ABU DHABI: Pope Francis landed in the United Arab Emirates vesterday for the first ever visit by a pontiff to the Arabian Peninsula - the birthplace of Islam. The pope touched down in Abu Dhabi for the 48-hour trip during which he will meet leading Muslim clerics and hold an open-air mass for some 135,000 Catholics. The pontiff will take part in an interreligious conference today, meeting Sheikh Ahmed Al-Tayeb, the imam of Cairo's Al-Azhar, Sunni Islam's prestigious seat of learning.

Hours before he flies back to Rome tomorrow, he will lead mass in a stadium in Abu Dhabi - set to be the largest gathering ever in the UAE, according to local media. His visit comes with the UAE engaged in a longrunning military campaign in Yemen and embroiled in a diplomatic spat with nearby Qatar. Before heading to the Gulf, the pontiff urged warring parties in Yemen, where the UAE backs the government against Houthi rebels, to respect a truce agreement.

"I appeal to all parties concerned and to the international community to allow the urgent respect of established accords to ensure the distribution of food," he said. "The population is exhausted by the lengthy conflict and a great many children are suffering from hunger, but cannot access food depots, he added, in his strongest condemnation yet of the war in Yemen. "The cry of these children and their parents rises up to God."

Nearly one million Catholic migrants reside in the UAE, mostly hailing from the Philippines and India.

Two groups of MPs to meet Amir today

KUWAIT: National Assembly Speaker Marzouq Al-Ghanem said yesterday that two groups of lawmakers will meet HH the Amir today separately after they had requested such meeting. Ghanem however provided no details on the names of the two groups or the issues that will be raised, but he said he will be present in both the meetings. One of the groups will likely comprise of a number of opposition MPs, as Islamist MP Mohammad Hayef said about 11 opposition lawmakers have requested a meeting with HH the Amir directly through the Amiri Diwan.

Israel begins construction of Gaza barrier

JERUSALEM: Israel said yesterday that work to strengthen its border with the Gaza Strip had entered a new phase, with construction starting on a massive new barrier along the frontier. "Over the weekend we began building the above-ground barrier along the Gaza border," Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu told journalists before the weekly cabinet meeting. The barrier, set to stand six meters off the ground, "will prevent terrorists from Gaza from penetrating into our territory on the ground", he said in Hebrew.

Netanyahu gave no further details but


a defense ministry statement said that work on the structure began Thursday. It is set to follow the 65-km course of an underground barrier also under construction meant to neutralize the threat of cross-border tunnels built by Gaza militants. At its western end, the statement said, the above-ground barrier would join a fortified sea wall jutting into the Mediterranean, aimed at blocking Palestinian attacks by water. "It's massive and especially strong," the ministry said in an accompanying video clip.

In the last Gaza war in 2014, Israeli forces killed four Hamas militants who had managed to cross into Israel by water. Some Israeli commentators have said that Netanyahu would be unwilling to see a new uptick in hostilities with Gaza's Hamas rulers in the run-up to general

elections set for April 9. Continued on Page 24

Bomb de terre: WW1 grenade found in French potato shipment

HONG KONG: A German World War I hand grenade was found among a shipment of French potatoes imported for a Hong Kong crisp factory, police said. The device was safely detonated after it was discovered at the Calbee snacks factory Saturday. "The grenade was in an unstable condition because it had been previously discharged but failed to detonate," Superintendent Wilfred Wong Ho-hon told reporters. Police detonated it onsite, Wong said, with a police video showing bomb

disposal officers packing the grenade in a drainage channel at the factory before blowing it up.

The grenade was eight centimeters wide and weighed about one kilogram. "All the information to date suggested that the grenade was imported from France together with the other potatoes," Wong said. The grenade is believed to have been left in a trench during World War I and accidentally gathered up with potatoes planted a century later in the former battlefield.

"If it was covered in mud, the grenade was likely to have been left behind, dropped by soldiers there during the war, or left there after it was thrown," Hong Kong University military historian Dave Macri told the South China Morning Post. "The ditch was then filled up and used as a growing field, and the explosive was tossed into the mix of harvested potatoes... and sent to Hong Kong."

Hong Kong police are used to dealing with old munitions, though more usually US bombs dropped on the

Duterte double sparks frenzy at HK church

HONG KONG: A Rodrigo Duterte impersonator sparked frenzy and confusion during Sunday mass when he walked into a Hong Kong church popular with the city's Filipino community. Accompanied by Howard X - the Hong Kong-based impersonator of North Korean leader Kim Jong Un - the Filipino actor arrived at St Joseph's Church dressed in the Philippine president's signature relaxed white shirt.

Hundreds of distracted worshippers erupted into cheers and took photos of the impersonator, who goes by the stage name Cresencio Extreme.

They settled down for the hour-long service but many continued to grin and glance at him. "Is that Duterte?" whispered an incredulous-looking woman, who said the man appeared too young to be the Philippine leader. As soon as mass ended, worshippers mobbed Cresencio Extreme, many screaming and taking photos with their mobile phones as he waved at them and shook their hands. Outside the church, some examined photos of the impersonator, saying it was odd that he did not have any bodyguards and that his personality seemed off.

MPs seek to extend Sisi rule

CAIRO: Egyptian lawmakers yesterday tabled proposed constitutional changes that would allow President Abdel Fattah Al-Sisi to extend his rule beyond 2022. The bill submitted to speaker Ali Abdel Aal calls for several amendments to the constitution, including on the duration of presidential mandates currently limited to two four-year terms. The lawmakers hope to extend the length of mandates to two six-year terms, which they say would allow Sisi to run for the presidency two more times after his second term expires in 2022. One other amendment is for a return to a bicameral parliamentary system, with the establishment of a lower house. Another amendment would see the reinstatement of an information ministry, a portfolio that was abolished in 2014. — AFP

Novelist gunned down in Karbala

KARBALA: A motorcycle gunman shot dead an Iraqi novelist close to his house in the holy Shiite city of Karbala on Saturday, police and witnesses said. Alaa Mashzoub, 50, was on his way home when he was shot multiple times, police said. "The cultural scene has lost one of its special authors and creators," Iraq's Culture and Tourism Minister Abdul Amir Al-Hamdani said in a statement yesterday. Men carried Mashzoub's coffin, draped in an Iraqi flag, along a busy main road in Karbala during his funeral yesterday and others waved banners calling him a "martyr". Iraq's writers union condemned the shooting and blamed security forces for not doing enough to protect intellectuals.— Reuters

KUWAIT: Ministry of education's assistant undersecretary for scholarships and cultural relations Fatima Al-Sannan announced referring 50 law degrees issued to Kuwaitis by an Arab state to the public prosecution over suspicions of being fake.

Total debts

KD 176m health insurance paid in 2 years

KUWAIT: Health Minister Sheikh Dr Basel Al-Sabah said KD 176,644,485 was collected in expat health insurance fees during the fiscal years 2015-2016 and 2016-2017. He said lists and statistics received by the ministry are crosschecked with what is being deposited in the ministry's Central Bank account by the contracting company with regards to this contract. He said the total annual support to the company to collect expats' health insurance fees is KD 25,000 to finance health enhancement and health awareness programs presented by the ministry. — Al-Rai

1 kg trash per person a day

Kuwait Municipality statistics revealed the amount of garbage received by landfills reached 2.5 million tons during 2017/2018. The stats showed that individual output is nearby 1.6 kg per day, including 1 kg of residential trash, which had the largest percentage of solid rubbish at 65 percent, with farming waste at 18 percent and commercial waste at 17 percent. There are three landfills in Kuwait - in Jahra, Mina Abdullah and south of the Seventh Ring Road. Statistics also showed that Hawally governorate produces the largest amount of trash, followed by the Capital and Farwaniya. — Al-Qabas

Prison 'drug den' busted

An informed security source said the criminal security sector succeeded in controlling 'one of the most important drug dens' inside the Central Prison. The source said detectives succeeded in preventing the management and smuggling of drugs and illicit material from inside the prison. The source said the number of prisoners on drugs charges total 1,586 prisoners, including 116 Kuwaitis jailed for using drugs and 30 Kuwaitis for trading in drugs. The number of expats sentenced for using drugs is 142, while the number of expat drug pushers is 1,198 - 90 percent of the total. About the percentage of recovery from drug addiction inside the prison, the source said that it reached 95 percent, which is unprecedented. He said the most important items found in the Central Prison are mobile phones, and their prices have reached astronomical levels of KD 4,000 per phone. — Al-Qabas

Murder threat

Jahra police detained a Kuwaiti youth who threatened to kill his father with a firearm. The youth - who works for the education ministry - was in an abnormal condition. He is charged with attempted murder and possession of an unlicensed weapon. The father said the incident took place after a verbal exchange, as the suspect wanted money. —Al-Anbaa

Stamp machines theft

Criminal detectives are working on identifying a thief who broke into two stamp machines at the physiotherapy hospital, stealing money and stamps before escaping. The administrative supervisor of the hospital called police and told them about the incident, adding that KD 607 and a large number of stamps were missing. — Al-Rai

Smuggling foiled

Nuwaiseeb customs prevented a Kuwaiti from leaving the country with hashish. The suspect seemed nervous and worried, so he and his car were searched and hashish was found in the car. The suspect himself was under the influence of drugs. He was sent to concerned authorities. Separately. a customs inspector was admitted in Jahra Hospital when his vehicle flipped over on Abdaly Road. The inspector - who works at Abdaly border outlet - was returning home when the accident took place. — Al-Rai

KUWAIT: Although there has been noticeable progress in Furthermore, there had been tangible work of various finding cures to some serious diseases, cancer remains one of the most deadly one. In Kuwait, proportion of cancer cases among nationals reached 183 out of 100,000 Kuwaitis, compared to 161 among women, according to official statistics (2015). The figures show that the total number of cancer patients, males and females, amounted to 2,680 in 2015. Among expatriates, there were 114 among 100,000 foreign nesses. Cancer claimed, in 2015, 8.8 million lives worldwide. residents of the country.

The disease, marked globally today as the World Cancer Day, is known as a case where human tissues swell abnormally due to dysfunction in genes, affecting various organs. Cancerous cells expand to neighboring ones causing tumors, largely curable if detected at an early stage. Therefore, it is quite necessary to guide people about early medical examination.

On the occasion, Deputy Chairman of the Cancer said that Kuwait, since the 2010 international conference trained scores of students on early detection of the disease, in addition to training hundreds of doctors and nurses.

'Once-in-a-century' floods hit Australia

'The volume of water is just incredible. Downstairs is gone, the fridge and freezer are floating'

into rivers and forced thousands to abandon their homes in northeast Australia, with authorities warning of tornadoes and more rain over the next few days. Australia's tropical north experiences heavy rains during the monsoon season at this time of the year, but the recent

downpour has surged far above normal levels. Thousands of residents in the city of Townsville in Queensland were without power and cut off by flooded roads. More severe weather could whip up tornadoes and destructive winds in the days ahead, Bureau of Meteorology state manager Bruce Gunn told reporters yesterday. Up to 20,000 homes are also at risk of being inundated if the rains continue. Military personnel were delivering tens of thousands of sandbags to affected locals, as Queensland Premier Annastacia Palaszczuk

SYDNEY: Once-in-a-century floods have turned streets warned residents to be careful. "It's basically not just a one in 20-year event, it's a one in 100-year event," she told reporters Saturday.

> The Bureau of Meteorology said a slow-moving monsoonal trough was sitting above Queensland, with some areas expected to receive more than a year's worth of rain before conditions ease. Bureau meteorologist Adam Blazak told AFP the heavy downpours could continue until Thursday, while floodwaters would take some time to recede even when the rains lessen.

'Never seen anything like this'

The region receives an average of some 2,000 millimeters of rain annually but some towns were already on track to pass that. The town of Ingham, north of Townsville, received 506 mm of rain in 24 hours between Saturday and Sunday, of which 145 mm fell in just one hour, Blazak said. "I've never seen anything like this," Townsville resident Chris Brookehouse told national broadcaster ABC, adding that his house was flooded with water more than one meter deep.

"The volume of water is just incredible. Downstairs is gone, the fridge and freezer are floating. Another five or six steps and upstairs is gone too." Blazak said that with adverse weather predicted to continue for up to 72 hours, some regions could see record-breaking levels of rainfall. There has been a silver lining to the deluge, with drought-stricken farmers in western Queensland welcoming the soaking.

"It is a welcome relief, especially in our western communities, to not only get the rain but also to fill up their dams," Palaszczuk said yesterday. "We're getting food

supplies in there. We still have many roads that are cut around those areas." The deluge comes amid a severe drought in the eastern inland of the vast Australian continent, including parts of Queensland state, that's left gra-

ziers struggling to stay afloat. Extreme heatwaves during the southern hemisphere summer have also led to maximum-temperature records being broken in some towns. High temperatures are not unusual in Australia during its arid southern hemisphere summer, with bushfires a common occurrence.

But climate change has pushed up land and sea temperatures and led to more extremely hot days and severe fire seasons. In the southern states of Victoria and Tasmania, firefighters in recent days have been battling numerous bushfires threatening homes and

Iran warns EU not to force 'strategic leap' on missile range

TEHRAN: The deputy chief of Iran's Revolutionary Guards has warned Europe against forcing the Islamic Republic into boosting the range of its missiles by trying to halt their development. "If the Europeans, or anyone else, want to conspire to disarm Iran of missiles, we will be forced to make a strategic leap," the guards' deputy commander Brigadier-General Hossein Salami said on state TV on Saturday.

"All that hear me today, come to terms with the new reality of Iran's missile might: there are no obstacles or technical limitations to us increasing (their) range," he added. The Islamic Republic develops its missile technology according to a "defensive strategy" which changes according to need, he said. Earlier Saturday, Iran announced the "successful test" of a new cruise missile with a range of over 1,350 kilometers, coinciding with the anniversary of the country's 1979 Islamic

Defense Minister Amir Hatami said the Hoveizeh cruise missile had successfully hit its targets, calling it the "long arm of the Islamic Republic of Iran". Iran reined in most of its nuclear program under a landmark 2015 deal with major powers, but has kept up development of its ballistic missile technology. Washington withdrew from the accord in May and reimposed sanctions against Iran, citing the missile program among its reasons.

European governments have stuck by the agreement, although some have demanded a new section to address Iran's ballistic missile program and its intervention in regional conflicts including Yemen. Iran has voluntarily limited the range of its missiles to 2,000 kilometers, but that is still enough to hit its arch-enemy Israel and US bases in the Middle East.

Washington and its allies have accused Tehran of pursuing enhanced missile capabilities that also threaten Europe. Tehran denies this, insisting its missile program is "purely defensive." The weapon tested Saturday takes its name from a city in the southwestern province of Khuzestan that was devastated in the 1980-1988 war against Saddam Hussein's Iraq. Salami on Saturday warned world powers "not to seek (new) negotiations or make recommendations or requests on Iran's missile power". "Our enemies only understand the language of force," he said. "If you cannot talk to them in that language, they will use it to talk to you." — AFP

Virginia governor now denies appearance in racist school photo

WASHINGTON: Ralph Northam, the Democratic governor of the US state of Virginia, changed his story Saturday about appearing in a racist 1984 yearbook photo and insisted he will not resign from office. Northam held a press conference to say that he in fact was not one of the men in a photo from his university yearbook depicting two people - one in blackface, the other dressed in a Ku Klux Klan robe and hood.

"In the hours since I made my statement yesterday, I reflected with my family and classmates from the time and affirmed my conclusion that I am not the person in that photo," he told reporters, a day after saying he had appeared in the picture without specifying which of the individuals he was. Northam added that while he had not appeared in the photo, "many actions that we rightfully recognize as abhorrent today were commonplace" and he was not surprised such material made its way to the yearbook.

He said he did not know why it appeared on his page, adding: "I had nothing to do with the preparation of the yearbook, nor did I buy one. "And so this was the first time — yesterday evening was the first time I saw this photo. It was shocking and it was horrific." The governor, who began his four-year term in 2018, did admit however that he had applied shoe



polish on his face on at least one occasion to imitate Michael Jackson during a dance contest held that same year, which he went on to win. "I look back now and regret that I did not understand the harmful legacy of an action

like that," he said.

On Friday, a website published a photograph from Northam's medical school yearbook "in a costume that is clearly racist and offensive," the governor said in a statement soon after the picture surfaced. "I am deeply sorry for the decision I made to appear as I did in this photo and for the hurt that decision caused then and now," Northam said. The admission prompted calls for him to resign — including from several Democratic presidential candidates.

"We made the decision to let Governor

Northam do the correct thing and resign this morning," the Virginia branch of the Democratic Party said on Twitter Saturday. "We have gotten word he will not do so this morning." Senator Cory Booker, an African-American 2020 presidential hopeful, was one of the first big name Democrats to react. "These images arouse centuries of anger, anguish, and racist violence and they've eroded all confidence in Gov. Northam's ability to lead. We should expect more from our elected officials. He should resign," he tweeted Friday.

California Senator Kamala Harris, another African-American running for president, tweeted that "the stain of racism should have no place in the halls of government." Other big-name Democrats such as Joe Biden and Elizabeth Warren also called for his departure. — AFP

Venezuela's Guaido pressures Maduro over humanitarian aid

The United States later said it would transport aid to Venezuela

was yesterday set to announce a date for the arrival of humanitarian aid to the crisis-wracked country — a path President Nicolas Maduro believes will lead to a US-led military intervention. A day earlier, National Assembly head Guaido and socialist leader Maduro held competing mass rallies in the capital Caracas, ten days after Guaido stunned the world by declaring himself "interim president" of the oil-rich nation.

During the protest, Guaido announced the installation of collection centers for medicine and food in neighboring Colombia and Brazil. The United States later said it would transport aid to Venezuela in response to a request by Guaido. The 35-year-old received a boost before the demonstration had even started when an air force general became the highest ranking officer to abandon Maduro and recognize Guaido as the country's true leader.

US National Security Advisor John Bolton responded to that in a tweet calling on "all military members to follow General (Francisco) Yanez's lead." The United States recognized Guaido as Venezuela's interim president on January 23 while four major European nations – Britain, France, Germany and Spain — have said they will do likewise unless Maduro calls presidential elections by midnight on Sunday.

'Let's have elections'

Speaking at a pro-regime demonstration marking 20 years since his predecessor Hugo Chavez came to power, Maduro ignored those demands and instead reiterated his call to bring forward legislative elections slated for the end of 2020 to this year. "They (the opposition) want to bring forward elections, let's have elections," he said. Maduro, making his first public

CARACAS: Venezuelan opposition leader Juan Guaido appearance since a military parade in August when he claimed to have been targeted in an attempted assassination, accused Guaido of being a US "puppet" in a coup d'etat attempt. The National Assembly is the only one of Venezuela's five government branches controlled by the opposition. Guaido had earlier urged the armed forces to allow humanitarian aid from abroad into the country. "You, soldier... have the decision in your hands" to allow it in or not, said Guaido.

> Under Maduro's stewardship, oil-dependent Venezuela has lurched into an economic crisis that has left the country suffering from hyperinflation and shortages of food and medicine. But he refuses to let aid into Venezuela, claiming it would precede a US-led military intervention.

'Decisive'

Guaido also called for a new demonstration on February 12, and another protest to push for the entry of humanitarian aid. Speaking at the European Union's headquarters in the east of the capital, he said this month "should be decisive." The rival Caracas rallies, separated by 10 kilometers (six miles), attracted huge

Carlos Morales, a 62-year-old who voted for Chavez in 1998 but now says socialism only brings "misery," attended a pro-Guaido rally with his wife. "This is the leader that all Venezuelans hoped for, a new leader, young, who is not contaminated," he added. At the pro-Maduro demonstration, Virginia Rondon, 69, hummed songs that glorified Chavez, and reminisced about his socialist revolution, saying: "I never experienced anything more beautiful in all my years."

Others denounced the specter of US intervention

and called on the United Nations to halt "Trump's war." Early on Saturday, General Yanez said in a social media video that he disavowed Maduro's "dictatorial" authority and recognized Guaido as the acting president. The air force high command strategic planning director said "90 percent of the armed forces don't support the dictator.'

His defection is "a hard blow" to Maduro, said Rocio San Miguel, an expert on the Venezuelan military. Later, in another video, retired Major General Jorge Oropeza, former air force general commander, also said he recognized Guaido as acting president. Oropeza and Yanez were also joined by Jonathan Velasco, Venezuela's ambassador in Iraq. —AFP

Trapped in shrinking holdout, IS turns to human shields

BAGHOUZ: On a rooftop near the front line with the Islamic State group's collapsing caliphate in eastern Syria, a US-backed fighter and his comrades sip tea as they await orders to restart the battle. The Syrian Democratic Forces halted their ground assault on IS's final shreds of territory last week, saying the jihadists are increasingly using civilians as human shields to block the advance.

In the desert hamlet of Baghouz, held mostly by the SDF, 22-year-old Mohammed Ibrahim Mohammed points towards a dirt mound separating areas under their control and the jihadists. "Since we arrived to this point almost six days ago we haven't moved forward," explained the young fatigue-clad man from the nearby town of Hajin, who joined the SDF just five months ago. "The fighting has stopped as we wait for the remaining civilians to leave," he said.

Just a few dozen meters away, on the other side of the dirt berm, trucks, motorcycles and cars driven by IS fighters zip along the front line and out towards white tents further away, surrounded by women wearing long black robes. "These are all Daesh houses," said Mohammed, using an Arabic acronym for IS. "Sometimes we see women coming to take wood" from nearby palm trees, he said.

The streets of Baghouz, which the SDF entered two

weeks ago, are lined with the burnt-out skeletons of cars and bullet-pocked buildings, some of them completely destroyed. SDF fighters group in clusters around some of the structures, tending small fires and exchanging small talk and cigarettes. Others perch on balconies and roofs with a view over the other side. On one terrace, a fighter uses binoculars to a get a closer look at jihadists just a stone's throw away.

As the SDF, with air support from the US-led coalition, ramped up its offensive in recent weeks, thousands of civilians have poured out of the beleaguered jihadist-held pocket. More than 36,000 people, mostly women and children from jihadist families, have fled since December via humanitarian corridors opened up by the SDF, according to the Britain-based Syrian Observatory for Human Rights. That figure also includes some 3,100 jihadists, the war monitor added.

'Civilians on the front lines'

But while hundreds of people a day reached SDFheld territory early last month, the flow has slowed to a trickle. Recent arrivals say there are still many civilians and foreign fighters in the besieged pocket of territory. With the final push paused, the eerie quiet is only broken by intermittent gunfire and the occasional roar of a coalition airstrike or artillery fire targeting jihadist positions. In the neighboring village of Al-Shaafa, the SDF's spokesman for the Deir Ezzor region said the assault has been put on hold to protect civilians. "The jihadists are using the civilians as human shields to block our advance," Adnan Afrin told AFP.

That has forced women and children, including members of fighters' families, to remain close to the battle. "They are putting the civilians on the front lines," he said, adding that airstrikes and artillery continued to

target positions further back, "where the jihadists are concentrated". IS has shown a pattern of trapping civilians among its fighters in order to slow offensives as its cross-border "caliphate", proclaimed in 2014, has withered under multiple offensives.

As the jihadists withdraw, they leave minefields and booby traps to slow their attackers and prevent civilians from escaping. To help protect those that remain cornered, the SDF is pushing to open new "safe corridors" to help civilians escape before the US-backed force delivers the final blow, said Afrin. And while SDF leaders prefer not to speculate on when the battle against the jihadists will finish, they are clear it will end by military means. "We do not negotiate with terrorists," Afrin said. — AFP

SAN SALVADOR: Polls opened yesterday in El Salvador's presidential elections amid heavy security as voters look for change in a country beset by gang violence and widespread poverty. Nayib Bukele, the 37year-old former mayor of San Salvador, is the frontrunner in a race that could upend the nearly three decade old grip of the country's two largest parties on Salvadoran politics.

Rigorous security was in place as polling stations opened at 7am (1300 GMT). Some 5.2 million people are elegible to vote at the more than 1,500 election centers. Some 23,000 police officers and 15,000 soldiers have been deployed to protect the sixth presidential election since democracy was restored in the country in 1992 after 12 years of bloody civil war between state security forces and leftist guerrillas.

Should Bukele, who represents the conservative Grand Alliance for National Unity (GANA) party, win it would put to an end three decades of domination by the rightwing Nationalist Republican Alliance (ARENA) and leftist Farabundo Marti Front for National Liberation (FMLN). His main challenge is expected to come from 42-year-old supermarket magnate Carlos Calleja, repre-

If he does win, though, he will have to form an alliance with the right, which dominates congress. He has promised to increase investment in education and fight corruption but his main task will be to implement new programs to confront insecurity. El Salvador is one of the most violent countries in the world with a murder rate of 51 per 100,000 citizens. It has been battered by gang violence, which authorities say were the source of most of the 3,340 murders reported last year. Gangs are said to have 70,000 members, 17,000 of whom are behind bars.

'Daring security solutions'

"The new president must offer daring security solutions," Carlos Carcach, an analyst and professor at the Higher School of Economy and Business in El Salvador,

told AFP. Another challenge will be to reduce illegal immigration to the United States given President Donald Trump has threatened to cut off aid if the stream of Central American migrants heading there is not stopped. During the last few months of 2018, more than 3,000 Salvadorans joined caravans marching towards the US, fleeing gangs and a lack of employment.

"You think and rethink about whether or not it's worth staying in this country or have the courage to go and try your luck in another," Sergio Hernandez, a 41-year-old carpenter told AFP. "It's terrible with the gangs, someone has to do something because it's unbearable." The other main worry for Salvadorans is the economy. Although it grew by 2.6 percent in 2018, its biggest rise in five years, that is considered insufficient to cover the demand for new employment.

The election winner will have to juggle the need to raise taxes to cover an external debt of more than \$9.5 billion while trying to maintain social programs in a country where the minimum wage of \$300 a month is barely enough to buy food. "The challenge for the new leader is to satisfy the demand for fairer salaries and avoid the social exclusion that forces many to flee the country," said Raul Moreno, an economics professor at the state university. Just over 30 percent of El Salvador's 6.6 million inhabitants live below the poverty line. — AFP

Yemen's warring parties meet to discuss stalled troop withdrawal

DUBAI/ADEN: Representatives from both sides in the Yemen conflict met on a ship on the Red Sea yesterday in a UN-led push to implement a stalled troop withdrawal from Yemen's main port of Hodeidah as agreed at December peace talks, a UN official told Reuters. The United Nations is overseeing the implementation of a ceasefire and troop withdrawal accord in Hodeidah, the main entry point for most of Yemen's imports, in the hope it will lead to a political solution to the almost four-year war.

The warring parties were meant to withdraw their forces by Jan. 7 as part of efforts to avert a full-scale assault on Hodeidah, but have failed to do so as the Iranian-aligned Houthi group and the Saudi-backed government disagree on who should control the city and ports. Yesterday's meeting was the third time the UNled Redeployment Coordination Committee (RCC) convened since it was formed in December, bringing together the Houthis with the Saudi-backed, internationally recognized Yemeni government and UN mediators.

The parties met on a UN ship because attempts to convene the third meeting in territory held by coalition forces failed because the Houthis were unwilling to cross the frontline, sources have told Reuters. The first two meetings were held in territory under Houthi control, after which the head of the UN mission tasked with overseeing the deal, Patrick Cammaert, shuttled between the two parties.

The vessel picked up a delegation from Yemen's internationally recognized government at an offshore meeting point in the Red Sea before sailing to Hodeidah to pick up the Houthi delegation, a UN statement said on Saturday. The spokesman for the Yemeni government's delegation to the RCC, Sadiq Dweid, told Reuters the committee had discussed Cammaert's proposals for the troop withdrawal at yesterday's meeting. "The meetings will continue," he said. The truce has largely held in Hodeidah, but clashes have increased in recent weeks and the UN Yemen Envoy Martin Griffiths has urged all parties to reduce tensions. Violence has continued in other parts of the country not subject to the deal. Griffiths' office told Reuters the meeting had begun yesterday.

The conflict, widely seen in the region as a proxy war between Saudi Arabia and Iran, has been bogged down in military stalemate for years. A Sunni Muslim Arab coalition led by Saudi Arabia and the United Arab Emirates intervened in Yemen in 2015 to try to restore the government of Abd-Rabbu Mansour Hadi after it was ousted from power in the capital Sanaa by the Houthis in

The Houthis, who say they are enacting a revolution against corruption, control most urban centres in the poorest Arabian Peninsula nation while Hadi's government controls the southern port of Aden and string of coastal towns. Pope Francis said yesterday he is following the humanitarian crisis in Yemen with great worry and urged all sides to respect international agreements and ensure food reaches suffering Yemenis. — Reuters

Thousands protest in support for Turkey hunger strikers

ISTANBUL: Thousands of protesters yesterday joined a rally in Istanbul called by a pro-Kurdish party to show support for hunger strikes against prison conditions of Kurdish militant leader Abdullah Ocalan. The protesters gathered at a square in Bakirkoy on the European side of Istanbul, with police tightening security measures.

"I am saluting my friends resisting in prisons. They are our honor, they are not alone," Fahit Ulas, a supporter of the Peoples' Democratic Party (HDP). "If needed we will sacrifice our bodies for this cause. We have no fear," he added. Some 250 prisoners all over Turkey have launched hunger strikes in support of HDP lawmaker Leyla Guven, who wants to pressure the Turkish government to allow Ocalan to hold regular meetings with his lawyers and family members.

Ocalan, one of the founders of the outlawed Kurdistan Workers' Party (PKK), has been serving a life sentence on a prison island off Istanbul since his 1999 capture. The 55-year-old Guven was jailed in January 2018 for her criticism of Turkey's military operation against a Syrian Kurdish militia. Last week, a Turkish court in Kurdish majority city Diyarbakir freed her under judicial supervision. Guven, who entered the 88th day of her hunger strike yesterday, launched the protest move on

November 8 while in jail. She told AFP in an interview on Wednesday that she would press on with the hunger strike at home. Garo Paylan, an HDP MP who joined the Istanbul protest, said choosing a hunger strike was a "last remedy," hoping Guven's demand would be met as soon as possible.—AFP

UK PM May says she's 'armed with a fresh' Brexit mandate

Attempts to get rid of the agreement's unpopular backstop provision

LONDON: British Prime Minister Theresa May said yesterday she would be "armed with a fresh mandate and new ideas" when she meets European Union negotiators over her Brexit deal. EU officials have insisted that the deal is not open for renegotiation. But May wrote in the Sunday Telegraph that she would be "battling for Britain and Northern Ireland" in her efforts to get rid of the agreement's unpopular backstop provision.

"If we stand together and speak with one voice, I believe we can find the right way forward," she said. The backstop is intended to ensure there is no return to a hard border with Ireland, but Brexit supporters fear it will keep Britain tied to the EU's customs rules. MPs voted last week to send May back to Brussels to renegotiate the clause, suggesting her deal would then be able to pass after it was roundly rejected in parliament last month. "I am now confident there is a route that can secure a majority in the House of Commons for leaving the EU with a deal," she wrote.

"When I return to Brussels I will be battling for Britain and Northern Ireland, I will be armed with a fresh mandate, new ideas and a renewed determination to agree a pragmatic solution". The EU insists that the deal "remains the best and only way to ensure an orderly withdrawal," but with the clock running down until the March 29 exit date the risks of a no-deal Brexit for both Britain and the bloc are coming into sharp focus.

May said opposition leader Jeremy Corbyn "also believes the potential indefinite nature of the backstop is an issue", and that the EU has "already accepted the principle of 'alternative arrangements' superseding the backstop should it ever be required." The backstop would kick in if Britain and the EU have not agreed a trade deal on their future relationship after a time-limited transition

period of up to two years. The prime minister rejected accusations that plans to reopen the backstop talks risked upsetting the Irish peace process. "Nor do I have time for those who believe the verdict passed by the British people in 2016 should be overturned before it is even implemented," she added, referring to the rump of MPs calling for a second referendum. "I'm determined to deliver Brexit, and determined to deliver on time — on March 29, 2019," she wrote. May has promised MPs that she will bring any revised deal back to be voted on by MPs on February 13.

Exit from Brexit

While German Foreign Minister Heiko Maas would like to see an "exit from Brexit" - Britain abandoning its plan to leave the European Union - he said in a newspaper interview on Sunday that he saw such an outcome as extremely unlikely. In the interview with the Funke media group, Maas repeated the EU's position that the withdrawal agreement thrashed out between Brussels and London, which was rejected by Britain's parliament last month, could not be renegotiated.

He added that Britain's only path to avoiding a so-called "hard Brexit", in which London exited automatically on March 29 with no transitional arrangements in place to ensure the continued flow of goods, medicines and transport links, was to accept the existing deal. With less than two months to go until it automatically leaves the bloc, Prime Minister Theresa May's government has yet to agree an exit agreement or a position on its desired future relationship with the soon-to-be

But Maas rejected British calls for further concessions to be offered to make the deal, negotiated over two years,



more palatable to its critics in London. "The agreement we negotiated with Britain is already a compromise - especially regarding the arrangements for Northern Ireland," he said. "There must not be a hard border to the Republic of Ireland... We cannot risk the Northern Ireland conflict flaring up again."

The lack of progress has led some to call on London to

exercise its right to revoke the announcement of its intention to leave that it made two years ago, which would leave it as a full-fledged member of the bloc. Asked if he could envisage this happening, Maas was skeptical. "That's what I'd like the most," he said. "But we should have no illusions about this. The likelihood of an exit from Brexit is extraordinarily low." — Agencies

South Africa disappointed after Western powers criticize policy

JOHANNESBURG: South Africa expressed disappointment yesterday after the United States and other Western powers wrote to President Cyril Ramaphosa urging him to tackle corruption, and said those countries had breached diplomatic protocol.

The Sunday Times newspaper reported that the United States, Britain, Germany, the Netherlands and Switzerland, had sent a joint memorandum to Ramaphosa through their diplomatic missions in Pretoria to warn that foreign investment was at risk unless South Africa takes tangible action against perpetrators of corruption and other serious crimes.

The countries also expressed concern over what they called "obstacles" to foreign investment such as "constant changes of goal posts" in the regulatory framework for mining and black economic empowerment targets, the paper said. It did not say when the memo was sent. South Africa's Department of International Relations and Cooperation (DIRCO) said it had noted "with disappointment the dispatching of a memorandum to the office of the presidency" by the five embassies. "This is a departure from established diplomatic practice," DIRCO said in a statement.

"In terms of acceptable diplomatic practice, protocol and convention, diplomatic missions are expected to communicate to the receiving state by means of a note verbale (diplomatic note) conveyed through the department," it added. According to the Sunday Times, the five countries said that there should be a "clear, unqualified and manifest political commitment to the rule of law, the independence of the judiciary and to honest and ethical business practices." — Reuters

French priest jailed for sexual abuse

COLMAR: A French priest was Friday sentenced to five years, two without parole, for sexually assaulting four young female parishioners, one of whom was just nine when the offences started, and embezzling 100,000 euros (\$115,000) to pay one of his victims. The trial was held behind closed doors at Colmar Criminal Court, in northeast France, which publicly announced the sentence late Friday.

The 60-year-old cleric, who will have to spend at least two years behind bars and be under restrictions for the rest of his term, could have faced up to 10 years in prison. The priest will also have to undergo psychological treatment, which he has already started, according to his lawyers. Under the judgment, he is forbidden from contacting his victims or any activity involving minors. He is also barred from staying in the Alsace region, where the offences were committed.

His sentence was lighter than that sought by the public prosecutor, who had asked for four years in prison followed by three years under a supervision order. The trial was held behind closed doors at the request of three of the four victims, who were minors at the start of the offences, the youngest just nine.

the youngest just nine.

The attacks, which continued after three of the victims were adults, took place between 2001 and 2006 and between 2011 and 2016. The priest, who was remanded in custody for three months at the start of the case in September 2016, "bitterly regrets the crimes that he has acknowledged (...) and offers his apology to the victims and to people (...) injured by such intolerable acts," his lawyer Thierry Moser said in a statement. He had admitted to having diverted more than 100,000 euros in money destined for the Church and transferred it to one of the victims, then an adult, in exchange for sexual favors. In total, he paid her more than 240,000 euros, including a portion of his personal wealth. — AFP

Head of Ukraine's new orthodox church enthroned

KIEV: The leader of the new independent Ukrainian Orthodox Church was enthroned in a ceremony in Kiev yesterday, formalizing a break with the Russian Orthodox Church that has enraged Moscow. During the three-hour event in the gold-decked 11th-century Saint Sophia Cathedral, Metropolitan Yepifaniy became head of the Church, having been elected by bishops last year.

The 40-year-old is a critic of Moscow's religious influence in Ukraine and has helped organize humanitarian aid for Kiev's army in its struggle against Russian-backed separatist movements. President Petro Poroshenko, who had promised an independent church ahead of this year's presidential election, attended the ceremony along with other top officials. Last week, he finally confirmed he was running for re-election in the March 31 poll.

Poroshenko described yesterday's ceremony as the "completion" of the process to create the Church, in comments carried by Ukrainian TV channels as part of a live broadcast. The new church would be independent of the state, he said. For more than 300 years, the Patriarch of Moscow controlled part of the Ukrainian Church. Kiev now considers this influence unacceptable given its ongoing war with Russia-backed rebels in the east that has already killed around 13,000 people. The Russian-controlled branch of the Orthodox Church in Ukraine has denounced the establishment of a unified church, breaking ties with the Istanbul-based Ecumenical Patriarchate of



Constantinople over the issue. The Constantinople Patriarch's decision to recognize the Ukrainian Church's

independence from Russia was a huge blow to Moscow's spiritual authority in the Orthodox world. — AFP

Bashir vows rural development as new protests loom

KHARTOUM: Sudanese President Omar al-Bashir yesterday pledged to bolster rural development, as he seeks to face down anti-government demonstrations that have rocked cities and villages. The veteran leader has been on a charm offensive with rallies across the country in a bid to head off weeks of protests seen as the biggest threat to his 30-year rule.

Addressing hundreds of villagers in North Kordofan state at a televised event he promised to bring clean drinking water to rural areas "across Sudan" and open a new hospital in the region. The speech came after he inaugurated a new 340-kilometre (210 miles) highway linking North Kordofan to Omdurman, the twin city of Khartoum. "Building such a road in present economic conditions is not an easy thing to achieve," said Bashir, after being

escorted to the stage by dozens of men on camels.

"Along this road we will bring electricity to boost the region's growth." Hours later Bashir addressed another rally where he called on the country's young men and women to help develop the country. "The youth, for whom we have built universities, have to be ready to continue with the mission of building a new Sudan," he said. The statement came after Prime Minister Moutaz Mousa Abdallah on Saturday called the protest movement a "respectable youth movement" and said its voice should be heeded.

Demonstrations erupted in Sudan in December after a government decision to triple the price of bread unleashed frustrations at years of deteriorating living conditions and growing hardship. Officials say 30 people have died in protest-related violence, while rights group Human Rights Watch says at least 51 have been killed. Bashir's attempts to rally support have so far failed to halt the wave of discontent, with the group leading the demonstrations calling for fresh protests over the next few days starting last night. Bashir and other senior Sudanese officials have repeatedly said that the government can be changed only through elections. The leader, who came to power in an Islamist-backed coup in 1989, is considering running for a third elected presidential term in polls due next year. — AFP



UK set to appoint top cop as new anti-slavery chief

LONDON: One of Britain's most senior police officers is set to be appointed the country's new anti-slavery chief almost nine months after the inaugural commissioner resigned citing government interference, the Times newspaper said yesterday. Sara Thornton, head of the National Police Chiefs' Council (NPCC) since 2015, will take up the role later this year, the British newspaper reported.

Britain's Home Office (interior ministry) said it could not confirm the appointment, and that a candidate would be "announced shortly". Thornton could not be reached for comment. A source with knowledge of the situation told the Thomson Reuters Foundation yesterday that Thornton's name had been "heard on the grapevine" but no appointment has been confirmed

Kevin Hyland was appointed as the inaugural independent anti-slavery commissioner in 2014 as part of Britain's landmark Modern Slavery Act, but he resigned last May and left the post in August, saying he had been frustrated by government meddling. Hyland was widely hailed for helping to champion the world-first law and pushing the United Nations to adopt a target to end slavery by 2030 among a set of global goals agreed in 2015.

Britain's push to be the world leader in tackling slavery has been "thwarted" by the delay in replacing Hyland, which has hindered policy advances and scrutiny of the government, sources told the Thomson Reuters Foundation in December. The Home Office has advertised twice for the role - a three-year contract with a salary of up to 140,000 pounds (\$178,000). Britain was in December urged by law-makers to scrap its search for a new anti-slavery chief and address concerns about the independence of the role before readvertising. In a government-ordered review of the law, three politicians said they were worried by reports that Hyland had not been free to criticize Britain's anti-slavery efforts and the job advert for his successor raised doubts about the role's independence. — Reuters

US special envoy Zalmay Khalilzad spoke of a "draft framework" for a deal but warned major hurdles — including any US withdrawal — remain. Ghani has refused to accept a "temporary" deal. "Even if I have one drop of blood in my body, I am not going to surrender to a temporary peace deal," he told Afghan commandos in Kabul yesterday. Railways minister Piyush Goyal on Friday had claimed to have improved rail safety after a series of deadly accidents spooked the country.

Goyal told parliament that all unmanned rail crossing had been eliminated, one of the main causes of train collusions in India. India's railway network is the main form of long-distance transport, but has been lagging in improving its infrastructure, often leading to disasters. Nearly 150 people were killed after a passenger train derailed in Bihar in 2016, the deadliest accident in recent years. — AFP





Chinese chemical firm 'misled' investigators over deadly blast

BEIJING: The Chinese chemical firm responsible for an explosion that killed 24 people and injured 21 others in northern China last year hid information and misled investigators, said local authorities in a report published yesterday. A gas leak caused the explosion last November at a PVC production plant in Zhangjiakou, a northern Chinese city in Hebei province that will host part of the 2022 Winter Olympics.

"After the accident occurred, Hebei Shenghua Chemical Industry Company did not report (the incident) to relevant government departments in accordance with regulations, concealed the accident, and misled investigators," said the emergency management department of northern Hebei province. In its report, local authorities also pointed to the company's lack of safety

measures and "chaotic" management for contributing to the blast. Those in charge of key departments were "not at the company for long periods of time" and violations of labor regulations by employees were common, including playing on their mobile phones and sleeping during work hours, said the report. Police have investigated and taken "criminal compulsory measures" against twelve employees and thirteen local officials have been "punished", the report said, without offering details.

The report also recommended Shenghua Chemical Company, a subsidiary of ChemChina, pay a 9.49 million yuan (\$1.41 million) fine. The Zhangjiakou blast is the latest alleged corporate cover-up in China, where industrial accidents are common as safety regulations are often poorly enforced. A few weeks before the explosion, a chemical spill left dozens ill in eastern Fujian province. Later that month, authorities said the company responsible for the incident had "deliberately concealed" the extent of the leak.

The Fujian Donggang Petrochemical Company had reported 6.97 tons of chemicals had spilled into the sea, when the true amount was 10 times higher. In August 2015, 165 people were killed in a chemical warehouse explosion in the port city of Tianjin. The government found that the disaster was caused by improperly or illegally stored hazardous materials. — AFP

Nepali women dies in 'menstruation hut'

KATHMANDU: A Nepali woman has died of suspected smoke inhalation while banished to a hut during her period, police said yesterday, just weeks after the deaths of a mother and two children in similar circumstances sparked outrage. Many communities in Nepal view menstruating women as impure and in some remote areas they are forced to sleep in a hut away from the home, following a centuries-old tradition known as "chhaupadi".

Parbati Bogati, 21, was found dead in a smoke-filled hut on Thursday morning in the western Doti district when her mother-in-law went to check on her. "We suspect she died due to smoke inhalation and suffocation because she closed the door of the windowless hut and lit a fire on the floor for warmth during the night," local police officer Lal Bahadur Dhami said. The body has been sent for autopsy, Dhami said. Chhaupadi was outlawed in 2005 but is still enforced in parts of Nepal, particularly in remote and conservative western regions.

The practice is linked to Hinduism and considers women untouchable during menstruation and after childbirth. Under Chhaupadi, women are barred from touching food, religious icons, cattle and men. Just three weeks ago a mother and her two sons in neighboring Bajura district died of suspected smoke inhalation while observing the tradition. Their deaths prompted locals to demolish chhaupadi sheds in their village and local authorities to warn that services would be denied to anyone forcing their daughters and daughters-in-law to follow the banned practice. Last year, Kathmandu introduced a three-months jail sentence and a 3,000 rupee (\$30) fine for anyone caught imposing chhaupadi. — AFP

Dirty money risks hit digital utopia

stonia's push to become a digital society has left it vulnerable to dirty money and sanction breaches, the country's top banking regulator has warned. The Baltic state took center stage in one of the largest-ever money laundering scandals last year - the Estonian branch of Danske Bank helped funnel money from Russia and other ex-Soviet states, a report by the Danish lender showed. Danske Bank is now being investigated in Denmark, Estonia, Britain and the United States over the 200 billion euros (\$227 billion) of suspicious payments.

The Danske debacle was rooted in old school subterfuge - offshore shell companies were used to disguise where the money was coming from. But Estonia's population of e-residents, some of whom bank in the country even though they live abroad, potentially offers a hightech route for suspect funds. "The lesson of Danske is, I hope, enough for us," Kilvar Kessler, the head of Estonia's financial watchdog, the Finantsinspektsioon, told Reuters. "You onboarded customers which were offshore companies. Now e-residents. Exactly the same questions will be asked. Who are they? Why do they need a bank account in Estonia?"

A former Soviet-occupied state on the edge of Europe, Estonia has remodelled itself as a hub for digital innovation through 'e-Estonia', a government-sponsored project to move almost all bureaucratic tasks, from voting to medical prescriptions, online. A key part of e-Estonia is e-residents, foreigners who have been given a digital identity card allowing them to access some online services such as government portals. It can also be a stepping stone to banking in Estonia, a member of both the European Union and the euro zone currency bloc.

Anyone can apply, including citizens of countries subject to US sanctions such as Iran and North Korea. Banks including Estonia's largest locally-owned lender LHV, as well as Sweden's SEB Bank and Swedbank, allow e-residents to open accounts after they prove their identity and business links to Estonia. Kessler, who has the power to withdraw a lender's license to operate, has been cautioning bankers for some time that they need to thoroughly vet e-residents before signing them on. He has stepped up his warnings since

Some 50,000-plus people hold the digital identity card but there is no public data on how many also bank in Estonia. Erki Kilu, the chief executive of LHV bank, said that while only a small number of e-residents opened a personal bank account in Estonia, the 6,000 companies registered in the country by e-residents required an account. One quarter of those bank with LHV, he told Reuters. Kilu said e-residents were subject to the same checks as other customers who lived abroad. In an email to Reuters, he said there were also "later screening and monitoring processes", declining to give further details. The bank does not open accounts for people or companies subject to sanctions.

Ainar Leppanen, responsible for SEB's retail banking in Estonia, said it took a cautious approach to foreign customers without "a clear link to the country", applying additional measures such as "background checks". He said customers were checked against international sanctions lists and described the number of e-resident customers of SEB as "insignificant".

A spokeswoman for Swedbank said it performed "due diligence ... to ensure that their businesses have a clear connection to Estonia" before taking on e-resident customers. Some banks, however, generally steer clear. "We don't see a business case here right now," said Erkki Raasuke, chief executive of Luminor, one of the largest banks in the Baltics. "The potential downside, if some of the anti-money laundering or sanctions-related risks would materialize, can be significant."

Cryptocurrencies

Closer scrutiny of e-residents is part of a wider effort to curb financial crime by authorities in Estonia since the Danske scandal. In addition to the e-residency program, the country's digital pedigree - video calling company Skype was built there - and pro-business culture have made it an attractive outpost for companies working with cryptocurrencies. It typically takes just hours and an online form to open a business in Estonia and some 600 digital currency companies are registered there.

"There is a money laundering risk with cryptocurrency operators. We have made it too easy for these crypto operators now. They get a reputational benefit from their link to Estonia. We get the reputational risk," Madis Muller, Estonia's deputy central bank governor, told Reuters. Lawmakers are considering giving police the power to scrutinize cryptocurrency companies and withdraw their licenses if executives fail a "fit and proper" test of their reputation and abili-

ty to do the job.

Under proposals before parliament, cryptocurrency companies will also be required to have a business presence in Estonia, something that many lack. "I understand that most would not be able to comply and would not qualify to keep their license," said Muller. National elections in early March, however, could delay such reforms, as lawmakers would have to restart negotiations if they do not sign off the rules by February 21, when they disband. Estonia's vision of an advanced digital society open to all is a point of pride for its 1.3 million people, many of whom remember the constraints of life under Soviet rule.—Reuters



'Inkjet' solar panels to revolutionize energy

hat if one day all buildings could be equipped with windows and facades that satisfy the structure's every energy need, whether rain or shine? That sustainability dream is today one step closer to becoming a reality thanks to Polish physicist and businesswoman Olga Malinkiewicz. The 36-year-old has developed a novel inkjet processing method for perovskites - a new generation of cheaper solar cells - that makes it possible to produce solar panels under lower temperatures, thus sharply reducing costs.

Indeed, perovskite technology is on track to revolutionize access to solar power for all, given its surprising physical properties, some experts say. "In our opinion, perovskite solar cells have the potential to address the world energy poverty," said Mohammad Khaja Nazeeruddin, a professor at Switzerland's Federal Institute of Technology Lausanne, an institution on the cutting-edge of solar energy receased.

Solar panels coated with the mineral are light, flexible, efficient, inexpensive and come in varying hues and degrees of transparency. They can easily be fixed to almost any surface - be it laptop, car, drone, spacecraft or building - to produce electricity, including in the shade or indoors. Though the excitement is new, perovskite has been known to science since at least the 1830s, when it was first identified by German mineralogist Gustav Rose while prospecting in the Ural mountains and named after Russian mineralogist Lev Perovski.

In the following decades, synthesizing the atomic structure of perovskite became easier. But it was not until 2009 that Japanese researcher Tsutomu Miyasaka discovered that perovskites can be used to form photovoltaic solar cells.

Inside a raid in crackdown on critics in slums

fter Venezuelan police officers clad in black military uniforms and masks stopped 27-year-old Yohendry Fernandez at gunpoint in the Caracas slum of Jose Felix Ribas, they asked him if he had a criminal record. He replied yes. The officers then dragged him into an alley and shot him twice in the chest, killing him, according to his family and a witness. It was the afternoon of Jan 24, the day after tens of thousands of slum residents left their hill-side homes to join mass protests against President Nicolas Maduro, who they blame for an economic crisis that has left them without water, power, medicines and food.

Several dozen officers from the National Police's Special Action Force (FAES) drove into the slum in armored vehicles and on motorcycles. As they roared down the dusty streets, some opened fire as residents fled before them shouting "They're here," according to witnesses. Police snipers clambered atop tin rooftops and locals hid under beds as the gunshots rang out, the witnesses said. By dawn, the FAES unit had killed as many as 10 people, leaving with their bodies and about a dozen hooded detainees, according to four local community leaders.

Venezuela's Information Ministry, which handles all media inquiries, including on behalf of the national police, did not respond to requests for comment on the operation. Diosdado Cabello, the ruling Socialist Party's deputy head, accused the opposition of fabricating death tolls from police raids. The FAES said reports of abuses were "fake news" spread by rightwing opponents. "Our struggle is against all criminals that ravage our communities. If you fear the FAES it's because you're a criminal," the unit said on Thursday on Instagram.

Residents said the FAES officers returned to Jose Felix Ribas for the next three afternoons, spreading terror in a poor community that used to be a bastion of support for Maduro and his predecessor, the late Hugo Chavez. Five years of economic recession have turned many into Maduro's most fervent opponents. The raids, the deadliest of several in Caracas last month, show how the government has used the FAES to target critics since opposition leader Juan Guaido proclaimed himself interim president and won the support of Western powers who say Maduro is illegitimate.

Reuters spoke with a dozen witnesses, local politicians, and lawyers, along with experts who study the FAES, to provide the first detailed look at the operation. Reuters also pieced together footage of the raid posted on social media, which witnesses verified.

'Bull's eye

Initially the process was complicated and required ultra-high temperatures, so only materials that could withstand extreme heat - like glass - could be coated with perovskite cells. This is where Malinkiewicz comes in. In 2013, while still a PhD student at the University of Valencia in Spain, she figured out a way to coat flexible foil with perovskites using an evaporation method. Later, she developed an inkjet printing procedure that lowered production costs enough to make mass production economically feasible.

"That was a bull's eye. Now high temperatures are no longer required to coat things with a photovoltaic layer," Malinkiewicz told AFP. Her discovery quickly earned her an article in the journal Nature and media attention, as well as the Photonics21 Student Innovation award in a competition organized by the European Commission. The Polish edition of the MIT Technology Review also selected her as one of its Innovators Under 35 in 2015.

She went on to cofound the company Saule Technologies - named after the Baltic goddess of the sunalong with two Polish businessmen. They had to assemble all their laboratory equipment from scratch, before multimillionaire Japanese investor Hideo Sawada came on board. The company now has an ultramodern laboratory with an international team of young experts and is building an industrial-scale production site.

"This will be the world's first production line using this technology. Its capacity will reach 40,000 square metres of panels by the end of the year and 180,000 square metres the following year," Malinkiewicz said at her lab. "But that's just a drop in the bucket in terms of demand." Eventually, compact production lines could easily be installed everywhere, according to demand,

to manufacture perovskite solar panels that are made to measure.

Self-sufficient buildings

The Swedish construction group Skanska is testing the cutting-edge panels on the facade of one of its buildings in Warsaw. It also inked a licensing partnership with Saule in December for the exclusive right to incorporate the company's solar cell technology in its projects in Europe, the United States and Canada. "Perovskite technology is bringing us closer to the goal of energy self-sufficient buildings,"

said Adam Targowski, sustainability manager at Skanska.

"Perovskites have proven successful even on surfaces that receive little sunlight. We can apply them pretty much everywhere," he told AFP. "More or less transparent, the panels also respond to design requirements. Thanks to their flexibility and varying tints, there's no need to add any extra architectural elements."

A standard panel of around 1.3 square metres, at a projected cost of 50 euros (\$57), would supply a day's worth of energy to an office workstation, according to current estimates. Malinkiewicz insists that the initial cost of her products will be comparable to conventional solar panels. Perovskite technology is also being tested on a hotel in Japan, near the city of Nagasaki.

Plans are also afoot for the pilot production of perovskite panels in Valais, Switzerland and in Germany under the wings of the Oxford Photovoltaics venture. "The potential of the technology is clearly enormous," Assaad Razzouk, the CEO of Singapore-based Sindicatum Rewable Energy, a developer and operator of clean energy projects in Asia, told AFP. "Just think of all the buildings one could retrofit worldwide!" — AFP

Fear the FAES

The reporting reveals a pattern of street justice employed by FAES, set up in 2017 as an elite force to combat terrorism and organized crime, and an atmosphere of impunity. The Venezuelan Observatory of Violence, a local crime monitoring group, attributes 43 deaths to security forces during protests and raids since Jan 22, and says it is processing reports of more. Keymer Avila, a criminology professor at the Central University of Venezuela, said he had not yet verified all the deaths in Jose Felix Ribas but that 10 seemed reasonable based on his understanding of the events.

Rights groups accuse the government of using the FAES to raid Venezuelans' homes after they return from protests, with the help of tip-offs from supporters. Authorities have arrested more than 900 protesters since Jan. 21, the rights groups say. Jose Pinto, head of the Revolutionary Tupamaro Movement, a militant group that backs Maduro, told Reuters he and other so-called "colectivos" were expanding their networks of informants. They alerted police to "suspicious activity" before the Jan 23 protests, Pino said, sending them images and addresses of suspected "rightwing conspirators," which he said led to raids.

'Consequences'

On Jan. 22, according to residents, an unmarked pickup truck mounted with speakers drove through Jose Felix Ribas, a district within Caracas' sprawling Petare shantytown, broadcasting a message: "If you protest tomorrow, there will be consequences." Most said they took little heed. But six locals said the consequences became clear on Jan 24 when FAES officers pulled a 23-year-old mother, the cousin of an alleged gang leader, from her house and shot her dead. A church was sprayed with bullets. One man was executed after being handcuffed inside a vehicle, residents said.

Local politicians said authorities justified the raid as an operation against a criminal group. The government has yet to show any evidence against those killed. Paula Navas, a local political organizer, said the authorities sought to silence her community. "They traumatized children. What was the objective of this?" Navas asked. Yohendry Fernandez had been fixing motorcycles in a parking lot on the slum's main road, some 200 m from his family home.

Motorcycles were his obsession, relatives said, and videos on his Facebook page show him racing down Caracas avenues performing wheelies. He sometimes repaired motorcycles for the local police, they said. At 3 pm, just as Fernandez was about to head home, FAES officers arrived and split into groups that advanced into the barrio's upper reaches.

One group set up a blockade on a plaza where the road divided. Fernandez's home, where his wife and two children were waiting, was on the other side. After family members told his mother, Isabel Pino, that he had been arrested at the plaza, she raced to the scene and begged an officer: "Please don't hurt him, he's special." — Reuters

Dropping weapons treaty would let US update nuke arsenal

he US scrapping of the Intermediate-Range Nuclear Forces (INF) treaty with Russia could launch a new arms race, but will also allow the United States to update its nuclear arsenal, a publicly stated goal for the past year. President Donald Trump announced Friday the US was suspending its obligations under the INF treaty as of Saturday and starting a process to withdraw in six months. NATO has said that US allies "fully support" its withdrawal from the pact, and agreed that Russia's 9M729 ground-launched cruise missile systems violates the treaty.

A day later, Russian President Vladimir Putin announced a tit-for-tat withdrawal from the pact to develop "new types of weapons," calling Washington's decision "unilateral and totally unprovoked". The United States has complained about the alleged Russian violations for years. But now it's also speaking openly about its chance to upgrade its arms stock. When the United States unveiled its new nuclear policy in Feb 2018, it warned that it planned to buy two new weapons: a new type of low-power nuclear missile to be launched from a submarine, and a new type of nuclear cruise missile that would violate the INF agreement.

This new missile - which would only come into service within a decade - would only be a violation of the treaty if it were deployed, the Pentagon says. It has always stressed that a research and development program was not prohibited by the 1987 treaty with Moscow. So starting Saturday "we are no longer bound by the constraints of the Treaty," Johnny Michael, a Pentagon spokesman, told AFP Friday. The 2019 US military budget provides funds for developing this new intermediate-range land-based missile and "we are still in the research phase," the spokesman said.

In fact, the Pentagon was already preparing its response to Russian missile 9M729, with a top range of 480 km, Moscow insists. But Washington, backed by NATO allies, says that Russian missile has already been tested on much greater distances.

Johns Hopkins University's Jeffrey Pryce argues that the INF treaty favors the United States because, while it prohibits all surface-to-air missiles with a range of 500 to 5,500 km, conventional or intermediate, anything fired from a submarine or dropped by a bomber, simply is not covered. — AFP

Nissan cancels investment plan for UK plant

BRITAIN: Japanese car manufacturer Nissan announced yesterday it was cancelling plans to build its X-Trail SUV at its plant in northeast England despite Brexit assurances from the gov-

"While we have taken this decision for business reasons, the continued uncertainty around the UK's future relationship with the EU is not helping companies like ours to plan for the future," Nissan Europe Chairman Gianluca de Ficchy said in a statement. "We appreciate this will be disappointing for our UK team and partners," he added. "Our workforce in Sunderland has our full confidence."

The car giant announced in 2016 that it planned to build the model at its plant in Sunderland, but will now assemble it instead at Nissan's global production hub in Kyushu, Japan.

"Other future models planned for Nissan Sunderland Plant-the next-generation Juke and Qashqai-are unaffected" by the decision, according to the statement. —AFP

Telecoms' dilemma: Huawei or the highway?

PARIS: It's a dilemma for European telecoms firms: Should they steal a march on competitors and rapidly roll out next-generation 5G mobile networks using equipment from top supplier Huawei? Or should they heed US-led warnings of security threats and sit tight, and possibly fall behind?

Getting it right will have big consequences as 5G networks are the next milestone in the digital revolution, bringing near-instantaneous connectivity, vast data capacity and futuristic technologies.

No operator wants to be left behind, and neither do governments who see 5G technology as a future key driver of economic growth. China's Huawei has quietly become a leading supplier of the backbone equipment for mobile networks, particularly in developing markets thanks to cheaper prices.

Spearheading cutting-edge 5G equipment has also seen it make inroads into developed markets.

However, a growing number of Western states are turning their backs on Huawei, fearful that its equipment could be a Trojan horse for Beijing's intrusive security apparatus as Chinese laws require its firms to cooperate with intelligence services. Huawei strenuously denies its equipment could be used for espionage.

"Many want to avoid the Chinese but they are currently the most advanced in the area," said Victor Marcais, a telecoms and media specialist at Roland Berger consultancy. "Huawei has moved in the past few years from being the 'low cost' option to becoming the

May fights again no-deal Brexit scenario

KUWAIT: Last week the US Federal Reserve left rates unchanged at 2.25-2.5 percent, pointing to rising risks in regards to global economic growth. New language by Fed chairman Jerome Powell signaled a more patient approach to the rate-hike program, a clear shift from the December rhetoric. Powell argued that a shift in guidance is needed due to "cross currents". Among them were slower growth in China and Europe, trade tensions, the risk of a hard Brexit, and the recent federal government shutdown. In a statement on Wednesday, the FOMC claimed it "will be patient as it determines what future adjustments to the target range for the federal funds rate may be appropriate to support".

Consumer confidence

Consumer confidence in the US fell in January to its weakest level since July 2017 from 126.6 to 120.2. Missing expectations of a drop to 124, the measure gauging consumer expectations mirrored American's weakening views on current conditions. Though the figure had recently hit an 18-year high, it appears that the five-week government shutdown, continuing trade tensions with China, and major swings in US stocks have taken their toll on confidence. During the shutdown alone the index fell 7.8 points, leading many to believe the drop is due to a "shock event" which leads to temporary results. On the bright side, with the shutdown over for now and financial markets stabilizing, a rebound in confidence may be seen in the months ahead.

Looking at the bigger picture, confidence is relatively high and for good reason. The US economy grew at a 3.4 percent annual pace from July to September after surging 4.2 percent in the second quarter. The unemployment rate reached its lowest level in five decades at 3.9 percent in 2018. Still, investors have legitimate concerns. Though the government shutdown has temporarily ended, Trump remains insistent on his border wall funding, setting a deadline of Feb 15 as he continues discussions with law-



makers. Meanwhile, the world's two biggest economies the US and China - remain locked in a trade war that threatens global commerce stability.

A robust labor market

The US economy added more jobs than expected in January despite a slight increase in the unemployment rate. Nonfarm payrolls increased by 304,000 during January of 2019 surpassing expectations of 165,000 jobs. The unemployment rate rose by just one-tenth of a percentage point at 4 percent versus the 3.9 percent forecast. Looking at average earnings, the figure increased 3.2 percent, down from the 3.35 percent figure seen in December. With worker pay on the rise, consumer spending may add to inflation pressures possibly pushing the case for the Federal Reserve to raise interest rates this year. The US dollar remained relatively stable at around the 95.548 level following the news, dropping less than 1 percent from last week's high.

Equities rally

US equities climbed towards their biggest monthly ralin more than 3 years with technology shares leading the way. The S&P 500 Index hit an eight week high as both General Electric and Facebook surged more than 10 percent due to strong quarterly results. Signals from the Fed that it would be more "patient" on interest-rate hikes helped ease fears of further monetary tightening. The

tech-heavy Nasdaq Composite gained 9.74 percent, mainly boosted by Facebook as the company soared 13 percent after reporting record profits. Twitter rose more than 2 percent, and Amazon was up 2.2 percent, all due to the group's earnings reports. The S&P 500 is up 7.9 percent for the month, representing an impressive rebound from the previous month's 9.8 percent fall.

May returns to Brussels

Two weeks following the rejection of UK Prime Minister Theresa May's Brexit deal in what was dubbed a historic vote for the House of Commons, May fought yet again to avoid what would be a disastrous no-deal Brexit scenario. Last Tuesday, May won six out of seven Commons votes, sending May back to the drawing board to win concession from the EU on the Brexit

The Irish backstop remains the major issue at hand as many believe the current layout, which avoids a hard border between Northern and the Republic of Ireland, will trap the UK in the EU indefinitely. The EU has previously claimed they were not open for renegotiation on the backstop issue. President Donald Tusk of the EU Council wrote in a statement on Tuesday: "The backstop is part of the Withdrawal Agreement, and the Withdrawal Agreement is not open for renegotiation". With the March 29 deadline approaching, May will return to Brussels - essentially back to where she started - in an attempt to put together a deal all sides can agree

SYDNEY: A major shake-up of Australia's massively profitable banking sector is on the cards as a landmark inquiry into abuses in the financial services industry releases its final

report today. Sweeping legislative and regulatory changes, a crackdown on the bulging pay packets of bankers and even criminal charges against senior executives could be among the recommendations issued by the royal commission. Major lenders including the country's "big four" banks-among the developed world's most wealthy-have been under scrutiny in recent years, amid allegations of dodgy financial advice, life insurance and mortgage fraud.

Some unscrupulous brokers were found charging customers long after they were dead.

The wide-ranging inquiry was established in late 2017 to quell public anger over their misbehavior, and a preliminary

Australia banks report released in September slammed the banks' culture of greed. "I think there the banks' culture of greed. "I think there will be some substantive changes... around strengthening the regulators and increasing the punishments (for misbehavior)," RMIT University's Warren Staples told AFP. Australia's conservative government has been cautious in committing to implement the report's recommendations in advance, while the leftleaning opposition Labor Party said it would adopt the suggestions in full.

But with a federal election due by mid-May, the potentially explosive findings and recommendations are broadly expected to be embraced by legislators eager to cash in on the public's antibank sentiments. In the firing line will be the regulators, viewed as being too soft on corporations, and standards in the home lending, financial planning, insurance and pension sectors.

The commission's hearings exposed poor behavior by financial houses and executives with rules repeatedly breached, personal gains prioritized over clients' interests and loans given to customers who could not repay them. These sectors are expected to be reined in through tighter standards such as increased penalties for misconduct and

as banning certain types of sales prac-



tices and removing underperforming pension funds.

'Over-inflated pay'

Regulation Authority (APRA) and Australian Securities and Investments Commission (ASIC) are tipped to be given more powers to chase wrongdoers, while also being subjected to performance reviews. Shares in the major banks have weakened in recent days ahead of the report's release, but Bell Potter banking analyst TS Lim said investors had priced in any potential bad news.

"I think it's probably going to be a limited response... my belief is that they will increase the fines or penalties for companies that engage in misconduct," Lim told AFP. —AFPr

The Fed acknowledged that some market gauges of inflation have fallen in recent months, a trend more typical of growth slowdowns rather than an economy on fire. The International Monetary Fund predicted the global economy will grow at 3.5 percent in 2019, down 0.2 percentage point from last October's forecasts, citing weakness in Europe and some emerging markets. It puts US growth at 2.5 percent this year and 1.8 percent in 2020, in both cases likely slower than 2018's figures, which have not been finalized due to the government shutdown.

"We're not favoring the US market, but

we're happy to own Treasuries," said Schroders Plc portfolio manager Angus Sippe. He said he does not see a recession on the horizon and gives the Fed an "A-plus" on its management of the economy. But he would rather take risk in emerging markets and wait for more evidence of US corporate earnings growth.

Financial research service Refinitiv expects 14.9 percent earnings growth for the final quarter of 2018, but just 5.1 percent for all of 2019, leaving less margin for error if consumer and business fear translates into lower spending and investment. Still, oil producers are working to stabilize prices, China is aggressively stimulating its economy and, as Bank of America Corp analysts said in a research note on Thursday, the Fed has shown that its commitment to supporting markets is alive and well. Those factors mean market pessimists are getting it wrong, according to Michael Jones, chairman at RiverFront Investment Group LLC.

Some investors appear to be positioning for the worst. Futures contracts tied to Fed rates imply the Fed's next move will be a cut. Markets are pricing in a higher probability of two cuts by next January than of a single rate hike. —Reuters

Fed pause validates market fears about US growth

NEW YORK: While the US Federal Reserve's indication it is done raising interest rates - for now - has fueled stock gains, investors worry the US central bank's pledge is a double-edged sword and implicit confirmation of the markets' lingering anxiety about growth. Fed Chairman Jerome Powell said on

Wednesday that US economic growth is "solid" and expected to continue. But in a sharp reversal of their stance just six weeks ago, Powell said the Fed has "the luxury of patience" in deciding whether to raise rates again. The Fed's soothing message sent the S&P 500 up 1.6 percent on Wednesday and extended into Thursday, helping the benchmark index post its biggest January percentage gain since 1987.

KAMCO GCC Markets Monthly Report

Global markets rally in new year; optimism drives GCC markets

KUWAIT: The year 2019 started on a positive note with almost all the key global financial markets closing the month in the green. The easing of tensions between the US and China with China hinting at raising goods imports from the former by 2024 provided a boost to global sentiments. Emerging markets also turned positive after the US Fed hinted at being patient on future interest rate hikes and said it would be flexible in lowering its bond holdings. In addition, positive data related to US manufacturing activity further added to the optimism, although a late month report from China showed the slowest manufacturing activity since February-16.

Oil market was also positive during the month with oil price gaining almost 20 percent. Brent regained the \$60/b mark after US imposed sanctions on Venezuela further supported by a decline in inventories in the US. The OPEC+ agreement to curb crude output also came into effect during January-19 further boosting prospects for oil prices. GCC market activity followed global cues and were largely positive. The MSCI GCC index closed the month with a return of 7.4 percent after all GCC benchmarks showed growth during the month barring Oman.

Tadawul was the best performing market during the month with a return of 9.4 percent followed by Qatar at 4.1 ercent. GCC markets also got support from positive earnings announcements from some of the large-cap stocks in the region. The sector performance chart in the GCC also reflected the positive earnings trend in the GCC. Banks continued to attract investor interest in the GCC following outperformance during last year. Within the

banking sector, Saudi banks topped the chart with double digit gains. Food & Beverage sector was also positive during the month recording double digit gains after a relative underperformance during most of 2018.

Kuwaiti stock market witnessed a broad-based surge during January-19 with all the three benchmarks closing the month in the green. Large-cap stocks remained investor's favorite pick with the representative Premier Market index gaining 3.1 percent during the month with 11 out of the 17 stocks showing positive monthly performance. Gains for the Main Market index was relatively muted at 1.3 percent resulting in 2.5 percent growth for the broader All Share Index.

Trading activity remained positive during the month with gains in both volume and value traded. Monthly volume of shares traded surged almost 60 percent to 4 Bn shares on the back of higher trades in small-cap stocks. On the other hand, monthly value traded saw marginal surge of merely 6 percent to reach KD 610 million in January-19 as compared to KD 575 million during December-18. A'ayan Leasing & Investment once again topped the monthly volume chart with trades more than doubling in the stock to reach 395 million shares as compared to 160 million shares during the previous month. Gulf Bank was next on the list with 337 million shares changing hands during the month followed by Ahli United Bank - Bahrain and Abyaar Real Estate Development with volumes of 332 million and 305 million, respectively. In terms of monthly value traded, Gulf Bank topped the list with KD 90.2 million worth of traded shares followed by KFH and NBK at KD 86.5 million and KD 81.5 million, respectively.

The sector performance chart was mixed during the month with the Financial Services index topping the monthly performance chart after gaining 5.6 percent. The Bank index was next on the list with a gain of 4.1 percent after all the banks recorded gains during the month barring KFH that declined marginally. Banking index got support from full year earnings for NBK, Boubyan Bank, KIB and Warba Bank with double digit net profit growth in 2018. The Telecom index was next on the monthly performance chart with a gain of 2.6 percent.

At the end of his statement, Alshaikh expressed his thanks and gratitude to all those who participated in the issuance of this guide. He also lauded the Chairman of KIB, Sheikh Mohammed Jarrah Al-Sabah, for his quick response as well as his cooperation with the Board of Directors Affairs Management Department to issue this guide, thereby benefitting the Bank as a whole and its employees.



Berlin filmfest turns focus on women, Netflix

omen directors and the rise of streaming services will take the spotlight at the Berlin film festival starting Thursday, with a starstudded lineup making the case for bigscreen diversity. The Berlinale, now in its 69th year, figures with Cannes and Venice among Europe's top cinema showcases. It will be the last edition led by Dieter Kosslick, 70, who is handing over to a younger duo after 18 years at the helm.



Workers put final hands on a banner installation depicting the Berlinale bear, on the Berlinale Palast facade, five days ahead of the film festival opening in Berlin. — AFP photos Nearly 400 movies from around the world will be presented, with 17 vying for the prestigious Golden Bear top prize. Among the contenders, seven of the pictures or 41 percent were made by women-a Berlinale record and a milestone for an A-list festival. In comparison Cannes, which has been roiled by calls for more diversity, only managed 14 percent last year and Venice just under five percent.

"The debates of the last year opened our eyes and when your eyes are open, you make different decisions," Kosslick told AFP, referring to the #MeToo controversy over sexual misconduct and the #TimesUp movement against gender discrimination in the entertainment indus-

try. "But we wouldn't have done it if the films had been bad, simply to boost the women's quota." French Oscar winner Juliette Binoche will lead the six-member jury selecting the main prizes.

Top of the mountain

The head of pressure group Women and Hollywood, Melissa Silverstein, said that, particularly in a year in which not a single female filmmaker was nominated for best picture or best director at the Oscars, festivals were essential to boost industry diversity. "We need women to get to the top of the mountain in the same way that men can," she told AFP.

"(A festival slot) means you get noticed, you get written about in papers across the world. People will be reviewing your film and buyers and other (event) programmers will be looking at it." Silverstein will attend the signing of a gender-parity pledge Saturday that Cannes, Venice and other major festivals have already inked, committing the Berlinale to striving for balance in the event's top manage-

ment and transparency in the selection process.

In June, Kosslick will hand over the reins to Carlo Chatrian, the current head of the Locarno film festival, and Mariette Rissenbeek, the Dutch director of German Film, which promotes homegrown movies abroad. Women have captured the Golden Bear the last two years-Romania's Adina Pintilie for her adventurous sex docudrama "Touch Me Not" and Hungary's Ildiko Enyedi for the political allegory "On Body and Soul".

Denmark's Lone Scherfig ("An Education") will open the event with the world premiere of "The Kindness of Strangers", a drama set in New York and starring Zoe Kazan, Andrea Riseborough and Bill Nighy. Polish veteran Agnieszka Holland will unveil the Stalin-era thriller "Mr Jones" starring James Norton ("Happy Valley") while France's Agnes Varda will premiere a new autobiographical documentary out of competition.

'Co-existence with Netflix'

After winning the Golden Lion top prize at the Venice film festival in September with "Roma", Netflix will enter the fray in Berlin for the first time with "Elisa and Marcela" by Spain's Isabel Coixet. Unlike Cannes, which has been at loggerheads with the streaming giant, the Berlinale sees scope for cooperation. "It's important that big, A-list festi-



vals keep fighting for cinema," Kosslick said.

"Now it's about finding ways of co-existence, just like film and television did. But we have to find ways of protecting productions so that they can run in cinemas first and only then be streamed. I think that will work itself out in a big debate in Europe over the next three or four years." Other program highlights include acclaimed French director Francois Ozon presenting the drama "By the Grace of God" based on real-life cases of sex abuse allegedly committed by a French priest.

A cardinal, Philippe Barbarin, is currently on trial in Lyon on charges he covered up the assaults. Germanborn actress Diane Kruger and Britain's Martin Freeman are expected for the premiere of their Israeli spy thriller "The Operative" by director Yuval Adler. And Indian superstars Ranveer Singh and Alia Bhatt are to commandeer the red carpet for the premiere of "Gully Boy" by Zoya Akhtar, one of the few big-budget woman directors in Bollywood. The movie is inspired by a true story about street rappers.—AFP

'Gangster' Peppa back in China's good graces in Year of the Pig

Roasted as a subversive symbol and chopped from a video streaming website in China, it seemed Peppa Pig, the loveable but imperious British cartoon character, faced a bleak future in the Communist-led country. But her popularity has risen unabated, and now just months after state media slammed her as an emblem of the counterculture, she is playing a starring role as the country ushers in the Year of the Pig on Tuesday.

A new film titled "Peppa Pig Celebrates Chinese New Year" is being released on the first day of the holiday. The movie shows Peppa celebrating Lunar New Year with two new friends-"Jiaozi" (dumpling) and "Tang yuan" (glutinous rice ball) — named after popular local delicacies. The animation, which follows the daily adventures of a bright pink piglet, her brother George and her parents, is hugely popular with Chinese children.

Last year, five-year-old twins Mi Ai and Mi Ni made a video asking to meet Queen Elizabeth II after seeing their porcine heroine visit the monarch in an episode. The clip garnered more than nine million views and made such an impact that the pair were invited for tea by the British ambassador to Beijing and promised a tour of Buckingham Palace.

"It is really fun and the language is easy to understand", their mother, Bella Zhang, said of the girls' obsession with the show. She added that the series was popular with Chinese parents because it teaches "the importance of love and cooperation". The cartoon's focus on family values has resonated with Chinese parents who strictly monitor their children's TV time, agreed Li Xin as she bought a Peppa toy for her four-year-old at a Beijing store.

Billions of views

Peppa Pig first broadcast in China in 2015 but last May some 30,000 clips of the cartoon were removed from a popular video streaming site, following criticism from state media. Papers affiliated to the Communist Party wrote harsh columns about Peppa Pig being hijacked by gangsters and subversives to create videos that reject mainstream values. Memes featuring the beloved children's character had also started to take on dark undertones at the time, occasionally veering into violent or pornographic territory.

"No matter how gangster Peppa Pig becomes, it cannot be allowed to destroy children's youth [or] break rules," The People's Daily said in an editorial last April. The shows have been watched around 60 billion times on the country's largest video streaming sites, including Tencent Video and iQiyi, since it first launched in China, said Jamie MacEwan from British TV analysts Enders. "This figure is up from 24.5 billion by May 2017, showing how China's appetite for Peppa has only increased," MacEwan told AFP.

Who is Peppa?

Now Entertainment One-the Canadian media company that currently produces the series-is banking on her popularity translating to the big screen. A trailer for the movie, direct-



ed by Chinese film-maker Zhang Dapeng, has gone viral with the hashtag "Who is Peppa" being viewed more than 1.6 billion times on China's Twitter-like Weibo, a spokeswoman for Alibaba Pictures Group told AFP.

The promotional clip shows a rural villager's quest to find

out what his city-dwelling grandson wants when he asks for "Pei Qi"-Mandarin for Peppa Pig-in a bid to create the perfect Chinese New Year gift in time for the boy's annual visit. The trailer struck a chord with Chinese audiences because it "showcases the same values highlighted in the movie-family, reunion, harmony and love", Zhang wrote on Weibo.

The film has already earned 12 million yuan in presale tick-

ets. In a country where the pig is a symbol of wealth, Peppa merchandise is in high demand. There are even themed attractions-Peppa Pig World of Play opened in Shanghai in 2018 with another set to open in Beijing this year. But the success of the Peppa brand has also brought headaches for the cartoon's creators. Copycat merchandise-from cookies to pencil casescan be easily found in corner stores in Chinese cities.

A spokesman for Entertainment One told AFP that in the last year more than half a million fake Peppa Pig items were seized and tens of thousands of online sale posts taken down. He added: "In China, Entertainment One has a dedicated team working on this ongoing issue and have already successfully dealt with many infringements."—AFP

TV drama stirs debate over S Korea's cutthroat education culture

It was created as a biting satire of South Korea's notoriously competitive education system, but the country's most popular cable TV drama has inspired some fans to ignore its warnings and instead double down on their pursuit of success.

"SKY Castle" follows several ambitious families as their drive to send their children to the country's best universities and secure lucrative jobs leads to identity fraud, suicide and murder.

The show's name comes from a fictionalized

version of luxury residential community in Seoul's suburbs, but is also a nod to the acronym "SKY," which refers to South Korea's top three universities: Seoul National University, Korea University and Yonsei University. It's the most-watched drama ever to air on South Korean cable networks, according to Nielsen Korea, and has found a wide following in China.

As the series came to an end this week, however, there were signs the show has led some South Koreans adopt some of the more intense educational measures the creators intended to criticize. Sales of the "studycube", a 2.5 million won wooden closet less than one square meter in size where students can hide themselves away to focus on their homework, for example, have soared eight-fold after it was featured in the show, according to the company which makes it.

"I saw the studycube on 'SKY Castle' and bought it of my own will to create a suitable studying environment for me," said 16-year-old Lee Do-gyeong, who is hoping to be accepted to one of Seoul's top veterinary medicine programs. Demand for specialized university entrance coaches has also increased, after the show depicted a university admissions coordinator going beyond school records to guide everything from sleeping patterns to friendships.

Lee Man-ki, director of Uway Institute of Educational Evolution, plans to increase the number of courses for aspiring college prep consultants by 50 percent. All of this runs contrary to what the show's creators intended, "SKY Castle" chief producer Kim Ji-youn said. "This news of a flood of orders for studycube or people eagerly searching for study coordinators are what the script writer wanted to avoid the most," she said. "The script writer, who also went through her child's university admissions process, wanted to give the audience awareness of excessive education fever."

Reading in the toilet

Studycubes sparked debate when they first appeared in South Korea seven years ago, and their appearance in "SKY Castle" led to fresh questions over the country's high-pressure education culture. Lee Do-gyeong, the high school student, said she was looking forward to studying in cube's sound-proof seclusion, but she acknowledged that if parents forced their children to use the room it could be "nothing more than a rice chest," a reference to an infamous incident where an 18th Century Korean prince was locked away in a rice chest to die.

Choi Ki-ju, the chief executive officer of studycube maker EMOK, said seclusion can help students focus without distractions. One customer compared using the studycube to reading in the toilet, Choi said. "This is simply accurate, don't we concentrate better when we read books in the toilet?" he said.

Life will get easier

South Korea's expenditure on educational institutions is around 5.8 percent of the country's GDP,

one of the highest among OECD countries, and nearly half of tertiary education expenditure is funded by households, compared with an OECD average of 22 percent, the report added. Three-quarters of students said they expect to complete university education, above the OECD average of 44 percent.

South Korea's education ministry in late January announced a plan to promote employment of high school graduates, saying the prevailing perception of university enrolment as the only way to success has created excessive competition and an overheated private education industry. The ministry wants to reach a 60 percent employment rate of vocational high school students by 2022, aiming to reduce unemployment of college graduates as well as labor shortages in smaller businesses that university graduates turn their noses up at.

Pressure at school and worries about jobs are seen as major contributors to South Korea's high youth suicide rate. "Even though (SKY Castle) may be extreme, it is still worth it to enter the top universities," said Kwon Seung-ok, a mother who said the show inspired her to hire a university consultant for her daughter ahead of entrance exams this year. "That will lead to better opportunities and better employment. Life will definitely get easier."—Reuters



CUARON ON PATH TO OSCAR VICTORY AFTER DGA WIN

exican filmmaker Alfonso Cuaron on Saturday scooped the Directors Guild of America (DGA) award for "Roma"-a strong indicator he will be named best director at the Oscars in three weeks' time. "Roma," a highly personal ode to Cuaron's own childhood in 1970s Mexico City, is nominated for 10 Academy Awards, including best director. Cuaron, who won the same accolade for "Gravity" in 2014, thanked stars Yalitza Aparicio and Marina de Tariva, along with the rest of the cast for bringing a memory to life.

"Thank Libo [the domestic worker who inspired the film], my mother and my country, the real architect of 'Roma'," he added. In a previous speech upon being presented as a nominee, Cuaron highlighted that there are over 70 million domestic workers in the world-not including children. "Roma was the story of one of them," he said. "When we villainize them, demonize them, calling them criminals and rapist, we diminish ourselves ... this is not about politics, this is about humanity," he added, referring to US President Donald Trump's anti-immigration rhetoric.

Cuaron received the top prize on Saturday from compatriot Guillermo del Toro, who won last year for "The Shape of Water." Speaking to AFP, Del Toro said the film was "absolutely superb, perfect and very complicated." Cuaron beat out Spike Lee ("BlacKkKlansman"), Adam McKay ("Vice"), Peter Farrelly ("Green Book") and Bradley Cooper ("A Star is Born"). He is the second director to be awarded the prize for a foreign language film: Ang Lee won in 2000 for "Crouching Tiger, Hidden Dragon."

Elsewhere, Bo Burnham ("Eighth Grade") won the award for first-time feature-an award that was widely expected to go to Cooper. "A Star is Born" started the awards seasons as a hot favorite, but the anticipated success has not materialized. The DGA short list is considered an Oscars bellwether. Last year's DGA winner, Guillermo del Toro ("The Shape of Water"), went on to win the same prize at the Oscars and the film took best picture honors.

Hollywood's long awards season has often proved contradictory and inconsistent this year. The Screen Actors Guild (SAG), many of whose voters are also members of the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences, last month selected musical "Bohemian Rhapsody" for its top award. But "Roma" and British historical comedy "The Favorite," which also has 10 Oscar nominations, were not among the SAG choices.

The Producers Guild, also a reliable bellwether of



Roma' wins best Latin American film award at Spain's Goyas

exican film "Roma", which is tipped for Oscars glory, was Saturday named best Latin American picture at the Goyas, the main Spanish film awards held in Seville. Shot in black and white by Academy Award-winning filmmaker Alfonso Cuaron, "Roma" has already won the Golden Lion at Venice, two Golden Globes and four awards at the Critics' Choice

Set in Mexico City in the 1970s, it has 10 nominations for the 91st Academy Awards to be held in Hollywood on February 24. The 33rd Goya Awards' best picture went to "Campeones" (Champions), by director Javier Fesser, Spain's most successful film last year.

Rodrigo Sorogoyen took the best director award for his political thriller "El Reino" (The Realm) and the best actor gong went to Antonio de la Torre in the same film, while Susi Sanchez took the best actress award for her role in "La enfermedad del domingo" (Sunday's Illness).—AFP

Bollywood film hailed for centering on lesbian romance

Bollywood movie about a family accepting their daughter as gay was hailed on Friday for pushing the boundaries of cinema in socially conservative India. It comes after the country's Supreme Court scrapped a colonialera ban on homosexuality in September, sparking wild celebrations amongst India's LGBT community. "Ek Ladki Ko Dekha Toh Aisa Laga" (How I Felt When I Saw A Girl) is being lauded as the first mainstream Indian film to show parents dealing with their daughter being in a same-sex relationship.

"I can't believe what I saw," prominent LGBT activist Harish Iyer wrote on Twitter. "While people were waiting to find the right time and day and age for making a film like this, @VVCFilms actually went ahead and made it," he added. The Hindilanguage drama, which was released nationwide on Friday, sees veteran actor Anil Kapoor star alongside his daughter Sonam Kapoor.

Kapoor, 62, plays the role of a father in a family that is eagerly trying to get his daughter Sweety-played by Sonam Kapoor-married. She is in love with a woman though and the movie centres on her grappling with how to tell her family while

fearing they won't accept the relationship. "Looks like such a beautiful and heartfelt film... more power for pushing boundaries," filmmaker Karan Johan posted on Twitter.

"Such a difficult subject handled with so much dignity n restraint... wishing All the very best to its cast n crew!! Its an important film first of its kind..." tweeted director Farah Khan. Mumbaibased Bollywood doesn't have a good track record when it comes to portraying homosexuality. Many movies over the years have even mocked gay characters, sometimes making them the target of jokes. But several films have dealt with the subject sensitively, such as "Kapoor and Sons" and "Aligarh". "Fire" was widely considered to be the first mainstream Hindi movie to feature a gay relationship.

Cinemas attacked

The film centered on two women in unhappy marriages who have a sexual relationship. When the movie was released in India in 1998 Hindu extremists attacked cinemas showing it. Shelly Chopra Dhar, the director of "Ek Ladki Ko Dekha Toh Aisa Laga", told AFP she hoped her movie

would help fight prejudice. "We do hope that this (film) breaks paradigms for many people and we realise that the dignity of all human beings is exactly the same and (that) love is love," she said via a WhatsApp message.

The movie received a mixed response amongst critics, however. A Scroll.in review praised its "bold theme" but said it was "undercut by its timidity". Shubhra Gupta, writing in the Indian Express newspaper, lauded "a progressive film" but questioned why it showed women being free "only after getting male approval and help". Promoters kept the nature of the movie's romance under wraps for fear of putting off some audiences, but did release a few hints including the official hashtag #SetLoveFree.

it could have been any Bollywood romance for the most part-but did include a short clip of Sonam Kapoor's character holding hands with a woman. On Friday, adverts taken out in newspapers hinted more at what was to come with the headline: "Today is the day of acceptance". The actors themselves remained tight-lipped ahead of the film hitting screens, with Sonam Kapoor telling





Once red-hot smartphone market sees cooler trend

SAN FRANCISCO: The smartphone market is down but not out, with high prices and other factors combining to chill what had previously been a red-hot sector. Fresh surveys show global sales had their worst contraction ever in 2018, and the outlook for 2019 isn't much better. Still, analysts don't see the sun setting any time soon on the smartphone era, seen as a must-have device for many people around the world. "They don't have a viable replacement yet," independent Silicon Valley analyst Rob Enderle said of the smartphone. "There is always the possibility to go to wearables or head-mounted displays, but none of those have emerged as a real threat."

Worldwide handset volumes declined 4.1 percent in 2018 to a total of 1.4 billion units shipped for the full year, according to research firm IDC, which sees a potential for further declines this year. Another market tracker, Gartner, said its research suggested some stabilization in the smartphone market at the end of last year, said analyst Werner Goertz. "Mobile phones are here to stay," Goertz said, while suggesting that consumers may be waiting for some devices with new features. "Foldable phones would represent a really nice disruptive feature," he said.

Analysts pointed out that other tech products such as personal computers have seen similar ebbs and flows. "Markets will always have slow moments when companies have to spend more on marketing money to get people to go out and buy stuff," Enderle said. He added that some consumers are holding off on replacing their devices amid price hikes for premium devices like Apple's iPhone.

During a recent earnings call, Apple

chief executive Tim Cook agreed that people were holding onto their iPhones longer. Cook contended that another reason for slower iPhone sales was that telecom carriers were cutting subsidies of handsets tied to service contracts, meaning customers were faced with paying full price of \$1,000 or more for high-end models. "People don't want to spend another thousand bucks to replace something that isn't broken," analyst Enderle maintained. "In emerging markets you can't get people to pay a quarter of their monthly income for a phone; they are not giving up food for texting."

In an unusual move, Apple lowered prices in some emerging markets to offset the effects of a strong US dollar on local pocketbooks. Cook said that in January, in some locations and for some products, Apple "absorbed part of the foreign currency move" to "get close or perhaps right on" prices in those respective markets a year ago. "So yes, I do think that price is a factor," Cook said.

Nonetheless, the latest data suggests the days of red-hot smartphone growth are over and that sluggish growth or contraction is likely in many saturated markets. Apple recently reported a rare drop in revenue in the fourth quarter South Korea's Samsung, the largest smartphone maker, reported a slump in fourth-quarter net profits, blaming a drop in demand for its key products. "Globally the smartphone market is a mess right now," said IDC analyst Ryan Reith. "Outside of a handful of high-growth markets like India, Indonesia, (South) Korea and Vietnam, we did not see a lot of positive activity in 2018."

Reith noted that along with consumers waiting longer to replace their phones and frustration around the high cost of premi-

um devices, there was political and economic uncertainty. The Chinese market, which accounts for roughly 30 percent of smartphone sales, was especially hard hit with a 10 percent drop, according to IDC's survey. However, Chinese smartphone mak-

ers such as Huawei, Oppo, and Xiaomi defied the trend and ended the year with gains, according to Counterpoint Research.

This year, smartphone makers will likely entice customers to upgrade devices with innovations such as superfast 5G network

connectivity and foldable screens, according to Counterpoint associate director Tarun Pathak. Leading smartphone maker Samsung is expected to show off a smartphone with a foldable screen at an event here in February. — AFP

Trump pushes withdrawal from 'endless' wars

WASHINGTON: Pushing back against Republican opposition, US President Donald Trump reaffirmed his determination to pull US troops out of "endless wars" in Syria and Afghanistan, in an interview that aired Sunday. But he said they would stay in Iraq to watch Iran. Trump cited the high cost in blood and money after years of fighting in Afghanistan, in arguing for a US withdrawal from the place where the 9/11 attacks

"It's time," he said in the interview with CBS's "Face the Nation." "And we'll see what happens with the Taleban. They want peace. They're tired. Everybody's tired." Trump's comments come in the face of warnings by US intelligence chiefs that a hasty US withdrawal from Afghanistan and Syria could allow a resurgence by Al-Qaeda and the Islamic State group.

On Thursday, the US Senate voted overwhelmingly for a measure sponsored by Mitch McConnell, the majority leader of Trump's Republican party, warning against a "precipitous withdrawal" from either country. But Trump appeared unmoved by the rare Republican pushback, noting that his promises to bring US troops home was "a big part" of the reason he was elected. US officials have been holding talks in Qatar with the Taleban on a framework for peace negotiations, raising prospects for a breakthrough in the 17-year-old conflict.

On Syria, Trump said the 2,000 US troops in the country to assist local forces would leave "in a matter of time" but cited the need to protect Israel "and other things that we have" for slowing down - after initially announcing an immediate pullout. He said he will soon

be announcing the recapture of "100 percent of the caliphate" once claimed by the Islamic State group in Iraq and Syria. "We're at 99 percent right now. We'll be at 100," said the president, who was expected to make the announcement during his annual State of the Union address on Tuesday.

ay. 'Pockets of something'

In a report to Congress last week, US intelligence leaders warned that IS still commands thousands of fighters in Iraq and Syria, and they could easily spring back in the absence of US forces. Trump responded by rebuking as "naive" and "wrong" his intelligence chiefs, who also had appeared to contradict him on Iran and North Korea.

In the CBS interview, he played down the danger of an extremist resurgence but said "we'll come back if we have to". "You're going to always have pockets of something," he said. "But you're not going to keep armies there because you have a few people. Or you even have fairly reasonable numbers of people." Watching Iran

However, the United States will not give up its bases in Iraq, he said. "We spent a fortune on building this incredible base. We might as well keep it. And one of the reasons I want to keep it is because I want to be looking a little bit at Iran because Iran is a real problem," he said. The US military presence in Iraq, he said, is "perfectly situated for looking at all over different parts of the troubled Middle East." "We're going to keep watching and we're going to keep seeing and if there's trouble, if somebody is looking to do nuclear weapons or other things, we're going to know it before they do," he said.

In Afghanistan, Trump said he would leave behind intelligence elements – "and if I see nests forming, I'll do something about it". "We got to get out of these endless wars and bring our folks back home," he said at another point. "Now, that doesn't mean we're not going to be watching with intelligence. We're going to be watching, and watching closely." — AFP

Millions of Yemenis face imminent starvation, according to the UN. Rights groups have also slammed the Gulf state for upholding a 10-year prison term against activist Ahmed Mansoor on Dec 31 - two weeks after the UAE declared 2019 the "Year of Tolerance".

"Despite its assertions about tolerance, the UAE government has demonstrated no real interest in improving its human rights record," Sarah Leah Whitson, Middle East and North Africa director at Human Rights Watch, said yesterday. "But the UAE has shown how sensitive it is to its image on the global stage, and Pope Francis should use his visit to press UAE leaders to meet their human rights obligations at home and abroad." — Agencies

The World Cup's king and queen are as dominant as ever-Hirscher, 29, heading to Sweden with 10 wins this season while Shiffrin has racked up 13 and looks likely to be the stand-out skier of the championships.

Hirscher is on course for an eighth successive overall World Cup title and the reigning slalom and giant slalom world champion, and double Olympic gold medallist, also leads the standings in those disciplines.

Shiffrin, also a double Olympic gold medallist and now with 56 career wins, leads the women's overall, super-G, giant slalom and slalom World Cups. "She is in a really good place and in my opinion will come away from the World Championships with a lot of medals, at least three," said Bode Miller, the most successful male

U.S. skier of all time.

If her dominance has become too predictable for some, Shiffrin is unrepentant as she heads to the resort where she took her first World Cup win in a slalom in 2012. Their resistence folded in the second over after lunch, with Mitchell Starc taking five wickets to leave them trailing by 319 after Australia's first innings 534 for five declared.

No stars mean no crowd for India's Ranji Trophy

NEW DELHI: India's premier domestic cricket tournament, the Ranji Trophy, climaxes this week. But with the big stars absent and fans preferring shorter, sharper matches, the stands have been largely empty.

At a recent match between Delhi and Andhra Pradesh at the Feroz Shah Kotla stadium in the Indian capital, there were about the same number of people in the stands-around 20 — as on

On the final day of the four this swelled to 150, but only because it was a special occasion-the swansong of former India opener Gautam Gambhir. Part of the problem is that once the likes of India's superstar captain Virat Kohli make it big, the packed international timetable of the modern game means they have no time for the Ranjireducing its pulling power for spectators.

People in cricket-mad India also no longer have much passion for the four-day Ranji games-named after a maharaja who played for England in the 1890s-preferring the excitement of one-day games and the razzmatazz of Twenty20.

(The) attention span of today's youngsters is less, they want action all the time," former India great Sunil Gavaskar, who used to electrify packed Ranji Trophy crowds back in the 1970s and 80s, told AFP.

"(But) most importantly it's the absence of the international stars which does not help draw the crowds. The international schedule being what it is, the players are tied up with that," he said. It doesn't help that the facilities are not very inviting. Unlike during international games, the toilets are seldom cleaned and refreshments are hard to come by.

One of the few fans at the Feroz Shah Kotla grounds is AP Bhalla, a grey-haired regular in the stands who remembers people "thronging" to games in decades gone by. "Especially during the Delhi-Mumbai games the stands were filled, with their city rivalry being legendary," the retired doc-

This one-day and T20 cricket has really taken the zip out of the longer format. Who cares for domestic four-day games? In the 1970s and 80s even inter-university games attracted crowds like in ODIs now," he added.

Ranji was and remains the breeding ground for India's future stars. India's latest addition to the senior team, Prithvi Shaw, is a case in point. The teenager scored heavily for Mumbai before shining in India's Under-19 World Cup triumph in 2018. He has also played for the Delhi Daredevils in the big-bucks Indian Premier League T20

Veteran sports journalist Vijay Lokapally remembers how stars used to go the extra mile to play in Ranji matches. "Sachin Tendulkar, Rahul Dravid, Anil Kumble, Virender Sehwag were always available for their state teams when not playing for India," he said. — AFP

NEW YORK: Steven Stamkos scored his 28th goal of the season in the second period to match his total from last season, and it turned out to be the game-winner as the Tampa Bay Lightning held on for a 3-2 victory over the host New York Rangers on Saturday night. Tampa Bay jumped on top 3-0 at 8:33 of the second period on Stamkos' fourth goal of the season against the Rangers. Stamkos received a cross-ice pass from defenseman Victor Hedman and lifted a wrist shot from the middle of the right faceoff circle off Rangers goaltender Henrik Lundqvist's left shoulder. Gervinho matches Ronaldo double as Parma frustrate Juventus

Napoli are back strong: Ancelotti

MILAN: Cristiano Ronaldo scored twice but champions Juventus had to settle for a point as a late Gervinho double snatched a 3-3 draw after promoted Parma staged an impressive comeback in Serie A on Saturday. Juventus' dropped points allowed Napoli to cut the gap on the leaders to nine points after a confident 3-0 win over Sampdoria.

Massimiliano Allegri's side had already had their confidence shaken after a 3-0 defeat to Atalanta shattered their hopes of winning a fifth straight Coppa Italia. Saturday's draw was not the response Allegri had called for ahead of their Champions League last 16 first leg tie against Atletico Madrid on February 20.

"I'm happy for the goals but not the result," said Ronaldo. "Parma didn't do anything special, they waited for us to make a mistake. "But we're not worried, we know it will be a great season for Juventus."

Juve, hit by injuries to defenders Leonardo Bonucci, Giorgio Chiellini and Andrea Barzagli, have now conceded six goals in their last two matches. But they still have a comfortable nine-point lead over Napoli with Inter Milan 20 points behind in third.

"It doesn't change anything, but we must not take anything for granted," said Allegri. "We were too light in defence. It was the first time this back four had played together." Juventus lined up with an inexperienced back line of Leonardo Spinazzola alongside Uruguay defender Martin Caceres who got his first start since moving from Lazio.

Sami Khedira rattled the post twice, before Ronaldo opened the scoring after 36 minutes with Daniele Rugani again scoring for the hosts on 62 minutes. An Antonino Barilla header clawed one back for Parma two minutes later before Ronaldo completed his brace to return to the top of the Serie A goalscorers' chart with 17. But Ivorian Gervinho threw his side

a lifeline on 74 minutes and grabbed a point at the death for Parma who remain 12th in the table, 31 points behind Juventus. "At least we satisfied those who complained we weren't entertaining," said Allegri. "But the beautiful football doesn't pay off, at the end of the day you have got to just kick it away from your goal." The seven-time reigning champions nevertheless remain unbeaten this season having dropped points just twice before against Genoa and Atalanta. Earlier Arkadiusz Milik and Lorenzo Insigne scored quick-fire goals and Simone Verdi added a third from the spot as Napoli got back on track. AC Milan had dented Carlo Ancelotti's side's title hopes with a goalless draw in the San Siro last weekend before dumping the southerners out of the Coppa Italia midweek. "Napoli are back strong," said Ancelotti. "Today we found the depth and the ability to quickly overturn the game. "The two tests against Milan were not our usual selves, we're back to our normal standard.'

Sampdoria striker Fabio Quagliarella was thwarted in his bid to set a new record of scoring in 12 consecutive Serie A games as the side from Genoa also missed the chance to move up into fourth and the Champions League places.

But Quagliarella-who is from Naples and had scored in Sampdoria's 3-0 win over Napoli earlier in the campaign-was denied his best chance to make history by a sliding Kalidou Koulibaly tackle.

Napoli skipper Marek Hamsik-reportedly set for a move to China-returned from injury and orchestrated the opener after 25 minutes in the San Paolo Stadium. The Slovak international's cross found Jose Callejon who burst through to provide the assist which Milik finished off for his 12th league goal this season.

Less than a minute later Insigne connected sweetly with another Callejon assist for his first



league goal in three months. Napoli were awarded a his towering performance, it was Verdi who stepped penalty for a Joachim Andersen handball but up to convert in the final minute. Messi double earns Barca a point in thriller with Valencia

BARCELONA: Lionel Messi scored in a ninth consecutive match but his latest double on Saturday was only enough to earn Barcelona a 2-2 draw against Valencia. Messi instigated another Barca comeback at the Camp Nou before placing an injury doubt over his availability for Wednesday's Copa del Rey Clasico against Real Madrid.

Ernesto Valverde confirmed after the game his captain had felt a "small problem" but insisted it was nothing serious. Valverde is still unlikely to take any risks given Barcelona's testing month ahead, even if Messi's absence, however brief, would be a blow, particularly while he is in such irresistible form.

Kevin Gameiro and Dani Parejo's penalty gave Valencia a surprise two-goal lead but Messi pulled one back with his own spot-kick before curling in a brilliant equaliser with 26 minutes left.

After their stunning turn-around against Sevilla in midweek, Barca looked destined again to finish the job, but at the end of a breathless contest. Valencia had held on for a point. "When you don't win, you always feel you have missed something," Valverde said. "But the league is long and there are matches where you come up against a good

team. This was one of those.' Messi's 20th and 21st league goals of the season leave his team six points clear of Atletico Madrid, who could cut the gap to three by beating Real Betis on Sunday, with Real Madrid, 11 points back, at home to Alaves.

After eight consecutive Barcelona wins in La Liga, this result perhaps offered the chasing pack a little encouragement at least. Real could inflict further disruption themselves. The first leg of the Copa del Rey semi-finals on Wednesday will be the first of three Clasicos in a month.

Neuer injury adds to Bayern's woes as title-race slip

BERLIN: Bayern Munich are unsure whether Germany goalkeeper Manuel Neuer can play in next week's crunch German Cup tie at Hertha Berlin after losing more ground in the Bundesliga title race on Saturday.

The defending German champions were humbled 3-1 at Bayer Leverkusen to leave them seven points behind leaders Borussia Dortmund in the title race. To make matters worse, Bayern later dropped to third in the table after Borussia Moenchengladbach's 2-0 win at 10-man Schalke meant they drew level on 42 points and leap-frogged into second on goal difference.

'The only positive thing is that Dortmund didn't get three points," said Bayern's head coach Niko Kovac after Dortmund drew 1-1 at Eintracht Frankfurt on Saturday. "Now we are seven points behind and that's no small amount.

'We have to use the remaining games, which won't be easy, but we won't give up, we still believe and will keep on working." After Leon Goretzka gave Bayern a 1-0 first-half lead and Robert Lewandowski had a goal ruled offside, Kovac's side had few answers as Leon Bailey curled in a free-kick, then Leverkusen attacked on the counter with goals by Kevin Volland and Lucas Alario. "We should have led by more after the first-half, then what happened is exactly what I didn't want," said Kovac as Bayern's seven-match winning streak in the league ended abruptly. "We got into an exchange of blows with Leverkusen and they killed us.

"The goals we conceded shouldn't have happened the way they did, so we have to be annoyed with ourselves. "The result doesn't reflect the game and we shouldn't have lost it. "Leverkusen had four shots on goal and created three goals.

The last half an hour was a horror show for Kovac and Bayern supporters as Leverkusen shredded the Bavarians defence with both Volland and Alario tapping home after the hosts countered at will.

To compound matters, Munich club captain and Germany shot-stopper Neuer missed the defeat in Leverkusen after injuring his thumb in training last week. It is unclear whether Neuer can play in Wednesday's German Cup, last 16 clash at Hertha Berlin, where Bayern have already suffered one of their four league defeats this season last September, going down 2-0 at the Olympic Stadium.

Kovac refused to say if Neuer could be fit in time, but Bayern's stand-in goalkeeper Sven Ulreich, playing his first game for the Bavarians this season, was more candid. "The thumb (Neuer's) is really fat, but in one or two days things should look different and he could be able to play," said Ulreich, after his first game for seven months.—AFP

City have leaders to catch Liverpool, says Guardiola

MANCHESTER: Pep Guardiola is convinced that Manchester City have enough leaders to chase down a significant points deficit in the league, something he has never previously achieved as a manager.

Guardiola's side go into Sunday's Premier League home match against Arsenal in third place, five points behind leaders Liverpool with 14 games to play. City suffered their fourth defeat in nine league matches as they were beaten 2-1 at Newcastle on Tuesday in a lethargic display.

They were without the leadership skills of club captain Vincent Kompany, who has made only six league starts this season because of injuries. Guardiola, though, has rejected the idea that he does not have the players willing to take responsibility in the absence of the Belgian.

"Of course, there are guys with a huge personality to talk, to communicate, but that is only worth so much," he said. "I am not going to call out a guy who is shy, who expresses himself with a lot of character on the pitch, but off the pitch is more quiet and doesn't talk too much with his mates.'

The former Barcelona and Bayern Munich boss added: "I met incredible players who didn't speak one word. And I saw a lot of players who speak a lot in the locker room, 'I want to do that', and afterwards, when they go out on the pitch and they are under pressure, say 'I don't want the ball and I don't want to defend'. There are so many of these kinds. —AFP

India beat NZ to wrap up series

Rayudu to the rescue with a commanding knock of 90



WELLINGTON: A commanding knock of 90 by Ambati Ravudu rescued India from deep trouble and saw them beat New Zealand by 35 runs in the fifth oneday international in Wellington yesterday to wrap up

between second-ranked India and third-ranked New Zealand. It did look as if India were heading for another defeat when Matt Henry and Trent Boult ripped out the first four wickets in under 10 overs.

But when the swing bowlers were taken out of the equation, Rayudu and Shankar toyed with the attack, putting on 98 for the fifth wicket before Shankar was

run out at 45. Rayudu, who faced 84 deliveries to reach 44, needed only 27 more for his remaining 46 runs in an innings that included eight fours and four sixes.

He had a life on 60 when dropped by Boult and was eventually removed when Henry, New Zealand's most successful bowler, came back for his second spell.

Hardik Pandya provided late fireworks for India with 45 off 22 deliveries, while Henry finished with four for 35. New Zealand batted through to the 45th over, which captain Kane Williamson described as "a step in the right direction" after being comprehensively beaten in the first three games of the series.

"Throughout the series they had us under more pressure than we would have liked," Williamson admitted. "Trying to soak that up with the ball, in the field, with the bat, and revert it back on the opposition we

were able to do that on occasions but not often enough." Like India, New Zealand's top order also went cheaply, before a 67-run stand by Williamson (39) and Tom Latham (37) for the fourth wicket. But after they went in quick succession Yuzvendra Chahal led a spin assault that saw the hosts all out for 217, with Chahal taking three lbw decisions for 41.

James Neesham threatened to get New Zealand up to their target when he whacked 44 off 32 deliveries before inexplicably running himself out. When India fruitlessly appealed for a leg before decision, Neesham stepped out of his crease in search of a possible leg bye, unaware the ball had been picked up by wicketkeeper MS Dhoni who had an easy shot at the stumps.

The series now moves on to three Twenty20 matches beginning in Wellington on Wednesday. — AFP

Rashford strike lifts Solskjaer's surging Man Utd into fifth

LEICESTER: Ole Gunnar Solskjaer remains unbeaten 10 games into his caretaker reign of Manchester United as the rejuvenated Marcus Rashford and Paul Pogba combined to earn a 1-0 win at Leicester yesterday to close in on the Premier League top four.

Rashford blasted home his sixth goal since Solskjaer took charge after taking an exquisite touch to control Pogba's lofted pass and United held out to move above Arsenal into fifth and within two points of fourth-placed

A 2-2 draw at home to Burnley in midweek is the only match Solskjaer has failed to win and much of that form is owed to the turnaround in both Rashford and Pogba's roles since Mourinho was sacked in December with

United 11 points adrift of the top four. Solskjaer again chose to leave Romelu Lukaku on the

substitutes' bench, with Rashford preferred as his central forward. The England striker took just nine minutes to respond with the crucial goal, having already missed a

good chance when he headed over when unmarked from a handy cross by Nemanja Matic.

Rashford's confidence was clearly unaffected, as he took just four minutes to respond in style. Ricardo Pereira was the guilty party for Leicester with a dangerous ball that was intercepted by Pogba.

The Frenchman proceeded to display his deftness of his touch with a beautiful pass that was lofted over the Leicester backline for Rashford to run onto and he did the rest, taking a touch before drilling a low shot past a helpless Kasper Schmeichel.

However, as is often the case on the road, United relied on goalkeeper David de Gea for all three points as a Leicester side that have often troubled the top six this season improved after half-time.

Twice the Spaniard stood tall to deny Jamie Vardy, but De Gea's best save came from Rachid Ghezzal's free-kick that arrowed towards the top corner. A Ghezzal goal would have been rich vindication for Leicester boss Claude Puel who was met with chants of 'you don't know what you're doing" from his own fans for replacing James Maddison with the Algerian just after the hour mark.

Jonny Evans and Harry Maguire also failed to hit the target as the Foxes laid seige towards the United goal in search of an equaliser that never came to pile more pressure on the under-fire Puel. His stock at Leicester remains on the slide but Solskjaer's at Old Trafford continues to soar. —AFP
