Amir undergoes 'successful' medical examinations

KUWAIT: The National Assembly's legal and legislative committee yesterday approved a draft law stipulating a mandatory health insurance scheme for expatriates living and working in the country. The committee also approved a proposal to impose charges on medical services for expatriates opting to seek treatment at public hospitals. At present, expatriates are required to pay KD 50 annually on renewal of their residence per-

mits and also pay partial fees for most health services at public hospitals. The opinion of the government, which

is crucial for the passage of the bill, was not explained.

The new bill comes even as the government and the Assembly had approved a law to establish hospitals for the treatment of expatriates only. The Assembly is expected to debate today a draft law calling to impose obligatory health insurance on foreigners who visit the country. The bill stipulates that before issuing a visit visa to a foreigner, the sponsor must attach a health insurance policy to the application. The committee also approved a draft law granting Kuwaiti employees and pensioners a KD 50 monthly allowance for fuel. The move comes a couple of years after the government raised the prices of fuel for both expatriates and

The Assembly is also expected to debate today the controversial early retirement law amid strong rejection by several lawmakers. The bill was approved by the Assembly's financial and economic affairs committee after consultations with the government and accepting some of the government's terms. MPs opposed to the new format say that the bill has been totally manipulated to be in line with government demands. The law, which allows Kuwaiti male and female civil servants to retire early, was passed by the Assembly in the last term but was rejected by the government. MPs want Kuwaiti employees to retire five years ahead of the legal retirement age but still enjoy full benefits.

Meanwhile, prominent opposition lawmaker Shuaib Al-Muwaizri yesterday ignored for the second time an invitation by the legal committee to discuss the constitutionality of a grilling he had submitted against the prime minister. The government claimed that the grilling violated the constitution and argued that it must be reviewed by the legal committee to see if it complies with the constitution to be debated. Opposition MPs strongly rejected the move, which was approved by pro-government lawmakers and all present Cabinet

The legal committee last week invited Muwaizri to hear his opinion on the issue but he abstained. The com-

mittee then invited Muwaizri again for yesterday's meeting, but he again ignored the invitation. The lawmaker did not make any comment on the issue, but it is clear that he is annoyed by the Assembly's decision to refer the grilling to the legal committee. Rapporteur of the panel MP Khalil Abul said the committee will not invite Muwaizri again but its report to the Assembly will not be ready for debate today, but for the Dec 25 session.

Israel can overfly Sudan, Oman

JERUSALEM: Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu said yesterday that Israeli airliners would be able to overfly Sudan en route to South America. Last month, Netanyahu and Chadian President Idriss Deby renewed relations severed by N'Djamena in 1972. Netanyahu told a briefing of diplomats his talks with Deby had helped open up a new air corridor to South America. "At this time, we can overfly Egypt. We can overfly Chad, that has already been set. And to all appearances, we can also overfly this corner of Sudan," he said, pointing to a map. Israeli diplomats say there have been low-level contacts with Sudan in recent years, although the authorities there have been reluctant to acknowledge them publicly. In October, Netanyahu made a surprise visit to Oman, a Gulf state that does not formally recognize Israel. Netanyahu said yesterday that Omani leader Sultan Qaboos had agreed to overflights by Israeli airline El Al. — Reuters

Israeli child sex network busted

BOGOTA: Colombian police have arrested six Israelis on charges of running a sex tourism operation that exploited underage girls. After a two-year investigation, Prosecutor General Nestor Humberto Martinez said agents have broken up "an Israeli mafia that exploited and used girls, adolescents and women as sex slaves in Colombia". Two Colombians were also arrested. Among those arrested was Israeli alleged gang leader Mor Zohar, and a Colombian police officer said to have helped protect the gang. The network was allegedly led by Israeli citizen Benyamin Mush, who has traveled in and out of Colombia and Central American countries. According to testimony obtained from victims, the minors received between \$65 and \$126 and were forced to belong to a WhatsApp group code-named after the Jewish holiday Purim. — AFP

Taj Mahal ticket hiked fivefold

NEW DELHI: Authorities have hiked fivefold ticket prices for Indian visitors to the Taj Mahal, in the latest attempt to lower tourist numbers and reduce damage at the country's top tourist site. Indians make up the majority of the Taj Mahal's 10,000-15,000 average daily visitors. Nearly 6.5 million people marvelled at the white marble 17th-century masterpiece in 2016. An all-inclusive ticket for Indian citizens including entry into the Taj Mahal, built by Mughal emperor Shah Jahan as a tomb for his beloved wife Mumtaz Mahal, was raised from 50 rupees (\$0.70) to 250 rupees. International tourists will pay roughly \$19 to enter the UNESCO World Heritage complex in northern India, up from \$16. The latest move comes only months after Indian authorities restricted the number of tourists to 40,000 per day. Previously up to 70,000 people would throng the site at weekends. — AFP

Kuwait warns social media not for kids; screen time impacts children's brains

KUWAIT/ WASHINGTON: Kuwait's attorney general has called for strict guidelines to ensure that children are adequately protected from the potential dangers associated with social media. Chief among the new guidelines is introducing age restrictions requiring social media users to be at least 13 years of age, the justice ministry cited Dharar Al-Asousi as saying in a statement yesterday. It strictly prohibited the commercial exploitation of children on social media websites, with the exception of "positive advertisements" for products that usually bear the likeness of kids.

Examples of positive adverts usually deal with philanthropic deeds, healthcare and education, all of which leave a lasting impression on the lives of children, the statement clarified. Any material deemed as an invasion of privacy or an intrusion into the personal lives of children is not allowed, in addition to the exploitation of children for financial gain, it added. Such topics usually create fodder for conversation that steers away from proper

decorum instead of depicting exceptional and talented children in a positive light, the statement explained. The justice ministry added that all necessary measures will be taken to ensure that these guidelines are strictly enforced.

Meanwhile, researchers have found "different patterns" in brain scans among children who record heavy smart device and video game use, according to initial data from a major ongoing US study. The first wave of information from the \$300 million National Institute of Health (NIH) study is showing that those nine and 10year-old kids spending more than seven hours a day using such devices show signs of premature thinning of the cortex, the brain's outermost layer that processes sensory information.

UN meet adopts migration pact despite pullouts

MARRAKESH: A United Nations conference adopted a migration pact in front of leaders and representatives from around 150 countries in Morocco yesterday, despite a string of withdrawals driven by anti-immigrant populism. The Global Compact for Safe, Orderly and Regular Migration - finalized at the UN in July after 18 months of talks - was formally approved with the bang of a gavel in Marrakesh at the start of a two-day conference. But the United States and 15 other countries either opted out or expressed concerns, with some claiming the pact infringes national sovereignty.

Billed as the first international document on managing migration, it lays out 23 objectives to open up legal migration and discourage illegal border crossings, as the number of people on the move globally has surged to more than 250 million. Describing it as a "roadmap to prevent suffering and chaos", UN Secretary General Antonio Guterres sought to dispel what he called a number of myths around the pact, including claims that it will allow the UN to impose migration policies on member states.

Indian central bank gov quits; fugitive tycoon faces extradition

NEW DELHI/LONDON: The head of India's central bank resigned yesterday following a public spat with Prime Minister Narendra Modi's administration about alleged government interference. Reserve Bank of India (RBI) governor Urjit Patel cited "personal reasons" for his decision, but media reports have said that he was annoyed by repeated government efforts to influence central bank policy. It comes after Patel's deputy, Viral Acharya, warned the government in a strongly worded

speech in October that undermining the bank's independence could be "potentially catastrophic".

Patel's short statement yesterday made no mention of the rift, highlighting only what he called the RBI's "considerable accomplishments in recent years". "On account of personal reasons, I have decided to step down from my current position effective immediately, Patel said in the statement which was posted on the bank's website. The governor and finance ministry officials were reported to be at loggerheads in recent months over claims that the government was trying to influence the bank's decision-making.

Indian business dailies reported in October and November that Modi's government had invoked neverbefore-used powers to send at least three letters to Patel seeking to direct policy. Newspapers suggested that Patel was close to quitting over the issue at the time, but the tension was believed to have been diffused following clear-the-air talks three weeks ago. "The RBI and the government had numerous differences but





Patel's resignation is shocking," Sujan Hajra, an economist at Anand Rathi securities, told AFP. "There was a belief both were ironing out their differences but the resignation raises issues about the RBI's independence," he added. The government is believed to be unhappy with the RBI over a number of issues including interest rates, how to deploy reserves and how to respond to India's sliding rupee.



The project aims to showcase the development of the historic neighborhood through its transformation into a globally-recognized touristic cultural center, Saudi Press Agency reported. The location has many historic, cultural, urban and environmental characteristics that would place it amongst the world's most renowned cultural sites. The neighborhood overlooks Huthaifa Valley in the Diriya region, located at the heart of the Arabian Peninsula. Once the center of command of the First Saudi State, it consists of a fort, palaces, homes and mosques that date back to the 18th century.

Unity of member states

The 39th Gulf Cooperation Council (GCC) Summit concluded in Riyadh on Sunday, after which leaders of the GCC reaffirmed keenness on unity of member countries, calling for achieving full-fledge integration, and forming a "single and effective" foreign policy. Leaders of the six Arab



Gulf states acknowledged the threats that undermined security and stability of the region, calling for cementing efforts for a collective action to honor aspirations of the GCC people, said the 'Riyadh Declaration' released after the conclusion of the summit.

The GCC leaders reaffirmed keenness on maintaining unity of member countries and noted their Gulf bloc realized many achievements that contributed to regional security, stability, economic and social prosperity. They said challenges required further efforts to achieve integration at economic,

social, political, security and military levels, said the declaration. They called for completing programs and projects needed to honor Saudi King Salman bin Abdulaziz's integration vision to ultimately boost the regional and international role of the GCC. They called for addressing all obstacles to achieve economic integration by 2025 and to complete requirement for creation of the common market and custom union.

The GCC leaders appointed a commander for the joint military command to advance towards completion of the joint defense system, while underlining importance of the bloc's role in addressing extreme ideologies through promotion of moderation, tolerance, human rights, rule of law and Islamic sharia. They called for joining hands with partners within the international community to eliminate terrorism and drying its financing resources. The leaders also called for forming a "single and effective" foreign policy to be based on the statute, noted the declaration. They reiterated support for the Palestinian cause and the Yemeni people.

Upon his return to Kuwait after chairing the country's delegation to the summit, His Highness the Amir was received by His Highness the Crown Prince Sheikh Nawaf Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah, National Assembly Speaker Marzouq Al-Ghanem, His Highness the Prime Minister Sheikh Jaber Mubarak Al-Hamad Al-Sabah, as well as

Cabinet commends GCC summit outcomes

KUWAIT: The Kuwaiti cabinet has applauded the outcomes of the 39th GCC summit held in Riyadh on Sunday, and appreciated the relevant efforts of His Highness the Amir Sheikh Sabah Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah and other GCC leaders. This came during the cabinet's customary weekly meeting presided over by His Highness the Prime Minister Sheikh Jaber Al-Mubarak Al-Hamad Al-Sabah.

During the meeting, Deputy Premier and Foreign minister Sheikh Sabah Khaled Al-Hamad Al-Sabah briefed his colleagues on the findings of the GCC gathering and His Highness the Amir's speech, which stressed the significance of safeguarding the Gulf bloc amid the ongoing serious regional conditions and challenges, the deputy prime minister said following the meeting.

Sheikh Sabah Al-Khaled also kept the cabinet on the final communique of the annual Gulf event, which underlined Gulf unity, along with economic, military and security integrity, Anas Al-Saleh, who doubles as minister of state for cabinet affairs, said in a statement. Later, His Highness the Prime Minister expounded on the outcomes of a recent visit by Libyan Prime Minister Fayez Al-Sarraj to Kuwait, along with the findings of his meetings with Kuwaiti officials on existing bilateral relations and issues of mutual interest. KUWAIT: Farwaniya Governor Sheikh Faisal Al-Hmoud Al-Sabah stressed the need to work on resolving the problem of Kuwait's demographic imbalance immediately in order to limit the spread of crimes and incidents that are considered 'strange' in Kuwait, especially in view of the surge of illegal and marginal laborers throughout the gov-

ernorate. He hailed the efforts exerted by the Public Authority for Manpower in fighting visa traffickers through decisions such as the recent ban on residency transfer for three years from the date of the issuance of the work permit.

Sheikh Faisal also noted that he was among the first who called to fight illegal

workers, as they cost state-funded public facilities considerable amounts of money and provide a perfect environment for crimes. Finally, he called for imposing strict laws on whoever takes Kuwait's safety and security lightly and setting strict measures for expats.

When asked about the possibility of issuing decisions related to organization of the marketplace soon, she said: "There are many decisions to be issued soon following the meeting of the Manpower Public Authority's board of directors that was held recently, as several decisions were approved and will be announced in the coming period."

Development projects

A recently published government document showed that Kuwait spent KD 1.37 billion on development projects until Oct 2018 of the fiscal year 2018-2019, which includes a KD 3.8 billion budget for development projects, which means that 36.1 percent of the budget has been spent so far. The document also justified the reduction of the budget set by the finance ministry for development projects over the past three years by reducing the number of projects as a result of using new project selection methods.

The document added that 957 development projects had been executed during the fiscal years 2015/2016, 2016/2017 and 2017/2018 with a total cost of KD 11.5 billion, of which KD 8.7 billion had been actually spent on the projects. Further, the document showed that the fiscal year 2017/2018 witnessed executing 149 development projects with a total value of KD 2.9 billion, of which KD 2.5 billion (86.4 percent) was actually spent, while 279 projects with a total value of KD 2.9 billion were executed in 2016/2017.

In addition, the documents showed that development projects during the three fiscal years faced 538 challenges, topped by administrative problems and red tape which recurred 182 times, technical problems, legislative problems and monitoring problems.

Kuwait fund signs loan deals with Ivory Coast, Malawi

SHARM EL-SHEIKH, Egypt: Ivory Coast and Kuwait Fund for Arab Economic Development (KFAED) signed Sunday a loan agreement whereby the fund will provide a loan of KD 9 million (\$30.6 million) to finance an environmental project. The loan agreement was signed by Ivory Coast's Minister of Finance Adama Kone and KFAED's Director-General Abdulwahab Al-Bader on the sidelines of the 2018 Africa Conference. The project aims to support economic and social development in the Gulf of Kokodi in particular by improving the environmental and health conditions of the population of that region. This is done through a comprehensive multispectral project including interventions in the field of wastewater treatment and transport, among other measures to restore the saline water characteristics of the Iberian lake in the Abidjan area, particularly in the project area.

The project consists of civil, electrical and mechanical works for hydraulic installations, landscaping, sewage treatment facilities, rainwater drainage and road infrastructure. The loan is for a period of 25 years, including a grace period of six years. The loan is

repayable in 38 installments. The loan represents KFAED's seventh to the Republic of Ivory Coast, where the past six loans financed projects in the transport, agriculture, drinking water, electricity and vocational training sectors with a total value of KD 31.076 million. KFAED is a Kuwaiti public institution that relies entirely on its own resources in providing loans and other development assistance.

Water network expansion

Similarly, a loan agreement between Malawi and KFAED was signed to help finance expansion of drinking water network in Mangochi city, totaling KD 5 million (\$17 million). The signing ceremony took place on the sideline of the Africa 2018 Forum. The agreement was signed by Malawi Ambassador to Egypt Caroline Bwanali Mussa and KFAED chief Abdulwahab Al-Bader.

The project aims to meet the growing demand for drinking water, protect public health, utilize natural resources efficiently, and reduce waste by establishing a water treatment plant and water transmission and distribution networks in the city to serve the population of about 50,000 people and is expected to increase to 93,000 by 2036. The total cost of the project is estimated at KD 6.3 million. The government of Malawi will cover the remaining cost. This is KFAED's eighth loan to the Republic of Malawi. The past seven loans financed projects in the telecommunications and transport sectors with a total value of KD 24.520 million (\$83.368 million). — KUNA

New terminal fully open

KUWAIT: Full operation has started at Kuwait International Airport's Terminal 4 (T4), which opened its gates last July, Kuwait's Civil Aviation Authority said on Sunday. "Kuwait International Airport's terminal 4 has been opened in a record time of four months," the Kuwaiti Civil Aviation's chairman Sheikh Salman Al-Humoud Al-Sabah said amid a ceremony. He thanked the Kuwaiti

government for its contributions towards the "unprecedented success" of the terminal, which was built in a timely and productive manner. Full operation at international airport terminals usually takes between 12 to 18 months, but the diligence of Kuwait's aviation workforce transcended expectations, the minister said. Kuwait Airways' chairman Yousef Al-Jassem said the success of the terminal can be attributed to the close rapport between the national carrier and Kuwait's civil aviation authority. With the opening of the new terminal, Kuwait's flag carrier is in the process of putting together a comprehensive and revamped itinerary, he added. — KUNA

World's celebration of human rights declaration reaffirms its importance

Human rights' values necessary for establishing world peace

KUWAIT: The world's celebration of the 70th anniversary of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights reaffirms its importance and purpose in establishing these rights regionally and internationally, a foreign ministry official said Sunday. The issuance of this declaration years following the establishment of United Nations confirms that nations and peoples agree that the values and principles derived from human rights are a vital necessity for the establishment of international peace and security, Foreign Minister's Deputy Assistant and Human Rights Office Talal Al-Mutairi said.

Mutairi added that since the declaration was issued on December 10, 1948, steps have been taken in the process of spreading and adopting human rights at the global and regional levels, through the adoption of a number of inter-

national agreements and conventions such as the International Convention on the elimination of all forms of discrimination against women and the International Convention on children rights.

Mutairi noted that other conventions also included the international convention on racial discrimination, the International convention on the rights of people with disabilities, the international covenant on civil and political rights, the international covenant on economic, social and cultural rights, and the international convention against torture and other Cruel, inhuman or degrading treatment

Mutairi pointed out that this is evidence that adhering to human rights has become a target for everyone to abide by, stressing that Kuwait is a pioneer in this field at the regional and international levels, or even the work in respect human rights by including them in its constitution and laws. The official stressed that countries, international and regional governmental and non-governmental organizations, will not forget humanitarian efforts exerted by His Highness the Amir Sheikh Sabah Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah, which encouraged the UN to name him Humanitarian Leader, and Kuwait as humanitarian center.

Mutairi expressed hope that efforts will continue to uphold the values of respect for human rights derived from cultural heritage and religious values that enshrine the principles of justice, equality and tolerance and to continue efforts to promote national measures and procedures that comply with international standards in the field of human rights. — KUNA

Regional human rights network launched

AMMAN: On the 70th anniversary of World Human Rights Day, civil society organizations in the Middle East and North Africa (MENA) launched a network to promote the democratic process under the name of 'Regional Network for Democracy, Development and Human Rights' to exchange ideas, proposals, and deliberation on enhancing practices that support liberties and individual rights.

KD 167m for SMEs approved

KUWAIT: Kuwait's National Fund for Small and Medium Enterprise (SME) said yesterday it has approved projects across diverse sectors worth KD 167 million (\$551 million) since its inception five years ago. Entrepreneurs are highly encouraged to put forward their proposals over small to medium enterprises by signing up on the national register, SME's acting director general Manaf Al-Minifi said in an interview. He said the fund has been receiving requests for projects since the start of the month and entrepreneurs can get access to varied programs once they are registered on

the database. Three factors are taken into account when classifying projects as small or medium-sized, which are revenue, assets and workforce, he explained, saying such criteria are used in order to determine the scope of a project. A project is considered smallsized if the revenue generated does not exceed KD 75,000 (\$2.4 million), while the revenue for mediumsized enterprises is usually no more than KD 1.5 million (\$4.8 million), Minifi revealed. On the purpose of the national register, he said it aims to help entrepreneurs get their projects off the ground by providing them with a wide array of services. — KUNA



Serial killer convicted of 56 murders

Siberian cop raped, killed women after offering late-night rides

IRKUTSK: A Siberian policeman who raped and ruled sane enough to stand trial. Investigators had killed women after offering them late-night rides was suspected a policeman because of the way the killer making him Russia's most prolific serial killer of recent times. A court in the city of Irkutsk found Mikhail Popkov guilty of 56 murders between 1992 and 2007, sentencing him to a second life term. He was already in prison after being convicted of killing 22 women in 2015.

Popkov offered rides to women late at night, sometimes in his police car, while off-duty around his city of Angarsk near Irkutsk, 4,200 kilometers east of Moscow. His murderous spree initially went unnoticed during a period of rampant mafia killings in the crime-ridden city. He killed his victims using weapons including a hammer and an axe, then dumped their bodies in the woods, at the side of the

road and in a cemetery. He was also found guilty of raping 11 of the women. Popkov described himself as a "cleaner" who was purging his home city of prostitutes.

All but one of his victims were women between the ages of 16 and 40. His one male victim was a policeman he gave a ride to late at night and killed in a forest. The grey-haired 54-year-old

appeared in court in prison uniform, his head bowed. He will be sent to a prison that is exclusively for convicts serving life terms, nicknamed the "Black Dolphin". As part of his sentence-a rare case in Russia of a convicted murderer being given a second life sentence-Popkov was also deprived of his police pension. He intends to appeal against the sentence, regional prosecutor Alexander Shkinev told Russian news agencies.

Covered his tracks

Prosecutors on Monday described Popkov as having "a pathological attraction to killing people" and "homicidal mania with sadistic elements," but he was

dozens more murders yesterday, carefully covered his tracks. The murders took place while he was a serving police officer and after he left

Popkov was caught in 2012 after investigators reexamined the case and carried out DNA testing of residents, focusing on those who drove a make of car that matched tracks found at crime scenes. In a 2017 interview with Russia's Meduza website, Popkov said he gave women lifts and targeted those who were drunk or living in a way he saw as immoral, adding that "any society condemns the behavior of a debauched woman".

While in jail, he confessed to 59 further murders but was convicted only of 56 yesterday because investigators had not managed to prove three of the

crimes took place, Interfax news agency reported, citing the court's press service. Investigators said they uncovered the remains of some of the victims' bodies based on Popkov's account, as well as finding murder weapons including axes, screwdrivers and knives. The number of killings for which he has been convict-

ed exceeds the totals of several notorious murderers in Russia and the ex-

Some of the world's worst serial killers

PARIS: Ex-Russian policeman Mikhail Popkov, found guilty yesterday of 56 murders while already in jail for 22, is one of the most prolific serial killers of recent times. Here is a recap of some of the others, starting with two more serial killers from Russia.

'Chessboard Killer'

Alexander Pichushkin was sentenced to life in prison in Moscow in 2007 for 48 murders, most between 2002 and 2006. Aged 33 at his trial, Pichushkin said he wanted to kill one person for each of the 64 squares on a chessboard, and crossed out a square for every kill, earning him his nickname. His victims were mainly elderly alcoholic men whom he met in a park outside Moscow.

'Butcher of Rostov'

In 1992 Russian Andrei Chikatilo, 56, was sentenced to death for 52 sexually motivated killings of women, children and young people between 1978 and 1990. The former teacher, known as the "Butcher of Rostov" after the area in southern Russia where he was particularly active, was executed in 1994.

America's worst?

A 78-year-old drifter in prison in Texas confessed in Nov 2018 to 90 murders and is being investigated as possibly the most prolific serial killer in US history. Samuel Little preyed mainly on drug addicts and prostitutes during a decades-long murder spree, according to the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI). Law enforcement have so far verified 34 killings.

German nurse

Former hospital nurse Niels Hoegel admitted at his trial in Oct 2018 to having killed 100 patients on top of six for whose murders he had already been convicted. Hoegel, 41, confessed to giving patients drug overdoses them at the last moment. Investigators say the final toll

US 'Green River killer'

US truck painter Gary Ridgway confessed in 2003 to the murders of 48 prostitutes and runaways from 1982-1984 but he is suspected of around 90 killings. Nicknamed the "Green River Killer" after the Seattle waterway where his first victims were found, he was 54 years old at his conviction and jailing.

England's 'Doctor Death'

Family doctor Harold Shipman was sentenced to life in 2000 after being convicted of killing 15 of his elderly patients by giving them fatal doses of morphine. He hanged himself in prison in 2004, aged 57. An inquiry found that Shipman, nicknamed "Doctor Death", had killed around 250 patients between 1971 and 1998, making him the country's worst-ever serial killer.

Travelling salesman

Luis Alfredo Garavito, a travelling salesman, was ailed for 835 years in 2000 aged 42 for murdering 189 boys over a five-year span until 1996. Known as "The Monster of Genova" after his birthplace in Colombia, Garavito met his victims by posing as a charity worker, salesman, monk or disabled person, among other disguises.

'Monster of the Andes'

In 1980 Colombian Pedro Lopez Monsalve was arrested at a market in Ecuador after attempting to abduct a young girl. He later confessed to having strangled at least 310 children from poor backgrounds in Colombia, Ecuador and Peru. The "Monster of the Andes" was first sentenced to 16 years in prison, the maximum term in Ecuador, and then extradited in 1994 to Colombia where he was interned in a psychiatric hospital. Freed several years later, he disappeared and would today be aged around 70.

Dutch hospitals to drop US body brokers, citing ethical concerns

AMSTERDAM: Two major Dutch hospitals say they will stop importing human body parts from American firms, which they have been doing without any regulation for a decade. The hospitals told Reuters in recent weeks they made their decisions on ethical grounds. The move comes amid investigations by US law enforcement into some so-called body brokers - companies that obtain the dead, often through donation, dissect them and sell

Earlier this year, Reuters reported that one broker

under scrutiny by the US Federal Bureau of Investigation -Portland, Oregon-based MedCure - has used a Dutch hub to distribute tens of thousands of kilograms of human body parts across Europe since 2012. US authorities suspect MedCure sold body parts tainted with disease to American and foreign customers, a concern triggered in part by such shipments to Canada and Hong Kong, according to people familiar with the investigation.

Reuters found that importers of US body parts included two Dutch hospitals. The news agency uncovered no evidence body parts used in the Netherlands were infected, but the Dutch hospitals said they would drop the suppliers in response to reporting by Reuters which raised questions about how the brokers acquired

The country's largest hospital, Amsterdam's Academic Medical Centre (AMC), said it bought between 300 and 500 heads from US brokers, which in the past included MedCure, to cover a shortfall. The parts, used for research and training courses, were bought as early as 2008 and as recently as Nov. 21, the hospital said. Erasmus Medical Centre in Rotterdam said it bought knees and shoulders from a US supplier but declined to provide details. The hospital said it used the parts for research and training courses which were not designed to make profits. The health ministry declined to comment on the hospitals' decision, and said there is no specific regulatory body which oversees the use of such samples.

From 2012 to 2016, according to manifest records reviewed by Reuters, MedCure shipped body parts valued at a total of more than \$500,000 from the United States to the Netherlands. MedCure said it helps connect donors and scientific, research and medical entities. "We are an accredited and regulated institution and adhere to the best-in-class industry standards for safety ethics, and transparency," the company said in a statement to Reuters. Dutch laws govern the use of donated organs, the transportation of bodies and cremation, but there are none pertaining to body parts used for training or research, Dutch Minister for Medical Care Bruno Bruins told parliament in April. The health ministry said it saw no need to regulate the trade in body parts because hospitals take precautions.

'Unacceptable'

In the Netherlands and much of Europe, people who bequeath their bodies to research do so as a charitable donation, with no payment involved. In the United States, many brokers offer donor families free cremation in return for donating a body - a potential saving of up to \$1,000. AMC's current supplier Science Care, one of the largest body brokers in America, is not under FBI investigation, the company said; an FBI spokeswoman said policy prevents the agency saying whether a company is or is not being scrutinized. But Science Care's business model rankles some Dutch lawmakers and doctors.

Freek Dikkers, the professor of ear, nose and throat medicine at the AMC whose department bought the heads, said it was stopping after learning that the company solicits donors at hospices and old age homes and that its former owners earned millions from the trade. Dikkers said that was "unacceptable." A year after IS defeat, Iraq in throes of political crisis

Iraq's political elites now at loggerheads

BAGHDAD: A year since Iraq announced "victory" over the Islamic State group, the country finds itself in the throes of political and economic crises left unresolved during the long battle against jihadists. Unified against the common menace of IS, Iraq's political elites are now at loggerheads over the drawn-out formation of a cabinet as the threat of renewed popular protests looms. Iraq is no stranger to instability. It fought an eight-year war with Iran in the 1980s, then a conflict over Kuwait followed by a crippling international embargo and the US-led invasion that toppled Saddam Hussein in 2003

International

A sectarian war ensued, capped in 2014 by IS's devastating sweep across a third of the country. Backed by a US-led international coalition, Iraqi troops and paramilitary forces battled the jihadists for three years, until Baghdad finally declared it had won in December 2017. After decades of nearly back-to-back wars, Iraq's decision-makers are now forced to face deep-rooted dilemmas left festering for years. "In Iraq you've seen many 'missions accomplished'," said Renad Mansour, senior fellow at Chatham House in London.

"But as usual, the much more challenging victory is the political victory-which has always been left for another day." Five months after Baghdad declared its win, the country held legislative elections that did not produce a clear governing coalition. Then-prime minister Haider al-Abadi failed to hold on to his position despite claiming credit for victory, as people turned to populist parties who tapped anger over corruption. The ongoing power struggle among various parties has stymied efforts by new premier Adel Abdel Mahdi, widely seen as a weak consensus candidate, to form a government.

'Little to celebrate'

In October, Abdel Mahdi managed to fill 14 of the cabinet's 22 posts, but repeated efforts to hold a parliamentary vote on the remaining eight, including the key interior and defense ministries, have failed. "The distribution of power, the race to acquire as many government positions as possible under the guise of real competition between parties-that is at the root of the problem," Iraqi political analyst Jassem Hanoun said.

"Iraq is still living in a transition period, without political stability or a clear administrative vision for the country." As the process drags on, observers have wondered whether Abdel Mahdi could step down, further destabilizing a country just getting back on its feet. "Withdrawal is an option," a source close to the gov-

ernment said, adding that Abdel Mahdi "has his resignation letter in his back pocket". "Only if the political situation gets significantly worse can I see him taking it out of his pocket and using it," the source said. But the thorny issues facing Iraq extend beyond the capital.

Much of the country remains in ruins after three years of ferocious fighting, including large swathes of one-time IS capital Mosul and the northern Sinjar region. An international summit in Kuwait in February gathered around \$30 billion in pledges for Iraq's reconstruction-less than a third of what Baghdad hoped to receive. More than 1.8 million Iraqis are still displaced, many languishing in camps, and 8 million require humanitarian aid, according to the Norwegian Refugee Council. "If this is what 'victory' looks like, then there is little to celebrate for millions of Iraqis still haunted by the crimes of the IS and the long war to eliminate it," said NRC's head Jan Egeland.

'Disaster'

Violence has dropped across Iraq, according to the United Nations, which recorded the lowest casualty figures in six years in November with 41 civilians killed. But the threat of hit-and-run attacks lingers. A recent study by the Center for Strategic and International Studies found that while the total number of IS attacks in Iraq had dropped in 2018, those against government targets had increased compared to 2017. Observers are also worried that the bitter squabbles among Iraqi's political forces could turn violent. "Because of the divisions among the parties, anything is possible," Hanoun said. One scenario would be a conflict among the country's competing Shiite Muslim factions, which he said would be a "disaster". But another major fault line divides Iraq's entrenched politicians and an increasingly frustrated public.

Deadly protests in the summer of 2017 saw tens of thousands turn out over unemployment, a lack of public services, and accusations of corruption. Rampant power cuts mean millions of Iraqis have just a few hours of state-provided electricity per day. The country is ranked the 12th most corrupt in the world, according to the Transparency International Corruption Perceptions Index. Protest leaders have threatened a return to the streets if these issues, as well as the political stalemate, are not resolved. "There's certainly a conflict within the Shiite camp, but the biggest conflict will be between the people and the whole system," said Mansour. "Summertime will be a test for Abdel Mahdi." — AFP

Israel forces hunt gunmen; victim's baby delivered

RAMALLAH: Israeli forces entered the Palestinian city of Ramallah yesterday after gunmen opened fire on several Israelis near a West Bank settlement, as doctors prematurely delivered the baby of one of the wounded. Soldiers entered the city yesterday morning, with low-level clashes breaking out a few hundred metres from the house of Palestinian president Mahmud Abbas, AFP journalists said. They seized the security camera footage of a nearby building, according to employees.

At least one man was arrested, the AFP journalists said. An army spokeswoman said she could not comment on the Ramallah raid, including whether it was part of the hunt for the gunmen from Sunday night's incident. Seven people were wounded in the drive-by shooting at a bus stop near the Ofra settlement in the occupied West Bank, including a 30-week pregnant woman taken to hospital in serious condition. Doctors at the Shaare Zedek hospital in Jerusalem delivered the baby via a caesarean section, the hospital said, adding the mother, 21, was stable yesterday but the baby had taken a turn for the worse.

"There has unfortunately been a deterioration in the baby's condition. The family is requesting prayers for him," a hospital spokeswoman said. The others wounded in the attack were not in life-threatening condition. The army said yesterday morning that the perpetrators had so far not been located. "IDF (Israel Defense Forces), border police and security forces commenced extensive searches in the villages in the area as part of the hunt for the terrorists who committed the attack," a statement yesterday said.

"The IDF will continue to operate to apprehend the terrorists and ensure the security of civilians." The Islamist Hamas movement, which runs the Gaza Strip, praised the attack, saying in a statement that it proved "resistance" was still alive in the West Bank. Palestinian attacks against Israelis occur sporadically in the West Bank. On November 26, a Palestinian rammed Israeli soldiers with a car and injured three of them. — AFP

May pushes Brexit deal; EU court offers way out

LONDON: British Prime Minister Theresa May yesterday began a final push to persuade parliament to back her Brexit deal as the European Court of Justice ruled Britain was free to halt withdrawal from the bloc unilaterally. The court ruling will fuel calls for a second referendum to stop Brexit and comes on the eve of a oncein-a-lifetime vote by MPs that will determine the fate of Brexit and could lead to May's downfall. Her splintered government appears to be facing a heavy defeat in parliament yesterday on the draft withdrawal agreement she signed with Brussels last month.

The text defining terms on which the island nation leaves its main trading partner after 46 years is the most important to go before the House of Commons in years. A big loss could spark immediate challenges to May from both within her

Conservative Party and the opposition Labor ranks. It would also leave the tortuous Brexit process in a state of flux-and raise the prospects of a no-deal scenario-less than four months before the March 29 departure date. May is under pressure to delay the vote and attempt to negotiate more concessions ahead of a planned summit

with 27 fellow EU leaders on Thursday and Friday.

But Environment Secretary Michael Gove, an influential Brexit backer, told BBC radio that the vote would go ahead and cast doubt on any major re-negotiation. He warned that "a fundamental re-opening" of the withdrawal agreement risked EU countries wanting to change it "in a way that may not necessarily be to our advantage". EU leaders have ruled out any change to the divorce deal but some EU officials have mentioned the possibility of changes to the accompanying political declaration on future trade ties between Britain and the EU after Brexit.

rent Brexit deal on the table risked "either potentially no Brexit... or we could have a situation where we have the very uncomfortable circumstances of no deal". Token concessions

Cab driver burns himself

SEOUL: A South Korean taxi driver burned himself to death vesterday in protest at an Uber-like ride-sharing service being introduced by the country's largest mobile chat app, reports said. South Korean taxi drivers have angrily protested against the car-pooling service created by KakaoTalk, saying it would threaten their jobs and livelihoods. US giant Uber has only a minimal presence in the country, offering only taxi- and licensed-hire vehicle hailing after closing its main ride-sharing service in 2015 in the face of an extensive backlash from drivers. But Kakao is used by more than 80 percent of South Koreans, and in recent months tens of thousands of taxi drivers have held mass rallies in Seoul to condemn its upcoming car-pooling service, which is due to launch next week. The 57-year-old driver, surnamed Choi, set himself alight in front of the national parliament in Seoul after complaining about the carpooling service.—AFP

Funeral for 'youngest' rebel

SRINAGAR: Thousands of mourners thronged the funeral yesterday of a 14-year-old rebel shot dead by Indian troops in Kashmir, the youngest-ever fighter killed in the decadeslong insurgency, police said. Mudasir Ahmad Parrey was killed alongside two other militants, one a 17-year-old, outside the city of Srinagar on Sunday. Parrey, a ninth-grade student, went missing in August before emerging in a photograph on social media brandishing an automatic assault rifle and military knife. The young militants' deaths sparked angry protests in the restive Himalayan region administered by India but also claimed in full by Pakistan. A funeral procession Monday for the slain teenagers turned violent as mourners clashed with police, who used tear gas to drive them back. Rebels fighting for Kashmiri independence or a merger with Pakistan have been warring with Indian troops in the disputed territory since the late 1980s. —AFP

Armenian PM wins vote

YEREVAN: Armenia's acting Prime Minister Nikol Pashinyan has won a landslide victory in snap parliamentary elections, results showed yesterday, cementing his authority months after sweeping to power in a peaceful revolution. Pashinyan, a 43-year-old former journalist, has pledged to root out endemic corruption and address widespread poverty in the impoverished, landlocked ex-Soviet republic of three million people. With all votes counted, the bloc led by Pashinyan's Civil Contract party had taken 70.43 percent of the vote, the central election commission said. The Prosperous Armenia party led by influential oligarch and former arm wrestler Gagik Tsarukyan came a distant second with 8.27 percent. Pashinyan hailed his victory yesterday morning, thanking the "mighty people" of Armenia. "I am proud of you... Let's be courageous," he wrote on Facebook.—AFP

Myanmar seizes heroin haul

YANGON: Myanmar has seized 370 kilograms of heroin worth \$4.7 million during a raid in the northeast, police said, the latest big bust in the world's second-largest opium producer after Afghanistan. Weak rule of law and conflict-riddled border areas allow industrial-size trade in heroin, pills and crystal methamphetamine-known as iceto flourish, even as massive drug seizures routinely grab headlines. The most recent narcotics batch was discovered in a truck outside a monastery near the Shan state capital Taunggyi on Saturday night, police said in a statement Sunday. Two men were arrested after officers found them with "62 bags containing 170kg of white heroin and 200kg of brown heroin", it said, referring to colors indicating levels of purity. —AFP

Serbia wants baby boom, but couples not in the mood

BELGRADE: "Give birth, don't delay!", says a rousing call by the Serbian state to young couples. "Let babies' cries be heard!" is another of the baby-making slogans Serbia is busy producing - while it struggles to increase actual births. Women say they need better support not words of encouragement to grow the country's population. Massive emigration coupled with the plummeting birth rate, which at 1.5 children per family is among the lowest in Europe, has brought Serbia's population down to under seven million people. According to the United Nations, Serbia's population is expected to shrink a further 15 percent by 2050.

Desperate to reverse the trend, Serbian officials have made some head-scratching proposals, including a plan announced in June to construct "lower-storey homes" in areas with the lowest birth rates. President Aleksandar Vucic said it was based on a study that showed couples have nearly double the number of children in two-to-four storey homes than in towering apartment blocks. The comments befuddled the local press, with one newspaper going on an unsuccessful hunt to find any academic expert who had heard of such a study, discovering only "laughs". The minister in charge of demographics, Slavica Djukic Dejanovic, nevertheless defended the idea that environment

"It is a fact that on the edge of big cities where settlements include yards where kids play and parents have a coffee... that kids' joy and cries could be heard more often," she said. In February, her ministry announced a campaign to tackle the declining numbers and awarded the best pro-birth slogan in a nationwide cash-prize competition. Among the winners were: "Mum, I don't want to be alone. Dad, I want a brother" and "Love and babies are what we need first!" The ministry will also introduce an award called "The Best Family Friend" for companies that support young parents, Djukic Dejanovic said.

Paid 'to give birth'

A new maternity care law passed last year provides some additional aid for parents who have a third and a fourth child, entitling them to 10 years of 30,000 dinars (250 euros, \$280) in monthly support. That led President Vucic to proclaim: "A mother that gives birth to a third and a fourth child will have 30,000 dinars a month from the state to do nothing... just to give birth." But critics say the law excludes many would-be mothers. The full package of state aid for maternity leave is only available to women who have been working without interruption for 18 months. "What about many women who either do unregistered work in the grey economy or volunteer in public service, like doctors or lawyers, without any payment?", asked Tatjana Macura, an opposition MP who has been advocating to change the law on behalf of the NGO "Mame su zakon" (Mums Rule).

According to various estimates, more than a quarter of Serbia's working population is employed in unofficial work, with an even higher proportion among women. "These women are invisible for the system because they have worked illegally and would not receive any aid," said Macura. The law also offers minimal maternity support to unemployed women in a country where the youth jobless rate was over 30 percent in 2017. Many women are also afraid to take maternity leave because it

afterwards, despite the practice being illegal added Macura. Babies abroad

remains common for businesses to fire them

The new maternity law also cuts support for women earning more than 1,200 euros a month. Instead of receiving five months of salary during maternity leave as the previous law allowed, they will only receive three. Andrijana Marinkovic, a 33-year-old mother affected by the change, said it made her consider raising her one-month-old baby boy abroad, such as an EU or other Western country which gives more support to family life. 'Nobody makes a decision to become a parent because of state support or lack of it, but the (Serbian) state certainly doesn't make that decision easier." Marinkovic said

> On top of the shrinking birth rate, a "brain drain" sees tens of thousands of young Serbians pack their bags every year to study and work in wealthier countries. That means the challenge is not only encouraging more births, but persuading Serbians to have their babies at home. Kristina Markovic, a 22-year-old economist, works part-time and lives with an unemployed partner. "We plan to have a family but not until we both have stable jobs," which means regular salaries, insurance and the possibility to live independently from parents, she said. "We will decide (to have kids) eventually but my wish would be to give birth in some European Union state," she added. —AFP

Tough on migrants: Countries taking a hard line

PARIS: Several countries have over the past few years taken draconian and controversial measures to shut out migrants. As a United Nations pact for better regulating worldwide migration has been adopted in Marrakesh yesterday, here are some of the most drastic cases:

US: Trump's wallUS President Donald Trump, who made curbing immigration a pillar of his election campaign, signed a decree shortly after taking office that launched the construction of a wall intended to keep out migrants and running 1,600 kilometers along the US-Mexico border. Trump wanted Mexico to pay for it, which they have so far refused to do. At the start of 2018 Trump asked Congress for \$25 billion to secure the whole border. He has so far only received \$1.6 billion for walls of a dozen meters in the two most densely populated areas.

In May he again sparked controversy by separating more than 2,300 children from their parents as part of a "zero tolerance" policy on illegal immigration. He eventually backtracked. Ahead of midterm elections in November and as thousands of migrants fleeing violence and misery in Central America headed for the US, Trump referred to the migrant carayan as an "invasion" and claimed. without evidence, that it included "thugs" and 'unknown Middle Easterners". By the end of

November, Trump had deployed thousands of military personnel to the US-Mexico border and threatened to close it completely.

Italy: hostile waters

Italy is the main entryway for migrants crossing the Mediterranean, putting it under pressure from European Union rules that a migrant can only make an asylum claim in the first country they reach. In an anti-migrant backlash, a populist coalition government made up of the far-right League and anti-establishment Five Star Movement took power in April 2018. Its Interior Minister Matteo Salvini, from the anti-immigrant League, has banned charity rescue boats from docking in Italy, accusing them of aiding human traffickers to bring migrants to Europe. In November Italy adopted a tough anti-migrant and security decree which makes it easier to expel migrants and limits residency permits. This year some 22,500 migrants landed on Italy's coasts, representing a drop of more than 80 percent compared to 2017.

Hungary: barbed-wire fence

In 2015 Hungary's Prime Minister Viktor Orban, claiming migration threatens the "dissolution" of Hungarian and European identity, put up a barbed-wire fence running hundreds of kilometers along the Serbian and Croatian borders to stop the arrival of refugees fleeing wars in the Middle East. Hungary has also adopted one of the most restrictive migrant legislation in Europe. Orban has rejected EU plans to relocate migrants via mandatory quotas. In 2016 he tried to have the constitution changed by referendum to bar the country from taking in migrants, but was narrowly defeated. The



European Commission has launched several procedures against Hungary over its failure to take in refugees, including for not respecting European law regarding asylum and for a measure making it possible to prosecute those who help migrants.

Australia: off-shore camps

In 2017 the number of migrants arriving in Australia on permanent visas plummeted to 162,000, its lowest in 10 years and reflecting the results of a hardline policy aimed at only accepting what it considers the best candidates for resi-

dency. Since 2013 Canberra has frequently turned away illegal boatloads of migrants from various places like Afghanistan, Sri Lanka and the Middle East. Boats that do manage to get through are sent to the off-shore islands of Nauru or Manus in Papua New Guinea. Canberra claims it is saving lives by putting migrants off attempting the perilous journey. Once a near-daily occurrence, the arrival of migrant boats has radically dropped off. However conditions in its off-shore migrant detention camps-where people are sometimes held for years-have been widely criticized as extremely harsh.—AFP

China cracks down on 'unofficial' Christian church; pastors missing

China authorities raid homes; 80 missing

BEIJING: Dozens of members of a prominent unofficial Protestant church and their pastor have gone missing in southwest China after authorities raided their homes, churchgoers said yesterday, amid increasing restrictions on religious worship. The police sweep occurred Sunday night, according to a statement from the Early Rain Covenant Church, which is based in Chengdu, the capital of Sichuan province.

Several church leaders, including pastor Wang Yi, were detained, several parishioners told AFP on condition of anonymity. At least 80 people are missing, they said, but it was unclear how many are detained or unaccounted for. "Most church members were taken from their homes, and some were grabbed off the street," one churchgoer said, requesting anonymity. "Some were found via their smartphone's location and were taken away." "The police had the whole neighborhood under control, as well as the surrounding area," he continued. "They didn't let anyone get close."

Sichuan police declined to comment. Chengdu police did not immediately respond to AFP's request for comment. China's officially atheist government is wary of any organized movements outside its own control, including religious ones. Christians in the country are split between unofficial "house" or "underground" churches like the Early Rain Covenant Church, and state-sanctioned churches where Communist Party songs also feature in the order of service. Catholics are similarly divided between unofficial churches led by bishops recognized by the Vatican and those who follow official prelates.

'Massive overnight attack'

This year, underground churches, especially larger establishments like the Early Rain Covenant, which has at least 500 church members, have faced increasing pressure. In September, Beijing officials shut down Zion Church, one of China's largest unofficial Protestant churches, for operating without a licencebefore ordering it to pay back 1.2 million yuan (\$170,000) in rent and removal costs. In November, a bishop in eastern China belonging to the Vatican-aligned

unofficial church went missing, despite a historic accord on the appointment of bishops reached in September between Beijing and the Holy See, which broke off diplomatic ties in 1951.

According to ChinaAid, a Christian human rights NGO, Early Rain Covenant Church has been repeatedly harassed by police and community officials this year. "The massive overnight attack against members of independent renown(ed) Early Rain Covenant House Church represents a major escalation of religious persecution in China," wrote Bob Fu, founder of ChinaAid and friend of pastor Wang, on Twitter

The Chengdu-based church has chosen not to register officially with the government because they want freedom of religion, another church member said. "Early on, we were prepared for this," he said, referring to suppression from authorities. The churchgoer added: "Following the touch of the Holy Spirit, and relying on faith and guidance from the Bible, we will move forward, one step at a time." — AFP

3 killed; schoolbus mounts pavement

HONG KONG: Three people were killed when an empty runaway schoolbus mounted a pavement in a crowded Hong Kong neighborhood yesterday, trapping passers-by underneath and injuring 11, police said. Two women-aged 80 and 70 - and an 83-year-old man were killed after the yellow bus careered out of control in the downtown North Point district. Photographs in local media showed victims sprawled on the ground while others received medical treatment at the scene. The vehicle rolled down the street after it was parked, terrifying passers-by as the driver ran towards it and tried in vain to stop it, according to the police.

"We believe he might have forgotten to pull the handbrake or hadn't properly pulled it," chief inspector of police Sun Lun-yum told reporters. The 62-year-old driver became trapped under the bus and was dragged along for about 20 meters before falling onto the road. Police said the bus travelled for a total of 100 meters, hitting two taxis before finally crashing into a building in a narrow lane lined with shops. In addition to the driver, who suffered injuries to his head, neck and back, a further 10 pedestrians aged between 22 and 89 were taken to hospital for treatment. Several remain in a serious condition.

Hong Kong prides itself on having one of the world's best public transport systems but deadly bus accidents are not unknown. Five people were killed and 32 injured when a coach carrying Cathay Pacific staff to Hong Kong's airport collided with a taxi last month. A speeding double-decker overturned in northern Hong Kong in February, killing 19 people and leaving more than 60 injured. The bus driver was arrested for dangerous driving. And in 2003 a double-decker bus collided with a truck and plummeted off a bridge, killing 21 people and injuring 20. — AFP

Trading blows: Canada next in China's crosshairs?

BEIJING: Canada's arrest of a top executive of Chinese telecom giant Huawei has put the country in the crosshairs of Beijing, which has warned of "grave consequences" over the case. China's foreign ministry issued the warning after it summoned Canada's ambassador on Saturday and called for the release of Huawei's chief financial officer, Meng Wanzhou, who was held on a US warrant on charges related to alleged sanctions-breaking dealings with Iran. While the ministry did not spell out what the consequences might be, Beijing has long used economic measures to punish countries that offend it. AFP takes a look at what Canada could face, and what other nations have endured in the past:

Canada trade hopes

China's state-run Global Times, a nationalist tabloid, cited experts as saying the consequences may include trade sanctions, a degradation in bilateral ties and fewer visits to Canada by Chinese tourists and businesspeople. Canada exported goods worth US\$18.2 billion to China last year, and it would be "very easy" for Beijing to shut down key energy and agricultural products with bans or boycotts, said Shaun Rein, the founder of Shanghai-based China Market Research Group. The spat could also endanger exploratory talks on a free trade agreement between Ottawa and Beijing that have been ongoing for two years. "I think the free trade agreement is definitely in a precarious situation, because Canada needs it with China more than China needs it with Canada, economically," Rein said. China could also hit back by detaining an executive from a large Canadian company, Rein added.

S Korea's tourism hit

Last year, after Seoul agreed to deploy a US missile defence system that Beijing considered a threat to its own military capability, Beijing banned Chinese tour groups from going to South Korea. South Korean retail giant Lotte Group, which provided land for the THAAD system, became a target of Chinese nationalist sentiment, as online shoppers and internet trolls launched a boycott and protestors gathered in front of stores, costing Lotte hundreds of millions of dollars. — AFP

Lawyers on wheels: 'Solidarity bus' represents Kyrgyz landless women

n a cold, sparsely lit Soviet-era room, sitting close to the heater, Ainura Ibraimjanova taps at her computer. In this rural district in southern Kyrgyzstan, she is the only lawyer providing free legal aid. Just back from court in the Alai district, Ibraimjanova is attending to a stream of clients in thick coats and clutching documents. They are in need of help with alimony, divorce or family land disputes. "The laws have changed considerably since Kyrgyzstan gained its independence, because there was a real gap in legal frameworks and customs - with many people breaching laws in favor of customs," she told the Thomson Reuters Foundation.

Land, a scarce and highly-prized resource in this former communist country, is of huge social value, she said, with disputes over it particularly affecting women. "Having or not having a piece of land decides who you are ... It's a very important matter, especially in a rural area," said Ibraimjanova. At independence in 1991, when state property was privatized, every citizen was given an equal plot of land, but it was often registered under the name of the male household head. That meant women often missed out on claiming land rights, especially if they got married or divorced,

Ibraimjanova said. 'According to Kyrgyz tradition, people treat men and women in different ways. If a girl grows up and chooses to take her share of land with her and separate from her big family, this really looks strange in accordance with local tradition and the family is usually opposed to it," she said. Although courts often rule in favour of women and in accordance with the law, executing such judgments can be arduous and take years, Ibraimjanova said. "There are still many women who need to be supported and whose rights needs to be better protected

On the road


Yet change is coming, even to remote regions like Alai - in part thanks to the "Bus of Solidarity". The small van bounds along rural roads to bring lawyers, notaries and social workers to remote parts of the country to resolve villagers' legal quandaries - for free. It is supported by the justice ministry and the UN Development Programme (UNDP). On this day, it is headed for the craggy village of Kara-Kulja in southern Kyrgyzstan. Among those waiting in the rain for the bus to arrive was Zoora Jumabaeva. "I learned by chance that the bus was coming today," Jumabaeva, a first-time user, told the Thomson Reuters Foundation. She hoped the lawyers could resolve her complaint with the local bazaar after the new owner raised rents and forcibly removed her stall, which sells medicine for livestock, to a location outside the market. Had the bus not come, Jumabaeva would have had to make an arduous two-hour journey on poor roads to the nearest town, Osh, to seek legal services.

In previous years, she would use informal mechanisms such as a council of elders to solve her disputes. But, she said, the fact that their decisions were not legally binding was frustrating. And so, bearing the rain and cold, Jumabaeva huddled at a small desk inside a billowing blue tent to explain her dilemma. "I'm losing my regular income and my family is suffering. I came here today to get some more legal advice on protecting my interests," she told a lawyer. "There are many other women and young families (at the market) who suffer more than me (from being evicted), as this was their only income source, so I'm trying to act on their behalf to solve a common problem.'

The lawyer, Jazgul Kolmatova, who practices in Osh, is no stranger to the Bus of Solidarity having made several journeys. Jumabaeva's paperwork, she said, was scant. "She came to us with quite a difficult and complex problem, but her case is a fairly common one," Kolmatova told the Thomson Reuters Foundation as she took down notes. Boarding the bus provides a chance to resolve knotty legal issues that have often been building for years, she said. "I joined the bus of solidarity because I know that the rural population and especially women - are very poorly educated in legal issues, and I want to make my contribution to changing this situation," she said.

Since the bus began running in 2016 it has visited about 193 villages and carried out more than 7,000 consultations, according to UNDP. But meetings are often brief, and complex cases require follow-up. With a luminous orange hijab wrapped around her hair and fighting back tears, Gulzina Ashimzhanova, 37, said she met Ibraimjanova when the Bus of Solidarity came to her village earlier this year. Ashimzhanova and her five children were made homeless when she left her alcoholic husband, who she said was violent. Ashimzhanova wanted to divorce him and secure her share of the property. "When we went to the village we saw the bus and met Ainura (Ibraimjanova). She told us about this free legal assistance, she explained everything," she said. "We were consulted from there, then she said to bring the documents and she could help me. She said we could divide the house and get alimony via the court." Ashimzhanova, who has been clinically depressed, tried to get her share of a house, 5,500 square metres of land and an apple orchard - all registered in her husband's name. — Reuters





Foreign leaders seize on French crisis

he "yellow vest" protests that have made headlines around the world are garnering France some unwanted attention, particularly from foreign leaders not exactly known for their defense of liberal democracy. French officials have gone so far as to accuse other nations of "interference" in its domestic affairs over claims the crisis has laid bare the shortcomings of President Emmanuel Macron's policies. Both Turkish President Recep Tayyip Erdogan and Italy's far-right leader Matteo Salvini have criticized Macron over the violent protests, as has his "friend" US President Donald Trump

"Very sad day & night in Paris. Maybe it's time to end the ridiculous and extremely expensive Paris Agreement and return money back to the people in the form of lower taxes?" Trump tweeted over the weekend. The comments earned him a stern rebuke from Foreign Minister Jean-Yves Le Drian, who on Sunday told the US leader to "leave our nation be". France is also looking into claims that Russian-linked social media accounts are trying to stir up trouble by spreading misinformation designed to

A source close to the inquiry told AFP that the prime minister's security and defense directorate was coordinating the investigation of suspect accounts. But the source said it was too early to confirm a claim in Britain's Times newspaper that hundreds of accounts linked to Russia were being used to stoke the demonstrations. Bloomberg news, citing the US-based Alliance for Securing Democracy, has also reported that #giletsjaunes ("yellow vests") has become the top hashtag on

600 Twitter accounts promoting Kremlin views. "That's a pretty strong indication that there is interest in amplifying the conflict," Bloomberg quoted the alliance's social media analyst Bret Schafer as saying.

A Kremlin spokesman rejected the accusations yesterday as "nothing but slander". "We have not interfered and we



don't plan to interfere in the domestic affairs of any country, including France," the spokesman, Dmitry Peskov, said.

'Exploiting the situation'

Italy's Salvini has also tried to fuel a narrative that the protests, which originated over anger at fuel tax hikes, underscore the failings of Macron's push to reform the French economy. The "yellow vest" movement has since ballooned into a protest against declining living standards, in particular in rural and smalltown France. The government has already backed down on a hated fuel tax increase set for January, and Macron is expected to announce other measures in a televised address Monday night.

"Now those left behind are on the street, the thousands of honest people who have been massacred by the French government," Salvini posted on Twitter on Sunday. Salvini has been a particular target of Macron, who is trying to forge an alliance of pro-European centrists to counter the populist waves in several countries ahead of European Parliament elections in May.

Steve Bannon, the architect of Trump's nationalistpopulist campaign who is now preaching a rightwing revolt across Europe, said in Brussels over the weekend that "Paris is burning". "The yellow vests... are exactly the same type of people who elected Donald Trump... and who voted for Brexit," Bannon said.

Turkey's Erdogan, meanwhile, went so far as to accuse French police of "disproportionate violence against the demonstrators. "Disorder reigns in several European countries, starting with Paris. TVs and newspapers are filled with images of burning cars, looted shops, and the violent police response against the protesters," he said Saturday.

France's Health Minister Agnes Buzyn denounced the comments as unacceptable "interference". "I am furious when I hear these extremist politicians exploiting this situation," she told LCI television Sunday. "These people are exploiting the situation to justify their own anti-climate, totalitarian policies," she said. — AFP

Freed from jail, Cambodian surrogate mothers raise Chinese kids

ophea was eight months pregnant when Cambodian police told her she would have to keep the baby that was never meant to be hers - and forfeit the \$10,000 she was promised for acting as a surrogate for a Chinese couple. Cambodia banned commercial surrogacy in 2016, and police in June raided two apartments where Sophea and 31 other surrogate mothers were being cared for in Cambodia's capital, Phnom Penh. They were charged the following month with violating human trafficking laws, but authorities released them on bail last week, under the condition they raise the children themselves.

Campaigners say Cambodia's surrogacy crackdown is unlikely to end the trade as poverty means many women will continue to risk arrest for the chance to earn life-changing sums of money. For some of the newly-freed women, keeping their baby is a burden as they struggle to get by. For others, it is a relief. Despite the financial loss, 24-year-old Sophea told the Thomson Reuters Foundation that she was happy the authorities intervened, and that her family had welcomed her baby boy.

"If not for the crackdown and my arrest, I would have been left in deep regret," said Sophea, who did not give her real name for fear of backlash from the authorities and members of her community. "I would have given away my baby," she said just two days after being released from police custody, settling back into village life at the end of a sandy track that winds through rice fields in Oudong, a 90 minute drive north of Phnom Penh.

Mixed blessing

Members of the other families said the babies are a mixed blessing. Instead of receiving \$10,000, the women went home with another mouth to feed, in a country where the average annual income is \$1,490, according to the International Monetary Fund. "It is a very difficult situation. I worry that my income will not support the whole family," said Pich, a motorcycle-taxi driver whose wife is carrying what will be their third child. The 40-year-old, who also requested that his real name not be used, said

he never supported his wife's decision to be a surrogate and that he was ashamed she had gone through with it. Another surrogate, a 24-year-old woman, went behind her husband's back to take part in the scheme. The \$10,000 would have allowed the couple and their two children to move out of the shack they share with 12 members of their extended family, said the woman on condition of anonymity. "I agreed to give birth at the provincial hospital and look after the baby, but I don't know how we will get the money to support and raise another child," she said.

Ros Sopheap, director of the charity Gender and Development for Cambodia, said poverty will likely drive more women to engage in surrogacy - and that few know the practice is illegal. "Very few people are aware of what's right, what's wrong, what's against the law," she said. "The reality is that these women do this because they are living in poverty. So as long as there is a demand for surrogate mothers, they will continue."

More arrests

Southeast Asia has long been a top destination for couples seeking surrogate mothers. Thailand banned the practice in 2015 after several high-profile cases, followed by Cambodia in 2016. In 2017, an Australian nurse and two Cambodians were jailed for 18 months for operating an illegal surrogacy clinic. In the country's most recent surrogacy raid - just last month - 11 pregnant women and four facilitators were arrested.

Chou Bun Eng, a secretary of state at the Interior Ministry, said the 32 women were released on humanitarian grounds last week, but that the fate of the latest 11 surrogates is unclear. Each case will be judged independently and "law enforcement will become stricter" in the future, according to the official. It would be difficult, she added, for authorities to track down those who organized surrogacy rings, or the Chinese couples who paid for Cambodian women to bear their children. "Even surrogate mothers did not know nor (have) contact with the one who wanted the babies," said Chou Bun Eng.

Sophea said she preferred not to know who the biological parents were. "I will not tell my son what happened in the past," she said. "I won't tell him about his actual Chinese parents." She said her priority upon returning home was to invite a Buddhist monk to conduct a cleansing ceremony - in order to rid the family of any bad karma incurred during the ordeal. Her four-year-old daughter and extended family have also welcomed the baby, she said after the ceremony, which was attended by a dozen relatives and several village elders. — Reuters

Bug business: Millions of roaches crunch waste in China

n the near pitch-dark, you can hear them before you see them - millions of cockroaches scuttling and fluttering across stacks of wooden boards as they devour food scraps by the tonne in a novel form of urban waste disposal. The air is warm and humid - just as cockroaches like it - to ensure the colonies keep their health and voracious appetites. Expanding Chinese cities are generating more food waste than they can accommodate in landfills, and cockroaches could be a way to get rid of hills of food scraps, providing nutritious food for livestock when the bugs eventually die and, some say, cures for stomach illness and beauty treatments.

On the outskirts of Jinan, capital of eastern Shandong province, a billion cockroaches are being fed with 50 tonnes of kitchen waste a day the equivalent in weight to seven adult elephants. The waste arrives before daybreak at the plant run by Shandong Qiaobin Agricultural Technology Co, where it is fed through pipes to cockroaches in their cells. Shandong Qiaobin plans to set up three more such plants next year, aiming to process a third of the kitchen waste produced by Jinan, home to about seven million people.

A nationwide ban on using food waste as pig feed due to African swine fever outbreaks is also spurring the growth of the cockroach industry. "Cockroaches are a bio-technological pathway for the converting and processing of kitchen waste," said Liu Yusheng, president of Shandong Insect Industry Association. Cockroaches are also a good source of protein for pigs and other livestock. "It's like turning trash into resources," said Shandong Qiaobin chairwoman Li Hongyi.

'Essence of cockroach"

In a remote village in Sichuan, Li Bingcai, 47, has similar ideas. Li, formerly a mobile phone vendor, has invested a million yuan (\$146,300) in cockroaches, which he sells to pig farms and fisheries as feed and to drug companies as medicinal ingredients. His farm now has 3.4 million cockroaches. "People think it's strange that I do this kind of business," Li said. "It has great economic value, and my goal is to lead other villagers to prosperity if they follow my lead." His village has two farms. Li's goal is to create 20.

Elsewhere in Sichuan, a company called Gooddoctor is rearing six billion cockroaches. "The essence of cockroach is good for curing oral and peptic ulcers, skin wounds and even stomach cancer," said Wen Jianguo, manager of Gooddoctor's cockroach facility. Researchers are also looking into using cockroach extract in beauty masks, diet pills and even hairloss treatments. At Gooddoctor, when cockroaches reach the end of their lifespan of about six months, they are blasted by steam, washed and dried, before being sent to a huge nutrient extraction tank. Asked about the chance of the cockroaches escaping, Wen said that would be worthy of a disaster movie but that he has taken precautions. "We have a moat filled with water and fish," he said. "If the cockroaches escape, they will fall into the moat and the fish will eat them all." - Reuters

'Yellow vest' protests stunt French growth

Macron under pressure as Q4 GDP growth seen easing

will slow growth to close to a standstill in the final quarter, the central bank said yesterday, complicating President Emmanuel Macron's task of finding concessions to placate the "yellow vest" movement.

The Bank of France yesterday forecast the eurozone's number two economy would eke out growth of only 0.2 percent in the quarter from the previous three months, down from 0.4 percent in a previous estimate. Finance Minister Bruno Le Maire declined to give an estimate for 2018 growth but forecast the nationwide tumult would trim 0.1 percent of a point off of national output. His deputy projected growth would round out "closer to 1.5 percent".

The slow-down will be worrisome for Macron, who faces huge pressure on the streets to make further cuts to taxes and social security costs to bolster household spending power, while keeping France's budget deficit below a European Union cap.

The slowdown is a "reality for our businessmen, entrepreneurs, it's the reality for those whose shops were van-

PARIS: The anti-government protests convulsing France dalized, looted, in the most violent way," Le Maire told RTL. "And it's a reality too for our foreign investors." Police used tear gas, water cannon and horses to charge protesters hurling projectiles, torching cars and ransacking some shops, though they encountered less violence than the previous Saturday, when the capital encountered its worst violence since the 1968 student uprising.

Upscale department store Printemps, which shut its flagship store in Paris on Saturday, typically one of the busiest days of the year ahead of Christmas, said it had suffered a 25 to 30 percent slump in sales since the unrest began. "There has been a colossal loss in sales and they won't be recouped," Pierre Pelarrey, who runs Printemps Haussmann, told Reuters.

Nationwide, shopping centers saw a 17 fall in people passing through the doors, the CNCC grouping of mall operators said. In a sign of the perceived heightened risk of holding French debt, French government bond yields rose yesterday, pushing the French/German 10-year bond spread to its widest since May, at around 46 basis points in early trade. On the Paris bourse, airport operator ADP fell 0.8, while retailers Casino and FNAC Darty also headed south. Hotels company Accor initially traded down 0.7 percent before paring losses.

Macron emerges into open Macron addressed the nation later in the evening.

The president has drawn criticism for his silence in ublic over the violence in Paris - opponents accuse him of turning the Elysee Palace into a bunker. Ministers hope he will placate the yellow vests, whose revolt poses the most formidable challenge to his 18-month administration to date. The government's latest estimates are for a budget deficit of 2.8 percent in 2019, just below the EU's 3 percent cap - a target Macron has cast as critical to meet to cement his reformist credentials. Le Maire reiterated his desire to accelerate tax cuts but suggested he was not in favor of reinstating a tax on wealth-known as the 'ISF'-that Macron narrowed when he came into office, and which earned him the tag "president of the rich". "Does the ISF help reduce poverty, reduce our debts, reduce public spending? No. If you want to hunt for money, go knocking on the doors of digital tech companies," Le Maire said. — Reuters

Stock selloff snowballs as investors price in slowing economy

LONDON: Losses on global stocks snowballed yesterday, with Wall Street set to follow Europe and Asia lower as fresh signs emerged that the US-China trade spat was taking a deeper toll on world economic growth. Data from the world's biggest economies-the United States, China, Japan and Germany-have all disappointed investors in recent days, and doubts are growing that Washington and Beijing will reach agreement before a 90-day trade ceasefire expires. Markets are also on edge after reports that the British parliament's crucial vote on Prime Minister Theresa May's Brexit deal will be delayed, sending sterling and UK stocks lower. "Another day, another reason to sell risk. Equity markets remain in a world of pain with everyone in search of a very elusive silver lining," said Stephen Innes at brokerage OANDA

MSCI's all-country index has spent four weeks in the red, despite intermittent rallies fuelled by hopes of trade war detente. The index slipped 0.5 percent, while a pan-European index fell 0.7 percent by 1200 GMT. US equity futures were down 0.3 percent, suggesting more pressure

on Wall Street later in the session.

Last week's arrest of the chief financial officer of Chinese smartphone maker Huawei for extradition to the United States was seen as putting up another hurdle to the resolution of a trade war between the world's two biggest economies. US trade representative Robert Lighthizer said Sunday there was a "hard deadline" to the 90-day trade ceasefire and without a successful end to talks by March 1, Washington would impose new tariffs on Chinese goods.

"The trade theme will preoccupy the markets through the 90-day truce period between the United States and China, waiting for any signs of concession between the parties," said Soichiro Monji, senior economist at Daiwa SB Investments in Tokyo.

Following weak trade and inflation data on the weekend, China also posted far weaker-than-expected November exports and imports, reinforcing expectations Beijing will roll out more stimulus to prevent the economy cooling too fast. However, the yuan sagged to a one-week low after the weak data.

'(The data) would suggest China woes go well beyond US tariffs, given that China trade surplus to the US was at a record level. One can only imagine the impact on China terms of trade if the US follows through with a 25 percent tariff," Innes of OANDA said. Japan posted the worst contraction in over four years in the third quarter as uncertainty over global demand and trade saw companies slashing capital spending. MSCI's index of Asian equities outside Japan earlier slid to near three-week lows, Shanghai shares retreated 0.8 percent and Japan's Nikkei shed 2.1 percent. Emerging-market stocks lost 1.5 percent.

Asia's data came after investors were spooked last

week by below-forecast industrial output numbers in Germany and US jobs data showing employers hired fewer workers than expected in November.

The slowdown signs also have pummeled oil prices, which have slumped around 30 percent since early October. Brent futures fell 1.5 percent to \$60.7 a barrel, reversing earlier modest gains triggered by a supply cut from OPEC and some non-affiliated producers.

Data and dollar

European investors were keeping their eyes on events in Britain and France. Sterling slumped to the lowest since June 2017 versus the dollar, after the BBC's political editor quoted cabinet sources said May was pulling the vote, scheduled for today. Sterling slid half a percent to \$1.2656 and extended losses versus the euro, trading down 0.7 percent at 90.18 pence - its weakest since early-

Britain's FTSE 250 equity index, sensitive to local economic developments tumbled 1 percent and investors scurried to buy British government bonds, with yields dropping five to seven basis points on the day.

There is still room for short-term political risk premium to be priced into pound which is currently worth of 2 percent based on our models. The downside to sterling is hence very clear," ING Bank analysts told clients. The dollar inched off two-week lows against a basket of currencies, including sterling. Last week, the dollar posted its worst performance since August after the lacklustre jobs data convinced many that US growth has peaked and the Federal Reserve will pause its rate tightening sooner than previously thought.

Turkish GDP growth fades to 1.6% as lira crisis bites

ANKARA: Turkish economic growth dwindled to 1.6 percent year-on-year in the third quarter, data showed yesterday, falling short of forecasts as a currency crisis and soaring inflation led to the worst economic performance in two years.

Turkey, a major emerging market once seen as a star performer by international investors, racked up growth of more than 7 percent last year. But this year it has been battered by a lira sell-off that has driven up the costs of food and fuel and forced the central bank to hike its main rate to 24 percent.

The construction sector - long a beneficiary of Turkey's credit-fuelled building boom - contracted 5.3 percent year-on-year, the data showed, countering a 4.5 percent expansion in services.

"The loss in growth momentum began in the third quarter with a slowdown in private consumption and investments," said Muammer Komurcuoglu, an economist at Is Invest

"We envisage a contraction in growth in the fourth quarter as a result of the negative impact of monetary tightening on financial conditions, a reduction in investment and consumption appetite with the loss in lira value, and high inflation." In a Reuters poll, economists had forecast third quarter growth of 2.0 percent year-on-year. The lira eased to 5.3047 against the dollar after the data from 5.2950 beforehand.

By 0918 GMT the lira was at 5.2760 to the dollar. It was the worst quarterly performance since the third quarter of 2016 - when Turkey was shaken by an attempted coup against President Tayyip Erdogan.

Output shrank a seasonally and calendar-adjusted 1.1 percent from the previous quarter, the data showed. "The effects of August's currency crisis caused Turkey's economy to contract in Q3 and more timely evidence suggests that the downturn deepened in Q4," Jason Tuvey of Capital Economics said in a note to clients.—Reuters

German rail strike halts trains nationwide

FRANKFURT: Germany was plunged into transport chaos yesterday as train services were halted by a railworkers' strike over pay, affecting millions of passengers. Inter-city and regional services as well as many urban commuter trains were cancelled throughout Europe's biggest economy by the four-hour stoppage that started at 05:00 am (0400 GMT), Deutsche Bahn (DB) said.

Although the walkout ended as planned at 09:00 am, its ripple effects will be felt for the rest of the day, particularly on long-distance lines, rail operator DB warned.

Some 1,400 trains, including cargo services, were affected, DB said, adding that both sides had agreed to return to the negotiation table today. The industrial action came after talks broke down Saturday between the DB and the EVG

railworkers' union, which is demanding a 7.5-percent salary rise for 160,000 employees. "We believe the warning strike was a total success," said EVG head Torsten Westphal.

"The next move is now up to Deutsche Bahn management."

DB had earlier described the strike as a "completely unnecessary escalation" in the tortuous negotiations. DB has so far offered a pay rise of 5.1 percent in two phases, with an option for staff to take extra time off instead, and a one-off payment of 500 euros (\$570), DPA national news agency reported.

A DB spokeswoman welcomed the decision to resume talks today. "We never left the negotiating table," she told AFP. "We have told the union that we are prepared to make another offer."

Yellow vests

Major transport hubs like Berlin, Frankfurt, Cologne and Munich were among those impacted by the walkout. DB said that purchased tickets would remain valid until next Sunday or could be refunded and urged passengers to delay travel where possible.

In the capital Berlin, where additionally the entire public announcement system broke down, frustrated morning com-

muters were asked to switch from S-Bahn commuter trains operated by DB to subways, buses or trams. At Nuremberg station, in the southern state of Bavaria, some 50 rail workers were seen demonstrating in yellow high-visibility vests, similar to the ones donned by anti-government protesters in France.

It is not unusual however for German rail staff to wear hi-vis jackets, and it was not immediately clear if the demonstrators intended to signal a link with the French street protests.

Ex-Nissan chief Ghosn charged, served with fresh arrest warrant

Case represents a stunning turnaround for 64-year exec

TOKYO: Japanese prosecutors yesterday formally charged Carlos Ghosn with financial misconduct for under-reporting his salary and also served him a fresh warrant on separate allegations, meaning the tycoon will likely spend Christmas in a cell.

It represents a stunning turnaround for the 64-year-old Franco-Lebanese-Brazilian executive, a once-revered colossus of the auto sector who won wide acclaim in Japan for saving car giant Nissan.

In a move that sent shockwaves through the business world, the former Nissan chairman was arrested on November 19 on suspicion of under-declaring his income by some five billion yen (\$44 million) between 2010 and 2015.

Prosecutors yesterday pressed formal charges on Ghosn-and key aide Greg Kelly-over this allegation, which both men are said to deny.

The pair were also immediately re-arrested over fresh allegations that they conspired to under-declare Ghosn's income by a further four billion yen over the past three years.

Under Japanese law, suspects can be re-arrested several times for different allegations, allowing prosecutors to question them for prolonged periods-a system that has drawn criticism internationally. Monday was the final day prosecutors could hold Ghosn and Kelly, 62, before either charging or re-arresting them, and the fresh arrest gives them up to another 22 days of questioning. In addition to charges against Ghosn and Kelly, prosecutors also indicted Nissan itself, as the company submitted the official documents that underreported the income.

Nissan shares dropped 2.90 percent to 945 yen in yesterday trading and the firm voiced "its deepest regret" over the affair. The manufacturer said it would "continue its efforts to strengthen its governance and compliance, including making accurate disclosures of corporate information".

The Japanese firms in the three-way alliance with

Renault-Nissan and Mitsubishi Motors-have both sacked Ghosn as chairman.

But amid reports of tension within the tie-up, which outsold all rival groups last year, the three companies last month said they were "fully committed" to the alliance.

'Combative' frame of mind

The millionaire auto sector star, who attracted some criticism for a perceived lavish lifestyle, is now alone in a spartan cell in a Tokyo detention centre, in a tiny room measuring just three tatami mats-around five square metres.

He has reportedly told embassy visitors he is being well treated but has complained of the cold, with yesterday's temperature in the Japanese capital hovering around five degrees Celsius.

He spends his time reading books and news reports and is said to be unhappy about the rice-based food. But he is in a "combative" frame of mind, according to sources at Renault, the company he still formally leadseven if the French car giant has appointed an interim chairman. According to local news agency Kyodo, he has admitted signing documents to defer part of his salary until after retirement but said this amount did not need to be declared as it has not yet been definitively fixed.

A source close to the investigation has said Ghosn and Kelly allegedly put the system in place after a new law came in obliging the highest-paid members of the firm to declare their salary.

Ghosn is suspected of deferring part of his pay to avoid criticism from staff and shareholders that his salary was too generous. Nissan is appealing to a court in Rio de Janeiro to block access by Ghosn's representatives to a luxury apartment on Copacabana Beach.

"We are closely watching if he is actually indicted and then found guilty," said Satoru Takada, an analyst at TIW, a Tokyo-based research and consulting firm.

"If he is exempted from prosecution or found inno-



cent, it is going to create huge confusion in Nissan's management," Takada said.

'Lebanese phoenix'

It is unclear if Ghosn will be bailed before a potential trial. In Japan, prosecutors and defendants begin a trial at a district court and can appeal to a high court and

the Supreme Court. It may take several years before reaching a final judgment.

If found guilty, Ghosn could face a 10-year prison sentence. The affair represents a staggering fall from grace for a figure celebrated for saving Nissan from the brink of bankruptcy and rebuilding it as a money-making subsidiary of Renault.—AFP

French bonds feel pain after more violent protests

LONDON: French government bond yields rose yesterday, pushing the gap over safer German peers to its widest since May, after more violent anti-government protests in France over the weekend

weekend.

The turmoil in France comes as heightened global trade tensions, a looming vote in Britain's parliament on Brexit and caution before this week's European Central Bank meeting are already bolstering demand for top-rated German debt. While higher-rated French bonds often benefit from risk aversion in world markets, turmoil in France prompt-

ed investors to stay away.

The anti-government protests will slow growth to close to a standstill in the final quarter, the central bank said yesterday, complicating President Emmanuel Macron's task of finding concessions to placate the "yellow vest"

The Bank of France yesterday forecast the eurozone's number two economy would eke out growth of only 0.2 percent in the quarter from the previous three months, down from 0.4 percent in a previous estimate. "Concern about a bit of political and fiscal capitulation is rarely good for a bond market," said Chris Bailey, European strategist at international financial services firm at Raymond James.

"In the wider scheme of things, the bond spread is pretty tight versus Germany but does show a bit of tension in the European bond fraternity."

French bond yields were up to 7 basis points higher on the day across the curve, with France standing out as the weakest performing bond market in the bloc.

Ten-year bond yields rose over 3 bps to 0.72 percent, almost 8 bps above 4 1/2-month lows hit last week. The gap between 10-year bond yields in France and Germany stood at around 46 basis points, its widest since late May, when a rout in Italian bonds rippled over into other eurozone bond markets except

Macron will make a televised address at 1900 GMT as he seeks to placate protesters, whose revolt poses his biggest challenge yet since assuming the presidency 18 months ago. Analysts said Macron is expected to announce new fiscal measures, implying some upward pressure for French yields.

"The big picture is that the budget deficit will worsen and political problems will make cuts to spending hard," said Rabobank rates strategist Lyn Graham-Taylor.

French bonds also underperformed other eurozone peers-the Spanish/French



10-year bond yield gap was at its tightest since October as French yields rose. Political uncertainty also put upward pressure on Belgian yields. Prime Minister Charles Michel re-launched his government on Sunday as a minority administration after the biggest party in his coalition quit in a dispute over a United Nations migration compact.

Italy's bond yields fell 4-5 bps on hopes of a compromise with the

European Union over Italian budget plans. Italian Prime Minister Giuseppe Conte is expected to meet European Commission President Jean-Claude Juncker tomorrow over the 2019 budget, a source said yesterday.

"This morning, the rumors are that Italy could present another revised budget this week and that has helped push yields lower," said DZ Bank analyst Sebastian Fellechner. —Reuters

Sudan pound slides to widest over official rate since devaluation KHARTOUM: The Sudanese currency slid to 60 pounds to the dollar on the black market yesterday, traders said, increasing the gap with the official rate of 47.5 pounds to it to idea to increasing the gap.

KHARTOUM: The Sudanese currency slid to 60 pounds to the dollar on the black market yesterday, traders said, increasing the gap with the official rate of 47.5 pounds to its widest since a sharp devaluation two months ago. The growing gap indicates the pound's official value may have to weaken further, adding to the woes of citizens already suffering shortages of bread and fuel.

The government has been expanding the money supply to finance its budget deficit, spurring inflation and weakening the currency's value. "The deterioration of the Sudanese pound's real value has made everyone rush to convert their savings into dollars," economics professor and analyst Abdullah al-Ramadi told Reuters. "Bloated government spending has increased inflation."

Annual inflation edged up to 68.93 percent in November from 68.44 percent in October, the state statistics agency said on Sunday. The pound was trading at 57 to the dollar on the black market as recently as Saturday. On Oct. 7 the government weakened the official rate to 47.5 pounds to the dollar from 29 pounds. The severe shortages of fuel and bread, both subsidized by the government, have forced people in the capital to queue in front of bakeries and cars to line up in front of petrol stations.

"I have been waiting for bread for more than an hour, and I have had difficulty withdrawing my monthly salary from the bank since December," said Yassin Abdullah, 43, an employee standing outside a bakery on one of Khartoum's main streets. "With prices rising we are living in a real nightmare." —Reuters

Chinese state media distance Huawei arrest from US trade talks mention in stat Huawei issue ble a possibility tha as investors w attempts to ease Tu Xinquan, University of In

BEIJING: Chinese state media yesterday denounced the arrest of a top executive at tech giant Huawei, but did not link it to talks to resolve a trade dispute with the United States, an apparent effort not to undermine prospects for a deal.

Senior White House administration officials on Sunday insisted that Canada's arrest of Huawei Chief Financial Officer Meng Wanzhou on a US extradition request was solely a law enforcement matter that would not derail talks with China.

China's Foreign Ministry criticized what it called the US "unreasonable demand" on Canada to detain Meng while she was passing through Vancouver on Dec. 1. But the commerce ministry, which is engaged in trade negotiations, has declined to comment on the matter.

"At present, it seems there has been a fragile adherence in China and the United States to not link the two," the influential Global Times newspaper said in a commentary.

In a separate commentary, the Global Times suggested that the United States would isolate itself from the world's digital economy if it shunned Huawei.

The China Daily newspaper said in an editorial on the arrest it hoped Canada would not "hold a candle while the devil does its dirty deeds". But there was scant

mention in state media of tension over Huawei issue bleeding into the trade talks, a possibility that had roiled global markets as investors worried it could torpedo attempts to ease trade tension.

Tu Xinquan, a trade expert at Beijing's University of International Business and Economics, said the commerce ministry had not mentioned the Huawei issue because it was focused on negotiations.

"The Chinese government is trying to de-link the two things," Tu said. "If you don't see any discussions in Chinese media, that's the intention of the government."

'Pride of the people'

Meng, 46, faces US accusations that she misled multinational banks about Huawei's control of a company operating in Iran. Her arrest was on the same day that US President Donald Trump met his Chinese counterpart, Xi Jinping, in Argentina to look for ways to resolve the escalating trade war.

The two sides agreed there to delay a planned Jan 1 US increase of tariffs to 25 percent from 10 percent on \$200 billion worth of Chinese goods while they negotiate over China's huge bilateral trade surplus and US complaints that it steals technology.

Huawei, the world's largest supplier of telecommunications network equipment and second-biggest maker of smartphones, is at the cutting edge of fifth-generation (5G) mobile network technology.

Citing security concerns, the US government has taken a series of steps to block the company from some parts of the US market, which is widely per-



ceived in China as an effort to hold the company back.

Huang Jing, a senior researcher at the Chinese think-tank the Pangoal Institution, said connecting the issues "would risk making it more difficult to achieve a compromise in the talks".

But Tu warned that public anger over Meng's arrest could eventually force Beijing's hand into measures that would endanger negotiations.

"If this thing continues, it could put the Chinese government in a very difficult situation. Huawei is the national pride of the Chinese people," Tu said.

In contrast to some of China's recent disputes with other countries, there has

been little evidence of an organized campaign to stoke anti-US behavior, or that consumers have begun to shun US goods in any volume due to the trade war. The Global Times' editor-in-chief, Hu Xijin, took a conciliatory tone in a speech at the newspaper's annual forum on Saturday, arguing that foreign brands, including US phone maker Apple, should not become a target of nationalist anger in the wake of Meng's arrest.

"It is also one of China's core interests to improve China's relations with the US and the West, and not to lead Sino-US relations to the direction of a Cold War," Hu said, at one point holding up his iPhone. —Reuters

Japan economy shrinks more than previously thought in Q3

TOKYO: Japan's economy shrank twice as much as initially thought in the three months to September, with natural disasters weighing on investment, official data showed yesterday. Gross domestic product for the July-September period contracted 0.6 percent from the previous quarter, Cabinet Office data showed, revising down the figure from the preliminary estimate of a 0.3-percent contraction. The reading comes after growth of 0.7 percent in the April-June period, and was slightly weaker than market expectations of a 0.5-percent contraction.

The main driver of the decline appeared to be private investment, which shrank 2.8 percent quarter-on-quarter, compared with an initial estimate of a 0.2-percent contraction the data showed

tion, the data showed.

"The background to the weak corporate investment is believed to be natural disasters in July which stopped some logistics, such as setting up facilities," Takashi Miwa, senior economist at Nomura Securities, told AFP. "This is a temporary, technical contraction and given the latest economic indicators, the economy picked up in the October-December quarter," he said, though he cautioned that potential intensification of US-led trade tensions remained a risk factor. —AFP

Mukwege: Congo's 'Dr Miracle' heals victims of sexual atrocity

'When one does not fight against an evil, it is like a cancer'

KINSHASA: In the Democratic Republic of Congo, they fired. "Her whole pelvis was destroyed. I thought it was call him "Doctor Miracle" for his surgical skill and dedication in helping women overcome the injuries and trauma of sexual abuse and rape. Denis Mukwege is a crusading gynecologist who has spent more than two decades treating appalling injuries inflicted on women

He has also emerged as an excoriating critic of President Joseph Kabila, set to be replaced in pivotal elections on December 23. A father of five, the tireless 63-year-old is an outspoken critic of the abuse of women in war and impunity for perpetrators. He has repeatedly accused the world of failing to act. "When one does not fight against an evil, it is like a cancer, it spreads and destroys the whole society," he told AFP in a weekend interview.

The 2018 Nobel Peace laureate, who shares the prize with Yazidi activist Nadia Murad, has dedicated his award to all victims of sexual violence. Mukwege's Panzi hospital has treated tens of thousands of victims of sexual violence in his war-weary native province of South Kivu, part of an eastern region riven by a conflict involving government forces and countless rebel groups. His work was the subject of an acclaimed 2015 film titled "The Man Who Mends Women".

"Denis Mukwege is the foremost, most unifying symbol, both nationally and internationally, of the struggle to end sexual violence in war and armed conflicts," Nobel committee chairwoman Berit Reiss-Andersen said when the award was announced in October. Mukwege resists talking of his work in terms of statistics, because "each woman raped is one woman too many," and he fears people have become desensitized to the swelling toll. But he said his hospital alone has treated more than 50,000 women and girls for injuries from sexual violence, while stressing that this is "just the tip of the iceberg".

'Atrocities on women's bodies'

In his French autobiography titled "Plaidoyer pour la Vie" (Plea for Life), Mukwege relates the "depths of horror" he encountered in South Kivu. Mukwege recounted how rapists had inserted a gun into a woman's vagina and the work of a madman, but the same year I treated 45 similar cases," he said of the incident in 1999 — the year he set up Panzi hospital in the provincial capital Bukavu.

"I have witnessed mass atrocities committed against women's bodies and I cannot remain with my arms folded because our common humanity calls on us to care for each other." The 450-bed Panzi hospital treats more than 3,500 women a year, though not all for sexual abuse. It provides free consultations and performs reconstructive surgery on women who have suffered serious internal injuries. Mukwege's work has also put his own life on the line. He narrowly escaped an attack in October 2012 in which his guard was killed. He now lives under the permanent protection of UN peacekeepers at his hospital.

Tireless campaigner

Aid agencies have accused all sides in the conflicts that have ravaged the eastern regions of North Kivu and South Kivu of using "systematic rape" against women as a weapon of war. Mukwege told AFP such attacks have increased since 2016 and more and more victims are children. Up to seven percent of rape victims at his hospital are now infants — up from around three percent. "I believe that in my life I have never been as disturbed, shocked, I don't have the words. When you see an innocent little baby, but bloody, with her genitals shredded, ou ask yourself questions about humanity.

"How could we get to this point? What happens to humans who have no rules? It has no limit." As well as his tireless medical work, Mukwege has fronted a worldwide campaign against trade in conflict diamonds and minerals. "The products of this looting, well we all have them in our pockets," he told reporters at a press conference on Sunday. "We all have a responsibility here." He expressed concern that this month's elections could spark further violence. DR Congo has not known a peaceful transition of power since gaining independence from Belgium in 1960. After Mukwege's Nobel award was announced, DR Congo authorities congratulated him for his "very important work", but accused him of mixing humanitarian work and politics.



Many awards

Born on March 1, 1955, in Bukavu, the third of nine children, Mukwege was inspired to become a doctor by his father, a pastor who used to visit the sick. After studying medicine in neighboring Burundi, he returned to work at Lemera hospital, south of Bukavu, before pursuing specialist training in gynaecology in France.

Levi Luhiriri, who works as a doctor at the hospital, said

Mukwege was fair but tough and strived for internationally recognised standards. He has been honored by the United Nations and has received many other international awards, including the Olof Palme Prize in January 2009 and the Sakharov Prize in 2014. In September 2016, he also won the Seoul Peace Prize. Like with his other awards, Mukwege said his share of the Nobel Peace Prize money — around half a million dollars — will go to his Panzi Foundation. — AFP

France: Protests no excuse to curb climate battle

KATOWICE: France said yesterday at the UN climate talks it fears certain countries will exploit the "yellow vest" protests to curb their ambitions in the fight against global warming. The "vellow vests", clad in the luminous safety jackets carried by law in all French cars, began slowing or blocking traffic on roads around France last month in protest against anti-pollution fuel tax hikes.

The demonstrations have snowballed, leading to calls to topple French President Emmanuel Macron, accused of favoring the rich. "It would be dangerous to blame the environment for this entire crisis. It's a broader political, economic and social problem," said Brune Poirson, French secretary of state for ecological transition. She spoke to reporters on the margins of the UN climate talks in Katowice, Poland, adding that she was notably there "to help countries decode" the situation in France.

"The 'yellow vest' movement is much broader and goes way beyond the single issue of ecological transition,

so I believe one should not conflate things," Poirson said. 'The risk is that other countries... will use what happened in France and reduce it to a question of ecological transition and a poorly received carbon tax in order to also

curb their ambitions regarding the climate.' Conceding the need to figure out a way to transition to clean energy "in the fairest way possible", Poirson said "the end goal remains the same, namely to get over our oil dependence and speed up the ecological transition". Officials from nearly 200 countries are meeting in Katowice until the end of the week to try to flesh out the

promises agreed in the 2015 Paris climate accord. The Paris deal saw nations agree to limit global tem-

perature rises to below two degrees Celsius (3.6 Fahrenheit) and under 1.5C if possible. The UN's expert climate panel in October warned that fossil fuel emissions must be halved by 2030 to have any hope of reaching the 1.5C goal by the end of the century. US President Donald Trump on Saturday cited the French protests as proof that he was right to reject the Paris agreement on fighting climate change. "Maybe it's time to end the ridiculous and extremely expensive Paris Agreement and return money back to the people in the form of lower taxes?" Trump tweeted. Polish President Andrzej Duda for his part said: "We can't enforce climate policies that go against the will of the people." — AFP



Turning bombs into bracelets, as Laos villagers wait for safe land

shiny, molten metal from a kiln and deftly pours it into a mold carved in a wooden block. Seconds later, she prises out a silver coloured dove that was once shrapnel from a bomb dropped in Ban Napia village in the north eastern province of Xieng Khouang in Laos, the most heavily bombed country per capita in the world.

Vanthon, who goes by one name, grows rice in a small plot of land a short distance away. But the ornaments and jewelry made from scrap metal in the small kiln at home provide her husband with an income. For the dozen families in the village who fashion jewelry from shrapnel for the New York-based company Article 22, it is a curious twist to the devastating war - one that helps them make a living from bombs, as they wait for their land to be cleared. "Our field has not yet been cleared of bombs, so this is our main source of income for now," said Vanthon, gesturing to a pile of finished doves.

"We have to be careful while farming, and hope that a bomb does not go off. When the land is cleared, we can farm more." The United States dropped more than two million tons of cluster bombs on Laos during the second Indochina War from 1964 to 1973, to disrupt supply routes to North Vietnam. About 30 percent of those bombs did not detonate, and still pose the risk of death or injury to villagers as they go about their daily routines, according to Mines Advisory Group (MAG), a British charity that clears unexploded

ordnance (UXO). MAG estimates that about 1,600 square km (618 square miles) of land - roughly the size of Greater London - still needs clearing in Laos, one of the world's poorest countries. Meanwhile, UXO contamination prevents Lao communities from "fully utilizing their land" and earning better incomes, according to MAG. "People have been living with the contamination for 40 years, and they have no choice but to live with the daily risk and fear of death or injury from unexploded bombs," said Greg Crowther, MAG's Southeast Asia director. UXO-impacted communities are "predominantly the poorest members of society", and the risk of bombs forces them to adopt different farming practices that often reduce the productivity of their crops, he said.

'A-ha moment'

More than of two-thirds of the population in

ith a long-stemmed ladle, Vanthon pulls the landlocked Southeast Asian country depends on the land for a living, according to government data. Many farm small plots of land that they do not legally own. The government aims to title all land by 2025, and introduce a new law that officials say will expedite modernization of records


and give greater tenure security. The country is also luring more foreign investment to build much-needed infrastructure and generate jobs, but most villagers have few livelihood options, particularly in Xieng Khouang, where much of the land is still off-limits because of the bombs. Elizabeth Suda, founder of Article 22, first visited the province about a decade ago while exploring a sustainable weaving venture with local women. It was there that Suda, who had previously worked with a luxury brand in New York, came across villagers melting bomb shrapnel into spoons that they would use and sell in the

local market. She said she had an "a-ha moment". "I thought, why not take a weapon of destruction and turn it into a symbol of love that has a positive impact on the community?" she told the Thomson Reuters Foundation. "These are subsistence farmers; having their land cleared makes a big difference. But until then, they can earn a living making jewelry from shrapnel they find." Suda founded Article 22 in 2009, named for the clause in the Universal Declaration of Human Rights that says every individual is entitled to the realization of "economic, social and cultural rights" indispen-

sable for his or her dignity and personality. After partnering with Swiss non-profit Helvetas, Suda set out on her own, selling online and through a few retail outlets, including one in Luang Prabang, Laos' former royal capital that the UN cultural agency considers a world heritage site. Suda works with about a dozen families in Xieng Khouang, sending designs for earrings, pendants and ornaments that the villagers fashion in their kilns. They are finished in capital Vientiane, then shipped to New York. Article 22 only works with shrapnel, or bombs that have already exploded, so the villagers are not at risk, Suda said. The metal has been tested for toxicity and found to be safe. Some of the profits are donated to MAG to clear UXOs.

War tourism

Unlike neighboring Vietnam, which draws millions of tourists each year keen to visit sites related to the war with the United States. Laos has few Instagram-ready war attractions. In villages in Xieng Khouang, remnants of the "secret war" are largely articles of everyday use - mugs and buckets fashioned from shell casings, ladles from shrappel. Article 22 received a huge boost when actor Emma Watson wore a pair of its earrings at a red carpet event in 2017. There is little glamour in Ban Napia, whose sign declares it to be the "war spoon village".

Simple wood and concrete homes sit on either side of a mud road. Some have a handpainted sign that says "making spoon", with a name and a phone number. Demining is a slow and expensive process, and at the current pace, experts say it could be more than 100 years before Laos is safe. While waiting for their land to be cleared, villagers in Ban Napia and elsewhere in Xieng Khouang will probably continue to supplement their income with articles made from shrapnel, said Nouds Phedrasy, a tourist guide.

"In the years after the war, they had nothing, and had to make do with whatever they could find - including shell casings and shrapnel," he said. "Now, it's a business, and they are aware of the irony. But it is just a way to make some money."— Reuters



James Arthur is taking acting lessons



Rumble in the Outback: Aussie boxing troupe keeps on swinging

I hen Fred Brophy bangs a drum on the floodlit stage outside his boxing tent, the large crowd gathered in front of him falls silent in rapt attention. Sporting a cowboy hat and a silky bright-red shirt, the tall and weathered 67-year-old looks every bit the showman. Brophy runs a boxing troupe-the last in Australia and one of the few left worldwide-travelling to outback towns where someone's always up for a fight. "I've been doing it since I've been five years of age. I was born into it," Brophy tells AFP in a broad Australian accent in Birdsville, a remote town in the vast continent's dry, dusty interior, around 1,500 kilometers (900 miles) west of Brisbane.

Having his own troupe is something of a family tradition, he explains. "Me father had one. Me grandfather had one. Me great-grandfather had one. So I've got one." Brophy and his touring pugilists are on their annual pilgrimage to the Queensland outback spot where more than 6,000 people travel for days and weeks across Australia to attend the centuries-old two-day Birdsville Races. Racegoers, clutching beer cans while buffeted by dust and flies during the day, flock to Brophy's big tent at night, eager for more

Lords of the ring

Back in the 1930s to 1950s, such tents were a fixture at county fairs and agricultural shows in the major cities, says Australian boxing author Grantlee Kieza. It gave aspiring boxers, particularly those from poor backgrounds, a chance to hone their skills in front of intimate vet boisterous crowds, pocket some money, and become the hometown hero. The troupes provided a foundation for some top Aboriginal boxers including Jack Hassen, George Bracken and Tony Mundine. One of the best-known tents was Jimmy Sharman's troupe, which attracted young indigenous boys keen to earn some cash. But other forms of entertainment have since seduced spectators away from the ring.

"The great traditions of being outdoors on the frontiers of Australia changed to a more bohemian way I guess, and those sorts of manly rough sports began to decline in popularity," author Kieza tells AFP. isney's "Ralph Breaks the Internet" has again topped North American box offices, taking in an estimated \$16.1 million for the weekend to narrowly edge out another family-oriented animation, Universal's "The Grinch," industry tracker Exhibitor Relations said Sunday. On a last quiet weekend before the coming crush of holiday films, the order of the top five films on this three-day weekend was, remarkably, exactly the same as last weekend.

"Ralph," a family-friendly sequel to 2012's "Wreck It Ralph" with the title character voiced by John C. Reilly, came in just ahead of "Grinch," which sold \$15.7 million in tickets. Benedict Cumberbatch voices the grouchy Seussinspired title character in that film. In third spot again was MGM's boxing drama "Creed II," at \$10.3 million. Jordan as Adonis Creed as he-coached by the aging Rocky Balboa (Sylvester Stallone) — takes on the son of the boxer who killed his father.

Fourth place went to "Fantastic Beasts: The Crimes of Grindelwald" from Warner Bros, with a take of \$6.8 million. 

Nobel laureates urge world to help rape victims in conflict

OSLO: Nobel laureates Denis Mukwege and Nadia Murad called on the world to protect victims of wartime sexual violence in their Peace Prize acceptance speeches yesterday, slamming indifference to the plight of women and children in conflict. Congolese gynecologist Mukwege, whose work has made him a global expert on rape in conflict, and Yazidi activist Murad, a survivor of IS sexual slavery, both said victims were sometimes valued less than commercial interests

In an emotional ceremony in Oslo, which saw the laureates cheered and given standing ovations. Mukwege and Murad called on the world to do more. "If there is a war to be waged, it is the war against the indifference which is eating away at our societies," Mukwege said. His Panzi hospital in the Democratic Republic of Congo's wartorn east has treated the wounds of tens of thousands of women and children after sexual assaults that have become a "new reality" in the country. The 63-year-old said the violence "shames our common humanity".

In her speech, Murad, 25, implored the global community to help free hundreds of women and girls still held by jihadists, saying the world must protect her people and other vulnerable communities. "It is my view that all victims deserve a safe haven until justice is done for them," she said. Nobel committee chairwoman Berit Reiss-Andersen said the pair had received the Peace Prize "for their efforts to end the use of sexual violence as a weapon of war and armed conflict". She described them as "two of the strongest voices in the world today". They received the Peace Prize gold medals, diplomas and nine million Swedish Krona (a million dollars), which they will share.

Mukwege lay much of the blame for the horrific violence unleashed on civilians on those in power in his troubled country. "For twenty years now, day after day, at Panzi hospital, I have seen the harrowing consequences of the country's gross mismanagement," said the doctor, a critic of DR Congo President Joseph Kabila, who is set to be replaced in elections this month. "Babies, girls, young women, mothers, grandmothers, and also men and boys, cruelly raped, often publicly and collectively, by inserting burning plastic or sharp objects in their genitals.'

Mukwege said the trade in the country's abundant natural resources helped fuel the violence while profits "end up in the pockets of a predatory oligarchy". "We love nice cars, jewelry and gadgets. I have a smartphone myself. These items contain minerals found in our country. Often mined in inhuman conditions by young children, victims of intimidation and sexual violence," he said. "It's not just perpetrators of violence who are responsible for their crimes, it is also those who choose to look the other way," Mukwege added, calling for a global fund to provide reparation for victims and economic and political sanctions for those behind the violence.

Murad survived the horrors of captivity under the Islamic State group, which targeted her Kurdish-speaking community as it seized parts of Iraq and Syria. Older women and men faced summary execution during the IS assault, which the United Nations has described as a possible genocide. Captured in 2014, Murad suffered beatings and gang-rape before she was able to escape.

In her Nobel acceptance address yesterday, Murad said more than 6,500 women and girls from her community had been kidnapped, raped and traded "in the 21st century, in the age of globalization and human rights". The fate of some 3,000 women and girls is still unknown. "Young

girls at the prime of life are sold, bought, held captive and raped every day. It is inconceivable that the conscience of the leaders of 195 countries around the world is not mobilized to liberate these girls," she said. "What if they were a commercial deal, an oil field or a shipment of weapons? Most certainly, no efforts would be spared to liberate them."

Murad, whose mother and six of her brothers were killed, said on Sunday that "steps towards justice" had given her some hope. A UN team authorized to investigate the massacre of the Yazidi minority is due to finally start fieldwork in Iraq next year. Murad has been supported in her campaign for justice for Yazidis by Lebanese-British lawyer and rights activist Amal

Clooney, who was in the audience in Oslo. No militant has yet faced trial over the atrocities against the Yazidis. Murad is the first Iraqi to win the Nobel Peace Prize. She said she was thankful for the honor, but added: "The fact remains that the only prize in the world that can restore our dignity is justice and the prosecution of criminals." — AFP

'I can't breathe' were Khashoggi's final words: CNN

ISTANBUL: Journalist Jamal Khashoggi repeatedly told his killers "I can't breathe" during his final moments in the Saudi consulate in Istanbul, CNN reported yesterday. Quoting a source who said they had read the full translated transcript of an audio recording, CNN said that Khashoggi recognized one of the men, General Maher Mutreb, who told him: "You are coming back". Khashoggi replied: "You can't do that...people are waiting outside.'

She insisted the pact seeks to prevent, rather than encourage, illegal migration. "This is about safe, orderly and regular migration - it says (this) clearly in the title."

It was the first country to disavow the negotiations late last year, and since then Australia, Austria, the Czech Republic, Dominican Republic, Hungary, Latvia, Poland and Slovakia have pulled out of the process. Rows over the accord have erupted in several European Union nations, hobbling Belgium's coalition government and pushing Slovakia's foreign minister to tender his resignation.

The UN's children's agency said the pact could help provide better access to education and health or migrant children and offer "them stronger protection from exploitation and violence". Other organizations, including Amnesty International and the International Federation of the Red Cross, see the accord as just a first step towards protecting migrants. "We have heard repeatedly that this compact is not legally binding and does not impact on state sovereignty," said IFRC president Francesco Rocca at a press conference on the sidelines of the main dialogue. "But if we are serious about fixing this problem, it should at the very least be ethically binding," he implored. After the Marrakesh conference, the UN General Assembly is set to adopt a resolution formally endorsing the deal on Dec 19. — AFP

A Turkish official said that by extraditing all suspects to Turkey, the Saudi authorities can address the international community's concerns. Saudi Arabia's Foreign Minister Adel Al-Jubeir on Sunday ruled out their extradition. "We don't extradite our citizens," he said at a Gulf Arab summit in Riyadh. Last month, Saudi Arabia's public prosecutor's office said is seeking the death penalty for five individuals, and that 11 of 21 suspects have been indicted and will be referred to court in Saudi Arabia. — Reuters

The rupee has been one of Asia's worst performing currencies this year, although it has bounced back in the past fortnight, while economic growth slowed to under eight percent in the last quarter. It is understood the government is pressuring the bank to enact policies to help spur growth ahead of next year's elections, when Modi will run for a second term. The government would like the RBI to lower interest rates and free up more of its cash reserves to invest in Asia's third-largest economy, analysts say.

Finance minister Arun Jaitley in October hit out at the RBI over a multibillion-dollar bank loan crisis that is hampering India's corporate sector. Jaitley accused the RBI of failing to stop indiscriminate lending from 2008 to 2014, saying it had "looked the other way" while banks issued loans that turned sour. The rift flared up again when economic hardliners from a powerful Hindu nationalist group linked to Modi's ruling Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) told Patel to fall in line with the government or quit.

Patel served as a deputy governor at the bank for three years before succeeding Raghuram Rajan in the top job in Aug 2016. His term at the helm was due to end in Sept 2019. Jaitley tweeted yesterday that the government "acknowledges with deep sense of appreciation" Patel's time at the bank. "It was a pleasure for me to deal with him and benefit from his scholarship. I wish Dr Patel all the very best and many more years of public service," he wrote. Modi described Patel as a "thorough professional with impeccable integrity". "He leaves behind a great legacy. We will miss him immensely," he wrote on Twitter.

'Quite clearly the resignation of Urjit Patel shows that nothing has changed," Yashwant Sinha, a former finance minister and member of the ruling Bharatiya Janata Party, told CNBC-TV18. "The resignation is a clear sign of the government trying to interfere with the working of the RBI," he added.

Meanwhile, a British court vesterday ruled Indian tycoon Vijay Mallya, the owner of Kingfisher beer and head of the Force India Formula One team, can be extradited to his homeland to face fraud charges. Mallya has been fighting to remain in Britain but judge Emma Arbuthnot said he had misrepresented how loans received from banks would be used and therefore had a case to answer. She said bankers had been "charmed" by a "glamorous, flashy, famous, bejewelled, bodyguarded, ostensibly billionaire playboy" into losing their common sense.

Mallya will be able to make a final appeal against the

ruling to Home Secretary Sajid Javid. Mallya left India in March 2016 owing more than \$1 billion after defaulting on loan payments to a state-owned bank and allegedly misusing the funds. The loans from the state-owned IDBI bank were intended to bail out his failed carrier Kingfisher Airlines. Arbuthnot said Mallya had used the loans, among other things, for "vanity projects" such as Force India, which had received payments at a time when it was struggling in 2010.

"I have found that on the face of it, (Mallya) was doing everything he could by using honest or dishonest means to keep the company going," she told Westminster Magistrates' Court. Arbuthnot rejected his defense team's argument that the case was motivated by political considerations or that he would not receive a fair trial in India. She said the cell where he would be held was large and would be able to cater for his medical needs, dismissing claims extradition would infringe his human rights. "A spell in custody is likely to help him cut down on alcohol," she added.

An extradition would be a huge win for Modi months before an election, after opposition parties said the government had given a "free passage" to Mallya to flee, an accusation it denies. Modi has faced pressure from political opponents to bring to justice several people who have fled India in recent years to escape prosecution in an array of cases, many of them loan defaults.

Mallya said in July that he had made an "unconditional offer" to an Indian court in a bid to settle the charges, but denies that was an admission of guilt. "I cannot understand how my extradition decision... and my settlement offer are linked in any way," he wrote on Twitter on Thursday. "Wherever I am physically, my appeal is 'please take the money'. I want to stop the narrative that I stole money," he added.

Lawyer Mark Summers, representing the Indian authorities, said during an earlier hearing, that "the focus of our case is on his conduct, how he misused the banks". He told the court that Kingfisher Airlines had been incurring losses and was forced to defer payments to its creditors. It sought loans in Oct 2009 and hoped to emerge from the global financial crisis as a profitable venture. "This was an airline in trouble at this stage, which is why it was seeking financial assistance from a large number of banks," for large amounts of money, Summers said.

Known for his lavish lifestyle, Mallya made Kingfisher beer a global brand. He stepped down as the director of the Indian Premier League cricket team Royal Challengers Bangalore last year. His financial dealings are being investigated by the federal Central Bureau of Investigation and the Enforcement Directorate, a financial crimes agency. Mallya was once known as the "King of Good Times" but dropped off India's most wealthy list in 2014, engulfed by Kingfisher Airlines' massive debts. He has been living in a sprawling \$15 million mansion in southeast England but has denied absconding. — Agencies

Australia to decide on Cheika's future as coach by Christmas

SYDNEY: Rugby Australia will decide the fate of underfire Michael Cheika and his coaching staff "ahead of Christmas", chairman Cameron Clyne said yesterday after an end-of-season review, following a disappointing year for the team.

Cheika has been under growing pressure after a poor season, with recent losses to England and Wales, and an uninspiring win over Italy. In a brief statement that lasted less than one minute to reporters after the meeting in Sydney, Clyne said the board would conduct a review before making a decision in the next two weeks.

"We've had a presentation from Michael, we've had some data gathered from him, from his coaching staff, from his players and from our high performance unit and we need to go through a fairly thorough review process," he said, without taking questions.

"We've got all the information we need and we'll be going through that process. "I know people are very keen to know what's going on but I felt it was important to at least let you know where we are in that process and obviously we'll have more to say and have that process wrapped up ahead of Christmas."

A source told The Sydney Morning Herald that player feedback was "mixed", with support for Michael Hooper as Test captain but concerns over the team's culture, communication and organisation. Cheika's contract is due to run out in a year and he had previously received the backing of Rugby Australia chief executive Raelene Castle to

take the Wallabies to the World Cup in Japan.

Earlier in Paris, Racing 92 took a big step towards the Champions Cup quarter-finals with a 36-26 win over Leicester Tigers on Sunday, while two-time winners Munster hammered French champions Castres.

Saracens joined France's Racing in making it three wins from three with an astonishing second-half revival to thrash Cardiff Blues 51-25. Racing claimed a bonus points within 35 minutes as international backs Virimi Vakatawa, Juan Imhoff and Simon Zebo crossed as well as inexperienced back-rower Baptiste Chouzenoux.

Scotland fly-half Finn Russell was instrumental as his side played an expansive brand of rugby which produced a fifth and final try to secure victory ten minutes from time. France prop Eddy Ben Arous left the field on a stretcher with a neck injury and went to a nearby hospital for further assessments.

Coach Laurent Travers was impressed by his team's ability with ball in hand but expected more from his side. "Our attack was very good so we're not going to be fussy but we left three tries out there," he said.

"Sometimes we have to be more clear in our thinking to know when to play and when to keep it tight," he added. Tigers left the French capital with their own bonus point, which pleased coach Geordan Murphy.—AFP

ADELAIDE: India won their first Test on Australian soil in a decade yesterday, bowling out the home side in a nailbiting finale to clinch the opening match and raise hopes of their first ever series victory Down Under.

Wicketkeeper Rishabh Pant pouched a world recordequalling 11 catches for the match as India, after setting an improbable target of 323, finally dismissed Australia to win by 31 runs on day five at Adelaide Oval.

Australia, attempting what would have been a record chase at the ground, gallantly battled to 291 before Josh Hazlewood became the last man to fall to Ravichandran Ashwin, who finished with 3-92. Shaun Marsh made 62 and Tim Paine 41.

It was a huge breakthrough for captain Virat Kohli's men, who went 1-0 up with three Tests to go after becoming the first Indian team to win the opening match of a Test series in Australia. Pant took the plaudits after matching the record of 11 catches in a Test held by England's Jack Russell and South Africa's AB de Villiers.

India's last Test success in Australia was at the WACA Ground in Perth in 2008, and the previous one in Adelaide was 2003. They have now won just six times in Australia in more than 70 years. But with the home team missing banned batsmen Steve Smith and David Warner, Kohli and his team sensed ahead of the tour that this could be their opportunity to make history by winning the series.

They now take the momentum into the second Test in Perth starting Friday, with Melbourne and Sydney to follow. "The odds were stacked against them. They fought really well but we executed our plans well and got that last wicket which we were intending to get," said Kohli.

"I'm super-proud of the bowlers, to have four bowlers and take 20 wickets is a great achievement and something that we haven't done in the past. "It shows us that if the batsmen step up regularly, we will be gunning for a win in every Test match."

'ŚHATTERING'

Paine, who fell to a rash shot after lunch, said the defeat was "shattering" but he was proud of the way the team took it to the wire. "We thought we could win, no doubt about that. We saw how the pitch is playing and told ourselves we are going to dig deep, but unfortunately, myself, Travis (Head) and Shaun couldn't bat long as long as we should have."

Australia resumed the final day needing another 219 for

victory with four wickets down, but lost their last two specialist batsmen before lunch, shifting the odds heavily in

India's favour.

Marsh and Head had started cautiously, grinding out 11 runs in the opening seven overs before seamer Ishant Sharma struck with the score on 115, bowling a bouncer that caught Head's bat as he tried to fend it off and Ajinkya Rahane took the catch at gully.

Paine joined Marsh and they upped the ante, capitalising on some loose balls from Shami to chip away steadily and close the gap. Marsh brought up a valuable 50 — his 10th in Tests-with a boundary from a pull shot off spinner Ashwin.

It was a much-needed knock for the left-hander, who was on a run of six consecutive single-figure Test scores, although he has been in scintillating form in domestic cricket. But Marsh didn't last much longer with Jasprit

Bumrah getting the big breakthrough as he pushed at a perfectly angled delivery, getting a faint edge to Pant behind the stumps.

By lunch Australia had fought to 186 for six, still needing a further 137 runs for victory, with Paine not out 40 and Pat Cummins on five. But in the second over after they resumed Paine top-edged a pull shot from Bumrah and Pant easily took a catch.

Cummins, who survived two big reviews within four balls, with the technology both times going in his favour, showed gritty application with Mitchell Starc in a 41-run eighth wicket stand.

And when the target dropped below 100, the crowd dared to dream before Starc fell to Shami for 28. It brought Nathan Lyon to the crease and he got the pulses racing with a quick 38 to set up a tense finale, before Hazlewood departed to end the match.—AFP

S Africa among potential hosts for 2019 Africa Cup of Nations

PARIS: South Africa could step in as hosts of the 2019 Africa Cup of Nations, according to the president of the Confederation of African Football (CAF) Ahmad Ahmad in an interview with AFP vectorday.

CAF has been studying alternative solutions for the staging of the June 15 to July 13 event after Cameroon were withdrawn as hosts due to delays with preparations and security concerns. A final decision on who will host next summer's football showpiece will be announced on January 9, Ahmad said. He added that for now "two or three" candidates had shown an interest in taking over from Cameroon, the Madagascan naming South Africa as having filed a letter of intent. "According to my information, two or three letters of intent have arrived," the CAF president told AFP in an interview yesterMonday.

"South Africa is one of the countries to have sent a letter of intention. Two or three countries have made serious inquiries." The decision to ditch Cameroon for 2019 has created a confusing merry-go-round. Cameroon will now host the 2021 edition, originally given to Ivory Coast, who are now being asked to host the tournament in 2023.

The hosts for 2019, meanwhile, will be chosen from a short-list whose submission deadline is December 14. "Everything will be finalised by December 25 to create a short-list of candidates who have been evaluated and noted," Ahmad said.

"The executive committee (of the CAF) will meet in Dakar on January 9, when we will make a decision." In 2014, then CAF president Issa Hayatou of Cameroon announced the hosts of three successive editions of the biennial tournament: Cameroon (2019), Ivory Coast (2021) and Guinea (2023). Ahmad confirmed earlier reports claiming Cameroon would now host the tournament in 2021. Cameroon has "agreed" to be hosts in 2021, Ahmad told AFP. "I have the letter, I'm in contact with the president of the republic. We are in agreement for 2021."

However the CAF chief is still waiting for Ivory Coast to confirm it would be happy to forego hosting the 2021 tournament and wait a further two years to play hosts in 2023. "We're waiting," added Ahmad. "We took the same steps (as with Cameroon), we've sent the letter.

"On Monday or Tuesday there will be a meeting between the Prime Minister and the people who organise the CAN, so we will see." Congo Brazzaville last week was named by the CAF as a serious candidate to host the 2019 event, although the country's sports minister subsequently played down those reports. Ahmad would neither confirm nor deny the country's interest.

"I can't comment on a country's internal problems," he said. "You would have to ask their federation or government." — AFP



NZ's Ajaz Patel wins battle for spinner's role against S Lanka

WELLINGTON: New Zealand left-arm spinner Ajaz Patel's form against Pakistan in the UAE has earned him the chance to impress in local conditions after selectors yesterday named him as the only slow bowler in the squad for two Tests against Sri Lanka.

The 30-year-old produced a man-of-the-match performance on debut in their four-run win over Pakistan in the first test in Abu Dhabi last month. He also finished with 13 wickets in the series, the most by a New Zealand bowler.

Despite his impressive performances, he had been in competition with offspinner Will Somerville and legspinner Ish Sodhi for the one slow bowling position in the squad with New Zealand returning to play on pitches less conducive to turn.

Coach Gary Stead had said on the team's return home on Sunday that he would need to drop two of the spinners as they resorted to a three-pronged pace attack for the first Test starting on Saturday at the Basin Reserve.

"Ajaz certainly grabbed his opportunity on the UAE

tour and he's a proven performer in New Zealand conditions," team selector Gavin Larsen said. "There's a real swell of support for the test team following their efforts in the UAE, so were hoping to transition that momentum into a big home summer."

Dolphins shock Patriots, Chiefs and Saints win

CHICAGO: In a marquee matchup of flashy offense throwing two incompletions as the Ravens fell to 7-6. against tough defense, it was all defense. The Chicago Bears held the Los Angeles Rams to 214 total yards and kept them out of the end zone Sunday night, logging a 15-6 win at Soldier Field that might play a major role in shaping the NFC playoffs when they start next month. Chicago (9-4) moved another step closer to the NFC North title. If Minnesota (6-5-1) loses on Monday night in Seattle, the Bears can wrap up the division crown next week at home against Green Bay. Los Angeles (11-2), meanwhile, sealed the NFC West last week but fell out of the No. 1 seed in the conference on Sunday. New Orleans (11-2) won earlier Sunday in Tampa Bay, and owns the top seed by virtue of a 45-35 win over the Rams on Nov. 4 in the Superdome.

DOLPHINS 34, PATRIOTS 33

Kenyan Drake scored to complete a two-lateral miracle final play as host Miami scored from 69 yards out and stunned New England. With seven seconds left on the clock, Dolphins quarterback Ryan Tannehill completed a 14-yard pass to Kenny Stills, who lateraled to DeVante Parker, who then found Drake. Drake ran the final 51 yards, scooting past stumbling tight end Rob Gronkowski, whom the Patriots had inserted into the game to stop a "Hail Mary" pass. Tannehill finished 14of-19 passing for 265 yards, three touchdowns and no interceptions. He battled a sore ankle after he got stepped on in the second quarter, but returned and kept the Dolphins (7-6) in playoff contention with the win. New England (9-4) had a chance to clinch its division for the 10th straight year but instead lost for the fifth time in its last six trips to Miami.

Special teams ace Taysom Hill flipped the momentum with a blocked punt and Drew Brees converted secondhalf touchdowns with a short pass and a fourth-down leap to lift New Orleans to a comeback victory over host Tampa Bay and claim the Saints' second consecutive NFC South title. The Saints (11-2), who won backto-back division titles for the first time in franchise history, looked sluggish, falling behind 14-3 at halftime, but they scored 25 unanswered points with three secondhalf touchdown drives and a 36-yard field goal by Will Lutz to put the game away. The Bucs (5-8) dominated the Saints in the first half, taking a 14-3 lead, and it could have been even more lopsided because kicker Cairo Santos missed a 46-yard field goal after Tampa Bay had driven to a first-and-10 at the New Orleans 22.

The outcome made a winner of interim coach Joe Philbin, who replaced Mike McCarthy after the Packers (5-7-1) fired the 13th-year head coach shortly after last week's loss to the Arizona Cardinals. The Falcons (4-9) lost their fifth in a row.

Derek Carr hit Derek Carrier for a 6-yard touchdown pass on fourth-and-goal with 21 seconds remaining to give host Oakland an upset of Pittsburgh. In a seesaw game, Carr was 5 of 7 for 74 yards on the winning drive. For the game, he threw for 322 yards and also had a scoring pass to Lee Smith. Doug Martin ran for a touchdown for the Raiders (3-10). Chris Boswell slipped and shanked a 40-yard field-goal attempt as time expired, leaving Pittsburgh (7-5-1) with a threegame losing streak. Ben Roethlisberger missed most of the second half, apparently injured on a second-quarter sack, but returned to lead the Steelers to a go-ahead score with 2:55 remaining. — Reuters

Tottenham face make-or-break Barcelona clash

LONDON: Tottenham are sitting pretty in the Premier League but face a potentially season-defining match against Barcelona in the Champions League today. Mauricio Pochettino's men have amassed 36 points from 16 Premier League matches, with 12 wins, leaving them in third place behind Liverpool and Manchester City. That they have managed that despite playing in their temporary home of Wembley and after a World Cup in which so many of their players featured until the final weekend, makes their achievement all the more impressive.

However, with City and Liverpool in such rampant form, few expect Spurs to win the Premier League, putting increased emphasis on their match against the Spanish league leaders in Group B.

Pochettino must somehow find a way past Lionel Messi's Barcelona to reach the knockout stages but he remains positive ahead of the daunting trip to the Camp Nou to face the five-time European champions.

"It will be a massive game. They have qualified for the next stage but in the Champions League no one is going to give a present," said the Argentine, who left Harry Kane out of the starting line-up for the 2-0 win away to Leicester on Saturday.

"We need to win and deserve to win. The mentality is going to be 200 percent to try to win. We are going to arrive in the best condition, Barcelona are one of the best teams in Europe." Spurs took just one point from their first three games in Group B, losing to Inter Milan and Barcelona and drawing with PSV.

But they beat PSV at home and then scored late through Christian Eriksen to beat Inter 1-0 at Wembley, leaving them in second place on seven points, the same as the Italians.

With Barcelona already guaranteed to top the group, Spurs must match Inter's result to guarantee progress. Pochettino has in the past talked about how

only the Premier League or Champions League title will take the club to the "next level", even though the trophy cabinet has been empty since 2008.

Spurs have played in the Champions League for the past three seasons but they cannot boast the pedigree or history of Manchester United or Liverpool in Europe's top club competition. They have only progressed beyond the Champions League group stage twice, reaching the quarter-finals in 2011.

Barcelona, who beat Spurs 4-2 at Wembley, have already made sure of winning their Champions League group for a record 12th successive season. Dauntingly for Spurs, Barca are unbeaten in 28 Champions League home matches and the Londoners will not be encouraged by the fact that the Spaniards have only lost two home matches in 33 against English opponents.

But Spurs themselves, with a vibrant collection of attacking players including Kane, Eriksen, Dele Alli and Son Heung-min, have won eight out of their past nine fixtures in all competitions and will be hoping that Ernesto Valverde's side take their foot off the gas.

Beating the Catalan club would be particularly sweet for Pochettino, a former player and coach at Barcelona's city rivals Espanyol. The Argentine earned his first win as a manager in a derby at the Camp Nou

"Espanyol were bottom and Barcelona were top," he recalled. "All the people were saying Espanyol were dead and had no chance. It was a special victory and an unbelievable memory." —AFP

Retiring an option point in Amsterdam to win Group E. as Robben confirms imminent Bayern exit

BERLIN: Arjen Robben says he may retire in June after confirming he will quit Bayern Munich when his contract with the defending Bundesliga champions expires. Robben, who turns 35 in January, confirmed in yesterday's edition of magazine Kicker that he will quit the Bavarian giants at the end of the season: "that's a fact".

"Of course it's a big step, which you don't just make in one day. "I thought about it a lot and it feels good that it's now out, also for the fans and the club. "It was the right point in time." Having missed the last two games with a thigh injury, Robben could make his return when Bayern face Ajax away in the Champions League tomorrow. Both teams are through to the last 16 and Bayern need only a

Robben also missed Saturday's 3-0 league win at home to Nuremberg which left Bayern third in the table and nine points behind Bundesliga leaders Borussia Dortmund. Bayern's senior bosses are planning a squad clear-out for next season and Robben says now is the right time to go, despite two stunning goals in the 5-1 thrashing of Benfica a fortnight ago. "The game against Benfica was a nice confirmation that I can play at the highest level," he added. "On the other side, the club wants to change the face of the team and I want to prepare my future.

"I am simply happy and grateful that there is clarity for both parties." However, Robben says he currently has no plans past the end of the season. "That's not entirely clear, perhaps I will stop playing - it's about waiting and seeing what possibilities there are," he said.

"If offers come in, I'll really consider them 100 percent and if it's something nice, I'll play on, but if no ideal offers come, then that could be it. "I have three children and they also must be happy, so it's not just about offers from China or places in the desert.—AFP

LIVERPOOL: Liverpool must again rely on fortress Anfield to inflict Napoli's first Champions League defeat of the season if they are to avoid the disappointment of a group stage exit just over six months since appearing in ast season's final.

The five-time European champions will most likely even have to win by two goals if they concede due to Napoli's 1-0 triumph when the sides last met in September. Yet, such a scenario is nothing new for Liverpool and even rekindles fond memories of similar permutations when they hosted Olympiakos in the final Champions League group game of the 2004/05 season.

Brazilian legend Rivaldo's early free-kick left the hosts needing three goals, which they got in dramatic fashion in the second half as Steven Gerrard's spectacular strike sealed a famous 3-1 win four minutes from time.

Inspired by Gerrard, the Reds went on to win their last Champions League title that season with a far inferior squad to the one that is off to a club record unbeaten start and top of the Premier League after 16 games.

Overcome the huge challenge facing them in midweek and Liverpool will again be among the favourites to lift the Champions League in Madrid next June. However, in stark contrast to their consistency in the Premier League, Jurgen Klopp's men have lost three of their five European encounters in Group C to put their chances of reaching the last 16 in serious peril.

There is some comfort for Klopp that all three defeats came on the road to Napoli, Red Star Belgrade and Paris Saint-Germain, while Liverpool haven't lost in 18 European games at Anfield. The German coach also isn't as reliant on an individual figure for inspiration as Rafael Benitez's vintage 14 years ago were on Gerrard.—AFP

River Plate win Copa Libertadores

River prevailed 5-3 on aggregate after first leg finished 2-2

MADRID: River Plate won the Copa Libertadores by beating their fiercest rivals Boca Juniors 3-1 after extra time on Sunday, bringing an end to a final tainted by violence and moved more than six thousand miles away from Argentina.

Boca took the lead through Dario Benedetto but Lucas Pratto equalised before Juan Quintero and Gonzalo Martinez scored in extra time, aided by Wilmar Barrios being sent off, to win a fittingly dramatic contest for River.

It means River prevailed 5-3 on aggregate after the first leg finished 2-2 and reclaim the trophy they had last won in 2015, lifting it for the fourth time in their history. "We have shown we are superior," River's Leonardo Ponzio said. "After trying to stay quiet about everything that happened, we showed on the pitch we were better."

"The only thing I feel is sadness for not winning the cup and giving it to the people of Boca," Boca coach Guillermo Barros Schelotto said. Postponed on three occasions and then relocated from Buenos Aires to Madrid, the supporters of these two great clubs showed in the Santiago Bernabeu why this fixture had

been billed as one of football's greatest ever.

Lionel Messi, Antoine Griezmann and Diego Godin were among the 62,200 in attendance. But, despite the bouncing huddles in the streets, the plumes of blue and red smoke, the swinging scarves, fluttering flags and fans that were chanting in their seats three hours before kick-off, there was nothing to extinguish the lingering sense of regret.

There was no repeat of the scenes that cast a shadow over Argentinian football and saw the original game at River's El Monumental on November 24 postponed, when around 50 fans attacked Boca's team bus and left some of their players injured.

Madrid, which will also host the Champions League final in June, was chosen in part because of its record of hosting major events and the security, which included around 2,500 police officers, did its job before kick-off

Fans were separated into zones either side of the stadium and had to go through checks even to enter the area immediately surrounding it. The shame was only that the operation was not as thorough 15 days ago and that a minority decided to take advantage.

Both clubs were allocated 25,000 tickets, with 5,000 of those reserved for residents of Argentina. The fear had been most of those buying would be tourists and neutrals, but the atmosphere suggested different.

Both teams had initially refused to play in Spain's capital but as the losers, Boca's sense of grievance will now become more entrenched. They felt River were responsible for the chaos two weeks ago and should have forfeited the trophy. They took their case to the Court of Arbitration for Sport, but the appeal was rejected on Saturday.

When the players shuffled out two hours before kick-off to inspect the pitch, they held up their phones to capture the thousands already inside and the view of a stadium most of them had never played in before.

The cheers grew louder when they came out for kick-off. Then there were whistles as the teams swapped ends and each were greeted by their opponent's fans behind the goal. Jonatan Maidana was playing for Boca when they last won the Copa Libertadores 11 years ago and, now in the red and white of River, he almost gave his former club an early lead, slicing just over his own crossbar.

The game lacked quality but came alive one minute before half-time. Nahitan Nandez's superb pass split two River defenders and Benedetto kept a cool head, guiding into the corner, before taunting the beaten Gonzalo Montiel. River had been inferior but improved. Their first real attacking move was also a brilliant one as Leonardo Ponzio and Quintero exchanged passes before the latter pulled back for Pratto to sweep home.

The game meandered towards full-time and seemed destined for penalties until Barrios was shown a second yellow card for a tackle on Exequiel Palacios and soon after, Quintero struck.

It was a goal worthy of winning the tournament, as he collected 25 yards out, glanced up and whipped the ball in off the underside of the crossbar. Leonard Jara almost snatched a late Boca goal but his shot nicked the outside of the post. Then, with Boca's goalkeeper Esteban Andrada up for a corner, River added the final

'Try something new, come to Italy,' Ronaldo urges Messi

MILAN: Cristiano Ronaldo has urged long-time rival Lionel Messi to be more like him and push his limits by challenging himself in another league than Spain. "I'd like him to come to Italy one day. I hope he accepts the challenge like me, but if he's happy there then I respect that," Ronaldo told the Italian press vesterday.

The two strikers have been rivals for the past decade winning five Ballon d'Or trophies each before their domination was broken by World Cup runner-up Luka Modric last week. Asked if he missed the 31-year-old Argentinian, who has spent his entire senior career at Barcelona, Ronaldo replied: "No, maybe it's him who misses me ...

"I've played in England, Spain, Italy, Portugal and

for my national team, while he's still in Spain. "Maybe he needs me more... For me, life is a challenge, I like it and I like to make people happy. "He's a fantastic player and a good guy, but I don't miss anything here. This is my new life and I'm happy.

"I left my comfort zone and took on this challenge here in Turin, everything has gone well, I've proven I'm still an incredible player," said Ronaldo. Ronaldo joined Juventus for 100 million euros (\$114 million) last summer as the Turin giants bid to lift the Champions League trophy after two runners-up finishes in the past four seasons.

To mark his 150 days in Italy he gave interviews yesterday to three leading sports dailies: La Gazzetta dello Sport, Corriere dello Sport and Tuttosport. "I had different options. I won't say which but I had them. Juventus is a solid club. It has a long history," he said of his decision.

"I knew the atmosphere in the stadium. I'd played several times in Italy. I like the city, the people and the club. I knew it could work. "I couldn't be 100 percent sure I was joining the best club in the world. After nine years at Real Madrid it was difficult to compare. "Now I'm 100 percent sure it was the right option."

Ronaldo has scored 11 goals this season, bringing his career total to 584. Finishing second in Ballon d'Or voting to Modric, said Ronaldo, just motivates him even more. "Of course I'm disappointed, but life goes on and I will continue to work hard," said the 33-year-old.

"On the pitch I've done everything to win the Ballon d'Or, numbers do not lie, but I'm no less happy if I do not win, I have wonderful friends and a family, I play in one of the best clubs. "Congratulations to Modric, who has earned the award, but next year we will meet again and I will do everything to win the prize again. "Do you think I'm going home and crying?"

Juventus play Young Boys in their final Champions League group game in Switzerland tomorrow, having already booked their place in the knockout rounds. And Ronaldo is hoping his experience of winning the trophy five times can serve his new team.

"The Champions League cannot be an obsession, you have to think about it calmly," he warned. "Yes we all want it but we have to get there step by step. "Look at the game against Manchester United (2-1 defeat), if it had been a quarter-final we would have gone out. You need a little luck." — AFP
