Kuwait rejects breach of laws, but ready to work with Manila

Duterte says Kuwait work ban for Filipinos 'permanent'

KUWAIT/MANILA: Kuwait rejects any breach against its sovereignty or laws and will act decisively against any relevant attempt, Deputy Foreign Minister Khaled Al-Jarallah affirmed yesterday in reference to a diplomatic row with Manila. Jarallah, reacting to remarks by Philippine President Rodrigo Duterte yesterday, said Kuwait was ready to cooperate with Manila to explore all means to address labor issues, including 800 Filipino citizens who are currently in shelters.

Duterte yesterday said the temporary ban on Filipinos going to work in Kuwait is now permanent, intensifying the diplomatic standoff over the treatment of migrant workers in the state. Duterte in February prohibited workers heading to Kuwait following the mur-

der of a Filipina maid whose body was found stuffed in her employer's freezer. The resulting row deepened after Kuwaiti authorities last week ordered Manila's envoy to leave the country over videos of Philippine embassy staff helping workers in Kuwait flee allegedly abusive employers.

The two nations had been negotiating a labor deal that Philippine officials said could result in the lifting of the temporary ban but the recent escalation in tensions has put an agreement in doubt. "The ban stays permanently. There will be no more recruitment for especially domestic helpers. No more," Duterte told reporters in his hometown in the southern city of Davao.

Speaking after a meeting held by Kuwaiti

authorities yesterday regarding the row, Jarallah said Kuwait is keen on maintaining the safety and rights of all expatriates including the Filipino community within the labor laws of the country, which have been praised by international human rights agencies. He appreciated the contributions of Filipinos, who are working in different sectors.

Jarallah said Kuwait shared Duterte's desire to maintain deeply-rooted relations, citing Manila's support of Kuwait during the 1990-91 Iraqi invasion. He said "the historic friendship" between the two countries "could help overcome this exceptional circumstance". Jarallah said Kuwait was looking forward to working with the Philippines to honoring names of staffers suspected of being involved mutual interest.

Around 262,000 Filipinos work in Kuwait, nearly 60 percent of them domestic workers, according to the Philippines' foreign ministry. Last week the Philippines apologized over the rescue videos but Kuwaiti officials announced they were expelling Manila's ambassador and recalling their own envoy from the Southeast Asian nation. Kuwait also detained four Filipinos hired by the Philippine embassy and issued arrest warrants against three diplomatic personnel, Manila said.

The Philippines' ambassador Renato Pedro Villa told AFP on Saturday he will leave Kuwait on Wednesday, adding that he refused to comply with Kuwaiti demands for the Continued on Page 11

Pompeo talks tough on Iran, urges Gulf unity

TEL AVIV: US Secretary of State Mike Pompeo lashed out at Iran during a rapid tour of Middle East allies yesterday ahead of a crucial White House decision on whether to quit the nuclear deal with Tehran. After setting off on his first diplomatic trip only hours after being sworn in, Pompeo met with Saudi and Israeli leaders yesterday, two countries with especially close strategic bonds with the

Both also have a common enemy in Iran, and Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu has repeatedly called for the nuclear deal to either be altered or scrapped, though most world powers see it as key to preventing Tehran from

obtaining atomic weapons. "Iran's ambition to dominate the Middle East remains," Pompeo said while standing next to Netanyahu after their two-hour meeting at defense headquarters in Tel Aviv. He reiterated that US President Donald Trump will withdraw from the nuclear deal with Iran "if we can't fix it"

Netanyahu said "Iran is trying to gobble up one country after the other". "Iran must be stopped," the premier said. "Its quest for nuclear bombs must be stopped. Its aggression must be stopped." Both Netanyahu and Saudi leaders appeared delighted that Pompeo, like US President Donald Trump, included their countries on his first foreign trip since taking office. The former CIA chief and congressman showed similar affection, telling Netanyahu that he was an "incredibly important partner, occupy a special place in my heart too".

Pompeo met earlier yesterday with Saudi King Salman in Riyadh, after dinner on Saturday with Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman. He later flew to Jordan, wrapping up a

weekend of talks with some of Iran's most fervent foes in the region. Pompeo accused Iran of destabilizing the Middle East, including through its support for Syria's President Bashar Al-Assad and for Shiite rebels in Yemen.

"(Iran) supports proxy militias and terrorist groups. It is an arms dealer to the Houthi rebels in Yemen and Iran conducts cyber-hacking campaigns. And it supports the murderous Assad regime," he said at a joint press conference with Saudi Foreign Minister Adel Al-Jubeir. "Unlike the prior administration we will not neglect the essary and we need to achieve it."

Iran's President Hassan Rouhani said the nuclear deal was "not negotiable". "The nuclear deal or any other subject under its pretext is not negotiable in any way," he told his French counterpart Emmanuel Macron in a phone call, quoted by the presidency website. "Iran will not accept any restrictions beyond its commitments."

Qatar to scrap exit system for workers

DOHA: Qatar could agree a deal within a fortnight to abolish its controversial exit visa system which requires workers to obtain their employers' permission to leave the country, labor experts said yesterday. The possibility of a landmark deal came as the International Labor Organization (ILO) opened an office in Doha, part of an agreement under which the United Nations agency will oversee wholesale labor reform by the 2022 World Cup host. "We are looking now about the final details of the exit visa, we expect a deal within the next two weeks," said Sharan Burrow, general secretary of the International Trade Union Confederation and a once-vocal critic of Qatar's labor laws.

Other sources with knowledge of negotiations on the issue confirmed a deal was expected to be announced soon. The exit visa system has long been savaged by critics of Qatar's labor practices as a prime example of the Gulf state's exploitation of its vast migrant workforce, which numbers some two million. Qatar has come under intense international pressure and scrutiny since it won the right to host the World Cup, for which it has said it is spending \$500 million a week on major infrastructure projects.

Labor Minister Issa Saad Al-Jafali Al-Nuaimi, who cut a ribbon at the opening of the ILO office, said the inauguration was "another step towards

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King launches construction of Saudi mega-park

RIYADH: Saudi Arabia's King Salman has launched construction of an "entertainment city" near Riyadh, part of a series of multi-billion dollar projects aimed at helping the oil-dependent kingdom diversify its economy. The project is part of a sweeping reform and investment program dubbed "Vision 2030", the brainchild of Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman, who also attended the launch ceremony at the site on Saturday evening.

Authorities have touted the 334-sq km project in Qiddiya, southwest of the capital, as the kingdom's answer to Disneyland. Its first phase, which includes high-end theme parks, motor sport facilities and a safari area, is expected to be completed in 2022, officials say. They hope the park will draw in foreign investment and attract 17 million visitors by 2030. The kingdom this month hosted its first public film screening in over 35

TV, radio should produce quality programs: Minister



KUWAIT: The replacement committee at the National Assembly confirmed that the government is implementing the 'Kuwaitization' plan during the coming years, with plans to complete it by 2022. Informed sources said a list of expat employees whose jobs will be terminated during the coming fiscal year, which started in April and runs through March 2019, is 3,108 expats in 48 state departments, starting from July.

As for the population structure, the source said Civil

Service Commission sent to the National Assembly the number of citizens who were nominated for employment since 2014, which is 75,476, while 16,468 expats were appointed in the health and education ministries where

no applications by Kuwaitis are available. It said that with the employment of 8,156 citizens in 20 days since the start of April, the country witnessed the largest employment in its history.

The number of citizens working in state departments related to civil service is 256,048 compared to 78,439 expats, 31,362 of whom work in education, 34,789 in health and 2,931 in the Awqaf ministries. The committee rejected in its first report a proposal to commit state departments to submit a report every six months to the National Assembly that includes the number and description of jobs where Kuwaitis were appointed by replacement. Committee rapporteur MP Safa Al-Hashem said the committee proposed finding solutions to eradicate the unemployment problem that is getting worse year after year.

Kuwait Petroleum Corporation (KPC) and its subsidiaries spent KD 18.3 million during the 2017/2018 financial year for medical treatment of expatriate employees and their families at Ahmadi Hospital. Treatment of expats during the past five years in the oil sector cost KD 95 million. The number of expat patients in Ahmadi Hospital has dropped in the past few

years as a large number of workers were transferred to contractors as part of the Kuwaitization process. The number of patients in Ahmadi Hospital dropped from 110,600 in 2013/2014 to 79,700 in 2017/2018.

The latest statistics approved by KPC show that there are 3,000 expat employees in the oil sector in various specialties. Despite

the drop in patient numbers at Ahmadi Hospital during the past five years, the individual cost rose to reach KD 229.5 during the latest fiscal year compared to KD 162.7 during 2013/2014.

Bogus certificates

Education Minister Hamid Al-Azmi said the committee investigating bogus certificates of Kuwait University hasn't completed its job yet, adding that the ministry will send the results to MPs as soon as they are ready. Azmi said the examination mechanism of the certificates goes through the appointment committee at the scientific department, then after checking, it goes to the appointments committee at the college, then to the university appointments committee and deputy university rector for scientific affairs, then it is referred to



Kuwait University rector for approval.

As for the Public Authority for Applied Education and Training (PAAET), Azmi said a ministerial decision was issued to form an investigation committee in the bogus certificates issue, and a report was sent to the public prosecution in this regard. He said none of the authority's leaders have been accused yet and the matter is in the hands of the public prosecution. On

procedures of appointing expats, he said professors and teachers are appointed according to decision 480/2001 with regards to amending the rules and regulations of education and training facilities at PAAET, so contracting with expats professors and teachers will not be considered final until after their degrees are authenticated within three months from the decision's issue.





Speed limit painted on left emergency lanes

They are teachers, doctors, engineers, cleaners, hairdressers and so on - I could go on about the job descriptions of the many Filipinos I meet on a daily basis. 3. Please refrain from keeping passports of employees - it is against the law.

4. Although not stated by the law, please always be kind, as hard as it may be at times.

Minister stresses arbitration's role

KUWAIT: The use of arbitration in administrative judiciary is a concrete step towards ensuring justice, Kuwait's Minister of Justice Dr Fahad Al-Afasi said yesterday. Afasi, who doubles as Minister of Awqaf and Islamic Affairs, made the remarks in a two-day Arab forum over administrative judiciary, which revolves around the application of judicial methods in the settlement of disputes. He highlighted the significance of such events that provide opportunities for judges to discuss crucial matters in the legal realm, pointing out that litigation remains the most established method in resolving disputes.

The Kuwaiti minister spoke of how arbitration represents a viable and reliable alternative to get to the bottom of quarrels, given the simplicity and effectiveness of the procedure. Meanwhile, the president of the Arab Union of Administrative Judiciary Ahmad Abulazam placed emphasis on arbitration as well, saying that the procedure has been in use for as long as the human race existed. He expressed hope that the forum would prove instrumental in promoting a developed legal system across the wider Arab region. — KUNA

Audio systems stolen from six mosques

KUWAIT: The director of Farwaniya governorate's mosque department complained to police about repeated thefts of audio systems from mosques. He said six mosques in Khaitan, Farwaniya and Riggae had their audio systems stolen, adding that the thefts take place during the period between opening the mosque's door and before the azan is made. The Ministry of Awqaf and Islamic Affairs issued an administrative circular that the muezzin should open the mosque's door 15 minutes before azan, and close it 45 minutes after the azan. The mosque will remain open between Maghrib and Isha prayers, while the circular is effective in Jleeb, Khaitan, Riggae and Farwaniya mosques.

Grace period

A security source said the number of expatriates who took advantage of the grace period for residency violators to leave without having to pay fines or correcting their status after paying fines (KD 600 to KD 1,000) is 57,123 expats. The source added that 20,946 expats corrected their status, while 36,177 expats left the country with the possibility of returning back. The source said the number of violating expats is 155,000.

Drug trafficking charges

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N Korea offers to shut nuke test site

Trump presses for full denuclearization

SEOUL: North Korean leader Kim Jong Un plans to invite experts and journalists from the United States and South Korea when the country closes its nuclear test site in May, Seoul officials said yesterday, as US President Trump pressed for total denuclearization ahead of his own unprecedented meeting with Kim. On Friday, Kim and South Korean President Moon Jae-in vowed "complete denuclearization" of the Korean peninsula in the first inter-Korean summit in more than a decade, but the declaration did not include concrete steps to reach that goal.

North Korea's state media had said before the summit that Pyongyang would immediately suspend nuclear and missile tests, scrap its nuclear test site and instead pursue economic growth and peace. Kim told Moon that he would soon invite the experts and journalists to "open to the international community" the dismantling of the facilities, the Blue House said.

"The United States, though inherently hostile to North Korea, will get to know once our talk begins that I am not the kind of person who will use nuclear weapons against the South or the United States across the Pacific," Moon's press secretary Yoon Young-chan quoted Kim as saying. "There is no reason for us to possess nuclear weapons while suffering difficulties if mutual trust with the United States is built through frequent meetings from now on, and an end to the war and non-aggression are promised." Kim said there were two additional, larger tunnels that remain "in a very good condition" at the Punggye-ri test site beyond the existing one, which experts have said had collapsed after repeated explosions, rendering much of the site useless.

Kim's promise shows his willingness to "preemptively and actively" respond to inspection efforts to be made as part of the denuclearization process, Yoon said. To facilitate future cross-border cooperation, Kim pledged to scrap the unique time zone Pyongyang created in 2015. He said the North would

move its clocks forward 30 minutes to be in sync with the South, nine hours ahead of Greenwich Mean Time. Kim also reaffirmed that he would not use military force against the South and raised the need for an institutional mechanism to prevent unintended escalations, Yoon said.



Late Saturday, US President Donald Trump told

Moon in a phone call that he was pleased the leaders of the two Koreas reaffirmed the goal of complete denuclearization during their summit, Seoul officials said yesterday. Moon and Trump agreed on the need for an early summit between Trump and Kim, and explored two to three potential locations, one of which Moon suggested, the Blue House said.

Korea is contingent upon its complete, verifiable, and irreversible denuclearization." Most of the specific commitments outlined in the official declaration signed by Kim and Moon focused on inter-Korean relations and did not clear up the question of whether Pyongyang is willing to give up its arsenal of nuclear weapons and ballistic missiles. Abe's office said yesterday that Trump and Abe highlighted the significance of Pyongyang's taking concrete steps towards denuclearization in their phone call.

Trump had informed Japanese Prime Minister Shinzo Abe that he would urge North Korea to promptly resolve its abductions of Japanese citizens, the White House said. Moon also had a phone call with Abe yesterday and said he had discussed the abduction issue with Kim during the summit "in substantial detail," the Blue House spokesman said. Pyongyang admitted in 2002 to kidnapping 13 Japanese in the 1970s and 1980s to train spies. Five of them returned to Japan, but Tokyo suspects that hundreds more may have been taken.

"Moon relayed Abe's wish for a normalization of bilateral ties to Kim based on the clearing of historical legacy issues, and that Kim expressed his willingness to talk to Japan at any time," the official said. Later on, Moon informed Russian President Vladimir Putin of the summit's outcome in a separate call, and proposed a joint study on trilateral cooperation over rail, gas and power infrastructure involving North Korea, the Blue House said. Putin stressed the need for the summit to lead to trilateral projects, and invited Moon to Russia for a summit and the World Cup in June, Moon's office said. —Reuters

Tunisian Islamist party endorses a Jewish candidate

MONASTIR: Decked out in a striking blue suit and white shirt, matching his political allegiance, Simon Slama rubs shoulders with fellow candidates ahead of Tunisia's municipal elections. Nothing unusual about that-except he is the only Jewish candidate, standing for the Islamist Ennahdha party. A public relations stunt for some; a sign of genuine liberalization for others. But even if Slama fares dismally come the May 6 poll, his candidacy has become a major story in the nation. This will be the first municipal vote since former dictator Zine El Abidine Ben Ali fell from power in 2011. And while Slama looks at ease, joyously clapping hands on the campaign trail in the coastal town of Monastir, the 54-year old sewing machine repairman's decision to run drew fierce initial opposition from loved ones.

"All my family were against my choice. My brother was angry and my wife went days without speaking to me," the candidate tells AFP, with a timid smile and a nervous fidget of the hands. "But I managed to convince them." Slama and his relatives are among the small number of Jews still living in Tunisia. The community in the North African nation has shrunk from several hundred thousand before independence in 1956, to just 1,200 today. While Jews in the country, which is overwhelmingly Muslim, once served as lawmakers and even ministers, they have long since slipped to the margins of politics. Slama believes his candidacy is helping to change all that and has already "removed fears for Jewish Tunisian citizens".

'Ancient family'

Comrades in the Ennahdha party insist Slama is the right man to stand for office in Monastir-a symbolic town for Tunisians as it is the birthplace of Habib Bourguiba, the father of the country's independence. "He comes from an ancient family. He has his roots in Monastir... and he knows the town's problems," says Chokri ben Janet, who heads the party's candidate list in the town. Slama says that

despite its history as an Islamist party he opted for Ennahdha out of political conviction, describing it as "the most active and the most serious on the political scene". "Ennahdha has changed its strategy-it is no longer a religious party, it is a civil party," he says.

The party is a junior partner in a coalition led by President Beji Caid Essebsi and his Nidaa Tounes party. Taking stock from its experience in power after the 2011 revolution, it has worked hard to modernize its image. It opposed a project to criminalize any attempt to normalize relations with Israel; a vote on the proposal was dropped this winter. Now some of its leading candidates are women who don't wear the Islamic veil. All of these changes-including Slama's candidacy-have drawn derision from some political opponents who accuse the group of simple opportunism to bolster its vote. Top Nidaa Tounes official Borhane Bassais called it a "political striptease".

Torah and Quran

Others say that interest in Slama's candidacy highlights that while Jews can practice their religion freely they remain an anomaly in Tunisia-and shows the country still has a long way to go on minority rights. The media frenzy is testament to "this obsession we have of judging (people) on the basis of something so personal as their religious conviction," says Yamina Thabet, an official for Tunisia's Association for the Support of Minorities.—AFP

Migrants at US border ask Trump to have heart

TIJUANA: Olga Caballero and her four children set out from southern Mexico a month ago as part of a US-bound caravan that infuriated President Donald Trump. Now, having reached the border with the wealthy United States on Tuesday, this Honduran woman is asking the anti-immigrant Trump to show compassion and remember that he, too, is a father. Caballero and her children-whose ages range from two to 16 - spent the first night in Tijuana, across the border from San Diego, as part of a caravan of 120 migrants including 50 migras, who arrived on two buses.

including 50 minors who arrived on two buses.

Since the so-called Viacrucis Migrante set out on March 25, or Palm Sunday, these poor and hearty Central Americans have crossed Mexico on foot, on trains and in buses. "My biggest fear was that I would fall asleep and one of my kids would fall from the train. Everybody was crowded up against a railing, and I sat up all night watching them," said Caballero, who is 35. The caravan is a tradition that dates back to 2010 and is designed to draw attention to the plight of destitute Central Americans crossing through Mexico to try to reach the US and the promise of a better life. This time, it set out with 1,000 people, but they have since dispersed, with some now traveling on their own.

Irineo Mujica of the migrant rights group Pueblo Sin Fronteras (People Without Borders) that organized the procession said that some 600 of the original thousand remain grouped together. About half have begun filing papers to stay in Mexico and the other 300 plan to request asylum in the United States. Media coverage of the US-bound caravan triggered a flurry of furious tweets from Trump, who ordered thousands of National Guard troops to the US-Mexican border and called on Mexico to stop the migrants. He also linked the issue of migration to the signing of a revamped North American Free Trade Agreement.

Late Wednesday, the Department of Homeland Security warned the migrants against trying to enter the country illegally or filing false immigration claims, saying they will be arrested if they do. Mexico rejected pressure from Trump. It gave the migrants a one-month transit pass to decide if they want to seek refuge in Mexico, go back home or keep trudging toward the United States. Lisandro Guerrero, a Honduran traveling with his wife, decided to stay in Mexico even though he made it all the way to Tijuana on the border with the US. He will stay in Tijuana seeking work and at some point bring over his nine children. "If they do not want us there," he said of the United States, "why go? It is better to stay in Mexico which is welcoming us with open arms, thanks to God."

Compassion

Caballero had a message for Trump: "I would like him to put his hand on his heart, and I would ask if he has ever been a father. Because only a parent knows what it means to be ready to do absolutely anything for your children." She says she will ask the Americans for asylum because violence from street gangs in Honduras makes life impossible there. "That is why we are here. It is not that we covet another country," she said, her voice breaking with emotion. Among this group there are only about 20 men, including the Honduran Gualdin Omar, 20, who will also ask for asylum to escape the gangs, known in Spanish as "maras."

"Because of the maras you cannot even go out on the street. No one leaves home," said this young farmer, who used to grow corn and beans. Omar says he is sure he will achieve the American dream, and challenged Trump: "I tell Donald Trump to get ready for when we get there." Upon their arrival at the border, the migrants were fed roast chicken, beans, rice and tortillas. Along the way, they found solidarity as people provided them with food and clothing."The good thing is there have been lots of good people who supported us a lot," said Honduran Reina Garcia. Tristan Call, a member of People Without Borders who accompanied these travelers, said Mexicans responded to what he called Trump's "hatred" and bent over backwards to help the Central Americans.—AFP

The Islamists have not been defeated, as Nigeria says, and researchers say ISWA, less extreme than Boko Haram, has evolved into the dominant group. The US map paints a similar picture, with ISWA operating in much of Borno.

military, at a briefing. "We are not interested in the faction, what has that got to do with it?" "They are not a government, they kidnap girls from schools," Agim told Reuters in a separate interview.

The military has announced an operation "to totally destroy Boko Haram locations in the Lake Chad Basin" -ISWA's domain - and end the insurgency within four months. But ISWA has so far proven intractable in its Lake Chad bases, where troops have been unable to make effective inroads, according to a Western diplomat who follows the group. The Nigerian military had "completely lost the initiative against the insurgency," they said. The diplomat said ISWA was ready to cede less important areas because the military cannot hold them. "However, they maintain absolute control over the islands and immediate areas near them where they train, live, etc." —Reuters

Palestinian forum Abbas rivals fume, see power grab

GAZA: Political rivals accused Palestinian President Mahmoud Abbas yesterday of pushing ahead with a rare and disputed national decision-making meeting to tighten his grip on power and sideline them. Abbas has billed today's convening of the Palestinian National Council (PNC), a 700-member assembly within the umbrella Palestinian Liberation Organization, as a chance to forge a united front against Israel and the United States.

But the event in Ramallah, the Palestinian hub in the Israeli-occupied West Bank, has revived old feuds between Abbas's Fatah party and rivals from Islamist and other factions, many of whose members cannot attend due to Israeli restrictions. Last week, 109 PNC members urged Abbas to postpone the meeting to allow greater participation. The call went unheeded, and yesterday, censure of the president became more pointed.

"The PNC meeting that will be held in Ramallah is not legitimate, is factional, and does not represent all of the Palestinians," Mushir Al-Masri, a lawmaker with the Islamist group Hamas, told reporters at a meeting of PNC critics in Gaza. The Gaza Strip, under de facto Hamas control since 2007, has been a focus of Palestinian infighting. Though Hamas formally resubmitted to Abbas's authority last year, their reconciliation has been held up by disputes over power-sharing. "We stress the need to regain Palestinian unity and end the policy of exclusion and unilateralism by the leadership of the Palestinian Authority and its hijacking of Palestinian institutions," said Masri.

Khader Habib of Islamic Jihad, a Hamas political ally, accused Abbas of "holding the PNC meeting to stress his

exclusion of all those who oppose him". "The president is keen for the conference to bring about only decisions that suit his own project," Habib told Reuters. Hamas and Islamic Jihad oppose Abbas' strategy of peace talks with Israel. However, diplomacy has been on hold since 2014 and many Palestinians' views have hardened over US President Donald Trump's recognition late last year of Jerusalem as Israel's capital.

The PNC last met in extraordinary session in 2009 to

replace several members of the PLO's Executive Committee. It last held a regular session in 1996. Political analysts in Gaza said a PNC meeting without wide factional representation would weaken the legitimacy of any decisions it may take. Earlier yesterday, dozens of masked vouths gathered on the Palestinian side of the Gaza Strip's main crossing with Israel, threatening to block any PNC official from leaving for the West Bank to attend today's session.—Reuters

Nigerian president's US visit to focus on security, economy

LAGOS: Nigerian President Muhammadu Buhari is to meet President Donald Trump in Washington today, the first African leader to be received by Trump's White House administration. All eyes will be on Trump after he earlier called African nations "shithole" countries, a damaging remark he has since denied. Trump's relationship with the continent suffered a further setback in March when former secretary of state Rex Tillerson was fired while in Nigeria on his first trip to the continent. As a result, the visit revealed little about Trump's Africa policy.

Buhari's visit comes after Trump met German Chancellor Angela Merkel on Friday and French President Emmanuel Macron last week to discuss the contentious Iran nuclear deal and biting trade sanctions. According to a White House statement, the talks will focus on fighting terrorism and insecurity, economic growth and democratic development in Nigeria, set to hold presidential polls in February next year. Nigeria is entering its ninth year fighting Boko Haram extremists, who have devastated the northeast of the country and killed over 20,000 people in a bloody quest to establish an Islamist state.

Buhari is also battling a so-called herdsmen crisis, a sectarian conflict hardening along religious lines that has claimed scores of lives this year in escalating violence. "I think both sides have a clear agenda in this meeting and it's security and economic issues. They both have something to gain," J. Peter Pham, director of the Africa Center at the Washington-based Atlantic Council said. "On President Trump's side, it's definitely putting that controversy behind him," Pham said. "On President Buhari's side, it's having the prominence of being the first African leader received at the White House in this administration.

Improved relations

In spite of Trump's remarks, Nigeria's relationship with the United States has improved since he came into office, according to Lauren Blanchard, African affairs specialist



with the Congressional Research Service. "(The visit) is intended to signal that the United States continues to see Nigeria as one of its most important partners on the conti-

"Cooperation has improved over the course of President Buhari's tenure but not as fast as both sides would like," she added. Buhari, who like Trump has a tendency to make gaffes, had lambasted former President Barack Obama shortly after coming into office for refusing to sell Nigeria weapons to fight Boko Haram. "Unwittingly, and I dare say unintentionally, the application of the Leahy Law Amendment by the United States government has aided and abetted the Boko Haram terrorists," Buhari said during a visit to Washington.

Under the legislation, the US is prevented from offering weapons or training to countries where there is credible information of human rights abuses by authorities. In contrast, Trump's administration has gone ahead with the reported \$496 million sale of up to a dozen Super Tucano aircraft, a plane with surveillance and attack capabilities, set to be delivered in 2020. The deal has recently come under scrutiny in Nigeria, a country with endemic corruption, where lawmakers are accusing the president of illegally withdrawing funds to purchase the planes.

While no major trade announcements are expected, Trump and Buhari will also be talking about ways to deepen economic cooperation. "There is the security element and the economic element that dovetails with Trump's agenda to push American business," said Pham. Buhari, who is seeking re-election in 2019, is likely to play up his administration's agriculture reforms and underline his commitment to democracy. —AFP

Questions mount over bloodshed in C African capital

BANGUI: Nearly three weeks after more than two dozen people were killed in the worst fighting in the Central African Republic's capital since 2015, what happened on that fateful day remains clouded by contradictions. On April 10, hours-long clashes unfolded in a mainly Muslim flashpoint district, sparking a wave of anger at UN peacekeepers tasked with shoring up the volatile nation. According to the UN mission MINUSCA, the fighting began when a joint patrol of Rwandan UN troops and the Central African army (FACA) was attacked on the outskirts of the mainly Muslim PK5 district as they pursued a security sweep against militia groups.

Hospital workers say 27 people were killed and more than a hundred injured a toll that mounted over several days as casualties were brought in. One of the fatalities was a UN soldier. In a dramatic protest, local people brought in 17 bloodied corpses with bullet wounds the day after the killing and laid them in front of the UN base in the centre of Bangui. They said the fatalities were simply unarmed civilians-a version fiercely contested by MINUS-CA, which is struggling to overcome accusations of inaction and sexual abuse by some of its troops in the past.

"We need to find out if it was the peacekeepers or the FACA who shot these people, and if so, whether they were unarmed civilians or fighters," said an observer, speaking on condition of anonymity. One of the UN's most ambitious peacekeeping operations, MINUSCA deployed 12,000 troops and police to CAR, which exploded into bloodshed after the 2013 overthrow of longtime leader Francois Bozize by a mainly Muslim rebel alliance, the Seleka. Bozize's successor, Faustin-Archange Touadera, elected in 2016, can only claim to control a fraction of the country-the rest is in the sway of ex-rebels and vigilante militias. One of the fatalities on April 10 was Oumar Ibrahim Bachir. "He was just a trader," his uncle, Zubeir, told AFP last Monday. "That day, he went out to buy medicine for his child at the Sambo pharmacy. —AFP

Actress 'sex-for-rent' claim sparks debate

ACCRA: An actress who said women needed men to take care of them has sparked fierce debate in Ghana and widened the focus about sexual harassment in the country. Moesha Boduong said the economy was so bad in Ghana that she was forced to have a relationship with a married man in order to pay her bills. "You just need someone to take care of you. You can't make enough money as a woman here," Boduong told CNN in an interview aired recently in the United States.

Boduong has since been pilloried by high-profile Ghanaians for her comment and quickly apologized, saying her experience was "not a reflection of what happens in most homes". But the interview struck a nerve in the conservative West African nation, where sexual harassment is an issue but is rarely talked about. "Sex-for-marks" scandals regularly make the news in Ghana and in nearby Nigeria.

Nigerians are currently following the case of a female student who recorded a conversation with a university lecturer, who demanded sex in exchange for good marks. The student says he failed her because she refused. "The angst that has greeted this scandal is not misplaced," columnist Monday Philips Ekpe wrote in the ThisDay newspaper on Friday. "Stories about lecturers who seek to satisfy their sexual passion not minding the mental and emotional trauma their victims suffer are common. "These unscrupulous men sometimes refer to the girls as 'bush meat'.'

'Victim blaming'

In Ghana, an investigation has been launched into allegations that high school girls in the central Ashanti region were sexually harassed by their school staff. Maame Akua Awereba, a representative of activist group Pepper Dem Ministries, told AFP there was a pervasive gender power imbalance in Ghana that needed to be addressed. "Look at the system, that is what gives men the power and gives girls the need to do these things for money for things as basic as rent." Awereba said sexual harassment was widespread across Ghana. "Their lecturers are harassing them to sleep with them to get the marks," she said. In a 2011 study published in the Cambridge Journal of Education, researchers found the most common form of sexual harassment at two Ghanaian universities was sex-for-grades.

Dilys Sillah, the founder of a sexual abuse awareness non-profit operating in London and Accra, said Boduong's comment reflected Ghana's hierarchal society. Those with status and power are protected, said Sillah, explaining that often victims do not see the point in speaking out. "There are people when they commit certain crimes no-one will come out and say anything. You may even find situations when other victims may be involved but they will not speak out." In the case of sex-for-grades, women are often seen as responsible. "Until we recognize child sexual exploitation is real and it's a crime we will continue to victimblame," said Sillah. "We need to put the responsibility on the adult." Earlier in April, two Ghanaian sisters were jailed after they assaulted a lecturer who demanded sex to boost their marks.

Speaking outFor many people in Ghana, the time is right for the country to have a #MeToo movement, following the lead of women who have spoken out after suffering sexual mistreatment by men. George Ossom-Batsa, a professor of religion at the University of Ghana, said Boduong should be praised for her honesty. "Instead of condemning her she needs to be given credit for making society aware of what is actually happening on the ground," he said. "It's only in that way that the ills in society could be fought or addressed." Eve Akagbo, a 27-year-old copywriter living in Accra, said she was aware of the "sex-for-marks" issue in Ghana. She said she believes that hard work is enough but is sympathetic to others who feel the need to look to a man for support. In her eyes, it's a "personal choice."— AFP


Book sparks renewed interest in US murders

LOS ANGELES: US detectives analyzed DNA to capture the former policeman alleged to be the notorious "Golden State Killer" but it was a book that sparked renewed interest in the murders. "I'll Be Gone in the Dark," a chilling true-crime bestseller by Michelle McNamara, was published after she died suddenly in her sleep in 2016, and is to be adapted into a documentary series for HBO.

Joseph James DeAngelo, 72, arrested after a 40-year search, was charged Friday with the 1978 murders of a newlywed couple shot dead in Rancho Cordova, a suburb of California's capital Sacramento. He is a suspect in 10 other murders committed in California between 1976 and 1986, according to authorities, while the Golden State Killer has been linked by DNA or other evidence to more

than 50 rapes.

"Think you got him, Michelle," McNamara's husband, the entertainer Patton Oswald, tweeted following the arrest on Tuesday, with horror writer Stephen King and the actor Rob Lowe also praising her steadfast work. It was the latest in a string of stalled or dead cases



'Marketing matters'

The author, who could almost have passed for Jodie Foster's FBI trainee Clarice Starling in "The Silence of the Lambs" (1991), set out her theory in a 2013 article for Los Angeles magazine that "marketing matters" in the solving of murders. The authorities had entrusted her with a neighborhood plan found at the scene of

one of the crimes, likely drawn by the killer, in the correct calculation that the story would prompt calls. Paul Holes, a now-retired Contra Costa County District Attorney's Office investigator whom McNamara contacted for her book, considered her "an investigative partner," he told CBS news magazine show "48 Hours" last year.

"It was nice to be able to talk to someone who knew as much about the case, and that she could talk the case with me and rattle off things," added Erika Hutchcraft, of the Orange County District Attorney's Office, on the same program. McNamara came up with the "Golden State Killer" moniker for her quarry, whom she suspected was military or police-trained, given his ability to handle weapons and the care he

took to wear gloves. She wrote that she had come to know almost everything about the killer, from his blood type to his penis size-"conspicuously small"-and that he was built "like a runner or a swimmer."

"One victim's phone rang 24 years after her rape. 'You want to play?'

a man whispered. It was you. She was certain," McNamara said in her book, addressing the killer directly. "You played nostalgic, like an arthritic former football star running game tape on a VCR. 'Remember when we played?' I imagine you dialing her number, alone in a small, dark room, sitting on the edge of your twin bed, the only weapon left in your arsenal the firing up of a memory, the ability to trigger terror with your voice."

Even though satisfied that the police would eventually use advances in science to flush out the killer, the insomniac author had become exhausted, taking powerful anti-anxiety drugs that contributed to her death. "He can't hurt me, I say, not realizing that in every sleepless hour, in every minute spent hunting him and not cuddling my daughter, he already has," McNamara



wrote. Launched in December 2015, Netflix's "Making a Murderer" featured the 2007 killing of Teresa Halbach in Wisconsin, for which Brendan Dassey was convicted. The series raised questions about the US legal system and prompted many to believe Dassey and his uncle Steven Avery were wrongly convicted of the killing.

A federal court in Wisconsin found in 2016 that Dassey, over the course of multiple interviews, had been tricked into confessing-both by police and an unsympathetic private investigator working for his defense attorney. Business magnate Robert Durst was arrested three years ago in a New Orleans hotel room hours before the final episode of the six-part HBO investigative documentary "The Jinx: The Life and

Deaths of Robert Durst." The series delved into the disappearance of his wife in 1982 as well as the killing of his friend Susan Berman in 2000 and the 2001 death of a neighbor in Texas who was found dismembered.

Perhaps the greatest "real crime" hit of all, the "Serial" podcast from the team behind public radio show "This American Life," raised doubts over Adnan Syed's conviction for the 1999 murder of his ex-girl-friend. Journalist Sarah Koening's investigation, one of the most downloaded podcasts in history, highlighted shortcomings in the police probe and the work of Syed's lawyer. Last month, an appeals court ordered a new trial, finding that Syed, 37, had received ineffective counsel and ruled that his 2000 conviction can be vacated, subject to an appeal by the state.—AFP

Armenia opposition stages show of force ahead of election

YEREVAN: Supporters of Armenia's protest leader Nikol Pashinyan took to the streets yesterday, hoping that a massive show of force will propel the opposition leader to power in a key election in two days. Flagdraped demonstrators blocked intersections, sang songs, played music and chanted slogans in support of Pashinyan in the capital Yerevan. "We are witnessing a decisive moment," said Arut Khachatryan, a 17-year-old high school pupil, adding that the ruling Republican Party should quit politics.

Vartan Madatyan, a 34-year-old accountant, added: "We will continue protests until the people's candidate comes to power." I hope that the Republicans will have enough common sense not to cling to power, and vote for Nikol." Ex-Soviet Armenia has been in the grip of a severe political crisis for the past two weeks, with the country's veteran leader Serzh Sarkisian stepping down after a decade in power in the face of major protests. Opposition lawmaker Pashinyan, 42, has thrown down the gauntlet, saying his colleagues in parliament should elect him to succeed Sarkisian as prime minister in Tuesday's vote.

Crunch time

On Saturday, after days of frantic negotiations, two major parties said they would back Pashinyan, but he was still six votes short of the 53 he needs from the 105-seat legislature. He needs the backing of some members of the ruling Republican Party, which has 58 seats. The party has said it will wait until all candidates are nominated by Monday and then decide who to back. Pashinyan-who is the leader of the small Civil Contract party-has been the only candidate nominated for the country's top job so far. Eduard Sharmazanov, vice speaker of parliament and the ruling party's spokesman, has said he personally doubted that Pashinyan was a suitable candidate.

In a bid to break the deadlock and drum up support, Pashinyan also called on his supporters to stage a major rally yesterday evening. "Our fantastic rallies and meetings across the country have affected the situation in a powerful way," he told supporters in a video address. "Everything will be fine, we just need to consolidate our victory." The Prosperous Armenia Party, which holds 31 seats, threw its weight behind Pashinyan on Saturday. A smaller party, the Armenian Revolutionary Federation, quit the ruling coalition and said it would also back the opposition leader.

'Rats from a sinking ship'Some analysts said they expected a number of

Republican Party lawmakers to defect and give their votes to the protest leader, sealing his victory. "I am sure that at least six people from the Republican Party - like rats from a sinking ship-would vote for Pashinyan," said analyst Ervand Bozoyan. Observers have expressed fears that the turmoil could destabilize the Moscow-allied nation which has been locked in a territorial dispute with Azerbaijan for decades. Moscow has urged compromise and Russian President Vladimir Putin earlier this week spoke by phone with the interim head of government, stressing the importance of the upcoming election.—AFP

London voters to punish PM, party

LONDON: Voters in London are expected to punish Prime Minister Theresa May's Conservative Party at local government elections this week which could embolden critics of her Brexit strategy, but are not expected to trigger her downfall. London and some other regions will on Thursday elect the local officials in charge of day-to-day public spending – a vote as much about issues like refuse collection and road repairs as it is about the national debate on immigration and May's plan to take Britain out of the European Union after a 2016 referendum.

The elections are seen as a bellwether of public sentiment and polls show voters are ready to deliver a critical verdict on both May's leadership and her party's eight years spent pursuing a policy of public spending cuts to shore up Britain's finances. "A government that's been in power for eight years with an austerity program is naturally going to suffer at elections," said Robert Hayward, a former Conservative lawmaker who now sits in parliament's upper house and specializes in polling analysis.

A YouGov survey published on April 26 gave the opposition Labor Party, led by Jeremy Corbyn, a 22 percentage point lead over the Conservatives in London, putting it on course for its best performance in the capital for 40 years. Thursday's vote will come less than a year after a snap parliamentary election splintered the previously rock-solid foundations of May's position, stripping her party of its majority in a vote she had expected to win easily.

Thessaloniki subway dig unearths secrets of 'city under the city'

THESSALONIKI: Shovels and brooms in hand, some two dozen workmen trudge around the remains of an ancient villa, deep beneath the bustle of modern-day Thessaloniki. Suddenly, one of them breaks away to deliver the latest find-a small clay head of a hook-nosed, bearded man with an ugly grin. "Probably a votive offering," notes the junior archaeologist on duty. A 15-year subway project in Greece's northern metropolis, scheduled to be completed in 2020, has shed light on unknown facets of daily life in the 2,300-year-old city's history. The excavation has brought to light Thessaloniki's central 6th-century highway and other urban works, filling in gaps in the city's long history for archaeologists.

"We did not know such important urban changes had

been carried out in this era, probably under (Byzantine Emperor) Justinian," said Polyxene Adam-Veleni, head of the culture ministry's Thessaloniki antiquities department. "We were surprised to discover the road in such exceptional condition. This phase of the city's history was mostly unknown to us," she told AFP. Other finds such as the villa are older, dating to the late fourth century AD. On the floor of the villa's hot bath, archaeologists found a gold ring. "It was probably dropped by a young woman who made the mistake of taking her jewelry into the baths," a site archaeologist said.

Trade hub for centuries

Built in the fourth century BC and named after the half-sister of Alexander the Great, Thessaloniki was an important hub of the Roman Empire and later became the second city of the Byzantine Empire. It continued to grow under the Ottoman Empire with the arrival in the 15th century of thousands of Sephardic Jews expelled from Spain. The excavation has turned up over 300,000 items of importance, including 50,000 coins, in addition to two marble plazas, a 15-metre (nearly 50-foot) fountain and an early Christian

The result of that general election has been a weakened leadership, open dissent among Conservative lawmakers over exiting the EU and a nagging fear for some investors that her government could fall and be replaced by socialist-led Labor. Thursday will not directly affect May's practical ability to govern: the vote does not cause seats in parliament to change hands and the slim working majority she has thanks to a deal with a smaller party will be unaffected.

But a below-par performance will embolden critics in her party and could then complicate the already-difficult task of executing her Brexit plan without making concessions to pro-EU factions, such as agreeing to stay in the EU customs union. "Politicians always look at the last set of election results and by definition they're going to look at what happens on May 3 and make a judgment on that," Hayward said. "It will have an impact on what has to happen in the budget, 'Do I take a more militant view in relation to the Customs Union, or Brexit, or nurses, or numbers of policemen?""

The key results in London will be Wandsworth and Westminster, both boroughs with a strong Conservative tradition that are now within reach of Labor. However, anything short of a total Conservative wipeout is not expected to generate renewed calls for her to quit. Although her party is deeply divided over Brexit, neither the faction that seeks a clean break from the EU nor those who favor a closer relationship have shown an appetite for a leadership contest before Britain has left the bloc.

Low expectations

Fortunately for May, expectations are low. London has in recent decades voted more towards Labor, favoring its more lib-

eral policies on immigration and social issues. The Conservatives currently control only eight of 32 boroughs outright. Labor's surprise surge in popularity under Corbyn, a crucial factor in May 2017's election flop, was also strongly felt in London. The party won 54.5 percent of votes in London last year - more than any other party for at least 70 years. Factor in deep spending cuts overseen by May and her predecessor David Cameron, and the unpopularity of Brexit in a city that voted 60-40 against it compared with a 52-48 percent margin in favor nationally, and some of the remaining Conservative strongholds are expected to be under threat.—Reuters

church. Alongside the stone-paved road, the Decumanus Maximus, crews also found the remains of mud-bricked workshops where jewelers plied their trade-as they still do today, in blocks of flats above the subway dig.

Golden wreaths and jewellery were also found in over 5,000 graves and tombs along the subway route, but it was another, more humble discovery that excited archaeologists, Adam-Veleni said. "We found vessels shaped like hand grenades. Initially we couldn't figure out their purpose. Then we realized they were used to store mercury for the making of jewelry," she said. "This plain object was extremely valuable to us. Because ultimately it gave us the interpretation that it was used in these workshops," Adam-Veleni said.

The subway's construction was commissioned in 2003, with work beginning three years later. It should have been completed in 2012. But the project stalled amid debate on how to best preserve the antiquities found, says Yannis Mylopoulos, chairman of state subway builders Attiko Metro. The archaeological excavations alone cost over 75 million euros (\$93 million), according to the company. "The city was called to decide, metro or antiquities? This was a false dilemma... we are doing both. —AFP

Armenia's street protests pose no danger to Kremlin

MOSCOW: The Kremlin is famous for its hatred of "color revolutions" but Armenian protests present no danger to Moscow because the rallies eschew anti-Russian slogans and Yerevan is hugely dependent on Moscow's military and economic aid. Over the past days Moscow has conspicuously sought to distance itself from a political crisis in Armenia which saw the country's leader Serzh Sarkisian ousted this week from his new post of prime minister after serving a decade as president.

Even on Thursday, as top Russian officials led by Foreign Minister Sergei Lavrov welcomed Armenian officials for talks in Moscow, the Kremlin insisted that the crisis remained the South Caucasus country's domestic affair. Analysts said that no matter who eventually comes to power in Armenia, he will maintain close ties to Russia. "The Russian leadership proceeds from the fact that Armenia will stay with Russia under any political regime," Konstantin Kalachev, head of the Political Expert Group think tank in Moscow, told AFP.

"Armenia's key problem is a security problem, the threat of major war with Azerbaijan," he said, adding that Armenia would be closely tethered to Russia until a territorial dispute over Nagorny Karabakh was solved. "And it will never be solved," he added. Azerbaijan and Armenia have for decades been locked in a bitter dispute over Nagorny Karabakh, a breakaway statelet with an Armenian ethnic majority that is internationally recognized as part of Azerbaijan. Frequent exchanges of fire along Karabakh's volatile frontline has been a persistent problem and the risk that Azerbaijan could use the crisis in Armenia to its advantage has not been lost on politicians in Yerevan and Moscow.—AFP

From dead voters to blackouts: Malaysia braces for 'filthy' poll

Malaysian activists gear up to battle widespread cheating

KUALA LUMPUR: "Phantom" voters, electoral roll tampering, mysterious power blackouts during recounts-Malaysian activists are gearing up to battle widespread cheating at what they fear will be the dirtiest election in the country's history. Prime Minister Najib Razak is facing a tough test at the May 9 poll due to a corruption scandal surrounding state fund 1MDB, discontent over rising living costs, and a challenge from veteran ex-leader Mahathir Mohamad.

While vote-rigging has plagued previous Malaysian elections, observers fear the high stakes mean that cheating by the long-ruling Barisan Nasional (BN) coalition will be more rampant than ever before. In response, opposition and civil society groups are training poll mon-

itors to prevent fraud, while leading electoral reform group Bersih has set up an online platform to report instances of alleged rigging.

"This election is not just dirty, it is filthy," Bridget Welsh, a Malaysia expert from John Cabot University, told AFP. "Najib's insecurity is delegitimizing the electoral process." Even before a single ballot has

been cast, Bersih lamented the poll had descended into an "open auction with votes for sale" due to local leaders-mainly from BN but also the opposition-giving out cash and gifts such as TVs and food hampers. Concerns have been raised about the electoral roll, with Bersih saying that it had so far received over 80 complaints from the public. These include reports of so-called "phantom" voters, such as people who have died but still appear on the list, or people whose names have appeared without them registering.

At the last election in 2013, when BN lost the popular vote for the first time since Malaysia gained independ-

ence from Britain in 1957, there were numerous allegations of cheating. There were reports of "dubious" voters including foreigners being flown into key constituencies in Malaysia to vote for BN. Supposedly indelible ink, used in a Malaysian general election for the first time and touted by the government as a guarantee against multiple voting, was found to wash easily off people's fingers. Sudden electricity blackouts at polling centers were also experienced during vote recounts, fuelling suspicions of ballot tampering-something the ruling coalition denied.

There are some instances of alleged poll rigging that it is already too late to fight. In March the government pushed a redrawing of electoral boundaries through parliament, in a move that critics say unfairly favors the ruling coalition by creating constituencies dominated by their Muslim Malay supporters.

'Even opposition can win'

BN however insists that Malaysian elections are conducted fairly. "There's no such thing as cheating here... In our system, even the opposition can win," Information Minister Salleh Said Keruak told AFP. Najib is tipped to retain power at the election. Critics say this will be partly due to vote rigging but admit other factors such as a robust domestic economy will help him. Still the presence of 92-year-old Mahathir, who is heading the opposition, has made life more difficult for him.

Mahathir came out of retirement to take on Najib, his former protege, in response to the 1MDB scandal, which allegedly saw billions looted from the state fund in a campaign of fraud and money-laundering. Najib and 1MDB deny any wrongdoing. While Mahathir has predicted enormous cheating, critics say this is rich coming from a man who faced numerous accusations of fraud at polls during his own time in office. However, Welsh from John Cabot University said that vote-rigging has become more serious under Najib: "Elections are supposed to be a contest-Najib wants it to be a beating." —AFP

Thrifty at 50: Pakistan keeps ageing Mirages flying

KAMRA: The sprawling complex at Kamra, west of Islamabad, reverberates at the thundering take-off of a Mirage Rose-1, the latest ageing fighter jet to have been gutted and reassembled by the Pakistani Air Force. Fifty years after Pakistan bought its first Mirages, many planes in the venerable fleet are still being patched up, overhauled and upgraded for use in combat, years after conventional wisdom dictates they should be grounded. That includes one of the first two planes originally purchased from France's Dassault in 1967, which was in a hangar at Kamra after its record fifth overhaul when AFP visited recently.

The techniques they have developed are reminiscent of-but far more high-tech and lethal than-the improvised methods used to keep classic American cars running on the streets of Havana. "We have achieved such a capability that our experts can integrate any latest system with the ageing Mirages," says Air Commodore Salman M Farooqi, deputy managing director of the Mirage Rebuild Factory (MRF) at the Kamra complex.

Pakistan bought its first Mirages to diversify its fleet, which in the late 1960s largely consisted of US-built planes: F-104 Starfighters, T-37 Tweety Birds and F-86 Sabres. The Mirage became a popular choice, with the Air Force buying 17 different variants in later years, eventually owning the second-highest number of the fighter jets after France. They performed bombing missions during Pakistan's failed war with India in 1971 - one of the shortest conflicts in history, lasting just 13 days and leading to the creation of Bangladesh.

But Mirages flew on, also carrying out reconnaissance missions in India, and intercepting and shooting down Soviet and Afghan planes that violated Pakistani



airspace during the Soviet war. Usually the jet has two or three life cycles, each spanning around 12 years. But overhauling them abroad was expensive for Pakistan, a developing country whose budget is already disproportionately tilted towards its military and which has historically received billions in military assistance from countries such as the US. So, with the help of experts from Dassault, the air force decided if you want something done for the right price, you've got to do it yourself.

Makeover

The Mirage Rebuild Factory was established at the Pakistan Aeronautical Complex (PAC) in 1978, and in the years since has saved "billions" of dollars for Pakistan, according to Group Captain Muhammad Farooq, in charge of one of the maintenance hangars-though he said the exact figure was difficult to pin down.

The planes take some seven weeks to be overhauled and repainted, he said, adding that usually the MRF has the capacity for more than a dozen planes a year. Its calendar for the next decade or so is already booked up. At least eight different Mirage variants, including the Mirage 5-EF, Mirage III-DP and Mirage-III Rose-I, were in one of the maintenance hangers when AFP visited. Engineers and technicians were dismantling cockpit instrument panels and landing gear while undertaking a "non-destructive inspection", essentially an X-ray to detect faults in the wings and airframe.

Dozens of engines awaiting overhaul were piled in one hangar. Even planes that had suffered accidents such as fires breaking out have been patched back together at the facility. Pakistan has also been buying up discarded Mirages from other countries to bring through the facility, said retired Air Marshal Shahid Lateef. The most important technological improvement, developed with the help of South Africa, is the ability to integrate air-to-air refueling, Farooqi said. The "identification of friend and foe" (IFF) system, which detects when a Mirage has been locked on to by the system of another plane, was also a key development, he said.—AFP

Outrage as WWII sex slave memorial removed in Manila

MANILA: Advocacy groups voiced outrage yesterday after a memorial to women forced to work as sex slaves to Japanese soldiers during World War II was taken down in Manila. City authorities said the bronze sculpture of a blindfolded woman, which was on a bayside promenade in the Philippine capital, was removed Friday to make way for a drainage and footbridge project. However, advocacy groups for the memory of so-called "comfort women" wondered whether the Philippine government had yielded to Japanese displeasure over the memorial.

While Japan occupied the Philippines during the war, it is now one of the Philippines' top investors, trading partners and aid donors. After the statue was installed in January, some two kilometers from the Japanese embassy, Tokyo said the move was "very unfortunate". "The Japanese government is working hard... they also wanted to get rid of a similar statue in New Jersey," said Rechilda Extremadura, executive director of Lila Pilipina, an organi-

zation of comfort women survivors and advocates. "This is a desecration of Filipino women's dignity as it casts a foul insult on hundreds of Filipina sex slaves victimized under the Japanese occupation," women's group Gabriela said.

Manila's public works department could not be reached for comment and the Japanese embassy in the Philippines did not immediately respond to an email. Historians say up to 200,000 women, mostly from Korea but also other parts of Asia including the Philippines and China, were forced to work in wartime military brothels for Japanese invasion troops. The number of Philippine women involved is believed to number in the hundreds. Activists have in recent years set up dozens of statues in public venues around the world, many of them in South Korea, in honor of the victims.

The statues have drawn the ire of Tokyo, which has apologized to Seoul over the issue and has since pressed for the removal of one of the statues outside its embassy there. Philippine officials had approved the statue in Manila, which was funded by a Filipino-Chinese philanthropist to highlight the suffering of comfort women. Asked about the statue's removal, President Rodrigo Duterte yesterday conceded he knew little about it but urged Filipinos not to "insult" Japan.—AFP

Jail for top Indonesia politician a 'turning point' in graft war

JAKARTA: A hefty 15-year prison term for one of Indonesia's top politicians, who allegedly even staged a car crash to evade arrest, could be a turning point in the country's war on corruption, observers say, as anger boils over against powerful figures living above the law. Setya Novanto's case sparked a mix of rage and disbelief as the disgraced house speaker tried to dodge arrest on graft charges, capped by his suspicious crash into a utility pole shortly after his palatial estate was raided. The car accident-widely believed to have been engineered-landed Novanto in a Jakarta hospital bed with medical tubes up his nose, apparently one step ahead of pursuing anti-corruption investigators.

The images sparked a flurry of mocking online memes, including the popular #SaveTiangListrik (save the electric pole) hashtag. It later emerged that Novanto's now-indicted lawyer had booked his hospital room before the accident happened. The 62-year-old-hailed by Donald Trump as one of Indonesia's most powerful men several years ago-then unsuc-

cessfully claimed that a bout of diarrhoea left him unable to participate in his trial.

On Tuesday, he was hit with one of Indonesia's heaviest sentences for corruption after being convicted of taking millions of dollars in kickbacks and bribes linked to the national roll-out of government ID cards. Novanto, dubbed Mr Teflon, had escaped corruption allegations before-including being caught on tape trying to extort a US-based miner-and his conviction marked the highestprofile victory in recent memory for Indonesia's Corruption Eradication Commission (KPK). "I think this is a milestone for the Corruption Eradication Commission and the anti-corruption movement in general," said Adnan Topan, coordinator for the non-profit Indonesia Corruption Watch. "Setya Novanto is very powerful. He has a strong network."

Novanto was among dozens of politicians, government officials and businessmen implicated in the scandal, which saw an estimated \$170 million syphoned off the \$440 million ID card project. It was the latest example of graft in a country where the legacy of notoriously corrupt dictator Suharto, suspected of looting billions of dollars from state coffers, still looms large. Indonesia ranked 96th out of 180 countries on Transparency International's 2017 corruption index.—AFP

News in brief

Iran 'prostitutes' report

TEHRAN: The head of Iran's reformist newspaper Shargh was arrested after residents of a northeastern city accused the paper of defamation over a report on "prostitution" there, Iranian media said yesterday. Mehdi Rahmanian was "summoned (by the courts) after a complaint by a group of residents of the Shahid Rajai neighborhood of Mashhad," the semi-official ISNA news agency reported, quoting the city's deputy prosecutor Hassan Heydari. "The newspaper had described some of the district's women as prostitutes." Mashhad's Khorassan newspaper said Rahmanian had been detained after failing to pay bail set at 500 million riyals (around \$9,000/7,500 euros). —AFP

Taiwan factory blaze

TAIPEI: Seven people-five of them firefighters-died in a fire that broke out late Saturday in an electronics factory in northern Taiwan, the local fire department said. The inferno raged through the eight-floor building of a circuit board maker, located in an industrial district in Taoyuan City. Seven firefighters were trapped by large fallen objects as they tried to search for people inside the factory. They were rescued yesterday but only two survived. The two others killed were factory workers from Thailand. Seven other firefighters were injured, five of them suffering burns from an unidentified liquid, according to the fire department. —AFP

Lebanese briefly detained

BEIRUT: Israel's army said yesterday that it had briefly held a Lebanese woman who crossed the border and then repatriated her, a detention Beirut denounced as an abduction. The Lebanese army said that the woman, Nohad Dali, was taken on Saturday evening from Shebaa, a small disputed area that Israel regards as part of the Golan Heights, which it captured from Syria in 1967, but which Beirut says is Lebanese territory. "An Israeli enemy patrol carried out the abduction of Nohad Dali," a Lebanese army statement said. — Reuters

Afghan voter registration

KABUL: Afghanistan is airdropping leaflets as it steps up efforts to boost the low number of voter registrations for upcoming legislative elections, amid concerns that a poor turnout will undermine the credibility of the poll. A series of attacks on voter registration centers across the war-torn country, including a suicide bomb in Kabul a week ago, has deterred many Afghans from signing up to participate in the October 20 ballot. Just over 650,000 adults had registered by Saturday, a fortnight after the two-month long process began, data compiled by the Independent Election Commission (IEC) showed. —AFP

The 'Windrush generation'

LONDON: British Prime Minister Theresa May is under pressure to introduce legislation guaranteeing a promise of compensation and help applying for citizenship made to long-term residents from the Caribbean incorrectly labeled illegal immigrants. For almost two weeks, British ministers have been struggling to explain why some descendants of the so-called "Windrush generation", invited to Britain to plug labor shortfalls between 1948 and 1971, are being denied basic rights because of trouble documenting their status. The Windrush scandal overshadowed the Commonwealth summit in London earlier this month and has raised questions about May's six-year stint as interior minister before she became prime minister in the wake of the 2016 Brexit referendum. —Reuters

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Catalonia and Basque Country: Separatists go different ways

with the Basque Country and Catalonia going their different ways, the Spanish government has avoided the nightmare of a joint independence front between the two wealthy regions. The northern Basque Country, home to 2.2 million people - roughly one in four said to be a separatist - wants to live in peace, taking advantage of the expected dissolution of separatist group ETA after decades of bloody attacks.

That contrasts sharply with Catalonia, where about half its 7.5 million people back independence and the region is now locked in a tense stand-off with Madrid. "The interests today of the two regions are very different. One wants to protect what they have won; the others (Catalans) want more," said Pablo Simon, a political science professor at Carlos III University in Madrid.

Shared history

The two regions have felt close since the 19th century, when elite-led nationalist movements first appeared. Both are industrial centres and they watched with a certain detachment as the rest of the country - rural and largely illiterate - collapsed into chaos after Spain lost its last colonies, notes Spanish historian Carlos Gil Andres. General Francisco Franco's 1939-75 dictatorship was then a time of repression with the public use of their distinct languages banned.

But it was in the Basque region that the response was more radical. ETA, set up in 1959, is blamed for the deaths of at least 829 people to 2010 in its campaign of bombings and shootings to achieve independence. In Catalonia, nationalist group Terre Lliure set up in 1978 and which like ETA was Marxist, carried out only one killing. It disbanded in 1991.

'New coexistence'

In 2003 Basque regional premier Juan Jose Ibarretxe proposed a status of "free association" with Spain. He also wanted - long before Catalonia - a referendum on self-determination but the plan was rejected by parliament in Madrid. Basque nationalist politicians however chose to respect democratic rules and avoid the confrontation with Madrid that Catalan leaders took on. Today all sides in the region "want to build a new coexistence" and "avoid a repetition" of the years of violence, said Agus Hernan of the Forum Social, a group which is close to families of ETA prisoners. The ruling conservative nationalist PNV party "realized that radicalization would keep them from power," said Inaki Oyarzabal, a Basque senator with the conservative Popular Party.

Unequal tax powers

There is another key difference - the Basque Country has since the 19th century had the power to collect its own taxes and decide for itself how to spend the money. Basque leaders negotiate roughly every five years the "cupo", the amount they must give Madrid to pay for public services, said Simon. They are therefore used to dealing with Madrid and are interested in maintaining the status quo. This taxand-spend advantage of the Basques fuels resentment in Catalonia.

The situation there has been made worse by "a perfect storm" driven by the drastic austerity measures adopted after the 2007-8 economic crisis and anger over corruption, said Borja Ventura who has written on both regions. In 2011, the then head of the Catalan regional government, Artur Mas, was forced to enter the regional parliament by helicopter to avoid a crowd that had surrounded the building to protest austerity, Ventura recalled. "And a way to bring people to his side was to mobilize them against an external enemy," he said, referring to the Spanish state.

Civil disobedience

Catalonia demanded the same "fiscal autonomy" but Madrid was unwilling to concede a region which accounts for 19 percent of Spanish economic output the same costly privileges enjoyed by the Basque Country which accounts for just six percent. Over the following years, Catalan separatists repeatedly challenged Madrid's authority and the decisions of the national courts until, on October 27, 2017, the parliament they controlled voted to break away from Spain after a banned independence referendum.

Oyarzabal, the Basque senator, said "there is no terrorism" in Catalonia but he likened the region's separatist drive to a "coup d'etat". Catalans reject outright any suggestion their struggle can be compared to that of the Basques. Joan Tarda, a lawmaker for Catalonia separatist party the Republican Left, said any comparison with the years of violence in the Basque Country "is an insult to intelligence and it trivializes terrorism". "We opted for an enormous act of civil disobedience. But we will not deviate from our civic and peaceful method," he added. —AFP



Facebook may crimp political campaigns

acebook's new focus on protecting private user data is likely to change the game for many campaigns, making it harder to deliver highly targeted, personal political messages. The changes unveiled by the huge social network following an outcry over the hijacking of data on 87 million Facebook members by Cambridge Analytica could be significant for campaigns. The new privacy effort could limit "microtargeting" using the social network, a technique used successfully by Donald Trump's campaign in 2016 and others.

"Microtargeting is a big deal for campaigns, because they have to decide how they spend money and who they target," said Joseph Hall, chief technologist for the Center for Democracy & Technology. He is leading a research project on election privacy and security. "Any clamping down on data collection is going to have a large effect on campaigns." Microtargeting is not new - marketing specialists used public records before the Internet era - but the trove of data from social networks, often combined with that of data brokers, has made it easier to identify population segments based on income, political affiliation and other factors.

Less precision

Hall said that if Facebook clamps down on its user data to campaigns, "They won't be able to target on a granular basis. That's not a bad thing, but campaigns hate it because it costs more money." Campaign consultants note that Facebook is not a source of voter data - with the major exception of Cambridge Analytica - but instead a targeting tool for ads based on data collected from other sources.

Facebook appears to be making it harder to use software tools to automatically match members of the social network with other affiliations. "I can target women between the ages of 21 and 35 who like Planned Parenthood, but I can't target Mary Smith," said one Democratic political operative who

asked to remain anonymous. "It's not clear if we'll be able to target voters as accurately and cheaply as in recent years."

Even with a stricter privacy environment, digital is expected to account for 20.1 percent of the \$8.8 billion spent this year in the United States on congressional and state election ads, according to the consulting firm Borrell Associates. That compares with less than one percent in the 2014 elections, according to Borrell. But it's down slightly from an estimate earlier this year, the firm said, because of "shyness about Facebook use following the Cambridge Analytica scandal."

Facebook has announced it would verify the identities of anyone placing political ads on its platform and follow procedures in a bill called the "Honest Ads Act" for labeling of candidate messages. It remains unclear how Facebook will adapt now FII privacy rules for the US market, such as the ability to easily opt out of targeted ads. "I think Facebook will provide as much incentive to opt in as possible," said Mark Jablonowski, chief technical officer of DSPolitical, an ad tech firm that works with Democratic candidates. "If Facebook users do opt out (in large numbers) that would have a major impact on Facebook revenue and targeting capabilities. It would have fairly far-reaching implications for the whole advertising industry.'

Jules Polonetsky, CEO of the Future of Privacy Forum, said that "it's not just a Facebook issue," because consultants and candidates can obtain detailed voter data from other, sometimes "sketchy" sources. Polonetsky said some political consultants are advertising ways to reach "angry" voters, which may lead to incendiary ads, whether via social media, email or other methods. "I fully expect candidates will do everything possible to win, using any available data they can hoover up, and apologize for it later," Polonetsky said.

Like Netflix or Spotify

Chris Wilson, CEO of the political consulting group WPAi, which works with Republican candidates, warned against going too far in restricting social media data use. "Facebook has given Republicans an important resource that allows candidates to go directly to voters with messages on issues they care about," Wilson said. "If we push too hard and Facebook changes their rules so that we can't do the same things as Netflix or Spotify at the individual level, that would be sad for the future of democracy."

Michael Cornfield, a George Washington University political scientist who leads a research project on social media in campaigns, said the public focus on Facebook and privacy is probably transitory and will have little impact on upcoming elections. "Data privacy has not been a big issue because few people see it costing them personally," he said. Cornfield said he expects campaigns to use the Facebook Live video platform and increase use of artificial intelligence to target voters.

Facebook has also promised labels and verification for ads on hot-button political issues which are not for specific candidates. But it may have trouble living up to that pledge, said Young Mie Kim, a University of Wisconsin professor who led research on 2016 Facebook political ads. Kim said many disputed 2016 ads were "dark" posts by anonymous groups, shown only to small numbers of users without mentioning a candidate's name. "It is incredibly difficult to define an issue ad - even policymakers do not completely agree on this," she said. "Facebook will have a very difficult time defining what are political ads."—AFP

Sex scandals deepen Chile mistrust in Catholic church

espite a strong Catholic tradition, Chile is witnessing a growing rift between the people and the church, sharpened by a string of sexual abuse scandals that until recently had been ignored by the pope. The extent of the rift became clear in January when Pope Francis visited Chile and sparked outrage by hugging Juan Barros, a controversial bishop who has been accused of covering up abuses by another priest in the 1980s and '90s.

Questioned by journalists, Francis responded abruptly, saying there was "not a single piece of proof" against Barros in remarks that caused widespread anger among those who had been abused by the other priest, Fernando Karadima. But the pontiff apologized and quickly moved to dispatch the Vatican's top abuse investigator to collect evidence, later acknowledging he had made "grave mistakes" in his handling of the scandal.

And he also pledged to meet with the victims, inviting three of them to the Vatican to discuss the extent of abuse within the church in Chile. All three were abused in the 1980s by Karadima, who at the time was an influential priest who trained seminarians in an affluent area of the capital, Santiago. It was only in 2011 that he was convicted of abusing children by the Vatican, which ordered him to retire to a "life of prayer and penitence" and barred him from any

public ministry. But the victims were unable to pursue a criminal case against him in Chile because the statute of limitations had expired.

80 church leaders accused

Next month, the pope will also meet with Chilean bishops to discuss the findings of the probe by his investigator, Archbishop Charles Scicluna. Beyond Karadima, nearly 80 Catholic clergymen have been accused of sexually abusing children in Chile, according to BishopAccountability, an American NGO that tracks such cases. And a recent poll showed that seven out of 10 Chileans disapprove of the way in which the Catholic church has handled the scandal.

Aware of what could be coming down the line, Santiago's archbishop, Ricardo Ezzati, recently suggested to Barros that he resign "for the good of the people of God". The visibility of the Karadima case and the testimony of the three victims who have spoken out on behalf of the abused - Jose Andres Murillo, James Hamilton and Juan Carlos Cruz - has dealt a major blow to a church seen as elitist and distant from the concerns of a modern society.

A growing disaffection

But Chile's disaffection with the church began back in the 1990s with the return of democracy to the country, says Luis Bahamondes, an expert on religion at the University of Chile. Despite the fact that part of the Catholic church sided with those persecuted by the country's military dictatorship, when democracy returned, it went "from having a more social role to one that was driven by traditional values," distancing itself from many worshipers.

In a country where some 70 percent of the population describe themselves as Catholic,

only a third say they have confidence in the institution, a Mori survey revealed this week. Chileans had to wait until 2004 before they were able to get divorced, and it was only in 2017 that women were legally allowed to have an abortion in cases of rape, or threat to the mother's life or deadly birth defects. Same-sex couples still cannot marry nor can anyone who is transgender change their identity on a passport, although this year's Oscar's triumph of "A Fantastic Woman", a Chilean film about a transgender woman, which won best foreign film, has gone a long way to changing that.

'Increasingly remote from the people' But Bahamondes denies talk of a "rift,"

pointing out that most of the population still identify as Catholic, saying it is more a sense that they simple don't feel that the church represents them, which is particularly true among the youth. President Sebastian Pinera, himself a practicing Catholic, on Thursday said he was saddened by the fact that the church "is increasingly remote, not only from worshippers but from people in general," which is not only happening in Chile but across Latin America. During his visit in January, Pope Francis himself acknowledge that people prefer leaders "who know how to be compassionate, how to lend a hand, to stop and help those who have fallen," while criticizing the "elitist" attitude of certain clergy. —AFP

Security Council envoys hear of rapes, murders from Rohingyas

Kuwaiti ambassador says int'l community has great interest in resolving crisis

KUTUPALONG, Bangladesh: Hundreds of Rohingya United Nations has called "ethnic cleansing". staged a demonstration yesterday as UN Security Council envoys visited refugee camps in Bangladesh where about 700,000 people who have fled Myanmar in the past year have sought sanctuary. Some of the Muslim refugees broke down in tears as they told the ambassadors harrowing stories of murder and rape in Myanmar. The demonstrators waved placards demanding justice for atrocities against the refugees until they were dispersed

Senior diplomats from the 15-member Security Council - including permanent members the United States, Russia, China, Britain and France - arrived in Bangladesh on Saturday for a four-day visit to the camps. They will go on to Myanmar where they are to meet civilian leader Aung San Suu Kyi. Myanmar has faced intense international pressure over the military clampdown against the Rohingya launched last August that the

The Security Council has called for the safe return of the Rohingya and an end to the discrimination against them. However, deputy Russian ambassador Dmitry Polyanskiy, whose country has supported Myanmar, warned that the council did not have a "magic stick" to resolve what is now one of the world's worst refugee crises. "We are not looking away from this crisis, we are not closing our eyes," the Russian diplomat told reporters. Britain's UN ambassador Karen Pierce said the Rohingya "must be allowed to go home in conditions of safety". "It may take some time but we'd like to hear from the government of Myanmar how they wish to work with the international community," she said.

Safety needed

The UN envoys first visited Konarpara camp, a no man's land between Bangladesh and Myanmar where

some 6,000 Rohingya have been trapped on bleak scrubland since the bloodshed began last year. The camp's Rohingya leader Dil Mohammad said council envoys spoke with some women victims of the violence in Myanmar's Rakhine state, as well as community elders. "We told them that we're staying here to save our lives. We're very much eager to go back to our land, provided our security is ensured by the UN," Mohammad told AFP.

Later, the diplomats went to the giant Kutupalong camp where hundreds of Rohingya staged the protest that was dispersed by police before the envoys arrived. A second was later held in the camp. "We want restoration of our citizenship under Rohingya ethnicity. We want security and return of our confiscated land and properties," said Rohingya leader Mohibullah. The council members were "shocked" by the accounts of rapes, murders and torture endured by the Rohingya in Rakhine, according to Mohibullah.

Myanmar has said the military operation in Rakhine was to root out extremists and has rejected nearly all allegations that its security forces committed atrocities. The Security Council delegation is to meet with Bangladesh's Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina today before leaving for Myanmar. They are to go on a helicopter flight over Rakhine to see the remains of villages torched during the violence. Kuwait's Ambassador Mansour Al-Otaibi said the visit was not about "naming and shaming" Myanmar, but that "the message will be very clear for them: The international community is following the situation and has great interest in resolving it." On Friday, Human Rights Watch called for the Rohingya crisis to be referred to the International Criminal Court. "The lack of a UN Security Council resolution has left the Myanmar government convinced that it has literally gotten away with mass murder," HRW executive director Kenneth Roth told reporters in Yangon. — AFP



Celtics win game seven to oust Bucks from playoffs

Anthony rejects future reserve role with Thunder

LOS ANGELES: Terry Rozier and Al Horford scored 26 points each as the Boston Celtics routed the Milwaukee Bucks 112-96 in game seven to book their spot in the second round of the NBA playoffs. The Celtics' victory in Saturday's deciding game was their fourth win at the Boston Garden as the home teams won all seven games in the Eastern Conference series. "We got it done that is the most important thing," said Rozier. "Before this series everybody doubted us. But we believed in each other and it worked out for us."

The storied Celtics franchise is now 36-0 lifetime

when leading a playoff series 2-0, and they will try to make it 37 straight when they face the Philadelphia 76ers in the next round. Game one is today in Boston. "We got to pay attention to details and take away what they want to do," Rozier said of the next round. Jayson Tatum tallied 20 points for the Celtics in the win.

The loss means the elimination of Giannis Antetokounmpo from the playoffs. Antetokounmpo, whose blend of size and athleticism has earned him the nickname the "Greek Freak," finished with 22 points and nine rebounds. Khris Middleton scored 32 and Eric Bledsoe chipped 23 in the loss. Boston led 50-42 at the half despite going one-for-12 from beyond the arc. Horford had 14 points and seven rebounds at halftime, while Bledsoe led the Milwaukee attack with 12 points.

The Bucks narrowed the Boston lead to three points early in the third, but Boston scored 11 of the last 15 points in the quarter to seize command. "Wasn't able to win on the road, but we pushed the series to game seven." Antetokounmoo said. "A lot of the guys in the locker room have never been in game sevens. It's a new experience. Now we know now what it takes to win a game seven."

WARRIORS CRUSH PELICANS

In Oakland, Draymond Green posted his fourth career playoff triple double as the Golden State Warriors rolled over the New Orleans Pelicans 123-101 in the opening game of their second round series. Green finished with 16 points, 15 rebounds, 11 assists, and Kevin Durant tallied 26 points and 13 rebounds for the defending champion Warriors who took command of the contest in the second quarter.

long after a behind-the-back pass to teammate Rudy Gobert. Rubio missed several games late in the regular season with soreness in his left hamstring. Rookie Donovan Mitchell, who took over the bulk of point guard duties after Rubio's departure, tweeted his support.

"We gon hold it down for you Rick!" Mitchell posted on Twitter on Saturday. But Rubio's absence is a big blow for the Jazz as they prepare to tackle a Rockets team whose 65-17 regular season led the league and was a franchise best. The Rockets dispatched the Minnesota Timberwolves 4-1 in the first round.

Meanwhile, Carmelo Anthony isn't interested in sticking around in Oklahoma City as a bench player for the Thunder. A day after the Thunder were eliminated from the first round of the NBA playoffs, Anthony said during his exit interview on Saturday that such a role was out of the question. "I'm not sacrificing (with) no bench role," he said. "I think everybody knows I've sacrificed damn near everything, and was willing to sacrifice nearly everything for this situation to work out."

The 33-year-old forward spent significant time on the bench during the Thunder's first-round loss to the Utah Jazz. Anthony, who averaged 16.2 points, 5.8 rebounds and 1.3 assists for the season, can opt out of the final year of his contract, which is worth \$28 million, and not return to the Thunder in 2018.

And he indicated he was mulling that option after a sometimes frustrating campaign that followed his trade from the New York Knicks on the eve of training camp.

Anthony waived his no-trade clause with the Knicks to make the move happen, with the Thunder hoping he would join established star Russell Westbrook and another OKC newcomer, Paul George, to form a Big Three that would see them challenge the Golden State Warriors and Houston Rockets in the Western Conference.

But Anthony said that with the trio joining forces so close to the start of the season "everything was just thrown together" and his role wasn't properly defined. —Agencies

Brilliant Bjork seals first European title

BEIJING: Alexander Bjork won his first European Tour title in stunning fashion after carding a seven-under 65 to emerge from a packed China Open field in a dramatic final round yesterday. "I can't describe the emotions. I'm really, really happy," said the Swede, who entered the day a shot off the pace and was part of a six-way tie for the lead at one point before winning by two strokes at 18-under par.

"I'm really proud of the way I played today," added the world number 112. "It's probably one of the best rounds I've ever played, I would say the best round, given the situation. I didn't make pretty much any mistakes today so I'm super happy." The 27 year-old will now leap into the top 10 in the European Tour Race to Dubai and as high as 72nd in the world today after receiving a bumper cheque for \$525,000 at the \$3.2 million event co-sanctioned by Asian Tour on his 44th European Tour start.

Jordan Smith earlier signed for a brilliant 64 to set the clubhouse target at 16 under par, but Bjork took the lead on his own for the first time with a birdie on 15 after a classy up-and-down from a sand trap. Spaniard Adrian Otaegui joined him in top spot but another birdie on the 17 left Bjork with an nervous clubhouse wait at 18-under par 270.

A three-putt on the 17th from Otaegui left him two behind and when he and fellow overnight leader Matt Wallace both failed to make eagles at the par-five 18th Bjork was able to celebrate. Spain's Otaegui did make a birdie at 18 to take second place on his own at 17under. Fellow Spaniard Jorge Campillo shared third at 16-under par with the English pair of Smith and Wallace.

The 27-year-old Bjork first hit the front with a stunning approach to the opening hole and further birdies on two par-fives, the fourth and eighth, plus another at the 11th left him one behind Smith who

Ko leads at Lake Merced in search of LPGA win

SAN FRANCISCO: Former world number one Lydia Ko, seeking her first win since 2016, takes a onestroke lead into the final round of the LPGA Mediheal Championship after firing a five-under par 67 on Saturday. The New Zealand star, who has slumped to 18th in the world rankings during an LPGA title drought stretching back to the Marathon Classic in July of 2016, topped the leader board on 11-under 205, one shot in front of American Jessica Korda.

It's the first time since her last victory that Ko has led after 54 holes of an LPGA event, but the player who turned 21 on Tuesday said she wouldn't put pressure on herself chasing an elusive win. "I've got to play as best I

can, stay focused and have a lot of fun and if it happens that's great," Ko said. "But I think the most important thing for me is to stay positive. I know there's still a lot of golf to be played."

Overnight leader Korda, seeking her second LPGA victory of the season, left her birdie attempt at the 18th short, settling for a one-under 71 and 206. Australian Minjee Lee was alone in third after a 68 for 208. Thailand's Moriya Jutanugarn, who claimed her first LPGA title last week in Los Angeles, signed for a 71 and headed a group sharing fourth on 210 that also included Colombia's Mariajo Uribe (68), American Ryann O'Toole (69) and England's Charley Hull (73).

For Ko, the friendly confines of Lake Merced Golf Club could be just the place to end her drought. Although Ko had 11 top-10 finishes across the 2017 season but has looked a far cry from the fresh-faced teenager who tore the scene apart back in 2015. Five victories, including her first Major at the Evian Championship, took Ko to the very pinnacle of women's golf that year as she became the game's youngest ever world number one aged just 17. — AFP

Pakistan Star wins Queen Elizabeth II Cup

HONG KONG: Pakistan Star clinched the Queen Elizabeth II Cup for jockey William Buick in Hong Kong yesterday, the highlight of three Group One spring races with a total purse of HK\$58 million (\$7.4 million). Known for being unpredictable, the five-year-old stormed to victory by a large margin in the final strides and finished the 2,000-metre course in just over two minutes.

"He's quite a famous horse for his antics so I was aware of him and I was aware of what he can do," Buick said after the race, adding Pakistan Star "felt beautiful today". "When I found out that I was riding him, I took on board all of the information I knew about the horse and also thought it was quite important to ride him with a fresh mind and just be

very positive about the horse," the winning jockey said.

The prize money for the Audemars Piguet QEII Cup had been boosted up from last year's HK\$20 million to HK\$24 million. Italian jockey Alberto Sanna finished second on Gold Mount, while Australian Hong Kong-based jockey Brett Prebble rode Eagle Way to finish third. Australian jockey Zac Purton was another star of the day, riding four-yearold gelding Ivictory to triumph in the 1,200-metre Chairman's Sprint race.

"I was fortunate enough to get on him and at the right time," he said of Ivictory. Purton claimed his first Hong Kong Cup last year in the city's Longines International Races, one of the world's richest race meetings. Already on a winning streak, Purton snapped up the 1,600-metre Champions Mile with Beauty Generation, surging from a relatively slow start to seal its victory. "He's just so honest, he goes out and runs the same race every time. When he gets the circumstances to suit him, you get to see how good he is," Purton said of the horse. — AFP

Hamilton wins chaotic Baku battle to lead title race

Lewis registers his first victory in seven races, 63rd of his career

BAKU: Defending world champion Lewis Hamilton retirements on a challenging day on the second-longest claimed his first win of 2018 yesterday and took over as circuit on the calendar. leader of the title race when he triumphed in a dramatic, crash-strewn Azerbaijan Grand Prix. The 33-year-old Briton, who had struggled for outright pace, managed to steer his Mercedes through a chaotic race and capitalize on others' misfortunes to register his first victory in seven races and the 63rd of his career. Sebastian Vettel of Ferrari looked set to turn pole position into a victory until a second Safety Car intervention left him lunging to pass Valtteri Bottas and locked up and ran off.

Bottas then seemed sure to win, but suffered a sudden right rear puncture on his Mercedes after running over metal debris on the straight. Hamilton flew past to return to the top of the podium "That was quite an emotional race, to be honest," said hamilton, who now leads the championship by four points from Vettel. "Valtteri deserved to have the win and

also Sebastian did a great job. I was very fortunate today so it feels a bit odd to me to be here." Vettel managed to continue and finish fourth ahead of his teammate Kimi Raikkonen and Mexican Sergio Perez of Force India. Carlos Sainz finishing fifth for Renault and Charles Leclerc sixth for Sauber, his first points finish.

Fernando Alonso finished seventh for McLaren ahead of Canadian Lance Stroll of Williams, Stoffel Vandoorne in the second McLaren and New Zealand's Brendon Hartley of Toro Rosso who scored his first point in F1. The race was heavily punctuated by accidents which included one in which the two Red Bulls of Daniel Ricciardo and Max Verstappen collided while fighting for fourth place in the closing stages, the pair having banged wheels and battled for positions throughout the race. RED BULL WIPE-OUT

In cooler conditions with a strong blustery wind, the drama unfolded from the start. As the lights went out, Vettel was away fast enough from his 53rd pole to hold off Hamilton in second, but behind them mayhem erupted. Raikkonen, starting sixth, attempted to pass inside Ocon's Force India, but the Frenchman turned in and as the pair collided he crashed into the wall. In the sur-

rounding chaos, Sergey Sirotkin was also contacted and he went down an escape road while Raikkonen limped back to the Ferrari pits. The luckless Alonso suffered punctured right front and rear tyres. The multiple incidents required a Safety Car before the action settled and racing resumed, after five laps.

Vettel pulled away to open a three seconds lead ahead of Hamilton and Bottas after 10 of the scheduled 51 laps of

Then, with two laps remaining, Bottas suffered a right rear punctured after running over debris. "Oh my God, it just blew up on me," he said as Hamilton took the lead ahead of Raikkonen and Perez. — AFP

Blues plunge further into funk with Jaguares loss

WELLINGTON: The Auckland Blues' creation of unwanted history as the first New Zealand side to lose to the Jaguares in Super Rugby has plunged the team into a fresh crisis. With playoffs hopes on a knife edge before May, the Blues were humbled 20-13 by the Argentine side at Eden Park on Saturday, their fifth loss in six games. Having finished ninth last year, hopes had been high for Tana Umaga's side to make a run at the postseason.

But they have won just two of their nine matches this campaign and again sit bottom of the New Zealand conference on 13 points. "We know we are underperforming as a whole so that is a challenge and we live for the challenge," Umaga told reporters. "We are not getting it right on the field at the moment but we are not far away."

The small crowd that braved torrential rain on Saturday saw the Blues take a 13-5 lead at half-time playing into a strong wind before tactically falling apart in the second spell. They failed to kick deep into Jaguares territory and were kept pinned inside their own half. Umaga has steadfastly refused to criticize his players but came close on Saturday. "It's a pretty simple game with the wind, isn't it?" he said. "It's up to everyone to understand the plan. "There are key people that need to make those decisions, and I

The Blues won the last of their three titles in 2003 and have been back to the playoffs just twice since. Their struggles in the current term have turned off fans and television viewers, and prompted an apology from acting captain James Parsons on Saturday. The poor form has not been helped by a horrendous injury toll and with 19 players unavailable this week, Umaga had to look outside his wider training group.

Conference rivals Waikato Chiefs, however, have kept winning amid a similar injury crisis and, unlike the Blues, have beaten other New Zealand sides. The Blues haven't defeated compatriots since Umaga's first game in charge, the 2016 season-opener against the Otago Highlanders. They can still sneak into the playoffs as the eighth-best team if they can start winning again. But it would be a long road back. The Chiefs, the side directly above them in fourth place in New Zealand, are on 26 points and have played one fewer game.

Umaga's bosses have stood by the former All Blacks captain, even as patience wears thin. "There is plenty of support for Tana within New Zealand Rugby and the Blues," Blues chief executive Michael Redman said last week. "We haven't been able to deliver and changing coaches every cycle hasn't worked for the Blues previously ... our preferred option would be to try to work with the group we have." — Reuters

Hamilton is still motivated, said Wolff, who added that there had been an overreaction to Mercedes failure to win any of the three season-opening races. "How the news is running these days, we are oscillating between exuberance and depression, and back again," he said. "When things are not going in the right direction it's doom, and when you win two races in a row it's the utter Mercedes dominance destroying the sport.

"Maybe it's somewhere in the middle. We haven't collectively performed on the level we would want to in the last races. "There were three races we could have won and we didn't, that's a fact. But I still see the fire and the desire to win very much burning in Lewis." Wolff was speaking ahead of the Azerbaijan Grand prix, where Hamilton shared the front row with pole sitter Sebastian Vettel in a Ferrari.

'VIRTUAL GARAGES'

Formula One champions Mercedes are against any future ban on the use of 'virtual garages', the factory-based control centers used during grand prix weekends by teams to back up engineers at racetracks. "I think it's a very bad idea because we've invested in the virtual garages," Mercedes team boss Toto Wolff told reporters at the Azerbaijan

Such hi-tech operations rooms, directly linked in real-time to cars and systems at the track, are widely used by top teams to circumvent restrictions on the number of personnel allowed into the paddock. They are also important sources of revenue, however, with teams using them to engage sponsors. Formula One's commercial rights holders want to limit spending and make a more level playing field when current agreements expire at the end of 2020.

They also want to put more emphasis on drivers, rather than armies of engineers working out of sight, and getting rid of such control centers has been mooted. Wolff, however, said that the virtual garage was "a great selling proposition" for partners and sponsors. "Actually, there's not only engineers in our virtual garage back at Brackley," the Austrian explained. "We have sponsors there, we are trying to have co-operations with high-tech companies and this is the part they are most interested in. "As far as I know, many teams have managed to commercialize the race support structures back in the factories and of course it gives you an advantage if you've got more brains working on solutions and problems. "For us it has become a point of sale." — Agencies

played so well all week." The 16th-ranked Vandeweghe enjoyed a great run in Germany's automotive capital after starting as a wild card entry because her agent forgot to enter her in the event.

The Californian, whose career-long aversion to clay began evaporating during the best week of her life on the dirt, upset three top 10 play-

ers - US Open champion Sloane Stephens, world number one Simona Halep and France's number seven Caroline Garcia.

"Thanks for the wild card," Vandeweghe said. "I've had a fantastic week. "I tried my best in the final but I didn't quite get there. Karolina played really well.

"I missed this year, but maybe next..."

Vandeweghe had won three of their four previous meetings, but lost to the Czech in the Stuttgart second round a year ago. The American had not dropped serve in her two wins prior to the final. On Sunday, Pliskova broke three times in a one and three-quarter hour victory. Vandeweghe started by breaking Pliskova in the opening game before the Czech found her rhythm to break back in the fourth game. The set then tightened with both women relinquishing little on serve. In

the tiebreaker, Vandeweghe again jumped into an early lead. But Pliskova won six consecutive points and earned three set points from a second-serve ace.

One was enough as the Czech found the line on a return to take the early lead.
Pliskova took a 3-2 lead in the second set and broke for a second time in the set

to lead 5-2.

It took her two attempts to serve out victory, losing serve in the eighth game, but Pliskova settled affairs in her next service game as her opponent's backhand went long on match point. Vandeweghe had been aiming to become the first American champion in Stuttgart





Let's make history, Guardiola tells record-chasing City

City now within two points of Premier League points record

LONDON: Pep Guardiola challenged Manchester City to make history after the champions equalled the Premier League record for most wins in a season with an imperious 4-1 victory at West Ham yesterday. Guardiola's side now have 30 wins this term, matching the record set by Chelsea last season, and will take sole possession of the milestone with one more success in their last three games.

Sweeping West Ham aside with their trademark swagger, City went ahead through Leroy Sane before an own goal from their former defender Pablo Zabaleta doubled

the lead. Aaron Cresswell's free-kick reduced the deficit before half-time, but Gabriel Jesus and Fernandinho netted for City after the interval. Simply untouchable for most of the season, City are bidding to cement their status as one of the all-time great Premier League teams by rewriting the record books.

"We have a chance to be the best team in the history of

England, with more points, we are trying to do it next their generous hosts. Sunday (against Huddersfield)," Guardiola said. "Always you have to play for something. Once we won the Premier League, the target was the numbers.

We have a chance to break the records, but it's not easy, we have to play good. It's good to fight." City have scored 102 league goals in 35 games, making them the fastest English top-flight side to reach the century mark since Everton in 1931-32. They are one goal short of the Premier League record of 103 set by Chelsea in 2009-10.

Guardiola's team also need three more points to eclipse Chelsea's 95-point Premier League record from 2004-05. "We are professional. We didn't celebrate the moment we were champions," Guardiola added.

"The numbers are there, Hopefully we will achieve one more win to get 96 points." Ominously for their title rivals, Guardiola believes City can be even better next season. "Always you can do better. Football is never done otherwise I wouldn't be here next season," he said.

"Next season the target will be to keep this consistency. In the recent past, teams couldn't do that. "Our level was so high, but there are 20 guys winning the Premier League for the first time. We are a young team. That's good." West Ham have won once in their last eight league

Juventus gains crucial title edge after late comeback downs Inter

MILAN: Juventus battled past 10-man Inter Milan with two late goals giving the champions a 3-2 win in the San Siro on Saturday to reopen a four-point lead at the top of the Serie A table. Inter looked as if they would pull off an unlikely victory as the hosts led until three minutes from the whistle despite playing more than 70 minutes a man down after Matias Vecino was sent off. But Milan Skriniar turned the ball into his own net after 87 minutes with Gonzalo Higuain heading in the winner two minutes later.

"I have to congratulate the lads, it was an important step towards the Scudetto," said Juventus coach Massimiliano Allegri. "It was a beautiful night of football between two teams who had to win. "Winning at San Siro is very complicated, they did very well at 10. We know that to win the championship we have to win all of our games." Juve's lead had been cut to one point after their defeat by Napoli in Turin last week.

Maurizio Sarri's Napoli travel to Fiorentina bidding to match the champions and keep their push for a third title after 1987 and 1990 alive. Saturday's defeat damages Inter's hopes of Champions League football next season as they stay fifth behind Roma and Lazio with just three games to play. "It will be hard to put this defeat behind us," said Inter coach Luciano Spalletti. "This match meant a huge amount to us and the team deserved a different result. Celtic rout Rangers to secure another Scottish league title

GLASGOW: Celtic hammered arch Glasgow rivals Rangers 5-0 as they secured a seventh successive Scottish title with an emphatic Old Firm victory yesterday. This win, achieved in front of their own fans at Celtic Park, gave Brendan Rodgers' side an unassailable 10-point lead t the top of the Scottish Premiership table over Aberdeen, who can only take a maximum of nine points from their three remaining league games.

Rangers are three points further back in third place. Celtic are now just two shy of the record of nine Scottish titles in a row they already share with Rangers. The Hoops' title party started early as they went 3-0 up before half-time. Odsonne Edouard gave Celtic an early lead before Edouard and James Forrest added two more goals late in the opening period.

Two minutes after the break, Tom Rogic made it 4-0 with Callum McGregor scoring Celtic's fifth goal in the 53rd minute. Defeat did little for Rangers caretaker manager Graeme Murty's hopes of holding onto his job, amid speculation the Gers are set to appoint Liverpool great Steven Gerrard as their new permanent boss.

UNBEATEN STREAK

Rodgers, who was Gerrard's manager at Liverpool for the latter part of the celebrated midfielder's Anfield career, is now unbeaten in 11 games against Rangers since he arrived in Glasgow in 2016 — a run made up of nine wins and two draws. The Northern Irishman is also just a Scottish Cup final win over Motherwell away from guiding Celtic to an unprecedented second successive domestic treble. "The performance was really pleasing, under the pressure and given the game," Rodgers told Sky Sports.

"You have to play football and today we did the basics really well," he added. "We were outstanding and could have had more goals...It's been a brilliant season by the players." Rangers goalkeeper Jak Alnwick made his Old Firm debut in place of the injured Wes Foderingham. Alnwick made a couple of saves but the writing was on the wall for Rangers, with Edouard opening the scoring in the 14th minute when he turned in a Kieran Tierney cutback from close range. It looked like Rangers might head into the break just a goal behind but that hope was dashed four minutes before half-time. Rangers' Graham Dorrans lost possession and Forrest sent Edouard clear into the visitors' box, where he drove a low shot past Alnwick and into the far corner. And there was still time for Celtic to extend their lead prior to the end of the first half when Forrest struck from 10 yards.

Barely had the second half got underway before Rogic made it 4-0 from the edge of the box and McGregor added a fifth goal after he was played in by Edouard. There was still plenty of time left in the game for Celtic to surpass their biggest win over Rangers-a 7-1 success back in 1957 — and the only surprise was that they didn't add to their tally of goals. Celtic fans, however, were more than happy with a final scoreline of 5-0.—AFP



Fellaini header inflicts more woe on Wenger

Wenger given Old Trafford send-off by Ferguson



MANCHESTER: Arsene Wenger was honoured by Manchester United on his final visit to Old Trafford as Arsenal manager, but left beaten once more on the field as Marouane Fellaini's stoppage time header handed the hosts a 2-1 win.

Wenger was greeted by former United boss Sir Alex Ferguson and current manager Jose Mourinho before kick-off and even presented with a glass momento. However, the Frenchman was left empty-handed when it came to points as defeat left sixth-placed Arsenal mathematically out of the race for a top-four finish.

Fellaini rose highest to flick home the winner after Henrikh Mkhitaryan's second-half strike against his former club had cancelled out Paul Pogba's early opener. United have now sealed their place in the Champions League next season and move closer to their target of finishing at least second best to champions Manchester City by opening a five-point gap on Liverpool.

Ferguson told the United website ahead of the game that his clashes for many years with Wenger's strongest Arsenal sides over a decade ago "made the Premier League." But it was a sign of how far Arsenal have fallen that Wenger made eight changes from the side that drew 1-1 with Atletico Madrid in the first leg of their Europa League semi-final on Thursday as he had already given up hope of a top-four finish.

Alexis Sanchez became the latest of a number of leading Arsenal players to leave towards the end of Wenger's reign in search of more success and more money in January.

And in his first appearance against his former club, the Chilean was heavily involved in the opening goal on 16 minutes. Romelu Lukaku picked out Sanchez at the back post and after his header was deflected onto his own post by Hector Bellerin, Pogba had the simple task of tapping into an unguarded net.

Wenger included club record signing Pierre-Emerick Aubameyang and Mkhitaryan, who was the makeweight for Sanchez to move in the other direction, among a side littered with youngsters. But it was the visitors who posed the greater

threat for the remainder of a soporific first 45 minutes. Mkhitaryan dragged a shot from the edge of the box just wide before Aubameyang's tame header was too close to David de Gea. United suffered a blow at the start of the second period when Lukaku limped off to be replaced by Marcus Rashford.

And the hosts soon also lost their lead when Mkhitaryan pounced on some slack United defending to fire across De Gea into the bottom corner to muted celebrations despite enduring a troubled 18 months under Mourinho before joining the Gunners.

United struggled to create in their search for a winner, but Arsenal failed to heed their warning when Rashford was denied by the offside flag after Fellaini's header came off the post a minute from time. Moments later Fellaini rose highest once more to meet Ashley Young's cross and the Belgian's looping header found the far corner to leave Arsenal still without a point away from home in the Premier League this year. — AFP

Rampant Nadal cruises to 11th Barcelona title

BARCELONA: Rafael Nadal won his 11th Barcelona title yesterday when he breezed past Greek teenager Stefanos Tsitsipas 6-2, 6-1 in the final.

It was world number one Nadal's 55th career clay-court title while he also extended his winning streak on the surface to 46 consecutive sets. The 31-year-old Spaniard won his 11th Monte Carlo Masters last weekend also without dropping a set.

Yesterday's victory reinforced his status as the overwhelming favourite to lift the French Open for an 11th time in June. Nadal now has 77 titles overall while his career clay-court match record stands at 401 wins against just 35 defeats. His win yesterday was greeted by ticker-tape and a video review of all his titles on the centre court in Barcelona which now bears his name. "It's really emotional to see that video. I never dreamed of having a career like this," said the 16-time Grand Slam title winner. "Last year, they made a video of my 10 titles here. Now they have had to make another video for 11 — it makes me feel like I am ageing. "Thanks to everyone for making the tournament so special and thanks to my family who have been with me even when things have not been so smooth."

Tsitsipas, 19 years old and ranked 63, was

the first Greek man to make an ATP final since Nicholas Kalogeropoulos in Des Moines back in 1973. He was also the youngest Barcelona finalist since Nadal in 2005. "Stefanos, you had an incredible week. You have a great future and I wish you great success," added Nadal of an opponent who will become just the second teenager in the world top 50 next week after Canada's Denis Shapovalov. Nadal needed just 77 minutes to claim victory yesterday. After racing through the opening set, he was quickly 3-0 up in the second before Tsitsipas carved out a degree of hope in the fourth game when he had two break points.

They were quickly saved by Nadal who then claimed the title on a third match point in the seventh game when the teenager dumped a one-handed backhand into the net. — AFP

In remote China, a high-tech auto plant flags global challenge

ZHANGJIAKOU, China: While auto workers in Germany and South Korea fight to save their jobs, one of China's youngest auto brands is gearing up to build sport utility vehicles at a new factory with digitally-connected robots and a fresh workforce of 1,800 people.

A three-hour drive from the Chinese capital Beijing, the Lynk & Co plant in Zhangjiakou combines technology and manufacturing know-how from the Geely and Volvo Cars units of China auto giant Zhejiang Geely Holding Group. The 12 billion yuan (\$1.89 billion) investment is a bright, freshly painted example of the challenge confronting long-established auto factories in mature industrial economies.

As automakers adopt a new generation of manufacturing technology, industry officials are confident that they can deploy the same packages of robots, assembly line designs and digital quality control systems anywhere in the world - and train people to do the tasks robots cannot yet perform.

Plant manager Tong Xiangbei is in the vanguard of a tech revolution that enables automakers to put new factories in remote places like Zhangjiakou, a city of four million people in Hebei province and far from many of Geely's parts makers.

"With this team, we could go anywhere and replicate this factory," Tong, 42, who previously worked at Ford Motor Co, told Reuters during the first media tour of the factory.

The ability to build cars in almost any location that has electricity and decent roads is one factor behind Peugeot SA's clash with German workers over proposed cost-cutting at Opel brand factories once owned by General Motors. GM this week agreed to invest \$3.6 billion in its money losing South Korean operations only after unions representing workers at its plants agreed to allow the shutdown of a factory in Gunsan, Korea and gave concessions GM said will save \$400 to 500 million a year.

With Lynk & Co, Geely is targeting younger and less affluent buyers than typical Volvo customers, but who still demand more sophistication and technology than a standard Geely Automobile Holdings Ltd car for the mass market in China. Lynk & Co vehicles already are competing with GM, Peugeot and other automakers in China. The brand plans to begin production at a plant in Belgium in 2019, and begin sales in Europe in 2020. Geely and Volvo have said they plan to bring the brand to the United States, but have not said when. — Reuters

US Fed to hold fire amid rising market sensitivity

WASHINGTON: Markets do not expect the US Federal Reserve to raise interest rates this week, as policymakers take time to assess how much pressure is building in world's

The central bank's Federal Open Market Committee, which is due to begin a two-day meeting tomorrow, has signaled it will key lending rate at least twice more this year after kicking it up a notch last month. But Wall Street since February has shown a tendency to swoon at the faintest hint the Fed might consider moving at a more aggressive pace.

And data that suggest the Fed might move four times this year under newlyinstalled Fed Chairman Jay Powell has generated wild volatility in share prices. While the central bank will leave the benchmark lending rate untouched on Wednesday when it announces the outcome of the meeting, investors will be reading anxiously between the lines for signs of how concerned officials appear to be about rising wages and inflation. After years at with interest rates at zero in the aftermath of the global financial crisis, the US central bank has nudged the rate up six times since the first move in December 2015, moving in increments of 0.25, or 25 basis points.

'There's just a level of disbelief that the Fed would actually raise rates a hundred basis points in a year, as if a hundred basis points is a lot," economist Joel Naroff told AFP.

"You've got this 10 years of low rates and people thinking it's almost a birth right," he added. "That's creating a lot of the uncertainty." Powell's nomination to lead the Fed was widely seen as a White House signal of continuity with the end of Fed Chair Janet Yellen's era, which saw low interest rates, tame inflation, rallying markets and steady growth. But since taking office in February, Powell has managed to spook the markets at virtually every turn. The index also fell 0.2 percent following Powell's first post-FOMC press conference in March, when the central bank hiked and raised its long-term interest rate forecast by a tenth to 2.9 percent.

No 'Powell Put'

Two weeks later, Powell delivered his first speech as Fed chair, saying the central bank wanted to avoid raising rates either too quickly or too slowly. Stocks fell 2.3 percent in the wake of his comments, seemingly disappointed he had not promised to slow future rate increases in light of a possible trade war with China. Kathy Bostjancic, head of US macro

investor services at Oxford Economics, said mounting inflation could indeed force the Fed to move faster than Wall Street likes, shattering hopes the central bank will act to protect stock prices.

"I do think Chair Powell will be careful as all Fed officials are but I don't believe that there's this so-called 'Powell Put,'" she said, referring to the idea the central bank chief would attempt to put a floor under stock prices. "I don't think he could easily give deference to the equity market and enable this idea." Since the FOMC raised rates in March, economic data have pointed to continued steady growth and signs wages are rising at long last, which would be expected to boost inflation. GDP expanded by a better-thanexpected 2.3 percent in the first quarter and is projected to return to around three percent in the second quarter, and job creation remained strong.

Inflation has turned up the heat. A quarterly measure of the core Personal Consumption Expenditures price index, the Fed's preferred measure, which strips out volatile food and fuel prices, surged above the Fed's two percent target to 2.5 percent, its strongest quarter since 2007.

Naroff said Powell would be careful not to send markets nosediving-which could spill over into business confidence and hurt the real economy-even though markets are not his primary concern.

Dollar makes a comeback amid higher yields and lower tensions

Doubts over Iran supply keep oil prices afloat

KUWAIT: After the worst start to the year since 1987, the dollar is finally making its comeback. The greenback has been struggling to gain ground despite the fact that the Federal Reserve has been raising interest rates and widening the interest rate differential with other major economies. This was due to a number of factors, not the least of which is the current US pursuit of trade protectionism under Donald Trump. Additionally, US officials' talked down the US dollar at the beginning of the year, adding further downward pressure. Coupled with talks about other central banks also looking to shift gears and end their recession-era policies, the dollar was left licking its wounds for the majority of the year as investors priced in a higher risk premium. Until last week.

The past week saw the dollar enjoy one of its best performances since 2016, wiping away most of its losses in 2018. Trade protectionism fears have been calmed after widespread optimism regarding an imminent NAFTA deal. Furthermore, markets see a light at the end of the tunnel in terms of tensions with China. US Treasury Secretary Mnuchin will be visiting China in an attempt to reach some sort of understanding after recent escalation of a trade war. Also a catalyst for dollar strength was the US-10 year Treasury yield breaking the 3 percent level for the first time since 2014.

Regarding the US economy, consumer confidence levels increased in April while new home sales increased more than expected. The data signaled some strength in the economy despite signs that growth slowed in the first quarter. Meanwhile, house prices rose in February which, coupled with strong consumer confidence, should underpin consumer spending.

In the commodities market, oil prices were kept afloat as doubts over Iran's supply increased after Trump threatened new sanctions on Iran. Trump also threatened to withdraw from the international nuclear deal with Iran, calling it "ridiculous" and "insane" and saying "it should have never, ever been made". During the week, Brent Crude prices reached \$75 for the first time since 2014 as the OPEC supply cut continued. Meanwhile, gold dipped to a 6-week low as the dollar jumped and 10Y Treasury yields broke the three percent level for the first time since 2014.

UK and Europe

The Euro fell to a low of 1.2053 against the dollar last week, a level not seen since January of this year. One might think this was due to a dovish ECB, which held rates at their meeting on Thursday. However, that was not the case. ECB President Mario Draghi hailed "solid" euro zone growth, while at the same time acknowledging a slow-down in the Eurozone economy. The ECB was not overly concerned by the recent moderation in growth, and described the eurozone economy as still experiencing a solid and broad based expansion. The ECB also continued to see the risks to their growth outlook as broadly balanced, although understandably expressed more concern over downside risks posed by the recent shift to more protectionist trade policies. The dip in the Euro after the press conference was mainly due to dollar strength rather than Euro weakness, as a roaring dollar marched on towards an outstanding weekly performance.

Meanwhile in the UK, the sterling pound recorded a second week of losses after official data showed economic growth slumped in early 2018, prompting investors to scale back their bets that interest rates will rise in May. The yield on two-year gilts, which are highly sensitive to rate expectations, fell by more than seven basis points to as low as 0.794 percent, the lowest level since March 16. The last time the two-year gilt yield fell that much in one day was Nov. 2, when the Bank of England raised rates for the first time in more than 10 years but said it expected only "very gradual" increases as Brexit approached. The growth data indicated that Britain's economy grew at its weakest pace since the fourth quarter of 2012, expanding by just 0.1 percent in the first quarter of 2018. The pound ended up falling 240 points during the past week alone, ending it at a level of 1.3778.

Asia

During its meeting on Friday, Japan's central bank continued holding its rates. This time however, the bank abandoned the timeline it had set for hitting its inflation target in a sur-

prise move analysts say is aimed at keeping market expectations for more stimulus in check. Bank of Japan Governor Kuroda noted the omission of a target timeframe was aimed at preventing markets from betting on additional easing each time the BOJ pushed back the timing for hitting its price goal. Kuroda added that "while there's no change to our commitment to achieve our price goal at the earliest date possible, there's considerable uncertainty on the outlook". The Japanese yen lost ground to the US dollar, as the latter attempted to erase all losses incurred in 2018. The USD/JPY pair rose 141 points during the week, breaking the 109.00 level for the first time since February.

Mozambique cracks open its cashews to boost the economy

NAMPULA, Mozambique: Mozambique is going nuts about cashews, and they're boosting the economy's health. The country's cashew nut industry, one of the world's biggest, was dealt a body blow first by the 1977-1992 civil war and then by a controversial World Bank assistance package. Now, the government is looking to help the curved, nutrient-packed nut to recover its past glory. In Nampula, in the country's north, the end of cashew nut season sees a processing factory burst into activity. Dozens of workers labor under a scorching hot roof, baked by the sweltering heat as they separate nut from shell with a stamp of the foot.

Condor Nuts, where they work, is one business that has seized on the support offered by the government having opened a plant in a suburb of Nampula in the heart of cashew country 10 years ago.

Condor boss Americo Matos told AFP that he was just getting started. "At the moment, we process 8,000 tons of nuts every year," he said. "Our goal is to quickly grow that to 10,000 tons a year and then, with our second factory, the company targets an overall capacity of 20,000 tons per year." In Condor's warehouses, sacks brimming with nuts are piled several feet high. Hundreds of workers-as many as 1,000 at peak times-are on hand to cut, open and peel the harvest, often by hand. For working five or six hour days in noisy conditions, the workers are paid 45 euros (\$55) a month, barely more than the minimum wage. "Demand is very strong. We manage to sell everything we produce, the future is bright," Matos said.

Europe's hungry for cashews

Business is also booming for Armendo Joaquim Balanca, whose 140 cashew trees produced two tons of nuts last year. "That brought in 140,000 meticals (1,850 euros, \$2,288)," he said. "I invested half and used the rest to pay medical costs and the children's school fees." Buoyed by his success, he now plans to plant 500 new trees. Since 2010, cashew consumption has surged in Europe, where the nuts have gained in popularity primarily because of their health benefits.

Almost three million tons are harvested worldwide every year with Ivory Coast's crop leading the way with an annual production of 725,000 tons, followed by India and Vietnam. With output of just 140,000 tons every year, Mozambique lags behind the top three producers but is closing the gap-and has big ambitions. "The productivity of the cashew trees is increasing and our plans are, in the near future, to reach the historic level of 200,000 tons of nuts a year," said Prime Minister Carlos Agostinho do Rosario.

That symbolic figure was reached in the 1970s-the golden age of cashew farming-but the civil war brought the sector to its knees. When peace returned, the World Bank imposed a neoliberal economic recovery strategy that shook the sector. Experts forced the government to end a tax which had funded development of the industry locally, convinced that the export of raw nuts would be more profitable for producers.

'A good opportunity'

The impact was devastating: 10,000 factory jobs were lost while the income of more than a million farmers went into freefall. "The goal of the World Bank was to ensure that the prices were at a level high enough to be sustainable," said the current head of the World Bank's Mozambique office Mark Lundell. "There were difficulties in implementing the project," he admitted. "Our focus has always been on trying to support the industry."

Cashew nuts are now one of the crops fuelling growth in the agricultural sector. Today, almost half of the raw products are now processed locally. "Without local industry, the producers would not have been unleashed," said the government's cashew industry promoter Jaime Chissico. "We process far more locally than our African rivals and, with the increasing demand for processed products, we are in a good position." And while competition is fierce with India and Vietnam, Mozambique is holding its own and attracting international investors. Jan Le Grange, the South African owner of 1,300 hectares (3,200 acres) near Namialo to the east of Nampula, initially grew soya.

But an overly dry year followed by a season of excessive rain forced him to rethink his plans. "I decided to go for cashew trees," he said, citing stable global demand and resilient prices. Le Grange just planted 30,000 cashew trees, a number he soon hopes to triple. "It is a good opportunity. I'm very optimistic," he said. — AFP

Poland looks east to plug manpower gap

WARSAW: From behind the wheel of his new Mercedes, a Polish entrepreneur eyes the bus in front of him. It features an ad from an employment agency boasting "Builders, welders: workers from Ukraine and Bangladesh". Speaking of the Warsaw logistics company he manages, the entrepreneur tells AFP: "Right now we mostly take on Ukrainians and some Belarussians."

'We practically no longer have Poles. They're all working in Germany or Britain," he said on condition of anonymity. Demographers believe the situation will only get worse, posing a threat to Poland's continuous streak of economic growth since the fall of communism in 1989.

The current child-rearing generation is having only half the number of children than those born in the post-WWII baby boom. Combined with the exodus of skilled workers to Western Europe, where salaries are higher, the result is that a labor shortage looms. According to official forecasts, by 2030 one in five jobs will be vacant. Poland's economy will need 20 million workers at a time when the working age population will be down to 16 million people.

The agricultural sector, at least, is not short on workers, who work on millions of small farms and are more numerous than their French or German counterparts. But shifting some of those workers away to other sectors will not be enough to solve the manpower problem elsewhere. Nor can the hole be plugged by hiring the jobless-the unemployment rate was 6.6 percent last month. And encouraging older workers to stay on past retirement age won't be a solution for all jobs.

Seeking construction workers

In the construction sector, the deficit is already at 100,000 people, according to the deputy president of Poland's union of construction employers, Rafal Baldys Rembowski.

The country's biggest construction firm Budimex, which is controlled by Spain's Ferrovial, is on the hunt for 1,000 extra workers, according to spokesman Krzysztof Koziol.



"We're seeing a labor shortage in our company, but the same goes for our subcontractors, who are also complaining," he told AFP. "Sometimes they offer to provide us with construction equipment but then add that they don't have anyone to drive it." he added.

"We're short on practically all workers: masons, carpenters, concrete mixers, plasterers, pavers, drivers, machine operators. Too few foremen and engineers too.'

Despite recent legislation requiring shops to close on Sundays, large supermarket chains like French giants Auchan and Carrefour have not had to fire staff. "We actually have a hard time recruiting people," said one supermarket

official who preferred to remain anonymous. Poland, which closed its doors to refugees for security reasons, must rethink its immigration policy, according to Development Minister Jerzy Kwiecinski. "Our economy already needs foreign workers and in the future we'll need more and more," he told reporters last month. He spoke after the government announced plans to adapt Poland's migration policy to job market needs by favoring the entry of workers in sectors where there are vacancies.

Banking on foreigners The plan is also to dissuade Poles from moving abroad for work, and encouraging those already gone to return home-and bring their businesses along with them. The government also wants to make it easier for foreigners to come to Poland to study subjects crucial to the economy.

Other government plans include expanding Polish language instruction for foreigners and simplifying formalities. Even without the planned incentives, Poland has been attracting workers from abroad for years. Mainly Ukrainians, they often come without work permits or visas which, given the laws in place, makes it necessary for them to return home every three months before crossing back into

Poland three months later. Those who work off the books also risk a fine. The central bank estimates that one million Ukrainians currently work in Poland, and expects that figure could rise by nearly a third in the coming years. That dwarfs the 235,000 foreigners who received official work permits last year. "We Ukrainians come to Poland to make money. That's the only reason," said Maria Andreikiv, a pensioner who cleans houses in Warsaw. "My monthly pension in Ukraine is 1,370 hryvnias (43 euros, \$52). Here, I'll make that in a day. And prices in Ukraine aren't that much different from those in Poland," she said. — AFP

Long battle to stop companies bribing Africa for contracts

PARIS: A spectacular probe into French tycoon Vincent Bollore over suspected graft in Africa marks a rare exception among corporate titans doing business south of the Sahara. Bollorecharged on Wednesday over contracts to operate ports in Guinea and Togo-is by far the most prominent business leader to be investigated in France for suspicious activities in Africa.

Campaigners have hailed the development as a break from decades of judicial indifference or nods and winks from the government over dubious deals in the former French colonies. The investigation stems largely from laws that are less than 18 months old. The socalled Sapin II Law, passed in December 2016, compels French firms to take preventive

steps against graft. It also beefs up measures dating back to 2000 that enable punishment of corrupt practices used to win public con-

Under Sapin II, "corruption is punishable in all circumstances and in any place, even it is a crime committed abroad", said Thierry Dal Farra, director of the public business law department in UGGC Avocats, a large Parisbased firm of attorneys. The tougher legislation came after years of criticism by the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development (OECD) and specialized NGOs which accused France of turning a blind eye to corporate corruption abroad. The Bollore probe breaks new ground in France-but the United States already goes much further. Its prosecutors are empowered to pursue non-American companies for economic crimes committed outside US soil-such cases often culminate in hefty fines.

Competition without ethics

If France is a European example of tighter regulation, ferocious competition from Chinathe main trading partner of the African continent-is deemed a hurdle to abolishing bad practices. "Emerging nations that will take decades to incorporate ethical concerns into their search for market share" are a major obstacle, said William Bourbon, head of an anti-corruption association called Sherpa. "The most stereotypical are the Chinese, who intimidate the entire world and who, when it comes to corruption in Africa, act with complete impunity," he said. Already losing ground, French companies in Africa face seeing their share of contracts threatened by potentially unfair competition.

"We would really like everybody to play by the same ground rules. We need competitors who are subject to the same requirements, shared regulations and reciprocity," said a spokesman for MEDEF, France's principal employers' organization.

Last week, the International Monetary Fund (IMF) announced the adoption of new guidelines providing for more systematic assessment of corruption in its 189 members, stressing that bad practice undermines growth, investment and tax revenue. Many African countries are only too well adapted to underhand deals. — AFP

Wall Street Week Ahead

US investors face rising costs and inflation

NEW YORK: Fresh worries about rising costs and inflation face US stock investors looking toward the coming week and the next leg of the first-quarter earnings period.

In the latest week, the busiest for first-quarter reports, several companies warned about or cited higher costs. Caterpillar said it was worried about higher prices for steel it needs for manufacturing. Alphabet said margins were squeezed by rising costs related to marketing and acquiring streaming rights for YouTube's new TV service, while Procter & Gamble cited higher commodities and transportation costs.

Shares of all three companies declined even though their quarterly earnings were mostly strong. Investors will be alert for more signs of rising costs next week, which brings results from several big consumer names like Kellogg and market-cap leader Apple. Also on tap will be a Federal Reserve meeting, the April jobs report and data on wages and inflation.

The first quarter was the first reporting period since US President Donald Trump in March imposed a duty on imports of steel and aluminum. Prices for those and other commodities have risen sharply, with US crude oil and 75 percent in the first quarter.

up 7.5 percent in the first quarter.

"The wind was at the backs of these companies for a long time. Now it's sort of turned. Input costs are up for most people," said Rick Meckler, president of investment firm LibertyView Capital Management in Jersey City, New Jersey.

"How are companies able to handle that, and what are they able to do to offset it? Those are the kinds of things investors will look at."

Earnings season

Higher input costs squeeze profits for companies. Compounding these worries, the yield on 10-year US Treasuries, a benchmark for rates, this week hit 3 percent for the first time in more than four years, requiring more cash to service company debt. To be sure, estimated S&P 500 profit growth for the first quarter has risen since the start of the reporting period and is now on track to rise 24.6 percent, the strongest year-over-year growth since the fourth quarter of 2010, according to Thomson Reuters data. That is thanks largely to changes in the US tax law that slashed the corporate tax rate to 21 percent from 35 percent.

Some companies have had surprisingly strong results, like Facebook, whose stock jumped 9.1 percent and helped support a rally

in the market Thursday after its results. "Worries around corporate earnings are to what degree you're starting to see those input costs chip away at margins," said Mark Luschini, chief investment strategist at Janney Montgomery Scott in Philadelphia. So far, "earnings growth is being produced by well above-trend levels of revenue." S&P quarterly revenue growth is forecast at 8.1 percent.

But if cost and inflation worries undermine investor sentiment further, it could throw another obstacle in the US stock market's attempt to reclaim record highs. The S&P 500 is flat since April 13, when JPMorgan Chase kicked off the earnings season, and the index is down about 7 percent from its Jan. 26 record high. Among other consumer names expected to report next week are Clorox and Kraft Heinz.

The consumer staples sector has the second-weakest estimated profit growth after real estate for the quarter, at 12.1 percent, based on Thomson Reuters data.

The S&P consumer staples index, down about 11.3 percent since Dec. 31, is the weakest sector in the S&P 500 so far this year. A government report Friday said US labor costs increased more than expected in the first quarter, and wages and salaries recorded their biggest gain since 2007. This may draw attention to average hourly earnings and other data in next Friday's US jobs report.

"Companies are talking more about wages. I think they know (wage pressures) are around the corner," said Scott Wren, senior global equity strategist at Wells Fargo Investment Institute in St Louis, Missouri. — Reuters

Saudi entertainment city casts wide net for investors and contractors

QIDDIYA, Saudi Arabia: A new entertainment city that Saudi Arabia has started building southwest of the capital is seeking a broad range of financing from local and international sources, the project's chief executive told Reuters. Qiddiya is one of three mega-projects managed by the kingdom's main sovereign wealth fund, the Public Investment Fund (PIF), as part of ambitious reforms aimed at overhauling the economy of the world's top oil exporter and providing jobs for an overwhelmingly young population.

The other two initiatives are NEOM - a \$500 billion business and industrial zone extending into Egypt and Jordan - and the Red Sea project, which includes a nature reserve, diving in coral reefs and heritage sites on about 50 islands. Qiddiya CEO Michael Reininger said the PIF's contribution would probably exceed 50 percent, with the rest likely financed through bonds, direct investment and other tools.

"Perhaps all at the same (time). All of those financial strategies are what we're working on every day," he said in an interview ahead of a

groundbreaking ceremony on Saturday.

Reininger would not specify the expected investment value for Qiddiya except to describe it as "incredibly sizeable". Local media have reported the cost of the project's infrastructure alone would reach up to 30 billion riyals (\$8 bln) and the project would eventually be worth tens of billions of riyals.

Qiddiya will be built on a 334 sq km site about an hour's drive from Riyadh, making it 2-1/2 times the size of Disney World. It will include a Six Flags theme park and other attractions like water parks and motor sports. There will also be sports training, arts and cultural events, and vacation homes.

Already some 50 people are directly employed by Qiddiya, with hundreds more contracted as local suppliers and global advisors. Those numbers are expected to reach 55,000 when the first phase opens in 2022. An official spokesman said Qiddiya expects to develop 34 sq km of land and attract 1.5 million visitors annually by then.

The project aims to be the epicentre of entertainment, cultural and sports activity in a country that has historically shunned such activities on religious grounds but is now pursuing them to generate economic returns and open up Saudis' cloistered lifestyles.

Giant market

With two thirds of the population under 35 and few local entertainment offerings, many Saudis flock to nearby Bahrain or Dubai seeking fun at the weekends. The state wants to secure

up to a quarter of the \$20 billion currently spent on entertainment overseas each year.

"Capturing as much of (those expenditures) as I possibly can is the objective and at the same time creating a bigger pie so that I can get the disproportionate share of that bigger pie that we create at the same time," Reininger said.

"We're not just going to go around the world, find things and copy them. We're going to innovate and we're going to stay ahead of the curve." Reininger, an American who joined Qiddiya last month, previously worked on a high-speed rail system in Florida, oversaw large-scale resort developments for the Walt Disney Company, and was a senior executive at engineering firm AECOM.

Asked about avoiding the pitfalls of other mega projects in the region, which have suffered long delays and cost overruns and sometimes fell far short of expected returns, Reininger said Qiddiya stood apart by fulfilling a clear economic need. "It's a giant market, there's not a lot of competition, there's a clear opportunity. That's the kind of thing you want to invest in," he said.

Asked whether social restrictions in place in other parts of Saudi Arabia, like gender segregation and a strict dress code for women, would apply, Reininger said Qiddiya would stay "on the leading edge" of changes in the kingdom, which has eased many of those rules in recent years.

Entertainment has been a prominent success of Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman's reform drive, with public concerts and shows now a regular occurrence and a nearly 40-year ban on cinemas lifted this month. —Reuters

Telecom Italia CEO to quit if hedge fund breaks up board

LONDON: The head of Telecom Italia has said he will resign if a US hedge fund wins a power struggle this week with French telecom giant Vivendi, its largest shareholder, according to reports in Britain.

Amos Genish, chief executive of Telecom Italia (TIM), told the Daily Telegraph his position would become "untenable" if Elliott, a fund that holds an 8.8-percent stake in the company, succeeds in shaking up the board at a Friday shareholders meeting.

Vivendi, which owns 24 percent of TIM, has de facto control thanks to its stranglehold on board and executive positions, and opposes Elliott's aim to replace six board members-though not Genish, whom it has said it would retain. TIM is set to elect a new board at this

week's investor gathering, following the resignation last month of eight members in a bid to pre-empt the fund's move.

"If the Vivendi slate does not get the majority of votes, because this is clearly the only slate to support our long-term industrial plan, I firmly believe my position as CEO would be untenable," Genish told the Telegraph. Elliott, sometimes called a "vulture fund", proposed a motion last month to replace the board members, in the latest salvo in a simmering stand-off with Vivendi over TIM's governance.

It has repeatedly blasted the company's performance since "Vivendi nominees" joined the board in December 2015 and last month offered its own list of six "independent" replacements, well known to the Italian business community.

The move prompted the resignations of the eight TIM board members, which Elliott called "Vivendi's cynical new attempt to avoid accountability and delay the shareholder vote." The comments by Genish, a well-respected figure who won the support of an overwhelming majority of shareholders at another meeting last week, will be seen as a blow to the fund as it tries to convince investors to back its agenda. —AFP

OMV signs oil concession deal with Abu Dhabi

ABU DHABI: Abu Dhabi National Oil Company (ADNOC) yesterday signed a \$1.5 billion offshore concession deal with Austria's OMV, the UAE firm said in a statement.

The 40-year deal to develop SARB and Umm Lulu offshore oilfield is the latest in a series of contracts with foreign oil companies to develop three offshore oilfields with the aim of boosting their output. The other fields are Lower Zakum and Umm Shaif and Nasr.

ADNOC has already signed concession contracts with France's Total, Italy's ENI, Japan's INPEX and China's CNPC in addition to Spain's CEPSA and an Indian consortium led by ONGC Videsh, raising some \$8 billion in participation fees, the statement said. The deals also guarantee secure markets for around 40 percent of Abu Dhabi oil output which currently stands at 2.8 million barrels per day ADNOC said.

day, ADNOC said.

ADNOC has been vying to expand its output capacity from 3.2 million bpd currently to 3.5 million bpd by the end of 2018. Earlier this month, it invited bids for exploration contracts for six major blocks with untapped reserves of oil and gas. ADNOC said the blocks are estimated to hold billions of barrels of oil and trillions of cubic feet of natural gas. Home to more than 90 percent of United Arab Emirates (UAE) oil, Abu Dhabi is auctioning off licenses in its blocks for the first time. ADNOC wants to double its refining capacity, currently at around 800,000 bpd, and triple its petrochemicals production. —AFP

Flydubai to operate to 5 points in Iraq, restart Sulaimaniyah flights

Flydubai first carrier from UAE to operate direct flights to Kurdish city

KUWAIT: Flydubai, the Dubai-based airline, announced yesterday that flights to Sulaimaniyah will resume from 10 May 2018. The carrier now operates to five points in Iraq including Baghdad, Basra, Erbil and Najaf. The decision to relaunch the flights was taken following the Iraqi authorities' announcement that that the airport reopened in March 2018.

Flydubai is the first carrier from the UAE to operate direct flights to the Kurdish city with a twice a week service from its Dubai hub to Sulaimaniyah International Airport. The frequency is set to increase to three times a week from June this summer.

Flights FZ205/206 will operate between Dubai International Airport, Terminal 2 and Sulaimaniyah International Airport on Thursdays and Sundays and will be the 92nd destination on the codeshare list with Emirates.

Commenting on the recommencement of flights to Sulaimaniyah, Ghaith Al-Ghaith, Chief Executive Officer of flydubai, said: "We are pleased to see the direct air links between the UAE and Sulaimaniyah return after three years of suspension. Flydubai first operated to the Kurdish city in 2010 and we have seen over the



years the positive demand from the region. We look forward to further strengthening our network in Iraq, a key market that has been witnessing a rise in investment, trade and tourism."

Sulaymaniyah's economy today relies on tourism, agriculture and a rising number of

SMEs, most of which are involved in the building trade. The city is also home to the second biggest museum after the national museum in Baghdad, and hosts a number of Kurdish and ancient Persian artefacts dating back to 1792-1750 BC.



Enzyme that affects ageing, cancer decoded, claims study

PARIS: Elated scientists announced the completion of a 20-year quest to map the complex enzyme thought to forestall ageing by repairing the tips of chromosomes in plants and animals, including humans. Decoding the architecture of the enzyme, called telomerase, could lead to drugs that slow or block the ageing process, along with new treatments for cancer, they reported in the journal Nature.

"It has been a long time coming," lead investigator Kathleen Collins, a molec-

ular biologist at the University of California in Berkley, said in a statement.

"Our findings provide a structural framework for understanding human telomerase disease mutations, and represent an important step towards telomeraserelated clinical therapeutics.'

Part protein and part RNA-genetic material that relays instructions for building proteins-telomerase acts on microscopic sheaths, known as telomeres, that cover the tips of the chromosomes found inside all cells. In humans, each cell contains 23 pairs of chromosomes, including one pair of sex chromosomes-the 'X" and "Y"-that differ between males and females

Australian-American biologist Elizabeth Blackburn, who shared the 2009 Nobel Prize in Medicine for discovering telomeres and their protective function in the 1970s, likened them to the tiny plastic caps that keep shoelaces from fraying. Eventually, however, shoelace tips and telomeres do break down: every time a cell divides the telomeres get worn a little bit more, until the cell stops dividing and dies. This, biologists agree, is probably central to the natural ageing process.

A 'Wow!' moment

In 1985 Blackburn discovered telomerase, and its remarkable capacity to extend a cell's lifespan by essentially rebuilding telomeres with extra bits of DNA, much in the same way that retreading a tyre can make it nearly as good as new. Telomerase, in other words, was revealed to be a key agent in longevity. It can also be linked to disease.

"Inherited genetic mutations that compromise telomerase function cause disorders," said Michael Stone, a professor at the Center for Molecular Biology or RNA at the University of California, Santa Cruz. A deficiency of the enzyme could accelerate cell death. At the other extreme, too much telomerase "supports unbridled cell growth in most human cancers," he wrote in a commentary, also in Nature.

But early efforts to develop drugs that could control the enzyme's expressionessentially switching it on or off-"were hampered by an incomplete understanding of the structure and organization of the telomerase complex," Stone added. To crack the telomerase code, Collins and her team used a state-of-the-art cryoelectron microscope (Cryo-EM) to see the enzyme in action at unprecedented resolutions of seven or eight angstroms.

An angstrom is one ten-billionth of a metre long. Cryo-EM can decipher the molecular structures of compounds that cannot be crystallized and imaged with X-rays. It's developers won the 2017 Nobel Prize in Chemistry. "When I got to the point where I could see all the subunits-we had 11 proteins in total-it was a moment of 'Wow! Wow! This is how they all fit together'," said lead author Thi Hoang Duong Nguyen, a post-doc at UC Berkeley's Miller Institute for Basic

A 2010 study showed that ageing could be reversed in mice that were treated with telomerase. And in 2011, scientists found a way to transform age-worn cells from people over 90 into rejuvenated stem cells indistinguishable from those found in embryos. In lab experiments, several critical markers of ageing in cells were "reset", including the size of telomeres. —AFP

Rising autism rate in US an 'urgent' concern

TAMPA: The autism rate in the United States has climbed to one in 59 children, up from prior estimates of one in 68, a US government report said. Calling the neurodevelopmental disorder an "urgent public health concern," the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) said the change represents an uptick from 1.5 percent to 1.7 percent of children. The latest figures are "broad and startling," said Walter Zahorodny, an associate professor of pediatrics at Rutgers New Jersey Medical School who led the New Jersey portion of the study.

The prevalence of autism in the United States was just one in 5,000 in 1975, and has been mounting steadily in recent years, rising 150 percent since 2000, the CDC said. Researchers are still unclear what causes autism, or why it appears to be on the rise. In 2014, the CDC said one in 68 US children had autism, a rate the agency said appeared to remain steady in 2016.

"It is now clear that what we saw in 2016 was just a pause along the way," said Zahorodny. The CDC report said some of the change in prevalence in recent years "could be due to improved autism identification in minority populations, although autism is still more likely to be identified in white children than in black or Hispanic children." Autism

is also about four times more common in boys than girls. Certain risk factors are linked to autism, such as being born to parents over age 30, maternal illness during pregnancy, genetic mutations, birth before 37 weeks gestation and multiple births.

"These are true influences that are exerting an effect, but they are not enough to explain the high rate of autism prevalence," said Zahorodny. "There are still undefined environmental risks which contribute to this significant increase, factors that could affect a child in its development in utero or related to birth complications or to the newborn period. We need more research into non-genetic triggers for autism.'

People with autism may display a range of symptoms including repetitive movements, difficulty communicating, and discomfort in social situations. Some excel at non-verbal skills such as mathematics. States included in the research were Arizona, Arkansas, Colorado, Georgia, New Jersey, Maryland, Minnesota, Missouri, North Carolina, Tennessee and Wisconsin.

New Jersey had almost twice the nationwide rate, at 2.9 percent, or one in 34 kids. The lowest rate was in Arkansas, with one in 76 kids affected. Data for Thursday's report came from health and special education records of 325,483 children who were eight years old in 2014. While the figures, which come from the Autism and Developmental Disabilities Monitoring (ADDM) Network, are not representative of the entire nation, health experts widely consider them a benchmark of the autism rate in the United States. —AFP

Robert Plant doesn't want to celebrate Led Zeppelin's 50th anniversary because of the "darkness" it brings John Bonham's family. The 'Whole Lotta Love' hitmakers mark the milestone years since their first gig later this year and though the 69-year-old singer - who was badly injured in a car accident in 1975 and lost his son Karac, five, to a stomach virus two years later - can appreciate there will be some "great things" release to mark the occasion, he's very aware that it's also tinged with sadness, especially as it's been so long since their drummer passed away after choking on his own vomit following a

drinking binge. Asked if the prospect of new Led Zeppelin activity excites him, he said: "No. It just makes me realize how time flies and how long John Bonham has not been with us and what a price to pay for the whole thing. "To have gone through car wrecks and losing my child and then losing the guy who tried to help me get back into a creative place after losing my boy ... So really, everything is fine. It's 50 years but it's not 50 years - it's 38 years of darkness for a family (Bonham's). So all that hullabaloo is great and I'm sure there'll be some great things to come out of it." However, with his bandmate Jimmy Page recently confirming

he'll be working on more special releases to mark the occasion. Robert is looking forward to seeing what they will be. He told MOJO magazine: "I really can't wait to hear them - I might even get a free copy." The group's website previously teased that they will be giving their fans lots of "surprises' for their anniversary, including neverheard-before tracks. In a video posted on the Academy of Achievement website, Jimmy said: "There'll be Led Zeppelin product coming out, for sure, that people haven't heard, because I'm working on that. Next year will be the 50th year, so there's all manner of surprises coming out."

But while the pair are having fun together, the 'Message in a Bottle' hitmaker admitted their partnership won't last beyond one album and a tour. Sting, 66, said: "This was great fun to make but we did it because we wanted to surprise people. We've done that so it wouldn't be a surprise next time. But the tour is going to be great fun." Shaggy, 49, is looking forward to going out on the road with his friend but he still gets nervous about getting up on stage. He told HELLO! magazine: "I get professional nerves a bit. Steven Spielberg speaks of Schindler's **List 'trauma'**

teven Spielberg says Robin Williams got him through the "trauma" of filming 'Schindler's List'. The legendary director credits the 'Mrs. Doubtfire' star who passed away in August 2014 - for helping him through the tough filming for the period drama, which documents the persecution of Jewish people by the Nazis. Speaking at the Tribeca Film Festival's special 25th anniversary screening of the film, Steven revealed: "Robin called me. Robin knew what I was going through. Once a week he called me on schedule. He knew exactly what time it was in Poland, what time it was in San Francisco ... and he would do 15 minutes of stand-up on the phone, and I would laugh hysterically because I had to release so much. The way Robin is on the telephone, he'd always hang up on the loudest, best laugh you'd give him. He'd never say goodbye, just hang up on the biggest laugh." Spielberg - who took the helm of the movie - picked up the Best Picture and Best Director at the Oscars the following year but didn't feel like he could celebrate their win because of its harrowing subject matter. He shared: "That night wasn't really a celebration at all. I don't feel this movie is a celebration. The subject matter and the impact the film had on all of us ... took sort of the celebration out of that. It was wonderful to win, but at the same time I just remember how moved I was when Branko Lustig, our co-producer, showed the world that he was in Auschwitz, too, and had numbers on his arms.'



Rachel McAdams won't 'stay safe' in career



achel McAdams doesn't want to "stay safe" with her career. The Disobedience' actress is keen to push herself out of her comfort zone with her work and loves the unpredictable nature of her job. She said: "I'm always looking to take on roles that push me further than I might like to go. I don't want to repeat myself and stay safe. One of the things I love about acting is how I never know exactly where a character is going to take me." When it comes to choosing her projects, the 39-year-old actress wants to find a "connection" to the character. She said: "I've never worried about [playing determined women]. I've worked on serious dramas, such as 'A Most Wanted Man' and I also played a nasty woman who tormented Owen Wilson in 'Midnight in Paris'. "I judge projects by the people involved and the quality of the writing. As long as I feel a connection to the character, I'm willing to play almost any role. Tourism boom to test Uzbekistan's thaw

oiffed, cheerful and multilingual, identical twins Fatima and Zukhra Rakhmatova do not immediately resemble agents of ex-Soviet Uzbekistan's long-feared security apparatus. But the photogenic 30-year-old pair are frontline members of a newly formed, user-friendly Tourist Police deployed in the famed Silk Road city of Samarkand and other hotspots as a visitor boom sweeps the Central Asian country. The force, established in January, is viewed as part of a broader opening initiated by Uzbekistan's authoritarian government following a long period of self-enforced isolation.

More than 2.5 million tourists visited Uzbekistan last year, a 24 percent increase on the previous year, according to the UzDaily news site. "In the past I worked as a teacher and then as a wedding stylist. I even won a national prize as a stylist," recalls Zukhra Rakhmatova, one half of a sister act proficient in English, Russian, Farsi, Turkish and Japanese. "But our grandfather served in the force and our uncle too," Rakhmatova told AFP. "It was always our dream to serve."

Change and continuity

Samarkand-a former power center positioned at the epicenter of millennia-old trade routes linking China and Europe-hosts symbols of authoritarian continuity as well as tentative reform. A short walk from the ceramic and marble dazzle of the three madrasahs towering over the city's old square is the statue of Islam Karimov, who ruled the country from before independence in 1991 until his death in 2016. Laid to rest in a grand mausoleum in Samarkand's historic center, Karimov is criticized by rights groups as the architect of one of the world's most repressive and closed-off police states.

Far from being disavowed, his monument is now

yet another photo opportunity for visitors and wedding parties in the city, where he was born in 1938 and remains widely revered. "Everyone makes mistakes but Islam Karimov is a hero. He worked day and night to protect the Uzbek people," said a 22-year-old bridesmaid posing for pictures by the monument. The young woman, who did not give her name but said she had travelled to Samarkand from the capital Tashkent, refused to say what "mistakes" she thought Karimov

Power struggle

Whether out of political pragmatism or genuine deference to a man he served for 13 years as prime minister, Karimov's successor, 60-year-old Shavkat Mirziyoyev has also continued to honor his mentor in public. In the aftermath of the former leader's death, new strongman Mirziyoyev likened him to a "father", even as he toned down some of the totalitarian excesses that defined Karimov's 27-year rule.

Foreign tourism, which grew by around a quarter during Mirziyoyev's first year in office emerged as a key battleground in a power struggle that pitted the new reform-touting president against regime hardliners. In February for instance, Mirziyoyev ordered the introduction of a 30-day visa-free regime for citizens of seven countries-Israel, Indonesia, South Korea, Malaysia, Singapore, Turkey and Japan-and relaxation of registration rules for citizens of 39 others. In cities like Samarkand, the changes were cheered by a population that endured long stretches of economic stagnation under Karimov.

"(We need to) open up of course!" said Malika Shakhimardonova, a chef at a mutton-grilling teahouse in the shadows of the Bibi-Khanym Mosque, completed on the orders of medieval conqueror Tamerlane in the 15th century. "Let the tourists arrive to us like brothers and sisters!" Shakhimardonova, whose kitchen is expanding.

'Take photos and share them!'

Many saw significance in the fact that Mirziyoyev's relaxation of visa restrictions came days after Rustam Inoyatov, 73, who led the notorious national security service for over two decades, was dismissed. Inoyatov was widely reported to have blocked a previous effort by Mirziyoyev to revamp tourism and to have insisted on retaining long-standing security measures, including a blanket ban on photography in the capital's metro. Such bans, which occasionally saw visitors detained by police, were "rudiments of the Soviet Union" now consigned to the past, said the country's new 44-year-old tourism chief Aziz Abdukhakimov.

"We want tourists to take as many photos as possible. Put them on Instagram! It is the best advert for the country," he told AFP. The Rakhmatova sisters. who scoot around Samarkand on two-wheeled, motorized "Segways" and are trained to administer first aid, certainly seem far removed from the grimmer elements of a former communist police state. But Fatima jokes their dual presence on the tourism beat might sometimes give visitors a different impression. "Some tourists will see one of us close to one attraction then move on to another and find the other sister standing there," she explained. "They smile but sometimes give us a strange look. Probably because we are identical they think the police are following them around," she laughed. — AFP

Jordan woos back nervous tourists

ith its rock-hewn ancient city of Petra, lunarlike landscape of Wadi Rum and a medical tourism drive, Jordan is luring back foreign visitors scared off by regional upheaval and jihadist attacks. Abundant natural wonders and ancient treasures have long attracted tourists to the kingdom, traditionally seen as a haven of peace in a war-ravaged region. But after the Arab Spring uprisings convulsed the Middle East in 2011 and the Islamic State group (IS) later rampaged across neighboring Syria and Iraq, visitor numbers slumped.

Jordan welcomed seven million tourists in 2010, but arrivals plunged to around three million in each of the following two years, according to tourism board head Abed Al Razzaq Arabiyat. Efforts to reverse the slide suffered a major setback in 2016 with a string of attacks in the kingdom, a member of the US-led alliance against IS. A Canadian tourist was among 10 people killed in a shooting rampage claimed by the jihadists in Karak, home to one of the region's biggest Crusader castles. But the spillover from the Syrian conflict has since abated and in 2017 tourist arrivals rebounded to more than four million, officials say.

"Jordan has proved to be a safe haven in a region which is witnessing turmoil," Tourism Minister Lina Mazhar Annab told AFP in an interview. "Jordan is a very safe country. We are proving to be safer than a lot of European countries. It is a matter of perception." The country's goal is to bring annual tourist arrivals back up to 7 million by 2020, she said, guiding a group of visitors through the steep paths of the ancient Nabataean city of Petra with its rose-pink cliffs. The UNESCO World Heritage Site, which featured in the Hollywood film "Indiana Jones and the Last Crusade", was once a major



crossroads for caravans transporting Arabian incense, Indian spices and Chinese silks.

'Huge cultural wealth'

Today Jordan's historical jewels are a major draw. "I came here because it's a country with huge cultural wealth," said French tourist Emmanuel Reneaume, visiting the Amman Citadel perched at the top of a hill in the capital. "Just behind us there are ruins, a Roman temple, a Byzantine church and an Umayyad mosque. It's exciting," he said. Jordan boasts 21,000 archaeological and historical sites that span millennia, according to the tourism board. They include the Roman ruins of Jerash, the Dead Sea and Wadi Al-Kharrar, or Bethany Beyond the Jordan, where some biblical historians believe Jesus was baptized. Such sites are helping to attract a growing number of tourists from Asian countries including Malaysia, Indonesia, China and India, according to the authorities. "People are coming back from all over the world," said the tourism minister. "This year, so far, it's looking great. The first quarter has been amazing. We also have seen growth of 15 percent in the number of visitors as well as tourism receipts."

Lacking in natural resources, the country of nearly 10 million depends on tourism for around 12 percent of

gross domestic product (GDP). In an attempt to diversify, the kingdom has sought to become a regional hub of medical tourism. "Between 250,000 and 300,000 foreign patients are admitted in Jordan each year, bringing in up to \$1.5 billion," said the president of the country's Private Hospitals Association, Fawzi Al-Hammouri. In March the government adopted a measure facilitating the entry of



patients from Iraq, Yemen, Syria, Libya, Sudan, Chad and Ethiopia, allowing them to obtain a visa within 48 hours.

Samer Mostafa, a 50-year-old Iraqi who underwent open-heart surgery in a private hospital in the capital, said he was attracted by Jordan's "stable security situation, the cleanliness of its hospitals and the absence of power cuts in such facilities". Medical tourism now directly employs 35,000 people in Jordan, according to Hammouri. The majority of patients come from Saudi Arabia, Iraq, Libya, Sudan, Yemen, Syria and the Palestinian territories.

Jordan is also a stop for Muslim pilgrims visiting holy sites in the region. And now the kingdom hopes to woo more European visitors thanks to an agreement struck in February with low-cost airline Ryanair for 14 new routes between Europe and Jordan. All of which gives tourism agency owner Salama Khatar reason for optimism. "Business is good. Since August we are starting to return to the situation of 2010," Khatar said. — AFP

King Khalmani who reigned between 207 BC and 186 BC," Mahmoud Suleiman, the head of a team of archaeologists, told journalists in Bajarawiya, about 250 kilometers (155 miles) north of Khartoum, late Tuesday.

The bones so far discovered are believed to have belonged to more than one person and have been shown to journalists, including an AFP reporter, by a team of archaeologists in Bajarawiya. DNA tests should shed light on the relation between the bones, while further items are expected to be recovered from another of the pyramid's chambers, the team said. "In the coming days we will open" another of the three burial chambers, said Murtada Bushara, a second archaeologist from the team. This chamber "contains a coffin," Bushara added. The dig is raising hopes that the remains of King Khalmani himself may be uncovered.

Evidence of world's biggest child sacrifice found in Peru

rchaeologists in Peru have found evidence of the biggest-ever sacrifice of children, uncovering the remains of more than 140 youngsters who were slain alongside 200 llamas as part of a ritual offering some 550 years ago, National Geographic announced on Thursday. The site was located on top of a cliff facing the Pacific Ocean in La Libertad, a northern region where the Chimu civilization arose, an ancient pre-Columbian people who worshipped the moon. The cliff is located just outside the northwestern coastal city of Trujillo, Peru's third largest city which today has 800,000 inhabitants.

"While incidents of human sacrifice among the Aztec, Mava and Inca have been recorded in colonial-era Spanish chronicles and documented in modern scientific excavations, the discovery of a large-scale child sacrifice event in the little-known pre-Columbian Chimu civilization is unprecedented in the Americas-if not in the entire world," National Geographic said. The investigations were carried out by an international team led by National Geographic's Peruvian explorer Gabriel Prieto, of the National University of Trujillo, and John Verano, a physical anthropologist from Tulane University in New

The team uncovered evidence of "the largest single incident of mass child sacrifice in the Americas-and likely in world history." "I, for one, never expected it," Verano told the magazine of the sacrifice site, known to the researchers as "Las Llamas." "And I don't think anyone else would have, either," he added. The excavations began in 2011 when the team uncovered the remains of 42 children and 76 llamas at a 3,500-yearold temple nearby.

By the time the excavations had finished five years lat-

er, they had uncovered more than 140 sets of child remains and 200 juvenile llamas, as well as rope and textiles dating to between 1400 and 1450. Located about 300 meters above sea level, the site is in the middle of a cluster of residential compounds in Huanchaco, a neighborhood bordering Trujillo.

Hearts removed?

"The skeletal remains of both children and animals show evidence of cuts to the sternum as well as rib dislocations, which suggest that the victims' chests were cut open and pulled apart, perhaps to facilitate the removal of the heart," the magazine said.


Researchers determined that the children were between the ages of five and 14, although most were between eight and 12 when they died, with their bodies buried facing west-out to sea. The llamas were all less

than 18 months and they were buried facing east, toward the Andes, they said. "It is ritual killing, and it's very systematic," Verano said.

The Chimu civilization extended along the Peruvian coast to where Ecuador begins, with its empire brought down by the Incas in around 1475, just a few decades after the sacrifice at Las Llamas. "Until now, the largest mass child sacrifice event for which we have physical evidence is the ritual murder and interment of 42 children at Templo Mayor in the Aztec capital of Tenochtitlan," National Geographic said, referring to what is modernday Mexico City. — AFP

The library of Ajaccio, Ali Baba's cave unexpected

rare book on Egyptology, unpublished letters signed by Napoleon, a book signed by Gustave Eiffel on the "300-meter tower": it is in the modest Fesch library of Ajaccio that these forgotten treasures were discovered by chance these last months. It is "between the directory of Corsica and a Marc Levy", in the middle of "old dentures and cockroaches", that Vannina Schirinsky-Schikhmatoff, conservative missioned by the town hall of Ajaccio to restore order in the reserve of the library, discovered the "Thesaurum Hyeroglyphicorum" which dates from 1610.

"This is the first book of Egyptology. The Museum of Man has a complete copy and the BNF (National Library of France) has an incomplete, in total there are seven listed in the world including three complete, "she said, regretting that two pages missing in the copy found in Ajaccio. "The Corsicans are considered underdeveloped at the cultural level and for the first time, we have a work that places us at the world level", welcomes the curator of the library that dates from the early 19th century and is installed in the palace Fesch, in the pedestrian street of downtown Ajaccio.

Over the pages covered with engravings, we discover the finesse and extraordinary precision of the hieroglyphs of the book from the prestigious collection of Jean-Baptiste Colbert, one of the principal ministers of Louis XVI. For the Italian Egyptologist, Francesco Tiradritti, director of the Italian archeology mission in Luxor, it is "an important discovery".

Treasure hunt

"We are setting up an international project around this book," says AFP expert, expected in Ajaccio in September.

According to Schirinsky-Schikhmatoff, he is working on "a scientific publication and a major exhibition". "This is a very important book that is at the root of modern Egyptology," adds Simone Martini, Italian art restorer commissioned by the Ajaccian town hall to intervene on this rare piece and a dozen old books. Among them, several incunabula, works printed before 1500, including "The Chronicles of Nuremberg" dating from 1493.

"The artistic and historical value of these works, like many others in the library, is remarkable," he insists. He started "washing" these books to rid them of mold and must complete their restoration in September. It is also by working on a Petrarch dating from 1496 that he himself

exhumed, between the wooden cover and the front page, two medieval parchments.

Vannina Schirinsky-Schikhmatoff also mentions the original and complete editions of Napoleon's Egyptian campaign, "fifteen volumes found at the four corners of the library", or "The Tower of 300 meters", "a double volume of Gustave Eiffel signed by his hand "which unites the plans of the iron lady of Paris. "I make the patrimonial rescue, it's like a treasure hunt", she summarizes, insatiable, presenting her latest find: letters written by several members of the imperial family, nine of which were signed by Napoleon, who escaped little in the trash.

"Letters not listed in the correspondence of Napoleon that we are the only ones to hold" and which date from the campaign of Germany of the emperor in 1813, she says, fulminating that an unpublished is missing, "probably stolen".

Ajaccio's head of libraries, Elisabeth PeriÈ, regrets that "there are many books missing, loans that have not been made" but stresses that the security of the library has now been strengthened. It is now conducting work to provide the "gold mine" with adequate humidity and temperature conditions, including protecting it from a sewage pipe that

runs through the library's storage area.

Accomplices, Vannina Shirinsky-Schikhmatoff and Elisabeth PeriÈ have no doubt that other treasures are still sleeping in the heritage room of the library whose inventory remains to be done. "It will take several lives, I have explored only 5 percent of the library," note, amused, the curator who dreams of exposing his findings to the public. — AFP

DJ Avicii 'could not go on any longer'


wedish superstar Avicii, one of the world's most successful DJs who died a week ago aged 28, "wanted peace" and "could not go on any longer", his family said in an open letter on Thursday. The musician, whose real name was Tim Bergling, was found dead on April 20 in Muscat, the capital of the Gulf sultanate Oman, where he had been on holiday with friends. "He really struggled with thoughts about Meaning, Life, Happiness," his family wrote in the letter, seen by AFP. "He could not go on any longer. He wanted to find peace," they added.

A spokeswoman for the artist declined to confirm whether he had committed suicide. A police source in Oman said his death was not considered to be suspicious, adding that the circumstances would remain confidential at the request of the family. He had made no secret of his health problems, including pancreatitis, triggered in part by excessive drinking linked to his party lifestyle. "Tim was not made for the business machine he found himself in; he was a sensitive guy who loved his fans but shunned the spotlight," his family said. In 2016, Avicii stunned fans by announcing his retirement when he was just 26, saying that he wanted to leave the high-flying electronic music lifestyle.

"When he stopped touring, he wanted to find a balance in life to be happy and be able to do what he loved most-music," his family said. His biggest hits included "Wake Me Up," which went to number one across Europe in 2013 and featured the soul singer Aloe Blacc. Avicii-who for years was one of the world's most lucrative electronic musicians-in 2016 made number 12 on the list of toppaid DJs of Forbes magazine, which said he earned \$14.5 million in the previous year. — AFP
