MPs request to meet Amir over tough jail sentences

Opposition lawmakers seek pardon • Speaker says no action until final verdict

KUWAIT: Opposition lawmakers yesterday decided to request a meeting with HH the Amir to discuss the shocking jail terms passed against 67 opposition figures and appeal to him to issue a general pardon for all the convicts. The decision came following an urgent meeting attended by 16 MPs, as Assembly speaker Marzouq Al-Ghanem said that no action will be taken against the three convicted lawmakers until a final ruling by the court of cassation.

The harsh sentences by the appeals court on Monday sent shockwaves in political and legal circles amid calls for a comprehensive solution to the lingering political crisis in the country. The court overturned acquittals by the criminal court and passed jail terms on 67 people, including three current lawmakers, several ex-MPs and many activists for storming the National Assembly building in Nov 2011 during protests against the former prime minister.

Former MP and prominent opposition leader Musallam Al-Barrak, who left jail in April following a two-year imprisonment, was handed a fresh nine-year term. Two MPs, Waleed Al-Tabtabaei and Jamaan Al-Harbash, were handed seven years each and MP Mohammad Al-Mutair got one year.

Defense lawyers yesterday filed petitions

for some defendants. The opposition lawmakers have decided to hold another meeting next week. MP Mohammad Al-Dallal, who hosted yesterday's meeting, said the jail terms against leading opposition figures constituted a shock, adding that lawmakers in the meeting expressed their respect for the verdicts but stressed they were harsh. He said the lawmakers formed two teams - first to study options how to deal with the issue, and the second to follow up with the convicts and their families.

MP Mohammad Hayef said the verdicts were shocking and are likely to return the political crisis to square one, adding that those who supported the rulings represent only themselves and do not want the wheel of development to progress. He said the ruling takes the country back to the period before the opposition ended its boycott of elections, "as if we are at the beginning of the political crisis".

Hayef called on the judiciary to keep itself away from political disputes and not to issue verdicts in political issues. He said that the judiciary should not enter this dark tunnel, stressing that entering the Assembly building is not a criminal offense. He said that the entire issue is a political one and the issue should have been resolved politically. Hayef criticized the interior minister for immediately forming a 40-member team from the min-

Senior Saudi prince Miteb freed

DUBAI: Senior Saudi Prince Miteb bin Abdullah, a former National Guard head once seen as a contender to the throne, has been freed after more than three weeks in detention, according to Twitter messages by roval family members vesterday. "Almighty, thanks be to you..." wrote Abeer bint Khaled bin Abdullah in a posting on her Twitter account. Posting an apparent file photo of Prince Miteb, she added: "May God give you long life, long life full of health, and keep you for us." Writing on his Twitter account, Moaid Mahjoob, who identifies himself as director of external relations for Princess Jawahar Al-Saud, said Prince Miteb "had been released and that he was at his home in Riyadh". Another royal family member, Princess Nouf bint Abdullah bin Mohammed bin Saud, also posted a similar message on Twitter, writing over a photo of Prince Miteb: "May you be safe for us, Abu Abdullah."

UAE: Qatar behind complaint

ABU DHABI: The United Arab Emirates yesterday accused Gulf rival Qatar of being behind a call for the International Criminal Court to investigate allegations of war crimes by the UAE in Yemen. A group calling itself the Arab Organization for Human Rights in the UK said on Monday it was taking the UAE to the ICC over "indiscriminate attacks on civilians" in Yemen. UAE Minister of State for Foreign Affairs Anwar Gargash accused Qatar of being responsible. "The Arab Organization for Human Rights with its address in Qatar has filed a media complaint against the UAE to the International Criminal Court," Gargash wrote on his Twitter account. "People with knowledge are aware that this move aims to create noise, which is Qatar's favorite game," he said.

Egypt police kill 11 'terrorists'

CAIRO: Egyptian security forces killed 11 suspected "terrorist elements" during a raid on a hideout for militants in Ismailiya province providing support for militants in the northern Sinai, the interior ministry said yesterday. Police were pursuing leaders of "terrorist groups in North Sinai that aimed to carry out a series of hostile operations targeting important and vital buildings and Christian churches," a ministry statement said. Security forces were able to identify "a group of these elements and the hideouts they were using to hide, train, and store means of logistic support ahead of smuggling them to terrorist groups in North Sinai".

Ivanka, feted in India, calls for closing gender gap in business

HYDERABAD, India: Ivanka Trump urged India vesterday to close its yawning gender gap in the job market, telling a business summit in her biggest foreign mission yet that this would bring huge economic benefits. US President Donald Trump's eldest daughter urged India to seize the untapped potential in women in a speech before Prime Minister Narendra

Modi and business leaders in Hyderabad. India is one of the world's fastest growing major economies but also has one of the lowest rates of female employment, a trend that has worsened over the last decade.

The World Bank has warned that the country must reverse a trend of falling women's participation in jobs if it is to achieve its ambition of double-digit growth. "Just consider, if India closes the labour force gender gap by half, your economy could grow by over \$150 billion dollars in the next three years," Trump told the Global Entrepreneurship Summit. "I encourage everyone here today to come together, to learn from each other, and to find new ways to lift the barriers in our societies so that women are free to innovate."

JERUSALEM: Israeli chess players could make history by participating in a tournament in Saudi Arabia after the international chess governing body yesterday said it was pushing to allow it to happen. A spokesman for the Israel Chess Federation told AFP seven players had filed requests for visas to participate in the games to be held in Riyadh on Dec 26-30 as part of the world rapid and

Saudi 'Matchstick' TV host takes over state broadcaster

RIYADH: With a furrowed brow and wagging finger, Dawood Shirian for years skewered top officials on Saudi television, but now the firebrand host is taking over the country's state broadcaster. Deploying a pullno-punches style rarely tolerated in Saudi Arabia's tightly controlled media landscape, Shirian spent nearly six years as the host of "Al Thamina" (Eight O'Clock) on satellite broadcaster MBC.

Shirian - nicknamed "matchstick" for his combustible personality - was allowed to champion issues that are a potential lightning rod for public discontent, from jobessness to extremism. His career took on a new trajectory on Monday with his appointment as the head of the Saudi Broadcasting Corporation, as his legions of admirblitz chess championships. Israel and Saudi Arabia have no official relations. The presence of Israelis there would be highly unusual, and comes as officials from the Jewish state increasingly hint at covert ties with the Sunni-ruled kingdom. Israel and Saudi Arabia share a common fear of Iran's attempts to increase its influence in the region.

Georgios Makropoulos, deputy president of the World Chess Federation (FIDE), said that the papers of the seven Israeli chess players - five men and two women - had been handed to the Saudi organizers "and the visa status is currently pending". "We are making a huge effort to assure that all players get their visas," Makropoulos said in a statement. The Israeli chess federation said it "supports FIDE's policy to hold the tournament in Saudi alongside FIDE's committment to ensure the participation of Israelis would not be subject to limitations,"

ers called for his return to Al Thamina. His intentions as the new chief are unclear. But if his past is any indication, Shirian may be about to shake up the country's traditionally sedate state television and radio channels.

The primetime show garnered an avid following with its host's hard-hitting style of demanding accountability from officials, often berating them and sometimes chivvying them into action. In a recent episode, Shirian, 63, fumed over rising unemployment among Saudi engineers, airing testimonies from some with the highest grades forced to work as waiters, car washers and fish sellers. "Does the job market have no place for Saudi engineers?" Shirian asked angrily, waving printouts from a government jobs website. "Where are the authorities?" he demanded.

Within minutes, the hashtag "Saudi engineers treated unfairly" started gaining traction on social media. Behind the scenes, the show's producers were inundated with hundreds of WhatsApp messages pouring in from people venting fury. A labor ministry official, caught like a deer in the headlights, sought to explain on the show that policy reforms were in the works to

spokesman Lior Aizenberg told AFP. "We expect the Saudis, aided by FIDE, to approve our requests for visas to play," he said.

Aizenberg noted the Israeli chess federation chairman Zvika Barkai had discussed the issue of the Saudi visas with Makropoulos as well as with FIDE President Kirsan Ilyumzhinov, who recently visited Israel. A spokesman for the Israeli foreign ministry said he didn't believe there would be a problem for the Israelis to participate in the Riyadh games if the visas were granted. Israeli athletes often face difficulties when competing around the Middle East due to hostility toward their country. In a recent incident, an Iranian wrestler was lauded by his government after he intentionally lost an international bout at a tournament in Poland over the weekend to avoid having to face an Israeli opponent. — AFP



EPA to recognize companies for protecting environment

KUWAIT: In its fifth meeting in 2017 headed by Chairman Sheikh Abdullah Al-Ahmed Al-Sabah, the Environment Public Authority's (EPA) board of directors made a number of decisions pertaining with the fees collected for the services it provides. The meeting also discussed various environmental issues, such as issuing clearance certificates to companies showing that they have not been involved in any sort of environmental violations.

Inaccurate information

Recent State Audit Bureau reports showed that the Ministry of Commerce and Industry's (MoCI) supplies department has failed to monitor inventories of stored supply goods. The report elaborated that the department has not conducted quarterly inventories of supply goods' warehouses, which resulted in inaccurate information about the actual stocks stored there. It also showed that the department did not take any measures when such differences were discovered and demanded to hold the concerned centers' managers accountable.

Safety condition

Kuwait Municipality Director Ahmad Al-Manfouhi stressed that Kuwait Oil Company (KOC) had no right to request writing off safety condition violations committed by companies it has business deals with. In a letter he sent to KOC's CEO about the violations committed by company contractors, Manfouhi said the municipality had requested the Fatwa and Legislation Department's legal advice on its right to hold those contractors accountable, and whether KOC had any right to request otherwise. He added that the fatwa department stressed that the municipality was legally entitled to take standard legal measures against violators of safety conditions and denied KOC's right to demand writing off or undoing those measures.

Media street

Kuwait Municipality also approved the Information Ministry's request to change the activity description of three land plots that remain unused on the media and press street in Ardiya so that they can be distributed to new dailies and satellite TV channels. A letter addressing the Municipal Council's Secretary General conditioned that the ministry will supervise distributing the land plots and the construction style so that they match adjacent buildings. The conditions also include that the state should not have previously allocated any land plots to beneficiaries. Notably, the Municipal Council had issued a decision in 2010 to allocate a media street in Ardiya of a total area of 33,000 sq m, which would be equally distributed over 11 land plots to be handed over to

unanimously agreed yesterday to officially grant Kuwait observer status. Addressing the 108th session of the IOM council, which kicked off yesterday and will continue into the next month, IOM's Director General William Lacy Swing heaped praise on Kuwait for the country's humanitarian endeavors. Meanwhile, in a speech of his own, Kuwait's permanent delegate to the UN Jamal Al-Ghunaim said that joining the IOM as an observer state "was a testament the Ministry of Information, who then distributes them to new dailies.

Security approvals

Education Minister Dr Mohammed Al-Fares said accepting bedoons at Kuwait University is conditioned by getting the needed security approvals from the central apparatus for illegal residents. Fares added that the university has already started taking measures to accept bedoons. Fares stressed that the Arab Open University (AOU) is accredited by the private universities council and that its degrees are approved by the ministry of higher education and are fit for employment in Kuwait. Yet, Fares said that using an AOU degree to pursue postgraduate studies depends on the institute applied for inside or outside Kuwait, as some of them have some restrictions on them.

New department

The Civil Service Commission (CSC) approved the foundation of a new department at the Ministry of Public Works (MPW) to handle the airport project under the name of 'Airport 2 Project Department,' which will be disbanded once the project is concluded. The CSC also agreed to adjust MPW's structural organization and merge construction maintenance departments in all six governorates into three - one for the central zone, one for the northern zone and one for the southern zone.



Saudi King shares Amir's letter to Cabinet


RIYADH: Saudi King Salman bin Abdulaziz yesterday discussed with lawmakers the contents of a letter he received from His Highness the Amir of Kuwait Sheikh Sabah Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah. Presiding over the Saudi Cabinet's weekly meeting, King Salman and the executive body reviewed the recently-concluded meeting of defense ministers of the Islamic Military Counter Terrorism Coalition, where more than 40 Islamic nations vowed to work as a cohesive unit to fight terrorism. Pope sidesteps Rohingya crisis in Myanmar

NAYPYIDAW, Myanmar: Pope Francis called for respect for rights and justice in a keenlywatched address in Myanmar yesterday, but refrained from any mention of the Rohingya or the alleged ethnic cleansing that has driven huge numbers of the Muslim minority from ostracized by a global rights commuthe country. Insurgency, attacks put Sinai strategy in spotlight

CAIRO: Egypt's years-long military campaign against a jihadist insurgency in the north of the Sinai Peninsula is under increasing scrutiny following a devastating mosque attack last week. More than 300 people were killed in Friday's bomb and gun assault-the deadliest in the country's recent history-highlighting the insurgents' ability to carry out spectacular attacks despite the deployment of tens of thousands of troops. President Abdel Fattah El-Sisi vowed to respond with "brutal force", and the army announced it had destroyed several of the vehicles used in the attack and killed their occupants.

But for some analysts, the army's muscular reprisals are not enough. "I think (the Sinai) needs (a) smarter military presence," said Zack Gold, an analyst at the Atlantic Council's Rafik Hariri Center. "The job of the military is not to protect the military," he said. "The job of the military is to protect the population and to secure the territory". He said currently soldiers were usually confined to checkpoints on the region's roads instead of securing the population centers, where the insurgency has crippled the economy.

'Easier to recruit'

Timothy Kaldas, a non-resident fellow at the Tahrir Institute for Middle East Policy, said multiple foreign diplomats had told him that when they urge Egyptian officials to change tactics, "they get a lot of pushback". "They are basically told 'not to interfere in Egypt's affairs'," he said. He said discussion of security

strategy took place within a "small circle" and that the public was "not allowed to participate in that conversation to discuss what is problematic and what could be better". Egypt's Western allies acknowledge the army has made some headway in containing the insurgency and forcing IS to change its tactics.

Large-scale attacks on the military have grown less frequent, as IS has increasingly turned to a war of attrition involving roadside bombings and sniper attacks, inflicting fewer casualties on the army. The military has also succeeded in hitting some of the group's top commanders, including overall leader Abu Duaa al-Ansari who was killed in an air strike last year. It has largely ended the once-lucrative smuggling trade with the Gaza Strip by destroying tunnels under the border with the Palestinian territory and razing parts of the divided frontier town of Rafah to create a buffer zone.

But the home demolitions have stoked further resentment in a region that has felt marginalized for decades. Kaldas said that situation "makes it easier for ISIS (IS) to recruit, it makes people less interested in supporting the government." IS too has sparked some antagonism with its tactics. The jihadists have alienated the region's largest tribe, the Tarabin, by executing dozens of its members for allegedly cooperating with the army. Some Tarabin have formed militias to fight IS.

Sisi came to power after leading the military overthrow of his Islamist predecessor Mohamed Morsi in 2013 promising to restore security following the chaos of the Arab Spring uprising that toppled longtime dictator Hosni Mubarak. But four years on, the situation in Sinai is far from stable. In November 2014, shortly after Sisi's election as president, Ansar Beit Ál-Maqdis, a Sinai-based jihadist group previously linked to Al-Qaeda, swore allegiance to IS. Friday's attack was carried out by some 30 armed men carrying flags similar to the black banner of IS, although the jihadist organization has not formally claimed it. - AFP

GAZA: Hamas is due to hand over power in the Gaza Strip to the Palestinian Authority by Friday as part of a reconciliation deal, raising hopes humanitarian suffering there can be eased. "My visa has been valid for two months but I haven't been able to travel because of the border. "It expires in January. If I don't arrive by that date they won't renew it and I will lose around \$2,000 I spent. "My future depends on the opening of the border and the national government taking control in Gaza. "I am very scared reconciliation will fail, my future will be lost completely."

The child who wants to fly

Hamada Ahmed, 12, a student in a United Nations school in Gaza, doesn't know exactly

Maysaa Al-Shanti, a 45-year-old mother of six, hasn't seen her parents since Hamas took control. They moved to Saudi Arabia decades ago. "I dream of reconciliation and for them to open the crossings so I can travel to see my family in Saudi Arabia. "I haven't seen them in 11 years. My father died without me seeing him. "I don't know when I will see my mother and siblings if they don't succeed with reconciliation."

The rival bureaucrats

In a strange quirk, there are two civil services in Gaza. When Hamas took over in 2007, the majority of the Fatah-dominated Palestinian Authority employees were told to stop working. Hamas set up a rival administration, while tens of thousands of PA employees continued to get a salary without working. Leila Saqar was among them. She is hoping to return to her job with the health ministry. "Ten years at home without work has negative psychological and professional effects. "I don't care if my colleagues or the patients I treat are Hamas or Fatah. We are all Palestinians.

"As employees in the PA we will complement the Hamas employees, who have acquired experience during their years of work, dealing with new projects we today must learn about." Mahmoud Al-Faraa, head of public relations with the Hamas media ministry, could be losing his job. A final decision about Hamas employees has been put off until early next year, with a merger possible, but Faraa said he was personally in favor of reconciliation to ease conditions for his family. — AFP

SEOUL: Signs of unusual activity have been detected in North Korea, the South's unification minister said yesterday, following reports that Pyongyang may be preparing for a ballistic missile test. The North has stoked international alarm over its banned nuclear missile program, but it has not staged a missile test since September 15, raising hopes that ramped-up sanctions are having an impact. But South Korea's Yonhap news agency cited a government source as saying that a missile-tracing radar was switched on at an unspecified base on Monday, and there had been a flurry of telecom traffic.

Unification minister Cho Myoung-Gyon confirmed there had been "noteworthy activity in the North recently",

but said the Seoul government had to "wait and see whether it leads to an actual missile test or provocation". Aside from the recent movements, Pyongyang has also been conducting various engine tests and fuel tests even during the testing lull, Cho told foreign correspondents. Japan's Kyodo news agency also

quoted sources as saying the Tokyo government was on alert after detecting radio signals suggesting North Korea might be preparing for a missile launch.

"North Korea might launch a missile within the next few days," one of the sources was quoted as saying. However, the Japanese sources also said that as satellite images have not shown any missile or moveable launch pad, the signals might only be related to winter training for the North Korean military. North Korea's leader Kim Jong-Un visited a new catfish farm northeast of Pyongyang, its state media said yesterday, in the latest of a series of economic outings that have coincided with a lull in weapons testing.

In September the North conducted its sixth and most powerful nuclear test and staged an intermediate-range missile launch over Japan. Cho said the frequency of North Korean activity tends to decline noticeably during the winter. "If it launched a provocation, North Korea has to put its military on alert, but most of its troops are needed

for manual labor for preparation of winter," he said. Other reasons behind the lull could be that Pyongyang simply needs more time to advance its missile program such as perfecting its re-entry technology, Cho said, or the North Korean leader could be focusing on boosting the economy.

While North Korea has tested an intercontinental ballistic missile (ICBM) that apparently brings much of the US mainland into range, questions remain about whether it has mastered the re-entry technology to bring a warhead back through the Earth's atmosphere. Another factor could be that the North could be restraining itself due to a flurry of joint military exercises between Seoul and Washington mobilizing various US strategic assets, the minister said.

But tensions are expected to spike again as the United States and South Korea kick off a large-scale air force drill on Monday in a new show of force against the North.

The five-day exercise, Vigilant Ace, involves 12,000 US personnel and an unspecified number of South Korean service members flying more than 230 aircraft including F-22 stealth fighters and other cutting-edge weapons at US and South Korean military

bases. Pyongyang routinely condemns such exercises, labeling them preparation for war. The US last week unveiled fresh sanctions that target North Korean shipping, raising pressure on Pyongyang to abandon its nuclear program. Pyongyang condemned the move as a "serious provocation" and warned that sanctions would never succeed.

Cold War-era siren

Meanwhile, Hawaii this week will resume monthly statewide testing of its Cold War-era nuclear attack warning sirens for the first time in about 30 years, in preparation for a potential missile launch from North Korea, emergency management officials said. Wailing air-raid sirens will be sounded for about 60 seconds from more than 400 locations across the central Pacific islands starting at 11:45 am on Friday, in a test that will be repeated on the first business day of each month thereafter.



A single 150-kiloton weapon detonated over Pearl Harbor on the main island of Oahu would be expected to kill 18,000 people outright and leave 50,000 to 120,000 others injured across a blast zone several miles wide, agency spokesman Richard Rapoza said, citing projections based on assessments of North Korea's nuclear weapons technology.—Agencies

Saudi Arabia executes 7

RIYADH: Saudi Arabia yesterday executed six Yemeni men convicted of murder and robbery and a Saudi man for smuggling drugs, the interior ministry said. The Yemenis were convicted of forming a gang that killed two



brought down a federal minister and dealt the government a stinging blow with the help of a blasphemy law that authorities have long used as a tool of repression against minorities and dissidents. Law minister Zahid Hamid resigned Monday, caving to a key demand from Islamist protesters who virtually paralyzed the capital for weeks over a hastily abandoned amendment to the oath sworn by election candidates. Hamid's surrender marked a disturbing new precedent in the country's political landscape, after the fringe Tehreek-i-Labaik Ya Rasool Allah Pakistan (TLY) tied the amendment fiasco to blasphemy charges.

Blasphemy is a profoundly sensitive issue in the Islamic republic and can rouse even moderates whose religion emphasizes devotion to the Prophet. At its most extreme, even unproven allegations have sparked mob lynchings and vigilante murders. But it is also enshrined in the country's legal code, where it carries the death penalty, with analysts warning the charge is unanswerable. "You're looking at a law that can't be defined... anything can be blasphemy, so it's very broad," said Pakistani lawyer Yasser Latif Hamdani.

Activists have long called for reform, saying the legislation is too often abused to settle personal scores and target the religious minorities. In recent months some have cautioned it is also becoming a way to stifle digital dissent, with authorities rounding up bloggers and sending out nationwide text messages warning against dubious postings on social media. Now analysts fear Hamid's capitulation has proven the statutes can serve as an all-powerful political weapon, allowing even a marginal group to deliver a humiliating blow to the country's rulers.

The amendment at the centre of the row altered the oath's reference to Prophet Mohammed. The government said the change was inadvertent and quickly reversed course but the protesters were not appeased. "The optimist would argue that this could be a one-off. But it isn't," Zeeshan Salahuddin of the Center for Research and Security Studies, a think tank in Islamabad said. "This is the net result of four decades of slow poisoning with intolerance, political indifference, and the state's inability to truly understand the public's concerns."

A history of violence

The country's first blasphemy law was originally passed down from Pakistan's former colonial masters and largely aimed at keeping the peace between different religious communities on the subcontinent. But the framework was given a shot in the arm during the rule of former hardline Islamist dictator Zia-ul-Haq in the mid-80s. His regime passed a series of new statutes that included a provision for capital punishment in cases of insulting the Prophet Mohammed. "The true tragedy is that the law never actually takes course, as the accused is often publicly lynched or beaten," explains Salahuddin. Hamid is not the first politician to face consequences over blasphemy.

In 2011, Salman Taseer-a liberal governor who called for reformation of the laws-was gunned down by his own bodyguard in broad daylight in the heart of Islamabad. A lone vigilante killed Taseer, whereas Hamid's downfall came when the government-already wounded by the ousting of former Prime Minister Nawaz Sharif earlier in the year over graft claims-was forced to turn to Pakistan's most powerful institution, the army, to extricate itself from what had become an explosive situation. Taseer's son Shahbaz, himself held captive by the Taleban for five years until he was freed last year, tweeted a viral video Monday in which Hamid attempted to defend his reverence for the Prophet.

"I understand how scared this man is for his life but I'm so proud to be my fathers son after seeing these cowards," he wrote. For decades leaders have forged political alliances and courted religious hardliners on the fringe for electoral support. But analysts have warned the government's credibility has been eroded by the TLY victory, leaving a vacuum which could also fuel the rise of rightwing religious parties in elections due in 2018. "There's been a generational gestation period for this shift. Political parties are becoming increasingly beholden to right-wing extremist groups with whom they've had political alliances," said Shuja Nawaz, a fellow at the Atlantic Council. "When push comes to shove, people are willing to make deals with them. —AFP

The victims of 'peacekeeper massacre'

BOALI: A stunned crowd looks on as crates bearing macabre labels such as "mixed bones" and "Body 1" are unloaded from a UN truck in Boali, victims of a massacre by peacekeepers from Congo. "This is like a knife in our hearts," breathes Robert Konomo, 60, who lost his two younger brothers in one of the greatest blunders by peacekeeping soldiers in Africa. Last week, the United Nations returned the remains of 13 women and men to their families in Boali, a town some 100 kilometers north of Central African Republic's capital Bangui.

But more than three years later, how the slaughter unfolded remains unclear, and justice remains an empty word. A sober black monument carved with the victims' names has been put up at the local cemetery, where relatives gathered last Tuesday for a ceremony where the bones were handed over, to be laid in their final resting place. About a dozen civilians were reported missing in the Boali region in March 2014 following a clash between, on one side, "antibalaka" militiamen mainly drawn from Christian communities, and on the other, Congolese soldiers serving in MISCA-a multinational African force that had been deployed to the strife-torn country.

Mass grave

MISCA handed over to the UN mission MINUSCA in September 2014. But by then, Human Rights Watch was already investigating the African-led force and accusing Congolese troops of bloody reprisals after one of their number was killed by the anti-balaka. "Peacekeeping soldiers are there to protect the civilian population, not to make them suffer new atrocities," HRW's emergencies director, Peter Bouckaert, said at the time. Searches for the bodies of those who disappeared came up with nothing until 2016, when a mass grave was unearthed close to a onetime MISCA base in Boali.

The remains of 12 men and women were exhumed and once again, HRW charged that Congolese peacekeepers were to blame for their deaths. "I'm happy, but I'm not satisfied," said Konomo, dressed in his finest robes to honor the reconstituted skeletons of his brothers laid out on roughhewn wooden tables ahead of burial. "I hope that justice will be done," he added firmly. Delivering justice is the goal of a medical and legal investigation into the incident since the Republic of Congo set up a probe under international pressure. A Special Criminal Court established to try crimes committed in the troubled CAR since 2003 - when onetime military chief Francois Bozize seized power in a coup-has placed Bouali prosecutor Roger Poussinga in charge of the legal inquiry.

A specialist team financed by the United States was formed to identify and reassemble the bones. Three-quarters of the

'Honor killing' in Pakistan

KARACHI: Pakistani police have exhumed the bodies of a couple believed to have been murdered and hastily buried by their families after they eloped, in the country's latest "honor killing" case. Authorities in the port city of Karachi have arrested at least nine people connected to the double homicide, including the father of the male victim, but admitted that several family members sought in the case were still on the run. The couple were reported missing when the owner of the house they rented in western Karachi entered the property after they gone missing for three days and discovered bloodstains around the home. "The autopsy report says that the couple were killed by strangulation," Dr Rohina Hasan of the government-run Abbasi Shaheed Hospital said yesterday. Police believe the couple were murdered by family members, including male relatives of both victims, after they eloped without their consent. Authorities later began rounding up relatives of the missing pair, who confirmed they had been killed by their families and buried in unmarked graves at a cemetery.

Bizarre sorcery ritual

JAKARTA: Seven Indonesians were hospitalized after rinsing their hands in acid, police said yesterday as they hunted for the self-styled sorcerer who promised the men it would make them invincible. The bizarre ritual last week left the men, residents of the Rawa Kopi village just outside the capital Jakarta, with serious burns on their hands, authorities said. A mystery man named Didi, who moved into the village several months ago, claimed he was a master of traditional magic-known as Debus-which is supposed to protect a person from physical injury. The selfproclaimed magician offered free lessons and promised to make the unlucky men invincible. "These men were trying to become invincible with a man who claimed to be a 'guru'," local police chief Harry Kurniawan said yesterday. To test that promise, Didi suggested that the men rinse their hands in a chemical that police believe was acid.

Explosion near Tel Aviv

JERUSALEM: A large explosion and fire in a building near Tel Aviv killed three people, Israeli police said yesterday, adding that they were still investigating the cause. The explosion, which occurred in a hardware store in Jaffa late on Monday, caused adjacent structures to collapse. Two men were pronounced dead at the scene, while a third died later of his injuries, police said. Another four people were still being treated for their injuries, medics said. A police spokeswoman said the three men killed had provisionally been identified as a Jaffa resident, a man from the Israeli Arab town of Taibe and a Palestinian from the occupied West Bank.

Macron's trip to Africa gets off to hostile start

Burkina grenade attack greets Macron's Africa tour

OUAGADOUGOU: Three civilians were wounded in Burkina Faso on Monday after a grenade was thrown at French troops shortly before President Emmanuel Macron touched down for the start of his first Africa tour. The French president is embarking on a three-day trip of western Africa aimed at boosting France's regional influence, stemming the continent's migrant exodus and bolstering the fight against violent Islamist militancy in the Sahel.

The visit was marred by an attempted attack on French troops in the capital Ouagadougou just hours before Macron's arrival. "Two hooded individuals on a motorcycle

threw a grenade towards a French army vehicle" as it made its way to a barracks housing French special forces, a security source told AFP on condition of anonymity.

Three residents were wounded, one seriously, in the attack which took place at 8:00 pm, the source added. "The attackers' target was the French army vehicle, which was not hit," the source said. An

AFP reporter at the scene of the attack witnessed a small hole in the tarmac where the grenade detonated and a damaged civilian vehicle. Macron flew into Ouagadougou three hours later for a trip that will take in Burkina Faso and Ivory Coast-two former French colonies that deposed strongmen leaders in recent years-as well as to Ghana. His advisors say his primary message will be to stress a partnership of equals with Africa, based on education and entrepreneurship.

Runaway train kills 2

BRUSSELS: Two Belgian railway workers were killed and several passengers injured Monday after a train being recovered from a previous accident rolled away and hit people repairing the track then collided with another passenger train, emergency services said. The train was initially involved in a collision on Monday morning with a car at Morlanwelz, at a crossing near the industrial town of Charleroi in southern Belgium, causing the vehicle burst into flames and damaging the first carriage of the train, they said. The line was closed for the rest of the day while engineers tried to clear the line, but as the train was being towed on Monday night, it became detached and hit a group of workers who were repairing the tracks following the earlier fire. I wo railway workers from the group were killed and two were seriously injured, police and firefighters said.

European leaders are desperate to find ways to stem the flow of African migrants across the Mediterranean without leaving them to the mercy of traffickers in transit countries like Libya, where they face torture, rape, and as a CNN report showed recently-being sold into slavery.

And Macron will also be seeking international backing for a new, five-nation African counter-terrorism force, which France hopes to see eventually take over the fight against jihadist groups in the Sahel region. new stage for our relationship with your country and the whole continent". He praised his host country for shaking off the 27-year authoritarian rule of former President Blaise Compaore in a 2014 popular uprising in which large numbers of youths participated. Burkina "is an emblem of the democratic aspirations of Africa's youth", he said. "I wanted to pay tribute to all this by making Ouagadougou the first step of my African tour," he added.

Merkel 'horrified' by knife attack on pro-refugee mayor

BERLIN: German Chancellor Angela Merkel vesterday condemned a near fatal knife attack against a town mayor, apparently motivated by the local leader's pro-refugee stance and which left him with a six-inch neck wound. Andreas Hollstein, 54, mayor of the western town of Altena, was stabbed Monday evening at a kebab shop by a man who had loudly criticized his liberal refugee policy. Hollstein said that without two shop employees who rushed

to help him, he would "probably not be here today". With a large bandage on his neck and a wavering Hollstein told reporters that the 56-year-old male assailant had asked him if he was the mayor before pulling the knife and then said: "You let me die of thirst and take in 200 refugees in Altena." Merkel, who has faced a strong backlash over her welcoming stance toward refugees, was "horrified" by the attack on Hollstein and "very relieved that he was already able to return to his family," her spokesman Steffen Seibert tweeted. "Thanks also to those who helped him." Hollstein, a member of Merkel's Christian Democrats (CDU), said that he believed "a coarsening of

US president faces fraught end to a tempestuous year

WASHINGTON: President Donald Trump returned to work at a festively decorated White House this week, facing a formidable to-do list that will decide whether his Christmas is filled with political misery or cheer. After spending much of November in East Asia and Florida, Trump returned to marbled corridors bedecked with garlands and graced by ballerinas but also chilled by the prospect of a daunting few weeks ahead.

December sees deadlines that, if missed, could see the US government hurtle towards a shutdown and even a technical default in the new year. The debt ceiling and government budget were on the agenda when Trump met congressional leaders from both parties yesterday. The meeting comes against the backdrop of a fiercely contested December 12 election in Alabama, which will be a bellwether for Trump's support and could tilt control of the Senate away from Republicans. Republican officials admit that controversies may split right wing voters, handing an unlikely victory to Democrats in that deeply Republican state. Trump has thrown his weight behind party candidate Roy Moore, who has refused to withdraw despite facing a string of allegations that he molested or sexually assaulted teenage girls when he was in his 30s. The White House says Trump will not campaign with Moore, but he has questioned the allegations and urged voters to oppose Democrat Doug Jones. But some Republicans plan to vote for a "write-in candidate" whose name is not on the ballot.



Bomb-making equipments

ATHENS: Greek police found bomb-making equipment and detonators in raids in Athens yesterday and were questioning nine people over suspected links to a banned militant group in Turkey ahead of an expected visit by Turkish President Tayyip Erdogan next week. Eight men and a woman thought to hold Turkish citizenship were being detained after morning raids at three different addresses in central Athens. Earlier, police officials told Reuters the individuals were being quizzed for alleged links to the leftist militant DHKP/C, an outlawed group blamed for a string of attacks and suicide bombings in Turkey since 1990. The police found materials available commercially and which could potentially be used in making explosives were found, they said in a statement. They also retrieved digital material and travel documents. Witnesses saw police experts in hazmat suits and holding suitcases entering one address in Athens. Tests on an unknown substance found in jars were expected to be concluded within the day.

Ireland crisis deepens

DUBLIN: Ireland was on the verge of a snap election after the opposition party propping up the minority government said the deputy prime minister's refusal to quit would force the country to the polls next month. The political crisis that deepened dramatically late on Monday has left the country's two main parties with less than 24 hours to head off a general election in a dispute that cast a shadow over a key Brexit summit next month. Ireland will play a major role at the meeting, telling EU leaders whether it believes sufficient progress has been made on the future of the border between EU-member Ireland and the British province of Northern Ireland. The pressure on Deputy Prime Minister Frances Fitzgerald of Varadkar's Fine Gael party mounted on Monday following the release of fresh documents about her disputed handling of a police whistleblower who alleged corruption in the force. Fianna Fail, whose backing Varadkar requires from the opposition benches to keep his government functioning, has said it will move a motion of no confidence in Fitzgerald unless she quits.

Turkey issues warrants

ANKARA: Turkey yesterday issued arrest warrants for two men accused of handing Washington fabricated reports and stealing documents in a case against a top Turkish banker suspected of violating US sanctions on Iran, local media reported. Former main opposition Republican People's Party MP Aykan Erdemir and certified bank auditor Osman Zeki Canitez are accused of giving "fake reports" for use as evidence by US authorities investigating gold trader Reza Zarrab and Mehmet Hakan Atilla, the deputy chief executive of Turkish lender Halkbank, Dogan news agency reported. The men are being investigated over whether they "destroyed paperwork relating to state security" and stole documents with the intention of using them abroad, according to a statement from the Istanbul public prosecutor, quoted by Dogan.

Kenyatta sworn in for disputed second term amid protests

NAIROBI: Kenyan President Uhuru Kenyatta was sworn-in for a second fiveyear term in front of a rapturous crowd yesterday as riot police sealed off an area where the opposition planned a rival gathering and teargassed people trying to reach it. Kenyatta won a repeat presidential election on Oct 26 that was boycotted by opposition leader Raila Odinga, who said it would not be free and fair. The Supreme Court nullified the first presidential election, in August, over irregularities. The extended election season has divided Kenya, a Western ally in a volatile region, and blunted growth in East Africa's richest economy.

Odinga's supporters, many drawn from poorer parts of the country, feel locked out of power and the patronage it brings. Political arguments often have ethnic undercurrents, with Odinga's supporters

450 people and said he had no plans to reverse his stance. Bali's paradise turns to tourist nightmare as volcano rumbles

Tourists and authorities feel the heat

DENPASAR: Cancelled flights, missed connections and everything online beforehand, so we don't have much cash expiring visas have turned Bali into a nightmare for thousands of tourists scrambling to leave, as a volcano on the Indonesian vacation paradise threatens a major eruption. Hundreds of flights have been grounded as the main international airport was shuttered for a second day yesterday, leaving 120,000 stranded visitors in need of shelter-or an exit plan. Hundreds joined the mad rush to board buses headed to an international airport in Indonesia's secondbiggest city Surabaya - 13 hours' drive and a ferry ride away-as torrential rains dampened spirits even more in one the world's top tourist draws.

The imminent eruption of Mount Agung may mean more five-star hotel living for some wellheeled visitors who are happy to sit out the minor inconvenience, but Mukesh Kumar Gupta and two-dozen members of his family aren't going to be staying at the Four Seasons. "We are practically helpless-how can we

get back to India?" said the Chennai-based member of

the heaving 26-member clan. Gupta's family - 23 adults and three kids-arrived in Bali 10 days ago from different Indian cities. They were all supposed to fly back Tuesday but now they say they are stuck, and nearly broke, as chaos ensued at the airport with frustrated travelers and overwhelmed staff.

"The refund money (from the airline) won't be enough to buy us new tickets," another family member, Navin Saraf from Kolkata said at Bali's main airport. "We booked

right now," he added. Towering columns of thick grey smoke have been rising from Agung since last week, and in the last few days the volcano has begun shooting smoke and ash into the sky, forcing all flights to be grounded until at least Wednesday morning. Ash is dangerous for planes as it makes runways slippery and can be sucked into their engines.

Taiwanese activist jailed

BEIJING: A Chinese court sentenced Taiwanese democracy activist Lee Ming-cheh to five years in prison yesterday on charges of attempting to subvert state power, further souring cross-strait ties. Lee sat nervously as the three-judge panel read the sentence at the Yueyang intermediate people's court in central Hunan province, according to a video posted on the tribunal's social media account. Taiwan and human rights groups immediately denounced the ruling as "unacceptable" and "politically motivated". Lee-an NGO worker who was arrested during a trip to the Chinese mainland in March-is the first Taiwanese person to be convicted in China on the political charge, according to Taiwan's Judicial Reform Foundation. A Chinese co-defendant named Peng Yuhua was sentenced to seven years in prison. The court said both men stated that they would not appeal their sentences. President Xi Jinping, who consolidated power at a Communist Party congress last month, has cracked down on dissent and tightened control on civil society since taking office in 2012.



before he could purchase an automatic rifle.

"What we will be alleging is that he was intending to use a firearm to shoot and kill as many people as he could in the Federation Square area on New Year's Eve," said Victoria Police Deputy Commissioner Shane Patton. "It is a tremendous concern to us that (during) the festive season, when people are out enjoying themselves, that there is a potential plot to commit a terrorist act. That is a huge issue for us but that is why we put the resources in."

He said the arrest meant the threat "has been removed". Federation Square is in the heart of the city, opposite busy Flinders Street train station and St Paul's Cathedral. It is one of the most popular places to see in the New Year and would be packed on December 31. The foiled plot comes a year after police prevented another attack in the same area on Christmas Day, arresting several men who planned to use explosives, knives and guns to target the location.

'Quiet guy' Patton said the man, who lived with his parents, had been on their radar since the beginning of the year, part of a small community of extremists that police have been monitoring. His behavior had gradually escalated over time, but police believe he was acting alone. "The potential of the attack was catastrophic," said Patton, adding that the man was an "Islamic State sympathizer". Asked if he had been inspired by last year's Christmas Day plot, Patton said detectives were still investigating how he became radicalized. "We will be exploring where this person of interest got the idea from," he said.

"Certainly, he becomes particularly energized when he sees other activities in the terrorist arena occurring." The man worked part-time at a computer repair business, with police raiding the facility. A person who knows the suspect told the Melbourne Herald Sun: "He is a very quiet guy. This is an absolute shock." Justice Minister Michael Keenan said the fact that the Christmas/New Year period was being targeted again "reminds us of the depravity of terrorists".

"They seek to strike fear in the community when Australians are enjoying time over the Christmas period with their families and friends," he said, adding that there would be high-profile policing over the holiday period. Australian officials have grown increasingly concerned over the threat of extremist attacks, raising the national terror alert level to "probable" in September 2014. Since then, 74 people have been arrested in 347 counter-terror investigations. Authorities say 14 attacks have now been prevented in the past few years, including an IS-directed attempt to bring down a plane using poisonous gas or a crude bomb disguised as a meat mincer. Despite this, several attacks have taken place, including a cafe siege in Sydney in 2014 where two hostages were killed.—AFP

Chinese general commits suicide

BEIJING: A prominent Chinese general under investigation for corruption has committed suicide, state media said yesterday, the latest development in a sweeping anti-graft campaign that has shaken the armed forces. Zhang Yang, a former member of the powerful Central Military Commission (CMC), was being investigated over links to disgraced generals Guo Boxiong and Xu Caihou, the official Xinhua news agency said.

The investigation into Zhang, 66, had verified that he "gravely violated discipline", was "suspected of giving and taking bribes" and the origin of a huge amount of assets was unclear, Xinhua said, citing the commission. "On the afternoon of Nov 23, Zhang Yang hanged himself at home," the agency said. A suicide by an officer who held such a senior post is rare, though experts have said the frequency of officials from various levels of government taking their own lives may have increased as a result of the intensity of the corruption crackdown since President Xi Jinping took power five years ago.

A commentary carried on both the

Defense Ministry and military's official websites said the CMC decided on Aug. 28 to investigate Zhang, who had "lost his moral bottom line" and used suicide as a means to "escape punishment from the party and country", an "extremely abominable act". "This former general of high position and great power used this shameful way to end his own life," the commentary said. "He would exhort loyalty but be corrupt behind others' backs, a typical 'two-faced person'," it said. Sources had told Reuters that Zhang, who had served as director of the military's Political Work Department, had been subject to an investigation, but the government had not announced it.

Zhang's downfall was foreshadowed in September when he failed to make a list of 303 military delegates to the ruling Communist Party's key five-yearly congress, along with fellow CMC member Fang Fenghui. Both men were replaced at the congress, held last month, as part of a sweeping military leadership reshuffle in which Xi install trusted allies in key positions. China's military, the world's largest and undergoing an ambitious modernization campaign, has been an important focus of Xi's deep-seated fight against corruption.

Serving and retired officers have said graft in the armed forces is so pervasive it could undermine China's ability to

Alleged Islamists killed

DHAKA: Three alleged Islamist extremists were killed yesterday in a raid by Bangladesh police as security was stepped up before Pope Francis's landmark visit to the Muslim-majority nation, officials said. Police said the trio died in suspected suicide blasts after they opened fire and threw bombs at anti-terror officers who cordoned off a house where they were hiding near the Indian border. Rapid Action Battalion police surrounded the home following a tip-off and urged those holed up inside to surrender but they opened fire instead, the force's local commander Mahbubul Alam said. "Moments later there were several loud explosions and the house caught on fire. Later we found three mangled bodies, one of them with a severed head," he said. He said the three were active members of Jamayetul Mujahideen Bangladesh (JMB) - a homegrown militant group blamed for a string of deadly attacks on foreigners, atheist bloggers, rights activists and religious minorities in recent years.

The 'Rohingya island'

DHAKA: Bangladesh approved a controversial \$280 million project to transform a desolate island off its southern coast into a temporary camp for 100,000 Rohingya refugees yesterday, despite warnings the site is uninhabitable. The announcement comes just days after Bangladesh signed an agreement to repatriate to Myanmar the Rohingya refugees languishing in overburdened camps along its border. A government eco-nomic council chaired by Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina gave the greenlight to the planned redevelopment of Bhashan Char island, a project that has attracted fierce criticism since being first proposed in 2015. Planning Secretary Ziaul Islam said it was hoped the island would be ready from May to accommodate some of the more than 620,000 Rohingya Muslims that have crossed the border in the past three months. "Approximately one lakh (100,000) people will be shifted there for the time being. We hope the project work will be completed by 2018," he told AFP.

Shell 'liable for violations'

LAGOS: Amnesty International yesterday called for Shell to be prosecuted for allegedly helping Nigeria's military to commit human rights abuses in the oil-rich south in the 1990s. The London-based global rights watchdog said the oil giant should be tried in Nigeria, as well as Britain and Netherlands where it has its head office. Shell's Nigerian subsidiary strongly denied the charges, calling them "false and without merit". Audrey Gaughran, director of global issues and research at Amnesty, said it was "indisputable that Shell played a key role" in events in Ogoniland in the 1990s. "But we now believe that there are grounds for a criminal investigation," she added in a statement after publishing a cache of documents relating to the turbulent period.

Calls to end Africa's 'horrific' land deals after firm's fallout

Large-scale land deals by investors in Africa are coming under greater scrutiny after an Indian firm demanded compensation for the cancellation of its lease by Ethiopia, with analysts saying they are hurting local communities and damaging ecosystems. Karuturi Global, one of the largest investors in Ethiopia's commercial farming industry, said the cancellation of its lease for 100,000 hectares in the western Gambella region broke the terms of its agreement with the government.

Ethiopian officials, who have earmarked some 11.5 million hectares of land for overseas firms to invest in agriculture, say Karuturi failed to make adequate progress on the land allotted for growing and exporting sugarcane, rice and palm oil. Critics say neither side addresses the more controversial issue of millions of indigenous people and small farmers being forcefully removed from their ancestral land with little consultation or compensation.

'These large-scale plantations and farms are displacing people who have lived there for generations, without creating jobs for the locals or enhancing food security," said Anuradha Mittal, executive director of California-based advocacy group Oakland Institute, which has studied these deals. "It is a horrific abuse of rights," she told the Thomson Reuters Foundation over the phone. Across Africa, more than 117 large-scale land deals totalling about 22 million hectares, an area the size of the US state of Utah, have been recorded in the last 12 years, according to data from the United Nations' Food and Agricultural Organization (FAO).

Millions of small farmers and herders in Ethiopia have been moved from the land offered to investors and relocated under "villagisation" programs, often with threats and assaults, according to rights groups, including GRAIN and the Oakland Institute. The new villages where they are resettled often lack basic resources including adequate food, agricultural support, and health and education facilities, according to activists.



Border risk awakens ghosts of Troubles

During the worst of the Troubles, this wedge of north Belfast was "Murder Mile", a neighborhood which crystalized the Northern Ireland conflict pitting Catholic nationalists against Protestant loyalists. It is in the heart of the scarred district that Irish Foreign Minister Simon Coveney sits in a community center, warning in measured terms that the fallout of Britain's leaving the EU is not only about trade and saving the economy.

Brexit is also about keeping the peace, a peace that cannot yet be taken for granted two decades after the Good Friday agreement erased the border between British-ruled Northern Ireland and the Republic of Ireland. "We have tried to not turn this into a unionist versus nationalist issue," Coveney told a small group of international journalists, referring to the factions that ripped the island of Ireland apart for generations and led o more than 3,500 deaths. But Northern Ireland "is not the same as the rest of Britain, and anybody who pretends it is, is misleading people," he said.

It was not supposed to be this way. After Britain voted or Brexit in June 2016, all sides quickly agreed that the reconciliation process was sacrosanct. Key to this was the Irish border, which since the Good Friday accords is largely invisible, identifiable only by a subtle change in traffic signs and the transition between kilometers and miles. But 18 months after the referendum, and just two weeks before a EU summit that could determine the future of Ireland's relations with Britain, Dublin is quietly but firmly putting on the table Brexit's implicit threat to the peace process, through the risk of a return of a so-called hard border. "Nobody should underestimate the strength of feeling in the Irish government on this border issue," Coveney said.

Ethiopian officials have denied people are being displaced, or that villagization takes place where overseas investments are planned. The program provides better infrastructure for rural populations, they say. "We have never replaced farmers, we have never replaced pastoralists in favor of mechanized farming," said Fitsum Arega, director of the Ethiopian Investment Commission, a government body. "There is lots of vacant land available that is not taken by any farmers. We believe in encouraging private investors with the capacity to develop large amounts of land," he said.

Agribusinesses, investment funds and government agencies piled into developing countries, particularly in sub-Saharan Africa, when oil prices peaked in 2007-08, leading to a surge in prices of food. Cheap land to grow food crops and bio-fuels to enhance food and energy security has become essential as populations expand. There is plenty of land in Africa, with only 5 percent of an estimated 550 million hectares of arable land in central Africa being cultivated, according to the FAO.

Prices were lower than in other developing countries, the terms were favorable, including no import duties on machinery, and full repatriation of products and profits. But most deals were cloaked in secrecy, and jobs for locals were often only low-paying manual work, activists say. Most deals also encompass fertile lands which are inhabited, rather than marginal or infertile land as promised by officials. "This is the land where indigenous communities have farmed and grazed their animals, and depended on for their livelihoods. This is the land where their ancestors lie," Mittal said. There is "irrefutable evidence that the locals have been forcibly evicted from their homes and lands. They have been intimidated, beaten, and even arrested for demanding their right to their land," she said.

Local customs

Most of these deals have also failed to achieve the objectives of enhancing food and energy supply and stimulating development in the local communities, activists say. The FAO confirmed these observations in a recent report, saying "there is little or no monitoring of the land use in terms of sustainability and social responsibility of the investors". In Ethiopia, where all land is state-owned, traditional tenure systems exist alongside modern systems. Several regions, including Gambella, where Karuturi had leased land, have no formal tenure and boundaries are agreed by local customs.

In regions where villagization took place, none of the inhabitants had legal titles, said a Human Rights Watch report. The relocations may have "life-threatening consequences", with shifting cultivators - who move from one location to another - made to plant crops in a single location, and pastoralists abandoning their cattle-based livelihoods, it said. Karuturi told Human Rights Watch it did not cause any displacements for the project.

Karuturi's 2010 lease for land in Gambella - a remote region near the Sudan border - was cancelled Dec 2015. The company only developed 1,200 hectares of a total 100,000 hectares in two years, Arega of the Ethiopian Investment Commission said. The company was to get 200,000 hectares eventually. - Reuters

Women get chance to 'one-up' men in US units

The young Army infantry recruits lined up in full combat gear, guns at the ready. At the signal, a soldier in front kicked in the door and they burst into the room, swiveling to check around the walls for threats. "You're dead!" one would-be enemy yelled out from a dark corner, the voice slightly higher than the others echoing through the building. It was 18-year-old Kirsten, training to become one of the Army's first women serving as infantry soldiers. "I want to be one of the females to prove to everybody else that just because you're a female, doesn't mean you can't do the same things as a male," she said, describing her brother - an infantry soldier - as motiva-

tion. "I also wanted to one-up him." Kirsten is among more than 80 women who have gone to recruit training at Fort Benning, Georgia, since a ban on them serving in combat jobs was lifted. Twentytwo have graduated. More than 30 were still in training late last month, working toward graduation. The recruits' last names are being withheld by AP because some women have faced bullying on social media.

Somewhat smaller in stature than some of her male comrades, Kirsten gave up a Division I soccer scholarship to become an infantry soldier. In body armor, helmet and rucksack, she looks like just any other grunt. A bunkmate, Gabriella, says the women push each other. "Today during our ruck march we were, like, directly across from each other and I would constantly look over at her," Gabriella said of Kirsten. 'We kinda just kept looking at each other and we're, like, all right, we're both doing it, we're passing these guys and stuff. We

back and forth." Injuries

Commanders are adjusting to new concentrations of injuries among the women. While male recruits often get ankle sprains and dislocated shoulders, women are prone to stress fractures in their hips. In the latest class, six of the seven injured women in Charlie Company had hip stress fractures. Half of the women, Kendrick said, weigh less than 54 kg, but all the recruits carry the same 31 kg of gear. As a result, female recruits need different advice, tailored injury prevention training, and iron and calcium supplements.

Across the base, Charlie Company is in a mock village, training for combat in urban environments, just hours after finishing a 19-km march. They kick through doors, scout for enemies and listen as drill sergeants bark out criticism and corrections. Those sergeants say all the recruits ask the same questions. "They want to know how to run faster," said Staff Sgt. Raven Barbieri. "They ask, 'How do I pack my ruck better?"

She said some women ask how to put their hair up properly. But more often, they seek tips for getting through long marches. Sitting on the bleachers for a quick lunch, Kirsten said her brother showed her how to pack the ruck so it doesn't overly stress her hips or shoulders. He told her: "Always bring extra socks and always bring baby wipes because you're not going to be able to shower." Corbin, 19, shrugged off questions about women in his company. -AP

As home to the previously all-male infantry and armor schools, Fort Benning had to make \$35 million in renovations, including female dorm rooms, security cameras, and monitoring stations. 
Challenges

This is the third class of recruits at Benning to include women. When they're not sleeping or washing clothes, they're completely integrated into their units. As sun peeked over the horizon on an October morning, dozens of infantry recruits spread across the Fort Benning field going through their morning PT drills. In the dark mist, it was difficult to tell one from another as they powered through situps and pushups. On that day, only two of five battalions training were integrated. There still aren't enough women to spread across all the units.

The shortcoming has created challenges. In the last class, only four women graduated, so filling rotations for guard duty all night was a problem. There weren't enough women to cover every hour, so others had to fill in. As women drop out, those remaining are moved to new companies to maintain balance within units, said Lt Col Sam Edwards, commander of 1st Battalion, 19th Infantry regiment. More than 36 percent of Benning's women have left - about twice the rate of men. Injuries

Celebrity elephant kills Thai owner

BANGKOK: An elephant that has starred in feature films and commercials crushed its owner to death in Thailand, zoo officials said yesterday, sparking fresh debate over the kingdom's animal tourism industry. The accident took place Monday morning in the northern city of Chiang Mai, just after owner Somsak Riengngen unchained the five-ton elephant Ekasit. With a mahout, or handler, on his back, Ekasit took a few steps before reversing course and attacking 54-year-old Somsak, who was on the ground.

"The elephant suddenly turned back and used his

trunk to grab the victim. Then the elephant used his trunk to crush him," Wuthichai Muangman, acting director of Chiang Mai Zoo, told AFP. Wuthichai, who described Somsak as an "elephant expert," said the 32-year-old animal was in musth - a state of high aggression accompanied by a hormonal surge - when the accident happened.

Ekasit, who according to a zoo official appeared in Thai and foreign films as well as several television advertisements, was being temporarily housed at the zoo under a contract due to expire in April. The elephant is best known for appearing in the Thai martial arts film series "Ong Bak". Thailand is notorious for its elephant tourism trade that sees the animals performing in circuses, giving rides, or hired out for other forms of entertainment.

Female participation in India's workforce has declined since 2007, particularly in rural areas. Women remain in education for longer, but even college-educated women are staying out of the workplace - just 34 percent of those with a degree are working, the World Bank reported in May. It said India's female labor force participation rate was "uniquely low" for all levels of education. Trump, without directly referring to India, lamented inequitable laws and cultural pressures that in some countries prevent women from working or travelling freely. The 36-year-old White House adviser is in India promoting women's empowerment in business and underscoring the growing friendship between the United States and the South Asian powerhouse. Saudi Arabia this year dropped three places to 168th out of 180 countries in an index ranking freedom of the media, prepared annually by Reporters Without Borders. A recent government crackdown on the elite, ostensibly to fight corruption, ignited new concerns that it could further tighten control. The detained included media moguls such as the owner of MBC Waleed Al-Ibrahim. But the tolerance for public criticism of officialdom appears to have expanded after the so-called Arab Spring - which saw pent-up public anger spilling onto the street across the Middle East. "A show like that (Al Thamina) is definitely tolerated by Saudi authorities," Najat Al-Sajed, author of "Screens of Influence: Arab Satellite Television and Social Development", told AFP. "In fact, the authorities are increasing the scope of freedom in this show... to release the valve for public frustration."

Uncowed Qatar to meet milk needs in 2018 amid crisis

DOHA: Qatar will be self-sufficient in milk by next July, thanks to boycott-busting cows flown in to boost supplies after neighboring Gulf states severed links with Doha, a firm said yesterday. Nearly six months after the eruption of a bitter political crisis which has rocked the region, the man in charge of the soon-to-be 14,000 animals, said Qatar would be able to meet all its own milk needs by the middle of next year. "We should be self-sufficient by June/July," John Dore, chief executive officer of Baladna Livestock Production, told AFP. The Irishman said: "Our aim is quite basically to be part of the national effort, to put our finger up to the Saudis. We don't need you, we can do it ourselves."

He said the total cost of flying in the cows from Germany and the United States, building milking parlors at the site 80 km north of Doha, and production was three billion Qatari riyals (\$825 million). Qatar was pushed center-stage into the region's worst political crisis for years when on June 5 neighbors Saudi Arabia, the UAE and Bahrain as well as Egypt cut ties with the gas-rich emirate. The countries accuse Qatar of supporting terrorism and fostering ties with Saudi Arabia's great regional rival, Shiite-dominated Iran, allegations that Doha denies.

One immediate impact of the crisis was the need for Qatar to find alternative food supplies as all exports of food from those countries in conflict with the emirate halted. And its only land border - with Saudi Arabia was closed. Before the crisis, Qatar largely relied on dairy imports from Saudi Arabia, especially milk. Qatar, with a population of 2.7 million, hurriedly turned to other countries for food supplies, including Turkey, Iran and Morocco.

Within weeks of the crisis starting, Doha announced it was flying in cows from around the world, and announced plans to build a major food processing and storage facility at the newly opened Hamad Port. The first 165 cows were flown in on July 11. "At the moment, we have roughly 3,400 cows... the rest coming in over the next 10 days, that will bring it up to 4,000," Dore said. By next February, he added, there will be 14,000 Holstein cows able to produce nearly 400 tonnes of milk per day, enough to meet Qatar's needs. Dore, 57, said the cows would also make the 2022 football World Cup host self-sufficient in beef. And he added the country was now looking at extending self-sufficiency to other livestock, including poultry. — AFP







Wiggins could make Olympic eight, says gold medallist Mark Hunter

LONDON: Former Tour de France champion Bradley unless he believed he could do it." Wiggins could fulfil his aim of becoming an Olympic rower after swapping a bike for a boat, according to Beijing gold medallist Mark Hunter. Wiggins, Britain's first Tour de France winner in 2012 who also won five Olympic cycling golds, has taken up rowing after announcing his retirement last year.

The 37-year-old is in training for the British Indoor Rowing Championships on Dec. 9 at the London Olympic velodrome where he will test himself against the country's best oarsmen. With double Olympic gold

medallist James Cracknell coaching him, Hunter would not be surprised if Wiggins makes the transition from rowing machine to the water. "I think it's great for the sport because he is a phe-

nomenal athlete and it's exciting to see what he can do," Hunter told Reuters at a Sports Analytics Conference hosted by KPMG in London. "The rowing machine is just like a

watt bike and he has a big engine and he is super fit so I think he will get some good results and go below six minutes for 2,000 metres." "On the water? That's a different challenge being able to take that strength and power and the engine he has and put that on a boat. It's a different skill set. "There are moving parts as a rower. You have to work with other people and train day in and day out in a system. That's maybe a culture that he hasn't been in. "I've seen others try and fail. But hats off to Bradley. He wouldn't be doing this

"I think we've made headway this year. It's early days so we're not declaring victory. But I feel good about the momentum we've got." There may be storm clouds brewing and battles to be fought but the flamboyantly moustachioed boss, who replaced former supremo Bernie Ecclestone in January when Liberty Media completed their takeover, sounded optimistic. A new logo presented on Sunday heralds an extensive re-branding of the global series, with a big push into digital platforms, and there is plenty more to come even if details remain scarce. Work on the more complex issues, such as implementing a cost-cap, rebalancing revenues distributed to teams and a rules blueprint for the future, is just getting started. "The initiatives that we have underwaywhether it's cost, revenues, engines-the reality is that there is broad-based support for the broad direction of where we're going," said Carey.

"As you get into the specifics there are always going to be differences, that's just the reality of life. What we need to do is find the right compromises. "Nobody gets everything they want but everybody's better off than they were before.

'So I think our goal would be to try and find those compromises and I think we honestly believe we're going to get a compromise." The American and his team-including ex-Mercedes team boss Ross Brawn and former ESPN executive Sean Bratches-have plenty to keep them busy.

Making the racing more exciting and competitive is a priority, with the season fizzling out in the later stages after Ferrari's Sebastian Vettel and eventual champion Lewis Hamilton had looked like battling down to the wire earlier in the year.

Sunday's race under the Abu Dhabi floodlights was so processional that Red Bull's Max Verstappen, one of the most exciting drivers on the grid, did not attempt to hide his boredom. "If I had a pillow in the car I could have fallen asleep," declared the 20-year-old.

Liberty has ramped up investment in the sport, spending on infrastructure and putting a marketing, research and digital operation in place.

That has led to a drop in earnings which has hit revenue payouts to the 10 teams with payments, at \$273 million in the third quarter, 14 percent lower than the same period last year. That has raised concerns but Carey said it was all part of growing a business. "Realistically, to grow things, usually there's no free lunches," he said. - Reuters

Ravens dig into their bag of tricks to topple Texans

LOS ANGELES: Baltimore scored a touchdown following a fake punt and Alex Collins rushed for another as the Ravens defeated the Houston Texas 23-16 on Monday night. The Ravens improved to 6-5 on the season and have back-to-back wins for the first time since the opening two weeks of the season. Baltimore's Joe Flacco completed 20 of 31 passes for 131 yards and had a key 25-yard run on the game's final possession. Ravens linebacker Terrell Suggs came up with a clutch sack of Texans quarterback Tom Savage late in the fourth quarter that resulted in a fumble being recovered by Baltimore defensive tackle Willie Henry. The Ravens had three takeaways, giving them an NFL-leading 26 on the season. Savage, filling in for the injured Deshaun Watson, was 22 of 37 for 252 yards with two interceptions. Running back Javorius Allen scored the touchdown off the fake punt. Baltimore surprised the Texans when Sam Koch threw a 22-yard pass to Chris Moore on the fake punt early in the second quarter. Two plays later, Allen tied the game on a 10-yard run.

Houston pulled to within 20-16 on a 37-yard field goal by Ka'imi Fairbairn with 8:36 remaining in the game. The Texans were driving again on their next possession, but Suggs sacked Savage, causing the ball to come loose. That led to a 49-yard field goal by Justin Tucker that gave Baltimore the lead 23-16. Ravens safety Anthony Levine sealed the win with the first interception of his career with just over two minutes left. Baltimore had to overcome a huge performance by Texans receiver DeAndre Hopkins, who caught seven passes for 125 yards. - AFP

dence provided by Rodchenkov, now living in the United States, was used and deemed credible.

"The (IOC) Disciplinary Commission has come to the conclusion that, whatever his motivation may be and whichever wrongdoing he may have committed in the past, Dr Rodchenkov was telling the truth when he provided explanations of the cover-up scheme that he managed," it said in its decision.

"The Disciplinary Commission would have preferred... to be able to hear Dr Rodchenkov in person. However, this does not alter its conviction that Dr Rodchenkov is a truthful witness and that his state-

ments reflect the reality and can be used as valid evidence."

The Sochi scandal, triggered by revelations made by Rodchenkov, is part of a broader doping affair that has led to the suspension of Russia's anti-doping agency RUSADA, its athletics federation and Paralympic Committee.

The IOC has said it will decide during its executive board meeting next month on the participation of Russian competitors at the Pyeongchang Winter Olympics in South Korea in February.— Reuters



Lehmann predicts more short-pitched barrage in Adelaide

BRISBANE: Australia's fast bowlers will once again pepper England's middle and lower order batsmen with short-pitched deliveries on a lively track in the day-night second Ashes test in Adelaide, coach Darren Lehmann said yesterday.

The Australian pacemen tormented England's lower order with bouncers on the fourth day in Brisbane to set up the hosts' 10-wicket win in the series opener. The barrage was reminiscent of the preceding home series in 2013/14, when the Mitchell Johnson-led pace battery mowed through England's tail repeatedly to help secure a 5-0 whitewash for the hosts.

"(Bowling short) certainly hasn't changed from four years ago," Lehmann told reporters at the Adelaide airport ahead of the second Test beginning on Saturday. "It's a bit different in Australia than England where grounds are smaller and you can't really get away with it, on bigger grounds you can. So that's one for us that we see as an advantage. "They did it quite a lot to us as well, it's a ploy a lot of people do now. At the back end when the wicket quickened up and we could go after them a bit harder was helpful. That's the blueprint, it's no secret we're going to attack their middle and lower order like that." Mitchell Starc had asked for a bit more pace from the wickets after the Gabba served up a docile surface in the first test and according to Lehmann his wish could get fulfilled with the pink ball at the Adelaide Oval.

"It's a fascinating Test match, there's a lot of talk about it'll seam and it'll swing," Lehmann said, adding that Australia's experience of playing daynight tests in the past would come handy. "The ball stays pretty good, but you can make runs if you play well as per normal. And it does quicken up at night probably the fastest wicket around Australia at night, so that's going to be interesting, how it plays. "You're more comfortable in your preparation, you know what you have to do to get ready. So the leadin is a lot more normal for us than other teams having done it twice. This is the third time so we're pretty comfortable where it sits."

The 47-year-old Lehmann, who played 27 tests for Australia, lauded off-spinner Nathan Lyon who bagged five wickets in a key contribution towards the hosts' victory. "He kept us in the game day one, he was fantastic. He's just grown with confidence and success breeds that," Lehmann said. "For him he's actually come out of his shell a lot as well, he wants the ball day in, day out, a bit like Warney (former leg-spinner Shane Warne) did when he played.

"He's not as confident as Warney was, but he's just really starting to lead and help the bowlers out, which is great." — Reuters

Stokes eyes NZ hit-out

SYDNEY: Suspended England all-rounder Ben Stokes plans to play first-class cricket in New Zealand, officials said yesterday, potentially paving the way for a dramatic Ashes call-up. Social media went into overdrive late Monday when a picture showing Stokes leaving London's Heathrow airport sparked speculation he was set to join his England teammates in Australia.

The England and Wales Cricket Board (ECB) poured cold water on the suggestion, saying the 26-year-old was simply heading to New Zealand to visit family. But it soon emerged Stokes aims to play first-class cricket for Canterbury during his trip to the South Island, keeping him in shape if required for the Ashes.

"(We) have been in initial informal discussions with Ben Stokes' representatives regarding his potential availability," Canterbury Cricket said in a statement. Stokes is barred from international cricket as British police investi-

But the suspension announced in September does not apply to domestic cricket, meaning Stokes could turn out for Canterbury. The London Times cricket writer Elizabeth Ammon tweeted that Stokes was poised to play as soon as this Sunday, when Canterbury face Otago in New Zealand's domestic one-day competition.

The Stokes controversy rocked England's Ashes preparations and the team slumped to a 10-wicket defeat in the first Test in Brisbane this week. Former Australia Test captains Steve Waugh and Ian Chappell are among those who believe England can't retain the Ashes without the hardhitting allrounder.

Stokes was born in New Zealand but moved to England as a child when his father Gerard, a former rugby league international, took a coaching role. Both his parents have since moved back to Christchurch, the Canterbury region's main city. The ECB emphasised that Stokes was on a private trip that had not been set up by the organisation. "His travel arrangements have not been arranged by the ECB," it said in a statement.

"He is not on his way to the Ashes, England Lions or any other official training camps with the England set-up." The Ashes resumes on Saturday when the day-night second Test starts in Adelaide.- AFP

Ishant's resurgence welcome news for India's pace stocks

MUMBAI: India's batsmen plundered runs and spin spearhead Ravichandran Ashwin got among the wickets against Sri Lanka but it was the resurgence of paceman Ishant Sharma that probably pleased captain Virat Kohli most ahead of their tour of South Africa.

Sri Lanka had lost 9-0 to India across all formats a few months back and were therefore never expected to provide the ideal preparation for what will be a challenging trip to South Africa for the world's top-ranked test team. After the rain-curtailed opening match at Kolkata's Eden Gardens ended in a draw, Kohli's men crushed the visitors by an innings and 239 runs in the second test, matching their biggest winning margin in the longest format.

India's batsmen compiled up a mammoth first-innings total against Sri Lanka's toothless attack, while the spin duo of Ravichandran Ashwin and Ravindra Jadeja combined to pick up 13 of the touring side's 20 wickets in Nagpur. But it was Ishant's match haul of 5-80 that the skipper described as the standout bowling performance of the match. "Even on this wicket, to have that kind of bounce and trouble the batsmen regularly, I think Ishant was outstanding," Kohli said at the post-match presentation on Monday.

'Although the spinners obviously did a good job for us, I think Ishant was the standout bowler in this game." India's biggest victory margin until Monday's win was against Bangladesh in Dhaka in 2007, a test in which Ishant made his debut as a 18-year-old.

The lanky right-arm paceman was marked as the future leader of India's fast bowling attack and while he has gone on to play 78 Tests he has failed to live up to those lofty expectations. After falling behind Mohammed Shami and Umesh Yadav in the pecking order, the emergence of

Bhuvneshwar Kumar as a swing bowler has only made it tougher for Ishant and his chances have largely come due to the unavailability of other fast bowlers.

He played three out of four Tests against Australia earlier this year after Shami was ruled out with a knee injury but played no part in three Tests in Sri Lanka in July-August, though he kept himself fit and in form by picking up 20 wickets in four matches for Delhi in the Ranji Trophy. Ishant would probably not have played in Nagpur had Kumar not withdrawn from the final two Tests to get married and Shami was not ruled out due to a slight injury concern. In Nagpur, he extracted good bounce and movement from a batting-friendly track, which could prove crucial in South Africa with India set to face wickets that are expected to aid the faster bowlers. "The way Umesh and Shami and even Bhuvi were bowling was tremendous. I didn't take much wickets in the last 12 tests I played, specially in India. They deserved to get a chance before me," Ishant said after Monday's win.

City's eight-point lead over second-placed Manchester United has established them as overwhelming favourites to win the title, but skipper Vincent Kompany is not buying into that.

Russia builds inside-out arena for World Cup

MOSCOW: How does it feel to be on the outside looking in? Football fans visiting Yekaterinburg in the Russian Urals for the 2018 World Cup will find out when they get seated in one of two temporary stands that fill empty plots of land next to the arena-originally too small to fit FIFA rules.

Openings at each goal end of the stadium's facade offer a remote view of the pitch but no protection from the sun or rain. And those unlucky enough to only get tickets for the extensions' upper-most rows will stare out directly at the outer edge of the refurbished Yekaterinburg Arena's circular roof.

The UK's perplexed Guardian newspaper suggested the entire ensemble might have come from "outer space" while USA Today screamed that it "couldn't look any scarier".

All of which has left the construction company behind the 42-metre-tall (138-foot-tall) extensions sounding somewhat bemused. "This is a typical solution for sport facilities built for major international competitions," Sinara-Development Director General Timur Ufimtsev told AFP.

"In addition, you can see a beautiful panoramic view of Yekaterinburg itself since the stadium is in a central part of the city." He added that the whole seating section is protected by "tall railings" to make sure no one falls off.

The additions will make Yekaterinburg Arena into a 35,000-seater that will shrink back down in size to 23,000 once the stands are dismantled when all the tourists go home.

CULTURAL HERITAGE SITE

The world media's sceptical gaze fell on the 60year-old stadium once it was selected as the easternmost venue of the 12 hosting the marquee June 14-July 15 event. The Kremlin wanted to show off Russia's cultural diversity and settled on Yekaterinburg-the mining capital of the tsars in which the late president Boris Yeltsin built his career.

Four were scheduled for Yekaterinburg and Russia had a problem. Sinara-Development said it also could not simply rebuild the entire arena because it was listed as a cultural heritage site that needed to be preserved in its original form.

Football's world governing body not only agreed but

applauded the unique way Yekaterinburg worked its way out of a potential mess. "Temporary seats are being installed in order to ensure that the renovation work would conserve the historical facade of the stadium and that maintenance costs are reduced after the World Cup," a FIFA spokesman told AFP. The old stadium's entrance featured six columns topped by sculptures of communist factory workers and athletes.

These will stay in place for posterity's sake. The FIFA spokesman also brushed aside any safety concerns. "Inspection visits and detailed reports have shown that the temporary seats in the Yekaterinburg Arena fully comply with all safety and security requirements," he said.

Ufimtsev said the stadium was "90 percent ready" and would be completed by the end of the year. — AFP face of a ban imposed on travel in and out of Qatar by a Saudi Arabia-led coalition that is backed by the United Arab Emirates. Clubs from the three nations regularly play each other in the Asian Champions League, although this year's competition was not affected by the standoff as Qatari teams had been eliminated before the action was taken in early June.

Qatar, along with Oman and the United Arab Emirates, hosted some of those games this season. Meanwhile, the AFC has said it will begin the tender process for the confederation's commercial rights in February of next year, with the aim to finalise the procedure by May or June 2018.

The rights are currently held by Lagardere Sports and Entertainment with the existing contract, which started in 2014 and is worth \$1 billion, due to expire at the end of 2021. "The AFC will ensure that transparent and fair procedures are followed and that the views of the Member Associations are taken into consideration," AFC President Shaikh Salman bin Ebrahim Al Khalifa said. — Reuters



Buffon wins Italy's best player award

MILAN: Italy's veteran goalkeeper Gianluigi Buffon has eased some of his World Cup heartache by winning the Serie A Best Player of the Year award. "I'm happy and proud. I never thought I'd get this kind of trophy, and I'll hold on tight to it because I never won best youngster!" said the 39-year-old Juventus goalkeeper at Monday night's ceremony. "The failure to participate in the World is the biggest disappointment in my career together with some (lost) Champions League finals."

Napoli's Maurizio Sarri was named the best coach in the Italian football awards, voted for by the players, for competing for the title with a smaller budget than **Juventus**.

Buffon quit international football last month as four-time champions Italy sensationally missed out on their first World Cup finals in 60 years after a playoff defeat to Sweden. "Italy-Sweden was the biggest disappointment of my life," he told Sky Sports Italia.

"But we need to move on, the season must end in the best way and with Juventus there are so many goals to be achieved." Buffon won a tenth Serie A title with Juventus and helped the Turin-based side reach the Champions League final for the second time in three years. He also won a third Italian Cup with the Juve. Despite the World Cup setback, he has left the door open on a future return for the national side. "I've taken a period of rest, I'm getting on, I've always been a soldier signed up for the national side and Juventus, so I can't desert," he said. "Even at the age of 60, if there was a dearth of goalkeepers I'd be available because that's how I conceive the idea of a nation." It is the sixth straight year that a Juventus player has won the award with Buffon following in the footsteps of Andrea Pirlo (2012-014), Carlos Tevez (2015) and Leonardo Bonucci (2016).

Buffon has said he will retire at the end of this season, unless Juventus win the Champions League title. The Serie A champions play league leaders Napoli on Friday before a crunch Champions League game next week at Olympiakos when they need a win to guarantee passage into the next round. —AFP

Tough OPEC meeting looms tomorrow

Cartel may rethink output cuts amid price rally

DUBAI/VIENNA: OPEC is heading for tougher-thanexpected policy talks this week as its leader Saudi Arabia pushes to extend oil output cuts by nine months while non-member Russia is hesitating on the curbs' duration due to worries that the market could overheat.

"It will not be an easy meeting and we always look at various scenarios," United Arab Emirates Energy Minister Suhail bin Mohammed Al-Mazroui said yesterday in Dubai before leaving for the OPEC gathering in Vienna. The Organization of the Petroleum Exporting Countries, Russia and nine other producers are cutting oil output by about 1.8 million barrels per day until March 2018, and tomorrow will discuss extending the deal.

The market had largely expected OPEC to prolong cuts until the end of 2018 but doubts have emerged in the last few days. Saudi Arabia has signaled that it wants oil to trade at about \$60 a barrel as the kingdom prepares to list shares in national oil champion Aramco and is fighting a large fiscal deficit. The Russian government also wants high oil prices ahead of a presidential election in March 2018. But officials in Moscow have voiced worries about pricier oil boosting the ruble, which could undermine the competitiveness of Russia's economy.

Slowing outflows let Qatar wind down bank support operation in Oct

DUBAI: Slowing withdrawals of deposits from Qatari banks permitted Qatar's government to stop pumping money into the banks last month to shield them from sanctions imposed by other Arab countries, central bank data showed yesterday.

Banks and investors from Saudi Arabia, the United Arab Emirates, Bahrain and Egypt began pulling deposits and other funds out of Qatar in June, when those four states cut diplomatic and trade ties with Doha. The deposit outflow initially put the balance sheets of some Qatari banks under pressure, and the government responded by injecting billions of dollars of its own money into accounts at the banks. Much of the money came from the country's sovereign wealth fund, the Qatar Investment Authority (QIA).

But the outflows are now slowing, as the four states run out of money left to withdraw. That is reducing the need for the government to aid the banks. In October, foreign customers' deposits at banks in Qatar - the vast majority in the form of foreign-currency deposits - fell by only 5.1 billion rivals (\$1.4 billion) from the previous month, to As oil rallied above \$60 per barrel, US producers aggressively hedged their future production, raising fears of another spike in shale output in the United

States, which is not participating in the global production curbs. Goldman Sachs, one of the most active banks in commodity trading and oil producer hedging, said yesterday in a note the outcome of the OPEC meeting was uncertain as Brent oil had risen above \$63 per barrel.

"The push for a ninemonth extension, four months before the cuts

The deposits dropped by 4.2 billion riyals to 298.4 billion riyals last month, after increasing by 7.2 billion riyals in September and rising by more than three times that amount in each of the previous three months. The central bank has not responded to queries about details of official support to banks, but central bank governor Sheikh Abdullah bin Saud Al-Thani said last month that the government and the central bank had more than enough financial resources to protect the banking system from outflows. After the sanctions were imposed, Qatari banks' borrowing from foreign banks also fell sharply as institutions from the four Arab countries stopped extending loans.

October's data suggested, however, that Qatari banks have begun to have success filling this gap by increasing their borrowing from Asia and Europe. Qatari banks owed banks outside the country 171.7 billion riyals in October, up from 169.5 billion riyals in September; it was the first increase since the sanctions were imposed. Kuwait's domestic credit up by 3.1% in Sept: KFH report

KUWAIT: Kuwait Finance House (KFH) said yesterday that the total domestic credit granted by the banking sector has grown 3.1 percent to KD 35.8 billion, equaling \$118 billion, as of September 2017.

Meanwhile, financial facilities directed to industrial, non-bank financial institution, real estate, and construction sectors have fell in September by 11.8 percent, 4.1 percent, and 0.6 percent respectively, KFH said in its economic report, entitled "Credit Activity Development in Kuwait".

The report indicated that the personal facilities sector recorded an increase in value in September by 3.6 percent to KD 515.5 million, equaling \$1.7 billion compared to same period last year.

PARIS: French bank Societe Generale and its Credit Du and parliamentary elections, during which she accused Nord subsidiary did not violate banking regulations in shutting down the accounts of the far-right National Front party, the Bank of France said yesterday. National Front chief Marine Le Pen last week accused the banks, as well as HSBC which closed her personal account, of launching a "banking fatwa" to silence her party.

Le Pen said she would file a legal complaint this week. "It will be up to the court to decide," Le Pen said in an interview on BFM TV, adding that the account closures prevented the party from operating properly. The Bank of

France revealed that the National Front had held 16 accounts with Societe Generale until Sept. 25, as well as a deposit account with Credit Du Nord on which two months notice was given in late October.

That appeared to contradict Le Pen who last week said the central bank had ordered Credit Du Nord to manage an account for the party and that the bank had refused to process cheques and credit card payments. Le Pen is smarting from defeat in this year's presidential

It targets raising its net profit per share to 6.5 euros in 2020, compared to 4.3 euros in 2016. Societe Generale's chief executive Frederic Oudea said the bank aims to remain a trusted partner to clients and is committed to a positive transformation of societies and economies.

Catalonia turmoil sets Spain retail sales falling


MADRID: Spanish retail sales fell for the first time in over three years in October, with sales in Catalonia dropping sharply after an illegal independence vote on Oct. 1 pushed the country into its worst political crisis in more than four decades. The vote prompted a standoff with the central government, which then took control of the region. The deadlock left eight of the regional cabinet in jail awaiting trial after a declaration of independence Oct. 27 that the courts ruled illegal. The crisis hurt many of Catalonia's economic indices in October, with car sales, job creation and hotel-stays all underperforming the rest of the country. Almost 3,000 companies have moved their legal headquarters from the region since the vote. Spanish retail sales fell 0.1 percent in October from a year earlier on a calendar-adjusted basis, after increasing by a revised 1.6 percent in September, the National Statistics Institute (INE) said yesterday. The September figure was revised from an original reading of a 2.1 percent increase. The unadjusted series fell 1.2 percent, INE said, with Catalonia decreasing the most out of all of Spain's 17 regions, down 3.9 percent from a year earlier. The wealthy, industrialized region of Catalonia weighs heavily in the index alongside Madrid, which was flat on the year. Catalonia's fall, coupled with an especially mild October which hit sales of winter clothing and textiles across the country, were the main reasons for the month's drop, according to one analyst with access to INE's data but who preferred to remain anonymous. The government has said that Spain's economy would grow just 2.3 percent next year if political tensions continued after the Dec. 21 regional election, but that could rise to three percent if the problem dissipated. The OECD yesterday cut its economic forecast for Spain for 2018 by 0.1 percentage points to 2.3 percent and warned the situation with Catalonia could drag on domestic demand. —Reuters

Cash and history keep **Europe as Africa's** prime partner

ABIDJAN: Hard cash but also the intangible ties of history have kept Europe in pole position as Africa's main partner, even if an influx of Chinese investment is prompting many African countries to look eastward. Successive years of hefty spending, particularly in infrastructure, have propelled China into the continent's top slot when calculated in terms of individual investor nations.

But a quite different picture emerges when this is seen through a broader prism-the ties between Africa and Europe as a 28-nation bloc.

"Europe is in front, given the shared history," said Pierre Dagbo Gode, professor of political science at the Felix Houphouet Boigny University of Abidjan. "Europe is the premier trade partner, the top investor, the top donor," a European diplomat in Brussels added, speaking ahead of a summit between the EU and African Union in Abidjan today and tomorrow. According to the Chinese ministry of commerce, trade between China and Africa was worth \$149.2 billion last year — \$92.3 billion in exports from China, against \$56.9 billion of imports. That made China, for the eighth year, Africa's foremost individual trade partner-well ahead of France and Germany. However, trade between the EU and Africa totalled 286 billion euros in 2015 (\$341 billion at current rates) with a 22-billion-euro surplus in Europe's favor. Europe also contributed some 21 billion euros in foreign aid-more than the United States and China combined. 'When people say Europe has let China overtake it you have to keep things in perspective," said an EU diplomat in Abidjan. Factors such as language, cultural cooperation, university exchanges, a military presence and aid all help to ensure "Europe remains the point of reference" for Africa, the source said.

'Aggressive policy'

Even so, Chinese competition is hotting up. Beijing's big policy is to mix aid and loans at ultra-low interest rates to muscle in on numerous large-scale projects.

"They have a very aggressive policy, in the good sense of the term, on loans and this seduces states," said one financial observer in the region. According to China's state-run Xinhua news agency, quoting Fitch Ratings,

loans from China to Africa over the past decade amounted to \$67.2 billion-a whole \$12.5 billion more than those made by the World Bank. "The aspects which attract Chinese enterprises to Africa are the development potential, resources and the market," said Xu Tiebing, professor of international relations at the Communication University of China. "The Chinese government has a South 'complex'. They think that when the South becomes powerful the world will be more balanced." added Xu.

Natural destination

"China thinks perhaps that as two of the world's poles of development (Europe and North America) are already in decline, Africa, Latin America and Asia are becoming the natural destination for Chinese investment. "In the past, China was more concerned by the political angle, but now ascribes greater importance to common development and to mutual advantage," he said.

A European diplomat commented: "China's presence and engagement in Africa attracts a lot of attention. "But China is not the only one massively gearing up its interests in Africa. Look at Japan, India and the Gulf States. There is a multitude of players." The so-called BRIC states-Brazil, India, China and Russia-have all gained a foothold on the

continent. Bolstered by its African roots and after first concentrating on fellow Portuguese-speaking countries, Brazil has been extending its influence, although its internal political problems have hampered the process.

Brazil-African trade was worth \$12.433 billion (\$7.830 billion of that made up of Brazilian exports) in 2016 - but that was well down on the 2013 figure of \$28.5 billion. 'With Lula (former president Luiz Inacio Lula da Silva, in power 2003-2010), Brazilian-African relations went through a very intensive phase," explained Pio Penna Filho, a professor of international relations at the University of Brasilia.

After Dilma Rousseff (2011-2016) succeeded Lula, Brazil "did not put an end to its African policy but there was a lessening of this intensity," owing to a political crisis sweeping the Latin American giant, he said. Africa's allure for investors is multifaceted. One attraction is the notion that, in many countries, a middle class is rising, providing a potent market for housing, transport, clothing, education and consumer products. Coupled with that is demography-the continent's population is expected to roughly double to 2.5 billion by 2050, according to a UN estimate. But, as Dagbo notes, there is also an age-old view of Africa as a "raw materials zone", a treasure trove of natural resources that are extracted but not transformed. —AFP

PARIS: Global economic growth is set to peak at an eight-year high next year as uninspiring investment and increasingly dangerous debt levels limit room for further improvement, the OECD said yesterday. The global economy is on course to grow 3.6 percent this year before reaching 3.7 percent next year then ease back to 3.6 percent in 2019, the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development (OECD) said in its latest outlook.

The Paris-based policy forum nudged up its estimate this year with 2.4 percent growth before easing to 2.1

for this year from 3.5 percent in its last forecasts dating from September, and left its 2018 projection unchanged.

"Things look really good now, but unless we see some robust private sector activity and renewal of capital stock, generating higher real wages, we are not going to maintain the growth rates we see today,'

OECD chief economist Catherine Mann told Reuters.

"There is still work to be done, we're still resting a bit comfortably on the incoming data, which have been supported by fiscal and monetary policy," she added. Mann said that in particular companies were not investing enough to make up for the depreciation of existing assets, and even less so in making additional invest-

ments for further growth.

Despite weak private investment, households and companies were bingeing on cheap debt in many countries, exposing themselves to trouble as central banks tighten monetary policy.

Mixed outlook

With its strongest growth in a decade, the euro area was seen outpacing other major developed economies

> percent in 2018 and 1.9 percent in 2019. In September, the OECD had foreseen growth of 2.1 percent this year for the euro area and 1.9 percent next year.

Marginally raising its estimates for the United States, the OECD forecast growth in the world's biggest economy would pick up from 2.2 percent this year to 2.5 percent in 2018, boosted by an expected cut in corporate and income tax, before

easing to 2.1 percent in 2019.

The OECD trimmed its forecast for Japanese growth this year to 1.5 percent and estimated growth would ease afterwards as budget tightening resumed. It left its forecast for next year at 1.2 percent and estimated growth would fall to 1.0 percent in 2019. But it warned

that government debt, the highest ever seen in an OECD member at 220 percent of GDP, posed a serious risk and required a broad-based plan to maintain confidence in Japan's fiscal sustainability.

The OECD left its estimates for China unchanged, forecasting growth would slow from 6.8 percent this year to 6.6 percent in 2018 and 6.4 percent in 2019 as exports slow. — Reuters

Banks could support UK economy in disorderly **Brexit: BoE**

LONDON: Britain's lenders could support the economy through a "disorderly" Brexit, the Bank of England said yesterday, as the sector passed its latest round of stress tests.

The central bank ruled however that the nation's seven top retail banks must hold another £6.0 billion (\$8.0 billion, 6.7 billion euros) in combined capital reserves to safeguard against crisis. "The stress-test scenario ... encompasses a wide range of UK macroeconomic risks that could be associated with Brexit," read a statement from the BoE's Financial Policy Committee (FPC).

"As a result, the FPC judges the UK banking system could continue



Diplomats search for ways to save trade system

GENEVA: Diplomats are searching for ways to prevent the global trade dispute resolution system from freezing up, after the Trump administration blocked appointments to the body that acts as the supreme court for global trade. US President Donald Trump has vetoed the appointment of judges to fill vacancies on the seven-member Apellate Body of the World Trade Organization, which provides final decisions in arguments between countries over trade. "Members are already having a conversation about what to do with this situation," WTO Director General Roberto Azevedo told reporters. "They are floating ideas, they are discussing. We have to see how that evolves." The WTO normally has seven judges and needs three to sign off on every appeal ruling. But two have left and another goes in December, leaving only four - just one above the minimum - to deal with a growing backlog of trade disputes. Azevedo said he did not think the situation was a threat to the WTO's survival but it was already having an impact, and the longer it went on the more acutely it would be felt.

In a confidential note sent to all WTO members on Monday, a copy of which was reviewed by Reuters, the Appellate Body said departing judges would continue working after they left on appeals filed before their terms ended. The United States has objected to that practice in the past.

Appointments to the Appellate Body are meant to be unanimously agreed by all 164 members, like all decisions at the WTO. The fine print says the WTO can switch to majority voting if necessary, but diplomats are reluctant to do that for fear of unravelling a system that relies on consensus as a bulwark to protectionism. Azevedo said the Trump administration had made clear it had misgivings about the way the world trade system has functioned, although it had not linked any specific demands for reform with the decision to halt appointments to the appeals panel.

There are concerns a deadlock in the talks could see Britain leave without a trade deal in place, potentially causing severe disruption to its economy.

"In such circumstances, capital buffers would be drawn down substantially more than in the stress test and, as a result, banks would be more likely to restrict lending to the real economy."

'Resilient to recession'

The Bank of England added yesterday that all seven lenders passed its stress assessments for the first time since it began testing in 2014, and are "resilient" to recession. Barclays and Royal Bank of Scotland struggled in the central bank's severe economic stress scenario.

However, the pair passed the latest tests as they have already taken action to strengthen their balance sheets since the end of last year.

RBS had been the only bank to fail the last tests in November 2016. 'For the first time since the Bank of England launched its stress tests in 2014, no bank needs to strengthen its capital position as a result of the stress test," the BoE added yesterday. "The 2017 stress test shows the UK banking system is resilient to deep simultaneous recessions in the UK and global economies, large falls in asset prices and a separate stress of misconduct costs." — AFP

SoftBank offers to buy Uber shares at 30% discount

SAN FRANCISCO: Japan's SoftBank Group Corp is offering to purchase shares of Uber Technologies Inc at a valuation of \$48 billion, a 30 percent discount to its most recent valuation of \$68.5 billion, a person familiar with the matter said on Monday.

The investment, which was approved by the Uber board in October, would also trigger a string of governance changes at Uber that would limit some early shareholders' voting power, expand the board from 11 to 17 directors and cut the influence of former Chief Executive Travis Kalanick.

The investment and board moves are supported by new Chief Executive Dara Khosrowshahi and come at the end of a year of scandals and change for Uber, including the announcement last week that executives covered up a major hack in 2016. The consortium of investors led by SoftBank and Dragoneer Investment Group plan to take a stake of at least 14 percent in the ride-services company. The tender offer will launch, sources told Reuters, and investors have nearly a month to respond. The SoftBank-led investor group will

acquire two of the new board seats, with the remaining four going to independent directors.

If there are not enough interested sellers, SoftBank can still walk away from the deal. SoftBank is also expected to make a separate \$1 billion investment in the company at the \$68.5 billion valuation. Another person familiar with the deal said the offer price was in line with what investors had been expecting. SoftBank's offer is close to what Uber was worth in 2015, when shares were priced a little less than \$40 apiece for a \$51 billion valuation, according to data from PitchBook Inc. Even at the discounted price, Uber is the world's second-highest valued private venture-backed company, after China's ride-service company Didi Chuxing, and the offer is a chance for early investors to lock in substantial profits and for employees to cash in shares that have to date only had value on paper. Shareholders, including employees, with at least 10,000 shares are eligible to sell. - Reuters

Carney weighs into contested exit of LSE boss

LONDON: The head of the Bank of England called yesterday for clarity on the contested departure of London Stock Exchange chief Xavier Rolet and suggested his exit should go ahead. "Everything comes to an end," said BoE governor Mark Carney, when asked about the ongoing spat at a press conference on the outcome of banking stress tests.

London Stock Exchange Group announced in October that Rolet would leave the company by the end of 2018 after almost a decade in charge. Activist investor The Children's Investment Fund (TCI), which holds five percent of LSEG, has since questioned whether Rolet chose to leave or was pushed out by a board of directors amid reported concerns over his management style.

LSEG is meanwhile due to hold a shareholder meeting before the end of

the year to discuss and vote on whether Rolet should be asked to stay until 2021. "I'm a bit mystified about the debate because we knew about the succession plan, we stayed close to the situation," said Carney yesterday, responding to a reporter's question on the row. "I can't envisage a situation where a CEO stays on beyond the agreed period."

LSEG shareholders will also discuss the possible ousting of chairman Donald Brydon-who TCI hold responsible for what they see as a premature eviction of a successful boss. Frenchman Rolet joined LSEG in 2009, after his Dutch predecessor Clara Furse started steering the group through the global financial crisis.

Rolet transformed the group into a global financial heavyweight, overseeing a surge in the company's market value to nearly £14 billion (\$18.5 billion, 15.7 billion euros) from £800 million. Under his management, the company bought US asset manager Russell for \$2.7 billion to diversify and boost its business in the United States, and also bought British clearing house LCH.Clearnet. But its attempt to merge with Franfurt stock markets were blocked earlier this year by the European Union, which cited concerns about competition and the fallout from Brexit. — AFP





Euro stocks advance; Shell energizes LSE

LONDON: Europe's stock markets took to higher ground yesterday, with London energized by Royal Dutch Shell, dealers said. Shell rallied after the energy giant pledged to resume all-cash shareholder dividends on improving profitability thanks to higher oil prices and deep cost-cutting.

Shares in the Anglo-Dutch titan soared almost 3.50 percent as investors welcomed the news, topping the FTSE 100 risers' board. The news also dragged rival BP 0.8-percent higher.

"A very good morning for Royal Dutch Shell allowed the FTSE to ignore issues in both its mining and banking sectors," said Spreadex analyst Connor Campbell. "The oil giant rocketed 3.5 percent higher after it restored an all-cash dividend. "This growth could not come at a better time for the FTSE, which jumped more than half a percent largely on the strength of Shell's gains and the subsequent rise from BP," he added.

London's financial sector was somewhat boosted after the Bank of England declared Britain's top sev-

He said, however, that the recent announcements warranted a switch to government debt from corporate debt as he expected default rates to rise, while public debt should benefit from being included in MSCI's widely used bond indexes. — Reuters

"The pace of new regulations" being announced "does look somewhat surprising," said Alexander Wolf, senior emerging markets economist at Aberdeen Standard Investments. "It might have caught some people off guard."

But, he said, policymakers were ultimately

oil majors bet big on shale technology new spaceport

HOUSTON: Shale oil engineer Oscar Portillo spends his days drilling as many as five wells at once - without ever setting foot on a rig. Part of a team working to cut the cost of drilling a new shale well by a third, Portillo works from a Royal Dutch Shell Plc office in suburban Houston, his eyes darting among 13 monitors flashing data on speed, temperature and other metrics as he helps control rigs more than 500 miles (805 km) away in the Permian Basin, the largest US oilfield.

For the last decade, smaller oil companies have led the way in shale technology, slashing costs by as much as half with breakthroughs such as horizontal drilling and hydraulic fracking that turned the United States into the world's fastest-growing energy exporter.

Now, oil majors that were slow to seize on shale are seeking further efficiencies by adapting technologies for highly automated offshore operations to shale and pursuing advances in digitalization that have reshaped industries from auto manufacturing to retail.

If they are successful, the US oil industry's ability to bring more wells to production at lower cost could amp up future output and company profits. The firms could also frustrate the ongoing effort by The Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries (OPEC) effort to drain a global oil glut.

"We're bringing science into the art of drilling wells," Portillo said. The technological push comes amid worries that US shale gains are slowing as investors press for higher financial returns. Many investors want producers to restrain spending and focus on generating higher returns, not volume, prompting some to pull back on drilling.

Production at a majority of publicly traded shale producers rose just 1.3 percent over the first three quarters this year, according to Morgan Stanley. But many US shale producers vowed during third quarter earnings disclosures to deliver higher returns through technology, with many forecasting aggressive output hikes into 2018. Chevron Corp is using drones equipped with thermal imaging to detect leaks in oil tanks and pipelines across its shale fields, avoiding traditional ground inspections and lengthy shutdowns.

Ryan Lance, chief executive of ConocoPhillips - the largest US independent oil and gas producer - sees ample opportunity to boost both profits and output. Conoco also oversees remote drilling operations in a similar way to Shell. "The people that don't have shale in their portfolios don't understand it, frankly," Lance said in an interview. "They think it's going to go away quickly because of the high decline rates, or that the resource is not nearly that substantial. They're wrong on both counts."

Shell, in an initiative called "iShale," has marshaled technology from a dozen oilfield suppliers, including devices from subsea specialist TechnipFMC Plc that separate fracking sand from oil and well-control software from Emerson Electric Co, to bring more automation and data analysis to shale operations. One idea borrowed from deepwater projects is using sensors to automatically adjust well flows and control separators that divvy natural gas, oil and water. Today, these subsea systems are expensive because they are built to operate at the extreme pressures and temperatures found miles under the ocean's surface. —Reuters **MOSCOW:** Russia said it had lost contact yesterday with a weather satellite just hours after it was launched from its Vostochny cosmodrome, in only the second rocket liftoff

from the new spaceport. The glitch is a fresh embarrassment for Russia's beleaguered space program which has suffered a series of setbacks over recent years as Moscow seeks to ease dependence on the Baikonur cosmodrome in Kazakhstan.

"During the first scheduled communication session with the space vehicle, contact has not been established because it is not on its planned orbit," the Russian space agency Roscosmos said in a statement.

"Information is currently being analyzed." The statement did not provide further details and its representatives declined immediate comment. Marking another milestone after the inaugural liftoff last year, the Soyuz rocket carrying the Meteor weather satellite and other equipment took off at 2:41 pm (0541 GMT) from far eastern Russia.

"All the initial stages of the rocket's flight went according to plan," Roscosmos said after the liftoff. National television broadcast live footage of the launch, showing the rocket taking off into a grey sky in the Amur region near the Chinese border. Apart from the weather satellite, the rocket carried 18 payloads from institutions and companies in Canada, the United States, Japan, Germany, Sweden and Norway, the space agency said.

Prime Minister Dmitry Medvedev said Monday that such contracts would help Russia modernise its space industry. "The launch of foreign devices with the help of Russian launch vehicles should strengthen our positions on the global market of space services and increase the volume of extra-budgetary funds and investments," Medvedev told a meeting.

The first launch from Vostochny spaceport took place in April 2016, with President Vladimir Putin overseeing the take-off. It represented a major development for the country's space sector, with the new cosmodrome touted to mark a rebirth of an industry plagued by a string of embarrassments. In December last year, an unmanned Progress ship carrying supplies lost contact with Earth

minutes after blast-off and burnt up in the atmosphere over Siberia. In April 2015, a failed Progress launch was also blamed on a problem with the Soyuz rocket, a space workhorse dating back to the Cold War-era.

Launches 'will grow'

The third launch from Vostochny is scheduled for December 22. "The program of launches will continue next year - it will grow, increase," Deputy Prime Minister Dmitry Rogozin, who oversees space, told Medvedev on Monday. The Kremlin's goal is to ease Russia's dependence on Baikonur in Kazakhstan, a launchpad Moscow has been forced to rent since the collapse of the Soviet Union.

Russia is also home to the Plesetsk cosmodrome in the north, which is used for satellite launches and missile testing. But Vostochny, like Baikonur, is closer to the equator, making launches cheaper and more energy-efficient. The new cosmodrome currently has one launchpad for the Soyuz, the only rocket currently being used for manned space flights. Rogozin said he planned to chair a meeting at the launchpad set to address a second construction phase that will see the country build a reinforced launchpad for the new Angara rocket.

The launch of the Angara, which is being tested to replace the ageing Proton workhorse rockets, is scheduled for 2021. Construction on the new spaceport began in 2012 but has been marred by labor disputes, corruption scandals and delays. The first satellite launch had been scheduled for late 2015, but setbacks forced authorities to review the timetable.

In October, Russia launched from Plesetsk a European satellite dedicated to monitoring the Earth's atmosphere, the protective layer that shields the planet from the sun's radiation. —AFP

Scandal-hit Uber hits the road to reassure regulators

TOKYO: Uber executives are travelling the globe to reassure regulators that the company is changing the way it does business, after a massive data breach became the latest controversy to hurt the ride-service firm's reputation. Uber Technologies Inc is also continuing talks with Japan's SoftBank Group Corp over an investment, Brooks Entwistle, Uber's recently appointed chief business officer for Asia Pacific, told Reuters on Monday.

Uber disclosed last week that it covered

up an October 2016 data breach involving 57 million customers and about 600,000 drivers. The company said it paid two hackers \$100,000 to destroy the stolen data and keep the matter a secret.

The revelation, made by Uber's new Chief Executive Officer Dara Khosrowshahi in a blog post, prompted governments in countries including Britain, the United States, Mexico, Australia and the Philippines to launch probes into the breach and Uber's handling of the matter.

The global backlash will test Uber's new collaborative approach to regulators, a stark change from the rule-breaking culture created by former CEO Travis Kalanick. "We have changed tacks in so many ways in dealing with regulators, dealing with governments," Entwistle said in an interview in Tokyo, where he is meeting Japanese officials and potential business partners. Nevertheless, Chicago Mayor Rahm Emanuel and Kimberly Foxx, the public prosecutor for Cook County, Illinois, said on Monday they filed a consumer fraud lawsuit against Uber for its failure to protect the data of its customers and drivers, accusing the company of violating local laws by failing to promptly disclose the breach. "We are committed to changing the way we do business, putting integrity at the core of every decision we make, and working hard to regain the trust of consumers," Uber said in a statement.

Also on Monday, fresh questions came from US lawmakers demanding an explanation for the company's handling of the breach. Republican senators John Thune, Orrin Hatch, Jerry Moran and Bill Cassidy sent a letter to Khosrowshahi seeking answers about the data theft and cover-up, which they called "a serious incident that merits further scrutiny." The senators requested a response from Uber by Dec. 11. Hatch chairs the Senate Committee on Finance and Thune chairs the Commerce Science and Transportation Committee. In a separate letter sent Monday, Senator Mark Warner, a Democrat and advocate of the technology industry including the ondemand sector that includes Uber, sent a letter to Khosrowshahi with detailed questions about Uber's security systems and rationale for covering up the breach.

The disclosure of the 2016 data breach at a time when Uber is trying to bring in SoftBank as an investor has spurred speculation about the price of the deal. SoftBank and Dragoneer Investment Group agreed on Nov. 12 to lead a group that would invest as much as \$10 billion in Uber, people familiar with the deal previously told Reuters. The group plans to directly invest \$1 billion to \$1.25 billion at Uber's current \$69 billion valuation, and also buy at a lower valuation shares held by existing investors and employees.—Reuters

Abusive digital avatars might help schizophrenics fight 'voices': Study

Taking their medication throughout the trial

PARIS: "You're rubbish. You're rubbish. You're a waste of space." The computer avatar pulls no punches as it lays into the young woman, a schizophrenia sufferer, facing the screen. "Can you go away, please?" the woman asks, timidly at first. But after some time, emboldened, she asserts: "I am not going to listen to you any more!" The exchange is part of an innovative treatment developed by specialists in London and Manchester for people with schizophrenia who "hear voices". And it seems to work, the team reported Friday.

Of 75 people who underwent "avatar therapy" in a three-month trial, seven "completely stopped hearing their voices," according to the authors of a study published in The Lancet Psychiatry. In the group overall there were "really large and significant decreases in the amount of distress people felt in relation to their voices, the number of times a day they heard the voices, and the extent to which they felt overpowered by the voice," said lead author Tom Craig of King's College London. In a comparison group of 75 patients who received counseling instead of avatar therapy, two said their hallucinations had stopped, the team found. All the participants continued taking their medication throughout the trial.

About two thirds of schizophrenia sufferers live with "voices" — imaginary people who "speak" to them, typically to insult and threaten. It is a "horrible and distressing" condition, Craig said. Most experience the voice as dominant, even omnipotent, and feel inferior and powerless in comparison. For most, drugs reduce the symptoms but about one in four continue hearing voices, said the study.

More in control

The new treatment helps schizophrenia sufferers confront these disembodied scolds, and



learn to dominate them. All 150 participants had experienced persistent and distressing hallucinations for between one to 20 years, despite taking antipsychotic medication. On average, they lived with three or four distinct voices each. In the first step, a therapist would help the patient create a digital computer simulation, or avatar, of the main voice plaguing them — mimicking what it says, the pitch and tone of its speech, and recreating what they imagined its face would look like.

Over six 50-minute sessions, the patient then confronts their tormenter, materialised on screen, guided by their therapist. The therapist, in a different room, uses a microphone to address the patient over the computer speakers, as well as voicing the avatar's on-screen tirade. In a video demonstrating the method, Craig counsels a woman as she talks to her avatar.

As she asks: "Can you go away, please?" Craig's voice advises: "That's good Lauren, that's good, but can you try and make it a bit stronger for me? Sit up, look at him, and tell him to go away, OK?" As the therapy advances and the patient learns to become more assertive, the avatar starts conceding ground, and eventually acknowledges the person's strong qualities. "The whole experience changes from something that's very frightening to something that's much more in the person's control," Craig explained. — AFP

Europe's HIV epidemic growing at alarming rate

LONDON: The number of people newly diagnosed with HIV in Europe reached its highest level in 2016 since records began, showing the region's epidemic growing "at an alarming pace", health officials said yesterday. That year, 160,000 people contracted the virus that causes AIDS in the 53 countries that make up the World Health Organization's European region, the agency said in a joint report with the European Centre for Disease Prevention and Control (ECDC).

Around 80 percent of those were in Eastern Europe, the report found. "This is the highest number of cases recorded in one year. If this trend persists, we will not be able to achieve the ... target of ending the HIV epidemic by 2030," the WHO's European regional director, Zsuzsanna Jakab, said in a statement. The trend was particularly worrying, the organizations said, because many patients had already been carrying the HIV infection for several years by the time they were diagnosed, making the virus harder to control and more likely to have been passed on to others.

Early diagnosis is important with HIV because it allows people to start treatment with AIDS drugs sooner, increasing their chances of living a long and healthy life. "Europe needs to do more in its HIV response," said ECDC director Andrea Ammon. She said the average time from estimated time of infection until a person is diagnosed is three years, "which is far too long". The report said new strategies were needed to expand the reach of HIV testing – including self-testing services and testing provided by lay providers.

Almost 37 million people worldwide have the human immunodeficiency virus that causes AIDS. The majority of cases are in poorer regions such as Africa, where access to testing, prevention and treatment is more limited, but the HIV epidemic has also proved stubborn in wealthier regions like Europe. The WHO European Region comprises 53 countries, with a popula-tion of nearly 900 million people. The ECDC/WHO report found that over the past ten years, the rate of newly diagnosed HIV infections in this region has risen by 52 percent from 12 in every 100,000 of population in 2007 to 18.2 for every 100,000 in 2016. That decade-long increase was "mainly driven by the continuing upward trend in the East," the report said. — Reuters

The 52-year-old actor has been accused of sexual assault or harassment by four women - actress Anastasia Taneie, former Playboy model Ariane Bellamar, 'Longmire' actress Cassidy Freeman, and advertising executive Tiffany Bacon Scourby, Following the spate of allegations, Jeremy said in a statement to BuzzFeed: "Let me be absolutely clear, this simply did not happen. "I would never force myself on a woman. I cannot speak as to why a person would create a story like this." Meanwhile, HBO - the TV network that broadcast 'Entourage' - said: "We reviewed our records and did not receive any complaints against Jeremy Piven on 'Entourage'." Timbaland almost died of an overdose of painkillers

he 45-year-old record producer - who has collaborated with some of the biggest names in the music industry, including Jay Z, Justin Timberlake and Katy Perry has revealed he came perilously close to losing his life three years ago after overdosing on OxyContin, which he became addicted to. Of his near-death experience, he shared: "All I can tell you is that there was a light. I woke up trying to catch my breath, like I was underwater." Timbaland started taking painkillers over a decade ago because of nerves issue, which he explained stemmed from a gunshot wound he suffered during his teens. But over a period of time, the chart-topping star developed an addiction to the potentially dangerous painkillers. He told Rolling Stone magazine: "Music is a gift and curse. "Once you're not popping, it plays with your mind. The pills helped block out the noise - I'd just sleep all day. I remember Jay Z told me one time, 'Don't do no more interviews' because I was saying crazy s**t." The producer's addiction eventually started to impact his career, with Timbaland's ability to produce hit records waning. But having survived his near-death experience, the music star claims he now has a completely different perspective on his life and his career. Timbaland - whose real name is Tim Mosley - explained: "Through that whole thing I saw life - I saw where I would be if I don't change, and where I could be if I did. "I thought about Michael Jackson ... I didn't want to be old and taking these pills." Timbaland currently had a number of projects in the pipeline, but the producer says he's also determined to work with up-and-coming artists, too. He said: "Right now, I feel like what I can do with my legacy is to give back. "Which means finding the youth of today. Look at Quincy Jones - he was 50 when he did 'Thriller'! What's my 'Thriller?"

Ray J and Princess Love expecting their first child

he 36-year-old singer and Princess tied the knot in 2016, and during her announcement post on Instagram, Princess revealed the couple have been patiently waiting to share their pregnancy news with their fans. She posted a picture of her baby bump and captioned it: "It's

such a blessing from God to be able to carry our child. We kept this to ourselves until after the first trimester because it's bad luck to announce too early. But we're so proud to share this journey with you guys. Thank you for all of the love and prayers (sic)" Ray J also spoke of his delight during his appearance on 'The Real', revealing the couple have been trying to have a baby for some time. He explained: "Princess and I, we're expecting. I'm nervous, excited ... it finally happened. My first one. "It was special, because we was trying for awhile. It's not as easy as people think. Meghan Markle follows Grace Kelly in abandoning acting

when she marries Prince Harry, following the exam-Lple of screen icon Grace Kelly who abandoned Hollywood to marry into royalty. The 36-year-old has starred in legal drama "Suits" since 2011, but is likely to shed

many outside interests as she joins the British royal family following the couple's engagement announcement, according to observers. Markle confirmed in an interview with the BBC she would be giving up acting and would focus much of her attention on the causes that are important to her.

"I don't see it as giving anything up. I see it as a change. It's a new chapter," she said. Markle and Harry, 33, will wed in spring next year, 62 years after silver screen icon Kelly abandoned her glittering career to marry Monaco's Prince Rainier III. Hollywood branding expert

the same league as the Oscar-winning star of 1950s Hitchcock thrillers "Dial M for Murder," "Rear Window" and "To Catch a Thief." "Americans who have heard of Meghan

eghan Markle says acting will take a back seat — will remember her as a working TV actor rather than an celebrity or a Hollywood star," Sehdev, bestselling author of "The Kim Kardashian Principle," told AFP. He added that Britain's first mixed-race royal could nevertheless inspire the British TV industry to create more leading roles for actors of

color. "Meghan Markle is the face of the modern princess and there's no reason why she shouldn't keep working in TV after her marriage. The palace will likely have a say in any of her future career choices and roles.

Reform too far?

But royal writer Catriona Harve-Jenner said in a commentary for British lifestyle magazine Cosmopolitan that Markle had made the right decision in shedding her acting ambitions. "Being a senior member of the royal family is a

full-time job, and it requires those who Jeetendr Sehdev pointed out however that Markle is not in do it to patron charities, represent the UK on an international scale and generally maintain the traditions of the royal family," said Harve-Jenner. "How would she balance all that with a full-time acting role on 'Suits?"

Markle will be the first American welcomed into the royals since Wallis Simpson-famously also a divorcee-but will probably not, in fact, be a princess. What is far more likely, say experts, is that the couple become a duke and duchess, like William and Kate. As well as starring as paralegal Rachel Zane on "Suits," Markle is an entrepreneur, activist, blogger and fashion designer and would probably be expected to drop many of those pursuits too, to focus on royal activities.

The actress appears to already be winding down her workload, having shut down her lifestyle website, "The Tig," in recent months. Sarika Bose, a lecturer in Victorian literature at the University of British Columbia and a royal expert, said times had changed since Kelly was forced to choose between career and family life. But she added that having a working actress in the fold may yet be a modernizing reform too far for the British throne, which dates back to the merger of England and Scotland in the early 18th century.

'Very charismatic'

"Although British society and the monarchy have changed greatly over the last few decades, there are still possible assumptions people might impose on Ms Markle which are conflated with her acting roles, her life as a celebrity and her public role as a member of the royal family," she told AFP. Bose said she expected Markle to follow other members of the family in pursuing charitable activities.

"Well before meeting Prince Harry, Markle already demonstrated a serious interest and commitment to social justice initiatives, as a World Vision Global Ambassador and an advocate for political participation and leadership for women through the United Nations," she said. "These activities provide her with both experience and credibility as a patron of causes when she becomes a member of the royal family." The daughter of an African-American mother and white American father of Dutch and Irish descent, Markle's parents divorced when she was aged six. She has half-siblings on her father's side, and grew up in Los Angeles, attending a girls' Roman Catholic school there. After graduating from Northwestern University's School of Communication in 2003, Markle appeared on more than a dozen TV shows including "CSI: NY" "Knight Rider" and "Fringe."

She became more high-profile when she began appearing in "Suits" and secured a small role in the movie "Horrible Bosses" (2011). Clarence Moye, TV editor at Awards Daily, described Markle as a "very charismatic" actress and said he was disappointed that she appeared to be set on conforming to tradition. "It would be interesting to see a modern woman continuing her career... but it's not where she seems to be headed," he said. - AFP

S actress Meghan Markle, who is to wed Britain's Prince Harry next year, will become the latest American to marry into a royal family. Here's a brief look at five other American women who became princesses or queens:

Grace Kelly

Actress Grace Kelly was at the peak of a glittering Hollywood career when she gave it up to marry Prince Rainier III of Monaco in April 1956. Grace Patricia Kelly was born on November 12, 1929 in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, the third of four children in a wealthy Irish-Catholic family. The blonde beauty made her film debut in 1951 in "Fourteen Hours" and shot to fame the following year alongside Gary Cooper in "High Noon."

She won an Oscar nomination for Best Supporting Actress for "Mogambo" in 1953 and the Academy Award for Best Actress the following year for "The Country Girl." But Kelly is perhaps best known for her roles in three Alfred Hitchcock movies-"Dial M for Murder," "Rear Window" and "To Catch a Thief." Kelly abandoned her career entirely when she married Prince Rainier after a whirlwind courtship. They had three children: Caroline; Albert, the reigning monarch in Monaco; and Stephanie. Kelly died in September 1982 when her car ran off the road after she suffered a stroke at the wheel.

Wallis Simpson

Wallis Simpson was a twice-divorced American woman whose marriage to Britain's King Edward VIII led to him relinquishing the crown in December 1936. Bessie Wallis Warfield was born on June 19, 1896 in Blue Ridge Summit, Pennsylvania. Her father died shortly after her birth.

Warfield married a US naval aviator, Win Spencer, in 1916, divorced him in 1927 and wed a shipping executive, Ernest Simpson, the following year. She became involved with then-Prince Edward in 1934. His relationship with an American divorcee was frowned upon by Britain's royal and political class. Edward became king in January 1936 but abdicated in December that same year and married Simpson-"the woman I love"-in June 1937. Edward and Simpson were named the Duke and Duchess of Windsor. Edward died in 1972 and Simpson in 1986. They had no children.

Rita Hayworth

Actress Rita Hayworth married Prince Aly Khan-the son of the Aga Khan III, the then spiritual leader of Ismaili Muslims regarded as a direct descendent of the Prophet Mohammed-in 1949 after the breakup of her marriage to actor-director Orson Welles. Hayworth was born Margarita Carmen Cansino on October 17, 1918 in Brooklyn, New York, to show business parents. After moving to Los Angeles as a teenager, she had bit parts in several movies before adopting the screen name Rita Hayworth and going on to stardom.

Nicknamed the "Love Goddess" by Life magazine, she appeared alongside Fred Astaire in the 1941 film "You'll Never Get Rich" and a host of other hits including "Gilda," in which she performed a strip scene which was seen as scandalous at the time. In 1949, a pregnant Hayworth married Aly Khan. She gave birth to a daughter, Princess Yasmin Aga Khan, in December 1949. She divorced Aly Khan in 1953 after a tumultuous marriage and went on to marry two more times. Hayworth suffered from Alzheimer's disease in her later years and died in New York in May 1987.

Queen Noor

Jordan's Queen Noor married King Hussein in 1978, becoming the fourth and final wife of the leader of the Hashemite Kingdom. Lisa Najeeb Halaby was born on August 23, 1951 in Washington to a prominent Christian Arab-American family. Her father was the chief executive of the airline Pan American and also headed the Federal Aviation Administration. A graduate of Princeton University, Halaby married King Hussein in June 1978, converting to his Muslim faith and becoming Queen Noor Al-Hussein. They had four children. Since the king's death in 1999, Queen Noor has been active in philanthropic activities and the nuclear non-proliferation movement.

Hope Cooke

New York socialite Hope Cooke married the crown prince of the tiny Himalayan kingdom of Sikkim in 1963 in a real-life story that has been compared to the Rodgers and Hammerstein musical "The King and I." Cooke was born on June 24, 1940 in San Francisco. Her mother, a pilot, died in a plane crash when Cooke was just two years old, and she was raised by her grandparents in New York. She met Palden Thondup Namgyal, the widowed crown prince of Sikkim, during a 1959 trip to India as a college student. They fell in love and married in 1963 and she became the Gyalmo, or queen consort, when her husband took the throne in 1965 and became Chogyal, or king. Sikkim was annexed by India in 1973 and Cooke returned to the United States with their two children. She divorced her husband in 1980 and he died two years later. Cooke recounted her life in a 1981 autobiography, "Time Change." — AFP

PRINCE HARRY: THE ONCE TROUBLED PLAYBOY GROWS UP

rince Harry, whose engagement to US actress Meghan Markle was announced on Monday, has been transformed in recent years from an angry young man into one of the British royal family's greatest assets. The youngest son of Prince Charles and the late princess Diana, the 33-year-old has always struggled with his role and for much of his youth seemed to want nothing more than to escape.

He spent 10 years in the British army, serving two tours of duty in Afghanistan, but hit the headlines for his partying and his outspoken criticism of the media. The prince has rebuilt his reputation in recent years, however, through his charity work with veterans and in taking on more and more duties from his grandmother Queen Elizabeth II.

He appears to have inherited his mother's ability to connect with people, as well as her sense of mischief, and with his brother Prince William and sister-in-law Kate have helped put a fresh face on the monarchy. Harry has said that Diana is always in his mind, and has championed many of her charitable causes, including taking an HIV test live on Facebook last year to raise awareness. But he revealed that for a long time he struggled to cope with her death in a Paris car crash in 1997, and sought professional help a few years ago. In a remarkably candid interview earlier this year, the prince admitted he came "very close to a complete breakdown on numerous occasions". He turned a corner and in July 2016 met Markle, a US television actress, through mutual friends. In September this year she declared to Vanity Fair: "We're in love."

Shutting down

Harry was born in 1984, the "spare" to his brother William, who will one day inherit the throne. Both educated at the elite Eton school, their childhood was dominated by the messy breakdown of their parents' marriage and Diana's tragically early death. The image of the young princes walking behind the coffin at her funeral-Harry only 12, his brother 15, both in suits-was one of the most enduring images of that day. "I can safely say that losing my mum at the age of 12, and therefore shutting down all of my emotions for the last 20 years, has had a quite serious effect on not only my personal life but also my work as well," Harry said.

At one point, he seemed the archetypal "playboy prince", regularly photographed looking worse for wear and often accompanied by an attractive girl. He caused outrage in 2005 when photographs of him in a swastika fancy dress outfit appeared in the press. That was the year he entered the army, a conventional path for royal and one that he later admitted "was the best escape I've ever had" from the constant public attention.

In 2008, he had to be pulled out of Afghanistan after a news blackout about his deployment was breached, leading to fears he would be targeted by the Taliban. But he returned in 2012, piloting Apache helicopters during a 20week tour of duty-only to make headlines again when he said his job was to take insurgents "out of the game".

'Share the pressure'

In a series of interviews from the frontline, the prince failed to hide his contempt for the media who he has long blamed for his mother's death. The first confirmation of his relationship with Markle came in an angry statement he issued last year decrying "abuse and harassment" against her. But Harry has learned to use his public profile to promote causes close to his heart, notably a recent campaign about mental health with William and Kate.

He has also set up a sports championship for wounded military personnel, the Invictus Games, which has secured the support of high-profile figures including former US president Barack Obama. Harry still gets himself in scrapes, including telling Newsweek magazine that he did not think anyone in the royal family wanted to be monarch. He also admitted "there was a time I felt I wanted out"-but has previously said "it would be great to have someone else next to me to share the pressure". — AFP

Western interest in China's school system, and Shanghai in particular, has intensified after the city's pupils aced worldwide standardized tests in recent years. Teachers from England have been visiting to learn from Shanghai's success and the World Bank last year published a report titled, "How Shanghai does it: Insights and lessons from the highest-ranking education system in the world".

As teacher Zhang Jing watched, boys and girls wearing the school uniform of trainers, blue tracksuit bottoms, white Tshirts, and red or green scarves, work silently on math exercises. What does Zhang do if they talk? "I look at them," she replies in perfect English. That's all that is needed by way of a reprimand.

Chinese education has long had a reputation for strong discipline and conformity, but teachers at Wuning Road, whose students are aged 8-12, and at another highperforming Shanghai school say success today requires a slightly different approach. Teachers want pupils to like, not fear them, and say they encourage expression and creativity. "I'm dealing with young children and what they need from the teacher is a kind of gentleness," said Shen Yi, a maths teacher with 26 years' experience.

'Stay in line'

Shen sets her class of 34 boys and girls a statistics task and walks among their desks as they beaver away, occasionally touching them tenderly on the back of the head, addressing them as "little sister" or offering words of encouragement like, "Your graph is so pretty". Pupils sit ramrod-straight, arms folded one on top of the other, and speak only when addressed.

"We basically don't have punishments,



only encouragement," said Shen. "It makes them feel the relationship between them and their teacher is really close, like a mother or a friend, and that makes them think. The teacher loves me so I want to go to class'." Melodic music played on the school P.A. system signals class is over and the students stand in unison and belt out: "Goodbye teacher!" It's now time for the school's 1,300 children to pay their daily respects to China's flag.

They file into the playground and stand to attention for the raising of the banner before enthusiastically singing the national anthem. Next, as military-style marchingband music plays, the children perform physical exercises by heart. Barely an arm or leg is out of sync. "Stay in line, left, right, left, right," barks a woman with a microphone. "Eyes forward and swing your arms."

World leader

A staff member at another top-performing local school said discipline is instilled foremost by parents, and China's Confucian traditions mean rules are obeyed and teachers are highly respected authority figures. The World Bank's report said Shanghai's academic success is due largely to high-quality teaching. It credited rigorous pre-service training and continuous professional development of teachers once they start.

"One of the most impressive aspects of Shanghai's education system is the way it grooms, supports and manages teachers, who are central to any effort to raise the education quality in schools," it said. It also lauded Shanghai for making schools accountable for their students' performance, and for a system under which highperforming schools provide management and professional support to lower-performing ones. Shen and others say their mission is not just about academics, but also about producing "upstanding" members of Chinese society. Teachers say lessons are designed to be relevant to every-

day life, so Shen uses examples of trees and flowers instead of pure numbers in her class. Like other Chinese schools, Wuning Road teaches "ethics" and "morals". But teachers are vague on specifics and on how much time is dedicated to studying Communist Party doctrine and "Xi Jinping Thought", the president's eponymous philosophy now pushed as the national credo. The scarves around pupils' necks indicate they are on the path to perhaps one day joining the party.

The school hand-picks one boy and one girl, both aged 10 and top pupils, to answer pre-prepared questions put forward by AFP. July breathlessly rattles off wellrehearsed replies in English. She does two hours' homework straight after school and three more after dinner. There is no time for television, though she admits enjoying Disney films when homework allows. What's the worst thing about school? "There is no worst thing about my school. Everything is good." — AFP

ndia's top court yesterday rejected a legal attempt to block the global release of a Bollywood film that has sparked violent protests, warning against prejudging the controversial historical epic. Caste-based groups have been staging violent demonstrations against "Padmavati" amid rumors that it will depict a romance between a Hindu queen and a Muslim ruler.

The epic was scheduled for release in India on December 1 but delayed indefinitely after the censor board refused to certify it. The Supreme Court yesterday dismissed a legal petition to delay its release abroad, saying nobody should pre-judge the censors before the film is classified. "Responsible people in power and public office say certain things, and make comments on certain aspects, that violate the rule of law," declared the bench headed by Chief Justice Dipak Misra. "We are sure they will be guided by the basic premise under the rule of law and not venture outside."

A number of officials, including state leaders from Prime Minister Narendra Modi's ruling party, had vowed to ban screenings of the film in their jurisdictions unless controversial sections were removed. The leader of a caste-related group also offered 50 million rupees (\$769,000) to anyone who "beheaded" lead actress Deepika Padukone or director Sanjay Leela Bhansali. In January protesters belonging to the Rajput Karni Sena caste-based group attacked Bhansali and vandalised the set during filming in Jaipur in Rajasthan.

Speculation that the film will include a romantic liaison between Rajput queen Padmavati, also known as Rani Padmini, and the 13th and 14th century Muslim ruler Alauddin Khilji, had enraged activists from the historically Hindu warrior caste. Rajput Karni Sena accuse the film's makers of distorting historical facts. But some historians say the queen is a mythical character and there is no clear evidence that she even existed. Protesters attacked another set near Mumbai in March, burning costumes and other props. Lawyer ML Sharma, who brought the petition before the Supreme Court, had previously failed to prevent the film's release in India. Harish Salve, representing the film's director and producer, said there was no intention of releasing the film abroad until it had received classification at home. — AFP

to Picasso in Baghdad

Dicasso, Dali, Miro, Chagall... names that are instantly recognizable in the international art world. Now works by these masters are being exhibited in Baghdad thanks to an anonymous Iraqi collector. The exhibition at the Hiwar gallery-one of the last to remain open in the city-includes 24 Picasso lithographs. For gallery owner Qassem Sabti, "this exhibition is a historic chance" for Iraqis to feast their eyes on artworks of such a high standard, in a first for the capital.

"It is presented by an Iraqi person who prefers not to disclose his identity due to the circumstances in Baghdad," Sabti said. There are 42 works in all being shown: in addition to those by Pablo Picasso, there is work by Salvador Dali, Joan Miro and Marc Chagall. They "belong to an Iraqi who lives in the United Arab Emirates who wanted to open a museum dedicated to Picasso in Baghdad or Karbala,

where he's from," said Sabti. "But he wasn't able to do so as he couldn't secure the necessary guarantees to protect the artworks," added the gallery owner, who also heads the Iraqi Plastic Artists Society. "The works on display are very valuable and have been collected over 30 years... some date from the 1950s and 1960s." Priced at between \$15,000 (12,600 euros) and \$25,000 (21,000 euros), there is little chance of them being snapped up by local buyers.

Instead, the main aim of the show is to let them be seen by students and those who appreciate the fine arts. For painter Mohammed Shawqi, "this exhibition reflects a return to stability in the country. "Who would have dared mount a show of such valuable works just a few

years ago?" After the US-led invasion of 2003 violence that saw waves of sectarian killings and that toppled now executed dictator Saddam Hussein, Iraq descended into a lengthy period of

culminated in the Islamic State group offensive of 2014. The exhibition was a breath of fresh air for 30-year-old engineer Zinah Sulaiman, who heard about it on Facebook. It was the first time she had been able to see works by Picasso, "and I hope I will see more of this". "It's important that art be supported here, especially since we are a people of culture and history."

In related news, an "exceptional" trove of sculptures by the tragic French artist Camille Claudel has broken records at auction in Paris, going for 3.5 million euros (\$4.1 million) three times their estimate.

Prices for work by Claudel, who died in a mental hospital after a tortured love affair with fellow sculptor Auguste Rodin which has inspired several films and plays, have rocketed in recent years.

The star of the auction late Monday, a bronze called "The Abandonment", went for nearly 1.2 million euros, twice its estimate. The statue is one of a series inspired by the Indian myth "Shakuntala" about an overlooked wife from the Hindu epic "Mahabharata" from which Claudel drew parallels with her own tumultuous relationship with Rodin, who was both her lover, boss and artistic rival. It was snapped up by an "international collector", auction house Artcurial said. Interest in the "unprecedented" sale of bronze, plaster and clay works still owned by the artist's family was intense, it added. French museums also stepped in to try to stop 12 works that were sold at the auction to stop them falling into private hands or going abroad. The Musee d'Orsay, which holds the coun-

try's largest collection of Impressionist and 19th century art, now has a year to raise the 467,800 euros for a study of "Shakuntala". The piece went for nearly ten times its estimate, breaking the record for a clay work by the artist, who died in 1943 after spending 30 years in a psychiatric hospital. — AFP
