dismissed the ICC's accusations of an "armed conflict" in Crimea, arguing that Crimea joined Russia after a legitimate popular vote.

Russia's foreign ministry insisted in a statement that Russia wants everyone implicated in grave international crimes to face justice but expressed frustration over the court's work in recent years. "The court has unfortunately failed to match the hopes one had and did not become a truly independent and respected body of international justice," the ministry said, adding that in the ICCs' 14 years of work "only four verdicts" have been passed while \$1 billion was spent on expenses.

Just hours before Russia's announcement, the UN human rights chief made a spirited defense of the ICC, entreating countries not to leave it. Several African nations have recently announced plans to leave the treaty. Jamey Keaten in Geneva contributed to this report. —AP

UKRAINE CALLS FOR VISA-FREE TRAVEL AS EU DRAGS ITS FEET

KIEV/BRUSSELS: The Ukrainian parliament called on the European Union yesterday to grant the former Soviet republic visa-free travel, a day before the bloc is due to debate the matter, with sources pointing to hesitation on the side of Germany and France.

Ukraine has been the heart of a dispute between the West and Russia since Moscow annexed the Black Sea peninsula of Crimea in the spring of 2014 and went on to back rebels in a war against government troops in the east of the country. The EU and United States have since imposed sanctions on Moscow and sought to build closer ties with Kiev, though they have also grown annoyed with Ukraine's slow progress on reforms and fighting corruption. Torn by growing eurosceptic and anti-migrant sentiment, the bloc has also gone cool on delivering a key reward to Kiev: dropping visa requirements for visiting Ukrainian citizens. "They have invited us to the large European building but tell us to wipe our feet. We wiped them once, we wiped them the second time, changed the shoes, put on slippers but are still standing in front of a closed door," said Leonid Yemets, a Ukrainian lawmaker with the People's Front group. "Now it's up to you dear EU staff and bureaucrats. If you are not able to deliver on your commitments then, excuse me, but neither you

nor we... need such a Europe." Germany and France led the drive to hold off any new visa waivers before the EU beefs up an emergency mechanism to suspend free-travel agreements if needed. The bloc is wary of any repeat of a 2015 influx of some 1.3 million refugees and migrants, and leaders fear appearing soft on immigration following Britain's vote to leave the EU and the U.S. election of Donald Trump as president. —Reuters

CAN SENEGAL STOP CHILD BEGGING, TRAFFICKING BY ISLAMIC TEACHERS?

DAKAR: Dressed in ill-fitting football kits and covered in dust and dirt, dozens of young boys chatter, laugh and chase a ball as Maimouna Balde leafs through a list of names. When a scuffle breaks out between two boys, Balde instantly steps between the former child beggars in the yard of the shelter for abandoned children in Senegal's capital, Dakar. "It is tough here - many of the boys have been beaten by their teachers and forced to live on the streets," the head of the Ginddi centre told the Thomson Reuters Foundation, reading a file listing boys as young as five and notes on various abuses.

Many of these children, known as talibe, are sent by parents in Senegal or trafficked from neighbouring countries such as Guinea-Bissau to Islamic schools, called daaras, where they are expected to receive food, shelter and teachings from the Koran.

But tens of thousands of children in daaras across the West African nation are forced to beg in the streets to make money for their teachers, called marabouts, said rights groups such as Human Rights Watch (HRW) and Anti-Slavery International (ASI). These influential Islamic figures, respected and even feared by communities and politicians, punish their pupils if they fail to bring in some 2,000 CFA francs (\$3) per day, activists said.

Alongside a drive to take the talibe off the streets, the state is considering a law to regulate daaras - seeking to raise teaching standards and eliminate trafficking and forced begging. Yet activists are concerned that the

clout of marabouts may hold back efforts to protect children in the Koranic schools as Senegal wrestles with its identity amid a rising tide of Islamist militancy in the region.

Many people in the Muslim-majority but staunchly secular West African nation are asserting their cultural and religious identity over Western values in response to growing anti-Islam sentiment in Europe and elsewhere, said Sarah Mathewson of ASI. "This extends to marabouts feeling excluded from Senegal's education system, which operates in French," she said. "They must be integrated and supported if things are to improve."

Marabout Mafia

Many of the talibe arriving at the Ginddi centre are sick and traumatised, according to staff at the state-run shelter, which works to reunite children with their families. President Macky Sall in June ordered the removal of children from the streets and said those who force them to beg would be imprisoned in a drive to end a practice estimated by the United Nations to generate \$8 million a year for Koranic teachers in the capital.

Yet fewer than 1,000 talibe of more than 30,000 in Dakar have been swept off the streets to date, with marabouts hiding them away or dressing them smartly to evade detection, said the state's national director of child protection Niokhobaye Diouf. "Many disappeared after Sall's announcement ... hidden by the crooked people who profit from their begging," Diouf said. —Reuters



FORMER UN CHIEF KOFI ANNAN 'DEEPLY CONCERNED' OVER MYANMAR VIOLENCE

YANGON: Former UN chief Kofi Annan has expressed "deep concern" over violence in Myanmar's Rakhine state where the military killed dozens of people over the weekend, sending hundreds of Rohingya fleeing to Bangladesh.

The military has locked down a strip of land along the border, an area largely home to the oppressed Muslim minority, since deadly raids on police posts last month. The army says troops have killed nearly 70 people as they hunt the attackers, who they say are radicalised Rohingya militants with links to overseas Islamists.

Activists say the toll could be much higher, accusing troops of shooting unarmed civilians, raping women and torching homes, but the army has stopped independent observers from investigating the claims.

Annan called for an end to the bloodshed in a statement released as seven members of a commission he heads on Rakhine held talks with local officials in state capital Sittwe. "I wish to express my deep concern over the recent violence in northern Rakhine State, which is plunging the state into renewed instability and creating new displacement," he said in a statement late Tuesday. "All communities must renounce violence and I urge the security services to act in full compliance with the rule of law."

villages hit by the unrest. The US is also "concerned Trudeau said in Washington, urging the government to allow a "credible and independent investigation".

Days of apparent calm were shattered over the weekend when troops killed more than 30 people in two days of fighting that saw the military bring in helicopter gunships for the first time. The surge in fighting sent around 200 Rohingya fleeing to the Bangladesh border, according to community leaders, who said they have been left stranded after border guards pushed them back.

150,000 without aid

One commander said the group, which arrived on Monday, was the largest number of Rohingya pushed back since violence erupted in Rakhine in early October. Some 15,000 people have been displaced by the unrest and 150,000 from the deeply impoverished area have been without humanitarian aid for more than a month, according to the UN Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs.

The resurgence of violence in Rakhine has deepened a crisis that has already threatened to derail to the new administration led by democracy activist Aung San Suu Kyi. The democracy champion appointed fellow Nobel laureate Annan to oversee a commission charged with finding ways to heal wounds in the poor western state.

Rakhine has sizzled with religious tension ever since waves of violence between the majority Buddhist population and the Muslim Rohingya left more than 100 dead in 2012. — AFP

PAKISTAN'S TOP DIPLOMAT SAYS HE WILL VISIT INDIA

ISLAMABAD: Pakistan's top foreign affairs official has said he plans to visit India next month for a regional conference, the first high-profile visit since tensions spiraled between the archrivals after a deadly attack on an Indian army base.

Sartaj Aziz, adviser to Pakistan's prime minister Nawaz Sharif and de facto foreign minister, said he will attend the Heart of Asia conference on Afghanistan, to be hosted by India in December, "to defuse the tension". "We want to prove that Pakistan is with the multilateral process by attending the Heart of Asia Conference as Afghanistan is our top priority," he told reporters in Islamabad on Tuesday.

It was not immediately clear if he would hold any bilateral talks with Indian officials during the visit. The decision came after months of surging tensions between the nuclear-armed neighbors sparked by a September attack on an Indian base in disputed Kashmir, which killed 19 soldiers and which New Delhi blames on Pakistan-based militants.

Tensions reached dangerous levels as India said it had retaliated to the raid by carrying out "surgical strikes" across the heavily militarized border, sparking a furious reaction from Islamabad, which denied the strikes took place. There have since been repeated outbreaks of crossborder firing, with both sides reporting deaths and injuries including of civilians.

India also sought to isolate Pakistan in the wake of the militant raid, pulling out of a key South Asian summit set to be held in Islamabad in November in a major snub. Other countries scheduled to attend the South Asian Association for Regional Cooperation (SAARC) summit followed suit, eventually forcing Islamabad to cancel it entirely.

In his comments Tuesday, televised by Pakistan's biggest private TV channel GEO, Aziz condemned India for that decision. Kashmir has been divided between India and Pakistan since the end of British colonial rule in 1947. Both claim the Himalayan territory in full and have fought two wars over the mountainous region. — AFP

killed six people in Kabul yesterday in an attack targeting a minibus with security agents working for the government. The Islamic State affiliate in Afghanistan promptly claimed responsibility for the bombing.

Sediq Sediqqi, an Interior Ministry spokesman, said four civilians and two members of the agency were killed. The attack also left 13 people wounded, including five members of the security force.

The blast destroyed the minibus and another car, which were quickly towed away as security forces sealed off the site of the suicide attack on a wide Kabul boulevard. An Afghan security official, who spoke on condition of anonymity because he was not authorized to speak to the media, said the bomber intentionally targeted the minibus with the members of the agency that provides protection for

to the US Secret Service.

The attack was the second this year against the agency. In April, a coordinated Taleban assault using a suicide truck bomb and gunmen killed 64 people at the agency's main compound in Kabul. The Afghan IS affiliate claimed responsibility for vesterday's attack in a posting on a website used by the militants, saying an IS bomber attacked intelligence service employees. In other violence, a man was killed late

Tuesday night when a sticky bomb attached to his car detonated in Kabul, the city's police said. The police said the vehicle belonged to a government ministry office in charge of rural development.

The Islamic State group emerged for the first time last year in Afghanistan as an offshoot of the militant group fighting in Irag and Syria. Analysts believe the IS affiliate in the country is mostly made up of disenfranchised Taleban fighters. — AP

KHAIRPUR TAMIWALI, PAKISTAN: Pakistan's

prime minister and powerful army chief traveled yesterday to a strategic area along the border with India to observe a drill meant to display the country's military might amid escalating tensions with New Delhi over the disputed Kashmir region.

Prime Minister Nawaz Sharif and Army Chief Gen. Raheel Sharif watched the exercise dubbed "Strike of Thunder" and complete with planes, tanks, artillery and other heavy weapons - to test the army's preparedness.

The drill, in the Khairpur Tamiwali desert area near the district or Bahawalpur, came three days after Indian fire in Kashmir killed seven Pakistani soldiers in a new escalation between the two nuclear-armed rivals.

Trading fire The two sides have traded fire repeatedly in

recent weeks across the Line of Control, which divides the Himalayan region into India- and Pakistani-controlled zones. Both Pakistan and India claim Kashmir in its entirety.

Pakistan's army chief has less than two weeks before retirement after his three-year term. The government has not yet named his successor. In a speech at the drill, Pakistan's prime minister paid a glowing tribute to the armed forces and reiterated his government's commitment to fighting terrorism.

Nawaz Sharif also issued a veiled warning to India, saying that Pakistan would deliver a "befitting response" to any hostile enemy action. The latest escalation was set off by a deadly

September attack on an Indian military base in the Indian-controlled part of Kashmir. India has blamed Pakistan-based militants for that attack and others, a charge Pakistan denies.

Tensions have run high since Indian troops killed a Kashmiri militant leader in July. The killing ignited some of the most violent protests in years, and dozens of people have been killed in India's resulting crackdown. Despite pleas from the United Nations, the two sides have continued to exchange fire in Kashmir. The violence has forced thousands of villagers on the Pakistani side to flee for safety. India says it has been retaliating for Pakistani violations of a 2003 cease-fire. Two of the three wars between India and Pakistan since 1947 have been fought over their competing claims to Kashmir. — A

GERMAN CABINET BACKS CONTINUED MILITARY MISSION IN AFGHANISTAN

BERLIN: Chancellor Angela Merkel's cabinet yesterday approved the continuation of Germany's deployment of up to 980 soldiers to Afghanistan through the end of 2017, a government spokesman said. The decision, which must still be approved by parliament, came less than a week after armed Taliban militants stormed the German consulate in the northern Afghan city of Mazar-i-Sharif and killed at least four Afghans and wounded more than 100 people. "With up to 980 soldiers, the German army will in future advise, support and train Afghan security services," said the government in a statement.

Germany, which heads the NATO-led Resolute Support mission in northern Afghanistan, has its soldiers stationed on the outskirts of Mazar-i-Sharif, and another 150 soldiers in Kabul.

The NATO mission includes a total of 13,000 foreign troops from Germany, Italy, the United States and others. The NATO forces are focused on training the Afghan army and police, not combat operations. Germany is also slated to provide up to 1.7 billion Euros in civilian aid to Afghanistan through 2020. — Reuters

PAKISTAN ORDERS 400 TURKS TO LEAVE AHEAD OF ERDOGAN'S VISIT

ISLAMABAD: Ahead of a visit by Turkey's president, Islamabad ordered 400 Turkish nationals affiliated with a chain of international schools in Pakistan to leave the country within 72 hours, officials said yesterday.

The move was announced on the website of the Pak-Turk International chain of schools and colleges, and confirmed by two school officials. Both officials spoke on condition of anonymity, saying they feared for their safety when they return to Turkey.

Turkish officials have accused the school of being affiliated with the movement of US-based dissident cleric Fethullah Gulen. Erdogan arrived in Islamabad later yesterday for a two-day visit and was received by Pakistani Prime Minister Nawaz Sharif and his family.

The Turkish leader has accused Gulen supporters of staging a failed July 15 coup attempt. His government later seized hundreds of social, educational and health care facilities and sacked thousands of employees on suspicion of working for Gulen. The Pak-Turk International operates 28 campuses throughout Pakistan. Of those being asked to leave, 108 are staff members and the rest are family members.

Erdogan welcomed Pakistan's decision at the Ankara airport before leaving for the trip, praising Islamabad for showing solidarity with Turkey against Gulen's movement - which Turkey has designated a terror organization. "They moved rapidly in the direction of ending the (Gulen movement's) presence in Pakistan and toward thwarting their attempts at unrest," Erdogan said.

"As you know, Pakistan has asked persons linked to the organization to leave the country by Nov. 20. This is very pleasing for us."

One of the Pak-Turk school officials denied that the institution was in any way related to Gulen. He said school was registered locally and fulfilled all local legal requirements. The other official said the school will challenge the decision because it wasn't possible for so many people to leave on such short notice. Both officials said the expulsions will not hinder the day-to-day func-

tioning of the school, since the vast majority of the 1,500 staff members are Pakistani.

Erdogan said Turkey's educational authorities would help Pakistan overcome any problems the expulsion may cause. "We will do whatever we can to ensure that there is no void or suffering as a result of the ouster of this organization from the country," he said. A Pakistani Interior Ministry spokesman did not immediately respond to requests for comment from The Associated Press. — AP

The petition was filed by lawyer Hani Hussein and former MP Abdulhameed Dashti, both of whom were disqualified by the election committee along with 45 other candidates. The ruling means that the committee, formed by the interior minister of judges, is legal and its decisions of barring and accepting election candidates are in line with the law.

Hussein however said that this ruling is not the "big surprise" verdict that could delay the Assembly elections. Hussein reiterated on his Twitter account that yesterday's ruling is not related with the other case that will be heard on Sunday, but he declined to reveal the nature of that case. The election committee's decisions to bar Hussein and Dashti have been upheld by the administrative and appeals courts and are widely expected to be supported by the court of cassation, whose rulings are final. Dashti's registration had been rejected by another court because he failed to submit his nomination papers in person because he has been outside the country for the past several months claiming he was undergoing medical treatment. In another development, leading opposition figures contesting the election yesterday urged voters not to vote any member of the dissolved Assembly, because they completely surrendered to the government against the interests of the Kuwaiti people. "We hope that the reformist MPs will be the majority in the next Assembly... The Kuwaiti people will emerge victorious in the election," former Islamist opposition MP Bader Al-

Dahoum said at the election rally of Islamist candidate and former MP Jamaan Al-Harbash.

Speaking at the same rally, former opposition MP Shuaib Al-Muwaizri said the country is facing a very dangerous period. "It is a choice between living in a state of masters and slaves or in the state of the rule of law," Muwaizri said. Harbash said Nov 26 is a day of rage against what the government and former Assembly members did against the opposition. "We are in a bottleneck. I tell them the response is coming and the Kuwaiti people will send you a clear message," he said.

"The former 'bogus' MPs will fail. We will change the face of the Assembly and will reclaim the Assembly chamber," Harbash vowed amid wild applause from the hug crowd. The former lawmaker did not rule out the possibility of the new Assembly getting dissolved, but he insisted this will not change the opposition's resolve. He said that since 2006, it has been one election after another. "They want you to get frustrated from the election process, but we will not be," he said. "Today, we are fighting against the funds they are pumping (in the election). Do not vote for any member of the previous Assembly. We have accepted the challenge and on November 26, they will hear the response of the Kuwaiti people," Harbash insisted. Both Harbash and Dahoum said they will vote for Muwaizri as the next speaker if they get elected. Muwaizri, in addition to former MPs Abdullah Al-Roumi and Ahmad Al-Mulaifi, have said they will contest the speaker's post against outgoing speaker Marzouq Al-Ghanem, triggering a key battle in the next Assembly.

OXFORD DICTIONARIES NAME 'POST-TRUTH' WORD OF YEAR

LONDON: The Oxford Dictionaries chose "post-truth" as their word of the year yesterday, saying its use had spiked because of the Brexit vote in Britain and the rise of Donald Trump in the United States. "Post-truth has gone from being a peripheral term to being a mainstay in political commentary," the Oxford Dictionaries said in a statement, noting that usage had increased by 2,000 percent since last year. The publisher defined the word as "relating or denoting circumstances in which objective facts are less influential in shaping public opinion than appeals to emotion and personal belief".

"It's not surprising that our choice reflects a year dominated by highly-charged political and social discourse," said Casper Grathwohl, president of Oxford Dictionaries. "Fuelled by the rise of social media as a news source and a growing distrust of facts offered up by the establishment, 'post-truth' as a concept has been finding its linguistic footing for some time. "We first saw the frequency really spike this year in June with buzz over the Brexit vote and again in July when Donald Trump secured the Republican presidential nomination."


The runners-up for words of the year included the British term "Brexiteer" used for anti-EU advocates. "Altright" also made the shortlist, defined as an ultra-conservative grouping in the United States "characterized by a rejection of mainstream politics and the use of online media to disseminate deliberately controversial content". Trump's appointment of anti-establishment media firebrand Steve Bannon, seen as a leader of the "alt-right" movement, as his chief of staff earlier this week has proved highly controversial. — AP

BIG DREAMS FOR PRO-TRUMP SITE BREITBART

The far-right news site Breitbart helped send Donald Trump to the White House with no-holds barred opinions and incendiary headlines that drew fire from mainstream media and pundits. Now, it seems, it wants to take that movement global. Growing out of its origins as a community of conservative bloggers, Breitbart News Network mirrored the tone of Trump's campaign with provocative and sometimes inaccurate claims, drawing criticism as racist, xenophobic and worse.

Breitbart, whose chairman Steve Bannon has been tapped for a key White House post after helping to mastermind Trump's campaign, outperformed many media outlets to get the fourth largest number of "engagements" by internet users on election night, according to the analytics group NewsWhip. Breitbart has signaled its intention to expand its global footprint, with sites expected in France and Germany after moving into Britain and supporting the Brexit movement.

The site, created by the late conservative commentator Andrew Breitbart, makes its impact with bare-knuckled headlines that mix opinion and sometimes stretched facts. Some examples of Breitbart stories are "Gay rights have made us dumber, it's time to get back in the closet," "There's no hiring bias against women in tech, they just suck at interviews," and "Science proves it: Fat-shaming works." Breitbart was among the outfits cited for the "worst journalism" of 2014 by the Columbia Journalism Review for erroneously reporting that the nominated attorney general Loretta Lynch had been a lawyer for Bill Clinton - and failing to correct the mistaken report that was based on another lawyer named Loretta Lynch.

Welcome to France

Breitbart did not respond to an AFP interview request or query about its expansion plans. But a leader of France's farright National Front said Tuesday that she welcomed reported plans by the group to expand and support the party's presidential campaign. "All alternative media are generally positive. Donald Trump is the demonstration of that... they're among the useful tools," said Marion Marechal-Le Pen, whose aunt Marine is the leader of the National Front. Placing Breitbart's chief in the White House could create some awkward situations and potential conflicts of interest, according to some analysts. Former Breitbart spokesman Kurt Bardella - who quit earlier this year - told The New York Times Bannon's role will mean Breitbart will be "as close as we are ever going to have - hopefully - to a state-run media enterprise." Angelo Carusone of the left-leaning watchdog group Media Matters for America, also predicted Bannon's role will create a difficult diplomatic position for the Trump administration if Breitbart is "supporting foreign movements while his government is engaging with those governments." Ken Paulson, a former USA Today editor-in-chief who is dean of the college of media and entertainment at Middle Tennessee State University, said it's not clear what the rise of Breitbart and other partisan news outlets means for the mainstream media.



BANNON ROLE SETS OFF CRITICAL FIRESTORM

White supremacists and neo-Nazis have rarely, if ever, in recent history been so enthusiastic about a presidential appointment as Donald Trump's choice of Steve Bannon to be his chief White House strategist. Before he took over as chief executive of Trump's campaign in August and led it to victory last week, Bannon headed Breitbart News, a website and voice for the alt-right movement, a loose right-wing confederation that includes hardcore nationalists, neo-Nazis, white supremacists and anti-Semites.

Five days after Trump defeated Democrat Hillary Clinton, Trump rewarded Bannon, 62, a former Goldman Sachs banker and a Navy veteran, by appointing him senior counselor and chief strategist - jobs not subject to US Senate confirmation. Democrats, rights activists and minority groups were outraged and said Trump, himself accused of racism and misogyny during the campaign, had just flung open the White House doors to hatemongers. Many urged him to reconsider.

"Bringing Steve Bannon into the White House is an alarming signal that President-elect Trump remains committed to the hateful and divisive vision that defined his campaign," House Democratic Leader Nancy Pelosi said in a statement on Monday. "There must be no sugar-coating the reality that a white nationalist has been named chief strategist for the Trump administration," Pelosi said. The Southern Poverty Law Center, the Anti-Defamation League and the Council on American-Islamic Relations (CAIR) also denounced Bannon.

finest and most honorable people I've ever met" and not bigoted in any way. The Trump campaign had been struggling to manage Trump's unconventional candidacy when Bannon took over. He stayed behind the scenes and devised the strategy for the final days of the campaign that kept Trump on message and enabled him to upset Clinton in crucial states such as Michigan.

It was Bannon and Jared Kushner, Trump's sonin-law, who invited three women who accused Bill Clinton of sexual assault to attend a presidential debate in hopes of unnerving Hillary Clinton. Bannon, looking typically unkempt with mussed hair and stubbly chin, grinned from the back of the room as Trump and the women held their predebate news conference. "Bannon is a legitimately sinister figure," Ben Shapiro, who had been editorin-chief of Breitbart under Bannon, wrote in August on the dailywire.com conservative news website which he founded. "He is a vindictive, nasty figure ... He will attempt to ruin anyone who impedes his unending ambition and he will use anyone bigger than he is - for example, Donald Trump - to get where he wants to go," Shapiro wrote.

KUSHNER TO WIELD CLOUT

fter winning a primary election that effectively clinched the Republican presidential nomination, Donald Trump paused to laud a boyish-looking 35-year-old who ultimately proved to be an indispensable figure on the path to the White House. "Honestly, Jared is a very successful real estate person. But I actually think he likes politics more than he likes real estate,"Trump said of his son-in-law Jared Kushner, standing to his right during a victory speech after the Indiana party primary election in May. "But he's very good at politics."

Kushner, the slender, clean-cut New Jersey real estate scion who married Trump's daughter Ivanka in 2009, helped guide the Republican Trump to victory last week over Democrat Hillary Clinton and is poised to remain an influential adviser during his presidency. Kushner emerged as an important voice early in Trump's campaign, launched in June 2015. He was involved in almost every aspect of Trump's campaign, offering advice on key personnel decisions, strategy, speeches, fundraising and other areas. Late in the campaign, he began laying the groundwork for a possible Trump-run television network, in the event his father-in-law lost, according to a person familiar with the matter. Kushner spearheads his family's real estate development company, Kushner Companies, and is the publisher of the New York Observer weekly newspaper, which he acquired at age 25. While a federal anti-nepotism law prohibits a president from hiring family members to serve in his administration, Kushner is set to remain a key insider and trusted confidant. Reince Priebus, appointed Trump's White House chief of staff on Sunday, told NBC's "Today" show on Monday that Kushner "obviously" will be very involved in decision-making. Kushner serves on Trump's transition executive committee.

his brother-in-law, who had cooperated with prosecutors, by hiring a prostitute to have sex with him in a motel room, then sending a secretly recorded video of the encounter to the man's wife, Charles Kushner's own sister. In an unusual twist, the man who prosecuted Charles Kushner was Chris Christie, now the governor of New Jersey, who also has served as an adviser to Trump. Kushner is an Orthodox Jew whose wife, Ivanka, converted to Judaism before they married. The family keeps kosher, observes the Sabbath and attends an upscale synagogue on New York's Upper East Side.

Anti-Semitism Controversy

Steve Bannon, former head of the rightwing Breitbart News website, took a leadership post in the campaign in August after it became clear that Trump, his children and Kushner trusted his advice and analysis, a source said at the time. Breitbart News is closely associated with the "alt-right" movement, a loose online group of white supremacists, anti-Semites and others opposed to multiculturalism. Trump, who takes office on Jan 20, named Bannon as chief strategist and senior counselor on Sunday. Dana Schwartz, a Jewish reporter for Kushner's newspaper, in July criticized Trump for his Twitter post accusing Clinton of corruption using a Star of David image and a background of \$100 bills. Schwartz then wrote an open letter to Kushner after being deluged with anti-Semitic tweets. Schwartz asked Kushner, "how do you allow this? Because, Mr Kushner, you are allowing this. ... When you stand silent and smiling in the background, his Jewish son-in-law, you're giving his most hateful supporters tacit approval." Kushner responded by writing in the Observer, "In my opinion, accusations like 'racist' and 'anti-Semite' are being thrown around with a carelessness that risks rendering these words meaningless." He went on to write that his grandmother and grandfather survived the Nazi Holocaust while other relatives did not. "I know the difference between actual, dangerous intolerance versus these labels that get tossed around in an effort to score political points," Kushner wrote. Kushner became a major player in real estate in his mid-20s, after his father's conviction. At 26, he orchestrated what was the most-expensive single-building purchase in US history in 2006 with the \$1.8 billion acquisition of a 41-storey skyscraper at 666 Fifth Avenue in Manhattan. Kushner told The Real Deal trade magazine afterward, "In New York, you have to act quickly, or else you get left in the dust." —Reuters

"The real question is whether there will continue to be a market for well researched and balanced coverage that doesn't pander to one side or the other," he said. Paulson drew a parallel between Breitbart and early newspapers that were designed "to share a political philosophy and undermine political rivals."The site "feels very 18th century to me," he said.

'Masquerading' as Media

Jeff Jarvis, a City University of New York journalism professor who blogs on media, also described Breitbart last month as one of several "political movements masquerading as media." For Carusone, Breitbart appears to be "challenging global power structures, and the way they do that is by preying on racial anxieties." While Breitbart offers a "veneer" of being a media organization, he said, "they have no noticeable editorial standards or journalistic practices, they do function like a political organism." Bardella this year quit the organization, protesting that under Bannon's leadership it became "the de facto propaganda machine for Donald Trump" and filled with "hateful rhetoric". "Steve ran the site and controlled the content as a dictator. not only limiting the expression of his journalists but also purposefully changing the narrative to increase vitriol, playing to the fears of his readers," Bardella wrote in a column in The Hill newspaper.

Breitbart has lashed out at critics who allege it has links to extremists, and has threatened to sue one media outlet. In a statement to The Hill, the group said it "is preparing a multimillion dollar lawsuit against a major media company for its baseless and defamatory claim that Breitbart News is a 'white nationalist website."

On its site, Breitbart also hit back at claims Bannon is anti-Semitic. "The losers of the left have worked themselves into such a bizarre hysteria over the fact that they lost the White House that they have lost all connection to reality," said an article Monday by writer David Horowitz. "I can't think of anything stupider than the charge coming from all quarters of the left including a headline in the pathetically wretched Huffington Post - that Bannon is an anti-Semite." —AFP

Bannon, who grew up in a Democratic family, has a reputation of trying to tear down a Republican Party establishment that he deemed too soft and too entrenched. As a senior adviser to the Republican Trump, Bannon will be expected by far-right groups to champion their views and make sure that Trump, who takes office on Jan 20, keeps such campaign promises as building a wall on the southern US border, cracking down on Muslims entering the country and restricting the influx of Syrian war refugees.

"Perhaps'The Donald' is for real," Rocky Suhayda, chairman of the American Nazi Party, told CNN. David Duke, a longtime leader of Ku Klux Klan movements, and Richard Spencer, a white nationalist who runs the National Policy Institute, were among the leading alt-right figures to praise Bannon's appointment. In remarks published in the New York Times on Tuesday, Bannon ascribed his interest in populism and American nationalism to a desire to curb what he views as the corrosive effects of globalization. He rejected what he called the "ethno-nationalist" tendencies of some in the movement. "It's not that some people on the margins, as in any movement, aren't bad guys - racists, anti-Semites. But that's irrelevant," he told the Times.

Political commentator Armstrong Williams, a close associate of former Republican presidential candidate Ben Carson, said Bannon was "one of the

Anti-Semitism Accusations

While Bannon was at Breitbart, it had stories with headlines such as "Birth control makes women unattractive and crazy," "Political correctness protects Muslim rape culture" and "Hoist it high and proud: The Confederate flag proclaims a glorious heritage." The site's pro-Trump agenda featured speculative stories questioning Hillary Clinton's health and accusing her close aide Huma Abedin of being a Saudi spy.

Bannon was charged with domestic violence and battery in 1996 after his then-wife, Mary Louise Piccard, said he grabbed her by the throat and arm during an argument. The case was dropped when she did not appear in court. In 2007 Piccard said in court documents Bannon did not like the school the girls attended because it had too many "whiny brat" Jewish students.

Bannon had a varied and profitable career before joining Breitbart. He earned degrees from Virginia Tech, Georgetown University and Harvard Business School and served four years in the Navy. It was his Navy experience, he said, that led him to shed his family's Democratic allegiance and become an admirer of Republican Ronald Reagan.

He was at Goldman Sachs before starting his own investment firm, which specialized in media. Through negotiating a studio sale, he obtained a stake in the royalties for the popular television show "Seinfeld," a money-making powerhouse in syndication. He was an executive producer of the feature movies "Titus" and "The Indian Runner" before producing, directing or writing conservative-oriented documentaries such as "Clinton Cash" about the Clinton Foundation, "Generation Zero" about the global economic crisis of 2008-2009 and "The Undefeated" on former vice presidential candidate Sarah Palin. —Reuters

Following Father's Footsteps

Kushner is a Harvard graduate with a New York University law degree and a master's in business administration. Like Trump, Kushner followed in the footsteps of a real estate powerhouse father. His father, Charles Kushner, is a real estate developer, philanthropist and major Democratic donor whose reputation was left in tatters after a lurid criminal case. He was sentenced to two years in prison after pleading guilty in 2004 to 18 counts of tax evasion, witness tampering and making unlawful campaign donations.

MERKEL NEW 'LEADER OF THE FREE WORLD'?

The shock election of Donald Trump as US president has forced greater responsibility for defending Western values and interests onto German Chancellor Angela Merkel's shoulders, analysts say, with some even crowning her the new "leader of the free world". While the last decade has been defined by Britain, France, Germany and the US showing a largely united front on issues ranging from NATO affairs to defense of basic freedoms, the coming four years may present a more fragmented picture.

During his campaign Trump signalled a protectionist and anti-immigration stance, while Britain is preoccupied with securing its future outside the European Union after June's stunning referendum vote to exit the bloc. France's President Francois Hollande is grappling with record low ratings ahead of next May's election that could see far-right Marine Le Pen reaching the second round run-off vote.

Merkel, after 11 years at the helm, now looks increasingly like the only bulwark of stability and liberal freedom among Western allies. "Merkel... has suddenly become the most important leader of the free, democratic and liberal world," said the left-leaning TAZ daily. The historian and columnist Timothy Garton Ash agreed in an editorial for Britain's Guardian newspaper: "I'm tempted to say that the leader of the free world is now Angela Merkel." Rather than visit Britain - a natural stop for any US leader given the two countries' special relationship, US President Barack Obama was travelling yesterday to Berlin on his last official trip to Europe, in what almost seems like the passing of a baton to Merkel. Ahead of the visit, Obama said Merkel "has probably been my closest international partner these last eight years".

Countering Putin or Erdogan

Merkel's striking message to Trump after his victory was not lost on observers - where her peers simply pledged close ties, she tied them to democratic values. She said that any "close cooperation" must be on the basis of the "values of democracy, freedom, respect for the rule of law and human dignity, regardless of origin, skin color, religion, gender, sexual orientation or political belief".

The remarks indicated the German leader is likely to accept perhaps grudgingly - the mantle of "leader of the real, remaining West and remind Trump of values", said Die Welt daily. "She is more than ever the woman who is countering men like Russian President Vladimir Putin or Turkish President Recep Tayyip Erdogan," said the TAZ. Merkel, 62, does not have Obama's oratorical flourishes but her voice is increasingly forceful on the world stage. She put her fluent Russian to good use in mediating in the Ukraine conflict with Putin. When most European countries were busy shutting their doors to refugees fleeing war in predominantly Muslim countries, Merkel let in nearly 900,000 people last year - a stance that Trump branded "insane".

'Can't Do This Alone'

Trump, who pledged to deport millions of undocumented migrants from the US, made anti-immigrant policies a key plank of his campaign. And few expect him to take the lead in countering Putin, given his open praise for the Russian strongman. If Trump makes good on his promises to rip up deals on free trade, climate change and Iran's nuclear program, as well as reconsider protection for NATO allies that haven't paid their dues, it could spell the end of the United States' post-World War II role as the guarantor of world peace.

Stefani Weiss, an expert on European integration and foreign policies at the Bertelsmann Foundation, said the US had started to retreat as "world police" under Obama and cede more responsibility to Europe. "This is a trend that will likely prevail and intensify with Trump's presidency," she said. It remains to be seen how effectively Merkel can push her agenda on the global stage, if Trump, as leader of the world's biggest economy, adopts contrary policies on migration, climate change and sanctions targeting Russia. —AFP



CONGO FIRE COACH AFTER WCUP DEFEAT

BRAZZAVILLE: Congo have fired coach Pierre Lechantre, making him the fourth coaching casualty since last month's kick-off of the group stages of Africa's World Cup qualifiers. Congo's 1-0 loss at Uganda on Saturday followed a home defeat to Egypt in October and left the country bottom of Group E without any points. Congo also failed to qualify for January's African Nations Cup finals in Gabon. The decision was announced after the Frenchman met Congo Football Federation officials on Tuesday. He had been in the job for almost one



year in which time Congo won just once in seven outings. The 66-year-old's departure follows the firing of coaches in Algeria, Gabon, Libya after October's opening series of group games. South Africa suspended coach Ephraim Mashaba on Sunday despite the weekend win over Senegal for allegedly insulting top football association officials and he will face a disciplinary hearing this week. If he is fired it will mean 25 percent of the coaches who started the group phase will have lost their jobs in less than 60 days. Lechantre won the African Nations Cup with Cameroon in 2000 and has also been national coach of Qatar and Mali. - Reuters

MEN'S ROCKIES RACES OFF FOR LACK OF SNOW

PARIS: A lack of snow at Lake Louise, Canada, has seen World Cup circuit organisers cancel the men's downhill and super-G races scheduled there for late November. The races had already been put back twice and would have been the first of the men's speed events for the upcoming season on the weekend of November 26-27. "While we have good snow conditions on the upper mountain, we didn't have enough cold to get to the finish line for the men. We will continue our efforts for successful races for the ladies and look forward to the men returning next year," said Brian Lynam, race chairman at Lake Louise. The women have two downhills and a super-G scheduled for Lake Louise at the start of December. While snow in North America is late this season there's plenty at the European stations of Val-d'IsËre in the French Alps and in the Italian Dolomites at Val Gardena. One of those two stations is likely to host the men's Lake Louise races. Further good news for ski fans is that World Cup downhill races at Beaver Creek in the United States on December 2-4 will go ahead thanks to good snowfall there. — AFP

KENYA TO HOST HK AS SECURITY THREAT EASES

NAIROBI: Kenyan cricketers are looking forward to playing their first international game after a four-year hiatus when they host Hong Kong in a World Cricket League qualifier in Nairobi tomorrow. Due to security concerns, Kenya was forced to play their first home game of the tournament against the United Arab Emirates in Southampton, England in June 2015. Kenya has not played at home since a series of bomb attacks hit the capital in 2012. Coach Thomas Odoyo says playing at the Nairobi Gymkhana club would provide boost his side, which is currently fifth in the competition. "It' pleasing for us that we are coming back to play in the conditions we are used to" said Odoyo, a former national team all-rounder. "This gives us an advantage over our rivals, Hong Kong who are playing here for the first time." The attacks followed Kenya's decision to send troops to Somalia to battle the Shabaab militant group,

which had threatened the country's tourism sector. But of particular concern for Odoyo and his players is the sudden change of the weather in Nairobi, which has been experiencing heavy rains over the past two days. —AFP

IRISH LOOK TO DIASPORA BACKING FOR 2023 BID

DUBLIN: IRELAND'S 2023 Rugby World Cup bid is hoping the large Irish diaspora in the United States could be their trump card. The IRFU officially launched their candidacy for the global showpiece in Dublin on Tuesday, pitting themselves against France and potential bidders South Africa, both of whom have experiencing hosting the tournament. A final bid must be submitted by June, with the winning decision announced by the World Rugby council on November 15, 2017. While France and South Africa have been there and done it, the IRFU hope their unique ability to spread the rugby gospel to the much desired North American market could swing things their way. Awarding the 2019 World Cup to Japan shows World Rugby are open to expanding the game beyond traditional borders, and the US is expected to join the race to host the 2027 tournament. Hosting the tournament in Ireland four years earlier, with a significant number of fans based in the North America expected to tune in to, or travel to the Emerald Isle, is something Philip Browne, the IRFU Chief Executive, was keen to mention in Dublin.

"It's going to be a World Cup involving the whole island of Ireland, and we have a good mix of stadia, all within easy walking distance of city centres," Browne said. "We hope by having standing terracing there will be accessible tickets for real rugby fans and we're going to provide those fans with a unique celebration of rugby, a unique fan experience.

"The other thing we bring to the party, which no one else can is the 80 million people around the world-the Irish diaspora. "One of the key issues for World Rugby is: How do you open up the American market? We possibly have the answer.

"We have 34.5 million [people] in the USA, another four million of Irish descent in Canada. There were 62,300 people at the match in Chicago. I'd say 45-50,000 were Irish supporters, even if they weren't all from Ireland. "There were about 7,000 people [travelling] from Ireland, but the rest were based in North America and the rest of the world. "We can provide a platform for World Rugby to promote the game into areas of the world they haven't been able to up to now." Winning the bid was said to be worth an estimated EUR800m to the Irish economy, while bid organisers predicted the largest number of travelling fans in tournament history, with Scottish, Welsh and English fans all expected to travel in their numbers to the island.

A list of 12 venues, four rugby and eight from the native Gaelic Games Association, was announced, with World Rugby expected to whittle that down to between eight and ten after the winning bid is chosen. To get the win, Ireland will need approximately 19 votes from the World Rugby Council, and discussions have already begun in earnest - with the IRFU speaking with their counterparts from the US and Canadian Unions in Chicago last week, ahead of their timely victory over reigning World Champions New Zealand.

"Listen, there are no votes in the bag at all," Browne said. "The reality is that we've just launched and it's up to us to go out over the next 12 months and persuade people of the value and benefit of our bid to world rugby. "Yes, we've started our conversations. We've started our conversations in Chicago with the Canadians and the US, we met people yesterday in London and we'll be meeting more people between now and Christmas, and after Christmas. "So the hard work really starts now in terms of actually putting the detail on the bid and then having those conversations, trying to persuade people that our bid is of value to world rugby."

The 2023 tournament will run from September 15 to November 4. — AFP

IRELAND CAN INFLICT PAIN ON ALL BLACKS

LONDON: New Zealand were punished for showing "a lack of respect" to Ireland when they lost in Chicago and could be in for another shock in Saturday's rematch at Dublin's Aviva Stadium, according to former Lions wing Luke Fitzgerald.

Joe Schmidt's side delivered one of rugby's biggest shocks of the year by winning 40-29 11 days ago to end the All Blacks' 18-game winning run and become the first team since South Africa in 2004 to score 40 points against them.

Fitzgerald, who retired from rugby earlier this year with 34 caps for Ireland and one for the British and Irish Lions, said Steve Hansen's world champions would be a tougher proposition on Saturday as Ireland bid to become the first side to post back-to-back victories against them since South Africa in 2009.

"Do I think we can beat New Zealand again? I absolutely do," said Fitzgerald. "It's a really uphill task, they'll be really hurting after that (defeat in Chicago).

"I think they showed a little bit of arrogance there and lack of respect with some of their selections.

"I think they'll be really, really pumped up for this one. I'd say they'll do a little bit more research behind the scenes on us. I'd say they were a little bit under-cooked in that department and, from my own perspective, some of the selection mistakes that they made they won't make them again."

New Zealand bounced back from the loss by making 12 changes to score 10 tries in a 68-10 win over Italy last Saturday, when Ireland also played free-flowing rugby to beat Canada 52-21.

The All Blacks are hoping influential second row Sam Whitelock is fit to return after injury, allowing them to move Jerome Kaino back to flanker. Ireland ruthlessly exploited that scrum weakness in Chicago and Fitzgerald expects a similar gameplan on Saturday.

"The things we did well, we can definitely do again," he said. "I think the pressure we got on all around the park, the desire we showed... I think in front of a packed Aviva Stadium we can definitely do that again."

Ireland's standout player in Chicago, scrum half Connor Murray, has recovered from a muscle injury and is fit to play. —Reuters

RUSSIAN OFFICIAL FACES CORRUPTION CHARGES OVER WORLD CUP

MOSCOW: Russian investigators are arranged for a friendly subcontractor to pressing graft charges against a former deputy governor of St. Petersburg linked to the construction of a trouble-plagued stadium that is to host World Cup matches in 2018.

The Investigative Committee said in a statement on Wednesday that Marat Oganesyan, the city's deputy governor in 2013-2015, has been detained on suspicion of embezzling 50 million rubles (\$777,000) on a single contract to supply display screens for the new stadium. However, it could be only part of a much larger corruption case.

Investigators said Oganesyan

win the contract and funneled the money out via shell companies. Investigators said they have filed a motion with a local court to jail Oganesyan pending the probe. One official in the St. Petersburg city hall as well as three employees of the subcontractor are also under investigation in relation to the 69,000-seat stadium, provisionally called the Zenit Arena. Current deputy governor Igor Albin said on Twitter that "the total sum of damages at the stadium ... exceeds 700 million rubles (\$10.7 million)," citing evidence presented to the city government's construction department.

"No external events will influence the construction of the Zenit Arena now: the budget for the construction is balanced and everything that is needed has been bought," Albin added.

Yesterday's announcement came amid a blitz of corruption-related arrests and investigations in Russia. Late Monday, Economic Development Minister Alexei Ulyukayev was detained over an alleged \$2 million bribe, while Wednesday also saw reports of investigations at a state technology firm and a helicopter manufacturer.

The St. Petersburg stadium has taken almost a decade to build, prompting Prime Minister Dmitry Medvedev to publicly call it "disgraceful." The stadium, which is to host a 2018 World Cup semifinal match, is set to cost more than \$600 million. Until the ruble dropped sharply in value in 2014 against the backdrop of international sanctions and a low oil price, the same ruble budget was worth more than \$1 billion, making it one of the most expensive soccer stadiums in history.

The St. Petersburg City Hall in July fired the general contractor over repeated delays and cost overruns, also saying that authorities have gone to the police because it has allocated \$39 million for

the construction which has been unaccounted-for. Later than month President Vladimir Putin issued a special decree, ordering officials in St. Petersburg to speed up the construction.

FIFA expects Zenit Arena to be delivered in December so that it is ready to host the Confederations Cup next year.


There have also been several deaths of workers during construction. In the past 12 months, three have died in accidents, and investigators said Tuesday a North Korean man working on the stadium had died of an apparent heart attack in a workers' communal area at the stadium. — AP

WADA'S REEDIE UNDER FIRE FROM OLYMPIC COMMITTEES

DOHA: The World Anti-Doping Agency and its head Craig Reedie faced stinging criticism from national Olympic committees yesterday for its handling of the Russian doping scandal, days before its board meeting where the Scot is up for reelection.

Reedie, speaking to the general assembly of the Association of National Olympic committees (ANOC), said these were "troubled times" after the Russian doping affair, which resulted in dozens of athletes being banned from the Rio de Janeiro Olympics.

While calling for more sanctioning powers for WADA and closer cooperation with

governments, Reedie, who is up for re-election on Nov. 20, had to defend his organisation's actions with half a dozen NOCs criticising him at the assembly. He also had to defend the timing of the release of part of the so-called McLaren report into doping in Russia shortly before the Rio Games in August. The report uncovered systematic state-sponsored doping in Russia.

The investigation, triggered by media

doping laboratory, its anti-doping agency and athletics federation.

"During the discussions at the IOC Executive Board earlier this month, Sir Craig Reedie was advised of the intention of the IOC Executive Board to have in the future a neutral WADA President for the sake of the credibility and good governance of WADA," an IOC spokesperson said yesterday.

"At the meeting, Sir Craig accepted this approach and said he would not stand in the way of such a solution. Following this he received the support of the IOC Executive Board for his reappointment as WADA President," the spokesman said.

Sheikh Ahmad was concerned about the release of the second part of the McLaren report, due out in early December, and noted WADA's suspension of the Doha doping lab was announced the day before the general assembly in the Qatari capital on Tuesday. "There were questions of timing with the (McLaren) report and now we see it again with Doha, not because of cheating but because of procedures. The decision was only made on November 7, but came here on the day of the general assembly.

"I am now worried that the (second part of the) McLaren Report will come out in the first week of December during the IOC Executive Board, or the day after to undermine decisions there," Sheikh Ahmad said.

He suggested moving WADA from Montreal to Geneva, where the World Health Organisation has offices. Reedie apologised, saying the McLaren report had to come out before the Rio Games and that led to a partial ban on Russians at the Rio the Doha lab suspension announcement

STENSON HEADS STAND-ALONE QUARTET AT RACE TO DUBAI

DUBAI: The year-long Race to Dubai on the European Tour enters its home stretch with the season-ending DP World Tour Championship starting today, with four players still in the hunt to secure the honour of being called Europe's No 1.

The top-60 players after last week's Nedbank Golf Challenge qualify for the DP World Tour Championship, but 56 of them will have to contend for the \$8 million tournament, the richest on European Tour schedule outside the majors and World Golf Championships.

With 1,217,175 points for the winner, only No2 Danny Willett, No3 Alex Noren and No4 Rory McIlroy have the chance to catch up with Race to Dubai leader Henrik Stenson. England's Willett has the best chance just 299.675 points adrift, but he has been struggling with his form since finishing second in Italy in September third week. World No 2 and FedEx Cup champion McIlroy is 1,176,414 points behind Stenson and while he has conceded the race to European No 1, the Northern Irishman is keen to defend his title, which he also won in 2012.

"Mathematically I can win the Race to Dubai, but it's not going to happen," said McIlroy. "I wouldn't hold my breath. I think the three guys that are ahead of me are playing very good golf, especially the two Swedes. Henrik (Stenson) and Alex (Noren). Alex with what he's done over the past few weeks; Henrik has had a fantastic year, and so has Danny, obviously.

"So I don't expect those guys to play badly this week. I'm just concentrating on trying to win the golf tournament and if I can do that, I'll be very happy."

Willett was hoping his final two sub-70 rounds in Nedbank Challenge would spark his bid to win the Race to Dubai, having finished second last year to McIlroy.

"We've got four rounds of golf left in what's been a pretty long season and slightly different situation to last year, but we still need to win the golf tournament to win the Race to Dubai," said the Masters champion.

"We're 300,000 points behind Henrik. If we can do what we can control this week and we can win a golf tournament, then nobody can take it away from us."

Noren is coming off a win last week in South Africa, his fourth in last 11 European Tour starts. But the hard-working Swede was taking nothing for granted, starting the week 633,436 points adrift of Stenson.

"Well, it's still a new tournament, new grass, new challenges. Obviously, it's nice coming in with a victory last week. I always thought it's easier if you have a good week before and you're a little bit more relaxed and enjoying it a lot," said Noren.

"But yeah, it's a new week and you always have your preparation. I'm not focusing too much on results. I am just trying to get my game in shape. I take it as it comes. I've never really been into looking at numbers like that."

Two players who qualified as top-60 for the tournament - Scotland's Russell Knox and Northern Ireland's Graeme McDowell - have withdrawn from the field and have been replaced by No61 and 62 France's Rafael Jacquelin and Chile's Felipe Aguilar. The top-10 players at the end of the tournament qualify for the \$5 million bonus pool. —AFP

IN MEXICO, FOOTBALL OR 'FUTBOL AMERICANO' IS A PASSION

MEXICO CITY: Dressed in their classic silver and black uniforms, the Raiders players huddle before kickoff. After words of encouragement and a praver. the teenagers finish with head butts, shoulder slaps and a battle cry: "Uno, dos, tres... vamos!"

This is, after all, south of the border, where football has a century-old tradition, rivals soccer in popularity and millions of kids like the "Raiders de Arboleda" play "futbol americano" -American football - every weekend.

The NFL returns to Mexico after an 11-year absence when the Texans face the Raiders in a regular season game on Nov. 21 in sold-out Azteca Stadium. For the "Mexican" Raiders and others across the country, football is part of Mexican sports tradition as much as soccer, boxing and lucha libre.

"Football gives you the chance to take your passion to the field, to hit people and not get fined," said Raiders quarterback Gabriel Ayana, 16. "Maybe that's why it's so popular."

The NFL has around 25 million fans in Mexico, the biggest number outside of the US, and its base "is still growing," said Arturo Olive, director of the NFL office in Mexico. The league sponsors 6,500 teams in youth programs in 27 of 32 Mexican states, and estimates 2.5 million kids play flag football in elementary schools

"Eight years ago, we played in only six states and had 120 teams," Olive said. 'The growth has been exponential."

In a country steeped in soccer culture, and one that has hosted two FIFA World Cups, the love affair with football might be surprising. But Mexico has two popular college leagues with 36 teams, a six-team professional league, and up to 10 NFL games are on basic cable each week. The local soccer league has nine games each week, and not all of them are on TV.

Fans can even watch the Thursday and Monday night games at the movie theater. Soccer gets the big-screen treatment only for World Cup matches. "I also

used to play soccer," Ayana said, "but preferred this sport."

Football was introduced in the country in 1896 by Mexican students returning home from US colleges. They brought back "an oval shaped ball," said Alejandro Morales, a local football historian and founder of Mexico's football hall of fame. He said the first official match was played that year in the city of Jalapa in the Gulf state of Veracruz, where the students and their friends faced a team of American sailors from a US ship anchored in the nearby port.

Soon after, several teams were created in Veracruz and eventually the sport spread to Mexico City and local colleges. UNAM, the national state university with over 200,000 students, started playing in the 1920*s, and by the 50's, most of the Mexican colleges where playing the game that, at the time, rivaled soccer in popularity. UNAM's famed Estadio Olimpico, site of the 1968 Summer Olympics, was used mainly for football in the first decade after its inauguration

in 1950. "Back then, football used to share the spotlight with soccer," Morales said. "Eventually that faded, because football was not seen as a business. It was played in college and they just wanted to help the students, while soccer was run by professionals."

Although football fell behind soccer, it remained hugely popular. The NFL noticed and on Aug. 5th, 1978, the Philadelphia Eagles played the New Orleans Saints in a preseason game in Mexico City. Some 30,000 fans packed the home of the Cruz Azul soccer team to watch the Saints 14-7 win in the first NFL game south of the border, and only the second played outside of the US or Canada. The NFL returned 16 years later, when the Houston Oilers played the Dallas Cowboys in Azteca Stadium in the first of six preseason American Bowls hosted by Mexico. The last was in 2001, when the Raiders played the Cowboys in the same venue.

The first regular season game was played in 2005, when the Arizona Cardinals played the San Francisco 49ers in front of 103,467 fans in Azteca Stadium, then an NFL record. Since 2007, the league has held games annually in Great Britain - including three each season since 2014 - but never returned to Mexico, until now.

"We were ready when the opportunity presented itself," said Olive, who has run the NFL Mexico office since 2008. "Now we have a commitment to be successful with a game of this magnitude."

Azteca Stadium, built in 1966 and home to the popular soccer club America, underwent several renovations to meet NFL standards, including new locker rooms exclusive for the football teams, new ramps and improved communication systems. The size decreased from 100,000 to 84,000 to improve seating, and all tickets were sold out in less than two hours, Olive said. Most fans will be rooting for the Raiders, the fifth most-popular team in Mexico behind the Steelers, Cowboys, Patriots and 49ers, according to the NFL. —AP

DJOKOVIC DIGS DEEP TO **REPEL RAONIC ONSLAUGHT**

LONDON: It has been missing for a while but Novak Djokovic rediscovered his warrior spirit to tame Canada's Milos Raonic 7-6(6) 7-6(5) in a rivetting duel and guarantee progress from his group at the ATP World Tour Finals on Tuesday.

The 29-year-old Serb's recent malaise has cost him the world number one ranking he held for 122 weeks but when backed into a corner by an inspired Raonic, he responded in the belligerent manner that has earned him 12 grand slam titles. World number four Raonic threw the kitchen sink at the elasticlimbed Serb for two hours and 14 minutes, striking 42 winners and 14 aces but Djokovic, aiming for a fifth consecutive title at the yearender, was equal to everything-just. Having edged a high-intensity first-set when Raonic double-faulted on set point in a tense tiebreak, Djokovic looked to have broken the shackles in the second to lead 4-2. Raonic, who dialled up his mighty serve to speeds of 140mph, stormed back to rock Djokovic on his heels and came within a missed forehand of extending the match into a decider. But Djokovic produced a magical backhand flick at 5-5 in the night's second tiebreak, then an ace, before Raonic succumbed to an eighth successive defeat at the hands of the Serb



when his backhand flew wide

With two wins in the bag Djokovic, whose form has tailed off since winning the French Open in June, is now assured of a semi-final spot although with 200 ranking points up for grabs in his final group match against Gael Monfils he will not be letting up. Raonic will be favourite to beat Dominic Thiem and reach the semis too, although the Austrian will be heartened by his 6-3 1-6 6-4 defeat of fellow debutant Monfils earlier. "I managed to hang in there mentally and stay strong and believed that the opportunities would come," Djokovic, who needs to better Andy Murray's performance here to reclaim the number one ranking, said.

"It could have gone either way this match. He's such a strong player and has got firepower. "Two tiebreaks against a big server is a great win." Despite having won only one set in their previous seven matches, Raonic betrayed no inferiority and forced Djokovic to save three break points early on.

Wimbledon runner-up Raonic was the aggressor throughout the opener while Djokovic absorbed the blows and waited to strike. Raonic did little wrong but was punished for not putting away a volley when leading 3-2 in the tiebreak and at 5-5 Djokovic produced a backhand lob of rare guality. The Canadian saved a set point with a barrage of bludgeoning forehands that cracked Djokovic's defences but then selfdestructed, shanking a forehand return off a powder puff second serve before offering up a double fault. Djokovic was twice pegged back after breaking in the second set and had Raonic converted the set point that came his way when Djokovic tugged a backhand long

at 5-6, the Canadian powerhouse might have taken some stopping. It was not to be though as Djokovic wriggled out of trouble to keep the pressure on Murray in the race to end the year as top dog for the fifth time in six seasons. "I could have won it, I gave myself the chances," Raonic, who won 83 points to Djokovic's 85, said. "I did a lot of good things. A lot of things to be proud of." Earlier, 23-yearold Thiem withstood a fightback from the mercurial Monfils to become the first Austrian to win a match at the event since Thomas Muster in 1996. — Reuters

INDIA SPINNERS IN FIRING LINE AGAINST CONFIDENT ENGLAND

VISAKHAPATNAM: India's much-hyped spin attack are under pressure to deliver in the second Test at Visakhapatnam starting today against an England side high on confidence and boasting new teenage sensation Haseeb Hameed.

Nineteen-year-old Hameed, dubbed "Baby Boycott" for his unflappable style akin to batting great Geoffrey Boycott, scored 31 and 82 on debut during last week's drawn first Test, the latter the highest by a teenager for England.

He shared a 180-run second innings opening stand-a record for England in India-with captain Alastair Cook, who made 130, as the homes side's spinners endured a torrid start to the five-Test series.

India's spin trio of Ravichandran Ashwin, the world's top-ranked bowler, Ravindra Jadeja and Amit Mishra had been expected to rip through England's batting line-up but wilted in the Rajkot heat.

The tourists sparkled with four centuries-from Cook, Joe Root, Moeen Ali and Ben Stokes-as the hosts clung on for a tense draw, losing six wickets on the final afternoon after being set a notional 310 to win. There had been questions marks over the quality of England's slow bowlers before the game but they outperformed their Indian counterparts with leg-spinner Adil Rashid taking seven wickets.

"Our batters played well against their spinners, and our spinners and seamers all bowled well. The way the guys played in this Test should give us plenty of confidence," said England coach Trevor Bayliss after the first match finished on Sunday.

England's strong showing against the top-ranked Indians banished memories of last month's defeat to minnows Bangladesh when they were undone by rookie spinner Mehedi Hasan.

Ashwin recorded just 2-167 in the first

innings and 1-63 in the second. Mishra finished on 1-98 and 2-60 while Jadeja's solid 3-86 was followed by 0-47 in the second innings.

RAHUL RETURNS

However, the pitch at the Visakhapatnam ground in Andhra Pradesh state is expected to be more favourable to India's spinners than Rajkot's flat and grassy track. "We're under no illusions that these next four Tests could be even tougher," said Bayliss. England could include leading wicket-taker James Anderson, who has recovered from a shoulder injury, while India are also set to make changes.

Opener Lokesh Rahul was added to the squad on Tuesday after proving his recovery from a hamstring injury sustained batting against New Zealand last month by scoring a century in a domestic fixture on Monday.

He looks certain to return at the top of the order to replace Gautam Gambhir who struggled in Rajkot with scores of 29 and 0. All-rounder Hardik Pandya could make

his debut and add pace to India's attack.

"We can still play an extra bowling option and keep putting pressure on the opposition," said captain Virat Kohli.

W INDIES BOWLERS SHINE IN BONUS POINT WIN

HARARE: Superb bowling allowed the West Indies to overcome the absence of several key players as they beat Sri Lanka by 62 runs in the second one-day international in Harare yesterday.

After managing just 227 all out with the bat, Ashley Nurse and Shannon Gabriel grabbed three wickets apiece and captain Jason Holder picked up two as Sri Lanka were bowled out for 165 inside 44 overs.

As a result the West Indies also picked up a bonus point, putting them level on five points with Sri Lanka, who beat Zimbabwe in Monday's series opener in the triangular series.

"It's good to start off with a win in a short tournament," said Holder at Harare sports club. "We fell short of our batting target but made up for it in the field, where I thought we were outstanding.

"It's good to start turning things around, and hopefully we can get some consistency going and start maturing." Shorn of their biggest stars, including batsman Darren Bravo after he was sent home for comments made on Twitter about West Indies Cricket Board president Dave Cameron, the West Indians lost the toss and were asked to bat first in seam-friendly conditions.

They soon found themselves on the back foot, with Johnson Charles finding third man and fellow opener Kraigg Brathwaite run out by a direct hit from Nuwan Kulasekara.

Although their next three partnerships all reached more than 40, none were able to set up a significant total as Evin Lewis was caught behind off Sachith Pathirana's offspin for 27, and debutant Shai Hope was bowled for 47 by Asela Gunaratne. Kulasekara then had top scorer Jonathan Carter caught for 57 at deep square-leg, and once Rovman Powell's entertaining cameo had been halted on 44 by Nuwan Pradeep, Kulasekara effected another run-out and grabbed a second wicket with the ball. Despite the challenging conditions, the West Indian total looked short until a brilliant first spell from Holder yielded the wickets of Dhananjaya de Silva and Kusal Mendis, with a Charles direct hit helping to reduce the Sri Lankans to 16 for three. "The bowlers did a great job to keep them to 227, but the batsmen didn't turn up today," said Sri Lanka captain Upul Tharanga. "We lost three early wickets and never recovered - we just couldn't form a partnership." It was Nurse who prevented any meaningful recovery in the middle of the innings, dismissing Tharanga and Gunaratne just as they were finding their feet at the crease, before having top scorer Pathirana caught in the deep as he threatened to bring Sri Lanka back into the game. With Gabriel cleaning up the tail, the West Indies secured their first win outside of the Caribbean since March 2015. The series will now move to Bulawayo, where Zimbabwe will take on the West Indies on Saturday. —AFP

QUITS OVER TEST CRISIS

SYDNEY: Australia's chairman of selectors Rod Marsh quit with immediate effect yesterday after a run of five heavy Test defeats left the team in crisis, saying it was time for "some fresh thinking". The former wicketkeeping great, 69, stepped down amid recriminations about the poorly performing team which crashed to a third-straight home series defeat to South Africa on Tuesday.

"This is my own decision and no one within Cricket Australia has pressured me or even suggested that I should do this," Marsh said in a statement. Cricket Australia said it would hold an extraordinary meeting later Wednesday to decide on an interim replacement, with an

announcement "in due course". Marsh, one of several leading cricket officials under intense pressure, had previously insisted he would see out his contract which runs to the middle of next year. But on Wednesday he said it was time for a new perspective after a run of defeats which has prompted severe criticism in Australian media. "Clearly... it is time for some fresh thinking, just as it is for our Test team to welcome some new faces as we build for the future," Marsh said. "I have always had the best interests of Australian cricket foremost in my heart, and that's why I have made this decision." Australia's four-man selection panel now consists of Mark Waugh, Trevor Hohns and coach Darren Lehmann. The panel has been under heavy scrutiny over the shocking results of Steve Smith's national team, culminating in their latest batting collapse of eight for 32 in their innings and 80 runs defeat to the Proteas in Hobart this week.

DARK DAYS

Lehmann declared only four playerscaptain Smith, David Warner, Mitchell Starc and Josh Hazlewood-were sure to keep their places after Australia's second demoralising collapse in the Hobart Test. Only hours before Marsh's announcement, Cricket Australia chief James Sutherland voiced support for him to see out his contract. "He said he will finish up June and we will make decisions about where and how we transition to that in the future," Sutherland told reporters in Hobart. Former Test fast bowler Jason Gillespie and former Test captain Ricky Ponting have been touted as possible successors. Australia's team announcement for next week's third and final daynight Test in Adelaide has been delayed until Sunday so selectors can assess players' form in domestic Sheffield Shield matches. It has been a stormy series for the Australians, starting with a stunning first innings collapse of 10 for 86 in the first Test in Perth, when Australia squandered a 158-run opening stand to surrender meekly to the Proteas by 177 runs.

Critics pointed to other recent dark days in Australian cricket, including their demolition for 60 by England at Trent Bridge last year. Australia now face being whitewashed in a home series for the first time in their history if they lose to the Proteas in Adelaide. The last time they lost six straight Tests-against India and England in 2013 — the coach at the time, Mickey Arthur, was sacked. Sutherland earlier Wednesday told reporters he would not be stepping down from his post as CA chief executive which he has held for 15 years.

Marsh, who replaced the previous chairman of selectors John Inverarity in May 2014, played 96 Tests from 1970-1984, taking a then-record of 355 dismissals as wicketkeeper. — AFP

N ZEALAND DRAW ON MCCULLUM HEROICS FOR PAKISTAN CLASH

CHRISTCHURCH: Pakistan and New Zealand both claimed the high ground on the eve of today's first Test in Christchurch, with the Black Caps drawing inspiration from Brendon McCullum's classic farewell innings.

Just days after a 7.8-magnitude earthquake rattled the city and devastated parts of the South Island, Pakistan captain Misbah-ul-Haq looked to cash in on a perceived lack of confidence in the New Zealand ranks after their disastrous tour of India, where they suffered a series whitewash. But although Pakistan are on a high after crushing the West Indies last month, New Zealand skipper Kane Williamson claimed his side was rejuvenated by returning to home conditions and familiar seamer-friendly wickets. After being flummoxed by Indian spin in all three Tests in October, Williamson said New Zealand's challenge was to pick themselves up. "It's important when you come off the back of that India tour, which was extremely tough, that we still come back here and play with freedom, express our skills. When we do we play our best cricket," he said. "There will be a little bit of movement for the seam bowlers but we've played in these conditions a lot and certainly back ourselves to play positively."

When New Zealand last played at Hagley Oval, former skipper McCullum smashed a world record 54-ball century against Australia in a brutal onslaught that produced 145 runs off 79 deliveries. Williamson scored seven off 69 in the same innings. "Brendon was the complete opposite. It was a great example of someone playing with freedom and I think that came come from the confidence of knowing your own conditions," he said.

MIND GAMES

New Zealand, who have not won a series against Pakistan since 1985, will delay finalising their side as late as possible although it has been confirmed opener Jeet Raval will make his debut. One of four pace bowlers in the squad is likely to be omitted to make room for leg-spinner Todd Astle.

Misbah said the Pakistan line-up was already confirmed but he was giving nothing away

before the toss other than to say seamer-friendly conditions would not hinder them.

They played in similar conditions in their drawn series against England earlier this year. "That experience is really going to help us here, because of the kind of confidence we gained from that," Misbah said. Pakistan have their own motivation, having lost their top world ranking and Misbah said they were keen to get it back and despite New Zealand pitches not being renowned for taking turn, his ace remained spinner Yasir Shah. Yasir, with 116 wickets at 27.04 from 19 Tests "can get something out of any conditions." Misbah said.

"It's all about building pressure, bowling in the right areas, playing with the mind of the batsman," he added.

"Regardless of the conditions, you can be effective and good bowlers always learn ways to get people and I believe he is that kind of bowler." New Zealand struggled against spin in India where senior batsman Ross Taylor, with a career average of 46.24, could only average less than 15 in six innings. —AFP



GERMANY'S MUELLER SURPRISED BY SAN MARINO ROW

BERLIN: Thomas Mueller admits having been surprised by accusations of arrogance and disrespect for saying Germany's 8-0 rout of minnows San Marino had "nothing to do with professional sport".

On Sunday, Alan Gasperoni, the San Marino National Olympic Commitee's press officer, posted an open letter to Mueller on Facebook, listing 10 reasons Germany's trip to the minnows for a 2018 World Cup qualifier was useful.

Mueller said he was taken aback by Gasperoni's angry rant, which poked fun at the cliched German habit of wearing

white socks with sandals and accused the Germans of thinking they could win by "bullying" San Marino.

Having captained Germany in Tuesday's goalless draw with Italy in Milan, Mueller said he had meant no disrespect. "I was a bit surprised, because I hadn't meant that at all," Mueller told

German broadcaster ARD. "I had been asked a few questions, which I had answered honestly and seriously, and had tried to look at both sides.

"The reader often reads only the

headline and then makes an impression. which I had once again underestimated."

Last Friday's 8-0 drubbing in heavy rain kept Germany top of their 2018 World Cup qualifying group with a perfect record of four wins while San Marino, ranked 199 places below the Germans by FIFA, remain bottom.

When asked about the value of such international miss-matches, Mueller admitted the question was "hard to answer", adding "romantics say such games have their place".

Mueller says his "nothing to do with professional football" comment was taken out of context. "My statement in the interview after the match on Friday related to the question of the sporting value of the game in San Marino in relation to the risk of injury," Mueller wrote on his Facebook page on Tuesday.

"It was taken out of context by some media, which seems to have given some people the wrong impression, influenced by a sometimes humorous social media post by a former official of the San Marino Football Association.

"I want to clarify here that I replied in the answer respectfully to illuminate both sides of the topic."

Mueller says he will not shy from speaking his mind. "I will continue to express my opinion in the future, even if I run the risk of getting a few flies buzzing around my ears," added the 27year-old. The matter could be put to bed over a beer.

Gasperoni has apologised for poking fun at Germans in his rant and wants to meet Mueller when San Marino play the return qualifier in Nuremberg next June. "I am sure everything will be settled with a hand shake and when we are in Germany, we could go for a beer together," added Gasperoni. — AFP

BARCA SEALS BIG DEAL WITH JAPAN'S RAKUTEN

BARCELONA: Spanish giants FC Barcelona sealed a massive shirt sponsorship deal yesterday with Japanese online retailer Rakuten worth at least 55 million euros (\$59 million) a year. One of world football's most lucrative shirt sponsorship deals sees Japan's leading e-commerce company replace Qatar Airways, Barcelona's shirt sponsor since 2013, confirming Asia's appetite for major investment in European football.

With the pulling power of top stars like Lionel Messi and Neymar, Barcelona's success on the pitch ensures the club exerts a huge draw on advertisers.

The base contract is 55 million euros per year, with a bonus of 1.5 million euros per year if the club wins the La Liga and five million euros if it wins the Champions League," Barcelona's head of marketing, Manel Arroyo, told a news conference at the club's Camp Nou stadium. Qatar Airways were reported to have paid 35 million euros for the final year of their deal taking them up to the end of the 2016-17 season.

MESSI, NEYMAR TOP DRAW

Barcelona boasts some of the world's most recognisable stars-vital marketing assets for the club's partners — who have millions of followers on social media, promising invaluable exposure to sponsors. Argentine striker Messi is one of the most popular athletes in the world on social media, with more than 78 million fan followers on Facebook alone. Barcelona's new sponsorship deal however falls short of the seven-year deal which Manchester United signed with Chevrolet which will earn the English club \$560 million-about \$80 million (70 million euros) per year. Barcelona-once renowned for never having had a sponsor on their shirts — had been looking to replace their Qatar Airways contract which was seen as below market value for a number of seasons.

It extended its contract last year with the airline for one year while it looked for a

new partner. Rakuten, seeking to boost its global image, is Japan's biggest e-commerce company with more than 13,000 employees in Japan and turnover of more than two trillion yen (18.2 billion dollars) in the first three quarters of the year. The company is already involved in domestic sport in Japan, owning J-League club Vissel Kobe and pro baseball outfit Tohoku Rakuten Golden Eagles. Barcelona took its first step towards ending its tradition of shunning sponsors on its shirts in 2006 when it agreed to bear the logo of Unicef. In 2011 Qatar Foundation replaced the charity on the club's shirts under a new deal

Second shirt sponsorship deal

Qatar Airways signed its first sponsorship deal with the club in 2013. But many of Barcelona's members had expressed their opposition to the club's relationship with the Gulf state.

Former club president Joan Laporta has pledged to end the sponsorship deal if reelected to the post but he was soundly beaten by Josep Maria Bartomeu in the club's 2015 election.

Barcelona's new sponsorship deal confirms the interest in Asian investors in European football and it comes as the club is set to begin work in 2018 on an extensive renovation of their Camp Nou home. The refurbishment will see the capacity of Europe's biggest stadium extended to 105,000 and an open facade to allow views across the city. A budget of 420 million euros has been estimated for the project that will be financed in large part by proceeds from sponsorship. Barcelona in May signed a 10-year kit agreement with Nike, which it expects to bring in at least 150 million euros per season when the arrangement takes effect in the 2018-19 season.

The club is expected to post a record turnover of 679 million euros in the 2015-16 season and surpass arch-rival Real Madrid as the world's richest club in the annual rankings by Deloit.—AFP

EPL'S SHAKE-UP PLANS ABANDONED

LONDON: Plans for the biggest shake-up in English football since the introduction of the Premier League have been abandoned after talks between the main participants broke down.

The Football League (EFL) proposed a raft of changes called the Whole Game Solution, including a five-division league one more than present - with 20 teams in each, and a winter break. But discussions with the Football Association (FA), the English game's governing body, foundered on a proposal to move FA Cup games to midweek from their traditional weekend slots, the EFL said in a statement on Wednesday. "If the weekend slots are not available (for league games), then there is simply no way we can meet the financial conditions as outlined at the very outset," said EFL chief executive Shaun Harvey.

Earlier this month, the FA announced a new six-year international broadcasting deal for the FA Cup, with British media reports putting its value at about 820 million pounds (\$1.02 billion).

This made the competition too lucrative

to tinker with, from the FA's point of view, and it refused to agree a new calendar for the changes which would have been introduced for the 2019-20 season.

"The stance the FA has adopted has brought the discussions to a premature end before fully understanding what the financial outcome from the creation of a new distribution model could be," added Harvey. The EFL believes change is necessary to ease fixture congestion, make weekend games more special and help supporters by cutting down midweek travel.

Under the plans, unveiled in May, each club outside the Premier League would have seen their home fixtures reduced from 46 to 38, a contentious proposal that some clubs opposed. Reacting to the news that the changes would not now go ahead, Julian Tagg, chairman of League Two (fourth-tier) side Exeter City, told the BBC: "Many fans across the country didn't like the idea of change and I think that was the same with our club. I think there'll be a little bit of a sigh of relief." The FA was not immediately available to comment. — Reuters

the U.S. 4-0 Tuesday night to drop the Americans to 0-2 for the first time in the final round of the North and Central American and Caribbean region. "A very, very bitter moment for us. There's no doubt about it," US coach Jurgen Klinsmann said. "We didn't imagine going into the hexagonal with two defeats right at the beginning."

Johan Venegas scored in the 43rd minute, Cristian Bolanos doubled the lead in the 69th and second-half substitute Joel Campbell beat beleaguered goalkeeper Brad Guzan in the 74th and 77th minutes in the worst margin of defeat for the US in a qualifier since a 5-1 defeat at Mexico in November 1980.

It was the biggest losing shutout margin in a qualifier since the U.S. fell 6-0 at Mexico in 1957. Combined with Friday's 2-1 loss to Mexico at Columbus, Ohio, the US finds itself in a quick deficit in the hexagonal, which resumes in March. "I'm very disappointed, obviously," US Soccer Federation President Sunil Gulati said. "There's obviously some concern. Mexico qualified with 12 points. There's a lot of points left on the board - 24 to be exact."

Ticos fans sounded air horns at the end of a match that reignited questioning of Klinsmann's tactics. The US dropped to 0-9-1 in qualifiers at Costa Rica. Klinsmann is still confident he's the right person to lead the team, but understands the scrutiny. "When you lose two games and obviously two World Cup qualifiers right after each other, there will be a lot of comments," he said. The Americans, who had had not lost a home qualifier in 15 years before last week, figure they will win their four remaining home games and pick up points on the road.

The top three teams qualify for the 2018 tournament in Russia, and the No. 4 finisher advances to a playoff against Asia's fifth-place nation. "There's going to need to be some urgency," US captain Michael Bradley said. "We're going to have to look collectively real hard in the mirror at ourselves and understand it's not been a good start but the reality of this hexagonal format is that nothing is lost yet, not even close. So anybody who thinks that is sorely mistaken."

Central defenders John Brooks and Omar Gonzalez, and right back Timmy Chandler had particularly poor games. Brooks and Omar Gonzalez started in the center of the back line. Geoff Cameron, who usually starts alongside Brooks, missed both qualifiers this month after hyperextending a knee during Stoke's Premier League match against Hull on Oct. 22.

Costa Rica, which won its opener 2-0 at Trinidad and Tobago, went ahead after a Brooks giveaway. Randall Azofeifa took a short pass from Jose Salvatierra in the center circle and played a long ball into the corner, where Bolanos ran it down on its third bounce. Gonzalez was slow to close on Bolanos, who crossed for Venegas just outside the 6-yard box. Bolanos beat Brooks to the ball and sent a header across Guzan for his seventh goal in 30 international appearances.

Bolanos scored after a turnover by 18-yearold midfielder Christian Pulisic near midfield. Salvatierra sent a pass down the flank to

foot as the American defender stabbed to make a play to no avail. He was a step behind all night on the slick, chunked-up turf.

"I said to the team that it won't be the last 4nil defeat in their career," Klinsmann said. "We'll get here some lessons but definitely it's a bitter moment because we wanted to do far, far better than what we did."

There was some whistling during "The Star-Spangled Banner" from the capacity crowd of about 35,000 in Estadio Nacional, where the field is surrounded by an athletics track and crowd noise dissipates - even from a band in the second deck. BUFFON REACHES LANDMARK AS GERMANY HOLD ITALY

MILAN: Gianluigi Buffon earned a handing Bernd Leno the gloves for the European record-equalling 167th cap as Italy played out a goalless friendly draw with their Euro 2016 quarter-final tormentors Germany in Milan on Tuesday.

The 38-year-old Buffon, who made his Italy debut in 1997, is now level with retired Spain legend and fellow goalkeeper Iker Casillas.

Although Buffon is now just 17 behind world record-holder Ahmed Hassan of Egpyt (184), the appearance of AC Milan's Gianluigi Donnarumma for a more positive second half was a reminder that retirement may not be too far off.

Hosting Germany just four months after a dramatic penalty shoot-out defeat ended their Euro 2016 hopes in Bordeaux, Italy were looking to end their three-game winless streak against the world champions.

But the hosts failed to transform a promising finish to the game into a win, Torino striker Andrea Belotti notably hitting the upright late on. "We were facing the world champions and gave very little away," said Italy coach Giampiero Ventura.

"Apart from hitting the post, we had four or five situations that we could have done better with." Like Ventura, Germany boss Joachim Loew has one eye on the future and made several changes to his established starting line-up. By the end, he was largely happy with their performance.

"It was a good and important result for us, especially our young players," he said.

"We can be totally satisfied, even though we could have tightened up a little in defence." Juventus midfielder Sami Khedira and Arsenal's Mesut Ozil were both rested, and regular skipper and goalkeeper Manuel Neuer was out with a virus,

After a lackluster first half, Brazil went ahead in the 57th minute when Peru's defense gave the ball away inside the penalty box to 19-year-old Gabriel Jesus, who made an easy and calm finish. In the 77th minute, the Peruvian defense again was at fault, allowing Jesus to set up midfielder Renato Augusto for another simple finish.

Brazil ends the year with 27 points, which was enough to qualify in other editions of the South American qualifiers. Only months ago it was lagging sixth under previous coach Dunga. Peru, who started dreaming of going to their first World Cup in 32 years after a 4-1 victory at Paraguay last week, will stay at eighth position with 14 points. - AP

ASPAS, ISCO DENY **ENGLAND VICTORY**

LONDON: Substitute Isco struck deep in stoppage time to earn Spain a 2-2 draw and deprive Gareth Southgate of victory in his final game as England interim manager on Tuesday.

Goals from Adam Lallana and Jamie Vardy had set England up for an impressive win, but Spain debutant lago Aspas reduced the arrears in the 89th minute before Isco levelled with practically the last kick. Southgate, who lost Lallana to injury in the first half, cursed his luck on the touchline, but having gone four games unbeaten since replacing Sam Allardyce, the job is still expected to be his full-time.

The players over the period of the four matches couldn't have given any more," Southgate said. "It feels like a defeat for the players, but I couldn't be more proud of what they've done. It was a healthy, positive performance."

While victory eluded England at the last, the vibrant nature of their performance at Wembley will help to erase lingering memories of their Euro 2016 humiliation by Iceland. Isco's 96th-minute strike extended Julen Lopetegui's unbeaten record to six games since he succeeded Vicente del Bosque as Spain coach in the aftermath of their Euro 2016 exit at Italy's hands. "Things got even tougher in the second half, but that's when we showed our character and never-say-die spirit. "To pull a draw out of the fire with two goals at the end was great. It showed we never give up." Vardy won the penalty that yielded England's opening goal in the ninth minute, but he was perhaps fortunate to still be on the pitch.

With less than five minutes on the clock, the Leicester City star followed through after clearing the ball downfield and caught Cesar Azpilicueta high on the Chelsea defender's right shin.

But Romanian referee Ovidiu Alin Hategan kept his cards in his pocket and within four minutes he was pointing to Spain's penalty spot.

After Jesse Lingard robbed Thiago Alcantara, Lallana curved a gorgeous pass into the box from the right and despite a loose first touch, Vardy succeeded in drawing a foul from goalkeeper Pepe Reina.

Reina went the right way from the penalty, to his left, but Lallana put enough height on the ball to register his third goal in three England outings.

He celebrated by freezing stockstill in the manner of the 'Mannequin Challenge' social media fad, with Walcott and Sterling joining in. Lopetegui awarded senior debuts to Ander Herrera and Aspas in the second half, yet still the hosts advanced, Reina saving one-handed from Walcott and Nacho clearing off the line from Lingard. When Spain did threaten, England substitute goalkeeper Tom Heaton denied David Silva and substitute Alvaro Morara, with Aspas putting the rebound over the bar in the first instance.

West Ham United left-back Aaron Cresswell won his first England cap as a late substitute, but was upstaged by Celta Vigo forward Aspas and Real Madrid midfielder Isco, his fellow entrants.

Aspas halved the deficit, drifting in from the right and curling home, before Isco atoned for an earlier miss by chesting down Dani Carvajal's pass and squeezing a shot between Heaton's legs. — AFP

SAUDI ROYAL SEES SPORT FUND AT MORE THAN \$600M

RIYADH: Saudi Arabia plans to develop its sports sector with a fund worth more than \$600 million helped by the privatisation of football teams, a senior official said yesterday. "The fund will be no less than 2.5 billion riyals (\$666 million)," Princess Reema Bint Bandar al-Saud told the MISK Global Forum. On Monday the kingdom's main economic coordinating body, the Council of Economic Affairs and Development, called for creation of the fund within three months.

It aims to "support different sports, development and investment in the relevant areas," while contributing to privatisation of sports clubs and the establishment and funding of amateur sports programmes, the official Saudi Press Agency said.

Most professional football clubs in Saudi Arabia are reportedly government owned. Saud, named three months ago as Vice President for Women's Affairs at the General Authority for Sports, said privatisation of football would provide "the seed capital of our future".

Her agency is trying to boost the kingdom's international competitiveness and to get more Saudis exercising. She said her own focus is on promoting healthy lifestyles, which would also have economic benefits in the conservative kingdom where sport opportunities, particularly for women, are limited.

"Today, the value of sports as a sector could equal, unbelievably, 250,000 jobs for women over the next two years," she told the forum which linked business leaders with young Saudis in a bid to inspire them to help diversify the oil-dependent economy.

She said she wants to encourage young people to walk more and to ride bicycles, but in the Saudi capital there are only about two shops selling bikes for serious adult riders.

Saud urged young entrepreneurs to take advantage of such market potential. — AFP

CURRENCY SWAP SETS OFF ENDLESS LINES OF FRUSTRATION

INDIAN MERCHANTS REPORT PLUMMETING BUSINESS

NEW DELHI: The first people showed up at the bank long before dawn, forming a line in the cold and the smog and silently waiting for the chance to withdraw their own money. They left more than seven hours later, each holding the handful of bills, worth \$60 at the very most, that they'd been allowed to take home. By midday, the lines snaked back and forth across the parking lot outside the Axis Bank branch in central New Delhi. Occasionally, a policeman carrying a long bamboo club would slap someone who stepped out of line. No one complained. In a crowd like this, largely working-class and uneducated, no one talks back to a policeman. Especially not one carrying a club.

Desperate for cash

"They keep telling us that that this is good, and maybe they're right," said Shahida Parveen, a 36-year-old woman whose family had almost no usable money left. "But I don't see anything good happening." This is just one bank, in one city, in a country of 1.3 billion people, millions of them increasingly desperate for cash amid a chaotic government effort to crack down on corruption by banning highdenomination currency notes.

Last week, Prime Minister Narendra Modi announced in a surprise nighttime TV address that all 500- and 1,000-rupee notes, worth about \$7.50 and \$15, would be withdrawn immediately from circulation, a move designed to fight corruption and target people who have been dodging taxes by holding immense stockpiles of cash, known in India as "black money." In a nation hobbled by corruption, and where less than 3 percent of people file tax returns, the plan at first earned widespread approval. But as the days ticked by, it became increasingly clear that the government was ill-prepared for a plan that suddenly pulled 86 percent of the country's money supply out of circulation.

Families began hoarding small-denomination currency, merchants reported plummeting business and salaries went unpaid. Many businesses were refusing to accept the only new note rushed into circulation, worth 2,000 rupees, because they were unable to make change for it. The government says it's also trying to get new 500-rupee bills into circulation, but they remain rarities. Modi acknowledged the transition to the new currency might be briefly difficult, but said the government "spent long hours trying to figure out how to minimize the inconvenience."

"The poor are now enjoying a sound sleep, while the rich are running around to buy sleeping pills" because of anxieties over their hoarded money, he said. But in the parking lot outside the Axis Bank, no one was talking about a sound sleep. "This is only to harass people like us," said Parveen, a stay-at-home mother whose husband works as a small-time broker for rental properties, but has had no work for the past week. Hundreds of millions of Indians do not have bank accounts and use only cash. Many businesses only accept cash. "The people with all the black money, they'll find a way to manage."

'Black money'

She's right. The price of gold spiked in the hours after Modi's announcement, as the rich looked for ways to get rid of their old currency. Accountants say there has been a surge in questions about laundering cash, with one saying a client had come in admitting he needed to get rid of more than \$5 million in discontinued notes. Others have used a range of ploys, from buying expensive train tickets that can be refunded later, to getting fake receipts, backdated to before Modi's announcement, to make their black money look legitimate. "Do you see anyone with black money here?" demanded Chote Lal, 59, who had taken the day off from his office job to wait in line. "Only the poor are getting hurt. Who else is suffering?"

A New Delhi businessman with connections to underground currency traders said it was still fairly easy to exchange the withdrawn currency - as long as you're willing to pay twice the legitimate exchange rate to get rid of the old notes. "They can take as much as you need to get rid of," the businessman said, speaking on condition of anonymity to be able to speak freely about illegal transactions. How are money launderers getting rid of outdated currency? Some are presumably using corrupt bureaucrats or banking officials. Others, however, are getting help from people in line at tens of thousands of banks across India.

Some of those waiting at Axis, like Parveen, were there to exchange their own money. She pulled a wallet from her purple-and-pink purse, revealing two crumpled 100-rupee notes and two 50-rupee notes, worth a total of about \$4.50. It was all her family of five had left to spend, at least until she got to the front of the line and could exchange 4,000 rupees in the old currency. But it was an open secret that more than a few of those waiting with her were being paid to exchange currency for wealthier people. "I'm not doing that, but many of these people are exchanging for others," said Sahil Saluja, a young airline employee, gesturing around him. He eventually gave up waiting after more than four hours in line.

Often-shifting regulations

The often-shifting regulations allow a onetime swap of 4,000 rupees, or about \$60, in exchange for smaller notes to meet immediate needs. That limit was raised to 4,500 rupees yesterday. The government insists the system will be back to normal by the end of the year. Overwhelmed banks had no reliable way to ensure that people didn't line up more than once, so on Tuesday, the government announced that banks would begin using indelible ink to mark the fingers of people swapping scrapped currency notes. India uses the same system during elections, to stop people from voting repeatedly.

Old notes can be deposited into bank accounts before the end of the year, though the government says it will investigate deposits above 250,000 rupees, or about \$3,700. Immense fines will be levied on anyone found to have been illegally avoiding taxes. But for at least the next week, and perhaps many weeks, hours-long bank lines and strict limits on withdrawals (most people are limited to about \$30 a day), mean lots of frustration ahead. The government, meanwhile, insisted all was well. The "public need not be anxious," said a weekend statement from India's national Reserve Bank. "Cash is available when they need it."— AP

ABU DHABI RALLIES ON BANK MERGER SPECULATION; SAUDI, EGYPT REBOUND **MIDEAST STOCK MARKETS**

DUBAI: Abu Dhabi bank shares surged yesterday because of renewed speculation that the government might merge more banks as part of an efficiency drive, while other regional markets rebounded, encouraged by strong global bourses and oil prices. The Abu Dhabi index jumped 2.6 percent, its largest single-day gain since June, but trading volume continued to decline from a seven-month peak hit earlier this month.

Quoting unnamed sources, Bloomberg reported Abu Dhabi was considering more financial sector mergers after First Gulf Bank and National Bank of Abu Dhabi announced earlier this year that they planned to merge in the first quarter next year. FGB shares closed 2.6 percent higher and NBAD shares added 1.5 percent. Union National Bank surged 12.3 percent and Abu Dhabi Commercial Bank jumped 5.8 percent on speculation they might form the next merger. Officials at the banks and in the government were not available to comment, though several bankers familiar with the industry told Reuters that formal talks were not under way and the idea of any merger was still in very preliminary stages.

A UNB-ADCB merger would create the United Arab Emirates' third biggest bank and "offer a better footing for ADCB to compete with the bigger players as underwriting capacity increases significantly," Arqaam Capital said in a note. Abu Dhabi Islamic Bank climbed 4.7 percent after Bloomberg said it could be merged with Al Hilal Bank. Bank officials could not be reached for comment and Bloomberg said it was possible that none of the potential mergers would proceed. Blue chips led Dubai's main stock index 2.1 percent higher with Emaar Properties gaining 2.8 percent and Dubai Islamic Bank adding 2.4 percent.

Saudi Arabia's index rebounded 2.4 percent to 6,648 points, 55 points below technical resistance on its July peak. Ninety-five percent of traded shares advanced. All but one petrochemical producer rose with Saudi Basic Industries adding 2.1 percent as Brent oil futures traded over \$46 a barrel. — Reuters

A decade after its conception, the King Abdullah Economic City-an integrated industrial, residential and tourism centre-is profitable and in line with a government push which intensified this year to develop the private sector, Fahd Al-Rasheed told AFP in an interview.

KAEC was one of several "economic cities" touted for development 10 years ago, during the reign of the late king Abdullah, as special zones where the private sector could thrive. Rasheed said there were "so many challenges" in the project's early years but that the KAEC is now thriving. "We are profitable for the last five years," he said, "and we are today at the highest cash position that we've ever been." Oil makes up the bulk of Saudi revenue but a collapse in crude prices since 2014 created a record deficit and intensified economic reform efforts.

In April, the country's powerful Deputy Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman announced an ambitious new economic plan dubbed Vision 2030 that aims to promote private sector investment. The scale of the project

vinced of "the strong fundamentals of the Saudi economy" and that the KAEC shows "the model works". Developed by Emaar, The Economic City, the Saudi-listed unit of Dubai's Emaar Properties, the project has seen \$10 billion in investment. Rasheed said it has signed contracts with more than 120 companies, many of them French. Renault is assembling trucks, drug maker Sanofi has a plant, and Total is also established.

The project is promoting seaside residential developments and expects to be home to 10,000 people within a few months, with more than 40,000 targeted by 2020. "We are the largest residential developer in terms of sales in the country, although we are concentrated in a remote site" north of Jeddah, said Rasheed. A high-speed rail line due next year will connect KAEC with Jeddah and Islam's holiest cities of Mecca and Medina, "which will give us access to 12 million residents in the western region within one hour," Rasheed said.

This will boost another goal of Vision 2030, which is tourism development, he said. "We are building golf courses, theme parks, zoos, safaris", he said, calling tourism "the most strategic sec-

tor" for the KAEC. Home so far to a luxurious waterfront resort, the city expects to receive 150,000 visitors this year and targets 1.5 million by 2020. Rasheed was speaking on sidelines of the MISK Global Forum, which ends Wednesday and aims to link business leaders with young Saudis in a bid to inspire their involvement in economic diversification. — AFP



EGYPT SAYS HAPPY WITH IMPACT OF **CURRENCY FLOAT; INFLOWS SURGING** PLAN TO CUT PRIMARY BUDGET DEFICIT STILL ON TRACK

DUBAI: Egyptian authorities are happy with financial market movements since they floated the pound, and inflows of foreign exchange into the banking system are surging, deputy finance minister Ahmed Kouchouk said yesterday. The Egyptian pound fell to near 18 to the US dollar after its peg of 8.8 was scrapped on Nov 3 in an effort to lure more foreign investment and shut a black market in dollars. In the last few days it has become more stable at around 15.50.

Kouchouk, speaking to a small group of foreign reporters at a financial conference in Dubai, said volatility was natural after a currency float and the pound's moves were "not a surprise or concern". "Banks are competing, we are seeing that rates are fluctuating, each bank has its own buying and selling rate - all the ingredients of a flexible, efficient system are there now," said Kouchouk, an architect of Egypt's economic reform plan.

He described the central bank as "very happy with what's happening". Data from the central bank shows Egypt's banking system has received about \$1.5 billion in net hard currency inflows since the float, around 10 to 15 times the level of weekly inflows before the pound was freed, Kouchouk said. He called that number encouraging and predicted inflows would increase further. Foreign holdings of government securities including Treasury bills and bonds - have increased by between \$700 million and \$900 million since the float, Kouchouk estimated. Some of that rise is due to foreign money that was already inside Egypt but some is due to new money from abroad, he said.

As part of its effort to obtain more hard currency, Egypt plans to return to the Eurobond market. Authorities expect to make a decision early next week on when they will hold investor roadshows for the first issue, Kouchouk said. He declined to give a number for the size of the debt sale, saying it would depend on market conditions given recent volatility in global fixed income prices. The pound's depreciation promises to raise the government's costs for importing wheat and energy, potentially slowing its drive to cut a budget deficit that totaled 12.2 percent of gross domestic product in the last fiscal year through June.

But Kouchouk said the depreciation would also help government revenues by inflating some payments such as Suez Canal revenues, and that its fiscal reforms had incorporated expectations for depreciation. For these reasons a weaker pound will not have a big impact on state finances and the government is still on track to cut its primary budget deficit, which excludes interest payments, by about two-thirds in the current fiscal year from last year's 3.4 percent of GDP, and to eliminate it next year, he said. — Reuters

LONDON: The Turkish lira fell to a new record currencies in October, the yuan had depreciated low yesterday and the Chinese yuan hit an eight-year low, although emerging market stocks rose for a second day, helped by a continued pull back in US Treasury bond yields. Emerging currencies have been under pressure in the face of dollar strength, but domestic woes have accentuated the losses in some markets, with the lira tumbling 0.7 percent to a record low on signs of more discord between Turkey and Europe.

President Tayyip Erdogan has accused Belgium of being a centre for supporters of the outlawed Kurdistan Workers Party (PKK) and the cleric who Ankara says orchestrated a failed July coup. He has also accused Germany of not being committed to the fight against terrorism. Roxana Hulea, a strategist at Societe Generale, said the lira was likely to remain under pressure. "We do consider Turkey as being one of the least protected during this renewed pressure on EM." she said. The Chinese yuan also hit an eight-year low as the central bank set a weaker daily guidance rate.

Commerzbank noted that after the yuan's inclusion in the special drawing rights basket of

by more than 3 percent, triggering concerns over a possible collapse. "It is hardly the case, in our view. On one hand, (the yuan) index is generally stable since August, suggesting (its) weakness reflects a broad US dollar strength." But the bank's analysts also noted China's foreign reserves had dropped for four consecutive months since mid-2016, indicating that the central bank was still actively intervening in the market. The yuan has depreciated 5.4 percent against the dollar so far this year.

The Mexican peso, which has been pummeled hardest by Republican Donald Trump's shock US election win last week, slipped 0.3 percent from a six-day high, after gaining 2 percent on Tuesday. Analysts expect the volatility to continue until there is more clarity on Trump's policies. "It is a market consensus that the peso is undervalued, but because it is at the eye of the storm it is very difficult to advocate bottom fishing at this point," said Hulea. The Russian rouble also weakened against the dollar, down 1.9 percent, as investors eyed developments in the government following the dismissal of the economy minister over allegations of corruption. — Reuters

HEDGE FUNDS TURN BEARISH ON OIL AT RECORD RATE

LONDON: Hedge funds turned bearish towards oil positions were cut by 13 million barrels. prices at the fastest rate on record in the first week of November amid growing doubts about whether OPEC will reach a successful deal to curb its growing production. Hedge funds and other money managers cut their net long position in Brent and West Texas Intermediate (WTI) futures and options by 149 million barrels in the week ending Nov 8.

The weekly reduction in net long positions was the largest on record, according to an analysis of data published by regulators and exchanges. The sell-off in crude prices, which has been under way for three weeks, was initially led by the liquidation of stale long positions, but the most recent week saw the emergence of a heavy wave of fresh shortselling. Hedge funds increased their short positions across the three main crude contracts by 135 million barrels in the seven days to Nov. 8, while long

Fifth cycle

Hedge funds' short positions in the flagship NYMEX WTI contract increased by 83 million barrels. This is the fifth time since the start of 2015 that hedge funds have accumulated a very large short position in NYMEX WTI. Each time the hedge funds have amassed a large short position oil prices have fallen, only to rise again when the shorts are closed out. The cycles of short-selling and the rise and fall in oil prices have been closely synchronized and had a strongly predictable component. But the cycles have become faster and deeper as more momentum-driven hedge funds trade the cyclical behavior. The entire short-selling cycle is accelerating.

The current cycle has been the most aggressive so far with short positions established at the fastest rate on record. Hedge funds accumulated an extra 89 million barrels of short positions in NYMEX WTI in just a fortnight. The total short position in NYMEX WTI on Nov 8 at 145 million barrels was still well below the maximum short position recorded on Aug 9 of 220 million barrels. But it is likely further short positions have been added since Nov 8 as crude prices continued to trend lower. With long positions sharply reduced from their recent peak and short positions increased, the balance of risks has shifted to the upside.

Risks shift

Oil traders and hedge funds are betting the Organization of the Petroleum Exporting Countries will fail to reach a production deal at its next ministerial meeting at the end of November, or that any deal will be weak and lack credibility. Similar scepticism was expressed before the last OPEC meeting in September. The establishment of large short positions left the market vulnerable to a short squeeze when a surprise deal was announced.

The renewed wave of short-selling and fall in oil prices will intensify pressure on OPEC oil ministers to reach a deal before the end of the month or risk triggering an even deeper sell-off. Policymakers from OPEC countries have launched an intensified round of shuttle diplomacy in recent days in response to the increased stakes. The outlook for oil prices is not a one-way bet from here given how many short positions have already been established. Even without OPEC, the large short positions run by hedge funds have left the market poised to rally if and when prices stop falling and bearish managers lock in profits by buying back some shorts. — Reuters

UK real estate giants fall into red on Brexit

LONDON: Real estate giants British Land and Land Securities sank into the red in the first half of 2016, partly hit by sliding commercial property prices after the shock Brexit vote. British Land said yesterday that it suffered a pre-tax loss of £205 million (\$255 million, 238 million euros) in the six months to September after a year-earlier profit of £823 million. The firm, one of Europe's largest publicly listed real estate companies, said the loss was "primarily due to a negative property valuation movement" in the wake of Britain's EU exit referendum on June 23. "Uncertainty caused by the UK's vote to leave the European Union has resulted in the central London office market registering its first capital value declines since 2009 following several years of strong growth in both rents and values," it said. "We recognize the impact that this uncertainty is having on businesses in London, and their ability to make plans for the future, but we believe that London will endure as a global centre."

Bahrain approaches banks about sukuk sale in the Q1

DUBAI: The Kingdom of Bahrain is in talks with lenders for an Islamic bond, or sukuk, which is expected to be issued in the first quarter of 2017, banking sources said. No banks have been appointed yet to arrange the debt transaction, the bankers said on condition of anonymity because the information has not been made public. The size of the debt issuance will be a minimum of \$500 million, one of the banking sources said. Bahrain's Ministry of Finance was not available for immediate comment. The Kingdom has some \$5 billion-equivalent in debt maturing in 2017, mostly consisting of short-term local currency treasury bills. It has no US dollar bond expiring next year, Thomson Reuters data shows. Bahrain's latest US dollar debt issuance was in October, when it sold a \$2 billion bond comprising a \$1 billion sukuk and a \$1 billion conventional bond. The \$1 billion long seven-year sukuk, maturing in February 2024, carries a 5.625 percent coupon rate, while the conventional bond, with a 12-year maturity period, was issued with a 7 percent interest rate.

Global rivalry between Russia and Saudi intensifies

LONDON: A multi-billion-dollar Russian deal to buy Indian refiner Essar was nearly sunk at the eleventh hour by a rival bid from Saudi Arabia as the two oil superpowers vie for supremacy across the world. The deal between Essar and a consortium led by Kremlin oil giant Rosneft appeared dead in the water two months ago after Saudi state energy firm Aramco weighed in, according to seven Russia, India and Saudi-based industry sources familiar with or involved in the negotiations.

It was salvaged due to the involvement of Russian President Vladimir Putin and Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi, who were keen for it go through, and after the consortium agreed to pay \$13 billion - more than double what Rosneft had initially valued Essar at, sources said. This made the refiner the biggest-ever foreign acquisition in India and Russia's largest outbound deal.

The tussle for Essar - a state-of-the-art plant in the world's fastest-growing fuel market - illustrates the growing battle for oil markets between Russia and Saudi Arabia, the world's two largest crude exporters. It also sheds light on the challenges OPEC member Saudi Arabia and non-OPEC Russia which are also fighting a proxy conflict in Syria's civil war - will face in trying to clinch a global agreement to limit output growth to prop up oil prices. The full details of how the Essar deal was struck remain unclear. Two industry sources said it was rescued thanks to the involvement of Putin and Modi while three other sources said Rosneft had simply outbid Saudi Aramco.

Officials in Modi's office declined to comment while Putin's spokesman Dmitry Peskov denied there was any Kremlin intervention in the deal. "Naturally, we defend

the exact amount Rosneft was prepared to offer for the stake at that stage is unclear, Russian and Indian industry sources said it valued the whole of Essar at about \$5.7 billion. However it became apparent that there were problems with the deal in early September, when Sechin travelled to India to meet the Ruia brothers, flying from Hangzhou, China, where he had been part of Putin's G20 summit delegation. Sechin walked into the meeting with the Ruia brothers soon after landing in India at 1 a.m., determined to close the deal, according to sources briefed on the discussions. As the meeting started, one of the brothers told Sechin the deal process had been going on for too long, the exclusivity period had expired in July and Essar was now talking to other parties. Those other parties included Saudi Aramco, he said. According to the sources familiar with how the meeting unfolded, Sechin responded by saving that if Essar walked away from the deal it risked losing Russian financial and oil-supply support. The Ruia brothers then said the talks with Rosneft were over and called an abrupt end to the meeting.

"People started leaving the room, embarrassed," one of the sources said. Another source said the Essar management had drafted a statement to say the deal with Rosneft was off. Rosneft and Essar declined to comment on what transpired at the meeting, or on whether such a statement had existed. Sechin and the Ruia brothers could not be reached for comment. Three Saudi-based sources familiar with details of talks between Essar and Saudi Aramco said the firm was seriously considering buying Essar. One of the sources said Aramco was prepared to pay up to \$9 billion for all or most of the refiner. Aramco declined to comment on whether it had made a bid.

Facing the Saudi competition, Rosneft formed a consortium that bought 98 per cent of the refiner plus a fuel terminal for \$13 billion. Doha Bank picks banks for conventional bond issue

DUBAI: Doha Bank, Qatar's fifth-largest lender by assets, has picked banks for a conventional bond issue, banking sources said yesterday. One of the sources said the issue would be in the region of \$300 million to \$400 million and that the issue was planned for the first quarter of 2017. The bank was not immediately available to comment. Several other Gulf banks are planning issues as investor uncertainty eases in the wake of Donald Trump's election as US president. Bahrain-based Gulf International Bank has asked banks to submit proposals to arrange a potential US dollar-denominated bond issue, while Bank of Sharjah is considering issuing a \$500 million conventional bond in 2017 for general corporate purposes, banking sources told Reuters on Monday. The sources declined to say which banks Doha Bank had mandated to arrange its issue. The bank received approval earlier this year to raise funds with up to \$5 billion worth of short-term instruments, including \$3 billion through certificates of deposits and euro commercial paper worth \$2 billion.

They said the Russian-led consortium was forced to outbid the Saudi offer, which they said comprised a combination of cash, long-term low interest credit and oil supplies. EVEN SHORT OF EXTREMES, TRUMP PROTECTIONISM 'STILL DAMAGING'

WASHINGTON: While his advisors have played down some of President-elect Donald Trump's most extreme trade threats as negotiating tactics, economists remain worried about the potential to inflict real damage. The Republican billionaire has said that on his first day he will label China a currency manipulator, has threatened to pull out of free trade agreements like NAF-TA and slap punitive tariffs of up to 45 percent on China and Mexico.

And there is no question the US president has the power to take those actions unilaterally, without the consent of Congress, economists say. In a campaign season drenched in hyperbolic rhetoric, those protectionist threats have pushed economists to issue truly apocalyptic projections, warning of job losses of four million or more, and a deep and damaging recession in 2018, with negative spillovers to the global economy.

Using threats to negotiate

Since his surprise election win November 8, Trump's advisors have suggested his threats were designed

simply to push trading partners to

agree to a better deal for the US. Even so, economists say Trump's stance already has done damage, although it is hard to quantify what might happen until he provides specifics. The Trans-Pacific Partnership, which comprised 12 economies and would have been the biggest US trade deal, is widely considered dead following Trump's election.

US Trade Representative Michael Froman said the deal "is in purgatory." "We've seen a rise of populism, not just in this country... politics that did not always permit a full debate on the facts," he said at a forum late Monday. It could be that Trump's threats have worked to some extent, since Canada and Mexico each announced last week that they are willing to sit down with the new administration to reexamine NAFTA. But not factored in to the Trump team calculation is the reaction of US trading partners to Trump's protectionist policies.

Marcus Noland, executive vice president of the Peterson Institute for International Economics, points out about US trading partners: "They've got complaints too" about NAFTA. Under the rules of the US free trade agreements like NAFTA, the president can pull out simply by notifying the other members. Notification triggers a 180day clock for new negotiations, but absent a new agreement-which must be ratified by all member legislaturesthe accord would disappear. — AFP

BARRATT CUTS THE PRICE OF ITS **EXPENSIVE LONDON HOMES** HOUSE PRICES A DIVISIVE ISSUE FOR BRITONS

LONDON: Britain's biggest housebuilder Barratt said it was cutting the price of some of its most expensive London homes by up to 10 percent in the latest sign that the market has cooled after property tax increases and the Brexit vote. After an initial dip following the June 23 referendum, demand for new homes in most of Britain, including outer London, has bounced back according to builders and surveys, but it remains weak in the capital's wealthiest central areas.

The Brexit vote followed an increase in property tax on buy-to-let and second homes which particularly affected central London. Some prospective buyers are investors seeking a rental income and have bought cheaper homes instead or pushed for price cuts to offset higher taxes. "We do recognize that at price points about 600,000 pounds (\$750,009), particularly at price points once you move above 1 million, the (London) market is clearly slower," Barratt CEO David Thomas told Reuters.

"You are seeing commentary about prices backing off year-on-year on a 5 to 10 percent basis so I think that it's in that sort of order," he added. The vote to leave the EU will contribute to a 9 percent fall in prices in prime central London, which

includes mansions and luxury apartments in Knightsbridge, Notting Hill and Chelsea, according to estate agents Savills. Thomas attributed the softening London market to more homes coming to market and the increase in stamp duty, property tax, rather than the EU vote.

House prices are key to consumer confidence in Britain, where many gauge the strength of the economy by rises in the value of their most valu-

able asset. However, complaints about the affordability of homes have risen to the top of the political agenda. The average price of houses in Britain is around 220,000 pounds, with many struggling to buy, particularly in the capital where prices are much higher. While Britain's largest housebuilders have reported strong growth in recent months, there have been mixed signs on the progress of Britain's commercial property market, which was first to be hit by Brexit as investors pulled cash from funds. — Reuters

TRUMP-FUELLED RISK RALLY SHIFTS TO JAPANESE BONDS, EURO STOCKS RESUME UPSWING; DOLLAR INDEX HITS 1-YEAR HIGH

LONDON: Investors resumed the post-US would cap the benchmark 10-year yield at election trade of selling bonds and buying stocks yesterday after a pause earlier this week, albeit less aggressively, with Japan's 10-year bond yield hitting its highest since February. The dollar was in demand again too, rising to a one year-high against a basket of currencies as the euro hit a ninemonth low of \$1.07, and to an eight-year peak against the China's yuan. US President-elect Trump's plans to cut taxes and boost infrastructure spending would boost economic activity while his proposals to deport illegal immigrants and impose tariffs on cheap imports are seen driving inflation higher. That prospect has given rise to expectations that US interest rates will rise faster than previously anticipated, boosting the dollar.

As the Bank for International Settlements warned on Tuesday, a stronger dollar poses risks for global markets. But for now, investors are enjoying the ride, meaning stocks and the dollar are in favor at the expense of bonds. "With 10-year Japanese yields briefly edging back above zero, the market will at some stage focus on whether the Bank of Japan will defend the zero level, especially if the global yield sell-off gathers pace over the coming weeks and months," Deutsche Bank's Jim Reid said in a note yesterday. The BOJ announced in September it zero as part of its long-standing battle against deflation and anaemic growth.

"It would be a strange decision to abandon the new policy so soon after announcing it, so assuming global yields remain elevated they may be forced to buy more (bonds) than they thought when the new scheme was announced," Reid said. Japan's 10-year yield rose to 0.03 percent, a ninemonth high. Comparable US Treasury yields rose 3 basis points to 2.27 percent, edging back up toward Monday's 11-month high of 2.302 percent and up from around 1.86 percent before the election. US interest rate futures are pricing in an 85 percent chance of a rate hike in December, compared to 75 percent before the election.

Dollar rises again

In currency market trading yesterday, the dollar rose 0.3 percent against the yen to a five-month high of 109.62 yen and a oneyear high of 100.32 on an index basis. Sharp gains in US bond yields have drawn investors to the dollar, and the dollar index is just 0.5 percent away from its highest level in more than 13-1/2 years. The yuan weakened to 6.8703 to the dollar, its lowest level since December 2008. "The narrative on the dollar is strong," said Simon Smith, chief economist at FXPro. "A move higher in inter-

est rates next month is now a near dead cert, with the implied path for rates next year also moving higher and providing further support for the dollar." In equities, the FTSEuroFirst index of leading 300 European shares followed Wall Street's lead from the previous day and was up 0.2 percent, underpinned by commodity-related stocks.

A 5 percent fall in Bayer, however, weighed on Germany's DAX, which fell 0.2 percent. The drugmaker fell after a placement of 4 billion euros of mandatory convertible notes. MSCI's broadest index of Asia-Pacific shares outside Japan rose 0.2 percent, bouncing back from a four-month low touched earlier this week, while the yen's slide toward 110 per dollar helped lift Japan's Nikkei by 1.1 percent.

The dollar's strength has fanned fears investors could shift funds to the United States from emerging markets. Emerging market stocks, which had fallen 7 percent in the four sessions to Monday, also extended gains for a second day yesterday.

On Wall Street, the Dow Jones industrial average rose 0.29 percent to a record closing high while the S&P 500 gained 0.75 percent. Since Trump's unexpected victory last week, US shares have rallied while US bond prices tumbled, pushing up their yields sharply. In commodities gold was steady at \$1,228 per ounce, not far from a 5 1/2month low of \$1,211.8 seen on Monday, while an oil industry report that showed an unexpected build in US crude stocks helped take this week's shine off oil prices. FINLAND PINING FOR THE **POST-NOKIA CHAMPION**

AANEKOSKI: Nokia was once the motor of Finland's economy, but since the demise of the company's mobile phone business the Nordic country has struggled to find a new engine for growth. But after nine sluggish years and a three-year recession that ended in 2015, could Finland's centuries-old, if unglamorous, forestry sector, hold the answer? A rare bit of good economic news came out of the small industrial town of Aanekoski when forestry giant Metsa Group announced last year a record investment of 1.2 billion euros (\$1.31 billion) in a new facility.

A gust of wind spreads the unpleasant odour of sulphur-akin to rotten eggs-across the town in central Finland, a regular reminder to the 20,000 residents of the quest for new riches. A new mill and biorefinery that will more than double the town's annual production of pulp-a wood fibre mass used to



GOLD SLIPS AS DOLLAR INDEX CLIMBS TO 11-MONTH HIGH

LONDON: Gold eased yesterday in line with a firmer dollar, but found support around \$1,225 an ounce as a sharp rally in cyclical assets like stocks and copper following Donald Trump's election to the US presidency ran out of steam. The metal has shed more than \$100 an ounce from last Wednesday's post-election high on the back of a surge in bond yields and sharply higher appetite for risk. Spot gold was down 0.1 percent at \$1,226.20 an ounce at 1035 GMT, while US gold futures for December delivery were up \$1.40 an ounce at \$1,225.90.

The dollar inched up to a fresh 11month high versus a currency basket yesterday, though major banks sounded slightly more divided on its immediate prospects after a week-long rally driven by the post-election surge in US bond yields. "The most important thing that we saw for gold (after the election) was that the dollar appreciated," LBBW analyst Thorsten Proettel said. "Also, yields on 10-year Treasuries went up 50 basis points, which is poison for gold, as a non-interest bearing asset." "It seems there is something of a bottom around \$1,225," he said. Trump's election to the US presidency sent bond yields surging to 2016 highs this week,

Stock markets stabilized yesterday, with European stocks little changed after rallying more than 3 percent over the past week from their post-election lows. High hopes have been cast for sumption from paper to online articles. "Five to 10 years ago forestry was considered a sunset industry," manager Riikka Pakarinen of the Finnish Forest Industries Federation acknowledged.

Biodiesel to fuel growth

By 2015, Finnish paper giants UPM-Kymmene, Stora Enso and Metsa Group had shut more than 30 paper-making machines around the country, most of them located in small towns highly dependent on the companies for jobs and tax revenue.But with forests covering 78 percent of Finland's land surface, they are unquestionably one of the country's most important resources. Metsa Group is not alone in hoping trees can mean new growth in two senses. Another group, Finnpulp, plans to build a new pulp and biorefinery in the eastern town of Kuopio, while Chinese Sunshine Kaidi New Energy Group plans to invest a billion euros in a refinery

making renewable diesel from wood materials in the northern Finnish town of Kemi.

Finland's leading forestry giant UPM is already in the business. Last year in the southeastern town of Lappeenranta it launched a biorefinery that turns resin, a side product from making pulp, into diesel. "It's the world's first facility to produce wood-based diesel," UPM's head of biofuels Sari Mannonen said. She anticipates growth especially in western Europe, where the EU's climate targets urge replacing fossil fuels with new green options. Analyst Amberla said forestry investments are grounded as global demand for pulp is rising, driven by increasing urbanization and a growing middle class, especially in Asia. But there is a limit to just how much forestry can do: Finland's Natural Resources Institute estimated the harvested share of forests amounted to 79 percent of their annual growth in 2014. —AFP

NINTENDO SHARES JUMP ON SUPER MARIO APP

TOKYO: Shares in gaming giant Nintendo jumped more than five percent yesterday after details of the launch for its keenly awaited new Super Mario game for iPhones were released, hot on the heels of the Pokemon craze. Kyoto-based Nintendo said it would release Super Mario Run worldwide for Apple's iPhone and iPad through the App Store on December 15. The firm's stock price soared as much as 5.5 percent at one point before easing slightly to close up 2.77 percent at 25,550 yen on the Tokyo Stock Exchange. Super Mario, which dates to 1985, is one of Nintendo's best-known and most instantly recognisable brands.

It is so associated with Japan that Prime Minister Shinzo Abe in August appeared at the Rio Olympics' closing ceremony in the mustachioed plumber's red hat and blue overalls to promote Tokyo's 2020 Games. The full app would cost \$9.99 in the United States and 1,200 yen (\$10.95) in Japan, although limited elements of the game would be available for free. Nintendo's shares more than doubled in July-making it more valuable than Sony at one point-as its Pokemon Go game exploded into the public consciousness, being downloaded half a billion times. However, because the firm did not own the licence to the game-that is owned by San Francisco-based Niantic-its success had little impact on the firm's bottom line. But while its share price has dipped back slightly over the past few months, it is still up two-thirds from lows seen before the emergence of Pokemon Go.

'Can't wait'

Neil Campling, an analyst at Northern Trust Capital Markets, hailed the company's approach of enticing gamers in the same way as other mobile game successes as "a great strategy". "To set a low incentive and then a low total cost when engaged could set Nintendo on a differentiated path, which ultimately could be a game changer," Campling said. The game will be introduced for Androidbased devices at a later date. Social media reaction in Japan to the game's price was positive. "Once you pay 1,200 yen, you don't have to pay extra money," one fan said on Twitter. "That's cheap. Can't wait."

Nintendo has already said that any potential earnings impact from Super Mario Run has already been factored into its forecast for the present fiscal year. Nintendo warned last month that its operating profit would come in at 30 billion yen for the financial year, about one-third less than an earlier forecast, while sales would also be lower than expected. After years of refusing to move into the smartphone sector, Nintendo-which also created the Donkey Kong and Legend of Zelda brandsannounced last year it was teaming up with Japanese mobile specialist DeNA to develop games for the handsets based on its host of popular characters.

And in March, the company released its first mobile game "Miitomo"-a free-to-play and interactive game that allows users to create avatars-as it tries to compete in an industry that has increasingly moved online. However, it remains committed to its console business and last Thursday launched a palm-sized version of its 1980s-era games console the Famicom, while it also plans to unveil another device early next year. —AFP



BMW EXPANDS REACHNOW MOBILE SERVICES

LOS ANGELES: German automaker BMW announced Tuesday in Los Angeles that it is expanding its ReachNow program with new mobile tools and adding a city location: New York's trendy Brooklyn borough. BMW ReachNow, launched in Seattle, Washington state in April, is adding services to its initial offering, the chief executive of the new program Steve Banfield said at a news conference on the first day of AutoMobility, a car show focused on

mobile technologies.

Among the new services offered on the ReachNow app is a car-sharing service, rivaling Uber and Lyft, that allows a person to hail a ride and personalize it by selecting temperature, music or even a "do not disturb" feature. It will launch in test mode in Seattle on December 8 before being tested in other cities. ReachNow also is expanding its shared car rental service, similar to Zipcar and launched in April that

until now was available only in Seattle and Portland, Oregon with 800 BMWs.

That service for the first time will leave the West Coast and head east, to Brooklyn, where 250 BMWs and Minis will be waiting for customers. In Manhattan, a pilot program for residential buildings will give residents access to a fleet of electric BMW i3 or BMW Series 3 vehicles that will remain onsite for their exclusive leasing. ReachNow also will allow longer-term car rentals of two to five days with members able to schedule a vehicle to be delivered at their preferred time and location. This reserve service will begin in Seattle in early 2017.

Another pilot program for owners of MINI 2016 or 2017 model year vehicles will be launched in Seattle. The Share program enables MINI owners to rent their vehicles when they do not need access to it, helping to offset the cost of car ownership. The Share service faces competition from other companies such as Turo or Car2go. BMW and other big automakers like General Motors, Ford and Mercedes are racing ahead to develop full suites of mobile technologies. AutoMobility LA is being held through Thursday at the Los Angeles Convention Center. The event combines the former Connected Car Expo and the press days of the LA auto show. The 10-day public show opens Friday and will feature 1,000 vehicles, including 50 new models. —AFP

ULTRA-RICH BID FOR ALL THAT **GLITTERS AT SWISS AUCTIONS**

GENEVA: Geneva's autumn jewel auctions got underway Tuesday, with Russian oligarchs and Chinese billionaires among those eyeing up the array of eye-wateringly expensive bling on offer. The Swiss city's twice-annual sales of rare jewels are often dominated by stones the size of door-stoppers. But this week, gems valued by their weight in carats will share centre stage with gems enriched by the weight of history-including Russian diamonds that reputedly helped broker peace between warring empires three centuries ago.

Christie's kicked off the sales at the luxury Four Seasons Hotel des Bergues on Lake Geneva, with an anonymous telephone bidder snapping up the most closelywatched item-a pair of Boehmer and Bassenge earrings-for a cool \$17.61 million (16.42 million euros) including commission. Tobias Kormind, head of the 77 Diamonds firm that tracks the global diamond market, said elite collectors are more attracted to pose stones rather than show-stoppers like the earrings, composed of two flawless white diamonds weighing 52.55 carats and 50.47 carats. "These earrings are far more likely to be a gift for someone to wear for special occasions," he said ahead of the sale, noting that the list of people interested in socializing with more than 100 carats worth of diamonds on their ears is limited. The earrings fell a little short of the expected price, valued by Christie's at \$20-\$30 million. A necklace made of three huge diamonds by the same jeweller went under the hammer for \$8.06 million.

It is similarly valued at up to \$5 million.

INDIA'S GOLD TRADERS ON EDGE AS MODI FIGHTS 'BLACK MONEY'

TRADERS FEAR IMPORT BAN SOON; 'A RUMOR'

NEW DELHI: Some Indian gold traders are placing bulk, short-term import orders on fears that Prime Minister Narendra Modi might soon add curbs on overseas purchases of the metal to his withdrawal of highdenomination banknotes in his fight against 'black money', traders and jewelers said. India is the world's second biggest gold buyer, and it is estimated that one-third of its annual demand of up to 1,000 tons is paid for in black money - untaxed funds held in secret by citizens in cash that don't appear in any official accounts.

Modi has said he may not stop at the shock currency move that has led to a massive cash shortage, but has not made clear what his next step would be in his drive to uncover the wealth. That uncertainty is likely to create sharp swings in purchases, affecting world prices. "We're uncertain about what the government will do next," said Daman Prakash Rathod, a director at MNC Bullion in the southern city of Chennai. "No legal business trader is willing to risk very big quantity. (Some) want to buy 2-3 kgs extra so that in future they could conduct their business for a month or two until the situation is sorted out."

Panicked gold traders and jewelers have circulated messages amongst themselves saying the government could ban import of gold for domestic use from early next year to March, according to several jewelers in New Delhi and Mumbai who have seen the message. India's ongoing wedding season - traditionally a focus for gifting gold - is fuelling the disquiet. The All India Gems and Jewelry Trade Federation dismissed the messages among traders as a rumor, but some are nevertheless buying extra gold

themselves through the next few months, said an official with the India Bullion And Jewelers Association. A finance ministry spokesman did not immediately respond to a request for comment.

'50 pct premium'

One senior official involved with government policy-making on gold said there has been no discussion on import curbs but that supply has gone up through "unofficial channels". "If you see the premiums, you know that there is demand," the official said, speaking on condition of jewelers are charging premiums of as high as 50 percent but have not committed to buy any new gold, said several jewelers who declined to be identified. The cash crunch has badly hit demand in rural areas, which account for two-thirds of total demand. But in the main gold markets of Zaveri Bazaar in Mumbai and Karol Bagh in New Delhi, there are ready buyers of the metal willing to pay in the old bills.

The current rate in the trade - illegal since Modi's Nov 15 move to withdraw the notes - is 45,000 rupees (\$663) per 10 gms in Karol

Christie's is aiming to capitalize on the still-solid colored stones market with a 9.14-carat Fancy Vivid Pink estimated at \$16-\$18 million. The rare "Fancy Vivid" classification is awarded by the Gemological Institute of America to signify a stone's exceptional color and clarity. Sotheby's top colored gem going under the hammer this week is the 8.01-carat "Sky Blue Diamond", with a pre-auction estimated price of \$15-\$25 million. Sotheby's has estimated its 342-lot auction at a total of \$100 million, while Christie's is offering 220 lots, with an estimated value of \$80 million. —AFP

TOILETS, TRADE AND TOWNS; BOOM TIME FOR ASIA'S PLASTIC MAKERS Demand driven by 'Clean India' sanitation program

million toilets in six years to China's ambitious new Silk Road network and the continued movement of millions of people into cities across Asia, plastic makers face years of strong demand. And, because they are closer to end-users and manufacturing hubs, Asian petrochemical makers are best placed to ride the boom.

Their profits and share prices are rising and they're investing in new projects to expand their business. Chinese futures prices for PVC (polyvinyl chloride), used in products from pipes to bank cards, have risen more than 80 percent this year. Petrochemicals, seen as a niche business in the oil industry, are used in 70 percent of manufactured goods - from mobile phones and yoga pants to cars and food packaging - and bring in valuable revenue for a sector otherwise battling over-supply.

Annual demand for ethylene, the most-used compound among many petrochemical products, is expected to grow at over 10 percent in the coming decade, analysts say. In just one illustration of how demand is set to grow, the "Clean India" program, seeking to end open defecation by 2022, has been welcomed by the Indian Petrochemical Industry group as a "boon for the plastics industry" - requiring building hundreds of millions of toilets, waste pipes and water supply systems to bring clean sanitation to more than 700 million people.

'There is tremendous potential for petrochemical demand to go up because per capita consumption is so low. There is a plastic usage in every utility," said B. Ashok, chairman of Indian Oil Corp, which has a petrochemical plant at its

BEIJING: From India's plan to plumb in over 100 refinery in Panipat, to the north of Delhi. "Demand is strong not only for toilets. India is short of domestic PVC supplies and has been sourcing from countries including South Korea, so Korean export volumes are growing," said Hwang Kyu-won, analyst at Yuanta Securities in Seoul.

'Lion's share'

China's "One Belt, One Road" project - to build a vast rail, road, shipping and factory network between China, central Asia, Africa and Europe will also require millions of tons of plastic materials, noted Luna Kim, principal consultant at Chemical Market Research Inc. This, together with the urbanization of tens of millions of people across Asia each year, means the region will have as many as 650 million new petrochemical customers within two decades, predicts research firm IHS Markit.

Mark Eramo, vice president for global chemical business development at IHS Markit, said the Asia Pacific region will "have the lion's share of the total investments" in petrochemicals until 2025, adding another 100 million tons of basic chemical production, including ethylene. "Ethylene and its related product supply will remain tight over the next 12 months," Japanese bank Nomura said in an investor note. The demand boom is showing across markets, with IHS Markit expecting overall 2016 Asian ethylene margins of \$600 per ton, up from below \$400 last year. In Thailand, PTT, Thai Oil and Siam Cement all reported strong profits in the last month, citing the performance of their petrochemical divisions

Advantage Asia

To be sure, plastic makers from the United States, Europe and the Middle East, such as BASF, Exxon Mobil, Total and Dow Chemical, also hope to profit from Asia's soaring demand, but those closer to that demand should benefit most from lower transit costs and cheaper feedstock prices. "Asian petrochemical makers can be winners over US petrochemical makers," said Jae-sung Yoon, analyst at Hana Financial Investment in South Korea. Asia's leading refiner Sinopec Corp has announced a joint venture with Taiwan's Dynamic Ever Investments to build a petrochemical complex in China's southeastern Fujian province, while Korea Petrochemical Industry Corp and Malaysia-based Lotte Chemical Titan plan to expand next year. In the Philippines, JG Summit has also said it plans to expand.

Malaysia's state-owned energy firm Petronas has a \$27 billion refining and petrochemical complex due to come on stream in 2019. Asian petrochemical makers are also at an advantage in that they largely use the fossil fuel naphtha as a feedstock, while the main feedstock in the United States is natural gas. "By using natural gas as a feedstock, US ethane crackers can only obtain ethylene. However, Asian naphtha crackers can also produce other byproducts like butadiene and propylene," said Yoon at Hana Financial. This feedstock flexibility has helped Lotte Chemical, Formosa Petrochemical and India's Finolex Industries outperform share price gains at manufacturers based in other regions.—Reuters







MALAYSIA TRIES TO PROTECT **ITS WEAKENING CURRENCY**

HONG KONG: Foreign banks have been asked to make a written commitment to Malaysia's central bank to stop trading the ringgit in the offshore non-deliverable forwards market in the bank's latest move to protect a weakening currency, banking sources said. Foreign banks have been sent a form letter to sign, which asks them for an "unconditional representation and commitment" to stop trading in any offshore Malaysian ringgit non-deliverable forwards or offshore derivatives. The letters were sent by banks in Malaysia who hold bonds and other Malaysian assets as custodians for foreign banks. The form letters are addressed to Bank Negara Malaysia. Two separate sources at banks confirmed getting the form letter, which Reuters reviewed

The letters also asks financial institutions to provide a detailed plan to the central bank if they need to make ringgit transactions onshore and to seek help from Malaysian financial institutions for any foreign exchange transaction needs.

Bank Negara in a statement to Reuters yesterday confirmed it has made the request through banks in Malaysia. "Bank Negara Malaysia has requested through onshore banks that any non-resident banks, which transact in the forex market, to attest that they are not and will not engage in NDF related transactions," the Bank Negara statement said.

Foreign holdings account for 40 percent of the total outstanding bond market in Malaysia, one of the largest foreign ownerships in Asia. Foreigners have been fleeing the Malaysian market in a global bond rout following Donald Trump's election as US President last week, which sent the dollar soaring and has hit emerging market currencies particularly hard. Trump is expected to adopt policies that are likely to increase interest rates faster than previously thought. Investors typically use the liquid NDF markets in Singapore and Hong Kong to exchange ringgit for dollars because of the many restrictions in the domestic market. —Reuters

FACEBOOK'S FAKE NEWS PROBLEM: WHAT'S ITS RESPONSIBILITY?

NEW YORK: Facebook is under fire for failing to rein in fake and biased news stories that some believe may have swayed the presidential election. Its predicament stems from this basic conundrum: It exercises great control over the news its users see, but it declines to assume the editorial responsibility that traditional publishers do. On Monday, Facebook took a minor step to address the issue, clarifying its advertising policy to emphasize that it won't display ads on sites that run information that is "illegal, misleading or deceptive, which includes fake news."

The company said it was merely making explicit a policy that was already implied. Its move followed a similar step by Google earlier on Monday, after the search giant acknowledged that it had let a false article about the election results slip into its list of recommended news stories. In the case of both companies, the aim is to discourage fake-news sites by depriving them of revenue.

Facebook is also said to be facing brewing internal turmoil over its influence and what it can and should do about it.

Employees have expressed concern over Facebook's role in spreading misinformation and racist memes largely associated with the alt-right, according to The New York Times and BuzzFeed. Some have reportedly formed an unofficial task force to investigate the role the company played in the election. Founder and CEO Mark Zuckerberg, however, insists that Facebook remains a neutral technology platform where its users can share anything they want, with only a tiny fraction of it fake or problematic. Last week, Zuckerberg called the idea that voters might have been influenced by what they saw on Facebook - fake, uber-partisan stories, such as a false one about Pope Francis endorsing Donald Trump for president - "pretty crazy."

Facebook control

People update to Facebook so fre-

quently that the company has no choice but to filter what everyone sees in their news feeds - the main artery through which users see posts from their friends, family, businesses, news sources and celebrities they follow. The company's secret algorithms are designed to deliver the posts from friends and other sources that will draw people in and lead them to read and click and "like" and share -"maximizing their engagement," in Facebook's jargon. Facebook frequently tweaks its algorithm to improve engagement. Various changes have been aimed at shutting out sites that promote clickbait and other garbage that users say they don't want to see, even as they click on it and share away. When users are surrounded by posts they want to see, they're more likely to stick around.

That's key to Facebook's advertising business. But it can be problematic when it comes to false but highly interesting posts. Facebook's news feed "maximizes for engagement. As we've learned in this election, bulls-t is highly engaging," for- nected with friends and family." mer Facebook product designer Bobby Goodlatte wrote in an Election Day post . "Highly partisan, fact-light outlets" on both the right and the left, he wrote, "have no concern for the truth, and really only care for engagement. ... It's now clear that democracy suffers if our news environment incentivizes bulls-t."

Social media companies today have to acknowledge that they are news organizations, said Jeffrey Herbst, president and CEO of the Newseum, a journalism museum in Washington. "Not like news companies of the 20th century," he added. "But not just pipes where people get their news. They determine what is news." In a post Saturday night, Zuckerberg rejected that idea. "News and media are not the primary things people do on Facebook, so I find it odd when people insist we call ourselves a news or media company in order to acknowledge its importance," he wrote. "Facebook is mostly about helping people stay con-

Facebook as newspaper?

Back in 2013, Zuckerberg said he wanted Facebook to be people's "own personal newspaper," one that delivers the stories most interesting and important to them. That's still the company's goal - though minus any reference to itself as a media company of any kind. Of course, fake stuff has existed on the internet long before Facebook. And under the law, Facebook is no more responsible for what appears on its site than "the paper mills that print newspapers are responsible for their content," said Steve Jones, a professor at the University of Illinois at Chicago who studies communication technology. At the same time, Jones said he thinks the broader issue of Facebook's responsibility is one that's going to be "debated forever." "Even the notion of truth is something that's highly contested at this point," he said.— AP

IN THE WORLD OF INTERNET-ENABLED THINGS, US SAYS 'SECURITY NEEDED

WASHINGTON: The Obama administration urged companies on Tuesday to make millions of devices safe from hacking, underscoring the risks posed by an increasingly bewildering array of internet-connected products permeating daily life, covering everything from fitness trackers to computers in automobiles. In a report obtained by The Associated Press, the Homeland Security Department described runaway security problems with devices that have been made internet-capable in recent years, a group that includes medical implants, surveillance cameras, home appliances, digital video recorders, thermostats and baby monitors.

It said they posed "substantial safety and economic risks," recommending immediate action by software and hardware developers, service providers, manufacturers and commercial and government buyers. No specific penalties were proposed for manufacturers failing to comply. No blame was placed on consumers buying and operating such products.

"The growing dependency on networkconnected technologies is outpacing the means to secure them," Homeland Secretary Jeh Johnson said. The department's strategy represents an attempt to organize the so-far scattered cybersecurity efforts for the category of devices known as the "internet of things." It comes less than a month after hackers harnessed an army of 100,000 internet-connected devices around the world, such as DVRs and security cameras, to attack Dyn Co., which helps route internet traffic to its destination. It caused temporary internet outages to sites that included Twitter, PayPal, Pinterest, Reddit and Spotify.

Such threats are likely to increase, US

with cybersecurity experts, industry associations and branches of the government such as the Justice and State departments. They spoke about possibly holding companies accountable through product liability principles and how to create a uniform rulebook for securing these devices.

"We need to have a very serious national conversation about what the approach is, and we need to do it urgently," Silvers said. The internet of things is decentralized and enormously complex, making it difficult to regulate. A camera with online capabilities may be designed in California, manufactured in China with parts from Taiwan and sold to someone who operates it on Germany's network. Silvers said there is no benefit to "190 different national approaches." Some industrial sectors have moved forward with their own recommendations. In September, the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration published guidelines for self-driving cars. The Food and Drug Administration published its own guidance for medical devices in January. For more than a decade, companies have added internet capabilities to devices as an additional feature, sometimes without security considerations. But adding security in wholesale fashion afterward is often more costly. It is also more complicated when change standard industry practices.

Some fixes are easier than others. The government urged companies to ensure security setting are turned on by default. Unique passwords for each device should be required so hackers can't use a single stolen password to control thousands or more devices. Manufacturers ought to make products whose vulnerabilities can be fixed remotely. "You can't rely on a consumer to spend three hours to upgrade her toaster software. It's not going to happen," Silvers said. The government also highlighted the need for an "end-of-life strategy" for devices that aren't created to last indefinitely. As a result, they won't be patched and updated forever, leading to new vulnerabilities for consumers using devices beyond certain expiration dates.—AP

WHATSAPP SUSPENDS GIVING FACEBOOK EUROPE USERS DATA

SAN FRANCISCO: WhatsApp has temporarily suspended giving parent company Facebook information about users in Europe for ad targeting, responding to concerns there over privacy, a source close to the matter said Tuesday. Conversations with officials in Europe over the past few months resulted in the social network deciding to only tapping into WhatsApp user data there for purposes such as fighting spam, according to the source.

The break was described as an effort to give regulators time to share privacy concerns and for Facebook to consider ways to address them. German data protection authorities in September cited privacy concerns when they blocked Facebook from collecting subscriber data from WhatsApp there. "It has to be (the users') decision whether they want to connect their account with Facebook," Hamburg's Commissioner for Data Protection and Freedom of Information Johannes Caspar said at the time.

"Facebook has to ask for their permission in advance." WhatsApp announced in August that it would begin sharing data with Facebook, in a bid to allow better tar-

geted advertising and to combat spam on the platform. Users of the instant messenger were given the ability to opt out of sending information to Facebook through settings in WhatsApp's applications on smartphones. European data protection group G29 formally expressed its concerns at the end of October. The G29 sent letters asking Facebook and WhatsApp to stop sharing data until appropriate legal safeguards were in place.

The sharing of WhatsApp user information with Facebook went beyond what subscribers consented to in the original terms of service, the G29 reasoned. Facebook bought WhatsApp about two years ago in a deal valued about \$19 billion. In mid-September, the European Commission recommended tighter privacy and security requirements for services including WhatsApp and Microsoft-owned video calling service Skype, saying they should be regulated more like traditional telecoms. Under the proposal, the commission would require companies like WhatsApp or Skype to offer emergency-calling services when customers dial traditional phone numbers as well as obey stricter privacy rules.—AFP

computers to interpret complete sentences. That may sound simple, but it took years of engineering to pull off. Until now, Google's technology analyzed phrases in pieces and then cobbled together a sometimes stilted translation. Now that Google's machines can interpret entire sentences, the translations of extended passages of text should read and sound much more like a native speaker of the language.

The technology, dubbed "neural machine translation," is similar to what Google has been using for the past few years to identify people and objects in pictures stored in its Photos service. Google described its neural machine tool as the biggest leap for its translation service in a decade. Forrester Research analyst Mike Gualtieri also believes Google's new method is a significant breakthrough, although he said he expects it to make some potentially embarrassing mistakes in its early stages, much like the Photos service misidentified some things when it first rolled out.

"I doubt it will be translating like the computers on 'Star Trek' quite yet," Gualtieri said. Starting Tuesday, the technology is being be used to translate phrases to and from English and eight other languages - French, German, Spanish, Portuguese, Chinese, Japanese, Korean and Turkish. Those languages cover about one-third of all the translation requests that Google gets. It says that on average it translates about 140 billion words per day for the more than 500 million people who use the service. Google, part of Alphabet Inc, eventually hopes to apply the neural machine technology on all 103 languages in its translation service.

Vote of confidence

In another development, Google delivered a vote of confidence in London's future as a technological hub after the Brexit vote on Tuesday by announcing plans for a new building in the King's Cross area of the city that will house thousands of extra engineers. Google's Chief Executive Sundar Pichai said computer science had a great future in Britain, citing the talent pool, educational institutions, and passion for innovation present in the country. "That's why we are investing in London in both engineering talent and infrastructure," he said. The 10-storey building, Google's first wholly owned and designed outside the United States, will increase its presence in King's Cross to more than 1 million square feet, enough for more than 7,000 employees in total, the company said.

Google has 5,700 employees and contractors in the UK, including about 2,000 engineers housed in the recently opened building in King's Cross where Pichai announced the expansion. Pichai, who became CEO in October 2015 when parent company Alphabet Inc was created, said he was optimistic about Britain's future, despite the uncertainty caused by June's vote to leave the European Union. "Historically, the UK has been an open and connected economy, and like a lot of businesses we are proud of and rely on the fact that we recruit the best talent from around world," he said, "We are optimistic that this situation will continue."

"We understand there is uncertainty and even concerns about topics like Brexit and the pace of technological change in our times, but we know for

investment showed leading firms were still choosing to invest in Britain, while the Mayor of London Sadiq Khan said inflows remain "robust" post-Brexit. 

"Attacks can either be opportunistic in nature, whereby a threat actor will target an organization having discovered a particular software vulnerability on a public-facing site, or more targeted as the organization may hold particularly sensitive or lucrative information that can be used for a variety of malicious uses. Broadcasting services represent potentially worthwhile targets as they often hold extensive personal details about their customers, such as names, dates of birth, physical addresses and payment information," said Chris Brown, VP EMEA, Digital Shadows.

The report further revealed that by their very nature, news sites attract large amounts of traffic. While this is great for their business models. it makes them an attractive target for malvertising, which is often used as a vector to compromise users who visit legitimate websites. The 'Shooting the Messenger' report further revealed a different approach to cyberattacks - typosquatting - where attackers use domain names that are similar to launch a wide variety of online fraud including phishing campaigns. Internet-facing products are insecurely brought to the market and threat actors develop ways to exploit them. Security professionals must understand the other threats that pose risks to their industry including malvertising, extortion and data leakage and by understanding these threats, as well as the actors behind them, media and broadcasting companies can better secure themselves and their customers."

Email addresses of media and broadcasting organizations have also been leaked through other breaches. In a recent Digital Shadows report that analyzed the extent of credential compromise from the world's biggest 1,000 companies, many leaked credentials were discovered. By analyzing nearly 30,000 claimed breaches, discovered across paste sites, criminal forums and dark web sources, we discovered over 935,870 email and password combinations for the media and entertainment industry. The top breaches were, somewhat unsurprisingly, social media platforms. Indeed, MySpace, LinkedIn, and Tumblr breaches were responsible for a respective 41, 14 and 3 percent of the total leaked credentials.

BAD SMOG AHEAD: BEIJING TELLS STUDENTS TO STAY INDOORS

BEIJING: Authorities in Beijing warned yesterday that heavy pollution will persist this week, urging the suspension of outdoor school activities and construction projects.

The warning comes in the form of an orange alert, the second highest in a four-tier system. The alert signifies there will be three consecutive days of smog starting Thursday at particularly dangerous levels on the Chinese capital's air quality index. A red alert is issued if pollution is forecast to persist for more than three days.

Kindergartens and primary and middle schools were advised to cancel outdoor activities. There was no word on such an advisory for Beijing's high schools, which focus mainly on indoor test preparation. Construction sites that dot the ever-expanding city were targeted by authorities for the exhaust, dust and other pollution they add to the already toxic mix in the air.

Launched three years ago amid rising public

concern, the warning system is one way authorities are attempting to clean up China's dirty air after decades of breakneck economic growth that led to the construction of hundreds of coal-fired power plants and soaring car ownership.

Authorities say they're making progress. Environmental officials in Beijing said Monday that a key indicator of poor air quality - the density of the particulate matter PM2.5 - decreased in the first 10 months year-on-year.

Also Monday, the environmental campaign group Greenpeace East Asia reported that levels of the heavy metals arsenic, cadmium and lead in the PM2.5 in Beijing had fallen rapidly since 2013. It said the decline was directly linked to the closure of coal-fired power plants around the city.

The Beijing Municipal Environmental Monitoring Center acknowledged that the city's air was likely to worsen as the coal-powered winter heating system kicks in across northern China. — AP

THOUSANDS OF KIDS DYING IN NORTHEAST NIGERIA, SAYS SURVEY

LAGOS, NIGERIA: Thousands of children have died of starvation and disease in Boko Haram-ravaged northeastern Nigeria, Doctors Without Borders said Tuesday quoting a new survey that is forcing Nigerian officials to stop denying the crisis.

The Paris-based organization hopes that official recognition of the calamity in which "thousands are dying" will help bring urgent aid before older children also start dying, Natalie Roberts, emergency program manager for northeast Nigeria, told The Associated Press.

A survey of two refugee camps in the northeastern city of Maiduguri shows a quarter of the expected population of under-5 children is missing, assumed dead, according to the organization. Under-5 mortality rates in the camps are more than double the threshold for declaring an emergency, Roberts said in a phone interview from Paris.

Speaking on her return from northeastern Borno state, the birthplace of Boko Haram's Islamic uprising, she said the absence of young children was striking. "We only saw older brothers and sisters. No toddlers are straddling their big sisters' hips. No babies strapped to their mums' backs. It's as if they have just vanished," Roberts said.

Sounding the alarm

Doctors Without Borders first sounded the alarm in June but senior officials of the National Emergency Management Agency managing the camps as late as September denied any child was suffering malnutrition and accused the doctors of exaggerating the crisis to attract donations. That was after The Associated Press published images of matchstick-thin children fighting medical organization, also known as Medecins Sans Frontieres, or MSF.

The crisis is aggravated by alleged theft of food aid by emergency management officials being investigated by Nigeria's senate. "The difference now is that our figures have been checked by the statistician general, and we have official recognition from the government that they believe this is happening," Roberts said.

An estimated 75,000 children could die within a year because donors have provided only one-third of requested funding and twice as much, \$1 billion, is needed for the rest of the year and into 2017, says the United Nations.

A vital funding conference in Geneva next month could save the day, otherwise "it won't be long before we could be in the painful position of having to turn away sick and starving children," says the US-based Save the Children.

Some 2.6 million people including more than 1 million children have been driven from their homes by Nigeria's 7-year-old insurgency that has killed more than 20,000 people, left food-producing fields fallow, disrupted trade routes and destroyed wells, bridges and entire towns.

President Muhammadu Buhari last month set up a presidential committee to coordinate aid and the rebuilding of the northeast, even as an end to the rainy season has brought a predictable upsurge in attacks on military outposts and urban suicide bombings by the Islamic extremists.

Buhari and Nigeria's military have said aerial bombardments and a ground offensive that have forced the insurgents out of most towns has the extremists on the run. But aid agencies say they can barely venture outside Maiduguri for fear of attack

Another approach might involve setting a deadline. "What Trump should do is on Day 1 say, 'We are not going to fight that lawsuit - those payments end at the end of calendar year 2017," said Michael Cannon, health policy director at the libertarian Cato Institute think tank. Cannon was one of the main proponents of an earlier legal challenge to the law's premium subsidies in certain states. That case was decided by the Supreme Court in favor of the administration.

A deadline would give consumers and insurers some time to adjust, and help focus Congress on the need to pass legislation to replace the ACA. But legally that could get complicated. If the Trump administration were to agree with the House that the subsidies are unconstitutional, how could it continue to make any payments at all? Congress would have to provide some sort of stopgap authority.

House Speaker Paul Ryan, R-Wis., is reviewing the issue. "We are in contact with the Trump transition team as we consider the House's options," said spokeswoman AshLee Strong. Insurers are worried. WELLINGTON: The world's first pizza drone delivery was claimed yesterday by the New Zealand division of fast food giant Domino's, as it looks to grab a slice of a potentially hot future market.

Domino's said it used an unmanned aerial vehicle to deliver two pizzas to a customer at Whangaparaoa, just north of Auckland. The firm's boss Don Meij said drones were set to become an essential part of pizza deliveries. "They can avoid traffic congestion and traffic lights, and safely reduce the delivery time and distance by travelling directly to customers'

homes," he said. "This is the future. Today's successful delivery was an important proof of this concept." He said tests would continue at Whangaparaoa this week, with a view to expanding the delivery area next year.

Domino's said it was also examining using drones in Australia, Belgium, France, the Netherlands, Japan and Germany. In March, the company unveiled a robot cart being trialed in New Zealand that it claimed was the world's first driverless pizza delivery vehicle. — AFP

CHOLESTEROL DRUG SHOWS PROMISE TO HELP REVERSE HEART DISEASE

NEW ORLEANS: For the first time, a new drug given along with a cholesterol-lowering statin medicine has proved able to shrink plaque that is clogging arteries, potentially giving a way to undo some of the damage of heart disease.

The difference was very small but doctors hope it will grow with longer treatment, and any reversal or stabilization of disease would be a win for patients and a long-sought goal. The drug, Amgen Inc.'s Repatha, also drove LDL, or bad cholesterol, down to levels rarely if ever seen in people before. Heart patients are told to aim for below 70, but some study participants got as low as 15. "There doesn't appear to be any level at which there is harm" from too little LDL, and the lower patients went, the more their plaque shrank, said one study leader, the Cleveland Clinic's Dr. Steven Nissen.

Results were published Tuesday by the Journal of the American Medical Association and discussed at an American Heart Association conference. Statins such as Lipitor and Crestor curb cholesterol production. Repatha and a similar drug, Praluent, block PCSK9, a substance that interferes with the liver's ability to remove cholesterol from the blood. Too much cholesterol, along with other substances, can build up and form plaque in arteries.

Drawbacks

The new drugs have drawbacks, though. Statins are pills sold as generics for as little as a dime a day. The new ones are biotech drugs that are expensive to make - Repatha costs \$14,000 a year and insurers often won't pay. They must be given as shots every two weeks or once a month. People can do it themselves with a penlike device.

In the study, about 900 heart disease patients were given a strong statin and monthly shots of either Repatha or a dummy solution. Ultrasound images were taken of an artery with plaque at the start of the trial and 18 months later.

The average for bad cholesterol stayed around 93 for people given only the statin, but dropped to 37 for those on both drugs. The amount of artery plaque stayed about the same for the statin-only group but shrank 1 percent in those also given Repatha. Some people with more dramatic LDL declines saw plaque shrink 2 percent. "It's small, but it probably took patients 60 years to accumulate that plaque," so to see any change after just 18 months of treatment is good, said a cholesterol expert, Dr. Raul Santos of the University of Sao Paolo. — AP

VILLAGERS IN GOA FIGHT TO **KEEP ANCIENT COMMUNITY** LAND FROM UNIVERSITY

LOLIEM, INDIA: For Meena Varik, a tury old. Meanwhile, the Goa governteacher in Loliem village in southern Goa, the Bhagwati Moll plateau has always been community land meant for cattle grazing, temple processions and a wildlife reserve.

But if the state has its way, the plateau on a hillock abutting the village could be the site for an Indian Institute of Technology (IIT) and the land given over to classrooms, laboratories and hostels for hundreds of students and faculty members. "We are not against development, but this land is sacred to us and our way of life," Varik said, pointing to the trees and thick scrub that cover the plateau. "The village owns this land. No one has the right to take it away without our consent."

The plateau, easily accessed by several trails from Loliem, is the latest of Goa's historic comunidades, or community lands, to be caught up in a dispute as demand for land for industrial and development projects grows in India. About 70 percent of Goa's land is collectively owned by more than 200 comunidades across the state, administered by a traditional code that is centuries old.

Over the years, comunidade lands have been given up for roads, mines, industries and hotels. Many have been contentious decisions, creating deep divides across the state that is popular with tourists for its sandy beaches and laid back vibe. "These are common lands that have always been meant for the welfare of the whole village, not one single individual or entity," said Andre Antonio Pereira, advocate and secretary of an association of comunidades. "But we have slowly been losing these lands in the name of development. If we don't protect them, we will lose a part of our history," he told the Thomson Reuters Foundation.

The majority of land conflicts in India are related to common lands, including Goa's comunidades, with disputes centered around their governance, according to a study released on Wednesday by the Tata Institute of Social Sciences. Communities are dependent on common lands for farming, fishing, livestock rearing, salt manufacturing, and grazing.

While private lands have some protection, governments rarely respect the customary usage or communities' claims over common lands, the report said.

Vague boundaries

Legislation such as a 2006 forest rights law and a 1996 act on tribal areas aim to protect the rights of farmers and local and indigenous communities over their lands, but the laws are usually diluted and poorly implemented, activists say.

The additional challenge with comu-

ment has locked horns with villagers over several projects, including land for a new airport in the northern part of the state, as well as for a National Institute of Technology in south Goa.

The federal government approved setting up an IIT campus in Goa about two years ago, and the institute began operations from a temporary campus in the state earlier this year. "The decision to locate the IIT campus in Loliem was made by the state government in consultation with village and district officials," said Vivek Kamat, director at the Directorate of Technical Education.

"If villagers turn down the project, we will have to see." Villagers in Loliem, which lies in the southernmost tip of the state, said they became aware the prestigious university was to be built on about 300 acres (120 hectares) of land on the Bhagwati Moll plateau a few months ago. Since then, they have written to state and federal officials, opposing the plan, and also held a protest march to the district headquarters. They say comunidade officials, who have given their approval, are acting on their own.

Villagers have demanded a meeting of the village council, which they say has also not kept them informed. The council will issue some of the permits for the construction of the campus. "It's a prestigious educational institute, not a polluting industry, and we will benefit from it," said Bhushan Padgaonkar, sarpanch or head of the Loliem village council, and a member of the comunidade. "There is no industry in this village; we need to think of our future. The IIT will put the village on the map," he said.

Sacred land

Villagers opposed to the project will attend a council meeting later this month "in large numbers" and oppose the resolution approving the project, said Renuka Prabhugaonkar of the Citizens' Committee of Loliem.

"We don't even have enough water and electricity for ourselves. How will there be enough with a large university?" she said, displaying copies of letters to state and federal officials and a campaign to collect signatures to protest the move. "How many jobs can a university generate, anyway? The damage to the village, the community will be far greater than any benefit from it," she said.

While comunidades have autonomy over the common lands, state officials are known to influence appointments of their officers and interfere in the running of the comunidades, said Almeida. Environmental activists have backed the protests in Loliem, saving the plateau is ecologically sensitive and is a natural aquifer for streams that sustain the village. The state has a spotty environmental record, with accusations of unplanned development damaging its famed coastline. A ban on mining in 2012, welcomed by environmentalists, was lifted three years later. Villagers in Loliem say they are determined to fight till the state backs down. "We are simply protecting what our forefathers passed on to us. We want to preserve it for our children and grandchildren," said Varik, the teacher. "This project threatens our culture, our way of life." — Reuters

DIY BREAST RECONSTRUCTION: DEVICE LETS WOMEN DO PART AT HOME CONTROL, COMFORTABLE AND CONVENIENT

NEW YORK: This might be the ultimate do-ityourself project: Doctors are testing a device that would let women do part of their own breast reconstruction at home. It's aimed at not only making treatment more comfortable and convenient, but also giving women a sense of control - something cancer often takes away.

More than 100,000 women each year in the United States have surgery to remove a cancerous breast, and many of them choose reconstruction with an implant. To make room for a permanent one, many of them get a tissue expander, a temporary pouch that is gradually enlarged with saline to stretch the remaining skin and muscle. This means trips to the doctor every week or two for several months for injections of saline into the pouch, which can be a painful ordeal. "We would put as much saline as we could until basically the patient would say, 'I can't stand it anymore," said Dr. Daniel Jacobs, a Kaiser Permanente plastic surgeon in San Jose, California.

While biking home one day, Jacobs had an idea: Why couldn't a tiny can of compressed gas, like the one he carries to fix a flat tire, be used to let women inflate their own tissue expanders, a little each day so there is less stretching at a time and less pain? He helped found a company -AirXpanders Inc. of Palo Alto, California - to develop the device, called AeroForm. It's sold in Australia, approved in Europe and under review by the US Food and Drug Administration.

Requirements

Ascherman, can't you change it?" he said.

There was no difference in rates of sideeffects such as infections, but seven of the air expanders malfunctioned versus only one saline one, Ascherman said. The device was tweaked to fix the problem, he said. "It's a really interesting concept," said one outside expert, Dr. Deanna Attai, a University of California at Los Angeles surgeon who is a past president of the American Society of Breast Surgeons.

"Giving the patient a sense of control is very psychologically important," because many women feel robbed of that, Attai said. "To a patient that's going through cancer treatment that could be a big deal."

Dr. Susan E. Downey, a Los Angeles plastic

surgeon who used the AeroForm on two patients in the study, said: "I think it will make life easier for a lot of people."

It did for 35-year-old Luincys Fernandez, a high school chemistry teacher who lives in Bogota, New Jersey, and teaches in New York. She was diagnosed with breast cancer a year ago, when pregnant with her second son, and used the AeroForm as part of the study. "I really, really liked it," she said. She carried the remote control in her purse and completed the tissue expansion in just 18 days. "It did not interrupt any of my daily activities. I could go back to normal. I could see the results right away and I could see where I wanted it to go" in terms of size and appearance, she said. — AP

"There's a fear that the scientific infrastructure in the US is going to be on its knees," said Robin Bell, a geophysicist at Columbia University and incoming president-elect of the American Geophysical Union. "Everything from funding to being able to attract the global leaders we need to do basic science research."





The indie child star who loves playing oddballs

e isn't quite a household name yet but, at the age of 19, child star-turned-teen heartthrob Asa Butterfield has built up a resume a Hollywood veteran would envy. The British actor has worked with Martin Scorsese and Tim Burton, starring alongside some of cinema's biggest names, including Samuel L. Jackson, Ben Kingsley, Emily Blunt and Anthony Hopkins. "I've never really gotten starstruck," he tells AFP ahead of the release of his latest project, sci-fi fantasy "The Space Between Us," co-starring Gary Oldman. "I've been very lucky to work with the people I have, but as an actor you need to be on a level playing field. Every actor I've worked with has been great at making me feel comfortable on set." Butterfield began acting at age eight, after a casting director saw him at his after-school drama club in north London. The movie that made Hollywood sit up and pay attention, 2008 Holocaust drama "The Boy in the Striped Pyjamas," earned Butterfield a British Independent Film Award nomination.

"Hugo," Martin Scorsese's 2011 love letter to the film industry, proved to be his big break, with his own lead performance earning him a Critics' Choice Award nomination for best young actor. He has since transformed himself into a poster boy for young adult drama through such films as 2013's "Ender's Game," where he played the titular role alongside Harrison Ford.

Dream come true


This year has seen him cast as the reluctant young hero of "Miss Peregrine's Home for Peculiar Children," a performance which moved director Tim Burton to praise Butterfield's "special kind of sensitivity." For the young London-based actor, working with the legendary director was the fulfillment of a career-long dream. "When people asked me which director do you want to work with, I'd say Tim Burton. It's lovely having him welcome you somewhat into his imagination and ideas, which always blow you away," he says. "He is always very spontaneous. The way he works is very chaotic and you have to be on your toes."

Next up is "The Space Between Us," in which Butterfield plays Gardner Elliot, the first boy born on Mars who visits Earth for the first time at the age of 16, released in the US on December 16. Butterfield and co-star Carla Gugino ("San Andreas," "Batman v Superman") spent two weeks walking with weights on their ankles to get used to how a Mars resident might cope in the more tiring gravity of Earth. The character is like many Butterfield has taken on-an abandoned or orphaned child, an oddball who must negotiate a world he barely understands.

Original roles

"I'm always trying to find roles which are original in one way or another, and stories which are original," he tells AFP. "I never really play the kid who's got the perfect life. Usually he's missing a parent or two." Like the young actors in the "Harry Potter" films, Butterfield has done his growing up in front of the camera but this indie child star has never been a recognizable celebrity. His more high-profile recent roles are beginning to change that as he enters adulthood, but he has his feet on the ground, and says he is more likely to be photographed cycling in London than cruising Beverly Hills in a Porsche.

"It hasn't really changed my life," he says of his career so far, before correcting himself. "Well, I suppose it has changed my life but I don't let it dictate my life." This month Butterfield began filming World War I drama "Journey's End," and there have been persistent rumors of superhero movies, although it's not a genre that particularly interests him. "I want to carry on acting. It's not the only thing I want to do though," he says. "I want to film wildlife documentaries up the Amazon or somewhere, behind the camera." — AFP

BEAUTY & THE BEAST IS A TALE AS OLD AS TIME - WITH SURPRISES

irector Bill Condon was only interested in turning Disney's animated classic "Beauty and the Beast " into a live-action film if he could use Alan Menken's Oscar-winning score. He remembers fondly when it came out in 1991 and how it not only solidified Disney's animation renaissance after "The Little Mermaid," but also helped revitalize the movie musical at a time when the genre was basically dead. The New York Times theater critic Frank Rich even called it, somewhat controversially, "the best Broadway musical score of 1991."It's fitting, then, that the twinkling instrumentals of Menken's prologue are the first thing you hear in the new trailer for the film , released Monday by Disney.

recreated and made real in magnificent detail - like the grand ballroom and Belle's yellow gown. But Condon was not restricted solely to drawing from the animated film.

The new movie also contains nods to Jean Cocteau's ornate black and white version from 1946, Condon said, as well as his own unique vision. "We went in with the idea that we were going to set it in a very specific time - the early 18th century in the French countryside," Condon said. They took pains to make sure the household staff resembled items - clocks, teapots, candelabras from that time and place.

More modern

Unsurprisingly, the big, splashy technical set-piece is "Be Our Guest," in which the anthropomorphized household items stage their own Busby Berkeley-inspired number to serve Belle a meal. It wasn't easy. "For us it was taking something that animation does easily - imagining dancing candlesticks and making it real," he said. The film is not just a remembrance of "Beauty and the Beasts" past, however. They've made Belle even more modern than she was in 1991, when it was somewhat extraordinary to have the center of a Disney film be more interested in books than boys.

Six years after 'True Grit,' another breakout for Steinfeld

oes Hailee Steinfeld know how good she is? It's a question writer-director Kelly Fremon Craig and producer James L. Brooks would often ask themselves after watching the young actress shoot a take while making their high-school comedy "Edge of Seventeen." "Jim and I would sit there and go, 'Holy god!'" says Craig. "And after we'd call cut, Jim and I would be staring at each other with our mouths open and she'd just be on her phone like she didn't even know she did something that great." Steinfeld, an Oscar nominee at 14, is having another breakthrough at 19. In Craig's much-lauded directorial debut "Edge of Seventeen," the young star of the Coen brothers' "True Grit" proves that she's matured into one of the finest (and funniest) actresses of her generation.

It's a comic and heartfelt coming-ofage movie in the John Hughes mode in which Steinfeld stars as Nadine, a Joblike high-school junior plagued by a series of embarrassments. She's a selfdescribed "old soul" who resents her fellow high-schoolers as "mouth breathers"; she's equal parts narcissistic and self-loathing, and altogether witty, honest and original. "This was one big liberating role for me," Steinfeld said in an interview earlier this fall. "It was amazing to be able to express all of that because I feel like, in a way, I haven't really been able to before. This character is so much like myself."

Steinfeld was making a brief stop at the Toronto International Film Festival, where "Edge of Seventeen" (in theaters Friday) was the closing night film. It was

"It's definitely something that requires going in headfirst and not looking back," says Steinfeld. "When you stand on that stage, it's you. It's me going out there and being vulnerable in front of a bunch of people and having fun. And it's scary because it's so different than having that protection of being a character." The irony is that Steinfeld, in character, is such a genuine performer and potent force of nature. That was first evident in "True Grit," Joel and Ethan Coen's Charles Portis adaptation in which she played the scripture-quoting, pigtailed Mattie. The Coen brothers searched and searched for an actress for the part before finding the then 13year-old Steinfeld; she was the only one could handle Portis' ornately formal dialogue.

Steinfeld vividly remembers the Coens giggling at the spot-on precision of her audition. In her feature film debut, an uncanny command of language came naturally. "I would get the feeling that I was in it, that I had switched on. But I never got the feeling that I switched off," she says. "In a way I felt like I had control but at the same time didn't know where it was coming from." The experience of "True Grit" remains unmatched for Steinfeld, she says; rare are directors who so trust actors. She was among the voungest every nominated, but after the Oscars, life more or less went back to normal.

Craig and Brooks, after auditioning a thousand other girls, that Steinfeld found her next great part.

Set for a March 1, 2017, release, the film stars Emma Watson as Belle, Dan Stevens as the Beast and a robust supporting cast including the likes of Luke Evans, Ewan McGregor, Stanley Tucci, Emma Thompson and Gugu Mbatha-Raw. Superb 'Manchester by the Sea' swells with emotion

t's hard to overstate the magnificence of Kenneth Lonergan's "Manchester by the Sea ." His third feature following "You Can Count on Me" and "Margaret" is one that swells with the spectrum of human emotion. Humor, anger, cynicism and love all crash into one another to create an elegant composition of image and sound that is filmmaking and storytelling at its best. It's centered on Lee Chandler (Casey Affleck), who we meet as a quiet custodian in Boston. He fixes clogged toilets and leaking showers for the tenants and shovels and salts the same walkway day after day with mechanical resolve. He is docile but stubborn and seems to have a deep disinterest in people. He is alone, but not lonely and at night, he drinks and drinks and drinks.

There is rage festering under the surface for reasons unclear. All we have are carefully chosen glimpses of the past, when Lee surrounded himself with family and had spirit and life, but we don't know what happened to turn him into this shell. Then his brother Joe (Kyle Chandler) suddenly dies and he must return to his hometown to take care of his teenage nephew, Patrick (Lucas Hedges), a hot-headed but sensitive kid ill-equipped to deal with this tragedy. Lee's ghosts make the picturesque Manchester a cold and hellish landscape. Everything is a reminder of why he had to leave in the first place and the nerve is still exposed. At least in Boston, he didn't have to see people who knew. He just had to deal with himself.

Gorgeous cinematography

There is no easy way to continue talking about the plot without mucking up the impact of the structure. Lonergan, who also wrote the script, allows the story to reveal itself to the audience, smartly weaving together past and present and building tension to a devastating crescendo midway through - enhanced by the gorgeous cinematography of Jody Lee Lipes and Lesley Barber's sophisticated score. Tissues are, unsurprisingly, recommended, but the film is packed with genuine wit and humor too, often when least expected. In this way, it feels like life, where fits of laughter sometimes are the only relief from shattering moments.

The film offers rich performances, too. Hedges, who had a small role in "Moonrise Kingdom," is beautifully affecting as a kid in flux - pushing the boundaries of the relationship with his reluctant guardian while trying to maintain a modicum of teenage normalcy. And, of course, there's the scene that has everyone buzzing - a raw conversation between Lee and ex-wife Randi (Michelle Williams) that will surely become a fixture in awards reels this season. And yet, it's really the small moments and characters that add up to the whole - CJ. Wilson as a family friend, Tate Donovan as Patrick's hockey coach, Josh Hamilton as Joe's lawyer, to name a few.

Highest caliber

But in the end it is Affleck's movie. In some other version of the universe, the role would have been played by Matt Damon, who executive produced. Meaning no disrespect to the fine acting of Mr Damon, what actually transpired was the outcome that was always meant to be. Affleck sinks into Lee's deep sadness and anger with mastery - it is a career defining performance and deserving of all the accolades. I saw "Manchester by the Sea" at the Sundance Film Festival in January and again recently and was delighted to find that it not only held up, but is even more rewarding and affecting the second time around.

It is a film to be watched, re-watched, studied and celebrated as a singular tale of tragedy, grief and aftermath. The scope might be small, but do not mistake its impact -"Manchester by the Sea" is an epic American tragedy of the highest caliber. "Manchester by the Sea," a Roadside Attractions release, is rated R by the Motion Picture Association of America for "language throughout and some sexual content." Running time: 137 minutes. Four stars out of four. — AP

Stairway to heaven: Iranian artist's wall mural turns heads

n a canyon walled by drab gray and brown highrises, a ragged line of men, women and children hold red helium balloons, ascending a staircase that ends in a spiral at an opening in the roof, where a single giant balloon slips into the blue sky. Two people at the top lift their heads in wonder. Seen by thousands of eyes a day at one of Boston's busiest intersections, the giant outdoor mural by Iranian artist Mehdi Ghadyanloo is a stunning expression of optimism he hopes can lead to better understanding between his homeland and the United States.


The 76-by-70-foot mural, painted on the side of a building across the street from South Station, appears almost three-dimensional, as if the admirer can join the line and find out what great secret awaits above. "I wanted to create something hopeful, especially now you always you see so much bad news from all around the world," Ghadyanloo said. "I think what we need as humans is hope to keep going and enjoy our lives."

It's the fifth mural at the site commissioned by the Rose Fitzgerald Kennedy Greenway Conservancy , which oversees a narrow, 1.5-mile-long strip of land created when the elevated highway that used to run through the city was torn down. Iranians and Americans don't really understand each other, Ghadyanloo said. The US has not had diplomatic relations with Iran since 1980, the year after 52 American diplomats were taken hostage at the US Embassy in Tehran. Ghadyanloo, 35, had not even been born yet.

But he wants Americans to know that despite political tensions, Iranians and Americans are not that different. They have dreams, they yearn and they love. His art, he hopes, can explain that."I think art is the international language," he said. "It's like a bridge between all cultures." Ghadyanloo studied hospital administration at the University of Tehran but found it boring. He soon discovered art was where his passion and talent lay. After graduation in 2004, he answered an open call from the Iranian capital's beautification bureau to submit proposals for murals to brighten the city. He ultimately painted more than 100 between 2005 and 2012.

But he became weary of painting murals, until he was online and saw a previous mural on the same Boston building - which is actually an air intake for a subterranean highway - by the Brazilian twins known as Os Gemeos. "I said, 'This is the wall that can be next for me," he said. Across the ocean, Lucas Cowan, the Greenway's public art curator, was already an admirer of Ghadyanloo's work. "I'd been following him for about two years and when I contacted him through Facebook to see if he'd be interested in doing something in Boston I was thrilled he already knew the space," he said. "Spaces of Hope" will stay up for a year before being covered up by another mural, and Ghadyanloo accepts his work's fate. "At least I can have a little bit of a positive effect on everyone's life," he said. — AP







Rediscovered Kahlo painting | Experts disagree on authenticity



is going to auction in NY

rediscovered painting by Frida Kahlo is going to auction this month in New York. The 1929 portrait, called "Nina con collar" or "Girl with necklace," will be part of Sotheby's Latin America: Modern Art sale on Nov 22. Its pre-sale estimate is \$1.5 million to \$2 million. Kahlo's husband, artist Diego Rivera, gave the work to her personal assistant in 1955, the year after she died. Until it surfaced over the summer, the only record of the portrait had been a black-and-white photo.

The work was painted before Kahlo and Rivera were married; they had no children, according to Axel Stein, Sotheby's head of Latin American Art. The unknown, unsmiling, wide-eyed model, perhaps 14 or 15 years old, appears to represent a young Kahlo. She is wearing the artist's jade necklace and possibly her earrings, said Stein. The subject also is depicted with dark, distinctive eyebrows resembling Kahlo's. The painting is about 22 inches by 18 inches. "I never imagined it would surface and turn out to be such a beautiful and warm painting," Stein said. "The blues are strikingly beautiful and intense," he said. "The vermillion is very, very sharp."

The owner hung it in a darkened bedroom in Sunnyvale, California, for six decades; because of her art expertise, she knew it should be kept out of the light. "The sun is the worst enemy of paintings," Stein said. "When she took it out it was beautifully preserved, like it was made yesterday." - AP

of new Van Gogh sketches

rt experts are disagreeing as to whether a book of previously unpublished drawings reported to be by Dutch master Vincent Van Gogh is authentic or fake. The book, "The Lost Arles Sketchbook," collated by eminent Canadian art historian Bogomila Welsh-Ovcharov, is being published internationally after reportedly being found in the southern French city of Arles near a hotel where Van Gogh used to stay.

Welsh-Ovcharov said the sketches appeared in an account book belonging to Mister and Missus Ginoux, owners of the "Cafe de la Gare," to whom Van Gogh gave numerous works. "I started to look through all the drawings and each one



had his fingerprint," she said, calling it an "OMG moment" at Tuesday's press conference in Paris

According to the University of Toronto website, Welsh-Ovcharov has taught art history for 25 years and has created several Van Gogh exhibitions, including one at the Musee d'Orsay in Paris. However, Amsterdam's Van Gogh Museum Director Axel Ruger says its experts have been aware of these drawings since 2008 and after examination they have repeatedly concluded that the previously-unknown sketches are complete fakes. The museum said the drawings don't reflect Van Gogh's development at the time. He says the drawings use original brownish ink when Van Gogh used only black or purple ink that only later appeared brown because of age. The museum also said its experts deemed the drawing style "monotonous, clumsy, and spiritless" with basic topographic errors.

A touch of 'Game of Thrones' magic on small Spanish town

hen the mayor of the small southern Spanish town of Osuna called Jesus Cansino to tell him "Game of Thrones" was coming to shoot part of season five, he wouldn't believe it. "She said, 'They're coming to film a series, I'm not sure you know it'. I started laughing," says the 43-yearold town hall employee and long-time fan of the multi-awardwinning series, sitting at a sun-drenched cafe. But it was no lie. Princess Daenerys Targaryen, her dragons and crew descended on Osuna's century-old bullfighting ring in October 2014 to film what is regarded as one of the season's best scenes, and the town nestled deep in arid Andalusia has not looked back since.

With Cansino now in charge of promoting Osuna to "Thronies", or fans of the series, visitor numbers have soared and foreigners are regularly seen wandering round the town of white-washed houses, monasteries and Roman ruins-once a draw mainly for Spaniards. In the first 12 months after the shoot, the number of tourists to Osuna shot up 70 percent, and while it slowed down in the second year, it was still up around 35 percent, says tourism councilor Rafael Diaz.

This compares to a 10 to 15 percent rise in years prior to Game of Thrones, a series so popular that shooting locations in Spain, Malta, Croatia and Northern Ireland have become a draw for "set-jetters", who visit destinations seen in films or series. Review site TripAdvisor analyzed the number of people visiting pages dedicated to "Game of Thrones" locations between May 2013 and May 2015 and found that Osuna came top, with a 35 percent rise in interest, followed by Mdina in Malta.

'Have to work on it'

The influx in Osuna has yet to change the fortunes of an 18,000-strong, mainly agricultural town surrounded by olive groves with 22 percent unemployment. But it has helped create jobs and put the town on the international tourist map-so much so that the local newsagent now stocks the Daily Mail, Bild and Le Monde newspapers. "A few years ago, there was just one company that did guided tours, now we have two and two others are in the works," says Diaz. The tourism office is now staffed with four employees rather than just one, and authorities have opened previously closed buildings such as the 467-year-old university, taking advantage of the visitor influx to show off the rest of the town. The local museum has also launched a permanent exhibition devoted to "Game of Thrones", complete with photos of the shoot.

And some restaurants and shops in town have capitalized on a series many in Osuna were once unfamiliar with. Teresa Jimenez, the bubbly 53 year old who runs the Casa Curro restaurant where actress Emilia Clarke celebrated her birthday during the shoot, has had to double her staff since then. With a wall adorned with pictures of the series' stars, she also has dishes named after the characters. "Gnomas", for instance, is a grilled cinnamon apple named after Tyrion Lannister because both the character and the piece of fruit are "small", she explains.

The allure of "Game of Thrones" will not last forever, though, and the town has to keep thinking up ways of attracting visitors

in a bid to expand a tourism sector it hopes will bring more money in. "Many people think that when a film crew comes, money is going to fall from the sky," says Cansino. "But you have to work on it."

'Hollywood' in Osuna

Plans are afoot to give visitors in the bullfighting ring a virtual reality headset with which they will fly through the air like a dragon, looking down on the natural sites around Osuna in the hope of getting them to visit those too. Cansino is also planning a national competition of medieval combat in the very arena where Khaleesi was saved by her dragon. And as "Game of Thrones" crew descend on other parts of Spain for season seven, several towns have called Osuna for advice, like Zumaia in the northern Basque Country.

The tiny seaside town known for its unusual rock formations had already been overwhelmed by visitors after a popular Spanish film was shot there, Diaz explains. The prospect of Thronies descending on them had them positively "scared", he adds. Even well-established tourist destinations have reaped the benefits, such as Peniscola on Spain's eastern shore-the scene of Daenerys Targaryen's city of Meereen."'Game of Thrones' was a real gift for us," says Laura Hidalgo, spokeswoman for the city hall.

"From July 2015 when the film shoot was announced up to now, there have been more than 5,000 news items in the international press," she says-free publicity estimated to be worth more than 35 million euros (\$38 million). Back in Osuna, meanwhile, residents like to recall the time when actors like Clarke, Peter Dinklage and "the good-looking one"-also known as Michiel Huisman-walked through the streets. People would congregate outside their hotels like it was "Hollywood", recalls one resident. "It was great," says Dolores Padilla-Cuervo, 64, walking down the street dressed in colorful, flowery trousers. "And there's much more atmosphere now, more people from outside town." But as for the series itself... not so much. "It's very violent, a lot of war-not for me." — AFP

NORTHEAST RESORTS INVEST IN SNOWMAKING, OFF-SLOPE ACTIVITIES

Before the ski and snowboard season gets cranking, here's a look at what's new at resorts around the Northeast.

Snowmaking, snowmaking and more snowmaking

After a dismal snow season last winter with frequent warm-ups, resorts across the Northeast continue to invest in snowmaking to better cover trails, open earlier and stay open longer, and to do it using less energy. The New Hampshire-owned and operated Cannon Mountain, for example, expects to reduce energy consumption by about 30 percent with the addition of new snowmaking guns and upgrades to older ones, for a total of 479 guns. The project plus other maintenance cost more than \$5 million.

World cup skiing returns to the east

The World Cup ski circuit is returning to the East Coast, after a 25-year absence. Vermont's Killington Resort will be hosting the women's giant slalom and slalom races on Nov. 26-27. Olympic and slalom world

champion Mikaela Shiffrin is among the 90 to 100 racers from about 20 nations expected to compete. To prepare for the race, Killington started snowmaking on Oct. 10.

More terrain

In its first major expansion in more than 30 years, New Hampshire's Waterville Valley Resort has added 45 acres and cut 10 new trails that will be served by a chair lift. The Green Peak expansion includes beginner, intermediate and advanced terrain.

Lodging

Burke Mountain Resort in northern Vermont has its first resort-owned slope-side lodging. The 116room ski-in ski-out hotel and conference center opened this fall with a pub, restaurant, heated pool and hot tub and fitness center and views of the mountain on one side and Willoughby Gap on the other.

Family fun

Resorts continue to add activities for visitors other than skiing and riding. This summer, Vermont's Stowe Mountain Resort opened a roughly \$20 million adventure center that includes ski and ride programs for kids, a daycare program, a rock-climbing center, shops, and family friendly dining looking out over the outdoor ice skating rink and the indoor climbing center. The rock-climbing center has 16 climbing stations and a free-standing 40-foot climbing tower.

On the other side of Mount Mansfield, Smugglers' Notch is also boosting its amenities for families, building a 26,000-square-foot Fun Zone that's expected to open in March 2017. It will include a two-floor laser tag arena, mini-golf, a 30-foot double-sided climbing wall, a slot-car track and a cafe. At Omni Mount Washington Resort in Bretton Woods, New Hampshire, the winter season programming includes trails for fat biking (bikes with oversized tires that can handle snow and mud). — AP

Utah ski resorts offering backcountry-type opportunities

tah resorts still want skiers and snowboarders to come enjoy their groomed slopes and high-speed lifts this season, but they're also offering expanded options for people who want to get a taste of the backcountry without the risk of going alone. New opportunities include a pair of new lifts at Powder Mountain Resort that open 5,000 acres of powder skiing through trees, and a new luxury cat-skiing operation at Whisper Ridge in northern Utah on 60,000 acres. Ski Utah is also widening its marketing of a long-running guided tour that takes in the back country near six resorts in one day.

The appetite for exploring beyond the boundaries of resorts has been growing in recent years. An estimated 5.7 million skiers and snowboarders ventured into the backcountry in 2015-2016 - up 34 percent from 2008-2009 ski season, according to research from SnowSports Industries America. A large chunk of those people went into the "side country," areas connected to resorts that resemble backcountry.

Utah ski resorts are hoping to repeat last year's banner season in which they parlayed good early-winter snow and buzz created by Vail Resort's new mega-resort into a 10-year high for visitors. Several of the state's 14 ski resorts are hoping to open in November to kick off season, though a lack of early season snow could make that difficult. Here's a look at what's new this year, including several of the new options for backcountry-like experiences.

Powder Mountain: New lifts, new terrain

Powder Mountain Resort's new lifts give skiers and snowboarders access to 10 new groomed runs on about 1,000 new acres. It also allows skiers to explore some 5,000

The terrain is ideal for beginner and intermediate skiers who want to practice powder and tree skiing, said JP Goulet, Powder Mountain spokesman. The lifts and 6 miles of new roads connect the existing resort to the site where Powder Mountain's owners - a group of young, wealthy entrepreneurs, nonprofit leaders and artists who purchased the resort in 2013 - are planning to build a New Age mountain town. Built around a vehicle-free main street, they tout the community as a rethink of the American mountain town with homes, pop-up stores, micro apartments, farm-totable restaurants and yoga boot camps. Work has begun, but the project is expected to take several years.

Powder Mountain, about 50 miles northeast of Salt Lake City, is also limiting day tickets to 2,000 per day so they can offer skiers and snowboarders uncrowded slopes. Deer Valley is the only other ski resort that has a set limit for daily skiers, though other resorts turn people away when parking lots get full, said Paul Marshall, spokesman for Ski Utah.

Luxury cat skiing

For skiers with plenty of money who are looking to get totally off the grid, Whisper Ridge Cat Skiing offers 60,000 acres of private terrain to carve through in the day and the option to spend nights at luxury yurts. The operation, located about 85 miles northeast of Salt Lake City, uses modified snow cats to carry skiers up and down the hills.

Day rates are \$450 per person in the early and late season and \$495 during the heart of winter. Yurt lodging rates range from \$725-\$1,000 a night depending on the type of yurt and dates. It is not the first cat skiing operation in Utah. Park City Powder Cats has been around for years. It offers rates of \$549-\$569 per day, depending on the dates. Alta, Powder Mountain and Snowbird also are offering cat skiing packages.

One day, six resorts

Ski Utah's long running "Interconnect Tour" has a developed a loyal group of customers who come back, but officials are hoping to entice skiers who may be among those tempted to ski more in backcountry terrain, Marshall said. The guided tour, which costs \$395 per person, takes skiers down backcountry routes near six different Utah resorts, starting at Deer Valley near Park City and finishing at Snowbird in the Little Cottonwood Canyon. The tour usually takes participants about 25 miles and down about 16,000 vertical feet.

Guides carry rescue beacons and take other safety measures needed in the backcountry. Skiers must be 16 or older and must be advanced skiers. No snowboarders are allowed. "It offers a taste of what the backcountry is about with the assistance of guides who know the terrain and area so well," Marshall said. "It's a great way to kind of put your toes in the water."—AP



Door-to-door book salesman

TYCOON HOSTS BIG, FAT INDIAN

n Saudi Arabia where many people spend a big The more prosperous era ended about two years chunk of their lives online, like elsewhere in today's world, John Gunti seems like a relic from a bygone era. The Indian national knocks on doors in the business district of the Saudi capital Riyadh, hoping to sell a 22-volume World Book Encyclopedia that weighs about 25 kilograms (55 pounds). Even though times are tough in an oildependent economy where everyone is cutting back, Gunti says: "Cold calling is my passion." But what would anybody want with such a tome these days, when every question can be answered on a smartphone? As a direct marketer, rather than just a static display in a bookshop, he is always ready to explain.

"You'll ask me 100 questions. I'll answer your 100 questions," says Gunti, 47, who carries fold-out promotional material in a smart black satchel to help his pitch. After 11 years in the business, and prior experience in medical diagnostic sales back home, Gunti says it doesn't matter what product is being sold. "If you want to sell a stone, you can sell it. If you want to sell sand, you can sell it. What matters is attitude: I have to sell this product," he says. Still, Gunti believes books have their place, even though sales have slumped to almost nothing.

Lonely business

Gone are the days when his company, Pioneer House, had about 20 salesmen, all of them from South Asia, who even came to blows over customers. Not the fast-talking Gunti, though. He says he never relied on fists but only on his power of persuasion. Gunti once had three or four salesmen under him and got a share of their income as well as his own. "I worked on commission all these years."

ago, coinciding with the collapse in Saudi Arabia's oil revenues and ensuing cutbacks throughout the economy.

"It was good some time ago but now... the demand has gone down," leaving only Gunti and one other Pioneer House salesman hunting for customers. According to him, theirs is the last surviving Riyadh firm in this business. Gunti depends on the roughly 25-percent share he earns on each 2,000 riyal (\$533) World Book Encyclopedia set he sells. He also offers the more costly Encyclopedia Britannica, children's encyclopedias and multimedia educational programs from which he also gets a cut. There were times where I sold five encyclopedias or six encyclopedias a month," says the well-spoken Gunti, glasses perched atop his head.

'The ideal ratio is that if you make five presentations, you need to close one deal." Now it takes 100 meetings to make a sale, so "you need to make more effort to meet more people," he says. "Ninety-nine percent are 'nos." Some of his business comes from referrals but most of his time is spent on cold calls.

Tough times

He rides elevators up and down the towers of Olaya Street and King Fahad Road in Riyadh's business district, ringing doorbells. Experience tells him who to target. "If I go to an office I don't just approach every person there." Gunti, who speaks some Arabic but makes his pitch in English, says he has the best luck with Jordanians, Syrians, Egyptians and Palestinians from among the millions of expatriate workers in the kingdom. Saudis and other Arabs are less likely buyers. "I'll approach and I'll

introduce myself in a friendly way so that he gets friendly with me," Gunti says.

"Then I start my pep talk and get his background about his children and their ages and everything. "Then in my mind I decide what (product) to present to him, so accordingly I'll make a presentation. "Then I'll close the deal." That is the tricky part-getting a stranger to part with 2,000 riyals. "It all depends on how you make your presentation," says Gunti. "He buys because of John, not because of the product, not because of the company. Because of trust in John."

Every customer asks why he should buy the printed encyclopedia, to which Gunti answers: "A book is more comfortable" than online and "has its place". The salesman says he enjoys a job where he can help children learn, and he still believes "there is a big market". But the kingdom's economic slowdown has left him barely getting by. "It's (a) tough time for me," Gunti admits, his business shirt showing signs of wear. "I'm unable to send any money back home" to his wife and two grown daughters in Hyderabad. "This month I may earn only 2,000 riyals. Or even there were times I earned only 1,500 riyals." He doesn't know how much longer he can keep going. "I'm really planning to quit," he says. "I have plenty of talents-people skills and presentation ability-that could be useful elsewhere." But Gunti firmly believes that, far from dying out, doorto-door sales is something that will survive economic downturns. "Door-to-door is a system," he says. "Direct marketing will never die." - AFP

WEDDING AMID CASH CRUNCH

controversial Indian mining tycoon has taken over a royal palace and flown in Brazilian dancers at a reported cost of \$75 million to celebrate his daughter's wedding, as the country reels from a cash crisis. Up to 50,000 people are expected at the sprawling Bangalore Palace, a mock Tudor castle in southern India, to celebrate the wedding of Gali Janardhan Reddy's daughter, who was married in a Hindu ceremony earlier in the day. Local media criticized the extravagance at a time when many Indians are struggling to find the cash to eat after the government's shock move to pull high-value notes out of circulation in a bid to tackle tax evasion.

But one associate defended the lavish expenditure, saying Reddy wanted people to remember the wedding of his only daughter. "It is unfortunate that a daughter's wedding has been made an issue out of envy and rivalry," Manju Swamy told AFP ahead of the party. "It's an important moment for her parents and they wanted to celebrate the event in a way that befits the family's status in society." India's Prime Minister Narendra Modi announced last week that that 500 and 1,000 rupee (\$7.50, \$15) bills — 85 percent of the cash in circulation-would cease to be legal tender. Indians can change a limited number of old notes for new ones at banks and post offices, but there have been huge queues

since they reopened last Thursday after closing for a day following the announcement.

Indians rely heavily on cash for their daily transactions and those living in rural areas or who do not have bank accounts have been particularly hard hit. The 49-yearold Reddy, a former minister with the ruling Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) in the southern state of Karnataka, spent three years in jail for his alleged involvement in a mining scam before he was released on bail last year. Speaking to journalists in his home town last week, he refused to reveal how much he was spending on the celebrations, but said everything would be declared to the tax authorities.

Guests received their invitations on LCD devices and the party venue reportedly includes a mock-up of the helium balloons featuring images of the Reddy family are reported to be floating above the palace. Indian activist T. Narasimha Murthy put the cost of the wedding at five billion rupees (about \$75 million), a figure that tallied with local media reports. "Reddy has hired about 3,000 bouncers and security guards to prevent media and activists like me from barging into the venue," said Murthy, adding he had petitioned local tax authorities to investigate. — AFP
