### SAUDIS EXECUTE **4 OVER ATTACKS ON POLICE, RIOTS**

RIYADH: Saudi Arabia yesterday executed four men convicted of "terrorist crimes" including attacks on police and participating in riots in the district of Qatif, the kingdom said. The interior ministry named the four as Zaher Al-Basri, Yusof Al-Meshikhes, Mahdi Al-Sayyegh and Amjad Al-Emeibid, according to a statement aired by Al-Ekhbariyah state news channel. They were convicted of "disobeying the ruler" and attempting to "sow sedition" in the kingdom, according to the statement.

They were found guilty of charges including opening fire at police centers in villages in Qatif, in Eastern Province, and taking part in riots and hurling petrol bombs at security forces and government installations. The executions come amid mounting attacks on police in Qatif, home to a significant part of the kingdom's Shiite minority which has traditionally complained of marginalization.

On Saturday, two police officers were wounded in an attack on a patrol in Qatif, while a police corporal was killed in a bombing in the same area on Thursday.

**US MILITARY PLANE** 

KUWAIT/DOHA: HH the Amir of Kuwait Sheikh Sabah Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah yesterday expressed "bitterness" and is "extremely concerned" over "unprecedented developments" in the Gulf crisis. The Amir appreciates the positive reactions and messages of support of Kuwait's mediation efforts regarding the stalemate, displayed by Kuwaiti nationals, Gulf states and the international community, read an Amiri Diwan statement.

These expressions of support have "relieved" him from the resulting pain and "increased our determination" to resolve the matter, said HH the Amir, who is leading mediation efforts in the crisis involving several Arab countries. The Amir warned that the Gulf Cooperation Council's accomplishments, based on the aspirations of its people, "cannot be compromised, and should be maintained and adhered to". "We will not surrender our historic responsibilities (towards the bloc) and we will be loyal to it until we overcome these developments," he underlined, stressing that the related parties themselves can only resolve this crisis.

Meanwhile, Qatar and the United States signed a deal yesterday on combatting "terrorism" as visiting US Secretary of State Rex Tillerson pursued efforts to resolve the Gulf diplomatic crisis. In Qatar as part of a series of Gulf meetings, Tillerson also said Doha had been "reasonable" in the dispute, which has seen Saudi Arabia, the United Arab Emirates, Bahrain and Egypt cut ties with the emirate over accusations it supports extremism.

## QATAR PLEDGES GAZA SUPPORT, UN SAYS ENCLAVE 'UNLIVABLE'

GAZA CITY: Qatar's envoy to Gaza said continue with the reconstruction yesterday Doha was committed to funding projects in the Hamas-run Palestinian enclave, despite pressure from Saudi Arabia and others who accuse it of supporting extremism. Meanwhile, the Gaza Strip may already be "unlivable", a United Nations official warned yesterday, after a decade of Hamas rule and a crippling Israeli blockade.

Speaking in Gaza City alongside a top UN official, Mohammed Al-Amadi said Qatar would continue to fund projects in Gaza, despite the "siege" imposed by Saudi Arabia and its allies in recent weeks. "We came to assure you we stood and will continue to stand with the besieged Palestinian people and we will

process," he told a news conference. "The policy of Qatar is to support the people and the official government. We do not support Hamas, we support Hamas as a part of the Palestinian people."

On June 5, Saudi Arabia and its allies severed all diplomatic ties with Qatar, accusing the gas-rich state of bankrolling "extremist" groups, including Hamas. Islamist movement Hamas has ruled Gaza since 2007 but is considered a terrorist group by the United States, European Union and Israel. The official Palestinian government is based in the Israeli-occupied West Bank and led by Hamas' rivals Fatah.

### **IS CHIEF BAGHDADI REPORTED DEAD**

### **THREE CUPS OF COFFEE A DAY KEEP** THE DOCTOR AWAY

MIAMI: Coffee addicts and aficionados often say drinking the bitter liquid makes life worth living, but the habit may also help them live longer, according to two major international studies vesterday. Experts cautioned, however, that the US and European reports, published in the Annals of Internal Medicine, failed to show that coffee was truly the reason that many drinkers appeared to have longer lives. Rather, the studies were observational in nature, meaning they showed an association between coffee-drinking and a propensity toward longevity, but stopped short of proving cause and effect.

The first study, led by the International Agency for Research on Cancer (IARC) and Imperial College London, examined more than half a million people across 10 countries in Europe. Those who drank about three cups a day tended to live longer than non-coffee drinkers, said the study, which researchers described as the largest analysis of the effects of coffee-drinking in a European population.

"We found that higher coffee consumption was associated with a lower risk of death from any cause, and specifically for circulatory diseases, and digestive diseases," said lead author Marc Gunter of the IARC, formerly at Imperial's School of Public Health. "Importantly, these results were similar across all of the 10 European countries, with variable coffee drinking habits and customs."

**BEIRUT:** Islamic State group chief Abu Bakr Al-Baghdadi was reported dead yesterday, a day after Iraq declared it had driven the militants from their one-time biggest stronghold of Mosul. The Syrian Observatory for Human Rights, a longtime monitor of the country's conflict, said it had information from top IS leaders confirming Baghdadi's death. The report could not be independently verified and Baghdadi has been reported dead several times.

But if confirmed, his death would mark another devastating blow to the extremist group after its loss of Mosul, which Iragi Prime Minister Haider Al-Abadi said Monday had been retaken from IS after a gruelling months-long campaign. "Top tier commanders from IS who are present in Deir Ezzor province have confirmed the death of Abu Bakr Al-Baghdadi, emir of the Islamic State group, to the Observatory," the Britainbased monitoring group's director Rami Abdel Rahman told AFP.

"We learned of it today but we do not know when he died or how."

Deir Ezzor, in eastern Syria, remains largely under IS control even as the group is losing territory elsewhere in the country and in neighboring Iraq. Abdel Rahman said Baghdadi "was present in eastern parts of Deir Ezzor province" in recent months, but it was unclear if he died in the area or elsewhere. There was no official confirmation or denial of the news on social media platforms used by IS.

The US-led coalition fighting the group in Syria and Iraq said it could not

verify the Observatory's information. "We cannot confirm this report, but hope it is true," said coalition spokesman Colonel Ryan Dillon.

"We strongly advise ISIS to implement a strong line of succession, it will be needed," he added, using a different acronym for IS. Asked if the coalition had a process underway to examine such claims, Dillon said: "We have professionals who use all information at their disposal to verify reports before we would confirm any allegations."

### 'GANGNAM' DETHRONED AS TOP YOUTUBE VIDEO

**NEW YORK:** "Gangnam Style," the quirky South Korean video that spawned a global dance craze and went so viral it nearly broke YouTube, has finally been dethroned as the most watched video. After four and a half years as YouTube's most seen video, "Gangnam Style" slipped late Monday to number two, replaced by "See You Again" by Wiz Khalifa and Charlie Puth. "Gangnam Style," a satirical take on the nouveau riche residents of the Seoul district by the same name, surprised even its singer, Psy, with its sudden global ascent in 2012.

Psy, who until "Gangnam Style" was little known outside of South Korea, found an avid fan base with the video's equestrian-style dance moves set to its infectious pop beat. The video became the first to reach one billion views on YouTube and caused the site's engineers to scramble to make changes when it topped 2.1 billion views, previously thought

to be the maximum possible.

As of early yesterday US time, "Gangnam Style" had 2.895 billion views on YouTube, a notch under "See You Again", which was featured in the 2015 action movie "Furious 7". "See You Again" intersperses scenes from the film with Wiz Khalifa rapping and Charlie Puth singing as they overlook a sandy coast. The song was a tribute to Paul Walker, an actor in "The Fast and Furious" film franchise who died in a car wreck.

Psy's triumph was all the more striking due to the overwhelming dominance of English-language music on global charts. In a new example, "Despacito" - a Spanish-language reggaeton song by Puerto Rican star Luis Fonsi and rapper Daddy Yankee-has reigned for nine weeks at the top of the US Billboard singles chart. The "Despacito" video is already the fifth most-watched on YouTube at 2.486 billion views even though it was released just this year. Once historic when Psy crossed the threshold, a total of 68 clips have passed the one billion view mark on YouTube, all but three of them music videos. — AFP

### KUWAIT, US, BRITAIN CALL FOR RAPID SOLUTION OF GULF CRISIS

**KUWAIT:** Kuwait, the US and Britain Monday called for a rapid end to the Gulf crisis through dialogue, as they expressed their concern over the prolonging of the dispute. Kuwait's Acting Prime Minister and Foreign Minister Sheikh Sabah Al-Khaled Al-Hamad Al-Sabah, US Secretary of State Rex Tillerson and Britain's National

Security Advisor Mark Sedwill expressed deep concern "over the continuation of the current crisis in the region."

The three officials, meeting at Bayan Palace, urged all parties to "contain this crisis rapidly, and to find a solution through dialogue as soon as possible." Tillerson and Sedwill reaffirmed support

for mediation carried out by Kuwait and efforts of His Highness the Amir Sheikh Sabah Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah to solve the crisis.

The meeting was attended by Minister of State for Cabinet Affairs and Acting Minister of Information Sheikh Mohammad Abdullah Al-Sabah, Deputy Foreing Minister Khaled Al-Jarallah, Assistant Foreign Minister for Sheikh Sabah Al-Khaled's office Ambassador Sheikh Dr Ahmad Nasser Al-Sabah, Assistant Foreign Minister for protocols Dhari Al-Ajran and Assistant Foreign Minister for Al-Jarallah's office Ayham Al-Omar. Earlier, Tillerson reiterated Washington's commitment to the security, safety and stability of the State of Kuwait. This came during a meeting with Sheikh Sabah Al-Khaled, during which they discussed ways of boosting bilateral ties, regional and international issues of mutual interest.

Meanwhile, Oman and Qatar said they supported mediation of His Highness the Amir Sheikh Sabah Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah to solve the Gulf crisis. This came during a meeting between Omani and Qatari Foreign Ministers, Yusuf Abdullah and Sheikh Mohammad Al-Thani respectively, the official ONA news agency reported. The two Ministers hoped Kuwait's mediation would help solve the

Gulf crisis in a way that would preserve security and stability of the GCC, and its common action, added ONA.

Earlier on Monday, Sultan of Oman Qaboos Bin Saeed received a letter from Qatari Emir Tamim Bin Hamad Al-Thani, dealing with bilateral relations and issues of mutual concern. Asaad Bin Qariq, Oman's Deputy Prime Minister for International Affairs and special representative of the Omani Sultan was handed the letter by Sheikh Mohammad. Kuwait is turning into a political 'Mecca' this coming week, with high-profile Arab and foreign officials arriving and holding talks in light of mediating efforts led by His Highness the Amir to solve the dispute between Saudi Arabia, Egypt, Bahrain and the UAE on one side and Qatar on the other.

Boris Johnson, British Foreign Secretary, visited Kuwait while Tillerson arrived earlier in the north Gulf state in yet another attempt to tackle the dispute. German Foreign Minister Sigmar Gabriel also visited the region, including Kuwait. The three men threw their weight behind the Kuwaiti mediation. Within the framework of the mediation efforts, His Highness the Amir had paid visits to Saudi Arabia, the UAE, and Qatar, where he held constructive talks with leaders there, who in turn, warmly welcomed the initiative. — KUNA

### **OIL MINISTER, CHINESE DELEGATION DISCUSS**

### **BOOSTING ENERGY, WATER COOPERATION**

### \$709 MILLION DEAL TO DEVELOP SOUTH MATLAA INFRASTRUCTURE

KUWAIT: Means of promoting bilateral cooperation in the energy and water sectors, as well investing in Kuwait's Silk City and five islands projects, featured high on the agenda of a meeting Oil Minister Essam Al-Marzouq held with a visiting Chinese delegation yesterday.

Emerging from the meeting, the minister said that he and the Chinese discussed boosting ties in the oil, electricity and water sectors. Marzouq explained to the delegation Kuwait's needs of future energy in fields like exploration for oil, and investments in oil refineries as well as petrochemical complexes overseas. In addition, the two sides discussed Kuwait's needs of energy over the coming two decades, namely establishing power plants, either to be operated by fossil fuel or alternative energy.

Meanwhile, Kuwait's ambassador to China Samih Hayat said that the visit is part of efforts to boost bilateral cooperation in energy, trade and investment. Such steps go in line with His Highness the Amir Sheikh Sabah Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah's strategic vision 'Kuwait 2035' and China's Belt and Road Initiative, Hayat noted. The Kuwaiti envoy stressed sincere mutual desire to consolidate ties, saying this is part of His Highness the Amir's desire to develop Kuwait into a regional and international financial and commercial hub.

The visiting delegation includes experts and specialists from several government departments in China, among them the China Development Bank, the National Development and Reform Commission, the Urban Planning Society of China, the China Association of Development Zones, the China Transport Company and the China International Energy Group Co, Ltd (CIEG), besides other state bodies in infrastructure and giant projects.

Housing project

In the meantime, a Chinese firm has signed a

contract with the Kuwaiti government worth KD 215 million (\$709 million) to develop infrastructure and roads for a new housing project in Kuwait's South Matlaa, a Kuwaiti official said. The contract, signed during the visit of the official Chinese delegation, involves works for 18,000 housing units in the new city located west of Kuwait City, Kuwait's State Minister for Housing Affairs and State Minister for Services Yasser Abul said. It comes on the heels of several contracts in the housing and communications sectors, and reflects the positive outcome of the visit, he added, without specifying the company that signed the deal.

Furthermore, Chinese technology and smartphone giant Huawei will execute the second phase of a fiber optics project in Kuwait, after it signed a KD 22 million (\$72 million) contract with Kuwait's Ministry of Services, Abul said.

He commented that the diverse nature of sectors Chinese companies are handling in Kuwait illustrates the "combined determination to develop these sectors, to reach new levels of cooperation and to boost bilateral relations" with Kuwait.

Kuwaiti-Cino relations are in "constant development and growth" as more and more Chinese companies are dealing with the Kuwaiti government, he said, particularly in the housing sector. The minister went on to welcome further investment from Chinese construction and building materials firms to benefit from the vast investment opportunities in Kuwait's housing sector.

#### 'Kuwait 2035'

Earlier yesterday, Minister of Amiri Diwan Affairs Sheikh Nasser Sabah Al-Ahmad Al-Sabah met with members of the Chinese delegation, as their discussion focused on finding ways to collaborate within the framework of the 'Kuwait 2035' development strategy.

Also, Minister of Public Works Abdurrahman

Al-Mutawa and the visiting Chinese delegation discussed means of promoting bilateral ties in all fields. The official Chinese delegation arrived yesterday on a four-day visit to Kuwait for boosting relations and promoting strategic cooperation for the good of both sides, the Ministry of Public Works said in a statement. Sheikh Nasser Sabah Al-Ahmad visited China last May for fostering bilateral ties, focusing on the goals of the 'Kuwait 2035' vision. During the visit, Sheikh Nasser met with China's Vice President Li Yuanchao.

The official Chinese delegation, which arrived in Kuwait on Monday, has been discussing matters related Kuwait's development plan and ways it could contribute to China's recreation of the ancient Silk Route, nicknamed the Belt and Road global trade project. The Chinese intend to do this through the development of strategic projects, including Kuwait's planned Silk City project, a 250 sq/km free trade zone in the northern Subbiyya region and Kuwait's five islands. — KUNA

### KUWAIT LOOKS FORWARD TO CLOSER TIES WITH TURKEY: MINISTER

**ISTANBUL:** Kuwaiti Oil Minister Essam Al-Marzouq on Monday described the Turkish-Kuwaiti relations as strong, voicing the country's desire for closer energy relations with Ankara. Marzouq, also Minister of Electricity and Water, said the State of Kuwait is looking forward to investing in Turkey in energy and benefiting from Turkish experiences in the fields of industry, technology and others.

He referred that meetings during the 22nd session of the World Petroleum Congress were fruitful, and focused on

the continued supply of energy to industrialized countries and on alternative energy. The congress discussed several issues mainly oil industry, technology, relations between oil consuming and producing countries, environment protection, investment problems and meeting demands for energy resources, the minister noted. The event kicked off on Sunday and runs until Thursday, with the participation of high-level executives from leading energy companies and up to 50 energy ministers. —KUNA

#### Personal inquiry

### KUWAIT URGES US TO LIFT BAN ON DIRECT FLIGHTS

**WASHINGTON:** The Directorate General of Civil Aviation (DGCA) on Monday called on the US Transportation Security Administration (TSA) to reconsider its decision and lift ban imposed on Kuwait Airways' direct flights to America. The directorate urged the US officials to take into consideration security measures taken for this purpose. This came in a meeting between a Kuwaiti delegation from DGCA headed by Emad Al-Jluwi and TSA's officials, in the presence of some staff of Kuwait Embassy in Washington, said Jluwi. During the meeting, the US officials were appraised of measures taken on international standards pertaining to security of civil aviation at the Kuwait International Airport, he said.

The Kuwaiti delegation also asked TSA to coordinate and cooperate with DGCA on enhancing the implementation of security systems at the airport and the new terminals, he noted. The delegation expressed the directorate's desire to accelerate the start of cooperation in various fields, including training and security systems, and the start of implementing procedures of the US Border Clearance at the support terminal. The US officials voiced their appreciation to keenness of Kuwait on boosting constructive cooperation on the implementation of standards of civil aviation security. The delegation invited the US officials to visit the Kuwait International Airport in mid-August to be appraised of measures so as to lift ban on the direct flights, he concluded. —KUNA

The finance ministry has requested the participation of local banks in financing the budget deficit of the 2016-2017 fiscal year.

#### Sponsorship ban

The Interior Ministry's information technology sector upgraded the deportation system to lift the sponsorship ban on the sponsor automatically from the main computer of the interior ministry as soon as the deportee's ticket is paid. The relations and security information department said the new system aims to achieve public interest. The system will issue deportees' tickets, and record details of financial affairs and statistics of collecting tickets from sponsors, along with all other required details. It said the system went into effect on Sunday.



### FIREFIGHTERS BATTLE FARM BLAZE

KUWAIT: Firefighters tackled a blaze that spread over an estimated area of 100 square meters inside a Sulaibiya farm yesterday. The fire reportedly started in a machine used to manufacture asphalt inside the farm. Firemen managed to contain and put out the flames before they could reach diesel containers that were stored in the farm as well. No injuries were reported in the incident.

MAN KILLED, THREE HURT IN ROOF COLLAPSE

KUWAIT: A man was killed and three of his colleagues were injured when the roof of a building under construction collapsed on them. The four Indian nationals were at work when the roof collapsed. Their colleagues rushed and got them out of the rubble, then called police and paramedics. Three were found severely injured, and one was pronounced dead on the scene. Investigations are underway.

#### Drunk 'fashion blogger' arrested

A famous 'fashion blogger' arrived in Kuwait from a neighboring Gulf country, and got into an argument with two policemen because they asked her to stay in line. She then insulted them and continued with behaving inappropriately. The woman, who was drunk, was arrested and taken to Jleeb Al-Shuyoukh police station. The two policemen filed a complaint and the investigator ordered that she be kept in jail until she sobers for questioning.

#### **Drug addict detained**

A young man decided to kill himself when his brothers tried to keep him from taking drugs. He was taken to hospital with various injuries and bruises. A security sources said the 29year-old could not control himself after being kept from using drugs, so he started screaming, then hit his head hard on the wall, which left him severely injured. His family called police, and the man tried to attack policemen when they arrived, but his brothers controlled him and he was taken to hospital. He is facing legal action.

#### Fight

A group of young men who were using drugs had a dispute then beat up one of them, who was taken to Mubarak Hospital for treatment. The victim told police about the incident

and they are in the process of arresting the suspects. Doctors at the hospital treating the victim, a bedoon, noticed his abnormal behavior due to using drugs and informed police. The victim confessed of using drugs with his friend in a flat.

#### Cable thief caught

Detectives arrested an Egyptian man on charges of stealing high voltage electricity cables that belong to the Ministry of Electricity and Water (MEW). Detectives received tips about a man who carried power cables on a half lorry and was seen by eyewitnesses using large cutters to cut suspended cables and cables on the ground. Police arrested the man red-handed while he was trying to sell the stolen cables. The man was referred to the public prosecution.

#### Attack

A citizen who went to help his wife, beat her friend following a dispute between the two in Saad Al-Abdullah. The victim went to the area's police station and told officers there about the incident. Police are investigating.

#### Kidnap

A Syrian man took his three children from their mother and traveled to Lebanon. The mother lodged a complaint at Fintas police station. The Syrian told his Lebanese wife he wanted to take the children on a picnic, but he took them to the airport and left to Beirut. He is placed on the wanted list.

#### Car thief apprehended

Jahra police arrested a bedoon (stateless) man while he was driving a stolen car that was carrying license plates different than the ones registered in the traffic department's records. The suspect was arrested and the car was sent to concerned authorities.

### 56% RESPONDENTS IN KUWAIT **BELIEVE THERE IS A SKILLS GAP**

**KUWAIT:** A recent study titled 'The Middle East Skills Report, conducted by Bayt.com - the Middle East's number one job site - and YouGov - a research and consulting agency, have found that 56 percent of respondents in Kuwait believe that there is a skills gap in the market.

At the regional level, 65 percent of employers believe there is a skills gap in the market, while 7 percent of employers said there isn't a gap, and 28 percent said they did not know. Employers and job seekers seem to be in agreement on the presence of a skills gap in the Middle East and North Africa (MENA) region. The majority of job seekers (59 percent) also think that there is a skills gap, while 11 percent think there is not.

ing" is very difficult to find.

Job seekers seem to tell a similar story by rating themselves lowest on two of these skills. Only 50 percent of job seekers claimed to be "very good" at global mindset and 53 percent claimed to be "very good" at visual thinking.

However, there is a discrepancy in their evaluation of their creative thinking skills against what employers said: 59 percent of job seekers evaluate themselves as "very good" while 47 percent of employers say it is "very difficult" to find this skill. For senior roles, 53 percent of employers claimed that it is "very difficult" to find candidates who possess creative thinking. 51 percent of employers said the same about critical thinking, while 49 percent said that about global mindset.

Meanwhile, an investigation was opened to determine the cause of the fire.

#### Job seeker challenges

From a job seeker's perspective, according to respondents, the number one reason for not finding jobs fitting their skills set is a "lack of awareness" (33 percent) of what skills are in high demand. This sentiment varies with age: 38 percent among those aged 40+, compared to 34 percent amongst ages 30-39, and 30 percent amongst those below 30 years old.

Just above a quarter of job seekers (26 percent) also claimed that the educational system doesn't train students on skills which are relevant in today's marketplace. This sentiment is more prevalent in North Africa (31 percent) and amongst recent graduates (32 percent).

#### Today's most demanded skills

According to employers, the top three most important skills for mid-career or junior positions are "teamwork" (83 percent of employers said it is very important), "time management" (80 percent said it is very important) and "written communication" (76 percent said it is very important).

Job seekers also agree; 84 percent said that "teamwork" is a very important skill, 83 percent said "time management" is very important, and 79 percent said "written communication" is very important.

When it comes to senior positions, the survey showed that the top three most important skills according to employers are "time management" (89 percent of employers said it is very important), "teamwork" (88 percent said it is very important), and "people management" (87 percent said it is very important).

Job seekers are in agreement for senior positions as well. 89 percent said "time management" is a very important skill, 89 percent said "teamwork" is very important, and 87 percent said "people management" is very important.

#### Today's most scarce skills

Less than one in three (32 percent) employers claimed that it is "very difficult" to find good candidates for junior or mid-career positions. On the job seeker's side, only a quarter (25 percent) of them have claimed that it was "very difficult" to find jobs matching their skills level.

According to those surveyed, there is a much bigger gap between what employers and job seekers think when it comes to senior roles. Only about a quarter (24 percent) of senior employees have reported that it is "very difficult" to find a job matching their skills. On the other side, the majority of businesses (58 percent) face challenges in sourcing employees with relevant skills for senior positions.

When looking to hire for mid-career / junior positions, 47 percent of employers surveyed said that they face the most challenges when searching for candidates skilled at "creative thinking." 44 percent of employers said "global mindset" is very difficult to find and 43 percent said "visual think-

Similarly to junior roles, job seekers rate themselves highly on the most critical skills. 93 percent of them said they are "very good" at team work, 87 percent said they are "very good" at time management, 87 percent said they are "very good" at written communication, and 86 percent said they are "very good" at people management.

However, on time management and team work, the gap between job seekers' evaluation and businesses' difficulty in finding the right skills is to the extreme. For time management, 87 percent of job seekers rate themselves as "very good", while 47 percent of employers said it is "very difficult" to find good candidates with this skill. Similarly, for team work, 93 percent of job seekers rate themselves as "very good", while 45 percent of employers said it is "very difficult" to find good candidates with this skill.

On job seekers' self-evaluations, the survey revealed that they rated themselves highest on the same skills they said are the most important. This is consistent but may also suggest that candidates felt compelled to say that they perform well on the skills they had identified as being critical.

#### Preparing for future jobs

The majority (78 percent) of job seekers surveyed claimed that they are committed to acquiring and developing new skills. However, senior job seekers are more likely than junior ones to read books on new skills (63 percent vs 57 percent), study industry best practices (51 percent vs 41 percent), attend company training (42 percent vs 27 percent), attend conferences (35 percent vs 23 percent) and attend extra classroom courses (31 percent vs 18 percent).

On the employers' side, eight in ten companies support their employees through a variety of initiatives. Mainly, companies organize training sessions (49 percent) and inform employees on industry best practices and implement them internally (38 percent). There is also some interest in offering extra classroom courses beyond the company trainings (24 percent), organizing industry tests for employees (23 percent) and paying for employees' participation in conferences (23 percent).

### More security provided for buses carrying pilgrims

**SRINAGAR:** As the Indian government blamed separatist rebels yesterday for gunning down seven Hindu pilgrims and wounding 19 more before fleeing into the night, Kashmiri rebel groups condemned the rare, deadly attack on civilians and insisted they had no part in it. Meanwhile, thousands of Hindus continued a religious pilgrimage undeterred, as Indian soldiers and police increased security along the mountain route to the Amarnath cave shrine in the mostly Muslim region.

Police said the attack Monday night began with gunmen unleashing a hail of bullets on an armored police vehicle and a police patrol. Police returned fire in both incidents and the gunmen responded, with bullets striking a bus carrying 60 Hindus returning from paying obeisance at the shrine. Several people who were wounded said the attackers fired at the bus from three directions for nearly five minutes. They said the driver kept driving the bus as it was being struck with bullets near the southern town of Anantnag on the main highway linking Kashmir with the rest of India.

The annual summer pilgrimage to the Amarnath cave shrine has been targeted in the past and takes place under heavy security. Opponents of Indian rule in Kashmir accuse Hindu-majority India of using the pilgrimage as a political statement to bolster its claim to the disputed region. Thousands of Indian army and paramilitary soldiers are deployed on the route to the cave shrine high in the Himalayas each summer. Officials said the bus was violating nighttime travel restrictions, which are imposed because security patrols are withdrawn after sunset.

#### **Cowardly attacks**

More security was provided yesterday for the buses that carry pilgrims to base camps where they start walking up a mountain path to the Amarnath cave. Police were still searching for the assailants Tuesday. They have blamed Muslim militants, but no group has claimed responsibility. Three top separatist leaders in Kashmir have condemned the attack. Officials say most of the wounded pilgrims were released from hospitals after overnight treatment.

The seven bodies were airlifted to New Delhi for the journey to the pilgrims' home states of Gujarat and Maharashtra in western India. Prime Minister Narendra Modi tweeted that "India will never get bogged down by such cowardly attacks and the evil designs of hate."

Separatist leaders demanded an independent investigation into the attack on pilgrims, which is rare in the insurgency-wracked region. "This incident goes against the very grain of Kashmiri ethos," three top separatist leaders, Syed Ali Geelani, Mirwaiz Umar Farooq and Mohammed Yasin Malik, said in a joint statement in Srinagar, the main city in Indian-controlled Kashmir. The attack sparked outrage across much of India. In the Jammu region of Kashmir, which is dominated by Hindus, hundreds of protesters shouted angry slogans against the militants and burned a faceless effigy meant to represent both terrorism and Pakistan, which India blames for supporting the rebels. Many shops and businesses were also shuttered in Jammu, after trade unions and political parties called for a protest strike.

Meanwhile, students in the Gujarati city of Ahmadabad gathered for a sit-in to protest all religious violence, while peace activists planned a candlelight vigil in New Delhi on Tuesday night. The Press Trust of India news agency said the last major attack on Amarnath pilgrims occurred in 2000 when gunmen struck in the Pahalgam area and killed 30 people, including some local porters who carry the baggage of pilgrims on the mountain path. —AP

## 16 KILLED IN US MILITARY PLANE CRASH IN MISSISSIPPI

**WASHINGTON:** All 16 troops aboard a Marine Corps air refueling and transport aircraft were killed when the plane crashed in a field in rural Mississippi, officials confirmed yesterday. Authorities provided few details on what went wrong, or the nature of the Marines' mission. The KC-130, an air refueling aircraft that can also carry troops and cargo, took off from a Marine Corps air base at Cherry Point, North Carolina on Monday and disappeared from radar over Mississippi, crashing in the late afternoon.

"A Marine Corps KC-130 transport aircraft crashed in LeFlore County, Mississippi, on July 10 at approximately 4:00 pm CDT (2100 GMT), claiming the lives of 16 service members," the Marine Corps said in a statement. The cause of the crash is under investigation. US President Donald Trump, in a tweet, said the news was "heartbreaking." "Melania and I send our deepest condolences to all!" he added. Mississippi congressman Steven Palazzo said on Twitter he was "devastated," and offered prayers for the families of the victims.

The plane crashed in a soybean field in a largely rural area in the western part of the state. All the victims were on the Marine Corps aircraft and there were no survivors, Leflore County emergency management director Fred Randle told CNN. Helicopter footage taken by local news station Fox 40 showed a large gash in a green field, with fiercely burning fires sending up plumes of black smoke. Firefighters sprayed the aircraft with huge layers of foam to quell the blaze.

Randle told NBC News that the scene was unsafe due to the presence of fuel. The FBI

was on hand, along with local and state emergency responders and investigators, he said. Mississippi Governor Phil Bryant called for prayers for "those hurting after this tragedy." "Our men and women in uniform risk themselves every day to secure our freedom," he said in a brief statement on Facebook. The names of the victims were being withheld pending notification of their next of kin.

Accidents involving US military aircraft are not uncommon, but rarely do they claim so many lives. The crash of a twin-engine C-23 Sherpa in the southern state of Georgia in March 2001 claimed the lives of 21 people. In April 2000, 19 people were killed in the crash of a Marine Corps MV-22 Osprey, a tilt-rotor aircraft that flies like a plane but can hover and land like a helicopter. — AFP

### IN SMALL-TOWN INDIA, BOOK HELPS GAY MEN COME OUT OF THE CLOSET

**CHENNAI:** Writing about the everyday him, sharing stories with him, crying, of his gay protagonist life Mohanaswamy, Indian author Vasudhendra was acutely aware of the fact that he himself had not yet found the courage to come out of the closet. For four years he wrote short stories inspired by his own life, his struggle to be open about his sexuality, his despair and frustration that nearly drove him to suicide - quietly breathing life into Mohanaswamy, the hero of his stories.

Just days before his book was first published in 2013, under a pseudonym in Kannada, the regional language of the southern state of Karnataka, he plucked up the courage to tell his sister that he was gay. "And with me and Mohanaswamy, many of my readers embraced their truth," the award winning Kannada writer said, adding that when he finally did reveal his identity, gay men from across Karnataka started calling laughing and talking.

"Many readers, who called me, from villages and small towns, do not read English and for them the Mohanaswamy series was a way to rediscover themselves and find solace in the fact that they were not alone," he said. The acclaimed series, which was recently translated in English, will also be published in other Indian languages, including Telugu and Malayalam in the coming months.

"Gay men don't only live in an urban setting. Thousands are growing up in villages and towns, with no way to access information on sexuality, most of which is available only in English," Vasudhendra, who goes by just one name, said. "More has to be written and it has to be written in the language people are familiar with." Since the stories were published gay women have approached him to write about their lives, frustrated that they

cannot even find magazine articles that Vasudhendra, who came out in his early reflect their situation.

"For women it is so much tougher because saying 'no' to a marriage is never an option," he said. "What they go through is something I cannot imagine because at least I got away by refusing to marry." There is no official data on the lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender (LGBT) population in India, but the government in the past has submitted in the Supreme Court that there are an estimated 2.5 million gay people in the country. Those numbers reflect only those who have self declared to the Health Ministry and will be far higher as many individuals conceal their identity fearing discrimination, campaigners say.

#### Healing process

"In Kannada literature, homosexuality has been portrayed in a very negative way, pushing it to the margins," said

40s. "It took me a long time because I also feared discrimination and lacked courage. Many go through their life keeping their sexuality a secret." The software engineer turned author vividly recalls a telephone call from an elderly man after the Mohanaswamy stories were published. "The man said he had regretted his marriage every single day," said Vasudhendra, 48.

"And when he read my book he relived his own struggle with his sexuality and the lie his life had been. I realized then that my story had resonated with people who live in small towns and villages, just like the one I grew up in." The series of 11 stories of homosexual love and lives explore sexuality, urbanization and class. Mohanaswamy talks about losing his partner to a woman, mentions an imaginary girlfriend to a fellow passenger on a plane while picturing the man he is in love with, losing friends, being shown around a flat by a real-estate agent who assumes he has a wife and children. "Mohanaswamy dreams of living a simple, dignified life that would allow him to leave, even forget, the humiliation and fears of adolescence, the slurs his mind still carries and the despair that made him crave to conform," is how the stories are described on the book jacket. While city readers have told the author these are "once upon a time in India" stories, rural readers say they are ahead of their time.

"Being gay is not easy, especially in small communities, where talking about it is taboo. It gives you many sleepless nights, there is constant pressure to get married and many friendships get ruined," said Vasudhendra. "Writing the stories was a healing process for me and for many of my readers, it was a book they understood."—Reuters

### **ISLAMIC STATE BUILT IN STAYING** POWER WITH GLOBAL JIHADIS

WASHINGTON: The Islamic State group's mix of a local insurgency and digitally-connected global jihadis gives the group staying power and the means to re-launch its future, from small cells of extremists escaping the war zone in Irag and Syria to those who never went there in the first place. The impending loss of Mosul and Raqqa cuts out the urban heart of its self-proclaimed caliphate, but the extremist organization has built-in plans to endure and has shown a degree of flexibility that will be difficult to counteract.

For more than a year, Islamic State has acknowledged the possibility of losing the territory that propelled it to the forefront of the global jihadi movement - and drew thousands of foreign fighters. Islamic State's goal since then has been to maintain its local and global support base in the face of overwhelming defeat. Whether it succeeds depends on what happens well after today's battles are over.

#### Escape cells

A first group of Islamic State fighters from Syria and Iraq numbering more than 100 arrived in Afghanistan at the beginning of February, followed by a smaller group, around 20, at the end of March, according to a UN report released last week. The group is unpopular among average Afghans, but shows traction among the young and, most importantly, receives ample funding from Islamic State's central command to pay new fighters triple what the Taliban offers - \$500 to \$600 a month.

The UN report said Islamic State has warned its Afghanistan contingent that it will soon need to be self-financing, an ominous sign for the organization that once pulled in millions of dollars in oil money, ransoms and extortion. Other groups of foreign fighters are feared to be trying to make their way back to Europe or North Africa, to ether plot attacks there or simply await orders. In Europe, this has fed fears of extremists hiding among the influx of migrants, while North Africa is "really unstable. ... It's awash in weaponry," said Colin Clarke, an analyst with the RAND think tank. Islamic State is "a global group but it's more regionally anchored. I don't see them taking up and traveling wholesale to another place. They're going to go where they have roots. They're going to seek out these weak states. They're going to insinuate themselves in local conflicts," he said.

Qaeda's branch there, then switched to what they believed was the winning side. Changing back will not be very difficult, Hoffman said. " Al-Qaeda has been waiting in the wings and been letting ISIS take all the heat," Hoffman said, using an alternative acronym for IS.

#### Fighting - or hiding - in place

Iraq and Syria themselves offer plenty of safe havens for local extremist fighters biding their time. At its height, IS held vast stretches of territory by promising not just brutality, but a religious government beyond corruption that would protect against arbitrary punishment, theft and graft in the service of a global movement for Sunni Muslims everywhere. The promises tapped especially into the grievances of Iraqi Sunnis, who felt abandoned by the Shiite-led government in Baghdad and were suspicious of the Kurdish government in Irbil.

Many in the US have called on the Iraqi government to ensure that Sunnis share in the country's gains going forward - a step that will prove especially complex given that Sunni areas have seen widespread destruction in the fight against the extremists. Block after block of shattered homes line the roads of Mosul, Fallujah and Ramadi. "It's almost at a new level of divisiveness and an unrelenting decade of bloodletting has made any sense of rebuilding a civil society unbelievably challenging," Hoffman said. Islamic State retains a powerful presence in Iraq's Anbar province and in the city of Tal Afar.

Islamic State's leadership still has a core of leaders from Saddam Hussein's Baathist organization, known for their survival skills and the support networks they built something the group's spokesman, Abu Muhammad Adnani, noted in a message before he was killed last summer in a US airstrike: To survive "whether Allah blesses us with consolidation or we move into the bare, open desert, displaced and pursued."

#### **Hostile takeover**

Many of Islamic State's foreign fighters, especially those from Europe, headed to Syria with the expectation of joining Al-

#### Revenge attacks

A major aspect of Islamic State's propaganda narrative has been to offer a haven to Sunnis worldwide and until recently its videos and photos made a point of tempering extreme brutality with images of abundant harvests, children at play and efficient, free medical care. Recently, however, its videos have depicted airstrikes destroying the caliphate, providing a powerful new message - vengeance. Last month's attack at London Bridge was claimed by Islamic State as revenge against the US-backed coalition, and the group pledged more violence to come.

With supporters from around the world linked by social media and thousands of pieces of propaganda, security officials in Europe and the US fear similar attacks are in the offing. At its height, Islamic State had tens of thousands of fighters at its disposal, though estimates varied widely. Airstrikes killed a vast percentage, the streams of Europeans heading to the war zone have dried up, and new recruits from the region are growing scarce, but its survival may not depend on numbers alone.

"The numbers may never be their 60,000 fighters or whatever, but the attraction of terrorism is the disproportionate effect a few people can have on the enemy societies and that'll be enough to keep it alive," Hoffman said. "The most visceral emotion we know is revenge. It is cathartic and self-satisfying and it becomes a duty."—AP

several airstrikes hitting the Old City neighborhood that was the scene of the fierce battle's final days. Plumes of smoke rose into the air as IS mortar shells landed near Iraqi positions and heavy gunfire could be heard on the western edge of the Old City. At times heavy, the clashes underscored the dangers still posed by the militants after Iragi forces announced they retook full control of Mosul, the country's secondlargest city, three years after it was seized by extremists bent on building a global caliphate.

Meanwhile, Amnesty International warned in a report released yesterday that the conflict in Mosul has created a "civilian catastrophe," with the extremists carrying out forced displacement, summary killings and using civilians as human shields. The report also detailed violations by Iraqi forces and the US-led coalition. "The scale and gravity of the loss of civilian lives during the military operation to retake Mosul must immediately be publicly acknowledged at the highest levels of government in Iraq and states that are part of the US-led coalition," said Lynn Maalouf, the research director for Mideast at Amnesty.

The report, which covers the first five months of this year, noted how IS fighters moved civilians with them around the city, preventing them from escaping, creating battle spaces with dense civilian populations while "Iragi forces and the US-led coalition failed to adapt their tactics." The Iraqi forces and the US-led coalition "continued to use imprecise, explosive weapons with wide area effects in densely populated urban environments," Amnesty stated, adding that some violations may constitute war crimes.

On Monday evening, Prime Minister Haider al-Abadi came to Mosul for the second day in a row to declare "total victory," flanked by his senior military leadership at a small base on the edge of the Old City. But he also alluded to the brutality of the conflict, saying the triumph had

#### respected in post-IS Mosul **Daily horrors**

Zeid Ra'ad al-Hussein described Mosul's fall as the "turning point" in the conflict against IS, but warned the group continues to subject people to "daily horrors" in its remaining strongholds of Tal Afar, west of Mosul, and Hawijah, north of Baghdad. "Horrific though the crimes of ISIS are, there is no place for vengeance," said Zeid, who is a Jordanian prince, using an alternative acronym for the Islamic State group. He cited allegations of threats of collective punishment and forced evictions in Mosul by Iragi security forces and their allies. He also cited three years of rights violations during IS' control of Mosul, including abuses like sexual slavery of women and girls that "have left deep scars on Iraqi society."

In Baghdad, Shiite politician Karim al-Nouri warned that defeating IS in Mosul doesn't mean that "terrorism" is finished and urged the government to review its policies for dealing with Sunni areas of the country to "avoid previous mistakes that led to the emergence" of IS. The government needs to work on "removing fears of marginalization and terrorism affiliation in Sunni areas," said al-Nouri, a senior member of Badr Organization. He said he believes the Iraqi security forces should stay in Mosul until it is fully secure, before handing over to local forces. Lawmaker Intisar al-Jabouri from Nineveh province, where Mosul is the capital, said that uprooting IS' "extremism ideology" was key for a peaceful future in Mosul, which reeled under the extremists' harsh rule for three years.

She urged Baghdad to invest in "good relations" between the residents and the security forces and take all "necessary measures to prevent terrorism groups from returning to Mosul." While Mosul fell to the Islamic State group in a matter of days in 2014, the campaign to retake

#### by coalition airstrikes slowly clawed back territo ry from IS elsewhere in Iraq, and tens of thousands of Iragi troops went through a massive coalition training program.

#### Caliphate

The IS defeat in Mosul dealt a huge blow to the group's so-called Islamic "caliphate" - territory that the militants seized, spanning large swaths of both Iraq and Syria - but also killed thousands, left entire neighborhoods in ruins and displaced nearly 900,000 from their homes. Thousands of civilians are estimated to have been killed in the fight for the city, according to the provincial council of Nineveh, where Mosul is the capital - a toll that does not include those still believed buried under collapsed buildings. Iraq's military does not release official casualty numbers for soldiers killed in combat.

A statement late Monday from IS claimed its fighters were still attacking Iraqi soldiers in the al-Maydan area of Mosul's Old City, purportedly killing and wounding many and seizing weapons and ammunition. "The soldiers of the caliphate in Mosul continue to accomplish epics until they achieve either victory or martyrdom," it said. Also Monday, the United Nations said that of the more than 897,000 people displaced from Mosul, thousands will probably not be able to return because of "extensive damage caused during the conflict."

"Make no mistake, this victory alone does not eliminate ISIS, and there's still a tough fight ahead," Lt. Gen. Stephen Townsend, the top US commander in Iraq said in a recorded video from Baghdad following al-Abadi's statement. ISIS is another acronym for IS, also referred to as Daesh, an Arabic name. "The coalition will continue to support our Iragi partners until ISIS is defeated in Irag," Townsend added, calling on Iraqis to unite and prevent a return of the conditions that allowed the extremists' rise more than three years ago.—AP

### US-BACKED FIGHTERS TAKE IS HELD VILLAGE OUTSIDE RAQA

BEIRUT: US-backed fighters said they have seized a village where the Islamic State group had a training camp and base near the jihadist stronghold of Raqa in northern Syria. The advance comes as the Syrian Democratic Forces militia, an alliance of Kurdish and Arab fighters, battles to oust IS from Raqa, one of their last remaining bastions in Syria. "The SDF has captured the village of Al-Akeryshi east of the city (of Raqa) and IS car bomb attacks attempting to take it back have failed," the alliance said late Monday.

The Syrian Observatory for Human Rights, a Britain-based monitor, said the village had been used by IS as both a military base and a training camp named after slain Al-Qaeda leader Osama bin Laden. But the jihadist group also carried out a massacre of up to 200 of its own members in the village in 2015, according to the monitor, executing fighters who were accused of seeking to leave its ranks.

The SDF has captured around 30 percent of Raqa city since it entered the IS bastion in June after a months-long operation to capture territory in the surrounding province.

The US-backed coalition fighting IS in Syria and Iraq has provided the SDF with key support ranging from air strikes to weaponry and advisors on the around.—AFP

### LIBYA CLASHES LEAVE FOUR DEAD IN E TRIPOLI

**TRIPOLI:** Clashes between forces loyal to Libya's unity government and rival fighters east of Tripoli have left four people dead including at least two civilians, the health ministry said. Another 21 people were wounded in the fighting on Sunday and Monday in Garabulli about 60 kilometers east of the capital, the ministry said overnight on Facebook. Two foreign workers, whose nationalities were unclear, were among those killed, it said.

Clashes broke out on Sunday evening between forces loyal to the Government of National Accord and fighters aligned with former prime minister Khalifa Ghweil who refuses to recognize the UN-backed government in Tripoli, witnesses said. The violence was continued at dawn yesterday, they said. Pro-GNA forces backed by dozens of tanks and pickup trucks mounted with anti-aircraft guns deployed east of the capital heading for Garabulli on the weekend, the witnesses said.

On Friday the GNA warned groups it described as "outlaws" against attempting to advance on Tripoli, adding that it had instructed security forces to prevent an assault on the capital. Libya has been wracked by chaos since the 2011 toppling of dictator Moamer Kadhafi, with various militias and administrations vying for control of the oil-rich country. A rival authority based in the country's east has refused to recognize the GNA since it started working in Tripoli in March last year.—AFP

### THOUSANDS MOURN SREBRENICA MASSACRE VICTIMS

SREBRENICA: Thousands gathered in Srebrenica yesterday to mark the 1995 massacre of some 8,000 Bosnian Muslims, Europe's worst atrocity since World War II, with some giving their loved ones a proper burial for the first time. The remains of 71 victims of the bloodshed, considered genocide by international justice, will be laid to rest in a joint funeral at a memorial cemetery in Potocari, near Srebrenica. They include seven people who were under 18 when they were killed and a 33-year-old woman.

Adela Efendic said she had come to "finally say goodbye" to her father Senaid, who was 35 when he was killed. "His remains were found nine years ago in a common grave, but only a few bones," the 22-year-old said, her head covered with a violet veil and tears streaming down her cheeks. "We were

waiting hoping to find more, but noth- tims were found in some 80 mass graves ing turned up... We decided to bury him now so his bones find peace," said Efendic, who was only 20 days old when her father died.

"I have only one photo of him, a small one, like for an ID card. But my mother told me a lot about him ... it allows me to imagine him." Bosnian Serb forces captured the eastern Bosnian town, a UNprotected enclave at the time, on July 11, 1995, five months before the end of Bosnia's inter-ethnic war. In the following days they summarily killed some 8,000 Muslim men and boys. So far the remains of 6,429 Srebrenica victims have been buried at the memorial site and 233 in other cemeteries, according to Bosnia's institute of missing people.

The remains of more than 1,000 other victims still have to be located. The vicof which the last one was discovered in December 2015. Among the identified victims there were 22 women and some 440 children who were under 18 when they were killed, according to the institute. In 2016, a UN tribunal found Bosnian Serb wartime leader Radovan Karadzic guilty of genocide over his role in the atrocity and sentenced him to 40 years in jail.

Bosnian Serb wartime military chief Ratko Mladic is expecting a verdict by the International Criminal Tribunal for the former Yugoslavia (ICTY) in November. Bosnian Serbs still deny the Srebrenica massacre was an act of genocide, although international courts have ruled so. Bosnia's 1992-1995 war between its Croats, Muslims and Serbs claimed some 100,000 lives.—AFP

### VENEZUELA ENTERS CRUCIAL WEEK IN **BATTLE OVER CONSTITUTION REWRITE**

### **OPPOSITION TO HOLD ITS OWN SYMBOLIC PUBLIC VOTE**

**CARACAS:** Pro- and anti-government groups are battling fiercely for public support over a contested plan by embattled President Nicolas Maduro to have a new body elected this month to rewrite the constitution. The opposition, energized by the release from jail of one of its emblematic leaders, Leopoldo Lopez, is leading the charge against the new assembly to be chosen in a July 30 election. On Monday it organized a demonstration in Caracas, during which dozens of protesters and some security force personnel confronting them were injured. Unrest also spread to other cities.

On Sunday, the opposition will hold its own

In what could be an ominous sign of violence yet to come, a candidate for Maduro's constitutional assembly was shot to death Monday in Maracay, capital of the central state of Aragua. According to the Telesur news channel, Jose Luis Rivas, 42, was gunned down at a campaign event.

#### Dictatorship

The Venezuelan president, who rules over a once flush oil-rich nation reduced to penury, has been accused by the influential Catholic Church of turning the country into a "military dictatorSaturday from prison, where he had been kept since 2014 on charges of inciting violence. He is serving the rest of his 14-year sentence under home detention in the capital, although his lawyers said they are looking to have that restriction lifted too, so he is completely free.

On Sunday—the 100th day of the protest wave against Maduro — 4,000 demonstrators marched against the president, some of them wearing T-shirts with Lopez's face and carrying banners that read: "One hundred days and I continue to rebel against tyranny." "I reiterate my commitment to fighting until Venezuela's freedom is won," Lopez said in a statement read by a leader of his party. The opposition also said it would continue to press for the liberation of 400 other detainees it describes as "political prisoners," but who the government insists are common criminals.

#### Possible talks?

One analyst, Luis Vicente Leon, said switching Lopez from prison to house arrest suggested the government hoped to lower tensions, and that political negotiations now seemed possible. Maduro especially wanted to avoid fractures within the army, without which his grip on power would end, he said. Other observers noted that the opposition leader's release came three days after pro-Maduro militants wielding sticks and pipes stormed parliament and beat lawmakers, injuring at least seven, during a nine-hour assault.

Maduro publicly condemned the violence and said he had ordered an investigation. The officer in charge of parliamentary security was on Monday charged with human rights violations for allowing the attack to happen. Inside Maduro's own camp, there are voices of dissent. The country's attorney general, Luisa Ortega, a strong supporter of Maduro's late predecessor and mentor Hugo Chavez, has come out against the constitutional assembly and criticized government and military actions. Venezuela's Supreme Court is holding legal proceedings against Ortega and is due to rule this week on whether to suspend her from office and put her on trial. A grouping of Latin American and Spanish attorneys general, AIAMP, is to hold an extraordinary meeting in Argentina on Thursday to discuss Ortega's situation. The body has already held two similar gatherings on the same issue. In the most recent one last month, it voiced support for Ortega and slammed the "illegal" pressure against her. —AFP

### RUSSIAN AID CENTRE IN SERBIA REBUFFS SPY FEARS

**NIS, Serbia:** Showing off tents, lifeboats and other rescue equipment at the Russian-Serbian Humanitarian Centre, codirector Viacheslav Vlasenko laughs at Western suspicions that his workplace is a front for a spy operation. Russia is often perceived as a big brother figure to Serbia, a fellow Slavic and Orthodox Christian nation. Moscow backs Belgrade, for example, in refusing to recognize the independence of Kosovo, a former Serbian province. As Serbia and other Balkan countries pursue European Union membership, however, Russia has stepped up efforts to boost its regional influence.

#### **Balkan chessboard**

Last month Montenegro joined NATO-to Moscow's anger-effectively completing the Western alliance's control of the Adriatic coast. Albania and Croatia have been members since 2009. The development came several months after an alleged attempt to overthrow the government in Podgorica, a murky affair in which Montenegrin prosecutors said "Russian state bodies" were involved with the aim of preventing NATO accession. Moscow denies the accusations.

The EU's foreign policy chief Federica Mogherini warned in March, when asked about Russia's role in the region, that the Balkans "can easily become one of the chessboards where the big power game

#### **Nefarious activities**

At a US Senate hearing last month on "Strengthening Democracy and Countering Malign Foreign Influence" in southeast Europe, US Deputy Assistant Secretary of State Hoyt Brian Yee expressed concerns over "this so-called humanitarian centre". He feared "not so much what it is now, but what it might become if it receives what Russia has been asking from Serbia, which is some kind of special status to protect it, diplomatic status or other immunity". Yee noted the centre's proximity to the border with Kosovo.

"If (Serbia) allows Russia to create some kind of special centre for espionage or other nefarious activities it will lose control over part of its territory," the senior US official said. Spying plans or not, the project is aiding Russia's drive to win hearts and minds in the region. Certificates of appreciation for its aid in times of crisis line the entrance foyer. The centre has also helped to clear explosives remaining from NATO's bombing of Serbia in 1999 during the Kosovo war, an episode that still fuels deep skepticism towards NATO among Serbs. Opinion polls in Serbia regularly show more favorable views of Russia than the EU-even though European funding far outweighs that from Moscow.

And Belgrade refused to join Europe in imposing sanctions on Russia over the Ukraine crisis. Serbian authorities have taken a cautious wait-and-see attitude towards granting the centre immunity-some have spoken in favor, but the country's strongman, President Aleksandar Vucic, has so far resisted it. The controversy is symbolic of the "real mistrust" between Russia and the West, according to Aleksandra Joksimovic, head of the Centre for Foreign Policy, a Belgrade-based non-governmental organization. "I think Serbia is closely watching how not to cross red lines on one side or the other," she said.—AFP

### **UNWELL WALESA A NO-SHOW** AT POLISH ANTI-GOVT PROTEST

WARSAW: Around 2,000 people on Monday took part in an anti-government street protest in Warsaw, though Polish freedom icon Lech Walesa was unable to attend because of health problems. The demonstration was held in opposition to a monthly march carried out by governing Law and Justice (PiS) party leader Jaroslaw Kaczynski in memory of his twin brother Lech, Poland's president at the time, and 95 other people who were killed when the presidential jet crashed in Russia in 2010. Opponents say Kaczynski uses the monthly event to mobilize supporters and attack centrist critics.

The Polish government is being probed by the European Union over perceived threats to the rule of law, and Walesa has previously questioned whether Kaczynski is seeking to turn Poland into "a dictatorship". Surrounded by a heavy police presence, the anti-Kaczynski protesters chanted. "Lech Walesa, freedom, equality, democracy" and placed white roses on the police cars.

The 73-year-old Nobel peace laureate,

who had been planning to attend the protest, announced Saturday he would be a no-show after he was taken to hospital for tests related to his high blood pressure. But fellow communist-era dissident Wladyslaw Frasyniuk, who was arrested at an earlier anti-government protest, attended the demonstration. "The government is afraid. It has put up a fence between it and the people," Frasyniuk said at the protest, in reference to the metal barriers installed along the avenue leading to the presidential palace.

Kaczynski for his part addressed his supporters-numbering a couple of thousandsaying "we can't hesitate. We can't quit the path we're on: that of the reconstruction of Polish democracy." Shipyard electrician Walesa won the Nobel Peace Prize in 1983 for leading Solidarity, the Soviet bloc's only free trade union, and became Poland's first democratically elected president in 1990. His boldness in standing up to the communist regime is still widely respected, but his divisive presidency earned him scorn from many Poles.—AFP

### EUROPE COURT UPHOLDS BAN ON FULL-FACE VEIL IN BELGIUM

Human Rights yesterday upheld a Belgian ban on wearing the full-face niqab veil in public. The court ruled that the restriction sought to guarantee social cohesion, the "protection of the rights and freedoms of others" and that it was "necessary in a democratic society", a statement said. Belgian banned the wearing of the full-face veil under a June 2011 law. It prohibits appearing in public "with a face masked or hidden, in whole or in part, in such a way as to be unidentifiable".

Violations can result in fines and up to seven days in jail. France was the first European country to ban the niqab in April 2011. The European Court of Human Rights

STRASBOURG: The European Court of had already ruled on a challenge to the French law in 2014 when it also rejected arguments that the restriction breached religious freedom and individual human rights. The Belgian case was brought by two Muslim women, Samia Belcacemi, a Belgian national, and Yamina Oussar, a Moroccan.

Both women said they chose of their own free will to wear the niqab and claimed their rights had been infringed and the law was discriminatory. After Belgium introduced the ban, Belcacemi continued wearing the veil for a while but stopped because of social pressure and fears she would be fined. Oussar told the court that she had decided to stay at home, the statement from the court said.—AFP

### US SOLDIER ARRESTED AFTER PLEDGING LOYALTY TO IS

HONOLULU: An active duty US soldier was arrested on terrorism charges after authorities say he pledged allegiance to the Islamic State group and said he wanted to "kill a bunch of people." The FBI arrested Sgt. 1st Class Ikaika Kang, 34, in a suburb of Honolulu over the weekend after a yearlong investigation involving multiple undercover officers and confidential informants. He made an initial appearance in federal court on Monday.

Kang's court-appointed defense attorney, Birney Bervar, said it appears his client may suffer from service-related mental health issues of which the government was aware but neglected to treat. Bervar declined to elaborate. He said Kang was "a decorated veteran of two deployments" to Iraq and Afghanistan. A 26-page affidavit from FBI Special Agent Jimmy Chen filed in court Monday detailed how Kang thought he was dealing with people working for Islamic State but who were actually undercover agents.

Paul Delacourt, the FBI special agent in charge of the Hawaii bureau, said Kang gave military documents to people he believed would give them to Islamic State, but none of them got to the organization. He told reporters the FBI believed Kang was a lone actor and wasn't affiliated with anyone who poses a threat. On Saturday, agents arrested him after he pledged loyalty to Islamic State leader Abu Bakr al-Baghdadi and said he wanted to "take his rifle, his magazines and kill 'a bunch of people."

Kang and the agents together made combat training videos he believed would be taken to the Middle East to help prepare the group's soldiers to fight American forces, according to the affidavit. Kang had received the highest level of combat training available in the Army and was a mixed martial arts enthusiast. Also on Saturday, Kang and an undercover agent allegedly went shopping for a drone to give to Islamic State fighters.

Kang said the drone would allow the fighters to view the battlefield from above "to find tank positions and avenues for escape" from US soldiers, the affidavit said. He used his debit card to pay nearly \$1,400 for the drone, Go-Pro camera, and related equipment. The agent paid him \$700 to split the cost. Kang, a trained air traffic controller based at Hawaii's Wheeler Army Airfield, had his military clearance revoked in 2012 for making pro-Islamic State comments while at work and on-post and threatening to hurt or kill fellow service members. —AP

### **AFGHAN-AMERICAN FEMALE PILOT SEEKS TO INSPIRE YOUNG WOMEN**

**KABUL:** An Afghan-American female pilot on a solo flight around the world seeking to inspire young women across the globe has taken a detour to visit her native Afghanistan - and meet the country's president and civil society activists seeking to safeguard women's rights. Shaesta Waiz left her single-engine plane in Dubai, the United Arab Emirates, to take a commercial flight to Kabul where she arrived on Monday night. The 29-yearold said her Beechcraft Bonanza A36 was not suited for flying over the mountainous terrain of her native country.

Waiz, the first female pilot from Afghanistan, began her journey in Florida in May and has since made stops in 11 countries, with eight more to complete her mission. "The whole purpose of this flight around the world is not to set a world record," Waiz said during a welcoming ceremony by government officials and civil society activists in Kabul. "The purpose of this trip is to inspire young ed to parliament. Waiz and her family girls and boys to believe in themselves, to believe on what they are capable of doing, regardless of where they are from or the challenges you had faced in your life."

Afghan President Ashraf Ghani welcomed Waiz at his office later in the evening and told her how much he admired her courage. Waiz, in turn, promised Afghan women that once her world trip is done, she would come back and find ways to help them. Much has changed for Afghan women since the Taliban were ejected from power 16 years ago. During their rule, women were not permitted to attend school or work, were largely confined to their homes, and subject to public beatings for violations of strict rules on what they could wear in public.

Now millions of Afghan girls go to school, compared to practically none in 2001, and many women work for the government and security services, run their own business, and are electmoved in 1987 to the United States where she got her pilot's license, becoming the youngest certified female pilot from Afghanistan. She took off from Daytona Beach in Florida in May and has mapped out a route that will take her aboard approximately 25,800 kilometers around 19 countries, including Canada,

Spain, Britain, Italy, Greece, Egypt, Bahrain, India, Singapore and Australia, before ending the trip back in the US in August. Waiz's father, Fahim Waiz Atghandiwal, who accompanied her on the visit to Kabul, said each and every girl needs the support of her family - especially the support of her parents - to achieve her goal and turn dreams into reality. After returning to Dubai, Waiz said she will continue her voyage to India as she seeks to become the first Afghan-American woman to accomplish a solo flight around the world.—AP

### **GUNMEN KILL EIGHT IN THAILAND**

BANGKOK: Eight relatives, including three children, were killed by gunmen posing as government officials in Thailand's Krabi province, police said yesterday, a mass slaving investigators believe was sparked by a personal conflict. Police say a gang of around six or seven men, dressed in camouflage outfits, stormed a house in the southern province around 4.00 pm on Monday. They took ten people hostage and waited for the owner of the property-a local village chief-to return.

"Around 8 pm the owner arrived, all of them (the victims) were handcuffed and blindfolded until midnight when gunmen opened fire," Chaiwut Buathong, chief of Ao Luek district, said. Six died at the scene and two others died in hospital, Chaiwut said, adding three of the victims were girls aged under 15. Three others were taken to hospital with one in critical condition. Deputy national police spokesman Krissana Pattanacharoen told reporters the victims came from a local Muslim family and that the gunmen "claimed to be officials who wanted to check on illegal activity". Photos taken by medical workers showed two bodies slumped on a bloodsplattered children's bed, with a teddy bear thrown to one side. Police said they are still investigating possible motives, including a property dispute between the village chief and locals who occupied public land in his community. "Personally I believe that the motive is a serious personal conflict," said national police chief Chaktip Chaijinda, who flew down to Krabi to lead the investigation. Firearm ownership is common in Thailand and the country boasts one of the highest gun-related homicide rates in Asia.

But while petty arguments and disputes frequently turn deadly, mass organized killings are rare. Krabi province is a popular holiday destination boasting beaches like Ao Nang and Rai Ley, though Monday's killings took place in an area removed from the main tourist drags. The province boasts a large Muslim community who have lived in the region for centuries. They are Thai speakers and ethnically different from the Malay-speaking Muslims in the country's three southernmost provinces where a violent nationalist insurgency has raged against the central government for more than a decade.—AFP

## SAN DIEGO LIKELY IN RANGE OF N KOREA ICBM IN TWO YEARS

### NK'S FIRST ICBM TEST, GIFT TO AMERICA

SEOUL: North Korea's intercontinental ballistic missile is "likely" to be able to deliver a 500 kilogram warhead to San Diego within two years, a US monitoring group said yesterday, after its launch sparked global alarm last week. The isolated, nuclear-armed state's first successful ICBM test was described by leader Kim Jong-Un as a gift to "American b\*\*\*\*rds". The Hwasong-14 missile is currently estimated to have a range of 7,000-8,000 kilometers-enough to reach Alaska or Hawaii-aerospace engineer John Schilling wrote on the respected 38 North website, a monitoring project linked to Johns Hopkins university.

"If the Hwasong-14 is put together the way we think it is, it can probably do a bit better than that when all the bugs are worked out," he wrote, projecting a range of 9,700 kilometers with a 500 kg warhead on board. "The North Koreans won't be able to achieve this performance tomorrow, but they likely will eventually," he added. At present it would be "lucky to hit even a city-sized target", he said, citing limits to its rewith enough accuracy to destroy soft military targets like naval bases", such as that at San Diego in California. The North's missile technology-which it is banned from developing by the UN Security Council-has advanced rapidly under Kim, ramping up

tensions between Pyongyang and Washington.

The impoverished state has also staged five nuclear tests-including two last year. Washington is to propose tougher UN sanctions against the North, but analysts say they will have a limited impact unless China-the North's sole major ally and economic lifeline-steps up pressure on its neighbor. Beijing is reluctant to risk destabilizing the North, fearing a potential influx of refugees along the frontier or US troops stationed on its border in a unified Korea.—AFP



### INDIA'S TOP COURT STAYS **BAN ON CATTLE SLAUGHTER**

**NEW DELHI:** India's top court yesterday stayed a nationwide ban imposed by Prime Minister Narendra Modi's government on the sale of cattle for slaughter that had provoked outcry in many states. The Supreme Court upheld a decision by a lower court staying the ban imposed in May, which prohibited the sale and purchase of cows-an animal considered sacred for Hindus-for slaughter. The sudden ruling had sparked protests against what many saw as an overreach by the Hindu-right Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP), and many states where cow slaughter was legal vowed to fight the decree.

Petitioners in the southern state of Tamil Nadu launched the first challenge, claiming the ban infringed their right to eat what they choose, a flashpoint issue in the Hindu-majority nation. Allegations of cow slaughter and beef consumption against Muslims and other minorities have triggered murders and violent reprisals in India, where many are vegetarian. "This is a welcome ruling and we expect the court will now look into the constitutional validity of the order," Ajmal Khan, the lawyer who represented petitioners in Tamil Nadu, said. "Our stand is vindicated."

In its ruling, the Supreme Court said the

government had already given it a commitment that it would review the rules on the sale of cattle for slaughter. Some states organized beef festivals in the days after the ban was announced to protest the measure, while counter rallies by BJP supporters saw cows adorned with flowers. The national government said the ban aimed to regulate the industry and ensure the welfare of animals, which often suffer cruelty in markets. But it threatened to constrain India's supply of beef and leather, two lucrative export industries worth billions.

A separate legal challenge against the ban was rejected by a court in Kerala, a southern state that along with a handful of provinces allow cow slaughter. Killing cows, as well as the possession or consumption of beef, is banned in most but not all Indian states. Some impose up to life imprisonment for infringements. The federal ban affected not just the trade in cows but bulls, bullocks, buffaloes, calves and camels. Modi's BJP pledged to impose a countrywide ban on the slaughter of cows ahead of the 2014 national elections, but the federal government failed to persuade opposition parties to back such a law. —AFP

### **BANGLADESH ARRESTS** SUSPECT IN MURDER OF **ROHINGYA LEADERS**

DHAKA: Bangladesh police have arrested a man suspected of murdering two Rohingya leaders in the country's southeast where tens of thousands from the group are living in camps after fleeing persecution in Myanmar, an official said yesterday. Dhaka estimates that 400,000 Rohingya refugees are now in Bangladesh, with 70,000 arriving since October when Myanmar security forces launched a brutal crackdown on the minority group in neighboring Rakhine state in response to militant attacks on police posts.

Dost Mohammad, a 32-year-old Rohingya man, was arrested Sunday from one of the many squalid camps in Bangladesh's coastal district of Cox's Bazar, which borders Rakhine and where thousands of the ethnic Muslim minority now live in grinding poverty. Police said Mohammad was caught at Nayapara camp in possession of firearms, ammunition and drugs after a long manhunt. "He is a key suspect in the murder of two refugee leaders," local police chief Mainuddin Khan said.

The arrest comes amid reports that young Rohingya in the Bangladeshi camps are trying to join insurgents in Myanmar. A Rohingya shopkeeper in Nayapara said on condition of anonymity that Mohammad and his group fought with others in the camps. "They are like a bunch of hooligans. Many say they are members of RSO," he said, referring to a Rohingya insurgent group who were active in the Bangladeshi Rohingya refugee camps in the early 1990s but are now widely considered defunct.

Other community leaders described Mohammad as "short tempered" but said the murder allegations were "baseless". "His father lives in Saudi Arabia, and sister in Australia. They regularly send him money, he didn't work. He quarreled with others in the camp," said Mirza Ghalib, a Rohingya refugee from the Nayapara camp. "But killing someone or possessing illegal weapons is an unbelievable accusation against him." Local law enforcement often blames the Rohingya for crimes including drug trafficking.

Police arrested several Rohingya men over an attack on a police checkpoint in Bangladesh last year when the commander of the checkpoint was killed. Bangladesh has floated the idea of relocating tens of thousands of Rohingva refugees to a remote island off its coast, despite opposition from rights groups.—AFP

### AFGHANISTAN COMBAT VET CHARGED WITH KILLING WIFE

**NEW YORK:** A New York state police trooper responding to reports of gunfire was shot to death by a soldier who had just killed his wife at their home near his Army base, authorities said Monday. Trooper Joel Davis was approaching the couple's home in rural Theresa, near the Canadian border, when Staff Sgt. Justin Walters shot him in the torso with a rifle, leaving him in a roadside ditch, police and court documents said. Another trooper arrived and found Davis, who died about an hour later at a hospital.

Walters' wife, Nichole Walters, was found dead in the driveway, with multiple


gunshot wounds. A female friend of hers, who was living on the property, also was shot, suffering non-life-threatening injuries, police said. Davis, 36, had been a state police trooper for four years, after 10 years as a county sheriff's deputy in the area, police and friends said. "He truly did love being a law enforcement officer," family friend Chris Fletcher said. "One of his last texts to another one

of his cousins was he couldn't believe he got paid to do what he does."

Gov. Andrew Cuomo said "the entire New York family grieves" for Davis, a married father of three teenagers who was commissioner of a youth baseball league in his tight-knit community. State police Superintendent George P Beach II noted that signs had already sprung up around the area to pay tribute to Davis. "It's not just the police who suffer a loss like this," Beach said. Justin Walters, 32, was barefoot and clad only in shorts when he was taken to a town court around 4 am Monday to be charged with murder.

He was in an orange jail uniform and shackles when he was re-arraigned Monday evening in LeRay Town Court, where he was ordered held without bail for grand jury action. His assigned lawyer, Eric Swartz, waived a preliminary hearing. He said the next appearance would be in Jefferson County Court later. He wouldn't comment further, saying he had only met Walters minutes before court. Walters, a native of Zeeland, Michigan, joined the Army in 2007 and did two one-year tours in Afghanistan, in 2009 and again from March 2011 to March 2012, Army officials said. He was stationed at Fort Drum, home of the 10th Mountain Division.

Fort Drum's senior commander, Maj. Gen. Walter E Piatt, called the slain trooper a hero. "It takes an uncommon valor to run toward acts of terrible violence, to sacrifice for the safety of strangers," Piatt said. Cuomo, a Democrat, called Davis' death "yet another sad reminder of the risks law enforcement officers face each day." Davis

### JAPAN FLOODS DEATH TOLL RISES TO 25

**TOKYO:** The death toll from torrential rains and flooding that swept through Japan's south has reached 25, the government said yesterday, as rescue teams battled through thick mud to rescue more than 100 still stranded. Further downpours were predicted to pound Kyushu after swathes of the southwestern island were devastated last week by overflowing rivers-sweeping away roads, houses and schools and forcing thousands of people into makeshift shelters. But many remain stranded, with emergency

services struggling to reach them amid treacherous conditions.

Some 150 people were still cut off as of Monday evening in hardest-hit Fukuoka and Oita prefectures, according to local government officials. A total of 25 people have died while at least 25 remain unaccounted for, Chief Cabinet Secretary Yoshihide Suga told reporters yesterday. Some 12,000 rescuers were making "utmost" efforts to find survivors and clear washed up driftwood hampering the search, Suga said.—AFP

### SPECIAL CLASS ON HOW TO SURVIVE SHOOTING IN RIO

eachers in violence-wracked Rio de Janeiro started a new course on Monday - they are learning how to react to the shootings and violence plaguing the host city of last year's Olympic Games. Some 40 teachers attended the course organized by the International Committee of the Red Cross, and each educator will go back and instruct colleagues in their own schools on how to deal with a variety of violent incidents.

"It's a question of knowing how to manage each situation - how to react during a shooting, for example. These are simple courses of action that can make a real difference," said Lorenzo Caraffi, regional director of the ICRC in Latin America. Rio has more than 1,500 public schools, a third of them located in areas deemed to be at risk from violence. Since the start of the academic year, only seven of 120 school days have passed without at least one of the city's schools being shut down because of outbreaks of violence.

Rio is in the grip of an increasingly bloody war between rival drug gangs operating in its favelas - the poorer communities that lack adequate infrastructure or police, but which are home to a quarter of the city's six million inhabitants. Residents can all too often find themselves pinned down by gunfire, especially when the quasi-military police force battles with gangs in pitched shootouts. On Monday, as the first class on dealing with violence began, 18 schools were closed due to a police raid on the City of God favela, made famous in the movie of the same name by director Fernando Meirelles, who also orchestrated the opening ceremony of last year's Olympics.

"The situation has really got much worse recently, so it's important to have extra tools available to deal with these chaotic situations," said Emiliane Tinoco, one of the educators taking part in the course. Tinoco coordinates human resources for schools in Rio's poorer northern zone where 13-year-old Maria Eduarda was killed by a stray bullet in her school on March 30. "Teachers know from experience that when a shooting breaks out, you have to lead the kids into a corridor and lie down. But they often feel very alone when faced with these stressful situations," she said.

The daily newspaper O Globo said that 632 people had been hit by stray bullets in Rio between January 1 and July 2, an average of three a day. Sixty-seven of them died of their wounds. "We are not going to solve the problem from one day to the next, but we can't just do nothing," said Rio's public schools chief Cesar Benjamin. "Education is like Stalingrad - it's the last bastion which must be defended whatever the cost," he said, referring to the World War II battle in the former Soviet Union. — AFP



### TECH COMPANIES WAGE WAR ON MOSQUITOES

Merican technology companies are bringing automation and robotics to the age-old task of battiling mosquitoes in a bid to halt the spread of Zika and other mosquito-borne maladies worldwide. Firms including Microsoft Corp and California life sciences company Verily are forming partnerships with public health officials in several US states to test new high-tech tools. In Texas, Microsoft is testing a smart trap to isolate and capture Aedes aegypti mosquitoes, known Zika carriers, for study by entomologists to give them a jump on predicting outbreaks.

Verily, Alphabet's life sciences division based in Mountain View, California, is speeding the process for creating sterile male mosquitoes to mate with females in the wild, offering a form of birth control for the species. While it may take years for these advances to become widely available, public health experts say new players brings fresh thinking to vector control, which still relies heavily on traditional defenses such as larvicides and insecticides. "It's exciting when technology companies come on board," said Anandasankar Ray, an associate professor of entomology at the University of California, Riverside. "Their approach to a biological challenge is to engineer a solution." robotics, infrared sensors, machine learning and cloud computing to help health officials keep tabs on potential disease carriers. Texas recorded six cases of local mosquito transmission of Zika in November and December of last year. Experts believe the actual number is likely higher because most infected people do not develop symptoms.

Pregnant women are at high risk because they can pass the virus to their fetuses, resulting in a variety of birth defects. Those include microcephaly, a condition in which infants are born with undersized skulls and brains. The World Health Organization declared Zika a global health emergency in Feb 2016. Most conventional mosquito traps capture all comers - moths, flies, other mosquito varieties leaving a pile of specimens for entomologists to sort through. The Microsoft machines differentiate insects by measuring a feature unique to each species: the shadows cast by their beating wings. When a trap detects an Aedes aegypti in one of its 64 chambers, the door slams shut.

The machine "makes a decision about whether to trap it," said Ethan Jackson, a Microsoft engineer who is developing the device. The Houston tests, begun last summer, showed the traps could detect Aedes aegypti and other medically important mosquitoes with 85 percent accuracy, Jackson said. The machines also record shadows made by other insects as well as environmental conditions such as temperature and humidity. The data can be used to build models to predict where and when mosquitoes are active. Mustapha Debboun, director of Harris County's mosquito and vector control division, said the traps save time and give researchers more insight into mosquito behavior. "For science and research, this is a dream come true," he said. The traps are prototypes now. But Microsoft's Jackson said the company eventually hopes to sell them for a few hundred dollars each, roughly the price of conventional traps. The goal is to spur wide adoption, particularly in developing countries, to detect potential epidemics before they start. "What we hope is (the traps) will allow us to bring more precision to public health," Jackson said. SORTING MOSQUI-TOES WITH ROBOTS Other companies, meanwhile, are

developing technology to shrink mosquito populations by rendering male Aedes aegypti mosquitoes sterile. When these sterile males mate with females in the wild, their eggs don't hatch. The strategy offers an alternative to chemical pesticides. But it requires the release of millions of laboratory-bred mosquitoes into the outdoors. Males don't bite, which has made this an easier sell to places now hosting tests.

Oxitec, an Oxford, England-based division of Germantown, Maryland-based Intrexon Corp, is creating male mosquitoes genetically modified to be sterile. It has already deployed them in Brazil, and is seeking regulatory approval for tests in Florida and Texas. MosquitoMate Inc, a startup formed by researchers at the University of Kentucky, is using a naturally occurring bacterium called Wolbachia to render male mosquitoes sterile.

One of the biggest challenges is sorting the sexes. At MosquitoMate's labs in Lexington, immature mosquitoes are forced through a sieve-like mechanism that separates the smaller males from the females. These mosquitoes are then hand sorted to weed out any stray females that slip through. "That's basically done using eyeballs," said Stephen Dobson, MosquitoMate's chief executive.

### TANZANIA WOMEN STREET COOKS HOPE FOR SAFETY, LOANS

t's nearly midday at the bustling Tegeta bus terminal in Tanzania's biggest city and Olivia Mbiku is busy preparing ugali - a popular maize meal - beef stew and vegetables for her customers. "I wake up early, light up the fire and rush to the market to buy meat, cooking oil, tomatoes and everything I need for the day," said the 25-year-old mother of two. Shrouded in a cloud of smoke, and with a traditional colorful 'khanga' tied round her waist, Mbiku takes some maize flour from a sachet and sprinkles it into boiling water while briskly stirring with a stick to make it stiff. "I cook ugali every day because most of my customers like it," Mbiku told the Thomson Reuters Foundation. "It's not a lucrative business, but I get enough to feed my family."

Mbiku is among dozens of food vendors trying to earn a living amid the hubbub of the Dar es Salaam bus terminal, where conductors hoot and yell to attract customers. She works eight hours and day, earning around 45,000 shillings (\$20) to supplement her husband's income as a mason. But unlike licensed hawkers who work from rows of wooden stalls, Mbiku cooks in the open air and is often harassed by the city militias for selling food without the proper papers. "They often seize my cooking pots and sometimes lock me up. I have to pay some money to be released and get my stuff back," she said.

Mbiku and other women with unlicensed businesses finally have a glimmer of hope after the Tanzanian government last month announced it would recognize them as part of its broader policy of empowering women. Maria Ezekiel, 31, who has a stall serving chicken soup, chapatti and tea along the busy Bagamoyo highway each morning, said the move to formalize micro-enterprises like hers was an important milestone for smallscale entrepreneurs. A license would allow her to apply for credit to upgrade her business, she said. — Reuters

#### **Smart Traps**

The Zika epidemic that emerged in Brazil in 2015 and left thousands of babies suffering from birth defects has added urgency to the effort. While cases there have slowed markedly, mosquitoes capable of carrying the virus - Aedes aegypti and Aedes albopictus - are spreading in the Americas, including large swaths of the southern United States. The vast majority of the 5,365 Zika cases reported in the United States so far are from travelers who contracted the virus elsewhere. Still, two states - Texas and Florida have recorded cases transmitted by local mosquitoes, making them prime testing grounds for new technology.

In Texas, 10 mosquito traps made by Microsoft are operating in Harris County, which includes the city of Houston. Roughly the size of large birdhouses, the devices use Enter Verily. The company is automating mosquito sorting with robots to make it faster and more affordable. Company officials declined to be interviewed. But on its website, Verily says it's combining sensors, algorithms and "novel engineering" to speed the process. Verily and MosquitoMate have teamed up to test their technology in Fresno, California, where Aedes aegypti arrived in 2013.

Officials worry that residents who contract Zika elsewhere could spread it in Fresno if they're bitten by local mosquitoes that could pass the virus to others. "That is very much of a concern because it is the primary vector for diseases such as dengue, chikungunya and obviously Zika," said Steve Mulligan, manager of the Consolidated Mosquito Abatement District in Fresno County. The study, which still needs state and federal approval, is slated for later this summer. — Reuters

### COUP TAKES TOLL ON TURKEY FOREIGN POLICY

The consequences of the failed July 15 coup in Turkey increased Ankara's international isolation, exposing shortcomings in the government's sometimes overambitious foreign policy, analysts say. NATO member and EU membership hopeful Turkey had expected an outpouring of solidarity after the coup attempt one year ago aimed at ousting President Recep Tayyip Erdogan, which Ankara blames on the US-based preacher Fethullah Gulen.

But ties with Brussels were bruised and Turkey's long-running EU membership bid set back as the European Union reacted with alarm to the post-coup purge that has seen tens of thousands arrested. The US presidency of Donald Trump has so far also given no hope that Turkey has seen the end of the rancor that marked ties between Washington and Ankara under Barack Obama. Meanwhile, the diplomatic crisis in the Gulf risks wrecking Turkey's efforts to keep a tight strategic alliance with Qatar without upsetting Saudi Arabia.

"Turkey has been somewhat isolated diplomatically since the July 2016 failed coup, both because NATO partners were taken by surprise and because the subsequent purge went far beyond anything that could be expected," said Marc Pierini, a visiting scholar at Carnegie Europe. "The crisis between Saudi Arabia and its allies and Qatar only adds to the host of problems Turkey is facing on the diplomatic front," he told AFP.

#### 'Ever-increasing disputes'

Ankara's precarious position is a far cry from what it enjoyed a decade ago, when Erdogan was seen as an essential mediator in almost every crisis and was courted by both the European Union and the United States. For former prime minister Ahmet Davutoglu, Turkey was a center of the Islamic world and deserved influence from Bosnia to Arabia in lands Constantinople controlled under the Ottoman Empire. Turkey had high hopes that the Arab Spring uprisings would bring into power Sunni Muslim governments that would be under Turkish influence. But the ousting of the Muslim Brotherhood's Egyptian president Mohamed Morsi and failure to unseat Syria's Bashar Al-Assad put paid to these goals. "The picture today is a very different one," said Kemal Kirisci of the Brookings Institution. "It is characterize by the everincreasing disputes that Turkey is having with countries in its neighborhood and beyond," he added.

#### 'Not even partially fulfilled'

Turkey has sought to join the European Union for the last half century, in an agonizingly slow process where Ankara has watched on enviously as post-Communist states join the bloc with far less fuss. Erdogan has sometimes made Brussels seem like a strategic enemy rather than partner, with attacks bubbling with venom in the run-up to an April 16 referendum on enhancing his powers. Victory in that referendum handed Erdogan powers that critics fear will create one-man rule and take Ankara inexorably away from European values.

"The bases for a deeper political alliance through EU membership remain as they have always been. It will be up to Turkey's leaders, at some point in the future, to return to their earlier ambitions," said Pierini, a former EU ambassador to Ankara. Despite the controversies surrounding Trump's anti-Muslim rhetoric, Turkish officials fell over themselves to welcome the tycoon as US leader, predicting a new page in relations.

But no progress has materialized on the vexed issue of Turkey's desire to secure the extradition of Gulen, who denies any link to the coup, or US support for a Kurdish militia in Syria which Ankara sees as terrorists. A much-touted visit by Erdogan to Washington to iron out these issues was overshadowed by a fracas involving his bodyguards that led to arrest warrants for 12 members of his security detail. "While Ankara was very optimistic about the Trump presidency, none of Turkey's expectations from the new US administration were even partially fulfilled," said Ozgur Unluhisarcikli, director of the Ankara office of the German Marshall Fund of the United States.

In this context, the Saudi-led move to isolate Qatar over its alleged support for terrorism - claims that both Doha and Ankara reject - was the last thing Turkey needed. Turkey had to some extent repaired ties with Saudi Arabia after a downturn in relations following Riyadh's support for the ousting of the pro-Ankara Morsi in Egypt. But it now finds itself dealing with a new environment in the Gulf, especially after the surprise elevation of the hugely powerful Prince Mohammed bin Salman to be Saudi crown prince. — AFP

Tillerson is spending much of this week in the Gulf seeking to mediate in the rift among crucial US allies, and will meet foreign ministers of the four countries isolating Qatar in the Saudi city of Jeddah today. After talks with senior officials in Doha yeterday, Tillerson and Qatari Foreign Minister Sheikh Mohammed bin Abdulrahman Al-Thani announced the deal targeting extremist financing. "The memorandum lays out a series of steps the two countries will take over the coming months and years to interrupt and disable terror financing flows and intensify counter-terrorism activities globally," Tillerson said at a joint press conference.

He said the deal meant Qatar was "the first to respond" to US President Donald Trump's call at a summit in Riyadh earlier this year "to stop the funding of terrorism" - suggesting that such deals could be signed with the other Arab states as a step towards ending the crisis. Referring to its rivals, Sheikh Mohammed urged "the siege countries to join us in the future" by signing on to such deals.

While the State Department has warned the crisis could last months, Tillerson yesterday struck a moderately optimistic note. "I'm hopeful we can make some progress to bring this to a point of resolution," he said after meeting Qatar's emir. "I think Qatar has been quite clear in its positions and I think very reasonable and we want to talk now... (about) how do we take things forward." Tillerson flew back to Kuwait - the main mediator in the crisis and where he is based this week - after the talks in Qatar.

Egypt announced the meeting with Tillerson in Jeddah today, saying it "reflects the four countries' desire to enhance coordination and underscore their unity on ways to deal with Qatar in the future." The diplomatic crisis is the worst to hit the region since the establishment of the Gulf Cooperation Council in 1981. The four countries on June 5 announced sanctions, effective immediately, against Qatar over accusations Doha supported Islamist extremism and was too close to Iran. They severed all diplomatic ties, suspended transport links with Doha and ordered all Qataris to return home within 14 days. On June 22, the Saudi-led bloc issued a list of 13 demands which, if met, would end the sanctions, including closing broadcast giant Al-Jazeera, downgrading ties to Iran and shutting a Turkish military base in Doha.

Qatar refused to comply and has consistently denied accusations of ties to Islamist groups. Tillerson's arrival in Doha was overshadowed by the publication of pre-existing confidential agreements between Qatar and other GCC states in which all sides had pledged to combat extremist funding and avoid interference in other states. Publication of the accords, dated 2013 and 2014, caused both sides in the dispute to launch a fresh round of mutual accusations.

US broadcaster CNN aired leaked papers in which Saudi Arabia, Qatar and Kuwait - and later Bahrain and the UAE - had signed accords forbidding support for any opposition and hostile groups in their own nations, as well as in Egypt and Yemen. That agreement specifically ruled out support for the Muslim Brotherhood and other unnamed groups that could threaten the bloc's members. Qatar sees the Brotherhood as a legitimate political force and has for years hosted its spiritual guide, Sheikh Youssef Al-Qaradawi. That puts it squarely at odds with Saudi Arabia, the UAE and Egypt, which see the Brotherhood as a terrorist organization.

A joint statement released by the Saudi-led bloc said the documents proved "beyond any doubt Qatar's failure to meet its commitments and its full violation of its pledges". Their 13-point list of demands in June was tied to those earlier deals and was "fully in line with the spirit of what was agreed upon," they said. The head of Qatar's government communication office, Sheikh Saif bin Ahmed Al-Thani, disputed that, saying the June demands "bore no relation to the Riyadh agreements", according to a statement carried by the official Qatar News Agency. He called the "siege" by the four states a violation of the GCC charter and agreements. — Agencies

### THREE CUPS OF COFFEE A DAY KEEP THE...

The second study included more than 180,000 participants of various ethnic backgrounds in the United States. It found benefits to longevity whether the coffee was caffeinated or decaffeinated. Coffee drinkers had a lower risk of death due to heart disease, cancer, stroke, diabetes, and respiratory and kidney disease. Those who drank one cup a day were 12 percent less likely to die compared to those who didn't drink coffee.

Those who drank two or three cups per day saw an even higher 18 percent reduced risk of death. "We cannot say drinking coffee will prolong your life, but we see an association," said lead author Veronica Setiawan, an associate professor of preventive medicine at the Keck School of Medicine of University of Southern California. "If you like to drink coffee, drink up! If you're not a coffee drinker, then you need to consider if you should start."

Coffee is one of the most popular drinks in the world. Some 2.25 billion cups are consumed every day. Many prior studies have hailed the benefits of coffee-drinking, saying the beverage imparts anti-oxidants, may improve liver function and reduce inflammation. But coffee may carry risks for some people, and pregnant woman and children are urged to avoid caffeine, which can be fatal in high doses. A report from the IARC last year that said drinking very hot beverages - coffee, tea or otherwise - is one probable cause of cancer of the esophagus, the tube that runs from the throat to the stomach.

Experts who were not involved in the latest studies urged caution in interpreting the results. For instance, the European study excluded people who had cancer, heart disease or diabetes, meaning it took a measure of people over 35 who were already generally healthy. It also asked about coffee consumption just once, at the beginning, and did not update this figure over the span of the study, which included an average follow-up time of 16 years.

Finally, it found signs of a link between women who drank large amounts of coffee and a higher risk of cancer death, but downplayed this finding, saying it "may be spurious". The "conclusions will not lead me to start drinking coffee or to recommend people drink more coffee as a way to lessen their risks for heart disease," said Naveed Sattar, professor of metabolic medicine at the University of Glasgow. "I remain unconvinced that the link between coffee and heart disease represents a true cause and effect relationship and that coffee is truly protective, regardless of how large a study suggests this."— AFP

### IS CHIEF BAGHDADI REPORTED DEAD

US President Donald Trump yesterday tweeted "Big wins against ISIS!" It was not immediately clear if that was a reference to the Mosul recapture, Baghdadi's reported death, or both. There have been persistent rumors of Baghdadi's death in recent months, and Russia's army said in mid-June that it was seeking to verify whether it had killed the IS chief in a May air strike in Syria. The US-led coalition said at the time it could not confirm whether the Russian strike had killed Baghdadi.

With a \$25 million US bounty on his head, Baghdadi has kept a low profile and was rumored to move regularly throughout IS-held territory in the area straddling Iraq and Syria. The 46-year-old Iraqi-born leader of IS has not been seen since making his only known public appearance as "caliph" in 2014 at the Grand Mosque of Al-Nuri in Mosul. IS destroyed the highly symbolic site before Iraqi forces could reach it as they pushed the group from Mosul.

Iraqi forces launched their campaign in October to retake Mosul, which was seized by the jihadists during the mid-2014 offensive that saw them take control of large parts of Iraq and Syria. Abadi announced in Mosul on Monday that the campaign had ended with the defeat of IS in the city, hailing "a victory over darkness, a victory over brutality and terrorism".

The cost of victory has been enormous: Much of Mosul in ruins, thousands dead and wounded and nearly half the city's population forced from their homes. In Mosul's Old City, where buildings lie crumbling and burned-out cars and other debris choke the streets, security forces were still searching for remaining IS fighters. "What we are doing today is just combing the area and clearing it of sleeper cells," Staff Lieutenant General Sami Al-Aridhi, a senior commander in Iraq's elite Counter-Terrorism Service (CTS), said yesterday. "There are groups that are hiding in shelters," but they surrender or are killed, Aridhi said.

Since the Mosul operation began in October, 920,000 people have fled their homes, only a fraction of whom have returned, according to the United Nations. Rights group Amnesty International yesterday accused Iraqi forces and the US-led coalition of exposing civilians to "relentless and unlawful attacks" in west Mosul. "Pro-government forces launched barrages of indiscriminate or disproportionate attacks using explosive weapons unsuitable for such a densely populated urban area," Amnesty said. — AFP

**LONDON:** Teenage striker Dominic Solanke, capped for England at the recent Under-20 World Cup, signed for Liverpool from Premier League champions Chelsea yesterday. The 19-year-old forward scored four goals in England's Under 20 campaign which saw them beat Venezuela in June's final and win their first global trophy since the senior team in 1966. ### BRITON TRANSFORMS CHILDHOOD TAG INTO 'EXTREME SPORT'

**LONDON:** A childhood game played in school playgrounds the world over, tag has been transformed by a British enthusiast into an extreme sport, attracting world athletes and a James Bond movie actor. Fast moves and dodging are essential in a game of "Chase Tag", the new sport which sees players race around obstacles trying to catch each other.

The idea came to creator Christian Devaux after playing tag with his son, who challenged his dad to find out who was really the best. "We decided to introduce obstacles into the garden. We had a bin, and some chairs, and a bench," he tells AFP. "Then the obstacles just grew and grew more complicated".

Devaux's garden game led him to create Chase Tag in 2015 with its own set of rules. This month the sport held its second tournament with six teams of four players competing. Often used for boxing matches, the York Hall venue in London has been cluttered with obstacles as the athletes take part in the tournament's 20-second matches. The rapid race features two players, one tasked with catching the others in the short time frame. Each catch gives a team one point, while anyone who escapes uncaught with their nifty moves gets three points.

While the players are seen concentrating as they leap and dart around the pitch, there's a light-hearted atmosphere. "It appeals to our childish side," said Mehdi Hadim, a member of the Blacklist team.

"Everyone's played tag. And the game we play here has placed it at a new athletic level." Extreme sports are defined as recreational activities involving a high level of physical exertion.

#### JAMES BOND MOVIE SKILLS

The first non-British team to take part in a Chase Tag competition, Blacklist brings together four young men from the Paris region. The team is already skilled at parking videos on the internet," said 25-yearold Valentin Dubois. For Sebastien Foucan, co-founder of parkour in France, Chase Tag "is a very technical type of sport but also very tactical. As you move, you reflect, you think ahead".

"You also have to analyse your opponents and act accordingly. For example, someone big goes under the obstacles less often," said the 43-year-old French athlete, who put his skills to the test as a James Bond villain in the film "Casino Royale".

#### **'DON'T GET CAUGHT!'**

Taking part in the competition, broadcast live on Facebook, is demanding and Blacklist trains several times a week, combining gymnastics, weightlifting, athletics, climbing and parkour. The team has a motto-"Don't get caught!"-which doubles as the golden rule of Chase Tag.

As well as the formal competition, Devaux has also arranged matches in one of London's famous parks. "You can do it anywhere," he says. "When we first decided to do the meet-ups, we were just using barrier tape (to build obstacles) in Hyde Park. We had all kinds of people doing it."

The sport has already come full circle, with 13-year-old fan Leo-Paul saying he plays Chase Tag in the playground.

"At the beginning, my mates didn't understand, they said that it was a thing for kids," he said, having travelled with his mother from Paris to help out at the tournament.

But when he showed it to them on Youtube videos "they were amazed. Now, we do our own route in the playground," he said. He discovered the game last year, having heard about it through Devaux's son, and he knows the Blacklist players.

With only a few dozen competitors, the sport is still in its infancy but there are already promising signs. Players in India, Japan and the US have

## WBO REVIEW RULES, DECLARES JEFF HORN THE CLEAR WINNER

**SYDNEY:** Australian Jeff Horn's shock welterweight title victory over Manny Pacquiao was confirmed yesterday after a scoring review by the World Boxing Organization declared him the clear winner. The WBO took a close look at the fight after Pacquiao, backed by the Philippine government's sports regulatory body, criticised the referee and the judges and demanded a review after losing in Brisbane on July 2. Horn stunned the Filipino legend-who has won world titles in an unprecedented eight weight divisions-with his ultra-aggressiveness to earn a unanimous 12-round decision.

The WBO-which does not have the power to reverse a decision unless fraud or law violations are proven-set up a panel of independent and anonymous judges who were asked to watch the bout without sound and determine who won each round.

The results were tabulated to show clearly the rounds each fighter won using an average scale based on 60, 80 and 100 percent, with three of the five officials needing to be in agreement. A similar method has been used to review WBO title fights before. "Upon the analysis, the findings stated that Pacquiao won the 3rd, the 8th and 9th by 100 percent; the 5th round was won by 80 percent; and the 11th round by 60 percent," the WBO said in a statement.

"Horn won the 1st, 6th and 12th rounds by 100 percent; rounds 2, 4, and 7 by 80 percent; and then, the 10th round by 60 percent. "From the results, it can be established that Pacquiao won five rounds while Horn won seven rounds. Based on this analysis, Jeff Horn was the winner of the bout."

The original fight was scored 117-111, 115-113 and 115-113 by judges Waleksa Roldan, Chris Flores and Ramon Cerdan respectively.

Concrete evidence - Horn, a former schoolteacher written off before the bout by most pbservers, welcomed the ruling as confirming what he already knew. "It gives me evidence behind me that I can just use now. Instead of saying I think I won the fight, now a heap of other people-professionally-think I won the fight,"

he told reporters in Brisbane. "It's definitely nice to have it finally put on paper. I thought I'd won the fight on the day and I think Pacquiao thought it as well. Now just to have it clear in front of us is good."

He has made clear he is keen for a rematch and Brisbane's Courier-Mail said talks were already under way for a possible November duel between the two in the same city.

Both the Philippine board and Pacquiao had criticised American referee Mark Nelson for supposedly allowing the underdog Australian

to get away with illegal tactics without giving him warnings or point deductions. The loss sparked calls in the Philippines for the 38-yearold Pacquiao, a national icon after rising from poverty to be considered one of the greatest fighters of his generation, to retire and concentrate on politics.

Pacquiao briefly quit boxing last year to pursue his long-held political ambitions and was elected senator. But he quickly made a successful comeback against Jessie Vargas in November, saying he still felt like a youngster. — AFP

### BRITISH GRAND PRIX AT RISK AS SILVERSTONE OWNERS PLAY TOUGH

**LONDON:** Silverstone will not host the British Grand Prix after 2019 unless the circuit's owners gets a better financial deal from Formula One owners, they announced yesterday just days ahead of this year's renewal.

The British Racing Drivers' Club (BRDC) — who own Silverstone-announced they were triggering a break clause in its 17year contract and the Grand Prix would not be raced on their prized possession post-2019 unless a revised agreement can be reached with Liberty Media, who were not the owners of Formula One when the original deal began in 2010.

"This decision has been taken because it is not financially viable for us to deliver the British Grand Prix under the terms of our current contract," BRDC chairman John Grant said.

"We sustained losses of  $\pm 2.8$ m (3.1m, \$3.6m) in 2015 and  $\pm 4.8$ m in 2016, and we expect to lose a similar amount this year. "We have reached the tipping point where we can no longer let our passion for the sport rule our heads.

"It would not only risk the very future of Silverstone and the BRDC, but also the British motorsport community that

depends on us. "However, I want to be clear that although we have now activated the break clause, we are fully supportive of the changes the Liberty team are making to improve the F1 experience.

"Our hope is that an agreement can still be reached, so that we can ensure a sustainable and financially viable future for the British Grand Prix at Silverstone for many years to come," added Grant whose body has been in talks with Liberty over the issue.

Nearly 140,000 spectators watched Britain's triple world champion Lewis Hamilton claim his third consecutive win at Silverstone last year. A near sell-out crowd is expected again this weekend as Hamilton bids to reduce rival Sebastian Vettel's 20-point lead in the title race. The circuit, unlike many other tracks on the F1 calendar, receives no government backing.

However, the BRDC have been hit financially by the hosting fee which goes up by five percent every year-from £12million in 2010, the year in which the new long-term deal started, to £17million this season and £26million in 2026. — AFP



### CUBS SEEKING ANSWERS AFTER ERRATIC START TO SEASON

LOS ANGELES: The Chicago Cubs' cursebusting World Series win is a distant memory as the Major League Baseball champions limp into the All-Star break. The Cubs won their first title since 1908 ending the longest sports title drought in American History-with their win over the Cleveland Indians in last year's Fall Classic.

But predictions that their core of 20something stars were just getting started have been sorely tested in the first half of the 2017 season. The Cubs went into the 2016 All-Star break at 53-35 on their way to a 100-win season that never saw them drop below .500. So far this year they've flailed around the .500 mark, and trail the surprising Milwaukee Brewers in the National League Central race by 5.5 games.

"This year's just been kind of weird for all of us," National League Most Valuable Player Kris Bryant acknowledged. The Cubs are 43-45 as Major League Baseball takes it's mid-season break for Tuesday's All-Star Game in Miami. After Bryant lost out to the Dodgers' Justin Turner in final voting, the Cubs are the first World Series winners not to send a returning player to

#### the All-Star Game.

Maybe Bryant could benefit from the time off. Last year the Cubs third baseman had 25 home runs, 65 RBI and a .962 on base plus slugging by the break. This season he's at 18, 38 and .928 — although Bryant insists he doesn't feel fatigued and the ankle he sprained in June is fine. Bryant showed a flash of brilliance on Friday, going 4-for-5 with two homers a triple and a single in the Cubs' 6-1 win over Pittsburgh. But the Pirates won the next two games of the weekend series, pummelling the Cubs 14-3 on Sunday to conclude the first half of the season. Bryant says the Cubs remain confident they can turn things around in the second half of the season-thanks in large part to their rally from 1-3 down in the World Series.

"We can do it," he said. "That's what makes us so confident." And manager Joe Maddon said he still sees "a chance for us to do something really spectacular" in the second half.

"I'm very pleased with where we're at right now," Maddon said at the weekend. "We have gone through a lot of different moments already this season regarding injuries, etc., and we've held our heads up pretty good." The Cubs offense stands to benefit from the returns of Ben Zobrist and Jason Heyward from the disabled list.

And the team is hoping slugger Kyle Schwarber's spell in the minor leagues was enough to sort out his hitting slump. But they also need to perk up their pitching. Ace Jon Lester endured the shortest outing of his career on Sunday when he gave up four earned runs and six hits before departing in the first inning against the Pirates on Sunday.—AFP

### FARAH SET FOR FINAL DOUBLE TITLE BLAST

**LONDON:** British athletics legend Mo Farah will hope he brings the curtain down on his track career with a third successive double world gold in the 5,000 and 10,000 metres in London in August.

The 34-year-old, who was named in both events in the British team selection unveiled yesterday, will compete on the track where he so memorably won double Olympic gold in 2012 when it was then the Olympic Stadium.

The host nation will be hoping a passionate home crowd will enable a relatively inexperienced team to at least match their 2015 world championship haul of seven medals. Farah-who began his world gold medal haul with gold in the 5000 in 2011 and silver in the 10000 — is the standout name in the British team with fellow 2012 Olympic champion Greg Rutherford the other proven champion in the squad.

Rutherford, who is also the defending world champion, will hope to have fully

recovered from the ankle injury that ruled him out of last Sunday's Diamond League meeting at the same stadium. "This feels bigger for us than Rio," said Neil Black, the performance director for British Athletics.

"We've selected some incredibly talented athletes, and in many events there have been some close calls. "It's now up to them to grasp this opportunity and produce performances that will make the whole nation proud."

Of the athleties hoping one day to aspire to such heights the most eye-catching is Scottish distance runner Laura Muir, who will compete in both the 1500m and 5000m. There was disappointment for sprinter Adam Gemili, who just missed out on a 200m Olympic medal last year, as the 23-year-old paid for his sixth place in the British trials and saw the last spot go to Zharnel Hughes. Gemili doesn't miss out altogether as he will compete in the 4x100m relay team. — AFP

### AARON JUDGE SMASHES HIT WAY TO HOME RUN DERBY TITLE

**MIAMI:** Aaron Judge hit the glass behind left field that supports the retractable roof at Marlins Park. He drove balls over the Red Grooms home run sculpture in left-center, over the batter's eye in center and - unusually for a Home Run Derby, to the opposite field, too.

He even hit the roof. The larger-than-life New York Yankees slugger dominated the All-Star Home Run Derby in the same manner he has smashed his way through his rookie season, beating Minnesota's Miguel Sano 11-10 with two minutes to spare in the final on Monday night.

"It was a blast. I enjoyed every minute of it - watching the other guys swing, coming home runs, and some Yankees fans showed up to support him in their full dress - flowing black robes and white powdered wigs. Booed initially by the crowd of 37,027, Judge earned cheers once Stanton, the defending champion, and Bour were eliminated in the first round.

Judge has hit the longest home run in the regular season this year in the majors -495 feet. He broke a TV monitor at Yankee Stadium with a BP drive that went over the center-field bleachers in May and dented a door casing with a home run last week.

In yesterday night's game, he's set to bat third for the American League. Sano beat Kansas City's Mike Moustakas 11-10 in the opening round, and the Yankees' Gary Sanchez topped Stanton 17-16. Stanton, who got home at about 5 a.m. after a game in San Francisco, started slowly against pitcher Pat Shine, hitting three liners before a 429-foot drive to center. Stanton began to find his grove and hit a 496-foot shot off the glass behind the left-field seats, then started spraying impressive drives. He had 15 when his 30-second bonus road started but added just one more. The crowd groaned when his last fell short. "It just didn't work out as we had planned," Shine said. Bellinger, hitting off his dad, former big leaguer Clay Bellinger, earned bonus time as four minutes expired with his 13th drive, into the right-field upper deck, then with five seconds remaining knocked out Blackmon 15-14. Hitting without batting gloves, Bour excited fans with 22 homers . Judge, hitting against his regular BP pitcher, Danilo Valiente, had 22 through four minutes, according to the scoreboard, and when he hit one in bonus time he walked away. But scoreboard reverted to 22 - apparently the roof shot was subtracted - and Judge added another with a few seconds left. "I thought I had 23 already, but I guess I tied him," he said. "I really didn't have any worries." Seeming tired, Sanchez opened the second round with 10 and Sano needed just 3:10 to hit 11, the longest at 491 feet. In a matchup of the leading candidates for rookies of the year, Bellinger hit 12 and Judge topped him with a minute to spare, including a 513-foot shot high off the window, a drive that left his bat at 119 mph and rose 143 feet. "I had no pressure going into it," Judge said. "I'm a rookie. This is my first time doing it. For me, I got no expectations. I'm just going to go in there and have some fun." — AP

here early and talking to the media," Judge said. "Everything about today was fantastic." Five years ago, Judge won the college home run derby in Omaha, Nebraska. This time, he outslugged some of baseball's top stars, including local favorites Giancarlo Stanton and Justin Bour of the Miami Marlins. "A lot more fans," Judge said. "Your adrenaline is pumping, you're nervous, you're excited. But this was an incredible experience." Judge, 6-foot-7 (2.01-meters) and 282 pounds (128 kilograms), hit 47 home runs in the derby that totaled 3.9 miles. His longest drive of the night went 513 feet, and he topped 500 four times.

"I thought I had seen it all before. He didn't even look like he was getting tired," said Seattle's Robinson Cano, the 2011 Derby winner. "He was going opposite field. He was late on the ball and he was putting the ball in the upper deck."

Judge had no trouble hitting the roof, thought to be previously untouched by batted ball. That drive didn't count. "I got it in BP, too, earlier. So I wasn't too surprised by that," Judge said. Hitting second each time, Judge knocked out Bour 23-22 in the first round and beat Los Angeles Dodgers rookie Cody Bellinger 13-12 in the second. Then, with lightning visible behind the huge glass door, he hit a 458-foot drive above the batter's eye for the title.

"That guy Aaron Judge, he doesn't get tired," Sano said. Many of the All-Stars sat in foul territory, some with their kids. "I had never seen him in person. He's really impressive," said Colorado's Charlie Blackmon, who was eliminated in the first round. "The first time I saw him, he was in a crowd. I was wondering what he was standing on. He's a monster."

### INDIAN SPRINTER READY TO FIGHT GENDER RULE AGAIN

**NEW DELHI:** Indian sprinter Dutee Chand vowed yesterday to fight any efforts to bar her from the sport, after new research showed runners born with high testosterone levels enjoy a "significant competitive advantage". The 21-year-old was banned after being diagnosed in 2014 with hyperandrogenism-a condition that causes high natural levels of the hormone in women. She contested the ban and won a temporary reprieve from the Court of Arbitration for Sports (CAS) which allowed her to compete. Without proof, the International Association of Athletics Federations (IAAF) regulations excluding women with hyperandrogenism from competition are set to lapse this year.

But the global body plans to submit the new research as evidence to back its case that they should remain in place. "I know that my case is going to start all over again but I am not afraid of anything," Chand told AFP by phone. "I am confident I will come out unscathed. I will keep fighting until I get justice. A positive ruling will not only benefit me but all other women athletes like me."

The IAAF introduced the regulations in

2011 after a highly emotive public battle with South Africa's two-time Olympic champion Caster Semenya. It part-funded the latest research, which relied on data from more than 2,100 blood samples taken from male and female athletes. Testosterone, which can also be injected as a performance-enhancer, increases muscle mass and boosts physical strength. The issue of hyperandrogenism is controversial because it has pitted principles of fair competition against the rights of women born with a condition they have no control over.

The IAAF rules allowed hyperandrogenic athletes to take medication to lower their testosterone levels to below 10 nanomoles per litre-considered a low level in men.

The natural range for women is about 10 times lower. Chand, who won two bronze medals at the recent Asian Athletics Championship in her home state of Orissa, said she was not alone in her fight against "cruel and discriminatory" rules.

"There are other athletes who are suffering like me without any fault. The whole world is supporting me." — AFP

### BANGLADESH CRICKET VOWS CRACKDOWN ON PLAYER SCANDALS

DHAKA: Bangladesh's cricket board vowed tough action yesterday against any players accused of misconduct or bringing the game into disrepute amid a slew of high-profile scandals involving top stars. The warning from the cricket board came as the wife of fast bowler Mohammad Shahid filed a complaint against her husband, accusing him of torturing her. Farzana Akther told the Bangladesh Cricket Board at the weekend that her 28-year-old husband had hidden his marital status from other women and tortured her after she intervened, an official at the board said. Shahid, who is undergoing treatment for a knee injury sustained during a

domestic match, denied the allegations. "The allegation of torture is not true. Somebody is provoking her to raise complaint against me," Shahid told AFP.

BCB president Nazmul Hasan said it was difficult to monitor every aspect of players' lives but warned of repercussions if they didn't get their act together. "We have tried a lot to control them when they are with the squad. We've become tougher when they stay in hotels under our care," he told reporters. 'The problems start when they leave (the hotel). We cannot monitor their personal issues.

"We have taken action against similar incidents in the past. We want (them) to get everything in order, otherwise we'll be compelled to take tough action in future." Shahid is the fourth Bangladeshi cricketer embroiled in a personal scandal in recent years.

Pace bowler Rubel Hossain was detained in 2015 after an actress claiming to be his fiancee accused him of rape. The charges were later withdrawn. Another pacer Shahadat Hossain spent nearly two months in custody last year after he and his wife were arrested on charges of torturing an 11-year-old girl they employed as a maid. A court later acquitted the couple. Left arm spinner Arafat Sunny was arrested in January and taken into custody after posting

intimate photos of his girlfriend on social media.

The 30-year-old cricketer was released on bail in March after he told the court that the girlfriend was, in fact, his second wife.

Meanwhile, Bangladesh opening batsman Tamim Iqbal has left English county Essex after just one match for personal reasons the club revealed yesterday.

The 28-year-old-Bangladesh's highest international run scorer with more than 10,000 to his name in all forms of the game-signed only last week for an eight game stint in the T20 Blast county competition.

Tamim appeared in Sunday's sevenwicket loss to Kent but on Tuesday Essex released a statement saying his stay was over. "Essex County Cricket Club can confirm that overseas player Tamim Iqbal has left the club with immediate effect due to personal reasons," the statement read.

"We wish him all the best, and it would be appreciated if Tamim's privacy is respected during this time." Tamim starred with the bat for Bangladesh in the recent Champions Trophy scoring a splendid century against England, falling five short of another century against Australia and hitting 70 in the semi-final against India. — AFP

### SRI LANKA TAKE FLAK AFTER 'DISGRACEFUL' CRICKET DEFEAT

**COLOMBO:** Sri Lanka's cricketers faced a barrage of criticism yesterday a day after their series loss to bottom-ranked Zimbabwe in what is being described as a new low for the beleaguered side. Zimbabwe notched their first win abroad in eight years after claiming the one-day international series against Sri Lanka 3-2, embarrassing a home side that has struggled with fitness, losses and coaching upheaval. "Sri Lankan cricket has reached its lowest point and it could well be the point of no return. Now that the 11th ranked Zimbabwe have beaten them, we wonder what excuse is in store," declared local newspaper Island. "Disgrace" read a headline in the local Daily Mirror, while another newspaper said Sri Lanka's cricket was "in the doldrums". Their defeat came hot on the heels of their early exit from the Champions Trophy and a drubbing by Sports Minister Dayasiri Jayasekera, who accused the national side of being overweight and unfit to compete on the world stage. Players were given three months to get in shape or face the boot. The side began the five-match series against

Zimbabwe without a coach after Graham Ford quit on the eve of the tournament, just halfway through his 45-month contract.

Sri Lanka's cricket board elevated fielding coach Nic Pothas for the series while they searched for a replacement for Ford. "You can't expect Pothas to perform miracles," said a senior cricket official, asking not to be named.

"There were several factors that contributed to the (latest) humiliation." A lack of preparation and poor selection decisions compounded problems for the home side, who appeared to underestimate the tourists, the official added. Zimbabwe rank just one place above cricket minnows Ireland and have not won abroad since a victory in Kenya in 2009.

Skipper Angelo Mathews conceded the shock defeat was a low point in his 187match ODI career. "This is a hard pill to swallow. I don't want to give any excuses... They played better cricket," Mathews told the Island.

He said he will discuss his future with selectors but had not made any decisions. Sri Lanka faces Zimbabwe in a Test match in Colombo on Friday.— AFP

After amassing a record 41 Origins - including 17 as skipper - Smith said this year's title would be his most enjoyable.

Thurston landed a pressure sideline conversion to crown a magnificent 18-16 comeback victory over the Blues last month to keep the series alive, but afterwards was ruled out for the rest of the season with a shoulder injury. The Maroons have named debutant Cameron Munster as Thurston's replacement at stand-off, implanting the steely Melbourne Storm club 'spine' into the Queensland starting line-up.

Queensland will have skipper Cameron Smith at hooker along with his fellow Storm teammates Cooper Cronk at scrum-half, Munster at stand-off and Billy Slater at fullback along with Will Chambers in the centres. "He's playing with them every week these guys and understands their game," Maroons coach Kevin Walters said after selecting Munster at No.6.

"Obviously the spine is a big part of what we do and certainly Cameron, Cooper and Billy are a major part of that." Smith, Cronk and Slater play an influential role in the Queensland team, with their innate understanding of attacking plays paramount to the Maroons' chances.

Slater and Cronk are expected to make an announcement on their Origin futures after Wednesday's crunch game.

"It'd be the most satisfying, no doubt about that given the injuries we've had and the personnel that are unavailable," he said.

The Blues are bidding to clinch their first Origin series since 2014 after decisively winning the opening game 28-4 in Brisbane. Laurie Daley is in line to become only the second NSW coach after Phil Gould to claim more than one series triumph for NSW.

Daley has named an unchanged side, although skipper and back-rower Boyd Cordner is battling a calf injury to be ready in time for the match.

The match was a triumph for Root, whose first-innings 190 put England in a strong position. "Before this Test match, he was a little more on edge than I've seen him before," said Bayliss. "But he didn't try to be something he's not. He's a pro-active, confident sort of a young bloke, and I thought that came across in the way he led the team."

Former captain Alastair Cook made a valuable fifty in the second innings and Bayliss said he was enjoying his return to the ranks. "He's loving it! I was having a bit of a laugh about it, just watching him in the field.

"For someone in that stage of his career, it's a good sign." Meanwhile Jonny Bairstow's increasingly assured wicket-keeping, allied to his Kuhn on Sunday. "That first catch was probably give him a lot of confidence." —AFP

### SHASTRI HOT FAVOURITE TO BE NEW INDIA COACH

**NEW DELHI:** Former skipper Ravi Shastri has emerged as the front-runner to be the new coach of India, but a final decision remains on hold until captain Virat Kohli has been consulted. Shastri, 55, was among five high-profile candidates interviewed on Monday for the post left vacant by ex-Test captain Anil Kumble, who resigned amid difficulties over his relationship with Kohli which he described as "untenable".

An advisory committee of Sachin Tendulkar, Sourav Ganguly and VVS Laxman has been tasked with selecting the new coach to head the world's numberone ranked Test team. The cricketing greats considered presentations from Shastri, Virender Sehwag, Australia's Tom Moody, Englishman Richard Pybus and former India manager Lalchand Rajput.

But after a gruelling round of interviews the committee decided there was "no hurry" to name the coach, and felt Kohli should be consulted before the final decision was made.

Speculation has been rife that Shastri, who served as India's team director between 2014 and 2016, is on friendly terms with Kohli and will therefore get the nod. "All members of the Indian cricket team are in favour of cricketer-turned-commentator Shastri taking over the role," reported The Times of India yesterday. "All 15 members of the team are unanimous on this. It's not even 14-1," the daily reported, citing an unnamed member of the Indian cricket team. Ganguly told reporters that Kohli would be briefed on the developments once the team returned from their limited-overs tour of the West Indies. "Sri Lanka tour is in a week's time, the board headed by (secretary) Amitabh Choudhary and (chief executive) Rahul Johri will probably continue with the same set for the time being," said Ganguly.

"We want to speak to Virat Kohli once he is back from America, all three of us along with the respective people concerned. "We will explain to him that the coaches want to function in a certain way and make sure that everybody is on the same page before we make the announcement."

Kohli made no recommendation for who should fill the coaching role, Ganguly added, which would run until the World Cup in 2019. Shastri, who has represented India in 80 Tests and 150 one-day internationals between 1981 and 1992, originally applied when a one-year contract to coach India was made available in 2016.

A decision by India's cricket board to allow Shastri to interview via Skype while on holiday at the time angered Ganguly, who complained publicly about the selection process. Shastri was then pipped to the post by Kumble. —AFP

**DUBAI:** Saudi Arabia said yesterday that it will grant girls in public schools access to physical education, a decision that comes after years of calls by women across the kingdom demanding greater rights and access to sports.

The Education Ministry said it will introduce the physical education classes "gradually" and "in accordance with (Islamic) Shariah regulations." At least one Saudi activist took to Twitter questioning whether this implied that girls will be required to seek the permission of their male guardians, such as a father, before they can play sports. It was also unclear if the classes would be extracurricular or mandatory.

The decision to allow girls to play sports in public schools is significant in Saudi Arabia because women taking part in exercise is still seen as a taboo. Some of the kingdom's ultraconservatives shun the concept of women's exercise as "immodest" and say it blurs gender lines.

It was only four years ago that the kingdom formally approved sports for girls in private schools. Women first participated in Saudi Arabia's Olympic team during the 2012 London games. Despite incremental openings for Saudi women, tight restrictions remain in place. Women are banned from driving and must seek the permission of a male guardian to travel abroad or obtain a passport. Restrictive male guardianship rules give men, usually the father or husband, huge sway over a woman's life in Saudi Arabia.

luxury for those women who can afford it and whose families permit it. A handful of private sports clubs have emerged over the years, allowing some women to join in female basketball leagues. In recent years Saudi Arabia has approved some licenses for femaleonly gyms, but membership costs are beyond the reach of many.

A new, sprawling female-only university in the capital, Riyadh, has a large gym, outdoor soccer pitches, running tracks and indoor swimming pools. Despite such facilities, the country's top consultative body, the Shura Council, rejected a proposal earlier this year to establish sports education colleges that would train women in how to teach fitness and well-being, such as physical education courses in schools.

Saudi Arabia implements strict gender segregation rules that often require women to sit in "family only" sections of restaurants and cafes, or to be banned entirely from establishments where segregated seating is unavailable. Boys and girls are segregated in schools and university to prevent unrelated males and females from mixing. The Education Ministry said the decision to introduce sports for girls was in line with the country's sweeping Vision 2030 plan, a wide-reaching government plan to overhaul society and the economy. It is being spearheaded by the kingdom's young heir to the throne, Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman.

The plan specifically calls for encouraging the participation of all citizens in sports and athletic activities. It says 13 percent of the Saudi population exercises once a week. The government aims to bump that up to 40 percent and raise life expectancy from 74 years to 80 years. — AP

### CROATIA'S MAMIC FACES NEW CORRUPTION CHARGES

**ZAGREB:** Croatia's football strongman and former Dinamo Zagreb chief Zdravko Mamic was charged yesterday for funnelling money from the club which allegedly cost it nearly 20 million euros (\$22.8 million). Along with Mamic, national anti-graft prosecutors charged six other people including his brother Zoran, a former Dinamo Zagreb coach, son Mario and former club director Damir Vrbanovic.

Mamic is charged of having organised a "criminal enterprise with the aim to get pecuniary gain for himself and others, all at Dinamo's detriment," a prosecutors' statement said.

The offences took place between December 2004 and December 2016, it said. The suspects were allegedly arranging fictious deals between Dinamo and foreign firms based in the United Kingdom, Switzerland, the United Arab Emirates and elsewhere for "non-existent mediation services during players' transfers," the statement said. The companies were then issuing receipts for non-existent services that the club was paying. "In such way...at least 144 million kunas (19.4 million euros) were paid on foreign companies' accounts at Dinamo's detriment," the statement said. The Mamic brothers and Vrbanovic are already being tried in another case for abuse of power and graft that cost Dinamo more than 15 million euros and the state 1.5 million euros.

Cash was allegedly embezzled through fictitious deals related to player transfers. Real Madrid midfielder Luka Modric testified in June over the details of his 2008 transfer from Dinamo to Tottenham Hotspur. However, he is now himself being probed over alleged false testimony and was questioned by prosecutors earlier this month. Another Croatian international, Liverpool defender Dejan Lovren, is to appear as a witness in September.

Mamic's trial, which opened in April, has attracted huge interest from media and residents of the eastern city of Osijek, where it is being held reportedly to avoid Mamic's influence on judges in the capital Zagreb. Mamic is considered to be the most powerful man in Croatian football and his connections extend into many spheres of public life. Most Croatian football fans see him as the real boss of the Croatian Football Federation and believe its formal chief Davor Suker is merely Mamic's puppet. The 57-year-old repeatedly argued that the probes against him were politically motivated.—AFP

## 'PROUD' KITTEL CONTINUES TOUR SPRINT DOMINATION

**BERGERAC:** Marcel Kittel cantered to a fourth stage win of the Tour de France at the end of yesterday's 178km 10th stage from Perigueux to Bergerac with Chris Froome retaining the overall lead.

The 29-year-old German was imperious as he won easily ahead of compatriot John Degenkolb with Dutchman Dylan Groenewegen third. "It's true, it's amazing, I can't even tell you how proud I am," said Quick-Step's Kittel.

"it's a fourth stage win in 10 days, that's a great achievement for me and the team." But it was the manner of Kittel's victory that was most impressive. Once he accelerated from around half a dozen bodies back, he simply breezed past the competition and streaked clear to win by a couple of bike lengths, even having time to raise his arms in celebration before crossing the line.

It means he is well set to make this his best Tour yet as he has already matched his previous top effort-four stage wins in both 2013 and 2014 — less than half the way through this year's race.

In fact, Kittel has won four of the five flat sprint finishes at the Tour this year, and in the one he didn't win he was held up by a crash in the final kilometer. A tilt at the record of eight stage wins from a single Tour has now become a viable possibility.

Kittel also broke the record for stage wins by a German, moving one clear of the 12 mark he had shared with Erik Zabel following his stage victory on Friday.

And he increased his lead in the green points jersey competition, emphasising the possibility of Kittel holding it all the way to Paris-although he has a fair way to go to match Zabel's record of six wins in that category. Earlier in the day French pair Yoann Ofredo and Elie Gesbert took off from the

The 10th stage followed Monday's rest day and Froome admitted Tuesday's stage "almost" felt like a second successive day off.

"It was a calmer day, there wasn't much wind and no stress today-it was a less complicated stage. "It's never easy but today was calmer." That would have been a relief after Sunday's calamitous stage that saw five riders crash out, including Australian con-

### EVERTON GAINING MOMENTUM ON FIELD, IN BOARDROOM

**LIVERPOOL:** Wayne Rooney's sentimental return to Everton after 13 years away fits the image of a club often criticized for living in the past amid the fast-evolving world of English soccer. The past 18 months have shown, however, that something exciting is brewing in the blue half of Merseyside: A newfound ambition and a determination to make up for lost time after falling behind the Premier League's elite.

There's a new 300-million-pound (\$385million) stadium on the horizon on the Mersey waterfront, replacing the atmospheric but cramped Goodison Park. There's a wealthy majority shareholder in place in Farhad Moshiri, an Iranian-British businessman who sold his share in Arsenal to get a stake in Everton in early 2016.

There's a highly regarded manager in Ronald Koeman, who holds a fine global reputation from his time as a player with Barcelona and the Netherlands, and a director of football in Steve Walsh, a super scout who was one of the unheralded architects behind Leicester's improbable Premier League title triumph in 2015-16.

And - arguably most important to Everton's success-starved fans - there's a team filled with a growing number of bright, bold and talented youngsters from England and abroad. The arrival of Rooney is the signature moment of a busy summer at Everton, a fact underscored by the lines outside the gates of Goodison Park on Monday to welcome home the club's so-called "prodigal son." But he's a blast from the past at a club looking forward, with momentum on the field and in the boardroom.

#### **GOING PLACES**

"We hit a level, and now we're going places," said Michael Graham, a 52-year-old Everton supporter who was outside the stadium waiting for a glimpse of Rooney. Everton's fans have been starved of success since the club's heyday in the mid-1980s, when it rivaled Merseyside rival Liverpool as England's most successful team. The last of Everton's nine top-flight titles came in 1987, its highest finish since the Premier League's inception in 1992 is fourth, and its last major trophy was the 1995 FA Cup.

A nine-year-old Rooney was at the old Wembley Stadium for that cup final against Manchester United, a big Everton follower just like his father and now his kids. They were the most pleased to see Rooney return to Everton after 13 trophy-laden years at United.

Rooney, a free transfer, is one of six players signed for a total of around 90 million pounds (\$115 million) this offseason. There are sure to be more, although Everton has recouped 75 million (\$97 million) in selling striker Romelu Lukaku to United. Koeman also oversaw the spending of 70 million pounds last season.

Fans are thrilled Everton is making its transfer moves early in the summer, instead of in the last days of the window as usual. Credit for that must go to Walsh for identifying the players and acting quickly, and also to Moshiri. Everton finally has a financial backer willing to spend big.

"I know from speaking to fans, my family, how excited they are," Rooney said about Everton's ambition on Monday. "It is great for everyone when a club makes new signings. There is a good feeling around Everton Football Club at the moment.

"We don't just want to limp around this season." Sitting alongside Rooney at his presentation on Monday, Koeman acknowledged the pressure was on Everton in his second season at Goodison. "The first season was to play good football and get good results," he said, "but now you need to make the next step."

The recent spending spree will not guarantee that improvement, though, as Liverpool and Tottenham know. Both clubs used money gained from a high-price player move (Luis Suarez at Liverpool in 2014 and Gareth Bale at Spurs in 2013) to strengthen the rest of the squad, but initially struggled to manage without their former star player.

Koeman has to decide where Rooney fits into his team and also how many of the club's youngsters, such as Ademola Lookman, Tom Davies, Dominic Calvert-Lewin and Mason Holgate, to start.

Still, there's optimism that Everton will bridge the gap to the top six by the end of the coming season, with Rooney providing the kind of leadership and experience - if not necessarily the goals - that Koeman's young team requires.—AP tender Richie Porte.

## JAMES LEAVES REAL, HOPES FOR SECOND CHANCE AT BAYERN

**MADRID:** After capturing the world's attention with his stunning goal for Colombia against Uruguay at the 2014 World Cup, no limits could be set for James Rodriguez. Now, three seasons later, he's leaving Real Madrid under a cloud of frustration, deemed surplus to requirements at the Spanish side and looking for a second chance in a loan spell at Bayern Munich.

The Bundesliga side hopes that Carlo Ancelotti, who was in charge in Madrid when James joined, will again be able to get the best from a player who undoubtedly has the talent to count among the world's best. "Signing James Rodriguez was our coach Carlo Ancelotti's biggest wish, following their successful spell working together in Madrid," Bayern chairman Karl-Heinz Rummenigge said as the club announced James' arrival on Tuesday.

Bayern signed the 25-year-old James on a two-year loan arrangement with an option to make the move permanent. Already well-known after three seasons at Porto and one at Monaco, that goal at the World Cup, where he took the ball on his chest and swiveled before smashing a brilliant volley in off the underside of the bar, catapulted James to stardom. He scored again in that game, too, and finished as the tournament's top scorer with six altogether.

James was suddenly being compared to established superstars Lionel Messi and Cristiano Ronaldo, and was touted as a future Ballon d'Or winner, the trophy then given to the world's best player. Real Madrid certainly thought so, splashing out some 80 million euros (\$91 million) to take the then 22-year-old from Monaco. He was given the prestigious No. 10 jersey, previously worn by the likes of Luis Figo and the Hungarian great Ferenc Puskas.

James enjoyed a stellar first season at Madrid under Ancelotti, scoring 17 goals and setting up 18 more in 46 competitive games in 2014-15, despite time sidelined with a broken metatarsal.

#### PERSONAL BATTLE

Ancelotti was forced to leave at the end of the season, however, and James failed to earn the same trust from his successor Zinedine Zidane. Last season he was relegated to Madrid's

"B-team" under the French coach, playing only when preferred stars were being rested. James failed to feature in the big games, and lsco - with whom he had been competing for a place from the start - had won their personal battle, establishing himself and becoming a firm favorite among fans.

With the talented Marco Asensio also pushing for a place, along with Croatian midfielder Mateo Kovacic, Zidane had a wealth of options when it came to replacing one of the favored "BBC" - Karim Benzema, Gareth Bale and Cristiano Ronaldo.

James simply found himself to be a star too many. He didn't even make the substitutes' bench for the Champions League final win over Juventus in June. In all, he finished with two Champions League medals, two FIFA Club World Cup titles and a Spanish league title, scoring 36 goals and providing 41 assists in 111 competitive appearances for Madrid.

They're impressive numbers for any player, but James' time in Madrid can only be viewed with regret based on his potential. Now Bayern is hoping to take advantage. In a way, the German club can't lose. It will reportedly pay Madrid 5 million euros (\$5.7 million) per season for James, and can then make the transfer permanent in 2019 for another 35 million euros (\$40 million).

"James is a very versatile player. He's a goalscorer himself, he sets up a lot of goals and on top of that he's great from set-pieces. There's no question that this transfer further increases the quality in our team," Rummenigge said.

While Madrid club president Florentino Perez had wanted James to stay so the club could capitalize on the player's marketing potential in South America, he left the final decision to Zidane, the first coach ever to lead a club to back-to-back Champions League titles in the modern era.

James cut a forlorn figure in his last season at the Spanish club, his frustration with Zidane clear when he was substituted off despite scoring in a rare start in a 4-2 league win at Leganes in April. Zidane defended his reaction, but James made only 13 league starts under the French coach last season, with nine appearances from the bench.

James was much happier under Ancelotti. Bayern can only benefit if the Italian coach manages to get him smiling again. — AP

## PARIS, LA TO HOST SUMMER GAMES

**LAUSANNE:** The International Olympic Committee agreed yesterday to award the 2024 and 2028 Games at the same time, effectively guaranteeing that Paris and Los Angeles will be the hosts.

The French capital is tipped to stage 2024, with the California metropolis having hinted that it was prepared to wait four more years. The two cities were the remaining candidates for the 2024 Olympics, a contest that IOC boss Thomas Bach said created "a golden opportunity". The Olympic movement has had increasing trouble attracting prospective hosts given the soaring costs and taxpayer support required. Paris and Los Angeles mounted progressive, exemplary bids that would trim expenses by using existing facilities, the IOC said, making clear that it did not want to reject t either candidate.

Bach lobbied for a double hosting plan, which won unanimous approval from IOC members at a meeting yesterday in Lausanne, Switzerland. With the deal in place, the IOC now has a two-month window to negotiate with Paris and Los Angeles over which city will go first. Bach said he wants a "tripartite agreement" before the IOC's main annual meeting in Peru's capital Lima on September 13, when a vote on the 2024 host had been scheduled. Immediately after the double hosting deal was approved, Los Angeles Mayor Eric Garcetti and his Parisian counterpart Anne Hidalgo appeared on stage arm-in-arm to thank the IOC members, a clear sign that the desired

#### PARIS 'READY', LA TO WAIT?

Delegations from the two cities-led by French President Emmanuel Macron and LA's Garcetti-were in Lausanne to make fresh pitches to IOC voters. Paris has maintained a tougher line on the 2028 question, insisting it was focused narrowly on 2024, the centenary anniversary of the city's last Games.

"I am here to convey a message to say our people are ready to host these Games," Macron told reporters. "After three failed bids we don't want to lose a fourth one," he said. Paris mounted losing bids for the 1992, 2008 and 2012 Games.

The Los Angeles team did little to quell

speculation it was open to 2028. "LA is ready to throw these Olympics in two months if we are asked, or two decades if it came to that because we have everything ready," Garcetti said, while noting the city was still "competing for 2024." Bid chairman Casey Wasserman reminded that Los Angeles had not given the IOC "ultimatums" over the 2024 question. The city last hosted the Games in 1984. "Working hard to get the Olympics for the United States (L.A.). Stay tuned!" President Donald Trump said in a tweet, without making reference to a particular year.

#### 'GREAT' OLYMPIC CITIES

The Olympic movement has been stained by Games that erected grand multi-million

dollar facilities that were left to crumble and rot, while the billions spent in public money offered no long-term benefit to the host communities.

Los Angeles has stressed its near entire reliance on private funding while vowing to use the Games to broaden access to sports across the city, something it won praise for doing following the 1984 edition.

While Paris has equally focused on leaving a positive legacy, Macron also highlighted the opportunity for France to rally around the "Olympic values" of tolerance and inclusivity, saying they were embedded in the country's "DNA." "It truly is a tale of two great Olympic cities," said a report released last week by the IOC's 2024 Evaluation Commission. — AFP

### VENUS, MUGURUZA INTO WIMBLEDON S-FINALS

**LONDON:** Venus Williams became the oldest Wimbledon semi-finalist for 23 years as the fivetime champion brushed aside French Open winner Jelena Ostapenko, while Garbine Muguruza powered past Svetlana Kuznetsova to make it back to the last four yesterday.

Williams' 73-minute masterclass on Centre Court clinched a 6-3, 7-5 victory that made her the most senior player to reach the semi-finals since Martina Navratilova in 1994. The American star, who reached the last of her eight Wimbledon finals in 2009, faces Britain's Johanna Konta or Romania's Simona Halep in the last four on Thursday.

World number 11 Williams, beaten in this year's Australian Open final, was knocked out in the 2016 semi-finals and is chasing a first major title since winning Wimbledon in 2008. Williams' victory equalled her sister Serena's total of 86 main draw match victories at Wimbledon, the most among any active player.

She will climb back into the top 10 thanks to her Wimbledon run, but breaking Serena's record to become the tournament's oldest champion in the Open era is her sole focus. "I love this game. That's why I put in the effort and the time. It's a beautiful game. It's been so good to me," Venus said.

"The competition keeps you growing. You have to get better if you want to stay relevent. "I love the challenge. It's not always easy dealing with the pressure. It's only you that can have the answer."

Twenty years after making her Wimbledon debut, Venus was playing in her 100th singles match at the All England Club, while Ostapenko was in only her eighth. That gulf in experience was

immediately apparent when Venus broke in the second game and cruised through the first set in serene fashion.

Having stunned the tennis world by becoming the first unseeded player to win the French Open last month, Ostapenko was riding an 11-match winning streak at the majors.

But Ostapenko, 20, was the youngest player left in the tournament and Venus has scythed through the draw by dispatching a series of opponents almost half her age, many of whom idolised the seven-time Grand Slam champion when they were growing up. Williams was just too canny for the fresh-faced Ostapenko, manoeuvering her out of position time and again before delivering the kill shot. After breaking in the third game of the second set, Williams moved into a 3-1 lead, then endured her only wobble as Ostapenko broke back. Williams was unfazed and shattered Ostapenko's spirit with another break before serving out a commanding win. Muguruza powered into her second Wimbledon semi-final in the last three years with an emphatic 6-3, 6-4 win over Russian seventh seed Kuznetsova.

Since winning her maiden Grand Slam title at the French Open last year, Muguruza has struggled to return to the top and this is her first major semifinal since that Roland Garros triumph.

#### STORMY

Muguruza, beaten by Serena in the 2015 Wimbledon final, will face Coco Vandeweghe or Magdalena Rybarikova in the last four.

The 23-year-old is being coached by Conchita

Martinez, who became the only Spanish woman to win Wimbledon in 1994, and the lessons appear to have done the trick. "I played good. I'm trying not to think a lot, just go for it and play my game. I'm happy it worked out," Muguruza said. "It seems far away since I last made the final here. I'm a completely different player. "It means a lot to make the semi-finals again, my breakthrough was here." Following Venus onto Centre Court is Johanna Konta, who takes on Simona Halep bidding to become the first British woman to reach the semi-finals since Virginia Wade in 1978.

Not since Jo Durie in 1984 has Britain had a female representative in the last eight and Konta, hoping to become the first home winner of the Wimbledon women's title since Wade in 1977, has added incentive to go a step further against Halep after their stormy Fed Cup encounter earlier this year. Konta was reduced to tears by what she felt were threats and intimidation from the Romanian fans in Constanta during her match against Sorana Cirstea, but Halep fanned the flames this week when she claimed her compatriots had done nothing wrong. Halep has extra motivation of her own as a victory over Konta will guarantee she takes over from Angelique Kerber as the new world number one. — AFP

### MT GOX CEO DENIES EMBEZZLING MILLIONS OF DOLLARS OF BITCOINS

TOKYO: The head of the failed Japanbased bitcoin exchange Mt. Gox pleaded not guilty Tuesday to charges of embezzlement and data manipulation. Franceborn Mark Karpeles said he had tried to save the bankrupted exchange by using a kind of automated computer software called a "Willy bot," also described as an "obligation exchange," to help cover its rising debts by pushing bitcoin values higher. "I am innocent of all the charges," he said. "I did not in any way dishonestly manipulate data or misuse the customers' money," he said.

Mt. Gox shut down in February 2014, saying it had gone bankrupt after losing about 850,000 bitcoins, possibly to hackers. Speaking after the hearing, Karpeles said he was not guilty and that he was still analyzing data, trying to track down the missing bitcoins. He said the main cause of the bankruptcy was "hacking of bitcoins by outsiders." "As the person responsible for Mt. Gox I must recover the stolen bitcoins. To do so, I must figure out how they leaked out and where they went," Karpeles said.

The "Willy bot" transactions were legal, he said, and intended to save the company. "I faithfully performed those obligation exchanges, but not for my own personal profit," he said. Karpeles was arrested in August 2015 and released last year. If found guilty of embezzlement, he could face up to five years in prison, or a fine of up to 500,000 yen (\$4,000).

Stunned community

Prosecutors have argued that money Karpeles obtained from Mt Gox was the property of the customers. Karpeles and his defense team contend that the funds were revenues of Mt Gox. People affected by Mt. Gox's failure are still trying to get back funds they lost and are hoping the trial will help explain what happened. Mt Gox was one of the world's biggest bitcoin exchanges and its failure stunned digital currency community. Critics said the debacle highlighted the risks of bitcoin transactions, while bitcoin proponents contended Mt. Gox was just an exception. The case has posed a challenge for authorities unfamiliar with digital currencies and the technologies involved in their creation and trading.

Japan has enacted new laws to regulate bitcoins and other cryptocurrencies, whose use has been rapidly expanding. One of the country's biggest electronics retailers, Bic Camera, has begun allowing bitcoin payments at its outlets. The government also has spelled out regulations to help prevent misuse of bitcoins and other virtual currencies for terrorism or other illegal activities, including requiring banks and other businesses to verify identities, keep records and report suspicious transactions. The regulations implemented in April require virtual currency traders to keep customers' assets separate from their own, partly because of the losses suffered in the Mt Gox bankruptcy. — AP

JACKSON: The United Auto Workers filed petitions Monday to force a unionization election at a Nissan plant in Mississippi after a yearslong campaign to build support in a region typically unwelcoming to organized labor. The UAW declined comment but has scheduled an event yesterday at its office near the plant in Canton, just north of Jackson. Sandra Hightower of the National Labor Relations Board confirmed that the board received the UAW's election petition in its New Orleans office.

The union has long struggled to organize foreign-owned auto plants across the South, working for years to build support for a vote among the 6,500 employees at the Mississippi complex. Monday's move sets the stage for a key showdown. The UAW and community allies also have pushed Nissan to stay neutral in a vote, claiming the company has intimidated workers. The labor board has backed some of those claims in pending litigation. Nissan Motor Co spokeswoman Parul Bajaj reiterated the company's stance that workers get to choose whether they have a union but management opposes the move. "While it is ultimately up to our employees who will represent them, we do not believe that UAW representation is in the best interest of Nissan Canton and its workers," Bajaj said.

#### **Celebrity support**

The pro-union campaign has sought to link support for the union with civil rights for African-Americans. Workers at Nissan's plant in Smyrna, Tennessee, rejected the UAW in 1989 and 2001 votes, but no election has been held at the Mississippi plant in Canton. The Mississippi campaign has featured support from the NAACP and actor Danny Glover, as well as a rally in March headlined by US Sen Bernie Sanders, a Vermont independent and former Democratic presidential candidate.

Hightower said the UAW asked to represent all production and maintenance workers at the Canton plant, a group that could include contract workers employed by two other companies. She said the labor board would seek to schedule an election "as soon as possible." However, she noted that pending unfair labor

practice complaints filed by the UAW could block the vote. The UAW filed a new round of charges June 26.

Thirty percent of workers must sign petitions seeking an election. Hightower could not immediately say how many workers have signed. "We have a pile of paper," she said. Bishop Thomas Jenkins of New Dimensions Church in Jackson recorded a video and spoke at a Sunday workers meeting at the UAW office. He said he has long advocated for better wages and working conditions in Mississippi. "We've been talking about this for a long time," Jenkins told the AP in a phone interview Monday. "It's time to go forth."

The union lost a 2014 vote among all workers at Volkswagen AG's plant in Chattanooga, Tennessee, but then won a vote among 160 maintenance workers. That was the first-ever win for the UAW at a foreign-owned auto plant in the US South. German-based Volkswagen had refused to bargain with those workers, saying representation decisions should be made by the entire hourly workforce. — AP

### VILLAGE WOMEN TRANSFORM INTO CLEAN ENERGY ENTREPRENEURS

**KATHMANDU:** Hundreds of rural women in Nepal are turning from housewives to entrepreneurs to bring clean, energy smart products such as solar panels, lanterns and batteries to power-starved villages in an initiative aiming to help women out of poverty. The social enterprise Empower Generation http: //www.empowergeneration.org/ provides technical training and support to women in the impoverished Himalayan nation to set up clean energy businesses and provide loans to poorer customers.

Since it began operations in 2012, Empower Generation has created over 20 women-led businesses, employing 300 female distribution agents who go from village-to-village, selling, maintaining and that time they have sold almost 60,000 products such as solar-powered mobile phone chargers, flashlights, and rechargeable batteries, providing around 300,000 Nepalis with access to cleaner, safer light and power.

"There are many slogans to empower women. But in reality little has been done," Empower Generation's co-founder Sita Adhikari told the Thomson Reuters Foundation in an interview.

"If we want to really empower women, we must train them in business skills so they can generate income and become economically self-dependent." Wedged between India and China, Nepal - famed as the birthplace of Buddha and home to

Deep-rooted patriarchy means women and girls are often marginalized and vulnerable to exploitation such as human trafficking and sexual slavery.

Female participation in the formal workforce is low and few opportunities are available. In addition, more than half of the country's 28 million population do not have reliable access to electricity and daily power cuts lasting up to 18 hours are common.

The poorest spend around 20 percent

which impacts women and children the most by exposing them to fumes from fuels with millions of women and children dying each year from respiratory problems. Adhikari, 43, a social activist and mother of two, said she and her partner, US national Anya Cherneff, wanted to boost the financial independence of Nepali women by addressing the issue of energy poverty. The entrepreneurs are trained in business skills such as maintaining accounts and inventory control while Empower Generation provides marketing materials.

They then recruit and train female distribution agents in their communities to go out and sell the products and earn a

commission on each sale. They are also piloting selling "pay-as-you-go" solar home systems using mobile money.

Empower Generation's business model has received much praise and last month won the International Ashden Award for Clean Energy for Women and Girls for its innovative approach to propagate sustainable energy among Nepal's rural poor. Adhikari said the company wanted to expand the number of female energy entrepreneurs from all of Nepal's 75 districts from the current 11 where it works. "We want to scale up to 100 entrepreneurs and 1,000 sales agents by 2020," she said. "This way more rural community will benefit and more women will be empowered," she said. — Reuters

### THAI SEAFOOD GIANT COMMITS TO MAJOR FISHING REFORMS

BANGKOK: Thai Union, one of the world's largest seafood conglomerates, said yesterday it will overhaul its fishing practices to protect against labor abuses and unsustainable trawling, a move hailed by Greenpeace as "huge progress". The Thai food giant-which owns major global brands such as Chicken of the Sea, John West and Petit Navire-has long been a bete noire to those campaigning against overfishing and abusive working conditions on boats. But yesterday it released a joint statement with Greenpeace announcing a series of reforms that both said should encourage other seafood behemoths to follow suit.

'This marks huge progress for our oceans and marine life and for the rights of people working in the seafood industry," Greenpeace International Executive Director Bunny McDiarmid said in the statement. "Now is the time for other companies to step up, and show similar leadership." Among the commitments Thai Union has made is to cut the number of fish aggregating devices (FADs) it uses by 50 percent by 2020 and reduce longline fishing.

FADs, which float on the surface to attract fish, and longlines are effective ways of catching large hauls of lucrative fish like tuna. But they often result in reams of other animals being caught, including endangered sharks and turtles.

The reforms will also target working conditions on board Thai Union boats and those of its suppliers including an extended moratorium on "transshipping". Transshipping is a method many fishing giants use to keep trawlers at sea as long as possible, often for years at a time.

Catches are transferred to refrigerated transport vessels at sea, saving the time and fuel costs of returning to port. While economically efficient, environmental groups have long warned that transshipping allows trawlers to hide illegal catches and often leads to slavery-like conditions for many of the low-paid fishermen who spend years onboard their boats.

Thai Union have also agreed to allow independent observers or digital tracking devices onto all their longline boats and will meet with Greenpeace every six months to assess implementation.

In the joint statement, CEO Thiraphong Chansiri said his company "has fully embraced its role as a leader for positive change as one of the largest seafood companies in the world."

Thai Union posted worldwide sales of \$3.8 billion in 2016 and is targeting \$8 billion revenue by 2020. Thailand is the world's third largest seafood exporter but the industry has been dogged by allegations of rights abuses and cheap labor in its fishing fleets and many food processing factories. The sector is mainly staffed by poor migrant workers from Myanmar, Laos and Cambodia. The European Union has threatened to ban all its seafood products unless the military government tackles rampant illegal fishing among its fleets. — AFP

### **DESPITE PROMISES, NO DECISION** YET FROM TRUMP ON STEEL TARIFFS PLENTY OF WIGGLE ROOM ON DIRECTION HE'LL TAKE

**WASHINGTON:** President Donald Trump pledged during the campaign to help US factory workers by slapping tariffs on foreign steel. But his long-awaited decision on the issue is running behind schedule and administration officials are leaving plenty of wiggle room on what direction he'll take. Commerce Secretary Wilbur Ross initially hoped to finish a report on tariffs last month, but his department has been holding off as the Pentagon weighs in about impact of steel tariffs on national security. The delay is an example of the difficulty Trump faces in delivering on his ambitious policy agenda - on taxes, health insurance and more - as quickly as he told voters he could.

Alliance for American Manufacturing, supports higher steel tariffs but notes that the initial timeline set by the administration was "very ambitious." He says that tariffs could help domestic steel mills while encouraging other countries to take similar moves against China. Paul said that some officials and advocacy groups have slowed the process to fine-tune the policy, while others are hoping that a slower pace of discussions will derail the debate. #### Low prices

"If we were to impose tariffs and quotas because of the Chinese problems, but we really hit our friends and allies - then how does all this advance our interests?" says Amanda DeBusk, head of the international trade department at the law firm of Hughes Hubbard & Reed. Then there are America's steel-consuming industries, such as automakers and equipment manufacturers. They say they would be hurt if sanctions drove up steel prices. Daniel Pearson, senior fellow at the libertarian Cato Institute, says steel mills employ just 140,000 workers - a fraction of the 6.5 million who work for manufacturers that consume steel. Stuart Speyer, the president of Dickson, Tennessee-based Tennsco Corp, employs 650 workers making cabinets, lockers, bookcases and other storage containers made of steel. He said Tennsco recently lost a 50-year customer who discovered cheaper prices elsewhere and that new tariffs would make things worse. "In an attempt to protect the US steel industry, many more American jobs will inadvertently be lost," Speyer said. — AP

### JAPAN TO HOST TPP PACIFIC RIM TRADE PACT TALKS, MINUS US

**TOKYO:** Members of a Pacific Rim trade initiative rejected by US President Donald Trump are to hold working-level talks today in the Japanese mountain resort town of Hakone, west of Tokyo. The three-day meeting among envoys from the 11 remaining members of the Trans-Pacific Partnership follows a breakthrough last week on a Japan-European Union trade deal seen as a repudiation of the US moves to pull back from such arrangements.

Last week, Japan named a new chief negotiator for TPP talks, Kazuyoshi Umemoto, a former ambassador to Italy. Trump pulled the US out of the pact soon after taking office, saying his "America First" policy favors one-on-one agreements with other nations rather than multinational pacts like the TPP. Other TPP members hope to make progress on an alternative that does not include the U.S. before an Asia-Pacific summit in Vietnam in November.

The administration of President Barack Obama helped lead the five-year effort that yielded a TPP agreement in 2015. That deal

has to be restructured since as originally agreed it can only take effect after it is ratified by six countries that account for 85 percent of its original members' combined gross domestic product. The US made up 60 percent of the TPP's combined GDP, so it could not be implemented as it stands now.

Japanese officials say they are hoping the TPP talks will get a boost from the Economic Partnership Agreement reached with the EU, which dismantles trade barriers and eases tariffs on a wide range of products for the two markets accounting for almost a third of world economic activity. The other TPP member countries are Australia, Brunei, Canada, Chile, Malaysia, Mexico, New Zealand, Peru, Singapore and Vietnam.

Supporters of the TPP say it would set high standards for modern trade rules, labor, environmental and intellectual property protections. Critics say it puts corporate interests ahead of the public good and national sovereignty. In Asia, the US withdrawal is seen as a step back for US influence that leaves wider leeway for Chinese geopolitical and business interests. — AFP

White House officials have hinted that tariffs still are coming. Asked on "Fox News Sunday" over the weekend if the president planned to impose sanctions on foreign steel, White House chief of staff Reince Priebus responded: "My guess is that he will because he promised he would."

There are trade-offs from taxing foreign steel that include higher prices for consumers and manufacturers that rely on steel, as well as strained relationships with trade partners. The possible risks became more apparent last week at the summit of the 20 leading rich and developing nations in Germany. The summit ended with a declaration that governments would develop "concrete policy solutions that reduce steel excess capacity" by November 2017, but the U.S. position was aggressive enough that there were concerns about a potential trade war.

Supporters of the tariffs say the move would help crack down on excess steelmaking by China. Opponents say it would raise prices for consumers and manufacturers that turn steel into cars, furniture and other products. Scott Paul, president of the

To critics, the administration's national security case against steel imports looks shaky. The American military does not appear critically dependent on steel imports. ### EU SEEKING COLLECTIVE APPROACH TO DEALING WITH BAD BANK LOANS

**BRUSSELS:** European Union finance ministers have backed proposals to jointly address the issue of nonperforming loans in the banking sector, which has been an economic problem particularly in Italy and Spain. At a regular gathering yesterday, the finance ministers outlined policy actions to reduce the EU's total stock of bad loans, which amounted to nearly 1 trillion euros (\$1.14 trillion) at the end of 2016 equivalent to 6.7 percent of the bloc's annual GDP, or 5.1 percent of total loans.

### EYEING SLEEPY OFFICE WORKERS, CHINA'S OPENS NAP CAPSULES

BEIJING: For China's sleep-deprived white-collar workers needing a place for a nap, a booming "sharing economy" offering a growing range of services has come up with a cheap, mobile-friendly solution: capsule hotels. With an easy phone scan, customers can book a nap in a sleek white capsule - designed to look like a space pod - for just 10 yuan (\$1.50) for half an hour during the midday rush. The rate drops to only 6 yuan at other times.

"It's really meeting a rigid demand as many professionals have a difficult time finding a nice private place to nap," said Han Yue, operations manager at Xiangshui Space, a Beijing-based startup which launched the services in Beijing in May and has since opened up in Shanghai and Chengdu. Han said her

capsules were different to Japan's capsule hotels, because she was targeting a different type of customer, those looking for a quick nap, not a full night of sleep.

The company plans to extend to cities such as Qingdao, Nanjing and Shenzhen by the end of July or early August, she said.

China's rapidly expanding "sharing economy", exemplified by the success of bike-sharing companies such as Mobike and Ofo, has inspired a wave of "sharing" enterprises backed by a funding frenzy powered by so-called angel investors and venture capital firms.

China's "sharing economy" is expected to grow about 40 percent this year to 4.83 trillion yuan (\$705 billion). By 2020, it could account for a tenth of gross domestic product. — AP

"Non-performing loans are a problem for the banking industry for which solutions have until now been mainly defined at the national level," said Toomas Toniste, Estonia's finance minister who was chairing the meeting as his country has taken over the rotating 6-month presidency of the EU. "We need a more collective approach," he added. Sweden's bad loans amount to only 1 percent of the nation's economy, while Greece's account for a massive 46 percent.

#### Italy gone bad

Italy is one big economy that's been contending with loans gone bad. Its banks have been worn down by some 360 billion euros (\$400 billion) in loans that won't be paid back in full as a result of years of crisis and subdued growth that's made it difficult for firms and households to service their debts. The scale of the non-performing loans stands a little below 20 percent of the banks' total

## EMERGING MARKET CURRENCIES' SELLOFF RESUMES

**LONDON:** The dollar hit a four-month high against the yen and world's top bonds and emerging market currencies were back under pressure yesterday, on bets for higher interest rates in a small but growing group of major economies. With the expectations fuelled by increasingly robust-looking global growth, MSCI's 47-country All World share index was up for a third day running, though it was forced to cling on as Europe's main bourses faltered despite a fresh flurry of M&A activity.

They were unsettled by some heavy falls among defensive consumer staples and property stocks, a dip in the commodity sector as oil stumbled and as futures markets pointed to flat start to US trading for Wall Street. Treasuries and benchmark European bond yields resumed their march upwards, having paused on Monday, as the focus shifted back to the pace of monetary tightening in the world's largest economies.

Federal Reserve chief Janet Yellen starts two days of testimony today as it prepares to unwind the massive hoard of bonds it bought to ease the financial crisis, while top ECB and Bank of England policymakers were due to speak in Europe yesterday. Germany's 10-year yield edged up 2 basis points to 0.56 percent having more than doubled over the last few weeks. The South African rand, Turkish lira and Russia rouble all dropped around 1 percent as some unusually concentrated selling resumed to emerging markets too.

Roger Webb, Head of European Credit at Aberdeen Asset Management said slightly stronger-than-expected global growth numbers recently had boosted expectations of higher interest rates. "I think the increased hawkishness we have seen from the central banks has led to a fear that we could see a mini-taper tantrum," he said. "I don't think there is too much alarm. I think the move to

slightly higher yields in Europe and the US, UK and elsewhere is probably understandable."

The dollar ground higher against most major currencies, including to a fourmonth high of 114.43 yen as traders played the past fortnight's 25 basis-point rise in US government bond yields against the Bank of Japan's vow to keep its stimulus flowing. The New Zealand dollar fell to its lowest in over two weeks meanwhile after an 6.8 magnitude earthquake hit the country's south island.

The Canadian dollar was down slightly too as investors awaited a Bank of Canada interest rate decision today which could be its first hike since the financial crisis. Forecasters are still divided on whether it will pull the trigger, but money markets seem convinced it will and are also 80 percent priced for a follow-up rise by December.

#### Fine China vs toxic trio

In commodities, crude oil slipped back after pushing higher overnight in Asia. Increased drilling activity in the United States and uncertainty over Libyan and Nigerian production cuts clouded the future supply outlook, leaving US crude down a third of a dollar at \$44.13 a barrel and Brent at \$46.57. BNP Paribas slashed its forecasts for Brent by \$9 to \$51 a barrel for 2017 and by \$15 to \$48 for 2018. Barclays also cut its 2017 and 2018 Brent forecasts to \$52 a barrel. Gold edged lower to \$1,212.13 an ounce as it headed back towards a fourmonth low and copper dipped too as the prospect of a strike at one of Chile's big mines failed to offset data showing a rapid build-up of inventories. Stainless steel ingredient nickel, however, gained after Chinese steel prices reached their highest in 3-1/2 years.

That came as bluechip Chinese stocks also hit an 18-month high as investors chased firms with stronger fundamentals and the central bank resumed liquidity injections having kept the taps closed for last 12 sessions. Other emerging markets heavyweights were on the ropes though. South Africa's rand hit a twomonth low while Turkey's lira and Russia's rouble both lost almost 1 percent to trade just off recent respective 2-1/2 month and six-month lows.

They have become a new 'toxic trio' for traders having been hammered over the last few weeks despite other major EM currencies, such the Mexican peso, Brazilian real and Polish zloty, all faring relatively well. "We have been emphasizing the fundamental weakness of the South African macro story for some time, and believe that market pricing on ZAR (the rand) showed a degree of complacency that in part was explained by low G3 bond yields," analysts at Morgan Stanley wrote in a note. "It is thus not much of a surprise that it is the worst-performing EM currency now that liquidity conditions look less supportive." —Reuters

### KEY FACTS ABOUT THE WORLD'S MOST WIDELY USED CRYPTO CURRENCY

TOKYO: Mark Karpeles, the former CEO of collapsed Bitcoin exchange MtGox, went on trial in Tokyo on charges stemming from the disappearance of hundreds of millions of dollars worth of the virtual currency from its digital vaults. Here are some key facts about the world's most widely used crypto currency:

#### What is Bitcoin?

Bitcoin is a virtual currency created from computer code. Unlike a real-world unit such as the US dollar or euro, it has no central bank and is not backed by any government. Instead, Bitcoin's community of users control and regulate it. Advocates say this makes it an efficient alternative to traditional currencies because it is not subject to the whims of a state that may devalue its money to boost exports, for example.

Just like other currencies, Bitcoins can be exchanged for goods and services-or for other currencies-provided the other party is willing to accept them.

#### Where does it come from?

Bitcoin was launched in 2009 as a bit of encrypted software written by someone using the Japanese-sounding name Satoshi Nakamoto. Last year secretive Australian entrepreneur Craig Wright said he was the creator of Bitcoin, but some have raised doubts over his claim.

Hundreds of other digital currencies followed but Bitcoin is by far the most popular, with an increasing number of merchants accepting digital currencies for payments. Transactions happen when heavily encrypted codes are passed across a computer network. The network as a whole monitors and verifies the transaction in a process that is intended to ensure no single Bitcoin can be spent in more than one place simultaneously.

Users can "mine" Bitcoins-bring new ones into being-by having their computers run complicated and increasingly difficult processes. However, the model is limited and only 21 million units will ever be created.

#### What's it worth?

Like any other currency, it fluctuates. But unlike most real-world units, Bitcoin's value has swung wildly in a short period.

When it first came into existence it was worth a few US cents. Several years later Bitcoin topped \$1,000. It's now worth more than \$2,300, with commentators suggesting some are buying it as an alternative bet in times of global economic uncertainty.

The chaotic withdrawal of high-value notes in India, and Chinese controls on the purchase of foreign currency have also been cited for its meteoric rise. There are presently more than 16 million units in circulation. Some economists say the limited number of Bitcoins mean its price will increase over the long run, making it less useful as a currency and more a vehicle to store value, like gold.

But detractors point to Bitcoin's volatility, security issues and other weaknesses as flaws that will eventually undermine it.

#### What's the future?

Some commentators say that like many technological developments, the first iteration of a product will encounter difficulties, possibly terminal ones. But the trail it blazes might smooth the way for the next crypto currency. Problems include an apparent vulnerability to theft when Bitcoins are stored in digital wallets.

A major Hong Kong-based Bitcoin exchange suspended trading last year after \$65 million in the virtual unit was reportedly stolen by hackers. The virtual currency movement also faces legitimacy issues because of the way it allows for anonymous transactions-the very thing that libertarian adopters like about it. Detractors say bitcoin's use on the underground Silk Road website, where users could buy drugs and guns with it, is proof that it is a bad thing. If Bitcoin does become more widely accepted, experts say, it could lead to more government regulations, which would negate the very attraction of the concept. — AFP

### Tesla adding service centers AS MODEL 3 GOES ON SALE

**DETROIT:** Electric car maker Tesla is expanding its service operations and hiring more than 1,000 technicians to meet expected demand for its new Model 3 sedan.

The Model 3, cheaper than Tesla's existing cars, goes on sale this month and is expected to attract hundreds of thousands of new customers to the brand. To accommodate them, the company is adding 100 new service centers worldwide over the next year, bringing its total number of service centers to 250 The new service centers will be in areas that have the most reservation-holders for the Model 3.

Tesla also is adding 350 vans to its mobile service fleet, mostly in the U.S. The vans go to owners' homes or offices and repair their cars while they wait, typically for about one hour. The vans are equipped with tools and replacement parts as well as an espresso machine, snacks and ids' toys. Until now. Tesla had around 30 mobile repair vans, which were used mostly in cases where the owner lived too far from a service center. About six months ago, the company began deploying the vans in the San Francisco area in order to ease the burden on its service centers and see if they could help meet anticipated demand for the Model 3. Customers were happy with the new arrangement, so the company decided to roll out mobile service in more locations.

able, \$1,000 reservations for the car, but it has said it expects to make 500,000 vehicles in 2018. That's up from 84,000 last year.

Like its stores, which are owned by the company and not by franchised dealers, Tesla has upended the auto industry with its service model. Tesla CEO Elon Musk said several years ago that unlike traditional dealerships, Tesla didn't intend to make a profit on service and repairs. U.S. dealers made \$110 billion in service and parts sales last year, according to the National Automobile Dealers Association.

Tesla said it's charging the same amount for non-warranty repairs done at service centers or through mobile vans. It hasn't released details on the warranty plan for the Model 3, so it's not yet clear if it will match Tesla's other vehicles. The Model S and Model X have a four-year, 50,000mile vehicle warranty and an eight-year battery warranty with unlimited miles

### MANY ORGANIZATIONS BANNED IN PAKISTAN THRIVE ONLINE

ISLAMABAD: It's dusk. The shadows of three men brandishing assault rifles welcome the reader to the Facebook page of Lashkar-e-Islam, one of 65 organizations that are banned in Pakistan, either because of terrorist links or as purveyors of sectarian hate.

Still more than 40 of these groups operate and flourish on social media sites, communicating on Facebook, Twitter, WhatsApp and Telegram, according to a senior official with Pakistan's Federal Investigation Agency, or FIA, who is tasked with shutting down the sites. They use them to recruit, raise money and demand a rigid Islamic system. It is also where they incite the Sunni faithful against the country's minority Shiites and extoll jihad, or holy war, in India-ruled Kashmir and in Afghanistan.

"It's like a party of the banned groups online. They are all on social media," the FIA official told The Associated Press. He spoke on condition his name not be used because agency officials are not allowed to be quoted by name.

Meanwhile, Pakistan is waging a cyber crackdown on activists and journalists who use social media to criticize the government, the military or the intelligence agencies. The Interior Ministry even ordered the FIA, Pakistan's equivalent of the American FBI, to move against "those ridiculing the Pakistan Army on social media." The FIA official said the agency has interrogated more than 70 activists for postings considered critical. All but two have been released and a third is still under investigation, he said.

Activists, journalists and rights groups who monitor Pakistan's cyberspace say the banned groups active on social media operate unencumbered because several are patronized by the military, its intelligence agencies, radical religious groups and politicians looking for votes.

Even the FIA official concedes state support for some of the banned groups but said it is a global phenomenon engaged in by all intelligence agencies.

Taha Siddigui, a Pakistan-based journalist with France 24 and an active social media user who often criticizes heavy handed actions of the military or its agencies, has taken the FIA to court to demand to know why he is under investigation after being ordered to come in for questioning. His resistance is taking its toll with family, friends and colleagues, who plead for him to be silent, he said. "They worry someday I will just disappear."

At FIA headquarters in the capital, Islamabad, the official told the AP that banned groups use proxy servers that reveal IP addresses buried somewhere in Baloch, a social media rights activist who has studied the free-wheeling use of social media by banned groups and purveyors of sectarian hate. He said sites can be blocked, users located and the persons running the pages stopped.

Bloggers like Goraya had elaborate safeguards but still were tracked down by authorities, said Baloch. Unlike the banned groups, Baloch said bloggers, social media activists and journalists are found and stopped because Pakistan's civilian and military intelligence agencies are on the offensive against them.

"Agencies have established a new wing to monitor 24/7, to counter liberal and progressive debate and particularly anything that criticizes their policies," he said. — AP

Unlike traditional dealers, Tesla also doesn't want customers to have to go to a service center for repairs that can be done remotely. The company says 80 percent of repairs to its cars, including replacing the tires or fixing electronic glitches, can be done without a lift, which means it's just as easy to perform them out of a mobile repair van. That leaves service centers free to concentrate on more complicated repairs that require a lift, like motor or battery problems. Tesla is hiring 1,400 new service technicians this year to staff the service centers and mobile repair vans. — AP

"Everyone is protecting their own terrorists. Your good guy is my bad guy and vice versa," he said, adding that some sites belonging to banned groups are intentionally ignored to gain intelligence.

On one Facebook page, the Afghan TalEban flag welcomes viewers, its masthead emblazoned with Arabic script identifying the page as belonging to the Islamic Emirate of Afghanistan. Still another Facebook site features one of India's most wanted, Hafiz Saeed, the founder of Lashkar-e -Taiba, another banned organization and a US declared terrorist group. Saeed even has a \$10 million US-imposed bounty on his head. Yet his group, which has been resurrected under several names, is billed as a charity and has several Facebook pages. Currently called Falah-e-Insaniat, the group boasts of its community work, but its pages feature anti-India videos, call Syria a bleeding wound, rail against India and chastise the Pakistan government for siding with the US following the 9/11 attacks.

Facebook and Twitter have said that they ban "terrorist content." In the second half of last year, Twitter said on its site it had suspended 376,890 accounts because they were thought to promote terrorism, although they say less than 2 percent of the removals were the result of requests from governments. Facebook, meanwhile, said in a blog last month it uses artificial intelligence and human reviewers to find and remove "terrorist content."

"There is no place on Facebook for terrorism," Facebook spokeswoman Clare Wareing said in an email reply to The Associated Press. "Our Community Standards do not allow groups or people that engage in terrorist activity, or posts that express support for terrorism. We encourage people to use our reporting tools if they find content that they believe violates our standards, so we can investigate and take action."

Shahzad Ahmed, of the Islamabad-based social media rights group BytesForAll, said Pakistan's powerful military and intelligence agencies are waging a "communication war" against progressive, moderate voices and those who criticize the government and more particularly the military and its agencies. They use radical religious groups to promote their narrative, he said.

"Their connectivity on the ground, the mosques, madrassas and supporters translates into social media strength and they are (further) strengthened because they feel 'no one is going to touch us," he said.

Ahmed Wagass Goraya is a blogger who was picked up and tortured by men he believes belonged to the country's powerful intelligence agency, known by its acronym ISI. He said Pakistan's social media space is dominated by armies of trolls unleashed by the military, intelligence agencies and allied radical religious groups to push their narrative. That narrative includes promoting anti-India sentiment - India is Pakistan's longtime enemy against whom it has fought three wars.

Critics who openly accuse the military of using extremists as proxies are under attack, said Goraya. He fled Pakistan after social media was used to suggest the he and other bloggers were involved in blasphemy, a charge that carries the death penalty. In Pakistan even the suggestion that someone insulted Islam or its prophet can incite mobs to violence.

### **CYBERSECURITY STARTS WITH** TRAINING YOUR EMPLOYEES

**DUBAI:** The Petya ransomware attack that hit computers around the world recently, the second in two months, is vet another reminder that computers play key roles in most enterprises, and that it does not take much to disable those computers. Irrespective of how robust your information security systems are, users are still the weakest link in your company's cybersecurity. It's a business



it's now equally applicable to data Mohammed Basheer the first line of security. Users are

defence against cyber-attack, and also potentially - a business's most glaring vulnerability. People are just a very large attack surface but organizations can reduce the attack surfaces by implementing an effective organisation wide security awareness program.

Untrained employees are the linchpins for most data breaches. Those who attack businesses have no wish to spend a lot of time and money defeating its technology. Instead they would prefer to infect the user with ransomware, their favourite bait - "spray & pray" phishing attacks, which involves spamming with email that carries malicious content.

It has become increasingly important to embed ICT security awareness at all levels of an organisation. While awareness is the key, there also needs to be a balance struck. Employees need to know the risk their online activities pose and how to manage it, without being rendered unproductive by overly complex procedures.

Computer security training isn't just a matter of giving employees information. Knowing best practices and organization policy is important, but it helps only if employees understand that they make a difference and should feel they are part of the organizations information security. The truth is that user ignorance to security make most malware attacks possible, and that employees who are aware can avoid most of the attacks. Information Security Awareness should be

part of an organization culture, business leaders need to make sure their awareness programs cover all the important aspects of cybersecurity which ensure that their employees are well trained to tackle the current security threats. At the end of an education and awareness initiative, all users should be able to understand:

#### 1. How to identify security threats?

The user should be able to identify the difference between normal emails and malicious email. They should understand best practice in internet usage and understand the organizations security policies.

#### Response to the security incidents

The user must be aware of the security incident response procedure. Should they suspect a security incident in progress, they should be able to follow the security incident management procedure to curtail the incident from spreading across the organization.

As they say people are the weakest link in the information security chain, hence employee involvement is crucial for the success of an organization's security strategy. There is often a disconnect between what employees know they should do securitywise and what they actually do in practice. Organizations which continue to implement and reinforce effective awareness programs, have seen reduced number of security incidents, in turn maintaining better uptimes for the IT environment supporting the business processes, helping the organizations to upkeep their reputation resulting in better financial rewards.

## 'SIXTH EXTINCTION' OF WILDLIFE FASTER THAN FEARED

on Earth is unfolding more quickly than feared, scientists have warned. More than 30 percent of animals with a backbone - fish, birds, amphibians, reptiles and mammals - are declining in both range and population, according to the first comprehensive analysis of these trends. "This is the case of a biological annihilation occurring globally," said Stanford professor Rodolfo Dirzo, co-author of a study published on Monday in the peer-reviewed US journal, Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences (PNAS).

Around a decade ago, experts feared that a new planetary wipeout of species was looming. Today, most agree that it is underway - but the new study suggests that the die-out is already ratcheting up a gear. It pro-

PARIS: The sixth mass extinction of life vides much-needed data about the of life on Earth, including the non-avian own ever-expanding species - which threat to wildlife, mapping the dwindling ranges and populations of 27,600 species. For 177 mammals, researchers combed through data covering the period 1900 to 2015. The mammal species that were monitored have lost at least a third of their original habitat. the researchers found. Forty percent of them - including rhinos, orangutans, gorillas and many big cats - are surviving on 20 percent or less of the land they once roamed. The loss of biodiversity has recently accelerated. "Several species of mammals that were relatively safe one or two decades ago are now endangered," including cheetahs, lions and giraffes, the study showed.

> Globally, the mass die-off - deemed to be the sixth in the last half-billion years - is the worst since three-quarters

dinosaurs, were wiped out 66 million years ago by a giant meteor impact. On average, two vertebrate species disappear every year. Tropical regions have seen the highest number of declining species. In South and Southeast Asia, large-bodied species of mammals have lost more than four-fifths of their historical ranges.

#### **Habitat loss**

While fewer species are disappearing in temperate zones, the percentage is just as high or higher. As many as half of the number of animals that once shared our planet are no longer here, a loss the authors described as "a massive erosion of the greatest biological diversity in the history of Earth". There is no mystery as to why: Our has more than doubled in number since 1960 to 7.4 billion - is eating, crowding and polluting its planetary co-habitants out of existence.

By comparison, there are as few as 20,000 lions left in the wild, less than 7,000 cheetahs, 500 to 1,000 giant pandas, and about 250 Sumatran rhinoceros. The main drivers of wildlife decline are habitat loss, overconsumption, pollution, invasive species, disease, as well as poaching in the case of tigers, elephants, rhinos and other large animals prized for their body parts. Climate change is poised to become a major threat in the coming decades, with some animals - most famously polar bears - already in decline due to rising temperatures and changing weather patterns.

"The massive loss of populations and species reflects our lack of empathy to all the wild species that have been our companions since our origins," said lead author Gerardo Ceballos of the National Autonomous University of Mexico. Beyond any moral imperative, there are practical reasons to rue the eclipse of animals, whether megafauna or smaller and less "charismatic" creatures, the researchers cautioned.

The vanishing of a top-level carnivore or herbivore can have a cascading effect down the food chain, disrupting entire ecosystems. Other species directly provide "services" to humans, such as honeybees that pollinate crops or birds that ensure pest control. Previous studies show that ecosystems under stress, while resilient, have a breaking point rapid change can lead to collapse. —AFP

## WEST AFRICA FIGHTS TO KEEP **BAD MEDICINE OFF SHELVES**

DAKAR: As West Africa declares war on the market for expired and counterfeit medicines, start-ups are putting quality control in the hands of patients to stop them risking their lives trying to get well. Not only can such drugs fail to treat the diseases they are bought to combat, experts say, but they may encourage resistance to antibiotics and even cause death as diseases continue to course unchecked through the body. At an April meeting in Liberia, the 15-member Economic Community of West African States (ECOW-AS) announced a region-wide investigation into the trafficking of expired and counterfeit drugs, and a public awareness campaign.

Traffickers in bad medicine prey on some of the world's poorest and most in need, who also face high costs for health care and often lack insurance, said Adama Kane, who founded the health start-up JokkoSante in Senegal to tackle the problem. Perversely, piles of perfectly good medication go unused in Senegal, Kane noted - a problem that JokkoSante tackles by organizing the collection of unused drugs from people who are awarded points in exchange to obtain other medicines later. Handing in asthma medication at an exchange point in a health centre in Passy, central Senegal, JokkoSante user Marie Gueye is one of those to benefit. "My family and I no longer have problems getting medication. All we have to do is come here and collect the points," she told AFP.

#### Rewards

For Senegal's rural households, up to 73 percent of health-related expenses go on medication, according to JokkoSante research. Half the overall population has no health insurance coverage. "Our app is used by hospitals, pharmacies and health centres," Kane said, adding it was still at the pilot stage with 1,500 users so far. People create an account and operate the points system all via their mobile phone. For those too poor to buy drugs at all, JokkoSante has teamed up with large company sponsors, including phone operator Sonatel, who cover the cost of providing patients with free medicine. Again, the system operates through a mobile app. At Diamniadio children's hospital, near Senegal's capital, Dakar, Yacina Ba described the fear of coming to the end of the 50,000 CFA Francs (\$85, 75 euros) she scraped together to buy treatment and medication for her sick six-month-old baby, finally begging a doctor for help. "She had rashes all over her arms," Ba told AFP, explaining how the free treatment sponsorship scheme made all the difference.

Ireti Oluwagbemi, its Nigeria-based spokeswoman, said fraudsters "target brands based on their market share", making household names the biggest targets. There is plenty of money to be made. The global counterfeit drug market is currently worth around \$85 billion, according to IRACM, and the proceeds drive organized crime. Sproxil's clients include pharma giants such as GlaxoSmithKline and Novartis, firms which lose millions each year from pirated products carefully stamped with their branding. "The consequences of ingesting these chemicals can range from discomfort to persistence of the disease it's supposed to be treating, to death," Oluwagbemi told AFP. —AFP

#### China, India drive trafficking

Counterfeited drugs from China and India are awash in west African markets, according to the Paris-based International Institute of Research Against Counterfeit Medicines (IRACM). And they are often indistinguishable from the genuine item, it warned. A joint IRACM and World Customs Organization (WCO) seizure of medical supplies at 16 African ports late last year yielded no fewer than 113 million items of fake medication, 5,000 medical devices and even veterinary products. Everything from fake cancer drugs to fake sutures for operations can be found in such hauls. IRACM is working with



## Madonna in Malawi to open kids' hospital wing

Earlier this year Madonna adopted twin girls from an orphanage in the southern African country after hearing of their plight through her charity "Raising Malawi". Twins Estere and Stella, four years old, joined her other Malawian children Mercy James and David Banda, both 11. Madonna, who set up the charity in 2006, has been a regular visitor to Malawi, taking Mercy and David last year when she inspected ongoing work at the children's hospital wing.

'A chance of survival'

She has not always been welcomed with open arms in one of the world's poorest countries, where some activists accuse her of using her wealth to short cut the adoption process. In 2013, she was stripped of her official VIP status in Malawi by then president Joyce Banda's government, which accused her of being "uncouth" and expecting gratitude for her adoptions. President Mutharika moved to repair the relationship, saying his government had "always been grateful for the passion Madonna has for this country". The singer, who divorced film director Guy Ritchie in 2008, now has six children after adopting her twins.

Court documents detailed how the twins were taken in by an orphanage supported by Madonna's charity. Their mother died soon after childbirth, their father left to marry another woman, and their grandmother struggled to look after several children. "Malawi needs such kind-hearted people to prosper," Malita Ndau, a 20-year-old woman selling doughnuts in Blantyre, told AFP. "Malawian children will now have a chance of survival because of this hospital." But some Malawians said the hospital highlighted the country's failures. Malawi should "be ashamed for begging from her to build this facility because we have failed to tame corruption," said Mumbo Phiri, who sells second hand clothes. The new hospital wing opened to patients last week and has already performed its first surgery. — AFP

### Missiles and music: For Kim Jong Un, they go together

North Korea's successful intercontinental ballistic missile launch is now music to its leader's ears - quite literally. Kim Jong Un was feted at a concert replete with pop music and thunderous applause marking last week's successful launch of his country's first intercontinental ballistic missile. Among the numbers performed were "Song of Hwasong Rocket" and "Make Others Envy Us," the North's official Korean Central News Agency reported.


Leading the bill at the concert was the Moranbong Band, an all-female ensemble that was hand-picked by Kim and serves as something of the "soft" face of his regime. Pyongyang has been the scene of a slew of special events to mark the July 4 launch of Hwasong-14, which is believed to be capable of reaching most of Alaska and possibly farther. The launch is being treated as a major national milestone in North Korea, with the government and media touting it as a technological breakthrough few other nations have achieved. The concert, which took place on Sunday before a packed crowd, many in uniform, also featured dancing.

Clips of the concert shown on North Korean television on Monday showed the crowd repeatedly cheering and applauding for Kim. Along with the Moranbong Band, the concert had North Korea's other top headliners - a similar pop ensemble called the Chongbong Band, the uniformed State Merited Chorus and the Wangjaesan Art Troupe. — AP

## Star conductor follows wife from **Met's ill-fated** '**Tosca**'

tar conductor Andris Nelsons on Monday followed his soprano wife Kristine Opolais in leaving the Metropolitan Opera's upcoming "Tosca," in the latest shakeup for a closely watched production. The New York opera house said in a statement that Nelsons had "withdrawn" from the new take on the Puccini classic that will premiere on New Year's Eve, without further explanation. He will be replaced by another major conductor-James Levine, who stepped down last year amid health problems after four decades as the music director of the Metropolitan Opera. Nelsons, a 38-year-old Latvian, is a rising star of classical music who was named the music director of the Boston Symphony Orchestra in 2013. He will simultaneously take charge of the Leipzig Gewandhaus Orchestra in Germany starting next season. With Nelsons already juggling a busy schedule, speculation had grown that he would leave the production after his wife pulled out last month from the title role in "Tosca." Opolais

has also been a rising name but has recently faced mixed reviews, with some critics hearing a thinning of her voice.

The couple's departure was only the latest blow to the "Tosca" production. It was set to star Jonas Kaufmann, one of the most famous stars of opera, but the German tenor with-

The Met in 2009 modernized "Tosca" with a new production by Swiss director Luc Bondy, who stripped back the ornate staging for a bare-bones look. The audience reaction was hostile, with booing on opening night. In a twist, Nelsons had his debut with the Boston Symphony Orchestra in 2011 when he stepped in for the ill Levine. — AFP

### Kermit the Frog finding a new voice after actor switch

ermit the Frog is getting a new voice. ABC News and The Hollywood Reporter report that Steve Whitmire has left his role as the voice behind the iconic Muppet. Whitmire has voiced the character since Muppets creator Jim Henson's death in 1990.

A Muppets Studio spokeswoman tells the outlets that longtime Muppets performer Matt Vogel will be taking over the role. Representatives for Disney, which owns Muppets Studio, didn't immediately return a request for comment yesterday about the motivation behind the move. In addition to Kermit, Whitmire had voiced grumpy critic Statler, Rizzo the Rat and other characters for the Muppets. — AP

### Gorilla warfare: Behind the visuals of 'Planet of the Apes'

s Caesar sits astride a horse rallying his legions to battle you'd be forgiven for thinking you were watching a Roman-era war epic-except that the protagonist is a chimpanzee. "War for the Planet of the Apes," the third installment of the rebooted simian sci-fi franchise, opens on Friday to reviews lauding some of the most breathtaking visual effects ever seen in cinema. Behind the photo-real apes is Weta Digital, a pioneering Wellington-based CGI studio founded by Peter Jackson that has seen its reputation grow steadily since its groundbreaking performance-capture work on his "The Lord of the Rings" movies.

Filmed against the stark snowy vistas of Alberta and British Columbia, "War" sees director Matt Reeves unleash the rapidly evolving simians into a world boiling over with divisions and rage. A band of soldiers led by a battle-hardened loose cannon-Woody Harrelson channeling Marlon Brando's Colonel Kurtzlaunches an all-out attack to destroy the apes once and for all. The movie is driven by Andy Serkis as the majestic Caesar, reprising a role for which he has drawn even more acclaim than for his other digital characters, Gollum in "Rings" and King Kong.

"Physically in this film, Caesar is much more upright and he uses his hands a lot more now, so he's more like a human being in ape skin," Serkis says in the production notes. "But as his intelligence and abilities have grown, the things he feels and remembers have become more daunting to him."

#### Digital fur

As in the previous films, Serkis wore a gray bodysuit and facial recognition dots that captured the tiniest nuances of movement, gesture and emotion of the apes. The 53-year-old actor, whom many believe should have won an Oscar for his pioneering work, has always maintained that there is no difference between playing a part in a motion-capture suit and performing in costume and makeup. "You're not just standing in for the role until the magic's done later on. You're not just representing the character, you are the character for real," he says in a behind-the-scenes featurette released recently by Fox.

"War" features a dozen key ape characters that interact with increasing sophistication, not just with each other, but with their environment, including falling snow. The crew included a team of 50 visual effects personnel, a 10-person camera unit and an army of data wranglers, surveyors and photographers who 3-D scanned every inch of every set and location. They crafted an array of more than 1,400 highly complex effects shots, deploying

advanced software bringing new levels of complexity to how digital fur behaves and interacts with the world.

A newly-built toolset called "Manuka physLight" modeled with pinpoint accuracy how cameras pick up and respond to light so that the crew were able to light the apes similarly to how a cinematographer would light a soundstage. The crew studied how snow sticks to fur, clumps on it, falls off and reacts as the apes walk through their wintry environments. Caesar alone had almost a million strands of hair.

#### **Towering effects**

"It looks insanely realistic," said Serkis. "It's just such a brilliant technology and I've embraced it. I actively want to push the boundaries so that this movie is the most thrilling on every single level." Weta's visual effects supervisor Dan Lemmon, who joined in 2002 to work on "The Lord of the Rings: The Two Towers," says the technology has improved dramatically. "All of our fur systems, how we model the way light moves through the scene and other materials, have all grown significantly more sophisticated," he added. "War" will be competing with "Spider-Man: Homecoming," "Wonder Woman" and several other effects-laden blockbusters, but industry tracking estimates the US opening at a healthy \$65 million. That figure would be in the same ballpark as the two previous installments, which went on to earn a combined \$1.2 billion worldwide. "War" has a 96 percent approval rating on the Rotten Tomatoes website, which collates reviews, with the most enthusiastic superlatives all reserved for the towering effects.

Even BBC critic Nicholas Barber, who didn't like the film, describes the technical wizardry as "frighteningly advanced." "The textures of leathery skin and thick hair are so convincing that you quickly forget that you're watching actors in motion-capture suits," he says. "You feel as though you're watching real live apes, even if those apes are carrying assault rifles and riding horses." — AFP

ore than 1,200 Fiat 500s from across Europe revved into the Italian foothills on Saturday to mark the 60th birthday of the iconic little car. The Italian classic took its first spin on July 4, 1957. # **S Korea's** first black model faces widespread racism

The eenage male model Han Hyun-Min's long legs and powerful strut have made him a rising star on South Korean catwalks, but his agent knew there would be a problem in the ethnically homogenous country: he is half black. Han, 16, has a Nigerian father in a society where racial discrimination is widespread and people of mixed race are commonly referred to as "mongrels". "A dark-skinned fashion model like Han was unheard of in South Korea, so recruiting him was a big gamble," said agent Youn Bum.

Now Han is posing for top glossy magazines as the country's first black fashion model. South Korea has for years sought to foster the image of a modern, sophisticated and tech-savvy nation whose pop culture has made waves across Asia. But behind the facade of an economic and cultural powerhouse lies a deeply-rooted racism-even as its immigrant population creeps up, doubling over the last decade but still only four percent of the population. Most foreigners in the country are from China and Southeast Asia, migrant workers or women who marry rural South Korean men unable to find local spouses willing to live in countryside.

Discrimination against them is widespread. Many are openly mocked at public transport for being "dirty" or "smelly", or refused entry to fancy restaurants or public baths. A government survey in 2015 showed that 25 percent of South Koreans do not want a foreigner as a neighbor-far higher than the 5.6 percent in the US and China's 10.5 percent. Mixed-race children are bullied at school and constantly taunted as "tuigi", a derogatory term that literally means cross-bred animals. Many complain of poor opportunities in many aspects of life, including difficulties socializing, getting a job or finding a spouse. Han was no exception.

#### Game over

"When I was playing with other kids at school, some mothers whisked them away from me, saying things like, 'Don't play with a kid like that," he told AFP. He was regularly stared at in public, with an elderly woman once asking him: "What are you doing in someone else's country?" "I wanted to become invisible," he said. "I hated my looks that stand out from everyone else," he said. He found his escape in fashion, taking part in modeling auditions and posting his photos on social media until Youn spotted the images.

After seeing the then 14-year-old demonstrate his "electrifying" stride on a Seoul street for five minutes, Youn signed him up immediately. "Being a fashion model helped build my confidence tremendously," said Han. "Now I enjoy being looked at by other people, instead of being ashamed or embarrassed." He hopes to become a role model for multiracial children. "I want to be more successful, not just for myself but also for people whom I represent."

#### 'Bad luck'

The duo were initially stonewalled by designers and magazine editors, some of whom openly dismissed the darkskinned model as "bad luck" and urged Youn to recruit whites instead. "Some of them told me, 'We don't do dark-skinned models,' or, 'For us, non-Korean models mean white models with blue eyes and blonde hair," Youn said. But a handful of designers found Han's look unique and charismatic, and he hit the runways at more than 30 shows at the two Seoul Fashion Weeks after his debut last year-an unusually high number for a novice.

Han's slim physique "had a good combination of strengths of both Asian models and Western models" said designer Cho Young-Jae, who used him to display his men's clothing line, Chaos From Undermind. Neighboring Japan has a similarly homogenous population, Cho said, but a longer history of immigration and already has a number of biracial star fashion models. Even so, when half-black Ariana Miyamoto was picked as Miss Universe Japan in 2015 she faced open accusations of not being sufficiently Japanese to represent the country, in a stark demonstration of the limits of acceptance.


#### Money and power

South Koreans have until recently been taught at school to take pride in the country's "single ethnicity", with one race and language enduring for centuries. A history of repeated invasions by powerful neighbors China and Japan has amplified the sense of victimhood and rampant ethnic nationalism, many analysts say. In addition, according to Choi Hang-Sub, sociology professor at Kookmin University in Seoul, Korea's ultra-competitive culture "worships those with money and power and despises those without".

"The rule also applies to foreigners," he told AFP. "So white people from advanced nations are welcomed with open arms, and those perceived to have hailed from less developed nations are relentlessly looked down upon." The South has a growing number of foreign or multiracial figures on TV and other public sphere-but almost all of them are Caucasians, whose looks are favored by many South Koreans as "beautiful". Commentators on social media, though, have warmed to Han. "He has such good aura around him," said one. "I hope that our society will become more open to people like him." — AFP

## Fashion house Lanvin names Lapidus artistic director

rench designer Olivier Lapidus has been appointed artistic director of Paris label Lanvin following his predecessor's resignation from the troubled fashion house. "I welcome the arrival of Olivier Lapidus to the artistic direction of Lanvin," the company's formidable owner, Taiwanese media magnate Shaw-Lan Wang, announced in a statement yesterday. "His great understanding of the world of this house, the world of fashion and design, and his resolutely modern approach will bring Lanvin to new horizons," she added.

Lapidus, 59, a prominent figure in high-tech fashion, replaces Bouchra Jarrar, who was appointed artistic director for Lanvin's women's collections in March 2016. Jarrar quit Lanvin only 10 months after she showed her first collection there. The 46-year-old had closed her own label so she could dedicate herself to reviving France's oldest fashion house. But it soon became clear that all was not well within the house, which has been in turmoil since the shock sacking of its previous designer Alber Elbaz in 2015.

In a short statement late Thursday announcing Jarrar's departure, Lanvin said they had "mutually decided to put an end to their collaboration". Lapidus was born into the fashion world: he is the grandson of a Russian emigre tailor, and the son of Ted Lapidus, who made his mark on fashion in the the 1960s and 1970s with his unisex and safari styles. He was artistic director of Lapidus for 11 years, where he advocated a marriage between haute couture, crafts and industrial research laboratories. But his new job presents a daunting prospect.

The popular Elbaz had brought Lanvin, founded in 1889, back from the edge of oblivion before he fell foul of Wang. Wang and Lanvin's other major shareholder, Swiss

businessman Ralph Bartel, plan to recapitalise the company and relaunch the brand, according to the French business magazine Challenges. — AFP

## Britain's Lake District named World Heritage site

Britain's Lake District, an area of wild beauty that beguiled poets and artists from William Wordsworth to Beatrix Potter, was named Sunday as a World Heritage site by UNESCO. The UN's cultural body meeting this weekend in Krakow praised the region's "picturesque aesthetic" as well as its links with Romantic art and literature. "The special significance of

the Lake District lies in the interaction between social, economic, cultural and environmental influences," it said in a statement.

Considered the cradle of the British Romanticism movement pioneered by Wordsworth, Samuel Taylor Coleridge and Robert Southey, the region becomes Britain's 31st World Heritage site. John Glen, minister for arts, heritage and tourism, said the new status would boost the Lake District's international reputation and benefit locals. "It is a unique part of the world that combines a vibrant farming community with thousands of archaeological sites and structures that give us an amazing glimpse into our past," he said in a statement.

UNESCO's heritage committee considered 33 sites for

the prestigious status at its annual gathering in Poland. On Sunday it also accepted Taputapuatea, a portion of the "Polynesian Triangle" in the South Pacific thought to be the last part of the globe settled by humans, to the list. — AFP

## Vivien Leigh's 'Gone With the Wind' script up for auction

Vivien Leigh's copy of the "Gone With the Wind" script is going up for auction alongside dozens of items from the late star's personal collection. Sotheby's said yesterday it will offer paintings, jewelry, clothes, books and more belonging to Leigh at a Sept 26 auction in London.

Leigh won an Academy Award for playing Scarlett O'Hara in the 1939 epic "Gone With the Wind." The sale includes Leigh's copy of the original novel, inscribed with a poem from author Margaret Mitchell, which carries an estimated price tag of 5,000 pounds to 7,000 pounds (\$6,500 to \$9,000). The script, presented to Leigh by her co-stars, has an estimate of 2,500 pounds to 3,500 pounds.

Also on offer is the wig Leigh wore to play Blanche DuBois in "A Streetcar Named Desire," estimated at 400 pounds to 600 pounds. Sotheby's UK chairman Harry Dalmeny said the collection offers a glimpse at the private Leigh, "a fine art collector, patron, even a bookworm." Leigh died in 1967, and her only child, Suzanne Farrington, died in 2015. The collection is being sold by Leigh's grandchildren. In 2013 the grandchildren sold her archive including correspondence, photos and awards, to London's Victoria & Albert Museum for an undisclosed sum. — AP
