IRAQ LAUNCHES ASSAULT ON WEST MOSUL

AL-BUSEIF, Iraq: Iraqi forces seized 10 villages from the Islamic State group yesterday, launching a daunting operation to retake west Mosul which aid groups warned will put civilians in grave danger. Advancing from several directions, the forces moved towards Mosul airport, which lies just south of the city, marking a new phase in Iraq's largest military operation in years. The Islamic State group has put up stiff resistance to defend Mosul, the city where its leader Abu Bakr Al-Baghdadi proclaimed a "caliphate" straddling Iraq and Syria in 2014.

"Our forces are beginning the liberation of the citizens from the terror of Daesh," Prime Minister Haider Al-Abadi said in a short televised speech, using an Arabic acronym for IS. A top army commander then announced that forces led by federal police units retook villages south of Mosul, including Athbah, which leaves them within striking distance of the airport. "We launched our operation at 7:00 am (0400 GMT)... We are heading towards the airport," said Abbas Al-Juburi of the interior ministry's elite Rapid Response force.

The sky south of Mosul was black with smoke from air strikes and artillery as thousands of forces in armoured convoys worked converged on the airport. "They're desperate," Ali, a Rapid Response officer, said in the village of Al-Buseif as helicopters flew overhead, tracking the last IS fighters attempting to flee. "They will try to cause as many losses as possible, because they know they will die anyway," his colleague Alaa said.

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Tanks and armored vehicles of Iraqi forces, supported by the Hashed Al-Shaabi (Popular Mobilization) paramilitaries, advance towards the village of Sheikh Younis, south of Mosul, after an offensive to retake the western side of Mosul from Islamic State group fighters commenced yesterday. — AFP

KUWAIT: The National Assembly's financial and economic affairs committee yesterday approved a draft bill calling to scrap all increases in utility charges and fuel prices, rapporteur of the panel MP Safaa Al-Hashem said. Hashem said after reviewing nine draft laws submitted by lawmakers, the committee passed a joint draft law stating that increases in public charges and prices of commodities cannot be applied without a law from the Assembly.

The draft law also calls for scrapping a law passed by the previous Assembly almost a year ago calling to raise the prices of electricity and water, starting from May. The committee also called for scrapping the hike in petrol prices which began on Sept 1, adding that prices should be reversed to the old rates, Hashem said.

It will now depend on the Assembly to decide whether to approve the committee's decision or not. But the Assembly is highly expected to pass the draft law because a large number of lawmakers have already committed to oppose any hike in prices. But under Kuwaiti law, the government has the power to reject laws passed by the Assembly, which also has the power to override such rejections by a two-thirds majority in a

Reducing subsidies and increasing prices by the government was one of the top issues raised by candidates during the Assembly election in November. The issue is expected to be debated in the Assembly in the first week of March. A law raising prices of electricity and water was due to be implemented on commercial shops from May and on expatriate houses from late August. Although Kuwaitis are exempt from the hike, MPs anticipated that the hike will result in increasing prices and the cost of living in the country, which will negatively impact Kuwaitis.

Top municipal official jailed for joining IS

KUWAIT: The cassation court yesterday sentenced a top bureaucrat to 10 years in jail for joining and fighting with the Islamic State group in Syria and Iraq. The court also fined the unnamed Kuwaiti national, who was a top official at the Municipality, KD 10,000 and convicted him of calling other people to join the group. The ruling is final and cannot be challenged.

No visa transfers for 'dependent' women

KUWAIT: The manpower authority plans to stop issuing work permits to women holding article 22 (dependent) visas. The authority met interior ministry officials and agreed to stop transfers to article 18 visas for women living in Kuwait on dependent visas to prevent them from working in the private sector.

Barrak injured in prison brawl

KUWAIT: Interior Minister Sheikh Khaled Al-Jarrah Al-Sabah yesterday ordered an immediate investigation and a report about a fight between former opposition MP Musallam Al-Barrak and another inmate at the Central Jail. Barrak was rushed to Farwaniya Hospital for treatment after suffering minor injuries.

DEALS GALORE AT UAE ARMS SHOW

Pentagon Chief Says Military running smoothly

head and theatrical explosions marked the opening of an arms show yesterday in Abu Dhabi, as a bullet-scarred Emirati armored personnel carrier served as a reminder of the country's ongoing military campaign in Yemen. The Emirates announced over \$1.2 billion in arms deals at the opening of the biennial International Defense Exhibition and Conference, known by the acronym IDEX. It and other Gulf nations, buoyed by rising oil prices and suspicious of nearby Iran, are likely to spend even more in the weeks and months ahead.

Two of the UAE's most-powerful rulers, Abu Dhabi Crown Prince Mohammed bin Zayed Al-Nahyan and Dubai's ruler Sheikh Mohammed bin Rashid Al-Maktoum, attended the event yesterday. During the military demonstration, they flanked Sudanese President Omar Al-Bashir, the world's only sitting head of state facing genocide charges at the International Criminal Court.

Bashir attended the 2015 IDEX arms show, but this year's trip comes after US President Barack Obama issued an execu-

US Defense Secretary Jim Mattis, who was also in Abu Dhabi yesterday, was not seen at the demonstration. Brig Gen Rashid Al-Shamsi, an IDEX spokesman, said he didn't know if Mattis attended.

SAUDIS, ISRAEL IN DE FACTO **UNITED FRONT AGAINST IRAN**

BIBI MET ARAB LEADERS IN 2016

MUNICH/JERUSALEM: Saudi Arabia and Republican senators said at the confer-Israel both called yesterday for a new push against Iran, signaling a growing alignment in their interests, while US lawmakers promised to seek new sanctions on the Shiite power. Turkey also joined the de facto united front against Tehran as Saudi and Israeli ministers rejected an appeal from Iranian Foreign Minister Mohammad Javad Zarif for Sunni Gulf Arab states to work with Tehran to reduce violence across the region.

While Saudi Arabia remains historically at odds with Israel, their ministers demanded at the Munich Security Conference that Tehran be punished for propping up the Syrian government, developing ballistic missiles and funding separatists in Yemen. International sanctions on Iran were lifted a year ago under a nuclear deal with world powers, but

ence they would press for new US measures over the missiles issue and Tehran's actions to "destabilize" the Middle East.

Saudi Foreign Minister Adel Al-Jubeir called Tehran the main sponsor of global terrorism and a destabilizing force in the Middle East. He sidestepped a question about Israel's call for concerted action with Sunni Arab states amid growing speculation that the two countries could normalize relations and join forces to oppose Tehran, much as Turkey has done.

The six Arab members of the Gulf Cooperation Council (GCC), especially Saudi Arabia, accuse Iran of using sectarianism to interfere in Arab countries and build its own sphere of influence in the Middle East. Iran denies the accusations.

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SWEDES MOCKING IMAGINARY TRUMP 'TERROR' INCIDENT

WASHINGTON: Bowling Green, Atlanta and now... Sweden? US President Donald Trump was speaking to supporters on Saturday when he apparently referred to the Scandinavian country as the site of a terror incident - the latest example of his administration naming a non-existent attack. He was addressing a campaign-style rally in Florida when he launched into a list of places that have been targeted by terrorists.

"You look at what's happening in Germany, you look at what's happening last night in Sweden. Sweden, who would believe this? Sweden. They took in large numbers. They're having problems like they never thought possible," he said, provoking mockery on social media. His speech was aimed at defending his order last month that blocked refugees and travelers from seven majority-Muslim countries from entering the United States. The order has been suspended by a federal appeals court, and Trump vowed to introduce a new order this week as a means of protecting Americans at home.

KUWAIT MARKS CROWN PRINCE'S 11TH ANNIVERSARY OF ASSUMING OFFICE

KUWAIT: Kuwait celebrates today the 11th anniversary of His Highness the Crown Prince Sheikh Nawaf Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah's assumption of office. On February 7th 2006, His Highness the Amir Sheikh Sabah Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah issued an Amiri Decree, naming His Highness Sheikh Nawaf as Crown Prince. On February 20, he was sworn in during an extraordinary National Assembly session, with the MPs unanimously declaring allegiance to His Highness.

His Highness Sheikh Nawaf, the son of Kuwait's tenth leader Sheikh Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah, started his national service following Kuwait's independence in 1961, when he was named Hawally Governor. He continued in this post until March 1978, when he was appointed Minister of Interior; later he became Minister of Defense in January 1988.

Following Kuwait's liberation in 1991, after that he was appointed Minister of Social Affairs and Labor between April 20, 1990 and Oct 17, 1992. In October 1994, His Highness Sheikh Nawaf was named Deputy Chief of the National Guards, serving in the Guards until July 2003, when he was reappointed as Minister of Interior, as well as the First Deputy Prime Minister. He continued holding these posts until he was pro claimed Heir Apparent in 2006.

Major accomplishments

Among his major accomplishments was transformation of Hawally, which was a small village, into a residential district bustling with commercial and economic facilities. Since he had taken the interior portfolio, His Highness had been preoccupied with maintaining the homeland security and stability. The Ministry of Interior during his era witnessed a widescale overhaul covering security and police sectors, in addition to drawing up an integrated security strategy aimed at combating crime. He had also worked out a strategy for protecting the borders, national sea territorial waters and the islands.

At the defense level, His Highness the Heir Apparent embarked on a major upgrading plan, equipping the forces with modern arms and equipment. Moreover, His Highness Sheikh Nawaf applied advanced technologies in the country's security system as well as the

AMIR PAYS OFFICIAL VISIT TO OMAN TODAY

KUWAIT: His Highness the Amir Sheikh Sabah Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah is scheduled to pay an official visit to the Sultanate of Oman today, during which he would hold talks with Sultan Qaboos on a host of issues at the bilateral and regional levels. Kuwaiti and Omani officials have regularly exchanged visits, particularly over the past years, namely Sultan's Qaboos' coming to Kuwait in 2012 in response to an invitation by His Highness the Amir.

The Kuwaiti-Omani relations are known as historic and the two countries are bonded by a common destiny. The two GCC countries' leaderships have been keen on cementing these ties and mutual cooperation. Oman stood on Kuwait's side in the face of the blatant Iraqi aggression in 1990. It had also taken part in liberating the country and hosted a large number of Kuwaiti citizens during the

plight in the 90s. At the economic level, the supreme joint commission plays a key role in bolstering the ties between the two brotherly countries. In March, 2001, they agreed on forming the committee to cement the coordination in the economic, commercial and tourist realms.

Officials from the two countries held a chain of meetings in 2015 discussing cooperation in the sectors of education, scientific research and youth. They resulted in inking a number of memos and executive programs, adding to more than 20 previously-signed ones.

Kuwait is a prime contributor to developing Oman's infrastructure. According to official figures, trade exchanges between the two countries rose in 2013 to \$609 million, higher by 30 percent as compared to 2012. Kuwaiti exports to the Sultanate in 2013 reached \$124 million, while the imports from Oman amounted to \$486 million. Volume of Kuwaiti investments in Oman in 2014 reached some \$1 billion. Moreover, there are some 9,000 Kuwaiti investors operating in the Sultanate. Meanwhile, leading Omani newspaper 'Oman' affirmed in an article published yesterday the significance of His Highness the Amir's scheduled visit to the Sultanate. The Omani-Kuwaiti ties have been solid and deeply rooted due to keenness on part of Sultan Qaboos and His Highness the Amir on maintaining the close relations, Oman said.

Sheikh Sabah Al-Ahmad's three-day visit will be a State visit, Oman newspaper added, indicating that the visit coincided with critical regional developments; such events warrant views' exchange at the highest echelons of the ruling hierarchies in the two GCC States.

Close consultations between His Highness the Amir and Sultan Qaboos are needed to stop the blood shedding in several Arab countries and resolve regional conflicts peacefully. Oman newspaper also noted the two countries' keenness on regional peace, security, stability and prosperity. — KUNA

THE FAMILY LAW

feel very blessed to be able to write to my readers and answer questions that may be of concern and that may affect their lives. I am also grateful that I have the freedom to talk about issues that may be very sensitive at times. Dealing with lawyers, unfortunately (and I hope to change this through my firm), can be very stressful. Dealing with lawyers about family issues is even more stressful for both the person dealing with the issue and the lawyer. Today, I have chosen to write about sensitive family issues. I hope they are of help.

Very long

Question: I heard divorce proceedings generally take a very long time - is this true? What should I expect?

Fajer: Unfortunately, going to court (in most countries) is a lengthy process, but with divorce more specifically, it depends on the circumstances. It depends if there was any physical abuse, if there are kids involved, the court where you married, if the husband and wife are agreeing to disagree or not and so on. Something to keep in mind though is that the judge will not look into the divorce without referring you to a marriage counselor first. There is a team of experienced professional counselors that aim to make both parties work on the marriage. Sometimes a partner doesn't want to cooperate or both parties agree not to go for counseling - if that's the case, a paper is signed by both parties and is taken back to the court where the proceedings would start.

I know quite a few married couples who were determined to obtain a divorce but came out of the marriage counseling program willing to reevaluate their marriage. After counseling, the case is taken to court, and the divorce settlement is purely for the divorce - it won't include other disputes like custody of a child, money settlements and so on. If there is no cooperation from both sides, it can take a really long time - up to a year, if not longer.

Can't pay back

Question: I borrowed KD 3,000 from a family member and I promised to pay them back within a few months. Now I cannot afford to pay it back. They keep texting me saying they will sue me. What can I do?

Fajer: Honestly, the best way to deal with this is to speak to them and try and negotiate another scenario maybe paying a small amount every month or getting an extension. Whatever you agree on, make sure you do so in writing. This is not legal advice, but I would like to give it anyway because I have seen things from my experience working at my law firm and dealing with clients with such issues. Do not let money get in the way of family or friends or other fruitful relationships, and always, always, have things in writing, even if it is between friends or family.

The two statements may seem to be contradictory, but they are there to protect you. Always forgive. I know I have moved away from speaking only legally, but it is just that I have seen a family fight over money and the brother is determined to put his sisters in jail for not paying him back the amounts they borrowed that they cannot afford to repay. Situations sometimes get out of hand when it comes to the law, and I felt the need to speak about it publicly.

Dowry

Question: When we first married, I was told that I will receive dowry from my husband and also a payment of money should we get divorced. Is this right?

Fajer: This depends on what you agreed upon when you got married. This should be stated clearly on your marriage certificate. For example, let's say you agreed to KD 1,000 as dowry and another KD 1,000 should you get divorced. These amounts are to be paid by the husband to his wife. If your husband did not pay you, you can file a lawsuit to obtain these amounts. Please note that this is a separate case altogether - separate from the divorce, therefore most lawyers will charge extra fees to do so.

Twice as much

Question: We are a Kuwaiti family. Is it true that men get twice as much as women when it comes to inheritance? How can we avoid this? How is this fair?

Fajer: This is true for children or for brothers and sisters. A brother will receive twice as much as a sister. Although this is by law, lawyers can assist parents who would like their children to have approximately equal amounts by legal procedures that they can do prior to death to ensure that when they pass away, their daughters/sons will receive a fair share of the inheritance. Many Muslim scholars say that although there is no equality between the two genders under law when it comes to inheritance, it is still fair, because by law, a man is required to take full responsibility of his family financially, including his wife.

So, if a grandparent passes away and has two sons and two daughters, the wealth will be divided into three parts - one for each son, and one part to be shared by the two daughters. The daughters though will not have to share this amount with their children, whereas the man should share the amount with his wife and children.

KUWAITIS MAKE UP 74 PERCENT OF PUBLIC SECTOR EMPLOYEES

EXPATS MOSTLY IN HEALTH, EDUCATION, AWQAF MINISTRIES

KUWAIT: Recent Central Statistical Bureau (CSB) figures have shown that the total number of government employees reached 338,400 as of the beginning of this year, including 252,800 Kuwaitis - 74 percent of the total workforce, while non-Kuwaitis were 85,670, 26 percent of the total. According to CSB statistics, the total number of Arab government employees was 50,350, while non-Arabs numbered 31,180, in addition to only 4,141 from GCC countries including 3,636 from Saudi Arabia.

Statistics also showed that female government employees (of all nationalities) were 191,000 (56 percent) versus 146,000 male employees (44 percent). Female Kuwaiti employees numbered 151,000 compared to 101,000 male Kuwaiti employees. Statistics also showed that the Ministry of Education (MoE) included the largest number of civilian employees with 110,887, including 78,000 citizens, followed by the Ministry of Health (MoH) with 62,000 including 26,000 citizens, then the Ministry of Electricity and Water (MEW) with 20,000 employees, including only 1,500 expats.

In addition, statistics showed that the total number of

citizens working in teaching is 53,000, in addition to over 50,000 in administrative positions, followed by 38,000 in engineering. Statistics also showed that the majority of Arab expats worked in medical and health services, while those working in teaching and education were 24,256. Finally, statistics showed that the largest number of expats in the public sector (over 35,000) worked for MoH, followed by over 30,000 at MoE and over 3,500 in the Ministry of Awqaf and Islamic Affairs.

Overdue payments

In other news, MEW's Undersecretary Mohamemd Boshehri stressed instructing the ministry's financial affairs sector to address companies contracted by the ministry to pay overdue payments to their laborers working in ministry projects, as many of them had complained about not receiving salaries for months. Separately, MEW recently signed a contract with an international consultancy firm to study and select new locations to build new power and water distillation plants. The contract includes studying East Doha and South Shuaiba plants with an ultimate goal of increasing power production to 39,000 megawatts by 2035.

UIC CHIEF UNDERLINES PRIVATE SECTOR'S DEVELOPMENT ROLE

KUWAIT ADOPTS FREE ECONOMIC POLICIES: MINISTER

KUWAIT: Chairman of the Union of Investment Companies (UIC) Bader Al-Subai stressed yesterday the significance of establishing the principle of partnership with the private sector at governmental agencies in order to achieve sustainable development and diversify income sources.

This principle can be realized by involving the private sector in the process of developing the state's policies, Subai added in remarks made during the second and last day of the 4th Kuwait Investment Forum. He also underscored the importance of finding solutions to pay differences in both public and private sectors, regarding this as being very essential to overhauling the private sector.

A healthy business environment should be created, and the principle of linking performance to bonus needs to be established in the public sector, he added. On corporate governance, Al-Subai emphasized that it should not be restricted to the private sector due to the significant and sensitive role of the public sector in promoting transparency, efficiency and effectiveness.

Furthermore, the UIC chief urged Kuwaiti citizens and expatriates to be keen on saving money with a view to stimulating the national economy. The 4th Kuwait Investment Forum kicked off Saturday under the partnership of Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of Finance Anas Al-Saleh under the title: "Investing in Kuwait - Available and Lost Opportunities.

Free policies

Meanwhile, Minister of Commerce and Industry Khaled Al-Rawdan said that Kuwait is adopting free and developed economic policies in spite of geopolitical reflections and changes in the Middle East region.

Speaking during the forum, the minister said that the business environment improvement committee, set up in cooperation with the National Assembly, mainly aims at drawing foreign investment and spurring Kuwaiti investors.

He added that Kuwait has the 102nd place in the World Bank's doing business index, pointing to the Kuwaiti government's efforts to enact fresh pieces of legislation in order to create a better business climate, especially amid the current regional events. In this context, the minister extolled existing government-parliament cooperation with

a view to developing the business environment in the next 15 months.

Furthermore, MP Al-Humaidi Al-Subaei said the business climate in Kuwait requires more developed laws and legislations in order to attract more investors to economic ventures. Addressing the same event, the MP emphasized that several laws need to be amended in order to push forward the current economic situation in the country. He emphasized that the National Assembly seeks to wipe out obstacles bugging Kuwaiti investors so as to encourage and spur them and to develop the local economy.

Investment promotion

In the meantime, Minister of Justice Faleh Al-Azab said that Kuwait has adopted a package of laws aiming at promoting investment and drawing local and foreign capital. Addressing the forum, Azab, who doubles as Minister of State for National Assembly Affairs, said the package mainly includes Law 116/2013 regarding direct investment promotion. It also involves Law 116/2014 as for partnership between public and private sectors, which allows investors from the private sector to invest on state-owned lands in service and infrastructure projects, he elaborated. Kuwait is seeking to create rebalance between both public and private sectors in order to achieve economic development and boost production through wholly or partially operating projects, he added.

Also yesterday, Deputy Governor of the Central Bank of Kuwait (CBK) Yusuf Al-Obeid said financial stability is the basis of economic stability in the face of unpredictable jolts. Speaking at the forum, he said monetary stability ensures stable prices of commodities and services, pointing to the CBK's role in maintaining monetary stability by targeting reasonable and static interest rates.

The 4th Kuwait Investment Forum kicked off Saturday under the partnership of Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of Finance Anas Al-Saleh under the title: 'Investing in Kuwait - Available and Lost Opportunities.' Local **spotlight**

BABA, SHEELNI, BABA!

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The Syrian tragedy returned in the past few days to the fore in the global media and with the emergence of an image of a Syrian child. A 25-second video shows a young boy with both his legs blown off due to an air strike, screaming at his father to pick him up. The video was heartbreaking and sent a message to the people that the war in Syria is bloody and devastating.

The child's name is Abdul Basset, and he was screaming "Baba, sheelni, Baba" after he survived an air strike in the southern countryside of Idlib. But he was rendered immobile after losing his feet. The video reminded the world of the bloody Syrian war and similarity to the images of Imran in 2016 and Alan in 2015.

Such horrific pictures send a clear message that the Syrian crisis is not only a battle between several forces and militants fuelled by the support of foreign countries - the conflict in Syria has put many innocent lives at stake and forced millions of people to flee their homes to nearby countries such as Turkey and Lebanon, as well as to migrate to Europe, especially Germany. We are confronting a humanitarian crisis, where food aid is on top of priorities.

Although some European countries such as Germany provide tremendous support to Syrian refugees, we should not disregard the possible impact on these countries. The problem today is the transformation of these immigrants to citizens because of coercive circumstances, and this is something worth looking at seriously. What will happen after the victory of Bashar Al-Assad? This is an important question. What happens when pro-regime troops are in control of all areas? What happens to IS?

Sir Bernard Hogan-Howe, a former official in the British police force, told The Times newspaper in an article on terrorism that around 850 Britons have traveled to fight in Syria and Iraq and that police now faced the threat of battle-hardened fighters returning home as IS moves closer to defeat. These people can be a threat to others and the society itself. It's natural to expect that IS is close to an end, and therefore some of these militants will return to their countries in the West, because IS members will not be able to stay in Syria, where they will be hunted. If they return to their respective countries, they will probably tend to stay under the radar, but this doesn't mean the society is safe from their revenge.

The conflict in Syria has entered a new phase, in which the ruling regime is strong on the battlefronts and the negotiating table. The Syrian issue is a war against humanity and must be stopped. In light of the new shift in US policy toward Iran, a new and potential Arab-Israeli alliance is possible, and the rules of the game will change.

Today, the biggest issue is not the image of an injured child or a family that chose to migrate to a country that it does not belong to or bonds with at all. The question is - what about Syria? It can't be evacuated of its citizens because it will become a hotbed for all terror cells on Planet Earth.

WOMAN HOLDS UP ELEVATOR AFTER REJECTED JOB APPLICATION

KUWAIT: A female citizen in her fifties was arrested yesterday after she held up an elevator inside a famous tower in Sharq and refused to get off in protest after her job application was rejected because of incomplete documents and her age, said security sources. The sources added that the woman told the police that her application to work for a private company was rejected, which made her highly upset.

Land plots

"It is unfair to refer an employee to investigation for expressing his opinion and making a statement to the press," he underlined.

Private sector to play bigger role to cope with growing demand for private schools

Education budget equals 17.5 percent of total GCC fiscal budget

KUWAIT: Significant advancements have been made in the GCC education sector in recent years. Literacy rates and school enrollment have risen and are now at high levels. The average youth and adult literacy rates are above 97 percent and 90 percent, respectively. The gross enrollment rate (GER) across various education levels has improved in GCC in the past few years. Over the previous decade, the education sector has gained prominence across the GCC nations. The sector has witnessed continual improvement and high investments (majorly from the government). Growth in the education sector became a key priority after the Arab

Preference for private schools, increasing use of technology and popularity of international curriculum schools are the emerging trends in GCC education sector. The demand for private schools in the GCC region has increased over the last decade from both expat and locals. It is perceived that private schools, particularly those with international curriculum offer better quality of education. The sector is observing growth opportunities in the way of the pipeline of new education projects (schools and colleges), e-learning market attracting investors and PPP in the education sector. Favorable demographics, private sector participation, rising income levels, and inclination toward better quality of education are the growth drivers providing the much needed impetus to the sector. However, the sector faces challenges in the form of shortage of skilled teachers, relatively low tertiary enrollment rate, high cost of construction and education quality not being at par with the global standards. Such challenges have led to an imbalance between the skills imparted and the job market. This demand supply mismatch is being bridged by the government initiatives and increased focus through various reforms and investments in the sector.

Educational expenditure driven by government


The GCC governments have been allocating a huge share of their budgets to the education sector. Although falling oil prices have impacted their major revenue stream, Oman, Saudi Arabia, and the UAE have allocated more than 20 percent of their total 2016 budget to develop the education sector. A high budget apportion to the education sector indicates that the government is concentrated on the overall development of the education system. This is expected to yield a skilled workforce better suited to the employment requisites and address the issue of unemployment. The proportion is much higher in the GCC countries than in developed countries such as Germany, the UK and the US. In 2016, Saudi Arabia (22.7 percent), the UAE (21.2 percent), and Oman (21.0 percent) made the highest allocation to the education sector as a percent of their GDP, while Kuwait (15 percent), Qatar (10.1 percent) and Bahrain (9.2 percent) made the lowest. When compared to the developed countries such as the US (15.2 percent), the UK (11 percent) and Germany (5.2 percent), the top three GCC rationalizing the information in terms of expenditure per student, it seems that GCC spends less than many of the developed countries but higher than the OECD average; approximately \$11,000 per student against an average of \$9,000 for OECD countries but below the expenditure of \$12,000 for Australia and around the same for the US.

GCC quality of education not at par with developed countries

The quality of education in the GCC countries is not at par with developed nations, majorly in terms of qualification of staff and curriculum drafting. In terms of quality of education, only Qatar and the UAE are at par with developed nations. The World Economic Forum's Global Competitiveness Report 2016-17 ranked Qatar, the UAE and Bahrain high in terms of quality of educational system as compared to other GCC nations. The primary education enrollment rate was high in all GCC countries, whereas the secondary education enrollment rate was high in Saudi Arabia, Qatar, and Oman but relatively lower in Bahrain, Kuwait, and the UAE. The region is witnessing an increase in students enrolling in universities for higher education abroad. The students and their parents seek higher education quality as well as the campus experience that universities in the Middle East do not provide. All GCC countries ranked low in terms of the tertiary education enrollment rate. Qatar, Bahrain and the UAE were among the top countries in terms of quality of management schools, while the rest relatively lower. The UAE, Qatar, and Bahrain ranked high in terms of Internet access in schools, whereas the rest of the countries ranked relatively lower. In terms of the pupilteacher ratio (for primary education) however, the GCC average stands better than other economies; for GCC the ratio stands very low at 12.3 as against 23.8 for the world, 25.7 for developing countries and 14.3 for the developed world.

Increased private sector participation is the need of the hour

The demand for private schools in the GCC region has increased over the last decade from both expats



and locals. Public schools provide free basic education in GCC only to nationals and commonly do not admit expats. Hence, there has been a gradual increase in demand for private schools with the growing number of expats in the region. Qatar and the UAE have led in alluring private investors to the education sector, mainly because they are home to a relatively large expat community. Both Qatar and the UAE are emerging as the centers for higher education as they have a large number of international schools/universities and educational institutes as well recognized for their encouraging investment climate. About 1mn students pursued education in the UAE in 2015 (4 percent CAGR during 2010-15). Private schools dominate the country's education sector, accounting for about 71 percent of the total students enrolled in the system. The number of students attending private schools expanded at a CAGR of 5.5 percent during 2010-15. Despite the public schools offering free education, nationals as well as expats prefer private schools, mainly because of better quality of education they provide. Private schools are also perceived to be imparting better quality of English among students. The governments are increasingly supporting the private sector through investor-friendly policies and resolution of challenges faced. Their aim is to raise private sector involvement to improve the education system. Gradual growth in the expat community majorly contributed to an increase in private schools in Saudi Arabia.

Favorable demographics are key to demand growth

The GCC region has among the world's highest population growth rates. GCC's population grew at an average rate of 3.1 percent during 2010-15; it is anticipated to expand at a CAGR of 2.4 percent over 2015-2020 to reach 60mn. According to the United Nations Population Division (UNPD), around 40 percent of the estimated population in GCC was under 25 years in 2015. An improvement in birth rate and life expectancy of the nationals, along with increasing number of expats, has led to rapid growth in the population base in the region. A rapidly expanding school-and-collegegoing population base is expected to increase student enrollments, thus driving the education demand in the region. This augurs well for growth in the education sector in GCC. In addition, the region is attracting many international schools and universities to cater to the demands of the expats for the requirement of international curricula.

Rising income levels are keeping the demand buoyant

The GCC countries rank among the wealthiest in the world. In 2015, four of the six GCC nations (namely, Qatar, Kuwait, the UAE, and Saudi Arabia) ranked among the world's top 10 richest countries, with Qatar standing at the top. This is majorly due to huge oil reserves and an expanding non-oil sector. Even though the recent slump in oil prices has impacted the revenues of the member nations, it is improbable to turn into a long-term phenomenon. Government spending would mostly be supported by diversification to non-oil sectors, large foreign exchange reserves, and fiscal measures such as the VAT implementation plan. A high level of personal disposable income, coupled with a strong inclination to spend on quality education, will be the greatest driver for growth in the education sector. According to IMF, GCC's average per capita GDP (at current prices) forecasted at \$26,458 in 2015 is estimated to expand at a CAGR of ~3 percent to \$30,434 in 2020. The citizens enjoy several benefits such as free public education, free healthcare, and tax-free environment, among others; leading to a high personal income level among the population. A rising income level coupled with a strong preference towards quality education is most likely to boost the sector.

Strong government support and involvement has continued

Governments across GCC have been taking several initiatives to develop the education sector, in form of budget allocations, long term reforms, and development strategies. In its 2017 budget, Saudi Arabia allocated \$53.3bn (the highest share, i.e., 22.5 percent, of the total expenditure) on education and training. To reform the Saudi education system, the King Abdullah bin Abdul-Aziz Project for Public Education Development (Tatweer) was established in 2007. The \$2.4bn program, Tatweer intends to improve the quality of graduates in the kingdom. Saudi Arabia's King Abdullah Scholarship Program (KASP), established in 2005, provided full funding support to thousands of Saudi national students to study abroad. KASP is projected to fund about 55,000 students up to 2020. In May 2014, King Abdullah approved a five-year plan valued more than SAR80bn (\$21.3bn) for education sector development. As part of this plan, 1,500 nurseries would be built, 25,000 teachers would be provided training and educational centers would be established. As part of the government's efforts to diversify income and cut public spending, the country also plans to privatize a few government schools and institutions. The kingdom anticipates increasing the number of students going to private schools from 15 percent to 25 percent. Government-owned Tatweer Buildings Company plans to form a PPP to construct and finance educational institutions at a cost of SAR45bn over the next five years.

The Kuwaiti government's approach is to transform its education sector by developing the curriculum, encouraging efficient teaching, constructing distinguished universities, and stimulating higher education bodes well for the sector. The government has launched its second phase of the school education quality improvement project at the end of March 2015. Kuwait's Ministry of Education and National Center for Education Development, along with the World Bank, brought into effect its five-year technical cooperation agreement concentrating on education reforms. The main agenda of the program was providing support to building capacity, improving the quality of learning and teaching, and supervising impact on schools and students. Besides this, the University City project is projected to enhance tertiary enrollments.

To build a top-class education system, the UAE government aims to invest significantly in improving the quality of education and schools, equipping schools

and colleges with smart devices, and recruiting internationally accredited teachers. The MoE's 10-year development strategy 2010-20 is aimed at providing students a high-quality curriculum and excellent teaching, improved student life, affordable and highquality education, as well as promoting the national identity and confirming administrative effectiveness. The government's AED1bn Mohammed Bin Rashid Smart Learning Program aims to deliver each student a smart tablet and provide superior 4G network connectivity by 2019. In June 2009, ADEC introduced a 10year strategic plan to address the challenges in offering P-12 education.

Growth in tertiary segment indicates investment opportunities

There has been a significant improvement in the enrollment rates across different education levels in the last couple of years. Bahrain's primary net enrollment rate (NER) is the highest at 96.9 percent, compared with the GCC average of 93.3 percent. Qatar's secondary GER is 109.4 percent vis-‡-vis GCC's average of 100.8 percent (ratio is above 100 percent since it includes students whose age exceeds the pre-defined elementary age bracket such as repeaters). Saudi Arabia's tertiary level GER is the highest at 61.1 percent against the GCC average of 31.9 percent. The region's tertiary GER has been growing steadily over the years. This growth was primarily driven by the opening of internationals universities/ colleges and increased government initiatives. This indicates that the efforts by the government and its citizens to pursue higher education and develop skills in order to diversify their economy and fit in the global picture have been fruitful.

The E-learning market is a definite area to look into

Out of 143 countries in the world, the GCC countries were among the top 50 with the exception of Kuwait's odd performance (72nd). Despite economic challenges, the GCC countries are increasingly investing toward modernizing their education system. To facilitate effective e-learning, the countries are gradually adopting information and communications technology. The Middle East's e-learning market is expected to expand at an annual rate of 8.2 percent to \$560.7mn over 2014-16. This bodes well for regional and global education suppliers. The highest growth is projected in Oman, Kuwait and Qatar. The share of the education sector in tablet shipments to the Middle


Shortage of skilled teachers is the chief drawback

With the expanding student base and a small pool of teachers, it is becoming difficult for GCC to attract qualified teachers. The shortage of qualified teachers is attributable to factors such as low teacher wages and insufficient school management. The private sector offers more economic benefits for teachers than the public sector. Teachers do not have the same social status and respect that they used to have in earlier times. This makes it harder to find and sustain quality teachers. A high percentage of the teachers in the GCC region are recruited from foreign countries. Most of these teachers are hired on a contract for 2-3 years. The schools incur more costs for visa fees, travel expenses, and housing. The costs have increased due to the rising cost of living in the GCC region.

Owing to the small pool of local teachers and a minor percentage of locals being interested in teaching, the GCC region primarily depends on expats to meet the shortage of teachers. The GEMS Group has launched initiatives such as Global Teacher Price, worth \$1mn to inspire the young generation to join the teaching industry. Teach for Qatar is a program being run by the Qatari government that provides training and development to the graduates and professionals to teach in high-need classrooms and schools and to take up teaching as a round-the-clock career option. In spite of the measures being taken to address the shortage, the competitors offering higher incentives poach the skilled teachers. In the UAE demand exceeding the supply is a major challenge. A minimum of 14,000 teachers need to be hired over the next 4-5 years. Both the government and private players are implementing teacher-training programs to boost the workforce. Incompetently skilled teachers could negatively impact students' academic performance, mainly due to unproductively delivered curricula.

High construction costs for schools is another barrier to entry

The cost of construction in the GCC region has risen due to an increase in the wages of contractors and workers as well as in the prices of building and construction materials, such as steel and cement. The high cost of setting up of a school and university/college is a major obstacle. The cost of construction in Qatar is the highest across GCC. The Doha Port in Qatar has a restriction on the volume of imports, which has further driven up costs and made the construction costs in Qatar the highest in the world. The government has established a committee to prioritize major projects in Qatar, review costs and propose alternative financing and contracting methods. A few economists believe that the drop in oil prices may be a silver lining for the construction indus-



East increased to 10.3 percent in the first half of 2014. Kuwait initiated the e-education program in 2011, which aimed at digitizing textbooks and rolling out elearning products across schools. Dawrat.org, founded by Mohammad Alsuraye in Kuwait in 2011, has become a hub for GCC training courses and has launched short Arabic Moocs (massive open online courses) in marketing, business and photography.

Several innovative e-learning programs have been introduced in the GCC region. For example, the UAE's Mohammed Bin Rashid Smart Learning Program is an integrated e-learning program aimed at shaping the new learning environment in schools. This five-year program worth AED1bn covers all government schools. In 2012, Saudi Arabia's Ministry of Education (MoE) launched the Smart Schools Project worth SAR800mn wherein the classrooms would be equipped with modern techniques that would make learning easier, flexible and more enjoyable. Qatar's Supreme Education Council launched an e-learning program to modernize its education system by integrating digital technology.

Ample opportunities for public-private partnerships (PPPs)

The fiscal position of GCC countries has weakened due to a drastic plunge in crude oil prices, leading to delays in several infrastructure projects. In addition, payment periods for many projects under construction have been extended. This scenario holds ample opportunities for PPPs in terms of operation, delivery, and financing of public infrastructure assets. The GCC governments are expected to turn to the private sector for financing the infrastructure projects. Social infrastructure sectors such as education provide innovation opportunities in the PPP domain. In fact the governments have already started encouraging enhanced private-sector contribution to the economy and also in diversification attempts. In February 2016, Saudi Arabia's MoE launched a new initiative to encourage private sector participation in the education sector. It aims to increase the number of students in private schools from 15 percent to 25 percent over the next few years. The Director General of Abu Dhabi Education Council (ADEC) had acknowledged that PPPs were necessary to take the country's education sector to the next level. He stated that partnering with private players to reform the education system was the most proficient way forward and was also part of the Abu Dhabi Vision 2030.

try in the Gulf region. Since the governments now have to prioritize their major projects, the demand for labor and raw materials may decrease, affecting their prices.

Enrollment rate in higher education

Enrollment in tertiary education remains low in the GCC countries as compared to developed nations (GER for tertiary education in the US is 86.7 percent and Germany is 65.5 percent), reflecting a disparity between skills imparted to graduates and labor market requirements. The education sector in GCC is yet to align itself with the requirements of the private sector. The skill gap is a reason for the increasing unemployment among the youth of this region. This, in turn, demotivates students for enrolling for higher education. Having recognized this gap, the GCC governments are pursuing for the enhancement of higher education. All the GCC countries have quadrupled their investments in higher education in the last ten years.

New projects in the pipeline

The GCC region has a number of major projects in the pipeline. Government investments along with private sector support, have led to a rise of projects in the region's education sector. Saudi Arabia accounts for the highest number of projects, followed by Qatar, the UAE, and Kuwait. In addition, a number of new schools and colleges are constructed across the region as a part of the Governments strategic plans to increase student capacity. According to the Director-general of the Knowledge and Human Development Authority (KHDA), Dr Abdullah Al Karam, around 15-20 new private schools will open in Dubai during the academic year 2016-17. Under its Future Schools Project, the ADEC is set to open 100 public schools by 2020. To address the education quality issue, the Kuwaiti government, in partnership with the private sector launched the Kuwait Schools Development program to develop high-quality schools. In the first phase, it would develop nine schools (one middle school, three elementary, and five kindergartens), including accommodation for school faculty and an Olympic-size swimming pool. To boost Oatar's educational infrastructure, the Public Works Authority (Ashghal) awarded contracts valued more than \$343mn for constructing 17 new schools and six kindergartens. Work is already in progress for 38 kindergartens and schools a cost of \$474mn. Lusail City Real Estate Development Company signed an agreement with four private schools to expand their branches in the new city in Qatar.



CAFE WORKERS DEPORTED FOR SERVING SHISHA TO TEENS

KUWAIT: Three Egyptian nationals are held pending deportation after they were arrested for serving shisha to three teenagers in a Farwaniya cafe. A security source said that the three men were caught red-handed while serving shisha to the Lebanese girls inside the cafe where they worked. The Interior Ministry had recently announced tougher penalties for cafes and restaurants that serve shisha to underage customers.

Passport destroyed

A girl tore apart the passport of a Jordanian woman to stop her from traveling with her boyfriend, after she caught them together in a cafe. The woman had busted her boyfriend sharing a table with another woman inside a cafe at Gulf Road. She approached him and asked who the other woman was, and he replied by saying that she was his coworker and they met to discuss their plans to go on a business trip together. Irked by her boyfriend's response, the woman lashed out at the two, and ended up snatching the Jordanian woman's purse, picking up her passport from inside of it and tearing it apart. Police were called to the scene and arrested the heartbroken woman on charges of 'destroying an official document.'

Attempted murder

An Egyptian man was stabbed by his compatriot in Mangaf. The victim was taken to Adan hospital and admitted inside the intensive care unit (ICU) in critical condition. The suspect was arrested before he tried to escape from the country. Investigations revealed that the suspect visited the victim and stabbed him on his door's step. The man had tried to resist the attack and close the door, but failed. A neighbor called police who arrived to the scene with paramedics. The victim was hospitalized while the suspect was taken in custody and charged with attempted murder.



Thief caught

Jahra detectives arrested a man on charges of robbing expatriates in different areas and residential buildings at knifepoint. Police also discovered that the man has a long history of criminal behavior. Detectives had taken statements of the victims who gave description of the suspect. Eventually, they arrested a man matching the description while he was trying to rob an Indian national. The man was taken to the proper authorities to face charges.

Harasser arrested

A former policeman was able to stop a drug user from harassing mall patrons. The ex-officer was shopping at a Hawally mall when he noticed a person behaving in an abnormal condition, and was harassing shoppers. He caught him and called police, who came over and placed him under arrest. Police found shabu (methamphetamine) in his possession.

Mistrust

An Egyptian man told police that he entrusted KD 2,000 in cash with his female relative, but she later denied receiving any money from him. Both were sent to detectives for further questioning. —*Translated from the Arabic press*

TRUMP REASSURES SUPPORTERS IN FIERY SPEECH

'The White House is running so smoothly, so smoothly'

Trump turned back the clock Saturday with a bold and aggressive Florida speech straight out of his fans while insisting all is well in the White House despite weeks of turbulence. He also took aim at his favorite foil, the "dishonest" news media that he said has become "part of the corrupt system."

At the end of a stormy first month in office, the billionaire took the power of the presidency on the road, revisiting the style and substance of the campaign trail. After stepping down from Air Force One to a deafening cheer, he was drawn into the collective bosom of several thousand of his dearest followers-mostly white, mostly male middle-class Americans who feel they have been left behind by the country's shifting economy. "I'm here because I want to be among my friends and among the people," he said.

Trump employed a loud and muscular delivery-one which won over millions of voters on the campaign trail last year-to assure Americans he is fulfilling promises to shrink government, rebuild the military, restrict immigration, and tear up health care reforms enacted by predecessor Barack Obama. "This will be change for the ages," the president said at the event in Melbourne, a sun-bleached city on Florida's Space Coast.

But Trump was completing his first month in office under a cloud in Washington, where lawmakers pledged to further investigate his possible pre-election ties to Russia, his national security advisor was forced to resign in disgrace, and a cabinet nominee withdrew amid controversy. "The White House is running so smoothly,

MELBOURNE: President Donald so smoothly," Trump stressed, before opposition is saying about me," she going on an extended rant about the US media. "I also want to speak to you without the filter of the fake news," 2016 campaign playbook, enthralling Trump said. "They've become a big part of the problem. They are part of the corrupt system," he said, continuing the open warfare with the media that has marked his young presidency.

First Lady's prayer

Aside from the fact that Trump is now leader of the free world, the event was eerily similar in style to his campaign-from the layout, to the recorded music, to the president's largely impromptu delivery. About the only thing missing was attacks on his 2016 Democratic rival Hillary Clinton, Trump acknowledged that he is always in campaign mode. "Life is a campaign," he told reporters on Air Force One ahead of the rally. "To make America great again is absolutely a campaign. It's not easy, especially when we're also fighting the press."

During his speech, Trump reiterated his pledge to crack down on terrorism, saying he has "ordered decisive action to keep radical Islamic terrorists the hell out of our country." And he said his administration would submit "in a couple of weeks" a plan to repeal and replace "the disaster known as Obamacare." Republican leaders in Congress have said they will unveil their health care plans in the coming weeks as well.

Meanwhile, First Lady Melania Trump, who is usually soft-spoken, broke with form by reciting the Lord's Prayer to begin the event, then issuing a scathing rebuke of her husband's enemies and her critics. "I will always stay true to myself and be truthful to you, no matter what the

said. At one point, the president broke security protocol by inviting a supporter to hop a barrier and join him onstage. "Mr President, thank you, sir," said Gene Huber, a car salesman from West Palm Beach who said he arrived at 4 am to be first in line for the event. "This is a world leader now who's taking control," Huber told AFP earlier. "No jitters at all."

'Total garbage'

The commander-in-chief was clearly seeking to reconnect with his tribe in a reassuring environment. Tensions have soared in recent days as lawmakers pressed for more information about the Trump campaign's connections with Russia. On Thursday, Trump held a news conference that was startling in its vitriol against the media. He later took to Twitter to call the media the "enemy of the American People." White House chief of staff Reince Priebus warned the media not to brush off Trump's denunciation. "I think you should take it seriously," Priebus told CBS in an interview.

"I think that the problem we've got is that we're talking about bogus stories like the one in the New York Times, that we've had constant contact with Russian officials. The next day, the Wall Street Journal had a story that the intel community was not giving the president a full intelligence briefing. Both stories grossly inaccurate, overstated, overblown, and it's total garbage." Robert Sponsler, 64, a retired railroad worker from Jacksonville who was attending the rally, turned his nose up at the stew in the capital. "We don't care," he said of the various controversies. "He don't owe nobody nothing. I'm with him 100 percent."—AFP

MCCAIN: SUPPRESSING PRESS IS HOW DICTATORS GET STARTED

MUNICH: US Senator John McCain, defending the media against the latest attack by President Donald Trump, warned suppressing the free press was "how dictators get started." The Arizona Republican, a frequent critic of Trump, was responding to a tweet in which Trump accused the media of being "the enemy of the American people."

The international order established after World War Two was built in part on a free press, McCain said in an excerpt of an interview with NBC's "Meet the Press" that was released in advance of the full Sunday morning broadcast. "I hate the press. I hate you especially," he told interviewer Chuck Todd from an international security conference in Munich. "But the fact is we need you. We need a free press. We must have it. It's vital."

"If you want to preserve - I'm very serious now - if you want to preserve democracy as we know it, you have to have a free and many times adversarial press. And without it, I am afraid that we would lose so much of our indi-

vidual liberties over time. That's how dictators get started," he continued. "They get started by suppressing free press. In other words, a consolidation of power. When you look at history, the first thing that dictators do is shut down the press. And I'm not saying that President Trump is trying to be a dictator. I'm just saying we need to learn the lessons of history," McCain said.

McCain's comments followed Trump's tweet and came days after the president held a raucous news conference at which he repeatedly criticized news reports about disorder in the White House and leaks of his telephone conversations with the leaders of Mexico and Australia. German Chancellor Angela Merkel underscored the importance of a free press at the Munich conference on Saturday, saying, "I have high respect for journalists. We've always had good results, at least in Germany, by relying on mutual respect." Merkel did not mention Trump specifically, but called freedom of the press "a very significant pillar of democracy." —Reuters

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Venezuela and US clash over political prisoners

CARACAS: Venezuela and the United 2018 should be held in 2017 instead. States locked horns again over political prisoners held by Caracas, including a jailed opposition leader whose supporters took to the streets of the capital Saturday to demand his release. Hundreds of opposition supporters marched in Venezuela's capital city, blocking one of the main highways in Caracas to protest Leopoldo Lopez's imprisonment.

Lopez, in a letter he wrote in his cell read out to supporters, urged an electoral "rebellion" to press for general elections in the country mired in economic and political crisis. Referring to gubernatorial elections set for last December that were delayed and not yet rescheduled, Lopez called instead for a referendum on whether the presidential election set for Supporters called for Venezuelans to press for change.

"His only crime was to demonstrate non-violently. And now, more than 80 percent of Venezuelans want (President Nicolas) Maduro to leave power," said David Smolansky, mayor of metro Caracas' El Hatillo district. Smolansky said the elected socialist Maduro's government amounted to a dictatorship that makes "Venezuelans go hungry while it protects criminals," he stressed, adding: "We urge the international community: no more dictatorship. We want to live in a free country where decency can overcome violence." The State Department issued a new call for the release of Lopez and other dissidents, days after the

Venezuelan Supreme Court upheld his imprisonment. Lopez is serving a nearly 14-year sentence on charges of inciting unrest at anti-government protests in 2014. "We call for the immediate release of all prisoners of conscience, respect for the rule of law, the freedom of the press, the separation of constitutional powers within the government, and the restoration of a democratic process that reflects the will of the Venezuelan people," the department's acting spokesman Mark Toner said in a statement.

'Dismay and concern'

"The United States reiterates its dismay and concern about these arrests, and other actions taken by the Venezuelan government to criminalize

dissent and deny its citizens the benefits of democracy," the statement said. The ruling on Lopez's appeal, which was filed in July, came a day after Trump received Lopez's wife Lilian Tintori at the White House and posted a tweet calling for the prisoner's release.

"Venezuela should allow Leopoldo Lopez, a political prisoner & husband of @liliantintori (just met w/ @marcorubio) out of prison immediately," Trump tweeted following the meeting. Lopez is the founder of Popular Will, one of the most hardline parties opposing Maduro. Shortly before Trump sent his Twitter missive this week, Maduro had warned the US that Venezuela would "respond firmly" to any action deemed aggressive.

"Those who tangle with us will get an

appropriate response," he said on state television. Ties had already been strained on Monday when the US Treasury imposed sanctions on Maduro's powerful Vice President Tareck El Aissami and a businessman, whom the US authorities accuse of being involved in drug trafficking. Washington has had a shaky relationship with Caracas since the late Hugo Chavez rose to power in 1999.

The former Venezuelan president was famous for his anti-American rhetoric, which has persisted under Maduro, who blames his country's deep economic woes on a US-backed capitalist conspiracy. The two countries have not exchanged ambassadors since 2010, but do share important economic relations, especially in the oil sector. — AFP

BALLOON, CAMERA, ACTION: MAPPING A PALESTINE REFUGEE CAMP IN LEBANON

Residents plan everything from future green spaces to inspections

BURJ AL-SHAMALI: Equipped with an inexpensive camera and a big red balloon, Firas Ismail-a 20-year-old Palestinian refugee in southern Lebanon-is not your typical urban planner. But the aerial shots he helped capture of the Burj Al-Shamali refugee camp, near the Mediterranean coastal city of Tyre, will help residents plan out everything from future green spaces to health inspections.

From below, you can't really tell anything about the camp. But from above, you can see just how dense the buildings are and how little space there is," Ismail told AFP. "It becomes clear there was no planning-this map is the first time there's a kind of urban planning for the camp," he said.

The mapping project was born when residents of Burj Al-Shamali, one of 12 Palestinian camps in Lebanon, wanted to create a local green space. They enlisted help from Claudia Martinez, a humanitarian worker who has volunteered in the camp for years. "I asked to see a map, but what they showed me was like a kid's drawing," she told AFP.

'We decided we needed a new map... which could also be useful to deal with problems of electricity grid, fires, and doing health inspections of restaurants." Lebanon is home to around 450,000 Palestinian refugees registered with the UN, who live in cramped camps where infrastructure is dilapidated and services limited. When it was established in 1948 to accommodate Palestinians who fled or were forced from their homes after the creation of Israel, Burj al-Shamali housed just 7,000 people. But it is now home to nearly 23,000 residents and suffers from "extremely high" unemployment, according to the UN Relief and Works Agency for Palestine refugees.

Phone stores, falafel shops

With Martinez's help, Burj Al-Shamali's residents raised more than \$16,000 in crowd-funding last year to finance a community-led project to map their camp. For days, Ismail and fellow volunteer Mustapha tied "one of those \$60 Canon cameras" to a red helium balloon and flew it over different parts of Burj Al-Shamali to take pictures. The young mappers laugh when recounting the challenges of guiding the balloon through the camp's chaotic maze of narrow

On one occasion, the balloon popped when they tried to squeeze it through a particularly narrow street. On another, celebratory gunfire from a nearby wedding shot their camera straight out of the air. Stitching the images together, mappers saw their camp from above for the first time: a monochrome grid of concrete rooftops dotted with water tanks and satellite dishes, broken up occasionally by a row of trees. To produce a real map, they printed large-scale copies of the composite image and invited camp residents to identify landmarks, but also annotate locations with relevant dates or associated memories. In February, curious residents gathered at Al-Houla, the community group that has spearheaded the initiative, to contribute their expertise.

They pored over the bird's eye pictures, trying to find their homes and taping neon pieces of paper identifying local landmarks like Abu Samer's bakery, Najwa's Nursery and the Old Mosque. "People were writing that shops opened a certain year, NGOs were established in this year, this year electricity came to the camp. There's a phone store here, a falafel restaurant there," Ismail said.

'We can create'

The annotated images have been sent to designers, who are working on finalizing the map, which will then be printed and distributed to camp residents. For Mahmoud Jumaa, who heads Al-Houla, the map will serve as "a message, carrying within its folds the concerns, problems and lifestyle of the camp."

Many residents had never used a map before, but now, "we can begin planning buildings-planning the future." Inspired by the densely packed concrete rooftops visible in the aerial images, Jumaa says there are already discussions about

creating urban gardening projects and then a full-fledged park later this year. "I was surprised that, despite the density, we can create," Jumaa, a lifelong camp resident, told AFP. "There is the possibility for innovation-there is a positive image despite all the difficulties."

Organizers say the map may also help make Burj Al-Shamali accessible to Lebanese citizens, whose impressions of Palestinian camps are often colored by stereotypes of the areas as hotbeds of crime and extremism. "There was a big interest (among residents) in building bridges with the Lebanese community, to say this place is not intimidating, you can move around," Martinez said. — AFP

MOSUL CIVILIANS DIVIDED OVER ARMY ADVICE TO STAY AT HOME

ARBIL: The first four months of the Iraqi offensive on Mosul were marked by relatively low displacement but the civilians who remain in the city's west face more dangers than ever. In the east, the Iraqi forces adopted a strategy of protecting civilians by keeping them at home, and the mass exodus expected by humanitarian organizations did not occur.

Since the Mosul offensive against the Islamic State group was launched in October, around 200,000 civilians are estimated to have fled their homes, and some 50,000 have already returned, according to the United Nations. In the early stages of the offensive, the army dropped tens of thousands of leaflets into Mosul, some bearing safety instructions for residents, most of whom remained in the city.

This prevented both sides from resorting to heavier weapons, avoiding large-scale destruction, as was the case in the battles of Fallujah and Ramadi. "We know that IS targets people who try to flee, causing many casualties." Abdulwahab Al-Saadi, a top commander of the elite Counter-Terrorism Service that did most of the fighting, told AFP. "Of course it would be easier for us to bomb the jihadists with heavy weapons if the city was emptied of its inhabitants, but as our main goal is to preserve the lives of civilians, we are convinced they will be better protected if they stay at home rather than try to flee," he said, stressing this strategy had been a "success" in the east.

'Better to flee'

It is a strategy that has been endorsed by some, including Hazem Ghanam, a 58-year-old resident who was in east Mosul during the battle. "It's a good plan, it worked for us in the eastern side," he said. Although he is worried about a brother and two nieces who live in the west, Ghanam said it is better to stay put. "Even though

IRAN DISMISSES US PRESSURE, CALLS FOR 'MUTUAL RESPECT'

MUNICH: Iran's foreign minister brushed aside new pressure from the United States yesterday, declaring that his country is "unmoved by threats" but responds well to respect. President Donald Trump has repeatedly criticized the 2015 nuclear agreement between Iran, the US and five other world powers, under which Tehran agreed to curb its uranium enrichment in exchange for the lifting of international sanctions, but hasn't said what he plans to do about it.

His administration has said Iran was "on notice" over a recent ballistic missile test, and imposed new sanctions on more than two dozen Iranian companies and individuals. "Iran doesn't respond well to threats," Iranian Foreign Minister Mohammad Javad Zarif told the Munich Security Conference, an annual gathering of top diplomats and defense officials. "We don't respond well to coercion. We don't respond well to sanctions, but we respond very well to mutual respect. We respond very well to arrangements to reach mutually acceptable scenarios."

"Iran is unmoved by threats," he said. "Everybody tested us for many years - all threats and coercions were imposed on us," Zarif added. He mocked "the concept of crippling sanctions," which he said didn't stop Iran acquiring thousands more centrifuges, used for enriching uranium, before talks with the US on the nuclear agreement got underway.

Regional rivals

Iran has always said it has no interest in nuclear weapons. Asked how long it would take to make one if it did decide it wanted such weapons, Zarif replied: "We are not going to produce nuclear weapons, period. So it will take forever for Iran to produce nuclear weapons." Iran's regional rivals aired a laundry list of grievances about Tehran's behavior, pointing to the wars in Syria and Yemen among other issues.

Saudi Arabia's foreign minister, Adel Al-Jubeir, argued that the Iranians "stepped up the tempo of their mischief" during the negotiations on the nuclear deal and have continued to do so since then. "I believe that Iran knows where the red lines are if the red lines are drawn clearly, and I believe that the world has to make it clear to the Iranians that there is certain behavior that will not be tolerated, and that there will be

consequences," Jubeir told the conference. "And those consequences have to be in tune with the financial side." Israeli Defense Minister Avigdor Lieberman insisted that the main challenges facing the region are "Iran, Iran and Iran."

Asked what approach he seeks against Iran, he replied: "It's a combination of economic pressure, very tough policy and of course to impose the resolutions of (the UN) Security Council, for example the ballistic missiles." Sen Lindsey Graham, a South Carolina Republican, said that Iran has been working to try and build a nuclear weapon, and "if they say they haven't, they're lying."

He proposed new sanctions in Iran for various reasons, including what he said were violations of U.N. resolutions and destabilizing the Mideast. "I think it is now time for the Congress to take Iran on directly," he said.

"I think most Republicans are on board with that concept and we'll see where President Trump's at." Jubeir said that he is "very optimistic about the Trump administration." "We see a president who's pragmatic and practical, a businessman, problem-solver, a man who's not an ideologue," he said.

"He wants America to play a role in the world. Our view is that when America disengages, it creates tremendous danger in the worlds, because it leaves vacuums." "He believes in destroying Daesh (the Islamic State group); so do we," Jubeir added. "He believes in containing Iran; so do we. He believes in working with traditional allies; so do we." — AP

TRUMP DRAFTS PLAN TO SPEED DEPORTATIONS

WASHINGTON: The Department of Homeland Security has prepared new guidance for immigration agents aimed at speeding up deportations by denying asylum claims earlier in the process. The new guidelines, contained in a draft memo dated February 17 but not yet sent to field offices, directs agents to only pass applicants who have a good chance of ultimately getting asylum, but does not give specific criteria for establishing credible fear of persecution if sent home.

The guidance instructs asylum officers to "elicit all relevant information" in determining whether an applicant has "credible fear" of persecution if returned home, the first obstacle faced by migrants on the US-Mexico border requesting asylum. Three sources familiar with the drafting of the guidance said the goal of the new instructions is to raise the bar on initial screening. The administration's plan is to leave wide discretion to asylum officers by allowing them to determine which applications have a "significant possibility" of being approved by an immigration court, the sources said. The guidance was first reported and posted on the internet by McClatchy news organization.

In 2015, just 18 percent of asylum applicants whose cases were ruled on by immigration judges were granted asylum, according to the Justice Department. Applicants from countries with a high rate of political persecution have a higher chance of winning their asylum cases. A tougher approach to asylum seekers would be an element of President Donald Trump's promise to crackdown on immigration and tighten border security, a cornerstone of his election campaign and a top priority of his first month in office. The DHS declined to comment for this story, referring questions to the White House, which did not respond to a request for comment.

What is 'credible fear'?

Under the Immigration and Nationality Act, an applicant must generally demonstrate "a well-founded fear of persecution on account of race, religion, nationality, membership in a particular social group, or political opinion." Immigration lawyers say any applicants who appear to meet that criteria in their initial interviews should be allowed to make their cases in court. They oppose encouraging asylum officers to take a stricter stance on questioning claims and rejecting applications.

Interviews to assess credible fear are conducted almost immediately after an asylum request is made, often at the border or in detention facilities by immigration agents or asylum officers, and most applicants easily clear that hurdle. Between July and September of 2016, U.S. asylum officers accepted nearly 88 percent of the claims of credible fear, according to U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services data.

Asylum seekers who fail the credible fear test can be quickly deported unless they file an appeal. Currently, those who pass the test are eventually released and allowed to remain in the United States awaiting hearings, which are often scheduled years into the future because of a backlog of more than 500,000 cases in immigration courts.

Between October 2015 and April 2016, nearly 50,000 migrants claimed credible fear, 78 percent of whom were from Honduras, El Salvador, Guatemala or Mexico, according to statistics from USCIS. The number of migrants from those three countries who passed credible fear and went to court to make their case for asylum rose sharply between 2011 and 2015, from 13,970 claims to 34,125, according to data from the Justice Department. Former border patrol chief Mike Fisher credits that trend to advice from immigration lawyers who know "asylum officers are going to err on the side of caution and refer most cases to a judge." The new guidance on asylum seekers is for border personnel implementing Trump's Jan. 25 executive order on tightening US border security. Among other measures, the president's directive calls for expediting eligibility claims of those attempting to stay in the United States and promptly deporting those whose claims are rejected. — Reuters

INMATES ABANDON THEIR GANG LIFE IN EL SALVADOR

SAN FRANCISCO GOTERA: Inside a Salvadaron prison Francisco Lopez teaches fellow ex-gang members how to make paper figurines, as part of a program designed to reinsert them into society once they are released. He is one of 460 inmates in El Salvador who have left one of the country's most vicious gangs, in a nation that along with neighboring Guatemala and Honduras makes up the "Northern Triangle" of Central

Their main claim to infamy is the gang violence that has propelled them to the top of the list of the most dangerous countries in the world, outside of actual war zones. Criminal outfits-dealing in murder, extortion and drugs-reign with terror over swaths of territory, often whole districts of cities and towns. Security forces clamp down on them, but any respite seems temporary. There are an estimated 70,000 gang members in El Salvador. But some, Lopez among them, have now abandoned their ranks.

"I want a new life," he said. "The streets were all danger and death." His organization was the Barrio 18 gang, and it was part of his life for 21 years-a period he says today was "wasted." "It was a crazy time that I badly lived through," the 38-year-old said on one of the patios in San Francisco Gotera prison in the country's northeast. "But it's never too late to change."

Preacher shows the way

The catalyst for many to ditch their brutal street "family" was inmate Edwin Chicas, who dropped Barrio 18 to become an evangelical preacher. His example prompted 460 other felons to follow suit-not only breaking with the gang but also converting to Christianity. The change brings with it an improvement to conditions behind

Inmates are no longer kept separate in the prison, in overcrowded cells and with no family visits. They are given the right to leave their cells daily and participate in religious classes and in training workshops. Most importantly, they are given opportunities to prepare for a different life, far from the brutish and often shortlived existence in the gangs.

Oscar Alirio Montano, 29, for instance, taught 60 prisoners the craft of turning mirrors into works of art. But while they have left the gangs, their past affiliation is still evident in tattoos. Alirio Montano, who is two-thirds of the way through his 15-year sentence, intends to go through a painful operation to remove the markings that cover him from head to toe.

'Getting rid of the past'

Designed to hold 400 inmates, the San Francisco Gotera penitentiary has a population nearly three times that: 1,122 prisoners. The sentences are lengthy — some have terms of over 100 years-for crimes including murder, extortion and belonging to a criminal organization. Overcrowding is so bad that prisoners have to sleep in hammocks strung up one on top the other.

Part of the way they prove they have left the gang involves the exmembers cleaning off Barrio 18 graffiti in the three wings where they are held, coating the walls in green and brown paint instead. "We are getting rid of the past that inspired respect and fear of the gang," Chicas said. One of the workshops offered to the gangfree prisoners is in English, taught by Edwin Garcia. The 36-year-old spent 23 years in the United States before being deported and later incarcerated for drug trafficking and weapon possession.

"I was deported from the US for the bad things I did. They grabbed me from home in 2010," he said, without elaborating further. He has served half of his six-year sentence. In a literacy and numeracy workshop-a popular activity with 60 enrolled the level is "beginner," explained one of the four teachers, Marvin Arias, 24.

Over in the guitar lesson, Alexander Lara, 22, and Neftali Escobar, 35, teach tunes with titles like "I'm changing for El Salvador" and "I want a better future." For those looking to shake off their violent, clannish past, there are glimmers of a different future. For other prisoners, though, sticking to the gangs, "the treatment will be drastic," warned the prison warden, Oscar Benavides. "They will learn that society is fed up" with gangs, he said. — AFP

AS TRUMP FORGES POLICIES, TILLERSON SHUNS SPOTLIGHT

Proving to be everything his extroverted boss is not

WASHINGTON: When North Korea fired a ballistic missile into waters between South Korea and Japan, President Donald Trump moved quickly to show US resolve. He appeared within hours alongside visiting Japanese Prime Minister Shinzo Abe and said the US "stands behind Japan, its great ally, 100 percent."

Trump happened to be hosting Abe that day in Florida. Yet his lack of any mention of US treaty ally South Korea didn't go unnoticed by new Secretary of State Rex Tillerson. So, while on his first official trip, Tillerson arranged a three-way meeting in Germany with the Japanese and South Korean foreign ministers to show the US wasn't picking favorites, according to a senior State Department official.

The talks culminated in a joint declaration in which the US pledged to defend a pair of Asian nations that don't always get along. There was no elaborate ceremony before the video cameras, no speeches, as their written statement went out in low-key fashion. It was Tillerson's way.

Cautious, reserved and intent on avoiding the spotlight, the former Exxon Mobil CEO is proving to be everything his extroverted Oval Office boss is not. In his first weeks as America's top diplomat, Tillerson has gone to great lengths to avoid attracting attention, despite a growing perception in Washington that the State Department is being sidelined by a power-centric White House.

Staffing cuts

Some State Department officials have been told by the White House to expect drastic budget cuts, with much of the reduction potentially coming out of US foreign aid money. Trump and his team have also told those interviewing for top State Department jobs that significant staffing cuts will come. Some appear to have started already.

While Tillerson was in Germany, several senior management and advisory positions were eliminated. The staffers were reassigned. Some other top posts are vacant, and there are no signs they'll be quickly filled. While Tillerson has met or spoken with dozens of foreign counterparts in his first weeks, the White House is driving the frontpage diplomacy. The lack of State Department involvement has flustered many long-time diplomats. When Trump met Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu last week, acting Deputy Secretary Tom Shannon was assigned to represent the agency in the meeting because Tillerson was flying to Germany. At the last minute, Shannon was blocked from participating in the meeting. The meeting went on without State Department representation.

It was "modified to allow for a more personal discussion," according to a US official, who was authorized to discuss the matter publicly and spoke on condition of anonymity. Tillerson had dined the evening before with Netanyahu and Jared Kushner, Trump's son-in-law and a White House aide who has emerged as Trump's top emissary to Israel, Mexico and other countries. That is a role that traditionally has fallen to the secretary of state.

Sharp contrast to Kerry

Tillerson has barely spoken in public, save for greeting US diplomats on his first day and brief comments after a get-together with Russia's foreign minister. It's a sharp contrast with the Obama administration's last secretary of state, John Kerry, who routinely found his way to the center of global crises, enthusiastically fulfilling the "public diplomacy" part of the job. Whereas Kerry exhausted staff with impromptu, whirlwind foreign trips and constant press appearances, Tillerson has made it known to his staff that he wants a lower profile.

In private, the Texas oilman with the booming baritone voice is deliberate, independent and cool-headed, according to US and foreign diplomats who have interacted with him and spoke on condition of anonymity in order to avoid possible diplomatic fallout from discussing private conversations. A common thread in Tillerson's meetings with diplomats has been an emphasis on safety of US personnel, State Department officials said. — AP





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DUTCH MUSLIM GROUPS SLAM WILDERS' 'SCUM' COMMENTS

the Netherlands yesterday criticized disparaging comments about Moroccans made by anti-Islam lawmaker Geert Wilders, but say they are just the latest in a long string of insults. Launching his campaign Saturday for the Netherlands' March 15 parliamentary election, Wilders criticized Moroccan youths for making the Netherlands unsafe, although he qualified the comments by saying they didn't apply to all Moroccans.

"If a Dutch person driving in a car drives five miles too fast he will be fined scum in Holland - once again, not all are scum, but there is a lot of Moroccan scum in Holland who makes the streets unsafe mostly young people and they are not taken seriously," Wilders said at his first campaign event in the blue collar town of Spijkenisse.

Ebubekir Ozture, director of the Muslim umbrella group Contact Organ Muslims and Government, called Wilders comments "reprehensible," but added that Moroccans and Muslims are accustomed to such outbursts from Wilders, whose polls less than a month from the election.

Appealing the conviction

"It is not the first time and probably won't be the last time," that Wilders has used such language, Ozture said in a telephone interview. "He has said worse things about Moroccans and Muslims. As crazy as it sounds, people are a bit used to it from him." Wilders was convicted late last year of inciting discrimination and insulting a group for anti-Moroccan comments he made before and after conviction "political."

Wilders is appealing the conviction, which centered on comments he made before and after Dutch municipal elections in 2014. At one meeting in a Hague cafe, he asked supporters whether they wanted more or fewer Moroccans in the Netherlands. That sparked a chant of "Fewer! Fewer!" - to which he replied, "we'll take care of it."

Wilders has a long history of criticizing Islam and Moroccans he says are responsible for a disproportionate amount of

THE HAGUE: Muslim organizations in within a minute whereas the Moroccan Party for Freedom is riding high in opinion local elections in 2014. He branded the street crime in the Netherlands. His onepage election manifesto also is strongly anti-Islam, vowing to ban the Quran, shut the country's mosques and halt all immigration from Muslim nations. Abdou Menebhi of the Euro-Mediterranean Center for Migration and Development said he expects more such comments in the future. Menebhi filed one of the many complaints that led to Wilders' prosecution last year. "Wilders is not going to stop," Menebhi said in a telephone interview. "He is still spreading hate and discriminating against Moroccans and Muslims." — AP

EUROPE WONDERS IF TRUMP WILL ACT ON PENCE'S REASSURANCES

EUROPEAN LEADERS REMAIN SKEPTICAL ON ADMINISTRATION'S PROMISES

MUNICH: Vice President Mike Pence was the latest in a trio of high-ranking Trump emissaries to tell European allies in person that the United States will steadfastly support NATO and demand that Russia honor its commitments to end fighting in Ukraine.

Some European leaders, however, remain skeptical of whether Pence and the US secretaries of state and defense actually speak for President Donald Trump. And they worry those declarations might easily be swept away at the whim of the mercurial American president. "We are waiting for actions," said Polish President Andrzei Duda. "We only know what the media has reported and the statements that we've got.

imposed on Russia over its intervention in Ukraine could be eased in exchange for a nuclear arms deal.

'Our country's so innocent?'

Trump also raised eyebrows when he appeared to draw parallels between Russia and the US when Bill O'Reilly of Fox News referred to Russian President Vladimir Putin as "a killer." Trump replied: "We've got a lot of killers. What do you think? Our country's so innocent?" In the days before his inauguration, Trump referred to NATO as "obsolete" in an interview, but said the 28-nation alliance remained important to him. He has since tempered his language and

served as homeland security secretary under President George W Bush, noted that Pence's comments were in line with similar assurances given by US Defense Secretary Jim Mattis during a NATO meeting in Brussels earlier in the week.

"They've all been consistent about the fact that there is a strong, deep and enduring commitment to Europe and to NATO and I think that message has been received," Chertoff said. The same day Mattis was in Brussels, US Secretary of State Rex Tillerson met with his Russian counterpart in Bonn, Germany, saying afterward that Russia must adhere to a 2015 deal to end fighting between Ukrainian forces and Russia-backed separatists in eastern Ukraine. But whether Trump intends to put Pence's words into action remained a front-and-center issue at the Munich Security Conference.

No doubts

German Vice Chancellor Sigmar Gabriel was pressed after Pence's speech on whether he had doubts about Trump's commitment to NATO. "I have no doubts that the American vice president, and also the defense minister, will do everything to take responsibility within NATO as in the past, and I don't think there is a big argument inside the American government," said Gabriel, who also is Germany's foreign minister. Asked about Trump's commitment, he said, "Since I haven't spoken to him, I can only say what I discussed with Mr. Pence - I did that and there are no doubts there."

Jeff Rathke, a senior fellow with the Center for Strategic and International Studies in Washington, said Pence's words were likely reassuring to Europeans in light of the similar affirmations from Mattis and Tillerson. "But everyone is aware that this is tentative until it is reaffirmed by the president in his own words," Rathke said in an email. "One tweet or statement casting doubt on the Europeans or on NATO will call back into question all of what Pence and Mattis have been saying."

Democrats are still stung by the conclusion by intelligence agencies that Russia meddled in the 2016 US presidential campaign to help Trump defeat Democrat Hillary Clinton. And they have continued to argue that Irump remains a major liability on the world stage. ECUADOR IN KEY ELECTION FOR LATIN AMERICAN LEFT

QUITO: Ecuador voted yesterday in general elections that could see a pillar of the Latin American left swing to the right at an economic turning point for the oil-rich nation. The vote puts in question the legacy of outgoing leftist President Rafael Correa, who is marking the end of 10 years and three terms in power. The outspoken critic of the United States is not running for re-election. It could also alter the fate of WikiLeaks founder Julian Assange. The two leading conservative candidates have said that if they win, they will evict him from Ecuador's London embassy where he has taken refuge for fear of extradition to the United States.

Continuity or change

Economist Correa, 53, initially oversaw a boom in the oil-rich country of 16 million. Now, "what is at stake are two visions of society, two visions of development, two visions of the state," he said of yesterday's election. Voters must decide whether to continue his Socialist agenda by electing his ally Lenin Moreno, or to follow Argentina, Brazil and Peru in switching to a conservative government. Moreno, who leads in opinion polls, promises to continue Correa's tax-and-spend social policies. "The Ecuadoran people have affection (for us) and are determined to continue with this process," the 63-year-old told AFP.

21st-century socialism

But in an uncertain contest, Moreno faces a challenge from conservative exbanker Guillermo Lasso, 61, second in the opinion polls. He has vowed to cut spending and taxes, lure foreign investment and create a million jobs. He has also slammed Correa's allies over alleged links to a corruption scandal. "We have to vote for change to fight against corruption," Lasso said at a campaign rally on Wednesday.

The third-placed candidate is conservative former lawmaker Cynthia Viteri, 51. Correa says Latin America needs a strong leftist movement to resist US President Donald Trump's hard line on immigration and trade. But Lasso and Viteri have shown more willingness to work with Washington since Trump's election victory in November.

Franco Sandoval, a student in Quito, said he will vote "for a change." "The ones who are in power have been there for a long time. They have done their job," he told AFP. "But at some point they go off the rails." Ecuador exports half a million barrels of oil a day. Correa used the wealth to fund social welfare schemes and public works. He called it "21st-century socialism."

But oil prices have plunged over the past three years, with Ecuador's economy shrinking by 1.7 percent last year. Correa is accused of failing to save any petrodollars for a rainy day, and of hampering businesses with high taxes and duties. "Whoever becomes president will have to dig the grave of '21st century socialism," Alberto Acosta-Burneo, an economist at the Spurrier Group consultancy, told AFP. "It is no longer viable in the current economic

Close contest

Opinion polls indicate Moreno will likely win Sunday's first-round vote. But his lead may not be big enough to avoid a runoff on April 2 against a conservative rival, most likely Lasso. Analysts say voters fed up with Correa may then rally behind whichever conservative candidate gets through. Polls show a high ratio of undecided voters.

"Any party could beat the governing one in the second round, because there is major resistance to and rejection of the government," said political scientist Paolo Moncagatta of Quito's San Francisco University. But Michael Shifter of the Inter-American Dialogue think tank in Washington cautioned: "It is a mistake to underestimate the strength of support for Correa's side." Polling stations opened at 1200 GMT and were due to close at 2200 GMT. — AFP

AS MUGABE TURNS 93, AN ANXIOUS ZIMBABWE WONDERS WHO'S NEXT

HARARE: As the world's oldest head of state approaches his 93rd birthday tomorrow, Zimbabwe has been planning a party for thousands of people in honor of President Robert Mugabe. For weeks, state television has led its broadcasts with tributes. But those closest to Mugabe, who has led this southern African nation for nearly four decades, appear to be finally looking ahead to a future without him, amid uncertainty.

The ruling ZANU-PF party has already endorsed Mugabe as its candidate in next year's election, and the president has declared that he would like to live until he's 100 and rule for life. In an interview published Sunday ahead of his birthday, Mugabe said he wasn't ready to step down, adding that he would not groom a successor either.

'No replacement'

"A successor is groomed by the people. The majority of the people feel that there is no replacement; a successor who to them is acceptable, as acceptable as I am," he was quoted as saying by the state-run Sunday Mail newspaper. Analysts say recent statements by his wife, however, might be more telling as Mugabe shows signs of slowing down. Headlining her first political rally in months on Friday, First Lady Grace Mugabe spoke to a crowd of thousands not about the birthday celebrations but about the possibility of her husband's death.

"If God decides to take him, then we would rather field him as a corpse" in the upcoming election, she said. "We will put his name on the ballot paper just to show that people love their president." The first lady has previously said she would get her husband a wheelchair if necessary and push it for him so that he can continue to rule. Attention, however, is on a post-Mugabe scenario, said political analyst Alexander Rusero. In the event of the president's death, resignation or incapacity, the first vice-president takes over for the remainder of the term, according to the constitution. The catch is that Zimbabwe has two vice presidents. Both belong to bitterly opposing factions and neither is designated as the official first vice president. This could mean a messy succession, say legal experts. "But then, that is how Mugabe has played it all along, ensuring that his succession remains a mystery by playing one faction against the other," said Gabriel Shumba, a human rights lawyer and chairman of the South Africa-based Zimbabwe Exiles Forum. "It may have served him well, but the downside is that Zimbabwe will be plunged into horrible uncertainty once he is gone."

International pariah

Mugabe has led the ZANU-PF party since 1975 and has been the country's leader since 1980, when Zimbabwe attained independence from white minority rule. Admired as a statesman during the early years of independence for reconciling with the country's former colonizers, Mugabe later became an international pariah following alleged human rights abuses and electoral irregularities. The country's once-prosperous economy is imploding, bringing more pressure from the opposition and frustration from a restless population. The government has failed to pay salaries on time since June, public hospital doctors are on strike and cash shortages are driving the economy to the edge. — AP

Malaysia searches for N Korean SUSPECTS WHO HAVE FLED COUNTRY

MURDER DRAMA CONTINUES HOLLYWOOD-LIKE PLOT

KUALA LUMPUR: Investigators are looking for four North Korean men who flew out of Malaysia the same day Kim Jong Nam, the North Korean ruler's outcast half brother, apparently was poisoned at an airport in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysian police said yesterday. Since Kim's death last week, authorities have been trying to piece together details of what appeared to be an assassination. Malaysian police have so far arrested four people carrying IDs from North Korea, Malaysia, Indonesia and Vietnam.

One of the suspects in custody, an Indonesian woman, told investigators that she was duped into thinking she was part of a comedy show prank. Yesterday, Malaysia's deputy national police chief, Noor Rashid Ibrahim, said four more suspects were on the run. He said the men were North Korean and had flown out of

the country last Monday, when Kim died.

"I am not going disclose where they are," he told a room packed with journalists, adding that Interpol was helping with the investigation. Noor Rashid showed photographs of the four men, who were traveling on regular - not diplomatic passports and are ages 33, 34, 55 and 57. He also said there were three other people police wanted to question. He said one was North Korean, but that police had not yet identified the other two. It wasn't clear if they were suspects or simply wanted for questioning.

Autopsy results

A rotund man in his mid-40s, Kim Jong Nam was waiting for his flight home to Macau when, authorities say, he was set upon by two women. He sought help at a customer service desk and said "two unidentified women had swabbed or had wiped his face with a liquid and that he felt dizzy," Noor Rashid said yesterday. Kim died en route to a hospital after suffering a seizure, officials say.

Noor Rashid said yesterday that he expected autopsy results to be released within days. "We have to send a sample to the chemistry department, we have to send a sample for toxicology tests," he said. Investigators also want to speak to Kim Jong Nam's next of kin to formally identify the body. He is believed to have two sons and a daughter with two women living in Beijing and Macau.

"We haven't met the next of kin," Noor Rashid said. "We are working, we are trying very hard to get the next of kin to come and to assist us in the investigation." The case has raised tensions between Malaysia and North Korea. Pyongyang demanded custody of Kim's body and strongly objected to an autopsy. The Malaysians went ahead with the procedure anyway, saying they were simply following procedure.

Kang Chol, North Korea's ambassador to Malaysia, said that Malaysia may be "trying to conceal something" and that the autopsy was carried out "unilaterally and excluding our attendance." South Korea has been quick to blame its enemies in North Korea for Kim's death. "Considering North Korea has so far committed crimes against humanity and terror acts, we, together with the international community, are closely watching this brutal, reckless incident with serious concerns," South Korean Unification Ministry spokesman Jeong Joon Hee told reporters yesterday. — AP

"We also urge the US to refrain from challenging China's sovereignty and security and to respect regional countries' efforts to maintain peace and stability in the South China

WASHINGTON: A US aircraft carrier strike group is patrolling in the South China Sea, the US Navy said Saturday, days after Beijing told Washington not to challenge its sovereignty in the waterway. China

11 pilgrims drown during Sri Lanka church festival

COLOMBO: At least 11 people including a child and five women drowned when an overcrowded boat carrying Christian pilgrims capsized in rough seas off Sri Lanka's southwest coast yesterday, police said. The victims had set off in a parade of fishing boats from the tourist resort of Beruwala but halfway into their journey their craft overturned in choppy seas, police said. "Other fishing boats and volunteers have been able to rescue 32 people, but we still do not have a count on the number of people on board," a police officer in the area told AFP by telephone. He said searches by navy boats as well as aircraft were hampered by heavy winds and rain. Sunday's boat parade came amid a warning to fishing communities from the meteorological department of winds up to 80 kilometers an hour. Yesterday's tragedy was the worst boat disaster since June 2013 when 54 fishermen were killed after several boats capsized during a freak storm in the same area. — Agencies

CHINA STAGES ANOTHER MASS ANTI-TERROR RALLY IN XINJIANG

BEIJING: Chinese security forces have staged another mass anti-terror rally in the restive far western region of Xinjiang, parading hundreds of armed men through the streets of the regional capital Urumqi in a show of force after an uptick in violence. Hundreds have died in Xinjiang in the past few years, mostly in unrest between the Muslim Uighur people, who call the region home, and the ethnic majority Han Chinese. Beijing blames the unrest on Islamist militants.

The Xinjiang government's news website on Saturday showed pictures of hundreds of gun-toting police and soldiers standing in front of a government building shouting out pledges to defeat terror and lines of armored vehicles driving though the streets. Xinjiang deputy party secretary Zhu Hailun said the Urumqi rally, following on from ones in Kashgar and Hotan in Xinjiang's Uighur heartland in the region's deep south, were a sign of "real action" to deepen the fight against terror.

Militants and extremists would be "smashed and destroyed", Zhu said. The official Xinjiang Daily on Sunday further quoted Zhu as saying at the Saturday rally that no effort would be spared in this regard. "With guns by our bodies, knives unsheathed, fists out and hands extended, we must use thunderous power to strike hard against terrorist activities," Zhu said.

After a period of relative calm, there has been a rise in violence in recent weeks, particularly in the region's south. On Tuesday, three knife-wielding attackers killed five people and injured another five in Pishan County before themselves being shot dead in Hotan prefecture. In December, five people were killed when attackers drove a vehicle into a government building and police shot dead what authorities described as three terror suspects last month. The government has blamed much of the unrest on separatist Islamist militants, though rights groups and exiles say anger at tightening Chinese controls on the religion and culture of Muslim Uighurs is more to blame. China routinely denies any repression in Xinjiang. —Reuters

CHINA UNDERSTANDS S KOREAN SECURITY NEEDS, OPPOSES MISSILES

BEIJING: China understands South Korea's need to protect its security but Seoul still needs to respect Beijing's concerns about the deployment of an advanced US antimissile system, Chinese Foreign Minister Wang Yi told his South Korean counterpart. China has repeatedly expressed opposition to South Korea's planned deployment later this year of the US Terminal High Altitude Area Defence (THAAD) system, which Seoul and Washington say is needed to defend

against North Korea. China worries the system's powerful radar can penetrate its territory and it has objected to the deployment. Meeting on Saturday on the sidelines of the Munich Security Conference, Wang repeated to South Korea's Foreign Minister Yun Byungse China's opposition to THAAD, China's Foreign Ministry said in a statement on Sunday. Wang "stressed that one country's security should not be founded on the basis of harming another country's security", the ministry paraphrased him as saying. "China understands South Korea's need to protect its own security, and at the same time South Korea should respect China's reasonable position," Wang added. Yun Fu Ying, chairwoman of the foreign affairs committee in the Chinese National People's Congress, told a panel discussion at the Munich conference that China could not understand Washington's decision to deploy the system to South Korea.

'Stabbed by your friends'

"It is like being stabbed by your friends," she said, adding the system would not increase South Korea's security anyway. But Yun Byung-se told the panel the system was needed to augment Seoul's existing Patriot missile defence system and guard against the kind of high-arc shot used by North Korea in its last test. "What we need is multiple layers of defense ... THAAD is really relevant," he said. "We don't pose any threat to China." Yun Byung-se said North Korea launched two nuclear tests and 24 missiles last year alone and was nearing the final stage of nuclear weaponisation. "In our analysis, the tipping point may be only a few years away," he told conference participants. "It's a ticking time bomb." Wang told Yun Byung-se that efforts to seek peace with North Korea should not be abandoned, the ministry said. —Reuters

HUNDREDS OF ROHINGYA RETURN FROM BANGLADESH

DHAKA: Hundreds of Rohingya who fled to Bangladesh to escape persecution in Myanmar have returned home, community leaders said yesterday, adding that most had gone back temporarily to fetch relatives. Tens of thousands of Rohingya have fled across the border from Myanmar's western state of Rakhine since October to escape a bloody crackdown by troops and police. Dudu Mia, a refugee camp leader in the coastal town of Teknaf, said nearly 1,000 Rohingya-mostly young men-had returned to their home villages to collect elderly family members left behind earlier.

"Most of those men are hoping to bring their relatives back to Bangladesh. It's been four months and they have barely even talked to their parents back home," Mia told AFP. Myanmar's army has halted its operations in the north of Rakhine, a senior official said last week, ending the four-month crackdown which the UN has warned may amount to crimes against humanity.

Hundreds from the Rohingya Muslim minority are thought to have died and almost 70,000 have fled to Bangladesh since the military launched a campaign to find militants who attacked police border posts. Bangladeshi authorities estimate 400,000 Rohingya refugees are now living in Bangladesh, including the 70,000 most recent arrivals. Escapees have given harrow-

ing accounts of how security forces raped, killed and tortured Rohingya and burnt their houses to the ground.

Another Rohingya leader said some of the refugees had left Bangladesh permanently because their home villages had not been damaged by the Myanmar army and they had properties to protect. "They left (their homes) because they were panicked. They didn't want to stay here as beggars, rather they would live in their own houses and work at land back home," he said on condition of anonymity. The Border Guard Bangladesh confirmed that some Rohingya refugees had gone back to Myanmar.

"Scores of Rohingya people have reportedly returned home in last few days," said local commander Abujar Al-Jahid. "But we're remaining on high alert about any illegal infiltration." A satellite image published last year by Human Rights Watch showed how Myanmar troops burned down Rohingya villages, displacing thousands. Most of the Rohingya who fled to Bangladesh are now living in squalid conditions in refugee camps in the Cox's Bazar district, which borders Rakhine and is also home to the country's biggest tourist resort. Bangladesh has already approved a controversial plan for their relocation to an island and instructed officials to identify undocumented Myanmar nationals as part of the campaign. —AFP

Sweden's embassy in Washington has asked for an explanation, the foreign ministry in Stockholm said yesterday. "We have now contacted the American (State Department) to understand and receive clarity," ministry press officer Catarina Axelsson told AFP. Users on Twitter, Trump's favorite communication platform, cracked jokes about the apparent miscue using the hashtags #lastnightinSweden and #SwedenIncident. Former Swedish prime minister Carl Bildt asked: "Sweden? Terror attack? What has he been smoking? Questions abound."

Gunnar Hokmark, a Swedish member of the European Parliament, retweeted a post that said "#lastnightinSweden my son dropped his hotdog in the campfire. So sad!" Hokmark added his own comment: "How could he know?" Numerous Internet wags responded with Ikea-themed tweets. Some posted photos of the impossible-to-understand instructions for assembling Ikea furniture, calling it "Secret Plans for the #SwedenIncident." Addressing Trump in an article yesterday, the Aftonbladet tabloid wrote, "This happened in Sweden Friday night, Mr President," and then listed in English some events that included a man being treated for severe burns, an

avalanche warning and police chasing a drunken driver.

Posts flooded into @sweden, the country's official Twitter account which is run by a different Swede each week. This week's curator, Emma, who describes herself as a school librarian and mother, said the account had received 800 mentions in four hours. "No. Nothing has happened here in Sweden. There has not (been) any terrorist attacks here. At all. The main news right now is about Melfest," she said, referring to the competition to pick the performer who will represent Sweden at the Eurovision singing contest.

Top Trump aides in his month-old administration have faced criticism and ridicule after speaking publicly about massacres that never took place. White House counselor Kellyanne Conway - who famously coined the term "alternative facts" - referred to a "Bowling Green massacre" during an interview. She later tweeted that she meant to say "Bowling Green terrorists" - referring to two Iraqi men who were indicted in 2011 for trying to send money and weapons to Al-Qaeda, and using improvised explosive devices against US soldiers in Iraq. And White House spokesman Sean Spicer made three separate references in one week to an attack in Atlanta. He later said he meant to say Orlando, the Florida city where an American of Afghan origin gunned down 49 people at a gay nightclub last year. — AFP

The jihadists overran Mosul and swathes of other territory north and west of Baghdad in 2014, routing security forces ill-prepared to face the assault. The Iraqi government launched the offensive to reconquer Mosul on Oct 17, throwing tens of thousands of forces into the long-awaited counter-attack with air and ground support from a US-led coalition fighting IS in Iraq and Syria. The Joint Operations Command coordinating the fight against IS declared east Mosul "fully liberated" on Jan 24. But it took Iraq's most seasoned forces - the elite Counter-Terrorism Service - more than two months to clear the eastern side of Mosul.

After a pause, federal forces now face what was

always billed as the toughest nut to crack: Mosul's west bank, home to the narrow streets of the Old City. "West Mosul had the potential certainly of being more difficult, with house-to-house fighting on a larger and more bloody scale," said Patrick Skinner, from the Soufan Group intelligence consultancy. The coalition said it carried out a total of 40 air strikes on Saturday, nine of which struck targets in the Mosul area.

"The US forces continue in the same role they were in in east Mosul and the coalition forces are in support of this operation," US Defence Secretary James Mattis told reporters while on a trip to the United Arab Emirates. More than half of the 9,000-plus coalition forces deployed in Iraq are American and some were visible on the frontline yesterday. — AFP

"Iran remains the single main sponsor of terrorism in the world," Jubeir told delegates at the conference. "It's determined to upend the order in the Middle East ... (and) until and unless Iran changes its behavior it would be very difficult to deal with a country like this."

Jubeir said Iran was propping up the government of President Bashar Al-Assad in the Syrian civil war, funding the Houthi movement in Yemen and fomenting violence across the region. The international community needed to set clear "red lines" to halt Iran's actions, he said, calling for banking, travel and trade restrictions aimed at changing Tehran's behavior.

Israeli Defense Minister Avigdor Lieberman said Iran's ultimate objective was to undermine Riyadh, and called for a dialogue with Sunni Arab countries to defeat "radical" elements in the region. "The real division is not Jews, Muslims ... but moderate people versus radical people," Lieberman told delegates. Turkish Foreign Minister Mevlut Cavusoglu also criticized what he called an Iranian "sectarian policy" aimed at undermining Bahrain and Saudi Arabia. "Turkey is very much against any kind of division, religious or sectarian," he said. "It's good that we are now normalizing our relations with Israel."

Zarif opened yesterday's session with the call for dialogue to address "anxieties" in the region. This followed a visit by Iranian President Hassan Rouhani to Oman and Kuwait last week to try to improve ties, his first visit to the Gulf states since taking power in 2013. Asked if Iran's envisioned regional dialogue could include Israel, Zarif said Tehran was looking at a more "modest" approach. "I'm focusing on the...Gulf. We have enough problems in this region so we want to start a dialogue with countries we call brothers in Islam," he said. Zarif dismissed any suggestions his country would ever seek to develop nuclear weapons. When asked about the new US administration's tough rhetoric on Iran's role in the region and calls to review the nuclear deal, he said

Tehran did not respond well to threats or sanctions.

Separately, Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu met secretly with Arab rulers last year to hear then US secretary of state John Kerry pitch a regional peace plan, an Israeli newspaper reported yesterday. Egyptian President Abdel Fattah Al-Sisi also attended the Feb 2016 talks hosted by King Abdullah II in the Jordanian city of Aqaba, Haaretz said, citing former senior officials in the Obama administration who asked to remain anonymous. Palestinian President Mahmoud Abbas did not attend the Aqaba meeting but was updated by Kerry, Haaretz said.

It said Kerry wanted the sides to endorse six principles, which he laid out publicly in a December speech. They included a call for Israel to vacate territory it occupied during the 1967 Six-Day War, subject to land swaps agreed between the two sides. Kerry's parameters envisioned a Palestinian state, with Palestinians recognizing Israel as a "Jewish state". Both would share Jerusalem as the "internationally recognized capital of the two states". "Netanyahu did not accept Kerry's proposal and said he would have difficulty getting it approved by his governing coalition," Haaretz wrote.

Meeting on Wednesday at the White House, Netanyahu and US President Donald Trump each spoke of prospects of a regional Middle East understanding to end the stalemated Israeli-Palestinian conflict. "For the first time in the life of my country, Arab countries in the region do not see Israel as an enemy, but increasingly as an ally," Netanyahu told Trump. Trump said Netanyahu's proposal for a regional alliance was something that "hasn't been discussed before", adding that it would take in "many, many countries and it would cover a very large territory".

Egypt and Jordan are the only Arab states to have formal peace treaties with Israel. Gulf states like Saudi Arabia, the United Arab Emirates and Qatar do not have diplomatic relations with the Jewish State, but they share informal links.— Agencies

In another development, 15 lawmakers yesterday signed a statement urging new Health Minister Jamal Al-Harbi to take swift actions against senior officials in the ministry, whom they held responsible for a serious deterioration in the ministry and widespread corruption. The lawmakers said that there are attempts to protect corrupt elements in the health ministry by owners of highly suspicious contracts and called on the minister to forge ahead with reforms in the vital ministry. They also called on the prime minister to back the health minister in his work to apply reform decisions.

MP Humoud Al-Hajeri said that it is not acceptable to see infighting within the ministry between the minister and some senior officials and that the problem must be resolved. A number of other lawmakers, however, came to the defense of senior officials in the health ministry, insisting that they have been performing their duties in the best way. The issue is expected to snowball in the coming weeks, especially because the ministry is responsible for sending Kuwaiti patients for treatment abroad and some MPs charge that this has been misused by officials to send "undeserved" patients for political reasons. Some say the cost of such actions ballooned to around KD 750 million last year.

out the way ahead and our people speak," he said. "We don't have any disarray inside the military and that's where my responsibility lies."

Military commanders in the region say they have so far seen little impact from the presidential transition. Mattis also referred to Trump's continued diatribe against journalists and his branding of several media outlets as the "enemy of the American people". "I have had some rather contentious times with the press," said Mattis, a former Marine general whose fiery war talk has landed him in hot water on several occasions. "But the press as far as I am concerned are a constituency that we deal with, and I don't have any issues with the press myself," he told reporters. — Agencies

PR OFFENSIVE FAILS TO QUELL EUROPE'S ANXIETY ON TRUMP

ne month into the unusual presidency of Donald Trump, his most senior cabinet members were deployed to Brussels, Bonn and Munich this week to reassure nervous Europeans that everything would be okay. The Europeans heard from Defense Secretary James Mattis that the NATO military alliance was not "obsolete" after all, despite Trump's repeated suggestions to the contrary. And they were told by Vice President Mike Pence that Russia would be "held accountable" for its actions in Ukraine, despite Trump's friendly overtures to Russian President Vladimir Putin.

But if the aim of the visits was to reassure Europe that the pillars of U.S. foreign policy are fully intact, they fell short of the mark, European diplomats, politicians and analysts gathered in Munich said. "What we heard here is not reassuring," Ruprecht Polenz, former head of the foreign affairs committee in the German parliament, told Reuters after Pence's speech to the Munich Security Conference. "There is absolutely no vision for how we are going to work together, going forward."

Pence was the highest-ranking member of the Trump team to travel to Europe and his address was eagerly awaited. Eight years ago in the same hall, his predecessor Joe Biden made headlines with a promise to "reset" relations with Russia. But unlike Biden, Pence came to Munich with a fatal handicap: the perception, fuelled by the circumstances surrounding the recent resignation of national security adviser Michael Flynn, that he is not part of Trump's inner circle. "His mission was always going to be hard, but it was made even more so by the questions about his lack of influence inside the White House," said Derek Chollet, a top defence policy adviser to former president Barack Obama who is now with the German Marshall Fund of the United States.

'Robotic Salute'

The vice president tried to tackle these doubts head-on by making clear at the start of his speech that he was speaking for Trump. But then he went on to mention the president 19 times in the course of the 20-minute speech, prompting one audience member, the author and historian Robert Kagan, to dismiss the address as a "robotic salute to the man in power". "Pence and Mattis and Tillerson can come here and talk about the importance of the transatlantic relationship and NATO - and that is all good," said Elmar Brok, head of the foreign affairs committee of the European Parliament and a party ally of German Chancellor Angela Merkel. "But we don't know what's coming on Twitter tomorrow morning," he said, referring to Trump's penchant for spilling out policy statements via social media.

Flynn's resignation has deepened the mystery over who Trump will listen to on foreign policy, although his chief strategist Steve Bannon and son-in-law Jared Kushner are both seen as influential. One European diplomat likened the challenge of figuring out who to listen to in the Trump administration to the task of "Kremlinologists" during the Cold War.

Ulrich Speck, a foreign policy analyst at the Elcano think tank in Brussels, said the conundrum that Henry Kissinger evoked when he famously asked who he should call when he wanted to talk to "Europe" seemed to have been turned on its head. "Now Europe is asking who it should call if it wants to talk to the United States," Speck said. Besides his reassurances on NATO and Russia relations, Pence tried to assuage fears that the United States is moving away from democratic values under Trump, who has attacked the media and judiciary repeatedly since taking power a month ago. "This is President Trump's promise," Pence said. "We will stand with Europe, today and every day, because we are bound together by the same noble ideals - freedom, democracy, justice, and the rule of law."


EU support

This message was welcomed, but others went down poorly. Pence raised eyebrows by suggesting that the nuclear deal between the world's major powers and Iran, which has strong support across Europe, was freeing up resources for Tehran to promote terrorism. And his repeated references to "radical Islamic terrorism" irked some who feel the Trump administration is targeting all Muslims in its fight against extremists. Merkel explicitly warned against this in a speech just before Pence spoke.

Some audience members were also dismissive of Pence's promise to relegate Islamic State to the "ashheap of history", saying such hyperbolic rhetoric was better suited to a U.S. election campaign than a European audience. — Reuters

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TRUMP LASHES OUT AT MEDIA IN PRESS CONFERENCE



TURKEY EYES STRONG TRUMP ALLIANCE

Turkey is seeking a tighter alliance with Washington under President Donald Trump but the road to a rapprochement may not be easy. President Recep Tayyip Erdogan's relationship with the White House worsened drastically in the final months of the Barack Obama administration, mired in rows on issues from Syria to the extradition of the preacher Fethullah Gulen, the Turkish leader's arch-foe.

But Turkish officials repeated none of the gloom that some EU leaders expressed after Trump's election, instead hoping that he would open a new page in relations. Trump's administration has a "good opportunity to make bold moves" in his foreign policy after the previous administration's "disregardful" attitude, Ayse Sozen Usluer, head of international relations at the Turkish presidency, told AFP. She added the new administration would assess anew its relationship with Turkey regarding trade, military, the fight against terror among other issues and "take new steps to improve relations".

'Withholding criticism'

So could a potential bromance now be brewing between two men who have made macho politics a trademark? Less than 48 hours after Trump and Erdogan had their first conversation of the new US president's term, new CIA chief Mike Pompeo came to Ankara last week to meet the Turkish leadership in his first foreign visit. In a sign of the importance of realpolitik in the relationship, Pompeo had only last year described Turkey as a "totalitarian Islamist dictatorship" in a now deleted tweet.

Meanwhile in a flurry of activity, US joint chiefs of staff Joseph Dunford also visited Turkey on Friday. But for all the good intentions, analysts believe it is doubtful the two sides will progress much beyond a honeymoon period before traditional disagreements reappear. Ankara hopes Trump is "the man who can deliver (a rapprochement) to them, so they're quite obviously withholding any criticism of him even though his rhetoric in multiple cases is completely against everything they stood for," said Aaron Stein, resident fellow of the Atlantic Council's Rafik Hariri Centre for the Middle East. "I'm not sure that the Trump administration is hearing them yet," he told AFP.

'Tactical love affair'

Keen not to disturb the relationship in its early days, Erdogan stayed unusually quiet over Trump's attempt to bar entry to nationals from seven predominantly Muslim countries. Erdogan regards himself as a champion in the battle against Islamophobia and has also not criticized Trump's repeated use of the phrase "radical Islamic terrorism". Yet when German Chancellor Angela Merkel came to Ankara and used the expression "Islamist terrorism", Erdogan swiftly rebuked her.

Well-connected Turkish columnist Abdulkadir Selvi

wrote Ankara wanted good start with the Trump administration "but at the same time, it is cautious". Fadi Hakura, Associate Fellow at Chatham House in London, told AFP the "thin-skinned" leaders would have major policy differences, particularly over political Islam. "This current love affair is short-term, tactical and ad-hoc," he told AFP.

More serious on Gulen?

One key issue is whether Trump continues the Obama policy of supporting the Kurdish Democratic Union Party (PYD) and its armed wing, the Kurdish Peoples' Protection Units (YPG), as the best fighting force on the ground against IS in Syria. Turkey views the PYD and YPG as sister groups of the outlawed Kurdistan Workers' Party (PKK) which has waged a bloody insurgency against the Turkish state since 1984. Turkey has repeatedly floated the idea of a joint operation to capture the IS de-facto capital of Raqa in Syria but insisted the Kurdish militia are not involved.

lived in self-imposed exile in Pennsylvania since 1999 and Turkey accuses of ordering a July 15 failed putsch. Gulen strongly denies the charges but Ankara has repeatedly called for him to be extradited. Prime Minister Binali Yildirim discussed the issue with US Vice President Mike Pence on Saturday after the men met on the sidelines of the Munich security conference.

Erdogan's spokesman Ibrahim Kalin said the Trump administration was taking the Gulen issue "more seriously" although there has yet to be a clear sign in Washington of a change in attitude. Stein said although Trump would not be able to extradite Gulen as it is handled by the US justice department, the Turks wanted "more pressure" on the Muslim cleric. Hakura of Chatham House said Turkey's key conditions - the extradition of Gulen and Washington ceasing all cooperation with the YPG - were unlikely to be met in the medium or long term. SOMALI PRESIDENT FACES DELICATE BALANCING ACT

ohamed Abdullahi Mohamed's victory in Somalia's presidential election last week brought joyous crowds into the streets of Mogadishu, a testament to the former prime minister's enduring popularity. But analysts warn that the iron will and nationalist discourse that Somalis fondly remember from his time as premier could be Mohamed's biggest obstacles when it comes to rebuilding the world's most notorious failed state.

Mohamed, who is better known by his nickname Farmajo, or "Cheese", has inherited an administration that has limited control over Somali territory due to the presence of Shabaab Islamists, and is heavily propped up by the international community. This fragile core is further weakened by deeply entrenched corruption and the rivalries in a maze-like clan structure that dominate Somali politics. "There is a super-sized expectation, but the problems that bedevilled Somalia for three decades won't vanish because Farmajo is the president," said Abdirashid Hashi, a researcher at the Heritage Institute.

Why so popular?

While prime minister for a mere eight months in 2010-11, Farmajo swiftly won over Somalis with his efforts to improve governance. His resolute nationalism, in which he tried to revive Somali pride in a nation best-

Farmajo's image also received a boost from the improved security in Mogadishu which saw Shabaab militants driven from the capital a few months after he stepped down as premier. "It was under Farmajo that the groundwork was laid for this victory," said Roland Marchal, a researcher at Sciences Po university in Paris. He was also highly popular within the military, not least because his government made sure to regularly pay soldiers, a rarity in Somalia's turbulent history.

Risky nationalism

Farmajo inherits a Somalia still operating under an interim constitution, with little in the way of solid administrative structures: the army, central bank, fiscal administration and electoral commission remain rudimentary. While Farmajo favors a strong central government, Somalia has in recent years shifted towards a system of federalism. The building of a state will require careful negotiations with powerful regions such as Puntland, Jubaland and Galmudug to finalize the constitution, properly define the federal agenda - which has already been a bone of contention - and stabilize the country. — AFP

MOSCOW FINDS PEACE TRICKIER THAN WAR

tith its show of military force, Russia changed the tide of the Syrian civil war. It is finding the next phase - brokering an end to the fighting - a tougher proposition. A round of Syria peace talks sponsored by Russia ended on Thursday with no joint communique, usually the minimum outcome of any diplomatic negotiation, and saw opposing Syrian groups exchanging angry tirades at each other and the brokers. With no concrete progress to report, media representatives at the talks venue in ex-Soviet Kazakhstan, were so hungry for a scrap of news that at one point a crowd formed around an Arabic speaker who they thought was a participant in the talks. He turned out to be another journalist.

Western diplomats, who say Russian President Vladimir Putin's campaign of air strikes has worsened the conflict, have, in private, reacted to Russia's tribulations as a peacemaker with variations on the phrase: "We told you so." Russia proposed a series of negotiations in the Kazakh capital Astana late last year with the expectation that, as the predominant outside power in Syria following its military intervention, it could break a deadlock that had defied the repeated efforts of the big Western powers and UN mediators.

Moscow's peace drive started hopefully, with the first Astana meeting in January. The Syrian rebels and government came together for the first time in nine months, and agreement was reached to consolidate a shaky ceasefire. But by the second round this week, things had gone downhill. The Syrian rebels debated until the eleventh hour about whether to attend at all, finally sending a smaller delegation which arrived in the Kazakh capital a day late.

Russia's efforts were hampered by the deep enmity between the rival Syrian sides, but also by contradictions among its co-sponsors. One of them, Turkey, is fiercely opposed to Syrian President Bashar al-Assad. Russia and the third co-sponsor, Iran, are Assad's staunchest allies.

Syrian government negotiator Bashar Jaafari said on Thursday that peace talks in Astana had not produced a communique because of the "irresponsible" late arrival of rebel participants and their Turkish backers which delayed the joint session by a day.

He also criticized the rebels and Turkey for downgrading their delegations from the previous meeting. "Turkey cannot ignite the fire and at the same time act as a firefighter," he told a briefing after the talks. The rebels, in turn, accused the Syrian government and Iran of routinely violating the ceasefire and Russia of failing to enforce it. "We know that the Russians have a problem with those for whom they are guarantors," rebel negotiator Yahya Al-Aridi told reporters, referring to Tehran and Assad's forces.

A step too far

According to two sources - a senior French diplomat and an official present for the talks from a country not directly participating - one of the main reasons progress had slowed were Moscow's attempts to expand the talks beyond the ceasefire and discuss political solutions to the Syrian crisis. Moscow has offered the Syrians a draft of a new constitution, Russian negotiator Alexander Lavrentiev told reporters on Thursday.

He also said the joint Russia-Turkey-Iran ceasefire monitoring task force agreed upon in Astana in January could in the future expand its activities to include a political settlement of the crisis. But the sources said other parties resisted those efforts, because they were still more focused on the fighting on the ground in Syria. Iran, according to one of the sources, wants to push on with territorial gains achieved by its allies in Syria, while Turkey is hell-bent on not allowing any Kurds near its border. The rebels also indicated they wanted the talks to focus on more down-to-earth matters such as air strikes on their territory - which

they said Russia has promised to stop - and release of prisoners. "We did not come here to make incorrect political decisions," said rebel negotiator Mohammad Alloush.

Caged parrots

Even the hosts for the talks, the Kazakh government, downgraded their presence. A deputy foreign minister welcomed the delegates instead of the minister himself, as was the case in January. The rebels sent nine people, instead of the 15-person delegation that attended the previous round. Organizers cordoned off most of the lobby of the Rixos Hotel, venue for the meeting, so negotiators could step out and have tea or coffee at tables surrounded by plants and parrots in cages.

Several ambassadors from Middle Eastern countries kept walking in and out of a conference room where the talks were being held behind closed doors, but mostly spent their time in the hotel's Irish pub, though they did not appear to drink any alcohol. United Nations special envoy on Syria Staffan de Mistura attended the first round of talks where he stressed that Syria's political transition must be discussed in Geneva rather than in Astana. He did not attend the second round, travelling to Moscow instead for talks with Russian Foreign Minister Sergei Lavrov.

Originally, Thursday's talks were billed as a low-key technical meeting. The co-sponsors then upgraded it last Friday, raising expectations that real progress could be achieved. A successful outcome would have handed a PR coup to Russia right before UN-led talks on Syria in Geneva on Feb 23. But instead, Lavrentiev, the Russian negotiator, was left trying to explain why the latest round had ended in acrimony. "The level of mutual distrust is rather high and there were many mutual accusations, but I think we must keep moving forward every time, step by step," he said. — Reuters



ANCELOTTI SHOWS HERTHA FANS THE MIDDLE FINGER

BERLIN: Bayern Munich's Carlo Ancelotti could be in hot water with the German FA (DFB) after admitting showing the middle finger towards Hertha Berlin fans who he claims spat at him. "Yes, I made the gesture after being spat at," Bayern's coach told broadcaster ARD. Hertha fans were enraged after Bayern equalised with a Robert Lewandowski goal in the 96th-minute at Berlin's

Olympic Stadium on Saturday to snatch a 1-1 draw which left the Bavarians eight points clear in the Bundesliga. The middle finger gesture happened as Ancelotti walked towards the players' tunnel in Berlin. According to magazine Kicker, the DFB are poised to investigate both Ancelotti and Hertha's goalkeeper Rune Jarstein, who kicked a ball which struck Bayern's Xabi Alonso in disgust at the result. Hertha's coach Pal Dardai later branded the six minutes of added time a 'Bayern's bonus' and tempers frayed on the pitch as Lewandowski equalised just seconds before the referee blew the final whistle. "We always fight until the end. It wasn't my best goal and was my last ball contact of the game-you can't get later than that," admitted Lewandowski who scored after 95 minutes, 59 seconds. — AFP

AUSTRALIA BACK LEALIIFANO'S LEUKAEMIA IN REMISSION

SYDNEY: Wallabies back Christian Lealiifano has been told his leukaemia is in remission after he received a bone marrow transplant last year. The 29-year-old inside centre, who has 19 test caps, was diagnosed with leukaemia last August, a diagnosis which rocked his team mates and prompted a number of them to shave their heads in a show of support. Lealiifano underwent two chemotherapy treatments and then a bone marrow transplant late last year after his sister proved to be a match for donation. "The doctors said the transplant was a success and everything is looking good in there and the cancer isn't showing up so I'm in remission at the moment but there is still a ways to go," Lealiifano told the Canberra Times. "It's a massive milestone today (on Saturday) because that's the time frame they sort of give you, 100 days after the transplant gives you a rough idea of where you stand, so to be cancer-free is quite amazing and why I've got a big smile on my face." Lealiifano was named as co-captain of the ACT Brumbies this season but is unlikely to play at all, with lock Sam Carter leading the side on the field. —Reuters

LILLE LURE BIELSA **BACK TO FRANCE**

LILLE: Iconic Argentinian coach Marcelo Bielsa, known as 'el Loco' for his intense 'all in' style, will be back in France as manager of Lille as of July, the newly bought out Ligue 1 club said yesterday. "Lille and the Argentine coach have signed a two years deal which comes into effect in July," Lille announced. Rumours had been ripe that Bielsa, who handled Argentina and Chile before succesful stints at Atletico Bilbao and Marseille, would join the struggling northerners who were French champions in 2011. Bielsa is known for cranking up the pressure and squeezing the most out of modest formations, taking Athletic Bilbao to a Europa League final in 2012, and coming close to a French title with Marseille. He left Marseille in a blaze of fury one game into the 2015-2016 season, before a two day stint at Italian side Lazio. Lille are 14th in Ligue 1, and were taken over three weeks ago by Luxembourg-Spanish businessman Gerard Lopez, a colourful tycoon and former owner of Formula One team Lotus. Earlier this week Lopez recruited Franck Passi who was Bielsa's assistant at Marseille, to oversee the rest of the season. — AFP

GLENN ROBINSON III IS NBA'S NEW DUNK KING

NEW ORLEANS: Glenn Robinson III is the NBA's new dunk king, with an assist to Indiana teammate Paul George, the Pacers' mascot and a Pacers cheerleader.

Robinson leaped over all three, snagging the ball from George along the way before finishing with an emphatic, twohand, reverse jam, giving him a perfect score - and the title - on his final dunk.

Robinson edged out Phoenix's Derrick Jones Jr., who was done in by his failure to complete his difficult first dunk of two in the final round.

Jones still managed a perfect score on his second dunk, when he received a bounce-pass in the paint, put it between his legs and threw down a left-handed jam. But Robinson made sure it wasn't enough.

In the 3-point contest, Houston's Eric Gordon dethroned Golden State splash brother Klay Thompson. Kristaps Porzingis of the New York Knicks won the Skills Challenge. Both dunk finalists delighted the crowd with soaring slams over teammates and others that showcased the explosive spring in their vertical leaps.

Robinson had one dunk in which he leap-frogged one man sitting on another's shoulders, grabbed the ball from the elevated man's hands and slamming it home.

Jones jumped over four teammates including Devin Booker and Marquese Chriss in the first round. He also drew roars from the crowd when he took a pass off the side of the backboard from Booker with his right hand, put the ball between his legs to his left for a round-house jam.

The dunk that cost him was a bold one. He tried to leap a friend and the Suns' gorilla mascot, grab the ball on the way over, put it between his legs and then finish with windmill. But he couldn't get the dunk to go down in his allotted three attempts.

DeAndre Jordan of the Los Angeles Clippers and Aaron Gordon of Orlando were unable to emerge from the first round. Jordan dunked over DJ turn tables and Gordon dunked after receiving a bounce pass from a drone that had flown over the court with the "Star Wars" theme music playing.

FREE AGENCY

Eric Gordon got his win in New Orleans, where he played the previous five seasons before leaving last summer in free agency.

Gordon's score of 21 in a final-round tiebreaker defeated Cleveland's Kyrie Irving, the 2013 winner who had 18. The pair had each finished with a score of 20 in the final round, meaning they each had to shoot 25 more balls to decide it.

"I wasn't really concentrating on how many I made," Gordon said. "It's all about just knocking down the shot. I never counted in my head or anything. I just go out there and just shoot the ball."

Thompson was stunningly eliminated in the first round, missing a final shot from the corner that could have put him through ahead of Kemba Walker. Big men reigned supreme for a second straight year in the skills competition, with the 7-foot-3 Porzingis beating Utah's Gordon Hayward in the final round. Those vanquished in earlier rounds included guards John Wall of Washington and Isaiah Thomas of Boston, both because they couldn't make their initial 3-pointers required to close out the course before Hayward did, even though Hayward had trailed each of them dribbling down the court by a considerable margin before hitting his clinching shots.

Porzingis emerged from the big-men's division that included the Pelicans' Anthony Davis and Denver's Nikola Jokic.

"It's a good feeling that I'm able to showcase my skill with my size and show to the kids that you're capable of doing that even if you're tall and lanky like me," Porzingis said. "I think a lot of kids now growing up will improve those perimeter skills just seeing guys like - I don't want to mention myself, but big guys with perimeter skills that can do it."

Porzingis and Hayward were neck-andneck until the end of the course, but Porzingis hit his 3 first to end it.

The three-round, head-to-head obstacle-course competition tests dribbling, passing, agility and shooting skills.

Earlier on Saturday, Rollie Massimino, who coached Villanova to the 1985 NCAA championship, and Chris Webber were among the 14 finalists for this year's Basketball Hall of Fame induction class.

Others include NBA referee Hugh Evans, Connecticut star Rebecca Lobo, two-time NBA scoring champion Tracy McGrady, fivetime All-Star Sidney Moncrief, Baylor women's coach Kim Mulkey, Kansas coach Bill Self and two-time NBA champion coach Rudy Tomjanovich.

Previous finalists returning to the ballot include point guard Tim Hardaway, recordsetting high school coach Robert Hughes, Notre Dame women's coach Muffet McGraw, former Wisconsin coach Bo Ryan and 10-time AAU national champion Wayland Baptist University.

Enshrinees will be announced at the Final Four on April 3. The induction ceremonies in Springfield, Massachusetts are Sept. 7-9. — AP

LEBRON JAMES TALKING A GOOD GAME, STILL PLAYING GREAT

NEW ORLEANS: Older, wiser and more aware of the world, LeBron James isn't afraid of letting his views known on politics or social issues or even the business of basketball. It wasn't always that way.

But in his 14th season, with more NBA playing years in his rear-view mirror than left in front of him, James doesn't see much reason to stay silent these days. His voice is louder than ever when he deems it appropriate while his numbers remain as good as ever. It's one of the reasons why he'll again be the star attraction yesterday night when he plays in the All-Star Game for the 13th time.

"I've been vocal about a lot," James said Saturday. "That's who I am. I'm a vocal guy. I've been vocal about a lot of things this year."

Whether it was his stance on the presidential election where he supported Hillary Clinton, expressing his displeasure about Phil Jackson's characterization of the people closest to him, speaking directly to fans through video messages or even saying his Cleveland Cavaliers need another playmaker to help with their NBA title defense, James has been taking full advantage of his massive platform.

This weekend, though, he is trying to take a break from any negativity and enjoy the moment. "Truly blessed," James said. "This is a special time for me."

He's not alone in that sort of thinking. For all the subplots - the Kevin Durant-Russell Westbrook drama, Kyrie Irving's claim that the Earth is flat and Carmelo Anthony's All-Star nod after some trying times in New York - none of the 24 players who'll be on the floor Sunday night will likely be thinking about anything besides putting on a show.

James' two sons are hoping for a show, too. Not from their dad, so much - but rather from their favorites like Westbrook and Stephen Curry. "LeBron Jr. wore 0 for the longest time because he loves Russ," James said. "Bryce wore 30 because he likes Steph and likes to shoot the ball from deep. I think that's pretty cool."

James' arrival was the big news of All-Star Saturday, largely because he missed Friday's events because of family obligations. Durant and Westbrook shared the floor for practice but had minimal interaction - not even looking at

each other when they were maybe a foot apart in the back of the Superdome while trying to find their assigned spots for a media session.'

"This game, it's for the fans," said Westbrook,

the two-time reigning All-Star MVP. It always is, though this All-Star weekend has a younger feel. Today's will be the first All-Star Game since 2005 - James' first All-Star where no player in the game will be older than 32. Kobe Bryant was 37 when he made his All-Star farewell in Toronto last season, and Kareem Abdul-Jabbar was two months shy of turning 42 when he played in the game for the last time in 1989.

Anthony is the oldest All-Star, seven months older than James and eight months older than Marc Gasol. They're all 32.

"It's pretty weird to be the veterans now when we were the young guys a few years ago, but that's just the way the league is going, man," Durant said. "Teams are drafting two or three 18-year-olds a year. ... The league is getting younger and at some point we're going to be the old guys passing the torch to the young guys." — AP



AUSTIN THERIAULT WINS ARCA SEASON OPENER RACE AT DAYTONA

DAYTONA BEACH: Austin Theriault would have welcomed another restart in smart race, you're hard to beat," Theriault the ARCA season opener.

Fontaine thanked safety personnel for "their quick actions after the accident." "I just want to let everyone know that I'm OK and I'm thankful for the outreach of support," he added.

Fontaine's wild ride brought out the final red flag. He slammed into the outside wall, slid on his driver's side door, flipped and then came to a stop on his roof. Fontaine was stuck in the car for several inutes as safety workers turned his car over and cut him out of the cockpit. Eight-time race winner Bobby

Gerhart, Codie Rohrbaugh and Derrick Lancaster also were caught up in the late melee. None of them was injured.

Terry Jones finished second, followed by Shane Lee, Dalton Sargeant and polesitter Tom Hessert.

Theriault passed Jones for the lead with eight laps to go, but the race was red-flagged after Fontaine's crash damaged part of the SAFER barrier at Daytona. The energy-absorbing wall had to be repaired before the Monster Energy Cup Series exhibition Clash.

Theriault sat in his car for more than 10 minutes until the race was called. He

then made his way to victory lane to cel-

"Our focus is to win the championship," said Theriault, who drives for Ken Schrader Racing. "I

think we made that clear tonight. We have a long season to go, though, and a lot of work to do. We always want to get better, and Daytona's kind of a different animal, obviously. "Once we get to Nashville (in April), we'll have a better idea of maybe what we have to work on and what we're good at and we can go from there. But our intention's to go for the championship."— AP

RUMFORD BEATS KHONGWATMAI IN SUPER 6 MATCHPLAY FINAL

PERTH: Australia's Brett Rumford captured his sixth European Tour title with a historic victory over Thailand's Phachara Khongwatmai in the final of the inaugural World Super 6 Perth yesterday.

Rumford, who dominated the field by five shots after 54 holes of strokeplay, won four match play rounds of the revolutionary new European Tour format to claim victory. His 2 and 1 victory over Thai teenager Khongwatmai in the final at Lake Karrinyup will now earn Rumford an exemption on the European Tour until the end of the 2018 season. It was Rumford's first win since the 2013 Volvo China Open. "It's amazing, particularly being a new format, the first winner of that," Rumford said.

"It's great to be back. I've done a lot of reflection these past few months after missing my (European) Tour card last year.

"I had a tough year and didn't see my family that much, only four weeks in six months. It was a gruelling six months, but I'm back and I couldn't be happier."

Khongwatmai, 17, would have become the second youngest winner in European Tour history if he had beaten Rumford in the final. Rumford had a bye in the first round of the match play round and overcame Hideto Tanihara, Wade Ormsby and Adam Bland on the way to the final.

Khongwatmai squeezed into the 24th and final spot in the Super 6 and defeated Australians Sam Brazel, Lucas Herbert, Matthew Millar and Jason Scrivener en route to the final.

Rumford got off to a sensational start, putting his approach to the first to within three feet, and when Khongwatmai flew the green into a bunker and failed to get up and down, the hole was conceded.

The 39-year-old Australian conceded on the second hole, sending his tee-shot well right and his second well left, with Khongwatmai safely on the green in two.

Khongwatmai found a bunker off the tee at the par three third but recovered well, with Rumford playing his ball up to the hole as they walked off all square.

Rumford looked in trouble again with a wayward second shot on the par five fourth but he hit a sensational shot over a bunker to set up a ten-foot birdie and a one-hole lead. An approach to two feet on the fifth piled the pressure on Khongwatmai, and when the young Thai found the bunker with his tee-shot and failed to get out with his second, it was all over.

Bland finished third after beating Scrivener in a play-off, with South Africa's Louis Oosthuizen fifth followed by Steven Jeffress, Millar and Ormsby. —AFP

JOHNSON LEADS AT RIVIERA, EDGES TOWARD NUMBER ONE

LOS ANGELES: Dustin Johnson left the Genesis Open in the twilight Saturday realizing he could be as little 24 hours away from reaching No. 1 in the world. He wasn't the least bit concerned, mainly because he still had 36 holes ahead of him. And all that really mattered to Johnson was winning at Riviera, the course he loves that has done nothing but tease him over the last five years. Johnson had it really easy on a sloppy Saturday of light rain and a muddied course. He only had to play 18 holes of the second round, making three birdies over his last four holes for another 5-under 66 that gave him a one-shot lead at the halfway point of the rain-plagued tournament. "I want to win this tournament," Johnson said. "Whether I get to No. 1 or not doesn't affect me at all." The tournament lost an hour to fog Thursday, then seven hours when heavy rain and wind arrived in southern California on Friday, and two more hours Saturday morning to get the course cleaned up for play.

Jordan Spieth hit his first shot at 9 a.m. and his last shot at 5:40 pm. That's a total of 10 shots for the day - two pars to close out his second round at 68, and two shots on the par-5 opening hole to start the third round. Johnson was at 10-under 132 and had a one-shot lead over Pat Perez, who birdied his last two holes for a 66, and Cameron Tringale, whose wedge from 82 yards flew straight into the cup on No. 18 for a birdie and a 64.

Jhonattan Vegas finished his second round well before lunch with four pars for a 68. He was in the group at 7-under 135 along with Patrick Rodgers (67) and PGA Tour rookie J.T. Poston (69).

Sam Saunders, who opened with a 7under 64 on Thursday and didn't play at all on Friday, stumbled to a 77. He was right on the cut line and was in danger of becoming the first player in four years to go from leading the first round to missing the cut until a long birdie on the 17th. Saunders was nine shots behind. The PGA Tour got a big break when 71 players made the cut, making it possible to complete 72 holes by Sunday. The third round began Saturday afternoon, though the last two groups did not tee off because of darkness and will face 36 holes on the final day. The

weather had cooperated enough that players no longer could lift, clean and place their golf balls in the short grass.

MARATHON

Johnson was in control of his game and the focus going into a marathon yesterday. Play was set to resume at 6:50 am. He said earlier this year that Riviera was the one tournament he wanted to win outside the majors because of his love for the course and how much he loves it, even though it has given him nothing but heartache. He has had a chance to win four times in the

last five years. Now, a victory might be enough to move him to No. 1 in the world. Johnson would have to win the Genesis Open and have world No. 1 Jason Day finish out of the top three to go to No. 1 for the first time.

"I don't really worry about that," Johnson said. "I want to put myself in position to win this golf tournament. That's really all I care about is what it takes to get it done here. The rest of the stuff, the points and the world golf rankings, yeah, I would like to get there but I'm not worried about it."

Day had another 70 and was eight shots behind and tied for 40th. Spieth, coming off a victory at Pebble Beach, managed his 19th consecutive round under par on the PGA Tour with a 68 even though he felt as though he hit it short and crooked most of the week. He was at 5 under and in a tie for 11th. Perez was coming off a bogey on the par-5 ninth when he drove left of the 10th green and hit what he thought was as good a shot as he could that ran onto the green toward the pin. It kept rolling into a bunker, though he hit a nifty shot from the sand to 3 feet for par.

"Another birdie," he said as he walked off the green, paying homage to a 313-yard hole that bedevils him. He saved his best work for the end of the round, chipping in from birdie from deep rough on the 17th and stuffing his approach into 8 feet for birdie on the 18th. Perez already has made a remarkable return from shoulder surgery, winning in his third tournament back in Mexico. Now he's headed back to Mexico in two weeks for a World Golf Championship, and a big yesterday could set him up for another WGC at the Dell Match Play.—AP

IMPERIOUS HIRSCHER HAILS 'PERFECT' WORLDS

ST MORITZ: Marcel Hirscher was at his imperious best as he sped to victory in the slalom at the World Ski Championships yesterday to add to his triumph in the giant slalom and silver in the combined. The 27-year-old Austrian, who also won the world slalom title on home snow in Schladming in 2013, led after the first run and went on to clock a combined total of 1min 34.75sec to bring the curtain down on what he dubbed a "perfect" championships.

That was a massive 0.68sec ahead of teammate Manuel Feller, whose silver was a careerfirst podium finish. Germany's Felix Neureuther, victor in 10 World Cup slaloms and previously a silver and bronze medal winner at the last two worlds, claimed bronze, at 0.93sec.

Hirscher admitted to racing the slalom without pressure after his successes in the week leading up to the most technical of the alpine skiing events. "It is a very great feeling to ski without this pressure on your shoulders," he said.

"After the silver medal in the combined, the minimum goal was reached with one medal in five starts at these world champs.

"After that very emotional giant slalom gold medal, which I've waited for for a pretty long time, twice second position behind Ted Ligety at the last two world champs, it was super easy for me mentally to go into this race. "Everything was ok, it didn't matter if I straddled at first gate. The only thing that would not be fine was skiing slow so I decided to give everything in these two runs and it worked and now the perfect championships are over." Hirscher's victory was his sixth world gold, two coming in team events, and confirmed his status as men's skiing's top performer, although he only has one Olympic medal to his name - slalom silver in the Sochi Games. Only Austrian Toni Sailer (seven) has more world titles than Hirscher, who is now level with France's Jean-Claude Killy.

Hirscher has also notched up 43 victories and 105 podiums in the World Cup and is seemingly on track to claim a sixth consecutive overall title on the season-long circuit.

EMULATING TOMBA

His slalom/giant slalom double was the first since legendary Italian Alberto Tomba achieved the feat in 1996. The Austrian also becomes the first man to claim three world medals at three different editions. In a nerve-racking race down the Suvretta course basked in sunshine, Austrian duo Marco Schwarz and Michael Matt, second and third fastest after the first run, dropped valuable seconds to eventually finish seventh and eighth. Sweden's Mattias Hargin looked to be set for a podium place, with a healthy lead time as he dropped into the bottom section, only to ski out. Teammate Andre Myhrer, winner at last season's World Cup finals on the same slope, came in sixth, one place behind Russia's Alexander Khoroshilov. There was the disappointment of another fourth place for Henrik Kristoffersen, the Norwegian having missed out on a giant slalom bronze by just five-hundredths of a second.

This time around Kristoffersen, winner of five slaloms this season and considered a gold medal contender here, was 0.11sec short of a medal. Norway, in the absence of the injured Aksel Lund Svindal, finished fourth in all five of the men's events in St Moritz.

Britain's Dave Ryding, whose second place in the Kitzbuehel slalom in January was the country's best for a male skier since 1981, also threat ened in the first run, in which he was fourth fastest. But a bad mistake on the second descent saw him clock up just the 22nd fastest time for 11th place overall. "I just wish I could have done better," said the Englishman. —AFP

S KOREA'S JANG WINS AUSTRALIAN OPEN

ADELAIDE: South Korea's Jang Ha-Na and 18th holes as well as the eagle at 17. stormed to a three-shot victory in the Australian Open at Royal Adelaide with a blistering eagle-birdie finish yesterday. The world number six claimed her fourth LPGA tournament win with a sensational flourish to her final round.

Jang, 24, conjured a remarkable finish with an eagle from long range at the 17th followed by a brilliant birdie at the 18th to reach 10-under 282. Her round of four-under 69 equalled the lowest round of the day but it was done in the toughest of the conditions with gusty winds.


Jang defeated Denmark's Nanna Madsen on seven-under 285 with a group of four including Thailand's world number two Ariya Jutanugarn at joint third on six-under 286.

"It was great to be confident and be able to hit those fairways, especially with the wind this week, it wasn't easy to hit them. "A lot of positive signs. Hopefully by next week it will be polished. It was my first tournament back." — AFP

PAKISTAN SUPER LEAGUE FINAL MUST BE IN LAHORE: GILES CLARKE

DUBAI: A top international cricket offiiit's final should be held in Lahore," Clarke cial insisted yesterday that the final of Pakistan's Twenty20 league must be held in Lahore despite a major bomb attack in the country last week.

Giles Clarke, head of an International Cricket Council team seeking to revive cricket in the country, said the March 5 final of the Pakistan Super League (PSL) in Lahore would be a key part of efforts to revive cricket in the country.

"PSL is Pakistan's domestic event and

told AFP from London. "It is really important that the final should be held successfully." The Pakistan Cricket Board has vowed to maintain the final in Lahore, assuring VIP security arrangementsreserved for state heads-for foreign players willing to travel to the city.

A suicide bomb blast in Lahore on Monday, which left 14 people killed and over 100 injured, had threatened the event. But the Pakistan army and government have backed plans to stage it in the city. Lahore was also where the Sri Lankan team bus was attacked by militants in March 2009, killing eight people and injuring seven visiting players.

Since then foreign teams have stayed away from Pakistan tours over security fears. Pakistan hosted a short limited over series with Zimbabwe in May-June 2015 but that failed to convince major teams to tour. Clarke, who visited Pakistan last month to study security arrangements for international teams, said reviving international cricket in Pakistan will take time. "It's a long road for the return of bilateral international cricket to Pakistan. On my recent visit, I noticed that not just the authorities but the man in the street is seeking the return of cricket to Pakistan," said Clarke, a former chairman of the England and Wales Cricket Board.

"Terror has no place in our society," said Clarke. "Terrorists should share whatever arguments they have or use ballott boxes." Clarke praised Pakistan cricket fans. "Pakistanis are cricket fanatics and have a great knowledge of cricket and I am sure they want to see their heroes and their own players playing at home and enjoy thrilling matches."

Since 2009 Pakistan have been forced to play all home series in United Arab Emirates. Bangladesh, Sri Lanka, Ireland and West Indies have refused offers to tour Pakistan in the last five years. —AFP

GUNARATNE INSPIRES S LANKA TO SERIES VICTORY OVER AUSTRALIA

VICTORIA: All-rounder Asela Gunaratne struck a superb 84 off 46 balls to inspire Sri Lanka to a dramatic two-wicket victory over Australia in the second Twenty20 International in South Geelong, Victoria yesterday.

The touring side needed 48 runs off the last three overs to clinch the series and Gunaratne, who smashed five sixes and six fours, led them home. Australia got off to a flying start, hitting 60 runs in the first six overs, and although medium-pacer Nuwan Kulasekara took four wickets, Moises Henriques made an unbeaten 56 off 37 balls to lift the hosts to a decent total of 173. Sri Lanka stumbled early as their top order collapsed, losing five wickets for 41 runs in the first five overs. A spirited 52-run partnership between Gunaratne and Chamara Kapugedera steadied the innings,

however, before the 31-year-old Gunaratne took charge to guide his side to an unlikely victory. "Asela's was an amazing innings," Sri Lanka captain Upul Tharanga said.

"We lost too many wickets early but Asela finished the game for us. Winning in Australia is a huge achievement. This is Asela's first tour to Australia and we are happy."

Australia are fielding a depleted side with their full-strength Test squad currently in India. The third and final match of the series will be played on Wednesday in Adelaide. "That was one hell of an innings," Australia captain Aaron Finch said. "When you have a good player in good form, they hurt you. "Sri Lanka played very well there. Take nothing away from them. The series is gone, but hopefully we can salvage something in Adelaide." — Reuters

DE VILLIERS GETS S AFRICA HOME WITH A BALL TO SPARE

HAMILTON: A polished Quinton de Kock half century laid the foundation for South Africa's four wicket win over New Zealand in a tense finish to a rain-shortened opening one-day international in Hamilton vesterday.

In a clash that went down to the wire, it was a man-of-the-match performance from de Kock on a wicket that took an exceptional amount of spin in New Zealand conditions.

The departure of de Kock for 69 sparked a middle order collapse as even the New Zealand quicks turned to bowling cutters on the responsive pitch before an AB de Villiers rescue mission saw his side home with a ball to spare.

"We never expected it to turn like that in Hamilton," de Villiers said. "From past experience this becomes a really good batting track in the evening but that was far from it."

With the fixture reduced to 34 overs a side following heavy rain early in the day, New Zealand posted 207 for seven, boosted by a whirlwind 51 off 23 balls at the end by unbeaten pair Colin de Grandhomme and Tim Southee.

But any thoughts New Zealand had that they were in a strong performance were soon dashed by the way de Kock launched into South Africa's reply. "At the halfway stage we felt we were right in the game," captain Kane Williamson said. "We knew needing five and a half on that surface was going to be difficult and they got off to a very good start which made chasing down that total a lot easier."

"South Africa showed their class with the bat, batted very well and their composure towards the end was very important on a tough surface"

South Africa went into the final over of their reply requiring 12 to win, and de Villiers ended the game with a four off the fifth ball of Tim Southee's over.

Team owner Sanjiv Goenka said Dhoni "is supportive of the decision, keeping the franchise's best interests in mind".

Under 35-year-old Dhoni's captaincy, the Pune team finished second last in their debut IPL season in 2016, winning only five games

PARIS: Racing 92 put Dan Carter's drinkdriving shock behind them with a 33-25 win over Brive in the French Top 14 on Saturday as Clermont grabbed pole position after a 46-27 victory over rockbottom Bayonne. Defending champions Racing maintained their unbeaten home record despite dealing with the fall-out from All Blacks legend Carter being pulled over for drink-driving in Paris on Wednesday.

FA CUP 'GLADIATOR' SPIRIT HITS PREMIER LEAGUE

LONDON: Lincoln City boss Danny Cowley hailed his players for bringing the "magic" back to the FA Cup after they stunned Premier League Burnley to become the first non-league team in more than a century to reach the last eight.

Sean Raggett's 89th-minute header secured a famous 1-0 win and Burnley boss Sean Dyche was not the only Premier League manager bemoaning his unwanted role in a football "fairytale".

Leicester City manager Claudio Ranieri called on his players to become "gladiators and soldiers" after the Premier League champions latest defeat saw them beaten 1-0 by third tier Millwall in their fifth round tie. This time a 90th minute goal by Shaun Cummings deepened the crisis for Ranieri ahead of a crunch Champions League game against Sevilla. Millwall could be in trouble over a crowd invasion after the final whistle though.

Manchester City face a troublesome replay-and an unwanted extra fixture as they battle to claw back the eight point deficit to league leaders Chelsea — after a goalless draw with Huddersfield of the Championship on a landmark weekend of Cup upsets.

Lincoln's fellow non league side Sutton will be hoping to round it off today against an Arsenal side still reeling from the 5-1 reverse they suffered at the hands of Bayern Munich in the Champions League last Wednesday.

Lincoln-who had already beaten Ipswich and Brighton from the Championship-are the first non-league club since Queen's Park Rangers in 1914 to reach the FA Cup quarter finals. Many Premier League and Championship sides now field weakened teams in domestic cup competitions leading to accusations of disrespecting the world's oldest senior football knockout tournament.

But the day was spoiled by ugly scenes when Millwall fans spilled onto the pitch and goaded the Leicester fans. Missiles appeared to be thrown by both sets of supporters while police horses were called upon to defuse the situation.

"No-one wants to see that on the football pitch," said Millwall manager Neil Harris. "I can't condone that, but if I have not seen it I am not going to say anything negative because you have to see something to make a realistic judgement."

Chelsea boss Antonio Conte warned his players to avoid complacency as they seek to become just the third club to win the Premier League and FA Cup 'Double' on two separate occasions.

'Big Phil' never stood taller than when he guided a Brazil side numbering the three 'R's' Rivaldo, Ronaldo and Ronaldinho to the 2002 World Cup triumph over Germany. Seen as the man most capable of delivering World Cup glory on home soil in 2014 the dream descended into a barely credible nightmare as without injured superstar Nevmar the Germans dismantled the hosts in a 7-1 walloping which plunged the nation into mourning. Describing it as the 'worst day of his life' he jumped before he was pushed, resigning from the post after the Netherlands beat them 3-0 in the meaningless third place play-off.

ROBERTO DI MATTEO - CHELSEA

The Switzerland-born Italy international was a popular figure as a player at the club-he scored goals in both the 1997 and 2000 FA Cup final victories-but his standing became almost godlike when against all expectations he delivered the Champions League in 2012, the trophy above all others that Russian oligarch owner Roman Abramovich desired. The FA Cup was added that season . Rewarded

with a two year contract in June 2012 the amiable di Matteo was sacked in November as a series of poor results prompted the never patient Abramovich to fire him.

JOSE MOURINHO - CHELSEA

The self anointed 'Special One' returned to Chelsea for a second spell and duly delivered the 2015 Premier League title in his second season back. All seemed set fair for another trophy-laden term in office but things quickly disintegrated not least his fragile temperament. A very public row with the club doctor Evas Carneiro and woeful results plus certain players growing disenchanted with the Portuguese handler resulted in the unthinkable happening and his leaving the club in December 2015 by 'mutual consent'.

CESAR LUIS MENOTTI - ARGENTINA

Chain smoking long-haired coach who despite the permanent smoke clouds emanating from the dugout could see clearly enough of what was going on on the pitch to mastermind the 1978 side captained by Daniel Passarella to World Cup success at home. Menotti stayed on for their 1982 title defence but they lost to Belgium in their first game. An early return home for a side including young talent Diego Maradona but a labouring ageing defence came after defeats to eventual winners Italy and bitter rivals Brazil in the second round group stage. Menotti had run out of puff.

JUPP HEYNCKES - REAL MADRID

Real Madrid are not renowned for sparing a manager's feelings or career and Heynckes can attest to that more than anyone. The German handler brought 'the meringues' their seventh European Cup trophy-and first in 32 years-in defeating Juventus in 1998. Ecstasy turned to misery as with a singular lack of gratitude Real sacked him days later for finishing fourth in the league. He had the last laugh years later, ending his career by guiding Bayern Munich to the treble of the league title, Cup and Champions League. — AFP

INFANTINO CALLS UNPRECEDENTED AFRICAN SUMMIT MEETING

JOHANNESBURG: FIFA President Gianni Infantino will meet more than 50 presidents of African football associations in an unprecedented summit in Johannesburg this week, officials said yesterday.

Each of the continent's 54 member countries has been invited to a day-long executive summit with Infantino, called to discuss general issues in the game and explain FIFA's plans to expand the World Cup and changes to its development structures.

The association presidents will be

divided into two groups with some 25 meeting Infantino and other FIFA officials on Tuesday and the rest repeating the exercise the next day, organisers told Reuters. It is the first time such a summit has been held at which FIFA deals directly with all the leaders of African football.

Infantino, however, did meet about 20 association presidents in Nigeria last July in a gathering that pointedly snubbed long-standing Confederation of African Football (CAF) President Issa Hayatou and members of his executive committee. Usually the only time all

association presidents get together is for annual FIFA and CAF Congresses.

The meetings, which are being held behind closed doors, will be followed by a trip by Infantino to Harare on Thursday to join birthday celebrations for the Zimbabwe Football Association President Philip Chiyangwa, a vocal critical of Hayatou who is backing his opponent in next month's CAF president election. Hayatou, 70, is seeking to extend his tenure in office into a third decade but faces a strong challenge from Ahmad of Madagascar, a former government minister who uses just one name. The CAF elections are to be held in Addis Ababa on March 16.

Chiyangwa has invited a wide array of African football administrators to travel from Johannesburg to Harare as he seeks to galvanise support for Ahmad.

In an exchange of letters published by local media last week, Hayatou threatened Chiyangwa with sanctions if he went ahead with the meeting, saying he had no right to call such a gathering.

But Chiyangwa, a wealthy businessman who has used his own money to fund the bankrupt Zimbabwe Football Association, responded by saying it was a celebration of his birthday and his election as President of the Council of Southern Africa Football Associations, a

regional body made up of 14 countries. Infantino's presence in Harare is seen as a tacit sign of support for the anti-Hayatou camp.

GIANT-KILLERS SUTTON SEEK SCALP OF WAVERING WENGER

LONDON: A plastic pitch, a vulnerable heavyweight and minnows with giant-killing pedigree could conspire to produce one of the great FA Cup shocks when Arsenal visit non-league Sutton United today. Arsenal approach the fifth-round tie reeling from Wednesday's 5-1 humiliation by Bayern Munich and with manager Arsene Wenger closer to the exit door than ever before. Sutton stunned Coventry City, FA Cup winners 19 months previously, in 1989 and Micky Stephens, who played in that game and is now assistant manager, says they will approach Monday's match with a similar mentality. "It's very difficult to stop them, but you don't want to give the players too much information," he told AFP this week.

"I didn't want to know too much when I played against Coventry. I wanted to know about the weaknesses, but not the strengths of the Coventry players.

"Everyone will know their strengths. All we can ask of our players is that they do their best." Sutton currently sit 17th in the fifth tier, 105 places below Arsenal in the English football pyramid, and have reached the fifth round for the first time.

Their National League counterparts Lincoln City have shown them the way, having beaten Burnley 1-0 on Saturday to become the first team from outside England's top four divisions to reach the last eight since 1914. Sutton entered the tournament in the first round in November and have already upset fourth-tier Cheltenham Town, third-tier AFC Wimbledon and Championship promo-

tion-chasers Leeds United. Their down-at-heel Gander Green Lane ground in south London will be at its 5,000 capacity on Monday for a game that will present Arsenal with the unusual challenge of playing on a synthetic 3G pitch.

It will be a particularly special occasion for Sutton trio Craig Eastmond, Roarie Deacon and Jeffrey Monakana, all of whom came through the youth ranks at Arsenal.

Eastmond, 26, was the only one to reach the first team, making 10 appearances between 2009 and 2013 and playing alongside current Arsenal regulars Theo Walcott, Laurent Koscielny, Francis Coquelin and Kieran Gibbs.





ZAIN GROUP FULL YEAR 2016 NET PROFIT UP 2%

Company records revenues of KD 1.1 billion, EBITDA up 3% for full year

KUWAIT: Zain Group, a leading mobile telecom innovator in eight markets across the Middle East and Africa, announces its consolidated financial results for the year 2016, and fourth quarter ended 31 December, 2016. Zain served 47 million customers at the end of 2016, reflecting a 3 percent increase year-on-year (Y-o-Y).

For the full-year 2016, Zain Group generated consolidated revenues of KD 1.1 billion (\$3.6 billion), down 4 percent Y-o-Y, while consolidated EBITDA for the period grew by 3 percent Y-oY and reached KD 512 million (\$1.7 billion), reflecting a healthy EBITDA margin of 47 percent. Consolidated net income reached KD 157 million (\$519 million), up 2 percent and reflecting Earnings Per Share of 40 fils (\$0.13).

For the full-year 2016, foreign currency translation impact, predominantly due to the 60 percent currency devaluation in Sudan from 6.4 to 15.9 (SDG / USD) in the beginning of November 2016, cost the company \$92 million in revenue, \$38 million in EBITDA and \$44 million in net income.

The Board of Directors of Zain Group recommended a cash dividend of 35 fils per share subject to the Annual General Assembly and regulatory approvals.

For the fourth quarter of 2016, Zain Group recorded consolidated revenues of KD 261 million (\$860 million), a decline of 8 percent on the same period of the previous year (Q-o-Q). EBITDA for the quarter reached KD 122 million (\$400 million), reflecting a healthy EBITDA margin of 47 percent. Net income for the guarter reached KD 32 million (\$106 million), reflecting Earnings Per Share of 8 fils (\$0.03).

Specifically, for the fourth quarter of 2016, currency translation impact cost the company \$83 million in revenue, \$33 million in EBITDA and \$42 million in net income, again predominantly due to Sudan currency devaluation from 6.4 to 15.9 (SDG /USD), a 60 percent decrease.

Key Operational Notes for 12 months ended 31 December, 2016:

- 1. Substantial investments in 3G and 4G LTE network expansion and upgrades continue to pay off as Group data revenues (excluding SMS and VAS) increase 6 percent during 2016, representing 23 percent of the Group's consolidated rev-
- 2. The 60 percent currency devaluation impact in Sudan in the beginning of November 2016 affected both Zain Group's full-year and Q4 2016 finan-
- 3. In December 2016, Zain Iraq entered into a negotiated settlement with the country's Finance Ministry for \$ 93 million related to an imposition of a capital gains tax on its acquisition of Iraqna in 2007. This resulted in the lifting of restrictions on the trading of Zain Iraq's shares, access to the company's bank deposits and also waived penalties and interest on taxes.
- 4. The continued political instability in Iraq during 2016 saw the operator endure frequent temporary network interruptions and associated higher network operational costs. These unavoidable occurrences coupled with heightened levels of price competition and a 20 percent sales tax on mobile services hit spending on mobile services. All these factors contributed to a negative impact on Zain Iraq's and consequently Zain Group's overall key financial metrics.
- 5. In Saudi Arabia, through a Royal Order on October 1, 2016, Zain received an extension of its telecommunications license by 15 Hijri years,

effectively extending the license term from 25 Hijri years to 40 Hijri years in total (to expire on 18th January 2047). The impact of this extension for the company was the immediate reduction of its license fee amortization, which amounts to approximately SAR 433 million (\$115 million) per annum, in effect reducing Zain KSA's net losses by the same amount.

Heavy investment in 3G & 4G network expansion upgrades across operations saw CAPEX spend for the year amount to \$635 million (excluding Saudi Arabia), reflecting 18 percent of Group revenues.

Commenting on the results, the Chairman of the Board of Directors of Zain Group, Asaad Al-Banwan said, "The Board is pleased to record relatively stable financial results; an achievement by the management given the many socio-economic challenges facing all our operations. The currency issue in Sudan in the last quarter of 2016 had an adverse impact on the results, as did the settlement of cumbersome litigation in Iraq that resulted in a payment of \$93 million. Nevertheless, we draw confidence from both the freeing of our cash deposits in Iraq and the favorable gesture by the Saudi leadership in extending our license in the Kingdom by an additional 15 years, which had a positive impact on the operation's financials and growth strategy."

The Chairman continued, "We have invested significantly in 3G / 4G network expansion upgrades across all our markets in order to improve the mobile experience for our customers. Our investments in capital expenditure reached \$635 million (excluding Zain Saudi Arabia), which represents 18 percent of our revenues, reflecting Zain's commitment to innovation and quality of service. I remain proud that we have been able to maintain our leadership position in the majority of the markets we operate in, testa-

Nevertheless, we are pleased with the progress of our cost optimization initiatives have had in driving efficiency, resulting in an impressive 47 percent

EBITDA margin for the year." Gegenheimer continued, "We are delighted by the success of our data monetization and Enterprise (B2B) initiatives across our operations, both of which are fast-growing and profitable business areas. During 2016 in key operations, we built-up dedicated B2B business units and premium B2B care models, installed state-of-the-art IoT/M2M platforms as well as developing new service propositions for Small Medium Enterprises and small home offices, leading to high-double digit sales growth. 

On Balance Volume (OBV): is a simple running total of up day (added) and down day (subtracted) volume. If OBV is moving with price, it confirms the current trend. Divergences between OBV and price indicates the price may be due for a reversal.

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MORTGAGE SERVICE FIRM OKS \$225M CALIFORNIA SETTLEMENT

SACRAMENTO, Calif: A mortgage services company signed a \$225 million settlement with California regulators on Friday to settle allegations it overcharged active-duty military members, was late in providing key information for some civilian borrowers seeking to modify their loans and violated other laws. Florida-based Ocwen Loan Servicing agreed to pay \$20 million to reimburse borrowers and make \$198 million in loan modifications over three years that will lower costs for thousands of California borrowers.

The settlement with the California Department of Business Oversight covers January 2012 through mid-2015, when Ocwen says it serviced more than 531,000 California loans. Under the terms, Ocwen may begin handling new California mortgages.

The settlement "will hold Ocwen accountable for widespread violations of laws that harmed borrowers in our state," department Commissioner Jan Lynn Owen said in a statement. Telephone and email messages left with Ocwen seeking comment were not immediately returned. Wilbur Ross, President Donald Trump's choice to head the U.S. Commerce Department, served on the board of Ocwen's parent company, Ocwen Financial Corp., in 2013-14. The billionaire investor sold subprime mortgage specialist Homeward Residential to Ocwen in 2012 amid investigations into his company's business practices.

Ocwen previously settled a lawsuit with the US Consumer Financial Protection Bureau and attorneys general in 49 states, including California, over alleged misconduct by Ocwen and by Homeward during the time it was under Ross's control. The Senate is expected to vote on his nomination during the week of Feb. 27.

Ocwen previously paid about \$2 million to more than 3,100 California borrowers because of what California regulators said was a practice of sending time-sensitive letters to borrowers after the date on the letter.

The tardy letters sometimes made it difficult for the borrowers to modify their loans, said regulators, who also found the company charged active-duty military personal more than the 6 percent rate mandated by federal law. The settlement requires the company to contact more than 19,000 borrowers and compensate them if they were harmed. —AP

IRAQ'S OIL RESERVES UP TO 153BN BARRELS

BAGHDAD: Iraq's oil reserves have increased to 153 billion barrels, from a previous estimate of 143 billion barrels, Oil Minister Jabal Al-Luaibi said yesterday.

Iraq will ask the Organization of the Petroleum Exporting Countries to adopt the new figure as the official estimate for its reserves, he said in a statement. The increased estimate is the result of appraisals and exploration carried out at seven oil fields in central and southern Iraq, he said. Iraq says proven oil reserves rise to 153 billion barrels.

Luaibi said that the increase comes from seven oil fields in central and southern Iraq, without naming them. Iraq will remain the fourth largest OPEC member, after Venezuela, Saudi Arabia and Iran. Oil revenues make up nearly 95 percent of Irag's budget. Like other oil-exporting countries, its economy has been hit hard by plummeting prices. —Agencies

PEUGEOT TO KEEP GERMAN **JOBS IF IT BUYS OPEL: REPORT**

BERLIN: French automaker PSA has pledged to keep Opel plants in Germany running if a planned merger goes forward, and to refrain from layoffs until at least 2019, a newspaper report said yesterday.

PSA, the parent company of France's Peugeot, Citroen and DS, has confirmed it is interested in taking over Opel, the German arm of US giant General Motors.

But the plans have sparked fears in Germany that Peugeot will cut jobs that overlap with existing positions in France. German newspaper Bild am Sonntag reported that Olivier Bourges, who sits on PSA's executive committee, had assured high-level German officials at a meeting at Chancellor Angela Merkel's office on Thursday that existing contracts would be respected.

They stipulate that redundancies in Germany's Opel workforce would be ruled out until the end of 2018 and that investment pledges for four German factories would be kept until at least 2020.

The Bild am Sonntag report did not cite its sources. "Peugeot wants to make sure it doesn't seem like a hostile takeover," an unidentified workers' representative told the newspaper. Bild said Opel executives expected PSA to set out the broad terms for a merger in the coming week, with the aim of signing the deal at the latest at the Geneva International Motor Show, which starts March 9. Founded in 1862 as a sewing machine maker, Opel, with its lightningbolt emblem, has long been a familiar sight on German and European roads.

But in recent years, the company has booked repeated losses, costing Detroitbased GM around \$15 billion (14 billion euros) since 2000. — AFP

COULD 'NEXIT' FOLLOW **BREXIT AFTER DUTCH POLLS?**

ROTTERDAM, Netherlands: For a small nation that has grown hugely wealthy thanks to centuries of doing business far and wide, the political mood in the Netherlands has turned surprisingly inward.

As a March 15 parliamentary election looms in the Netherlands - one of the founding members of the European Union - popular lawmaker Geert Wilders is dominating polls with an isolationist manifesto that calls for the Netherlands "to be independent again. So out of the EU."

After Britons voted last year to divorce from the EU, could a Dutch departure known here as "Nexit," after "Brexit" - be close behind? "I see the European Union as an old Roman Empire that is ceasing to exist. It will happen," Wilders said in an interview with the Associated Press.

Wilders' Party for Freedom is a serious contender to win the popular vote, with most polls a month out from the election showing it ahead of all other parties. Over the past dozen years, the Dutch have already voted in referenda against EU proposals twice. Few analysts think "Nexit" would materialize: Despite his popularity, Wilders will struggle to find coalition partners among mainstream parties, which shun him and his strident anti-Islam, anti-EU rhetoric.

Then again, few observers predicted last year that Britain would vote to become the first country to leave the EU, so the worries are real about the possible effects of a Nexit - or a further disintegration of European unity driven by the rise of nationalist populism throughout the continent.

An exit from the EU would likely deal a huge blow to Rotterdam, a cosmopolitan city known for its port, one of the world's busiest. The city employs 90,000 people, and a further 90,000 are directly linked to its activities elsewhere in the country. Port of Rotterdam corporate strategist Michiel Nijdam believed a Dutch exit from the EU seemed unlikely, though not impossible.

"Because we are so dependent on our trade with other countries that it would clearly hurt us so much that I don't think it's likely," he said. "But you never know what happens if a lot of people think it's a good idea and you vote on a party that is pro-Nexit." Nijdam was speaking in the port's imposing Norman Foster-designed headquarters, which commands views over the port and the Nieuw Maas river that bisects the city. Cranes at container terminals can be seen to the west, while low-slung barges glide past, heading eastward along

rivers and canals into the heart of Europe.

The port made a profit of 222 million euros last year as it dealt with 461 million metric tons of freight. Some 28,000 seagoing vessels and 100,000 inland waterway barges used the port in 2016.

"The effects will be the opposite of the effects we had from the opening of Europe," Nijdam said. "That means that it's more difficult to organize your logistics through the Netherlands, so it will clearly have an impact on supply chains that will shift their routes from Rotterdam to other ports. "The Netherlands will be less attractive that's for sure. For logistics it's not a good decision to leave the EU."

Wilders disagrees, pointing to a report his party commissioned that showed the Dutch economy would benefit from an exit. The Netherlands would remain a strong trading nation while saving billions in funding to the trade bloc, it claimed.

"The position of Rotterdam will really be the same after we would leave the European Union," he said. "It will not be that Rotterdam all of a sudden will have moved to Sweden."

Dutch bank Rabobank published four scenarios this month for the future of Europe and its effects. A scenario in which the bloc disintegrates amid a messy divorce from Britain and growing skepticism about Europe among remaining member states doesn't look pretty for the Netherlands or Rotterdam. The bank even suggested that a huge new extension to Rotterdam's port could turn into a "nature reserve." One Rabobank economist, Elwin de Groot, said Rotterdam's port underscores how deeply embedded the Netherlands is in the EU and its single market.

"We are the spider in the logistic web of Europe," he said. "So if that is affected by, for example, a Nexit ... that could have significant consequences for our economy." A new economic hit is the last thing this nation of 17 million needs. After being pummeled by the global economic crisis in 2007 and 2008, it was struck again around 2012 but is now bouncing back strongly. Figures released this month showed that the Netherlands' economy grew a robust 2.1 percent in 2016.

Rabobank researcher De Groot says a Nexit could slam the brakes on that growth. If the Netherlands were to leave the EU, he said, "suddenly we are confronted with all kinds of trade restrictions. That could have, you know, a very negative impact on the Dutch economy." —AP

IMF AGREES ON \$5BN LOAN TO DEBT-RIDDEN MONGOLIA

EXECUTIVE BOARD MUST CLEAR PACKAGE

ULAANBAATAR, Mongolia: The Mongolian government and envoys from the International Monetary Fund said yesterday that they and other partners have agreed on terms for a more than \$5 billion loan package to the north Asian country to help get its economy back on track.

The deal is subject to approval by the IMF's executive board, which is expected to consider Mongolia's request in March. Under the preliminary agreement, the IMF would provide \$440 million over three years. The Asian Development Bank, World Bank, Japan and South Korea are together expected to provide up to \$3 billion, and the People's Bank of China is expected to extend its 15 billion RMB (\$2 billion) swap line with the Bank of Mongolia for at least another three years, the IMF said in a statement. Finance Minister Choijilsuren Battogtokh said that the six-month negotiations had been tough, and that the government would be revising its 2017 budget before the IMF executive board considers whether to approve the loan.

He said the government proposed to bring in more money for the budget by increasing income, fuel and other taxes, and by raising the retirement age from 55 to 65 for women, and from 60 to 66 for men. Its proposals have to be approved by parliament during a session in March, which is likely ecause the ruling Mongolian People's Party has a clear majority.

Battogtokh said that with the loan package, the government estimated growth would be "below zero percent" in 2017, 1.8 percent in 2018 and 8.1 percent in 2019. The economy of mineralrich Mongolia has been hit hard in recent years by a sharp decline in commodity prices and a collapse in foreign direct investment.

Mongolia's national debt now stands at about \$23 billion, or twice the annual economic output, and a \$580 million payment to foreign bondholders is due March 21. Battogtokh said that the government, at the IMF's suggestion, will refinance the \$580 million bond with another similar commercial bond.

"We will offer the new bonds at a marketfriendly rate," the finance ministry said on its website. The IMF statement said the loan agreement would mean Mongolia has to strengthen its banking system and adopt fiscal reforms to ensure that budget discipline is maintained. Generally, terms required by the IMF as a condition for such lending prompt complaints in borrower countries that the conditions hurt the poor or undercut economic growth by reducing social spending or investment in public facilities.

Adding to Mongolia's woes is an exceptionally cold winter for the second straight year, which the Red Cross warned last week was putting the livelihoods of more than 150,000 nomadic herders and family members at risk. Dale Choi, an analyst with the Mongolia Metals and Mining research firm, said the agreement announced Sunday means investors can now make assumptions and investment decisions. "It brings clarity, which investors have been waiting for," he said. Associated Press writer Louise Watt in Beijing contributed to this report. —AP

THE MAN WHO TURNED THE LIGHTS ON IN **ENERGY-STARVED NEPAL**

KATHMANDU: The continuous whirl of a public awareness campaign to encour hair dryers is a novel sound at the Blush Beauty Point parlor in Nepal's capital Kathmandu, which until just five months ago had to close at regular intervals because of power cuts.

Scheduled power cuts-known as loadshedding-have been a part of daily life in the impoverished landlocked country for decades, forcing small businesses to rely on expensive generators or simply close when the lights went out.

"We had to run our business according to the load-shedding schedule. Clients would call and check if there was light," the salon's owner Anita Shrestha told AFP.

But that has all changed since Kulman Ghising was appointed head of the Nepal Electricity Authority in September last year. Load-sheddingpreviously up to 16 hours a day in the winter dry season has all but ended in the country's three largest cities and in other major towns been reduced to around two hours on alternate days.

"When I was appointed I set the goal that I would at least make Kathmandu load-shedding free," Ghising told AFP.

"But at that time I felt that whatever I said I could manage more than that." Demand for electricity has long outstripped supply in Nepal, with energy production severely depressed by chronic under-investment and inefficiencies in the power network. The result has been crippling for domestic industry and deterred foreign investment, while crucial infrastructure development has flagged in the years of political paralysis that followed the end of the Maoist insurgency in 2006 and the overthrow of the monarchy two years later.

Political alignment

Ghising's formula to end the power cuts involved tackling some basic inefficiencies. He overhauled the hydropower generation system-storing water at times of low demand so more could be generated at peak hours. He also ended a policy that provided electricity round the clock to certain industries.

The policy was meant to give 24hour power to around 20 big employers, but had expanded after decades of mission creep-and backhanders. "Before there was some mismanagement that some industries get 24 hours (of power), some industries get 12 hours, some industries get only 8 hours. There was unequal distribution of electricity that was not as per the rules of NEA," said Ghising.

In addition, he brought online some power plants that had been sitting idle due to poor maintenance, and launched age people to avoid electricity-guzzling activities-like ironing and pumping water-in the evenings when demand for power is at its highest.

But arguably the single greatest weapon Ghising has is the backing of the prime minister and the energy and finance ministers. For one of the first times in Nepal's short history as a parliamentary democracy, all four are members of the Maoist party and that political alignment is bearing fruit.

The country is due to hold its first local elections in nearly two decades later this year and the Maoists need to show results to boost their chances at the polls.

Hydro potential

But while Ghising might have turned on the lights for much of Nepal, the country will need to harness its huge hydropower potential to keep the electricity flowing. "It's cautious optimism because we are known to squander opportunities," said Sujeev Shakya, founder of the Kathmandu-based Nepal Economic Forum, of the recent drop in


load-shedding. He added: "Now at (the) NEA you have a good guy and he may try to reform, but the system is designed to take care of the interests of few." Nepal with its mountain river system should be an energy-producing powerhouse. Experts say it could be generating 83,000 megawatts of power, but its total installed generation capacity currently stands at less than two percent of that.

Construction on two long mooted projects is finally expected to begin later this year. It will take around seven years before they come online, but even one would double Nepal's current generation capacity, eventually transforming it into an energy exporter. That would be a game changer for the Himalayan nation, which currently relies on India for electricity in the winter dry season.

But with the average tenure of governments in Nepal at around seven months, many are concerned that another change at the top could reverse the recent gains. "Development of hydro energy infrastructure requires a long-term view. And with these shortterm governments it's very difficult to believe they can have a long-term view," said Shakya. And on the now lit streets of Kathmandu, suspicion darkens the mood.

"I don't know the details, but I feel like Nepalis were kept in the dark for too long," said Shrestha as she styled a client's hair into cascading curls. "There is a tension that there will be power cuts again if the government changes."—AFP

LONDON STOCKS GET UNILEVER FIZZ AS TRUMP RALLY FADES

LONDON: World stock markets eased back on Friday as a Trump-fuelled surge fizzled out, but London gained in an end-of-week flurry of excitement prompted by a Kraft Heinz bid for

"After a five-day running streak markets are looking a bit tired," said Jasper Lawler at London Capital Group, adding that losses were light so far and "no justification for alarm".

Wall Street fell, as did Paris, while Frankfurt ended the day unchanged with strong Allianz results helping the Dax index off its earlier lows. But London posted closing gains as Unilever shares surged, topping the day's winners, after the Kraft bid which the Dutch company rejected. Dutch-British giant Unilever, whose main listing is in London, saw its stock rise by 13.6 percent by the close. Kraft Heinz said it had made an offer to Unilever to merge both companies, creating a leading consumer goods company. But Unilever turned down the bid, saying the \$143 billion offer "fundamentally undervalues" the company, and that it saw no basis for further talks.

Kraft may be back

Kraft, however, promised to continue trying. Mike van Dulken at Accendo Markets said Unilever's initial thumbs-down was par for the course in takeover negotiations. "If someone is that interested, they'll be back with a better offer. Which Kraft may well do," he said. He said a 30 percent premium over the targets' last share price has been the average in takeovers in recent years, which compares with the 18 percent that Kraft has brought to the table.

The Unilever stock surge helped London recoup early losses, as did renewed sterling weakness after news of a fresh drop in British retail sales. A weaker pound boosts the earnings outlook for British exporters which are heavily represented in the FTSE 100 benchmark index. But elsewhere investors kept taking profits, capping a rally fuelled by US President Donald Trump's announcement of a "phenomenal" tax plan, as uncertainty crept in over his ability to deliver.

Remarks by Trump during a Thursday news conference clearly had investors rattled. "The week will be finishing with investors weighing

up the likelihood of another Trump Twitter rampage or press conference," said Michael Hewson at CMC Markets.

Honeymoon over?

"Whilst these create great headlines for the media it does little to improve stability in the markets, and many will be wondering whether the honeymoon period is over already." There remained a lot of uncertainty, particularly with Trump's first weeks in office engulfed in controversies, most recently over his relationship with Russia, dealers said. "The current political landscape is unlikely to change soon, nor will the debates surrounding tax, fiscal and Fed policies," said Oanda analyst Stephen Innes. "As such we should expect the markets to come under renewed pressure and to be severely tested in the weeks to come." The dollar recovered, underpinned by Fed chief Janet Yellen's comments this week to Congress that the economy continued to improve, leaving open the chance of a March rate hike.

Elsewhere in forex markets, the ruble gave up some of its spectacular recent gains after Russia's Economy Minister Maxim Oreshkin said that authorities expected the ruble to begin weakening soon, but would react if the currency continues to strengthen.

But at current levels the greenback is still 10 percent lower against the ruble than it was three months ago, and 23 percent lower than a year ago. —AFP

YELLEN DEFENDS FED POLICY AS GROWTH SLOWS

ow that Fed Chair Yellen's tenure is coming close to an end, the market is likely to start shifting its focus on her potential replacement. In addition, coming April, there will be three vacancies on the board of governors of the Federal Reserve and given the fact that the republicans have the congress and the senate, it is likely to be an easy task for the President to appoint people close to his agenda.

This week, Yellen faced tense criticism during her testimony in front of the House of Representatives, mainly from lawmakers who viewed that low interest rates and buying large amounts of bonds from the market in response to the last financial crisis led to the slowest US economic recovery since the Second World War. Although, Yellen defended the FED's policy by claiming the Fed used the appropriate tools to rescue the economy from disaster, she admitted the recovery hasn't been at par.

Yellen elaborated that economic growth in the US continues to accelerate with inflation edging higher and the labor market remains near full employment. She added that waiting too long to hike rates will eventually lead to a faster pace of tightening, causing financial instability and increase the chance of a recession.

During the second day of testimony, Yellen said "Unemployment has come down substantially and we're quite close to achieving our labor market objectives, but slow productivity growth hasn't helped." Moreover she asserted "the economic growth performance has been quite disappointing," a point she agrees on with the president.

On the currency front, the US dollar index started the week in positive territory and reached a high of 101.76 on Wednesday due to the robust economic data and Yellen's hawkish comments on the first day of the congressional testimony. However, the bullish momentum was short lived as Yellen's second day of testimony was less hawkish after she stated that economic growth has been quite disappointing. The index opened the week at 100.95 and ended the week 100.95.

The EURUSD was on a down trend at the start of the week on worries over political uncertainties in Europe. However, on Wednesday the euro started to reverse its losses after the dollar dipped. The single currency opened the week at 1.0630 against the dollar and reached a low of 1.0520. On Friday, the EURUSD pair closed at 1.0611.

period on Monday after the Japan-US summit ended smoothly in Washington and President Trump did not talk about the Yen's devaluation. The pair then jumped on Tuesday after Yellen's Hawkish comments and rose to a high of 114.95 on Wednesday. The bullish momentum

did not last for long and continued its decline until Friday. The pair started the weekly session at 113.63 and ended at 112.85.

In the commodities space, gold opened the week at \$1,231 and depreciated after President Trump spoke about tax cuts reaching the market fairly quickly. On Wednesday the price of gold fell to a one week low at \$1,216, however the drop was short lived after the dollar backed away from its upward momentum closing the week at \$1,235.

Oil was particularly volatile this week as the market took crude prices as high at \$53.59, before tumbling to \$52.68 on Friday, and then reverse again into the close to actually finish up +0.60% at around \$53.36. A combination of growing US inventories following the latest EIA data and a news report suggesting that OPEC could look to extend the six-month production cut both seemed to play their part.

Strong growth

The latest data from the Philadelphia Fed indicate that manufacturing activity continues to expand after falling over the last couple of years by depressed energy investment and weak global demand. The February Philadelphia Fed manufacturing index jumped 19.7 points to 43.3, the largest onemonth gain since June 2009. The figure is now at its highest level since January 1984 at 47.0. More importantly, the details of the survey showed an improvement that point to an ongoing increase in business spending this year. New orders came at 38.0 against expectations of 26.0 and shipments at 28.6 versus 20.5. In addition, one of most observed series within the Philadelphia Fed survey, the six-month outlook for capital expenditures, remained elevated in February. The broader pickup in manufacturing sentiment bodes well for business spending, which has been extremely depressed over the past year. Looking at historical patterns, in 1984 when the Philly Fed index was around the 44 level, the GDP growth was at 7.3 percent. Based on the historical relationship, the data would point to a GDP growth of at least 6 percent for this year.

Retail sales as well continue to expand for a fifth consecutive month even though inflation soared near four years high. US retail sales came in at 0.4 percent on a monthly basis, The USDJPY appreciated for a short well above market expectations of 0.1 percent and compared to January last year retail sales were up 5.6 percent. The jump in retail sales is mainly due to the purchases of electronics and appliances, which advanced 1.6 percent in January, the most since June 2015. Consumer spending accounts for as much as 70 percent

of US economic growth, reinforcing optimism that consumer spending will be able to push economic growth at the beginning of 2017.

Last but not least, US inflation rose for a third consecutive month due to surge in prices for clothing, new vehicles, gasoline and other commodities. The consumer price index jumped 0.6 percent in January from the previous month of 0.3 percent, the largest gain since February 2013. Last month's data placed the yearly CPI at 2.5 percent, the biggest year on year gain since March 2012. Core CPI also increased slightly by 0.1 percent to 0.3 percent on a monthly basis and to 2.3 percent from January 2016.

On the wholesale level, prices recorded their biggest jump in more than four years. The producer price

Nevertheless, if the recovery in the EMU continues on the back of a strong global growth, the tone of the central bank should potentially turn more hawkish in 2017.

Despite the ongoing political uncertainties, the eurozone economic recovery is expected to advance at higher rate in 2017 and 2018 than previously anticipated by the European Commission. Looking at future prospects, the European Commission predicts eurozone GDP growth of 1.6 percent in 2017 and 1.8 percent in 2018. The latest data is

index for final demand jumped by 0.3 percent to 0.6 percent last month as half of the gain is attributed to a 12.9 percent surge in gasoline prices. Despite the month to month gain, the PPI only increased by 1.6 percent on a yearly basis.

In summary, the strong data along with the up trending inflation at a three year high have brought the Fed close to the target of 2 percent inflation with full employment. This is why, looking now at the dot plot, the Fed has more ammunition to move faster into a tightening mode in 2017.

Europe & UK

The main event in the Euro zone this week was the publication of the latest ECB meeting minutes which confirmed that the ECB's underlying message remains unchanged. The dovish stance was evident with the ECB remaining reluctant to consider any unwinding of its quantitative

According to the report, the recovery in Europe is positively correlated to the growth expectations in developed economies outside the EU, which have improved in recent months. The improvement of anticipated growth in developed nations is largely due to the expectations of a fiscal stimulus in the United States.

Greece...Again?

During the past week, Greece has returned as a concern for markets. The second review of its third Ä86 billion bailout has run into roadblocks which need to be cleared ahead of large debt redemptions in mid-July. The second review is also when the IMF has to decide whether it wants to participate in the program. This all will require difficult compromises between Greece and its European creditors, and potentialdelayed response to the post-referendum uncertainty. Alternatively the rise in input costs and prices following the fall in GBP during the last eight months may be finally starting to bite. Either way, retail sales growth is now at its lowest since 2013.

Moreover, inflation reached the highest level since June 2014, as the consumer price index year on year rose from 1.6 percent in December to 1.8 percent in January versus a forecast of 1.9 percent. The higher inflation is attributed to a jump in energy prices, which is up by almost 88 percent from last year and a weaker currency since the vote to leave the

European Union. The data on UK's labor market showed real wage growth fell to a two-year low towards the end of 2016 as earnings growth declined by 0.2 percent quarterly to 2.6 percent. On the other hand, employment hit a new high of 74.6 percent in Q4 2016, while the unemployment rate remained at an 11 year low of 4.8 percent.

On the monetary front, speculation on monetary tightening has increased since inflation has accelerate for four consecutive months and the Bank expects inflation will rise above 2.7 percent in a year time as Brexit pushes cost of imports higher. However, the BoE expects wage growth to fall further to 2.2 percent in 2017. In summary, the central bank may not be able to raise interest rates until wage growth picks up and as UK's economy adjusts through Brexit uncertainties.

China's inflation

China's consumer price index soared in January to a level not seen since June 2014 due to rising energy prices and higher demand for food during the Lunar New Year festival. The CPI index year to year accelerated from 2.1 percent in December to 2.5 percent for January versus a forecast of 2.4 percent. However, the rise in inflation may be short lived as the increase in food demand is a seasonal appetite.

On the producer front, the producer price index continues its upward momentum since September 2015. The index climbed 6.9 percent in January from a year earlier and 1.4 percent month to month, this sets the PPI to the largest rise since 2011. The boost is attributed to a rebound in commodity prices including iron ore and oil. In details, mining products surged 31 percent year on year while those for raw materials climbed 12.9 percent. In conclusion, the continuous rise in PPI is elevating global inflation as the world's largest exporter transfers the bill to its clients after emerging from years of deflation.

Continuous growth

The Japanese economy continues to expand for a straight fourth quarter, a streak not seen in three years led by solid exports and firmer capital expenditure. The Latest data shows that overseas demand now accounts for about half of the expansion in gross domestic product, leaving the economy particularly exposed to any new trade barriers from the US, which is Japan's biggest export market after China.

On a quarterly basis, the economy grew 0.2 percent in the fourth quarter versus a forecast of 0.3 percent, placing the yearly growth at 1 percent and also missing an expected growth of 1.1 percent. In conclusion, the strength in exports that has supported economic growth indicates how important it is for Prime Minister Shinzo Abe to ease trade tensions with the Trump administration.

INVEST GLOBALLY WITH THEMATIC STRATEGY

here are the traditional investments that are based on first identifying the global economic cycle then trying to be ahead of the next cycle by positioning your investment



accordingly. This investment tradition has been going on for more than a century. However, in recent years this way of investing has become somehow nonrewarding for those who want to outperform the market. Thematic investments have been very rewarding for those who have the patient and the wish of their

What is Thematic Investing?

It goes way beyond the old way of investing, being geographical or sectorial approach. Thematic investing involves lots of research that are based on one or more investment themes. It pursues to identify the themes and future economic trends that are going to push market returns in the future. Equity researchers and investment managers can only pick on trends and follow them rigorously so they can identify the industry and companies that can deliver on those themes. Once identified investors can easily exposure themselves to a few selected companies then wait to achieves the returns they targeting. At the end it is all

about finding future growth opportunities. Over the past decade or so, the traditional investments have been less attractive and been delivering mediocre returns to investors. An investment that is based on a specific theme approach should help equity investors to achieve superior returns. Traditional investors who want to invest in themes, should first use the top-down analysis of global and regional macroeconomic trends then select sectors and companies that are best fit to benefit from new trends. However, within a region or sector, performance may be driven by specific trends that can only be identified with a thorough bottom-up analysis of the companies in this region or sector. Linking this bottom-up analysis with the top-down process, investors should be able to recognize the trends and investment themes that are likely to deliver the outperformance that are desperately needed nowadays.

Thematic investing requires much focused approach and it helps greatly in narrowing the search for good investments ideas. Usually investments themes start with small events that could be initiated by governments, industry or simply by changing in consumer's behaviors. Investors should not mix new investments themes with some old themes that might become a fashion these days. Investing in sectors that are going to upgrade old infrastructure or in new planned infrastructure are not investments themes and are not going to deliver excellent returns. For instance,

Donald Trump has spoken about big spending on US infrastructure and Europe might do the same. Yes, there might be big spending on neglected and outdated infrastructure in the US and Europe but again these are not new investment themes.

One investment theme that has been dominating the car industry is the introduction of the electric-powered cars. Tesla, the US-based electric car company, which is owned and run by billionaire Elon Musk, hopes to boost production tenfold to 500,000 vehicles by 2018. Such is the optimism surrounding environment-friendly electric cars that many say that in 20 years the majority of cars on the road will be powered by electricity.

It is not going to be an easy ride for the electric-powered cars. It still faces some difficulties though. A big issue for the industry is the lack of modern high tech infrastructure that is needed to support and maintain this kind of cars. One of the most important issue for the electric car industry to be successful is to have a network of charging stations to enable more mainstream take-up, but this will take time and investments to achieve and importantly needs government help. There is no doubt that the demand for the electric car is growing year by year but it is still in its infancy. Electric car sales are growing just by 1 percent annually putting this in numbers is just around million out of over 100 million cars sold annually worldwide.

Despite the difficulties that are electric car industry is facing, equity investors who have the time horizon on their side will be reward handsomely in the long run. Investors should avoid the traditional or the electric car manufacturers and should focus on the broader supply chain; in particular, the power-providing components, communication equipment's, radars, censors and batteries which are typically rechargeable lithium and cathode batteries.

But when it comes to investing in battery producers, it is difficult to see viable investment opportunities that give good exposure to the electric-car theme. A major challenge is finding suppliers with sufficient exposure to this area instead of consumer-focused batteries. Although some pure-play battery producers have emerged as start-ups, their track record is not promising. To avoid any potential risk with battery producers, investors should focus on the components and materials that go into the batteries themselves.

Sustainability appeals to an increasing number of investors, both as a theme and a way for investors to support their convictions. We find that with the increased use of batteries in electric vehicles and electric storage systems, for instance, investing along the value chain of battery production is one of the most promising themes for the coming year. It taps into a fast growing market and offers some benefits of diversification for traditional stock portfolios. The electric powered car is becoming reality and with time it is becoming affordable, investors should take a long look at the industry and the supply chain and invest in a new revolution in the auto industry. @rasameel

WEANING OFF OIL, SCOTTISH ISLES EYE RENEWABLE FUTURE

LERWICK, United Kingdom: Strong winds and stormy seas have helped turn the Shetland Islands in the North Atlantic into a European renewable energy giant, producing more power than it knows what to do with. The tidal power underwater turbines that were completed last month are only the latest green energy project for an archipelago that has been reliant for decades on the North Sea offshore industry. Even homeowners are getting in on the act with small wind turbines in their gardens and solar panels on their roofs-somewhat optimistically in an area where winter daylight lasts just six hours.

"We're not 100 percent self-sufficient but we're quite a long way towards it," Jim Dickson, 69, told AFP at his home in the windswept village of Brae, referring to electricity generation for his own house.

Dickson, who lives near the Sullom Voe oil terminal, can power the building and an electric powered Nissan Leaf car from a turbine in his garden with enough left over to feed into the island's grid when conditions are favourable.

"What I make from the government for producing per kilowatt hour more than pays for what I buy from the grid, so effectively there is no power bill."

The former harbour master knows about the dangers of fossil fuels.

He was winched aboard the out of control oil tanker MV Braer in 1993 during the worst cyclone on record in the North Atlantic, in an ill-fated attempt to prevent it running aground.

His efforts to attach a tow rope failed and the ship crashed into the rocks at Quendale Bay, spilling 84,700 tons of crude oil into the sea. The nation was aghast at images of Shetland's famous seabirds drowning in black ooze.

Harnessing the sea

The oil industry in Shetland began in the 1970s with the development of the North Sea fields. The Brent field east of the archipelago became an emblem of the industry, with "Brent Crude" becoming a benchmark for oil trading around the world. Oil giant Shell has announced plans to decommission the field but new discoveries west of Shetland could give a boost to the industry.

French energy firm Total has invested £3.5 billion (4.1 billion euros, \$4.4 billion) in a new gas plant near Sullom Voe that opened last year to extract gas from its fields west of Shetland, Laggan and Tormore. "Producing gas and oil from the west of Shetland basin is very, very challenging," field operations manager Simon Hare told AFP on a hill overlooking the plant, a sprawling development which stands in sharp contrast to the rest of the islands' natural beauty. The gas plant is designed for a lifetime of 30 years. But environmentalists are pinning their hopes on another energy asset under the waters around Shetland.

"In tidal, we're very fortunate in Scotland," said Patrick Ross-Smith, Shetland development officer at Nova Innovation, which has installed three 100 Kilowatt turbines in the Bluemull Sound.

Scotland has 24 percent of Europe's entire marine energy potential because of its powerful tides.

"It's great to harness some of that in Shetland," he said. The turbines' success has had the odd effect of creating too much power. "The Shetland grid is itself constrained now. It cannot take any more renewables," he said. Around 10 percent of the islands' electricity is generated from renewables and wind and tidal generators are only licenced to produce up to that limit. —AFP



RENAULT-NISSAN ALLIANCE DELIVERS SIGNIFICANT GROWTH IN 2016

Alliance sales reach 9,961,347 vehicles in 2016, one in 9 cars sold worldwide

DUBAI: The Renault-Nissan Alliance on-year increase of 374,000 units. delivered significant growth in 2016, with global sales of 9.96 million vehicles. The car group also reinforced its leadership in zero-emission vehicles with cumulative sales of nearly 425,000 electric vehicles since the introduction of the Nissan LEAF in 2010, followed by the Renault ZOE.

The Alliance sales figures include Mitsubishi Motors sales of 934,013 vehicles globally. Mitsubishi Motors joined the Alliance last fall with Nissan's acquisition of a 34 percent equity stake in the

"The combination of Groupe Renault, Nissan Motors and Mitsubishi Motors creates a new force in the global auto industry," said chairman and CEO Carlos Ghosn. "The strength of this innovative partnership that began 18 years ago has allowed us to improve our competitiveness, boost our growth and engage in the race for the vehicle of the future." The Alliance brands accounted for about one in nine cars sold worldwide last year.

Groupe Renault's sales were up 13.3 percent to 3,182,625 vehicles in 2016 for the last year of the "Drive the Change" plan. This marked the fourth consecutive year of sales growth with a record year-

Both Renault and Dacia brands had a record year in terms of sales volumes and Renault Samsung Motors volumes were up by 38.8 percent. Market share and sales volumes are up in all regions, with the Renault brand becoming No 2 in

Nissan Motor Co Ltd sold a record 5,559,902 cars and trucks worldwide, up 2.5 percent. In the USA and China, the company achieved sales growth of 5.4 percent and 8.4 percent respectively, setting new records in both markets. Infiniti sold over 230,000 vehicles in 2016, a 7 percent increase from the previous year. In December alone, Infiniti sold 27,200 vehicles, an 18 percent increase versus the prior year.

Mitsubishi Motors sold 934,013 cars worldwide, down 13 percent. Sales grew in the United States and Australia, but were offset by lower sales in Brazil, Russia, and the Middle East. Japan sales were also affected by lower consumer confidence following the fuel consumption issue.

Through Nissan's partnership with Mitsubishi Motors, Nissan expects to target synergy benefits worth 24 billion yen



in fiscal year 2017, rising to 60 billion yen in fiscal year 2018 and beyond. The gains will contribute to increased earnings per share worth an estimated 4 yen per share in fiscal year 2017 and 10 yen per share in fiscal year 2018 - on top of any earnings accretion linked to Nissan's overall shareholding in Mitsubishi Motors.

AVTOVAZ, which sells cars under the LADA brand, sold 284,807 vehicles. Together, the Renault-Nissan Alliance and AVTOVAZ sell about one in three cars in Russia.

Sustained leadership in electric vehicles

The Renault-Nissan Alliance, with Mitsubishi Motors, cumulatively sold 424,797 electric vehicles through 2016, making it the undisputed leader in zero-

emission mobility. The Nissan LEAF, the first mainstream, mass-marketed electric vehicle, remains the world's best-selling EV with more than 250,000 vehicles sold since its launch in December 2010.

In addition to the LEAF, Nissan also sells the e-NV200, a light commercial vehicle sold mainly in Europe and Japan since 2014. Renault has sold more than 112,000 electric vehicles worldwide since 2011, including the Renault ZOE, Kangoo Z.E., Fluence Z.E., the SM3 Z.E. and the Twizy.

Renault was at the top of the European EV market last year, with sales up by 11 percent at 25,648 units (excluding Twizy). ZOE led the EV ranking with 21,735 sold. Renault Pro+ recently announced the addition of two new commercial EVs to its lineup: the

New Kangoo Z.E. and Master Z.E. In 2016, the Renault-Nissan Alliance, including Mitsubishi Motors i-Miev series, sold 94,265 EVs, up more than 8 percent from 2015.

Boosting innovation for the vehicle of the future

In 2016, the Renault-Nissan Alliance took several steps to advance the development of future vehicles that will be electric, autonomous and connected.

The Alliance plans to launch at least 10 models with autonomous drive functionality by 2020. Development and tests of connectivity and autonomous drive technologies are underway with several partners, including Microsoft and NASA.

"We were the first to launch an affordable electric car back in 2010. Other major automakers are now recognizing that EVs are the most effective zero-emission solution," Ghosn said. "With autonomous drive and connected cars and services, we are firmly engaged in the race for the vehicle of the future."

KIPCO SUCCESSFULLY COMPLETES TEN-YEAR \$500M BOND ISSUE


KUWAIT: KIPCO - the Kuwait Projects Company (Holding) - has announced that it has successfully completed the issuance of a \$500 million (KD 152.5 million) bond under its \$3 billion Euro Medium Term Note (EMTN) Program, with a simultaneous tender of its existing 2019 bonds. The new issue was four times oversubscribed.

The ten-year fixed rate notes, issued at a fixed rate coupon of 4.5 percent, set a new benchmark for the issuer. KIPCO was met with a solid reception by investors during a global roadshow - covering key centers across Hong Kong, Singapore and London - while the tender period was ongoing, and prior to the launch and issue of its tenyear bond. The success of the trade was evident in the tightening of the initial price guidance of the KIPCO bond by a significant 37.5 basis points to the final issue price, reflecting the global and regional investors' recognition of the company's credit quality among a busy period of regional MENA supply.

The bond issuance took place alongside a repurchase of its existing five-year bond maturing in 2019 that carried a fixed coupon rate of 4.8 percent through a simultaneous any-and-all tender process made to investors. The purchase price was set at 105.25 percent and 53 percent of holders opted to tender. KIPCO is the first-ever company to execute a liability management exercise out of Kuwait, and is the first company in the MENA region to do so this year.

Commenting on the transactions, KIPCO's Vice Chairman (Executive), Faisal Al-Ayyar said:

"The order book of around \$2 billion is a reflection of the confidence that the global investors have in our sound business model and prudent practices. KIPCO led this journey for Kuwaiti issuers when it began to issue bonds in international markets in 2006. Since then, KIPCO has educated global investors about the fundamental strength of the Kuwait economy and how it stands out in the MENA region and the world. This decade-long effort fulfils our purpose of

being a role model for the private sector in the MENA region."

On his part, Pinak Maitra, KIPCO's Group Chief Financial Officer said: "The success of the 2017 bond issue, eleven years after the debut issue, confirms that global investors support regular engagement and reward issuers with fine pricing for this investor interaction. This is reflected in the tightening of the KIPCO 2023 bond by 59 basis points from December 31, 2016. Also, despite a fairly priced tender offer for the KIPCO 2019 bonds, 47 percent of the holders chose to hold on to their notes, demonstrating demand for KIPCO bonds across the maturity spectrum. The two transactions result in the extension of the average life of KIPCO's debt to 5.6 years and reduce overall cost of funds."

The issue attracted 205 investors, including leading fixed income global institutions, insur-

ance companies and pension funds. The bond order book closed at \$2 billion. The bonds were allocated across a wide range of quality investors. SMARTPHONES ARE REVOLUTIONIZING MEDICINE

diagnosis and treatment of illnesses, thanks to add-ons and apps that make their ubiquitous small screens into medical devices, researchers say. "If you look at the camera, the flash, the microphone... they all are getting better and better," said Shwetak Patel, engineering professor at the University of Washington. "In fact the capabilities on those phones are as great as some of the specialized devices," he told the American Association for the Advancement of Science (AAAS) annual meeting this week.

Smartphones can already act as pedometers, count calories and measure heartbeats. But mobile devices and tablets can also become tools for diagnosing illness. "You can use the microphone to diagnose asthma, COPD (chronic obstructive pulmonary disorder)," Patel said. "With these enabling technologies you can manage chronic diseases outside of the clinic and with a non-invasive clinical tool." It is also possible to use the camera and flash

BOSTON: Smartphones are revolutionizing the diagnosis and treatment of illnesses, thanks to including iron and hemoglobin deficiency.

"You put your finger over the camera flash and it gives you a result that shows the level of hemoglobin in the blood," Patel said. An app called HemaApp was shown to perform comparably well as a non-smartphone device for measuring hemoglobin without a needle. Researchers are seeking approval from the US Food and Drug Administration for its wider use. Smartphones can also be used to diagnose osteoporosis, a bone disorder common in the elderly. Just hold a smartphone, turn on the right app in hand and tap on your elbow.

"Your phone's motion picture sensor picks up the resonances that are generated," Patel said. "If there is a reduction in density of the bone, the frequency changes, which is the same as you will have in an osteoporosis bone." Such advances can empower patients to better manage their own care, Patel said. "You can imagine the broader

impact of this in developing countries where screening tools like this in the primary care offices are non-existent," he told reporters. "So it really changes the way we diagnose, treat and manage chronic diseases."

Lower costs

Mobile smartphone devices are already helping patients manage cancer and diabetes, says Elizabeth Mynatt, professor at the Georgia Institute of Technology. "Someone who is newly diagnosed with diabetes really needs to become their own detectives," she said. "They need to learn the changes they need to make in their daily lifestyle." For women newly diagnosed with breast cancer, researchers provided a tablet that allows them real-time access to information on the diagnosis, management of their treatment and side effects.

The technique also helps patients who may not be able to travel to a medical office for regular care, reducing their costs. "Our tool becomes a personal

support system," Mynatt said. "They can interact to get day-to-day advice." Research has shown this approach "changes dramatically their behavior," she added. "The pervasiveness of the adoption of mobile platform is quite encouraging for grappling with pervasive socio-economic determinants in terms of healthcare disparities."

A growing number of doctors and researchers are turning to smartphones for use in their daily work, seeing them as a useful tool for managing electronic health data and figuring out the most effective clinical trials, said Gregory Hager, professor of computer science at Johns Hopkins University. Clinical trials currently cost around \$12 million to run from start to finish, he said. "The new idea is micro-randomized trials, which should be far more effective, with more natural data," he said. Although the costs could be dramatically lower, too, the field is still new and more work needs to be done to figure out how to fully assess the quality and the effectiveness of such trials. —AFP

SPACEX BLASTS OFF CARGO FROM HISTORIC NASA LAUNCHPAD

CARGO EXPECTED TO ARRIVE AT THE SPACE STATION ON FEB 22

MIAMI: SpaceX yesterday blasted off its Falcon 9 rocket carrying the unmanned Dragon cargo ship, packed with food and supplies for the six astronauts living at the International Space Station.

The white rocket soared into the cloudy, gray skies over Cape Canaveral, Florida at 9.38 am (1438 GMT). The mission was the first to take off from NASA's historic launchpad 39A, the origin of the pioneering US spaceflights that took

astronauts to the Moon in the 1960s and 1970s, as well as the space shuttle missions that ran from 1981 to 2011. The launch was initially planned for Saturday, but was canceled just 13 seconds before liftoff due to a glitch with the rocket engine

"They resolved all the technical issues last night," said NASA's Bob Cabana, director of Kennedy Space Center. The origin of the problem-a piece of equipment known as the thrust vector control actuator in the second stage-was replaced. Subsequent tests showed it was working fine, a SpaceX spokesman explained. The unmanned spaceship is packed with more than 5,000 pounds of food, gear and science experiments for the astronauts in orbit. It is the 10th such resupply mission for SpaceX, which along with Orbital ATK has a multi-year contract with NASA to send supplies to the International Space Station. The cargo is expected to arrive at the space station on Feb 22, a SpaceX spokesman said.


Successful landing

About 10 minutes after the launch, SpaceX refired the engines on the booster portion of the Falcon 9, guiding it down to a controlled, upright landing at a different part of Cape Canaveral. "The Falcon has landed once again," a SpaceX spokeswoman said on a live webcast, as loud cheers and applause erupted at the company's mission control center in Hawthorne, California. The touchdown marked the third time SpaceX has managed to stick a landing on solid ground. Other such landings have taken place on floating ocean platforms, as the company perfects its techniques of powering costly rocket parts back to land instead of jettisoning them in the ocean after a single use.

Crew vehicle

SpaceX is also developing a version of its Dragon capsule that can one day carry astronauts to space. SpaceX says the first crew flights will take place in 2018, though a Government Accountability Office (GAO) report out last week predicted that schedule delays and budget cuts would push it back to 2019. SpaceX's chief operating officer Gwynne Shotwell insisted Friday that the company is on target for 2018, saying she was "very confident" in that deadline.

The retirement of the US space shuttle program in 2011 left the United States without any spacecraft for sending people into orbit. Since then, the world's astronauts have hitched rides aboard Russia's Soyuz spaceships, which fit three people at a time. The cost for a single astronaut's transport is currently \$82 million, the GAO report said.— AFP

MILWAUKEE TO POKEMON MONSTERS: GET A PERMIT TO ENTER PARKS

MILWAUKEE: "Pokemon Go" monsters can roam virtually wherever they please, but they'll need a permit to get into Milwaukee County parks. At the height of the game's popularity last summer, the large crowds it attracted to one Milwaukee park left county officials at a loss for how to deal with the sudden influx of players and the trash they left behind. With more augmented-reality games in development, the permitting process Milwaukee County set up puts it at the forefront of an emerging challenge for government officials who want to regulate the present of the service of the present of the service of

"We're prepared for all of them now," said County Supervisor Sheldon Wasserman, who wrote the proposal setting up a permitting process that County Executive Chris Abele signed on Feb 10. Other places where officials are looking at how to handle such games include Illinois, where lawmakers are considering requiring companies to remove sites from games when they receive a request to do so. The bill pending in the Illinois Legislature is a response to heavy foottraffic last year at a suburban Chicago park with protected dunes.

Kate Edwards, the executive director of the International Game Developers Association, said in an email that local and state regulations haven't been on developers' radars because there haven't been any "that specifically affect game content or design." Most people associate augment-

ed-reality smartphone apps with "Pokemon Go," which allows players to catch monsters in the real world when they appear on their phones. But the number of games is growing. Other apps allow people to blast zombies on streets, race cars around the office, and aim basketballs at virtual hoops anywhere.

Edwards warned that "legislation and regulation at this early stage of an emerging technology" can stifle its growth. But Wasserman said something needed to be done after months "of basically absolute hell" at a Milwaukee park along Lake Michigan. Hundreds and sometimes thousands of players came to Lake Park at all hours of the day, he said, leading to traffic congestion, overtime for sheriff's deputies providing security, overflowing bathrooms and so much trash that the county had minimum-security inmates help clean up.

The new ordinance requires that game developers such as Niantic, the San Francisco-based creator of "Pokemon Go," get a permit like any other business or group that wants to host park events. The fees will be on a sliding-scale - anywhere from \$100 to \$1,000, depending on how much of the park will be used and how many people are expected to be there, Wasserman said. The money will help with the park's upkeep, he said, and the permits will help the county prepare for the volume of people. Wasserman said the county could pursue legal action if a company doesn't comply with a permit. —AP

TECH TOOLS GAIN TRACTION AMID TRUMP WAR ON LEAKS

WASHINGTON: As President Donald Trump warns of a crackdown on US government leaks to media, interest is growing in technology tools that allow sources to share information anonymously. One such tool called SecureDrop, being used by at least 30 US and global media organizations, offers a way for sources to anonymously communicate via encrypted servers. "We've seen an explosion of interest in SecureDrop in the past two months," said Trevor Timm, executive director of the Freedom of the Press Foundation, which created the tool.

Timm said "dozens" of news organizations had expressed interest in using the tool which enables sharing without leaving digital traces. "Ever since the election there seems to be an urgency within these organizations to set up a more secure way to get information from whistle-blowers," he said. While news leaks have come from a variety of sources, Trump, who took office on January 20, has denounced the release of classified information by officials as "criminal" and vowed to punish leakers.

Timm argued however that the news leaks have been important in holding elected officials accountable and helping the truth emerge. He said the resignation of national security adviser Michael Flynn, caught lying about his contacts with Russia, was an important example. "Not only are leaks allowing the public to put pressure on the government to pull back awful policies, but it's even informing other people within the Trump administration," Timm said in a blog post for the Columbia Journalism Review.

Though the methods for leaks are not always known, some news organizations have acknowledged using SecureDrop, including the

Associated Press and First Look Media's investigative site The Intercept. SecureDrop "is the system easiest to use for newsrooms to facilitate communication that allows a back-and-forth exchange while allowing the source to remain completely anonymous," said Intercept editor-in-chief Betsy Reed. The system "has become an increasingly useful source of genuinely newsworthy documents for us," Reed noted.

"In the current political environment there can be tremendous risks to cooperating with a journalist and becoming a whistleblower, and it makes sense to offer this as protection." Reed said she expects the media to rely more on these kinds of sources, with the Trump administration seeking to control the flow of information. "We're going to have feistier independent journalism that depends on cultivating these kinds of sources," she said. "Whistleblower journalism will have its heyday, and access journalism is on the decline."

Secure mobile apps

Meanwhile some government officials, fearful of monitoring, have taken to using encrypted mobile applications to share information. Some newsrooms use a secure chat app called Signal. Another application called Confide, which takes a cue from Snapchat by allowing people to send messages that disappear after being read, also is gaining popularity. The app offers "the digital equivalent of a face-to-face conversation," according to Confide co-founder Jon Brod.

"End-to-end encryption ensures that only the intended recipient can read the message, but ephemerality adds another layer of protection ensuring that no copies reside on any servers or

devices." Founded in 2014, Confide has seen downloads and usage spike during times of well-publicized hacks or leaks. "Our growth has accelerated significantly since the US election and we have seen a recent surge in our business-the number of new users joining Confide this week is more than seven times higher than last week's," Brod said.

Legal questions

But the use of private channels by officials raises a host of questions, such as those that surfaced over Democratic presidential candidate Hillary Clinton's private email server. "Conducting official White House business in this way almost certainly violates the Presidential Records Act, which requires preservation of any correspondence or records" of top officials, says a Lawfare blog post by Brookings Institution fellow Susan Hennessey, with Harvard law student Helen Klein Murillo.

Analysts point out that leaking classified information may be illegal, but the degree of enforcement has varied over the years with leakers, and even journalists, facing potential prosecution under the Espionage Act. Even without these specific tools, news organizations have gotten major stories from leaks provided through systems such as WikiLeaks and documents obtained by former national security contractor Edward Snowden.

Hennessey and Murillo note that the Trump administration "might have a range of criminal statutes and enforceable legal obligations to use (or threaten to use) to stem the tide of leaks." But they added that "investigations are opened only when the leaked information is accurate-that is, the mere fact of an investigation is an indirect confirmation of the accuracy of the leak."—AFP

ADVANCES IN IMAGING COULD DEEPEN KNOWLEDGE OF BRAIN

BOSTON: New imaging techniques enable exploration of the brain in much more detail than ever before, opening the door to greater understanding of neurological problems and possibly new treatments, researchers say. Showcased this week at the American Association for the Advancement of Science annual meeting, the research and innovations are the product of three US scientists involved in a project launched by former president Barack Obama in 2013 to unlock the inner workings of the brain.

Obama's Brain Research through Advancing Innovative Neurotechnologies (BRAIN) initiative promised a multidisciplinary approach, with a budget of \$434 million for 2017, aimed at unlocking the mysteries of the brain and treating diseases such as Alzheimer's, Parkinson's and schizophrenia. One of the technolo-

gies developed as part of the initiative, called Scape, enables scientists to see brain structures at a microscopic level. Scape permits the three-dimensional observation of individual neurons in the brain of a fruit fly as the insect is in flight, searching for food or suddenly afraid for its life, said Elisabeth Hillman, professor of biomedical engineering at Columbia University.

"You can see actually flashing green as the brain is telling the body to move," she told the conference. "We can image every single neuron in the entire brain of these organisms, which was never possible to do before." The new tool opens up multiple paths for research, including deciphering the signals currently seen in magnetic resonance imagery (MRI). "We are hoping to leverage this new technique to better understand diseases," she said. —AFP

TAI CHI TIED TO REDUCE FALL RISK IN OLDER ADULTS

NEW YORK: Seniors who practice tai chi - a University Medical Center in Lubbock. Chinese meditation practice that combines deep breathing and slow, fluid movements - may be less likely to fall than their peers who don't do this type of exercise, a recent study suggests. Researchers examined data from 18 previously published trials of tai chi for fall prevention with a combined 3,824

participants aged 65 and older.

Tai chi was associated with a 20 percent lower risk of falling at least once and a 31 percent drop in the number of falls, the analysis found. "This is a fairly significant finding because tai chi is an activity that can be easily taught and that people can do independently at home or at their workplace or at the retirement center on their own or in a group," said Jean-Michel Brismee, a physical therapy researcher at Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center and

"So in regard to cost and preserving independence and health it is significant because people do not have to go to the gym or a special facility as they can do it anywhere," Brismee, who wasn't involved in the study, added by email. Worldwide, up to 40 percent of people over 65 and about half of people over 80, fall each year, researchers note in BMJ Open. Falls are often associated with considerable decline in mobility, independence and quality of life and are a leading cause of death in old-

For the study, Zhi-Guan Huang of Guangzhou Sport University in China and colleagues analyzed data from published trials that randomly assigned older adults to either receive tai chi lessons or join a control group that didn't get this intervention. Overall, 10 seniors would need to practice tai chi in order to avoid one fall, Huang and colleagues estimated. When researchers accounted for how often seniors practiced tai chi, how much time they spent at it, the style of tai chi and the falling risk for individual patients, they still found these exercises associated with a lower risk

Sometimes the fall risk appeared smaller but the difference between the tai chi groups and control groups was too small to rule out the possibility that it was due to chance, however. Increasing the frequency of tai chi sessions from once a week to more than three times weekly was associated with a dramatic improvement in risk reduction, from 5 percent to 64 percent.

One limitation of the study is that it examined data from trials where participants knew what intervention was being tested and whether they received it, which has the potential to bias results, the authors note. Even so, the results confirm previous research showing tai chi can improve balance, flexibility, strength of knee extension and reduce the risk of falls in older adults, said Dr. Chenchen Wang, director of the Center for Complimentary and Integrative Medicine at Tufts Medical Center in Boston.

"Many important components include: exercise, breathing techniques, awareness of the body, focused attention, mindfulness, balance and function, visualization and relaxation," Wang, who wasn't involved in the study, said by email. "These components also positively impact health by improving self-efficacy, psychosocial functioning, and depression and can help patients bolster self-confidence, which also

helps balance and coordination to avoid falls," Wang added.

The complex nature of tai chi exercise sequences can also support cognitive function because it requires steady effort to coordinate multiple movements at the same time, said Dr. Rome Lauche of the University of Technology in Sydney and the Australian Research Center in Complementary and Integrative Medicine.

"For frail elderly patients who can't go to the gym and conduct conventional exercises, or those with a preference towards relaxing mind/body interventions, the slow and flowing nature of tai chi might be the right choice," Lauche, who wasn't involved in the study, said by email. "For patients who have already fallen, it is important to undergo a medical examination first." —Reuters

WHY THERE'S A US SURGE IN MUMPS DESPITE VACCINE

NEW YORK: Fifty years ago, mumps was once a childhood rite of passage of puffy cheeks and swollen jaws. That all changed with the arrival of a vaccine in the late 1960s, and mumps nearly disappeared. But now the US is in the midst of one of the largest surges in decades. Arkansas has been hardest hit, but schools and college

campuses in many states have been contending with outbreaks. Some basics about the illness and the situation:

What is mumps?

Mumps is caused by a virus. It's contagious and spread through coughing and sneezing. Common symptoms are fever, headache, and

that can cause puffy cheeks. Most cases occur in children and teens who spread it at schools and dormitories. Some people never have symptoms. In most others, it is a mild disease that people completely recover from in few weeks. Sometimes it can lead to complications: hearing loss, meningitis and

painfully swollen salivary glands swollen testicles. In rare cases, infections lead to sterility.

How common is it?

Before the vaccine, roughly 200,000 cases were reported each year. Then the numbers dwindled to around 200 a year. But some years, cases have jumped up. In 2006, there were nearly 6,600 cases, most of them college students in the Midwest. Cases surged again last year, reaching 5,300 - the bulk of them in Arkansas, lowa and Oklahoma. High numbers have continued this year, mostly in Arkansas and Missouri, according to the Centers for Disease Control and

Who gets the vaccine?

The mumps vaccine is part of routine childhood shots. U.S. health officials recommend that by age 6, all children get two doses of a combination vaccine against mumps, measles and rubella. The vaccine is highly effective when children get the shots on schedule, they say, and there has not been any new, mutated mumps strain going around to change that. Yet, most of the children who got sick recently were fully vaccinated, health officials have said.

The vaccine didn't work?

No vaccine is perfect and it's expected that some people who get the shots will still get mumps. Also, some research suggests that 10 or more years after the second dose, immunity may fade enough to allow outbreaks to take hold. During some outbreaks, like one currently at the University of Missouri, students and others have been offered a third booster dose to increase protection and snuff out the outbreak.—AP

MONTANA OFFICIALS ALARMED AS THEY FIGHT SURGE IN METH USE

HELENA, Montana: Methamphetamines continue to make an alarming surge in Montana, as law enforcement, health officials and communities struggle to address the problem. Panelists at a drug summit convened Saturday by the Montana Legislature said resources are being strained because of a widening prevalence of the drug. While authorities attempt to stanch the flow of meth into the state from Mexican cartels, courts are burdened by a growing caseload of drug cases.

Family services are also strained by drug-related cases that are tearing apart families. And drug clinics are struggling to serve an increasing population of meth users seeking to treat their addictions. As meth use in Montana continues to rise, authorities are also bracing for a possible influx of heroin in an expansive rural state whose borders aren't easy to patrol. "I've never seen it this bad before," said Bryan Lockerby with the Montana Department of Criminal Investigations.

"The problem we're all trying to solve is like boiling the ocean, and we have people drowning in meth." The concern over meth and opiates, such as heroin, in Montana is shared nationwide. More Americans are dying from opioids than at any time in recent history, with overdose deaths hitting a peak of 28,000 in 2014. That amounts to 78 Americans dying from an opioid overdose every day, according to the US Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. But meth remains the drug of choice in Montana and other nearby states because

it is inexpensive and so widely available. Lockerby told legislators that law enforcement is but a component in the effort to eradicate the drug from Montana. But the challenges, he said, are daunting as the meth supply transforms a homegrown substance cooked in clandestine labs to a well-financed out-of-state import that crosses stateliness and national borders. In 2015, the state's crime lab analyzed about twice the number of samples as two years prior, according to state statistics. Montana health officials say meth-related cases now account for more than 40 percent of the caseload being handled by the state's child and family services - doubling from a

As meth use in Montana continues to rise, authorities are bracing for a rise in heroin use as that drug further encroaches into an expansive rural state whose borders aren't always easy to patrol.

Meth is the primary drug encountered by Montana's 11 drug task forces, according to the Montana Department of Justice. Attorney General Tim Fox called for more collaboration among state, federal and community agencies to deal with the issue. "One of the largest challenges is for us all to work together," he said. "We have various agencies with all the same general goal to protect our citizens and in promoting health. Because we're compartmentalized in separate places, and we all have our separate missions, we sometimes don't work together well."

That means identifying "all the stakeholders, what money is being spent where, what kind of success rates we have and where are we not doing enough," Fox said. What's needed In particular, Fox said, is to develop stronger partnerships with tribal authorities, who are also struggling to attack the scourge of meth and other substances on reservations. "Meth is so devastating to a community, to a family, to children," said Alexis MacDiarmid, an addiction counselor at the Helena Indian Alliance.

Zoe Barnard, an administrator for the Department of Public Health and Human Services, called the economic burdens associated with substance abuse alarming. From 2010 to 2014, she said, there were \$714 million in charges for hospital admissions in Montana because of substance abuse. About a fifth of that amount was charged to the taxpayerfunded Medicaid program. Sen. Diane Sands, a Democrat from Missoula, said the summit sought to bring awareness about the state's drug problems and to help fellow legislators understand the need for more resources, particularly for drug treatment programs.—AP

SANCTUARY HOLDS SEVEN COWS SAVED FROM SLAUGHTER TO PROMOTE PEACE

SAN TAN VALLEY: An Arizona sanctuary is sheltering seven cows that were intended for slaughter as part of an effort that owners believe promotes peace and good health. Goshala cow sanctuary President Naren Koka told the Casa Grande Dispatch that the organization protects cows while educating people about how saving these animals promotes a sustainable ecosystem. "We believe that kindness to animals leads to kindness to humans and hence a peaceful world," Koka said.

Groups visit the farm and cows make public appearances to spread awareness. Support comes from the Indian community and some animal advocates. One cow's care can cost \$150 monthly. A volunteer said the cows' milk cannot be sold but is shared with groups for religious uses. "One of the purposes in establishing Goshala was so milk may be offered for deity worship at temple," said one of the founders, Prayag Narayan Misra.

Cows are good for the Earth when they are given proper care, Koka said. "Cows eat grass, and the cow dung is very good for the earth. It protects the topsoil, and the manure can be used to feed the corn," he said. "The manure has anti-bacterial properties. In India, it's mixed with water and used as a floor cleanser, and the cow urine is a natural way to repel insects from plants." The sanctuary plans to bring cows to the Festival of Colors on March 19 in Tempe.—AP

ZOO INTRODUCES AFRICAN PAINTED DOG PUPS TO PUBLIC

CUMBERLAND, Ohio: An Ohio zoo says a litter of six African painted dog puppies born in December can now be viewed by the public. The Columbus Zoo says the puppies from the endangered species have begun exploring publicly visible areas of the zoo's conservation center, The Wilds, in Cumberland, Ohio. Dan Beetem, director of animal management at The Wilds, says the puppies are the center's first successful litter of painted dogs. Beetem says the dogs' mother, Quinn, was an attentive caregiver after their birth, a rarity for first-time painted dog mothers. The Wilds says that painted dogs are one of Africa's most endangered species because of continued habitat loss, conflict with humans, and infectious disease.—AP

TANZANIA STOPS 40 HEALTH CENTERS FROM OFFERING AIDS SERVICES

government has stopped 40 privately run health centers from providing AIDS-related services, accusing them of catering to homosexuals in a country where gay sex is criminalized. It is the latest move by this East African country to crack down on the activities of homosexuals. The government believes that non-governmental organizations are using some health centers to promote gay sex, Health Minister Ummy Mwalimu said Thursday while announcing

In Tanzania, gay sex is punishable by up to 30 years in prison. Around two-thirds of

the restrictions.

DAR ES SALAAM, Tanzania: Tanzania's African countries criminalize consensual same-sex sexual conduct, according to Amnesty International. The HIV rate among gay men in Tanzania stands at 30 percent, according to government figures. The health minister also announced that the government was expanding HIV/AIDs services at 3,000 other health centers across the country. The news comes about six months after the government threatened to deregister pro-gay civic groups it said were harmful to the "culture of Tanzanians." In September, the government temporarily suspended HIV/AIDs outreach projects targeting gay men.—AP



ROAMING TELESCOPE BRINGS KENYAN KIDS VIEWS OF NIGHT SKY

STUDENTS LOOK AT CONSTELLATIONS USING VIRTUAL REALITY GOGGLES

MOLO, Kenya: Thousands of schoolchildren in Kenya are getting a rare opportunity to look at the stars. The Traveling Telescope visits some of this East African country's most remote areas, showing students the night sky and the describing the science of astronomy with telescopes and virtual reality goggles. One by one, the children in this Rift Valley town lined up to peer through the telescope. Fourteen-year-old Evie Clarke gazed into the sky. "Over there is Venus and just above it is Mars and there are loads of suns," she said, pointing. "You have such a nice picture of the moon and you can see all the craters. Oh man, it was amazing, yes!"

Students also enter an inflatable planetarium to learn more about astronomy, and they look at constellations using virtual reality goggles. Although Kenya lies on the equator and has dramatic nighttime skies in rural areas, children find it hard to name planets and other bodies as astronomy is rarely taught in schools. The telescope "has been around for more than 400 years and yet very few people have looked through one," said Susan Murabana, who founded the Traveling Telescope project in 2013 with Daniel Chu Owen.

They charge 200 to 300 Kenyan shillings, or about \$2 to \$3, per child at international or private schools. They do not charge at public schools. They would like to expand the project across Africa "There is something really powerful about seeing things for yourself and seeing those photons coming from a star or planet or whatever is going through the telescope hitting your eye, you know," Owen said. "You are not looking at a screen, you are not looking in a book ... It stays with you." Fifteen-year-old Tamara Lugonzo said she is considering a career in astronomy after her experience: "It's so cool, yeah!"—AP

Alcohol, drugs and sexuality: Arab Israeli film faces backlash

he culture clash in "Bar Bahar" starts off when Nur, a veiled and conservative Muslim, moves into a flat with two other Arab Israeli women and sees their drug-taking, party-going lives. But for its director, the real shock of the film, which opened last month in Israel, has been the controversy it has whipped up, even death threats on social media. Maysaloun Hamoud, herself an Arab, always hoped her first feature film would hit hard. In its two hours, the Galilee-born filmmaker, 35, tackles almost all the taboos of Arab Israeli society: Drugs, alcohol, homosexuality.

Salma is rejected by her Christian family for being a lesbian, while Leila leaves her boyfriend when she discovers he is more conservative than he claims. But above all, there is the story of Nur, a native of the conservative city of Umm Al-Fahm-a stronghold of the Islamic Movement, close to the ideology of the Muslim Brotherhood. Conservative, and initially shocked by the attitude of her roommates, Nur and the other two become friends and allies. She ultimately rebels against her family and tradi-

Death threats

The film has already been released in the United States, under the title "In Between", and it won three prizes at the San Sebastian Film Festival in Spain last year. US magazine Variety called it a "compelling" drama and The Hollywood Reporter trumpeted it as a "sparkling, taboo-breaking first feature". The film company has not released ticket sale numbers but Hamoud said there had been a lot of feedback, mostly positive but some less so. The response from Umm Al-Fahm has been particularly sharp. The municipality issued a statement condemning a film as being "without the slightest element of truth" and barring it from being screened there.

They insisted, however, that they were happy to support "meaningful" art, but did not reply to a request for an interview. Hamoud as well as her actresses have received death threats. "Those who speak ill of Umm Al-Fahm dig their own

grave," said one. "You need a bullet in the head and another in the heart," a second read, Hamoud told AFP.

"For me as an artist, a director and a screenwriter who is a part of this society, it is my right to tackle any issue I feel is important enough for me to talk about," Hamoud said in a cafe near where she lives in Jaffa, a predominantly Arab district of Tel Aviv. "For the audience, if they want to see it they are welcome and I will be very happy. But if you don't want to, don't go," she added. Her face is framed by short black hair and she has tattooed arms, including one with the title of the film in the colors of the Palestinian flag. Her film, she said, brings to the screen issues usually "hidden" among Arab Israelis, such as lustful, youthful evenings where cannabis smoke billows among dancers.

Bar Bahar, literally meaning "land and sea" in Arabic, translates as "neither here, nor there" in Hebrew. For its director it aims to be "the voice of a generation" of young Arab Israelis who feel trapped between cultures. Making up around 18 percent of Israel's population, the 1.4 million Arab Israelis are

descended from Palestinians who remained on their land after Israel was established in 1948. Many identify as Palestinian but feel torn between identities-saying they experience discrimination and racism living and working in major Israeli cities. "I'm not exaggerating, every scene is realistic," Hammoud insisted.

'Contradictions'

Hamoud chose to set the film in Tel Aviv, regarded the most tolerant and liberal city in Israel, to make a point that even there racism against Arabs is prevalent. She wanted to show the girls' "otherness" in the city. "They discover that no matter how far they go from their towns and the traditions they came from, they are shocked that the place where they are (Tel Aviv) doesn't accept them." Hamoud wants to make films that help society "face its contradictions in order to move forward". "No one should feel good after the movie, neither Israelis nor Palestinians in this society." — AFP

SYRIA'S WHITE HELMETS TO TRAVEL TO US FOR OSCARS

Rescue workers from Syria's White Helmets-the subjects of an Oscar-nominated documentary-said on Saturday they have received US visas to attend next week's prestigious Academy Awards ceremony. For weeks, the rescuers and the film's staff had been nervously watching the fallout from US President Donald Trump's now-suspended travel ban for seven countries, including Syria. "We got our visas yesterday (Friday), but we're not yet sure if we'll be able to travel or not," Raed Saleh, leader of the rescue group, told AFP by phone on Saturday. "We don't want to have problems at the borders or the airport," he said.

The documentary titled "The White Helmets", directed by Orlando von Einsiedel, was named a contender in late January in the Oscars short documentary category. Since it emerged in 2013, the rescue group has attracted over 3,000 volunteers and says it has saved more than 78,000 lives. It is named for the distinctive white hard hats worn by its volunteers and has gained international renown for its daring rescues, often filmed and circulated on social media. The Oscars award ceremony will take place on February 26 in Hollywood.

"With so many people watching, it would be such an important opportunity to talk about the suffering happening in Syria," Saleh said. More than 310,000 people have died since Syria's conflict erupted in March 2011, and over half the

country's citizens have been forced to flee their homes. "The documentary took a lot of effort to make and we've been working on it for a long time. People who are featured in the film have since died. There's equipment that you see that has been destroyed," Saleh said.

"This film is history for us. We hope that we win the Oscar, because that would provide moral support to the White Helmets and show them that their sacrifices weren't for nothing." According to the film's producer Joanna Natasegara, Saleh will be joined by fellow White Helmet Khaled Khatib, who shot much of the footage. Natasegara told AFP by phone that the last few weeks had been a "roller coaster" ride. "Initially, we were totally delighted at the nomination and invited them to join us, and two days later the executive order came through," she said. Under Trump's short-lived executive order, travellers from seven mainly-Muslim countries, including Syria, were banned from travelling to the United States for 90 days.

The travel ban has since been suspended in court, but Natasegara said she and the film's team would "be nervous until (Saleh and Khatib) are on US soil". "For us as filmmakers, we wanted to be able to give them that platform," she said. "It's their day. Their message is one of hope and peace. We're just really excited to share that day with them." — AFP

Brazil mega-church scores TV hit with biblical soaps

ebuchadnezzar II is about to be crowned in a sumptuous Babylonian palace, and production assistants in Havaiana flipflops are rushing to get a small army of extras into place. Welcome to the set of "The Rich Man and Lazarus," the latest biblical telenovela from the media empire of one of Brazil's largest evangelical mega-churches. Edir Macedo, the controversial founder of the Universal Church of the Kingdom of God, has already scored two primetime hits with soap operas based on the Bible: "The Ten Commandments," in 2015, and "The Promised Land" currently on air.

Promised Land," currently on air.

Macedo is the owner of Brazil's secondlargest television network, TV Record, whose foray into telenovelas is reshaping prime-time in
the giant South American country. Telenovelasor "novelas," in Brazilian Portuguese-are a
national obsession in Brazil, nearly on par with
football. They used to be strictly secular, with the
dominant player, TV Globo-the country's largest
network-dealing with subjects such as gay cou-

ples and racial discrimination in its scripts.

But Macedo and TV Record saw an opening for a new kind of series in a country where evangelical Christianity is booming, steadily eroding the numbers of the world's largest Catholic population. Spending \$230,000 per episode, the network has drawn viewers and advertisers with extravagant biblical sets, costumes and, in the case of "The Ten Commandments," action filmed partly on location in Israel. "In the 27 years I've been in this business, I've never seen a set like this. It's a very bold project, and it will be a wonderful story," said the director of "Lazarus," Edgard Miranda. "The Bible is a fantastic script."

'Family time'

On a recent visit to the sprawling studios on the outskirts of Rio de Janeiro, AFP saw large Mesopotamian sphinxes and gold-tipped columns framing the palatial set where the ancient Babylonian king was about to be crowned. TV Record has built an artificial river, a Babylonian temple and Jerusalem streets in its quest to create an authentic Old Testament feel. The soaps' scripts do not lack for romance and intrigue. But in between staple telenovela plot lines, characters preach the word of God. "The stories deal with very current issues with a high level of quality," said Miranda, a 44-year-old Rio

native who cut his teeth at Globo. But "TV Record's greatest success has been bringing the whole family together in front of the television again," he said.

It is a strategic shift for the network, whose nighttime programming originally featured pastors preaching to their flock. About six years ago, TV Record began producing religious mini-series with modest budgets. Emboldened by their success, the network then went out on a limb and commissioned "The Ten Commandments," Brazil's first biblical telenovela. It managed to beat Globo in the ratings several nights, and sold the show to networks in some 20 countries around the world. "Promised Land" achieved similar success, and TV Record is now hoping "Lazarus" will do the same.

The 150-episode series explores a parable of Jesus with two protagonists, one poor and bound for heaven, the other rich and bound for hell. "It teaches certain tenets of ethical behavior. People are tired of the aggression and ugliness of daily life," said actor Cassius Scapin, who plays a villain on the show.

Powerful pulpit

Evangelicals have grown from five percent of Brazil's population in 1970 to nearly 25 percent in the 2010 census. Evangelical denominations have capitalized on an extensive network of churches, deftly using TV, radio and social media to draw millions of Christians away from the Catholic Church. In a country with millions of poor, evangelical churches typically teach a message of change for the better in this life and after-whereas the local Catholic church traditionally puts the accent on the afterlife. The power of Macedo's church is evident in Rio, where his nephew Marcelo Crivella, a former bishop, was recently elected mayor.

But Macedo's rise has also been controversial. Macedo, 71, was charged with fraud and money laundering in 2011 for allegedly buying jewelry, real estate and cars with billions of dollars skimmed off his followers' charitable donations. He denies the accusations, which have done little to dent the popularity of his church. But the evangelical boom is not the only reason for the success of biblical telenovelas, said TV critic Nilson Xavier. —AFP

HUNGARIAN SLAUGHTERHOUSE LOVE STORY WINS BERLIN FEST GOLDEN BEAR

ungary's "On Body and Soul", a tender love story set in a slaughterhouse, won the Golden Bear top prize Saturday at the Berlin film festival, Europe's first major cinema showcase of the year. The drama by Ildiko Enyedi, one of four female filmmakers in competition, features graphic scenes in an abattoir set against the budding romance of two people who share a recurring dream. The win marked an upset at the 11-day Berlinale, where a European refugee comedy by cult Finnish filmmaker Aki Kaurismaki, "The Other Side of Hope", had been the odds-on favorite. Kaurismaki took the Silver Bear for best director. Enyedi thanked the festival for embracing her first full-length feature in 18 years but said working conditions in Hungary were growing more difficult under Prime Minister Viktor Orban.

"We live in a more and more absurd country, frighteningly absurd country," she told reporters after the ceremony, while adding that the state film fund served as a "sort of island". "We can work there at relative freedom, peace and we get professional support." The runner-up jury prize went to Franco-Senegalese filmmaker Alain Gomis for "Felicite" about a Kinshasa nightclub singer who has to scrape together funds to pay for her son's treatment after a serious road accident. South Korea's Kim Min-Hee, the star of Hong Sang-Soo's intimate drama "On the Beach at Night Alone" about a failed love affair with a director, won best actress. And Austria's Georg Friedrich scooped best actor for his role in the German drama "Bright Nights" as a mourning father who takes his teenage son on a road trip through Norway.

'Fight the dark ages'

Best screenplay went to another favorite of the festival, "A Fantastic Woman" by Chile's Sebastian Lelio, starring transgender actress Daniela Vega. Lelio, joined on stage by Vega, said the film about a singer fighting for her right to attend the funeral of her much older lover was a call for tolerance in trying times. "We have to fight the dark ages with beauty, with elegance, with poetry," he said. Best documentary, awarded for the first time at the festival, was picked up by Palestinian director Raed Andoni for "Ghost Hunting". The film recre-

ates a notorious Israeli interrogation center-and has ex-prisoners re-enact experiences in a bid to free them of their demons.

"We still have 7,000 Palestinians living in those jails... They never get the recognition as I do," said Andoni, who also served time behind bars in Israel. Capping a politically charged year at the festival, US documentary jury member Laura Poitras ("Citizenfour") said filmmakers must stand up for basic freedoms. "Yesterday the president of the United States described the press as the enemy of the people," she said, referring to a tweet by Donald Trump on Friday. "As documentary filmmakers we're here to say that we're the enemy of nationalism and of exclusion."

Jury 'fell in love'

A seven-member jury led by Paul Verhoeven ("Basic Instinct", "Elle") and including US actress Maggie Gyllenhaal ("The Dark Knight") and Mexican director and actor Diego Luna ("Rogue One: A Star Wars Story") selected the main prizes among 18 contenders. Last year, jury president Meryl Streep gave top honors to Italy's "Fire at Sea", a portrait of the refugee crisis on the island of Lampedusa. It is nominated for an Academy Award for best documentary this month.

Presenting the Golden Bear, Verhoeven said the jury "fell in love" with "On Body and Soul", adding that it was about "two people connecting in quite an amazing way". The enigmatic film features Endre and Maria, who by day work in a slaughterhouse but by night have the same dream about a male and a female deer nuzzling in a snowy forest. Endre, the abattoir's financial director, has a deformed hand that makes him self-conscious while Maria, the new quality control inspector, is crippled by shyness and an obsessive-compulsive disorder. Enyedi contrasts the growth of their relationship and the petty squabbles at the company with stomach-churning scenes of the cattle bound for the butcher's hooks. Film industry bible Variety said the film "blends mournfully poetic whimsy with stabs of visceral brute reality". — AFP

Artisans break the mold in Britain's pottery capital

t the 18th-century Spode pottery works in Stoke-on-Trent, start-up artisans like 22-year-old Emma Price are moving into abandoned buildings and breathing new life into a once-mighty industry. The 10-acre (four-hectare) site in the heart of the Staffordshire city in central England whose name worldwide is synonymous with pottery has become a creative hub that is drawing a new generation. "It's a real privilege to be on this site," said Price, wearing blue overalls flecked in plaster, as she worked on the mold for a bowl.

"This offers me the opportunity to do my own thing and gives me the space to work in and do what I'm passionate about," she told AFP. "A lot of people now are starting to move away from the mass-produced work and want something that's more bespoke." Iconic Stoke brands such as Wedgwood, Royal Doulton and Spode are renowned across the globe for their fine chinaware. On a rich seam of clay in England's West Midlands, Stoke became the world center of pottery production by 1800.

Now fewer than 10,000 people still work in an industry that once employed 80,000 in Stoke, as factories closed and production shifted to Asia over the last 20 years. But young artists are making the most of the latent factory space, skills and expertise that still exist in the 250,000-strong city, not to mention the coveted "Made in Stoke-on-Trent" backstamp. At the Spode works, founded in 1767, a few dozen artisans have moved into the derelict buildings.

Cobwebbed storehouses on the site are stuffed with Spode molds from the past, stacked on wooden shelves marked with names like Louis XV, Old Comport and Rose Tazza. The cavernous China Hall, once bustling with people and machines, now stands like an empty cathedral, filled with light and silence. Ceramic artist Jo Ayre, 34, works in a makeshift studio just off the China Hall, in a space formerly known as Scorpion Alley, so fierce was the reputation of the women who worked there. Besides producing her own works, she runs adult learning classes, teaching groups of locals who want to know more about the craft that made their city's name.

'Endless possibilities'

Among those taking their first steps in learning how to manipulate the clay was 36-year-old barber Craig Urwin. "We are doing it in the old-fashioned way, by hand. It's fascinating," he said. "We've probably got ancestors who did work here or in other factories." Ayre, who hails from Stoke, trained at the Royal College of Art in London but moved back in 2015. "There's so much space, people you can talk to who know a tremendous amount about ceramics, so it feels like there's endless possibilities here."

In 2011, Prince Charles, the heir to the throne, stepped in to save Middleport Pottery, another historic site and the home of Burleigh chinaware. As part of the regeneration project, artists have moved in there too, while the new visitor center tells people about traditional pottery production.

Laura Cohen, chief executive of the British Ceramic Confederation trade association, said the industry was in good health in Stoke as sales and employment had surged since the depths of the recession in 2010. "It forced those companies that were surviving to look at their business models, to think about how they can become truly world-class," she told AFP.

Only pottery left

Steph Woodhouse, spokeswoman for the Emma Bridgewater factory, one of the more established brands, said: "We've seen a real return of artisan potters coming back to Stoke to utilize the skills and experience". Bridgewater began producing ceramics on a tiny scale in Stoke in 1985, and bought the Victorian-era Meakin factory in 1996 as the business expanded. The pottery now produces 32,000 hand-made, hand-decorated items per week and exports internationally.

Some 250 people work in the Bridgewater factory, from the men casting the clay to the women using traditional sponging techniques to press on the decoration. John Buckley, 59, has been working in potteries since he was 16. "The mining's gone, the steel's gone, there's only this, really," he said of Stoke's traditional industries. "I'm surprised this is still going, and it's coming back, and I'm proud to be part of it." — AFP



Tourism shows signs of recovery in Egypt

ourists are slowly returning to Egypt, easing pressure on a key sector battered by years of turmoil and the 2015 bombing of a plane carrying Russian holidaymakers. "There is an increase in the number of tourists. This situation was much better in January than in previous years," tourism ministry spokeswoman Omaima Al-Husseini said. Visitors from China, Japan and Ukraine account for a large part of the growth. China's top public travel agency, China International Travel Service, reported a 58 percent increase in tourists flying to Egypt compared with 2015.

"There are more bookings between October 2016 and January 2017 than last year," said Egyptian Federation of Tourism chief Karim Mohsen. "There is an improvement, especially in cultural tourism in Cairo, Luxor and Aswan," key historical sites, he said. The uptick is a sign of hope for a country also reeling from the shock of an economic reform program that has triggered massive inflation. Once a key foreign currency earner, the tourism sector crashed in 2011 after a popular uprising overthrew veteran strongman Hosni Mubarak, ushering in years of sporadic unrest. Recoveries in the sector since then have been set back by new crises. In June 2015, a massacre of tourists at a Luxor temple was narrowly averted when assailants armed with assault rifles and times" last year.

explosives bungled the attack and were intercepted by police.

But in October that year, Islamic State group jihadists, who are waging an insurgency in the eastern Sinai Peninsula, struck again. They bombed a Russian airliner carrying holidaymakers home from the popular Red Sea resort of Sharm El-Sheikh. All 224 people on board were killed. Russia suspended flights to Egypt and Britain cut air links with Sharm El-Sheikh. Visitor numbers plunged from 9.3 million in 2015 to 5.3 million the following year, Husseini said.

Recovery hinges on Russia, UK

But industry officials have cautiously welcomed what they say is a noticeable improvement since October. In December 2016, 551,600 tourists visited Egypt compared with 440,000 the year before, according to the government's statistics agency. "Activity has picked up a bit in the winter of 2016-2017," said Tamer Al-Shaer, vice president of the Blue Sky travel agency. He said that included a 30 percent increase in Ukrainian tourists and a 60 percent increase in visitors from China, with daily flights to Aswan, a southern city rich in ancient sites. Japan's HIS travel agency said the number of tourists heading to Egypt "multiplied by four to five times" last year.

Since charter flights from Japan to Egypt resumed in April 2016, they have been on average 80 percent full, said a spokesman for the Japan Association of Travel agents. Egypt hosted a record 14.7 million foreign tourists in 2010, a year before Mubarak's overthrow and the ensuing economic nosedive. Restoring even two thirds of that number is a key government goal, but it hinges on Russia and Britain resuming flights, Husseini said.

"There are ongoing negotiations... we hope the issue will be resolved as soon as possible," she said. More than 60 percent of tourists arriving in Sharm El-Sheikh by plane used to come from Britain or Russia. "So long as the Russians do not come back, there will be paralysis," the tourism federation's Mohsen said. "Russians and Britons are the backbone of Sharm El-Sheikh." Other European countries such as Germany and France have registered a slight increase in reservations to Egypt. In early February, four other European countries-Denmark, Finland, Norway and Sweden-eased travel warnings against travel to south Sinai, where Sharm El-Sheikh and other resorts are situated. — AFP



In Lebanon, an avant-garde mosque to preach coexistence

'Lebanon cannot survive but through its diversity'

building at the entrance of the Druze heartland village of Mukhtara in Lebanon's Chouf mountains is a mosque. After all, despite practicing a faith that is an offshoot of Shiite Islam, the Druze do not worship at mosques, and the building strays far from the traditional rendering of a Muslim prayer house. But the Amir Shakib Arslan mosque is intended to make visitors reflect on religion and modernity-and on the symbolic gesture of constructing a mosque in a village whose residents worship elsewhere.

It is named after the grandfather of Walid Jumblatt, the head of Lebanon's Druze community, who commissioned and funded the project, and replaces a mosque that once stood in Mukhtara but was destroyed decades ago in a feud. Its unusual design is the result of Jumblatt's decision to give architect Makram El-Kadi free reign to reinterpret what a mosque could look like. Instead of the traditional domed roof alongside a minaret tower, a cage-like structure of white steel beams has been constructed to sit over an existing traditional Lebanese stone building like a "veil", Kadi says.

At one back corner of the roof, the white blades of the structure bend up towards the sky in a tower that implies a minaret. Light and air flow between the blades, which contrast with the heavy sand-coloured stone of the one-storey traditional building beneath. In places, the spaces between the blades are filled to create two words that can only be perceived from a distance: on the minaret above, "Allah" or "God", and below, the word "Al-Insan" or "human being". For Kadi, the project is the product of years of reimagining the architecture of the mosque. "There's nothing scripted, neither in the Koran nor in the hadith (words and practices of the Prophet Mohammed) that tells you what a mosque should be," he told AFP.

'A new kind of calligraphy'

But despite the lack of religious constraints and the young demographics of Islam, the design of mosques has remained largely static. "Given this big number of young people in the religion, you don't see as much experimentation in the architecture of the mosque as you would expect," Kadi said. Inside,

white, with the sun streaming in from a skylight cut into the vaulted roof. At the back of the room, where religious texts are traditionally stored, the word "Iqra" or "read" appears in wooden latticework, a nod to the first word of the Quran and a reminder, Kadi says, of the religious imperative to read, not merely recite. The interior is dominated by a striking carpet featuring an abstract black-and-white pattern-a first-of-its-kind print of soundwaves taken

from a recording of Koranic recitation. "The carpet is a new kind of calligraphy, in the sense that it's a visual representation of spoken language," said artist Lawrence Abu Hamdan, who conceived the piece. Moments in the soundwaves where the word "God" appeared were removed, in part to avoid the possibility of visitors stepping on the word. "But also to reflect something that's very important in this mosque... that God is both concealed and ultimately very present," added Abu Hamdan.

For all the innovation of the mosque, it retains certain elemental features, including an orientation towards Mecca, which Muslims face to pray and, for now, a traditional adhan, or call to prayer. Abu Hamdan produced a reinterpreted adhan, with the words spoken rather than sung, but it was deemed a little too avant-garde and has been replaced for now with a standard sung recording.

'Diversity and coexistence'

For Jumblatt, the project's aims were twofold: to emphasize the ties between the Druze faith and other branches of Islam, but also to promote religious tolerance. Lebanon still bears the scars of its 1975-1990 civil war, in which all factions and sects committed abuses, and it has been rocked by the consequences of the conflict in neighboring Syria. "I think the message that we have to say again and again, always in Lebanon, is that it's a place of diversity and coexistence," Jumblatt said. "Lebanon cannot survive but through its diversity."

The Chouf area where Mukhtara is located witnessed some of the bloodiest massacres of the civil war, committed both by and against the Druze. More recently, the Druze have been among the religious

rom a distance, there's little to suggest that the the Mukhtara mosque's walls are largely bare and minorities targeted for forced conversions and expul sions by jihadists in Syria who consider them apostates. For Mukhtara residents, the mosque is something of a curiosity, regarded as a gesture towards outsiders rather than a potential prayer house for



"I haven't been inside, but from the outside the design is really nice," said 50-year-old Sabah Abdel Samad, whose pharmacy is opposite the mosque. "It's something very lovely, promoting pluralism and acceptance of the other," she added. "Many of our Muslim brothers pass through here, it's a good thing for them to have a place to pray." Kadi sees the mosque an "act of bridging" between the different branches of Islam at a time "when such gestures... are rarely being made". "The fact that it's done in this way, that it's done at this time specifically, sends a strong message: that there's an alternative, you can be religious without being close-minded." — AFP
