GHANEM CALLS FOR MEETING WITH GOVT OVER PETROL HIKE

KUWAIT: National Assembly speaker Marzouq Al-Ghanem yesterday said he has invited the government for an expanded meeting next Tuesday to discuss the hike in petrol prices, a move that will

automatically end the proposed emergency parliamentary session to debate the issue. Ghanem said the Assembly will demand that Kuwaiti citizens be spared from the hike in the same way lawmakers rejected an attempt by the government

to increase electricity and water tariffs. If the government accepts the lawmakers' demand, it will Marzouq Al-Ghanem mean that the over 80 percent

increase in petrol prices will apply only to foreigners. The mechanism to implement this request has not yet been disclosed. Earlier this year, MPs voted to increase electricity and water prices, but Kuwaiti citizens were excluded. The new power charges will go into effect from June next year for commercial establishments, and in late August for expatriates.

KUWAIT: Kuwait's economy suffers from glaring structural errors induced by accumulations that have stalled development, Finance Ministry Undersecretary Khalifa Hamada said yesterday. Hamada, speaking on behalf of Finance Minister and acting oil minister Anas Al-Saleh at the Euromoney 2016 Conference, said that these glitches are related to governmental procedures, adding that bureaucracy has encumbered economic production.

Moreover, Hamada noted that the flaws are also the result of irregularities in the job market, saying that the government has struggled to provide employment for

nationals. Speaking on the primary factor that has impeded growth, Hamada said that the nation's budget heavily relies on oil revenues, an issue that if not remedied, would be detrimental to the country's economy. He also noted that public spending should center on efforts to maximize production capacity to ensure sustained development.

Furthermore, Hamada made a correlation between financial reforms and economic growth, as he listed numerous factors that could help eliminate any hindrances to growth, chiefly, the addition of non-oil revenues and to rationalize public spending, measures he

described as the two focal points of financial reforms.

On the government's role in developing the economy, he said that it should monitor economic procedures and enhance collaboration with the private sector, which would result in a robust market that will keep consumers satisfied. Hamada also urged the private sector to contribute to economic growth through public projects and increased cooperation with the government sector, adding that citizens should own a 40 percent share of these projects.

COLOMBIA, FARC REBELS SIGN HISTORIC PEACE DEAL

CARTAGENA, Colombia: Colombia's leftist FARC rebel force signed a historic peace accord with the government Monday and apologized to the countless victims of the country's half-century civil war. In an emotional open-air ceremony, President Juan Manuel Santos welcomed the communist rebels into the political sphere after signing the accord with FARC leader Rodrigo Londono, alias Timoleon "Timochenko" Jimenez.

Dressed in white, the former mortal enemies signed and shook hands, smiling before an audience of international dignitaries, drawing loud cheers. The ceremony in the Caribbean coast city of Cartagena followed a four-year process

to end the last major armed conflict in the Americas. The accord remains to be ratified by referendum in a week. "We are being reborn to launch a new era of reconciliation and of building peace," Timochenko said. "In the name of the FARC, I sincerely apologize to all the victims of the conflict for any pain we may have caused during this war."

Colombian authorities estimate the territorial and ideological conflict has killed 260,000 people, left 45,000 missing and uprooted 6.9 million. "Let no one doubt that we are moving towards politics without weapons. Let us all prepare to disarm hearts and minds," Timochenko said.

PETITION SEEKS FULL RIGHTS FOR SAUDI WOMEN

RIYADH: Thousands of Saudis have signed a petition urging an end to the guardianship system that gives men control over the study, marriage and travel of female relatives, activists said yesterday. The petition calls for the kingdom's women to be treated "as a full citizen, and decide an age where she will be an adult and will be responsible for her

own acts", said campaigner Aziza Al-Yousef of Riyadh. The retired university professor told AFP that she tried unsuccessfully to deliver the petition containing 14,700 names to the Royal Court on Monday. The activists will now send it by mail as requested.

Saudi Arabia has some of the world's tightest restrictions on women, and is the only country where they are

not allowed to drive. Under

the guardianship system a male family member, normally the father, husband or brother, must grant permission for a woman's study, travel and other activities. Activists say that even female prisoners have to be received by the guardian upon their release, meaning that some have to languish in jail or a shelter beyond their sentences if the man does not want to accept them.

CLINTON ASSAILS TRUMP IN FIERY DEBATE **HEMPSTEAD**, **New York**: Republican Donald Trump vowed yesterday to hit rival Democrat Hillary Clinton harder in the next US presidential debate after she put him on the defensive by accusing him of being racist, sexist and a tax dodger during their first matchup. Trump, a real estate mogul making his first run for public office, praised himself for not attacking Clinton about the marital infidelity of her husband, former President Bill Clinton, but said in a morning interview yesterday with Fox News that he may take up the attack line going forward.

> "I may hit her harder in certain ways," Trump said in a telephone interview with

"Fox & Friends." Trump added that when Clinton criticized him for his treatment of women, he resisted. "I was going to hit her with her husband's women. And I decided I shouldn't do it because her daughter was in the room."

Clinton was under pressure to perform well on Monday night after a recent bout with pneumonia and an erosion in recent weeks in her lead over Trump in opinion polls. One line of attack was Trump's past remarks about women, a message designed to resonate with women who have not yet decided who to vote for and who could prove pivotal in deciding the Nov 8 White House election.

ARMY RETAKES ALEPPO DISTRICT AS BOMBS RAIN

DAMASCUS: Syria's army took control of a rebel-held district in central Aleppo yesterday, after days of heavy air strikes that have killed dozens and sparked allegations of war crimes. In the first advance since announcing plans last week to retake all of the divided city, pro-government troops seized the Farafira district northwest of Aleppo's historic citadel, a military source told AFP. "After neutralizing many terrorists... units are now demining the area," the source said.

The push follows several days of Syrian and Russian air strikes on rebel-held Aleppo neighborhoods - some of the fiercest bombardment of the five-year conflict so far - after a ceasefire deal brokered by Moscow and Washington collapsed last week. The Aleppo maelstrom prompted Western powers to accuse Russia of committing possible war crimes, charges the

Kremlin condemned as "unacceptable". In the latest broadside, NATO Secretary

General Jens Stoltenberg also condemned the air campaign. "The appalling attacks on Aleppo have shaken all of us, and the violence and the attacks we have seen... is morally totally unacceptable and is a blatant violation of international law," Stoltenberg told a news conference in Bratislava.

On the ground in eastern Aleppo, an AFP correspondent said air strikes struck several neighborhoods simultaneously, including in Al-Shaar, where a five-storey building was levelled with a family stuck inside. One young girl, her body encased in rubble, was among the dead. Her father, in shock as rescue workers picked up her lifeless body, collapsed beside, saying: "She's just sleeping. She's just used to sleeping."

The Syrian Observatory for Human Rights, a monitor, said that more than 155 people have been killed by Russian and regime bombardment on Aleppo city since the government announced its offensive last week. At least 11

civilians were killed yesterday in raids on the neighborhoods of Al-Shaar and Al-Mashhad, according to the Britain-based group. As well as the intensified violence, residents have been left reeling from food shortages and skyrocketing prices. The World Health Organization warned yesterday that medical facilities in east Aleppo were on the verge of "complete destruc-

Analysts said yesterday Russia has decided to throw its military might behind the Syrian regime's drive to recapture divided Aleppo in a bid to strong-arm Washington into accepting Moscow's demands. "Negotiations with the Americans were just a smokescreen in order to buy time and prepare for the next phase of military operations," said Thomas Pierret, a Syria expert at the University of Edinburgh. "For the (regime) loyalists, diplomacy is the continuation of war by other means," Pierret said.

AN AWARDING CEREMONY FOR FAMILIES OF MARTYRS

KUWAIT: On the occasion of the second anniversary of HH the Amir Sheikh Sabah Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah's honoring by the United Nations as a Humanitarian Leader and Kuwait as a Humanitarian Center, author Abdullah Buwair held an awarding ceremony for the families of martyrs. Buwair said he decided to award families of martyrs and victims from all over the world who participated in liberating Kuwait. "These martyrs sacrificed their lives for the freedom of our country and people," he said during the ceremony on Monday at the Crowne Plaza Hotel.

He also spoke about HH the Amir, saying he was the first Arab leader to be awarded this title by the United Nations. "This is an honor for all Kuwaitis and for Kuwait as well, as it was named a Humanitarian Center. This is considered the golden era for Kuwait in the field of humanitarian work. On January 29, 2006, Sheikh Sabah Al-Ahmad became the Amir of Kuwait, taking the country to new heights," stressed Buwair. "HH the Amir is a man of forgiveness. This is clear from the present Kuwaiti-Iraqi relations, which have strongly developed since the Iraqi invasion, and bilateral ties have improved, including investments, demarcating borders, and the issue of martyrs and the missing. Sheikh Sabah is systematically supporting Arab countries in need, and helps countries suffering from disasters and crises. Also, Kuwait is delivering aid to fight poverty and improve health, education, economy and infrastructure all over the world. HH the Amir is behind all these charity projects," Buwair concluded.

Iman Areiqat, Head of the International Organization for Migration of the UN, said the honoring of the Amir by the UN was an unprecedented event, which was deserved by both HH the Amir and Kuwait. "The charitable and humanitarian work of the Amir goes beyond the borders of Kuwait and has reached those afflicted and people in need all over the world. The humanitarian initiatives of HH the Amir have no political aspect and are purely humanitarian. Millions of Syrian refugees have benefited from Kuwait's donations as well," she pointed out. Dr Ameera Al-Hassan, head of the visiting mission of Habitat-UN, noted that the title of Humanitarian Leader is not strange to HH the Amir. "After he assumed power in 2006, we noticed an increase in humanitarian help and donations provided by Kuwait to countries in need. Also, Kuwait hosted three international donor conferences to support the people of Syria and neighboring countries," she said.



FINISHING TOUCHES ON JAHRA ROAD DEVELOPMENT PROJECT

KUWAIT: The Ministry of Public Works announced the progress on the ongoing final works taking place on the elevated portion of the Jahra Road Development Project, which is scheduled to open shortly. The upcoming opening begins after Saad Al-Abdullah Academy and stretches to the end of the bridge after Airport Road, in both directions. Engineer Ahmad Al-Hassan, the Assistant Undersecretary for Road Engineering Sector at the Ministry of Public Works commented: "Since last year this mega-project has seen multiple openings, including directional ramps, service roads and portions of the elevated mainline. This will be the largest opening to date and will mark the completion of the final remaining portion of elevated mainline on the Jahra Road Development Project."

"Currently we are working on the final stages of road works and finishing works, which include installation of edge and median barriers, anti-carbonation coating, deck waterproofing and asphalting. Once opened, road users will immediately see a difference in overall driving time between the United Nations and Sheraton roundabouts. Additionally, it will lead to paramount differences in the overall traffic patterns in the surrounding areas with a significantly lower number of cars using the service roads as drivers will have access to the elevated mainline, heading straight to Kuwait City or towards Jahra in the other direction," explained Engineer Hanan Hussein, Deputy Project Engineer at the Jahra Road Development Project.

"We are also pleased to report that as of Thursday 8th September, we have finished casting all 8,390 bridge segments at our pre-cast yard located in Doha. To date, 7202 of them have been erected (86%), and tremendous progress has also been witnessed across other areas of the project: construction of 92% of piles, 87% of the piers, and 90% of the diaphragms. Additionally, the work on the trough located on the 2nd Ring Road currently stands at 79% complete" added Eng Hanan. This mega project involves the construction of 17.7 km of viaducts (7.3 km of mainline Jahra Road, 2.4 km of bridges on linked roads and 8.0 km of ramps), including a trough at the 2nd Ring Road intersection, 10 pedestrian bridges, and service roads. The Jahra Road project also includes major utilities relocation works.







BANGLADESHI WORKERS STAGE A SIT-IN PROTEST

KUWAIT: Around 100 Bangladeshi workers hired by a Kuwaiti company to guard supermarkets and various stores in Kuwait staged a sit-in protest yesterday at the Bangladesh Embassy in Khaldiya. The workers demanded residency permits, which the company failed to provide since they joined 11 months ago. They also haven't been paid for the past two months, with no housing too in this period.

"We have been working for almost a year now with this company. They said they will provide us with visas and good accommodation, but nothing happened," said 24-year-old Muhammad Jassem. "We want a transfer as soon as possible because we do not have any place to live. We have no money too, and are forced to work elsewhere. We are very afraid, as the police could check our residency status, and we can end up in jail," he said.

Abdul Latif Khan told Kuwait Times he told the workers to be patient as the embassy has been coordinating with their company to resolve their issues. Asked why they were not able to get iqamas, he said the company has a problem with the ministry, so they cannot process the visas. "But rest assured, we have been coordinating with the company and they promised us to resolve the problems of the

workers in the next few days or weeks. Hopefully, they will comply," he said.

Khan said the company promised to pay the outstanding salaries and that work will resume in the coming days. "I appeal to the workers to cooperate with the company so that their legal documents and residencies will be given in due time. The workers came from Bangladesh directly, and we were not informed when they entered Kuwait. Only last month they came to seek assistance. We are continuing negotiations so that the problem will be resolved," he told Kuwait Times. The recruitment company was contacted by Kuwait Times, but refused to comment.

Kuwait and Cyprus promote trade, seek joint investment

KUWAIT: Visiting Cypriot Minister of Finance Haris Georgiades met yesterday with officials of Kuwait Chamber of Commerce and Industry (KCCI) on ways of promoting trade exchange and available investment opportunities for the private sector. During the meeting, they discussed available investment opportunities, visa advantages for foreign investors in Kuwait, investment in real estate, tax system and investment funds, KCCI Member Wafa Al-Qattami said in a press statement. She said trade exchange between Kuwait and Cyprus stands at around \$26 million, calling on Cypriot companies to boost trade between both sides. She quoted the visiting Cypriot minister as stressing firm historical relations between Kuwait and Cyprus, boasting that his country enjoys high-quality financial services and low taxes. He added that Cyprus has several promising growth opportunities for a number of sectors, including real estate, tourism, navigation and mega development ventures.

Shortfalls in schools will soon be resolved

KUWAIT: Minister of Education and Minister of Higher Education Dr Bader Al-Essa expressed yesterday his Ministry's keenness to cover all shortfalls in all schools in Kuwait in a short period. Al-Issa said in a statement during an inspection tour of Fari'aa Bint Al-Salt secondary school for girls in Mubarak Al-Kabeer governorate that there is a shortfall in the number of teachers of mathematics and physics and such deficit is not only happening in Kuwait but in the Arab world as well. He added that some 400 out of 700 positions have been allocated and approved, adding that the problem lies in rare specialties and not with the Civil Service Commission.

Kuwait legislative delegation in Cambodia for APA meeting

KUALA LUMPUR: A Kuwaiti legislative delegation headed by MP Humoud Al-Hamdan is taking part the First Executive Council meetings of the Asian Parliamentary Assembly (APA) and the meeting of APA Standing Committee on Staff and Financial Regulations, which got underway in the Cambodian capital Phnom Penh yesterday. The meeting agenda includes its endorsement, electing members of the APA bureau, examining the Assembly's general report, along with several recommendations addressing diverse issues. The conference focuses on boosting parliamentary cooperation among the Asian nations, information and expertise exchange, challenges facing sustainable development, climatic change and its impact on economic development in Asia, said the Kuwaiti legislator during the first session.

Kuwait Airways to be first to use new Cairo terminal

CAIRO: Kuwait Airways will be the first aviation firm to operate Cairo International Airport's new terminal, a senior company official said yesterday. In a statement to KUNA a day before Cairo International Airport's Terminal 2 opens for a test period, Director of Kuwait Airways' Middle East and North Africa Department Abdullah Al-Huwaila said that the fact that Kuwait Airways will be the first aviation company to use the terminal is a testament to its "repute and credibility." Moreover, Egypt's Ministry of Civil Aviation announced that all airlines using Terminal 1 will begin operating the new terminal on September 28, as Terminal 2 will officially be opened on October 6th.

KUWAIT 'READY TO HOST' FRESH INTRA-YEMEN TALKS

IRAQI SPEAKER PRAISES KUWAITI DIPLOMACY

KUWAIT: Deputy Foreign Minister Khaled Suleiman Al-Jarallah said Kuwait is ready to receive the Yemeni stakeholders if they are willing to reach deal and break the political stalemate. "The State of Kuwait has always been supportive of all efforts aiming to resolve the Yemeni crisis peacefully, including the efforts of the brothers in the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia," he affirmed. He was referring to a recent report by the Iranian Fars news agency that the Kuwaiti and Saudi stances on Yemen are different. Al-Jarallah made the press remarks during a celebration at China embassy this evening to celebrate the National Day of the People's Republic of China. Kuwait hosted the first round of the UN-sponsored intra-Yemeni peace talks between April 21 and August 6.

Oman commends Kuwait

Meanwhile, Oman has commended

Kuwait for hosting the peace negotiations among the Yemeni parties, with an objective of achieving a win-win solution to the conflict. "We laud the efforts exerted by His Highness the Amir Sheikh Sabah Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah to bridge the gap in the views of the Yemeni parties" who held UNbrokered talks in Kuwait between April and August this year, Minister responsible for Foreign Affairs Yusuf bin Alawi bin Abdullah said in a speech before the UN General Assembly's (UNGA) 71st session.

The aim of hosting the talks, he added, 'has been to achieve a win-win solution to the conflict by peace negotiations." Representatives from the Yemeni legitimate government, Ansarullah Movement and the General People's Congress (CPG) held several rounds of talks in Kuwait, moderated and sponsored by UN special envoy to Yemen Ismail Ould Sheikh Ahmad. Bin Abdullah emphasized that Oman strongly believed in the peaceful solution of conflicts. "Our country has been one of the states that adopted the policy of dialogue, negotiation and conciliation to settle disputes by peaceful means," he added. Ansarullah committed a coup d'etat against the legitimate government of Yemeni President Abd Rabbu Mansour Hadi and as a result the country has plunged into a crisis. The international community has been firm in calling on all parties in Yemen to solve their dispute on the basis of UN Security Council resolution 2216, GCC initiative and its implementation mechanism, and outcome of national dialogue.

Kuwait diplomacy

Also, Iraqi Parliament Speaker Salim Al-Jubouri has praised the role of Kuwait's diplomacy in the region, especially its efforts to support the crisis of displaced Iraqis. Kuwait's Ambassador to Iraq Salem

Al-Zamanan said in a statement to Kuwait News Agency (KUNA) yesterday after meeting the Iraqi senior official that the latter stressed that Iraq was in dire need for support by Arab nations in light of the current challenges, wishing the Ambassador success in his diplomatic mission in his second country Iraq. The ambassador added that he discussed with Iraqi Parliament Speaker ways to strengthen bilateral relations between the two countries to serve the interests of both peoples. He pointed out that the meeting touched on files related to bilateral affairs of the two countries, including the file of displaced persons in which Kuwait had played a significant role. He explained that the meeting also tackled what Kuwait can contribute as part of Arab support for Iragis at the level of economic cooperation. The ambassador had submitted his credential to the Iraqi president Fouad Maasoum last Sunday. — Agencies

KUWAIT'S SUPPORTIVE ROLE OF OIC EXTOLLE

GENEVA: Permanent Representative of Kuwait to the European headquarters of the United Nations and international organizations in Geneva and periodical President of the Organization of Islamic Cooperation (OIC) Ambassador Jamal Mohammed Al-Ghuneim held a reception in cooperation with the OIC Office in Geneva yesterday at the United Nations headquarters on the occasion of the 47th anniversary of the founding of the OIC.

The ceremony was attended by heads of international organizations in Geneva and officials of the United Nations and its specialized agencies as well as members of the diplomatic corps and a group of academics and intellectuals. At the same time, the Kuwaiti ambassador stressed that Islamic countries are determined on the importance not to give attention to attempts aimed to weaken this organization through questioning its role or level of performance, but to move forward in its role both within the United Nations Human Rights Council, the Conference on Disarmament, the World Trade Organization and other world bodies.— KUNA

KUWAIT URGED TO MONITOR CARDIOVASCULAR DISEASES

KUWAIT: On World Heart Day 2016 Sabah Al Ahmad Cardiac Center Amiri Hospital Kuwait along with World Heart Federation calling on government to strengthen monitoring and surveillance of cardiovascular health. World Heart Federation calls on all governments to implement reliable and fit for purpose surveillance and monitoring systems for cardiovascular disease (CVD) in order to better prevent, treat and control the world's biggest killer.

The World Heart Federation is emphasizing the need to ensure that every country has information on the World Health Organization Global Action Plan (GAP) Targets and a set of measures or indicators on quality of care appropriate to a range of contexts including the primary healthcare level. This call is tied to the strengthening of health systems, in particular monitoring and surveillance, by providing complementary recommendations to governments drawn from the World Health Organization NCD Global Action Plan 2013-2020 and the Health Data Collaborative, supported by the World Bank, USAID and WHO.

Dr Salim Yusuf, President, WHF, says: "We know that robust monitoring and surveillance are key to guiding what policies and strategies we implement and whether they are successful in reducing CVD rates. Countries that measure these rates are also the ones which demonstrate the greatest reductions in CVD. "We are calling on governments to reinforce their commitment to preventing premature deaths by taking some key steps toward better surveillance of their populations

Dr Mohammed Al Jarallah Director and Head of the Department of Cardiology, Sabah Al Ahmad Cardiac Center said: In establishing systems for monitoring the burden and treatment of CVD governments should prioritize the following actions: Strengthen vital and cause of death registration systems (to better record statistics on births and causes of death). Include details of CVD key interventions (for example services provided, numbers of people being treated) in existing health information

Collect information on a representative subsample of the population on the prevalence and quality of care of patients with hypertension and CVD; and undertake periodic data collection on the behavioural and metabolic risk factors (harmful use of alcohol, physical inactivity, tobacco use, unhealthy diet, overweight and obesity, raised blood pressure, raised blood glucose, and hyperlipidemia), and determinants of risk exposure such as marketing of food, tobacco and alcohol in a sub sample of the population.

Why is this needed?

To monitor public health/health system interventions; To support evidence-based advocacy, policy development and coordinated action; To ensure that appropriate prevention and treatment services are provided based on need; To reinforce political commitment to prevent and control.

Dr Raja Dashti, Chairman and Head of Internal Medicine and Consultant Cardiologist Amiri Hospital comments: CVD - including heart disease and stroke - is the leading cause of death globally, claiming 17.5 million lives each year. However, at least 80% of premature deaths from CVD could be avoided by addressing risk factors such as tobacco use, raised blood pressure and physical inactivity; and improving the use of simple treatments after a heart attack or stroke.


"CVD is the world's number one cause of death and tackling it must happen on the global stage. To achieve this we need accurate data upon which countries can build their health strategies, so we very much welcome this call on national government to improve surveillance and monitoring of CVD. No matter what the country, we all benefit from shining the spotlight on the gaps and opportunities in global data collection."

Dr Rajesh Rajan, Cardiologist Sabah Al Ahmad Cardiac Center, Amiri Hospital pointed out the impact such preventive care and activities and also said it will help in following:- Develop and/or strengthen CVD surveillance capacity. - Effective national and regional policies for the prevention and treatment of CVD. - Progress towards meeting the Global Monitoring Framework (GMF) Targets including; reduction in raised blood pressure, reduction in tobacco use, improved access to essential medicines and technologies, improved access to drug therapy and counseling.

Every country has reliable information on o CVD mortality o Prevalence of CVD (number of people living with CVD) o Prevalence of CVD risk factors (at least hypertension and smoking) o Quality of preventive, primary and acute care. Cardiovascular disease burdens individuals in their most productive years by creating deaths, disabilities and illnesses at early ages that are largely preventable. In Kuwait the impact of CVD is much higher and around 45% of the total death are due to CVD. Cardiovascular disease and non-communicable diseases threaten international development by placing an incredible strain on national economies due to high medical costs and lower worker productivity as a result of premature death and disability.

COURT DEFERS TERROR CASE

KUWAIT: The Criminal Court deferred a hearing into the "Abdaly cell" terrorism case, in which 26 defendants are involved, to Oct 11 for further questioning of the accused. The court held its first hearing on Aug 16 to examine the case sent to it by the court of appeals. On Jan 12, 2016, the criminal court sentenced two of the defendants, the first and the 23rd on the list of defendants, to death, while one of the accused was sentenced to life imprisonment. Other defendants in the case received sentences from five, 10 and 15 years in prison. In Sept 2015, the public prosecutor lodged criminal charges against the terrorist cell, in which the 26 defendants were put on trial over possession of huge caches of weapons and ammunition, as well as allegedly spying for Iran and Hezbollah.

Manager banned

A remand judge yesterday released the manager of Kuwait health office in Washington on KD 500 bail and banned her from leaving Kuwait. The defendant, a female citizen, denied all charges after being detained for 21 days over embezzlement charges.

Minister of Electricity and Water Ahmed Al-Jassar yesterday referred a contract to supply spare parts for a power plant to the public prosecution to investigate suspicions of squandering of public funds, as pointed out by MP Ali Al-Khamees. HARDLINE FORMER PRESIDENT OF IRAN WILL NOT SEEK RE-ELECTION

TEHRAN: Iran's hard-line former president Mahmoud Ahmadinejad said yesterday he won't run in next year's presidential election, ending weeks of speculation after the country's supreme leader discouraged his candidacy. Ahmadinejad could have posed a strong challenge to President Hassan Rouhani, a moderate who many believe will seek a second term after his administration struck the landmark nuclear accord with world powers. It also could have exposed the still-lingering wounds in Iran from the widespread unrest that followed Ahmadinejad's contested 2009 re-election.

"By the grace of God, I am proud to continue as a small soldier for the revolution," Ahmadinejad said in a letter to Supreme Leader Ayatollah Ali Khamenei. Ahmadinejad, known for repeatedly questioning the scale of the Holocaust, predicting Israel's demise and expanding Iran's contested nuclear program, had been touring the country, fueling rumors of a political comeback.

He also wrote and publicly released a letter to President Barack Obama in August asking him to "quickly fix" a US Supreme Court ruling that allows families of people killed in attacks linked to Iran to collect damages from the country's frozen assets. Ahmadinejad previously served two four-year terms from 2005 to 2013. Under Iranian law, he became eligible to run again after four years out of office, but he remains a polarizing figure, even among fellow hard-liners.

Two of his former vice presidents have been

jailed for corruption since he left office. Iran's economy suffered under heavy international sanctions during his administration because of Western suspicions that Tehran was secretly pursuing nuclear weapons. Iran insists its nuclear program is for peaceful purposes. Internally, many associate Ahmadinejad with the aftermath of Iran's disputed 2009 presidential election. His victory sparked massive protests and a sweeping crackdown in which thousands of people were detained, dozens killed and others tortured.

'Harmful of the country'

The memory of the unrest likely sparked comments Monday by Khamenei, who said he recommended an unnamed candidate not seek office as it would bring about a "polarized situation" that would be "harmful for the county." In his letter yesterday, Ahmadinejad confirmed that Khamenei was referring to him. "You advised me it's not expedient to run and I announced my obedience, following my explanations of my plans," Ahmadinejad wrote. "I hereby inform you regarding the supreme leader's considerations, I have no plan for next year's elections."

Ahmadinejad said the two met on Aug 30. It wasn't immediately clear what transpired in the weeks between, though it appears Khamenei's comments Monday likely pushed Ahmadinejad into making his announcement. Without Ahmadinejad in the running, it's unclear whether hard-liners will be able to put up a candidate with similar name

dential candidates are barred from publicly campaigning for the May 17 election until roughly the end of April, making it even harder to find possible challengers. — AP

GERMANY MOSQUE BOMBED AHEAD OF UNITY CELEBRATIONS

XENOPHOBIC AND NATIONALIST MOTIVE SUSPECTED

DRESDEN: Bomb attacks hit a mosque and an international convention centre in the eastern German city of Dresden, police said yesterday, adding that they suspected a xenophobic and nationalist motive. No one was injured in the blasts late Monday in a city that has become a hotspot for far-right protests and hate crimes following Germanyis huge migrant influx.

ìAlthough no one has claimed the attack, we assume a xenophobic motive,î said Dresden police chief Horst Kretzschmar. ìWe also suspect a connection with celebrations next weekend for the Day of German Unityî on Monday, October 3. Dresden will host national celebrations Monday to mark 26 years since the reunification of East and West Germany, to be attended by Chancellor Angela Merkel and President Joachim Gauck. ìWe have now switched to crisis mode,î Kretzschmar said, with police deployed

to guard the cityís two mosques and an Islamic

The first homemade bomb went off around 9:50 pm local time (1950 GMT) Monday and damaged the door of the mosque while the imam and his family were inside. The second blast about 25 minutes later happened at the main venue for next Mondayís festivities, the cityís international convention centre which also includes a hotel. It was partially evacuated.

Dresden, a Baroque city in Germanyis excommunist east, is also the birthplace of the anti-immigration PEGIDA street movement, short for Patriotic Europeans Against the Islamisation of the Occident. Its members have angrily protested against the influx of refugees and migrants that last year brought one million asylum seekers to Europeis biggest economy. About a dozen demonstrations are planned over

the long weekend, by both PEGIDA and by anti-

Saxony state premier Stanislaw Tillich called the icowardlyî bombings an iattack on freedom of religion and on the values of an enlightened societyî that could easily have claimed lives. German Interior Minister Thomas de Maiziere said the mosque attack was iall the more scandalousî because it happened on the eve of the 10th annual meeting of the dialogue forum the German Islam Conference.

Saxony state saw far-right hate crimes targeting shelters for asylum seekers rise to 106 in 2015, with another 50 recorded in the first half of this year. In an annual report outlining progress since reunification, the government warned last week that growing xenophobia and right-wing extremism could threaten peace in eastern Germany. — AFP

GAZA'S LEGION OF WOUNDED BATTLE TO FORGE NEW LIVES

GAZA CITY: Every time he hears a loud noise, Imed Al-Firi hides his healthy leg under a cushion-a reflex he developed after the summer of 2014, when Israeli tank fire struck his Gaza home and robbed him of his right leg. He is among thousands of Gazans learning to live with disabilities or missing limbs after three wars between Palestinian militants in the territory and Israel since 2008. Beyond limited medical care in Gaza, they also face a lack of facilities for the disabled in the Palestinian enclave run by Islamist movement Hamas which has been under an Israeli blockade for nearly a decade. More than 75,000 Gazans suffer from some form of disability, a third of them linked to conflict in the territory of 1.9 million people, according to the International Committee of the Red Cross. The 2014 war alone, the deadliest of the three conflicts, wounded 11,000 people.

Firi, 50, often sees Mohannad Aid, 20, at Gaza's clinic for polio and prosthetic limbs. Aid and Firi have at least two things in common-both are missing a leg and are unemployed, like nearly half of Gaza's population. Aid lost his leg from rocket fire while returning home from a mosque in 2014. He has since become better at managing his prosthetic leg-two metal rods connected by a joint at knee level, with a red-and-black tennis shoe at the bottom.

His physiotherapist Ahmed Abu Shaaban says he has made impressive progress, but everyday life remains a chalenge for him in Gaza. "Some streets are not paved and are only dirt, others are potholed and rutted," said Abu Shaaban. "Construction is chaotic." Firi says little is done to ease conditions for the disabled despite Gaza's legion of war wounded. He has started an organization for people in his situation and has organized protests to demand improvements.

When met by AFP, he had a letter in his pocket for the mayor of Gaza City demanding paving of a road. He wants to send another one calling for beach access for the disabled. "Everyone has the right to go to the beach, but we are not good enough for that?" Firi complained. Access to medical supplies is another source of frustration. The only factory to build prosthetic limbs in the Gaza Strip faces limited capacity, factory head Nabil Farah said, as workers surrounding him moulded and carved plastic arms and legs. "It is hard to bring raw materials into Gaza, especially

chemical products needed for production," he said.

'Give them the opportunity'

Israel strictly controls goods entering the Gaza Strip to keep out items that could be employed to build weapons or tunnels, which have been used to carry out attacks. At the same time, Gaza's border with Egypt remains largely closed. So far this year, 4,562 tons of medical materials have entered Gaza through the Kerem Shalom crossing with Israel, according to COGAT, the Israeli defense ministry unit that oversees it. COGAT says it has made an effort to improve health assistance for Gazans, though UN officials and others have called for a complete lifting of the blockade.

Israeli authorities hand out limited numbers of permits to Gazans to leave the territory. Every day hundreds of Gazans enter Israel — 22,635 in 2016 including those accompanying them-for treatment there or for care in the West Bank or abroad, COGAT says. However, in July one out of three were refused or did not receive a response to their request to leave Gaza to visit a hospital, according to the World Health Organization. The total number of those who made a request was 2,040. Those who were refused or did not receive a response included 146 children, the WHO said.

Orthopaedics is among the medical specialties most in demand in Gaza, along with oncology, pediatrics, haematology and ophthalmology, the WHO says. "More than 2,300 Gazans need a prosthetic," Farah said, while his factory supplies between 12 and 18 people a month with assistance from the Red Cross. Psychological counseling is also required to help them adjust, said Mamadou Sow, head of the ICRC's Gaza

Such counseling is not only to help people learn to live without a limb, but also to assist their social integration, he said. There is also a need to push for access for the disabled in public spaces and convince "authorities and the population at large that the disabled can do great things if we give them the opportunity," said Sow. Firi says he has "gained confidence in himself" and learnt that he can help others, particularly through organizing them.

"We are an engine for society, not a handicap," he said. — AFP

TURKEY DISMISSES 87 SPY STAFF OVER FAILED COUP

ISTANBUL: Turkey has dismissed 87 staff from its spy agency over alleged links to the failed July 15 coup, state media said yesterday, in the first purge of one of the country's most powerful institutions. National Intelligence Organization (MIT) has suspended 141 personnel in an internal probe over links to US-based preacher Fethullah Gulen who Ankara alleges was behind the coup. Of these, 87 have now been expelled, the Anadolu news agency said. Criminal complaints have been lodged against 52 of them, it

In a separate development, Turkish police detained 41 suspects from a charity organization Kimse Yok Mu? (Is There Anyone There?) for alleged links to Gulen, Anadolu news agency reported. Turkey has fired tens of thousands of people from state institutions in the wake of the attempted putsch but this was the first announcement of dismissals from the powerful spy agency. Turkey's secret service was widely criticized for not warning authorities about the coup bid and the government has acknowledged a vacuum in gathering intelligence. The 87 staff from the Turkish intelligence will no longer be able to work in another state institution after their dismissal, Anadolu also reported.

Fidan under fire

There had been intense speculation over the future of Turkish spy chief Hakan Fidan after President Recep Tayyip Erdogan publicly said intelligence lapses had helped the coup. The Turkish strongman had admitted he himself found about the coup not from the intelligence service but from his brother-in-law, and that he had been unable to reach Fidan on the night of the putsch.

Fidan was named to head MIT by the Turkish president in May 2010 after serving as his foreign policy adviser for three years. Erdogan, who described Fidan as his "secret keeper", had made no secret of his discontent when the spy chief in February 2015 resigned as head of MIT with the aim of becoming an MP from the president's ruling party. But later Fidan withdrew his candidacy and remained at the top of the intelligence service. In a picture that sparked a frenzy on social media, the previously cleanshaven Fidan was shown in a meeting with the president in the aftermath of the coup in July with a moustache. Several top ministers, including Foreign Minister Mevlut Cavusoglu, have grown facial hair in recent months in what is widely seen as a sign of loyalty to the mustachioed head of state. — AFP

STRUGGLE BETWEEN LIFE AND DEATH ON BAGHDAD STREET

BAGHDAD: It had become something they just had to do: whenever the main shopping street in Baghdad's Karrada district was bombed, Hussein Al-Fatlawi and his brother would rush to help. When the Islamic State jihadist group set off a car bomb on Karrada Dakhil Street shortly before midnight on September 5, 24-year-old Hussein was halfway up the stairs to his flat. "I was about to reach my home when I heard the explosion... I pulled out my phone and called my brother Ali to get him to meet me so we could run to help the victims," he said.

Ali, 26, did not pick up and Hussein had a bad feeling. Instead of going to the bomb site, he started searching for his brother and eventually found him at the morgue, dead. Ali and Hussein had been among the first to reach the nearby site of a July attack, the bloodiest to ever hit Baghdad, that killed at least 323 people. The massive blast set fire to two shopping arcades on either side of Karrada's busy thoroughfare, burning many people alive. The 40-day mourning period is over and the charred bomb site is being cleaned. But everyone in the neighborhood knew at least one, sometimes many, of those killed and Karrada is still in shock.

"We used to rush out as soon as we heard a bombing and head to the site to help out with transporting the dead and wounded to hospital," said Hussam, the Fatlawi brothers' uncle. "Since these bombings started, Ali felt a lot of empathy for the victims. Whenever there was a blast, he and his brother were always the first among the volunteers," he said.

Countless bombings

A busy shopping area on the east bank of the Tigris River, Karrada has seen countless bombings since the 2003 US-led invasion. Karrada Dakhil is a favourite spot for many Baghdadis to

also a prized target for the Islamic State group's seemingly endless supply of bombs. There were phases, before IS swept through Iraq and tried to set up its Islamic "caliphate", during which several large bombings would rock Baghdad every day. On the street, the number of times a cafe or restaurant has been destroyed in bombings is almost part of its pedigree. — AFP

CUBA CALLS UPON GLOBALIZING SOLIDARITY

UNITED STATES: As part of the General Debate of the United Nations General Assembly's High-Level Meeting on Antimicrobial Resistance, Cuba was represented today by Abelardo Moreno Fernandez, Deputy Minister of Foreign Affairs who noted it is shameful that some 18,000 children around the world die every day from poverty-related causes or that only 70 per cent of the world population has adequate social protection coverage.

CHARLOTTE CITY COUNCIL BLASTED OVER POLICE SHOOTING REACTION

CHARLOTTE: Angry Charlotte residents verbally lashed City Council members for hours, complaining about what they called unaccountable police officers and civilian leaders who have failed to force change as the city marked a week of protests since a police officer fatally shot a black man.

At its Monday night meeting, the council opened the floor to dozens of residents who voiced their opinions about the Sept 21 shooting of Kevin Lamont Scott by Charlotte-Mecklenburg police. Many called on Mayor Jennifer Roberts, Police Chief Kerr Putney and other council members to resign on the seventh day of protests since the shooting. "It's going to be rough in these streets until you give justice to our people," said the Rev. Milton Williams, the final speaker in a three-hour string. "Our city's in an uproar, and you did not respond."

Many of the speakers carried signs expressing their anger. One man's sign called for the repeal of legislation taking effect on Saturday blocking the release of police video without a court order. Many speakers demanded that police release all video footage of the confrontation. Scott's family and advocacy groups complain that the department divulged only about three minutes of footage from two cameras. They have urged the police department to release all other video footage it has, as well as audio recordings of com-

munications that could clarify how the situation unfolded. A media coalition is also requesting more footage. "We have no reason to trust you, and you're giving us even less," Khasha Harris told City Council members.

Decades in the making

Some speakers brought their children, not only to share in the moment, but in several instances, to address the council. Many in the crowd were brought to tears by the comments of Zianna Oliphant, a child who needed a stool to be seen over the lectern. "It's a shame that our fathers and brothers are killed and we can't see them anymore," Zianna said. "It's a shame that we have to go through that graveyard and bury him. We need our fathers and brothers to be by our side."

Council member Kenny Smith said the council should be listening and taking action to answer the concerns. "The unrest here has been decades in the making," council member Al Alston said. "Tuesday was the boiling point, and it's getting hotter." The footage released so far of Scott's shooting left questions in many people's minds - including whether he was holding a gun, as police have stated. Scott's family said he didn't have a weapon. The footage includes body camera video from one officer, but not the black officer who fatally wounded Scott. — AP

MODERATOR LESTER WORKED TO KEEP CONTROL OF DEBATE

EVEN TRUMP AGREES: 'I THOUGHT HE WAS GREAT'

NEW YORK: After initially taking a hands-off approach to the two strong-willed presidential candidates before him, NBC's Lester Holt more aggressively challenged Hillary Clinton and Donald Trump as the general election's first debate wore on and he warmed to the oftenthankless role of moderator. Holt asked questions about job creation and home-grown terrorism in Monday's first debate, and also hit on specific issues regarding the birther controversy, Trump's decision not to release his tax returns and Clinton's email scandal. The sole journalist onstage, Holt was responsible for the questions asked and for steering the conversation.

While some Republicans rushed online to accuse the NBC News veteran of being unfair to their candidate, Trump himself praised Holt for his work. "I thought it was great," Trump said, adding that he thought Holt had done a very good job. It was the NBC "Nightly News" anchor's first general election debate, after doing a Democratic forum during the primaries. Holt has been NBC's top anchor for more than a year, taking over from Brian Williams after Williams was caught lying about his role in news stories.

Letting the conversation flow

With an initial discussion about the economy and trade practices, Holt let the conversation flow and the candidates go after each other. It's a strategy many debate moderators prefer but left him vulnerable to charges that he had lost control of the action. The first subject area that Holt introduced, intended to last for 15 minutes, stretched for nearly 45 minutes.

He constantly needed to remind the candidates to stick to time limits, which was tough when they decided to steamroll over him. At one point he said, "20 seconds" when Trump tried to make a point, but it stretched to 55 seconds before Holt could get in another question. Later in the debate, Holt interjected some factchecking, raising Trump's ire in the process. That had been a major issue going into Monday evening, with the Clinton campaign arguing that cking should be part o job and the Trump campaign saying it should be left up to the candidates.

Holt's NBC colleague, Matt Lauer, was criticized for not challenging Trump at a forum earlier this month when the candidate said he had opposed the war in Iraq - when there is interview footage from 2002 that shows otherwise. The issue came up again Monday, with Trump saying it was "wrong, wrong, wrong" that he ini-

tially supported the war. "I was against the war in Iraq," Trump said. Replied Holt: "The record shows otherwise." "The record shows that I'm right," Trump argued. When Trump advocated for the "stop-and-frisk" police policy, Holt told him that it was declared unconstitutional in New York largely because it singled out black and Latino young men. "No, you're wrong," Trump said, adding that he believed the court decision would have been overturned on appeal.

Holt later brought up the issue of Trump's questioning whether President Barack Obama had been born in the United States, and asked him what made him conclude this month that Obama was indeed a legitimate citizen. Trump twice did not address the question, and cut Holt off when he tried a third approach. "What do you say to American people of color..." Holt started asking. "I say nothing," Trump replied.

Loud and clear

Republicans criticized Holt after the debate for bringing up more issues that were damaging to Trump and ignoring issues that would have reflected more poorly on Clinton. "Lester Holt clearly heard cries of his colleagues in the liberal media to be tough on Trump and ease up on Hillary loud and clear," tweeted Brent Bozell, president of the conservative media watchdogs Media Research Center.

One media observer, columnist Nicholas Kristof of The New York Times, tweeted that "Lester Holt has done a fine job as moderator. Not too intrusive, moving things along, factchecking when necessary." In a reflection of the attention paid to Holt, his voter registration became an issue last week. "Lester is a Democrat," Trump said in a Fox News Channel interview. "It's a phony system. They are all Democrats." Holt, however, is a registered Republican, according to New York state voting records.

Asked about the misstatement on Monday, Trump campaign manager Kellyanne Conway said on MSNBC that it wasn't a lie because Trump didn't know Holt's voter registration. CNN's Anderson Cooper and ABC's Martha Raddatz will team up to moderate the second presidential debate, with Chris Wallace of Fox News in charge of the third. — AP

IOWA BRACES FOR HIGHEST FLOODWATERS SINCE 2008

CEDAR RAPIDS: Residents of Cedar Rapids are watching anxiously as the quickly rising Cedar River threatens to inundate their city with devastating floodwaters for the second time in just over eight years. After days of sandbagging and erecting an extensive system of flood barriers, residents and officials in lowa's second-largest city were simply waiting to see how high the Cedar River would rise and what impact the

flood would have. Entire neighborhoods and the downtown area were largely abandoned as residents in lowlying areas heeded the city's call to evacuate. Schools were canceled and many businesses were closed. The river was expected to crest Tuesday at 23 feet, the second-largest flood in the city's history, behind only that of June 2008. The river level has risen to nearly 22 feet by dawn Tuesday, or 6 feet above major flood stage. Here's the situation in Cedar Rapids and other communities affected by the flooding:

Is Cedar Rapids ready for the flooding?

So far the temporary flood protection system is working, city spokeswoman Sara Baughman said Tuesday morning. Only some minor street flooding from storm sewer backup had been reported, she said. At a Monday news conference. Mayor Ron Corbett said nearly 10 miles of temporary levees have been constructed in just days, and 250,000 sandbags have been filled and placed to protect homes and businesses. More sandbags were filled Monday to beef up barriers around critical city infrastructure. The Fire Department has staged boats for water rescues on both sides of the river. The American Red Cross has opened two shelters, and a local official said more emergency workers are flying in

Why is the city relying on temporary structures?

The city has struggled since the 2008 flood to secure the funding that would be necessary to create a comprehensive flood protection system for low-lying areas on both sides of the river. Residents voted down a sales tax increase that would help pay for it years ago. Now the city is

waiting on Congress to authorize and appropriate the federal share of a plan to build the system along with investments from the state and the city. City Manager Jeff Pomeranz said lobbying for the federal money is a top priority and the project will be critical to the city's future. lowa's members of Congress are expected to push for the financing in the coming days.

Have residents in the potential flood zones been evacuated?

Officials estimate that about 50 percent of the people in those zones have left for temporary shelter elsewhere, but the officials didn't have a head count of those remaining. The mayor and other officials implored people to stay away from the evacuation zone, lest they be caught by gushing water should part of the flood protection system fail. Corbett said the city wouldn't force residents or businesspeople out of the area but asked them to use common sense in making decisions that could affect their safety and the safety of others.

What about the national guard?

It's been activated to help, and Police Chief Wayne Jerman said Monday the troops will be patrolling the evacuation zone and helping out at traffic control checkpoints to keep out unwanted visitors. Jerman also said the Iowa State Patrol and other law enforcement agencies have sent officers to help.

What's the situation upstream?

The river crested Saturday night in Waterloo and Cedar Falls, which are about 55 miles upstream from Cedar Rapids. The water levels in Cedar Falls and Waterloo were slightly lower than had been expected, but they still reached levels that were second only to those in 2008. Black Hawk County emergency manager Lori Glover said Monday that the water was dropping slowly and likely wouldn't be back to below flood stage until Thursday. She said any damage estimates would have to wait until then. In Charles City, residents put flood-damaged items out on their curbs for pickup Monday. — AP

US AIR FORCE WORKS TO BRING PRESTIGE BACK TO NUKE ROLES

sileer"-one of the key-keepers for America's nuclear bombs-whether their first career choice was to spend days on end cocooned underground in a steel bunker, and the answer is usually no. Decades after the Cold War, and frequently forgotten by a public preoccupied with the threat of terrorism, the United States still fields hundreds of Minuteman III Intercontinental Ballistic Missiles (ICBMs), dotted in silos across rural America.

The crews tasked with the unthinkable job of actually launching the Doomsday devices have been on a state of constant alert since 1963 — a posture unlikely to change for decades to come, as countries including Russia, China and now North

Korea build up their nuclear arsenals. Most airmen join the Air Force to fly, but here on the chilly, windswept plains of North Dakota, 50 miles below the Canadian border, crews work around the clock practicing for a launch they hope will never happen. It's not glamorous. Two-person crews pull 24-hour shifts in a launch control center buried deep underground.

The centers were built in the 1960s. Stepping into one is like a journey through time, with bulky, analog machines blinking in the crammed control room and an interior design that's not changed for decades. The launch crews live on a diet of burgers, fried potato nuggets and other popular American foods, and there's nowhere to shower or work out. In the event of extreme weather-not uncommon in North Dakota's harsh winters-the teams have to stay for extra shifts, sometimes getting stuck underground for 72 hours straight. They take turns sleeping during the frequent down times.

Perhaps unsurprisingly, morale has sagged in recent years, and the Air Force has been working to address a slew of quality-of-life issues. All-night fitness centers have been built on the main base, pay has gone up and the military is even

Over the next 20 years, the US Air Force will switch out the entirety of its Minuteman III fleet with an as-yetunnamed new missile known only as the Ground Based Strategic Deterrent (GBSD). The Air Force estimates the cost of the GBSD, to be introduced late in the 2020s and phased in over the following decade, will be around \$86 billion over the missiles' life cycle of about 50 years.

Lieutenant Erin Powell, who spoke to reporters Monday during a visit by Defense Secretary Ashton Carter to a "Missile Alert Facility" in the middle of a flat expanse of farmland, said joining the nuclear force was not her preferred career path, but she has come to appreciate her role. "It's very humbling," she said, speaking of her first 24-hour alert, when she realized the gravity of her job. But "when I first got my assignment, people patted me on the back and said, 'I'm so sorry for you."

The negative connotations of missile work began after the demise of the Soviet Union, as the mission gradually received a lower priority and a less-exciting career path. "I realize it feels at times that most people don't often think about your mission-which I know can be frustrating, even though in a way it's also a good thing, because it means you're doing your job," Carter told troops at nearby Minot Air Force Base.

A series of embarrassing revelations in 2014 described the state of the nuclear force, with dozens of airmen disciplined for cheating on proficiency tests. Other investigations have probed drug use. Separately, some senior officers were fired for personal misconduct, including the head of the ICBM force after he went on a drunken bender during a trip to Russia. The Pentagon in 2014 unveiled an "action plan" that included reorganizing the command structure, restoring "pride" in the mission and more funding for equipment and additional personnel. — AFP

AZERBAIJAN REFERENDUM BOOSTS STRONGMAN PREZ

EU FEARS LOSING TRUCULENT RENZI

BERLIN/PARIS: He's rude about Brussels, zone. ble efforts at reform "If Renzi gets through this referendum, it would be a huge step forward," said Merkel ally Gunther Krichbaum, chair of the parliamentary European affairs committee. But, he told Reuters: "If he doesn't get through it, Renzi will be badly damaged." In conversations with officials and policymakers around the EU, Reuters has found little sense of alarm that defeat in the referendum could trigger a political or economic crisis in the euro zone's third biggest member.

Yet there is concern that it would blunt hopes of reviving growth in Italy. It could also hinder a more dynamic partnership with Paris and Berlin to bolster the post-Brexit EU against eurosceptic parties gaining votes, not least ahead of elections in France and Germany next year. "If he doesn't pull it off, Renzi will be weakened but it's reasonable to think he can stay as prime minister," a senior French diplomat said. "But there would be institutional deadlock and so uncertainty on making progress on reforms in Italy." In common with many Italian observers, others in the EU play down the chances of Renzi's leading opponents, the insurgent 5-Star movement of comedian Beppe Grillo, turning a referendum victory into executive power, at least before elections in 2018. Even if Renzi resigns, they believe allies could continue to pursue his policies for two more years.

New EU 'trio'

A senior EU official said a flurry of contacts among the three big founders of the Union since its No 2 economy Britain voted in June to leave had created expectations that Renzi could add a vital spark to Franco-German cooperation. This could deepen the Union that has stuttered as the French economy has struggled and Paris and Berlin have diverged on how to bolster the euro

She has as defied hawks in her own party to call for Italy to be given more EU fiscal wiggle room to deal with an influx of migrants and last month's earthquake. But Merkel's room for maneuver is limited by the threat the eurosceptic AfD poses to conservative seats in a parliamentary election in a year. Allies' disquiet at her embrace of not one but two southern socialists was why, French officials believe, Merkel shared a platform at

Bratislava with Hollande alone. "We'll have to do something again with Renzi," the French diplomat said. "He simply mustn't feel we've abandoned him." In Berlin, however, Krichbaum cautioned that Merkel could not move too far toward Renzi on such issues as fiscal leniency or bringing more refugees to Germany. "The government of course has an interest in Renzi succeeding with his reforms," he said. "But it is always a fine balance and we shouldn't lose sight of our own domestic political situation. Because if we let up on reform in the euro zone ... that will strengthen ... the AfD."—Reuters

THE HAGUE: War crimes judges yesterday sentenced a Malian jihadist to nine years in jail for destroying the fabled shrines of Timbuktu, in a landmark ruling experts hope will help safeguard the world's vulnerable monuments. Judges at the International Criminal Court in The Hague found Ahmad Al-Faqi Al-Mahdi guilty of directing the 2012 attacks on the UNESCO world heritage site in northern Mali. Mahdi "supervised the destruction and gave instructions to the attackers", presiding judge Raul Pangalangan told the tribunal.

"The chamber unanimously finds that Mr Al-Mahdi is guilty of the crime of attacking protected sites as a war crime," he added, saying the crime had "significant gravity". The court "unanimously sentences you to nine years of imprisonment," Pangalangan added as Mahdi, dressed in a sober grey suit and blue-striped tie, listened intently. The landmark verdict is the first to focus solely on cultural destruction as a war crime and the first arising out of the conflict in Mali, when jihadists swept into the country's remote north in 2012.

Prosecutors will likely be satisfied having asked for a jail term of between nine and 11 years, which they said would recognize both the severity of the crime and the fact that Mahdi was the first person to plead guilty before the court. Observers say they hope the sentence will act as a deterrent to those bent on razing the world's cultural heritage, which UN chief Ban Ki-moon recently condemned for "tearing at the fabric of societies".

In an unprecedented move, Mahdi, aged between 30 and 40, last month pleaded guilty to the single war crimes charge of "intentionally directing" attacks in 2012 on nine of Timbuktu's mausoleums and the centuries-old door of the city's Sidi Yahia mosque. "Legend had it that this door had not been opened for 500 years and that its opening would lead to the last judgment," the presiding judge said. But while the court recognized the severity of the crimes targeting sites which "were dedicated to religion and historic monuments and were not military objectives," the judges also gave Mahdi credit for his guilty plea, and for his "substantial cooperation" with the prosecution.

Pickaxes and bulldozers

The slight, bespectacled man with a mop of curly hair had previously asked the pardon of his people when videos were shown of him and other Islamist extremists knocking down ancient earthen shrines with pick-axes and bulldozers. Founded between the fifth and 12th centuries by Tuareg tribes, Timbuktu has been dubbed "the city of 333 saints" and the "pearl of the desert" for the number of Muslim sages buried there.

Revered as a centre of Islamic learning during its golden age in the 15th and 16th centuries, it was however considered idolatrous by the jihadists who swept across Mali's remote north in early 2012. As the head of the so-called Hisbah or "Manners Brigade," it was Mahdi, a former teacher and Islamic scholar, who gave the orders to ransack the sites. Apologizing for his actions at the court, he said he had been overtaken by "evil spirits", urging Muslims not to follow his example.

The court found that Mahdi, was a member of the Ansar Dine, one of the jihadist groups linked to Al-Qaeda in the Islamic Maghreb which seized the northern territory before being mostly chased out by a French-led military intervention in January 2013. Even though the list of UNESCO world heritage sites appears to be growing, there is little hope that those behind attacks on monuments in Iraq and Syria will find themselves in the dock any time soon. Neither country is a signatory to the ICC's founding Rome Statute, meaning that without a mandate from the UN Security Council an ICC investigation into such crimes is not yet possible. — AFP

BRAZIL'S WOUNDED POLITICAL GIANT LULA VOWS TO FIGHT ON

RIO DE JANEIRO: Brazilian ex-president he was president. A trial could fatally dam-Luiz Inacio Lula da Silva hinted strongly at seeking a return to power Monday in a fiery speech that dismissed corruption charges against him as persecution. Lula, who was massively popular when he left office in 2010 and remains a giant of the Latin American left, was campaigning in western Rio de Janeiro on behalf of Jandira Feghali, a communist candidate running for mayor in local elections next Sunday. But the appearance before some 1,000 excited activists in front of a brick church was far more about Lula's own campaign to make a comeback at the 2018 presidential

"You will be my electoral support in 2018," he said to enthusiastic cheers, also vowing "to keep fighting for this country." A one time barely literate shoeshine boy who founded the Workers' Party or PT and became one of Brazil's most influential presidents, Lula spent much of the halfhour speech recalling his achievements in reducing poverty and expanding education. "I proved that it's possible for people to change the history of this country," he said. "In Brazil the poor stopped being a problem. The poor became part of the solution." Lula, 70, was on friendly ground. The small but impassioned crowd cheered loudly, beat on drums and chanted his name. Supporters lit red flares, engulfing the public square in thick smoke. But these days, Lula needs all the friends he can get.

Lula's downfall?

Federal prosecutors have charged him with taking bribes in a vast embezzlement scheme centered on state oil company Petrobras that they say he oversaw while age his electoral ambitions. Multiple former allies have already been investigated or indicted in the sprawling probe codenamed Operation Car Wash, the latest being Antonio Palocci, a former finance minister who was arrested earlier Monday. Another former finance minister, Guido Mantega, was detained last Thursday.

And in another blow to Lula's legacy, his handpicked successor Dilma Rousseff was pushed out of the presidency in an impeachment trial this August and replaced by a center-right leader, Michel Temer. Lula ridiculed the youthful corruption task force as "boy prosecutors" and said his enemies "persecuted the PT to stop me being a candidate in 2018." Lula won plaudits in Brazil and around the world for lifting tens of millions of people from poverty with social programs while at the same time making the huge country relatively investor friendly.

However, that record is increasingly under strain as the scale of corruption during those years becomes clear and the economy, which was heavily dependent on high world commodity prices, founders. Lula, wearing a brown suit with no tie, remains a powerful orator, alternating between angry shouts and emotion-filled near whispers. Defiant against what he considers to be a campaign to diminish his historic role and to destroy the PT, he is not shy about blowing his own trumpet.

'They say Lula compares himself to Jesus Christ," he said, referring to mocking accusations that he thinks too highly of himself. "I don't compare myself to Jesus Christ," he said, before adding, "but I, too, was persecuted." — AFP

PAKISTAN SLAMS UN SPEECH AS A 'LITANY OF FALSEHOODS'

ISLAMABAD: Islamabad has branded an address by India's foreign minister to the UN in which she accused Pakistan of terrorism in disputed Kashmir as a "litany of falsehoods". Tensions between the longtime rivals have spiked over a recent attack on an Indian army base in Kashmir that New Delhi has blamed on Pakistan-based militants.

Addressing the UN General Assembly on

Monday, Indian Foreign Minister Sushma Swaraj said: "Pakistan remains in denial. It persists in the belief that such attacks will enable it to obtain the territory it covets. "My firm advice to Pakistan is: abandon this dream. Let me state unequivocally that Jammu and Kashmir is an integral part of India and will always remain so."

Kashmir has been split between India and Pakistan since the end of British rule in 1947.

Both claim the disputed Himalayan territory in its entirety and have fought two wars over it. The Indian army has blamed the latest attack, in which 18 soldiers and four attackers were killed, on the Pakistan-based militant group Jaish-e-Mohammad. The group was also implicated in an audacious attack in January on an Indian air force base in Pathankot in the northern state of Punjab, that left seven soldiers dead.

Pakistan responded by calling Swaraj's speech a "litany of falsehoods" that distorted history, and denied its forces had aided the army base attack. "These allegations are designed principally to deflect global attention from the brutalities being perpetrated by India's over half a million occupation force against innocent and unarmed Kashmiri children, women and men," said a statement by its foreign office released late Monday.

"Jammu and Kashmir never was and can never be an integral part of India. It is a disputed territory, the final status of which has yet to be determined in accordance with several resolutions of the UN Security Council." More than 80 people have been killed in ongoing unrest in Kashmir since July 8 when a young militant leader was shot dead by Indian soldiers, sparking one of the deadliest bouts of violence to hit the region in decades. Several rebel groups have fought an estimated 500,000 Indian forces deployed in Kashmir, demanding independence for the Muslim-majority region or its merger with Pakistan. Tens of thousands of people have died in the fighting, most of them civilians. — AFP

The law, which comes into effect Wednesday will make it illegal for government employees, private school teachers and journalists to accept meals worth 30,000 won (\$26) or more.

"The number of reservations have recently fallen sharply as customers are apparently worried they might be caught in breach of the law," Roh Young-Hee told AFP. "There are meals of different price ranges in the world, but with 30,000 won you cannot produce decent Korean dishes," she added. The legislation, the latest effort to curb low level corruption endemic in South Korea, targets teachers bribed by parents to give better grades, journalists paid to give favorable publicity and officials bought off by businessmen to speed up bureaucratic processes.

The law has prompted some restaurateurs to

"Instead of expensive Korean beef, we are now using imported US beef for our new dinner set priced at 29,800 won," Restaurant Condu manager Han Yoon-Joo said. The ban also forbids teachers, officials and journalists accepting gifts worth 50,000 won or higher, and cash gifts above 100,000 won for weddings or funerals. Offenders who accept gifts worth more than a million won will face a jail sentence of up to three years, or fines of up to 30 million won. Ensuing public uproar inspired the new law, the "Improper Solicitation and Graft Act", an attempt to tighten loopholes in the country's existing anti-graft legislation. NGOs have welcomed the law, expressing hope it will help enhance transparency.

Skepticism

However, the law has been greeted with wariness in some quarters. "We will closely monitor whether the authorities will attempt to take advantage of the law by applying the law arbitrarily in a bid to tame the media and limit their normal reporting practice," the Journalists' Association of Korea said in a statement.

Some critics say the law's targeting of private sector workers-journalists and school teachers-is potentially unconstitutional and that the government rushed the law through as a sop to public opinion. "Punishment can serve as a short-term measure, but for a long-term effect, all that matters is education" aimed at raising public awareness against corruption, said Kim Young-chul, president of the Korean Association for Anti-Corruption Policy Studies. —AFP

COLOMBO: Sri Lankan police yesterday exhumed the body of a prominent anti-establishment newspaper editor as part of an investigation into his murder, widely blamed on the regime of former strongman president Mahinda Rajapakse. Lasantha Wickrematunga, a fierce critic of Rajapakse's government, was killed by unidentified gunmen as he drove to work in Colombo seven years ago.

The new administration has reopened the investigation into his killing, which sparked an international outcry and shone a spotlight on allegations of deadly violence directed against the media. Wickrematunga, chief editor of the Sunday Leader newspaper, wrote an article

before his death in which he forecast that the Rajapakse government would murder him. "When finally I am killed, it will be the government that kills me," wrote Wickrematunga, who endured years of harassment and intimidation for his work, in the article published in the Guardian and the New Yorker.

Yesterday police swarmed onto Wickrematunga's grave site at Colombo's main cemetery and erected two white tents after a magistrate ordered a fresh autopsy. "The magistrate is present with a team of doctors," said Athula S Ranagala, a lawyer for the Wickrematunga family, outside the cemetery where journalists were gathered. "The family is

happy with the progress of the case," he added. President Maithripala Sirisena last year slammed police for dragging their feet on investigations into the 52-year-old's death and into other high-profile murders during Rajapakse's rule. Sirisena swept Rajapakse from office in a 2015 general election, pledging action against criminals and corrupt individuals during the for-

mer strongman's decade in power.

The case was reopened last year after a former minister in Rajapakse's government accused the deposed president's brother, Gotabhaya Rajapakse, of running a death squad and ordering the hit against the editor. Gotabhaya, then secretary to the defense ministry, has denied any involvement. But rights groups say there is strong evidence the military played a role. An army intelligence officer was arrested in July in connection with the killing. Wickrematunga and his newspaper had accused Gotabhaya of corruption over the purchase of second-hand aircraft and arms for the military.

Another autopsy was ordered this month after scrutiny of medical examinations showing different results, including one that suggested he was stabbed. Journalists gathered outside the cemetery yesterday but were blocked by police from entering, while the gravesite was covered with black plastic and the magistrate involved spoke with cemetery workers. Ranagala said doctors were expected to examine the body at the facilities of the island's judicial medical officer in Colombo. Wickrematunga started the Sunday Leader with his brother Lal Wickrematunga 22 years ago, building it into one of the most vocal anti-establishment newspapers in the country.

The newspaper was highly critical of rights abuses by troops against ethnic minority Tamils during the island's long-running separatist conflict that ended in 2009. Some 17 journalists and media employees were killed in Sri Lanka under Rajapakse's regime. —AFP

TYPHOON MEGI LEAVES TRAIL OF DESTRUCTION IN TAIWAN

TAIPEI: The third typhoon to hit Taiwan in two weeks killed four people and injured scores yesterday, bringing violent winds and heavy rain as schools and offices closed. Typhoon Megi forced thousands to evacuate their homes and played havoc with rail and road networks as it made landfall in the eastern county of Hualien in the early afternoon.

One man aged 40 died in a car accident in high winds while a 65-year-old man was killed when he was hit by falling scaffolding, and a 17-year-old boy drowned when his boat overturned, authorities said, with the deaths all in the south. Also in the south, a 48-year-old man fell to his death as he was repairing the roof of a house. At least 167 people were injured, including seven Japanese tourists and a local guide when their bus was bowled over by winds on a highway in central Taiwan, according to the national fire agency.

Billboards and scaffolding were torn down while trees were uprooted and roofs ripped off. Television footage showed waves surging past breakwaters in the northeastern county of Yilan and outlying Orchid Island. Over 11,000 people have been evacuated from their homes and nearly 3,000 are in shelters, according to the Central Emergency Operation Centre. Over two million households have lost power and more than 35,000 households are without water.

Four hundred international and domes-

tic flights were cancelled as of yesterday afternoon, and over 400 delayed. Most trains and ferries were halted. In the capital Taipei, which was also lashed by downpours and winds, bus services and overground metro trains were suspended as some roads were flooded. More than 1,000 millimeters of rain had fallen in mountainous areas of Yilan as of yesterday afternoon, according to the weather bureau.

It said accumulated rainfall in some mountainous areas could reach 1,300 millimeters before the storm moves on, increasing the risk of landslides. "Typhoon Megi has weakened slightly in the past three hours but it will continue to bring winds and rains to Taiwan till tomorrow," said weather bureau forecaster Hung Jensheng. At 1000 GMT Megi was 40 kilometers south of the central city of Taichung, packing gusts of up to 191 kilometers per hour. It is moving at 15 kilometers per hour.

More than 35,000 soldiers are on standby to help with disaster relief. Ahead of the storm, 3,700 tourists had been evacuated at the weekend from Orchid Island and Green Island, Hualien and Taitung were first to be hit by the storm. Those areas are still recovering from damage brought by Super Typhoon Meranti earlier this month-the strongest storm for 21 years to hit Taiwan. Meranti, which left one dead in Taiwan before killing another 28 as it moved to eastern China, was followed closely by the smaller Typhoon Malakas. — AFP

DUTERTE: AFTER TOUGH TALK, DAMAGE CONTROL PREVAILS

MANILA: The new Philippine president uses an expletive to warn key ally Barack Obama not to lecture him on human rights and, in another impromptu speech, declares a dramatic policy change in policy such as removing US counterterrorism forces out of his country's volatile south. His key officials walk back the remarks and say everything is normal. And the world wonders which pronouncement is the one that will stick. Impassioned speeches by Rodrigo Duterte about the United States, the European Union and the United Nations have repeatedly led his government to issue clarifications, though he has been on the job less than three months. Here's a sampling of Duterte's broadsides - and the ensuing clarifications by him or other Philippine officials.

'Sob' (but won't cut umbilical cord)

THE STATEMENT: "I do not have any master except the Filipino people, nobody but nobody. You must be respectful. Do not just throw questions. Putang ina, I will swear at you in that forum." Duterte in a Sept 5 speech, using the Tagalog phrase for "son of a bitch" in answer to a reporter, who asked what he'll do if President Barack Obama questions his deadly anti-drug fight when they meet in Laos during the annual summit of leaders of the 10-nation Association of Southeast **Asian Nations**

THE BACKTRACK: Obama responded by canceling a much-awaited meeting with Duterte, who expressed regret over his remarks. The two leaders, however, met informally in a holding room before a gala dinner in Laos, where Duterte said he told Obama the SOB remark wasn't directed at him. The brash Duterte capped the tempestuous week in US-Philippine ties by discussing, in another Laos meeting with Obama and other world leaders, how US colonial forces killed Muslims in his country's south in the early 1900s. Back home, Duterte railed at the US again in a speech but said he would not "cut our umbilical cord to countries we are allied with."

Migraine or principles?

THE STATEMENT: "I purposely did not attend the bilateral talks between ASEAN countries and ... the president of the United States. I really skipped that ... Now, the reason is not I am anti-West. The reason is not, I do not like the Americans. It's simply a matter of principle for me." Duterte in a Sept 12 speech at the Malacanang presidential palace

THE BACKTRACK: The remarks by Duterte,

who has been critical of Obama and US security policies, came four days after his much-noticed absence from the summit of ASEAN leaders and the US president in the Laotian capital of Vientiane. Duterte's spokesman, Martin Andanar, and at least three Cabinet officials, however, told the media in Vientiane at the time that the Philippine leader couldn't attend the annual ASEAN-US summit because he had a migraine and wasn't feeling well.

Driving US forces out of the south

THE STATEMENT: "The special forces, they have to go. They have to go in Mindanao. There are many whites there, they have to go." Duterte in a Sept 12 speech. He added that he was reorienting the Philippines' foreign policy and that Americans were under threat of attack by Muslim militants. "I do not want a rift with America, but they have to go. It'll become more heated. If they see an American, the latter will really be killed. Ransomed off, then killed."

THE BACKTRACK: Duterte's key officials initially explained that his remarks were based on fears for the safety of the Americans. But his defense secretary, Delfin Lorenzana, later played down the safety issue: "The fears of the president that they might be subject to reprisal by the Muslims is a little bit, may not happen because they're only in the camp and they don't go out of the camp alone or unless they're accompanied by our troops or they are also armed. These people are also combatants. They are not civilians that are subject to kidnapping by terrorists. Duterte later suggested he only made the remarks to pacify restive Muslims opposed to the US presence in the south: "I didn't say (they) have to leave immediately. I said, 'There will be sometime in the future that I will ask the special forces to go' ... I never said, 'Get out of the Philippines,' for after all, we need them there in the (South) China Sea."

On breaking off from the UN

THE STATEMENT: "Maybe we'll just have to decide to separate from the United Nations. If you're that rude, son of a bitch, we'll just leave you. So take us out of your organization, you have done nothing here anyway." Duterte at a news conference in August, reacting to concerns by UNappointed human rights reporters about drugrelated killings.

THE BACKTRACK: Foreign Secretary Perfecto Yasay later assured that the Philippines isn't bolting out of the 193-nation world body and clarified the context of the president's remarks: "I can assure you that he remains committed to the United Nations, of which the Philippines is one of the founding members, and to the purposes and objectives of which this august body stands for." — AP

Pakistan court upholds death PENALTY FOR MENTALLY-ILL MAN

ISLAMABAD: Pakistan's Supreme Court yesterday dismissed an appeal brought by lawyers for a mentally ill prisoner facing execution, and a rights group said he could now be hanged next week. Imdad Ali, who is aged around 50, was sentenced to death for the murder of a religious cleric in 2002. He had been scheduled to hang on September 20 in a prison in the city of Vehari despite having been diagnosed

with schizophrenia. Ali received a last-minute stay of execution from the Supreme Court last week. But with that stay now expired, he could receive a new "black warrant" and face execution as early as next Tuesday. The Justice Project Pakistan (JPP), which is providing Ali with counsel, has sent a mercy petition to President Mamnoon Hussain along with

testimony from medical experts. "It is indisputable that Imdad suffers from serious mental illness," said Harriet McCulloch, deputy director of the death penalty team at international charity Reprieve. "There is therefore no doubt that, should Pakistan execute him, it will be committing a grave violation of both Pakistani and international law. — AFP

STRAY DOGS' CORPSES PARADED IN VILE INDIA STREET PROTEST

NEW DELHI: Police in southern India were investigating political activists yesterday for killing dogs, tying the corpses to a pole and parading them in public to protest against dangerous strays. The protesters from the youth wing of a local party carried the pole with the dogs hanging by their legs through the streets of a town in Kerala state on Monday. Video of the protest in Kottayam district that saw the dogs being dumped outside local government offices was broadcast on television and sparked public anger.

"We have registered a case against the protesters today for cruelty against animals and launched our investigation," Gireesh P Saradhi, deputy superintendent of Kottayam police, told AFP. "They killed and paraded five to seven dogs. We have sent the bodies for a postmortem to ascertain how they were killed," he added. The protest is the latest incident in a row over feared rising numbers of strays in the state, after a woman was mauled by a pack of dogs last month and later died.

Chief Minister Pinarayi Vijayan sparked anger recently by saying he opposed culling, while animal activists have called for sterilization and other more humane methods of curbing numbers. Thousands of stray dogs roam the streets in India, with some carrying rabies and other diseases. It was unclear why the numbers were feared to be a particular problem in Kerala, a popular state with tourists.

Saji Manjakadambil, one of those involved in the protest from the Kerala Congress (M) party, said such killings would continue unless the government acted on the problem. "We have killed these dogs.

And it's a warning that this will continue if the central and state governments do not control the stray dog menace," Manjakadambil told the NDTV network. In a statement, the Humane Society International branded Monday's protest disgraceful, saying members of political parties should not be taking the law into their own hands. — AFP

Russia intends "to give Assad a decisive victory" and "eliminate any alternative, while depriving the opposition of what it considers its 'capital", said Pierret. "An uprising chased from Aleppo will be relegated to nothing more than a peripheral

By backing government forces in Aleppo, Moscow seeks "to close that important pocket of rebels' resistance at last", said Igor Sutyagin, a Russia expert at the Royal United Services Institute in London. Outside Aleppo, only Idlib province remains a major opposition stronghold. Russia has long been a steadfast ally of Damascus, entering the conflict militarily last September to bolster Assad against rebels backed by Gulf nations and much of the West. It has also provided key diplomatic cover at the United Nations.

But Moscow now seems closer than ever to the regime, having decided after some hesitation to support the Assad government's desire to retake Aleppo by force. "Russia has decided to go all out because it no longer believes in the possibility of collaborating with the United States in Syria," said Fabrice Balanche, a Syria expert at the Washington Institute for Near East Policy.

In Damascus, analyst Bassam Abu Abdullah said Moscow was "now more in line with the Syrian government's way of thinking". "Russia was focused on the political solution, so it

began dialoguing with the Gulf and the US and other countries, but it became clear that this is not possible," said Abdullah, who runs the Damascus Centre for Strategic Studies and is close to the government. A victory in Aleppo would put Assad's regime in a strong position ahead of any new negotiations, which UN peace envoy Staffan de Mistura s still seeking despite the worsening conditions.

"Without Aleppo, Assad is nothing but a half-president. To really govern, he needs Aleppo," said Balanche. Assad already controls most of the cities he considers key in Syria -Damascus, central Hama and Homs - with only Aleppo remaining. "The Russians and the Syrians would like to take control of all of Aleppo and only afterwards negotiate with the opposition," said foreign policy analyst Fyodor Lukyanov. "Aleppo plays a key role" because the future "depends on the state of the front line that separates the fighting parties. And that line must be stable."

The heavy bombing has raised some comparisons with Moscow's strategy against Chechen separatists in the 1990s, which saw the capital Grozny nearly completely destroyed by air power and artillery. But analysts said the devastation was not yet on a similar scale. "Russia's military tactics in Aleppo are nothing like those used in Grozny," said Alexandre Golts, an independent military expert. "In Aleppo, the civilian deaths are in the dozens, if you believe the Western media, not hundreds like in Chechnya. It isn't comparable." — Agencies

Santos then stepped up to the podium and addressed a message to the thousands of FARC fighters preparing to disarm in their jungle camps. "When you begin your return to society... as head of state of the homeland that we all love, I welcome you to democracy," he said. "Swapping bullets for votes and weapons for ideas is the bravest and most intelligent decision that any rebel group could take."

The 2,500 guests at the signing included UN Secretary General Ban Ki-moon, US Secretary of State John Kerry and the Vatican's Secretary of State Pietro Parolin. An array of Latin American heads of state, including Cuban President Raul Castro, sat near the signatories on stage.

The FARC launched its guerrilla war on the Colombian government in 1964, after a peasant uprising that was crushed by the army. Over the decades, the conflict drew in several leftist rebel groups, right-wing paramilitaries and drug gangs. Under the deal, the FARC is now to relaunch as a political party. Timochenko, 57, is expected to remain its leader. At a remote jungle camp in El Diamante, western Colombia, FARC fighter David Preciado celebrated the accord by playing football with his comrades. "The government did not defeat us, and we did not defeat them. Our 52 years of war were not in vain," he told AFP. "We are aware that we have to move forward together, united... to finally achieve victory, giving power to the people by political means."

The rebels came to the negotiating table after being weakened by an army offensive led by Santos, 65, when he was defense minister. After he became president, four years of talks hosted by Cuba yielded a final, 300-page accord last month. It grants an amnesty for "political crimes" committed during the conflict, but not for the worst atrocities, such as massacres, torture and rape. The FARC's fighters are to leave their mountain and jungle hideouts and disarm in a UN-supervised process. Colombian authorities estimate their number at more than

Recent polls show the "Yes" camp in the lead to ratify the accord in the referendum on Oct 2. Some Colombians resent the concessions made to the FARC, however. Former president Alvaro Uribe led a demonstration in protest at the signing on Monday. "The Americans would not grant impunity to Osama bin Laden. The French would not grant impunity to (Islamist militants) ISIS," he said. "Why should ve Colombians grant total impunity to terrorists?"

Santos told the gathering at the signing ceremony: " prefer an imperfect accord that saves lives to a perfect war that keeps sowing death and pain." The European Union suspended the FARC from its list of terrorist groups, EU foreign policy chief Federica Mogherini said in a statement. The government has yet to begin planned peace talks with another, smaller leftist rebel group, the National Liberation Army (ELN), saying it must first stop kidnappings. — AFP

PETITION SEEKS FULL RIGHTS FOR SAUDI WOMEN

"We are suffering from this guardianship system," said Nassima Al-Sadah, an activist in Eastern Province. The campaign is an outgrowth of a Twitter hashtag in Arabic that started more than two months ago calling for an end to guardianship. "This momentum got very high after the hashtag was created" and following a report by the New York-based Human Rights Watch, Yousef said. "Saudi Arabia's male guardianship system rights in the country despite limited reforms over the last decade," the watchdog said.

Although the government no longer requires guardian permission for women to work, Human Rights Watch said many employers still demand guardian consent in order to hire a woman. Some hospitals also require a guardian's approval before carrying out medical procedures, it said. Activists said that if they have open-minded male family members, getting their consent is not a problem - although the men still have to formally complete consent papers.

Yousef said many men endorsed the petition because they consider signing the consent forms a waste of time. Activists claim that Islam does not require men to control women, and male newspaper columnist women and girls in Saudi Arabia. — AFP

Abdullah Al-Alweet agreed. "How can an illiterate father become the guardian of a highly educated woman?" he asked in a Saudi Gazette column on Monday. Sadah said "it's a government system" which only came into effect about 30 years ago, and which some women get around by paying for permission from their guardians.

Activists said that ending guardianship will make it easier for women to work at a time when the kingdom wants to boost female employment. "We cannot do it with half of the society paralyzed," Yousef said. In April, remains the most significant impediment to women's Deputy Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman announced the wide-ranging Vision 2030 plan to diversify the oil-dependent economy. Under the National Transformation Programme (NTP), which sets targets for the Vision, the proportion of women in the workforce should rise from 23 to 28 percent by 2020.

The jobless rate for Saudi women increased slightly last year to 33.8 percent, according to figures cited by the Jadwa Investment firm. A slow expansion of women's rights began under King Salman's predecessor Abdullah, who named women to the Shura Council which advises the cabinet. Last December, when women could vote and stand as candidates for the first time, at least 20 women were elected for the 2,106 contested council seats. There are roughly 10 million

CLINTON ASSAILS TRUMP IN FIERY DEBATE

Trump, a former reality TV star who eschewed a lot of debate practice, was assertive and focused early on, interrupting Clinton repeatedly. As the night wore on, he became testy and less disciplined in front of the crowd at host Hofstra University and a televised audience that may have reached upwards of a record 100 million people. Clinton's campaign manager, Robby Mook, said on CNN yesterday that Trump wanted to steer the political debate away from the policy issues that Clinton is better prepared to discuss. "Trump wants to talk about anything but the actual issues that people care about and that's because he didn't prepare. He didn't show up ready to talk about the things that matter in people's lives," Mook said.

A CNN/ORC snap poll said 62 percent of respondents felt Clinton won and 27 percent believed Trump was the winner. Trump complained yesterday that issues from Clinton's 2009-2013 tenure as secretary of state were not addressed on Monday night, including topics he has assailed her on such as her use of a private computer server for government emails, a deadly attack in Benghazi, Libya, and the Clinton Foundation charity.

Clinton, the first woman to win the presidential nomination of a major US political party, seemed to pique Trump when she brought up how Trump has insulted women. She pointed to Alicia Machado, a former Miss Universe, saying Trump had repeatedly insulted her. "He loves beauty contests, supporting them and hanging around them and he called this one 'Miss Piggy' and then he called her 'Miss Housekeeping," she said.

Trump, former owner of the Miss Universe pageants, was asked yesterday morning about Clinton's comments. He said he knew Machado and defended his insults of the woman. "She was the winner and she gained a massive amount of weight," Trump said of Machado. "And it was a real problem. We had a real problem. Not only that - her attitude - and we had a real problem with her." Venezuelan-born Machado was Miss Universe in 1996.

"You feel good tonight?" Clinton asked supporters afterward. "I sure do. We had a great debate." Trump, 70, declared himself the winner to reporters at the debate site. The 68-year-old Clinton relentlessly sought to raise questions about her opponent's temperament, business acumen and knowledge. Trump used much of his time to argue the former first lady and US senator had achieved little in public life and wanted to pursue policies begun by President Barack Obama that he said have failed to repair a shattered middle class, with jobs lost to outsourcing and excessive government regulation. Trump suggested her disavowal of a trade deal with

Asian countries was insincere. Her handling of a nuclear deal with Iran and Islamic State militancy were disasters, he argued. Trump said Clinton had spent her "entire adult life" fighting the Islamic State, a group that has existed for less than a decade. In one of their

more heated exchanges, Clinton accused Trump of promulgating a "racist lie" by suggesting Obama, the first African-American US president, was not born in the United States.

The president, who was born in Hawaii, released a long-form birth certificate in 2011 to put the issue to rest. It was not until this month that Trump said publicly that he believed Obama was US-born. "He has really started his political activity based on this racist lie that our first black president was not an American citizen. There was absolutely no evidence for it. But he persisted. He persisted year after year," Clinton said.

Trump repeated his false accusation that Clinton's failed 2008 presidential campaign against Obama started the so-called "birther" issue. "Nobody was pressing it, nobody was caring much about it ... I was the one that got him to produce the birth certificate and I think I did a good job,"Trump said.

Trying to get under Trump's skin, Clinton suggested her opponent was refusing to release his tax returns to avoid showing Americans he paid next to nothing in federal taxes or that he is not as wealthy as he says he is. "It must be something really important, even terrible, that he's trying to hide," she said. Trump fought back, saying that as a businessman, paying low taxes was important. "That makes me smart," Trump said. "I have a tremendous income," he said, adding that it was about time that someone running the country knew something about money. He said he would release his tax documents after a government audit.

Trump sniffed loudly at times - although he said yesterday that he did not have a cold - attracting a sideshow in social media attention. Trump sought to deflect criticism of his debate performance yesterday morning, arguing that some of the questions asked by moderator Lester Holt were unfair. "I think I really did well when we were asked normal questions,"Trump said.

During the debate, Trump darkly hinted at wanting to say something but stopped short. Afterwards, he told reporters he had held back from raising Bill Clinton's sex scandals. "I was going to say something extremely tough to Hillary and her family and I said I can't do it. I just can't do it. It's inappropriate. It's not nice," he said. Trump himself had a high-profile affair with Marla Maples, the woman who would be his second wife while he was still married to his first wife, Ivana Trump. He eventually divorced Maples and married his third and current wife, Melania Trump.

There was much speculation before the debate about how much debate moderator Holt would intervene to correct facts. The NBC News anchorman largely left the candidates to fight it out, interjecting a few times to set the record straight. Trump repeated his campaign assertion that he opposed the 2003 US-led invasion of Iraq, despite having voiced support for it in a 2002 interview. "The record shows otherwise," Holt challenged him. "The record does not show that,"Trump shot back. — Reuters

Elaborating on reforms needed to prop up the economy, he said that they should also include administrative and institutional ones that will increase efficiency and lure local and foreign investment.

Meanwhile, Governor of the Central Bank of Kuwait (CBK) Dr Mohammad Al-Hashel said local banks have hitherto been able to withstand the oil market's recent slump, but this resilience is not "infinite".

Hashel said that the lackluster economy will prove to be a burden to local banks, despite CBK's strenuous efforts to maintain monetary and financial stability. Moreover, Hashel said that financial regulations are not adequate as they are geared towards the economy as a whole, adding that local banks are merely a component of the country's economy and stability there does not equate to economic

Speaking on Kuwait's low public debt and financial buffers, he noted that they provide an opportunity for progressive economic reforms. He also added that recent stability of oil prices is not a reason for complacency, as the main goal remains for Kuwait to curb its dependence on oil revenues. On the need for economic reforms, he said that it is the main proviso required for increasing non-oil revenues and producing a multi-faceted economy that provides ample opportunities for employment.

Furthermore, Hashel said that local banks have remained stable, despite a challenging economic environment, noting that banks' non-performing loan ratio has continued its steady decline to reach an all-time low of 2.4 percent. Similarly, he pointed out that the coverage ratio has climbed to a record high of 204 percent and that banks are well above the minimum benchmark of 100 percent liquidity needed by the year 2019, adding that banks' overall leverage ratio of 9.7 percent is significantly higher than the 3 percent global benchmark.

The governor cited these statistics as a testament to CBK's commitment to financial stability, as "banks' ability to support economic activity in Kuwait has not been restricted, rather, our banks will continue to lead despite a challenging macro environment," he said. Hashel also asserted that CBK is leaving no stone unturned in upgrading its regulatory regime and enhancing its supervisory focus, given how limited financial regulations can be to

address macroeconomic and structural issues. Ali Mousa Al-Mousa, chairman of Commercial Bank of

Kuwait, said the government cannot issue a sovereign bond without the creation of a secondary debt market first. Kuwait plans to issue up to KD 3 billion (\$10 billion) in US dollar-denominated bonds and sukuk in international markets to help plug its budget deficit for the current 2016-17 fiscal year, finance minister Saleh said in July.

Meanwhile, Kuwait Direct Investment Promotion Authority (KDIPA) Director General Sheikh Dr Meshaal Jaber Al-Ahmad Al-Sabah said KDIPA has recorded more than \$2.2 billion in foreign direct investments (FDI) by renowned global companies since it started accepting applications in early 2015. He said these companies have been approved in the services sector focusing on ICT and energy activities, and hail from many different geographic regions. He added that this has led to the creation of more than 1,000 jobs for Kuwaiti nationals while supporting the local economy.

In order to maintain Kuwait' attractiveness as a potential investment hub, KDIPA is currently leading two national initiatives aiming to further improve the business climate and enhance competitiveness, he said. The first initiative is leading the Permanent Committee for Streamlining Business Environment in Kuwait (PCK), based on the Cabinet's decision and with membership of nine concerned government entities, Sheikh Meshaal said.

The second initiative, launched in March 2016, aims to enhance Kuwait's competitiveness towards a more innovation driven economy in coordination with various stakeholders, he said. He considered the conference as a good opportunity for discussing key topics and providing the opportunity to exchange knowledge and deepen understanding of core economic issues faced by policymakers, regulators, investors and corporate executives.

Separately, Kuwait's stock exchange will introduce a limit of 20 percent for the maximum daily rise or fall of individual stocks by November, Khaled Abdulrazzaq Al-Khaled, chief executive of Boursa Kuwait, which operates the exchange, said yesterday. The exchange will also introduce a circuit breaker mechanism providing for brief halts in trade with every move of 5 percent, he added. The new rules will replace the current range of limits for stock movements; these limits vary depending on the level of stock prices. Boursa Kuwait is working with the regulator to begin establishing a secondary market for small and medium-sized enterprises that would open in 2017, Khaled told reporters. — Agencies

Ghanem said the meeting next week with the government comes to replace the demand for an emergency session, because the latter involves lengthy procedures, while the next parliamentary term is due to open on Oct 18. He called on lawmakers to focus on the main goal of their moves, which is to find "smart solutions" to face economic challenges, but by safeguarding the standard of living of citizens.

MP Ahmad Al-Qudhaibi, who collected the required signatures of lawmakers for the emergency session, said yesterday that following a meeting with the speaker, it was decided to convene a meeting with the government to resolve the problem to avoid the lengthy procedures for the emergency session. But he insisted that if no acceptable solution was reached at the meeting

next Tuesday, "we will continue with the procedures to convene the emergency session".

The request to hold the emergency session was filed last Thursday but no decision has been taken about it. He said that differences in opinion among lawmakers could delay reaching an acceptable solution for the problem of petrol prices. Qudhaibi said that there are MPs who want to give the government enough time to study proposals by the lawmakers, while others believe that grillings are the best solution, and a third group is supporting the increase.

The lawmaker said the aim behind demanding the emergency session was to force the government to suspend the petrol price hike until it has presented alternatives to support low-income people affected by the price rise. He said others are trying to utilize the reaction to the hike for election purposes.

TRUMP STRUGGLES AS 'CHANGE' CANDIDATE

unning as an anti-establishment candidate, Donald Trump took the presidential debate stage on Monday night to hammer home his call for sweeping political change and try to win over millions of undecided voters. But the Republican nominee seemed unable to capitalize on his opportunity in front of a television audience that by some estimates may have been 100million strong. Instead of presenting himself as a change agent, he spent most of the evening trading personal insults with his Democratic opponent, Hillary Clinton.

It illustrated the paradox that has plagued Trump's campaign. Polls show an electorate hungry for change, with a majority believing the country is on the wrong track. Yet Trump's brash personality and his tendency to stir up controversy have made him, at times, a poor messenger. Trump started strongly on Monday, sticking to the bread and butter theme of his campaign - the erosion of US manufacturing jobs. But he soon lost his composure, especially when Clinton questioned his success in business and his refusal to release his tax returns and accused him of racism and sexism.

When on message Trump paints a bleak picture of a United States that is victimized by China in trade, hemorrhaging jobs to Mexico and blighted by gangs of illegal immigrants roaming the streets of "warzone" inner cities committing crimes. Robert Adams, 75, an undecided voter from Boise, Idaho, said he thought Trump's dystopian view of America was correct. "I think it's hell in the big cities," Adams said.

Downcast

But after watching the debate, he viewed both the real estate magnate and Clinton as a "sad choice for American voters and was leaning towards Libertarian candidate Gary Johnson. Reuters/Ipsos polling shows an electorate in a downcast mood, with 64 percent of Americans believing the country is on the wrong track. That number includes 87 percent of Republicans and 44 percent of Democrats. When Reuters asked voters to pick the first word that comes to mind when thinking about the country, the most popular choice was "frustration," followed by "fear" and

Some of Trump's strongest moments at Monday's debate were when he categorized Clinton, a former secretary of state and US senator as a "typical politician", accusing her of achieving nothing in her years in Congress and government. With an electorate yearning for change, Clinton is hamstrung by her long record and her close association with the Obama administration. Rather than proposing wholesale political overhaul, Clinton offers up a vision of a country headed in the right direction but one that needs some changes to address income inequality and create jobs.

Her more optimistic view impressed another undecided voter, Nancy Willhite, 61, of Portland, Oregon. "She seems more in touch with reality to me," she said. A Reuters/Ipsos poll published on Monday found that about half of all likely voters in the United States were looking to the debate to help them make a final decision. Ron Bonjean, a Republican strategist in Washington, said Trump's performance on Monday would have left many undecided voters with questions about his ability to lead the country. "Donald Trump has to convince them that he is going to be a safe alternative and I think it's open to debate whether he pulled that

off," Bonjean said. Christopher Devine, a political science professor at the University of Dayton in Ohio said Trump's message on Monday sometimes got lost in a welter of hyperbole that invited mocking responses from Clinton. "He'll identify a problem people are concerned about, but in that excitement over making that point, he goes overboard and makes claims that don't hold up. It loses its effectiveness at that point." — Reuters

he was at her best. He was not at his worst. Weeks of Super Bowl-style hype aside, Monday night's 90 minutes of heated clashes between Hillary Clinton and Donald Trump probably didn't shove many undecided voters off the fence. If Clinton aimed to push her famously unpredictable opponent into a made-for-sharing disqualifying moment, she didn't quite get there. If Trump set out to show America - particularly women - he's completed the transformation from cartoonish pop culture staple to leader worthy of the Oval Office, he still has a way to go.

But in a debate full of feisty exchanges and a personal scuffle or two, the candigotten this far. Clinton was polished, prepared and proud of it - a Hermione Granger at a podium. She came with sharp and practiced answers, most notably a newly direct one for the questions about her private email server that has dogged her candidacy for months. She grinned broadly and calmly, even when under fire, and she mocked but only gently the man she called "Donald."

"I think Donald just criticized me for

prepared for? I prepared to be president. And I think that's a good thing." Trump addressed his opponent as "Secretary Clinton" - even asking for her approval for the term - but by the end he called The care he took with her title was a reminder of the voters he was aiming to

Clinton said. "And you know what else I

win over. Women, particularly collegeeducated white women, are the key to Trump turning his current burst of momentum into a sustained surge that lasts until Election Day. The 70-year-old businessman has struggled to persuade women, even those with doubts about the first woman president, to get behind his bid, thanks in part to his performancdates demonstrated clearly how they've es in past debates, which led to cringeworthy challenges to moderator Megyn Kelly or opponent Carly Fiorina.

Trump avoided another jaw-dropping, decorum-busting moment on Monday night, but it was hard to see that he did much to soften his image. He repeatedly and aggressively interrupted Clinton to rebut or deny her charges, at times talking over her or interrupting. When asked by moderator Lester Holt to explain a previous comment that Clinton doesn't have a "presidential look", Trump simply repeated the comment. "She doesn't have the look. She doesn't have the stamina," he said. "To be president of this country, you need tremendous stamina."

Clinton came prepared to pounce: "Well, as soon as he travels to 112 countries and negotiates a peace deal, a ceasefire, a release of dissidents, an opening of new opportunities in nations around the world, or even spends 11 hours testifying in front of a congressional committee, he can talk to me about stamina." As the debate went on, Clinton seemed to gain confidence and a better sense of timing. When Trump concluded a long and tangled defense of his yearslong campaign to challenge President Barack Obama's citizenship, she paused for a moment to let Trump's words sink in. "Well, just listen to what you heard." she said.

Insider

Trump, too, had his moments. He delivered a searing indictment of Clinton as just another insider proposing the same-old solutions for an economy on the brink of "crashing down". The riff was a potent reminder of why his candidacy has become a vehicle for the alienated white Americans feeling pinched by the economy and forces of globalization. 'Typical politician. All talk, no action. Sounds good, doesn't work. Never going to happen," he said, encapsulating the core message of his campaign.

He showed Clinton remains vulnerable on her support for trade deals, forcing Clinton in her clearest fib of the night when she denied having called the Trans-Pacific Partnership the "gold standard" of trade agreements and claimed she merely said she hoped it would be a good deal. But Trump missed opportunities to dive into Clinton's other vulnerabilities. She was also able to make swift work of her email scandal, saying simply "It was a mistake and I take responsibility for that." "That's for sure," Trump interjected, but left it there.

The Republican didn't raise Clinton's description of half of his supporters as "deplorables" or the Clinton Foundation and its donor network. That left Clinton largely free to play the prepared grown up to Trump's agitated upstart. Even Trump granted her that: "She's got experience," he said. "But it's bad experience. And this country can't afford to have another four years of that kind of experience." — AP

DANGER IN TRUMP RESPONSE TO SECRET BRIEFINGS

residential nominees are not supposed to talk about the intelligence briefings they receive as part of their race for the White House. The secret information is supposed to help them fully prepare for the presidency - not to be discussed publicly on the campaign trail. Yet that has already happened. We'll see if it happens again during the debates Monday night. During the NBC "Commander-in-Chief Forum" earlier this month, Matt Lauer of the Today show asked Republican nominee Donald Trump whether anything in the briefings caused him "shock or alarm."

"Yes, there was one thing that shocked me," Trump replied, "and it just seems to me that what they said - President Obama, Hillary Clinton and [Secretary of State] John Kerry, who is another total disaster - did exactly the opposite." Trump elaborated on the briefing sessions: "I have (sic) pretty good with the body language. And I could tell they [the briefers] were not happy. Our leaders did not follow what they were recommending."

There were several immediate problems with Trump's answer. First, on the most basic level, he did not explain what he meant by "body language." Did the intelligence professionals squirm? Wiggle? Did they grimace or smirk? Raise an eyebrow? Voters watching were left to wonder, as they do so often in this bizarre election year.

Most important, however, the briefers are intelligence analysts whose job does not include recommending anything. The analysts sift through information flowing in from a multitude of sources, including the CIA's clandestine service that provides information from spies it recruits, electronic intercepts, overhead satellites and foreign radio broadcasts and publications. They synthesize and summarize all the information, and their analysis is then made available to government officials to assist in making policy.

Their task in a presidential election is much the same. They are to bring the nominees up to date on the major conflicts and issues around the world, based on information gathered by the CIA, the National Security Agency and the other US intelligence agencies. The briefings so far have likely covered topics such as Islamic State, the civil war in Syria and the refugee crisis in Europe, Washington's brittle relations with Moscow, North Korea's nuclear tests, turmoil in Iraq and Afghanistan and terrorism.

Lauer was widely criticized for the job he did as moderator. But here he twice cautioned Trump to answer the question "without going into specifics". Trump, however, managed to assert that the administration and his opponent were not following what the briefers "were recommending" - even though the briefers would not be suggesting policies. They might have described, for example, how fewer recruits are flowing into Syria from the West because Islamic State has lost control of a good deal of its territory. But as analysts, they would not have recommended that Washington increase its support for one faction or another.

Former intelligence officials were appalled at what Trump said. "That's just awful," former CIA Director Michael Hayden told Politico. "A candidate used the intelligence professionals who were briefing him in an absolutely nonpolitical setting, he imputed to them views that were politically useful to him in the moment." Hayden, a retired Air Force general who also served as head of the NSA, has not endorsed either candidate. But he has warned that Trump's election would create havoc in the relationship between the military and its civilian leadership.

This isn't the first time intelligence briefings have become entangled in election politics. The tradition of providing classified information to presidential candidates began in 1944, when President Franklin D Roosevelt made wartime intel-

ligence reports available to the Republican candidate Thomas E Dewey. In 1952, President Harry S Truman made CIA information available to Republican nominee General Dwight D Eisenhower and Democratic nominee Adlai Stevenson.

Politics

In 1960, however, politics entered the presidential nominees' intelligence briefings. The results proved highly unfortunate for the nation. In that election, the GOP nominee, Vice President Richard M Nixon, announced his opposition to a covert plan that he had actually helped devise. Meanwhile, his Democratic opponent, Senator John F Kennedy, managed to both support the plan and then oppose it. CIA Director Allen Dulles had flown to Hyannis, Massachusetts, to brief Kennedy. Shortly before the election, Kennedy put out a statement urging support for forces opposing Cuba's new leader, Fidel Castro, both inside and outside the island nation, with the "hope of overthrowing" him.

Nixon was furious, he later confirmed in his book, "Six Crises". As vice president, he had been an architect of the Eisenhower administration's covert CIA plan to train Cuban exiles to do just that. Nixon believed Dulles told Kennedy about the plan, though Dulles later denied it. The Kennedy camp knew that Cuban exiles were training in Florida, however. It was pretty much an open secret. Life magazine published pictures of the trainees a week before the election.

After Kennedy's response, though, Nixon decided to publicly oppose the invasion that he had helped plan. "The covert operation had to be protected at all costs," he wrote. "I must not even suggest by implication that the United States was rendering aid to rebel forces in and out of Cuba. In fact, I must go to the other extreme: I must attack the Kennedy proposal to provide such aid as wrong and irresponsible."

The truth was that Nixon had actually been hoping the invasion of Cuba would take place before the election and help clinch his victory. But it didn't happen. And Kennedy, who was advised during the campaign that favoring support for the rebels was a political mistake, reversed his position. He sent a telegram to Nixon. It said Kennedy had "never advocated and I do not now advocate intervention in Cuba". Kennedy won the election, and, in April 1961, he launched the Bay of Pigs invasion of Cuba. It failed disastrously. More than 100 Cuban exiles were killed, and almost 1,200 captured. Ten Cuban exile pilots and four US pilots

recruited by the CIA also died. In a democratic system, the voters are supposed to listen to the candidates and make a choice. But in this instance, a major campaign issue - what to do about Cuba - became distorted. Voters were left with no true idea of where the candidates really stood. And also with no real public debate about the issue. Many historians believe the failure of the Bay of Pigs invasion emboldened Soviet leader Nikita S. Khrushchev to send missiles to the Caribbean isle, leading to the 1962 Cuban missile crisis. Over those 13 days in October, the world faced a nuclear confrontation.

The lesson of the 1960 election is that it matters what the presidential nominees say during a campaign. One wonders, if Trump wins, how he might interpret the body language of Kim Jong Un, the volatile and unpredictable leader of North Korea, who claims to have an arsenal of nuclear missiles that the Pentagon warns might "be capable of reaching much of the continental United States' by 2020. A mistake in reading Kim's body language - or Russian President Vladimir Putin's - could lead to unimaginable consequences. Presidents had better rely on something more than body language in making decisions that could affect the millions of people around the globe. — Reuters

few people own a bidet, while almost every bathroom across the Alps is equipped with one. Balotelli, whose reputation is anything but squeaky clean, took the joke in his stride, laughing as he accepted the gift before leaving it on the ground. The "Le iene" (the hyenas) presenters thanked Balotelli before taking the bidet away with them. Balotelli has had a storming start to life with Nice, scoring a brace in each of his first two league appearances for the Ligue 1 pace-setters following a free transfer from Liverpool. In the past he has been in trouble for a number of off-field antics, such as throwing darts at junior players at Manchester City, where he also set fire to his bathroom after setting off fireworks from inside his house. —AFP

QATAR TO BUILD BEDOUIN CAMP FOR WORLD CUP FANS

DOHA: Qatar is to construct a special Bedouin-style desert camp to house thousands of fans during the 2022 World Cup as the Gulf state looks to broaden accommodation for the tournament beyond the limited number of apartments and hotels. A fan village among the sand dunes close to the Saudi border will house up to 2,000 visitors in Arabian tents, allowing them to experience the desert from close quarters, Qatar's World Cup organising committee said in a statement yesterday. "We will allow visitors from outside the country to enjoy Qatar and their football experience in an entirely new way," said the committee's Abdulaziz al-Mawlawi. "There will be options for all kinds of budgets..." Most of the 500,000 fans expected to descend on the tiny country will stay in hotels and apartments, but an earlier announcement suggested thousands could also camp under canvas in desert areas close to stadiums. Qatar's World Cup bid in 2010 said it would create more than 55,000 rooms for fans but authorities said in January that only 46,000 would be ready, prompting concern about a potential shortage of accommodation during the tournament. —Reuters

NOVES SAYS FRANCE DOOR OPEN TO OUSTED DULIN

MARCOUSSIS: France coach Guy Noves insisted yesterday the door is still open for full-back Brice Dulin to force his way back into the national set-up. Noves has not picked 26-year-old Dulin, who has 24 caps, since taking over the role following the 2015 World Cup, preferring instead his former charge at Toulouse, Maxime Medard, and South African-born Scott Spedding. And even though Spedding pulled out of this week's three-day France training camp, Noves still didn't bring in Dulin, saying his Racing 92 side was already depleted enough by four other international call-ups. "I really do watch his matches and follow his progression," said Noves, who coached Toulouse for 22 years before taking over the France reins. "His name has come up but there are also teams playing in the Top 14 who have lots of players involved, so I don't want to pillage the clubs. "But if Spedding is out (of the November tests), there's a good chance Brice Dulin will join us with Max Medard, so

he's not been ditched at all. "He is right to keep

working hard, I would never close the door to

SPIETH: US RYDER SQUAD **WANTS TO HONOR PALMER**

CHASKA: Two-time major winner Jordan Spieth says the US Ryder Cup team is looking to pay tribute to Arnold Palmer this week after his death and bringing home the trophy would certainly qualify. The Americans have lost three in a row, six of seven and eight of the past 10 Ryder Cup showdowns to Europe ahead of Friday's start of the 41st biennial matches at Hazeltine.

"As Team USA, we're all looking to do something to honor him this week," Spieth said. "We all learned a lot from him. We would not be who we are on and off the course if it were not for him." The US flag flies at half staff over the suburban Minneapolis course to pay homage to Palmer, who died Sunday at age 87 of heart issues.

Palmer was the first superstar of American golf, the first true celebrity sportsman. He attracted passionate supporters known as Arnie's Army and lifted golf into the television age and beyond, serving as an inspiration to many of today's top stars.

"He was the first cool guy to play golf," said US Ryder Cup player Jimmy Walker. "Nobody did anything more for golf than Arnie did. He was one of the greatest personalities in golf ever. He had a love for the game. It showed to the end."

Black and white video highlights of Palmer in his prime, a US sports-TV staple since his death, fail to capture the go-for-broke style that made him popular or the fan-friendly manner and charm that made the seven-time major winner iconic for how he played in addition to how well he played.

"All athletes owe him a debt. He paved the way for us," Spieth said. "He was a role model and golf's greatest friend. I still think it's underrated how much he contributed to golf. This will be

a tough loss for golf going forward."

Reactions from those trying to work on their putting on a windy Monday at Hazeltine were grief-filled. "It's just sadness," two-time major winner Zach Johnson said. "He was such a great person. I don't believe you can quantify or put into words what he has done for golf." Europe star Lee Westwood of England put it in simple terms: "Professional golf is what it is today because of Arnold."

'MADE DIFFICULT LOOK EASY'

Palmer set a standard for himself to give back to the people who paid to come watch him, whether with a smile or personal attention. An autograph, a handshake or just a moment of his attention made him the role model some could immitate but none could duplicate, even today's most beloved shotmakers. "We all try but we never live up to his standard," five-time major winner Phil Mickelson said. "He made the difficult look easy."

Spieth, 23, was born in 1993, the same year Palmer collected his last tour victory of any sort at the Champions Tour Skins Game. But Palmer was able to pass along lessons about golf and life to the younger stars.

"He's just a man who has inspired me personally," said Spieth, who shared the locker Palmer uses in the Augusta National Champions Locker room. "I don't feel worthy. He should have his own. I feel very fortunate to have something in common with him." Europe Ryder Cup captain Darren Clarke said both teams are preparing to honor Palmer both with a worn emblem as well as their performances. "Whatever happens this week, it will be another great chapter in Ryder Cup history," he said. "And one that honors Mr Palmer." —AFP

GARCIA, MCILROY FIRE BACK AT LOVE'S BEST-EVER US TALK

CHASKA: Sergio Garcia and Rory McIlroy fired up European passions yesterday at the Ryder Cup, taking exception to US captain Davis Love's contention that his Americans might be the best team ever.

"At the end of the day, you don't win Ryder Cups with your mouth," Garcia said. "You win them out there on the golf course and that's where we'll see which team is the best." European teams have won three consecutive Ryder Cups, seeking an unprecedented fourth in a row this week at Hazeltine, while the Americans have lost six

of the past seven and eight of 10. But with a new task force bringing stronger organization and commitment, Love felt confident enough in his roster last Friday to tell a golf radio interviewer, "We're a great team. This is maybe the best golf team

maybe ever assembled." Those words added inspiration for a Europe side not lacking for it to start with. "They are pretty much motivating factors," Garcia said. "You know what they say opinions are like-we all have one. Everybody is allowed to have their own opinions. That's what they think. We know what we have."

World number three McIlroy, Europe's topranked player, is coming off a victory at the US PGA's season-ending Tour Championship. It brought \$1.5 million plus a \$10 million season points bonus he swiped from the pocket of US Cup rival Dustin Johnson, the US Open champion ranked second in the world.

'To see Rory showing that fighting spirit and battling the way in which he did was wonderful," Europe captain Darren Clarke said of his Northern Ireland compatriot. "That was a very enjoyable thing for all of us to watch."

McIlroy tossed his own barbs at the US notion of Ryder Cup supremacy before Friday's opening tee shots. "I've followed everything and I've had a bit of fun with it, the task force and greatest team ever assembled and whatever else they are talking about," McIlroy said.

"If Europe were in the same position as what America have went through over the past few Ryder Cups, we would be probably doing the same thing and searching for answers."

EUROPE'MORE THAN READY'

The Americans have four of the world's top 10 in Johnson, Jordan Spieth, Patrick Reed and Rickie Fowler and all 12 players are ranked in the world's top 31.

While Europe counters with five of the world's top 12, including Garcia in 12th, half the European squad is ranked below Ryan Moore, the captain's pick who is the lowestranked US player.

McIlroy noted that in terms of worldwide victories this year, Europe players have taken 12 to nine by the Americans, the majors split

even at two for each roster. "So our team is good. Our team is more than ready to handle the occasion, to handle what we need to do," McIlroy said.

"I don't think it's hard for us to find motivation. Whether it be the sea of red (US supporters) you see on the golf course or comments made by the US team or captain, that gives us so much motivation already. "Whenever we are going up against one

of the greatest teams ever assembled, that's motivation enough. How good a victory would this be if we go out and beat these guys on home soil?" Clarke passed on his chance to dig into

Love about the best-ever notion, saying, "About going up against the best team in the world, that one you should ask Davis. I'm very pleased with our team."

England's Andy Sullivan, the lowest ranked player in the event at 50th and one of six Ryder Cup newcomers for Europe, was willing to grant the hosts an edge on paper but warned Europe has a tough history when

"It hasn't been spoken about very much, but on paper they are an unbelievable side," Sullivan said.

"You look at it for most years and Europe go in as the underdogs. As the recent years have shown they have done pretty well out of it. Hopefully that's a common theme and we get the job done this year." —AFP

Wuhan boss says Serena absence 'unfortunate'

WUHAN: Serena Williams' withdrawal from the Wuhan Open was "unfortunate", the tournament's director said yesterday, after the American star ruled herself out of the injury-hit tournament for the second year in a row.

The 22-time Grand Slam champion pulled out of the Chinese event-and next week's China Open in Beijingwith a shoulder injury, robbing it of its best known player.

"It's unfortunate but we understand. It's the nature of the sport," Fabrice Chouquet told AFP. "We hope to see her here in 2017." Williams has only made it to the hot and humid Wuhan Open once, in 2014, when she retired from her first match against Alize Cornet with illness. Last year, she was also injured and skipped the entire Asian swing, a busy period which culminates in the season-ending WTA Finals in Singapore. The Wuhan Open, held just after the year's final Grand Slam tournament, the US Open, has become bedevilled with injury problems, witnessing a series of

Six players retired mid-match in the first two days of this year's tournament, while another five suffered the same fate last year-including Garbine Muguruza in the final.

"We are towards the end of the season and we know the players have played a lot and we know that some of them are very tired," said Chouquet. "A player never retires by pleasure. They retire because they have to." Women's Tennis Association (WTA) chief Steve Simon has vowed "fundamental changes" to the sport's gruelling schedule, which has added eight tournaments in China since 2008.

"The circuitry structure is on the agenda," Chouquet said, adding that there could be changes to the schedule by the 2018 season.

"It's always a very fine line (between) giving playing opportunities to players and overloading a calendar... (and for) these top tournaments to receive the player field they deserve for the investment they put (in)."—AFP

AGAG COMMITTED TO FORMULA E, RULES OUT FORMULA ONE ROLE

LONDON: Formula E founder and chief executive Alejandro Agag has dismissed media speculation that he could play a role in running Formula One after Liberty Media's takeover of the glamour sport.

"There haven't been any contacts at all, whatsoever," he told Reuters in an interview at his London headquarters yesterday.

"My interest is Formula E and I think there is still so much to be done in Formula E and it's really exciting to be in Formula E," said the 46-year-old Spanish businessman.

"I think I could not go anywhere without Formula E. So wherever I go, Formula E has to come, in a way. Formula E is like my baby. I founded it, we were very few in the beginning and we've taken it to this point and I don't think I can stay apart from Formula E."

Formula E, the world's first electric car racing championship which starts its third season in Hong Kong next week, is owned by Liberty Global, another of US cable television tycoon John Malone's companies.

Media reports have suggested that new Formula One chairman Chase Carey, who took the role after the takeover was announced on Sept. 7, wants to appoint executives to run the sport's commercial and sporting operations.

Agag, because of his experience and connections, has been touted as a possible candidate. Bernie Ecclestone, the 85-yearold who has run Formula One for decades, once co-owned London second tier soccer club Queens Park Rangers with Agag and former Renault team boss Flavio Briatore.

NO COMPETITION

Agag welcomed the Formula One takeover, which has still to be approved by anti-trust regulators, but said there had been no discussions "in terms of synergies or co-operation or anything".

"If you ask me for my feeling, I think it's good. I think if Formula One had been bought by a competitor of the Liberty family, the extended family, it would be more difficult," he added.

He did not envisage any competition issues, however, because the two series were so distinct and raced in very different arenas, with Formula E a city-based series using temporary circuits.

Only Monaco, Montreal and Mexico City host both championships.

"We don't compete at all with Formula One. We don't race in racetracks, we race on very small places where Formula one cannot race so there is no competition," said Agag. "The place we race in Brooklyn is far too small for a Formula One race. And we race on a different technology, electric."

Agag said other US series NASCAR and IndyCar had more to fear, with Liberty Media clearly targeting the United States as a growth area for European-based Formula One. "If I was IndyCar or NASCAR, I would be worried," he said.

"I would be concerned because the Formula One push in America is going to affect them, if anyone. But definitely Formula One and Formula E are totally compatible in America and everywhere else." Agag said it made business sense to keep Formula One and Formula E apart and he sees scope for both to grow, even if electric racing could one day become the bigger draw.

The Formula One championship has been running since 1950, with annual turnover of around \$1.9 billion and one of the largest global audiences in sport after the soccer World Cup and Olympics.

Formula E's cumulative TV audience in its debut season was a comparatively tiny 61.5 million, according to research firm Repucom. "If the motor industry becomes fully electric, Formula E will be the relevant championship in terms of the motor industry," said Agag.

"But I don't think Formula One will disappear. I think Formula One will continue, like today there are horse races but we don't use a horse to go to the office. Combustion cars will be maybe only used for racing.

"But I think Formula One has such a strong tradition that it will continue in the future. Formula E may be the main championship at one point in 50 years or 60 years, but only time will tell."—Reuters



ANTI-DOPING SYSTEM OPEN TO ABUSE: FROOME

LONDON: Tour de France champion Chris Froome has responded to the drugtaking controversy surrounding Bradley Wiggins by claiming sport's anti-doping rules are open to abuse. Froome took to Twitter to vent about the issues with doping controls after two officially approved Therapeutic Use Exemptions (TUE) earlier in his career were revealed by hackers earlier this month.

Froome, who won his third Tour de France title in four years in July, said: "I take my position in sport very seriously and I know that I have to not only abide by the rules, but also go above and beyond that to set a good example both morally and ethically.

"It is clear that the TUE (therapeutic use exemption) system is open to abuse and I believe that this is something the UCI (cycling's governing body) and WADA (World Anti-Doping Agency) need to urgently address. "At the same time, there are athletes who not only abide by the rules that are in place, but also those of fair play.

"I have never had a 'win at all costs' approach in this regard. I am not looking to push the boundaries of the rules. "I believe that is something that athletes need to take responsibility for themselves, until more stringent protocols can be put in place." Athletes are able to take some banned substances as medication if they are cleared by the authorities and Froome said he has never pushed the boundaries of what is allowed.

British star Wiggins, a five-time Olympic champion, received three TUEs for intramuscular injections of the powerful corticosteroid triamcinolone on the eve of the 2011 and 2012 Tours de France and 2013 Giro d'Italia. Triamcinolone has been described by several former dopers as one of the most effective performance-enhancing drugs and it is believed to help athletes lose weight without losing power, postpone fatigue and aid recovery. The disgraced Lance Armstrong tested positive for it at the 1999 Tour but used a bogus TUE to avoid

an anti-doping violation. Wiggins, a life-long asthma sufferer with an allergy to pollen, hasn't broken any doping rules and told the BBC on Sunday that he was not seeking "an unfair advantage" when he used the drug, but was trying to "level the playing field so he could compete at the highest level". — AFP

KERBER SURVIVES SCARE IN FIRST MATCH AS NUMBER ONE

WUHAN: Angelique Kerber survived a scare in her first match as world number one before beating Kristina Mladenovic in three sets at the Wuhan Open yesterday.

The US and Australian Open champion, who had a bye in the first round, made a convincing start before missing two set points and allowing Mladenovic to take the first set in a tie break

But the German then swept through the rest of the match, winning 6-7 (4/7), 6-1, 6-4 to set up a third-round meeting with two-time Wimbledon champion Petra Kvitova. "I was trying to find my rhythm because I was not playing my best in the first set," top seed Kerber said after the match. Kvitova said she would be trying not to think about Kerber's new status as world number one, formalised when the rankings were updated after this month's US Open, when they play today. "(It) will be for the first time... that I will play her as a number one, which is a little bit different. But I think if I'm on the court, I don't really think about that," she told reporters.

World number four Agnieszka Radwanska also romped into the third round, as last year's US Open finalist Roberta Vinci became the tournament's first seeded casualty.

One-time Wimbledon runner-up Radwanska won 6-4, 6-1 against Russia's Ekaterina Makarova, who bagged Olympic women's doubles gold last month in Rio. Italy's Vinci, ranked 15, was ousted by Yaroslava Shvedova 7-5, 6-2 her second defeat at the hands of the Kazakh this year. Radwanska will next meet an in-form Caroline Wozniacki, who defeated qualifier Kateraina Siniakova 6-4, 6-4 on Tuesday, in the third round of the \$2.6 million hardcourt event.

The former world number one beat Poland's Radwanska in the semi-finals of last week's Pan Pacific Open in Tokyo, en route to her first title of the year. "We always (have) long battles against each other, especially on the slower surface (such) as here," Radwanska said of Wozniacki. Seven-time Grand Slam champion Venus Williams downed Yulia Putintseva of Kazakhstan 6-3, 6-2, and will next play fellow tour veteran 10th-ranked Svetlana Kuznetsova of Russia. The pair have not met on court since 2009. American Madison Brengle fell to Kuznetsova 6-0, 6-4 in the second round, as eighth seed Madison Keys beat Caroline Garcia 6-3, 6-4.

Former Wimbledon quarter-finalist Barbora Strycova downed Japan's Misaki Doi, while Daria Kasatkina of Russia beat fellow qualifier American Louisa Chirico.—AFP

U-TURN AS N ZEALAND TEEN STAR AXED OVER ASSAULT

WELLINGTON: New Zealand rugby officials yesterday terminated the contract of a teenage star who viciously assaulted four people including two women, following a public outcry after he escaped conviction.

After initially supporting winger Losi Filipo, rugby administrators performed a U-turn following a heated reaction that even saw Prime Minister John Key drawn into the debate.

Filipo, 18, dodged conviction because a judge said he did not want to derail his career, sparking accusations the court system in rugby-mad New Zealand gives sports stars special treatment.

"If it was anyone else on the street, they wouldn't be let off for any of this-for attacking four of us-punching two females," Kelsey Odell, one of his victims, told TV3.

Key also weighed in, telling reporters: "Violence is unacceptable anywhere, it doesn't matter what your profession."

New Zealand Rugby (NZR), which was criticised last month over its handling of sexual assault allegations against Waikato Chiefs players, had argued that Filipo was dealt with by the court system and should not be shunned. "We believe young men, like Losi, are better off with rugby in their lives," NZR chief Steve Tew said in a statement early yesterday. However, the issue dominated radio phone-ins and Wellington Rugby, which holds Filipo's contract, had more than 1,000 negative comments on its Facebook page.

EMOTION, TEARS AS MARLINS PAY TRIBUTE TO FERNANDEZ

No. 16 jerseys in honor of Jose Fernandez paid a tearful tribute to their fallen team-mate on Monday, a day after the star pitcher was killed in a boating accident. A night of wrenching emotion saw several of the Cuban-born player's team-mates choke back tears as they gathered on the pitcher's mound at Marlins Park ahead of their game against the New York Mets.

Many players touched a large "16" which had been painted on the mound in tribute to the 24-year-old pitching ace, before hanging their heads in a moment of silence.

Tributes followed throughout the game, eventually won 7-3 by the Marlins, with Dee Gordon breaking down in sobs after hitting his first home run of the season, before being embraced by team-mates.

Marlins owner Jeffrey Loria said earlier Monday that the club would permanently retire Fernandez's "16" jersey number. "Nobody's going to wear it. I can tell you that now, nobody will wear that number again," Loria told the Sun-Sentinel newspaper.

Marlins coach Don Mattingly said the shattered organization were "not trying to do anything other than just get through the day."

"We're just handling it the best we can, whatever way that is, for each guy," said Mattingly shortly before Monday's game. "We have a love for Jose, the way he played, his passion for the game, and his energy for it. And I think our guys

MIAMI: Miami Marlins players wearing want to honor that, and what we've learned from him and that joy that he played with."

Marlins president David Samson said Fernandez, a Cuban refugee who became a US citizen and achieved his dream of starring for a team in Miami, had been a role model beyond baseball.

"This was a loss not just in the baseball world, but a loss in the community," Samson said. "Jose Fernandez represented the possibility of freedom and the possibility of what America can mean to the Cuban people."

TOXICOLOGY TESTS

Fans created a makeshift memorial for the pitcher at the Florida baseball stadium, leaving flowers and handwritten notes in his honor.

The tributes come a day after Fernandez's body was found, along with two deceased boating companions, in an overturned vessel off Miami Beach.

The Marlins canceled Sunday's game against the Atlanta Braves as his teammates absorbed the shock of his loss.

Authorities said Fernandez and the other two victims were killed when the 32-foot (10-meter) vessel crashed into a jetty. The Coast Guard discovered the overturned boat around 3:30 am (0730 GMT) on Sunday.

Officials said Fernandez was killed as a result of the impact. A Coast Guard spokesman told AFP on Monday the other two victims have been identified as Emilio Macias, 27, and Eduardo Rivero, 25. "We are awaiting toxicology results,"

spokesman Darren Caprara said, adding that it can "take several days or can take up to several months," for the accident investigation to be completed.

The investigation is being led by the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission. Fernandez was enjoying his best major league season, posting a

16-8 record with a 2.86 earned run average. The hard-throwing right-hander set a club record with 253 strikeouts this season, and his 12.49 strikeouts per nine innings led the majors. He came to the United States from Cuba at age 15, after three failed attempts.

At 20, he broke into the major

leagues and was National League Rookie of the Year in 2013. Fernandez's final start last Tuesday was one of the best of the two-time All-Star's career.

He tossed a season-high eight innings and struck out 12 in a 1-0 shutout win over the Washington Nationals. —AFP

KHAWAJA AND SMITH PEERLESS IN IRELAND ROUT

BENONI: Usman Khawaja and captain Steve Smith shared an unbeaten 126-run partnership as Australia romped to a ninewicket win in a one-day international against Ireland at Willowmoore Park yesterday. Khawaja made 82 not out and Smith an unbeaten 59 as Australia chased down a modest target of 199 with 19.5 overs to spare. It was a second heavy defeat in a row for Ireland, who lost by 206 runs against South Africa at the same venue on Sunday, but set the scene for what Smith expects to be a tough five-match one-day series between South Africa and Australia, starting at Centurion on Friday.

Ireland let slip a promising start, collapsing from 121 for two in the 24th over to 198 all out. The solid foundation laid by William Porterfield (24), Paul Stirling (30) and John Anderson (39) was destroyed when they lost three wickets for two runs in the space of seven balls.

Anderson was leg before wicket to Scott Boland before new cap Daniel Worrall claimed his first international wicket when he had Gary Wilson caught

Worrall appealed unsuccessfully for leg before wicket when his next ball struck Sean Terry on the pad. But a careless Terry did not get back into his crease and the ball deflected to Smith, whose throw from slip ran out the new batsman. "We lost our way there," said Ireland captain Porterfield.

"It was difficult to come back from that." Leg-spinner Adam Zampa was Australia's most successful bowler, taking three for 37. He made good use of his variations, taking two wickets with googlies and one

Zampa apart, a largely inexperienced Australian bowling attack looked in need of more work ahead of the series against South Africa. They sent down 13 wides, costing a total of 19 runs.

"It was a pretty good performance in the end," said Smith. "We need to work on the way we started with the ball but we came back nicely to bowl them out. We gave them too many freebies and we can't afford to do that against South Africa." David Warner got Australia off to a rapid start, dominating a 73-run first wicket stand with fellow left-hander Khawaja. Warner hit 48 off 30 balls, with five fours and two sixes, before pushing back a slower ball from Tim Murtagh to be caught and bowled. Murtagh was the only Ireland bowler able to impose a measure of control over the batsmen, taking one for 21 in six overs. Khawaja was dropped twice, on eight and 73, both times in the deep by Peter Chase off Barry McCarthy, but played a stylish 77-ball innings, hitting eight fours and two sixes. Smith, returning to action after being rested during a recent one-day series in Sri Lanka, started slowly but finished with 59 off 73 balls. —AFP

DE VILLIERS OUT OF **AUSTRALIA SERIES**

JOHANNESBURG: South African captain and star batsman AB de Villiers failed a fitness Test yesterday and will undergo elbow surgery which will force him to miss home and away series against Australia.

Cricket South Africa announced on Tuesday that a left elbow impingement injury had failed to respond to rehabilitation and treatment, ruling De Villiers out of a five-match one-day series against Australia, starting in Centurion on Friday, as well as a three-match Test tour of Australia in November. It is hoped he will be fit for a home series against Sri Lanka, starting on December 26. Proteas team manager, Dr

Mohammed Moosajee said: "AB has not recovered, which makes surgery the only long-term solution. We have tried the conservative management of rest, physio, rehab and cortisone infiltration into the elbow, but that has not yielded the results that we would have liked. He will have sur-

gery to the elbow early next week." De Villiers, 32, has already missed a Test series against New Zealand last month and last Sunday's one-day international against Ireland. Faf du Plessis will captain the side in the one-day series against Australia and will almost certainly lead the side in the Test matches in Australia.—AFP

GORDON HITS EMOTIONAL HR AS MOURNING MARLINS BEAT METS

MIAMI: Dee Gordon and the Miami Marlins wore their emotions on the sleeves of their No. 16 jerseys. Jose Fernandez would have loved it. Gordon homered leading off the first inning for the Marlins, who totaled 14 hits and mixed cheers with the tears of the past two days by beating the New York Mets 7-3 on Monday night in their first game since Fernandez died in a boating accident. Adam Conley pitched three scoreless innings subbing for Fernandez, who had been scheduled to make his final start of the year. Justin Bour went 3 for 3 and Gordon had four hits, including one that will go down in Marlins lore. Paying tribute to their charismatic ace, the left-handed-hitting Gordon stepped to the plate as a righty leading off the first. After one pitch, Gordon switched to his customary left side - and pulled a 2-0 delivery into the upper deck for his first homer of the season. New York's Bartolo Colon (14-8) allowed a season-high seven runs in 2 1/3 innings. Mike Dunn (5-1) pitched a perfect fourth for the win. New York still leads the NL wild-card race with five games to go.

INDIANS 7, TIGERS 4

Cleveland clinched the AL Central title, overcoming an injury to ace right-hander Corey Kluber in a victory over Detroit. Kluber left after four innings with right groin tightness, joining Carlos Carrasco and Danny Salazar in a group of talented Cleveland pitchers dealing with injuries. But even those concerns were secondary when the Indians poured onto the field to celebrate their first division title since 2007. Buck Farmer (0-1) allowed four runs in five innings for the Tigers, who fell two games behind Baltimore for the second AL wild card. Andrew Miller (10-1) won in relief, and Cody Allen pitched the ninth for his 30th save in 33 chances.

MARINERS 4, ASTROS 3, 11 INNINGS

Robinson Cano hit his second homer of the game with two outs in the 11th inning, lifting Seattle over Houston. Houston scored two runs in the ninth, but then Cano sent a slider from Luke Gregerson (4-3) into the second deck in right field to win. The victory moves Seattle two games behind Baltimore for the second AL wild card and drops Houston, which has lost four of five, to 3 1/2 games back in the race Drew Storen (4-3) pitched a perfect 10th for the win. Nick Vincent allowed consecutive singles to Jose Altuve and Carlos Correa before retiring the next two batters for his third save.

CUBS 12, PIRATES 2

Javier Baez hit a grand slam and drove in a career-high six runs while major league ERA leader Kyle Hendricks pitched six scoreless innings, helping Chicago win its 100th game of the season. Baez helped the NL Central-champion Cubs reach triple digits in victories for the first time since 1935. Hendricks (16-8) dropped his ERA to 1.99 by scattering seven hits, striking out five and walking none. He has not allowed more than three runs in 22 consecutive starts. LA LIGA EYES AIRWAVES BATTLE FOR EUROPEAN SUPREMACY

MANCHESTER: La Liga may be the League to have forced through the cendominant championship on the field but now the Spanish top flight is aiming to wrest off-field supremacy from the English Premier League in the battle for TV revenue.

Adolfo Bara, managing director of Sales and Marketing of La Liga, said a new three year television deal-for the first time a centralised one and not separate club agreements-and vastlyimproved production will aid the process. The Spanish TV deal of an annual 1.6billion euros (\$1.8 billion) may be double the previous deal but it pales into insignificance when compared to the Premier League's three-year deal of £8.3 billion (\$10.75 billion, 9.6 billion euros). Bara, who has been in the post for three years, said that it had been a crucial first step in catching the Premier tralised TV deal-which he says also levels the playing field in La Liga with other clubs receiving a third of what Real Madrid and Barcelona get from the deal compared to an eighth in previous times. "The main thing is regaining control over TV rights. So we sell, and then we control, and talk to the broadcasters," Bara said after appearing at the SoccerEx Global Football Convention in Manchester, England.

"We can impose live games, delayed games, programmes and organise convenient kick-off times for the Asian and American markets. That's No. 1."

Timothy Bridge, senior consultant at Deloitte's Sports Business Group, concurred with Bara's opinion that the television deal could be a game changer both internally and externally for the Spanish League. "La Liga is clearly lagging behind the Premier League in terms of competitiveness on the pitch but the TV deal should make it more unpredictable than it has been," he told AFP. "Javier Tebas (the president of La Liga) has done a pretty remarkable job in turning round a pretty tricky situation to the benefit of everybody. "For instance the TV rights will undoubtedly grow over future cycles, the first evidence of that will be when they go back to the market in about 18 months time."

GREENER GRASS

Bara, formerly marketing director of Real Sociedad and Espanyol, said that being in control of the TV rights also permitted La Liga to impose rules on the clubs to make their product look better on television-even down to clubs giving a new lick of paint to their stadia, painting the front three rows of the stands in their home colours or ensuring the grass looks green rather than yellow after the hot summer off-season.

"The EPL does a fantasic job in production," said Bara.

"Every game, no matter what, looks the same: fantastic. This summer we did an audio-visual rule that we imposed on all the clubs, which means about the power of lighting, the grass length and colour, the size of sponsorship (boards), making sure the fans are in the camera shot." Bridge, who says La Liga are also very effective at hammering home how successful they are in Europe compared to the Premier League, said while Spain could catch up in terms of quality of TV production, they would also need to change their culture in another respect.

"Where the EPL have been so successful is with 3000 away fans say travelling from Southampton to Sunderland, the length of the country," he told AFP.

"In Spain there is no culture of that and they will have to change their mindset. "There is a culture in England of supporting teams home and away and there is a reason why away tickets have gone down to £30.

"It adds to the atmosphere for TV, passionate away support is what people associate with."

Bara says progress is being made and the grass may indeed be greener on the other side eventually for La Liga. "For us, it's very important that when someone watches a football game, they know it's La Liga no matter which team is playing," said Bara. "It's going to take another year, but we will get there." — AFP

DIVERSITY AWARD MEANS SO MUCH TO INDIA: BARSE

MANCHESTER: 'Slum Soccer' winning the inaugural FIFA Diversity award will mean the world to India, better known for its cricket than football, the CEO Abhijeet Barse told AFP on Monday.

'Slum Soccer' saw off two other shortlisted rivals-The International Gay and Lesbian Football Association (ILGBTFA) and British anti-discrimination pressure group 'Kick It Out'-to take the award.

"This is absolutely thrilling for India, being acknowledged for a football project when India doesn't ever make the football headlines!" an overjoyed Barse said at the Soccerex Global Football Convention.

"This will help us project ourselves onto the Government with this sort of publicity. "The Government used to see it as education versus sport but now they see sport is part of education."

'Slum Soccer' Barse explained takes in children who are outcasts in society and gets them playing football as a means to getting their confidence back with the ultimate goal of re-integrating them into society. "They just give up because they have no direction and don't feel part of the community," he said. "We go not only into the slums but also to schools and we take children who feel marginalised.

"At the moment we have around 12,000 on a daily basis in the project not just in the cities but also in the villages and rural areas." Barse, who is an academic by background, said that it had been wonderful to see some of the successes they had had in their different children.

"Many have gone on to gain the confidence to apply for and obtain jobs," he said.

"Some have even returned to our proiect as coaches. Others have returned to resume their education and are absorbed back into the community that once they didn't feel part of. "That is because we have built up their confidence through playing together and being a unit, learning off each other as much as from us adults."

Barse, whose project is backed by among others UNICEF and FIFA's Football For Hope, said that his father had been the brainchild behind the project.

"He was a sportsman himself, a handball player," said Barse. "But he came from a very poor background and he knew that lots of children wouldn't be getting opportunities to shine because of their origins. "Thus 14 years ago he started up 'Slum Soccer' to give them a possibility of hope. And it grew and grew."

However, success as often the case had its price as Barse Senior discovered and his son observed. "He realised it was unmanageable and I saw the impact it was having on him," said Barse. "I was doing my PhD in the US at the time but I decided that I would return and help," he said.

"I have no regrets because of the joy it brings. Of course there are challenges but different to the ones I found in academia. "It is very satisfying." —AFP

ASIAN CONGRESS SCRAPPED AFTER FIFA PROTEST VOTE

PANAJI: An Asian football congress was year ban for Saoud Al-Mohannadi, vice-presiscrapped after just 20 minutes yesterday as members rejected its agenda in protest at ts powerful new council.

Asian Football Confederation (AFC) delegates flew from all over the region to a luxury hotel in Goa, India to elect three new members to the FIFA Council, only for the extraordinary congress to be declared closed after just 20 minutes. The 42-1 vote against adopting the congress's agenda will be seen as a rebuke to FIFA president Gianni Infantino, who was among those present at the shortlived gathering.

"This has been an eventful morning-and an eventful few weeks," said AFC president Sheikh Salman bin Ibrahim Al Khalifa, who stood against Infantino in FIFA polls in February. "But the congress has spoken with one voice and that has been clear for us all to see. "FIFA president, Gianni Infantino, I am not sure if you have been at a shorter congress but I think you can see the strength of opinion in the room." Various delegates told AFP that the agenda was rejected because a senior official from Qatar, hosts of the 2022 World Cup, had been barred from standing for the FIFA Council.

Scandal-plagued FIFA's ethics committee last month recommended a two-and-a-half-

dent of the Qatar Football Association, for refusing to cooperate with a corruption inves-FIFA barring a Qatari official from elections to tigation. Mohannadi denies any wrongdoing and North Korea, were standing for three and had initially been cleared to stand, before the AFC announced late on Sunday that he'd been ruled out of the process by FIFA.

FIFA has not revealed the subject of the corruption inquiry, but it is not connected with allegations related to Qatar's hosting of the 2022 World Cup.

'CLEAR MESSAGE'

"Today the AFC and Asian football has shown solidarity and unity. The message has been clear to everyone both inside and outside Asia," Sheikh Salman told an executive committee meeting, according to an AFC statement. "Football in Asia is united and that is down to you-the members-and I thank you for sending out such a strong message that we stand united." According to officials, it will be months before another congress is held, with the AFC needing to give at least 30 days' notice and FIFA also taking up to four months to approve candidates.

AFC general secretary Windsor John told reporters that postponing the congress "was a clear message with one voice".

"The executive committee just decided that we will convene a new extraordinary congress after we have checked all the timelines with FIFA and with our statutes," he said.

Six candidates from Asia, including China seats on the FIFA Council, which was set up under anti-corruption reforms earlier this year in a bid for greater transparency. Three male candidates-Zhang Jian of China, Iran's Ali Kafashian Naeni and Zainudin Nordin of Singapore-were set to compete for two of the seats in today's vote. Former Australian footballer Moya Dodd was favourite to beat Mahfuza Ahkter of Bangladesh and North Korea's Han Un-Gyong to be the AFC's designated female representative.

Praful Patel, president of the All India Football Federation, said he wished the election had been handled differently. "It was not the right way to go about things. I wish this process had been done much earlier," he told AFP. "It's only fair that elections take place in a way that is fair and just. When people file nominations I think at that stage it's better if they know whether they are going to be able to contest or not," he added. FIFA boss Infantino has promised a clean-up of FIFA after a series of corruption scandals and bribery allegations plunged the body into crisis and left senior officials including ex-president Sepp Blatter banned from football. — AFP

After the highs of beating Borussia Dortmund in the 2013 Champions League final came Bayern's lows of semi-final exits to Real Madrid, Barcelona and then Atletico in each of the last three seasons under Pep

Atletico have won 25 of their last 30 home European games making the Estadio Vicente Calderon something of a cauldron. Last season's semi-final exit at the hands of Diego Simeone's Atletico was particularly painful for Bayern, who won the return leg

BERLIN: After three consecutive semi-final 2-1 in Munich after losing 1-0 in Madrid as the Spanish side reached the final on away goals. "In the last three years, we played three times against Spanish teams and always lost there," said Bayern chairman Karl-Heinz Rummenigge.

"We saw how strong Atletico are last season and you can't get much more of a tougher test. "Now we have the chance to show with Carlo (Ancelotti) that we can get at least a point there-or even three."

After Guardiola failed to steer Bayern to the Champions League final, his successor Ancelotti is the Bavarian giants' not-sosecret weapon.

Two years ago, Ancelotti's Real Madrid won the 2014 Champions League final with a 4-1 extra-time win over Atletico. "I really like Madrid and I'm looking forward to going back, I had two wonderful years there," said Ancelotti.

Sightseeing will be the last thing on the Italian's programme, with Ancelotti more concerned about French forward Antoine Griezmann, whose goals knocked Bayern out of Europe last May.

"He could play at any big club in Europe," said Ancelotti. Bayern smashed Russian side Rostov 5-0 in Munich in their opening Group D match, the same night Atletico won 1-0 at PSV Eindhoven.

But the German team's players know they will be in for a much sterner challenge today.

"It will be a difficult fight in Madrid and we have to at least get a few goals," said Bayern captain Philipp Lahm. Bayern defender Mats Hummels, who trained on Monday after limping out of Saturday's 1-0 win at Hamburg with a knee injury, says the Bundesliga leaders have a "pretty tricky task against one of the top favourites to win the Champions League". — AFP

Premier League must strike right BALANCE IN GLOBAL EXPANSION

MANCHESTER: The Premier League must find a balance between continuing its global expansion and ensuring clubs satisfy the local fan base and keep their stadia full in an era of television dominance, former FA vice-chairman David Dein has said.

A 39th game played abroad has been suggested as the league, which is broadcast globally, tries to enhance its exposure and popularity overseas.

"There is a balance to be struck," Dein, attending the Soccerex Global Convention as an ambassador for the Premier League, told Reuters. "The clubs want to promote themselves overseas, but you have to be careful you don't deny your fans the chance to see your team play.

"If, all of a sudden, they are playing in Sydney, you are not going to be able to make it to that game. "In the bigger picture it is great exposure but the fans are the life and soul of the game and there must be a balance. It is not a concern that football will lose its soul; the passion is there and the stadia exude a great

However Dein said the Premier League is "not complacent" and is looking to explore new markets. "People talk about China because of the massive population and it is an exploding market - they are increasingly involved in the Premier League now with ownership of clubs - but clubs are going all over the world on pre-season tours to promote themselves and television does it all for them," he said.

"The fact NBC in America shows every game simultaneously tells the story. Television makes people famous - people are wearing people Jamie Vardy shirts all over the world.

"Every league wants to be at the top. When I came into football in 1983 it was Italy, with England five or six. Now we are number one by a streak, the challenge is to stay there."

While the former Arsenal supremo does not favour the creation of a European Super League, he said he had previously been keen on the idea of Scottish giants Celtic and Rangers joining England's top flight.

"I'm opposed to a European Super League because we have that in a Champions League," he said. "Anything that is elitist I am against because just because your name is Barcelona or Real Madrid or Bayern Munich or Arsenal you should not expect to join an elite group. You have to earn the right.

"Leicester was a Cinderella story in the Premier League last season and we want those stories. "I once tried to promote Celtic and Rangers coming to the Premier League ... but I can't see it happening because of the fear factor of clubs worrying about them coming to take their place."—Reuters

LISBON: Sporting Lisbon got the victory it deserved this time, defeating Legia Warsaw 2-0 in Group F of the Champions League yesterday.

After a heartbreaking loss at Real Madrid in its opener, when it was leading until the 89th minute, Sporting rebounded with another good performance and secured the three points at home against the group's weakest team. The result left Sporting one point behind Real Madrid and Borussia Dortmund, which drew 2-2 in Germany. Legia remains without any points after two games. Sporting came close to opening the scoring when midfielder Gelson Martins hit the crossbar in front of the goal in the 18th. But Costa Rican playmaker Bryan Ruiz put the Portuguese side ahead from the far post in the 28th after Legia midfielder Miroslav Radovic failed to fully clear a cross into the area.

Dutch striker Bas Dost continued to impress at his new club by adding to the lead from close range in the 37th after a well-placed cross by captain Adrien Silva.

It was the fifth goal in as many games for Dost since his high-profile signing by Sporting in August. He had scored his first four goals in three Portuguese league appearances after arriving from German club Wolfsburg.

It was the seventh loss in 11 matches for Legia, which opened its Champions League campaign with a 6-0 thrashing by Dortmund. Legia's 39-year-old coach, Jacek Magiera, replaced Besnik Hasi a week ago.

Legia is in the group stage of the Champions League for the first time since the 1995-96 season. It next plays at Madrid, while Sporting hosts Dortmund. —AP

his goal to block Vietto's effort when clean through on goal. Ben Yedder then had a goal ruled out for offside against Samir Nasri in the build-up.

However, the Europa League holders had goalkeeper Sergio Rico to thank for being level at the break as his outstretched foot turned Maxwel Cornet's low effort to

Sevilla were greeted by a few timid boos as they left the field at half-time, but came out transformed at the start of the secondhalf. Nasri had already seen a fierce effort saved by Lopes by the time Ben Yedder followed up Vietto's intelligent header back across goal to nod the hosts into a 53rd minute lead.

Rico came to his side's rescue again two minutes later with a brilliant save from Tolisso after an excellent through ball from Fekir. Vietto had two golden chances to put the game beyond Lyon, but failed to take either as again he couldn't get the better of Lopes in a one-on-one. And when Nasri was chopped down by Jordy Gaspar inside the area, the on-loan Atletico Madrid striker chipped the ball well over the bar from the penalty spot. Tolisso fired another warning when his long-ranger effort was tipped onto the bar by Rico. Vietto's luck was out again 13 minutes from time when Jeremy Morel's brilliant goal line clearance denied the Argentina after he finally beat

SLIMANI SCORES AGAIN AS LEICESTER BEAT PORTO

LEICESTER: Leicester City striker Islam Slimani resumed his torment of Porto as the Premier League champions preserved their 100 percent Champions League record with a narrow 1-0 victory yesterday.

Playing in their first ever Champions League home game, Claudio Ranieri's Leicester prevailed thanks to Slimani's 25th-minute header to make it two wins from two in Group G.

Slimani earned the nickname 'The Dragon Slayer' for his scoring feats against Porto with former club Sporting Lisbon and he has now scored seven goals in seven career appearances against The Dragons. Eight years to the day previously at the King Power Stadium, Leicester had beaten Hartlepool United 1-0 in an English thirdtier game. Eight years on, they are the champions of England and having won 3-0 at Club Brugge in their opening group fixture, their fans will already be dreaming of a place in the last 16.

The European campaign is proving a welcome tonic for Leicester, whose faltering league title defence has seen them beaten three times already. Two-time European champions Porto, meanwhile, have now played 17 games on English soil without winning, losing and failing to score on their last five visits.

Porto right-back Miguel Layun made an enterprising start to the game, working fit-again Leicester goalkeeper Kasper Schmeichel with a curling shot and then whipping a low cross across goal. But Layun's defensive colleagues were quickly made to look uncomfortable by Leicester's muscular strike pairing of Slimani and Jamie Vardy. Brazilian centre-back Felipe was particularly discomfited, almost heading Christian Fuchs's long throw into his own net and then being booked for blocking Vardy's run.

The crowd sensed blood and in the 25th minute the breakthrough arrived courtesy of 28 million pounds (\$36.3 million, 32.3 million euros) record signing Slimani.

Marc Albrighton switched play with a glorious crossfield pass, Riyad Mahrez shaped an inviting cross to the back post and Slimani outmuscled Felipe to plant a diving header past Iker Casillas. It was the Algeria international's third goal in four appearances for Leicester and the sixth goal he had scored past Casillas in 2016 alone. Layun flicked the side-netting at the other end with a free-kick, but half-time arrived without Porto having seriously threatened. Mahrez threatened to extend Leicester's lead shortly before the hour with a zipping low drive that Casillas had to turn around his left-hand post. Nuno Espirito Santo made a double change moments later, sending on Hector Herrera and Diogo Jota for Andre Andre and Adrian Lopez, and the entrants enlivened the visitors' attacking efforts.

Both players tested Schmeichel shortly after entering the fray, Jota with a deflected shot and Herrera with an ambitious long-range strike that the diving Dane turned behind for a corner.

There was one big scare when Schmeichel came to punch a cross and missed, but substitute Jesus Corona's volley flicked off Albrighton, struck the right-hand post and rebounded to safety. — AFP

PJANIC, HIGUAIN HELP JUVENTUS EASE TO 4-0 WIN OVER DINAMO

ZAGREB: Juventus' big summer signings proved their worth as Miralem Pjanic and Gonzalo Higuain helped the Italian side to a 4-0 win at Dinamo Zagreb in the Champions League yes-

Pjanic scored one and set up another to put Juventus firmly in charge at halftime. Paulo Dybala and Dani Alves sealed matters after the break. Juventus moved top of Group H, level on points with Sevilla after the Spanish side beat Lyon 1-0. Dinamo, which lost 3-0 at Lyon in the first round of fixtures, remained bottom. Massimiliano Allegri's side knew it needed a win after drawing 0-0 at home to Sevilla in its opening match in Europe's elite club competition.

Juventus dominated from the start and broke the deadlock in the 26th minute. Two Dinamo defenders got in each other's way and, as Leonardo Sigali attempted to head Leonardo Bonucci's ball back to his goalkeeper, Pjanic nipped in behind them and slotted into the bottom right corner.

Dinamo almost leveled immediately with its best chance of the match but Gordon Schildenfeld headed Domagoj Antolic's free kick onto the crossbar with Gianluigi Buffon beaten.

Pjanic, who had been signed for 32 million euros from Roma in the offseason, helped Juventus double its lead in the 31st with a stunning pass for Higuain to chest down and volley into the bottom far corner.

Higuain transferred from rival Napoli for 90 million euros (\$99 million) after scoring 36 goals last campaign to break a 66-year-old Serie A record. Dinamo was offering little resistance and Dybala extended Juve's lead with a stunning

strike, sending the ball swerving into the top near corner from more than 30 yards (meters).

Dani Alves, who was also signed in the offseason, had done little of note all match but he got on the scoresheet five minutes from time with a deflected free kick.

Dinamo goalkeeper Adrian Semper was wrongfooted by the deflection and although the 18-year-old managed to get a hand to the ball, he couldn't keep it out. The only moment for Dinamo fans to cheer was when former player Marko Pjaca, who scored 12 goals for the Croatian side last season, came on as a substitute in the 68th minute for Juventus.

Pjaca, who is yet to score for Juventus, also helped Dinamo reach the group stage with two goals in a preliminary round match against FK Vardar, —AP

SCHUERRLE STRIKES LATE AS DORTMUND DENY REAL

DORTMUND: Andre Schuerrle rescued Borussia Dortmund yesterday with an 87th-minute equaliser to seal a 2-2 draw with Real Madrid and deny the Spaniards a rare Champions League win in Germany.

Real were minutes from a first win in Dortmund in six attempts, and the result means the Spanish giants have won only four times in 30 away games against German clubs.

Madrid took the lead when Cristiano Ronaldo netted his 95th Champions League goal early on. Dortmund's Pierre-Emerick Aubameyang was credited with the equaliser just before the break after a deflection off Raphael Varane.

But the French international enjoyed second-half redemption when he stabbed home on 68 minutes before Dortmund levelled in the dying stages.

Ronaldo had been left fuming after being substituted by Real coach Zinedine Zidane for the final 20 minutes of Saturday's 2-2 draw at Las Palmas in La Liga.

And the superstar chose to celebrate his goal at Dortmund's Signal Iduna Park with his Portugal team-mates Fabio Coentrao and Pepe, who were on the Real bench, with Zidane in the background.

Dortmund dominated the opening quarter of an hour before Ronaldo's opener and both goalkeepers were tested in the first five minutes. Matthias Ginter gave away a free-kick just outside the area and Ronaldo's powerful shot was blocked by Dortmund shot-stopper Roman Burki. At the other end, Gonzalo Castro's well-struck shot tested Costa Rica goalkeeper Keylor Navas, who was making his

Ronaldo was lucky that the referee failed to spot his clear handball from an Aubameyang free-kick shortly after, and teenage French winger Ousmane Dembele then fired over.

first appearance of the season after injury.

But Real took the lead when Ronaldo finished off a sweeping move. Luka Modric and Karim Benzema combined to get the ball out

of their own half.
When the ball was played into the

Dortmund area, James Rodriguez fed Gareth Bale who played the ball back between his legs for Ronaldo to sweep his shot home on

17 minutes.

At the other end, Aubameyang clipped the bar and was pulled up for offside on 29 minutes before a bullet header from defender Sokratis Papastathopoulos was too close to Navas. But Dortmund kept up the pressure and drew level on 43 minutes when Navas opted to punch out a Raphael Guerreiro freekick. The ball rebounded into the net off the unfortunate Varane with Aubameyang in close proximity, although the Gabon striker was officially given the goal. The equaliser was lucky, but it was no more than Dortmund

deserved. Just before the half-time whistle, Ronaldo's header hit the back of the Dortmund net, but the flag went up for off-side. Dortmund coach Thomas Tuchel introduced Schuerrle for Germany's World Cupwinner Mario Goetze on 58 minutes in what proved to be an inspired switch.

Real took the lead a second time when Varane followed in to score after a Benzema attempt had struck the post and the bar. But Dortmund were not done, and when Aubameyang's attempt at an overhead kick distracted Danilo, the ball brushed off his chest and into Schuerrle's path as the Germany winger fired home the equaliser.— AFP

ENGLAND BOSS SACKED AFTER NEWSPAPER STING

LONDON: Sam Allardyce was sacked as England manager yesterday having behaved "inappropriately" when seeking a lucrative sideline role while talking to undercover reporters, bringing a crushing end to his dream job after one match and 67 days in charge.

The 61-year-old's fall from grace was swift after he was summoned to a meeting with new FA chairman Greg Clarke and chief executive Martin Glenn to discuss overnight revelations from an undercover sting set up by Britain's Daily Telegraph newspaper.

Amid a series of injudicious comments, the issue that seems likely to have persuaded Clarke to use his authority was Allardyce's comments about how FA and FIFA rules banning transfers involving third-party ownership could be circumnavigated.

The Telegraph, which says it has hundreds of pages of transcripts from the meeting, said Allardyce was negotiating a deal worth 400,000 pounds (\$520,840.00) to represent a Far East firm seeking advice on the transfer market.

The money would be paid for a series of visits and speeches and, though Allardyce made it clear at the meeting that any arrangement would have to be cleared with the FA and on Tuesday apologised for what he described as an error of judgement, he was forced out of the biggest job in

British football.

"Allardyce's conduct was inappropriate of the England manager," the FA said in a statement. "He accepts he made a significant error of judgement and has apologised. However, due to the serious nature of his actions, The FA and Allardyce have mutually agreed to terminate his contract with immediate effect.

"This is not a decision that was taken lightly but The FA's priority is to protect the wider interests of the game and maintain the highest standards of conduct in football.

"The manager of the England men's senior team is a position which must demonstrate strong leadership and show respect for the integrity of the game at all times."

MANAGERIAL REPUTATION

Allardyce, a former no-nonsense centre half, built his managerial reputation largely by getting the best out of unfashionable or struggling clubs, including Bolton Wanderers, Newcastle United, Blackburn Rovers, West Ham United and Sunderland.

He was appointed England manager in July following the departure of Roy Hodgson after this year's poor showing by England at the European Championship and has overseen only the 1-0 World Cup qualifying win over Slovakia.

One of the highest-paid managers in the game with a salary of about three million pounds (\$3.9 million) a year, Allardyce was secretly filmed by the Telegraph discussing England's failings with a group he had been told were businessmen with interests in Singapore and Hong Kong.

During his meetings with the newspaper's undercover reporters, Allardyce also criticised his predecessor Hodgson's speech impediment, referring to him as "Woy" and saying he "hasn't got the personality" for public speaking.

He also made a rambling attack on the UK's tax authorities, calling them "the most corrupt business in Britain".

"We've concluded, and Sam's agreed, that his behaviour has been inappropriate," the FA's Glenn said. "(It's) not what's expected of an England manager, discussing a range of issues from potential contraventions of FA rules to personal comments that frankly don't work when you're the manager of England.

"Sam is absolutely distraught, he recognises that he made a terrible error of judgement and I think he recognises as well that whilst it's a tough decision that the FA are taking, he can see that at least we have a point."

Seventeen years after Glenn Hoddle was sacked for making comments about the disabled, Allardyce leaves with the tag of being his coun-

try's shortest-serving manager.

There seemed little sympathy for him among those giving early reaction to the news. "I'm angry, I'm sad, I'm staggered at the misjudgement from a guy who admitted this was his dream job," former England striker Alan Shearer told the BBC. "It's incredible and a catastrophic misjudgement by Sam

and his advisors.
"I'm angry at the whole situation, I didn't

think England could stoop any lower from what happened in the summer at the Euros. Now here we are, a laughing stock of world football."

Gareth Southgate, the early favourite for the job, will take charge of the next four matches against Malta, Slovenia, Scotland and Spain while the FA searches for a new manager, with Steve Bruce, Alan Pardew and Eddie Howe also in the running. — Reuters

Alghanim said: "Since the birth of the oil industry, the government has employed the vast majority of our people. Today, the government employs over 85 percent of our people. But it can't continue doing so in a low oil price environment. Who is going to give jobs to Kuwait's young people? The solutions to these problems lie in fostering a culture of entrepreneurship, executing infrastructure projects, and implementing privatization".

With regard to entrepreneurship, he said: "Young people need to be taught the skills the private sector requires such as critical thinking, problem solving, empathy, creativity, and flexibility. It is equally important that we embrace taking calculated and controllable risks because nothing in business can be achieved without taking risk". He further added that companies must create environments where talent and innovation can thrive and where young people can

flourish. He stressed the importance of reaching out to youth. "Through our work with INJAZ we offer educational programs on entrepreneurial and leadership skills to build successful careers for high school and university students. But we must start even earlier, in elementary school."

Addressing infrastructure issues in Kuwait is also of great importance. Alghanim commented: "Infrastructure is vital for competitiveness as a country; we've seen good progress on this front recently, with some overdue mega-projects now underway. In order to maintain momentum, we should also allow the focus to be on bite-sized projects, because both the funding and the execution are easier."

SAUDIS, IRAN DASH HOPES FOR OPEC DEAL

ALGIERS: Saudi Arabia and Iran yesterday dashed hopes that OPEC oil producers could clinch an output-limiting deal in Algeria this week as sources said the group and non-member Russia were still trying to bridge differences between the kingdom and Tehran. "This is a consultative meeting ... We will consult with everyone else, we will hear the views, we will hear the secretariat of OPEC and also hear from consumers," Saudi Energy Minister Khalid Al-Falih told reporters. Iranian Oil Minister Bijan Zanganeh said: "It is not the time for decision-making." Referring to the next formal OPEC meeting in Vienna on Nov. 30, he added: "We will try to reach agreement for November." The Organization of the Petroleum Exporting Countries will hold informal talks at 1400 GMT on Wednesday. Its members are also meeting non-OPEC producers on the sidelines of the International Energy Forum, which groups producers and consumers.

Oil prices have more than halved from 2014 levels due to oversupply, prompting OPEC producers and rival Russia to seek a market rebalancing that would boost revenues from oil exports and help their crippled budgets. The predominant idea since early 2016 among producers has been to agree to freeze output levels, although market watchers have said such a move would fail to reduce unwanted

A deal has also been complicated by acute political rivalry between Iran and Saudi Arabia, which are fighting several proxy-wars in the Middle East, including in Syria and Yemen. Sources told Reuters last week that Saudi Arabia had offered to reduce its output if Iran agreed to freeze production, a shift in Riyadh's position as the kingdom had previously

refused to discuss output cuts.

WHAT IRAN WANTS

Yesterday, several OPEC delegates said the positions of Saudi Arabia and Iran remained too far apart. Oil prices were down nearly 3 percent. Three OPEC sources said Iran, whose production has stagnated at 3.6 million barrels per day, insisted on having the right to ramp that up to around 4.1-4.2 million bpd, while OPEC Gulf members wanted its output to be frozen below 4 million.

"Don't expect anything unless Iran suddenly changes its mind and agrees to a freeze. But I don't think they will," an OPEC source familiar with discussions said. The Saudi and Iranian economies depend heavily on oil, but Iran is seeing the pressure easing as it emerges from years of sanctions. Riyadh, on the other hand, faces a second year of record budget deficits and is being forced to cut the salaries of government employees.

Russian Energy Minister Alexander Novak met Zanganeh yesterday in what sources said was a new attempt to persuade Tehran to play ball. Several other sources said Algeria and Qatar were also talking to Iran in a bid to rescue a deal. Speaking to Reuters in between meetings on whether a deal was still possible this week, Zanganeh said: "I cannot predict."

BLAME GAME

Iranian oil sources said Tehran wanted OPEC to allow it to produce 12.7 percent of the group's output, equal to what it was extracting before 2012, when the European Union imposed additional sanctions on the country for its nuclear activities. Sanctions were eased in January 2016.

Between 2012 and 2016, Saudi Arabia and other Gulf OPEC members have raised output to compete for market share with higher-cost producers such as the United States. As a result, Iran believes its fair production share in OPEC should be higher than its current output, which it says should rise once Tehran agrees new investments with international oil companies. Saudi output has risen to 10.7 million bpd from 10.2 million in recent months due to local needs for summer cooling.

Gary Ross, a veteran OPEC watcher and founder of U.S.-based think tank PIRA, said Saudi output had risen too steeply in recent months and even if it were cut to pre-summer levels, Iran would see an offer to freeze its own output as unfair. "It is a carefully calculated offer because Saudi Arabia knows it will not be acceptable to Iran ... Saudi Arabia wants to put the blame of OPEC inaction in Algiers on Iran," Ross said. Bjarne Schieldrop, chief commodities analyst at SEB Markets, said: "We cannot see how Iran could possibly accept the Saudi offer. It would be like asking a long-time prisoner who was finally released from prison to go back again."

He said the lack of a deal in Algeria would result in further downside pressure on oil as Saudi Arabia would maintain elevated output levels and Iran would boost supply too.

Falih said he was, nevertheless, optimistic about the oil market although rebalancing was taking longer than expected. He said record global stocks of oil had started to decline: "How fast will it take place, it also depends on the production agreement. If there is a consensus on one in the next few months, Saudi Arabia will be with the consensus view." — Reuters

SAUDI TUMBLES ON **AUSTERITY MEASURES**

MIDEAST STOCK MARKETS

DUBAI: Saudi Arabia's stock index slumped 3.8 percent yesterday after the government said it would cut ministers' salaries by 20 percent and scale back financial bonuses and perks for public sector workers under an austerity drive. The new steps largely appear to formalize spending reductions introduced on an ad hoc basis since last year, and they will not by themselves make a huge difference to the government's deficit. NCB Capital estimated allowances accounted for about a quarter of the government's total salary expenses last year, which were 38 percent of its overall budget.

Nevertheless, the announcement underlined the bleak outlook for Saudi government spending, which is a key driver of consumption, as oil prices stay low. None of the 170 traded Saudi shares rose on Tuesday with roughly 30 percent of them dropping their 10 percent daily limits as trading volume jumped above the three-month average. The index posted its biggest daily percentage drop since January.

The retail and insurance sectors were hard hit. Luxury goods retailer Fitaihi slumped 10.0 percent and supermarket operator Al Othaim Markets dropped 4.7 percent. The insurance sub-index retreated 5.9 percent; the sector is

chiefly traded by local retail investors. "Disposable income has been hit - traders can no longer afford to participate in the stock market because they now have to divert this money towards paying bills," said a Jeddahbased broker. "Moving forward I think there will be far more prudence when it comes to trading the speculative stocks. For the value traders, this may be a good time to hunt for value."

Banking shares, which had rallied on Monday, erased some of those gains with National Commercial Bank, a lender with close ties to the public sector, down 3.5 percent and Aljazira Bank, which does considerable business with stock market participants, shedding 5.4

UAE, KUWAIT

Dubai's main index pulled back 0.8 percent with 24 stocks declining and eight advancing. Builder Drake & Scull, which has substantial exposure to Saudi business, dropped 1.8 percent and Dubai Parks and Resorts retreated 1.3 percent. Blue chips weighed on Abu Dhabi's index, which fell 0.5 percent. Dana Gas lost 3.6 percent and First Gulf Bank declined 1.3 percent. In Kuwait, banking shares rose after the central bank governor said the banking system was stable, with non-performing loans dropping to 2.4 percent of total loans in 2015 from

Al Ahli Bank rose 1.6 percent and Boubyan Bank added 1.3 percent. The main index edged up 0.1 percent. Meanwhile Cairo's main index fell 0.3 percent in thin trade with losers outnumbering gainers 22 to three. Qalaa Holdings, a private equity company, declined 3.3 percent. — Reuters

TANKER BRINGS FIRST US SHALE GAS TO BRITAIN

Ship Carrying 27,500 cubic metres of ethane arrives at Grangemouth

GRANGEMOUTH, United Kingdom: A tanker carrying the first shipment of shale gas from the United States arrived yesterday in Britain, where North Sea gas supplies are dwindling and there is fierce public opposition to fracking.

The ship carrying 27,500 cubic metres of ethane arrived at Grangemouth, a sprawling energy complex on the River Forth west of Edinburgh, but was not able to dock due to high winds.

The shipment of Pennsylvania gas arrived in Scottish style, a lone bagpiper playing from the tanker's prow as it passed under the Forth's iconic 19th-century rail-

A £2 billion (2.3 billion euros, \$2.6 billion) investment by Ineos, the world's third largest chemical company, will create a "virtual pipeline" with eight tankers transporting regular shipments across the Atlantic Ocean to Britain and Norway. "There simply is insufficient raw material coming out of the North Sea to run Grangemouth," Ineos chairman Jim Ratcliffe told a press conference.

The gas shipment will help make up for dwindling offshore supplies which once flowed in abundance from the North Sea but have become increasingly difficult and costly to extract as wells have matured. North Sea oil production hit a record low

last year as the global oil price plummeted. They have since risen, going up more than 10 percent in 2015, according to the sector's annual report.

A new shipment of gas will arrive every three weeks at Grangemouth, where it will be broken down using a chemical process called "cracking" and used to make plastics for bottles, pipes, cabling, insulation, food packaging and pharmaceutical equip-

The deal is expected to support thousands of jobs in Scotland but the controversial method of extracting the gas, known as hydraulic fracturing or "fracking", has divided political opinion and caused a headache for Scottish First Minister Nicola

Scotland has a moratorium on fracking. While the British government has given the go-ahead for projects in the rest of the country, none are currently under way, often due to lengthy local planning procedures and legal action. One project won approval in May as councillors in Yorkshire, northern England, gave the go-ahead to a plan by shale company Third Energy but work has yet to begin.

Fracking 'hypocrisy'

Ineos chairman Jim Ratcliffe said the import deal has secured the future of Grangemouth, which was on the brink of closure only a few years ago. "This is a hugely important day for Ineos and the UK. Shale gas can help stop the decline of British manufacturing and today is first step in that direction," Ratcliffe said.

We're talking about 10,000 jobs in total that depend on that Grangemouth facility,

so if it were not for the shale gas we are bringing in from the USA, Grangemouth would have closed three years ago."

Ratcliffe has accused the Scottish government of "hypocrisy" by brokering a deal to save the plant but then leaving it dependent on US imports by refusing to allow fracking in Scotland.

Think tank Reform Scotland in a report this month said the ban is "not logical" given the Scottish government's support for offshore oil and gas. The Scottish government said it had commissioned reports into fracking "to inform our evidence-led approach" whose results are expected later this year. Fracking is credited with reviving the fortunes of US "rust belt" states that had fallen into industrial decline by the turn of the century, but campaigners say this has come at the cost of damage to the environment, human and animal health, safety, property value, and quality of life.

US shale is facing a similar backlash in Scotland. The Friends of the Earth Scotland campaign group said Grangemouth was being propped up "on the back of human suffering and environmental destruction across the Atlantic". Jim Ratcliffe, a lawmaker from the

Scottish Greens, accused Ineos of "bullish behaviour" and said Grangemouth should be converted to renewables. — AFP

Kuwait oil price down 99 cents to \$40.03pb

KUWAIT: Price of Kuwaiti crude oil went down 99 cents to \$40.03 per barrel yesterday after it was at \$41.02 pb last Friday, said Kuwait Petroleum Corporation (KPC) yesterday. In international markets, the oil price also went down due to indications that major exporters would not reach a consensus on setting an output ceiling during next week, in addition to reports indicating the US would record highest rise in a number of drilling rigs since collapse of the crude oil prices two years ago. Meanwhile, price of the Brent Blend moved up upon settlement \$1.46 to \$47.35 pb. West Texas crude oil also rose \$1.45 to \$45.93 pb.

US dollar stable against KD at 0.301

KUWAIT: The US dollar's exchange rate against the Kuwaiti dinar was stable at KD 0.301 yesterday, the same case with the euro's rate which stabilized at KD 0.338 compared to Monday's exchange rates, said the Central Bank of Kuwait (CBK). Exchange rate of the Sterling Pound went down to KD 0.390, the same case with the Swiss Franc which stood at KD 0.310. The Japanese Yen remained unchanged at KD 0.002.

Oman sets final guidance on dual trance dollar tap

MUSCAT: The Sultanate of Oman has set final guidance on its dual-tranche US dollar tap, according to a lead. The June 2021 increase is now being marketed at 230bp-235bp over Treasuries and the June 2026 increase at plus 315bp-320bp, both to price within the range. Marketing for the June 2021s began at plus 250bp area, before being revised to plus 240bp area. Marketing for the June 2026s started at plus 335bp area and was revised to plus 325bp area. Combined books at the last update were over \$3.4 billion. Citigroup, JP Morgan, Mitsubishi UFG, National Bank of Abu Dhabi and Natixis are running the 144A/Reg S trade, which is today's business. Oman is rated Baa1 by Moody's and BBB- by Standard and Poor's.

BAHRAIN NEEDS EXTERNAL SHARIA AUDITORS FOR ISLAMIC BANKS

MANAMA: Bahrain's central bank has proposed new governance rules that would require Islamic banks in the kingdom to conduct external sharia audits of their operations, representing a shift away from the longheld practice of self-regulation.

Islamic banks in the Gulf have traditionally used inhouse boards of Islamic scholars to determine whether religious principles are being obeyed, such as a ban on payment of interest.

Some scholars argue that this decentralized approach allows more flexibility and diversity in Islamic finance, but there has been growing support in the region for measures to increase transparency and reduce scope for conflicts of interest. Such measures would aim to address concerns of potential customers who believe that the banks too closely mimic conventional finance operations. Bahrain's central bank said that a public consultation period for its draft rules would close on Oct. 16. The draft is part of an effort by Bahrain to regain prominence in Islamic finance, an industry it helped to pioneer, against competition from centres such as Dubai and Kuala Lumpur. — Reuters

ECONOMIC DIVERSIFICATION AND TRANSFORMATION: THE NEED OF THE HOUR

iversification has evolved into a key factor across all businesses thanks to the way technology is digitally disrupting every facet of modern life. Both, young digital and historic tangible organizations are blurring the lines between the two in the name of sustainable growth and market share. But economic diversification is even more vital for resource-based economies like the ones I work with - Russia, Middle East and Africa - in today's particularly volatile market.

Crude oil and natural gas prices have dipped to their lowest levels since 2009. The impact of which has been huge. As Focus Economics explains, "Oil prices are still low and this is hurting oil-producing countries' coffers, while geopolitical risks, subdued global demand and challenging domestic conditions are putting a dent in MENA's

growth." As such, many natural resource rich countries are embracing economic diversification. The most widely documented being Saudi Arabia's ambitious 'Vision 2030' agenda. The country is transforming its public and private sector and ways to manage its vast resources. But of course diversification requires transformation, both in terms of the way organizations operate and their digital infrastructure. New revenue streams and partnerships mean new business models, processes and channels. And these must all be supported and enabled by relevant technology

Almost everyone I speak to, no matter the region or vertical, realizes that in order to be competitive they have to embrace these new approaches and technologies. Our recent State of IT Transformation report, which assessed over 660 global enterprises across 18 industries, states that organizations have clear technological goals. It shows that CIOs are looking to reduce IT costs and use those savings to make investments in digital transformations. CIOs view creating a hybrid cloud architecture as a key enabler for them to provide the automation and self-service that will reduce operating costs.

However, while the majority understands this - they're not always able to execute a transformation, for a number of reasons. According to a survey undertaken for EMC by Arlington Research reveals that more than 39 percent of professionals believe that in their companies the IT agenda is set by functions such as marketing and sales other than IT. This disconnect is clearly evident across the boardroom. The study also states that many IT professionals are concerned that their company will struggle to overcome IT challenges and harness new opportunities if they do not have the right infrastructure or tools. Moreover, this could also lead to IT inhibiting rather than enabling innovation in the organization.



Furthermore, drastic economic and political changes mean that finances are being squeezed more than ever. Every single IT decision must have a clear business case that provides short, medium and long term ROI.. Secondly, maturity is an issue. Just because a

business wants to implement a new technology, doesn't always mean it's ready to. As our report showed, 50 percent of organizations still rate themselves as low in overall maturity, when it comes to implementing these solu-

Most organizations face a complicated future as they do not always plan these types of programs and applications on a greenfield site. So to be successful you need to consider how you deal with legacy IT. I'm working with several financial services companies based in Africa & the Middle East who are in the process of planning their long-term transformational roadmap to become a marketleader. TO DRASTICALLY CUTS GLOBAL TRADE FORECAST

GENEVA: The World Trade Organization yesterday downshifted its global trade forecast, warning that anti-globalisation rhetoric and Brexit were pushing trade growth to its slowest pace since the financial crisis.

The warning comes as talks on a landmark free trade deal between the European Union and United States battle stiff opposition and as Britain's EU exit causes jitters. The WTO said that global trade was now estimated to expand by just 1.7 percent this year, compared to its April projection of 2.8 percent. The new figure is also a far cry from a projection a year ago that trade

would swell by 3.9 percent this year. Describing it as "wake-up call", the Genevabased global trade body said growth had fallen to its slowest pace in around seven years when the global financial crisis hit.

"With expected global GDP (gross domestic product) growth of 2.2 percent in 2016, this year would mark the slowest pace of trade and output growth since the financial crisis of 2009," the trade body said in a statement. Looking ahead, the WTO said several issues, including Brexit's possible impact, had now cast a shadow and it had revised down its 2017 forecast.

Trade is now expected to grow between 1.8-3.1 percent, down from the previously anticipated 3.6 percent, said the WTO, which sets the rules of global commerce. Also clouding the outlook, the WTO said, is "the possibility that growing anti-trade rhetoric will increasingly be reflected in trade policy" as well as financial volatility due to monetary policy changes in developed countries.

"The recent run of weak trade and economic, growth suggests the need for a better understanding of changing global economic relationships," it said. It warned that "creeping protectionism", coupled with lacking trade liberalization and perhaps the growing role of the digital economy and e-commerce might help explain the recent declining ratio of trade growth to GDP growth. Last week, the Paris-based Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development said Britain — the world's fifthbiggest economy-was poised to take a major hit next year from its decision to leave the EU. The WTO said that the main impact of the shock vote in June had been on the value of the pound and noted that it had not sparked an immediate economic downturn. But, it added: "Effects over the longer term remain to be seen. Economic forecasts for the UK in 2017 range from fairly optimistic to quite pessimistic."

'Anti-globalisation sentiment'

The WTO said the downgrade followed a sharper-than-expected decline in merchandise trade volumes in the first quarter, and a smallerthan-expected rehound in the second quarter

The contraction, it said, was driven especially by slowing economic and trade growth in developing economies like China and Brazil. China's banking sector debt came into the crosshairs earlier this month of the global central bank watchdog, the Bank for International Settlements, fuelling fresh fears about the world's second biggest economy. But, said the WTO, North America, which showed the

strongest import growth of any region between 2014 and 2015, was also hit by deceleration.

"The dramatic slowing of trade growth is serious and should serve as a wake-up call," WTO director general Robert Azevedo warned in the statement. "It is particularly concerning in the context of growing anti-globalisation sentiment," he added, cautioning against this translating into "misguided policies".

Azevedo also highlighted the negative impact of inequality. "While the benefits of trade are clear, it is also clear that they need to be shared more widely," he insisted. "We should seek to build a more inclusive trading system that goes further to support poorer countries to take part and benefit, as well as entrepreneurs, small companies, and marginalised groups in all economies," he said. "This is a moment to heed the lessons of history and re-commit to openness in trade, which can help to spur economic growth," Azevedo said. — AFP

'HARD BREXIT' WORRIES PIN STERLING AT SIX-WEEK LOWS

LONDON: Three months after Britain's vote to leave the European Union, fears in currency markets of a "hard Brexit" that would drive an exodus of banks from London have knocked sterling to within sight of its weakest levels in decades.

It has been a rollercoaster ride for investors and companies worried by or speculating on the value of the pound, which slumped 13 cents on the shock result of the June 23 vote but had recovered around half of that by early this

That broadly reflects shifts in expectations of how the economy will deal with the fallout from talks that may deprive Britain of its membership of the single market as the quid pro quo for imposing controls on immigration.

Comments from some of the ministers responsible for steering Brexit have raised expectations of that more disruptive scenario in the last 10 days, knocking sterling back below \$1.30 and to a six-week low of 87 pence per euro on Monday. The pound was pinned around

those levels on Tuesday. "If you take (Prime Minister) Theresa May at her words, we will go for a hard Brexit and that is clearly a worry," said Neil Mellor, a strategist with Bank of New York Mellon. "It's about the huge amount of activity that the UK would be precluded from doing. Clearing (of euro trades) is one issue and there are a lot of activities that relate to that.

"Given how important the City is to the UK in terms of growth ... it is a negative." Forecasts for the pound after the vote were almost universally bleak. A number of major banks predicted a fall to around \$1.20, levels not seen since the Plaza Accord's move to weaken the dollar in the mid-1980s. But the pound has so far held up better than that, bottoming out in early July at \$1.2798, still a 30-year low but a long way short of many forecasts.

Analysts and traders have argued since about the reasons for the halt. Many point to record-high market positioning against the pound that means there is limited space in the trading books run by banks and speculative investors to bet further against the British currency. Those bets were trimmed in the last month.— Reuters

CLOUDS GATHER OVER TURKEY **ECONOMY AFTER DOWNGRADE**

ISTANBUL: Turkey has snarled with anger over a downgrade of its debt to junk status, but its previously robust economic performance risks being bruised by lower growth, stalled reforms and rule of law concerns after the July 15 coup bid. Strong growth since the ruling party of President Recep Tayyip Erdogan came to power in 2002 amid the wreckage of financial crisis has been one of the Turkish strongman's political aces. Millions of Turks now enjoy higher incomes and backwaters in the nation's interior have been transformed into thriving manufacturing hubs.

Meanwhile, Turkey has impressed even Erdogan's critics with resilience in the face of global economic troubles, posting growth of 4.0 percent in 2015 and defying predictions of meltdown in the wake of the coup. But downgrade by Moody's on Friday came after a slew of indications the economy was starting to hurt, with July industrial production plummeting and second guarter growth slowing to 3.1 percent from 4.7 in the first. "The growth outlook is weak. Domestic demand seems to have slowed sharply after the coup attempt, due to a hit to confidence," William Jackson, emerging markets economist at of Capital Economics in London told AFP, projecting growth to be just 2.0 percent in 2017.

'Rule of law concerns'

The move by Moody's to downgrade to Ba1 its assessment of Turkey's capacity to pay back debts brought the rating into junk status, a level deemed speculative due to a higher default risk.

With Standard and Poor's also downgrading Turkey's rating deeper into junk in July, only Fitch, of the world's big three ratings agencies, still assesses Turkish debt at so-called investment grade. The government reacted with pique, with Prime Minister Binali Yildirim saying on Saturday that Moody's was biased and government spokesman Numan Kurtulmus alleging the move was "politically motivated".

Explaining its decision, Moody's pointed to some long-standing troubles in the Turkish economy, in particular the high current account deficit and external debt which together it said will account for 26 percent of GDP in 2016 and 2017. But Moody's also touched a nerve by suggesting Ankara's response to the failed July 15 coup-which has seen tens of thousands either arrested or dismissed from their jobs-would negatively impact growth. It cited concerns about the "predictability and effectiveness" of government policy and the rule of law.

'Likely to disappoint'

Michael Harris, global head of research at investment bank Renaissance Capital, said it was "very understandable" Ankara was unhappy over the downgrade after it showed fiscal discipline, kept the debt to GDP ratio in check and launched a key pensions reform. But he said markets were looking closely at the rule of law, in particular when the three month post-coup state of emergency comes to an end in October. "Long term, any deterioration in the rule of law has an impact on the willingness to invest," Harris told AFP. — AFP

EUROPE'S BANK ANGST SOURS US DEBATE RALLY

LONDON: Worries about Europe's banks wrenched stocks into reverse yesterday and halted a surge in Mexico's peso that followed Democrat Hillary Clinton's victory over Republican Donald Trump in the first US presidential debate. Europe's mood soured as Deutsche Bank shares hit another record low on nagging worries about the lender's health and left Wall Street futures pricing in barely a rise for the S&P 500 and Dow Jones Industrial.

Trading was still expected to still be frenetic after a marathon TV debate between Trump and Clinton on Monday evening that was estimated to have pulled in nearly 100 million viewers.

Markets have tended to see Clinton as the

candidate of the status quo, while few are sure what a Trump presidency might mean for US foreign policy, international trade deals or the domestic economy. Snap polls after the debate suggested Clinton had bolstered her chances of winning November's election. She accused Republican Trump of racism, sexism and tax avoidance while the real estate tycoon, making his first run for public office, said Clinton's long years of service represented "bad experience".

For markets the clear victor was the Mexican peso, which surged as much as 2.3 percent after hitting an all-time lows on fears that a Trump presidency would threaten Mexico's exports to the United States, its single biggest market. Those gains had been pruned to just

over 1.6 percent before the start of US and Mexican trading although the currency didn't look keen to give back much more.

"The Mexican peso has become the main market proxy for Trump on-Trump off," said Saxo Bank's head of FX strategy John Hardy, pointing to its near 9 percent fall versus the dollar this year.

"It was probably becoming a bit too cheap ... but as long as you don't know the result of US election that proxy (US election) risk is probably going to stay." Deutsche Bank wasn't the only European banks in the firing line. Shares in UK-based Standard Chartered fell 2.5 percent on reports that it was facing a US probe over an Indonesian investment.

Europe was also digesting news that a referendum over Italian Prime Minister Matteo Renzi's flagship constitutional reform will be held on Dec 4, with the fate of his administration likely to hinge on the outcome. It was one of the latest dates he could have picked and gives him maximum time to try and turn around what at present looks like a defeat. That offered investors some comfort and Italian bond yields fell to a 2-1/2-week low.

"It is being kicked down the road quite a bit, this can," said Rabobank's head of macro strategy research Elwin de Groot. "He is trying to buy time but that could also be a risk. He is banking that he will win back a bit of public support but there is the possibility that he might not."

OIL PRESSURE

There was mixed news from the European Central Bank as data showed loans to eurozone businesses dipped slightly in August despite its massive stimulus program. The euro fell for the first time in five days, slipping 0.25 percent to \$1.1225 and to 1.1563 per pound. Oil markets were also in flux as the world's largest producers gathered in Algeria to discuss ways to tackle a crude glut that has battered prices for two years now. A source from Iran, where production is on the comeback after years of international sanctions, told Reuters it wanted 12.7 percent of any new OPEC output ceiling to help it reclaim its market share. Saudi Arabia has suggested it would need Iran to freeze its production for it to do the same.

In Asia, MSCI's broadest index of Asia-Pacific shares outside Japan had recouped early losses to rise 0.6 percent and Japan's Nikkei swung 0.8 percent higher, having been down 1.5 percent at one stage. The US dollar rebounded as high as 100.83 yen from a one-month low around 100.08 though it was fading again in the first flurry of New York trading as European banking sector strains returned.

Hong Kong's Hang Seng index advanced 1.1 percent to 23,571.79 and Tokyo's Nikkei 225 was up 0.6 percent at 16,635.29. The Shanghai Composite Index was unchanged at 2,969.14. Seoul's Kospi added 0.9 percent to 2,017.94 and Sydney's S&P-ASX 200 rose 0.4 percent to 5,497.40. India's Sensex gained 0.2 percent to 28,342.26 and benchmarks in New Zealand and Thailand advanced. Other Southeast Asian markets declined.

The yen's safe-haven counterparts were reclaiming ground too. Yields on US 10-year Treasuries, which move inversely to prices, dropped to a three-week low of 1.54 percent, from 1.60 percent overnight. German two-year yields hit a record low as Finland became the third eurozone country after Germany and the Netherlands to see its 10-year yields drop below zero. "Deutsche Bank is a natural suspect for the move in the Bund yields," said Ciaran O'Hagan, strategist at Societe Generale.

Tokyo shares rose yesterday as investors gave Hillary Clinton the nod against rival Donald Trump in the first US presidential debate. The Japanese market had opened lower following declines on Wall Street ahead of the highly anticipated showdown between the pair who are locked in a neck and neck race for the White House. — Agencies

GOLD DOWN AS DOLLAR AND STOCKS GAIN AFTER US DEBATE

LONDON: Gold fell yesterday as the dollar and stocks gained ground on the view that US presidential candidate Hillary Clinton got the better of rival Donald Trump in their first debate.

Markets have tended to see Clinton as the candidate of the status quo, while few are sure what a Trump presidency might mean for US foreign policy, trade and the domestic economy. Gold, which is often seen as an alternative investment in times of geopolitical and financial uncertainty, suffered after the debate as a higher appetite for risk favoured shares, the dollar and the Mexican peso over the precious metal. Spot gold was down 0.2 percent at \$1,335.34 an ounce at 1136 GMT, snapping a six-day winning streak. US gold futures eased 0.3 percent to \$1,340.80 an ounce. ETF Securities analyst Martin Arnold said Clinton came out on top during the debate against Trump, which eased investor uncertainty.

"The debate gave financial markets more optimism over the outlook so it put a little bit of pressure on gold, especially because the US dollar has been supported by its outcome," he said. "It takes away some of the uncertainty that has been weighing on investors' minds."

Some market participants said the US presidential race was still a hot issue, with polls giving Clinton only a slight lead over Trump and this could prevent gold from falling too sharply.

"Gold slipped back slightly on the back of that but this story is far from over. Trump showed his true colours (unpleasant) and this will continue to support gold prices if his poll numbers climb," David Govett, head of precious metals at Marex Spectron wrote in a note.

"The current \$1,330-\$1,342 range is still in play and participants will be looking closely at the results of the first US presidential debate for direction," MKS PAMP Group trader Sam Laughlin said in a note. The dollar index, which weighs the greenback against a basket of currencies, was up 0.1 percent at 95.350.

Among other precious metals, silver shed 0.1 percent to \$19.40 an ounce after falling 1.2 percent in the previous session, which was its biggest loss over two weeks. Platinum and palladium were barely changed at \$1,035 an ounce and \$694.85, respectively. — Reuters

IS THE PHILIPPINES 'WAR ON DRUGS' FUELLING AN HIV EPIDEMIC?

office in downtown Cebu in the central Philippines, he passes her a handful of biscuits and six clean needles. What Jose has just done could land him in jail. Rosita is a pregnant, HIV-infected injecting drug user - and Jose is a social worker. Amidst Philippines President Rodrigo Duterte's war on drugs - in which nearly 3,000 people have been killed, according to police - it is safer to be anonymous. Neither wants to give their real name.

Clean needles have been distributed in Cebu City for years, sometimes illegally, in order to prevent the spread of HIV. Under the new government, which took office at the end of June, pressure is increasing for such clandestine activities to stop. The Philippines has one of the fastest growing HIV/AIDS epidemics in the world, according to the **United Nations**

"HIV cases have sharply increased from maybe one new infection a day back in 2007 to what we have now which is more than 24 new cases a day," said Teresita Bagasao, country manager for UNAIDS in the Philippines. The latest Department of Health figures showed there were 841 newly diagnosed HIV cases in the Philippines in June - the biggest monthly total since records began in 1984 and higher than the annual total for 2009.

Most new cases were from sexual contact, particularly among men who have sex with men (MSM), according to the government's figures, but in Cebu it is sharing dirty needles that is the driver. Rosita, a former sex worker, explained: "Sometimes my friends don't have needles so we share." Since finding out she had HIV two years ago, Rosita says she has stopped sharing needles but adds that a lack of

> Rosita, 35, lives in Kamagayan neighborhood the historic epicenter of the drugs problem in Cebu, the Philippines' second city. In a dark rabbit warren of wood and corrugated iron, the most commonly used drugs - shabu (crystal meth) and nubain (a morphine-like opiate) - are sold in "shooting galleries" for 300 pesos (\$6) per syringe. For those who can't afford a full syringe, it can be divided between up to 10 people. Prices have almost doubled since Duterte was elected by a landslide in May after vowing to wipe out drugs and crime.

Crackdown

Efforts to protect drug users, including the distribution of clean needles, began in Cebu, particularly in Kamagayan, in 1993 but were halted by city officials in 2009. "The following year prevalence of HIV amongst people who inject drugs went from less than 0.5 percent to 53 percent," said Ilya Tac-an, who leads the STD/AIDS detection unit at Cebu City Health Department.

The World Health Organisation says there is "compelling evidence" that needle programs substantially reduce the spread of HIV among injecting drug users without increasing drug use, but in the Philippines possession of "paraphernalia for dangerous drugs" is illegal and carries a prison sentence of between six months to four years. Since 2009, research programs - under which clean needles can be legally distributed - have been repeatedly given the green light by the Philippines' Dangerous Drugs Board but then stopped under pressure from antidrugs groups and politicians. In 2015, the programs ernment pressure to not distribute needles has increased. "It is very hard for us to work with the new administration as they have a very strong program for drugs and there have been a lot of killings going on," said one healthcare source in Cebu. "They are really quite serious about it." Jerson See, founder and president of Cebu Plus, an HIV care organization that has in the past been involved in clean needle programs but does not distribute any more, said the organization was being watched by the government. "It came to our attention that the name of our organization is already under the radar of the National Bureau of Investigation," he said. He urged the government to reconsider its position on needle programs. "The police and drug enforcement agency's mandates are a supply and demand reduction program but we just hope the government will reconsider the harm reduction program because it is also a way of halting the spread of HIV," See said.

'Special cases'

Jose, the social worker, also says he was "called by Manila" a month ago and advised to stop distributing clean needles. He says he has drastically reduced the amount of needles he hands out. "In some special cases I hand out needles - when it is really needed such as in the case of a person living with HIV who is in the company of those not living with HIV," he said. Cebu Plus and Cebu City Health Department offer other services to people with HIV including counseling and HIV testing, but Dr Tac-an says it is not enough.

"The needle and syringe program was one of getting them (injecting drug users) to come in for

were finally terminated, and under Duterte's gov- the other services," she said. "We are not really reaching that many injecting drug users (now)." But not everyone in Cebu is supportive of clean needle initiatives. Alice Uttlang is the head of COSAP, the city government's Cebu Organization for Substance Abuse Prevention.

The veterinarian-by-trade was given the COSAP job in 2014 in the office next door to Cebu Plus at a time when clean needles were being distributed as a part of a research program. "I saw a lot of people outside my office with the typical 'users' look," she said. "I asked myself what these people are doing here, were they lining up to get the syringes?

"Is this not a slap in our face? Our office is here preventing and here they are condoning, even encouraging them to continue to use drugs, to inject drugs, as long as you use a clean syringe." Uttlang says some of those getting free needles would go on to sell them. She adds that she would potentially accept a clean needles program as long as there were other conditions, such as police being given data about the locations of drug users.

The Department of Health did not respond to questions on clean needle programs in Cebu, but said it was implementing a "behavior modification program" which included community members teaching others about the dangers of drugs, as well as HIV testing. For Jose, the government's efforts are helping: "Everybody is trying to think of what is best and there is no perfect remedy."

But he says he will continue to distribute needles in special cases. "I have a different understanding. Others (the government, churches and NGOs) are doing something good but they are not on the frontline - I know these people." —Reuters

'Fast action to tackle air pollution can't come soon enough

GENEVA: Nine out of 10 people globally are Organization said yesterday, calling for dramatic action against pollution that is blamed for more than six million deaths a year. New data in a report from the UN's global health body "is enough to make all of us extremely concerned," Maria Neira, the head of the WHO's department of public health and environment, told reporters.

The problem is most acute in cities, but air in rural areas is worse than many think, WHO experts said. Poorer countries have much dirtier air than the developed world, according to the report, but pollution "affects practically all countries in the world and all parts of society", Neira said in a statement. "It is a public health emergency," she said.

"Fast action to tackle air pollution can't come soon enough," she added, urging governments to cut the number of vehicles on the road. improve waste management and promote clean cooking fuel. Yesterday's report was based on data collected from more than 3,000 sites across the globe. It found that "92 percent of the world's population lives in places where air quality levels exceed WHO limits". The data focuses on dangerous particulate matter with a diameter of less than 2.5 micrometers, or PM2.5. PM2.5 includes toxins like sulfate and black carbon, which can penetrate deep into the lungs or cardiovascular system.

Air with more than 10 micrograms per cubic meter of PM2.5 on an annual average basis is considered substandard. In some regions satellite data has been complemented by groundlevel PM2.5 measurements, but in much of the developing world ground readings remain unavailable, forcing the WHO to rely on cruder estimates. Despite these data gaps, Neira said the UN agency now had more information than ever about pollutants in the planet's air. Using both satellite and ground measurements "is a big step forward towards even more confident estimates of the huge global burden", of dirty air, she added.

Six million deaths a year

The WHO has estimated that more than six million deaths per year are linked to exposure to outdoor and indoor air pollution. Data is more solid for outdoor pollution, which is blamed for more than three million fatalities annually. But indoor pollution can be equally as harmful, especially in poorer developing world homes where cooking often involves burning charcoal. Nearly 90-percent of air pollution-related deaths occur in low and middle-income countries, the WHO said.

Southeast Asia and the Western Pacific region-including China, Malaysia and Vietnamare the hardest hit, the data showed. Carlos Dora, coordinator at the WHO's public health

and environment department, said that some of the strategies adopted to safeguard against polluted air have limited effectiveness. For example, daily air quality warnings-like those sometimes issued in Beijing-likely do little to help the average person, since the real threat is exposure to sub-par air over extended periods.

Staying indoors on a day when the air is particularly bad accomplishes little, Dora said. Additionally, the WHO has seen no conclusive evidence that face masks do much to filter dirty air, Dora added. Using a different data set, the WHO reported in May that 80 percent of the world's city dwellers breathe poor quality air, a figure that rose to 98 percent in poorer coun-

THAILAND INVESTIGATES FOUR CASES OF SUSPECTED ZIKA-LINKED MICROCEPHALY

BANGKOK: Thailand is investigating four suspected cases of Zika-related microcephaly in three babies and a 36-week old unborn baby, the public health minister said yesterday, in what could be the first cases of Zika-linked microcephaly in Southeast Asia. Several countries in Southeast Asia have reported increasing cases of infection from the mosquito-borne Zika virus but Thailand has one of the highest numbers in the region, with 349 confirmed since January, including 25 pregnant women. Public Health Minister Piyasakon Sakolsatayadorn said authorities needed to be thorough in their investigation of the cases as confirmation would be "sensitive". "The lab results will take at least two days because we have to be thorough with this as it is a big deal and a link hasn't been detected before," Piyasakon told Reuters. "This is a sensitive matter for Thailand," he said. US health officials have con-

cluded that Zika infections inpregnant women can cause microcephaly, a birth defect marked by small head size that can lead to severe developmental problems in babies.

Piyasakon said the three babies were born with small heads and an ultrasound appeared to indicate the unborn baby had a small head. Of the four mothers, two were diagnosed with Zika when they were pregnant but two were not confirmed to have had Zika, said Apichai Mongkol, director-general of the ministry's Department of Medical Sciences. If a Thai case were confirmed, it would be the first in Southeast Asia, the World Health Organization (WHO) said in a statement emailed to Reuters. The connection between Zika and microcephaly first came to light last year in Brazil, which has confirmed more than 1,600 cases of microcephaly that it considers to be related to Zika infections in the mothers.

Monitoring

Some health experts have accused Thailand, which has a thriving tourist industry, of playing down the risk from Zika. But officials dismiss that saying the response has been adequate and another mosquito-born disease, dengue, which can be deadly, is a bigger threat. The director-general of Thailand's Disease Control Department, Amnuay Gajeena, said the four cases were being monitored but he declined to say exactly where they were suspected of contracting the virus. "It is not in Bangkok," Amnuay told Reuters. "Both the mothers and babies are being tested and we have sent the tests to several labs." There are no specific tests to determine if a baby will be born with microcephaly, but ultrasound scans in the third trimester of pregnancy can identify the problem, according to the WHO. — Reuters

ASIA'S POOR CHOKING ON FILTHY AIR

NEW DELHI: Polluted air is a "public health emergency", the World Health Organization said yesterday, adding nine out of 10 people globally breathe bad air that is blamed for more than six million deaths a year. And the WHO warned that nearly 90-percent of air pollution-related deaths occur in low and middle-income countries. Southeast Asia and the Western Pacific region-including Chinaare the hardest hit, the data showed. South Asia is also badly affected, with the WHO saying poor air quality is responsible for the deaths of more than 600,000 people in India and 37,000 people in Bangladesh every year.

Pakistan too is suffering, with experts blaming unplanned and unsustainable development and warning that proposals for more coal-fired power stations will further worsenair quality. Smog is a perennial problem across China, where pollution from heavy industry and a rapidly growing fleet of cars brews a toxic haze that, in the winter, can wreathe whole regions in a choking miasma.

Even Shanghai, reputed to have some of China's cleanest air, struggles with constant haze: in 2015 readings of dangerous fine-particulate matter known as PM averaged twice the WHO's daily rec ommended maximum exposure of 25, according to government data. Here are snapshots from four Asian cities:

New Delhi

In the shadow of a massive shouldering rubbish dump outside India's sprawling capital, Ritu Devi fears for her children whom she says constantly fall sick from dirty air. "Everything hurts. My eyes burn, my head hurts and I feel very dizzy at times," said Devi, who guesses her age at 22 or 23. "My children keep coughing and falling sick. My eyes burn and they start to water. These things keep happening to us," she said, as her two-year-old daughter sat on her lap and tugged on her sari.

"We suffer because of all this smoke and pollution," said Devi, whose husband works at a nearby market. Locals living near the huge Ghazipur landfill site complain of chronic headaches, wheezing and recurring bouts of fevers and colds as methane from decomposing waste escapes the landfill and fills their homes. The methane, which traps heat, also sparks fires and smoke regularly billows from the site.

On a road choked with traffic in the Bangladeshi capital, 22-year-old rickshaw puller Nur Alam stops for a break. Alam started riding a bicycle taxi five years ago, competing with motorbikes and cars for space on Dhaka's streets, after he arrived from his village in the south in the hope of making some money. "I often feel suffocated while I work, especially, when I'm stuck in traffic jams," Alam said. "The strong smell of black smoke and the open garbage dumps sometimes weaken me," the father-of-one said.

"Sometimes I see white rashes on my skin. I have never visited a doctor to check it, but I think it's because of the pollution I have to face every day," he added. Like thousands of other rickshaw pullers, Alam works about 12 hours a day, seven days a week, rarely taking a day off in one of the world's most populated and congested cities. "I have no other means of income but pulling rickshaws to feed my family. I really have little choice," Alam said.

Karachi

In Pakistan's largest city and commercial hub, Abdul Aziz, a 65-year-old rickshaw driver, said the pollution was suffocating. "In traffic jams, the smoke emitting from bus and other vehicles is badly suffocating-it makes me feel very ill said. "I am a diabetic and the pollution further aggravates my illness. The environmental pollution is impacting my health and it becomes extremely difficult for me to drive the rickshaw in the suffocating traffic jams.

"So I have to park the vehicle on the side of the road till I catch my breath back." Mohammad Rameez, a 25-year-old office worker, called for the most polluting vehicles to be banned. "As you can see, traffic is immense in the city of Karachi. There is no implementation of a law for those polluting vehicles which are emitting smoke," he said. "They should be guided, banned or stopped playing on the roads. Most of the vehicles being used are as old as the 1990s, so they all are contributing to pollution dangerously and affecting human health very badly."

Shanghai

Dong Weiwei, a courier in his late 20s originally from Henan province, works outdoor riding his scooter delivering packages in Shanghai. He said air pollution affects him, but his company does not supply masks or other protective equipment. "Sometimes I feel I have difficulties breathing when the air is bad, but I rarely take any precautions about this. I have neither the time nor the money to do that."—AFP

AMERICAS REGION IS WORLD'S FIRST TO BE FREE OF MEASLES

MIAMI: Measles has been eradicated from the Americas due to decades of vaccination efforts, making it the first region of the world to rid itself of the disease, global health authorities said yesterday. "Endemic transmission of measles has been eliminated from the region," said World Health Organization director Margaret Chan. "The Americas region has shown that with strong national immunization programs... dedicated financing and strong political commitment and partner support, measles can be stopped," she added, describing it as "an outstanding achievement."

Measles is now the fifth vaccine-preventable disease to be eliminated in the Americas, after smallpox, polio, rubella and congenital rubella syndrome, according to a statement from the Pan American Health Organization. The end of endemic transmission means the virus is no longer commonly spread locally, although imported cases may still lead to isolated outbreaks. The region of the Americas reported its last endemic case in 2002.

"However, since measles continues to circulate worldwide, some countries continued to report imported cases," said the PAHO statement. Over the past year, from August 2015 to August 2016, all countries in the Americas showed documentation that endemic measles had been wiped out to the International Committee of Experts for Documentation and Verification of Measles, Rubella and Congenital Rubella Syndrome Elimination in the Americas. Measles is a highly contagious virus that lives in the nose and throat of an infected person, according to the US Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

Severe complications can occur, particularly in children, and lead to death by pneumonia or brain swelling. A vaccine became widely available in 1963, but the virus has proven difficult to eradicate. In recent years, measles outbreaks have risen in some parts of the United States and Europe where parents have refused to vaccinate their children. "It is my hope that other regions of the world are encouraged by the success of the Americas," said Chan. "And that the lessons learned here serve them as they move forward toward their own elimination goals."—AFP

MELTING GREENLAND ICE THREATENS TO EXPOSE COLD WAR WASTE

COPENHAGEN: A snow-covered former US army base in Greenland-dubbed "a city under ice"-could leak pollutants into the environment as the climate changes, raising difficult questions over who is responsible for a clean-up. In 1959, US army engineers began constructing a futuristic project in northwestern Greenland that might as well have been lifted from a Cold War spy movie. A network of tunnels under the snow contained everything from research facilities to a hospital, a cinema and a church-all powered by a small, portable nuclear reactor. The pollutants left behind include PCBs used in building supplies, tanks of raw sewage and low-level radioactive coolant used in the nuclear reactor that once stood there.

"When the waste was deposited there nobody thought it would get out again," William Colgan, an assistant professor in the Lassonde School of Engineering at York University in Canada, told AFP. But a study led by Colgan, published in August in the journal Geophysical Research Letters, found that higher temperatures could eventually result in toxic waste from the base being released into the environment. "Neither the US or Denmark has done anything wrong per se, but the world has changed," he said.

Accommodating up to 200 soldiers, "Camp Century" was officially built to provide a laboratory for Arctic research projects, but it was also home to a secret US effort to deploy nuclear missiles. Codenamed "Project Iceworm", that part of the operation was never mentioned in the treaty between the US and Denmark, once the colonial master of Greenland, a territory that is now largely self-governing. But the spectacular project-which even included a test railway under the snow-was never fully realized. Three years later scientists found that the glacier was shifting much faster than previously thought, threatening to crush the tunnels, and the base was abandoned in 1967.

Warmer climes

Assuming the site would remain frozen in perpetuity, the US army removed the nuclear reactor but allowed waste-equivalent to the mass of 30 Airbus A320 airplanes-to be entombed under the snow. Half a century later that decision is being questioned as temperatures in the Arctic rise at a higher pace than in the rest of the world. By 2090, the amount of ice melting may no longer be offset by snowfall, meaning the toxic chemicals could start leaking into the environment, the study found. Before then, fissures in the snow could lead to melt water seeping into the crushed tunnels, currently located around 35 meters (115 feet) below the surface.

Since excavating the site would be hugely expensive, Colgan believes a cleanup operation would have to wait until the camp has been uncovered by the melting ice. Greenland Foreign Minister Vittus Qujaukitsoq said the study's findings were "worrying" and that his government was working to ensure that it was established who would be responsible for cleaning up the site. The former government in the capital Nuuk had in 2014 requested a report from Copenhagen on possible contamination from Camp Century without receiving "any assessment of the extent or character of the waste" described in the study, he said in a statement. Danish Foreign Minister Kristian Jensen said in a statement that his government would "now look closer at these aspects together with the relevant expertise... in close dialogue with Greenland." After Colgan's report was published, the US Department of Defense released a statement saying it "recognizes the reality of climate change and the risks it poses. The Department is aware of the report but has not evaluated it." The US would "continue to work with Danish authorities and Greenland home rule authorities to address mutual security concerns," it said.

Placing the blame

The logistics of decontaminating the site may not be the greater challenge, Colgan said, noting that the US and Denmark have previously cleaned up a site where a B-52 bomber carrying four hydrogen bombs crashed in 1968 near the Thule air base, around 240 kilometers (150 miles) from Camp Century. "The environmental hazard is relatively small and far away and there are only a few native towns close by," he said. Establishing which country is responsible for doing it would be trickier, but could help set a precedent for other conflicts arising from climate change, he predicted. "It hasn't really been done before, there's no blueprint. It's not as easy as the engineering aspect of the challenge," he said. Sara Olsvig, a Greenland opposition lawmaker who raised the issue in Nuuk's parliament, admitted that "a lot of things" in the decades-old agreements between Copenhagen and Washington on several different military installations were "unclear".

"There's not so much that Greenland can do in regards to the Danish-US relationship and what they will do concerning the final responsibility," she said. In the end, the two countries would probably take joint responsibility for cleaning up the base, said Kristian Hvidtfelt Nielsen, an associate professor of science history at Aarhus University who has studied the Camp Century project. — AFP

'REAL' FRENCH CAMEMBERT PLAYS DAVID TO INDUSTRIAL GOLIATH

'Only way to survive is through direct distribution'

CAMEMBERT, France: It's a cheese maker's take on David and Goliath. Camembert, the village that gave its name to France's most famous-and imitated-cheese, has only one remaining traditional "fromagerie" still making the specialty. And it's holding its own against big industry. As they tend cows and ladle curdled raw milk into low, wooden cylindrical molds, the Durand family and their employees don't look like militants in a Gallic culinary battle against globalization. But they are on the front line in this Normandy locality, population 200, on a picturesque hill-side where Camembert was first created during the French Revolution.

Dairy producers "are really in dire straits," said Nicolas Durand, 43, owner of the Heronniere farm in the northwestern French region where Europe's biggest dairy group Lactalis has bought out numerous farms like his. For a small operation, the "only way to survive is through direct distribution," he said. Durand's family acquired the farm in 1961 and has produced Camembert since 1987. Today his seven employees turn 90 percent of the milk from his 90 cows into 700 to 800 cheeses a day, up from 600 in the year 2000. Durand sells the minuscule remainder of his output to Agrial, one of France's top agricultural cooperatives and food processors.

French way of life

Dairy production is a hot-button issue in France. Only last month, the agriculture ministry had to step in to mediate between Lactalis and farmers angry over what they say are unsustainably low milk prices. Lactalis today is France's biggest maker of Camembert, mass-producing it for sale in supermarkets at home and abroad under labels like the ubiquitous "President" brand. But ask anyone at a Heronniere farm how a "Durand" differs from a factory-produced Camembert and they will laugh, saying even the question is an "insult". Real Normandy Camembert-a soft-cheese staple on France's

post-dinner cheese plates-finally won the coveted AOP, or Protected Designation of Origin, only 33 years ago. The label ensures that a product's origin and fabrication is within a strict geographical area and adheres to traditional methods and craftsmanship.

Local pride is such that a stone monument in honor of Marie Harel — who invented the creamy cheese in 1791 with, as legend has it, the help of a priest stands in Vimoutiers, the nearby village where she died. Camembert itself has a museum recounting the history of its specialty, a symbol of the "French way of life". Yet half the museum is rented by Lactalis, whose industrial Camemberts tend to be made with pasteurized-not raw-milk. And since it is not necessarily from Normandy and is ripened quickly, it cannot bear the "AOP Camembert de Normandie" label.

Bloomy white rind

defend "terroir", an almost untranslatable notion evoking the goodness of a particular patch of countryside. "It's made with milk from our cows and not from a mixture of milk from different farms. That is important for the taste," Durand says. "Durand's flavor stays with you" and it has a stronger, richer scent, said one cheese seller from the Normandy port of Caen.

While an industrial version costs a couple of euros in the supermarket, a Durand Camembert is costlier, fetching 4.40 euros (about \$5) on the farm and 5.60 euros (about \$7) at the Caen merchant's store. But the scene at Durand's farm looks like just like the cheese making portrayed in the ageing black and white celluloid film at the museum. The milk preparation is set in molds to drain for half a day in rooms heated to 32 degrees Celsius (89 Fahrenheit). Because modern sanitary standards require farmers to sterilize the cows' teats-removing both good and bad bacteria-lactic acids must be added to aid coagulation.

The forms are then taken to the "haloirs" or drying rooms, and kept at between 12 and 17 degrees Celsius. Salt is added as well as penicillin, which helps to form Camembert's characteristic bloomy white rind. This part takes two weeks, after which the cheese is left again to mature properly. While Durand's supply is necessarily limited, demand is strong and the farm is already attracting some 10,000 visitors a year. He is working with partners to develop his marketing strategy and to ramp up tourist interest even more. The cheese maker says he brings in around 2,000 euros (\$2,250) a month, of which he must pay off 500 euros in loans until 2018. He also needs to replace his brother and sister-in-law, who left the farm to open a cheese store at Granville on the Normandy coast last July. Numerous candidates have shown interest, including some from as far away as China and Russia. But Durand says one thing he'll not be doing is selling up, to Lactalis or

ENGINEERED BLOOD VESSELS GROW IN LAMBS

PARIS: In a hopeful development for children born with congenital heart defects, scientists said yesterday they had built artificial blood vessels which grew unaided when implanted into lambs, right into adulthood. If repeated in humans, such grafts would spare afflicted children the need for repeated surgeries, an expert team from the University of Minnesota reported in the journal Nature Communications. "This might be the first time we have an 'off-the-shelf' material that doctors can implant in a patient, and it can grow in the body," study co-author

Robert Tranquillo said in a statement.

Children born with heart defects often need five or more open-heart operations to replace synthetic blood vessel grafts which cannot grow or regenerate. In the quest for a longer-lasting alternative, Tranquillo and a team grew vessel-like tubes in the lab from a donor sheep's skin cells. After about five weeks, they used special detergents to wash away all the sheep cells, leaving scaffold-like tubes, which were used to replace a part of the pulmonary artery-which carries blood from the heart to the lungs-in

three lambs. The lambs' own cells repopulated the tubes, allowing them to grow and preventing their rejection by the immune system as foreign tissue, said the team. "This is the perfect marriage between tissue engineering and regenerative medicine where tissue is grown in the lab and then... the natural processes of the recipient's body makes it a living tissue again," said Tranquillo. The lambs developed normally into adulthood. The next step would be human clinical trials, hopefully "within the next few years," said the team.—AFP

Beyonce, Bieber lead MTV Europe nods

op chart-toppers Beyonce and Justin Bieber yesterday led nominations for the MTV Europe Music Awards, with Danish newcomers Lukas Graham also among top contenders. The Europe Music Awards, which will take place on November 6 in Rotterdam, are held each year in a different location as the entertainment network highlights international acts and fans.


Beyonce-who dominated MTV's signature Video Music Awards in New York last month amid acclaim for her intertwined "Lemonade" album and film-and Bieber were nominated in five categories each at the Europe Music Awards, or EMAs. With the EMAs also giving out awards by country, Beyonce was in the running for best US act and Bieber for Canada.

Bieber was nominated for Best Song with his pop hit "Sorry" and Beyonce was in the running for Best Video for "Formation," her most politically charged work that references the Black Lives Matter movement against police brutality. Lukas Graham-a band that has quickly found a global fan base with socially conscious tracks such as "7 Years" and "Mama Said" about life on the economic fringes-was nominated in four categories, including Best Danish Act.

Adele, the English balladeer whose blockbuster hits include "Hello," was also nominated in four categories alongside British rockers Coldplay and Canadian singer Shawn Mendes. Showing MTV's growing focus on international markets and social media, the network announced the nominations through a medley video in which Leroy Sanchez, a Spanish singer who has won a YouTube following for covers, sings the Best Song nominees. —AFP

Washington and Davis dig deep in first 'Fences' trailer

aramount Pictures has unveiled the first trailer for Denzel Washington's "Fences," based on August Wilson's 1987 play. The film is set for wide release on Christmas Day following a New York/Los Angeles limited run on Dec 16. The trailer features Washington in the lead role of Pittsburgh garbage collector Troy Maxson that won him a Tony six years ago, launching into the memorable "How come you ain't never liked me?" scene with Jovan Adepo, who stars as Troy's son, Cory. The scene is intercut with flashes from the rest of the story, building as Troy's monologue becomes more impassioned until it explodes with an emotional moment from Viola Davis as Troy's wife, Rose.



Wilson won a Pulitzer Prize for the work in 1987, and the Broadway production went on to win Tonys for best play, best leading actor (James Earl Jones), best featured actress (Mary Alice) and best direction (Lloyd Richards). The 2010 revival won best revival of a play, best leading actor (Washington) and best leading actress (Davis).

Naturally, then, "Fences" comes with an undeniable pedigree. Produced by Scott Rudin, with Stephen McKinley Henderson reprising his Tony-nominated role and Mykelti Williamson back as well, the film is one of a handful Paramount has to work with this Oscar season. It's also one of a number of 2016 films that can help answer two years of #OscarsSoWhite controversy, if voters are so inclined. But Wilson's work stands out in any context, and the first big screen treatment of "Fences" will be an event regardless. — Reuters

Springsteen reveals father's ghost, depression in memoir

hen Bruce Springsteen's first marriage fell apart, the rock legend-a multimillionaire about to turn 40 — received a surprise offer: his father asked him to move back temporarily into their tiny home. "The old man finally wanted me around the house," Springsteen, who ultimately declined the invitation, writes in his new memoir, "Born to Run." Springsteen's late father Doug-who worked a string of unstable blue-collar jobs, struggled with drinking and mental illness, and only hesitantly late in life acknowledged his failings to his son-looms as a reflection both for the artist's life and for the state of America in 'Born to Run," published yesterday.

The "Born in the USA" chronicler of working-class America describes his childhood fear of his father in their poorly heated home in Freehold, New Jersey and also reveals that he has spent years himself in treatment for depression. While sensing that he inherited his father's demons, the 67-year-old rocker also sees broader traits in his dad-"the rigidity and blue-collar narcissism of 'manhood' 1950s-style."

"I haven't been completely fair to my father in my songs, treating him as an archetype of the neglecting, domineering parent," he writes. "Our story is much more complicated. Not in the details of what happened, but in the 'why' of it all." Springsteen describes a loving relationship with his second wife-Patti Scialfa, a singer in his E Street Band-and their three children. But "The Boss"-famed for his marathon, audience-revving concertswrites that he still needs therapy and occasional medication for depression, with comedowns especially hard after tours.

Mother as guiding force

Springsteen-who spent seven years writing "Born to Run," named after one of best-known songs, in long hand-infuses the 510-page book with his music's same lyrical voice, evocatively weaving together stories of blue-collar America. Yet Springsteen, whose songs are rarely noted for irony, also shows a surprising gift for humor as he recounts his early days as a struggling artist.

His teenage band landed a gig playing at a psychiatric hospital, where he writes that patients sang along "vigorously" to a cover of "We Gotta Get out of This Place" by The Animals.


Another early show in 1969 was marred by a television in the bar-patrons were distracted by watching the Apollo 11 Moon landing. And as he first makes his break into the New York-based music industry, he is so broke that he tries to pay the toll to enter through the Lincoln Tunnel from New Jersey by paying pennies - and is nearly prevented after the operator sifts through the 100 coins and finds that one is Canadian. Springsteen's family was so cash-strapped that he says he never ate at a restaurant until his 20s. But his mother Adele, a secretary, managed to save enough to help him buy his first electric guitar.

His mother emerges as the heroine of his book, sacrificing for young Bruce and sticking by her husband, judging that for all his faults he would never abandon the family. Springsteen, whose Dutch surname comes from his father, identifies with his mother's Italian heritage and grew up Roman Catholic, a faith witnessed later in his songs' themes of redemption. His mother at age 90 became an online sensation earlier this year when she danced with her son, even shaking her behind, as he packed another concert at New York's Madison Square Garden.

Gradual political turn

Springsteen did not grow up political. He says that his mother told him only that they voted Democratic as they were working class. In recent years, Springsteen has been increasingly active, campaigning for President Barack Obama and other Democrats and speaking out through his 2001 song "American Skin (41 Shots)," about New York police's fatal shooting of Guinean immigrant Amadou Diallo. But his most political resonant song may still be 1984's "Born in the USA," about a Vietnam War veteran returning home to discomfort. President Ronald Reagan hailed the song as he ran for re-election, a move that Springsteen in his book describes as cynical.

Springsteen writes that the song remains a Rorschach test for listeners to find their meaning-but he has no regrets. "If I'd tried to undercut or change the music, I believe I would've had a record that would've been more easily understood but not as satisfying." — AFP

Researchers restore first ever computer music recording

ew Zealand researchers said yesterday they have restored the first recording of computergenerated music, created in 1951 on a gigantic contraption built by British genius Alan Turing. 
largely overlooked," they said.

ground floor, was used to generate three melodies; "God Save the King", "Baa Baa Black Sheep" and Glenn Miller's swing classic "In the Mood". But when UC professor Jack Copeland and composer Jason Long examined the 12-inch (30.5 centimeter) acetate disc containing the music, they found the audio was distorted.

"The frequencies in the recording were not accurate. The recording gave at best only a rough impression of how the computer sounded," they said. They fixed it with electronic detective work, tweaking the speed of the audio, compensating for a "wobble" in the recording and filtering out extraneous noise. "It was a beautiful moment when we first heard the true sound of Turing's computer," Copeland and Long said in a blog post on the British Library website. It features short snippets of the tunes rendered in a slightly grating drone, like electronic bagpipes. There are also a number of

glitches and when the music halts during the Glenn Miller number, a presenter comments: "The machine's obviously not in the mood".

While Turing programmed the first musical notes into a computer, he had little interest in stringing them together into tunes. That work was carried out by a school teacher named Christopher Strachey, who went on to become a renowned computer scientist in his own right. Strachey recalled that Turing's taciturn response upon hearing his machine play music was "good show". Turing was a computer scientist, philosopher and cryptologist who played a crucial role in breaking the Nazi's Enigma Code. As depicted in the Oscar-winning movie "The Imitation Game", he was prosecuted for homosexuality and forced to undergo chemical castration, killing himself in 1954 at the age of 41. He was officially pardoned by Queen Elizabeth II in 2013. — AFP



This is the story of the man who changed the history of crime in the last decades of the 20th century," the film's producer, Miguel Menendez de Zubillaga, said in the statement. Husband and wife off screen, the last time the two appeared together in a movie was in the 2008 Woody Allen romantic comedy "Vicky Cristina Barcelona". Cruz won a supporting-actress Oscar for her role.

Bardem won a supporting-actor Oscar for the 2007 crime thriller "No Country for Old Men". "Escobar" will be directed by Spain's Fernando Leon de Aranoa whose credits include the 2002 film "Mondays in the Sun" also starring Bardem, for which both got Spain's Oscar-equivalent Goya for best director and best actor. Escobar was the boss of one of the world's most powerful criminal organizations and Colombia's most-wanted fugitive. The Colombian farmer's son who became the world's seventh-richest man with his ruthless dominance of the global cocaine trade was hunted for years before police killed him in his hometown of Medellin in 1993. Over the years, thousands of people were killed in violence unleashed by his Medellin cartel. He has recently inspired several films and series including "Narcos," a hit on Netflix which is in its second season. — AFP

Scorsese's 'Silence' lands Oscar-season release date

■ ilence," Martin Scorsese's passion project about Jesuit priests in feudal Japan, has snagged an awards-season release date, signaling that Paramount Pictures believes it has an Oscar contender on its hands. The religious epic will debut in limited release on Dec 23, before expanding in January. There are no wide releases scheduled to debut on that date, but "A Monster Calls," a fantasy adventure, will bow in limited release on that date. Moreover, it is a crowded time of year as studios are fielding a number of prestige films and commercial projects, all trying to take advantage of the holidays. The animated musical "Sing," video game adaptation "Assassin's Creed," and "Passengers," a sci-fi romance with Jennifer Lawrence and Chris Pratt, hit theaters two days before "Silence" debuts.

Related Denzel Washington, Tom Hanks Make a Case for Star Power "Silence" boasts a cast that includes Andrew Garfield, Liam Neeson, and Adam Driver, as well as a screenplay by Jay Cocks, Scorsese's collaborator on "Gangs of New York" and "The Age



of Innocence." The film has been in development for over two decades, with the likes of Daniel Day-Lewis, Benicio del Toro, and Gael Garcia Bernal all involved at various points before they left for other projects. Lining up financing for the \$50 million

production was a herculean task. Scorsese has been nominated 12 times for an Oscar, winning best director in 2007 for "The Departed," starring Leonardo DiCaprio, Matt Damon, Mark Wahlberg, and Jack Nicholson. If "Silence" is going to emerge victorious it will have to hold off the likes of "La La Land," a musical with Emma Stone and Ryan Gosling that has drawn raves; "Manchester by the Sea," Kenneth Lonergan's portrait of a family tragedy; and "Fences," Denzel Washington's adaptation of August Wilson's beloved play. — Reuters

Mohammed Al-Hai makes coffee in his home

A Syrian refugee balances life in Germany with chaos at home

'Germany opened its door for me and gave me everything I have'

t the intersection, Mohammed Al-Haj waited patiently for the "green man." No cars were coming, no policemen watching. Back home in Syria, he wouldn't hesitate. But here in Germany, it's the law, you only cross when the walk light is green. "I don't want to get into the habit of not waiting for him," said the 27-year-old Mohammed. "I felt from the first day, that this is a country of law and order."

This is one world Mohammed lives in, guided by rules, where he says he knows his rights and his responsibilities. It's a world where he can plan for the future, after arriving a year ago among hundreds of thousands of refugees. But at the same time, Mohammed is living in a second world: The hell of Syria. First thing every morning, he checks

on the Internet and social media for the latest in the constant stream of grim news. He can't stop, even though he feels helpless, following day by day the destruction of his home city, Aleppo.

"Syria is like a nightmare that travels with me wherever I go," he said. "I could just be sitting here doing nothing and suddenly learn that someone I know has died." The Associated Press followed Mohammed in the summer of 2015 as he made the arduous trek from Turkey to Germany. In August, the AP revisited him in the German city of Saarbruecken. He shares a

Spartan two-bedroom apartment with three other Syrian men. There's little furniture, and none of them have beds. A blackboard hangs on a wall, and one of his housemates has drawn on it a map of Syria topped by the flag of Syria's opposition.

Syrian friends

Mohammed receives a monthly government stipend of 370 euros (\$400), and his rent, utility bills and language school are paid for. He's grateful for it - he says Germany "opened its door for me and gave me everything I have." Still, the money is barely enough. He rarely eats out, sits at a cafe or goes to a movie. He has one pair of jeans and one pair of shoes. He can't visit Syrian friends settled elsewhere in Germany because public transport is too expensive for him.

It's a similar situation for many others. In 2015, at least 477,000 refugees - more than 160,000 of them Syrians - applied for asylum status, and another 310,000 have applied so far this year. Five days a week, Mohammed attends German classes. He often walks the 25-minute route to the language institute to save the tram fare. After four months of studies, he can now converse reasonably well in German. As he spoke to the AP one weekend evening in Saarbruecken, two German men walked by, stark naked. Mohammed was unfazed. There's a group of anarchists in town who sometimes walk around nude, he explained.

There are things he has had to get used to. You don't take off your shoes entering a German's home, like you do in Syria. You don't just drop by unexpected. And he never calls a German after 10 pm. It's all a world apart from Syria. The war has scattered Mohammed's family, as it has for many Syrians. One sister lives in the Turkish city of Killis, another in Izmir and a third

in Lebanon. His parents live in Izmir with a brother, and his other brother is stuck in Syria, driving a taxi. Mohammed is the farthest away, unable to reach the rest of his family. All he has are calls.

My heart aches

After every one, he said, "my heart aches." Every few days, Mohammed talks on WhatsApp to his parents in Turkey. In almost every sentence, they say "inshallah" - "God willing" - or "alhamdulillah" - "thanks be to God." The generic Arabic phrases are a cushion, letting parents and child avoid burdening each other with their hardships, trying to keep each from worrying about the other.

In July, Mohammed learned of the latest of his friends to die. He woke up in the morning, checked Facebook and saw that Tareq al-Bayanooni, a rebel commander, had been killed by an air strike outside Aleppo. It felt, he said, like a stab in the heart.

"But I did not cry. Honestly, I have run out of tears." Al-Bayanooni was the fifth of his childhood friends to be killed, guys he played with in his neighborhood streets as a kid. From his broader friends and acquaintances, he guesses 20 to 25 have died - the ones he knows about, anyway. At the time, it looked like the opposition-held part of Mohammed's home city of Aleppo was on the verge of being crushed. Mohammed kept going back to his telephone to follow the news. His studies suffered. "I was feeling down, I lost my concentration," he said.

Making it even harder, he felt he couldn't call friends or relatives still in Aleppo. "How can I be in the safety of Germany so far away from home and call someone in Aleppo to ask how they are doing?" he said. "I will only get 'Thanks be to God' and nothing else. He gives that answer because he could die five minutes later."

Mohammed's housemates tease him over how closely he follows the war. He understands, they're fed up with war. Mohammed also wants to move on with his German life. He aims to enroll at a German university by the fall of 2017. Plan B is to enroll in a vocational training program as a quicker way of gaining employment. When he gets a job, he will pay taxes - perhaps 30 or 35 percent of his income - and he says that will repay the money he is now getting from the government. For now, his entire future hangs on learning German. If he doesn't pass an exam in October, he'll have to repeat, delaying everything. "Germany needs a great deal of patience," he said. "My journey is long, and without patience I will not complete it." — AP

What to look out for at Paris fashion week

aris fashion week started yesterday with dizzying changes at the top of some of the most famous brands. Saint Laurent, Dior and Lanvin all have new artistic directors who will be putting on their first shows in their new roles.

With more than 90 runway shows and dozens more presentations behind closed doors over nine days, the spring-summer ready to wear collections promise to be the most scrutinized for some time. Here is our guide to the shows to watch out for:

Saint Laurent after Slimane

How will Anthony Vaccarello face up to the massive challenge of filling Hedi Slimane's Chelsea boots at Saint Laurent is the question on many fashionistas' lips. Slimane, the man credited with reviving skinny jeans, brought the French label a whole new younger generation of fans, drawn by his grungy rock star chic.

Nor is Vaccarello a slouch when it comes to sass. The 36-year-old Belgian has developed a sexy, leggy, asymmetrical style since he first came to fame with a collection inspired by the Hungarian-Italian porn actress turned politician la Cicciolina. And he showed he could do rock with the best of them with his designs for the younger Versus Versace label. Like Slimane, he has a taste for black. And in a sign that he is prepared to sink all his creative energy into Saint Laurent, Vaccarello has put his own brand on hold. All will be revealed at the Saint Laurent show on Tuesday evening.

Jarrar at Lanvin

The popular French haute couture designer Bouchra Jarrar debuted yesterday at the head of Lanvin, the oldest Paris cou-

ture house of them all. The 45-year-old takes over from Alber Elbaz, who was fired in October 2015 after 14 years at the head of the label, in a move that caused dismay at the time.

The label's redoubtable Taiwanese owner businesswoman Shaw-Lan Wang has now turned to Jarrar, and her pure, elegant lines are likely to mark Lanvin's show on Wednesday. Jarrar, whose parents came from Morocco, worked her way up through Balenciaga and Christian Lacroix before launching her own label in 2010.

Dior's Italian job

But perhaps the week's biggest moment will be Italian designer Maria Grazia Chiuri's debut show on Friday at Dior as the first woman ever to lead the house. The 52-year-old helped revive Valentino with her creative partner Pierpaolo Piccioli before leaving him to run the Roman brand alone this summer.

Like the Belgian Raf Simons who she succeeded, hers is a sober, restrained aesthetic with romantic flourishes, very much in contrast to the flamboyant theatrics of John Galliano's time at the helm. Simons has since moved on to the more mass market Calvin Klein.

Leonard's new face

French designer Christine Phung is the other new arrival of the week. The 37-year-old, who has her own prize-winning label, will give her first show for Leonard next Monday. Leonard, which was founded by Daniel Tribouillard in 1958, and is known for its floral prints, has seen a succession of designers in recent years. — AFP

Reshaping the future? Hong Kong's face readers

ant to improve your performance at work, or solve relationship problems? Li Chau-jing has the solution-plucking your eyebrows to help achieve those life goals. A trained face reader, Li has taken the ancient Chinese tradition one step further, making slight changes to her client's brows to bring them better luck. Stalls practicing the face-reading discipline, which dates back more than 2,000 years, are still found in market streets and near temples in modern-day Hong Kong. Practitioners believe they can determine a client's fate by interpreting their features-a strong brow translates to the person's ability to plan ahead, high cheekbones can point to power.

The face can be read like a book, they say, a show-case of a person's wealth, health and family. But Li claims she can help alter the path of destiny with a few flicks of her tweezers. "It's an instant change and you can change it for everyone," she told AFP, describing her clientele as ranging from just a few years old to in their 70s. "I can help a person in the shortest amount of time, by bringing them energy and happiness and the goal they want to reach," Li said. Wearing a long white dress with a ruffled high collar and purple polka-dots, the former make-up artist says she has studied the art of face reading with a mentor.

She has been running her shop in the working class neighborhood of Sham Shui Po for six years and its walls are covered with photos of her clients' eyes and brows. Women tend to come to her to solve emotional or relationship problems, men for better luck at work, she says. Li, who refused to give her age but said she has worked for 43 years, believes straight brows will bring more luck and happiness than curved." If the brows are very straight, then those people will not have to suffer through many hardships," she says.

Customer Edward Lam, a 35-year-year old technician for a television station, said he felt more energetic after having his brows modified. "The biggest goal I have for fixing my eyebrows is to find jobs and to have better networking, and that my career will improve," Lam told AFP. "I believe that the impression I gave was better," he said of job interviews since having his brows worked on by Li.

Traditional Hong Kong face reader Chow Honming says the art is a scientific discipline that ties in with some of the tenets of traditional Chinese medicine. Face reading has been practiced in China for thousands of years but became a popular practice in the 10th century because the social upheaval in the dying days of the Tang Dynasty prompted many to worry more about their fate, Chow said.

"There are turning points in a person's life, and when you can't make a decision at those points, you might want to seek a (face reading) master," Chow said. A face reader starts with the left ear, which tells the story of the first seven years of a person's life. The right ear reflects the next seven years, followed by

the nose, eyes and chin, which are used to predict later life. Different parts of the face also represent

A jutting chin and a squarish jaw mean a person will have power as they get older, while large exposed nostrils mean they are bad at saving money. "The nose represents wealth, just look at (actor) Jackie Chan's nose, it is very big," says Chow, who also predicted Hillary Clinton to win the US presidential election as her chin is "stronger" than rival Donald Trump's. Chow said tweaking features like eyebrows could give fortunes a short-term boost-but warned against making drastic changes, describing plastic surgery as potentially doing more harm than good.

While some may prefer eyebrow-plucking Li's proactive approach, others are happy to stick to tra-

Dozens of packed stalls next to Hong Kong's popular Wong Tai Sin Temple offer face reading to thousands of worshippers and tourists visiting the religious hot-spot. Chinese tourist Fu Xiaohong, 26, says she came here to have her face read in order to deal with a personal matter. "I have some longing in my heart," she said near one stall where diagrams of faces and palms were displayed. 

Marilyn Monroe's dresses, notes, chequebook seen before sale

arilyn Monroe's dress from "Some Like It Hot." Handwritten notes and letters expressing the Hollywood icon's inner thoughts and, at times, despair. These and dozens of other personal items the actress left to a friend and mentor were in Beijing yesterday for a private viewing by Chinese collectors. More than 1,200 items, including Monroe's shoes, purses, makeup and jewelry, will then be auctioned in Los Angeles come November.

The 1950s actress who achieved fame as a sex symbol led a troubled life and died aged just 36. The image and recollections of her have endured and made her into a pop culture icon. Now the personal items up for auction may invite new readings of the screen legend in the world as well as in China, a country she never visited.

"Last night I was awake all night again," she writes to her therapist in March 1961. "Sometimes I wonder what the night time is for. It almost doesn't exist for me - it all seems like one long, long horrible day." She goes on to describe her recent time in a mental institution, which she likens to a being sent to a prison "for a crime I hadn't committed." "Oh, well, men are climbing to the moon but they don't seem interested in the beating human heart,"

Around 800 items to be auctioned come from the estate of Lee Strasberg, the famed American acting coach who became a father figure to Monroe. The money will go to his widow, Anna. Other items come from the collection of David Gainsborough-Roberts, a major collector of Monroe's costumes. The hundreds of items include dresses and outfits, the negligee she wore in the movie "Niagara" and the green and black-sequined leotard she picked out herself from a studio wardrobe to wear in "Bus Stop." There is a tube of her "non-smear" Revlon lipstick in "Bachelor's Carnation" shade, the shoes she wore to marry playwright Arthur Miller, and the pair of costume earrings that she wore to the premiere of "The Seven Year Itch."

Crayon drawings

Then there are the personal notes, crayon drawings and watercolors. Lee Strasberg's son, David, said that he, his mother and brother found many of the items in suitcases and closets about six years ago during a clean-out, including one trunk he'd been throwing his football



cleats on for years that turned out to contain some of Monroe's personal writings.

"She writes a note to my dad talking about something she heard in class, and she says, 'It helped me feel freer -you said two plus two does not necessary equal four in acting," said Strasberg, 45. "There's logic and then there's imagination, there's something more. And for Marilyn, I think she was always after that 'something more."

Monroe, who would have turned 90 this year, spent most of her childhood in foster homes and an orphanage and became one of Hollywood's most bankable stars, trading off her sex appeal and an image as a vacuous blonde. Off camera, she struggled with drug addiction and depression. She died from an overdose of barbiturates.

Some items up for auction have never been seen by the public before. They include a first-edition handbound 1957 volume of her third husband Miller's plays dedicated to Monroe, and a letter from a member of the Kennedy family.

The early 1960s letter is from Jean Kennedy Smith, sister of politicians President John F Kennedy and Robert "Bobby" Kennedy. Smith writes to Monroe: "Understand that you and Bobby are the new item! We all think you should come with him when he comes back East!" "There's always speculation about her relationship with the Kennedys and this speaks to the fact that there was in fact a relationship between Robert Kennedy and Marilyn Monroe," said Martin Nolan, executive director of Julien's Auctions in Beverly Hills, which will be handling the sale.

Strap sandals

Among the quirkier items are a receipt for a bottle of champagne, her 1947 contract with Twentieth Century Fox and a recipe for stuffing jotted down on a slip of paper with an insurance company's letterhead. Her final chequebook shows her payments to the window cleaner, her maid and the New York Telephone Co. She paid \$200 to herself marked as "cash for trips." "Marilyn kept everything. She was a hoarder," said Nolan. "She bought a pound of butter, she bought a bottle of tonic water she kept the receipt. It's incredible. We have a pair of strap sandals that she wore when she was Norma Jean, probably 1943, 1945. And all the money she made and how famous she became and she kept those."

Although Western movies were banned in China during Monroe's heyday, her pop culture image and aspects of her life are well-known among many Chinese. Darren Julien, founder and CEO of Julien Auction's, said about 40 percent of their client base are Chinese collectors interested in Western pop culture, and particularly Monroe.

"A lot of people relate to her because she had actually a very difficult life in a lot of ways. She never had a lot of money, but she captured the hearts of so many people around the world," said Julien. In recent years, wealthy Chinese citizens and private businesses have become big spenders in the art and pop culture worlds, often as a way to display their wealth or find a place to park their money. Real-time online bidding has made it easier for Chinese collectors to buy Western pop culture. The auction takes place Nov 17-19 in Los Angeles. — AP
