KUWAIT: The government reaffirmed yesterday keenness on enforcing justice and equality among all citizens, while also preventing any measure that would undermine the national economy, following a briefing by the state's top banker. The government was reacting to a briefing by Governor of the Central Bank of Kuwait Mohammad Al-Hashel on consumer loans, and explained that less than one percent of debtors are experiencing trouble in repayments.

Hashel said the total value of consumer loans is KD 989 million (\$3.253 billion), while the total value of housing loans is KD 12 billion (\$39.5 billion), a statement by Deputy Premier and Minister of State for Cabinet Anas Al-Saleh said. Hashel said the number of debtors is 552,000 people, but only 4,677 of them, or less than one percent, have trouble repaying their loans.

The Cabinet members also discussed the government's efforts to address the situation of some people who were unable to repay their loans, through the establishment of a special fund through which the government allocated around KD 800 million (\$2.63 billion) to address the financial situation of 34,174 people. In a previous statement, Executive Director of the supervision sector at the Central Bank Waleed Al-Awadhi had said there are 429,000 Kuwaiti debtors, who represent 90 percent of the workforce under the age of 50.

On Saturday, around 400 people gathered in Irada Square opposite the National Assembly to call upon HH the Amir Sheikh Sabah Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah to write off their loans. A large number of lawmakers have said they will support such a move when it comes up for debate in the Assembly, while the government insists it will not scrap the loans. On Sunday, MP Thamer Al-Sumait said the living conditions of Kuwaiti citizens must occupy the top of priorities of lawmakers and that the government must carefully understand the message of the Kuwaiti people. — Agencies

Pompeo to visit Kuwait next month

CAIRO: US Secretary of State Mike Pompeo will visit Kuwait next month to hold the third round of strategic dialogue between the two countries, KUNA quoted Deputy Foreign Minister Khaled AlJarallah as saying on Sunday. Pompeo visited several Arab capitals in January, including in Egypt, Saudi Arabia and Qatar. He had to cut short his Middle East trip to return to the United States for a family funeral. — Reuters

MBS not seeking to buy Man Utd

DUBAI: Saudi Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman is not seeking to buy Premier League football club Manchester United, the kingdom's Media Minister Turki Al-Shabanah said yesterday, denying reports and adding that there had only been a meeting with the Saudi wealth fund regarding sponsorship. On Sunday, British newspaper The Sun said the crown prince was in a £3.8-billion takeover bid for one of football's most popular clubs. — Reuters

UAE inks major deals with Raytheon

ABU DHABI: The United Arab Emirates announced yesterday it had signed deals worth more than \$1.6 billion for the purchase of Patriot missile launchers from US arms giant Raytheon, state media said. The deals, inked on the second day of an international military exhibition in Abu Dhabi, come a day after the UAE announced it would buy \$353 million worth of Patriot missiles from Raytheon. — AFP

Iran self-sufficient in gasoline

DUBAI: Iran has become self-sufficient in gasoline production, Iranian Oil Minister Bijan Zanganeh said yesterday after the inauguration of the third phase of the Persian Gulf Star Refinery in the southern port city of Bandar Abbas. "Fortunately, we do not need to import gasoline anymore. We have reached self-sufficiency. We can export our produced gasoline but have no export plans," Zanganeh was quoted as saying by Iran's state TV. — Reuters

308 people of same family hold forged Kuwaiti citizenship

KUWAIT: Those holding forged Kuwaiti citizenship and those who got it using fake documents are being exposed one by one, informed sources told Al-Rai daily. The sources explained that the latest case involves 308 people belonging to the same tribe of Iraqi origins who hold forged citizenships, adding that residency detectives had been working on the case for a while and that four out of the five main suspects involved in it had died, while the fifth is currently in his sixties.

Saudi crown prince orders 2,100 Pak prisoners released

ISLAMABAD: Saudi Arabia's Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman has ordered the release of about 2,100 Pakistani prisoners from the kingdom's jails during a high-profile visit to Islamabad, Pakistan's information minister said yesterday. Prince Mohammed arrived in Pakistan on Sunday at the beginning of an Asian tour, which will include China. Saudi Arabia on Sunday signed investment agreements with Pakistan worth \$20 billion.

The crown prince had "ordered the immediate release of 2,107 Pakistani prisoners", after a request by Pakistani Prime Minister Imran Khan, Information

The case goes back to when a Kuwaiti - who was infertile - got married to an Iraqi woman who had four children from an earlier marriage to an Iraqi, said the sources, noting that the citizen added them to his citizenship files as his own, and thus they got Kuwaiti citizenship, along with their children and grandchildren,

and enjoyed all privileges granted to citizens.

Security sources said residency detectives were tipped off concerning this major case a month ago, and accordingly a citizen in his sixties was arrested and confessed that his Iraqi mother had added him and his three Iraqi brothers to her Kuwaiti husband's dossier, adding that all his brothers had died. However, further investigations showed that the total number of the four fake citizens' children and grandchildren add up to 308, who have been enjoying citizen privileges for decades. — Al-Rai

Minister Fawad Chaudhry said in a post on Twitter. The fate of thousands of Pakistani workers locked up in jails across the Middle East is a sensitive issue in Pakistan, where there is a perception the prisoners are mostly poor laborers who have no real legal recourse. Huge numbers of Pakistanis travel to the Middle East every year, with many working on construction sites or as domestic helpers. The remittances they send back are vital for Pakistan's dollar-starved economy.

Saudi Arabia also vowed to "de-escalate" rising tensions between Pakistan and India as Prince Mohammed prepared to travel from Islamabad to New Delhi. "Our objective is to try to de-escalate tensions between the two countries, neighboring countries, and to see if there is a path forward to resolving those differences peacefully," said Saudi Foreign Minister Adel Al-Jubeir. Following the pledge, the crown prince - widely known as MBS - held a series of meetings yesterday afternoon with the Pakistani leadership before flying on to India.

9 dead as Kashmir battle heightens Indo-Pak tensions

SRINAGAR: Indian troops suffered new losses yesterday in a battle with Kashmir militants that left nine dead, officials said, just days after a major suicide bomb attack escalated tensions with neighboring Pakistan. The confrontation piled more pressure on the Indian government, which has blamed Pakistan for last Thursday's suicide attack on a convoy that killed at least 41 paramilitaries. Several hours of shooting rocked the Pulwama district, south of

Kashmir's main city of Srinagar, after officials said four soldiers, a policeman, three militants and a civilian were killed in the latest clash.

An army major was among the dead, along with three militants from the Pakistan-based Jaish-e-Mohammed (JeM) group which claimed last week's attack, military and police officials said. Six senior army men including a brigadier and a lieutenant colonel were

Pompeo to visit Kuwait in March for strategic dialogue meeting: Jarallah

Deputy FM reasserts Kuwait's stance against normalization with Israel

KUWAIT: Deputy Foreign Minister Khaled Al-Jarallah has stated that US Secretary of State Mike Pompeo would visit Kuwait next month to partake in the third session of the Kuwaiti-US Strategic Dialogue. Jarallah made the announcement while speaking to reporters on the sidelines of his participation in Canadian embassy's celebration of the National Flag Day on Sunday.

The third session of the Kuwaiti-US Strategic Dialogue was scheduled on January 15, 2019, but was adjourned when Pompeo cut short his regional tour and cancelled the planned visit to Kuwait to return to the US to partake in the funeral of a family member. In a phone call with Deputy Premier and Foreign Minister Sheikh Sabah Khaled Al-Hamad Al-Sabah after the visit postponement, Pompeo said he was looking forward to visit Kuwait to hold the third Strategic Dialogue Session.

Agreement signing

According to Kuwait's Assistant Foreign Minister for the Americas Reem Al-Khaled, signing an agreement to boost their ongoing Strategic Dialogue and others in defense, security and economic affairs would be on the agenda of Pompeo's visit to Kuwait. The strategic dialogue would also deliberate topics of defense, education, economics, consulate and customs affairs, civil aviation and cyber security - with the matters of trade and scientific research be introduced to the fold for the very first time, Jarallah noted.

Meanwhile, Jarallah affirmed that Kuwait remains firmly against normalization of relations with Israel, as long as there is no justice and a comprehensive solution to the Palestinian issue. "It is painful that there is still doubt regarding the Kuwaiti position on the Palestinian issue," he said, stressing that Kuwait's position has not changed and continues to be supportive of the Palestinian cause at all levels. He pointed out that Kuwait is a member of the UN Security Council and therefore it is unreasonable to not participate in international conferences, stressing that Kuwait went to protect the rights of the Palestinian people and discuss issues of concern in the region. Jarallah pointed out that there are many issues addressed at Warsaw Summit affecting the Middle East and therefore it is logical to interact and participate in such conferences.

Improving relation

On relations with Canada, Jarallah hailed the steadily growing and improving relation and cooperation on all levels and realms with the north American country. He disclosed that Kuwait was planning to hold a major economic forum in Canada in April. The forum would tackle important issues relative to investment, economic and energy sectors. Jarallah recalled the supportive stance of Canada during the Iraqi invasion of Kuwait in 1990 and

its participation in the Kuwait liberation war.

In the meantime, Canada's Ambassador to Kuwait Louis-Pierre Emond said that his country is proud of the strength of the bilateral relationship with Kuwait. "After just four months in Kuwait, I have really gotten to see and understand the breadth of that relationship in terms of commerce, investment, education, defense and diplomacy," he said in a speech at the ceremony. He mentioned the growing number of Canadian companies doing business in Kuwait as part of ongoing efforts to help Canadian companies diversify their export markets are working. "The focus is still on oil and gas but we are working hard on identifying potential projects in new areas such as infrastructure, life sciences, food and agri-food products, and information and communications technology," he pointed out.

Important investment

In this regard, the Ambassador pointed out an announcement made in early February of an 'important new investment in Canada' by Canada Kuwait Petrochemical Corporation (CKPC), a joint-venture between Kuwait's Petrochemical Industries Company (PIC) and the Canada-based Pembina. "This important

announcement showcases the strength of our economy and the confidence it inspires in foreign investors," he said. "This should pave the way for more investment projects in Canada by new players, and expansion for partners already present in the market.'

The Ambassador also mentioned that there are nearly 400 Kuwaiti students who joined colleges in Canada this year. "Our education links continue to grow and we are extremely proud to see the number of Kuwaiti students continue to grow every year," he said. Diplomatically, the ambassador mentioned the visit of Canada's Governor General to Kuwait this past January, saying that "this short but worthwhile visit underlines the importance we put on our bilateral relationship." Furthermore, Ambassador Emond stressed Kuwait's 'important role' that it plays on the world stage advocating for peaceful solutions, for dialogue and communication, saying that this goes in line with Canada's approach. Finally, the Ambassador extended congratulations to His Highness the Amir Sheikh Sabah Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah for the 13th anniversary of his ascension to power, and to Kuwait on the National Day and Liberation Day.



Young Leadership Academy initiative to discover, develop future Kuwaiti leaders

The first of its kind in Kuwait and the Gulf region

He pointed out that the initiative aims to create an annual program aimed at young people aged 16 to 18 in Kuwait and qualifying those young people for leadership through a unique program. "The program is in line with Kuwait's 2035 vision for the development of Kuwaiti

human capital and coincides with the United Nations

Anfal Al-Radwan, one of the initiators of Rawaj Institute and the official spokeswoman, explained in detail about the initiative. "The academy program consists of five educational and training courses of 17 days. The program is composed of five modules, each focused on a combination of learning and doing. Four modules will be executed

in Kuwait and the fifth module will be executed in the UK at the Royal Military Academy Sandhurst. Rawaj Youth Leadership Academy program is dedicated only to students in Kuwait between the ages of 16 to 18 years, who believe that they are tomorrow's leaders," she said.

She added that 20 students from among the best performing students in secondary school in Kuwait will be selected to join this program through the application forms that they have started to receive through their website. "It is worth mentioning that the students will not bear any financial burden to participate as this initiative is sponsored by a number of private and public bodies."

Radwan noted that the academy will start implementing its program from March till June 2019, and will be pre-

MP calls for raising decade-old cost of living allowance

Lawmaker proposes establishing new governorate

KUWAIT: Opposition MP Khaled Al-Otaibi yesterday questioned why the government did not raise the cost of living allowance for the past decade despite a steep rise in prices. In a question to Finance Minister Nayef Al-Hajraf, the lawmaker said that the council of ministers decided in 2008 to grant Kuwaitis with a cost of living of KD 120 monthly to cope with an increase in prices and inflation rate. He said that since then, the government did not consider raising the allowance despite the increase in the cost of living in the country.

The lawmaker said that ahead of deciding the allowance in 2008, a government spokesman said that it was based on a comprehensive study conducted by the finance ministry and a number of government departments in cooperation with the World Bank that included revising salaries and other benefits enjoyed

by employees. He asked if the ministry has conducted a similar study in the past 10 years and demanded copies of such studies, and if not he asked for the reasons why the study was not made.

Otaibi asked the minister if the existing cost of living allowance has been revised and its value compared with the cost of living at present. He demanded the rates of inflation since 2009 and asked about the ministry's role in facing the continuous rise in such rates and their negative impact on the incomes of middle and low income families.

MP Osama Al-Shaheen meanwhile proposed the establishment of a new governorate in the country besides the six governorates to accommodate new areas in the south of the country. He said the new governorate should include Sabah Al-Ahmad City, Wafra and Khairan in addition to a number of neighboring areas. The new governorate should have its own edu-

cational, health and security authorities.

Deputy Speaker Essa Al-Kandari submitted a proposal yesterday to set up a national council for women to be entrusted with reviewing proposals and draft laws relating to women affairs before they are approved by the national assembly. Kandari said that the council should consist of a number of female experts who have experience in women's affairs, adding that the council must be consulted before the national assembly approves any draft law relating to women or that could impact their affairs.

Exemptions

In other news, member of the parliamentary human resources committee Saleh Ashour said the committee asked the government to cancel the exemptions given to certain sectors from setting a specific ratio to appoint Kuwaitis, such as private universities, hospitals, hotels and touristic companies. Ashour added that government responses concerning replacing expats with citizens are good, but still below par, stressing that the committee will continue following up the Civil Service Commission's performance in this regard.

Moreover, Ashour said that the recent rally in Irada Square conveyed a message to the government, showing that people are dissatisfied with the grants and loans given to other countries worth billions of dinars, namely those who stood against Kuwait during the Iraqi invasion, while the Kuwaiti people are overburdened with loan interest. "The government must resolve this social dilemma," he underlined. In the meantime, MP Hamdan Al-Azmi said that the new disability bill is still being studied and demanded that it should include bedoons and children of Kuwaiti women in it.

Ten kilograms of heroin, three kilograms of hashish and two kilograms of shabu (methamphetamine) were found inside the apartment. The Asian man was referred to the proper authorities for further action.

A motorist was injured when his sedan crashed into a car carrier trailer on the Sixth Ring Road yesterday. Firefighters used special equipment to free the man who became trapped inside his wrecked vehicle, before paramedics rushed him to the hospital. US will not protect you, Assad warns Syria's Kurds

to protect them from Turkey. European powers "have a political and moral responsibility" to the Kurds, Aldar Khalil said in a interview in Paris, warning that the Kurds would seek the protection of Syrian President Bashar Al-Assad if failed by Europe and the US.

The Kurdish-led Syrian Democratic Forces (SDF) have been leading the fight against the Islamic State group in Syria for the past four years, backed up by air strikes from a US-led coalition. With IS's self-declared caliphate now in ruins, the Kurds fear being left at the mercy of Turkey after the US declares mission accomplished in the final battle currently underway for the jihadists' last Syrian holdout. Turkey, which has been battling a Kurdish insurgency on its own soil since 1984, views the Kurdish fighters that dominate the SDF as terrorists and has threatened to invade areas under Kurdish control in northeast Syria.

Khalil, who played a key role in establishing Syria's semiautonomous Kurdish region in 2013, appealed to Europe for protection. "If they (Europe) don't meet their commitments they are effectively abandoning us," Khalil said late on Sunday, calling on France particularly to work at the United Nations for the creation of a buffer zone along the Turkish border. "France can table a proposal to the Security Council on our protection, suggesting an international force between us and the Turks-of which it would be part-or to protect our airspace," he said.

'Hasty decision'

But Western observers expect Assad, whose forces control about 60 percent of Syria, to take advantage of the Kurds' vulnerability and drive a hard bargain. On Sunday, Assad

warned them that the US would not protect them against Turkey. "No one will protect you except your state," he said.

Assad warns Syria's Kurds

Meanwhile, President Bashar Al-Assad warned Syria's Kurds Sunday that their ally the United States would not protect them against any Turkish offensive as Washington looks to withdraw it troops. The US is set to pull out its soldiers from Syria after allied Kurdish-led forces capture the Islamic State group's last holdout in the war-torn country. Any withdrawal risks leaving the Kurds exposed to a long threatened attack by neighboring Turkey, which views Kurdish fighters as "terrorists". "We tell those groups who are betting on the Americans that the Americans will not protect you," Assad said in a televised speech. "The Americans do not hold you in their heart... They will put you in their pocket so you can be a bargaining chip." Apart from fighting IS, the Kurds have largely stayed out of Syria's civil war, working towards semiautonomy in the northeast of the country.

The looming prospect of a US withdrawal, announced in December, has sent them scrambling to rebuild ties with the Damascus regime, but talks so far have failed to reach a compromise. "If you don't prepare yourselves to defend your country and resist, you will be nothing but a slave to the Ottomans," Assad warned, using a historic term for Turks. "No one will protect you except your state. No one will defend you except the Syrian Arab army," he said. The Kurdish-led Syrian Democratic Forces, which has fought IS with backing from the US-led coalition since 2015, on Sunday met to discuss "the future of relations with the

The SDF stressed the need for Damascus to recognize the 'special status" of the Kurdish-Arab alliance, as well as the Kurdish semi-autonomous region. In a statement, it also expressed a "willingness to solve problems with Turkey through dialogue," based on "mutual respect". Nearly eight years into a war that has killed more than 360,000 people and displaced millions, Assad's forces control almost two thirds of the country. Just two areas remain beyond its control: the jihadist-held northwestern region of Idlib, and around a third of the country under control of Kurdish-led forces. "Every inch of Syria will be liberated," Assad said in Sunday's speech.—Agencies

Venezuela expels 5 **Europe lawmakers**

CARACAS: Venezuela has expelled five visiting European lawmakers, an act opposition leader Juan Guaido branded "irrational" as his showdown with President Nicolas Maduro over the arrival of international aid intensifies. The members of the European Parliament were being tossed out with no explanation, said Spanish MEP Esteban Gonzalez Pons, who led the group. "We are being expelled from Venezuela. Our passports have been seized. They have not informed us of the reason for the expulsion," Pons said.

The incident on Sunday is the latest point of tension between the international community and Maduro, who is in the grip of a power struggle with Guaido, the head of the National Assembly who proclaimed himself interim president last month. Guaido has the backing of more than 50 countries including 30 in Europe. Pons' fellow Spaniards Jose Ignacio Salafranca and Gabriel Mato Adrover, as well as Esther de Lange of the Netherlands and Paulo Rangel of Portugal, were also expelled. All are members of the conservative European

Writing on Twitter, Guaido said the MEPs were being "deported by an isolated and increasingly irrational regime." Foreign Minister Jorge Arreaza said the Europeans had "conspiratorial aims" and were sent back from the country's main Maiquetia airport. Earlier Sunday Guaido set a goal of enlisting a million volunteers within a week to confront a government blockade that has kept tons of humanitarian aid, most of it from the United States, from flowing into the country where residents can't get enough food and say they are dying because of a shortage of medicines.

The economy is imploding

Guaido has given next Saturday-one month to the day after he proclaimed himself acting president-as the date for a showdown with Maduro over the aid. Food supplies, hygiene kits and nutritional supplements have been stockpiled near the Venezuelan border in Cucuta, Colombia. Additional storage centers are supposed to open this week in Brazil and Curacao, a Dutch island off



Venezuela's northern Caribbean coast.

"Our principal task is to reach a million volunteers by February 23," Guaido said in a message to the 600,000 supporters who have signed up so far for the push to bring aid in. Caravans of buses are being planned to carry volunteers to border entry points to meet and transport arriving cargo. Guaido has kept to himself how he plans to overcome the border barriers put up by the Venezuelan military, on Maduro's orders. Volunteer groups have begun meeting in "humanitarian camps" in several Venezuelan states to organize and prepare for the aid arrival.

They have started to identify the most vulnerable and have begun caring for the needy in accordance with Guaido's promises. Sometimes working under awnings or tents, doctors, nurses, dentists and pediatricians have attended to local residents who can receive donated medications. Patients arrive with respiratory, skin or other ailments, and suffering from malnutrition. An imploding economy has driven an estimated 2.3 million Venezuelans to migrate from the oil-rich country. Those who remain have been punished by hyperinflation that has put scarce food and medicine out of reach for many. —AFP

Russia TV fumes after Facebook blocks 'wildly popular' page

MOSCOW: Facebook has blocked a popular page run by Russian state TV channel RT, the channel's editor said yesterday, criticizing the move as an attack on media rights. "We had a subsidiary project in English, In the Now. The project was wildly popular - 2.5 billion views and four million subscribers on Facebook alone!" RT editor-in-chief Margarita Simonyan said on her

Telegram social network account. She said a report aired by CNN about the project being financed by the Russian state led to "Facebook immediately blocking us! Without presenting any of the accusations." "We didn't violate any Facebook rules," she said. Simonyan said it should not be an issue that the page did not disclose its Russian funding to visitors. Asked to comment, Kremlin spokesman Dmitry Peskov said RT "must receive an explanation from Facebook regarding what exactly was the reason" for it being blocked. It was not possible to access the In the Now Facebook page yesterday.

A YouTube channel describes the project as striving "to build a community of mindful media consumers around important, curious and purpose-driven content." Launched on YouTube in March 2014, it makes no mention of any affiliation with RT or Russia and reports over 2.8 million views. The topics of the most recent videos include cleaning up the oceans, the yellow vest protests in France, the rise of atheism and Russian football hooligans. The EU-funded project EU vs Disinfo, a campaign to "respond to pro-Kremlin disinformation", has said In the Now was launched to attract younger audiences turned off by RT's political stories.

It does this "by adding videos with high emotional and entertainment value" which are used as "bait" to "camouflage" the project's ties to Russia, EU vs Disinfo said. Last month, Facebook said it had removed over 500 pages originating in Russia for engaging in "coordinated inauthentic behavior". Most of the removed accounts were found to be linked to employees of Sputnik, a state news agency launched in late 2014 that is also run by Simonyan. Facebook said at the time that the blocked pages created accounts "to mislead others about who they were and what they were doing". -AFP

Nigerian president orders troops to be 'ruthless' with vote-riggers

Boko Haram kills two soldiers in North East

ABUJA: Nigeria's President Muhammadu Buhari said yesterday he had ordered the police and military to be "ruthless" with vote-riggers, as preparations were made for rescheduled elections. Presidential and parliamentary elections were put off just over five hours before polls were due to open on Saturday, causing widespread anger. New polls have been rescheduled for this Saturday, while governorship and state assembly elections have been pushed back to March 9.

At an emergency meeting of his ruling All Progressives Congress party (APC) in Abuja, Buhari said he intended to make sure the rescheduled ballot proceeds without a hitch. "I do not expect anybody

to make any disturbance," he told senior party members. "Anybody who decides to snatch (ballot) boxes or use thugs to disturb it (the vote), maybe this will be the last unlawful action he will take."

Buhari, 76, said he had ordered "the military and the police to be ruthless" to ensure all Nigerians can vote for their chosen candidate. "I am going to warn anybody

who thinks he has enough influence in his locality to lead a body of thugs or snatch (ballot) boxes or to disturb the voting system, he will do it at the expense of his life," the president added. Both the APC and the main opposition Peoples Democratic Party (PDP) have been accused of wanting to rig the result, notably by buying biometric voter identity cards.

The Independent National Electoral Commission (INEC) blamed the last-minute delay on logistical difficulties in the distribution of election materials, as well as sabotage. Elections have been delayed before in Nigeria: in 2015, there was a six-week postponement on security grounds linked to the Boko Haram

conflict in northeast Nigeria. In 2011, the election was halted after it had already begun due to problems with the non-delivery of ballot papers, results sheets, and other voting materials. This year's election is the sixth in the 20 years since Nigeria returned to civilian rule after decades of military government. Some 84 million voters are registered.

President Buhari came to power on a pledge to defeat the Islamist militants but despite his repeated claims that they have been weak-

ened to the point of defeat, attacks persist. His failure to end the violence is again a polling issue as Buhari seeks re-election this weekend. "We lost two soldiers to Boko Haram terrorists who attacked Alpha Company location..." a military officer in Banki said on condition of anonymity.

"Six soldiers were also injured in the attack," he said. The account was backed by a civilian militia member in the town. The injured troops were evacuated to a hospital in Mora, across the border in Cameroon. Banki is 130 kilometers southeast of Maiduguri, the Borno state capital, and houses some 45,000 people displaced by the



conflict in a sprawling camp. Boko Haram has launched several attacks in and around Banki, targeting troops and the displaced. Last month two soldiers were killed and seven civilians injured in an ambush on a convoy of traders under military escort in Chachile village.

Boko Haram has in recent months stepped up attacks against military targets which have been blamed on or claimed by IS-affiliated Islamic State

West Africa Province (ISWAP). On Saturday, four soldiers and five jihadist fighters were killed when ISWAP fighters attacked a base in the town of Buni Yadi, in nearby Yobe state, the military said. Five civilians were killed and 11 injured in the crossfire. The conflict, which began in 2009, has killed more than 27,000 people and left 1.8 million homeless in northeast Nigeria. The violence has spilled into neighboring Niger, Chad and Cameroon. —Agencies

Iran arrests 3 'terrorists' over suicide attack

TEHRAN: Iran's elite Revolutionary Guards said yesterday it has arrested three "terrorists" involved in last week's deadly suicide bomb attack on security forces in a region bordering Pakistan. and Khash were identified and eliminated, and the terrorists based in them were arrested," the force said on its official Sepah news agency. "Three of the terrorists were arrested and 150 kilograms (330 pounds) of explosives and 600 kilograms of explosive materials as well as weapons and ammunition were confiscated," it said. Islamabad launched an operation against the "terrorists" in its Balochistan border province on Sunday, he said.

Guards commander Major General Mohammad Ali Jafari has accused Pakistan's army and intelligence agency of sheltering the jihadists. The foreign ministry said Iran "cannot tolerate" Pakistan's inability to stop cross-border attacks on Iran and said Tehran's frustration had been communicated to Islamabad. "We hope the Pakistani government can and wants to prevent such

things from happening again," lies in ruins, bearing the scars of a war against jihadists launched in 2014. Hamas takes control of Gaza crossing

GAZA: Gaza's Islamist rulers Hamas took control of the Palestinian side of the enclave's main goods crossing with Israel, the strip's interior ministry and an official news agency said yesterday. Hamas seized the Gaza Strip in 2007 in a near civil war with Palestinian president Mahmud Abbas' Fatah party. But it agreed to hand control of the crossings to the Fatah-dominated Palestinian Authority in 2017, as part of a sincefailed reconciliation attempt between the two parties.

The PA administration at the goods crossing said Sunday that Hamas had "expelled (its) employees and banned them from entering the crossing", the official news agency Wafa reported. Known to Israelis as Kerem Shalom and to Palestinians as the Kerem Abu Salem, the crossing in the south of poverty-hit enclave has been a lifeline for Gazans, who have lived under a crippling Israeli blockade for more than a decade. Hamas confirmed PA employees had left the crossing. Security forces "put in place procedures dictated by security imperatives", Gaza's interior ministry spokesman Iyad Al-Bozum said in a

"Palestinian Authority employees at the crossing have refused to cooperate on these procedures for a few days and today we were surprised by their departure," he added. He said goods continued to pass through the crossing as normal. The Israeli defense ministry body responsible for Palestinian civil affairs, COGAT, said "trucks were going through" into Gaza as usual. Last month, Gaza's only crossing with Egypt was partially closed for some 20 days after PA employees withdrew from the border

point, accusing Hamas of interference.

Hamas employees quickly retook control of the Rafah crossing, the only way for Palestinians to leave the enclave that bypasses Israel. Israel and Palestinian militants in Gaza, including Hamas, have fought three wars since 2008. Tensions have risen again since March as Palestinians have gathered at least weekly along the border with Israel for often-violent protests, calling for an end to the blockade. At least 250 Palestinians have been killed by Israeli fire since then, the majority shot during clashes, though others have been hit by tank fire or air strikes. Two Israeli soldiers have been killed over the same period.—AFP

Russia pioneering return of 'IS kids'

MOSCOW: As the end nears for the IS enclave in Syria and the fate of jihadists' family members becomes a prescient issue, Russia can be seen as a pioneer in systematically returning children of Islamist fighters home. A potential homecoming of the many foreign women who have gone to live in the IS "caliphate" and their children, many of whom were born there, has been a subject of debate in Russia, with some security chiefs seeing them as potential threats. Earlier this month, 27 children, from four to 13 years old, were flown from Iraq to the Moscow region. Clutching stuffed toys and bundled in winter jackets, the children were carried off the cargo plane to face the Russian winter after years in the desert.

After health exams, they would be given into the care of their uncles, aunts, and grandparents in the Russian North Caucasus, the majority-Muslim territory in the south of Russia that is home to most of the Russians that had joined the Islamic State group. Another 30 children were brought back in late December. "They attend school and kindergarten. Volunteers work with them and talk to them about what they have been through, explaining how they have been indoctrinated," said Kheda Saratova, an advisor to Chechnya leader Ramzan Kadyrov, who has assumed a central role in the process of repatriating Islamists' relatives.

An 'honorable' deed Russian authorities have given sometimes conflicting

figures of returnees. Saratova said that about 200 children have been brought to Russia, but nearly 1,400 are still stuck in Iraq and Syria. Kadyrov, a longtime Kremlin protege with vast resources, began efforts to bring back fighters' children in 2017. Diplomatic negotiations are often led by Aleppo-born Chechnya senator Ziyad Sabsabi. Endorsing Kadyrov's efforts, President Vladimir Putin in late 2017 called the drive to return the children "a very honorable and correct deed" and promised to help."It's very good for the image of Kadyrov. He seems somebody who doesn't just use violence against terrorists but who builds mosques and hands out humanitarian aid," said Grigory Shvedov, who edits a Caucasus-focused news website Caucasian Knot.

When he began Russia's intervention in Syria in 2015, Putin justified it by the need to kill jihadists before they come to Russia. Although some regions have tried rehabilitation programs for Islamic extremists, these have failed to catch on at the national level. Young men who returned from Syria or Iraq and turned themselves in have faced harsh punishment. This month Russia's Supreme Court confirmed a 16-year-term for a young man who went to Syria as a 19-year-old student and worked as a cook and driver on IS-controlled territory for six months.

The promise of amnesty

Returning the wives of jihadists is also complicated by the absence of an extradition agreement between Russia and Iraq, where many have been sentenced, sometimes to life, in prison. But there is also reluctance by Russia's powerful security services to bring home adult civilians. FSB chief Alexander Bortnikov in November noted that many women with children exiting conflict zones have been used by jihadists as suicide bombers or recruiters.

"The FSB sees them as dangerous, even though many of these wives purchase their freedom from the Kurds and will eventually return one way or another," said Saratova. Any affiliation with Islamic State jihadists is a crime, since the group is banned under Russian law. "Some sort of amnesty has been promised to many, but it doesn't actually happen," said Shvedov. "They are put on trial, (charges) sometimes trumped up and sometimes real." —AFP

LONDON: A group of MPs from Britain's opposition Labor Party broke away yesterday in protest at leader Jeremy Corbyn's support for Brexit and his failure to stamp out anti-Semitism. The seven MPs included Chuka Umunna, who has led a campaign for a second referendum that could stop Brexit and was once seen as a potential leader of the centre-left party. Umunna called for a centrist "alternative" in British politics as the rebel MPs complained about the far-left turn the party had taken under veteran socialist Corbyn.

"The bottom line is thispolitics is broken, it doesn't
have to be this way, let's
change it," Umunna said at a
hastily-arranged press conference in London. The seven
MPs will form a breakaway
independent group in parliament, undermining Corbyn as
he attempts to steer the party through the highly divisive
issue of Brexit. Many Labor
voters, particularly in north-

ern England, chose to leave the European Union in the 2016 referendum-but a majority of Labor MPs and members supported staying in.

The referendum cut across party political allegiances also in the ruling Conservative Party, which is now deeply divided between pro-EU moderates and Brexit hardliners. The Labor rebellion is unlikely to make a major difference in crucial upcoming votes on Prime Minister Theresa May's Brexit deal but the move was welcomed by pro-EU forces. Vince Cable, leader of the opposition Liberal Democrats, said he

'Painful but necessary'

Corbyn said he was "disappointed" by his MPs' decision. "Now more than ever is the time to bring people together to build a better future for us all," he said, pointing to the party's strong result in the last general election in 2017. Corbyn has come under fire

from europhiles for failing to push for a second referendum. He has instead called on May to negotiate a customs union with the European Union to ease trade ties after Brexit. Corbyn has also been criticized for months for his handling of cases of anti-Semitism in the Labor Party, and his own past associations with Palestinian militants.

Another of the seven MPs, Luciana Berger, a victim of anti-Semitic online abuse for years, said: "This has been a very difficult, painful but necessary decision." Berger said the Labor Party had become "institutionally anti-Semitic", adding: "I have become embarrassed and ashamed to represent the Labor Party. "I am leaving behind a culture of bullying, bigotry and intimidation," she said. MP Mike Gapes said one of his main reasons for leaving was because he was "furious that the Labor leadership is complicit in facilitating Brexit". His colleague Chris Leslie said he too was

leaving because of "Labor's betrayal on Europe". —AFP

Maldives arrests ex-leader

MALE: Maldivian authorities yesterday ordered the arrest of former strongman president Abdulla Yameen over money laundering charges, officials said. The arrest came after a court began a preliminary hearing into allegations that Yameen received nearly \$1.5 million in illicit payments just before he lost his re-election bid in September. "Prosecutors said that Yameen had allegedly attempted to bribe witnesses," a court official said, adding that the former president would be taken to the Dhoonidhoo prison island near the capital. Yameen, who came to power in 2013 and jailed many of his opponents or forced them into exile, had been summoned to the Criminal Court Sunday to formally receive his indictment. During his five-year tenure, Yameen relied heavily on China for political and financial rights record. The Indian Ocean archipelago nation of 340,000 Sunni Muslims is heavily in debt to China. —AFP

Armed foreigners charged

PORT-AU-PRINCE: Haiti has charged several Americans and other foreign nationals with criminal conspiracy after their arrest with assault rifles and other weapons, the national police said. The group was detained in central Portau-Prince Sunday evening and includes five Americans, a Serb, a Russian and a Haitian, police said. They gave no indication about the motives of the group and said interrogations will continue. The arrests came 10 days after protests began against corruption and poverty in the Caribbean nation. At least seven people have died during demonstrations demanding the ouster of President Jovenel Moise. Police said the men were detained at a checkpoint near the central bank. They are also charged with illegal possession of weapons for allegedly having with them six assault rifles, six pistols, ammunition, bullet proof vests, drones, telecommunications gear and two vehicles.—AFP

Oil workers in Libya freed

TRIPOLI: Fourteen Tunisian oil workers kidnapped in Libya were freed Sunday night after three days in captivity and are in good health, the Tunisian consul in country said. Armed men seized the 14 Tunisians from a bus on Thursday as they were heading to work at an oil refinery in Zawiya, just to the west of the Libyan capital. The consul, Taoufik Al-Guesmi, did not disclose the conditions for the release of the workers, whose abductors had demanded a man jailed in Tunisia be released from prison. But a security source in Zawiya confirmed the news of their release, saying the hostages had been freed in an operation carried out by the town's security forces. The forces "stormed the place where they were being held and were able to release them without fighting, no casualties," Thamer Mounir, head of the media section of the Zawiya security service said. Mounir was unable to say if any arrests had taken place. —AFP

'Air Cocaine' smuggling trial

AIX-EN-PROVENCE: Two former French air force pilots went on trial in France yesterday six years after they fled the Dominican Republic following a spectacular drugs bust on a private jet in the Caribbean nation. In what has become known as the "Air Cocaine" case, Pascal Fauret and Bruno Odos are accused along with seven other defendants of trying to smuggle 680 kilogram of the drug out of the country. Dominican police found the narcotics packed into 26 suitcases onboard a Falcon 50 jet as it prepared to fly from the Dominican beach resort of Punta Cana to Saint-Tropez in the south of France in March 2013. While out on bail, the two men managed to flee the Dominican Republic to French territory in the Caribbean in mysterious circumstances, but were re-arrested upon their return to the French mainland in November 2015. —AFP

British lawmakers target Facebook 'digital gangsters'

LONDON: A scathing British parliamentary report yesterday branded Facebook "digital gangsters" who failed to fight the spread of fake news and violated data privacy. Lawmakers' 18-month investigation into technology companies and disinformation also accused the world's largest social media platform of trying to hide the extent of Russian interference in foreign elections. Facebook is coming under attack over its response to Russia's alleged use of misleading stories and targeted ads to sway the 2016 US presidential election and a series of European votes.

Its executives have further been accused of trying to either hide or suppress emerging evidence of foreign meddling flagged by its engineers. Parliamentary committee chair Damian Collins said Facebook "deliberately sought to frustrate our work by giving incomplete, disingenuous and at times misleading answers to our questions". Facebook cofounder and chief Mark Zuckerberg turned down three requests to appear before the committee. "Companies like Facebook

should not be allowed to behave like 'digital gangsters' in the online world, considering themselves to be ahead of and beyond the law," the 108-page report said.

Code of ethics

The committee urged a compulsory code of ethics for all tech companies that would be overseen by an independent UK regulator. It said Facebook should be obliged to take down "sources of harmful content". "We further recommend that the Government launches an independent investigation into past elections-including the UK election of 2017, the UK Referendum of 2016, and the Scottish Referendum of 2014 - to explore what actually happened with regard to foreign influence," the report said. Russia has denied either backing Britain's decision to leave the European Union or covertly backing pro-Brexit leaders during the 2016 referendum campaign. Facebook spokesman Karim Palant said executives at the California company "share the committee's concerns about false news and elec-

"We are open to meaningful regulation and support the committee's recommendation for electoral law reform," Palant said in a statement released to AFP. But Collins said Facebook has only adopted incremental policy changes that were mostly aimed at fending off regulation making it liable for



the spread of malicious stories. "They have taken a step, largely I think, to offset legislation," Collins told BBC radio. "It shouldn't be down to Mark Zuckerberg to determine what the code is for election advertising in the UK through Facebook."

Russian interference

The committee had earlier found that

Facebook's engineers had flagged potentially malicious Russian activity as early as 2014 - long before it became public. Yesterday's report said the two Facebook officials who did testify "deliberately misled the committee or they were deliberately not briefed by senior executives at Facebook about the extent of Russian interference in foreign elections".—AFP

Poland shuns summit amid Holocaust row

WARSAW: Poland's prime minister yesterday cancelled Warsaw's participation in a summit in Jerusalem, accusing Israel's foreign minister of "racist" comments about the actions of Poles during the Holocaust, in a row that has stoked outrage and soured relations. Mateusz Morawiecki's decision to scotch Poland's involvement in the summit of central European nations follows days of angry exchanges that were originally sparked by quotes from Israeli leader Benjamin Netanyahu over the role of Poles during World War II.

Czech Prime Minister Andrej Babis said the summit with Israel and the Visegrad Four-the Czech Republic, Hungary, Poland and Slovakia-was cancelled but that there would be bilateral talks. Polish leader Mateusz Morawiecki, who said on Sunday he would not attend the Jerusalem summit over the row, said the country's foreign minister would now not be attending the meeting.

"The words of the Israeli foreign minister are racist and unacceptable," he said. Poland's foreign ministry had summoned Israeli ambassador Anna Azari over the remarks by acting Foreign Minister Israel Katz on Sunday, the second time in just days that Warsaw has taken such action. Katz told Tel Aviv-based international television station i24 News that "there were

many Poles who collaborated with the Nazis, and like Yitzhak Shamir, whose father was murdered, said: Poles suckle anti-Semitism with their mothers' milk."

The Visegrad Group, often known as the V4, was due to hold its first summit in Jerusalem yesterday and Tuesday for talks with Israeli officials. Foreign Minister Jacek Czaputowicz had been due to replace Morawiecki before he pulled the plug on Poland's participation. Morawiecki said it was up to other central European leaders due to attend the summit, including the prime ministers of Hungary and Slovakia, to decide how they would proceed. Czech premier Babis told reporters that since Poland has cancelled its participation "the trip will change to bilateral talks between the individual countries and there will be no V4 summit with Israel".

Sensitive subject

The initial row broke out last week when Netanyahu-who was quoted in Haaretz newspaper as saying that "the Poles collaborated with the Nazis"was condemned in Poland for appearing to accuse all Polish people of cooperating with Nazi Germany during World War II. Warsaw has long been at pains to state that Poland, which was occupied by Nazi Germany, could not have and did not collaborate in the Holocaust although individual Poles gave up Jews to the Nazis. The Israeli prime minister's office said on Friday that Netanyahu had not implicated all Poles in the Holocaust. It insisted that Netanyahu was "misquoted" in Haaretz and other publications that reported different versions of the quote. The clarification came hours after the Polish foreign ministry had summoned Azari over the remarks.

Netanyahu was in Warsaw last week for a two-day summit on the Middle East, co-hosted by Poland and the United States, which focused on isolating Iran while building Arab-Israeli ties. The fresh controversy in Polish-Israeli ties comes after a row last year over a Polish law that made it illegal to accuse the Polish nation or state of complicity in Nazi German crimes. After protests from Israel and the United States, Poland amended the law to remove the possibility of fines or a prison sentence. Poland was occupied by Nazi Germany during World War II and lost six million citizens including three million Jews.—AFP

Britain rejects Trump's jihadist repatriation call

LONDON: The British government yesterday rebuffed US President Donald Trump's call to take back alleged UK jihadists captured in Syria and try them at home. Trump tweeted on Sunday that Washington was "asking Britain, France, Germany and other European allies to take back

over 800 ISIS fighters that we captured in Syria and put them on trial". His comments came with diehard Islamic State group fighters trapped in the last pocket of their crumbling "caliphate" in Syria. Prime Minister Theresa May's spokesman said the fighters should be put on trial in places where they committed their crimes. "Foreign fighters should be brought to justice in accordance with due legal process in the most appropriate jurisdiction," Downing Street said. "Where possible, this should be in the region where the crimes had been committed."

The spokesman added that London continued "to work closely with our international partners on this". US allies have been grappling for weeks with

what to do with foreign fighters detained in the war-ravaged country by the Kurdish-led Syrian Democratic Forces. The issue's urgency was raised in Britain after a London school girl who joined the Islamic State in 2015 resurfaced in a Syrian refugee camp last week. Shamima Begum told British media she wanted to come back to London to raise a baby she gave birth to this weekend. UK security officials said they could not block Begum's return since she had never been convicted of any crimes. But they did not rule out prosecuting her upon her arrival.

Meanwhile, Germany vowed yesterday to prosecute German IS fighters but warned that it would be "extremely difficult" to organize the

repatriation of European nationals from Syria, after US President Donald Trump called on allies to take back alleged jihadists. Syria's US-backed Kurdish forces, which are battling Islamic State group jihadists in their last redoubt in eastern Syria, hold hundreds of suspected foreign IS fighters and the calls for their reluctant home countries to take them back have grown in urgency. "We must be able to ensure that prosecution is possible," Defence Minister Ursula von der Leyen told Bild daily. Underlining the difficulties however of putting the ex-fighters on trial, the minister noted that there is "no government in Syria with which we have a sensible relationship". —Agencies

Death row 'spy' in Pakistan 'must be freed', India tells the UN court

'Farcical case based on malicious propaganda'

Indian man sentenced to death for alleged spying in Pakistan, India's lawyers told the UN's top court yesterday, saying his military trial was a "farcical case" based on "malicious propaganda". The hearing concerning Kulbushan Sudhir Jadhav at the International Court of Justice comes amid a sharp spike in tensions between the two nuclear-armed neighbors, after a suicide attack on an Indian military convoy last week and renewed fighting in restive Kashmir.

Jadhav, a former Indian navy officer, was arrested in the restive southwestern Pakistani province of Baluchistan in March 2016 on charges of espionage and sentenced to death by a military court in 2017. India insists Jadhav, 48, was not a spy and that he was kidnapped in Pakistan. New Delhi is now asking the ICJ-which rules in disputes between countries-to nullify his sentence and to order Islamabad to set him free.

'Unlawful'

"Considering the trauma he (Jadhav) has been subjected to over the past three years, it would be in the interest of justice of making human rights a reality, to direct his release," India's lawyer Harish Salve told the judges. "India seeks relief in declaring that the trial by the military court in Pakistan... hopelessly fails to satisfy even minimum standards of due process... and should be declared unlawful," he said, speaking at the Peace Palace, the ICJ's headquarters in The Hague. India's joint secretary at its External Affairs Ministry, Deepak Mittal, told the court the proceedings against Jadhav in Pakistan were based on a "farcical case" and "malicious propaganda".

New Delhi's renewed bid in a controversial court case comes as fresh bloodshed in Kashmir sent tensions

THE HAGUE: Islamabad should be ordered to free an between the neighbors soaring. The rare foray into the international courts by India and Pakistan could be another flashpoint after Thursday's suicide bombing in Indianadministered Kashmir that killed 41 troops. Indian troops suffered new losses yesterday in a fierce battle with Kashmir militants that left at least seven more dead. The latest confrontation piled more pressure on the Indian government, which has blamed Pakistan for the suicide attack that sparked widespread calls for action against its neighbor. Pakistan has rejected the allegations.

'Blurry on facts'

Jadhav was accused of working for the Indian intelligence services in the province bordering Afghanistan, where Islamabad has long accused India of backing separatist rebels. After a closed trial he was sentenced to death by a Pakistani military court on April 10, 2017, on charges of "espionage, sabotage and terrorism". India accused Islamabad of violating the Vienna Convention by failing to provide him with consular access, as well as breaking human rights law. Pakistan's "story has always been strong on rhetoric and blurry on facts," Salve said, adding that consular access should be granted immediately. Islamabad reacted coolly to the ICJ's urgent order at the time to stay Jadhav's execution, saying it "has not changed the status of commander Jadhav's case in any manner". Islamabad's lawyers are to state their case on Tuesday. The ICJ's decision will likely come months after this week's hearings.

Kashmir has been split between India and Pakistan since independence from Britain in 1947 with both countries, which have fought three wars, claiming it as their own. India and Pakistan also routinely accuse each other of sending spies into their countries and it is not uncom-

mon for either nation to expel diplomats accused of espionage, particularly at times of high tension. Death sentences however have been rarely issued in recent years. The last time India and Pakistan took a dispute to the ICJ

was in 1999 when Islamabad protested at the downing of a Pakistani navy plane that killed 16 people. The tribunal decided that it was not competent to rule in the dispute and closed the case. — AFP

China province defends ban on Tibetan lessons

BEIJING: Chinese authorities yesterday defended a ban on schoolchildren attending informal Tibetan language classes taught by Buddhist monks in western China, as religious and cultural freedoms in the country come under increasing pressure. A county in western Qinghai-a province with a large Tibetan population that is mostly Buddhist-in December ordered an immediate halt to informal language classes taught by monks during the winter school holidays.

The lessons taught in monasteries in the province bordering Tibet have gained popularity among parents as a way for their children to learn a language that is being sidelined from the official curriculum. It follows a similar ban last summer barring Tibetan students from taking part in religious activities during their holidays. The provincial government said yesterday that the lessons were "illegal" and said the monasteries were "safety hazards" as well as being "ill-equipped" to teach students.

"According to Chinese law... education is conducted by the government. No organization or person can use religion as a means of obstructing the state education system," it said in a statement. It added that the classes pose a financial burden to students and their families, and contravene regulations to reduce the workload of students. Monasteries and monks who do not follow the new rules will be "dealt with in accordance with the law", the statement said. The regulations follow similar edicts by the ruling Communist Party in other regions with large ethnic minority populations, starting with a clampdown on Islam in Xinjiang, a Muslim-majority region in the far west. — AFP

Thai junta shoots down proposal to slash defense spending

BANGKOK: Thailand's junta defended its \$7 billion defense budget and annual draft yesterday after political opponents proposed slashing military spending by 10 percent and ending conscription after elections. The country spends among the most on defense in Southeast Asia and recent big purchases-including submarines and tanks from China-have drawn criticism in a state riddled with inequality and corruption.

Its generals have grabbed power a dozen times since 1932 with defense spending spiking in lockstep with each coup. Last year the junta-picked National Legislative Assembly proposed a defense budget for 2019 of \$7 billion, a \$1 billion increase since the latest 2014 coup. But Pheu Thai, linked to ex-premier Thaksin Shinawatra and the country's most popular political party, has vowed to end conscription and cut spending by 10 percent if it beats the odds and returns to power after the March 24 poll.

Junta chief Prayut Chan-O-Cha-who hopes to become civilian premier under an army-aligned party after the elec-

tions-on Monday justified the increase as necessary to upgrade obsolete gear. "If we do not have it, our military quality cannot be compared with other countries," he told reporters. Chan-O-Cha said the breakout of war was impossible to predict and in peacetime the army "fights against drugs and illegal entry" into the country.

Military conscription, he added, is "a duty of all Thai men". The army runs an annual draft for 100,000 men each year-all male citizens must participate at least once after they turn 21, but are exempted if they are students. Thailand has not fought a full blown war in living memory, although border disputes have previously turned into bloody conflicts with Laos and more recently Cambodia. The military has used its might more frequently inside the councoups or fighting insurgents in the Muslim-majority "Deep South", bordering Malaysia.

Army chief Apirat Kongsompong gave a coded slapdown to Pheu Thai's leadership over the proposal to cut military spending, insisting they should listen to a nationalist Cold War-era propaganda song, Nhak Paen Din. Roughly translating as "Scum of the Earth", it was the anthem of paramilitary units who led a massacre of at least 41 students protesting the return of a military dictator in October 1976. India pulls down Imran Khan portraits over Kashmir killings

NEW DELHI: Cricket stadiums around India have taken down portraits of Pakistan's former captain-turned-Prime Minister Imran Khan amid protests over the killing of 41 paramilitaries in Indian-administered Kashmir last week. India has blamed Pakistan for the suicide attack on a military convoy that sparked widespread calls for action against the country's neighbor. Khan, who led Pakistan to a World Cup victory in 1992, is considered one of the best players ever, and his portrait is found at many grounds around the world.

But the Cricket Club of India in Mumbai and the Test ground at Mohali have led the portrait protests by removing pictures of Khan

and other Pakistan stars. "We respect the sentiments of the people of India who are angry by what happened in Kashmir. In protest we took off the pictures of all Pakistani players," Punjab Cricket Association treasurer Ajay Tyagi told AFP. "We have kept them in safe custody and will see later what we are going to do about them," he added.

The Pakistan Cricket Board (PCB) slammed the removal of the portraits. "We have always believed and emphasized that sports and politics should be kept separate. History tells us that sports, particularly cricket, have always played a key role in building bridges between people and countries," PCB managing director Wasim Khan said in a statement. He called the protests "highly regrettable." Indian production company IMG Reliance has pulled out of producing the Pakistan Super League Twenty20 matches for broadcasters because of the Pulwama attack. India froze bilateral cricketing ties with Pakistan after deadly attacks on Mumbai in 2008 blamed on militants based across the border. The arch rivals only play each other abroad, and are next scheduled to meet in the World Cup in England starting June 15.— AFP

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Europe food makers find green palm oil hard to stomach

urope, the world's second-biggest buyer of palm oil, is set to miss a 2020 target backed by about 10 countries, as well as big companies, to use 100-percent sustainable supplies of the edible oil in food ingredients, environmental experts warn. A lack of public awareness and debate around the palm oil industry has left nations like Italy, Spain and Poland lagging behind their neighbors in green palm oil purchases, a January report by The Sustainable Trade Initiative (IDH) said. "Countries in northwestern Europe are leading the pack," said Daan Wensing, a director at IDH, a Netherlands-based nonprofit. "Other major destinations are just getting started."

In addition to a lack of government action to force buyers to purchase sustainable palm oil, Wensing said European catering firms and animal feed companies are not coming under consumer pressure to source greener supplies. "The industries that are consumerfacing have stepped up, but sectors like canteen catering services are not really playing ball yet," he told the Thomson Reuters Foundation.

As the world's most widely used edible oil, palm oil is found in everything from margarine to biscuits and soap to soups, as well as in biofuel. But in recent years, the industry has come under close scrutiny from green activists and consumers, who have blamed it for clearing forests for plantations and causing fires, along with the exploitation of workers.

In response, about 10 European governments - including France, the Netherlands and Britain - and major corporate buyers of palm oil like Nestle, Mondelez, PepsiCo and Unilever pledged to purchase only sustainable palm oil by 2020. The European Union has also approved a law to phase out palm oil-based biofuels by 2030, causing outrage in top producer nations Indonesia and Malaysia.

But with less than two years to go until the end of 2020, only 74 percent of palm oil bought by Europe's food industry was certified as sustainable, the IDH report said. "To meet the 100-percent target by 2020 is going to be very difficult because now we move into these markets where there is no consumer pressure or awareness," said Wensing.

Cart before horse

Palm oil certified as sustainable by the global industry watchdog, the Roundtable on Sustainable Palm Oil (RSPO), accounts for about a fifth of global output, at an estimated 12.3 million tons per year. It sells at a premium but demand covers just half of supply. Europe imported an estimated 7 million tons of palm oil in 2017, according to consultancy LMC International, with about 2.6 million tons of that used for food production.

Anne Rosenbarger, Southeast Asia commodities manager at the World Resources Institute Indonesia, said the debate around palm oil had often been politicized, further confusing consumers. British supermarket chain Iceland, for example, said last year it would remove palm oil from its own-brand food by the end of 2018 as part of efforts to stem deforestation. The retailer was then banned from showing a palm oil-themed Christmas advert on television because it was deemed to breach political advertising rules.

Such controversies around palm-oil boycotts are making major brands wary of using the RSPO logo on their products and drawing attention to their use of palm oil, said Rosenbarger. Building greater awareness of sustainable palm oil and the RSPO among consumers would encourage more food makers to use the trademark on their products, she added. Improving transparency around the way the RSPO applies its standards and handles complaints would also help convince more brands to use the logo, researchers said.

The RSPO is backed by major European buyers and has more than 4,000 members, including producers, traders, consumer goods firms and green groups. Even if the "extremely ambitious" 2020 targets set by European buyers fall short, they were required to drive the transformation seen in companies over the last few years, said Rosenbarger, who is also co-chair of the RSPO. "There was a little bit of cart before the horse, but that's part of the growing pains of what needed to happen," she said.

No deforestation

While many companies have put in place sustainable palm oil policies, action and implementation have often been lacking throughout supply chains, said Grant Rosoman, Asia-Pacific campaign advisor at Greenpeace International. He said it was unlikely the 2020 goals would be met because "no deforestation" commitments take years to implement. "A lot of the big traders and buyers just don't want to pay enough for what it takes to do proper, responsibly produced palm oil" be said

European countries that have pledged to buy only sustainable palm oil should enforce those commitments even if they are just refining or taking port deliveries of palm oil to be delivered across Europe, said IDH's Wensing. He called on more European governments to make the 2020 pledge on sustainable palm oil, and for more awareness campaigns to change consumer attitudes and demand. "Governments need to step up their game to make sure it (sustainable palm oil) is the norm in Europe," he said. — Reuters

In Aleppo, gas shortages add to daily woes

s soon as they spotted a truck distributing gas canisters, residents in the Syrian city of Aleppo formed a long queue stretching down the street - a now-familiar sight due to crippling shortages. Security forces and members of a municipal committee shuffled people around into an organized line, as men climbed into the back of the muddy lorry to hand out the cylinders. The mayor of the Salah al-Din district wrote down the personal details of each person who received a gas canister that day.

Umm Bader was one of them. A smile beamed across her face as she struggled to drag the heavy cylinder back home. "I've been standing here every morning for the past three days," said the women in her 50s, wearing a long robe and a black veil. "Today I was lucky," she said. Since December, queuing for hours to buy gas has become part of everyday life in the Salah al-Din district.

The crisis has also hit other government-held cities in Syria, including the capital Damascus, sparking a wave of discontent. Persistent power cuts and a spike in the price of fuel oil has forced residents to increasingly rely on gas to cook and heat their homes. Swelling consumption and increased demand during winter has led to one of the most serious gas shortages in recent years.

The scale of the crisis prompted Syrian President Bashar Al-Assad to acknowledge the problem during a televised speech Sunday. "There has been real suffering, which most of the Syrian people have felt," he said. "There needs to be a change in the distribution system to take into account consumption and population density" in each province, he said.

'Punitive' sanctions

In Aleppo, the mayor of Salah al-Din said just 200 gas canisters a day were reaching a district of 25,000 families.

"Salah al-Din is considered to be the most populated neighborhood in Aleppo," 44-year-old Hassan Al-Jok said. Electricity cuts and high fuel oil prices mean residents are relying mainly on gas for heating, causing "excess in consumption", he said. "I expect the gas supply will improve as spring approaches," he said.

The mayor pointed to sanctions imposed on Syria as a reason behind the crisis, but said they only served to "pun-



ish" the population. Since 2011, the United States and Europe have both slapped sanctions on imports including fuels, as well as Syrian individuals accused of financially backing Assad's regime. In November, the US Treasury issued a new advisory threatening penalties against "insurers, shipping companies, financial institutions, and others involved in petroleum-related shipping transactions with the Government of Syria".

That same month, the treasury moved to disrupt an international network "through which the Iranian regime, working with Russian companies, provides millions of barrels of oil to the Syrian government". The General Competition and Anti-Monopoly Commission, a state

body, said last month the gas crisis was linked to sanctions. In a report published by the pro-government Al-Watan daily, it said economic sanctions were disrupting gas shipments to Syria, which imports up to 80 percent of its fossil fuels from allied countries.

Bad for business

Minister of Petroleum and Mineral Resources Ali Ghanem told parliament last month work was being done to boost local gas production and to identify alternative sources to satisfy growing demand. On average, Syria requires 130,000 gas canisters a day, according to official figures. The government sells each cylinder at a subsidized price of 2,700 Syrian pounds (\$5) but limited supply has forced residents to purchase gas from private vendors at more than double that rate, according to residents.

Local businesses and restaurants that rely heavily on gas are struggling to stay open. In Aleppo's Al-Hamidiyah neighborhood, the owner of a rotisserie chicken shop said he now closes his restaurant early. "Ever since the gas crisis started, we have decreased the amount of food we sell and shortened working hours to avoid closing down completely," said 50-year-old Mohammad Fattouh. "We can't wait in line for hours every day to buy (state-subsidized) gas, so we are forced to pay more to get gas" from private sellers, he said.

Gas shortages are also a problem for Fattouh at home. His wife, Umm Abdu, says she is cooking less and preparing salads instead to limit gas consumption. "We're used to electricity cuts and fuel oil shortages but we're not used to not enough gas, which is a basic necessity," she said. "Finding a gas canister has become yet another dream to add to all the other dreams of a simple Aleppo resident," she said. — AFP

Coffee farmers bet on blockchain to boost business

n a bustling street near the shiny new international airport in Ethiopia's capital is a small coffee roastery with big dreams. Nearly 40 Ethiopians - a third of them women - sift, roast and package prized Arabica beans for export to Europe under the Moyee brand, founded by a Dutch social entrepreneur. The roastery, together with the innovative use of blockchain technology to ensure the supply chain is transparent, represents an attempt to keep as much of the profits as possible in Ethiopia, one of the world's poorest countries.

"It's the world's favorite drink. We drink over 2 billion cups a day," said Killian Stokes, who set up the Irish branch of Moyee. "The industry's worth \$100 billion and yet 90 percent of coffee farmers in Ethiopia live on less than \$2 a day." That is partly because most exporters process the beans elsewhere, but also down to price fluctuations and other factors that make coffee growing a precarious business.

To make things fairer, Moyee has created unique digital identities for the 350 farmers it currently works with - meaning buyers can see exactly how much each individual grower is paid, with prices set at 20 percent above the market rate. Now the brand, whose slogan is "radically good coffee", wants to use blockchain to take that to the next level - allowing buyers to tip farmers, or fund projects such as a new planting program, through a mobile app.

The UN Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) said in a recent report that blockchain had huge potential to address challenges smallholder farmers faced by "reducing uncertainty and enabling trust among market players". The technology, used to underpin cyber-currencies like Bitcoin, allows shared access to data that is

maintained by a network of computers and can quickly trace the hundreds of parties involved in the production and distribution of food. Once entered, any information cannot be altered or tampered with.

'Bigger than the Internet'

Siobhan Kelly, an advisor to the Food Systems Program at the FAO, said blockchain would ultimately be "much bigger than the internet". "Within 10 years - it'll take probably 10 years - it's going to be a major revolution, for everything," said Kelly. Fruit farmers in Caribbean nations are also looking at using blockchain to attract better-paying customers, bring traceability and build a credit trail.

"It's an innovation that is poised to empower local farmers in the Caribbean region," said Pamela Thomas, executive director of the Agriculture Alliance of the Caribbean (AACARI), a regional network of nearly 100,000 farmers. AACARI's project has two components: auditing by accredited professionals to ensure farmers adhere to the Global GAP (good agricultural practices) standards, and a digital marketplace where buyers can find detailed information about the produce. Global GAP is a voluntary standard required by many European and US supermarket chains.

market chains.

Vijay Kandy, whose company is building the blockchain platform, said the auditing process would allow farmers to deal directly with buyers - bypassing the middlemen that many currently rely on - and make access to credit easier. "One reason why buyers from faraway places or different countries go through middlemen is because they rely on them to make sure farmers are following these good practices," he said.

One such buyer is London-based Union Hand-Roasted Coffee. The company sources its coffee directly from growers' cooperatives to ensure higher quality, pays farmers more than minimum price set by the global Fairtrade organization, and works with more than 40 producer groups in 14 countries. — Reuters

Hit by weather, Botswana farmers seek welfare

aipato Kesebang normally grows maize, jugo beans and sweet reed on her 20-hectare plot of land northwest of Gaborone, Botswana's capital. But last year, worsening drought and heatwaves destroyed much of her harvest. "The little that grew feebly we just ate. Nothing was left for storage or to sell," she said. Usually when her crops fail she turns to collecting wild spinach to sell, to support her two sons. But even that is now disappearing as climate change brings harsher weather and more people turn to harvesting the vegetable to survive, she said.

So last year, for the first time, she signed up to Ipelegeng, a long-standing government safety net program that provides temporary jobs for those struggling to make ends meet. Now she works one month out of four cutting back overgrown grass and trees, desilting dams and drains, collecting litter or cleaning streets. She'd prefer to work every month - but demand is so high for the jobs that there aren't enough slots, she said. "We only work for a month, then we go home and wait for three months before we apply again. That's because there are too many people now needing the relief," said Kesebang, as she pulled weeds on her parched plot of land. As harsher droughts and hotter weather linked to climate change ruin crops more frequently in Botswana, the country is facing a new challenge: growing demand for social assistance programmes.

Swelling ranks

About 68,000 people worked for Ipelegeng as of March 2018, according to figures from Statistics Botswana, up from about 64,000 in March 2016. Of those on the rolls, about 47,000 were women, according to the agency. To accommodate

rising demand, Botswana's government last August increased the number of Ipelegeng slots by 5,000, after declaring 2018-2019

an expected drought year.

That will cost the country an extra \$2.7 million - money that it does not readily have as its national budget does not specifically set money aside for drought relief, said Billyboy Siabatho, deputy director of the rural development council at the Ministry of Local Government and Rural Development. "Often, when drought comes, we end up borrowing from funds that would have been set aside for infrastructure development projects," he said.

Ipelegeng's main objective is to provide short term employment and relief, while helping carry out development efforts the country sees as important, he said. "During drought periods, there are fewer farming activities. Therefore most people relocate from farms to villages, looking for alternative sources of income," Siabatho said. "Due to limited job opportunities in rural areas, most people rely on Ipelegeng as an alternative source of employment," he noted.

But as droughts continue to worsen in southern Africa, Siabatho wonders whether the government will be able to keep pace with growing demand. He also worries whether people will begin to see dependence on safety nets as an easier route than farming, as crop failures worsen. Botswana's government, aware of the risks from worsening drought, began in December working on a new drought management strategy that aims to improve planning and budgeting for threats and not focus simply on responding to them, Siabatho said.

For Kesebang, such help can't come soon enough. Her farm, a few kilometres out of the town of Molepolole, sits in Kweneng District, which has the highest poverty levels in the country, of over 50 percent, according to 2018 report by Statistics Botswana. Most of the 567 pula (\$55) she earns each month she works for Ipelegeng goes to keep her youngest son in primary school. "I buy books and uniform. Often nothing is really left. Life has become difficult," she said. — Reuters

CMA project to set capital adequacy standards

Authority eyes effective monitoring system in accordance with global standards

launched a project to prepare regulations of capital adequacy standard for licensed persons with a view to establishing an effective monitoring system in accordance with international standards.

This is in tune with the CMA's comprehensive vision to enhance its legislative infrastructure and within its role as a monitoring auditor of the Kuwait capital market.

A capital requirement, also known as regulatory capital or capital adequacy, is the amount of capital a bank or other financial institution has to hold as required by its financial regulator. This is usually expressed as a capital adequacy ratio of equity that must be held as a percentage of risk-weighted assets.

The CMA's move is as per law no 7 of 2010 regarding the establishment of the Capital Markets Authority and regulating securities activities and its amendments, namely clause number 2 of article 66 of the law, which states "A person licensed to engage in the management of securities activities shall comply with the regulations specified in the bylaws and in particular maintaining adequate capital", as well as article 64 which states "The authority may request from persons licensed to engage in securities activities to submit periodic reports on all their activities to make sure they are capable of carrying on with their business and particularly have adequate capital that suits the volume and type of their securities activities".

These regulations are a major step in this regard as

EU vows 'swift' riposte to threatened **US** auto tariffs

BRUSSELS: The EU promised a quick and effective response if the United States imposes import duties on European autos, a spokesman for the European Commission said yesterday.

Brussels issued the threat after the US Commerce Department filed a report yesterday that empowered President Donald Trump to apply car duties within the next 90 days.

German Chancellor Angela Merkel has labelled as "frightening" the prospect that this report could label European car imports as a national security threat to the United States, enabling the tariffs. The White House has already used the national security argument-saying that undermining the American manufacturing base impairs military readiness, among other claims-to impose steep tariffs on steel and aluminum imports.

"Were this report translated into action detrimental to European exports, the European Commission would react in a swift and adequate manner," EU spokesman Margaritis Schinas told a news briefing in Brussels. The protectionist Trump has threatened 25 percent duties on European autos, especially targeting Germany, which he says has harmed the American car industry. In 2017 just under half of the 17 million cars sold in the US were imported, most of them produced in Canada and Mexico which are expected to be exempt from any new automobile duties.

German automobile groups last year exported 470,000 cars from Germany to the United States, according to the VDA manufacturers' federation.

The transatlantic flare-up followed a truce established in July, in which Trump and European Commission President Jean-Claude Juncker pledged no new tariffs while both sides pursued a limited trade deal.

Juncker "trusts President Trump's word. The European Union will stick to its word as long as the US does the same," Schinas said. Aside from economic matters, US-European ties have already been upended over Trump's approach towards Iran and Syria, as well as other issues. —AFP

Italy leads peripheral rally on expectation of ECB stimulus

LONDON: Short-dated Italian government bonds outperformed yesterday, their yields falling the most among euro-zone bonds to lead a rally in the periphery, on expectations of further monetary easing from the European Central Bank.

Italian two- and five-year government bond yields fell as much as eight basis points after comments by ECB policymakers François Villeroy de Galhau, Olli Rehn and Benoit Coeure raised expectations of new stimulus from the central bank.

Coeure's comments on Friday saw eurozone banking shares jump over 3 percent, the euro fall and Italy's bond yields tumble. Italian short-dated bonds outperformed because analysts expect the ECB's next round of cheap loans to banks to have a maturity of two to four years, according to Daniel Lenz, rates strategist at DZ Bank. "We expect banks to invest in the same maturities as this tender," he said.

Rehn told a German newspaper that recent data suggested a weakening eurozone economy, adding that interest rates would remain where they were until monetary policy goals were met.

Analysts took Villeroy de Galhau's comments to indicate that if Europe's economic slowdown looks permanent, the ECB might delay its forward guidance on interest rates.

Expectations of a fresh round of cheap funding for banks helped peripheral bonds yesterday, when Italy's government bond yields extended declines late last week by around two basis points across the curve. Italy's 10-year bond yield fell to a two-week low of 2.76 percent. Spain's 10-year government bond yield was also down one basis point to 1.234 percent.

The market was pinning hopes on a single-party government in Italy, Lenz said, after the country's 5-



Star Movement called an online vote to decide whether to block a possible kidnapping trial of Matteo Salvini, the leader of 5-Star's coalition ally, the League party.

"In case there is a majority, this could trigger new speculation about the end of the ruling coalition in Rome and increases the chance of snap elections," he said.

The ECB chatter also helped Portuguese bonds, with its 10-year government bond yield hitting its lowest since March 2015, down two basis points on the day to

Elsewhere, Germany's 10-year government bond, the benchmark for the region, held near 0.10 percent after falling as low as 0.07 percent on Feb 8. Some 20 billion to 23.5 billion euros of new supply is due this week, analysts at UniCredit predicted. New issuance from France, Spain, Germany, Italy and Slovakia will be supported by 16 billion euros of redemptions from Germany and 0.5 billion euros of coupons from Ireland, Austria and Germany.

France has mandated banks for the issue of a new 30-year bond to be sold soon, the Agence France Tresor public debt management agency said yesterday. In addition, Cyprus picked Citi, Goldman Sachs and HSBC to arrange fixed-income investor meetings for a new euro-denominated deal that may come this week. —Reuters

China unveils guidelines for developing **Greater Bay Area**

BEIJING: China's cabinet yesterday issued guidelines for developing a "Greater Bay Area" around the Pearl

River Delta, in a bid to spur growth and transformation in Guangdong province and the cities of Hong Kong and Macau. The area is home to some 68 million people with a combined GDP of \$1.5 trillion, roughly that of Australia or South Korea.

The development plans will "further enhance and support and leading role of Guangdong-Hong Kong-Macau Greater Bay Area in national economic development and opening up", the

Xinhua news agency said, citing the cabinet's guidelines.

The aim is to turn the Greater Bay Area into a global technology innovation center and build advanced manufacturing and modern services industries, it said.

The area will also promote "coordinated development and create a model for high quality development", it said. Authorities will expand and upgrade airports in Hong Kong, Macau, Guangzhou and Shenzhen, and accelerate construction of large-scale oil reserve bases in the Pearl River Delta area. Xinhua said. Financial institutions in the Greater Bay Area will be allowed to conduct spot and forward yuan trading and yuan derivatives and conduct cross-border yuan lending, Xinhua said. Companies in the Greater Bay Area would be allowed to issue yuan-denominated bonds within the area, it said. —Reuters

Swiss bank UBS faces French court ruling on fraud charges

PARIS: A Paris court will rule tomorrow on whether Swiss banking giant UBS illegally tried to convince French clients to hide billions of euros in Switzerland, charges which prompted prosecutors to seek a record 3.7 billion-euro fine. The trial opened last autumn after seven years of investigations, launched when several former employees came forward with claims of unlawful conduct.

The move came as authorities across Europe cracked down on tax evasion and dubious banking practices in the wake of the global financial crisis which erupted in 2007.

The pressure eventually forced Switzerland to effectively end its tradition of ironclad bank secrecy, by joining more than 90 countries which agreed to automatically share more client account information among each other. In the UBS case, French authorities determined that more than 10 billion euros had been kept from the eyes of tax officials between 2004 and 2012.

The National Financial Prosecutor's office urged a 3.7 billion euro (\$4.2 billion) fine, the largest ever sought in France, saying the bank and its directors "were perfectly aware that they were breaking French law" by unlawfully soliciting clients and helping them evade French taxes.

They also sought a 15 million-euro fine for UBS's French subsidiary, and fines of up to 500,000 euros for six top executives, including Raoul Weil, the former third-in-command at UBS, and Patrick de Fayet, formerly the second-ranking executive for its French operations.

In addition, lawyers for the French state, which is a plaintiff in the case, asked for 1.6 billion euros in damages. UBS, which was ordered to post 1.1 billion euros in bail, has denied the charges and said its operations complied with Swiss law.

It also says that it was "unaware" that some French clients had failed to declare assets in Switzerland, and that prosecutors have not produced any proof, such as client names or account numbers, to back up their fraud claims. The case is being closely watched by industry executives at a time when Paris and other European capitals are hoping to lure multinational banks from London as Brexit looms.

'Milk tickets'

UBS is accused of organizing or inviting prospective clients to prestigious outings such as the French Open or luxury hunt-

ing retreats, where UBS's Swiss bankers would meet their "prospects"-something they were not allowed to do under French law. UBS France directors then used notes called "milk tickets" to keep track of how many "milk cans"-amounts of money-were transferred to Swiss accounts. They say the system was merely a way to balance out bonuses due to French bankers who were effectively losing a client to their Swiss peers, and the notes were later destroyed.

But investigators claim the "milk tickets" were proof that UBS had a parallel accounting system for keeping the transfers off its official books.

Only one "milk ticket" was found during the inquiry, prompting defense lawyers to argue there was no proof to justify claims of a massive fraud. Yet prosecutors pointed to the roughly 3,700 French UBS clients who later took advantage of an amnesty offer to regularize their tax declarations with the French authorities. UBS has been embroiled in a series of similar cases, most notably in the United States, where the authorities said the bank used Switzerland's banking secrecy laws to help rich clients avoid taxes. In 2009 it paid \$780 million to settle charges it helped thousands of American citizens hide money from the Internal Revenue Service, and agreed to turn over information on hundreds of clients, severely denting Switzerland's long tradition of shielding banking clients and their operations from prying eyes.

That case was also prompted by a former American UBS employee turned whistleblower, Bradley Birkenfeld, whose book "Lucifer's Banker: The Untold Story of How I Destroyed Swiss Bank Secrecy" was published in 2016.

Last November UBS was again sued by US authorities, who accuse the bank of misleading investors over the sale of mortgage-backed securities in 2006 and 2007, just before the financial crisis struck. UBS has denied the charges and said it will defend itself "vigorously". — AFP

Norwegian Air sets big discount for share sale

OSLO: Norwegian Air will sell new shares at just a third of the current market price when the loss-making airline seeks to raise money from its owners in the next few weeks, it said yesterday.

Norwegian Air said on Jan. 29 it planned to raise 3 billion Norwegian crowns (\$348 million) in a share sale to bolster its finances, just days after British

Airways owner IAG ruled out a bid for the budget airline.

Norwegian is trying to replicate on transatlantic flights the low-cost model that dominates the short-haul market via companies such as Ryanair and easyJet, but is struggling to make the business profitable. The European airline sector is struggling with over-capacity and high fuel costs, with several companies going out of business, the latest being British budget airline Flybmi, which filed for bankruptcy on Sunday.

In the rights issue, Norwegian's shareholders will get two subscription rights to buy shares for every share they currently own, and new shares will be sold at 33 crowns each, compared with

Friday's closing price of 97.34 crowns. By selling new shares far below the current market price, Norwegian will boost the value of each of the purchasing rights, which can in turn be bought and sold.

The company's shares fell as much as 15 percent to a six-and-a-half year low of 83 crowns on Monday, before paring losses to trade down 8.8 percent at 88.8 crowns by 1300 GMT, valuing the business at about 4 billion crowns.

"Based on the (Friday) closing price, the theoretical value of each subscription right is NOK 21.45 and the theoretical value of the two subscription rights received per existing share is NOK 42.90," Norwegian said in a statement. — Reuters

How South African mines cope with power cuts

JOHANNESBURG/LONDON: South African utility Eskom imposed the worst power cuts in several years on homes and businesses last week, conjuring up memories of the 2008 crisis when the grid nearly collapsed and cost the mining industry billions in lost output.

Although Eskom - which supplies around 90 percent of power in Africa's most industrialized economy - paused the blackouts on Friday for the first time in five days, it warned that its creaking infrastructure could buckle at any time. A decade ago, the state utility ordered mining houses to evacuate all underground staff and cease mining operations for five days as it cut electricity supply to minimum levels.

It is not clear how much the industry, which consumes about 15 percent of Eskom's annual output, lost in production but the crisis sent prices of both gold and platinum to record levels and pummeled the rand. But mining companies now appear to be better prepared to cope with the scheduled blackouts thanks largely to an agreement struck in 2010 between Eskom and the industry that allows it to continue operating on reduced power.

"The South African mines are probably a little bit better prepared for electricity cuts than they were 10 years ago," said Peter Major, an analyst and director of mining at Mergence Corporate Solutions.

Anglo American Platinum Ltd (Amplats), the world's top producer of the metal, said it lost 14,000 ounces or less than 1 percent of annual output - based on 2018 production - last week.

Diversified miners Exxaro and Anglo American said their operations were affected to varying degrees while AngloGold Ashanti said safety and production were untouched. An industry group, the Mineral Council, did not give specific details about the impact of last week's power cuts on production but said the effect on output for the sector had been minimal. Miners including Impala Platinum, Harmony and Sibanye-Stillwater have also been working on reducing their reliance on Eskom by setting up their own power generators. However, it has been difficult to get that off the ground because of red tape and prohibitive costs, they say.

What is at stake?

South Africa is home to the world's biggest platinum group metals deposits, accounting for just over 90 percent of global production. Any disruption in output could directly affect prices of the white metal. The mining industry directly contributes more than 7 percent to the economy which has been struggling with anaemic growth over the last 10 years.

Miners, among the biggest consumers of electricity in the country, are already grappling with weak profits that could be exacerbated by the potential loss of output if Eskom imposes deeper power cuts.

The potential impact on jobs is also a concern in a country with a jobless rate of more than 27 percent and has prompted fierce opposition from the coun-

try's powerful trade unions to President Cyril Ramaphohsa's plan to split the utility. "With all these power cuts through Eskom there will be consequences ... People will lose their work for less time put in for work and we are very, very concerned about this," said Stanford Mazhindu, spokesperson of trade union UASA.

What are miners doing to cope?

The 2010 agreement between Eskom and the mining industry has partly shielded miners from the massive disruption caused by the 2008 power cuts, when the sector was forced to shut for five days to allow the grid to recover. Under the scheme, Eskom gives the industry notice to reduce their power consumption by between 15 and 20 percent when the national grid is at its tightest and unable to meet demand.

"If it's a 15 or 20 percent reduction in demand and it goes on for an extended period, it can have quite a big impact," said Sibanye spokesman James Wellsted.

For instance, concentrators are switched off and water pumps that would prevent underground dams from flooding are only turned on during low usage hours at night, he said. Impala Platinum reduces its usage of power-intensive equipment, including furnaces, during national peak usage times when residential consumers are just waking up or have just returned from work, spokesman Johan Theron said.

Aare these measures enough?

Despite these measures, business leaders and the Mineral Council are still concerned about the risks Eskom poses to the industry. Impala's Theron said shifting energy-intensive work to an off-peak demand period in the middle of the night to catch up on lost production "is not ideal or sustainable, as it will impact the business over time in that wear on furnaces are accelerated under these operating conditions".

While the industry was coping, extended rolling blackouts would have affected the commercial viability of mines, particularly deep-level mining and platinum mines, Mineral Council spokeswoman Charmane Russell said.

Attempts by miners to produce their own power are expensive, as Eskom requires them to connect to the grid for a fee. The variety of legal codes found at the energy regulator and energy ministry are additional hurdles to independent power generation, they say. The volume of electricity consumed by the industry is also too much to rely solely on self-generation.

"We need to fix Eskom, to think that underground gold mining can survive without Eskom is going to be difficult," said Peter Steenkamp, the chief executive of gold miner Harmony.

However, a few companies have succeeded in cutting dependency on the grid. Petrochemicals firm Sasol produces 70 percent of its electricity needs to power its sprawling plants. Power generation, from steam turbines commissioned in 2010 and contracted with Eskom via a medium-term power purchase program, helped to alleviate Eskom's shortages at the time, Sasol said. But companies such as Sibanye are struggling to do the same. The precious metals producer has pushed back plans, unveiled in 2014, to build a solar plant because of difficulty in getting finance for the project and bureaucracy related to connecting to the national power grid. Harmony Gold has also been trying to build a 30 megawatt solar plant. Amplats said it was also considering building a 100 megawatt solar power plant at the group's Mogalakwena mine. — Reuters

Japan trial to treat spinal cord injuries with stem cells

TOKYO: A team of Japanese researchers will carry out an unprecedented trial using a kind of stem researching cell treatment. cell to try to treat debilitating spinal cord injuries, the specialists said yesterday. The team at Tokyo's Keio University has received government approval for a trial using so-called induced Pluripotent Stem (iPS) cells — which have the potential to develop into any cell in the body — to treat patients with serious spinal cord injuries.

The trial, expected to begin later this year, will initially focus on four patients who suffered their injuries just 14 to 28 days beforehand, the university said. The team will transplant two million iPS cells into the spines of the patients, who will then go through rehabilitation and be monitored for a year. The strict limitations on the number of participants is necessary because the process is an "unprecedented, world first clinical trial", the uni-

Finally we can start a clinical trial," Hidevuki Okano, a professor of physiology, said at a press conference. "We want to do our best to establish safety and provide the treatment to patients," he added. There are more than 100,000 patients in Japan who are paralyzed due to spinal cord injuries but there is no effective treatment.

The primary purpose of the trial is to confirm the safety of the transplanted cells and the method of the transplant, the researchers said. The research team hopes to test the efficacy and safety of the treatment for chronic injuries as well in the future if they can confirm the safety of the

The cells can be transformed into a range of different types of cells, and their use is a key sector of medical research. — AFP

workshop for compensatory systems that deals with erectile dysfunction. It was done alongside a visiting doctor from France, who is a urology surgery consultant. This was his visit to the hospital and third to Kuwait. Al-Ghanim said, we carried out several operations using new state of the art techniques in the field of compensatory equipment, and they were all successful, and we fortunately did not face any complications.

He said the medical team at Jaber Armed Forces Hospital always carry out such operations, but we use some visiting doctors, especially those who we worked with before in order to exchange expert-

ise in this field. There is also the fact that these operations are done more frequently in Europe due to the larger population. He said compensatory systems are the last resort in treating erectile dysfunction, as we try several normal means as well as stop smoking, exercise, eating habits, then treatment with pills, then local injections and then finally compensatory systems as a last resort and they have proved highly effective.


The film has already changed the lives of its cast members, many of whom were experiencing the same struggles as their characters during the grueling sixmonth shoot. "Capernaum" follows the travails of Zain, a malnourished boy who runs away from his family when his 11-year-old sister Sahar is sold into marriage. He is sheltered by an undocumented African worker named Rahil and ends up looking after her baby boy Yonas when she is arrested and jailed. The parallels between the film's script and what happened to the actors in real life are uncanny.

'No make believe'

Baby Yonas's on-screen and real-life mothers were arrested together during filming and both were in jail when the scenes of the two children being left to their own devices in the streets of Beirut were being shot. In the film, Zain keeps dreaming that he will one day escape his misery and move to Sweden. The Syrian refugee child who plays Zain's character was recently resettled by the United Nations in Norway, where he now lives with family in a house overlooking the sea.

"I don't know why those things kept happening, maybe because the script was inspired by so much reality that it was actually bound to happen," Labaki said. Zain is now going to school as are his parents as well as several other of the film's children. Capernaum has already achieved new milestones for Lebanese cinema and received glowing endorsements from media mogul Oprah Winfrey and others. Some critics however argued the film was unsubtle in rubbing the viewer's

nose in social squalor, telling the audience when to smile and when to cry. But restraint, Labaki retorts, is just not in her culture. "It's as if people, especially critics, want all cinemas coming from all parts of the world to look the same way," she said. "Let each country bring its own identity."

"It's really very hurtful to hear words like 'poverty porn' or 'emotional manipulation'," Labaki said. "Especially when there's no big make believe in the film, everything that is in the film is a reality." The activist in her wanted to jolt her audience into action and mobilize decision-makers in Lebanon, a country where Syrian refugees account for a quarter of the population but where faith in the government is rock-bottom.

"People come to me in tears, people say 'You changed me forever', 'I'm not looking at the child I see under the bridge every day in the same way', 'I want to do something about it', 'How can we help?'," Labaki said. She said an Oscar on February 24 would further increase her chances of making a difference. "Why do we use the word influencers? A celebrity is an influencer whether they like it or not, so they need to use this influence in the best way possible." — AFP

ichard E. Grant was told he "looked too weird" to make it as an actor when he was studying drama at university. The 61-year-old actor has revealed that when he was studying drama at the University of Cape Town his adviser predicted that he wasn't "cut out" for Hollywood because of his looks. 



Future styles: Could virtual clothes reduce the damage of fast fashion?

Striking a pose in the mirror, Swedish model and stylist Lisa Anckarman shows off a new jacket with a difference on Instagram - though it fits her perfectly in the photo, it's a virtual design that does not exist in real life. She is among a number of trendsetters embracing cutting-edge technology that offers the opportunity to sate appetites for fast fashion while dramatically slashing the emissions, pollution and labor abuses linked to the garment industry. "I really liked the idea and the aspect that it's good for the environment,' Anckarman told the Thomson Reuters Foundation as she discussed her virtual styling.

"Actually I think it maybe looked too good because people didn't really get that it was digital. "People were asking me 'Where did you buy this?" and I was saying, 'It's digital', and they were like, 'No, at what shop did you buy it?"" Fashion is one of the world's most damaging industries - it is responsible for about 10 percent of all greenhouse gas emissions, sucks up scarce water and creates vast amounts of pollution and waste. But the desire for the latest look is only increasing. Global fashion sales grew by about 4.5 percent to \$1.7 trillion in 2018, found analysts at McKinsey and Company, who said social media is bringing trends to consumers at an ever swifter pace.

Some businesses are now looking to meet the demand for new styles through digital designs, with Scandinavian fashion firm Carlings convincing its customers to pay real cash for virtual clothes that are digitally "fitted" onto users' photographs. "It was kind of scary (launching it) but the response was so overwhelming that we were convinced we were on to something," said Ronny Mikalsen, the firm's brand director. The first Carlings designs, costing between 10 euros (\$11) and 30 euros, sold out and a second digital collection is due to be released in spring 2019.

High fashion, low emissions

Digital clothes create far lower emissions than physical clothes as they cut out the long, laborintensive process of sourcing materials, producing fabrics, making garments and shipping them worldwide. While virtual styles may still be niche, experts say they are set to grow as technology seeps into more aspects of human lives. Younger generations in particular are keen to curate their online personas as much as their real-life image, said Matthew Drinkwater, the head of the Fashion Innovation Agency based at the London College of Fashion.

On Instagram you have to ask "how much of that is a real person and how much is an enhanced version or a way they wish to portray themselves?" he said. The increasing use of filters on social media that can add cute dog ears or a flower crown on top of a photo or edit video in real time to make people vomit rainbows shows how people are already using digital effects to play with their image, he said.

"In a very simple sense people are beginning to enhance or alter the way that they look," he said. "You can begin to see a drift towards this merging of physical and digital." Shopping habits are already changing to meet the demands of online images: nearly one in 10 people have bought clothes to wear once, with the aim of sharing their outfit on social media, according to a survey of 2,000 Britons by finance firm Barclaycard last summer.

"If you get caught wearing the same clothes too many times it's seen as a bad thing," said Morten Grubak from the Virtue creative agency, who came up with the Carlings campaign. "One of the worst things you can write under images is 'Not again', making the hint they have posted that outfit before."

'Physics-defying' outfits

Some involved in virtual fashion said they had set out to offer a new solution to the industry's climate damage and waste rather than trying to persuade consumers to buy less. Right now (environmental campaigns) are always about, like, how much water did we save producing these jeans and people don't care about that," said Grubak. 'Instead of getting angry with people doing fashion on Instagram, how can we innovatively solve that problem by adding a new platform?" Other companies said they had taken a deliberate decision to avoid the traditional fashion market entirely. "We've made a very clear point of never wanting to be a physical fashion brand," said Kerry Murphy of Dutch digital fashion house The Fabricant, which creates only virtual designs.

"We believe the world does not need more clothing. It's an incredibly wasteful and polluting industry. That's why we very consciously said we want to re-imagine fashion." Digital design also opens up new possibilities to play with fashion, from using fabrics like rubber which would be relatively uncomfortable in real life through to dabbling in exotic skins or even physics-defying fantasies. "Clothing will definitely have a different meaning because it does not have the same functionality as physical clothing," Murphy said.

"People can wear fire or they wear rain or they can be a dinosaur, so the possibilities are limitless.' Those involved in the digital design industry said it will not offer a complete solution to fashion's emissions and waste problems, but it can help by encouraging people to update their existing wardrobes with virtual flourishes. And as technology advances, virtual fashion could sashay into the mainstream, said Drinkwater.

Within a decade, people could regularly wear high-tech glasses that can apply digital effects over what the wearer sees in real life, he predicted, meaning virtual clothes will no longer be restricted to a computer or phone screen. —Reuters

'No love scenes' for Hagler as boxing legend eyes more silver screen action

merican boxing legend Marvelous Marvin Hagler may be 64 but he told AFP that age won't stop him hunting down more roles in action adventure movies. However, there is one condition-he will not do love scenes. The undisputed middleweight world champion from 1980-87 has made four films in Italy where he lives with his second wife Kay. His most recent silver screen appearances were in 1997 in movies Notti di Paura and Virtual Weapon. However, Hagler says while he enjoys commentating and carrying out charity work, the chance to lose himself playing someone else in movies has its attractions

"Hopefully for me to land another film," he told AFP of his future plans. "I love to do that, that is what I have been doing, action and adventure." However, light-heartedly suggesting that his wife may not be happy, he added: "You always get the girl in adventure films, but I cannot do any love scenes." Hagler, who retired from the ring after a controversial loss to bitter rival Sugar Ray Leonard in 1987, says he found himself as immersed in films as he had once been in boxing. "It is not real; it is all

fake, a fantasy," said Hagler, who is in Monaco for the annual Laureus Awards. "You can die and come back the next day, you know what that stuff cracks me up.

"Its another game in the sense you can get lost and become another character. "I got to live it same as I did it in boxing-walk it, talk it, live it, sleep it just try not to look like it afterwards!"

'Brings back respect'

Hagler, who retired with a record of 62 wins, including 52 inside the distance, two draws and three defeats, shakes his head at the amount of titles that are on offer in his former sport today compared to his heyday. "Now they have so much they throw them (titles) away like candy," he said. "It was a long hard road in my day. I said you have to kill me to take it (the title)." Hagler says there is one boxer who he believes represents the good old days and that is Kazakhstan's former unified middleweight champion Gennady Golovkin. "I saw 'Triple G' (Golovkin's nickname) and I told him I am glad that you became

champion because it brings back respect into my division, you look like a champion who will be there for a while. "Most champions these days, they come and they go, they confuse the public, who do not know who the real champion is. "Right now they think Mike Tyson is the champion," he adds, chuckling.

Hagler, though, derives great pleasure in his work with disadvantaged youngsters in his role as an academy member of Laureus, a global movement that aims to use the power of sport to tackle social challenges in the world. "I like to give them hope and direction and put a smile on their faces," he said. "I went to Brazil before the Olympics to see some of these kids who had bad habits. "I had to step in there but my wife says 'Marvin, what are you doing?'. However it gets into your blood and you get carried away. "The coach (at the gym) says I am not going to stop you going in there. "It is important to catch them when they are young. It was exciting and they responded." — AFP

Rarer than a Sumatran rhino: A woman composer

amille Pepin is part of a very rare breed. She is a female composer. Women have conquered space, risen in the military ranks, but some professions remain resolutely and bewilderingly masculine. When Pepin turned up for her first day at the Paris Conservatoire-as usual the only woman in a class of men-an official told her that her name wasn't on the list. But when she insisted that she was and that he look again, he cried, "Ah, you're a woman!" Camille is also a man's name in France.

"I would never have thought," he apologized. "There are so many men..." With so few female composers in the classical music repertoire, it was an easy mistake to make. Pepin has never let everyday sexism get her down though, laughing it off like water off a duck's back. "One male composer told me I was getting commissions because I was a woman and not too bad looking," said the 28-year-old, whose first album, "Chamber Music", is released later this month. After a concert of one of her more combative pieces, "a man came to tell me my music was 'very fresh, flowery and sweet'," she told AFP.

"I am a woman so clearly those three words" apply, she said wryly. Pepin, whose music recalls both Claude Debussy and American minimalist composers like John Adams, said sometimes the sexist stereotypes which persist in the classical music world are hard to take.

Only woman

One "old school" music professor insisted she sit on his right at lunch "because that was a woman's place" and sent her off to make the coffee. "I was the only woman in all my classes in the Conservatoire, and it was fine," said Pepin, who is now working on her first ballet score in her Paris apartment which doubles as a studio. Mostly the young composer, who made her breakthrough with the orchestral piece "Vajrayana" in 2015, said she was treated exactly the same as her male colleagues in classes with French contemporary composers like Guillaume Connesson, Thierry Escaich and Marc-Andre Dalbavie.

Beyond the classroom, however, progress is slow in the conservative world of classical music. Pepin believes it will take generations for the forgotten work of female composers to get just recognition. Beyond the casual unthinking sexism, she said the biggest problem for young female composers was "a lack of role models". A few woman such as the American composer Meredith Monk, Kaija Saariaho of Finland and Tansy Davies from Britain have managed to break the glass ceiling.

Written out of history

But even Pepin admitted that when she was younger she didn't know of a single female composer. "We never studied them," she said. Who has ever heard of Helene de Montgeroult (1764-1836), Louise Farrenc (1804-1875) or Fanny Mendelssohn (1805-1847)? Fanny was the older sister of the more famous Felix Mendelssohn, with many at the time saying her work was more expressive. But after she married she was limited to domestic duties and had to content herself with being her brother's chief editor and muse, which led him to call her his "Minerva" of wisdom.

"Lots of female composers were crushed like Clara Schumann (the wife of Robert Schumann)," despite being one of the most distinguished composers and musicians of the Romantic era, said the pianist Celia Oneto Bensaid, who often performs Pepin's work. "You play my music," Schumann once bluntly told his wife, a star of concert halls across Europe.

Began at age 13

Born into a family in the northern French city of Amiens that wasn't particularly musical, Pepin began to write her own melodies at 13. But even at the age of five in her ballet class, her eyes were more drawn to the piano. "I was so fascinated that I would forget to do my exercises," she said. Before settling on composing, Pepin thought about being a dancer. "I need to feel the notes physically," she said.

Her first ballet will be choreographed next year by Sylvain pad for France's Ballet du Nord. Finally, she feels she is getting beyond the dreaded question-"But what do you do for a living?"-when she tells people she's a composer. "They thought it was just something I did to chill on Sundays," she laughed. —AFP

Investigation into alleged attack on US actor has 'shifted'

n investigation into an alleged attack on an openly gay black actor has "shifted" and police are now seeking a follow-up interview with the "Empire" cast member, a spokesman said Sunday. Jussie Smollett, 36, reported to police on January 29 that two men beat him, yelled racial and homophobic slurs, poured bleach on him and tied a rope around his neck while he walked downtown in the third-largest American city. The announced change in direction came two days after police said that the two "potential suspects" in the attack had been released without charge and as US media outlets reported that the attack may have been staged.

"The information received from the individuals questioned by police earlier in the Empire case has in fact shifted the trajectory of the investigation," Chicago police spokesman Anthony Guglielmi said in a statement. "We've reached out to the Empire cast member's attorney to request a follow-up interview," he added. Multiple US media outlets reported the two men are brothers who were arrested at Chicago's O'Hare airport upon their return from a trip to Nigeria.

At least one of the men reportedly worked on "Empire," a TV series about the fortunes of a hip-hop mogul and his family battling over control of a multi-million-dollar music company. In an emotional interview with ABC's "Good Morning America" broadcast Thursday, Smollett gave details of the purported attack and said he was angry at doubts about its veracity. Smollett said a masked man

yelled "Empire" as the actor was walking through an intersection after a late-night stop at a sandwich shop.

After he ignored the man, Smollett said the attacker yelled out a racial slur and used President Donald Trump's campaign slogan acronym "MAGA," which stands for "Make America Great Again." Smollett said the man called Chicago "MAGA country" and then punched him in

the face, at which point the actor fought with the attacker, and was kicked by a second man he had not noticed earlier. "It felt like minutes, but it was probably like 30 seconds, honestly," Smollett said. Initial reports of the attack shocked the entertainment industry and brought waves of support from advocacy groups and senior politicians, including Democratic presidential hopefuls Kamala Harris, Cory Booker and Kirsten Gillibrand. — AFP

Istanbul vets make city's stray animals feel at home

oncerned for the health of a black cat roaming around the university campus where she works, Mevlude dropped off the feline at the veterinary clinic for street animals run by the Istanbul municipality. Visitors to the Turkish city, who admire its centuries-old mosques and Ottoman palaces, are often surprised to see cats and dogs making themselves at home on the streets, and watch them taking the best seats in cafes and restaurants without a care for the world. Like Mevlude, many Istanbul residents try to help these four-legged friends in their neighborhood, putting out bowls of food and offering shelter by their doors or windows.

Now Istanbul officials are increasing efforts to ensure the good health of the street animals, and thereby of the residents who come into contact with them. That care can be seen at the "Vetbus", where Mevlude brought the black cat because one of its eyes had been closed for several days. The bus is a mobile clinic stationed for several days in different neighborhoods around the Turkish metropolis. "We often get in touch with the municipality when we see animals who are in need of care," Mevlude said, once reassured over the cat's health whose eyes were now wide open. "People generally bring the animals that they take care of... so that they are given anti-parasite" treatment, said Nihan Dincer, a veterinarian working for the Istanbul Metropolitan Municipality (IBB). And "because people are in constant contact with them, they are also protected", she added.

Islamic tradition

The attention given by Istanbul residents to caring for street animals partly "comes from the Islamic tradition, and part of it... comes from the structuring of the public space in the Ottoman Empire," Mine Yildirim, a doctoral candidate at the New School for Social Research in New York, said. In Ottoman times, people moved between home, the mosque and the market. The streets were the space for the dogs, the researcher said. Then in the early 20th century there were extermination policies like in the West, and

even in the 1990s city officials would put poison on the streets to kill animals, said Yildirim, coordinator of the collective "Dort Avakli Sehir" (Four-legged City).

But an animal protection law passed in 2004 forced municipalities to take care of street animals. In Istanbul, as well as the mobile clinic, IBB maintains six health centers. The aim is to vaccinate, sterilize and take care of around 130,000 dogs and 165,000 cats who live on the streets, according to the municipality. The animals, fitted with a microchip, are then taken back to where they were found, except those which are adopted by individuals during their stay at the health centers.

Due to the development of these services, the municipality has cared for 73,608 animals in 2018 — that compares with only 2,470 back in 2004. There hasn't been a single case of rabies in Istanbul since 2016, according to the municipality which employs 100 veterinarians and veterinary technicians.

While the municipality refused to say how much the services cost, Agriculture and Forests Minister Bekir Pakdemirli said last month that his ministry has provided 31 million Turkish lira (around \$6 million) of support to local authorities across Turkey for the care of street animals between 2009 and 2018. "If people knew how much money was spent on these services, maybe people would be more upset, but these figures are not disclosed," Yildirim commented.

Puppies

While animals living on Istanbul's streets are often well fed, in the forests surrounding the city, "animals don't have a place to feed themselves," Umut Demir, also a veterinarian at IBB, said during a patrol in Belgrade Forest on Istanbul's European side. So around a ton of food is distributed each day by vans dispatched full of dry food, towards which dogs come running after hearing the horn. According to Tugce Demirlek, chief veterinarian at Sultangazi district health center, the fact that the animals are well fed and cared for ensures that they are calm and limits any aggressive behavior.

But the number of dogs has remained fairly stable in the past few years despite sterilization efforts. "We sterilize them systematically, but the animals that we do not catch continue to reproduce," she explained. Puppies continue to be born every year in Istanbul, like a small golden puppy only 40 days old, that was found alone, whimpering, on the side of a road. Once examined and chipped, the dog is put up for adoption, its picture displayed in the Vetbus. One recent afternoon, the puppy attracted a lot of attention, but it still has not found a home. "We will try our luck again tomorrow," Dincer said. — AFP

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

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US pressing Gulf states to keep Syria isolated

Kuwait reiterates any return of relations only through Arab League

DUBAI: The United States is lobbying Gulf states to harder for the devastated country to attract investment hold off restoring ties with Syria, including the UAE which has moved closer to Damascus to counter the influence of its rival Iran, five sources told Reuters. The opposing approaches are an early test of whether Syrian President Bashar Al-Assad can gain political and diplomatic credibility after a nearly eight-year civil war turned him into an international pariah. Many countries cut links with Syria at the start of the war.

Several Gulf states shut or downgraded their embassies, Syria was suspended from the Arab League, flights stopped and border crossings were closed. The United States and other countries imposed economic sanctions. Washington, backed by Gulf countries Saudi Arabia and Qatar, does not want Syria welcomed back into the international community until a political process to end the war is agreed.

"The Saudis are quite helpful in pressing the others. Qatar also is doing the right thing," said a US official, when asked about the diplomatic pressure. The official said that the United States was pleased that "some Gulf states are putting the brakes on". The US position suggests that Assad is still a long way from being accepted, even after his forces reclaimed most of Syria through victories over Sunni rebels, thanks largely to help from Iran and Russia.

The lack of support from Washington and regional heavyweight Riyadh to end Syria's isolation will make it

needed to rebuild it. While the UAE believes Sunni Muslim states must embrace Syria swiftly in order to move Assad out of Shiite Iran's orbit, Saudi Arabia and Qatar back the US approach.

The UAE sees Assad as the "only option", according to one Gulf source, and believes that stemming Iranian influence in Syria could help prevent the kind of hold it now has in Iraq. During the war, the UAE did support armed groups opposed to Assad. But its role was less prominent than that of Saudi Arabia and Qatar, and its support was mostly to do with ensuring that Islamist forces did not dominate the uprising.

US and Saudi officials have spoken to representatives of other Gulf countries, urging them not to restore ties with Syria, three Gulf political sources, a US official and a senior Western diplomat said. They particularly want to ensure that those countries do not back Syria's return to regional organization the Arab League, and that embassies are kept closed or operating with only

With Assad strengthening his position militarily, relations with some countries have started to thaw. The UAE reopened its Damascus embassy in December. This was a major boost for Assad, and the United States 'gave the Emiratis flak", said the US official. A UAE

official did not respond to a request for comment. "In the last seven years there has been absolutely zero Arab influence in Syria. Zero Arab influence has been a disaster," UAE Minister of State for Foreign Affairs Anwar Gargash told reporters in a recent briefing in Washington. He said Abu Dhabi re-established diplomatic ties with Damascus to "be closer to the reality on the ground". Gargash said more Arab states need to engage "to crowd the space" taken by Russia and Iran, who support Assad, and Turkey, which backs the rebels.

The next step for Syria's international rehabilitation could be reinstatement to the Arab League, which would be largely symbolic but something Assad's government would likely use to show its return from the diplomatic wilderness. The League said last Monday that there was not vet the necessary consensus for this to happen, and the United States is pushing hard to ensure it does not, according to the sources.

"Washington is lobbying against it and Saudi Arabia and Egypt are working to slow down the readmittance of Syria in the Arab League," said the senior Western diplomat. Government media offices in Saudi Arabia, the United Arab Emirates, Bahrain and Oman's foreign ministry did not respond to a Reuters' request for comment. A Kuwaiti foreign ministry official declined to comment on whether Kuwait had been asked by Washington or Riyadh to hold off on normalizing ties and reiterated the country's stance that "any possible return of relations with it can only be through the Arab League".

Not all Arab League nations severed ties with Syria

after the outbreak of the war in 2011. Oman maintained diplomatic ties with Damascus. A day after the UAE reopened its embassy, Bahrain said its embassy in Damascus and the Syrian diplomatic mission in Manama had been operating "without interruption". Kuwait's deputy foreign minister said in December it would reopen its embassy in Damascus once the Arab League allowed it.

Saudi Arabia has no plans now to normalize ties, said one Gulf official, adding "everything is suspended" until Syrians agree a transition from Assad's rule. Rival Qatar has said it sees no "encouraging" signs for restoring normal relations, its foreign minister said in January. But Abu Dhabi hopes it can eventually sway Syria towards the business-friendly UAE model, and Dubai can play a role as a hub for trade with Syria.

Abu Dhabi last month hosted a Syrian delegation led by prominent businessman Mohammad Hamsho to discuss potential cooperation in trade, infrastructure, agriculture, tourism, logistics and renewable energy, state media reported. Gargash acknowledged, however, that real investment would not happen without a political process. A second senior Western diplomat said that without a UN-led political process it would be difficult for sanctions to be removed which would clear the way for investment. "I don't think this is the end of the war and time for reconstruction," that diplomat said. — Reuters

Pakistani women seeking abortions as birth control

PESHAWAR: Pregnant, desperate, and poor, Pakistani mother Zameena faced a stark choice: Risk her life by having a secret abortion, or risk her life bearing her husband a sixth child. In the end, she opted for the former, one of more than two million women a year to do so in a country where religious leaders are critical of family planning measures and there is a lack of sex education and access to contraception.

Almost half of all pregnancies in Pakistan - around 4.2 million each year - are unplanned and around 54 percent of those end in termination, according to a report by US research firm Guttmacher Institute. "Three years ago, when my daughter was born, the doctor told me that I should stop having babies because it would be bad for my health," said Zameena, using an assumed name, from her home in the northwest city of Peshawar. "But whenever I say that to my husband, he tells me to trust God," the 35-year-old added. "My husband is a religious man... he wants to have a line of sons."

Decades ago, a family planning campaign with the slogan "do bache hi ache" or "two children is good" was rejected by religious leaders as well as nationalists who wanted a bigger population to rival the 1.2 billion people in neighboring India. Today with a population of around 207 million, Pakistan's baby boom is stretching resources beyond capacity and experts warn of trouble ahead.

Zameena said she frequently suggested to her husband that they practice family planning, but he refused. "My mother-in-law had nine kids," said Zameena.
"When I complain to my husband that I can't have more babies, he answers: 'If my mother didn't die, you should also stay alive'." Abortion is allowed in Pakistan if the health of the mother is in danger. But many doctors invoke their Muslim faith and refuse to carry them out. As a result, some women abort illegally and authorities largely turn a blind eye to the situation.

The preferred method is by ingesting Misoprostol,

an over-the-counter drug used to treat ulcers, which causes the expulsion of the embryo. It can also cause serious complications for the mother. NGO Aware Girls counsels those who call its hotline on how such drugs should be used safely and when to seek emergency or professional treatment at a clinic. "Most of us know women who have died of an abortion," said Aware Girls co-founder Gulalai Ismail.

Zameena was one of the lucky ones - she knew where to go for help once she decided to terminate her latest pregnancy. At the other end of the Aware Girls hotline, counselor Ayeesha reassured and advised her on what medicines to take and in which dosage. They insist that women must never be alone when they attempt such procedures. "My work saves women's lives. When they call, they are willing to do anything to have an abortion," explained the 26-year-old.

Aveesha estimated that she fields around 350 calls a month. Most women who contact the NGO know very little about contraception. Access to condoms, the most well-known option, is limited and even when they can be bought, it requires the man to agree. According to official statistics, only around 35 percent of Pakistani women use any form of non-abortive birth control despite them being inexpensive. Birth control pills cost just 20 rupees (0.12 euro), for example, while an IUD is available for 400 rupees (2.5 euros).

But population control is a controversial issue in Pakistan, where large families are prized. "Authorities have not been able to make this issue an emergency for Pakistan. It is all rhetoric and political gibberish," says Dr Haroon Ibrahim of the family planning NGO Greenstar. Zeba Sathar, a demographer in charge of another NGO, the Population Council, branded the nation's negative attitude to contraception a "systemic failure".

Prime Minister Imran Khan in December acknowledged the lack of political will on the issue and promised pro-contraception campaigns using the media, cell phones, schools and mosques. "The mullahs have a key role to play," he insisted. But the Council of Pakistani Islamic Ideology, a religious body which advises the government, says otherwise, insisting that family planning is against Islam. "The birth control campaign at the government level should be immediately stopped and the birth control program should be removed from the economic planning," the council told AFP.

The charity Marie Stopes, whose clinics provide post-abortion care, has profiled a typical client in Pakistan: Aged in her thirties, married at 18, she is poor, uneducated and already has three children. Such women approach the agency when backstreet abortions go wrong. "Women are just dying... for the lack of knowledge," said Xaher Gul, an executive at Marie Stopes.

In 2012, the year of their last study, the Guttmacher Institute estimated there were 2.25 million abortions in Pakistan with 623,000 women treated for postabortion complications. "We have failed women in this country," warned Hassan Mohtashami, former head of the United Nations Development Programme in Pakistan. He added: "Abortion is not a family planning method." — AFP

injustice they have suffered because of pretenders and fake bedoons.

The sources added that those who do not deserve Kuwaiti citizenship will be offered a reasonable settlement by granting them permanent residency and decent lives in Kuwait. However, the sources warned against taking the issue lightly, because of security threats that entail the government's swift action to resolve the problem, especially since certain countries have 'implanted' their nationals in Kuwait and are refusing to two days in China on Thursday and Friday. Analysts have said the tour is part of a Gulf pivot to rising Asia as a growing oil market, but also a timely demonstration to the West that MBS is not an international pariah. Pakistan has also been accused by its western neighbor Iran of harboring militants who carried out an attack that killed 27 Revolutionary Guards last week. The Guards' commander has also vowed to make Pakistan pay. But Islamabad received a boost from Jubeir, who called Tehran a "chief sponsor of terrorism" during yesterday's live press conference.

Pakistan and Saudi Arabia have enjoyed a long alliance dating back to the founding of the Islamic republic. However, Islamabad has also tried to walk a fine line by maintaining warm relations with its neighbor - and Saudi Arabia's regional foe - Iran. Jubeir also noted that Riyadh continues to participate in a months-long push by Washington for peace talks in Afghanistan, saying that if the war-torn country can be stabilized, "it will be to benefit... the region as a whole". — Agencies

take them back or grant them any sort of identification after their true nationalities were discovered.

Meanwhile, chairman of the central agency for illegal residents' affairs Saleh Al-Fadhalah said the total number of bedoons dropped from 220,000 before Aug 2, 1990 to only 117,000 in 1992, noting that the agency tracked the relationship between those deported and their relatives who still live in Kuwait, and that this helped discover the original citizenships of many people pretending to be bedoons.

Fadhalah added that the legal statuses of 90 percent of the 88,000 bedoons registered with the agency have been determined. He also noted that the agency exerts endless efforts to provide bedoons with decent services. Fadhalah said a special committee had been formed with elements from various state bodies to study the dossiers of bedoons included in the 1965 census pending granting them citizenship. — Al-Qabas

injured in the hours-long gun battle, a police official told AFP. "A police deputy inspector general has also suffered injuries," the official said.

The identity of the militants was not revealed but local media reports said one of those killed was Abdul Rashid Gazi, a Pakistani national whose role in Thursday's attack was being probed by investigators. Hundreds of soldiers raided villages and fired warning shots at a suspected militant hideout, unleashing the firefight in the village of Pinglan late Sunday. Images showed flames and smoke billowing out of one of the residential houses in the area.

Government forces have launched a massive hunt since an explosives-packed van struck the convoy transporting 2,500 security men close to Pinglan on Thursday. A video on social media purportedly shows a prerecorded message by the 20-year-old Kashmiri suicide bomber warning of more attacks. India accuses Pakistan of harboring the JeM group, a charge Islamabad denies.

With tensions mounting, Islamabad recalled its envoy to New Delhi for "consultations" while Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi called for greater international action against "terrorism". "The cruel terrorist attack in Pulwana shows that time for talks is over," Modi said after a meeting with Argentina's President Mauricio Macri in New Delhi.

Thursday's attack sparked anger and outrage across India. Thousands of demonstrators staged angry rallies in several Indian cities over the weekend, with attacks on Kashmiris reported in several towns. Protesters in New Delhi on Sunday burned effigies of Pakistani and

JeM leaders. Many small businesses closed yesterday following a call for a nationwide shutdown. In the capital, a Kashmiri man was beaten by a mob that accused him of chanting anti-India slogans. He was later detained by police.

A curfew remained in force for a fourth day in Jammu city, in the Hindu-majority part of Kashmir, where mobs attacked and set fire to properties belonging to Kashmiri Muslims. Thousands of residents in the city have fled to Muslim-majority areas. The government faces increased pressure because of an upcoming national election. New Delhi has withdrawn trade privileges for Pakistan and ended police protection for four

Kashmiri separatist leaders. Some commentators have called for military action against Pakistan. India launched what it called 'surgical strikes' on targets in Pakistani Kashmir in Sept 2016, 11 days after a militant attack on an Indian army base in Kashmir which left 19 soldiers dead. Pakistan denies the strikes took place. But experts say India has limited options for action now. "Whatever retaliation India takes will be symbolic. It won't have any real impact," Ajay Sahni, executive director of the New Delhi based Institute for Conflict Management, told AFP.

Saudi Foreign Minister Adel Al-Jubeir said during a visit to Islamabad that his country "will try to de-escalate tensions" between India and Pakistan. He is due to visit New Delhi with Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman today. JeM is one of several militant groups fighting Indian troops in Kashmir, which has been split between India and Pakistan since independence from Britain in 1947. Both claim the Himalayan region and have fought two wars over the territory.

Kashmir is the world's most militarized zone with some 500,000 Indian troops deployed to fight a rebellion that broke out in 1989. Tens of thousands of people, mainly civilians, have died in the conflict. Violence has spiked since 2016 with almost 600 killed last year, the highest toll in a decade. — AFP

Wawrinka, the 2015 champion in the Dutch port city who is continuing an 18-month comeback from double knee surgery, was playing in his first final since Roland Garros in June 2017. "It was great for sure to be in the final," Wawrinka said. "I'm pleased with the way I played in it and the way I arrived to the final. "I played four good matches here, I kept my level up all week." Three-time major winner Wawrinka said he hopes to build on his run this week. "I need to keep doing what I've been doing the last few months. I need to play events to gain confidence. Keeping going is the only way to get back my ranking," said the world number 68.

It was the first championship match in 11 years at Rotterdam to feature two unseeded players. Monfils, 32, showed no hard evidence of the left wrist injury which has bothered him all week and forced him onto a regime of pain-killers.

"I struggled with the wrist all week," he said. "I came out running hard in the first game to make him feel I was there. "But when I hit as hard as I could with the backhand-'ohhh'," he said in reference to the wrist pain he was feeling.

"I've been in worse shape, but I'm really exhausted after this week." The world number 33 triumphed in one and three-quarter hours with four service breaks against three-time major winner Wawrinka as he claimed his first title since Doha last year.

The Frenchman took the opening set with two breaks of Wawrinka, but the 33-year-old Swiss immediately returned the favour with a 6-1 second set. In the third, Monfils broke for 2-1, taking control of his opponent's mighty backhand.

The Frenchman moved to 5-2 and saved a break point a game later as he closed out victory.

Meanwhile, Stan Wawrinka returned to the

Split with Bajin not over money: Naomi Osaka

TOKYO: World number one Naomi Osaka was adamant that her shock split with coach Sascha Bajin had nothing to do with money but it was because she was determined that her career would not be about putting "success over happiness"

The German had guided the Japanese player to back-to-back Grand Slam titles as well as to the summit of the WTA rankings. But just two weeks after her triumph at Melbourne Park, Osaka abruptly severed ties with Bajin. That led to suggestions the two had fallen out over money.

"Everyone thinks it was a money-related issue, but it wasn't," the U.S. and Australian Open champion told the WTA in Dubai. "That's one of the most hurtful things I've ever heard.

"I travel with everyone on my team, I see them more than my family. I would never do that to them.

"My reason is I wouldn't put success over my happiness - that's my main thing. I'm not going to sacrifice that just to keep a person around." Bajin, a former hitting partner of Serena

Williams, Victoria Azarenka and Caroline Wozniacki, was named as the WTA's coach of the year in 2018 after his success with Osaka. During their time together, Osaka rocketed from

72 in the world at the start of 2018 to number one last month. Osaka said it was clear things were not right between them during the season's opening major. "It was kind of brewing in Australia. I think some people could see that if they saw how we interacted," the 21-year-old added.

"I would not want to split on really bad terms. I'm not going to say anything bad about him because, of course, I'm really grateful for all the things he's done. "During the Australian Open, I was just trying to tell myself to get through it. I'm not sure, but I think you guys noticed."

Osaka said she hopes to have a new coach in place by March at Indian Wells.

cricket body, one of the world's richest, should use its influence to force Pakistan out of the ICC. "Either India will be part of World Cup 2019 or Pakistan. You have enough funds to pull this off," the supporter

India on Finch's mind after Big Bash League win

MELBOURNE: Australian limited overs skipper Aaron Finch heads to India with a skip in his step after leading the Melbourne Renegades to the Big Bash League title, in contrast to a despondent Glenn Maxwell.

Finch's Renegades clinched their first domestic Twenty20 crown in dramatic fashion on Sunday after city rivals the Stars, led by Maxwell, imploded during a tense run chase. They lost seven wickets for 19 runs in one of the biggest capitulations in Australian cricket history, and Maxwell admitted it left him "pretty shattered".

Both men were due to fly out Monday to play two T20s and five one-day internationals against Virat

Kohli's team, leaving them little time to reflect on their incredible change in fortunes on Sunday.

Chasing 146 to win at Docklands Stadium, Maxwell's men were cruising at 93 without loss before dramatically collapsing to throw away the game. Finch said he was thrilled by the 13-run win, which was just the tonic for a man who has gone through an eventful

He was appointed Australia's one-day captain in a World Cup year, before making his long-awaited Test debut. But he has since been dropped from the Test squad after failing to fire, and has not been as destructive as usual in the shorter form of the game.

West Indies need better batting: Bishop

LONDON: Former West Indies bowler Ian Bishop took pride in his former team's recent test series win over England, and thinks the current crop is "filled with possibilities" enough to climb up the rankings and put a smile back on the face of Caribbean fans.

Despite the unexpected 2-1 win in the threetest series, West Indies remain eighth in the International Cricket Council (ICC) rankings, bottom of the sport's traditional powers.

The series against England showed that West Indies has depth in fast bowling, but Bishop identified two glaring deficiencies that need to be rectified for the team to have further success.

They are looking for a spinner to be developed and want more consistency for the top-order batting," the Trinidadian said in a telephone interview with Reuters ahead of the five-game one-day international series that starts on Wednesday.

"From speaking with one or two of the people involved with the team, they are very aware of certain areas of the game that need to be rectified." West Indies played the tests against England without a specialist spinner, though allrounder Roston Chase took eight wickets in the first test, which West Indies won by 381 runs.

They followed up with a 10-wicket win in the second test, though it could have been a far different story had Jason Holder not won the toss and sent England in on a green wicket. West Indies openers John Campbell and Kraigg Brathwaite got the team off to decent starts with partnerships in excess of 50 in all but one innings, but the rest of the top order proved brittle and inconsistent.

Shai Hope was out cheaply three times in five innings and his back-to-back centuries at Leeds in 2017 are a distant memory, although Bishop said he was a "phenomenal talent".

"During the (recent) series, and even last year, batting on seamer-friendly pitches, he is getting beaten on the outside of the bat and inside of the bat," said Bishop, now a respected television commentator in the Caribbean.

"He has to decide how best he can position himself at the crease and allow the ball to come to him, because he is reaching for the ball. He will overcome it. He just needs reps. I think he's an

Stylish left-hander Darren Bravo, back in the team after a two-year absence following a dispute with administrators, also failed in four of his five innings but with a batting average of more than 38, Bishop said he only needs time to "integrate himself" back into test cricket.

Chase also had three failures, balanced by an unbeaten century in the final test, while Shimron Hetmyer made 81 in the first test but then fell away.

WORKLOAD MANAGED

Hetmyer's problems may stem from a heavy schedule, with the 22-year-old still due to play in the IPL and Bishop said his workload needed to be managed over the next year. "Particularly for next six to eight months, his cricket must be managed," Bishop said. "He's an integral part of the test match team, growing quickly as a batsmen.

"Problem is that for such a young kid he is good in all formats of the game. In order to keep fresh, he has to be managed. It could mean time off. If he were to play every game, that's a lot of cricket."—AFP

England expects as World Cup looms into view

LONDON: With 100 days until the 2019 World Cup gets underway, might it be the year that England lift the global game's premier limited-overs trophy at

England-the pioneers of one-day cricket as a professional sport-have taken part in every World Cup since staging the inaugural men's event in 1975. But all they have to show for their efforts are runners-up medals from the 1979, 1987 and 1992 finals. Test cricket has long been the priority for everyone in English cricket, be they players, fans or administrators. That changed, however, after another World Cup groupstage exit at the 2015 edition in Australia and New Zealand was sealed with a woeful loss to Bangladesh.

Then England and Wales Cricket Board supremo Andrew Strauss decreed that white-ball cricket would no longer be the "poor relation", with the former England captain sacking head coach Peter Moores and bringing in Australian Trevor Bayliss specifically to turn round the team's limited-overs form. The transformation has been remarkable with a newly-liberated England twice setting new records for the highest ODI totals-their 444 for three against Pakistan at Trent Bridge in 2016 a prelude to last year's colossal 481 for

six at the same ground.

England, captained in 50-over cricket by former Ireland batsman Eoin Morgan, with the side featuring Test skipper Joe Root and the hard-hitting talents of Jason Roy, Alex Hales and Jos Buttler, now sit atop the ODI world rankings heading into their upcoming fivematch series away to the West Indies.

'NOW IS THE TIME'

"We can say we were the best ODI side to play for England... but without a trophy, it will be difficult to say that," said all-rounder Moeen Ali, looking to help England's men win just their second major global event following the 2010 World Twenty 20 in the Caribbean.

"We have come close and we feel now is the time." We don't feel we have to win it, it's more 'this is the time to win it'. We are an amazing side but we know this year is massive for us," added Moeen, with England, as was the case in 1975, playing host to a World Cup and an Ashes series in the same season.

But unlike that first eight-team edition 43 years ago, which featured two then non-Test sides in East Africa and the long since elevated Sri Lanka, this year's event will be a 10-team affair contested solely by Test

Ever since India and Pakistan were both knocked out in the group stage of the 2007 World Cup in the West Indies, thereby putting a huge dent in broadcast audiences, attendance figures and commercial revenues for the rest of the tournament, International Cricket Council chiefs have been determined no such 'nightmare scenario' will ever befall both Asian giants again.

The result has been a decrease in the number of non-Test nations involved to the point none will take part this year. That has seen the ICC criticised for making the World Cup too narrow at a time when other sports are expanding rather than cutting the number of teams involve in their global showpiece events.

But ICC officials point to the creation of a qualifying tournament-from which two-time champions West Indies only narrowly emerged-as proof the non-Test world still has a shot at the World Cup.

Rather than have pool stages this year, the ICC have opted for an all-play-all group format-a move that many believe has more to do with ensuring India, cricket's financial powerhouse, are guaranteed a minimum of nine matches than sporting fairness for all the teams taking part.

Such a lengthy group phase ahead of the semi-finals does reduce the chances of any team going through to the July 14 final at Lord's unbeaten.

Reigning champions Australia, set to be boosted by the return of star batsmen Steve Smith and David Warner following their lengthy ball-tampering bans, will be bidding for a sixth title.

India, with Virat Kohli at the helm, are a major force in all formats while Pakistan defied expectations to win the 2017 Champions Trophy in England.

New Zealand will be keen to go one better after losing in the 2015 final, while South Africa will arrive hoping to end years of World Cup heartbreak.

West Indies, the 1975 and 1979 champions, will have an extra incentive this year after Sunday's announcement that star batsman Chris Gayle will retire from ODIs following this year's World Cup.— AFP

Mbappe fires PSG 12 points clear in France

PARIS: Kylian Mbappe's excellent volley secured Paris Saint-Germain a hardfought 1-0 win at Saint-Etienne on Sunday as the runaway Ligue 1 leaders moved 12 points clear at the summit.

The 20-year-old Mbappe fired home his leagueleading 19th goal of the campaign with 17 minutes

"He (Mbappe) shows his quality every day in training, he has this hunger to score, score, score," said PSG coach Tuchel. "It's his quality. He is a special player." Mbappe has now scored 45 goals for PSG since signing from Monaco at the start of last season.

"We lost to a goal from nowhere... A 20-year-old who will soon be the best player in the world," said Saint-Etienne coach Jean-Louis Gasset.

With a second straight French title all but secured, Tuchel's men, who also have two games in hand on second-placed Lille, now have their eyes on breaking their own record tally of 96 points set in 2015-16.

Tuchel rested midfielder Marco Verratti after his excursions in the midweek Champions League victory at Manchester United, with Leandro Paredes handed his first league start for the club.

"Everyone was tired after Manchester Unitedphysically, but also mentally," added Tuchel. "It was necessary to control the game, to play focused."

PSG fashioned their first clear-cut chance in the 18th minute, as Julian Draxler turned and fired over the crossbar after a fine exchange of passes with Dani

Mbappe saw a shot well saved by home goalkeeper Stephane Ruffier in an underwhelming first half.

The visitors always appeared in control of the game, but Draxler wasted another golden chance to put them ahead shortly after the restart when he was denied by a sprawling Ruffier stop.

Angel Di Maria, who starred with two assists on his return to Old Trafford in midweek, dragged an effort wide as PSG continued to plug away in search of an opening goal.

It arrived in the 73rd minute, as Alves picked out the run of Mbappe, and the Frenchman caught out Ruffier with a fine first-time volley on the turn.

Saint-Etienne started to show more ambition with time running out, but the best they could muster was Kevin Monnet-Paquet's long-range strike which flew harmlessly over, with the winger injuring himself in the

Suspended Van Dijk leaves gaping hole in Liverpool defence

LIVERPOOL: Fortress Anfield has become even more impenetrable for visiting sides in the 13 months since Liverpool made Virgil van Dijk the world's most expensive defender, but the commanding Dutchman's absence for Bayern Munich's visit in the Champions League leaves Jurgen Klopp with a selection headache.

Van Dijk is banned for the last 16, first leg today after being booked three times as last season's finalists squeezed through the group stages by the narrowest of margins thanks to more goals scored than Napoli.

In stark contrast to their Premier League form, where Liverpool have been beaten just once all season, Klopp's men lost all three of their group games on the road against Napoli, Paris Saint-Germain and Red Star Belgrade to underline the importance of taking a lead to Germany for the second leg.

Three wins at Anfield pulled them through to the last 16 and Van Dijk has yet to taste defeat in 25 Premier and Champions League games on home soil as a Liverpool player, keeping 16 clean sheets in the process to tighten up a leaky defence that undermined Klopp's first two years in charge.

"Straightaway he was organising the defence, he was the leader at the back, and as time has gone on he is even more important," said former Liverpool captain Sami Hyypia.

"He gives confidence to the players and makes many other players play better. "It is very difficult to find a weakness. He is an ultimate centre-back." Missing the £75 million man is a big enough blow, but Liverpool will also be without Joe Gomez and most likely Dejan Lovren through injury.

Gomez underwent surgery on a lower leg fracture earlier this month, while Lovren has not featured since suffering a hamstring injury on January 7 and did not travel with the rest of the squad for a warm weather training camp in Marbella this week.

A makeshift centre-back pairing of Joel Matip and Fabinho are therefore likely to be tasked with stopping

another former pupil of Klopp's-Robert Lewandowski. The prolific Pole won two Bundesliga titles under Klopp when the pair were together at Borussia Dortmund and also lost the Champions League final against Bayern in 2013 before Lewandowski was lured to Bavaria a year later.

Bayern have been dominant in the Bundesliga since Klopp's Dortmund won back-to-back titles in 2011 and 2012, but are playing catch up in the title race to Lucien Favre's outfit this season. "Of course over the years I have watched a lot of Bayern games and this season as well," said Klopp.

"They were six times in a row champions of Germany, which is not easy, and they were one of the teams in the last 10 years who were pretty much all the time in the quarter-finals, semi-finals, final of the Champions League.'

However, while Lewandowski, the in-form Kingsley Coman and the creativity of James Rodriguez and Leon Goretzka could post plenty problems for Liverpool's undermanned defence, it is at the other end Bayern could also be exposed.

Ajax's youngsters exposed Bayern's weakness against pace in the Champions League group stages, while Bayer Leverkusen and Augsburg have also given Klopp extra encouragement in recent weeks in the Bundesliga.

As Van Dijk kept the back door shut, Mohamed Salah, Roberto Firmino and Sadio Mane fired Liverpool to the Champions League final last season. Without their talismanic defender, all three will need to shine more than ever to give Klopp's men a lead to defend when Van Dijk returns for the second leg on March 13. — AFP

Kevin Durant scores 31 points and claims MVP honors



CHARLOTTE: Kevin Durant scored 31 points and won MVP honors after outdueling Giannis Antetokounmpo to lift Team LeBron to a 178-164 win Sunday night in the 2019 NBA All-Star Game.

In the "First in Flight" city, players showed up Sunday ready to launch. Team LeBron attempted 90 3-pointers (hitting 35), and the teams combined for 167 tries from deep. Durant helped put the game away for Team LeBron with a 3-pointer with two minutes left for a 171-160 lead. Kyrie Irving made a leaning floater and Durant hit a 15-footer from the wing to seal it.

"It's cool to be out there with some of the best players to ever play the game, and to win an MVP here in front of my family and friends is pretty sweet," said Durant, who also took home All-Star Game MVP honors in 2012.

Antetokounmpo scored a game-high 38 points on 17-of-23 shooting and drew raves from his peers, Durant included. "He's got potential through the roof. He's still producing at an elite level, and it's scary to see how far he can keep going," Durant said. "His game is rounding into shape. He's still getting better, but he's leading top five, top

3-pointers from the right side to give Team LeBron a 161-153 lead at the five-minute mark in the fourth as shots started to fall short and handles were less certain.

Honorary All-Stars Dirk Nowitzki and Dwyane Wade checked into the game with 58 seconds left in the first quarter. Nowitzki splashed a 3-pointer from the right wing on his first offensive possession, and drained another from the left wing on the subsequent possession, giving Team Giannis a 53-37 advantage entering the second quarter. He added a third at the 9-minute mark in the second quarter and scored nine points on 3-of-3 shooting in 3:58 in the opening half.—Reuters

Semenya fights gender rule at top sports court

LAUSANNE: Olympic 800 metres champion Caster Semenya of South Africa went to the Court of Arbitration for Sport yesterday to challenge proposed rules that could force her to lower her testosterone levels. Semenya made no comment as she arrived at the court in Lausanne for the start of a week-long hearing that is likely to define the rest of the 28-year-old's career. The International Association of Athletics Federations (IAAF) says it is introducing the rules to create a "level playing field" for other female athletes.

The South African government says the rules specifically target Semenya and has called them a "gross violation" of her human rights. The controversial measures would force so-called "hyperandrogenic" athletes or those with

"differences of sexual development" (DSD) to take drugs to lower their testosterone levels below a prescribed amount if they wish to continue competing.

The rules were to have been introduced last November but have been put on hold pending this week's hearings. A judgement is expected by the end of March. As he arrived at the court, IAAF President Sebastian Coe said: "Today is a very, very important day. "The regulations that we are introducing are there to protect the sanctity of fair and open competition." Athletics South Africa has strongly backed Semenya. Its chief advocate Norman Arendse said she would give evidence.

"The whole week is going to be important. Obviously the evidence will be evaluated and assessed at the end of the process this week, so today this is the start," Arendse told reporters. The issue is highly emotive. When British newspaper The Times reported last week that the IAAF would argue that Semenya should be classified as a biological male-a claim later denied by the IAAF-she hit back, saying she was "unquestionably a woman".

In response to the report, the IAAF-stressing it was referring in general terms, not to Semenya in particular-denied it intended to classify any DSD athlete as male. But in a statement, it added: "If a DSD athlete has testes and

male levels of testosterone, they get the same increases in bone and muscle size and strength and increases in haemoglobin that a male gets when they go through puberty, which is what gives men such a performance advantage over women.

"Therefore, to preserve fair competition in the female category, it is necessary to require DSD athletes to reduce their testosterone down to female levels before they compete at international level." Semenya is not the only athlete potentially affected-the silver and bronze medallists in the Rio Olympics 800m, Francine Niyonsaba of Burundi and Kenya's Margaret Wambui, have also faced questions about their testosterone levels. But it is Semenya, who also won Olympic gold in 2012 and has three world titles to her name, who has brought the court challenge. Matthieu Reeb, the secretary general of the court, said: "It is unusual and unprecedented because we never had a such a case at CAS." South Africa's Sports Minister Tokozile Xasa argues that the IAAF's rules are "discriminatory". "What's at stake here is far more than the right to participate in a sport. Women's bodies, their wellbeing, their ability to earn a livelihood, their very identity, their privacy and sense of safety and belonging in the world, are being questioned," Xasa said on Friday.—AFP
