Kuwait mulling plan to cut 1.5 million expats in 7 yrs

Thousands of job titles of expats with unendorsed or no degrees cancelled

KUWAIT: Kuwait could soon implement a roadmap to reduce the number of expatriates by at least 1.5 million over the next seven years in a plan that aims at achieving a demographic balance between Kuwaitis and expatriates, a leading newspaper reported yesterday. Citing informed sources, Al-Qabas said that the fatwa and legislative department, the government's legal body, has asked opinions from government agencies on the possibility of setting up a national committee for the organization and management of the demographic structure.

The committee, which was proposed by MPs, will enjoy extensive powers to propose and implement plans to make Kuwaitis 50 percent of the population, with expatriates not exceeding that number. The number of expatriates now is just over 3.244 million and Kuwaitis around 1.4 million, based on figures published by the Public Authority for Civil Information (PACI).

Based on current population growth rates for Kuwaitis, they are expected to reach 1.7 million after seven years, the target of the proposed plan. This would mean that the number of expatriates must be equal to Kuwaitis, or 1.7 million. If this equation is to materialize, the number of expats must be reduced by a mini-

mum of 1.5 million without even considering natural growth and any future recruitment.

The expected plan also envisions that the number of any foreign community must not exceed 25 percent of the Kuwaiti population. If this item is to be strictly implemented, at least 600,000 Indians and 300,000 Egyptians, the two communities that largely exceed the expected limit, must be among those who will be reduced. The proposal does not explain the mechanism for implementing the cuts and who will be included. It does not mention whether the 120,000 bedoons or stateless people will be considered expats. It does not also say if the cuts will involve 650,000 domestic helpers.

Based on previous Kuwaitis attempts, the proposed plan appears to be far-fetched and highly unrealistic, especially to be achieved in just seven years. According to the proposed plan, 10 percent of expatriate employees in the government must be replaced by Kuwaitis every year, in addition to five percent in the private sector, both seemingly unrealistic goals.

Meanwhile, government sources told Al-Rai newspaper the manpower authority has cancelled thousands of job titles of expats working in the private sector in leading positions because some of them were found to be not holding university degrees or their degrees

were neither endorsed by their own countries nor by Kuwait's foreign ministry.

The sources added that the manpower authority recently mandated the presence of the original degree officially endorsed by both the country of origin and Kuwait to renew expats' work permits, especially after the authority found that thousands do not actually hold university degrees or hold unendorsed or unattested certificates. The sources said a considerable number of expats refused to stay in Kuwait and preferred leaving after their job titles were changed, which will greatly help in adjusting Kuwait's demography by only keeping highly-qualified expats in the country without any exceptions.

The manpower authority is also planning to ban issuing permits to expats with university degrees entering Kuwait to work in the private sector unless they have a minimum of 'good' grades, according to informed government sources. Last month, a senior lawmaker said over 30 percent of expats living and working in the country are "not useful", and the government must start practical measures to reduce the number of foreigners. MP Mohammad Al-Dallal told reporters that the large number of expatriates put major pressure on essential services and infrastructure like health, traffic and others.

KUWAIT: The interior ministry's relations and security media department said two children were killed when a vehicle driven by their mother flipped over along Fahaheel Expressway. According to initial reports, on arriving at the scene, paramedics found one child had died and the mother and three other children were in critical condition. The injured were rushed to Adan Hospital, where another child passed away. — Hanan Al-Saadoun



Fake cop escapes after fight

KUWAIT: An Asian told police he was mugged by a person claiming to be a policeman, who stopped him and asked for his ID, then searched the vehicle and robbed him. The victim said as passersby attempted to catch the suspect, he stabbed him in his right hand with a sharp object, but he was able to grab him and get his money back. The suspect then tried to carjack a vehicle driven by a man with a child on board and threatened him with the knife, but the driver refused to budge. The suspect still managed to escape. The interior ministry said a video of the incident that went viral showed attempts by some expats to avert a crime, save the child and prevent the suspect from escaping. — By Hanan Al-Saadoun

Kuwait, China sign Silk City, 5 islands MoU

KUWAIT: Kuwait and China signed a memorandum of understanding yesterday on forming a mechanism for the development of Silk City and five Kuwaiti islands. The signing ceremony was held at the National Development and Reform Commission's headquarters in Beijing, Kuwait's Ambassador to China Samih Hayat told KUNA. Head of the apparatus for developing the planned Silk City and Boubyan Island Faisal Al-Medlej signed the deal from the Kuwaiti side, while NDRC's Vice Chairman Ning Jizhe signed for the Chinese side, added Hayat.

Prior to the signing, the two sides stressed the importance of boosting

their economies through China's 2013 "Belt and Road" initiative and revival of the historic Silk Road, he said. Kuwait's participation in the Silk Road project reflects HH the Amir Sheikh Sabah Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah's strategic "New Kuwait 2030" vision, which aims to transform the country into a financial, commercial and cultural hub at regional and international levels, Hayat said.

Reviving the Silk Road project will restore Kuwait's commercial and economic role in the region, especially since the country enjoys a distinctive geographic location, and also contribute to the prosperity of the global economy, added the Kuwaiti diplomat. There is mutual and substantial consensus between the "New Kuwait 2030" vision and the "Belt and Road" initiative to revive the Silk Road and establish commercial, vital and safe zones to serve countries across the land and sea routes, be said

Discovered in 2015 by Italian energy giant Eni, Zohr is the biggest gas field so far found in Egyptian waters. The immediate upshot has been that since September, the Arab world's most populous country has been able to halt imports of liquefied natural gas, which last year cost it some \$220 million per month. Coming after a financial crisis that pushed Cairo in 2016 to take a \$12 billion loan from the International Monetary Fund, the gas has been a lifeline. Egypt's budget deficit, which hit 10.9 percent of GDP in the financial year 2016-17, has since fallen to 9.8 percent. Gas production has now hit 184 million cu m a day.



Rainfall damage

uwait has been blessed with a lot of rainfall this year (yes, it is a blessing in its own way). I know that although the rain brings a lot of good with it, it can also be a cause of destruction for many. Some families have been left with damaged houses, vehicles and other valuable possessions. Today I am answering legal questions regarding the rainfall.

Suing the government

Questions: Do I have the right to sue the government for damages to my possessions?

Fajer: Many readers have been asking this question, and to be honest, I found this question weird at first. Rain is an act of God, yet there have been discussions on suing the government for the damages because of the poor infrastructure in certain areas. This depends on a few things.

If your house is damaged because of the poor infrastructure or the roads or an error from the government, for example, no sewage facilities, then you could possibly sue for damages. If the house is damaged because of poor construction by the contractor, ie not to the specifications requested, then you can claim for damages and compensation from the contractor.

With the above said, before bringing a claim to court, you will first need prove that your house was actually damaged - this cannot be just with photos. You will need to go to a police station and ask them to come and see the damage and 'file' it - this will assist you in filing your case in court. The same applies to damaged cars.

B2B agreement

Question: I own a business and signed a B2B agreement with another business. I am supplying products to the business, but I could not do so last week because of the rainfall. The business is asking for compensation because of the loss they suffered on the day that I could not supply them with goods. Do they have the legal right to do so?

Fajer: Under law, natural disasters or impediments are referred to as force majeure, or may be referred to acts of God. In other words, they are events that are unforeseen and cannot be controlled, and therefore obligations under a contract are exempted. Heavy rainfall can be seen as force majeure.

I hope everyone stays safe and that everyone understands that the government is doing everything it can, including the police force and other governmental entities to ensure everyone's safety.

Educator wins patent for reducing persistent fever

Ministry teams have been inspecting shops and warehouses in Industrial Shuwaikh and succeeded in discovering the fake labels, it added. It urged people to call 135 if they believed the product they bought was fake, stressing the importance of keeping the invoice. — KUNA

'Sad' Trump visits fire-wracked California

76 killed; more than 1,200 listed as missing

PARADISE: President Donald Trump has expressed sadness at the devastation caused by fires in a California town, but persisted in his controversial claim that forest mismanagement was responsible for the tragedy, which has killed 76 and left more than 1,200 listed as missing. "This is very sad," Trump said after surveying the remains of Paradise, where nearly the only people out on the road were emergency services workers, surrounded by the twisted remains of a community incinerated by the flames.

"They're telling me this is not as bad as some areas; some areas are even beyond this, they're just charred," he added after looking at a street lined with melted cars, tree stumps and the foundations of wrecked houses. The deadliest and most destructive wildfire in California's history, the so-called Camp Fire, has now claimed 76 lives after authorities on Saturday confirmed five more victims. The blaze has devoured an area roughly the size of Chicago, destroying nearly 10,000 homes and more than 2,500 other buildings. In Chico, near Paradise, Trump met with firefighters and other first responders at a makeshift headquarters.

Senior fire officials recounted how quickly the blaze spread, complicating evacuation efforts, as Trump studied

a huge map spread across a table showing where fires continue to burn. Reviving an earlier controversy, Trump repeated his claim that California had mismanaged its forests and was largely to blame for the fires. "I'm committed to make sure that we get all of this cleaned out and protected, (we've) got to take care of the forest, it's very important," Trump said in Paradise. Days ago Trump threatened to cut federal funding to California over its alleged "gross mismanagement" of forests.

Fire haze

Brian Rice, president of California Professional Firefighters, called Trump's earlier remarks "ill-informed", noting the federal government had cut spending on forest management. Asked if he believed climate change had played any role in the fires, Trump again pointed to the forest "management factor" and insisted that his "strong opinion" remained unchanged. Trump has long been skeptical of man's role in global warming despite mounting scientific evidence that the burning of fossil fuels is heating the planet and leading to more extreme weather. The inferno erupted November 8, laying waste to Paradise in the northern foothills of the Sierra Nevada mountains and

sending thousands fleeing. The Camp Fire and another huge blaze have created a serious smoke problem across vast areas of the country's largest state. When Trump stepped out of Air Force One at Beale Air Force Base north of capital city Sacramento, the sun struggled to cut through haze so dense it covered the base like a fog. More than 1,200 people were listed as missing from the Camp Fire, according to a list issued Saturday by the Butte County Sheriff. Sheriff Kory Honea has said there could be duplicate names and some people who had escaped could be unaware they were listed as unaccounted for. More than 300 people recorded as missing have already been found. The Republican president was accompanied on his visit by son-in-law Jared Kushner and chief of staff John Kelly.

Living in tents

They were met on the tarmac by Governor Jerry Brown and Governor-elect Gavin Newsom, both of them Democrats in a state that leans strongly that way. As they drove through the state, several signs thanked Trump for coming but one called him a "moron". Roslyn Roberts, 73, who fled from her home in Paradise, said she voted for Trump but disagreed with his views about forest manage-

ment. "I would tell him that this fire has nothing to do with forest mismanagement.

Thousands and thousands of homes got destroyed with no trees around," she said at a shelter set up by the American Red Cross in a church. In Chico, volunteers had erected a tented encampment for evacuees. The Camp Fire has burned 149,000 acres (60,000 hectares) and was 55-percent contained late Saturday, California's fire service said. Authorities said 47,200 people had been evacuated because of the fire and nearly 1,200 were living in shelters.

Much of the work is now focused on Paradise, where many retirees were unable to get out in time. Rescuers with sniffer dogs have been conducting house-to-house searches. Three other people have died in southern California in a blaze dubbed the Woolsey Fire, which engulfed parts of Malibu and destroyed the homes of several celebrities. That inferno, about two thirds the size of the Camp Fire, was 84 percent contained Saturday as Trump surveyed the damage at well-to-do homes there. California's tragedy touched the heart of Pope Francis in Rome, where on Sunday he sent out "a special prayer... to those affected by the fires that are ravaging California." — AFP

Cyclone death toll hits 33 in southeast India

NEW DELHI: The death toll from a cyclone that battered India's eastern coast has reached 33, a disaster official said yesterday, as authorities assessed the damage caused by the powerful storm. Cyclone Gaja, which packed winds of up to 120 kilometers (75 miles) per hour, had barreled into Tamil Nadu state after hitting the coast on Friday. Thousands of trees were felled by winds that destroyed homes and hundreds of thousands were forced to flee to shelters.

"So far 20 men, 11 women, and two children have died due to the cyclone," said an official with the state disaster management authority, who asked not to be named as he was not authorized to speak to media. "As of now 177,500 people are housed in over 351 camps. Thousands of trees have been uprooted and livestock has also been badly affected," he said. Chief Minister Edappadi Palaniswami, who has announced compensation of \$14,000 each to the families of victims, said most deaths were caused by flooding, house collapses and electrocution.

Hundreds of emergency workers have been pressed into service to restore roads and power cables, as the full scale of the disaster becomes clear. A Navy helicopter and



two ships have joined relief efforts in the state, the local government said. India's weather department said the cyclonic depression had moved westwards Saturday into the neighboring Kerala state before continuing into the Arabian Sea.

Gaja is the second major storm to hit

India's east coast in recent weeks. Cyclone Titli battered Odisha state in October, killing at least two people. Storms regularly hit southern India between April and December. Last year, Cyclone Ockhi left nearly 250 people dead in Tamil Nadu and Kerala states. — AFP

India's elephant hospital cheers animal activists, draws tourists

MATHURA: At India's first hospital for elephants, opened last week in the northern state of Uttar Pradesh, 49-year old Asha placed her left foreleg on a stool for a doctor to attend to an injury while visitors filmed it all on their mobile phones. The facility, armed with facilities such as wireless digital X-Ray, thermal imaging, ultrasonography, tranquilization devices and quarantine facilities, has not only come as a respite to the elephants but is also attracting local and foreign tourists.

Elephants are an important part of India's culture and are prominently displayed in festivals and processions in the south of the country. They are also used as tourist attractions at several forts and palaces in the northern and western regions. The hospital, inaugurated on Friday in the Hindu holy town of Mathura, is spread over 12,000 square feet and is designed to treat injured, sick or geriatric elephants. "I think by building a hospital we are underlining the fact that ele-

phants need welfare measures as much as any other animal," Geeta Seshamani, co-founder of Wildlife SOS, the non-profit behind the hospital, told Reuters TV.

"That captive elephants are not meant to be used and abused but instead have to be given the respect which an animal needs if you are going to be using the animal." While elephants are revered as a cultural and religious symbol in India, they are also ill-treated by their unschooled mahouts and often fall victim to electrocution, poaching, train accidents and poisoning, animal rights activists say. India's elephant population fell to 27,312 in 2017 from 29,391-30,711 in 2012, government data shows.

Hundreds of elephants across India, which accounts for more than half of Asia's elephant population, are held in captivity and sharp metal hooks are often used to pinch and tease them into subordination. The hospital, on the banks of the Yamuna River, is close to an elephant conservation and care centre run by Wildlife SOS that is home to 22 elephants. Elizabeth Ritson, a tourist from Australia, said she was glad there was now a dedicated hospital for elephants in India. "Look at them, they are so much happier and when you see the abuse that they have been through, the horrible shackles that were put on their feet and to see them all healed up, it's just really nice," she said. — Reuters

SYDNEY: A swimmer died after a rare suspected their barbs, at the end of their tails, are coated in toxstingray attack off an Australian beach while another two people were mauled in separate shark encounters this weekend. The 42-year-old's death came more than a decade after world-renowned "Crocodile Hunter" Steve Irwin was killed when a stingray barb punctured his chest while he was filming on the famed Great Barrier Reef. The man was in waters off Lauderdale Beach some 23 kilometers (14 miles) from Hobart in the southern island state of Tasmania Saturday when he "sustained a puncture wound to his lower abdomen... possibly inflicted by a marine animal", police said.

He was brought onto the beach by friends but suffered a heart attack and was unable to be resuscitated, police added. "It's consistent with (a stingray injury) but further investigation and examination of the deceased may be able to give a bit more of a concrete fact on that," Tasmania Police Senior Constable Brett Bowering told the Sunday Tasmanian. "It's a pretty traumatic incident to see." Commonly found in tropical waters, stingrays rarely attack humans but

ic venom which they use to defend themselves when threatened.

Two attacks

In the first shark attack of the weekend, a man taking part in a surf lesson off the east coast suffered serious cuts after an encounter on Saturday. The 24-year-old was wading waist-deep in waters off Seven Mile Beach some 130 kilometers (81 miles) south of Sydney when he "felt a forceful lashing motion against his legs", South Ambulance said.

He had "significant cuts and haemorrhage as well as several puncture wounds to his wetsuit and right leg... and cuts to his hand", NSW Ambulance duty opera-

tions manager Inspector Jordan Emery told reporters

The beach was closed and authorities sought to identify the shark species involved. That attack was

followed by another on Sunday off the north coast, when a teenage boy was bitten on his arm and leg while spearfishing, police said. The 17-year-old was spearfishing from a vessel off the coast of Arnhem Land in the Northern Territory when he sustained "significant injuries" to his arm, St John Ambulance told national broadcaster ABC.

"Obviously there's quite a

large amount of bleeding that's occurred," St John Ambulance's Craig Garraway said. He said shark encounters in the NT were unusual, adding: "I've been around a long time and I'll be honest, I can't remember

a shark attack." The two attacks are the sixth and seventh off Australian beaches in two months, amid public debate about how to reduce the risk of encounters between sharks and the growing number of people using the ocean for leisure. Australia has one of the world's highest incidences of shark attacks, but fatalities remain rare.

There have been 13 "unprovoked" shark attacks off the vast continent's coast this year, including one death after a swimmer was mauled by a shark in the Whitsunday Islands in early November, according to data from Sydney's Taronga Zoo. There were 15 attacks-one fatal-last year, and 17 encounters and two deaths in 2016, the data showed. New South Wales hosted an international conference with marine experts in 2015 after a sharp increase in attacks across Australia that year to 22, including the death of a Japanese surfer after his legs were torn off by a shark. The state, Australia's most populous, has trialled non-lethal measures such as aerial drones to track shark movements and "smart" drum lines that alert authorities to their presence.—AFP

Coalition hits back over civilian deaths in east Syria

BEIRUT: The US-led anti-jihadist coalition hit back yesterday at reports its air strikes on an Islamic State group holdout in eastern Syria had killed civilians, appearing to blame their deaths on regime forces. The jihadist IS group overran large swathes of Syria and neighboring Iraq in 2014, declaring a "caliphate" in territory it controlled, but has since lost most of it to various offensives.

In war-torn Syria, multiple offensives have now whittled down territory IS once controlled to a small pocket in the eastern province of Deir Ezzor on the Iraqi border. A Kurdish-led alliance backed by the coalition is battling to expel IS from that holdout on the eastern bank of the Euphrates, while Russianbacked regime forces have been fighting the jihadists west of the river. The Syrian Observatory for Human Rights monitor said coalition strikes on Saturday killed 43 people, including 36 family members of IS fighters in the village of Abu Al-Husn in the jihadist pocket.

But the coalition denied that its air raids there had killed any non-combatants. The US envoy for the coalition, Brett McGurk, on Sunday appeared to blame

The Observatory said regime forces and IS fighters exchanged fire across the river on Saturday, but pro-government shelling did not hit Abu al-Husn.

The Britain-based war monitor says it obtains its information from sources inside Syria, and determines who carries out air strikes according to type, location, flight patterns and munitions involved. The US-led international coalition has consistently denied reports by the Observatory in recent weeks that its air raids have killed civilians. It says it takes allegations of civilian casualties seriously and investigates each one thoroughly. Syria's war has killed more than 360,000 people since it started in 2011

The ICC said Yekatom would be tried for "alleged war crimes and crimes against humanity" carried out by so-called anti-balaka militias. The court launched an investigation in September 2014 into crimes committed in the country since 2012. A threejudge bench of the Hague-based court's pre-trial chamber issued an arrest warrant against Yekatom last Sunday. "The Chamber is satisfied that the overall supporting evidence is sufficient to establish reasonable grounds that Yekatom bears criminal responsibility," the judges said in the warrant, made public by the ICC late on Saturday.

This included acts of murder, torture, deportation and using child soldiers younger than 15 years in the antibalaka group between December 5, 2013 and August 2014. In continuing violence however, a Tanzanian peacekeeper died late Friday after an attack on a UN base and a priest was found burned to death, the UN and Catholic Church said after sectarian clashes that claimed nearly 40 lives. The soldier died of injuries sustained in the raid on the base in Gbambia in the country's west, the UN mission MINUSCA said.

Revenge attacks

An armed group called Siriri, created this year by Fulani cattle herders, operates in the area. Led by a man named

with the brutal repression of anti-government protests.

Since 2014, the US-led coalition has acknowledged direct responsibility for over 1,100 civilian deaths in Syria and Iraq, but rights groups put the number much higher. The Kurdish-led Syrian Democratic Forces, who are backed by to seize the eastern pocket of Hajin from IS in September. The SDF assault was slowed by a fierce jihadist fightback, and then briefly put on hold to protest Turkish shelling of Kurdish militia positions in northern Syria. An SDF commander on Saturday said his forces were

The withdrawal likely came "under a deal with the regime forces" after weeks of encirclement and air raids, he said. —AFP

It has witnessed chronic fighting in recent months that has also killed other UN soldiers and a humanitarian aid worker. —AFP

Panama inmates build confession boxes for papal visit

PACORA: Amid swirling sawdust and the smell of fresh paint, the inmates of a grim Panamanian prison are diligently preparing for the upcoming visit of Pope Francis, hoping for forgiveness and praying for freedom. The sound of nails being deftly hammered into wood mingles with music in the makeshift workshop of the overcrowded La Joya prison, northeast of Panama City. Around 30 inmates are busy making confession boxes that will be used by pilgrims to confess their sins to priests during the pope's January 22-27 visit to mark the Catholic World Youth Day festival. A painting on one of the walls at the entrance to La Joya seems oddly prophetic: "God impacts your life, let yourself be led to him." Inmates like Felix Salinas hold out hope that a papal visit will impact their lives in some concrete way.

"I would ask him to give me a chance. A pardon at least. Because that is what we all want here," said Salinas, a 50-year-old driver locked up here since 2015. Justino Hernandez, 62 and a devout Catholic, is particularly looking forward to the papal visit, the first to the Central American country since the late John Paul II made the trip in 1983. "The most important thing is to tell him that we are all entitled to a second chance and to freedom, that he gives us the chance to get out of this place," he said. Hernandez is prepared to ask the pope's forgiveness "as many times as he wants."

The pope's agenda has yet to be finalized, and though he has visited prisons before, there has been no suggestion that he will visit the inmates of La Joya. The 9,700 inmates packed into La Joya is double the prison's capacity. Conditions here have been condemned by human rights organizations. From 8:00 am to 4:00 pm, the prisoners cut out traced designs from wood panels, assemble crosses and then sand, paint and upholster the confessionals, under an instructor's watchful eye. It's unpaid work, but most detainees hope their reward will come from Francis noticing their handiwork, or at least being told about it, and then pardon them-failing that, a papal blessing.

Surpassing expectations

The brightly painted confessional booths will be set up in a so-called "Park of Forgiveness," an area of the capital's Omar Park that will be dedicated to WYD activities. Most of the detainees have never done this kind of work before but it has been such a success that the prison has received orders to make 70 information kiosks and to prepare food bags for pilgrims.

Sharon Diaz, deputy head of the Penitentiary system, told AFP that the project-rewarded by a day's deduction from inmates' sentences for every two days worked-has surpassed expectations. "They have taken on this task not only in a personal way but in a spiritual way too, and the surprising thing about this initiative is that these are people deprived of freedom who don't profess the Catholic faith, and yet have still been enthusiastic," said Diaz. The project's supervisor Luis Vega said "there are no complications with them. They are very cooperative." —AFP

N Korean new 'tactical' weapon test highlights military modernization

SEOUL: North Korea's claim last week that it had tested an unidentified "ultramodern tactical weapon" highlighted its desire to upgrade its conventional arms and reassure its military even as talks are under way to end its nuclear program, analysts said. North Korean leader Kim Jong Un witnessed the test of a newly developed tactical weapon that could serve as a "steel wall", state media reported on Friday, without giving more crucial if the country were to abandon at

details of the weapon.

It was Kim's first observation of a weapons test this year and could complicate already stalled nuclear talks with the United States, although Washington and Seoul downplayed the development in an apparent effort not to derail negotiations. Experts say the test was part of Kim's initiative to shift the mainstay of the conventional military power from a nearly 1.3 million-strong army to high-tech weapons.

This is sort of like the North Korean version of military reform," said Choi Kang, vice president of the Asan Institute for Policy Studies in Seoul. "If we have to find an underlying message to the outside world, it's 'Don't underestimate us, we are modernizing too." New advanced weapons might be even

least some of its nuclear arsenal. Although heavilysanctioned Pyongyang is easily outspent in defense funding by Seoul and Washington, the North's forward-deployed troops, guns and multiple-launch artillery rocket systems (MLRS) pose a significant threat to the allies.

The North Korean military has nearly 5,500 MLRS, 4,300 tanks, 2,500 armored vehicles, 810 fighter jets, 430 combatant vessels and 70 submarines, according to a 2016 assessment by the South's defense ministry. The Centre for Strategic and International Studies said last week it has identified at least 13 undeclared missile bases inside North Korea. The Washington-based think tank has also said Pyongyang has been developing hovercraft units for its 200,000-strong special forces as part of the military modernization drive. —AFP

Macron and Merkel meet amid WWI centenary debate on Europe's army

France, Germany present a united front in countering global turmoil

BERLIN: The leaders of France and Germany meet in Berlin yesterday to jointly remember the victims of European wars, presenting also a united front in countering global turmoil stoked by the mercurial US President Donald Trump. President Emmanuel Macron will visit France's former enemy turned key EU partner from 1000 GMT for a wreath-laying ceremony on its Day of Mourning for victims of war and tyranny, a parliamentary address and talks with Chancellor Angela Merkel.

Macron and Merkel are both committed pro-Europeans and internationalists who have resisted rising populist, eurosceptic and anti-immigration forces in Europe and Trump's isolationist 'America First' stance. During their second meeting in a week, the

pair will likely delve deeper into the idea of a future European army, a proposal that has raised Trump's hackles. As the world has remembered World War I, which ended a century ago this month, Macron has repeatedly invoked its horrors to drive home his message that rising nationalism around the globe is again destabilizing

He has suggested building a future European army as a symbol of a united continent. The proposal has been backed by Merkel although Dutch Prime Minister Mark Rutte on Friday said France and Germany were jumping the gun, asserting that the continent's safety could be guaranteed only through NATO. Tomorrow the US leader mocked both European powers by tweeting that "it was Germany in World Wars One & Two - How did that work out for France?" and adding that "they were starting to learn German in Paris before the US came along".

Weakened leaders

A week after world leaders attended the Armistice centenary events in Paris, Merkel and Macron are also due to meet again one-on-one to resume their dialogue on ways to boost the EU. Since their joint cabinet meeting on Europe in June, challenges have piled up, with Brexit nearing and a budget conflict escalating between Brussels and Italy. The talks also come at a time when both leaders are politically weakened, reducing the traditional driving power of the Franco-German engine at the heart of the bloc. As Trump gleefully tweeted days ago, Macron's once stellar approval ratings have dropped off into the mid-twenties.

And Merkel, after 13 years in power, has in recent weeks announced the beginning of the end of her reign,

by declining to stand again as leader of her centre-right Christian Democrats (CDU). She has vowed to serve out her fourth term, which runs until 2021, but many observers expect Merkel could be brought down earlier by infighting within her CDU or the unhappy three-party coalition she leads. All this has made substantial reform initiatives by the Franco-German

power couple even less likely. There is already much frustration in Paris about Merkel's perceived foot-dragging on Macron's bold reform plans, especially forging a euro-zone with a major common budget and finance

Tricky questions

The joint army plan too faces tricky questions, among them post-war Germany's traditional reluctance to send combat troops abroad, and the fact that it is the parliament that must approve military missions. The



next major political test for both Macron and Merkel will be European Parliamentary elections in May, when their centrist parties will do battle with populist and far-right forces. Macron's trip to Berlin first sees him join President Frank-Walter Steinmeier at 11:00 am at the "Youth for Peace" event where youngsters will present "100 ideas for peace".

From 1130 GMT Macron, Steinmeier and Merkel will attend the ceremony at the Neue Wache, a neoclassical former Prussian military guardhouse that serves as Germany's Central Memorial for the Victims of War and Dictatorship. At 1230 GMT Macron delivers a speech in the glass-domed parliamentary chamber of the Bundestag, housed in the historic Reichstag building that still bears the scars of World War II. When Macron again meets Merkel at the chancellery at 1410 GMT, they will deliver statements to the media but not give a joint press conference.—AFP

Floods, landslides kills 12

HANOI: Flash floods and landslides killed at least 12 people in central Vietnam, officials said yesterday, as hundreds of troops were dispatched to clean up destroyed villages and washed out roads. Heavy rains pounded the central Khanh Hoa province over the past few days as tropical depression Toraji blew in from the South China Sea, triggering landslides that wiped out houses and destroyed a small reservoir. At least a dozen people have been killed so far while a search was ongoing for several others, an official from the provincial disaster office told AFP, refusing to be named. "We have mobilized hundreds of army troops to help people restore lives and clean up damaged roads," he said. The main highway linking north and south Vietnam was temporarily blocked and some railway routes were interrupted, while images on state media showed destroyed houses buried under debris and vehicles submerged in floods.—AFP

Bomb kills 3 in Pakistan

QUETTA: A bomb blast yesterday killed three paramilitary soldiers and wounded four others in Pakistan's troubled southwest, officials said. The incident happened in Margat area on the outskirts of Quetta, the capital of oil and gas-rich Balochistan province. "An improvised explosive device planted along the road went off as a vehicle of Frontier Corps (FC) passed by, killing three soldiers and wounding four others," an FC spokesman told AFP on condition of anonymity. Balochistan is regularly hit by homegrown militancy and sectarian violence. Violence in Pakistan has however dropped significantly since the country's deadliest-ever militant attack, an assault on a school in the northwestern city of Peshawar in 2014 that killed more than 150 people, most of them children. —AFP

WWII-era plane crashes

WASHINGTON: A World War II-era fighter plane crashed on Saturday into a Texas parking lot, killing a veteran and one other person, local media and officials said. The US National Transportation Safety Board said it was investigating the crash of "a North American P-51D" in the city of Fredericksburg. The P-51 Mustang served in the Pacific and other theaters of World War II, as well as during the Korean War. Fredericksburg is home to the National Museum of the Pacific War, which said on Twitter that there were two victims, one of whom was a veteran. "At this time we have no further information," the museum tweeted. According to the museum website, an outdoor show about the "equipment and weapons" used in the Pacific theater, including a battle re-enactment, was to take place Saturday. Attempts to reach the museum for further comment were not immediately successful. —AFP

'World Day of the Poor'

VATICAN CITY: Pope Francis railed against social inequality yesterday, lamenting "the din of the rich few" drowning out the voice of the needy, as he marked the second "World Day of the Poor". At a mass attended by about 6,000 poor people at St. Peter's Basilica in Rome, the pope noted that "injustice is the perverse root of poverty". "The cry of the poor daily becomes stronger but heard less, drowned out by the din of the rich few, who grow ever fewer and more rich," he said ahead of a lunch at the Vatican for 1,500 destitute people and their helpers. "Let us ask for the grace to hear the cry of all those tossed by the waves of life," the pope said. "It is the cry of all those forced to flee their homes and native land for an uncertain future. It is the cry of entire peoples, deprived even of the great natural resources at their disposal... while the wealthy few feast on what, in justice, belongs to all." —AFP

Migrants stalled at US border, mull work offers

MEXICALI: Hundreds of migrants from a caravan of Central Americans were stalled at the US-Mexico border on Saturday, where a handful said they welcomed recent Mexican offers of employment in the face of a hostile US reception. The Mexican government last week reiterated ob offers to the migrants, saying that those who obtained legal status could occupy thousands of vacancies, most of them in the country's "maquiladoras," doing factory work. Since arriving at the border last week, they have been denied entry through the gates linking Mexico to the United States.

Dozens of the mostly Hondurans waited in lines to bathe and washed clothes sullied from 2,600 miles of relentless travel. Several members of the caravan, which left the crime-wracked city of San Pedro Sula, Honduras, on Oct 13, told Reuters they would be willing to stay put in Mexico rather than face rejection across the border. "If we had work, we would stay. This has been very tiring," said Orbelina Orellana, a 26year-old Honduran mother of three,

waiting at the Alfa and Omega shelter in the city of Mexicali, which borders Calexico, California. "I cry a lot to not be able to feed them as I'd like," Orellana said of her children. "I just want an opportunity."

Briefly stalled by Mexican riot police on a highway crossing between two southern Mexican states late last month, a dozen migrants told Reuters they rejected such offers, preferring to try their luck in the United States. But on Saturday, some said that thinking had changed. "We had the idea to cross to the United States, but they told us it will be nearly impossible," said Mayra Gonzalez, 32, traveling with her two children. "We cannot starve as we wait to find out if they'll give us asylum. Better to work, by the grace of God, here in Mexico."

In a sharp reversal of longstanding US policy, President Donald Trump's administration last week began enforcing new rules that curtail asylum rights for anyone who arrives without documents at the US border. Trump earlier this month deployed almost 6,000 troops along the long US border with Mexico. As they wound north through Mexico, the migrants were helped along by local authorities and residents who offered food, clothing and even free rides on daily treks that averaged 30 miles a day,

MIAMI: Democrat Andrew Gillum announced Saturday he was conceding his hard-fought race for Florida governor to his Republican rival, Ron DeSantis, vowing to keep fighting until he wins an election. Gillum, who was aiming to become the state's first black chief executive, had vowed to keep in the race until every single vote was counted. The race had gone to a recount, with results due by a Sunday deadline, as has a narrow Senate race between outgoing governor Rick Scott and incumbent Democrat Bill Nelson. "I want to congratulate @RonDeSantisFL on becoming the next Governor of the great state of Florida," tweeted Gillum. "We are going to keep fighting. We will keep working. And in the end, I believe that we will win. I am so thankful to each and every one of you."

Florida produced some of the nation's

closest results in the November 6 midterm elections, including DeSantis's apparent narrow victory over Gillum. "I can tell you, this has been the journey of our lives," Gillum said in a video posted on Facebook alongside his wife, R Jai. For the Senate race, unofficial results show incumbent Nelson trailing Scott by about 12,600 votes out of more than 8.2 million cast, or 0.15 percentage points. That narrow margin triggered a hand recount of problematic ballots, such as those where a voter filled in bubbles next to the names of Nelson and Scott.

Results are scheduled to be certified tomorrow. Trump has repeatedly charged that Florida's elections were marred by vote fraud, but state and local authorities have said there is no evidence of wrongdoing. In the neighboring state of Georgia, Democrat Stacey Abrams, who was aiming to become the country's first ever black female governor, conceded to Republican Brian Kemp, Georgia's secretary of state. They only had about a single percentage point between them. She contemplated further legal action in the race, but her



legal burden would have proven extremely steep. In her concession speech on Friday, she cited hours-long lines at polling sta-

tions, thousands of voter registrations frozen before the election, and polling sites shuttered.—AFP

'We'll come back for you': US fires split families, pets

CHICO: Steve Cox pets and cuddles Ernie, his 10-year-old English bulldog, before leaving him at a shelter. Cox lost his home in California's devastating wildfires, and now they have to part. "Don't you worry Ernie. I am not gonna let you down. We'll come back for you," Cox whispers. He has been staying at a hotel but it doesn't take pets. For a week, Cox tried to take care of Ernie in the back of his pickup

truck. But now, as Cox tries to get his life back on track, he thinks Ernie would get better care at one of three animal shelters in northern California's Paradise area where the so-called Camp Fire has claimed 76 lives and left more than 1,000 unaccounted for. In this rural area, which had many horses, one shelter is for large animals. Then there are two small facilities where helpers are working with dogs, cats, chickens, rabbits, turtles and even swans.

Ernie is walking with a bit of trouble after an operation on an abscess in one of his front legs. Cox says the dog is lazy, though, so he thinks Ernie will adapt quickly to the separation by sleeping a lot. The main shelter was set up in the city of Chico's airport, near Paradise, where rescue and firefighting operations have been based. Animals saved by firefighters are dropped off there to be cared

for. One woman arrives desperate, her hands trembling. She pulls out an envelope of photos of her cats and dogs. "Please, let me in and see. I might find them," she begs in

When the fire began to threaten Paradise, Cox was headed home from the doctor with his wife. He could have stopped but instead kept going, to rescue $\mathop{\rm Ernie}\nolimits$ and two other smaller dogs he has. "They are family. I couldn't just leave them. We had 10 minutes to leave," he recalls. Cox, who lived there since 1973, said he lost two houses, and many pieces of furniture that his father had left him, in the blaze which virtually wiped the entire community from the map. "I have a big question mark above my head. I don't know what I'll do," he says, his face showing exhaustion.—AFP

'Moral panic' grips Indonesia's vulnerable LGBT community

Hardline rhetoric and a string of arrests spark fears

JAKARTA: Indonesian Budi Ahmad used to live openly as a gay man without fear of becoming a target for violence in the world's biggest Muslim-majority nation. Not any more. The country of 260 million is in the grip of a moral panic, with critics saying the vulnerable LGBT minority is being used as a political punching bag in the run-up to 2019 elections. Hardline rhetoric and a string of arrests have raised fears among the community. "There could be more persecution and we're scared that the public might become vigilantes," said Ahmad, who agreed to speak to AFP using a pseudonym. The 29-year-old, from a small town in the province of West Sumatra, said family and friends in the tight-knit area have long been aware of his sexual orientation.

But he said the public mood was turning increasingly ugly and he was now confronted with deepening hostility. "People look at me wherever I go these days. Some

avoid me," said Ahmad of his non-traditional masculine image. "Now when I go to withdraw money from the ATM, for example, there are people staring at me. It never used to be this bad." Indonesia's LGBT communitv has always been vilified as immoral. But the recent police crackdown - including authorities hosing down a group of transgender women

in what they called a "mandatory bath" - comes Indonesia's Executive Director. against the backdrop of a recent lurch toward religious conservatism.

The shift, led by increasingly powerful hardliners, has dented Indonesia's reputation for moderate Islam. Last week, thousands of anti-LGBT demonstrators marched outside the capital Jakarta, as some local politicians called for carte blanche to detain and "rehabilitate" members of the minority. Several mosques in West Java were recently urged by the local government to conduct sermons on the dangers of homosexuality. And Indonesia's biggest Muslim organization - the 80million-member Nahdlatul Ulama - has called for a clampdown on same-sex relations.

'Cynical political gain'

Concerns have been aggravated by president Joko Widodo selecting a conservative cleric, known for his disparaging views of the gay community and other minorities, as his running mate for next year's elections. A poll this year showed nearly 90 percent of Indonesians felt "threatened" by the LGBT community, while a 2013 Pew survey said 72 percent of Indonesian Muslims supported replacing the secular code with Islamic law, which bans gay sex. "(The elections) could mean an uptick in politicians scapegoating... people for cynical political gain," said Human Rights Watch researcher Kyle Knight.

"The verbal threats politicians issue can quickly metastasise into physical attacks." Police arrested at least 300 suspected LGBT people last year - a record - mostly under an anti-pornography law as homosexuality and

gay sex are legal in Indonesia. This month, 10 people described as "suspected lesbians" were arrested in West Sumatra, following the detention of another eight lesbians and transgender people in October. "This situation is alarming as the hateful abuses by law enforcement bodies... are seen as a normal practice by many people," said Usman Hamid, Amnesty International

Officials are unfazed by the criticism. "We're being consistent in our efforts to eradicate LGBT (behaviour) because it's very destructive," said West Sumatra deputy governor Nasrul Abit, adding that thousands of people were having "deviant sex" in the region. Parliament is considering a move to criminalize sex outside marriage including gay couples - while the health ministry previously announced plans to release a medical guide classifying homosexuality as a mental disorder. The UN human rights chief and Association of Southeast Asian Nations (ASEAN) have criticized the proposed legal overhaul.

Authorities have also taken aim at social media, arresting two men for links to a LGBT community Facebook page. Google in January pulled one of the world's largest gay dating apps from the Indonesian version of its online store in response to government demands.

'This is wrong'

The latest crackdown can be traced back to 2016 when Indonesia's higher education minister Mohamad Nasir called for LGBT student groups to be banned from universities, and the defense minister criticized gay and trans rights activism, Human Rights Watch said.

Since then, police have raided nightclubs, saunas, hair salons, hotels and even private homes in pursuit of LGBT people. Gay people have been publicly flogged in Aceh under the province's Islamic legal code. Local police there made global headlines when they arrested a dozen transgender people and publicly humiliated them by chopping off their long hair and forcing them to wear men's clothes. But there are few hopes that Widodo or other senior officials vying for re-election will protect a widely hated minority, said HRW researcher Andreas Harsono. "We need leaders who have the courage to say this is wrong." —AFP

Three killed in blast in India's Punjab state

AMRITSAR: Three people were killed in a grenade attack on a prayer congregation in India's Punjab yesterday which left some 20 others injured, police said. Around 250 followers of the Nirankari spiritual group, who are considered heretics by most Sikhs, had gathered for morning prayers in Amritsar district when two men arrived and threw the explosive at

"Three people have died and 15-20 are injured," senior police officer Surinder Pal Singh Parmar told reporters. The attack triggered a security alert across the state as it gears up for a major Sikh festival.

A witness said the attackers were wearing white and had covered themselves in shawls. "Someone threw an object which flew past my neck. The explosion happened immediately," the witness told News18 network. "Everyone started running. There was a lot of smoke." —AFP

Stealth crackdown: Chinese censorship extends to Twitter

BEIJING: Despite being blocked in China, Twitter and other overseas social media sites have long been used freely by activists and government critics to address subjects that are censored on domestic forums-until now. As Beijing presses a campaign to throttle any remaining voices that stray from the Communist Party narrative, it is extending its reach to foreign sites outside of its "Great Firewall" of internet censorship. People in China can use virtual private network (VPN) software to circumvent Beijing's controls and access blocked foreign sites. But fearful that the platforms could be used to coordinate political activity, the authorities have launched a stealth crackdown over the past year.

Chinese activists and other Twitter users say they have been pressured by police to delete sensitive tweets. It's a "silent slaughter", said Yaxue Cao, founder of human rights site China Change. In some cases, Chinese authorities may be getting access to and deleting accounts themselves. Last Friday, Cao reported that the Twitter account of Wu Gan, a Chinese activist sentenced last December to eight years in prison for subversion, had been suddenly deletederasing more than 30,000 posts representing years of political critique and commentary. A Chinese Twitter user

who requested anonymity told AFP that he was taken in by police over tweets critical of the Communist Party. After being held at a police station overnight, the user was made to hand over login information and watch police delete the tweets. "You don't know what kind of crime they'll sentence you with. There's no due process, so you feel scared," said the Twitter user, who was forced to write a letter of repentance and warned against further tweeting. "Once they threaten you, you'll do what they say." Twitter declined to comment when contacted by AFP.

Online clean-up

Under President Xi Jinping, China has increased scrutiny of social media platforms and sought to restrict access to VPN software. Authorities have not launched a full crackdown on VPNs, however, because both Chinese and foreign companies need them to do business. On Monday, the Cyberspace Administration of China said it had "cleaned up" 9,800 accounts on Chinese social media platforms like messaging app WeChat and the Twitter-like Weibo that it accused of spreading "politically harmful" information and rumors. The internet regulator also chastised the sites for negligence and "irresponsibility". Chinese Twitter users have been targeted before-one was arrested in 2012 for joking about a building collapsing on a political meeting.

But the recent police activity indicates a more concerted clampdown, triggered by an exodus of users from censored platforms that has resulted in a stronger Chinese Twitter presence, said writer and activist Li Xuewen. "It's the latest trend," said Li, who was detained in 2017 over an

online memorial to Liu Xiaobo, the Nobel Peace laureate and rights activist who died of liver cancer in police custody last year. "Naturally, Twitter would become the target of the next round of attacks." Last month, Li received a call from police at his parents' home in central Hubei province.

They said "higher-ups" had sent orders to find him and ask him to delete tweets. Wen Tao, a friend of Chinese dissident artist Ai Weiwei, said he too was approached by police last month over his tweets and had heard of many similar stories. "Activists (on Twitter) can communicate with each other and also to the outside world, in particular the Western media," said Emily Parker, a former journalist in China who wrote about its online activists in her 2014 book "Now I Know Who My Comrades Are". "Beijing is concerned about tools that could facilitate online organization. It's thus not surprising that Twitter would get on authorities' radar."

Some Twitter users are let off with a warning, while others are told to delete tweets. But the police pressure could have a ripple effect as hollowed-out accounts or farewell tweets posted by activists under duress could cause others to selfcensor. "It is a huge setback for researchers and anyone who cares about the struggles of contemporary Chinese society," Cao wrote on China Change, describing Twitter as an "open diary" for Chinese dissidents. Li said he plans to cut back his Twitter activity, since "speaking out these days is useless anyway". A user in southern Guangxi province, who was told to delete his tweets in September, said he is now cautious about what he posts. "If I'm not careful, I'll be asked to 'drink tea' again," he told AFP, using a common euphemism for being called in by police. —AFP

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A year after Mugabe's fall, Zimbabwe yearns for upswing

imbabwean businessman Munya Chihota's face lights up when he recalls taking part in a march last year with tens of thousands of people calling for then-president Robert Mugabe to step down. The march came after the military had briefly taken over, and days before Mugabe was forced from power on November 21 in what the veteran leader described as a coup d'etat. "There was so much joy," 41-year-old Chihota told AFP, describing the outpouring of excitement as Zimbabweans waved flags and placards and sang songs urging an end to the nonagenarian strongman's 37-year hold on power.

"We were all there. Young, old, black, white. There was a collective sense of hope that, after the hardships we had endured as a nation, things were going to change," he said. "The general feeling was that the system had to go." But Chihota now looks back on those euphoric times with mixed emotions. "Unfortunately only an individual and a few of his hangers-on were removed, and the system remained in place."

Mugabe, who held power since independence from British colonial rule in 1980, presided over Zimbabwe's decline from a regional power with huge potential, to a ruined country from which millions fled. Many hoped his fall would mark a new era for the country and a re-birth of its economy, but Chihota says business at his plastic manufacturing firm is at its slowest since he started eight years ago. "A lot of things have turned out bad," he said. "This is definitely not what we expected."

Elation turns to disillusion

Mugabe maintained his stranglehold on power by using brutal tactics, deploying security forces to crush opponents and rivals. Finally last year, when he reached the age of 93, a long-brewing succession battle burst into the open. The military, fearing that Mugabe's wife Grace, now 53, was being lined up to take over from him, sent tanks into the streets, seized control, and forced the president to resign. The army top brass ushered in close ally Emmerson Mnangagwa, whom Mugabe had sacked as vice president weeks before.

Like Chihota, 24-year-old job-seeker Belina Mlilo recalls the heady days of Mugabe's ouster with a sense of growing disillusion. Having marched for Mugabe's ouster, she now realises: "We made the mistake of thinking that Mugabe was the only problem." "We were used as pawns in the fight between (ruling party) ZANU-PF factions and now they don't care about us." Mlilo has been unemployed since leaving college six years ago.

Mnangagwa, who secured his hold on power by winning disputed elections in July, had pledged to revive the economy, attract foreign investment, and create jobs. But the dire financial problems of the Mugabe era haunt the new reality. Unemployment is estimated at over 90 percent, and the economy has been cut in half since 2000 when many white-owned farms were seized. Banks without cash, a government without money to spend, and inflation above 20 percent in October - Zimbabwe's suffering shows no signs of ending.

'Still waiting'

"We are still waiting for investors to come, for jobs to be created, and for prices to come down," said economist John Robertson. "The president has made inroads by arresting some people who were guilty of corruption - but the repercussions of (Mugabe's) policy decisions are still with us and the government has not changed that." Shortages of basic goods have created a thriving black market, with some prices rising 200 percent in recent months. A litre of cooking oil can be sold for as much as \$12 on the street compared to the retail price of \$2.70.

to the retail price of \$3.70.

Hopes that the July 30 election would mark a new chapter for Zimbabwe were quickly dashed when soldiers opened fire on protesters in Harare even before the results of the presidential race were announced. Six people were killed - triggering global outrage and undermining efforts to re-brand Mnangagwa, a veteran 76-year-old ZANU-PF loyalist, as a fresh face.

The election result was also engulfed by accusations of fraud and opposition supporters and activists have since complained about constant harassment. "If anything, things are getting worse," said Ibbo Mandaza, head of the Southern African Political and Economic Series Trust think-tank. "Mnangagwa had the opportunity to redeem his reputation but this has not happened. The election shootings and the rigged vote blew away that chance."

ZANU-PF defends Mnangagwa's first-year record. "There has been pronounced freedom and democracy," party spokesman Simon Khaya Moyo insisted. "The economy is also showing signs of growth with many foreign businesses interested in investing. We have had hordes of foreign tourists. Those are clear signs that things have changed." The opposition Movement for Democratic Change disagrees. "Shortages continue unabated and the government continues to intensify the suffering of people," spokesman Jacob Mafume said. — AFP



Modi turns heat up on central bank gov

s Prime Minister Narendra Modi's government turns up the heat on the Reserve Bank of India (RBI) governor to do its bidding ahead of next year's general election it is getting the central bank's board to take on a much more powerful role, according to government officials and board members. Now stacked with government nominees who can be counted on to support the administration, the board is being transformed from having a passive advisory role into a body that can exert pressure for policy change. Some economists fear it could threaten the bank's independence.

Two board members told Reuters that government pressure for easier lending policies is likely to become abundantly clear at today's board meeting - the first to be held since the extent of a deep rift between the RBI and the government became public knowledge. With the election due by May, and voters concerned about weak farm incomes and whether enough jobs are being created, Modi's ruling Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) is keen to stimulate the economy and sees the RBI's hawkish stance as a barrier, said government officials and BJP allies.

The government has been pressing the Mumbai-based RBI and Governor Urjit Patel to accede to a range of demands that could help to boost demand. They include making it easier and cheaper for small businesses to borrow, easing lending curbs on 11 state-run banks which had debt and capital adequacy issues, and providing more liquidity to shadow lenders. They also want the government to have access to surplus reserves the RBI has built up - money that could be used for the administration's populist programs including boosts to rural wages, fuel subsidies and buying crops at a guaranteed minimum price. The RBI has hit back by questioning whether the government wanted to destroy its autonomy and warning that when this happened in Argentina in 2010, financial markets took fright.

Spearheading push

In the past week there have been signs of an uneasy truce as some government officials indicated they didn't want Patel to resign and would allow some issues to be kicked down the road. But at the same time, Modi sup-

porters have made it clear they want major policy change, and a senior finance ministry official said some government backers on the board had been given the green light to push hard at today's meeting.

Spearheading that push is new board member S Gurumurthy, a confidante of Modi's. He is an accountant and columnist who was until recently co-convener of the Swadeshi Jagaran Manch, the economic wing of the Hindu nationalist Rashtriya Swayamsevak Sangh, which is the fountainhead of the BJP. In a speech last week,

Gurumurthy lashed out at the RBI's restrictions on bank lending, saying it was damaging the economy. "We are a bank-driven economy...in a bank-driven economy if you restrict the banks, you are restricting the economy, you are restricting the flow of funds into the economy," he said.

Under the colonial era RBI Act, the government can give the bank directions after consultations with the governor. That law establishes the primacy of the RBI board to do "all acts and things" subject to government directions. It also empowers New Delhi to dismiss any board member - including the governor. In practice, the government has never invoked those sections of the act. For many decades, RBI governors have enjoyed operational freedom, though they have traditionally worked closely with the government, said an official directly aware of such consultations.

The board also doesn't have direct influence over interest rate policy. In 2016, Modi agreed to establish a monetary policy committee to set interest rates based on

whether India was meeting an inflation target. It consists of three RBI officials and three government-appointed members, with the RBI governor having the casting vote.

'Nationalist vision'

Modi supporters are confident newly appointed members of the RBI board with a "nationalist vision" could over time press it to cut interest rates, transfer surplus funds to the government and ease bank lending curbs. The RBI board will seek more accountability from the governor, said Ashwani Mahajan, who is co-convener of the Swadeshi Jagaran Manch. "Now the RBI will be functioning in a more prudent manner looking at the specific needs of the country," he said. Provided Modi gets reelected, the RBI board could ensure a greater role for banks "in the social and economic transformation of the country", he added.

Packed the board

Modi has packed the RBI board in the past few months with people with links to his party and economists who favor greater government influence over the RBI. In August, Gurumurthy and Satish Marathe, a former banker who was in the student wing of the BJP, were named to the board. And last month, the government appointed retired bureaucrat Revathy Iyer and Sachin Chaturvedi, head of a Delhi-based think tank, while removing Nachiket Mor, who was close to RBI officials.

It means that of 18 current members, five come from the government bureaucracy, two are finance ministry officials, and two have close links to Modi and the BJP. Four have a business background, and the other five are Patel and his four deputy governors. Previously, the RBI would usually propose new board members or the government would at least consult the governor before nominating members. Under Modi, there has hardly been any consultation, said one former official directly aware of the appointment process. In a sign of the marathon meeting that could be in store, the last board meeting on Oct 23 ran for eight hours, taking up only two out of 12 agenda items, one member said. The rest will be discussed today, this person said. — Reuters

Fiery mailboxes and dogs in bags: Fleeing Calif wildfire

Destiny noticed a red glow on the horizon as they drove to school in Paradise, California, that Thursday morning. They did not think much of it as they had seen fires nearby in the past. Since they had not heard any warnings, they shrugged it off. But within minutes mass panic broke out, said Nicole Montague, 45. They gathered their nine dogs and a few belongings as the trailer park they live in burst into flames. "As we were driving out, the mailboxes were on fire," Nicole said. "All you could hear were big booms and those were (neighbors') propane tanks starting to explode."

California's deadliest ever wildfire, the innocuous-sounding "Camp Fire," swept into Paradise early on Nov 8, as a rapid-moving, wind-fueled disaster that has left at least 76 people dead and more than 1,276 missing. The flames moved so fast that some of the victims died in their cars in a chaotic evacuation as gridlock formed on the two exit routes out of town. Through sheer luck or quick thinking, many of the survivors only barely managed to escape.

Retirees Julie Walker and her husband, Lane, had lived in Magalia, a northern suburb of Paradise, since 2003. When the fire threatened their house, the Walkers avoided traffic jams by taking to back roads. They said they knew a route out because they spend a lot of time exploring in their Jeep. So when the fire came, the Walkers led a caravan of relatives and neighbors out to safety along dirt roads that circumvented the traffic jam. "They did not know what to do," Julie said of those overtaken by the wildfire while trying to escape. "The fire was on us immediately."



'I don't think I'm going to make it'

David Wigham, 51, who splits and sells firewood to support himself, smelled smoke when he woke up early on Nov 8. Assuming it was far away, he went back to sleep. He awoke hours later to a world turned red. Embers were blowing in through his front door as he tried to stuff his Chihuahua, Dee Dee, into a backpack. "I thought we were going to spontaneously combust," Wigham said. His pick-up truck was aflame, so he fled on foot. Three different strangers gave him rides and eventually he made it south to the town of Oroville.

When the Montagues were certain they were going to die, Nicole called her husband Eric, who was trying to flee in a separate vehicle, to say goodbye. "I said, 'Honey I don't think I'm going to make it out of here, I love you," she recalled. Cars around them caught fire. People behind them on the road got out of their cars, with some fleeing on foot and some jumping into other people's cars to try to escape.

It took them five hours to drive 16 km to Chico, where 15 members of the family are staying in a one-

bedroom apartment with nine dogs. Others would have died on the spot without help. Betty Myers, 89, wheel-chair-bound and diagnosed with Alzheimer's disease, was among some 50 residents of an assisted-living facility in Paradise who were evacuated in a caravan of vehicles, Myers' son Ron Rohde said by phone from the San Francisco area.

Fires surrounded them on the road and the sky turned black. One vehicle was abandoned because it was about to run out of gas and they had to try at least two escape routes before making it out. When Rohde finally reached his mother in Redding, California, she was in bed at a hotel. "Most of the staff lost their homes. They had to worry about their own families, yet they focused on getting those 50 people out to safety," Rohde said.

Not only could his mother not have escaped by herself, Rohde said, but her Alzheimer's left her unaware of the danger. "She was sitting in the car saying, 'Oh those are nice lights,' waving at people," Rohde said he was told. "When I asked her a couple days later what she thought of the fire, she said 'What fire?" — Reuters

Warba Bank to raise capital through IPO

In Kuwait's first electronic IPO on Nov 25, 50% of bank's shares will be on offer

KUWAIT: Warba Bank is raising its capital on Nov 25 through an initial public offering (IPO). On this occasion, the bank held a press conference yesterday to explain the goals of the offer and the bank's expectations from it.

"This will be the first electronic IPO held in Kuwait's history in cooperation with Kuwait Clearing Company. We have set up a special website for the IPO, where the number of shares will be mentioned. The offering is for up to 50 percent of the total shares, but interested buyer can demand more shares online," CEO of Warba Bank Shaheen Al-Ghanem said during the conference.

There will be two categories of buyers. "Those who will buy up to 16,500 shares will be able to pay through K-Net and will receive a message and an email confirm-

ing the completion of the buying process. In case of an interest to buy more than 16,500 shares, the system will print a document with the number of demanded shares and the directions to follow. These include going to his bank to transfer the payment for the demanded shares to Warba Bank's account. They will then receive another document of payment which they will take to KCC to complete the process," he added.

The record growth achieved by the bank over the last two years has prompted it to go for an amendment to increase capital. "We expect to complete the growth percentage, so we need to raise the capita in addition to supporting the bank's growth objectives. We expect growth mainly from our financial portfolio," stressed Ghanem.

, stressed Gnanem. "The Central Bank of Kuwait issued new regulations last week on consumer and housing loans that raised the limit from KD 15,000 to KD 25,000 for consumer loans, and maintained the housing loan at KD 70,000 - a total of KD 95,000, which brings more opportunities. We hope that Warba Bank will get a good share in this market. We expect that the mortgage law will be issued by 2019, which will give us good opportunity for growth. We also hope that the government will continue offering more projects in the oil sector. We closed some outstanding deals in financing oil projects, and we hope to continue in this field," he concluded.

Chief Financial Officer Khaled Hafez said that the bank was founded in 2010 - just after the economic crisis - with limited capital, "when the smallest bank at that time had double our capital". "The capital of any bank is related to the ability to compete in financing, and we

succeeded to grow very well since 2010. Our assets grew by around KD 2 billion; last year we scored high growth and were ranked as the third-largest among Kuwaiti banks assets-wise and financing portfoliowise," he pointed out.

"The upcoming capital raising amendment will support our competing ability to enter new sectors, finance more clients and boost our growth trajectory. In the third quarter of 2018, the rate of return on shareholders' equity crossed 6 percent in a very short period, which is a great achievement. Furthermore, we are working on having more positive reserves to be able to give dividends by 2019," explained Hafez. The price of the share issue is low to attract buyers. "The share issue price is 180 fils, while the average price is 230 fils, which should attract investors and encourage them to buy," he added.

APEC's future in doubt after costly summit failure

PORT MORESBY: With Donald Trump and Vladimir Putin absent and leaders unable even to agree a joint statement, some critics are questioning whether the annual APEC summit is still worth the effort.

"Expectations are low and probably won't be fulfilled anyway." That was the brutal if prescient presummit prediction of William Reinsch, an analyst at the Center for Strategic and International Studies.

The two-day gathering in Papua New Guinea was almost five years in the making, cost untold millions of US dollars and required the deployment of at least one battleship and three cruise liners.

And after all that, leaders came away with little more than three family photos and a loud shirt unlikely to be worn again. The grouping was born three decades ago as a way of promoting trade liberalization. But that cause has fallen out of vogue and Port Moresby was little more than a different venue for another China-US bunfight.

For the first time ever, the leaders failed to produce a joint summit declaration-usually a technocratic exercise in fudging differences, overstating agreement and promising great things to come.

It is a heartbreaking result for host Papua New Guinea, which was making its debut on the international stage-at no insignificant cost. Prime Minister Peter O'Neill's government-not much larger than a municipal authority in most developed countries-visibly struggled with hosting such an enormous enterprise.

with hosting such an enormous enterprise.

It dealt with more than 21 delegations, each numbering in the dozens if not hundreds who needed to be fed, housed and watered and ferried round a city not exactly designed for armor plated motorcades. Papua New Guinea officials forgot to provide lighting for a leaders' photo opportunity, outside, at night and at another they put their own flag upside down.

'Big show'

They also suffered enormous pressure from much more powerful countries. Chinese officials on one occasion reportedly demanded that hundreds of red flags for Xi Jinping's state visit be kept up. In another instance, the police had to be called to prevent officials from Beijing storming the foreign minister's office. China denies the incident.

But the summit's failure was hardly the fault of rookie stagecraft. Skipping the leaders' scheduled coffee break on the last day wasn't going to provide enough time to sort through the defining strategic rivalry of our time.

"I feel sorry for Papua New Guinea, this was their big show' said Euan Graham, executive director of La Trobe Asia, describing a diplomatic minnow caught in the crossfire of the world's two largest economic and military powers. Papua New Guinea did benefit from the rivalry and chequebook diplomacy of the two powers, winning new investments in energy, electricity and infrastructure.

O'Neill, like other small power leaders, also got images of himself mixing with global big hitters. That will elevate his stature at home and may help when election time comes round.

Executive director of the APEC secretariat, Alan

Bollard said the organisation was about more than the annual shindig. "APEC is more than just a leaders' meeting, but a place for economies to incubate ideas throughout the year," he said.

US officials hope that next year will bring Trump's return, but it may matter little if protectionist and

nationalistic trends persist and the United States and China continue butting heads.

"APEC's founding vision was already fraying," said Graham. "But the failure to agree a communique is a final death knell for a pan-Asia-Pacific trade framework." — AFP

Brexit turbulence at an all-time high

In a shift of sentiment, the US and China have intensified efforts to strike a truce at the G20 that would curb their trade war. US President Trump and his Chinese counterpart Xi Jinping have agreed to discuss trade during the upcoming G20 meeting, which starts on November 30 in Argentina.

Since the two trade partners have a lot to work out, markets are managing their expectations. Even if the current tariffs are not rolled back, any signal of trade war ceasefire would be viewed in a positive light.

Meanwhile, reports indicate that US trade representative Robert Lighthizer has told some industry executives that the next tranche of tariffs is already on hold. This would mean the US would hold off on increasing tariffs from 10 percent to 25 percent on \$200 billion of Chinese goods. Moreover, the US administration could also revisit their earlier intention to impose tariffs on an additional USD267 billion of Chinese goods.

Auto tariffs attract EU retaliation

At the same time, the US is also negotiating trade terms with the European Union. Last week, the trump administration hit the brakes on auto tariffs after top US officials expressed skepticism about the plan. The auto tariffs are at the center of the US-EU trade rift. Without delays, the EU's trade chief said Brussels was "ready" to retaliate against US products if Washington slapped tariffs on cars.

US inflation

US inflation picked up after two months of declines. Consumer prices increased 2.5 percent from a year earlier, while the core figure came in at 2.1 percent. With inflation hovering close to the Fed's target, the US central bank is unlikely to change its view and is expected to move ahead with its gradual pace of interest rate hikes. The current probability of a December rate hike reached 71 percent.

Furthermore, retail sales also bounced back, beating analysts' expectations. Headline retail sales increased 0.8 percent m/m in October, according to the Commerce Department. This is compared to expectations of a 0.5 percent increase.

Oil prices under fire

Meanwhile, oil prices came under pressure after the US surprisingly granted waivers to both China and India, Iran's two main oil-buying customers. Initially, the notion of Iranian oil supply disappearing from the market ignited an oil rally that spurred talk of triple digit oil prices. Turmoil in Venezuela and OPEC production cuts also added fuel to fire. Markets traded oil all the way up to 4 year highs as they priced in supply concerns.

Now however, the tide seems to have shifted as oil prices face the sixth consecutive week of falling prices. The record output in the US is placing significant downward pressure, with oil inventories there soaring 10 million barrels last week. This, coupled with the waivers, has spurred talks of an oversupply in the market. In fact, OPEC is now reported to be considering fresh cuts to support prices. As a result, oil recouped some of its losses towards the end of the week.

Brexit fallout

With four months until Brexit day, when Britain will officially exit the EU, political turmoil continues to plague the UK. The British Prime Minister Theresa May, tasked with overseeing the Brexit process and securing the best deal possible for the UK as it exits the European Union, has pro-

As one would expect, the British pound fell sharply during the aftermath. Sterling suffered its worst day in more than two years on Thursday, losing 1.7 percent of its value against the

UK economy

Disappointing UK retail sales figures raised concerns that the economy is losing momentum. This makes it the second consecutive month where retail sales have fallen. Consumer spending is needed to help power the economy as businesses cut back on investment ahead of the final stage of the Brexit

Meanwhile, UK inflation remained steady last month as slowdowns in food, clothing and transport price increases were offset by rises in utility bills and the cost of fuel. The Office of National Statistics stated that consumer prices were 2.4 percent higher than a year earlier. The figure slightly missed analysts' expectations of 2.5 percent.

EU economy

Eurozone growth fell to 0.2 percent m/m, or 1.7 percent /y, the lowest figure in more than four years. Nevertheless, ECB president Mario Draghi reiterated the central bank's positive view on the region's economic outlook. Draghi believes that the region's labor market is strong enough to boost growth and leave price pressures at a level where the ECB can consistently hit its inflation target of just under 2



Romania could challenge Russian iron grip on Europe's energy

Untapped reserves under the Black Sea attract oil and gas majors

BUCHAREST: Romania, one of the EU's poorest members, could emerge as an unlikely challenger to Russia's iron grip on eastern Europe's energy supply thanks to vast oil and gas reserves waiting to be tapped, experts say.

Its hydrocarbon riches already give Romania a high degree of energy self-sufficiency, but there are many more untapped reserves under the Black Sea, attracting the attention of the world's oil and gas majors. Some, including US giant ExxonMobil and Austria's OMV Petrom, have started drilling in the Black Sea. "Romania's position as a potentially significant gas producer in this region is unique and the resources here may pose a threat to what has been mostly a Russian monopoly," said Mark Beacom, CEO of Black Sea Oil & Gas, a company owned jointly by the Carlyle Group and the European Bank for Reconstruction and Development.

But the energy majors have put their ambitions on hold after Bucharest passed legislation that will tax revenues from offshore drilling and stipulate that half of output must be reserved for the domestic market-even though the country still lacks much of the infrastructure needed to distribute and consume it.

Romania currently produces about 10.5 billion cubic meters of gas each year, largely onshore, and consumes 11-12 billion cubic meters, making it almost completely independent from Russian gas unlike its eastern European neighbors. According to varying estimates, further untapped reserves of between 170 and 200 billion cubic meters lie deep in the Black Sea that could be extracted by 2040.

That represents the equivalent of Romania's total annual consumption for 15 years, and four years' consumption of a country such as France.

It was the former communist leader Nicolae Ceausescu who first launched an off-



shore drilling project in the Black Sea 50 years ago. And now Romania could "become a regional hub and contribute to Europe's energy security," the Energy Ministry told AFP.

Russian stranglehold

Russia is one of the biggest suppliers of oil and gas to Europe, a stranglehold that the West has long tried to break in view of recurring geopolitical tensions between the former Cold War foes.

In the 2000s, a dispute between Russia and Ukraine left Europeans shivering in the middle of winter when Russian giant Gazprom cut supplies to the West.

The volume of (offshore) reserves can turn Romania into the main EU gas producer, after the UK leaves the bloc," Razvan Nicolescu, a consultant with Deloitte told AFP.

To capitalize on this, authorities have started work on the Romanian stretch of the BRUA pipeline, a 479-kilometre (308-mile) artery, partly financed by the European Commission, that will also cross Bulgaria, Hungary and Austria, and transport gas from the Caspian and Black Seas to Central Europe.

But the plan can only proceed "if the gas companies decide to go ahead with their investments," Nicolescu said. And therein lies the catch. In October, the Romanian parliament passed a law introducing progressive taxation on revenues from offshore drilling and stipulating that half of the gas produced must be sold on the local market. — AFP

Macron popularity dips as French fuel tax revolt simmers

PARIS: Emmanuel Macron's populartions sparked run-ins with frustrated ity took a further hit in recent weeks, according to a poll yesterday, as fuel tax protests rumbled on across France in the latest sign of discontent with the president's economic reforms.

Only 25 percent of those questioned in an Ifop poll between Nov. 9 and 17 said they were satisfied with Macron, down from 29 percent in October, according to the survey of almost 2,000 people published in the Journal du Dimanche (JDD). Macron, who came to power 18 months ago vowing to reshape the economy and overhaul institutions, has brushed off slumping ratings to push through a series of reforms, including a loosening of laws governing hiring and firing.

His government introduced fuel tax hikes to encourage drivers to embrace less-polluting cars, touching a nerve with voters in rural areas in particular as the extra cost began to bite in October when global oil prices surged. Angry motorists and other demonstrators, many accusing Macron of being out of touch with ordinary people, blocked roads across France on Saturday in a grassroots campaign dubbed the "Yellow Vests" that drew nearly 288,000 protesters.

Some were still maintaining blockades on highway sliproads, tolls and roundabouts yesterday. Saturday's demonstradrivers trying to get around stoppages, and more than 400 people were injured, 14 of them seriously, Interior Minister Christophe Castaner said.

A woman protester died when she was accidentally hit by a panicked driver at one blockade. At least 157 people were taken into police custody. In a separate Ifop poll in the JDD on Sunday, 62 percent of those surveyed said the government should prioritize policies to help household incomes even if it meant advancing more slowly in an environmentally friendly energy transition plan.

Environment Minister François de Rugy said the government, which last week sought to placate motorists with subsidies for the worst off, would not back down on its fuel tax plans. These are set for another hike in January including on diesel, the most commonly used fuel in France.

"I would prefer to announce tax cuts but we need levers to fight climate change," he told Europe 1 radio and CNews television in a joint interview yesterday. Macron's popularity has sunk to as low as 21 percent in other polls recently, after a torrid summer marked by a scandal over the violent conduct of the president's former security adviser and the departure of several ministers. — Reuters

An on-orbit servicing: The new type of space industry

'Equivalent to a AAA servicing truck in geostationary orbit'

WASHINGTON: Imagine an airport where thousands of planes, empty of fuel, are left abandoned on the tarmac. That is what has been happening for decades with satellites that circle the Earth. When satellites run out of fuel, they can no longer maintain their precise orbit, rendering them useless even if their hardware is still intact.

"It's literally throwing away hundreds of millions of dollars," Al Tadros, vice president of space infrastructure and civil Space at a company called SSL, said this month at a meeting in the US capital of key players in the emerging field of on-orbit servicing, or repairing satellites while they are in space. In recent years, new aerospace companies have been founded to try and extend the lifespan of satellites, on the hunch that many clients would find this more profitable than relaunching new ones.

In 2021, his company will launch a vehicle—as part of its Robotic Servicing of Geosynchronous Satellites (RSGS) program—that is capable of servicing two to three dozen satellites in a distant geostationary orbit, some 22,000 miles from Earth where there are about 500 active satellites, most in telecommunications. This unmanned spacecraft will be able to latch onto a satellite to inspect it, refuel it, and possibly even repair it or change components, and put it back in the correct orbit. Tadros describes it as "equivalent to a AAA servicing truck in geostationary orbit." And "it's financially a very, very big opportunity," he adds.

Telecommunications giant Intelsat, which operates 50 geostationary satellites, chose a different option and signed a contract with Space Logistics, a branch of Northrop Grumman, for its MEV, a "very simple system"

vice president Ken Lee told AFP is much like a "tow truck." When it launches in 2019, the spacecraft will attach itself to a broken down satellite, and reposition it in its correct orbit. The MEV will stay attached and use its own engine to stay in orbit.

Too much debris

On-orbit servicing could also help cut down on the perplexing problem of mounting space debris. Of the 23,000 space objects counted by the US military, just 1,900 are active satellites. The rest — which move at speeds of some 12-19,000 miles (20-30,000 kilometers) per hour — includes nearly 3,000 inactive satellites, 2,000 pieces of rockets (such as the second stages of rockets) and thousands of fragments produced by two key events: the deliberate missile explosion of a Chinese satellite in 2007, and the 2009 collision of an Iridium satellite with an aging Russian one.

No short term solution has been identified for small-scale space junk, but some companies would like to be able to remove defunct satellites from orbit. Since 2008, France has required satellite operators to take steps to "deorbit" their spacecrafts by programming them to re-enter Earth's atmosphere in 25 years so that they burn up, according to Laurent Francillout, head of space security at the French National Center for Space Studies (CNES).

When it comes to satellites in geostationary orbits, their end-of-life option is to go farther from Earth to a "graveyard orbit" 200 miles further away. "We are trying to promote these principles" in other countries, Francillout said. A small Japanese company founded in 2013, Astroscale, is developing a system to



approach and capture space debris and broken satellites. Though it doesn't have a clientele yet, director of operations Chris Blackerby anticipates the business would be "very viable." A test launch is planned for 2020.

Airbus's future "Space Tug," planned for 2023, is being built to grab old satellites and push them down to 125 miles above Earth so

they burn up. The problem of space junk is only getting worse. The number of satellites in space has already risen 50 percent in five years, according to the Satellite Industry Association, and growth continues. Meanwhile, debate is roiling in the United States over the need for better international regulation of space traffic, aimed at avoiding

accidents and managing future conflicts. "We don't want the Wild West," said Fred Kennedy, director of the Tactical Technology Office at DARPA, the technological research arm of the Pentagon, noting that the United States, with its fleet of military satellites, is keen to establish sound practices beyond the boundaries of Earth. — AFP

Meditation helps conflict veterans with PTSD: Study

PARIS: Transcendental meditation — the practice of effortless thinking — may be as effective at treating PTSD in conflict veterans as traditional therapy, US researchers said Friday, in findings that could help tens of thousands deal with their trauma. Post traumatic stress disorder, a debilitating condition that can lead to psychosis, bipolar disorder or suicidal and homicidal thoughts, affects an estimated 14 percent of US veterans who serve in Iraq or Afghanistan.

The most common treatment for PTSD is a process known as prolonged exposure psychotherapy, which forces sufferers to re-experience traumatic events by confronting their memories of the conflict. Researchers from three US universities decided to look into whether more everyday techniques, which help civilians lower their stress levels and increase focus and productivity, would work on traumatized veterans. They trialed 203 former servicemen and women with PTSD, most of whom were receiving medication for their symptoms, and randomly assigned them courses of transcendental meditation, prolonged exposure therapy or a specialized PTSD health education class.

They found that 60 percent of veterans who did 20 minutes of quiet meditation every day showed significant improvement in their symptoms, and more completed the study than those given exposure therapy. "Over the past 50 years, PTSD has expanded to become a significant public health problem," Sanford Nidich, of the Maharishi University of Management Research Institute, told AFP. "Due to the increasing need to address the PTSD public health care problem in the US, UK and worldwide, there is a

compelling need to implement governmental policy to include alternative therapies such as transcendental meditation as an option for treating veterans with PTSD."

Transcendental meditation involves effortlessly thinking of an idea or mantra to produce a settled, calmer state of mind — scientists call it "restful alertness". Unlike exposure therapy, meditation can be practiced at home, takes up relatively little time, and researchers say it would be significantly cheaper than current treatment techniques. It also avoids forcing combat veterans to relive their trauma in a bid to get better. "Transcendental meditation is self-empowering, and can be practiced just about anywhere at any time, without the need for specialized equipment or ongoing personnel support," said Nidich, who was the lead author of the study published in The Lancet Psychiatry journal.

'Gave me my life back'

The main problem with existing PTSD treatment, according to Nidich, is that forcing veterans to relive their trauma means many never finish the courses. Exposure therapy, although officially approved as a treatment by the US Veterans' Association, is ineffective in up to 50 percent of patients and drop-out rates range from 30-45 percent.

"New treatments, including options not involving exposure to the traumatic experience, are needed for veterans who do not respond to treatment or drop-out due to discomfort," said Nidich. One study participant, a 32-year-old navy veteran whom authors identified only as Ms K, said learning the meditation technique had "given me my life back." After being diagnosed as having suffered sexual trauma while on military service, her symptoms worsened until she drank to excess every night and sought to avoid human interaction. After the transcendental meditation course, "I began to come out of my nightmares and face the battle I had ahead," she said. She added she had since applied for a job in a hospital. Researchers said further studies were needed to see if meditation could be a long-term aid for PTSD sufferers. — AFP

'Picasso' stolen in Rotterdam possibly found in Romania

ne of seven paintings stolen six years ago from a museum in The Netherlands as part of a spectacular art heist may have been found in Romania, the public prosector in Bucharest said yesterday. Seven masterpieces by Picasso, Monet, Gauguin, and Lucian Freud were stolen from the Kunsthal Museum in Rotterdam in 2012 in a raid that lasted only three minutes. Dutch media at the time called it "the theft of the century". Public prosecutor Augustin Lazar confirmed to AFP that Romanian authorities were in possession of a painting that "might be" one of those stolen from the Kunsthal Museum, adding it needs to be further examined.

Sources told AFP that experts are checking if the canvas is Picasso's "Harlequin Head". A Dutch foreign affairs ministry spokesperson said the painting's "authenticity must now be established". Four Romanians were jailed for the heist in 2014, and ordered to pay 18 million euros (\$20.5 million at today's rates) to the paintings' insurers. One of the group, Olga Dogaru, told investigators she had burned the paintings in her stove in the sleepy village of Carcaliu in eastern Romania in a bid to protect her son, Radu, when he could not sell them.

She later retracted the statement. Investigators have previously said the paintings were destroyed after the

Missing St Mark mosaic finally returns to Cyprus

ne of the last missing pieces of Byzantine art stolen from Cyprus in the 1970s was handed back this week by a renowned, and proud Dutch art investigator. Arthur Brand said Friday he handed back the sixth century depiction of Saint Mark during a private ceremony at the Cypriot embassy in The Hague. For Brand, dubbed the "Indiana Jones of the art world" because of his exploits to recover stolen works, the handover was a highpoint in his lifelong interest in the Byzantine saint-and the result of a nearly two-year chase across Europe.

"This is a very special piece that's more than 1,600 years old. It's one of the last and most beautiful examples of art from the early Byzantine era," said the art sleuth. He showed AFP the mosaic hours before it was handed back. The Cypriot embassy and Church of Cyprus declined to comment when asked about the mosaic and the Cypriot Department of Antiquities did not respond to phonecalls.

'Greatest moment'

After getting a tip from a prominent London art dealer, Brand travelled to Monaco in August. Through a series of intermediaries-including several in the underground world-Brand finally traced the missing mosaic to an apartment in the upscale city-state. "It was in the possession of a British family, who bought the mosaic in good faith more than four decades ago," Brand told AFP. "They were horrified when they found out that it was in fact a priceless art treasure, looted from the Kanakaria Church after the Turkish invasion," Brand said. The family agreed to return it "to the people of Cyprus" in return for a small fee to cover restoration and storage costs, he added.

A week ago, Brand-who was working with the Church of Cyprus-returned to Monaco to collect the treasure, said to be worth five to 10 million euros (\$5.7-\$11 million). "It was one of the greatest moments of my life," the detective said. In 2015, Brand won world fame after finding two massive bronze statues made by Nazi sculptor Joseph Thorak that are referred to as "Hitler's Horses". He made headlines again a year later for helping to recover five stolen masterpieces from a criminal group in the Ukraine.

Looted art

Religious artifacts including mosaics were hewn from the church walls in northern Cyprus following an invasion by Turkish forces in 1974. They included a set

of mosaics taken from the Panayia Kanakaria church, about 105 kilometers (65 miles) northeast of Nicosia. Many pieces ended up in the underground world of art smuggling and went missing for many years, while the Cyprus government and church campaigned ceaselessly to recover them.

"The mosaics of Kanakaria are of immense importance in Christian art and world culture," said Maria Paphiti, a former department head at British auction house Christie's. The ensemble "is among a handful of artworks that escaped the menace of Byzantine iconoclasm" in the eighth and ninth century, Paphiti, an art historian and world authority on Byzantine art told AFP.

'Last missing pieces'

Twelve mosaic fragments have been returned so far, notably one depicting the Apostle Andrew-which Paphiti discovered among a collection of artworks in 2014. In 1989, four fragments depicting the upper part of Christ, two apostles and an archangel were handed back after a high-profile case in Indianapolis. Most of the mosaic fragments were recovered between 1983 and 2015, Paphiti said, but some pieces are still missing, including the lower part of Christ's body. "This is truly one of the last outstanding pieces to be returned," said Brand. "It is incredible to think that this piece of art survived for so long. It's part of the Cypriot peoples' soul," he added.

St Mark is expected to return to the Mediterranean island within the coming days. German police made a major breakthrough in the recovery of stolen Cypriot art in 1997 when they raided the home of convicted Turkish art dealer Ayden Dikmen in Munich. Cyprus has been divided since 1974 when Turkey invaded and seized its northern third in response to an Athens-engineered coup to unite the island with Greece. — AFP


Ralph Lauren to get royal title














Kelsey Merritt's mascara secret

Looters plunder Albania's sunken treasures

Ibania's long underexplored coastal waters have become a hotspot for treas-Lure hunters scooping up ancient pottery, sunken ship parts and other shell-encrusted relics that have lain on the seabed for centuries. The 450-kilometre (280-mile) coastline, which is lapped by the Adriatic and Ionian seas, was off-limits under the communist regime which ruled the Balkan state until 1990, with orders to shoot anyone caught diving without authorization. But today its waters are open, luring archaeologists but also looters eager to plumb the new territory and sell their finds on the art and metals markets.

"Much of this wealth resting at the depth of 20-30 meters (66-99 feet) is easily accessible without any special equipment and has almost completely disappeared without a trace," said Albanian archaeologist and art historian Neritan Ceka, among those calling for urgent measures to protect the underwater heritage. While diving at the beginning of the 1980s-under communism, archaeologists and soldiers were permitted-he was one of the first to see for himself the seabed treasures, he said. "I saw extraordinary richness, amphoras (terra-cotta jugs), pottery, archaeological objects which are no longer there today," he added. Teams of European and Albanian divers "have started to loot in a barbaric way", he lamented.

'Big profits'

Expeditions carried out since 2006 by the US-based RPM Nautical Foundation have found some 40 shipwrecks along Albania's coastline, including vessels dating back to the 7th century BC and naval ships from World War I and II. Hundreds of Roman-era amphoras-used to store wine, olive oil and other goods on trade vessels-are also clustered on the sea floor, covered in marine plants. Experts say that without a full inventory, it is impossible to know how many of the artifacts have been plucked from the

seabed and sold on the international art trafficking market.

The market overall generates a global turnover of more than \$4 billion (3.5 billion euros) a year, according to Auron Tare, who chairs UNESCO's scientific and technical advisory body on underwater cultural heritage. "But what is certain: a treasure hunt below the seas can bring in big profits," said Moikom Zeqo, an underwater archaeologist who helped discover a 2nd-century BC Roman ship carrying hundreds of amphoras.

Art and steel

The vases can be sold for up to 100 euros in Albania, where they are on display in some high-end restaurants, or auctioned for much greater sums in London and other art capitals. Other prized discoveries have been ferried home by foreign divers and placed in various private museums around the world, such as the bell of an ill-fated Austro-Hungarian ship, the SS Linz, that sunk off Albania's northwest coast with 1,000 passengers on board after striking a mine in March 1918. "These objects (from the SS Linz), exhibited in a private museum in Austria, must be returned to Albania," said Tare, who also heads the Albanian Center for Marine Research.

Divers are also going underwater to strip early 20th century warships for their high-quality steel. Steel produced before any nuclear explosions happened in the world is especially lucrative, as it lacks any trace of radioactivity and can be used for sensitive medical devices and other scientific equipment. "To skin the hull and remove it from the seabed, the looters use dynamite," said Ilir Capuni, a researcher and professor at the University of New York Tirana. He has seen the plunder firsthand.

Back in 2013, Capuni helped discover a Hungarian-Croat steamer, the Pozsony, that sunk off the coast of Durres in 1916 after striking a mine. But four years later, "we found that there was almost nothing left of it," said Capuni. A similar fate has befallen the Italian medical ship Po, which was struck by a British torpedo in 1941 off the coast of southeastern Vlore. Benito Mussolini's daughter Edda Ciano, who was aboard the ship as a nurse, survived. Its algae-covered hull was miraculously intact when it was first discovered but has since been dismantled in places and emptied of valuable objects, such as the bell, compass, telegraph, lights and dishes. Bought firsthand for 5,000 euros, some parts have been resold since to collectors for 20 times that amount, Capuni said.

Underwater museum

In June, authorities passed a law classifying the shipwrecks as cultural monuments and requiring strict licensing for diving teams. Police are also working with Interpol to trace and return stolen objects, said criminal police director Eduart Merkaj, although so far there have been no concrete results. One dream shared by Albanian and foreign experts is to create an underwater museum, such as the one that exists in the Turkish city of Bodrum, that would protect the artifacts and draw tourists. "The time has come to build an underwater museum, laboratories and a specialized center," says Luan Perzhita, director of Albania's Archaeological

But the high costs of such a project remain a barrier, with only 30,000 euros allotted in the state budget this year for archaeology. "Albania has never had the luxury or awareness to understand the great importance that this wealth represents for the country's history and for Mediterranean civilization," said Tare. Even though, he added, the waters still contain "more treasures that have not yet been discovered". — AFP

From Afghanistan to the Outback: Refugees ditch Australia's overcrowded

Hazara refugee who now calls the Australian outback home, Ali named his new venture the "Afghan Friendship Restaurant", a tribute to the warm welcome he says he received after moving to the town of Griffith five years ago. The 44-year-old father of three is among a growing number of refugees and migrants to Australia who have opted to live in the bush rather than among the bright lights, hustle-bustle and astronomical prices of Sydney or Melbourne. The word "friendship" hovers over Ali's head in bright red lettering while he cooks lamb skewers, his face a picture of concentration as the rich wafts of fragrant smoke lure in hungry customers.

It is the first-ever Afghan eatery in Griffith-a six-hour drive west of Sydneyand a far cry from the pie and chips staples of the Australian bush. "I suggest to all of my friends, especially Afghan people, to come to Griffith, because here's very friendly," Ali, who asked that his surname not be used to protect family still in Afghanistan, tells AFP during a break from cooking. "Also we can find a job as well, because the population is not too much."

A nation of immigrants, nearly half of Australia's 25-million-strong population was either born overseas or has at least one parent born abroad. The country takes

in around 14,000 refugees annually, with one-off exceptions to allow additional asylum-seekers, such as a recent scheme for 12,000 Syrians and Iraqis. But harsh antiasylum policies against boat arrivals and high-profile incidents of racism have given the country a reputation as inhospitable to non-white immigrants. There's been a spike in anti-immigration sentiment, according to the Lowy Institute think tank, despite the overall intake of migrants-capped annually at 190,000 — remaining stable. Lowy's annual poll found that for the first time this year, more than half the Australians surveved said the number of migrants was "too high"-up from 40 percent in 2017. The poll's authors said the shifting attitudes could reflect a lurch to the right, particularly as conservative politicians call for intake cuts amid urban pressures.

'Crying out for people'

Rapid demographic changes in Australian cities over the past decade have caused disquiet as residents grapple with congestion and high house prices. Yet at the same time many regional towns are "crying out for more people", according to population and cities minister Alan Tudge. His government is proposing that new arrivals live in smaller towns for a few years, in the hope they would make it their home. Critics say the policy is not enforceable, and add that migrants would struggle to integrate into rural populations amid language and cultural differences.

But that is not what Jock Collins at the University of Technology Sydney, who is currently surveying 250 recently arrived families from Iraq, Syria and Afghanistan, has found. Collins says many migrants have positive feedback to share after being settled in smaller towns.

In addition to job opportunities and a supportive environment-"where the town goes out of its way to welcome refugees"the presence of other migrant communities can ease the transition, Collins says. "A lot

of regional and rural towns are losing populations and in particular, the young people are leaving... so immigration can help fill that gap." Some immigrants also find it difficult to adjust to the busy rhythms of city life, making smaller towns an easier fit. Incentives like extended family visaswhich the conservative government has been cutting back on in favor of younger working-age migrants-could also attract and keep refugees in the bush.

Crocodile Ali

One success story is Mingoola, a small rural township in New South Wales, on the border with Queensland, that was slowly dying as its population aged. Desperate for an injection of new blood, the town finally found a match with refugees from rural east Africa who were struggling in Sydney. Similar praise has been heaped on Nhill, a town four hours' drive from Melbourne that's boomed since local poultry firm Luva-Duck found a Karen community, a minority group persecuted in Myanmar,

willing to move there. Eight years on, business is booming and the Karen now make up 10 percent of Nhill's 2,000-strong population. "From a position of decline, these towns are now thriving," says Jack Archer of the Regional Australia Institute, which is pushing for a national strategy instead of isolated efforts to match needy towns with job-seeking

Back in Griffith, refugee entrepreneurs are boosting local jobs. Ali's restaurant employs another refugee and a migrant from Malaysia, while his wife also helps with the cooking. In more than one way, Ali is altering visitor flows between cities and rural towns. One couple have travelled from Sydney three times to eat at the restaurant. It's "for the soup", he says, "they like my soup and because of that they come here." — AFP

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

Giant Damien Hirst sculptures catch eye at Qatari hospital

DOHA: Fourteen giant bronze sculptures by British artist Damien Hirst graphically charting the moment of conception to birth greet patients arriving at an \$8-billion hospital in the Gulf state of Qatar. The vast open-air installation, named "The Miraculous Journey", shows a fetus growing in the womb and culminates with a 14-m sculpture of a naked baby just after birth. The monumental work is the centerpiece of an impressive modern art collection at the Sidra Medicine Hospital, officially opened this week in Doha, that would be the envy of many galleries around the world.

"We believe it reflects very much the mission of Sidra, taking care of the healthcare of woman and babies," said Layla Ibrahim Bacha, art specialist with the government-supported Qatar Foundation, which owns most of the artwork. "I think it's perfect for the location, as you can see a lot of people are taking pictures, I think it's becoming iconic."

Among the 65 works at the specialty facility for children's and women's health are pieces by high-profile international names and artists from across the Arab world, including Qatar. A fourth-floor outpatient clinic is decorated with a neon installation entitled "I Listen To The Ocean And All I Hear Is You" by Tracey Emin, one of Hirst's ground-breaking contemporaries from Britain. Bacha says the art was chosen with "very specific themes" in mind. "They are not meant to be decorative, they are meant to be more creating debates, helping with the patient to keep calm," she said.

Syrian artist, Jaber Al-Azmeh, whose pictures hang in the hospital, told AFP that it makes him "smile" to imagine his photographs on display in a place where new lives are starting. Sidra began receiving its first patients in January and last month successfully conducted Qatar's first conjoined twin separation surgery. Energy-rich Qatar has become a major buyer of contemporary art. It is seeking to portray itself as one of the most progressive states in the region against the backdrop of a bitter standoff with Gulf rivals led by Saudi Arabia.

But that does not mean there has not been some controversy over the Damien Hirst works towering outside the hospital. The sculptures were originally unveiled in Oct 2013 but then covered from public view until recent weeks. The official reason was to protect them from ongoing building work on the hospital, but they were concealed after a social media outcry. "We are not expecting everyone to like them. We are not expecting everyone to understand them," said Bacha. "This is why they are there to actually create this element of debate, this element of thinking." — AFP



Questions over APEC after costly summit failure

PORT MORESBY: With Donald Trump and Vladimir Putin absent and leaders unable even to agree a joint statement, some critics are questioning whether the annual APEC summit is still worth the effort. "Expectations are low and probably won't be fulfilled anyway." That was the brutal if prescient pre-summit prediction of William Reinsch, an analyst at the Center for Strategic and International Studies. The two-day gathering in Papua New Guinea was almost five years in the making, cost untold millions of US dollars and required the deployment of at least one battleship and three cruise liners.

And after all that, leaders came away with little more than three family photos and a loud shirt unlikely to be worn again. The grouping was born three decades ago as a way of promoting trade liberalization. But that cause has fallen out of vogue and Port Moresby was little more than a different venue for another China-US gunfight. For the first time ever, the leaders failed to produce a joint summit declaration - usually a technocratic exercise in fudging differences, overstating agreement and promising great

It is likely to be a disappointment for host Papua New

Guinea, which was making its debut on the international stage - at no insignificant cost. Prime Minister Peter O'Neill's government - not much larger than a municipal authority in most developed countries - visibly struggled with hosting such an enormous enterprise. It dealt with more than 21 delegations, each numbering in the dozens if not hundreds who needed to be fed, housed and watered and ferried round a city not exactly designed for armorplated motorcades. Papua New Guinea officials forgot to provide lighting for a leaders' photo opportunity, outside, at night and at another they put their own flag upside

They also suffered enormous pressure from much more powerful countries. Chinese officials on one occasion reportedly demanded that hundreds of red flags for Xi Jinping's state visit be kept up. In another instance, the police had to be called to prevent officials from Beijing storming the foreign minister's office. China denies the incident. But the summit's failure was hardly the fault of rookie stagecraft. Skipping the leaders' scheduled coffee break on the last day wasn't going to provide enough time to sort through the defining strategic rivalry of our time.

"I feel sorry for Papua New Guinea, this was their big show' said Euan Graham, executive director of La Trobe Asia, describing a diplomatic minnow caught in the crossfire of the world's two largest economic and military powers. Papua New Guinea did benefit from the rivalry and chequebook diplomacy of the two powers, winning new investments in energy, electricity and infrastructure. O'Neill, like other small power leaders, also got images of

himself mixing with global big hitters.

Executive director of the APEC secretariat, Alan Bollard said the organization was about more than the annual shindig. "APEC is more than just a leaders' meeting, but a place for economies to incubate ideas throughout the year," he told AFP. US officials hope that next year will bring Trump's return, but it may matter little if protectionist and nationalistic trends persist and the United States and China continue butting heads. "APEC's founding vision was already fraying," said Graham. "But the failure to agree a communique is a final death knell for a pan-Asia-Pacific trade framework." — AFP

rival clan would fire on the absentee's home or that of fellow tribesmen, a practice known as the "degga ashairiya" or "tribal warning".

But in an age when Iraq's vast rural areas and builtup cities alike are flooded with weapons outside state control, the "degga" may be deadlier than ever. A recent dispute between two young men in a teashop in the capital's eastern district of Sadr City escalated to near-fatal proportions, leaving a 40-year-old policeman with a broken hip and severely damaged abdomen. His cousin Abu Tayba said the policeman was "wounded by a stray bullet during a 'degga' on a nearby home". "Weeks after the incident, he's still in hospital, hovering

between life and death," Tayba told AFP. Even in Baghdad, disputes often involve machine guns and rocket-propelled grenades, the city's military command warned a top Iraqi court recently. That body, the country's Superior Magistrate Council, issued a decision last week classifying "deggas" as "terrorist acts" - and therefore warranting the death penalty because of their impact on public safety. A few days later, it announced it would take legal action against three people accused of targeting a home in Al-Adhamiyah, north of Baghdad, with the deadly custom.

In Iraq, a country of 39 million people, clan origin and family name can carry weight in securing a job, finding romance, and gathering political support. They can also interfere in the work of the state, as tribal structures in some areas can be more powerful than government institutions. Last year, Iraq's tribes and the ministries of interior and justice pledged to work closer together to impose the law, but "deggas" seem to have hindered such cooperation.

Raed Al-Fraiji, the head of a tribal council in the

southern province of Basra, told AFP the warnings have become commonplace. "This happens every day. Yesterday it happened twice. The day before, three times," he said. "Two months ago, a domestic dispute between a husband and wife turned into an armed attack on the husband's home. The exchange of fire killed one person and wounded three." Fraiji said tribal influence and practices were growing because the state was seen as unreliable. "For an Iraqi citizen, the law has become weak. Meanwhile, tribes impose themselves by force. Iraq is like a jungle - so a citizen will turn to a tribe to find solutions to their problems." The country has been ravaged by years of conflict

since the US-led invasion in 2003 that removed strongman Saddam Hussein and led to the rise of militias. A decade later, the Islamic State group overran much of Iraq and was only ousted from its urban strongholds across the country late last year. Years of instability have left many of Iraq's communities flush with weapons and largely out of the state's reach, contributing to a preference for tribal mediation methods.

"The government is responsible for the increase in tribal conflict and of 'degga' cases," said Adnan Al-Khazaali, a tribal leader in Baghdad's Sadr City. "Most of the young men today are armed and even the security forces cannot stand in their way." Tribal leaders and government officials alike are clinging to the hope that the new ruling could change things. "These incidents are continually happening, and are often causing casualties," interior ministry spokesman Saad Maan told AFP. "Court rulings and their implementation," Maan said. could be the only way to secure peace.

Back in Basra, the head of the local human rights commission estimated around a dozen people were wounded or killed in "deggas" last year. "These incidents threatens social peace," said Mahdi Al-Tamimi. "It's sad and worrying, and cannot be eliminated without a solid and effective law." But Fraiji, known in Basra for his relatively progressive views, feared the court's ruling would not be enough to take on Iraq's powerful clans. "The decision will only remain ink on paper if the security forces do not enforce it on the tribes," he said. — AFP

Having met its own needs, Cairo is looking to kickstart exports and extend its regional influence. It has signed deals to import gas from neighboring countries for liquefaction at installations on its Mediterranean coast, ready for re-export to Europe. In September, Egypt signed a deal with Cyprus to build a pipeline to pump Cypriot gas hundreds of kilometres to Egypt for processing before being exported to Europe. That came amid tensions between Egypt and Turkey - which has supported the Muslim Brotherhood, seen by Cairo as a terrorist organization, and has troops in breakaway northern Cyprus.

In February, Egypt, the only Arab state apart from Jordan to have a peace deal with Israel, inked an agreement to import gas from the Jewish state's Tamar and Leviathan reservoirs. A US-Israeli consortium leading the development of Israel's offshore gas reserves in September announced it would buy part of a disused pipeline connecting the Israeli coastal city of Ashkelon with the northern Sinai peninsula. That would bypass a land pipeline across the Sinai that was repeatedly targeted by militants in 2011 and 2012. The \$15-billion deal will see some 64 billion cu m of gas pumped in from the Israeli fields over 10 years.

Egypt's General Intelligence Service is the majority shareholder in East Gas, which will earn the largest part of the profits from the import of Israeli gas and its resale to the Egyptian state. Kamal said he sees "no problem" in that, adding that the agency has held a majority stake in the firm since 2003. "That guarantees the protection of Egyptian interests," he said. Ezzat Abdel Aziz, former president of the Egyptian Atomic Energy Agency, said the projects were "of vital importance for Egypt" and would have direct returns for the Egyptian economy. They "confirm the strategic importance of Egypt and allow it to take advantage of its location between producing countries in the east and consuming countries of the West", he said.

The Egyptian state is also hoping to rake in billions of dollars in revenues from petrochemicals. Its regional energy ambitions are "not limited to the natural gas sector, but also involve major projects in the petroleum and petrochemical sectors," said former oil minister Kamal. Minister of Petroleum and Mineral Resources Tarek El-Molla recently announced a deal to expand the Midor refinery in the Egyptian capital to boost its output by some 60 percent.

On top of that, the new Mostorod refinery in northern Cairo is set to produce 4.4 million tonnes of petroleum products a year after it comes online by next May, according to Ahmed Heikal, president of Egyptian investment firm Citadel Capital. That alone will save the state \$2 billion a year on petrochemical imports, which last year cost it some \$5.2 billion. Egypt is also investing in a processing plant on the Red Sea that could produce some four million tonnes of petro-products a year - as well as creating 3,000 jobs in a country where unemployment is rife. — AFP

first commercial flight from Riyadh to Baghdad in 27 years. Iraq is seeking economic benefits from closer ties with the wealthy kingdom as it looks to rebuild after the defeat of the Islamic State (IS) group. Riyadh is keen to develop relations with Baghdad to counter the influence of regional rival Iran in Iraq.

"Both literally and figuratively, Iraq finds itself stuck between two competing neighbors: Saudi Arabia and Iran," columnist Abdulrahman Al-Rashed wrote in the leading Saudi daily Arab News yesterday. "The tripartite relationship... is tangled and complex," he wrote. "It remains to be seen how senior officials in Iraq decide they want to define this relationship and deal with the two governments."

But Iran has also been accused of interference that has caused factionalism and poor governance in Iraq. Ireland down world champions N Zealand for historic home win

Ireland claim 11th successive home win, second victory under coach Joe Schmidt

DUBLIN: Six Nations holders Ireland beat world a desperate effort to keep them out. One of those led to champions New Zealand for the first time at home on Saturday, winning a frenetic contest 16-9 in Dublin. A converted Jacob Stockdale try-his 12th in 14 Tests-proved the difference as the hosts came out on top in the clash between the two top-ranked teams in the world.

For Ireland, who claimed an 11th successive home win, it was their second victory under New Zealander coach Joe Schmidt in four meetings with the All Blacks, having recorded their first-ever in Chicago in 2016.

"We showed real character out there today," said Ireland captain Rory Best. "The difference to two years ago here in Dublin (a 21-9 loss) is we didn't score any tries. Today we did. "I am so proud of the boys." All Blacks skipper Kieran Read said there were no excuses. "The Irish were too good for us," Read told RTE. "They defended really well." The Irish were pinned back inside their five-metre line early on but produced tackle after tackle-prop Cian Healy making five in around 90 seconds-and eventually excellent work by Josh van der Flier won the hosts a penalty to clear.

Ireland then took the game to the All Blacks with New Zealand-born Bundee Aki-who had sung his adopted country's anthem in Gaelic with great gustoprominent in their attacks. Eventually the pressure told and Read strayed offside, with Johnny Sexton slotting over the penalty to give the home side a 3-0 lead in the 11th minute.

Ireland had spoken all week about how important it was not to make mistakes, even deep inside All Blacks territory, and they paid the price when Best spilled the ball inside the visitors' 22. A long kick back upfield by Ben Smith resulted in Rob Kearney ultimately being penalised and Beauden Barrett converted the penalty to level the match.

The Irish, though, had their opponents rattled and forced the Kiwis into infringement after infringement in Sexton's delightful chip over the defence which saw Kearney touch the ball down, but the try was ruled out on review as he lost control of the ball.

However, Sexton kicked the penalty for 6-3 as the game neared the half-hour mark. Within a minute the visitors were level as Barrett, having waited till his 71st Test to drop his first goal against England last week, landed another.

But it was all Ireland in attack and the All Blacks were so unnerved that referee Wayne Barnes had to warn Read that the next player to incur his ire would be yellow-carded after they committed their seventh offence of the half.

Sexton chose to kick and converted it for a 9-6 halftime lead. The All Blacks had a golden opportunity to turn the game around five minutes into the second half when Read charged down Stockdale's ambitious chip. but the rangy No 8 knocked on.

The New Zealand scrum were being steam-rollered by the Irish and coach Steve Hansen rang the changes only eight minutes after half-time, removing all of his front row. Their first job was to stand behind the posts as Stockdale found that if you keep probing, things can

He received the ball from Aki and then chipped, outstripping the defence to collect it before barging over despite Aaron Smith's desperate tackle.

It brought him a mobbing from his team-mates and regular first-choice scrum-half Conor Murray-who has not played all season due to a neck injury-to his feet while watching on from a box in the stadium.

Sexton converted brilliantly for 16-6. The All Blacks hit their straps at last but time and again the Irish repelled them, with Peter O'Mahony preventing a certain try by getting back to gather Barrett's brilliant

Somalia holds first boxing competition since civil war

MOGADISHU: Somalia has held its first boxing competition in more than three decades, with young fighters in the conflict-torn nation dreaming of a career in international rings. The three-day lightweight boxing competition that wrapped up yesterday took place in the capital Mogadishu, where athletes squared off in a ring set up on a basketball court surrounded by ruined buildings that bore witness to the country's long conflict.

The fighters were cheered by dozens of enthusiastic residents of the capital, many of whom had never seen or heard of boxing before in a country where football and basketball are far more popular, even before the war when such competitions were rare.

"Boxing in Somalia stopped after the civil war and it is now reviving with the fact that the country is recovering from the war," said Awil Gelle Ahmed, deputy chairman of the country's national boxing federation.

The last Somali competition he could recall was in 1982. "There are significant changes which affect the political and security situation of the country and this competition is part of the changes."

Ahmed said the competition involved four teams of two people, all from Mogadishu as "we don't have access to other regions in the country." The winner was 21-year-old Mustafa Mohamed Nur, who told AFP: "This was a big day for me, I have become the first Somali to win a boxing competition inside the country

"I'm very happy to see this development which was missing for a long time. Now that the boxing competition is back I think our boxers can compete with counterparts worldwide," said spectator Mohamed Ahmed Abdulahi. — AFP

KUWAIT: Former Australian National Football player, Luke Casserly, spent time at the Australian College of Kuwait (ACK) during a visit by the Socceroos team to play a friendly match against Kuwait.

Whilst at ACK, Casserly held a coaching clinic with members of the ACK Football team and spoke about his own experiences as a national player. When asked what was the best match he ever played, Casserly replied "Australia against the Czech Republic around year 2000. They were ranked no. 2 in the world and, also for us; it was the strongest Australian team because we had so many players playing in different countries. Casserly was also asked about the experiences of the Australian National team at the World Cup 2018 in Moscow. He replied, "It was an incredible experience. Thompson in control at LPGA Tour Championship

MIAMI: Lexi Thompson fired a four-under par 68 on Nelly Korda in the LPGA's season-ending Tour Championship in Naples, Florida. Thompson made four of her five birdies on the back nine at Tiburon Golf Club to put herself in position for a first win of 2018. "Golf is all about momentum," said Thompson, who can expunge the memory of a missed two-footer that cost her victory here last year. "I just tried to keep the same attitude as I did the last two days," said Thompson, adding that having her brother, Curtis, on her bag had kept things relaxed.

"He's always cracking jokes out there," she said. "It's been a nice, relaxing week just having him on the bag and having all my family and friends out here supporting me." A victory would extend Thompson's streak to six straight LPGA seasons with at least one win. Her 16-under total of 200 put her three clear of Korda, who had eight birdies in her five-under 67. It was a further three shots back to Spain's Carlota Ciganda, who had three birdies without a bogey in her three-under 69.

World number one and defending champion Ariya Jutanugarn goes into the final round 10 adrift, but she's still in position to claim the \$1 million bonus for winning the LPGA's Race to the CME Globe season-long points chase for the second time in three years.

The 22-year-old from Thailand, whose three titles this year include her second major at the US Women's Open, is already assured of claiming Player of the Year honors. She's also closing in on the Vare Trophy for lowest scoring average in 2018.

"I did a pretty good job," Ariya said after a round that featured five birdies but was marred by a doublebogey six at the 11th. "I didn't think about that at all," she added of the Globe race. "Yesterday I (thought) about that too much, worrying about that.'

Meanwhile, Charles Howell kept his bid to end an 11-year PGA Tour title drought on track Saturday, firing a two-under par 68 for a one-stroke third-round lead in the RSM Classic. Howell started the day with a three-shot cushion, and pushed the lead to five with two early birdies. But two back-nine bogeys on the par-70 Seaside

course in Sea Island, Georgia, left him little breathing room. His 16-under par total of 196 put him one clear of veteran Jason Gore and rising rookie Cameron Champ, who both carded four-under par 66s.

Webb Simpson carded a 63 to share fourth along with Ryan Blaum, who signed for a 65. Howell is a twotime winner on the PGA Tour, but his most recent trip to the winner's circle came at Riviera in 2007.

Since then he has notched 53 top-10s and six second-place finishes. It has been even longer since 44year-old Gore claimed his lone PGA title, in 2005. Since then he has seen his career disrupted by back trouble, but he is making the most this week of a sponsor's exemption and played the back nine on Saturday in five-under with three birdies and an eagle at the par-five 15th.

Champ, the big-hitting 23-year-old who won his first title at the Sanderson Farms Championship last month, seized his share of second place with a birdie at 18, where he stuck his second shot less than three feet from the pin.

His seven birdies on the day included four in a row from the seventh through the 10th, and a birdie from a greenside bunker at 15. — AFP

England take winning 2-0 lead in three-match series

PALLEKELE: Spin duo Moeen Ali and Jack Leach combined to end England's 17-year wait for a test series victory in Sri Lanka after bowling the tourists to a 57-run victory in the second Test yesterday.

Moeen struck twice in three deliveries and Leach completed his maiden five-wicket haul as the tourists took a little over 30 minutes on the final morning to seal victory and take an unassailable 2-0 lead in the threetest series. Sri Lanka resumed on 226 for seven, needing 75 to keep the series alive after their opening loss in Galle, but were all out for 243 as England completed their first away series win in tests since beating South Africa at the beginning of 2016.

The England side led by Nasser Hussain were the last to register a series victory in Sri Lanka in 2001 and Joe Root's men arrived in the country winless in their last 13 tests away from home. Their last series victory in Asia was in India six years ago and not many would have bet on England to win with a match to spare against Sri Lanka, who defeated South Africa 2-0 at home in July.

"We said we are going to come out here and play bold cricket, we were quite courageous at times and everyone's really bought into that. We are seeing the rewards now," Root said at the post-match presentation. "We have to keep looking to improve. We have seen this team grow in the last six-eight months. We are not the finished article, we want to get to number one at some point. "We have to be consistent to do that, in all parts of the world and on different surfaces.'

For the first time in a test match, spinners claimed 38 wickets with Leach and Moeen sharing 14 between them on a turning track at Pallekele. Sri Lanka's standin captain Lakmal was the only quick to pick up a wicket while the other was a run out. It was also the first time since 1973 in Karachi that no seamer took a wicket in a test for England.

When play resumed yesterday, Sri Lanka's hopes of squaring the series rested entirely on wicketkeeper Niroshan Dickwella, who was unbeaten on 27 overnight. The hosts managed to keep the England

spinners at bay for 15 minutes while picking up singles to advance towards their target but Moeen broke their resistance by dismissing Dickwella, who was caught at slip by Stokes for 35.

The off-spinner then sent back Lakmal for a duck two deliveries later before Malinda Pushpakumara spooned a catch straight back to left-arm spinner Leach. "It was a brilliant test match," said Root, who was named player of the match for his brilliant 124 in the second innings.

"We were very good for the whole game. At times we were under pressure and we responded really well to that. (I) couldn't be more proud of the guys." Sri Lanka batted well in both innings but Sam Curran's counter-attacking 64 in the first innings and Root's century under pressure in the second made the difference for England.

"Sri Lanka played brilliantly in both innings," added Root, after registering his first away series victory as captain. "At times we lost clusters of wickets but we staved very calm and managed to find ways to get back in the game and get the control back in our favour."

The third and final test of the series will start on Friday in Colombo. — Reuters

Shastri says India 'taking no prisoners' in Australia

BRISBANE: Coach Ravi Shastri vowed yesterday India will "take no prisoners" in their quest to win a Test series in Australia for the first time, but cautioned against underestimating the struggling home team.

India play four Tests and three one-day internationals from early December, with three Twenty20s before that, starting in Brisbane on Wednesday.

Despite Australia's form nosediving since the ball-tampering scandal in South Africa in March resulted in bans for Steve Smith and David Warner, the former spin great doesn't believe they have lost their aura.

"I don't think so," he said. "I always believe no team is weak at home. "We might have three or four players not playing when a team comes to India but God forbid if anyone says it is a weak Indian team because you will be surprised."

Shastri didn't want to be drawn on Australia's new "friendlier" approach to playing cricket under Justin Langer, which has seen them tone down the confrontational style that brought then so much success.

But he has instructed his team to play hard but fair. "We will be taking no prisoners, but are focusing on our game rather than what is happening outside," he said.

South Africa captain Faf du Plessis, who has fed off the Australian "in-your-face" attitude in recent years, urged them last week not to totally abandon this aspect of their game. His Indian counterpart Virat Kohli is another who has thrived previously on the combative rivalry.

Shastri did not believe the hosts' new, polite approach would affect his skipper. "He won't take his foot off the gas that is for sure," he warned.

"He loves coming to Australia, he's passionate about his game and the pitches here suit his style of play." While India have maintained home recent supremacy with a thrashing of the West Indies in Tests (2-0), ODIs (3-1) and T20s (3-0), they have not been as dominant away.

They lost 2-1 in Tests to South Africa and were then outplayed in England 4-1. "It's about seizing the moment. If you look at those Test matches (overseas), the scoreline doesn't really tell you the whole story," said

There were some very tight Test matches and we lost some big moments badly which cost us the series. "It could have been just an hour in a session over four days which made all the difference-you have to learn from that." — AFP

Hasan, Yasir set Pakistan on victory path in first Test

ABU DHABI: Medium pacer Hasan Ali and leg-spinner Yasir Shah took five wickets apiece to set Pakistan on the victory path on the third day of the first Test against New Zealand in Abu Dhabi yesterday. Hasan took his maiden five-wicket haul with 5-45 while Yasir finished with 5-110 — his 14th five-wicket feat in an innings-as New Zealand collapsed from 220-4 to 249 all out soon after tea.

That left Pakistan with 176 to win the Test and at close they were 37-0 with Imam-ul-Haq on 25 not out and Mohammad Hafeez unbeaten on eight, needing another 139 to win with all ten wickets in hand and two days to play. With the Sheikh Zayed Stadium pitch not worrisome for batting Pakistan has high hopes of enforcing a 1-0 lead in the three-match series while New Zealand can take heart from the fact that Pakistan lost a Test here against Sri Lanka by 21 runs after set 136 to win last year.

Bradley-John Watling with 59 and Henry Nicholls with 55 had defied Pakistan in the post lunch session with a fighting stand of 112 for the fifth wicket but Yasir took four wickets off just 15 balls to bring his team back into contention. Pakistan took the second new ball with the total at 201-4 soon after tea and Yasir had Nicholls caught beautifully by wicketkeeper Sarfraz Ahmed and then in his next over trapped Coiln de Grandhomme leg-before for three.

Nicholls hit three boundaries in his 171-ball resistancepacked knock. An over later, Yasir ended Watling's 145-ball defiance with a leg-before and then bowled Neil Wagner for nought. Watling had five boundaries in his knock.

Hasan then wrapped up the innings by bowling Ish Sodhi for 18 and Trent Boult caught off a miscued drive for nought to improve on his previous best figures of 4-51 against England at Lord's in May this year.

Dominant Ogier rules world rally for sixth year

COFFS HARBOUR: Dominant Frenchman Sebastien Ogier clinched his sixth world rally title yesterday in a gripping final race of the year at Australia, denying Belgian Thierry Neuville and Estonia's Ott Tanak maiden crowns.

In one of the closest seasons of recent times, the M-Sport Ford driver came to Coffs Harbour with a three-point cushion over Hyundai's Neuville and 23 in front of Toyota ace Tanak. All he needed to do was stay ahead of the Belgian and in touch with Tanak over the three days of frantic driving along dusty and slippery roads.

The experienced campaigner and his co-driver Julien Ingrassia did just that, getting an early edge when Neuville lost 40 seconds on day one after blowing a tyre. When Neuville swiped a bank and ripped a wheel from his car and Tanak clipped a tree, forcing their retirements as they took risks in a desperate bid to make up time on Sunday afternoon, the title was his before the rally finished.

Toyota (368 pts) won the constructors championship ahead of Hyundai (341), M-Sport Ford (324), and Citroen (237). Ogier admitted he drove some of the stages Sunday "like my grandma would do", knowing any mistakes could be costly at a race won by Finnish Toyota driver Jari-Matti Latvala, 32.5secs ahead of New

Zealand's Hayden Paddon in a Hyundai. "It's been an incredible season, so tough, and this is so emotional," said the Frenchman, who finished fifth in Australia. "I am so proud of what I have achieved and so proud of our team. We've had an amazing journey together." He has now won six titles in a row to move within three of the greatest driver ever, fellow Frenchman Sebastien Loeb, who claimed nine on the trot between 2004-2012. It was his last race for Ford ahead of a switch next year to Citroen on a two-year deal.

He was part of the Citroen team between 2008-11 before decamping to Volkswagen between 2013-16 when he won four world titles, and then M-Sport Ford where he won his fifth and sixth.

The rain that had been forecast for the region finally arrived early Sunday, leaving the forest roads treacherously slippery, as overnight leader Tanak found to his cost, sliding into the trees on stage two of the day.

He lost 12 seconds with teammate Latvala taking the overall lead in a race that the Estonian had to not only win but also claim bonus points in the event-closing stage to have any hope of

Slalom titan Hirscher wins Alpine opener

LEVI: Austrian star Marcel Hirscher scraped into first place after a dramatic second run in Levi, finishing in 1:51.04 during the opener of this year's Alpine ski world cup. Hirscher, gunning for a record eighth consecutive crystal globe, ended 0.09 seconds ahead of Norway's Henrik Kristoffersen, who claimed silver in the giant slalom at this year's Winter Olympics.

After a strong start Hirscher lost some time in the final sector of the descent but held on to clinch the win from Kristoffersen. But the defining moment in the race was a cruel last-minute twist in the fortunes of the French team. Both Clement Noel and Victor Muffat-Jeandet looked set for a podium finish before missing the same gate, metres from the finish line, within minutes of each other.

Both climbed back up and finished the course, ending in 26th and 25th place respectively. Noel, the 21-year-old rising star who placed fourth in slalom in Pyeongchang, ended his first run in third place in 54.65 seconds. The win is the third at Levi for Austria's titan of the slalom Hirscher, after 2013 and 2016, and a hoped-for start to the season where the 29-year-old will look to build on his seven consecutive world cup overall wins. Delph's pass sparked a frantic sequence, forcing Kalinic to dash out of his area to head away from Sterling. When Kalinic's clearance fell to Kane, the England captain's effort was headed off the line by Tin Jedvaj. The rebound fell to Kane, but Kalinic, by now back in his goal, used his legs to foil the Tottenham striker with a last-ditch save. It was more of the same at the start of the second half, but once again England couldn't find the killer touch.

That profligacy looked as though it would prove fatal when Croatia snatched the lead after 56 minutes. Kramaric was allowed time and space to turn in the area and the Hoffenheim forward took full advantage, clipping a shot that deflected off Eric Dier and looped over

Pickford's despairing dive. Southgate responded by sending on Lingard and the change reaped an instant reward as England equalised in the 78th minute. Joe Gomez's long throw was flicked on by John Stones and Kane prodded past Kalinic, leaving Lingard with the simple task of tapping in from virtually on the goal-line.

England's deserved winner arrived in the 85th minute. Ben Chilwell curled over a teasing low free-kick and Kane timed his run to perfection, guiding his shot past Kalinic

Kane's first goal in eight games for England sparked a wild celebration from Southgate, who leapt into the air as he punched the air on the touchline. Kane had joked with his fiancee this week that he would cry if England ever win a trophy, but he couldn't guarantee he would weep when they get married. Thanks to their thrilling comeback, England could bring a tear to Kane's eyes in the Finals next year.—AFP
