UK: ATTACK 'VERY LIKELY' IN KUWAIT

KUWAIT: In an advisory, Britain warned its nationals travelling to Kuwait that attacks in Kuwait are "very likely", adding they should "take care" if they plan to travel in "conservative" areas like Jahra and Jleeb Al-Shuyoukh. "Attacks in Kuwait are very likely and could be indiscriminate, including in places frequented by expatriates and foreign travellers. You should be especially vigilant at this time and follow the advice of the local authorities," the advisory said, urging Britons to take additional safety precautions.

"Violent crime against foreigners is rare. However, you should take care if you intend to travel in conservative areas like Jahra, where there have been incidents involving firearms, and Jleeb Al-Shuyoukh where there have been riots by migrant workers protesting about their conditions," the advisory added.

It also reminded travelers that following maritime restrictions issued by the Kuwaiti Ministry of Interior in 2011, they should take care when sailing in Kuwaiti waters. "Many areas of the Gulf are highly sensitive, including near maritime boundaries and the islands of Boubiyan and Warbah... The area in the northern Gulf, between Iran, Iraq and Kuwait has not been demarcated and vessels entering these areas have been detained and inspected.

WASHINGTON: Women in pink "pussyhats" flooded into Washington by the trainload yesterday for a massive rights march that drew hundreds of thousands in defiance of America's hardline new president, Donald Trump. Tens of thousands of people also took to the streets of London, Paris and other cities across the world chanting "Dump Trump" in solidarity with US protesters.

Washington's metro stations overflowed as trains packed to bursting moved cheering, clapping marchers into the city for what was expected to be a recordbreaking inauguration-related protest. Michele Phillips, a 45-year-old Canadian from New York State who took US citizenship in 2013, came to make a stand against what she calls Trump's "platform of hate and bigotry". "I know that we can do better, we have to fight for the change we want to see," she told AFP. According to Washington's deputy mayor Kevin Donahue, organizers have upped their initial turnout estimate from 200,000 to 500,000 people faced with the early morning flood of protesters. The city provides no official crowd counts.

Trump's defeated rival Hillary Clinton tweeted her support to the crowds massed near Washington's National Mall, preparing to march on the White House led by celebrity participants including Scarlett Johansson and Michael Moore. "Thanks for standing, speaking & marching for our values, @womensmarch. Important as ever. I truly believe we're always Stronger Together."

Women made up the overwhelming majority of the people who emerged whooping and cheering from Washington's Union Station, arriving on jam-packed trains and buses. Many carried homemade signs.

ERDOGAN BUOYED BY VOTE

Parliament endorses move

FOR POWERFUL PRESIDENCY

ANKARA: Turkey's President Recep debate, Turkish lawmakers passed the Tayyip Erdogan yesterday began campaigning for constitutional reforms that would greatly expand the powers of his office, only hours after a vote in parliament cleared the way for a national referendum on the issue. Speaking in Istanbul, he hailed the assembly's earlymorning decision, saying a more powerful presidency will catapult Turkey to a position of strength. "God willing the people will give the true decision, the final decision," Erdogan said.

After an all-night session capping almost two weeks of acrimonious

controversial set of 18 articles. The measures still need to be approved in a national plebiscite slated for April. The bill would abolish the role of the prime minister and introduce a presidential system that critics fear lacks effective checks and balances. A change to the presidential system would be a crowning achievement for Erdogan, who has outmaneuvered and crushed all his major foes. The reforms would potentially allow him to remain in power until 2029.

TRUMP MOVES TO WEAKEN OBAMACARE

MILITANTS BLOW THEMSELVES UP IN JEDDAH CLASH

RIYADH: Two suspects blew themselves up yesterday during a firefight with security forces in the Red Sea city of Jeddah and a third was arrested in another operation, the interior ministry said. Security forces raided a suspected "terrorist" hideout used for making explosive belts and other devices in a southern district of Jeddah, a spokesman for the ministry said in a statement. Two men holed up inside the premises shot at security forces, who returned fire, according to the

statement carried by the official Saudi Press Agency.

The suspects refused to surrender and "blew themselves up by detonating their explosive belts", it said, confirming an earlier statement by Jeddah authorities. Pictures posted on Twitter showed a fire at the site of the shootout. The interior ministry spokesman also said that a third suspect was arrested yesterday in a security operation targeting another Jeddah neighborhood. The suspect, a Saudi national, is believed to have had links to the two men who blew themselves up. He was arrested along with a Pakistani woman whom he identified as his wife, the spokesman said.

Earlier this month, security forces shot and killed two suspected jihadists including an explosive belt maker during a police operation in the north of Riyadh. Both were Saudi citizens. At the end of October, authorities said they had foiled a plot to bomb a football stadium in Jeddah during a football match and dismantled two "terrorist" cells linked to the Islamic State group. Eight suspects were arrested in the operation, including two Pakistanis, a Syrian and a Saudi. — AFP

16 KILLED IN ITALY SCHOOL BUS CRASH

VERONA, Italy: Sixteen people died when a coach bringing Hungarian teenagers home from a skiing trip crashed and burst into flames on a northern Italian motorway overnight, authorities said yesterday. It appeared the death toll from the tragedy near Verona at around 11:00 pm (2200 GMT) could have been much worse had it not been for the bravery and quick thinking of a teacher. Emergency workers said that the bus carrying 56 people returning from France, most of them teenagers aged 14-16 as well as several teachers and two drivers, ploughed into a

A huge inferno very quickly engulfed the bus, dramatic pictures released by police showed, completely destroying the interior and reducing the vehicle to a burned-out wreck. Some were killed when they were hurled from the coach on impact, but most of the victims were found badly charred inside the vehicle after being unable to escape in

three people were in a very serious condition, including one in an artificial coma. Ten more were seriously hurt and 13 had minor injuries.

All were being treated in nearby hospitals. Twelve others who were not hurt were receiving counseling at a hotel in the vicinity. "These were children. It's the hardest thing to take. Everyone thinks of their own," Hungarian Foreign Minister Peter Szijjarto, fighting back tears, told a news conference in Budapest. "Of course the Hungarian government will do everything necessary to ease the families' pain."

Girolamo Lacquaniti, Verona traffic police chief, said on radio that no other vehicle was involved, pointing to mechanical failure or human error such as the driver falling asleep. "The coach was travelling at quite a constant speed and we haven't found any traces of braking," Lacquaniti said. The vehicle burst into flames "moments after the impact," he

time. The Hungarian government said that said. One of the drivers was among those killed, Italian media reported. Describing a "devastating" scene, Lacquaniti told Radio Capitale that 13 passengers had managed to escape by jumping out.

"Those who were seated at the back of the bus saved themselves by smashing the windows amid shouting and panic," Hungary's consul in Italy Judit Timaffy told Italian media. "A gym teacher rescued lots of those on board by getting back on the bus. He was taken to hospital with serious burns on his back," Timaffy said. She said that the drivers had changed over around an hour before the accident. Traffic police were still gathering evidence and consulting video evidence meaning it was "still too early to determine the cause of this tragedy," Lacquaniti said.

STOLTENBERG: NATO-ICI CENTER TO DEEPEN COOPERATION WITH KUWAIT, ENTIRE REGION

GULF SECURITY DIRECTLY LINKED TO THAT OF ALL NATO ALLIES

BRUSSELS: NATO's Secretary General Jens Stoltenberg will travel to Kuwait tomorrow to inaugurate the NATO-Istanbul Cooperation Initiative (ICI) Regional Center which will be the Alliance's first such presence in the region.

"I thank Kuwait for its generosity, and commend its active role in promoting regional security. The NATO-ICI Center represents an important milestone in NATO's deepening cooperation with Kuwait and the entire region," he said in an exclusive interview ahead of the two-day visit.

The NATO chief explained that the center will be a hub for cooperation between the Alliance and Gulf partners in a wide range of areas, including strategic analysis, civil emergency planning, military-to-military cooperation, and public diplomacy.

The Center will also facilitate the sharing of expertise and improve understanding between NATO and Kuwait, as well as the three other Istanbul Cooperation Initiative (ICI) partners -Bahrain, Qatar and the United Arab Emirates (UAE), he said.

He noted that the Kuwaiti authorities proposed the establishment of the Center at NATO's Chicago Summit in 2012, and the Alliance gratefully accepted. "Last year, I toured the construction site, and in a few days, I will be in Kuwait again to celebrate the Center's opening," said Stoltenberg, 58, a former Prime Minister of Norway.

Directly linked

He stressed that "the security of the Gulf is directly linked to the security of all NATO Allies. We share the same aspirations for peace and stability, and we share common security threats, such as terrorism, weapons proliferation and failing states." "The shared security challenges make it even more important that we work closer together. That is exactly why we are reinforcing our political dialogue and practical cooperation," he stated.

NATO has partnership programs with all four members of the Istanbul Cooperation Initiative which was launched during the NATO summit in the Turkish metropolis in 2004. "Taking Kuwait as an example, we work closely in areas including

crisis management, defense policy, and defense against chemical, biological, and radiological and nuclear weapons," Stoltenberg said.

He said the NATO-Kuwait Transit Agreement, signed during his last visit in 2016, is another example of the value this partnership provides: it facilitates the movement of NATO equipment and personnel through the region.

"NATO deeply values its partnerships in the Gulf, and my upcoming visit to Kuwait and the new Regional Center underlines the priority we place on building our cooperation even further," he underlined.

Stoltenberg said he would welcome the membership of Saudi Arabia and Oman in the ICI if they so wished. "The Gulf Cooperation Council, to which they belong, plays a key role in regional stability. I met the Saudi Defense Minister last year at NATO Headquarters, and he expressed Saudi Arabia's readiness for further cooperation. So I look forward to an ongoing dialogue on deepening our relations," he said.

Fighting terrorism

Further, he said that NATO is committed to

fighting terrorism and projecting stability, including by working with a range of partners throughout North Africa and the Middle East. "We have already trained hundreds of Iraqi officers in Jordan to better fight IS, and from this month we are expanding our efforts into Iraq itself. In Tunisia, we are supporting the training of Tunisian Special Forces, and in Afghanistan. we are helping to ensure that the country never again becomes a safe haven for international terrorism. When our neighbors are more stable, we are more secure," he said.

NATO also continues to offer direct support to the Global Coalition to Counter the so-called Islamic State (IS), with our AWACS surveillance aircraft providing surveillance data to support air operations. And all Allies contribute to the Coalition in different ways, he said.

"The Coalition is making steady progress, and IS is losing ground," he said. "So as we begin 2017, I am confident that NATO will remain the cornerstone of Euro-Atlantic security, and continue to project stability beyond our borders. Again and again, our history has proven that NATO can adapt and deliver. Today, as we face the most serious security challenges in a generation, our adaptation continues," he concluded.

Meetings

During his visit, the NATO chief is scheduled to have meetings with His Highness the Prime Minister Sheikh Jaber Mubarak Al-Hamad Al-Sabah, the First Deputy Prime Minister and Foreign Minister Sheikh Sabah Khaled Al-Sabah and the President of the Kuwait National Security Bureau Sheikh Thamer Ali Al-Sabah, according to a statement released earlier by NATO.

A meeting of the North Atlantic Council with senior representatives of the four ICI partner countries will follow the ceremony, with the participation of the Secretary General of the Gulf Cooperation Council and representatives of the Sultanate of Oman and the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia. The ICI which includes Bahrain, Kuwait, Qatar and the UAE was launched in Istanbul in 2004 to develop security and defence cooperation between the four Arab Gulf states and NATO. —KUNA

Commitment

Upon his arrival to Vienna on Friday. Minister Marzouq said that the meeting will review the commitment of OPEC and non-OPEC countries with their respective output quotas under the historic agreement they reached late last year. "The committee members will review the changes relating to supply and demand after the producers cut the glut of oil on the global oil market by 1.658 million barrels per day," he pointed out.

Asked on his assessment of the commitment of the oil producers, Marzoug expressed upbeat view, citing the recent remarks from Russia, a non-OPEC producer. He affirmed that the representation of non-OPEC countries at the committee indicates their seriousness about the need to maintain equilibrium on the oil market. The oil prices have rallied by 20 percent since the deal was struck here on December 10, 2016.

The minister said the committee will analyze the exact figures and the trends of prices in the coming period after receiving reports from the main producers on their compliance by the end of January. "The OPEC ministers will convene their semiannual meeting in May to look into the possibility of extending the current deal to another six months if need be," he noted. Marzouq reaffirmed Kuwait's keenness on strict implementation of the agreement with a view to serving the interests of both exporters and importers. — KUNA

I AM THE 'SAVIOR'... AND FORGET 'MAMA AMERICA'!

he Inaugural address of US President Donald Trump was harsh, offensive if not insulting to the American political class, both Republican and Democratic.

Trump directly addressed the symbols of this class, including his predecessors, decrying the practices of the traditional political establishment, and accusing it of indulging over the course of decades in idle talk. He also accused the political establishment of serving its interests at the expense of the American people to the point of marginalizing them, destroying their dreams and wasting their achievements all over the world where, as Trump sees it, many countries became rich at his country's expense.

Significantly, Trump was earlier keen on stressing that he wrote his speech himself. Taking advantage of the solemn atmosphere of the ceremony, he purposefully presented himself as the 'Savior', in a strategy that we can conclude from his carefully chosen and frightening words, the likes of which were seldom used by any former American president, about the weakened US economic and military prowess. He used words such as 'decay' and 'depletion' to refer to the country's infrastructure and its army, whose bases are spread across the world.

He painted a grim picture of America as a preamble to his objective of restoring the waning glow and glitter. From the very start, it became clear that he would not be tolerant, and that in a direct message to the Congress in which he warned them that they either go along and work with him, or that he would unmask them and reveal those who are "all talk and no action." All are aware out of experience that he could do that with a morning Tweet, possibly beginning it with: 'You …!"

So far matters seem somewhat obvious and an internal American affair. But there is something more sinister in the speech, which he summed up in an equally harsh message to the whole world: Listen...

Since the collapse of the Iron Curtain, the world became accustomed or forced to fall into the arms of America as a caring mother, carrying out the role of both father and mother. The world paid the price of its recklessness, negligence and miscalculation in many instances. On the other hand, the world benefited from its efforts to enhance globalization and free trade driven by technological advances, in return for its hegemony and control over the decision-making of the international institutions - the financial in particular and the direction of the world's economy. Trump is saying 'America first.' That is fine, but how? What will America offer in order to continue leading the world if it is monopolizing the priority for itself? Does it want to get rich by impoverishing the world? Or will it turn inwards and relinquish its leadership?

'Mama America' is again bewildering us all, while no one is sure whether we should satisfy it, or be satisfied by it at a time when the world is yet to recover from the economic malaise transmitted from it, and from a human bleeding in many parts as a result of its insufficient care. Trump is waving his stick promising it to be magical and for the better. We can only hope that we are witnessing magic, not jugglery!

MINISTER TOURS ABU HALIFA, WAFRA HOUSING PROJECTS

KUWAIT: Minister of State for Housing Affairs and Minister of State for Utilities Affairs Yasser Abul inspected the Abu Halifa and Wafra residential expansion projects yesterday. Abul was escorted by the Director of the Public Authority for Housing Welfare (PAHW) Bader Al-Waqian and his deputy for implementation affairs Ali Al-Hubail. During the tour, Abul inspected both projects' infrastructure and was briefed about the work progress on both sites. Waqian said that PAHW has already handed over the lands in both projects to citizens, and that building licenses have been issued according to schedule.

Waqian explained that Abu Halifa's project includes 171 housing units, a power plant, seven power transformers, a mosque and a number of stores. He added that the Wafra project includes 2,426 housing units, 10 power transformation units in addition to several public facilities such as a kindergarten, a middle school, a high school, a polyclinic, a mosque, a park, a government complex, a shopping mall, a cooking gas cylinders' branch, a police station, a social office, a community development building, an ambulance center and stores

Labor demands

Board member of the Ministry of Electricity and Water's (MEW) labor union Khaled Al-Tahous expressed discontent with what he described as MEW officials' ambiguity in dealing with the issue of turning some of the ministry's sectors into separate establishments without consulting with concerned employees' syndicates in the process. He added that the syndicate had asked for the project's draft long ago without any response so far

ject's draft long ago without any response so far. Tahous, who is also a member of the executive board of the union of government employees' syndicates, further stressed that he holds Minister of Oil and Minister of Electricity and Water Essa Al-Marzouq responsible in case any of the employees' rights were harmed, adding that withholding the project's draft was completely rejected, and that employees will line up to face any decisions against their interests. Tahous said that the syndicate had met with Undersecretary Mohammed Boshehri to discuss employees' demands, while this project was discussed as a priority. "We demanded a copy of the project's draft to study it, but failure to meet our demands calls for suspicions," he underlined.

Oil pipelines

MP Khalil Al-Saleh filed an inquiry asking Minister of Oil and Minister of Electricity and Water Essa Al-Marzouq about the controversial oil pipelines tender, reports about the performance of a contractor responsible for collection center number 31, and the reasons and impact of delaying a refinery project.

Dangerous phenomenon

Commenting on recent newspaper report claiming that some training centers in Kuwait grant arbitration certificates within 24 hours, Deputy Director of the Arbitration Center of Kuwait Lawyers Association lawyer Ahmed Al-Enezi said that this issue is a dangerous phenomenon, and stressed the importance that such certificates should only be given by accredited centers and institutions. Enezi added that Kuwait Lawyers Association had long ago established the Kuwait Institute for Judicial and Legal Studies with the aim of spreading legal awareness. He also urged fellow lawyers to consolidate and face such negative phenomena.

MOTORIST HURT IN SALMIYA ACCIDENT

KUWAIT: An expatriate man was severely injured in a collision reported along Salmiya highway, said security sources, noting that firemen rushed to the scene and had to cut open the wreckage to free the injured man and rush him to hospital.

Tent fire

A fire broke out in a tent pitched outside a house in Qossour, said security sources, noting that firemen rushed to the scene and controlled the fire, rescuing an injured citizen with severe burns. An investigation is in progress to determine the cause of the fire.

Also a fire broke out in a house in Hitteen, said security sources, noting that firemen rushed to the scene. The house was evacuated and the flames were stopped from spreading. Some tenants were treated for smoke inhalation onsite. Further investigations are in

progress to determine the cause of the fire.

Suspects caught with contrabands

Two citizens, one of whom was wanted for a 12-year prison drug-related sentence and a KD 34,167 financial claim, were arrested by Capital detectives with alcohol and drugs. Security sources noted that the suspects fled from a checkpoint and tried to run over a police officer when they were asked for their IDs. The sources added that the suspects were chased into Faiha, where the suspects hit a police patrol car. Another car continued in hot pursuit and managed to stop the suspects, who were drunk. A case was filed and the suspects were referred to relevant authorities. Separately, an Asian man with an expired residency visa wanted for a KD 400 financial claim by a local telecom company and KD 300 by another was arrested in Mangaf with 64 home-brewed liquor bottles. The suspect confessed to running an illegal liquor brewery.

RELIGIOUS INTOLERANCE

Religious extremism is prevailing in the world today, especially in the Middle East, and the problem is that it is being associated with Islam because of ignorance and fanaticism. Is there a way out, and what can we do about our situation? What are the reasons behind the widespread ignorance and intolerance in the Middle East, despite the presence of education and scholars?

Every day we hear and watch fanatics who are against diversity, dialogue and freedom of expression and thought, because in the minds of these fanatics, they are the only ones who have the right to think, decide and judge, but we don't have these rights.

Religious extremists have supporters in local communities including some well-known conservative scholars and officials. The cause of religious intolerance lies in the absence of information, which was created by extremists. For example, a Muslim scientist called Ibn Al-Muqaffa was executed in 759 AD after being accused of heresy and being an infidel. Some other enlightened scientists like Al-Tabari also faced persecution.

Other causes of religious intolerance are due to differences between the divine text of the Holy Quran and the sayings of scholars and religious men, who may not be capable to issue the right opinions. With time, the public starts to consider views of the scholars as definite and begin to defend them as they defend the divine text.

Islamic civilization, which was launched 14 centuries ago, brought about the finest examples of tolerance and positive coexistence among nations and peoples of different civilizations, cultures, religions and races. Prophet Muhammad (Peace Be Upon Him) had a Jewish neighbor, but I know that no conservative today will accept to have a Jew living next door. Religious intolerance has distorted the image of Islam in the world. The problem of not accepting differences and the legacy of hatred and prejudice have led to this condition today. These are disagreements about the niqab or the hijab, let alone other things in life.

Religious extremists have promoted sectarianism and justified the murder of Muslims. The worst thing is when terrorist organizations speak on behalf of more than a billion Muslims and seek legitimacy, such as IS, and impose their false views. This is an embarrassment for moderate Muslims. This corruption happens under the name of Islam, which is innocent. We must stand up against this campaign. Moderate thinkers need to advocate the public to put forward effective solutions to stop the spread of religious intolerance. The media and columnists need to carry out this task too.

If we want to end civil conflicts and bloodshed in our part of the world, we need to deliver the true image of Islam to the world and dry out all sources of extremism, killing and hatred. This is a long and hard mission and requires a new philosophy. But I honestly don't see us moving an inch towards this direction any time soon.

TELANGANA DELEGATION IN KUWAIT, EYES PARTNERSHIPS ON MANPOWER

Around 30,000 workers from Telangana in Kuwait

KUWAIT: A four-member delegation from Telangana state of India headed by Home and Labor Minister Naini Narsimha Reddy has arrived in Kuwait yesterday as part of a GCC-level visit. The delegation will explore the possibility of supplying manpower from the Telangana state to various sectors in Kuwait.

"We are here primarily to interact with the Telangana community and to study the possibility of supplying quality manpower from our state to the State of Kuwait," Reddy told a press conference at the Indian Embassy here yesterday. The minister said that the state government has established a government company called Telangana Overseas Manpower Company (TOMCOM) under official license in order to conduct legalized overseas recruitment and to prevent exploitation of job-seekers by unscrupulous and unauthorized private placement agencies.

The minister said that around 30,000 people including domestic laborers, skilled and semiskilled workers are currently in Kuwait from the youngest Indian state of Telangana. Indian Ambassador Sunil Jain also spoke during the meeting. Other members of the delegation include

Principal Secretary Dr Rajat Kumar, TOMCOM General Manager K Bhavani and Managing Director KY Naik.

"The delegation will interact with the community members and will meet with various stake holders, employers, the labor community and government bodies in Kuwait and most importantly the Indian embassy here to understand how we can develop mutually beneficial partnerships in Kuwait, especially in the area of manpower supply. The presence of the minister, who heads the delegation shows our deep interest in developing partnerships here and providing quality manpower to various sectors in Kuwait," said Dr Kumar.

Bhavani, with the help of a PowerPoint presentation, gave an overview of Telangana and its capability to provide technically skilled manpower to the states in the Gulf. "Initially, we will focus on three major sectors such as healthcare, infrastructure and construction and hospitality," she said. There are around 100 nursing colleges and 244 engineering colleges in addition to hundreds of other specialized institutions in the state that produce trained workforce every year, she added. The delegation visited Qatar before arriving in Kuwait. It will leave for the UAE today.

PANEL DISCUSSES FINANCIAL SUPPORT TO KUWAIT AIRWAYS

KUWAIT: In its upcoming meeting, the parliament's financial affairs committee is due to discuss a bill proposed by the government to withdraw a sum of KD 600 million from the general reserves to support Kuwait Airways. The meeting will be attended by Minister of Social Affairs and Labor and Minister of State for Economic Affairs Hind Al-Subaih. Committee rapporteur MP Safaa Al-Hashem had rejected the proposal, saying that by doing this, the government is willingly violating public funds, especially since many violations have been committed by Kuwait Airways,

according to her.

Meanwhile, the parliament's human rights commit-

tee will discuss a proposal to turn the temporary committee into a permanent one. The committee is also scheduled to discuss activating the role of the National Human Rights Diwan.

In the meantime, the parliament's budgets and final statements committee is scheduled to discuss the Ministry of Education's 2015-2016 final statement and the State Audit Bureau's remarks on it. Also scheduled today, the parliament's legislative committee is set to discuss a number of proposals to pass the juvenile law and other penal laws. The committee's meeting will be attended by the ministers of justice, interior, social affairs, awqaf and municipality, in addition to the head of the Supreme Judicial Council and Director of the Interior Ministry's General Investigations Department.

Video investigated

They drove away after hearing noises that sounded like firearm shots in the background, said security sources, noting that investigations are in progress to identify the policemen.

Liquor possession



TAKE IT EASY ON US

olitical groups that are holding expatriates responsible for the state's deteriorating financial status have to cut down the fuss and stop acting arrogantly and racially. They should stop pretending as if expats are the ones depriving Kuwaitis from job opportunities, or that remittances they send to their families back home are behind the bad economic situation Kuwait is suffering from. Ever since the beginning of the decline of the prices of oil; the country's only financial resource, Kuwaiti and GCC 'Trump-like' citizens have shifted their attention to expatriates and their jobs, as if those expats removed citizens and took over their career positions and source of income.

Reason up people and tell us which jobs have expats taken over and deprived citizens from. Have Asian expats who sweep streets, collect your garbage or serve you at home by cooking your meals prevent you from making a living? Have expat construction workers and craftsmen in various lines take you away from your historical professions? Are expat doctors and nurses medically treating you in various hospitals the ones you want deported? All this is just for the sake of an argument. Can you imagine how an expat doctor feels when prescribing a certain medicine to you while knowing that neither him nor his kids have access to it? Or how he would feel when paying high prices for medical services while knowing that citizens get them free of charge?

The same applies to all professions and jobs a citizen cannot do without or refuses to do, considering them as insulting to his outstanding 'GCC status and prestige. Where do we start and end with such a state that depends on a sole source of income? A state that produced miserable groups who insist on blaming others for laxity and negligence of successive cabinets. Those cabinets have deliberately and intentionally nurtured the concept of citizens' dependence on the work of others and limited their professions in strictly administrative positions in a flabby, lazy and fatally bureaucratic public sector.

This has altered the nature of jobs in most state departments from providing public service to mere profiteering without really doing any true productive work in return. Those groups who are on spreading illusion and hypocrisy by distracting people and lying about expats must reconsider their diagnosis of GCC diseases; which are mainly caused by its political and, consequently, social systems. According to a Central Statistical Bureau report recently published by Al-Rai, only three percent of unemployed Kuwaitis would accept a private sector job and, while a majority of 58 percent prefer jobs in government establishments.

Our real dilemma in oil-rich countries are not expats who already suffer because of the ugliest form of shameful slavery known as the 'sponsorship' system, which is officially legalized by states and financially utilized by many through visa trafficking or through local 'Spartans' reliance on foreign slavery work. This is nothing more than a policy of deception and avoiding facts by some of us, who are burying their heads in the sand while the state is facing its worst economic challenges. There is nothing stopping the state from denying expats access to Kuwait and deporting the ones already here to make more job opportunities for citizens. Just have those political outbidding hotshots tell us how long we might survive without rotting in place. —Translated by Kuwait Times

INAUGURATION COVERAGE SHOWS DEEP DIVISIONS

THE AIR OF CELEBRATION WAS MUTED

and ceremony to its coverage of President Donald Trump's inaugural on Friday, yet deep divisions exposed in the campaign that brought him there weren't far from the surface.

With the armchair psychologists reading the expressions on Hillary Clinton's face, several sour reviews of Trump's inaugural address and images of rock-throwing protesters, the air of celebration was muted. Non-news networks ESPN, BET and MTV aired the moment when Barack Obama was sworn in eight years ago. Not this time.

Demonstrations

An anti-Trump demonstration in Washington, DC, was essentially ignored by television networks until the stands set up for dignitaries witnessing the oath of office cleared. Then pictures of demonstrators clashing with police emerged. No doubt an incoming administration and supporters who frequently view the media as the enemy were taking notes.

'American carnage'

"It's just disappointing that it's starting out with a little bit of a cloud," New York Republican Rep Chris Collins said on ABC, in a discussion about colleagues who stayed away from Trump's inaugural in protest. "But that's the decision that they're making." The living ex-presidents attended Trump's oath of office, with the exception of the hospitalized George HW Bush. Both Nicolle Wallace on NBC and Bob Schieffer on CBS noted that there was no evidence any of them voted for Trump.

Clinton reacted with silence when she arrived at the Capitol with her husband, former President Bill Clinton, and reporters shouted questions about what it felt like to attend her rival's inauguration. Some on TV, like ABC's Anita McBride, didn't even need a reply: "That's not the smile of a woman who is happy to be here right now," she said. "It's gotta sting," NBC's Lester Holt said.

Although some shouts of "lock her up" within the audience echoed the campaign, there was a moment of televised grace at the luncheon that followed when Trump saluted Clinton and dignitaries in attendance stood and applauded. Following Trump's 16-minute inaugural address, Brian Williams on NBC drew a contrast to the new president's image of an "American carnage" to the call to action in President John F Kennedy's 1961 speech.

Several commentators noted that the speech was aimed more at Trump's supporters than constituents who are suspicious of him. "I have to say it was surprisingly divisive for an inaugural address," said NBC's "Meet the Press" host Chuck Todd. "It's tough to be both a unifier and that populist carrier. He went with populism and I think it's going to play well with his folks but that wasn't the type of inaugural address that was intended to bring this country together."

ABC's Tom Llamas called it the first speech of Trump's re-election campaign. "For anyone who hoped or thought that the magnitude of the moment would change Donald Trump, they were completely wrong," he said. The speech was a repudiation to many of the politicians who sat behind Trump as he delivered it, including the former presidents, some analysts said. "It was definitely a bipartisan hand grenade," said CBS' Gayle King.

While the speech was dark, "if you were a Trump voter, you heard everything you wanted to hear," said CNN's John King. On Fox News Channel, overwhelmingly the news source of choice for Trump supporters, analyst Dana Perino called the speech "very muscular." Tucker Carlson said it was populist, not conservative. "Not poetic, but quite strong," Brit Hume said. "He painted this dark landscape of circumstances in America and promised to fix them all."

'Impeach Trump now'

On social media, veteran commentator Keith Olbermann urged fans to boycott television coverage of the inauguration. Olbermann may not have been following his own advice, since he tweeted "Impeach Trump Now" less than a minute after the oath of office was administered. Twitter was also filled with pictures comparing the crowd size at Obama's first inauguration with Friday's turnout for Trump, although it was not entirely clear if the postings depicted comparable moments in

Footage of anti-Trump protests filled the television void between the inaugural address and parade, and instantly became part of the divisive political conversation. "If you want to help Donald Trump have a good start to his presidency, go out on the streets and throw rocks at

> Even MSNBC's Rachel Maddow, likely a hero to many of the demonstrators, urged caution. Democrats need to lead their party in a constructive manner, so Trump opponents will feel like they have "another home inside politics and that you don't have to do non-political things like this, which once you're setting fires and throwing stuff at police officers is no longer politics, it's just rioting."



NETANYAHU SET TO DISCUSS IRAN 'THREAT' WITH TRUMP

JERUSALEM: Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu said yesterday he planned to discuss soon with US President Donald Trump how to "counter the threat" from Iran. "I plan to speak soon with President Trump about how to counter the threat of Iranian regime which calls for Israel's destruction," Netanyahu said in a video message posted on his Facebook page. Before his inauguration on Friday, Trump had repeatedly denounced the nuclear deal between Iran and six world powers, including the United States, which Israel has also staunchly criticized.

On Jan 16, Trump said in an interview with the Times of London and Bild newspaper of Germany: "I'm not happy with the Iran deal, I think it's one of the worst deals ever made. I think it's one of the dumbest deals I've ever seen, one of the dumbest." But he declined to say whether he intended to "renegotiate" the deal, as he asserted regularly during the presidential campaign.

Netanyahu has been an ardent opponent of the 2015 pact signed by Iran, the United States, China, Russia, Britain, France and Germany. The deal placed curbs on Tehran's nuclear program in exchange for the lifting of international

sanctions. In December, Netanyahu said there were many ways of "undoing" the Iran nuclear deal and that he would discuss that with Trump. "I have about five things in mind," he said.

But before he left office, former president Barack Obama warned against rowing back the pact, emphasizing its "significant and concrete results". EU foreign affairs chief Federica Mogherini has also said that the bloc would stand by the accord - which she helped negotiate because it showed that diplomacy worked and served Europe's security needs. And on Monday, Iranian President Hassan Rouhani that the nuclear deal was approved by the UN Security Council and therefore "is not a bilateral deal" with the US that Trump can renegotiate.

In the video message posted online, Netanyahu also addressed the Iranian people saying "we are your friend, not your enemy". Netanyahu addressed the people of Iran in English, with Farsi subtitles. "You have a proud history. You have a rich culture. Tragically, you are shackled by a theocratic tyranny," he said. Meanwhile, Israeli President Reuven Rivlin, whose role is largely ceremonial, said in a statement that he had invited Trump to visit Israel. — Agencies

GAMBIANS AWAIT JAMMEH'S EXIT AFTER PLEDGE TO LEAVE

Political standoff came close to military intervention

DAKAR: Gambia's defeated leader Yahya Jammeh is expected to leave soon for Guinea, and the new president said yesterday he plans to return home to take power once the situation is "clear." A visibly tired Adama Barrow told The Associated Press in an interview yesterday that he will enter Gambia once a security sweep has been completed. He has been in neighboring Senegal for his safety during a political standoff that came to the brink of a regional military intervention.

Barrow, who won December's presidential elections, spoke just hours after Jammeh announced he would relinquish power, ending hours of lastminute negotiations with the leaders of Guinea and Mauritania. "It is not vet confirmed information, but reliable sources say he'll be leaving today," Barrow told the AP. "We believe he'll go to Guinea, but we are yet to confirm 100 percent, but that's what we believe." In the Guinean capital, Conakry, the security minister was at the airport with jeeps full of well-armed military personnel, witnesses said. However, a special plane also landed from Malabo, the capital of Equatorial Guinea, with only a crew and no passengers, suggesting that could be Jammeh's final destination. Equatorial Guinea, unlike Guinea, is not a state party to the International Criminal Court.

Heavy security

The new Gambian president said he had not yet been given the communique that should spell out the terms of Jammeh's departure. "What is fundamental here is he will live in a foreign country as of now," he said. Under heavy security, Barrow took the presidential oath of office Thursday at Gambia's embassy in Senegal, with the backing of the international community.

As Jammeh prepared to leave the country after more than 22 years in power, human rights activists demanded that he be held accountable for alleged abuses, including torture and detention of opponents. It was those concerns about prosecution that led the famously mercurial Jammeh to challenge the December election results, just days after shocking Gambians by conceding his loss to Barrow. Jammeh once vowed to rule for a billion years. His agreement to step down has brought an end to the political crisis in this tiny West African nation of 1.9 million, which has promoted itself to European tourists as "the Smiling Coast of Africa." Critics of Jammeh insisted he should not be given any kind of amnesty. "Jammeh came as a pauper bearing guns. He should leave as a disrobed despot. The properties he seeks to protect belong to Gambians and Gambia, and he must not be allowed to take them with him. He must leave our country without conditionalities," said Jeggan Bahoum of the Movement for the Restoration of Democracy in Gambia.

An online petition urged that Jammeh not be granted asylum and should instead be arrested. Barrow, though, cautioned that was premature. "We aren't talking about prosecution here, we are talking about getting a truth and reconciliation commission," Barrow told the AP. "Before you can act, you have to get the truth, to get the facts together."

Increasingly isolated

Jammeh, who first seized power in a 1994 coup, has been holed up this week in his official residence in Banjul, increasingly isolated as he was abandoned by his security forces and several Cabinet members. The West African regional bloc,

ECOWAS, pledged to remove Jammeh by force if he did not step down. The group assembled a multinational military force including tanks that rolled into Gambia on Thursday. The force moved regional efforts.

Jammeh's announcement to relinquish power is a good first step, said Jeffrey Smith, executive director of Vanguard Africa. "For the Gambia to truly move on, President Barrow must reside in State House and begin the task of governing. In an ideal

scenario, Jammeh will also face justice for the many crimes he has committed since 1994," Smith wrote by email. Fearing violence as the political crisis dragged on, about 45,000 people have fled in after Barrow's inauguration and a unanimous Gambia for Senegal, according to the UN refugee vote by the U.N. Security Council supporting the agency. After days of uncertainty, Banjul was peaceful yesterday. At the ferry terminal, Yassin Jallow helped hand out bread to families returning to the capital. "There are so many people who couldn't go out, and nothing is working, the shops are closed, the bakeries are closed ... and we don't want anyone to starve," Jallow said. — AP

TEHRAN: Rescue teams recovered the bodies of two Iranian firefighters early yesterday, two days after they were killed while tackling a blaze in Tehran's oldest high-rise. They were among around 20 firefighters feared to have been killed when the 15storey Plasco building collapsed on Thursday after a four-hour blaze while emergency services were still evacuating

One firefighter already died in hospital from his injuries. Smoldering fires and smoke have complicated the recovery effort as sniffer dogs have combed the rubble. Tehran's chief pathologist said the degree of the burns had made identification of the dead difficult. "Even the identity badges they wore on their uniforms were burnt beyond recognition," Massoud Ghadipacha told Iran's ISNA news agency.

The government announced a day of mourning for the firefighters yesterday, with the cabinet releasing a statement "praising these great men of sacrifice". President Hassan Rouhani, who visited the site yesterday, called for an immediate investigation. Impromptu displays of solidarity and sadness appeared across Iran, with people leaving flowers and lighting candles outside fire stations.

The Plasco building was Iran's oldest high-rise and contained a shopping centre and hundreds of clothing suppliers. When completed in 1962, it was Iran's tallest building, before being dwarfed by the construction boom of later years. It was built by Habibollah Elghanian, a prominent Iranian-Jewish businessman who was arrested for alleged ties to Israel and executed after the 1979 Islamic revolution. — AFP

BLAST IN CAMP FOR DISPLACED SYRIANS NEAR JORDAN KILLS 4

BEIRUT: A large explosion rocked a camp for displaced Syrians along the Syrian-Jordanian border yesterday, killing at least four, and wounding many others, opposition activists and a resident said. Badr Abu Sultan, a resident of the Rukban camp, said the explosion was caused by a suspected car bomb in a local market. The Britain-based Syrian Observatory for Human Rights said the explosion caused a huge cloud of smoke over the area. A video posted by the Syrian Media Organization also showed some tents burning, as parts of the car bomb were scattered across the camp.

A Jordanian military official told the official Jordanian Petra news agency said the explosion inside Syrian territory was caused by a small truck. He ruled out that any Jordanians were injured. Jordan has been on edge since a car bomb attack last year launched from Rukban killed seven Jordanian border quards. Jordan then sealed the border, cutting off vital aid to 75,000 Syrians stranded in the area.

"There was a powerful explosion at the beginning of the market," Abu Sultan, a member of a tribal council in the camp, told The Associated Press, adding that the market is located at the entrance to the camp. "It was a car bomb." Abu Sultan said two men, a woman and a child were killed and at least 12 were wounded. The Observatory, which has a network of activists on the ground, said some of the wounded were in critical condition.

The Jordanian official said 14 wounded were admitted to the Jordanian health center at the border which is used to treat Syrian refugees. The camp houses a local militia targeted in the past by rival factions in Syria's war. Another opposition activist network, the Palmyra Coordination group, said the explosion hit a checkpoint for a local militia near the market. The group said two of the victims have been identified as displaced. The displaced Syrians live in makeshift camps between two parallel earthen barriers, or berms, that mark the Jordanian-Syrian frontier. — AP

WORLD NERVOUS ABOUT TRUMP'S 'AMERICA FIRST' SPEECH

A LOOK AT REACTIONS FROM ACROSS THE GLOBE

WASHINGTON: President Donald Trump's inaugural speech promised "America first" policy led by a forceful executive, in contrast to the coalition building and international conferences which have featured strongly in past administrations. The billionaire businessman and reality television star - the first president who had never held political office or high military rank - promised to stir a "new national pride" and protect America from the "ravages" of countries he says have stolen US jobs. "This American carnage stops right here," Trump declared. In a warning to the world, he said, "From this day forward, a new vision will govern our land. From this moment on, it's going to be America first." A look at some reactions from around the world:

Speech resonates in Mexico

Perhaps no country was watching the speech more closely than Mexico. Trump has made disparaging remarks about immigrants who come to the United States illegally and sought to pressure companies not to set up shop in Mexico by threatening a border tariff on goods manufactured there and exported to the United States. So Trump's talk of "protect(ing) our borders," "America first" and "buy American and hire American" had particular resonance in America's southern neighbor.

Ricardo Anaya Cortes, president of the conservative opposition National Action Party, called for "the unity of all Mexicans, unity in the face of this protectionist, demagogic and protectionist speech we just heard. Unity against that useless wall, against deportations, against the blockade of investment." The challenge is enormous. ... We demand the federal government leave aside tepidity, that it tackle with absolute firmness and dignity the new relation-

ship with the United States," Anaya said. The United States is by far Mexico's largest

commercial partner, buying some 80 percent of its \$532 billion in exports in 2015. Mexico is the second-largest market for US exports. "At least the word 'Mexico' was not heard in the speech. Nevertheless one can expect the United States to launch a hyper-protectionist project," said Ilan Semo Groman, a researcher at Iberoamericana University.

If Trump truly moves to block or drive away US investment in Mexico, Semo said Mexico should focus its commercial efforts on other countries. "There are very clear possibilities," Semo said. Mexican President Enrique Pena Nieto sent three tweets after Trump's inaugural speech Friday: "I congratulate @realDonaldTrump on his inauguration. We will work to strengthen our relationship with shared responsibility." "We will establish a respectful dialogue with the government of President @realDonaldTrump, to Mexico's benefit." "Sovereignty, national interest and the protection of Mexicans will guide the relationship with the new government of the United States."

Pakistan worries about Muslim comments

A group of retired government officials gathered after morning prayers for a walk in a sprawling park in the heart of the federal capital of Islamabad and the topic of their conversation was President Trump's inaugural speech.

They expressed concern that Trump would target the Islamic world, particularly Pakistan, because of his campaign rhetoric about Muslims as well as his inaugural speech in which he promised to eradicate Islamic terrorism worldwide. Pakistan has often been accused of harboring militant insurgents and declared terrorist groups that have targeted neighboring India, against whom Pakistan has fought three wars, as well as Afghanistan. Pakistan denies the charges.

"Likely there is more trouble in store for the Islamic world and our country will take the

most brunt of the harsh treatment from President Trump administration," said Mohammad Afzal. His sentiments were echoed by Shafiq Khan, who said "the one main thing that the new president mentioned about the world outside America is to tackle Islamic radicalism and that should be the matter of concern for all of us."

Amanaullah, a school teacher in Islamabad, feared Trump's reference to eliminating radical Islamic terrorism. "I think under this name he wants to malign and eliminate Islam," he said. Umair Khan, an engineer, said of Trump: "Let him taste the burden of government and get settled, I am sure he will calm."

Concern in Tokyo

Some Tokyo residents are worried that Trump's "America first" policy will usher in an era of populism and protectionism at the expense of the rest of the world. Tadashi Gomibuchi, who works in the manufacturing industry, recorded Trump's inauguration speech overnight as he was keen to hear what the new president had to say. "Trump is trying to make big changes to the way things are. Changes are good sometimes, but when America, the most powerful, loses stability ... it's a grave concern," he said. "If you take his words literally, it may destabilize the world going forward and I'm really worried. I hope things will lead to a soft landing." Retiree Kuninobu Inoue, who lived in the US during he 1990s, is concerned about trade fri between Japan and the US, citing Trump's decision to withdraw from the 12-nation Trans Pacific Partnership.

"Japan-US relations are not just about security. Our good relations rely so much on trade," he said. Protectionist policies such as the withdrawal from TPP and renegotiation of NAFTA will have a negative impact on the global economy including Japan's, said Akio Mimura, head of the Japan Chamber of Commerce and Industry. "These policies only enhance protectionist and populist movement spreading around the world, and could largely shake the free trade system that has supported global

growth," he said. In his congratulatory message to Trump, Japanese Prime Minister Shinzo Abe stressed the importance of the Asia-Pacific region as a source for growth but also tensions. "In the 21st century, while the Asia-Pacific region is the source of the global economic growth, the security environment of the region is becom-

ing more severe," he said.

Taiwan tweets

Taiwanese President Tsai Ing-wen tweeted her congratulations to Trump, saying: "Congratulations @realDonaldTrump. Democracy is what ties Taiwan and the US together. Look forward to advancing our friendship & partnership." Trump didn't mention the self-ruled island in his speech, but he angered China and broke diplomatic protocol by talking by phone with Tsai shortly after winning November's election. He has said earlier that Washington's "one China policy" under which it recognized Beijing in 1979 was open to negotiation, and questioned why the US should be bound by such an approach without China offering incentives.

South koreans put security first

Some in South Korea worried that President Trump would ask Seoul to shoulder a bigger share of the cost of US forces stationed in South Korea as a deterrent against aggression from North Korea, or that their country will be caught in a conflict between the US and China. "I think the biggest challenge is the national defense," said Park Geon-rok, a 30-year-old designer, adding that South Korea was "heavily influenced by the US."

In an editorial, the English-language JoongAng Daily said South Korea's relations with the US under Trump will face a challenge as the new leader will likely ask Seoul to pay more for the cost of the US military forces in the country, and renegotiate a bilateral free trade agreement. But the paper also notes it is "fortunate" that Trump has a strong position on North Korea's nuclear weapons.

There were concerns about potential conflicts between the US and China, South Korea's key business partner. Kim Kyung-jin, a spokesman for the opposition People's Party, said that the international economic order might collapse as the US seeks its own economic interest. Kim urged Trump to ease such

Indians fret about immigration

Among dozens of young, urban Indians who watched Trump's inauguration and speech at a club in a New Delhi, the 27-year-old Jigar Gorasia said getting work visas for professionals and green cards will become a problem. "It is going to be a little bit challenging for those," said Gorasia, who studied and worked in Chicago before moving back to India last year. Divya Narayanan, a 21-year-old student of journalism, said that Trump as president worried her. "Someone at the level of the US president coming out and saying things which are bigoted, which are sexist, it sets a precedent for other people in the country, right?" Indian newspapers highlighted Trump's protectionist policies in his speech. "America First President," read the banner headline of The Indian Express newspaper. "Protectionist Trumpet: Buy American, Hire American," was the headline of The Times of India newspaper.

Vietnamese say speech too America-focused

A Vietnamese analyst said Trump's speech was disappointing because it mainly served the domestic audience. "I think this speech would be right for an election campaign, but not an inauguration speech," said Nguyen Ngoc Truong, president of Hanoi-based private policy think-tank Center for Strategic Studies and International Development. "It should not be that simple because in an inauguration speech, you must introduce an objective and multifaceted vision, not just one-sided vision to the American public," he said, "I don't think Trump could have a magic stick to be able to manage America to realize the goals that he outlined."

Australians find speech divisive

An Australian father of two, Marek Rucinski, found Trump's speech "very divisive" and lacking substance. "Normally these speec used to rally and unite people," he said. "It was, again, more bluster." Rucinski was among some 8,000-10,000 people who attended a Women's March anti-Trump rally in Sydney's Hyde Park. Self-described feminist, Niall Anderson, watched the president's inauguration in disbelief. "Just disbelief that this can happen in 2017," the 35-year-old said.

The Australian newspaper's Foreign Editor Greg Sheridan wrote that "Trump answered one big guestion with his inauguration address: There is to be no transition from campaign Trump to presidential Trump." "Donald Trump is always Donald Trump. This consistency is perhaps his chief virtue," Sheridan wrote. "And his inauguration address made it clear that he intends to govern just as he campaigned, taking swings at his opponents, extolling his populist mantras, speaking in the slightly weird argot of contemporary down market celebrity," he added. — AP

HUGE CROWD CHEERS TRUMP, BUT NOT EVERYONE HAPPY

WASHINGTON: Throngs of happy Donald Trump supporters cheered and clapped Friday as they massed on the National Mall to witness his swearing-in as president, hailing the 70-year-old's unlikely rise to power as "one of the biggest stories in history." Many wore colorful garb with the slogans or face of their man, and they welcomed the 70-year-old Republican billionaire as an overdue agent of change in a nation in need of a political and economic makeover.

'This is one of the biggest stories in history. My grandchildren will be hearing about this," said Nick Questel, a 58-year-old utility worker from New York state. Rain started falling just as Trump-who had never held elected office before Friday-was introduced to deliver his inaugural address. "Rain is a sign of God's blessing," Franklin Graham, a pastor and son of the prominent evangelical Billy Graham, later told the crowd. The audience clapped when Trump vowed to take power in Washington away from politicians and return it to the people.

Norma Cohen-Minardi, a senior citizen from Florida, blessed herself earlier as the ceremonial invocation was given before Trump took the oath of office. Her daughter Beverly Minardi, 55, said Trump's denigrating remarks about women were no big deal. "It's not an issue to stop him from being president. He is a human being that makes mistakes. We are not electing the pope," said Minardi. "It is a very momentous time in my life," Steve McDonald, a 52-year-old carpet dealer from Pennsylvania, said as he walked toward the white, domed Capitol building on a cold, drizzly morning to watch it all.

'Despicable'

Not everyone was happy, though. "I find

him despicable," said protester Ben Brun, a teacher from New York state banging a blue plastic bucket as a drum and holding a sign calling for the deportation of Trump. Supporters of Trump said they dismissed, or forgave, his perceived offenses: his remarks about women, Muslims and immigrants; his thin-skinned bluster toward opponents; his penchant for conducting foreign policy via Twitter.

But the unhappy ones like Brun bemoaned him as divisive and phony, or worse racist, a circus barker, a con man only in it for money and sure to lead America down a dark, uncertain path. All however seemed to agree on the singular import of the moment: the rise to the presidency of a blunt real estate billionaire, a political neophyte, a former reality TV star whose White House run was once mocked as a joke. "It's time the country goes to we, the people. We have our signs that say 'we the people," said Darla Clark, a 66-year-old banker from California wearing a glittery plastic cowboy hat with the red, white and blue of the American flag.

She then smiled broadly and spun around to show a picture with that line from the preamble of the US constitution and a bald eagle, the US national emblem. "We are the ones who pay the taxes. Things have to be done for us and I think Trump is going to accomplish that," Clark said.

'Not my first choice'

Damaris Schuler, a 36-year-old history researcher from Texas, said Trump was not her first preference for president but she has come around to him. She added that when Trump has spoken insultingly of women and immigrants, she was not pleased but he could say what he wanted. "It would not be

my first choice. However, everybody expresses themselves in different ways and that is the great thing about freedom of speech," said Schuler, who carried her 18-month-old son on her chest in a harness. He wore a Stars and Stripes ski cap.

Such memorabilia was on sale all over the place: Trump flags, Trump baseball hats, Trump scarfs, and vuvuzela horns to trumpet his arrival to power. In one of several protests around the city, about 100 people who were kept away from the Capitol grounds by police chanted against Trump at a fountain outside Union Station, the city's main rail terminal.

They carried signs labeling him a racist, and at one point shouted "el pueblo unido jamas sera venido"-a Latino civil rights battle cry alluding to Trump's pledge to deport millions of undocumented immigrants. David Schein, a 67-year-old actor from Vermont, carried a cardboard sign calling Trump a "loser by 3 million." That was defeated Hillary Clinton's margin of victory in the popular vote. Trump won what mattered, the electoral college. Schein called this moment of American life appalling. What bothers him most about Trump? "That he is a corrupt liar, racist, xenophobe, in-it-for-profit con man, thief, and he has no moral character and he lies. I could go on," said Schein. — AFP

KREMLIN HOPES FOR US RAPPORT BUT SAYS DIFFERENCES WILL STAY

spokesman voiced hope for a constructive dialogue with President Donald Trump's administration in comments broadcast yesterday, but warned that differences will remain. Dmitry Peskov said in an interview with state Rossiya television that it would be an "illusion" to expect that US-Russian relations would be completely free of disagreements.

"Successful development of bilateral ties will depend on our ability to solve these differences through dialogue," Peskov said. He added that Putin will call Trump soon to congratulate him. Trump has promised to mend ties with Moscow badly strained over the Ukrainian crisis, the war in Syria and allega-

MOSCOW: Russian President Vladimir Putin's tions of Russian meddling in the US elections, and his victory has elated Russian political elites.

> Peskov, however, pointed at the challenges posed by the intricacy of nuclear arms control, the complexity of the situation in Syria and other issues. While Russia supports prospective nuclear arms cuts, they should be proportional and not upset the nuclear parity between Russia and the US, which "plays a critical role in ensuring global stability and security," Peskov said. He noted that different composition of Russian and US nuclear forces is a factor that needs to be carefully considered in negotiations.

Asked to comment on Trump's recent interview

with the Times of London in which he indicated that he could end sanctions imposed on Russia in the aftermath of the 2014 annexation of Crimea in return for a nuclear arms reduction deal, Peskov said that the two issues are hard to link. Peskov emphasized the US role in settling the nearly sixyear conflict in Syria, where Trump has offered to pool efforts with Russia in fighting the Islamic State group.

"It's quite obvious that it's impossible to constructively solve the Syrian problem without the US participation," he said. Russia already has invited Trump's administration to attend talks between Syrian government and opposition groups in Kazakhstan capital Monday. Russia brokered the talks together with Turkey and Iran, but Tehran has opposed the US involvement in them.

"There are certain disagreements between Moscow and Tehran on this subject," Peskov said, noting that the Syrian issue "is too complex to have a full harmony in approaches." "Any deals there are unlikely, there are too many parties involved," he added. Turning to the Ukrainian crisis, which has driven Russia's relations with the West to post-Cold War lows, Peskov criticized Barack Obama's administration for an "unconstructive" approach and voiced hope that Trump's administration would revise it. — AP

'Europe will wake up in 2017', LE PEN SAYS IN EU GATHERING

A STRING OF HIGH-STAKES ELECTIONS IN 2017

KOBLENZ: French presidential hopeful Marine Le Pen yesterday told a European gathering of rightwing populists in Germany that a string of high-stakes elections in 2017 would blow a wind of change across the region. Emboldened by the Brexit vote and Donald Trump's US presidential victory, the far-right National Front leader said voters in France, Germany and the Netherlands would be next to reject the status quo.

2016 was the year the Anglo-Saxon world woke up. 2017, I am sure, the people of continental Europe will wake up," she told a cheering crowd at a conference hall in the western city of Koblenz, on the river Rhine. "It's no longer a question of if, but when," she added in a speech that railed against migration, the euro and open borders.

Billed as a "European counter-summit", the Koblenz gathering is also being attended by Frauke Petry of the anti-immigration Alternative for Germany (AfD), Geert Wilders of the Dutch anti-Islam Freedom Party, Harald Vilimsky, secretary general of the Freedom Party of Austria and Matteo Salvini of Italy's anti-EU Northern League. It comes just a day after the inauguration of Trump, who assumed power with a staunchly nationalist address in which he vowed to put "America first".

'Good PR'

The Koblenz participants have repeatedly voiced their admiration for the maverick billionaire, and like him are hoping to shake up the political landscape by capitalizing on a tide of anger against the establishment and anxiety over migration. "Yesterday a new America,

today Koblenz and tomorrow a new Europe," Wilders, sporting his trademark peroxide hairdo, told the 800-strong crowd in German. "We are the start of a patriotic spring in Europe," he said to loud applause.

The charismatic Dutch MP, who has vowed to ban the Koran and pull his country of the European Union, currently tops polls ahead of March parliamentary elections. But observers say he will likely struggle to find the coalition partners needed to govern. The Koblenz congress, the first of its kind, has been organized by the European Parliament's Europe of Nations and Freedom (ENF) grouping, which was set up by Le Pen in 2015 and now brings together 40 MEPs from nine member states.

It has been touted as an opportunity for the parties to highlight their common ground but political analyst Timo Lochocki of the German Marshall Fund said the event was mainly "just good PR" as the parties had little to gain from strengthening ties. "This is largely to increase media attention," he told AFP. "The reasons why people vote for these parties are purely national and are independent from any alleged crossnational cooperation between the far-right."

The meeting of some of Europe's most divisive politicians has stirred controversy in Germany. Some 3,000 demonstrators protested against the event under the banner "Koblenz stays colorful-No room for rightwing populism", organizers and police told AFP. They displayed cardboard cutouts of Hitler, Stalin and Mussolini, and some protesters carried signs that read 'If you sleep through democracy, you wake up in a dictatorship'. More than 1,000 police officers have been deployed to keep the protests peaceful.

Controversy

Chancellor Angela Merkel has ruled out meeting Le Pen ahead of the French polls, with her spokesman saving the French far-right politician's policies have nothing in common with the German government's. Le Pen hit back at the perceived snub on I witter. "I am going to Germany to meet its future, the AfD, not its past, the CDU," she wrote, referring to Merkel's conservative party.

In the run-up to the congress, AfD MEP Marcus Pretzell, Petry's husband, triggered widespread criticism when he announced that several German media outlets had been denied accreditation because of their perceived bias.

AfD co-chief Petry meanwhile came under fire for taking part in the meeting at all, with some prominent members questioning whether the party should be cosying up to Le Pen, and in doing so, lurching further to the right. The AfD started out as an anti-euro party but has since gained ground by railing against Merkel's liberal refugee policy, which has brought over a million asylum seekers to the country since 2015.

Petry used her speech to again lash out at the record influx, slamming the establishment's calls for tolerance "while hundreds of thousands, millions, of mostly illiterate young men from a far and partly violent culture invade our continent". The AfD is polling at between 11-15 percent, ahead of a general election in September, boosting its chances of becoming the first hardline rightist party to enter Germany's parliament since 1945. — AFP

POPCORN, SALAMI, BEMUSEMENT IN MELANIA TRUMP'S HOMETOWN

SEVNICA, Slovenia: Sevnica is a small town in a small country but on Friday that didn't stop local dignitaries making the most of its most famous daughter-US First Lady Melania Trump. "We are very proud, the people of Sevnica are very proud," Mayor Srecko Ocvirk told AFP in the picturesque riverside town in central Slovenia.

Melanija Knavs, as she was known, was born in 1970, when Slovenia was part of communist Yugoslavia, the daughter of a local entrepreneur. The grander scale of her current life-Slovenia is not even the size of New Jersey, across the Hudson River from Manhattan in New York where she lives is not lost on those she left behind. Her next stop is the White House, in Washington DC.

"When somebody from a small place like this succeeds in such a way, it represents a strong motivation for the place and its people," Ocvirk said. "Today Melania is putting us on the world map. Her modeling career took off in her late teens, after being noticed by a fashion photographer in Slovenia's capital Ljubljana, 100 kilometers away.

Soon she was jetting around the world, settling in New York where she met and was bowled over by her future husband, property tycoon Donald Trump, 24 years her senior, in 1998. By now known as Melania, she became Trump's third wife in 2005 and in 2006 took US citizenship. Their son Barron was born a year later, the new US president's fifth child. "Many of us like her, she was born here although she has been in the US for many years," Matej, an engineer from Sevnica, told AFP.

More tourists

Before Melania became famous, Sevnica and its 5,000 inhabitants were better known for lingerie and furniture factories and the town's 900-year-old castle. But once Trump's run for president started looking serious, the mayor and the tourist office sought to make the most of it, trying to put Sevnica on the tourist map. The number of American visitors jumped by 11 percent, albeit from a low base, to 80,000 between January and October last year

compared to 12 months earlier. Locals hope for even more now.

But efforts by businesses to cash in with "Melania" cakes and "White House" slippers were dealt a setback when a Trump lawver warned them to be careful about trademarks. Sevnica's council promptly took down an advertising billboard that had featured Melania's image. A honey producer also removed jars that claimed the product came from "Melania's home garden". Others changed the name of their products, including the local Rondo pizzeria whose "Trump" burger became the more generic "Presidential" burger.

Tito's chef

Events on Friday, however, reflected how far away Melania now is from her homeland-and, perhaps, the lives of its everyday, non-elected citizens. "Nothing's going to change here, probably it will be a good add for Sevnica, but I don't think that will bring any mayor changes," said Stanko, a radiologist.

There were no Stars and Stripes flags or banners on the streets. The main event, other than a tour for half a dozen TV crews, was a charity dinner with 80-100 people out of town at a restaurant where Melania's parents reportedly used to be regulars. Watching the powder-blue suited Melania and the Washington ceremony live, attendees included the mayor and representatives from Slovenia's US Chamber of Commerce. Proceeds were going to a local hospital.

The chef was Jozef Oseli, one of Slovenia's most experienced, who used to cook for Yugoslavia's late dictator Josip Broz "Tito" when he visited the area. The starter, restaurant owner Martin Dolinsek said before, was to be a "crazy" combination of popcorn with Sevnica's salami, served with a wine named in honor of the first lady. But Sevnica's link to Melania Trump and the inauguration seemed tenuous and far away in more ways than one to some. "She is an ordinary woman, nothing special, I can say that her mother was much prettier than she is," said Jelka, a pensioner who used to be neighbors with her family. — AFP

AUSTRIA ARRESTS SUSPECT PLANNING ATTACK: POLICE

arrested Friday a man suspected of planning a "terrorist" attack in Vienna, police said, with authorities deploying additional officers and warning the public to be vigilant. "In recent days indications have grown of an actual suspect planning a supposed act of terror, and Vienna police... immediately began investigating and implemented security measures," spokeswoman Irina Steier told AFP. "The presence of uniformed and plainclothes police was increased and today at 1800 (1700 GMT) the suspect was arrested in Vienna near his address on the basis of an arrest warrant," Steier said.

He gave no details of the suspect, except to confirm that it was a man and that investigations are continuing. The Kronenzeitung newspaper published online a document from the interior ministry saying that a group of "radical Islamists of Albanian origin" intended to launch an attack in Vienna. It said that according to information from a foreign intelligence agency and, independently from a foreign police force, the attack was to take place between January 15 and January 30.

The document added that a Germanspeaking sympathizer of the Islamic State (IS) extremist group made explosives in Germany and that he intended

VIENNA: Austrian armed commandos to bring them to Vienna to carry out an attack. He was not immediately able to complete his travel plans but the newspaper said that the suspect travelled from Germany to Austria on Friday. "The man has been in custody... There are still lots of things to clear up," another police spokesman, Thomas Keiblinger, told the Austria Press Agency, declining to comment further.

Police also issued a public warning for people to be on the lookout at crowded public places and to inform police if they see any suspicious objects. Interior Minister Wolfgang Sobotka was due to give a news conference at 8:00 pm (1900 GMT) together with senior police officials, authorities said.

Austria spared so far

Austria has been spared in the string of attacks by Islamists suffered by other European countries but has increased security measures. In 2015 a record 90,000 people applied for asylum in Austria after hundreds of thousands of migrants transited the country bound for Germany and elsewhere. A Moroccan asylum-seeker was detained in Austria in December for allegedly planning an attack in Salzburg over the Christmas and New Year period, prosecutors said. — AFP

ITALY RESCUERS RACE TO FIND 23 MISSING IN AVALANCHE HOTEL

PENNE: Italian rescuers pulled four survivors from an avalanche-hit hotel yesterday and said they remained hopeful of finding alive at least some of the 23 people still trapped under the ruins. The latest rescues lifted the total number of survivors to 11. But there were 23 people still unaccounted for, according to a first official statement on the number of missing.

Morale among the teams of mountain police and firefighters remained high after Friday's dramatic rescue of all four children who were inside the Hotel Rigopiano, in central Italy, along with the mother of two of them. But the rescue operation, now in its third day, was increasingly resembling a race against the clock amid fears that anyone still alive could suc-

cumb to the cold before being found. Two men and two women were rescued alive in the early hours of yesterday. There were no reports of any other signs of life but officials emphasized that was no reason to give up hope. Enrica Centi, a spokeswoman for the mountain rescuers involved in the operation, said: "There is still hope because although no more voices have been heard, there may be people trapped behind or under a cement wall which would make it impossible to hear them."

'Extreme conditions'

Heavy snow and poor visibility that grounded helicopters in the area was hampering the rescue effort. "The operation continues to be very complicated," said Fabrizio Curcio, head of the civil protection agency. "The rescuers are working in extreme conditions." Teams of firefighters and police are combing a debrisstrewn area bigger than several football pitches as a result of the devastating force of the avalanche, which pushed the three-storey hotel some 10 meters from its foundations.

And Friday's rescue showed that even once someone is located, it can take many more hours to complete their extraction amid an ever-present risk of further masonry collapses. The latest operations bring to 11 the total number people who survived the disaster, including two hotel guests who were outside when the avalanche struck just before nightfall on Wednesday. Five bodies had been recovered by lunchtime yesterday. —AFP

IS THERE AN EXPLANATION FOR AFRICA'S ODD 'FAIRY CIRCLES'?

WASHINGTON: The forces behind the say an intricate combination of animals mysterious "fairy circles" that dot a desert in southern Africa do not appear to be supernatural, but they are intricate and complex. The formations are circles of land dozens of feet wide that create a stunning pattern in the Namib desert and have mystified locals and scientists for ages. Inside the circles it looks like nothing is growing, while plants grow well on the land surrounding them. Similar patterns have also been seen in Australia.

Paranormal powers like fairies and even dragon breath have been credited with creating them. But Princeton University ecologists have come up with a much less shadowy - and maybe less charming - explanation for what's afoot. Using computer simulations, they

and plants cooperating and competing help explain the unusual patterns, according to a study in the journal Nature Wednesday.

Corina Tarnita, the study's lead author, calls it "simple and elegant geometry on such enormous scale." Until this study, there were two competing explanations: Termites created the pattern or plants surrounding the circles did it. Tarnita's theory borrows from both. The giant circles - from six to 100 feet in diameter - are mostly from termites that cooperate with others in their colony, but compete against other colonies, she said. The unusual patterns seen between circles are plants that establish an orderly root system so they don't compete too much for limited water.

"Out of all these processes, where each is doing what they need to, emerges this large scale pattern," Tarnita said. The circular shape is a result of termites venturing as far as possible from their own colony's nest without encroaching on a competing colony. It's not quite a conspiracy, says co-author Robert Pringle, because the creatures aren't trying to make the patterns. "There's no master plan, there's no kind of blueprint for what's supposed to emerge," he said.

Several outside experts contacted by The Associated Press weren't convinced by the study, because they weren't comfortable with the author's assumptions about rainfall and especially termite colony lifespans. They did not, however, argue that it was fairies at work. — AP

PM MODI OVERTURNS **BULL-WRESTLING BAN**

Court ban on a popular bull-wrestling festival yesterday after Prime Minister Narendra Modi ordered the event should be allowed to go ahead. Modi overturned the ban on the festival after massive protests in southern India by demonstrators who called the court's ruling an attack on their culture.

India's Supreme Court outlawed the bull-wrestling Jallikattu festival last year after a plea by animal rights groups, which have long accused participants in the event-held annually across southern Tamil Nadu state-of cruelty to the animals. Tensions have escalated in recent days with thousands of demonstrators gathering in state capital Chennai and other cities, demanding the ban on Jallikattu be lifted which they say is an attack on their culture and traditions.

The growing protests prompted Tamil Nadu's chief minister to travel to Delhi earlier this week to ask Modi to overturn the ban, which he did late Friday. Tamil Nadu's governor then promulgated the executive order yesterday evening, paving the way for Jallikattu to resume today. "Tamil Nadu Governor Vidyasagar Rao approves

CHENNAI: An Indian state lifted a Supreme Jallikattu ordinance," the state's ruling AIADMK party posted on Twitter.

> Television footage from Chennai showed crowds erupting in joy, waving, giving the thumbs up and flashing peace signs as the news came in. State Chief Minister O Panneerselvam is set to kick off the traditional contest Sunday morning. "Honorable CM Thiru O Panneerselvam thanks the students, women and the public who staged agitations across the state to protect our culture," the party said on Twitter.

ROMANIAN NIGHTCLUB FIRE SENDS DOZENS TO HOSPITALS

BUCHAREST: A fire broke out in a nightclub in the Romanian capital Bucharest early yesterday morning, resulting in more than 40 people being taken to hospital. No deaths were reported. Doctors said one person was in serious condition, while most of the victims suffered from smoke inhalation and hypothermia. Some had bone fractures, doctors said, indicating they had panicked and jumped from an upper floor terrace.

The cause of the fire, which broke out at around 3:30 am and burned the Bamboo club to the ground, was still unknown. Prosecutors have opened an investigation. The unit for emergency situations (ISU) said the club lacked a fire safety permit and that it had been fined several times since 2015. Officials had given club owners a deadline of a few months to obtain the required permit. Bamboo previously burnt down in 2005.

The fire comes a year and a half after one of the European Union state's worst disasters in decades, when a fire at nightclub Colectiv killed 64 people and injured more than 100. That fire occurred when fireworks used during a concert ignited non-fireproofed insulation foam, triggering a stampede towards the single-door exit and trapping many inside. The club was filled beyond capacity and lacked emergency exits.

City officials gave the club an operating license and safety inspectors allowed it to run despite knowing it did not have a fire safety permit. The fire triggered some of Romania's biggest protests in years against failed oversight, lack of accountability and a politicized public administration, but many remain pessimistic about any real chance of reform. "Fortunately, no lives were lost in the Bucharest club fire," President Klaus Iohannis said on his Facebook account yesterday. "However, we passed by another significant tragedy. Rules and laws were apparently broken again. Until we understand once and for all that the law is for everyone, society will always be in danger." — Reuters

PAKISTAN MARKET BOMB IN SHIITE AREA KILLS 20

BLAST WAS CAUSED BY AN IED HIDDEN IN A VEGETABLE BOX

PESHAWAR: A bomb exploded at a market vesterday in a mainly Shiite area of Pakistan's northwestern tribal belt, killing at least 20 people and wounding 40 others, officials said. The bomb detonated in a crowded vegetable market in Parachinar city, the capital of Kurram tribal dis-

trict on the Afghan border. "20 people have been martyred [killed]," the Pakistan military said in a short statement, adding that the injured had been taken to military and civil hospitals in the region's main city of Peshawar. "Troops from army and (paramilitary) Frontier Corps are under taking relief and rescue operations," it said. Igbal Zafar Jhagra, governor for Pakistan's northwestern Khyber Pakhtunkhwa province confirmed the death toll in a televised interview with Pakistan's private news broadcaster Geo.

Jhagra said at least 40 people were wounded in the blast, 12 critically. Video footage from the site showed chaotic scenes with people running and shouting in panic and victims strewn in front of vegetables shops among smashed

crates and pushcarts. Victims could be heard Sharif expressed grief over the latest loss of life, screaming and crying while ambulances arrived at the site with sirens blaring.

Ikramullah Khan, a senior government official in Parachinar, told AFP that the blast was caused by an IED (improvised explosive device) hidden in a vegetable box. In a telephone call to AFP, the Hakimullah Mehsud faction of the Tehreek-e-Taleban Pakistan (TTP), claimed responsibility for the attack. "It was to avenge the killing of our associates by security forces and to teach a lesson to Shiites for their support for Bashar Al-Assad," said the group's spokesman, Qari Saifullah, referring to the Syrian president.

Continue attacking

Saifullah warned that his Sunni Muslim group will continue attacking Shiites if they back Assad, whose regime is entrenched in a civil war that began in 2011 and has claimed more than 310,000 lives. In December 2015 an IED blast at the same market killed at least 23 people and wounded more than 30. Prime Minister Nawaz his office said in a statement.

Kurram is one of Pakistan's seven semiautonomous tribal districts which are governed according to local laws and customs. The district is known for sectarian clashes between Sunnis and Shiites, who make up roughly 20 percent of Pakistan's population of 200 million. Last year the country recorded its lowest number of killings since 2007 when the Pakistani Taleban was formed. But the remnants of militant groups are still able to carry out periodic bloody attacks. — AFP

HUMANITARIAN SUPPORT A 'BAND-AID' FOR AFGHANISTAN CONFLICT: OFFICIALS

KABUL: Afghanistan's continued descent into crisis is forcing the country to increasingly rely on humanitarian aid that can only provide short-term relief while leaving the underlying problems unsolved, international officials acknowledged yesterday, even as they launched a request for \$550 million in new funding.

Amid rising violence, economic stagnation, and social upheaval, the United Nations estimates at least 9.3 million Afghans, or nearly a third of the population, will need humanitarian assistance in 2017, a 13 percent increase from last year. While praising the humanitarian workers who provide vital care around the country, Swedish ambassador to Afghanistan Anders Sjoberg said the continued reliance on their services is a sign of broader failures.

"Let us acknowledge that we've been doing this work in Afghanistan for too long," he said at an event with international and Afghan officials in Kabul yesterday. "This is a failure in itself. Humanitarian aid is not shortterm anymore, it has unfortunately become a Band-Aid for the unresolved conflict." Since even before a US-led military operation toppled the Taliban regime in 2001, international organizations have helped provide both more short-term humanitarian aid designed to address the most pressing and life-threatening problems, as well as long-term development support.

But last year saw record increases in the number of people displaced by fighting, with at least 626,000 additional people fleeing their homes, compared to around 70,000 in 2010, when the international military effort

was at its height. The number of refugees ment aid much more effectively and we must returning - in many cases forcibly - to Afghanistan from neighboring countries like Pakistan and Iran also spiked dramatically, from 181,000 in 2015 to at least 618,000 in 2016, according to the UN.

That has led the humanitarian community in Afghanistan to request \$550 million to help an expected 5.7 million of the most vulnerable people in 2017, the highest amount of funding requested since 2011. "We need to link humanitarian and long-term developnot allow humanitarian aid to contribute to cementing the conflict," Sjoberg said, noting that the crisis highlights the need to find a peaceful resolution to the conflict.

Mark Bowden, the UN's humanitarian coordinator, told Reuters in a recent interview that the prolonged violence has created a "vicious cycle" in which Afghanistan struggles to address the root causes of problems like economic malaise, limited access to medical care and education and malnutrition. — Reuters

AFGHANISTAN'S ABDULLAH WELCOMES TRUMP COMMITMENT TO TROOPS

KABUL: Afghan chief executive Abdullah Abdullah yesterday expressed hope that the United States would continue its support for the Afghan government after American President Donald Trump publicly spoke with US troops stationed in Afghanistan after his inauguration on Friday.

"I want to congratulate the US president on behalf of myself, the Afghan government and the people of Afghanistan," Abdullah said at an event to launch a bid for \$550 million in international humanitarian aid for Afghanistan, which remains locked in a bloody war between the Western-backed government and insurgent groups like the Taleban.

Trump, attending a post-inauguration ball in Washington, spoke by video link with American troops stationed at a base

"I'm with you all the way... we're going to do it together," he told the troops. "The courage that you show is incredible." As president-elect, Trump spoke by phone with Afghan President Ashraf Ghani in early December, but has provided few details on whether he will continue the billions of dollars per year in military and development aid to Afghanistan, nor has he confirmed the future of the nearly 9,000 American troops still deployed there.

Abdullah, who shares power with Ghani after a 2014 US-brokered political deal, said he interpreted Trump's comments to the troops as a positive sign. "I watched the US president's message to their soldiers... and he announced his support for them, which is a good and graceful step and I am sure that cooperation will continue in all aspects." — Reuters

S KOREA MINISTER RESIGNS AFTER ARREST OVER ARTISTS' BLACKLIST

resigned after being arrested yesterday for allegedly creating a "blacklist" of nearly 10,000 artists who voiced criticism of impeached President Park Geun-Hye. Cho Yoon-Sun, who is the first minister in active service to be arrested in South Korea, is accused of creating the vast catalogue to starve the artists of government subsidies and private investments and place them under state surveillance.

The list's existence has sparked widespread anger, raising the spectre of Seoul's 1960-80s army-backed ruleincluding under dictator Park Chung-Hee, the impeached leader's late father-when the news, arts and entertainment were heavily censored. Shortly after her arrest, Cho tendered her resignation to Prime Minister Hwang Kyo-Ahn, a spokesman for the prime minister's office said.

'Left-leaning artists'

The Seoul Central District Court had issued a warrant to arrest Cho on charges of abuse of authority and perjury following a request from prosecutors. Cho, 50, known as "Park's Cinderella", is a staunch loyalist of the impeached president and previously served as the minister for gender equalrant for Kim Ki-Choon, a powerful former chief of staff for Park. Kim is accused of ordering Cho to create the list of "left-leaning" artists.

Kim, 78, a former top intelligence official, came under fire for his alleged involvement in human rights abuses committed under Park's father. "Charges are verified... and there are risks of the accused seeking to destroy evidence", a court judge said in a statement issuing the warrants for Cho and Kim. Some Korean media reports have alleged that Park asked for the blacklist to be drawn up, while others said she approved it.

Prosecutors questioned Cho and Kim as part of their probe into a wider political scandal involving Park and her confidante, Choi Soon-Sil, who is currently on trial for abuse of power and coercion. Park stands accused of colluding with Choi to coerce top local firms including Samsung to "donate" nearly \$70 million to non-profit foundations Choi later used for personal gain.

She is also accused of letting Choi, who has no title or security clearance, meddle in a wide range of state affairs including nomination of senior officials. Park was impeached by parliament last

SEOUL: South Korea's culture minister ity. The court also issued an arrest war-month and Seoul's Constitutional Court is currently reviewing the validity of the motion, with the frequency of hearings sparking speculation that it might reach a verdict before mid-March.

Big names blacklisted

The scandal has already seen more than a dozen former senior officials and presidential aides arrested. But the Seoul Central District Court this week rejected a prosecution request for the arrest of Samsung heir Lee Jae-Yong-who is accused of bribing Choi in a bid to seek governmental favoursciting lack of evidence.

The scandal has brought huge numbers of protesters onto the streets every Saturday over the past three months, urging the Constitutional Court to verify Park's impeachment and her immediate departure from office. 'Poor clothing, shelter'

By opening new centers for migrants, "the Serbian government has shown that it takes into account the urgency of winter," says Moissaing, but that "is not enough to absorb everyone". Most of the 7,300 migrants currently estimated to be in Serbia by the UN refugee agency (UNHCR) are sleeping in one of 17 official centers. But there are always more than 1,000 outside, above all in Belgrade, who are male and mostly young, often minors.

Temperatures can drop below minus ten degrees Celsius at night. Cases of frostbite "can only increase in the coming days as most of the refugees have really poor clothing and shelter," said Momcilo Djurdjevic of MSF. He lists the other health problems his team has dealt with since temperatures plummeted: body lice, respiratory infections, scabies. In the largest warehouse, thick with smoke from the fires lit to keep warm, the sound of deep coughs can be heard from migrants huddled under grey blankets. Some concede that they refused to move to an official

who lurk around the station.

They also worry about restrictions in the centers, like the one in Presevo in southern Serbia, where freedom of movement is limited. But many have given in-and when Serbian authorities opened up a new camp this week in an old barracks about 30 kilometers from Belgrade, its 225 beds were immediately occupied, half of them by minors.

'We need shoes'

In the largest of the warehouses, faces are reddened by the cold and eyelids are swollen, making the youngsters look much older than their years. The outside walls bear political slogans such as "One World, One Struggle!" most likely written by activists. Others bear the mark of exhausted travellers: "We need shoes" reads one, while another calls for doctors. Liaqat Khan, a 17vear-old from Bajaur in the northwestern tribal areas Pakistan, said he had tried and failed to get access to an official centre. In his current squat, "sleeping is big problem, shower is big problem, water is big problem, eating is big problem," he

told AFP in broken English. — AFP

TRUMP 'SISTER MARCHES' BEGIN IN AUSTRALIA AND NEW ZEALAND

SYDNEY: Thousands of protesters in Australia and New Zealand yesterday joined the first of hundreds of womens' marches organized around the world in a show of disapproval of US President Donald Trump as he began his first day in office. In Sydney, Australia's biggest city, about 3,000 people - men and women gathered for a rally in Hyde Park before marching on the US consulate downtown, while organisers said 5,000 people rallied in Melbourne.

"Feminism is my Trump card" and "Fight like a girl," were among the placards held aloft by the protesters in Sydney. "We're not marching as an anti-Trump movement per se, we're marching to protest the hate speech, the hateful rhetoric, the misogyny, the bigotry, the xenophobia and we want to present a united voice with women around the globe," organiser Mindy Freiband told Reuters.

Many of the protesters in Sydney and Melbourne wore pink hats, that activists referred to as their "pussyhats". The emergence of a 2005 tape in which Trump spoke of women in a demeaning way sparked widespread outrage and was one of the low points of his election campaign. In the tape he was heard saying: "Grab them by the pussy. You can do anything." In New Zealand, there were marches in four cities, involving around 2,000 people, Wellington's march organiser Bette Flagler told Reuters by phone.

SEOUL: Tens of thousands of protestors braved icy weather and slippery roads for a rally in Seoul yesterday, demanding impeached President Park Geun-Hye's removal and the Samsung heir's arrest for corruption. Park was impeached by parliament last month over an influence-peddling scandal and the Constitutional Court

She is accused of colluding with Choi to extract money from large companies including Samsung and letting her friend meddle in a wide range of state affairs.

"Arrest Park and Lee Jae-Yong immediately," protesters chanted loudly, waving banners and brandishing candles during the evening rally in the capital. "I was shocked and very angry. The court knelt down before Samsung," Agnes Choi, 51, told AFP. "This shows the business empire is

above the law", she said. A 71-year-old retired teacher, Kim Tae-Won, said the court had missed "a good chance to teach a lesson for the country's corrupt business tycoons". Nearby, around 10,000 pro-Park supporters staged a rally protesting Park's impeachment. Police mobilized dozens of police vehicles and hundreds of officers to separate the two rival groups. —AFP

MYANMAR REBUFFS MALAYSIA FOR ROHINGYA OIC MEETING

YANGON: Myanmar rebuffed Malaysia yesterday for organizing a meeting of Muslim governments to put pressure on Myanamar over the plight of Rohingya Muslims following a military crackdown that sent at least 66,000 people fleeing to Bangladesh. Hosting a meeting of representatives from the Organisation of Islamic Cooperation on Thursday, Malaysian Prime Minister Najib Razak called on Myanmar to stop attacking, and discriminating against the Rohingya minority.

Najib urged the OIC, which groups 57 Muslim nations, to act to end the unfolding "humanitarian tragedy". In response, Myanmar, a mostly Buddhist country, said it was "regrettable" that Malaysia had called the meeting, and accused Kuala Lumpur of exploiting the crisis "to promote a certain political agenda" and disregard for the government's efforts to address it.

"The Government has been endeavoring to safeguard lives and ensure the security of the people from the violent attacks of new extrem-

ists," said Myanmar's Ministry of Foreign Affairs in a statement printed in the country's state-run daily, the Global New Light of Myanmar. The ministry is run by Nobel Peace Prize winner and de facto leader of Myanmar, Aung San Suu Kyi, who won 2015 elections in a landslide after decades of pro-democracy struggle, ushering in Myanmar's first civilian government for about half a century.

Myanmar authorities say the military launched a security sweep in response to what they say was an attack in October by Rohingya insurgents on border posts near Myanmar's border with Bangladesh in which nine police officers were killed. Since then, at least 86 people have been killed and the United Nations says at least 66,000 Rohingya have fled to Bangladesh.

Residents and refugees accuse the military of killing, raping and detaining civilians while burning villages in northwestern Rakhine State. The government denies the accusations and insists a lawful counter-insurgency operation is underway. About 56,000 Rohingya live in Malaysia having fled unrest and persecution in Myanmar.

Kuala Lumpur summoned Myanmar's ambassador last year to protest against the treatment of Rohingya, breaking a tradition of non-intervention by members of the Association of South East Asian Nations in each other's affairs. Najib said it would be a disgrace if the Southeast Asian group did not do its utmost to "avert the catastrophe that has been unfolding". On Friday, a United Nations human rights investigator criticized Myanmar's operation and urged the military to respect the law and human rights. — Reuters

"Keep your tiny hands off me," said one. "Rise, Love, Resist," read another. The incoming tide of women in knitted pink hats flushed through a city that the day before had welcomed throngs of Trump supporters in red "Make America Great Again!" caps for the Republican's swearing-in to a four year term.

For his first full day in the world's most powerful office, Trump attended a multifaith service at Washington National Cathedral. He was later due to visit the headquarters of the CIA, an agency he feuded with bitterly before taking office. Powered by social media, the "Women's March on Washington" illustrates the divisions of a country whose incoming leader faces levels of public mistrust unseen in recent decades. He faces resistance dramatized by the show of force by demonstrators with fresh memories of his fat-shaming a former beauty queen, sex assault allegations and a controversial stance on abortion.

The knitted "pink pussyhats" they wore were an allusion to his boasts in a leaked videotape of grabbing women's genitals with impunity. Yesterday's march comes on the heels of a first day of anti-Trump protests marred by sporadic outbreaks of vandalism, with windows smashed downtown and more than 200 people arrested. Authorities were on alert for any new flare-up of violence - although the stated goals of the women marchers are resolutely peaceful.

Jennifer Behr, a 42-year-old accessory designer, rode a packed train from Baltimore to make her voice heard. "It's important we assert our majority and we have a large physical presence to show Trump and the Republicans that they cannot railroad our country," she said. While Trump won 42 percent of the women's vote, millions who did not vote for him worry that gender rights and other progress on women's health, contraception and abortion could be chipped away.

Organizers have not specifically used the term "anti-Trump" to describe their efforts, but the message is clear. Bringing together "people of all genders, ages, races, cultures, political affiliations and backgrounds," they say the protest seeks to secure immigrant rights and access to abortion, among other demands - things which Trump's critics accuse him of wanting to curb.

Dozens of progressive groups are supporting the event, as well as Amnesty International and Planned Parenthood, the women's healthcare provider that is a Republican target because of the abortion services it provides. The Women's March began with a simple Facebook post from Hawaii grandmother and retired lawyer Teresa Shook to about 40 of her friends. Word traveled quickly, and eventually made it to the pro-Clinton Facebook group Pantsuit Nation, which has nearly four million members.

Some 300 sister marches were being held across the country, from New York to Seattle. In London, a largely female crowd, which also had many men and children, packed a Trafalgar Square rally in solidarity with women-led demonstrations throughout

the United States. "Our Rights Are Not For Grabs - Neither Are We" were among the banners held aloft, along with "We shall overcomb" and "Make bigotry wrong again".

Hannah Bryant, a 34-year-old museum worker, brought her four-year-old daughter - both of them wearing the bright pink "pussyhats" worn by US demonstrators. "I've been teaching her about equality and prejudice," she said. "It's a feeling of solidarity - not in our name," said Jill Pickering, a 56-year-old American student. "I'm angry - I didn't vote for Trump"

Organizers said 100,000 attended the London march, although there was no independent verification as police do not give an estimate. In Paris, at least 2,000 people gathered near the Eiffel Tower, holding up banners that read "liberty, equality, sorority", in a reference to France's national motto. "I am here for women and for all minorities because Trump is a threat to all humanity," said a US national Kendra Wergin, who is in her mid-30s. Andreia Rossi, a 39-year-old Brazilian, told AFP she was taking part "because I am a woman, but also because I want to protest against everything Trump represents." She added: "It's very dangerous, he has lied to all those who voted for him, and that can happen in France too."

In Barcelona, Rome, Amsterdam and Geneva too, protesters were enraged by Trump's derogatory remarks on women. "We are here for women and for human rights," one of a large contingent of American expatriate women told SkyTG24 news channel in Rome. "This American says Trump go back to your own planet," read a placard brandished by a protester.

"We must defend democratic values," said Karen Olson, who organized the Swiss march, as motorists driving by honked their horns in support. "When injustice becomes law, resistance becomes duty," read a banner held up by a Barcelona protester. "Make America sane again," read a banner in Amsterdam. In Budapest, up to 400 people gathered in solidarity with the Washington marchers. "Bridges not walls," read one of their banners, a reference to Trump's threat to build a wall separating the United States from Mexico to stop migrants from entering the country - and to have Mexico pay for it.

In Berlin, hundreds rallied in front of the US embassy, chanting pro-migrant slogans in a nation that welcomed nearly a million people fleeing war and poverty in 2015. "No hate, no fear, immigrants are welcome here," they cried. In Prague, protest organizer Johanna Nejedlova branded Trump's rhetoric "hateful". "We want to express our support for values such as democracy, human rights, ecology and women's rights," she said.

There were also solidarity marches beyond Europe too, with protests in Johannesburg, South Africa, where marchers held up banners reading "Black lives matter" and "Love trumps hate". Anti-Trump protests also took place in Australia with several thousand marching in Sydney and Melbourne. And in New Zealand, hundreds joined demonstrations in the capital Wellington as well as in Auckland. — Agencies

The bill envisions granting the office of the presidency - currently a largely ceremonial position - the power to appoint government ministers and senior officials, dissolve parliament, declare states of emergency, issue decrees and appoint half of the members in the country's highest judicial body. The deliberations, which were not televised, dragged on late into the night.

Kemal Kilicdaroglu, head of the opposition Republican People's Party, vowed to lead a "struggle for democracy" to have the reforms rejected in the national vote. "The Turkish people will spoil this game being played in parliament, I believe this with all my heart," he said. Lawmakers of the pro-Kurdish and liberal People's Democratic Party, or HDP, argued freedoms were being rolled back in the name of stability at a time when a divided nation needs more, not less democracy.

"If this presidential system passes, the state of chaos, crisis, instability, clashes, polarization we've experienced in the past 11/2 to 2 years will become institutionalized and made permanent," Hisar Ozsoy of the HDP said in a motion to dismiss the bill. The HDP also demanded that their leaders and representatives jailed on "terrorismrelated" charges be allowed to cast votes - a request that was ignored. "Taking into account rising terror attacks in Turkey by (the Islamic State group) and Kurdish militants, in a potential referendum, Erdogan's winning recipe will be to cast himself as the strong man, rightwing leader able to deliver security to the Turks through the office of his newly created executive-style presidency," said Soner Cagaptay, director of the Turkish Research Program at The Washington Institute for Near East Policy. — AP

Experts also believe the administration could try to reduce the "essential benefits," such as maternity care and mental health services, that insurance plans must cover. The White House did not provide further details about the executive order. Trump's spokesman Sean Spicer said the White House also directed an immediate regulatory freeze for all government agencies in a memo from Trump's chief of staff, Reince Priebus. He did not offer details.

"It's a sign that the Trump administration is looking to unwind the law in every way it can administratively," said Larry Levitt of the Kaiser Family Foundation, a nonpartisan clearinghouse for information and analysis about the healthcare system. Leslie Dach, campaign director of the Protect Our Care Coalition, issued a statement saying, "While President Trump may have promised a smooth transition, the Executive Order does the opposite, threatening disruption for health providers and patients." He called the executive order "irresponsible".

Repealing and replacing the Affordable Care Act, one of former President Barack Obama's signature laws, was a central pledge for Trump during the presidential election campaign. Republicans in the US Congress have not yet laid out a plan to recast the insurance program. In a hastily arranged ceremony, surrounded by some of his aides, Trump sat behind the presidential Resolute Desk and signed the order. He also signed commissions for his newly confirmed defense secretary, James Mattis, and his homeland security secretary, John Kelly.

Trump spoke briefly about his day with reporters. "It was busy, but good. It was a beautiful day," he said. Vice President Mike Pence then swore in Mattis and Kelly in a separate ceremony. There were other signs of change in the Oval Office, which Obama vacated on Friday morning. Golden drapes hung where crimson ones had earlier in the day and new furniture dotted the room. — Agencies



DEATH OF BRAZIL JUDGE TO DELAY **CORRUPTION PROBE**

■he death of a Supreme Court justice handling corruption accusations against dozens of Brazilian politicians will not derail the country's biggest ever graft probe but will delay it, handing valuable breathing space to President Michel Temer. Justice Teori Zavascki was killed in a plane crash on Thursday, just weeks before he was due to unveil explosive testimony from executives at engineering group Odebrecht SA that is expected to implicate as many as 200 politicians in a vast kickback scandal.

Postponing the fallout from evidence that could incriminate powerful political figures in his coalition gives the president more time to push through reforms to generous pension and labor rules and restore business confidence in a country stuck in a two-year recession. "This can give Temer more room to move ahead with his reform agenda in Congress but Zavascki's death won't stall or change the course of the investigations," said Thiago de Aragao, partner at ARKO consultancy that advises corporations and banks on investment in Brazil. "It will just pause it for a while."

Temer, who has himself been named by one defendant as a recipient of illegal campaign funds, has said he will rapidly appoint a new justice who, under Supreme Court rules, would take over Zavascki's cases. The nominee would have to be confirmed by the Senate, which could take weeks if not months after Congress returns from its Christmas recess in February.

The new judge would then need to get up to speed on the sprawling corruption investigation, dubbed Operation Car Wash, which is centered on bribes and political kickbacks from state-run companies, principally oil company Petroleo Brasileiro S A, commonly known as Petrobras. "Zavascki was ready to resolve Car Wash promptly and take decisions that would clear up who could stay in government or Congress and who had to go," said Ives Gandra Martins, a constitutional lawyer in Sao Paulo. Those decisions will be delayed until at least March or April, Martins said, preventing Brazil from turning the page on a corruption probe so massive and complex it paralyzed public sector construction projects and deepened the recession.

'Got to be Quick'

That is too long for some Brazilians who want to know which of their leaders were embroiled in the scandal that involved at least 6.4 billion reais (\$2 billion) in bribes for contracts with state-run enterprises. In Brazil, federal politicians and other senior officials can only be tried by the Supreme Court. Given the public's suspicion of politicians, the Supreme Court should opt for a rule that in urgent cases lets it name a replacement from its ranks, rather than wait for Temer's nominee, said left-leaning Senator Cristovam Buarque

"Any presidential choice would be questionable," Buarque said in a telephone interview. "It has got to be guick. Brazil cannot wait another six months. We want to know what happened and who should be punished." At least one justice on the 11-seat court, Marco Aurelio Mello, has come out publicly in favor of one of his peers immediately taking charge of Car Wash. Though he was appointed by impeached former President Dilma Rousseff, the 68-year-old Zavascki had gained a reputation as independent and willing to target corrupt politicians of any stripe, including Rousseff's Workers Party. Police are investigating the crash in which a small, twinprop plane that was carrying him plunged into the sea south of Rio de Janeiro during heavy rain.

'Bad for Brazil'

Zavascki's replacement will have to approve hundreds of plea deal statements by defendants that are expected to shake Brazil's political establishment to the core. Temer has already lost four cabinet members to corruption allegations. Several other ministers and leaders of his PMDB party in Congress have been named in Odebrecht plea deals, raising concern about the survival of his government. Odebrecht S A is the holding company for the group's interests, which include 14 subsidiaries.

"In the short-run, any delay works in Temer's favor because it will put off the instability that the new accusations will bring," said Roberto Dias, a constitutional law professor at the FGV think tank in Sao Paulo. "But it's bad for Brazil." For Brazilians dismayed by the scandals that Car Wash has uncovered, Zavascki's death - whether an accident or not - was just the latest reason to lose faith in their institutions. "His death will delay the Odebrecht testimony and, depending on who takes over, the Car Wash investigation could take a different course," said Rio de Janeiro systems analyst Bruno Bokel. "I do not believe in our justice system." — Reuters

WHAT WILL DONALD TRUMP DO?

hen Donald Trump shows up for work next week, it's anyone's guess as to what he will do. Over the past month, many reporters have asked me "what do you think Trump will do and what are you most concerned about?" My simple answer has been "I know what worries me most, but I have no idea what he'll do because I don't think he knows either".

During the campaign, Trump promised a boatload of dramatic initiatives and actions. After winning, many have been substantially changed or just disappeared. Hillary Clinton isn't going to jail; Mexico isn't paying for a wall; Muslims aren't being banned; and, lest we forget, Wall Street and lobbyists aren't problems anymore (actu-

ally, they are now the government). We'll soon see what Trump will do. If I had to guess, I'd assume that he'll undo some of President Obama's executive orders that protected air quality, water purity, consumers and workers. These will all, no doubt, be serious set-backs, but they won't make good on the new President's "big promises" to transform our country from the dark post-Apocalyptic nightmare of his speeches to his vaguely defined vision of being "Great Again". That will require more than "I promise you".

The job of being president is different than starring in a reality TV show, running a campaign, tweeting, or being a real estate self-promoter. Boastful rhetoric and vainglorious promises may have defined Donald Trump's road to the White House but I fear that he may not be able to adjust to the challenges of being there. There are several reasons to be concerned.

Control

Donald Trump likes to be in control, but as he will soon learn, the president is not so much captain of the team as he is captive of the team. He's not the only actor in this drama nor does he have complete control over events, or even over those who supposedly work for him. Being president is not as easy as starring in your own TV show or running a campaign. A president is dependent on staff for input and on their ability to execute. This might sound simple, but when you consider the

degree to which Trump's cabinet appointees have already made clear in Senate hearings their disagreements with his views on critical issues and the extent to which the positions of some cabinet appointees differ dramatically from those of key White House staff (think of General Mattis versus General Flynn, or General Kelly versus Steve Bannon and Steve Miller), internal conflicts will make for messy decision-making.

The new president will also need Congress and the much maligned GOP establishment to support his agenda. And here too, his control will be limited. Republican leaders in both houses will give Trump a bit of a honeymoon, but they know that he starts his presidency with low approval ratings. With all Members of Congress and eight Republican Senators facing reelection in 2018, expect that Congress will soon start thinking more about their own careers and less about the success of the President's agenda. One big blunder, embarrassing incident, or ethics or financial scandal and we'll see how loyal Republicans will be to "their" President.

More significant than the difficulties the President will face in attempting to control competing staff or Congress will be his inability to control unforeseen events that will unfold at home or abroad. I often note that Presidents are judged less by their success in accomplishing the agenda they set for themselves and more by how they respond to the agenda set for them by an unpredictable world.

George W Bush was confronted with the horror of 9/11, the devastation of Katrina, and the worst economic collapse since the Great Depression. He squandered the world's goodwill after 9/11, launching two disastrous wars and engaging in torture abroad and repression at home. He bungled Katrina and struggled to deal with the recession.

Barack Obama began his race for the White House before the recession hit. It was presented to him as an unwanted gift. He inherited an Israeli-Palestinian conflict reeling from the disastrous Gaza War and the election of an incorrigible and intransigent Israeli leader. He also had to contend with a resurgent Russia, an increas-

ingly aggressive China, and the unsettling out-of-control consequences of the so-called Arab Spring. Obama successfully managed an economic turnaround while managing to pass a sweeping health care reform bill and other significant pieces of social legislation. But he had much less success in foreign affairs. Netanyahu was a persistent headache whom Obama felt pressured to deal with gingerly. His efforts to "reset" with Russia and the Muslim World failed, and his desire to "pivot to Asia" was stymied by domestic politics and the unraveling of the Middle East.

Test

This inability to control people, institutions, and events will test the Trump presidency. He won't find it easy to fire whoever doesn't play by his rules. And unlike business, he won't be able to declare bankruptcy and get a "do over". In the White House, should he screw up - he, the rest of us, and possibly the entire world, will suffer the consequences (think of George W Bush's Iraq

As much as the new president has to be concerned about dissension within his Administration, an uncooperative Congress, independent-minded foreign leaders, foreign wars or terror attacks or other calamities that may occur, I am concerned with how a volatile and unpredictable Donald Trump will respond to situations he can't control. He hasn't demonstrated the patience, discipline, and thoughtfulness that will be required to handle complex issues and unexpected problems.

So yes, I am troubled by the prospect of Donald Trump undoing some of the key elements of Barack Obama's progressive agenda. But, to be honest, more than that I am concerned that on any given day, given what we've seen of his personality and what we know about the demands of the job he has now assumed, we could be one Tweet away from an international incident or one terror attack away from a campaign of mass

SYRIAN REBELS BITTERLY DIVIDED BEFORE TALKS

yrian President Bashar Al-Assad's opponents appear more divided than ever as they prepare for peace talks this week, demoralized by their defeat in Aleppo and unable to unite into a single force to defend their remaining territory. The new diplomacy led by Assad's Russian allies has exposed yet more splits in a rebellion that has never had a clear chief, with rebel factions long fractured by regional rivalries, their ties to foreign states, and an ideological battle over whether to pursue Syrian national or Sunni jihadist goals.

Several leaders became prominent only to be killed in the nearly six-year-old conflict and numerous military and political coalitions have come and gone. After the rebels' defeat in Aleppo last month, the latest effort to unify the jihadist and moderate wings of the insurgency collapsed. By contrast Assad is as strong as at any time since the fighting began, his Russian and Iranian backers committed to his survival while the differing agendas of foreign states backing the rebels have added to their divisions.

The delegation of rebels that will attend the talks with the Syrian government starting tomorrow in the Kazakh capital Astana represents only part of the moderate opposition that has fought Assad in a loose alliance known as the Free Syrian Army. Most are from groups fighting in northern Syria with the backing of Turkey. Other rebel groups seen closer to the United States and Saudi Arabia have been left out.

The delegation will be led by Mohammad Alloush, the politburo chief of the Jaish al-Islam rebel group, which is at the more moderate end of the Sunni Islamist spectrum and has its main stronghold near Damascus. Alloush, who lives outside Syria, has not been appointed to the role because he wields influence over the rebellion as a whole - he does not. He was chosen because he is a member of the High Negotiations Committee (HNC), an alliance set up with Saudi and Western sup-

port in 2015. The HNC itself, the broadest opposition body formed since the war began, has not been invited to Astana. Its chairman, former prime minister Riad Hijab, is the nearest thing the moderate opposition has to "a face". But his role is closer to that of a spokesman for the myriad groups on the ground and he will not be in Astana either. The HNC has said it hopes the Astana talks will be a step towards new peace talks in Geneva. But while Russia says Astana aims to supplement Geneva, some in the opposition fear Moscow is trying to supplant the UN-backed process with its own and wants to increase divisions in the rebel camp.

"Going to Astana has more danger than going to Geneva," said Mohammad Aboud, a member of the HNC. "In Geneva, there was a political front for the opposition that had gained international recognition while in Astana there is a lot of ambiguity and with Russia sponsoring this and being an occupying force and not a mediator." He said "polarization may increase" in the opposition and added: "This is perhaps one of the real goals of the Russians - to increase the division."

Widening Divisions

Russia's peace moves have also exacerbated the split between the moderate and jihadist wings of the insurgency, fuelling tensions that have spilled into confrontation in Idlib, the rebels' main remaining foothold. A ceasefire brokered by Russia and Turkey last month has excluded the main jihadist group in northwestern Syria, Jabhat Fateh al-Sham, while a spate of air

strikes targeting its leaders have increased

mistrust in the rebel camp. All this plays further to Assad's advantage, as his Russian and Iranian allies want to lead diplomacy over Syria, with Donald Trump indicating he will cut backing for the moderate Syrian opposition as US president. The rebels going to Astana say the meeting must focus on shoring up the ceasefire and will resist political discussions although Assad has said he is open to such talks. "If Astana is just about a mechanism for a ceasefire, and humanitarian access, then it is positive. But it won't be good if they discuss political affairs in Astana because that will amount to the marginalization of the other political forces," said one FSA commander.

After years of failed international diplomacy, Moscow says it wants to advance peace by dealing directly with rebels fighting on the ground. It says the aim of the talks, which Iran will also attend, is to consolidate the ceasefire. Turkey, which backs the revolt against Assad, is also behind the new peace drive and is widely believed to have put pressure in the rebels to go to Astana. This reflects its shifting goals in Syria, where its priorities are now shaped around combating Kurdish militia and Islamic State near its border.


Uncertain Outlook The outlook for the moderate rebels is more uncertain than ever as Trump has signalled he will cut American support for rebels who have been armed under an aid program backed by the United States, Arab states and Turkey. An invitation to Astana has been sent to the United States, but Saudi Arabia and Qatar have been left out. The rebel divisions have long worked in Assad's favor in the conflict, which grew out of protests against Assad and his government in March 2011 and is estimated to have killed several hundred thousand people. — Reuters

'NEXT ZLATAN' CLOSE TO DEAL WITH DORTMUND

STOCKHOLM: Swedish football prodigy Alexander Isakdubbed the next Zlatan Ibrahimovic-is on the verge of signing with Borussia Dortmund, snubbing an offer from Real Madrid, Swedish daily Aftonbladet reported yesterday. "Alexander Isak looks set to snub Real Madrid. Instead the 17-year-old has apparently decided on another option: the big German club Borussia Dortmund," the paper wrote, citing unnamed sources close to the club. Isak, who earlier this month became Sweden's youngest ever international goalscorer at 17 years and 113 days, had been close to a deal with the Spanish club, according to Spanish media reports a week ago. Aftonbladet said the transfer fee looked set to exceed 82 million kronor (8.6 million euros, \$9.2 million). If confirmed, Isak's move to Dortmund could be part of a bigger switch-up at the Bundesliga club. Star striker Pierre-Emerick Aubameyang admitted Friday he could leave Borussia Dortmund in the summer. The German league's top scorer so far this season with 16 goals in his 15 Bundesliga games, he has a Dortmund contract until 2020. —AFP

INJURED INIESTA **IRREPLACEABLE**

BARCELONA: Barcelona boss Luis Enrique believes there isn't another player in world football who can adequately replace what injured captain Andres Iniesta brings the Catalan giants. However, as Barca go in search of a fourth straight win at Eibar on Sunday night, Enrique is hopeful the Spanish champions are finally beginning to find the form that will help them chase down Real Madrid at the top of La Liga. "There is no one, not in the squad or in world football (like Iniesta)," Enrique said yesterday. "That is the problem. I have many very good players, but none of them are like Iniesta. Iniesta will miss the trip to the Basque country after coming off at half-time in Barca's 1-0 Copa del Rey quarter-final, first leg win at Real Sociedad on Thursday due to a calf problem. REFRESHED JOHNSON SHOOTS 64, IN CONTENTION IN ABU DHABI

ABU DHABI: Over his jet lag and familiar with the golf course, Dustin Johnson is finally a real factor at the Abu Dhabi HSBC Championship.

The US Open champion shot an 8under-par 64 in the third round yesterday to catapult into title contention in his first event of 2017. He started the day eight shots off the lead and finished it in a fiveway tie for second at 12 under par, one stroke behind new leader Tyrrell Hatton.

Johnson is showing a steady improvement on the 7,583-yard, American-style National Course, which was always going to suit one of the biggest hitters in the sport. He opened with an even-par 72, made the cut by shooting a 68 and then refreshed after his best sleep of the week powered through the field by making six birdies and chipping in for eagle from the back of the eighth green.

"Definitely by far the best day I've been feeling out on the golf course," said Johnson, who is playing for the first time in Abu Dhabi after receiving a sponsor's invitation. "You know, just felt the swing, my body was moving a lot better.

"I think it's a course you need to play a few times to get the exact lines you need to take off the tees and stuff."

No kicker left has playoff familiarity like Stephen Gostkowski, who has 20 postseason appearances with the New England Patriots entering the AFC championship game on Sunday against Pittsburgh.

No kicker left has been in the league longer than Matt Bryant, the balding, 15-year veteran for the Atlanta Falcons. "As far as kicking as long as I've kicked, I've never taken anything for granted. Even though I am 41 and even though this is Year 15, it's still a dream," Bryant said.

Then there is Green Bay's Mason Crosby, who enters the NFC championship game Sunday against Atlanta fresh with the confidence of having hit a 51-yard field goal as time expired to beat the Dallas Cowboys last week.

'That's my biggest kick that I've had and I've had a 10-year career here," Crosby, who is from Texas, said this week. "To be able to have a 51yarder in (the) divisional playoffs down in Dallas, such a big game like that, it was special."

Crosby actually hit two 51-yarders, except the first was waived off because Cowboys coach Jason Garrett had called timeout just before the attempt. Crosby also drilled a 56-yard field goal with 1:33 left. "Come kind of down the hash, take a swing, just get back into that rhythm," Crosby said in describing his thought process after Garrett called the timeout. "Just focus on trying to be smooth and hit a good ball." The conditions were ideal at roofcovered AT&T Field, just like they should be inside the Georgia Dome today. "When you see Mason operate inside, he's pretty flawless," Packers coach Mike McCarthy said. "He's a machine. Frankly, I don't think anybody was concerned." STORM DISRUPTS SINGAPORE OPEN

SINGAPORE: Australia's Adam Scott was - stop and start, and kind of tricky conditions among four players tied for the lead at the Singapore Open yesterday when a tropical storm and fading light forced the suspension of the third round.

Already behind schedule after Southeast Asia's fickle weather disrupted the opening day, the storm left Asian Tour officials scrambling to finish the US\$1million tournament on time. Organisers face the possibility of a Monday finish after heavy rain resulted in more long delays at the Sentosa Golf Club.

Thunder and lightning caused a three-anda-half-hour delay and of the 77 players who made the cut, only 45 completed their third rounds, leaving the remaining 32 to return to the course early on Sunday to finish where they left off. "It's one of those unfortunate days

at the end there," said Scott. "Unfortunately I dropped a shot, but I'm still in the mix, so it's not too bad and I'm in good shape." The players did manage to get back on course after ground staff drained the greens of surface water and made some repairs to the bunkers, but play was again halted when darkness fell. Scott, playing in the final group, was on the 14th hole when play was abandoned for the day in drizzling rain. Already a three-time winner of the Singapore Open, he was locked in a four-way share of the lead with his playing partner, South Koreanborn American Han Seung-su, and Thai pair Tirawat Kaewsiribandit and Phachara Khongwatmai, who managed to complete their rounds to share the clubhouse lead.

Tirawat charged up the leaderboard with a superb round of five-under 66, the best of the day, that featured an eagle three on the fourth

hole and four birdies on the back nine. "I am very happy with how I finished. It wasn't easy out there, especially with the rain," said Tirawat, who only secured his Asian Tour card last week after going through qualifying school. Han, who led after the second round, surrendered his place at the top of the leaderboard when he double bogeyed the third hole but pulled one shot back on the fourth to stay in contention while Pharachat birdied the last to sign for a 67 just before the hooter sounded to stop play. "I'm glad I managed to finish the round as that would give me some extra rest for tomorrow," Parachat said. "It was pretty tough out there with the rain but I'm happy to sink that last birdie to bring me to the top."

Scott held the outright lead at nine-under at the turn but the 2013 US Masters champion dropped back to minus eight when he threeputted the 12th hole after hitting his approach to the fringe of the green. —AFP

'BLOOD, SWEAT AND TEARS': VONN BACK ON TOP WITH DOWNHILL WIN

GARMISCH-PARTENKIRCHEN: Lindsey Vonn is back on top in just the second race of her comeback from a knee injury and a broken arm.

The American edged defending overall World Cup champion Lara Gut to win a downhill event in Garmisch-Partenkirchen, Germany, yesterday and claim career victory No. 77, moving her within nine wins of the record held by Ingemar Stenmark.

After finishing 0.15 seconds ahead of Swiss rival Gut and 0.48 ahead of Viktoria Rebensburg of Germany, Vonn collapsed to the snow in celebration and shed tears of joy. She also grew emotional when she embraced her once-estranged father, Alan Kildow.

"I just got to the bottom and I cried,"

Vonn said. "I worked really hard to come back. I feel like sometimes I come back so quickly. Everyone forgets how much time and energy and blood, sweat and tears it takes to come back without any training and just jump in there.

"I had to trust myself and my team and my technician and we all did our best and today was just amazing. I'm so happy that it only took me two races to get back on the top step," the four-time overall World Cup champion added.

Vonn broke her upper right arm 10 weeks ago in a training crash on Copper Mountain, Colorado, while recovering from a left knee injury that ended last season prematurely in February. She finished 13th in the first race in Altenmarkt-Zauchensee, Austria, last weekend.

"I honestly wasn't sure after through her run but was able to hold to Zauchensee how long it would take me and I proved to myself today that all the work that I put in is really coming through," Vonn said.

Last week, Vonn revealed that she struggled with nerve damage so severe that she couldn't move her fingers soon after undergoing arm surgery in November. She has been skiing with a battery -operated heated sock over her right hand to help her maintain feeling and hold onto her ski pole.

Without any sun on the Kandahar course, it was difficult for skiers to see the bumps and terrain. Still, Vonn pushed from start to finish. Racing after Gut and Rebensburg, Vonn lost some time when she went wide midway

her advantage in the lower section where she missed a gate in training a day earlier. "I gave myself a little bit of extra room so I could carry the speed in that section," Vonn said.

Vonn's last win also was in a downhill event in Garmisch last February. She already passed Annemarie Moser-Proell's women's record of 62 wins across all events two years ago. Next up is the outright record held by Stenmark, the Swedish great who garnered his wins between 1975 and 1989.

In the overall standings, Gut gained 80 points on Mikaela Shiffrin, more of a technical specialist who is not racing this

weekend, but still trails by 235 points. Ilka Stuhec of Slovenia finished eighth

and leads Gut by 117 points in the downhill standings. Ramona Siebenhofer, the Austrian who led both training sessions, finished fourth, and Italy's Sofia Goggia was fifth. The surprise of the day came from Ricarda Haaser, an Austrian who finished 10th with the No. 53 bib.

American skier Breezy Johnson finished 11th to match her best career result. Christine Scheyer, the Austrian who recorded her first win last weekend, went wide a few gates from the finish and failed to clear a gate. Johanna Schnarf had trouble in the same spot, losing control and falling, but the Italian appeared to avoid serious injury. Vonn will be aiming for another win today in a super-G event on the Kandahar course. —AP

PARIS CLAIMS SECOND KITZBUEHEL DOWNHILL WIN

the pantheon of skiing greats who have won the World Cup's most prestigious event, the Kitzbuehel downhill, twice after his latest triumph yesterday.

Paris previously won in 2013 and the Italian's second victory down the notoriously difficult Streif course, in 1min 55.01sec, was his seventh win on the World Cup circuit. The 27-year-old joins a list of multiple winners including Didier Cuche (5), Franz Klammer (4), Swiss duo Franz Heinzer and Pirmin Zubriggen, and France's Luc Alphand all winning three times.

"From the midpoint down it was very good," Paris said. "It is one of the most beautiful races, I am really chuffed. "I have not been in such good shape in the downhill, but that's a great start!"

Unheralded Valentin Giraud Moine claimed second, 0.21sec adrift, with French teammate Johan Clarey in third (+0.33) in perfect conditions with temperatures of -8 degrees Celsius (18F) and clear skies.

The Hahnenkamm, or rooster's comb, the mountain on which the "Streif" piste lies, is widely recognised as the toughest course on the World Cup circuit, with racers touching 100kph within 8.5 seconds of leaving the start and hitting 140kph further down the piste.

Starting with bib number nine, Paris attacked from the off and picked a particularly good line in the bottom section of the 3.3km-long course that demands everything of man and material as racers fight not only creeping exhaustion but also a

Blast through

Coming into view of an estimated 50,000 flag-waving spectators packed into the picturesque Tyrolean town, Paris kept his nerve to blast through the finish line, his fist pumping the air in delight.

Fancied Norwegian Kjetil Jansrud finished well down the field, more than 2sec off the pace, a mistake at the top of the course costing him dear.

Austrian Matthias Mayer, the reigning Olympic downhill champion and winner of Friday's super-G, finished eighth, at 0.75sec, despite words of encouragement from onlooking former California governor and Hollywood star Arnold Schwarzenegger.

"Do it!" Schwarznegger intoned on the big screen, then deadpanning, to a raucous reception: "He'll be back!"

As ever, the course claimed its victims, notably Austrian hope Max Franz and Switzerland's Beat Feuz, who was third in the super-G.

Feuz tore down the piste and came into the final descent well in the lead, but the centrifugal forces got the better of him, the Swiss racer unable to get back on line and crashing heavily into the safety netting.

On each occasion, there were collective gasps of shock from the crowd, followed by a deathly minutes-long silence before widespread cheers as the respective racers got to their feet and waved to signal they were okay. — AFP

Warriors get sixth straight WIN, 125-108 OVER ROCKETS

HOUSTON: Kevin Durant scored 32 points and the Golden State Warriors used a big third quarter to build a huge lead and coast to their sixth straight victory, 125-108 over the Houston Rockets on Friday night. In a matchup of two of the best teams in the Western Conference and All-Star starting guards Stephen Curry and James Harden, the Rockets fell short. Houston, which entered the game leading the NBA with 667 3-pointers, was just 7 of 35 behind the arc. Harden went 0 for 5 and Eric Gordon, who entered the game leading the NBA with 160 3s, missed all seven attempts. Clint Capela had 22 points and Harden added 17 points with 11 assists for the Rockets, who are third in the West behind Golden State and San Antonio. Curry finished with 24 points and made five 3-pointers, including one with about 3 1/2 minutes remaining that left the Warriors up 117-93. Both teams cleared their benches after that.

HORNETS 113, RAPTORS 78

Kemba Walker scored 32 points on 11-of-16 shooting, and Charlotte beat Toronto. Walker, who came in averaging 23 points and looking to earn his first All-Star selection, scored 16 points in the pivotal third quarter, including a four-point play as the Hornets outscored the Raptors 33-15 to build a 25-point lead. Walker didn't play at all in the fourth quarter after the Hornets stretched their lead to 30. He finished with eight assists. Frank Kaminsky had a solid night off the bench for the second straight game, scoring 16 points and grabbing eight rebounds. Kyle Lowry had 24 points and DeMar DeRozan added 23 points for the Raptors, who have lost two straight.

76ERS 93, TRAIL BLAZERS 92

Robert Covington scored 22 points and made two 3-pointers in the final 40 seconds to lead streaking Philadelphia over Portland. Ersan Ilyasova scored 24 points and Joel Embiid added 18 points, 10 rebounds and five assists for the Sixers, who have won four straight and eight of their last 10. Embiid, who sparked the recent surge, suffered a bruised left knee in the second half and didn't play the final 8:50 of the game. But the Sixers rallied for the victory without their prized center as Covington drilled the winner with 4.5 seconds left before Mason Plumlee missed a shot at the buzzer on the other end. Damian Lillard scored 30 points for the Blazers, who have lost four straight.

HAWKS 102, BULLS 93

Dennis Schroder scored 23 points, Paul Millsap added 14 and Atlanta held back a late scare to beat Chicago. The Bulls put up little resistance all night until their reserves went on a 33-4 run in the fourth quarter to pull within five on Bobby Portis' dunk with 1:08 remaining. Chicago trailed by 22 at the end of the first, by 29 at the end of the second and 30 at the end of the third. Atlanta's lead was tenuous enough that Hawks coach Mike Budenholzer brought back Schroder and Millsap, who had rested the entire fourth quarter, for the last 2 minutes. Dwight Howard and Thabo Sefolosha combined by 24 points for Atlanta, which has won 10 of 12. Jimmy Butler finished with 19 points for the Bulls, who looked uninspired most of the night. They have dropped five of seven.

GRIZZLIES 107, KINGS 91

Marc Gasol had 28 points and nine rebounds, Mike Conley added 16 points, eight rebounds and eight assists, and Memphis coasted past Sacramento. The Grizzlies used the 3-point shooting of Gasol and Zach Randolph to build the advantage to 19 at the end of the third quarter. At that point, Sacramento coach Dave Joerger sat his starters as Memphis eventually would build the advantage to 22 in the fourth. Randolph finished with 20 points and 10 rebounds for Memphis, which snapped a two-game losing streak. Tony Allen also had a double-double with 13 points and 10 rebounds. Sacramento has lost seven of its last eight. DeMarcus Cousins led the Kings with 19 points and 10 rebounds, while Garrett Temple added 14 points and Ty Lawson had 13.

MAGIC 112, BUCKS 96

Elfrid Payton scored 20 points, Jeff Green added 18 points and seven rebounds off the bench, and Orlando snapped a three-game losing streak by beating Milwaukee. The Magic, returning home from a 1-5 road trip, played with a small lineup for much of the night and it provided the offense they needed with two of their top scorers out. Orlando had six players in double figures, including starters Aaron Gordon (17), Serge Ibaka (13) and Nikola Vucevic (13). Caris Levert added 17 points on 6-of-6 shooting for the Nets, who had seven players in double figures while beating their season high for points by 16. 

FEDERER GRACIOUS IN PRAISE OF TODAY'S OPPONENT AT AUSSIE OPEN

MELBOURNE: As befitting his status as strong service game if he's going to give a 17-time Grand Slam champion and as an astute judge of the sport, Roger Federer's reply to a simple question about his next opponent was handled with the same aplomb as one of his stylish groundstrokes.

The player in question was Kei Nishikori, who plays Federer in a fourthround night match Sunday at Rod Laver Arena. "I'm a big fan of his game," Federer said. "He's got one of the best backhands out there. I love how he can crush it down the line or cross-court. He's got wonderful second serve returns. He's fast on his legs. Strong in his mind. I know how tough he is as the match goes along. He finds his range and his rhythm, he's tough to stop."

Federer said he'll need another

Nishikori some trouble. In Federer's win over Tomas Berdych on Thursday, he didn't face a break point and he won points on 95 percent of the first serves he got into play - 39 of 41, and all 16 in the third and final set.

"This one's going to be completely different to Tomas ... there's going to be more rallies, even though the surface remains fast. I said it at the beginning of the week, it's not easy to control the ball. Today again, when you serve well, it pays dividends. I hope I can keep that up against Kei."

Asked if Nishikori should be considered the favorite because of the No. 5 seeding (Federer is 17th after a sixmonth left knee injury layoff) Federer replied, smiling: "Yeah, sure, he's the favorite. Maybe. I don't know."

Nishikori said he watched some of the Federer-Berdych match and was impressed. "Roger, it's a big challenge for me," Nishikori said. "I'm just happy to play him because I think we needed him on the tour. Happy to see him back 100 percent.

NO PRESSURE

Top-seeded Andy Murray plays Mischa Zverev in an afternoon match at Margaret Court Arena. Murray, a fivetime Australian Open finalist, is heavily favored. The 50th-ranked Zverev, the older brother of 19-year-old rising star Alexander Zverev - who lost to Rafael Nadal in the third round - says Murray could go either way while pondering his ranking advantage.

"I don't know if it's more pressure on him or maybe it's a relief," Mischa Zverev said. "If someone like Novak (Djokovic) is out of the tournament, I feel like the whole rhythm of the tournament changes a little bit, so we'll see what's going to happen." Zverev hopes to possibly rile the often volatile Murray.

"If he plays his best tennis, obviously I don't think I have a lot of chances, but it'll depend on the day," he said. "Let's see if I can annoy him a little bit. If I'm serving well and not missing any volleys, maybe I can do some damage."

KERBER IN CONTROL?

Defending champion Angelique Kerber plays American CoCo Vandeweghe in the match following Federer-Nishikori on Rod Laver. Kerber holds a 2-0 career edge, although the last time the two played - in Wuhan, China in 2015 - Vandeweghe retired from the match with a left ankle injury while trailing 6-1, 3-1. "CoCo is a tough opponent ... she's serving well," Kerber said. "I have to move good ... bring a lot of balls back, but also be aggressive."

Venus Williams, who is appearing in her 73rd Grand Slam main draw - a record for the Open era - plays Mona Barthel in an afternoon match. US Open champion Stan Wawrinka continues his quest for titles in consecutive Grand Slams - and his fourth major overall when he plays Andreas Seppi. French Open champion Garbine Muguruza plays Sorana Cirstea. — AP

AGASSI BACKS DJOKOVIC TO REBOUND QUICKLY

MELBOURNE: Andy Murray is yet to reach his maximum potential and should only get better but the world number one has not seen the back of Novak Djokovic, according to eight-times grand slam champion Andre Agassi.

Djokovic, a six-times champion at Melbourne Park, was bundled out of the second round by Uzbek wildcard Denis Istomin on Thursday, leaving top seed Murray a raging favourite to win a first Australian Open title after five trips to the final. Djokovic's exit, which comes on the heels of a dip in form in the second half of last season, raised fresh doubts about the 12-times grand slam champion's motivation after he surrendered the world number one ranking to Murray at the ATP Tour Finals. Agassi, however, felt the Serb's struggles would pass quickly and he would be back to contesting the pointy end of grand slams sooner rather than later.

"I've celebrated Novak's accomplishments to the point of predicting he's going to win everything and the truth is it's always a surprise when he loses," Agassi told reporters in a video conference call from Las Vegas.

"What I can speak to is Novak's game and his abilities and there's no reason in the world why he can't turn it around.

"In my opinion, (he is) one of the greats of all time so I give him a high chance of coming back in a hurry."

Murray expressed sympathy for Djokovic after his Melbourne exit but cannot have felt too mournful to see the back of the man who beat him in four finals at the tournament, including the last two.

Murray's rise to world number one after 10 years of hard graft has raised British hopes of a sustained run of success for the Scot and Agassi was not about to pour cold water on them.

However, the 46-year-old American felt Murray's outstanding defensive game might actually be holding him back from realising his full potential.

"He's very impressive. I've always talked about Andy as a person that has never really realised his maximum potential," said Agassi. "He's so good at certain things it almost makes him a bit indecisive. It almost makes him not bring his strengths to the table as much as he could.

"If he actually minimised his defensive skills by just five percent he might actually be a better player.

"My expectation is he is only going to get better. It looks like he's strong. It looks like he's fit. It looks like he knows how to invest in himself." — Reuters

RAONIC FIGHTS FEVER, DOWNS SIMON TO REACH LAST 16

MELBOURNE: Milos Raonic's machine-like advance through the Australian Open hit a brief glitch against Gilles Simon but the Canadian re-booted to delete the dogged Frenchman 6-2 7-6(5) 3-6 6-3 and reach the fourth round yesterday.

been suffering from a "bad fever", lost his first set of the tournament against the indefatigable Simon, whose hard running and sublime passing shots threatened to turn the game on its head.

The big-serving Canadian drowned out the Gallic cheers by capturing the decisive break in the sixth game of the fourth set and sealed the match with a big kicking serve to set up a clash with Spanish 13th seed Roberto Bautista Agut.

"I've had a rough last 48 hours, everything was aching, just sort of those kind of symptoms," said Raonic.

"I'm managing it. I'm sure I'll probably get something after today's match."

Raonic became the first Canadian man to reach the semi-finals here last year and backed it up with his first grand slam final at Wimbledon in his best season to date.

His chances of blazing a trail to a maiden final in Melbourne were handed a huge boost when Uzbek journeyman Denis Istomin knocked out six-times champion Novak Djokovic in the second round. That

upset has left Raonic as the highest seed left in the lower half of the draw.

Raonic has long been tagged a grand slam contender and he looked the part early on against Simon, mowing through the first set in 28 minutes and showing impressive composure to fend off the 25t a tense tiebreak in the second.

The 26-year-old stumbled in the third as he gave up two breaks of serve but refused to put it down to two days battling illness catching up with him.

"He started playing a bit more aggressive, I became a little bit too passive," Raonic said. "It was more just a dip in sort of dictating. It wasn't a physical dip of any kind." He pushed a shot wide to give up a break-point at 4-3 and Simon grabbed the chance with a delightful drop-volley played off his feet. Simon sealed the set with a thumping first serve that triggered raucous cheers from the French fans in Hisense Arena and sent Raonic back to his chair muttering.

The Canadian regrouped, however, and raced to 3-1 before stumbling again to lose serve a third time. But he grabbed back the break and grimly held to close out a galvanising win before returning to his sick bed. "The most important thing for me right now is just to get myself at full capacity or as close to it as possible," Raonic added. — Reuters

AGELESS NADAL OUTLASTS TEENAGER, SERENA CRUISES

MELBOURNE: Rafael Nadal's ageing legs outlasted German teenager Alexander Zverev in an epic five sets as Serena Williams sailed into the last 16 at the Australian Open yesterday. Nadal needed all his trademark grit against Zverev, 19, dubbed "the future of tennis", and his superior fitness told as he ground out a thrilling 4-6, 6-3, 6-7 (5/7), 6-3, 6-2 win. Germany's Zverev looked in discomfort as he won a punishing 37-shot rally nearly four hours into their contest as Nadal, still full of running, pressed his advantage in the final set.

It means Nadal, 30, follows fellow veteran Roger Federer into the last 16 of a contest now missing defending champion Novak Djokovic after his stunning defeat to Denis Istomin. "Everybody knows how good Alexander is," said Nadal, who will play France's Gael Monfils in the fourth round. "He's the future of our sport, and the present." Williams, by contrast, had no such trouble as she brushed off fellow American Nicole Gibbs 6-1, 6-3 to maintain her charge towards a 23rd Grand Slam title.

Williams, back after an injury break at the end of 2016, has been in brilliant form and she will take some stopping as she zeroes in on Steffi Graf's

Open-era record. The next player to take on Williams will be Barbora Strycova, who ousted France's Caroline Garcia to earn a shot at the world number two.

'FIGHT UNTIL MIDNIGHT'

"Obviously I'm here for one reason," said Williams, who again lifted her index finger in celebration at her victory, symbolising the number one. "But at the end of the day, this is all bonus for me and I look forward to playing (Strycova). I'm ready for her." Elsewhere 117th-ranked Istomin built on his win over Djokovic by beating Pablo Carreno Busta 6-4, 4-6, 6-4, 4-6, 6-2 to reach the last 16 for the first time. David Goffin halted towering Croatian Ivo Karlovic, who won a tournament-record 84-game match in the first round, to set up a clash against Austrian eighth seed Dominic Thiem. "I was ready to fight until midnight if I had to," grinned the Belgian. Roberto Bautista Agut ousted fellow Spaniard David Ferrer 7-5, 6-7 (6/8), 7-6 (7/3), 6-4 and will next play third seed Milos Raonic, who beat Gilles Simon 6-2, 7-6 (7/5), 3-6, 6-3.

In the women's draw, Britain's Johanna Konta maintained her sizzling form with a dominant 6-3, 6-1 victory over former world number one Caroline Wozniacki.

"Against someone like Caroline, she's not going to give it to you. You really do have to earn it and win it till the very last point. I'm just very happy I was able to keep that pressure on," said the ninth seed. Konta's prize is a round-of-16 rematch with Russia's Ekaterina Makarova, whom she edged at the same stage last year, going 8-6 in the final set. Makarova, seeded 30, beat sixth seed Dominika Cibulkova in a three set marathon.

Mirjana Lucic-Baroni, who hadn't won an Australian Open match since 1998 before this year, extended her fairytale run by beating Greece's Maria Sakkari 3-6, 6-2, 6-3.

Next up for the 34-year-old Croatian, who put her career on hold to flee her abusive father, is American qualifier Jennifer Brady, who upset 14th seed Elena Vesnina. — AFP

KONTA WIPES OUT WOZNIACKI TO SET UP RUSSIAN REMATCH

MELBOURNE: Rampant Johanna Konta blitzed former world number one Caroline Wozniacki yesterday to set up an intriguing fourth-round Australian Open rematch with Russia's Ekaterina Makarova.

The British ninth seed, who made the semi-finals last year to kickstart a breakthrough season, discarded the Danish former world number one 6-3, 6-1 on Margaret Court Arena. It sets up a showdown with Makarova, also a former Melbourne semi-finalist, who upset sixth seed Dominika Cibulkova in three hard-fought sets.

Whoever comes through that test-a repeat of last year's round of 16 clash, which Konta won-will have the mighty Serena Williams as a potential quarter-final opponent.

"I was very happy with I guess the way I was able to assert myself from the very beginning, also tighten up my game a bit as that first set went on, and just maintain my level to the very end," said Konta.

"Against someone like Caroline, she's not going to give it to you. You really do have to earn it and win it till the very last point. I'm just very happy I was able to keep that pressure on." Konta, who is on an eight-match win streak after her victory at this month's Sydney International, had never played Wozniacki before, making for an interesting battle.

The Briton, 25, kept the Dane on the move, pushing her around the baseline as she looked for an opening, which came in the seventh game when she worked Wozniacki wide and came to the net to smash a volley winner.

The confident, Australian-born Brit wasted no time in holding serve then breaking again to secure the set in 42 minutes, hitting an incredible 20 winners to Wozniacki's one. Konta likes to play high on the baseline,

taking the ball early and dictating the point, a tactic that left Wozniacki struggling. She broke the 20th-seeded Wozniacki to

go 2-0 in front with the Dane, who prides herself on being one of the fittest on tour, having no answers to a player on a hot run of form.

It was one-way traffic as Konta raced to the finish line, leaving a dazed Wozniacki, who has put injury struggles aside and enjoyed a resurgence over the past year, left to wonder what hit her. Next up is Makarova, whom she beat at the same stage in Melbourne last year on her way to the semis, going 8-6 in the third set.

Makarova, who in 2015 enjoyed a memorable run to the semi-finals, losing to Maria Sharapova, is seeded 30 this year and needed nearly three hours to get past Cibulkova. She remembers last year's Konta battle well. "After that match, she started playing really good and all year at the top level," she said, adding that physically she felt 100 percent and was ready to get her revenge. —AFP

But the hard work of the top order was undermined by the brief collapse close to stumps, which came 50 minutes early due to rain. Shakib's success capped an outstanding bowling performance by Bangladesh on a pitch which is hard and fast but offered little seam or spin. Latham negotiated a rocky first session in which New Zealand lost the wickets of Jeet Raval (16) and Kane Williamson (2) within two balls. Raval was dropped twice in slips before chopping a ball from Kamrul Islam onto his stumps and Williamson edged a superb outswinger from the same bowler to wicketkeeper Nurul Hasan.

Latham helped New Zealand reach lunch at 70-2, then combined with Taylor in a 106-run partnership for the third wicket which put the

home team in a strong position. Latham was struck on the helmet by a bounc-

er which left him dazed but unhurt. He composed himself to reach his half century from 87 balls; his sixth 50 in his last seven tests which is a better run of form than any other New Zealand batsman has achieved.

Taylor scored slowly at first but grew in confidence and reached his 27th half century in tests from 60 balls, rushing to the milestone with two fours and a six in four balls from Rubel Hossain. The pair was on top of the Bangladesh attack when Latham was caught behind for 68 off Taskin Ahmed and Taylor followed soon after, holing out at midwicket off Mehedi Hasan. Taylor became the third New Zealand player after Stephen Fleming and Brendon McCullum to surpass 6,000 runs in tests. Henry Nicholls was left to rebuild and did so in an innings which was riddled with chances but also full of character, reaching 56 not out by stumps.

"They bowled really well this morning and were pretty demanding on a good length on a wicket that did a little bit," Latham said. "They bowled good areas before lunch and it was good me and Ross managed to get through that period. "Ross is a fantastic player and he's been a great player for many years for New Zealand and that's another milestone that he's ticked off today. I'm sure he's got many more to come." Shakib ended the day with 3-32 from seven overs and Kamrul 2-48 from 13. — AP



LIVERPOOL: Gylfi Sigurdsson's decisive goal boosted Swansea's hopes of Premier League survival as they inflicted Liverpool's first home defeat for almost a year with a 3-2 triumph at

Anfield yesterday. Iceland international Sigurdsson, who has repeatedly been linked with a move away from the Welsh club, struck with 16 minutes left after Paul Clement's side had let a two-goal lead slip against title-chasing Liverpool.

Fernando Llorente had scored twice in the first seven minutes of the second half for Swansea, but Liverpool's Roberto Firmino responded with a double of his own.

Swansea showed great spirit to come back and earn both the Welsh club's first-ever league win at Anfield and their first under Premier League victory under new manager Clement.

In doing so, they lifted themselves off the foot of the Premier League table and out of the bottom three, at least for a few hours.

Liverpool, playing their eighth match in 25 days, paid for sloppy defending, and missed the chance to put pressure on leaders Chelsea, losing at home for the first time since Stoke won

the second leg of a League Cup semi-final at Anfield on January 26 last year.

Philippe Coutinho, now fully recovered from injury, made his first league start since November after playing for 65 minutes in Wednesday's FA Cup win at Plymouth, but showed only occasional sparks of creativity during a tepid first half.

It was Swansea, for all the pressure they had to absorb, who came closest to scoring before the interval. Midfielder Tom Carroll, signed from Tottenham during the week, ran in from the left on to Sigurdsson's pass infield and struck the outside of the near post from a tight angle, via a deflection off Dejan Lovren.

Both Carroll and fellow debutant Martin Olsson, brought in from Norwich, performed solidly, with the Swedish full-back making one positive attacking run that ended when he was bodychecked by Ragnar Klavan.

One excellent turn from Coutinho just after the half-hour mark allowed him to create a chance for Firmino, who would have scored but

for Alfie Mawson's block. Liverpool manager Jurgen Klopp's frustration grew as Swansea went ahead with little more



CARROLL BRACE FIRES HAMMERS PAST BORO

The England international sent a thumping header beyond Victor Valdes to give the Hammers, who were again playing without want-away France playmaker Dimitri Payet, a ninthminute lead. Christian Stuani finished off a superbly constructed team move to draw Boro level before the half hour, but Carroll struck again two minutes before the break with substitute Jonathan Calleri sealing the victory at the death.

Slaven Bilic's men have now won five of their last seven matches to climb into the top half of the table, but Boro remain in 16th place after a fifth straight game without a win. Payet's refusal to play for West Ham amidst his desire to return to Marseille has seen the Frenchman forced to train with the club's Under-23 squad and he was again left out the first-team squad for the trip to Boro.

But despite the absence of their influential midfielder, West Ham quickly found their stride with Michail Antonio slicing wide on the volley from Aaron Cresswell's cross.

The visitors went ahead soon after as Carroll rose to meet Manuel Lanzini's inswinging corner and plant a thumping header past a helpless Valdes to get on the scoresheet for the second game running. Aitor Karanka's Boro are the league's lowest-scoring team but they hit back on 27 minutes through Stuani as the Uruguayan side-footed home Calum Chambers' pass following a passage of slick play from the hosts.

West Ham regained the lead before the interval when Carroll pounced to slot in the rebound after Valdes had kept out a fierce long-range drive from Antonio, West Ham's leading scorer with eight goals this season.

Antonio then headed over at the start of the second half while Lanzini fluffed a one-on-one with Valdes having been slipped in by Carroll. Republic of Ireland goalkeeper Darren Randolph turned behind a firm header from Boro's Marten de Roon as Adama Traore was proving a handful down both flanks. And the Hammers were fortunate not to concede a fluke equaliser when Cresswell smashed an attempted clearance straight into Stuani, with the ball looping off the bar and away to safety. Karanka introduced new signing Patrick Bamford, who scored 19 goals in 44 appearances while on loan from Chelsea in 2014-15, with 10 minutes play but West Ham wrapped up the points with Calleri's deflected effort deep into stoppage time. —AFP

LONDON: Seamus Coleman's late strike gave Everton a 1-0 win over Crystal Palace yesterday to leave the losers without a win under Sam Allardyce in five Premier League matches and third from bottom of the table. The Irish international's goal four minutes from time was no more than the visitors deserved-recording wins in their first three league matches in a calendar year for the first time since 2008 — having peppered the Palace goal with 16 shots prior to that. Palace, with just one win in their last seven league matches and only one clean sheet in their last 22, dropped into the bottom three when Swansea pulled off a thrilling 3-2 win over Liverpool earlier yesterday. Things look even bleaker for Palace and Allardyce as their run-in will see them play the present top five in their last nine games. 



ROONEY BREAKS UNITED RECORD IN DRAW AT STOKE

STOKE-ON-TRENT: Wayne Rooney fired home a spectacular injury-time equaliser to break Bobby Charlton's Manchester United goalscoring record and force a 1-1 draw with Stoke City in yesterday's Premier League clash.

Rooney couldn't have chosen a better way to grab his 250th goal for the club from a free-kick with time running out after United had trailed since the early stages to an unfortunate own goal by Juan Mata.

While Rooney was delighted with his personal record, the point did little to advance United's title claims as they trail Chelsea by 11 points with the leaders

due to play struggling Hull on Sunday.

Rooney's strike was appropriately enough witnessed by 1966 World Cup-winning star Charlton sitting in the director's box.

"It means a hell of a lot," said Rooney. "It is a great honour and I am very proud. "It is difficult at the minute to be over-pleased because of the result but in the grand scheme it is huge honour.

"It is not something I expected when I joined. As I said before, I am proud and I hope there is more to come." United manager Jose Mourinho said the record allowed Rooney to be termed a legend.

"The record is the record. It is the record of the biggest club in England and one of the biggest in the world," said the Portuguese coach. "Before him the record belonged to a legend of English football. Now Wayne becomes a legend of Manchester United." United

SPURS FIGHTBACK THWARTS GUARDIOLA'S MAN CITY

down to earn a contentious 2-2 draw yesterday.

Blunders by Spurs goalkeeper Hugo Lloris allowed Leroy Sane and Kevin De Bruyne to give City a deserved 2-0 lead, only for Dele Alli and substitute Son Heung-Min to grab a point for the visitors. The game's main talking point occurred shortly before Son's 77th-minute leveller when Kyle Walker got away with a push on City forward Raheem Sterling inside the Spurs box as he took aim at Lloris.

Guardiola reacted furiously and having seen his team humiliated 4-0 at Everton on their previous outing he will know this was a huge missed opportunity for his misfiring team. City, for whom £27 million (\$33 million, 31 million euros) new signing Gabriel Jesus made his debut, remain fifth and will fall 12 points off the pace if leaders Chelsea beat Hull City on Sunday.

While Spurs remain second, the point earned at the Etihad Stadium came at a cost for Mauricio Pochettino's side, who had been chasing a seventh successive league win.

Toby Alderweireld was forced off by injury in the second half, meaning he will potentially join fellow Belgian centre-back Jan Vertonghen on the sidelines. City's defeat at Everton was the heaviest league reverse of Guardiola's stellar coaching career, but his response was to go on the attack.

Centre-back John Stones was dropped again, while De Bruyne and David Silva joined Yaya Toure in an attacking midfield trio that enabled City to pierce holes in Spurs' rearguard right from kick-off.

After sights of goal for Pablo Zabaleta and Sergio Aguero, Lloris turned a low Silva shot behind and then stood motionless as Zabaleta's drive from De Bruyne's corner skidded inches wide.

With Spurs incapable of playing through City's high press, Kevin Wimmer and Eric Dier were both booked inside the first 13 minutes.

By the time De Bruyne rolled a cross-shot across goal and wide after Aguero had robbed Dier, Pochettino had seen enough, moving Dier into midfield and swapping his 3-4-2-1 for a more stable 4-3-2-1. Still City came, with Sane heading wide and Lloris twice thwarting Aguero, springing to his right to catch a header and then getting down at his near post to parry a left-foot drive.

Pochettino made another change at the interval, sending on Son for Wimmer, but within nine minutes of kick-off his side were 2-0 down as Lloris unwittingly took centre stage.

Flying out to meet De Bruyne's 50-yard pass on the edge of his box, Lloris contrived to head the ball

GHANA BEAT MALI TO REACH LAST EIGHT

PORT GENTIL: Ghana became the second team at the African Nations Cup to book a quarter-final place after veteran striker Asamoah Gyan scored the only goal of the game against Mali in Group D yesterday.

A second successive 1-0 win for Ghana ensured they progressed past the group stage for the sixth successive tournament, although they needed two late saves from goalkeeper Razak Brimah to make sure of the victory.

Gyan delivered a power header in the 20th minute to set up the win after Ghana had beaten Uganda by the same score line in their opening match.

They joined Senegal as teams through to next weekend's knockout phase in Gabon. There was a shocking miss from Andre Ayew after 17 minutes as the Mali defence was breached by a skilful burst from Christian Atsu.

BUSINESSES WARY OF PLAN TO SLAP 45% TARIFF ON CHINESE IMPORTS

BEIJING: People in Beijing expressed doubts yesterday about President Donald Trump's ability to steer the US economy and manage China-American relations, underscoring concerns over trade, Taiwan and other issues. While Trump didn't mention China in his inaugural address Friday, he referred often to the country during the campaign and upended diplomatic protocol after the election by speaking on the phone with the president of self-governing Taiwan, the island China considers its own

Aaron Wang, who works for a logistics company, said he hoped for the best but was wary of Trump's threat to disrupt commerce between the countries, including imposing a 45 percent tariff on Chinese imports.

"I will wait and see what Trump actually does in the future, but I do hope that the China-US relations can develop in a good direction under Trump's presidency," said Wang. A retired teacher, who would only give her surname, Wei, said Trump hadn't yet shown that he could handle the US presidency.

"It's really uncertain whether he can properly run the US," Wei said. "A business person can run a country very well, but he can also do a very bad job." On a visit to Beijing, Dunkin' Brands CEO Nigel Davis said he wanted to reinforce the importance of global free trade to Trump, who opposes the 12-nation Trans-Pacific Partnership and has suggested he might renegotiate the 1994 North American Free Trade Agreement.

"I will give him concrete examples and talk to him about how you can overcome obstacles," Davis told The Associated Press. China is the world's second-largest economy behind the US, and Trump railed during his campaign against alleged Chinese cheating at trade and manipulation of its currency. Those assertions came despite evidence that for the past couple of years, China has been intervening in markets to prop up its currency, not push it lower in a manner that would benefit exporters to the detriment of US businesses.

China's economy slowed over the past year and exports fell back into contraction last month, signaling renewed weakness as it faces possible trade tensions under Trump. However, China still sells considerably more to the United States than it buys, resulting in a trade deficit in goods amounted to \$289 billion through the first 10 months of 2016. In a commentary on Trump's inaugural address, the official Global Times newspaper

said he had made a number of "lofty promises" but offered few details on how he intended to carry them out.

"It remains to be seen if he can keep his ambitious promise throughout his term - correcting the domestic and foreign policies and the world order he believes to have strayed off track," the paper said. The commentary

also stated that Trump has yet to formulate a China policy despite his constant references to the country during the presidential election campaign.

"His China policy will hinge on how well he understands the overlapping interests of the world's two largest economies, how their national interests intertwine, and whether he is motivated to change the existing structure with force," the paper said. Along with stating that relations with Beijing were open for re-negotiation, Trump has criticized China's creation of man-made islands in the South China Sea furnished with airstrips and military infrastructure. —AP

TRUMP TO GET FIRST SIGN OF US ECONOMIC HEALTH

GLOBAL ECONOMY WEEK AHEAD

BRUSSELS: Donald Trump's policy plans in his first days in office are likely to dominate headlines in the coming week, but the new president himself will also get a first read-out on the health of the US economy. And for all his call to make American great again, data should confirm that the economy is clipping along at a healthy rate even before Trump's promised tax cuts and infrastructure spending.

While Trump has talked of a feverish first full day - with orders and notifications to withdraw from the TPP trans-Pacific trade pact, cancelation of restrictions of energy production and curbs on illegal immigrants - the economic diary is light.

Further details of a stimulus package, which could be watered down by Congress, could be the dominant economic event. Other than that, a week before the monetary policy meetings of the Federal Reserve, the Bank of England and the Bank of Japan and a week after a European Central Bank sitting, the stand-out figures are likely to be first estimates for US growth on Friday and for British growth a day earlier. The US economy is seen expanding by an annualized rate of 2.2 percent in the final quarter of 2016, easing from the 3.5 percent of third quarter as net trade turns negative, but with solid consumption growth and a reduced drag from the energy price collapse that hit investment.

"We're seeing a lot of momentum

in some areas of the economy," said Laura Rosner, economist at BNP Paribas. "It's a bit of a step down, but is still very healthy and really should support expectations for further growth and expansion." "It's an important number but at the same time markets are focused on the outlook, particularly given all the potential policy changes," she added.

Rosner, like other economists, sees US growth accelerating this year and next, buoyed by the fiscal stimulus. Harm Bandholz, chief US economist at UniCredit, sees the effect of that being at the end of 2017, but says there is then a risk increased consumption hikes imports, leading to a call for growth-draining trade protection. According to a Reuters poll in the past week, the top risk to US growth is that Trump keeps his protectionist promises.

Brexit hit for UK economy in 2017? In Britain, it is the week after Prime Minister Theresa May's big speech on Britain's plans to leave the European Union . The chief Brexit news is likely to be Tuesday's supreme court ruling on parliamentary involvement in triggering the EU's Article 50 exit clause.

Britain too will report a first estimate for economic growth in the fourth quarter. Like the United States, GDP is seen easing, to 0.5 percent quarter-on-quarter from 0.6 percent in the July-Sept period.

James Knightley, ING senior econo-

mist, said the report is likely to confirm that the UK economy grew faster than that of the United States, the euro zone and Japan in 2016. However, the outlook for 2017 is less rosy. "Inflation is going to rise, driven by import costs for energy and food, particularly as hedged positions end. This should weaken consumer spending, while the triggering of Article 50 could lead to business being more

cautious," Knightley said. For the eurozone, purchasing manager indexes should confirm continued steady growth across industry and services in January. In Europe's largest economy, business sentiment is forecast to push slightly beyond December's near three-year high in Ifo's report on Wednesday, with both the assessment of current conditions and expectations ticking higher.

The mood among German analysts and investors improved slightly in January, figures showed on Tuesday, with rising expectations "a leap of faith for 2017" after a stronger-than-expected economic performance by Germany last year. Elsewhere, Turkey is one of few countries where central bank policymakers will meet faced, like many emerging markets, with a challenge from the strong dollar. Its central bank will undergo a credibility test, with investors hoping for a significant interest rate hike after attempts to defend the Turkish lira with liquidity measures proved ineffective. —Reuters

DEMOGRAPHIC IMBALANCE AND POLICY FLAWS

AL-SHALL WEEKLY ECONOMIC REPORT

ccording to the latest available data about population and workforce, figures of the Public Authority for Civil Information (PACI), indicate that the total population of Kuwait scored 4.330 million with 30.5 percent Kuwaitis on jun, 30 2016. Work force figures for the same period indicate that its number scored 2.645 million workers, 16.7 percent of which are Kuwaiti. Certainly this structure is imbalanced and with a big gap that should be remedied. The imbalance in the quality of the population and the labor force is more dangerous because the level of education and expertise is quite low to the majority. The purpose behind reviewing the demographic structure, as if it was discovered yesterday, is the current talk about the desire to discuss its conditions.

What we want to emphasize is that its structure is not the mistake of the expatriates but the sin of the miserable public policies. The root of the problem lies in the public policies. The demographic increase and in the foreign labor are only a variable subordinate to the financial expansion resulting from the prosperous oil market.

The badness of that expansion does not affect the demographic growth only but it is designed to attract the marginal part of it as well. Figures indicate that most of the demographic expansion occurred in the 1970s when the population growth in the period 1973-1982 scored about 5.9 percent of the total population, about 7.3 percent of non-Kuwaitis and for the period 2003-2016 it scored 4.1 percent, and 4.8 percent of non-Kuwaitis.

These two periods were periods of intensive financial expansion. But it scored during the period 1997-2001, the postrecession period following the "Asian Tigers" crisis in autumn 1997; it scored only 1.4 percent of the total population and 0.3 percent of non-Kuwaitis. In fact, the expansion period witnesses prosperous trade in humans. Individuals and companies importing labor against expensive commission increase only to release them into the streets to look for work. This represents a human and political crime. Anyway and without any effort, the near future will witness a continuous decline in the demographic growth rate with continued oil market recession.

The remedy of the four structural imbalances in Kuwait lies in adopting a correct development approach or project which, if found, does not only remedy the quantitative acceleration in demographic growth but by replacing it with the qualitative accumulation.

This kind of project should be driven neither by emotion nor by inhumane inclinations that target the innocent victim instead of the guilty. We have to keep in mind that Kuwaitis until a near past were immigrants searching for earning their living. We say this in advance of deviation in treating the imbalance by exerting pressure on its weakest rings rather than addressing the real problem and by escaping the adoption of the difficult path, such as reviewing the expansion of the horizontal housing ie a genuine development project to guarantee the sustainability of the country's stability: economically, politically and socially.

Boursa Kuwait liquidity

14 working days passed since the beginning of the current year and until the end of last week. Boursa Kuwait achieved liquidity in the amount of KD 595.7 million, a daily liquidity average of KD 42.5 million, or 3.7 times the daily trading average for 2016 which scored KD 11.6 million and 2.7 times of 2015 average which was at KD 15.9 million. We frequently reiterated that the more important variable of the Boursa which affects it up or down is the liquidity variable. The big rise in the liquidity since the beginning of the year is quite positive if it is a genuine sustainable one

tainable one. In one of our previous reports, (35/2016), we stated that 80% of listed companies are sold by a discount on their book value and 45.4% of these listed companies sold at a discount between 50% and 90%. The week before last, we called for government intervention to reduce the supply of listed stocks and profit from that through contemplated investment and not the Boursa support. The recent rise in the Boursa liquidity would be positive and sustainable if the current liquidity directed to the Boursa was private sector's funds aiming at benefitting from continues weakness, which dropped most prices to an unjustifiable level, creating lucrative investment opportunities. In this case, the private sector's intervention substitutes the government's intervention and may support it if the continued drop duration in the Boursa liquidity coincides with a hot real estate market, especially in its investment activity. After the recent correction in prices, the rise in interest rates and their pressure on prices and liquidity, those funds headed toward the only available cheap asset, namely, the stocks at the Boursa. It is also supported by the rise in oil prices after producers' agreement in the end of last year and the rise in the liquidity and prices of the regional stock exchanges especially the Saudi market which recovered in the last two months of 2016 substantial losses and began to achieve gains by the end of the year.

On the contrary, that liquidity may be temporary if it resulted from injecting public funds to purchase high value operational stocks and aiming at reinforcing the demand side to support prices. It is usually associated with the entry of private risk funds that bet on cheap stocks which any rise in their prices would achieve high instant profits.

Continued rise in liquidity for several weeks drives the naive to try to catch up those who preceded them to achieve quick profits after which the musical chairs game begins. Such liquidity lasts for a limited period during which holders of expensive stocks benefit from liquidating their stocks and settling their financial conditions. In other words, the general liquidity transforms to private funds and exits the Boursa. Gamblers on cheap stocks begin withdrawing leaving behind new victims, liquidity is harmed and the trust level drops again

drops again.

The chances whether this liquidity is sustainable or opportunist and temporary are equal or perhaps joint. If we take a sample of 10 percent of listed companies, which takes a highest liquidity, or 18 companies, we note they captured 52.1 percent of all market liquidity. The market value of 10 companies of these 18 companies is at least KD 100 million each and for the other 8 companies is between KD 17.7 million and KD 99.9 million, ie a mixture of big and small companies or a mixture of investments with unknown source and adventure obsession.

The gap is still wide between liquid and an illiquid company continues. 92 listed companies, or 50 percent of listed companies, captured 97.5 percent of the Boursa liquidity while 92 companies continued to be a burden on the Boursa and illiquid, captured only 2.5 percent of this liquidity. However, we should admit that what we mentioned is just an indicator and there is no judgment on Boursa liquidity trends. Time is still too short to conclude judgments but it is worth following up.

GCC states' growth projections: World Bank report

In its January 2017 report, the World Bank raised its projections for real GDP growth for the six GCC countries, increasing five of them and one country -Bahrain-decreased. The highest growth rates expected were for Qatar whose economy is expected to grow by about 1.8 percent in 2016 (June 2016 report) but its January 2017 report issued after the rise in oil prices in late 2016, doubled its growth esti-

mates in 2017 to 3.6 percent but it reduced it to 2.1 percent in 2018. The second highest growth rate expected was for Oman which the Bank increased its growth projections from 2.5 percent in 2016 to about 2.9 percent in 2017, then to 3.4 percent in 2018. The United Arab Emirates came third with increased forecast for growth from 2.3 percent in 2016 to 2.5 percent in 2017 and to 3 percent in 2018. Kuwait came forth with increase in growth estimates from 2 percent in 2016 to 2.4 percent in 2017 and then to 2.6 percent in 2018. The fifth position went to Saudi Arabia the largest economy in the region, the World Bank raised its estimate from 1 percent in 2016 to 1.6 percent in 2017, and then to 2.5 percent in 2018. Bahrain alone has reduced growth estimates from 2 percent in 2016 to 1.8 percent in 2017 but it remains higher than what is anticipated for Saudi Arabia. But this means that the increase in oil prices did not support its growth.

The World Bank adjusted estimates upwards between its June 2016 report and January 2017 report is based on how true will its assumptions that a barrel of oil price in 2017 settles at US\$ 55. But this is also dependent on other assumptions, such as how far will the agreement to withdraw 1.8 million barrels a day from oil production: 1.2 million barrels a day from OPEC countries and 0.6 million barrels a day from outside producers, primarily Russia, will last. Secondly and to a less degree in the short term, it is based on the technical developments that might reduce the cost of nonconventional oil production.

Despite the high projections of growth rates for most of the GCC countries, they remain weak compared to their historical levels and remain below the level of being able to create enough jobs opportunities, while unemployment is the real forthcoming challenge for all of them. Even the

weak growth rates are not guaranteed. 2017 will be rich with potential political changes worldwide that would have significant adverse effects on the performance of the global and individual economy similar to the changes in 2016 when Britain exited from the EU, "Donald Trump" wining the US presidency elections.

The region also has its own surprises The geopolitical violence events have positive effects if they cool down and negative impacts if they intensify on potential growth rates either from a psychological perspective or from decrease or increase of saved or wasted resources of its funding. In summary, increased revenues because of the oil agreement and the support of the increase to growth rates in most GCC States are not guaranteed or sustainable. Assuming that the agreement would be respected and those other risks are not to be realized only given a short pace of time that enhances the chances of success of the reforms but does not postpone it.

Global Economy growth prospects

Two reports were released in January 2017 each with its vision of the potential global economy growth. One was issued by the World Bank which expects growth of 2.7 percent in 2017, and the second was released by the IMF which expects growth by 3.4 percent, with 0.7 percent difference which is big. The difference involves all components of the global economy, advanced, emerging and developing countries. An example of the difference is the World Bank's estimate for the economic growth for KSA's economy, the largest regional economy. The World Bank estimated its growth in 2017 by 1.6 percent which is 4 times IMF estimate at 0.4 percent. The significant difference in the estimates is because macro variables, mainly political, became very influential on the performance of global economy, while estimating their correct weight and track is extremely difficult which causes the discrepancy between the two estimates. In 2016, with weak growth, dominant expectations were for Britain remaining within the European Union. They also did not expect the winning of "Donald Trump".

Facts came contrary to expectations with negative effects. And 2017 is full of such issues at global and regional levels. President "Trump" ushered his reign by introducing a new term to economic policies named "Trump" Impact. The fear of a return to protectionism and starting a new cold war with a change in its poles has become a fact. And next March is the beginning of Britain's exit talks from EU. The differences in its impacts are quite big, whether it would be safe exit or stormy exit with intervention from the new US Administration.

The two poles of the European Monetary Union, namely Germany and France, will have general elections. The fear of repeating the American experience, i.e. the winning of the radical Right, is a probability, with very serious consequences on the performance of the world economy if happened. The foregoing variables will have impacts on geopolitical violence events in our region with their unbearable levels regardless of the position of any party. The results of Iran's presidential election this year will also have an impact on them.

The purpose of the above is that the growth of the world economy will have a positive effect if it rises and a negative impact if it drops on the demand side for oil, which has become obviously difficult to agree on its levels or to guarantee any level. The reports of the World Bank and the International Monetary Fund are examples of the weak ability to predict. The geopolitical events of the region are an influential factor on the supply side of the traditional oil market.

It is very difficult to predict the course of those events, and their potential impact, positive or negative, on cohesion of oil prices at a time of huge financial deficits. Therefore, we believe that logic invites us to be extremely cautious. Economic and financial reform rely on hypotheses that are accomplishable in a normal time while the conditions of the world and the region demand adopting the worst case scenario for reform programs because stability and not growth is at stake.

The Weekly performance of Boursa Kuwait

The performance of Boursa Kuwait for the last week, was more active compared to the previous one, where all indexes showed an increase, the traded value index, the traded volume index, number of transactions index, and general index, AlShall Index (value weighted) closed at 391.8 points at the closing of last Thursday, showing an increase of about 17.2 points or about 4.6 percent compared with its level last week and it increased by 28.8 points or about 7.9 percent compared with the end of 2016.

CITY CHIEF PLAYS DOWN BREXIT RISK AS BANKS MOVE JOBS

LONDON: The City of London's policy chief played down Brexit risks for the world's top financial hub in an interview with AFP on Friday, even after a string of banks said they may have to shift jobs from London. "Brexit won't be... so damaging as to risk London's status," Mark Boleat said, while acknowledging there would be "a loss of tax revenue and... a loss of jobs" as Britain prepares to leave the European Union.

"I am sure London will be the leading global financial centre whether Britain is in the European Union or not. There are many assets that London has that no other centre has," he said.

Boleat, policy chairman of the City of London Corporation-the Square Mile's local authority-made his remarks after Prime Minister Theresa May unveiled her

historic Brexit blueprint on Tuesday.

"Corporates come from all parts of the EU, whether it is to hedge their currency risks, to insure, to raise money on the bond market or the equities market.

"They also use other centres in the EUthat's the benefit of having a single market. London is by far the largest. That is something that not only British negotiators will be conscious of; so will the European negotiators".

'No wish for damage'

Fragmenting the City-which serves all of the EU-would strengthen rival finance hubs outside Europe.

"There will be no wish in the EU to do things that would damage the rest of the EU. "Fragmenting the financial centre that currently is based in London is not going to benefit anybody in Europe; it may benefit people like New York, Singapore, and Hong Kong." Ever since Britain's June 23 referendum to quit the EU, speculation has been rife that other hubs-particularly in the eurozone-would battle to win precious market share.

The finance sector argued in the runup to the shock vote that Brexit would spark major City job losses. Boleat himself was a powerful supporter of the "Remain" campaign, as was the City of London Corporation. It emerged at Davos this week that top-flight banks-including Goldman Sachs, HSBC, JP Morgan and UBS-could shift thousands of London jobs to elsewhere in Europe.

Boleat however shrugged off the news. "They are not moving all of their people; they are not closing down in London, but they are preparing to move part of their business to other centres in the EU where they will need to have authorization somewhere that is other than the United Kingdom," he told AFP. Research consultancy Oliver Wyman suggested Brexit could lead to as few as 2,000 London job losses to elsewherebut as many as 35,000 in a worst case scenario.

"It's very difficult to say how many jobs are going to move away from London as a result of Brexit," Boleat said.

"A lot depends on the deal that is done between Britain and the European Union-and then on what the British government does in respect of its policies generally to keep business in London."

The City employs some 164,000 people, according to 2015 data, while two million work in Britain's financial services sector. The loss of single market access and passporting rights-which allows for trading across the entire EU-remains key.

May vowed Tuesday that Britain would quit the common market in order to control EU immigration-but would seek new trade deals with the EU and beyond.

Business 'prepared for everything'

"There's a chance of a good Brexit deal. There's a chance it might not be good, and business is prepared for everything," Boleat said Friday. "What we really want ... is continued access to the European markets from Britain, and continued access to the British market from the EU." Boleat sounded a diplomatic tone about other hubs-such as Dublin, Frankfurt and Paris-drumming up business. "It's perfectly reasonable that other European cities are trying to attract business from London. It's what we would be doing in the same circumstance." —AFP

AS POPULISM SOARS, DAVOS ELITE TOLD: PAY YOUR TAXES

WORLD'S MULTINATIONALS PUT ON NOTICE

DAVOS: The world's biggest multinationals have been put on notice to start paying their fair share of tax-or risk accelerating the rise in populism that has carried Donald Trump to the White

From Panama Papers to LuxLeaks, recent years' headlines have been filled with revelations on the secret ways the rich and multinationals, with the help of accountancy firms, shift profits across the globe to drastically cut tax. Perfectly legal, these methods helped divert billions in profit from the tax man, using well established wealth hubs such as Luxembourg, the British Virgin Islands and Switzerland, the host country of this week's World Economic Forum in the posh ski resort of Davos.

"No, we don't promote fiscal evasion," a testy Bob Moritz, chairman of PricewaterhouseCoopers, said when hounded by one journalist in the corridors of the forum.

Accountancy giant PwC has been in the centre of the LuxLeaks tax storm, after a pair of employees turned whistleblowers leaked thousands of documents that exposed Luxembourg's huge tax breaks for major companies, including Apple, IKEA and Pepsi.

"This is a political issue of the greatest consequence," said Angel Gurria, head of the Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development, the Paris-based club of rich nations that has led a global push for fair taxation. "Here

at Davos, businesses are listening and if we had their backing things would be a whole lot easier," he said.

Gurria's message to his audience was clear: "You must pay tax where you turn a profit."

Amid voter rebellions across the West, politicians and leaders warned corporate captains that the times were fast changing. "The landscape is changing in a radical way," said EU Economy Commissioner Pierre Moscovici, who is leading a push in Brussels to draw up a blacklist of tax havens.

The EU has made cracking down on low taxes a high-profile priority since LuxLeaks unveiled two decades of tax deals made when Jean-Claude Juncker, now head of the European Commission, was prime minister of Luxembourg. "We must tackle this much more decisively and much more quickly," said Mateusz Morawiecki, deputy prime minister of Poland.

"Middle-income countries... emerging markets, they are losing huge money," he said.

'Race to the bottom'

Oxfam opened the Davos forum on Monday with its annual assessment of inequality that pointed directly at the tax problem. The charity called for an increase in tax rates targeting "rich individuals and cooperation", as well as a global agreement to end competition between coun-

tries to lower corporate tax rates. Britain's vote to leave the European Union and Trump's presidential campaign were symptomatic of inequality in rich countries and a sense that the game is rigged for the better off, it said.

Tax games by companies, even if legal, "deny the government the investments for infrastructure, (and companies) the education of their workforce that they need for their businesses", said Winnie Byanyima, the executive director of Oxfam.

Companies were only "working against themselves", she said. Also present in Davos, French Finance Minister Michel Sapin warned against any race to the lowest tax rate, in an oblique warning to the US of Trump and post-Brexit Britain. Trump has promised to slash the US corporate tax rate from 35 percent to 15 percent, while Britain has sent veiled threats that it could undercut the EU on tax rates if Brussels does not offer London a good divorce deal.

But Davos-goers were dubious of government efforts to trigger any movement towards a higher tax take. "The European Union seems to want to enact a tax cartel which will be the race to the top (tax rate)," said Daniel Aegerter, a Swiss investor and entrepreneur.

"It feels any competition between states will mean a race to the bottom. Obviously the truth lies somewhere in between," he said. — AFP.

VENEZUELA 2016 INFLATION HITS 800%, GDP SHRINKS 19%

CARACAS: Venezuelan consumer prices rose 800 percent in 2016 while the economy contracted by 18.6 percent, according to preliminary central bank figures seen by Reuters, the sharpest contraction in 13 years and the worst inflation reading on record.

The extended slump in oil prices has turned the OPEC nation's once-prosperous oil-boom economy into a mirror of the latter day Soviet Union, with rampant product shortages leading leaving to skip meals and wait hours in food lines. President Nicolas Maduro's government blames the situation on an "economic war" led by political adversaries with the help of the United States. As problems mounted, the central bank has stopped releasing quarterly and monthly economic indicators.

The oil sector, which provides nearly all of Venezuela's hard currency, in 2016 shrank 12.7 percent, according to an excerpt of a document containing the figures that was shown to Reuters. The non-oil sector shrank by 19.5 percent, according to the document.

The figures could be changed in the process of approval by the central bank's board of directors, according to a source with firsthand knowledge of the situation. In 2015, the economy contracted 5.7 percent while inflation reached 180.9 percent, the central bank said last year. Maduro accuses opposition-linked businesses of artificially creating economic problems. He says inflation is the result of speculative price-gouging by unscrupulous capitalists, and insists workers are better off as a result

of minimum wage increases in 2016 that totaled 454 percent.

"In a year we have raised minimum wage five times, and I say today that (those increases) are well above 2016 inflation," he said during a news conference this week, without offering an inflation figure.

The country's currency controls have left businesses unable to obtain dollars, meaning merchants struggle to stock shelves and factories sit idle for lack of raw materials or machine parts. Venezuelans last year began crossing into neighboring Brazil and Colombia to buy groceries.

PUERTO RICO GOVERNOR REJECTS FEDERAL CONTROL BOARD ORDERS

SAN JUAN: Puerto Rico's new governor on Friday rejected orders from a federal control board in the first clash over how best to tackle the government's deep financial crisis after a

decade-long economic slump in the US territory. Gov. Ricardo Rossello called the board's demands unacceptable and said they differ greatly from his vision to promote economic

growth.

"Any fiscal plan premised exclusively on a reduction in the health, well-being, and living standards of the people of Puerto Rico through health care delivery cutbacks, current retiree pension reductions ... and layoffs is by its nature unacceptable," he said in a letter to the board,

adding that he is willing to work with the board to reach "acceptable balance."

Rossello's reply comes as his administration faces pressure to submit a revised fiscal plan this month and next month's expiration of a stay on lawsuits filed by creditors. The governor has asked for an extension on both deadlines, and the board said earlier this week that it was inclined to grant them.

The board also ordered Rossello's administration to present a plan that would generate \$4.5 billion a year in revenue or savings through 2019. Board members said Puerto Rico should reform its tax system and reduce health care and higher education spending as well as mini-

mize the size of government in part by reducing


payroll costs by 30 percent, among other things. "Puerto Rico faces a daunting fiscal challenge," the board said. "Unless significant fiscal and structural measures are implemented, the government will have an annual average fiscal gap of \$7.0 billion from fiscal year 2019 to fiscal year 2026."

This is in addition to a nearly \$70 billion public debt load that Puerto Rico is seeking to restructure. The board has said the government should set aside \$800 million in annual debt service, which would represent a nearly 80 percent shortfall on payments due, but Rossello has said the administration will pay based upon resources available at the time. He has said he is willing to keep negotiating with creditors, many of whom have filed lawsuits following multimillion-dollar defaults by the previous administration. Rossello and others have criticized board members for their demands, saying they are putting too much pressure on a wobbly economy that has prompted more than 200,000 Puerto Ricans to move to the US mainland in recent years. Economist Vicente Feliciano said that if the board's demands were implemented, the local economy could contract up to 16 percent in a worst-case scenario.

"That's the sort of contraction you get in a civil war or an Ebola epidemic," he said in a phone interview. "The proposals are extreme." He said that while major adjustments are needed, the board and Rossello's administration need to reach a consensus: "Any debt renegotiating right now is a waste of time." A statement from the board said it was studying Rossello's letter and would respond later.

Rossello has already taken several steps to help offset the government's financial crisis, including signing executive orders to reduce spending per agency by 10 percent as well as ordering a 10 percent cut in contracts for professional services. The board has previously stated that those measures are not enough.

"We must be candid and stress that, to get closer to fiscal balance, a lot more will need to be done beyond the measures already adopted by your administration," said the board, which was created last year after President Barack Obama signed a rescue package for Puerto Rico. —AP

IN TIME OF TROUBLES, DAVOS ORGANIZERS SEND IN THE CLOWN

DAVOS: With an ear-piercing whistle, a professional clown in the crowd startles to order a conference room full of some of the world's elite thinkers, writers and religious minds. That's why Sabine Choucair was invited to Davos, quips a quick-witted panel moderator.

The Lebanese-born, curly-haired artist in baggy green trousers and with a frequent raspy laugh made her debut this week at the World Economic Forum in Davos, Switzerland, a special invitee more accustomed to entertaining refugees than livening up serious thought-fests.

"They got in touch with me, and I was like 'Whoa, who are these people?" said Choucair, on hand from Beirut, with a chuckle. "I was like, 'Yeah, let me check if I'm available or not.' Then I looked, and I was like 'Oh my God, I have to come!"

Choucair, a clown and storyteller, has often worked with refugee children in places like the Greek island of Lesbos. This time, wearing no particular getup or red nose, she was working a different crowd-joking with world-class cellist Yo-Yo Ma in

front of a bunch of well-heeled onlookers in an entrance hall of the Davos Congress Center. In one event this week, Choucair enlivened a Davos dinner on the theme of "The Power of Play."

"I gave them one very, very silly game of, like, smiling ridiculously at each other, and talking about their first kiss, or a coworker they don't like, or how do they like to eat their eggs? Just silly stuff," she said on Friday, the closing day of the WEF in Dayos this year.

"People just played because they loved to play," she said, assenting that Davos attendees might have been expected to be a bit uptight. "You know how we all have prejudices about things, but no. I think everybody wants to play." "It was also an opportunity for me to really tell them about what I'm seeing, because at the end of the day, I'm the one on the ground working with the people," she said of the refugees she's seen. Writer Grenville Byford, who attended the dinner featuring Choucair, said: "She's quite something."—AP

SPAIN ARRESTS RUSSIAN BANK ACCOUNT HACKER WANTED BY FBI

MADRID: Spain has arrested a 32-year-old Russian computer programmer at Barcelona airport who is alleged to have designed and used software to steal bank account details from banks and individuals, Spanish police said on Friday. Working with the US Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI), the man, named Lisov, was arrested by Spanish police on Jan 13 as he waited

to take a flight to another European country. He is suspected of leading a financial fraud network, the police said in a statement.

Lisov, wanted by the United States under an international arrest warrant, had been under observation by authorities for several days in the north-eastern region of Catalonia, police said. Police did not give the man's first name. Lisov

had been under investigation by the United States for two years for developing and using "NeverQuest," a computer virus that spreads itself via social media, email and file transfers and has led to the loss of millions of dollars.

An investigation of servers operated by Lisov in France and Germany revealed databases with lists of data stolen from banks, including account balances. One of the servers had files with millions of bank account access details such as user names, passwords and security questions, police said. The Russian is being held in Catalonia before Spain's High Court decides whether to extradite him to the United States. The United States has requested his extradition, a police spokesman said. — Reuters

APPLE ANTITRUST SUIT: QUALCOMM OVERCHARGED 'BILLIONS'

SAN FRANCISCO: Apple on Friday sued Qualcomm, power to demand unfair royalties, echoing charges filed days earlier by US antitrust regulators. Tech giant Apple said in the court filing that it has been overcharged "billions of dollars" by its chip making partner's "illegal scheme." The company also claimed Qualcomm owes it a billion dollars but is refusing to pay in retaliation for the iPhone maker's cooperating with South Korean antitrust regulators looking into the chipmaker's actions in that country.

"For many years Qualcomm has unfairly insisted on charging royalties for technologies they have nothing to do with," Apple said in an email statement. "To protect this business scheme Qualcomm has taken increasingly radical steps, most recently withholding nearly \$1 billion in payments from Apple as retaliation for responding truthfully to law enforcement agencies investigating them."

Qualcomm rejected Apple's claims at baseless, contending the iPhone maker "intentionally mischaracterized" agreements as well as the value of the company's technology. "Apple has been actively encouraging regulatory attacks on Qualcomm's business in various jurisdictions around the world... by misrepresenting facts and withholding information," Qualcomm general counsel Don Rosenberg said in a statement. "We welcome the opportunity to have these meritless claims heard in court."

model on using its rights to older, legacy technology flawed," arguing that reasoning at the heart of the civil considered telecommunication industry standards to raise royalties when Apple innovates with features such as TouchID fingerprint recognition or digital wallets in mobile devices. "Despite being just one of over a dozen companies who contributed to basic cellular standards, Qualcomm insists on charging Apple at least five times more in payments than all the other cellular patent licensors we have agreements with combined," Apple said.

Antitrust woes

Apple noted in the suit that Oualcomm's business practices have come under scrutiny by antitrust regulators in an array of countries for selling its smartphone chipsets only to makers agreeing to its "preferred license terms" for essential mobile telecom patents. Apple asked for a jury trial, and for damages including Qualcomm paying the company what it owes plus giving up excessive royalties it has raked in. Qualcomm did not immediately respond to an AFP request for comment.

The Apple filing came three days after the US Federal Trade Commission filed suit in federal court in California claiming Qualcomm abused its market power in as part of its "unlawful maintenance of a monopoly in baseband processors," which are devices that enable cellular communications in phones and other products.

The suit charges Qualcomm of building a business Qualcomm rejected the agency's case as "significantly complaint is wrong. South Korea's anti-trust watchdog last month slapped Qualcomm with a record fine exceeding \$850 million for abusing its dominant market position as a maker of baseband chipsets used in mobile phones.

Room for rivals

Apple relies on Qualcomm for chip-based modems that enable iPhones and iPads to communicate with telecommunication networks. Apple undoubtedly knows of the antitrust tide rising against Qualcomm and would like to help provide room for rival chipmakers to flourish, perhaps letting Intel improve its position, according to analyst Patrick Moorhead of Moor Insights and Strategy. "I think Apple is not comfortable in feeling that they have only one source and are taking this opportunity to go after Qualcomm," Moorhead said, referring to the mobile device modems.

"Qualcomm is being looked at on every continent on the planet; this is probably, strategically, the right time for Apple to do this." While the legal case alleges exclusionary contracts and the idea of being overcharged for licensing, it may well be powered by Apple wanting to ramp up competition to Qualcomm so it can negotiate better deals, the analyst said. Modem chips are separate from processors that act as the brains or graphics engines for mobile devices. — AFP

Trapped in dying tea gardens, children get lost to traffickers

JALPAIGURI: Fagua Ooraon was running late for work when traffickers stopped outside his hut and said they were taking his teenage daughter with them to the city for better employment. Ooraon said 'no' and went to work. When he got home that evening, his daughter was gone. "They took her anyway," he said, sitting in his home in Diana Tea Estate in the east Indian state of West Bengal.

"If I wasn't late that morning, I would have stayed and talked my daughter out of it. But they had lured her with the promise of good clothes, a new mobile, better education and money - everything I have been struggling to give my family since the tea gardens started closing." Tea gardens began shutting in 2002 and within five years, most had fully closed because management said they were unviable to run or struggled with big loans.

Sabita, 16, is among the growing number of adolescent girls coerced to leave the tea-growing belt of West Bengal, whose pickers endure severe

poverty, social isolation and health problems now their jobs have gone. West Bengal reported 14,671 cases of missing children in 2014, according to Child Rights and You, a non-profit organization that analyzed government data. One in every five missing children in India is from West Bengal, it stated.

"There is a close linkage of missing children to organised crime," said Atindra Nath Das of Child Rights And You, "Large number of missing children are actually trafficked, kidnapped or abducted." In the 276 mostly closed tea gardens of West Bengal, young girls are dropping out of high school and "disappearing" with agents, according to a Child Welfare Board official, who did not want to be identified.

"Parents are helpless and in many cases don't even file a missing person's report in the hope that their daughter will safely return home," said Victor Basu of Dooars Jagron, a non-profit group fighting for child rights in the region. "In some cases the parents are given a few

thousand rupees and told that everything is fine," he said. "Then the money stops coming and all contact with the child is lost."

Lured by lipstick

Not very far from Ooraon's hut, Rukmani Naik holds up a passport-size picture of her 14-year-old daughter. Alisa. "She went in the first week of January," Naik, a temporary picker in the Diana Tea garden, told the Thomson Reuters Foundation. "She was taken last year also but we managed to find her and bring her back. Then a man who came to my neighbor's house this month managed to convince her a second time and she's gone."

Campaigner say many young girls are directly approached by agents - an outsider and a local resident usually work together - and that fancy clothes and make-up are the biggest lure. Earlier this month, undergraduate student and activist Sulochana Naik joined a group of students to prevent a teenager from being trafficked. "The agents said they would buy her lipstick, cut her hair fashionably and buy her new clothes," the 21year-old member of an anti-trafficking campaign said. "They said she would be enrolled in a school and all she had to do was babysit for a couple of hours. The girl told us that she thought she would earn, help her parents and become more beautiful." Reports of human trafficking in India increased 25 percent in 2015 compared to the year before, with more than 40 percent of cases involving children, according to government crime data.

Growing despair

Hunger and death are deep set in the tea gardens. But for the nearly 200,000 families that still live here, despair is only growing. Most live in abject poverty. Women who once plucked leaves for some of the finest tea blends now break boulders on the river bank, earning 150 rupees (\$2) a day. "The girls have dropped out of school, mostly because their parents can't even afford the bus

fare," Basu said. A team from the National Commission for Women, a statutory body that advises the Indian government on women's issues, last week visited the tea gardens to assess the conditions and were met with anguished questions about missing children. At the Red Banks tea estate, Shanti Kesh stood up and told the commission: "Children are seeing our struggle and are moving out to earn money.

"But many are not coming back, some die there and most of us have no contact with them at all. We want our jobs back so that our children are safe with us." Ooraon believes his daughter is in the neighboring state of Sikkim, a new destination for many trafficked children who are then employed in the booming tourism industry, anti-trafficking campaigners say.

"I miss her terribly," he said quietly. "She would always have my lunch box ready when I left for work. My wife thinks I sold her for a little money. I didn't, she was just taken." — Reuters



A member of a royal warrior clan and heir apparent to the throne of Rajpipla in deeply conservative Gujarat state, Gohil uses his fame and status to educate the gay community about safe sex and their rights in a country where gay sex is a criminal offence.

"Gohil has been part of a campaign against the colonial-era law that bans homosexual acts in India, which he says has contributed to the spread of HIV/AIDS. ern culture. It is absolutely wrong," Gohil told among the MSM (men having sex with men), we were harassed and threatened by police. "We would keep condom packets in public toilets, and even hang them on trees in public parks because we did not want to stop them from having sex in toilets or behind the bushes. We just wanted them to have safe sex."

'Spreading homosexuality'

Gay sex was effectively decriminalised in 2009 when the Delhi High Court ruled that prohibiting it was a violation of a person's fundamental rights. But in 2013 the Supreme Court ruled that the responsibility for changing the 1861 law rested with lawmakers and not judges. Prosecutions are rare, but gay people say they face significant discrimination as well as harassment from the police.

Gohil said even a government contract to distribute condoms did not protect his workers from police harassment. "They said we were spreading homosexuality," he recalled. "Some of our workers were arrested and taken to the police station where the cops themselves had forced sex with them without condoms." India has the third highest number of HIV/AIDS cases in the world according to the United Nations, with about 2.1 million people in 2015, although the rate of infection is falling.

In another positive sign, two bills designed to end discrimination against transgender people and individuals infected with HIV are currently going through the Indian parliament. Working with people in the transgender community is a priority for the government in its national AIDS response plan, but social isolation means the community is still at particularly high risk of HIV transmission.

The bill seeks to prohibit discrimination in any form and specifically bans denying them access to public places, on pain of up to two years' imprisonment and a fine. But campaigners have objected to a clause which would force people to undergo tests to determine their gender identity. They say this is against the spirit of a 2014 Supreme Court judgement that allowed anyone to "self identify" which gender they are.

When the social empowerment ministry itself is not clear who a transgender is how will they address their issues?" said Gohil. "It is a challenging situation. I don't blame any political party. It's not the party but the individuals who are either homophobic or gay friendly. "It's our duty to educate them because they are ignorant." — AFP

BREAST IMPLANT VICTIMS WIN PAYOUT FROM SAFETY BODY

TOULON: A French court on Friday ordered German safety certifier TUV to pay 60 million euros (\$64 million) in compensation to 20,000 women who received defective breast implants that the group had approved. TUV Rhineland was ordered to make a provisional payment of 3,000 euros to each plaintiff for certifying that implants made by French firm Poly Implant Prothese

(PIP) met safety standards. In the far-reaching health scandal, the devices were later found to contain substandard, industrial-grade silicone gel that was seven times cheaper than medicalgrade silicone. "The final amount will be determined after an assessment, but (TUV) is required to make a provisional payment of 3,000 euros" per person, said lawyer Laurent Gaudon, representing 7,000 women. Another lawyer Olivier Aumaitre, representing some 13,000 women, praised the commercial court in the southern port of Toulon for a ruling he said was inevitable given "TUV's glaring negligence". TUV's lawyer Cecile Derycke said the firm would appeal the latest ruling in a long-running saga. The court "persists in ignoring very clear elements of the PIP dossier that establish that (TUV Rheinland) fulfilled its mission of a certifying body with diligence and full conformity with applicable regulations," she said in a statement.

The Toulon court in 2013 ordered TUV to pay 53 million euros to six foreign distributors of the implants as well as 1,600 users. But an appeals court later overturned that decision, saying that TUV had fulfilled its obligations as a certifying body and could not be held responsible for failing to detect PIP's cover-up. The company maintains it was never its job to check the actual implants, and their task was only to inspect the manufacturing process.

The court said that if TUV staff had carried out "the slightest unannounced inspection... the fraud would have been easily detected." The scandal made global headlines in 2011, the year after doctors first noticed abnormally high rupture rates in the implants. Some 300,000 women in 65 countries, most in Latin America, are believed to have received the faulty implants. PIP's founder, Jean-Claude Mas, was convicted of fraud and sentenced to four years in jail in 2013, confirmed on appeal in 2016.

Toxicity ruled out

Mas was ordered to pay a fine of 75,000 euros and was banned from working in the health sector or running a business. He is appealing that ruling to a court of cassation. Two other pending legal cases are pending against Mas, one for involuntary manslaughter-the implants were suspected in several deaths from systemic toxicity-and another linked to the financial implications of the scandal.

He always denied the implants posed any health risks. In a setback for the plaintiffs, a scientific panel mandated by the European Commission concluded in May 2014 that the implants could not be linked to toxicity and users did not have to remove them as a precaution. Thousands of women have had the implants removed, even though health officials in several countries have said they are not toxic and are not thought to increase the risk of

breast cancer. — AFP

CLIMATE SCIENCE BEDEVILED BY SEVERAL 'TIPPING POINTS'

PARIS: Of the many things that keep climate scientists awake at night, tipping points may be the scariest. To start with, these thresholds for deep, sometimes catastrophic change in the complex web of Earth's natural forces, caused by manmade global warming, are largely invisible. You can't see them on the horizon, and could easily cross one without noticing.

Also, there is no turning back-at least not on a human timescale. Ice sheets with enough frozen water to lift sea levels more than a dozen meters; powerful ocean currents that keep bone-chilling winters at bay on both sides of the Atlantic; monsoon rains upon which hundreds of millions in Asia depend for food-all are at risk of irretrievable disruption

"There are points-of-no-return where, for example, a certain amount of warming triggers unstoppable collapse of glaciers off of Antarctica, even if the planet cools again," explained Ben Strauss, vice president of the US research group Climate Central. Think of someone leaning back on two legs of a chair, suggests Sybren Drijfhout, a professor at the University of Southampton.

"The tipping point is when you're exactly in between two states," he said. "A tiny perturbation"-a gentle shove" will make the system tip over." In the case of ice sheets, how this might happen is well understood. Thick ice shelves astride land and sea in Greenland and Antarctica act as giant bulkheads, preventing even larger inland ice masses from sliding into the ocean. West Antarctica's would lift the global watermark by at least six meters.

Permafrost (not)

Were these ice dams-eroded by warming water (below) and air (above) — to fall away, "the blocking features may not be able to reform even after hundreds of years of cooling," Strauss told AFP. As if by way of illustration, an ice block nearly 100 times the size of Manhattan is poised to break off West Antarctica's Larsen C ice shelf within months, scientists said earlier this year. But if experts agree on the mechanics, they sharply disagree on how much a region would need to warm up to trigger collapse, or

how long it would take. "We don't know exactly when we might pass these points-or whether we already have crossed some of them," Strauss added. James Hansen, former head of NASA's Goddard Institute for Space Studies, has argued that West Antarctica could disintegrate rapidly, adding up to a couple of metres to ocean levels this century. But most experts say humanity is still within a "safe operating space" for the ice sheets, even if the margin for error has become uncomfortably thin.

Other tipping points could trigger the natural release, on a massive scale, of the same greenhouse gases that humans have spewed into the atmosphere, further destabilizing the delicate balance that has made our planet so livable over the last 11,000 years. Methane and CO2 locked in the increasingly misnamed permafrost of Russia, Canada and northern Europe is equivalent to roughly 15 years worth of global emissions from fossil fuels at today's levels.



PRO-CANNABIS GROUP GIVES FREE JOINTS IN WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON: Hundreds of people dispersed through the streets of Washington on Friday during the inauguration of Donald Trump to hand out thousands of free joints and raise public awareness about cannabis consumption. DCMJ, the organizing group, said it was distributing some 8,500 marijuana cigarettes-double the originally planned number, following an "overwhelming public response."

Alan Amsterdam, one of the event's organizers, said volunteers had been rolling joints for three weeks. Amsterdam, who looks rather like a biker, said his main hope is that the new administration will keep its hands off the city's legalization of cannabis. Trump's nominee as attorney general, Jeff Sessions, is a critic of legalization. Amsterdam said Friday's dope distribution was not political. "This is a nonpartisan event," he said. "We welcome Trump supporters,

Clinton supporters and Bernie (Sanders) supporters. Everyone who stands with cannabis is welcome." He added: "We want people to know that cannabis is legal here in DC and we want it to stay that way. Our message to

Trump is: Leave it that way." Marijuana was legalized in the District of Columbia for medicinal and recreational use in 2014, though not for commercial sale.

Nataly de Leon, a member of the procannabis group, was handing out joints Friday, one at a time, to a line that seemed to just keep growing. She supports the medicinal use of cannabis. "So many patients have severe illnesses that cannabis can really help them with," she said. She called it "ridiculous" that people in most parts of the country can legally consume alcohol but not smoke marijuana.

Dawn Lee-Carty quipped that legalization was "one thing that will contribute to 'Make America Great Again'"the Trump slogan seen on a multitude of red hats around Washington on Friday. More seriously, she said she wanted to help educate people on the benefits of marijuana use. Her ailing 9year-old daughter, she said, had been helped by cannabis therapy. The DCMJ group worked in 2014 for the passage of Initiative 71, which legalized cannabis use in the US capital. Since then, DCMJ has been working to make cannabis accessible to Americans in every state. — AFP

TINY 'HAIRDO' MOTH NAMED AFTER TRUMP

LOS ANGELES: A tiny moth has been tats in the US that still contain many named after Donald Trump partly because of its distinctive 'hairdo' which resembles that of the president-elect. The minuscule creature, Neopalpa donaldtrumpi, was discovered by Canadian scientist Vazrick Nazari who said he was struck by the resemblance of the golden scales on the head of the moth to Trump's signature hairstyle. He said he also named the new species, which measures about 0.4 inches (9 mm), after the incoming president to focus attention on ecological issues.

'The reason for this choice of name is to bring wider public attention to the need to continue protecting fragile habiundescribed species," Nazari wrote in a review of the species published on Tuesday. The newly discovered moth, the first animal to bear Trump's name, is native to southern California but its habitat extends to Baja California in Mexico.

According to Live Science, President Barack Obama has had nine species named after him, more than any other US president. They include a coral reef fish native to Hawaii and a trapdoor spider. Last year, a caterpillar found in the Peruvian Amazon was informally named "Trumpapillar" because its orange-yellow furry cover resembled Trump's hairdo. — AFP

PARIS: Avalanches such as the one that slide. At extremely low temperatures, even a relatively light snowfall can set off an avalanche up to a meter deep.

In other cases, high winds create snowdrifts in sheltered areas, and the resulting slab can wrench free because of a steep gradient. Finally, when the snowpack becomes wetter and heavier in the spring, slabs can break off from the slippery, stillfrozen underlying layers, depending on how fast the surface snow melts. Forecasting avalanches is difficult, but areas known to be frequent corridors and which threaten villages or ski areas are regularly purged with explosives to limit the risk.

The avalanche that buried the Hotel Rigopiano near Farindola occurred after the nearby town of Amatrice was rocked by moderate earthquakes with magnitudes of 5.2 to 5.7, according to the European-Mediterranean Seismological Centre (EMSC). CAN BREAKFAST KEEP US THIN? NUTRITION SCIENCE IS TRICKY

SORTING THE HYPE FROM RELIABLE DIETARY ADVICE

NEW YORK: Cereal makers have happily encouraged the belief that eating breakfast can help keep us thin and bring other benefits, partly by paying for studies that seem to support the idea. So, does that mean breakfast is bad for you? Not that either. What it does show is how difficult it can be to sort the hype from reliable dietary advice when studies are funded by the makers of Froot Loops, nutrition science is often inconclusive, and gray areas can be spun for marketing.

Take Special K. In the 1990s, Special K boxes featured findings that people who didn't normally eat breakfast lost more weight after they started doing so. "That was the little piece they put on the cereal box," said David Schlundt, a co-author of the study of about 50 women. Not mentioned on those boxes: Regular breakfast eaters who started skipping the meal lost even more weight, compared to those who stuck with their routines. That doesn't mean particular breakfasts can't help some people control their appetites, or bring other benefits like energy. Schlundt's study was tiny. But it shows how easy it is to simplify the complexities and limitations of nutrition science and

cherry-pick the findings. Our understanding of what's healthy can evolve, which is why dietary guidelines are regularly updated to reflect the latest science. A recommendation that breakfast can help with weight control - inserted in 2010 - is no longer in the guidelines. With its last update, the government says it looked at broader eating patterns. A look at some research around breakfast and weight illustrates why advice about it is so tricky.

'White hat' bias

To investigate the long-held idea that breakfast can prevent weight gain, researchers in 2013 reviewed dozens of studies examining the premise. Their conclusion: Popular opinion outweighed the scientific evidence. A major issue they identified was that studies often misleadingly used language to indicate that breakfast influenced weight, even though the findings did not establish a cause-and-effect relationship. Like a lot of nutrition research, the studies drew links between physical traits and what people said they ate. "It

goes back to the idea that correlation doesn't equal causation," said Andrew Brown, one of the researchers who conducted the analysis. Brown, a nutrition scientist at the University of Alabama at Birmingham, noted that it could be that heavier people were skipping breakfast in hopes of losing weight. When citing past studies, scientists also tended to mischaracterize inconclusive results in favor of breakfast. Brown chalked that up to 'white hat" bias, since people are constantly told breakfast is "the most important meal of the day."

Brown also noted that "breakfast" can consist of any number of possibilities, whether it's cold pizza, yogurt or an egg sandwich. It's possible to question all sorts of dietary ideas. A study published last month, for instance, said the science behind recommendations to limit sugar was weak. That study drew criticism from health advocates because it was paid for by an industry group that includes Coke and Hershey - but it underscored the vulnerability of dietary recommendations.

Timothy Caulfield, an expert in health law and policy at the University of Alberta, said nutrition science often comes with uncertainties and shouldn't be discarded just because it doesn't provide slam-dunk evidence. He said health experts give advice on the best available research, but there needs to be greater understanding about its limitations. With breakfast and weight, Caulfield said there hasn't been a pendulum swing in the data, just that the evidence doesn't seem as powerful as once believed.

'Not good, not good'

Disclosures about who paid for the research became the norm only in recent years, so it's unclear how much of the literature on breakfast and weight from past decades was funded by breakfast food makers. The 1992 study featured on Special K boxes, for example, doesn't list a funding source. Schlundt told the AP that Kellogg paid for it. "Only the ideas they see as favorable get money," Schlundt, an associate professor at Vanderbilt, said of industry-funded research. Even when funding is disclosed, people may not realize that not all studies are that meaningful. "The paper is not good, not good = There are major

structural problems with it that cannot be fixed," Carol O'Neil, a professor at Louisiana State University, wrote to her co-author in 2011 about a Kellogg-funded study, according to emails obtained through a records request. O'Neil and her co-author wanted to withdraw the paper from submission, but felt they couldn't because Kellogg expected it to be published. When the paper kept coming back with notes, O'Neil said she didn't see a way around the problems. "But let me look at the comments again and see if there is some sort of clever verbiage we can present," she wrote.

The paper did not find a link between cereal consumption among Mexican-American children and better weight, but found one between cereal and higher nutrient intake. As eventually published in 2013, it concluded that nourishing breakfasts - including those with cereal - should be encouraged. O'Neil did not respond to requests for comment. Kellogg said it is unable to comment on the study and the research by Schlundt because they were done long ago. General Mills, which has funded studies about breakfast, cereal and weight, declined to comment. Another study funded by Kellogg last year found breakfast consumption was not consistently linked with differences in weight among Canadian adults. It found people who ate cereal had lower weights than those who ate other types of breakfast, though results varied by age and sex. Yoni Freedhoff, an obesity expert at the University of Ottawa, said many of his patients find protein-rich breakfasts help control their appetites. Yet he noted that breakfast studies are often funded by cereal makers, and look specifically at cereal.

Those studies can help shape policy. In its 2010 guidelines, the US government cited breakfast as a way to manage weight. Of the 15 studies involving children mentioned to support the recommendation, five listed funding from General Mills or Kellogg, with three looking specifically at cereal. With its 2015 update, though, the government decided to look instead at "the combination of what you eat and drink over time," according to the Health and Human Services Department. As a result, it no longer recommends breakfast for weight loss. — AP







hey are fashion's new celebrity aristocracy, the sons and daughters of stars who are themselves becoming the kings and queens of the catwalk shows. From Lily-Rose Depp and Will Smith's daughter Willow-the faces of Chanel to the Beckham boys and Sylvester Stallone's two daughters modeling for Dolce & Gabbana, celebrity offspring are luxury labels' new not-so-secret weapon. With their huge followings on social media and instant name-recognition, these millennial born in the limelight have become the perfect avatars for advertising campaigns. British actor Jude Law's daughter Iris is the new face of Burberry having followed her brother Rafferty in modeling, while the daughters of singer Lionel Richie, Cindy Crawford and even Bob Dylan's grandson have all embarked on catwalk careers.

Michael Jackson's daughter Paris turned up in the French capital this week for a photo shoot, adding her name to a bulging celebrity model roll call that includes the daughter of Oasis singer Noel Gallagher, the son of Isabelle Adjani and Daniel Day-Lewis, the daughter of Nastassja Kinski and Quincy Jones, and the sons of Sean Penn and Pierce Brosnan. The list is endless and seemingly inexhaustible, with marketing experts maintaining that young consumers cannot get enough of celebrity dynasties. You just have to look at the Kardashians, said Gachoucha Kretz, professor of fashion marketing at the HEC business school in Paris, to see how the model works.

Kardashian effect


They have converted their reality television fame into fashion hard currency, with Kim Kardashian and her half sister Kendall Jenner now established stars of the firmament, their every wardrobe choice scrutinized on social media. Brands hope to piggyback on "the popular fascination with these tribes and families", Kretz said. With no problem about name recognition "there is much less marketing to do", she added. "The associations are already created." With their Instagram or Twitter endorsements of their favored brands, they become the ultimate "influencers" to help push demand.

Aged only 17, Brooklyn Beckham has nine million followers on Instagram. After two years as a model he has branched out into fashion photography, shooting an advertising campaign for Burberry this summer that made headlines around the world. Even fashion's biggest players are happy to play along with the family fame game. Chanel's Karl Lagerfeld, for instance, has been a enthusiastic nepotist, hiring Depp, Smith and Jenner, and taking former supermodel Ines de la Fressange's daughter Violette d'Urso as his muse.

Self-replicating elite

"The tabloids and celebrity magazines love these famous families and that assures media coverage," said Aurore Gorius, co-author of a French book "Sons and Daughters of..." The 2015 book casts a critical eye on the public's fascination with this "phenomenon of elites reproducing themselves and blocking social mobility. "These children have grown up under the eyes of the media and we are curious what will become of them," she said. Trends expert Cecile Poignant, who teaches at the New School Parsons Paris, said there has been a gradual push toward the "starification of childhood" over the last 15 years. She said it began with photographer Annie Leibovitz's famous front cover of a naked Demi Moore pregnant for Vanity Fair magazine.

"For a lot of models and celebrities, the child has become something of a fashion accessory, a must have," Poignant said. But could the omnipresence of celebrity offspring now finally lead to a backlash. Fashion student Marie Richaud said she found it irksome that their fame "is not based on merit but family links. It excludes." Even so the 25-year-old follows several second generation celebs on Instagram even if "she doesn't identify with them." "These children who seems to have had it all give people something to dream about. But at the same time they can just as easily annoy," said Poignant. "Do any of them have any talent or is their



Paris fashion takes on the great men's suit conundrum

o suits suit us anymore? Designers wrestled with how to reinvent the boring old jacket and pants combo for skate-kid millennial at the Paris menswear shows Friday. With everyone wondering if Haider Ackermann would take his scissors to the classic lines of Berluti in his debut show for the Italian brand, much brainpower is being expended on trying to make the classic two-piece relevant. Purists need not panic, not as far as Ackermann is concerned in any case. The Colombian-born designer's first Berluti collection was exquisite, a symphony in velvet, suede and cord, classic yet right on the button of cool.

His suits of often subtly contrasting browns and blacks were paired with coats in rich reds, blues and gold and woolly halo collars. Trousers-as has often happened this week-stopped at the ankle over Berluti's trademark Chelsea boots. The celebrity-studded audience included the British actress Tilda Swinton, a long-time fan of the 45-year-old creator, whose show earlier in the week for his own label was adored by critics. Cerruti turned the clock back to the 1930s in its search to find the roots of the suit. The result was a show that was lock, stock and two smoking barrels of gangster chic which channeled both Al Capone and "Goodfellas" influences from the 1950s.

Wide fur-collared coats were matched with Homburg hats and three-pieces suits for the capos and shirts, braces and "Peaky Blinders" style Irish caps for the foot soldiers. For all its mobster vibe it had none of the simmering menace of Australian Justin O'Shea's failed attempt last year to make over Brioni in his own image with gangsterish silk shirts and full-length chinchilla coats. Margiela too eschewed cheap machismo in its collection inspired by the American Beat poets Jack Kerouac and Allen Ginsberg. Its two suits were unadorned, simply cut showing the man within rather than trying to put on a show.

Nice skirt, sir

Masanori Morikawa of Christian Dada went for a bigger statement with his rethought pinstripe suits, contrasting them with sweatshirts emblazoned with slogans like "Loser" and what seemed to be "I Don't Like the Drugs But the Drugs Like Me." Another Japanese brand, Commes Des Garcons, went unisex, turning the conventional jacket and trousers combo into jacket and skirt or jacket and culottes. Yohji Yamamoto deconstructed the waist coated three-piece suit with traditional Japanese layering's, which although hugely comfortable looking, may take some convincing for the average businessman to wear.

Pinstripes had made a tentative comeback earlier in the week in Ackermann's own label show and in the debut Icosae collection by young Parisian brothers Valentin and Florentin Glemarec. Sebastien Meunier at Ann Demeulemeester, however, went for outright romanticism, skipping back two centuries to the poets and dreamers of the early 19th century and their trailing black greatcoats. These were the kind of dashingly gothic get-ups that Byron and Shelley would have given a finger or two on their writing hands for. His see-through lacey greatshirts with high collars or ruff necks and hats plumed with feathers were an ode to dreamier days, ribbons trailing down to long baggy trousers.

Setting it all to Roxy Music's doomed love song "A Song for Europe"-"Here I sit at this empty cafe, thinking of you..."-was a stroke of genius. "Romanticism is the DNA of this brand and we tried to keep it very strong," Meunier later said. "The show tells the story of a beautiful dandy who is in love," saying he used male and female models-the dominant trend in this year's menswear shows-"because love is the same for us all." — AFP

Melania Trump stood by his side in an elegant ivory column gown reportedly designed by Herve Pierre, former creative director of Carolina Herrera. "Now," the president added, "the fun begins." At think it's more essential than the politicians feel."

Services Ball," the evening began with a solemn prayer and a moment of silence in honor of soldiers killed in the line of duty.


The arts, an easy target

Melania Trump stuns in First Lady fashion stakes

Iirst Lady Melania Trump stunned fashion watchers ■ by donning a sleek, off-the-shoulder cream dress with a daring thigh-high slit to dance with President Donald Trump at the inaugural balls. Her column dress, finished with a sculpted ruffle that cascaded down the front of the gown and cinched at the waist with a red ribbon, won praise for being fresh, modern, elegant and yet understated. She won rave reviews for her look and originality in choosing in Herve Pierre a New York-based designer who last year struck out on his own after working as creative director for famed label Carolina Herrera.

Her pick is likely to boost sales and publicity for the relatively unknown Pierre, much like her predecessor Michelle Obama's selection of the then relatively unknown Jason Wu in 2009 turned him into a star. The 46-year-old former model glowed as she stepped onto the dance floor, her auburn hair hanging around her shoulders, with her husband, dressed in a black tie, to "My Way" the song made popular by Frank Sinatra and considered something of a personal anthem for Trump.

The couple swayed rather gingerly, the Republican

president clutching his wife tightly by one hand and placing his other on her back as they nuzzled, and exchanged smiles and laughs. The former reality TV star, who reportedly refused to practice the dance ahead of time, at times broke away from his wife to wave or flash a thumbs up to unidentified members of the crowd. They were joined by Trump's adult children from his two previous marriages, each dancing with their other halfs, and first daughter Ivanka stunning in a pink beadencrusted princess Herrera gown.

Channeling Jackie O in Ralph Lauren

Women's Wear Daily, quoting Pierre, said Trump collaborated on the gown. He said it had been an honor to dress her "under my name" after dressing first ladies Hillary Clinton, Laura Bush and Michelle Obama while working for Oscar de la Renta and Carolina Herrera, it said. The new first lady's sartorial picks for the inauguration went some way to silencing critics who have complained in the past that she favored high-end European clothes rather than American creations.

Earlier in the day she donned a custom-made power

blue suit from US fashion royalty Ralph Lauren for her husband's swearing-in ceremony. Her cashmere turtleneck dress fell to her knee, paired with a cropped bolero jacket and matching suede gloves. The Slovenian-born first lady wore her hair swept up, showcasing diamond stud earrings. It was a look that channeled her 1960s predecessor Jackie Kennedy, of whom she has spoken admiringly, the wife of slain Democratic president John F Kennedy and considered one of the most stylish first ladies.

Lauren, a 77-year-old master who personifies a ragsto-riches American dream is perhaps the country's most iconic living designer, whose clothes define a uniquely American sense of elegance. His decision to work with the new first lady comes after a string of other designers refused to dress her, citing opposition to her husband's controversial policies on immigration and campaign insults. An American first lady's clothes have become hugely influential, believed to send implicit messages about the tone of their husbands' administrations.

Old fashioned feel

Both Melania Trump's outfits on Friday are likely to go on display at the Smithsonian's National Museum of American History along with first lady inaugural wear dating back to Mamie Eisenhower. Obama was particularly praised for her savvy blend of accessible high street clothes with striking high-end pieces that championed a host of little known designers. As the wife of a billionaire, it remains unclear whether Trump will follow Obama's example and include cheaper outfits in her wardrobe.

She will also have to work hard to keep up with 35year-old Ivanka, who unlike Melania is moving straight to Washington with her husband, Jared Kushner, an incoming White House advisor. Tickets to the official balls went for \$50 a head, which the Trump team said was designed to make them accessible to the ordinary voters who helped propel Trump into the White House, electrified by his populist, message that has nonetheless alarmed vast swaths of America.

The three official balls, the grand finale to inauguration day, served up a slice of old fashioned glamour with performances from the likes of the Rockettes, Michael Flatley's Lord of the Dance and Sam Moore. Aged 70 and the oldest man ever sworn in as US president, and the first to have never previously held elected or military office, Trump and his family took to the dance floor at all three. The choice of "My Way," a song made globally famous by Sinatra in 1969 is synonymous with Trump's hometown New York and is own tear-up-the rule book approach to politics that ended in his widely unexpected election. - AFP
