MOI BEGINS OPERATING NEW TRAFFIC CAMERAS

By Hanan Al-Saadoun TURKEY MARKS YEAR SINCE 'EPIC' COUP DEFEAT

ISTANBUL: Turkey yesterday marked one year since the defeat of the coup aimed at ousting President Recep Tayyip Erdogan, seeking to showcase national unity and his grip on power in an increasingly polarized society. The authorities have declared July 15 an annual national holiday of "democracy and unity", billing the

foiling of the putsch as a historic victory of Turkish democracy. "It's one year since the darkest night was turned into an epic," Prime Minister Binali Yildirim told a special session of parliament that kicked off a day of celebrations set to last until dawn. He said the night of July 15 was a "second War of

Independence" after the war that led to the creation of the modern Turkish state in the ruins of the Ottoman Empire in 1923. Two hundred and forty nine people, not including the plotters, were killed when a disgruntled faction in the army sent tanks into the streets and war planes into the sky in a bid to overthrow Erdogan after one-and-a-half decades in power.

But they were thwarted within hours as the authorities regrouped and people poured into the streets in support of Erdogan, who blamed followers of his allyturned-nemesis, the US-based preacher Fethullah Gulen. Erdogan, at the center of the commemorations, took part in a "people's march" on the Istanbul bridge across Continued on Page 11

KUWAIT: The Ministry of Health yesterday condemned efforts to discredit its services and malign the integrity of its staff. A statement issued by the ministry urged citizens and residents not to pay heed to attempts to undermine public confidence in the country's healthcare services. The statement noted that the ministry "reserves the right to mount legal action against all those involved in sharing untrue and baseless information that is detrimental to its reputation". The ministry added that it is open to all suggestions and complaints regarding the quality of healthcare provided in the state.

Earlier yesterday, a ministry official said that the ministry was handling with "full urgency and concern" alleged social media reports of a foreign national posing as a doctor. The ministry has made contacts with several bodies in order to gather information before issuing a statement regarding the rumors, ministry spokesman Ahmad Al-Shatti said in a statement. Shatti added that those revealed to have been involved in the incident and allowing it to take place will face legal charges.

Separately, the Interior Ministry's Relations and Security Information Department said the traffic department has begun operating new traffic cameras on major roads, including the Fifth Ring Road near Avenues mall, Ourtuba: Fourth Ring Road near Surra; and King Fahd Road near Bayan Palace. It said the new cameras monitor speeding in all lanes in both directions, including the emergency lanes.

PARIS AIMS TO BE 'FACILITATOR' IN CRISIS TALKS

MATHS 'GENIUS' MIRZAKHANI DIES

WASHINGTON: Maryam Mirzakhani, an Iranian-born mathematician who was the first woman to win the coveted Fields Medal, died yesterday in a US hospital after a battle with cancer. She was 40. Mirzakhani's

friend Firouz Naderi, a former director of Solar Systems

Exploration at NASA, announced her death on Instagram. "A light was turned off today. It breaks my heart gone far too soon," he wrote, later adding: "A genius? Yes. But also a daughter, a mother and a wife."

Mirzakhani, a professor at Stanford University in California, died after the can-

Maryam Mirzakhani cer she had been battling for four years spread to her bone marrow, Iranian media said. In 2014 Mirzakhani won the Fields Medal, the

equivalent of the Nobel Prize for Mathematics, which is awarded by the International Congress of Mathematicians. The award recognized her sophisticated and original contributions to the fields of geometry and dynamical systems, particularly in understanding the symmetry of curved surfaces such as spheres.

Born in 1977 and raised in Tehran, Mirzakhani initially dreamed of becoming a writer, but by the time she started high school and showed an affinity for solving math problems she shifted her sights. "It is fun - it's like solving a puzzle or connecting the dots in a detective case," she said when she won the Fields Medal. "I felt that this was something I could do, and I wanted to pursue this path."

DOHA: France's foreign minister yesterday called on Qatar's neighbors to immediately lift measures impacting thousands of people in the Gulf, becoming the latest foreign diplomat to visit the region and attempt to find a resolution to a crisis that has dragged on for more than a month. Jean-Yves Le Drian said in Doha yesterday that Paris wants to assist Kuwait-led mediation on the crisis. "France should be a facilitator in the mediation" led by Kuwait, Le Drian told

reporters following talks with his Qatari

counterpart Sheikh Mohammed bin

Abdulrahman Al-Thani. In early June, Saudi Arabia, the United Arab Emirates, Bahrain and Egypt cut ties with Qatar and moved to isolate the small, but wealthy Gulf nation, canceling air routes between their capitals and Qatar's and closing their airspace to Qatari flights. Saudi Arabia also sealed Qatar's only land border, impacting a key source of food imports in the mostly desert nation.

TIGHT SECURITY IN JERUSALEM AS HOLY SITE CLOSED AFTER ATTACK

JERUSALEM: Security forces locked down parts of Jerusalem's Old City yesterday and an ultra-sensitive holy site remained closed after an attack that killed two police officers and heightened Israeli-Palestinian tensions. Three Arab Israelis opened fire on Israeli police Friday in the Old City before fleeing to the nearby Haram Al-Sharif, where they were shot dead by police. Israeli authorities said they had come from the flashpoint holy site, which includes the Al-Aqsa mosque and the Dome of the Rock, to commit the attack.

The authorities took the highly unusual decision to close the Al-Aqsa mosque compound for Friday prayers, leading to anger from Muslims and Jordan, the holy site's custodian. Wael Arabiyat, Jordan's Islamic affairs minister, warned that

keeping Al-Aqsa mosque closed is "dangerous" and "unprecedented", a day after Amman on Friday called for its immediate reopening. Hundreds of Jordanians, responding to a Muslim Brotherhood call, demonstrated in Amman after midday prayers yesterday, calling for the "liberation of Al-Aqsa".

Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu has indicated the site will stay closed until at least today while security was assessed, and rejected Jordan's criticism. "Instead of denouncing the terrorist attack, Jordan chose to attack Israel," Netanyahu was quoted as saying by officials, and called for restraint. Netanyahu also spoke of increasing security at entrances to the site when it reopens likely to be a controversial move.

HONOLULU: Flames ripped through three floors of a Honolulu tower block, killing three people including a mother and her adult son on Friday, officials and media said. The blaze at the 36-storey Marco Polo condominium complex sent thick black smoke pouring over the city, a month to the day after a deadly high-rise fire in London. Firefighters sprayed water onto the flames from nearby balconies and brought them under control at about 6.30 pm local time (0430 GMT yesterday), four hours after the fire began, Honolulu Mayor Kirk Caldwell told reporters.

"I looked down I could see the billowing smoke coming up," resident Ron Chiarottino said. "I heard three women's voices screaming, pleading, moaning, 'Please help me, please' continuous screaming for five or ten minutes, and then I didn't hear anymore."

among the three people who perished on the 26th floor, where the fire started. At least 12 other people were injured, it added.

Fire Chief Manuel Neves told reporters that the building did not have a sprinkler system. "Without a doubt if there was sprinklers in this apartment, the fire would be contained to the unit of origin ... the unit (where) the fire started," he said. More than 100 firefighters tackled the fire and officers were conducting a room-by-room search, a task that could take several hours, he added.

The building was constructed in 1971, before the city began requiring sprinkler systems, the Star-Advertiser newspaper said. In London, at least 80 people were killed when a fire gutted the 24-story Grenfell Tower block on June 14. That building was sprinkler system. Images posted online on Friday showed orange flames raging on several floors and debris falling from windows. There were no immediate reports on what caused the blaze in Honolulu.

"We were all trying to help as much as we could ... but there was a fire and you could see it spreading," said 72-year-old resident Karen Hastings, who was in the building when the fire broke out. One firefighter and four residents were taken to hospital while eight other residents were treated at the scene, the Star-Advertiser said. Volunteers were looking after residents at a nearby park, the Hawaii Red Cross said on Twitter. The fire forced the closure of a major road in front of the condominium complex, the Honolulu police department said on Twitter. —Reuters

STATE AUDIT BUREAU SET TO TAKE PART IN UN MEETING

KUWAIT: Kuwait's State Audit Bureau (SAB) announced vesterday that it will take part in a higher financial and auditing bodies meeting at the UN headquarters in New York. SAB has been invited to the two-day gathering due on Thursday by the UN Department of Economic and Social Affairs (UN DESA), a statement said. The meeting will review and audit the arrangements for the implementation of the UN 2030 Vision of Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).

The Kuwaiti delegation to the UN gathering will include SAB Acting President Adel Al-Sarawi, senior auditor at the performance control department Sultan Al-Otaibi and public relations and media specialist Fatima Al-Nasser. The New York meeting is part of the ministerial side of the High-level Political Forum, the main platform dealing with the SDGs, the statement quoted Otaibi as saying.

It aims to discuss the key topics on the implementation of the SDGs, in addition to offering the opportunity for boosting the capabilities of the control higher bodies to conduct sound auditing of the SDGs. Otaibi pointed to the major goals of the cooperative performance auditing to be discussed by the meeting, to be achieved by some of the higher bodies supported by the International Organization of Supreme Audit Institutions (INTOSAI). —KUNA

PREVENTING IS FROM RISING AGAIN IS BIGGEST CHALLENGE: IRAQI AMBASSADOR

KUWAIT: Iraqi Ambassador to Kuwait Alaa Al-Hashemi has declared victory over the Islamic State (IS) group in Mosul, but in the fight against a militant organization that has reincarnated itself before, the biggest challenge may not be defeating IS, but preventing it from rising again.

During a press conference held on Thursday at the Iragi Embassy, Hashemi said members of the terrorist organization still exist in some areas. "We are seeing the end of the fake Daesh state," he said, referring to the terrorist group by its Arabic acronym. "We will not relent - our brave forces will bring victory. The security plan is needed at the moment and the experience gained by Iraqi forces and intelligence is very high. We were able to distinguish between militants and citizens who tried to escape during the liberation of Mosul - but many of them remain in hotspots that have not yet been liberated." Hashemi noted that Iraqi forces can deal with the situation, but it also requires regional and international efforts, because the issue is not limited to Iraq only, but many countries. He said these efforts are required in coordination with Iraq, which has gained experience during years of war against Al-Qaeda and Daesh. "The Amir of Kuwait has announced Kuwait's readiness to host a conference before the end of this year with the participation of many sponsors and supporters of Iraq to ensure its success," he added.

On the sidelines of the conference, Iranian Ambassador to Kuwait Ali Reza Enayati said the Iran-Iraq border is secure, but with the current situation, it requires to be more so, stressing that this will be through coordination with relevant authorities in Iraq. "We congratulate the Iraqi leadership, government and people on this important victory that was achieved in Mosul. Iraq deserves this victory. The brutal hand of terrorism has hit the good, civilized and ancient Iraq. We hope that such joy will spread throughout our region," Enayati said.

On participation of Iranian forces in the liberation of Mosul, he

said: "We have previously announced that Iran is present only in an advisory role and there are no ground troops in Iraq." On the Gulf crisis and regional interventions, Enayati confirmed that Iran is not a party in the conflict,

but is assisting Qatar. British Ambassador to Kuwait Matthew Lodge said after his congratulations to the Iraqi Ambassador on the liberation of Mosul, that, "The aim of intensive visits by British officials to Kuwait last week is to support this country's mediation efforts and noble endeavors led by His Highness the Amir of Kuwait Sheikh Sabah Al-Ahmad Al-Sabah to resolve the Gulf crisis. Unity of the Gulf Cooperation Council must be maintained and the dispute resolved as soon as possible."

ANKARA/ROME: Qatar looks forward to Thani, at a press conference alongside his seeing His Highness the Amir Sheikh Sabah Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah's efforts to resolve the Gulf crisis a success, the country's Foreign Minister said Friday. In my **view**

POLICE HERE AND THERE

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ood morning my dear and honorable brothers and sisters, and I wish you all the best of health. In this article, I would like to shed some light on the role of policemen and traffic departments in Kuwait compared with the United States. We all know that policemen are there to protect, safeguard and work on imposing law on all without discrimination.

However, we all notice some fallbacks and negligence committed by some policemen here in Kuwait pertinent to respect of others, especially expatriates, and law enforcement on all without being influenced by wasta (connection) which is tearing the society apart.

When an expatriate drives his or her car on roads in areas mostly populated by Kuwaitis, and particularly the helpless taxi drivers, some of them get unwanted harassment even when they abide by the law completely. When an expatriate gets pulled over on the side of the road and is approached by traffic policemen, some officers in this case tend to find fault with that poor person's car and try to search for the slightest car defect if he could not detect any violation in terms of speed limit, not fastening the seat belt or durability of the vehicle. When pulling an expatriate over, many policemen tend to be harsh, disrespectful and never want to listen to the other side's plea. At least the 'violator' must know his or her violation before signing the citation, but in this case, no mercy is given, and he or she must accept it without hesitation.

In the United States, when any person is pulled over for whatever violation, he or she would be approached by the traffic policeman who starts the conversation with a smile and a greeting, followed by an explanation of the violation committed and an advice for non-repetition. When I was there, I had never encountered any situation where my car's registration got revoked or my driver's license got taken away for a very simple citation.

In Kuwait, you see many policemen sitting in the early hours of the day inside their cars that are parked under bridges supposedly to monitor the flow of traffic and pursuit those reckless drivers. However, the majority of them would sit in their air-conditioned patrol cars playing with their smartphones and not even looking at the road or those who are driving maniacally.

Last year, I was driving one day at around 6:30 am going to work and I saw a minivan zigzagging between lanes at high speed. I quickly stopped my car near a patrol vehicle that was parked under a bridge and knocked on the window to wake the policeman up as he was asleep, and told him to chase that speeding van. He got up, wiped his eyes, started the siren and chased the wrong car. I am not saying this to belittle the policemen's courage and accomplishments, but I am saying this to awaken the minds of the authorities that there are some of their workers who do not appreciate the responsibilities being shouldered on them, and need to be punished.

In Kuwait, when a reckless driver gets chased by police, he can easily run away from their sight because some of the policemen here do not have the adequate capacity to apprehend violators. For example, helicopters that monitor the flow of traffic and continuously keep spotting the violators or reckless drivers till they are apprehended.

I watched a police chase on YouTube and became amazed by the sophisticated equipment used by the US police to arrest and pursuit violators. Let us dream that one day the Kuwaiti police force would be as efficient and strong as that of the US.

EDUCATION SYSTEM TO BE IMPROVED TO MEET MARKET REQUIREMENTS

KUWAIT: Education Ministry's Assistant Undersecretary for General Education Fatima Al-Kandari said a plan is in the works to modify the education system so it meets the labor market requirements, adding that a committee that was formed to introduce a system similar to the credits system has almost completed its work. She announced the postponement of the competencies curriculum in the 10th grade, which was supposed to start with the new school year until after the next school year.

Kandari said the new system is not a credits system, but is close to it, adding that it is not necessary to admit all secondary graduates in colleges, as some of them may have technical inclinations. "Through this system, we can provide market needs," she said. Kandari said that three new schools will enter service at the start of the school year - a girls' intermediate school in Farwaniya and elementary and intermediate boys' schools in Ahmadi. On schoolbooks, Kandari said these will be distributed starting next week, but as for books with changes, they are still at the printing press waiting for approval.

Small business

Director of small business at the Manpower and Government Restructuring Program Faris Al-Enezi said that the labor support allowance that is paid monthly to Kuwaitis working in the private sector is not available in any other country. "Kuwait will see a leap to encourage these projects," he added. He said the number of Kuwaitis who have applied for small business licenses is on the increase because of the government, the national fund for small and medium enterprise development, and new decisions such as approving home businesses, which is expected to cause a major revolution when applied.



MAN HURT IN FARWANIYA FIRE

KUWAIT: A man suffered from smoke inhalation during a fire that broke out in a Farwaniya apartment yesterday morning. Firefighters arrived to the scene shortly after the fire was reported, and immediately rushed to evacuate the building and tackle the blaze, which started on the fourth floor. Paramedics rushed the injured man to hospital for treatment and firemen managed to put out the fire. An investigation was opened to determine the cause of the blaze.

TURKISH EMBASSY MARKS FIRST ANNIVERSARY OF DEFEATING COUP

KUWAIT: The Turkish Embassy yesterday marked one year since the defeat of a coup aimed at ousting President Recep Tayyip Erdogan. On the night of July 15 last year, the Turkish nation foiled a coup by the followers of Fethullah Gulen, who considers himself the 'imam of the universe, who had infiltrated into the armed forces and other public institutions. What happened that night was a huge terrorist attack never seen before in the history of the Republic of Turkey. Around 250 people were killed and more than 2,000 were injured," Turkey's Ambassador to Kuwait Salih Murat Tamer told reporters.

Tamer noted that the Turkish Embassy honored the martyrs of the coup bid. "We recall with respect our dear martyrs who lost their lives during their heroic struggle in defending democracy and the future of their state. We ask God for mercy on them, and express our thanks and gratitude to the wounded. The Turkish people faced the putschists with great courage - they were all one. They stood in front of tanks with no weapons. They made shields from their bodies to prevent the fall of state institutions. They made it clear that the Turkish people will not allow any interventions outside the framework of democracy. They proved that the future of Turkey is determined by the free will of the people and not by the armed groups,"Tamer said.

"For more than a thousand years, traitors fought against the military, but did not open fire against their own people. For this reason, as the president of our republic has stated, the event of July 15 is the most insidious and dirty coup attempt," he added.

The Turkish ambassador called to never forget July 15 and not let future generations forget it. He thanked HH the Amir, HH Crown

"Kuwait has been impressive despite its small geographical size, it has a large heart that can accommodate the whole world," Tamer said. He said the terrorist organization established by Gulen (FETO) aims to abolish the government of Turkey by force and all illegal means, hindering the performance of its functions in part or in total and putting the sovereignty of the state under pressure, thus weakening it.

GCC rift

On the Qatar-Gulf crisis, the Turkish ambassador said Turkey believes the crisis was not supposed to be this complicated in the first place. "We support the Amir's efforts. We are not a part of this crisis but we stand by international and humanitarian laws. The Gulf Cooperation Council has been in existence for over 40 years, and I hope it will continue to do so. This issue should be resolved under the umbrella of the Gulf states and not by external interventions," Tamer said. He said the four Arab states are "brotherly countries" to Turkey, but it is not right to be against Qatar. He said any problem in the Gulf is a problem for Turkey, as the region is its strategic partner.

On a visit by Erdogan to Kuwait and other Gulf countries, he said: "The president will be visiting Kuwait soon but the date has not yet been determined." About the possibility of Erdogan visiting Saudi Arabia, Tamer affirmed that he might visit Riyadh because Saudi Arabia is a brotherly country even if "we do not agree on some points of iew" "This does not mean that we are not friends, but we use the discussion table to resolve our disagreements," he said. The ambassador noted that Qatar is the only nation that can ask the Turkish military to close its base and leave. "It is not reasonable for other countries to force the Turkish military base to close, while they have US and British

military bases!"

He revealed that some members of FETO were planning to open a university in Kuwait, but when Kuwait didn't agree with their proposal, they opened an education center. But Kuwait later closed the center and expelled its members to Turkey.

Fight



CHINA DISSIDENT'S ASHES BURIED AT SEA

SUPPORTERS DEPRIVED OF PLACE TO PAY TRIBUTE TO LIU XIAOBO

SHENYANG, China: The ashes of China's late Nobel laureate Liu Xiaobo were buried at sea yesterday, depriving his supporters of a place to pay tribute to the pro-democracy dissident. Officials showed a video in which his wife, Liu Xia, and relatives lowered a white round urn into the water off northeast coast city of Dalian, two days after the democracy advocate died of liver cancer aged 61 while in custody.

His supporters said the authorities wanted to avoid giving him a pilgrimage site where they could remember a writer whose calls for political reform angered the Communist regime and led to his arrest in 2008. Officials "fear that if someone who is as emblematic a symbol as Liu Xiaobo had a burial ground, it would become a place where his supporters would gather on his memorial day, the day he received the Nobel or any other such occasions to express their desire to chase after freedom," activist and family friend Ye Du told AFP.

Liu Xiaobo's older brother, Liu Xiaoguang, said at a news conference organized by the authorities that the government had followed the family's wishes. He thanked the Communist Party for its "humanistic care" of his brother during his hospitalization and death. He did not take any questions before being escorted out by two women. Zhang Qingyang, an official from the Shenyang city municipal office, said the cremation was "in accordance with the will of his family mem-

bers and local customs". Liu's supporters said it was impossible to verify if it was really his wish to be buried at sea as the authorities have severely restricted access to his family. They also said Liu Xiaoguang did not agree with Liu Xiaobo's political leanings. "It is deplorable how the Chinese government has forced the family to cremate Liu Xiaobo, bury him at sea, and then coerced Liu's brother to make robotic statements to the media about the great care of the government and superiority of its health called the display "disgusting" and a "violation" care system," Jared Genser, a US lawyer who represented Liu, told AFP.

'Disgusting' funeral'

Authorities also released photos of a private ceremony attended by his family, including his wife, whose fate worries supporters hoping the government will cede to international pressure to release her and let her leave China. Liu Xia, a poet, stood with her brother, and two of Liu Xiaobo's brothers in front of the body, which was covered with white petals. Zhang said "friends" also attended the ceremony.

But Amnesty International's China researcher Patrick Poon told AFP that he did not recognize any in the row of non-family members in the official photo and people close to the Liu couple identified at least one "state security police officer" among them. Chinese dissident artist Ai Weiwei, who lives in Berlin, tweeted a photo of the funeral and of the deceased.

Wife is 'incommunicado'

China's government faced a global backlash for denying Liu Xiaobo's wish to be treated abroad, and the United States and European Union have called on the government to free Liu Xia. She has been under house arrest since 2010, but she was allowed to see her husband after he was transferred from prison to a hospital in Shenyang after being diagnosed with late-stage liver cancer in

Liu Xiaoguang said Liu Xia was in "weak condition" and experiencing such "great sorrow" and that she may need hospital treatment. "As far as I know, Liu Xia is in a free condition," municipal official Zhang said. But Genser said she was still being held "incommunicado" and he has "seen no sign that the government is going to let her go". At Liu Xiaobo's funeral, Liu Xia "fixed her eyes on him a long time, mumbling to say farewell," Zhang said, adding that she was "in very low spirits". "It's best for her not to receive too much outside interference during this period after Liu Xiaobo has died," he said.

Liu was jailed in 2008 after co-writing a petition calling for democratic reforms. The veteran of the 1989 Tiananmen Square prodemocracy protests was sentenced to 11 years in prison for "subversion" a year later. The foreign ministry lashed out at the international criticism on Friday, saying it lodged official protests with the United States, Germany, France and the United Nations human rights office. "The most preposterous thing is that even during his cremation and funeral he still was not free," Hu Jia, a Beijingbased activist and family friend, told AFP. "And now it's been passed on to his wife, who will continue to lead on that same freedomless existence."— AFP

EGYPT POLICE PROBE MOTIVES OF ATTACKER

HURGHADA, Egypt: Police yesterday questioned the suspected jihadist who stabbed to death two German women and wounded four others at a Red Sea beach resort, adding to the woes of Egypt's hobbled tourism industry. Judicial sources said the man who had swum ashore from a public beach in Hurghada to carry out Friday's attack confessed to sharing the ideology of the Islamic State jihadist group, although there was no IS claim of responsibility.

The sources said the suspect, a 28-year-old from Kafr Al-Sheikh province in the Nile Delta, north of Cairo, has been transferred to the capital for questioning. At the same time, the prosecution said in a statement that it had not yet confirmed the assailant's motives and urged the media "to stop resorting to speculation or getting ahead of the investigation". The streets of Hurghada were being heavily patrolled and security was stepped up outside hotels yesterday.

"I was sitting down in my shop when we heard people shouting. We ran outside and heard that someone had swum to the next door hotel and was attacking foreigners," said Rafic Rushdi, the owner of a hotel shop. "After killing two women, he ran towards our hotel. He was shouting that he was not after Egyptians, and

some Egyptians intervened to stop him." After initial confusion over the nationality of the women killed, Berlin yesterday said they were both German nationals, rather than Ukrainians as earlier reported. "I am very upset by this cowardly crime, my condolences to the families of the victims," German Foreign Minister Sigmar Gabriel said. Among the four others wounded were two Armenian women and a woman from the Czech Republic, according to authorities in those countries.

It was not the first attack in Hurghada. In Jan 2016, three tourists were wounded in a stabbing assault in the resort by two assailants with apparent IS sympathies. In Tunisia, IS claimed a beach attack in June 2015 when a student armed with a Kalashnikov assault rifle and grenades went on a rampage near the Mediterranean resort of Sousse killing 38 holidaymakers, 30 of them Britons, before being shot dead by police.

Hurghada is one of Egypt's most popular beach resorts, especially with Ukrainians and other European tourists. Egyptian authorities say they have boosted security at the country's tourist sites. The industry provides the Arab world's most populous country with much-needed revenues. An IS bombing of a Russian airliner carrying holidaymakers from a resort in the south of the Sinai Peninsula in 2015 killed all 224 people on board and decimated the country's tourism sector. Russia suspended all flights to Egypt in response and has yet to resume them. IS has been waging a deadly insurgency concentrated in the north of the Sinai Peninsula that has killed hundreds of policemen and soldiers.

Police, Copts also targeted

It has also killed dozens of Coptic Christians in church bombings and shootings since December, and pledged further attacks. Yesterday, a Muslim man stabbed a security guard at a church in the Mediterranean city of Alexandria after the guard asked to check his bag. The attacker was quickly subdued and is being questioned, a police official told AFP. The incident came days after leaders of the Christian minority suspended some services such as conferences and religious trips for three weeks over security concerns.

On Friday, unknown assailants shot dead five policemen just south of Cairo, in the latest of a series of attacks targeting Egypt's security forces. The killings came as police and the army said they were closing in on militants and jihadists following a spate of deadly attacks in the Nile Valley and the Sinai. Egypt has struggled to quell IS militants based in the Sinai and smaller militant groups in the mainland since the military overthrew Islamist president Mohamed Morsi in 2013 and cracked down on his supporters. — AFP

HUNGER-STRIKING PAIR ARE SYMBOLS OF TURKEY PURGE

ANKARA: An Ankara academic and teacher who have been on hunger strike for over four months after being sacked in the wake of Turkey's failed coup have emerged as symbols of the biggest purge in the country's history. Academic Nuriye Gulmen and teacher Semih Ozakca were fired by a government decree under the state of emergency imposed after the July 15 coup bid last year. They then held daily demonstrations in the heart of Ankara wearing vests with the simple words: "I want my job back," winning national and international media attention.

On March 9, they went on a hunger strike to challenge their dismissal and were jailed in May on terror charges. The pair are now over four months into their hunger strike, only consuming salty or sugary water, herbal teas and vitamin B1. "We know that at this stage of a hunger strike, there is a risk of death," their lawyer Selcuk Kozagacli told AFP, adding they were suffering hearing and eyesight problems while their muscles were very weak.

'No luxury of time'

But Gulmen and Ozakca are just two of more than 100,000 people sacked by the Turkish state after the attempt to overthrow President Recep Tayyip Erdogan. Under the state of emergency imposed a few days after the failed coup, Turkish authorities fired judges, civil servants, teachers and academics, accusing them of being supporters of the Muslim cleric Fethullah Gulen. Ankara accuses Gulen, who lives in self-imposed exile in Pennsylvania, of ordering the failed putsch. Gulen strongly denies the charges.

Turkish officials say the actions are needed to expunge the influence of Gulen's movement and any other banned organizations from the state sector. Anyone who feels unfairly treated can appeal to a commission that begins its work next week, although it remains unclear how it will be able to examine so many cases. Opponents

of Erdogan say the emergency powers are being used to purge anyone who has been critical including those, like Gulmen and Ozakca, who deny any links to Gulen but have a history of leftwing activism.

In a report published in May, rights group Amnesty International criticized the arbitrary" and "politically motivated" dismissals. But Turkish officials have expressed impatience with the interest in the pair's case, arguing they were jailed for membership of the Revolutionary People's Liberation Party-Front (DHKP-C), an outlawed Marxist group that has carried out sporadic attacks. The pair deny any link to banned groups. Kozagacli said that since the 80th day of their hunger strike, they have not had a medical check-up. They rejected the medical team sent by the prison administration after the doctor threatened to force-feed them if they lost consciousness. "Their situation, their health and other needs are being followed very closely," Justice Minister Bekir Bozdag said earlier this month. "End this hunger strike," Bozdag said, adding: "This is not the way to seek rights." Their trial begins on Sept 14. "We cannot wait for that date, we do not have the luxury of time," lawyer Kozagacli told AFP.

'Cannot hide'

But it is not just those sacked affected by the purges: Their families and partners are also impacted. A European diplomatic source estimated "around a million people are directly or indirectly affected by the purges". Indeed, once sacked, the fired individual loses their income as well as their social security for them and close relatives, Amnesty said. The powerful teachers' union Egitim-Sen is able to provide 1,200 Turkish liras (\$336) a month for its sacked members.

But this is hardly enough to make ends meet and those sacked find it impossible to find new work. Acun Karadag, one of over 33,000 sacked teachers, protests every day in support of Gulmen and Ozakca. — AFP

COUP 'MARTYRS' BECOME NEW HEROES OF ERDOGAN'S TURKEY

HALISDEMIR PROBABLY THE MOST CELEBRATED VICTIM

CUKURKUYU, Turkey: People have come from far and wide to this sleepy Anatolian village in central Turkey to recite prayers, take selfies or just think quietly. The purpose of their visit is simple - to pay their respects at the grave of Sergeant Omer Halisdemir, probably the most celebrated victim of the July 15 coup aimed at ousting President Recep Tayyip Erdogan. The 249 people who died at the hands of the coup plotters are remembered in Turkey as "sehitler" - martyrs for Islam - and the subject of intense veneration on the first anniversary of the failed putsch

But none has received the attention of Halisdemir, who became an immediate national hero by shooting two bullets into the head of General Semih Terzi on the night of July 15. Terzi is suspected of being one of the key plotters who was leading the assault on the headquarters of special forces in Ankara. Anti-coup special forces commander Zekai Aksakalli had ordered Halisdemir by telephone to shoot dead Terzi to break the chain of command. The sergeant replied simply "Yes Sir!".

After carrying out his commander's instructions to the letter, Halisdemir was himself immediately shot dead by Terzi's entourage. The ultimate sacrifice made by Halisdemir, married with two children, was hailed by Turkish leaders as the turning point of the night and turned his home village of Cukurkuyu in central Anatolia into a place of pilgrimage.

'One of the greatest heroes'

Tens of thousands of people have already made the journey to the cemetery in Cukurkuyu to visit the grave of Halisdemir, located at the end of an alley lined with pine trees and flanked by a gigantic Turkish flag. "One of the greatest heroes of the night of the putsch is buried there," said Aydin, 23, a student who had come to Halisdemir's grave with his family from Ankara. "When he fell as a martyr, Omer Halisdemir became the brother of 80 million Turks," he added. In the province of Nigde, where Cukurkuyu is located, Halisdemir's image is omnipresent - stuck to the windows of lorries, on the local university that is now named after him, on scarves sold in the street. A statue of him now occupies pride of place in central Nigde.

'A whole mythology'

The heroes of the coup night like Halisdemir have been given an importance of historical magnitude by the government. "A whole mythology is being built around" the failed putsch, said a European diplomat. "In the official discourse, July 15 has become some kind of second War of Independence," the diplomat added, referring to the struggle that led to the founding of modern Turkey in 1923. This is made clear in the large number of roads, schools and parks named after the martyrs of the putsch. The first bridge across the Bosphorus in Istanbul is now called the bridge of the Martyrs of July 15.

"On July 15, these people became heroes," said Abudurrahman Tarik Sebik, president of the Foundation for the Martyrs of July 15 established after the coup. "But what were they doing on the 14th? One was a taxi driver, another a ship captain and someone else was an academic."

'Normal kind of guy'

The cult of martyrs has aroused the greed of businessmen who have shown no hesitation in exploiting their names to make a fast buck. Halisdemir's widow recently even inscribed her husband's name in Turkey's patents register to protect it from misuse. In the wake of the failed putsch, promises flooded into the authorities in Cukurkuyu to help with development. "At the start, everyone wanted to build something here," said Ahmet Ozer, the mukhtar (senior local official) of the village. "But almost no-one kept their promises," he added bitterly, with only the cities of Kocaeli and Ankara forking out to build a park and a wall around the cemetery.

At the cemetery, the gardener Ahmet Yesil, a childhood friend of Halisdemir, rummages around in his memory as he digs into the ground. "Omer had the look of a soldier, he had that sharp look. He often said - 'I am not scared of anything, just of God!" They met for the last time just a week before his death, during a funeral of a friend in the same cemetery. "I liked Omer a lot," said Yesil. "He was a normal kind of guy." — AFP



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LIBYA TRAINS REGULAR ARMY TO 'DO AWAY WITH MILITIAS'

at a military center in western Libya, dozens of young recruits learn to march in formation, as authorities train the country's first regular force since its 2011 revolution. Another makeshift camp has been set up nearby to train future soldiers. On the menu: jumping, climbing, crawling and scaling ropes. "This basic training marks our passage from civilian life to military life," said Issam Abu Ghnima, a member of the first class of a soon-to-be-formed Presidential Guard.

The 28-year-old, who has two wives, says he lost two children during the NATO-backed uprising that ousted longtime dictator Muammar Gaddafi in 2011. He decided to join the Presidential Guard "to get rid of the militias that have destroyed this country". "We want to move on to a new stage: building the state. I think the Presidential Guard is a very good project for starting to build institutions," he said.

Successive transitional authorities over the past six years have been unable to form a regular army or police force, or the core of the future Libyan army and

brigades, Colonel Salah Al-Triki said the first contingent of 600 soldiers and officers are being trained at centers in Gharian, Tripoli and the western city of

police, is to eventually comprise seven Misrata. After three months of basic training, they choose a speciality according to their skills: Special forces, telecommunications, the mechanics' brigade and so on.

The Guard already has 500 operational fighters, recruited from armed groups, whose task is to protect Tripoli's international airport, said General Mohammad Shtiba. The GNA recently ousted rival militias to regain control of the airport, which was destroyed by fighting in 2014.

"We are now trying to integrate the fighters individually in just three months of training, essentially to instill the ABC of military discipline," Shtiba said. "Most of them have completed their military service and are well seasoned in combat." Since 2011, transitional authorities have tried repeatedly to integrate the militias into regular forces controlled by the state.

Thousands of fighters have been trained both inside Libya and abroad. But many militiamen switch allegiance depending on the interest of the day, often ending up rejoining armed groups formed on the basis of regional, tribal or religious affiliations. "We will not make the same mistakes," Shtiba said, without going into specifics. —AFP

KUSHNER UNDER PRESSURE OVER RUSSIA SCANDAL

WASHINGTON: Donald Trump's eldest son Don Jr may be in the media spotlight over his notorious Trump Tower meeting with a Russian lawyer promising dirt on Hillary Clinton. But the latest revelation in the burgeoning scandal has added to the pressure on another family member who was at the meeting and is already in the crosshairs of investigators - Jared Kushner, the president's influential sonin-law. Democrats are up in arms, demanding that the 36-year-old Kushner - a senior adviser to the president with an office in the White House - be stripped of

his security clearance. "There doesn't seem to be any ethical standard in the White House," Democratic House minority leader Nancy Pelosi tweeted on Thursday. "Jared Kushner's security clearance must be immediately revoked." Even some from Trump's Republican Party are not so sure that Kushner - who is married to the president's eldest daughter Ivanka - should remain in the West Wing. "I'm going out on a limb here - but I would say I think it would be in the president's best interest if he removed all of his children from the White House," Texas Representative Bill Flores told local television Thursday. "Not only Donald Trump (Jr), but Ivanka and Jared Kushner."

Omissions on security clearance forms

While Donald Jr has no role in his father's administration - he is helping run his corporate empire - Kushner is one of Trump's closest advisors. The Harvard graduate is also the progeny of a nowerful New York real estate family, and has long been in Trump's inner circle. It was actually an omission on a government security clearance application filed by Kushner that led to the revelation of the meeting between himself, Donald Jr, former Trump campaign manager Paul Manafort and the Russian lawyer. It also led Donald Jr to release an email chain about the planning of that meeting which is now being cited as the most serious evidence yet of alleged collusion between the Trump presidential campaign and Russia. In the June 2016 emails, Donald Jr eagerly agrees to a meeting with a Kremlin-linked Russian lawyer who is said to possess incriminating information about Clinton and invites Kushner and Manafort to come along.

Kushner, filing a security clearance

document known as an SF-86, initially neglected to mention that he attended the meeting with lawyer Natalia Veselnitskaya - as well as contacts he had with several other Russians, including Moscow's ambassador to the United States, Sergey Kislyak. The meeting with Veselnitskaya came to light only after Kushner filed an amended SF-86 form. Veselnitskaya confirmed to CNN and MSNBC that Kushner attended the meeting but said he was there for only "seven to 10 minutes" and she had never intended to hand over damaging information about Clinton anyway.

Russia ties under microscope

But even before revelations of the Veselnitskaya meeting came to light, Kushner's other dealings with Russian officials have been facing scrutiny. According to The Washington Post, Kushner - at a December 2016 meeting with Kislyak - raised the possibility of setting up a secret and secure communications link between the Trump transition team and the Kremlin. That same month, Kushner also met with Sergey Gorkov, chief of Vnesheconombank and a former member of Russian intelligence. The bank, a key arm of the Russian government, is under tough US sanctions.

The Post reported last month that Kushner's finances and business dealings were being examined as part of the probe led by special counsel and former FBI director Robert Mueller into whether the Trump campaign teamed with Russia to help tilt the presidential race in favor of the hillionaire tycoon. And this week the McClatchy newspaper group reported that congressional and Justice Department investigators were looking into whether the Trump campaign helped Russian cyber operatives bombard key voting districts with "fake news" about Clinton. Kushner was in charge of the Trump campaign's digital operations. He now plays a major role in shaping foreign policy.

US intelligence agencies have concluded that Russian President Vladimir Putin approved a massive effort to swing the election to Trump, including hacking and leaking embarrassing emails from Democrats. Trump has vehemently denied any collusion between his campaign and Russia and repeatedly claimed to be the victim of a "witch hunt" by the media and sore loser Democrats. — AFP

TWO YEARS ON, NUKE DEAL HAS FEWER FRIENDS IN US AND IRAN

EUROPEANS CONCERNED ON PATH TRUMP MIGHT TAKE

WASHINGTON: Signed with pomp and fanfare on July 14, 2015, the Iranian nuclear agreement was heralded as a triumph for American diplomacy and international cooperation on nonproliferation. Two years later, it has few friends in the Trump administration or in Tehran. When it was signed in Vienna, President Barack Obama and his secretary of state, John Kerry, claimed the pact - commonly known as JCPOA, for Joint Comprehensive Plan of Action - as an undeniable success.

Their Iranian counterparts, President Hassan Rouhani and Foreign Minister Mohammad Javad Zarif, were equally ebullient. The pact was also signed by China, Russia, France, Britain and Germany, lending it additional weight. In force since Jan 16, 2016, the JCPOA provides for international monitoring of Tehran's nuclear program to ensure its purely peaceful, civilian use. In exchange, Tehran was promised the gradual lifting of the international sanctions that have strangled the Iranian economy for years.

But during his presidential campaign, billionaire Republican Donald Trump made the accord a favorite target. In campaign speech after campaign speech, he pronounced it "the worst deal ever," and he vowed, if elected, to "rip it up". As president, however, Trump has not carried out his threat. In May, the Trump administration even decided to pursue the Obama policy of easing some sanctions at least while completing a JCPOA review to decide - in principle by tomorrow - whether to continue lifting sanctions.

Obama legacy at stake After vowing to drop out of the Paris climate

agreement and questioning the Obama-era opening to Cuba, Trump would be dealing a terrible blow to his predecessor's legacy if he decided to abandon the JCPOA. The former real estate mogul has already staked out contrary positions to Obama in the Middle East, tightening US ties to Saudi Arabia's Sunni leaders while calling for the "isolation" of their Shiite rivals in Iran.

Washington accuses Tehran of posing a regional "threat" that "destabilizes" Syria, Iraq, Yemen and Lebanon, either directly or through its "terrorist" proxies. The Republican-controlled US Senate passed a bill in June to impose new sanctions on Tehran for its "support for international terrorism." Meantime, the State Department, which since 1984 has declared Iran a "state sponsor of terror," continues to punish Tehran for its ballistic missile program. The JCPOA nonetheless still has its fervent supporters in Washington.

'An existential threat'

The accord "removed an existential threat to the United States and our allies and partners," said a statement from Diplomacy Works, a pressure group founded by John Kerry and some former advisers. The lobbying group added, "We encourage the administration to recertify Iran's compliance - which they must do in order to reissue sanctions waivers due Monday." As Jonathan Finer, a former Kerry chief of staff, told AFP, "The nuclear agreement is working... It would be hard to understand why the administration would want to generate a crisis" by tearing up the accord.

In a letter to Trump, 38 retired US generals and admirals stressed that the agreement had "successfully blocked Iran's paths to a nuclear weapon". "Iran dismantled two-thirds of its centrifuges, gave up 98 percent of its stockpile of sensitive uranium and poured concrete into the core of its heavy-water reactor," the retired officers wrote. In fact, the UN nuclear monitoring authority, the International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA), praised Iran last month for respecting its commitments.

Europeans are deeply concerned, however, about the path Trump might take. "What we are telling the Americans is that the JCPOA is not perfect but (is) much better than other options," a senior European official told reporters, speaking on grounds of anonymity. "Losing the JCPOA would be a mistake." The retired officers warned against "aggressive posturing that could pave the way to war" with Iran, something that seemed a possibility in the early 2000s.

Dashed hopes in Iran

In Tehran, too, the euphoria of July 2015 has given way to disillusion. Even if the desire for closer ties with the West remains strong among many Iranians - as shown by the re-election in May of the moderate Rouhani - the much-anticipated economic fruits of the nuclear deal have been slow to materialize. The continuing American sanctions frighten bankers and scare away international corporations. While the French oil company Total did recently sign a \$4.8 billion gas deal with Iran, foreign direct investment in the country topped out last year at \$3.4 billion, a very long way from the \$50 billion that Rouhani once promised.

And that provides grist for ultraconservative factions in Iran hostile to America. As the holy month of Ramadan was ending in June, and just before a speech by supreme leader Ayatollah Ali Khamenei, the official poet of the Islamic Republic proclaimed: "Too much excitement over the JCPOA was a mistake, Relying on Uncle Sam was a mistake, O friends, we made a pact with a thief." — AFP

ITALIANS DEBATE CITIZENSHIP RIGHTS AS PRESSURES GROW

ROME: With a flood of migrants arriving on Italy's shores, a bitter debate has erupted over whether children born on Italian soil to foreign parents should have citizenship rights at birth. According to a poll published Thursday in the Messaggero daily, the idea of "ius soli" is losing support among Italians, even though such a path to citizenship exists in many other EU countries. The Latin term "ius soli" refers to rights linked to the land (where you are born) as opposed to "ius sanguinis", where rights are based on blood ties.

Children currently must have at least one Italian parent to enjoy citizenship rights. Those who do not can apply when they turn 18 but rules on time spent out of the country mean some are rejected. Back in October, 41 percent of people polled said they were in favor of "ius soli", but now that number has dropped to 32.3 percent. Italy's high-profile battle with Europe over who should deal with the hundreds of thousands of migrants rescued in the Mediterranean and brought ashore since 2014 has sparked a backlash over a proposed bill and even fisticuffs in parliament.

After 15 years of debate, the draft law establishing "ius soli" was adopted by Italy's lower house in 2015. Two years later, after a series of amendments, it is now being debated in the upper house with the support of the center-left. The draft law also provides for nationality via "ius culturae" for children not born in Italy who have spent at least five years in the country's education system.

Italy's anti-immigrant Northern League has slammed the proposal as a "cultural mistake". Ex-premier Silvio Berlusconi. founder of the center-right Forza Italia, said it would send the wrong signal to those already attracted to Italy's shores. "Making it known that it's easier to become Italian will create false hopes in Africa and increase migratory pressures," he warned. Over 86,000 migrants have arrived so far this year, up over 10 percent compared with the same period in 2016.

800,000 new nationals

The adoption of "ius soli" would bestow Italian nationality on around 800,000 children immediately, and another 60,000 newborns a year, according to the Italian Institute of Statistics (Istat). "The children born in Italy are Italians and it is the duty of a civilized country to welcome them," Prime Minister Paolo Gentiloni said earlier this week. The proposed bill is also passionately supported by his predecessor Matteo Renzi.

Gentiloni has brushed aside attempts by critics to link the issue of citizen rights to that of national security, saying "the way to reduce risk is not through exclusion but dialogue and inclusion". But with unemployment towering at 11 percent - well above the average in the Eurozone - and soaring to 37 percent among young people, the age-old narrative of foreigners stealing locals' jobs has reared its head.

That fear has not been eased by new figures this week showing 4.5 million Italians are living in absolute poverty. According to II Messaggero, those polled in Thursday's survey said it would be better to postpone the debate on citizenship rights until after the general election in spring next year. Italy in 2016 bestowed the highest number of citizenships in Europe at 205,000, up from just 63,000 in 2012. Adopting "ius soli" would bring Italy into line with the majority of its European neighbors - from Belgium and Britain to France and Portugal - where the law already applies in various forms. —AFP

Tragic end to Raqqa family's hopes **RAQQA, Syria:** While thousands of people head wrapped in a traditional white scarf

scramble to flee Syria's battle-torn Raqqa, members of the Sheikh Wais family bravely headed back in to recover the bodies of loved ones killed there. Dodging shelling, air strikes and snipers, the four Syrian Kurds finally made it back into the western district of Al-Daraiya in the jihadistheld city this week. But hopes of retrieving and burying their relatives were shattered by a night-

"We found half a corpse and some hair. I only knew it was them from my sister Zahraa's gold chain," wailed 17-year-old Amal Sheikh Wais. Her sister, their brother Abdallah, his pregnant wife Nour and the couple's 18-month-old baby all perished in ferocious fighting between US-backed forces and the Islamic State group. "We couldn't even find the baby's body," Amal told AFP, moments after return-

ing from the horrifying ordeal. Amal, another brother and their mother had just arrived at a home in west Raqqa used as a command base by the US-backed Syrian Democratic Forces as they battle IS jihadists. An SDF fighter saw the family approaching their position along a dirt road and first assumed they were civilians escaping IS. "Abdallah! Abdallah! Abdallah!" screamed Amal's mother, dressed in a black robe and white headscarf. SDF fighters tried to console them, but to no avail. "There was nothing left of them," said her son solemnly, his embroidered with colored flowers.

A fatal decision

Before Syria's war erupted in 2011, Ragga's population was about 20 percent Kurdish, according to French geography expert Fabrice Balanche. When IS overran the city in early 2014, thousands of the city's minority residents fled. The Sheikh Wais family was one of the few Syrian Kurdish clans to stay in their native city. "Abdallah would get beaten a lot because he wanted to smoke cigarettes and refused to wear the style of dress" mandated by IS, Amal recalled.

As the US-backed SDF tightened the noose around Ragga earlier this year, IS turned parts of the city into "military zones" - including the family's home district of Al-Rumeilah. The Sheikh Wais family fled across the city to a bakery where they used to work, in the western district of Al-Daraiya. In June, Amal and her mother risked the harrowing journey out of Raqqa further west to the town of Tabqa, which was captured by the SDF two months ago.

But Zahraa, along with Abdallah, Nour and their toddler, made the fatal decision to stay in Ragga, where their situation grew even more dire. "Daesh kicked them out of the bakery, so they were forced to camp in a nearby field with the bakery owner," Amal said, using an Arabic acronym for IS.

Worst fears confirmed

After she had settled in Tabqa, Amal learned of rumors circulating on Facebook suggesting that their relatives had been killed. Her brother, who had managed to cross into Turkey, heard the same news and rushed back across the border to find out what had happened to his family. Desperate for closure, the remaining members of the Sheikh Wais family gathered last week at a camp for the displaced in Ain Issa, more than 50 km north of Ragga.

Their worst fears were confirmed by Nour's father, who had just escaped IS. "He went to check on them one day and found the dead bodies," Amal said. "So he covered them in a sheet and built up a small dirt berm around them to mark the location before fleeing the city," she told AFP. Flustered, she switched between Arabic and Kurdish and said it was still unclear exactly how her relatives had died.

Some recent escapees said they were killed in air strikes as they were preparing to flee, but others blamed IS mortar fire. The United Nations has warned that civilians caught in the fighting or trying to flee face massive risks. Corpses still litter the streets in areas recaptured by the SDF. Some are of suspected IS fighters, but others - including those of small children - are clearly civilians. — AFP

RWANDA OPPN IN UPHILL BATTLE AGAINST KAGAME

KIGALI: On the impeccably clean streets of Rwanda's capital, where a skyline of gleaming new buildings pokes through undulating hills, few have heard of opposition presidential aspirants Frank Habineza and Philippe Mpayimana. They were only confirmed as candidates and allowed to begin fundraising a week before Friday's campaign start for Augst 4 elections in the east African nation. With little money, and only three weeks to drum up support, the two men face a seemingly insurmountable task in challenging the all-powerful President Paul Kagame, who himself says the result is a fore-

"The election is over," Kagame told thousands of supporters at a rally as the campaign kicked off, explaining the decision had been made when around 98 percent of voters chose to let him seek a third term in office in a 2015 referendum. Posters and decorations in the colors of the ruling Rwanda Patriotic Front (RPF) went up overnight in time for the start of the campaign, while many Rwandans said they did not even know who the other candidates were.

"We as the population have lived a long time with our president (Kagame). We only know what he has done, we don't care about the other candidates," says One Love Nkundimana, 28, who works as a street porter. Kagame and his RPF have held an iron grip on power since overthrowing the extremist Hutu regime, which perpetrated the 1994 genocide of 800,000 mainly Tutsis.

While credited with bringing order, infrastructure and stability to the shattered nation, rights groups say Kagame's regime rules through fear with systematic repression of the opposition, free speech and the media. "We know many people are tired of the same government for 23 years but they don't say it

because there has been a climate of fear," Habineza, 40, told AFP.

A dangerous journey

In his starkly decorated office in the capital, Habineza is still absorbing the fact that he is finally on the ballot paper eight years since he began the struggle to register his Democratic Green Party. "It has been a very difficult journey and also a very dangerous journey," he said. He describes political meetings violently broken up, supporters imprisoned or forced to flee into exile, and his own departure to Sweden after his deputy was found almost decapitated shortly before the last election in 2010.

Habineza finally managed to register his party in 2013 after returning to the country, and was a lone voice against the constitutional reform allowing Kagame a third term. His dissent is not without consequence: In the run-up to this election he was evicted from his former office, and both he and his deputy were thrown out of their homes without warning.

Opposition a facade

In a Kigali garden, the other opposition candidate, Mpayimana, appears somewhat dazed to be in the race at all as he sits at a table strategizing and sipping beer with a small team of advisors. He was the only one of four independent hopefuls to be allowed to run. "I have only one week to raise awareness among people to support me financially," said the 47-year-old former journalist who spent 18 years in exile before returning to Rwanda in February to run as an independent. He is careful not to criticize Kagame but says he would like to "change the mentality of my country to go with the notion of democracy". —AFP

INDIA SET TO GET HEAD OF STATE FROM LOWEST CASTE

Modi sends message to Dalits

NEW DELHI: India's next president will emerge from the Dalit caste - a community so marginalized they were once known as "untouchables" - with the victory of the ruling party candidate set to strengthen Prime Minister Narendra Modi's grip on power. Ram Nath Kovind, 71, is hot favorite to be elected tomorrow by national and state lawmakers to become titular head-of-state as the candidate of Modi's Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP). It will be only the second time, after President K R Narayanan, who served from 1997 to 2002, that a member of the downtrodden caste has assumed the post.

The result will be announced Thursday. And for Modi, with one eye on re-election in 2019, it will send an important message to a key, long disdained electoral group. Dalits, who number around 200 million, are among the poorest communities in India and have traditionally been relegated to activities on the margins of society.

Despite legal protection, discrimination is rife and Dalits are routinely denied access to education and other opportunities for advancement. Analysts say Modi can win political capital by helping BJP politician Kovind - a former Supreme Court lawyer and ex-governor of the eastern state of Bihar - to win the contest against opposition nominee Meira Kumar, also a Dalit. Modi has used Twitter to hail the rise of Kovind, the son of a farmer, from "a humble background".

Kumar, the daughter of freedom fighter Babu Jagjivan Ram, was a diplomat before entering politics in 1985 and became India's first woman speaker in 2009, but the electoral college numbers are heavily tilted against her. Her nomination, which followed Kovind's, was seen by many as the opposition's attempt to counter Modi's move to woo Dalits.

Poor but powerful

Votes from the Dalits and the BJP's traditional Hindu base propelled Modi to his 2014 landslide, especially in the battleground states of Uttar Pradesh and Bihar. "Every (Indian) politician would want support from this 16 percent voting bloc for any election," Vimal Thorat, an activist and convener of the National Campaign on Dalit Human Rights, told AFP. Dalit support is even more important for the BJP as it has mostly been shunned by Muslims, who make up about 14 percent of the 1.3 billion

Dalit votes supplemented by support from the BJP's rightwing Hindu nationalist followers "will, for once and all, defeat the 'Muslim veto' in this country", Nistula Hebbar, political editor of The Hindu newspaper, told AFP. "Dalits as a community or a base are spread across the country, especially in all electorally

important states. Their vote is extremely important, especially for the BJP," Hebbar said.

But reports of clashes and caste discrimination are routine across the country. Authorities in BJPruled Uttar Pradesh state sent riot police to Saharanpur district in May after clashes between Dalits and upper caste Hindus. Violent protests erupted in Modi's home state Gujarat last year after video footage emerged of an attack on four Dalit villagers who were taking a dead cow to be skinned. Cows are considered sacred by Hindus and attacks by vigilante groups on cow traders and smugglers have increased since Modi's election.

Dalits are commonly tasked with jobs such as skinning cattle carcasses for their hides and the incidents have flagged inherent tensions between the BJP's traditional base and its bid to reach out to lower caste voters. "The increasing friction between upper and lower castes in states like Gujarat, Maharashtra and UP has led to the rise of a young and oppositional Dalit leadership," a Times of India editorial said last month. It added that Modi and his allies have "sought to regain advantage in this equation with a Dalit presidential candidate".

Ashok Malik of the New Delhi based Observer Research Foundation think-tank told AFP that Kovind's nomination was "a milestone" for the BJP, which "is at its strongest ever" and poised to elect its choice of president even without any support from opposition lawmakers. But Dalits wonder whether the election of a president from their community for the second time in two decades - will bring real

"Change will happen only when the everyday problems of the community are addressed in line with our constitution. When they are given justice and the rules are implemented fairly and firmly," Thorat said. India's prime minister wields most of the executive power, but the president can send back some parliamentary bills for reconsideration and also plays a guiding role in the process of forming governments. In his three years in power, Modi has shown himself to be an astute politician. The response to his latest political gambit, particularly by India's marginalized groups, will play a key role in deciding his future after 2019, experts say. —AFP

MAN FOUND DEAD WANTED FOR RUNNING 'DARK WEB' MARKET

BANGKOK: A 26-year-old Canadian found dead in his Thai police mostly traded in drugs, stolen credit cards and forged IDs. It was cell this week was wanted in the US for allegedly running a massive "dark web" marketplace for drugs and other contraband, a enue of somewhere between 600,000 and 800,000 dollars a day in police source told AFP yesterday. Thai cops arrested Alexandre Cazes in Bangkok on July 5 and had planned to extradite him to the US, where he faced drug trafficking and money laundering charges. But the computer programmer hanged himself with a towel in his detention cell a week later on July 12, according to Thai anti-narcotics police, who have been tight-lipped on the

Yesterday, a Thai officer confirmed Cazes was accused of being an "operator" of a major online black market. "It's a huge dark web market that traffics drugs and sells other illegal stuff," the police officer said, requesting anonymity. Speculation is rife that the underground marketplace was AlphaBay, considered the world's largest and most lucrative darknet bazaar until it was taken down within hours of Cazes' arrest.

Like its predecessor Silk Road, which was shut down by the FBI in 2013, AlphaBay used the encrypted Tor network and virtual currencies like Bitcoin to shield customers from detection. According to Nicolas Christin, a computer science professor at Carnegie Mellon University, AlphaBay gained prominence in 2015 and early 2017, and that's a rather conservative estimate," he told AFP.

Luxury lifestyle

Cazes appeared to be living a life of luxury in Thailand, where he owned three houses and four cars - including a Lamborghini according to Thai police who have seized the assets. He slipped into the country around eight years ago, according to police. "He was a computer expert involved with international transactions of Bitcoins," said Major General Soontorn Chalermkiat, a spokesman for Thailand's Narcotics Suppression Bureau.

"He didn't have any business in Thailand but he had many houses," the officer said, adding that Cazes' Thai wife has since been charged with money laundering. The US Embassy in Bangkok refused to comment on the details of the case, saying only that Cazes was detained at the request of the US "with a view toward extradition to face federal criminal charges". The founder of Silk Road - the world's first and most famous digital drug market - was sentenced to life in prison by federal court in



CHINA CENSORS SCRUB EMOJI TRIBUTES TO LIU

BEIJING: China's censors raced Friday to scrub social media networks of candles, RIP and other tributes to Nobel laureate Liu Xiaobo as they seek to silence discussion about the prominent dissident's death. The 61-year-old democracy activist died Thursday from liver cancer while under heavy police guard at a hospital in the northeastern city of Shenyang - but most Chinese remain clueless about his death or even who he was.

A search for news of his death on Chinese search engine Baidu turned up no results and China's Twitter-like Weibo blocked the use of his name and initials "LXB". Even the most obscure homages to Liu on Weibo were removed. One user who posted "RIP" was advised it had been deleted "because it violated relevant laws and regulations" - even though the post did not mention the activist by name. RIP is now among the search terms blocked on Chinese social media networks. Grieving users who had posted candle emojis on Weibo saw them erased. When accessing Weibo on a personal computer the symbol is no longer among the emoticon options. On the Weibo mobile app, however, the candle was still available but attempts to post it were blocked and triggered a message saying "content is illegal!" The Chinese word for "candle" is also barred.

'The brave one'

China tightly controls the Internet through a censorship system known as the "Great Firewall" and closely monitors social media networks for sensitive content. Social media sites have been cleaned of comments praising the dissident. "He is the brave one for this time. The history will remember him whether alive or dead," one user said in a Weibo post that was later deleted. Another said: "You, who was just freed, made the world different; we, those who are still in prison, salute you."

Even a Chinese language article about German pacifist Carl von Ossietzky, the last Nobel Peace Prize laureate to die in custody, that had been circulating on the mobile messaging app WeChat can no longer be accessed. A search for the most commonly used Chinese translation of Ossietzky's name also returned no results on Weibo but it was not blocked on Baidu.

The circumstances recalled the situation in 2010 when Liu was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize while serving an 11-year sentence for "subversion" - online searches for his name and references to his award, including the empty chair that represented him at the Oslo ceremony, were blocked. Not all online posts were sympathetic to Liu, a veteran of the 1989 Tiananmen Square protests whose advocacy for democratic reform infuriated the government. —AFP



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LULA CONVICTION OPENS FIELD FOR '18 PRESIDENTIAL RACE

he graft conviction Wednesday of former Brazilian President Luiz Inacio Lula da Silva, a front-runner for next year's presidential election, opens the door for an outsider to take power in Latin America's largest country, political experts said. Lula, a giant on the Brazilian political scene who led Brazil from 2003 to 2011, has said he wants to run for president again next year. But if his nearly 10-year sentence is upheld on appeal, Lula, a founder of the leftist Workers Party, would be barred from seeking office again for eight years, beginning after any jail time is complete.

Lula, 71, is among a raft of Brazilian elites toppled by an epic corruption scandal that has battered the nation's economy, engulfed every major party and deepened public cynicism about politics. It's a toxic mix that has enraged voters, who are searching for someone to lead them out of the political and economic wilderness. "Brazil is now as polarized as the US, it really has been for years," said Carlos Melo, a political scientist with Insper, a Sao Paulo business school. "But if Lula is absent it would unquestionably open the space for an outside, very emotional leader, a bit like US President Trump."

Lula was convicted on Wednesday by Judge Sergio Moro, who found Lula guilty of accepting 3.7 million reais (\$1.15 million) worth of bribes from engineering firm OAS SA. That is the amount prosecutors said the company spent refurbishing a beach apartment for Lula in return for his help winning contracts with state oil company Petroleo Brasileiro.

OAS was part of a supplier cartel that prosecutors said fleeced billions of dollars from Petrobras through inflated contracts, funneling some of the ill-gotten gains to politicians and political parties. Several OAS executives were jailed by Moro, the hard-charging judge overseeing the so-called Car Wash investigation, the largest-ever corruption probe in Brazil's history.

Lula' lawyers said he is innocent. He will remain free while his attorneys appeal the ruling, which they have characterized as a political witch hunt. The appeals court is expected to take at least eight months to rule. "This politically motivated judgment attacks Brazil's rule of law, democracy and Lula's basic human rights," Lula's defense team wrote in an emailed statement. "It is of immense concern to the Brazilian people and to the international community."

The Race

Despite his legal woes, the charismatic Lula remains Brazil's best-known politician and has retained a base of loyal supporters. As president, he channeled resources from a commodities boom into social programs that helped lift millions from poverty. Recent surveys from the respected Datafolha polling institute show that in a second-round runoff next year, Lula would beat all contenders with the exception of the environmentalist and two-time presidential candidate Marina Silva, with whom he is in a technical tie.


But if Lula cannot run, and with roughly 20 percent of the electorate undecided on any candidate, the election is up for grabs. While Silva has polled well, Melo and other political watchers doubt that the soft-spoken, environmental expert could win, in part because her campaigns have lacked the fiery speeches and dramatic flair needed to engage many voters. The public's thirst for showmanship and anti-establishment candidates, Melo said, could give a boost to two outsiders: Ciro Gomes, a tough-talking former governor, federal minister and congressmen who is now with the Democratic Workers Party; and Joao Doria, a millionaire media mogul and former star of Brazil's version of "The Apprentice."

Gomes, despite his long career in politics, is a rough-and-tumble politician who could easily position himself as an anti-government candidate. Loud and politically incorrect, Gomes called unpopular President Michel Temer, himself facing a corruption charge, the "captain of the coup" that led to the impeachment of former President Dilma Rousseff last year.

Doria, who had never held elected office before, stunned the political establishment last year when he won the mayorship of South America's largest city in the first round, capturing 53 percent of the vote. A member of the centrist Brazilian Social Democracy Party, he is loved by the business community for his pro-market stance. And he has caught the public's attention with stunts such as donning a street sweeper's uniform and spending days cleaning roadways.

Shortly after the Lula verdict was made public Wednesday, Doria posted on Twitter that "Justice has been done". "The most shameless man in Brazil was condemned to nine and a half years in prison," Doria continued. "Long live Brazil." — Reuters

HISTORY IS TOO DEEP, PAIN IS TOO REAL

week ago, a pro-Israel media monitoring group accused me of making "an unsubstantiated charge that Israel supporters are responsible" for discrimination, hate crimes, and the political exclusion of Arab Americans. Because this issue is so important to Arab Americans and because some hardline pro-Israel groups refuse to acknowledge their role in harming my community, I am obliged to respond with a few examples representing just the tip of the iceberg of painful acts of defamation, discrimination, exclusion, threats, and violence.

From the moment Arab Americans began to organize and to advocate for causes we held dear, we were confronted by attacks from major Jewish community organizations. Our early efforts to bring our community into the mainstream of American political life were met with resistance and campaigns of pressure designed to make us "radioactive". They used political pressure to have us excluded from government meetings, engagement with coalitions, and involvement in political campaigns. They defamed us in reports they circulated (I have copies of all of them), terming us "Arab propagandists", "a made up community", "a creation of petrodollars", purveyors of anti-Semitism, or a "subversive plot" supporting Palestinian terror.

My first direct encounter with this exclusion came in 1978. I was invited to the White House for an ethnic leaders' round-table with Vice President Mondale. A few days after the meeting, I received call from the White House informing me that because they had received complaints from Jewish groups that a pro-Palestinian Arab had been at the meeting, I wouldn't be invited to follow-up discussions.

The next year, my organization applied for membership in the Coalition for a New Foreign and Military Policy - a grouping of 60 religious, and peace and justice organizations. We overwhelmingly won the vote for admission, but three members, led by a liberal Jewish group, objected to our entry and threatened to quit the coalition "if the Arabs were admitted". The coalition leadership then asked us to withdraw our application. In late 1979, my Palestine Human Rights Campaign hosted a major national conference that featured seven Members of Congress, major Black leaders, and many figures from peace and justice organizations. Despite receiving prominent and favorable national news coverage for three consecutive nights, a pro-Jewish Defense League newspaper in New York described the event with a huge font front page headline as a "SECRET PLO MEET" that "plots terror".

Exclusion

A few months later, after having received a number of threats, my office was firebombed. The JDL issued a state-

ment which, while not claiming credit, said that they "approved of the act". Months later, JDL head, Meir Kahane, showed up pounding on my office door taunting us about the firebombing until the police arrived and removed him from the premises. In 1981, I was invited by a national Italian American organization to head-up a multiethnic meeting addressing issues of media stereotyping. Some Jewish groups objected to my role accusing me of having "another agenda". They refused to participate and convened their own meeting.

In 1983, former Senator James Abourezk was invited to serve on the Executive Committee of the 20th anniversary of Dr. King's March on Washington (I was asked to serve on the National Steering Committee). Once again, major Jewish groups threatened to withdraw if Arab Americans were included. After a long and painful debate, the matter was resolved in our favor when Rev Joseph Lowery and Rev Jesse Jackson intervened on our behalf

The threats continued - by mail and phone - all of which were reported to authorities. Some came to us in Washington, others to Arab American offices in other cities. Then, in 1985, Alex Odeh, the Director of the California American-Arab Anti-Discrimination Committee was murdered when a bomb exploded as he entered his office. Shortly after Alex's murder, the House Judiciary Committee and, later, the US Commission on Civil Rights, held hearings on violence against Arab Americans. In my testimony, I said: "These acts of violence and threats of violence against Arab American organizations are but part of a larger picture of discrimination, harassment, and intimidation. We can document numerous instances of active political discrimination against Arab Americans, "blacklisting" of Arab American political activists and spokespersons, and efforts to "bait" or taint Arab American leaders and organizations as "terrorist supporters". "All of these actions and practices create a climate . . . [which] serve[s] to embolden the political opponents of Arab Americans to the point where, as we have seen, some have escalated their opposition to include acts of violence against Arab Americans and their organizations."

Hurdles

While our efforts to organize and normalize our involvement in civic life proved challenging, in the political arena, Arab Americans faced even greater hurdles. Throughout the 1980s, Arab Americans had contributions returned and endorsements rejected. A prominent group of St Jude Hospital board members had their contributions to the Mondale campaign returned in 1984, and in 1988, presidential candidate Michael Dukakis rejected our endorsement. Two national political leaders, David Dinkins, running for Mayor in New York City, and Ed Szchau, running for a Senate

seat in California, both directly asked me to discourage Arab Americans from contributing to their campaigns citing their fear of a backlash from the Jewish community. Whether their fears were real or imagined, the impact on my community was real and hurtful. In spite of these obstacles, we persisted and with the help of courageous leaders like Jesse Jackson, Ron Brown, and Bill Clinton we made our way into the mainstream. Jackson welcomed us into his two presidential campaigns. As Chair of the Democratic Party, Brown, despite warnings by some Jewish donors that they would withdraw support for the party, came to our events, welcomed us, and gave us a seat at the table.

But problems remained. In 1992, Arab Americans were being rebuffed by the Clinton campaign. At that year's Democratic Convention, I was approached by AlPAC's legal director, who also served as the Clinton campaign's legal advisor. He said to me "I know you're trying to get into the campaign. Why the f**** should we let you in? ...leave us alone". I was shaken by the naked hostility of the encounter and went to Brown. Together we laid out a strategy. It ultimately led me to an unlikely place - a meeting with Senator Joe Lieberman. Despite our many disagreements, he was approachable and fair. He was so incensed that he called the Clinton campaign expressing his outrage over this behavior. The next day, we were invited to join the campaign.

Toll

While the Clinton years, shaped as they were by the Oslo Accords and the president's own personal commitment to justice, changed the political dynamic for Arab Americans, problems persisted with some Jewish groups still attempting to exclude Arab Americans and defame those who were in government posts. Now, however, the main threats came not from the mainstream groups, but from the fringes, and from a collection of entities funded by the likes of Sheldon Adelson and Robert Shillman. They assumed the role of smearing Arab Americans and now, American Muslims. Their efforts have not been able to exclude us, but they have been able to incite against us and the toll they continue to take on community leaders and activists is substantial.

After 9/11, three men were arrested, tried, and convicted of making death threats against me, my family, and my office. Two of the three used, in their threats, material culled from these "hate sites" - citing their support for Israel as a reason for their hatred and death threats. The bottom line is the charge that supporters of Israel are, in part, responsible for instances of discrimination, hate crimes, and the political exclusion of Arab Americans cannot be dismissed as "unsubstantiated". The history is too real and the pain is too deep. Shame on those who can't acknowledge the history and the pain.

Trump will take healthcare credit or cast blame

f congressional Republicans succeed in repealing and replacing the Obama-era health law, expect a big Rose Garden celebration with President Donald Trump taking credit. If they fail? Trump has already indicated he will hold Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell responsible, setting up an intraparty blame game that could be devastating for the GOP. "After all of these years of suffering thru ObamaCare, Republican Senators must come through as they have promised!" Trump said in a tweet early Friday while in Paris.

Trump has made it clear that the onus for delivering a major Republican achievement and fulfilling seven years of those promises is on the six-term Kentucky senator, who is battle-hardened by legislative negotiating - and not on the president and author of "The Art of the Deal". "Mitch has to pull it off. He's working very hard. He's got to pull it off," Trump said in an interview for the Christian Broadcasting Network's "The 700 Club." Trump has cast himself as a bystander in the monthslong process. "I will be at my desk, pen in hand!" he tweeted Friday as he described the wait to sign a bill erasing much of former President Barack Obama's 2010 law. Trump is reminding GOP lawmakers who promised so often to repeal and replace, and voted repeatedly but never finally to do it, that they better not blow this best shot. And if they do, "I will be very angry about it, and a lot of people will be very upset," the president has said.

After brokering deals with individual lawmakers before a healthcare bill barely made it through the House in May, Trump has largely stayed on the sidelines as the Senate has dealt with the issue. That's partly because McConnell had made his preference clear that Trump keep out of Senate business, according to associates. Trump has mostly acceded to the request, partly because McConnell had earned his respect by shepherding conservative jurist Neil Gorsuch

to Supreme Court confirmation in April. That still stands as Trump's most significant achievement since taking office.

But McConnell's stewardship of the healthcare issue has proved less adroit. He had to abruptly cancel a vote last month on a bill he drafted largely in secret after it became clear support was lacking. He's now struggling to nail down votes to pass the latest version next week. The president has shown some patience with McConnell's predicament, telling reporters on Air Force One on the way to France that "the only thing more difficult than peace between Israel and the Palestinians is healthcare." He then

repeated his confidence in a successful outcome.

But he has delivered no major speech in six months on healthcare either before Congress or outside Washington, addressing it only in a few tweets and a couple of asides at rallies in lowa and elsewhere. Pressed on what the president is doing to secure the votes for the Senate bill, White House aide Sarah Huckabee Sanders said the administration has provided "technical assistance throughout the process". In comparison, Obama aggressively used the bully pulpit of the presidency to secure passage of his Affordable Care Act, with at least five town halls in Wisconsin, Ohio, Colorado and Virginia, prime-time speeches to Congress, healthcare summits at the White House and elsewhere, and personal lobbying of lawmakers.

Greatest fear

GOP lawmakers insist that Trump has been helpful, though sometimes they've struggled to depict exactly how. But his distance from the process could help him to avoid blame if failure is the outcome. And now, Trump's words signal that if Congress fails, lawmakers can expect his wrath and that of his followers - a relative minority of

the population but an important slice of the GOP base that has the ability to punish Republicans who cross the president. In last year's elections, the two major Republican Senate candidates who lost their races, then-Sen Kelly Ayotte of New Hampshire and Rep Joe Heck of Nevada, did so after withdrawing their support from Trump. Winning Republicans stuck with him.

For many GOP lawmakers, the greatest fear is not a Democratic opponent but a primary challenge from the right. Republican Sen Jeff Flake of Arizona, who was one of Trump's most outspoken critics throughout last year's campaign, has grown much quieter about the president as he faces re-election next year and a primary opponent who has embraced Trump and taunted Flake for his stances. Now Flake is looking like a likely "yes" vote on the healthcare bill. He said Thursday he was still considering it, but he applauded inclusion of an amendment by conservative Sen Ted Cruz of Texas that would allow insurers to sell skimpy, low-cost healthcare. "I like the consumer freedom amendment in it, you've got to get relief to Arizonans that just don't have insurance," Flake said.

Most Republicans say that even though the GOP's healthcare bills have polled poorly, and they will be forced to defend yanking insurance coverage from millions, a worse result would be failing to repeal. That would undermine the GOP's ability to present itself as a governing party, while breaking seven years of promises. The Republican in the White House might be able to dodge the fingerpointing that would surely follow. But he might be the only one. "I think the whole party is going to be responsible so everyone with that label is probably going to have to bear responsibility no matter what they go home and claim," said conservative former Sen Jim DeMint. — AP

Mirzakhani said she enjoyed pure mathematics because of the elegance and longevity of the questions she studies. "It is like being lost in a jungle and trying to use all the knowledge that you can gather to come up with some new tricks, and with some luck you might find a way out," she added. In 2008 she became a professor of mathematics at Stanford. She is survived by her husband, Stanford mathematician Jan Vondrak, and her young daughter Anahita.

In Iran, President Hassan Rouhani said that Mirzakhani's "doleful passing" has caused "great sorrow," state media reported. Rouhani praised the "unprecedented brilliance of this creative scientist and modest human being, who made Iran's name resonate in the world's scientific forums, (and) was a turning point in showing the great will of Iranian women and young people on the path towards reaching the peaks of glory ... in various international arenas."

Separately on Instagram, Iranian Foreign Minister Mohammad Javad Zarif said that Mirzakhani's death is a cause for grief for all Iranians. Mirzakhani's impact "will live on for the thousands of women she inspired to pursue math and science," said Stanford President Marc Tessier-Lavigne. He described her as "a humble person who accepted honors only with the hope that it might encourage others to follow her path". The university said via Stanford News that Mirzakhani's preferred method of working "was to doodle on large sheets of white paper, scribbling formulas on the periphery of her drawings. Her young daughter described her mother at work as 'painting."

Mirzakhani became known on the international mathematics scene as a teenager, winning gold medals at both the 1994 and 1995 International Math Olympiads - and finished with a perfect score in the latter competition. She went on to win the 2009 Blumenthal Award for the Advancement of Research in Pure Mathematics, and the 2013 Satter Prize of the American Mathematical Society. Mirzakhani studied mathematics at Sharif University in Iran and earned a PhD degree from Harvard in 2004. She then taught at Princeton University before moving to Stanford in 2008.

The Fields Medal, which she won in 2014, is given out every four years, often to multiple winners aged 40 or younger. Mirzakhani also collaborated with Alex Eskin, a University of Chicago mathematician "to take on another of the most-vexing problems in the field: The trajectory of a billiards ball around a polygonal table," Stanford News said. "The challenge began as a thought exercise among physicists a century ago and had yet to be solved." — AFP

TIGHT SECURITY IN JERUSALEM AS HOLY SITE...

Yesterday, access was restricted through Damascus Gate, the main entrance used by Palestinians into Jerusalem's Old City, and only residents with identification were allowed to pass. "This is not security. This is punishment," said Bader Jweihan, 53, an accountant who was denied entry.

Musa Abdelmenam Oussam, 73 and with poor evesight, was helped by a grandson as he walked with a cane and sought to enter. But the owner of a book wholesale shop in the Old City was also turned away. 'This mosque is not only for Muslims. Tourists come," he said, adding that he usually prays at Al-Agsa every day. 'This city is for all the world. It must be open." Jaffa Gate, heavily used by tourists and near the Old City's Jewish Quarter, was open but with a heavy police presence.

A group of tourists from Poland said they were concerned when they heard about Friday's shooting but wanted to continue their visit. They planned to shop in the Old City and visit the nearby Garden of Gethsemane, where Christians believe Jesus (PBUH) prayed the night before his crucifixion. "It stressed me a little," said Ewa, who did not want to give her last name. At Lions Gate near the site of the attack, police guarded the entrance and restricted access, checking IDs.

The attack and aftermath was one of the most serious incidents in Jerusalem in recent years. Palestinian president Mahmud Abbas and Netanyahu spoke by phone on Friday as tensions rose. Israeli authorities also detained Jerusalem's top Muslim cleric, grand mufti Muhammad Ahmad Hussein, as crowds gathered at the gates of the Old City after the attack, his son said. Hussein, who had criticized the closure of Al-Agsa, was released later Friday after being questioned, according to another of his sons.

With Al-Aqsa closed, crowds gathered at Old City gates and held Friday prayers there instead. The Palestinian director of the Waqf (religious property) council, Abdel Azim Salhab, said the closure of the mosque compound was the "worst aggression since 1967" - a reference to the start of Israel's occupation of east Jerusalem which it later annexed. The Haram al-Sharif/Temple Mount is central to the Israeli-Palestinian conflict, with Palestinians fearing Israel may one day seek to assert further control over it. — AFP

TURKEY MARKS YEAR SINCE 'EPIC' COUP DEFEAT

the Bosphorus that saw some of the fiercest fighting, after arriving from Ankara on his official plane accompanied by an F-16 fighter jet.

Tens of thousands carrying the Turkish flag and chanting "we are soldiers of Tayyip (Erdogan)" gathered on the bridge, which has since been renamed Bridge of the Martyrs of July 15. "We are here for the victims, for democracy, for our country for our people and our flag," said Hakan, a resident of Istanbul.

In the wake of the failed coup bid, authorities embarked on the biggest purge in Turkey's history, arresting 50,000 people and sacking almost three times as many. Erdogan also shored up his position by winning a referendum on enhancing his powers earlier this year. In the latest dismissals, another 7,563 police, soldiers and other state employees were fired late Friday under the state of emergency that has been in place since July 20 last year.

Turkey's opposition put political disputes aside on the night of the putsch but the scale of the purge has intensified political divisions. The celebrations come less than a week after the head of the Republican People's Party (CHP) Kemal Kilicdaroglu held the largest opposition rally in Turkey in years, pushing for "justice". "Over the last year, the judicial proceedings... moved outside the framework of the law," Kilicdaroglu, whose party will boycott commemoration ceremonies later in the day, told parliament.

He also called for full clarity over what happened on the night of July 15, with questions still remaining over when the authorities first found out an uprising was afoot. "The details need to be made clear in the name of the martyrs and the heroes," he said, accusing the authorities of "hindering" efforts to find out the truth. Erdogan, who was present at the session, gazed down stonily from the VIP balcony. The coup bid also frayed ties between the United States and European Union with NATO member Turkey, which accused its allies of failing to show solidarity. Gulen has always denied involvement and in a new statement Friday said the accusations were "baseless, politically motivated slanders" and slammed a "witch hunt" of Erdogan's critics.

The scale of yesterday's nationwide commemorations is aimed at etching July 15, 2016 into the minds of Turks as a key date in the history of the modern state. Giant posters designed by the presidency have sprung up across billboards in Istanbul showing gaudy paintings that portray the key events of the coup night, including the surrender of the putschist soldiers. "The epic of July 15," says the slogan. However some have criticized the posters for belittling the Turkish army.

Public transport is free in Istanbul and Ankara over the weekend while mobile operator Turkcell has sent text messages to clients promising them a free extra gigabyte of data from July 15. Illuminated anti-coup slogans have been hung between the minarets of some of Istanbul's greatest Ottoman mosques.

At midnight local time (2100 GMT) people across Turkey were to take part in "democracy watches", rallies commemorating how people poured out into the streets. Erdogan was to later return to Ankara and at 2300 GMT give a speech in parliament to mark the time it was bombed. A giant monument to those killed - showing people holding up the Turkish star and crescent insignia will then be unveiled outside his palace in the capital as the dawn call to prayer rings out. — AFP

The four countries also expelled all Qatari nationals, impacting mixed-nationality families in the Gulf, students and people seeking medical treatment abroad, among others. Prior to the dispute, Qataris could travel visa-free between the Gulf countries. Le Drian said such punitive measures should end. "France is calling for these measures to be lifted, especially ones that affect the (Qatari) population, specifically measures that impact bi-national families that have been separated,"

He was speaking to reporters in Qatar alongside Sheikh Mohammed, who said he welcomed mediation efforts and possible negotiations so long as they are founded on respect for "sovereignty". The Arab quartet has demanded Qatar end its support of extremist groups, but also its support of Islamist political dissidents they brand as terrorists, but which many Western allies do not. Other demands include shutting down Qatar's flagship Al-Jazeera network, curbing ties with Iran and expelling Turkish troops stationed in Qatar.

Qatar has rejected the demands, saying that the list in its entirety infringes on national sovereignty. Qatar also rejects allegations it has supported terror groups. Despite the blockade by the four Arab countries, life has not been impacted significantly in Qatar. The government has stepped in to help pay additional costs of shipping and has looked to its allies, like Turkey, for

With Qatar holding firm to its position, a top Emirati diplomat cautioned that the diplomatic standoff could be prolonged. "We are heading toward a long estrangement," UAE Minister of State for Foreign Relations Anwar Al-Gargash wrote on Twitter. "The reality is we are far from a political solution that changes Qatar's course. In light of that, nothing will change and we must look to a different mode in relations," he added.

Earlier in the week, US Secretary of State Rex Tillerson was in the Gulf, meeting separately with officials in Qatar, Saudi Arabia and Kuwait, which is trying to mediate the dispute. In Qatar, he secured an agreement to enhance cooperation on combatting terrorism and terror financing. Saudi commentators criticized the result of Tillerson's visit to Qatar, saying the signed counterterrorism agreement fell far short of the demands made for Qatar to change its policy of supporting Islamists. Tillerson, however, said the discussions had been "helpful" and that the US planned to keep at it.

Qatar's Foreign Minister told reporters in Turkey on Friday that it would be unfair to describe Tillerson's visit to the Gulf as a failure, insisting that the crisis "cannot be solved in a day". Qatar hosts Al-Udeid Air Base, the largest US military installation in the Middle East and hub for US-led operations against the Islamic State group in Iraq and Syria. Saudi Arabia, the UAE and Qatar are among the world's biggest military spenders, purchasing billions of dollars in equipment from the US and Europe to beef up their militaries. All three are considered allies of many Western nations.

Meanwhile, in Washington, Qatar attended an international meeting on countering Islamic State group financing on Friday. After the meeting, Qatar said a united front is required. "We must not be distracted from our campaign to root out ISIS and cut off their flow of funds," said a statement distributed by Qatar's government communication office, referring to the IS group using a different acronym. The Arab quartet, however, view Qatar's policies in the region as a bigger and more immediate threat. — Agencies





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
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BONUCCI BIDS JUVETUS FAREWELL AFTER MILAN MOVE

ROME: Italy international defender Leonardo Bonucci took out a page in a local newspaper yesterday to thank Juventus fans for their support after agreeing a shock move to rivals AC Milan. Bonucci, 30, is joining Milan on a five-year deal after seven seasons in Turin, where he won six successive Serie A titles with Juventus and played in two Champions

League finals. "Seven seasons have gone by. Seven seasons of victories, of dreams achieved, of maturity gained thanks to this exceptional bond with Juve," Bonucci wrote in the Gazzetta dello Sport daily. "I truly always gave everything until the end. I have received, given and learned. And what I see today, looking back, is a splendid story worthy of ending in full respect and affection, without questioning anything I went through with the club, the captain, my colleagues and the fans," he added. Bonucci's arrival in Milan comes after heavy investment from the seven-time Europeans champions following the sale of the club by former Italian Prime Minister Silvio Berlusconi to a Chinese consortium in April. —AFP

LINFIELD TO INVESTIGATE CELTIC BOTTLE INCIDENT

BELFAST: Linfield will investigate a bottle-throwing incident involving Celtic striker Leigh Griffiths that occurred during the Scottish club's 2-0 win in Friday's Champions League second qualifying round. Scott Sinclair and Tom Rogic scored as Celtic won a hostile first-leg encounter at Windsor Park in Belfast, but Scotland international Griffiths was targeted by objects thrown from a section of the home crowd while taking a corner. The striker was booked after picking up a bottle thrown onto the pitch, a decision Celtic manager Brendan Rodgers branded as "strange" before saying he would seek further explanation from the officials. Linfield issued a statement after the match promising to punish anyone identified as being involved. "The club will be reviewing our own footage and investigating an incident that took place during the match where a number of objects were thrown on to the pitch. We are obviously very disappointed that a small number of people chose not to respect the club's wishes," the statement said. "Linfield FC strongly condemns these actions and will be taking all necessary steps to identify any individual who was engaged in this activity. —AFP

OLIVIER CLAIMS 1ST GOLD MEDAL AT AQUATICS WORLDS

BUDAPEST: Marc-Antoine Olivier of France claimed the first gold medal at the World Aquatics Championships yesterday by winning the men's 5-kilometer open water race. The 21-year-old Olivier, who won bronze in the 10K at the 2016 Olympics, finished the course in 54 minutes, 31.40 seconds, edging Italy's Mario Sanzullo by 0.70 seconds, to become the first French male world champion in open water swimming. Timothy Shuttleworth of Britain was 10.70 seconds behind Olivier for bronze. Defending champion Chad Ho of South Africa was 11th, 17.20 off the pace. The open water swimming is taking place at Balatonfured on Lake Balaton, some 130 kilometers (80 miles) southwest of Budapest. The women's 10K race takes place today, with the men's 10K on Tuesday. In Budapest, Svetlana Kolesnichenko of Russia won the women's solo technical title for the first gold medal in synchronized swimming - and her first in an individual event. Kolesnichenko already had 12 world golds in synchronized swimming. She beat Spain's Ona Carbonell, who joined three-time gold medalist Natalia Ishchenko on a record three medals in the solo technical routine.—AP

SUNWOLVES END HORROR YEAR WITH BLUES TONIC

TOKYO: Japan's Sunwolves stunned the Auckland Blues 48-21 yesterday to finish a second chastening Super Rugby season on a high note and silence their critics-at least for now. Boosted by a Timothy Lafaele hat-trick, the home side posted only their second win of the campaign, erasing a seven-point half-time deficit with a pulsating comeback as the New Zealanders faded badly in the blistering Tokyo heat.

The rampant Sunwolves, who won just one of 15 games in their 2016 debut season, scored eight tries to three against a bungling Blues side held scoreless in the second half.

Scores from James Parsons, Gerard Cowley-Tuioti and Michael Collins looked to have put the Blues in command before Keisuke Uchida capped a lightning attack to help keep the Sunwolves in touch at the break. But from the moment Ryohei Yamanaka chased down a clever Kotaro Matsushima kick to score after 53 minutes, it was all Sunwolves. Kaito Shigeno dived over, before Lafaele scored on a breakaway and completed his treble after charging down a Sam Nock kick close to the try line as the hosts capitalised on a Jerome Kaino sin-binning. Their tails up, the Sunwolves even forced a penalty try from a rolling maul and when Yoshitaka Tokunaga raced clear to score moments before the

buzzer, Sunwolves head coach Filo Tiatia wore a look of disbelief. "That's one of the best performances I've seen from this team," Tiatia told reporters. "We were resilient and competitive for the full 80 minutes. It just speaks volumes of the players."

Once Super Rugby powerhouses, the Blues ended their own lacklustre campaign with a record of seven wins, seven defeats and a draw-and became the first team from New Zealand to lose to the Sunwolves. "You can't take anything for granted in this competition," said Blues coach Tana Umaga.

"I've got to look at myself and the way I help prepare this team," he added. "It's probably symptomatic of our season. They just wanted it more. That's all down to attitude."

However, the Sunwolves barely improved on their 2016 record in the southern hemisphere's elite club competition. Last year's baptism of fire included a 92-17 mauling by the Cheetahs which prompted former Japan coach Eddie Jones to call the Sunwolves "embarrassing", while the team's Super Rugby future has become a topic of debate.

They opened their 2017 campaign with a crushing 83-17 home defeat by the Hurricanes and conceding 94 points to the Lions earlier this month further underlined their struggles.—AFP

HURRICANES END CRUSADERS' UNBEATEN RUN IN SUPER RUGBY

WELLINGTON: The Christchurch-based Crusaders lost 31-22 to the Hurricanes yesterday, forfeiting their unbeaten record in the final round of Super Rugby's regular season and likely surrendering the No. 1 seeding in playoffs which begin next weekend.

The seven-time champions needed to beat the Wellington-based Hurricanes for the second time this season to hold out the challenge of the Johannesburg-based Lions for first place and the top seeding which guarantees home advantage throughout the playoffs.

The Lions could claim that honor with a win over the Sharks in Durban later. The Crusaders appeared to have the match under control when they led 22-14 after 55 minutes. But lapses of discipline and defense allowed the Hurricanes to reclaim the lead with tries to winger Wes Goosen and flanker Vaea Fifita, then to seal the match with a late penalty to new All Black Jordie Barrett. The Hurricanes win lifted them into fifth place ahead of the Hamilton-based Chiefs who beat the ACT Brumbies 28-10 earlier on Saturday. That means the Hurricanes will face the Brumbies in Canberra in next weekend's quarterfinals while the Chiefs have the more difficult task of traveling to Cape Town to take on the Stormers. They beat the Stormers 60-21 in a quarterfinal in Cape Town last year. If the Lions beat the Sharks to take the top-seeding they will face the Sharks again in Johannesburg next weekend and the Crusaders will host the seventh-ranked Highlanders in Christchurch. If the Crusaders remain the No. 1 seeds, they will face the Sharks and the Lions will meet the Highlanders.

PENALTIES

The Crusaders appeared at times yesterday to have the measure of the defending champion Hurricanes. Winger Seta Tamanivalu scored two tries in the first 15 minutes to give them a 12-0 lead and they were still ahead 12-7 at halftime.

"We gave away too many penalties at key times and we had our chances but didn't convert them," Crusaders captain Matt Todd said. "You've got to take your chances in big matches like this and we didn't."

Hurricanes captain T.J. Perenara said the Crusaders remain the team to beat in the playoffs but he was pleased his team "put ourselves in a position to play for another championship." Earlier, fullback Damian McKenzie scored a try among 18 points as the Chiefs beat a secondstring ACT Brumbies lineup 28-10. The Chiefs held a narrow 13-10 lead at halftime but kept the Brumbies scoreless while adding two tries in the second half. "We were chasing the win and a

bonus point on top of that would have been outstanding for us heading into next weekend but that's just the way it goes," Chiefs captain Aaron Cruden said. "Bonus points have eluded us this year."

Japan's Sunwolves pulled off a remarkable turnaround by beating the Auckland-based Blues 48-21 only a week after a 52-15 loss to the Stormers and two weeks after their record 94-7 loss to the Lions. The Blues led 21-14 at halftime, mainly through an intercept try to fullback Michael Collins. But the Sunwolves scored six second-half tries, including a hat-trick to center Timothy Lafaele, to post only their second win of the season, the third in their history and their first over a New Zealand team.

The Blues visibly wilted in the second half as temperatures reached 42 Celsius (107 degrees Fahrenheit) in Tokyo. All Blacks flanker Jerome Kaino was sin-binned for a high tackle in the 57th minute and the Sunwolves scored two tries in his absence. Lafaele completed his hat-trick with tries in the 17th, 69th and 76th minutes.

At Perth, Western Australia, the Western Force beat the New South Wales Waratahs 40-11. The Force are one of two Australian teams - the Melbourne Rebels being the other - reportedly being considered for elimination from the 2018 competition. — AP

ONE-DAY CLASSICS SPECIALISTS SET TO SHINE AT TOUR

"The next stage is already tomorrow for Michael (Matthews) because there's going to be a sprint," he said after his victory. The race moves from the yellow jersey battle which raged on Friday to the green jersey one yesterday and a chance for Australian Matthews to make up some much needed ground.

German Marcel Kittel has dominated that competition so far on the back of five stage wins but Matthews has a chance of closing his 128-point deficit if he can make the most of the next three days over lumpy terrain. Saturday's 181.5km 14th stage begins in Blagnac, the hub of the European aeronautics industry, and ends in Rodez, known for its sheep tripe speciality. The bumpy run-in that crests two third category climbs before finishing on a steep 570-metre climb with a 9.7 percent average gradient will be

too tough for Kittel and the other specialist sprinters. But it's ideal territory for an all-rounder like Matthews and with 50 points on offer at the line to the winner, the Aussie Sunweb rider could start to make some inroads into Kittel's lead. But he'll have Olympic champion Greg Van Avermaet to contend with among others. Belgian Van Avermaet won a stage finish in Rodez two years ago, outsprinting world champion Peter Sagan in the process. Sagan would have been a favourite for Saturday's

stage but was kicked out of the race last week for elbowing British sprinter Mark Cavendish in a pacey finish.

With the overall contenders set to take something of a back seat, there will be a bun-fight to get in the day's breakaway as it has a great chance of going all the way. The sprinters' teams won't feel the need to chase, neither will the contenders' teams so it should be a large breakaway containing some top one-day classics specialists.

Van Avermaet and Matthews are certain to be amongst them. — AFP

RODGERS TAKES 2-STROKE LEAD IN JOHN DEERE CLASSIC

SILVIS: Patrick Rodgers shot a 7-under 64 on Friday to take a two-shot lead after the second round of the John Deere Classic. Rodgers had eight birdies and a bogey to finish at 13-under 129 at TPC Deere Run. Finishing on the front nine, he had five birdies in a seven-hole stretch before closing with a bogey on the par-4 ninth.

"It was nice to keep making birdies and keep the gas pedal down," Rodgers said. "It was tricky with some breeze, but I know 13 under is not going to win the golf tournament. So, I got to keep that same mindset for the next two rounds."

Bryson DeChambeau was second after a 65. Local favorite Zach Johnson, the 2012 winner, had a 67 to join Charles Howell III, the co-leader after the first round, at 10 under. Howell followed his opening 63 with a 69. Kevin Tway (63), Chesson Hadley (64), Chad Campbell (68) and J.J. Henry (64) were 9 under.

Tway had nine birdies in a 10-hole stretch en route to the best round of the day. Hadley is coming off a victory today in the Web.com Tour event in New York. Rodgers, the 25-year-old former Stanford star who is winless on the PGA Tour, has followed the formula that many players have used to win at TPC Deere Run - converting makeable birdies and largely avoiding mistakes.Rodgers also made his fair share of tough shots, notably chipping in from 50 feet on the par-3 third hole and holing a 50-foot birdie putt on the seventh hole. "I put together a really nice round. Was very much in control. Rolled in some nice putts and stayed very patient," Rodgers said.

DeChambeau, who was just above the FedEx Cup playoff cut line entering the weekend, survived a pair of early bogeys to grab second place.

Tway was struggling to stay above the cut line when he went on his birdie binge, making seven in a row at one point. But Tway's tee shot on his 17th hole found the rough and he was forced to settle for a bogey.

Tway's round, the best of his career, was highlighted by a 28-foot birdie putt on the forgiving third hole. "I was kind of hoping it would never stop," Tway said. "You've got to make a lot of birdies around here."

Hadley said after his bogey-free round that he felt like he was playing with "house money" after wrapping up a PGA Tour for next season card last week.

"I've been heading in the right direction for a while, and I think it kind of starts with your attitude,

how you think about and handle things," Hadley said. "So I kind of finally got that right, and then everything came together last week obviously."

First-round co-leader Ollie Schniederjans had a 74 to drop eight shots behind Rodgers. Two-time Masters champion Bubba Watson shot a 70 to make the cut at 3 under, as did Davis Love III (68). Three-time tournament winner Steve Stricker (67) made the cut on the number at 2 under.

Defending champion Ryan Moore shot a 71 and missed the cut, finishing at 3 over after two rounds. Moore missed the previous five weeks with a left shoulder injury. — AP

Undrafted Dylan Ennis drops 35 for Warriors in Vegas

LAS VEGAS: Dylan Ennis went undrafted last month, but the Oregon product was the recipient of "MVP" chants from the crowd in Las Vegas on Friday. Ennis was nearly unstoppable as he scored 35 points during the Golden State Warriors' 109-100 NBA Summer League victory over the Los Angeles Clippers.

"Being undrafted, you take it personal," Ennis told NBA TV. Teammates waved towels at the end of the game to cool down Ennis, whose career high at Oregon was 22 points. Ennis, who played for the Thunder in the Orlando Summer League before joining the Warriors in Las Vegas, poured in 23 points in 12 first-half minutes, including six of his eight 3-pointers. He previously had 21 points over five games in Las Vegas.

"Just don't think about it," Ennis said. "It touches your hand, you put it up and the rim looks like the ocean ... I'll probably never hear (the 'MVP' chants) again in my career." Ennis' 3-pointer with 1:11 remaining gave the Warriors a 105-97 lead that put the game away.

Bryce Alford, undrafted out of UCLA, finished with 16 points. Jaron Johnson scored 18 for the Clippers while 2016 first-round pick Brice Johnson and Jawun Evans had 17 apiece.



Matt Costello blocked a would-be dunk by Michael Young with 59.9 seconds remaining to seal the Timberwolves' comeback win over the Wizards. Costello, who was undrafted out of Michigan State in 2016 and played in the D-League, had a team-high 14 points and 11 rebounds. "Just trying to make winning plays," Costello said on NBA TV. "That's all it was. I know I'm not the best scorer in the world, so I have to make it up in other different areas." Charles Cooke scored 13, Perry Ellis added 12 and Marcus Paige finished with 11 for Minnesota,

JAZZ 97, BUCKS 76

Tony Bradley scored 19 points and the Jazz easily won their first game of the Las Vegas session after four straight losses. Bradley, Utah's No. 28 overall pick from North Carolina, added eight rebounds and two blocks in his best game of the summer. James Southerland scored 16 for the Jazz. Donovan Mitchell, the No. 13 pick who has dazzled this summer, did not play. Stephen Zimmerman, Gary Payton II and Travis Trice II led the Bucks with 12 apiece. The No. 17 overall pick from Michigan, D.J. Wilson, managed just eight on 3 for 10 shooting. Thon Maker, last year's No. 10 pick, sat out. —AP

BIG NAMES IN FIGHT FOR FORM GOING INTO BRITISH OPEN

SOUTHPORT: The last British Open at Royal Birkdale was won by a golfer from across the Irish Sea, something Rory McIlroy will hope is an omen ahead of this year's championship starting on the English links next

Thursday.

The 146th Open is the first to be held at the par-70 Birkdale, set amidst the sand dunes in Southport, near Liverpool in northwest England, since Padraig Harrington successfully defended the Claret Jug in 2008. McIlroy, who won his only Open to date not far away at Hoylake in 2014, is always one of the main focuses of attention ahead of a major but the Northern Irishman hardly comes into the tournament in his best form. He has missed the cut at three of the last five majors and also failed to make the weekend at the recent Irish Open.

"It's been a really frustrating year. Just hasn't really went the way I wanted it to," the world number four admitted in the wake of that disappointing showing. Of the venue, he added: "It all depends on the conditions, but I don't envisage myself hitting a lot of drivers at Birkdale. It's definitely a course where it dictates to you how you play."

McIlroy is far from the only big name with concerns about his game. World number one Dustin Johnson may be the bookmakers' favourite but the 33-year-old has not been at his best since a back injury forced him to miss the Masters-he returned to defend his US Open crown but promptly missed the cut. Jordan Spieth and secondranked Hideki Matsuyama of Japan are in better shape, while defending champion Henrik Stenson missed the cut at the season's first two majors.

Stenson beat Phil Mickelson in a thrilling shoot-out on the final day 12 months ago at Troon and is another who can read something into Harrington's triumph on the same links nine years ago.

That is the last time anyone retained the Claret Jug. Tiger Woods is the only other player to have achieved the feat in 30 years. With no one player now able to dominate the sport since the demise of Woods, the last nine majors have all been won by a different name, going back to Spieth's back-toback victories at the US Open and Masters in 2015. Indeed, the last seven majors have all been claimed by players who had never previously taken one of the sport's biggest prizes, including Brooks Koepka at last month's US Open and Stenson 12 months ago. "It's kind of like before and after having kids," said the Swede on how life changed for him after ending his major search.

Stenson has taken the trophy everywhere with him, including on a jet ski in Florida, but now he must reluctantly hand it back before trying to win it again, along with the \$1.845 million winner's cheque. "I haven't played my best golf this year. I've been quite busy off the course, and I'm sure that's impacted the performances to a degree. But at the same time, I don't feel like it's miles away," he added. Sergio Garciawho sported his Masters green jacket on a recent visit to Wimbledon-is another European star who recently ended his long search for a major, but history favours the Americans at Birkdale. Five of the nine previous Opens held here have seen an American lift the Claret Jug in front of the white Art Deco clubhouse, including Lee

Trevino and Arnold Palmer.

The latter won the first of his two Opens at Birkdale in 1961, and a plaque sits by the 16th fairway to commemorate a famous shot he hit out of a bush on his way to securing the title. — AFP

CHINA'S FENG EXTENDS US WOMEN'S OPEN LEAD

BEDMINSTER: China's Feng Shanshan shook off persistent rain and the commotion of a presidential visit on Friday to fire a two-under par 70 and stretch her US Women's Open lead to two strokes.

Feng had three birdies and a bogey for an eight-under par 36-hole total of 136. That was good enough for a two-stroke lead over South Korea's Lee Jeong-Eun6, Amy Yang and Choi Hye-Jin, who all shared second on 138.

Choi, a 17-year-old amateur, teed off on 10 and joined Feng atop the leaderboard after a burst of four straight birdies at 18, one, two and three. But she faded with bogeys at the seventh and eighth to join her compatriots on six-under.

Lee, last year's KLPGA Rookie of the Year playing her first tournament in the United States, set

an early target with a second straight 69 on a rainy morning at Trump National Golf Club. She birdied the second, took her lone bogey at the fifth but closed the front nine with a birdie and added back-to-back birdies at the 14th and 15th.

She was eventually joined by Choi and Yang, who went into the second round one stroke behind Feng and fired a second-round 71. Feng said she wasn't bothered by the sometimes heavy rain that fell through much of her round, and she didn't get too distracted to the arrival of US President Donald Trump, who has made his namesake club in Bedminster a frequent weekend retreat this summer.

Trump arrived in a motorcade fresh from a Bastille Day trip to Paris, and watched from an enclosed viewing area near the 15th green,

offering a few waves for cheering fans who eagerly snapped his picture.

"I heard people like kind of screaming, so that's what I was trying to find out, like why they were screaming," Feng said of the movement around the green, where marshals had to remind the gallery that play was continuing.

"But I was still really focusing on my game," Feng said. "I didn't really get distracted." Trump's visit marked the first time a sitting president has attended the US Women's Open, and the US Golf Association was unrepentantly welcoming despite the controversy sparked by Trump's controversial remarks about women during his presidential campaign.

While there were fears his visit would spark protests, fans at the course were supportive and players apparently unfazed. The morning rain-on the heels of Thursday thunderstorms that disrupted play and caused the first round to be carried over until Friday morning-was more of a challenge.

WELL-PREPARED

Feng coped admirably, playing her first 10 holes in even par, with one birdie and one bogey, before back-to-back birdies at the 11th and 12th. "I played probably the first nine holes in the rain, but my phone told me it was going to rain all afternoon and I was prepared," she said. "I really didn't pay attention to the weather and just concentrated on every shot." The rain-soaked course did play longer, Feng said, which she admitted "made me feel like I was older".

Among Feng's closest pursuers, Yang is seeking a first major title after 16 top-10 finishes. Lee-the '6' in her name distinguishing her from five other KLPGA players with the same name-is hoping to make a splash in her first US tournament. Choi, the second-ranked amateur in the world, is also hoping to stay in the hunt at the weekend for what would be a sensational major win. The trio sharing second were followed by another South Korean, with Bae Seon-Woo alone in fifth after a 69 for 139.

World number one Ryu So-Yeon carded an even par 72 to join four players sharing sixth on 140 that also included South Korean Chun In-Gee, Japan's Haru Nomura and Spain's Carlota Ciganda. —AFP

MAYWEATHER, MCGREGOR CLASH OVER RACISM DURING MEDIA TOUR

LONDON: Conor McGregor celebrated his 29th birthday by defending himself against accusations of racism during a media tour to promote his fight with Floyd Mayweather in London on Friday. The Irish mixed martial arts fighter went on the defensive at the fourth press conference in as many days with American Mayweather at the SSE Arena, Wembley. The pair meet in a light-middleweight boxing contest at the T-Mobile Arena in Las Vegas on August 26 in what could be boxing's richest ever fight. But the event has received some negative publicity since McGregor said to Mayweather at a press conference in Los Angeles on Tuesday, "Dance for me, boy". "If he feels disrespected he's an

idiot and **** him as well," McGregor told reporters at a press conference.

"I think it's ****ing ridiculous. I don't understand it. I know who I am as a person. Most realistic people can see that. He's trying to sway something by (saying I'm) disrespecting women."

Before going on stage in London, American Mayweather criticised McGregor for what he perceived were racists comments made by the Irishman. "Racism still exists," said Mayweather. "I've got a diverse team. It's all about treating people how you want to be treated. You have to give respect to give it back. "He totally disrespected black women, he called black people monkeys and he was disrespectful to my (13year-old) daughter.

"I'm not going to stoop that low to talk about his wife or child. There's certain levels and you don't stoop to or cross. I love everyone."

WIPEOUT

But Mayweather, 40, was just as guilty as McGregor in using insulting terms for women on Friday. Their latest trash-talking exchange was full of profanities and insults, just like the previous events in New York, Toronto and Los Angeles. Both claimed victory in the war of words.

"I smoked him in all four rounds," McGregor said. "In the first round, they set me up with no music or anything.

The **** you suit I wore went viral. Toronto was a wipeout, a 10-7 round, and New York was alright, and tonight I smoked him so it's 4-0, or 3-1 if you want to be generous."

But Mayweather, who has not fought since September 2015, believes he got the better of McGregor. "I'm the best at it, when it comes to trash talking," Mayweather said, "He's not able to push my buttons. He cannot out talk me. "There has been a lot of trash talkers (through his career) and at the end of the day, he's not bad.

"We will rate him number two, I'm number one. He's got heart. You need more guys to be more aggressive to each other, do more trash talking to

each other." By day four in London, some of the lines had already been heard, but not that the estimated crowd of 10,000 at the SSE Arena cared much. They lapped it up and cheered, but only for McGregor. Mayweather, a five-weight world boxing champion who knocked out Briton Ricky Hatton in 2007, was booed loudly by the fans, many of whom were Irish, and he could barely be heard.

The pair met on a makeshift stage, a boxing ring, in the middle of the venue. 'This is my first time in a boxing ring, and in six weeks I run boxing," said McGregor. "Four years ago I fought in front of 400 people. Now I get to quadruple my met worth for half a fight."—AFP

Late Puig homer lifts Dodgers over Marlins

MIAMI: Yasiel Puig hit his second homer of the game with two outs in the ninth inning Friday night, and the three-run shot helped the Los Angeles Dodgers beat the Miami Marlins 6-4 for their seventh consecutive Major League Baseball victory. Corey Seager also homered for the Dodgers (62-29), who were one strike from defeat three times before winning for the 27th time in the past 31 games. The Marlins led 4-3 when Joc Pederson singled on a 1-2 pitch with two outs in the ninth against A.J. Ramos (2-4). Pederson moved up on a wild pitch, Yasmani Grandal walked on a 3-2 pitch, and both runners advanced on another wild pitch. Puig fell behind 1-2 before pulling a 94 mph fastball into the home run sculpture. It was his 18th homer this year, and the second blown save by Ramos. Josh Fields (5-0) worked a perfect eighth, and Kenley Jansen followed with a 1-2-3 ninth for his 22nd save.

RED SOX 5, YANKEES 4

Aroldis Chapman walked home the winning run without getting an out in the ninth inning, handing Boston a victory over New York. Chapman (2-1) gave up two runs in the ninth for his third blown save. New York entered tied for the major league lead with 17 blown saves. Mookie Betts and Dustin Pedroia started the rally with consecutive singles and a successful double steal. Betts scored when second baseman Ronald Torreyes booted Xander Bogaerts' grounder. After an intentional walk to Hanley Ramirez, Chapman walked Andrew Benintendi on five pitches to bring home Pedroia. Robby Scott (1-1) got the win for the Red Sox, who got their first victory over the Yankees at home this season. It was Boston's first game-ending walk since Sept. 23, 2000, against Baltimore.

CUBS 9, ORIOLES 8

Addison Russell hit a go-ahead solo homer in the ninth inning as Chicago edged Baltimore after squandering an eight-run lead. Baltimore's Mark Trumbo tied the game at 8 with a two-run homer off Chicago's Japanese reliever Koji Uehara (3-4) in the eighth. Russell responded when he hit a first-pitch fastball from Brad Brach (2-2) over the left field fence. Wade Davis picked up his 17th save. Willson Contreras and Kyle Schwarber hit back-to-back homers in a four-run first inning for the Cubs. Ben Zobrist also homered onto the flag court behind the right field scoreboard, and Jason Heyward reached Eutaw Street with another towering shot. Chicago improved to 3-6 in interleague play after going 15-5 against the AL last season. Welington Castillo homered for the Orioles,

who left 10 runners on base. Kevin Gausman tied a career high by allowing eight runs and seven hits over three innings. He also gave up

Jedd Gyorko hit a two-run homer in the first inning, but St. Louis was limited to just four hits the rest of the way against Gerrit Cole and three relievers.

METS 14, ROCKIES 2

Jacob deGrom came out dealing once again, striking out 11 and winning his sixth straight start as New York began what could be a last-chance homestand by routing Colorado. Michael Conforto and T.J. Rivera homered, Yoenis Cespedes got four hits and deGrom contributed two singles for the Mets, who trail Colorado by 9 1/2 games for the second NL wild card. The Rockies posted their best record ever before the All-Star break, but absorbed their most lopsided defeat of the season while losing for the 14th time in 19 games. Big-hitting Nolan Arenado exited a few innings early with a sore hip after slipping on the bases on a misty night. DeGrom (10-3), snubbed for the All-Star team, gave up four hits and one earned run in eight innings. He also fanned at least 10 for the seventh time this year. Jon Gray (2-1) was tagged for eight runs on nine hits and three walks in two-plus innings.

NATIONALS 5, REDS 0

Gio Gonzalez pitched four-hit ball into the ninth inning, and Bryce Harper extended his mid-July tear with a pair of homers to lead Washington over Cincinnati. Gonzalez (8-4) snapped his streak of three straight tough-luck losses. He allowed a double and three infield singles before leaving with one out in the ninth after his 113th pitch. Matt Albers gave up three singles, and Matt Grace escaped the bases-loaded threat for his first save. The Reds were shut out for the second time this season. Four of their seven hits were infield singles. Harper had a two-run shot and a solo homer off Tim Adleman (5-7) as the NL's top offense got right back in form after the All-Star break. Harper has 22 homers overall, four during his nine-game hitting streak.

BLUE JAYS 7, TIGERS 2

Aaron Sanchez pitched six strong innings for his first win of the season as Toronto beat Detroit. Steve Pearce and Jose Bautista homered for the Blue Jays, who won the opener of a 10-game road trip. Sanchez (1-2) allowed one unearned run and seven hits to win for the first time since beating Boston on Oct. 2. He struck out four. Justin Verlander (5-7) permitted only three hits, but needed 114 pitches to get through 5 1/3 innings. He gave up three runs, two earned.

MARINERS 4, WHITE SOX 2

Robinson Cano hit a three-run drive on his first swing since connecting for the winning homer in the All-Star Game, helping James Paxton and Seattle beat Chicago. Jean Segura added two hits and scored twice as the Mariners started a six-game trip with their third victory in four games. Paxton (8-3) struck out nine while pitching six effective innings in his third straight win. Cano, who went deep in the 10th inning of the American League's 2-1 victory Tuesday night in Miami, walked on four pitches in the first. He came up again with two on and one out in the third and drove the first pitch from James Shields (2-2) off the top of the wall in right-center for his 18th homer, giving the Mariners a 3-1 lead. The last-place White Sox have dropped five of six. It was Chicago's first game since it traded left-hander Jose Quintana to the crosstown Cubs on Thursday.

RANGERS 5, ROYALS 3

Adrian Beltre hit a three-run homer while pinch-hitter Mike Napoli had a go-ahead, tworun shot as Texas rallied to defeat Kansas City. Martin Perez (5-6) allowed eight hits and a walk over seven innings, but kept all that traffic to just three runs. Two of those came in the second, when Alcides Escobar homered. Beltre connected in the sixth off Royals starter Jason Hammel, who had just permitted back-to-back singles - the first hits off him all night. It was Beltre's 453rd homer, passing Carl Yastrzemski for 38th on the career list. The drive also gave Beltre 1,601 RBIs in 20 big league seasons. Napoli homered in the seventh off reliever Mike Minor (5-2). Matt Bush breezed through a perfect eighth and Alex Claudio handled the ninth for his second save, giving the Rangers their 10th straight win over Kansas City dating to last July. — AP

FROM REFUGEE CAMPS TO LORD'S, DIZZYING RISE OF AFGHAN CRICKET

KHURASAN REFUGEE CAMP: The in camps outside Pakistan's border city manicured emerald pitch at Lord's in London, where Afghanistan played for the first time ever Tuesday, is a world away from the border refugee camps where the country found its love for

In dusty Pakistani camps like Khurasan, young barefoot cricketers have no pitch, no kit, no wickets, no helmets, no gloves and no shade-only the hunger that helped catapult Afghanistan into the elite group of Test nations last month.

of Peshawar, where they have been exposed to the cricketing fever that has gripped their neighbouring nation since Britain colonised the sub-continent centuries ago. "We learned cricket here and we took this cricket with us to Afghanistan, and now Afghanistan has a team which plays on a world level and the entire world has recognised it," 35-year-old Abdul Wahid, a refugee from Kunar province, tells AFP.

He and a generation of Afghans Millions of Afghans fleeing war spent years cheering for the Pakistani have sought refuge for nearly 40 years team before daring to dream of more.

Wahid, who missed out on a spot in the national team but now coaches refugees, says his contemporaries in the camps learned to play with tennis balls. The best of them would go on to join academies in Peshawar, where they encountered the hard cricket ball for the first time. Faridullah Shah, a coach with the Pakistan Cricket Board, remembers the fierce determination of the Afghan players who reached the academies. "They used to work as labourers until the afternoon and were later playing cricket here... The team of Afghan players was named the 'Team of Chickens'" as many were trying to

survive by supplying poultry in Peshawar, he says. They worried about how to afford kit but played every day, Shah recalls. "They had extreme eagerness-more than our players-and that was the reason for their success."

SURVIVING ON BISCUITS

At the Islamia Cricket Academy, selector Qazi Shafiq, a former first class player, agrees. "Afghans are quick learners-if you pinpoint a mistake, he understands ... then he will work hard on that," Shafiq says.

"I will not mention his name but

one Afghan national player told me that he had to borrow money to reach here... and then he could only afford a 10-rupee (10-cent) packet of biscuits a day on which to survive." Asghar Khan, a coach and twice the president of the Peshawar district cricket association, remembers Afghan players as "the beauty of tournaments here".

He rattles off a list of names, from Mohammad Nabi-whom Khan praises for his "long, long sixes"-up to Asghar Stanikzai, captain of the Afghan cricket team. All learned in Peshawar, Khan says, with many like Shapoor Zadran beginning in the refugee camps.—AFP

CREMER'S STRIKES RATTLE SRI LANKA ON DAY 2

COLOMBO: Zimbabwe skipper Graeme Cremer claimed three wickets to dent Sri Lanka's first innings reply on the second day of the one-off Test in Colombo yesterday. Cremer's leg-spin and two crucial run outs left Sri Lanka reeling at 293-7 at stumps. Asela Gunaratne (24) and Rangana Herath (5) were at the crease with the hosts still trailing Zimbabwe by 63 runs.

Gunaratne, who came down the batting order at number eight after sustaining a hamstring injury while fielding, put up sturdy resistence in the final few overs of the day. "The wicket has got drier and the legspinner (Cremer) is taking lot of turn. We have to bat well and we need to make sure that we get to 350," said Herath, who had taken five wickets to help dismiss Zimbabwe for 356. "We had a good start, but they fought back well. We are still behind by 63 runs and we need to knock off that deficit," Herath told reporters. Zimbabwe coach Heath Streak believes the visitors are in a "nice position", adding that anything between 250 and 280 would be a tough fourth-innings chase on this pitch.

"Any sort of lead is going to be very valuable on this track. It's going to be an interesting day's play tomorrow. Hopefully we can pick up those wickets quickly," Streak said. Top Sri Lankan batsmen faltered against Cremer's wily wrist spinners including captain Dinesh Chandimal falling to his opposite number after a well-made 55. Chandimal's wicket ended a 96-run stand for the fourth wicket with Angelo Mathews (41), who quit the captaincy this week after Sri Lanka's loss in the one-day series against Zimbabwe.

Cremer, who had got Kusal Mendis caught behind for 11 before tea, struck twice in the final session of play to put the hosts in trouble at 238-6. Dilruwan Perera, who made a gritty 33 with 2 fours and as many sixes, was run out after hesitating on a single with his hamstrung partner Gunaratne. Another unlucky run out early in the innings saw the back of opening batsman Upul Tharanga, who gave Sri Lanka a solid start with his brisk 71. Tharanga fell short of his crease while backing up to a straight drive by Chandimal as the ball grazed past the fingers of paceman Donald Tiripano. Tiripano's lucky fielding effort came after he got Zimbabwe's first breakthrough in Dimuth Karunaratne (25) in his first over after lunch, ending an 84-run opening partnership. Earlier the Zimbabwe innings lasted just 4.4 overs of the morning session, adding only 12 runs to their overnight score. Batsman Craig Ervine topscored with 160. Left-arm spinner Herath returned with an impressive 5-116, his 30th five-wicket haul in 81 Tests. — AFP

TURKISH SIDES DIG DEEP IN QUEST FOR FOREIGN STARS

ISTANBUL: Another day in this summer's transfer window and another foreign star arrives at Istanbul airport to sign for a Turkish top-flight side, met by a raucous reception from hundreds of local fans.

Looking slightly bewildered and not understanding a word of the sometimes bawdy Turkish football chants, the player brandishes a club scarf, smiles politely and is whisked away in a luxury vehicle.

This scene has played out several times this summer as half a dozen foreign stars arrived in Istanbul to begin a new stage in their careers, attracted by massive clubs with a genuine history but, above all, multimillion euro annual wage packages.

In order to attract the very best, the Turkish sides are digging deep into their pockets, straining their own financial positions, economists say. The big name arrivals this summer have included France's Mathieu Valbuena (Lyon to Fenerbahce), his international teammate Bafetimbi Gomis (Swansea to Galatasaray) and Portugal's Euro 2016 winner Pepe (Real Madrid to Besiktas).

They will join a Super Lig already stacked with big names including Robin van Persie at Fenerbahce and Samuel Eto'o at Antalyaspor.

Those arriving are generally in the final stage-but not end-of their careers and playing in Turkey offers the chance of performing for prestigious clubs who have places in European competition.

But no-one can also deny that the salary packages are mouth-wateringly attractive. Pepe, 34, will over the next two years receive a total net wage of 9.5 million euros (\$10.8 million), excluding bonuses. Gomis will get 3.35 million euros per season.

Signing the big foreign players brings prestige and ramps up the clubs' image. Clubs want to turn the page on the dark days of the 2011 match-fixing scandal while ground attendance has been falling at just an 10,000 per game average last year. The domestic game is increasingly competitive and clubs dream of finding the great player who will propel them to European glory.

The only time a Turkish side won a European competition was when Galatasaray defeated Arsenal in the 2000 UEFA Cup final.

And the traditional Istanbul big three-Besiktas, Fenerbahce and Galatasaray-no longer have the field to themselves.

Last season's surprise runners-up were Basaksehir of Istanbul who have signed former Manchester City player Gael Clichy. Another big spending side is Antalyaspor whose captain is the famously high-earning former Barcelona and Chelsea star Eto'o.

But the enticing packages offered to foreign players come at a price. Tugrul Aksar, a specialist in the economics of Turkish football, told AFP the current total revenue of Turkish clubs amounts to four billion lira (one billion euros) but their spending is up to six billion lira.

"It's a very serious shortfall," he said, saying clubs were drawing on future revenues. He said while the Turkish Super Lig is the

number six competition in Europe in terms of revenue "it is a championship that spends more than it earns".

In a sign of the tightrope that the clubs walk, Galatasaray were in March 2016 banned from European competition for one year for breaching spending rules that impose limits on the levels of annual losses. As a result, the Lions lost their place in the 2016-2017 Europa League.

'PART OF TURKISH NATIONALISM'

Clubs sometimes have enjoyed having their fiscal debts cleared by the government, with the game seen in the country as a matter of national prestige.

"The state is always going to be there to support the Turkish clubs," said Daghan Irak of the University of Strasbourg. "In Turkey, the big clubs will always survive whatever the difficulty is because they are there to represent Turkey in Europe.

"Playing against foreign clubs has been their raison d'etre since they were founded. Their existence is fused to Turkish nationalism," he added.

Along with their high wages, the foreign players themselves can enjoy becoming massive celebrities and the centre of attention in Turkey.—AFP

ROOT FALLS AS ENGLAND COLLAPSE IN SECOND TEST

NOTTINGHAM: South Africa captured the prize wicket of England captain Joe Root as they seized the initiative on the second day of the second Test at Trent Bridge yesterday. At tea, England were 184 for six in reply to South Africa's first innings 335 — still a deficit of 151 runs. Moeen Ali was 14 not out and Liam Dawson two not after Root in his second match as England captain, had fallen for a fine 78 on a day when batsmen on both sides struggled in the overcast conditions.

South Africa were without fast bowler Kagiso Rababa, suspended from this match after swearing at Ben Stokes during England's 211-run win in the first of the four-match series at Lord's last week. But after Morne Morkel removed Root, left-arm spinner Keshav Maharaj took two wickets for five runs in 11 balls, with Stokes out for a 12-ball duck

and dangerman Jonny Bairstow falling for 45. South Africa, 309 for six overnight, lost their last four wickets for 26 runs in 6.2 overs. James Anderson, England's all-time leading Test wickettaker, did the damage with a burst of four wickets for four runs in 16 balls. But England then slumped to three for two in reply. Former skipper Alastair Cook was caught behind for three when he got an inside edge to Vernon Philander's inswinger, although South Africa had to review Australian umpire Simon Fry's not out decision. Next ball, Cook's fellow left-handed opener Keaton Jennings fell for a duck. The South Africa-born batsman was undone by a brilliant Morkel delivery from around the wicket that cut away off the pitch and took an edge safely held by wicket-keeper Quinton de Kock-who played in the same Johannesburg school side as Jennings.

ROOT COUNTER-ATTACKS

Root, who made 190 in his first innings as England captain at Lord's, counter-attacked by hitting Philander for three fours in an over. And at lunch he and Yorkshire team-mate Gary Ballance, desperate to nail down his Test place after being recalled at Lord's, had taken England to 85 for two. Ballance, however, had added just one to his lunch score of 26 not out when the left-hander played on to Philander. The towering Morkel then had Root edging an intended drive and de Kock, diving in front of first slip, held an excellent catch. It was the end of Root's impressive 76-ball innings, featuring 12 fours, with England now 143 for four. De Kock was involved again when holding a juggling catch after Stokes inside-edged Maharaj onto this pad.

It took an age for Stokes to finally be given out as the umpires checked to see if the ball had made any contact with de Kock's helmet-which would have seen the wicket chalked off.

Ali got off the mark first ball with a slog-sweep four off Maharaj. But Maharaj bowled Bairstow with a ball that drifted in and then turned to hit off stump-a classic left-arm spinner's wicket. Before play started on Saturday, England persuaded the umpires to change what they believed to be an out of shape ball, with the floodlights already switched on.

It was a move that paid dividends just five balls into the day's play when, without another run added, Philander fell for his overnight 54, caught in the covers from a leading edge off Anderson. Trent Bridge is renowned for aiding swing bowlers such as the 34-year-old Anderson, whose overall return of five for 72 in 23.2 overs was the 22nd time he'd taken five or more wickets in a Test innings and his seventh such haul at the Nottingham ground. — AFP


Davies, who is the first player this tournament to reach three goals, did not start Friday due to an ankle problem but he was inserted into the lineup by head coach Octavio Zambrano.

MUGURUZA STUNS VENUS TO WIN FIRST WIMBLEDON

LONDON: Garbine Muguruza stormed to her first Wimbledon title and shattered Venus Williams' history bid with a majestic 7-5, 6-0 victory in yesterday's final. Muguruza overwhelmed Williams with a supreme display of power hitting in 77 minutes on Centre Court to become only the second Spanish woman to win Wimbledon.

Watched from the Royal Box by King Juan Carlos of Spain, the 23-year-old finally got her hands on the Venus Rosewater Dish two years after losing to the American's sister Serena in her maiden Wimbledon final. Fittingly, it was Muguruza's current coach Conchita Martinez who was the first woman to raise the Spanish flag at Wimbledon in 1994 when she defeated Martina Navratilova.

Venezuela-born Muguruza's second Grand

Slam title, following her French Open triumph last year, denied Williams, 37, in her attempt to become the oldest Wimbledon champion in the Open era.

Back in the Wimbledon final after an eightyear absence, Williams had hoped to clinch a sixth All England title, nine years after she last lifted the trophy. Instead, she paid the price for a surprisingly nerve-ridden display that condemned her to a second Grand Slam disappointment this year following her Australian Open final loss against Serena.

Since winning her maiden Grand Slam title in Paris, Muguruza had endured something of a sophomore slump as her ranking dropped out of the top 10. But she has rediscovered her mojo on grass and will climb to fifth when the new rankings are confirmed next week.

Remarkably, of her four tour-level titles, two are now Grand Slams. With persistent drizzle blanketing the All England Club, Williams and Muguruza were competing in the first Wimbledon final to begin under the roof, watched by a sell-out crowd including

Hollywood actress Hilary Swank. Twenty years ago, Venus admitted she was a bundle of nerves when she made a losing Wimbledon debut against Magdalena Grzybowska and, in her ninth All England Club final, once again there was anxiety coursing through the American's error-strewn display.

BARRAGE

Fortified by a cross-court winner to bring up break point at 3-2, Williams looked poised to seize control, but instead a tame forehand

into the net to let Muguruza off the hook. It was the first of a series of vital escapes for

Muguruza, who was matching Venus blow for blow in a series of bruising baseline rallies. Gifted two set point at 4-5, Venus couldn't deliver the knockout blow and Muguruza over-powered her in a gripping rally to save the first before scrambling out of trouble on

the second. Muguruza had the momentum

now, her piercing ground-strokes gradually moving Williams into enough awkward areas to land the crucial first break at 5-5. Williams was rattled by Muguruza's barrage, fatally allowing the Spaniard's lob to drop in and present her with set points that she gleefully gobbled up. Muguruza was just

six when Venus first won Wimbledon and the

23-year-old's third major final appearance was

dwarfed by Williams' 16 Grand Slam title matches.

But in all those finals, only Serena had produced the lethal power and poise Muguruza was showing and suddenly Williams was beginning to look her age. Still reeling from the shock of losing the first set, she served up a limp double fault on break point to hand Muguruza the lead at the start of the second set. Williams was shattered and Muguruza went for the kill so ruthlessly that in the blink of an eye she had broken twice more to take a 5-0 lead. Muguruza had spoken eloquently this week of etching her name onto the Wimbledon honours board alongside Venus, Serena and the other All England Club icons. It took one last blizzard of thunderous winners to ensure her dream would come true. — AFP

ARSENAL SCORE THREE GOALS IN FINAL AUSTRALIAN TOUR WIN

SYDNEY: Arsenal wrapped up their Australian tour with a 3-1 win over the Western Sydney Wanderers with all their goals coming in the first half in Sydney yesterday. The Gunners scored their goals in a 11minute period late in the first half through Olivier Giroud, Aaron Ramsey and Mohamed Elneny with Spanish defender Nacho Monreal standing out with two assists.

The English giants were held scoreless in the second half with the 2014 Asian Champion League winners pulling a goal back off an indirect free kick from Steven Lustica. Arsenal leave for China winning both games on their first tour to Australia in 40 years after beating A-League champions Sydney FC 2-0 on

"They made it quite physical for us, they pushed us a little bit and we played very well for long periods in the first half," Arsenal manager Arsene Wenger said. "The players who came on in the second half gave us more impetus and we finished strongly, unfortunately we couldn't score any more but overall it was a positive game."

The game drew 83,221 fans for a two-game total of 163,653 for Arsenal's visit. "The support out here is truly amazing, we probably didn't realise the amount of support we had out here in Australia, it's truly incredible," attacker Theo Walcott said.

Arsenal broke away with three goals late in the opening half after a competitive opening. French striker Giroud made a sweet first-time finish at the near post after a strong overlapping run from Monreal in the 33rd minute and they were two-up a few min-


Monreal found Ramsey with a long ball and he lobbed goalkeeper Janjetovic on the edge of the box. The Gunners grabbed a third goal nearing half-time when Egyptian Elneny's long-range volley deflected off defender Brendan Hamill's leg past Janjetovic into the unguarded net.

Gunners' record signing Frenchman Alexandre Lacazette showcased his dazzling skills when he turned his marker and fired a shot at the keeper in the opening minutes. Elneny came close to a second goal when another long-range shot cannoned off the underside of the bar with Janjetovic beaten minutes after the resumption.

But the Wanderers stuck at it and Jack Clisby clipped the bar with a drive and Ramsey conceded a free kick with a back pass to substitute goalkeeper Emi Martinez. Lustica hammered the indirect free kick against Monreal on the goal-line and put the rebound into the roof of the net for his team's opener in the 57th minute.

Wenger substituted every outfield player after 66 minutes with Lacazette and Giroud among those to come off. The Gunners came close to adding to their tally in the final stages with Mesut Ozil and Eddie Nketiah hitting the post and Theo Walcott having a sharp chance saved by goalkeeper Janjetovic.

Arsenal now head to China for further games against Bayern Munich in Shanghai and Chelsea in Beijing. — AFP

CHINA'S ECONOMY SLOWS IN Q2

BEIJING'S GROWING DEBT TO TRIGGER ECONOMIC SHOCKS

BEIJING: China's economy lost momentum in the second quarter, a survey shows, as Beijing's efforts to curb risky lending and investment took a toll on the Asian powerhouse. The world's second-largest economy expanded by 6.8 percent in the April-June period, compared with a year ago, according to the median forecast of 12 analysts polled by AFP. That follows a better-than-expected increase of 6.9 percent in the first three months of the year.

The estimate comes ahead of the official release tomorrow of China's closely-watched GDP growth data for the second quarter. Debt-fuelled investment in infrastructure and real estate has underpinned China's growth for years but warnings of a potential financial crisis have spurred Beijing to clamp down. In the latest alert, Fitch Ratings on Friday said China's growing debt could trigger "economic and financial shocks" even as it maintained its A-plus rat-

ing on the country. That follows Moody's decision in May to downgrade China for the first time in almost three decades on concerns over its ballooning credit and slowing growth. Tighter restrictions on property purchases and bank lending will continue to weigh on the economy in the months ahead, said Larry Hu, head of China economics at Macquarie Group. "We expect GDP growth to trend down in the second half of 2017 on slowing property sales and tight liquidity," he said.

The economy is likely to face further headwinds as consumption also comes under pressure from slowing income growth, said Fan Zhang, senior China economist at RHB Bank. UBS chief China economist Tao Wang said "higher funding costs due to supervisory tightening" will impact fixed-asset investment-which measures spending on real estate, roads and bridges. But a sharp slowdown in the second half is

unlikely as policymakers prepare for an important Communist Party congress later this year that will likely make President Xi Jinping the most powerful leader in a generation. "It is therefore highly probable that authorities will use the resources and policy tools at their disposal to ensure a positive economic outcome," Citibank said. The government has trimmed its 2017 GDP growth target to around 6.5 percent, after it expanded by 6.7 percent in 2016 — its slowest rate in more than a quarter of a century. Despite growing concerns about China's financial risks, Premier Li Keqiang said last month that the country could reach this year's economic growth targets.

Last quarter's growth momentum had continued into the current one, he said, noting that traditional economic indicators such as power generation and consumption, and new business orders had increased "significantly".—AFP

WHITE HOUSE SAYS BUDGET DEFICIT TO HIGHER THIS YEAR

WASHINGTON: The White House says worsening tax revenues will cause the budget deficit to jump to \$702 billion this year. That's a \$99 billion spike from what was predicted less than two months ago. The report from the Office of Management and Budget comes on the heels of a rival Congressional Budget Office analysis that scuttled White House claims that its May budget, if implemented to the letter, would balance the federal ledger within 10 years. The OMB report doesn't repeat that claim and instead provides just two years of updated projections.

The White House budget office also says the deficit for the 2018 budget year that starts on Oct 1 will increase by \$149 billion to \$589 billion. But lawmakers are already

working on spending bills that promise to boost that number even higher by adding to Trump's Pentagon proposal and ignoring many of Trump's cuts to domestic programs. Last year's deficit registered \$585 billion. The White House kept the report to a bare-bones minimum and cast blame on "the failed policies of the previous administration."

"The rising near-term deficits underscore the critical need to restore fiscal discipline to the nation's finances," said White House budget director Mick Mulvaney. "Our nation must make substantial changes to the policies and spending priorities of the previous administration if our citizens are to be safe and prosperous in the future." In late May, Trump released a budget plan proposing jarring cuts to domestic programs and promising to balance the budget within a decade. But it relied on rosy predictions of economic growth to promise a slight surplus in 2027.

Trump's budget, however, left alone Social Security retirement benefits and Medicare, though House Republicans are poised next week to again propose cutting Medicare as they unveil their nonbinding budget outline. CBO says that Trump relied on far too optimistic predictions of economic growth and that Trump's rosy projections are the chief reason his budget doesn't balance as promised. Trump's budget predicts that the US economy will soon ramp up to annual growth in gross domestic product of 3 percent; CBO's long-term projections predict annual GDP growth averaging 1.9 percent.—AP

AFGHAN GIRLS ROBOTICS TEAM ARRIVES IN US JUST IN TIME

WASHINGTON: Twice rejected for US visas, an all-girls robotics team from Afghanistan arrived in Washington early Saturday after an extraordinary, last-minute intervention by President Donald Trump. The six-girl team and their chaperone completed their journey just after midnight from their hometown of Herat, Afghanistan, to enter their ball-sorting robot in the three-day high school competition starting Sunday in the US capital.

Awaiting them at the gate at Washington Dulles International Airport were a In the short time since their visa dilemma drew global attention, the girls' case has become a flashpoint in the debate about Trump's efforts to tighten entrance to the US, including from many majority-Muslim countries. Afghanistan isn't included in Trump's temporary travel ban, but critics have said the ban is emblematic of a broader effort to put a chill on Muslims entering the US. The girls' story has also renewed the focus on the longer-term US plans for aiding Afghanistan's future, as Trump's administration prepares a new military strategy that will include sending more troops to the country where the US has been fighting since 2001.

Defense Secretary Jim Mattis said Friday the strategy was moving forward but "not finalized yet." Trump's personal intervention earlier in the week using a rare "parole" mechanism to sidestep the visa system ended a dramatic saga in which the team twice traveled from their home in

western Afghanistan through largely Taliban-controlled territory to Kabul, where their visa applications were denied twice. The US won't say why the girls were rejected for visas, citing confidentiality.

But Mohib said that based on discussions with US officials, it appears the girls were rebuffed due to concerns they would not return to Afghanistan. It's a fate that has beset many Afghans seeking entry to the US in recent years as continuing violence and economic challenges lead many to seek asylum in America, or to travel through the US to Canada to try to resettle there. As their case gained attention, Trump intervened by asking National Security Council officials to find a way for them to travel, officials said.

Ultimately the State Department, which adjudicates visa applications, asked the Homeland Security Department to let them in on "parole," a temporary status used only in exceptional circumstances to let in someone who is otherwise ineligible to enter the country.

The US granted parole after determining that it constituted a "significant public benefit." Ambassador Alice Wells, the acting US special envoy for Afghanistan and Pakistan, downplayed concerns that the girls might use the parole to stay in the US

or go to Canada.

As she drove to the airport to greet the girls, she said by phone that they were proud to represent Afghanistan and "proud to return to be role models to others around them." —AP

Dow, S&P 500 end week AT RECORDS; DOLLAR TUMBLES

NEW YORK: Wall Street stocks finished at fresh records Friday following solid bank earnings, while the dollar retreated after lackluster US data raised questions about additional Federal Reserve rate hikes. The Dow and S&P 500 ended at fresh records in anticipation that teh positive bank results foreshadow a generally strong earnings period. The records, the third in a row for the Dow, capped a strong week for US stocks that some analysts attributed to commentary from Fed Chief Janet Yellen that was more dovish than expected.

Equity markets elsewhere were mixed, with London and Frankfurt down, Tokyo up and Paris flat. JPMorgan Chase, Citigroup and Wells Fargo all reported higher earnings than expected by Wall Street analysts, showing the benefits of higher US interest rates, despite a drop in revenue from trading divisions. However, share prices for all three banks fell, with JPMorgan losing 0.9 percent, Citigroup 0.4 percent and Wells Fargo 1.1 percent.

The fact that the banks started off the earnings season with very good earnings will bode well," said Bill Lynch, director of investment at Hinsdale Associates. "Most strategists expect the season to be a good one with earnings going up at least six percent, maybe as much as nine percent." On foreign exchanges, the dollar struggled after disappointing US inflation and retail sales data for June, falling against the pound and the euro. "The morning's data, particularly the cooler than expected CPI figures, seem to justify Fed Chair Janet Yellen's more cautious tone this week in her Congressional testimony," said Omer Esiner, analyst at Commonwealth Foreign Exchange.

"The lack of meaningful evidence of a strong rebound in the economy in the second half of this year could continue to keep the dollar pressured." Oil prices rose for the fifth straight day amid signs of greater balance between supply and demand.—AFP

EASYJET LAUNCHES PLANS FOR POST-BREXIT BASE IN AUSTRIA

LONDON: British low-cost airline EasyJet charted a course on Friday to keep flying unhindered across the European Union after Brexit. The carrier, which is based in Luton, north of the British capital, said in a statement that it will create a new division, EasyJet Europe, which will be based in the Austrian capital, Vienna. EasyJet, which will retain its Luton headquarters, added that it has applied for a new air operator's certificate (AOC) in Austria to continue flying across Europe regardless of the final Brexit deal between Brussels and London.

The accreditation process is "now well advanced" and it should be concluded "in the near future", the company said. The application "will allow EasyJet to establish a new airline, EasyJet Europe, which will be headquartered in Vienna and will enable EasyJet to continue to operate flights both across Europe and domestically within European countries after the UK has left the EU", the no-frills carrier added. EasyJet Europe will become the group's third airline division after EasyJet in Luton and EasyJet Switzerland in Geneva.

Vienna was picked because EasyJet had concluded that its airline regulator was "the best fit" for the firm. The switch will create jobs in Austria, while no positions would be lost in Britain. "While the new structure will protect all of EasyJet's current flying rights within Europe,

EasyJet will continue to push for the UK and EU to reach an aviation agreement which, at a minimum, will enable flights between the UK and EU," the statement added. Austrian Chancellor Christian Kern hailed the announcement as "tremendous news for Austria."

Investors, however, shrugged off the news, with the share price edging around 0.1 percent higher to 1,410 pence compared with the closing level on Thursday. Soon after Britain voted in a referendum a year ago in favour of exiting the EU, EasyJet applied for a European Union license to keep flying throughout the bloc. Britain's airline industry has soared over the last two decades under the Single European Sky system, which lifted trade restrictions on EU airlines.

Unless British negotiators manage to secure preferential conditions, British airlines could lose this status once the country leaves the EU. This will mean they no longer enjoy rights including being able to freely set airfares, and to launch any route in Europe without getting prior authorization.

Passengers leaving or arriving in the United Kingdom will face new taxes and British airlines face obstacles and delays in developing new

SINGAPORE: A Chinese consortium on Friday offered more than \$11 billion for Singapore's Global Logistic Properties Ltd, which provides warehouses for the likes of Amazon China and WalMart, as ecommerce drives demand for logistics space. In filings with the Singapore Exchange, both firms said they were "pleased to announce the proposed acquisition" after GLP selected Nesta Investment Holdings as its preferred bidder.

Under the deal, Nesta would buy GLP shares at Sg\$3.38 apiece, valuing the company at around Sg\$16 billion (\$11.6 billion). Data compiled by Bloomberg showed the deal will be the biggest private equity buyout of an Asian company by enterprise value. It would

be the second-largest logistics deal this year after China Investment Corp agreed to acquire Blackstone Group LP's European logistics business for 12.25 billion euros (\$13.8 billion) in June, Bloomberg said.

GLP-of which Singapore sovereign wealth fund GIC is the biggest shareholder with an almost 37 percent stake-owns and manages a portfolio of modern logistics facilities in China, Japan, the United States and Brazil. It counts Amazon China, WalMart, Adidas, FedEx and DHL among its clients. It is also one of the world's largest real estate fund managers with assets under management of around \$39 bil-

lion, filings with the Singapore stock exchange said. The growth of websites such as Amazon and

US BANKS REPORT SOLID EARNINGS AS JPMORGAN CEO BLASTS WASHINGTON

NEW YORK: Credit cards were a strength and trading revenues a weakness in the solid US bank earnings released Friday, as JPMorgan Chase chief executive Jamie Dimon erupted in frustration at political gridlock in Washington. JPMorgan Chase, Wells Fargo and Citigroup all reported betterthan-expected earnings, and bank executives described US economic growth as solid, if unspectacular, as moves by the US Federal Reserve to lift interest rates have enabled banks to charge more for loans.

Yet Friday's deluge of results, the unofficial start of the second-quarter corporate earnings period, drew a lackluster reaction from Wall Street, with shares of all three banks falling after the reports. At JPMorgan, the biggest US bank by assets, second-quarter net Net revenues climbed 4.7 percent to \$26.4 billion. Key factors behind the earnings jump included higher net interest income due to the rising interest rate environment, as well as higher overall loans, often seen as a proxy of economic activity of firms and households.

But JPMorgan's trading divisions suffered compared with the year-ago period, with the bank citing "sustained low volatility." Analysts also were disappointed by a \$500 million cut to JPMorgan's 2017 projection for growth of net interest income to \$4 billion, implying it sees weaker loan growth in the second half of 2017, due in part to the Fed's policy of only raising interest rates gradually. "We're looking at a slower rise in interest rates in general and that speaks to Fed funds rate policy,"

income rose 13.4 percent to \$7.0 billion. said CFRA analyst Ken Leon. "I believe you're not going to see significant contributions of net interest income from rising rates until 2018 and 2019."

Dimon blasts Washington

JPMorgan chief executive Jamie Dimon also made waves with a colorful tirade against Washington gridlock that he blames for blocking progress on tax reform and other growth measures needed to boost the economy. Dimon, who is a member of President Donald Trump's business advisory council, warned the US will have trouble accelerating growth from its current 1.5 to 2.0 percent trend if it fails to come together in favor of pro-business policies.

"It's almost an embarrassment to be an American citizen traveling around the world and listening to the stupid shit we have to deal with in this country," Dimon told analysts on a conference call, "It's not a Republican issue, it's not a Democratic issue and it doesn't matter who the pilot is." Dimon's remarks come amid lagging progress on President Donald Trump's economic agenda, with the outlook highly uncertain for a Republican health care law that has been seen as important to tax

Citigroup chief financial officer John Gerspach expressed cautious optimism about the outlook for pro-growth measures from Washington. "The hope is still there," Gerspach said in a conference call with reporters. "Obviously it's taken a little bit longer than anybody would want." Citigroup's net income came in at \$3.9 billion, down 3.2 percent from the year-ago period, but better than analysts expected. Revenues rose two percent to \$17.9 billion, with revenues from Citi-branded credit cards jumping 10 percent following a venture with Costco Wholesale.

Citigroup cited higher cost of credit and operating expenses as factors behind the drop in profit. It also said its trading revenues were dented by an unfavorable comparison with the yearago period, when Brexit-related trading boosted volumes. Wells Fargo's net income rose 4.5 percent from the yearago period to \$5.8 billion. Revenues of \$22.2 billion were essentially flat compared with the year-ago period. Net interest income rose, but overall loans were essentially unchanged compared with the year-ago period. One factor was a decline in auto loans due to tighter underwriting standards.—AFP

AIRBNB HOST FINED OVER CANCELLING RESERVATION

LOS ANGELES: An Airbnb host who cancelled a reservation and told the guest, "One word says it all. Asian," has agreed to pay a \$5,000 fine and attend a college course in Asian-American studies, officials with the California Department of Fair Employment and Housing said Thursday. The guest, Dyne Suh, had booked the home as part of a ski trip with her fiancÈ and friends in Big Bear in February. When she was close to the house, Suh messaged host Tami Barker through the Airbnb app, but the host cancelled the reservation after a dispute over additional guests.

Barker told Suh in a series of messages at she wouldn't rent to her if she were the last person on Earth. "One word says it all. Asian," one of the messages said. When Suh told Barker that she would complain to Airbnb, Barker wrote, "It's why we have Trump ... I will not allow this country to be told what to do by foreigners." Suh, who posted an emotional video about the incident on YouTube, has said she'd agreed to pay \$250 per night to rent the home and later asked Barker if two other friends

could also stay at the house, which Barker agreed to.

Suh sent Barker screenshots of text messages where she agreed to the additional guests, but Barker cancelled the reservation. As part of an agreement with state officials, Barker also agreed to personally apologize to Suh and perform community service at a civil rights organization. A message left at a number listed for Barker was not immediately returned. Her attorney, Edward Lee, said his client was "regretful for her impetuous actions and comments" and is pleased to have resolved the matter.

Sub said in a statement posted on Facebook that she was pleased the settlement included Barker's agreement to attend an Asian-American studies course and hoped the settlement would encourage others to report discrimination. CUBA SAYS GDP RECOVERS, UP ABOUT 1 PERCENT IN 2017

HAVANA: The Cuban government said Friday that the economy is growing again following a decline last year that was the first drop reported in two decades. Economy Minister Ricardo Cabrisas said at the opening session of the National Assembly that Cuba's GDP grew just over 1 percent in the first six months of 2017 and is on track to hit an estimated 2 percent for the full year. The rebound came despite the economic crisis in Venezuela, which provides oil and other support to the island.

The government said Cuba's economy shrank last year by 1 percent amid falling help from Venezuela, which is struggling with triple-digit inflation and widespread shortages of food and other basic goods. The decrease was the first reported by Cuba in vears. Cuban media quoted Cabrisas as telling the assembly that instability in the supply of Venezuelan oil weighs on the country's economy but tourism, construction, transportation and communications are all growing.

Foreign media were not allowed to attend the session, which was presided over by President Raul Castro. Some growth in tourism is due to the normalization of relations with the U.S. that was started by President Barack Obama and is now threatened under President Donald Trump.—AP

UBER, LYFT TAKE DOWN NOT JUST CAB DRIVERS, BUT ALSO LENDERS

NEW YORK: Ride-hailing apps such as Uber and Lyft have been so disruptive to New York City's taxi industry, they are causing lenders to fail. Three New Yorkbased credit unions that specialized in loaning money against taxi cab medallions, the hard-toget licenses that allow the city's traditional cab fleet to operate, have been placed into conservatorship as the value of those medallions has plummeted. Just three years ago, cab owners and investors were paying as much as \$1.3 million for a medallion.

Now they are worth less than half that, and some medallion owners owe more on their loans than the medallions are worth. "You've got borrowers who are under water. This is just like the subprime loan crisis," said Keith Leggett, a credit union analyst and former senior economist at American Bankers Association. LOMTO Federal Credit Union, which was founded by taxi drivers in 1936 for mutual assistance, was placed into conservatorship by the National Credit Union Administration on June 26 "because of unsafe and unsound

New York City has the nation's largest taxi industry, with more than 13,000 medallions. Marcelino Hervias bought his medallion in 1990 for about \$120,000 and thought its value would hit \$2 million by the time he was ready to retire. Instead, the 58-year-old said he owes \$541,000 and is driving 12 to 16 hours a day to make ends meet. "I celebrate my kids' birthdays over the phone. Why?" Hervias said. While some medallions are held by large owners with fleets, owning a single medallion was long seen as a ticket to the middle class for immigrants like

Hervias, who is from Peru. Many of them now owe more on their medallion loans than they originally paid for the medallions because they used their equity in the medallion for a home, a child's education or other expenses. Hervias said he borrowed against his medallion to pay for medical care for his mother, a new car and a visit to his homeland. "Every time we want to go on vacation or do something, where do we go? To the equity of the medallion," he said. Other medallion owners tell similar stories.

Constant Granvil bought his medallion for \$102,000 in 1987 and said he now owes more

than \$300,000 to his lender. He could have sold the medallion for two or three times that a few years ago, "but I said no, I'm not going to sell it," said Granvil, who is 76. "And then I got caught." The value of Granvil's medallion is hard to pinpoint because 2017 sale prices have varied from the \$200,000s to the \$500,000s depending on whether lenders are willing to finance the purchase.

Meanwhile, Granvil, who no longer drives because of poor health and uses a broker to hire a driver, said he is facing threats from the lender, Melrose Credit Union, to foreclose on not just his medallion, but also his house. "How am I going to live?"

he said. "And now Melrose wants to take my house?"The New York State Department of Financial Services took possession of Melrose Credit Union in February and appointed the NCUA as conservator.

Critics say the federal agency is playing hardball with medallion owners like Granvil, who have been making their payments, by demanding that they pay off their loans in full or face foreclosure. "They're approaching it with this cookie-cutter idea," said David Beier, head of the Committee for Taxi Safety, an association of taxi leasing agents. "They want you to mortgage your house to them as collateral. It's forcing borrowers into bankruptcy." John Fairbanks, a spokesman for the NCUA, said

that the agency has hired a management team to run Melrose and that it would be inappropriate to comment on the management team's actions.

Supporters of the yellow cab industry have sued and pushed for city legislation to try to level the playing field between taxis and ride-hailing apps, which they say enjoy advantages like not paying a public transportation improvement surcharge that's levied on yellow cabs and not having to outfit a percentage of cars with disabled-access features. City Council member Ydanis Rodriguez, who chairs the council's transportation committee, called this week for a panel to investigate the fall in medallion values.

According to a Morgan Stanley report, there were 11.1 million yellow cab trips in the city in April 2016, compared with 4.7 million Uber trips and 750,000 Lyft trips. The 11.1 million taxi rides were 9 percent fewer than the April 2015 number. Some observers believe that the yellow cab's market share will continue to shrink and that the value of a medallion won't recover. "This is a commodity that has been fundamentally disrupted," said Leggett, who has written about medallion loans in his online newsletter Credit Union Watch. "I don't see the value of the medallions getting close to what they were."—AP

US MOVES TO SEIZE \$140M FROM NIGERIAN OIL CORRUPTION

WASHINGTON: US officials said Friday company, according to the Justice they plan to confiscate \$144 million in corruption-tainted assets of Nigerian oil executives found in the United States including an \$80 million yacht the "Galactica Star." The yacht and a \$50 million condominium overlooking New York's famed Central Park were among the riches tied to dirty contracts awarded by Nigeria's former oil minister between 2011 and 2015, the US Justice Department said statement.

'The United States is not a safe haven for the proceeds of corruption," acting Assistant Attorney General Kenneth Blanco said. "Corrupt foreign officials and business executives should make no mistake: if illicit funds are within the reach of the United States, we will seek to forfeit them and to return them to the victims from whom they were stolen." The assets were purchased using proceeds of oil sector contracts awarded by Nigeria's former minister for petroleum resources, Diezani Alison-Madueke, who oversaw the state oil Department.

Prosecutors allege she accepted bribes from oil executives Kolawole Akanni Aluko and Olajide Omokore, who spent millions of dollars buying and furnishing London-area homes with artwork, furniture and other luxury items acquired in Texas. The minister allegedly steered lucrative oil contracts to companies owned by Aluko and Omokore, which sold \$1.5 billion worth of Nigerian crude.

They then used shell corporations and intermediaries to launder the funds through US banks and buy the assets which the Justice Department is now seeking to seize. Under former President Barack Obama, the Justice Department in 2010 launched a "kleptocracy" initiative to recover the ill-gotten gains of corrupt foreign officials. The initiative has had mixed results but in 2014 collected a \$500 million once held by the former Nigerian dictator Sani Abacha and his cronies.—AFP

US JUDGE PAUSES QUEST TO BLOCK TOSHIBA CHIP UNIT SALE

SAN FRANCISCO: A California judge put on hold Friday a request by Western Digital to block the sale of Toshiba's chip division, suggesting a more collaborative order. San Francisco Superior Court Judge Harold Kahn gave Toshiba and Western Digital until a July 28 hearing to draft an order requiring the Japanese company to give its Silicon Valley partner two weeks' notice before closing a sale of the division. In the meantime, the court ordered Toshiba to not complete the sale.

Toshiba lawyers have contended in court documents that selling to the high bidder interested in the chip division was not expected to close until early next year at the earliest. The hearing was held to consider a request by Western Digital for an injunction stopping Toshiba from selling interests in three NAND flash-memory joint ventures operated with Western Digital's SanDisk subsidiaries.

"Our entire goal was to preserve and protect our rights through the binding arbitration process, and that's precisely what the court has done today," Western Digital chief executive Steve Milligan said in a released statement proclaiming the outcome of the hearing a victory. Toshiba was free to continue negotiations for the sale of the chip division as the matter made its way to likely arbitration in an international forum.

Kahn proposed a "finessed" alternative to the injunction sought by SanDisk that preserves legal options of both sides without stalling sales discussions, according to Toshiba. Executives at crisis-hit Toshiba faced hundreds of angry shareholders last month as the firm announced it has not yet clinched a deal to sell its prized chip business to a consortium of US, Japanese and South Korean investors. The sale, reportedly worth about 2.0 trillion yen (\$18 billion), is seen as crucial for the cash-strapped company to plug massive losses at its US nuclear division, Westinghouse Electric.

Toshiba said it had entered into exclusive talks with the public-private Innovation Network Corp. of Japan, state-backed Development Bank of Japan and US private equity fund Bain Capital, with South Korean chipmaker SK Hynix acting as a lender. Toshiba is the world's number-two supplier of memory chips, behind South Korea's Samsung. The sale involving state-backed buyers means the Japanese government will effectively own the chip division.

The profitable division has accounted for about one-quarter of Toshiba's total annual revenue. The chip unit sale is seen as key to Toshiba's turnaround. Western Digital, which jointly runs a key chip plant in Japan, opposes the sale. Toshiba's chief executive has blasted the US firm's bid for a court injunction as "unfair interference." Toshiba later said it has filed a 120 billion yen (\$1 billion) lawsuit against its US partner over the disputed deal.—AFP

KUWAIT: Boursa Kuwait ended last week in the green zone. The Price Index closed at 6,788.48 points, up by 1.62 percent from the week before closing, the Weighted Index increased by 1.87 percent after closing at 404.62 points, whereas the KSX-15 Index closed at 922.29 points up by 1.65 percent. Furthermore, the week's average daily turnover increased by 28.60 percent, compared to the preceding week, reaching KD 11.93 million, whereas trading volume average was 77.78 million shares, recording an increase of 60.34 percent.

The Boursa was able to redirect its path to the upward direction and its three indices were able to realize different gains by the end of the week, especially the Price Index which benefited from the noticeable speculative activity on the small-cap and idle stocks, that been traded below 100 Fils, and witnessed a noticeable decline over the last period, which made it tempting for purchase. Also, some leading stocks witnessed a purchasing activity that was reflected on the performance of the Weighted and KSX-15 indices, that accompanied the Price Index in the green zone during this week.

In addition, the Boursa gained over KD 480 million during the last five sessions, as the market capitalization for the listed companies in the official market reached KD 26.72 billion, up by 1.83 percent from its level in the previous week, where it was KD 26.24 billion. On an annual level, the market cap gain for the listed companies in the official market increased to reach 50.16 percent compared to its value at

end of 2016, where it was KD 25.41 billion. As per the daily trading activity, the Boursa Kuwait initiated the first session of the week with different gains to the three indices, especially the Price Index, which increased by more than 43 point as a result to the quick



MAJOR CENTRAL BANKS NUDGE THEIR POSITIONS

KUWAIT: Midyear, things are proceeding more or less as expected back in January. Economic growth is holding up well in most economies. Politics are not much of an impediment, though risk factors remain in the background and may be rising. Brexit negotiations are still a question mark, primarily for the UK. Qatar's dispute with its neighbors is a factor certainly for some GCC equities.

More importantly, the Trump agenda on tax cuts and economic stimulus remains an expected plus for US equities, even if not for this year. However, as we approach the US Congressional mid-term elections of November 2018, the markets will want to see concrete action, surely for reasons economic but also to avoid a Republican setback in the election. The latter wouldlikely be seen as delaying, or even derailing, the current pro-business agenda. US politics are bound also to loom larger, because the above will be taking place against a backdrop of a US Federal Reserve raising interest rates further and embarking on the next leg of undoing years of quantitative easing.

The Fed has recently signaled strongly that it intends to start reducing the size of the massive portfolio, which amassed over several bouts of quantitative easing since 2008. The portfolio today stands at \$ 4.3 trillion (Treasuries, Agencies and mortgage-backed securities) versus under \$ 1 trillion prior to 2008. The wind-down will be very slow and gradual, starting probably in September 2017 and in amount of \$ 10 billion per month initially. Still the Fed and the markets will want to see and reassure themselves that the unwinding of the unprecedented QE(s) will not cause undue market or other disruptions.

Chair Fed Janet Yellen seemed confident recently that reducing the balance sheet gradually would

have minimal/spread-out impact on long term rates Furthermore, if one takes Fed rhetoric at face value (and the latest dot-plots), the Fed should be hiking the federal funds rate once more this year (25 bps), and about 3 times in 2018. The markets, and we, do not share that view at this point, in large part because US inflation, as well as EU inflation, continue to disappoint on the lowerside of their 2.0% targets.

The world economy is still expected to grow at 3%-plus this year, with US GDP growth above 2.0%, EU close to 1.5%, while China should maintain 6.5% growth. The last data from the US is consistent with this outlook, June payroll employment added 222K new jobs, unemployment was little changed at a low 4.4%, and wage growth remains tame, with steady y/y rises of 2.4%.

The uncertainty around the Trump agenda and the strength of the economic recovery are the other factors generating market doubts for the US interest rate forecast ahead. The markets seem to be looking for just one 25 bps in the next 12 months, to June 2018, and that with about 50% probability. While at the same time, the signs from other major central banks, in

particular the ECB, have pointed to the end of aggressive accommodation soon, and to the possible tapering of bond purchases perhaps by end of year.

The result of the above, i.e. Fed hikes, has been a gradual rise in short term interest rates, with the US 2-year reaching a yield of 140 bps for the first time since 2008. The longer maturities, which remain very well behaved, have seen their rate rises contained thanks to low inflation and repressed European yields. However, long rates are finally seeing some upward pressure from signs of the Fed unwinding its balance sheet, as well as from finally higher European rates. The latter were freed up by signs that the ECB was about to "taper" or stop its purchases in 2018. 10-year US rates rose to 2.38% recently, while German 10-year Bunds jumped to 58 bps after starting the year at 18 bps. Nonetheless, rises in long rates are still expected to be gradual thanks to a gradualist Fed and ECB, when its time comes, as well as low inflation. In fact, US rates fell slightly since, following Janet Yellen recent dovish comments on

Inflation is contained and below

target and the recent downward pressure on oil prices means another bout of soft inflation data. Oil prices in fact were the main surprise or deviation from expectations earlier this year. Oil prices remain under pressure, notwithstanding an extension by OPEC and its partners of the earlier production cuts into 2018.

Oil prices are off 14% from the start of the year, and Brent is well below \$50 pb. With the OPEC production cuts acting slowly on supply, and with still rising US production (primarily from shale oil), the market has had a very difficult time getting to balance. Balance was expected by mid-year but now seem pushed to 2H2017, if not next year. This prospect has pressured GCC equity markets, or at least prevented them from doing better. At the same time, the diplomatic row between Qatar and 3 GCC members (Saudi, the UAE, Bahrain plus Egypt) has also unsettled some investors. These are some of the factors responsible for the year-todate underperformance of the regional markets, versus international markets. Saudi was helped to a large extent by it consideration and potential future inclusion in the MSCI emerging markets,

announced in June. The change in relative central bank position has also pressured the USD recently, in particular versus a rising Euro. The USD is off 8.4% against the Euro, 2.6% against the JPY. As mentioned above, equities are performing well generally. The US headline markets are up close to 8% ytd, while in Europe the DAX (Germany) is up 7.9% on the year. Moderate growth, low inflation and slowly rising interest rates (toward "normalization") seem to be working nicely for equities, though valuations are getting rich in some markets and raising eyebrows in some investor and policy circles (BIS, Fed...).

Rather, AT&T says it merely opposes the FCC rules that set it in place. Comcast and Verizon joined AT&T in making that distinction. ISPs don't like the FCC's approach because it treats internet service as a utility and comes with more oversight. They worry about

price regulation and say the rules hurt broadband investment.

Tim Karr, the campaign director for Free Press, an advocacy group that supports net neutrality, slammed the ISPs for "simply attempting to fake the funk, pretending to support net neutrality while opposing the (FCC) rules that make it an enforceable reality."

The 2015 regulation is the only set of net-neutrality rules that courts have upheld. Internet activists and tech firms hope that the protest will pressure Congress and the FCC, the way a highly visible 2012 online protest including the blackout of Wikipedia's English-language site for 24 hours helped kill anti-piracy legislation that tech companies equated to internet

This year's online protest is more muted. Netflix put a gray banner at the top of its home page and is tweeting out "gif" animations in support. Amazon's website has a small square inviting users to "learn more." Twitter is

promoting "net neutrality" as the top trending topic in the US Google tweeted a blog post. Smaller tech companies including Airbnb and Etsy have fat banners on their home pages.

Karr said that internet users have taken "hundreds of thousands of actions," like contacting the FCC. There had been about 6 million filings on net neutrality's overturn made to the FCC as of Tuesday night, both supporting and opposing the policy; that had risen to 6.7 million Wednesday afternoon. —AP

AUSTRALIA PLANS LAW TO FORCE TECH GIANTS TO DECRYPT MESSAGES

CANBERRA: The Australian government on Friday proposed a new cybersecurity law to force global technology companies such as Facebook and Google to help police by unscrambling encrypted messages sent by suspected extremists and other criminals.

But some experts, as well as Facebook, warned that weakening end-to-end encryption services so that police could eavesdrop would leave communications vulnerable to hackers.

The new law would be modeled on Britain's Investigatory Powers Act, which was passed by the British Parliament in November and gave intelligence agencies some of the most extensive surveillance powers in the Western world, the govern-

The Australian bill that would allow courts to order tech companies to quickly to Parliament by November, officials said.

Under the law, internet companies would have the same obligations telephone companies do to help law enforcement agencies, Prime Minister Malcolm Turnbull said. Law enforcement agencies would need warrants to access the communications.

'We've got a real problem in that the law enforcement agencies are increasingly unable to find out what terrorists and drug traffickers and pedophile rings are up to because of the very high levels of encryption,"Turnbull told reporters.

Cooperate

"Where we can compel it, we will, but we will need the cooperation from the tech companies," he added. The government expected resistance from some tech companies, many of them based in the United States. But the companies "know morally they should" cooperate," Turnbull said. "There is a culture, particularly in the United States, a very libertarian culture, which is quite anti-government in the tech

sector," Turnbull said. "We need to say with one voice to Silicon Valley and its emulators: 'All right, you've devised these great platforms, now you've got to help us to ensure that the rule of law prevails," he added.

Attorney-General George Brandis described the growth of encrypted communication applications such as WhatsApp, Signal, Facebook Messenger and iMessage as "potentially the greatest degradation of intelligence and law enforcement capability that we have seen in our lifetime."

Brandis said he met the British government's chief cryptographer last week and believed it was technically possible to decode encrypted messages in a time frame that police needed to act.

This could be achieved without socalled back doors - built-in weaknesses that allowed a tech company access to a communication but could also leave it vulnerable to hackers, Brandis said.

Facebook said it had a protocol to respond to requests for police help. But the social media giant said it could not read individual encrypted messages. "Weakening encrypted systems for them (police) would mean weakening it for everyone," a Facebook statement said on

Australia was a major driver of a statement agreed at the Group of 20 leaders' summit in Germany last week that called on the tech industry to provide "lawful and non-arbitrary access to available information" needed to protect against terrorist

The Australian Federal Police say the proportion of communication traffic they monitor that was encrypted had grown from 3 percent to more than 55 percent in only a few years.

Police say 65 percent of organized crime investigations including terrorism and pedophile rings involved some kind of encryption. —AP

NEVADA DMV NABS CRIMINAL WITH FACIAL RECOGNITION TECHNOLOGY

LAS VEGAS: A man who fled federal custody more than 25 years ago couldn't escape newage crime fighting, thanks to facial recognition technology. The Nevada Department of Motor Vehicles said it nabbed 64-year-old Robert Frederick Nelson in June as he tried to renew his state identification card. Nelson has since been turned over to the federal Bureau of Prisons. He's expected to serve his remaining sentence and additional time for fleeing federal custody in 1992.

Federal authorities aren't clear on how Nelson fell through the cracks for so long, said Chris Clifford, a spokesman for the US Marshals Service in Minneapolis. "We almost had to rebuild the entire case," he said.

Nevada DMV spokesman Kevin Malone said a technician processing Nelson's paperwork at the North Las Vegas station called agency investigators after noticing something suspicious about him. Nelson's left the DMV unaware a full-scale probe would follow by officers in the department's Compliance Enforcement Division who investigate identity theft and related issues.

"The facial recognition was only part of it. It was good, old-fashioned police work," Malone said. The investigators discovered Nelson's ID card photo resembled another man: Craig James Pautler, who had a commercial driver's license and a state ID card dating back to 1993. Nelson began using his true identity in 2013 when he got an ID card under his real name, which he attempted to renew last month. In Nevada, people apply for identification in person and leave with a paper detailing

their information. The DMV processes the application, and if approved will mail the identification card to the applicant.

In the case involving Nelson, the resemblance between the two identities prompted investigators to run his criminal history. They found felony convictions under both names, and that he had eluded federal authorities in Minnesota for decades. Nevada officials called to inform him of a problem with his application and asked him to return to the DMV office, where he was arrested June 20.

Mug Shot

Malone said the DMV has used a facial recognition technology since 2008, after moving to a central processing system for all stateissued ID cards to tighten security. The technology is strictly for mug shots and isn't the higher-tech type that can pick people out of a group. The facial recognition software shows possible matching faces, allowing the DMV to further scrutinize applications. Malone said most cases just link similar-looking photos but the department catches ID fraud two to three times a month.

"We've caught a lot of ID theft and ID fraud cases," said Malone. "This is the first time I'm aware of that we've captured an escaped prisoner." The program pre-dates the state's compliance with the federal Real ID Act of 2005, which required all states to enhance ID standards. The process and regulations for state IDs were more lenient before 9/11, which Malone said is probably how Nelson got his other identification documents. —AP

APPLE TO OPEN DATA CENTER IN CHINA WITH GOVERNMENT TIES

SAN FRANCISCO: Apple will open a data center in mainland China with ties to the country's government, raising concerns about the security of iCloud accounts that store personal information transferred from iPhones, iPads and Mac computers

The data center announced Wednesday will be located in the Guizhou province and run by a company owned by the Chinese government. Apple is teaming up with the company, Guizhou on the Cloud Big Data, to comply with a new Chinese law requiring data-storage providers to keep the information of mainland China customers on computers located within the country.

The Guizhou data center will store photos, video, documents and other personal information uploaded to iCloud accounts by Apple customers who live in mainland China, even when they're traveling outside the country. Backups and other data stored in iCloud accounts by customers outside China will continue to be stored in data centers in the US and eventually Denmark.

Other major technology companies, including Amazon, Microsoft, and IBM, have already made similar deals to run data centers in mainland China to remain in the good graces of the country's Communist government.

But Apple's acquiescence is striking because CEO Tim Cook has made preserving customers' privacy a company cornerstone. The Cupertino, California, company underscored that commitment last year in a highprofile battle with the US government over a legal demand to crack open the iPhone of a suspected killer in a mass shooting.

Apple has a strong incentive to toe the line in China because that country already is its third-largest market behind North America and Europe, with all signs pointing to it become an even bigger profit center.

China currently accounts for about 20 percent of Apple's revenue.

Even though it's working with a government-owned company, Apple sought to reassure customers in China that the arrangement won't compromise their privacy. "As our customers know, Apple has strong data privacy and security protections in place and no backdoors will be created into any of our systems," the company said in a statement.

What's more, Apple says it will hold to the security keys protecting the data that people routinely back up in iCloud accounts. But experts believe the data center will make it easier for the government to retrieve the information through legal

demands or other means. Apple will find it more challenging to resist any order from a Chinese court to give authorities there access to an iCloud account that they want to sift through, predicted Nate Cardozo, a senior staff attorney specializing in privacy for the Electronic Frontier Foundation, a digital rights group. Currently, the Chinese government has to funnel those demands through the US court system, a more difficult process to negotiate.

Cardozo recommends that Apple customers in mainland customer turn off the iCloud feature on their iPhones and other devices to protect their information from prying eyes. Data stored on the devices themselves should remain secure as long as they lock them with passwords that only the user knows. Even if the government seizes a device, Apple won't have the keys to unlock data. But with iCloud, Apple does have the keys. The exception is passwords and credit card data synced with iCloud Keychain.

Ajay Arora, CEO of data security specialist Vera, also warns that Apple's partnership with a company owned by the Chinese government increases the chances that authorities could secretly pry their way into iCloud accounts.

"It's like Apple is putting the fox in charge of the henhouse," Arora said. —AP

HYPERLOOP MOVES CLOSER TO NEAR-SUPERSONIC RAIL

announced the first successful full-systems test of its near-supersonic rail transit system. The test took place in May at the company's development track in the Nevada desert near Las Vegas, and involved a vehicle coasting above tracks for slightly more than five seconds using magnetic levitation, according to the startup.

The test vehicle accelerated to a speed of 70 miles (112 kilometers) per hour during the test, and the company's next goal is to ramp the speed to 250 mph (400 kph), Hyperloop One said in a release. "Hyperloop One has accomplished what no one has done before by successfully testing the first full scale Hyperloop system," said startup co-founder and executive chairman Shervin Pishevar.

"By achieving full vacuum, we essentially

SAN FRANCISCO: US startup Hyperloop One invented our own sky in a tube, as if you're flying at 200,000 feet (60,000 meters) in the air." Hyperloop One had originally promised a fullscale demonstration by the end of 2016, after a successful test of the propulsion system. Systems tested in May included the motor, vacuum pumping, magnetic levitation, and electromagnetic braking, according to the company. Hyperloop One also announced on Wednesday that it has built a prototype pod designed to carry people or cargo through the systems low-pressure tubes. Hyperloop One early this year disclosed a list of locations around the world vying to put near-supersonic rail transit system to the test. Viable submissions had to be condoned by government agencies that would likely be involved in regulating and, ideally, funding the futuristic rail. Hyperloop One wants to get three systems

underway, chief executive Rob Lloyd told AFP

at the time.

Hyperloop One, which has raised more than \$160 million, was set on an idea laid out by billionaire Elon Musk, the entrepreneur behind electric car company Tesla and private space exploration endeavor SpaceX. Pods would rocket along rails through reducedpressure tubes at speeds of 1,200 kilometers (750 miles) per hour. Hyperloop One says the system offers better safety than passenger jets, lower build and maintenance costs than highspeed trains, and energy usage, per person, that is similar to a bicycle.

Port colossus DP World Group of Dubai last year invested in the concept, joining backers including French national rail company SNCF, US industrial conglomerate General Electric and Russian state fund RDIF. —AFP

IN WEST AFRICA, CANCER PATIENTS FORCED ABROAD FOR TREATMENT

DAKAR, Senegal: Christine's doctor felt a small lump in her left breast at a checkup in 2015, though she was flooded with relief when the technicians assured her they had detected nothing amiss. Still in pain more than a year later, she pushed for another mammogram. The 44-year-old mother of four was then diagnosed with advanced breast cancer.

"It was the descent into hell," she said. "You ask, 'Why, why, why?' ... I was so angry. Because why in 2015 did they not see this, and why was it left for so long?" The word "cancer" is rarely spoken in Senegal, synonymous with death in a country where many like Christine are only diagnosed in the later stages of disease and radiation therapy can be difficult to access. Cancer has become an emerging public health problem in West Africa, and the lack of strong prevention, good screening and treatment often leaves outcomes grim. For that reason, Christine and most other patients don't share their diagnosis, and they ask not to be identified by their full names.

Two new machines

For now, radiation treatment is impossible without leaving the country. Senegal's sole radiotherapy machine, donated in 1989, broke down last year. Senegal's government had promised two new machines by December, and they were delivered weeks ago, but patients must wait until they are functional. In the meantime, their only option is to seek treatment in North Africa or Europe. "Wherever you go in Africa you have the same problem. Late diagnosis is a fact ... and you don't have the same treatment that you have in Europe or the United States or other developing countries," said Macoumba Gaye, head of the radiotherapy department of Dalal Jamm Hospital outside Dakar.

The need for radiation in West Africa is greater, too. While about 70 percent of patients might need radiation in developed countries, more than 80 percent require the treatment in Senegal because their cases are caught at more advanced stages, Gaye said. The problem is only expected to worsen unless improvements are made. The number of cancer cases in Africa is projected to double between 2008 and 2030 because of an aging population, according to the International Agency for Research on Cancer.

The Senegalese Ministry of Health did not respond to several requests for an interview on the broken radiotherapy machine. The country has been planning to set up a National Cancer Institute within five years, plus a registry to track cancer patients. There is also a program to have mammogram machines in all regions of Senegal by next year. Gaye said they hope to have the two new machines up and run-

ning by September. Until then, Senegal's government is paying for patients' travel to nearby Morocco, said Gaye, who is on the committee that approves who can get such funding. He says some 70 patients have been sent to Morocco so far. Treating stage 3 to 4 cancer costs at least \$5,000-\$10,000, he said, while preventative planning such as a pap smear costs only \$20. It's unclear how many people have had to forego the important treatment, but Gaye said it's likely in the hundreds.

Hide their illness

Christine's husband had insurance that allowed her to undergo radiation treatment in Casablanca after her tumor was successfully removed by surgery in Senegal in November. She was fortunate to have a daughter who already lived there, but still had to attend 30 treatment sessions by herself. Christine said she and other West Africans didn't feel entirely welcome in Morocco, adding to the burden of being sick and trying to hide their illness. "Treatment there was frustrating because they were indifferent to me," she said. "But when the Moroccan patients came in they got kisses, greetings and were treated with kindness."

Wearing a wig, a bright purple dress and a bra with inserts, she said she hopes to start a consultation service for others who have to fight cancer, helping them find such bras and wigs. She especially credited Dr. Abdoul Aziz Kasse, her Senegalese surgeon, with helping to save her life. Kasse has been at the forefront of Senegal's cancer care for decades and has been pushing for improved treatment options and government planning to focus on prevention. Kasse has saved lives with mobile screening units as well, saying that screening can reduce cancer rates by some 30 percent. He now hopes to continue helping others like Christine by opening a new private clinic in Senegal's capital that would expand treatment options.

Medical evacuation

Once opened, it will offer advanced technology at a lower cost than treatment in Morocco. He and his French partners hope that their business model can be replicated with satellite facilities in Burkina Faso, Ghana, Benin, Ivory Coast and Rwanda. Burkina Faso has no radiotherapy machine but expects one by next year, said Paulin Somba, head of non-communicable and chronic diseases at Burkina Faso's health ministry. The government has suspended since 2015 sending its citizens to other countries for medical evacuation because of the costs - the lowest coming in at about 1.5 million CFA, or \$2,500, he said. Because of that, the death rate is at 50 percent, he said, adding that surgery and chemotherapy are available. — AP

Preventive care and routine screening can make a big difference

WASHINGTON: US President Donald Trump has often said he doesn't want people "dying in the streets" for lack of health care. But in the United States, where chronic conditions are the major diseases, people decline slowly. Preventive care and routine screening can make a big difference for those at risk for things such as heart problems and cancer, especially over time. That edge is what doctors and patients fear will be compromised if Republican efforts to repeal the Obama-era health law lead to more uninsured people. The uninsured tend to postpone care until problems break through.

It's a message that lawmakers are hearing from doctors' groups and constituents, in letters and emails, and at town hall meetings. About 10 years ago, Cathy Cooper of Ocala, Florida, was battling a blood cancer. Against doctor's advice, she continued to work full time as a paralegal, through chemotherapy and radiation, just to preserve her health insurance. Cooper said she would schedule chemo on Fridays, spend the weekend sick from side effects and report back to work Monday.

Now in her early 30s, Cooper is healthy. She has her own business as a photographer specializing in maternity, newborns, families and seniors, and a family of her own. Her health insurance is through HealthCare.gov. With her cancer history, Cooper is worried about changes under debate that may reduce options for people with medical conditions. She said she voted for Hillary Clinton in the presidential election.

Medicaid coverage

"The 'dying in the streets' thing - it's an overtime process," said Cooper. "If I didn't have insurance, it (cancer) could just keep forming inside me and I wouldn't know. Then I'd go into the hospital, and there's nothing they could do. And then, yeah, I could die in the street. But that's because I wouldn't have had insurance to get things checked out prior to that point."

In Charlotte, North Carolina, Dr Octavia Cannon said that's basically what happened to one of her patients several years ago. The patient, a working mother with three young children and more than one job, was uninsured after losing previous Medicaid coverage. She went to Cannon, an osteopathic obgyn, because of abnormal bleeding. Cannon said she knew something was horribly wrong on the basis of her initial physical examination. The pathology lab confirmed advanced cervical cancer.

"In six months, she was dead," Cannon recalled. "All I could think was 'Who is going to take care of these babies?' If she had only come in for a Pap smear." Such stories are swirling around the Senate debate as Majority Leader

Mitch McConnell, R-Ky, pushes toward a vote on legislation rolling back much of former President Barack Obama's Affordable Care Act. The GOP bill has been facing headwinds since the Congressional Budget Office estimated it would lead to 22 million more uninsured people by 2026.

Administration officials say the nonpartisan budget office has been wrong before about health coverage, and its analytical methods may give too much weight to the current requirement that most people carry health insurance or risk fines. (Republicans would repeal that immediately.) Health and Human Services Secretary Tom Price said Trump's goal is more people with health insurance, not fewer. "Nobody is looking at it in its totality," Price said recently on NBC. "We will bring down premiums, we will increase coverage, we'll increase choices. And I believe we'll increase the quality of care provided in this nation."

There's not much debate about the negative consequences of being uninsured. Studies by the National Academies have found that the uninsured are more likely to receive too little care, and too late; be sicker and die sooner; and receive poorer care in the hospital. But surprisingly, there are questions about whether gaining coverage produces tangible health benefits. Major government surveys have documented clear improvements to family finances associated with Obama's coverage expansion. On health itself, the evidence is mixed.

Having insurance is a start

Medicaid expansions in New York, Maine and Arizona in the early 2000s were associated with a 6 percent decline in death rates in those states, compared with neighboring states that did not expand coverage for low-income people. A study of Massachusetts found a similar trend. But in Oregon a Medicaid expansion study that found a marked reduction in depression failed to detect significant improvement in blood sugars, blood pressure and cholesterol levels - risk factors for heart disease and diabetes.

Dr Cyrus Hamidi, a solo family medicine practitioner in Sparks, Maryland, said having insurance is a start, reducing barriers to access for patients. "If you have to pay to go to the doctor, then you worry about payment instead of what you need to do to reduce the risk of dropping dead," he said. Gaywin Day, a union electrician from Austin, Texas, said being able to get coverage under Obama's law in the aftermath of a medical crisis has been "a lifesaver." Day, in his early 60s, was between jobs and uninsured when he had a stroke in March. A couple of months later, a "special enrollment period" enabled him to get subsidized coverage through HealthCare.gov, opening doors to physical therapy and follow-up medical care. Now, Day no longer uses a walker or cane. He's thinking about returning to work. "Nobody wants anybody dying in the streets, but if I hadn't got this. ... I could just be shriveling up in my bed," he said. He didn't cast a ballot last year. "I don't vote," said Day. "I do a lot of praying."—AP

FDA OKS NEW JOHNSON & JOHNSON TREATMENT FOR PSORIASIS

NEW BRUNSWICK, New Jersy: People with the skin disorder psoriasis will have another treatment option after US regulators approved a new drug from Johnson & Johnson. The Food and Drug Administration approved Tremfya (trehm-FEYE-eh) Thursday for people with moderate to severe plaque psoriasis.

Johnson & Johnson said that in one patient study about seven in 10 patients getting Tremfya had clear or nearly clear skin after 24 weeks of treatment, compared with about four in 10 patients receiving rival AbbVie's Humira, the world's top selling drug. Tremfya, which is injected every eight weeks, can cause infections and other serious side effects. It will cost \$9,684 per dose, or about \$58,100 per year, without insurance.—AP







would purchase 50 percent of African music download service Musik Bi, as the platform struggles to gain a foothold after its launch 18 months ago. Africa's first homegrown platform for legal music downloads, Musik Bi launched in



Senegal in February 2016 with a mission to promote African artists, pay them properly, and fight internet piracy.

Akon, whose real name is Aliaune Badara Thiam, announced in Dakar he would become the majority shareholder in the service, describing Musik Bi as "the platform of the future". "It's not

enegalese-American rapper Akon announced yesterday he 👚 just a platform for Senegal but for Africa," he added, refusing to be drawn on what he had paid for the transaction. Best known for his singles "Locked Up" and "Smack That", Akon has devoted more of his time in recent years to his Lighting Africa solar energy initiative and other charitable pursuits. He launched his latest single "Khalice", a collaboration with Senegalese superstar Youssou Ndour, exclusively on Musik Bi.

More than 200 internationally famous musicians, along with younger rappers, jazz artists and Christian and Muslim vocalists, initially agreed to put their music on Musik Bi, where users can download it using their phone credit. CEO Moustapha Diop, whose company Solid pioneered the project, said ongoing disputes with phone companies over their cut of takings had hindered Musik Bi's reach. "We have the ambition of developing across Africa and being 'the' musical distribution platform in Africa," Diop told journalists. "The profit made by the operators is problematic because it goes against the interests of the artists and the platform in general. We will keep pushing to get a reasonable deal," he added.

After mobile operators took their share, artists keep 60 percent of their income from the service, while Musik Bi take the remaining 40 percent. The platform also hopes to broaden into a music festival, television channel and a streaming service, Akon said. Piracy and changing consumer habits have seen record sales drop across the continent, with illegal downloads tempting African consumers looking online for music while copyright enforcement remains relatively weak. — AFP

The real-life Jedi Council policing Planet 'Star Wars'

in the "Star Wars" universe. Their job is to make sure every movie, animated television show, novel, guidebook, comic and video game is part of one, big, internally-consistent story. Known as the "Lucasfilm Story Group," this cabal of around a dozen experts maintains a meticulously detailed database of "Star Wars" lore, from major plot points to the tiniest specifications on a spaceship never seen on camera.

"A lot of what we do, and what I do specifically, is basically keeping track of 'Star Wars' as a real place with a real history," said creative executive Pablo Hidalgo, sometimes referred to as the "Yoda of Lucasfilm.""And then we see what that gets you as far as storytelling opportunities go." Set up when Disney bought "Star Wars" in 2012, it was one of the first innovations of producing legend and newly appointed Lucasfilm chief Kathleen Kennedy. Led by Hidalgo, Carrie Beck, Diana Williams and a handful of other lifelong fans, the group's big

group of elders act as a real-life Jedi Council-keepers of single narrative. The group staged a Brexit of sorts from their sacred knowledge who police everything that happens own EU-George Lucas's mainly fan-created "Expanded Universe" of comics, novels, video games, and more, built up over decades.

Obscure

That material would stay in circulation under a new "Star Wars Legends" banner, but movie episodes seven to nine would not have to honor its many stories. From then on, all material-from the new movies to the "Clone Wars" and "Rebels" animated series-would go through the Story Group for approval as part of the official "canon." "We had decades and decades of publishing that was written with the assumption that there would be no more 'Star Wars' movies," said Hidalgo, who joined Beck and Williams at a Disney press day in Los Angeles this week.

"When it became apparent that we were going to do 'Episode VII'-and the storyline that George kicked off made it

eep within Lucasfilm's San Francisco headquarters, a first task was wiping the slate clean to make way for this new clear that 'Episode VII' did not resemble the galaxy described in the books-we said, 'Let's align all this stuff." From 2014, the Story Group was able to furnish creative, from comic book writers to theme park designers, with a rich trove of background material fact-checking dialogue, plot lines and the most obscure ephemera.

Beck, who worked on the relationship between "Rebels" and "Rogue One" -- which shared the "Clone Wars" character Saw Gerrera-said it was important to make sure all these properties worked together but could still be enjoyed independently. "We think about how (characters) enter into this narrative in a way which feels honest to their story," she said.

'We see it all'

The system might seem unwieldy and dictatorial, but it is appreciated by fans and filmmakers alike. The last thing you want in your "Star Wars" novel is Chewbacca winning a tap dancing competition when a video game released years earlier established that he has two left feet. "What we don't want to do is create something that feel like it is an outlier in a way that it doesn't feel like it fits within the larger universe," said Williams. "What we want is for people to feel engaged and that no matter how varied that expression might be, all things are authentic, valuable." It's not just about nit-picking either-Story Group members work with writers and filmmakers to develop new ideas.

Some are turned down because the timing is wrong, they don't fit in or are just plain silly. Others such as "Rogue One"offered to the Story Group by Industrial Light and Magic's special effects guru John Knoll in his first-ever movie pitch are given the green light. "It's not like we tell them what story to tell, but we together find the story that they are looking to tell," said Hidalgo. "And because we are a connection point for all that creative activity... we see it all, we communicate it all and we make sure we're all in sync." — AFP

IIFA KICKS OFF NEW YORK AWARDS EXTRAVAGANZA

■he International Indian Film Academy fired the opening salvo in a weekend of glitz, glamor and music for its annual awards, sending fans wild with excitement by hosting Bollywood stars in Times Square. Hundreds of peopleoverwhelmingly South Asians joined by bemused onlookers, confused tourists and a smattering of Western converts to Bollywood cheered a fashion show and shrieked in delight when actors Shahid Kapoor blew kisses and Varun Dhawan

The crowd turned into a sea of camera phones and raised arms, a taste of the excitement building among Indian cinema fans in New York, the heart of a tri-state area home to around 1.8 million Indian-Americans. "It's so nice, I feel so proud," beamed Neelam Singh, a 47-year-old software consultant and mother of one. "It looks like a mini India," she said of the socalled IIFA "Stomp" party in Times Square. Living in the United States for more than 20 years, she and her girlfriends have been planning what to wear for weeks, some jetting in from as far as Atlanta and Panama in the hopes of seeing their idols.

Events kick off in earnest Friday with a concert honoring A.R. Rahman, the movie composer who won two Oscars in 2009 for best original score and best original song for "Slumdog Millionaire." That bonanza-together with the awards ceremony-will be held at the 82,500-seat MetLife Stadium, an outdoor NFL venue across the Hudson River in East Rutherford, New Jersey. "We need you to pray a little for the rain Gods to be on our side," joked Kapoor on Thursday with downpours forecast.

Soft power

The 18th edition of the awards, which some dub the Oscars of Bollywood, comes at a time of growth for Indian film in North America. The organizers have been on a publicity blitz, ringing in the Nasdaq stock exchange bell Wednesday, drumming up sponsorship and marketing. Mohammad Asif, founder of the Bombay Theatre in Queens, said that since he set up shop in the mid-1990s, the number of cinemas showing Indian films in the United States has grown from around

He attributed the increase to the thriving Indian economy, bigger film budgets, an increase in the South Asian diaspora, and growing popularity among Afghans, Arabs, Russians and Caribbean immigrants. Increased cross-over with Indian stars such as Priyanka Chopra having roles in Hollywood is giving

India more visibility and global exposure. "This is really India's soft power at its best, as we strive to develop our relationship with the United States further," consul general to New York, Riva Ganguly Das, told an IIFA press conference. But if IIFA's hopes to reach out to new audiences by holding its awards ceremony each year overseas, it still has some way to go. "It's a store," one American in Times Square said blankly when asked if he knew what Bollywood was. A passing British tourist said he had never heard of IIFA, nor star actors Salman Khan and Katrina Kaif. "I'll probably move on," he said walking off.

'Waiting'

Neither are drawn-out logistics and fluid timings to every taste in a city well versed in tight schedules. "I'm actually kind of upset because we've been waiting here for about three hours," said Nija Walker, 23, a funk-jazz drummer from New York's Westchester suburb keen to learn more about

Bollywood. But Foram Dalal, 30, who studies management and information systems, travelled in from New Jersey with her parents, seven-month-old daughter, husband and friends determined to savor the moment.

"Even if you see one star, it's worth it," she told AFP in Times Square. "I'm more than overwhelmed to be at this place right now." With a viewership of almost 800 million, IIFA is India's biggest media event and one of the world's most-watched annual entertainment shows. "It's a huge industry," said Habibah Hussain, a 37-year-old teacher and Pakistani tourist soaking up the atmosphere. "I've seen people who don't even understand Hindi-they watch it, because they dub it as well, and they're famous. That's why they're here," she said gesturing to Times Square. — AFP

Mastering manners at Switzerland's last finishing school

Mastering manners is not about snobbism, it's about respect, for yourself and others

ight women sit primly around an elaborately set table making pleasant ■small-talk about the weather, as immaculately starched waiting staff stand at the ready. But as one of the servers steps forward holding a silver soup tureen with white-gloved hands, an instructor helps her adjust the angle of the bowl to make sure the ladle is facing the diner. And a second tutor whispers in the ear of another diner to lower her elbow as she brings the spoon to her mouth. The women are not at a fancy restaurant or a high-end social club, but at Switzerland's last finishing school, learning to master good manners, strict etiquette and how to avoid a fatal

faux pa

"I realize now that I have been mixing the French style of eating with the British style," said Institut Villa Pierrefeu student Heba, asking that her last name not be given. With some embarrassment, the 34-year-old Egyptian national explained that she had placed her knife on her plate even though she had not used it during her meal-a no-no in French dining etiquette. Heba is among 30 students from 14 different countries taking an intensive Pierrefeu summer course, lasting either three or six weeks, and offering classes like international business etiquette, floral art and staff management.

Not all princesses

The students are a diverse crowd, according to Viviane Neri, who took the reins of the school in 1972 -- nearly two

decades after her mother founded it. "Obviously we have daughters of presidents and princesses, but those are definitely not the majority," she said, her warm smile offsetting the strictness of her impecable attire. "We also have people who save money to finance their stay because... they realize that this will give them extra knowledge that very few people have," she said. It is not cheap. Depending on the formula chosen, a six-week course, with exams and board at the school's majestic manor houses, can cost close to 30,000 Swiss francs (\$31,000, 27,000 euros).

The current students, aged between 18 and 50 and ranging from professional businesswomen, to doctors and housewives, do not reveal their last names to each other to ensure equal treatment. Half a century ago, the students at Institut Villa Pierrefeu, which overlooks the picturesque town of Montreux, were among thousands attending a plethora of finishing schools dotting the hills around Lake Geneva. Back then it was common for girls and young women from wealthy, upper-class families to attend so-called "charm schools" to polish their manners and social graces. Britain's late Princess Diana was among the famous alumni of since shuttered finishing schools in this area.

'Ashamed, post-1968'

But today, Pierrefeu is the only one left, after the industry was decimated by the 1968 student revolution and rise of feminism. "There was a huge dip in attendance right after the student revolution," Neri said, adding that "the few who came said they were going to a languages school. They were ashamed." Neri attributes her school's longevity to its broad international focus and its rigorous efforts to keep the course material, including textbooks available only to Pierrefeu students, constantly up-to-date.

The students learn and practice the proper etiquette and protocol of 20 different countries, as well as cultural taboos to be avoided. "Cultural differences you are not aware of can create conflicts for very silly reasons," Neri said, pointing out for instance that in Japan it is rude to blow your nose in public, while in Germany it is rude not to. She suggested that many journalists could use a Pierrefeu course to avoid "embarrassing" articles like those criticizing US First Lady Melania Trump for not covering her head during a recent trip to Saudi Arabia.

"She doesn't have to because it is not compulsory for non-Muslims who come to

Saudi Arabia. That's protocol," she said. The students seem to enjoy delving into such details, although some expressed surprise at the intensity of the course. "I don't know if, when you hear finishing school, you take it as seriously as I think we all do now," said Taylor, a 34-year-old American student, who also refrained from giving her last name. "It is very rigorous,... very comprehensive," she said, adding that she felt she was "becoming educated here in a very rounded way."

'Not about snobbism'

Unlike the post-1968 generation, she and others said they proudly boasted of attending the school. Former student Nadine Abou Zahr, 46, said she had been skeptical when she first heard about the school while attending university nearby two decades ago. But the French-Lebanese former fashion magazine editor, who declined to reveal her current occupation, told AFP in an email that she could not be more delighted with her experience.

"Learning good manners in my opinion is not about snobbism or superficiality. It's about respect, for yourself and others," she said. The course is not about creating "dramatic" career or life changes, she said, but, rather, designed to broaden cultural horizons and teach the importance of paying attention to detail.

Etiquette roaring back?

Neri said she had noted a clear shift in attitudes towards the need for good manners. "I think people, after two generations of no etiquette, realize that it is so much easier when people share the same codes," she said. The shift has led Neri, along with her son and would-be successor, Philippe, to explore a range of expansion options. Three years ago they opened shorter seminars to men. They are also looking into reinstating a full school year and online courses.

At the same time, Neri is working to clear up common misunderstandings about what finishing schools actually represent. Far from seeing girls walking gingerly with books balanced on their heads, or being focused on how to find a husband, her finishing school provides for indepth learning and opening-up of the mind, she said. "I always say we don't finish them (the students), we start them," Neri said. "We open their eyes to the diversity there is." — AFP

Dutch collector tells court he 'no longer owns Chinese mummy'

fight over ownership of a 1,000-year-old mummified monk opened in a Dutch court on Friday, with an art collector saying he no longer possessed the controversial statue said to contain the mummy. The small eastern Chinese village of Yangchun has accused Dutch collector Oscar van Overeem of having bought the stolen Buddha statue containing the remains of a monk in Hong Kong in 1996. But Van Overeem told the Amsterdam District Court the statue was now in the "possession of a businessman who wants to remain anonymous" after an art swop in 2015.

He declined to name the businessman. "It was a verbal deal," lawyer Turan Teke told the judge, adding his client only knew the businessman's "international English name" without giving further details. The human-sized Buddha statue sitting in a lotus position, called the "Zhanggong Patriarch", disappeared from a temple in Yangchun in late

1995 after being worshipped there for centuries.

Missing for two decades, the Buddha statue resurfaced when villagers in 2015 recognized it as part of a display at the "Mummy World Exhibition" at Budapest's Natural History Museum. The statue was subsequently withdrawn. A scan of the statue revealed a skeleton inside-said to be that of the monk who lived nearly a millennium ago during China's Song dynasty. The villagers "without a doubt recognized the statue when they saw it," their lawyer Jan Holthuis told the court. The relatives of the monk-whom Holthuis says have written proof of their family ties-are asking the court to rule that they are entitled to have their ancestor returned to his rightful place.

Holthuis is using an argument under Dutch law that says "a person is not allowed to have a known body in their possession" to get the statue back. He also presented a slew of other arguments intending to show that the statute

bought by Van Overeem is indeed the one stolen from the temple. After three hours of technical discussions, presiding judge Jeroen Thomas asked both parties to submit new written statements.

The judge will now also decide whether Van Overeem should disclose the name of the anonymous businessman, Holthuis told AFP after the hearing. "This will take a few months," he added. The case is being closely watched as it could mark one of the first successful retrievals of Chinese relics in court, the state-run Chinese newspaper Global Times reported on Tuesday. Previously similar retrievals have been done through diplomatic channels, the paper said. Beijing in recent years has vehemently protested the sale of artefacts it says were stolen, particularly in the 19th century when European powers began encroaching on Chinese territory. — AFP

Archaeologists go high-tech in 2,500-year-old Greek cold case

ore than 2,500 years ago, an Athenian nobleman named Cylon-the first recorded Olympic champion-tried to take over the city of Athens and install himself as its sole ruler. According to Thucydides and Herodotus, Athenian and Greek historians who wrote about the coup, Cylon enticed an army of followers to enter the city and lay siege to the Acropolis. They were defeated, but Cylon managed to escape.

Now archaeologists in Athens believe they may have found some of the remains of Cylon's army in a mass grave in Phaleron, four miles (6 kilometers) south of downtown Athens. The discovery of the 80 skeletons of men is "unequalled" in Greece, said site project director Stella Chrysoulaki. The men, young and well-fed, were found lying in the unmarked grave in three rows, some on their backs while others were tossed face down on their stom-

All of the men had their hands in iron chains and at least 52 of them had their hands tied above their heads. They died from blows to the head, victims of a "political execution" that dates back to between 675 and 650 BC according to pieces of pottery found in the grave, Chrysoulaki said. At the time, Athens was just being formed and the city was transitioning towards a democracy, Eleanna Prevedorou, a bioarchaeological researcher on the project, said. And it was happening "against a backdrop of political turmoil, tensions between tyrants, aristocrats and the working class," she

'Crime Scene Investigation'

Bioarchaeological scientists use forensic research, such as DNA profiling, to investigate and ultimately uncover how humans lived and died by

examining skeletons. "We are going to use, roughly speaking, the methods made famous by television series on forensics crime science," joked Panagiotis Karkanas, laboratory director and geoarchaeologist at the Malcolm H. Wiener Laboratory at the American School of Classical Studies in Athens. Probably the most famous of these TV series, CBS' "CSI: Crime Scene Investigation", which chronicles the cases of an elite team of police forensics investigators, has spawned the shorthand CSI to describe the technology the agents use.

Karkanas' team, though technically not crime scene investigators, will apply similar high-tech methods using some of the same tools. They will perform a battery of tests-particularly gene, radiographic and isotopic analyses-to uncover the mysteries hidden inside each skull and skeleton fragment. Whatever clues they gather will give them an idea of how old the men were, whether they were related, where they came from, how healthy they were, and where they stood on the socioeconomic ladder of the times. But unlike crime dramas, where investigators reveal exactly how and why the crime took place, this cold case will likely not be resolved for five to seven years.

1,500 skeletons

The mass grave was uncovered in spring last year in one of the largest excavation sites Greece has ever unearthed. Though the site was found a century ago, large-scale excavation of the complex only began in 2012, when archaeologists discovered a large cemetery containing over 1,500 skeletons dating back to between the eighth and fifth century BC. More than 100 of them bore the marks of a violent death.

Other small-scale excavations since then have

unearthed other treasures, including the group of men believed to be part of Cylon's army.

Many of the skeletons found were bound or shackled, and face down in unmarked graves, sometimes in sandy holes barely big enough to hold a body. Other skeletons were buried in open pits, placed on funeral pyres and in jars, the preferred coffins at the time for infants and small children. According to researchers, the cemetery measures about 4,000 square meters (372 square feet) and all 1,500 skeletons will eventually be taken to the laboratory's facilities for proper study.

At least 10 of the 80 men found are headed to the lab later this year, while the rest will stay as part of an upcoming exposition on the excavation site. One of the skeletons already at the lab, with his arms twisted behind his back, is a reflection of past Athenian violence. He could have been a "prisoner of war, a criminal or a runaway slave," Prevedorou

A story to tell

Even the nonviolent deaths, or deaths without historical reference-notably the hundreds of children's remains found in jars-have a story to tell, Karkanas said. The bones could reveal the children's lifestyles and diseases, shedding more light on ancient Athenian culture and history. Most of the recorded ancient history on Athens and Greek life describes the "elite and the victors," Karkanas added. But to rely solely on those testimonies to understand the past would be like "reading newspapers today to find out what's going on in the world right now". — AFP

Re-creating old weapons for new discoveries of human history

etin Eren wasn't satisfied just digging up ancient arrowheads to learn about the past. He wanted to use them for their intended purpose. But shooting and shattering priceless millennia-old tips is out of the question, so instead, the archaeologist chips replicas of the stone-age weapons by hand. "We can break 'em and throw 'em," he says. "Our imagination is the limit." The 34-year-old Kent State University professor specializes in experimental archaeology re-creating ancient pots, knives and arrows. By testing the replicas in ways impossible with the originals, archaeologists study how tools found in archaeological digs were actually used.

"The stuff that we find, it's just stuff," says Brian Andrews, an archaeologist at Rogers State University. "Stuff's cool, but we're not interested in stuff for the sake of itself. We're interested in the human behaviors that went into making it." Eren's experiments focus on making sense of ancient weapons littered across the Americas, illustrating how humans first settled the Western Hemisphere: through careful preparation, long-term planning, and refined technology. "Even though it's the Stone Age, they're still thinking in a very modern way," Eren says.

Already he has cracked one longtime mystery. In the early 1900s, archaeologists found unusually shaped arrowheads in North America, with grooves carved from the base halfway to the head's tip. They first appeared over 13,000 years ago and spread rapidly across the continent, but existed nowhere else. Researchers were puzzled why the grooves were carved, with speculation running from religious rituals to mere decoration. That's where experimental archaeology came in.

By testing the pressure at which the arrowheads would crack using a \$30,000 crusher and computer models, Eren dis-

covered the grooves act as a shock absorber. It allows the arrowhead's thinned base to crumple slightly and absorb energy upon the arrow's impact, making the head less likely to break. Archaeologists call it the "first truly American invention." Scientists from Brazil to Britain previously conducted many kinds of experiments with re-creations, and borrowing techniques and technologies from other scientists has been longstanding practice.

Still, Eren's lab, only a year old, stands out for its cuttingedge equipment and singular focus on archaeological experimentation, says Briggs Buchanan, a professor at the University of Tulsa. "Metin's lab is setting an exceptional example by conducting rigorous controlled experiments," said Buchanan, who has co-authored papers with Eren. "Earlier experimental studies suffered from being of variable quality and rarely built on previous studies." On a Thursday morning, Eren hunches over a pile of flint shavings. Donning goggles, he grips a chunk of obsidian the size of a large pickle jar and cracks a moose antler down on one edge. With a resounding snap, a blade of obsidian chips off. He examines it gingerly. Obsidian blades are "sharp to the molecule," he says, and one nearly sliced off his left pinky in graduate school.

In his hand, he's holding a piece of the puzzle of how humans came to rule the world. By refining their weapons, ancient Americans learned how to adapt to all sorts of conditions. "They knew they were going into unknown territory, and because of that they actually prepared extremely well technologically," Eren says. "Understanding this process of colonization is important to understanding how we are today."— AP

20 years after Gianni's murder, Versace has rediscovered its soul

Two decades on, it is one of the world's top global luxu- opening new ones as the books improved. ands thanks to his little sister. Donatella. He had gone out for the morning papers: as Versace returned to his Miami beach mansion on July 15, 1997, he was shot dead by Andrew Cunanan, a homosexual prostitute known for his obsession with all things luxury.

The fashion world mourned deeply. The stylist to celebrities from Madonna to Elton John had been just 50 years old. "He was a 360-degrees creator, a real artist, he had a pure creative vision on colors and materials," Stefania Saviolo, director of the luxury and fashion center at Bocconi University, told AFP In Milan. The group he had created with his brother Santo in 1978 had been one of the hottest fashion brands in the

It fell to Versace's platinum blonde sister Donatella-to whom Gianni had entrusted the casual line Versus-to take over as artistic director. But the brand struggled to recover from Versace's murder. Donatella, who had worked for 14 years alongside Gianni, was severely affected by the loss of her brother and confessed to feeling "vulnerable".

Depression and cocaine

"You can't invent yourself as an artistic director overnight," says Saviolo, particularly as Donatella took over "at a time when fashion was changing a lot, with many collections and great pressure on artistic directors". Donatella, instantly recognizable for her famous locks and perpetual tan, sank into a period of depression and cocaine use before detoxifying in

The year before, the brand had acquired a new CEO in Giancarlo Di Risio. The former Fendi boss refocused the Medusa on the luxury market, streamlining licensing and franchising deals and developing the accessories range. Amid rumors in the press of a fall-out between the family and Di Risio over planned cuts, he was replaced in 2009 by Gian Giacomo Ferraris, who moved over from the Jil Sander fashion house. Ferraris wasted no time in launching an extensive reor-

> His intervention "doubled the turnover. 268 million euros in 2009 to 645 million in 2015," according to David Pambianco, who heads up a consultancy company in his name. By 2011 the historic brand had returned to profit after a gruelling three years of losses.

'So much potential'

"The right balance was struck between Ferraris and Donatella, the dialogue between them was good and there was great respect for Donatella's creativity and vision," Saviolo said. The family, which had always refused to relinquish control to a luxury conglomerate like so many of its fellow Italian fashion houses, finally yielded a 20 percent stake in 2014 to the US private equity firm Blackstone.

The move, which Donatella said would allow Versace to "achieve its potential", resulted in a cash injection into the luxury designer and boosted its presence in emerging markets. The bet paid off: despite a difficult global context, sales increased by some 17 percent in 2014 and in 2015. The house said it was time to "move onto the next phase" and Ferraris was replaced in May 2016 by Jonathan Akeroyd, former CEO of Alexander McQueen. Results last year were mixed, with sales up 3.7 percent to 668 million euros but the company admitting a loss of 7.4 million euros due in particular to funds sunk into its network of boutiques.

These results "have caused some uncertainty", but "the company is healthy, certainly more than 10 years ago," said Pambianco. "Versace remains one of the most beautiful brands in the world in the luxury sector" and has "still so much potential to express", he said, pointing out that luxury house Gucci for example "has a turnover that is seven times higher". Saviolo agrees: "Versace has recovered its lost "red carpet DNA" and its style is currently "very daring, very strong." — AP

Pain runs deep for Taiwan artists 30 years after 'White Terror'

nen saxophonist Chen Shen-ching was jailed during Taiwan's "White Terror" political purges, it was music that helped him hold on to his sanity. Banned from taking his instrument into prison he scrawled 12 years behind bars. As the island prepares to mark 30 years since martial law was lifted and it began its journey to become a vibrant democracy, Chen is one of a number of creative Taiwanese who want to ensure those dark days are never forgotten.

Now 75, he continues to sing his prison songs at political rallies and human rights events. "I hope people will listen, sing them and want to learn more about White Terror history," Chen told AFP. At 32, with a promising musical career and a young family, Chen was given a life sentence for sedition after joining a group advocating Taiwan independence-taboo under nationalist leader Chiang Kai-shek.

His father died soon after he was arrested and he penned a tribute song to help him through his grief. "I taught others to sing it and we often cried," Chen said. "For a musician, playing a sad song helps release emotions." He composed 20 songs in jail reflecting inmates' homesickness and mental anguish. Chen was freed in 1986 as part of a prison amnesty and slowly managed to rebuild his life in southern Taiwan.

He still wants the self-ruling island to split from China and often performs at pro-independence rallies. Beijing considers Taiwan part of its territory and has said it would respond with force if it ever announced a formal breakaway. Chen is glad he never wavered from his beliefs. "I did what I did for my ideals," he says. "So, I have no regrets."

Blood and horror

Chiang Kai-shek fled to Taiwan in 1949 after losing the civil war to Communist forces on the mainland, but saw himself and his authoritarian government as the legitimate rulers of the whole of China. Under his rule, political opponents were killed and imprisoned, there was no free press and songs deemed vulgar or pro-Communist were banned. Official records state around 140,000 people were tried by military courts with as many as 8,000 executed during the 38-year crackdown. Many believe the actual numbers are higher.

Chen Wu-jen was jailed aged 20 for sedition after scribbling anti-government phrases on the back of an aptitude test for new military conscripts as he was about to start his compulsory service. Released after two years, he took up art teaching but only painted portraits and landscapes for fear of being imprisoned again. After martial law was lifted by Chiang's son, Chiang Ching-kuo, on July 15 1987, he was able to truly express himself for the first time.

Since then, almost all his creations revolve around the White Terror. "I regret what I did," Chen, 68, told AFP at his studio in southern Tainan. "But as an artist I feel lucky because this experience has given me a profound subject to work on." His sculpture series "The Verdicts" is a collection of large skulls made from wood, pasted with photocopied sentencing documents. Clawing hands stretch out from the skulls while feet trample them. Paintings depict a woman screaming in front of a train, another suffering a miscarriage and being dragged by her hair through a pool

He lends his works to exhibitions but does not sell them-currently some are on display in a former dissidents' prison on remote outlying Green Island, which has been converted to a human rights center. "I think artists' depictions of a historical event leave a deeper impression on people than historians' narratives," said Chen. "I hope my works will have some impact."

Young generation

(DPP) has organized a music festival featuring young bands performing previously banned songs as part of this weekend's commemorations of the end of martial law. There will also be an exhibition of banned books, magazines and albums. The DPP has its roots in the political movement that opposed Chiang and former rebels have become top officials and lawmakers. The young musicians singing at the festival were mostly born after 1987, but say they want to play a part in keeping history alive.

Bassist and songwriter Mickey Yu, 32, of hip-hop band Community Service says his grandfather was beaten during White Terror interrogations, although never convicted. His group will sing their own political compositions as well as previously banned song "Hometown at Dusk"-popular with those who were blacklisted and forced to live overseas during the purges. "History definitely cannot be forgotten," said Yu. "It should be a lesson for all." — AFP
