MP demands scrapping maid company due to high prices

Bedoons under rights panel • Speaker slams footage 'leakers'

MoI mulls fee hikes to plug budget deficit

KUWAIT: Director General of Residency Affairs Maj Gen Talal Maarafi said the most important reasons that made the interior ministry submit a proposal to increase fees is the deficit in the state's general budget, besides the real cost of services presented by the department, which are not in harmony with the current fees. He said the current fees have been in effect for 40 years without a change and most of them are selective, such as for visit and temporary residency permits.

"We are not against expats as they are our brothers. They live in Kuwait and earn their living here, and have a major role in building old and modern Kuwait as far as education, health and

infrastructure are concerned, but the fee increase includes both expats and citizens," he told Al-Qabas daily.

Maarafi spoke about a new system to renew expats' residency permits online, adding several offers from companies are being studied to select the best.

KUWAIT: MP Safa Al-Hashem yesterday demanded in a draft law the scrapping of the newly-established company for the recruitment of maids from abroad because of its high prices. Hashem said in her proposal that the company was established in accordance with a law passed in 2015 by the National Assembly with the main objective of bringing down the highly inflated prices charged by private recruitment offices.

But the company, which began operations recently, is charging almost similar fees, which means it has failed to achieve the goals of its establishment and should be scrapped, she said. Under the said law, only one company has been established, Al-Durrah Company, which recently advertised recruitment of domestic helpers from Sri Lanka, demanding a price of around KD 1,000, which is almost the same as charged by private offices.

Meanwhile, reports said the Kuwaiti Embassy in Manila recently sent a report to the foreign ministry in which it explained that the cost for the recruitment of a domestic helper from the Philippines is only KD 370, including the airfare. Recruitment offices have been charging well over KD 1,000, which prompted MPs to pass the law to set up pub-

lic shareholding companies for the recruitment of helpers with the aim to reduce prices.

Meanwhile, the Assembly's human rights defense committee yesterday decided to include the issue of stateless people or bedoons under its mandate in a bid to help resolve their decades-old problem. Head of the committee MP Adel Al-Damkhi said the committee decided to invite State Minister for Cabinet Affairs Anas Al-Saleh for a meeting to debate the establishment of the national human rights commission. He said the committee will pay an inspection visit to the central jail on Thursday and also decided to visit any facility where human rights abuses take place.

MP Mohammad Al-Dallal said yesterday that he will grill the new finance minister if he does not send the financial and economic reforms document to the Assembly before Feb 20 for a debate. Dallal asked the minister about the motives and the reasons behind the finance ministry's plans to impose taxes on individuals and companies, especially since taxation has a unique system under capitalism and does not apply to the Kuwaiti constitutional system. The Assembly will hold its regular session tomorrow amid demands to debate the hike in petrol prices, amendments to the health insurance on expatriates and others.

Separately, Assembly Speaker Marzouq Al-Ghanem vowed yesterday that those who leaked footage deemed offensive to the political leadership will be exposed and penalized. Ghanem linked between these people and those who helped impose a ban on Kuwaiti sports, which was lifted by FIFA a few days ago and which allowed the country to host the Gulf football championship.

News in brief

Saudis deny Israelis visas

ATHENS: Israeli players have been denied visas to participate in a speed chess championship hosted by Saudi Arabia this week, a vice president of the World Chess Federation (FIDE) said yesterday. Seven Israeli players had requested visas for the tournament on Dec 26-30. It would have marked the first time Saudi Arabia had publicly hosted Israelis as the Gulf state does not recognize Israel and there are no formal ties between them. Israel Gelfer, vice president of FIDE, whose Secretariat is based in Athens, told Reuters in an email that visas for the Israeli players "have not been issued and will not be issued". He said the tournament would go ahead as planned. It was not immediately clear if other delegations had been excluded but players from Qatar had suggested they may have been rejected.

Tunisia outraged over UAE curbs

ABU DHABI: The United Arab Emirates said yesterday that "security information" had caused the delays on Tunisian women from boarding flights to the Gulf state that caused an outcry in their home country. "We contacted our Tunisian brothers about security information that necessitated taking specific procedures," UAE Minister of State for Foreign Affairs Anwar Gargash said on his Twitter account. A number of Tunisian women said in recent days that their travel to the Gulf state on UAE airlines had been delayed and some had to undergo additional examination of their visas. That triggered angry reactions on social media and local Tunisian media. The Tunisian government said Friday it had asked the UAE ambassador for clarification, adding that the envoy said the decision was for only a short period and the restrictions had been lifted.

Fog disrupts UAE flights

DUBAI: Thick fog yesterday disrupted flights at major airports in the United Arab Emirates as thousands of foreign residents rushed to travel home for Christmas and the New Year. Dozens of flights were cancelled, diverted or delayed at the three main airports in the emirates of Abu Dhabi, Dubai and Sharjah. At Dubai airport, one of the busiest in the world, at least 17 flights were cancelled, as visibility dropped to just 100 m in some areas of the emirate. At least another 100 incoming flights were either diverted to nearby airports or delayed, according to the flight schedule at the airport. Emirates Airlines, which has a fleet of over 250 large planes, said it has cancelled 10 flight departures. Police warned motorists to be extremely cautious when driving in the fog.

Dozens dead in Philippine mall inferno

DAVAO, Philippines: At least 37 people, including call center staff from an American firm, are believed to have perished in a fire that tore through a shopping mall in the southern Philippine city of Davao, local authorities said yesterday. President Rodrigo Duterte, himself a Davao native, visited distraught relatives outside the burning building overnight but told them there was "zero" chance their loved ones had survived, witnesses told AFP.

Firemen found one body as the blaze was finally extinguished yesterday, Davao Mayor Sara Duterte - the president's daughter - told reporters. Firemen have concluded that all those trapped in the building are dead, she said, adding: "They assessed that no one would survive in that heat and with that thick, black smoke." The deadly fire adds fresh misery for the mainly Catholic Philippines at Christmas as the death toll from a tropical storm that hit the

Ad firms using tools to help them read your mind

NEW YORK: Why did you splurge on that new pair of shoes? Or that pricey smartphone? More and more advertisers are trying to tap into the unconscious to divine the invisible forces that drive those spending decisions. Using gadgets to track eye movements, computer maps of faces to capture a momentary grin (approval) or squinting (anger), and sensors to measure perspiration or monitor brain activity, companies are mining consumers' raw emotions for information. Traditionally, ad firms have measured the success of their campaigns through consumer surveys, but that technique has its limits.

"It's not that people won't tell you, they actually can't tell you why they're making the decision they're making," said Jessica Azoulay, vice president of the market intelligence practice at Isobar, a digital marketing agency. The new techniques recognize that our purchase decisions are driven by both rational and emotional factors, and

And the techniques are being applied to other industries, such as retail, which is experimenting on ways to attract customers in the Amazon era. "Ultimately there is a dance between the conscious and unconscious," Moses said, noting that "in order to actually buy a product, you have to make a conscious decision."

Some of the techniques were first employed in the 1970s, but now are being more widely adopted as equip-

An eye tracking test uses technology-enhanced glasses with a camera to record what a person is seeing on a television or in a store and read how long the eye settles on a particular cue. That can be combined with other methods, such as galvanic skin responses with sensors applied to a person's hand to read perspiration, and electroencephalography (EEG) which reads brain activity through sensors on a per-

son's head. The data is used to produce a "heat map" with yellow, orange or red "hotspots" that show where the person's eye fixated.

Techniques measuring arousal can signal whether an ad stands out amid today's media avalanche. Other tests that are becoming more popular seek to shed light on unconscious associations with products or shopping needs.

10 schools to be offered to investors as part of plan to privatize education

CSC suspends hiring expatriate advisors in public sector

KUWAIT: The supreme privatization council's advisory committee is currently considering setting a system to allow international companies to invest in Kuwait's educational sector. It aims to bring American, Chinese and Korean experiences to Kuwait using public-private-partnership (PPP) or build-operatetransfer (BOT) systems and attracting these companies by offering more incentives and facilities that would achieve long and short-term profits, said informed sources.

The sources added that the purpose of offering 10 public schools for privatization is driven by a need to gradually develop education through PPP, making use of the sums allocated for education in the budget as well as cutting the cost of education, bearing in mind that education consumes around 15 percent of the state budget. The sources said that Ministry of Education's technical office statistics show that educating a public school student costs the state KD 15,000 until finishing high school, a medicine student annually costs KD 100,000 while other university students annually cost KD 7,350 per student, which are large sums compared to the cost of studying in European and American uni-

The sources also noted that the privatization project will help the private sector invest in education, especially since teachers' salaries already consume 93 percent of Kuwait's education budget. Moreover, the sources said Korean Mudhaf stressed that youth are the companies will be invited to invest in nation's assets. He explained that the

which the private sector will be given 10 schools to rebuild and run for 20 years.

Advisors' hiring

The Civil Service Commission (CSC) suspended appointing expatriate advisors in the public sector and restricted such positions to citizens alone as recommended by the Fatwa and Legislation Department, as part of a policy of replacing expatriates working in state departments with Kuwaitis. In a different concern, well-informed sources at CSC announced that the registration of children of Kuwaiti women in the job application system has not officially opened and that CSC is still technically studying the topic to set up the needed database, and start with jobs that cannot be filled by citizens.

Separately, the Credit Bank's deputy chairman and managing director Salah Al-Mudhaf said the bank had 'Kuwaitized' its staff members in record time. Speaking during the graduation of the first batch of newly-appointed employees at the bank's training center,



during which new recruits were briefed about the bank's regulations and loan conditions as well as other skills needed in their career.

Court cases

The criminal court yesterday ordered closing down the 'Wathakker' Islamic preaching center and sentenced its owner to five years in prison for slandering a Muslim doctrine. The criminal court also annulled the public prosecution's decision on shelving the 'Dow Chemical' report and ordered reopening the penal case filed against some

Kuwait Petroleum Corporation (KPC) officials. Meanwhile, the misdemeanor court sentenced a lawyer to three months Kuwait in an experimental phase during training course lasted for three months,

in prison over a hoax report and disturbing the authorities by calling the police operator and claiming the presence of a vehicle full of explosives outside his house. In another case, the court adjourned hearing a state security case filed against Abdullah Al-Saleh for slandering UAE and its rulers till Jan 21.

Cold wave expected

Meteorologist Abdul Aziz Al-Qarawi expected warm weather and southeasterly winds will continue until this evening, when a cold northwesterly moderate wind of speeds between 15-45 kilometers per hour will affect Kuwait. Qarawi added that this shift will make temperature drop by 6-8 degrees centigrade and that cold weather is predicted until the beginning

Amir reason for FIFA ban lift: Speaker

KUWAIT: His Highness the Amir Sheikh Sabah Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah's support towards the national football scene is the main reason behind lifting the ban imposed on Kuwait by the FIFA, Speaker of the National Assembly Marzouq Al-Ghanem said yesterday.

Speaking to the press at the National Assembly building, Ghanem thanked all officials and individuals who contributed to lifting the ban on Kuwaiti football. Ghanem also thanked the Cabinet, National Assembly, and all national entities for their efforts in this regard. Early in December, FIFA's Chief Gianni Infantino visited Kuwait to announce the lift of the ban. Kuwait took several steps to change its sport-related laws to comply with international standards.

FIFA President Gianni Infantino, who attended all four opening games of the 23rd Arabian Gulf Cup, was impressed by both the numbers and diversity of the football-loving fans in attendance. comprising large numbers of children, fathers and mothers. "It was a great honor for me to attend the opening games of the 2017 Gulf Cup in Kuwait," said Infantino in a statement posted on FIFA's website yesterday. "This tournament embraces the spirit of sportsmanship and is a great example of the values FIFA and football strive to spread all around the world."

Kuwait donation to reimburse 272 factories in Gaza

GAZA: A sum of \$2.1 million of the Kuwaiti donation for the reconstruction of the Gaza Strip will be disbursed to finance a number of industrial facilities damaged during the Israeli war, the Palestinian government said yesterday. Palestinian Minister of Public Works and Housing Mufeed Hasayneh said in a press statement that 272 destroyed industrial enterprises during the Israeli aggression would benefit from the sum. In the name of the Palestinian leadership and people, Hasayneh thanked His Highness the Amir Sheikh Sabah Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah, the Kuwait Fund for Arab Economic Development (KFAED) and the Kuwaiti people for their non-stop support to the Palestinian people. In October 2014, Kuwait pledged \$200 million as part of the \$5.4 billion donation made at Cairo's donors conference for the Gaza Strip. — KUNA

KPC signs LNG deal with Shell Global

KUWAIT: Kuwait Petroleum Corporation (KPC) signed a long-term deal with Shell Global to receive supplies of Liquefied Natural Gas (LNG), said a statement yesterday. A press release by KPC said that the deal would help attend to the increasing demand for energy in Kuwait. The LNG deal will provide fuel to power stations in Kuwait, the KPC indicated. It added that LNG is a clean source of energy that will protect the environment from pollutants. — KUNA

ALECSO key to keep hurdles at bay: League chief

CAIRO: The Arab League's Educational, Cultural and Scientific Organization (ALECSO) is instrumental in staving off numerous challenges thrust upon the Arab region, the bloc's secretary general Ahmad Abul-Gheit said yesterday. In a meeting with ALECSO's newly-appointed director general of Kuwait Dr Saud Al-Harbi, the Arab League's head underlined the need for Arab nations to work closely together to ameliorate the region's educational and cultural sectors. Abul-Gheit acknowledged ALESCO's contributions towards overall growth and development, according to a statement by the Arab League. On the spread of radical ideologies, the statement cited the Arab League chief as saying that a solid education system can help promote the virtue of moderation across social spectrums. — KUNA

US Dollar stable against Kuwait Dinar

KUWAIT: The exchange rate of the US dollar was stable at KD 0.301, same as the Euro with KD 0.358, said the Central Bank of Kuwait (CBK) yesterday. On its daily bulletin, CBK added that the rate of the Sterling Pound was also stable at KD 0.403, while the Swiss Franc was down to KD 0.305 rate. The Japanese Yen remained stable at KD 0.002. — KUNA

Domestic helpers' trade network busted

KUWAIT: Detectives raided a luxury apartment and arrested several expat women who worked for a network that traded in domestic helpers. The owner swindled citizens and expats by sending helpers to work for a few days, who then escaped and returned to the apartment. A citizen complained to the domestic help department at the interior ministry's residency directorate against the office, saving that a helper worked for him for 48 hours, then escaped. A source said that an undercover agent called the office and hired three helpers, who were later arrested and led police to the apartment, where several other women were found.



Christians celebrate Xmas in churches around Kuwait

We are not blessed if we are greedy, angry: Catholic priest


KUWAIT: Except for the Eastern Orthodox Church which celebrates Christmas on Jan 7, Christians all over the world mark Christmas today. In Kuwait, some Christians observe Christmas through prayer services at various churches at midnight (the eve of Christmas), leading to the traditional sharing of gifts. Filipinos in Kuwait have a unique tradition in anticipation of Christmas Day. For nine consecutive days, they visit churches and attend devotional Mass (Simbang



Gabi) in the belief of a more prosperous life in the years

ahead. There are about 250,000 Filipinos in Kuwait.

The Catholic Church in Kuwait has three churches - the Holy Family Cathedral in Kuwait City, Our Lady of Arabia Church in Ahmadi and the Saint Therese Church in Salmiya. These churches had schedules of nine days of Christmas Mass, which began in the early hours (4:30 am - 6:00 am) from Dec 16 to Dec 24. The Salmiya compound had additional church services, or what it calls anticipated Christmas Mass, from 9:00 pm, also for nine consecutive



In his message during the last day of 'Simbang Gabi' yesterday, Father Monching Atanacio urged attendees to focus more on the love of God and not on gifts or material blessings. "Mary was full of grace because she followed God," he said. He urged Christians to follow the model of Mary (the mother of Jesus) and why she is considered blessed. "People are not blessed if they are greedy, full of grudges and have anger in their hearts. They do not know

how to forgive - they prioritize money, power and fame instead," he said.

Christmas is not an official holiday in Kuwait, although some companies give the day off to Christian employees to celebrate with their loved ones, families, friends and community, with joyful carols, food and various fun activities, as long as it does not disturb the peace and harmony with others. Kuwait's constitution guarantees non-Muslims' absolute freedom of belief and the right to practice religion in accordance with its established customs.

KUWAIT: Gold prices have rebounded in December following a two-month drop triggered by a looming decision by the US Federal Reserve to raise interest rate. Gold prices recorded the highest rate this year, hitting \$1,346 per ounce in September, as against roughly \$1,273 and \$1,161 per ounce in November and early this year respectively.

As the Federal Reserve raised interest rates to a range of 1.25 to 1.50 percent on December 13, gold prices amounted to around \$1,260 per ounce, compared with \$1,238 in the previous day. However, it left its rate outlook for the coming years unchanged even as policymakers projected a short-term jump in US economic growth from the Trump administration's proposed tax cuts.

The US central bank raised rates by a quarter of a percentage point to a range of 1.25 percent to 1.50 percent. It was the third rate hike this year. The recent US rate depreciation has pushed many investors to resort to gold instead of dollars since it is considered a safe haven in the event of economic crises. In this context, experts said that the dive in gold prices over the last couple of months was expected due to forecasts of the Federal Reserve's decision, expecting gold recovery at the advent of next year.

Sabaek Al-Kuwait Company's General Manager Rajab Hamed said there was a recent high demand for gold, occasionally hitting 50 percent especially regarding alloys, which are a "new and safe" investment source. Hamed anticipated gold prices to improve by over 10 percent in the first quarter of this year, believing that gold has proved firm in spite of repeatedly increased US interest rates this year.

Gold prices have rebounded this year following a hike in US interest rates, he said, adding that gold prices always nosedive with an approaching US decision to raise interest rates. Commerce and Industry Ministry's Precious Metals' Department Acting Manager Saad Al-Saidi said local demand for gold during the last four months went down, as against the same period last year.

External gold quantities hit around 3.720 tons of different gold karats during the reported period, compared with 4.184 tons during the same period last year, he added. On consumers' indexes, he pointed out an increasing demand for alloys of different sizes during the last period, reflecting investors and citizens' desire to buy gold as a feasible investment opportunity.

Meanwhile, Ali and Nasser Al-Sayegh Jewellery Company's General Manager Nasser Al-Sayegh said gold prices in Kuwait are linked to the world bourse, and high or low gold prices depend on occasions, rather than world prices. Local jewelry sales often largely increase during Eid Al-Fitr and Eid Al-Adha as well as wedding parties, he pointed out. Kuwait's current growing demand for gold reflects investors' search for fresh opportunities, he said, estimating gold investment returns at a range of 10 to 15 percent. —KUNA

First bank to sign agreements with UN organizations in GCC

The situation does not differ much in Yemen where nearly one million refugees have migrated internally. The latest Rohingya crises was the last. It was described as the fastest growing humanitarian crises worldwide. The number of Rohingya refugees in Bangladesh approximated 900,000 refugees including 626,000 refugees which have fled to Bangladesh before the outbreak of the violence this year.

MANILA: More than 200 people have been killed and this may have caused many to ignore warnings to move floodwater carried away 103 houses. Footage on ABS-CBN days after floods carried off 40 houses, killing three people day after a tropical storm triggered severe flooding and the island submerged by brown water, often waist-deep, and rescuers retrieving the body of a girl buried in a landlandslides that also wrecked Christmas for tens of thousands of survivors. Tropical Storm Tembin lashed Mindanao Island, home to 20 million people, on Friday with strong gusts and torrential rain, wiping out at least one mountain village and prompting a massive rescue operation. Police said 208 people were confirmed dead and 164 remained missing, while more than 40,000 had fled their homes for evacuation camps as Tembin roared out into the South China Sea yesterday.

A total of 70,000 have been displaced or otherwise affected by the storm, according to the International Federation of Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies (IFRC), which warned that continued heavy rain could hamper the search for survivors."People left everything behind when they fled for their lives," the IFRC's Philippines operations and programs manager Patrick Elliott said in a statement. The archipelago nation is pummeled by major storms every year, many of them deadly.

Mindanao tends to be less affected and officials said

with streets turning into rivers. Local police said 135 people were killed and 72 missing in the northern section of Mindanao, while 47 were dead and 72 missing in the impoverished Zamboanga peninsula on its western side. Another 26 people perished with 20 missing in the province of Lanao del Sur in the centre of the island, based on an updated official tally there.



Village erased One of the places hit hardest was the mountain village of Dalama, which was virtually wiped off the map as roaring

slide. Police, soldiers and volunteers used shovels and their bare hands to dig through mud and debris in their search for survivors.

"The flood was already close and the people were not able to get out from their Sangcopan, an elderly male survivor, told the station. "We called for forced evacuation, pre-emptive evacuation in certain areas. We are saddened by the (large) num-

bers of casualties," Romina Marasigan, spokeswoman for the National Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Council, told reporters in Manila.

In the town of Kabasalan in Zamboanga, dozens of families huddled in the homes of neighbors on Christmas Eve, two

scores were missing in the southern Philippines yester- to safer ground. Footage showed vast tracts of land on showed houses there destroyed or engulfed by floodwater with one missing, said local civil defense chief Junalyn Maravillo. "This is a disaster. They don't think about Christmas. All they think about is what they will eat for today," she said. Pope Francis said in Rome he was praying for storm victims in the Philippines, where some 80 percent of the population is Catholic.

"May the merciful God welcome the souls of the dead and comfort those who suffer from this calamity," he said. The storm swept into the South China Sea before dawn yesterday after hitting the western tourist island of Palawan overnight Saturday, the state weather service said. "So far zero casualties, but we have accounts of some people missing," Palawan civil defense chief Zaldy Ablana told DZMM radio yesterday.

But in a Palawan fishing village, a 53-year-old man was killed by a crocodile while securing his boat in a river. Tembin struck less than a week after Tropical Storm Kai-Tak left scores dead and more than 20 missing in the central Philippines, straining the disaster-prone nation's already stretched resources. The deadliest typhoon to hit the country is still Haiyan, which killed thousands and destroyed entire towns in heavily populated areas of the central Philippines in November 2013.—AFP


'10,000 refugees' to be relocated from Libya to EU

ROME: Up to 10,000 people stranded in refugee camps and detention centers in Libya could be relocated to Europe in 2018, the Italian government said yesterday. The initiative would be part of an attempt by EU countries to address the deteriorating conditions in Libya, where thousands of people are held captive in inhumane conditions. "In 2018, up to 10,000 refugees will be able to come to Europe without risk, through humanitarian corridors," Italian Interior Minister Marco Minniti said in an interview with the newspaper La Repubblica.

The announcement comes after a group of 162 "vulnerable" people, from Eritrea, Ethiopia, Somalia and Yemen, were evacuated from Libya and arrived by military plane in Rome on Friday. The group included single mothers, unaccompanied children and handicapped people, and was the first time refugees and migrants had been relocated directly to Europe by the UN's refugee agency (UNHCR).

About 400,000 migrants are in Libya, including roughly 36,000 children, the UN children's agency UNICEF and the International Organization for Migration (IOM) said earlier this month. In 2018, the IOM aims to repatriate 30,000 migrants to their home countries as part of a voluntary return program. Around 15,000 have been sent back this year. "In accordance with the objectives of the International Organization for Migration, 30,000 migrants without right to asylum will be able to be repatriated to their countries on a voluntary basis," in 2018, Minniti said.

"With the help of the Libyan authorities, we have constructed a new management model on the other side of the Mediterranean."Libya has long been a transit hub for migrants seeking a better life in Europe, but

people smugglers have stepped up their lucrative business since the chaos following the 2011 revolution. Last month, US television network CNN broadcast video footage appearing to show migrants being sold as slaves near the Libyan capital Tripoli, sparking interna-

International organizations are now able to "visit reception centers and improve their living conditions," Minniti said, adding that the conditions were currently

"unacceptable". Italy also needs to take "credible" measures to work with the Libyan coastguard to better control the "illegal" influx of migrants arriving by sea, he said. Sea arrivals to Italy are down a third this year, from almost 180,000 people in 2016 to just under 119,000 in 2017, which includes nearly 15,000 unaccompanied children, according to UNICEF and IOM. Hundreds of people also drowned trying to make the treacherous journey across the Mediterranean.—AFP

Turkey fires more than 2,700 in latest post-coup purges

ANKARA: The Turkish government yesterday ordered the sacking of more than 2,700 people working in public institutions over alleged links to "terror" groups, in the latest round of purges since last year's failed coup. In a separate emergency decree, the country's defense procurement agency was ordered to answer to President Recep Tayyip Erdogan instead of the defense ministry, in a move widely viewed as a further expansion of

Turkey's intelligence service (MIT) also came under Erdogan's control in August. A total of 2,756 people including academics, soldiers and military personal were removed from different bodies including the interior, foreign and defense ministries, according to the Official Gazette. All those dismissed were either members of "terror" organizations or had links to structures which were acting against national security, it said. 17 Turkish institutions were also ordered to close,

including two newspapers and seven associations. More than 140,000 people including judges, lawyers and academics have been sacked or suspended since a failed coup in July last year, while some 55,000 people have been arrested over suspected links to US-based Islamic cleric Fethullah Gulen and the coup attempt. Turkey claims Gulen and his Hizmet (service) movement, which it calls the "Fethullah Terrorist Organization", ordered and conducted the attempted coup. Gulen, who's lived in self-imposed exile in Pennsylvania since 1999, denies any links to terrorism and the failed putsch. —AFP

Pyongyang vows to punish those who supported new resolution

BEIJING: The latest UN sanctions against North Korea are an act of war and tantamount to a complete economic blockade against it, North Korea's foreign ministry said yesterday, threatening to punish those who supported the measure. The UN Security Council unanimously imposed new sanctions on North Korea on Friday for its recent intercontinental ballistic missile test, seeking to limit its access to refined petroleum products and crude oil and its earnings from workers abroad.

The UN resolution seeks to ban nearly 90 percent of refined petroleum exports to North Korea by capping them at 500,000 barrels a year and, in a lastminute change, demands the repatriation of North Koreans working abroad within 24 months, instead of 12 months as first proposed. The US-drafted resolution also caps crude oil supplies to North Korea at 4 million barrels a year and commits the Council to further reductions if it were to conduct another nuclear test or launch another ICBM.

In a statement carried by the official KCNA news agency, North Korea's foreign ministry said the United States was terrified by its nuclear force and was getting "more and more frenzied in the moves to impose the harshest-ever sanctions and pressure on our country". The new resolution was tantamount to a complete economic blockade of North Korea, the ministry said. "We define this 'sanctions resolution' rigged up by the US and its followers as a grave infringement upon the sovereignty of our Republic, position that they are a "grave warning by the inter-

as an act of war violating peace and stability in the Korean peninsula and the region and categorically reject the 'resolution'," it said.

"There is no more fatal blunder than the miscalculation that the US and its followers could check by already worn-out 'sanctions' the victorious advance of our people who have brilliantly accomplished the great

historic cause of completing the state nuclear force", the ministry said. North Korean leader Kim Jong Un on Nov. 29 declared the nuclear force complete after the test of North Korea's largest-ever ICBM test, which the country said puts all of the United States within range.

Kim told a meeting of members of the ruling Workers' Party on Friday that the country "successfully

realized the historic cause of completing the state nuclear force" despite "short supply in everything and manifold difficulties and ordeals owing to the despicable anti-DPRK moves of the enemies". North Korea's official name is the Democratic People's Republic of Korea (DPRK). South Korea's foreign ministry told Reuters it is aware of the North Korean statement on the new sanctions, again highlighting its

national community that the region has no option but to immediately cease reckless provocations, and take the path of dialogue for denuclearization and peace".

'Balance of force'

The North Korean foreign ministry said its nuclear weapons were a self-defensive deterrence not in con-

tradiction of international law. "We will further consolidate our self-defensive nuclear deterrence aimed at fundamentally eradicating the US nuclear threats, blackmail and hostile moves by establishing the practical balance of force with the US," it said. "The US should not forget even a second the entity of the DPRK which rapidly

emerged as a strategic state capable of posing a substantial nuclear threat to the US mainland," it added.

North Korea said those who voted for the sanctions would face its wrath. "Those countries that raised their hands in favor of this 'sanctions resolution' shall be held completely responsible for all the consequences to be caused by the 'resolution' and we will make sure for ever and ever that they pay heavy price for what they have done." The North's old allies China and Russia both supported the latest UN sanctions. Tension has been rising over North Korea's nuclear and missile programs, which it pursues in defiance of years of UN Security Council resolutions, with bellicose rhetoric coming from both Pyongyang and the White House.

In November, North Korea demanded a halt to what it called "brutal sanctions", saying a round imposed after its sixth and most powerful nuclear test on Sept 3 constituted genocide. US diplomats have made clear they are seeking a diplomatic solution but proposed the new, tougher sanctions resolution to ratchet up pressure on North Korea's leader. China, with which North Korea does some 90 percent of its trade, has repeatedly called for calm and restraint from all sides. China said on Saturday the new resolution also reiterated the need for a peaceful resolution via talks and that all sides needed to take steps to reduce tensions.

Chinese state-run tabloid the Global Times said on Saturday the tougher resolution was aimed at preventing war. It suggested the United States had wanted an even harsher resolution, and noted there was no indication in the resolution that the United Nations could grant the United States permission for military action. "The difference between the new resolution and the original US proposal reflects the will of China and Russia to prevent war and chaos on the Korean Peninsula. If the US proposals were accepted, only war is foreseeable," it said in an editorial. — Reuters

UN vote a setback but US still 'a key' to Mideast peace

WASHINGTON: Washington's latest overwhelming defeat at the United Nations may have been an embarrassment, but any claim it has lost its role as Middle East peace mediator will likely prove premature. A huge majority of UN member states, including close US allies and major aid recipients, voted Thursday to reject President Donald Trump's recognition of Jerusalem as Israel's capital.

Underscoring the significance of the defeat, US ambassador Nikki Haley had warned that Trump would be watching and that she would be "taking names" of countries who let him down. But-once again-Trump's "America First" policy delivered an "America Alone" result, leaving some Palestinians crowing that the United States can no longer serve as peace mediator. Vice President Mike Pence had already postponed a trip he was due to make to the region this week, after Palestinian and Arab Christian leaders had proved reluctant to meet him.

Peace broker

So, perhaps Washington will have to keep its powder dry for a few weeks as dust settles, some experts acknowledge. But if there is ever to be a long-elusive peace deal between Israel and the Palestinians, only one broker can deliver it. "There's been peaks and valleys before on this issue," said David Makovsky, a peace process veteran and senior fellow of the Washington Institute for Near East Policy. "If I had a dollar every time people said 'Oh, it's over now, the US is not the broker..." he said ironically. Dan Shapiro, who served as former president Barack Obama's ambassador to Israel, dismissed the vote as a "pathetic UN circus" and urged Washington to refocus on its goal. "What is US strategy to end the conflict, achieve two states, avoid permanent binational reality? Or at least keep those goals alive?" he demanded, on Twitter.

That strategy should reveal itself in the coming weeks or months, when Trump's son-in-law and peace envoy Jared Kushner reveals his hotly anticipated blueprint. Almost since Trump has been in office Kushner and his fellow real estate lawyer Jason Greenblatt have been shuttling between the White House and the region drawing up plans. Few details have leaked, but Washington gossip assumes it will be a less prescriptive version of the plan to see Israel and Palestine negotiate the borders of two states.

Kushner and Greenblatt initially made a good impression on leaders in the region, despite Palestinian fears that Trump is sympathetic to Israeli settlement building on occupied land. But America's unilateral decision to recognize Jerusalem as Israel's capital without the parties first agreeing a division of sovereignty in the holy city outraged Palestinians. Planned meetings with Pence were cancelled and, at the United Nations on Thursday Palestinian envoys tasted bitter victory when the world largely united to condemn Trump's position.

Peace parameters

"One hundred twenty-eight versus nine-that's a massive setback for the United States of America," Ambassador Riyad Mansour said, after the vote. But if the Palestinians are now hoping for a more convenable mediator, they stand to be disappointed. France-along with other key US allies like Britain, Turkey and Saudi Arabia-voted to censure Trump, but French envoy Ambassador Francois Delattre played down its importance.

'Today's resolution simply reaffirms the international law that applies to Jerusalem," he told reporters. "It is more important than ever to unite the international community behind agreed peace process parameters, including of course the United States," he said. Of Washington's mediation, the ambassador added: "Everyone knows the special role and weight they have in this dossier." So, however the Palestinians fell today after a rare procedural victory, next year they may find themselves obliged to engage with whatever new plan Kushner comes up with.

Makovsky argued that Trump had never ruled out a Palestinian capital in east Jerusalem, and said US officials should have gone on Arab television to explain this. "Look at what the guy said; that he wanted to leave this open to the parties to negotiate whatever sovereignty arrangements they want, including the religious sites," he argued. "So I wouldn't say this is dead and buried," he said. "My feeling is that if Kushner and Greenblatt actually put forward a peace plan in the first quarter of 2018. I think [the Palestinians] would have to take it seriously."—AFP

Britain homelessness becomes a 'national crisis'; Christmas helps

Thousands of people forced to sleep in cars, trains, buses

LONDON: Volunteers at a drop-in centre in north adding: "The extent of homelessness across England is a London hand out food, healthcare and advice to homeless people as they do every Christmas-except that this year, the numbers needing help have reached crisis point. At a school emptied of children for the holidays, visitors are offered a hot meal and a chat, dental and medical check-ups, and even a sewing repair service for damaged sleeping bags.

The pop-up centre is among 13 set up across Britain by homelessness charity Crisis to provide some festive cheer to an estimated 4,500 people who might otherwise

be on the streets. Among those stopping by for a cup of tea before Christmas was Paula, a 48year-old former care worker who spent three months living in her car after being evicted following problems with her landlord. "My car was my safest bet because I could lock the doors, but it wasn't warm-luckily it was summer," she said.

It was also deeply uncomfortable and exacer-

bated an existing back problem, to the point that she collapsed and had to be taken to hospital. She has since found a new place to live, but Crisis warned that cases like hers are increasingly common, estimating that thousands of people across Britain are forced to sleep in cars, trains, buses and tents. These "hidden" homeless are in addition to the more than 9,000 people living on the streets in England at any one time, up 134 percent since 2011, according to a scathing report by lawmakers published this week. The MPs said the growth was "appalling", national crisis.'

Housing shortages

Opposition Labor lawmaker Jeremy Corbyn highlighted the plight of rough sleepers in his Christmas message yesterday, as well as that of an estimated 78,000 households who are living in temporary, often sub-standard accommodation. He has previously described it as a "national disgrace". Crisis chief executive Jon Sparkes said there were numerous reasons why people lost their

homes, including the breakdown of relationships, but the biggest recent factor has been the ending of a private sector tenancy. News in brief

Gunmen kill 3 at cafe

CAIRO: Masked gunmen opened fire on a cafe south of the Egyptian capital, killing three people, security officials said yesterday. The attack, which took place overnight in the village of Al-Ayat about 50 kilometers from Cairo, left at least five others wounded, they said. While the motivation was unclear officials suspect it was a criminal incident rather than terrorism. State-run newspaper Akhbar Al-Youm, citing witnesses, said two attackers arrived on a motorcycle and opened fire on people in the cafe before fleeing. Security officials arrived at the scene and also interviewed injured people in hospital to try to identify and arrest the attackers, the newspaper reported.

American IS fighter

WASHINGTON: A federal judge has ruled that the Pentagon must allow an American Islamic State fighter captured in Iraq access to a lawyer, following a lawsuit filed by the American Civil Liberties Union. Judge Tanya S Chutkan of the Federal District Court in Washington ruled Saturday the ACLU must be provided "temporary, immediate and unmonitored access" to establish whether the detainee wants it to act on his behalf. The Trump administration had argued the ACLU had no standing to file suit as it had not conferred with the man and could not "prove that it is pursuing his best interests," according to the 12-page ruling. But in a cutting criticism, Judge Chutkan slammed the government's position as "disingenuous at best"given that the Defense Department was the only reason the ACLU had not met with the detainee, designated an "enemy combatant." The ruling also noted that the man requested counsel during questioning by FBI agents-describing the Defense Department's disregard of the request "until it decides what to do with the detainee and when to allow him access to counsel" as "remarkable and troubling."

Vanished submarine

BUENOS AIRES: A sonar search for the Argentine submarine that disappeared on November 15 with 44 crew members on board has made a new contact in the South Atlantic, according to the navy. It will be investigated by the remotely-operated Russian Panther Plus submarine, while the US oceanographic research vessel Atlantis continues exploring the search area, the navy announced Saturday. Argentina has received help from 13 countries in its search for the San Juan submarine. It has abandoned hope of finding survivors and is concentrating only on finding the vessel, which in its last message reported that seawater had entered the ventilation system, causing a battery on the dieselelectric vessel to short-circuit and start a fire. An unusual noise heard in the ocean near the last known position of the San Juan, three hours after its final contact, was "consistent with an explosion," the navy said in late November. Other reported contacts detected weeks ago amounted to nothing-with some arising from a fishing boat which sank years previously.

12th Palestinian dies

GAZA: A Palestinian teenager died yesterday, nine days after being wounded by Israeli fire during a Gaza protest against US recognition of Jerusalem as Israel's capital, the health ministry said. Mohammad Sami Al-Dahduh, 19, from Gaza City was shot on December 15 during a demonstration on the Israeli border, ministry spokesman Ashraf Al-Qudra said. His death brings to 12 the number of Palestinians killed since US President Donald Trump announced on December 6 that he would recognize Jerusalem as Israel's capital and move the US embassy there from Tel Aviv. Ten protesters have died after clashes with Israeli troops, two of them on Friday. Two others were killed in an İsraeli air strike on Gaza earlier in the month. Among the Gazans killed in the December 15 clashes was Ibrahim Abu Thurayeh, who had lost his legs in an Israeli attack a decade ago.

Russians endorse Navalny candidacy; a challenge to Putin

MOSCOW: Thousands of Russians yesterday endorsed the candidacy of Alexei Navalny, seen as the only Russian opposition leader who stands a fighting chance of challenging strongman Vladimir Putin in a March vote. Thousands of people who back the charismatic 41-year-old lawyer were meeting in 20 Russian cities to nominate him as a candidate in the presence of electoral officials to boost his chances of making the presidential vote.

In Moscow alone, more than 700 people supported Navalny's candidacy as they gathered in a huge tent set up in a picturesque park on the snow-covered banks of the Moscow River. "I am hugely happy, I am proud to tell you that stand here as a candidate of the entire Russia," the plucky Western-educated lawyer told supporters at the Moscow event which at times felt like a US campaign conference. "We are ready to win and we will win these elections," Navalny said before finishing his speech in a cloud of confetti. Two members of the Central Election Commission attended the Moscow event, Navalny's campaign said.

Earlier yesterday supporters in other Russian cities also endorsed his candidacy, including more than 800 people in the southern city of Rostov-on-Don, more than 900 in the Urals city of Yekaterinburg and over 700 in Novosibirsk in Siberia, his campaign said. Electoral officials have deemed Navalny ineligible to run due to a criminal conviction, saying 'only a miracle" would help him get registered. Navalny, who has tapped into the anger of a younger generation who grew up under Putin and yearn for change, hopes that popular support for his Kremlin bid would pressure authorities into putting his name on the ballot.

'Thwart dishonest elections'

An independent candidate needs at least 500 votes to get registered with election authorities, according to legislation. Navalny has said he would get at least 500 Russians in each of the 20 cities to support his candidacy to make it harder for the authorities to reject his bid. Putin, 65, announced this month that he will seek a fourth presidential term, which would extend his rule until 2024 and make him the longestserving Russian leader since dictator Joseph Stalin.

Opposed by token opposition candidates, he is widely expected to sail to victory. Yesterday, Navalny reiterated his

Florida orange industry hit by hurricane, disease

NEW YORK: Hit by Hurricane Irma and a citrus ailment known as "Yellow Dragon Disease," Florida orange growers are bracing for potentially the worst harvest in more than a half century. Forecasters are projecting a yield of 46 million boxes of oranges for the 2017-2018 Florida orange season, a drop of 33 percent from last year and the lowest output since at least 1944-1945, according to the US Agriculture Department.

Some areas have lost as much as 90 percent of their fruit due to winds from Irma, or root damage due to flooding. "It may take months for growers to gauge the true scale of the impact of Hurricane Irma and years to fully recover," said Shelley Rossetter, a spokeswoman for the Florida Citrus Department. Florida oranges aren't the only casualty of 2017, an unusually busy year for natural disasters in North America.

The massive "Thomas" wildfire, considered the second biggest fire ever in California, has damaged lemon and avocado crops in the region north of Los Angeles. Hundreds of acres of producing land have burned, said Ken Melban, vice president of industry affairs at the California Avocado Commission."It's a very unusual fire, some areas have been burned several times," Melban said. "It has a tremendous impact on growers impacted by the fire." But Melban said it was difficult to determine the full

threat to call for a boycott of the polls if he did not get registered. "Thwart the elections if they are dishonest," he said. With the result of the March vote a foregone conclusion, turnout could be low, harming Putin's hopes for a clear mandate, observers say. "If Navalny is not allowed to run I am not going to vote," pensioner Marina Kurbatskaya said in Moscow. "I don't see anyone else who I want to become president."

Navalny has built a robust protest movement in the face of persistent harassment and jumped through multiple hoops as ne campaigned across the country in an effort to shift attitudes amid widespread political ennui. He says he is the only Russian politician who has run a genuine Western-style political campaign, stumping for votes in far-flung regions. Many critics scoff at Navalny's Kremlin bid but the anti-corruption blogger says he would beat Putin in a free election if he had access to state-controlled television, the main source of news for a majority of Russians.

impact on avocado prices because of higher imports and the supply from California growers not touched by the fire.

Sour times

But in Florida, where the orange industry employs 45,000 and an economic impact in the state of \$8.6 billion, the outlook is grim, especially since the industry already faced myriad challenges even before Irma hit in September. Citrus greening disease-otherwise known as Yellow Dragon Disease-is a bacterial malady spread by insects that has begun to ravage crops, killing some orange trees and rendering other fruit small and sour.

Orange production in Florida, which peaked at 244 million cartons in 1998, fell last year to 67 million. There is no cure, so growers are focusing on ways to limit the spread of the disease, and on technologies and growing practices that could build resistant to the disease. "Things were starting to turn around," Rossetter said. "Before Hurricane Irma, Florida Citrus growers were expecting 75 million boxes, the first crop size increase in years.'

But she warned that in the wake of the storm, "Without support from state and federal government, some growers may go out of business." The state orange industry also has come under pressure due to declining demand for orange juice as Americans turn to less sweet drinks and other alternatives. About 90 percent of Florida's oranges are used for juice.US consumption of fresh orange juice has fallen 18 percent in just four years, according to Nielsen data. At the same time, rising imports offer unwelcome competition. Brazil, a big producer of oranges for orange juice, could see an increase in output of 55 percent this year amid favorable weather conditions, according to USDA.—AFP

Navalny shot to prominence as an organizer of huge anti-Putin rallies that shook Russia in 2011 and 2012 following claims of vote-rigging in parliamentary polls. The rallies gradually died down but he has been able to breathe new life into the protest movement this year, bringing out tens of thousands of mostly young protesters onto the streets. "Navalny is the only real opposition candidate," Sergei Dmitriyev, 60 said in the second city of Saint Petersburg where more than a thousand supporters gathered to support Navalny's bid. "We need a new president," added Alexander Semyonov, 18. Despite a litany of problems such as corruption, poor healthcare and increasing poverty, opinion polls suggest Putin enjoys approval ratings of 80 percent. Asked why Navalny had been barred from running, Putin - who has refused to mention him by name in public-said the opposition was hoping for a "coup" but would not succeed.—AFP

Myanmar, accused of crackdown, invited to US-Thai exercise

WASHINGTON: The Myanmar military, which has been accused of ethnic cleansing against the country's Muslim Rohingya minority, has been invited back as an observer in a major multinational military exercise next year led by the United States and Thailand. Lieutenant Colonel Christopher Logan, a Pentagon spokesman, told Reuters that Thailand had invited Myanmar to take part in the annual Cobra Gold exercise, which involves thousands of US and Thai military personnel and participants from other Asian countries.

Myanmar had been invited to observe the humanitarian assistance and disaster relief portion of the exercise, Logan said. A senior officer at the Directorate of Joint Intelligence of the Royal Thai Armed Forces told Reuters it was unclear whether Myanmar had accepted the invitation but Thailand was eager for them to join. Asked why Thailand decided to invite Myanmar despite concerns over the crackdown against the Rohingya and whether this issue was part of their deliberations, the official said:

"That never came up in the discussions. We separated that issue (the Rohingya). We focus on training, on education, on military cooperation. That is our wish, to have Myanmar involved." "That is politics. We are soldiers. This is a military exercise," added the official, who declined to be named because he was not authorized to speak to the media. -Reuters

In 'China's Jerusalem', faith trumps Sunday School ban

As religion grows, Beijing warns against 'Western' ideas

WENZHOU: When authorities in China's southeastern city of Wenzhou outlawed Sunday School earlier this year, Christian parents determined their children must still learn about Jesus and the Bible. Churches in Wenzhou started teaching children in private homes or at other venues. Some billed Sunday School classes as daycare, not education, or moved them to Saturdays, more than a dozen local Christians told Reuters.

Wenzhou, sometimes known as "China's Jerusalem" due

growing standoff between China's leadership and the country's devout over religious education for children. The ruling and officially atheist Communist Party has increased efforts to curb the influence of Christianity, tightening restrictions on faith classes and warning against the religion's "Western" ideas.

But Christians say the resolve of the community in Wenzhou suggests the party will struggle to exert

control over the next generation of the country's 60 million es and tear down the crosses that adorned them sparked Christians. In her house, "faith comes first, grades come second," said one parent surnamed Chen, asking not to use her full name due to the sensitivity of the matter. Immaculately turned out in a cream fur coat and wearing a giant turquoise ring, Chen is one of Wenzhou's numerous wealthy Christians who say their children must attend Bible classes because state education fails to provide sufficient moral and spiritual guidance.

"Drugs, porn, gambling and violence are serious problems among today's youth and video games are extremely seductive," she told Reuters. "We cannot be by his side all the time so only through faith can we make him understand (the right thing to do)." In some districts of Wenzhou, in Zhejiang province, an official edict has prohibited Sunday Schools since August, according to three sources with direct knowledge of the matter. The provinces of Zhejiang, Fujian, Jiangsu, Henan and the autonomous region of Inner Mongolia have barred children from faith activities including summer camp, Christian news site World Watch Monitor reported in September.

Sources spoken to by Reuters were unaware if the policy was a local government initiative or centrally mandated. They also did not know of any similar bans in other regions of China. Also in September, new rules were released expanding state oversight of religious education

nationwide in what officials say is an attempt to create a new generation of religious leaders loyal to the party. China's State Administration for Religious Affairs and the foreign affairs office of the Wenzhou city government did not reply to faxed requests for comment.

Explosion of belief

In Wenzhou, a small Christian community started by 19th century missionaries has bloomed to over one million Christians. an outcry from the Christian community and sowed mistrust of authorities among believers. The campaign came shortly after President Xi Jinping, who had been communist party chief of Zhejiang from 2002 to 2007, was appointed General Secretary of the party. But attempts to stem the rapid growth of believers has struggled in Wenzhou where churches, often funded by devout local business owners, are ubiquitous.

"Wenzhou government does not let churches register, because there are way too many, so there are lots of house churches and it is tough for the government to manage them," Zhao Gang, the minister at Wenzhou's Church of the Rose-tinted Clouds said. Sunday School textbooks have been especially sensitive in the clampdown in Wenzhou, teachers said. The government restricts religious publications, and churches often use translated texts from overseas. One teacher said classes resumed when they stopped using unsanctioned textbooks and avoided the words "Sunday School".

Freedom for all

Chinese law officially grants religious freedom for all, including children, but regulations on education and protection of minors also say religion cannot be used to hinder state education or to "coerce" children to believe.

Local governments in troubled areas of China, such as the far western region of Xinjiang, ban children attending religious events, but Christian communities elsewhere rarely face blanket restrictions. This year, the party has been unusually strict in warning university students, stateowned enterprise employees and officials themselves against celebrating Christmas, with admonitions such as to "resist the corrosion of Western religious culture", according to state media reports.

While parents in Wenzhou want to control their children's education, the government is working to create a new crop of religious leaders loyal to the party. Venezuela frees 80 opponents in rare goodwill gesture

CARACAS: Venezuelan authorities late Saturday began releasing some of those detained during demonstrations against President Nicolas Maduro's socialist government, a rare goodwill gesture to the opposition at the end of a politically torrid year. Delcy Rodriguez, the president of the assembly and head of its Truth Commission investigating the protests, said that Christmas was "a moment of reconciliation" as she announced the decision to release around 80 people. Among the first freed was Alfredo Ramos, mayor of the northwestern municipality of Iribarren, who was arrested late July and handed a 15 month sentence, and a dozen police officers from Chacao municipality, an opposition stronghold of Caracas.

State television showed image of Rodriguez meeting with the group. "You go back to jail for the medical check and then you go home to spend Christmas with your families," she said. "I feel happy for my freedom," Ramos told journalists upon his release. "It was a hard test, quite difficult." But he also lashed out at his sentence. "It was an arbitrary, unjust detention-I committed no crime," he added. Venezuela, whose oil reserves once made it the region's richest country, has been paralyzed in recent years by economic collapse and political conflict.

Opposition forces accuse Maduro of dismantling democratic institutions and setting up the Constituent Assembly to rubber-stamp his policies, with widespread protests breaking out this year. Supplies of food and medicine have become scarce, taking an ever-greater toll on

people's health, and hundreds of thousands of Venezuelans have chosen to emigrate. The fate of those imprisoned has been a subject of negotiations between the government and the opposition Democratic Unity Roundtable (MUD) in the Dominican Republic, as both sides seek a solution to the country's grave political and economic crisis.

A third round of talks is set for January 11 and 12. Earlier this week, Venezuelan opposition leaders asked Maduro to free "political prisoners"-whose numbers one non-governmental group has put at 268 - before Christmas as a gesture of good will. On Thursday, the regional trade bloc Mercosur also called for their release. The government has insisted that all are being held for acts of violence, conspiracy or treason, not as "political prisoners". Rodriguez said those affected were being held in both civilian and military prisons, and she suggested community service as an alternative to imprisonment. Some were detained in 2014 protests, and others this year. —AFP

MH17 families voice concerns over new discovery of remains

THE HAGUE: Relatives of those killed in the MH17 air disaster have called for greater respect for victims' remains fearing some may be "playing a game" after a new discovery of bones. Freelance journalist Patrick Lancaster revealed in a YouTube video on December 11 that he had found 52 bones and remains on the site of the 2014 crash in eastern Ukraine. His video shows him apparently excavating the remains from the snowcovered crash site in rebel-held territory. It comes after Lancaster maintained he had discovered remains in August and handed them over to local mayor, saying he was trying to do it "in the most professional way

And in January, Dutch police seized possible human remains from a Dutch journalist which he said he found on the sire. But Lancaster's latest find has puzzled relatives and the MH17 Foundation, who are calling for any outstanding remains to be handed over immediately to be identified and returned to the next-of-kin. "The circumstances of the findings are a little suspicious," Piet Ploeg, the chairman of the foundation said yesterday. The remains were found "exactly on the place where the

joint investigation team has excavated the soil, and sifted it. It can't be possible on that place that there are a lot of human remains."

'Disrespectful to victims'

"It is curious," he said, adding "it seems like someone withheld human remains to release them now and then, and get publicity about it". Malaysia Airlines flight MH17 from Amsterdam to Kuala Lumpur was shot down in July 2014 over war-torn Ukraine, killing all 298 people on board most of them Dutch. An international investigation concluded the plane was hit by a Russian-made BUK missile transported across the border into Ukraine from Russia and fired from territory held by separatists pro-Russia rebels.

Ploeg's 58-year-old brother, Alex, is one of only two victims who has not yet been identified, and fresh videoed reports of new finds are painful. "It's good when human remains return to the next-of-kin let's be clear about that. But playing games with them, is not good. That's bad behavior from the journalists," Ploeg said.

"It's disrespectful to the victims and very difficult to see for the next-of-kin," he added, calling for anyone with remains to "please handle them with respect and hand them to the authorities and don't use any publicity." Lancaster did not immediately reply to an AFP request for comment. Alex Ploeg died alongside his wife, Edith, and 18-year-old son Robert. His two daughters had not joined them on the holiday trip, and survived. We had a funeral with two coffins and one photo ... we didn't have a funeral for my brother as we can't say goodbye to his remains. That's very strange. It's very painful," Ploeg said.—AFP

A Christmas message to Mike Pence

Mr Vice President:

As you celebrate Christmas with your family and listen to the gospel story of the birth of Jesus, I hope you will read and reflect on the following piece I wrote a few years back. I want you to open your eyes to the situation facing Palestinian Christians and Muslims living in the Holy Land. And I want you to understand why the Arab Christian leadership in Palestine was so troubled by your blindness to their plight that they refused to meet with you.

Christmas: Then and Now

Two thousand years ago, Palestine was subject to a harsh occupation, much as it is today. In some ways, though, the conditions back then allowed the residents of occupied Palestine greater mobility than the current inhabitants of that land. As we are told in the bible story, Joseph had to take his expectant wife from Nazareth, where they were living, to Bethlehem, their ancestral village, in order to fulfill a requirement imposed by the authorities to register as part of a nationwide census. Today, of course, all of that would

be impossible.

In the first place no Palestinian originally from Bethlehem could ever have moved to Nazareth. The occupation and closure of the West Bank makes that sort of movement impossible. Furthermore, Israeli law prohibits an Arab from Nazareth from marrying a Bethlehemite and bringing their spouse across the Green Line to live with them in Israel.

Additionally, while thousands of Palestinians in Bethlehem, both Muslim and Christian, can see Jerusalem from their homes, they cannot go to the Holy City to pray. And Arab Christians from Jerusalem, likewise, can not easily go the Christmas services in Bethlehem to pray alongside their co-religionists at the seasonal event

Bethlehem of old was overcrowded and under siege. Today, as well, the city itself is being strangled, hemmed in by settlements that have confiscated the town's ancestral lands to make way for a 30 foot barrier wall and massive Jewish-only housing colonies that cut the Arab residents off from nearby Jerusalem. The constriction of growth and the lack of economic opportunity have forced Bethlehemites to flee in search of jobs and freedom, with tens of thousands of them and their descendants now living in the US and the Americas. They can return to visit Bethlehem with difficulty, but are not permitted by the occupation authorities to take up permanent residency in the town of their origins.

While the kings of old, we are told, were able to travel from afar bearing gifts to honor the newborn child, one can only imagine the difficulties they would encounter today dealing with Israeli soldiers at the Allenby Bridge. Having personally endured their interrogations, I can hear the kings answering hours of questions, such as "Where are you from?" "Who are your parents, grandparents?" "Why are you here?" Who are you visiting?" "What are these gifts for?" The questioning is reminiscent of Herod's interrogation of the biblical visitors. In today's Israel/Palestine, it is doubtful whether those hapless "kings from the East" would have gained entry.

That Joseph, Mary, and Jesus were able to flee to Egypt to escape Herod's vengeful wrath was possible back then. Today, that option is unlikely. The barrier/wall that encapsulates the West Bank, the hundreds of checkpoints, and the closure of Gaza would make such a life-saving flight impossible.

Finally, as I reflect on the birth of Jesus, I cannot help but think of the almost 400 babies who will be born, this very day, to Palestinian parents in the West Bank and Gaza. I think as well of the number of those who will perish at birth because of inadequate medical services (some babies have been put at fatal risk at checkpoints, because Israeli soldiers would not permit their delivering mothers to pass). And I think of Mary, 2,000 years ago, and am grateful that, despite all she endured, there were no checkpoints blocking her way to Bethlehem.

Our traditions tell us that Mary's joy at the birth of her son was tempered by foresight. She knew her child would grow and endure great suffering. Likewise, the joy that Palestinian parents experience when greeting new life these days must, no doubt, be accompanied by similar concerns. Not only must they question how they will provide for their new child, but they must face down their fears of bringing up a son or daughter under occupation, with its dangers and hardships. From the violence, pressures, and humiliation encountered daily by Palestinians in the West Bank at the hands of the Israeli military and settlers, to the grinding poverty and despair facing those trapped in Gaza, life under hostile foreign rule can drain joy out of even the most blessed events.

There is a traditional Christmas carol that asks the question "What child is this?" - the answer, of course, being "Jesus, the son of Mary". But given the universal message conveyed by the Christmas story we also understand that the child is for us, a reminder of our responsibility to care for the helpless and the unrecognized.

Bangkok struggles to keep canal slums dry

Rung, 63, fought a running battle against the rubbish and raw sewage besieging her old home in a wooden slum perched on stilts on the banks of Bangkok's Lat Phrao canal. "You could see and smell the daily flow of trash," recalled the tailor who goes by one name. "It would stop at the back of my house. I wanted a better life for my son and daughter." On Christmas Day last year, Rung moved into a brand-new, blue-painted house just yards from her old one in the Chao Phor Somboon community – part of the Thai capital's attempts to clear a waterway of illegal settlements that contributed to catastrophic floods in 2011.

that contributed to catastrophic floods in 2011.

Rung, who now pays just \$2 per month towards the \$6,000 construction cost of her new two-room home, is one of the successes of a project along the Lat Phrao canal launched almost two years ago, which is so far only about a third complete. The authorities have struggled to convince most slum dwellers to relocate, and are unlikely to meet the project deadline of June 2019, according to a senior official.

Delays to the canal rehabilitation, and the slow progress or abandonment of a flurry of other flood-prevention schemes announced after 2011 could result in a bigger flood disaster in the decades ahead unless urgent action is taken, experts warn. Besides causing damage worth \$46 billion, the floods six years ago affected more than 3 million of Bangkok's residents, mostly the poor, across 36 of the 50 districts that make up the sprawling megacity

Key causes of the flooding included subsidence, poor infrastructure, weak government coordination, and the blockage of vital waterways by littering and unregulated construction. The extensive canal and drainage network that once helped manage the flow of water in the Chao Phraya River has been largely filled in to accommodate the traffic that now clogs the capital's streets. And while efforts to better equip the city to handle flood waters have struggled to keep pace with a booming population, the threat from climate change has worsened, experts say.

"The wet places will become wetter, and the dry places will become drier," said Abhas Jha, a manager for urban development and disaster risk at the World Bank. "What we used to call a one-in-a-hundred-year event is happening more frequently."

Going Underground

Bangkok is a city that is slowly sinking. Built on a swampy plain, the so-called City of Angels has a land subsidence problem made worse by over-pumping of groundwater. Tapping underground wells was traditionally a way for people to access free water, and at one stage the city was sinking at a rate of 10 cm per year. In the late 1970s, the central government introduced and enforced a new law to help ban groundwater extraction.

The city is now sinking at a smaller rate of 2-3 cm per year - a success story that could be replicated in other cities, researchers said. But it still faces the threat of floods. Today, Bangkok receives just 3 billion-5 billion baht (\$92 million-\$153 million) per year from the central government to invest in new water management projects, officials said. As the monsoon season has become increasingly unpredictable, the Bangkok Metropolitan Administration Flood Control Centre has set up a flood

monitoring system across the city and an alert system that incorporates social media.

But the city needs to expand early warnings to ensure they do not ignore the poor and rural areas, urban experts said. "The problems are more complicated today," said Nambi Appadurai, head of strategy for the climate resilience practice at the World Resources Institute, referring to new construction and Bangkok's population growth. "I wouldn't be surprised to see flooding (like in 2011) happening again. Very little has been learned."

Master Plan

In an effort to avoid a repeat of the 2011 floods and improve residents' lives, in 2013 Bangkok joined 100 Resilient Cities, a network backed by The Rockefeller Foundation to help cities tackle modern-day shocks and stresses. Supachai Tantikom, Bangkok's chief resilience officer, published a strategy for the city earlier this year, with flooding a key focus. Supachai believes the Thai authorities should create a new 20-year master plan for flood defense in Bangkok's 50 districts and surrounding provinces, mapping out each area and making use of the

latest data. "We have flooding every year. This year we have had a few floods during the rainy season, lasting three to four hours ... it caused a lot inconvenience," he said. "Our infrastructure is not sufficient to drain the water." Supachai, previously an adviser to the governor of Bangkok, said Dutch experts had already started scoping out a plan, which would cost around Ä2 million (\$2.4 million). As in other Asian cities, a lack of coordination between local and central government authorities often makes river management difficult, said the World Bank's Jha.

A focus on hard infrastructure projects means people think cities can build their way to safety, he added. "Globally, we find that policymakers love concrete," he said, noting other measures can be simpler and more cost-effective. Green infrastructure projects that could help Bangkok include the protection of wetlands and the development of green roofing, permeable pavements and rainwater harvesting. Dual-purpose facilities - like car parks that double up as storage spaces for floodwater - are also a relatively cheap method of reducing risk.

'Infrastructure Deficit'

Bangkok, which became Thailand's capital in 1782, is now home to more than 10 million people. Rapid industrial growth over the past decade has attracted large flows of people from other parts of Thailand. This migration is set to continue, with the population expected to top 15 million by 2020. Previously, the city's water defense strategy focused on strengthening the giant flood wall encircling its center, and pumping out any excess water.

But as the capital keeps on growing, new approaches will be needed to protect all Bangkok's residents, officials said. Managing the water surrounding the city and longer-term investments are crucial for the city's future, according to urban experts. Rajiv Shah, president of The Rockefeller Foundation, a New York-based philanthropic organization that funds 100 Resilient Cities, said 70 percent of the network's projects in Asia relate to water - from providing clean drinking water to managing storm run-off.

"The huge deficit in infrastructure and infrastructure finance is going to hold back growth and well-being," he told the Thomson Reuters Foundation. "We see a whole new set of technologies and partners that can come together and do things." Back at the Lat Phrao canal, work grinds on to build new homes, reinforce the sides, and dredge the channel. Rung urged those still in slums by the water not to let stubbornness or pride stop them from moving into new homes. "I have no regrets about leaving. It is better and cleaner here," she said.— Reuters

Investor's best friend: China pet market sparks deals

Li Mingjie is a pet industry investor's dream. The 23-year-old e-commerce worker spares little expense to make his pooch happy. "I'll happily splash out on my dog," Li told Reuters as he walked his brown poodle Coco in Pingyang, a town on China's east coast. "She is like a child to me." He is far from alone in China these days. The growth in the middle class, a massive move to urbanization and other demographic changes - such as growing numbers of elderly, and people getting married and having children later than before - have been turning this into not just a pet-owning society but also one that is prepared to lavish money on them.

Chinese shoppers are set to spend 46.3 billion yuan (\$7 billion) on their pets by 2022, up from 17.5 billion yuan this year as the market grows at around an annual 20 percent, according to estimates from Euromonitor. The U.S. market may be much bigger with an estimated \$44.4 billion in sales this year but it is only growing around 2 percent a year. The surge in Chinese demand is not only great news for

global pet food behemoths such as Mars Inc and Nestle SA, but also rapidly growing Chinese pet food and product companies, as well as entrepreneurs setting up everything from dog salons for grooming to fancy pet hotels.

It is an amazing shift in a country where owning pets was once banned for being too much of a bourgeois pursuit under revolutionary leader Mao Zedong, and where - despite protests - there is still an annual dog-meat festival in the southern Chinese town of Yulin. "There is huge growth potential in the Chinese market," said Liu Yonghao, the chairman of Chinese company New Hope Group at a recent event in Beijing, noting that younger people especially were developing closer bonds with their pets. "They are willing to spend lots of money on the pets because they have become like part of the family," he said.

New Hope joined a consortium, including Singapore's state-owned fund Temasek and private equity firm Hosen Capital that just closed a \$1 billion deal to acquire Australian pet food maker Real Pet Food Co, with the aim of bringing the firm's brands to China. The growing popularity of pets is turning China into a magnet for local and global firms. Thomas Kwan, chief investment officer of Hong Kong-based fund manager Harvest Global, said China's pet market would be one of his personal picks for 2018 as consumers looked to shift up to premium products. The questions pet owners are asking now: "Can you buy them healthy foods? Can you give them a good lifestyle?" he said. —Reuters

Big strategies drive small plane deals

Airbus and Boeing are pairing with smaller regional rivals to add sales at the lower end of their \$100 billion-a-year commercial plane duopoly, but the two market leaders are also laying the foundation for a longer-term strategic contest against more powerful threats such as China. US planemaker Boeing Co and Brazil's Embraer SA said on Thursday they were discussing a "potential combination" widely assumed to focus on jetliners, confirming a report in the Wall Street Journal.

News of the talks comes just two months after Boeing's European archrival Airbus agreed to buy a majority stake in Bombardier Inc's 110 to 130-seat CSeries jet, the Canadian rival of Embraer's biggest E-Jets. "This seems initially to be about blunting the offering of the CSeries," said consultant Jerrold Lundquist, managing director of The Lundquist Group, one of the first industrywatchers to predict the move. "One of the things the CSeries brings to Airbus is the ability to offer a broader product line."

Both Embraer's E-Jets, which generally range between 70 and 130 seats, and to a greater extent Bombardier's CSeries, overlap at the margins of the big-airplane portfolios of Airbus and Boeing, but the products are mainly seen as complementary. Boeing and Airbus smaller planes start at around 125

seats. Such commercial tie-ups allow planemakers to offer package deals and expand opportunities for generating revenue and profit, a person familiar with the CSeries deal said.

Boeing now appears to be a convert to this approach after initially - at least in public - dismissing the deal between Airbus and Bombardier, several analysts said on Thursday. But the proposed alliances, neither of which is finalised, are not simply about tacking on revenue and cash flow, analysts and industry sources said. First, they could quickly lead to technical overlap. "If Boeing begins to collaborate with Embraer, you could imagine them creating commonality in the Boeing cockpit," Lundquist said. Others see similar benefits at Airbus.

More importantly, they broaden the battlefront for the next round of developments in 2030 and beyond: one in which Western jetmakers will be up against growing competition from China and Russia and could rely on their new partners to spread the risk.

Boeing and Embraer had already prepared just such a tryst in confidential talks over a decade ago. In October, Reuters reported that the template for a possible Boeing-Embraer response to the Airbus-Bombardier deal already existed in dormant plans for a new generation of single-aisle planes, for which there had been a previously unreported collaboration between Boeing and Brazil. Plans for an all-new plane were put on hold while Boeing and Airbus focused on engine makeovers for existing models, cashing in on fuel savings that were considered strong enough to hold off Chinese and Russian competitors for another 10 or 15 years. —Reuters

World's largest amphibious plane takes off in China

BEIJING: China's home-grown AG600, the world's largest amphibious aircraft in production, took to the skies yesterday for its maiden flight. The plane, codenamed "Kunlong" according to state news agency Xinhua, took off from the southern city of Zhuhai and landed after roughly an hour-long flight. With a wingspan of 38.8 m and powered by four turboprop engines, the aircraft is capable of carrying 50 people and can stay airborne for 12 hours. "Its successful maiden flight makes China among the world's few countries capable of developing a large amphibious aircraft," chief designer Huang Lingcai told Xinhua.

The amphibious aircraft has military applications but will be used for firefighting and marine rescue, with at least 17 orders placed so far with state-owned manufacturer Aviation Industry Corp of China, state media reported. While it is around the size of a Boeing 737, the AG600 is considerably smaller than billionaire Howard Hughes' flying boat, better known as the Spruce Goose, which had a wingspan of 97 m and a length of 67 m but only made one brief flight, in 1947.

The AG600's flight capabilities put all of China's island-building projects in the South China Sea well within range. "Its 4,500-km operational range and ability to land and take off from water makes it well-suited for deployment over China's artificial

islands," said James Char, a military analyst at Singapore's Nanyang Technological University. The aircraft can fly to the southernmost edge of China's territorial claims - the James Shoal - in just four hours from the southern city of Sanya, state-owned Global Times reported.

The shoal is also claimed by Taiwan and Malaysia, and is currently administered by Malaysia. The collection of submerged rocks lies roughly 80 km from Malaysia's coastline and about 1,800 km from the Chinese mainland. "The plane's capacity and maneuverability makes it ideal for transporting materiel to those maritime features that are too structurally fragile to support runways," Char said. Beijing's buildup in the South China Sea, through which some \$5 trillion in annual trade passes, is hotly contested by other nations.

The Philippines for many years was one of the region's strongest opponents of Chinese expansionism, and brought a complaint to a United Nations-backed tribunal. The panel ruled last year that China's territorial claims in the sea were without legal basis, but the Philippines has backed away from the dispute under its new president Rodrigo Duterte. The launch of the new amphibious aircraft further strengthens China's rapidly modernizing military.

Earlier this year, it launched its first domestically built aircraft carrier, the Type 001A. This complemented the



Liaoning, a second-hand Soviet carrier commissioned in 2012 after extensive refits. China's military expenditure in 2016 was an estimated \$215 billion, according to the Stockholm International Peace Research Institute, putting it in first place in Asia, well ahead of India (\$56 billion), Japan (\$46 billion) and South Korea (\$37 billion). — AFP

Johnson & Johnson has tested thousands of consumers about Tylenol pain relief and other over-the-counter products, showing them quick-fire images or words that connote a particular emotion. Responses are tracked to the tens of milliseconds, said Eric Dolan, associate director for global strategic insights at Johnson & Johnson. The insights can help determine "whether we want to dig in and reinforce those emotional spaces," or rethink the marketing to convey a different message, he said.

Tivity Health turned to many of these techniques for its "Silver Sneakers" fitness program for seniors, hiring Isobar to help it devise a marketing strategy based on a psycho-

logical profile of potential members. Isobar had more than 1,000 seniors review a series of rapidly presented images and words about exercise. Based on their clicks, the report showed the population most valued exercise because it made them feel empowered or "ready to go".

The finding was important as Tivity weighed potential marketing campaigns, including "Living Life Well," which featured images of age-defying seniors, such as a grandfatherly figure balancing a toddler on his back while doing push-ups. These ads performed better than an alternative campaign showing groups of smiling seniors together in swim class and in a gym which emphasized the social aspect of Silver Sneakers.

That campaign appeared to fall flat with seniors who view exercise as a means of staying independent, or who may be intimidated at the thought of immediately exercising in a group. The results countered Tivity's assumption that the social aspect of the program was the "key motivating driver for members," said Elizabeth Rula, who directs research for Tivity Health. "We were a bit surprised." — AFP

He said this project will improve performance and make it easy for companies, while boosting economic activity and reducing the number of people in offices. He revealed there will be a new security card instead of the sticker on the passport.

He said new fees will not be implemented on visit and residency permits without the approval of Deputy Premier and Interior Minister Sheikh Khalid Al-Jarrah Al-Sabah and the National Assembly. Maarafi said there are 2.753 million residents with valid residencies in the country, representing nearly 205 nationalities from around the world. He said Indians are on top with 925,000 residents, followed by 605,000 Egyptians, 257,000 Filipinos, 241,000 Bangladeshis, 144,000 Syrians, 107,000 Pakistanis and 93,000 Sri Lankans.

Maarafi said a new penalty for harboring iqama violators of KD 1,000 will have to be paid instantly if a joint committee of the interior, social affairs, municipality and commerce ministries catch an employer with a residency law violator working for him. He said that a meeting was held with the health and social affairs committee at the Assembly with regards to imposing health insurance on visitors. He said visit visa holders are not allowed to work, especially those on business visas, adding that

many such cases have been discovered and deported.

About the decision to increase the salary ceiling of those who want to bring their wives, children or other relatives on visit visas, he said strict measures are being implemented to prevent marginal laborers, beggars and those seeking treatment from arriving in the country, by studying the cases and ability of the applicants. He said parents' visits are linked to age and the maximum age limit is 60. As for ages above this, the cases are considered according to status and salary.

Maarafi said the salary ceiling for family visas will be raised from KD 250 to KD 450, while recommendations are made to the manpower authority to decide the maximum period of residency. He said no family visas will be granted to children without the presence of the father. He said the mother cannot sponsor her children except for rare specialties the country needs.

Meanwhile, Social Affairs and Labor Minister and State Minister for Economic Affairs Hind Al-Sabeeh told Al-Rai daily a plan to deal with the population imbalance has been in place for a while, and coordination is ongoing with ministries and government departments to implement it, adding "the response of government departments was positive, and soon results will be clearer".

She said the social affairs ministry is following the matter with government entities, which expressed strong belief that the imbalance exists and must be dealt with. Sabeeh said some departments have started to reduce the number of cleaning and security workers by 25 percent, adding other contracts must be waited out so to prevent any legal action.

When our firemen tried to enter they were pushed back by smoke and fire."

Mayor Duterte said she told the firefighters to retrieve all the dead, stressing: "you do not stop until you find 37". She also said the circumstances surrounding the fire would be investigated but added that it was too early to say who was at fault. Deadly blazes occur regularly in the Philippines, particularly in slum areas where there are virtually no fire safety standards. "It's possible that while they were working, they did not immediately notice the fire spreading," Davao police officer Ralph Canoy told AFP, referring to the call cen-

ter workers. Davao, with a population of about 1.5 million people, is the biggest city in the southern Philippines. It is about 1,000 km south of Manila, the nation's capital. President Duterte served as mayor of the city for more than two decades and continues to visit on weekends. His daughter succeeded him when he ran for president, with one of his sons winning the vice mayoralty post. Most of those killed by the recent tropical storm were also in the southern region of Mindanao.

There have also been horrific fires in bigger buildings and factories, where corruption and exploitation mean supposedly strict standards are often not enforced. In 2015, a fire tore through a footwear factory in Manila, killing 72. Survivors of that blaze blamed barred windows and other sweatshop conditions for trapping people inside the factory. In the deadliest fire in the Philippines in recent times, 162 people were killed in a huge blaze that gutted a Manila disco in 1996. — AFP


Fluery stops 26 shots to lead Knights to 3-0 win over Capitals

Breathless finish forecast for Sydney-Hobart race

SYDNEY: A close race could be in store for Australia's gruelling Sydney to Hobart bluewater classic, with unfavourable conditions near the finish set to work against the supermaxi favourites. There are 103 entries, including 28 from overseas, for the 73rd edition of the often brutal 628-nautical mile (1,163-kilometre) slog across the Tasman Sea, which leaves Sydney on December 26.

The weather forecast points to a fast race, ideal conditions for line honours favourite Comanche, one of four supermaxis in the hunt along with Wild Oats XI, BlackJack and InfoTrack. But the conditions could also see the frontrunners arrive in Hobart's notoriously breathless River Derwent at night.

"It doesn't look good for us in the river. We could spend a lot of time there," Comanche's navigator Stan Honey said. Ichi Ban's navigator Will Oxley quipped that "between 10pm and 10am is death in the Derwent".

The Bureau of Meteorology's state weather services chief Jane Golding said the race was likely to start in a moderate east or south-easterly breeze around 10 knots. "The winds will shift around to the north-east

during the afternoon, to around 15 knots," she added. The forecast, if it holds, means last year's record race time of 1 day 13hr 31min 20sec by Australian supermaxi Perpetual Loyal, now InfoTrack, was unlikely to be under threat. Wild Oats, an eight-time winner, is hoping to make it third time lucky after being forced to retire from the last two races.

It took a blow to its chances when the top of its 45metre (147-feet) high carbon fibre mast was struck by lightning last week, destroying some of its instruments, but is expected to be ready. "The goal is to be first, to finish," said Wild Oats skipper Mark Richards.

Medium-sized boats, which expect to arrive at the Derwent in the morning, would be in "red hot" competition for the overall win, Oxley suggested. "It will come down to boat handling and minimising damage," he said. "Everyone talks about how much fun it is to go downwind, but in 25 to 30 knots on a TP52 (Ichi Ban), that's a lot of wind on the eastern side of Bass Strait.



"So we will be working pretty hard to look after the boat to get through those conditions.'

NEW OWNERS

All the supermaxis this year are Australian owned, after Sydney's Jim Cooney purchased the 100-foot Comanche from American owner Jim Clark less than two weeks ago. Local media speculated he paid more than Aus\$10 million (US\$7.7 million) for the yacht.

"It's a once in a lifetime opportunity-too good to pass up," said Cooney, who is relishing the upcoming battle despite only having handled Comanche several times before the start of the race.

"This year competition is fierce, with the strongest line-up of supermaxis ever seen on one race," he said. "Depending on conditions, any of the 100 footers could

take line honours, it threatens to be one of the best races in the history of the event."

InfoTrack is also in the hands of a different owner,

Sydney software developer Christian Beck, a newcomer to ocean racing. "I've seen the start one hundred times but I've no idea what happens after that," he joked.

One a more serious note, he said that "if the weather is very windy like it was last year I think we have a realistic chance of taking back-to-back line honours". Last year's overall handicap winner, the Volvo 70 Giacomo, has been renamed Wizard, and is now under the ownership of American brothers David and Peter

It is tipped to again be a challenger for handicap honours-the vessel that performs best according to size. Line honours go to the fastest boat. — AFP

Chess federation says Israel excluded from Saudi-hosted match

ATHENS: Israeli players have been denied visas to participate in a speed chess championship hosted by Saudi Arabia this week, a vice president of the World Chess Federation (FIDE) said yesterday.

Seven Israeli players had requested visas for the tournament on Dec. 26-30. It would have marked the first time Saudi Arabia had publicly hosted Israelis as the Gulf state does not recognize Israel and there are no formal ties between them.

Israel Gelfer, vice president of FIDE, whose Secretariat is based in Athens, told Reuters in an email that visas for the Israeli players "have not been issued and will not be issued". He said the tournament would go ahead as planned. It was not immediately clear if other delegations had been excluded but players from Qatar had suggested they may have been rejected. Saudi Arabia's Center for International Communication said in a statement that more than 180 players would participate but did not immediately respond to a request for comment.

Israel Chess Federation Spokesman Lior Aizenberg said efforts were still being made "by various parties" to ensure the Israeli players took part. "The event is not a world championship if they prevent chess players from several countries from taking part," Aizenberg told Reuters

"Every chess player should have the right to participate in an event on the basis of professional criteria, regardless of their passports, their place of issue or the stamps they bear." Aizenberg said FIDE should ensure Israeli players could compete in international events and that the Israeli federation was considering all options, including legal action and holding an international competition in Israel for players excluded from the Saudi match. FIDE had said in November it was undertaking a "huge effort" to ensure all players were granted visas. —Reuters

Ashes gone, pride at stake for wounded England at MCG

Bairstow call teammates to rally behind under-fire skipper

MELBOURNE: England have lost paceman Craig blown away by big losses — 10 wickets in Brisbane, Overton and may make a further change as they try to restore some pride in tomorrow's fourth Melbourne Test after surrendering the Ashes to Australia. It's been a tour from hell for Joe Root's beleaguered team, succumbing to three heavy defeats which rendered the last two Tests in Melbourne and Sydney "dead rubbers."

Root has been in the eve of the storm over the tourists' underwhelming efforts, with former Australia captain Ricky Ponting deriding him as a "little boy" who has been a "bit soft" during the one-sided series. Several other under-performing senior players, notably Alastair Cook, Stuart Broad and Moeen Ali, have also been under the gun as some critics call for their axing.

Overton was ruled out on Sunday with a rib injury, with either Tom Curran or Mark Wood likely to replace him, while young leg-spinner Mason Crane is pushing for a Test debut.

England and Wales Cricket Board chief Tom Harrison typified the feelings inside the team when he said earlier in the week: "I don't think this is the moment for decisions.'

Wicketkeeper Jonny Bairstow has called on his teammates to rally behind their under-fire skipper. "We don't just owe him (Root), we owe

ourselves as well," Bairstow said. "We've got to go out there and try and win both of these Test matches.'

Talking is one thing, doing is another for England, who have had their moments in the series but have been 120 runs in Adelaide and an innings and 41 runs in Perth. Cook, who became the first Englishman to play 150 Tests during the series, has scored just 83 runs in six innings, while Root has two half-centuries but only a total of 176 runs at 29.33.

In comparison, Australia skipper Steve Smith is in cracking form and is coming off a Test-best 239 in the third Test. He is averaging 142 for the series. Smith's phenomenal form has him in rarefied company, occupying joint second position in the ICC's all-time rankings list along with England's Len Hutton and behind only the legendary Don Bradman.

Smith has a career average of 62.32 from 59 Tests, second only to Bradman's pinnacle 99.94. The Australian skipper is gunning for his fourth consecutive Melbourne Test century after hundreds against

Pakistan, the West Indies and India in the last three Boxing Day show-

There will be some respite for England, with Australian pace spearhead Mitchell Starc ruled out on Sunday with a bruised heel and replaced by Jackson Bird. But Smith has vowed no let-up in short-pitched bowling against England's tailen-

ders, despite claims the umpires should give the lower order more protection. "We obviously had a plan from the start of the series

that we were going to bowl a lot of short stuff to those

guys, much like we did back in 2013," Smith said in the past week. Australia have won half of the 56 Tests played at the vast MCG, although England won there in 1998 and 2010.

Cricket Australia chief executive James Sunderland said the Boxing Day crowd was likely to surpass the 91,112 that made Ashes history in 2013-14 even though England had already lost the series.

Selection challenge for South Africa against Zimbabwe

PORT ELIZABETH: Selection is likely to be South Africa's biggest challenge ahead of their one-off daynight Test against Zimbabwe, starting at St George's Park tomorrow. Zimbabwe are unlikely to stretch the home side but South Africa, ranked second in Test cricket, will want to establish their best XI in this fourday Test ahead of a three-match series against India, starting in Cape Town on January 5.

With the return of AB de Villiers and Dale Steyn after long absences from Test cricket, and with all South Africa's front-line fast bowlers fit for the first time in more than a year, coach Ottis Gibson described the selection issue as "a good nightmare"

"India are the number one team in the world at the moment and we know we need to be at our best if we are going to compete with them and beat them, which is our ultimate goal," said Gibson.

Six or seven batsmen? Three or four fast bowlers? A spin bowler? An all-rounder? These are all questions that will be troubling Gibson and his fellow

The situation is complicated by South Africa's unique racial balancing act, with Cricket South Africa committed to having an average of six players of colour, including two black Africans, in their starting teams. Three black Africans - batsman Temba Bavuma, all-rounder Andile Phehlukwayo and fast bowler Kagiso Rabada - played in South Africa's most recent Test matches, two one-sided encounters against Bangladesh. But with batsman De Villiers and fast bowlers Steyn, Vernon Philander and Morne Morkel back in the mix, only Rabada of the three seems guaranteed to start in what should be another lop-sided contest. Assuming captain Faf du Plessis is passed fit after recovering from shoulder surgery, it will be difficult to fit Bavuma into the batting line-up, while Phehlukwayo's medium-pace is unlikely to be required when there are four world-class fast bowlers

Zimbabwe had a disappointing warm-up when they were beaten by a largely unheralded Invitation team in Paarl, but they were able to gain some experience with a pink ball under floodlights.

It is the first day-night Test to be played in South Africa. When the hosts held their first practice under lights on Friday they found the ball helped the seam bowlers more at night than during the day, which has been a pattern in floodlit Tests elsewhere.

The floodlights at St George's Park were upgraded during the off-season. Only two Twenty20 matches have been played at the ground since then, with the team batting second winning on both occasions.

PORT ELIZABETH: South Africa talisman AB de Villiers has declared himself fit for the challenge of day-night test ahead of the one-off match against Zimbabwe at St George's Park from

It will be the first test appearance in almost two years for the 33-year-old, who had taken time off from the longer version of game while continuing to dominate bowlers in limited overs. "I pride myself in the fact that I can adapt to certain conditions and formats," he told reporters as the Proteas prepare for the first ever-four day match, also the first test to be played under lights in South Africa.

"I have worked hard on my game over the last six months. I started in July facing red balls at the University of Pretoria, getting some technical stuff sorted out, I feel more ready than ever to take it on. "I faced a few pink balls here

last night on a spicy wicket, it was really tough. Then again it's a great challenge, it's the ultimate form of the game, it's the greatest challenge to come out on top when the ball is moving around a bit."

De Villiers did not see much difference between the formats. "It's a mindset, a little tweak here and there. You have to have more patience with the red ball but you still have to play cricket strokes, it's not like you are playing rugby, it is still cricket.

"As long as you respect the conditions, sum up what is going on in a match situation, you can make it work." He allayed fears about the stiff lower back that kept him out of the three-day warmup match against Zimbabwe in Paarl and was looking forward to a fruitful outing.

"I want to contribute. I want to play knocks, have my say in the field with my experience and take some catches that can win games of cricket," he said. South Africa will host India to three tests in January before their four-test series against Australia in March and April.

"We would like to be number one in the world, we are not far away. We know if we win a few series in the next three months against tough opposition we can achieve that," de Villiers said.

"We will take it one step at a time, that will be nice to achieve, to be the number one team in the world and to maintain it for a few years." — Reuters



Giles slams immature England

LONDON: Ashley Giles admits he would have considered sending home some of England's players for bad behaviour during their Ashes tour of Australia. England's poor performances on the pitch, which have seen them lose the series ahead of the start of the fourth Test on Boxing Day, have been compounded by

Ben Duckett, who is not part of the full Ashes squad but was in Australia to play for England Lions, was given a suspension and a fine by the England and Wales Cricket Board for throwing a drink over vice-captain James Anderson. England star Jonny Bairstow was involved in a bizarre headbutt incident with Australia's Cameron Bancroft during a night out in Perth. Ben Stokes, an England all-rounder, is out of the international frame while waiting to discover whether he will be charged for an alleged late-night brawl before the Ashes tour in Bristol in September. Former spinner Giles, who played 54 Test matches for England and later worked as a national team selector, believes some of the current crop of players have lacked maturity.

"I think I would have been very tempted (to send some home)," Giles told BBC Radio 5 Live yesterday. "There comes a time when there's enough water gone under the bridge, a lot of it not very nice water, you have to make a stand and we're probably past that

"The whole thing sheds a bad light on England cricket but I think what we have to remember is these guys are extremely talented cricketers and they've got a great gift in what they do. "It doesn't make them extremely mature individuals. And there's work to do there. "If the maturity isn't there in the dressing room then they need quite strict guidelines and rules. "Over time, if you can't trust people to make correct decisions off the field, how can you trust them to make them on the field?" — AFP



England's injured paceman Overton out of fourth **Melbourne Test**

MELBOURNE: England paceman Craig Overton is out of the fourth Ashes Test against Australia with a fractured rib, officials said yesterday.

The England and Wales Cricket Board confirmed he would not play in the Melbourne Test, starting on Boxing Day. Uncapped fast bowler Tom Curran will reportedly make his debut to replace him, although fellow speedster Mark Wood has trained with the team this week.

Overton, who made his Test debut in Adelaide this month, was diagnosed with a cracked rib during the third Test in Perth. He was struck when batting in Adelaide and exacerbated the injury when he tumbled while attempting to take a catch off his own bowling in

It is a blow for England, with Overton one of their best players on a troubled tour in which the Ashes urn was surrendered before Christmas. "It's obviously quite sore...and not the most ideal thing to get," Overton told reporters last week.

"It just seemed like battling through the pain was in my nature. I've always been taught to fight through things and that's what I've had to do." Curran, a rightarmer from Surrey, was only added to England's Ashes squad when Steve Finn was ruled out at the start of the tour with a torn knee cartilage.

Born in South Africa, the 22-year-old played a one-day international and three T20s for England earlier this year. — AFP

Golden State Warriors' win streak snapped by Nuggets

Bucks missing Antetokounmpo, who sat out with soreness in his right knee

LOS ANGELES: The Denver Nuggets limited the Golden State Warriors to 3-for-27 on 3-point shooting Saturday, stunning the defending NBA champions 96-81 on the second night of back-to-backs for both teams. The loss ended the Warriors' 11-game winning streak on the eve of their showdown with the Cleveland Cavaliers on Christmas Day in a rematch of last season's NBA Finals. Coming off a tremendous defensive effort in a 102-85 win at Portland on Friday night, the Nuggets were even better less than 24 hours later. harassing Warriors stars Kevin Durant and Klay Thompson into a combined 12-for-38 shooting, including 1-for-15 on 3-pointers. Gary Harris led five players in double figures with 19 points for the Nuggets, who were thumped 127-108 at home by the Warriors earlier

this season when Golden State matched its season-high with 18 3pointers.

RAPTORS 102, 76ERS 86

DeMar DeRozan, who scored a career-best 45 points Thursday against the Philadelphia, came back with 29 points in the rematch. The Raptors have won six in a row

Mourinho lashes United after Leicester frustration





Ravens led 13-7 at the break. In Green Bay, the Minnesota Vikings' defense dominated the short-handed Packers. The Packers, with quarterback Aaron Rodgers on injured reserve, receiver Davante Adams inactive and receiver Jordy Nelson lost for the second half, simply lacked the horses to challenge the Vikings. Minnesota won for the 10th time in 11 games by knocking off the rival Packers 16-0 in a game played in sub-10 degree temperatures.

For the fourth time in their last six games, the Vikings (12-3) allowed fewer than 10 points. It was their first shutout victory since 1993. Harrison Smith's second interception of the night preserved the achievement.

Green Bay (7-8) was blanked for the second time this

season, also losing at home to Baltimore 23-0 on Nov. 19. Brett Hundley, making his eighth start for Rodgers, was ineffective, going 17 of 40 for 130 yards and two interceptions. Green Bay trailed 10-0 midway through the third quarter when it faced a fourth-and-7 from the Vikings' 36-yard line. Without Adams, who ranks second in the NFL with 10 touchdown catches but was out with a concussion suffered last week, and Nelson, who exited late in the second quarter with a shoulder injury, Hundley threw the ball to Michael Clark.

Clark, an undrafted free agent, recently was promoted from the practice squad. A former college basketball player, he played one year of football at Marshall. The ball was sailed over Clark's head. The Vikings tacked on a 20-yard field goal by Kai Forbath on the ensuing possession to extend the lead to 13-0. The key play on the drive came when Keenum ran toward the line of scrimmage, backpedaled and threw a short pass to tight end David Morgan, who broke three tackles for a gain of 23.—Reuters



US bond market flashes a warning sign

Could the 'curve' be a warning of US recession?

NEW YORK: The US economy may be basking in the warm glow of solid growth, but economists are nervously eyeing a trend in the bond market that could spell stormy weather ahead.

Even though President Donald Trump is touting unemployment at its lowest level in 17 years and Wall Street soaring to new heights, economists are worried about one indicator that is often a harbinger of recession: the yield curve. "Since 1950, each recession has been preceded by a reversal of the yield curve," said Christopher Low, chief economist of FTN Financial.

This closely scrutinized graph maps the difference in yield, or return on investment, of short- and long-term US Treasury debt, usually comparing two-year notes to 10-year bonds. Normally, the shorter the investment, the lower the yield, and conversely, the longer the investment, the higher the return, to offset the greater risks of losing access to funds for an extended period.

But for the past year, the yield curve has been flattening as the return on short-term debt has been getting close to long-term yields, possible signaling eroding confidence in the economy's performance in the coming years.

However, outgoing Fed Chair Janet Yellen downplayed those fears. "There are good reasons to think that the relationship between the slope of the yield curve and the business cycle may have changed," Yellen said in her press conference last week. FTN's Low said Yellen could be making the same mistake as her predecessors Alan Greenspan in 1998 and Ben Bernanke in 2006, who each saw recessions after the yield curve inverted. —AFP

Indonesia (43 percent), UAE/Saudi Arabia (36 percent) and Australia (34 percent) are the countries where firms are most likely to focus their long-term strategies on this, as well as companies in the Mining (42 percent), Utilities (38 percent) and Manufacturing (37 percent) sectors.

In the poll of more than 1,400 decision-makers across 14 countries, half (50 percent) recognize their customers are demanding products that consider environmental and social impacts. This can act as a competitive advantage. In fact, 59 percent of firms say that sustainable business practices will improve their growth and profitability.

Companies in the Manufacturing sector (72 percent) and in India (68 percent), Saudi Arabia (66 percent) and Canada (66 percent) are the most likely to recognize this commercial benefit. Almost a third (30 percent) of companies globally also believe that becoming a more sustainable business will contribute to improving their financial performance over the next three years.

To unlock further growth, more than a quarter (27 percent) of Middle Market Enterprise companies have prioritized investment to become more sustainable, with firms in Saudi Arabia (34 percent), Hong Kong (33 percent) and Australia (33 percent) the most likely to have done so. London-listed NMC in talks to run struggling Saudi hospital

DUBAI/KHOBAR: London-listed NMC Healthcare is in talks with the Riyadh government to take over the running of a struggling Saudi hospital, according to four sources familiar with the matter.

A deal for the Saad Specialist Hospital in Khobar, one of the top cancer treatment facilities in the Gulf, would be a rare instance of a foreign group operating a Saudi hospital.

It would be a test of Riyadh's plan to bring overseas investors into the healthcare sector under a reform drive, led by Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman, aimed at restructuring the kingdom's economy and reducing its dependence on oil revenue.

The Saudi health ministry has asked interested parties to submit bids for the operational license by the end of this month, said the sources who declined to be named as the discussions are confidential. UAE-based NMC is involved in the process and is considered a frontrunner to win the contract, they added. The 750-bed hospital is owned by Saad Group, a conglomerate owned by billionaire tycoon Maan al-Sanea which also operated the facility. But in recent weeks the government has stepped

in after the hospital become weighed down by financial problems, said the sources.

The hospital had effectively ceased operating - with the emergency room the last unit of the facility to close last month due to debts which meant it was unable to pay salaries or contractors, according to the sources. The government's intervention coincided with the detention of the Al-Sanea by Saudi authorities for unpaid debts, sources have previously told Reuters. NMC Healthcare and the Saudi health ministry were not immediately available to comment.

Saad Specialist is one of only two hospitals in the kingdom to have a cyclotron, used to help identify cancerous tumors. The ministry is keen to get it re-opened as quickly as possible.

It approached NMC and other healthcare companies a few weeks ago about taking over the running of the facility and conducted a site tour for potential bidders, which number around 10, according to the sources familiar with the matter. The sources did not name any other potential bidders.

'Vision 2030'

Saad Specialist Hospital, which Al-Sanea opened in 2001, gradually ground to a halt this year as staff began to leave, including doctors and nurses, because of non-payment of salaries, which in some cases dated back around one year, said the sources.

In addition, contractors began to stop maintaining the high-tech medical equipment because of lack of payment, the sources said. At the peak of his business success in 2007, al-Sanea was ranked by

Forbes as one of the world's 100 richest men, with his Saad Group owning interests in everything from banking to civil engineering.

But his empire has been embroiled in a high-profile debt dispute since 2009 spanning courts in London to the Cayman Islands, and Saudi authorities have recently begun liquidating some of his assets. Al-Sanea was detained in October in the kingdom's Eastern Province and he has been held in a civil detention center in Khobar, sources previously told Reuters. His detention was a few weeks before Prince Mohammed launched a corruption crackdown in which dozens of Saudi princes and businessmen are being held.

In an effort to get him released, Reemas Group, a financial consultancy hired by Saad Group, has outlined a proposed settlement covering \$4 billion in debt, sources previously told Reuters. Reuters was not able to determine whether the plan includes any provision to repay hospital staff or contractors. NMC Healthcare has \$800 million available to start investing in 2018 in the Gulf and other markets, its CEO Prasanth Manghat said this week. "We want to look at opportunities in Saudi Arabia," he said. "It is a very strong market and the reforms happening there will give the healthcare sector a lot of momentum."

The government is looking to bring in foreign investors to the healthcare sector as part of its "Vision 2030" plan. But progress has been slow. The health ministry has put on hold its tender seeking financial advisers for the privatization of 55 primary healthcare units in Riyadh, a financial source familiar with the matter told Reuters earlier this month. — Reuters

Dollar remains subdued despite passage of tax overhaul bill

Britain's economy forecast to slow down

KUWAIT: The US tax reform has been signed into law by President Donald Trump and the majority of alterations in the bill will take effect as of January the first 2018. The interesting issue is that the largest tax reform in US history in terms of size wasn't a market mover. It was evident that the tax factor was already priced in over the course of the year. Lately, the market's tone toward the benefits of the tax cut has been subdued, as they expect the positive effects to be overshadowed by higher interest rates stemming from the enhanced government deficits. The tax reform will cost roughly \$1.5 trillion over the next 10 years. The US central bank predicts a "modest lift" to economic growth from the tax modification and that's why the FED increased the growth forecast to 2.5 percent for 2018 from 2.2 percent, afterwards they expect growth to slip back closer to its recent 2 percent average.

In Catalonia, the pro-independence parties won the regional election and retained their majority in the parliament. The separatists' parties won 70 of the 135 seats, while the pro-Spain parties won 57 seats. The results of the election may cause tensions to re-emerge between Madrid and the pro-independence faction eager to exploit the tactical advantage of a favorable election outcome. The overall impact of the vote on the single currency was minimal and Catalonia may find it difficult to develop into an independent state if no other country recognizes its sovereignty. It won't even be able to have its own currency under such circumstances. The EU mostly likely won't support a pro-independent state, especially during ongoing negotiations with the UK. The pro-separatist parties are somewhat divided and the previous independence declaration created tensions between the parties over policy direction.

On the currency front, the dollar index was pressured downwards at the start of the week as markets awaited the outcome of the vote from Congress. The downward direction persisted as the euro's strength took its toll on the greenback and final US GDP reading came in lower than expected. Despite positive news from the tax reform and higher US yields the DXY failed to gain support. The Dollar was the second weakest major currency last week after the Japanese ven and lost 0.55 percent of its value.

As for the single currency, the euro took advantage of the dollar's weakness last Monday and received a boost after inflation moved in the right direction.

The EUR/USD gained momentum throughout the week, until the election results from Catalonia came out. The pair opened the week at 1.1751 and closed on Friday 1.1857. The pound sterling's direction last week was influenced by the majors as it was a light week in terms of economic data. The sterling appreciated sharply at the first day of the week before entering into a

consolidative tone, which persisted until Friday. The safe haven ven was the worst performing major currency last week, pressured by powerful rally in treasury US yields.

The dollar hit a nine-day high against the yen on Thursday, after comments by Governor Haruhiko Kuroda reinforced expectations that the BOJ was in no hurry to move away from its ultra-loose monetary policy. The dollar was supported against the yen after the 10-year yield jumped to a nine-month high as investors worried the tax refurbishment could lead to higher US debt. The US dollar gained 0.53 percent over the yen throughout the week.

In the commodities complex, the price of oil edged higher on Monday, supported by a North Sea pipeline outage and a Nigerian oil worker strike. Moreover, the upward trend continued after US crude oil inventories declined by 5.222 million barrels last week, according to data from the American Petroleum Institute, compared to an expected draw of 3.518 million barrels. Brent crude oil closed the on Friday at \$64.95.

US gross domestic product

The final value of all goods and services produced in the third quarter edged lower to 3.2 percent annually, from an earlier estimate of 3.3 percent.

The slight downward movement is attributed to weaker trade and consumer spending. Personal consumption, which makes the biggest contribution to the economy's growth, was revised down to a 2.2 percent from .3 percent. Although, this doesn't change the fact that it was the first time since 2014 that the economy enjoyed growth of 3 percent or more for two consecutive quarters. The Federal Reserve lately enlarged its calculation for growth next year to 2.5 percent from 2.2 percent in expectation of a tax change.

Economic figures ranging from the labor market to the housing sector as well as other reports, suggested the economy maintained its solid momentum into the fourth quarter. Looking forward, markets expect a modest boost for the next two years due to changes in the tax model and a pickup in the global economy. In spite of the latest tax amendment, several economists predict a moderate boost to the economy as tax cuts for individuals is skewed towards higherincome households. Several economists believe the lower tax regime will lead to share buybacks and debt repayment rather than a boost in business investment

Housing sector

Last month's gains in new home constructions are inspiring, as they are motivated by single-family home building, which tends to increase economic activity and jobs in a bigger way than apartment construction. Single-family licenses have risen for three consecutive months, suggesting a sustained pipeline of work for developers. The recent data increases the probability that residential construction spending, which negatively impacted Q2 and Q3, will add to the pace of growth in the last quarter of 2017. In details, housing starts rose 3.3 percent to an annualized rate of 1.3 million from 1.29 million seen in October. The latest rate indicates the data is the highest level since October 2016.

Looking at building permits, an indicator of future construction, dipped 1.4 percent to a rate of 1.298 million. The decline is attributed to a fall of 6.4 percent in permits for the construction of multi-family homes. In conclusion, confidence

among home builders is at 18 years high, with relatively low mortgage rates. The average rate on 30-year fixed US mortgages is lower by 0.23 percent than a year earlier. The figures reflect a boost from rebuilding and recovery efforts following hurricanes Harvey and Irma after areas in the South had faced the brunt of the damage from flooding and winds.

Europe & UK

Morale in German businesses drifted lower this month, over the shape of the new government as Chancellor Angela Merkel struggles to form a firm government. Merkel's party lost supporters to the far right in September's election and her attempt to form a three-way alliance failed last month. After recording an all-time high in November, Ifo business climate index contracted 0.4 points to 117.2, pressured by attitudes toward business prospects over the next six months. Despite the drop in the German Ifo Business Confidence, the present conditions index improved to 125.4 from 124.5 last month.

Overall, the Ifo climate index remains near record highs, while growth projection by the government and Bundesbank have been upgraded.

Inflation edges up in Europe

Consumer inflation in the eurozone slightly increased 0.1 percent in November to 1.5 percent y/y, while the core rate remained stagnant at 0.9 percent. The main contributor that supported the rise in headline inflation was oil prices. German inflation rose back to September's level of 1.8 percent annually, having dropped to 1.5 percent in October. The highest annual rates were recorded in Estonia (4.5 percent), Lithuania (4.2 percent) and the United Kingdom (3.1 percent).

The European Central Bank expects consumer price growth to dip before slowly picking up again and to float around the 1.5 percent level until 2020, when it rises to 1.7 percent. The Bank enhanced its growth prospect for 2018 from 1.8

> percent to 2.3 percent. Overall, economic indicators are at multi-year highs suggesting the robust momentum will likely

UK's economy

The final calculation of Q3 growth in the United Kingdom revealed that British consumers financed their expenditures by saving less. The saving ratio fell to 5.2 percent from 5.7 percent seen in the second quarter mainly due to consumer prices exceeding wage growth. Households have now been net borrowers for four successive quarters for the first time since records began in 1987.

In details, the economy grew 0.4 percent in Q3, taking the annual rate up to 1.7 percent from an earlier estimate of 1.5 percent. But despite being revised higher, that's still the lowest annual growth in over 4 years. In regards to the IMF, they predict the economy to slow down further next year to 1.5 percent.

The Recruitment and Employment Confederation claimed that fewer UK employers plan to hire extra staff next year on the back of a gloomy outlook. The REC survey revealed the net balance of companies planning to add permanent staff in the next 12 months fell to 16 percent in November from 24 percent a year ago. No companies in the survey said they expect the British economy to improve in 2018.

Asia: No exit in sight

In his last monetary meeting of the year, BoJ Governor Kuroda poured cold water on speculation that the central bank is gunning up to tighten its monetary stance. The Governor

claimed "just because I brought up this academic analysis, reversal rate, doesn't mean at all that we need to review or change the yield curve control we've adopted since September last year. The Japanese economy is in great shape in terms of growth, job creation and price expansion is at least moving in the right direction.

The BoI's tone lately indicates confidence in the strength of the economic recovery as the economy expanded at an annualized 2.5 percent in Q3 2017, to mark a seventh straight quarter of growth. Inflation is still far away from the 2 percent level and there isn't much pressure on Kuroda to elevate rates by the government after he has been called to parliament only 19 days this year. That's down from 51 days last year and is the fewest for any BOJ governor since 2007. The overall data supports the case that the central bank will maintain its negative interest rate model until price growth lands towards the 2 percent target.

In details, the BOJ hasn't amended its monetary policy since September 2016, when it employed its yield-curve control program, setting an interest rate of -0.1 percent on some bank reserves and a target of around 0 percent for 10-year government bond yields.

RBA's monetary policy

The Reserve Bank of Australia's meeting report was released last week after maintaining its cash rate at 1.5 percent on December the 5th. The RBA has restrained itself from tightening monetary policy for the last seven years. As for the labor market, the environment remained positive as overall growth in employment has increased slightly and full-time employment is growing at its fastest pace in a decade. The unemployment is currently at 5.4 percent, the lowest since 2013.

The RBA cautioned that the outlook for household consumption continued to be a significant risk due to a modest rise in wages, while household debt levels were extremely high. Household consumption rose 0.1 percent in the three months through September, its weakest pace in five years. The Board judged that retaining the stance of monetary policy at this meeting would be consistent with sustainable growth in the economy and achieving the inflation target over time. In regards to expectations, interbank futures and financial market prices indicate that the cash rate is expected to remain unchanged for the time being.

'Virtual gold' may glitter, but mining it can be really dirty

PARIS: As the poster child for the growing ranks of computer-generated currencies, bitcoin's recent stratospheric price rises have propelled it from the chat forum-hosted depths of nerddom into the global consciousness. As it rose from under \$1,000 to over \$19,500 at one point this year, hordes of techsavvy punters have rushed in to buy, while any investors can now do the same on the US futures markets.

Bitcoin has been called virtual gold, in part because it is created in a process that insiders call mining. And like real mining, it can be dirty. That's because joining the online gold rush to mine the coins that are streams of computer code requires high-powered rigs that consume considerable amounts of electricity to do the virtual equivalent of blasting through rock by solving a string of highly complex computer algorithms. Depending on how the electricity used for mining is generated, the virtual currency can have a very real impact by adding pollutants into the air and contributing to global warming.

Out of the bedroom

What barely five years ago was a hobby for "bedroom miners" has mushroomed into a massive, but unregulated, industry that some observers fear is a bubble waiting to explode, potentially causing damage similar to the subprime mortgages fiasco that caused the global economic crisis a decade ago.

Mining involves "adding value by dedicating computational resources to verify transactions in a huge public ledger called a 'blockchain'," explained Julian Oliver, a New Zealander who uses wind power to mine ZCash-a bitcoin cousin. The miners are thus providing the computer resources for their currency's trading system to operate.

But the number-crunching to pocket coins requires ever more powerful hardware and the means to keep them running, Oliver told AFP. "At current bitcoin prices things are looking good for miners," he said. "But it's a huge use of energy, whatever the profit margins (and is)

not remotely sustainable. Specialist studies estimate the total annual



energy output of the hundreds of thousands

of dedicated mining machines worldwide at 35 terawatt hours, according to the Digiconomist website-some 25 percent up on last year. That puts it on the level of energy consumption of

Each transaction consumes roughly 100 kWh-the equivalent of running a lightbulb for three months. By contrast, a credit card transaction uses about 0.2 kWh. But focusing on the electricity consumption of cryptocurrency mining "ought not to overshadow pre-existing environmental costs of the traditional financial system," said Oliver, as "cash needs to be printed and transported and banks run off the back of data centres."

Cleaning up

Nadine Damblon, chief executive of HydroMiner, which uses hydroelectric power to mine in the Austrian Alps, said there is a need for greater use of renewables in the industry as Asian miners often rely on coalgenerated electricity. Hydroelectric can play a leading role as "one of the most environmentally friendly ways to generate power," she said. Damblon believes the market will help solve the problem. "I think in the case of bitcoin mining the capital will flow into more efficient hardware that will need less energy," said Damblon. The scale of the long-term environmental threat that mining poses is unclear, as is the degree to which it could act as a catalyst for greater take-up of renewables.In its Global Cryptocurrency Benchmarking Study, the Cambridge Centre of Alternative Finance found that nearly threequarters of all major mining zones are in China and the United States. But the likes of Iceland

and Austria are gaining ground. Not only do they offer clean hydroelectric power, but also cold temperatures that help save on cooling computer equipment, which can account for up to a third of energy needs.

What is undeniable, said the report, is that "the mining sector has evolved in a short time from a hobby activity performed on personal computers into a professional and capitalintensive industry with its own value chain."

As for how many bitcoin mines or miners there are now, nobody really knows.

Green vs anarchist

In terms of large-scale mines "there are perhaps about a hundred," said French information technology specialist Marc Bevand. "Maybe (there are) a few thousand smaller ones" using "one or two racks" of machines rather than the tens of thousands in the largest Asian mines, San Franciscobased Bevand told AFP.

The push for scale to save on energy costs and go green also risks pushing bitcoin against its libertarian, or even anarchist, founding philosophy. Bitcoin was created to not only allow secure and anonymous transactions, but for the system to be controlled by users and not by a government or corporation.

The push for scale "would concentrate number-crunching power in the hands of the richest or throw into question bitcoin's (decentralised) philosophy," said Teunis Brosens, a senior economist with ING bank. He forecasts that eventually "banks will create private blockchains which will not face the problems of scale or regulation" which bitcoin is coming up against. — AFP

Poland in the EU: Challenging times for a dream come true

WARSAW: Poland's entry into the European Union in 2004 was a dream come true just 15 years after it shed communism, but today its rightwing government is posing an unprecedented challenge to the authority of Brussels in enforcing democratic standards, including the rule of law. Poles are overwhelmingly EU-enthusiastic, with nearly 90 percent backing membership of the bloc that has given the country billions of euros in subsidies, turbo-charging its economic development.

But tensions came to a head this week as the EU launched unprecedented disciplinary proceedings over Warsaw's judicial reforms, which Brussels insists threaten democracy by putting the courts under government control. Warsaw insists the reforms are necessary to root out the last vestiges of communism from the justice system. But Brussels contends that 13 laws adopted by Poland in the space of two years have created a situation where the government "can systematically politically interfere with the composition, powers, the administration and the functioning" of judicial authorities.

The EU's censure could ultimately lead to Poland losing its voting rights in the bloc. Poland dismissed the EU's decision as being "political" while its president, Andrzej Duda, defiantly signed into law two hotly contested judicial reforms just hours after the censure process was launched. He also accused Brussels of lies and hypocrisy for pushing ahead with the discipli-

Clashing ideologies

While agreeing to dialogue with the European Commission, Warsaw has also made it clear that it has no intention of budging on its reforms. Its boldness is likely rooted in the backing it enjoys from fellow EU rebel Hungary. Budapest has promised to torpedo any pos-

sible sanctions against Poland, which require the unanimous agreement of all other EU members.

Warsaw-based political scientist Kazimierz Kik believes the current conflict is rooted in ideological differences between Poland's rightwing populist and nationalist Law and Justice (PiS) party government and the liberal elites that dominate the EU. Poland "is not in conflict with the European Union, but with its neo-liberal elites, Christian Democrats and Social Democrats, who comprise the majority in the European Parliament and the Commission," Kik, who identifies himself as a leftist PiS supporter, told AFP. For him, Poland's clash with Brussels also reflects the tensions between the PiS administration and its political arch-rival the liberal Civic Platform opposition, whose former leader Donald Tusk became EU president in 2014 after serving eight years as the Polish prime minister.

Social gapsBy developing Poland's social welfare system-including a new child allowance and introducing a lower retirement age-the PiS has cast itself as the party working in the interest of poorer Poles, Kik told AFP. PiS voters feel they did not benefit enough from the transition to democracy and the market economy or EU entry. The popular discontent in Poland is part of a larger European and global trend says Kik, pointing to similar socio-economic factors that led to last year's pro-Brexit vote in Britain and the presidential victory of Donald Trump in the United States. The conservative and nationalist views of the PiS government and its supporters on issues ranging from refugees to abortion, are diametrically opposed to those held by liberal elites in western parts of the EU.

According to left-leaning Polish sociologist Slawomir Sierakowski, powerful PiS party leader Jaroslaw Kaczynski "is not hostile towards the EU, but he feels it is getting in the way of the political vision he wants to implement in Poland." Sierakowski also believes the conflict between Warsaw and Brussels is rooted in the conservative mentality of Catholic Poles and the lack of democratic traditions in Poland.

Its turbulent history of foreign domination and war "wasn't an ideal context for the birth of a liberal democracy," Sierakowski said.

Poles are also very attached to the idea of national sovereignty and reject the notion of "Brussels replacing Moscow" in calling the shots for Warsaw, he adds. According to Igor Janke, head of the Warsaw-based Freedom Institute conservative think-tank, the timing of President Duda's signing of the two PiS judicial reforms into law straight after the EU launched its disciplinary action was intended to "demonstrate that there is no turning back". But Janke says PiS leaders do hope to restore normal ties with the European Commission. He quotes a recent policy speech by new PiS Prime Minister Mateusz Morawiecki, a capable ex-banker seen as someone who can mend ties with Brussels. "Dear Europe, the Polish piece fits perfectly in the European puzzle but it should not be placed the wrong way or shoved in by force," Morawiecki told parliament ahead of a confidence vote that he won last week. — AFP

2017's lumps of coal could be 2018's diamonds

SAN FRANCISCO: Investors saddled in 2017 with the market's worst performers, including Under Armour and General Electric, may do well to remember as December draws to an end that lumps of coal sometimes turn into diamonds. As investment advisors rebalance clients' portfolios in the final weeks of the year, the instinct to dump stocks that have been left behind in surging markets - or that fall out of favor with analysts - can be selfdestructive.

With the S&P 500's rally pushing


own technology and other high-growth stocks may attract bargain-hunting investors heading into 2017. "A contrarian strategy of buying beaten-up names might have a good year," said Tim Ghriskey, chief investment officer of Solaris Group in Bedford Hills, New York. Ghriskey in recent months bought shares of General Electric, which has slumped 45 percent this year as it struggles with a shift from coal and gas to renewable energy. He believes the 125-year-old conglomerate will claw its way back to growth, or might be split into

2016 roared back to life in 2017, including Vertex Pharmaceuticals and medical device maker Illumina. Those two companies this year have rebounded 69 percent or more. As he rebalances clients' portfolios this month, Jake Dollarhide, head of Longbow Asset Management in Tulsa, Oklahoma, is investing more in Kroger Co and other supermarkets that took a beating after Amazon.com said in June it was buying Whole Food Markets. Kroger has lost 20 percent year to date and it recently traded at 14 times expected earnings, compared to its five-year average of 27.

Kroger has the footprint to not even notice that Amazon is around," Dollarhide said.

Investors following the Dogs of the Dow investment strategy each year buy components of the Dow Jones Industrial Average with the highest dividend yield, betting that those stocks have been oversold. Currently, those companies include Verizon Communications, International Business Machines and Exxon Mobil, all with dividend yields of 3.7 percent or more. Those three stocks were also Dogs of the Dow at the start of this year, and they have underperformed. But an investor following that strategy last December also would have bought Boeing, which has nearly doubled in 2017, Caterpillar, which is up 64 percent, and Cisco Systems, which has risen 28 percent.

In the past 12 months, however, it has surged back with a 25 percent rally. Due partly to increased competition from Nike, Under Armour has slumped 48 percent year to date, making it the S&P 500's thirdworst-performing stock. Last January, most analysts recommended buying Under Armour's shares and none recommended selling. Now, most analysts are neutral on the

Thirsty rocks may contain the missing water of Mars

Researchers put scientific modeling to the test

PARIS: What happened to all the water that once sloshed in lakes and oceans on Mars? Much of it, researchers proposed Wednesday, may be locked up in stone. Previous studies had concluded that the water was swept into space by powerful solar winds when the planet's magnetic field collapsed, while some was captured in sub-surface ice. But this did not account for all the missing water.

To try to track down the rest, an international team of researchers put scientific modeling to the test. "The results revealed that the basalt rocks on Mars can hold approximately 25 percent more water than those on Earth, and as a result drew the water from the Martian surface into its interior," said a statement from Oxford University, where scientists took part in the study.

As on Earth, chemical weathering and hydrothermal reactions can change minerals in rock from dry to water-bearing, study coauthor Jon Wade of Oxford said. But Martian rock, because of a different composition, is much better at doing so. Such rocks would have reacted with the surface water on Mars, locking some of it up in their mineral structure, Wade said in an email.

"It is not liquid anymore but physically bound in the mineral," he said-which means the only way to release the water would be to melt the rock. On an infant Earth, water-bearing rocks formed in a similar way would have floated on the planet's super-hot surface until

MIAMI: The world's first-ever detection of two faraway neutron stars colliding, causing a massive blast that rippled through the fabric of space and time, was judged the scientific breakthrough of 2017, the journal Science said

Hide holiday chocolate from your dog: Experts

PARIS: While Christmas may be a time of sweet indulgence for humans, for dogs it is a period of heightened risk of chocolate poisoning, experts warned on Thursday. With edible tree decorations, sweet-laden advent calendars and gift boxes aplenty, chocolate becomes "more accessible" meaning dog owners must be extra vigilant, a University of Liverpool research team said.

When eaten by dogs, chocolate in small doses can cause vomiting or diarrhea, and in large quantities it can lead to muscle tremors, seizures, an irregular heartbeat, internal bleeding or even heart attacks. It is responsible for about a quarter of all acute canine intoxication cases. "Chocolate ingestion has a unique seasonal pattern which merits highlighting this risk," the researchers wrote in the Vet Record journal after scrutinizing five years worth data on chocolate poisoning from 229 British veterinary practices. Such cases increase fourfold over Christmas compared to the rest of the vear, they found, while at Easter it was double. Young dogs were more likely to eat chocolate than older ones. "Sources of chocolate included bars and boxes (often gift selections) of chocolate, Easter eggs, chocolate cake, liqueurs, chocolate rabbits, Santa Claus figurines, advent calendars, and Christmas tree decorations," the research team wrote. There was "one case involving a hot chocolate drink."

A garden of eggs

Reported doses were mostly small, except in one case involving "a garden of Easter eggs hidden for a large party of children," the team found. None of the cases were life-threatening. For dogs, the toxic element in chocolate is theobromine, with pet food maker Hills explaining on its website that while humans easily metabolise the substance, dogs process it much more slowly, "allowing it to build up to toxic levels in their system."

Darker chocolate contains more of the substance, and less than an ounce (28 grams) of dark chocolate is enough to poison a 22 kilogram dog. "If you are worried or suspect that your dog may have eaten a large quantity of chocolate... call your veterinarian immediately," the company advises. Chocolate is bad for cats too, but they are less likely to eat it. Unlike other mammals, they do not taste sweetness. —AFP







Gnarls Barkley to drop new album

new Gnarls Barkley album is on the way. The American soul duo comprised of CeeLo Green and Danger Mouse - have completed a good chunk of their first album in nine years. In an interview with DJ Booth magazine, CeeLo shared: "We have already started on a new [Gnarls Barkley] album. "We're halfway in and we have some overtures from the other projects that may not have stood the test of time, we don't know yet." Speaking about the little time they've had to work on the songs, the 43year-old songwriter explained: "That's pretty much all the time we had to do 'St Elsewhere' because we were heating up around that time. The 39-year-old producer - whose real name is Brian Joseph Burton - was all set to meet up with his CeeLo to set the ball rolling to make their musical comeback on January 20, the day the US Republican was voted in. However, their plans fell apart as Danger Mouse watched the events unfold on TV. He said at the time: "The last time we saw each other was the day before the election in Los Angeles. "And we were supposed to meet the next day and I was like, 'this thing will be over with by seven West Coast time. I'll see you around eight or nine or something.' I was drinking heavily on a couch by myself staring at the TV at that time. I don't even know where he was." The pair collaborated on the 2006 album 'St Elsewhere' as well as 2008's 'The Odd Couple' and although CeeLo was busy working on solo material and 'The Voice' while Danger Mouse was producing music for artists including A\$AP Rocky, CeeLo said in 2015, he was keen for them to make another record. Asked if he'd spoken to Danger Mouse at the time, he said: "I just talked to him last night. I told him, 'This is the next thing we should do'. I know he's about to do the Red Hot Chili Peppers' album. I hope he does great with that, but I said, 'Hey, I need you to be able to split your attention. We need another Gnarls album, and so do the people.'




Payne and Ora to release For You for Fifty Shades Freed

Efron happy to be a musical guy Renner up for Hawkeye standalone movie




ac Efron is happy to be known as a "musical guy". The 30-year-old actor shot to fame in the 'High School Musical' franchise as well as starring in the movie adaptation of 'Hairspray' but although Efron loves the superhero genre, he admitted he is a "different kind of guy". When asked if he is eyeing a role in a superhero movie, Efron told Collider: "Not yet. In the superhero world, I think you got to earn those suits so to speak. I'm happy to be in musicals. I'm the musical guy. "I'm a different kind of guy. There's no suits or masks involved and I'm not fighting crime but we are flying around and we are telling people really important messages and being brave." Efron is currently starring alongside Hugh Jackman, 49, and Zendaya, 21, in Michael Gracey's new musical movie 'The Greatest Showman'. The film tells the story of P.T. Barnum - an American showman, politician, and businessman remembered for promoting celebrated hoaxes and for founding the Barnum & Bailey Circus - who rose from nothing to create a spectacle that became a worldwide sensation. Jackman stars as the ring master and recently revealed he went against doctor's orders to sing at his audition - just a day after he underwent a skin cancer operation on his nose. He said: "I thought there's about a one in 10 chance this movie happens. But we're going for it. My doctor had said, 'Do not sing, you've just had 80 stitches in your nose. They really could split apart, you could get an infection', which I'd had before in a similar operation. "So I was like, 'Don't worry I'm not going to risk that, I'm just going to speak it and someone else will sing it.' But the emotion of the song and the moment took over me.'



eremy Renner is up for a Hawkeye standalone movie but wants to do it sooner rather than later. The 46-year-old actor has portrayed master archer Clint Barton aka Hawkeye in three Marvel Cinematic Universe movies so far - as well as a brief cameo in 'Thor' - and is set to reprise the role in 'Avengers: Infinity War' and 'Avengers 4'. As one of the few Avengers without a standalone movie, Renner has admitted he's keen to take title billing but he doesn't want to do it in "50s in tights". Speaking to South China Morning Post newspaper, Renner said: "It would be a wonderful thing. Just don't wait too long! I don't want to be in my 50s in tights." 'Avengers: Infinity War' will see the hero squad - Iron Man (Robert Downey Jr.), Captain America (Chris Evans), Thor (Chris Hemsworth), The Hulk (Mark Ruffalo), Scarlet Witch (Elizabeth Olsen), Vision (Paul Bettany), Black Widow (Scarlett Johansson) and Hawkeye (Renner) - join forces with the Guardians of the Galaxy to save the Earth. The two teams will have to work together to fight intergalactic tyrant Thanos, with some help from newcomers Spider-Man (Tom Holland), Black Panther (Chadwick Boseman) and the screen debut of Captain Marvel (Brie Larson). Although a standalone Hawkeye movie hasn't been announced yet, Marvel Studios boss Kevin Feige confirmed there will be 20 more films in the MCU. In an interview with Vanity Fair, Feige said: "Marvel is 22 movies in and we've got another 20 movies on the docket that are completely different from anything that's come before - intentionally. "Avengers 4" will bring things you've never seen in superhero films: a finale. There will be two distinct periods. Everything before 'Avengers 4' and everything after. I know it will not be in ways people are expecting. Everything after." 'Avengers 4' will be the last outing for Evans, Downey Jr, Hemsworth, Johansson, Ruffalo and Renner as their contracts are ending.

Kelly Marie Tran: Rian Johnson is perfect new Star Wars trilogy

elly Marie Tran thinks Rian Johnson is the "perfect person" to helm a new 'Star Wars' trilogy. The 43-year-old filmmaker took control of the eighth installment of the hit sci-fi franchise, 'The Last Jedi', and was recently announced to be creating a new trilogy outside of the current Skywalker saga. Now Tran, who stars as newcomer Rose Tico in the latest movie, said she cannot think of a better person to helm the new trilogy and she is excited to see what Johnson does. Speaking to 'Entertainment Tonight', Tran said: "I think that Rian isn't afraid to do something that's different and I think that's really hard with something that has been established and something that people love so much. ['The Last Jedi'] really feels like it's a standalone film, if that makes any sense. There are great action sequences, there are great characters - but every single character has an arc, every character [has] some sort of a mental, physical or emotional challenge that they're going through, and it's pretty incredible to kind of see what he's done with it. Hamill had 'fundamental differences' with Johnson



ark Hamill has claimed he had "fundamental differences" with Rian Johnson whilst filming ▲'Star Wars: The Last Jedi'. The 66-year-old actor has been starring as Luke Skywalker for 40 years, and has revealed he was unhappy with the direction the director took his character in during the recently released eighth installment of the sci-fi franchise as Luke seemingly "gives up", something which Mark doesn't believe a Jedi would ever do. Speaking about his role in the new movie, Mark said: "I said to Rian, 'Jedis don't give up.' I mean, even if he had a problem, he would maybe take a year to try and regroup. But if he made a mistake, he would try and right that wrong. So, right there we had a fundamental difference, but it's not my story anymore. It's somebody else's story - and Rian needed me to be a certain way to make the ending effective. That's the crux of my problem. Luke would never say that. I'm sorry." Mark went on to state that 73-year-old franchise creator George Lucas - who sold the franchise to Disney along with production company Lucasfilm in 2012 - would have handled Luke's story in a different way, and said he no longer feels like the role is "his Luke Skywalker" any more. He added: "Well, in this version, see I'm talking about the George Lucas Star Wars. This is the next generation of Star Wars, so I almost had to think of Luke as another character. Maybe he's Jake Skywalker. He's not my Luke Skywalker, but I had to do what Rian wanted me to do because it serves the story well." The star "still hasn't accepted" the changes Rian, 44, made to Luke's character, but insists he still believes the director was the "exact man" the franchise needed to helm the project. In an interview uploaded to YouTube by user Jar Jar Abrams, Mark said: "But listen, I still haven't accepted it completely. But it's only a movie. I hope people like it. I hope they don't get upset, and I came to really believe that Rian was the exact man that they need for this job.'

Tarantino's Star Trek adds a writer

uentin Tarantino's 'Star Trek' movie has hired Mark L Smith to write the script. Paramount is said to have signed Smith up to the role after he took part in a writer's room with the Hollywood director, who recently shared his idea for the next Starship Enterprise story with J.J. Abrams. According to Deadline, Paramount and Abrams have become huge fans of Smith after he penned World War II thriller 'Overlord'. Smith was said to be in consideration for the screenwriting duty after Tarantino recently spent several hours discussing plot ideas with him, 'Godzilla vs. Kong' writer Lindsey Beer, and 'Iron Man 3' scribe Drew Pearce. Tarantino is keen to direct the project and was recently said to have insisted on an R rating, which Paramount and Abrams have agreed on. His movies have mostly been R rated - which means at least a 15 certificate in the UK - due to their use of extreme profanity and violence. Smith is due to work on the script while Tarantino focuses on his next motion picture, a film about Charles Manson, which he had begun work on before the cult leader died in November this year. Margot Robbie and Jennifer Lawrence are among the actresses he is said to have approached to play Sharon Tate, the pregnant wife of director Roman Polanski who was stabbed to death by members of the Manson Family commune in August 1969. Tom Cruise, Leonardo DiCaprio and Brad Pitt are all said to have been in discussions for two male lead roles.

No holiday cheer for Belgrade's 83,000-euro Christmas tree

Belgrade has been getting more jeers than cheers this holiday season-given that its reported price tag of 83,000 euros would make it one of the most expensive in the world. The 18metre tall (59-feet) tree, decorated with 200 red plastic ornaments and 40 candlewick red-gold ribbons, stands in the main pedestrian zone in Serbia's capital and has sparked a furious public reaction and accusations of corruption.

"In the city budget for this and next year there are a lot of scandalous things, and the Christmas tree is only the tip of the iceberg," Nikola Jovanovic, from the opposition People's Party, told Beta news agency. Jovanovic said the tree was just one example of financial abuse by city authorities after the investigative website Pistaljka revealed the cost of almost 10 million dinars (83,000 euros \$98,000). Belgrade Mayor Sinisa Mali, a close ally of Serbian President Aleksandar Vucic, initially

n artificial Christmas tree in the center of refused to talk to reporters about the tree, but later said he was going to cancel the contract-which Pistaljka reported had been signed three days after the tree was installed. "I was surprised with the amount. We have been working completely transparently and publicly for three and a half years. We did not hide anything," Mali told reporters. The revelation about the tree's cost has led to the public prosecutor's office launching a probe into the case but that hasn't quelled the outrage, with many mocking the price.

> "Believe it or not: the city of Belgrade paid whooping 83,000 EUR for its Christmas tree!!! No, it does not boil eggs, it does not clean the house, and frankly it looks like crap," Marko Kmezic complained on Twitter. "Such a tree would be a reason for stormy protests anywhere in a normal world," Uros Stojiljkovic wrote on Facebook. The opposition Democratic Party (DS) also spoke out against the cost and invited

Belgraders to leave "wishes" worth 83,000 euros near the pricey tree. "We want cheaper Christmas trees," read one message. "I want to visit Thailand," someone else wrote, while another requested a "raincoat XL size for my dog". All of the messages had the hashtag #83000wishes. The tree was purchased from a company that has been renting New Year lighting to the city of Belgrade for years for very high prices, according to local media reports.

The city authorities, controlled by the ruling Serbian Progressive Party, have regularly been criticized for installing the festive lighting in early autumn and leaving it on display until February. But in the end the Christmas tree jeers have produced a little bit of cheer. The company has agreed to cancel this year's contract for the tree and said it will donate the proceeds to Belgrade "to contribute to New Year decorations for the capital". — AFP

MODERN-DAY AMBER 'KLONDIKES' THRIVE IN TROUBLED UKRAINE

olodymyr Korkosh steps on the accelerator and his jeep lurches forward, jumping through deep water-filled ditches. "We often come too late by just two to three minutes," the police officer shouts in disappointment. His unit carries out daily raids on the outskirts of the village of Kryvytsya and nearby settlements in northwestern Ukraine's Rivne region, aimed at catching locals red-handed mining amber illegally. Once a scenic forest area, the site has been turned into a moonscape with wet marshy sand on the surface and man-made, funnel-like pits scattered for hundreds of meters around, evidence of work by hundreds of illicit prospectors.

This site, which locals call a "Klondike" in reference to a 19th-century gold rush in Canada, is one of a number of amber fields in Ukraine, which has the world's second-largest reserves of amber-some 15,000 tonsafter Russia, according to the country's state geology committee. Amber is the translucent resin of trees which fossilized over millions of years and ranges in color from pale yellow to deep brown. It is used as a gemstone in jewelry making. But as prices for amber have quadrupled in recent years, fuelled by demand from China, Ukraine has suffered from an illegal mining crisis.

'Environmental disaster'

Legal mining in Ukraine produced just four tons of the mineral in 2015, according to the most recent available figures, while unlawful methods of amber extraction have reaped 120 to 300 tons annually in recent years, said the geology committee. "The state suffers missed financial opportunities that are huge. In addition, we can already talk about an environmental disaster," it said in a written comment to AFP. Prospecting for amber involves applying high-pressure water to the ground. That loosens the amber, which then floats to the surface, but also erodes the fertile top soil to the point that trees can no longer grow there.

Amber poachers have also cleared huge plots of forest in order to ease access to amber-rich sites. Illegal prospectors admit they cause damage but say the work is the only way to make ends meet in a deprived region. "Some people there live below the poverty line," Oleg, a 28-year-old miner, who wanted to give only his first name, told AFP. "I was constantly scared, but the adrenaline and the taste of the first big money blocked that fear," he said, having recently spent four months mining amber in his native northwestern Zhytomyr region, which neighbors Rivne. Agreeing to be filmed only with his back to the camera and the hood of his grey sweatshirt over his head, the former assistant manager in a Kievbased trade company said his monthly salary was about 6,000 hryvnia (\$220, 187 euros), but at the Klondike he managed to earn \$300 in the first five days.

Working in groups of five to 10 people, the miners use powerful homemade pumps and thick hoses to funnel water to a depth of 10 meters (33 feet) in the ground, wash out a dirty mixture of clay, sand and stones and then finally sift from it the coveted gems. As soon as prospectors get information about an approaching police car, it takes just a few minutes for them to turn off the equipment and vanish.

Racing the miners

Korkosh leads a team of some 200 police officers brought in to reinforce the Rivne regional police since March but they don't often manage to detain the amber hunters, who work in remote areas. "We raid the sites of illegal mining and document the crimes. When we arrive, the mining at least stops," Korkosh told AFP, as he stood near a freshly dug abandoned pit, minutes after once again arriving too late to make an arrest. Amber can fetch as much as \$20-\$30 per gram, depending on quality, said Sergiy Martynyuk, a deputy director of Burshtyn Ukrainy (Ukrainian Amber), the only state-owned amber production company. — AFP

Paris truffle find hailed as boon for urban gardeners

after a wild truffle was discovered for what experts said was the first time ever in Paris. The discovery in a hotel roof garden in the shadow of the Eiffel Tower comes as prices for the aromatic fungus have doubled to more than 5,000 euros (\$6,000) a kilo. Coming just before Christmas, when truffles are used to flavor such seasonal dishes as foie gras and chestnut soup, it raises the hope of an undreamt-of windfall for the new wave of urban gardeners colonizing city roofs.

The discovery of this wild truffle is a wonderful example of how roof gardens and green roofs have a huge potential for urban biodiversity," said the Museum of Natural History in the French capital, which revealed the find. It also raised the question of whether the microclimates roof gardens foster might be particularly favorable for truffles, the museum added.

Trench gourmets were celebrating Friday The black "tuber brumale", which tends to again and that it might be possible to cultivate grow in the same regions as its more highlyprized cousin, the Perigord black truffle, was found at the base of a hornbeam tree on the roof of the Mercure Paris Centre Tour Eiffel hotel by Frederic Madre, a researcher from the museum's centre of ecology and conservation.

He told AFP that he felt a "great surge of joy" when he found the truffle but immediately began to wonder how it could have grown so far north. He said he had to resist the temptation to taste the fungus, which weighed 21 grams, before handing it over for analysis. The museum's mushroom expert Professor Marc-Andre Selosse said the truffle usually only grows in a Mediterranean climate, but that the soil and exposure of roof of the hotel had managed to replicate that. "What is remarkable is that it takes two spores coming together for a truffle to grow. This shows that it could happen truffles on Paris roofs," he added. Madre is a co-founder of the Topager startup which was responsible for putting organic gardens on the top of several major buildings in Paris.

City of roof gardens

It plans to add another to the roof of the Opera Bastille. A 600-square-metre (6,450square-foot) roof garden above the Pullman Paris Tour Eiffel hotel, around the corner from where the truffle was discovered, already supplies that hotel with honey, herbs, salad leaves and some of its vegetables and eggs, with chickens fed on its kitchen leftovers. Deeply-flavored truffles are usually hunted down and dug out of the ground using dogs or specially trained pigs. The variety found in Paris is said by experts to be stronger and muskier than the classic black Perigord truffle

found in the warmer climes of southern France, Italy, Spain and Croatia.

It has a light garlicky aroma and a much more pronounced peppery flavor than the sweeter Perigord and Italian white truffles. Although cheaper to buy than its grander cousins, the tuber brumale is preferred by many chefs to flavor sauces, rustic sausage and potato dishes and carpaccios of scallops. Experts from the museum and mushroom specialists from the French Institute of Evolution and Biodiversity are now trying to work out how the truffle got onto the roof, "and if this is a good sign of the health of the Paris ecosystem." The French capital is making a major push towards urban gardening, aiming to have 100 hectares of roof gardens in the next two years, a third of which will be used to grow herbs, vegetables and hops to flavor beer. — AFP

'Kung fu nuns' on bikes swap maroon robes for lycra leggings

bout 200 "Kung fu nuns" kicked A off a month-long journey from Nepal through India on Saturday, swapping their flowing maroon robes for lycra leggings to raise awareness about human trafficking and gender equality. The Buddhist nuns are trained in martial arts and frequently organize pilgrimages and cycling trips to promote gender equality. "We are starting our fifth cycle yatra (pilgrimage) today and our main mission is about increasing awareness about female empowerment, the environment and human trafficking," nun Yeshe Lhamo told AFP.

Each year thousands of women and children across South Asia are lured into cities and across borders with promises of lucrative jobs but are instead sold into modern-day slavery. Nepal has seen an upswing in the number of cases of trafficking since a devastating earthquake in 2015 left thousands homeless. The country's human rights commission estimated that there

were about 23,200 cases of trafficking all girls, girls are capable of doing or attempted trafficking last year. The nuns said they came across several cases of trafficking while volunteering in relief efforts for earthquake victims.

"That's how we had this idea of going on this cycle yatra to all the remote places and telling people we are

everything. They are not useless, they are not things to sell," said 23-year-old nun Jigme Konchok Lhamo. The nuns will cover a 3,000-kilometre route from the hills of Nepal's capital Kathmandu, peddling through south India to Delhi and then to Darjeeling. — AFP

In rubble of Aleppo souk, tablecloth shop makes solitary comeback

't used to be one of the most vibrant marketplaces in the Syrian city of Aleppo, but today, the bombed-out streets of Khan Al-Harir are home to a solitary shop selling tablecloths. Mohammad Shawash's partly restored storefront stands amid a sea of smashed concrete and debris-laden roads. The 62-year-old with a snow-white beard and glasses decided to return to the historic souk five months ago to reopen the shop he had managed for years.

"I cried when Í first came back. I found total destruction all around me. The stores were destroyed, the streets covered in rubble and rocks, and the buildings collapsed," he told AFP. "So I repaired it myself, to prove to the whole world that Aleppo's Old City still has a soul." Khan Al-Harir, or the Silk Market, lies in the celebrated Old City of central Aleppo, a UNESCO world heritage site. Its historic covered market was the largest in the world, with some 4,000 shops and 40 caravanserais in a labyrinth of alleyways selling everything from home ware to artisanal products.

For four years, the Old City was on the front line of battles between government troops in the city's west and rebels in the east. But a blistering, Russian-backed offensive saw Syria's army retake swathes of the country, and in December 2016 the government declared it was once more in control of the whole of Aleppo.

'I lost myself' Much of the Old City remains scarred by fighting, but part of the Souk Al-Jumruk marketplace reopened last month. Other shopkeepers have slowly begun returning to assess the damage. Shawash, a native of

Khan Al-Harir, was one of them. "I was raised here and I used to open my shop from 7:00am until late at night. I knew everyone around me," he said. "The streets were full of passers-by, stalls, restaurants and people selling clothes, carpets and furniture. But now there is no one." When he returned earlier this year to check on his shop, he found a wall had collapsed, the goods were either gone or burned, and the streets were eerily empty.

"It's not just about losing money or stock. I lost my neighbors, I lost my people, I lost myself." For a week, Shawash piled bricks, cement, and stone in a small wheelbarrow and navigated it through the ravaged streets to repair his shop by hand. "I would arrive completely exhausted, because the streets are narrow and there was rubble everywhere, which meant cars couldn't get through," he said. He has since resumed his daily ritual, laying out multicolored plastic tablecloths and mats for display, many of them still wrapped in protective plastic.

Shawash then sits down on a plastic chair and waits for customers, his prayer beads in hand. For hours no one stops, so he packs up his goods, locks the metal door, and heads home. With a dearth of customers, he said he was barely making enough "to buy a falafel sandwich". "Before the war, I used to sell between 50,000 and 70,000 pounds (\$1,000 and \$1,500, depending on the exchange rate) worth of goods," he said. Shawash insisted Aleppo's young people must return to rebuild their city. "Aleppo is the symbol of civilization," he said. "I'm proud to be the first one to reopen my shop in this souk, but I hope that life returns to the market." —AFP

What's for Christmas? \$300,000 in marijuana, says elderly couple

n elderly American couple's Christmas plans went up in smoke after they were caught by police with a giant stash of pot-which they said they planned to give as gifts. Patrick Jiron, 80, and his wife Barbara, 70, went on a cross-country road trip from California to Vermont to visit friends and familyand brought with them a dizzving 60 pounds (27 kg) of marijuana, according to the York News-Times. They told police in Nebraska-

where they were detained about midway through their trip-that the approximately \$336,000 worth of pot were intended as

Christmas presents, the newspaper said. Police allegedly had pulled over the couple on Tuesday for traffic violations, and smelled a pungent odor emanating from their pickup truck. Patrick Jiron was arrested and charged with possession of marijuana with intent to deliver and having no drug tax stamp, according to the news-

paper, which said he had been released after posting 10 percent of his \$100,000 bond. Barbara Jiron was cited, but was not jailed due to unspecified medical conditions, the newspaper reported. Pot is illegal in Nebraska, even though a handful of states, including California and Nebraska's neighbor Colorado, have legalized the drug for recreational use. Vermont is among 29 states that have legalized marijuana for medical

Frenchman invents lemony oysters in time for holidays

French seafood farmer is proposing lemon-flavored oysters this holiday season, a delicacy he perfected after four years of trial-and-error experiments in his garage. Joffrey Dubault, 29, also offers oysters flavored with shallots, another perennial accompaniment usually served finely chopped and floating in vinegar. "It was pretty discouraging at first when I had to throw out 90 percent," the lanky oyster farmer says, a baseball cap shielding his blue eyes. "Now I have a 95-percent success rate."

The process, which Dubault has patented, involves plunging the oysters into a tank of sea water laced with lemon extract for between two and 12 hours. The oysters naturally pump the water through sieve-like gills, becoming impregnated with the flavor. The technique may seem simple but "there are 16 steps to the process, and if any one of them isn't done correctly the result is failure," says

Dubault, who farms some 40 tons of the bivalves each year off Marennes, France's oyster capital on the west coast.

'Chocolate? No way!' Dubault, who says he got the idea from customers at his market stall constantly asking him to throw in a lemon along with their purchase, began marketing the preflavored oysters in October and has found buyers from Belgium to Hong Kong. He won recognition for his invention at a seafood trade fair in Brussels last April when he said Chinese visitors congratulated him, saying they had been attempting a similar feat for seven years. The nod in Brussels encouraged Dubault to set up his company, called So'ooh, to market the novelty. Targeting Asian clients, he has created a ginger version, while oysters flavored with muscatel, the sweet fortified wine, are aimed at the Italian palate. Next year he plans to add grapefruit and mirabelle plum to his flavor menu, Dubault says, while truffle and pepper versions will follow for the next end-of-year holidays. "People have asked me to add chocolate, but I say no way!" he exclaims. Of all his customers, the French are the hardest to win over, he says, calling them "purists". But he is hopeful, having recently signed on with a major supermarket chain. "People eat flavored yoghurts and drink flavored water, so why not oysters?" he asks. Then there are his raspberry-flavored oysters, aimed at young people. It is a future-looking strategy, since the average age of oyster lovers "is fairly advanced", he says. — AFP

ymns filled a church in Iraq's second city Mosul yesterday as worshippers celebrated Christmas for the first time in four years after the end of jihadist rule. Tens of thousands of Christians fled northern Iraqi towns in 2014 as the Islamic State group seized Mosul and swathes of the surrounding Nineveh province. But Iraqi forces expelled the jihadists from the city this year after months of battle, allowing Christians to return to pray at Saint Paul's church.

Yesterday morning, the patriarch of Iraq's Chaldean Catholic Church, Patriarch Louis Raphael Sako, called on dozens to pray for "peace and stability in Mosul, Iraq and the world". Muslims, as well as local and military officials, stood with Christian worshippers amid the candles and Christmas trees. On the church's walls, white sheets covered up window frames blasted empty in the war. Armored vehicles sat outside the church, where the portrait of a Christian killed under IS rule was displayed as a reminder of the city's grim recent history.

Farqad Malko, a Christian woman in the congregation, said celebrating the mass on Christmas Eve was "important to relaunch Christian life" in the city. She is one of the few to have returned to the area after Iraqi forces defeated IS in the city in July. She said she was determined "to work and go to church in Mosul". The jihadists' defeat is a massive turnaround for an organization that once ruled over millions of people in a territory as big as Italy encompassing large parts of Syria and nearly a third of Iraq. This month Prime Minister Haider Al-Abadi declared victory in the threeyear campaign backed by a US-led coalition to expel IS from Iraq. — AFP
