KUWAIT: The Anti-Corruption Authority (Nazaha) referred yesterday an official - without disclosing his name, position, or the entity he worked for - to the public prosecution on the charge of accepting a bribe. Nazaha spokesman and assistant secretary Mohammad Bouzber said in a press release that this case is considered the first of its kind.

The authority said in a statement that it had received a complaint backed by documents against the official and conducted its own investigation, including interrogating the official. The statement said the official failed to justify the larger-than-usual funds that were deposited into his bank accounts and also failed to justify overspending in his government department. Nazaha affirmed that it will continue its work on fighting corruption by following leads and investigating suspicious and illicit acts.

Meanwhile, the head of the National Assembly committee to investigate damage from last year's heavy rains MP Adel Al-Damkhi yesterday defended the probe's report, saying it is complete and includes full details. Damkhi's comments were made after the report was criticized as lacking important information



that could be used to indict some companies and their owners.

MP Ahmad Al-Fadhl said yesterday that the report does not include important information provided by the Audit Bureau, which directly accused some companies by name. But Damkhi insisted that the report is not brief, did not ignore any facts and has held a number of senior officials responsible for the massive damage that impacted several residential areas in November.

The committee was formed by the Assembly after heavy torrential rains lashed several residential areas, especially Sabah Al-Ahmad, causing heavy damage and losses to property.

Interior ministry eases dependent visa transfers

KUWAIT: Well-informed security sources said the interior ministry's residency affairs department has given the manpower authority the green light to immediately transfer expats' dependent residencies to work visas without checking with it. The sources explained that the new decision will help accelerate procedures by allowing transfers from article 22 to article 18 for expats reaching the age of 21, which will save the time that used to be wasted to complete the procedure.

No travel ban for minor debts

KUWAIT: Judges at the justice ministry's verdict execution department rejected pleas by local companies to summon or impose travel bans on Kuwaitis indebted to them with small amounts ranging between KD 100 and 200, which had been causing them embarrassment at the airport for years. A well-informed source said the cancellation has been in effect for two weeks now, as judges believe that Kuwaitis will not flee the country to

avoid paying such small amounts.

The sources added that local companies' representatives met the department inquiring about rejecting their travel ban requests and were told that the rejection was made on purely legal grounds, taking into consideration that travel bans and summon warrants are restrictive and exceptional measures that should not be overused to avoid violating individual freedoms without due cause.—Al-Qabas

Oman diplomat meets Assad in rare Syria visit

MUSCAT: Oman's top diplomat met yesterday with Syrian President Bashar Al-Assad in Damascus, Muscat said, in the Gulf official's second visit to the war-wracked country since conflict broke out in 2011. Assad met with Oman's state minister for foreign affairs Yusuf bin Alawi bin Abdullah to discuss bilateral relations and regional security, the sultanate's foreign ministry said in a statement. It added that Abdullah also met with his Syrian counterpart, Walid Muallem.

Oman is one of the few Arab states to have maintained ties with Damascus over the past eight years. Syria was suspended from the Arab League in 2011 for its deadly crackdown on an uprising against Assad's

Fallout runs deep as Salah, Egypt flop at Cup of Nations

CAIRO: After his tale of redemption with Liverpool this season, Mohamed Salah was instead left in disbelief once more as Egypt crashed out of their own Africa Cup of Nations, an exit that triggered an immediate clear-out within the country's football association. While Salah helped lead his club to a sixth European Cup triumph in June, a year on from an injury forcing him out of the final, he was powerless to stop the Pharaohs suffering humiliation on the international stage for the second time in 12 months.



Ministry to retire 63 senior employees to create jobs for Kuwaiti jobseekers

6,013 Kuwaitis nominated for public sector jobs this year

KUWAIT: The Ministry of Commerce and Industry (MoCI) recently referred 63 senior employees to retirement, said informed sources, noting that this is the second group of MoCI retirees after the minister previously referred 13 employees to retirement. Further, the sources said a new list of retirees will be announced soon, including a director, heads of sections and supervisors, in implementation of the Cabinet's decision of referring employees with at least 30 years in service to retirement to help create job opportunities for younger generations.

Meanwhile, Minister of State for Economic Affairs Mariam Al-Aqeel said that the Civil Service Commission (CSC) has nominated 6,013 Kuwaitis for jobs in the public sector this year, adding that the total number of citizens nominated to work for the government since 1999 is 236,085. Responding to a parliamentary inquiry, Aqeel explained that 21,879 citizens were nominated for work last year compared to 20,615 in 2017 and 18,027 in 2016.

New weighing system

In other news, MoCI plans to introduce a new standard weighing system at shops around Kuwait in response to recent complaints about possible misconduct at various outlets. Informed sources said that the ministry is currently considering issuing 'revolutionary decisions' concerning weighing solid and liquid consumer goods at various outlets, noting that the new decision is likely to be made within two months by replacing the old manual inaccurate electronic scales with French weighing systems and mandating all outlets to use them by the beginning of 2020.

The French weighing system measures the size of products, said the sources, adding that it will be used with foodstuff,



vegetables, meat, dairy products, gold, precious stones, oud and bakhour. The sources

said specialized teams will be sent to various gas stations to check the pumps and make sure they use the metric system and have new gauges. In addition, the sources said pints of sale that do not comply with the new decision would graced for a period before subjecting them to strict penal measures.

Moreover, the sources said that in a bid to fight commercial fraud, MoCI inspection team will visit and inspect gold, diamond, precious stone, oud and bakhour outlets that use sensitive scales in response to some complaints that some salesmen point air conditioners to exposed sensitive scales, which places an additional pressure and adds 3-5 percent to the final price. "Sensitive scales must be put inside airtight glass boxes," explained the sources.

Truck driver hurt in Ghazali Road crash

KUWAIT: A half lorry driver was injured when his truck collided into a bus on Ghazali Road, said security sources, adding that the truck driver was trapped inside the wreckage. Firemen from Farwaniya rushed to the scene, where they managed to

free the driver and handed him over to paramedics, the sources added.

Meanwhile, a limited fire broke out yesterday in a storage area in a Fahaheel building, said security sources, noting that firemen from Fahaheel and Mangaf fire stations rushed to the scene, where they evacuated the entire building and managed to control the fire. Some tenants were rushed to hospital for treatment for smoke inhalation.

In a separate incident, a sailor was rushed to hospital for treatment from injuries he sustained when he fell from a high place inside the engine chamber of a ship docked at Shuaiba Port, said security sources, noting that Shuaiba marine fire brigade immediately rescued the sailor and sent him to hospital for treatment.







Kuwait seeks better ties between regional bodies, UNSC: Diplomat



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KUWAIT: Kuwait works on improving relations between regional organizations and the UN Security Council, the Arab Gulf country's envoy to the United Nations said, citing a session between Arab League and UNSC held in New York last month under Kuwait's presidency. Kuwait issued a statement by UNSC president aims at boosting relations between Arab League and the 15-member UNSC through once-a-year briefing by secretary general of the pan-Arab bloc to the Security Council, Permanent Representative Mansour Al-Otaibi said yesterday. The statement called for regular consultations between the two sides as well as setting up a UNSC office at the Cairo-based Arab League, Otaibi said in an interview.

Otaibi said arrangements were underway to organize a visit by UNSC members to the Arab League. He meanwhile said Kuwait supported UN efforts particularly in on humanitarian front, and noted Kuwait was among top donors to UN agencies. The humanitarian file, he said, was a top priority of Kuwait's foreign policy. He pointed out to around five million Syrian refugees and six million internally displaced persons (IDPs) in Syria. Otaibi said Kuwait hosted three donor conferences to support the Syrian people, and participated in other conferences all aimed at alleviating suffering of Syrians. Kuwait pledged \$1.9 billion in all conferences, he said. Otaibi said Kuwait sought through its non-permanent UNSC membership to promote approach of mediation, solving conflicts via diplomacy, also known as preventive diplomacy, improving the way the Security Council operate by boosting transparency.

Missing persons

Asked about people missing in armed conflicts, Otaibi said this was a national cause and Kuwait was

not the only country with missing citizens. More than 50,000 people are missing due to wars and conflicts, he said, prompting Kuwait to table UNSC resolution 2747 (2019) which aimed at strengthening protection of civilians in armed conflicts. This resolution, he explained, was one-of-a-kind legislative and legal tool over missing people.

Attention to missing people usually happens after end of conflicts, he said. "The resolution means we deal with this issue throughout stages of conflicts not after they finish. Kuwait considers this issue a humanitarian cause which is a source of suffering of the international community," said Otaibi. The International Committee of Red Cross (ICRC) and UNSC's five permanent members welcomed the draft resolution, he said, which encouraged Kuwait to table it.

On a related issue, Otaibi welcomed the efforts of the tripartite Commission, which had recently resulted in discovery of remains of people in southern Iraq "which we hope do belong to Kuwaiti citizens." Iraq's Defense Ministry said on July 1 it would hand over to Kuwaiti authorities samples of human remains that might belong to missing Kuwaiti citizens. The remains were found in two locations near Nuqrat Al-Salman area in southern Al-Muthanna Governorate, the ministry said in a statement. The ministry said the remains were exhumed and sent to

laboratory in Baghdad to examine if they match DNA samples of families of missing Kuwaitis. On June 20, a joint statement by ICRC-affiliated Tripartite Commission announced recovery of the remains, offering hope for families of missing people from 1990-91 Gulf War. Kuwait and Iraq are the other Commission members.

Defending Arab causes

On Kuwait's UNSC membership, Otaibi said his country wanted to defend Arab causes like Palestine,

Syrian and Yemeni crises. He said Kuwait and Sweden cosponsored a resolution for a ceasefire in Eastern Ghouta, Syria, "but regrettably was not implemented." Another resolution sponsored by Kuwait to allow humanitarian aid delivery to around three million IPDs in Syria. Otaibi said Kuwait, Sweden, Netherlands and Cote

d'Ivoire sponsored a resolution about relation between hunger on one side, and peace and security on the other. On tension in the Arabian Gulf region following attacks on oil tankers, Otaibi said UNSC condemned these worrisome violations, which threatened international peace and security. Otaibi, who said an investigation was underway over the attacks, reaffirmed Kuwait's solidarity with Saudi Arabia and the United Arab Emirates (UAE) in the wake of the assaults.

On Palestine, Otaibi called for implementation of relevant UNSC resolutions like halt of Jewish settlements, East Jerusalem being part of the Palestinian territories, and the two-state solution. "However, it is difficult to have a binding resolution against Israel because there are those who support it in the Security Council," he said. Otaibi commented on the recent visit by a delegation of the UNSC to Iraq, and said it aimed at extending support for Baghdad amidst security, economic, political and humanitarian challenges facing the Arab country. — KUNA

Afghan foes meet in bid to secure peace

KABUL: A Taleban attack on a government security compound in central Afghanistan yesterday killed at least 14 people and wounded more than 180, including scores of children, hours before a meeting in Qatar aimed at preparing the ground for peace talks. Islamist Taleban fighters detonated a car bomb in Ghazni city near an office of Afghanistan's main intelligence service, the National Directorate of Security (NDS), during yesterday morning's rush hour, officials said.

The Taleban claimed responsibility, saying in a statement dozens of NDS officers were killed or wounded. The attack took place as Taleban officials and a selected group of Afghan activists and civil society figures prepared to meet in Doha, casting a pall over talks intended to open the way for full peace negotiations in the future. "It is unfathomable to endanger children in this way and I strongly condemn this attack," US Special Representative for Afghanistan Reconciliation, Zalmay Khalilzad, said in a tweet.

Health officials in Ghazni said 13 adults, including eight NDS members, and a child were killed. At least 60 children who were attending classes in a private school situated near the blast site were among the 180 people wounded. Doors and windows of the school were destroyed in the powerful explosion, the children suffered multiple injuries caused by flying shards of glass and broken pieces of wood. "The casualty figures may rise as this is not the last report of those injured in the powerful blast," said Zaher Shah Nekmal, a health director in Ghazni province.

The blast in a crowded area of Ghazni city was the latest in a wave of near-daily attacks by the Taleban, who now hold sway over about half of Afghanistan and continue to intensify attacks on Afghan forces despite increased U.S. efforts towards a peace agreement to end the 18-year war.

Intra-Afghan summit in Qatar

The Taleban, who have repeatedly refused to negotiate with the Western-backed government of Afghan President Ashraf Ghani, agreed to join the intra-Afghan summit on the condition that those there would attend in a personal capacity. About 60 highprofile Afghan figures and activists were in Doha to meet the Taleban officials during the two-day conference, a meeting arranged by German and Qatari officials with the support of US negotiators.

Ghani condemned the Taleban bombing in Ghazni yesterday, and questioned their real intent as they hold talks in Qatar. "They stain their hands with the blood of innocent people in Afghanistan every day. They should know that it is not possible to gain privileges in peace talks by targeting civilians, especially children," he said in a statement. The intra-Afghan

talks follow the start of a seventh round of peace talks between US and Taleban negotiators in Doha last week, which Khalilzad described on Twitter on Saturday as the most productive session to date. The US-Taleban talks were put on hold while the intra-Afghan dialogue takes place.

He said substantive progress had been made on all four parts of a peace deal: counter-terrorism assurances, troop withdrawal, participation in intra-Afghan negotiations, and a permanent and comprehensive ceasefire. Military conflict and attacks on civilians have intensified even as the diplomatic process gains momentum, triggering tremendous unease among some Afghans about the significance of holding peace talks with the Taleban.

Government officials in the southern provinces of Logar and Helmand said the Afghan forces had conducted several air strikes on Taleban hideouts in the last 36 hours, killing over 30 insurgents. The Taleban took responsibility for detonating a car bomb at the start of a lengthy gun fight outside a defense ministry compound in the capital, Kabul, last week. Six people were killed and more than 100 civilians, including 60 children, were wounded in that attack.

In western Ghor province, a landmine explosion killed seven children and wounded one on Saturday, officials said. The blast occurred when children

stepped accidentally walked over a landmine. The insurgents often place landmines to target Afghan security forces, but the lethal weapons also inflict casualties on civilians. According to the United Nations, 3,804 civilians-including more than 900 children-were killed in Afghanistan in 2018, with another 7,000 wounded. It was the deadliest year to date for civilians in Afghanistan's conflict. —Reuters

Heatwave adds to the woes of migrants stranded in Bosnia

Under a leaden sky, Saleh Alhasan and his friends hurry to reach the shade of the woods after failing yet again to cross the border to Croatia, the last barrier on the long and tortuous road into the European Union.

"I tried more than 15 times... It has been 10 months that I try to pass. And I do not want to give up. I just want to see my son" born in Sweden, says the 33-year old Syrian architect. "I only saw him in a photo." His wife was among hundreds of thousands of migrants and refugees who took the socalled Balkans route in 2015, before the EU

borders closed for them. On a dusty road, Saleh and his companions pass by red signs hanging on trees, warning that the field is mined: a legacy of the country's brutal 1992-1995 war. They stop at a stream to refresh themselves, exhausted after walking in temperatures exceeding 35 Celsius degrees.

The men no longer know where to rest. In Bihac and Velika Kladusa near the Croatian border, reception centers with a capacity for 3,500 run by the International Organization for Migration (IOM) are full. Saleh and his friends live in unhealthy squats. He wants to return to Sarajevo where, he says, "there are more options" for a fresh attempt to cross the border.

Tensions with locals

The flow of newcomers slowed during winter but has now resumed and "a hundred migrants arrive daily in the canton" of Bihac, says regional police spokesman Ale Siljdedic. "But recently far fewer people succeed in crossing the border. Croatia has considerably reinforced its police presence," he adds. According to Bosnia's security minister, more than 34,000 migrants from Asia and Africa have illegally entered the country since the beginning of 2018, 11,000 of them this year alone.

Some 8,000 are currently in Bosnia, according to European Commission estimates. This has caused tensions both among

migrants of different nationalities and with locals, who are also poor. Recently, hundreds of migrants occupied public spaces in the town of Bihac, which is home to some 65,000 people. With the help of the local Red Cross, the authorities in June set up a camp in Vucjak, an uninhabited zone a dozen kilometers from the border, to accommodate migrants who have not found a place in IOM centers. But according to the United Nations, the zone around this camp is also "very close" to minefields.

The jungle

The EU finances the IOM centers, but it has refused to provide funds for the Vucjak camp because "it is not a suitable location and presents a clear danger" for those staying there. Bihac mayor Suhret Fazlic says the problem is the facility is too close to the border. Nicolas Bizel, head of operations at the EU delegation in Bosnia told AFP that this was not the main issue. His concern was that it was too close to unexploded wartime mines and that there was also a risk of a methane explosion because the zone used to be a landfill site.

This camp became know as "The Jungle" by its occupants-like the one that sprang up in the northern French port city of Calais, before being torn down in 2016. Several hundred young men live there in deplorable

sanitary conditions, sleeping in tents without beds, without medical assistance, showers or toilets. Several barrels equipped with faucets provide minimal hygiene facilities. "It is too hot. We could not rest in the

tents," said Suleman Ashraf, a 29-year-old Pakistani trying to get to Spain to join his brother. The food that arrives twice a day is everything we have here. Some water as well and we survive with that." —AFP

Syrians, facing orders to demolish homes, fear fate in Lebanon

Lebanese politicians ramp up calls for Syrians to leave

ARSAL, Lebanon: Dima al-Kanj's house is now a pile of rubble and twisted metal. It was just a concrete hut near the Lebanese border, but she had spent five years trying to make it cozy for her children after fleeing the war in Syria. Then, under army orders, she had to smash it. "Every year, we fixed up one thing after another so that we could live in what you'd call a home," she said, standing in the room leveled to the ground in the remote Lebanese town of Arsal. "Now, there's nothing left."

Kanj is among thousands of Syrian refugees who will be left stranded by a government decision to dismantle "semi-permanent structures" in eastern Lebanon, aid agencies say. At least 15,000 children could become homeless. Lebanon is toughening enforcement of work and housing rules - some of which were ignored for years - on its more than 1 million Syrian refugees. Lebanese politicians have also ramped up their calls for the Syrians to leave.

The army demolished at least 20 refugee homes on Monday, seven global aid agencies said. In the makeshift Arsal camp where Kanj lives, home to 450 people, refugees said the army arrived at dawn with a small bulldozer taking down a few shelters. Soldiers came again two days later as a reminder that people must remove their concrete walls and metal roofs. Kanj, 30, has since paid men from a nearby camp to knock down her hut with jackhammers. She preferred to do it herself than face a forcible demolition.

She and her four small children are now crammed into their neighbor's hut across the dirt road with a dozen people. "We're all sitting inside the same room on top of each other with our stuff," she said. "We can't rent a place or leave or do anything at all." People at the camp said they would follow the rules but have found it hard to meet deadlines and

find money for equipment. They must also get rid of the rubble.

Some worry they will not manage to cobble together the permitted tents from wood and plastic sheeting, which would barely shield them from Arsal's harsh winter. The military first told them of the order some two months ago and has since allowed grace periods. The army has not commented on the demolitions, but a military source said the forces were executing a legal regulation. "Of course, we're scared of the future," Kanj said. "God knows what more decisions (authorities) will come up with next."

Start from scratch

Human Rights Watch described the shelter order as "one of many recent actions to crank up pressure on Syrian refugees to go back." These include more arrests, deportations, shop closures, curfews, evictions and other measures in the past months, it said on Friday. Some Lebanese officials have called the mainly Sunni refugees a threat to Lebanon, warning the concrete huts would lead to their lasting settlement.

It is a thorny topic in a country with a fragile sectarian political system where informal settlements of Palestinians have expanded after they came decades ago. Foreign Minister Gebran Bassil, the president's son-in-law, has pushed hard for Syrians to go home, insisting they should not wait for an elusive peace deal to end the war. Last month, he said town councils could get refugees to leave by "implementing the law and protecting public order".

But activists accuse his party and other politicians of fueling hostility towards refugees and blaming them for Lebanon's long-existing problems. Abou Firas, a Syrian refugee who oversees the same Arsal camp, said they would leave if they could. As fighting died

down and Damascus reclaimed much of Syria, tens of thousands of refugees have returned, Lebanese authorities say.

Still, aid agencies say many have fears about going home, including reprisals, military conscription, loss of property, or fresh waves of violence. "There's a lot of uncertainty about our fate," said Abou Firas, who must demolish his family's hut too. "We don't intend on permanently settling here." "This room becomes a part of you," he added. "You put effort into fixing it up ... and suddenly you find yourself having to start from scratch." —Reuters

Thousands march across Europe for Gay Pride

MADRID: Four hundred thousand people turned out on the streets of Madrid Saturday for a Gay Pride parade dedicated this year to pioneers of the LGBT+ cause, amid growing fears of fresh repression with the rise of the far-right in Europe. The marchers converged on the Spanish capital's main Atocha train station for the start of the festivities. The 400,000 figure was later given by police.

The slogan for this year's march was "History, struggle and memory" and participants marked 50 years since the Stonewall riots in New York in 1969 which were the foundation of the gay rights movement worldwide. Catholic Spain at the time was controlled by dictator General Francisco Franco and homosexual acts were illegal. Thousands of gay people were shipped off to rehabilitation centers or even jailed.

Homosexuality was decriminalized in 1978, three year's after Franco's death, since when Spain has become one of the most LGBT-tolerant countries in the world, authorizing gay marriage and adoptions by gay couples in 2005. "I'm 53 years old and I have suffered," said Manuel Carmona, carrying a large rainbow flag for Saturday's march. "But those who are 63-years-old suffered more and those who are 73-years-old even more and I want us to recognize these people who have helped us," added Carmona, who has been attending the pride march for 30 years.

Resurgent homophobia

Madrid's city hall swung to the right in June after a conservative candidate was elected mayor with the support of newly-emerged far-right party Vox, in a move that has caused concern in Spain. Vox has said that the Madrid Gay Pride Parade should be moved to a park in the suburbs and opposes public subsidies for the event. "They do not want to understand that when we talk about LGBT rights, we are talking about human

Indonesia issues tsunami warning after 6.9 quake

JAKARTA: A strong, magnitude 6.9 earthquake struck off Indonesia yesterday, the US Geological Survey reported, triggering a tsunami warning and sending panicked residents fleeing from their homes. The quake struck at a depth of 24 kilometers and was centered in the Molucca Sea between north Sulawesi and north Maluku, according to the USGS. Indonesia's geophysics agency issued a tsunami warning for coastal communities nearby.

There were no immediate reports of damage or casualties, but residents in the city of Ternate in North Maluku province described the panic when the quake hit. "I was getting ready to sleep when the window started rattling," resident Budi Nurgianto told AFP. "It was very strong-I ran from my house and all my neighbors fled too." According to the USGS, considerable damage was possible in poorly built or badly designed structures.

Indonesia is one of the most disaster-hit nations on Earth due to its position straddling the so-called Pacific Ring of Fire, where tectonic plates collide. It has been hit by a string of deadly quakes including a devastating 2004 tremor measuring 9.1 magnitude that struck off the coast of Sumatra and triggered a transport of the coast of Sumatra and triggered a transport of the coast of Sumatra and triggered at the coast of Sumatra and triggered

region, including 168,000 in Indonesia.

The Boxing Day disaster was the world's third biggest quake since 1900, and lifted the ocean floor in some places by 15 meters. Last year, a 7.5-magnitude quake and a subsequent tsunami in Palu on Sulawesi island killed more than 2,200 with a thousand more declared missing.—AFP

Iraq launches new operation to secure desert near Syria border

BAGHDAD: Iraq's military announced a new operation yesterday to secure the vast western desert leading to the Syrian border, amid fears jihadist sleeper cells were using the area to regroup. The operation, dubbed "Will of Victory", began early yesterday morning and would push to clear the remote territory between the provinces of Salahaddin, Nineveh and Anbar, a statement by the military said

Iraqi armed forces, paramilitary units of the Shiite-dominated Hashed al-Shaabi, tribal groups and US-led coalition warplanes were all taking part, according to the statement. Iraq formally declared victory against the Islamic State group in late 2017, a few months after ousting the jihadists from their seat of power Mosul, the capital of Nineveh province. The group lost their last sliver of territory in Syria-a small desert hamlet near the Iraqi border-in March.

But IS sleeper cells have managed to keep up hit-and-run attacks in desolate parts of Iraq, targeting government checkpoints, public infrastructure and local officials. Iraq's security forces have targeted IS in several coalition-backed operations in recent months, including in the rugged Hamrin region north of Baghdad. In May, they armed tribal forces in several dozen villages in Nineveh province to defend themselves against insurgent attacks.—AFP

Gas explosion at US mall injures 21

PLANTATION: A powerful explosion from a suspected gas leak ripped through a shopping mall in Florida on Saturday, injuring 21 people, the fire department said. The explosion sent debris flying across the parking lot of the Fountain Plaza shopping center, damaging an LA Fitness gym, numerous cars and blowing holes in neighboring buildings in the city of Plantation, about 50 kilometers north of Miami.

"We got our workout in, picked up the kids, walked out, got in the car, drove away and as we drove away everything exploded. It was a pretty crazy scene," said Jessi Walasheck, who witnessed the explosion. Deputy fire chief Joel Gordon told reporters two of the injured were in serious condition after the blast, one of whom had potentially lifethreatening injuries.

"We found patients scattered all around the debris area," he said, but added the injuries generally "are not as severe as what we thought they would be." His department initially called it a gas explosion and Gordon said ruptured gas lines were found in the debris, but the cause of the blast has not been confirmed. No one has been reported missing. "As bad it was, it could have been a lot worse," he said. A major avenue running past the mall was shut down as a rescuer aided by a dog combed through the wreckage —AFP

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Mexico's new National Guard in face-off with migrants

New security force created to bring down record homicide rates

CIUDAD JUAREZ, Mexico: A convoy of Mexican state and municipal police trucks roared along the US-Mexico border in Ciudad Juarez to confront cartel gunmen, past National Guardsmen patrolling the banks of the Rio Grande River for migrants trying to cross into the United States. "We should be with them, not here. We're soldiers," one of three guardsmen in a green camouflage uniform grumbled to himself within earshot of a Reuters reporter. He was frustrated that orders kept him from going to back up police in the shootout with gangsters.

The National Guard is a new security force that was created by Mexican President Andres Manuel Lopez Obrador to bring down record homicide rates. But now it has been tasked with patrolling the border to placate President Donald Trump, who has demanded Mexico stem the flow of US-bound Central Americans that pass through the country or risk tariffs on Mexican goods. If the deployment of some 21,000 National Guard troops at Mexico's northern and southern borders can reduce the flow of migrants, Lopez Obrador will have successfully kept Trump's tariffs at bay and averted opening up another front in the global trade war.

But using almost a third of the National Guard's total ranks for migration duties means fewer security forces to tackle one of Mexico's most pressing issues, spiraling violence, which last year cost a record 33,000 lives. Those numbers continued surging in the first six months of Lopez Obrador's term in office, which began in December. In Juarez, where drug cartel murders are especially acute, many people wish the troops were helping fight crime instead.

The city across the border from El Paso, Texas has long been synonymous with cartel warfare, which pushed the murder rate to 244 per 100,000 residents by March 2011, according to data compiled by Juarez-based advocacy group Mesa de Seguridad y Justicia. With help from civil society groups and businesses, the city made hard-won gains to restore security, and by late 2015 the murder rate had been cut to 21 per 100,000, the group says, citing numbers from the attorney general's office it corroborates independently.

Now, crime is climbing back towards levels last seen in the darkest days of the drug war, with homicides growing fivefold in the last three years to 107 per 100,000. "Murders, kidnappings, extortion have taken a back seat so the Mexican army can patrol the border,' said Juan Hernan Ortiz, director of Citizens for Better Government, a watchdog organization in Juarez that keeps tabs on the local government. The Mexican government did not respond to requests for comment on the criticism.

The National Guard in Juarez, mostly made up of active-duty soldiers equipped with ballistic helmets, body armor and assault rifles, is identifiable by small arm bands emblazoned with the letters GN, for the Spanish words for National Guard. "We have the army dressed up as the National Guard making sure migrants don't reach the United States while the city is headed towards a much larger crisis of violence," said Ortiz.

Shootout by the bridge

The police convoy that raced by the National Guardsmen was heading to free a 53-year-old American man kidnapped by members of the Assassin Artists cartel. A car chase through the streets of Juarez led to a shootout near the Zaragoza border bridge, said the attorney general's office of Chihuahua state. The American was freed, four kidnappers were arrested, another was killed and two policemen were wounded.

Visibly vexed at not being able to take part in the rescue, the three guardsmen remained at their post on the lookout for migrants as one cop car after another, sirens blaring, zipped past them toward the scene of the gunfight. Along this stretch of frontier the Rio Grande River is parched dry. Reuters reporters saw a steady trickle of women, children and men walking along the US side of the riverbed, out of the guardsmen's jurisdiction and into the United States, where waiting US Customs and Border Protection agents took them into custody.

Facing accusations the troops had been

heavy-handed in their efforts to deter migrants from crossing the northern border, Lopez Obrador said on June 25 the National Guard does not have orders to detain migrants. The guardsmen themselves, who are posted in groups at specific points along the border or patrol the frontier in military vehicles mounted with heavy weapons, say they do not detain migrants but are there to advise them not to cross into the United States. — Reuters

Migrants disembark in Italy after rescue boat defies ban

ROME: Dozens of shipwrecked migrants disembarked in Italy early yesterday after their rescue boat docked on the island of Lampedusa, the second vessel in a week to defy efforts to stop them by far-right Interior Minister Matteo Salvini. Some 41 people were finally allowed to step off migrant rescue charity Mediterranea's Italian-flagged Alex, which arrived at the port on Saturday in an overnight operation that saw the ship temporarily seized by authorities.

The boat's captain Tommaso Stella is being investigated for allegedly aiding illegal immigration, according to the Italian news agency Agi. It is the second vessel in just over a week to defy Salvini's attempts to block Italian ports to rescue ships, as tensions increase over the international response to the migration crisis. A third boat that had also been waiting off Lampedusa, the German charity Sea-Eye's vessel Alan Kurdi carrying 65 migrants, was sailing towards Malta on Sunday, even though it has not received permission to enter Maltese waters.

enter Maltese waters.

The charity said it could not "wait until the state of emergency prevails" in a message on Twitter. "Now it has to be proven whether the European governments stand by Italy's attitude. Human lives are not a bargaining chip," it added. Salvini last month issued a decree that would bring fines of up to 50,000 euros for the captain, owner and operator of a vessel "entering Italian territorial waters without authorization".

territorial waters without authorization".

After the Alex reached port, the populist deputy prime minister said that he would raise the maximum fine to one million euros. "I do not authorize any landing for those who couldn't care less about Italian laws and help the people smugglers," Salvini tweeted late Saturday. Mediterranea said it had sailed to "the only possible safe port for landing", citing "intolerable hygiene conditions aboard" in a tweet Saturday.

Irresponsibility of European countries

Authorities on Lampedusa in late June seized a rescue ship belonging to German aid group Sea-Watch, which had forced its way into port with dozens of rescued migrants on board, and arrested its captain Carola Rackete. An Italian judge subsequently ordered her freed, saying she had been acting to save lives, a decision which sparked Salvini's ire but may have encouraged the Alex crew. Two other investigations, on charges of helping people smugglers and resisting the authorities are still under way after Rackete forced her way past Italian customs vessels.

"The irresponsibility of European countries obliged me to do what I did," Rackete said, in a message to the thousands of protesters who demonstrated in Germany on Saturday to support her. German Interior Minister Horst Seehofer wrote a letter to Salvini asking him to rethink his policy, sources close to the German government said. "We cannot be responsible for boats with people rescued from shipwrecks on board spending weeks on the Mediterranean because they can't find a port," Seehofer wrote.

Sea-Eye's ship Alan Kurdi is carrying migrants who were rescued when they encountered difficulties off Libya. A spokesman for the Armed Forces of Malta said authorities were monitoring the ship on Sunday, stressing that the vessel had not been granted permission to enter Maltese waters. Libya, which has been wracked by chaos since the 2011 uprising that killed dictator Moamer Kadhafi, has long been a major transit route for migrants, especially from sub-Saharan Africa, desperate to reach Europe. On Tuesday night, 53 migrants were killed in an air strike on a detention centre in a Tripoli suburb. — AFP

Rattled nerves, minor damage from second major S California quake

RIDGECREST, United States: Southern California appeared to have avoided the worst on Saturday after it was rocked by a second powerful earthquake in as many days — a 7.1 magnitude tremor that revived fears of the so-called Big One the region has feared for decades. No fatalities or serious injuries have been reported from this second quake, the largest in Southern California in more than two decades. It hit Friday night in a remote and sparsely populated area around 150 miles northeast of Los Angeles, where it was also felt.

But the earth's mighty twitch shook buildings, damaged roads and rattled people still jittery from a 6.4-magnitude earthquake in the same region on Thursday. "We've never seen anything like this, this is the biggest and most impactful quake that I've ever experienced," said Victor Abdullatif, owner of a small supermarket in the Mojave desert town of Ridgecrest where the quake left wine bottles and other merchandise smashed on the floor in huge piles.

Naval Air Weapons Station China Lake, a remote testing ground for military hardware, wrote on Facebook that due to the quake it was "not mission capable until further notice." An official at China Lake had said after Thursday's temblor that there was "substantial damage" to their facilities, including fires, water leaks and spills of hazardous materials. As the second big quake hit on Friday, two news presenters live on Los Angeles TV station KCBS looked distraught and gazed up repeatedly to see if anything was falling.

"We are experiencing very strong shaking. I think we need to get under the desk," one presenter said, then did just that as the station cut to a commercial. Hardest-hit was the town of Trona east of Ridgecrest, where between 20 and 50 buildings were damaged and the Federal Emergency

Management Agency had to truck in bottles of water as water lines had been cut, county supervisor Robert Lovingood said. California Governor Gavin Newsom said on Twitter that he had requested federal assistance for communities hit by the quake, and on Saturday flew to the area to inspect the damage. However there were already signs of recovery as both Trona and Ridgecrest saw electricity restored Saturday and the state highway connecting the towns was opened after "emergency temporary repairs" to earthquake-caused cracks, the California Department of Transportation said on Twitter.

The latest quake was 11 times stronger than the 6.4-magnitude "foreshock" the previous day, according to the United States Geological Survey. The two major quakes, along with multiple aftershocks, have revived fears of the

"Big One"-a powerful tremor along the San Andreas Fault that could devastate major cities in California. "This is an earthquake sequence. These earthquakes are related," said Caltech seismologist Lucy Jones. There was a 10 percent chance of Friday's quake being followed by another magnitude 7.0 or higher quake in the next week, she added.

Abdullatif, the shop owner, said he is holding off on cleaning up from the quake because of the warnings there could be yet more seismic activity. "The anxiety is definitely very high," he said. "It's definitely a scary time." Terri Brantley, who lives in a mobile home in Ridgecrest, said the quake's fury was stunning. He and his wife were in bed when it hit but they managed to get out. "It literally picked up the house in the air, and threw it to the west about three feet," he said. — AFP

Greece votes in election expected to oust leftist Tsipras

ATHENS: Greek voters cast their ballots yesterday in the country's first national election of the post-bailout era, with leftist Prime Minister Alexis Tsipras's Syriza party expected to be ousted by the conservative opposition. After nearly five years in power, Greece's longest-serving crisis premier-as well as the youngest in more than a century-is battling to overcome a 10-point deficit in opinion polls amid widespread dissatisfaction after years of high

Polling stations opened at 07.00 am local time and will close at 07.00 pm. Exit polls are expected soon after and the first results should come in around 09.00 pm. With three new opinion polls predicting a clear victory for the conservative New Democracy party, Tsipras called for supporters to mobilize, hoping for a turn around. After voting in Kypseli, near the centre of Athens, with his supporters cheering, the premier called on young people "not to leave this crucial decision for their lives in the hands of others".

With temperatures forecast to reach 39 degrees Celsius, all parties are concerned about the impact the heat will have on turnout. "What is at stake is too important for someone not to vote and instead go to the beach," 36-year-old Aphrodite told AFP, as she cast her vote in the bohemian downtown neighborhood of Exarcheia.

"Greece is exiting ten years of crisis and the new government will have the heavy task to give a chance to the country to recover completely or to sink", she added. Opinion polls have consistently forecast that New Democracy headed by Kyriakos Mitsotakis, a scion of a leading Greek political family, will win an absolute majority in Sunday's legislative elections. "Today is a big celebration of democracy. Greek women and men hold the fate of this land in their hands," Mitsotakis said after voting in an Athens suburb.

Battle for the premiership

Some members of a small far-left party protested outside the polling station where Mitsotakis voted, but their

shouts were drowned out by New Democracy supporters calling their leader the new prime minister. "I hope that from tomorrow we will be able to breathe with relief. To take a deep breath. If Mitsotakis does what he promises," Athinodoros, a 48-year-old self-employed worker voting in Athens told AFP.

Tsipras called the snap election in June after losing both European and local elections to Mitsotakis' New Democracy in the space of two weeks. He has accused Mitsotakis-who was part of a 2012-2014 crisis government-of "disastrous" mismanagement that brought hundreds of thousands of job losses and business failures. Mitsotakis, who took over New Democracy three years ago, is a 51-year-old Harvard graduate and former McKinsey consultant.

He has pledged to create "better" jobs through growth, foreign investment and tax cuts and to "steamroll" obstacles to business. Tsipras, on the other hand, touts his party's track record in reducing unemployment and raising the minimum wage for the first time since 2012. His government also rolled out a batch of last-minute tax cuts in May. But Tsipras has been widely criticized for campaigning as an anti-austerity crusader before eventually accepting a third EU bailout.

According to the latest polls, conducted for the Ant1 tv channel, New Democracy is expected to gain between 151 to 165 seats in the 300-seat parliament. Syriza meanwhile is forecast to fall from 144 seats to between 70 and 82. The biggest party picks the premier. — AFP

Biden apologizes for comments defending segregationist senators

WASHINGTON: Former US Vice President Joe Biden, the frontrunner for the Democratic nomination in the 2020 presidential election, apologized on Saturday for comments supporting segregationist lawmakers that had been seized on by his opponents. A former Delaware senator who served under America's first black president Barack Obama, Biden stirred controversy last month when he said he'd "got things done" with the late southern senators James Eastland and Herman Talmadge, both of whom supported racist policies.

Eastland "never called me 'boy,' he always called me 'son,'" Biden had said in remarks that sparked condemnation from several of his competitors seeking the Democratic nomination to face Republican President Donald Trump in next year's election. Biden had remained defiant and refused to apologize, but on Saturday reversed course. "Was I wrong a few weeks ago to somehow give the impression to people that I was praising those men who I successfully opposed, time and again? Well, yes, I was, and I regret it. And I'm sorry for any of the pain or misconception they may have caused anybody," Biden said during a speech in South Carolina.

"Should that misstep define 50 years of my record for fighting for civil rights, racial justice in this country? I hope not," he said. Though he still polls at the top of the crowded Democratic field, Biden saw his standing slip following his first debate appearance in which California Senator Kamala Harris confronted him over racial issues. She accused him of opposing the busing of black students to schools in white neighborhoods during the 1970s as part of desegregation efforts, a standout moment during the debates which stretched over two nights. Polls released following the debates showed growing support for Harris, the only black female in the race, while Biden's fell. On Friday, Biden told CNN he was surprised by Harris's attack, but said he wasn't concerned because "the American people think they know me." — AFP

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Sri Lanka on alert as Buddhist hardliners hold meeting after Easter attacks

Muslims fear backlash from hard-liner Buddhist group

KANDY: Police lined the streets of the Sri Lankan highland town of Kandy vesterday and the army was on standby as hardline Buddhist monks gathered for their first big assembly since Easter attacks by Islamist militants on churches and luxury hotels. Galagoda Aththe Gnanasara, the influential head of the Buddhist nationalist group Bodu Bala Sena (BBS), has called for as many as 10,000 clergymen from across the country to attend the meet.

The group said the gathering will decide who to back in the presidential elections later this year in the Indian Ocean island nation where Buddhists make up about 70 percent of the population. The rest include ethnic Tamils, who are mostly Hindus, and Muslims. Dressed in orange, Gnanasara visited one of Buddhism's most sacred temples in Kandy on Sunday where a relic believed to be the Buddha's tooth is kept. Later in the day, the hardliner, who has faced allegations of inciting violence against Muslims, will address the gathering.

After visiting the temple, he told reporters they would take a "historical decision" to give leadership for the development and security of the Sinhalese. "Today, the Sinhala ethnicity, which has developed this country historically, has become very weak...There is no leader who holds responsibility for Sinhalese," he said adding some people were trying to sabotage the convention by spreading fears of possible riots.

Police and armed army officials lined the streets around the stadium, where the gathering will take place later on Sunday, and were also present outside other Buddhist temples in the town centre. "The army is assisting the police on security under the emergency law," military spokesman Sumith Atapattu said, adding soldiers were on alert should

trouble erupt. There has been increasing anti-Muslim violence in the country in recent weeks, blamed in part on Buddhist groups, in apparent reprisal for the April bombings claimed by Islamic State that killed more than 250 people.

Muslims have become fearful of a backlash, especially from hardline groups such as the BBS that are leading the campaign against Islamic extremism. Many shopkeepers and restaurant owners in Kandy said they planned to close their establishments on Sunday for fear of violence. M J M Faizal, a Muslim who set up the Expo Leather store in Kandy 20 years ago, said late on Saturday he never had a problem with his neighbors even if they belonged to diferent communities.

"We cannot predict anything because a lot of outsiders are coming to Kandy and we don't know what that means," said the 55-year-old, who said he has been losing business since the attacks in April. "We are not safe now, there is always tension about what might happen. If we could, we would move to another country," he said, adding that his wife and daughters now do not leave the house alone and are always accompanied by him or his brother.

Kandy was rocked by violence last year when mobs vandalized a mosque, homes and businesses. "The government is not doing enough for our security and safety," said 42-year-old Mohamed Rilwa, a Muslim businessman who owns the Fancy Point general store that remained closed on Sunday. "They see all of us the same way ... just because we are Muslims and we have Muslim names," he said, adding that he has lost 75 percent of his business since the attacks and worries for the safety of his wife and three children. Yatawaththe Dhammaloka, one of the organizers of the event, however, said, the objective was to

Hong Kong protesters march on station to 'educate' Chinese mainlanders

HONG KONG: Tens of thousands of anti-government protesters rallied outside a controversial train station linking Hong Kong to the Chinese mainland yesterday, the latest mass show of anger as activists try to keep pressure on the city's pro-Beijing leaders. The rally was the first largescale protest since last Monday's unprecedented storming of parliament by largely young, masked protesters-which plunged the international financial hub further into crisis.

Hong Kong has been rocked by a month of huge marches as well as a series of separate violent confrontations with police, sparked by a law that would have allowed extraditions to mainland China. The bill has since been postponed in response to the intense backlash but that has done little to quell public anger, which has evolved into a wider movement calling for democratic reforms and a halt to sliding freedoms in the semi-autonomous city.

Organizers said some 230,000 people snaked their way through streets in the harbor-front district of Tsim Sha Tsui, an area popular with Chinese tourists. Police said 56,000 turned out at the protest's peak. The march was billed as an opportunity to explain to mainlanders in the city what their protest movement is about.

Inside China, where news and information are heavily censored, the Hong Kong protests have been portrayed as a primarily violent, foreign-funded plot to destabilize the motherland, not a mass popular movement over Beijing's increased shadow over the semi-autonomous hub. "We want to show tourists, including mainland China tourists what is happening in Hong Kong and we hope they can take this concept back to China," Eddison Ng, an 18-yearold demonstrator, told AFP.

Bluetooth and loud-hailers

Hong Kongers speak Cantonese but protesters were

using Bluetooth to send leaflets in Mandarin-the predominant language on the mainland-to nearby phones, hoping to spread the word to mainlanders by digital word of mouth. "Why are there still so many people coming out to protest now?" one man said in Mandarin through a loudspeaker. "Because the Hong Kong government didn't listen to our demands."

Many protest banners were written with the Simplified Chinese characters used on the mainland, not the Traditional Chinese system used in Hong Kong and Taiwan. And a lawmaker had to coach crowds how to chant "Students are not rioters" using the correct Mandarin pronunciation. Protesters are demanding the postponed extradition bill be scrapped entirely, an independent inquiry into police use of tear gas and rubber bullets, amnesty for those arrested, and for the city's unelected leader Carrie Lam to step down.

Beijing has thrown its full support behind Lam, calling on Hong Kong police to pursue anyone involved in the parliament storming and other clashes. In an interview with the BBC on Sunday, China's ambassador to Britain said the extradition bill was needed to "plug loopholes" and that Beijing has "full confidence in the Hong Kong government". Yesterday's protest began on the waterfrontthe first time a rally has taken place off the main island-and made its way to West Kowloon, a recently opened multibillion-dollar station that links to China's high-speed rail network. Police placed the glass and steel structure in virtual lockdown and only those with previously purchased tickets were being allowed in. — AFP

Pakistani judge rejects opposition blackmail claims

LAHORE: A senior Pakistani judge yesterday denied being blackmailed into convicting ex-Prime Minister Nawaz Sharif for graft last year after the main opposition party showed secretly taped video that appeared to show him saying he was threatened over the case. Nawaz Sharif's Pakistan Muslim League-Nawaz (PML-N) party presented the video at a specially called news conference on Saturday, saying it proved that Sharif, currently serving a seven-year sentence for corruption, had been wrongfully convicted and should be released.

In the secretly shot video, judge Arshad Malik, a senior judge on the accountability court, is seen telling a man described by PML-N officials as a party sympathizer that unidentified individuals had confronted him with compromising video footage to pressure him into convicting. He appears to tell the man that "they called me to a place and put on a film on a TV and left the room. After three or four minutes later, they entered the room and said take it easy. After watching the movie, I thought of committing suicide."

Reuters has not been able to verify the authenticity of the video presented by the PML-N. In a statement issued through the accountability court, Malik said that his comments in the video were pieced together and presented out of context and he had never faced intimidation to rule against Sharif. "I want to make it clear that I was neither directly nor indirectly intimidated, nor was I influenced by greed," he said, adding that he had faced pressure from the former prime minister's allies not

to convict. "During the hearing of the cases against Nawaz Sharif and his family, I was repeatedly offered bribes by their representatives and also given threats of serious consequences if I did not cooperate." A PML-N spokeswoman said Malik did not deny the conversation recorded on tape had taken place and asked why, if he had faced pressure from Sharif's camp, he had not reported it previously. "Why did he not report to the Supreme Court supervisory judge about threats, bribes and blackmail?" she said in messaged comments.

The incident highlighted the increasingly feverish political atmosphere in Pakistan, where the government of Prime Minister Imran Khan swept to power last year vowing to root out and punish corruption by past governments. Since then, it has run into growing economic and political headwinds and was forced to turn to the International Monetary Fund for Pakistan's 13th bailout since the 1980s.

As the problems have mounted, opposition parties have stepped up attacks, accusing the government and its allies in the powerful military establishment of crushing dissent and orchestrating Sharif's removal from power and conviction. Maryam Nawaz, Nawaz Sharif's daughter and vice president of the PML-N, said the video showed the judge had been intimidated into passing the conviction against her father. "This evidence is enough to prove Nawaz Sharif is innocent and he should be released immediately," she said during Saturday's press conference. Nawaz Sharif is currently serving a seven year sentence for being unable to prove the source of income that had led to his ownership of a steel mill in Saudi Arabia. Under Pakistani law, this is taken to prove corruption. Pakistan information minister Fidous Ashiq Awan called the video an attack on the entire judiciary by the PML-N and said a forensic audit of the video would be conducted. —Reuters

Bolsonaro defends child labor in Brazil, sparking outcry

Jair Bolsonaro, no stranger to controversy, sparked a new brouhaha this week by repeatedly defending the practice of child labor. "I've been working since I was eight years old... and today I am what I am," the far-right leader said during his weekly live forum on Facebook. "Look, when a child of eight or nine years old works somewhere, many people denounce it as 'forced labor' or 'child labor," he said on Thursday. "But if that child smokes coca paste, nobody says

"Work brings dignity to men and to women, no matter their age," he added. He then repeated the remarks over the following days, saying at an official event on Friday that, "I worked from the age of eight planting corn, picking bananas... while studying at the same time. "And today I am what I am. This is not demagoguery, it is the truth." On Saturday, he republished a 2017 AFP video showing Frank Giaccio, the 11-year-old owner of a lawn mowing business and admirer of US President Donald Trump, trimming the White House lawn. Bolsonaro added the words, "Work ennobles."

Not allowed

His comments provoked strongly critical reactions. "He is the best example to incite a child not to work-to keep him from growing up to become an adult like (Bolsonaro), with so much hatred and such incompetence," said Marcelo Freixo, a socialist politician. Meanwhile Brazil's media seized on a 2015 interview in which Bolsonaro's brother contradicted the head of state. "My father had his bohemi-

RIO DE JANEIRO: Brazilian President an style, but he never let one of his sons work, because he thought they had to study," Renato Bolsonaro told Crescer

magazine. Brazilian law prohibits children younger than 16 from working, except in the case of apprentices, who can begin work at 14. According to the Brazilian Institute of Geography and Statistics (IBGE), some 2.5 million children and adolescents aged five to 17 work in Brazil. "The argument that working would not hurt, or that it would be a viable alternative is exactly what we are fighting every day while striving to make society think differently," Patricia Sanfelici, who oversees the fight against child labor for Brazil's labor ministry, told news web-

On Friday, Bolsonaro's minister for Human Rights, Family and Women, the former evangelical pastor Damares Alves, tried to put an end to the controversy. Our generation worked from a very young age," she said. "I worked from a very young age. But this does not mean that we are going to decriminalize (child labor). "Let us be clear that for children to work is a violation of their rights, something that cannot be allowed.'

Bolsonaro is not known for being politically correct. In 2011, he told Playboy magazine he would rather see his own son "die in an accident" than come out as gay. He has also said poor people are too ignorant to understand family planning. And as a congressman in late 2014, he said that a colleague was not "worth raping; she is very ugly." A judge ultimately ordered him to pay the woman \$2,500. — AFP

Bangladesh religious teacher arrested over child rapes

DHAKA: A religious school's head teacher has been arrested for allegedly raping two girls and sexually molesting another six children under his care, Bangladeshi officials said yesterday. Abul Khair Belali, 33, is the second principal of a madrassa-a religious school-to be arrested this week for allegedly raping students. Belali, also an iman at a nearby mosque, was arrested Friday at the Kendua girls' madrassa after an 11-year-old student told her parents she had been raped by him, police chief Mohammad Rasheduzzaman said.

The school is also used as a dormitory by around 15 girls from the surrounding villages. "On Saturday, he admitted that he raped at least two girl children aged eight and 11 and sexually molested another six girl children," Rasheduzzman told AFP. The incident sparked protests in Kendua, roughly 120 kilometres (75 miles) north of Dhaka, with hundreds of people marching through the main street demanding punishment for the

It comes after police last week arrested another madrassa head over alleged child rape in Fatulla, and two high school teachers in the central industrial town of Narayangani for allegedly raping 20 students. Rights groups raised concerns about the spike in the number of rape and sexual assaults in the Muslim-majority South Asian nation. The Manusher Jonno Foundation, a local rights group, published a report in April saying 433 children were raped last year. Most were aged between seven and 12, it said.

The arrests have also raised questions on the safety of students in Bangladesh's thousands of residential madrassas, where mostly poor pupils live under the care of their teachers. "We have noticed an alarming rise in sexual abuses of children, including the rapes of male children, in madrassas in recent years," Abdus Shahid, head of the Bangladesh Shishu Adhikar Forum, a children rights group, told AFP.

He said "a culture of impunity" is partly to blame for the rise in sexual violence in the country, as only a few cases end in convictions. The latest arrests come months after Bangladesh was shaken by the murder of 19-year-old Nusrat Jahan Rafi, burned to death on the alleged orders of the madrassa head teacher after she refused to withdraw a sexual assault charge against him. — AFP

One killed, thousands displaced in Rohingya camp landslides

DHAKA: Monsoon-triggered landslides in Rohingya refugee camps in Bangladesh have killed one person and left more than 4,500 homeless, aid officials said yesterday. About 35 centimeters of rain fell in 72 hours before the landslides started Saturday in camps around Cox's Bazar that house more than 900,000 of the Muslim minority who fled Myanmar, the UN said.

Twenty-six landslides were reported in makeshift camps built on hills near the border with Myanmar. Trees there have been torn up to build huts and for firewood, leaving the terrain unstable. UN refugee agency official Areez Rahman said about 30 shanty camps have been affected by the storms. One woman in her 50s died after being hit by a wall that collapsed, he said. Nur Mohammad, a 40-year-old Rohingya in the main Kutupalong camp, said 12 relatives had fled their tarpaulinclad huts on the hills to take shelter with him.

"My home is already overcrowded. I'm worried how I will feed all these people," he said. Officials said some 5,000 Rohingya on a strip of no man's land between Bangladesh and Myanmar had also been badly hit by the storms. "Children are suffering from diarrhoea and we don't have enough drinking water," camp leader Dil Mohammad said by phone. He said most of the camp was knee deep in water as Myanmar authorities had put a dam on a nearby river. — AFP

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Sudan deal first step to transition, but challenges ahead

fter months of political uncertainty, Sudan has taken its first step towards a democratic transition, but getting the ruling generals to deliver on a power-sharing accord with protesters remains a challenge. "The only path forward is a negotiated deal between the two sides," said Alan Boswell, senior analyst at the International Crisis Group think tank. Sudan's ruling military council and protest leaders reached the tentative deal in the early hours of Friday, agreeing to form a joint civilian-military governing body.

That body is to oversee the formation of a transitional civilian administration that will govern for three years - the main demand of demonstrators. The two agreed the ruling body would have a rotating presidency, a breakthrough following months of political impasse after the army in April ousted longtime ruler Omar al-Bashir on the back of a popular uprising. Tensions climaxed on June 3 when armed men in military fatigues stormed a longstanding protest camp in Khartoum, shooting and beating crowds of demonstrators in a predawn raid.

Dozens were killed, triggering international outrage, although the generals insisted they did not order the violent dispersal of protesters. The power-sharing deal comes after intense mediation by Ethiopia and African Union diplomats. "Any agreement is a positive step. The challenge will be actually getting the military council to do as it promised," Boswell told AFP.

On Saturday, the head of that council General Abdel Fattah Al-Burhan vowed to "implement" the deal and to work "in close cooperation" with the protest leaders. The governing body will have a total of six civilians and five military representatives. The six civilians will include five from the umbrella protest movement, the Alliance for Freedom and Change. A general will head the ruling body during the first 21 months of the transition, followed by a civilian for the remaining 18 months, according to the framework agreement.

'Giant red flag'

Against the backdrop of the June 3 raid, experts doubt whether the military will keep its part of the deal. "The key question is whether the military or the security sector more widely will cooperate fully with civilian members of the board or is cooperation mere window dressing," said Andreas Krieg, assistant professor at King's College London. "It is the security sector's intent to accept civilian control that will determine whether Sudan can move to a fully civilian rule in the future."

Bashir, who came to power in an Islamist-backed coup in 1989, ruled Sudan with an iron fist thanks to the security apparatus, especially the feared National Intelligence and Security Service (NISS) - accused by rights groups of trampling human rights and freedoms. Experts say the power-sharing accord is far from a long-term solution to the country's overall political crisis. One potential dispute is over the eventual formation of a transitional parliament. Friday's agreement postponed the creation of a 300-seat transitional legislature - 67 percent of which would be lawmakers from the protest movement - that had already been agreed in previous talks. "Failing to agree yet on the legislative body is a giant red flag. This risks becoming the new impasse," said Boswell. "Even in a best case scenario, Sudan will be navigating a very challenging transition for years to come."

'Huge responsibility'

Boswell said the protest movement "will almost certainly need to continue mobilizing its street power to pressure the military council to uphold its commitments". Prominent protest leader Babikir Faisal said that while the deal may not be a cure-all, an agreement with the generals was needed. "Given the overall tension, agreeing on a sovereign council and a government is a step forward," he told AFP. "The other choice would have been to take the path of confrontation."

The protest alliance says it is now in charge of appointing the new prime minister and a transitional government of technocrats. Faisal said the first priority of the new administration will be to offer a "relief program" aimed at tackling Sudan's economic crisis. "The economic situation is very difficult," he said. "This is one of the major challenges. This revolution was also triggered by the crisis of bread."

Protests first broke out after the government tripled the price of bread, but they swiftly escalated into nationwide rallies against Bashir's rule, culminating in his ouster on April 11. And while addressing economic concerns will be key, it will be just one of many challenges facing the protest leaders in their new role, said Khalid Tijani, editor of Sudan's economic weekly Elaf. "The government will be formed by the alliance, which means revolutionaries," Tijani said. "They have taken on a huge burden of responsibility, because any failure will be blamed on them ultimately." —AFP

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Limitless water for Delhi haves, poor fight for drops

n this teeming capital city of more than 20 million people, a worsening drought is amplifying the vast inequal-Lity between India's rich and poor. The politicians, civil servants and corporate lobbyists who live in substantial houses and apartments in central Delhi pay very little to get limitless supplies of piped water - whether for their bathrooms, kitchens or to wash the car, dog, or spray a manicured lawn. They can do all that for as little as \$10-

But step into one of the slum areas in the inner city, or a giant disorganized housing estate on the outskirts and there is a daily struggle to get and pay for very limited supplies of water, which is delivered by tanker rather than pipe. And the price is soaring as supplies are fast depleting. India's water crisis is far from even-handed - the elite in Delhi and most other parts of the country remain unaffected while the poor scramble for supplies every day. Prime Minister Narendra Modi's official residence and those of his cabinet are in central Delhi, as are those of most lawmakers.

That may help to explain why it took until this week for Modi to call for a massive water conservation program, the first big initiative by the government despite years of warnings about dry reservoirs and depleted water tables, policy makers and water industry experts said. Telecom sales representative Amar Nath Shukla, who lives in a giant unauthorized housing sprawl on the south side of Delhi, says he is now paying 700 rupees for a small tanker to bring him, his wife and three school-age children 2,000 liters of water, their weekly quota.

A year ago, Shukla would buy two of the rusty, ovalshaped tankers a week for 500 rupees each but he cut back to one as the price climbed 40 percent. "Why should a densely populated settlement get so little of water and why should the sparsely-populated central district of New

Delhi receive so much of extra supply?" asked Shukla. More than 30 other residents Reuters spoke to in his Sangam Vihar district also complained about the quality of water. "Until last year I was drinking the water sold by a few local suppliers but then I fell ill and the doctor asked

me to buy water bottles made by only big, reputed com-

panies," said Dilip Kumar Kamath, 46, waving a prescription which listed abdominal pain and stomach infection as his ailments.

Water gangs

Delhi's main government district and the army cantonment areas get about 375 liters of water per person per day but residents of Sangam Vihar on average receive only 40 liters for each resident per day. The water comes from boreholes and tankers under the jurisdiction of the Delhi water board, run by the city government. But residents say some of the boreholes have been taken over by private operators associated with criminal gangs and local politicians. These gangs also have a major role in providing private tankers, which are all illegal, making people liable to

And all this when temperatures, and demand, are soaring. Delhi was the second driest it has been in 26 years in June, and recorded its highest ever temperature for the month at 48 degrees Celsius on June 10. Monsoon rains reached the capital on Thursday, more than a week later than usual, with only a light drizzle. Most private tanker operators in Delhi either illegally pump out fast depleting ground water or steal the water from government supplies, various government studies show.

In Delhi, nearly half of the supply from the Delhi water board either gets stolen with the connivance of lowly officials or simply seeps out via leaky pipes, several studies show. The board's 1,033 tanker fleet is well short of the city's requirements. Hundreds of private water tankers are operating this summer, though there are no official numbers.

Water wars

The water scarcity is even more acute in the Bhalswa Dairy locality of northwestern Delhi, more than 30 km from Sangam Vihar. The water from a couple of community taps and hand pumps are too toxic to use, forcing people to queue up for a government tanker that comes just once a day. As a result, fights frequently break out when people, mostly can-carrying women and children, sprint towards

the arriving tanker. Last year, at least three people were killed in scuffles that broke out over water in Delhi.

"Fights over water supplies have gone up since May and these fights now constitute almost 50% of our daily complaints," said a police official at the Bhalswa Dairy Police station, who declined to be named. Some tanker operators have also started selling bottled water, underlining concerns over the quality of water in their tanks and how costs for ordinary people can mount, said the police

official Nearly 200,000 people living in the Bhalswa area are vulnerable to liver-related disease such as jaundice and hepatitis, said Kamlesh Bharti, president of non-governmental organization Kamakhya Lok Sewa Samiti, which works in the areas of health and education. The Bhalswa area is next to a big waste landfill, which has contaminated both surface and groundwater in the area. According to UK-based charity WaterAid, about 163 million people in India, roughly 12 percent of the population, do not have access to clean water close to their homes, the most of any

Almost all middle-class residents in the city have either water purifiers at home or they buy big cans of water from Bisleri, India's top bottled water brand, Coca-Cola Co or PepsiCo Inc. Bottled water suppliers reported a nearly three-fold jump in sales in India between 2012 and 2017, according to market research company Euromonitor. India's dependence on groundwater and the country's failure to replenish aquifers have exacerbated the crisis, said K Madhavan chief executive of WaterAid.

Both individual households and myriad industries mostly use fresh water and the reuse and recycling of water "is almost an alien concept" in the country, Madhavan said. Still, Delhi authorities said the plan to build three dams in the upper reaches of the Yamuna river, which passes through the city, would help Delhi overcome the shortage. It will take 3-4 years to construct them, said S K Haldar, a top official of the Central Water Commission. But issues such as land acquisition, resettlement and environmental clearances could make such an aggressive timetable untenable, Madhavan said. —Reuters

Gabon's timber industry reeling after graft scandal

ropical timber is piling up at Gabon's main port as the country's logging industry reels from a corruption scandal that brought down the vice president and ushered in a veteran environmentalist to oversee its forestry. Wood is big money in the central African nation, which is almost 80 percent covered by forests. The timber industry accounts for 17,000 jobs and 60 percent of non-oil related GDP. But at the port of Owendo on the Libreville peninsula, exports have stagnated for months and warehouses are overflowing.

The trouble began in late February, when customs officials discovered huge quantities of kevazingo, a precious and banned hardwood, in two Chinese-owned depots at Owendo. Nearly 5,000 cubic metres were seized, worth around \$8 million, some of it disguised in containers bearing the stamp of the forestry ministry. Several suspects were arrested, but the plot thickened in April, when 353 of the confiscated containers mysteriously disappeared from the port.

The ensuing scandal, dubbed kevazingogate, led to the government sacking the vice president, the forestry minister and several senior civil servants. The minister was replaced last month by British-born Lee White - an environmental campaigner who has lived for years in Gabon, battling to conserve its forests and wildlife.

Scandal hits exports

The scandal has "heavily affected people working in Gabon's timber industry, without differentiating between those who cheat and those who play by the rules," said Philippe Fievez, head of French timber company Rougier in Gabon, which has been present in the country since colonial times. He said the company had been able to export wood for just three of the first six months of the year and at the neight of the crisis had had to temporarily lay off 400 of its 1,400 employees. "It's going to take us between six and nine months to return to normal.'

After the stash of kevazingo, also called bubinga, was found in late February, the team responsible for checking cargo loaded onto ships at ports was suspended, accused of complicity in a smuggling plot. The following month, timber exports ground to a halt. "A month later, the team was replaced, allowing exports to resume," said Fievez. But then the containers vanished in April, and several top executives were suspended and the fallout reached the highest reaches of power. Françoise Van de Ven, secretary-general of the forestry industry association UFIGA, said, "our companies have been unable to export since early May - we are talking about a considerable loss of profits". White, the new forestry minister, "immediately took on the case" after his appointment in mid-June and exports "have just resumed," she said. But the scandal has inflicted "significant" reputational damage, she admitted.

'Tarnished image'

Exports were also hit by a damning report issued by British NGO the Environmental Investigation Agency (EIA) in March that pointed the finger at a Chinese group, Dejia, which has widespread logging interests in the Congo Basin. The report laid out the apparent ease with which officials took bribes to cover up the fraudulent activities of some loggers, and within weeks of its release the government suspended Dejia's license at two logging sites.

Benjamin Feng of the Chinese company KHLL Forestry said that now "buyers have the impression there is a risk of purchasing illegal timber when buying wood from Gabon". We have about 1,500 cubic metres of azobe wood ready to go to Europe, but my Dutch buyer is hesitating, asking me: 'What proves that your wood is legal?'." "I can prove it, I have all the papers, but the image has been tarnished," he said. Rougier's Fievez tried to look on the bright side. "At least the scandal had the merit of pointing out the bad practices of some loggers - now everyone plays by the same rules." —AFP

Game changer? African leaders launch free-trade zone

Potential for Africa's \$3.4tn economy is massive, but hurdles remain

nental free-trade zone that if successful would unite 1.3 billion people, create a \$3.4 trillion economic bloc and usher in a new era of development.

After four years of talks, an agreement to form a 55nation trade bloc was reached in March, paving the way for yesterday's African Union summit in Niger where attendees were to unveil which nation would host the trade zone's headquarters, when trading would start and discuss how exactly it would work.

It is hoped that the African Continental Free Trade Area (AfCFTA) - the largest since the creation of the World Trade Organization in 1994 - will help unlock Africa's longstymied economic potential by boosting intra-regional trade, strengthening supply chains and spreading expertise. "The eyes of the world are turned to Africa," Egyptian President and African Union Chairman Abdel Fattah Al-Sisi said at the summit's opening ceremony. AfCFTA "will reinforce our negotiating position on the international stage. It will represent an important step."

Africa has much catching up to do: its intra-regional

NIAMEY: African leaders met yesterday to launch a conti-trade accounted for just 17 percent of exports in 2017 versus 59 percent in Asia and 69 percent in Europe, and Africa has missed out on the economic booms that other trade blocs have experienced in recent decades. Economists say significant challenges remain, including poor road and rail links, large areas of unrest, excessive porder bureaucracy and petty corruption that have held back growth and integration.

Members have committed to eliminate tariffs on most goods, which will increase trade in the region by 15-25 percent in the medium term, but this would double if these other issues were dealt with, according to International Monetary Fund (IMF) estimates. The IMF in a May report described a free-trade zone as a potential "economic game changer" of the kind that has boosted growth in Europe and North America, but it added a note of caution. "Reducing tariffs alone is not sufficient," it said.

Divergent interests

Africa already has an alphabet soup of competing and overlapping trade zones - ECOWAS in the west, EAC in

the east, SADC in the south and COMESA in the east and south. But only the EAC, driven mainly by Kenya, has made significant progress towards a common market in goods and services.

These regional economic communities (REC) will continue to trade among themselves as they do now. The role of AfCFTA is to liberalize trade among those member states that are not currently in the same REC, said Trudi Hartzenberg, director at Tralac, a South Africa-based trade law organization.

The zone's potential clout received a boost on Tuesday when Nigeria, the largest economy in Africa, agreed to sign the agreement at the summit. Benin has also since agreed to join. Fifty-four of the continent's 55 states have signed up, but only 25 have ratified. One obstacle in negotiations will be the countries' conflicting motives. For undiversified but relatively developed economies like Nigeria, which relies heavily on oil exports, the benefits of membership will likely be smaller than others, said John Ashbourne, senior emerging markets economist at Capital Economics.

Nigerian officials have expressed concern that the

country could be flooded with low-priced goods, confounding efforts to encourage moribund local manufacturing and expand farming. In contrast, South Africa's manufacturers, which are among the most developed in Africa, could quickly expand outside their usual export markets and into West and North Africa, giving them an advantage over manufacturers from other countries, Ashbourne said.

The presidents of both countries are attending the summit. The vast difference in countries' economic heft is another complicating factor in negotiations. Nigeria, Egypt and South Africa account for over 50 percent of Africa's cumulative GDP, while its six sovereign island nations represent about 1 percent.

"It will be important to address those disparities to ensure that special and differential treatments for the least developed countries are adopted and successfully implemented," said Landry Signe, a fellow at the Brookings Institution's Africa Growth Initiative. Regulations governing rules of origin, removal of non-tariff barriers and the development of a payments and settlements system are expected to be unveiled at the summit. — Reuters

Turkish cenbank chief ousted for refusing rate cuts: Erdogan

ANKARA: Turkish President Tayyip Erdogan sacked the central bank governor for refusing the government's repeated demands for rate cuts, Hurriyet newspaper yesterday quoted Erdogan as telling a meeting with his party's lawmakers. Governor Murat Cetinkaya, whose four-year term was due to run until 2020, was replaced by his deputy Murat Uysal, a presidential decree published early on Saturday in the official gazette showed.

"We told him repeatedly in economy meetings that he should cut rates. We told him that the rate cut would help inflation to fall. He didn't do what was necessary," Erdogan was quoted as saying.

The daily Hurriyet said Erdogan gave his explanation for sacking Cetinkaya, almost a year before his term was due to end, during a consultation meeting in Istanbul with the members of his ruling AK Party.

"We weren't on the same page," Erdogan added. No official reason was given for the sacking, but government

sources cited Erdogan's frustration that the bank has kept its benchmark interest rate at 24% since last September to support the ailing lira currency. In a written statement on Saturday, Uysal said he would independently implement monetary policy instruments focused on achieving and maintaining the primary objective of price stability.

Despite the new governor's assurance, critics say the move once again showed that Erdogan was in full control of the monetary policy, and that Turkey would witness a period of rapid rate cuts. "The sacking of the governor of the CBRT by presidential decree shows that Erdogan is in charge of monetary policy," said Wolfango Piccoli, of the Londonbased political risk consultancy Teneo.

"The decision significantly undermines whatever credibility the CBRT had left. It also signals that overall institutional degradation continues unabated," he added. Under Turkey's new executive presidency, which came into effect last year, Erdogan does not need cabinet approval to change the central bank governor. A senior Turkish economist also said Erdogan's surprise dismissal of Cetinkaya could further undermine perceptions of the bank's independence.

"While the debate regarding the central bank's independence continues, removing Cetinkaya, who apparently resisted some measures, and replacing him through an unusual method will only fuel this debate," the senior economist told Reuters. "We will see how he can convince the markets for a rate cut at a time when the independence is increasingly doubtful."—Reuters

Saudi carrier flyadeal ditches **Boeing MAX** for Airbus

RIYADH: Saudi budget carrier flyadeal has withdrawn a provisional order for Boeing's grounded 737 MAX jets, the US plane maker said yesterday, as the airline confirmed a new order for Airbus A320 aircraft. "We understand that flyadeal will not finalize its commitment to the 737 MAX at this time given the airline's schedule requirements," a Boeing spokesman said. The carrier's provisional order was for "up to 50 MAXs-commitment for 30 and then options for 20 more", the Boeing spokesman added.

In a separate statement, flyadeal said it will operate an all-A320 fleet. "Flyadeal announces a significant growth to its fleet, with an order for 30 A320 NEO aircraft, and options for a further 20 A320 NEO family aircraft," the carrier said, adding that deliveries will begin in 2021.



"This is in response to continuing growth in passenger demand across domestic, regional and international routes." Boeing is under global scrutiny after crashes of 737 MAX planes operated by Ethiopian Airlines and Lion Air that claimed a total of 346 lives. The MAX was grounded globally after the Ethiopian Airlines crash in March and there is still no firm timetable for returning the planes to service. Boeing said Wednesday it would give \$100 million (89 million euros) to communities and families affected by the 737 MAX disasters. Flyeadeal is a subsidiary of Saudi Arabian Airlines and flies to a range of domestic destinations across the kingdom. — AFP

Factory activities contract across globe as economic indicators fall

Markets relieved as Trump eases tariff threats

KUWAIT: Factory activities contracted across the globe in June after PMI indicators came in below the 50 threshold. A global manufacturing index produced by the IHS Markit and others fell to its lowest level in seven years at 49.4. Nations like the UK, China, South Korea, Mexico and Germany have witnessed their industrial sector contract. The EU manufacturing segment has also entered the negative terrain, while the US sector tumbled to a near 3-year low. Meanwhile, Japan's Tankan index for large manufacturers slipped to its lowest level since 2016, reflecting the slowdown in the key Asian export country. The picture is just as depressing in the single market, where the majority of manufacturers except for France reported dwindling output. It seems like negative effects caused from the trade war are spreading across most continents.

Moving to the bonds market, the free fall in major treasury yields across Europe was the focal attention in financial markets last week. The German 10-year bund vield hit another record low at -0.405 percent, falling below the ECB's deposit rate of -0.4 percent, while Italian government bond yields dropped to their lowest levels in at least a year. UK's 10-year gilt yield also plummeted to a low of 0.66 percent, below the BoE's policy rate of 0.75 percent. On the other hand, US treasury yields soared after the jobs report reached markets. Hence, the divergence between US and European yields facilitated the dollar's rally. The dollar index appreciated by 0.93 percent versus a basket of currencies last week.

Dollar rallies

The US Nonfarm payroll continues to be the stellar of the economy, while other economic figures disappoint to the downside. The American economy created 224,000 jobs in the preceding month from an unsatisfactory 72,000 seen in May. In spite of the decent jobs added in June, job growth averaged 172,000 for the first half of the year compared to an average of 223,000 seen last year. On the salaries front, wages remained in a constant state of 3.1 percent y/y and way below the 10year high of 3.4 percent seen at the start of the year. The unemployment rate edged higher by 0.1 percent to 3.7 percent versus expectations of 3.6 percent. The resilience of the jobs market has somewhat counterbalanced worries about the relative health of the US economy such as softening activity in the manufacturing and services sector and below-target inflation. The greenback rallied after the release of the labor report from 96.846 to a 2.5-week high of 97.443 and the 10-year Treasury note yield jumped around 8.4 basis points to 2.033 percent. Although, markets still expect the US Federal Reserve to deliver a cut of 0.25 percent in July.

Weaker growth prospect

Data provided by the Institute of Supple Management (ISM) showed that US factory activity had stumbled to nearly a three-year low last month and was the third consecutive fall for the manufacturing segment. The index shed 0.4 points to 51.7 dragged down by inventories and prices paid, which are currently below the break even rate of 50. The inventories index fell to 49.1 from 50.1 and prices paid index fell to 47.9 from 53.2. Compared to a year ago, prices paid index was at 79.5.

Unlike some of the regional manufacturing PMIs, the ISM manufacturing index evaded a fall below its breakeven rate of 50. Nonetheless, it is evident from the economic statistics that

the industry is in the center of a slump that is similar in severity to the previous downturn in 2015 and early 2016. The latest deceleration is prominent since the noticeable improvement in 2017 and early 2018. The downward trend in manufacturing is having some undesirable effects on other industries. For instance, industry data show that freight shipments were rising at a double-digit pace in the first half of 2018 but are now declining on a year-over-year basis.

Looking at tariffs, US President Donald Trump has suspended his tariff threats on China and Mexico. He agreed to hold more trade talks with China, rather than impose import taxes on \$300 billion of Chinese products. He also delayed 25 percent duty on all imports from Mexico, which he threatened to impose in May. Yet those threats still loom and are forcing many manufacturers to rethink their supply chains. Last Wednesday, the President turned his attention towards Europe. He accused Europe of being a currency manipulator. Moreover, the US and the EU have been entangled in a disagreement over aircraft subsidizations to Airbus (EU) and Boeing (US) for some 15 years. Last week the US administration intensified pressure on Europe by threatening to impose tariffs on \$4 billion of additional EU goods. It seems that the trade war rhetoric is still in play mode and may further pressure the manufacturing sector down the road.

As for the largest contributor to US GDP, the services industry cooled more than expected in June to its lowest level in nearly 2 years. The services index fell to 55.1 in June from 56.9 in May due to declines in new orders and employment. In regards to the sub-components, the new orders index declined to 55.8 from 58.6 and the employment index descended to 55.0 from 58.1. The sector employs more than 80 percent of the US workforce and is critical to the health of the economy. Even though the sector is still growing at a healthy rate, growth has tapered off this year. Tariffs have impacted manufacturers negatively and some of the weakness now appears to be spilling over into the service side of the economy. Consistency in weakening PMI data across sectors, below target inflation, slower global growth, inversion of the yield curve and a never ending trade war theme could pave the way for US monetary officials to lower the overnight interest rate. Federal funds futures contracts are indicating a 100 percent chance of a 25 basis point cut on July 31.

Britain's economic indicators feeble

For the past two readings the UK's manufacturing industry has been in a contractionary environment. The latest figure for the month of June revealed that the IHS Markit Manufacturing Index fell to 48, the frailest reading in more than 6 years. Across the sub-indices, there were sharp drops in output and new orders indices. Moreover, new export orders fell for the third month in a row. Business confidence also plummeted, falling to its third-lowest level since IHS Markit's records began. The manufacturing survey is in line with a quarterly poll released from the British Chambers of Commerce, which indicated that factory sales rose at the slowest pace in seven years between April and June. Despite the gloomy overall results, there was some hope in the PMI survey. Around 44 percent of firms projected higher output in one year's time, while only 14 percent expected a decrease.

As for the dominant sector in the UK, the services PMI

almost entered into negative terrain as the figure declined from 51 to 50.2. The near-stagnation of the services sector last month is one of the poorest performances seen over the past decade and comes on the heels of steep declines in both manufacturing and construction. The composite index that encompasses the construction and manufacturing sectors fell to 49.7 from 50.9, signaling a drop in overall private sector activity for the first time in nearly three years. Construction activity stumbled from 49.3 to 43.1, the frailest reading since 2009. The overall growth outlook implied by the PMIs is anemic due to the fact that there is a strong correlation between PMI and future growth prospects. According to IHS Market survey provider, the composite PMI seen in the second quarter points to a minus 0.1 percent quarterly contraction in GDP growth. GDP growth for the month of May came in at negative 0.4 percent m/m; hence a recession may just be around the corner. Weakening global growth, combined with acute uncertainty over Brexit, frail data out of the British economy and few signs of material inflationary pressure supports the case for the BoE to hold rates at their current levels.

In the FX sphere, the Sterling pound persists in a downward trajectory falling back towards the strong support level of 1.2500 and was the worst performer in the currencies market. The negative momentum witnessed in the pound was due to the most unsatisfactory run of data last week since 2011 and it marks a sharp turnaround after the UK economy expanded by 0.5 percent in Q1. The releases of the latest PMI surveys have indicated that the UK economy may have contracted in Q2 and fears of a no-deal Brexit outcome looming over the economy led the GBP to depreciate by 1.32 percent against the USD last week.

The euro followed the pounds route lower versus the USD in the past five trading session, undercut by growing expectations for a looser ECB policy. The appointment of Christine Lagarde to be the next ECB President has strengthened market expectations for a looser ECB policy. It helps to explain in part why the US dollar failed to weaken more in light of the dovish re-pricing of Fed policy expectations. The single currency lost 1.24 percent of its value to the dollar.

RBA delivers on its promise

The central bank of Australia (RBA) last week lowered the cash rate by 0.25 percent as expected to a new record low of 1.00 percent. This followed a cut from 1.50 percent to 1.25 percent on June 4, which was the first cash rate move in almost three years. The last time the Bank dropped its cash rate in two successive months was in 2012, in response to global concerns and the European financial crisis. The rate cut was widely anticipated and therefore it explains why the AUD/USD rose by around 40 basis points after the cut was delivered. The RBA stated that the "easing of monetary conditions will support employment growth and provide greater confidence that inflation will be consistent with the medium-term target". Furthermore, officials indicated they "will continue to monitor developments in the labor market closely and adjust monetary policy if needed to support sustainable growth in the economy". The introduction of "if needed" proposes that the central bank is in no rush to deliver an additional cut unless the economic stance proves frailer than projected. Nonetheless, the door remains open for further easing and the sharp drop in the cash rate by -0.50 percent suggests greater growth fears.



China manufacturing

China's manufacturing sector came under further pressure in June after the manufacturing indicators disappointed to the downside. The NBS PMI index has been in negative territory for the past two months at 49.4, while the Caixin PMI index contracted for the second time this year also coming in at 49.4. Any reading below the 50 threshold suggests shrinkage in the aforementioned sector. In its latest report, Caixin said manufacturing production declined for the first time in five months with businesses pointing at trade tensions for the weaker sentiment. New orders dropped for the first time since January and export demand

On the political front, trade talks between the two largest economies are scheduled to resume after the positive outcome seen at the G20 summit. This could support business sentiment to some extent; however there is still a lot of lingering uncertainty as the core issues that prompted the trade war rhetoric are far from resolved. Overall, the manufacturing sector that accounts to 30 percent of China's GDP is contracting, the service sector is slightly slowing down, growth is relatively low compared to historical standards and resolving the trade dispute is nowhere to be seen. As such, policy makers in Beijing could further ease monetary and fiscal policies to support future growth to come.

Equities

All three major US equity indices soared to new record highs last week thanks to mounting expectations that the US central bank would take a more dovish turn as a raft of data provided more evidence of a slowing economy. In addition, the latest trade truce between the US and China also played a positive role. The Dow Jones and S&P 500 gained 2.28 percent and 2.24 percent respectively, in the past five trad-

Commodities

Oil prices tumbled drastically in the previous week even as OPEC members extended the supply cuts by nine months until March 2020. It seems that the outlook for global economic growth outweighed supply cuts. The price of Brent crude oil was subdued immensely falling to \$62.19, the lowest level since February 11. Over the course of the week, Brent crude was 6 percent in the red.

Wall Street Week Ahead

Buoyant US stocks at odds with downbeat market signals

NEW YORK: Even as record highs this week in the major US stock indexes telegraph confidence on Wall Street, caution abounds in other US markets, where falling bond yields and flailing small-cap stocks indicate investors are torn about where to place bets.

Hints from Federal Reserve policymakers that the central bank will cut interest rates have buoyed both US stocks and Treasuries. The S&P 500, the Dow Jones Industrial Average and Nasdaq have all notched new highs this week, while yields on the benchmark 10-year Treasury note dropped below 2 percent to their lowest since late 2016. Rate cuts often occur in response to signs of emerging economic weakness, which is ultimately negative for equities. Yet lower interest rates are considered supportive of stock valuations by stimulating corporate earnings and capital spending as borrowing costs for companies fall. Such a conundrum was evident on Friday as stocks fell in response to strongerthan-expected US payrolls data, which dampened expectations of a Fed rate cut.

The conflicting signals have given a bid to stocks in defensive sectors such as real estate and consumer staples, yet investors say they are hesitant to abandon cyclical plays, in the event of Fed rate cuts and a trade truce between the United States and China. "Investors have got to be nuanced," said Andrew Milligan, head of global strategy at Aberdeen Standard Investments in Edinburgh, Scotland. "I wouldn't disagree

with being pro-cyclical or pro-yield." It will likely take several months of economic data - along with results from the corporate earnings season later this month - to clarify the picture, investors say. In contrast to Friday's upbeat employment report, data earlier this week showed US manufacturing and service activity in June declined to multi-year lows. Some are leaning toward an upbeat outlook. The late 2018 swoon in US stocks was an early harbinger of recent softness in economic data, so equity prices have already taken it into account, said Jim Paulsen, chief investment strategist at the Leuthold Group in Minneapolis. In his view, the S&P's new highs reflect investors' anticipation that the data will turn around with the support of easing monetary policy at the world's major central banks and US fiscal stimulus. "There's not as much downside as people portray," Paulsen said. "Every policy official in the world is trying to push up the markets and the economy, everywhere you look."

Yet the performance in shares of smallcap companies, which tend to be more domestically focused than their large-cap counterparts, belies such optimism. Though it has gained 16.6 percent for the year, the small-cap Russell 2000 index has underperformed the benchmark S&P 500 index, which has risen 19.5 percent. Whereas other indexes have marked new records, it remains 9.7 percent below its August 2018 high.

"Investors are becoming more and more fearful that the economy is in the late cycle, and small caps, rightly or wrongly, are viewed as a play on the US economy," said Lori Calvasina, head of US equity strategy

at RBC Capital Markets in New York. Furthermore, the Federal Reserve Bank of New York currently forecasts a 29.6 percent chance of a US recession in the next twelve months. The bank's model, based upon the spread between 10-year and three-month Treasury yields, has reliably predicted recessions once it has hit the 30 percent threshold, said Lisa Shalett, chief investment officer of Morgan Stanley Wealth Management, in a recent note advising a cautious approach toward US

With the muddled market outlook, several market strategists suggest splitting the difference: adding to positions in defensive sectors while looking for opportunities within beaten-up areas of the market, such as small caps. Such an approach may be especially prudent given the conundrum regarding the US economic outlook, said Quincy Krosby, chief market strategist at Prudential Financial in Newark, New Jersey. Future data, she said, may end up either confirming recession fears or altogether dashing the hopes for interest-rate cuts that have buoyed stocks. "The market has got into its head the 'weaker is better' mentality," she said. "Will it be able to substitute stronger economic data for a rate cut? There are a number of scenarios under which it can end up consolidating." —Reuters

In Yakutia, Russia digs for diamonds in permafrost

Region home to 11 mines of Alrosa group

MIRNY, Russia: Diamonds are forever, and so is the permanently frozen ground of Yakutia in north eastern Siberia, home to huge diamond deposits that ensure Russia's supremacy in world production of the luxury stone.

In the city of Mirny, the sun shines almost continuously during the region's white night season in early July, with temperatures exceeding 30 degrees Celsius. But the summer does not last long. Yakutia is known for having the coldest winters on the planet, which drag on for nine dark months. This region-rich in oil, gas and precious metals-is also home to eleven out of twelve mines belonging to Russia's Alrosa group, the world's largest producer of rough carats. The majority state- and local government-owned company employs most of Mirny's 35,000 inhabitants and contributes around 40 percent of the wider region's budget in taxes.

Alrosa, which has been criticized by some locals for alleged environmental damage including polluting water supplies, has a reputation for secrecy but is now making efforts to demonstrate some of its work. In Mirny, a gaping hole of massive depths-the abandoned mine "Mir"-stretches out into the city. It is more than a kilometer in diameter and 525 meters deep, or nearly two Eiffel towers placed end to end. Oleg Popov, the director of Mirny's diamond sorting center, shows off a billiard table covered in shiny stones. "There are 14,000 carats worth around \$9 million on this table," he said.

Explosions in -55 centigrade

"Each stone must be sorted by size," said

Irina Senyukova, leaning on stones in the nearby sorting room. To reach the next diamond deposits themselves, visitors board a 20-seater Antonov plane and head north, across the taiga, to Nakyn, where Alrosa operates two open pit mines and is planning for a third out in the wilderness.

The most productive mine, Botuobinskaya, is currently only 130 metres deep, but the company plans to dig down 580 meters. The operating mines will be exploitable until 2041, the company hopes. Inside the mines, the temperature drops to -55 degrees Celsius in winter, which requires an increased use of explosives to extract diamonds. "The climate has an impact on our machines, but they are adapted to the extreme conditions," said Mikĥail Dyachenko, deputy chief of the mine, standing on the edge of the precipice and wearing a safety helmet.

"Man will adapt to anything, most of the miners are natives of the region. They know this climate well," he added. Trucks go down the mine slowly, spiralling down thin dirt roads dug into the rock. The descent can last up to

In each ton of ground, there are around 6.2 carats of diamonds. After sorting, the rough diamonds are transported on secret flights to be sold around the world.

Some are flown to polishing centers in Moscow and Smolensk, a city in Western Russia. The process takes place under heavy security, which was tightened further since a small gang of employees stole three million dollars worth of diamonds last month. The diamonds were later recovered.

Mirny was founded in the mid-1950s after the discovery of the first diamonds. Its first mine functioned until 2001, and it was closed down in 2017 after a flood killed eight people. Last year several dams built by the company broke and villages around Yakutia's Vilyuy River said they could no longer use it as a water source.

Russia's environment watchdog estimated the damage to the Vilyuy basin at 22.1 billion rubles (over \$330 million, 290 million

euros) but said Alrosa would not be held accountable as the accident was caused by

field, some 340 kms North-East from the town of Mirny. — AFF

Separately, the company said in April it would provide 833 million rubles (\$13 million, 11.5 million euros) over five years for a program to improve the quality of drinking water in the river area. Miners are exclusively men, predominantly from the region but also from the rest of Russia. Planes or helicopters carry the miners to the sites, where they work eleven hours a day for two weeks, then have a two week break.

'Local, indigenous communities lived here, and still live nearby-they are reindeer herders, but some of them go to the city to look for work," said Dmitry Averyanov, who drives trucks that survey the mines. As for the future, Alrosa is looking for ways to reopen Mirny's mine. Works are not due to start before 2024 and their cost is estimated at 73 million rubles. — AFP

US job growth surges, July rate cut expectations remain intact

WASHINGTON: US job growth rebounded strongly in June, with government payrolls surging, but persistent moderate wage gains and mounting evidence the economy was losing momentum could still encourage the Federal Reserve to cut interest

The Labor Department's closely watched employment report on Friday suggested May's sharp slowdown in hiring was probably a fluke. Lack of concrete progress in resolving an acrimonious trade war between the United States and China, however, means the bar could be very high for the Fed not to lower borrowing costs at its July 30-31 policy meeting. But the strong pace of job gains reduced the chances of a half percentage point rate cut at the end of the month. The US central bank in June signaled it could ease monetary policy as early as this month citing low inflation and growing risks to the economy from an escalation in trade tensions between Washington and Beijing.

"We think the Fed is still on track for a 25 basis points cut given trade uncertainty and the steady downtrend in business sentiment," said Andrew Schneider, a US economist at BNP Paribas Securities in New York. "An insurance cut by definition means getting ahead of a downturn, and waiting for employment to roll likely means being too late to deliver one."

Nonfarm payrolls increased by 224,000 jobs last month as government employment rose by the most in 10 months, and construction and manufacturing hiring regained speed. The economy created only 72,000 jobs in May. Economists polled by Reuters had forecast payrolls rising 160,000 in June.

Job growth averaged 172,000 per month in the first half. Hiring has cooled

from an average of 223,000 jobs per month in 2018, in part as the economy runs out of workers. The pace, however, remains well above the roughly 100,000 needed to keep up with growth in the working age population. The economy, which has expanded a record 10 years, has shifted into lower gear as the stimulus from last year's massive tax cuts and increased government spending fizzles. The trade tensions are also dimming the economy's outlook by undercutting business confidence and leading to a downturn in equipment spending and manufacturing. Consumer spending is rising moderately and the housing market continues to struggle, while the trade deficit has widened again

President Donald Trump and Chinese President Xi Jinping last week agreed to a trade truce and a return to talks. Trump has said he is in "no hurry" to make a deal and on Wednesday accused China and Europe of "playing big currency manipulation game and pumping money into their system in order to compete with USA." Trump on Friday said the robust employment gains indicated the United States continued to do "really, really well" and "would be like a rocket ship," if the Fed lowered rates. US House of Representative Speaker Nancy Pelosi, a Democrat, welcomed the rebound in job growth, but said "hardworking Americans are still struggling under the Trump administration's disastrous special interest agenda."

The Atlanta Fed is forecasting gross domestic product rising at a 1.3 percent annualized rate in the April-June quarter. The economy grew at a 3.1 percent pace in the first quarter.

Average hourly earnings rose six cents or 0.2 percent in June after gaining 0.3 percent in May. That kept the annual increase in wages at 3.1 percent in June for a second straight month. The trend in wage growth has slowed from late last year when wages were rising at their fastest rate in a decade, pointing to moderate inflation. Interest rate futures fully priced in a monthend rate cut, but dialed back expectations for an easing of 50 basis points. The dollar rose against a basket of currencies, while US Treasury prices fell. Stocks on Wall Street slipped.

Eyes on Powell testimony

Fed Chairman Jerome Powell's semiannual testimony to the US Congress on the economy next week could shed light on the near-term outlook for monetary policy. The Fed in its semi-annual report to Congress on Friday repeated its pledge to "act as appropriate" to sustain economic growth. "There is no inflationary pressure coming from the labor side," said Sung Won Sohn, an economics professor at Loyola Marymount University in Los

"It is hard to explain why wage gains are so slow in the current labor market." The unemployment rate rose one-tenth of a percentage point to 3.7 percent last month as 335,000 people entered the labor market, a sign of confidence in their prospects of getting a job. Some of the recent drop in the jobless rate had been because of people leaving the labor market.

The labor force participation rate, or the proportion of working-age Americans who have a job or are looking for one, rose to 62.9 percent last month from 62.8 percent in Mav.

A broader measure of unemployment, which includes people who want to work but have given up searching and those

working part-time because they cannot find full-time employment, rose to 7.2 percent in June from 7.1 percent in May. Hiring picked up across nearly all sectors in June, though retail payrolls contracted for a fifth straight month, shedding another 5,800 jobs on top of the 7,300 lost in May.

Manufacturing payrolls accelerated by 17,000 jobs after rising by 3,000 in May. The surge in hiring is despite the sector struggling with an inventory bulge - concentrated in the automotive industry trade tensions, design troubles at planemaker Boeing and slowing global growth. Construction employment rose by 21,000 jobs last month after gaining 5,000 in May. Government payrolls rebounded by 33,000, the most since August 2018, after shedding 11,000 jobs in May.

The surge in hiring was driven by local governments. But leisure and hospitality sector payrolls increased by a moderate 8,000 in June after rising 18,000 in the prior month. Professional and business services employment gained 51,000 jobs. There were increases in healthcare and transportation and warehousing employment. The average workweek was unchanged at 34.4 hours in June for a third straight month. — Reuters

Turkey's new central bank governor seen as interest rate dove

ANKARA: Turkey's new central bank governor Murat Uysal, who served as deputy governor for three years before the shock dismissal of his boss, is known as one of the more dovish members of the bank's interest rate setters. He has less than three weeks to prepare for the next rate-setting meeting, under pressure from President Tayyip Erdogan's calls for lower rates to kickstart an economy in recession.

A fall in inflation last month had added to expectations of a rate cut on July 25, but likely US sanctions over Turkey's purchase of Russian air defence systems, combined with investor jitters over Erdogan's sacking of the bank governor, could put the lira under renewed pressure and make it harder to cut rates.

Here is some background on Turkey's new central bank governor:

- Economists and bankers say Uysal has been one of the more dovish members of the Central Bank's Monetary Policy Committee, describing his views on interest rates as closer to the Turkish president than the previous governor. "We know that Uvsal is more sympathetic about a rate cut than (former governor Murat) Cetinkaya, and that's why he has been appointed as the central bank governor," said a senior Turkish banker who predicted a significant rate cut.

Uysal has worked in banking for two decades, holding several senior positions at the majority stateowned Halkbank and its subsidiaries. Bankers say he was respected for his trading in foreign exchange, government debt and derivatives.

"Uysal is on top of money and forex markets. He knows how to read the pulse of markets. He knows the mechanisms of banking and central banking," a senior Turkish official said.

However, some point to his relative inexperience of monetary policy. "He is not a proper economist, rather a banker," said one Turkish economist who asked not to be named. "My hunch is that his knowledge of monetary policy has been obtained through 'on the job training' as deputy governor."

- The Central Bank said on Saturday Uysal would fully communicate how the bank plans to attain "price stability and financial stability"

"He will prefer much more frequent communication with markets," the Turkish official said. "He will be able to explain himself and the central bank policies to the markets and the public effectively." Another economic source said Uysal's communication skills "will stand out", as he tackles market perceptions that he was appointed to do what the president wants, adding however: "It's no secret that he defends low rates".

The study, carried out by ETH Zurich and published in Science, said a largescale operation could capture two-thirds of man-made carbon emissions and reduce overall levels in the atmosphere to their lowest in almost a century. It found that the Earth can support 2.2 billion acres (900 million hectares) of trees that would sequester 205 billion tons of carbon. Some environmental campaigners have reacted cautiously to the research. "Yes, of course we need to plant as many trees as possible," wrote teenaged activist Greta Thunberg on Twitter Friday.

"Yes, of course we need to keep the existing trees standing and rewild and restore nature. "But there's absolutely no way around stopping our emissions of greenhouse gases and leaving the fossil fuels in the ground." — AFP

Eastern Libya, **US** firm close to signing Libya port deal

TUNIS/BENGHAZI: Eastern Libyan authorities and US security firm Guidry Group plan to finalize an agreement to develop a major port in the east of the troubled oil producer, both sides said. Talks have been going on for about a year to build a port in Susah, which would mark a rare sign of investment in Libya. Most of the country has been in chaos since the toppling of Muammar Gaddafi in 2011.

"The Guidry Group and the State of Libya through the Sea Port Authority officially signed the concession agreement on May 13 for the development of a multi-purpose, deep sea port in Susah, Libya," the Guidry Group said in a statement to Reuters.

"Next steps for the project will involve establishing all the technical,

financial, operational and commercial requirements," the firm said. Salah Elhasi, head of the eastern port authority, said no final deal had been signed yet but 90 percent of work was done.

"We are in the final stage of the agreement. ... and are reviewing the agreement's details," he said.

Neither side gave details. In February, both had put the investment volume of the project at \$1.5 billion. A final signature would be a coup for the parallel government in charge of eastern Libya which has not gained international recognition. The UN-backed government sits in Tripoli in western Libya.

The Susah port is supposed to be the main entry port for goods into Libya as a sea depth of up to 40 meters (130 feet) would enable containers to load goods on smaller vessels headed for other cities.

Officials hope the port will create obs in a country where most look to a bloated public sector or join armed groups. Since the negotiations started, tensions between the two governments have escalated as eastern Libyan forces led by Khalifa Haftar allied to the parallel government started a military campaign to seize Tripoli. — Reuters

Berry Spinach Salad with Spicy Maple Sunflower Seeds

Summertime salad featuring fresh raspberries, blueberries, spinach and goat cheese. Toss all that in homemade balsamic vinaigrette for the perfect summer side salad!

INGREDIENTS

To prepare the sunflower seeds, warm a small nonstick skillet over medium heat and add the sunflower seeds. Let the sunflower seeds warm up a bit, then pour in the maple syrup, a pinch of salt and a tiny dash of cayenne pepper, if desired. Toast the seeds while stirring constantly until most of the maple syrup has evaporated and the sunflower seeds are turning lightly golden on the edges, about 3 to 5 minutes. Transfer the seeds to a plate to cool.

In a serving bowl, combine the spinach, berries, crumbled goat cheese and sunflower seeds. In a small measuring cup or bowl, whisk together the vinaigrette ingredients until emulsified.



Just before serving, drizzle in enough vinaigrette to lightly coat the leaves (you might have leftover dressing) and gently toss (careful with those delicate raspberries!). Serve immediately.

Green Bean Salad with Toasted Almonds & Feta

This green bean salad is the best! Perfectly cooked green beans are tossed in a lemony dressing with toasted almonds, feta and basil.

INGREDIENTS 1 cup sliced almonds

1 pound green beans, trimmed and cut into 2 to

3" long pieces 1/4 cup water

1/2 teaspoon fine sea salt, divided

2 tablespoons extra-virgin olive oil 1 tablespoon lemon juice

2 teaspoons Dijon mustard

1 small-to-medium clove garlic Several twists of freshly ground black pepper Pinch of red pepper flakes

1/4 cup crumbled feta cheese, divided 3 to 4 large basil leaves, torn or chopped, for

garnish
Lemon zest from about 1/2 lemon, for garnish

INSTRUCTIONS

Start with a large skillet over medium heat. Add the almonds and cook, stirring frequently (careful, they burn quickly). After 3 minutes, reduce the heat to medium-low, and continue stirring until they are fragrant and turning golden on the edges, about 1 to 3 more minutes. Transfer the almonds to a bowl to cool.


Make sure the heat is set to medium-low and place the skillet back on the heat. Immediately add the green beans, water and 1/4 teaspoon salt. Cover and cook, stirring occasionally, until the beans are nearly tender, about 7 to 10 minutes. Remove the lid, raise heat to medium-high, and cook until the liquid evaporates, 2 to 5 minutes. Remove the skillet from the heat and set aside.

Meanwhile, whisk together the olive oil, lemon juice, mustard, garlic, black pepper, red pepper flakes and remaining 1/4 teaspoon salt. Set aside.

Once the green beans are done cooking, whisk the olive oil mixture once more, then pour it into the skillet. Pour the almonds back into the skillet, and add about half of the feta, reserving the other half for garnish. Toss to combine, then taste and

add more lemon juice or black pepper if necessary.

Transfer the green beans to a serving bowl or platter. Sprinkle the remaining feta and the torn basil leaves on top. Lightly grate some lemon zest on top, and serve promptly.

Malaria surges back in crisis-struck Venezuela; health system collapses

'I have pain everywhere, fever'

EL TUCUCO: The sweltering heat of the Venezuelan forest makes no difference to Jose Gregorio, who trembles with a cold chill. "I have pain everywhere, fever," he stammers. Gregorio has the classic symptoms of malaria, a disease eradicated years ago among his Yukpa indigenous people, but it's back with a vengeance all across crisis-struck Venezuela. "He had sore joints and then started vomiting, and it's been four or five days since he's eaten anything," says his worried wife Marisol.

Their four-month-old baby babbles beside his father on the bed. "The baby and I also had malaria," says Marisol. "Before, that was not the case here, there was only chikungunya and dengue, malaria came back here last year." She doesn't bat an eyelid at the mention of either of the other mosquito-borne viruses, whose spread has been fueled by the collapse of Venezuela's health system.

"Here" is El Tucuco, a small village at the foot of the mountains that form the border with Colombia, a three-hour drive from Maracaibo in Venezuela's western Zulia state. With 3,700 people, El Tucuco is the Yukpas' "capital" and malaria is rapidly making its presence felt here as in the rest of Venezuela – a country that could once boast of being the first to have eradicated the disease in 1961.

'Pandemic'

There are no official statistics on malaria's reach into El Tucuco, nor on the number of deaths it causes. But from his consulting room at the Catholic Mission, Dr Carlos Polanco is seeing a developing crisis. "Out of 10 people who are tested for malaria in the village laboratory, four to five come out with a positive test. This is an alarming figure." Brother Nelson Sandoval, a Capuchin friar who presides over the mission, adds: "Before entering the order, I already knew this community and I had never seen a case of malaria. Today we are in the middle of a pandemic."

El Tucuco is affected by Plasmodium vivax, the most geographically widespread malarial species. The more lethal Plasmodium falciparum strain is prevalent in the Amazonian regions of southeastern Venezuela. According to Sandoval and Polanco, the reason for malaria's sudden virulence in El Tucuco is simple: onceregular fumigation missions by the Venezuelan government stopped. "And as the population of mosquitos increased, cases exploded," said Polanco. Added to this is the malnutrition that weakens resistance to the disease, a new phenomenon since the economic crisis took hold at the end of 2015. "Before, it was possible to vary one's diet, but with inflation the Yukpa cannot afford it,"

instead making do with what they can grow, like cassava and plantain, according to Polanco. Rosa, 67, knows all about malnutrition. Lying on the floor of her house, she is battling malaria for the third time. "The doctor weighed me yesterday - 37 kilograms. I was 83 kilos before." A report published in British medical journal The Lancet in February warned of an epidemic of malaria and dengue fever as a result of the continuing crisis in Venezuela.

Between 2016 and 2017 alone, the number of malaria cases in the nation jumped 70 per cent. "The situation is catastrophic," said Dr Huniades Urbina, secretary of the national Academy of Medicine. In 2018, "there were 600,000 cases of malaria and we, the scientific organizations, estimate that in 2019 we could reach a million cases" - one in every 30 people. But these figures are only estimates, "because the government conceals the statistics."

'Nobody answers us'

The malaria explosion has gone hand in hand with the worsening economic crisis. According to Nicolas Maduro's government, inflation reached a staggering 130,000 percent in 2018 and GDP halved between 2013 and 2018. In the oil-rich state of Zulia, service stations have been dry for more than a month. Electricity blackouts are commonplace and residents flee abroad in their

thousands. Despite a poster of late president Hugo Chavez at the entry to the clinic, there is little sign of government presence in El Tucuco. Dr Luisana Hernandez despairs of ever seeing any state help.

"Every day, everything is deteriorating a bit more," she says, exasperated. Refrigerators intended to keep vaccines cold do not work "because we have no gasoline to run the generator," and both the clinic's broken-down ambulances are gathering rust in the garden. "We've knocked on every door. But nobody answers us," said Hernandez. Without fuel to bring drugs from the city, without resources to prevent illnesses, eradicating malaria in an almost impossible task.

Brother Nelson does what he can, with help from the Catholic charity Caritas and the Pan American Health Organization. His mission distributes the antimalarial drugs chloroquine and primaquine to sick Yukpa people. Maria Jose Romero, 22, was able to benefit from treatment. "Repeated seizures are due to the fact that many people cannot follow the treatment," for lack of drugs, she said. Romero now lives across the border in Colombia, having fled Venezuela. She is visiting El Tucuco to see her family. Soon she will return to the other side of the mountain, on foot. "It's three days' walk," she says. — AFP



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




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


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



Nigeria's **Nollywood** film industry reels in foreign investors

igeria's film industry, dubbed Nollywood, has long kept viewers entertained with tales of romance and riches, and now foreign investors are increasingly looking for a part of the action. US giant Netflix, France's Canal+ and China's StarTimes are among those making moves in the globe's second most-prolific film industry, which churns out more than 2,500 films each year and is topped only by India's Bollywood. At an event in Nigeria's economic capital Lagos this week potential investors from France mingled with local directors and politicians as they heard about the possibilities on offer.

"The revenues from the box office rose by 36 percent between 2017 and 2018 from \$17.3 million to \$23.6 million," Chijioke Uwaegbute, an expert on the industry at PwC Nigeria, told those gathered. "Nowhere in the world will you see this kind of opportunities and growth." Traditionally, Nollywood films have been low-budget productions, often shot in just a couple of days at a cost of several thousand dollars and marred by poor sound and image quality.

Rampant piracy and the widespread circulation of unlicensed copies has eaten into profits and put off investors from increasing funding. But higher quality Nigerian-made films have in recent years been having far more impact at the box office in a nation with a potential market of almost 200 million people. The Wedding Party and its sequel Wedding Party 2 released by director Kemi Adetiba in 2016 and 2017 generated over \$2 million, beating out US

blockbusters for the first time. Following up on that success the comedy Chief Daddy by Niyi Akinmolayan brought in some \$600,000 last year.

The figures remain miniscule compared to the vast sums grossed by Hollywood hits, and the Oscars are a distant dream, but increasingly upper and middle class Nigerians who can afford the tickets seem willing to pay to go see local productions. And it is these films with higher production value that are attracting the investors from overseas.

'Real appetite'

Canal Olympia, a subsidiary of French media giant Vivendi, runs cinemas and entertainment venues across the continent and includes at least one Nollywood film in its programming each week. The group will next year open two cinemas in Nigeria, a country with only one screen per million people where power shortages and high land-costs have made such ventures complicated. "It is very important for us to be close to Nollywood," Simon Minkowski, development director at Canal Olympia, told AFP.

"But beyond just distribution, there is a real appetite to produce the content made by Africans in Africa." Laurent Sicouri, head of acquisitions at Canal+, said he was in Lagos to "evaluate the production" of Nigerian cinema. The chain has already upped its interest in films from the country and offers Nollywood TV to its subscribers in Francophone Africa. While there is interest from Europe, most of the attention for directors and producers in Nigeria is focused on trying to attract Netflix.

The online entertainment provider has already acquired the rights to a string of Nollywood productions and in January released the first Netflix Nigerian original film, Lionheart by actor-director Genevieve Nnaji. Those involved in the industry are hoping that the influx of foreign interest will help push their output to a new level. But Serge Noukoue, founder of the Paris-based Nollywood Week film festival, warned that the industry needs to wise up to take full advantage. "Now that Nollywood is attracting investors the Nigerians have to learn to better protect their interests so that there is not just a pure exploitation of their content," he said. "At the moment, they sell to Netflix and that is the end of the story."—AFP

Stevie Wonder announces will have kidney transplant

Stevie Wonder has revealed he will take a break from music to undergo a kidney transplant later this year. The legendary US singer-songwriter told a crowd in London on Saturday that he had a kidney donor lined up and that the procedure is planned for September. "I'm going to have surgery," Wonder said as he wrapped up a set at a music festival in Hyde Park. "I'm going to have a kidney

transplant in September of this year. "I have a donor, it's all good," he added.

The 69-year-old multi Grammy Award-winner added that he will perform a few more shows before taking a break ahead of the operation. "I want you to know, I came here to give you my love and thank you for your love," Wonder told the crowd to cheers. The Detroit Free Press this week reported that he is fight-

ing "a serious but manageable health issue", citing sources close to the Motown star. Wonder was born blind as Stevland Hardaway Judkins, in Saginaw, Michigan, in the United States in 1950. He is said to have learned to play piano, drums and harmonica by the age of nine and released his first album in 1961 under Detroit's famous Motown record label. — AFP



Russian band performing in Alabama to protest 'ridiculous' abortion ban

The Russian collective Pussy Riot will perform in Alabama on Thursday, a sold-out concert to raise money for women's rights groups in light of the state's recent passage of a near-total ban on abortion. Proceeds from the Birmingham benefit will go to Planned Parenthood and the Yellowhammer Fund, a group that gives assistance to women seeking abortions at one of the southern US state's three clinics. In May, Alabama lawmakers triggered outrage after pushing through legislation making abortion a felony-even in cases of rape or incest, unless the mother's health is at risk-punishing doctors with up to 99 years in prison for providing the procedure.

"It is ridiculous to me that it's still a question in 2019 whether women can have an abortion," Pussy Riot co-founder Nadya Tolokonnikova told AFP ahead of the performance. "We want to come to Alabama and support women who are in quite a critical and vulnerable position right now," she said. "Many Americans, they believe that Russia is a patriarchal country-it's true in a lot of ways, but when it comes to abortion rights, it's not questionable." The Soviet Union in 1920 became the first state in the world to legalize abortion, though it was banned under Joseph Stalin for nearly two decades starting in 1936.

An anti-abortion movement does exist in Russia, with activists seizing on the country's declining population as reason for a ban, but according to Tolokonnikova it is only "insane, crazy freaks who claim that women don't have right to have an abortion" there. Though she feels "the US going backwards" the 29-year-old said she sees progress "because activism is blooming and the feminist movement is stronger than any time." "The feminist movement today is so strong that it will be able to overcome these obstacles,' the Moscow-based activist said. "Those white, male dudes who are voting against abortion rights, they're part of the history. They're not really relevant." She sees legislation like that signed in Alabama as evidence of politicians who are "angry, and desperate, because they feel that their time (in power) is about to end."

Activism 'a mindset'

The anarchist Pussy Riot collective has gained international fame for its politically charged performances that see members don balaclavas and skewer everything from the Russian church to persecution of the country's gay community. In 2012, Tolokonnikova was among the members sentenced to two years in a prison colony for "hooliganism and religious hatred," for performing a song protesting Russian President Vladimir Putin. Despite her time in prison, Tolokonnikova says she will never give up activism: "It's a mindset. It's something you can't really escape. It's a part of me."

She became a young mother 11 years ago, an experience that gave her "more conviction" in her feminism. "Having a baby who is a girl definitely convinced me that I should try to make my country and the world a better place for my girl to live in," she said. "I'm still fighting laws of patriarchal ghosts." The ban in Alabama is set to go into effect November 15.

But the law-which was designed as a challenge to the landmark 1973 US Supreme Court ruling Roe v Wade, which made abortion legal nation-wide in the US-may be blocked in court before then. "I'm looking forward to meeting inspiring people, who are surviving in an environment that is not particularly open to progressive people," Tolokonnikova said of her upcoming show.

"I like to go to places that are not super obvious to play in," she said. "I want to support those progressive people who decided to stay in a place like Alabama and make that state more progressive and more open-minded. If I can help just a little bit, I'd be really happy to." "That's the beauty of art, it can unite people with different views." — AFP

Madanna's reluctant records

adonna made her three most recent albums "reluctantly". The 60-year-old singer - who has Lourdes, 22, Rocco, 18, David, 13, Mercy, also 13, and six-year-old twins Estere and Stelle has been planning to make a new movie but got "bored" with the process so found herself back in the recording studio. Asked how she suddenly finds herself with ideas and knows it's time to make an album, she told MOJO magazine: "Sometimes that happens. But it has definitely not happened in the last... three records. "Honestly, the last couple of albums, I've made them reluctantly. "Both times I was trying to do something else- get a film made. "That happened on this record too. I moved to Lisbon because I wanted my son [David] to be able to attend a soccer academy and then I was trying to raise money for a film and then I got bored waiting and then I ended up making a record. "So it just kind of happened. It wasn't like a burning thing that I had." But when she does start working on new music, Madonna is "very focused". She said: "Because time is so limited and precious, you do have to be laser-focused

and not waste any time. "Because you're juggling, you know? Taking care of six children and they live in three different countries and you're doing other jobs and taking care of other people. "And I do have other areas of interest and filmmaking is one of them. "I've been working for years on a screenplay and I've another script that I'm supposed to direct. "With this album, at first I was just playing around and experimenting and then I was officially making a record. "And when that happened, I did have to become very focused." And the 'Holiday' hitmaker admitted some of her albums have come from a need to make a record. She said: "Other times, I did have lots of ideas stirring inside me and I did have a burning desire. "Ray of Light' would be one. 'Like A Prayer'. "But my life was simpler then. 'Like A Prayer' - I was married to Sean [Penn] and I had no children and my life was very simple. "Ray of Light', I had my daughter, but again, I didn't have such a complicated life. Now my life is complicated."

Aerosmith were surprised by Run-DMC song impact

oe Perry thinks "divine intervention" brought Aerosmith and Run-DMC together. The 'Crazy' hitmakers saw their careers revived when they teamed up with the hip-hop group in 1986 on a new version of 'Walk this Way' but the guitarist admitted he had no idea just how big an impact the track would make. He said: "We really didn't realize the impact that song and that video made on people until we were touring in Europe and there were people who thought we were a new band. "They didn't know anything about the earlier days. We were fascinated by that. "When Rick Rubin sent us a couple of plane tickets to go to New York to record the song and then make the video a couple of months later, for us it was business as usual. "Obviously the song was a big hit, but we really didn't realize what the impact was. "Without it, we would have kept playing and going on, and it would have been us doing what we've always done. Who knows what we would have written later down the road, but there was some divine intervention there that put us in touch with Run-DMC. I'm really pleased that it happened." While Aerosmith are currently on a break, Joe is busy with Hollywood Vampires, his group with Alice Cooper and Johnny Depp and admitted it wasn't much of a surprise when he started working with them because he's always working on new music. He told Kerrang! magazine: "I'm always writing, recording and messing around with different songs and ideas, just because it's something that I love to do whether they end up being something anyone gets to hear or not. "So, I've always got songs lying around and it really wasn't unusual for me to put a band together when I had a little time on my hands. "Hollywood Vampires isn't that different, apart from the guys are on a whole other level of tenacity from the guys that I usually play with to have a little fun."

eline Dion paid tribute to Sir George Martin at her London concert on Friday. The 51-year-old star kicked off the Barclaycard presents British Summer Time Festival in Hyde Park and used the gig to remember the English record producer - known as "the fifth Beatle" - who she worked with on her 'Let's Talk About Love' album. She said: "Many years ago, I had the honor and the privilege of working with the late great Sir George Martin, your very own Sir George Martin and he produced 'The Reason' for me. I wanted to mention his name before I sing this song because meeting with him and working with him, singing for him was more than a privilege, it was a true honor and I wanted to say a few words about him. So thank you so much." 
Jaden Smith's album 'for the haters'



wayne 'The Rock' Johnson was "excited and proud" to showcase Samoan culture in 'Hobbs & Shaw'. The 47-year-old actor - who is half-Samoan - admitted the "culture aspect" was key for him in staring in the 'Fast & Furious' spin-off, in particular as much of the movie was shot in co-star Jason Statham's native UK. Dwayne said: "The culture aspect was the most important thing for us, in addition to the chemistry. "It was a really awesome opportunity to showcase both of our cultures, but ultimately, whether it's British or Samoan culture, there's an anchoring to these cultures: regardless of what you look like and what your bank account is and what your color is - if you're my family, I've got your back. "That is a story point I was really excited and proud to showcase Samoan culture because in this movie, really, it's the first time ever that Samoan culture has been exposed in a big tentpole movie like this, that is a global earpiece." And Jason who lives in Los Angeles with partner Rosie Huntington-Whiteley and their son Jack, two - loved showcasing all he loves about Britain in the film. eremy Renner doesn't think he's suited to playing a superhero like Thor. Speaking on the Life Is Short podcast, Jeremy recalled: "When they showed me my character ... it's like, 'Oh, that's great, it's just a guy with no superpower - he's just got a high skill set.' I can actually attach to that." By contrast, Jeremy felt he couldn't relate to the character of Thor, meaning he would have declined the role if it was offered to him by Marvel. He said: "I'd have passed on Thor all day long - not that I'd ever be cast in that - but like, that kind of thing I'd be like, 'I don't know how to do that, I'm sorry.'" Last year, meanwhile, it was revealed Jeremy missed out on a cameo role in 'Mission: Impossible - Fallout' because of his commitment to Marvel. The actor was originally lined up to appear in 'Avengers: Infinity War' and although he didn't make the final cut, his relationship with the studio meant he was unable to commit to the 'Mission: Impossible' movie, according to director Christopher McQuarrie. He said: "Jeremy had his commitment to 'Avengers', which ironically they ended up not exercising, and we didn't know what the [sixth 'Mission'] movie was, so we couldn't provide a schedule. We needed absolute freedom. "The unfortunate thing for Jeremy is that he got caught in this perfect storm of, one can't use you and one doesn't know how to, given the massive complications they had with 'Avengers'."




James 'blown away' Boyle

Stop, stop: Washington residents use go-go music to fight gentrification

o-go music has been the rhythm of Washington for decades, but in recent weeks it has also become the improbable battle hymn of a movement pushing back against the capital city's rapidly expanding gentrification. Guided by the music blasting out of a storefront speaker in Washington's Shaw neighborhood, a young woman with long braids instinctively marks out a few dance moves on the sidewalk while waiting to cross the street. It's an impromptu dance break at the intersection of two worlds: close to U Street-the "Black Broadway" of Washington, with its jazz clubs, chili dogs and traces of segregation-and a nearby burgeoning haven for hipster craft beer bars, electric scooters and condominium apartment buildings like The Shay.

"Modern. Vibrant," promises a massive poster draped down the side of the luxury apartment complex. Below the sign, at ground level, the community's opinion becomes clear: "Gentrification is genocide," reads someone's graffiti. Just a few weeks ago, after much insistence, a resident at The Shay got the owner of phone store across the street from the apartment building to turn off the go-go music that has played from the store's speakers every day for nearly a quarter of a century.

"The customers were complaining. Everybody kept running at the store asking why my music wasn't on," said owner Donald Campbell. He sits at the counter of his Metro PCS store, surrounded by go-go CDs that he sells at \$10 each, in addition to phone equipment. "They thought we were closed." Over the next month, the store's silence rang loudly in the neighborhood. Residents organized petitions and impromptu street concerts, spreading the word on social media via the hashtag #DontMuteDC (referring to

the District of Columbia, where Washington is located). They finally succeeded in convincing John Legere, the CEO of T-Mobile-of which Metro PCS is a subsidiary-who took to Twitter to end the controversy. "I've looked into this issue myself and the music should NOT stop in DC!" he wrote. Campbell has since turned the music back on, albeit a little quieter now. But the fight for go-go continues. "You can't go to Nashville, Tennessee and say, 'Stop playing country music.' You can't go to New Orleans and say, 'Stop playing jazz," said the former nightclub owner, his jeweled cross glinting around his neck. "Everybody's voice has to be heard."

Chocolate City

Born in the 1960s and popularized over the following decade by Chuck Brown, the "Godfather of Go-Go," the music borrows from multiple genres-funk, rhythm and blues, soul-and is mainly heard live in concert, with an emphasis on audience call and response. "Go-go means that the music keeps going. It doesn't stop. It's continuous," explains former go-go musician Peter Battle, who sports a t-shirt that reads "District of Cannabis," a substance that has been decriminalized in Washington. The former trumpet player, now 55, has come to Campbell's store to buy a Chuck Brown CD. He remembers the times during the 1980s when he would play "all around the city" with his friends in the groups Petworth Band and The Mighty Peacemakers. But after the height of its glory in the 1970s and 80s, go-go began to crumble, dragged down by its

"DC experienced an epidemic of gun violence and drug addiction that coincided with the rise of go-go music," said Natalie Hopkinson, the author of "Go-Go Live: The Musical Life and Death of a Chocolate City," which refers to DC's nickname, given due to the cultural significance of its black community. "The music was completely innocent in this. But because it was the gathering place, it ended up being blamed for the problems that were happening," Hopkinson explained.

Today, the American capital has the fastest rate of gentrification in the country. And high-end apartments like The Shay have become a symbol of movement. When it opened in 2015, in the heart of Washington's historically segregated neighborhood, the poster on the side of The Shay declared, "She has arrived," in capital letters above a picture of a white woman wearing a powdered wig, in the style of Marie-Antoinette.

The black community was "very offended by this," said Hopkinson. "There is a total colonial mentality, and a notso-subtle signal that it is time for black people to leave." Since it became the symbol of the fight against Washington's gentrification, go-go has experienced a resurgence. In June, a city council member introduced a bill that would make go-go the official music of the city, and iconic go-go groups such as Rare Essence, Backyard and Junkyard are increasingly sought for performances. "The popularity is back up," said Campbell, who has become the second-best-known Donald in Washington. "Everybody wants to see what it is." Campbell, who is also launching a streaming platform dedicated to the genre, isn't worried about go-go's future. Thanks to the speaker over his store's doorway, go-go often is the first thing heard by newborns in the neighboring maternity ward. — AFP

Brazilian bossa nova pioneer Joao Gilberto dead at 88

oao Gilberto, the legendary Brazilian musician and songwriter who pioneered the lilting, melodious music known as bossa nova, has died, his son Joao Marcelo announced Saturday. The legend was 88. The cause of death was not immediately known. "My father has passed," the son, who lives in the United States, wrote on Facebook. "His fight was noble, he tried to maintain his dignity." Gilberto, a small-town boy from Bahia state whose soft voice singing "The Girl From Ipanema" in the 1960s made him world famous, was living alone in a borrowed house in Rio de Janeiro at the end, deeply in debt.

He fell in love with music when he got his first guitar at the age of 14. After leaving his village, he made it onto local radio in Salvador de Bahia, and at age 19, arrived in Rio. In 1957, he made a name for himself as guitarist on a recording by Elizeth Cardoso, "Cancao do Amor Demais," considered the first bossa nova album.

Later, known both for his smooth voice and his guitar style, Gilberto brought the sounds of bossa nova-meaning "new trend" or "new wave"-to jazz festivals and concert halls around the world, putting Brazilian music on the map. Bernardo Araujo, a music critic for the daily O Globo newspaper, said last year that Gilberto's importance was "immeasurable." "He was the leading voice of the bestknown Brazilian style in the world and a revolutionary without even really meaning to be," Araujo told AFP.

"He was the first singer, at least in Brazil, to demonstrate that you don't need a big voice, that you can sing quietly, like in a whisper, while accompanied by virtuoso guitar." Among Gilberto's dozens of albums, some of the most renowned were recorded with jazz greats Stan Getz, Herbie Hancock and fellow Brazilian Antonio Carlos

The singer of "Desafinado," "Corcovado" and "Chega de Saudade,"-which he often sang as a duet with his first wife Astrud Gilberto-was an obsessive perfectionist and then an eccentric recluse. He is known for living in his pajamas and for reclusiveness, only opening the door of his home to get restaurant deliveries.

Family feud In his later years, he was caught in an ugly conflict pitting two of his three children-Joao Marcelo and daughter Bebel Gilberto, both musicians-against his last wife, Claudia Faissol, a journalist 40 years his junior from whom he had separated. The two children accused Faissol of taking advantage of their father's mental and physical decline and contributing to his financial ruin. In late 2017, Bebel was named her father's legal guardian as he was found no longer competent to manage on his own. "In front of the microphone, he was a smashing success," his biographer Ruy Castro said last year, "but offstage it was the opposite."—AFP

Dates in the life of Joao Gilberto, bossa nova pioneer

Tere are some of the key dates in the life of Brazilian singer-guitarist Joao Gilberto, the bossa nova pioneer who helped put his country on the world's

He has died at age 88, his son said Saturday.

June 10, 1931: Joao Gilberto Prado Pereira de Oliveira was born in Juazeiro, Bahia state. At 19, he first recorded in Rio with a small band, "Garotos da Lua.'

1957: Gilberto made a name for himself playing guitar on Elizeth Cardoso's "Cancao do Amor Demais." composed by Tom Jobim and Vinicius de Moraes.

Summer 1958: "Saudade" (nostalgia) invaded the waves, as his 33 rpm "Chega de Saudade" kicked off his career and bossa nova ("new trend"), the syncopated rhythms of samba mixed with cool jazz.

1962-1979: After two albums with Tom Jobim and Vinicius de Moraes, Gilberto moved to New York, with an interlude of two years in Mexico that included collaboration with Jobim and jazzmen like Stan Getz.

Autumn 1964: A concert at Carnegie Hall in New York is a huge success. It came after the album Getz/Gilberto, which popularized bossa nova around the world, and the concert featured his then-wife Astrud Gilberto (who would leave him for Getz.) Frank Sinatra would add "Girl from Ipanema" to his repertoire.

End of 1979: Gilberto returned to Rio, recorded the album "Brasil" with Caetano Veloso, Gilberto Gil and Maria Bethania. He performed on world tours until the beginning of the 2010s.

2001: Gilberto won a Grammy for best artist in the vorld music category, for his album "Joao: Voz e Violao." **2008:** Final public appearance on stage, in Salvador de

Tehran set to exceed nuclear deal uranium enrichment cap

TEHRAN: Iran said yesterday it was set to breach the uranium enrichment cap set by an endangered nuclear deal within hours as it seeks to press other parties into keeping their side of the bargain. The Islamic republic also threatened to abandon more commitments unless a solution is found with parties to the landmark 2015 agreement. London said Iran had "broken the terms" of the accord and along with Berlin urged Tehran to halt its advance towards breaching the cap.

Iranian Foreign Minister Mohammad Javad Zarif said that Tehran could further scale back its commitments, but "all such steps are reversible" if European countries deliver on their part. The move to start enriching uranium above the agreed maximum purification level of 3.67 percent comes despite opposition from the European Union and the United States, which has quit the deal. President Hassan Rouhani's order to exceed the threshold would be implemented "in a few hours" after the last technical details were sorted, Iran's Atomic Energy Organization spokesman Behrouz Kamalvandi said live on state televicien

Rouhani initially flagged Tehran's intentions on May 8, exactly a year on from US President Donald Trump abandoning the multilateral deal. The Iranian president has said the move is in response to a failure by remaining parties to help Iran work around biting sanctions reimposed by the US. The arch-rivals have been locked in an escalating war of words with Washington blaming Iran for a series of attacks on tanker ships and Tehran shooting down an American surveillance drone, raising fears of a conflict that both sides have said they want to avoid

that both sides have said they want to avoid.

Deputy Foreign Minister Abbas Araghchi yesterday singled out Iran's declining oil sales and the effect of financial sanctions as the main issues that needed to be solved, or Tehran would further step back from its nuclear commitments. "We hope we can reach a solution otherwise after 60 days we will take the third step as well," he said, adding that Tehran would give further details at an "opportune moment".

Iran has previously threatened to also resume building as of July 7 a heavy water reactor - capable of one day producing plutonium - in Arak in central Iran, a project that had been mothballed under the agreement. However since Iran delivered its ultimatum on the Arak reactor "good technical progress" had been made with parties to the deal on modernizing the reactor, convincing Iran to postpone its decision, Araghchi said.

The 2015 deal was reached between Iran and six world powers - Britain, China, France, Germany, the United States and Russia - and saw Tehran agree to drastically scale down its nuclear program in exchange for sanctions relief. Washington began reimposing sanctions in August 2018 and has targeted crucial sectors including oil exports and the banking system, fuelling a deep recession. Kamalvandi said Sunday that Iran's Atomic Energy Organisation was fully ready to enrich uranium "at any amount and at any level" if ordered to do so. A top advisor to Iran's Supreme Leader Ayatollah Ali Khamenei hinted Friday it could reach five percent. The 3.67 percent enrichment limit set in the agreement is far below the more than 90 percent level required for a nuclear warhead. Iran says that it is not violating the deal, citing terms of the agreement allowing one side to temporarily abandon some of commitments if it deems the other side is not respecting its part of the accord

Britain and Germany said Sunday they were coordinating with other partners to the deal. In separate statements, their foreign ministries called on Iran to "stop and reverse all activities inconsistent with its commitments". French President Emmanuel Macron told Rouhani of his "strong concern" over the risk of weakening the nuclear agreement during a telephone call Saturday, according to a statement from the Elysee Palace. However, Macron pledged to "explore by July 15 the conditions for a resumption of dialogue between all parties".

Iran says it exercised "strategic patience" for a year after the US withdrawal, waiting for the remaining partners to make good on promised economic benefits. Trump has warned Iran that it is "playing with fire" by scrapping limits set by the accord.—AFP

Top British envoy in US says Trump administration 'inept'

LONDON: Britain's ambassador in the United States has described President Donald Trump and his administration as "inept" and "uniquely dysfunctional", according to leaked diplomatic memos published by the Mail yesterday. Ambassador Kim Darroch reportedly said Trump's presidency could "crash and burn" and "end in disgrace", in the cache of secret cables and briefing notes sent back to Britain seen by the newspaper. "We don't really believe this administration is going to become substantially more normal; less dysfunctional; less unpredictable; less faction riven; less diplomatically clumsy and inept," Darroch allegedly wrote in one dispatch.

The paper said the most damning comments by Darroch described Trump, who was received by Queen Elizabeth II during a state visit to Britain just last month, as "insecure" and "incompetent". A memo sent following the controversial visit said the president and his team had been "dazzled" by the visit but warned Britain might not remain "flavor of the month" because "this is still the land of America First".

He reportedly wrote that the "vicious infighting and chaos" inside the White House - widely reported in the US but dismissed by Trump as "fake news" - was "mostly true". Darroch is one of Britain's most experienced diplomats whose posting in Washington DC began in Jan 2016, prior to Trump winning the presiden-

cy. The Mail on Sunday said the memos, likely leaked by someone within Britain's sprawling civil service, cover a period beginning in 2017. In one of the most recent reported dispatches filed on June 22, Darroch criticized Trump's fraught foreign policy on Iran, which has prompted fears in global capitals of a military conflict, as "incoherent" and "chaotic".

He allegedly said the president's assertion that he called off retaliatory missile strikes against the Iranian regime after a US drone was shot down because it risked killing 150 Iranians, "doesn't stand up". "It's more likely that he was never fully on board and that he was worried about how this apparent reversal of his 2016 campaign promises would look come 2020," Darroch reportedly stated, referring to the next presidential election.

Britain's Foreign Office did not dispute the veracity of the memos. "The British public would expect our ambassadors to provide ministers with an honest, unvarnished assessment of the politics in their country," a spokeswoman said. "Their views are not necessarily the views of ministers or indeed the government," she added, noting "we pay them to be candid". "Our team in Washington have strong relations with the White House and no doubt that these will withstand such mischievous behavior," the spokeswoman said of the potential fallout from the leak. — AFP

when his shoulder was injured as he was wrestled to the ground by Real Madrid's Sergio Ramos in the 3-1 loss in the 2018 Champions League final in Kiev. He scored twice in four matches in Cairo, both goals struck with unerring precision, but rarely looked at his peak surrounded by an Egyptian supporting cast far more limited than he is accustomed to at club level.

But Salah also, uncharacteristically, made headlines off the pitch after offering a degree of support for disgraced teammate Amr Warda, who was banished from the squad over sexual harassment allegations only to later be recalled - with Salah at the forefront of appeals for his reinstatement. One of the most popular Twitter hashtags in the wake of Salah and others defending the midfielder was "National team of sexual harassers".

Salah faced a backlash from many users after saying Warda deserved a "second chance" and that "shunning is not the answer". Many of Salah's fans noted his hypocritical line of argument. He has made a point of speaking up for women in the Muslim world, and in an April interview with Time magazine he vehemently defended their rights in the region. Shouldering the weight of

expectation of nearly 100 million Egyptians, hoping for a fourth title in five editions as hosts, Salah found himself a capable ally in Mahmoud 'Trezeguet' Hassan, the

team's standout performer in the group stage.

But he too wilted as the pressure intensified once the tournament moved into the knockout phase, spurning Egypt's best chance in a bitter defeat that provoked widespread dismay throughout the football-mad nation. "I'm really sad. Nobody expected we would go out at this stage. We thought for sure our team would reach the final," said Mohamed Alaa, a 17-year-old fan from Cairo. Amr Kamel, 23, said he was "disgusted" by the team's abject failure. "We expected better than that, that we would win, especially given the competition is being played in our country. We are really disgusted."

The sense of shame prompted Egyptian FA president Hani Abou Rida to sack coach Javier Aguirre and announce his own resignation out of "moral obligation" just hours after the defeat, paving the way for a vast shake-up within the organization. Aguirre came in for criticism for his management of the side during the Cup of Nations, with Egypt legend Wael Gomaa accusing the Mexican of having "no tactics or strategy".

But Gomaa did not point the finger at Salah, saying the team's failure was due to a lack of strength in depth. "Counting on just two or three players? That's impossible in football," he told BeIN Sports. "I will not blame Salah. Salah has played at the highest level throughout the season for more than 60 matches, and honestly, he provided what he is capable of doing with the national team."—AFP

Rays walk off after Yankees' rally; Angels overpowered

Gonzales wins 10th as Mariners down A's

with two outs in the bottom of the ninth inning as the Tampa Bay Rays overcame blowing a late lead and edged the New York Yankees 4-3 in St. Petersburg, Fla on Saturday. The Rays were one strike away from getting the win in the top of the inning, but left-hander Colin Poche allowed a game-tying homer to Aaron Hicks. Poche (2-1) blew his first career save attempt but kept the game tied by striking out Gary Sanchez. After Chad Green (2-3) easily got the first two outs in the bottom of the frame, d'Arnaud won it by lining a first-pitch fastball just over the right field fence. D'Arnaud's sixth homer with the Rays ended Tampa Bay's six-game losing streak to the Yankees. It also gave the Rays only their third win in 12 meetings against New York this season.

Nationals 6, Royals 0

Max Scherzer won his seventh straight start with seven scoreless innings and stole his second career base, while Kurt Suzuki hit a two-run homer as host Washington beat Kansas City. Both teams wore throwback 1969 uniforms, with the Nationals paying homage to the Expos, who moved from Montreal prior to the 2005 season. Washington won for the fifth time in six games and is 27-11 since May 24. Scherzer (9-5), who has not lost since May 17, allowed four hits with 11 strikeouts. He did walk one and threw 75 strikes on 103 pitches. He has fanned 79 batters in his last seven starts against just six walks.

Twins 7, Rangers 4

Marwin Gonzalez homered, Miguel Sano tripled and scored twice, and Jason Castro drove in three runs to lead Minnesota to a victory over Texas in Minneapolis. Gonzalez's home run was the 166th of the season for the Twins, matching the team's entire total for the 2018 season while also extending their major league record for home runs before the All-Star break. Michael Pineda (6-4) won his second consecutive start, allowing one run on five hits over six innings while finishing with a season-high nine strikeouts. It marked the 13th time in 17 starts this season that Pineda allowed three or fewer earned runs.

Indians 7, Reds 2

Roberto Perez highlighted his second career four-hit performance with a go-ahead two-run homer in the eighth inning, as visiting Cleveland posted a victory over Cincinnati. Shane Bieber (8-3) tossed eight strong innings, and Francisco Lindor belted a pair of solo shots to record his 11th career multi-homer performance for the Indians, who have won five in a row. Yasiel Puig launched a two-run homer in the first inning and finished with three of the five hits for the Reds, who saw their three-game winning streak come to a halt.

Astros 4, Angels 0

Gerrit Cole continued his run of exceptional pitching, and Houston squared its three-game series with visiting Los Angeles. Cole (9-5), the American League Pitcher of the Month for June, twirled seven shutout innings at the Angels to open July in similar fashion. He surrendered three hits and two walks while recording

It was the second consecutive game Renfroe put the Padres in the lead for good with a late home run, ending a scoreless tie with a solo homer in the seventh inning. He hit one in the eighth inning Friday night to give San Diego the lead in a 3-2 victory. Padres rookie starter Chris Paddack pitched 5 2/3 scoreless innings, giving up three hits with one walk and six strikeouts while his 96 pitches were one off his career high. Trey Wingenter (1-1) earned the victory with 1 1/3 scoreless innings. Kirby Yates pitched a scoreless ninth inning for his 29th save.

Cubs 6, White Sox 3

Kyle Schwarber and Javier Baez both hit two-run doubles in a decisive five-run fifth inning, and Jon Lester pitched 6 1/3 strong innings to lift the visiting Cubs over the White Sox. Eight consecutive Cubs reached base to start the fifth, including the first three via walk as White Sox ace Lucas Giolito struggled with his command. Schwarber followed with a two-run, bloop double to the opposite field in left to give the Cubs a 3-1 lead before Baez chased Giolito from the game with a two-run double one batter later. Recently named an American League All-Star, Giolito (11-3) allowed six runs and four hits in four-plus innings with five walks and five strikeouts. He has two losses and a 12.96 ERA in two starts against the Cubs this season, compared to a 2.26 ERA in 15 starts against the rest of the majors.

Red Sox 10, Tigers 6

Twin set - Pakistan's Qureshi hopes sister act can lead to victory

LONDON: Pakistan's Aisam-ul-Haq Qureshi admits that playing at Wimbledon with a mixed doubles partner who has a twin sister can often leave him seeing double, but he's happy to remain bamboozled if it brings him and his country a first Grand Slam title. Qureshi teamed up with Ukraine's Nadiia Kichenok at Roland Garros and they immediately clicked, reaching the semi-finals despite only squeezing into the draw at the last minute.

However, he admitted that with Nadiia also having twin sister Lyudmyla playing on the tour, it can lead to some embarrassing moments. "At Roland Garros, I thought I saw her in the gym and I said 'hey, partner, how's it going?' She said 'I'm not your partner, it's the other one'," the 39-year-old Qureshi told AFP.

"Now I see the differences between the two although it's tough to tell how I know they are different. "It's just the look and you kind of sense it. Maybe it's the way they greet me, I can sense straight away who my partner is." Qureshi's recent fortunes have been inter-linked with the Ukrainian sisters. He said that when they originally planned to play in Paris, they were just one spot off the cut after Lyudmyla decided to play with Santiago Gonzalez of Mexico. Ironically, Gonzalez is Qureshi's partner in the men's doubles on the tour.

"He had no one to play mixed with so Lyudmyla signed with himso one sister kicked the other one out. "I said that you know your're doing this to your own sister and she was like 'yeah, yeah, but I need to get in'." In the end, Qureshi and Nadiia squeezed into the Roland Garros draw as alternates and went all the way to the semi-finals where they were just two points from making the championship match. Gonzalez and Lyudmyla were beaten in the second round.

Qureshi, who was a mixed doubles runner-up at the US Open in 2010 with Kveta Peschke, and Nadiia decided to play again at Wimbledon. 'We were the last team in again. The cut was 110 and we were 110, it was pretty sweet." It was even sweeter when they made the second round at the All England Club on Saturday, beating China's Xinyun Han and....Gonzalez. "It's hard to get



pumped up as me and Santiago have been playing together all year," said Oureshi, who is still in the doubles tournament at Wimbledon with his Mexican friend.

"I can't ever remember playing my doubles partner in the mixed. "I didn't know we had been drawn against each other. He texted me and said you can't believe it but we are playing each other, smiley face, LOL and I was like no way!" But Qureshi added: "My partner was on fire today, she didn't care who I was playing against, so credit to her." Once the Grand Slam season is finished for Qureshi, there will be another big date for him when he leads the Pakistan team into an historic Davis Cup home tie against India in Islamabad in

September. It will be the first time India have played a Davis Cup tie in Pakistan in 55 years. "It's huge and it could be my last. Playing singles is tough on my body," said Qureshi, who made his debut in the tournament back in 1998. He also played in the most recent tie between the two countries in Mumbai in 2006 when India won 3-2. "This is historic for us, it will be one of the most memorable ties. "There will be lots of tension and lots of hype but we are playing on grass and it's best-of-three. "We are underdogs but we will fight to the last point and we will see what happens."—AFP

LONDON: Roger Federer, Rafael Nadal and Novak Djokovic, with 14 Wimbledon titles between them, dominate 'Manic Monday' at the All England Club with the 'Big Three' still standing while weary rivals have again flattered to deceive. Tour de Impossible? Pakistan hosts 'toughest cycle race'

Climbing towards the 'Roof of the World'

KHUNJERAB: Finishing nearly 5,000 metres above sea level after hundreds of kilometres winding past blackened glaciers and snow-capped peaks: a new Pakistani race presents a world-class challenge for cyclists-climbing towards the "Roof of the World". The Tour de Khunjerab-its name a homage to its more famous French counterpart, which began on Saturday-is still many years away from being another Big Loop, but with a solid claim to being the highest cycling race in the world, it has a lot to offer a certain type of athlete.

In the last week of June, some 88 cyclists, including two teams from Afghanistan and Sri Lanka as well as solo participants from Špain and Switzerland, took part in its second edition. Less than half completed it within the allotted time. The four stages-three ranging from 68 to 94 kilometres (42 to 58 miles) plus a shorter time trial-are much shorter than many other cycling events. But there is one fundamental difference: the Pakistani Tour starts at 1,500 metres above sea level, and never stops climbing.

The final day of this year's event sums up the challenge. Starting at 2,800 metres-higher than the Iseran Pass, the summit of the Tour de France-it ends at 4,700 metres, just over 100 metres short of Mont Blanc, Europe's highest mountain. The Khunjerab Tour must become "an attraction... for the most daring and adventurous cyclists in the world", said Usman Ahmed, the top official for the northern Gilgit region, home to some of the planet's tallest peaks and where the race was held.

The cyclists' tyres swallow up the asphalt of the Karakoram Highway, one of the highest paved roads in the world. Named after the Karakoram mountain rangejust one of the ranges in Gilgit-the road passes through

an extraordinary landscape. Soaring, jagged peaks contrast with vertiginous ravines, glaciers driving a chill wind, and tumbling aquamarine rivers. Landslides are common. Guardrails are a flimsy suggestion of protection from steep falls of hundreds of feet. "There is no place in the world that offers all these things," said Ahmed.

"No doubt it is the toughest cycle race in the world. We are aiming to make it our trademark," said Haroon General, president of the Pakistan Cycling Federation. The most difficult part of the race is the final stage where cyclists face shortage of oxygen and there is risk of heart issues... At such an altitude a person falls down (faints) after running for 200 metres, but our cyclists travelled for almost 59 kilometres," he said. Five ambulances were on standby in case of emergencies in the final stage, he said, adding: "A majority of the cyclists made it but the support staff needed ambulances."

'Breathless'

The winner of the event, Najeeb Ullah-a Pakistani from a hilltop village in the southwestern province of Balochistan who won three of the four stages-told AFP that breathing was a "problem" for him in the final climb. "I had to face a lot of difficulties while reaching the finishing line," located at the Khunjerab Pass, the border between Pakistan and China, he said.

Especially since altitude was not the only obstacle: On the final day, fierce winds drove snowflakes into the cyclists' faces, forcing some already struggling to catch their breath to dismount. "Our entire training is reduced to nothing when we reach the final stage," lamented Abdullah Aslam, a participant who could not finish the

5 Cricket World **Cup stars for** the future

LONDON: With the Cricket World Cup heading into the semi-finals, the tournament is set for a dramatic conclusion featuring some of the game's finest talents. But the group stage also introduced the world to several vibrant young talents set to dominate cricket for years to come. Here, AFP Sport looks at five players who have announced their arrival as potential stars:

Nicolas Pooran (West Indies)

Nicolas Pooran finally showcased the talent he has promised to unleash for so long as the batsman finished as the West Indies' leading run scorer. The 23-year-old made a duck on his ODI debut before the World Cup but went on to play each of the team's nine group games, scoring 367 runs at an average of 52.42. West Indies assistant coach Roddy Estwick had seen Pooran's potential five years ago when he scored 143 in an Under-19 World Cup match against Australia. "I've always believed in Nicholas. I'm not surprised by his talent. What's surprised me is it's taken as long as this for him to come through,' Estwick said.

Shaheen Shah Afridi (Pakistan)

Pakistan paceman Shaheen Shah Afridi enjoyed a breakthrough World Cup campaign, prompting Wasim Akram to hail the teenager as a future star. The teenager recorded Pakistan's best-ever World Cup bowling figures with a scintillating spell of 6-35 in Friday's win over Bangladesh at Lord's. He became the youngest player to take a five-wicket haul at the World Cup at 19 years and 90 days, finishing the tournament with 16 wickets in five games. "Definitely, Shaheen is one for the future, a beacon of light for the next generation of fast bowlers," Wasim said.

Double triumph for dominant Marquez brothers in Germany

SACHSENRING: Honda rider Marc Marquez tightened his grip on a possible sixth world title with a seventh consecutive victory at the German MotoGP yesterday. The 26-year-old Spaniard, who had earlier seen his younger brother Alex win the Moto2 race, led from start to finish to cross the line over four seconds ahead of the Yamaha of Maverick Vinales and Cal Crutchlow on another Honda.

It is Marquez' fifth victory in nine races this season which takes him to 185 points in the championship standings, 69 clear of the Italian Andrea Dovizioso, who took fifth. "The race went to plan, I was riding out in front and enjoying myself," said Marquez. "At the end I was thinking about my brother. I am very happy with this victory and very happy to have the summer break in these conditions."

It was a ruthless performance from Marquez who has now won at each of his last 10 races at Sachsenring. He first won here in 2010 in the 125cc race and followed that in 2011 and 2012 with wins in Moto2. He has won every MotoGP in Germany since 2013. Vinales



West Indies' Nicholas Pooran

Mujeeb Ur Rahman (Afghanistan) Afghanistan may have left the World Cup winless after losing all nine matches, but the minnows could take heart from the rise of teenage off-spinner Mujeeb Ur Rahman. Mujeeb took just seven wickets in the tournament, but the 18-year-old tormented batsmen with his crafty use of flight and variation, marking him out as one to watch. Rashid Khan, his senior by two years, remains Afghanistan's number one spinner, but Mujeeb is coming up fast, as he proved with a superb spell of 3-39 against Bangladesh in Southampton.

Avishka Fernando (Sri Lanka)

When Sri Lanka captain Dimuth Karunaratne reflected on a frustrating campaign for the 1996 champions, the promising form of fearless batsman Avishka Fernando put a smile back on his face. The 21-year-old scored 203 runs in only four matches in the tournament, including 104 against the West Indies and 49 in Sri Lanka's shock win over England. "We've had a few positives out of this World Cup," Karunaratne said. "Avishka Fernando is playing really well. "He showed what he can do, he can produce runs for Sri Lanka. He's one of the future stars."

Jofra Archer (England)

Barbados-born Jofra Archer has repaid England's faith with a dazzling breakthrough in his first major tournament. Archer only became eligible to play for England earlier this year and was fast-tracked into the team just before the World Cup in a bid to make the most of the paceman's natural gifts. The 24-year-old's combination of speed and accuracy made him unplayable at times. He taken 17 wickets in England's run to the semifinals, including a run of four successive three-wicket hauls, leading many to mark him down as the spearhead of his country's attack for years to come. — AFP

Rashid Khan (Afghanistan)

Rashid Khan came into the World Cup as cricket's hottest property after catching the eye with his leg spinners for minnows Afghanistan. But the Twenty20 sensation, who played a leading role for many sides in franchise cricket across the globe, claimed only six wickets in nine games as the Afghans returned winless.

Skipper Gulbadin Naib defended his premier spinner, who is number one in the T20 rankings, after their final loss to West Indies, saying "he gives 100 percent but it's bad luck". But the 20year-old Rashid, who made the world take notice of his art when he became the fastest to take 100 ODI wickets, in

44 matches, still has a long way to go.

Mashrafe Mortaza (Bangladesh)

Mashrafe Mortaza started the tournament by leading Bangladesh to a shock victory over South Africa as he became the country's most successful ODI captain with four World Cup wins. But the 35-year-old struggled with his own form as the seamer claimed just one wicket from eight matches. The sting was missing from Mashrafe's bowling as he seldom completed his quota of 10 overs, relying on the team's other quicks to do the job. The end came with his team's disappointing loss to Pakistan and Mashrafe signed off by saying: "We are extremely sorry that we couldn't lend a helping hand to Shakib (Al Hasan) who batted, bowled and fielded very well in every match in this tournament.'

Hashim Amla (South Africa)

One of South Africa's most dependable players in the last five years, Amla scored just 203 runs in his seven World Cup outings. The opener did hit two half-centuries but one came in a losing cause and the other was delivered in a consolation win after the Proteas had fallen out of the semi-finals race. Amla's woes often put Faf du Plessis' side in trouble in the first 10 overs and the rest of the batting did little to make up for it. He remains a cherished figure in South Africa though and when he scored an unbeaten 80 against Sri Lanka, veteran commentator Harsha Bhogle wrote on Twitter: "So happy to see Hashim Amla get runs. One of the greats of our era."

Hasan Ali (Pakistan)

A lot was expected of the right-arm quick who had starred for Pakistan in his team's 2017 Champions Trophy triumph in England. But the speedster disappointed after claiming just two wickets in four games and failing to check the flow of runs. He was dropped after returning figures of 1-84 in his nine overs in the team's thrashing against arch rivals India. And the fastest bowler to take 50 wickets for Pakistan remained benched for the rest of the tournament. — AFP

Late Lorch goal stuns Africa Cup of Nations hosts Egypt

Nigeria topple holders Cameroon 3-2

give South Africa a stunning 1-0 victory over Africa Cup of Nations hosts Egypt after a pulsating last-16 clash in Cairo Saturday. After three woeful group performances, South Africa were rank outsiders against the record seven-time African champions, whose line-up included Liverpool star Mohamed Salah. A seesaw struggle was settled when a swift counterattack allowed Lebo Mothiba to send Lorch through and he fired past goalkeeper Mohamed Elshenawy.

The winners were unrecognisable from the team that struggled in the group stage as they displayed sharpness and desire not previously evident. South Africa will face arch-rivals Nigeria, who eliminated defending champions Cameroon earlier Saturday, in the quarter-finals. Egypt changed three of the side that defeated Uganda to complete Group A with a 100 percent record, five goals scored and none conceded. Back came defender Mahmoud Alaa, midfielder Tarek Hamed and forward Marwan Mohsen with Baher Elmohamady, Nabil Donga and Ahmed Hassan dropping to the bench. South Africa made two changes, both in midfield, from the team that lost to Morocco and squeezed into the second round with the worst record of the best four third-place teams.

In came South African Premiership Player of the Season Lorch and fit-again Dean Furman for Thulani Serero and suspended Themba Zwane. Bafana Bafana (The Boys) had been woeful in all three Group D matches, barely troubling rival defences, and the public and media slammed the negative tactics of coach Stuart Baxter. The England-born coach hinted at a more attacking approach and was true to his word as Percy Tau and Lorch had ambitious long-range attempts at goal within three minutes of the kick-off.

Tormented

Salah, passed fit after recovering from a midweek

CAIRO: Thembinkosi Lorch scored on 85 minutes to cold that forced him to miss some training, had a shot deflected wide soon after. Mohamed 'Trezeguet' Hassan, one of the Pharaohs' stars in the group stage, tormented several defenders just outside the box and induced a foul, but Abdallah el Said botched the free-kick. The desire of South Africa to attack was evident again on 15 minutes when impressive winger Tau stung the fingertips of Elshenawy with a hard, long-range shot.

Tau came much closer to breaking the deadlock midway through the half with a free-kick that cleared the wall and forced Elshenawy into a brilliant save. South Africa were looking the likelier side to break the deadlock and a brave block by Ayman Ashraf foiled Lorch. Mokotjo then unleashed a sizzling low,long-range shot that flew past Elshenawy but finished just off target, The frustration of Egypt, who scored all five group goals before half-time, was mirrored in the angry reaction of Salah when a free-kick was awarded against him.

Mexico-born Egypt coach Javier Aguirre altered his largely ineffective attack at half-time, bringing in veteran Ahmed Ali for Mohsen. 'Trezeguet' squandered a great chance just before the hour, tamely shooting straight at goalkeeper Ronwen Williams after a superb defence-splitting pass from Salah. Angry Messi slams 'Brazilian fix' after Copa red card

SAO PAOLO: Lionel Messi was sent off before halftime and then angrily hit out at "corrupt" tournament organisers after Argentina beat Chile 2-1 to win a bad-tempered third-place playoff at the Copa America on Saturday. The match was 34 minutes old when Chilean captain Gary Medel shepherded out a ball near his own goal. Messi challenged him from behind and Medel reacted angrily, pushing the Argentine and

The Paraguayan referee showed Medel a red card and even though Messi did not react, he too was sent off, prompting boos in Sao Paulo's Corinthians arena. Reports said the Barcelona forward did not attend the ceremony to receive his third-place medal and he later hit out at the South American Football Confederation (CONMEBOL). "We don't have to be part of this corruption," Messi told reporters. "The lack of respect that they have showed us throughout this

"Sadly, the corruption, the referees, they don't allow people to enjoy football, they ruined it a bit. "I think the cup is fixed for Brazil," Messi added. "I hope that the VAR and the referees have nothing to do in this final and that Peru can compete because they have the team to do so although I think it's difficult." His comments came four days after Argentina were beaten 2-0 by arch rivals Brazil in a semi-final that was marked by a number of contentious refereeing decisions.

Egyptians light up stadium in tribute to fallen fans

CAIRO: Even as Egypt struggled against South Africa in the last 16 of the Africa Cup of Nations on Saturday, the home fans took time to honour a recent tradition. In the 20th and 72nd minutes of a match that the Egyptians were to lose 1-0, hundreds of supporters switched on their mobile phone flashlights-a simple tribute to victims killed in deadly stadium clashes after the 2011

"This is our tradition that we pull out our mobiles," said 19-year-old Mostafa Atef. "The blood of martyrs has nothing to do whether we support (rival clubs) Al Ahly or Zamalek." The timing of the flashlight tributes reflect the numbers of fans killed in two separate incidents. There is still uncertainty at the number of fans who died in February 2012 when security forces stormed the field at the Port Said stadium of Al Masry during a match with Cairo-based Al Ahly.

Some reports claim 74 fans died that day, others say 72. Whichever, it was one of the world's deadliest football clashes. Three years later, almost to the day in 2015, 20 Zamalek fans-some

The five-time Ballon d'Or winner was involved in a tangle with Chile captain Gary Medel in which Messi appeared to do nothing wrong, but both players were given their marching orders by referee Mario Diaz de

reports say 22 — died after a mass stampede at the June 30 Stadium's gates, prompted by police use of teargas and live bullets. That led to the reinstatement of a total ban on attending domestic games which is still in effect.

Troubling times

In a tournament designed to promote the country's international image, Egyptian President Abdel Fattah al-Sisi told the national squad that preparations for international audiences were more important than their results on the pitch. Under Sisi, who led the army's overthrow of President Mohamed Morsi in 2013, a focus on political stability and crushing dissent has meant that even football has been heavily scrutinised by the security forces. — AFP

Egyptian press slam 'embarrassing', 'still-born' Pharaohs

CAIRO: Egypt's usually tame press did not hold back after the national team's exit from the Africa Cup of Nations on home soil, branding the side "embarrassing" after a "still-born performance". The record seven-time champions were dumped out in the last 16 by South Africa on Saturday with a 1-0 defeat at the Cairo International Stadium. "You embarrassed us... Our national squad disappoints millions and bows out of the African Cup of Nations," Al-Akhbar, one of Egypt's main newspapers, splashed on its Sunday front page. In a country where the press is rarely critical of official institutions, there was plenty of blame thrown around.

Al-Akhbar lambasted "the absurdities" of Mexican coach Javier Aguirre's tactics and "the still-born performance of the players". A photo of star forward Mohamed Salah on the verge of tears accompanied the front-page article. Meanwhile, state mouthpiece Al Ahram declared the loss as "one of the biggest surprises of the 2019 AFCON". Egypt, with most of their team playing in Europe's top leagues, were the pre-

tournament favourites. "Egyptian football paid the price for the coaching staff who chose players unfit to play at an international level," the paper said. "Coach Javier Aguirre is the number one man responsible for this humiliating exit." The Egyptian Football Association (EFA) sacked Aguirre just hours after the loss along with the entire coaching staff. EFA president Hani Abou

Egypt's fans bitter as unloved team crash out

CAIRO: Egyptian football fans reacted with anger and sorrow yesterday after the host team tumbled out of the Africa Cup of Nations in the second round following a lacklustre run marred by a controversy over alleged sexual harassment. The defeat led to an immediate purge of Egyptian football officials, and took the gloss off a high-prestige event that Egypt had volunteered to host at short notice after Cameroon was stripped of

Fans had high hopes for a Pharaohs team starring national hero and Champions League winner Mohamed Salah. Egypt have won the cup a record seven times and were runners-up in 2017. But after winning their three group games in unconvincing style, the host team were upset 1-0 on Saturday by a South African side that had scraped through to the knock-out stages with one win and two defeats. Egyptian Football Federation (EFA) President Hany Abo Rida resigned hours after the defeat,

Rida also tendered his resignation. Papers wary of fans' swelling anger shied away from criticising the association directly as it is politically loyal and backed by the authorities.

'Catastrophic failure'

In Al-Watan, one of the biggest tabloids close to the security services, the devastating loss was summed up with "The dream goes up in smoke" also went after Aguirre for making "catastrophic" errors throughout the tournament, leading to a national "failure". Previously praised in this competition, rising star Mahmoud Trezeguet "wasted every single opportunity" he was given to put South Africa away, Al-Watan said. Popular football website Yalla Kora questioned whether "this generation will ever reach the next World Cup in 2022". Even beloved national icon Salah was caught in the crosshairs of criticism.

Several reasons were given for the disappointing exit, including how the Liverpool star had "imposed" his will by demanding the return of his teammate Amr Warda. The controversial player was initially kicked out of the squad following sexual harassment allegations surfacing online, but was then brought back into the fold after an outcry by the players supporting him. Many fans actually welcomed the defeat of the Pharaohs on social media, with the "National Team of Harassers" trending last night. They felt the loss was punishment for players defending the inclusion of Warda. — AFP

simultaneously sacking Mexican head coach Javier Aguirre and the rest of the coaching staff.

He also called on the EFA's board members to resign. Most have done so. Fans had long called for an overhaul of the EFA over accusations of mismanagement. After Egypt's unceremonious exit from the World Cup's group stage last year, those calls increased. "There is no plan, there are no players, no one knows how to defend or attack," said fan Ahmed Mostafa outside the stadium after the loss. "This is what the four games we played looked like. None of the players wanted to play, really. There is no spirit, nothing."

Off the pitch, the EFA had been grappling with a scandal surrounding striker Amr Warda, who was removed from the squad for disciplinary reasons on June 26. The EFA gave no details, but Warda had previously been accused of harassing a fashion model on Instagram and a complaint against him was filed with Egypt's public prosecutor. After Salah and other prominent team mates came to Warda's defence and Warda posted an apology on Facebook, the EFA reinstated him, drawing the ire of some fans. "Egypt's national team is also its national embarrassment ... Plenty of Egyptians are basking in the team's loss today," tweeted Karim Zidan, a journalist, referring to a trending hashtag "Team of sexual harassers". — Reuters

Rapinoe and Lavelle give US fourth WCup title

LYON: The United States retained the women's World Cup yesterday as a Megan Rapinoe penalty and a superb Rose Lavelle strike gave the holders a 2-0 victory over a battling Netherlands side in Lyon. Having been kept at bay by the brilliant Dutch goalkeeper Sari van Veenendaal throughout the first half, the USA finally went ahead just after the hour as Rapinoe stroked home from 12 yards to end the tournament as joint top scorer on six goals. There was an air of inevitability about the pink-haired 34-year-old, the star of this World Cup on and off the field, putting the USA ahead.

It also seemed inevitable that the breakthrough goal here should come from a VAR-awarded penalty, with French referee Stephanie Frappart initially giving a corner before pointing to the spot following a review. The whippet-like Lavelle, another stand-out performer over the last month, got the second goal in the 69th minute, killing off Dutch hopes of a comeback. The victory underlines the USA's status as the dominant force in

Wimbledon targets Asian fans 'nirvana' with lite app

LONDON: Wimbledon has unleashed a new lightweight app to try and hook the growing tennis-loving market in Asia, while AI-generated highlights are getting smarter at spotting the most exciting action. The official Wimbledon app is packed with heavy graphics but the new, slimmed-down alternative is designed for fans in places with poorer bandwidth and older smartphones-especially India.

The prestigious tennis tournament reckons it can potentially reach several hundred million people in India who are interested in the championships but can only download data over slow mobile phone networks. The slimmer app has lightweight scores, results, headlines and the order of play. "India is one of the largest social media audiences for them globally," said Sam

AI learning to improve

Every single shot at Wimbledon is logged by US technology giants IBM, with up to 180 staff capturing 4.8 million bits of information. Their statisticians have been refining their artificial intelligence-generated video clips. By monitoring a mixture of crowd noise, match analysis of key moments such as break points and player reactions, an overall excitement factor is produced for each passage of play. But IBM has detected inadvertent bias in the AI system, which this year it has managed to iron out.

Seddon gave the example of a three-hour epic match on Centre Court. "The place is full and everyone is screaming and cheering," he said. Once it finishes, people step out for a breather. "It doesn't matter who comes on next, the crowd noise will be different," Seddon explained. "Same court, same high-profile players, same high quality of tennis, but the highlights

Statistically capturing excitement

The AI system has this year learnt how to recognise ball strikes so clips can automatically be trimmed to when a point starts. Last year, the AI highlights garnered more than 14 million video views. Big screen vote

Wimbledon is seeking to bring together as much digital information as it can on the 40,000-odd daily visitors to the complex in southwest London, in order to deliver a better fan experience. Signing in with the moments later as she tried her luck from 20 yards, and the European champions held out until the interval.

The USA had scored no later than the 12th minute in all of their prior matches at this World Cup, but the Dutch, crucially, offered little going forward at the other end. Need for speed
