'BARRAK ATTACKER' COMMITS SUICIDE IN SOLITARY CELL

KUWAIT: The interior ministry's security media and public relations department said a 28-year-old non-Kuwaiti inmate committed suicide at the Central Jail yesterday using his blan-ket. He was being held in solitary confinement. The depart-ment said the inmate was doing a two-year sentence for drug abuse and that relevant security forces are currently investi gating the matter to find out the motive for the suicide. Further investigations are in progress. According to unconfirmed reports on social media, the deceased was a Syrian inmate who had allegedly attacked

deceased was a syrian inmate who had allegediy attacked former opposition MP Musallam Al-Barrak at the prison last month. Barrak suffered light injuries and was rushed to Farwaniya Hospital. He was later returned to his cell. In a post on Twitter, MP Marzouq Al-Khalifa described the Syrian's suicide as suspicious and demanded an investigation, adding "the case had many questions from the beginning". He called on authorities to increase Barrak's security in prison to prevent any possible retailation.

After the assault last month, Interior Minister Sheikh Khaled Al-Jarrah Al-Sabah had ordered an immediate investigation into the attack, while member of the Assembly's human rights committee MP Mohammad Hayef said the committee discussed the attack and demanded a full investigation. It also decided to send representatives to hear the testimony of Barrak on the matter.

KUWAIT/TEHRAN: Iran's President Hassan Rouhani sent a letter yesterday to HH the Amir of Kuwait Sheikh Sabah Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah, state media reported, a further sign that the two might be trying to defuse tensions between the Islamic Republic and the Gulf Arab states. Predominantly Shite Iran and the Sunni Arab-dominated Gulf countries, notably Saudi Arabia, support opposing sides in conflicts in Syria and Yemen, but in January, Kuwaiti Foreign Minister Sheikh Sabah Al-Khaled Al-Hamad Al-Sabah paid a rare visit to Tehran. He deliv-

rered a message from the Amir to Rouhani, describing a "basis of dialogue" between Gulf Arab states and Iran. Iran's state news agency IRNA said Rouhani replied to the message in the letter delivered by Iran's ambassador yesterday. Kuwait state news agency KUNA said Sheikh Sabah Al-Khaled received Alireza Enayati, and "during the meeting, a letter was delivered addressed to His Highness the Amir Sheikh Sabah Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah from Iranian President Hassan Rouhani^{*}. Neither news agency gave details of the letter's contents. Rouhani visited Oman and Kuwait in February on his first visit to the Gulf states since taking power in 2013. He said Kuwait was among at least 10 countries to have offered to

mediate in Iran's escalating feud with Saudi Arabia. In Tehran, Speaker of Iran's Shura Council Ali Larijani said Iran pursues peaceful policies with neighboring states based on conservative religious principles. In a press conference, Larijan referred to Rouhani's visit to Kuwait and Oman as "nositive" Following the visit, it was decided to continue talks with the foreign ministers of both states, he said.

Referring to the ties with Egypt, Larijani said Tehran wel-comes all moves that would lead to normalizing ties with Cairo. He highlighted Egypt's pivotal role amid the current events in the region. Ties between Cairo and Tehran strained in the wake of Egypt's peace pact with Israel in the late 1970s but conditions have considerably changed since then, Larijan stressed. He also defended Iran's nuclear deal with world powers as a "right decision". — Agencies

HASHEM DEFENDS EXPAT MEDICINE BAN PROPOSAL

KUWAIT: MP Safaa Al-Hashem said yesterday her proposal to ban giving medicines to expatriates at public hospitals and clinics aims at improving health services for Kuwaiti citizens and achieve what she described as "social justice". Hashem, the only woman in the 50-seat National Assembly, proposed a few days ago that the health ministry should stop giving expatriates any medicines at public clinics and hospitals.

She said the KD 1 and KD 2 paid by expatriate patients at clinics and hospitals respectively should be considered as

examination fees to allow them to be seen by doctors. She said expat patients should then purchase the prescribed drugs from private drug stores. Her proposal was harshly criticized as inhuman, especially by online activists. She told a press conference held to explain her proposal that it aims at organizing the medical sector and allowing Kuwaiti patients easy access to the government-run health sector.

Hashem said that what she proposed is nothing new, as all the five Gulf Cooperation Council (GCC) member states are implementing it. In those countries, expatriates are barred from public health services.

SAUDI DEPUTY CROWN PRINCE TO MEET TRUMP

MUBARAK SET TO WALK FREE

CAIRO: Hosni Mubarak, overthrown as president of Egypt in 2011 and the first leader to go on trial in the wake of the Arab Spring, will walk free this week for the first time in six years. The 88-year-old was cleared of murder charges this month in his final court appearance, having stood trial on charges ranging from corruption to ordering the killing of some of the protesters who ended his 30-year rule.

Mubarak was initially arrested in April 2011, two
months after stepping down, and has since been in
prison and military hospitals. "He will go to his home
in Heliopolis," Mubarak's lawyer Farid El-Deeb said,
referring to the Cairo neighborhood where the main
presidential palace from which Mubarak governed is also located. Deeb said the ageing former president could be released today or soon after.

Mubarak still had one more jail sentence to serve, for appropriating funds reserved for maintaining presidential palaces, but time he had spent in detention in connection with the murder charges was sub-tracted from it, judicial sources and the state news agency said. Mubarak was originally sentenced to life in prison in 2012 for conspiring to murder 239 demonstrators during the 18-day revolt. An appeals court ordered a retrial that culminated in 2014 in the case against Mubarak and his senior officials being dropped. An appeal by the public prosecution led to a final retrial by the Court of Cassation, the highest in the country, which acquitted him on March 2.

After the turmoil of the Arab Spring, former Tunisian President Ben Ali fled into exile in Saudi Arabia, Libyan leader Muammar Gaddafi was killed by rebels and former Yemeni President Ali Abdullah Bashar Al-Assad still holds the title of president in Syria that lies largely in ruins after years of civil war.

TOKYO: Japan and Saudi Arabia agreed yesterday to explore ways to bolster Japanese investment and trade in the Middle Eastern nation, possibly by setting up special economic zones there. King Salman and about a thousand businesspeople from Saudi Arabia are in Japan for talks this week focusing on the economy, as the country seeks a less oil-dependent growth strategy. Japanese Prime Minister Shinzo Abe told King Salman that Japan wants to "vigorously advance its ties with Saudi Arabia, which is the linchpin of stabil-ity in the Middle East". The visit is the first by a Saudi king in 46 years, though Salman visited more recently as crown prince.

The two leaders agreed to promote Japanese investment, research and manu-facturing, possibly through special economic zones. They also agreed to seek a possible share listing of Saudi Aramco, the state-run

oil company that is being partially privatized, on the Tokyo Stock Exchange. The two countries also will cooperate in promoting renewable energy as well as seawater desalination by Japanese companies. King Salman met with Japanese Foreign Minister

Fumio Kishida earlier yesterday. Separately, Saudi Arabia's sovereign wealth fund and Japanese telecoms provider Softbank have joined forces in set-ting up a \$25 billion private fund for technology investments. Saudi Arabia is one of Japan's biggest suppliers of crude oil, accounting for about a third of its imports of oil from the Middle East. Trade between the countries fell last year as oil prices dropped. Japanese imports from Saudi Arabia totaled 2.1 trillion yen (\$18.6 billion) in 2016, mostly oil and gas, compared to exports of 546.3 billion yen (\$4.8 billion).

KUWAIT: Kuwait's Foreign Ministry and the German Government have signed a visa-exemption agreement for holders of diplomatic and private passports from both countries. The agreement was signed by Kuwait's Deputy Foreign Minister Khaled Al-Jarallah and the Ambassador of Germany to Kuwait Karlfried Bergner.

PILOT DESCRIBES THE DAY SHEIKH JABER RETURNED TO KUWAIT AFTER LIBERATION

KUWAIT: Twenty-six years have passed since the fateful day when the late Amir His Highness Sheikh Jaber Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah returned to Kuwait, marking a historical movement in the liberation of the country from the Iraqi aggressors.

On March 14, 1991, Captain Falah Al-Shemmeri - the pilot who flew Sheikh Jaber back to Kuwait on the aircraft Boubyan - felt and knew he was on a patriotic mission to bring the leader of the Kuwaiti back home. "I was informed about the flight two days prior and I knew that I will be part of the significant historical movement to finalize the act of liberation," Shemmeri reminisced about the moment during an interview.

It was a 25-minutes flight from Dhahran, Saudi Arabia to Kuwait, "but the sense of national duty was filling me with pride and joy," said the pilot. He added that despite the skies being dark because of the heinous Iraqi act of burning the oil fields in Kuwait, he was determined to touchdown as soon as possible for the sake of the country and its people. —KUNA

CABINET INSTRUCTS **ENERGY EFFICIENCY**

KUWAIT: The Kuwaiti cabinet has asked the Ministry of Electricity and Water to work with other concerned bodies to put the country's energy efficiency program in place. It has also asked the ministry to send it a bimonthly report on steps and measures taken in this regard, primarily the improvement of air-conditioning and lighting technologies nationwide. This came during a regular cabinet meeting held at Bayan Palace yesterday under the chairmanship of His Highness the Prime Minister Sheikh Jaber Al-Mubarak Al-Hamad Al-Sabah.

Emerging from the meeting, Minister of State for Cabinet Affairs and Acting Minister of Information Sheikh Mohammad Abdullah Al-Mubarak Al-Sabah said in a press statement that the cabinet was apprised of a letter sent to His Highness the Amir from Iranian President Hassan Rouhani on the latter's recent visit to Kuwait. They were also informed about a letter addressed to His Highness the Amir from French President Francois Hollande, congratulating Kuwait on the occasion of the National Day, the minister said.

Locally, the cabinet mourned the death of General Mohammad Abdulaziz Al-Bader last Friday, remembering with all appreciation his

sincere and national efforts and great sacrifices during the heinous Iraqi invasion of Kuwait. The ministers were also notified by His Highness the Amir's accompanying delegations during a visit to Turkey on March 20-22, and a visit to Jordan to attend the coming Arab summit on March 28-29.

The ministers then listened to a briefing from His Highness the Prime Minister on the outcomes of a recent visit by Pakistani Prime Minister Nawaz Sharif to Kuwait, and his official talks with Kuwaiti officials on bilateral relations as well Arab, Islamic and international issues of mutual interest.

First Deputy Prime Minister and Foreign Minister Sheikh Sabah Al-Khaled Al-Hamad Al-Sabah briefed the cabinet on the outcomes of his talks with New Zealand's Foreign Minister Murray McCully during the latter's recent visit to Kuwait.

Internationally, the cabinet discussed several political reports on the latest Arab and international developments, and condemned a recent attack on a military base in Mali, which left a number of soldiers killed or wounded. In this context, the cabinet reiterated Kuwait's unshakable position based on rejecting all forms and manifestations of terrorism. —KUNA

FIVE COMPANIES COMPETE FOR PARK MAINTENANCE CONTRACT

KUWAIT: Five local companies qualified by the Central Tenders Committee (CTC) are currently competing to win a tender for landscaping, maintenance and irrigation at Al-Shaheed Park, while 10 other companies were disqualified for various reasons such as filing incomplete documents, owning small nurseries, not achieving any projects over the past five years or lack of experience in doing Amiri Diwan projects over the past five years. CTC set March 26 as the deadline for disqualified companies to file grievances.

Court order upheld

The court of cassation yesterday upheld an appeals court order which acquitted former MP Saleh Al-Mulla from charges of slandering His Highness the Amir Sheikh Sabah Al-Ahmad Al-Sabah and Egypt. The public prosecution had challenged the appeal court's verdict, but the cassation court, whose rulings are final, rejected the challenge.

TWELVE RECOMMENDATIONS TO SOLVE DEMOGRAPHIC IMBALANCE

COURT ORDERS TREATMENT FOR EXPAT GIRL

KUWAIT: A study prepared by the research department at the Ministry of State for National Assembly Affairs about Kuwait' demography made 12 recommendations to solve the problem. They include determining the local market's actual need of expat laborers, holding visa traffickers and fake companies legally accountable, exerting more efforts in deporting marginal laborers, and lifting travel bans filed against people with expired residencies before deporting them. Furthermore, they include linking the outcome of education to actual local market needs, resolving the problem of illegal residents, increasing the percentage of national workers in the market, making further decisions to encourage Kuwaiti youth join technical colleges and institutes after finishing high school and limiting the exaggerated recruitment of domestic helpers. The recommendations also included encouraging more citizens to join the private sector, setting a timetable to stop hiring expats in the private sector and stopping transfers from government projects to the private sector.

Treatment costs

The comprehensive court yesterday passed a sentence compelling the Ministry of Health (MoH) to provide medical treatment to an expat girl who cannot afford the cost of a surgery. The court explained that the girl's case was a humane one regardless whether she can pay the fees or not. In other news, the constitutional court yesterday used a new name for people with special needs, describing them as 'disability challengers' in a sentence it passed cancelling an article in the law, and ordered paying equal allowances to 'disability challengers' belonging to the same family.

The educational affairs director at the Capital educational zone Laila Al-Shareef stressed finishing the preparation of the new primary stage charter. Shareef added that the educational zone also started providing enough teaching staff members to understaffed schools in collaboration with the Ministry of Education. Meanwhile, Islamic Studies supervisor Dr Jassem Al-Mesbah called for increasing the number of Quran lessons taught in the intermediate and secondary stages to two per week instead of only one, because the Holy Quran is one of the most important subjects students should learn.

Blacklisted companies

The Ministry of Electricity and Water (MEW) announced preparing blacklists of companies faltering in projects they were hired to execute for various MEW sectors and submit them to the Central Tenders Committee (CTC) so that they could be blacklisted and disqualified for further tenders. The ministry's announcement was made in response to inquiries made by the parliamentary budgets. MEW also stressed its keenness on studying each applying company's resume, credibility and previous projects.

Cities' projects

The Public Authority for Housing Welfare (PAHW) finished applying the final touches on preparations made to attract local and international investors in a special ceremony it intends to hold next week at a hotel to make a presentation about its experience in Jaber Al-Ahmad and Sabah Al-Ahmad cities.

New directors

Kuwait Petroleum International's (KPI) CEO Bakheet Al-Rashidi issued an administrative directive reshuffling two managing directors to company operation sites worldwide. The directive included appointing Azzam Al-Mutawa as the company's managing director in Italy

and appointing the managing director for international operations Fadhel Faraj as managing director in northwestern Europe. In addition, it appointed Nasser bin Botain as director of the aviation fuel company and transferred Ayman Al-Qattan from Netherlands back to the headquarters in Kuwait to work as treasury and finance manager.

Violations

Head of the parliament's committee formed to investigate the Ministry of Health's (MoH) violations MP Saadoun Hammad said the committee members agreed to travel to the overseas health offices in Germany, Washington, Paris and London to investigate violations committed in the period of 2013-2017, before summoning the health minister and the Audit Bureau to discuss them. Hammad added that the committee would also investigate violations made in nursing contracts, the Afya retiree health insurance program, Adan Hospital and Audit Bureau reports. Meanwhile, MP Osama Al-Shaheen urged all investigation committee members to resign from the committee in case of any conflicts of interest.

KUNA's budget

The head of the parliament's budgets and final statements committee MP Adanan Abdulsamad said that the committee discussed KUNA's budget for 2017-2018 and its final statement for the fiscal year 2015-2016. Abdulsamad added that the committee found that KUNA had rejected appointing a Civil Service Commission (CSC) supervisor to monitor recruitment affairs. KUNA also exceeded the budget set by the finance ministry by rehiring 20 former retired employees at higher wages and more incentives. Abdulsamad said that the committee noticed some malfunctioning in funding KUNA's offices abroad through transferring funds to some employees personal bank accounts with the excuse that some countries do not allow opening bank accounts for the agency.



WHO CREATED TERRORISM?

s it enough that clergymen, religious experts and other religious men warn of terrorism in order to fight it? Is it enough that these people sermonize the public in mosques and through other media about how clement and tolerant Islam is? Is it enough that they keep arguing that terrorist groups of various Islamic doctrines do not actually represent true Islam and that describing others as non-believers, terrifying and assaulting innocent people is not part of Islam? Is it enough, at a time when 'violence sheikhs' are instigating youth to join terrorists' dens and die in the process for them, that our sheikhs follow such simple procedures to restrain the terrorism'tsunami'?

Drying up terrorism resources in such a monotonous and naive manner, or even blaming the 'tumult sheikhs' for spreading terrorism is but an attempt to simplify a very complicated issue, because 'terrorism sheikhs' do not have magic lanterns through which genies come out to spread their ideas amongst people. They have communicated with the society and managed to impact individuals through methods and media such as

mosque pulpits, satellite TV channels, radio, newspapers, schools, co-ops, charities and youth camps right under the governments' noses and within the jurisdiction of governments that had turned a blind eye for long and greatly contributed in turning Arab communities from a state of clemency into one of hate!

Such ugly and terrifying changes happened right before Arab governments that had neglected the importance of spreading the culture of enlightenment, which paved the way for extremists to spread their own obscurantist ideas. A sheikh promoting violence and tumult would never be able to brainwash a well-aware and balanced young man enjoying patriotic awareness - one who had learned the significance of respecting women from his father, learned how to reject hatred and respect others from his mother, learned about clemency, values and respecting the law at school, got used to listening to music and appreciate arts and take part in scout camps without being left alone by the state or his family to fall victim to terror camps organized by radical organizations! — *Translated by Kuwait Times*

GCC-IRAQI NORMALIZATION

any analysts considered the Saudi Foreign Minister Adel Al-Jubair's visit to Baghdad as a political surprise that surely had various political indications including setting a roadmap that might reform the region, especially after President Trump came to office. In addition, victories achieved by the Iraqi army in Mosul and destroying the last of IS strongholds in Iraq would increase Baghdad's strategic value and suggest its return as a regional pivotal power, especially if the Iraqi government succeeds in resolving some barbed domestic issues such as growing sectarianism and achieving political stability.

Regional sectarian expansion opens wide for Saudi Arabia to have some Iraqi factions take greater roles in politics in a way that would enhance security, namely in central Iraqi governorates. In addition, Iraqi experience in fighting terrorism and the data its intelligence owns after hunting the leaders of several insurgent groups such as IS, is surely of great interest to both Riyadh and Washington.

The other element about the visit concerns Iraqi-Iranian relations in a bid to politically and strategically contain Iran, because relations between them are probably the strongest for Iraqis, and this might have been the reason behind the relatively cold relations Iraq had with GCC states, namely Saudi Arabia, since the fall of Saddam Hussein.

It might be difficult to completely shift the Iraqi compass to the exact opposite direction so soon, because Iraqis have their own remarks about some hot regional issues.

Therefore, regardless of guessing and speculating about this visit, reason, logic and regional situations call for activating the role of diplomacy and opening for more dialogue concerning regional issues and concerns no matter how complicated and crossed they are. With its deeprooted strategic significance, Iraq is qualified to regain a pivotal Arab and regional role if it manages to get over terrorism and manages to politically build its domestic fronts.

Therefore, It is for everybody's good interest to invest in the regional opening to Iraq because of its relations with Iran for one, and with the aim of normalizing relations with GCC states, namely its direct neighbor Saudi Arabia, in addition to rehabilitating its relations with Turkey, because who else knows better about domestic and foreign war atrocities? — Translated by Kuwait Times

TURKEY-NETHERLANDS CRISIS DEEPENS

EU warns Erdogan • Ankara 'should re-evaluate' migrant deal

ISTANBUL: The European Union yesterday warned President Recep Tayyip Erdogan to avoid inflammatory rhetoric as a diplomatic crisis between Turkey and the Netherlands deepened over the blocking of Turkish ministers from holding rallies to win support for plans to expand his powers. Erdogan at the weekend twice accused NATO ally Netherlands of acting like the Nazis, comments that sparked outrage in a country bombed and occupied by German forces in World War II.

In an escalating standoff that risks damaging Turkey's already deteriorating relations with the European Union ahead of the April 16 referendum on constitutional change, Brussels sternly warned Ankara to avoid making the situation worse. In apparent reference to Erdogan's comments, EU foreign policy chief Federica Mogherini and EU Enlargement Commissioner Johannes Hahn called on Turkey to "refrain from excessive statements and actions that risk further exacerbating the situation. "It is essential to

avoid further escalation and find ways to calm down the situation," their statement added.

But Turkey's EU Affairs Minister Omer Celik responded by warning that Ankara "should reevaluate" a key part of a 2016 deal to stem the flow of migrants to the European Union. He said Turkey should look at its policy on preventing migrant flows across land borders, although it would keep halting the illegal and dangerous sea crossings as a matter of human responsibility, state media said. NATO chief Jens Stoltenberg also urged Turkey and its NATO allies to "show mutual respect, to be calm and have a measured approach to contribute to de-escalate the ten-

Envoy summoned three times

The Dutch authorities had at the weekend prevented the plane of Turkish Foreign Minister Mevlut Cavusoglu from landing and blocked Family Minister Fatma Betul Sayan Kaya from holding a rally in Rotterdam. The ministers had been seeking to harness the support of an estimated 400,000 people of Turkish origin living in the country ahead of the April 16 referendum on constitutional changes giving Erdogan greater powers. The Turkish foreign ministry yesterday summoned the Dutch envoy to Ankara for the third day in a row, handing two separate protest notes over The Hague's behavior. The Netherlands yesterday also issued a new travel warning to Dutch citizens in Turkey, urging them to stay "alert across the whole of Turkey". Turkey has already responded furiously to fellow NATO ally Germany's refusal to give permission for ministers to hold rallies there, with Erdogan comparing such action to "Nazi practices". After Erdogan used the same language to scold the Netherlands, German Chancellor Angela Merkel said on Monday that the comparison was "completely wrong" and "banalizes suffering". "This is particularly unacceptable directed at the Netherlands which suffered so much" under the Nazis, she added, offering Dutch Prime Minister

Mark Rutte her full support.

'Lifeline for Erdogan'

The issue risks spiralling into a crisis with the EU as a whole, which Turkey has sought to join for more than half a century in a so far fruitless membership bid. Denmark has also asked Turkish Prime Minister Binali Yildirim to postpone a visit planned for later this month. Erdogan, who has indicated he may personally travel to EU states to address rallies - in a move that could inflame the situation further - said Sunday that the West was showing its "true face" in the standoff.

He has repeatedly accused the Netherlands of acting like "fascists" and "Nazis", saying on Sunday: "I had thought that the era of Nazism was over but I was wrong." Deputy Prime Minister Nurettin Canikli described Europe as a "very sick man", a nod to the moniker used in the mid-19th century of the declining Ottoman Empire as the "sick man of Europe". Rutte, under

pressure to take a hard line against Erdogan as he faces the far-right populist Geert Wilders in general elections tomorrow, said there were no apologies to be made to Turkey. He called for Dutch voters to be the first to stop Europe's "trend of populism" but dismissed the idea that Turkey was trying to interfere in the Netherlands elections. Bringing out the millions-strong expatriate vote could be key in a referendum that is expected to be close and potentially a turning point in Turkey's modern history.

Analysts have said Erdogan is using the crisis to show that his strong leadership is needed against a Europe which he presents as being innately hostile to Turkey. "Erdogan is looking for 'imagined' foreign enemies to boost his nationalist base in the run up to the April 16 referendum," Soner Cagaptay, director of the Turkish Research Programme at The Washington Institute, told AFP. "By blocking (the rallies), they may have given Erdogan a lifeline to eke out a victory in the referendum," he added. —AFP

IRAQI FORCES ADVANCE IN MOSUL, SEARCH FOR MILITANTS AND BOMBS

MOSUL: Iraqi forces said yesterday that they have taken more territory from militants and were searching for militants and bombs on the edge of the Old City as they press an offensive in west Mosul. They are also striking IS with armed drones as part of a renewed push launched on March 5 that has forced the jihadists out of several neighborhoods and key sites, including the famed Mosul museum. West Mosul is the most-populated urban area still held by the jihadists, followed by Syria's Raqqa, which is also a key target in the US-led anti-IS campaign.

Iraq's Joint Operations Command announced additional gains on Monday, saying that forces from the elite Counter-Terrorism Service had recaptured west Mosul's Al-Nafat neighborhood. Lieutenant General Raed Shakir Jawdat said that forces from the Rapid Response Division, another special forces unit, and the federal police were working to search and clear territory on the edge of Mosul's Old City. The forces are conducting "combing and search operations in the liberated areas of Bab Al-Toub, searching for traps and mines and terrorists hiding among the people", Jawdat said in a statement.

The Old City - a warren of narrow streets and closely spaced buildings where hundreds of thousands of civilians are believed to still be living - could see some of the toughest fighting of the campaign to retake Iraq's second city. The commander also said that armed observation drones are being used to monitor and strike IS, as Iraqi forces also targeted jihadist defenses and positions with field artillery and rockets. He did not specify what type of drones were being used.

More than 68,000 people have fled west Mosul since Feb 25, streaming to camps around the city, according to the International Organization for Migration. But that is only a small fraction of the 750,000 people who were estimated to still be in west Mosul at the time the operation was launched. While CTS and Rapid Response are spearheading the advance inside Mosul, Iraqi army forces and pro-government paramilitaries are fighting IS to the west. Soldiers from the 9th Armoured Division scored an important victory on Saturday night when they cut the last road out of west Mosul, said Brett McGurk, the US envoy to the international anti-IS coalition. —AFP

ALEPPO DARES TO DREAM OF END TO SYRIA WAR

ALEPPO: When the army recaptured Aleppo in December, Mohammad Baqdul left Beirut and returned with his family to his native city, convinced the end of Syria's six-year war was near. Baqdul fled Syria's second city when rebels overran its east in 2012, posing one of the most serious threats yet to the government of President Bashar Al-Assad. But four years later, the tables have turned. Assad's forces have recaptured the whole city, shattering rebel dreams of toppling the regime and putting the brutal war on a new trajectory.

"When I heard Aleppo had been secured, I thought the war was on the brink of ending, so I brought my family back," says Baqdul, speaking to AFP in the once rebelheld quarter of Shaar. The devastation in Shaar is striking: its dusty streets are flanked by flattened buildings and piles of rubble. Baqdul stands proudly with his young daughter in front of his new brick shop, welcoming residents who are buying materials to fix up their homes.

'People are tired'

Syria's war erupted on March 15, 2011 with peaceful demonstrations that, after a violent crackdown by government security forces, transformed into an armed uprising. In six years, the multi-front war has become one of the most destructive conflicts of the 21st century. Backed by Turkey, the Gulf and some Western nations, Syrian rebels were at their strongest in 2012 and many thought they would march to Damascus.

But Assad's powerful allies came to the rescue: Iran sent military advisers and fighters, Lebanon's Shiite militant group Hezbollah joined forces and Russia began a deadly bombing campaign in support of Damascus in 2015. That support was key to retaking Aleppo, allowing the government to consolidate its upper hand by seizing other strategic territory, including from Islamic State group militants in northern Syria.

While swathes of the country remain embroiled in violence, Syria's government has decidedly won the crux

of the conflict. Aleppo, meanwhile, has become a symbol of the most destructive streak of the war - but some have found a silver lining.

"I think the war is heading toward an end, because people are tired and they prefer to stay where they are instead of being displaced again," said Ibrahim Amoura, a 35-year-old laborer. He spoke to AFP while working on a ceiling in the formerly rebel-held district of Karm al-Jabal. For years, residents of Karm al-Jabal had only heard the sounds of gunfire and bombardment. Now, the nearly-incessant whirring of generators, cement mixers and pounding hammers fill their days.

'Reconstruction will take time'

A larger-than-life portrait of Assad with Russian President Vladimir Putin in the background looks over what was once Aleppo's front line, teeming with military vehicles and Russian soldiers. The municipality is eager to erase all trace of the former fault line that split the city for years between the government-held west and rebel-controlled east. But the divide is powerful: buildings in the west were indeed damaged by rebel rockets, but the east has been totally ravaged, reduced to rows of crumbling buildings nearly indistinguishable from each other.

Water remains a precious commodity in Aleppo, cut off

for almost two months by IS jihadists who controlled the main pumping station further east. Government forces recaptured the pump at Khafsah last week and have pledged to repair the lines. For now, residents still queue up at local distributors with tanks to fill up. State electricity is equally rare, and generators are cropping up across the city. For Aleppo's deputy governor Abdulghani Kassab, "reuniting Aleppo is a turning point in the Syrian crisis because it's our second city, the economic and cultural capital." "Residents are full of energy and optimism... Reconstruction will take time, but we will work hard," he told AFP.

'Mother of all revolutionaries'

For rebels living just outside the city, Aleppo's fall was indeed a turning point - but instead of a harbinger of stability, it was a death knell for their dreams of Assad's ouster. "Aleppo was the mother of all revolutionaries. Losing her really was like losing our mother," said Abu Maria, a 30-year-old Islamist rebel.

Thomas Pierret, a Syria expert at the University of Edinburgh, told AFP that "Aleppo symbolized hope for the opposition that it could position itself as an alternative to the regime". "It's this same hope that was shattered in December, that reduced the uprising to a peripheral insurrection," Pierret said.

The opposition "dreamt of building an administration that could compete with Damascus", said Fabrice Balanche, a Syria expert at the Washington Institute. "But the defeat (in Aleppo) shattered their morale. Around Damascus, the surrenders are multiplying," he said. According to Balanche, regime forces now control 36 percent of Syria's territory, with IS in second place at 29 percent, Kurdish forces at 23 percent and rebels with only 12 percent. Back in the devastated northern city, Aleppo's municipal council has planted rows of lemon and orange trees by a bridge. Mohammad Jassem Mohammad, a 43-year-old municipal employee, is watering them patiently. "This is the sign that life is returning," he says. — AFP

CAR BOMB KILLS 6 NEAR HOTEL IN MOGADISHU

MOGADISHU: A suicide car bomber detonated near a hotel in Somalia's capital yesterday morning, killing at least six people and injuring four others, police said. The bomber detonated near the Weheliye hotel on the busy Maka Almukarramah road, Capt Mohamed Hussein said. Ambulances rushed to the scene. The Al-Qaeda-linked Islamic extremist group Al-Shabab claimed responsibility for the blast, according to the group's Andalus radio. The group has often targeted hotels in Mogadishu, including a hotel attack in late January that killed at least 26 people.

In a separate blast yesterday morning, a suicide bomber detonated a minibus laden with explosives at the gate of a military camp south of the capital. The bomber was killed and two people were wounded, said

Col. Yusuf Burhan, a Somali military officer. Somalia's new Prime Minister Hassan Ali Khaire condemned the two attacks, saying they were carried out by "bloodthirsty groups."

Despite being ousted from most of its key strongholds in south and central Somalia, Al-Shabab continue to carry out deadly guerrilla attacks across the country. In the past couple of years it has started to target checkpoints and bases of both the Somali military and the multinational African Union force. Al-Shabab pose a major challenge to Somalia's new President Mohamed Abdullahi Mohamed, who has vowed to make security a priority in this Horn of Africa country as the fragile central government seeks to expand its control outside key areas like the capital. — AP

MOROCCO COURT TRIES 25 OVER W SAHARA KILLINGS

RABAT: A Moroccan court yesterday resumed the trial of 25 Sahrawis accused of killing 13 people, mostly Moroccan security forces, in the contested Western Sahara's Gdeim Izik camp in 2010. The killings allegedly took place during riots that broke out as security forces cleared the camp near the city of Laayoune in Nov 2010. The Court of Appeal in Sale, near the capital Rabat, was packed with lawyers, relatives of victims and defendants, observers, journalists and security forces as the hearing began.

The courtroom was dominated by a giant screen broadcasting the hearing. Knives, axes, road signs and hard disks were presented as evidence. Outside, supporters of the two camps, separated by a line of policemen,

exchanged slogans and insults. "No to impunity for killers!" shouted dozens of victims' relatives, waving Moroccan flags and pictures of soldiers killed. "Freedom for political prisoners!" shouted a crowd of Sahrawi

A military court in 2013 sentenced the 25 defendants to punishment ranging from 20 years to life imprisonment following a high-profile legal drama. International NGOs condemned the trial as "unfair", and in July the Court of Cassation ordered a new trial in a civilian court. Defense lawyers yesterday said they had little faith that the new trial would deliver justice. The trial "is taking place in very unfair conditions, but we remain at the defendants' side," they said. — AFP

DROUGHT CRUSHES LIVES OF HERDERS IN SOMALIA

'DYING ONE BY ONE'

BANDAR BEYLA, Somalia: Ahmed Haji turns from his visibly dehydrated animals and whispers: "I am lost." Trying to flee the worsening drought, he trekked thousands of kilometers with a herd that once numbered 1,200. But hundreds perished during the arduous trip to Puntland, in northern Somalia, in search of greener pasture. The land here dried up not long after he arrived, leaving his animals weak from hunger and thirst. "They are now dying one by one," the 30-year-old said, shading his face from the scorching sun. His goats drank water from a plastic barrel and picked dry leaves from plants nearby.

"I don't even think these remaining ones will survive in the next two months," Haji said. He left his wife and five children behind on his eightday trek, fearing they wouldn't survive. Now he wonders about himself. Somalia has declared this drought a national disaster, part of what the United Nations calls the largest humanitarian crisis since the world body was founded in 1945.

An estimated 6 million people in this Horn of Africa nation, or about half the population, need aid amid warnings of a full-blown famine. Two consecutive seasons of poor rainfall, longer in some areas, have caused large-scale crop failures, the UN humanitarian agency says. It is not clear how many people, or animals, have died so far. Animals are central to many in Somalia. The United Nations says more than half the population is engaged in the livestock industry. The drought threatens their main sources of nutrition and survival.

Many wells have dried up, forcing herders to risk long treks to remote areas. Water prices have spiked, with a single water tanker now going for \$150. The hot wind blows across the vast, barren land and carcasses of animals. "The sad reality of the drought this severe, this long, this enduring is we're starting to see these massive livestock deaths, livestock losses. Fifty, 60, 70 percent of livestock herds dying, which is an enormous hit for these pastoral families," said Richard Trenchard, the UN Food and Agriculture Organization representative in Somalia.

The mass animal deaths, from hunger and thirst as well as disease, have caused herders to lose "just about everything", Trenchard said, standing beside the carcass of a camel. Even though rains are expected in mid-April, there are

fears that effects of a heavy downpour could kill already weakened animals. With their livestock gone, herders are ending up in camps with shortages of food, medicine and safe drinking water. "Our journey here was so rough. There was no transport or water. We left behind everything. We are here now and we don't have any proper shelter or transport," said Dahiya Ahmed, a 48-year-old mother of eight at a camp in Qardho town. She once herded 200 goats but now has just six. "The few of them that are still alive are too weak and cannot provide us with milk and meat," she said. "They are just still alive but cannot benefit us at all."

With the rise of disease-related deaths among the remaining animals, the United

Nations is planning a major animal vaccination intervention. Some herders are being given basic training on vaccinating their animals and giving oral medications on their own. "Hungry animals, starving animals are very vulnerable, very prone to disease," Trenchard said.

Around two million animals are targeted for treatment against parasites, infectious disease and wounds, said Khalid Saeed, the FAO livestock sector coordinator, as he gave medicine to sick and weakened animals. Somalia is part of a massive \$4 billion aid appeal launched last month for four nations suffering from conflict and hunger. The others are Nigeria, Yemen and South Sudan, where famine already has been declared in two counties. — AP

BRITISH BOYCOTT SUPPORTER REFUSED ENTRY TO ISRAEL

JERUSALEM: A British activist who advocates boycotting Israel over its occupation of Palestinian territory has been denied entry to the country, authorities said yesterday. Hugh Lanning, head of the London-based Palestine Solidarity Campaign (PSC), was denied entry on Sunday night at Ben Gurion airport in Tel Aviv over his "ongoing actions to promote boycotts against Israel", the immigration authority said. He flew back to London yesterday morning, authority spokeswoman Sabin Hadad said.

"The organization Mr Lanning heads is one of the leading anti-Israel delegitimization and BDS (Boycott, Divestment and Sanctions) organisations in Britain, and one of the largest in Europe," a joint statement from the immigration authority and the strategic affairs ministry said. It also accused Lanning of maintaining ties to leaders of Hamas, the Palestinian

Islamist group that runs the Gaza Strip.

The PSC condemned what it called an "undemocratic" decision and called on the British government to intervene. "The PSC will not stop raising its voice to highlight the systematic violation of Palestinian human rights in Gaza, the West Bank, and Israel itself," its

director Ben Jamal said in a statement. Israel has carried out a campaign against calls to boycott the Jewish state over its 50-year occupation of Palestinian territory.

It sees the boycott movement as a strategic threat and accuses it of anti-Semitism - a claim activists deny, saying they only want to see the occupation end.

Last week, parliament adopted a law barring entry to foreigners who support boycotting Israel, a move denounced by human rights groups and the opposition as "thought control" harmful to the country's international standing. "If Israel believes that by introducing these draconian undemocratic laws it will intimidate its critics into silence, it is mistaken," Jamal said.

Lanning was however not stopped due to the new law but instead on the discretion of Interior Minister Aryeh Deri and Strategic Affairs Minister Gilad Erdan, who can bar those they see as working to harm Israel, Hadad said. Israeli politicians have become more combative against BDS activists under Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu's current coalition government, seen as the most right-wing in the country's history. — AFP

FLORIDA SPENT \$240M ON LAWYERS

TALLAHASSEE, Florida: Gov. Rick Scott and other top Florida Republicans frequently complain about government spending, but they have quietly spent more than \$237 million on private lawyers to advance and defend their agendas, an AP investigation has found. Florida tax-payers also have been forced to reimburse nearly \$16 million for their opponents' private attorney fees. That means an overall \$253 million has been spent on legal fights in the last six years, including a water war with Georgia and losing battles to test welfare recipients for drugs, trim the state's voter registration lists and ban companies that do business with Cuba from bidding on government contracts.

"A quarter of a billion dollars is a gosh lot of money," said Dominic Calabro, president of Florida TaxWatch, a business-backed group that scrutinizes state spending. Much of the state's legal spending doesn't show up in the normal process of assembling the state's \$82 billion budget. Attorney General Pam Bondi oversees a legal budget of nearly \$309 million a year that helps pay for 450 state lawyers, but all that in-house legal firepower hasn't stopped state leaders from hiring private attorneys, and no one in state government is closely tracking what their hourly rates add up to.

"We do not have that information and are unaware of a way to capture expenditures for the purchase of outside legal services that would not entail an exhaustive search of documents," said Whitney Ray, a spokesman for Bondi. The AP came up with the figure by analyzing budget documents and the results of public records requests. The AP review found that Florida has spent more than \$237 million on outside lawyering since 2011, a figure that averages to nearly \$40 million a year, plus nearly \$16 million reimbursing private attorney fees on opposing sides.

Hiring private counsel in expenditures that fall outside the normal budget process seems common in state governments around the country, though perhaps not on the same scale as during the Scott administration. New York has spent more than \$86 million since 2012, or about \$17 million a year, on outside lawyering, according to that state's comptroller. California's Democratic leaders recently approved payments of \$25,000 a month to former U.S. Attorney General Eric Holder and his law firm to defend the state's interests against President Donald Trump's policies.

'Runaway train'

In Florida, it was the soaring cost of the state's water war against Georgia - more than \$41 million in the last 18 months alone - that started to raise eyebrows when the Department of Environmental Protection sought more money in January. Rep Carlos Trujillo, a Miami Republican and House budget chief, called the department's legal spending a "runaway train". His response when told that the overall state tab for private legal fees is about a quarter-billion dollars? "Insane," Trujillo said. Trujillo said "nobody is disputing" that defending Florida's water rights is important, but "as taxpayers and constituents, we have the right to ask: 'Is it necessary, are we overpaying?""

House Speaker Richard Corcoran, who ordered a legislative review, was even more blunt: "We are getting gouged, and that needs to be fixed." A spokeswoman for Scott, Jackie Schutz, sought to downplay the outside legal costs during Scott's administration, saying that private law firms are sometimes necessary "when there are complex legal matters or specific expertise needed." "It's no surprise that our office vigorously defends the laws we sign," she said.

The decades-long water dispute took a new and expensive turn when Scott asked the US Supreme Court in 2013 to limit the water Georgia takes from the Apalachicola, Chattahoochee and Flint river basin. Florida argues that Georgia has guzzled more than its share of water at the expense of Florida's oyster industry. Bondi's office handed the case over to one of the world's most prestigious firms, Latham & Watkins, whose lawyers charge up to \$825 an hour. The firm's bills to date almost doubled the funding Scott personally requested in late 2014 to repair the Apalachicola Bay watershed.

Scott, an attorney and multimillionaire businessman who ran one of the nation's largest for-profit hospital chains, has backed the use of taxpayer money to bolster the state's legal team with private attorneys for defending his initiatives, despite the rising costs. "It's important to make sure that Florida gets the water it deserves," Scott said. Ryan Matthews, the interim secretary for the Department of Environmental Protection, said last week that his staff "carefully reviews every invoice". He also said that since July 2015, DEP has denied more than \$3 million in legal expenses and hourly charges.

A spokesman for Bondi's office noted that her agency's lawyers are assigned to duties such as handling criminal appeals and Medicaid fraud cases. Bondi's office must approve the hiring of outside attorneys by state agencies. Her office keeps a list of outside lawyers hired and hourly fees charged. But no one keeps track of the overall spending. The governor, Legislature and other state elected officials, such as Agriculture Commissioner Adam Putnam, do not have to report their spending on legal fees to the state's chief legal officer.

To capture that total, the AP sought public records on all the firms hired and outside lawyers used. It asked agencies how much they spent. The office of Florida's Chief Financial Officer Jeff Atwater maintains a website where the public can see spending on individual contracts, and provided information on legal settlements. Calabro said the state may be hiring outside counsel for good reasons, but the cost of this lawyering "has hardly gotten any attention" by either Democrats or Republicans. — AP

ABRUPT DISMISSALS LEAVE US ATTORNEYS SCRAMBLING

Trump tried to call Bharara before firing him

WASHINGTON: Two days before Attorney General Jeff Sessions ordered dozens of the country's top federal prosecutors to clean out their desks, he gave those political appointees a pep talk during a conference call. The seemingly abrupt about-face Friday left the affected US attorneys scrambling to brief the people left behind and say goodbye to colleagues. It also could have an impact on morale for the career prosecutors who now must pick up the slack, according to some close to the process. The quick exits aren't expected to have a major impact on ongoing prosecutions, but they gave US attorneys little time to prepare deputies who will take over until successors are named.

"It's very, very gut-level reaction," said Steven Schleicher, a former prosecutor who left Minnesota US Attorney Andrew Luger's office in January and was still in contact with people there. The request for resignations from the 46 prosecutors who were holdovers from the Obama administration wasn't shocking. It's fairly customary for the 93 US attorneys to leave their posts once a new president is in office, and many had already left or were making plans for their departures. Sessions himself was asked to resign as a US attorney in a similar purge by Attorney General Janet Reno in 1993.

But the abrupt nature of the dismissals -done with little explanation and not always with a customary thanks for years of service -stunned and angered some of those left behind in offices around the country. Former prosecutors, friends and colleagues immediately started reaching out to each other on a growing email chain to express condolences and support, commiserating about how unfair they felt the situation was. One US attorney was out of state on Friday and was forced to say goodbye to his office by a blast email, said Tim Purdon, a former US attorney

from North Dakota who was included on the email chain. Some of those ousted were long-time prosecutors who had spent their careers coming up through the ranks of the Justice Department. John W Vaudreuil, US attorney for the Western District of Wisconsin, became an assistant US attorney in that office in 1980. Another, Richard S Hartunian of the Northern District of New York, joined the Justice Department in the 1990s. "All of these US attorneys know they serve at the pleasure of the president. No one complains about that," said John Walsh, an Obama-era appointee as US attorney in Colorado who resigned in July.

"But it was handled in a way that was disrespectful to the US attorneys because they were almost treated as though they had done something wrong, when in fact they had not."

something wrong, when in fact they had not."
Peter Neronha, who had served since 2009
as US attorney for Rhode Island, said even
before Friday he had been preparing for his
eventual departure and had written a resignation statement to be released upon his exit.
He said he knew his time was limited but had
been eager to stay on to see through a major
public corruption prosecution and to speak
with students about the perils of opioid
addiction. "When that was done, I was going

to go anyway - whether I got 24 hours' notice, or two weeks' notice, or two months' notice. It doesn't really matter," Neronha said. Whenever there's a change in presidential administration, he said, "I think it would be unwise not to be ready."

It's not clear why the Justice Department asked the prosecutors to exit so quickly. Sessions gave no warning during the Wednesday conference call in which he articulated his agenda for fighting violent crime. "The attorney general did not mention on that call, 'Stay tuned for changes," Neronha said. Much of the public attention since Friday has focused on Preet Bharara, the highprofile Manhattan federal prosecutor who said he was fired despite meeting with then-President-elect Donald Trump and saying he was asked to remain.

Trump himself did apparently make an attempt to speak with Bharara in advance of the Friday demand for resignations. The president reached out through a secretary on his staff to Bharara a day earlier but the two men never spoke, according to a person told about the conversation but who requested anonymity. The White House on Sunday said the president reached out to thank Bharara for his service and to wish him good luck.

The Justice Department on Friday did say it would not accept the resignations of Dana Boente, now the acting deputy attorney general, and Rod Rosenstein, the Maryland prosecutor who's been nominated for the deputy role. On Sunday, some Democrats condemned the demand for resignations in highly partisan comments.

Maryland Rep Elijah Cummings, the top Democrat on the House Oversight Committee, suggested Trump might have fired Bharara to thwart a potential corruption investigation, and believed the move added to a lack of trust of the administration.—AP

TRUMP ADVISER SAYS, GOVT HAS MANY WAYS TO SURVEIL PEOPLE

WASHINGTON: Senior White House adviser Kellyanne Conway says she doesn't have any evidence to support President Donald Trump's claim that Barack Obama wiretapped Trump Tower phone lines during the election. Instead, Conway is pointing to recent revelations about other government surveillance to suggest it was possible Obama used a different technique. Her response was unlikely to tamp down criticism of Trump's tweets earlier this month. The House intelligence committee has asked the administration to provide evidence of the allegation by Monday.

"The answer is I don't have any evidence and I'm very happy that the House intelligence committee (is) investigating," Conway told ABC's "Good Morning America." She later tweeted that the administration is "pleased" with the ongoing congressional investigation and "will comment after". Trump's critics have slammed the president for making the explosive wiretapping claim on his Twitter account without evidence. Wiretapping a U.S. citizen would require special permission from a court, and Trump as president would have the ability to declassify that information.

James Clapper, who was Obama's direc-

tor of national intelligence, has said that nothing matching Trump's claims had taken place. Also this month, WikiLeaks released nearly 8,000 documents that purportedly reveal secrets about the CIA's tools for breaking into targeted comput-

ers, cellphones and even smart TVs. Conway noted that development to justify Trump's claims. "What I can say is there are many ways to surveil each other now, unfortunately," including "microwaves that turn into cameras, et cetera," Conway told

New Jersey's The Record newspaper in an interview Sunday. "So we know that that is just a fact of modern life."

Conway told "Good Morning America" that "I wasn't making a suggestion about Trump Tower." She said she was answering a question about surveillance "generally," and without specific reference to the current controversy. FBI director James Comey has privately urged the Justice Department to dispute Trump's claim but has not come forward to do so himself.

Sen John McCain, an influential Republican, said Sunday: "I think the president has one of two choices: either retract or to provide the information that the American people deserve, because, if his predecessor violated the law. President Obama violated the law, we have got a serious issue here, to say the least," the Arizona senator said. The House Intelligence Committee's request for evidence by Monday was made in a letter sent to the Justice Department by the panel's chairman, Rep Devin Nunes, R-Calif, and its ranking Democrat, Rep Adam Schiff, D-Calif, according to a congressional official. The aide wasn't authorized to discuss the request by name and requested anonymity. — AP

CARLOS THE JACKAL STANDS TRIAL OVER 1974 PARIS ATTACK

PARIS: Carlos the Jackal, once one of the world's most wanted criminals, was back in a French court yesterday, charged with a grenade attack on a Paris shop more than 40 years ago that killed two people. The Venezuelan, whose real name is Ilich Ramirez Sanchez, has been held in France for 23 years since being captured in Khartoum by French special forces and was previously sentenced to life imprisonment for deadly attacks in the 1970s and 1980s.

In his latest trial, which began in a Paris court yesterday, he faced charges including murder over the Sept. 15, 1974 grenade attack on the Publicis drugstore in central Paris, which also injured 34. Ramirez denies involvement. Ramirez, 67, with receding white hair, refused to give his name in court and gave his age as 17 "give or take 50 years". Ramirez, who wore a dark jacket and metal-framed glasses, was confined in a glass box, with just an opening to speak through. Three police officers flanked him

in the box. In the 1970s and 1980s, the Marxist militant and self-dubbed "elite gunman" became a symbol of Cold War antiimperialism and public enemy number one for Western governments.

He seale $\bar{\rm d}$ his notoriety in 1975 with the hostage-taking of OPEC oil ministers in Vienna in the name of the Palestinian struggle, and went on to become an international gun-for-hire with Soviet bloc protectors. The press gave him his nickname after a reporter saw a copy of Frederick Forsyth's "The Day of the Jackal" at Ramirez's London flat and mistakenly assumed it belonged to him.

He was convicted in 1997 of murdering two French police officers and an informant in 1975 in Paris and in 2011 of masterminding attacks on two trains, a train station and a Paris street that killed 11 people and wounded about 150 more. Investigators say they have established links between the Publicis case, Ramirez, and a hostage-taking

at the French Embassy in The Hague two days previously by the Japanese Red Army militant group.

The US-made hand grenade used in the Publicis attack came from the same batch as three grenades used in The Hague attack and another grenade found in a Paris apartment used by Ramirez, they say. Some years later, in a newspaper interview which Ramirez now denies having given, he was quoted as claiming responsibility for the drugstore attack, saying its aim was to put pressure on French authorities to wrap up negotiations with the hostage-takers in The Hague. Speaking to Reuters before the trial, Ramirez's lawyer Francis Vuillemin said the charges against Ramirez were non-existent. He attacked "contradictory and dishonest" testimony in the case and a procedure he said had not respected the law. Seventeen witnesses are expected to testify in the trial, which is expected to take until around the end of this month. — Reuters

HUNGARY MPS RE-ELECT ORBAN ALLY AS PRESIDENT

BUDAPEST: Hungarian lawmakers yesterday re-elected President Janos Ader for a new five-year term, marking a comfortable victory for the rightwing government ally over his leftist rival. Ader beat opposition candidate Laszlo Majtenyi in a secondround runoff by 131 votes to 39 in the 199seat parliament.

The vote for the largely ceremonial presidential role was a mere formality given that the ruling Fidesz party of premier Viktor Orban holds close to a two-thirds majority. Despite his defeat however, respected former ombudsman Majtenyi, 66, nonetheless managed a rare feat in this election-uniting Hungary's normally warring leftist parties behind him. In the last election five years ago, 57-year-old Ader ran uncontested. But ahead of next year's general election, the fragmented left bloc-made up of the Socialist Party and several smaller outfitshas been trying to set aside its rifts and come up with a common strategy to take on Orban, in power since 2010.

His opponents have denounced the strongman for undermining key democratic institutions in sweeping reforms and stifling press freedom. "(We need) a return to independent institutions guaranteeing our constitutional rights," Majtenyi said in a speech yesterday. Fidesz currently enjoys a comfortable lead over the Socialists and the radical right Jobbik party, which both vie for a distant second place. — AFP

DUTERTE WANTS MINING BAN, LINKS MINERS TO CONSPIRACY


President says he'll do what's necessary to preserve land

MANILA: Philippine President Rodrigo Duterte yesterday accused some miners of funding efforts to destabilize his government as he talked about a possible plan to impose a ban on mining given the environmental damage producers have caused. Duterte, who has said the Southeast Asian nation can survive without mining, has backed a crackdown on miners by Environment and Natural Resources Secretary Regina Lopez in the world's top supplier of nickel ore. Duterte said he was looking at a total mining ban "and then we'll talk", referring to miners.

"When it comes to the preservation of my country, the land...I will do what is necessary," Duterte told a media briefing. "I know that some of you are giving funding to the other side to destabilize me," he said, referring to companies in the mining sector he did not name. He did not say how his government was being destabilized, only that there could be efforts to make him "unpopular". The Chamber of Mines of the Philippines, which groups many large-scale miners, said in a statement it was "unaware of any mining company that is supportive of any destabilization efforts against the administration". Duterte has supported Lopez's Feb. 2 order to shut 23 of the country's 41 mines to protect watersheds. She suspended another five for environmental infringements and also cancelled 75 contracts for undeveloped mines.

"You think you can live with it (environmental degradation) because of the 70 billion (pesos) or because they contributed to campaign funds? Not me," Duterte said, while showing pictures of the environmental harm mining has caused. The mining sector contributes an estimated 70 billion Philippine pesos (\$1.39 billion) a year in revenue.

Dante Bravo, president of Global Ferronicke Holdings Inc, the Philippines' No 2 nickel ore miner, said he was surprised at Duterte's com-

NEW 'ENEMY PROPERTY' LAW

MUMBAI: A controversial bill that amends a five-decade-old law to deny Indian families of those who moved to China and Pakistan the right to reclaim "enemy properties" seized by the state unfairly targets Muslims, analysts say. The Enemy Property Act of 1968, enacted after the India-Pakistan War three years earlier, gave the Indian government the right to seize assets of Indian nationals who had moved to Pakistan or China following wars with the

Those who left India for Pakistan were Muslims, and relations between the two countries remain fraught after numerous conflicts. Pakistan enacted a similar law at the time and seized properties of those who left for India. The amended law, which would apply retrospectively, extends the definition of "enemy" to include legal heirs of declared enemies, even when the heir is an Indian citizen, or of a country not deemed to be an enemy.

DEFENSE SPENDING BY EUROPEAN NATO ALLIES INCHES UP IN 2016

BRUSSELS: Defense spending by European NATO states inched up for the first time in seven years in 2016, the military alliance said yesterday, but still remained below the threshold the new U.S. President Donald Trump said was crucial to achieve.

Trump made NATO states in Europe nervous when he criticized the alliance as "obsolete" during election campaign and then went on to suggest he could make US commitment to their security conditional on them meeting the alliance's target of defense spending at two percent of their economic output.

Trump has since reaffirmed support for NATO but insisted Europeans must "pay their fair share." His aides have said Trump wants to see progress on that by the end of this year and that Washington could otherwise "mod-

erate" its support. NATO said the US defense spending last year stood at 3.61 percent of its Gross Domestic Product, compared to 3.58 percent in 2015. That compares to 1.47 percent for NATO's European allies last year and 1.44 percent the year before.

NATO's overall figure for 2016 stood at 2.43 percent versus 2.40 percent in 2015. "There has been progress but the job is far from done, we still have no fair burden-sharing within our alliance," NATO's Secretary General Jens Stoltenberg said. "It is realistic that all allies reach the goal of two percent."

Stoltenberg said Romania was due to meet the target this year, with Lithuania and Latvia expected to follow in 2018. "This is not just about a call from the Unites States and President Trump... It is in Europe's best interest to spend more on defense. We have a long way to go but at least after years of decline, we are now starting to see an increase." — Reuters

DUTCH PM IN ELECTION DUEL WITH ANTI-ISLAM LEADER

ROTTERDAM, Netherlands: Dutch Prime Minister Mark Rutte was to go head-to-head with his rival anti-Islam MP Geert Wilders in a key election debate, sharpened by a bitter row with Turkey.

Just two days before The Netherlands goes to the polls, tensions with Ankara have flared into a diplomatic crisis, forcing simmering concerns about immigration and integration back to the top of the political agenda. Monday's debate, plus Tuesday's final night round-table with eight political party leaders, could yet sway Wednesday's vote, one analyst told AFP, estimating that some 60 percent of Dutch voters remain undecided. While Wilders has delighted in the chaos which erupted over the weekend when Dutch riot police moved in to disperse hundreds of protestors waving Turkish flags in Rotterdam, Rutte has appealed for calm.

The leader of the Liberal VVD party, Rutte is bidding for a third term, but faces a strong challenge from Wilders and his Freedom Party (PVV). Tomorrow's vote "is about one question: in what kind of country do you want to live?" Rutte said in a Facebook post yesterday.

"I want a country where we live together in a normal way... a country that has shown the world that we do not fall for false populism." He has angrily rejected Turkey's calls to apologize for expelling a Turkish minister who tried to attend a pro-Ankara rally in Rotterdam.

Instead, he urged Turkish President Recep Tayyip Erdogan to say sorry for likening the Dutch to Nazis-a jibe that has cut deep in a country bombed and occupied in World War II.

'Expel ambassador!'

While Rutte says he also wants to defuse the crisis with a fellow NATO member, Wilders urged the Dutch government to up the ante. "Erdogan repeats we are Nazis + Fascists. He insults Dutch police. No de-escalation. Expel Turkish Ambassador to NL and entire staff!" Wilders said in a tweet yesterday.

The stakes are high, with Rutte's Liberals (VVD) predicted to return as the largest party in the 150-seat parliament with between 23 to 27 seats, according to the latest aggregated polls. That is well down from 40 VVD MPs in the outgoing lower chamber however, and would leave him scrambling to cobble together a viable coalition which may have to include four to five parties to reach the 76-seat majority.

After weeks of flirting at the top of the polls, Wilders has seen his ratings slip and may now come second with between 19 and 23 seats. polls suggest. "They are now at 13 percent of the

Dutch vote, which is considerable but I think we should not exaggerate it: It is one out of eight," Monika Sie Dhian Ho, director of the Clingendael Institute, told AFP. If Wilders emerges as one of the largest parties in parliament, he may be a difficult voice to ignore even though other parties have vowed to snub him, turned off by his extreme rhetoric in a country which prides itself on its consensus politics.

'Here to stay'

Wilders has vowed to close mosques, ban sales of the Koran and bar Muslim immigrants. But his one-page manifesto is glaringly short on detail. The Dutch are "interested to hear how he's going to implement that since he's going against the constitution, against many laws that we have in the Netherlands," said Sie, highlighting how so far Wilders has snubbed the major debates. The latest polls also suggest support for traditional Dutch establishment parties such as the Christian Democratic Appeal (CDA) and the Democracy Party D66 is rising as the vote looms.

Most Dutch voters remain preoccupied with issues such as the economy, pensions and health care for the greying population, even though the elections are being closely watched abroad amid the European debate about immigration and integration. Wilders's "ideology might be negative, it's anti-Muslims, it's anti-EU, it's anti-immigration, it's anti-refugees. But it is a clear ideology that addresses concerns of a substantial group of the Dutch. So it is there to stay," said Sie.

These elections have also seen the remarkable rise of the left-wing ecologists GroenLinks and their charismatic young leader Jesse Klaver, who could yet become a kingmaker in a fragmented political landscape. "My weapons are hope and optimism," the 30-year-old Klaver told AFP Saturday after campaigning in southern Eindhoven. "We are building a movement that is stronger than any parties in Netherlands."—AFP

ple, but has not held a census since 1998 despite a constitutional requirement for one every decade.

The process starts Wednesday and will deploy a team of more than 300,000 people and involve 55 million forms-a challenge in a country known for corruption and dysfunction. It will be the basis for revising political boundaries, parliamentary seat allocations and federal funding. while also giving a clearer picture about religious minority numbers in the Muslimmajority country as well as counting the transsexual population for the first time.

The census is a highly charged issue, coming one year before national parliamentary elections. "Pakistan is not a country with a homogenous population," said Muddassir Rizvi, head of programs at the Free and Fair Elections Network, "we are multiple ethnicities, more than 80 different languages are spoken. The count actually determines the political power of various ethnicities." The mighty Punjab province, for example, could see its political grip weaken as a result of its population not rising at a similar rate to other provinces. "It is not a well-received exercise by political actors. It's only on the orders and insistence of the Supreme Court that this exercise is being undertaken," said Rizvi.

The lack of political will has resulted in hasty preparations. The Pakistan Bureau of Statistics (PBS) has been primed and ready on the starting blocks for ten years, but the government only gave its green light less than three months ago — a short time to train staff and reassure parties and communities.

"There was very limited time to get everybody on board (and) ensure everyone feels the importance of being counted " said Dr Hassan Mohtashami, of the United Nations Population Fund. Many within the country are unhappy about how the presence of approximately two million Afghan refugees, whose nationality is difficult to determine because of falsified documents, could skew the numbers if they get counted as Pakistanis belonging to the Pashtun ethnic group.

In Balochistan, the country's largest province by area but the least populated, a nationalist party has rejected the census, calling it tantamount to "suicide" because an influx of Pashtunsboth from other parts of Pakistan as well as from Afghanistan-would make the ethnic Baloch a minority in their own region.

The PBS will deploy some 119,000 people, including 84,000 enumerators: teachers and local officials who will go door-to-door to count homes and then individuals. Pakistan's powerful army meanwhile announced it would dispatch up to 200,000 troops for the exercise, including 44,000 participating directly in the census-taking and making a parallel count. Asif Bajwa, the PBS's chief statistician, said the army would act as 'observers' to ensure enumerators did not inflate local counting.

"Being a local person, the enumerator is susceptible to pressures, because everybody knows that a larger population translates into more jobs, more seats, and more money for the province," he said, adding each census-taker will be accompanied by a military counterpart. But that has created some disquiet for the UN who are concerned about the army's role as parallel data collectors.

The administration of any kind of other questionnaire during the census is (infringing) on the principle of confidentiality," said Mohtashami. The first census phase will take place from March 15 to April 15, the second from April 25 to May 25, and final results are expected by the end of July. —AFP

MYANMAR REFUGEES SURGE INTO CHINA AS CONFLICT ESCALATES

NANSAN, China: Within earshot of mortar fire echoing from beyond a ring of hills, a sprawling relief camp in Southwestern China is swelling steadily after fighting erupted last week between a rebel ethnic army in Myanmar and government troops just across the border. In a recent Reuters visit to the rugged area in southwestern Yunnan province, aid workers and those displaced expressed fears of a more violent and protracted conflict than a previous flare-up in the Kokang region in early 2015.

"Every day, more people come," said Li Yinzhong, an aid manager in the camp, gesturing at the mostly Han Chinese refugees from Myanmar's Kokang region trudging through the reddish mud earth around rows of large blue huts where they sleep on nylon tarpaulin sheets.

"We will look after them until they decide they want to go back." Blue disaster relief tents provided by the Chinese also dotted the terraced sugarcane, maize and tea terraces flanking the mountainous winding road to Nansan. The town, close to the Kokang region of Myanmar's Shan State, is providing refuge for a stream of refugees that Chinese authorities estimate number more than 20,000.

The violence is a blow to efforts by Myanmar's de facto leader Aung San Suu Kyi, to reach a comprehensive peace agreement with Myanmar's ethnic minorities, some of them in rebellions spanning decades. The conflict is also fraying ties between China and Myanmar, which Beijing has hoped could be a key gateway in its multi-pronged "One Belt One Road" strategy to promote economic links between China and Europe.

Kokang has close ties to China. The vast majority are ethnic Chinese speaking a Chinese dialect and using the yuan as

The Kokang began fleeing when the rebel Myanmar National Democratic Alliance Army (MNDAA) launched a surprise raid on Myanmar police and military targets in the town of Laukkai, resulting in the deaths of 30 people on March 6. The Myanmar military has launched "56 waves of

small and large clashes", using cannons, armoured vehicles and heavy weapons over the past two months, according to a statement published by the military on March 6 after the attack.

Rebel forces who lay historic claim to the Kokang region have attacked government troops with rocket-propelled grenade launchers and other military hardware. In an "urgent notice" posted on Sunday on its official website, the MNDAA said the Kokang area was now in a "state of war" as fighting worsened.

On the Chinese side, paramilitary police have sent in battalions of reinforcements, mostly in readiness for disaster relief, according to Chinese officials who spoke on background. Reuters saw seven Chinese armored personnel carriers moving west along the hilly road towards Myanmar and the relief camp sprawled across a muddy wasteland the size of 10 football fields.

The fresh unrest comes after fighting in early 2015 and in 2009 involving the MNDAA, both flare-ups displacing tens of thousands of people. Ordnance has occasionally strayed into China, with five people in China killed in 2015 during a round of fighting then.

This time round, the door to a village house was blown out, and the upper floor of the Anran hotel in Nansan was shelled forcing its closure, according to local residents and one official. Reuters was unable to cor roborate these accounts. China has lodged "solemn representations" with Myanmar over its citizens put at risk by the conflict, foreign ministry spokeswoman Hua Chunying told a regular news briefing yesterday.

"The Chinese will be very angry if it escalates to the level of 2015," said Sino-Myanmar expert Yun Sun, a senior associate with the Stimson Center in Washington D.C. Beijing wants the Kokang to be included in the comprehensive peace negotiations that Aung San Suu Kyi initiated last August, she said.

The military has blocked that, saying the rebels can only join if they lay down arms first. "The Chinese actually tacitly and privately support the Kokang being included in the negotiations, but they can't say that," Sun said. —Reuters

JAPAN PLANS TO SEND LARGEST WARSHIP TO SOUTH CHINA SEA

VIETNAM DEMANDS CHINA STOP CRUISES IN DISPUTED WATERS

TOKYO: Japan plans to dispatch its largest warship on a three-month tour through the South China Sea beginning in May, three sources said, in its biggest show of naval force in the region since World War Two. China claims almost all the disputed waters and its growing military presence has fuelled concern in Japan and the West, with the United States holding regular air and naval patrols to ensure freedom of navigation.

The Izumo helicopter carrier, commissioned only two years ago, will make stops in Singapore, Indonesia, the Philippines, Indonesia and Sri Lanka before joining the Malabar joint naval exercise with Indian and US naval vessels in the Indian Ocean in July.

It will return to Japan in August, the sources said. "The aim is to test the capability of the Izumo by sending it out on an extended mission," said one of the sources who have knowledge of the plan. "It will train with the US Navy in the South China Sea," he added, asking not to be identified because he is not authorized to talk to the media.

Maritime dispute

A spokesman for Japan's Maritime Self Defense Force declined to comment. Taiwan, Malaysia, Vietnam, the Philippines and Brunei also claim parts of the sea which has rich fishing grounds, oil and gas deposits and through which around \$5 trillion of global sea-borne trade passes each year.

Japan does not have any claim to the waters, but has a separate maritime dispute with China in the East China Sea. Japan wants to invite Philippine President Rodrigo Duterte, who has pushed ties with China in recent months as he has criticized the old

alliance with the United States, to visit the Izumo when it visits Subic Bay, about 100 km (62 miles) west of Manila, another of the sources said.

Japan's flag-flying operation comes as the United States under President Donald Trump appears to be taking a tougher line with China. Washington has criticized China's construction of man-made islands and a build-up of military facilities that it worries could be used to restrict free movement.

Vietnam call

Vietnam yesterday demanded that China stop sending cruise ships to the South China Sea in a response to one of Beijing's latest steps to bolster its claims in the strategic waterway. A Chinese cruise ship with more than 300 passengers visited the disputed Paracel Islands earlier this month. "Vietnam strongly opposes this and demands that China respect Vietnam's sovereignty over the Paracel Islands and international law and immediately stop and not repeat those activities," foreign ministry spokesperson Le Hai Binh told Reuters.

"Those actions have seriously violated Vietnam's sovereignty over the Paracel Islands and international law." China claims 90 percent of the potentially energy-rich South China Sea. Brunei, Malaysia, the Philippines, Vietnam and Taiwan lay claim to parts of the sea, through which passes about \$5 trillion of trade a year.

Yesterday, Chinese foreign ministry spokeswomen Hua Chunying told a regular news briefing that she had not seen the comments by Vietnam, but reiterated China's claim to the Paracel Islands. Countries competing to cement their rival claims have encouraged a growing civilian presence on disputed islands in the South China Sea. The first cruises from China to the Paracel islands were launched by Hainan Strait Shipping Co in 2013. —Reuters

MODI PARTY SEES BIGGER MANDATE IN 2019 AFTER STATE ELECTION

NEW DELHI: Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi's party expects national elections in 2019 to deliver an even bigger mandate than in 2014, its leaders said on Sunday, buoyed by a thumping victory in the country's most politically important state. As well as winning Uttar Pradesh with the biggest majority for any party since 1977, Modi's Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) is moving closer to forming governments in at least two more of the five states that went to polls recently.

Federal Defence Minister Manohar Parikar will resign soon to lead the state government of Goa, BJP leaders told a news conference. BJP president Amit Shah said: "In coming days BJP's winning ways will be seen in other states too. We will get a much bigger mandate in 2019 under Modi."

Many investors hope the BJP will embark on a round of new reforms to boost growth and fight endemic corruption. The BJP won the biggest government mandate in three decades in 2014 and the prospect of a tighter grip on power is not something Modi's critics relish.

They say his surging popularity and the lack of a strong opposition could further embolden hardline Hindu factions close to his party and isolate Muslims and other minorities. The state victories are being seen as an endorsement of Modi's high-risk decision last November to scrap high-value banknotes, an anti-corruption measure that was unpopular which many economists said would hamper growth. The wins vindicated his decision to turn the campaign into a referendum on his own performance since coming to power more than two-and-a-half years ago. With expectations rising high, his biggest challenge now will be to create millions of jobs for the country's surging population.

"We may get things wrong, but we won't do anything with wrong intentions," Modi said in a speech at the BJP headquarters, broadcast live by several television networks on Sunday evening.

Modi said 2022, the 75th anniversary of independence, would be marked by a "New India". "We have got five years ... for 1.25 billion of my countrymen to take India forward," he said, urging Indians to unite, as his supporters chanted "Modi! Modi!". "The election results have strengthened the resolve to fulfil the dreams of the India of 2022." —Reuters

HASHEM DEFENDS EXPAT MEDICINE BAN...

The lawmaker claimed that expatriate doctors prescribe large quantities of medicine to expatriate patients and this leads to squandering of public funds. "How else can we improve the level of health services in the country?" Hashem asked, adding that expatriate patients overcrowd public health institutions, thus pre-

venting citizens from having good medical treatment.

Hashem said that what she has proposed has got nothing to do with humanity. "I don't want anyone to ask me where are human factors in my proposal. I am talking about the dignity of citizens ... I did not say don't give them (expatriates) treatment. I said we should regulate it in order for Kuwaiti citizens to experience social justice," she said. "The government is not obliged to provide medical treatment to expatriates. Employers are obliged to provide such a service," she added.

Hashem called for immediately forcing employers to provide health insurance for their expatriate employees, adding this will resolve most of the problem. The lawmaker also claimed that some expatriate visitors who do not hold legal residence permits arrive in Kuwait to enjoy almost free medical services, while many Kuwaitis are forced to go to the private sector.

Hashem said that the health ministry budget soared from KD 437 million in 2006 to as high as KD 1,489 million last year, close to fourfold growth. She also said that in 2015, as many as 465,000 Kuwaitis visited outpatient clinics at public hospitals against 331,000 expats, adding that the large number of expatriates resulted in overcrowding. In addition to barring expats from medicines, Hashem had also proposed collecting a five percent tax on all foreign money transfers by expats. She has also called for charging each expat at least 100 fils for walking on roads.

KING SALMAN, ABE EYE BOOST IN TIES

The two countries yesterday also signed economic cooperation agreements in industry, energy and finance. They also agreed to start a feasibility study on vehicle production in the Middle Eastern country The Nikkei on Saturday reported that Toyota Motor Corp is looking into building a plant in Saudi Arabia. Japan's Deputy Chief Cabinet Secretary Kotaro Nogami told reporters Abe made the request for support on the Aramco listing to the Saudi monarch, who responded by saying the kingdom would look into the request because he wants Japanese investors to buy Aramco shares.

The Saudi delegation arrived late Sunday on about 10 aircraft. King Salman is on a month-long tour of Asia to advance his kingdom's economic and business interests. His stop in Japan followed visits to Indonesia and Malaysia. He is to travel on to Brunei, China and the Maldives. Salman pledged \$1 billion in development finance for Indonesia and closer cooperation in combating transnational crime such as human trafficking, terrorism and the drug trade.

Separately, the White House confirmed yesterday that US President Donald Trump will meet this week with Saudi Arabia's second-in-line to the throne in the highest-level visit to Washington by a Saudi royal since November's presidential election. In his daily press briefing, White House press secretary Sean Spicer said the meeting with Deputy Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman, who is also defense minister and King Salman's son, will take place Thursday at the White House. No other details were provided.

The Saudi royal court, in a statement carried by the

official Saudi Press Agency earlier yesterday, said that Prince Mohammed will meet with Trump and a number of US officials to discuss "the strengthening of bilateral relations between the two countries and regional issues of mutual interest". The prince, who departed for Washington yesterday, is spearheading the kingdom's economic overhaul to become less dependent on oil and its major investments in US technology firms.

He will be the first Gulf Arab royal to meet the president since his inauguration. Key issues at the top of the agenda are likely to include global energy prices, as well as the conflicts in Syria, Iraq, Libya and Yemen, where a Saudi-led coalition backed by Washington has been bombing Iran-backed rebels for nearly two years. Saudi Arabia, the world's top oil exporter and biggest buyer of American-made arms, is also part of the US-led coalition bombing campaign against the Islamic State group in Syria.

Saudi relations with Washington cooled under President Barack Obama after his administration secured a nuclear deal with regional rival Iran. The deal has been heavily criticized by Trump. Obama had also openly criticized Gulf Arab countries, expressing frustration at their feud with Iran. In contrast, the kingdom has expressed optimism about rebuilding its alliance with Washington and working with the Trump Administration to contain Iran's reach in the region. In a call between Trump and King Salman in January, the two agreed to back safe zones in Syria and Yemen, according to a White House statement. The monarch is currently touring Asia in a visit aimed at building alliances with other partners. — Agencies

Many Egyptians who lived through Mubarak's rule view it as a period of autocracy and crony capitalism. His overthrow led to Egypt's first free election, which brought in Islamist President Mohamed Morsi. Morsi lasted only a year in office after mass protests against his rule in 2013 prompted his overthrow by then defense chief General Abdel Fattah Al-Sisi, who went on to win a presidential election in 2014.

Morsi is in prison and his Muslim Brotherhood has

been banned as a terrorist organization. Hundreds of Morsi supporters were killed in a single day in August 2013 and thousands were jailed, with the dragnet quickly widening to include secular activists who were at the forefront of the 2011 uprising but opposed Muslim Brotherhood rule. Mubarak-era figures, meanwhile, are gradually being cleared of charges and a series of laws limiting political freedoms has raised fears among activists that the old regime is back. Mubarak has long maintained his innocence and says history will judge him a patriot who served his country selflessly. — Reuters









FRANCE LIKELY TO BECOME FREQUENT POWER IMPORTER

or two straight months this winter, France was a net importer of electricity for the first time in five years, a trend that could continue during periods of peak demand no matter who wins the April-May presidential election. France, usually a net exporter of electricity, imported a record 950 gigawatt-hours of power on a net basis in January, the highest level since 1980, as a cold snap increased demand for heating amid a series of prolonged nuclear outages.

Dependence on its neighbors during peak winter demand could accelerate if France fails to develop renewables further or extend the lifespan of its 58 nuclear reactors, while cross-border exchange capacity continues to grow. France's capacity to import electricity from its neighbors increased by 30 percent to 12.2 gigawatts (GW) in the 2016/2017 winter period, compared with winter 2015/2016, French grid operator RTE said in its winter outlook.

Data from the finance ministry showed France spent €290 million (\$307 million) on electricity imports in January, compared with €56.5 million for the same month in 2016. France passed an ambitious energy law in 2015 with a target of cutting the share of nuclear in its electricity mix to 50 percent by 2025 from 75 percent currently, while investing in renewables and efficiency to curb consumption and heat loss

Although the share of renewables has increased to about 16 percent, it lags its peers and is well below the International Energy Agency's (IEA) average of 24 percent, the IEA said in its January review of French energy policies. "Reaching the (50 percent target) will require careful policy guidance, effective markets and strong measures for renewables and energy efficiency," the IEA said. Analysts say the situation in December and January was exceptional, blaming prolonged outages of about a dozen nuclear reactors for safety checks and low hydropower output as a lack of rain and snowfall pushed reser-

"However, given the high sensitivity of French electricity consumption to cold temperatures and the fact that the French production fleet has fallen due to coal plant closures, this issue will be present every year, maybe not to the extent we saw this winter," said Utomi Odozi of Freepoint Commodities.

Tough Decisions Ahead


While President Francois Hollande has begun implementing some of the measures in the energy bill, tougher decisions such as shutting nuclear plants and increasing investments in renewables would have to be made by the next government after the April-May election. Independent candidate Emmanuel Macron, the frontrunner to win the presidency, plans to stop coal-power generation by 2022. He would keep the 50 percent nuclear target while launching 26 GW of renewables development.

The cornerstone of Macron's energy plan is 15 billion euros of investments with objectives that include immediate help for low-income earners to renovate about 2 million old homes to cut heat loss and curb consumption. Far-right leader Marine Le Pen, who is expected to come top in the first round of the election but lose in the decisive second round, wants France to be energy-independent, with staterun utility EDF at the centre of energy security.

Le Pen has proposed keeping the French nuclear fleet going as long as watchdog ASN deems the reactors safe. She plans to scrap a plan to privatize French hydropower stations. According to his election manifesto, conservative Francois Fillon, third in opinion polls, also wants France to be energy-independent. He would scrap the 50 percent nuclear target, which he has described as absurd. He plans to extend the lifespan of the reactors to between 40 and 60 years with the agreement of ASN, and would halt the planned shutdown of the Fessenheim nuclear plant, France's oldest.

But aiming to make France self-sufficient could be costly, according to Fabien Roques, senior vice president at FTL.CL Energy consultancy. Roques said the focus should instead be on how to include cross-border participation in France's security of supply and capacity mechanism that was launched in January. Capacity mechanisms are used to fund power plants that may not be cost-effective but can guarantee supply during peak demand. — Reuters

COMPANIES STRUGGLE WITH ETHICS VS PROFITS

ome multinationals working in conflict zones are turning to ethically dubious practices to keep their factories operating, employees working and goods flowing. French-Swiss cement manufacturer LafargeHolcim admitted earlier this month that it resorted to "unacceptable" practices in 2013 and 2014 to keep its Jalabiya plant in Syria running until it was seized by the Islamic State. In practice this amounted to the financing of armed groups. Recent history is full of scandals involving businesses paying armed groups and fanning the flames of war.

Banana companies paid paramilitary groups in Colombia in the 1990s and 2000s, jewellers fed the trade in "blood diamonds" in Liberia and Congo and mobile phone makers are regularly accused of using minerals taken from mines controlled by armed groups in Africa. But how do companies get themselves into this? Errors of judgment? Sliding imperceptibly past a point of no return? Too much responsibility given to middlemen? A fundamental contradiction between profit and ethics?

Grey areas, platitudes

"Whether it wants to or not, a business working in a war zone or a post-crisis zone becomes an economic stakeholder in a military environment," said Bertrand Monnet, a professor in criminal risk management at France's Edhec business school. "And it is not always quite able to manage the challenges that this involves." Big companies have ethical codes and while "this type of talk is all very well... in reality it's not enough to cope with the tensions between economic logic and fundamental rights," said Cecile Renouard, a professor at the Essec business

school in France and a writer on corporate ethics. She said that in the Lafarge case, the company's ethics statement was ambiguous in this respect. "The company says it wants to be the world leader in its sector and at the same time contribute to making the world a better place", but "permanently striving for economic and financial performance inevitably comes into conflict with the desire to take into account the local situation."

Nicolas Berland, a professor at the business ethics and management department of the Paris-Dauphine university, said that while there are "true cynics" who work in conflict zones with no regard for the morality of what they are doing, others find themselves in grey areas. Trying to honour agreements and protect their workers in difficult, unpredictable environments "they sometimes try to find a compromise by betting the situation will change rapidly," he said.

The safest approach is not to get involved in dangerous areas in the first place, or to pull out as quickly as possible when a crisis blows up. Alexandre Hollander, head of Amarante International, a company specialising in security for international organizations, said: "In a war situation, multinationals generally decide to pull out of the country." French oil giant Total left Syria in 2011 and French industrial gas supplier Air Liquide recently quit eastern Ukraine, where pro-Russian separatists decided to seize control of businesses.

Responsibilities and obligations

Local officials can also play an ambiguous role. "The fashion is to have 'cross-expatriates', such as a Jordanian in

Libya, because they are less exposed to risks thanks to their nationality," Hollander said, but "the understanding of corruption is not always the same for a Russian, a Turk or a Lebanese." Moreover, "put under great pressure, mid-level managers can find themselves tempted to turn a blind eye a bit," he said. And then, "it is difficult to extract yourself once you're caught up in the machinery. Once you've given two cans of petrol, \$1,000, then \$100,000, the amount doesn't matter any more."

In the Lafarge case, "the basic mistake is that they failed to clearly articulate a break point, to identify what are the red lines beyond which these relationships with local partners become unacceptable," said David Rodin, an expert in the ethics of war at Oxford University. In theory the question is "to what extent is Lafarge responsible for the crimes the armed groups commit," he added. "The question is then at what level were decisions being taken? Was there sufficient oversight and guidance?"

Two companies with extensive foreign operations listed on the Paris stock exchange blue-chip CAC 40 index declined to make public their guidelines while insisting that the issue of ensuring the security of foreign staff is monitored at the highest level of management. "Lafarge, a company of international standing, approaching such a highly-publicized conflict - shouldn't it have been extra vigilant?" said Marie-Laure Guislain of Sherpa, a French law association that protects victims of financial crimes, which made a criminal complaint against Lafarge for "financing terrorism". France has just adopted a law on companies' obligation to be vigilant on these issues, which could "have real effects" in this sort of situation, she said. — AFP

'Brand Modi' gets thumbs up as BJP wins

ebounding from a self-inflicted banknote crisis to deliver his party a stunning victory in state polls, Prime Minister Narendra Modi's dominance mirrors that of India's early independence leaders and bodes well for his re-election in 2019, analysts say. Modi's Bharatiya Janata Party won a surprise absolute majority in Uttar Pradesh at the weekend, a result not seen in decades in the northern state that's home to 220 million people and seen as a bellwether of national politics.

It also won a majority in Uttarakhand and despite coming second will form governments in Goa and Manipur, the latter a remote eastern state where the Hindu nationalist party held zero seats before polling day. "A new India is emerging," Modi declared on Twitter, nearly three years after he came to office pledging inclusive government and a "shining India" that would provide jobs for a growing youth population.

Instead of fielding a candidate for chief minister in Uttar Pradesh, Modi spearheaded the campaign himself, attending nearly a rally a day for the better part of a month. The 66-year-old banked that his charisma and thundering rhetoric from the rally pulpit, both used to spectacular effect in the 2014 general election, would sway votes his way again. The risky strategy, which massively backfired in Bihar state polls in 2015, paid off: Modi floored his doubters as the BJP swept 312 of the state's 403 assembly seats.

The party declared Modi the most popular prime minister since independence, the first leader since Jawaharlal Nehru and Indira Gandhi whose force of personality commanded adulation and ensured broad mandates. "Since those days we've never seen one individual dominate the polity in the way Narendra Modi has been able to," Paranjoy Guha Thakurta, editor of the Economic and Political Weekly, told AFP. "This is perhaps the kind of sweeping victory we haven't seen in India for a very, very long time.

Modi won the first overall majority in three decades in the 2014 election but his agenda has been hampered in the upper house of parliament, slowing the pace of promised reforms, fostering disillusionment and earning jeers from his opponents. But the key victory in Uttar Pradesh will see Modi wield a command over parliament rarely seen in India's coalition-based politics, and able to pursue more controversial measures.

It will also embolden him in addressing security concerns, most notably Pakistan, and burnish his standing on the world stage, particularly as India pushes for a permanent seat on the UN Security Council. There was much speculation the state elections would be a referendum on "demonetization" - Modi's shock decision in November to pull all high-value banknotes from circulation. The policy was designed to flush out tax cheats but it triggered a chronic currency shortage and chaos in a country where most transactions are cash-based. Indians were forced to supply - a rare luxury in Uttar Pradesh - during the Hindu queue for hours to exchange their suddenly worthless bills, and the poor struggled to buy daily essentials.

The anticipated backlash - though encouraged by his opponents - never eventuated. Modi turned the disruption on its head, tapping into popular anger over corruption and selling the hardship as necessary pain to hit the rich. "He appeals to emotion. The fact he was able to project demonetization in this manner says a lot about his ability to convert what many would believe would be his liability into an electoral asset," Thakurta said.

By courting the votes of poorer Indians, the BJP broadened its appeal beyond the traders and middle class perceived as its traditional support base. "The reinvention of the BJP, particularly Modi as a messiah of the poor, is complete," ran an editorial in India's Sunday Business Standard newspaper. The BJP - a rightwing Hindu party did exploit religious divisions in Uttar Pradesh, painting their opponents as pandering to the state's sizeable Muslim population. Modi promised voters 24-hour power

festival Diwali, appeasing voters aggrieved at alleged preferential treatment doled out to Muslims during their holy month.

The BJP did not field a single Muslim candidate in the state - despite one in five following Islam - underscoring its "majoritarian outlook", Thakurta said. Modi assured voters he would use this "emphatic win" to deliver his outstanding reforms, something his political opponents will be keenly watching as he seeks re-election in 2019. "Earlier parties were scared to fight elections on development. The strength of the poor and the aspirations of the middle class will take India to new heights," he told supporters at a massive victory parade in New Delhi.

With a favorable parliament in his pocket, and a massive vote of confidence halfway through his term, Modi looks well-placed to retain India's stewardship for another term, analysts say. "More than the party, this is a victory for the Modi brand," said Sanjay Kumar, from the Centre for the Study of Developing Societies. — AFP

BAUMANN HONOURED, SAD AT REPLACING FREDERICKS

LAUSANNE: Switzerland's Patrick Baumann said yesterday he was both honoured and sad at taking over as head of the IOC commission monitoring candidates for the 2024 Olympic Games following the resignation of Frankie Fredericks. Namibian sprinting great Fredericks stepped down last week after becoming embroiled in a corruption scandal related to the awarding of the

2016 Games to Rio. "I'm honoured on the one hand and sad on the other because the circumstances aren't what we would have wanted," Baumann, 49, told AFP. Baumann, an International Olympic Committee (IOC) member since 2007 and general secretary of the International Basketball Federation, was appointed last Tuesday amid a probe into money Fredericks accepted from a sports marketing chief accused of corruption. Fredericks, 49, strongly denied any wrongdoing in accepting nearly \$300,000 (283,000 euros) around the time that Rio de Janeiro was awarded the 2016 Olympics. Los Angeles and Paris are the only two cities remaining in the race for the 2024 Games. — AFP

STADE FRANCAIS, RACING 92 ANNOUNCE MERGER PLAN

PARIS: Stade Francais and Racing 92, two leading French rugby union clubs both based in the Paris region, announced plans yesterday to merge. The clubs, which have both struggled this season in France's premier Top 14 league, said in statements on their websites that the combination would create a new, stronger club that could enjoy a bigger fanbase in the French capital. Star players in the Racing 92 squad include New Zealand World Cup winners Dan Carter and Joe Rokocoko, while Stade Francais' top players feature the likes of French international Pascal Pape and Italian Sergio Parisse. Wealthy businessmen have invested large sums of money in recent years into French rugby clubs, allowing them to sign top players from around the world. Racing is owned by French property billionaire Jacky Lorenzetti, while businessman Thomas Savare is the current club president of Stade Français. Racing beat Toulon last year to win the French Top 14 title in front of a record crowd of more than 90,000 fans in Barcelona's Camp Nou stadium. — Reuters

NO RANIERI GRUDGE, SAYS LEICESTER'S SHAKESPEARE

LEICESTER: Craig Shakespeare said there were "no grudges" between himself and Claudio Ranieri yesterday after he succeeded the Italian as Leicester City manager. Ranieri was sacked last month, nine months on from Leicester's fairytale Premier League title triumph, after the club slid towards the relegation zone. Shakespeare took over as caretaker manager and was on Sunday confirmed as manager until the end of the season following 3-1 wins over Liverpool and Hull City in his first two games. "Of course I'm part of that back-room team, but it's about time we all moved on," Shakespeare told a press conference prior to today's Champions League last 16 second leg at home to Sevilla. "I bear no grudges, Claudio bears no grudges. We have to try and move on as a football club." Shakespeare previously worked as Ranieri's assistant. Asked if he had spoken to Ranieri since his appointment as manager until the end of the season was confirmed, Shakespeare replied: "We haven't spoken since. "But I said last week, when we spoke he wished me luck. We'll probably be in contact and I have no problem with that."—AFP

KJA SUSPENDS MEMBERSHIP WITH ASJA

KUWAIT: Kuwait Journalist Association (KJA) Board of Directors decided to suspend its membership in the Asian Sports Journalism Association (ASJA) during its meeting held on March 12, following the resignation of Kuwait representative at the executive bureau of the Asian Association Sattam Al-

Sahli as well as the resignation of five other members from the association during the meeting that was held in the Malaysian capital Kuala Lumpur during Feb 28 to March 3, 2017, in protest of not submitting the financial report along with many financial violations at the association.

FROOME FINALLY BACKS BRAILSFORD

LONDON: Three-time Tour de France champion Chris Froome finally rallied to the defence of under-fire Team Sky boss Dave Brailsford yesterday.

Brailsford, the man behind Great Britain's rise as an Olympic cycling superpower, has been under intense scrutiny but has insisted he will not resign from his Sky post despite being engulfed in rows over both doping and sexism.

British Cycling was already reeling from revelations it mishandled the drugs records of star rider Bradley Wiggins, when Brailsford was labelled "untouchable" in a leaked review publish Friday of how the national governing body handled sexism allegations against a leading coach.

Froome's relative silence had led to suggestions he was trying to distance himself from Brailsford as the likes of Team Sky colleague Geraint Thomas offered their support. But a statement issued Monday saw Froome, the Tour de France champion in 2013, 2015 and 2016, offer his backing to Brailsford. "With respect to Dave Brailsford, he has created one of the best sports teams in the world," Froome said. "Without Dave B,

there is no Team Sky.

"He has supported me throughout the last seven years of my career and I couldn't be more grateful for the opportunities and the experiences I've had.

"By his own admission, mistakes have been made, but protocols have been put in place to ensure that those same mistakes will not be made again.

"I know it will take time for faith to be restored, but I will do my utmost to ensure that happens, along with everyone else at Team Sky." Brailsford, speaking at the Tirreno-Adriatico race in Italy, told cyclingnews.com last week he had no intention of standing down.

"No. My thoughts are about what's good for the team and what's right," he said. "It's important to make sure that you can look at yourself and say that there has been no wrongdoing. "I'm confident of that," added Brailsford.

'PROCESS FAILURES'

However, he had previously accepted mistakes were made but said earlier this

month: "There is a fundamental difference between process failures and wrongdoing. Our commitment to anti-doping has been a core principle of Team Sky since its inception. Our mission is to race and win clean, and we have done so for eight years."

British anti-doping authorities are investigating Sky and British Cycling over a mysterious package delivered to now retired Wiggins, the 2012 Tour de France champion, at the 2011 Criterium du Dauphine.

Questions have also been asked over three "therapeutic use exemptions" or TUEs, granted to five-times Olympic champion Wiggins in 2011, 2012 and 2013.

It has been alleged that the package contained the banned corticosteroid triamcinolone. Wiggins has faced repeated questions since Russian hackers Fancy Bears revealed documents in September which showed he received TUEs for triamcinolone. TUEs are official waivers allowing athletes to use otherwise banned substances for the treatment of legitimate medical conditions.

Wiggins, however, has always denied any wrongdoing and insisted he needed the treatment to deal with a pollen allergy.

Under fire for its medical record-keeping, British Cycling was blasted Friday for its "shocking and inexcusable" treatment of sexism allegations.

Shane Sutton, Brailsford's longtime lieutenant and widely regarded as one of world cycling's top coaches, resigned as British Cycling's technical director in April last year after rider Jess Varnish alleged he had told her to "go and have a baby" following her failure to qualify for the Rio Olympics and subsequent loss of public funding.

Later an independent was launched to review British Cycling's performance programme-that has produced a host of worldbeating riders-led by British Rowing chair Annamarie Phelps.

According to the Daily Mail, the review said British Cycling looked to change the conclusions of grievance officer Alex Russell's inquiry into Sutton in a bid to retain the highly-regarded Australian. "The actions of the British Cycling board in that regard are shocking and inexcusable," the paper quoted the review as saying. — AFP

KUWAIT: Kuwait Eighth Tennis Open Tournament will come to a conclusion tonight under the patronage of President of Arab Tennis Federations, as more than 50 players will be honored during the closing ceremony.

Tournament Director Abdelreda Ghareeb called upon fans to attend the closing ceremony and enjoy the final match between Mohammad Siddiq and Bijorn Renquest against Abdelrahman Al-Awadhi and Abdallah Al-Mukaimi Al-Ghareeb thanked all sports clubs for their participation in the tournament which contributed to its success and made it the largest in Kuwait as far as participation is concerned. He said we would have accepted more participation but the courts limitation kept us from that. He said this tournament will be the nucleus of tournaments to be held at the New Tennis Center Courts at Sheikh Jaber Al-Abdallah Al-Jaber Al-Sabah International Tennis Complex, because such events are the basis for developing the game, as the player needs at least 50 matches locally, while it is only 10-20 currently per year.

RUSSIA STILL HAS WORK TO DO TO GET BAN LIFTED: WADA CHIEF

LAUSANNE: Russia still has "significant work" before its scandal tainted anti-doping operation regains global recognition, WADA chief Craig Reedie warned yesterday.

The World Anti-Doping Agency chief said Russia's national agency had not proved it was shielded against "outside interference." Reedie spoke at a WADA symposium in Lausanne as the Court of Arbitration for Sport ordered a life ban against Russian athletics doctor, Sergei Portugalov, one of the alleged masterminds of Russia's "state-sponsored" doping system.

The Russian Anti-Doping Agency (RUSADA) has been suspended since the eruption of the scandal over the widespread use of banned substances in Russian sport in 2014. "There remains significant work to do (for RUSADA). It must demonstrate its processes are autonomous and independent from outside interference," Reedie told the symposium.

"We continue the work to restore the compliance of the Russian agency." WADA has had two experts in Moscow " to ensure this independence," Reedie added. RUSADA was declared "non-complaint" with the international sports anti-doping code in November 2015 following an inquiry's findings of state-sponsored, systematic doping in Russia.

NOVEMBER TARGET

A report by Canadian lawyer Richard McLaren for WADA said the Russian sports ministry organised the doping. The Russian state has repeatedly denied any involvement. Russian sports minister Pavel Kolobkov, who replaced Vitaly Mutko who was implicated in the McLaren report, said Monday that Russia hoped to be declared compliant by November.

WADA "has agreed to a road map to ensure that RUSADA is back in line with the World Anti-Doping Code," Kolobkov told the symposium. "Some of the criteria have already been achieved and we are working to ensure that all the criteria are met. "The objective is to obtain a provisional conformity next May and RUSADA wants to regain its approval by November," added Kolobkov. "We have tripled RUSADA's budget and we've placed the anti-doping laboratory under the control of the University of Moscow and no longer under the ministry of sports." The McLaren report said that as sports minister Mutko must have known about the "state-sponsored" doping programmes used to help Russian athletes at the 2012 London Olympics, 2014 Sochi Winter Olympics, and the 2013 world athletics championships held in Moscow. As a result Russian athletes were barred from competing at the 2016 Rio Olympics after Russia's suspension by the IAAF. Kolobkov, 47, a former Olympic fencing champion, took over from Mutko-also chief organiser of the 2018 World Cup and Russian deputy prime minister-in October 2016.

The CAS, which handles Russian doping cases, yesterday ordered a "lifetime period of ineligibility" against Portugalov for supplying athletes with banned substances.

CAS said that Portugalov, who had served as the head of the Russian athletics federation's medical commission, had been found to have possessed, trafficked and administered prohibited substances. WADA recommended in a 2015 report that Portugalov take no part in any state sports programme after it found he had been key to rampant doping among Russian track and field athletes. — AFP

NBA REGULAR SEASON ENTERS FINAL MONTH

NEW YORK: The marathon that is the NBA regular season is headed toward its final sprint. With less than a month remaining until the final night of the season on April 12, the races for MVP and Rookie of the Year are wide open, and there is seemingly no clear-cut favorite to win the championship.

Much was already settled by this time last season. Stephen Curry had long since wrapped up what became the first unanimous MVP award in NBA history, and Karl-Anthony Towns had left Kristaps Porzingis behind in the Rookie of the Year chase.

There's far more intrigue now in a season that began with what seemed a forgone conclusion, that Golden State and Cleveland would meet in the NBA Finals for the third straight year. And this time, the MVP race could be headed toward a narrow finish among the likes of James Harden, Russell Westbrook, Kawhi Leonard and LeBron James. Joel Embiid's season-ending injury has put the rookie race up for grabs, with Philadelphia teammate Dario Saric and Milwaukee's Malcolm Brogdon perhaps emerging as the best of the leftover candidates - unless voters believe Embiid did enough to win in just 31 games. Golden State was headed toward an eventual NBA record for wins last season; now the Warriors aren't winning at all. Their three-game skid and Curry's slump have left San Antonio just a half-game back for the NBA's best record.

INJURY ISSUESKevin Durant's loss has left Golden

State vulnerable and Kyle Lowry's absence has Toronto reeling. Both could return near the end of the regular season, which could give their teams enough time to mount serious playoff runs.

RACES FOR 8TH

Milwaukee has surged into playoff position in the Eastern Conference with six straight wins, with Miami and Chicago both within 11/2 games of the Bucks' lead for the eighth and last postseason spot. Denver occupies No. 8 in the West, with Portland, Dallas and Minnesota close behind.

HOME-COURT HOPES

Toronto is clinging to a one-game lead over Atlanta for the No. 4 seed in the East and home-court advantage in the first round. Out West, Utah's lead over the fifth-place Los Angeles Clippers also is one game. The only

thing that seems settled is the race for the worst record. Brooklyn is eight games worse than anyone else, which will almost certainly give the Boston Celtics the best shot at the No. 1 overall pick, because they have the right to swap spots with Brooklyn.

WOBBLY WARRIORSGolden State is on its first three-

game losing streak in the regular season since Nov. 20-23, 2013, an NBA-record 297 consecutive games without three straight regular-season losses. The Warriors have a good chance to snap that Tuesday at home against Philadelphia.

WONDERFUL WIZARDS

Washington has won five in a row, the last two in overtime, and can wrap up a 5-0 road trip and a winning record for the season with a victory Monday in Minnesota.

BIG MONDAY MATCHUP

The Clippers visit the Jazz on Monday and certainly don't want to have to do it again in their playoff opener. A victory would tie them with Utah for the important No. 4 spot in the West.—AP

BANGLADESH HOPE TO BREAK LOSING STREAK IN 100TH TEST

COLOMBO: Bangladesh will be looking to overcome their recent dismal form as the perennial minnows try to make their 100th Test appearance an occasion to celebrate against Sri Lanka in Colombo.

Test cricket's newest entrants have showed occasional promise since they were drafted into the elite cricket competition in 2000 but have mostly embarrassed their loyal fans with a series of below-par performances in the game's most enduring format. They go into tomorrow's Test at the P Saravanamuttu Stadium trailing the twomatch series 0-1 after last week's crushing 259run loss at Galle-their 76th defeat and the fourth in a row in 99 Test matches.

No other Test-playing country has lost so many times in their first 100 Test matches and the dubious honour highlights Bangladesh's struggle in the five-day format over the past 17 years. So far they have won only eight Test matches, one more than New Zealand, who had only seven wins in their first 100 Tests, though the Kiwis managed to eke out 47 draws against

Bangladesh's 15. Five of Bangladesh's eight wins came at home including four against fellow strugglers Zimbabwe. And they won just three of their 46 games abroad-two against an under-strength West Indies and one against Zimbabwe.

The Tigers, as they are affectionately called by their fans, lost 21 consecutive Test matches between 2001 and 2004, the worst ever losing run by a team which no other side has even come close to emulating.

They have improved in recent matches, drawing their home series against England before dragging their last four Tests into the fifth day, which many saw as a mark of success.

"We are doing the right thing, that's why we have been competitive in all these games," coach Chandika Hathurusinghe told reporters in Colombo on Sunday.

'KEEP THINGS SIMPLE'

"Why have you raised your expectations? Because we are doing well, am I right? That's what we all expect, and we are asking too much of a team that is still finding their team in Test cricket. It is a fact," he said. While Sri Lanka Cricket plans to help Bangladesh celebrate their 100th Test match, including hosting a dinner in their honour, the visitors want to focus on the game. "We're trying to keep things simple because apart from the 100th Test, this is also an important game for us," Bangladesh Cricket Board spokesman Jalal Yunus told AFP in Dhaka. Former captain Habibul Bashar, who played

Bangladesh's inaugural Test against India in 2000, said the team must win more games to prove their detractors, including former England player Geoffrey Boycott, wrong.

"The best way to celebrate the (100th Test) occasion will be winning this game. Bangladesh need this win more than anything else," Bashar said. "We are now a strong side in limited over matches. But in Test cricket we must translate our potential into match-winning feats."

Under Manuel Pellegrini last season City reached the semi-finals for the first time, losing to eventual champions Real Madrid 1-0 on aggregate, and De Bruyne is confident they can go further with Guardiola

"I think we can reach the final, but of course the other teams will think the same and that doesn't make it easier,"

"It will be very tough against Monaco, they're doing extremely well at the moment, but we are very positive and if we beat them we are through to the quarter-finals.

"After that, the final isn't that far away," he added. Guardiola has won all seven previous last-16 ties with Barcelona and Bayern Munich, but City's recent away form is mediocre at best with just one victory in their last six games in Europe.

"We'd like to go through, but we cannot forget the team we are going to play. Their attack is the best, by far," Guardiola said after City defeated Middlesbrough 2-0 on Saturday to reach the FA Cup semi-finals. "It will be tough but we'll try to play our game and try to be one of the best eight teams in Europe."

Radamel Falcao, who scored twice at the Etihad Stadium, is set to return to the starting line-up on Wednesday after coming off the bench in Saturday's 2-1 win over Bordeaux that kept Monaco three points clear at the top.

Eighteen-year-old starlet Kylian Mbappe has scored nine goals in his last eight appearances, including the opener against Bordeaux, and will have a key role to play if Monaco are to continue their strong record in two-legged ties against English teams, having won four out of five times.

SHAKESPEARE APPOINTED

Jamie Vardy's goal in Spain ensured Leicester City remain firmly in the hunt for a quarter-final berth despite a 2-1

first-leg defeat at Sevilla. The Foxes used a 10-day gap in the fixture list to hold a training camp in Dubai ahead of Tuesday's return leg at the King Power Stadium. Craig Shakespeare has been named as the club's manager until the end of the season, and Austrian left-back Christian Fuchs said the trip to the Middle East was a welcome breather.

"It was an intense time over the last couple of weeks. It's good to come down and work a little on team spirit. When you win two games, that's the best medicine for team spirit," Fuchs told Leicester's in-house TV channel, with the Premier League champions coming off back-to-back 3-1 wins over Liverpool and Hull. Fernando Torres is expected to return for Atletico Madrid for their second leg at home to Bayer Leverkusen

after a sickening clash of heads in a 1-1 draw with Deportivo La Coruna 10 days ago. Diego Simeone's side, runners-up twice in the past three seasons, hold a 4-2 advantage going into Wednesday's clash in Spain.

Captain Gabi and defender Filipe Luis are suspended for Atletico, while Tayfun Korkut is the new man in charge for Leverkusen after replacing Roger Schmidt last week.

Porto face a monumental challenge to overturn a 2-0 deficit away to 2015 finalists Juventus. The Italian giants are unbeaten at home since August 2015 and extended their incredible 17-month winning league run in Serie A as Paulo Dybala scored a controversial last-gasp penalty in a 2-1 victory over AC Milan

MUGURUZA RALLIES TO BEAT US TEEN, PLISKOVA ADVANCES

INDIAN WELLS: French Open champion Garbine Muguruza survived a fierce challenge from US teenager Kayla Day Sunday to reach the fourth round of the WTA Indian Wells hard court tournament.

The seventh-seeded Spaniard had to dig in to subdue the hard-hitting Californian 3-6, 7-5, 6-2 and set up a meeting with 10th seeded Ukrainian Elina Svitolina.

Day, last year's US Open junior champion, had reached the third round with an upset of Australian Open semi-finalist Mirjana Lucic-Baroni. She needed little more than half an hour to seize a set from Muguruza, whose progress so far in 2017 has been hindered by injuries. Muguruza saved break points in the fifth and 11th games of the second set, finally converting her own first break chance to force the third. By then Day was wilting in the baking heat of Stadium Court. Muguruza broke her in the second game of the final set and again in the final game as the left-handed youngster surrendered with a double-fault.

"I think she played very good," Muguruza said. "She served very well. I think the first set I didn't play good. My level was not there. My shots were not there, and right away she took advantage and she won. "I didn't let that frustrate me. I reset my mind. I think at the time I was playing a little bit better and better, even though that first set was a little bit bad. But I think she played good. "I'm surprised with how she handled center court," added Muguruza, who was astonished-and touched-to learn that Day had named one of her dogs Garbine after seeing the Spaniard play at the Australian Open several years ago. If that youthful admiration made it harder for Day on the

court, Muguruza said, it was a problem many on the WTA face.

"I feel the same," she said. "When I play with all those big names and they are older than me. That's being very lucky to play

STREAKING SVITOLINA

Muguruza will face a dangerous challenge from Svitolina, a two-time winner on the WTA tour this year who took her winning streak to 15 matches with a 6-2, 6-1 win over Australian Daria Gavrilova.

"I'm trying not to think about whether this is my best tennis," Svitolina said. "I've achieved a lot of what I wanted, so I'm happy that I'm keeping it going."

In other women's matches Sunday, thirdseeded Karolina Pliskova, inserted at the top of the draw after Serena Williams's late injury withdrawal, edged Romanian Irina Camelia Begu 6-4, 7-6 (7/2).

Pliskova next faces Switzerland's Timea Bacsinszky, who beat Kiki Bertens of the Netherlands 6-3, 5-7, 7-6 (10/8) that produced multiple match points for both players. Bacsinszky had her first chance to close it out with two match points in the second set. Bertens had three match points as she served for the contest in the ninth game of the third-and she had a fourth match point in the tiebreaker before Bacsinszky finally sealed it on her sixth match point.

France's Caroline Garcia rallied from a set down to defeat 11th-seeded Briton Johanna Konta 3-6, 6-3, 7-6 (7/1) and book a meeting with eighth-seeded Russian Svetlana Kuznetsova.

Kuznetsova downed Italian Roberta Vinci 6-2, 2-6, 6-1. — AFP

DJOKOVIC, FEDERER, NADAL ADVANCE AT INDIAN WELLS

INDIAN WELLS: Novak Diokovic launched his bid for a sixth ATP Indian Wells Masters crown with a two-set triumph over Kyle Edmund as the stars shone Sunday in the California desert. The 46th-ranked Edmund served for the second set at 5-3, but world number two Djokovic broke him en route to a 6-4, 7-6 (7/5) triumph. His reward is a tough third-round clash with former US Open champion Juan Martin del Potro, a 7-6 (7/5), 6-3 winner over fellow Argentine Federico del Bonis.

"I think I played very well in the first set," Diokovic said. "Second set was obviously up and down. But credit to Kyle for playing some really aggressive tennis.

"He made a lot of winners in the beginning and midway through the second. There was not much wrong I did. I did miss some forehands. But other than that, it was a very solid match. Good, quality tennis, a good test." Roger Federer and Rafael Nadal also reached the third round, Federer flying through with a 6-2, 6-1 victory over France's Stephane Robert in just 51 minutes. Nadal opened his account with a steady 6-3, 6-2 victory over Argentina's Guido Pella. The three stars are packed together in a remarkable

bottom quarter of the draw. But Djokovic said he can't afford to think about a possible quarter-final clash with either of his longtime rivals with del Potro coming up. While Djokovic has won 12 of their 16 career meetings, the Argentine handed him a crushing two-tiebreak defeat in the first round of the Rio Olympics-a defeat Djokovic avenged in Acapulco this month. "Big guy, big serve, big forehand," Djokovic said of del Potro. "Definitely not the draw that you like early in the tournament and that you wish for, but it is what it is," added Djokovic, who is trying to get back to the winner's circle after a shock second-round exit at the Australian Open and a quarter-final loss to Nick Kyrgios in Acapulco.

Ninth-seeded Federer, resurgent after a 2016 season marred by injury, downed Nadal in an epic Australian Open final to secure his 18th Grand Slam title.

He hit a speed bump in Dubai this month, failing to convert three match points in a thirdround loss to Evgeny Donskoy-but he was firing on all cylinders against the 81st-ranked Robert.

"Very happy," said Federer, who missed Indian Wells last year with a knee injury that required surgery. "Knee is a thing of the past, which is great. I don't even have to think or talk about it."

'SOLID' NADAL

Nadal was pleased with a "solid" opening effort against Pella, made trickier by the ovenlike mid-day temperatures and the fact that Pella, like Nadal, is a left-hander.

"I didn't try to do amazing things. I tried to play solid," the fifth-seeded Spaniard said. "For moments I played well. For moments I played a little bit less well. Important thing, I won, and I won in straight sets." Nadal knows he'll have to turn up the intensity if he wants to end a hard court title drought stretching back to 2014.

The bottom half of the draw also features fourth-seeded Kei Nishikori of Japan, who eased past Britain's Daniel Evans 6-3, 6-4 on Sunday. But sixth-seeded Marin Cilic, who beat Nishikori in the 2014 US Open final, was an early casualty, beaten 4-6, 7-5, 6-4 by 19-year-old American Taylor Fritz. The jam-packed half of the draw is a

contrast to the wide-open top half, which lost a lot of its lustre on Saturday when world number one Andy Murray was stunned by 129th-ranked Canadian qualifier Vasek Pospisil.

"That's sport, no?" Nadal said. "Yesterday probably Andy didn't play his best match and Vasek served very well. So then you go to a tiebreak and anything can happen." — AFP

JUVENTUS FOCUSED ON WINNING CHAMPIONS LEAGUE

MILAN: With a sixth straight Serie A title looking likely and another Italian Cup final on the horizon, Juventus has become almost obsessively focused on the Champions League.

There is a feeling in Turin that victory in Europe would crown its resurrection from relegation to Serie B in 2006 following a match-fixing scandal. But first, Juventus needs to get past FC Porto today in the last 16, already holding 2-0 lead from the first leg.

"I'm aware of the importance the Champions League has for the Bianconeri family and for the history of the club," Juventus defender Dani Alves said. "I too, like all Juventus fans, want to dream and I'm convinced that if we continue down our path calmly, with personality, and without fear of making a mistake ... Then we can get right to the end." Against Porto, Juventus will be boosted by the return of Juan Cuadrado from suspension and Mario Mandzukic from illness. The two are almost certain to start in Juventus coach Massimiliano Allegri's innovative 4-2-3-1 system. Juventus holds an eight-point advantage in Serie A, and is leading Napoli 3-1 ahead of the second leg of the Italian Cup semifinals. So a treble is still possible.

"We are well, physically and mentally," Alves said. "Now the most important part of the season is coming and the great players work all year to be ready for these moments, those in which you have to win competitions.

"Together we can have a great end to the season." Juventus went close to the treble in Allegri's first year in charge, but the Italian team lost in the Champions League final to Barcelona.

That was the closest it had got to winning Europe's premier club competition since it was defeated in the final by AC Milan in 2003. Juventus, which was also runner-up in 1997 and 1998, last won the trophy in 1996.

Playing for titles in three competitions makes for a hectic schedule, however. "There's no time for us to rest after Milan and we don't want to," Alves said. "We want this match to come, to aim to pass the round and be in the

FA WITH PROBE INTO SON ABUSE

INDIAN WELLS: Garbine Muguruza of Spain in action against Kayla Day of the United

LONDON: Tottenham Hotspur and Millwall have both promised to assist a Football Association inquiry into the racist abuse directed towards Spurs forward Son Heung-Min during Sunday's FA Cup quarter-final. South Korea star Son was taunted by Millwall supporters during Tottenham's 6-0 victory at White Hart Lane and responded to the jibes with a hat-trick against the third-tier side.

He was subjected to chants of "dvd" and "three for a fiver", which were perceived as a racial slur against Asians who sell black market films in London.

According to British media reports, the FA will consider referee Martin Atkinson's match report and also seek the observations of both clubs.

A Tottenham spokesman said: "We strongly condemn the use of any racist language. "We shall be passing on all of our footage to the relevant authorities which can assist with the identification of anyone responsible for such chanting at yesterday's game." Meanwhile, a Millwall statement read: "Millwall have led the way on anti-discrimination initiatives and will continue to do so. "The club is assisting the FA with their investigation and will make no further

comment until that process is complete." After the match, Millwall manager Neil Harris made it clear such taunts shouldn't be tolerated.

"Honestly I didn't hear anything but myself and the club, we won't condone

that if there is," Harris said. "I'm sure it will be investigated and left to the authorities. We want people dealt with harshly of course. It's a shame to be talking about this.

"We just want everyone to enjoy the game. It's wrong in society and wrong in football." Millwall fans were also accused by Wolves boss Paul Ince of aiming the same racist chants at South Korea's Seol Ki-Hyeon in a match in 2005.

But Tottenham manager Mauricio Pochettino said Son hadn't complained about the chants after the match.

"No, Son didn't say anything," Pochettino said. "I didn't hear (the songs). It's difficult for me to understand the crowd." Millwall remain under a separate investigation by the FA after Leicester complained about the opposition fans' behaviour following the Lions' surprise victory in the previous round. Each inquiry, however, will be treated as a separate entity.

Millwall, based in south London, became notorious for mass acts of fan violence during the 1970s and 1980s,

leaving the club with a reputation that its officials have tried desperately hard to shed in the years since. —AFP

Heroes and worms: My Rally Mexico experience with Red Bull TV

have had an amazing time as Red Bull TV guest reporter in Mexico! Can I come back next time? It is funny: in some ways, the whole experience just underlined what I already admired about the World Rally Championship, and in other ways, it has taught me a lot as well. The sheer amount of organization that goes into a TV production like this is incredible; every second is accounted for.

As I said, these are the best drivers in the world, no question. To see their bravery, precision and commitment up close is something that is very special. Then to talk with them afterwards and find out exactly how it felt from their perspective was fascinating.

Make no mistake: Mexico is one tough rally. The World Rally Championship is an intense sprint, certainly compared to the off-road races that I do, so the drivers really have to perform under pressure. That pressure is not even just from the competition: it is from the heat, the dust, and the rocks as well. You fight the elements in Mexico.

To be honest, speaking as a Mexican, I did not actually find it that hot when I was out and about! However, when you are dealing with these very complex cars, built to completely new regulations, the heat was clearly a big issue. The cars were really struggling so it was just about survival, and that was an effect of the altitude as well. If you come from here you tend to take all that for granted, but you can see just how big a challenge it was.

As a driver watching a rally, your first thought is always: 'I wish I could be doing it myself!' In fact, I often found myself looking at the stages and thinking: 'I wonder what my Trophy Truck would be like round there?' However, if the opportunity ever came, I would love to have a go in a World Rally Car as well. It

MERKEL TO MEET TRUMP AMID TRADE TENSIONS

GERMAN INDUSTRY BOSSES TO ACCOMPANY CHANCELLOR ON US TRIP

FRANKFURT: Bosses of German companies including engineering group Siemens and carmaker BMW will travel with Chancellor Angela Merkel to meet US President Donald Trump this week, sources familiar with the matter told Reuters. Faced with Trump's "America First" policy and threats to impose tariffs on imported goods, the captains of industry will stress how many US jobs are tied to "Deutschland AG".

Trains-to-turbines group Siemens employs more than 50,000 people in the United States, its single biggest market, where it makes 21 percent of its total revenue, while BMW's South Carolina plant is its largest factory anywhere in the world. Trump will meet Merkel, Europe's longest-serving leader, for the first time today

Merkel told business leaders in Munich ves-

terday that free trade was important for both countries, while a German government spokesman confirmed at a press conference that the two leaders would also meet with German business executives. German chancellors have a long tradition of taking groups of business leaders along with them on trips to important countries. The other business leader accompanying Merkel will be the chief executive of ball-bearings maker Schaeffler.

The three chief executives will cross the Atlantic for a single scheduled meeting of less than an hour with Trump. They will brief the president on the German practice of training workers on the job while also sending them to classes at a vocational school to obtain formal qualifications. Such training is traditionally offered by large German companies both at

home and in their foreign operations, and is particularly prized in emerging economies, where it helps German corporations win business.

Sources of tension between Berlin and the new US administration include an accusation by a senior Trump adviser that Germany profits unfairly from a weak euro, and Trump's threat to impose 35 percent tariffs on imported vehicles. The United States is Germany's biggest trading partner, buying German goods and services worth 107 billion euros (\$114 billion) last year while exporting just 58 billion euros' worth in return. "The accusations of President Donald Trump and his advisers are plucked out of thin air," the president of Germany's VDMA engineering industry association, Carl Martin

Welcker, said in a statement yesterday. He said 81,000 people were employed in German-owned engineering firms in the United States with almost 30 billion euros in total revenue, while German export successes were linked to the high quality of goods, not

foreign-exchange effects. As part of a bid to bring jobs to America, Trump has urged carmakers to build more cars in the United States and discouraged them from investing in Mexico, where German and other carmakers have big plants. Trump's order banning citizens of some majority-Muslim countries from entering the United States, and a threat to tear up the NAFTA free trade deal between the United States, Mexico and

Canada, have also unnerved business leaders. Siemens chief executive Joe Kaeser expressed concern last month about developments in the United States since Trump took office, saying: "The new American president has a style that's different from what we're accustomed to. It worries us, what we see."

BMW's Chief Executive Harald Krueger said last week that introducing protectionist measures and tariffs would not be good for the United States. The carmaker is expanding its plant in Spartanburg, South Carolina, to have a capacity of 450,000 vehicles, with 70 percent for export. It is also building a new plant in Mexico, where it plans to invest \$2.2 billion by 2019. Mexico's lower labor costs and unique free trade position mean it now accounts for a fifth of all vehicle production in North America. "America profits from free trade. We are supporters of free trade and not of protectionism," Krueger told reporters at the Geneva auto show. — Reuters

SCOTLAND SEEKS INDEPENDENCE REFERENDUM AMID BREXIT SPAT

LONDON: Scotland's leader delivered a shock twist to Britain's EU exit drama yesterday, announcing that she will seek authority to hold a new independence referendum in the next two years because Britain is

dragging Scotland out of the EU against its will. First Minister Nicola Sturgeon said that she would move quickly to give voters a new chance to leave the United Kingdom because Scotland was being

forced into a "hard Brexit" that it didn't vote for. because evidence shows most Scottish voters Britons decided in a June 23 referendum to leave the EU, but Scots voted by 62 to 38 percent to remain. Scotland must not be "taken down a path that we do not want to go down without a choice," Sturgeon said. The move drew a quick rebuke from Prime Minister Theresa May who said a second referendum would be hugely disruptive and is not justified

oppose a second referendum.

She said Sturgeon's Scottish National Party is guilty of "tunnel vision." Sturgeon spoke in Edinburgh as Britain's Parliament was on the verge of approving a Brexit bill that will allow the UK to start the formal withdrawal from the EU within days.

Sturgeon said she would ask the Scottish Parliament next week to start the process of calling a referendum, to be held between the fall of 2018 and the spring of 2019. She said by then, details of Britain's post-Brexit deal with the EU would be clear and Scottish voters would be able to make "an informed choice."

The British government must agree before a legally binding referendum can be held. It didn't say yesterday whether it would do so, but said an independence ballot "would be divisive and cause huge economic uncertainty at the worst possible time."

In a 2014 referendum, Scottish voters rejected independence by a margin of 55 percent to 45 percent. But Sturgeon said that the UK's decision to leave the EU had brought about a "material change of circumstances." Sturgeon said that she had sought compromise with May's government, but had been met with a "brick wall of intransigence."

Sturgeon has been seeking a deal that will allow Scotland to stay in the European single market and customs union. But she said she has become convinced May is pursuing a "hard Brexit" that would leave Britain outside those arrangements, which many UK businesses see as crucial. "I am not turning my back on further discussions should the UK government change its mind," she said. — AP

EUROPE TO TELL G20 IT WILL **RESIST PROTECTIONISM**

BRUSSELS: European Union finance ministers will tell a G20 meeting this week that they will resist protectionism and that financial rules introduced after the 2008 crisis must be kept in place.

A document prepared by the EU ministers, which appears aimed at the United States, sets out the position of all European delegations for the G20 gathering of ministers and central bankers in Baden Baden in Germany on March 17-18. "We reaffirm our commitment to keep the global economy open, resist protectionism and keep global economic cooperation on track," says the paper, seen by Reuters.

An early draft communique for the G20 meeting suggested on March 7 that the world's financial leaders might no longer explicitly reject protectionism, breaking with a decade-old tradition. Instead, following the change of administration in Washington, they might promise only to keep an "open and fair international trading system", wording which some officials see as a way to accommodate the protectionist views of President Donald Trump. The draft communique, however, could change substantially, following discussions on March 17-18, G20 officials said.


The European Union ministers' document also appears to argue against Trump's plans to roll back US legislation, called the Dodd-Frank Act, introduced to prevent another financial sector crisis


like that one in 2008. "Avoiding a rollback in the financial regulation agenda is necessary," the document says. The document also appears to address remarks by Patrick McHenry, the Vice-Chair of the House of Representatives' Financial Services Committee, in letter to Fed Chairman Janet Yellen about the international role of the Fed. McHenry wrote that the US central bank should stop "negotiating international regulatory standards among global bureaucrats in foreign lands without transparency, accountability, or the authority to do so". The European document says: "International coordination and continued participation of all G20 members in international fora on financial regulation is of fundamental importance."


European Commission Vice President Valdis Dombrovskis said in February that while the United States had every right to redefine its national interest, Europe was entitled to say that international cooperation on financial governance was in everyone's interest.

"We are sensitive to talk of unpicking financial legislation which applies carefully negotiated international standards and rules," Dombrovskis said.

"It is difficult not to notice when the Chair of the Federal Reserve is criticised for her approach to negotiating international rules and standards, or when an American President talks about 'doing a big number' on Dodd-Frank." — Reuters

KUWAIT: Inflation in consumer prices steadied at 3.3 percent year-on-year (y/y) in January, as inflation across most components remained stable or came in unchanged. Local food inflation remained weak as global food inflation remained soft. Core inflation, which excludes food prices, held steady at around 4.1 percent y/y after witnessing a surge in the aftermath of the fuel price hike in September 2016; this came largely on the back of lower inflationary pressures from housing rent.

Inflation is expected to witness renewed upward pressures in 2017 from May onward, as the government introduces higher electricity and water tariffs, though the impact is now thought to be more limited. The government recently approved new tariffs that are well below those initially approved in legislation last year. The hikes are now expected at 50-150 percent for the various sectors. As a result, upward pressures could push average inflation to around 3.5 percent in 2017, up from 3.2 percent in 2016.

Inflation in local food prices maintained its weakness in January, after logging in a reading of 0.2 percent y/y. Price growth in this component continues to be weighed down by soft global food price inflation. However, we may see inflation in this segment gain momentum in the near-tomedium term on the back of gains in global food price inflation. According to the Commodity Research Bureau, international prices of commodity foods rebounded and jumped to a multi month high of 2.9 percent y/y in January following several months of deflationary prices.

After easing in December in line with some softness in the real estate market, inflation in housing services remained unchanged. Inflation in the housing component, which is mostly comprised of housing rents and is updated quarterly, eased from 7.4 percent y/y in 3Q16 to 6.4 percent y/y in 4Q16. Nonetheless, on a quarter-on-quarter basis the 4Q16 increase remained surprisingly strong at 2.8 percent.

We expect the momentum in this segment to see some further easing in the near term on a year-on-year basis before gathering pace in the second half of 2017 on the back of utility hikes.

Retail sector

Inflation in the retail sector continued to face downward pressures at the start of 2017. Inflation in clothing & footwear and the other goods & services segments continued to decelerate in January; in fact, clothing & footwear prices continued to decline due to softer consumer demand, extended seasonal promotions and a stronger dinar. After jumping in December, inflation in the furnishings & household maintenance segment stabilized at 4.0 percent y/y in January.

The stabilization in inflation in the furnishings & household maintenance segment was reflected in the inflation in services excluding housing segment. After surging on higher fees in the household maintenance segment in December, inflation in services excluding housing stabilized at 2.3 percent y/y in January.

Inflation in the transportation sector stood pat above the 10 percent y/y mark for the fourth straight month in January. After surging in September, on the heels of a fuel price hike, inflation in this segment has thus far held steady around 10 percent y/y. We may see some upward pressures in this segment in the short to medium-term as transport services readjust their prices to account for the fuel price increases.

But any further upward pressures are likely to be at least partly offset by the continued decline in car prices, which weigh more heavily on the transportation index.

EU SAYS GAZPROM OFFER TO AVOID ANTITRUST FINES ALLAYS WORRIES

BRUSSELS: Gazprom is ready to comply with EU rules to end a five-year antitrust case and avoid fines, the bloc's competition commissioner said yesterday, signalling a thaw in business ties between Moscow and Brussels despite tensions over Ukraine. Eight member states in the east, all formerly dominated by Moscow, now have until May 4 to object to the EU executive's view and could try to seek changes in Gazprom's offer. The Russian state gas exporter, which supplies a third of the EU's gas, has been on the radar of EU regulators since 2012, culminating in charges in April 2015 that it overcharged customers in Central and Eastern Europe and blocked rivals. Since then, Gazprom has offered concessions aimed at staving off a potential fine of up to 10 percent of its global turnover. EU Competition Commissioner Margrethe Vestager, who has brought actions and levied fines against major US multinationals such as Google, said Gazprom's offer allayed worries and provided "a forward looking solution".

"Combined we think that these measures are important improvements to ensure the free flow of gas at competitive prices," Vestager said. Gazprom has agreed to fixed transparent fees and to allow clients the right to price revisions clauses in long-term contracts, EU regulators said. — Reuters

ORLD STOCK MARKETS PUSH HIGHER ON FED FOCUS

LONDON: World stock markets mostly rose yesterday following a forecast-busting US jobs report that looks set to prompt an interest hike this week from the Federal Reserve. The pound advanced amid speculation that Britain could trigger as soon as today the formal process for exiting the European Union. Sterling held onto its gains despite the announcement by Scotland's nationalist government of plans for another independence vote.

In the United States, Friday's employment report reinforced a long-running belief the world's top economy was on a strong growth track and focus is now on the conclusion of the central bank's policy meeting tomorrow.

In a busy week for global monetary policy, the Japanese and British central banks also meet this week. "Another rate hike could be just days away, indeed, given the way the Fed's policymakers have been talking, it is practically a certainty at this point," said Chris Beauchamp, chief market analyst at IG trading group.

"Friday's jobs report reinforced the narrative, but the key now will be what the statement and press conference say." The dollar wobbled yesterday as some traders took out their profits before the Fed meeting.

"Markets are already fully priced for a Fed rate hike on Wednesday," said Janu Chan, a senior economist at St George Bank in Sydney. Most stock markets in Asia started the week on a high-tracking all three main Wall Street indicesafter the Labor Department said the US economy created 235,000 new jobs in February, much more than estimated.

US flatlines before Fed

US markets opened flat. "US stocks are hovering around the flatline in early action ... amid heightened Fed rate hike expectations for Wednesday and ramped up political uncertainty in Europe," said analysts at US brokerage Charles Schwab. But oil prices continued to suffer following last week's losses of about nine percent in both main contracts, hit by a surpris-

ingly big jump in US stockpiles, increased US shale production and concerns about implementation of a OPEC-Russia led deal to cut output.

"For all the somewhat hopeful talk from industry experts about oil inventories running down later in the year, the fact remains that US shale has come back harder, faster and cheaper than anyone could have imagined," said Jeffrey Halley, senior market analyst at Oanda trading group.

Modest gains

European stock markets eked out some modest gains yesterday after a strong US jobs report helped Wall Street end last week on a high note. However a welter of potential "event risks" this week kept sentiment in check.

In Europe, Germany's DAX rose 0.2 percent to 11,985 while the CAC 40 in France added 0.2 percent to 5,002. Britain's FTSE 100 was up 0.3 percent to 7,362. U.S. stocks were poised for a steady open with Dow futures and the broader S&P 500 futures both up 0.1 percent.

Japan's Nikkei 225 stock index rose 0.2 percent to 19,633.75 and Hong Kong's Hang Seng gained 1.1 percent to 23,829.67. South Korea's Kospi added 1 percent to 2,117.59. The Shanghai Composite index climbed 0.8 percent to 3,237.02, while Australia's S&P ASX 200 fell 0.3 percent to 5,757.30. — Agencies

BIG WEEK FOR MARKETS: BREXIT, FED, ELECTIONS

LONDON: Investors around the world are bracing for a series of events this week that could potentially cause waves in markets. And, for once, they're not directly about US President Donald Trump.

From the expected launch of Britain's exit from the European Union to the Federal Reserve's discussion of another interest rate hike, there's a lot that could cause volatility and even put a brake on the so-called Trump Bump, the monthslong rally in stocks. "This week is most unusual from a macro point of view as there is a heavy concentration of 'event risk", said Neil MacKinnon, global macro strategist at VTB Capital. Here are a few of the biggest events.

Brexit begins?

Brexit could become a binding, irreversible fact this week. Since Britain voted to leave the EU last June, nothing happened apart from a sharp fall in the pound. But that period of calm is due to end, with the government expected to trigger, as soon as today, the formal process by which the country leaves the bloc it's been part of since 1973.

Triggering the so-called Article 50 of the EU treaty begins two years divorce negotiations. They will focus on how Britain leaves the bloc and on creating a new trade deal with the EU, its main export market. It's unclear how big the market reaction may be to the announcement of the Article 50. Traders will have come to expect it to happen eventually, which could mean the pound doesn't drop too sharply on the day. In the longer-term, however, it means British markets will be subject to a daily barrage of headlines on how the negotiations are going.

"It will prove challenging for the government to manage expectations over a two-year period, and negotiating setbacks may be reflected in heightened financial market volatility," said James McCormack, Global Head of Sovereign Ratings at Fitch. And complications could arise, as evidenced Monday by the decision from the Scottish government to call for another independence referendum from the United Kingdom. That is directly due to June's Brexit vote, when Scotland voted overwhelmingly to remain part of the EU.

US rate-setters are set to sanction

another quarter point interest rate increase at the conclusion of their twoday meeting tomorrow, which will take the benchmark Fed rate up to a range of 0.75 - 1.00 percentage point. That won't be a surprise - it's a near unanimous opinion among experts in the markets following a raft of positive economic news, including last Friday's stronger than anticipated payrolls report.

There will be more interest in what Fed Chair Janet Yellen says in her subsequent press conference and whether she will indicate that there are more hikes to come this year. "The expectations that the Fed will hike three times this year has been rising in recent weeks and the market will be watching the central bank's statement closely for any signs that another move could follow in June," said Jane Foley, a senior strategist at Rabobank International.

The Fed isn't the only central bank meeting this week - the Bank of Japan, the Swiss National Bank and the Bank of England will all reconsider their monetary policies, potentially moving markets.

Dutch elections

In Europe, another key focus will be tomorrow's general election in the Netherlands, and how well populist anti-EU forces do. The vote comes at a time of acute tension between the country and Turkey after Turkish ministers were prevented from campaigning in the Netherlands regarding a referendum in Turkey. That prompted Turkish President Recep Tayyip Erdogan to claim that

"Nazism is alive in the West." The question is how the clash will play out in the election: will it boost support for Prime Minister Mark Rutte's conservative party or will it stir up more support for the Party for Freedom, the vehicle of anti-Islam populist Geert Wilders, who wants the Netherlands to leave the EU?

Though Wilders is unlikely to be part of any new government due to how the electoral system works, the level of support he gets will be a gauge of populist sentiment in Europe, where other key elections are due year. —AP

DOLLAR STEADIES AFTER 3 day fall; sterling hit

LONDON: The dollar recovered a foothold yesterday after its worst three days of losses since early December, the impact of higher US market interest rates turning it positive on the day against both the euro and a basket of currencies. Sterling, along with the Canadian dollar the worst major performer of the past fortnight against the greenback, rose almost half a percent after the devolved Scottish government demanded the right to hold a new referendum on independence.

But a gain of 0.2 percent for the dollar put an end to a wave of profit-taking that has taken hold since last Thursday's policy meeting yielded hints the European Central Bank is starting to think more about how to react to an improving eurozone economy.

Friday's solid jobs number has still cemented the case for a rise in US Federal Reserve rates this week that will long predate any rise in the European equivalents, and long-term market rates are also far higher. Belgian central banker Jan Smets also told the Wall Street Journal that the ECB had not taken a first step towards removing stimulus. "There was also always the chance that once we got a good payrolls number on Friday, the market would take some money off the table and that duly occurred," said Neil Mellor, a currency strategist with Bank of New York Mellon in London. "But the fundamentals are still behind the dollar. A lot is priced in but when you have a currency that is outstanding in terms of yield, the selloff was always going to be limited."

"Sturgeon in the end did not say anything that changed what we had assumed would happen sooner or later," said a dealer with one bank in London. — Reuters

OIL PRICES DROP AS HEDGE FUNDS HEAD FOR THE EXIT

LONDON: Hedge funds and other money managers had barely started liquidating their record bullish position in crude oil futures and options before prices tumbled on March 8. The critical question is how much more of the position will need to be liquidated before the market stabilizes again.

Hedge funds still held a net long position in the three major Brent and WTI futures and options contracts amounting to 874 million barrels at the close of business on March 7.

Fund managers had reduced their net position by 16 million barrels compared with the previous week and by a total of 77 million compared with the record of 951 million barrels set on Feb. 21. The net position has been trimmed in the two weeks ending on March 7 but only after increasing by 529 million barrels in the previous 14 weeks. The net long position is still more than double the low of 422 million barrels set in mid-November before OPEC announced its productioncutting agreement.

Fund managers still held an overwhelming bullish position at the end of March 7, with long positions outnumbering shorts by a ratio of 7:1. The near-record concentration of hedge fund long positions in oil significantly raised the risk of a crowded trade and likely contributed to the sharp fall in the price of oil starting on March 8.

The drop in prices started after the cut off for the latest commitments of traders reports issued by the U.S. Commodity Futures Trading Commission and ICE Futures Europe. But the next reports, for the week ending March 14, are likely to show hedge funds liquidated more long positions when they are published on March 17 and March 20.

Crowded trade

The sharp fall in prices that occurred on March 8 and continued on March 9-10 is consistent with the rush for the exits which occurs when a crowded trade breaks down ("Predatory trading and crowded exits", Clunie, 2010). The rush normally starts shortly sometime AFTER prices have peaked and after a small number of traders have already started to shift their positions ("Why stock markets crash", Sornette, 2003).

In this case, Brent prices reached a recent peak of \$57.31 per barrel on Feb. 21, and the hedge funds' net long position also peaked at 951 million barrels on the same date. Since then, there has been gentle liquidation of hedge fund positions and a barely perceptible downward trend in prices.

This gentle exit by a small number of traders turned into a rush on March 8 in much the same way an avalanche picks up momentum.

Critically, some traders seem to have anticipated the market was close to a turning point, with the number of short positions rising from 102 million on Feb. 21 to 144 million on March 7.

The absence of fresh hedge fund buying and the emergence of a small band of short sellers created a liquidity hole and was likely responsible for the abrupt drop in prices which started on March 8.

The next commitments of traders reports, published on March 17 and March 20, will reveal how much of the remaining net long position was liquidated between March 8 and March 10, and give some idea of how much more needs to be liquidated before prices steady again. — Reuters

WANDA ABORTS \$1BN BID FOR GOLDEN GLOBES PRODUCER

BEIJING: A \$1 billion bid by China's Wanda Group for the operator of the Golden Globe awards has been aborted, the US firm's parent has said, following reports that it was sunk by a Chinese clampdown on overseas investments. The acquisitive Chinese property-toentertainment group had announced in November it planned to buy Dick Clark Productions, the latest move into Hollywood by a company from China.

But Eldridge Industries, the parent of Dick Clark Productions, said in a statement issued in the United States on Friday that the deal was terminated "after Wanda failed to honour its contractual obligations". Eldridge Industries added that Dick Clark Productions is suing Wanda for funds it is contractually owed upon "failure to consummate the sale".

Reached by phone yesterday, a Wanda spokeswoman declined to comment. Sources told Bloomberg News last week that Wanda had struggled to move the money for the acquisition out of China. "It's almost impossible to use the yuan to invest in overseas projects," Zhang Yichen, chief executive and chairman of Citic Capital Holdings, told Bloomberg News.

"To say that capital controls don't have any impact-it's a lie. As a result, yuan funds can only give up, and not invest (outside China)."

Wanda, headed by one of China's richest men, Wang Jianlin, is a commercial property developer that has diversified recently into entertainment and sports, partly as a buffer against Chinese real-estate volatility. Wanda bought AMC Entertainment Holdings-owner of US-based cinema chain AMC Theatres-for \$2.6 billion in 2012 and last year acquired Legendary Entertainment, makers of the

recent "Batman" trilogy and "Jurassic World", for \$3.5 billion.

The Dick Clark Productions deal would have marked its entry into television production. Dick Clark Productions' eponymous founder made his name presenting "American Bandstand" for more than 30 years. The company also owns the television rights to events ranging from Miss America to the New Year countdown in New York's Times Square.

'Irrational investments'

Chinese firms went on a multi-billion-dollar shopping spree last year, culminating in state-owned ChemChina's pending \$43 billion bid for Swiss seed giant Syngenta. The acquisitions stoked Chinese official concern over capital flight, reckless investments, slowing domestic economic growth and a weak-

The government began last year to roll out

new restrictions to curb the outflow of money into "irrational" investments. Commerce Minister Zhong Shan on Saturday kept up the criticism of overseas investments by Chinese "companies with no strength or experience".

"Some companies have already paid the price," Zhong said during a press conference at the annual session of China's rubber-stamp legislature. "We not only discourage these kinds of irrational investments, but we will also be keeping watch on them." Central bank governor Zhou Xiaochuan last week blamed the foreign investment wave on "overheated emotions", saying the government's measures have been "necessary and effective". A \$1 billion financing deal between Paramount Pictures and two Chinese film companies, Shanghai Film Group and Huahua Media, has reportedly borne little fruit since it was announced in January.

December saw the collapse of Chinese copper manufacturer Anhui Xinke New Materials' \$350 million bid to buy Voltage Pictures, the producer of "The Hurt Locker", shortly after it was announced.

Other overseas acquisitions reportedly running into trouble include a Chinese consortium's purchase of Italian football titans AC Milan, which has been repeatedly delayed. China's clampdown marks an about-face after authorities had long urged companies to seek better returns and technological knowhow through overseas acquisitions. China's direct overseas investment plummeted 35.7 percent year-on-year in January, according to official data, though the Lunar New Year business slowdown during the month may also have been a factor. — AFP

Trump budget timeline mixes **DEADLINES AND UNCERTAINTY**

WASHINGTON: President Donald Trump's release of a spending blueprint for the upcoming budget year will set in motion a debate that's full of uncertainty - and the potential for gridlock, even a government shutdown. There's also a more immediate quandary: What to do about the current budget year? None of the 12 annual appropriations bills has been enacted and a temporary funding measure expires next month. Trump's signature is needed on what promises to be an omnibus spending bill with a \$1 trillion-plus price tag. The path toward passage may be rocky, given the political land mines such as the southern border wall and a budget-busting supplemental Pentagon request.

Some key dates in the process:

Early March: With Wednesday's deadline to increase the government's borrowing authority looming, Treasury Secretary Steven Mnuchin said he would use bookkeeping measures to avert a first-ever government default on U.S. obligations such as Social Security benefits and interest payments. Such "extraordinary measures" will buy time until the fall for lawmakers to approve legislation increasing the debt limit.

Thursday: Trump submits a budget covering only discretionary spending. That's the \$1 trillion-plus portion of the \$4 trillion federal budget that passes through Congress each year. Trump's plan would boost the Pentagon's budget by \$54 billion - about 10 percent - while cutting domestic programs and foreign aid by an equal amount.

April 28: A temporary, governmentwide funding bill expires. Unless Congress passes and Trump signs a catchall spending bill or another exten-

sion, the government would partially shut down. Democratic votes are needed to pass the bill through the Senate, but any measure that satisfies Democrats is sure to alienate tea party Republicans.

May: Trump reveals the remainder of his budget, including tax proposals, plans for curbing mandatory spending, economic projections - and large deficits. Around the same time, Congress is likely to work on its annual budget resolution, which promises to be very difficult but is a precursor to Trump's promise to overhaul tax laws.

Summer-Fall: The Republican-run Congress tries to advance spending bills for the 2018 budget year, which begins Oct. 1. Meeting that deadline is highly unlikely, but at some point, budget talks probably will begin - assuming, as many do, that the regular process will have broken down. — AP


DISCOVER HOW FORD'S PARTS DEPOT DISTRIBUTES FROM DUBAI TO DAKAR

DUBAI: In 2011, Ford established a regional parts distribution centre (PDC) in Dubai's Jebel Ali Free Zone. Before it opened its doors in the UAE, it could take up to 90 days for a part requested by a Ford dealer from the Middle East, to be handed over. Nowadays, it can take as little as one day with a same-day emergency delivery service available - or up to a maximum of only nine days for a vehicle to have its replacement part ready to go to work, depending on the location.

Even more impressive is that within two days of a dealer requesting a replacement part, it is located, packaged and invoiced, which equates to the quickest turnaround in the region. For an emergency order, however, it gets handled within three hours, regardless of its final destination. The approximate 42,000 different part numbers in the UAE travel as far as the west coast of Africa - to places like Dakar in Senegal, with a potential 85 per cent of those parts having arrived in the UAE, initially, direct from the affiliates in the United States. The United Kingdom accounts for a further 11 per cent, with the final four per cent of parts shipped to the UAE originating in Thailand, India and South Africa.

On average, seven ocean containers arrive by truck to Ford's PDC each day, fully-loaded with parts to be received, shelved, and accounted for. The same day, an average of 15 trucks, some carrying full ocean containers depart the facility, ready to distribute Ford service parts regionwide. In 2011, the Ford PDC stood on 22,000 square metres of warehouse space. Currently its floor space is around 27,000 square metres, though plans are afoot to increase to an estimated 30,000 square metres in the next five years. Within the decade it's projected that 41,000 square metres will be needed to cater for the amount of parts passing through Dubai's distribution centre.

Despite Ford demonstrating an exceptionally efficient downsizing in unique parts, year-onyear regional sales growth of around 13 per cent has dictated the need for growing warehouse floor space. The sales growth not only highlights the PDC's importance due to increased demands.



but also the innovation required to best serve Ford customers. The end result of these increased efficiencies means most parts at the PDC don't have much of a literal shelf life.

"When a part is ordered by a dealer, it's important to know that their technicians will probably be required to perform some sub-assembly to go with that part before it is fitted to the vehicle. In some cases, it could be closer to 20 different parts, and not just one that might be needed", said Erhan Yengulalp, Ford Dubai PDC Manager, Parts, Service and Logistics.

"Consider a replacement door for example this one item requires many different component parts," Yengulalp explained. "Therefore the associated sub-assemblies will need the door panel, hinges, door checker, weather strips, mouldings, door glass, run channels, door run-belts, door glass and door handles. Our ability to locate, pack and invoice all those parts in a region-best time makes the Ford PDC one of the top performing supply chain services in the Middle East and North Africa."

The majority of the parts that are delivered to the Ford Parts Distribution Centre in Dubai arrive in a cardboard box on a pallet, which is then taken from to be stock-kept in the racks or stored in drawers. Showcasing Ford's desire to work efficiently, and 'greener', 100 per cent of the boxes and pallets are recycled to pack and redistribute parts to their new destination, proving that corporate responsibility is high on Ford's agenda, and sustainability plays a vital role in the company's plans.

Investing in a regional growing parts warehouse allows manufacturers to better manage its supply chain, and brings Ford closer to the customer, with a keen eye on service.

In Kuwait, Genuine Ford and Motorcraft parts are available at Alghanim Auto, the only importer contractually authorised by Ford to sell new Ford vehicles, genuine Ford and Motorcraft parts, and provide aftersales support to Ford and Lincoln customers in Kuwait. DON'T TELL YOUR BOSS: HOW TO STREAM MARCH MADNESS TOURNAMENT

NEW YORK: The 67-game March Madness basketting cable service might be cheaper. Streaming ball tournament begins today, with many games taking place during the day when you're, ahem, supposed to be working.

Fortunately for you - but not your bosses - all NCAA Tournament games will be available online. For many of the early round games, though, you'll need a password through your cable or satellite TV subscription. The television networks no longer offer a stand-alone subscription you can buy without cable.

places http://www.ncaa.com/marchmadness or the NCAA March Madness Live app. All the games will be there, regardless of where they are televised.

CBS is televising 24 games, including the national championship and the Final Four. These games won't require a cable or satellite password through the app or website, but they are viewable only on phones, tablets and computers - not streaming devices such as Apple TV, Roku or Fire TV.

You'll need a password for the remaining games, which are split among the Turner-owned cable channels - TBS, TNT and truTV. There's a three-hour grace period on most devices. You could get some 40 devices to watch all the games for free, but getdevices are OK for watching, but there's no grace period. Games also will be available on individual apps for TBS, TNT and truTV - again with a password. On desktops and laptops, the March Madness website will have a "boss button" on the upper right corner. One click replaces the game with a fake screenshot of a note-taking or PowerPoint-like app.

No passwprd?

Consider subscribing to an online television package. If you want just the CBS games and don't have an antenna, you can get CBS All Access starting at \$6 a month. This service is required to watch CBS games on a streaming TV device.

You can time the free week trial to watch the Final Four games on April 1 and the championship on April 3, if that's all you want. Make sure your local station is included.

CBS says it has deals covering more than 90 percent of the US population, but that won't help if you're in that 10 percent. For the Turner channels, you can get Sling TV for \$25 a month, DirecTV Now at \$35 or PlayStation Vue for \$30 or \$40, depending on the market. All three offer weeklong trials as well. For Sling TV, get the "Orange" package with the "Comedy Plus Extra" add-on, or sign up for the "Blue" option. Same price either way. Sony's PlayStation Vue is the only service to offer both Turner and CBS, but only in selected markets.

The availability of CBS stations is impressive, compared with other networks, but it's short of what CBS All Access offers. Sony says the 99 CBS stations it has through Vue covers 60 percent of the U.S. population.

Keeping up

If you subscribe through PlayStation Vue and have a PlayStation 4 device, you can watch three channels on the same screen at once. This means you can keep up with games being televised simultaneously on different channels, or have a talk show taking up one of the three streams. You choose which stream gets the audio. If you're watching Vue on something other than the PlayStation 4, it's just one game at a time.

The March Madness app on Apple TV offers two games simultaneously, one with audio. You can have multiple browsers open on some devices, or you can just watch simultaneously on a phone and a personal computer.

Raising the stakes

If your office isn't doing a March Madness pool, there are plenty of options online. You can set up your own challenge group with friends, family or co-workers, or you can join an existing public group. Yahoo, for instance, has groups organized around specific schools. ESPN is offering prizes, including a trip to Hawaii.

The NCAA's official bracket challenge promises to integrate links to live video streams from the tournament. There's also an option to award bonus points for correctly picking upsets.

There's more

Westwood One's radio coverage of all games will be available through the March Madness app on phones and tablets and the tournament's website on PCs - no password needed. No streaming TV devices. This year, live audio is also available on Amazon Alexa speakers, such as the Echo. Just ask with a voice command.

On desktops and laptops, a shot-chart feature will let you see where players made shots during a game, updated in real time. It's an optional graphical overlay over the live video stream, so you won't miss the action.

On Apple TV, March Madness fans will get a special navigation tool resembling the traditional NCAA bracket. Just click on the matchup you're interested in for stats, highlights and a link to the full game. — AP

INTEL BUYING ISRAELI CAR TECH FIRM MOBILEYE FOR \$15BN

JERUSALEM: Intel will buy Israeli car tech firm Mobileye for more than \$15 billion (14 billion euros), the companies said yesterday, in a deal signalling the US computer chip giant's commitment to technology for self-driving vehicles.

Israeli media reported that the deal worth approximately \$15.3 billion was the largest ever cross-border acquisition for an Israeli tech firm. It comes with Intel and Mobileye previously collaborating with German automaker BMW to develop self-driving cars.

Intel and Mobileye said they expected to combine to become a global leader in "autonomous driving" that could provide the technology at a lower cost.

'The combination is expected to accelerate innovation for the automotive industry and position Intel as a leading technology provider in the fast-growing market for highly and fully autonomous vehicles," it said. "Intel estimates the vehicle systems, data and services market opportunity to be up to \$70 billion by 2030." Last year, BMW announced that it was joining forces with Mobileye and Intel on a self-drive project for "highly and fully automated driving" to be commercially available by 2021.

BMW announced in January it would deploy 40 self-driving vehicles for tests in the United States and Europe

In August, Mobileye and UKbased auto-equipment maker Delphi said they were teaming up to develop an autonomous driving system which would be ready for vehicle-makers in 2019.

Nearly all the major global automakers are involved in testing autonomous or semi-autonomous

vehicles, with some expecting full autonomy within a few years.

'Data centres on wheels'

Mobileye, whose speciality includes systems for accident avoidance, has concluded an agreement with Volkswagen on road data technology as well.


The Israeli firm was founded in 1999. It has developed real-time camera systems used to avoid accidents with the help of algorithms that interpret the data.

Its proprietary EyeQ5 computer vision processor gets input from the 360-degree surround view sensors as well as localisation.

Drivers may be familiar with its system that warns when they are approaching too closely to another vehicle or pedestrian.

Mobileye co-founder Ziv Aviram said of the acquisition that "together, we will provide an attractive value proposition for the automotive industry." "We expect the growth towards autonomous driving to be transformative," he said in the statement. "It will provide consumers with safer, more flexible, and less costly transportation options, and provide incremental business model opportunities for our automaker customers." The companies said the transaction, approved by the boards of both Intel and Mobileye, is expected to close within the next nine months.

"As cars progress from assisted driving to fully autonomous, they are increasingly becoming data centres on wheels," the statement said. "Intel expects that by 2020, autonomous vehicles will generate 4,000 GB of data per day, which plays to Intel's strengths in highperformance computing and net-

work connectivity." Israeli officials were also touting the deal as a sign of confidence in the country's high-tech sector-an industry that has given it the nickname the "start-up nation".

RECHARGEABLE LITHIUM-ION BATTERIES COME WITH RISKS

NEW YORK: Rechargeable lithium batteries have become ubiquitous over the past decade, powering our cellphones, computers and even some cars. But they also carry the risk of intense fires, which is a special safety concern when large numbers of batteries are shipped on planes.

WHY ARE LITHIUM-ION BATTERIES MORE **DANGEROUS THAN OTHER BATTERIES?**

Lithium batteries are popular because they pack significantly more energy into a small package. But their chemistry makes them more likely to catch fire under certain conditions because, unlike other rechargeable batteries, they contain a flammable electrolyte and are kept pressurized.

WHAT CAUSES THE BATTERIES TO **CATCH FIRE?**

If the batteries have a manufacturing flaw, are damaged, are packed too closely together, are overcharged or are exposed to excessive temperatures they can overheat, causing a condition known as "thermal runaway." That's a situation in which an increase in temperature causes continuous further increases - a kind of uncontrolled positive feedback. If a single battery overheats, it can cause other nearby batteries to overheat and experience thermal runaway as well. The flammable electrolyte can also ignite.

WHY ARE LITHIUM BATTERY FIRES DIFFI-**CULT TO PUT OUT?**

Li-on battery fire temperatures have been measured up to 1,100 degrees Fahrenheit, which is close to the melting point of the aluminum used in aircraft construction. It's possible to put out flames from battery fires with water, but the water doesn't stop the thermal runaway and so the flames often return. Halogen fire suppression systems in planes should be able to put out flames from a li-on battery fire, but the flames may return after the halogen gas is expended. Vented gases from the overheated batteries can also cause an explosion capable of disabling the suppression system.

WHAT'S BEING DONE ABOUT THIS?

International Civil Aviation

Organization, a UN agency that sets international safety standards, agreed last year to ban lithium battery shipments as cargo on passenger planes and to require batteries shipped on cargo planes be no more than 30 percent charged. Authorities hope that decreasing the energy in the batteries will reduce the risk they

PORTUGUESE START-UP AIMS TO REVOLUTIONIZE PHYSICAL REHABILITATION INDUSTRY

LISBON: When Virgilio Bento's brother had to go to Cuba 20 years ago to receive cheap physiotherapy as he recovered from a life-threatening car crash back home in Portugal, he did not know it would inspire an innovation. Now, after developing technology that uses body sensors and artificial intelligence for his doctorate in electronic engineering, Bento aims to transform the way victims of strokes and accidents physically recover. The Stroke Wearable Operative Rehabilitation Device (SWORD) provides an exercise program on a tablet computer, which gives instructions to a patient, whose movements are monitored by sensors strapped to the body.

Progress reports are sent through the cloud to a remote physiotherapist, who can alter the exercises by sending instructions back to the tablet for the patient to see. "It's not magic, it's simple," said Bento, explaining how his system could mark a sea change by dramatically reducing the cost of physical rehabilitation and making it affordable to millions. "I saw first hand very vividly the challenges that my parents faced to provide intensive physical rehabilitation," he said. "I thought to myself 'ok this is a huge challenge that nobody is looking at, nobody is trying to solve, I will try to solve it."

The market place for medical technology is exploding, but few solutions have been designed to aid the intensive phys-

like stroke. Alternatives, like robotics, are vastly more expensive. "There aren't enough therapists and the numbers (who need them) are only going to go up (as populations age)," said Tom Paprocki, managing director of the innovation and technology center at Direct Supply, America's leading provider of equipment and services to senior homes. "This kind of technology will help bridge that gap."

Paprocki has vetted 1,400 technology start-ups in the sector and says Bento's system is in the top five. Bento's idea is simple-to offer patients physical, interactive rehabilitation in the comfort of their own home by getting rid of the need for

iotherapy required for serious conditions difficult and expensive visits to a physiotherapist at a clinic. It has taken years to refine and adapt, relying on unique sensor technology and the latest advances in cloud computing. Initial results show 93 percent of patients improved their motor performance using the exercises provided by the system.

The yearly estimated cost of treating and caring for stroke survivors - where Bento has concentrated his research - is 30 billion euros (\$32 billion) in Europe and 57 billion euros in the US, according to a report provided by Bento's company to the European Commission. Bento says his system, which gives patients immediate feedback and a score on the number of right and wrong movements they perform, will cost one tenth of physiotherapy. "At the end of each exercise the results appear, how many times I did the movements, how many medals I won," said Alvaro, 56, who has used the system after hip surgery. "There is virtual compensation if you do the exercises well, it's kind of fun and ends up being a bit of a game as well."

Bento won a development grant of 1 million euros from the European Union in 2014 under a program for technology models promising to "ultimately disrupt existing markets." He has raised 1 million euros from private investors and is now launching another financing round of 3 million euros as he rolls out SWORD in the US market. —Reuters

SUN-SEEKING RETIREES FLOCK TO 'CHINA'S FLORIDA'

'Here we can breathe, and that warmth is better for our health

fringed beaches and balmy weather, the island province of Hainan is fast becoming known as "China's Florida," drawing masses of retirees fleeing the biting cold of their hometowns. "At home in Harbin, it (can be) -30 degrees (-22 Fahrenheit), it's unbearable! But here the climate is perfect," said a 71year-old pensioner who gave only her surname, Wang. Hailing from the capital of the polluted, frigid, rust-belt province of Heilongjiang on the Siberian border, Wang and her husband have migrated each winter to the Hainan resort town of Sanya for the past eight years. "Here we can breathe, and that warmth is better for our health," said Qi Ningxia, a 60-year-old asthma-sufferer from Heilongjiang, who joined Wang in waving brightly coloured fans in a group exercisedance near the shore of the South

"And we find so many people here from our province! We are sure we will not be bored," Qi said. Between 600,000 and 700,000 elderly descend on Sanya every winter, almost doubling its population, said Huang Cheng, a sociologist at Sanya University. Nearly half of these "migratory birds", as they are called, come from the northeastern provinces of Heilongjiang, Jilin and Liaoning. The trend began in 2000 as residents of those provinces began buying Sanya apartments, opening businesses and luring friends and

ball effect," Huang said. Recreational centers with features aimed at the elderly, such as mahjong tables, have mushroomed. "Ping-pong, billiards, chess, calligraphy, painting or computer science" are among the offerings on display, said the director of

Hospitals are also struggling to cope with an explosion in demand from the ageing "migratory birds."

"The situation has evolved so suddenly that we have to allow time for local infrastructure to adapt," said An Honglian, director of the Yihe service center. The Sanya-based Buddhist non-profit helps retirees with practical problems from plumbing issues to health concerns. An said the flood of pensioners to warmer destinations will only intensify as China's population ages. China has more than 212 million people over the age of 60, who will represent 25 percent of the population by 2030, according to the National Bureau of Statistics. Other southern provinces like Yunnan and Guangxi also are witnessing an increase in the number of elderly migrants.

Wang, the Heilongjiang pensioner, is so convinced of the benefits of her winter sojourn that she persuaded her son and grandchildren to join her in Hainan for the Lunar New Year holiday in late January, overturning a Chinese tradition of spending it in one's hometown. "But here, there is bracing sea air. It's good for the health of the whole family," she explained. —AFP

BELGIUM'S TIGENIX SAYS, HEART ATTACK STEM CELL TRIAL SUCCESSFUL

BELGIUM: Belgian biotech group Tigenix said yesterday its medical trial with a novel treatment for patients at risk of heart failure after a coronary attack was successful. The group said patients treated in its Phasel/II trial of donor-derived expanded cardiac stem cells (AlloCSC) showed no side-effects and all of them continued to live after 30 days, six months and a year.

Tigenix added that in one subgroup of trial patients associated with a poor longterm outlook, there was a larger reduction in the size of infarction, tissue death due to inadequate blood supply. "This is the first trial in which it has been demonstrated that allogeneic cardiac stem cells can be transplanted safely through the coronary tree," one of the doctors in the trial said. The group said it would now analyze the data from the trial and decide on how to proceed with its research. —Reuters

NEPAL REPORTS SEVERE H5N8 BIRD FLU ON FARM: OIE

NEPAL: Nepal has reported firmed an outbreak of severe H5N8 bird flu on a poultry farm in the Koshi region, the World Organisation for Animal Health (OIE) said yesterday, citing a report from the Nepalese authorities.

The virus killed 3,650 of the 6,200 hens exposed, with the remaining animals culled, the Parisbased OIE said. Nepal had already reported last month an outbreak of highly pathogenic H5N1 bird flu among backyard chickens and ducks. —Reuters

Paris mayor to spend 1.5m EUROS FOR 'WAR ON RATS'

PARIS: The mayor of Paris said Sunday the city would spend 1.5 million euros (\$1.6 million) to rid the French capital of rats and install more public ashtrays to clean up the city's streets. In an interview with Journal du Dimanche weekly, Mayor Anne Hidalgo unveiled a 10-point plan aimed at making cleanliness a "priority". The measures include increasing the number of sanitation workers and health inspectors, expanding the hours for garbage pickup, and urging restaurants and buildings to provide more ashtrays

at entrances and exit points. Municipal workers collect more than 150 tons of cigarette butts every year in Paris. "We already allot 500 million euros a year for cleanliness and waste management...and the situation has improved," she said. "But it is clear that Paris is not yet perfectly clean." "I want to speed up, increase efforts. It is a top priority," she said. "In a civilized city, cleanliness must be everybody's responsibility," she said, calling for a change in the mindsets and habits of residents. "In Tokyo, everything is clean and yet there are no dustbins because people wait to get home before throwing their waste."

Paris had come under fire in December for allegedly dragging its feet before it launched what has been dubbed its "war on rats". Most of the criticism was centered on Hidalgo and the city's environmental health services chief. The city's

failure to keep the streets clean was also a major sticking point for residents, as a scathing commentary at the time in the conservative daily Le Figaro targeting the eco-friendly mayor revealed.

"New in the Parisian cityscape: filthy streets because of the total and persistent disarray in the cleaning services," wrote author and politician Serge Federbusch, describing the situation as 'Hidalchaos". In announcing the 1.5-million euro anti-rodent campaign, Hidalgo said the city would buy new traps for the rats and surround some of the city's 30,000 rubbish bins with wooden or Plexiglass bases. The bins are currently lined with flimsy plastic

bags designed to avert terror attacks by making it harder to hide explosives in them.

The Republican group on the Council of Paris however scoffed at Hidalgo's measures. "Anne Hidalgo is attempting to short-circuit her opposition by announcing as of now certain placebo measures, but there is absolutely nothing new," said the group. The Republicans said an investigative commission will begin to study the city's cleanliness problem in May, suggesting that only then can the city come up with the right policies to "know how to remake Paris" into "a clean city". The Journal du Dimanche said cleanliness "is the city's management weak point". —AFP

HUMANS TO BLAME FOR BULK OF ARCTIC SEA ICE LOSS

PARIS: Natural changes in the environment are responsible for about 40 percent of Arctic sea ice induced global warming, has been fiercely debate. The new study concluded that up to 60 percent of loss, while humans are to blame for the rest, a climate study said yesterday. The paper, based on model simulations of different climate conditions, was a rare attempt to quantify the relative contributions of humans and Nature to the dramatic decline and could have a major impact on future research into Arctic ice lost. Understanding all causes of the sea ice retreat is crucial for accurately projecting the rate of future loss, and trying to slow it.

Scientists have long accepted that natural changes in the environment, such as atmospheric air circulation, were at least partly responsible. But its relative contribution, and that of human-

sea ice decline since 1979 was caused by summertime changes in atmospheric circulation. About 70 percent of the air flow changes, in turn, were the result of natural variability, not human-caused climate change.

Taken together, this meant that between half and two-thirds the sea ice decline was attributable to climate change, said the American team. Natural variability, on the other hand, "dominates the Arctic summer circulation trend and may be responsible for about 30-50 percent of the overall decline in September sea ice since 1979," they said. Commentators not involved in the study said its

findings do not call into question whether human-induced planet warming has contributed to Arctic sea-ice loss.

'Not good news'

"Realizing that humans have caused 50-70 percent of the decline is not good news," said Twila Moon, a lecturer in Cryospheric Sciences at the University of Bristol. "Continuing to put carbon dioxide and other emissions into the atmosphere is having a direct negative impact on the Arctic, including sea ice," she said via the Science Media Centre in London. Chris Rapley, a professor of climate science at University College London, said the study helped explain why Arctic sea ice was disappearing faster than most climate models

predict-they underestimated the contribution of natural drivers. Models for future predictions will have to be adapted, according to the findings published in the journal Nature Climate Change. Last month, US government scientists said Arctic sea ice cover in January was 1.26 million square kilometers (487,000 square miles) — 8.6 percent below the 1981-2010 average. This was the smallest January extent since records began in 1979 and 100,000 square miles smaller than the previous low recorded in 2016. Sea ice, floating slabs of frozen ocean water which grow in winter and melt in summer, provides an essential platform for hunters-humans and bears alike and helps moderate the climate by reflecting the Sun's rays. The region is warming at about twice the global average rate. —AFP

FLIPPING HAPPY: COIN SWALLOWING THAI TURTLE ON THE MEND

BANGKOK: A sea turtle dubbed 'Piggy Bank' for swallowing nearly 1,000 coins took swimming lessons yesterday as she embarked on a rehabilitation program following the removal of the treasure trove by Thai surgeons. The hapless reptile underwent a seven hour operation in Bangkok last week to remove five kilograms (11 pounds) of coins from her digestive tract-good luck pennies thrown into the pool she swam in. The story of her plight and successful operation went viral, with headlines around the world. Yesterday the 25-year-old turtle, called 'Omsin' (Piggy Bank), paddled around a small pool with

Nantarika Chansue, a vet in charge of Chulalongkorn hospital's aquatic research center, said she was overjoyed by just how much movement Omsin had gained in her flippers since the operation. "Before this she didn't use her left side at all, because every time she moved it probably made it painful," she told AFP, as her patient splashed around. "Look at her now, she's fully using all the limbs very effectively." The troubled reptile lived for two decades in a small public park in Chonburi Province.

Visitors tossed coins into her pond seeking to 'make merit' or good luck. Nantarika said the international media reports have had the added bonus of making Thais think twice about throwing coins into ponds where animals live. "Because of this, all the ponds that I know they are cleaning up their ponds, pulling out all the coins, putting signs up that there is no throwing coins," she said.

Chulalongkorn vets say they hope Omsin will one day be able to return to the sea given she could easily live for another 60 years. First they

will teach her how to swim and then how to dive-a task that requires her to build up lung strength. Then they will take her for swims in the ocean using a specially designed "turtleleash" that allows researchers to reel her back in.

Asked whether she will know how to swim in the deep blue, Nantarika replied: "Of course. It's like us being in prison for twenty years, you know, we still know how to live our lives, so I believe that the best way is to let her go." —AFP

SCIENTISTS RACE TO PREVENT WIPEOUT OF WORLD'S CORAL REEFS

SOUTH ARI ATOLL, Maldives: There were star- halt global warming now, scientists still expect Europe or Australia, you should be concerned," dead, killed by the stress of rising ocean temperatures. What's left is a haunting expanse of gray, a scene repeated in reefs across the globe in what has fast become a full-blown ecological catastrophe. The world has lost roughly half its coral reefs in the last 30 years. Scientists are now scrambling to ensure that at least a fraction of these unique ecosystems survives beyond the next three decades. The health of the planet depends on it: Coral reefs support a quarter of all marine species, as well as half a billion people around the world.

"This isn't something that's going to happen 100 years from now. We're losing them right now," said marine biologist Julia Baum of Canada's University of Victoria. "We're losing them really quickly, much more quickly than I think any of us ever could have imagined." Even if the world could

"To lose coral reefs is to fundamentally undermine the health of a very large proportion of the human race," said Ruth Gates, director of the Hawaii Institute of Marine Biology.

Medical research

Coral reefs produce some of the oxygen we breathe. Often described as underwater rainforests, they populate a tiny fraction of the ocean but provide habitats for one in four marine species. Reefs also form crucial barriers protecting coastlines from the full force of storms. They provide billions of dollars in revenue from tourism, fishing and other commerce, and are used in medical research for cures to diseases including cancer, arthritis and bacterial or viral infections.

"Whether you're living in North America or

tling colors here just a year ago, a dazzling array of that more than 90 percent of corals will die by said biologist Ove Hoegh-Guldberg, director of University of Queensland. "This is not just some distant dive destination, a holiday destination. This is the fabric of the ecosystem that supports us." And that fabric is being torn apart. "You couldn't be more dumb ... to erode the very thing that life depends on - the ecosystem - and hope that you'll get away with it," Hoegh-Guldberg said.

Corals are invertebrates, living mostly in tropical waters. They secrete calcium carbonate to build protective skeletons that grow and take on impressive colors, thanks to a symbiotic relationship with algae that live in their tissues and provide them with energy. But corals are sensitive to temperature fluctuations, and are suffering from rising ocean temperatures and acidification, as well as from overfishing, pollution, coastal development and agricultural runoff. —AP

the Sabra and Shatila Massacre - Azzawi tells CNN: "I exhibited this work in Kuwait in 82-83 and then the Kuwaiti minister of culture kept it for five years as a loan. Then after five years I contacted them and asked them if they can send it back to me. After I got it from the embassy, three days after that, Saddam went to Kuwait. So I was so lucky to get the painting."

Azzawi shows CNN that he is working on an artistic reaction to the retrospective exhibition. It will be his largest ever painting. He says: "This one, I mean huge, I cannot move it. It's a reality, sort of a celebration of my exhibition, and my opportunity which I got from Doha." More broadly, Azzawi talks to Inside the Middle East about his approach to art: "I try to create something which belongs to me or belongs to my culture, my stand, morally, politically, or socially." On his future plans and legacy, Azzawi says: "Historically, I hope somebody will do a research about my work. He can find my contribution to push the Arab arts to wider step or to open window to be part of the international scenes in art...The title of the exhibition 'Until Tomorrow' this is what I feel. If you want to stop, to be creative, is dead. I mean, for me, hopefully I will not be in this position."

RESIDENTS 'POSSESSED' BY VOODOO DOLL

ver 30 people are thought to be "possessed" after finding a voodoo doll in a Central American village. Residents of the small village of Santa Tomas, close to Waspan in the south of Nicaragua, are believed to be suffering



from the culture-bound syndrome grisi siknis, which translates into English as "crazy sickness". The contagious syndrome sees its victims express symptoms such as nausea, anxiety, dizziness and irrational anger and fear. One member of the Santa Tomas community, known as Marisella, attempted to help her neighbours by making a home remedy for the illness, and upon investigating the disease further, believes she has found the cause of their troubles in the form of a small voodoo doll.

She told Central American media: "A doll with black ribbon and a cross marked on its face [has been found in a street]. It suggests that it's affected by dark spells and bad influences. A type of bad spirit." Residents of Santa Tomas have reportedly decided to burn the doll to prevent further "possessions", but it is unknown as of yet whether the disease has stopped claiming victims. — Bang Showbiz

Stewart and Assayas find a groove in the shadow of celebrity

n the disheveled backroom of an East Village restaurant, Kristen Stewart is sarcastically motivating the French director Olivier Assayas for a photo shoot. "You're in America now, dude," Stewart jokes. "We've got to sell the s--- out of this movie." Stewart, a blockbuster veteran at 26, is well acquainted with the demands of movie promotion. But with Assayas, she has found a freedom from such concerns. She and the director have forged an unlikely but formidable bond that has resulted in two highly acclaimed movies, both made in Europe, far outside of Hollywood jurisdiction. They're an odd pair: She, a rebel A-lister from Los Angeles who has become one of the movie's most exciting and uncompromising actors; he, a demure Parisian whose layered, cerebral films teeter between reality and fiction.

What makes them click? They chuckle. "I'm not sure," says Assayas. Stewart nods. "That's the main question," she says. "I don't know. We like each other." Their latest film, "Personal Shopper," is full of mysteries, too. It's a ghost story, set in a contemporary world of texting and Googling. In the film, which opened Friday, Stewart plays a twin whose brother has just died. Her day job is shopping in Paris for a stuck-up celebrity, but she's also a medium, and a series of strange encounters make her believe a spirit (her brother?) is contacting her.

"Personal Shopper" follows their previous "Clouds of Sils Maria," also a singularly enigmatic movie in which Stewart played support staff (an assistant to Juliette Binoche's theatre actress) to a more famous character. (The part earned Stewart a Cesar. the first American to win the French award.) But by stepping into characters out of the spotlight - and into films outside of Hollywood convention -Stewart has never been so much herself on screen.

'Personal Shopper'

"I could be making movies about Kristen being a movie star or whatever persona any actress has on social media," says Assayas. "But what interests me is the person. So I throw the burden of celebrity on someone else, so she can be free of it." "Maybe for the next one I could play a famous actress," jokes Stewart. "Try to normalize that!" There were plenty of moments while making "Personal Shopper" where Stewart's fame invaded. Shooting on the streets of Paris (Stewart drives a moped through the city in the film), they were surrounded by paparazzi. Assayas acknowledges for that and other reasons (a difficult crew, his underestimation of the complexity of a lengthy texting sequence) the movie had "a weird energy." "We struggled for

this film," he says. But Stewart says she channeled the intrusions into her haunted character. "I thought I was being taken from, and it was good," she says. "It made me more sensitive. My nerves were very close to the surface."In the two films, Stewart has relished the chance to slyly remark on the celebrity industrial complex. "As an outsider, you're allowed to comment very honestly about things that are undeniably, objectively strange," says Stewart." But if you're the person who is at the center of that, then all of a sudden those comments



become scathing and you're ungrateful and whatever. It was nice to be able to speak the truth and not be harpooned for it."

Yet the former "Twilight" actress, with freshly buzzed blonde hair, has deservedly made a reputation for herself as an unusually forthright and frank star. She has taken part after part, usually in smaller, indie productions ("Certain Women," "Equals," "Cafe Society"), with an insatiable urge to work, to keep exploring. Stewart also debuted a short film she directed at Sundance this year.

Trump and an inspiration

In a memorable "Saturday Night Live" monologue earlier this year, she reflected on when Donald Trump in 2012 repeatedly tweeted that her then-boyfriend Robert Pattinson should "dump" her. "It was inconceivable, actually," Stewart says. "At the time, I regarded him as like a reality-show star. I was like: Who is this guy?" "To be honest, there are so many significant and very effecting things that he has said and says all the time," continues Stewart. "This was just a stranger, fascinating one because it's so piddly in terms of what matters. It was worth everyone knowing that because it's f----- weird."

She also, in a rebuke to Trump and an inspiration to others, announced, "And I'm like so gay, dude." "I've really allowed myself to really freely and with no regard to the effect of others live my life," says Stewart. "There was just a time where I realized that the things you do and say when you have so many people looking at you, they do affect others. So I'm really proud of it. But at the same time, I hate that it's such a big deal. It's a fact of life right now but it's like, whatever. To me, it's not personally that big of a deal but I know that it can be to others." Stewart and Assayas may, in many ways, be opposites. But they're both prone to following their instincts in unpredictable directions and pursuing questions they know won't lead to answers. Whatever the reason, they're a match. "It's a fact that a film like 'Personal Shopper' happens because of Kristen," says Assayas. "The way we function allows me to try, eventually, more daring things. In a certain way, she protects me." — AP

Young pioneers push envelope on freestyle indoor skydiving

ressed in a white skintight full body suit and helmet, Maja Kuczynska spins furiously before diving into a fast-moving sequence of airborne gymnastic moves with the elegance of a ballet dancer. Soaring into yet another spin, she then floats, twists and backflips in choreographed maneuvers akin to acrobatics or ice-skating suspended in midair. Her expressive and dizzying two-minute display is enthusiastically applauded by the crowd seated around the outside of the wind tunnel. At the age of 17, the Polish high school student is one of about 20 top indoor skydiving competitors worldwide, who are pioneering the solo freestyle version of a sport they call "flying".

"It's more of an artistic approach to the subject," the slender and sleepy teen told AFP, at 3:00 am on a Sunday as she waited to practice at the busy vertical wind tunnel in the Polish capital, Warsaw. "It's such a fast-paced discipline, right now there's no one to teach me," she adds. Vertical wind tunnels, where air moves up a column that stands up to 20 meters (66 feet) high, were first developed for aerodynamic tests. Their recreational use has gained in popularity over the last decade among skydivers seeking a safer alternative to jumping out of a plane. Wind speeds in the tunnel can reach up to 300 kilometers per hour (186 miles per hour) and, while the moves look effortless, staying in control requires enormous strength, flexibility and precision.

But there are no limits on creative freedom. "It's really different from, let's say, ice-skating, because it's been around for such a long time that now it's really hard to create new moves, while in the tunnel I can go in and play and create something nobody has ever seen before. "A couple of different people and I are creating this discipline," Maja adds.

Olympic dreams

She won the bronze medal in solo freestyle at a major international indoor skydiving competition, the Wind Games 2017, last month in Empuriabrava, northeastern Spain. Competitions have rounds involving compulsory moves and others where anything goes. A video posted on Facebook of Maja's performance, choreographed to Major Lazer's hit song "Powerful", has gone viral, gathering 30.5 million views in just over a month. She was only outdone by Singapore's 14-year-old indoor skydiving sensation Kyra Poh, who won gold in the freestyle category, and Czech competitor Jakub Harrer, who took silver, according to the Wind Games 2017 official website.

Although there are still just a handful of people worldwide competing at the top level in the solo freestyle category, there is already talk of the sport making it to the Olympics. "Indoor skydiving is the only aerobatic sports discipline that meets the criteria for being an Olympic discipline," claims Bartosz Wiecek, manager

of the Fly Spot vertical wind tunnel in Warsaw. "It's following the same path as snowboarding, which at one time was very 'underground' and very independent. "In the end, an agreement was reached and it became an Olympic sport because it gained popularity," he said.

Kids too

Several vertical wind tunnels have popped up in Poland. They can operate around the clock and are much cheaper and safer than skydiving out of a plane. There is also no age limit. Maja says that when she started six years ago, she was among a handful of indoor skydiving children around the globe including two girls in Singapore and "a couple of siblings in Dubai". "But now, half of the flyers at least, at competitions for freestyle, are kids!" she said.

At just nine years old, Polish "flying" competitor Olga Lubak will head to Montreal in Canada, along with Maja, in October for the World Indoor Skydiving Championships. For now, Olga is spending hours in the wind tunnel to perfect her routine. "I'm really stressed out because I'm afraid of being last but I don't think that will happen," she told AFP, before being swept up in the wind tunnel in another series of "flying" twists, turns and spins. — AFP

100 years on, debate rolls on over Russia's last tsar

aint or playboy, blood-stained autocrat or family man, incompetent leader or just a victim of circumstance? A century after he ended Romanov rule, Russia's last tsar still prompts heated debate. Nicholas II abdicated on March 2, 1917, or March 15 by the current calendar, in the royal train in the northwestern town of Pskov. "There's no consensus in society or among historians about Nicholas II," says Boris Kolonitsky, a history professor at the European University at Saint Petersburg. Independent polling center Levada last month found almost half of Russians feel positively about Nicholas II. President Vladimir Putin, despite his Soviet spy past, has linked his rule to the Romanovs, opening statues and exhibitions and lighting a candle in front of an icon used at Romanov coronations. In December he called for the 1917 centenary to bring "reconciliation".

A big 'what if'

Nicholas II abdicated after the February Revolution in Saint Petersburg, when troops mutinied as protestors demanded bread and condemned tsarism. An online poll by

Nicholas first wanted his ailing son Alexei to succeed, but agreed to choose his brother Grand Duke Mikhail, who refused, ending the dynasty. For Romanov descendant Paul Kulikovsky, the moment of Nicholas's abdication is a big "what if".

"It could easily have been avoided," said Kulikovsky, whose great-grandmother Olga was Nicholas's sister. "He was basically isolated and didn't have any family or friends around him at this crucial moment." Kulikovsky, 56, is the only Romanov descendant living in Russia. With recognizably Romanov features, he grew up in Denmark but has a Russian wife. He is philosophical about the Romanov legacy, citing a recent poll finding that only 20 percent want a monarchy. "Even if there is a monarchy, it's not a given that it will be a Romanov one again and I'm fine with that," he told AFP.

Romanovs as holy martyrs

After Nicholas's abdication, a provisional government took over but was overthrown by the Bolsheviks in the October Revolution. The new authorities arrested the ex-tsar and his family and moved them to Siberia and Yekaterinburg in the Urals where the Bolsheviks shot them in 1918 and hastily hid their remains. The Russian Orthodox Church has canonized the whole family as holy martyrs, which some believe means Nicholas II is beyond criticism. A forthcoming film about Nicholas's pre-marital affair with a ballerina, "Matilda" by Alexei Uchitel, has angered extreme believers who even threatened arson attacks on cinemas. Monarchists this month announced a bust of Nicholas II in Russia-annexed Crimea was miraculously oozing myrrh-a claim denied by the Church.

Nicholas's ambiguous status as a historical figure but also a saint affects his family, too. Criminal investigators and geneticists believe bone fragments found in 2007 are the remains of Alexei and his sister Maria. But they cannot be laid to rest until the Church decides on their fate. Meanwhile they lie in boxes in state archives. Other family members were buried in 1998 in Saint Petersburg in a ceremony attended by thenpresident Boris Yeltsin. Leading a Church investigation is Archimandrite Tikhon, a monk said to be President Vladimir

Putin's spiritual advisor. Tikhon said he hopes to announce a decision by this summer. "We hope very soon this will be the end of this chapter," Kulikovsky said.

'Not a good politician'

Historians are divided on the impact of Nicholas II's reign and his abdication. Monarchist historian Vladimir Lavrov of the Institute of Russian History at a recent debate in Moscow said the "handover of power was illegal." It followed an "anti-Russian and anti-Orthodox" revolution," he said. Yet the tsar is still remembered as "Bloody Nicholas". In 1905 his troops shot dead hundreds of peaceful protesters, shocking the world. Historian Kirill Solovyov of Russia State University for the Humanities recalled a Soviet joke that it wasn't Lenin but Nicholas II who did most to foment revolution. Solovyov believes a political crisis was inevitable but revolution could have been avoided if in 1917 the tsar had agreed to "radical

But Nicholas delayed and by late February, the situation was "probably irreversible", Solovyov believes. For Kolonitsky, Nicholas "wasn't a good politician." "He didn't want to allow reforms-which conformed to his beliefs, he was a convinced monarchist," he said. Russia's complex situation "escalated significantly" during World War I, he says. "I'm not sure even a good politician could have brought the ship of Russia through those reefs. The challenges were very great." The public often dismissed the tsar as "a fool," he said, but Nicholas was not stupid. He was an "unusually reserved" man who viewed his family as his priority, but also "had the gift to charm people," he said. He was "quite stubborn" but not a strong person or a good judge of those he appointed, Kolonitsky said. "He wanted to be an autocrat but he didn't have the character of an autocrat."— AFP



Priceless remains lie in ruins at Mosul museum

t was once home to priceless archaeological treasures, but these days you get into Mosul museum in Irag's second city via a gaping hole in the basement.

In the darkness lies a pile of rubble-all that remains of two ancient Assyrian statues of winged bulls, smashed to pieces by Islamic State group jihadists. Iraqi forces announced that they retook the building from IS on Tuesday as they pushed into west Mosul as part of a vast offensive to oust the jihadists from the northern city.

Taking the museum was a symbolic victory. In a notorious video issued in February 2015, the jihadists were seen attacking items at the museum with sledgehammers and pneumatic drills, destroying priceless pre-Islamic artefacts. Today, the museum is in ruins-nothing escaped the attackers. In a darkened hall, a heap of stones marks the spot where tourists once admired two imposing "lamassu" statues, Assyrian winged bulls with human faces. The twometer-tall monuments weighed more than four tones, according to Iraqi archaeologist Layla Salih.

In the rubble, what appear to be the remains of carved legs and wings can be seen. Other pieces of smashed stone bear inscriptions in the cuneiform alphabet. Amid the ruins, a hole leads to the basement, where twisted iron bars are visible in the foundations. From time to time, an explosion rocks the building, a plain structure of ochre rock, as Iraqi forces fire rockets at IS positions. On the first floor, two Iraqi snipers huddle behind narrow windows, their weapons trained. An IS sniper is operating nearby. Assyria, with its capital Nineveh in the area of present-day Mosul, was a kingdom in northern Mesopotamia that became one of the most powerful empires in the ancient Middle East. Assyrian art is famous for its bas-reliefs showing scenes of war.

'Destroyed on the spot'

As well as the two lamassu, the museum housed a winged lion of similar proportions, says Salih. The three lost sculptures "were among the most valuable pieces in the museum", she says. The building had housed 100 objects, she adds, and all but six of them were originals." Antiquities weighing more than four tons were impossible for them to steal, so they were destroyed on the spot." The second-most important museum in Iraq, the building also housed Hellenic objects dating from centuries before the Christian era. But now, the iron and wood showcases are empty, covered with broken glass.

Labels discarded on the ground bear witness, in Arabic and English, to inestimable losses: "Two silver goblets found in the royal cemetery of Ur... dating from 2,600 BC." "Various small objects found in the royal palaces of Nimrud - 9th century BC." Others mention pottery, marble or alabaster tablets and a Mamluk-era copper candleholder decorated with floral motifs. IS jihadists seized a string of ancient sites in their lightning 2014 advance across Iraq and Syria.

After declaring their supposed caliphate that summer, they plundered and destroyed several of them. The jihadists cast their destruction of artefacts as the religiously mandated elimination of idols, but they have had no qualms about selling smaller pieces on the black market to fund their rule. In one video, they were seen using bulldozers, pickaxes and explosives to demolish Nimrud, a jewel of the Assyrian empire founded in the 13th century BC. At Mosul museum, little survived except two massive, dark coffins decorated with inscriptions from the Quran. Salih says they belonged to 13th century Shiite imams. "A restoration is possible, but it will be difficult to know if we will find all the fragments, or if some are missing," she says. — AFP

Unearthing 2,000 years of history in central Algiers

n archaeological treasure trove on the site of a be surprisingly well-preserved, Stiti said. The 3,000planned metro station in central Algiers is set to become a museum, opening a window on 2,000 years of history. The site, close to the Algerian capital's UNESCO-listed casbah, has yielded remains from the city's Roman, Byzantine, Ottoman and French periods. "It was spectacular," said archaeologist Kamel Stiti, co-director of the excavations. "In one look, you could see two millennia of Algiers' history." The remains, on the location of a Roman port town called Icosium, were discovered in 2009 when the ministry of culture ordered surveys along the planned metro line.

Archaeologists have since discovered coins, weapons, a public building paved with 5th century mosaics and a large 7th century Byzantine necropolis containing several dozen graves. They also found parts of the Ottoman-era Es Sayida mosque, which French authorities flattened in 1831, shortly after their conquest of the North African country. The colonial government put a public square in its place and called it King's Square and later, Government Square. It was re-named Martyrs Square after the country's hard-won independence in 1962.

Experts had believed that few pre-colonial artefacts remained on the site, but many of the ruins turned out to



square-metre (32,300-square-foot) site was deemed so important that the municipality adapted its plans for the metro station, a move Stiti said was a first in Algeria. The site will now become a museum incorporated into the station, which, in turn, will take up less than half its planned 8,000 square meters. The tunnel will go as deep as 35 meters (115 feet) in order to work around the remains.

Metro museum

The Martyrs Square station is set to open in November, part of an extension to the main metro line inaugurated in October 2011. The museum will open shortly afterwards, covering 1,200 square meters and organized chronologically. Some of the remains will be exposed to a depth of over seven meters. "In Rome or Athens, museums present particular periods, whereas here the visitor can embrace the whole history of Algiers over 2,000 years," Stiti said. "It's a source of pride." He said the project showed that archaeology is not incompatible with development.

"It gives added value. One accompanies the other without slowing it down," he said. "So as not to delay the work, which would add costs to the subway project, archaeologists have worked hard, including on public holidays." The National Archaeological Research Centre (CNRA) and France's National Institute for Preventive Archaeological Research (INRAP) have been working on the dig since 2013. More than 150 people of different nationalities and specialties have taken part, giving young Algerian archaeologists valuable opportunities to work on an important excavation.

Aicha, 70, who lives near the site, said she is looking forward to seeing the museum open. "There will be no more hassle because of the building work, and I'll be able to travel by subway and visit the museum with my two granddaughters," she said. Said, a 50-year-old high school history teacher, said he hopes there will be guided visits for young people "so they can take ownership of our city's several millennia of history." — AFP
