Kuwait to ensure Ethiopian maids 'psychologically' fit

New labor deal with Addis Ababa to be finalized soon



KUWAIT: Kuwait, which has lifted a ban on employing Ethiopian domestic helpers, wants jobseekers from this nation to be psychologically examined. Rashed Al-Hajeri, Kuwait's Ambassador to Ethiopia, said in a phone contact with KUNA yesterday that he held talks with Ethiopian Minister of Labor and Social Affairs Abdulfettah Abdulahi on terms for dispatching domestic workers to Kuwait.

"I have asked the Ethiopian minister to subject those willing to work in Kuwait - namely in houses - to training at habilitation centers and that they undergo psychological tests to avert the recurrence of some of the negative (incidents) that had prompted Kuwait to stop bringing in Ethiopian workers previously," Hajeri said. He added that he agreed with the Ethiopian official on working out a new deal for employment of Ethiopian citizens in Kuwait - a copy of which will be addressed to competent Kuwaiti authorities in the coming days.

A delegation from the Ethiopian ministries of labor and foreign affairs

will visit Kuwait very soon to finalize the accord. Kuwait lifted the ban on hiring Ethiopian domestic workers after a series of meetings with representatives from the Ethiopian government, the interior ministry's assistant undersecretary for citizenship and passports affairs Maj Gen

Sheikh Mazen Al-Sabah said in a statement on Tuesday. He pointed out that this is being done on compassionate grounds as well, as the holy month of Ramadan is approaching, "which invariably means more household chores for Kuwaiti families". — KUNA

20 MPs ask govt to refile bribery case

KUWAIT: In a major development, 20 opposition lawmakers vesterday signed a letter calling on the government to refile the corruption case involving 13 MPs, which led to street protests in the country six years ago. The lawmakers warned that if the government does not file the case with the public prosecution, they will use their constitutional tools against the government, which

means grilling ministers or the prime minister himself. The case involves MPs who were elected to the Assembly in 2009. It was reported that at least 13 MPs, some of them still active members, accepted cash bribes of over KD 50 million to vote in favor of certain issues. The exposure of that corruption case led to street protests against the government and demands for former prime minister HH Sheikh Nasser Al-Mohammad Al-Sabah to resign.

In one of the protests in Nov 2011, hundreds of protesters stormed the National Assembly building and the

Overcast skies to persist

Overcast skies to persist harsh jail terms. The corruption case was handled by the public prosecution in late 2011 and early 2012, but it decided to shelve the case. The letter vesterday said that the shelving was because of a lack of legislation, although the crime was established. They added now the legislative vacuum has been filled after the Assembly last month passed the conflict of interests law which deals with such cases. The letter said that such cases do not die with the passage of time and should be resubmitted to the prosecution.

Among those who signed the letter are MPs Waleed Al-Tabtabaei, Jamaan Al-Harbash and Mohammad Al-Mutair, the three MPs who were handed jail terms in the Assembly storming case. The letter stressed that the government has failed to perform its duty in fighting corruption, which has become widespread. The large number of signatories is likely to apply pressure on the government to take some action. MPs Abdulkarim Al-Kandari, Riyadh Al-Adasani and others also sternly warned against any attempts to introduce changes to the Assembly's charter to make it difficult for MPs to

Meanwhile, the Assembly yesterday approved in the first reading a law that regulates registration of commercial records and granting commercial licenses. During the debate on the law, Commerce and Industry Continued on Page 11

Rare monkeys remain at zoo as wasta brews

KUWAIT: Thirty-eight monkeys from South America that were smuggled into Kuwait around 10 days ago are currently quarantined at the zoo, amid reports that the 'importer' is trying to retrieve them surreptitiously. According to a source at the zoo, these are New World monkeys including capuchin and squirrel monkeys. These monkeys are listed as endangered animals according to CITES (Convention on International Trade in Endangered Species of Wild Fauna and Flora), so they are banned from being imported according to local and international laws.

"They will be kept in the quarantine for 21 days until we receive results of the medical tests we did to make sure they are free of any contagious diseases, especially those that can be transferred to humans. As these animals were imported illegally, they don't have any health certificates, so they could be sick," explained the source.

An anonymous source told Kuwait Times that these monkeys are kept clandestinely at the zoo so they can be quietly released by the smuggler, but the zoo source insisted this isn't possible.

Turkey, Russia, Iran urge lasting Syria ceasefire

ANKARA: The presidents of Iran, Turkey and Russia vowed to work for a lasting ceasefire after over seven years of civil war in Syria, following a summit aimed at boosting both peace prospects and also their influence in the country. Turkish President Recep Tayyip

Erdogan, Iran's Hassan Rouhani and Russia's Vladimir Putin reaffirmed their commitment to cooperating for "the achievement of a lasting ceasefire between the conflicting parties", a joint communique said.

The meeting in Ankara was the second such tripartite summit after the first hosted by Putin in November in the Black Sea city of Sochi, in a new symbol of an increasingly deep cooperation. However there was no major breakthrough announced after the summit meeting, and comments by the trio

Bahrain oil find contains 80bn barrels

MANAMA: Bahrain yesterday announced its newly discovered shale oil reserve was estimated to contain more than 80 billion barrels, making the once-marginal oil producer potentially a major player in the market. The amount of recoverable oil - or oil that can be extracted - is still under study, Oil Minister Sheikh Mohammed bin Khalifa Al-Khalifa told a press conference in Manama. The field covers 2,000 sq km in shallow waters off the kingdom's west

coast, which faces oil giant Saudi Arabia. The new field would in theory dwarf the Bahrain Field, the country's only other oil field, which contains several hundred million barrels. The actual impact of the discovery is contingent on how much of it is actually extractable. Yahya Al-Ansari, exploration manager at Bahrain's national oil company Bapco, said that the pumping of oil from the field is not expected for at least five years. Speaking to reporters after yesterday's press conference, Ansari said Bahraini authorities, in cooperation with international oil companies, were trying to establish how much oil can be extracted.

"What we have announced is oil in place ... So far, we don't know how much of

it can be extracted and the cost of its production," two important elements that could determine whether the major announcement is viable. "The US shale oil industry normally extracts 5-10 percent of the known shale oil reserves and raising this percentage depends on the advancement of technology," Ansari said. The Bahraini minister and Ansari refused to be drawn into providing details about how much production Bahrain is likely to have

Shale oil production is a costly business and is far more expensive than conventional oil. In some cases, high cost makes production commercially not possible. International consultants DeGolyer and MacNaughton, Halliburton, and Schlumberger are heading the project with Bahrain's National Oil and Gas Authority. Analyst Stephen Brennock of broker PVM Oil said the find has "the potential to be a game changer" for the tiny Gulf kingdom. "However, it is still early days and the reserves of the field have yet to be finalised. Moreover, it will be several years before these newly found supplies are brought online," Brennock told AFP.

JBC Energy, an independent research center, was equally cautious. "It remains completely unclear yet how much of the 80 billion barrels can be seen as recoverable reserves. Furthermore, apparently it is a shale oil reservoir, which would inflate production costs.

Kuwaiti media delegation visits Ur city in southern Iraq

NASIRIYAH: Dhi Qar governorate, famous for historical sites and rich natural resources, welcomes with open arms all Kuwaiti investors and tourists, said an Iraqi official yesterday. During his reception of a visiting Kuwaiti media delegation, Dhi Qar governor Yahia Al-Nasseri lauded the strong relations linking Kuwait and Iraq, affirming that what have occurred during the era of the Saddam regime should not distort the historic ties between the two countries. ation," Zohidi affirmed.





Russia, Britain trade barbs at OPCW

London suspends high-level diplomatic contact with Moscow

THE HAGUE: Russia and Britain faced off yesterday trading accusations at a tense meeting of the world's chemical weapons watchdog, as Moscow accused British and US secret services of being behind the poisoning of a Russian former double agent. London slammed as "perverse" a Russian proposal for a joint probe into the poisoning of ex-spy Sergei Skripal and his daughter Yulia with a nerve agent, dismissing it as a "diversionary tactic".

But Russian officials hit back that accusations of Moscow engineering the attack were a "grotesque provocation ... crudely concocted by the British and American security services". British authorities say the Skripals were poisoned with the Soviet-designed nerve agent Novichok in the town of Salisbury on March 4, and said it was "highly likely" Moscow was behind it. The crisis has sent the long-difficult relations between Russia and the West plummeting to new lows. Both sides have already expelled scores of diplomats.

Britain has also suspended high-level diplomatic contact with Moscow. Russian foreign intelligence chief Sergei Naryshkin warned yesterday in a speech in Moscow that both sides must avoid tensions escalating to the dangerous levels seen at the height of the Cold War. At a closed-door meeting of the Organization for

the Prohibition of Chemical Weapons (OPCW) in The Hague, convened at the request of Moscow, Russia insisted it was ready to cooperate.

Independent OPCW

"We consider this is necessary to ensure that this problem is solved within the (international) legal

framework," the Russian embassy to the Netherlands said in a Tweet. It added that it had won backing from 14 other countries on the OPCW's governing executive council and its statement was "supported by solid facts by experts in this field". But the British delegation to the OPCW said "Russia's proposal for a joint, UK/Russian investigation into the Salisbury inci-

was seeking to "evade the questions the Russian authorities must answer," it added in a tweet.'

The British defense laboratory analyzing the nerve

agent revealed Tuesday that it could not say whether the substance came from Russia. Moscow hailed that as a vindication of its repeated denials of involvement. Russia's ambassador to the Netherlands and deputy minister for industry and trade Georgy Kalamanov attended the OPCW meeting, along with British chemical weapons expert and acting permanent representa-

New Iron Curtain

Russia has accused the West of wanting to put up a new Iron Curtain and warned of a return to the mutual isolation of the Cold War. For Washington, "fighting the non-existent so-called Russian threat has become a real fixation," foreign intelligence chief Naryshkin said. "It has reached such proportions and developed such ludicrous characteristics, that it's time to talk about the return of the grim times of the Cold War." He urged the need "to stop the use of force in relations between states, not to bring matters to a new Cuban Missile

That was a reference to the 1962 standoff between the Soviet Union and the United States that brought the world to the brink of nuclear war. The Kremlin has also demanded an apology from British Prime Minister Theresa May and her government for implicating Russian President Vladimir Putin in the attack, saying this "idiocy has gone too far". —AFP

12 European hostages freed in troubled anglophone Cameroon

DOUALA: Twelve European tourists have been freed after being taken hostage in western Cameroon, where anglophone militants are campaigning for an independent state, the government said yesterday. The group of seven Swiss and five Italians "were taken hostage by a band of armed terrorists" in the Southwest Region before being rescued by troops on Monday in a "special operation," the communications ministry said in a statement.

Separately, six municipal councilors in the neighboring Northwest Region another seat of anglophone unrest-were also released in operations that saw "tens of assailants neutralized, huge stocks of weapons and ammunitions as well as large quantities of drug(s) seized," it said. Cameroon's government is fighting insurgents demanding a separate state for the two regions. They are home to most of the country's anglophones, who account for about a fifth of the predominantly Frenchspeaking population.

Legacy of colonial era

The Europeans, members of an organization called the African Adventure Group, were seized in the area of Moungo-Ndor while they were heading for a tourist site called the Twin Lakes, the ministry said. The lakes, lying in volcanic craters, have special significance in the local traditional religion, and are deemed to represent the male and female genders. The statement did not say when the group, or the municipal councilors in the Northwest Region, had gone missing.

The anglophone question in Cameroon is a legacy of the colonial period in Africa.

France and Britain divided up the former German colony under League of Nations mandates after World War I. A year after the French-ruled territory became independent in 1961, the southern part of British Cameroons was integrated into a federal system, scrapped 11 years later for a "united republic". In recent years, agitation has risen among anglophones, chafing under the perception that they suffer prejudice at the hands of the francophone majority, especially in the judicial system and education.

But demands for a return to the federal structure were rejected by the government. In a spiral of radicalization, the breakaway movement issued a symbolic declaration of independence for "Ambazonia," their name for the putative state, on October 1. Cameroon's President Paul Biya met the revolt with a crackdown, including curfews, raids and restrictions on travel. Unrest has increased in recent weeks, with attacks on security forces and civilians and a spate of kidnappings of officials, and new groups are spawning within the separatist movement.

The clashes have prompted around



33,000 people to flee to neighboring Nigeria. The latest violence comes on the heels of visits to the Northwest and Southwest regions last month by Cameroon's newly-appointed interior minister, Paul Atanga Nji, himself an anglophone. He said he brought "a message of dialogue, a responsible dialogue, a dialogue with those who know that Cameroon is one and indivisible". —AFP

Trump vows to deploy military to Mexican border

Trump accuses Mexico of profiting from illegal immigration

WASHINGTON: President Donald Trump on Tuesday vowed to deploy the military to secure America's southern border, as a caravan of Central American migrants headed north through Mexico toward the United States. The US leader has spent three days attacking the Mexican government for failing to block the estimated 1,500 people from El Salvador, Guatemala and Honduras from walking north toward the border.

"Until we can have a wall and proper security, we're going to be guarding our border with the military," Trump told journalists. In an evening statement, the White House clarified that Trump's plan involved mobilizing the National Guard-not active duty military troops, which would be barred by US law. Senior officials including Defense Secretary James Mattis, Homeland Security Secretary Kirsten Nielsen,

Attorney General Jeff Sessions, Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff General Joseph Dunford and Chief of Staff John Kelly briefed Trump last week and follow-up discussions Tuesday, it added.

"President Trump and senior officials present also agreed on the need to pressure Congress to urgently pass legislation to close legal loopholes exploited by criminal trafficking, narco-terrorist and smuggling organizations," the statement added. Trump accused Mexico of abetting and profiting from illegal immigration, which he pledged in his 2016 election campaign to halt.

Laws are weak and 'pathetic

"The caravan makes me very sad that this could happen to the United States, where you have thousands of people that just decide to walk into our country and we don't have any laws that could protect it," he said. "If it reaches our border, our laws are so weak and so pathetic... it's like we have no border," added the president-who lashed out at his predecessor Barack Obama for allegedly weakening border security, without elaborating on his claims.

He also railed against the US Congress for not tightening laws on immigrants, and against Democrats for stalling the border wall he promised to build during his campaign. Trump had previously suggested the military could help

In the past 12 years, National Guard troops have been deployed twice to bolster border security, but none have been there since 2010. Mexican Foreign Minister Luis Videgaray said he was seeking further information about the announcement. "Mexico has asked the United States,

> via official channels, to clarify the announcement by @POTUS on the use of the military on the border," Videgaray said on Twitter. "The Mexican government will decide its response based on said clarification, and always in defense of our sovereignty and national interest."

People flowing in

The Trump administration has sharply bolstered spending on patrolling the border,

and intensified crackdowns on undocumented immigrants inside the country. But the president remains frustrated that other initiatives by his administration to slow both legal and illegal immigration have been stalled or blocked. After a year's delay, Congress budgeted \$1.6 billion last month to begin construction of the wall, a small portion of the \$25 billion Trump asked.

The initial funding might only pay for 100 miles of wall, and Trump last week proposed that the Pentagon's budget be tapped to build the rest. "We need to have a wall that's about 700-800 miles," he said Tuesday. The US president's rekindled anger over immigration was apparently sparked over the weekend by media reports on the migrants heading across Mexico. Like each of the last five years, the so-called caravan set off recently from the southern Mexican state of Chiapas, partly in protest at conditions faced by migrants, and partly to help migrants safely reach the US border.

Trump says the phenomenon is proof of the need for a wall. "The caravan which is over 1,000 people coming in from Honduras thought they were just going to walk through Mexico and right through the border," Trump said. "We cannot have people flowing in our country illegally, disappearing and, by the way, never showing up to court."—AFP

Italy launches talks in fraught quest for new government

ROME: Italy launched talks vesterday aiming to break political deadlock between anti-establishment and far-right leaders and form a new government a month after a general election. Despite agreeing last week on the nomination of the speakers in parliament, the anti-migrant League and the Five Star Movement (M5S) have not budged publicly on their demands to be allowed to govern.

Last month's election yielded a stalemate: a rightwing coalition including the League and former Prime Minister Silvio Berlusconi's party won 37 percent of the vote. M5S got the biggest share of any single party with just under 33 percent. M5S leader Luigi Di Maio stepped up the rhetoric in the lead-up to President Sergio Mattarella's series of consultations, which began at 0830 GMT at the Quirinal presidential palace in Rome and were scheduled to finish on Thursday afternoon.

Di Maio said on television Tuesday that he would only deal with either the League or the centre-left Democratic Party (PD), which leads the outgoing government and suffered a collapse in the election. He said any deal with Matteo Salvini's League must exclude media magnate Berlusconi's Forza Italia, the second largest party in the right-wing coalition and a fierce rival of the M5S. "Salvini needs to choose between revolution and the restoration. Whether to leave Berlusconi and change Italy or whether to stay with him and not change anything," said Di Maio.

Tricky task

Salvini responded on Facebook that, unlike the M5S, the League "excludes any alliance with a PD rejected by the Italian public". He reiterated that the right will discuss a partnership with Di Maio "but without being subected to vetoes or impositions." In any case, both will have to make their cases to Mattarella. Mattarella was to meet the Chamber of Deputies and Senate speakers and political leaders for consultations, with the biggest parties penciled in for Thursday. After his consultations the president will decide who, if anyone, can command enough seats to form a government or whether a fresh round of consultations is necessary. —AFP

Thousands protest in Brazil

SAO PAULO: Thousands of Brazilians demonstrated in favor of prison for former president and election frontrunner Luiz Inacio Lula da Silva on the eve of a Supreme Court ruling yesterday on whether he should start serving a 12-year sentence for corruption. Up to 20,000 people turned out after work in the country's biggest city, Sao Paulo, as well as a few thousand in Rio de Janeiro and smaller numbers in other cities. The head of the army, General Eduardo Villas Boas, tweeted that the military shared Brazilians' "desire for the repudiation of impunity."

The comment, likely to be seen as backing prison for Lula, was a rare foray into politics by a general in a country that was under military dictatorship for two decades until 1985. Villas Boas also asked "who is really thinking about the good of the country and future generations and who is only worried about personal interests?" The protesters demanded that Lula begin his sentence and be barred from the October 7 presidential election in which the veteran leftist is leading in the polls, despite his legal problems.

"We want Brazil to be freed of this shameful corruption. Imprison Lula and let Brazil turn the page," said Mara Massa, 67, at the protest in Sao Paulo, where the crowd chanted "No more Lula!" Smaller demonstrations in favor of the Workers' Party founder also took place around the country. The court showdown scheduled in the capital Brasilia on Wednesday has become a focal point for Brazil's deeply divided electorate. Lula, 72, was sentenced to 12 years and one month in prison after being convicted last year of accepting a seaside apartment as a bribe from a huge construction company seeking government contracts. He appealed in a lower court, but lost. Under current law, that means he should go immediately to prison, while pressing further appeals. However, Lula

Fake Indian website offering girls for 'every taste' stirs up a storm

StayUncle enables unmarried couples to book into hotels

MUMBAI: A fake website offering girls to cater to "every taste and pocket" clocked up more than 1,000 subscribers on its first day, highlighting the challenge of tackling sex trafficking in India. StayUncle, a website that enables unmarried couples to book into hotels without hassle in conservative India, launched the spoof site staylaid.com - after tiring of requests from clients to procure a sex worker as well.

"We get nearly 3,000 calls every month from people

asking for a partner along with a room. It was important to initiate this conversation," Sanchit Sethi, founder of StavUncle, told the Thomson Reuters Foundation. "We wanted people to see how real the problem of trafficking is ... how victims are affected. In our understanding, there was no better way than creating a fake website. It is only through technology that

vou can reach the masses." Hotels and home rental services such as Airbnb have launched measures to tackle trafficking as concerns mount over their properties being used to exploit vulnerable women and girls.

More than 8,000 cases of human trafficking were reported in India in 2016, up 20 percent on the previous vear, government data shows. The website listed about a dozen girls and their physical attributes, adding that some had joined voluntarily while others were "procured

from remote areas of India such as Assam and West Bengal by trusted brokers and promised big dreams". "Getting laid could never be easier," it promised. Subscribers then received an email explaining that thousands of women are forced into sex slavery in India, calling for greater awareness to bring about change.

Many poor victims from rural areas are lured by traffickers with promises of good jobs, only to find themselves sold to brothels, forced to work in fields or brick

kilns or enslaved in homes as domestic workers. Staylaid.com's offer of girls "suited for every taste, every demand and every pocket" provoked strong reactions on social media, with #StopWomenTrafficking trending on Twitter until late Tuesday night. "It was surprising that people started talking about it on Twitter but the fact is that people wanted to use it," said 29-

Launched in 2015, StayUncle helps "privacy-starved lovers" find accommodation in about 900 partner hotels across India, where premarital sex is frowned upon. Hasina Kharbhih, founder of anti-trafficking charity, Impulse NGO Network, called on StayUncle to work more closely with established campaigners. "Their idea might be good, but there was much confusion in the anti-trafficking sector last night on whether this was real," she said. —Reuters

'Vatican deal' - a new trial for one Catholic village in north China

YOUTONG VILLAGE: Choosing a church can be complicated in China under the rule of the officially atheist Communist Party - especially in Youtong village, where roughly half the 5,000 residents are Catholics. Within a mile radius, the village in northern China's Hebei province hosts a Catholic church sanctioned by Chinese authorities, two large "underground" churches, and numerous smaller unofficial house churches, according to villagers. Youtong provides a snapshot of the muddled and delicate situation for China's estimated 12 million Catholics, with allegiances split between government-sanctioned churches and the underground ones endorsed by the Vatican, amid expectations that a historic accord will soon be struck between Rome and Beijing. The underground churches are generally tolerated but closely monitored by the authorities. House churches tend to be ignored so long as gatherings are small. When Reuters visited Youtong on Good Friday, displays of faith were ubiquitous. Villagers poured into the streets to attend afternoon mass at the official church, whose spire is topped with a large cross that glints in the sunlight high above nearby buildings. Bright red banners with religious slogans, including the Chinese characters for "Emmanuel", meaning God is with us, or simply "We have faith in you, Jesus" adorn the gates of many homes.

While some Catholics in Youtong told Reuters that a long-awaited agreement could bring clarity and freedom to practice their religion openly, others said they worry the deal will sow further discord in the community. Dong Guanhua, an outspoken priest who sparked controversy in 2016 when he claimed at his underground church that he had been appointed a bishop in a secret ceremony eleven years before, said the deal would push more people to unofficial churches like his. The Vatican has said that it has not authorized Dong's ordination and, if it occurred, it was a breach of church law. "The word 'compromise' sounds good but to some churchgoers it will sound like you are abandoning your faith," he said. "People say I am trying to break away, but in fact I am sticking to the old road, while the Vatican's policy changes." The expected deal would allow China to appoint bishops, in consultation with the Vatican, and could lead to the restoration of full diplomatic ties for the first time in seven decades.

On Thursday, the Vatican said an accord on appointing bishops was not imminent but talks were continuing. While relations among the rival churches are cordial, some villagers warned that local schisms could arise from renewed attempts to push together the state-sanctioned Chinese Catholic Patriotic Association, which claims independence from the Vatican, and underground churches loyal to Pope Francis. "Father Dong does not listen to anyone. He has made some people angry. But lots of people like his style, because he tells it like it is," said a man in his forties who would only give his surname, Pei, a common name in

Suspicion and pressure

The large tin-roofed underground church of Pei Ronggui, 84, a retired bishop recognized by Rome, has long been the most popular for village Catholics whose loyalty to the Vatican makes them suspicious of the official church, villagers said. Exact numbers were not available, but villagers suggested that the congregations of the official church and Pei's were roughly similar, while Dong attracted slightly fewer.

In December 2016, Pei said that Beijing would have to change its attitude towards the Vatican before any deal could work. But Pei, who spent four years in a labor camp after the government raided his church in 1989, appeared to be under pressure from authorities when Reuters recently visited him at home. Pei, who still gives mass and takes confession, was accompanied by a heavyset man, who declined to identify himself, wearing a belt with a police emblem buckle. The man said Pei could not hear well enough to do an interview, ushering him away. —Reuters

Mob burns homes as caste violence rages

NEW DELHI: Hundreds of Indian security forces enforced a curfew on a tense district yesterday after a mob set fire to the homes of two political figures from the country's low-caste Dalit community. Amid heightened communal tensions over caste rights, some 5,000 people angered by earlier Dalit protests torched the houses Tuesday of a state legislator and former lawmaker in the Karauli district of the popular tourist state of Rajasthan.

Neither was at home at the time, the district's top administrative official told AFP. "We have made some arrests following the arson and violence. A curfew is in place and we have also deployed 600-700 extra security personnel," said Abhimanyu Kumar. The incident followed violent nationwide protests by tens of thousands of Dalits on Monday which left at least nine dead. Once dismissed as "untouchables", Dalits make up 200 million of India's 1.25 billion population and are at the bottom of the caste hierarchy. They have been enraged at a Supreme Court ruling that they say weakens a law intended to protect lower caste communities.

The Court last month banned the automatic arrest of people accused of attacking or harassing Dalits and other marginalized groups. 'Blasphemous poem': Islamic groups report Indonesian politician

JAKARTA: Hardline Islamic groups yesterday filed a blasphemy complaint against a daughter of Indonesia's first president, accusing her of reciting a poem insulting Islam and prompting fresh concerns over intolerance in the world's most populous Muslim-majority country. Sukmawati Sukarnoputri, a politician, is the third daughter of Indonesia's founding father Sukarno and the younger sister of Megawati Sukarnoputri, who leads President Joko Widodo's ruling party.

Indonesia is a secular country with significant Christian, Hindu, Buddhist and other religious minorities, but a rise of hardline, politicized Islam and stricter interpretations of the religion have undermined its reputation for tolerance in recent years. The Islamic Defenders Front (FPI) was among an alliance of hardline groups that reported Sukmawati, as she is usually known, to police over the poem. The same alliance last year accused Jakarta's former Christian gover-

Southeast Asians unite as beef over 'chicken rendang' rages on

KUALA LUMPUR: Southeast Asians have united to defend hugely popular "chicken rendang" that was knocked out of a British cooking competition television show for not being crispy enough, but the longstanding debate on the origins of the dish rages on. Malaysian-born chef Zaleha Kadir Olpin cooked nasi lemak, a beloved traditional Malaysian dish, served with chicken rendang in the quarter-final of the BBC show "MasterChef UK", in which contestants were asked to prepare a meal that was important to them.

Judges John Torode and Gregg Wallace turned down the chicken accompaniment saying the skin nor of blasphemy and spearheaded mass rallies that led to his ouster and jailing, a ruling that many believed was politi-

"It's clear there is an insult toward the teachings of Islam in the poem," said Eggi Sudjana, a lawyer and an adviser to the alliance. "We hoped that Ahok's case would be the last one, but now there are others who dare to insult Islam again," he said, referring to the ex-Jakarta governor Basuki Tjahaja Purnama by his nickname. Sukmawati apologized for reading the poem, which appeared to favor traditional Indonesian culture and beliefs over conservative Islamic customs like the full veil, in public.

"The poem is a reflection of my concern about the sense of nationalism...and to honor our motherland's rich cultural traditions and diversity," a tearful Sukmawati told a news conference in Jakarta yesterday. "I apologize to Islamic people in Indonesia, especially to those who feel offended by the poem," said Sukmawati, whose family remains highly influential in Indonesia. FPI's Novel Bamukmin said the alliance appreciated the apology but would not withdraw its complaint. "There will be no mercy for those who blaspheme," he said. Rights activists feared the controversy was a sign that religious tolerance and freedom of expression are being eroded in the world's third-largest democracy.

"It's creating an atmosphere of fear," said Andreas Harsono of Human Rights Watch. "People never know

Suspects can be jailed for up to five years under the blasphemy laws, which have been criticized by rights groups as draconian and vulnerable to abuse. Regional ehailing service Grab offered promotions, asking users to tweet #RendangIsNeverCrispy. However, the jury is still out on which country owns the dish with neighbouring Indonesia already claiming it. Some suggest the first version of rendang was in Padang, West Sumatra, Indonesia, some 600 years ago. Torode riled Malaysians by suggesting on Twitter that chicken rendang was from Indonesia, and ending his tweet with "namaste", an Indian greeting.

"I don't know what's wrong with these Malaysians keep saying Rendang theirs, it's like the Koreans claiming Japanese ramen," said one post on Twitter. Many other Indonesians were quick to agree. Haikal from Alma said there were different versions of the dish. —Reuters

wasn't crispy, stirring fury on social media and a viral debate in Malaysia, Indonesia, Singapore and Brunei where the spicy dish is widely loved. "Chicken rendang should be made authentic. And it is just stupid for it to be crispy," said KF Seetoh, founder of Makansutra and an Asian street food expert based in Singapore. "Saying chicken rendang should be crispy is like saying that hamburgers should be boiled."

Rendang is traditionally made with chicken or beef that is slow cooked with Asian herbs and coconut milk. "Chicken rendang is a dish that many of us grew up with. And to have a angmoh (caucasian) tell us how the dish should be like is a smack on our face," said Haikal.

which was the last major rebel enclave on the outskirts of Damascus, in a ferocious assault that began in February, marking a major victory for President Bashar al-Assad.

They were now negotiating with the armed group inside Douma, the

last remaining area under armed opposition control, adviser Jan Egeland said, adding that the United Nations was playing no direct role. "We hope that that agreement will lead to people being able to stay if they choose to, to get amnesty for those who put away their arms but also to an opportunity to leave for those who choose to leave Douma," he told a news briefing.

Out of the nearly 400,000 people besieged in eastern Ghouta for years by Syrian government forces, 130,000 had fled in the last three weeks, Egeland said. Evacuations should be voluntary but in some cases might not have been, he added. "The deals might have shortened the battle and that is a good thing. The worst possible thing would have been fighting street-by-street, like in Raqqa, until the very, very bitter end," he

said, referring to the northern city where Islamic State was defeated last year by USbacked forces. The evacuees included 80,000 people now in centers in government-controlled areas, where Egeland said conditions were terrible. Some 50,000 fled to opposi-

biggest cluster of displacement camps in the world" with around 1.5 million people. "We need to learn from the battles of Homs, Aleppo, Raqqa, Deir al-Zor, and eastern Ghouta. Idlib cannot become a battle zone, it's full of

Broken by siege, Syria rebels face worst loss yet in Ghouta

BEIRUT: The expected loss of Eastern Ghouta will deal Syria's fragmented rebels their biggest blow yet, leaving them unable to threaten President Bashar al-Assad in Damascus and increasingly subservient to competing global interests. Just weeks after their ill-fated uprising turned seven years old, Syrian opposition fighters have found themselves bussed out of their onetime bastion on the capital's outskirts. They had overrun the suburb in 2012, setting up independent power structures that served around 400,000 residents and granted them a thriving popular base.

The three main factions-Jaish al-Islam. Faylaq al-Rahman, and Ahrar al-Shamcontinually pledged to march on Damascus and rained rockets down on its residential neighborhoods. Weakened by a slow and painful half-decade siege, rebels could hardly hold out under weeks of bombing that culminated in negotiated withdrawals, a strategy polished by Syria's regime elsewhere. "What happened is an absolutely huge loss strategically, militarily, and politically for the rebels. However you look at it, it's a total loss," says Nawar Oliver, an analyst at the Omran Institute.

"Just having a presence at the gates of the capital, near foreign embassies, was enough for rebels to impose themselves as essential players." Even during Ghouta's dying days, its rebels maintained their deadly ability to lob mortar bombs and rockets on the capital, killing dozens. It had granted them leverage for years, Oliver said. "The regime had to talk to them, had to release prisoners, because they held the gates of the capital," he said. "Now, they're nothing."

Nowhere is safe

After the crumbling last year of the Islamist State (IS) jihadist group's "caliphate" in Syria and neighboring Iraq, Assad's troops have shifted their focus

in control of 55 percent of the war-ravaged country. Swathes of the north and northeast are held by Kurdish militia and IS still holds small pockets in the country's centre and east. The conventional armed opposition still holds most of the southern province of Daraa, a few towns in central Syria, and part of Aleppo province in the north.

They are also present in northwest Idlib, but their influence has been shrinking as Islamist and jihadist groups tighten their grip on the province. Just like Ghouta, those areas have been designated as "deescalation zones" meant to pave the way for a nationwide ceasefire. But after Ghouta, nowhere is safe, Nawar said. "This is the essential thing the opposition knows now: nowhere is an exception," he said.

The evacuation deals that appear to have sealed Ghouta's fate were preceded by years of similar withdrawals, most infamously in December 2016 from second city Aleppo. After a bombing blitz, tens of thousands of rebels and civilians were bussed out of their stronghold in the city's east in what was, at the time, their most devastating defeat. "The fall of Aleppo was the beginning of the end, but Ghouta is more symbolic," said Thomas Pierret, a researcher at the University of Edinburgh.

At the time, mainstream rebels held more territory in Idlib, Homs, and around Damascus-and they still had Ghouta. "At a rather symbolic level, there was this idea that we still have something. (Ghouta) was a meaningful challenge to the regime," said Pierret.

Biggest loss

Now, rebels across the country face three options, Pierret said. They could reconcile with the regime and join loyalist forces, or could throw their lot in with the opposition's main remaining backer-Turkey. "The only alternative is the jihadi option. The jihadists would be the only group left fighting the regime and not directly under the control of another state," said Pierret. Syria's conflict has drawn in a host of international players-including rebel backer Turkey, regime allies Russia and

Iran, and the US-led coalition fighting IS. The "Syrian National Army"-the Turkey-backed force tied to the political opposition-said Ghouta's rebels were welcome to join its ranks. "Developments in Ghouta and elsewhere make us more insistent on maintaining and organizing the SNA," said its spokesman Mohammad

Russia short of foreign policy options if bet on Trump fails

Russia long saw Donald Trump as the wild card in its strategy to improve relations with the United States. But 14 months after he became US president, Moscow is close to viewing him as a busted flush, unable to enact his pledge for better ties. Trump reluctantly signed off on new sanctions against Moscow last summer over allegations of Russian meddling in the 2016 US presidential election. Last week he backed the expulsion of 60 Russian diplomats and the closure of Russia's Seattle consulate over the poisoning of an ex-Russian agent in Britain.

After betting the farm on Trump, Russia has seen relations with the West sink so low that there is talk of a new Cold War. President Vladimir Putin's options for a change of strategy, banking less on Trump and his ability to sway those around him on Russia, is severely limited as he prepares for a new term. One option being explored is to try to widen splits in the West by courting France and Germany. Another is to draw closer to China and India. But the relationship with Washington is still seen in Moscow as central to Russian foreign policy. "Washington has become fixated with the fight against a non-existent, so-called Russian threat," Sergei Naryshkin, Russia's foreign intelligence agency chief, said yesterday. "This has reached such proportions and acquired such absurd characteristics that it's possible to speak of a return to the dark times of the Cold War." Russian Foreign Minister Sergei Lavrov said earlier this week that the standoff was worse than during the Cold War between East and West after World War Two. "... Then some kind of rules and appearances were kept up. Now, as I see it, our Western partners ... have cast aside all proprieties," Lavrov said.

The Cold War saw the Soviet Union square off against the United States, with the threat of nuclear war hanging over the world until the collapse of the Soviet Union in 1991. But the standoff was kept under control by arms treaties, superpower summits and both proscribed and informal rules of engagement. The new standoff, raw and unpredictable, has been likened to a "fight without rules" by Konstantin Kosachev, head of the upper house of Russian parliament's foreign affairs committee. The risk of miscommunication, miscalculation and sudden escalation into a hot war is higher than during the original Cold War, he says.

Arch hawks

Trump's appointment of Mike Pompeo and John Bolton, whom Moscow regards as arch Russia hawks, to key foreign policy posts last month has further soured the mood in Moscow, say analysts and people close to Russian decision makers. When it comes to the United States, these sources say Moscow is not willing to change course, make concessions or launch new initiatives. Russia will therefore continue to engage only if and when the United States is ready to do so, and, if faced with more hostile action - such as further diplomatic expulsions - will respond in kind, the people close to decision makers say."All we can do is keep the doors open for negotiation and wait and see what will happen. That's the predominant view," said Andrey Kortunov, head of a thinktank close to the Russian Foreign Ministry. In particular, Moscow is keeping the door open to a possible summit between Trump and Putin, an idea floated by Trump, and is also keen for US-Russia talks on strategic nuclear stability to avoid a costly arms race. But its baseline scenario is a downward spiral in ties. "Washington is the standard bearer of a new Cold War," Fyodor Lukyanov, a foreign policy expert close to the Kremlin, wrote in government daily Rossiyskaya Gazeta after last week's US diplomatic expulsions. "There's no point in hoping for an improvement in ties or any progress in any area for the foreseeable future," said Lukyanov, who has warned the Russian elite to brace for sweeping Iran-style financial sanctions.

Eastwards, Franco-German pivot


While better ties with the United States are seen as a remote possibility, improved relations with France and Germany are seen as "more interesting opportunities for political investment," said Kortunov. Kremlin spokesman Dmitry Peskov praised France's "constructive position" after Paris confirmed French President Emmanuel Macron would still visit Russia in May despite tensions. Alexei Pushkov, a senator specialising in foreign policy, has lauded German Chancellor Angela Merkel's decision to back Russia's proposed Nord Stream 2 gas pipeline.

The planned pipeline will connect Germany and Russia, despite concerns from other EU nations who fear it will harm the bloc's energy security. Lukyanov said Moscow should look to beef up ties with Beijing and Delhi as they had "freedom to maneuver" on the world stage and were not vulnerable to Western pressure on Russia. Moscow believes the only wild card it has with Washington is Trump who, in Russian eyes, appears to have been playing a game of good cop bad cop, offering Russia a glimmer of hope, while Congress and his administration read Russia the riot act.

Russia casts Trump as a hostage of the US political establishment who it accuses of reducing his room for manoeuvre by boxing him in with the special investigation into his associates' possible collusion with Moscow and what Russia says are false allegations it meddled in US politics. Its disappointment with Trump has unfolded in stages. Trump's decision to launch a missile strike against a Syrian air base, drop a large bomb in Afghanistan in an attack on Islamic militants and stick with Obama-era policies over Russia's annexation of the Crimea region from Ukraine, and, until recently, his tough talk on North Korea, went down badly in Moscow.—Reuters






Hit to Boeing depends on definitions

hina yesterday announced plans to place a 25 percent tariff on certain US aircraft, in a move expected to affect some older Boeing Co narrowbody models, according to documents from China's Ministry of Commerce and the US manufacturer. But it was not immediately clear how far they would affect Boeing's upgraded 737 MAX family, a key source of future Boeing profits, because of a lack of detail in the announcement and the fact that not all airplane characteristics are published.

Boeing shares fell as much as 6 percent in early trading after China hit back at US tariffs with the announcement of duties on key US imports including soybeans, cars, beef and chemicals, as well as planes. These include aircraft with an "empty weight" of between 15,000 kilograms and 45,000 kilograms, or 15 to 45 tonnes. Depending on how "empty weight" is defined, this places a question mark over the fate of Boeing's new big-selling 737 MAX 8 jet - though the larger MAX 9 and MAX 10 could be spared.

The stakes are high. The United States exported \$15 billion of aircraft to China in 2016, ranking it equally with agricultural products like soybeans also targeted for tariffs as the biggest category of goods, according US trade data. Several definitions of "empty weight" are used in the aircraft industry and the ministry document did not contain any footnotes or further explanation. Industry experts said the rules most likely refer to the "manufacturers' empty weight," or the core aircraft structure.

rers' empty weight," or the core aircraft structure. But manufacturers are usually shy about publishing this number because of its commercial sensitivity, while they do give estimates for the slightly higher "operating empty weight," which includes crew and some fluids and equipment, but not fuel. Yet even this number can vary according to an airline's specific requirements, so it is seen as a guideline only. Whatever category is used, the range appears comfortably to include the current-generation 737 narrowbody aircraft, which is in the midst of being replaced by the newer 737 MAX.



737 Max 8 fate unclear

Boeing documents available online list the "operating empty weight" of the 737-700, 737-800 and 737-900 well within the tariff zone at 37.6 to 42.9 tonnes. The "manufacturer's empty weight" would typically be about 1 to 1.5 tonnes lower than this, a plane appraisal expert said.

In contrast, the newer 737 MAX 8 is heavier than its predecessor, with an operating empty weight of 45,070 kilograms, according to a Boeing airport document published in August 2017.

Depending on how the rules are applied, this leaves it on the edge between the tariff zone and escaping the trade spat. But the larger 737 MAX 9 and MAX 10 could both be spared. A Beijing spokesman for Boeing declined to comment when asked about the impact of the tariffs. Chinese airlines have been on a buying spree from Boeing and rival Airbus SE as air travel grows. Boeing and China's Commercial Aircraft Corp of China (COMAC) are expected to open a 737 completion centre in the coastal city of Zhoushan to install interiors and paint liveries this year.

The bulk of published 737 orders from Chinese that have not yet been delivered are for the newer MAX version. However, China Southern Airlines, Ruili Airlines and Okay Airways each have two 737-800s on order and Xiamen Airlines has four more, according to the Boeing order book. It remains unclear whether the trade dispute between the US and China could affect future jet purchases. Asked if the airline's plane buying plans could shift away from Boeing, China Eastern Airlines Corp CEO Ma Xulun said yesterday "it's too early to say, we will keep an eye on the situation of the China-US trade war".

Apart from some Boeing jets, the Gulfstream G650, a large corporate jet manufactured by General Dynamics Corp, also appears within the weight range targeted by the tariffs. Gulfstream did not respond immediately to a request for comment.—Reuters

Coffee conquers conflict for business-savvy Filipino farmers

ve years ago, Filipina farmer Marivic Dubria would buy Nescafe sachets to serve visitors because she was embarrassed by the quality of the coffee she grew next to her main vegetable crops. Life was tough for her family in Mindanao, the second largest island in the Philippines, as they struggled to earn \$1,000 a year from their produce, with their coffee beans fetching only 20 cents per kilo from local traders. But Dubria is now one of hundreds of farmers nationwide who are brewing up a storm with training from Coffee For Peace (CfP) - a social enterprise striving to boost growers' profits, protect the environment and foster peace between communities.

Having learned how to grow, harvest and process high-quality Arabica beans at a time when global demand for coffee is soaring - it is set to hit a record high this year - Dubria exports her crop to buyers as far away as Seattle for at least \$5 per kilo. "But it's not all about the money - it's about taking responsibility for the environment and other communities," Dubria told the Thomson Reuters Foundation in her home on Mount Apo while brewing a pot of thick, aromatic, treacle-like coffee.

Beyond helping coffee growers get a better deal, CfP aims to encourage dialogue between communities, with tensions ranging from colonial-era conflict between native Muslims and Christian settlers to land and resource disputes between ethnic groups. The Philippines is battling to restore order to troubled Mindanao, where militant groups have pledged allegiance to Islamic State, and five decades of communist insurgency and separatist bombings have displaced at least 2 million people.

By bringing people together through

trade, businesses with a social mission can help build peace, industry experts say. "Social enterprise presents an emerging pathway or approach to conflict resolution," said Angel Flores, East Asia business head at the British Council, which backs companies seeking to help people, invest in the environment and tackle social ills. "Being inclusive, participatory and prioritizing community benefit over personal agendas enhances the social fabric from a place of distrust to ... confidence and mutual understanding."

'Farmerpreneurs'

CfP was set up in 2008 on the conflict-hit southern island of Mindanao, after its founders stopped Christian and Muslim neighbors going to war over the ownership of a rice field. The men were invited to put down their guns and talk over coffee, a tradition which quickly spread across the region. CfP offers a three-year scheme to train farmers to produce coffee while encouraging native and settler communities and various tribes to harvest and process the beans together.

process the beans together.

While the social enterprise buys the farmers' beans above market value - selling them on to local coffee shops and exporting as far as Canada - communities can sell to any buyer, but are encouraged to demand higher prices. "We don't treat them as suppliers or just part of the chain - they are farmerpreneurs," said CfP senior vice president Twinkle Bautista. "The aim is to unite the settlers and indigenous people to teach each other, share techniques and tools ... and harmony," she added. "Our product is peace - coffee is just the tool."

For Kagawad Abe and his indigenous community, setting up a processing center through CfP has brought them closer to the Christian settlers - who work with them to process their beans. "It has also brought women together, and given them a chance to work independently ... to contribute to the tribe," he said. About 80 percent of CfP's coffee-growing partners are women. "Just five or so years ago, we didn't really know each other - but now we are talking and working together," Abe added.

CfP says business is booming, having tripled sales to at least \$46,000 last year from \$15,000 in 2012 and won United Nations and regional awards for promoting peace and development. Although social enterprises in the Philippines have more than tripled in the last decade to 165,000, many are struggling due to limited state support and a lack of funding, said the British Council and the Philippines Social Enterprise Network.

CfP's success is likely largely due to its unusual mission, said Gerry Higgins, chief executive of Community Enterprise in Scotland (CEIS), Britain's largest agency to support the sector. "Coffee for Peace is unusual ... there aren't many social enterprises that recognise that if a community is resilient and sustainable, (then) fewer conflicts will emerge," Higgins said.

Conquerors of coffee

By walking farmers through every step of the supply chain, CfP says they no longer see the coffee industry as "a mystery". Once dependent on traders and big brands such as Nestle, the world's biggest coffee maker and producer of Nescafe, farmers can now

demand higher prices for better quality beans, CfP said. Yet winning communities over remains a major challenge. Some are proud of their traditional methods and reluctant to embrace change, while others are wary of civil society groups and used to instant cash or aid, rather than long-term support.

"We had to convince and convince our people, many times, to move from the traditional to the technical way of doing things," said Baby Jerlina Owok, chieftain of a native tribe which has seen their coffee beans almost double in value in recent years. Yet for women such as Owok and Dubria and their coffee cooperatives, the ambitions are much bigger than making money. Pointing at huge swathes of coffee trees covering the hills, painting once barren land vibrant shades of green, Dubria spoke about planting more to combat deforestation and soil erosion.

Lastly, she said they need to share their prosperity. "We need to encourage and help other communities to produce quality coffee," she said. "We want to pull them up - to improve their standard of living - so they can experience what we have." —Reuters

SAN BRUNO, California: An Iranian-born woman who blogged about veganism had railed online about dictatorship and accused YouTube of limiting viewers of her videos before opening fire at its California corporate headquarters, wounding three people and killing herself. San Bruno police yesterday were investigating why Nasim Najafi Aghdam, 39,

"BE AWARE! Dictatorships exist in all countries. But with different tactics. They care only for short term profits," she wrote on a website called NasimeSabz.com, which translates as "Green Breeze" from Persian. "I am being discriminated. I am being filtered on YouTube. I am not the only one," Aghdam said in an English language video on YouTube before her channel was deleted on Tuesday.

San Bruno police said yesterday her motive appeared to be related to her anger over YouTube policies, and that there were no other suspects in the case. "Currently, there is no evidence linking Aghdam to any individuals at the scene of this incident," said police chief Ed Barberini. Barberini said they had recovered a handgun registered to Aghdam, and that she had gone to a local gun range on Tuesday before driving to YouTube, where she entered the building via the parking garage.

A man was in critical condition and two women were seriously wounded in the attack at an outdoor patio at YouTube's Silicon Valley headquarters, which employ about 2,000 people. Police said Aghdam seemed to have chosen victims at random. The shooting came in the midst of a par-

ticularly intense phase of the United States' long-running debate on gun rights, following the killing of 17 students and educators at a Florida high school in February. While mass shootings have become a regular occurrence in the United States, they are rarely carried out by women.

Writing in Persian on her Instagram account, Aghdam said she was born in the Iranian city of Urmiah and that she was not planning to return to Iran. "I think I am doing a great job," she wrote. "I have never fallen in love and have never got married. I have no physical and psychological diseases. But I live on a planet that is full of injustice and diseases."

Californian media reported that Aghdam's family had warned authorities that she could target YouTube prior to the shooting. The San Jose Mercury News quoted her father,

Ismail Aghdam, as saying he had told police that she might go to YouTube's headquarters because she "hated" the company. Efforts to reach her relatives by phone were unsuccessful. Her family in Southern California recently reported her missing because she had not been answering her phone for two days, police said. At one point Tuesday, Mountain View, California, police found her sleeping in her car and called her family to say everything was under control, hours before she walked onto the company grounds and opened fire.

A survivor of the February shooting at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School in the Parkland, Florida, weighed in on the YouTube incident yesterday. "The YouTube HQ shooting is proof that this is

NOT just schools," Jaclyn Corin said on Twitter yesterday. "Our country has a GUN problem. End of story." Gun rights advocates have argued that more armed guards and citizens could prevent mass shootings.

YouTube has long faced complaints about alleged censorship on its site, and says it attempts to balance its mission of fostering free speech while still providing an appropriate and lawful environment for users. In some cases involving videos with sensitive content, YouTube has allowed the videos to stay online but cut off the ability for their publishers to share in advertising revenue. Criticisms from video makers that YouTube is too restrictive about which users can participate in revenue sharing swelled last year as the company imposed new restrictions. — Agencies

indicated possible tensions in what analysts see as a potentially brittle alliance. The three powers have backed peace talks in the Kazakh capital Astana, which they argue are a parallel process to UN-supported discussions in Geneva.

Erdogan insisted their meetings and the Astana talks were not an "alternative" to the Geneva process to find peace in Syria, at a post-summit press conference. But the three presidents said that so far, "the Astana format had been the only effective international initiative that had helped reduce violence across Syria and had contributed to peace and stability".

Experts say that Ankara, Moscow and Tehran are looking to take advantage of the waning Western influence in Syria and reluctance to commit militarily. Hours before the summit, US President Donald Trump said he wanted to "bring our troops back home" from Syria after indicating last week the US would withdraw from the country "very soon". But Rouhani hit back, complaining that the "Americans say something different every day".

Unlike the West, the three countries have deployed significant military resources in Syria, with Tehran having a strong ground presence and Moscow ruling the skies. Turkey meanwhile drove out Kurdish militia from Afrin city on March 18, two months after it launched an offensive in northern Syria supporting Syrian rebels. Ankara has indicated Turkey could extend its operation to the Kurdish-held town of Manbij and further east, as well as the northern Syrian town of Tal Rifaat. "We are ready to work together with our Iranian and Russian friends to make Tal Rifaat region livable for our Syrian

brothers and sisters," Erdogan said.

So far the three powers - whose imperial predecessor states spent much of the last centuries at war - have managed to keep a lid on their differences on Syria. While Moscow and Tehran support the regime of Syrian President Bashar Al-Assad politically and militarily, Turkey has repeatedly called for his removal and supported Syrian opposition fighters. But experts say disputes between Moscow and Ankara could come to the fore when the regime turns its attention to Idlib province. Idlib's civilian infrastructure is largely controlled by the jihadist alliance Hayat Tahrir al-Sham (HTS), led by Syria's former Al-Qaeda affiliate.

Turkey is keen to prevent a Russia-backed regime assault on the province home to around 2.5 million people. But Moscow wants Ankara to also exert influence over the militants in control of Idlib. Tensions may also be emerging behind the scene between Russia and Iran, with Moscow much more concerned to press for reform under Assad than Tehran.

Meanwhile, according to the Iranian presidency, Rouhani said in the closed-door session that the Afrin area taken by Turkey and its allied forces should be handed over to the Syrian regime's army. He argued that the Syrian army "is still the symbol of this country's national sovereignty". Turkey's reaction was not made public. Erdogan also expressed alarm over the situation in Eastern Ghouta near Damascus, which has come under heavy regime bombardment over the last weeks, creating a major humanitarian crisis.

Syrian state news agency SANA said evacuations from the former rebel bastion's main town of Douma of Jaish al-Islam fighters and family members were ongoing for a third day. Erdogan said that the bloodshed in Ghouta had been "ruthless" but avoided any direct criticism of Russia and Putin as the backers of the Syrian regime. More than 350,000 people have been killed since the war began following anti-government protests in 2011, while millions have been internally displaced or forced to flee. — AFP







Tokyo 2020 Olympics 'back on track' after rocky start

Tokyo making 'steady progress' towards hosting the games

TOKYO: On a nondescript patch of land east of Tokyo, cranes are whirring frantically against a city skyscraper backdrop as 200 workers toil on the 2020 Olympic canoe venue. With the Pyeongchang winter games closed, Tokyo is stepping up preparations for the next event on the Olympic calendar, with busy building sites dotted around the Japanese capital.

Unlike in previous Olympic host countries, where there was a scramble to finish venues on time, Japan appears to be living up to its reputation for efficiency, with foreman after foreman telling AFP on a recent tour of sites: "We are on schedule." The Aquatics Centre in Tokyo Bay is a hive of activity with workers scurrying around the huge site, pushing to finish a venue that will eventually welcome 24,000 cheering supporters.

"Roughly 25 percent of the work is already done," said Daishuu Tone, director of venues for the Tokyo Metropolitan Government. "We are confident we will be on time," he added, with the first test events scheduled for mid-2019.

The city's governor Yuriko Koike told AFP in an interview that Tokyo was making "steady progress" towards hosting the games, the second in its history after 1964. "We hope to make it a wonderful Games," she said during an interview in an imposing 48-floor office looming over the Tokyo skyline. And Tokyo 2020 chief executive officer

Toshiro Muto is also bullish, telling reporters: "Everything is going very smoothly and I can clearly say that most of the competition venues are on track and they will be completed as scheduled."

'SIGNIFICANT' CUTS

During the bid process, Japan sold itself as a "safe pair of hands"-an advanced economy with a history of efficiency and excellence. But organisers are still battling to wrench the Games back on track following a

series of PR disasters after Tokyo beat Madrid and Istanbul to win the bid in 2013.

The main issue has been the budget, which rapidly spiralled out of control and forced a red-faced Prime Minister Shinzo Abe to tear up the blueprints for the original Olympic stadium.

Koike admitted: "There was a time when

Tokyo's budget seriously ballooned. We have reviewed it and then we reviewed it again. So it has been very much squeezed from the previous budget." In December, Tokyo 2020 organisers announced a "significant" cut of \$1.4 billion in the budget, bringing the overall bill to 1.35 trillion yen (\$12.6 billion).

"The budget should be reduced to the greatest extent possible," stressed Koike, adding she would continue to make efforts towards "creative" budget solutions. Tokyo

2020 organisers were also embarrassed by a plagiarism scandal that led to the scrapping of the original games logo due to its similarity to that of a Belgian theatre and a separate Spanish design.

But the unveiling last month of a pair of futuristic "superhero" mascots picked by schoolchildren around Japan sought to draw a line under that scandal and rekindle enthusiasm for the Olympics and Paralympics.

BATTLE AGAINST HEAT

If the pace of constructing venues is unlikely to cause headaches for Tokyo, plenty of challenges remain, notably dealing with the summer heat in the Japanese capital where temperatures regularly top 35C (95F).

Koike noted that Pyeongchang had the opposite problem, with fans urged to wrap up warm in extreme cold and buffeting winds forcing organisers to postpone the

showcase men's downhill. "In Tokyo, we will...
need to implement various creative efforts
and ideas to deal with the heat," she said.
The governor said she was more concerned
for the supporters than the athletes who "are
very capable-more so than ordinary peopleof bringing their physical fitness to deal with
any climate."

Organisers are looking at coating pavements with a substance to reduce the surface temperature and making sure there are trees to provide shade for competitors and spectators alike, Koike said. There are also worries over contamination in Odaiba Bay, where the triathlon and open-water swimming events will be held.

Samples taken between July and September last year showed levels of e-coli bacteria more than 20 times higher than permitted-apparently brought about by unseasonably heavy rain. Muto said organisers would solve this problem using special "underwater filters" that have proved successful in cleaning water in testing. — AFP

Tampa Bay Lightning shut out Boston 4-0

The Lightning set a franchise single-season points record (110). The Bruins failed to earn at least a point for the first time in 10 games. Vasilevskiy registered his 43rd win of the season. Brayden Point, Victor Hedman, Chris Kunitz and J.T. Miller scored for Tampa Bay, while Ryan Callahan and Braydon Coburn each registered two assists. Bruins goaltender Tuukka Rask stopped 32 of 36 shots.

PANTHERS 2, PREDATORS 1

Jonathan Huberdeau and Colton Sceviour scored, and Roberto Luongo made 45 saves as Florida kept its slim playoff hopes alive with a win over visiting Nashville. Nashville's Filip Forsberg appeared to score with 0.3 seconds left in the third period, but, upon review, the goal was wiped out for interference, giving Florida the win. The Panthers, who have 90 points, are competing for the final wild-card playoff berth in the Eastern Conference. They trail the Philadelphia Flyers, who lost on Monday, by four points. The Flyers have just two games remaining. The Panthers have three to go.


JETS 5, CANADIENS 4 (OT)

Woods's comeback bid drives Masters drama

AUGUSTA: Tigermania has blossomed along with the azaleas at Augusta National, but 14-time major champion Tiger Woods is just one of the contenders at a Masters that promises to be a classic. "I don't think there's one clear-cut favorite," said Woods, who is vying to pull off a comeback that would rate among the greatest in sport. His quest to better Jack Nicklaus's record of 18 major titles stalled after he grabbed number 14 at the 2008 US Open.

He owns four Masters green jackets, but hasn't even teed it up in the stately confines of Augusta National in two years as back trouble threatened to end his career completely.

Pain free at last after spinal fusion surgery last April, Woods has ignited expectations with one runner-up finish and a tie for fifth in five official PGA Tour starts this year-his best finishes since 2015. Woods himself is at a loss to explain the impressive swing speed and driving distance he never expected to see after having vertebrae in his lower back fused.

"For some reason it has come back," he said. "All of a sudden I have this pop and my body and my speed's back and my timing." He'll need all of that, and his vaunted short game and solid putting, on the course famed for the difficulty of its fast, undulating greens. "This golf course is something else," Woods said. The course, however, isn't the only obstacle standing in Woods's way, and he knows it.

Former Masters champions Phil Mickelson and Bubba Watson signalled their intentions with recent wins, Mickelson ending a near fiveyear title drought in March and Watson halting a two-year dry-spell

at Riviera before hoisting another trophy at the WGC Match-Play.

"I think there's so many guys playing well at the same time. I think that's what is making this year's Masters so exciting, that there's so many guys," Woods said.

Northern Ireland's Rory McIlroy, vying to complete a career Grand Slam with a first green jacket, boosted his confidence with a victory at Bay Hill in March. "I feel like I found something with my putting over the past few weeks, and in good time, because obviously you need to putt these greens very well," McIlroy said. "I'm looking forward to see what the week holds."

JOHNSON'S NO. 1 UNDER THREAT

World number one Dustin Johnson comes in on a mission, having missed the Masters last year thanks to a freak fall on the stairs that halted the hottest streak of his career in its tracks.

Johnson opened the year with a USPGA Tour Tournament of Champions win, but three players have a shot at toppling him from number one with a victory this week. Justin Thomas, 24, heads that list, and arrives at the Masters buoyed by a win at the Honda Classic, a runner-up finish at the WGC-Mexico Championship and a fourth-placed finish at the WGC-Match Play.

Should Thomas falter, Spain's third-ranked Jon Rahm or world number four Jordan Spieth-Masters champion in 2015 — could conceivably overtake Johnson this week. "I think there's a lot of players, a lot of the top quality players, young and old, are playing some of their best golf, and I think that's going to lead to one of the most exciting Masters in years," Mickelson said. Spain's Sergio Garcia faces a tall order in seeking to join Woods, Jack Nicklaus and Nick Faldo as the only players to successfully defend the Masters title.

England's Justin Rose insists his runner-up finish to Garcia last year left him not demoralized but determined. — AFP

Didgeridoo, heavy downpour at Commonwealth Games opening ceremony

Not cricket: Australia hit reset at Commonwealth Games

GOLD COAST: A blast from a didgeridoo, a sprinkling of royal stardust and a strong message of unity lit up the opening ceremony of the Commonwealth Games on Australia's Gold Coast yesterday.

A heavy downpour lashed the 35,000 crowd at Carrara Stadium as the ceremony began, ensuring a wet start to the proceedings for many in the half-covered arena. Britain's Prince Charles and wife Camilla were among the guests and the heir to the throne was due to officially open the Games later in the painstakingly planned gala.

As the ceremony sprang to life in the rain, the camera panned in on an Aboriginal family planted in the crowd

and a girl with a smartphone. The message on the screen read: "Welcome to the oldest living culture on Earth." A scene from a group of friends surfing off the beach gave way to a virtual journey through space and time as the stadium was engulfed in a galaxy of stars and blue light.

In contrast, just outside the stadium, about 100 Aboriginal activists protested against what they

have labelled the "Stolenwealth Games". The sporting action in the Games, which feature 71 nations and territories, gets underway today. Australia will try to forget all about cheating cricketers and restore their sporting image when the Commonwealth Games open at a gala ceremony in Gold Coast yesterday.

Australia's reputation for tough but fair competition took a hit when Test cricketers admitted ball-tampering, a scandal which prompted much debate and soul-searching. But the hosts have an opportunity to repair the damage at beach city Gold Coast, where they will attempt to top the medals table, led by their resurgent swimmers and

Dancing lifesavers and a floating white whale took the centre stage at the 35,000-seat Carrara Stadium for the opening ceremony, where Britain's Prince Charles were guest of honour. It heralds 11 days of competition and should soothe the trauma of the cricket row, after a player was caught doctoring the ball with sandpaper.

"Sand and sport have not been a happy combination for this country of late as we endure our national shame over the ugly fusion of cricket and sandpaper," The Australian newspaper said in an editorial.

"Starting tonight on the Gold Coast we can flick the switch to optimism and celebration." Attempts at secrecy took a knock when Australia's Channel 9 broadcast excerpts from the ceremony dress rehearsal-and had its accreditation suspended as punishment. Thousands of performers, volunteers and security will be involved in the event, which has been years in the planning and required about 400 truckloads of equipment.

on an unprecedented sub-57 seconds in the 100 metres, is another who will try to crash the Australian pool party.

Australia will also go head-to-head with England in track cycling, where they will field a revamped line-up under the tutelage of British coach Simon Jones.

In athletics, Gold Coast's world champion hurdler Sally Pearson is battling an Achilles' problem but Jamaican sprinter Yohan Blake should provide fireworks in the absence of the retired Usain Bolt. Elaine Thompson also looks set to blaze to sprint gold for Jamaica, while South Africa flag-carrier Caster Semenya is said to be targeting the long-standing 800m record.—AFP





Indian squash queen looks to hit cricket for six

GOLD COAST: Indian sporting celebrity Dipika Pallikal is hoping to put cricket in the shade back home by successfully defending her Commonwealth Games squash title-even if it upsets her cricketer husband.

The 26-year-old star, who is married to Indian cricket star Dinesh Karthik, made history in Glasgow four years ago when she won doubles gold with partner Joshna Chinappa-India's first medal in the sport.

Her wedding in 2015 was splashed across national media and made Pallikal a household name, although she made headlines by declaring she hated cricket. "I said that because I feel that every other sport is getting overshadowed by cricket," said Pallikal after arriving in Gold Coast to defend her title.

"It's kind of hard to try and concentrate on my career, as well as my husband's. We're all athletes and all have to be treated equally." The hope of squash overshadowing her husband's sport is likely to be a forlorn one in cricket-mad India.

English swimmers brace for Aussie assault at Games

GOLD COAST: England's swimmers are ready to fight fire with fire at the Commonwealth Games when they clash with a fearsome Australia team revved up by their home crowd. The English, spearheaded by Olympic breaststroke champion Adam Peaty, expect a rude reception from the Australians when the competition begins Friday, but their swimming boss promised they will rise to the

"Australia are a powerhouse, they're the team to beat," team leader Grant Robins told AFP in an interview. "They're strong across pretty much all the events and have a pro-

duction line of swimming quality." "It's going to be a hostile crowd," added the former Commonwealth Games competitor. "We've said 'You're going to walk out

Dipika Pallikal But Pallikal, whose jet-setting lifestyle is followed by 255,000 users on Instagram, insists she doesn't follow cricket. "There's a

Australian athletes can be every bit as spiky as their crowds and the aggressive antics of their cricketers have sparked a public outcry following a recent ball-tampering scandal. "He's an awesome athlete, a great role model. He's a hell of an athlete. He doesn't need to get out of bed and do this but he loves racing."

"But we've got some world-ranked people," added Robins. "Ben Proud obviously had a great world championships last year (50m butterfly gold) and James Guy had a good Olympics and world championships.

'Siobhan O'Connor, in the 200 individual medley, she's an Olympic silver medallist. We think she's going to be competitive so we've got some big-hitters. "Obviously some of our combined British relay teams have gone off to their home nations. There will be an opportunity for some people to step up and get their name in lights with Tokyo 2020 in mind."

But given the enormity of the task facing the English, Robins refused to say what their medal target was. "What I would like is for some of our newbies to step up," he said. 'That would be the icing on our cake. We have got a medal target but that is stuck on my bedroom wall and we'll see." — AFP

Alvarez cancels Golovkin rematch over drugs

LOS ANGELES: Saul "Canelo" Alvarez on Tuesday withdrew from his rematch against middleweight rival Gennady Golovkin over his failed drugs test but is optimistic the fight can be rescheduled later

At a press conference in Los Angeles, Alvarez's promoters Golden Boy said the likely suspension for the failed tests made it impossible to stage the May 5 bout in Las Vegas. "We're going to have to cancel the May 5 rematch," Golden Boy Promotions president Eric Gomez said. "We've been advised that given the regulations in Nevada it's unlikely that Canelo will be cleared to fight in May.

"We're hoping that Canelo will be cleared to fight in the summer, allowing us to reschedule the fight in August or September." Mexican star Alvarez, who was already under suspension from the Nevada State Athletic Commission, insisted he was a "clean fighter".

"I am truly shocked about what has happened, and for those who have doubts and suspicions about my integrity I have always been and always will be a clean fighter," Alvarez said through an interpreter.

"I want to apologize to... everyone who is involved in the promotion of this event and especially to the fans. I respect this sport. I will always be a clean fighter." Alvarez and Golovkin fought to a controversial draw in their first meeting in Las Vegas last September, a fight most neutrals believed unified champion Golovkin had won.

Their rematch at the T-Mobile Arena next month was expected to be one of the biggest fights of 2018 but was thrown into uncertainty after it emerged Alvarez had tested positive for Clenbuterol on February 17 and 20.

TAINTED MEAT?

Alvarez and Golden Boy had steadfastly denied any wrongdoing, saying the drug had entered the fighter's system inadvertently through contaminated meat in his native Mexico. The fight was initially expected to go ahead but was placed in jeopardy when the Nevada commission temporarily suspended Alvarez on March 23 and set a hearing date for April 10.

Nevada commission executive director Bob Bennett subsequently filed a formal complaint against Alvarez requesting that authorities consider a formal suspension against the Mexican fighter at a regularly scheduled meeting on April 18.

The T-Mobile Arena had already started offering refunds for tickets to the fight, venue owner MGM Resorts International said. Golovkin-who accused Alvarez of deliberately taking performance-enhancing drugs but was nevertheless ready to fightsaid in a statement he planned to press ahead with a bout on May 5 against an as-yet unknown opponent.

"I am looking forward to returning to Las Vegas for my 20th title defense and headlining my first Cinco De Mayo event on May 5," Golovkin said in comments emailed

"It is time for less drama and more fighting." Alvarez could in theory face up to a year's suspension for his failed drugs test. However, given it is a first offence, and provided he cooperates with Nevada investigators, he could see that sentence reduced

With drug sanctions in boxing backdated to the date of the failed test, a six-month ban would mean he would be free to reschedule his meeting with Golovkin on the Mexican Independence Day holiday weekend in early September-a popular slot for fights in Las Vegas.

Alvarez said he was ready to submit to extra drug-testing to prove he was clean. "I am sad and I feel powerless that I can't make this fight happen at this point," he said. "I'm willing to do whatever they request to prove that I'm a clean fighter. I have nothing to hide, I want to be transparent and open in this process." — AFP

Pakistan invites **England team back** after 13 years

ISLAMABAD: Pakistan's interior minister has invited the England cricket team to tour the country for the first time since 2005, after a successful visit by the West Indies amid improved security boosted hopes of an international revival.

A visit by a major Test-playing nation such as England would be hugely significant, in terms of both cricket as well as Pakistan's wider security and the message it hopes to send about its crackdown on extremism and militancy. Interior minister Ahsan Iqbal extended the invitation to UK High Comissioner Thomas Drew on Tuesday, urging the international community to recognise the strides Pakistan has made. "The successful staging of international matches in Pakistan is a clear proof that we have defeated terrorism and extremism," he said, according to an official statement. Drew said he was already looking forward to "this summer's big cricketing event", Pakistan's upcoming England tour.

"But I also hope that it will not be long before I can welcome an England team to Pakistan," he told AFP yesterday. "That really is something to look forward to." For years foreign teams refused to tour Pakistan, wracked by Islamist attacks. In 2009 an attack on the Sri Lankan team in Lahore drove international cricket from the country entirely, and their fixtures have been played in the United Arab

But security has improved dramatically in recent years, and since 2015 Pakistan has hosted Zimbabwe, a World XI, Sri Lanka, the finals of its domestic T20 league for two years running and, most recently, the West Indies, for a short T20 series which finished on

The matches have been staged in both Lahore and Karachi, the cricket-obsessed country's two largest cities, both of which have been hit repeatedly by militant violence over the last decade. Head-of-state level security has been provided for visiting players, most of whom have come away praising the arrangements. Various military operations across the country have led to the increased security, particularly in the northwestern tribal region, where militants once operated with impunity.

But the US maintains that Pakistan is hosting militant safe havens in the northwest, accusations Islamabad denies; while critics warn that the country has not gone far enough in rooting out the long-term causes of extremism. — AFP

Smith, Bancroft won't be challenging bans

SYDNEY: Former captain Steve Smith said vesterday he desperately wants to play for Australia again but will not be challenging a 12-month ban for a ball-tampering scandal that rocked cricket. Opening batsman Cameron Bancroft echoed similar sentiments, saying he was determined to earn back the trust of the Australian public. Cricket Australia last week suspended Smith and David Warner from all international and domestic cricket for a year, while Bancroft was suspended for nine months over the incident during the third Test in South Africa. All three players have admitted what they did was wrong and a wave of sympathy has been growing for Smith since his public apology, during which he broke down in tears.

The trio had until today to tell Cricket Australia whether they accepted their punishment or would opt for a hearing, as is their right. Warner has yet to comment but Smith, a golden boy who is compared to Donald Bradman for his batting exploits, took to social media to make clear he


would do his time.

"I would give anything to have this behind me and be back representing my country," he tweeted, in his first comments since the emotional press conference on his return to Australia last Thursday. "But I meant what I said about taking full responsibility as captain of the team. "I won't be challenging the sanctions. They've been imposed by CA to send a strong message and I have accepted them." Smith-the world's number one Test batsman-was charged with knowledge of the potential ball-altering plan, while Warner was charged with developing the plot and instructing Bancroft to carry it out.

Since the scandal erupted, Smith has lost a lucrative Indian Premier League contract and has been dumped by sponsors. Bancroft, who used sandpaper to scratch the surface of the ball, said he had informed Cricket Australia he would serve his ban. "Today I lodged the paperwork with Cricket Australia and will be accepting the sanction handed down," he said on

"I would love to put this behind me and will do whatever it takes to earn back the trust of the Australian public." The Australian Cricketers' Association on Tuesday called for the bans to be reduced, arguing the punishment was disproportionate to previous ball-tampering cases.

ACA president Greg Dyer pointed to



the separate International Cricket Council sanction, which suspended Smith for one Test and docked him his match fee. He also said the contrition expressed by players had been "extraordinary" and should be taken into account, urging a relaxation to

for the ball-tampering scandal. — AFP

Warne wants more heads to roll after SA tour shambles

SYDNEY: Spin king Shane Warne has called for more heads to roll over Australia's embarrassing tour of South Africa, saving the game's top brass must also be held accountable. The drama-filled four-Test tour was won by the Proteas 3-1 with a crushing 492-run win in the final match in Johannesburg on Tuesday, handing them their first series victory at home against Australia since 1969/70. A ball-tampering scandal during the third Test in Cape Town claimed the scalps of former captain Steve Smith, David Warner and Cameron Bancroft, who have all been suspended for up to a year, while coach Darren Lehmann quit in the aftermath.

Warne said the bloodletting should not stop there. 'Australia have a lot of questions to answer and I believe heads must roll on and off the field," he wrote on Instagram, having been a broadcast commentator

for the last two Tests. "Australia need new people who are passionate about the game in charge, but under-

"Australia can be a force again, but need the right people involved. There is a huge opportunity now for players and people to be leaders. All positions are in jeopardy and need to be looked at, heads must roll." Warne put the heat on Cricket Australia chief executive James Sutherland and team manager of performance Pat Howard while analysing the series defeat, Fox Sports reported.

"Every single position on the field, off the field, starting from James Sutherland at the top, Pat Howard who is in charge of cricket excellence, all these people," Warne was quoted as saying.

"The coaches. Batting coaches-when are we going to produce a good batsman? "All these people need to be (held accountable), saying 'right - are they good enough for that position? Who else have we got to take their position?" The Australian Cricketers' Association on Tuesday said the culture of Australian cricket must be addressed by an independent inquiry examining the game from top to bottom, reporting to both the players' union and Cricket Australia.

"Organisational culture comes from its leadership



and it comes from the top. It cannot be grafted onto the bottom," president Greg Dyer said, as pressure grows for the role of cricket's top executives to also come under the spotlight. "Let us identify all the causes of the tipping point that occurred in Cape Town." —AFP


utes but he too was deemed to be offside.

Former England captain Wilkins dies aged 61

LONDON: Ray Wilkins, who has died aged 61, achieved every English youngster's dream of captaining his country. He did that and more in a playing career which saw him grace the colours of boyhood club Chelsea, who he skippered at just 18, and Manchester United, where the midfielder displayed skills that few of his English peers could match. Wilkins also stopped off in Italy with AC Milan, in France with Paris Saint-Germain and Scotland at Rangers. With the game in his blood, Wilkins also even managed a brief spell as coach of Jordan. Affectionately nicknamed "Butch", Wilkins struggled when his playing career, which stretched the best part of 25 years, ended.

He fought a battle with alcohol, twice picking up drinkdriving convictions. "Footballers who think they are something special are making a terrible mistake," said Wilkins who revealed he was an alcoholic in 2016.

"I always told my kids (he has two sons, Ross and Jade) I'm nobody but their dad. But I just don't cope well with rejection. "I was lucky enough to play until I was 40, 41. But when time decided I could no longer continue, I struggled in a way I'm sure a lot of sportsmen do.

"It's hard to replace what sport gives you. After QPR, I suffered badly with depression and it had an impact on the whole family." For Wilkins, who admitted to being hooked on Valium even during his Chelsea days in the 1970s, his losing battle with alcohol did not at least cost him his marriage. Jackie, who he met when she was a secretary at Chelsea, stood by him through thick and thin. Wilkins had appeared the least likely person to suffer from self-doubt as his days on the pitch saw him play with a swagger. Softly-spoken, he was a far more creative player than another of his nicknames, "The Crab", suggested. However, he sacrificed that both at club and international level to allow Bryan Robson the freedom to roam and get forward. Wilkins, who came from a footballing family, won 84 caps-skippering England 10 times.

But his international career was never to be rewarded with silverware. Indeed, for many, his most noteworthy moment in an England shirt was becoming the first England player to be sent off in a World Cup finals-a rare moment of petulance seeing him throw the ball at the referee in a torrid 0-0 draw group phase match with

Morocco in 1986.

Inadvertently, his suspension allowed coach Bobby Robson to change his formation. Wilkins's replacement Peter Reid proved more than capable of standing in and transformed the team's fortunes to such an extent he was unable to regain his place for the Diego Maradona 'Hand of God' quarter-final against Argentina.

For such a storied career, the return of just one FA Cup medal in a 1983 replay romp over Brighton-he scored a sublime goal in the drawn match-and two trophies in

Scotland with Rangers seem little by way of reward.

But if that nagged at him, it was nothing compared to the upset and hurt that came when Chelsea sacked him as assistant coach early in the 2010/11 season just months after he and Carlo Ancelotti had guided the club to their first ever domestic double. "I slipped into a deep hole. That was my darkest time," he told the Daily Mail in 2014. Ancelotti never forgot Wilkins's contribution. "Ray is

one of those select few, always present, noble in spirit, a real blue-blood, Chelsea flows in his veins... without him we wouldn't have won a thing," Ancelotti wrote in his autobiography. —AFP

Ulsan storm into AFC last 16 on good night for Korea, China

HONG KONG: South Korea's Ulsan Hyundai FC powered into the knockout stages of the AFC Champions League yesterday with a 6-2 demolition of Melbourne Victory, who crashed out. Ulsan will finish second in Group F behind Shanghai SIPG, who drew 1-1 at home to Kawasaki

And on a great night for South Korean football, the 2016 winners Jeonbuk also clinched their berth with a 2-0 Group E win at Kashiwa Reysol in Japan. China's Tianjin Quanjian left it late to join them in the last 16 from Group E with the only goal against Kitchee in Hong Kong coming in the 89th minute from 30 million euro French import Anthony Modeste.

Ulsan were gifted a comical opening goal before the floodgates opened against the A-League side. Just 12 minutes had elapsed when striker Junior Negrao threw out a hopeful boot to block a clearance from Melbourne goalkeeper Lawrence Thomas, who was mortified to see the ball ricochet back over his head from the Brazilian and into the empty net. Lim Jong-eun got the second with a cool left-foot volleyed finish and Mislay Orsic thumped home a third before half-time to put the home side in complete control. Kim Seung-jun made it 4-0 for Ulsan 10 minutes after the break and Junior bagged his second before a brief fightback from Melbourne.

The visitors scored twice in two minutes through Kenny Athiu and Kosta Barbarouses. But any fleeting hopes of an against-the-odds fightback were snuffed out when the Croatian Orsic thumped in his second to make it 6-2. Jeonbuk were grateful to another Brazilian striker, Ricardo Lopes, who got them up and running in front of a vociferous Kashiwa home support with a scrambled finish

Hugely popular veteran Korean striker Lee Dong-gook sealed qualification with a cool finish in the 77th minute.

The 38-year-old had been on the pitch for just 10 minutes when he sweetly struck a left-foot shot past Kazushige Kirihata to leave Kashiwa's qualification hopes at that stage dangling by a thread.

Kashiwa needed Kitchee to defeat the big-spending Tianjin in the later match but the Chinese Super League side broke Japanese hearts in the 89th minute when Modeste nodded in from close range to knock out both Kitchee and Kashiwa.

Tianjin are two points behind the Korean side and will olay Kashiwa next week while Jeonbuk face Kitchee with hose results determining who will finish top of the group.

In Shanghai, burly striker Hulk blazed a first-half penaly over the bar and fellow Brazilian Oscar was largely nonymous as the already-qualified SIPG laboured to a 1-1 against Group F stragglers Kawasaki Frontale.

SIPG eventually opened the scoring through Brazilian Elkeson's 68th-minute strike but it was cancelled out six minutes later by a Kei Chinen close-range header.

The draw was still enough to assure SIPG of finishing top of the group with Ulsan guaranteed second place with one round of matches remaining next week.—AFP

Saudi sports chief backs North America 2026 World Cup bid

RIYADH: Saudi sports authority chief Turki al-Sheikh on Tuesday extended his support for a joint US-Canada-Mexico bid to host the 2026 World Cup, calling it a "strong" contender. The comment from Sheikh an advisor to powerful Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman, came as he hosted United States Soccer Federation chief Carlos Cordeiro, who sought Saudi support for the joint bid in competition

"I was pleased to meet with the president of the American Football Association and chairman of the joint bid for US, Canada, Mexico, a strong bid for hosting World Cup 2026," Sheikh tweeted along with a picture of himself with Cordeiro, smiling and shaking hands. The comment comes as Prince Mohammed is on an elaborate tour of the United States, a key strategic ally and arms supplier of the kingdom. The US-Canada-Mexico bid has long been viewed as the favourite to stage the most prestigious tournament in football, which will expand to 48 teams for the 2026 finals. Morocco is in the running to stage the tournament, which will be awarded during a FIFA vote in Moscow shortly before this year's World Cup kicks off in June. Sheikh has tacitly implied before that Morocco made a mistake when they chose not to side with Saudi Arabia in its feud with Qatar.

Saudi Arabia, the United Arab Emirates, Bahrain, and Egypt cut diplomatic and trade ties with Qatar last June, accusing Doha of bankrolling Islamist extremists and fostering ties with arch-rival Iran. Doha denies the charge. — AFP

Monaco stumble at Rennes

RENNES: Rony Lopes scored for the sixth Ligue 1 game in a row yesterday but Monaco were held to a 1-1 draw by a Rennes side with European ambitions of their own. Joris Gnagnon put Rennes ahead on 20 minutes at Roazhon Park before Portugal international Lopes levelled on the half-hour with his seventh goal in his past six appearances.

Monaco extended their unbeaten league run to 16 matches, although the draw means Paris Saint-Germain could wrap up a fifth title in six seasons this weekend if results go their way. The trip to Rennes gave Monaco an opportunity to swiftly move on from Saturday's 3-0 defeat by PSG in the League Cup final, but the visitors made a poor start in Brittany. Sabri Lamouchi's men are locked in a five-way battle for a Europa League berth next season and forged ahead when defender Gnagnon turned in Sanjin Prcic's cross on the half-volley.—AFP

Liverpool stun City with 3-0 win

Prolific Salah, Oxlade-Chamberlain and Mane on target

LIVERPOOL: Liverpool swept Manchester City aside with a three-goal blitz in 19 first-half minutes to take a commanding 3-0 first leg lead in their Champions League quarter-final. Champions-elect City lead Liverpool by 18 points in the Premier League, but their only league defeat this season came in a 4-3 thriller at Anfield in January, and they suffered an even worse fate vesterday to leave their hopes of winning the European Cup for a first time hanging by a thread. Just as in the January meeting between the sides, the prolific Mohamed Salah, Alex Oxlade-Chamberlain and Sadio Mane were on target for the hosts. However, a perfect night for Liverpool was marred when Salah limped off with an injury early in the second half.

City could already be crowned English champions by the time the sides meet again for the second leg in six days' time should they beat local rivals Manchester United on Saturday. However, it will take an extraordinary Etihad turnaround if they are to make just their second ever Champions League semi-final. City were well aware of the cauldron they were facing from the off as their team bus was battered by bottles and cans on their arrival at Anfield.

Liverpool boss Jurgen Klopp was quick to apologise as were the club in a strongly-worded statement condemning the actions of their own supporters. The atmosphere was equally electric inside the stadium for Liverpool's first Champions League quarter-final for nine years. However, it didn't immediately appear to shake City out of their rhythm as the hosts controlled possession for the opening 10 minutes. City, though, remained susceptible to the speed of Liverpool's forwards and the visitors were caught out on the counterattack on 12 minutes when Salah sprang Roberto

Firmino in behind the City defence and, after his initial effort was parried by Ederson, Firmino teed up Salah to smash home his 38th goal of the season.

OXLADE-CHAMBERLAIN ROCKET

City should have struck back straight away when Leroy Sane pulled his shot wide from the edge of the box as City outnumbered the Liverpool defence on a quick break of their own. However, they were soon swept away in the euphoria engulfing Anfield as Oxlade-Chamberlain pounced on a loose ball on the edge of the area and rendered Ederson helpless with a stunning strike from 20 yards. The composure that has characterised City's record-breaking Premier League season ebbed away as misplaced passed were gobbled

up by wave upon wave of Liverpool attack. A third duly arrived as Salah stood up a cross to the far post for Mane to head in and take Liverpool's prolific front three's tally for the season to 77. Liverpool's night was soured when Salah limped towards the touchline eight minutes after the restart with a muscle injury that will make him a serious doubt for the second leg.

Guardiola turned to his bench moments later to introduce former Liverpool winger Raheem Sterling, who had been surprisingly left out from the start, to add even more spice to the atmosphere. The Liverpool faithful had to try and carry their tiring side over the line in the second half as City pressed relentlessly for an away goal that would get them back in the tie.

However, the precise passing that is often the trademark of Guardiola sides deserted the Catalan's charges as their final ball was consistently inches off target and Liverpool held out for a priceless clean sheet. — AFP

Two own-goals help Barca take charge of q-final against Roma

BARCELONA: Barcelona can start planning for the Champions League semi-finals but their 4-1 win over Roma vesterday will not necessarily have rivals quivering in their boots. Two owngoals, from Daniele De Rossi and Kostas Manolas, and a closerange finish from Gerard Pique, presented the Catalans with a flattering 3-0 advantage at the Camp Nou before Edin Dzeko snatched Roma a late away goal.

But, just as the Italians looked to have grabbed a lifeline, Luis Suarez restored the three-goal cushion, by scoring a fourth in the 87th minute. It means Barca will head to Italy next week with a place in the last four firmly in their grasp but this was not a virtuouso attacking display. Instead, they benefited from two fortuitous own goals and some careless Roma finishing. Ernesto Valverde's side are unlikely to meet as generous an opponent in the semis. After Cristiano Ronaldo's spectacular bicycle kick for Real Madrid on Tuesday, even Lionel Messi, back from injury here, endured a slightly frustrating night, his shots and dribbles for once meeting opponents rather than the net.

Messi returned to the starting line-up after recovering from his hamstring complaint, as did Sergio Busquets, back after breaking his toe against Chelsea three weeks ago. Roma's own midfield enforcer Radja Nainggolan was missing with a hamstring strain.

Barca struggled for fluency in the first half, with Roma's nineman defensive action largely successful in channelling their opponents' attacks down the centre, where the visitors were able to tackle, block and contain the space.

The only real early threat from Barca came through Ivan Rakitic's cross-shot, which curved without a touch all the way through to the far post, which it struck and bounced out. By then, Roma were unfortunate not to have had a penalty as Dzeko nipped in front of Nelson Semedo, who pushed the attacker in the back. Referee Danny Makkelie, however, was unmoved.

Instead, it was Barca who enjoyed the rub of the green when De Rossi attempted to cut out Andres Iniesta's pass to Messi. Facing goal, his leaping slide connected too well with the ball, which he stabbed past Alisson Becker and into his own net. Stodgy in the first half, Barca were sloppy at the start of the second as Semedo allowed Diego Perotti a free header at the back post and then Samuel Umtiti could have been punished for a moment of indecision in his own six-yard box.

But Roma were blunt in attack and they paid the price. In the 55th minute, a skimming cross from Rakitic was met by Umtiti five yards out and while his finish came back off the post, the ball deflected off Manolas and in. Four minutes later, it was 3-0. Messi's bending pass allowed Suarez a shot at goal and Alisson's parry fell at the feet of Pique, who side-footed home. — AFP

Roma looked to have found a way back into the contest when Dzeko nipped in to convert Perotti's cross but Suarez secured the victory and perhaps the tie. His namesake Denis Suarez supplied the cross and as the ball spilled loose, the Uruguavan needed no second invitation to find the net. — AFP

China retaliates, slaps duties on US soybeans, planes

BEIJING/WASHINGTON: China hit back quickly yesterday against US plans to impose tariffs on \$50 billion in Chinese goods, retaliating with a list of similar duties on key American imports including soybeans, planes, cars, beef and chemicals in a move that sent global mar-

Beijing moved with exceptional speed after US President Donald Trump's administration unveiled tariff plans targeting China, acting less than 11 hours later as the trade dispute between the world's two economic superpowers sharply escalated. US President Donald Trump, who has long charged that his predecessors served the United States badly in trade matters, rejected the notion that the tit-for-tat moves amounted to a trade war.

"We are not in a trade war with China, that war was lost many years ago by the foolish, or incompetent, people who represented the US," Trump wrote in a post on Twitter early yesterday. The latest developments sent shivers through global stock markets and commodities. Shares in US exporters of everything from food to planes were hammered with a list of duties on key US imports including soybeans, planes, cars, beef and chemicals.

By mid-morning in New York, shares in US aerospace giant Boeing Co were down 3.3 percent while agricultural machinery maker Deere & Co had slipped 3.9 percent. The Dow Jones Industrial Average was down 0.91 percent while the S&P 500 fell 0.59 percent. The US dollar also fell.

While Washington targeted products that benefit from Chinese industrial policy, including its "Made in China 2025" initiative to replace advanced technology imports with domestic products in strategic industries such as advanced IT and robotics, Beijing's appeared aimed at inflicting political damage. For example, the US farm belt strongly backed Trump in the 2016 US election.

Because the actions will not be carried out immediately, there may be room for maneuver. Publication of Washington's list starts a period of public comment and consultation expected to last around two months. The effective date of China's moves depends on when the US action takes effect.

US Commerce Secretary Wilbur Ross said in an interview with CNBC that it would not be surprising if the US and China trade actions led to negotiations, although he would not speculate on when this might happen. Investors were wondering, nonetheless, how far one of the worst trade disputes in many years could escalate.

"The assumption was China would not respond too aggressively and avoid escalating tensions. China's response is a surprise for some people," said Julian Evans-Pritchard, senior China economist at Capital Economics, noting that neither side had yet called for enforcement of the tariffs.

"It's more of a game of brinkmanship, making it clear what the cost would be, in the hopes that both sides can come to agreement and none of these tariffs will come into force," said Evans-Pritchard. US-made goods that appear to face added

tariffs in China based, on an analysis of Beijing's list, include Tesla Inc electric cars, Ford Motor Co's Lincoln auto models, Gulfstream jets made by General Dynamics Corp and Brown-Forman Corp's Jack Daniel's whiskey. Unlike

frozen beef, cotton and other key agricultural commodities produced in states from Iowa to Texas that voted for Trump in the 2016 presidential election. Information technology products, from cellphones to personal computers, largely escaped the latest salvo of US-China trade measures despite accounting for a significant portion of bilateral trade. China ran a \$375 billion goods trade surplus with the United States in 2017.

"But let's remember: we buy five times more goods than they buy from us. They have a lot more to lose in any escalation in this matter." Beijing's list of 25 percent additional tariffs on US goods covers 106 items with a trade value matching the \$50 billion targeted on Washington's list, China's commerce and finance ministries said. —Reuters

Eurozone unemployment falls, economic recovery gains pace

Jobless rate drops to 8.5% in February

BRUSSELS: Europe's economic recovery is gaining pace, with eurozone unemployment at its lowest level since December 2008 and inflation on the rise, official figures showed yesterday.

The EU's official statistics agency said the jobless rate in the single currency area fell to 8.5 percent in February, down from 8.6 percent in January. Eurostat said inflation in the eurozone jumped to 1.4 percent in March, a leap from February's 1.1 percent. That edges inflation closer to the European Central Bank's (ECB) target although it is still a way off the desired 2.0 percent. The data are in line with other recent statistics that suggest the European economy is growing at a solid pace after years of weak recovery following the debt crisis. The steady decline in joblessness comes on the back of three years of massive support from the ECB to help the 19-country single currency zone survive the eurozone debt crisis.

The ECB has bought more than two trillion euros (\$2.46 trillion) worth of bonds during that time, helping trigger growth but struggling to push inflation towards its 2.0 percent goal. In a sign of growing confidence in the eurozone recovery, the ECB last month dropped a long-standing pledge that it stood ready to ratchet up bond-buying again if needed-taking a small step towards the stimulus exit door.

But inflation remains well below the central bank's 2.0 percent target, which may give ECB head Mario Draghi second thoughts about turning the stimulus off completely this year. "The ECB will tread very cautiously in raising interest rates," said economist Jessica Hinds of Capital Economics. "We have pencilled in the first hike for September 2019, which is later than investors seem to expect." There were

also regional differences in unemployment, which remained high in Greece at 20.8 percent in December, the last month for which figures were available, Spain at 16.1 percent, and Italy at 10.9 percent. German unemployment remained super-low at 3.5 percent in February, with the Netherlands dropping to 4.1 percent. The youth unemployment rate was also trending downward. In February, youth unemployment was 17.7 percent in the euro area, down from 19.4 percent the same month in 2017.

'Unacceptably high'

But rates for people under 25 years old remained high in Spain at 35.5 percent in February, down from 40.8 percent a year earlier, and in Italy at 32.8 percent, down from 35.2 percent in February 2017. Greece's rate was a whopping 45 percent in December 2017, the last month for which youth figures were available, down slightly from 46.7 percent in February 2017. "The level of youth unemployment in a number of countries is unacceptably high," European Commission deputy spokesman Alexander Winterstein told reporters. "It will not induce young people to be enthusiastic about Europe," he said when asked if it could hurt during national elections and in European Parliament elections in 2019. During the worst of the debt crisis in 2013, eurozone unemployment reached a record 12.1 percent. Since then, the economic situation has slowly improved, but unemployment remains much higher than the average rate before the crisis, when it was 7.5 percent. Economic growth in the 19country eurozone hit 2.3 percent in 2017, the highest level in

Nigeria CB holds key rate after months of limbo

ABUJA: Nigeria's central bank held its repo rate at 14 per cent in its first meeting this year yesterday after a political standoff between the executive and the senate prevented a quorum for months.

"The committee decided ununanimosly" to retain the rate, said central bank governor Godwin Emefiele. Inflation has been steadily coming down in West Africa's largest economy, opening the door for easing monetary policy, though there are still concerns about foreign-exchange pressures. "We think that rates will be cut later this year but they'll wait for inflation to ease a little bit before moving," said John Ashbourne, Africa economist at London-based Capital Economics. Emefiele said in January that he would look at cutting interest rates if inflation-currently well outside the target band of 9 per cent at 14 per cent-is hovering closer to single digits. "I want to think that between the end of the first and second quarter, we should begin to see easing," Emefiele said in an interview. "I don't think they'll wait until (the interest rate) is back within target," said Ashbourne, "he's been making statements that are quite dovish so I think he's chomping at the bit to make a cut."

Since its last meeting in November, several new members have joined the committee, and they were finally approved by the senate at the end of March.

In a spat typifying political dysfunction in Nigeria, the senate refused to confirm the committee members in protest of President Muhammadu Buhari's earlier appointment of antigraft head Ibrahim Magu. After being deadlocked for months, the senate finally "decided to do the right thing", according to a senate source, and confirmed the new members. Nigeria is recovering from its worst recession in 25 years after the crash in global oil prices in 2014. As a result of increased oil revenue, Nigeria's economy expanded 0.8 per cent in 2017, but growth in non-oil sectors remains tepid. —AFP

In Africa, scant data protection leaves Internet users exposed

NAIROBI/LAGOS: In Kenya, which has a large and fast growing population of Internet users, there are no specific laws or regulations to protect the privacy of those individuals. Kenya is not alone in Africa, which as a region has clocked the world's fastest growth in Internet use over the past decade. Unlike in Europe and the United States, where data-privacy laws provide a level of protection to consumers, many Africans have little or no recourse if a data breach occurs because often legal and regulatory safeguards don't exist. Recent revelations about British analytics firm Cambridge Analytica, which Facebook says improperly accessed personal data of about 50 million of the social networks users in the 2016 U.S. presidential election, have also touched the African continent.

Cambridge Analytica or its parent company SCL Group worked on the 2013 and 2017 campaigns of Kenya's President Uhuru Kenyatta. The company was also hired to support the failed re-election bid of then-president Goodluck Jonathan of Nigeria in 2015, according to Britain's Guardian newspaper. A spokesman for the Nigerian president said on Monday that the country's government will investigate allegations of improper involvement by Cambridge Analytica in the 2007 and 2015 elections. Kenya's ruling Jubilee party told Reuters that it had hired SCL for "branding" in the 2017 presidential election but did not elaborate on the precise nature of the work.

Cambridge Analytica didn't respond to a request for comment. The company has suspended its chief executive pending what it said would be a full, independent investigation. Growth of Internet use in Africa, a continent of 1 billion people, has been fuelled by rapidly expanding mobile broadband networks and ever more affordable phones. That presents a major growth opportunity for Internet companies such as Facebook, which currently sees some 123 million people across sub-Saharan Africa accessing its social network platform monthly.

While some governments on the continent have responded to these rapid changes - rights campaigners welcomed a data-protection law passed by South Africa 2013 - many have not.—Reuters

France hit by second day of rail chaos as strike bites

Unions reject government plans for SNCF reforms

Macron move to

reform ailing

PARIS: Millions of French commuters suffered a second consecutive day of travel chaos yesterday as striking rail workers locked horns with President Emmanuel Macron's government in a dispute over reforming the state-owned SNCF railways.

Commuters in and around Paris pushed their way onto the few trains running during the rush-hour while many platforms in the French capital's busiest stations lay empty.

SNCF data at midday showed the number of drivers on strike fell slightly yesterday, though more signalmen and conductors had walked out than a day earlier.

Across the company, including administrative and sales staff, the participation rate dipped.

Macron wants to transform the heavily indebted rail company, which loses 3 billion euros (\$3.7 billion) each year, into a profit-making public service able to withstand foreign competition when its monopoly ends in 2020

in line with European Union rules. Unions reject plans to end rail workers' special privileges, including job-for-life guarantees and early retirement, and complain the government is paving the way for privatizing the SNCF.

Macron, a former investment banker, has set a summer deadline for the overhaul to be completed.

"I don't understand the strike. Some say we want to break up public services and it's simply wrong," Julien Denormandie, a junior minister in Macron's government, told BFM TV. In taking on the rail unions, Macron is treading where past presidents have either failed or steered clear, determined to cement his image as a fearless and indefatigable moderniser of the French economy. The battle's outcome could define Macron's presidency with trade unions, already badly bruised by his success in liberalizing labor regulations last autumn, also needing to score a win.

Time to talk debt

Other protest movements are also simmering, with university students, public workers, garbage collectors and pensioners all angry at Macron's social and economic reform agenda. So far, though, they have shown no sign of coalescing into a single, more potent move-

ment, just as France prepares to mark the 50th anniversary of the May 1968 anti-establishment revolt that transformed the nation.

Yesterday, only one in seven high-speed TGV trains were running slightly more than on Tuesday - and one in five trains on overground commuter lines into Paris, similar to Tuesday's lev-

els. The unions plan to strike two days in every five over the next three months.

"It's not our aim to frustrate rail passengers. Our goal is to find a way out of this row, to sit down and negotiate and find real solutions," said Roger Dillenseger of the UNSA-Railways union.

The SNCF said the participation rate fell to 30 percent of staff from 34 percent on Tuesday. However, the number of striking conductors and signal-box workers considered essential for running services - climbed by 8 and 7 percentage points respectively.

Before the strike, the government offered small con-



cessions, including delaying the opening of SNCF networks to foreign companies as long as legally possible and dropping plans to push some aspects of the reform through by decree.

It has, however, said it will not discuss how much of the SNCF's 46 billion euro debt pile the Treasury will assume until a deal is reached on employment benefits, prompting union accusations that it negotiating "with a on SNCF reform, told Europe 1 radio. — Reuters

Morocco's new Tanger-Med port running at full speed

TANGIERS, Morocco: Home only to grazing sheep just a decade or so ago, a stretch of Moroccan coastline near Tangiers is now abuzz as its new port presses full speed ahead towards expansion.

Inaugurated in 2007, the Tanger-Med port complex, not far from the Strait of Gibraltar, handled 51.3 million tons of cargo-on a par with the Port of London.

Its industrial park, connected to a freetrade zone, is creating jobs at a rate that "exceeds expectations", according to port chief Jaafar Mrhardy.

With 750 companies and thousands of employees, it generated 5.5 billion euros (\$6.8 billion) of revenue in 2017. The port's strategic location, growing industrial zone and cheaper local labor have attracted shippers, truckers and businessmen alike, but its ambitions do not stop there.

Tanger-Med, which expects its Tanger Med II extension to triple container capacity by 2019, is aiming to become the Mediterranean's top port. "We are positioning ourselves as a 'best cost' country," said Mrhardy, "with proximity to European markets and very competitive costs."

2.8 million travellers

Bulldozers are working on embankments, and three gigantic gantry cranes have already been delivered. Even in bad weather, the Spanish port of Algeciras is clearly visible on the other side of the strait. On one of the Tanger-Med I docks, a massive wind turbine produced by a local branch of Spanish renewable energy giant Siemens Gamesa was awaiting delivery. Nearby, security guards with a sniffer dog scanned cars as they boarded a ferry bound for Italy.

The port's passenger terminal handled 2.8 million passengers last year. During peak sea-

son, it receives up to 33,000 passengers and 9,000 vehicles per day, said Hassan Abkari, director of the port's passenger division. He said the new port has helped to reduce waiting times and to unclog Tangiers' city centre. Truckers now use a motorway junction that bypasses Tangiers city, 50 kilometres (30 miles) away. About 290,000 semi-trailers passed through Tanger-Med just last year.

Day and night, teams of trucks loop between the docks of the port complex, the storage warehouses and the companies in the industrial zone. The workshops of "Still Nua Fashion", in an alley of the free-trade industrial zone, receive containers of fabric from China and Turkey. Designs made in Ireland are cut and sewn, ready for shipment to the United States and Britain.

"We are in the 'fast-fashion' (business)," said Naoual el-Mlih, Still Nua's energetic director. "With very short delivery times, the proximity of the port is crucial."

'Time is money'

For Mohammed Ali Enneifer, a Tunisian who leads a branch of the French cable production company Acome, the port's strategic placement is key. "Time is money. It used to take three weeks to reach Hamburg, now it's 10 to 12 days," he said of the link with the German port city.

'The connections are direct. We can receive or remove a container in less than 24 hours." French car manufacturer Renault, which opened a plant in Tanger-Med in 2012, exported more than 300,000 cars last year to the 74 countries served by the port. Its site employs 8,600 people and "100 percent of the staff is Moroccan", boasted factory director Jean-Francois Gal.

Next year, the port expects to also export cars built in a new Peugeot factory in Kenitra, 200 kilometres to the south, said Rachid Houari, another Tanger-Med director.

Beyond the logistics and customs facilities offered by the port's free-trade zone, the cost of Moroccan labour is another major draw. "Our parent company in Ireland employs 75 people, at a total cost equal to that of our branch, which has 400 employees," said Mlih of Nua Fashion. The company plans to move its design services from Dublin to Tangiers, joining a growing crowd of outfits making the same jump. — AFP

US services sector activity slows; private payrolls rise

WASHINGTON: US services sector activity slowed in March, held down by a drop in new orders, while private employers maintained a brisk pace of hiring. The Institute for Supply Management (ISM) said yesterday its non-manufacturing activity index fell 0.7 point to a reading of 58.8 last month. A reading above 50 indicates expansion in the sector, which accounts for more than two-thirds of US economic activity. March's moderation in services industry activity reflected a 5.3 points decline the new orders subindex. The ISM's employment measure increased 1.6 points. There were also increases in the backlog of orders and import measures last month.

Separately, the ADP National Employment Report showed private payrolls increased by 241,000 jobs in March after rising 246,000 in February. Last month's increase beat economists' expectations for a 205,000 gain. The ADP report, which is jointly developed with Moody's Analytics, was published ahead of the government's more comprehensive employment report for March due on Friday.

According to a Reuters survey of economists, nonfarm payrolls likely increased by 195,000 in March after surging 313,000 in February. The unemployment rate is forecast falling onetenth of a percentage point to 4.0 percent in March. US financial markets were little moved by the data as investors fretted over escalating trade tensions between the United States and China. The dollar was trading lower against a basket of currencies. Stocks on Wall Street fell while prices for longerdated US Treasuries rose. In a third report the Commerce Department said factory goods orders increased 1.2 percent in February amid strong demand for transportation equipment and a range of other products, nearly unwinding January's revised 1.3 percent decline. Orders surged 7.9 percent on a yearon-year basis in February.

Manufacturing, which accounts for about 12 percent of US economic activity is being supported by strong domestic and global demand, but a shortage of skilled workers and capacity constraints could hurt factory output. A survey on Monday showed a slight ebb in sentiment among manufacturers amid rising concerns over labor shortages and the supply chain. Manufacturers also reported that tariffs on steel and aluminum imports imposed by President Donald Trump in early March were raising prices, "causing panic buying" and "leading to inventory shortages for noncontract customers." — Reuters

Ryanair cancels flights in Portugal after cabin crew strike

LISBON: Ryanair cabin crew held a third oneday strike in Portugal over worker rights yesterday, prompting 11 flight cancellations and a government promise to investigate alleged

Inspectors from the state Authority for Labor Conditions were monitoring the strike in the country's main airports in Lisbon, Porto and Faro, Labor Minister Jose Vieira da Silva told a parliamentary committee. The SNPVAC cabin crew union said 11 Ryanair flights to and from Portugal were cancelled in the morning after some 90 percent of the 330 crew personnel in Portugal joined the strike. But Europe's largest low-cost carrier said the majority of Portuguese crews were working normally and only a small number of early flights had been cancelled or delayed. It planned to operate its full schedule through the rest of the day.

SNPVAC accuses Ryanair of using its Irish jurisdiction to ignore parenthood rights and not allow doctor-approved sick days, as well as resorting to disciplinary processes and threats for not reaching in-flight sales objectives.

One of the strike's goals was to involve the government in the dispute. Ryanair, which was forced to recognize trade unions to avoid mass strikes in December, argues that staff working conditions are comparable to competitors.

Boeing, Apple lead slide as China-US spat intensifies

Dollar slides, oil slips and gold jumps

manufacturers and technology companies yesterday, bearing the brunt of a deepening trade conflict between China and the United States. China and the United States announced tariffs on \$50 billion of each others' imports. But, while Washington's list covers many obscure industrial items, Beijing's covers 106 key US imports including soybeans, planes, cars, and chemicals. The speed with which the trade struggle between the two countries is ratcheting up - China took less than 11 hours to respond with its own measures - led to a sharp selloff in global stock markets and commodities.

At 9:44 am ET, the Dow Jones Industrial Average was down 399.81 points, or 1.66 percent, at 23,633.55. The S&P 500 fell 28.57 points, or 1.1 percent, at 2,585.88 and the Nasdaq Composite was down 75.51 points, or 1.09 percent, at 6,865.77.

The S&P opened and stayed below its 200-day moving average, a key support level watched by traders technical analysts, while the Dow held just above that mark. The Nasdaq dipped into negative territory for the year. "Tariffs by themselves and an escalating trade war would certainly have deleterious effects on just about everything," said Jack Ablin, chief investment officer at Cresset Wealth in Chicago.

The declines were broad based. All 30 Dow components were lower. About 469 of the S&P 500 components were lower. The industrials index's 1.8 percent slide was the most among the 11 major S&P sectors, as has been the case since the trade war fears surfaced.

Shares of Boeing, the single largest U.S. exporter to China, tumbled 4 percent. Caterpillar fell 3 percent.

NEW YORK: Boeing and Apple led a slide in big U.S. Ford, General Motors, Fiat Chrysler and Tesla fell between 0.8 percent and 1.88 percent. While manufacturers were the bigger losers as a group, the technology sector's 1.74 percent drop weighed the most on the market.

Major tech names Apple and the FANG group -Facebook, Amazon, Netflix and Alphabet were down between 1.4 percent and 2.6 percent.

Chipmakers, many of which have the highest revenue exposure to China among S&P 500 companies, also fell. All components of the Philadelphia chipmakers index were lower, led by AMD's 5 percent drop. "As a sector, technology has the most to lose from a world in which global trade is restricted and of course, some of the subjects of the tariffs, will also be hit," said Rick Meckler, president of investment firm LibertyView Capital Management in Jersey City, New

Among the few bright spots was Lennar, whose shares jumped 6.2 percent after the homebuilder's quarterly revenue beat estimates as it sold more homes at higher prices.

Declining issues outnumbered advancers by a 9.42to-1 ratio on the NYSE and a 5.74-to-1 ratio on the Nasdaq. In Europe, London's FTSE, Paris's CAC40 and the export-heavy German DAX fell between 0.6 percent and 1.2 percent. "The market should be focused on it because it's (U.S. protectionist measures are) bad news," fund manager Ashmore's head of research, Jan Dehn, said.

Trump denied yesterday that the United States was in a trade war with China. The Organisation for

Angel Gurria said the US exports \$150 billion of goods a year to China whereas China exports \$500 billion to the US, meaning China's tariffs were therefore not proportional.

The swing in risk sentiment put the pep back into bonds, with yields on US 10-year Treasury debt down three basis points at 2.75 percent. Borrowing costs also nudged lower in Europe even as the first March reading on euro zone inflation, important data for markets as the European Central Bank looks to wind down its massive monetary stimulus, came in firm at 1.4 percent.

Benchmark Bund yields slipped back under 0.50 percent, just off 2-1/2 month lows hit last week.

MSCI's broadest index of Asia-Pacific shares outside Japan had spent most of its session dithering either side of flat before ending 0.3 percent lower. China's retaliation came after trading hours for Japan's Nikkei, which added 0.2 percent in thin volumes and Chinese blue chips ended down 0.2 percent. South Korea saw the big move, dropping 1.4 percent.

Emerging market stocks, which have proved resilient to trade tensions, tumbled 1.6 percent and turned negative on the year. EMini futures for the S&P 500 were also pointing to New York opening between 1.5 percent and 1.8 percent down. Boeing shares fell 7.2 percent in pre-market trading. China's duties on major U.S. imports included aircraft.

Factories fade

The dollar dropped to 106.14 yen, after edging up from a low of 105.70 on Tuesday. The euro hovered at Economic Co-Operation and Development's head \$1.2287, after easing from a high of \$1.2335 overnight,

while the dollar index was 0.2 percent lower at 90.

"It is not our view to expect risk aversion to sustainably rise, even though nervousness is indeed high," Credit Agricole currency strategist Manuel Oliveri said in the Reuters Global Markets Forum. The Mexican peso and Canadian dollar both held firm after hitting a nearly five-month and five-week highs respectively in recent days on growing optimism about the prospect of a NAFTA trade deal.

Investors also seemed to be keeping their nerve on the global economic outlook after a host of manufacturing surveys (PMIs) showed some slowing, but from lofty levels in many regions. Activity in Japan's service sector also grew at its slowest pace in 17 months last month, British shop prices dropped at the fastest pace for more than a year while Australian February building approvals fell 6.2 percent.

"If global PMIs slow and avoid overheating concerns, that is good for risk appetite. If they slow for 'the wrong reasons' like trade protectionism, that is much more worrying," Deutsche Bank global strategist Alan Ruskin said. "The March data is at the most a very early warning shot for policymakers not to get too complacent on global growth resilience," he said.

Trade wars were a particular concern for developing Asia, where South Korea, Taiwan, Thailand, China, Indonesia, and India reported a slowing in factory

In commodity markets, gold jumped 0.85 percent to \$1,343 an ounce, recovering some of Tuesday's losses. Oil prices slipped with Brent crude futures off 97 cents to \$67.14 a barrel, while U.S. crude fell 98 cents to \$62.51 a barrel. —Reuters

Lebanon hopes to raise billions to keep economy afloat

BEIRUT: Lebanon is hoping to raise billions of dollars at a France-led donor meeting on Friday to stave off an economic crisis in the world's third most indebted country.

Growth in the small Mediterranean country has plummeted in the wake of repeated political crises, compounded by the 2011 breakout of civil war in neighboring Svria.

The Syrian war has sent one million Syrian refugees in flight to Lebanon, a country of only four million before the conflict. The Paris conference comes as Lebanon gears up for its first general elections in almost a decade in May, after parliament renewed its own mandate three times since 2009.

The Middle Eastern country hopes donor countries and financial institutions at the CEDRE conference will help stimulate the economy through investment.

Lebanon hopes to raise "between \$6 billion and \$7 billion in the shape of credit facilities and funds," Nadim Munla, an adviser to Prime Minister Saad Hariri, has said.

Parliament last week adopted a 2018 government budget, projecting a deficit of \$4.8 billion-more than double the deficit in 2011, when Syria's war started. Economist Paul Doueihy says this growing budget shortfall means "the probability of a systemic crisis is now higher than ever". To avoid bankruptcy, the state should "urgently" reduce its spending, he and

'State keeps' spending

"But the state keeps increasing its expenses," Doueihy says.

In July, parliament approved an increase in public salaries, estimated to cost more than \$1 billion per year. Nassib Ghobril, head researcher at Byblos Bank, says the state has also given jobs to 26,000 new employees over the past three years.

In February, the International Monetary Fund warned that Lebanese authorities needed to address "rapidly rising" public debt.

It stood at 150 percent of GDP in 20 the third highest worldwide after Japan and Greece, the international body said. With a budget deficit last year equivalent to more than 10 percent of GDP, the IMF signalled a "critical need for a fiscal consolidation plan" and cuts in

On top of budget trouble, fears remain over the devaluation of the national currency.

The central bank in November drew more than \$800 million from its foreign reserves to maintain the fixed exchange rate of around 1,500 Lebanese pounds to the dollar, in place

But structural factors behind the currency's fragility persist, experts say.

With Lebanon importing more goods and services than it exports, the pound is artificially

overvalued, they say. This is likely to continue with the current account deficit "expected to remain above 20 percent". The pound would be worth much less under a floating exchange rate.

On top of this, banks also cannot lend as much money to the state as before because deposit growth has been down. Deposit growth stood at four percent last year, against 12 percent in 2010 on the eve of the Syrian conflict.

As for increasing revenues, the state in October adopted fiscal measures including increasing VAT to 11 percent to fund its new

erosion of purchasing power, it's difficult to increase taxes further," economist Marwan Barakat says. The state could however fight tax evasion, which stands at an estimated \$4.2 billion per year. With trade war, **US** and China stumble into the **Thucydides Trap**

LONDON: The United States and China have fired the opening shots in a trade war that may be hard to stop. Washington has published a target list of 1,300 items imported from China worth an estimated \$50 billion that would be hit with an extra tariff of 25 percent ("Notice of determination", USTR, April 3).

Beijing has responded with a target list of 106 items imported from the United States worth a similar amount that would be hit by the same ad valorem tariff. The United States has appeared eager to impose tariffs to create leverage and force China into concessions on the bilateral trade deficit, intellectual property protection and forced technology transfer.

President Donald Trump has insisted trade wars are winnable and pushed his officials to increase the scope of the target list. For its part, China has appeared anxious to avert a trade conflict but threatened a proportionate response to any unilateral US action.

Both sides have been careful to leave time for further negotiations in an effort to prevent the tariffs from taking effect. Most investors still seem convinced a last-minute deal can be reached without damaging the world's two largest economies.

The Trump administration has a track record of announcing aggressive and headline-grabbing trade policies and then diluting or abandoning them in the face of stiff opposition and in exchange for comparatively minor concessions.

Trade wars, however, are like real wars in that they are easy to start, but, once underway, the course is unpredictable and they can be difficult to halt. As a result, trade war between the United States and China must be seen as one of the biggest risks to the global economy and commodity prices in 2018 and 2019.

Domestic politics

Neither Trump nor Chinese President Xi Jinping can afford to be seen to lose a trade conflict or make many concessions without securing something in return. Trump made trade a central plank of his presidential campaign in 2016 and faces tough mid-term congressional elections in just seven months. Fair trade and dealing with China's perceived abuses is an important issue for the US president's core supporters and has qualified backing from some elements of the US business community.

In China, Xi has just been re-elected as Communist Party chief and had the constitution changed to allow him to extend his tenure as president based largely on his promise of strong leadership.

Like a real war, the trade measures announced by both sides are largely for domestic political consumption and designed to play to a nationalist audience. Behind the scenes, both sides are trying to negotiate a settlement, and have been leaking some details to the media in an effort to calm concerns about the economic impact. There are plenty of possible options to settle the dispute. The problem is that any compromise must allow both sides to save face. And that will be much harder now that tariffs have been announced.

Both sides are likely to come under business and economic pressure to de-escalate, avoiding a major disruption of global trade and with it the increased likelihood of a recession.

But with the domestic political credibility of the leaders of both countries now on the line, just as in a real war, the scope for a mutually facesaving climb-down has narrowed.

The Thucydides trap

The trade conflict is really just one aspect of the increasing strategic competition between the United States and China. The United States wants to maintain its military, diplomatic and economic superiority over all other countries while China is determined not to accept second place and to achieve parity. The problem has been termed the Thucydides Trap, after the conflict in ancient Greece between Sparta (the incumbent superpower) and Athens (the rising superpower) that led to the Peloponnesian War. The problem of how to manage the rising power of China and its challenge to the superiority of the United States has been evident for two decades (I remember discussing it frequently with colleagues in the late 1990s).

China has appeared anxious to avoid the problem, and the government-run Xinhua news agency has published numerous articles on averting the Thucydides Trap in recent years.

The issue has been extensively discussed by officials, including the president and foreign minister, as well as in opinion commentaries. Even with this level of awareness, however, the two countries have already blundered into the Thucydides Trap on trade.

The list of areas where the two powers are in increasingly pointed strategic competition now covers trade, overseas investment, advanced technology, naval and military armaments.

Intensifying diplomatic competition also covers multiple regions including the South China Sea, Southeast Asia, the Indian Ocean, Central Asia, the Korean peninsula, Africa and Latin America.

There are compelling economic reasons for the United States and China to avoid imposing extensive tariffs on bilateral trade, but both sides face tricky domestic political constraints. —Reuters

Zuckerberg to testify before US House commerce panel on April 11

WASHINGTON: Facebook Chief Executive Mark Zuckerberg will testify before the US House Energy and Commerce Committee on April 11, the panel said yesterday.

Facebook has come under fire in recent weeks after it was revealed that political consulting firm Cambridge Analytica, which worked for US President Donald Trump's campaign, gained access to the personal data of 50 million

"This hearing will be an important opportunity to shed light on critical consumer data privacy issues and help all Americans better understand what happens to their personal information online," the panel's Republican chairman Greg Walden and top Democrat Frank Pallone

Facebook said last month that it hired forensic auditors to probe whether Cambridge Analytica still had the data. The technology company has also faced pressure to do more to stop "information warfare" on its platform.

In February, 13 Russian nationals were indicted for using the website, along with other social media sites, to interfere in the US presidential election. American spy agencies have warned Russia would again try to interfere in the 2018 midterm elections by using social media to spread propaganda.

Zuckerberg said on Tuesday that he agreed "in spirit" with a strict new European Union law on data privacy but stopped short of committing to it as the standard for the social network across the world.

As Facebook reels from a scandal over the mishandling of personal information belonging to millions of users, the company is facing demands to improve privacy and learn lessons from the landmark EU law scheduled to take effect next month. Zuckerberg told Reuters in a phone interview that Facebook was working on a version of the law that would work globally, bringing some European privacy guarantees worldwide, but the 33-year-old billionaire demurred when asked what parts of the law he would not extend worldwide.

"We're still nailing down details on this, but it should directionally be, in spirit, the whole thing," Zuckerberg said. He did not elaborate.

His comments signal that US Facebook users,

many of them still angry over the company's admission that political consultancy Cambridge Analytica got hold of Facebook data on 50 million members, could find themselves in a worse position than Europeans.

The European law, called the General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR), is the biggest overhaul of online privacy since the birth of the internet, giving Europeans the right to know what data is stored on them and the right to have it deleted. Apple Inc and some other tech firms have said they do plan to give people in the United States and elsewhere the same protections and rights that Europeans will gain.

Shares of Facebook closed up 0.5 percent on Tuesday at \$156.11. They are down more than 15 percent since March 16, when the scandal broke over Cambridge Analytica.

Push for data privacy

Privacy advocacy groups have been urging Facebook and its Silicon Valley competitors such as Alphabet Inc's Google to apply EU data laws worldwide, largely without success.

'We want Facebook and Google and all the other companies to immediately adopt in the United States and worldwide any new protections that they implement in Europe," said Jeff Chester, executive director of the Center for Digital Democracy, in Washington.

Zuckerberg said many of the tools that are part of the law, such as the ability of users to delete all their data, are already available for people on Facebook. "We think that this is a good opportunity to take that moment across the rest of the world," he said. "The vast majority of what is required here are things that we've already had for years across the world for everyone." Google and Facebook are the global leaders in internet ad revenue. Both based in California, they possess enormous amounts of data on billions of people.

Google has declined to comment on its plans. When GDPR takes effect on May 25, people in EU countries will gain the right to transfer their data to other social networks, for example. Facebook and its competitors will also need to be much more specific about how they plan to use people's data, and they will need to get explicit consent.

GDPR is likely to hurt profit at Facebook because it could reduce the value of ads if the company cannot use personal information as freely and the added expense of hiring lawyers to ensure compliance with the new law.

Data is central to Facebook's advertising business, and it has not yet sketched out a satisfying plan for how it plans to comply, said Pivotal Research analyst Brian Wieser.

"I haven't heard any solutions from Facebook to get ahead of the problem yet," Wieser said.

Failure to comply with the law carries a maximum penalty of up to 4 percent of annual revenue. It should not be difficult for companies to extend EU practices and policies elsewhere because they already have systems in place, said Nicole Ozer, director of technology and civil liberties at the American Civil Liberties Union of California. Companies' promises are less reassuring than laws, she said: "If user privacy is going to be properly protected, the law has to require it." —Reuters

Telecom Italia urges probe into Mediaset-Sky deal

MILAN: Telecom Italia (TIM) called yesterday for regulators to look into a tie-up between Silvio Berlusconi's Mediaset TV group and Rupert Murdoch's Sky Italia in order to prevent further concentration in the Italian media. The deal could complicate efforts for Telecom Italia's main shareholder, Vivendi, to revive the fortunes of the Italy's former monopoly telecoms provider as broadcasters scramble to acquire content to keep subscribers from defecting to services such as Netflix. Under the deal announced over the holiday weekend by the Italian TV heavyweights nine of Mediaset's Premium pay-TV channels will be made available to Sky Italia subscribers.

"I believe that the authorities will have to examine the alliance carefully so that it does not give rise to a (media) concentration even greater than that existing today," Telecom Italia's chief executive Amos Genish said in the interview with Italian daily La Stampa.

The surprise deal with Sky Italia has given a boost to Mediaset's shares, which have risen by over six percent since the announcement. For the Berlusconi family group, the accord is a lifeline that should help the struggling Premium unit increase its audience and advertising revenues, after a series of setbacks for the platform.—AFP

New treatment for obesity now available in Kuwait

32.1% of adults in Kuwait obese, 72.7% overweight

KUWAIT: Novo Nordisk held a press conference yesterday attended by the Danish Ambassador to Kuwait Oleemil Moesby to launch Saxenda (liraglutide 3 mg), the first oncedaily glucagon-like peptide-1 receptor agonist for chronic weight management in Kuwait. Treated alongside a healthy diet and continued exercise, the new entrant has proven greater improvements in weight loss, including certain cardio metabolic risk factors, and severity of sleep apnoea

According to World Health Organization, around 72.7 percent of adults in Kuwait are currently overweight and 32.1 percent are living with obesity. Many of these people suffer from weight-related comorbidities such as type 2 diabetes and high blood pressure, along with emotional distress and anxiety often associated with this disease.

"It is an extremely interesting day to be present at the conference and it is a reflection of excellent relations between Denmark and Kuwait," Moesby said, adding there have been many discussions since he arrived around two months ago about joint opportunities between Kuwait and Denmark. There are several Danish companies active in Kuwait - some for decades - yet there are more opportunities and additional ways of cooperation between the two nations.

Dr Maryam Al-Dwairji, MD, PhD, Specialist in Clinical Nutrition at the Ministry of Health, commented on the new breakthrough in obesity management in Kuwait: "In the light of the economic, social and behavioral shifts that are taking place in our communities and which has been overshadowed by the negative effects on their health that have contributed in spreading various chronic diseases such as diabetes and cardiovascular disease. These diseases can be prevented through proper nutrition and a healthy lifestyle. Our aim is to provide the best possible healthcare to the general public across the country and to emphasize the important of medical and surgical interventions in obesity management in the line with healthy lifestyle."

Dr Khalil Alshowaiekr, MRCP, obesity and weight disorders specialist at Adan Hospital, said: "Identified by leading international health organizations like WHO, AACE & AMA as a chronic disease requiring long-term management, obesity represents a serious public health issue in Kuwait. Unfortunately very few people with obesity receive weight counseling. Current options available to obese or overweight patients with co-morbidity are limited or include invasive alternatives. Simultaneously, obesity poses a significant burden on the country's finances, whereby WHO estimates that 0.7 percent -2.8 percent of a country's total healthcare expenditure is spent on obesity-related illness. Saxenda, coupled with a stringent



diet and physical activities, is possibly the start to help patients achieve clinically meaningful weight loss.'

Dr Amna Shaghouli, MD, FRCPC, Consultant Endocrinologist at Adan Hospital and Glycemia Clinic in Kuwait, said:" Owing to the need for efficient weight loss solutions in the region, Saxenda provides a simple and effective treatment that is

administered once daily via a subcutaneous injection to increase the feeling of satiety and reduce hunger, thereby decreasing food intake. The clinical trial programs were overwhelmingly positive as Saxenda achieved superior weight loss results wherein one out of four patients treated with Saxenda lost more than 10 percent of their body weight and sustained it! 





Hollywood French film fest showcases women's triumphs

he world's largest festival of French film hits Hollywood this month embracing the #MeToo moment with a line-up dedicated to the country's best female filmmaking talent. The 22nd COLCOA is offering a record 86 films, television shows, digital series and virtual reality experiences, many never seen before in the United States, as well as a handful of international and US premieres. It is the first edition of the annual event since the Harvey Weinstein sex abuse scandal that sparked the #MeToo and Time's Up campaigns, and the program reflects the push to celebrate the work of women.

"Through its different competitions, we are proud to dedicate this year's programming of COLCOA to women, both in their role in the making of the films and series, and their central roles in the majority of the stories selected this year," said executive producer Francois Truffart. Originally styled "City of Lights, City of Angels," COLCOA boasts some 75 entrants for a slew of honors, including the audience award, best documentary, best TV movie, critics award and critics special prize.

With the film industry still reeling from the shock of the sexual harassment and assault firestorm that ended the careers of Weinstein and numerous other powerful Hollywood figures, the female aspect of many COLCOA entrants should resonate on both sides of the Atlantic. These include Oscar-nominated Xavier Legrand's feature debut "Custody," a social realist thriller about a violent abuser

who forces his way back into his ex's life that won best director and debut at the Venice film festival.

'Their problem too'

"The Party is Over," another feature directorial debut, this time from Marie Garel-Weiss, is about two women who bond as they battle drug addiction, becoming inseparable. More than half of the selection of short films are by women, while panels will address the role of women in the French film industry and first films directed by women. Over at the festival's "virtual reality corner," an experience called "Uturn" examines the gender gap from both sides with interwoven stories that allow the viewer to embody either a female or male character.

The experience was created by Nathalie Mathe, a NASA scientist turned filmmaker and VR specialist whose credits include "Persepolis," "The Dark Knight Rises," "Skyfall," "Captain Phillips" and "Fast and Furious 6." "For 50 years women have been told how they should adapt and learn to survive in order to succeed in male-dominated industries like tech and media," she said in a statement about the project. Mathe said that while a few women had risen to the top of their field, the vast majority were still under-represented and under-valued, an assertion borne out in numerous studies of employment patterns in

"Now is the time for changing strategy. Men need to see gender issues as their problem too,

COL-COA also boasts a focus on filmmaker and actress Melanie Laurent ("Inglourious Basterds"), screening her first movie "The Adopted" before a discussion about her career, followed by a US premiere screening of her latest film, "Diving." 'Stronger then death'

religious sanctuary for recovering addicts, "The Prayer," which won newcomer Anthony Bajon best actor at Berlin's film festival. COLCOA is nothing if not glamorous and other big international names sprinkling stardust on the festival include Vanessa Paradis ("Dog"), Gerard Depardieu ("Get Out Your Handkerchief," "The Other Woman"), Charlotte Rampling ("Flesh of the Orchid") and Jean Dujardin ("Return of the Hero"). In the documentary section, highlights include "Nothingwood," which follows the work of Salim Shaheen, a chubby Afghan actor who is his country's one-man film industry.

A gonzo director who has made 111 movies on a shoestring in a country where just watching one can get you killed, he and his endearingly eccentric band of actors are the stars of the documentary. Shaheen regularly dodges minefields and the Taliban, and survived a rocket attack on his studio in 1995 in which nine of his actors and crew died "I am stronger than death," he told AFP at the Cannes film festival. "We Afghans don't worry about death. It will come, we just don't know when."

Alongside the movies, the television competition features 12 series and TV movies, including the international premiere of "Proud," a three-part miniseries dealing with gay rights spanning 30 years in France. COLCOA's growing repertoire of movies and burgeoning popularity-about 25,000 people now attend each year-have seen it become the world's largest festival dedicated to French film, according to its organizers. — AFP



'Wonder Woman' Lynda Carter feted with Hollywood star

for action, "Wonder Woman" television actress Lynda Carter was honored with a star on the Hollywood Walk of Fame on Tuesday as her most famous superhero character enjoys a big-screen revival. Carter, 66, was introduced by longtime friend and CBS Corp Chief Executive Leslie Moonves and Patty Jenkins, the director of last year's blockbuster film "Wonder Woman." "It seems impossible but I have been in entertainment for more than 50 years-do the math," Carter told the audience along Hollywood Boulevard in Los Angeles before the unveiling of the emblematic terrazzo and brass star.

"I have loved it all!" the former Miss World USA exclaimed. Carter's "Wonder Woman" character, which first appeared on the pages of DC Comics in 1941 and debuted as a TV series starring the actress in 1976, is seen as a forerunner to the empowered heroines that are taking center stage in Hollywood. Jenkins, 46, said Carter

TT 7ith her arms crossed and poised inspired her as a girl and showed her that she did not have to choose between being rebellious or feminine, or attractive or strong. "Her Wonder Woman made me believe I could have whatever I wanted, and even more importantly, it made me unashamed to want it," Jenkins said.

"Wonder Woman" was only on US television for three seasons, first on ABC and later on CBS where it finished in 1979. But the series, along with Carter's performance, have given "Wonder Woman" a long legacy as a feminist symbol. At times choking with emotion, Carter thanked her friends and family for their support as well as a nod to the men who helped stand behind women's stories. "From all of the wonder women out there, we love our men who stand with us and champion our causes and our voices, Carter said. "This is a day that I shall never forget," she concluded. The Hollywood Walk of Fame is administered by the Hollywood Chamber of Commerce and is major tourist attraction. — Reuters

S Korea musicians return after rare Pyongyang joint concert

usicians from North and South Korea held hands, sang and cried together at La rare concert held in Pyongyang that ended with an emotional standing ovation by thousands of spectators. The South Korean pop stars returned home yesterday after two concerts in the North's capital this week, the first of which was attended by leader Kim Jong Un who said he was "deeply moved" by their performance. Their visit, part of a cultural charm offensive by Seoul, comes as a diplomatic thaw gathers pace on the peninsula ahead of a landmark inter-Korean summit this month.

The second concert, held Tuesday evening at a packed 12,000-capacity Ryugyong Jong Ju Yong Gymnasium in Pyongyang, saw the North's Samjiyon Orchestra join South Korean K-pop stars on stage, to rapturous applause. "The performers sang of the ardent desire of the fellow countrymen for national reunification hands in hands," reported the North's official KCNA agency. The joint concert stirred the audience as those present "overflowed with compatriotic and warm feelings", KCNA said. Kim, who made a surprise appearance with his wife at the first concert, did not attend Tuesday's performance.

But the crowd responded with louder applause for 61-year-old musician Choi Jin-hee, who sang her 80s hit song "The Maze of Love"reportedly former North Korean leader Kim Jong Il's favorite song. The stadium also reacted enthusiastically when female singers from the two countries jointly performed "Paektu and Halla are My Fatherland", a patriotic North Korean song about reunification. The show culminated with all the musicians joining together to sing the North's "See You Again" and the

Reunification", prompting a standing ovation that lasted more than 10 minutes.

"I think the performance was a success," said Hyon Song Wol, head of the North's art troupe, after the show. "The South Korean singers did really well without any mistake even though they had only half a day to practice," Hyon said. The rapprochement on the peninsula began with the South's Winter Olympics, to which the North's Kim sent athletes, cheerleaders and his sister as an envoy. An inter-Korean summit will be held on April 27. No date has been set for a planned US-North Korean summit although it is expected before the end of May. — AFP

They argued that critics would now have to wait until the day after gala red carpet premieres to see many of the films in the competition. But the French producers union said it backed Fremaux's changes which did away with the tradition of having press previews before the gala premieres. It said they supported the idea of showing "their films in real world premieres before the public and film professionals at the same time". — AFP

SERIOUS MONKEY BUSINESS AT MALAYSIA SCHOOL FOR MACAQUES

pig-tailed macaque yanked at a coconut on a piece of string until it fell to the floor, a small victory for the simian student at a Malaysian school that trains monkeys to harvest fruit for farmers. Thousands of monkeys have been taught the trade over the past four decades by a man known as Grandfather Wan in a small village in the north of the country. For a small fee people across the country send their macaques to the famed school, where they are put on thin chains like leashes, and trained to clamber up palm trees and pick coconuts.

Teaching monkeys to pick fruit has in the past sparked protests from animal rights groups who have denounced it as cruel, but Grandfather Wan-real name Wan Ibrahim Wan Mat-insists he only ever treats his charges kindly. "They are like our children," said the 63year-old, as macaques swung about and screeched in a training area consisting of a cluster of palm trees and some dilapidated wooden platforms for the macaques to climb on. "When they drop the fruits, we show them

He trains southern pig-tailed macaques, a medium-sized monkey found across much of Malaysia, as well as parts of Indonesia and southern Thailand. They are mostly found in the region's rainforests but as their natural habitat has been destroyed by logging and human encroachment, the monkeys have increasingly strayed into villages and cities.

Top-notch coconut pickers

Wan Ibrahim first became interested in macaque training in his early 20s when he spotted the creatures climb up coconut palms to pick the fruit. It was just a hobby to begin with but as he improved, word of his skills spread and people from far and wide started sending their macaques to him in the small village of Padang Halban in northern Kelantan state. Coconuts are big business in tropical Malaysia which produces some 700 million every year and the country is home to countless smallholders some of whom use monkeys to carry out the labor-intensive work of harvesting.

Getting a monkey up to speed as a top-

notch coconut picker can take anything from a few days to a month, depending on the animal, Wan Ibrahim said. But once fully trained they can pick up to 800 coconuts a day, which he said makes his fee of 150 ringgit (\$38) for a full course well worth it. The course has several stages. The first is training a monkey to yank a coconut free that is attached by a piece of

string to a wooden fence-aping the action of pulling one of the fruits from a coconut tree.

The creatures are then trained to pull coconuts from a plank of wood raised a few feet above the ground, and the final stage sees them clambering up palm trees to collect the fruit. Mat Ali Zakaria, a coconut picker and customer from the town of Padang Rengas, more than 300 kilometers (180 miles) away from Padang Halban, praised Wan Ibrahim for his gentle training methods. "I've seen other people training macaques-sometimes if they don't want to take coconuts, the monkeys are dunked into a river," he said. Wan Ibrahim's business won't be around forever-he has slowed down since a stroke two years ago and now gets around with a walking stick. None of his five children are interested in taking over the training center but he said there are other monkey trainers in Malaysia who will continue the work once he retires. Malaysian Animal Welfare Society president Shenaaz Khan said she was not against training macaques as long as it was not cruel,

but raised concerns there was insufficient mon-

itoring of the monkeys once they were returned to their owners. "When you use them as a labor force, they don't have protection. Who's going to look out for them?" she said. — AFP

EVEN MONKEYS NEED A SPA DAY, JAPAN STUDY FINDS

relaxing soak in a hot tub is a timehonored stress reliever but the advantages are not confined to humans-with monkeys also benefiting from spa time, researchers in Japan say. Japan's "snow monkeys" are known for their love of hot springs in the country's northern Nagano region, with tourists flocking to photograph the mediating macaques soaking in steaming baths. It was long assumed that the blissed-out bathers were simply trying to warm up during the chilly winter months, when snow blankets the region.

But experts at the Primate Research Institute at Kyoto University who observed 12 female Japanese macaques in 2014 at the Jigokudani Yaen-Koen monkey park in Nagano found there was more to it. They

examined the bathing behavior of the monkeys and collected their excrement to measure glucocorticoid, a hormone whose concentration increases when stress levels are high. They found that stress levels in the monkeys, aged between five and 24, were about 20 percent lower on average after bathing.

The results of their study were published this week. "The study showed that bathing in hot springs is beneficial not only for people but for Japanese macaques too," researcher Rafaela Sayuri Takeshita told AFP. Takeshita believes the spa treatment may have additional benefits for the macaques, perhaps increasing both fertility and longevity. "We also want to study the relationship between bathing and their reproduction and longevity in the future," she said. — AFP

Replica of bedroom in '2001: A Space Odyssey' on display in Washington

Ilm buffs can now visit a replica of the bedroom depicted in the penultimate scene of "2001: A Space Odyssey" on the 50th anniversary of its release. It has been set up in the National Air and Space Museum in Washington. In the neo-classical bedroom, the spaceman Dr David Bowman sees and then becomes older versions of himself, ending up as an old man in bed and then, as he reaches for a black monolith, a fetus. The exhibit will be open to the public April 8-May 28 and serve as the centerpiece of the museum's celebration of the film's 50th anniversary. The installation is called "The Barmecide Feast."

One thing that stands out is the bright lighting, just like in the film. That way viewers can "appreciate the physical environment around the arti-

facts" in the exhibit such as the bed, chairs, paintings and sculptures, said Martin Collins, a curator at the museum. "For Kubrick it was important not to have extra set lighting but to have lighting built into the scene itself," said Collins. It is the work of British artist Simon Birch and is the museum's way of honoring a film considered one of the best in the history of cinema.

Long before movies like "Star Wars" or "Blade Runner", Kubrick revolutionized science fiction with this film co-written with Arthur C. Clarke. A year before humans set foot on the moon, Collins said, "vou also had a deep preoccupation about the future. It was a moment of time in the 60s, both in the United States and the Soviet Union, where the advances in science and technology were very dramatic." But this progress came with a lot of questions, mainly about the future of humanity, he said, and in some way "2001" addressed them. One of the features of this film honored by a top US museum is its respect for scientific rigor. Unlike in "Star Wars", for instance, the reality of silence in space is respected.

For minutes at a time, viewers are treated to scenes with no sound or dialogue, giving the film a slow, gripping feel. "The space scenes are grounded into the scientific knowledge of the early 60s," said Collins. "There was a high degree of interest on Kubricks' part, and Clarke's, to be accurate in that sense", Collins said. He added: "For the future of humanity, it gets more speculative." — AFP





New York Met returns stolen idols to Nepal

pair of rare idols stolen from Nepal three decades ago were returned to the country yesterday by New York's Metropolitan Museum of Art. The two statues-one of Buddha and the other of the Hindu god Shiva and his wife Parvati-were stolen in the 1980s when rampant looting saw many important artifacts whisked out of Nepal and into the hands of private collectors. "The government was unaware of the whereabouts of the statues until historian Lain Singh Bangdel mentioned (in a book) that the statues were on display at the Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York," Shyam Sundar Rajbanshi of Nepal's Department of Archaeology

The 11th-century Shiva statue, known as the Uma Maheshwor idol, was given to the Met in 1983 while the

Buddha-estimated to be around 700 years old-was donated by a private collector in 2015. The two statues were removed from display after the Met learned they were stolen, local media reported. The statues will now be showcased at the National Museum of Nepal in the capital Kathmandu, Rajbanshi confirmed. Nepal's rich cultural heritage was ravaged by decades of theft from the 1960s to 1980s. Natural disasters and unchecked development also encroached on ancient sites. A devastating earthquake in April 2015 caused extensive damage in the Kathmandu Valley, home to hundreds of sacred Buddhist and Hindu sites. The UN's cultural agency UNESCO warned if not properly conserved those sites could lose their coveted world heritage status. — AFP
