

EGYPTIAN ARRESTED AFTER FAILED SUICIDE ATTACK ON US SOLDIERS

EXPLOSIVES FOUND IN TRUCK • 5 GIS UNHURT

KUWAIT: An Egyptian linked to the Islamic State group was arrested yesterday after he tried to ram a truck into another vehicle carrying five American soldiers in a failed suicide bombing. The interior ministry identified the attacker as Ibrahim Suleiman, born in 1988. It said he was driving a cleaning truck at the time of the attack, and suffered multiple fractures and injuries. The min-

istry added the five US soldiers were not injured.

Security sources said that the suspect was taken to hospital under tight security. Detectives found in his possession a hand-written letter pledging allegiance to IS and adopting its ideology. Explosives including a suicide belt - were found in the truck, owned by a local contracting company. Security bodies are interrogating

Suleiman and conducting investi-

gations to uncover the circumstances of the attack, in addition to finding the suspect's accomplices and bring them to justice, the ministry said, reiterating commitment to preserving the safety and security of Kuwait and Kuwaitis.

Kuwait is a stalwart US ally following the 1991 American-led Gulf War that ended the Iraqi occupation. Police have also vowed increased security ahead of the Shiite commemoration of Ashoura this week. Two Iranians were arrested in recent days for taking "suspicious" photographs of husseiniyas. An IS-claimed suicide bombing in 2015 targeting a Shiite mosque in Kuwait City killed 27 people and wounded scores.

ERDOGAN TAKES SPIN IN BOSPHORUS ROAD TUNNEL

ISTANBUL: Turkish President Recep Tayyip Erdogan went for an inaugural spin yesterday in Istanbul's latest megaproject: the first-ever road tunnel linking the city's European and Asian sides under the Bosphorus Strait. The tunnel will open to the public on December 20 but Erdogan, accompanied by Prime Minister Binali Yildirim and Transport Minister Ahmet Arslan, made the first journey from the Asian side to the European side in a black car.

Construction of the 5-km-long tunnel began in Feb 2011 and has two levels which will be open to traffic. Travel across the two sides of Istanbul will be cut down to 15 minutes from 100 minutes, the presidency said on its website. It will cost \$4 plus VAT to use the Avrasya (Eurasia) tunnel, Arslan said. It is the latest in a series of key infrastructure projects in Istanbul including the city's third airport due to open in the second quarter of 2018.

In its first phase, the airport will have an annual capacity of 90 million passengers but will later have be able to handle 150 million travellers. This would mean the \$29 billion airport overtakes the total combined traffic of 140 million people who pass through Charles de Gaulle in Paris and London Heathrow, making it Europe's largest airport. In August, Erdogan inaugurated the city's third bridge - one of the longest suspension bridges in the world over the Bosphorus, just over a month after a rogue military faction tried to oust him from power in the July 15 failed coup.

Speaking after he made the drive, Erdogan explained that 156 million people have crossed from the Asian side to the European side since Oct 2013 when the Marmaray underground railway tunnel opened linking the two sides of the Bosphorus. "It was all a dream come true," he added, referring to the project which has significantly improved public transport for the city's 15 million residents by making it quicker to get across the two sides.

Dubbed the "project of the century", the Marmaray was the first giant project initiated by the president who was then prime minister. "Of course, we also knew this: without a dream, nothing real can be achieved. This is work that can be done and was achieved by those with faith and perseverance," the former mayor of Istanbul said, according to the presidency's

MOGUL APOLOGIZES FOR LEWD TALK AS OUTRAGE MOUNTS

GERMAN POLICE FIND EXPLOSIVES **DURING MANHUNT**

BERLIN: Police yesterday found several hundred grams of "explosive materials" in the east German apartment of a Syrian man suspected of planning a bomb attack, and arrested three people connected to him. The suspect who remains at large, 22-yearold Syrian Jaber Albakr, could have had "an Islamist motive" sources close to the police told AFP. "Highly explosive materials were found in the apartment concerned in Chemnitz, new evacuation measures are necessary," tweeted police in Germany's east.

Officers found "several hundred grams (of a) very dangerous substance which cannot be moved without protective measures", said police spokesman Tom Bernhardt. Two of those arrested were seized close to the city's railway station while the other was taken into custody in the city center. A package belonging to one of those arrested was undergoing analysis, police added. "They were known to the suspect we are looking for and were arrested and detained," said Bernhardt who added that the trio were being questioned.

Germany has been on edge after suffering two attacks claimed by the Islamic State group (IS) in July - an axe rampage on a train in Wuerzburg that **Continued on Page 13**

HURRICANE MATTHEW SLAMS INTO S CAROLINA

CHARLESTON/SAVANNAH: Hurricane Matthew slammed into South Carolina yesterday, packing a diminished yet still powerful punch after killing almost 900 people in Haiti and causing major flooding and widespread power outages as it skirted Florida and Georgia. Now weakened, the most powerful Atlantic storm since 2007 left flooding and wind damage in Florida before moving slowly north to soak coastal Georgia and the Carolinas. Wind speeds had dropped by nearly half from their peak about a week ago to 120 kph, reducing it to a Category 1 hurricane, the weakest on the Saffir-Simpson

Matthew, which topped out as a ferocious

Category 5 storm more than a week ago, made landfall near McClellanville, a village 30 miles north of Charleston that was devastated by a Category 4 hurricane in 1989. The National Hurricane Service said Matthew was over Myrtle Beach, South Carolina, yesterday afternoon, and warned of potentially life-threatening flooding in Georgia and North Carolina even as the storm slowed as it drove inland. At least five deaths in Florida were attributed to the storm, which knocked out power to almost 1.6 million households and businesses in the US Southeast.

The stretch of the Atlantic coast from Miami to Charleston, a nearly 600-mile drive, encompasses some of the most well-known beaches,

United States. Parts of Interstate 95, the main north-south thoroughfare on the East Coast, were closed due to flooding and fallen trees, state officials said. In Florida, 775,000 were without power, according to state utilities, while in South Carolina 433,000 had no electricity, Governor Nikki Haley said. Georgia Power said at least 275,000 were without power in the state.

ACD COMMUNIQUE TO INCLUDE AMIR'S PROPOSAL FOR ASIA FUND

Summit endorsing a permanent secretariat based in Kuwait

BANGKOK: His Highness the Amir Sheikh Sabah Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah's participation in the 2nd Asia Cooperation Dialogue Summit (ACD) reiterates Kuwait's keenness to give impetus to the initiative to realize its goals, Assistant Foreign Minister for Asian Affairs Ambassador Ali Al-Said, told KUNA yes-

The 2nd ACD Summit kicks off in Bangkok, today for three days. The first ACD summit was held in Kuwait in 2012 upon His Highness the Amir's initiative as part of his interest in Asian economic development, and keenness on making Asia one of the main axes in paving the way for Kuwait to be a financial and commercial hub in the region.

Among the first achievements of the ACD was endorsing a permanent secretariat, to be based in Kuwait, in recognition of the country's leading role in Asian joint action, Al-Said said. He added that they look forward to further convergence among the Asian countries through the summit.

On His Highness the Amir's proposal for establishing a fund to support development

projects in the ACD member states, Al-Said said that the 2nd Summit communique will include an item on the issue.

It will welcome the proposal, and entrust the summit's secretary general with taking the necessary measures for a work mechanism for the would-be fund.

The summit, is held under the theme "One Asia, Diverse Strengths: Enhanced Partnership towards New Dynamism." The summit agenda includes aspects of cooperation among Asian countries in economic, environmental and humanitarian domains. Kuwait's Assistant Foreign Minister for Asian Affairs Ambassador Ali Al-Said represented his country in the

Attracting the leaders of 33 countries, the summit focuses on a host of major issues the Asian continent is facing in political, economic, trade, social and environmental areas.

Established in Thailand in 2001, the ACD Forum has held 10 meetings at the level of foreign ministers, the last of which was hosted by the State of Kuwait in 2012 under the auspices of His Highness the Amir. -KUNA

KUWAIT: The Ministry of Higher Education's Cultural Office in Washington has moved many Kuwaiti students from various areas threatened by Hurricane Matthew, to safe places. KUWAITI FIRMS COVER EDUCATIONAL COSTS OF LOW-INCOME CHILDREN

AL-GHANIM INDUSTRIES PLAYING PIONEERING ROLE

KUWAIT: Kuwaiti private companies and conglomerates, namely Al-Ghanim Industries, are covering teaching costs for thousands of children of cash-strapped families, depicting the deeply-engrained compassion for the needy among the citizens.



SPANISH ADVENTURER WHO WALKED 6,400KM ARRIVES IN KUWAIT

KUWAIT: An intrepid adventurer, who has been walking from Paris to Makkah to perform umrah, arrived in Kuwait a few days ago. Ishaq, a 33-year-old Spaniard of Algerian descent, began his journey around five months back. He has already walked a distance of 6,400 km and is planning to reach his destination in 50 days. He is now waiting for a visa to enter Saudi Arabia. Ishaq was received by his Kuwaiti host Abu Mohammed Al-Mutairi at the Iraqi border in Abdaly. Mutairi promised to help him obtain the umrah visa, and has put him up at his house till then.

This is Ishaq's first walking trip, which he calls the 'Walk of Peace'. He aims to deliver a message to the world that Islam is a religion of peace and tolerance, not terror and aggression. He wants to tell the world that Muslims are good people who love peace, not killing. Ishaq noted that he doesn't need anything, and only wants to reach Makkah. He doesn't have a big budget for this trip, and has managed to survive on €10 a day.

Ishaq told Kuwait Times about the mountainous terrain he had to cross during this journey, and it was very cold. "I stayed in a tent, and when I woke up in the mornings, my fingers were frozen. This was the biggest obstacle that I faced. Fortunately, I wasn't injured, but I faced some trying situations. Once I was sleeping in my tent and heard a wolf in the night. I cowered in the tent, and in the morning I saw the tracks of the wolf," he said. Ishaq began his journey by carrying his stuff in a backpack. After three days, he got exhausted and decided to travel with a trolley. During the journey, the wheels of the trolley got damaged, and he had to change them.

Ishaq is also documenting his journey.

Various media outlets have interviewed him in the countries he passed through. He crossed from Europe into Turkey, then to Iran, Iraq and Kuwait, from where he will continue to Makkah.

THE OTHER SIDE OF BREAST CANCER

PATIENTS MEETING THE UNMET NEEDS

KUWAIT: You might have been part of a breast cancer (BC) marathon or heard about the latest awareness campaign promoting BC screenings. Maybe you have donated money to the cause, are a family member of a survivor, or a survivor yourself. Yet there is a high chance that there are a group of men and women living with the disease that you are not aware of - they are the "forgotten" patients of metastatic breast cancer (mBC). They are a group of brave individuals who often live with feelings of isolation due to their metastatic diagnosis.

mBC is the most advanced stage of breast cancer, a stage in which the cancer has spread beyond the breasts to other parts of the body such as the bones, liver, brain and lungs. In the MENA region especially, a high proportion of BC cases are diagnosed at an advanced stage. Despite this, there still exists multiple misconceptions around mBC considering the lack of conversation around it compared to the attention, advocacy and policy focus on the early stages of breast cancer.

The lack of awareness around mBC has left many patients feeling isolated and marginalized, Additionally, the diagnosis of mBC has shown to have a huge psychological and emotional impact on women and their families. Many surveys, such as the Canadian Breast Cancer Networks, reflected that many patients start to experience anxiety, isolation and depression due to their diagnosis. This is in addition to the high levels of fear associated with the uncertainty of the future.

In fact, one of the biggest fears that women with mBC have is the impact that this disease will have on their family members, as most women with mBC are over 50 and are caregivers for children and/or other family members.

However, despite the huge toll that mBC

brings, it is important that we remember that it does not mean women with mBC have a negative outlook on life. Rather, it is found that many patients of mBC will do everything in their power to maintain control and live a full and long life as possible.

But how can we help? How can we as loved ones, supporters, advocates and policy makers help in reducing the anxiety and fear? How can we help women and men with mBC have fulfilling lives not in isolation? How do we meet the unmet needs of people living with mBC?

One of the most significant challenges ahead in addressing the needs of women and men with mBC is the need to create greater public awareness. It is essential that people know mBC as the most advanced stage of breast cancer, and as different from the earlier stages of BC. Heightened awareness will generate and encourage conversation along with support on how to live with mBC on a day to day basis.

Cultural taboos

Considering the cultural taboos in many countries, culturally sensitive information is also important in helping women feel a greater sense of control and strength.In fact,

more information regarding current and future treatments and research on mBC should be readily available and encouraged within the country.

Furthermore, although not all women with mBC have a negative outlook on life, many women experience heightened fear, isolation and depression. Hence, more resources for psychological counselling and support, including awareness on existing support services are needed. Additionally better patient-doctor communication is also required to aid women in gaining a sense of higher control over their condition.

Lastly, apart from knowledge around mBC, greater knowledge about the benefits and risks of treatments, along with higher investment on research on mBC are vital. According to an international study only 5 percent of publically funded research in the United States goes towards mBC.

In order to fully support and address the needs of women and men with mBC, it is essential that we continue to carry on conversations and encourage awareness around mBC. We as a community, as loved ones, as family members and as breast cancer survivors must join hands to make women with mBC feel visible and make time count.

DASMAN INSTITUTE TO TREAT YOUNG DIABETIC PATIENTS

KUWAIT: Kuwait's leading institute aimed at cooperating with medical for treating diabetes is expanding its approach, treatment techniques and researches on various conditions namely illness among the

Dasman Diabetes Institute is currently conducting up to 53 studies on causes of the second type of diabetes, gestational diabetes (affecting pregnant women), and the disease afflicting children and adolescents and Maturity onset diabetes of the young (MODY), said the institute's general director, Dr Qais Al-Dwairi in a statement to KUNA.

Among the major studies currently underway is the one based on the technique of heat shock for tissues of the liver and muscles: outthe yearend, said Dr Al-Dwairi.

Dr Maisa Kamkar, in charge of research at the institute, said the institute's new approach is basically centers specialized in illnesses affecting the nerves, eyes and kidneys, to establish a clearer picture about the disease complications. Moreover, the institute is also seeking to substantiate a strong theory suggesting that the mostly disease spread among individuals in racially coherent communities, where it genetically persists.

The institute will sign cooperation accords with a number of topnotch institutes and universities in America, Europe and Asia early next year. Realizing that diabetes was one of the most chronic diseases among Kuwaitis, Kuwait Foundation for Advancement of Sciences (KFAS) financed establishment of the institute. Its cornerstone was laid on 8th May 2001. In June 2006, the institute was inaugurated by His Highness the Amir Sheikh Sabah Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah.

757 ILLEGAL RESIDENTS **EMPLOYED IN CO-OPS**


KUWAIT: The Central Apparatus for Illegal Residents announced yesterday that the number of illegal residents who are employed in cooperative societies till the end of June of 2016 has reached 757.

Assistant Secretary General for Technical and Information Affairs in the Apparatus Waleed Al-Asfoor told KUNA that the number of Cooperative Societies which are employing illegal residents went up to 38. Al-Asfoor stated that Saad Al-Abdullah Co-op has hired 73 illegal residents, constituting

the lion's share, followed by Al-Naseem Co-op with 70 employees, then came Al-Jahra Co-op with 57 employees, Al-Andalus and Al-Reqeie Co-op with 55 employees and Al-Sulaibiyah Co-op which came fifth 37.

Al-Asfoor hailed the Kuwaiti Cooperative Societies Union for its efforts and support in the recruitment mechanism for the illegal residents, noting that beneficiaries must have obtained the statistics of 1965 in order for them to be recruited. Sons of Kuwaiti women and sons of military

personnel who participated in wars are exempt. Al-Asfoor added that this came under the guidance of the Executive Chairman of the Central Apparatus for Illegal Residents Saleh Al-Fadala, who has directed for taking all measures needed to execute the recruitment mechanism for both private and public sectors. The Central Apparatus for Illegal Residents, with the cooperation of Cooperative Societies Union, have established a mechanism for hiring illegal residents in the cooperative sector at the beginning of year 2014. —KUNA

GCC NATIONAL, 2 EXPATS ARRESTED FOR FRAUD

KUWAIT: A Saudi and two Sri Lankans were recently arrested for fraud, said security sources. The suspects had been using a website to advertise offers to relieve housemaids of sponsorships in return for cash. The sources added that the suspects met potential victims in public places to collect money from them and hand over maids who would be ready to run away from their new bosses. The source added that a search is on for a Sri Lankan female accomplice.

9 suspects arrested

Ahmadi detectives recently launched an inspection campaign at Khairan resorts, said security sources. The campaign resulted in the arrest of nine wanted suspects and confiscation of 35 ATVs. The officials issued 126 traffic tickets.

Hooligan arrested

A citizen, who resisted arrest and deliberately drove his vehicle into a police patrol damaging it before fleeing the scene was later on arrested while driving around the crime

Liquor traders arrested

Four Asians, two men and two women, were recently arrested for manufacturing home-made liquor and selling it, said security sources. The two women, who worked as cooks, rented a house in Kaifan and used to produce the liquor while their male accomplices distributed the illicit liquor. On raiding the place, policemen found 152 barrels of liquor.

Money stolen

A citizen reported that an accountant working for him had stolen more than KD 3,000. The accountant was supposed to deposit the amount in the company's bank account.

Medical error

A female citizen recently filed a complaint against a plastic surgeon working in a private hospital for committing a medical error while subjecting her to a liposuction. According to her complaint the surgeon was supposed to suck fat from her thighs and put them somewhere else, which he did not.

Fight over traffic rights

A citizen sustained head injury when he fought with two others over traffic rights in Ardhiya, said security sources.

Jet ski hits man

An unidentified man was killed when a Jet ski hit him while swimming off Salmiya beach, said security sources. The man on the jet ski fled the scene though he was chased by coastguards.

An African housemaid was recently rushed to Jahra hospital in a critical condition after she stabbed herself in the belly in an apparent suicide attempt at her sponsor's house in Saad Al-Abdullah area. 'hat happened? How did closeness and friendliness turn into desertion and separation? How did a strong friendship that lasted for almost one decade suddenly change? WHITE HELMETS: 'HEROES' WHO RUN TOWARDS BOMBS

BEIRUT: Before war broke out they were bakers, decorators or students. Now Syria's volunteer rescuers known as the White Helmets risk their lives trying to pull victims from the rubble. Footage of the daring, often heart-rending rescues carried out by the group's nearly 3,000 volunteers has frequently gone viral, earning it plaudits around the world. Images of the aftermath of bombardments of rebel-held areas almost invariably show White Helmets sprinting into clouds of dust and digging through the debris, often with little more than their bare hands.

Among the most famous footage was the July 2014 rescue of Mahmoud, a two-month-old dubbed the "miracle baby" after he was pulled from the rubble of a building in battleground second city Aleppo following more than 12 hours of digging. His rescuer Khaled was killed in August in an air strike on the rebel-held east of the city, one of more than 140 White Helmets killed in the war.

A painter and decorator, he was an early volunteer for the group, his round face distinguished by his crooked nose and bright eyes. He was just 31 when he died and left behind a wife and two daughters. "If I die saving lives, I think God would definitely consider me a martyr," he once said.

'Outstanding Bravery'

A more recent video showed a volunteer sobbing as he cradled a four-month-old girl he helped rescue in Idlib province. "We've been working for two hours to get her out from under the rubble and thank God, it turns out she is alive," he said, as the girl, covered in dust, coughed and grabbed his collar. In late September, the group won a Swedish human rights prize often referred to an "alternative Nobel" with the jury hailing their "outstanding bravery, compassion and humanitarian engagement".

It was also seen as a contender for this year's Nobel Peace Prize, and while it did not win it attracted support from a slew of celebrities. The group was also the subject of a Netflix short documentary. The rescue group emerged in 2013, when the civil war that has now killed more than 300,000 people was nearing its third year. It was not until the following year that it took its current form and began to be known as the "White Helmets" for the distinctive hardhats worn by its volunteers.

The group's motto - "To save one life is to save all of humanity" - is drawn from a verse of the Holy Quran, although the White Helmets insist they treat all victims, regardless of religion. Some of its members have received

training abroad, returning home to instruct colleagues on search-and-rescue techniques. It receives funding from a number of governments, including Britain, Denmark, Germany, Japan, the Netherlands and the United States, but also solicits individual donations to purchase equipment, including their signature hardhats, which cost \$144.64.

More than five years into the conflict, the organization now operates some 120 centres in eight provinces in Syria. Its volunteers include 78 women. It operates only in rebelheld areas, saying it is not permitted to work in government-held territory, but insists its volunteers are neutral. "We are independent, neutral and impartial, we are not affiliated to any political or armed group," White Helmet leader Raed Saleh told AFP last month. "We are ready to rescue people regardless of their political or religious background."

Still, the organization is not without its critics, mostly backers of President Bashar Al-Assad's government. Some accuse it of being a tool of its international donors, governments that largely support the opposition. Others have charged that the group's volunteers include rebel fighters or even jihadists, circulating pictures purportedly showing White Helmets in civilian clothing bearing arms. But elsewhere, the group's members have been hailed as "real life heroes" focused only on saving lives. "We stand for the victims and it is our responsibility and our duty to work for the victims," Saleh said. — AFP





and shock value when covering conflict? Capturing violence on camera was hotly debated on the fringes of Bayeux, a major French photography festival. Seasoned photographers discussed where to draw the line at an event Friday on the fringes of the Bayeux Calvados festival, whose main prizes were set to be awarded later yesterday. "How do you want people to accept refugees in Europe if you don't show them the violence from which the migrants are fleeing?" said Indian photographer Sami Siva who has covered unrest and post-conflict

issues in Turkey, Afghanistan, Sri Lanka and India. But this does not convince Yunes Mohammed,

BAYEUX, France: How far to go in terms of gore a 44-year-old Iraqi Kurdish photographer, who says this is like playing into the hands of militants. "I've seen children playing at decapitation. This raises questions. And those who use violence want to show their power and wait for people like me to help them have a psychological impact on others,"

> In 2014, the Bayeux festival ignored the work of Turkish photographer Emin Ozmen, whose work showing decapitations by Islamic State fighters in Syria sparked great controversy. That decision is still being debated. According to French photographer Patrick Chauvel, Ozmen, who has won two World Press Photo awards, was right.

'Photograph Everything'

"You can't say 'Daesh decapitates' and then not show it," Chauvel said, using the Arabic name for the Islamic State group. This year too the theme is in the limelight with an exhibition devoted to gang wars in Acapulco, "the most dangerous city in Mexico", according to its curator, Belgian reporter Laurent van Der Stockt. "My ethics forbid me from showing battered bodies of women and children," said Mexican photographer Bernandino Hernandez. "I concentrate on the details" like the tied up legs of a body found on the sidewalk, he said.

But Chauvel says one should go all the way.

"One must photograph everything for collective memory, for the International Criminal Court, but should not publish everything," he said. "Some people go too far in their quest for fame," the 67-year-old added. Virginie Nguyen Hoang said if photographs were unduly gruesome they would fail to inform as people would stop looking at them. "In August 2013, I covered a massacre in Cairo. I saw many people dying in front of me, bleeding to death. But I photographed a dead youth with just a hole in his throat. "That photo did not shock but it left a mark," she said. It touched a chord with the Egyptian authori-

ISLAMISTS BEAT LIBERALS IN MOROCCO ELECTIONS

BOTH SIDES MAKE ACCUSATIONS OF VOTER FRAUD

RABAT: Morocco's ruling Islamists have beaten their liberal rivals in parliamentary elections five years after sweeping to power following Arab Spring-inspired protests, results showed yesterday. Prime Minister Abdelilah Benkirane's Islamist Justice and Development Party (PJD) took 125 seats out of 395 in Friday's polls, the interior ministry said after all ballots were counted. Its main rival, the Authenticity and Modernity Party (PAM), which had campaigned against the "Islamization" of Moroccan society, won 102 seats, the ministry said.

The PJD's rise to power in 2011 after King Mohammed VI relinquished some of his nearabsolute power following massive street protests brought hopes of change in the North African country. The PJD was the first Islamist party to win a national election, and the first to lead a government, albeit with coalition partners after failing to win an outright majority. But analysts say that when it comes to the major longterm and strategic issues such as foreign policy the key decision-maker remains the king, the scion of a monarchy that has ruled for 350 years.

'Fraud Allegations'

Observers from the Council of Europe who monitored Friday's vote said it was organized "with integrity and full transparency". But the delegation said it "regrets that the current voters' registration system and the awareness cam-

paign have not produced a turnout higher than in 2011, particularly among young voters." It also noted "the surprisingly high amount of spoilt ballot papers" and said there were reports of "electoral fraud" although members of the delegation did not witness any wrongdoing.

Interior Minister Mohamed Hassad rejected accusations of voter fraud from both sides. He said turnout was 43 percent. On Friday the PJD and the PAM traded accusations of vote irregularities, while the media reported that a video shared on social networks had showed a man stuffing a ballot box. Apart from the two main parties, Istiglal, which historically fought for independence from France, came third with 45 seats. Nine other parties also won seats, including the National Gathering of Independents which took 37 and the Federation of the Democratic Left which clinched two.

A statement by the PJD said the Islamists were "very concerned about numerous reports of fraud being carried out by authorities" in favour of the PAM and urged the interior ministry to intervene. PAM spokesman Khalid Adennoun said his party had filed "50 complaints" of voting irregularities, some concerning the PJD in Tangiers. The head of the European observers team, Ian Liddell-Grainger, told a news conference he was confident that the interior ministry had done a good job. "I don't feel that at any stage the ministry interfered," he said.

Scandals

To make life easier for the illiterate, who make up a third of Morocco's population, the 30 parties in contention were marked on ballot papers with symbols such as a tractor or camel. The PJD clinched 12 more seats in parliament than in the 2011 election, which was held after a new constitution transferred some of the king's powers to parliament, at a time when autocratic regimes were falling in Tunisia, Egypt and Libya.

The king is expected to appoint a new prime minister from the biggest party in parliament - a task which could again fall to Benkirane. Over the past five years his PJD has been weakened by rising unemployment and plummeting growth while critics said it failed to make good on promises to tackle corruption. The PJD also faced a string of scandals within its ranks including a drugs bust, a land-grab deal and the suspension of two vice presidents found in a "sexual position" on a beach. The PAM, formed in 2008 by a close adviser to the king, had hoped to take advantage in the poll and despite coming in second place more than doubled the number of its seats in the future parliament. Headed by Ilyas El Omari, it has poured enormous resources into a campaign criticizing the government's economic record as "catastrophic" and pledging to roll back the "Islamization" of society. The PJD and the PAM have ruled out joining forces in a grand coalition. — AFP

BATTLE FOR ALEPPO RAGES AHEAD OF UN SHOWDOWN

ALEPPO: The Syrian regime pressed its assault on rebel-held areas of Aleppo yesterday ahead of a showdown at the United Nations between Western governments and its ally Russia. German Foreign Minister Frank-Walter Steinmeier warned that the mounting tensions between Washington and Moscow over the conflict had created a situation "more dangerous" than the Cold War. US Secretary of State John Kerry made clear his anger at the Syrian army's Russianbacked onslaught in the battleground second city, saying that its bombing of civilians could amount to a war crime.

The UN Security Council is to vote on two rival resolutions on the fighting, one drafted by France calling for an end to air strikes and a second by Russia that urges a ceasefire but makes no mention of halting the bombings. Moscow has said it will veto the French draft. Its ally Damascus has made significant advances in its renewed two-week-old offensive in Aleppo, seizing territory to the north and pushing back the front line in the city centre which had remained largely static since the rebels captured eastern districts in 2012.

But it has come at a heavy human cost. Since the regime offensive began on Sept 22 a few days after a US- and Russian-brokered ceasefire collapsed, at least 290 people - mostly civilians - have been killed in rebel-held areas, 57 them children, the Syrian Observatory for Human Rights reported. And 50 civilians including nine children have been killed in rebel shelling on regime-held areas of the city, according to the Britain-based monitoring group, which relies on a network of sources on the ground.

It said government forces were making further advances yesterday ahead of the Security Council session. "The battle is unfolding in the centre, particularly in the Bustan al-Basha district where the army is advancing, in Sheikh Said in the south, and on the northern outskirts where the regime has taken the Uwaija neighborhood," Observatory chief Rami Abdel Rahman told AFP. The monitor reported heavy air strikes on the rebel-held Fardos and Sukari neighborhoods. An AFP correspondent said the

raids mostly hit combat zones in the city.

'Cynical' Ploy

Russia is expected to use its veto to block the French-drafted resolution backed by the United States and Britain that also calls for a halt to all military flights over Aleppo. The council will then move to a second vote on the Russian-drafted text. It "urges immediate implementation of the cessation of hostilities, in particular in Aleppo" and demands that all parties allow deliveries of humanitarian aid". British ambassador Matthew Rycroft dismissed the Russian draft as a political ploy. "This is a cynical attempt to divert attention away from the need to stop the bombing of Aleppo," he said.

Council members have been holding negotiations for the past week on the French proposal for an end to the bombing of Aleppo, access for aid deliveries and a ban on military flights over the city. But Russian ambassador Vitaly Churkin said the measure was "hastily put together" and suggested it was "not designed to make progress... but to cause a Russian veto". "I cannot possibly see how we can let this resolution pass," he told reporters when asked whether he would use the veto powers Russia wields as one of the council's five permanent members.

A Security Council diplomat, who asked not to be named, said the Russian "resolution on the surface looks like a lot of constructive language that draws from previous resolutions and the French draft, but the key point is that it does not call for an end to the aerial bombardment". He said the "vast majority" of council members want "an immediate end to the indiscriminate bombing of civilians in Aleppo."

Kerry made clear his anger, declaring: 'These are acts that beg for an appropriate investigation - war crimes". The German foreign minister said that tensions between Washington and Moscow were now worse than during the Cold War. "It's a fallacy to think that this is like the Cold War," Steinmeir said in an interview published by Bild newspaper yesterday. "The current times are different and more dangerous." — AFP

MILITANTS KILL THEMSELVES IN STANDOFF WITH TURKEY POLICE

ANKARA: Two people suspected of planning a car bomb attack on the Turkish capital Ankara yesterday blew themselves up after being confronted by police, averting what the justice minister called a "huge disaster". The suspects, who both died in the explosion, were believed to be preparing an attack when they set off the explosives, the official Anadolu news agency said. "A huge disaster has been prevented. It is probable they would have attacked Ankara....

organization," Justice Minister Bekir Bozdag told the CNN-Turk broadcaster.

The bombing comes two days before the first anniversary of Turkey's deadliest terror attack in its modern history in Ankara which left 103 dead. Ankara governor Ercan Topaca told reporters at the scene it was "highly likely" that the suspects had connections to the outlawed Kurdistan Workers' Party (PKK). "The materials used, the construction and the way

quoted by Anadolu. The PKK - proscribed as a terrorist organization by Turkey, the EU and US - has been waging a 32-year insurgency against the state in the country's southeast. Bozdag added that Turkey was in a "critical position" in the region and referred to "sources of terror" in Syria and Iraq where conflict is raging. Video published by Dogan news agency showed the moment officers urged the suspects to surrender before a large and loud explosion sends clouds of smoke and rubble thrown into the air.

Violence returned to the region after the collapse of a two-year ceasefire last year with hundreds of Turkish security forces killed and thousands of militants dead. In the latest clashes, eight PKK militants were "neutralized" in Cukurcu district in Hakkari province on the border with northern Iraq, the Turkish armed forces said, quoted by Anadolu.

Police Swoop

The governor said police swooped early on Saturday after a tip-off from Diyarbakir, a mainly Kurdish province in Turkey's southeast. Noone else was killed or injured in the blast understood to have taken place close to a black car in the town of Haymana, around 30 km from Ankara, the governor's office said in a statement. The suspects were believed to have been hiding in a hut near a stud farm. "The security forces launched the operation and warned (them) to surrender. A short while later (and) before any intervention, two terrorists confirmed to be a man and a woman detonated themselves," the statement added. — AFP

EGYPT ADMONISHES US **EMBASSY OVER WARNING**

CAIRO: Egypt has criticized an "incomprehensible" US warning to citizens to avoid theatres and malls in Cairo over the weekend because of unspecified security concerns, saying it could damage the country's economy. The alert issued by the US embassy in Cairo on Friday was cited in Canadian and Australian travel warnings, with the British Foreign Office later putting out

a message that copied the US warning. Embassy officials declined to comment, and an Egyptian interior ministry official said he was unaware of any specific threat. "The US Embassy strongly advises US citizens to avoid large gatherings and public spaces such as concert halls, movie theatres, museums, shopping malls, and sports venues in Cairo through Sunday, October 9, due to potential security concerns," it said

on its website. foreign Egyptian ministry spokesman Ahmed Abu Zeid said he "was disturbed" by the warning. "When contacted to clarify the reasons for issuing the security message, the US embassy denied the presence of any particular reasons or security threats that triggered the alert," he said in a statement overnight. He added that the embassy said it was a routine warning over long weekends. The embassy will be closed today, a

workday in Egypt, for Columbus Day. "The Foreign Ministry deplored, during the call (with the US embassy), these unnecessary alerts that can have negative impacts, particularly on the economic front," he said. He called on "all embassies in Cairo to exercise caution when issuing unnecessary or incomprehensible statements".

Egypt has been battered by militant attacks since the army toppled the divisive Islamist president Mohamed Morsi in 2013. The Islamic State group's branch in Egypt has killed hundreds of policemen and soldiers in attacks, mostly in the restive Sinai Peninsula. It also claimed responsibility for bombing a Russian airliner carrying holidaymakers from a Sinai resort last year, killing all 224 people on board. — AFP

MEXICO'S MASKED WRESTLING HEROES TRAIN POLICE

MEXICO CITY: Wearing colorful masks, two pro wrestlers show off their moves to a crowd, but this time it's not in an arena: They're teaching Mexico City police officers how to subdue villains. "How are you doing?" Dragon Rojo Jr, wearing a red mask with yellow horns and a crest, shouts at the 190 men and women at the courtyard of a police station in Iztapalapa, a crime-plagued borough of the megacapital. "Good!" the officers reply in chorus before the ring gladiators lead them through a series of stretches, push-ups, squats and situps, making many sweat and pant heavily (while some take a break).

After warming up, Dragon Rojo (Red Dragon) and his fellow "Lucha Libre" star Polvora, whose ring name means Gunpowder in English, demonstrate one of their moves. The burly Polvora lunges forward with a stabbing motion, but Red Dragon grabs his assailant's arm, twists it, pins him down and places a knee on his chest to immobilize him. The "Lock 4" submission was among the clutches, holds and other moves that the pro wrestlers presented to the officers, who then practiced the move against each other on the concrete.

But snatching suspects is not the only benefit to this intense training. "We are proud to change an image of the Mexican police that is not very good: Fat, short, unfit," said Polvora, who grew up in Iztapalapa. "We are trying to make a contribution to change this image," he said through a mask decorated with golden and red flames.

Feeling Healthier

The wrestlers come twice a week to train the officers in the densely populated borough, where murders are up this year with 150 people killed so far. 'You go into your patrol car and the truth is that your get rusty," said officer Joel Garcia, who admitted that a suspect got away from him once. "With this you get more active, you start running, feeling better, lighter and healthier," he said as he worked out following a 24-hour shift.

Garcia grew up admiring Lucha Libre legends such as El Santo, Blue Demon and El Matematico. Now he was trying to imitate his idols. With the deliberate motion of a rookie wrestler, Garcia crossed his arms and raised them to block his smiling colleague from fake-stabbing him in the head. Captain Alfredo Alvarez, a former marine, had the idea of bringing luchadores to train officers after he took over as the police station's coordinator three months ago and realized that his colleagues were "somewhat sedentary." The station commander, Israel Rodriguez, told him he knew Dragon Rojo Jr and Polvora because they were both from Iztapalapa. "All the special police forces in the world have their specialty: Russia has sambo, Brazil has capoeira, China has kung-fu, Japan has karate. In Mexico, our martial art is lucha," Alvarez said. The wrestlers agreed to provide free lessons to some 380 officers every week out of "friendship and commitment" to their borough, Alvarez said. — AFP

PUBLIC CAN WATCH NYPD TRIALS, CAN'T GET RESULTS

NEW YORK: Each day in a drab set of Garner in a fatal chokehold in 2014. A courtrooms, anybody can sit and watch New York City police officers face administrative trials accusing them of misconduct ranging from disobeying orders to aggressive arrests resulting in a suspect's death. But most outcomes of such trials - whether an officer is reprimanded, docked pay or out on probation - are not disclosed. secrecy is the result of a state law protecting the privacy of officer disciplinary records, and a recent city decision to adhere to the confidentiality rules more closely - a move that puts America's largest police force at odds with a national movement to make law enforcement more transparent to the public.

"It's striking to have a system where the hearings are open and the decisions are secret, but that's exactly what we have at the NYPD," said Christopher Dunn, associate legal director at the New York Civil Liberties Union, who has fought for full disclosure of the penalties. Two high-profile alleged abuse cases involving white officers and black men could thrust the tribunals' incongruities into the spotlight: the slaying of unarmed teenager Ramarley Graham in a Bronx home in 2012 and the roughing up of former professional tennis player James Blake last year. Both officers are expected to face administrative hearings before the end of the year.

Concerns over transparency of the NYPD's disciplinary system took hold in recent months after the city appealed a decision by a state court judge ordering the release of the records of Daniel Pantaleo, the officer accused of putting Eric grand jury declined to indict the officer on criminal charges, but he's still the subject of an administrative case that could end his police career.

Around the time the city filed its appeal, the NYPD stopped providing the outcomes of administrative proceedings to the media, Department lawyers justified both moves by saying they needed stricter compliance with a state law meant to protect the privacy of police officers, jail guards and firefighters - a position strongly backed by police unions.

In response to an outcry by politicians and police reform advocates, Mayor Bill de Blasio said the city had to follow the law, but also said he'd favor changes that would allow more openness. That response didn't satisfy Graham's mother, Constance Malcolm, who accused the mayor of not doing enough to keep victims' families informed. At a recent rally, she complained that she knew that the department was preparing a case against the shooter only because of news reports. "How would anybody in my neighborhood find out about this information?" Malcolm said.

In high-profile cases such as fatal shootings, police officials regularly name officers accused of wrongdoing, announce if they have been placed on desk duty or suspended pending the outcome of criminal or administrative charges, and confirm if they've been fired - a practice that's not expected to change. What's not available is records of punishment for misbehavior in an officer's past. — AP

JOB HUNTING SUBSTANTIAL PART OF BAYH'S LAST YEAR

WASHINGTON: Evan Bayh spent substantial time during his last year in the Senate searching for a job in the private sector, even as he cast votes on issues of interest to his future corporate bosses, according to the former Indiana lawmaker's 2010 schedule, obtained exclusively by AP. The Democrat held more than four dozen meetings and phone calls with head hunters and future corporate employers over the months, beginning just days after announcing his surprise retirement from the Senate on Feb. 15, 2010, through the remainder of that year as his term came to an end. Bayh is now running to get his old seat back and help his party retake Senate control.

Announcing his retirement, Bayh claimed he'd grown fed up with the gridlock and that it was time for him to "contribute to society in another way." Two days later, on Feb 17, Bayh was on the phone with a job headhunter. In the months to come, Bayh met and talked repeatedly with headhunters at more than a half-dozen recruiting firms, and with officials at Apollo Global Management, Marathon Oil Co, and three other companies he would work with after his retirement: the McGuireWoods law firm,

Leading Authorities, Inc speaker's bureau, and the investment firm RLJ Companies. At the same time the Senate was weighing major pieces of legislation, including the Dodd-Frank financial overhaul bill and an extension of the Bush tax cuts, and in some cases Bayh was casting votes that seemed to align with the interests of his future employers. Under the Senate's self-policing rules, it may all have been perfectly allowable.

A 2007 law requires senators to file a disclosure with the secretary of the Senate within three days of beginning negotiations for private-sector employment. But after the law went into effect, the Senate Ethics Committee defined negotiations as employment discussions that occur after a job offer has been made. So Bayh would not have had to disclose his job meetings to anyone, as long as they occurred prior to a solid offer. "It's outrageous," said Craig Holman, a lobbyist with Public Citizen who helped Democrats write the ethics language intended to eliminate conflicts of interest. "What we were unaware of at the time was how Congress would manipulate the rule so that they really don't abide by it." — AP

US ACCUSES RUSSIA OF CYBER ATTACKS TO DISRUPT ELECTION

Washington vows reponse

WASHINGTON: US officials formally accused the Russian government Friday of trying to "interfere" with the American presidential election, and vowed to respond at an undisclosed time and place. The assertion against Russia comes with relations already frayed over NATO defenses and stalled efforts to end the bloody civil war in Syria. A joint statement from the Department of Homeland Security and Office of the Director of National Intelligence was the first official accusation by Washington against Moscow in the spate of cyber attacks, although many analysts had said the hacks appeared to be from Russia.

A US administration official said Washington would respond to the cyber attacks, without offering details. "We will take action to protect our interests, including in cyberspace, and we will do so at a time and place of our choosing," the official said. "The public should not assume that they will necessarily know what actions have been taken or what actions we will take."

The official statement said the US intelligence community "is confident that the Russian government directed the recent compromises of emails from US persons and institutions, including from US political organizations". "We believe, based on the scope and sensitivity of these efforts, that only Russia's senior-most officials could have authorized these activities," it added. The Kremlin labeled the allegations as "rubbish". "Every day (President Vladimir) Putin's website gets attacked by several tens of thousands of hackers," Kremlin spokesman Dmitry Peskov told Russian news agency Interfax. "A lot of these attacks are traced to the territory of the

USA, but we do not blame the White House or Langley each time."

The American statement said the disclosures of alleged hacked emails on WikiLeaks and other websites and by the online persona "Guccifer 2.0" were "consistent with the methods and motivations of Russian-directed efforts". "These thefts and disclosures are intended to interfere with the US election process," the statement said. The statement, however, stopped short of accusing Russia in the recent cyber attacks on state election databases. "Some states have also recently seen scanning and probing of their election-related systems, which in most cases originated from servers operated by a Russian company," the statement said. "However, we are not now in a position to attribute this activity to the Russian government."

It was not immediately clear how Washington would respond in the matter. Officials have in the past said any cyber attacks on important US institutions would prompt a response, which could take the form of diplomatic or economic sanctions, or possibly cyber measures.

'Strong Response'

US Senator Dianne Feinstein, who last month said she and other lawmakers believed Moscow was seeking to disrupt the election, said the ous checks and balances as well as extensive new statement "conveys the seriousness of the oversight at multiple levels built into our electhreat" to the vote. "Attempted hacking of our election system is intolerable, and it's critical to convince the Russian government to cease these activities," the California senator said. "If it does not, we must develop a strong response."

Jason Healey, a former White House director of critical infrastructure protection who is now a researcher at Columbia University and with the Atlantic Council, said the US has tools to respond. "The initial response will be to protect and thwart what the other side wants to do," Healey told AFP. Healey said Washington is also capable of "counteroffensive cyber actions" which can limit or deter attacks. "Don't attack them back but use our own cyber capabilities to disrupt them," he said. "I would not call that offensive, it's counteroffensive."

The FBI has been investigating a leak of Democratic National Committee emails, which were published by WikiLeaks in July. A hacker group using the name Guccifer 2.0 has also released leaked emails and has claimed to have hacked into the Clinton Foundation, led by former US president Bill Clinton, whose wife Hillary is the Democratic presidential nominee.

But the US statement said that "it would be extremely difficult for someone, including a nation-state actor, to alter actual ballot counts or election results by cyber attack or intrusion". That is because of the decentralized nature of the US election system, which is operated by thousands of state and local government entities. "States ensure that voting machines are not connected to the Internet, and there are numertion process," the statement said. "Nevertheless, DHS continues to urge state and local election officials to be vigilant and seek cybersecurity assistance from DHS. A number of states have already done so." — AFP

FROM 'OHIO OF INDIA' TO THE REAL ONE FOR POLITICAL LESSONS

COLUMBUS, Ohio: Eight political professionals from "the Ohio of India" are working at campaign offices in the American bellwether state as part of an international fellowship program. They're all University of Akron International Campaign Fellows, participating in a new program that allows students to swap campaign lessons with the political battleground. "Indians have a lot of interest in U.S. elections, and I think the entire world has a lot of interest," said Pankhuri Pathak, a fellow who works as spokeswoman for India's 24-year-old Samajwadi Party. "Over here, campaigning techniques are more sophisticated, more advanced. So we thought maybe we could learn something from here and apply it back home."

The fellows are high-ranking professionals in their home country - political scientists, communications specialists and strategists from India's most populous state, Uttar Pradesh. Unlike Ohio, UP sends more legislators to the national governing body, Parliament, than any other state. But like Ohio, it has huge sway over which party wins a national majority and gets to influence who becomes prime minister. "We call it 'the Ohio of India' because you can't win an election in India without winning UP," said Hari Kasula, the program's deputy director. Groups from Liberia and Brazil arrive later this month.

No Republican has ever won the White House without winning Ohio, and the last Democrat to do so was John F Kennedy in 1960. The state is an attractive laboratory for these political observers because of its compact mix of big cities, suburbs, mountains and farms that attract almost nonstop presidential stops in election years. Democrat Hillary Clinton and Republican Donald Trump have visited the state about 25 times combined since they clinched their parties'

Besides working full-time knocking on doors, making phone calls and stuffing mail for political campaigns, all fellows must complete the university's class on battleground politics. Gerald Austin, a longtime Ohio Democratic strategist, conceived the program and says it's unique in embedding international fellows with US political campaigns. He team-teaches the battleground politics class with the University of Akron's John Green, director of the Bliss Institute of Applied Politics.

On a recent Wednesday night, the class gathered in two separate classrooms - at Columbus

State Community College and on the university's main campus more than two hours away - that were digitally linked by audio and video. The guest speaker was Tim Monaco from the office of Ohio Secretary of State Jon Husted, the state elections chief. He fielded dozens of technical questions about how Ohio elections work.

International Connections

Austin said international connections made through the program are valuable to both sides. "All these folks are very skilled, experienced in their own country," Austin said. "India's the largest democracy in the world. They've got 1.3 billion people, and 800 million of them vote. They're astounded to hear we actually vote, count and declare a winner all on Election Day. So they have a lot to teach us about what they do that we don't do, and we have a lot to teach them about what we do."

The Indian fellows can discuss the effects in their country of making Election Day a national holiday, casting all votes into a central digital system - and greeting the first voters at polling places with flowers. "The Indian system is more easy, and more safe," Kasula said, while noting he and his colleagues are especially interested in the voter micro-targeting - tailored messages to individual voters based on data such as voting patterns and internet habits - employed by American campaigns.

Indian ballots also feature an option that may have come in handy this year in the US, when two of the least popular candidates on record are running for president: None of the above. There's less time to grow weary of the candidates, though. India's election season is just 45 days long. — AP

DANISH INTELLIGENCE AGENCY STOPS BOOK OF EX-BOSS

"We now have access to the book and are currently reading it," Borch Andersen told the TV2 channel, adding the agency may ask for the injunction to be lifted if nothing sensitive is found. "We have no interest in holding back the book." The book is set to be published on Oct. 17.

Press, said PET "had demanded to be allowed to make changes." Some 5,000 copies had already been distributed to book stores and at least one shop had already sold it.

Scharf, PET chief from 2007-2013, was in charge when PET foiled terror attacks, mainly linked to the 2005 publication in a newspaper of 12 cartoons by various artists depicting the Prophet Muhammad. Since then, Denmark has been a target of Islamist extremists. —AP

PRO-WESTERN GEORGIA HOLDS KNIFE-EDGE VOTE

ELECTIONS SPARK FEARS OF POLITICAL INSTABILITY

TBILISI: Georgians voted yesterday in bitterly contested parliamentary polls that have sparked fears of political instability in the Caucasus nation, with two pro-Western parties tied after a fraught campaign.

Saakashvili, a charismatic reformer who took over in the Rose Revolution of 2003, was forced out of the country after prosecutors issued an arrest warrant for abuse of power and now works as a regional governor in pro-Western Ukraine.

The crackdown on his allies has prompted concerns among Georgia's Western allies that the country could backslide after its sole orderly transfer of power in 2012.

The ex-president has pledged to return after the elections but the authorities warn they will detain him if he steps foot in the country. Voting, which started at 0400 GMT and ended at 1600 GMT, was being monitored by international observers from the Organization for Security and Cooperation in Europe. Exit polls from TV stations loyal to the two rival sides were set to be released when voting ended. —AFP

FRENCH TOWNS PROTEST PLAN TO TAKE IN MIGRANTS FROM CALAIS

PIERREFEU, France: French villagers are protesting the arrival of migrants who are being dispersed around the country as the government shuts down the slum-like camp in Calais that has become a flashpoint in Europe's migrant crisis. Competing rallies were being held yesterday in Pierrefeu in southeast France. The mayor led several hundred people protesting a government proposal to house migrants in an abandoned wing of a psychiatric hospital while they apply for asylum or study other options. Left-wing activists held their own, smaller rally to welcome the migrants.

Gendarmes stood watch but the morning gatherings were peaceful. The far-right National Front plans its own anti-migrant protest later in the day.

The National Front is urging mayors to resist the Calais relocation plan and is organizing or taking part in protests across the country this month. Resistance to immigration is central to the campaign platform of National Front leader Marine Le Pen in her bid for the French presidency next year.

National Front politicians were also at a protest Saturday in Forges-les-Bains south of Paris. About 200 people marched through town, past the farmers' market, school and town hall to protest the arrival of about 40 Afghan migrants relocated from Calais to an unused building in town.

President Francois Hollande has pledged to close the Calais camp before winter and relocate as many as 9,000 migrants living there to 164 sites around France while their cases are examined. The Calais camp has been an embarrassment to the French government and symbol of Europe's failure to find solutions to the migrant crisis. Pierrefeu residents hostile to the migrants say they fear the newcomers will threaten their security, and worry about potential tensions with psychiatric patients.

"Even if we can understand the dismantling of Calais ... our small towns are not the solution for this dismantling. We are too small to host so many people," said Mayor Patrick Martinelli. The government is considering sending up to 60 migrants to this town of 6,000 for up to five months.

The pro-migrant residents called for solidarity. "I am ashamed because we repress the poorest. They need us, the people who are coming from abroad, and are dying in the seas. We have everything here, we are a rich country, we have a rich village," said Pierrefeu resident Laure Paul.

In Forges-les-Bains, villagers largely say they are not hostile to the migrants themselves - they just don't want them in their towns. Posters at the march read "Not against migrants, but against the state and "Plan imposed from above = mounting anger." —AP

BUDAPEST: Hungary's biggest opposition newspaper suspended activities yesterday, heightening concerns about press freedom under right-wing Prime Minister Viktor Orban. Since sweeping to power in 2010, critics say that Orban, as well as undermining key democratic institutions, has muzzled the media in the ex-communist EU member state.

substantial Nepszabadsag's Austrian-controlled owners Mediaworks said that the decision to halt the left-leaning paper's online and print operations was purely commercial.

Mediaworks said in a statement to the MTI news agency that the printing presses would not roll again until "the formulation and realization of a new concept". But the opposition Socialists said that it was a "black day for the press" and called a demonstration outside the daily's offices in Budapest for later in the day.

In Brussels, the head of the main centre-left group in the European Parliament, Gianni Pittella of the S&D Group, said that the paper's financial position was merely a "pretext". "The freedom of press is today in danger in Hungary," Pittella said in a statement. "It is very common in undemocratic systems to shut down hostile newspapers that undermine the power of the government by uncovering-for example-clear cases of corruption. This is exactly what has happened at Nepszabadsag."


MOCK BORDER POSTS **ERECTED ON NORTHERN** IRISH BORDER

CARRICKCARNON, Ireland: Anti-Brexit campaigners erected six mock customs checkpoints along the Northern Ireland and Irish Republic border yesterday, in a protest over the possible impact to peace, jobs and the free movement of workers. Northern Ireland, a British province, will be the only land frontier between the United Kingdom and the European Union once Britain leaves and some fear that will mean a return to checks at the border where about 30,000 people cross each day for work.

The frontier was marked by military checkpoints until a 1998 peace deal ended three decades of violence between Catholic nationalists seeking a united Ireland and Protestant unionists who wanted to keep Northern Ireland British. Over 3,600 died in that time. "We want to stop the reimposition of those border posts," said Border Communities Against Brexit spokesman Declan Fearon, leading a protest in the town of Carrickcarnon between the Northern Irish county of Armagh and southern county of Louth. "In many cases they divided peoples' farms, they divided communities and parishes. Young people nowadays have never known of that," said Fearon, who runs a kitchen manufacturing company three kilometres (1.86 miles) north of the border.

In Carrickcarnon, some locals dressed up as customs officers and caused tailbacks at a temporary road barrier where they called motorists into a mock customs booth and searched vehicles beside fake British customs signs that demanded they stop. Signs telling motorists they were entering the European Union free travel zone were erected on the other side of the border.

Hundreds protested from Carrickcarnon, which is less than an hour's drive from Dublin airport, to the border between the counties of Donegal and Derry, 160 km north-west. Overall, 52 percent of voters in the United Kingdom voted in favour of leaving the EU in June's referendum, but a majority - 56 percent - of those voting in Northern Ireland supported remaining in the bloc. "In (the Northern Irish constituency) Foyle where I am 82 percent of people voted to remain," said Dermot O'Hara, a charity worker protesting at the Donegal/Derry border. "The democratic mandate of the remain camp (in Northern Ireland) should be respected." —Reuters

ALBANIAN PRINCE MARRIES IN COUNTRY'S SECOND EVER 'ROYAL' WEDDING

TIRANA: Prince Leka, the sole descendant of Albania's last king, married popular actress Elia Zaharia yesterday in a ceremony attended by the Spanish queen and several former royals.

It was the first wedding in Tirana of a member of the deposed royal family since 1938. Leka's grandfather Zog I, fled when Italian Fascist troops invaded Albania in 1939, a year after his wedding with Hungary's princess Geraldine

Apponyi. The royal family was forbidden to return until the fall of communism in 1990. Albania was isolated during the communist era and closed to the outside world and the descendants of Zog were considered traitors.

The 33-year old bride, who studied theatre in Paris, is a famous actress in Albania. More than 20 current and erstwhile royals attended, including Spain's Queen Sofia, Iran's former empress Farah Diba, Prince Mihailo Karadjordjevic of Yugoslavia and Princess Margarita of

OBAMA LIFTS US ECONOMIC SANCTIONS ON MYANMAR

WASHINGTON: President Barack Obama on Friday lifted US economic sanctions on the former pariah state of Myanmar, the culmination of years of rapprochement that Obama has worked to facilitate. The Southeast Asian nation, also known as Burma, has pursued political reforms over the last five years following decades of oppressive military rule.

Obama had announced plans to lift the sanctions last month, when Myanmar's new civilian leader, Nobel Peace Prize laureate Aung San Suu Kyi, visited the Oval Office. Suu Kyi concurred it was time to remove all the sanctions that had hurt the economy and urged Americans to come to the country and "to make profits."

The US has already eased broad prohibitions on investment and trade but had retained more targeted restrictions on military-owned companies and officials and associates of the former ruling junta. US companies and banks have remained leery of involvement in one of Asia's last untapped markets.

Friday's executive order lifts those restrictions. It removes the national emergency with respect to Myanmar - the executive order authorizing sanctions that has been renewed annually by US presidents for two decades. It also lifts a ban on the importation of jadeite and rubies from Myanmar, and removes banking restrictions. "I have determined that the situation that gave rise to the national emergency with respect to Burma has been significantly altered by Burma's substantial advances to promote democracy,

including historic elections in November 2015," Obama wrote in a letter to the leaders of Congress. He said the US intends to use other means to support Myanmar in the "significant challenges" it still faces. Some Myanmar nationals remain on the Treasury Department's list of Specially Designated Nationals under other sanctions authorities, such as those intended to block the drug trade, a Treasury statement said. This bars them from any business dealings with the US. They include alleged drugs kingpin Wei Hsueh Kang and other figures from the United Wa State Army, one of Myanmar's biggest ethnic armed groups. Among those taken off are the ex-junta chief, Than Shwe, and the founder of one of the nation's largest conglomerates, Stephen Law, whose late father was once described by Treasury as one of the world's key heroin traffickers. Also taken off were military officials added to the blacklist since 2013 for alleged arms trading with North Korea, such as Lt. Gen. Thein Htay, chief of the Directorate of Defense Industries. — AF

ANGER AS FIGHTING IN KUNDUZ CITY FORCES PEOPLE TO FLEE

KABUL: Parmi fled the fighting in the northern Afghan city of Kunduz with 13 members of her family this week, in shock at how quickly the city's defenses had collapsed to the Taleban. Now in Kabul, she speaks bitterly of the failure of the government to protect the city, a year on from the last time it was overrun by the Islamist mili-

"There is blood and dead bodies everywhere in Kunduz. Our young people are dying and the government hasn't done anything for us," she said, in the hotel she has been staying since Thursday with scores of other refugees from Kunduz. Her comments, and similar accounts from others, who speak of a blacked-out city running out of food, water and medicine, underline the despair of Kunduz residents and the anger building up against the government of President Ashraf Ghani.

Parmi, 42, who like many Afghans goes by only one name, managed to escape with her family, putting a chain on the door of their house and leaving with only the clothes they were wearing after artillery and mortar fire hit their neighborhood. "We had to crawl out of the area; there were bullets everywhere. We left home emptyhanded, now my clothes are dirty and I have nothing to wear," she said but added that she and her family were relatively lucky.

"Anyone who doesn't have money is left there under threat of mortars and gunfire," she said. Special forces units, backed by American advisers and air strikes, have been battling to drive Taliban fighters from the city which the insurgents entered unexpectedly at the start of the week, and fighting continues in many areas.

Following widespread reports of security forces abandoning their positions, poor coordination and rivalries among commanders, there has been heavy criticism that the government failed to learn from last year, when the Taliban seized and held the city for two weeks before pulling out. "Even as the security situation got bad, we didn't believe Kunduz would collapse," said Shogofa Bahar, a medical assistant who fled the city for Kabul this week. "But the situation got worse and worse."

PRESSURE ON PRICES

The United Nations said on Thursday that as many as 10,000 refugees had arrived in Kabul and northern towns including Taloqan and Mazar-i-Sharif. But Kunduz is only one of the many hotspots that have flared in the past few weeks, with heavy fighting seen in Lashkar Gah, capital of the southern province of Helmand, Farah in the west, Baghlan in the north and Nangarhar in the east. Afghanistan already has more than 1.2 million internal refugees, with some 260,000 forced to flee their homes across the country this year as the fighting has continued.

In Takhar, the neighboring province to Kunduz, Sunatullah Timor, a spokesman for the provincial governor, said 5,000 families had been registered with authorities but their arrival was putting pressure on local food prices. Hundreds of families have also arrived in Baghlan but many had moved on to safer areas because of the fighting.

Aid agencies and government authorities have been providing assistance to the latest arrivals from Kunduz but there has also been help from other sources, including private citizens. — Reuters

BANGLADESHI TROOPS KILL 11 SUSPECTED ISLAMIST MILITANTS

JMB LEADER BEHIND DHAKA CAFE MASSACRE AMONG DEAD

DHAKA: Bangladeshi forces yesterday killed 11 suspected Islamist extremists including the new leader of a banned group behind a Dhaka cafe massacre, a minister said.

"Eleven extremists were killed. They are all members of the new JMB (Jamayetul Mujahideen Bangladesh)," Home Minister Asaduzzaman Khan told AFP, referring to the outlawed group that killed 22 mostly foreign hostages at the cafe in July.

"The dead included Akash who was leading the new JMB after the death of Tamim Chowdhury," he said, adding seven of the extremists were killed in a gunfight in Patertek, Gazipur district, just outside Dhaka, after they rejected an offer to surrender. Police said Akash could be a code name for the slain JMB leader. Chowdhury, a Canadian citizen of Bangladesh origin, was shot dead in a gunfight in August. Police said he was the leader of the JMB and behind the cafe attack.

The siege at Holey Artisan Bakery cafe in

deadliest in a series of assaults claimed by Islamist groups which have blighted Bangladesh in the last three years. The Islamic State group claimed responsibility for the attack, posting photos of the carnage as it happened and pictures of the attackers holding IS flags online.

However, Bangladesh officials have rejected the claims, saying the new JMB led by Tamim was responsible for the bloodbath. The minister said seven more suspected Islamist extremists were also arrested in raids in two industrial towns just outside the capital after they committed robberies to fund their activities.

"We have seized money from these extremists that they got through robbery," he said. He told reporters that Syed Ziaul Haque, the leader of another outlawed extremist group called Ansarullah Bangla Team (ABT) would soon be arrested. "He is under our surveillance. He'll be arrested anytime," Khan said.

The ABT, also known as Ansar Al-Islam, is

Dhaka's posh Gulshan neighborhood was the linked with Al-Qaeda in the Indian Subcontinent and has been blamed for a series of murders of atheist and secular bloggers who were critical of Islam.

In the Tangail raid the RAB said the extremists fired at them from their hideout after shouting Allahu Akbar (Allah is the greatest), prompting officers to fire back. NY BOMBING SUSPECT'S FATHER: US 'PUNISHING' MY FAMILY

ISLAMABAD: The father of New York bombing suspect Ahmad Khan Rahami said yesterday that the FBI had made "mistake after mistake" in handling the case and is now "punishing" the family for his son's wrongdoing by barring them from travelling to the United States. Mohammed Rahami told The Associated Press by phone that the FBI did not "do its job properly" by failing to act when he contacted investigators in 2014 with concerns his son could be a terrorist. He said he told investigators that his son had become "bad" and his personality had changed after returning from trips to Pakistan and Afghanistan.

A senior FBI official last month pushed back against the elder Rahami's claim that he warned agents about his son. FBI agents interviewed the father after a 2014 incident in which Rahami was arrested on charges - later dropped - that he stabbed one of his brothers in the leg, according to the FBI official, who insisted that Rahami's father "at no time" discussed his son's radicalization or potential interest in Al-Qaeda, the Taleban or their propaganda. The official wasn't authorized to discuss the case by name and spoke to AP on condition of anonymity.

Rahami said US authorities recently turned back his wife and one of his sons when they tried to travel from Afghanistan to the United States. He said Ahmad Khan Rahami's wife was also refused entry into the US. He would not reveal where his daughterin-law was living, but said her family is from the Pakistani city of Quetta. He urged US authorities to allow his relatives to travel to the United States, saying they are law-abiding citizens.

Rahami is accused of planting bombs in New York and New Jersey that wounded 31 people last month. The Afghan-born US citizen remains hospitalized with gunshot wounds after a police shootout. Prosecutors said that when he was arrested Rahami was found to be carrying a journal that praised Osama bin Laden and other militants and that fumed about what he saw as the US government's killing of Muslim holy warriors. The elder Rahami said he had been given no information on his son's condition in hospital.

He expressed his "sympathy for all those who suffered" in the blasts. "My son's bad act damaged our repute, it defamed my motherland and it caused bad impression about Islam, which stands for peace," he said. — AP

LETHAL CHEMICAL USED AS A DRUG HAUNTS THEATER HOSTAGES

October 2002, a dense white cloud silently filled Moscow's Dubrovka Theater. It had been three days since Chechen militants took more than 800 people hostage. Russian special forces faced an impossible task: liberating the hostages from a theater laced with booby traps and several dozen suicide bombers. They turned to chemicals Russian scientists had been researching for years, and pumped an aerosol containing potent forms of the synthetic opioid fentanyl into the theater before

As the mysterious substance descended, people knelt, covering their

eyewitness accounts. No one was choking. People simply dropped into what appeared to be a deep sleep. "I lay down and started praying," said Vladimir Stukanov, the director of the children's troupe at the theater. His friend, Boris Lapin, had given him his coat, which Stukanov pressed to his face. "Boris died, but saved me," he said.

Commandos stormed the theater and killed the attackers, but more than 120 hostages died from the effects of the chemicals. Many survivors suffered lasting health effects.

The Russian government acknowledged that the aerosol contained fenreveal the exact composition. Years later, British government scientists tested clothing and urine samples from three survivors and concluded that the aerosol contained carfentanil, one of the most potent opioids on the planet, as well as the less-powerful remifentanil.

Readily available

Today, carfentanil is readily available from vendors in China, who offer to export the deadly substance around the world, no questions asked, an Associated Press investigation has found. Carfentanil is not a controlled substance in China, the world's largest chemicals Beijing to blacklist it. Olga Dolotova, an engineer, remembers seeing the plumes descend in the theater before losing consciousness. Later, she heard someone say, "She is alive." When Dolotova opened her eyes again, she found herself on a bus packed with bodies.

"It was such a horror just to look at it," she said. "Nobody was moving. They put the people there like dolls." Dolotova wanted to get up, or shout. She wanted the bus to stop. And she badly needed to vomit. "I was having spasms, but I could not throw up," she said. When she reached the hospital, she gulped down some tea and began retching. "I contin-

The aerosol created a kind of sleep without memory, Stukanov said. "It's like this cluster has been erased and dropped out of your head," he said. — AP

PHILIPPINES TELLS US NO JOINT PATROLS IN SOUTH CHINA SEA

107 US TROOPS MAY BE ASKED TO LEAVE SOUTH

SAN ANTONIO, Philippines: The Philippine defense chief said Friday he told the US military that plans for joint patrols and naval exercises in the disputed South China Sea have been put on hold, the first concrete break in defense cooperation after months of increasingly strident comments by the country's new president.

Defense Secretary Delfin Lorenzana also said that 107 US troops involved in operating surveillance drones against Muslim militants would be asked to leave the southern part of the country once the Philippines acquires those intelligencegathering capabilities in the near future.

President Rodrigo Duterte also wants to halt the 28 military exercises that are carried out with U.S. forces each year, Lorenzana said. Duterte has said he wants an ongoing U.S.-Philippine amphibious beach landing exercise to be the last in his six-year presidency as he backs away from what he views as too much dependence on the US.

"This year would be the last," Duterte said of military exercises involving the Americans in a speech Friday in southern Davao city where he lashed out at the US anew and repeated his readiness to be ousted from office for his hardline stance. "For as long as I am there, do not treat us like a doormat because you'll be sorry for it," Duterte said. "I will not speak with you. I can always go to China."

In Washington, State Department spokesman John Kirby said the US government is not aware of any official notification on curtailing military exercises. He said the US remains focused on its security commitments to Philippines, with which it has a mutual defense treaty.

"We think comments like this, whether they are or will be backed up by actual action or not, are really at odds with the closeness of the relationships that we have with the people of the Philippines and which we fully intend to continue," Kirby told reporters. Duterte, who took office in June and describes himself as a leftist politician, has had an uneasy relationship with the US, his country's former colonial master.

Duterte has lashed out against US government criticism of his deadly crackdown against illegal drugs, which has left more than 3,600 suspects dead in just three months, alarming Western governments and human rights groups.

But while some Filipino officials have walked back on Duterte's sometimes crude anti-US pronouncements - early this week he told President Barack Obama "to go to hell" - Lorenzana's comments show for the first time that the Duterte administration will act by rolling back cooperation with the US military.

With the turquoise backdrop of the South China Sea, US Marines and allied Filipino combat forces barged ashore Friday on amphibious vessels in a mock assault on a Philippine beach in San Antonio town in northwestern Zambales province. Pounding rain prevented military aircraft from joining the beach assault drills, but the US and Filipino forces managed to rapidly come on shore to take out a "notional target," said Maj. Roger Hollenbeck, a US military spokesman for the drills.

Asked to comment on the possibility that the joint maneuvers will be the last under Duterte, Hollenbeck replied, "If it's the last, so be it."

"I have nothing to do with that and we are going to continue to work together, we've got a great relationship," he said. Lorenzana said some US military officials have expressed concern about where the countries' 65-year-old treaty alliance is headed under Duterte.

Regional security

Duterte's moves to limit the presence of visiting American troops will impede Washington's plans to expand the footprint of US forces in Southeast Asia to counter China. "President Duterte's shoot-from-the-hip style of parochial democracy is deeply troubling," said Carl Thayer, an expert on the South China Sea. "If Duterte moves to curtail US rotational military presence from bases in the Philippines, this would undermine the US ability to deter China not only in defense of Philippines sovereignty but regional security as well."

Despite the difficult stage in the countries' relations, Lorenzana remained optimistic that those ties would eventually bounce back. "I think it's just going through these bumps on the road," Lorenzana told a news conference. "Relationships sometimes go to this stage ... but over time it will be patched up."

Duterte's falling out with Washington will not necessarily spread to US allies such as Japan, for example, which has committed to deliver patrol ships for the Philippine coast guard and has signed a deal to lease five small surveillance planes the country can use to bolster its territorial defense. The planes may arrive as early as next month, Lorenzana said.

The US and Japan have helped the Philippines develop its capabilities to safeguard and defend its territorial waters amid China's increasingly aggressive actions in the South China Sea. Under Duterte's predecessor, Benigno Aquino III, the US and Philippine militaries twice staged naval exercises near the disputed waters. — AP

JAPAN'S MOUNT ASO VOLCANO **ERUPTS; SENDAI PLANT SAFE**

TOKYO: Mount Aso, a volcano on Japan's main southern island of Kyushu, erupted early yesterday, Japan's Meteorological Agency said, spewing volcanic ash 11,000 meters (7 miles) into the sky. Police and municipal governments said there were no reports of injuries from the eruption, which began at 1:46 a.m. local time (1646 GMT Friday) on one of the peaks of the 1,592metre (5,222 feet) mountain in Kumamoto

It was the first "explosive eruption" at the peak since January 1980, according to the meteorological agency. The agency raised the alert level for the volcano to level 3 on a scale of 5, telling people not to approach the mountain and warning of falling rocks. It also warned of falling ash in 10 prefectures. TV footage showed volcanic ash had accumulated on cars, houses and roads in the city of Aso and ash was falling as far as 320 km (200 miles) away, Japanese media said.

Farmers have reported that some vinyl greenhouses where tomatoes and asparagus were being grown 6-8 km (4-5 miles) away from the crater had been broken by ash and small rocks. A window was cracked by a falling rock at an Aso youth centre about 5 km (3 miles) away from the crater but there were no reports of injuries, an official at Aso city hall said.

"We are concerned that more damage on crops will be reported," the official said. Kyushu Electric Power Co said the eruption had no impact on its Sendai nuclear plant, which is about 160 km (100 miles) south of Mount Aso and is one of the two reactors that are online in Japan.

Up to 29,000 households lost power shortly after the eruption but the problem was fixed in less than two hours, a spokesman at Kyushu Electric said. Mount Aso is one of the most active peaks in Japan but is also a popular hiking spot. Japan lies on the "Ring of Fire", a horseshoe-shaped band of fault lines and volcanoes around the edges of the Pacific Ocean, and is home to more than 100 active volcanoes.

Mount Ontake in central Japan erupted unexpectedly in 2014, killing 63 people in the worst volcanic disaster in Japan for nearly 90 years. Mount Aso also erupted in September last year, blasting a plume of black smoke 2 km (1.2 miles) high. — AFP

SEVEN TEENS MISSING AFTER **BOAT CAPSIZES** IN INDONESIA

JAKARTA: Seven teenagers were feared dead yesterday, a day after they went missing when their boat capsized on a river in Indonesia, officials said. None have been found despite a major rescue operation.

The wooden boat was carrying 25 Islamic boarding school male students across the Bengawan Solo river on Java when it capsized early Friday. Officials said they suspected overloading caused the boat to tilt. "They were about to reach land, about seven metres away or so, but the kids, probably from overexcitement, came to the front of the boat, making the boat unbalance," Suprapto, a local disaster management official, told AFP.

The missing passengers were aged between 12 and 19. Eighteen other passengers survived, Suprapto, who like many Indonesians goes by one name, added. Scores of rescuers were deployed to search the river using inflatable boats soon after the accident but none of the missing has been found so far. Rescuers said rain, muddy water and strong currents were hampering the search. Indonesia has a poor water transport safety record and regularly suffers fatal boat accidents.

Last month, an explosion on a speedboat on the resort island of Bali left two foreigners dead and 18 other tourists injured. — AFP

SATELLITE IMAGES SHOW ACTIVITY AT N KOREA NUCLEAR TEST SITE

SEOUL: An increase in activity at North Korea's nuclear test site could signal preparations for a new test or a collection of data from its last one, a US-based monitoring group said on Friday. The 38 North group, run by Johns Hopkins University's School of Advanced International Studies, said satellite images showed activity at all three tunnel complexes at the Punggye-ri nuclear test site involving a large vehicle and personnel.

"One possible reason for this activity is to collect data on the Sept. 9 test, although other purposes cannot be ruled out, such as sealing the portal or other preparations related to a new test," the group said. North Korea conducted its fifth and biggest nuclear test on Sept. 9 and South Korea has said it believes the north is ready to conduct


another nuclear test at any time. There has been specula tion that Pyongyang could mark the Oct 10 anniversary of the founding of its Workers' Party with a sixth detonation.

A study published on Friday by a US-based North Korea research project said North Korean missile and nuclear tests, and other major "provocations", had clustered increasingly closer to US elections. The study from Washington's Center for Strategic and International Studies said the pattern based on looking at 30 US elections since 1956 suggested a North Korean action as early as a month before the Nov 8 US presidential election. This could mean a test coinciding with the Oct.10 anniversary. The trend also suggested the possibility of an act during the December transition period for the next US administration. North Korea conducted its first nuclear test in 2006 and has since defied UN sanctions to press ahead with the development of the weapons and missiles to carry them, which it says it needs for defense.

In January, it conducted its fourth nuclear test and the fifth was carried out on the anniversary of the nation's founding. South Korea's Unification Ministry spokesman Jeong Joon-hee told a briefing there were no particular indications of a plan for a nuclear test on Oct. 10.

However, South Korea's Yonhap news agency cited an unidentified government official as saying that activity at North Korea's rocket launch station near the west coast could be preparations for a long-range missile launch. Japan said the possibility of further "provocative action" by North Korea could not be ruled out.

"The government is taking all possible measures in gathering information, exercising vigilance and taking surveillance activities to be able to respond to any situations," Japan's Chief Cabinet Secretary Yoshihide Suga told a news conference. — Reuters

The video was the latest calamity for Trump, who had hoped to revive his flagging campaign in the face of a recent drop in polls with less than a month until Election Day. The 2005 video of Trump talking on an open microphone showed the then-reality TV star speaking openly about groping women and trying to seduce a married woman. The video was taped only months after Trump married his third wife, Melania.

DEFIANT TRUMP VOWS TO STAY IN RACE

The backlash against the video was swift and wide-spread. In an unusual move, vice presidential running mate Mike Pence issued a critical statement, saying on Twitter that he cannot defend the nominee. "As a husband and father, I was offended by the words and actions described by Donald Trump in the eleven-year-old video released yesterday," Pence, who is governor of Indiana, said in a statement. "I do not condone his remarks and cannot defend them."

Pence indicated he would continue to support Trump, despite calls from several Republicans that the New York real estate mogul step aside and let Pence be the nominee. There is no precedent for a major party to replace its nominee this late in the campaign and it is unclear if there is an avenue to force him out. Voting has begun in several states, including the important swing states of Virginia and North Carolina.

A hastily recorded apology by Trump early yesterday did not stymie an avalanche of calls from members of his party to quit. Trump huddled yesterday afternoon in Trump Tower with senior advisors, including New Jersey Governor Chris Christie and former New York City Mayor Rudy Giuliani.

Trump quickly moved to conduct damage control in yesterday's video in which he declared himself a changed man and attempted to shift the focus to his opponent, Democrat Hillary Clinton. He threatened, again, to focus his attacks on the infidelities of her husband, former President Bill Clinton, saying he would talk more about the pasts of both Clintons with only a month until the Nov 8 election. Trump has dismissed questions about his own marital infidelities as irrelevant

"Anyone who knows me knows these words don't reflect who I am. I said it, I was wrong, and I apologize," Trump said in his video statement, posted on his Facebook page. "I've never said I'm a perfect person, nor pretended to be someone I'm not," Trump said in his apology. "I pledge to be a better man tomorrow."

The video overshadowed the publication of excerpts of Clinton's paid closed-door speeches made public on Friday by a hacker who claimed to have obtained them from the email account of John Podesta, the chairman of the Democrat's campaign. In the speeches, she advocates for more open borders and trade, a position she abandoned during the primary because it was untenable to Democratic progressives. Trump has repeatedly

criticized her for her past support of free trade.

Trump has struggled to win over women voters, and the video is expected to further feed Democratic criticism about his past behavior toward women. In the video, Trump uses vulgar and predatory language as he describes hitting on a married woman and grabbing women's crotches. The three-minute video captures Trump reacting to an actress he was about to meet as he arrived on the set of daytime soap opera "Days of Our Lives", for the taping of a segment in which he was to have a cameo appearance.

"I did try and f*** her. I moved on her like a b****, but I couldn't get there. She was married," Trump said about one woman, before discussing his attraction to others. "I've gotta use some Tic Tacs (breath mints), just in case I start kissing her," Trump says to Billy Bush, then host of the "Access Hollywood" show about celebrities. "You know I'm automatically attracted to beautiful. I just start kissing them. It's like a magnet," he says. "I don't even wait. And when you're a star they let you do it. Grab them by the p****. You can do anything."

House Speaker Paul Ryan disinvited Trump to a scheduled appearance yesterday afternoon in Wisconsin. Pence declined to speak in his place. The list of Republicans announcing they would not vote for Trump or calling on him to step aside grew yesterday: Senators Kelly Ayotte, Mark Kirk, Jeff Flake, John Thune, Mike Crapo, Shelley Moore Capito and Mike Lee; House members Jason Chaffetz, Mia Love, Joe Heck, Bradly Byrne, Martha Roby and Barbara Comstock; and Governors John Kasich, Dennis Daugaard and Gary Herbert. Additionally, former presidential candidates Mitt Romney and Carly Fiorina also called on Trump to quit.

Capito, of West Virginia, called his remarks "disgusting and demeaning". Chaffetz of Utah, one of Clinton's fiercest critics, retracted his endorsement of Trump, telling CNN he would not be able to look his 15-year-old daughter in the eye if he voted for him. Other prominent Republicans, however, indicated they would stick with Trump. Ralph Reed, head of the Faith and Freedom Coalition, and Tony Perkins, head of the conservative Family Research Council, said they would continue to support him.

Conservatives point to the fact that the winner of the November election will get to appoint a Supreme Court justice as reason to stick with Trump despite the video. Greg Mueller, a conservative Republican strategist, pointed to Clinton's views on abortion as a reason religious voters will stick with Trump. "Nothing indefensible that Donald Trump said 20 years ago is going to change that," he said. "Plus, to many religious voters, Mrs Clinton is the epitome of a corrupt politician." Representative Jack Kingston, a Republican from Georgia, argued Trump has changed since the video was filmed. "I think 10 years ago he was a different man ..., I am very glad that he quickly apologized," Kingston said. — Agencies

HURRICANE MATTHEW SLAMS INTO S CAROLINA

"We rode out the storm. It wasn't this bad at our house, but here there's a lot of damage," said Zowi Cuartas, 18, as he watched people pick up shattered signs near the beach. "We were prepared to lose our house."

Governor Rick Scott of Florida said more than 6,000 people stayed in shelters overnight, but he appeared relieved at a news conference on Saturday the storm had not done more harm. "We're all blessed that Matthew stayed off our coast," he said. He predicted most people would have power back by Sunday evening. He did not comment on the death reports.

Streets in downtown Charleston, known for its historic architecture, were flooding up to the tops of tires on some cars and a few residents waded near the city's sea wall as high tide approached. Tony Williams, 54, who said he is homeless, rode his bicycle against huge wind gusts after spending the night in the garage of a bank. "I just got tired of laying where I was laying," he said. On Daufuskie Island near the Georgia border, writer Roger Pinckney, 70, said he was fine on Saturday morning after refusing pleas from officials for residents of low-lying barrier islands to evacuate. "It blew like hell," he said. Charleston officials said they were not aware of any deaths, injuries or significant structural damage. Winds and the threat of surges were expected to diminish through the day.

The toll in the United States was far less devastating than in Haiti, where at least 877 people died earlier, a death tally that ticked up as information trickled in from remote areas. Matthew howled through Haiti's western peninsula on

Tuesday with 233 kph winds and torrential rain. Some 61,500 people were in shelters, officials said, after the storm hurled the sea onto coastal villages.

The Mesa Verde, a US Navy amphibious transport dock ship, was en route to Haiti to support relief efforts with heavy-lift helicopters, bulldozers, fresh-water delivery vehicles and two operating rooms. The US government was also airlifting emergency supplies, according to the United States Agency for International Development. Aid group Doctors Without Borders was flying personnel to Haiti by helicopter. The Haitian government warned a deadly outbreak of cholera could worsen, confirming dozens of new cases of the water-borne disease since the storm, 13 of them fatal.

Officials in Florida, which has been grappling with an outbreak of Zika, said they hoped the flooding would not worsen the spread of the mosquito-borne virus, which causes fever and birth deformities. "We have got to get rid of standing water as quickly as we can," Governor Scott told reporters.

In North Carolina, where the hurricane was due to arrive yesterday evening, Governor Pat McCrory warned storm surges and high winds could cause serious problems. He said he was "extremely concerned" the downgrade to a Category 1 would cause people not to take warnings seriously. Forecasters warned of flooding as 40 cm of rain were expected to fall in some areas along with massive storm surges and high tides. Further south, some 20 cm of rain fell in the Savannah, Georgia, area, downing trees and causing flooding. Though gradually weakening, Matthew was forecast to remain a hurricane until it begins moving away today, the NHC said. — Reuters

injured five and a suicide bombing in Ansbach that left 15 wounded. The attacks in July rattled Germans' sense of security and fuelled concerns over the country's record influx of migrants and refugees last year. Police in the state of Saxony, where Chemnitz is located, issued a search warrant for Albakr after officers received information from domestic intelligence services, a police spokesman said, saying he was born in Syria in January 1994.

They added that Albakr was wearing a black hooded sweatshirt and was "suspected of preparing a bomb attack" and issued an image of the man. He arrived in Germany as a refugee last year and was under interior ministry surveillance for a period, according to Focus magazine, which cited intelligence sources. The German magazine's website added that he had been plotting to attack an airport in the country.

A vast police operation was underway as heavily armed officers, some wearing balaclavas, combed the area around Albakr's apartment and local residents were evacuated. An explosion was heard in the leafy Chemnitz suburb which investigators said was a police entry device. Part of the city's main station was sealed off by officers as a remote-controlled robot was deployed to

inspect a suspect package on a platform.

German police said previously they had

German police said previously they had identified 523 people who posed a security threat to the country, around half of whom were known to be currently in Germany. On Sept 21 German officials said a 16-year-old Syrian refugee had been arrested on suspicion of planning a bomb attack in the name of IS. The youngster, thought to have been radicalized only recently, was detained in a special forces operation at a shelter for asylum-seekers in the western city of Cologne, police and prosecutors said.

Initial information gathered from the teenager's mobile phone showed that he had expressed an "unmistakable willingness" to carry out an attack, Klaus-Stephan Becker of the Cologne police told reporters. A week earlier, German police detained three men with forged Syrian passports accused of being IS militants and labelled a possible "sleeper cell" with links to the assailants behind the November attacks in Paris.

More than 200 police took part in predawn raids in northern Germany to detain the men, suspected of either plotting an attack or awaiting orders to commit one. German authorities have urged the public not to confuse migrants with "terrorists", but have acknowledged that more jihadists may have entered the country among the one million asylum-seekers who arrived last year. — AFP

US' STRONG WORDS MUST BE FOLLOWED BY STRONG ACTION

was both understanding of and puzzled by the Obama administration's reaction to Israel's announcement of new settlement construction in occupied Palestinian lands. It was just a few weeks ago that the White House signed a new 10 year agreement with Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu committing a total of \$38 billion in military assistance to Israel. In announcing the deal, President Obama noted that this is the most significant support package ever offered to Israel, demonstrating his unparalleled commitment to that state's security. Shortly thereafter, Obama, speaking before the United Nations General Assembly, cautioned Israel that it "cannot permanently occupy and settle Palestinian land."

And so it was like a slap in the face when, when Netanyahu announced that he was building new settlement units in colonies deep in the West Bank, along with ongoing plans to expand settlements in other sensitive areas of the occupied lands - in Arab areas of Jerusalem, in the heart of Hebron, and around Bethlehem. All of these are clear provocations and when seen in combination make clear Israel's intention to maintain its control over the West Bank, making impossible the establishment of a viable Palestinian state. Adding insult to injury was the fact that Netanyahu's the announcement came just two days before Obama was to travel to Israel to speak at the memorial service for Shimon Peres.

And so, I was not surprised when the reactions from the White House and the State Department were quite harsh. The White House spokesperson noted that every US Administration, since 1967, has opposed settlements in the occupied lands and reaffirmed their view that expanding settlements in the West Bank and Jerusalem only served to further frustrate a two-state solution to the Israeli-Palestinian conflict.

The White House went further by accusing Netanyahu of violating his commitment to the US that he would refrain from any further settlement expansion noting, caustically that "I guess, when we're talking about how good friends treat one another, that's a concern, as well".

For its part, the State Department spokesperson "strongly condemned [the Israeli] plan that would create a significant new settlement deep in the West Bank". He referred to the expansion as being yet "another step toward cementing a one-state reality of perpetual occupation" and added that "Such moves will only draw condemnation from the international community...and further call into question Israel's commitment to achieving a negotiated peace". He went further, adding that the Administration was "deeply troubled" that Israel took this action so soon after the signing of the new massive military aid agreement.

Puzzle

While fully understanding that the Administration is upset, I admit to also being puzzled. Netanyahu has been playing them for almost eight years, repeatedly sticking his finger in their eye and getting away with it. In fact, it is a running joke, that Netanyahu, either before or after high level US visits, will defiantly announce new settlement plans, boasting that he knows how to control America. On three occasions, Netanyahu used invitations to address the US Congress in an effort to stymie the goals of the president - succeeding twice. In the one instance where he lost (on the Iran deal), he ended up being rewarded with the \$38 billion arms agreement. And so after almost eight years of frustrating the Administration's efforts at peace-making, of continued settlement expansion, of systematic violations of Palestinian rights, and of repeated episodes of near unrestrained gross violence, why should anyone have been surprised that Netanyahu would pocket the \$38 billion and once again flaunt his commitments to the President? He acts with impunity, precisely because there has been no accountability for his behavior. The White House and State Department may cry foul, issuing strong statements. But Netanyahu knows that it will end there - with no price to be paid for bad behavior. As long as the US allows this pattern to continue, the spoiled child will take advantage of the situation - taunting, acting out, and getting his way.

DESPITE NOBEL, PEACE PROCESS IN DANGER

Peace Prize gives the country's troubled peace process a major boost, but saving a deal voters recently rejected still won't be easy, analysts say. The prize closed out a roller-coaster week for Santos, who suffered a major defeat Sunday when Colombians narrowly voted against his signature achievement as president, a peace deal with the Revolutionary Armed Forces of Colombia (FARC).

Santos, who has staked his legacy on ending the country's half-century conflict, has sought to battle back by opening talks with the deal's top opponent, his predecessor and former boss, Alvaro Uribe. He simultaneously sent his negotiators back to Havana, where the peace talks were held, to see whether the FARC would be open to revising the deal. He scored a small victory in the wake of the Nobel announcement, when government and FARC negotiators said they had agreed to discuss changes to the deal and continue a bilateral ceasefire.

But Santos will still have to pull off a difficult balancing act. "The government is looking for a way out on two fronts: With the opposition and with the FARC," said political scientist Marc Chernick, a Latin America specialist at Georgetown University in Washington. The Nobel "will

strengthen Santos," he said. But it might not make much difference, he added. "There isn't much room for maneuver to change the accord that was already reached." "If they manage to make any amendment, it will be cosmetic," he said. "And time is running out to save it. It won't be easy."

Risky Game

The Colombian conflict has killed more than 260,000 people and left 45,000 missing, drawing in several leftist rebel groups, right-wing paramilitaries and drug gangs. The FARC, a Marxist guerrilla army launched in 1964, is the oldest and largest rebel group. It was to relaunch as a political party under the peace deal. But Uribe, the rightwing hardliner leading opposition to the deal, claims the rejected agreement would have given the rebels impunity for their crimes and put Colombia on the path of "Castro-Chavismo" - a reference to the far-left governments of Cuba and Venezuela.

Santos has warned the country is in a "very dangerous limbo" as it scrambles to salvage the peace process. In the referendum's aftermath, he had said the army would halt its ceasefire with the FARC at the end of the month if the impasse were not settled. Although both sides have since vowed to continue the ceasefire indefinitely, they are locked in a risky game, political analyst Laura Gil said.

Santos may still pull out of the ceasefire "if there is no clear and definite roadmap by Oct 31" in order to pressure the peace deal's opponents, she said. "The opposition is panicking because they know the first person to die will come crashing down on their heads."

The ceasefire is currently worth little more than the paper it's printed on - which is to say not much - said Jorge Restrepo, head of the Conflict Analysis Resource Center in Bogota. Now that the peace deal that established the ceasefire has failed, "it means the conflict starts again," he said.

All-Out War?

The FARC, which had begun grouping its nearly 6,000 fighters together for a UN-monitored disarmament process, has now ordered its fighters back to their hideouts in the Colombian jungle and mountains. "It's a logical military decision. The implementation of the deal has been frozen," said retired army colonel Carlos Alfonso Velasquez, a specialist in the Colombian conflict at the University of La Sabana, outside Bogota. The FARC, he said, has grown "moderately mistrustful". That could deepen what has in recent years been a low-intensity conflict, he added. "This has been a conflict with only tenuous characteristics of a civil war," he said. "But if (the impasse) isn't resolved, it could now reactivate as a full civil war." — AFP

FIRST 100 DAYS OF DUTERTE'S TURBULENT RULE

n just 100 days in office, Philippine President Rodrigo Duterte has stirred a hornet's nest by picking a fight with Barack Obama, the United Nations, the European Union and others who have criticized his brutal crackdown against drugs, which has left more than 3,600 people dead. In another defining aspect of his unorthodox rule, the 71-year-old Duterte has pushed back his country's 65-year treaty alliance with the United States, while reaching out to China and Russia.

Highlights of the first 100 days of Duterte's turbulent presidency:

Anti-Drug War

Duterte's obsessive focus on his deadly crackdown on illegal drugs, a hallmark of his three-decade political career, has singlehandedly defined his early days in the presidency. It has become his boon and bane and earned widespread condemnations when he compared it to the Holocaust under Hitler. A rough estimate puts the death toll at about 3,600, including more than 1,300 suspects killed in gunbattles with police - an average of 36 killings a day since he took office on June 30. The scale of the crackdown has been unprecedented, with the police launching more than 23,500 raids so far and arresting 22,500 suspected drug dealers and addicts. More than 1.6 million houses of drug suspects have been visited by police to invite them to surrender and stop using drugs or disengage from the drug trade. About 732,000 addicts and dealers have surrendered, apparently for fear of being killed, overwhelming Duterte and the national police, and prompting them to scramble for land and money to build rehabilitation centers.

Duterte's public threats to kill criminals, especially drug dealers, have helped considerably reduce the crime rate, according to police. A poll by the independent Social Weather Stations last month showed 84 percent of adult Filipinos were satisfied with his war on drugs, but 94 percent felt it was important for police to arrest suspects alive, underscoring public worry over the growing body count even in a crime- and insurgency-plagued country long accustomed to deadly violence.

Western governments led by the US, the EU, the U.N. and human rights watchdogs are alarmed. Amnesty International says

Duterte's "first 100 days as president have been marked by state-sanctioned violence on a truly shocking scale". Uncertainty over the killings, Duterte's SOB-laced verbal assaults on President Barack Obama, UN Secretary-General Ban Ki-moon and other critics, along with flip-flopping government pronouncements, have been partly blamed for foreign selling in the stock market and the peso's plunge to a seven-year low.

Fraying US Alliance

An emerging casualty under the Duterte presidency is the country's 65-year treaty

alliance with the United States, which has been a constant target of his foul tongue. He has had a falling out with Obama, who along with the State Department raised concerns over the widespread drug killings, earning Duterte's wrath. In a speech this week, he told Obama "to go to hell". While critical of the US, Duterte has reached out to China and Russia.

Labeling himself as leftist, Duterte wants US counterterrorism forces to leave his country's south, saying their presence was helping inflame restiveness among minority Muslims and they could be targeted by

extremists. He ordered the military not to join the US Navy in planned joint patrols in the disputed South China Sea, and said that an ongoing combat drill by US Marines and their local counterparts, one of 28 joint exercises by the allies each year, would be

the last of his six-year presidency.

The US has generally played down the effect of Duterte's remarks and underscored the Filipinos' long affinity with America, although Philippine officials have said that some of their US counterparts have privately been concerned about where Washington's alliance with the Philippines is headed. Duterte's moves to limit engagements with visiting American troops will impede Washington's plans to expand the footprint of US forces in Southeast Asia to serve as a counterweight to China, including in the South China Sea.

Taming Decades-long Rebellions

Duterte's effort to resume peace talks with communist insurgents who are waging one of Asia's longest rebellions has led to cease-fire declarations by both sides. With a cease-fire accord forged under his predecessor with the largest Muslim rebel group, the easing of violence involving the communist insurgents has freed up thousands of troops who were redeployed to execute the president's order to destroy the brutal Abu Sayyaf group, notorious for kidnapping and beheading Western tourists.

Duterte, however, walks a tightrope in handing concessions to the communists, including the release of long-detained insurgent leaders, without unsettling a military that's in the front line of a bloody conflict that has left between 30,000 to 40,000 combatants and civilians dead in nearly half a century. He has made whirlwind visits to at least 22 military and police camps to explain his counterinsurgency strategy, raffle off pistols and update them on a pledge to double their salaries and improve medical care for combat troops.

A Sept 2 bomb attack that killed 15 people at a night market in Duterte's southern hometown of Davao prompted him to declare a "state of lawlessness" to empower the government to harness troops in countering militant threats in urban areas. The attack was a reality check on the complexity of fighting the restiveness that Duterte blames on atrocities against local Muslims by American colonial forces around the early 1900s. — AP

Poom will enter the final round as the leader for only the second time in his career on the Asian Tour, after leading in the 2014 Queen's Cup in Thailand before finishing second. With numerous players breathing down his neck, the baby-faced Poom hopes to put his experience of playing on the Asian Development Tour (ADT) to good use as he chases for a first Asian Tour victory. "After I was five-under, I felt like it would be my day so I started playing more aggressively. This is my second time in the last group on the Asian Tour," said the one-time winner of the ADT, according to an Asian Tour press release. —AFP

AUSTRALIA'S 'MYSTERY' SPINNER GLEESON DIES

SYDNEY: Australian cricketer John Gleeson, who mystified batsmen with his unique bent finger spin, has passed away aged 78, Cricket Australia said yesterday. Gleeson played 29 Tests between 1967 and 1972, and debuted for his country in the 1967-68 Test series against India in the First Test at the Adelaide Oval. He captured 93 wickets in his Test career at an average of 36.20. Gleeson used a unique "bent-finger" action using two fingers-a bent middle finger and the thumb pressing against the ball on both sides in an attempt to extract a new variety of bowling tricks. "John captured the imagination of cricket fans everywhere as he bamboozled batsmen with his odd bowling grip, borrowed from another mystery 1950s Australian spinner, Jack Iverson," Cricket Australia chief executive James Sutherland said. "We were deeply saddened to hear of John's passing and are truly appreciative of his contribution to the game, which, beyond his distinguished playing career, included time as an administrator with World Series Cricket. "He will be remembered as someone who played for his country at the highest level and, with his unique skills, had the ability to regularly dumbfound the best batsmen in any team." —AFP

NANI RULED OUT OF FAROE ISLANDS CLASH

LISBON: Valencia forward Nani has been ruled out of Portugal's World Cup qualifier away against the Faroe Islands tomorrow due to injury, the Portuguese Football Federation said. Nani, 29, who played a starring role in Portugal's Euro 2016 triumph, already missed Portugal's 6-0 defeat of Andorra at home on Friday because of a muscle strain in his right leg. According to an evaluation by the Portuguese Football Federation's health department, the player "is not fit for the match on Monday" and would not travel to the Faroe Islands. Portugal began their qualifying campaign for Russia 2018 with a 2-0 loss away to Switzerland on September 6. They are third in Group B, a point behind minnows Faroe Islands and three back from leaders Switzerland. —AFP

CHINESE KHL TEAM OFF TO MODEST START WITH EYE ON '22 GAMES

ST PETERSBURG: Few professional sports teams had grander beginnings than Kunlun

With Vladimir Putin and Xi Jinping looking on, China's biggest venture in hockey to date joined the Kontinental Hockey League in June at a lavish ceremony in Beijing. For the Russiabased KHL, Kunlun is a chance to beat the NHL to the Chinese market. Chinese officials hope the club can groom enough talent to strengthen its feeble national team in time for the Beijing Olympics in 2022.

"This project was organized at the highest level," said Vladimir Yurzinov Jr., Kunlun's Russian coach. "It's good that we're first because if it wasn't us (in the Chinese market), it would be the North Americans."

China offers a vast potential fan base for foreign sports leagues, but there are challenges in turning interest into revenue. English Premier League soccer is the biggest success story, having built a dedicated Chinese following in part by playing preseason games in Hong Kong. That has helped to push its global

TV rights deals to record levels. The Women's Tennis Association now hosts some of its most lucrative events there, thanks to the breakout popularity of Chinese player Li Na, while the British-based sport of snooker has also reversed its fortunes by finding a younger

audience in China. Still, Tom Doctoroff, an US-based expert on marketing in China, cautioned that hockey has limited potential in China because it is "too overtly aggressive" for Chinese consumers, and persuading them to pay to watch sports

team is off a sobering start to life in the KHL, widely considered the world's secondstrongest league. Kunlun had lost three in a row when it

arrived for a recent game at SKA St. Petersburg, which had ex-NHL stars Slava Voynov and Ilya Kovalchuk on the ice. There were a few giggles when the announcer asked fans to stand for the Chinese anthem, and SKA barely had to sweat for a 3-0 win as Kunlun's Canadian and European import players struggled to deal with one of the strongest rosters outside the NHL.

FUNDING

The KHL sprawls across eight countries and nine time zones, meaning players face a punishing schedule of long flights across Eastern Europe and Asia. That's a new world for ex-Carolina Hurricanes defenseman Brett Bellemore, who had never left North America until he joined Kunlun before the season. For Bellemore, the move was more about seeing the world with his new wife, Natasha, than the

financial side of playing in China. "I'd never even had jetlag before," he said. "It's been a bit of a ride, but it's been exciting." Kunlun boasts players from nine countries, ranging from 36-year-old NHL veteran Alexei Ponikarovsky to young Chinese players just starting their careers. Among them is Rudi Ying, an 18-year-old who grew up in the United States after moving there at age 10 to pursue his dream of being a professional hock-

Spreading hockey beyond China's wealthier classes will be hard, given the cost of equipment and facilities. Right now, soccer is attracting the lion's share of government and private funds, with President Xi the country's No. 1 fan. "I've had one foot in either culture," said Ying, who comes from a privileged background. "It helps me to see how far behind Chinese hockey is. China's not to blame, it's just a sport that's not very popular ... We don't have much time to catch up."

Despite the political fanfare around Kunlun in Russia and China, club spokesman Oleg Vinokurov said no government money is involved and funding comes from Russian and Chinese companies. So far, there are mixed signals on the success of the fledgling team: While almost 8,000 people watched Kunlun win its first home game in Beijing, a game at its secondary arena in Shanghai attracted just 550 fans.

For the KHL, moving into Asia is something of a plan B after its westward expansion into Europe stalled, with several teams experiencing chronic financial difficulties. The long-term aim is for Kunlun to be the basis for the Chinese national team, just as CSKA Moscow was for the Soviet Union.

Yurzinov said part of his mission as Kunlun coach is to improve the Chinese players on his roster with mentoring from older teammates and simply "practice after practice." The focus is firmly on developing local talent, not attracting foreigners to represent China in international play, as 2018 Olympic host South Korea has done.

If it can't improve the national team by 2022, China will be the first Olympic host not to take part in the men's tournament. The national team was pounded 9-0 by the Netherlands earlier this year and will play next year's world championship in Division II B, competing against the likes of Mexico and North Korea.

Ying will be 23 when the 2022 Olympics take place and hopes he will be a star on home ice for the Chinese national team. He worries the timetable is just too tight, even with Kunlun spawning a new generation.

"The reason we created this organization to try to help promote Chinese hockey is because one person can't do it," he said. "If 2022 comes around and I'm the only one who's at that level, it's not going to be enough."—AP

DERRICK ROSE SAYS HE ASSUMED EX-GIRLFRIEND CONSENTED TO SEX

LOS ANGELES: There was no text message that specifically gave Derrick Rose permission to have sex with his ex-girl-friend, but for the NBA star the signs were clear, he testified in a lawsuit that accuses him and two friends of raping the woman.

It started with a morning text message from the woman saying Rose was the reason she "wakes up horny," including a photo of herself in her nightshirt. Rose said Friday he surmised that the "horny" text had triggered consent from that point on, and that was only reinforced for him by their sexual acts she engaged in with him and his personal assistant that night at his house and an invite hours later to her apartment.

The 30-year-old woman denied having sex earlier in the evening at Rose's Beverly Hills mansion, though her testimony was clouded by her claims that she blacked out and could only piece together the evening through short "flashes" of memory and by reviewing a flurry of text messages she apparently was able to send despite being drunk and, possibly, drugged.

At the end of testimony, Rose's lawyer asked a judge to declare a mistrial because of a profane text message that he said the woman's lawyers had failed to reveal until Friday.

The judge said he would take the issue up Tuesday morning before the Knicks point guard is scheduled to

resume testimony. The judge ordered Rose to return to the stand even if it means missing a preseason game the night before in New York.

Rose, 28, was called to the stand by the plaintiff's lawyer as a hostile witness to help make the plaintiff's case that the woman never gave consent to have sex with him and his longtime friends and assistants, Randall Hampton and Ryan Allen. Consent is the main issue for the jury of six women and two men. The men, all friends since adolescence in Chicago, have denied the allegations and said the woman consented.

The Associated Press is not naming the woman because it generally does not identify people who say they are victims of sexual assault.

Rose said he never received any text from the woman telling him she wanted to have sex with him and the two others. But he had assumed from what had transpired and the fact she had never told him no.

"In my mind, she consented every time we had sex," he said. "Why wouldn't she do it that time?"

Attorney Waukeen McCoy suggested Rose had no remorse about the night. "I'm sensitive to it," Rose replied, but added, "I feel I didn't do anything wrong." Rose hadn't seen the woman since breaking up months earlier, but invited her over for drinks that night. Rose retreated to his room, where he rebuffed

further advances until a friend removed her from the room.

Rose said the woman was acting a bit abnormally, but he didn't think she was drunk. Rose said he once had feelings for the woman and thought they had a bond. He was once asked if he thought she was after his money. "Not at that time" he said

Defense lawyers have described her as a gold digger and suggested she had sued for money. She denied that saying: "I didn't wish him any harm, I wanted him to be accountable."

The woman didn't report the incident to police until she filed suit more than two years later. Los Angeles police still have an open investigation.— AP

LYNAGH SAYS LACK OF DEPTH HURTING WALLABIES

LONDON: Wallaby legend Michael Lynagh believes a lack of depth lies behind Australia's post World Cup slump. Michael Cheika's men return to Twickenham yesterday for their Rugby Championship finale against Argentina in their first match at 'headquarters' since a World Cup final defeat by New Zealand just over a year ago. Few would have forecast then that loss would mark the start of a run of six straight defeats for Australia, albeit all the games concerned were against the world champion All Blacks and a resurgent England coached by former Wallaby boss Eddie Jones. Australia head into this weekend's match in London having won just twice in eight games, with the initial optimism engendered under Cheika, who took charge following the shock resignation of Ewen McKenzie in October 2014, now a thing of the past.

"We thought that under difficult circumstances, the team and Michael Cheika performed very well to get to the final," Lynagh, 52, told AFP in an interview on Friday at the London office of financial media firm Dow Jones Corporate, where he works as the managing director for Europe, the Middle East and Africa. "They played good rugby and it's not that much different to the team that's been trotted out this year," explained former fly-half Lynagh, a key member of the Wallabies' 1991 World Cup-winning side.

Lynagh, whose 911 points in 72 Tests remains an Australia record, added, however: "There's been some issues. (David) Pocock hasn't played a lot of games and he was arguably one of the players of the tournament at the World Cup. "The England games we were down to our fifth inside centre which, when you are a nation such as Australia that struggles with depth, is not great and it's the same now.

"When you look at them, (Matt) Giteau, (Kurtley) Beale, (Matt) Toomua and (Christian) Lealiifano are all out."

'STRUGGLE'

Last week's 18-10 defeat by South Africa was typical of Australia's recent problems, with the normally efficient Wallabies failing to make their pressure count.

"When you get more than 50 percent of the ball, you look at the Wallabies and you think they are going to score a lot of triesthat was the case at the World Cup-and they normally win games," said Lynagh. "But it's been a real struggle this year to score tries. Whether that's because oppositions have worked them out, whether they don't have enough versatility in their armoury, we've yet to see.

"But we are in a rebuilding phase. We lost six in a row there but all six of them to the number one and number two teams in the world (New Zealand and England) so it's not too bad."

Argentina head into yesterday's match with just one win, over South Africa, in this season's Rugby Championship. But Lynagh insisted the Pumas, defeated by Australia at Twickenham in last year's World Cup semifinal, will still be one of the "teams to beat" at the 2019 edition in Japan.

Right now, he reckons they are paying the price for the first season of the Jaguares team-the Argentina side in all but name-in the Super Rugby club competition.

"They had a tough Super Rugby tournament-it was their first time in there and I think players dealing with the travel and it's a long season and it's always the same group of players," Lynagh said. "They wanted to incorporate more teams and I think that's diluted the product a little bit.

"I can understand wanting Argentina to be there, but when you've got an extra South African team, another Australian team and a Japanese team who play home games in Singapore as well. More is not necessarily better. "But Argentina play a pretty good brand of rugby. They are pretty dangerous and they've been very close (to more wins) and they'll go close again yesterday. "I think that with teams in both these championships, they will really benefit and they will be one of the teams to beat at the next World Cup." Television analyst Lynagh, who overcame a life-threatening stroke in 2012, finished his playing career with London club Saracens, now the reigning English and European champions.

Saracens boss Mark McCall has led criticism of last week's England training campwhich included a judo session-that saw Wasps flanker Sam Jones break his leg and Bath wing Anthony Watson fracture his jaw.

"It's just ludicrous," said Lynagh. "You can't have a guy playing for Saracens or whoever on a Sunday, then going doing judo sessions on Monday and Tuesday and then playing Wasps yesterday. It's just too much."—AFP

ROSBERG KEEPS SQUEEZE ON HAMILTON WITH JAPAN POLE

SUZUKA: Nico Rosberg stormed to pole position at the Japanese Grand Prix in a pulsating climax yesterday's qualifying, piling yet more pressure on world title holder Lewis Hamilton.

The German, who has a 23-point lead over Hamilton in the Formula One championship with five races to go, will start alongside his British foe on the front row as the two Mercedes continued to dominate in Suzuka.

Rosberg has been quickest all weekend with Hamilton forced to play second fiddle after being cruelly robbed of victory in Malaysia by a blown engine six days ago.

The triple world champion asked questions of his fierce rival, but Rosberg showed nerves of steel to produce a blistering lap that pipped Hamilton by just 0.013s in a nail-biting finish to qualifying. Ferrari's Kimi Raikkonen will start from third in Sunday's race, next to Dutch teenager Max Verstappen's Red Bull.

"I knew I could do it. I just had to get my head down and nail it," said Rosberg after securing his eighth pole of the year, the same number as Hamilton. "The end of qualifying was pretty intense but I had a good feeling-I knew if I put in a decent lap then it should be enough," added the German, whose slender edge over Hamilton was calculated by Mercedes to work out to just 82 centimetres.

"I still need to get the job done on the start tomorrow, then race pace, strategy. We're feeling good about it and we think we can be quickest tomorrow."

REVERSAL OF FORTUNE

Rosberg, chasing his first win in Japan and his fourth in his last five races, is hoping for a reversal of fortune at Suzuka after failing to convert pole into victory in 2014 and 2015, both times losing out to Hamilton.

Meanwhile, Sebastian Vettel was fourth fastest for Ferrari but a three-place grid penalty for a first-corner crash with Rosberg in Malaysia means he starts seventh.

Daniel Ricciardo, who inherited victory in Sepang after Hamilton's misfortune, lines up fifth

ahead of Force India's Sergio Perez, while Vettel starts alongside Romain Grosjean's Haas on the fourth row. Nico Hulkenberg's Force India and the second Haas of Esteban Gutierrez rounded out the top 10. There was frustration for McLaren in engine supplier Honda's home race, however, with Fernando Alonso starting on row eight and Jenson Button one row behind after failing to escape the first qualifying round.

Hamilton insisted he could still halt Rosberg's surging momentum by winning Sunday's race, having done exactly that in Japan the past two years. "I did as well as I could I think," said Hamilton, who courted controversy this week by hinting his Malaysia heartbreak may have been caused by sabotage from within Mercedes.

"History has shown you don't have to be on pole to get the win."

The Briton bristled when asked if he was too hard on his engines. "For people's reference there's nothing wrong with my driving style," sniffed Hamilton. "I asked the team and it's not the case, it never has been." —AFP

VETTEL PLAYS DOWN FERRARI BOSS' COMMENTS ON FUTURE

SUZUKA: Sebastian Vettel said he had nothing to sort out with Maurizio Arrivabene, playing down comments the Ferrari team principal made that the German had to earn his place at the Italian Formula One team.

"I know that there is nothing between us, nothing that we need to sort out," Vettel, who said he was not aware of the comments, told reporters at the Suzuka circuit yesterday after Japanese Grand Prix qualifying. "I enjoy a really good relationship with him and I think if there's something that I don't like, I tell him and equally the other way around," the four-times world champion said. Arrivabene, speaking to broadcaster Sky Sports Italia, made the comments in reference to Vettel's future. "Each of us has goals," Arrivabene said, adding that a decision on Vettel's contract, which is up for renewal at the end of next season, would be made during 2017.

"So it is only right that anyone, no matter who it is, earns their place and their salary," Arrivabene added. He suggested Vettel needed to focus on getting the most out of the car and not get distracted by other aspects of the team's operation.

vettel, 29, joined Ferrari at the start of

last season, hoping to emulate boyhood idol Michael Schumacher by turning the sport's most successful season into a championship-winning force again.

The partnership won three races in their first year together, becoming the only team apart from Mercedes to stand on the top step of the podium.

But an expected title challenge has failed to materialise this year with Ferrari slipping back behind Vettel's former team Red Bull. The German, who retired on the opening lap of the last race in Malaysia after shoving Nico Rosberg's Mercedes into a spin, has also come in for criticism from the Italian media.

"As much as the team wants to perform, I want to perform," said Vettel, who qualified fourth behind team mate Kimi Raikkonen in Japan but will drop three places on the grid as punishment for colliding with Rosberg at Sepang.

"I had races this year where I didn't do so, I wasn't happy with myself because there was more on the table," he added.

Vettel is fifth in the standings, behind Raikkonen. The Finn won the world championship with Ferrari in 2007, the team's last drivers' title.—Reuters

RICKY BURNS EYES BRONER BOUT AFTER TITLE DEFENCE

LONDON: Scotland's Ricky Burns made a successful first defence of his World Boxing Association super-lightweight title with a hard-fought points win over Kiryl Relikh in Glasgow on Friday. Victory took Burns, 33, closer to a clash with American four-weight champion Adrien Broner.

But he did not have things all his own way before prevailing 118-110, 116-112, 116-112 on the three judges' scorecards for a unanimous points decision.

The fight was made all the more emotional for Burns and his legion of fans after it was announced Wednesday that all money from remaining ticket sales would be donated to the family of dead boxer Mike Towell. Towell died in hospital last Friday after being stretchered from the ring in Glasgow the previous day.

Belarus boxer Relikh, coached by former world champion Ricky Hatton, made a strong start as he fully justified his pre-fight record of 19 knockouts in 21 wins.

But a straight right by Burns that landed on the 26-year-old Relikh towards the end of the fourth round brought forth cheers from the crowd. The resilient Relikh kept pursuing Burns and he landed with a couple of heavy punches in the 10th round.

Three-weight world champion Burns went down in the 12th and final round, but only due to a slip rather than a punch, and by that stage he had done enough to hold on to the WBA belt.

After the bout, he quickly turned his attention to the prospect of facing Broner in Las Vegas.

"If the money is right, I will fight anyone," Burns told Sky Sports. "Broner, when he is on his game, is a very good fighter. "I don't see the point in going anywhere else. At some point I can get a big fight over there."

As for his victory over Relikh, Burns conceded: "In the second round he caught me with a couple. "He could whack. I know people go on about big punchers all the time but there were some punches there - I can hardly lift my hands tonight." But we stuck to the game-plan, we stuck to boxing. I got the win and that is the main thing. We move on to the next one." — AFP

ENGLAND'S BALL IN DHAKA 'DREAM DEBUT'

DHAKA: Fast bowler Jake Ball made a dream debut in Dhaka by becoming the first England bowler to take five wickets in his first one-day international during Friday's 21-run win against Bangladesh.

Bangladesh, replying to England's 309-8, appeared to be coasting towards their target with opener Imrul Kayes (112) clubbing a century and racking up a 118-run partnership with all-rounder

Shakib Al Hasan. With the hosts needing 39 runs off 52 balls, Ball helped England claw their way back into the fight by removing Shakib, who played one of the finest innings of his career before going for 79 off 55 balls.

Ball bowled young Mosaddek Hossain off the next ball and completed the dramatic win with the wicket of Taskin Ahmed as England claimed the last six wickets for 17 runs to dismiss Bangladesh for 288 runs. The visitors have a 1-0 lead in the three-match series. "It was a debut you can't forget really," Ball said after the match. "It was a dream debut," said Ball.

Ball, whose only Test match to date has been against Pakistan in July, also praised the England dressing room.

TON-UP KOHLI STEERS INDIA TO 267/3 AGAINST N ZEALAND

INDORE: Skipper Virat Kohli struck form with a gritty century as India ended the opening day's play on a commanding 267 for three against New Zealand in the third and final Test in Indore yesterday.

The hosts, who elected to bat first, rode on an unbeaten 167-run partnership between Kohli (103) and Ajinkya Rahane(79) to gain control of the innings after early losses. Kohli recorded his 13th Test ton in 48 matches after a string of low scores in his last seven innings since his first Test double hundred against West Indies in July.

The top-order batsman, who tackled the New Zealand bowlers with excellent footwork, hit the ball to all parts of the Holkar Stadium. Rahane, who seemed to gain confidence from the free-flowing Kohli at the other end, brought up his fifty-the tenth of his Test career-with a six off Jeetan Patel.

"Virat played a very good innings and got the first century (from either side) in the series and Ajinkya too batted well," number three batsman Cheteshwar Pujara, who scored 41,

told reporters. "Their partnership was crucial and if it carries on tomorrow it will be good for us," Pujara said. The 27-year-old Kohli worked hard in the initial part of his innings but grew in stature after getting past fifty and his assured strokemaking soon dominated the New Zealand bowling. Kohli tapped a rising delivery from Matt Henry to run a quick single that saw a direct hit at the non-strikers end but the star batsman scampered home and celebrated his hundred. New Zealand skipper Kane Williamson, who returned to lead the side after missing the second Test with a viral infection, juggled his bowling options but Kohli and Rahane held fort.

The hosts did not lose a single wicket in the space of 34 overs in the final session as the batting duo entertained the raucous home crowd.

"We will try to bat as long as possible. The kind of position we are in, we will look to get 400 and if we don't lose quick wickets tomorrow and continue like we are doing, we will keep batting. "We hope for a big total and when our spinners bowl we expect some more help from the wicket on day two and three," said Pujara.

GAMBHIR'S BREEZY KNOCK

Earlier in post-lunch play number-three Pujara was bowled off a beauty by left-arm spinner Mitchell Santner for 41. He had put on 40 runs with Kohli.

India lost both its openers in the morning session with returning Gautam Gambhir (29), who was playing Test cricket after a two-year gap, letting go of a good start.

Pace spearhead Trent Boult cut short Gambhir's breezy knock, which was studded with three fours and two sixes, after trapping the left-handed batsman lbw on an incoming delivery. Boult, Santner and Patel, who struck first after sending back Murali Vijay for 10, shared a wicket apiece in the 90 overs of play.

New Zealand allrounder James Neesham, who was added to the starting lineup in place of Neil Wagner, said the visitors were in with a chance provided they strike early on day two.

"I don't know if we could have done it a whole lot different with the ball, stuck at it well...Keeping the run rate below three was a good achievement. Couple of quick wickets tomorrow we're still in game," said Neesham on Saturday. The hosts, who took a 2-0 lead after winning the second Test in Kolkata on Monday, have set their sights on a whitewash against the tourists. — AFP

PAKISTAN INCLUDES IN-FORM AZAM FOR DAY-NIGHT TEST

KARACHI: Pakistan yesterday included inform Babar Azam for the first Test against the West Indies, Asia's first day-night match to be played with a pink ball.

The 21-year-old batsman notched up 360 runs during the West Indies one-day series that ended Wednesday. Azam, who has played 18 one-day internationals and four Twenty20s, has yet to play a Test.

Senior batsman Younis Khan will, however, miss the first of the three Tests as he continues recovering from dengue fever. The squad for the other two Tests will be announced later.

Chief selector Inzamam-ul-Haq said Azam was being rewarded for his prolific form.

"We felt Azam did very well on the big stage and is in good form so we have included him in the team so he could be groomed," Inzamam said.

The selectors have dropped misfiring openers Mohammad Hafeez and Shan Masood from the 15-man squad which levelled the four-match Test series against England 2-2.

Inzamam explained the axing of other regular openers. "We consulted the captain

(Misbah-ul-Haq) and coach (Mickey Arthur) and they wanted the same combination which played in the Oval Test where Azhar Ali and Sami Aslam had opened," said Inzamam of Pakistan's last Test in August.

He hoped Younis would recover in time for the second Test.

The second Test starts in Abu Dhabi from October 21 while the final Test is in Sharjah from October 30.

The opening match, in Dubai from October 13, will only be the second Test played under lights and with a pink ball, instead of the usual red. Australia played the first-ever day-night Test in Adelaide in November last year in an attempt to beef up dwindling crowds for the five-day matches.

Left-arm spinning all-rounder Mohammad Nawaz, who has yet to play a Test, is also part of the Pakistan squad. EX-COSTA RICAN SOCCER CHIEF LI PLEADS GUILTY IN US BRIBERY CASE

NEW YORK: A former Costa Rican soccer federation president charged in a US corruption probe involving the sport's global governing body FIFA pleaded guilty on Friday, admitting he took hundreds of thousands of dollars in bribes.

Eduardo Li, also an ex-member of the executive committee for the North and Central American and Caribbean soccer confederation, CONCACAF, pleaded guilty in federal court in Brooklyn to charges including wire fraud and racketeering conspiracy.

In court, Li said as president of Costa Rica's soccer federation, FEDEFUT, he accepted bribes to award contracts for media and marketing rights for matches and for sponsoring team uniforms.

"I knew that it was wrong of me to accept such undisclosed payments," Li said through a Spanish interpreter. Li, who prior to his indictment was a memberelect to FIFA's executive committee, also agreed to forfeit \$668,000.

Li, 57, is one of 42 individuals and entities charged in a US investigation that has rocked FIFA. He was among seven soccer officials arrested at a Zurich luxury hotel in May 2015. U.S. prosecutors allege Li and others engaged in schemes involving over \$200 million in bribes and kickbacks that were sought and received by soccer officials for marketing and broadcasting rights to tournaments and matches. Seventeen people and two entities have pleaded guilty. In court on Friday, Li said he negotiated a \$500,000 bribe, of which \$300,000 he actually received, to award a Miami-based unit of Brazil's Traffic Group

media and marketing rights for 2022 World Cup qualifier matches.

Li said he also agreed to accept a separate \$500,000 bribe, \$230,000 of which he received, from Panama-based intermediaries in exchange for awarding a US company a contract to be the Costa Rican national team's uniform sponsor.

Li added the intermediaries asked him to not tell the company about the bribes. While he did not name the company, the deal matched the description of one announced in 2015 with Boston-based New Balance. New Balance said in a statement it plans to cooperate with authorities should they contact the company. "New Balance has a long history of ethical and fair play across all of our global business operations and we do not tolerate any corrupt activities," the company said.

Li said he also accepted bribes in connection with friendly matches a Floridabased individual organized, and embezzled \$90,000 FIFA sent FEDEFUT for the 2014 Under 17 FIFA Women's World Cup soccer tournament in Costa Rica. —Reuters

CHICAGO CUBS WIN DUEL, JAYS AND INDIANS UP 2-0

LOS ANGELES: Javier Baez blasted an eighth inning solo home run as the Chicago Cubs won a pitching duel over the San Francisco Giants with a 1-0 victory at Wrigley Field on Friday.

The solo shot by Baez came off Giants starter Johnny Cueto and broke open a scoreless contest, allowing Cubs starter Jon Lester to take the victory in game one of the Major League Baseball playoff series. "This guy was written off as a hitter," Lester said of Baez. "But at times this year he has carried us on both offence and defence.



TOP 10 DEBUT FOR KONTA WITH CHINA OPEN SEMI WIN

BEIJING: Johanna Konta became the first British woman in 32 years to break into the top 10, after she beat Madison Keys to reach the final of the China Open yesterday.

for the second set and then stepped up her game in the third, keeping the American on the defensive to take her a step closer to her second season-and career-title. "I don't think she made a lot of unforced errors or gave me a lot of balls to be able to get on the offense," Keys told reporters after the match. Konta, 25, burst onto the scene at last year's US Open where she reached the round of 16, claiming two top 20 scalps along the way. She has gone up another gear this season, becoming the first British woman to reach a Grand Slam semi-final in 33 years at the Australian Open and reaching the quarter-finals at the Rio Olympics.

The win in the Chinese capital is yet another one for the record books: she

will be the first British woman to break into the top 10 since Jo Durie in 1984 when the new rankings are released Monday.

SMASHING RECORDS

Durie, who reached a career high of five, tweeted her congratulations after the match: "Congrats to @JoKonta91 a fantastic year & thoroughly deserves the Top Ten ranking. More to come I'm sure."

Although typically focused Konta was quick to put aside thoughts of her top 10 achievement, she admitted that breaking another of Durie's records felt good. "I know I've achieved something good whenever I'm mentioned in the same sentence as her (Durie)," Konta said. There was a lot on the line for both Konta and Keys as they chase points to

qualify for the first time for the eightplayer season finale in Singapore. Konta moves into eighth spot with the semifinal win, while Keys remains in seventh position, but with two weeks to go before the tournament both could be nudged out.

Konta will face third-ranked Agnieszka Radwanska in Sunday's final, after she beat Ukrainian Elina Svitolina 7-6 (7/3), 6-3 in the semis.

Svitolina-who upset world number one Angelique Kerber in the third round — recovered from 3-0 in the second set but was unable to close the gap on the 2011 China Open champion.

Meanwhile Raonic pulled out of his semi-final match a few hours before it was due to start.

"Yesterday during my second match

in the evening... I rolled over my ankle, obviously caused it some level of a sprain," Raonic told reporters. The sixthranked 25-year-old has been stalked by injuries all season, costing him the chance to bag his first Grand Slam title. He was two sets up to Murray in the Australian Open semis when he suffered a thigh injury, eventually losing in five.

The big-serving Canadian was also tipped to make a run for the crown at Flushing Meadows, but fell in the second round after again injuring himself on court.

Murray made quick work of Ferrer for a place in the finals. The Spaniard had lost his previous six matches against Murray and failed to get a look in after the Scot went two breaks up in the first set.—AFP

SWISS WIN FIVE-GOAL THRILLER IN HUNGARY

BUDAPEST: Substitute Valentin Stocker scored in the last minute to give Switzerland a 3-2 win away to Hungary on Friday after Adam Szalai had twice equalised for the hosts in a thrilling World Cup qualifier.

The Swiss went top of Group B with six points from two matches following a game in which all five goals were scored after halftime, while Hungary were left with one point and already look unlikely to make a first World Cup appearance since 1986.

The Faroe Islands are second with four points after their shock 2-0 win in Latvia, while Portugal and Latvia have three and Andorra none.

Switzerland struggled to get going in the first half without the suspended Granit Xhaka, who usually dictates the rhythm in midfield

But striker Haris Seferovic, widely criticised for his performances at Euro 2016 when he failed to score a goal, put them in front six minutes after halftime, scoring from a rebound after Xherdan Shaqiri's shot

was saved by Peter Gulacsi.

Szalai equalised two minutes later, also from a rebound after his own shot hit the post. Left back Ricardo Rodriguez put Switzerland back in front in the 67th minute, volleying home from Valon Behrami's lofted cross for his first international goal, only for Szalai to again equalise four minutes later.

Switzerland were not to be denied, however, and snatched the points when a long thrown-in was twice headed on and Stocker scored at the far post.

"Hungary applied lots of pressure on us during the game which was intense and entertaining. Hungary came back at us twice, but we showed character at end," Switzerland coach Vladimir Petkovic told reporters. His Hungarian counterpart Bernd Storck added: "It was a dynamic and good game, both teams gave all they had. We are very disappointed because came back twice against a top team, but we made too many mistakes and they made us pay for them." — Reuters

SOUTHGATE CAUGHT UP IN TAX AVOIDANCE DISPUTE

LONDON: England interim manager Gareth Southgate is among hundreds of rich clients caught up in a multi-million-pound tax avoidance dispute with British authorities, a newspaper reported Friday, on the eve of his first match in charge.

Southgate invested in two partnerships set up by a film investment fund, Ingenious, which is accused by Her

Majesty's Revenue and Customs (HMRC) of being part of an elaborate scheme to avoid paying tax, the Daily Mirror said.

A source close to the former England player told AFP he made the investments in 2004 in good faith and would not challenge any tax demand that might arise

when the case was resolved.

But the timing is embarrassing for the 46-year-old and for the Football Association, the English game's governing body, as they hope to draw a line under former manager Sam Allardyce's controversial exit. Southgate takes charge of England for the first time in Saturday's World Cup qualifier against Malta, barely a fortnight after his predecessor quit in disgrace after just 67 days and one game at the helm.

Allardyce, 61, was secretly filmed by undercover reporters giving advice on how to circumnavigate transfer rules and mocking England predecessor Roy Hodgson.

Appointed England manager on a £3 million-a-year contract (\$3.9 million, 3.3 million euros), Allardyce also agreed to travel to Singapore and Hong Kong as an ambassador for their fictitious firm for a fee of £400.000.

According to the Daily Mirror, Southgate

is one of about 400 rich clients of Ingenious, a movie financing firm that has backed films such as Avatar but which is accused of creating artificial losses to help investors avoid tax.

Following a tribunal ruling earlier this

year, investors are facing a bill for £434 million (482 million euros, \$540 million) in unpaid tax, plus interest and legal fees, according to the Mirror.

Ingenious denies it operated as a tax

avoidance scheme. A spokesman for the FA told AFP: "This is a private matter." Meanwhile, The Times newspaper reported that England captain Wayne Rooney is facing a £3.5 million tax bill after a separate film investment partnership in which he put his money was also accused of tax avoidance. "Wayne's tax affairs have always been conducted in full compliance with the law," a spokesman told the newspaper. —AFP

RUTHLESS RONALDO HITS FOUR FRANCE AND DUTCH RUN RIOT

PARIS: Cristiano Ronaldo scored twice in the opening four minutes on the way to a four-goal haul as European champions Portugal smashed Andorra 6-0 in World Cup qualifying on Friday, while France recovered from a goal down to thrash Bulgaria.

The Real Madrid superstar was making his first appearance for Portugal since he was stretchered off injured and in tears from the final of Euro 2016 and he wasted no time in making up for his three-month absence from international football.

The 31-year-old took just 73 seconds to make his mark. He was wrestled to the floor at a corner but then jumped up to volley in left footed from around the penalty spot after the Andorra goal-keeper could only parry a Portugal header.

Ronaldo, who has struggled to get back to his brilliant best for Real since returning from his knee trouble, was at it again two minutes later when he was left totally unmarked on the sixyard box to rise and head in. It was only a matter of how many for the home side after that, as Portugal belatedly got three points on the board in Group B, after losing in Switzerland in the opening group matches.

Ronaldo made it the perfect hat-trick just 90 seconds after the break, grabbing his third-Portugal's fourth-with a sweet right-footed volley. Andorra's nightmare evening got that bit worse just after the hour when they went down to 10 men, Jordi Rubio receiving a second yellow card for clattering late and hard into Ronaldo, who punished the away side soon after with another fine half-volley for 5-0.

Cynical and increasingly desperate Andorra saw red again when Marc Rebes was the next to get sent off, again for cutting down the man of the moment Ronaldo.

Andre Silva sealed the punishment four minutes from time. "We know that Switzerland and the Faroes won tonight and it will be necessary for us to beat them during qualification," said Ronaldo who now has 65 international goals.

"There are eight games left and we want to win them all to reach the World Cup finals."

GAMEIRO AT THE DOUBLE

France, agonisingly beaten by Portugal in Paris in the Euro final in July, returned to the scene of that heartbreak and got off to the worst possible start when they conceded after just six minutes at the Stade de France. Mihail Aleksandrov stroked home from the penalty spot to give the Bulgarians a shock lead in a very competitive-looking Group A. But the French stormed back with two goals from Kevin Gameiro-making his first international start in almost five years-in a convincing 4-1 win. "It was a perfect evening. We reacted well and then ran away with it," Gameiro, back in favour at the age of 29, told TF1. "I felt enormously proud and especially full of desire. Hard work pays off." The Netherlands, who failed to make it to the Euros, top the group after they defeated Belarus 4-1 in Rotterdam. Quincy Promes grabbed a first-half

brace for the Dutch.

Under-achieving Belgium also enjoyed a fine home win, Eden Hazard scoring a beauty in the first period as they defeated Bosnia and Herzegovina 4-0 to go top of Group H.

WEST HAM COUNT COST AS RELOCATION SPARKS TURF WAR

LONDON: While historic Upton Park is being reduced to rubble by demolition workers, just across east London the price of progress seems painfully high to the West Ham fans engaged in a struggle for their club's soul.

Just five months ago West Ham waved farewell to Upton Park, their home for 112 years, and headed into a bright and lucrative future in their new and bigger London Stadium.

Becoming the main tenants at the former Olympic Stadium had been a gruelling process, but West Ham's hierarchy felt the politicking and legal wrangles would be worthwhile if the increased revenue helped transform their underachieving club into a major force. Determined to fill the stadium, season-ticket prices were slashed to a cheapest mark of £289 (\$359, 320 euros) for adults, in comparison to Upton Park's lowest range of £600, and business was booming at the box office ahead of the new Premier League sea-

son. West Ham's number of season-ticket holders doubled to over 50,000, close to stadium capacity, but while co-owners David Sullivan and David Gold counted the cash, the streets around their new home have become paved with blood rather than gold.

Traditionally drawing their support from the working-classes who grew up in the tough districts around Upton Park, West Ham's change of address was expected to repeat the trend of crowd gentrification seen at Arsenal and Chelsea. Once feared in the 1980s for their large number of hooligans, Chelsea's fanbase underwent a remarkable change when higher ticket prices saw many old-school supporters usurped by the middle classes, who saw the modern game as a fashionable addition to their lifestyle.

West Ham had serious problems with their "Inter-City Firm" of hooligans for many years as well, but rather than keep out the undesirable

elements, the cheap tickets and larger stadium have allowed a way back in for some of the club's more volatile followers and a new breed keen to follow in their violent footsteps.

Adding to the explosive mix, fans who stood throughout matches at Upton Park have quickly become frustrated by the club and local council's desire to ensure they stay sitting in their new abode. Continuing to flout the rule, those supporters have turned violent when confronted by stewards or other fans, often those with children whose view of the match is impeded by the

Compounding the problem is a security debacle which means police are only on duty outside because there isn't a radio system in the stadium

which would allow officers to communicate.

West Ham have pushed for a police presence inside the ground but it is the responsibility of stadium owners E20 to meet the cost.— AFP

LAUSANNE: Olympic bosses yesterday asked the World Anti-Doping Agency (WADA) to create a new body for testing athletes and revamp the fight against drug cheating in sport.

An International Olympic Committee (IOC) summit also backed plans for the world's top sports court to take the primary role in sanctioning athletes who are caught doping.

The two moves amount to a rebuke for international sports federations, which have had control over testing and punishment, a system the IOC says has repeatedly failed to ensure clean competition.

Overall, the high-stakes summit at a luxury hotel in Lausanne, Switzerland — at a time when the Olympic movement is grappling with one of its worst crisesagreed "to make anti-doping testing independent from sports organisations," a statement said.

The IOC decisions will be seen as a victory for WADA after it faced what some called an existential threat after the damaging Russian doping scandal, which culminated in dozens of its competitors being barred from tak-

ing part at the Rio Olympics. IOC leaders had accused WADA of failing to act quickly enough on evidence that Russia was running a government-supported cheating programme in some 30 sports over several years. It had been clear before the summit that the IOC wanted to curb the power of sports federations and overhaul doping controls through a new testing body. Speaking after the meeting-the guest list also included international sport heavyweights such as FIFA president Gianni Infantino and Olympic chiefs from the US, Russia and China-WADA chief Craig Reedie said: "I'm very happy with it."

The IOC recommendations "will strengthen WADA. We're to be given substantial additional authority and substantial additional power so I'm perfectly happy with that".

NEW TESTING BODY

The IOC statement called for "a new testing authority" to be set up "within the framework of WADA".

It did not however specify WADA's level of control over the new entity, though WADA will oversee the new body's creation and maintain its own supervisory role in the global anti-doping fight.

But the IOC stressed there will be a "clear segregation

of duties" between the testing authority and WADA as the regulator. The IOC proposals must be approved at a WADA meeting next month and by the IOC's executive, which meets in December.

If implemented, the reforms will give WADA more power to crack down on failing national anti-doping organisations as well as more intelligence and investigative powers.

IOC leaders were frustrated that the Russian doping programme was run for years before it burst onto the public scene thanks largely to an investigation by German television.

WADA has since commissioned a bombshell report into the nefarious Russian doping scheme, led by Canadian lawyer Richard McLaren, with the full findings to be released in the coming weeks.

IOC President Thomas Bach said that a beefed-up WADA will need significantly more money, but that the Montreal-based anti-doping agency will first need to show it has a plan for handling its new powers. "It is up to WADA to now discuss the implementation of these reforms, which ones are implemented, to which degree they are implemented and then to present a budget," Bach told reporters after the summit. If WADA embraces its new role "100 percent... it would mean a substantial increase in financing," Bach said.

COURT TO PUNISH DOPERS

The Court of Arbitration for Sport (CAS) already plays a prominent role in sanctioning dopers by hearing the appeals of athletes sanctioned by their sports federations. But Bach argued that a system where the court made the first decision on punishments would increase transparency and consistency. He noted that CAS made all doping-related rulings at this summer's Rio Olympics and that none of those decisions had been appealed, indicating the court's authority was widely respected.

Aside from the Russia scandal, which overshadowed the Rio Games and allegedly had links to the Moscow sports ministry, Kenya's track and field programme was revealed to be riddled with cheaters, while various other doping revelations cast doubt on the integrity of competition at the Games.

The IOC said it would continue to strive "for a more robust, more efficient, more transparent and more harmonised WADA anti-doping system". — AFP

GARETH SOUTHGATE STARTS **ENGLAND REIGN WITH WIN**

Dele Alli earned England a laboured 2-0 win over minnows Malta yesterday in interim manager Gareth Southgate's first game in charge. Southgate has stepped into the breach following the departure of Sam Allardyce, who was brought down by a newspaper sting, and saw his side secure a successive World Cup qualifying victory.

Sturridge and Alli struck within nine minutes of each other at a nearly full but subdued Wembley, but England were unable to swell their lead despite monopolising possession and they were jeered late on as they ran out of ideas. "I thought first half we played well. We could and should have scored more goals," Southgate said.

"Their goalkeeper made some good saves and subconsciously I think some of our players looked after themselves physically in the second half. "We missed a couple of good chances, but given where we were 10 days ago, I am pleased with the

Southgate, who handed a debut to Manchester United winger Jesse Lingard, also lost left-back Ryan Bertrand to injury. It increases the likelihood the former England Under-21s coach will call up reinforcements ahead of Tuesday's next Group F match in Slovenia. Southgate will also preside over November's qualifier against Scotland and friendly with Spain before the

LONDON: First-half goals by Daniel Sturridge and Football Association decides who will succeed Allardyce on a full-time basis.

Malta's goalkeeper, Andrew Hogg, hails from London and it was no surprise he was a central figure on his return to the city of his birth. He was called into action for the first time in the eighth minute, plunging to his right to palm away a curling effort from Wayne Rooney. Rooney, deployed in central midfield, was upstaged by his midfield partner Jordan Henderson, whose enterprising running and incisive passing kept Malta on the back foot in the first half.

His lofted pass freed Lingard, whose mishit half-volley flashed over, and he teed up Alli for a header that was parried by Hogg, with Sturridge wastefully blazing the rebound over.

MADE IN LIVERPOOL

It was not all plain sailing for England.

Bertrand was forced off with an apparent hamstring injury in the 19th minute, which saw Danny Rose come on, while Rooney was lucky to avoid sanction for an untidy challenge on Malta skipper Andre Schembri. England took the lead in the 29th minute with a goal made in Liverpool, Henderson swishing a cross into the box from deep and Sturridge steering a header inside the right-hand post.

It was Sturridge's 100th goal in professional

football. After Hogg had denied Lingard and Gary Cahill sliced wide from a corner, England inflated their lead in the 38th minute.


Southgate's men circulated the ball patiently before Henderson lit the detonator, charging to the edge of the box and then ceding possession to Alli. The Tottenham Hotspur man's initial attempt was repelled by Hogg, but he followed in to prod home his second international goal. Hogg saved from Sturridge, twice, and tipped a Rooney free-kick over the bar early in the second half before sliding out to block from Theo Walcott, who had been slipped in by Lingard.

Walcott and Sturridge gave way to Marcus Rashford and Jamie Vardy, the Manchester United youngster and Leicester City striker both getting rousing receptions from the home fans.

Shy of a Lingard shot that flew wide, England struggled to create chances as the game wore on. Malta's Andrei Agius almost made things inter-

esting with a late volley that England goalkeeper Joe Hart had to turn behind. Alli should have made the game safe when he was picked out by Rashford, but from barely six yards out he sent the ball over the bar. "England are stronger than us, but we stayed in a good shape all the game," said beaten manager Pietro Ghedin.

"We saved a lot of chances. We suffered a lot, but we played a good game." — AFP

ECONOMICS PRIZE REMAINS CONTROVERSIAL

PRIZE A FAR CRY FROM NOBEL'S PHILANTHROPIC IDEALS

STOCKHOLM: The Nobel prize in economics, to be announced tomorrow, has increasingly honored research in the field of finance-a subject which, observers note, is far from founder Alfred Nobel's philanthropic ideals. The economics prize has always been set apart from the other Nobel awards, and the subject of much controversy: unlike the other awards, which were created in Nobel's 1895 will, the "Prize in Economic Sciences in Memory of Alfred Nobel" was devised by the Swedish central bank in 1968 to mark its tricentenary.

"Alfred Nobel himself, a prolific inventor and businessman of genius, would not have created a prize for economics," according to economists Avner Offer and Gabriel Soderberg in their book "The Nobel Factor", which came out in September. "He wrote in a letter that he 'hated business with all (his) heart', and he considered himself a social democrat." Nobel seemed wary of finance. He kept his distance from lenders, who had given his father Immanuel a hard time, and feared the hazards of the financial markets.

In his last will and testament, he asked executors to invest his fortune in "safe securities". But the Nobel prize jury has of late shown its growing appreciation for the field: while none of the laureates in the first two decades of the prize's existence conducted research in finance, eight have since been honoured: three in 1990, two in 1997 and three in 2013.

That is more laureates than in the field of microeconomics (five laureates since 1969), or labor economics (three), and the same number as the field of econometrics. Only macroeconomics has fared better, with nine laureates to date. This year, the Nobel judges could tap Douglas Diamond and Philip Dybvig for their work on financial panic models, or Robert Townsend for his work on risk and insurance in developing economies.

Financial economics a 'failure'

Most of the mathematicians who have won a Nobel prize can be found among financial economists-yet their equations and models would probably not have impressed Alfred Nobel. "He was a man of science, a passionate reader with literary ambitions, and with a sincere interest in the field of peace. I don't think he was particularly interested in either mathematics or financial issues," insists Bengt Fredrikson, who has written a

While the prizewinning financial research may appear to be as rigorous, some argue that it has not acquired the same status as the science disciplines that Nobel himself chose to honour-medicine, physics and chemistry. "It appears more 'scientific', at least from a physical sciences standpoint, than it really is," suggests Skip McGoun, a finance professor at Bucknell University in Lewisburg in the United States.

In a 2003 article, he was even more damning. "By the traditionally rigorous standards of the natural sciences, financial economics has been a failure. It simply cannot predict anything with equivalent accuracy or reliability," he said. A case in point: two economists who won the prize in 1997, Myron Scholes and Robert Merton, also made a name for themselves for helping devise an investment strategy for Long-Term Capital Management, a hugely successful hedge fund... until it went belly-up. But for Xavier De Scheemaekere, professor at Universite Libre in Brussels, the entire field of economics, and not just finance, could then be questioned as Nobel-worthy. "If economics has its place amongst the Nobels, finance does too," he said, noting that, contrary to the natural sciences, in those fields "there is no verifiability."

Despite his criticism, McGoun is quick to acknowledge the academic and intellectual achievement of financial researchers crowned with a Nobel. "The finance winners of the Nobel award in economics do deserve recognition for their creative intellectual accomplishments, regardless of whether they're eventually refuted," he said. — AFP

FOR SHORTBREAD MAKER, STERLING CRUNCH PUSHES UP BREXIT COSTS

voted to leave the European Union has pushed up costs so much for Scottish shortbread maker Bill Dean that he may have to lift prices to balance the books. Already Dean, who employs 150 people at his factory in the rural northeastern county of Aberdeenshire, has a 3 million pound (\$3.7 million) investment plan on hold and says he may eventually have to shrink his business - and his workforce - if costs keep rising.

Dean's family business, born in his mother's kitchen in the 1970s, imports the chief ingredients of the rich traditional Scottish biscuit: butter, flour and sugar. However, only eight percent of his sales are abroad, so for him the weak pound brings few benefits and a lot of headaches.

Sterling's 17 percent dive against both the dollar and euro since Britons opted for "Brexit" on June 23 - signalling a break with more than 40 years of stable trade within Europe - has come on top of another problem that is eroding profitability for

HUNTLY, Scotland: Sterling's plunge since Britain butter - and shortbread needs a lot of it - have jumped 75 percent since the referendum, inflated not only by the weak pound but also by volatile prices of its raw material, milk, on European com-

modity markets. "After a while with higher costs and hemorrhaging cash to keep up, your margin gets eaten away and your (profit) has taken a pasting," Dean, who turns 52 on Monday, told Reuters. "No business is capable of absorbing those kind of price increases for any length of time," Dean said at his factory. "We'd be looking at a reduced business model with fewer people if this cost trend continues in the coming years."

Brexit may well push up prices for British shoppers, and it has already cast doubt on job prospects. At the other end of the corporate scale from Dean, Japanese giant Nissan has said it may scrap potential investment in Britain's biggest car plant unless the government compensates it for any new tax barriers erected post-Brexit by the EU.

However, some British-based businesses will

benefit from the weaker pound, which makes their exports more competitive - as long as they still have tariff-free access to the single European market. The FTSE 100 stock index, which comprises the biggest London-listed corporations, has soared 20 percent since referendum day to near record levels. Overall, these groups earn the bulk of their money abroad, so the currency slide raises the profits that they report in sterling.

Moving situation

Dean, whose business began when his mother's shortbread recipe became a favorite with his father's bagpipe band, has no such buffer due to his low level of exports.

Scots voted to stay in the EU but were outweighed by a strong "leave" result in England and Wales, so Dean has to deal with the uncertainties of Brexit. That has meant freezing the three million pound expansion plan to make a bigger variety of cakes and biscuits, including gluten-free products for customers who are intolerant to ingredients such as wheat. "It's a big investment for us but it's come slap bang in the middle of a moving situation which we have no control over, so it's not a comfortable place to be," the former metalworker said.

Even for a business that has doubled annual turnover to 8.5 million pounds in the past 10 years, the combination of higher costs and continued uncertainty is damaging. "We've not got such a big cushion to ride it out with both of those barrels coming at us," he said, adding that transport costs have also risen three to four percent.

Doubts for EU workers

A short distance away in the town of Aberlour, a larger family-owned producer of shortbread, cakes and traditional savoury oatcakes exports about 40 percent of sales, which reached 137 million pounds in 2013, helping it to withstand the hit from weaker sterling. But, like his smaller rival, proprietor Jim Walker has an additional worry: keeping his large number of foreign employees. With sterling at a five-year low against the euro, some EU workers might find work paid in sterling less attractive and this combines with doubts over whether they can stay in Britain after Brexit. — Reuters

POLITICAL FACTORS ON THE RISE AHEAD

NBK ECONOMIC UPDATE

KUWAIT: As we approach year-end, 2016 eerily resembles 2015: unimpressive but "acceptable" world growth, central banks hell-bent on aggressive non-conventional policies, except for the Federal Reserve, which is likely to repeat its 2015 feat of a measly 25 bps hike in December of that year. However, to poach the old aphorism "history does not repeat itself, but it often rhymes," well, so does the economy. Away from the rhyming part, the rest of the background is slowly changing; in new and uncharted ways and in politics and in economics, now and ahead.

On politics, the Brexit vote in June was not the immediate catastrophe that many had feared. The difficult part starts next year, when the UK begins exit negotiations in earnest. Only then, will more clarity come about, and markets will get a better feel of how contentious the issue may get. Similar issues may be brewing elsewhere in Europe. Italy will hold an important constitutional referendum in November that may well determine the future of the current government, as well as the ability of the country

France will hold a presidential election in 2017. These events and others are taking place with populism and anti-establishment sentiment on the rise, both in Europe and in the US. The latter will hold its presidential election on November 8 of this year, with the unconventional outsider Donald Trump in close contention. These events and others are bound to inject more questions than answers for the markets in the months ahead.

Shifting grounds

These shifting political grounds are occurring while policy and policy-makers appear near exhausted. Policy makers and investors alike are beginning to realize that current policies, especially the monetary kind, have perhaps reached their limit, and that the options will be scant should any major economy hit a big pothole. After zero, even negative interest rates in some cases, and the recent massive QE programs, where are we? The Fed is still trying to find a window to "normalize" its policy rates (and missing opportunities). The ECB is promising further accommodation, but is taking its time in the hope that "things" improve and perhaps in the face of its own doubts.

The BOJ remains committed to pushing Japanese retail inflation from "negative" to 2.0%, via new innovative moves: pumping up the monetary base, and targeting the 10-year interest rate at 0.0%, atop the previous aggressive QE measures already in place. Here again, doubts are being raised as to the efficacy of monetary policy (the Yen rose throughout this year). Furthermore, zero-to-negative rates seem on the verge of becoming a potent political issue, hurting savers and retirees, especially in the current volatile political times. Finally, should the need arise for other policy options, needless to say fiscal options are very limited with current debt levels at record highs. Economic restructuring and reforms are made very difficult by the contentious/dysfunctional politics of the day.

Thus, politics is bound to be as important as economics in the period ahead, and caution is warranted. And while most "baseline" forecasts argue for a steady, albeit modest, growth environment in the next year or two, any significant deviation on the lower side could have more market impact than usual because it would further charge the politics, and there are no guarantees that financial markets would be as welcoming of further central bank accommodation as in the past.

Falling rates

In this type of environment, so far this year, interest rates have fallen dramatically in the EU and in Japan, to negative levels. The dollar has been in a range versus the Euro, and the Japanese Yen has risen to the BOJ's chagrin. Stocks have moved up in most advanced markets, led by the US where equities made new alltime highs recently before retreating some. For their part, UK stocks are up post-Brexit, though the pound lost major ground.

Consensus projections for world growth in 2017 are close to the IMF's 3.4% (3.1% in 2016), with the US at 1.8%, the Eurozone at 1.6%, Japan at 0.5%, and emerging markets at 4.6%. The central banks are expected to do "whatever is necessary" to keep things going, In that environment the price of oil is expected to recover very gradually toward \$60 pb in late 2017, as supply continues to outpace demand, and with OPEC wielding much less control than in the past.

Besides the Italian referendum and the US presidential election this November, the Fed will dominate the agenda in Q4, at its December meeting. Ever so cautious, the Fed has kept postponing the "expected" Fed hike(s) for the year, now down to one hike. Between international developments (Brexit) and some soft data out of the US (PMIs, sales), the Fed decided at its September meeting to leave policy rates unchanged, though three FOMC members did dissent, pushing for a rate hike. "Three dissenters" is on the high side for the Fed and indicates that Fed Chair Yellen is having a harder time postponing raising rates.

The November Fed meeting is assumed to be a "dead" meeting (no change) because it takes place one week before the US election. So, barring a change in US data, or financial market turmoil before yearend, the Fed should be raising rates 25 bps on December 14 (the federal funds rate target). The September Fed's dot-plots are finally in line with the current market expectation for 2016 of one interest rate hike. However, as usual, the Fed anticipates more action than the market does for 2017. The markets are looking for 2 hikes next year, and these have certainly been more "right" than the Fed the past few

US elections

As to the US elections, any change will be more gradual and less dramatic than feared, especially if no party sweeps the elections, ie Congress and the presidency. A Clinton win with a Republican Congress would be the least change prone, and therefore the most "stable" for the markets. A Trump presidency would create more nervousness initially, but there again even a Republican Congress would still act as a check. Under Trump, fiscal stimulus would be more expansive than with Clinton (tax cuts, infrastructure spending), and deregulation would be more pro-business. So in such a very simulative scenario, the Fed may raise rates faster in 2017 (versus a Clinton Administration). Also, a Trump's anti-status-quo politics could have more of a spillover effect into European politics. At any rate, many of these developments will have to be gauged as they unfold, including any significant changes to international trade policy.

In the GCC, we continue to expect moderate GDP growth in 2016 especially if oil prices continue to improve from current levels. Governments remain committed to infrastructure spending. Adjustments to budgets are still ongoing, but continue to be gradual, as policy makers are keen on supporting GDP growth. Non-oil GDP growth should post 3.5% for the region the period ahead, somewhat lower than our previous projection. All GCC countries have started issuing sovereign debt in order to finance their deficits. Debt issuance is still pressuring liquidity but governments and central banks are addressing the issue adequately when needed, thanks to their ample reserves.

EGYPT HAS CONTRACTED TO IMPORT 420K TONS OF SUGAR, SEEKS MORE

CAIRO: Egypt has contracted for the import of 420,000 tons of sugar in coordination with the military in the "past few days" and will seek to import another 200,000 tons in the coming week, the government said yesterday, "The Supply Ministry, in coordination with the National Service Products Organization, has contracted to import 420,000 tons of sugar in the past few days in addition to contracting this week to import an additional 200,000 tons of sugar," the government said in a statement.

The National Service Products Organization is part of the Defense Ministry. It manufactures military and civilian products and provides contracting services. State grain buyer GASC is seeking 100,000 tons of raw sugar and traders said on yesterday it received two offers, both for 50,000 tons. Egypt said last week that it plans to build a six-month reserve of essential food items, adding to other recent purchases of commodities such as oil and wheat.

Traders said the move was aimed at building up stocks ahead of a currency devaluation. GASC announced three separate tenders in the space of one day on Tuesday for wheat, vegetable oils and sugar. The Supply Ministry will also hold an international tender for rice with a minimum of 500,000 tons, the government said yesterday. GASC has not announced any international tenders for rice yet. — Reuters

NETFLIX CEO SLAMS CINEMAS FOR 'STRANGLING' BUSINESS

fired back at cinema chains Friday, with the Netflix chief accusing theater owners of "strangling the movie business" by refusing to budge on windows to allow streaming of films soon after release or even the same day. Hastings, speaking at the New Yorker's TechFest 2016 event, claimed that movie studios want to "break the oligopoly" of the major theater chains but that they

The deal raised alarm bells for the National Association of Theatre Owners, the trade group representing US theater chains, which cautioned that moving to day-and-date simultaneous film releases would disrupt the ecosystem.

"Simultaneous release, in practice, has reduced both theatrical and home revenues when it has been tried," NATO CEO John Fithian said in a statement. "Just as Netflix and its customers put a value on exclusivity, theater owners and their customers do too."

The fight over theatrical-release

issue. It goes back to cable VOD experiments with premium-priced early-release dates-well before Netflix's move into original filmswhich exhibitors pushed back on, wanting to preserve the roughly 90-day window of exclusivity for new releases.

Netflix's push into the film biz, starting with its announcement of the acquisition of the sequel to "Crouching Tiger, Hidden Dragon" in 2014, has been met with a boycott by major movie chains like AMC Entertainment and Regal Entertainment.

Also at the event Friday, Hastings said that the chances of Netflix's entry into China, the largest market in the world, "doesn't look good," per Bloomberg. "We're focused on the rest of the world," Hastings said.

He noted that both Disney and Apple, who have a strong track record in the country, both had their movie services shuttered by Chinese authorities. —Reuters



CHICAGO TEACHERS, OFFICIALS LOOK TO CIRCUMVENT STRIKE

CHICAGO: Contract negotiations between Chicago teachers and officials in the nation's third-largest school district will happen throughout the weekend in hopes of reaching a deal to avert a strike. The Chicago Teachers Union has said its members are prepared to stop instruction for about 400,000 students as early as Tuesday morning for its second major strike since 2012, when teachers were out for seven school days. At issue during the negotiations, which have stretched into a second year, are pension contributions, pay raises, staffing levels and classroom funding.

Union leaders say teachers "do not want to strike, but are concerned about threats to reduce their pay and benefits, as well as the overall impact of school-based cuts on their students," while Chicago Public Schools CEO Forrest Claypool has said teachers deserve a raise but that the district is facing massive financial challenges. Here's a look at the situation:

The issues

The cash-strapped school district wants to phase out the decades-old practice of paying most of teachers' pension contributions, replacing it with a total base wage increase in a four-year contract. The union wants the district to keep up the pension payments and seeks raises at the end of a three-year contract.

The district, which has offered other "quality of life" changes such as less paperwork, also wants teachers to pay more for rising health care costs. Union President Karen Lewis said it amounts to an overall pay cut at a time when teachers are struggling to make ends meet and to do their jobs, given that schools have lost some special education resources and librarians due to budget cuts. Plus, the district ended automatic pay raises for experience and education last year. The bargaining unit of the union - representing about 28,000 members - rejected the district's last offer in February.

The backdrop

The threat of a strike is set against perilous financial problems for Chicago's public schools as well as the state of Illinois. The district announced layoffs Monday for about 250 teachers and staff due to a larger-than-anticipated drop in enrollment.

Credit rating agencies have placed the district at "junk" status, or below investment grade, while its \$5.4 billion budget relies on increased property taxes, borrowing and \$215 million in state funding.

But the state funding is contingent on a wider pension overhaul that must be approved by state lawmakers, who are deadlocked over the budget with Republican Gov. Bruce Rauner. The Republican also has pushed to curb union power, suggested the district file for bankruptcy and unsuccessfully attempted a state takeover of the district's finances.

Where do the kids go during a strike?

All schools will be open during normal hours and staffed by non-union employees to provide online learning, physical education and arts and crafts. Classes and extracurricular activities will be canceled, but free breakfast and lunch will be provided to students who need them. Safe Passage routes, which are staffed by adults to help kids get to and from school safely, will operate as usual.

The district also has partnered with libraries, the park district and "Safe Haven" locations, such as churches, that will provide child care.

Other factors

The 2012 strike was the first teacher walkout in 25 years and tied to evaluations, classroom conditions and job security. Parents and community leaders were largely supportive then, but it's unclear whether the sentiment will stick this year. Plus, the threat of a strike comes as Chicago residents have seen major increases in property taxes and other fees, and an uptick in street violence.

"It will be a difficult strike," University of Illinois at Chicago professor and former alderman Dick Simpson said. "I'm not sure that anyone wants to play it all the way out." One thing is clear: There's a different tone in negotiations. In 2012, the outspoken Lewis and Mayor Rahm Emanuel were often at odds. Emanuel had canceled a pay raise, and Lewis dubbed him "the murder mayor" because of city violence, briefly considering challenging him in the 2015 mayor's race. More recently, Lewis has been almost complimentary, saying Emanuel's job is "impossible" and their relationship now "respectful." —AP

SHUFFLED: ONCE A DESTINATION, TAJ MAHAL POKER ROOM FOLDS

AN END TO TRUMP'S LEGACY IN SEASIDE RESORT

ATLANTIC CITY: The closing of the Trump Taj Mahal casino tomorrow will cost thousands of workers their jobs and bring a final end to Donald Trump's legacy in the seaside resort, but it will also mean the closure of what was once one of the premiere destinations for poker outside Las Vegas.

The poker room in the casino on Atlantic City's boardwalk long ago lost its luster, but in its heyday drew packed crowds of gamblers from around the region and country to dozens of tables around the clock. Around lunchtime Wednesday, the 24 remaining tables were empty. A security guard and two soon-to-be unemployed employees milled about, but there were no dealers, no chips being shuffled, no cards flying through the air.

After opening in 1993 when poker was legalized in New Jersey, "the Taj" became "the center of the East Coast poker world, certainly the legal poker world," said Brian Koppelman, who used the mix of locals, tourists and pros as inspiration for scenes in his 1998 film "Rounders." "It was the place that you could go play without violating any laws and where, if you were someone who wanted to get better at poker and study the best players, you were there," Koppelman said. "If you were someone who wanted to hustle people, you could go there and find tourists to hustle."

Koppelman, creator of TV's "Billions" on Showtime along with "Rounders" writing partner David Levien, said the scene in the film where Matt Damon's character plays for more money than he should against poker legend Johnny Chan was inspired by him sitting at a table at the Taj with brash World Series of Poker champion Phil Hellmuth. Koppelman and Levien traveled there for research after deciding to make a film about the New York underground poker scene. When they shot there, "none of us slept. We were shooting and then just playing cards."

'It was just a mess'

The steady stream of players from the New York and Philadelphia region made the room popular, but it was the US Poker Championship in 1996 that turned it into a destination. Some of the game's top players laid down \$10,000 in what was the first tournament on the East Coast on the same financial level as the World Series of Poker. "When we went there, the Taj Mahal poker room was kind of a mess," said former World Series of Poker tournament director Jack McClelland, who Trump hired to launch the tournament that was broadcast on ESPN. "They ran the poker room like you run the blackjack pit. It was just a mess."

McClelland says the tournament organizers helped to change some of the problems, and he said he enjoyed working for Trump, for whom he plans to vote in November. Connecticut's Foxwoods Casino had already begun splitting up the lucrative New York market, but it was the opening of Atlantic City's Vegas-style Borgata casino in 2003 that started the end of the Taj poker room. It began drawing most of the city's big action, and the opening of poker rooms in Pennsylvania, Delaware and later Maryland took away most of the rest. The room closed for renovations in February 2015 and didn't reopen until this past May, less than two months before workers at the casino went on strike.

Kevin Thompson, 38, was walking through the room on Wednesday, looking for one last game. When that didn't happen, he reminisced with a reporter about the good times. A full room. An attached horse racing and keno lounge. A place where the locals played and staffers treated you like family. "There was always something to do. You could always enjoy yourself here," he said. "I'm going to miss it a lot. Sad, it's real sad."—AP

PROTECTIONISM A SCOURGE? MAYBE NOT IN AFRICA

WASHINGTON: World economic leaders gathered in Washington this week to defend alobalization, delivering a single message in unison: Protectionism will not save you. But this glosses over the plight of Africa, which is sinking further into poverty despite years of free trade.

According to the International Monetary Fund, which held its annual meetings this week with the World Bank, growth in Sub-Saharan Africa is in free-fall this year, with a growth rate of 1.4 percent, down from 3.4 percent in 2015, its lowest in a quarter century. The regional economy will therefore grow more slowly than the population, at the risk of deepening poverty in a region already home to more than half of the 766 million people on earth who live on less than \$1.90 a day. "I am actually concerned about Sub-Saharan African countries," said IMF Managing Director Christine Lagarde.

As the most rarified circles of economists gathered this week to ponder globalization's failures, the African region seems to offer a prime case in point. Despite opening its economies and the explosion of trade with China, Sub-Saharan Africa is the only region in the world to have actually seen the number of people living in extreme poverty rise since 1990. "The growing number of the poor in Sub-Saharan Africa stands eral prognosis primarily reflects the failure out as an exception," the World Bank said in a recent report.

With a recession in Nigeria, ravaged by the collapse of crude prices, virtual stagnation in South Africa and a booming Ivory Coast, where this year's growth rate is forecast at 8 percent, circumstances of course vary widely depending on the country. Climate, security situations and political instability can also weigh heavily on economic outlooks.

Failure But, according to NGOs, the region's gen-

of full-borne free trade, brought in by the structural adjustment plans of the 1980s and 1990s and the World Trade Organization.

"Africa did well in recent years because prices for oil and other raw materials climbed higher," Antonio Gambini, of the National Center for Development Cooperation, told AFP. "But prices have collapsed and with the free trade imposed on them these countries spiraled downwards because they were unable to diversify," he

Contrary to the traditional prescriptions, a dose of protectionism could help African countries shore up their economies, sheltered from foreign competition. "If we want to see a more inclusive global growth than it has to have a space for protection," said Max Lawson of Oxfam GB. "It's just not as simple as more free trade mans less poverty," he added.

Some Asian countries, such as Vietnam, South Korea and Taiwan, built their own economic expansions on strong exports and severe restrictions on imports to protect their domestic markets. On the African continent, Ethiopia, which is forecast to see strong growth in 2016 of 6.5 percent, has jealously guarded its own telecoms and financial sectors. Makhtar Diop, World Bank vice president for Africa, still has no faith in inward-looking trade policies.

"In times of crisis, there's a protectionist reflex because we think it's the answer but all the evidence shows that international trade has been a factor in development," he told AFP. According to Diop, a former Senegalese finance minister, the region's persistent poverty is tied to poor revenue redistribution policies, particularly when oil was above \$100 a barrel.

Once in place, protectionist barriers are hard to remove because they are supported by interest groups seeking to preserve their advantages, he said. "We have to find a middle ground," he said, particularly by allowing nascent industries the time to size up foreign competition. But the priority, he said, is to strengthen trade, particularly among African countries. "Sometimes it's cheaper to export a product out of Africa than to a neighboring country," he said. —AFP

BRAZIL'S TOP PROSECUTOR **URGES CONGRESS TO** SHELVE SPEND CAP

BRASILIA: Brazil's Prosecutor-General's Office on Friday questioned the constitutionality of President Michel Temer's proposed public spending cap and recommended that Congress shelve the austerity measures. The office said in a statement the proposal interferes with the autonomy of other federal powers and would weaken the country's judicial system, handicapping efforts to combat corruption. "The proposal invades the judicial system budgeting competence drastically, risking impacting the exercise of its constitutional and institutional functions," said the statement.

The unprecedented constitutional amendment, which limits the growth of federal spending to the rate of inflation for 20 years, is aimed at gradually closing a yawning budget gap that topped 10 percent of gross domestic product (GDP) last year. It is the first of a series of austerity measures to assuage market concerns that the once-booming economy, which was stripped of its investmentgrade rating last year, could be hurtling toward a debt crisis. A lower house committee approved the proposal on Thursday, handing President Michel Temer an initial victory on the battle to pass the amendment. Its approval requires two votes in the plenary of the lower house and two more in the Senate, needing a three-fifths majority in each. A first vote in the full lower house chamber should take place early next week. —Reuters



NEW YORK: Stocks ended slightly lower on Wall Street on Friday, giving the market its first weekly decline in a month. The market edged up in early trading after a much anticipated report on hiring last month showed

decent gains. It quickly turned lower and remained down for the rest of the day. Suppliers of basic materials and industrial companies lost the most.

The government reported that employers hired last month at a slower pace than forecast, but not slow enough to signal the economy is in trouble and cause the Federal Reserve to hold off on raising interest rates later this year. Bonds were little changed on the news. The yield on 10-year Treasury notes slipped to 1.72 percent from 1.74 percent.

Real estate and phone companies continued to decline. Once favored by investors for their relative stability and steady dividends, they have become less attractive at the prospect of higher interest rates. Real estate companies lost 5 percent during the week, and phone companies slumped 3.8 percent.

"Everything that everyone had been buying for safety has gone down this week, and it's gone down big," said John Fox, chief investment officer of Fenimore Asset Management. "You have an unwinding of the low-rate trade." The Dow Jones industrial average fell 28.01 points, or 0.2 percent, to 18,240.49. The Standard & Poor's 500 index lost 7.03 points, or 0.3 percent, to 2,153.74. The Nasdaq composite declined 14.45 points, or 0.3 percent, to 5,292.40.

Dragged down

Industrial companies were dragged down in part by Honeywell International, which lowered its earnings forecast. The company put out a press release citing lower shipments to aviation equipment makers and delays in its military and space businesses, among other things. Honeywell closed down \$8.67, or 7.5 percent, to \$106.94.

The jobs report showed that US employers added 156,000 jobs last month, a decent gain but slightly below market expectations. Jobs growth has averaged 178,000 a month so far this year, down from last year's pace of 229,000. Most investors expect the Fed to raise rates in December. It has held them near zero since 2008, a factor that many market watchers cite as a key driver of the seven-year bull run in stocks. Low interest rates make stocks appear relatively appealing compared to lowyielding bonds or CDs. They also make it easier for companies to borrow money to buy back their own stock.

"The world's largest economy looks to be sailing full steam ahead to a rate hike before the end of the year," said said Paul

Sirani, chief market analyst at Xtrade.

BUSINESS LEADERS URGE AGAINST 'HARD' BREXIT **LONDON:** British business leaders yesterday urged the government to rule out a hard break with the European Union, saying the uncertainty over the terms of Brexit was impacting investment decisions. "What we would like is the ruling out of the really worst options," Carolyn Fairbairn, the director general of CBI, Britain's biggest business lobby group, told BBC radio. She outlined her case in an open letter to

the government which was also signed by the heads of the EEF manufacturers' association, the International Chamber of Commerce UK and the techUK technology industry body. They warned against a situation where Britain leaves the EU single market without having a new trade deal in place, meaning it would revert to trading under World Trade Organization rules.

"Falling into WTO rules in only 29 months from now, which is the prospective timetable, would mean up to 90 percent of goods could potentially have tariffs on them," Fairbairn said. She said ruling out "some of these really negative options would "help to reassure investors that the UK was still a really good place to invest". The letter calls for continued barrier-free access to the EU's single market, particularly for financial services, and for a transitional deal to give businesses certainty until a new

deal with the EU is agreed. It comes after a tumultuous week of increasing market nervousness over Brexit, culminating in a "flash crash" of the pound to strike a 31-year low against the dollar. Britain's finance minister Philip Hammond downplayed the flash crash, blaming "technical factors" in the market. Prime Minister Theresa May, who took over following the June 23 vote to leave the EU, has said she intends to start the two-year process of withdrawal by March next year.

While giving few details of her strategy, she has indicated that she will prioritize cutting immigration-a key issue in the referendum campaign-over access to the single market. "The government must set out a clear roadmap for consulting with firms of all sectors and sizes to increase confidence that these complex decisions are taken on the basis of fact and a genuine understanding of the economic implications," the business leaders' letter concluded. — AFP

DESPITE RECALL, SAMSUNG TIPS HIGHER-THAN-EXPECTED PROFIT

SEOUL: Samsung Electronics Co. estimated its profit rose more than expected in the July-September quarter likely helped by its component businesses that helped offset the cost from an unprecedented recall of its flagship smartphones. The South Korean company said in an earnings preview Friday that its third-quarter operating income rose 6 percent to 7.8 trillion won (\$7 billion), compared with 7.4 trillion won a year earlier.

That was slightly higher than fore-casts. According to financial data provider FactSet, analysts expected a figure of 7.5 trillion won. Samsung said sales fell 5 percent from a year earlier to 49 trillion won (\$43.9 trillion) during the three-month period. The company will disclose its full results including earnings and divisional breakdowns later this month

The results give clues about the short-term financial impact of its first global recall of smartphones. Last month Samsung recalled 2.5 million units of the Galaxy Note 7 just two weeks after its debut as consumers reported that batteries were overheating and catching fire. That was followed by global airlines banning the phone during flights and official recalls by the governments in the US and Canada.

Analysts estimate the cost of the recall could be as much as \$1.8 billion as Samsung shipped the phones back and replaced them with a new Note 7 phone with safe lithium-ion batteries. But they also said the damage would be outweighed by Samsung's other businesses, especially its sales of advanced computer chips and high-end smartphone displays.

Dominant supplier

"We'll see an earnings surprise in the display and memory chip businesses," said Kim Young Woo, an analyst at SK Securities. "The numbers will show that they are the two growth engines for Samsung." According to Kim's estimates, nearly half of the income was generated by Samsung's component business during the last quarter, including the chips and the displays. He said the profit from Samsung's mobile business plunged to its lowest level in three quarters.

Samsung is the world's largest maker of the computer memory chips and the world's dominant supplier of advanced mobile-phone screens known as OLED. Samsung uses the lucrative OLED screens for its top-end phones, including the Galaxy S7 and Galaxy S7 Edge phones, whose sales were not affected by the Note 7 recall. The analysts also believe that the third quarter would be the bottom for Samsung's earnings. OLED screens for mobile devices and Samsung's advanced chips for computers will likely fuel a huge profit growth for the company in coming quarters, they said. That means that Samsung will have a buffer for its bottom line even as its smartphone battery crisis continues to damage its brand reputation.

The latest blow to Samsung's brand happened earlier this week when a U.S. domestic plane with 75 passengers had to be evacuated because of a Samsung phone emitting smoke before the plane's takeoff. Southwest Airlines Co. and the Federal Aviation Agency are investigating the Wednesday incident but declined to confirm whether the Samsung phone was the replaced Note 7 smartphone that Samsung had said was safe to use. —AP

VIETNAM COURT REJECTS FISHERMEN LAWSUITS AGAINST TAIWAN'S FORMOSA

HANOI: A Vietnamese court has rejected hundreds of lawsuits filed by fishermen who demanded more compensation from a Taiwanese-owned steel plant responsible for a devastating toxic leak, a leading activist said yesterday. In a rare case of civic action in authoritarian Vietnam, crowds of fishermen swamped a court house last month to file 506 lawsuits against Taiwan's Formosa, which is building a multi-billion-dollar steel plant in Ha Tinh province.

The conglomerate paid Vietnam's government \$500 million after it was blamed for dumping waste that poisoned tons of fish and decimated the local seafood industry earlier this year. Local fishermen launched their lawsuits in an effort to wrest more money from Formosa and demand it shut down the steel operation altogether. But Catholic priest Dang Huu Nam, who helped lead the plaintiffs, told AFP the court had returned more than 100 case files and that he was expecting more. "We will look into why the files are returned as the court did not say concretely, before deciding what moves to do next," Nam The court's judge, Nguyen Van Thang, was quoted in state-run media saying that all 506 cases were returned. The fishermen had asked for compensation of roughly \$2.5 million but did not provide clear evidence of their losses, he said according to Phap Luat, an official legal news site. Dead fish and other marine life began washing up on Vietnam's central coast in April, hitting fishermen and triggering rounds of


After weeks of obfuscation the government laid blame on Taiwan's Formasa, which has a history of environmental scandals spanning the globe, and ordered the conglomerate to pay a \$500 million fine. The government said it would start distributing the cash to affected fishermen in October and confirmed last month that payouts would range from \$130 to \$1,600 per person. Last Sunday, thousands of Vietnamese protesters surrounded the steel plant, with some scaling its walls and holding signs demanding its closure. 1 IN 5 JAPAN EMPLOYEES FACE DEATH FROM OVERWORKING

TOKYO: A fifth of the Japanese workforce faces the risk of death from overwork, according to a new government survey into the country's notoriously strenuous working culture. Hundreds of deaths related to overwork-from strokes, heart attacks and suicide-are reported every year in Japan, along with a host of serious health problems, sparking lawsuits and calls to tackle the problem.

The survey was part of the nation's first white paper on "karoshi", or death from overwork, endorsed by Prime Minister Shinzo Abe's cabinet on Friday. While the popular image of Japanese salary men toiling long hours for the company before taking the last train home is changing, many still spend far more hours in the office than counter-

parts in other modern economies. According to the paper, 22.7 percent of companies polled between December 2015 and January 2016 said some of their employees logged more than 80 hours of overtime each month-the official threshold at which the prospect of death from work becomes serious. The report added that approximately 21.3 percent of Japanese employees work 49 or more hours each week on average, well above the 16.4 percent reported in the US, 12.5 percent in Britain and 10.4 in France. The survey concluded that Japanese employees also reported feeling high levels of stress related to their work, pushing officials to call on companies to improve working conditions. —AFP

CHINA TO IMPROVE ACCESS FOR FOREIGN COMPANIES

'A NEW ROUND OF HIGH-LEVEL OPENING UP'

BEIJING: China's State Council, or cabinet, said yesterday the country is committed to improve access for foreign companies in China, as part of "a new round of high-level opening up". According to a statement released yesterday following a State Council meeting chaired by Premier Li Keqiang, the Chinese government will create an environment for fair competition for foreign firms. "It's important part of pushing forward a new round of high-level opening up," the statement said.

In the future, except for certain sensitive industries in which access for foreign companies is restricted, foreign investments would only require registration, rather than approval. The statement did not offer details on how the new system would work. It also said the Chinese government would take further steps to improve market entry for foreign companies.

The State Council's statement comes at a time when the foreign business community in China has become highly critical of the current unbalanced access for foreign companies in China. Last month, a top European business lobby warned China that it risked a protectionist backlash unless it opened its markets faster to foreign investment. Progress on China's economic reforms has been "highly disappointing", the European Union Chamber of Commerce in China said in an annual paper, released as China prepared to host leaders from the world's biggest economies at last month's G20 summit in Hangzhou.

Forex reserves fall

China's mountain of foreign exchange reserves dropped around \$19 billion in September to a five-year low, government data

showed, with the central bank spending heavily to defend its currency against capital outflows. The world's largest currency hoard fell to under \$3.17 trillion, the People's Bank of China (PBOC) said on its website Friday, below median analyst forecasts of \$3.18 trillion in a Bloomberg News survey.

It was the third straight month of declines and brought China's reserves to their lowest level since April 2011, Bloomberg said. Analysts said the decline indicated China was selling foreign exchange to buy its yuan currency amid capital flight spurred by slowing growth in the world's second largest economy. The data came days after the yuan's official entry into the International Monetary Fund's elite SDR basket of currencies, a symbolic coup for Beijing policymakers who are seeking to expand international use of the currency.

In the months preceding the currency's formal inclusion, China's central bank spent "heavily" to keep the yuan's value stable, roughly \$27 billion last month, said Julian Evans-Pritchard of Capital Economics. But "with the inclusion of the renminbi in the SDR basket now complete, the PBOC may no longer feel the need to intervene as heavily to counter capital outflows", he said, adding that US Federal Reserve rate hikes could increase depreciation pressure on the yuan in coming months.

Colombia deal

In other news, China wants to start talks on a feasibility study for a free trade agreement with Colombia as soon as possible, China's foreign minister said during a visit to the South American country, where he also offered sup-

port for its peace process. China is not a big diplomatic player in the region despite being a major commodities buyer there, but already has free trade pacts with Peru, Chile and Costa Rica.

President Xi Jinping will attend a summit of the Asia Pacific Economic Cooperation (APEC) bloc in Peru next month and is also expected to visit several other Latin American nations. Chinese Foreign Minister Wang Yi said during a visit to Colombia that China would maintain close communications with Bogota to start substantive talks on a free trade agreement feasibility study as early as possible, China's Foreign Ministry said yesterday. The statement provided no details.

Colombian President Juan Manuel Santos won the 2016 Nobel Peace Prize on Friday for his efforts to end a 52-year-old war with Marxist guerrillas, a surprise choice and a show of support days after voters rejected a peace deal he signed with the rebels. Wang said that, as a permanent member of the United Nations Security Council and a good friend of Colombia's, China would continue to support the peace process.

"China upholds that all hot button issues in the end should be resolved via peaceful negotiations. Force cannot resolve problems, only bring more harm and even hate," the ministry paraphrased Wang as saying. Wang also congratulated Santos on winning the Nobel prize, the statement added. China has a difficult relationship with the Nobel Peace Prize and reacted with fury when it was awarded to prominent Chinese dissident Liu Xiaobo in 2010. Exiled Tibetan spiritual leader the Dalai Lama, a man accused by Beijing of being a dangerous separatist, is a fellow peace prize laureate. —Agencies

CATHAY FLIES BOEING 747 OVER HK ONE LAST TIME

HONG KONG: Hong Kong flag carrier Cathay Pacific bid farewell to its Boeing 747 fleet yesterday with a final low-altitude flyby over the city's iconic skyline. The final route harked back to dramatic images of the planes flying low over rooftops of apartment blocks as they used to approach the old airport on the harbor.

Yesterday's flight, codenamed CX8747, flew over the city's famous Victoria Harbor and the former Kai Tak Airport, which closed in 1998 and was considered one of the most challenging places to land an aircraft due to its crowded urban site surrounded by steep

mountains. Around 300 airline staff made a donation of HK\$747 (\$96) to ride on the venerable aircraft, which was first used by Cathay Pacific in 1979, for the last time, the airline said.

Photos of the last flyby, at an altitude of 610 meters were posted on the airline's Facebook page, which showed some 747 fans waving goodbye. "Goodbye and thank you, our dearest Boeing 747," Adonis Lau said on the airline's Facebook. "Cathay 747s brought me and my family between HK and our stays in US and Canada during my childhood. I'll miss my time on the upper deck," Denise Ho said. —AFP

PERU: DEFORESTATION SLOWING AS IT BEEFS UP LAWS, SANCTIONS

LIMA: Deforestation in Peru has slowed since peaking at nearly 180,000 hectares (700 square miles) in 2014 when swaths of the Amazon were illegally cleared for oil palm plantations, the head of the country's forest service said on Friday. Fabiola Munoz said tougher new laws and enforcement, including fines 700 percent higher and jailtime for people who destroy primary forest, are helping Peru rein in deforestation. "People really used to think there would be no consequences," Munoz told foreign media. "That's changed."

In 2015, Peru lost about 160,000 hectares of forest cover, and less should be cleared this year, Munoz said. So far in 2016, about 120,000 hectares have been destroyed, according to satellite imagery. "We expect the trend to continue to be downward. But that means we have to be more active, we can't let our guard down," Munoz said. Peru controls about a tenth of the Amazon, a tropical forest home to unrivaled biodiversity and vast stores of carbon dioxide that fuel global warming when destroyed.

Environmentalists have criticized Peru for not doing enough to keep wood and gold from being torn illegally from its forests for export, and for allowing local authorities to dole out agricultural concessions that include swaths of virgin rainforest. Munoz said the government has ordered oil palm plantations in Peru owned by United Cacao Limited SEZC to halt activities after finding they had illegally cleared primary forest in previous years. But efforts to evict workers from the land have been met with threats, Munoz said.

United Cacao, headquartered in the Cayman Islands, did not immediately respond to requests for comment. The company has previously denied any wrongdoing. The dispute is now in Peruvians courts. "We're still fighting that battle," Munoz said. "We hope the courts understand the importance of these emblematic cases ... of sending the right message." A large Indonesian palm oil company interested in operating in Peru recently requested a meeting with Munoz and other public officials to discuss possible investments, Munoz said.

The officials told the company that the kind of large-scale oil palm plantations that have contributed to rapid deforestation in Indonesia are not viable in Peru. "We do want investments, but we don't want investments at any price," Munoz said. Munoz added that it was unclear how much a recent spate of forest fires might hurt efforts to slow deforestation as the Amazon suffers its driest year in nearly two decades. —Reuters

Verizon cuts jobs in stores as wireless growth slows

NEW YORK: Verizon has cut jobs in stores across the country as it deals with increasing competition in the wireless industry.

Verizon spokeswoman Kim Ancin said Friday that stores will have fewer employees, but she refused to specify the size of Thursday's layoff. A union representative, Tim Dubnau, estimates that Verizon has cut hundreds or even thousands of jobs across the nation given that nine of 55 employees were laid off in six Brooklyn stores in New York. Dubnau is an organizing coordinator for the Communications Workers of America union, which represents

workers in seven Verizon stores in New York and Massachusetts. Most Verizon stores are not unionized.

Ancin said estimates of thousands of cuts are "an exaggeration." People who lost their jobs can apply for new positions at Verizon. Verizon has 162,000 US employees. Ancin could not immediately

say how many of those were retail store workers.

The layoffs result from Verizon combining the roles of two store positions inventory stockers and customer-service specialists who answer questions about gadgets and bills.

Revenue growth across the wireless

industry has slowed. Most adults already have smartphones, and carriers offer discounts. In the first half of the year, Verizon's wireless revenue fell nearly 3 percent to \$44 billion; additions of the type of wireless subscribers who are more lucrative to the company fell 26 percent. — AP

POLICE TRACKING SOCIAL MEDIA DURING PROTESTS STIRS CONCERNS

DENVER: Increasingly common tools that allow police to conduct real-time social media surveillance during protests are drawing criticism from civil liberties advocates, who oppose the way some departments have quietly unrolled the technology without community input and little public explanation.

Police say services such as Geofeedia, which map, collect and store information from social media posts, are a powerful way to help find crime witnesses, spot brewing problems during large gatherings and gauge community sentiment.

Groups like the American Civil Liberties Union say the software can be easily used to collect information on peaceful protesters or target certain groups. The programs let police gather and record all online posts within specific geographic boundaries, and some allow users to do keyword searches for certain words or hashtags.

Law enforcement agencies have used the services to mine posts on Facebook, Twitter, Instagram, YouTube and other sites during parades, protests and other large events. One company marketing the technology, Media Sonar, suggested police track hashtags such as #BlackLivesMatter and #ImUnarmed, and Geofeedia offered webinars on the way a Maryland police department used its software during protests over the death of Freddie Gray, a response to an ACLU records request showed

The group's Colorado chapter requested more information Thursday on how Denver police uses Geofeedia, saying the department could be gathering intelligence on law-abiding demonstrators.

2003 agreement

The department agreed in 2003 to stop collecting information on protesters not suspected of crimes after the ACLU found it kept thousands of "spy files" on peaceful groups, including a Franciscan nun and Amnesty International. The group sued to keep Denver police from gathering such information without a clear law enforcement purpose. "Now they've bought software that lets them do some of the things they were doing so much easier and at a computer screen," said Mark Silverstein, the chapter's legal director.

Denver police provided documents showing it spent \$30,000 for a one-year subscription to Geofeedia. In requesting

funding, Lt. William Mitchell said it would be used to monitor large events, including Denver's annual marijuana rally and Martin Luther King Day march and parade.

POTENTIAL THREATS

"You are able to see real-time potential threats being made to an event," Mitchell wrote in the request, adding that the program assisted in the Boston Marathon bombing investigation and helped police find a woman who made social media threats during Super Bowl festivities. "It has the ability to identify criminal suspects and their actions as they post them to social media."

It is unclear how many departments nationwide are using such software programs. Police in Baltimore, Seattle and Dallas have used them. Los Angeles police officials wrote in a 2014 grant application for the software that more than 500 police agencies were already using it.

The ACLU of California found at least 13 police agencies acquired or used Geofeedia in that state alone. The software is also used by news organizations, retailers and companies to quickly analyze large amounts of social media. The Mall of America used the program to engage shoppers, according to the company's web-

Activists are concerned that Geofeedia is marketing itself as a way to target protesters. "These programs are a deterrent to free speech," said Baltimore activist Kwame Rose, who was arrested while protesting the mistrial of a Baltimore officer charged in the death of Gray, whose neck was broken in the back of a police van. "It's a waste of resources that could be spent on implementing programs for police reform."

A Geofeedia representative and Baltimore police didn't immediately return calls for comment. The software can be a valuable public safety tool if used transparently, said Jim Bueermann, president of Washington, DC-based nonprofit Police Foundation, which is seeking money to study the value of such social media tracking programs. "As social media becomes an increasingly important way to interact with each other, it's a rational and natural response that the police would try to engage social media on multiple levels to try to get a better handle on how people feel about the department or certain incidents that happen," he said. —AP

LAWSUIT CLAIMS YAHOO JOB REVIEWS DISCRIMINATED AGAINST MEN

SAN FRANCISCO: A Yahoo Inc media executive fired from the internet company last year has filed a lawsuit claiming a job review process implemented by Chief Executive Marissa Mayer was used to cut men from executive ranks and lay them off illegally, court papers showed.

Scott Ard, a former senior editorial director at Yahoo, filed the lawsuit in California's Northern District Court in San Jose on Tuesday, saying the company violated federal civil rights and employment regulations. Yahoo spokeswoman Carolyn Clark said in a statement that the lawsuit had no merit and called the performance review process "fair."

The lawsuit is the second this year accusing Yahoo of discrimination against men, and targets one of the highest-profile Silicon Valley female executives, Mayer, who is in the middle of divesting Yahoo's core assets after failing to turn the company around.

Ard, who joined Yahoo in 2011, argued that he had received overall positive performance reviews and stock awards before Mayer introduced a quarterly performance review (QPR) system that left him with an unsatisfactory rank-

ing. "Yahoo's QPR Process permitted manipulation without oversight or accountability and was thus more arbitrary and discriminatory than the stack ranking used for a while by other employees," the lawsuit said.

It accused Yahoo of violating the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and U.S. Worker Adjustment and Retraining Notification regulations. Ard claims that since 2012, Yahoo has terminated more than 50 employees within a 30-day period on several occasions under the system, according to court documents. Yahoo had 9,400 employees as of March.

The lawsuit also claims former Chief Marketing Officer Kathy Savitt "intentionally hired and promoted women because of their gender," noting that 14 of about 16 senior level editorial employees hired by her were women.

In February, former Yahoo Autos Managing Editor Gregory Anderson sued the company, accusing it of gender discrimination and violations related to the job review process. The case, filed to US District Court Northern California, San Jose Division, is 5:16-cv-05635-NC. — Reuters

REPORTED YAHOO EMAIL SCANNING REVIVES SURVEILLANCE CONCERNS

NEW YORK: Yahoo's reported willingness to search user email to assist US government investigators has revived concerns about courtapproved surveillance programs that companies aren't allowed to disclose to the people using their services.

Last year, Yahoo modified an existing version of its email security program to flag the appearance of a digital "signature" the US had linked to a foreign terrorist group backed by another government, according to a report published Wednesday by The New York Times. Copies of any incoming email containing the signature were stored in Yahoo's system and made available to the FBI.

The Times quoted an unnamed government official, following up an earlier Reuters story that had revealed Yahoo's email scanning activity without specifying what kind of information the government sought.

Seen through a prism

The revelations have conjured memories of a data-collection program set up by the National Security Agency and major internet companies a few years ago under other court orders issued in secret. That program, called "Prism," only became public knowledge in 2013 after former NSA contractor Edward Snowden leaked slides revealing that the government had been authorized to grab emails, videos and pictures stored by Google, Yahoo and Facebook, among other companies.

As with Prism, the US government appears to have demanded Yahoo's cooperation in an effort to sniff out terrorist threats and protect public safety. The government said Prism targeted the specific online accounts of foreigners.

The Yahoo hunt may have cut a much broader swath, scanning through hundreds of millions of incoming emails in search of the signature used by the foreign terrorist group, said Kurt Opsahl, general counsel for the Electronic Frontier Foundation, a digital rights group. He

likened it to the government getting a court order to rifle through the documents stored in millions of homes in search of a particular piece of information.

Big computer is watching you

"This is a troubling vision of the future where there might be massive government surveillance done with computers," Opsahl said. "The government may well say they were only targeting a string of characters used by a foreigner, but it just so happened that hundreds of millions of innocent people also had their emails examined too."

Patrick Toomey, a staff attorney with the American Civil Liberties Union, said in a statement that the government order appears to be "unprecedented and unconstitutional."

Odia Kagan, a Philadelphia-based data privacy attorney, said that it's impossible to judge the legality of the government's request, because the facts surrounding it remain murky.

The Justice Department didn't immediately respond to a request for comment late Wednesday. Bulk collection of data isn't allowed and the government cannot indiscriminately review the emails or phone calls of ordinary people, Richard Kolko, deputy director of public affairs for the Office of the Director of National Intelligence, said in a statement. The US government can gather information about non-US citizens under the Foreign Intelligence and Surveillance Act, but those powers are supposed to be narrowly focused, Kolko said.

Yahoo hasn't explained what it did under the government order. It called Reuters' original story "misleading," but declined to comment on the Times' disclosure about the government's quest for the digital signature.

Gagging on secrecy

The company probably wishes it could say more, but can't because of a court order forbidding the company from discussing the surveil-

lance, Opsahl said.Google and Microsoft have issued statements disavowing any involvement in a government-ordered surveillance program similar to Yahoo's. While companies have a duty to abide by the law, they also have a duty to protect the privacy of their users, Kagan said. The trick is to balance those two things. And sometimes that means putting up a fight when it comes to government requests, even if they ultimately lose, in order to preserve their users' trust in them. Not long ago, Yahoo also resisted government demands. The Sunnyvale, California, company initially challenged the program that became Prism in a battle dating back to 2007, despite threats of being fined \$250,000 per day if it didn't comply.

Yahoo was under different management then. It has been run by a former Google executive, Marissa Mayer, for the past four years. "The big takeaway is that that we really don't know what is going on between any of these companies and the government," said Forrester Research privacy analyst Fatemeh Khatibloo. "It sort of a shadowy world threatening our Fourth Amendment rights" protecting against unreasonable search and seizures.

More trouble for Yahoo

The news is just the latest email bombshell for Yahoo, which was already reeling from its recent admission that computer hackers swiped personal information from at least 500 million of its accounts. That attack is believed to be the biggest digital break-in ever suffered by an email provider.

This week's revelations could also affect Yahoo's operations in Europe, Kagan said. User data there is protected by a data privacy agreement struck this summer between the US and EU regulators known as the Privacy Shield.

Yahoo is also in the process of selling its online operations to Verizon for \$4.8 billion. Verizon so far has had no comment on the email-scanning reports.—AP

FCC PROPOSAL: INTERNET PROVIDERS MUST ASK TO SHARE YOUR DATA

NEW YORK: A new privacy proposal unveiled last week will require broadband providers like Verizon and Comcast to get your permission before sharing with advertisers what you've been doing on your phone or computer.

The Federal Communication Commission has changed its broadband-privacy plan since it was initially proposed in March. The wireless and cable industries had complained that under the initial plan, they would be more heavily regulated than digital-ad behemoths like Google and Facebook, which are monitored by a different

agency, the Federal Trade Commission.

The FCC explained its new approach
Thursday and plans to vote on it Oct. 27. The
revised proposal says broadband providers don't
have to get permission from customers ahead of
time to use some information deemed "non-sensitive," like names and addresses. The previous
plan called for customers to expressly approve
the use of that information.

This time around, customers still need to OK broadband providers' using and sharing a slew of their data, like a phone's physical location, websites browsed and apps used, and what's in emails. And customers must be told what types of information is kept and how it will be used. Agency officials said customers can also still say no to internet service providers using other data, like names and addresses.

Drawing on customer information could help broadband providers make more money from digital advertising. Verizon, for example, bought AOL last year for \$4.4 billion and is spending \$4.8 billion more to buy Yahoo in a bid to build an ad business . The FCC proposal also requires broadband providers to tell customers within 30 days if their data has been hacked.

In a statement, Verizon's chief privacy officer, Karen Zacharia, said that the company was encouraged that the FCC "seems to be moving" to an approach that was more consistent with how the FTC regulates internet companies. But trade groups for the cable and phone-company

industries chided the plan because of differences with the FTC approach to regulating consumer privacy.

Several consumer-advocacy groups praised the FCC's plan. The proposal was a good defense "against internet service providers' unpermitted use of personal information," Free Press Policy Counsel Gaurav Laroia said in a statement. The proposal can change before the five FCC commissioners vote on it. —AP

SURGERY DURING PREGNANCY CARRIES LOW RISK OF COMPLICATIONS

NEW YORK: Surgical procedures during pregnancy are generally safe, new research indicates. "Clearly, surgery during pregnancy should only be considered if absolutely necessary," said Paul Aylin, study co-author and an epidemiologist at the Imperial College London in England.

But when expectant mothers do need to undergo surgery, "the information provided in our analysis may give reassurance," he told Reuters Health by email. Aylin and colleagues used England's national hospital database to identify nearly 6.5 million pregnancies between 2002 and 2012, including 47,628 in which the moms had nonob-

The most common operations involved the

abdomen, dental issues, the nails and skin, orthopedic conditions, the ear, nose or throat, the perianal region, and the breast. Overall, surgery during pregnancy was associated with a higher risk of birth complications, but the amount of that increased risk that could be blamed on the surgery was relatively small, according to the authors.

They found that for every 143 surgeries, there was one extra case of a hospital miscarriage. In addition, there was one extra stillbirth among every 287 women who had surgery, one preterm delivery among every 31 surgery patients, one underweight baby for every 39 women in the surgery group, and one maternal death for every 7,962 surgeries.

Four times higher risk

Approximately two-thirds of all abdominal operations were laparoscopic - but laparoscopic abdominal surgery was linked with a nearly four times higher risk of miscarriage compared with open abdominal surgery, the authors found.

Fewer than 6 percent of the operations occurred within one week of the end of pregnancy, however. Overall, after accounting for other factors that might increase expectant mothers' risks for these bad outcomes, nonobstetric surgery was found to increase the risk by 0.7 percent for miscarriage, 0.4 percent for still birth, 3.2 percent for preterm delivery, 2.6 percent for low birth weight, 4 percent for cesarean section, and 0.013 percent for maternal death, the authors reported in Annals

'This study puts it into perspective that other risk factors are at play and this is the amount of risk that can be blamed on the surgery," said Dr. Daniela Carusi, an obstetrician gynecologist and director of Surgical Obstetrics at Brigham and Women's Hospital in Boston.

"The risk you can attribute to surgery may be small, but it's not zero," said Carusi, who was not involved with the study. "Because of that, it's important to consider the safest alternative." In some cases, it might be better to wait. "But if it's a medical condition, like appendicitis, then surgery may be the better option," she said. — Reuters

4 UTERUS TRANSPLANTS FROM LIVE DONORS DONE IN TEXAS; 3 FAIL

BORN WITHOUT A UTERUS

DALLAS: Texas doctors have done the first womb transplants using live donors in the

Four women who had been born without a uterus received one in operations last month at

Baylor University Medical Center at Dallas. Three of the wombs have had to be removed because of poor blood flow. But the hospital said in a statement Wednesday that the fourth recipient

still has hers and is showing no signs of rejec-

tion. The hospital would not identify any of the donors or recipients.

There have been at least 16 previous uterus transplants worldwide, including one in Cleveland from a deceased donor that had to be removed because of complications. Two doctors from the University of Gothenburg in Sweden, which has done the most of these operations, were in Dallas to assist with the four transplants there.

At least five births have resulted from the womb transplants in Sweden. Dallas doctors are hopeful the patient who still has her transplanted womb will become the first successful case in the US She is part of a clinical trial that Baylor announced in January that aims to enroll 10 women born without a uterus or with a faulty one.

Womb donors can be dead or alive, and the Baylor study aims to use some of both. The first four cases involved "altruistic" donors - unrelated and unknown to the recipients, a hospital spokesman said. The ones done in Sweden were from live donors, mostly from the recipients' mother or a sister.

Doctors hope that womb transplants will enable as many as several thousand women born without a uterus to bear children. To be eligible for the Baylor study, women must be 20 to 35 years old and have healthy, normal ovaries. They will first have in vitro fertilization to retrieve and fertilize their eggs and produce embryos that can be frozen until they are ready to attempt pregnancy.

After the uterus transplant, the embryos can be thawed and implanted, at least a year after the transplant to make sure the womb is working well. A baby resulting from a uterine transplant would be delivered by cesarean section. The wombs are not intended to be permanent having one means a woman must take powerful drugs to prevent organ rejection, and the drugs pose long-term health risks, so the uterus would be removed after one or two successful preg-

Womb transplants are one of many newer trends in a field that has advanced many frontiers in recent years. On Wednesday, doctors at Brigham and Women's Hospital in Boston said they performed a double-arm transplant for a retired Marine sergeant who lost all four limbs to a bomb in Afghanistan. It was not a first, even for the hospital - at least 85 hand or arm transplants have been done globally since the first one nearly two decades ago.

Doctors from Houston Methodist Hospital and MD Anderson Cancer Center in 2014 did the world's first partial skull and scalp transplant to help a man who suffered a large head wound from cancer treatment. More than two dozen face transplants have been done since the first one in France in 2005; the first one in the US was done in Cleveland in 2008.

A host of patients have received transplants or implants of 3-D printed body parts, ranging from blood vessels to windpipes. — AP

MYLAN TO PAY \$465 MN OVER **EPIPEN OVERCHARGES TO MEDICAID**

NEW YORK: Mylan will pay \$465 million to resolve accusations from some regulators that it overbilled the federal Medicaid program for the EpiPen allergy medication, the drugmaker announced Friday.

The settlement with the Department of Justice and some other regulators resolves questions about Mylan's classification of EpiPen as a generic drug, the drugmaker said. Mylan said it did not admit fault in the

Federal health care regulators have said the misclassification contributed to a swelling of payments to Mylan, which nearly monopolizes the market for the allergy injectors, for EpiPen under federal health care programs. Had EpiPen been correctly classified, Mylan would have been forced to pay higher rebates to federal and state officials officials with the US Center for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS)

Mylan, which has been under strong attack from politicians and the public for jacking up the price of EpiPens — essential for severe allergy sufferers to block lifethreatening attacks-touted the settlement. "This agreement is another important step in Mylan's efforts to move forward and bring resolution to all EpiPen Auto-Injector related matters," said Mylan chief executive Heather Bresch.

Despite news of the settlement, Mylan alluded to a fresh federal investigation in an SEC filing, saving it had received a document request Friday from enforcement officials "seeking communications with the CMS and documents concerning Mylan products sold and related to the Medicaid Drug Rebate Program, and any related complaint."

"Mylan intends to fully cooperate with the SEC's investigation," it added. A CMS official declined substantive comment on the settlement. "Today, through an SEC filing, Mylan Pharmaceutical announced that it has come to an agreement in principle with the federal government over a dispute over the misclassification of Epipen in the Medicaid Drug Rebate Program," a CMS spokesperson said.

"We have no further comment at this time." A Justice Department spokeswoman declined comment, adding, "the Justice Department does not confirm or deny the existence of an investigation."

Mylan has been under fire since August over the soaring price of the life-saving EpiPen injectors, for which it faces virtually no competition in the market. A pack of two of the devices soared to more than \$600 from less than \$100 in 2007, when Mylan bought the rights to the technology.

Mylan in August boosted patient assistance programs to help defray costs for EpiPen, eliminating immediate out-ofpocket costs for the uninsured and underinsured. Bresch endured a bruising hearing on Capitol Hill last month where she was pressed on swelling compensation for executives at the company that was tied in part to the rising income from EpiPen sales.

Bresch defended the company's pricing, saying some of the higher cost was due to payments to insurers and others in the health care industry. However, the company was forced to back off a claim that a two-pack of EpiPens yielded a profit of just \$100 after it emerged that the figure deducted for an unrealistically high amount of taxes. Mylan shares rose 8.5 percent in after-hours trade. — AFP

CHOLERA OUTBREAK HITS WAR-TORN YEMEN: UNICEF

SANAA: War-torn Yemen is suffering from a cholera outbreak, the UN's children agency and the World Health Organization said Friday, posing a further threat to infants in the impoverished nation.

This outbreak adds to the misery of millions of children in Yemen," UNICEF Yemen representative Julien Harneis said in a statement. "Children are at a particularly high risk if the current cholera outbreak is not urgently contained especially since the health system in Yemen is crumbling as the conflict continues."

The WHO, citing Yemeni health ministry figures, said that eight cholera cases mostly involving children had been recorded in one neighborhood of the rebel-held capital Sanaa. They were being treated for extreme dehydration in an isolated section of the capital's Al-Sabiine hospital, it said.

The WHO said the scarcity of drinkable water has worsened the hygiene situation in Yemen, fuelling a marked increase in cases of severe diarrhoea, in particular among people displaced from their homes in the centre of the country. UNICEF said health professionals in Sanaa had reported several cases, as had medics in Taez, Yemen's third largest city.

It said its team was working with doctors in Yemen to establish the cause of the outbreak and called on international donors to provide funding to work to improve the health situation there. UNICEF said that cholera, a disease that is transmitted through contaminated drinking water and causes acute diarrhoea, could prove fatal in up to 15 percent of untreated cases.

The agency says nearly three million people in Yemen are in need of immediate food supplies, while 1.5 million children suffer malnutrition, including 370,000 enduring very severe malnutrition that weakens their immune system.

The conflict between Yemen's government and Iran-backed Huthi rebels escalated last year with the intervention of a Saudi-led Arab coalition in support of President Abedrabbo Mansour Hadi. The UN says more than 6,700 people have been killed and more than three million displaced by fighting in Yemen since March 2015, when the coalition launched its campaign. — AFP

NOVARTIS CHALLENGES PFIZER WITH STRONG BREAST CANCER DRUG DATA

NEW YORK: An experimental Novartis pill given with an older drug kept advanced breast cancer in check far longer than standard treatment alone, putting it on track to challenge Pfizer's blockbuster Ibrance, data showed on vesterday.

Patients taking ribociclib with letrozole were 44 percent less likely to see their disease progress or to die, a keenly awaited clinical trial found.

Novartis' ribociclib works in a similar way to Ibrance and is set to be second to market in the category. It is expected to go on sale next year, ahead of Eli Lilly's rival abemaciclib.

44 percent reduction

Ibrance has been quickly adopted by oncologists and is tipped by analysts to sell some \$2.1 billion in 2016, according to Thomson Reuters consensus forecasts. The 44 percent reduction in progression-free survival seen with ribociclib, which is also known as LEE011, compared with a 42 percent fall reported in a comparable late-stage trial involving Ibrance.

Lead researcher Gabriel Hortobagyi of the MD Anderson Cancer Center in Houston said the two drugs appeared very similar both in terms of their efficacy and side effects. "This is a practice-changing study and when it (ribociclib) is approved by the appropriate regulatory agencies it will be one of the major choices," he told reporters.

The news may prompt industry analysts to increase sales forecasts for the drug. Currently, consensus forecasts for ribociclib are \$1 billion in 2021 against \$5.8 billion for Ibrance. Alessandro Riva, head of cancer drug development at Novartis, told Reuters he believed the data showed that ribociclib was "at least as good" as Ibrance.

Like Ibrance, ribociclib caused a decline in white blood cells. The Novartis drug was also associated with signals of potential liver and heart problems, although these issues were well managed.

"The addition of ribociclib to letrozole does increase the rate of toxicity, but overall, if we evaluate the magnitude of clinical benefit, there is definitely a benefit to be gained from adding ribociclib," said Giuseppe Curigliano of the European Institute of

Novartis announced in May that the 668-patient trial was a success but full details were only unveiled in Copenhagen at the annual European Society for Medical Oncology congress. They were also published online in the New England Journal of

Patients on letrozole alone went a median 14.7 months before their disease progressed, while the median point was not reached in the ribociclib com-

bination arm because so many of those patients remained healthy. The number of deaths in the study was also too low to allow researchers to calculate an impact on overall survival.

In August, Novartis won breakthrough therapy designation from US regulators for ribociclib as a first-line treatment for advanced breast cancer and the company plans to file the medicine for approval worldwide this year. Like Pfizer's Ibrance, which has a US list price of around \$10,000 a month, ribociclib blocks enzymes known as cyclin-dependent kinases 4 and 6.

Both drugs are designed for patients whose tumors grow in response to estrogen and whose cancer is not caused by the HER2 protein. This is the most common type of breast cancer. — Reuters

DIETARY SATURATED FAT LINKED TO AGGRESSIVE PROSTATE CANCER

CHAPEL HILL, NORTH CAROLINA: Men with prostate cancer may be more likely to have the most serious form of the disease if their diet contains a lot of fat from meat and dairy, a recent US study

The increased risk tied to saturated fat and cholesterol was greater for the prostate cancer patients who had not been taking cholesterol-lowering statin drugs, researchers report in the journal Prostate Cancer and Prostatic Diseases.

The link between saturated fat in the diet and aggressive prostate cancer was also strongest for men of European descent, compared to African American men, the study found. "A diet high in saturated fat contributes to high blood cholesterol levels," which have already been linked to worse outcomes for prostate cancer, said lead author Emma Allott of the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill.

One out of every seven men in the US will be diagnosed with prostate cancer during their lifetimes, according to the American Cancer Society.

More common in the west

In Western countries, prostate cancer tends to be more common, and people in Western nations also tend to consume more saturated fat, the authors note. with more aggressive prostate cancer consumed more calories and more cholesterol every day and had a higher percentage of calories from fat in their diets. Among men with more aggressive prostate cancer, a greater proportion of the total fat they consumed was the saturated kind and less of it was polyunsaturated fat, compared to men with less aggressive cases.

Diets highest in saturated fat were tied to an overall 51 percent higher risk of having highly aggressive cancer, compared to diets lowest in saturated fat. Cholesterol intake was also separately tied to higher risk of more aggressive cancer, but only for white men.

For men who weren't taking statins, the risk of highly aggressive cancer was increased by 71 percent with the diets highest in saturated fat, only a 16 percent risk increase in men using statins. "There are a number of things that men can do to reduce their risk of advanced or lethal prostate cancer," said Stacey Kenfield, who researches lifestyle and diet factors to help prevent prostate cancer at the University of California, San Francisco.

Preventive measures include "not smoking, having a normal body weight, high physical activity, and high intake of tomatoes and dark meat fish (e.g., tuna, mackerel, salmon, sardines), and low intake of processed meat," she said.

These efforts may also help prevent other diseases, such as heart disease and diabetes, Kenfield, who was not involved in the study, told Reuters Health by email. People concerned about cancer "can cut down on the amount of saturated fat in their diets by choosing lean cuts of meat and low-fat dairy products, and by cooking with plant-based oils," Allot said. "Controlling dietary saturated fat content may be important not only for cardiovascular disease prevention and overall health, but also for aggressive prostate cancer prevention," she said. — Reuters

BRAZIL'S BIGGEST DINO FOUND AFTER 60 YEARS

REMAINS WERE IN CUPBOARD

RIO DE JANEIRO: Brazil just found its biggest ever dinosaur-in a storage cupboard. In its prime, more than 66 million years ago, this long necked herbivore was 25 meters (82 feet) long-longer than an articulated bus-and could chomp through trees at a terrifying rate.

By the time the creature was found by renowned Brazilian paleontologist Llewellyn Ivor Price in 1953, only a few hefty, fossilized bits of the spine remained. Researchers knew immediately they'd stumbled on something big. They didn't have the staff or resources to figure out how big, however, so the dinosaur pieces languished the next six decades in storage at Rio's ornate Museum of Earth Sciences. Until now.

The remains of what has been named "Austroposeidon magnificus," and pronounced Brazil's biggest dinosaur, went on general public view for the first time Thursday. A nearly complete spinal vertebra-about the size of a microwave oven and entirely petrified-and numerous fragments of other vertebrae lie on a black cloth in an upper room of the museum.

Nearby hangs an enormous artist's rendition, done to scale, of what "Austroposeidon magnificus" might have looked like: a small head, long neck, enormous body and long tail. A patch of the reptile's skin is shown pulled back to reveal where the prize vertebra would have slotted in.

'What, 60 years?'

Museum director Diogenes de Almeida Campos said six decades does sound on the slow side for studying such a big find. "A friend said to me just yesterday, 'Diogones, what, it took you 60 years?", he recalled with a wry smile. "It sounds a bit ridiculous to say this." But he explained that in the 1950s Price and his assistants were pioneers in the field for Brazil, and while "it was certain that vertebrae of this size came from a gigantic animal, it needed to be studied." Campos said money was an issue holding back research, as well as a lack of people up to the task. Even today there are only 10 serious dinosaur experts in the country,

he said. "We were waiting for the staff..., for a laboratory that started from nothing to mature," he said. "We made a first effort with students about eight years ago and it didn't succeed." Finally, Campos' student Kamila Bandeira made the mysterious monster the subject of her doctoral thesis and over the last four years put the pieces of the puzzle together.

Dinosaurs in back yards

The most spectacular dinosaur discoveries come in desert or largely bare areas, such as the US southwest, the south of Argentina or Mongolia, where they are easier to find. The fossilized bones of the biggest dinosaur known to date — an estimated 40 meters (130 feet) longwere unearthed in Argentina in 2014.

"Austroposeidon magnificus" was found, like many other dinosaur remains, by chance during road building near Sao Paulo. The reason only a few fossilized bones were found-and not the whole skeleton-points to the creature's unceremonious end, Campos says.

"When these animals die, it's... a huge new source of meat. So all the hunters, the carnivores ate this creature. The first thing they ate is the head, because the brain must be tasty," said Campos. "They also broke the long bones to get materials." — AFP

at the marrow... After, came smaller animals and nothing was left over. Anything that did remain the beetles and the spiders and the ants finished, and when there was just bones, the bacteria came. Finally the remains sank into the lagoon."

There may be many such discoveries waiting to be made in Brazil's thick flora. "Pay attention when roads are built, when wells are dug," Campos advised. "You could have a dinosaur in your backyard and not realize!"

Extinction then and now

A lifetime hanging around fossils of extinct giants has given Campos, 73, unique perspective on creation and destruction. But today's world, where human activity dominates for the first time, disturbs him. "Extinction is as normal a thing for paleontologists, as is the appearance of a new species," he said. "But in comparison with what's happening today-the disappearance of tigers or whales-this is not caused by nature." "It's worrying." In the palatial but at times shockingly decrepit Rio museum-a victim, like many other Brazilian public institutions, of underfunding-Campos said his job was a great passion. He recalled studying under the great Price and "traveling with him over almost all of Brazil, collecting materials" — AFP

PUERTO RICO MAN, 80, INFECTED WITH ZIKA DIES

SAN JUAN: Puerto Rico's health secretary has reported the death of an 80-year-old man who was infected with Zika and had other medical conditions. Ana Rius said Friday the mosquito-borne virus caused a drop in platelets, among other issues, and the man died of cardiac and respiratory complications.

platelets, among other issues, and the man died of cardiac and respiratory complications. He was the third person to die in Puerto Rico under such conditions. Two other people died from a paralysis condition linked to Zika. Rius also reported the death of a fetus with brain damage that was carried by a woman infected with Zika. Rius declined to say if the woman miscarried or had an abortion. Puerto Rico has 26,701 Zika cases, including 2,106 pregnant women. Health officials expect a growing number of babies to be born with severe birth defects linked to Zika. — AP

George and Amal Clooney's new multi-million dollar apartment in Manhattan







Simon Cowell has beefed up his own security





CANADIAN DESIGNER CELEBRATES UNISEX AT DUBAI SHOW



anadian-Jordanian designer Rad Hourani creates avant-garde designs with a vision: To break all boundaries, starting with gender. His revolutionary unisex garments were showcased in the Middle East for the first time ever during a show late Friday at Arab Fashion Week in Dubai.

In thick pieces of material tied up in different styles, male and female models walked down the runway wearing dark sunglasses. The 34-year-old, an invited member of the Chambre Syndicale de la Haute Couture in Paris, was the first ever designer to present a unisex haute couture collection in 2013.

His Spring-Summer 2017 collection presented in Dubai is a reworked mix of his past archives and aims to showcase "the timelessness" of his 10-year-old genderless works, the soft-spoken designer, wearing a simple black cotton T-shirt and matching trousers, told AFP in an interview.

"People didn't really understand it (unisex) at the beginning," he said. "They were always asking which pieces are for men and which pieces are for women." "I had to work very hard in the past 10 years to communicate the neutral unisex vision," which has become his signature style, he said.

'Free of limitations'

For Friday's show, Hourani said he re-edited his old collections "in a new way, adding new forms and new shapes." But it was the first time the designer, known for his clean A-lines and minimalist looks, has worked with draped folds. "I think working with these shapes in a new drapey and architectural way was an interesting exercise for me," he said.

Behind his work, Hourani has his own unbounded philosophy or "vision", as he likes to call it. "I live in a way which is free of (the) limitations of gender, race, age or nations," he said. "I see the world as one place and I see the people as one as well."

Through his garments, he tries to offer customers some of this freedom by creating unisex clothing that could be transformed to menswear or womenswear through simple styling such as adding a belt, or tying up the piece in a certain way. "What I'm trying to do is to create neutral graphic shapes and then to give each individual the options of wearing it: feminine, masculine, casual, or whatever style they like it to be." "I don't work in a way that I can limit you in the way you style the garment. So my garments are really very transformable in terms of style."

While his fabrics are generally cotton satin, silk, and crepe, he used a plastic-like material for his Dubai collection and added bright colours-a change from his usually monochrome palette of black, white, grey, and blue. "This time it's more of a fun show" with the models even appearing wrapped up "like gifts" to celebrate the decade he has spent in the industry, Hourani said with a grin.

'Lady Gaga style'

His designs drew mixed views from the audience with an elderly Iraqi man exclaiming: "They're aliens!" as the models walked past. But Nora, a Frenchwoman of Arab origin, said she did see some "interesting" pieces which she could consider buying. "We don't have this kind of fashion here in the Middle East... I see it (as) a bit special," she said after the show. "To understand this kind of design you need to... understand the designer himself how he thinks."

Daryl Scott, a fitness trainer from New York, agreed that "it was pretty interesting. It's different in a good way." "It's something more like Lady Gaga" style, said Scott, referring to the all-famous American pop star who has already worn Hourani's designs.

But the designer said he does have Arab clients. "I see a great evolution" in the Arab world in terms of fashion. "We have Emirati clients", male and female and of different ages. — AFP

'Woodstock for Geezers': Baby boomers unite for rock icons

mome fans rarely go to shows these days; others sport served him in first-class on a flight to London. Redpath, who recent tour T-shirts. But one idea unites the graying crowd at this weekend's concert of rock all-stars-this may be the last chance to see their musical heroes. Desert Trip, which could be the most profitable music festival of all time, is bringing out six acts from the rock canon never seen before together led by the Rolling Stones and Paul McCartney.

The fruit of the booking prowess of the company behind Coachella, the annual festival in the California desert that has helped shape youth pop culture, Desert Trip offered nostalgia and a fleeting sense of community for baby boomers.

Instead of crushing standing-room crowds, the festival provided seats and let others bring in lawn chairs; instead of Coachella's bare-as-much-skin-as-legal fashion rules, Desert Trip's standard attire was T-shirts and shorts. And, rather than Coachella's omnipresent smell of marijuana, the attractions at so-nicknamed "Oldchella" included sommelier-selected wines. "Woodstock for geezers-that's what this is," joked Mike Bench, 64, who flew in from Florida, leaving behind his two dogs with friends as Hurricane Matthew approached.

Beach, who spent 32 years as a radio DJ playing rock classics, was excited not just for the scheduled acts but the prospect of surprise appearances. "Anybody who's anybody in the rock world will want to be here," he said. Enduring pull of

Gerri Redpath, 71, has seen Mick Jagger before-when she was a flight attendant for now-defunct airline Pan Am and recalls Jagger as well-mannered, described Desert Trip as her first concert in her 70s. "I'm impressed that this music has lasted so long," she said.

Her husband, John Doutsas, said that he waited three hours online to buy tickets for Desert Trip after the couple decided they needed to make the journey from their home in the San Francisco area. "This is a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity because some of them may not be around for much longer," he said.

The three-day festival's other performers are Bob Dylan, Neil Young, The Who and Roger Waters. Of the artists, all are septuagenarians with the sole exception of Rolling Stones guitarist Ronnie Wood-who is 69.

While the festival industry has boomed thanks to young people, the Desert Trip crowd was dominated by older people and was also overwhelmingly white, in line with the makeup of the artists. The artists-who have collectively sold more than \$3.1 billion tickets since 2000, according to industry site Pollstar-will return the following weekend for the same lineup, with total attendance expected at 150,000.

'Bucket list' experience

Ernie Demarbiex, 77, grew up in nearby Palm Desert, which like many cities near the Coachella grounds has a large population of retirees whose relationship has at times been awkward with young partygoers.

Demarbiex said he would be on his feet and dancing from the moment Mick Jagger came out with the Rolling Stones. "He's on my bucket list. He's up in age and this may be the last time to see him," said Demarbiex, whose previous "bucket list" achievements have included trekking to Machu Picchu.

While Coachella and other sweaty summer festivals have taken to setting up tents for clubs, Desert Trip's indoor attraction was a 35,000-square-foot (3,250-square-meter) air-conditioned photo gallery full of classic shots of the Desert Trip

Brooke Adamic, 21, snapped photos with her phone of her nearly two-year-old daughter Vera in front of a portrait by Terry O'Neill of Stones guitarist Keith Richards shaving.

Adamic said she had expected most of the crowd to be older but was pleasantly surprised at the number of young people. "Probably never in my 21 years of living would I have an opportunity like this. This is my one chance to go back in time," she said. And, pointing to her daughter, she said, "Maybe by the time she is 12 or 13 years old she is going to thank me as well."—AFP

Damon and Affleck resurrect 'Good Will Hunting' roles

att Damon and Ben Affleck resurrected their "Good Will Hunting" roles, not to mention their Boston accents, in a special one night only live read from the script Friday in New York.

John Krasinski hosted and served as a guest director for the night before an audience that benefits a non-profit arts organization called Film Independent. Tickets ranged from \$65 to \$150. He began saying the "Good Will Hunting" script was special to him, not only because he's from Boston, but because it makes him emotional.

Krasinski introduced a cast to read the different roles including his wife, Emily Blunt, in Minnie Driver's role, and Margo Martindale, reading Robin Williams' part of a therapist who helps Damon's emotionally damaged orphan, who also is unusually intelligent, let go of his past and realize his poten-

Keegan Michael Key and "Hamilton""s Daveed Diggs also had parts. The read kicked off with Krasinski taking Damon's lead role of Will Hunting when Damon walked on stage and surprised the audience. Krasinski then attempted to begin Affleck's role of Hunting's wise-cracking friend, when he appeared.

The crowd screamed and gave a standing ovation and Krasinski took over the duty of narrator. The reading went off script a few times, like when Krasinski would jokingly protest to Blunt and Damon's portraval of lovers and when Affleck and Damon pointed out inside jokes. A few lines were flubbed, but the theater was silent when Martindale recited Williams' dialogue in an emotional scene.

"Good Will Hunting" won Damon and Affleck the Oscar for best writing of an original screenplay in 1997. Williams won the best supporting actor Academy Award. Live Read events began in 2011 in Los Angeles with director Jason Reitman gathering actors together to read popular scripts like "Breakfast Club", "The Princess Bride" and "Reservoir Dogs," to raise money for Film Independent.

Police in Paris say they are investigating the heist in which armed robbers forced their way into a private residence where Kardashian was staying, tied her up and locked her in a bathroom, then stole \$10 million worth of jewelry.—AP

Bob Dylan plays 80-minute set to open Desert Trip festival

Bob Dylan kicked off the historic Desert Trip music festival Friday with an 80-minute set. The 75-year-coachella is aimed at millennials, Desert old rocker spent most of his time behind the piano as he performed songs from throughout his catalog, including "Tangled Up in Blue," "Highway 61 Revisited" and "Make You Feel My Love."

He opened with "Everybody Must Get Stoned." Wearing a white hat and white shoes with a black tuxedo jacket and trousers, Dylan did not speak to the audience or say anything between songs. He occasionally crept out from behind the piano to sing at a microphone center stage, pulling a harmonica from his pocket

Dylan's set officially launched the Desert Trip festival, dubbed "Oldchella" when it was first announced. The threeday concert features six legendary acts: Dylan, the Rolling Stones, Paul McCartney, Neil Young, Roger Waters and the Who. It's the first time they've all performed at the same event.

Desert Trip is being staged at the same Southern California desert venue where

Trip targets the more affluent baby boomers who grew up with the festival's featured rockers. Luxury camping, gourmet dining and yoga classes are among the amenities being offered.

When tickets first went on sale, 53year-old Cathleen Ellsworth of Greenwich, Connecticut, knew she had to attend with her best friends from college.

"She introduced me to Tequila and Bob Dylan!" Ellsworth said of pal Charlene Hare, 54, whom she met in 1980. Along with fellow friend Christine Trauth, 53, they wore matching macrame tops and light-up flower headbands. Their husbands had light-up eyeglasses shaped like peace symbols.

"It's a rock festival. We have to represent!" Ellsworth said. The Rolling Stones are set to take the stage later Friday night. Neil Young and Paul McCartney perform Saturday night. The festival repeats next weekend.—AP

In '20th Century Woman' with Annette Bening, an ode to a mom

irector Mike Mills had some advice for his audience at the New York Film Festival: Make a movie about your mom. Mills premiered his "20th Century Woman," starring Annette Bening, on Friday at Lincoln Center, where his film is playing as the festival's centerpiece. In it, Bening stars as Dorothea Fields, a woman born during the Great Depression who's raising her 14-year-old son (newcomer Lucas Jade Zumann) by herself in 1979 California, albeit with the help of the colorful tenants (Greta Gerwig, Billy Crudup) living her old Santa Barbara home.

The film is a lushly lived-in coming-of-age dramedy about a mom and her son, told with a keen eye to how historical currents shape emotional lives. Mills, at a press conference Friday, said the movie could be

reduced to "'As Time Goes By' meets the Buzzcocks." Mills, the writer-director of "Beginners," said he wrote "20th Century Woman" primarily as a love letter to his mother. "You all should make movies about your mom because it's really a trip," said Mills. "And then have an amazing actress do it."

The film, which A24 will release Dec. 25, has been lined up as an awards season contender, with Bening's lead performance particularly trumpeted. Her Dorothea is part a cigarette-smoking traditionalist (she tells her son: "Wondering if you're happy is a great shortcut to being depressed"), and part an openminded child of the 1960s, willing to try dancing to both the Talking Heads and Black Flag.

Bening was 19 during the film's time period, but grew up in San Diego near the movie's coastal setting.

in finding the character herself while also being faithful to Mills' descriptions of his mother. The balancing act, she said, was "fascinating but not easy." "To me Dorothea was very much Annette, in body and timing and soul," said Mills. "It was fun to sort of show her my mom, always saying to her to take what's interesting and dump the rest." 



The rapper resumed the Saint Pablo Tour in his home-

The rapper resumed the Saint Pablo Tour in his hometown of Chicago without mentioning the crime at the show. He did tell the crowd "it's good to be home." West performed for about 90 minutes straight.

The rapper abruptly cut short a New York concert earlier this week citing a "family emergency." It was later reported that robbers held Kardashian West at gunpoint Monday and locked her in the bathroom of a Paris residence before stealing more than \$10 million worth of jewelry.

She returned to the US later Monday and West announced that he had rescheduled for December planned concerts on Tuesday in Philadelphia and Thursday in the Detroit area. Kardashian West, known for prolific posting on social media, has been publicly silent since the ordeal. No arrests have been made. — AP
