DUBAI: Saudi Arabia said vesterday that two of its oil tankers were among those attacked off the coast of the United Arab Emirates and said it was an attempt to undermine the security of crude supplies amid tensions between the United States and Iran. The UAE said on Sunday that four commercial vessels were sabotaged near Fujairah emirate, one of the world's largest bunkering hubs lying just outside the Strait of Hormuz. It did not describe the nature of the attack or say who was behind it.

The UAE had not given the nationalities or other details about the ownership of the four vessels. Riyadh has identified two of them as Saudi and a Norwegian company said it owned another. Details of the fourth ship were not immediately clear. Thome Ship Management said its Norwegian-registered oil products tanker MT Andrew Victory was "struck by an unknown object". Footage seen by Reuters showed a hole in the hull at the waterline with the metal torn open inwards.

Iran, which is embroiled in an escalating war of words with the United States over sanctions and the US military's presence in the region, moved to distance itself yesterday. Iran's Foreign Ministry called the incidents "worrisome and dreadful" and asked for an investigation into the matter.

Healthy Diet in Ramadan

amadan is a time of worship, a time to return our focus to Allah and His blessings. To remember all that we have been blessed with. To remember those who are less fortunate than ourselves. During this time, Muslims fast from before sunrise until sunset. During the fasting period, Muslims abstain from eating, drinking, smoking, and anything else that may bring them pleasure. Instead, they focus on acts of worship and in earning good deeds.

And because Ramadan involves fasting, there seems to be a big focus on food. Too many Muslims tend to break their fast with huge feasts, rather than simple, small meals that will give them the required energy and satisfy their hunger. So, how can we then earn good deeds and get the most out of our fasting? You should make sure to do extra acts of charity, worship, reading Quran, and making duaa. In doing so, InshaaAllah (God willing) you will earn extra good deeds. During the month of Ramadan make sure that you avoid drinking sugary drinks and juices, as these will make you feel even more thirsty and hungry; instead drink plenty of water during the evening hours, in order to be well hydrated

If you do not want to feel like you have gone into a food induced coma then do not overeat when breaking your fast. Make sure that your meals are clean whole foods rather than processed foods or packaged foods that are chock full of chemicals, preservatives, dyes, and other ingredients that are body doesn't know how to properly digest. Also avoid foods that are high in bad fats, sugar, refined carbs and low in fiber. When possible adding fermented foods to your diet will help in the digestive process and reduce bloating.

In order to avoid any bloating after meals, be mindful of what you are ingesting and the amazing processes that are happening within your body. Thoroughly chew your food. Digestion starts in our mouth and yet few of us chew our food properly. So, while you are enjoying your iftaar, slow down while chewing your food and enjoy the tastes and flavors on

Whenever we eat too quickly, air can get trapped up in our stomach causing gas and bloating which in turn may prevent you from performing your prayers. You may also want to avoid chewing gum, drinking through a straw, eating fruit after your iftaar meal, as all of these can lead to gas and bloating. When eating fruit, eat it on an empty stomach as it digests much quicker than animal proteins, dairy and grains.

Gulf stocks down on rising tension

DUBAI: Stock markets in the energy-rich Gulf states dived yesterday as regional tensions soared after ships and oil tankers were targeted by acts of "sabotage" off the UAE coast. The Saudi bourse, the largest in the region, was down 2.7 percent after the kingdom's ener-

gy minister said two Saudi oil tankers were damaged in a "sabotage attack" off the coast of Fujairah on the

The United Arab Emirates said on Sunday that four commercial vessels from various nationalities had been targeted by acts of sabotage just outside its territorial waters near Fujairah. The attacks did not result in any casualties but they caused damage to the vessels. The UAE bourses of Dubai and Abu Dhabi dropped by 3.7

percent and 2.5 percent, respectively yesterday. Qatar shares were down 2.1 percent and Kuwait

Bourse was 1.2 percent lower while the small bourses of Oman and Bahrain were down 0.16 percent and 0.6 percent, respectively. The incidents came amid rising tensions in a region already shaken by a standoff between the United States and Iran. Tehran called for an investigation into the "alarming" attacks and warned of "adventurism" by foreign players to disrupt maritime security. US Secretary of State Mike Pompeo meanwhile scrapped a planned visit to Moscow to head Brussels to discuss Iran with European officials. — AFP

Qatar distributes Gaza funds after deadly flareup

GAZA: Qatar began distributing millions of dollars in aid in the Gaza Strip yesterday in a fresh bid to restore calm after a flareup with Israel, a Oatari official said. Gaza's Islamist rulers Hamas, along with an allied militant group, fired hundreds of rockets at Israel on May 4 and 5, saying they were frustrated by the slow imple-

mentation of a previous ceasefire deal. A new agreement was brokered which reportedly includes tens of millions of Qatari aid to Gaza as part of a package to ease Israel's crippling blockade of the strip. The Gulf state, a rare Hamas ally in the region, has been providing millions in aid to the strip monthly since November. Qatari envoy Mohammed Al-Emadi entered Gaza yesterday, the Qatari source

told AFP on condition of anonymity.

"This morning, the distribution of a cash aid of 100 dollars per poor family began," he said, adding it was destined for 108,000 families. Hundreds of Palestinians waited at post offices in Gaza City to receive the \$100 cash payments, an AFP photographer said. Israel and Hamas have fought three wars since 2008 and analysts fear another round remains likely. UN envoy Nickolay Mladenov warned yesterday of the risk of fresh conflict.

'The risk of war remains imminent and today we have perhaps the last chance to consolidate the agreements that have been reached," he told a press conference in Gaza. — AFP

15,558 Filipinos vote in Kuwait

KUWAIT: 15,558 Filipinos in Kuwait cast their votes in the Philippines midterm election through overseas absentee voting which culminated yesterday in line with the Election Day in the Philippines. There are 96,423 Filipino registered voters in Kuwait. Voters are allowed to elect 12 senators and one party list representative.

Philippine Embassy's Charge d'Affaires Mohammad Noordin Pendosina Lomondot lauded the enthusiasm of Filipinos as they participated in the voting exercise. "This is about 16 percent of the total number of registered voters in Kuwait. The turnout is very good. It was a solid proof - how Filipino community is willing to be part in the democratic process. We can discern through cooperation demonstrated by many of us in order to have a better Philippines," Lomondot said.

The last vote was casted yesterday around 1:10pm by Bodie Tagayon, an auto-mechanic from Shuwaikh Industrial area who hails from Mandaluyong City

Philippines. "I was a bit late because I came from Shuwaikh. I just asked permission from my boss to leave early so that I can participate in the last day of voting," he said. "I really wanted to cast my vote, I am thankful that I was able to catch up," he said.

When asked about the character of the candidates, Tagayon said, he voted for a candidate that will pursue changes in the Overseas Filipino Workers. "We want a senator who can help us - the Filipino Overseas Workers. We need jobs in the Philippines, not outside the Philippines. If there are better options we will stay in the Philippines," he added.

Overseas Voting Spokesperson at the Philippine Embassy Luiz Carlos Osorio said this year's election is historic and 'record breaking'. "As compared to previous elections, there was a historic turnout - 15,558 is a good number. Probably we are the second, next to UAE as regards to high turnout," he said.

The vote counting is expected to be completed by 12 midnight. There are election observers who are on standby to witness the entire voting process. "We will not sleep or rest until we're done. Expect our messages by midnight to announce the winners in Kuwait," Osorio added.

Kuwait first Arab state to stand by Iraq's quest for liberation: Hakim

KUWAIT: The President of the Iraqi National Wisdom Coalition Ammar Al-Hakim is visiting Kuwait to meet His Highness the Amir Sheikh Sabah Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah, His Highness the Crown Prince Sheikh Nawaf Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah and other officials to discuss the challenges in the region and bilateral relations between Kuwait and Iraq. He has been making this visit annually for the past 16 years. On this occasion, Kuwait Journalists Association (KJA) held a press conference at Crowne Plaza Hotel on Sunday for local and Arab media.

"I am glad to be in Kuwait again this year during the holy month of Ramadan, which has become a habit. Kuwait was the first Arab country to stand by Iraq in its quest for liberation and change. We will always appreciate the role of Kuwait in supporting the Iraqi people in all fields, including political, social and humanitarian ones," Hakim said during the meeting.

He stressed both countries share the desire to strengthen relations. "There will be an important development in bilateral relations. I hope the Kuwaiti public and private investors will tap into the highly promising investment opportunities in Iraq. The improvement of the security situation in Iraq is encouraging a growing number of investors to resume doing business in the country," Hakim

According to him, Iraq is recovering from years of instability after winning the battle against the so-called Islamic State. "We have moved from instability in all fields - political, social, economic and others - to the phase of stability," stressed Hakim. He noted that Iraqi military and security personnel offered great sacrifices in the struggle to liberate Iraq from IS terrorists, reaffirming that Iraq is emerging stronger from the war

Iraq is not perfect but there are many positives, and we hope to improve it, he

said. "As Iraq is a country of many tribes, it's common that people have weapons, as they think they can protect themselves against terrorists. All Kuwaiti officials that I met during this visit agreed that the security situation in Iraq is improving. The security of Iraq is important for all neighboring countries and the region," he explained.

On the escalating tension between the US and Iran, Hakim said Iraq enjoys strategic relations with both countries, which could help deescalate tensions. "Iraqi Prime Minister Adel Abdel Mahdi recently visited Iran, Saudi Arabia, Egypt, France and Germany, where he signed dozens of deals with leaders of these countries on cooperation in the political, economic and development areas," Hakim pointed out.

The Iraqi government has awarded a German company a \$14 billion contract to build a power generating station with a capacity of 11,000 megawatts in the coming five years. A US oil company was also awarded a contract worth \$53 billion to exploit oil resources in Iraq, he noted, adding that investors from the US, Russia and the Arab and European countries are vying for the promising investment opportunities in his country.

Kuwait, Iraq ink several cooperation agreements

KUWAIT: The Kuwaiti-Iraqi joint committee held its seventh session in Kuwait on Sunday under the chairmanship of Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of Foreign Affairs Sheikh Sabah Al-Khaled Al-Hamad Al-Sabah and Iraqi Foreign Minister Dr Mohammad Ali Al-Hakim. The session resulted in the signing of a number of agreements, memorandums of understanding and executive programs that would contribute to enhancing the cooperation between the two countries.

A statement by the committee stressed that the meeting between the two brotherly countries is a continuation of the positive results achieved by the previous sessions. The seventh session witnessed a review of all fields of cooperation between the two sides, especially the economic and developmental ones, and discussed means of enhancing them for close cooperation and integration between the two brotherly countries, reflecting the common desire to develop and strengthen bilateral relations at all levels, said the statement. It noted that the Kuwaiti-Iraqi joint committee is an example of strong bilateral relations that contribute to achieving the progress and prosperity of both countries and peoples. The last two days witnessed the convening of meetings of committees, government task forces and the private sector representatives from both countries to discuss ways to promote and develop cooperation between all public and private sectors in various vital areas and work on prepare draft agreements and memorandums of understanding to be signed between the governments of the two countries.

Taxation avoidance

The Kuwaiti and Iraqi ministries of finance signed yesterday an agreement for avoiding double taxation and preventing financial evasion for income and capital taxes. The deal encompasses various advantages involving tax exemptions and reduction for investments and business in Kuwait and Iraq, the Kuwaiti Finance Ministry said in a statement. The deal was signed by Undersecretary of the Kuwaiti Finance Ministry Saleh Al-Sarawi and his

Iraqi counterpart Maher Johan, it said. It aimed at wiping out financial barriers that could restrict capital movement and trade exchange between both countries through the prevention of double taxation on money and individuals, according to the statement.

Steadly development

Sheikh Sabah Al-Khaled has praised the steadily improvement in Kuwaiti-Iraqi relations. The recent high-level reciprocal visits of the two countries' officials showed the steady growth of the already strong bilateral relations, Sheikh Sabah Al-Khaled said in his speech at the seventh session of the high Kuwaiti-Iraqi committee. He noted that both Kuwait and Iraq shared the same visions and stances of various regional and international issues. The strengthening bilateral relations also reflected His Highness the Amir Sheikh Sabah Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah and Iraqi President Barham Saleh's directives, he said. Kuwait's top diplomat said that the wide participation representatives of public and private sectors in the committee meeting has resulted in the signing of five cooperation documents (agreements, memorandums of understanding and executive programs). The documents cover fields of economy, transport, sports, science and technology, he pointing, adding that they take the number of cooperation agreements and memos between the two countries up to 60. He underlined that this large participation in the session was a positive indicator of constructive cooperation between the two countries.

Sheikh Sabah Al-Khaled expressed hope that the Kuwaiti-Iraqi relations would maintain growth to serve the interests of the two Arab nations. He pointed out that bilateral relations between Kuwait and Iraq have witnessed increasing growth in various fields over the past few years. He highlighted the remarkable contribution of the public and private sectors to various investment, trade, development, energy and telecommunications projects in the two countries.

Sheikh Sabah Al-Khaled stressed Kuwait's firm support to Iraq in its fight against terrorist organizations. He also reiterated Kuwait's backing to all measures taken by Iraq to preserve its security, stability and territorial integrity. He urged the international community to support Iraq in its efforts to eliminate terrorism in all its forms, recalling with pride that less than two years ago, Iraq defeated the so-called Islamic State group and liberated its territory. He recalled His Highness the Amir Sheikh Sabah Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah's call for an international conference for the reconstruction of the liberated areas in Iraq, which was hosted by Kuwait in February 2018. The Kuwait-hosted conference raised up to \$30 billion of aid pledges by donor countries and the development institutions. This reflected the confidence of the international community in the great potential and opportunities available in the economic and investment aspects in Iraq, he said. — KUNA

Education ministry lays off third batch of expats effective July

KUWAIT: The Ministry of Commerce and Industry (MoCI) issued a decision mandating all insurance companies, insurance brokers, companies practicing real estate brokerage, real estate offices dealing with gold and precious metals and money exchange companies to appoint Kuwait auditors effective Jan 1, 2020 to fight money laundering. Al-Qabas daily had reported yesterday that the move is expected to generate nearly 16,000 job opportunities for Kuwaiti jobseekers in the private sector.

And in another decision that goes in line with the 'Kuwaitization' policy, the Ministry of Education (MoE) has decided to lay off a third batch of expats effective July, said informed educational sources, noting that the majority of those to be terminated work for Hawally and Farwaniya educational governorates, and that lists of the suggested names had been submitted to minister Al-Azmi for approval to proceed with the policy of replacing expats with citizens.

In the meantime, state departments seem to be continuing the replacement policy in various fields, hiring more Kuwaiti advisors

specialized in IT systems to replace expats. Informed sources said the finance ministry approved a request by a government body to adjust the value of a tender to provide IT advisors to become KD 1.5 million, provided the body coordinates with the Civil Service Commission and Kuwaitize these positions.

In a separate education concern, the Central Agency for Public Tenders agreed to extend a contract on fixing, operating and maintaining various air conditioners, cooling, heating and ventilation devices in schools in Jahra educational zone from March 31 till June 30, 2019 at a total cost of KD 58,444,748.

Data statements

The Public Authority for Manpower invited employers and authorized signatories to submit their endorsed data statements within 90 days ending Aug 14, 2019 to avoid suspending transactions of their companies. The manpower authority's public relations manager and official spokesperson Aseel Al-Mazyad said the authority had previously announced openings to receive employers' data through its website http://www.manpower.gov.kw.

Excellent performance bonuses

The Secretariat General of the Supreme Council for Planning and Development finished preparing lists with 300 names of its employees to be paid excellent performance bonuses, said assistant secretary general for administrative and financial affairs Eman Al-Mutairi, noting that a nearly KD 240,000 in bonuses will be paid within a few days.

Drug prices

Health Minister Sheikh Dr Basel Al-Sabah announced reducing the prices of 291 drugs by up to 50 percent, explaining that the new prices were set upon recommendations made by the GCC drug pricing committee. He noted that the new prices will go into effect at private pharmacies 30 days after publishing the resolution in the official gazette. Health Ministry's assistant undersecretary for medicine and food control Dr Abdullah Monjed Al-Bader said reductions will continue side by side with periodic inspection of medicines, namely those for chronic diseases.

Assembly set to debate grilling against premier

KUWAIT: The national assembly is set to discuss today whether to go ahead with debating a grilling against Prime Minister Sheikh Jaber Al-Mubarak Al-Sabah over alleged government failure to implement development programs and other charges.

The grilling was filed by opposition MP Abdulkarim Al-Kandari who charged the prime minister of failing to perform his job as the head of the council of ministers which is responsible for drawing and implementing public policies and development plans.

A grilling against the premier several weeks ago by MPs Mohammad Al-Mutair and Shuaib Al-Muwaizri was sent to the assembly legal and legislative committee which ruled that the grilling breached the constitution. Based on the committee decision, the national assembly scrapped the grilling and rejected its debate. It was unclear if the assembly

will follow the same procedure especially with the government having enough support to take whatever decision it deems suitable.

But Kandari's grilling was backed by strong constitutional arguments that the prime minister is responsible for the issues and allegations he is making in the grilling. In the grilling, the lawmaker also insisted that the prime minister is responsible for the failure of the government to implement key policies on correcting the demographic structure which resulted in expatriates reaching 3.36 million against just 1.4 million citizens. He insisted that the prime minister is responsible for the council of ministers' conceding parts of its responsibilities like allowing the Amiri Diwan to carry out key projects that are essentially the work of the government.

Kandari charged that the council of ministers under Sheikh Jaber had failed to implement the necessary policies to cut spending and also failed to safeguard



national unity and identity with regards to the controversial issue of using illegal methods to get Kuwaiti citizenship. The assembly is also expected to decide whether to discuss a draft law calling to impose a five-percent tax on the remittances of expatriates living and working in the country. MP Khalil Al-Saleh collected signatures of several MPs to accord this bill priority in discussion especially that this week's assembly ses-

sions will be the last during the month of Ramadan and most of sessions after the holy month will be allocated to debating

MP Bader Al-Mulla in the meantime said vesterday that he will file to grill Finance Minister Navef Al-Hajraf after Eid Al-Fitr on issues like public debt, the sovereign wealth fund, customs and the social security institution. He said that another MP may take part in the grilling.

Soldier escaped kidnap attempt

KUWAIT: A soldier escaped an attempt to kidnap him by an unidentified person, and was injured while resisting. The soldier was exercising in Jahra when a man attacked him in an attempt to kidnap him, but his resistance thwarted the suspect, who fled. The victim was taken to Jahra Hospital, where he was treated, then went to the police station, where he lodged a complaint.

Policeman attacked

An Egyptian man was detained for attacking a policeman who prevented him from filming a Salmiya mosque. The policeman was guarding the mosque and noticed the man filming during taraweeh prayers, so the policeman asked him to stop. But the man exchanged words with him, then attacked him.

Forged passports

Police authorities arrested six Sri Lankans including three women who arrived in the country. Each of them had three passports, 12 of which were forged, and were about to leave for Britain. Police received tips from sources and arrested them in the transit hall. They were searched, and it was found that each of them held genuine Sri Lankan passports, forged Indian passports and forged Malaysian passports with forged British visas. The six persons were arrested and face legal action.

A Kuwaiti and a Syrian did not respect the sanctity of Ramadan, ate in public and behaved recklessly. When a police officer attempted to stop them, he was run over and sustained bruises. The two were showing off near the Catholic Church in Salhiya and endangered the lives of those around them. The driver was arrested along with the other person. Both were in an abnormal condition and in possession of two tablets.

Kashmir protests over rape of 3-yr-old

Schools across valley shut along with shops and businesses

SRINAGAR, India: Large parts of Indian-administered Kashmir erupted in protest yesterday over the rape of a three-year-old child, leaving at least a dozen people injured in clashes with government forces, police said. Last Wednesday, a car mechanic - a neighbor of the victim's family - allegedly lured the child into the toilet of a nearby school and sexually assaulted her. The accused, from the Sumbal area north of the main city of Srinagar and thought to be 20 years old, has already been arrested.

Yesterday, allegations emerged that the principal of another school issued a certificate for the accused that he was a minor, sparking anger and triggering protests across the Kashmir valley. At least a dozen people, including government forces personnel, were injured when tear gas and pellet shotguns were fired to quell the protests in many towns, top police officer Swayam Prakash Pani told AFP. "One of the injured

protestors is critically wounded," Pani said. "We have registered a separate case against the school principal and detained him for questioning."

Thousands also protested in Srinagar and clashed with government forces. Across the Kashmir Valley, thousands of security forces wearing riot gear were deployed to contain the spreading protests, officials said. A police statement later yesterday said that protests had spread to northern Baramulla district where 47 security personnel and seven protestors were injured in the clashes. The security personnel used tear gas on the angry stone pelting protestors in the region.

angry stone petting protestors in the region.
Schools across the valley shut spontaneously as did shops and businesses.
Hundreds of students at three university campuses also protested, demanding capital punishment for the alleged perpetrator and action against the school principal. Lawyers abstained from work in the courts yesterday

to express solidarity with the victim. Condemnations of the crime poured in from leaders from across the political spectrum appealing for calm, with a top separatist leader, Mirwaiz Umar Farooq saying yesterday the incident was "a crime against humanity".

Another separatist leader with a wide following in Kashmir, Syed Ali Geelani, said the alleged crime was "a black stain on the social fabric" of Kashmir. Baseer Ahmad Khan - the region's top administrator - also appealed for calm and said in a statement that the "enquiry of Sumbal incident is being conducted on a fast-track basis". In Jan 2018, an eight-year-old girl was abducted, starved for a week and murdered after she was raped by several people in the southern Kathua area of Jammu & Kashmir. That incident caused widespread outrage and protests in Kashmir and many Indian cities and towns. — AFP



Sweden reopens rape investigation against Assange

STOCKHOLM: Swedish prosecutors said yesterday they were reopening a 2010 rape investigation against WikiLeaks founder Julian Assange, hoping to bring him to justice before the statute of limitations expires in August 2020. The 47-year-old has claimed the Swedish allegations were a pretext to transfer him to the United States, where he fears prosecution over the release by WikiLeaks of millions of classified documents.

"I have today decided to reopen the investigation... There is still probable cause to suspect that Mr Assange committed rape," the deputy director of public prosecutions, Eva-Marie Persson, told reporters. "The previous decision (in May 2017) to close the investigation was not based on difficulties related to evidence, but on difficulties that blocked the investigation."

The Australian whistleblower, who holed himself up in the Ecuadoran embassy in London for seven years to avoid a British extradition order to Sweden, was arrested on April 11 after Ecuador gave him up. A London court sentenced him on May 1 to 50 weeks in jail for breaching the British order. Now that Assange has left Ecuador's embassy, "I am of the opinion that the conditions are in place once again to pursue the case," the prosecutor said.

Person said she hoped Assange could be questioned again, adding that she would ask a Swedish court to remand him in custody in absentia, and that a European arrest warrant would be issued. Assange's Swedish lawyer, Per E Samuelson, said Sweden was "embarrassing itself" by reopening a decade-old case. "I'm not in the least concerned

about the question of guilt," he told Swedish television.

Assange's spectacular arrest revived his Swedish

accuser's hopes of seeing him brought to justice, and her lawyer had asked prosecutors to reopen the rape investigation. The alleged victim, who says she met Assange at a WikiLeaks conference in Stockholm, filed a complaint in Aug 2010. She accused him of having sex with her - as she slept - without using a condom despite repeatedly having denied him unprotected sex. Assange has always denied the allegations. WikiLeaks's editor, Kristinn Hrafnsson, said yesterday the reopening of the investigation would give him "a chance to clear his name".

Meanwhile, the lawyer for the plaintiff, Elisabeth Massi Fritz, told reporters yesterday's decision sent "a very important signal: That everyone is equal before the law. No one is above the law, even if your name is Julian Assange." With the Australian in the Ecuadoran embassy, the Swedish case dragged on for years over procedural difficulties and prosecutors were never granted permission to question him directly.

In testimony released in December 2016 - after an Ecuadoran prosecutor grilled him over questions supplied by Swedish prosecutors - Assange insisted the sex was consensual.—AFP

Modi mocked for tech gaffes

NEW DELHI: Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi has been roundly mocked for suggesting that radars are affected by clouds and boasting that he sent an email attachment years before the technology to do so was invented. Modi, who is currently fighting to retain his premiership in a marathon election, claimed in a weekend television interview that he ordered air strikes on Pakistan in February because cloud cover would stop radar detection of Indian fighter jets.

"I said there is so much cloud and rain. There is a benefit," Modi told News Nation in the interview, recounting the bombardment of what India claims was a militant training camp across the Pakistani border. "(I thought) the clouds can benefit us too. We can escape the radar... Ultimately I said there are clouds, let's go," he added.

Modi has been using the air strikes during the country's election campaign to bolster his strongman image. His Bharatiya Janata Party posted the comments on Twitter but soon deleted them as newspapers quoted experts rubbishing Modi's claims, with the Kolkatabased Telegraph ridiculing the prime minister for his "shock and awe" disclosure. Opposition politicians also piled in to taunt the 68-year-old. "It seems no one clarified (to) the PM how radars work," tweeted Salman Soz, a senior member of the opposition Congress party. "If that is the case, it is a very serious national security issue. No laughing matter!"

Social media jibes came thick and fast. One widely-shared Internet meme featured a still from the block-buster "Avengers" film franchise with Modi superimposed among the superheroes. Twitter users also had a

field day over Modi's claim that he sent digital pictures as an email attachment in the late 1980s. "I am likely the first person to use digital camera in India in 1987 or 88. Only a few people had emails then," Modi had said in the same interview. In reality, the first email attachment wasn't sent until 1992 by researcher Nathaniel Borenstein. "The joke is not on Modi," tweeted academic and columnist Nissim Mannathukkaren. "The joke is on the "educated" elite/middle class supporters of Modi who have made idiocy and ignorance fashionable." — AFP

Sudan army rulers, protesters resume key talks on civil rule

Angry demonstrators block major avenue along Nile

KHARTOUM: Sudan's army rulers and protest leaders resumed crucial talks yesterday over handing power to a civilian administration after a deadlock in negotiations, as angry demonstrators blocked a major avenue along the Nile river. The much-awaited discussions came with crowds of protesters still camped round-the-clock outside the army headquarters in central Khartoum, vowing to force the ruling military council to cede power - just as they drove longtime leader Omar al-Bashir from office on April 11.

Protest leaders Omar Al-Digeir and Satea Al-Haj were among those attending the talks yesterday on behalf of the Alliance for Freedom and Change, a spokeswoman for the umbrella group, Mashar Darraj, told AFP. The meeting was being held behind closed doors at a convention center in central Khartoum. Prior to the meeting dozens of protesters blocked Nile Street, a major avenue in the city, for the second consecutive day, an AFP correspondent reported.

'Optimistic atmosphere'

Protesters also blocked a road leading to the capital's northern district of Bahari, the correspondent reported. Burnt tyres were strewn across the road as soldiers and members of the paramilitary Rapid Support Force deployed. On Sunday protesters blocked Nile Street after police stopped them from going from that road to the sit-in outside the army complex that has been held since April 6. The military council slammed the blocking of the avenue. "It is totally unacceptable what is happening on the Nile street as it creates chaos and makes life difficult for citizens," the council said in a statement late on Sunday.

The council also dismissed unconfirmed reports that security forces were trying to disperse the sit-in outside the military headquarters. The protest alliance said Saturday the generals had invited the movement for a new round of talks. The army generals and protesters are at loggerheads over who will sit on a new ruling body that would replace the existing military council. The generals have proposed that the new council be military led, while the protest leaders want a majority civilian body.

Late last month, the alliance - which brings together protest organizers, opposition parties and rebel groups - handed the generals its proposals for a civilian-led transitional government. But the generals have pointed to what they call "many reservations" over the alliance's roadmap. They have singled out its silence on the constitutional position of Islamic sharia law, which was the guiding principle of all legislation under Bashir's rule but is anathema to secular groups like the Sudanese Communist Party and some rebel factions in the alliance.

The alliance has said it wants to "sort out all these points in 72 hours" once the talks resume. Late on Sunday the spokesman for the ruling military council, Lieutenant General Shamseddine Kabbashi, said the talks are being held in an "optimistic atmosphere". He said the negotiations aimed "to reach an agreement over the arrangements of the transitional period". Thousands of protesters first reached the army complex on April 6 seeking the army's help in ousting Bashir.

Days later the army ousted the veteran leader, but a 10-member military council has since taken power, and demonstrators are now continuing their sit-in against

the generals. Crowds have dwindled during the day due to the scorching heat, but protesters still gather in their thousands after breaking the fast in the evening for the Muslim holy month of Ramadan. —AFP

Rights groups urge action on Syria missing

BEIRUT: Rights groups yesterday urged the international community to pressure all sides in Syria's war to reveal the fate of "tens of thousands" of people gone missing over years of conflict. "Tens of thousands have been forcibly disappeared by the Syrian government; and many have gone missing after being abducted by armed anti-government groups or the Islamic State" group, eight Syrian and international rights groups said in a statement. "Hundreds have died in detention of torture or ill-treatment,"

said the statement, whose signatories included Amnesty International and Human Rights Watch.

The Britain-based Observatory for Human Rights estimates that around 200,000 people have gone missing since the start of the conflict in 2011, with nearly half believed to be held in government prisons. Many have been subject to "staggering levels of serious violations" committed by regime and anti-regime forces, including extrajudicial executions, torture and arbitrary detention, the report said. They include activists, lawyers, journalists and humanitarian aid workers, some of whom were perceived to oppose the government of President Bashar Al-Assad, it added.

The report called on member states of the UN security council to "end the

suffering of the families of the disappeared and of the arbitrarily detained" by putting "pressure" on the culprits and their international backers to reveal the names, fate and whereabouts of the thousands concerned. It also called on the international community to "support the creation of a unified system for logging all cases of missing persons in Syria".

Rarely told where their loved ones

Rarely told where their loved ones are held or whether they are still alive, the relatives of the missing often have to shuffle between different security agencies in a desperate bid to collect information. "Families are living in hell every day, they do not know where their children are, whether they are alive or dead, and if they will see them again," said Leen Hashem, Amnesty's Syria campaigner.

Starting in May 2018, the Syrian government started updating its civil records with the names of those who have died in its custody and in some cases provided families with death certificates that date as far back as 2013, the report said. "However, the government has not responded to requests by families of detainees to obtain information on the circumstances of the enforced disappearances or the causes of death, or to take possession of the remains of those who died," said the report.

"As things stand, there is no way to verify the deaths without the government returning the remains to the families," it added. The civil war in Syria has killed more than 370,000 people and displaced millions since it started with the brutal repression of anti-government protests. —AFP

In Somalia first, DNA used to convict rapists

MOGADISHU: Somalia has for the first time used DNA evidence to obtain a criminal conviction, sentencing three men to death Sunday for the gang-rape and murder of a 12-year-old girl, the Bureau of Forensic Science said. The country got its first-ever forensic laboratory in 2017 in the semiautonomous state of Puntland, seeking to tackle widespread sexual violence in a country where two decades of conflict and turmoil have put justice out of reach for most. The bureau said in a statement that Somalia had "joined, for the first time, the rest of the world in utilising science to solve a heinous criminal case".

In February, the kidnapping of 12-year-old Aisha Ilyas Adan - who was gang-raped and tortured to death, her body dumped outside her parents' home - sparked outrage and protests in the region. Human Rights Watch has described rape as "normal" in Somalia, with police often failing to take cases seriously. The Puntland state government enacted a Sexual Offences Act in 2016, which criminalized sexual offences and imposed tough penalties.

The central government in Mogadishu is still working on adopting Somalia's first-ever national rape laws, with a new Sexual Offences Act adopted by ministers in May 2018. It still needs approval by parliament. About 10 suspects were arrested in connection with Adan's rape and murder. State prosecutors said 37 DNA samples were taken from the suspects and stored in the lab, which cannot at present analyze such material.

The samples were sent to neighboring Kenya for processing, which linked three of the suspects to the crime. High court judge Abdinur Jama Hussein on Sunday sentenced the three "to the death penalty for kidnapping, raping, and murdering Aisha Ilyas". In Somalia, the death penalty is carried out by firing squad. —AFP

Turkey starts naval exercise amid Cyprus gas dispute

ANKARA: Turkey's military launched a major naval exercise yesterday at a time of rising tensions over its plans to explore for gas off the coast of Cyprus. The exercises, featuring 131 vessels, 57 planes and 33 helicopters, began early yesterday, a Turkish defense ministry official confirmed to AFP. They are due to last until May 25 and take place across the Mediterranean, Aegean and Black seas. It follows Turkey's announcement in May that it would carry out exploratory drilling off Cyprus up to September.

The European Union has said that will

encroach on Cyprus's exclusive economic zone, while the United States described the move as "highly provocative". The international community does not recognize the Turkish Republic of Northern Cyprus, proclaimed after troops occupied the top third of the island in 1974 in response to a coup sponsored by the Greek military junta. The discovery of huge gas reserves in the Mediterranean has fuelled a race to tap the underwater resources.

Turkey considers the area to be part of its continental shelf and granted exploration licenses to Turkish Petroleum in 2009 and 2012. The internationally recognized Republic of Cyprus, which rules the rest of the island, has signed its own exploration deals with energy giants Eni, Total and ExxonMobil. Speaking on Sunday, Defence Minister Hulusi Akar insisted Turkey would take all necessary measures to "protect its rights in the Mediterranean and Aegean Seas, and in Cyprus". —AFP

Egypt's new desert capital faces delays as it battles for funds

CAIRO: Egypt's government wants to start running the nation from a new capital in the desert from mid-2020, but the \$58 billion project is struggling to raise funds and needs to overcome other challenges after investors pulled out. Workers are rushing to build core areas of the new city to replace Cairo, the existing capital on the Nile that has become a traffic-clogged, urban sprawl of more than 20 million people. The project, launched in 2015 by Abdel Fattah Al-Sisi a year after he was first elected president, aims to offer a clean and efficient base for the government and finance industry, as well as homes for at least 6.5 million people.

But the project, which also seeks to lift an economy dented by political turmoil after 2011, lost a lead investor from the United Arab Emirates and is now being run by the Housing Ministry and the army's Engineering Authority. "There is very strong interest from the political leadership in the project," said Ahmed Zaki Abdeen, a retired general who heads the company building the new city, told Reuters. But he said "the large scale of the work leads to large scale problems", such as finding enough skilled labor to wire up the "smart city" and raising about 1 trillion Egyptian pounds (\$58 billion) in financing over coming years from land sales and other investment.

"We need very extensive financing and the state doesn't have money to give me," said Abdeen, adding that about 20 percent of investment so far had come from abroad, including up to \$4.5 billion from China. A promotional video depicts a green city, running on cashless systems for transport and oth-

er services, that contrasts with Cairo, much of whose elegant 19th and early 20th century architectural heart has fallen into disrepair.

The new city, known for now as the New Administrative Capital, is eventually expected to cover about 700 square km. The first phase, covering about 168 square km, will have ministries, residential neighbourhoods, a diplomatic quarter and a financial district. A large mosque and cathedral, as well a hotel and conference center, have already been built. With parks and tree-lined avenues, the city will consume an estimated 650,000 cu m a day of water from the North African nation's scarce resources.

Laying foundations

At the construction site, about 45 km east of Cairo, diggers and cranes clutter the landscape and wide roads run between empty plots and part-finished buildings. Workers for China State Construction Engineering Corp (CSCEC) lay foundations for the business district, where 21 skyscrapers including Africa's tallest at 85 stories are planned. Abdeen said he hoped a \$1.2 billion electrified train link from Cairo to the city, also being built by a Chinese firm, would be ready in 18 months. Before then the city would be served by electric buses, he said.

However, a \$20 billion deal for the second project phase agreed in 2016 with China Fortune Land Development Co. Ltd fell through over financial terms. The second and third phases had been "postponed", he added. Despite setbacks, Egypt's general-turned-president has been keen to show off the project, taking visiting French President Emmanuel Macron on a helicopter tour of the site in January. —AFP

David Sims, author of Egypt's Desert Dreams, a book on development projects, said the backing of Egypt's presidency and military made the project "too big to fail", although he said that did not guarantee people would want to live there. "It's one thing to have an army of laborers and lots of machinery out there pushing dirt around but it will be another thing to see if it all comes together," he said. —AFP

HTS chief Jolani calls for arming to defend Idlib

BEIRUT: The head of Syria's former Al-Qaeda affiliate in a video released Sunday urged supporters to "take up weapons" to defend his group's bastion of Idlib against increased bombardment. The Damascus regime and its Russian ally have in recent weeks upped shelling and air strikes on the northwestern region held by Hayat Tahrir Al-Sham, despite a Russian-Turkish buffer zone deal intended to protect it. "We call for anybody able to take up weapons... to head to the battlefield," HTS chief Abu Mohammad al-Jolani said.

The spike in violence against the Idlib region since late April signalled "the death of all previous agreements and conferences", he said during an interview with a local media activist in a countryside setting. It shows that "only jihadists and military might can be relied on", said Jolani, wearing a camouflage uniform and sitting cross-legged in the grass. The activist said the interview was recorded in the northern Hama countryside, although it was not immediately possible to verify this. It appeared to have been made in recent days after a regime advance.

Idlib, a region of some three million people, is supposed to be protected from a massive regime assault by a September buffer zone

deal signed by Russia and rebel backer Turkey. But that agreement was never fully implemented after militants refused to withdraw from the planned buffer area. Damascus and its allies have increased their deadly bombardment of the southern part of the bastion in recent weeks, killing dozens of civilians and causing tens of thousands more to flee.

They have taken control of several towns from the militants in recent days. The uptick in air strikes and shelling has displaced 180,000 people between April 29 and May 9, the United Nations says. The Syrian Observatory for Human Rights, a Britain-based monitor, says around 120 civilians have been killed in the bombardment. Damascus has not announced a wide offensive, but instead regularly announces targeting "terrorist" - meaning jihadist or rebel - positions.

Analysts believe the offensive will be limited. The regime and Russia have accused the militants of targeting the main Russian airbase of Hmeimim to the west of Idlib. "It's the right of the revolutionaries to bombard this base which causes the death of... women and children," Jolani said. "If the Russian leadership wants the bombardment on Hmeimim to stop, it simply needs to stop supporting the regime and killing the Syrian people and civilians," he added.

Russia intervened in the war in 2015, and has since helped the government to regain large parts of the country. The civil war in Syria has killed more than 370,000 people and displaced millions since it started with the brutal repression of anti-government protests in 2011.—AFP

N Zealand PM targets online hate after mosque attacks

Judicial probe opens into Christchurch mosque shootings

WELLINGTON: New Zealand's leader Jacinda Arden will demand action to curb online extremism, citing the worst mass killing in her country's recent history at a summit of world leaders and tech firms in Paris yesterday A selfdescribed white supremacist killed 51 Muslims in the Christchurch mosque attacks on 15 March. During the assault the man wore a head-mounted camera, broadcasting his actions online. Arden has been the driving force behind the Paris summit, co-hosted with French President Emmanuel Macron, following the tragedy.

Participants will be asked to commit to a "Christchurch Call" pledge - named after the city - designed to eliminate terrorist and violent extremist content online. Ardern said the Christchurch massacre underlined "a horrifying new trend" in extremist atrocities. "It was designed to be broadcast on the internet. The entire event was livestreamed... the scale of this horrific video's reach was staggering," she said in an opinion piece for the New York Times.

Ardern said Facebook removed 1.5 million copies of the video within 24 hours of the attack, but she still found herself among those who inadvertently saw the footage when it auto-played on their social media feeds. Since the attack,

enough to combat online extremism. Attendees at the Paris summit reportedly include heads of state or government from Britain, Canada, Ireland, Norway, Jordan, Senegal, Indonesia. Top executives from Twitter, Microsoft Google and Amazon will also attend.

But New Zealand media reported that Facebook boss Mark Zuckerberg will not be there - instead sending the company's vice president of global affairs and communications, former British deputy prime minister Nick Clegg. Running alongside the G7's "Tech for Humanity" meeting in the French capital, Ardern said the Christchurch Call was a voluntary code aimed to stop terrorist content being uploaded to social media platforms.

"(We're) asking both nations and private corporations to make changes to prevent the posting of terrorist content online, to ensure its efficient and fast removal and to prevent the use of live-streaming as a tool for broadcasting terrorist attacks," she said. She added: "This is not about undermining or limiting freedom of speech. It is

about these companies and how they operate. While some - such as Zuckerberg - have called for bet-

Ardern has strongly criticized tech giants for not doing ter regulation to address the issue, Ardern said governments could not succeed without help from the tech sector. "Practical outcomes are what we're seeking from this work," she told New Zealand's Newshub. "Not just governments regulating, but actually tech companies taking ownership and responsibility over their platforms and the technological solutions that they hold the key to." Ardern said New Zealand had been "left reeling" by the Christchurch massacre, and it wanted to prevent similar atrocities happening elsewhere. "We have a reluctant duty of care, a responsibility that we now find ourselves holding," she said. "That is what we will be taking forward this week in Paris.'

> Meanwhile, a judicial inquiry into whether New Zealand's police and intelligence services could have prevented the Christchurch mosque attacks began taking evidence yesterday. The royal commission - the most powerful judicial probe available under New Zealand law - will examine events leading up to the attack. "This is a critical part of our ongoing response to the attack - the commission's findings will help to ensure such an attack never happens here again," Ardern said. New Zealand's spy agencies

have faced criticism in the wake of the attack for concentrating on the threat from Islamic militants while underestimating the danger posed by rightwing extremism. The Christchurch victims were all Muslims and the massacre was allegedly carried out by a white supremacist fixated on the belief that there was an Islamist plot to "invade" Western countries. The commission is jointly headed by Supreme Court judge William Young and former diplomat Jacqui Caine. It is due to report its findings by Dec 10, although it may release interim recommendations before then if it regards them as crucial to public safety.

Australian Brenton Tarrant, 28, a self-avowed white supremacist, has been charged over the attacks and is currently undergoing psychiatric testing to determine if he is mentally fit to stand trial. The royal commission will examine Tarrant's activities before the attack, including how he obtained a gun license, weapons and ammunition, and his use of social media. Since the attacks, the government has tightened the country's gun laws and is reviewing legislation dealing with hate speech, as well as pressuring social media giants to do more to combat online extremism. — AFP

Argentine lawmaker dies of wounds

BUENOS AIRES: An Argentine lawmaker died yesterday of gunshot wounds he suffered last week in a daylight attack outside the Congress building in Buenos Aires. The death of Hector Olivares, 61, was announced by his ruling party coalition, called Cambiemos. Six people have been detained, including two men arrested Friday for the shooting which happened a day earlier and left Marcelo Yadon, a civil servant, dead at the scene. He had been walking with Olivares. Yadon, 58, was hit five times at close range as he walked in a square in front of the National Congress with Olivares, a childhood friend. Press reports in Argentina have said the motive may have been linked to a relationship that Yadon was having with a much younger daughter of one of the assailants. — AFP

Peru police clash with lynch mob

LIMA: Fourteen Peruvian police officers were injured Sunday in clashes with stick-wielding and rock-throwing villagers trying to lynch a man suspected of raping and killing two young girls, the Interior Ministry said. The violence unfolded outside a police station in the town of Andahuaylas in the southeast of the country. The hundreds-strong mob was trying to get at a 23-year-old man identified as Maicol Oscco, who was arrested overnight in connection with the rape and murder of two girls, aged 10 and 11, who were reported missing last week. Police fired tear gas to disperse the crowd on Sunday. The Interior Ministry issued a statement urging people not to try to take justice into their own hands. Colonel Alejandro Castillo, a regional police chief, told reporters that Oscco confessed to killing the girls. — AFP

Quakes in Panama leave 5 injured

PANAMA CITY: A 6.1-magnitude earthquake hit Panama on Sunday, injuring at least five people and causing damage to businesses and homes, officials said. The strong quake struck at a depth of 37 km in the far west of the country near the Costa Rican border, according to the US Geological Survey. It was followed by a smaller 5.4-magnitude quake in Colon province, on central Panama's Caribbean coast, according to the country's National Civil Protection System (Sinaproc). Five people were injured in the first quake, which hit 22 km from the town of Puerto Armuelles, said Sinaproc. Four homes were damaged, including two that collapsed, it said. The second quake occurred late Sunday and was not related to the afternoon quake near Puerto Armuelles, Sinaproc said. — AFP

Europe warns US against escalation as tensions mount

BRUSSELS: Europe yesterday urged the US not to further escalate tensions over the Iran nuclear deal, with Britain issuing a stark warning of the risk of conflict erupting "by accident" in the Gulf. US Secretary of State Mike Pompeo made a last-minute visit to Brussels where he met his counterparts from Britain, France and Germany - the three European signatories to the 2015 accord that curbed Iran's nuclear ambitions in return for sanctions relief - on the sidelines of a regular EU foreign ministers' gathering.

Iran last week announced it was suspending some of its commitments under the agreement, a year after US President Donald Trump withdrew from the accord and imposed swingeing sanctions on the Islamic republic putting the deal in peril. Adding a military dimension to the diplomatic tensions, Washington is sending an amphibious assault ship and a Patriot missile battery to the Gulf, having already deployed an aircraft carrier and B-52 bombers.

Pompeo's visit to Brussels was announced at the last minute and if he came hoping for a show of transatlantic unity against Iran, he was disappointed, with Britain, France and Germany all publicly criticising the hardline US approach. German Foreign Minister Heiko Maas said Berlin "still regards this nuclear agreement as the basis for Iran not having any nuclear weapons in the future and we regard this as existential for our security".

Maas said he used his one-on-one meeting with Pompeo to stress that "we are concerned about the development and the tensions in the region, that we do not want

Putin extols 'hockey diplomacy', falls on ice

MOSCOW: Kremlin chief Vladimir Putin praised "hockey diplomacy" as he scored nine goals in a game with his allies and Russian stars but fell on his face after the match. "It brings people closer," Putin told reporters during the hockey match, in footage broadcast on television Sunday evening. "This always helps." Wearing his traditional No. 11 jersey, the Russian president on Friday took to the ice for an exhibition game at the Bolshoi Ice Arena in the Black Sea resort of Sochi.

The sports-mad 66-year-old leader, who has done a lot to promote a healthy lifestyle in Russia, said hockey was outside of politics and helped foster ties between statesmen. In the past, the Kremlin chief took to the ice with Finnish President Sauli Niinisto and often plays with Belarusian hockey-crazed strongman Alexander Lukashenko. Putin said he could not even stand on ice several years ago and learned to skate by clutching a chair.

Skating alongside Defense Minister Sergei Shoigu and Russian hockey stars such as Pavel Bure and Slava Fetisov, Putin scored nine goals, leading his team to a 14-7 win in the gala match of the Night Hockey League, the Kremlin said. The opposing side was made up of prominent amateurs including Gennady Timchenko, a billionaire Putin associate who is under US sanctions. After the match



Putin took a victory lap to greet the cheering crowd but fell on his face after apparently tripping over a red carpet on the ice rink. Two of his teammates rushed to help the president but Putin quickly stood up without assistance.

The Kremlin made no mention of Putin's fall but video footage showing the mishap went viral on social media and unleashed a frenzy. "It was not a fall. It was a negative ascent," quipped one Twitter user, making fun of Kremlin's whitewashing attempts. "The hockey gates that captured the president's goals have been nominated for the post of Saratov governor," tweeted prominent anti-Kremlin blogger StalinGulag. — AFP

Ex-Armenia prez on trial, rejects 'coup' charges

YEREVAN: Armenia's jailed former president went on trial yesterday over what prosecutors describe as a coup that led to bloody protests but he insists is a politically motivated case. Robert Kocharyan led the ex-Soviet nation for a decade up to 2008 when his hand-picked ally Serzh Sarkisian was elected. He stands accused of tipping those presidential polls in Sarkisian's favor and faces charges of "overthrowing the constitutional order".

Dozens of Kocharyan's supporters rallied yesterday outside the Yerevan city court, holding placards that read "Kocharyan is a political prisoner" and "Political vendetta." Hearings started at 1000 GMT in a tiny courtroom packed with journalists. Dressed

in a grey business suit, Kocharyan looked unperturbed and smiled at supporters in the audience who shouted "Freedom".

The 64-year-old told AFP the case was brought against him because of new leadership that pushed out his successor in a popular uprising last year. "What is happening to me is nothing less than lawlessness," he told AFP from prison in written comments sent via representatives. "The current Armenian political authorities have declared me guilty, and the judicial system now serves this political master." The former head of state faces up

to 15 years behind bars if convicted. After the 2008 election, tensions erupted into violent clashes between riot police and supporters of the defeated opposition candidate, who denounced the vote as fraudulent. Eight protesters and two officers were killed. Sarkisian led the South Caucasus nation until April last year when he was forced to resign because of mass protests against his rule, spearheaded by current Prime

Minister Nikol Pashinyan. In 2009, Pashinyan was arrested

for organizing the 2008 post-electoral protests and sentenced to seven years in prison, but was released on a 2011 amnesty. "I was a non-partisan president who acted without favor or prejudice," Kocharyan told AFP. Defense lawyer Hayk Alumyan told AFP that "the immediate goal... is to obtain his release from pre-trial detention". 'The entire process may take several years," he added. — AFP

defamed in a play by a French writer. David Barclay, who shares along with his twin brother Frederick an estimated fortune of £8 billion (\$10.4 billion), is suing playwright Hedi Tillette de Clermont-Tonnerre for violation of privacy and defamation. The court in the city of Caen was due to hear the case, which was filed in June 2018, from 1200 GMT in a case expected to last several months. If the court rules in favor of David Barclay, the play could be banned from performance and the theatres that performed it forced to pay damages of tens of thousands of euros. The play, "Les Deux Freres et les lions" ("The Two Brothers and the Lions"), was performed at the 150-seat Theatre de Poche in Paris up to March 31 this year and was critically acclaimed.

The play does not mention the Barclay brothers directly. But it does not take much effort to see parallels with the pair who built a vast property and media empire after being born into a modest Scottish family. "The irresistible rise of two Scottish immigrants. This tale tells the rise two twins who came from a poor background to have at the end of the 20th century one of the biggest fortunes of Great Britain," the theatre says of the play. According to the latest rich list published by The Sunday Times this month, the twins are the 17th richest people in Britain, with a fortune of £8 billion.

'Freedom of expression'

The defense argues the play's aim was to shed light on the continued use of feudal law from the mediaeval Norman era in the Channel Islands off the northern coast of France, which are self-governing dependencies of Britain. The brothers live part of the time in a vast mock Gothic castle on the Channel Island of Brecqhou, neighboring the island of Sark, and are known to fiercely defend their privacy, often through legal action.

Ahead of the hearing, Clermont-Tonnerre, 44, told AFP that "in France there is complete freedom to talk about public figures. "We are in the country of Voltaire, it is a case of freedom of expression," he added, referring to the great 18th-century French writer. He described the case as "extraordinary", pitting one of the richest individuals in Britain against a "play which played in a small Paris theatre".

According to defense documents, the playwright only drew inspiration from well-known aspects of David Barclay's life and almost all the elements in the play "are all fictional and imagined by the author". Tillette de Clermont-Tonnerre "respected a distance between the text and the reality", it said, emphasising that this was theatre which made clear it belonged to the realm of the story. — AFP

there to be a military escalation". As he arrived for the talks, British foreign minister Hunt called for "a period of calm" and bluntly warned of the danger of pushing Iran back towards developing nuclear weapons. "We are very worried about the risk of a conflict happening by accident with an escalation that is unintended on either side but ends with some kind of conflict," Hunt said.

"Most of all we must make sure we don't end up putting Iran back on the path to re-nuclearization, because if Iran becomes a nuclear power its neighbors are likely to want to become nuclear powers. This is already the most unstable region in the world and it would be a massive step in the wrong direction."

The European Union's diplomatic chief Federica Mogherini stressed the need for dialogue as "the only and the best way to address differences and avoid escalation" in the region. "We continue to fully support the nuclear deal with Iran, its full implementation," Mogherini said. "It has been and continues to be for us a key element of the non-proliferation architecture both globally and in the region." French Foreign Minister Jean-Yves Le Drian joined the criticism of the US saying Washington's move to step up sanctions against Iran "does not suit us".

'Nuclear bomb'

Mogherini chaired a meeting of the so-called E3 -Britain, France and Germany - to discuss efforts to keep the deal going, including the special trade mechanism called INSTEX the trio set up to try to enable legitimate trade with Iran to continue without falling foul of US sanctions. INSTEX was launched in January but is still not operational and has been dismissed scornfully by the Iranian senior leadership. Mogherini gave a chilly response to news of Pompeo's visit, which she said was only communicated to Brussels at the last minute. "We'll be here all day with a busy agenda so we'll see during

Fresh curfews, social media block in Sri Lanka after riots

Anti-Muslim riots hit several towns

COLOMBO: Sri Lanka's police imposed fresh curfews and banned Facebook, WhatsApp and other social media platforms yesterday after anti-Muslim riots gripped several towns in the latest fallout from the Easter bombings. Christian groups attacked Muslim-owned shops in a sign of the ongoing religious tension in Sri Lanka since the April 21 attacks by suicide bombers on three hotels and three churches which left 258 dead.

A night curfew in several towns north of Colombo was lifted at dawn, but reimposed 10 hours later as tensions were fuelled by persistent rumors of mob violence. Police said a Catholic priest had sent out a message to parishioners about possible attacks, causing panic among some people in violence-prone areas. Prime Minister Ranil Wickremesinghe urged the public not to believe rumors and warned that civil unrest will only stretch the already thinly deployed security forces. "I appeal to all citizens to remain calm and not be swayed by false information," Wickremesinghe said on Twitter, which was not targeted in the social media blockade. "Security forces are working tirelessly to apprehend terrorists and ensure the security of the country, but each time there is civil unrest, we increase their burden and hamper ongoing investigations."

A state of emergency has been in place

since the bombings - which the Islamic State group claims to have helped - and security forces have been given sweeping powers to arrest and detain suspects for long periods. Police said a mob targeted shops in the northwestern town of Chilaw on Sunday in anger at a Facebook post by a shopkeeper. Security forces fired into the air to disperse the crowd, but the violence spread to nearby towns where Muslim businesses were also attacked.

A motorcycle gang attacked shops in nearby Kuliyapitiya and four members were arrested, officials said. However, dozens of people laid siege to the police station and forced their release. Despite a night curfew, a mosque was vandalized, local residents said.

Mosque attack


"Don't laugh more, 1 day u will cry," was posted on Facebook by a Muslim shopkeeper, and local Christians took it to be a warning of an impending attack. Mobs smashed the man's shop and vandalized a nearby mosque prompting security forces to fire in the air to disperse the crowd. A curfew was imposed from Sunday afternoon until dawn yesterday. There have already been clashes between Christians and Muslims in Negombo, the town north of Colombo that was targeted by the suicide attackers. The main body of Islamic

clerics, the All Ceylon Jamiyyathul Ulama (ACJU), said there was increased suspicion of Muslims after the Easter Sunday attacks. "We call upon the members of the Muslim communities to be more patient and guard your actions and avoid unnecessary postings or hosting on social media," the ACJU said.

Internet service providers said they have been instructed by the telecommunications regulator to block access to Facebook, WhatsApp, YouTube and Instagram. The latest unrest came as Catholic churches resumed public Sunday masses for the first time since the bombings. Worshippers were searched before being allowed into churches that were guarded by armed police and troops. There were no reports of disruption to services, however.

Schools reopen

Dozens of people have been detained since the Easter Sunday attacks, and amid the heightened security, police have banned parking near schools and students are allowed in after checking for explosives. Public schools completed their reopening from extended Easter holidays after the attacks, but attendance was extremely low, according to education authorities. Private Catholic schools were to open today, but many were planning to postpone the reopening until next week,

'I'm the original': Modi lookalike hits campaign trail

LUCKNOW, India: His white beard neatly trimmed and a sleeveless jacket thrown over his traditional Indian shirt, Abhinandan Pathak turns heads thanks to an uncanny resemblance to the country's Prime Minister Narendra Modi. But Pathak - almost the same height and build as the PM, and who even walks in a similar way - is no ordinary doppelganger. Bitter at Modi's "failed promises", Pathak is running as an independent against Modi's Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) in India's marathon election - and is getting a lot of support.

The largest election on Earth wraps up on Sunday May 19, after seven weeks of intense campaigning and the votes of 900 million Indians. "The anger (towards Modi) is real. I can feel it wherever I go," Pathak, 58, told AFP from his one-room shanty home in the northern city of Lucknow, in India's most populous state Uttar Pradesh. When Modi was first elected in 2014, Pathak was a supporter. Because of his resemblance to the premier, people "adored me, they asked for selfies and hugged me".

"I was showered with love. People thought that if they can't meet the real Modi, they might as well meet me," he said. "But now they get angry when they see me. They ask me 'where are the good days'," he said, after Modi's 2014 election slogan "achhe din ayenge" ("good days will come"). Pathak's brightest moment came in May 2014, when he says Modi hugged him during a victory parade in the city of Varanasi, Uttar Pradesh. But it was all downhill after that. He was ignored by the party and his many letters to Modi went unanswered, Pathak said.

Doppelganger draw

Lookalike candidates are nothing new in the colorful world

of Indian politics. Their presence invariably invokes curiosity, with crowds thronging to catch a glimpse of the duplicates. In Mumbai, another Modi lookalike - Vikas Mahante - has been out and about on the campaign trail in a district of the city, and on a BJP ticket. The 57-year-old businessman, who even played Modi in a little-known 2017 biopic, has been the star attraction at rallies. But it can get hairy. Once people threw stones at him and he had to be rushed to safety. Now the lookalike has his own bodyguard. "Once I was chased by a gang of men around midnight while I was returning from a raly," he told the Hindustan Times daily in 2017. "(I) stepped on the accelerator, jumped all signals and didn't stop anywhere."

Chickening out

In 2014, Prashant Sethi lapped up being a dead ringer for Rahul Gandhi, the scion of the country's Nehru-Gandhi political dynasty and Modi's main challenger in both the

Surat in the western state of Gujarat, was reportedly offered a film role too. But now the Modi supporter has had enough. He has transformed his look: putting on weight, growing a beard and changing his hairstyle - all to look different from Gandhi. "Me and my family have been supporters of the BJP since the beginning. But because of my look I was always teased," Sethi told AFP. "People had started calling me pappu," he said, referring to a common nickname - used by Gandhi's detractors - for slightly stupid individuals. "So I had to change my look," he said.

But back in Lucknow feisty father-of-six Pathak has no wish to change. "Why should I? I have been in politics since the 90s and I have always sported the beard and kurta," he said, referring to a traditional Indian long-sleeved shirt, and showing a picture from his younger days. "I am

Philippines votes in polls expected to strengthen Duterte

MANILA: Filipinos headed to the polls yesterday in a vote that is expected to strengthen President Rodrigo Duterte's grip on power, opening the way for him to deliver on pledges to restore the death penalty and rewrite the con-

stitution. More than 18,000 positions are at stake, including half of the seats in the upper house Senate, which has served as a bulwark against some of Duterte's most controversial policies.

Duterte is known internationally for his foul-mouthed tirades and deadly drug war, but remains hugely popular among Filipinos fed up with the country's general dysfunction and leaders who have failed to fix it. He wants to bring back capital punish-

ment for drug-related crimes as part of his narcotics crackdown, in which thousands of alleged pushers and users have already been killed by police. His tough-oncrime platform - which also includes lowering the age of criminal responsibility from 15 to 12 - was key to his landslide election victory in 2016. Crowds gathered at voting centers in the capital Manila

even ahead of polls opening at 6:00 am (2200 GMT Sunday) in an election where some 61 million are registered to cast ballots. "I voted for many of the candidates endorsed by President Duterte because his government is doing its job," said Myrna Cruz, 51. "I support their programs, including the anti-drug campaign... but I wish the bloodshed would stop," she added, echoing many Filipinos' nuanced backing of the crackdown.

Voters across the country flooded social media with images of their ink-stained fingernails, which are daubed blue as a protection against voter fraud. The opening of the polls saw isolated outbursts of violence, which is not unusual in the Philippines' frequently bloody competition for elected posts. At least 20 people were killed and 24 wounded in election-related violence in the run up to the vote, according to an official count. The military said nine people were shot and wounded yesterday during a confrontation at a polling station on the restive southern island of Jolo, which is home to insurgents and powerful local clans. — AFP

Pak Hazaras fear for their lives in besieged 'ghettos'

QUETTA, Pakistan: Crowded into "ghettos" surrounded by armed checkpoints, Pakistan's Shiite Hazara minority say they are being slaughtered by sectarian militants in the southwestern city of Quetta, with authorities seemingly unable to halt the killings. For years, hundreds of thousands of the Shiite community's members have been hemmed into two separate enclaves cordoned off by numerous checkpoints and hundreds of armed guards designed to protect the minority from violent militants. "It's like a prison here," said Bostan Ali, a Hazara activist, about conditions inside the enclaves.

The Hazaras are experiencing mental torture," he added, complaining the community has been effectively "cut off from the rest of the city" and "confined" to such areas. The Shiite community's presence is particularly strong in Quetta - the uneasy capital of impoverished Balochistan province where sectarian violence, suicide bombings, and banditry are common. Hazaras are technically free to roam around Quetta at their will, but few do,

To further protect the group, day traders and market vendors are also given armed escorts when they leave their neighborhoods, while ongoing military operations are said to be targeting militants in the restive province. But even these measures have proven inept at stopping major attacks on Hazaras. Just last month a bombing at a vegetable market left 21 dead and 47 more wounded - with the majority of the victims identified as Hazara.

The incident is all the more disturbing considering the roup was under the protection of Pakistani paramilitary forces, who failed to stop the suicide bomber from detonating in the crowd. The attack - claimed by the Islamic State and its local anti-Shiite affiliate Lashkar-e-Jhangvi is just the latest in a long series of assaults targeting the group, including back-to-back bombings in early 2013 that killed nearly 200 of its members. The situation across the border in Afghanistan is equally if not more dangerous, with Hazara mosques, schools, and community events regularly attacked by insurgents.

'Prison'

Pakistan has long been a cauldron of unrest and sectarian violence, with the officially Islamic Republic home to myriad sects of Islam and religious minorities that have been targeted by violent extremists for decades. The Hazara have proven to be particularly vulnerable with their

distinct Central Asian features making the members of the community easy targets for Sunni militants who consider them heretics. At the entrance to Hazara town - one of the two enclaves in Quetta - a grim scene plays out every day as Hazara men squeeze into the backs of a long line of trucks headed in the city to buy food from the markets.

Once there, they are flanked by soldiers as they buy supplies before heading back to their homes in a heavily armed convoy. Authorities insist the measures are a necessity. In the last five years, 500 Hazaras have been killed and another 627 wounded in Quetta alone, according to a Pakistani security source familiar with the situation who asked not to be named. "We know that we are passing through a killing field" explained Nauroz Ali, about life outside the enclaves. He added: "But we have to earn a living for our families."

Criticized for their inability to stop the attacks, officials point to their own casualties in the fight against sectarian extremists as proof that they are trying their best. Over the past six years, in their efforts to protect them "more police officers have died than Hazaras" says local police officer Abdur Razzak Cheema, adding that many terrorists have been arrested and others eliminated due to their efforts. He explained: "New groups emerge. We're trying to track them down and eradicate the threat." — AFP

Malaysia foils IS-linked plot, seizes explosives

KUALA LUMPUR: Malaysian police said yesterday they have arrested four militants linked to the Islamic State (IS) group who were in possession of explosives and planned to attack non-Muslim places of worship. The suspects - a Malaysian who led the group, two Rohingya from Myanmar and one Indonesian - were detained last week in raids around Kuala Lumpur and in eastern Terengganu state.

Malaysia's national police chief Abdul Hamid Bador described them as an "Islamic State cell" and said they planned to "assassinate high-profile individuals and attack Hindu, Christian and Buddhist places of worship in Malaysia". He did not give any details about who the high-profile individuals were. Police also seized six improvised explosive devices, a pistol and 15 bullets, he said. The planned attacks were to avenge the high-profile death of a Muslim fireman during riots at an Indian temple outside Kuala Lumpur last year, police said.

One of the Rohingya admitted supporting the Arakan Rohingya Salvation Army, a militant group blamed for attacks in Myanmar that sparked an army crackdown, and had also planned to target the Myanmar embassy in Kuala Lumpur, police said. The second Rohingya was a 25-year-old laborer who admitted to being militant with ties to IS, police said. The Rohingya are a Muslim minority that have long faced persecution in their Buddhist homeland.

Police are hunting for three more members of the suspected terror cell who allegedly planned to attack entertainment outlets. Authorities in Muslim-majority Malaysia regularly announce IS-related arrests but it is rare for police to seize explosives or weapons. Malaysia practices a moderate brand of Islam and has not seen any notable terror attacks in recent years. But security forces are on alert for militants from Malaysia and other parts of the region heading to the country after IS lost the last of its territory in the Middle East. Authorities say scores of Malaysian radicals flocked to fight with the jihadists in Iraq and Syria. — AFP

India cyclone death toll rises, anger grows

NEW DELHI: The death toll from a major cyclone that hit eastern India and Bangladesh in early May rose to 77 yesterday as anger grew over millions of people still without power and water. Cyclone Fani, the first summer cyclone to hit India's Bay of Bengal coast in 43 years, made landfall in Odisha state on May 3 packing winds up to 200 km per hour. The winds damaged half a million houses, uprooted hundreds of thousands of trees and knocked out power, telecommunications and water for millions of people in one of India's poorest states.

The Indian death toll, which earlier stood at 41, shot up with fresh casualties reported from Puri and Khurda districts on Sunday. Thirteen people also perished in Bangladesh after Fani barrelled northwards. "The toll has gone up to 64 with maximum deaths (39) reported from Puri," an official at the State Emergency Operation Centre told AFP. India initially won praise, including from the United Nations, for moving some 1.2 million people to safety before the storm arrived, in what Odisha's chief minister called the "biggest human evacuation in history".

But this praise has turned to anger for many local people at what they see as the slow pace of reconstruction and apathy from the authorities. "I have lost my thatched house in the cyclone. No one from the government has come to see my damaged house," Shantilata Mishra, a resident in the Puri district, was quoted as saying by the Press Trust of India (PTI) news agency. "I do not know when they will assess the damage and give me assistance to construct my house," she said.

Angry survivors have even been taking to the streets to protest the slow pace of relief as well as high prices of essential food items and water. On Sunday, demonstrators blocking roads in Odisha's state capital Bhubaneswar said a lack of coordination among various government agencies was compounding their misery. "There is a limit to our patience. We are being made to spend sleepless nights. We have to purchase drinking water at exorbitant prices," a protester told PTI. — AFP

Britain's Trump? Farage surges on Brexit discontent

olls show his Brexit Party easily winning next week's European Parliament polls and edging ahead of Theresa May's Conservatives in a UK general election. Nigel Farage is channeling Donald Trump's brand of angry populism to help turn British politics on its head. "You are in denial, the BBC is in denial, the Tory and Labor parties are in denial," the nationalist poster boy of the 2016 campaign to get Britain out of the European Union told the broadcaster in a feisty interview. "I think you are all in for a bigger surprise than you can even imagine," he said of the May 23 elections. The rise and rise of the 55-year-old former commodities trader is one of the most immediate and striking consequences of May's failure to lead Britain out of the European Union on time.

Britain was meant to have split away after 46 years on March 29. May's inability to force her EU divorce deal through parliament has pushed that back until October 31. Some think the date may have to be delayed further still - giving EU supporters time to reverse Brexit. All this has fuelled voter suspicions of politicians and turned Farage into a voice of the disaffected who has both May's government and Brussels on edge.

'More than a flash in the pan'

A May 8-9 YouGov survey showed his threemonth-old Brexit Party winning 34 percent of the UK vote in the European Parliament poll. The opposition Labor Party was second with just 16 percent. May's Conservatives trailed in fifth with 10 percent after the Liberal Democrats and the Greens. Voting intentions in any general election that might result from the current political impasse make equally grim reading for May's team. A poll taken for Saturday's edition of The Daily Telegraph showed the Brexit Party on 20 percent and the Conservatives on 19. YouGov has the Conservatives coming first in the general election but losing nearly half their parliamentary seats.

The question now is whether the Brexit Party is a passing phenomenon or a new force that breaks Britain's existing political order. "The Brexit Party has the potential to be much more than a flash in the pan," said UK national populist movement analyst and author Matthew Goodwin. "The rise of the Brexit Party is deeply problematic for the Conservative Party because it is eating away at Conservative Party support, making a radical left Labor government much more likely."

'The enemy'

The parallels between Farage and Trump are striking. They doubt the science behind climate change and embrace gun rights. They both blame social ills on migrants and support strong borders. Farage also appears to have taken a page out of the US president's playbook by portraying himself as the victim of a biased and out-of-touch media. The BBC "now behave with outrageous bias," Farage told the PoliticsHome.com website a few hours after his spat with the venerable UK broadcaster. "The BBC are now the enemy." It was a familiar echo of Trump's "enemy of the people" refrain that has him and much of the US media exchanging daily blows. "Farage certainly exhibits elements of Trumpism," the analyst

May's government never expected to do well in a European vote. But a potentially disastrous showing in a general election that could set Conservatives back many years has members of her party on edge. "People mocking, denouncing or vilifying Nigel Farage are missing the point," junior Brexit minister James Cleverly, the deputy party leader, tweeted on Sunday. "Rather than say 'people are wrong to vote for him & his party' we should ask "why are people voting for him & his party?"

'Fighting the political class'

Voters in southeast England have actually been re-electing Farage as their European Parliament representative since 1999. He has used the time to make numerous enemies in Brussels - perhaps none as vocal as the European Parliament's Brexit coordinator Guy Verhofstadt. The Belgian accused Farage on Sunday of having "one of the lowest attendance rates" in the chamber. "He would rather sign in & go to the pub than fight for British interests in Europe," Verhofstadt tweeted. "Sending him back would be insane!" Farage did not respond to his Brussels nemesis. But he did pin a clip of his exchange with the BBC to the top of his Twitter account. "We are not just fighting the political class, but the BBC too," Farage wrote. — AFP

Fears over rising violence in Amazon as 'forest guardians' battle logging

ollowing traditional rituals, indigenous chief Olimpio urucum seeds as he prepares to go on patrol to protect Brazil's Amazon rainforest. He is the leader of about 120 Guajajara Indians who call themselves "guardians of the forest" and fight illegal logging in the Amazon where rainforest destruction hit the highest level in a decade in 2018, according to government data. On a rarely permitted visit, the Thomson Reuters Foundation followed 12 'guardians" on a three-day patrol in the northeast state of Maranhao where they set fire to an illegal logging camp and to piles of timber ready to be sold.

Today our land is under threat ... Logging, fishing and hunting are all forbidden on indigenous lands by law," said Santos, wearing string necklaces with tattoos lining both arms. 'It's destroying our lives. It's destroying our culture." But he said the government had failed to clamp down on illegal logging and concerns about land are escalating with no sign of an end to the encroachments which was fuelling violence.

"We take action—and are defending the law explaining that the face paint was an appeal to "Mother Forest" to protect the guardians. "It is a very big war that we are facing still today." Brazil's 900,000 indigenous people make up less than 1 percent of the population and ive on reservations that account for 13 percent of the country. They are increasingly concerned about illegal logging and agriculture encroaching on the jungle.

Brazil led the world in rainforest destruction in 2018. according to independent monitoring group Global Forest Watch. The World Wildlife Fund estimates that more than a quarter of the Amazon rainforest will be without trees by 2030 if the current rate of deforestation continues. The Arariboia territory where the Guajajara live is also home to the Awa Indians, hunter-gatherers whom indigenous rights group Survival International has described as the most threatened tribe in the world.

Bruno Pereira, coordinator for uncontacted tribes at FUNAI, Brazil's indigenous affairs agency, said this tension has led to the emergence of forest vigilante groups, or guardians, across the Amazon, with fears conflicts will escalate. But he said it was a complicated situation as loggers paid some of the locals to co-opt them into their activities which was also pitting indigenous tribes against each other. "Whole towns have been built on the proceeds from illegal logging inside the indigenous lands. It is an extremely violent region," Pereira said.

"There are even conflicts among themselves as they are

trying to survive within their land ... I don't think they (the guardians) are acting in the best way but I do understand that they are so desperate that they have to act like this." Santos said at least three Guajajara Indians had been killed in conflicts with illegal loggers since the group started in 2012. Some estimates put the number of land activists murdered across the Amazon as high as 80.

Controversial leasing

Human rights groups have voiced fears that the situation could get worse under Brazil President Jair Bolsonaro, who put indigenous land decisions under the Ministry of Agriculture, sparking concerns that more land would be opened to farming. But on May 9, a congressional committee voted to reverse President Bolsonaro's decree giving the Agriculture Ministry power to define tribal lands and removing the country's indigenous affairs agency from the Justice Ministry. The decision must still be ratified by the full lower house of Congress and then the Senate. But Agriculture Minister Tereza Cristina Dias said the adminis tration's push to repeal a ban on commercial farming on indigenous land was in response to requests from indigenous people themselves. "Since I was a congresswoman (in 2015-2018) I received more than 150 indigenous people saying: 'we would like to be able to lease a plot of land in our area'," she told the Thomson Reuters Foundation in her office in Brasilia, the capital.

This would be on land that has already been cleared rather than deforesting new areas, she added. "So they (indigenous people) would like the law to be changed ... so that they can lease and produce on the land. The ideal is they produce in their own areas," she said. Not everyone agrees, however. Joenia Wapichana, the first indigenous woman to be elected to Brazil's Congress, said indigenous people have the right to receive full government support to farm their land "but this does not justify opening indigenous land up for leasing".

'No choice'

The guardians' work against illegal logging is widely recognized by government bodies in charge of protecting indigenous rights and the environment. But although citizens' arrests are legal under certain circumstances, authorities have warned against the danger of indigenous people going head-to-head with loggers and taking justice into their own hands. "The guardians inform us and make reports for us (on logging)," said Cassandra Parazi, federal police chief in Maranhao's capital Sao

Luis in an interview in her office. "But it's important that they remain vigilant, this kind of initiative to attack and try to defend (the land) with their own hands is dangerous, it is reckless.

Parazi said the federal police and environmental protection agency Ibama have conducted about a dozen operations in Maranhao state since 2015, destroying sawmills and logging camps, but this was not enough to halt illegal logging in the region. Corruption was also hampering efforts to protect the land. "The area is so big, it needs more investment ... There are few roads and a lot of rivers. So (illegal logging) is easy to cover up," she said. "It is very easy to hide in the woods."

'Generalized conflict'

The guardians patrol entrances to the forest used by trucks and cars where they approach and identify any illegal logging activity and expel those involved from the land, Santos said. During a night patrol followed by the Thomson Reuters Foundation, a balaclava-clad guardian interrogated a Guajajara Indian whom he suspected of working with illegal loggers. "You think this is a joke? It's not," he said, as the man denied any involvement with logging. "If we find out you're deceiving us, that you're lying, it will be much more complicated for you," another

Roberto Cabral Borges, coordinator of operations and enforcement at Ibama, said he worried that escalating violence with illegal loggers could make the area even more dangerous. "Something that started as an environmental crime could be placed aside and become a generalized conflict in the area." Borges said. Since the guardians were set up in late 2012, they have destroyed some 200 logging camps, Santos said, adding that the group was setting up a charity and a website for donations.

"I ask the world to look at our struggle and recognize our activities as legal ... because we are fighting for our lives and also for the lungs of the world," he said, gazing at a pile of burning wood. Laercio Souza Silva Guajajara, another guardian, said the group was "not a militia". "We are defending life, we are not killing anyone. It's our fight for the children, for the old, for the whole world," he said, his face and body painted with black dye from jenipapo fruit and wearing a camouflage hat. "If we wait for the government nothing will happen ... We'll fight until the end, until the last breath." — Reuters

Julian Assange: Transparency icon or fugitive?

heroic campaigner for democratic openness, or an alleged criminal trying to avoid justice: after a decade in the limelight, WikiLeaks founder Julian Assange remains a highly polarizing figure. The 47-year-old Australian, who now faces the reopening of a 2010 rape investigation against him in Sweden, is already in prison in Britain for breach of bail conditions. He was arrested by British police at Ecuador's embassy in London, where he had been holed up since 2012, after the Ecuadorian government withdrew his asylum.

Assange has always denied the Swedish allegations, saying they were politically motivated and expressing fears of a plot to transfer him to the United States to be tried there. The US has now submitted a formal request for his extradition on a charge of computer hacking. At the time the Swedish sexual assault claims were first made 2010, Assange was the frontman of whistleblowing website WikiLeaks as it exposed government secrets worldwide, with particular focus on the US.

Transparency and anti-war campaigners hailed his work revealing the deaths of civilians, torture and clandestine military operations with the release of 500,000 US documents on the Iraq and Afghan wars. But the United States and its allies accused him of risking lives by sharing information on sources, intelligence techniques and key infrastructure sites. Following his arrest, WikiLeaks said that "powerful actors, including the CIA, are engaged in a sophisticated effort to dehumanize, delegitimize and imprison him".

Ties with Russia?

Assange was initially supported by human rights groups and newspapers that once worked with him to edit and publish the war logs. But many were also horrified when WikiLeaks dumped the documents unredacted online, including the names of informants. When in 2016 a UN panel declared that Assange had been detained arbitrarily, one of his previous media partners, The Guardian, dismissed the idea and said he should face justice. There have since been questions about his relationship with Russia, with WikiLeaks identified in independent prosecutor Robert Mueller's probe into interference in the 2016 US election. Mueller found that Russian government actors hacked White House hopeful Hillary Clinton's campaign "and publicly disseminated those materials through various intermediaries, including WikiLeaks".

War logs exposed

Born in Townsville, Queensland, in 1971, Assange has

described a nomadic childhood and claims to have attended 37 schools before settling in Melbourne. As a teenager, he discovered a talent for computer hacking, and although he has pleaded guilty to 25 such offences, he has only ever walked away with fines. He created WikiLeaks in 2006 with a group of like-minded activists and IT experts, to provide a secure way for whistleblowers to leak information.

A confident speaker, he became its figurehead - and a lightning rod for criticism. The most damaging leaks emerged in 2010, beginning with a video showing a US military Apache helicopter firing on and killing two journalists and several Iraqi civilians on a Baghdad street in 2007. It was followed by more than 90,000 classified US military files from the Afghan war, 400,000 from Iraq, and in November that year, around 250,000 US diplomatic cables covering almost every country in the world.

Living in a space station

He was arrested in Britain in December 2010 and a judge ordered his extradition to Sweden. The claims were later dropped but Sweden's deputy director of public prosecutions Eva-Marie Persson yesterday said there was "still probable cause to suspect that Mr Assange committed rape". At the time of the first judicial battle, Ecuador's former president, Rafael Correa, said Assange's human rights could be at risk and offered him refuge at his country's embassy,

Assange compared his embassy stay to living in a space station - he exercised on a treadmill and used a sun lamp to make up for the lack of natural light. Correa's successor Lenin Moreno was less patient and accused Assange of interfering in foreign affairs. Assange's supporters said it had become a "Trumanshow type situation", accusing Ecuador of gathering thousands of photographs and videos from inside the embassy. After seven years, Assange was finally arrested on April 11. — AFP

China says will 'never surrender' on trade

Trump warns Beijing against retaliation in escalating trade dispute

WASHINGTON/BEIJING: US President Donald Trump yesterday warned Beijing not to retaliate in an escalating trade dispute after China said it "will never surrender to external pressure."

The trade war between the world's top two economies heightened on Friday after Trump hiked tariffs on \$200 billion worth of Chinese goods, saying China reneged on earlier commitments made during months of negotiations. Beijing vowed to respond to the latest US tariffs. "As for the details, please continue to pay attention. Copying a US expression wait and see," Foreign Ministry spokesman Geng Shuang told a daily news briefing yesterday.

Trump warned China not to intensify the trade dispute and urged their leaders to continue working to reach a deal. "China should not retaliate-will only get worse," he said on Twitter. "I say openly to President Xi & all of my many

friends in China that China will be hurt very badly if you don't make a deal because companies will be forced to leave China for other countries," Trump wrote.

Global equities fell yesterday as hopes of an imminent trade deal were crushed. The Republican US president last week also ordered US Trade Representative Robert Lighthizer to begin imposing tariffs on all remaining imports from China, a move that would affect an additional \$300 billion worth of goods.

Asked about the threat, Geng said: "We have said many times that adding tariffs won't resolve any problem ... We have the confidence and the ability to protect our lawful and legitimate rights."

Chinese state media kept up a steady drum beat of strongly worded commentary vesterday, reiterating that China's door to talks was always open, but vowing to

defend the country's interests and dignity.

In a commentary, state television said the effect on the Chinese economy from the US tariffs was "totally controllable." "It's no big deal. China is bound to turn crisis to opportunity and use this to test its abilities, to make the country even stronger." Before high-level talks last week in Washington, China tried to delete commitments from a draft agreement that Chinese laws would be changed to enact new policies on issues from intellectual property protection to forced technology transfers. That dealt a major setback

Trump has since defended the tariff hike and said he was in "absolutely no rush" to finalize a deal. White House economic adviser Larry Kudlow said on Sunday there was a "strong possibility" Trump will meet Chinese President Xi Jinping at a G20 summit in Japan in late June. —Reuters

Iran insists on ramping up oil sales to stay in nuclear pact

LONDON/BRUSSELS: Iran insists on exporting at least 1.5 million barrels per day (bpd) of oil, triple May's expected levels under US sanctions, as a condition for staying in an international nuclear deal, sources with knowledge of

The figure was communicated in recent meetings between Iranian and Western officials, including Iranian Foreign Minister Mohammad Javad Zarif, but has not been set down in writing, four European diplomatic sources said. The United States reimposed sanctions in November on exports of Iranian oil after US President Donald Trump last spring unilaterally pulled out of the 2015 accord between Iran and six world powers to curb Tehran's

In an attempt to reduce Iran's crude exports to zero, Washington ended at the beginning of May waivers that had allowed the top buyers of Iranian oil to continue their imports for six months. The sanctions have already more than halved Iranian oil exports to 1 million bpd or less, from a peak of 2.8 million bpd last year. Exports could drop to as low as 500,000 bpd from May, an Iranian official told Reuters this month.

Iran has threatened to block the Strait of Hormuz - a major oil-shipping route - and disrupt crude shipments from neighboring countries if Washington succeeds in forcing all countries to stop buying Iranian oil.

According to one European Union official, the Iranians have not been specific, but they wanted to ensure production returned to pre-sanctions levels. Other sources said Iran's demand seemed to be in a general range of 1.5 million to 2 million bpd.

'Zarif said specifically that they want to sell 2 million barrels of oil (per day), basically the level Iran was exporting before Trump withdrew from the deal," said a source present at the New York meeting in which the minister made the statement.—Reuters

KAMCO announces Q1 financial results for 2019

KUWAIT: KAMCO Investment Company, a leading investment company with one of the largest AUMs in the region, announced its consolidated financial results yesterday for the first quarter ended March 31, 2019. The company reported an increase of 470 percent in profit attributable to equity holders to KD 577,669 from KD 101,260 for the same period in 2018. KAMCO also recorded an increase in its revenues by 253 percent from KD 2.09 million in 2018 to KD 7.37 million in 2019 during the first quarter. Earnings per share increased to 2.43 fils for the period in comparison to 0.43 fils in 2018. For the first three months period, fee income reached KD 4.76 million, up 192 percent from KD 1.63 million in 2018 driven by a growth in management and advisory fees. Oil rises as US removes Iran sanctions waivers

look improved through April amid a spate of encouraging first quarter GDP estimates and as the US and China appeared close to a trade deal - a hope subsequently dimmed when US president Trump threatened to impose further tariffs on imports from China

Having plunged in March, benchmark bond yields rose on the improving global growth climate and reduced expectations of central bank policy support, while oil prices broke through the \$70/bbl mark for the first time in five months helped not just by the stronger growth outlook but also by the decision by the US to end Iran sanctions waivers on Iran.

US growth

The first estimate of US GDP growth in 1Q19 came in at an annualized 3.2 percent, well above the consensus of 2.3 percent and accelerating from 2.2 percent in 4Q18. The strong figure came despite the impact of the federal government shutdown - estimated to have lowered growth by 0.3 percent - and fears of a broader slowdown linked to tighter monetary policy, fading fiscal stimulus impact, the US-China trade war and a weakening global economy. Although hailed as "an incredible number" by President Trump, robust quarterly performance was driven by rising inventories which can sometimes foreshadow weaker growth going forward - and a smaller trade deficit mostly reflecting falling imports, while consumer spending growth roughly halved to 1.2 percent. The underlying picture is therefore somewhat softer than the headline figure suggests, and expectations are for a slower expansion in Q2.

Despite consumers' softer contribution to growth in Q1, there are grounds for optimism given continued strength of the labor market. Jobs growth in April surpassed expectations at 263,000, unemployment declined to a 49-year low of 3.6 percent and wage growth, at 3.2 percent y/y, was above 3 percent for the ninth consecutive month.

Reports from the business sector are less upbeat. ISM indices on manufacturing (52.8) and non-manufacturing (55.5) both eased in April and while at solid levels are well below peaks of above 60 recorded last August/September amid softer orders and reports of labor scarcity. There are also mixed signals on growth from the international trade data, where the deficit

> The Federal Reserve as expected kept interest rates on hold at the 2.25-2.50 percent target range at the start of May. But in post-meeting comments Chairman Jay Powell adopted a slightly more hawkish tone than expected, stating that there was no "strong case for moving rates in either direction" and that recent softness in inflation - the Fed's preferred core PCE inflation measure slipped to just 1.6 percent y/y in March, well below the 2 percent target - was driven by 'transitory', sector specific factors. The comments may have been motivated by a desire to push back against any perceived politicization of the bank in light of President Trump's rate cut calls. Futures markets have now pushed the probability of a rate cut by end year to below 50 percent, while the US dollar remained close to a near two-year high on a trade-weighted basis in early May.

European growth surprises in Q1

Similar to the US, Eurozone growth also provided an upside surprise in the first quarter, raising hopes that the single currency bloc may be starting to emerge from last year's slowdown. GDP rose 0.4 percent q/q, above the 0.3 percent consensus and double the rate of 4Q18. Encouragingly, Italy pulled out of recession with growth of 0.2 percent, while French growth was steady at 0.3 percent. Figures for the allimportant German economy were not released, though after growth hit a standstill in 4Q18, survey evidence points to the crucial export sector still under pressure from weakness in global manufacturing - which could intensify following the latest US tariff threats on China.

The European Central Bank left policy unchanged at its April meeting, committing to leave borrowing costs on hold until at least the end of the year (versus earlier discussion of rate hikes) but also hinting that policy could still be loosened if conditions remain weak. Pressure on the bank to enact further stimulus may have been eased by relatively decent O1 growth performance and also the rise in inflation to 1.7 percent y/y in April, near to the bank's 'below but close to' 2 percent target. The policy outlook may also be shaped by talk of a more fundamental strategy rethink being mooted by some of the candidates to replace ECB chief Draghi when he departs his post in October.

Meanwhile Brexit continues to weigh on activity

in the UK. The composite PMI stood at 50.9 in April, consistent with just-positive growth at the start of 2Q18 from an estimated 0.5 percent q/q in Q1 boosted by uncertainty-related stockpiling. While the deadline for Brexit has been pushed to end-October giving the UK parliament more time to approve the government's withdrawal deal with the EU, results from UK local elections in early May point to large-scale voter dissatisfaction with the two major parties and continued pressure on prime minister Theresa May to step down, possibly triggering a general election that could shift the political and economic landscape.

Japanese growth sluggish

Japan's exports continued to struggle in March, falling 2.4 percent y/y versus a 1.2 percent drop in February, amid US-China trade tensions and a softer global economic climate. Imports recovered however, up 1.2 percent versus a sharp 6.5 percent drop in February. Recent weakness in exports led to Japan posting its first trade deficit in three years in FY18/19. Japan's domestic economy also remains sluggish with retail sales growth for example averaging just 0.7 percent y/y in 1Q19. The Bank of Japan has vowed to maintain its current monetary policy to support growth, especially with inflation still far below its 2 percent target: inflation was at 0.5 percent in March.

Chinese economy

Economic growth in China reached a faster-thanexpected 6.4 percent y/y in 1Q19 - unchanged from the previous quarter - thanks in part to the government's pro-growth efforts and after the US (up to then) held off on any further tariff increases. However, downside risks persist, not least because of the recent escalation in trade tensions with the US. The official services PMI slid from 54.8 in March to 54.3 in April and given that the Chinese economy remains fragile, the government is likely to implement further stimulus measures to prop up growth. Indeed, the central bank cut its reserve requirement ratios for some small and medium-sized banks in a bid to support struggling small and private firms.

Oil rises

Oil prices posted a fourth consecutive month of gains in April, rising to six-month highs amid continued oil market tightness and the Trump administration's



decision to end the Iran sanctions waivers. Brent crude, the international benchmark, reached as high as \$74.6/bbl in late April - a level last recorded in October 2018 - though has since retreated as the US attempts to press the Saudis and OPEC to pump more crude to offset further supply losses from Iran and as US shale production continues to set record highs. Brent is still up around 32 percent so far in 2019, which is one of the best starts in years. While Saudi overcompliance with the OPEC+ production cut agreement (260 percent in March) has been the primary driver, elevated geopolitical risk related to plummeting Venezuelan crude supply - a 75-year low of 732 kb/d in March - and falling Iranian production have been important contributors.

GCC private sector

In the GCC, non-oil sector activity continues to improve. The UAE PMI in April reached a more-thanone-year high of 57.6 on robust new orders and new export orders growth, while the Saudi Arabian index was steady at 56.8, with output remaining strong and exports continuing to recover. Saudi private sector credit (+3.1 percent y/y) and retail POS growth (+20 percent y/y) were also showing good momentum in March. Indeed the IMF has indicated that it could revise up its 1.8 percent forecast for Saudi economic growth in 2019 based partly on better-than-expected non-oil activity.

Meanwhile the fiscal picture is also improving, with the kingdom recording in 1Q19 its first fiscal surplus since 2014 (SR27.8bn) on the back of a sizeable increase in revenues (+48 percent y/y) and a more moderate increase in expenditures (+8 percent y/y). However, the budget surplus could be temporary as capex spending is expected to pick up in the remainder of the year.

1) Robots, do you take lunch breaks? Robots have performed manufacturing activities that humans don't want to do or shouldn't do for decades. From repetitive tasks or jobs that do not require unique cognitive skills or emotional intelligence, replacing human workers with intelligent machines can enable a company to become more productive as believed by 61 percent of businesses in the UAE and Saudi Arabia. Another bonus: the elimination of the lunch break. Beyond the fears of intelligent machine growth as a job killer, artificial intelligence (AI), machine learning and automation will enhance the coordination of resources and on-demand learning, which will reset work structures for manufacturing and more. AIpowered machines have an enhanced ability to make basic decisions, learn from experiences and share that learning with other AI programs. This will enable people to rely on them more heavily, while streamlining and improving processes and everyday tasks, while also enabling a mutually beneficial relationship. Unlike humans, robots do not provide emotional intelligence; and thus humans will remain as critical partners working alongside advanced algorithms. A recent survey of over 3,000 global business executives worldwide, conducted jointly by MIT Sloan Management Review and The Boston respondents from the Middle East, 60 percent consider AI to be only an opportunity, not a risk, for their business and 23 percent believe AI already has a large impact on their organization. Iran metal exports may be harder to sanction than oil, say experts

TEHRAN: Iran, hard hit by US sanctions on its oil sales, now faces restrictions on metals exports-but industry insiders say foreign income from mining and steel will be

Tensions are soaring a year after Washington withdrew from a multilateral 2015 deal over Iran's nuclear program. A US aircraft strike group is heading for the Gulf and Tehran has said it will stop abiding by some restrictions on its nuclear activities.

US President Donald Trump last week imposed sanctions aimed at punishing anyone who buys or trades in Iranian iron, steel, aluminum or copper.

That came after Washington in November re-instated sanctions aimed at slashing the Islamic republic's oil exports, by far its top source of foreign currency.

But the steel and mining sector, Iran's second-largest source of foreign revenue, may prove harder to target. Relatively decentralized, made up of small and mediumsized companies and selling mostly to nearby countries, it is less vulnerable to sanctions, experts say. "The US cannot completely stop exports. Some countries, companies with no US ties, are OK to work with Iran," said industry analyst Mojtaba Fereydouni.

"Also our main export markets are our neighbors-Iraq and Afghanistan, and recently Syria and Oman." He pointed out that Iranian metals firms, no strangers to sanctions, were relatively unscathed by an initial tranche of restrictions re-imposed last year. "In August, steelmakers were barred from importing essential raw materials and any trade in steel products... yet exports are up" for the year, he said. According to official data, Iran's mineral exports grew about 20 percent year-on-year to \$6.2 billion in the 12 months to March, with steel making up over two-thirds

Another industry official, Amir Sabbagh, said that while metals firms will face extra costs, they will be "manageable" as the country's weakened currency has made



exports more profitable.

Iran's rial has lost more than 57 percent of its value against the dollar on the black market in the last year, making exports more lucrative. Sabbagh, an official with a state-owned mining firm, wrote on Telegram that the sanctions' main impacts would likely be to increase sea freight costs and reduce exporters' bargaining power. The sector could also be hurt by banking sanctions re-imposed by Washington in November. Analyst Henry Rome warned that this could hurt Iranian importers who buy many of their raw materials from states further afield such as China, South Korea, Kazakhstan and Russia. "The financial sanctions will choke off at least some of these relationships," said Rome, a specialist on Iran sanctions for the Washington-based Eurasia Group consultancy.

Jobs at risk?

But Tehran-based economist Ehsan Soltani said minerals firms may be cushioned by the fact that their revenues, particularly from steel shipments, rarely make it back to

Iran's financial system. Instead, they are largely kept outside the country to

pay for imports. Only one-third of Iran's \$40 billion in non-oil export revenue returned to the country in the last Iranian year, economy minister advisor Hossein Mirshojaeian told semi-official news agency ISNA.

Steelmakers say they keep the money outside Iran in order to pay for raw materials, arguing that they cannot bring it into Iran due to the banking sanctions anyway, Soltani said. Despite these factors, analyst Rome warned that potential factory closures and job losses would increase pressure on the government.

Mining employs 200,000 people directly and thousands more in downstream businesses, according to Soltani. But Fereydouni said the industry could be protected by the fact the government retains a majority share in most major companies, while smaller, downstream firms

can fly under the US radar. "Major companies... are still quasi-governmental and therefore will not lay people off under any circumstances" for fear of the political and social consequences, he said. Ultimately, he added, sanctions are "nothing new" for Iran's mining industry. "We have always been sanctioned. Sometimes less, sometimes more," he said. —AFP

Pakistan reaches \$6 billion IMF bailout package

ISLAMABAD: Pakistan has reached an accord with the International Monetary Fund for a three-year, \$6 billion bailout package aimed at shoring up fragile public finances and strengthening a slowing economy, officials said on Sunday.

The deal, which still needs approval by the IMF board in Washington, would be the 13th such bailout since the late 1980s. Finance Minister Abdul Hafeez Shaikh told PTV television he hoped it would be Pakistan's last. Prime Minister Imran Khan's government came to power last year determined to avoid another bailout and initially sought billions of dollars in funding from friendly countries including China, Saudi Arabia and the United Arab

But with inflation climbing to over 8 percent, the rupee losing a third of its value over the past year, and foreign exchange reserves barely enough to cover two months of exports, it was forced to turn to the IMF. "Pakistan is facing a challenging economic environment, with lacklustre growth, elevated inflation, high indebtedness, and a weak external position," the IMF said in a statement outlining the framework deal.

The IMF forecasts Pakistan's economic growth slowing to 2.9 percent this fiscal year from 5.2 percent in 2018, while the central bank has cut its estimate to between 3.5-4 percent.

As the bailout talks neared culmination, Khan shook up his top economic team, replacing Asad Umar with Hafeez Shaikh as finance minister and making IMF economist Reza Baqir central bank governor instead of Tariq Bajwa.

Currency flexibility

For decades, Pakistan has had chronic problems collecting tax and the program envisages reforms to improve public finances and cut public debt, including "revenue mobilization measures to eliminate exemptions, curtail special treatments, and improve tax administration," the IMF

In addition, it foresees a "comprehensive plan for cost-recovery" in the creaking energy sector, where mounting debt backlogs have acted as a growing drain on government resources. The budget for the coming 2019/20 fiscal year, expected later this month, will aim for a primary deficit, not including debt servicing costs, of 0.6 percent of gross domestic product. The savings should allow room for a "substantial increase" in social spending to strengthen welfare protection and boost infrastructure and human capital development, the IMF

It said the independence of the State Bank of Pakistan would be protected and the central bank would focus on reducing inflation and safeguarding stability. A "market-determined" exchange rate for the rupee would help the financial sector, it added in comments reflecting the IMF's longstanding push for Pakistan to adopt a more flexible currency policy to end repeated boom-and-bust cycles.

One of the key sticking points during the IMF bailout discussions had been how to manage the currency, whose exchange rate the central bank underpins in a de facto managed float system and which many analysts see as overvalued. The package will include "an ambitious structural reform agenda" to boost growth, the IMF said. "Priority areas include improving the management of public enterprises, strengthening institutions and governance, continuing anti-money laundering and combating the financing of terrorism efforts.

But it made no explicit mention of privatizing notoriously sensitive and high-employing statecontrolled companies like Pakistan International Airlines of Pakistan Steel Mills. — Reuters

World equities sink as US and China exchange trade war salvos

LONDON: World stocks sank yesterday in reaction to new eruptions in the US-China trade war, while oil rallied on simmering tensions in the crude-rich Middle East. In cryptocurrency deals, bitcoin rebounded back above \$7,000 for the first time since September.

Equity investors began the day in underwhelming fashion in Asia, as the lack of a US-China trade deal jarred markets. Negative sentiment spilled over into Europe on the back of the latest developments in the trade war between the world's top two economies.

Negotiations in Washington ended Friday without agreement and a massive US tariff hike on Chinese imports kicked in. Then on Monday, President Donald Trump told China via Twitter not to retaliate, a warning ignored by Beijing where the government announced tariffs on \$60 billion worth of US goods from

'Nowhere near'

"Judging by Trump's tweets alone, the two nations are apparently nowhere near signing a trade deal," said Fawas Razaqzada, a market analyst at Forex.com. "And for the markets, this is all that matters right now. Thus, for sentiment to improve again, Trump's tone towards China will need to improve first and foremost," he said.

At the opening bell in New York, Wall Street's Dow index fell more than 400 points, while eurozone stock markets were as much as 1.5 percent lower by that time, with London doing a little better. Markets remain on red alert over a trade war between the two big superpowers that observers warn could shatter global economic growth-and also hurt demand for commodities like oil.

'Groundhog Day'

"It's Groundhog Day yet again, with yet another day of US-China focused selling taking hold," said senior market analyst Joshua Mahony at trading firm IG. White House economic advisor Larry Kudlow said Trump and China's Xi Jinping could meet next month on the sidelines of the G20 summit to hash out their differences on trade-but no new talks are yet scheduled.

Bitcoin mystery

Trump had accused Beijing of reneging on its commitments and ordered new punitive duties-which took effect Fridayon \$200 billion worth of Chinese imports, raising them to 25 percent from 10 percent. He then ordered a tariff hike on almost all remaining imports from China, which are worth about \$300 billion, according to US Trade Representative Robert Lighthizer.

China trade tensions.

"While it's far too premature to suggest that bitcoin has restored itself as a potential safe-haven asset for investors, the idea will attempt to pick up further momentum if the cryptocurrency continues to explode higher amid the risk-off conditions," Otunuga said.

In Greece, smoking is alive and kicking despite bans

ATHENS: When George Balafoutis returned home from New York two years ago, he was shocked to see what little impact nearly a decade of anti-smoking laws had made on stubbing out Greece's favourite guilty pleasure. It was then that Balafoutis, now 38, decided to build a website dedicated to informing non-smokers where they could enjoy a meal or coffee unmarred by other patrons' cigarette smoke.

"After so many medical studies on (the harmful effects of) passive smoking, it's unacceptable for smokers to keep on ignoring the health of pregnant women and children," he said. Balafoutis' website, akapnos.gr, currently lists more than 400 smoke-free establishments but he acknowledges that the movement has yet to gather steam. "Restaurant and club owners are afraid of losing smoking customers, and politicians are afraid of losing votes," fumed the cybersecurity architect who came back to work in Greece because he missed his homeland, family and friends.

And with Greece headed for local elections on May 26, officials are unlikely to press the point, he conceded. In 2009, Greece banned smoking in indoor public places, instituted stiff fines and created a complaints hotline. However, in practice, the law is still rarely enforced.

Nikos Louvros, an Athens bar owner and pro-

trays on the tables of his Booze Cooperativa venue, where customers can puff away at ease. "It makes sense not to smoke in a hospital but when you're having fun, you should have the choice of going somewhere where you can smoke," he said.

Louvros even founded a smokers' political party in the wake of the 2009 legal clampdown, so strongly did he feel about people's right to smoke. In Greece, 72 percent of licensed establishments are restaurants that allow smoking, the highest figure in the European Union, according to a 2017 Eurobarometer study. Some 37 percent of Greeks smoke, compared to an EU average of 26 percent, it found.

'I'll quit when I choose'

Earlier this year, the issue sparked a row when European health commissioner Vytenis Andriukaitis reacted with disdain to a 2016 photo of Greek junior health minister Pavlos Polakis smoking inside the ministry. "It's shameful! This guy knows nothing about health," Greek daily Kathimerini quoted Andriukaitis as saying.

Polakis, a veteran surgeon, scornfully replied on Facebook: "I'll quit when I choose to... ok "guy"???". Anti-smoking laws in Greece date back to the mid-19th century. An 1856 royal decree issued by the country's first post-indepen-

ponent of smokers' rights, proudly provides ash- dence monarch, king Otto of Bavaria, forbade the use of pipes and cigarettes in public offices and shops. The 2009 anti-smoking law carries a fine of 50-500 euros (\$56-\$560) for an individual, and 500-1,000 euros for the establishment where the infraction occurred.

> "In the end, we will join the ranks of civilized nations... what are we, the idiots of Europe?" then health minister Dimitris Avramopoulos — now EU migration commissioner — said, at the time the law was tightened. Few people are reported to the police, however. When the economic crisis hit Greece a year later, few could argue with business owners complaining that their livelihood depended on placating a paying majority of smoking patrons. Even today, "most owners prefer to risk it and flout the law," admits Yiorgos Kavvathas, head of the GSEVEE confederation of small enterprises.

> Local council initiatives to discourage smoking remain few and far between, prompting the mayor of Greece's second largest city, Thessaloniki, Yannis Boutaris — another chain smoker — to protest in March: "We are the only country in the world where laws are not respected because that's just how we feel like." Authorities have had more success in eliminating tobacco products from public view. — AFP

Native Australians take action on climate change

SYDNEY: Indigenous residents of reduce its emissions to at least 65 perlow-lying islands off northern Australia will submit a landmark complaint with the United Nations yesterday accusing the government of violating their human rights by failing to tackle climate change. The Torres Strait Islanders will tell the UN Human Rights Committee in Geneva that rising seas caused by global warming are threatening their homelands and culture, lawyers representing the group said.

The lawyers, from the non-profit ClientEarth, said the case was the first of its kind to be lodged with the UN equating government inaction on climate change to a human rights violation. In their complaint, the islanders ask the UN to find that international human rights law requires Australia to cent below 2005 levels by 2030. The country should become carbon neutral by 2050, phasing out its use and export of coal completely, they say.

The complaint also demands the government allocate Aus\$20 million (US\$14 million) for emergency infrastructure like sea walls to protect Torres Strait communities. "Advancing seas are already threatening homes, as well as damaging burial grounds and sacred cultural sites," the claimants said in a statement. "Many Islanders are worried that their islands could quite literally disappear in their lifetimes without urgent action."

Kabay Tamu of Warraber island said that his community had a "right to practice our culture in our traditional homeland". — AFP

'HALF MAN, HALF GOD' MARADONA IS KING OF CANNES

Diego Maradona is sure to cause a stir when he turns up next week at the Cannes film festival for a new documentary about his jaw-dropping life by the Oscar-winning maker of "Amy". It is only one of a wave of new works about the flawed Argentine football genius that include a just-wrapped Amazon biopic series that follows every step of his dramatic rise and fall. The poster for Asif Kapadia's striking documentary "Diego Maradona" also pulls no punches, calling him both hero and a "hustler".

Yet Maradona will still walk the Cannes red carpet for the man who won plaudits and prizes for his insight into the life and tragic death of singer Amy Winehouse. Brad Pitt, Leonardo DiCaprio, Bono and Iggy Pop will climb the same carpet during the festival, which starts Tuesday, but few if any of them can draw the crowds or the passion as the short man born in a Buenos Aires shantytown. It is this complex yet unshakable adoration, forged in Maradona's frequent flirtations with death, that drew Kapadia to his story.

After his acclaimed portrait of the Brazilian Formula One ace Ayrton Senna, who lost his duel with death at 34 as he was leading the San Marino Grand Prix, the filmmaker said he had to steel himself to tackle another sporting hero who lived life on the edge. Despite swearing never to make another sports film after "Senna", Kapadia caved in when he discovered a cache of footage from Maradona's mythic period playing for Napoli.

Partying with the Camorra

"It was infamous," he told a documentary conference in Copenhagen earlier this year, with some sequences showing the player partying with dons from the Camorra, the Neopolitan mafia. They were meant to go into a 1991 documentary that was never shown. "We managed to get our hands on them and thought, 'He is

really interesting and his journey is incredible.' What he gets up to, and what happens to him, has much wider themes," Kapadia said.

Maradona also agreed to talk, sitting down for three long interviews because "he liked 'Senna'. That was one of the reasons we were able to get through the door." Kapadia, who has invented his own genre of "true fiction" documentaries, concentrates on Maradona's Naples years, the most operatic part of his career. Between 1984, when he was welcomed to the city by 70,000 fans, to 1991 when he failed a drugs test because of his cocaine habit, Maradona's magic left foot won the club two Serie A Italian championships and his "hand of God" goal put England out of the World Cup in 1986

But Kapadia said he was just as interested in Maradona after his fall. "After two films about people

who tragically died young I wanted to test myself with somebody who is still around. It's a different type of story-of what happens when you get older if you're a star." Like Senna and Winehouse, Maradona is "another person who felt like he was fighting a system", Kapadia insisted. "This is the third part of a trilogy on child geniuses and fame, and the effect it can have, and what they mean to their country and what they mean to people," he told The Guardian.

Ravaged hero

Maradona's status as "half man, half God" has drawn director after director to his rollercoaster life story. Two-time Cannes winner Emir Kusturica, who tackled him in his 2008 documentary "Maradona by Kusturica", identified three Maradonas: "The football teacher, the politically incorrect citizen and the family man." Italian Oscar winner Paolo Sorrentino created an unforgettable image of the ravaged hero in "Youth", his movie on ageing, with an overweight Maradona lookalike in an oxygen mask doing kick ups with a tennis ball.

That tragic but defiant figure is the heart of a new Maradona play in Paris based on a book by Argentinian writer Alicia Dujovne Ortiz, where this "demi-god tries to escape destiny for something worse". The big-budget Amazon series "Maradona"-which will go out later this year-follows the "Golden Boy" from the cradle through the highs and lows of his career at Sevilla, Barcelona and Napoli, with a relay of actors playing Maradona through

All eyes at Cannes will be on how the hugely unpredictable icon performs before the eyes of the world, having made headlines at the last World Cup in Moscow with his antics in the stands. Never one to avoid the grand gesture, he dedicated a recent victory of the Mexican club he manages, Dorados de Sinaloa, to the Venezuelan leader Nicolas Maduro, who has just survived a coup attempt. Maradona had previously fallen asleep during one of Maduro's speeches and had to be woken when the cameras turned to him when the president praised him.—AFP

UK's Jeremy Kyle Show suspended after death of guest

The Jeremy Kyle Show, one of Britain's best-known daytime television programs, was taken off-air indefinitely on Monday after a guest died a week after appearing on the talk show, broadcaster ITV said. The show, which began in 2005, is well-known for its format which involves members of the public engaging in sometimes fiery

arguments about their personal lives, often involving lie detector or DNA tests.

ITV said that the episode featuring the guest who died would not be screened and the channel would review the show. "Everyone at ITV and The Jeremy Kyle Show is shocked and saddened at the news of

the death of a participant in the show a week after

the recording of the episode they featured in," ITV said in a statement.

"Given the seriousness of this event, ITV has also decided to suspend both filming and broadcasting of The Jeremy Kyle Show with immediate effect in order to give it time to conduct a review of this episode." In 2007, a judge compared the program to

bear-baiting after one guest was convicted of assault after a fight on set during the filming of a show. One of ITV's most popular daytime shows in Britain, a US version of the show was less successful, and ended in 2013 after two seasons.—Reuters

Cannes rocks! Tsunami of pop stars make film festival splash

Dono, Elton John, Iggy Pop, Tom Waits...
The red carpet at Cannes is shaping up to look like a dream rock festival line-up. Not to mention Rihanna and a couple of the surviving members of Led Zeppelin, who may yet put in an appearance at the world's biggest film festival, which starts Tuesday. The opening movie alone, the tongue-in-cheek zombie flick "The Dead Don't Die", is chock full of A-lister musicians

As well as Waits and Iggy Pop-who plays a rampaging member of the undead-it also stars singer Selena Gomez and rapper and Wu-Tang Clan guru RZA. Its director Jim Jarmusch is a composer in his spare time and leads Bill Murray and Adam Driver are both musical, with the "Groundhog Day" actor touring North America as a singer with a chamber orchestra in 2017.

And that is all before the promise of Elton John bringing his grand piano to the Croisette to play at the premiere of his biopic, "Rocketman". With "Bohemian Rhapsody" taking more than \$900 million at the box office, cinema bosses are wetting their lips over the amount a film about the sex and drug-fuelled life story of the writer of such standards as "I'm Still Standing" will rake in.

Sex, drugs and Elton John

Unlike that the Freddie Mercury movie, which skirted around the singer's complex personal life, the Elton John picture prides itself on its warts-and-all portrayal. The singer-who has been frank about his struggles with his

sexuality, drugs and alcohol-was himself deeply involved in the film, which his husband David Furnish produced. "We didn't want to compromise the fact we felt it had to be hard-hitting and truthful," Furnish said. "I think we would have got a lot more interest (from studios) at the higher-budget levels if we'd been willing to produce a more sanitised version of Elton's life.

"That never appealed to Elton," he added. "His life has had incredible moments of lightness but also moments of real darkness. We wanted to be very honest about those and not gloss them over." More than a decade in the making, the film was written by Lee Hall of "Billy Elliot" fame with its star Jamie Bell playing Sir Elton's friend and lyricist Bernie Taupin, who penned such classics as "Rocketman", "Candle in the Wind" and "I Guess That's Why They Call It The Blues" with John.

British actor Taron Egerton, who shaved his hair to mimic the singer's receding 1970s hairline and painting a gap in his teeth, said he was freaked out when the man himself walked onto the set as he was performing "Saturday Night's Alright for Fighting". "I don't think I could have done it if he was around a lot," he admitted. But the now 72-year-old superstar was impressed, telling the Hollywood Reporter last week that "I didn't think it was Taron. I thought it was me."

Led Zeppelin documentary

Distributors at Cannes will also get a sneak preview of first authorized documentary on the legendary rock band Led Zeppelin. Jimmy Page, Robert Plant, John Paul Jones and the late John Bonham all spoke to director Bernard McMahon, the maker of the acclaimed television series on roots music, "American Epic". "When I saw everything Bernard had done both visually and sonically on 'American Epic', I knew he would be qualified to tell our story," Page said in a statement.

Speculation is also rising that pop idol Rihanna-who is about to launch her new luxury Paris-based fashion house Fenty-could also turn up on the Riviera, with a source close to her entourage telling AFP that he "wouldn't be shocked up she drops by". U2 frontman Bono will definitely be there to support the documentary "5B", which is showing in the official selection and tells the story of the San Francisco General Hospital ward that was the first in the States to treat patients with AIDS.

"Bono has been a fervent champion of the cause" and the "fight against HIV, tuberculosis, and malaria", the festival said. Star pianist James Rhodes' struggle with post traumatic stress disorder after a teacher raped him as a child is also coming to the big screen in the forthcoming film "Instrumental", with its producers Lionsgate set to unveil the project at Cannes. Londoner Rhodes, who will be played by actor Andrew Garfield, had to go to court in 2015 to get a ban on the publishing of his autobiography lifted.—AFP

Cannes makes a killing on the film festival

The Cannes film festival is not just about killings made on big-money movie deals sealed over champagne in hotel suites and on luxury yachts. It is a goldmine too for many locals in the French Riviera resort. "For my boss the festival is the goose that lays golden eggs," a hotel receptionist called Herve said. The proof, he declared, is that a room in his two-star hotel goes "from 40 euros (\$45) a night to 260" as soon as the red carpet is rolled out. It is not the only establishment to rake it in when the population of the town almost triples for the festival.

A few minutes' walk away, the price of a room in a rival three-star hotel rockets five times from 71 euros a night to 350 — without breakfast. "The six rooms that we put aside for the very last minute will be filled very rapidly" at the very top price, said the receptionist at the hotel, which is officially fully booked. Even if the four days in March when MIPIM, the world's leading property congress, is held in Cannes are more profitable day-for-day for the conference town, the film festival fortnight with its 40,000 accredited movers and shakers is on an entirely different scale.

Town makes \$200 million

For hotels close to the giant Palais des Festivals, where the red carpet premieres are held, the festival accounts for nearly a sixth of their annual turnover, said the Cannes hoteliers union, UMIH. The festival was worth 197 million euros to the town in 2017, according to official municipal figures. Even so, hoteliers insist there is still room for improvement. "Everything fills up for the first week of the festival but the second is more difficult," said Christine

Welter of UMIH. "For several years now people are not staying as long as they did," she added

She also warned that "the cards are also being reshuffled" by the possible defection of people working with Netflix, whose films are barred from competing in the festival because it refuses to release them in French cinemas. "When suddenly demand falls the market has to adjust," Welter cautioned, pointing the finger of blame partly at what she regards as the unfair competition of people letting out their homes and apartments. Just as many homes in Cannes are being rented out now as hotel rooms-"6,000 of each," she revealed.

Locals cashing in

It has become something of a racket, Welter complained, with some people renting out several flats. Airbnb alone claims between 2,500 and 4,000 arrivals a night, peaking with 4,600 on Friday May 17 — nearly 10 times the number of Cannes homes it is handling on the Friday before the festival. With that amount of fast money to be made, "some locals don't think twice about going and sleeping in a campsite along the coast so they can rent their places out for a fortune," quipped Herve, the hotel receptionist.

For the resort's restaurants-some of whom put up their prices-the festival is also a boon. "May is the biggest month in the year for us: the place is jammed. We can do 5,000 covers in 11 days," said Pascal Hamard, who runs an Italian restaurant. However, he has noticed a drop off in recent years, which he blames on people trying to cash in. "You feel some of the clientele have become ultra suspicious and are worried about being ripped off," the restaurateur added, with taxis and hotels hiking up their rates. "Now people coming to Cannes for the festival are more carefulwe can feel that they have been warned by their bosses-and budgets are that much tighter," Hamard said.—AFP

EUROVISION CONTESTANTS WALK HE ORANGE CARPET IN TEL AVIV

ontestants from 41 countries walked an orange carpet in Tel Aviv's "Culture Square" on Sunday for the opening ceremony of Eurovision 2019, brushing aside security concerns and calls for a pro-Palestinian boycott. The 64th Eurovision Song Contest holds semi-finals in Tel Aviv, Israel's entertainment and business capital, on Tuesday and Thursday ahead of the grand final on Saturday.

Instead of the traditional red carpet, an orange carpet, matching the logo of a company sponsoring the international song fest, was rolled out at the Tel Aviv square that houses Israel's Habima national theatre and the Israel Philharmonic. "Everyone is excited in my team. I'm really happy to be here," said Cypriot singer Tamta, the first artist to stroll the walkway flanked by visiting photogra-

The four members of Poland's Tulia gave a quick sample of their folk singing style called "spiewokrzyk" or "scream singing" to the crowd's enjoyment. Finish DJ Darude said artists behind the scenes of the festival were "slapping high-fives and having a good time." Concerns had been raised that the contest could be disrupted by a surge in cross-border violence between Israel and Palestinian militants in Gaza. But a ceasefire that went into effect a week ago has been holding.

When Israel was selected last year to host the 2019 Eurovision finals, the internationally televised event was identified by the Boycott, Divestment, Sanctions (BDS) campaign as a target for its campaign to pressure governments, companies, performers and academics to isolate Israel. BDS has called on artists and broadcasters to withdraw, saying that holding it in Tel Aviv amounted to "artwashing - whitewashing through arts" Israel's policies towards Palestinians in the occupied West Bank and

No delegations have pulled out. Israel has mounted a counter-campaign, rebutting BDS attacks and accusing some supporters of being anti-Semitic or having ties to militant groups such as Hamas and the Popular Front for the Liberation of Palestine, allegations BDS leaders reject. An Israeli ad for Eurovision that used a misogynistic term and an anti-Semitic trope to send up stereotypes about Israel has raised hackles among some viewers.

The 4-1/2 minute song video, posted online by Israel's public broadcaster Kan on Friday, underscored worries about low attendance at the competition given security

concerns and calls for a boycott. Two singers are shown greeting a wide-eyed couple arriving at Tel Aviv's airport with: "I know just what you heard - that it's a land of occupation. But we have so much more than that!'

In an apparent spoof of the common local mispronunciation of "beaches", a male singer urges: "Come and enjoy our lovely bitches." On Israel's often unwieldy demographics, he adds, beaming: "Most of us are Jews but only some of us are greedy." Some Israelis were left fuming or confused. Shahaf Weisbein, an Israeli activist with the left-wing Women for Peace group, denounced the video as a "disgrace" that "whitewash(es) the apartheid reality" of Palestinians. "It also includes an ugly anti-Semitic trope of Jewish 'greed'," she said in a statement. Kan spokeswoman Gili Shemtov defended the video, saying it included "selfdeprecating humor". — Reuters

In Lebanon, vintage film posters question Western cliches

pale woman rides through the desert, flanked by armed men on camels, a palace shimmering in the distance. This is Lebanon-or so someone thought in the 1950s. At a Beirut cultural centre, Lebanese film buff Abboudi Abu Jawdeh is exhibiting vintage film posters from his collection that show off a lost art, but also offer insight into decades of Western clichÈs of the Arab world. On a guided tour, the collector gestures towards the desert scene, which is an Italian poster for the 1956 French movie "The Lebanese Mission". "This is from the artist's imagination," the 61-year-old says, standing beside the image featuring the camel riders and a palace resembling India's Taj Mahal.


"He knew Lebanon was in the East, so he did this," he says, despite the country having ski slopes and sand only on its Mediterranean beaches. Abu Jawdeh moves along to another poster for the same film, this time featuring an oil well. "I hope we will have some," he says, as his country only this year starts exploration for the hydrocarbon off its coast. A glance at the film's synopsis reveals more inconsistencies. A Frenchman falls for the daughter of a Lebanese nobleman while in Lebanon hunting for uranium, a metal not mined in the country.

'Orientalists'

Abu Jawdeh first began collecting posters in his teens, starting with films starring American actors Steve McQueen and Clint Eastwood. Visiting old cinemas in Lebanon and across the region, he unearthed a world of images-for more foreign films, but also thousands of prints advertising films from the Arab world. Some of his finds in this rare collection date back to 1930s Egypt or Lebanon in the late 1950s. Today he owns some 20,000 posters,



Different versions of the same poster are especially revealing-indicating which country required a change in a film title or a bra to be painted over a naked back to avoid offence. But as he collected, Abu Jawdeh also started noticing a trend in some of the Western posters for films set in the Middle East. They "resembled the paintings that Orientalists painted of the region in the 18th and 19th centuries," he says. Dozens of these images are on show until May 25 at the Dar El-Nimer cultural centre in Beirut.

Titled "Thief of Baghdad", after a much-remade fantasy film from 1924, the show is replete with turbaned men, flying carpets, snake charmers and belly dancers. There is Elvis Presley starring in a film called "Harum Scarum", and a British-Egyptian comedy reportedly inspired by late Egyptian king Farouk's unrequited passions for a belly dancer. With captions summarizing often outlandish screenplays, the posters show a fantastical world far removed from the modern Middle East, but also gross misrepresentation.

'We're not all belly dancers'

"Come to savage seething Arabia on a terror search for forbidden treasures of the ages," reads the tagline for the 1957 action film "Forbidden Desert". Late Lebanese-American academic Jack Shaheen analyzed portrayals of Arabs in Hollywood films. He watched more than 900 movies spanning a century to the early 2000s, and found only five percent showed Arab roles as "normal, human characters". Instead, a whole people was systematically dehumanized or vilified. Often, all Arabs were Muslims, and all Muslims were Arabs, wrote the researcher of Christian descent.

Female characters were largely belly dancers or enchantresses, silent "bundles of black" or "terrorists". Abu Jawdeh says that he and others may not have always rejected such depictions. "We too liked seeing a belly dancer," he says. But the public now will likely see the posters differently, he adds, welcoming a fresh-eyed reevaluation of how the West has viewed the Arab world. "They need to see them to re-examine these human relations," he urged.

Round the corner, Rabbah Faqih, a masters student in archive management, looks at a poster featuring a skimpily dressed actress. "I'm all for a good expressive poster to draw people in, but I'm against commodifying women like this," she says. "We're not all belly dancers in Lebanon," says the 30-year-old, dressed in a long black robe, her hair covered. — AFP









S Korea latest big export: Jobless college graduates

SEOUL: Cho Min-kyong boasts an engineering degree from one of South Korea's top universities, a school design award and a near-perfect score in her English proficiency test. But she had all but given up hope of finding a job when all her 10 applications, including one to Hyundai Motor Co, were rejected in 2016. Help came unexpectedly from neighboring Japan six months later: Cho got job offers from Nissan Motor Co and two other Japanese companies after a job fair hosted by the South Korean government to match the country's skilled labor with overseas employers.

"It's not that I wasn't good enough. There are just too many job seekers like me, that's why everyone just fails," said the 27-year-old, who now works in Atsugi, an hour southwest of Tokyo, as a car seat engineer for Nissan. "There are numerous more opportunities outside Korea." Facing an unprecedented job crunch at home, many young South Koreans are now signing up for government-sponsored programs designed to find overseas positions for a growing number of jobless college graduates in Asia's fourth largest economy.

State-run programs such as K-move, rolled out to connect young Koreans to

"quality jobs" in 70 countries, found overseas jobs for 5,783 graduates last year, more than triple the number in 2013, its first year. Almost one-third went to Japan, which is undergoing a historic labor shortage with unemployment at a 26-year low, while a quarter went to the United States, where the jobless rate dropped to the lowest in nearly half a century in April.

There are no strings attached. Unlike similar programs in places such as Singapore that come with an obligation to return and work for the government for up to six years, attendees of South Korea's programs are neither required to return, nor work for the state in the future. "Brain drain isn't the government's immediate worry. Rather, it's more urgent to prevent them from sliding into poverty" even if it means pushing them abroad, said Kim Chul-ju, deputy dean at the Asian Development Bank Institute.

In 2018, South Korea generated the smallest number of jobs since the global financial crisis, only 97,000. Nearly one in five young Koreans was out of work as of 2013, higher than the average 16 percent among the member countries of the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development. In March, one in every

four Koreans in the 15-29 age group was not employed either by choice or due to the lack of jobs, according to government data.

Labor mismatch

While India and other countries face similar challenges in creating jobs for skilled labor, the dominance of family-run conglomerates known as chaebol makes South Korea uniquely vulnerable. The top 10 conglomerates including world-class brands such as Samsung and Hyundai, make up half of South Korea's total market capitalization. But only 13 percent of the country's workforce is employed by firms with more than 250 employees, the second lowest after Greece in the OECD, and far below the 47 percent in Japan.

"The big companies have mastered a business model to survive without boosting hiring," as labour costs rise and firing legacy workers remains difficult, said Kim So-young, an economics professor at Seoul National University. Yet while increasing numbers of college graduates are moving overseas for work, South Korea is bringing in more foreigners to solve another labor problem - an acute

shortage of blue collar workers. South Korea has the most highly educated youth in the OECD, with three-quarters of high school students going to college, compared with the average of 44.5 percent. "South Korea is paying the price for its overprotection of top-tier jobs and education fervor that produced a flood of people wanting only that small number of top jobs," said Ban Ga-woon, a labor market researcher at state-run Korea Research Institute for Vocational

Education & Training.

Even amid a glut of over-educated and under-employed graduates, most refuse to "get their hands dirty", says Lim Chaewook, who manages a factory making cable trays that employs 90 people in Ansan, southwest of Seoul. "Locals simply don't want this job cause they think its degrading, so we're forced to hire a lot of foreign workers," Lim said, pointing to nearly two dozens workers from the Philippines, Vietnam and China working in safety masks behind welding machines.

In the southwestern city of Gwangju, Kim Yong-gu, the chief executive of Kia Motor supplier Hyundai Hitech, says foreign workers are more expensive but he has no choice as he can't find enough locals to fill vacancies. "We pay for accommodation, meals and other utility costs in order not to

lose them to another factory," said Kim. Out of a staff of 70, 13 are Indonesian nationals, who sleep and eat at a building next to his factory.

No happy ending for everyone

For those who escaped Korea's tough job market, not all has been rosy. Several people who found overseas jobs with government help say they ended up taking menial work, such as dishwashing in Taiwan and meat processing in rural Australia, or were misinformed about pay and conditions. Lee Sun-hyung, a 30-year old athletics major, used K-move to go to Sydney to work as a swim coach in 2017 but earned less than \$A600 (\$419) a month, one-third what her government handlers told her in Seoul.

"It wasn't what I had hoped for. I could not even afford to pay rent," said Lee, who ended up cleaning windows at a fashion store part-time before she returned home broke less than a year later. Officials say they are making a "black list" of employers and improving the vetting process to prevent recurrence of such cases. The labour ministry also established a "support and reporting centre" to better respond to problems.— Reuters

A senior Iranian lawmaker said "saboteurs from a third country" could be behind it, after saying on Sunday the incident showed the security of Gulf states was fragile.

Highlighting international concerns, Britain's Foreign Minister Jeremy Hunt warned of the risks of "a conflict happening by accident" with an unintended escalation between Washington and Tehran over an unravelling nuclear deal. Washington withdrew last year from a 2015 pact between Iran and global powers aimed at reining in Tehran's nuclear plans. Since then, the United States has ratcheted up sanctions on Iran, saying it wanted to reduce its oil exports

Chokepoint

A fifth of global oil consumption passes through the Strait of Hormuz from Middle East crude producers to major markets in Asia, Europe, North America and beyond. The narrow waterway separates Iran from the Arabian Peninsula. Iran's Revolutionary Guards, designated a terrorist organization by the United States, threatened last month to close the chokepoint if Tehran was barred from using it.

Oil prices rose yesterday, with Brent crude futures at \$71.71 a barrel by 0912 GMT, up \$1.09. Saudi Energy Minister Khalid al-Falih said that one of the two Saudi vessels was attacked in the UAE economic zone on its way

to be loaded with Saudi crude from Ras Tanura port for delivery to state-owned Aramco's customers in the United States.

The attack did not cause any casualties or an oil spill but caused significant damage to the vessels' structures, he said in a statement. Trading and shipping sources identified the Saudi vessels as very large crude carrier (VLCC) tanker Amjad and crude tanker Al Marzoqah, both owned by Saudi shipping firm Bahri, which did not respond to a Reuters request for comment.

The UAE Foreign Ministry had said there were no casualties and the Fujairah port operations were normal. An investigation was launched in coordination with international authorities, it said, calling on global powers to prevent any parties trying to harm maritime safety and security. Gulf stock markets fell yesterday, with the index in Dubai, the region's trade and business hub, down 2.6% and the Saudi index down over 2%.

Kuwait condemns attacks

Meanwhile, Kuwait yesterday voiced "strong condemnation" of vandalism acts that targeted four ships near the UAE territorial waters late Sunday. A source at the Ministry of Foreign affairs, in a statement, branded the act as "criminal", as it is seen as a blatant breach of international law and an escalation of tensions in the region; jeopardizing its safety, as well as the one of maritime traffic and the overall world trade and energy supply. Such act must be internationally encountered in a swift manner in order to limit its serious aftershocks, the source said in a statement. Kuwait reaffirms its supportive stance with the UAE to secure its stability and maintain its sovereignty, concluded the statement.

Sunni Muslim allies Saudi Arabia and the UAE have backed US sanctions against Shiite Iran, a fellow OPEC producer but regional foe. After the United States ended all sanctions waivers that had allowed some nations to continue importing Iranian crude, Washington said Riyadh and Abu Dhabi would help compensate for any shortage in oil supply.

Falih said the attack aimed to undermine maritime freedom and the security of oil supplies to consumers worldwide. "The international community has a joint responsibility to protect the safety of maritime navigation and the security of oil tankers, to mitigate against the adverse consequences of such incidents on energy markets and the danger they pose to the global economy," he said.

Iranian Foreign Ministry spokesman Abbas Mousavi said the incident "has a negative impact on maritime transportation security" and asked regional countries to be "vigilant against destabilizing plots of foreign agents", the semi-official ISNA news agency reported. The US Maritime Administration said in an advisory on Sunday that incidents off Fujairah, one of the seven emirates that make up the UAE, had not been confirmed and urged caution.

The Maritime Administration had said earlier this month that US commercial ships including oil tankers sailing through Middle East waterways could be targeted by Iran in one of the threats to US interests posed by Tehran. Washington said it was sending a US aircraft carrier and other forces to the Middle East due to what it said were Iranian threats, while Tehran has called the US military presence "a target" rather than a threat. Iran has said it would not allow its oil exports to be halted. — Agencies

New Delhi hit by rare summer air pollution alert

NEW DELHI: New Delhi suffered a rare summer air pollution alert yesterday as dust storms and heat over northern India took smog to hazardous levels. The world's most polluted capital city is blanketed in a toxic smog of car fumes, agricultural smoke and factory waste most winters, but it is less severe in summer months.

Summer months.

Yesterday, the Indian government's air quality index hit "very poor" with PM 2.5 particles, the most harmful, at 154 micrograms per cubic meter, five times the normal safe level. Clouds of dust swirled around the streets and many people brought out masks generally used in win-

ter. "Right now we are in the thunderstorm

season. High speed winds are raising a lot of dust but we think it is only transient and will change in a day or two, when it rains," V K Soni, an India Meteorological Department official, told AFP.

Pollution levels started rising the day after a top minister promised that Delhi's air would be clean in three years because of action taken by the government. "Our government has done 100 per cent corruption-free, transparent, time-bound, result-oriented and quality work and that is why Delhi will be free of air and water pollution in the next three years," Transport and Water Resources Minister Nitin Gadkari told an election-campaign press conference last Thursday. — AFP



Ryu takes no-hitter into 8th as Dodgers blank Nationals

Pillar's single caps Giants' comeback win over Reds

LOS ANGELES: Hyun-Jin Ryu no-hit the visiting Washington Nationals for 7 1/3 innings as the Los Angeles Dodgers won the finale of a four-game series 6-0 on Sunday afternoon. Ryu (5-1) threw eight shutout innings to extend his overall shutout streak to 24 innings. He allowed one hit, struck out nine and walked one while lowering his ERA to 1.72. Ryu was coming off a complete-game shutout against the Atlanta Braves on Tuesday. He needed only 93 pitches in that win but threw a career-high 116 on Sunday. Corey Seager hit a grand slam in the bottom of the eighth and drove in five runs for the Dodgers. Cody Bellinger went 3-for-3 with a walk and two runs scored, and Russell Martin had two hits.

Yankees 7, Rays 1

Masahiro Tanaka won an early pitching duel as New York defeated Tampa Bay in St. Petersburg, Fla. Rays left-hander Blake Snell (3-4) took the loss. The reigning AL Cy Young winner struck out 12 battersone short of his career high-in just 5 2/3 innings. Tanaka (3-3) struck out seven and allowed just five hits and no walks in seven innings. He also retired 12 consecutive batters from the second through the sixth innings and fired first-pitch strikes to 19 of the 26 hitters he faced. In all, Tanaka required just 73 pitches, 55 for strikes.

Cubs 4, Brewers 1

Jon Lester pitched 6 2/3 strong innings and Kris Bryant slugged a two-run homer as host Chicago defeated Milwaukee. Lester (3-1) limited the Brewers to one run (none earned) while allowing nine hits, walking one and striking out six. Bryant went 3-for-4 with three runs scored and two RBIs. Jhoulys Chacin (3-4) took the loss for the Brewers. He allowed six hits, one walk and two runs (one earned) in six innings.

Red Sox 11, Mariners 2

Michael Chavis had three hits and five RBIs, and J.D. Martinez homered twice as Boston took advantage of porous defense from visiting Seattle in rainy conditions to complete a three-game sweep. Xander Bogaerts walked a career-high four times, and Rafael Devers had his third straight three-hit game as the Red Sox extended their season-best winning streak to five games. Boston has won 11 of its last 13, outscoring opponents 100-37 in that stretch. Omar Narvaez homered for the second straight day for the Mariners, who have dropped 12 of their last 14 and were outscored 34-8 in the series.

Pirates 10, Cardinals 6

Josh Bell went 4-for-4 with a career-high five RBIs and visiting Pittsburgh rallied for a 10-6 win against St. Louis in the finale of a four-game series. Francisco Cervelli collected three hits, Gregory Polanco had two hits and scored three runs, and Adam Frazier and Colin Moran had two-run doubles for the Pirates, who have won three in a row. Jose Martinez had three hits, scored two runs and drove in two for St. Louis. Paul

Goldschmidt had two hits, including a two-run homer, to finish 9-for-17 in the series.

Astros 15, Rangers 5

Corbin Martin excelled in his major league debut, while Alex Bregman and George Springer each hit two homers for Houston, which completed its first fourgame home sweep over Texas. Martin (1-0), a second-round pick by the Astros in 2017, allowed two runs on three hits and one walk over 5 1/3 innings. The Houston native's nine strikeouts tied for the second most in franchise history in a debut. The Astros provided Martin ample run support, starting with Springer producing his 29th career leadoff home run against Texas starter Adrian Sampson (0-3).

Giants 6, Reds 5

Kevin Pillar's tiebreaking single in the eighth inning rallied San Francisco past visiting Cincinnati. Trailing 5-4 after Cincinnati took the lead in the top of the eighth, San Francisco tied it on an RBI groundout by Mac Williamson off reliever David Hernandez (0-2) before Pillar singled to center. Tony Watson (2-0) got the win after getting two outs in the eighth, and Will Smith notched his 10th save.

Indians 5, Athletics 3

Roberto Perez belted a go-ahead, three-run homer in the sixth inning as visiting Cleveland averted a three-game series sweep against Oakland. Carlos Santana had an RBI double and Jordan Luplow added a sacrifice fly for the Indians, who won for just the second time in their last 11 games in Oakland. Jefry Rodriguez (1-2), who saw Cleveland shut out in two of his other three starts this season, welcomed the run support on Sunday. He picked up his first win after allowing three runs on six hits in six innings. He walked three and struck out three.

Rockies 10, Padres 7

Charlie Blackmon drove in three runs with a pair of homers, Daniel Murphy hit a three-run double and Raimel Tapia followed with a two-run homer in a five-run seventh inning as Colorado defeated visiting San Diego. Antonio Senzatela (3-2), who retired 14 straight hitters before Wil Myers singled with two outs in the seventh, allowed three runs on four hits over 6 2/3 innings. He walked two and struck out seven, as the Rockies won the rubber match of the three-game series. Blackmon homered twice off Padres left-handed rookie starter Nick Margevicius, who fell to 2-4.

He scattered nine hits over five innings and struck out seven. Four members of the Braves bullpen covered the final four innings, with Luke Jackson pitching the eighth and ninth to earn his fourth save. Zack Godley (1-3) returned to the starting rotation for Arizona after making two relief appearances.

He went only two innings, allowing four hits and one run, with two strikeouts.

Spieth says he is close to top form

NEW YORK: Jordan Spieth will have a third opportunity to complete the career grand slam at the PGA Championship this week, but his form is a far cry from that which saw him ranked third in the world as recently as this time last year.

Spieth has not won since the 2017 British Open and, more troubling, has not even contended at any tournament he has played this year.

He showed glimpses of his old self at the Byron Nelson tournament in his home city of Dallas at the weekend, but ultimtely finished a disappointing equal 29th after a mediocre final round.

Spieth says that he is happy with every part of his game except his driving and that he is close to getting that area back to where he wants it.

"I really think I've done a good job now of embracing the struggle," he said last week. "My last four to six starts, I've been a couple of tee balls away from really having a chance to win and that's without feeling like I had my best stuff.

"So, just tightening up the tee game is really the key at this point. The rest of it is really coming together."

Several former players, however, are not quite so sure a return to form for Spieth is just around the corner.

"He talks about getting comfortable and all sorts of things but it just doesn't look comfortable for me," six-times major champion Nick Faldo said during a conference call last week for CBS television, which will screen the PGA Championship in the United States.

"I watch his hip action, and his leg action, the whole action which leads to balance and power. To me that just doesn't seem right and that's why he's got ... the two-way miss.

"He can block it right and pull it left with the driver."

The two-way miss refers to the dreaded affliction of wondering which side of

the fairway you are going to miss with your bad shots.

Spieth, 29, almost completed the calendar grand slam in 2015, winning the Masters and U.S. Open before contending but falling just short at the British Open and PGA Championship.

His iron play was magnificent back then, his short game sublime and his putting unparalleled, particularly from midrange. He sank so many 20-footers, they began to look almost routine.

Those days are long gone.

"The putting woes have been well-documented. He doesn't have the same confidence because he's now seen an awful lot of misses his last 18 months," said Faldo.

Golf Channel analyst Brandel Chamblee also wonders whether Spieth, who won a third major at the 2017 British Open, will ever find his way back to his previous heights.

"His golf swing has changed so much, it's almost been completely stripped of all of its athleticism," Chamblee said recently. "Spieth was one of the best drivers of the ball his first couple of years on the PGA Tour. People now just think of him as a poor driver of the golf ball.

"It looks to me like he's in a very tough spot. Who knows if he'll ever find his way back? A lot of people who go down that road can't remember how to get back home." As for Spieth's putting, former British Open champion Ian Baker-Finch has noticed the Texan change his routine.

"When you feel a little anxious or confused with aim it throws off your routine and that's what it looks like to me," Australian Baker-Finch, a master putter in his day, told Reuters.

What this will all add up to next week is open to question, but Faldo does not expect it to be pretty.

"It seems like golf's hard work from three or four years ago," he said.

Spieth, however, is shrugging off the criticism. "There's a lot of experts out there that actually have no idea what they're saying," he said. —Reuters

Kang captures first US PGA Tour title at Byron Nelson

DALLAS: South Korea's Kang Sung fired seven birdies in a four-under par 67 on Sunday to claim his first US PGA Tour victory, a two-shot win over Matt Every in the Byron Nelson in Dallas, Texas.

Kang drained a 23-foot birdie putt at 15 to take the lead for good on a marathon day that saw the leaders play 27 holes thanks to the six-hour weather delay on Saturday.

Kang, who equalled the Trinity Forest course record with a bogey-free 10-under 61 on Friday, finished with a 23-under par total of 261. Every had edged ahead by one through nine holes when darkness halted play on Saturday.

But Kang fired three birdies and bogey over the final nine holes of the third round to regain a three-shot lead. Every responded with seven birdies-

including five on the front nine-in a five-

under par 66 in the fourth round. But he was unable to maintain the lead and his 21-under total of 263 was only good enough for a share of second place alongside compatriot Scott Piercy.

Piercy capped a bogey-free tournament-the first on the US PGA Tour since 2010 — with a seven-under 64. Kang strung together three straight birdies at eight, nine and 10. He was unable to get up and down from a green side bunker at the 12th, but he reeled off another trio of birdies at 14, 15 and 16 to move to 24-under for the tournament.

He was three strokes up when he arrived at 18, where his closing bogey proved immaterial. "I'm so happy right now," Kang said after notching his first tour win in his 159th start. "Yesterday we finished too late," Kang said. "I didn't have time to sleep much, only slept about three hours."

Because he knew it would be hard to concentrate, Kang said he told his caddie "I just wanted to be chill and having some fun and then when my turn came just try to really focus in-and it worked out great."

World number three Brooks Koepka fin-

All eyes on Woods even if Koepka the one to beat

NEW YORK: Defending champion Brooks Koepka is the one to beat at this week's PGA Championship even if Tiger Woods will have the boisterous New York galleries on side as one of golf's four major tournaments begins a new era in the spring.

After being held since 1972 in the dog days of summer, the PGA Championship's move to May should ensure milder weather and more attention from US sports fans whose thoughts by August have invariably turned to American football.

For the first time ever in a major championship, every player ranked in the top 100 in the world will tee it up, barring late withdrawals. The field will comprise 156 players, but 155 of them will be in the supporting cast as one man takes centre stage.

Tiger-mania is back in full force after he ended his decade-plus major drought by winning the Masters last month, and Woods is one of the favourites on a course where he lifted the US Open trophy in 2002.

But big, brawny Bethpage, a 7,459-yard course in Farmingdale on Long Island, is arguably less suited for his 43-year-old game than the other major venues this year.

While not short off the tee, Woods is no longer among the game's biggest hitters after his 2017 spinal fusion. He may have to let rip with his driver to hoist the Wanamaker Trophy a fifth time, adding to his previous successes in 1999, 2000, 2006 and 2007.

Fifty players are averaging 300 yards or more on the PGA Tour this year.

Woods, at 200 yards, is respectable, but gone are the days

Woods, at 299 yards, is respectable, but gone are the days when he could overpower a course.

He now gets the job done the old fashioned way, by relentlessly

hitting greens in regulation. At 75 percent, Woods is the year's best on tour at it, which could prove decisive at Bethpage.

Legitimate title chances will line up like jets at nearby JFK airport, but anyone with designs on winning will likely have to contend with the quiet assassin Koepka, who for all his dominance in recent majors remains less than a crowd favourite.

Koepka and Woods have developed a close rivalry at the majors, with Koepka heading a 1-2 finish at the PGA at Bellerive before Woods turned the tables at Augusta, where he clinched his 15th major title. The stoic Koepka does not stand out as superior in any single category of the game, but is good across the board, and his mind is perhaps his best weapon, seemingly immune to pressure. Others with the goods to contend include Europeans Rory McIlroy, Justin Rose, Jon Ram and Tommy Fleetwood, and Americans Dustin Johnson, Justin Thomas and Rickie Fowler. —Reuters

Dhoni eyes Chennai clean-out after losing IPL final to Mumbai

Bumrah best bowler in the world, says Tendulkar

HYDERABAD: Chennai Super Kings skipper M.S. Dhoni suggested his ageing side needs a shake-up after they lost a nail-biting Indian Premier League final to archrivals Mumbai Indians. The thriller saw Mumbai edge out Chennai on Sunday after Australian Shane Watson was run out going for an unlikely second run in the final over to end a blistering 59-ball innings at 80.

Chennai then needed two runs off the last ball to overtake Mumbai's 149-8. But Sri Lanka paceman Lasith Malinga trapped Shardul Thakur lbw to claim a record fourth title for Mumbai. "We need to go back and reflect as to how we reached the finals. I don't think it was one of those years where we played really good cricket and we got into the finals," said Dhoni.

"After the World Cup, once we come back, that's the time we get to the drawing board and see what can be done to fill the gaps. "Nothing against the bowlers, but batting could have been better," said Dhoni, whose team has won three IPL titles from eight

None of Chennai's batsmen made it to the top-10 scorers list in this year's IPL, India's cash-rich domestic Twenty20 showpiece tournament. Dhoni — 37 but still a key member of India's World Cup squad-was Chennai's best with 416 runs, including three fifties.

Watson's return to the IPL next season was already uncertain after the 37-year-old bid farewell to Australia's Big Bash early this year. The Australian allrounder and Dhoni are among the 11 members of the 25-man Chennai squad aged over 30.

'A LOT OF MISTAKES'

Dhoni was run out in Sunday's final for two, leaving the defending champions in trouble at 82-4. "We committed a lot of mistakes and Mumbai Indians also did the same and at the end of the day the winning team was the one that made one mistake less than the other team," said Dhoni, adding that his immediate focus is on the 50-over World Cup starting later this month in

England and Wales.

Kieron Pollard smashed an unbeaten 41 off 25 deliveries for Mumbai while paceman Jasprit Bumrah returned figures of 2-14 from his four overs. The Rohit Sharma-led Mumbai were the team to beat this year in the world's most popular T20 league, ending top of the table after 14 league games.

"We played some good cricket. Good to see we qualified in the top two," said Sharma. "Our bowling in this tournament was excellent. At different stages, our bowlers put their hands up and brought us back in the game.'

Indian cricket great Sachin Tendulkar yesterday hailed Jasprit Bumrah as the "best bowler in the world" after the Mumbai Indians paceman played a key role in his team's fourth Indian Premier League

The 25-year-old took 2-14 in Sunday's IPL final as Mumbai edged Chennai Super Kings by one run in the thrilling finale in Hyderabad. He is set to lead India's pace attack at the World Cup, which starts in England and Wales later this month.

"Without any doubt, let me go on record and say that he is the best bowler in the world at this stage," said Tendulkar, an advisor to the Mumbai team. "The best is yet to come."

With Lasith Malinga giving away 32 runs from his first three overs and Chennai needing 18 off the last 12 balls, Bumrah choked the opposition in the penultimate over and sent Dwayne Bravo back to the pavilion for 15. He was named man-of-the-match for his efforts. "Winning a fourth title for Mumbai makes me very happy," said Bumrah, the top-ranked bowler in the world in the one-day format.

"I was surprisingly very calm. I wasn't panicking, just focusing on the next ball." Bumrah has picked up 85 wickets in 49 ODIs and 51 scalps in 42 T20 games for India since his international debut in January 2016. India begin their World Cup campaign against South Africa in Southampton on June 5.—Agencies

S Africa to appeal against Semenya testosterone ruling

JOHANNESBURG: South Africa yesterday said it would lodge an appeal after Olympic champion Caster Semenya lost her case challenging new rules forcing female athletes to regulate their testosterone levels. Semenya's case has provoked a furious debate across sport worldwide about gender and "hyperandrogenic" athletes, those with "differences of sexual development" (DSD).

The decision on May 1 by the Court of Arbitration for Sport (CAS) in Lausanne,

elevated testosterone will have to take suppressive treatment if they wish to compete as women in certain events. "We'll file the appeal as soon as we possibly can," Vuyo Mhaga, spokesman for the South African sport and recreation ministry, told AFP. The 23-time Grand Slam winner-now ranked 11th-also withdrew from Indian Wells in March complaining through illness. Watched by her husband Alexis Ohanian, Williams doubled faulted on her first match point but sealed victory on her second against her 58th-ranked opponent.

A four-time Rome winner Williams last won on the red clay of at the Foro Italico in 2016. She will play either her older sister Venus, who received a wild card entry to the tournament she won in 1999, or Belgian Elise Mertens in the second round.

Should Serena and Venus meet in Rome, it will be their first meeting on European clay in nearly 17 years. Their last meeting on red clay came at the 2002 Roland Garros final. Serena Williams is preparing for the French Open later this month where she could match Margaret Court's record of major singles titles.

Meanwhile, Novak Djokovic tightened his grip on the ATP tennis rankings Monday following his win in the Madrid Open. The Serbian world number one widened his lead over

Mercedes dominance bad for F1 box office, says Hamilton

BARCELONA: Lewis Hamilton cut short his celebrations after winning the Spanish Grand Prix to warn that Mercedes' dominance could be a menace to Formula One's box office appeal. The defending five-time world champion seized the initiative at the start of Sunday's race and then cruised to his 76th career victory ahead of team-mate Valtteri Bottas, who had started in pole position.

It was the Mercedes pairing's fifth consecutive one-two finish and left rivals Ferrari floundering in pursuit. The two Mercedes drivers are competing against each other ... and it's not much fun for outsiders, admits Hamilton, especially for spectators.

Having hoped to see a Ferrari renaissance at the Circuit de Catalunya, where they were so dominant in pre-season testing, Hamilton was disappointed again at their lack of pace, which, almost incredibly, prompted paddock talk of the Silver Arrows winning all 21 races.

Mercedes locked out the front row of the grid and then took a stranglehold on the race in such fashion that some observers talked of them being 'the invincibles' with 16 races remaining including the classic Monaco Grand Prix later this month.

That street circuit challenge will be very different to all that has gone before, but rivals have already installed Mercedes as favourites and the drivers' championship as a two-man race. Hamilton is hopeful that for the sake of the sport, any such scenario

Guardiola hailed as 'obsessive' genius behind City winning machine

Reds post third-highest Premier League points tally ever with 97

LONDON: Pep Guardiola was eulogised yesterday for his relentless hunger for success that propelled Manchester City to a second consecutive Premier League title after a titanic battle with Liverpool. Guardiola claimed his eighth league title in 10 seasons as a coach in charge of Barcelona, Bayern Munich and City as the English champions followed up their record 100-point campaign last season with another stunning 98-point season thanks to a 4-1 victory at Brighton.

That meant Liverpool's long wait for a first league title since 1990 continued despite the Reds posting the thirdhighest Premier League points tally ever with 97 after they beat Wolves 2-0 on Sunday.

"Pep's party," ran the headline in the Guardian newspaper. "The only real world star in this set-up is the manager. 'They didn't go for (Cristiano) Ronaldo or (Lionel) Messi but invested in fine young players, almost all of whom have been pushed to the outer levels of their talent."

City became the first side in a decade to retain the title as Guardiola's demands ensured there was no drop-off at the Etihad as has happened in the seasons that followed title wins under Roberto Mancini and Manuel Pellegrini.

"Manchester City could buy great players, good enough to take them up the mountain, but they could never stay there. Because you cannot buy hunger, the sustaining daily hunger that drove the greatest teams of other eras," said the Independent.

"Senior officials at City say that they have never seen as much focus and character from a City side in the modern era as what they have seen this season. "This is the opposite of what we have come to expect from champion City sides. And it is a vindication of the daily intensity and demands of their obsessive manager."

Liverpool, whose season could still end in glory if they win the Champions League next month, were also praised

for the contribution they made to a thrilling race. "Nothing underscores the brilliance of Pep Guardiola's team more than the presence of Liverpool a short neck behind. Liverpool are, without doubt, one of the greatest teams the competition has ever seen," said the Daily Mail.

"Encapsulating this campaign is a battle of superlatives. Liverpool were amazingly good. Incredibly, City were even better." Liverpool manager Jurgen Klopp said this season is just the beginning of a journey for his side, but in their three-decade wait to win the league, the Reds have finished second before and failed to build on it the following season. "They're entitled to wonder, given that they've pulled one of the most stupendous league campaigns in history and still fallen short, what more can be done?" added the Independent.

Klopp pointed to City's financial power, backed by the club's Abu Dhabi owners, as a principal reason why they will not be easy to overhaul. However, unlike Manchester United, who ended the season as close to the relegation zone as they were to City, 32 points behind the champions in sixth, City have invested their money wisely.

"More than half a billion pounds lavished on one of the most expensive and brilliant squads ever assembled. But we only have to look down the road at Manchester United to know that you can pour millions down the drain," said The Times. "The danger, when City have smashed so many records in two years of domestic domination — 198 league points from a possible 228, 19 domestic cup ties won out of 20 — is that it is regarded as easy, normal, expected. Those figures suggest a relentless machine.

Juventus lose stripes and match as Florenzi, Dzeko keep Roma's **CL** hopes alive

MILAN: Alessandro Florenzi and Edin Dzeko scored late as Roma beat Juventus 2-0 to keep their hopes of Champions League football next season alive on Sunday. Dzeko set up Florenzi for the first after 79 minutes in the Stadio Olimpico with the Bosnian then slotting in the second two minutes into injury time as Juventus fell to just their third defeat this season.

The defeat came on the day that Juventus displayed their new strip which no longer features the club's iconic black and white stripes in a breakaway from over a century of tradition. Massimiliano Allegri's side have not won a match since sealing an eighth consecutive Scudetto, being held to 1-1 draws in their last two games against Inter Milan and Torino.

Roma needed a win after their Champions League rivals Atalanta, AC Milan, Torino and Lazio all won their games this weekend. Juventus and Napoli have already booked their berths in next season's elite European berths with two places remaining.

Atalanta beat Genoa 2-1 on Saturday to move third two points ahead of Inter Milan, who play bottom club Chievo. AC Milan also won 1-0 against Fiorentina 1-0, and are one point behind Inter in fifth, with Roma equal on points with

Milan, with two games left to play. "A great (goalkeeper Antonio) Mirante kept us up in the first half but I am satisfied with the game," said Roma coach Claudio Ranieri. "We must continue to believe in it. Even if not everything depends on us, we must reach the

end with a clear conscience." Playing in their new jersies, Juventus with nothing left to play for, and with growing speculation over Allegri's future, failed to take advantage of their first half domination. Mirante pulled off towering saves, denying Juan Cuadrado and Paulo Dybala.

After the break Cristiano Ronaldo had the ball in the back of the net after 64 minutes but was ruled offside. But Roma captain Florenzi, perhaps annoyed by Ronaldo who had just made fun of his size, turned things around when

he picked up a Dzeko cross to break the deadlock. Dzeko added the second in injury time as Roma join AC

Milan on 62 points, with Torino, now two points behind, lropping out of the European places into seventh.

Torino captain Andrea Belotti scored a brace including the winner with a spectacular overhead kick in a come from behind 3-2 win over ten-man Sassuolo. Belotti missed a penalty after 17 minutes in Turin but made up with two second-half goals.

'We knew very well how important it was to win today," said Belotti. "We have to fly low, there are still two games left and we have to win them." Mehdi Bourabia put Sassuolo ahead after 27 minutes, but the visitors played a man down for most of the game as the Moroccan midfielder was sent off for a second yellow card after celebrating by pulling his jersey over his head.

Belotti almost scored after the break but Sassuolo goalkeeper Andrea Consigli denied his overhead kick. The Torino captain grabbed the equaliser on 56 minutes, but Sassuolo charged back with Jeremie Boga racing down the

The three points could also be vital for Torino's Europa League hopes, with their final two games against struggling Empoli and Lazio. Sassuolo are sitting in tenth position. Empoli kept their hopes of Serie A survival alive with a 2-1 win at Sampdoria.

Fabio Quagliarella pulled a goal back for Sampdoria converting a penalty in injury time to take his Serie A leading tally to 26 goals-five more than Juventus star Ronaldo. Napoli beat SPAL 2-1 in a game with nothing to play for as Carlo Ancelotti's side are already assured of second place and SPAL have staved off relegation. — AFP

Gambian international Barrow broke through immediately after being introduced as a substitute at the break. His first goal this season in a 2-1 win over Genoa put Atalanta third in Serie A and close to a first Champions League qualification.

MEHDI BOURABIA (Sassuolo)

Moroccan midfielder Bourabia put Sassuolo ahead after 27 minutes against Torino but was sent off immediately after for a second yellow card after celebrating by pulling his jersey over his head, as his side fell to a 3-2 defeat.

GERMANY ANTHONY UJAH (Mainz)

The Nigerian scored twice in four minutes soon

after half-time to give Mainz a 2-0 Bundesliga win at Eintracht Frankfurt, who were beaten on penalties by Chelsea in a Europa League semi-final last Thursday. It was a surprise result as Frankfurt are six places above Mainz and the loss completed a disastrous eight days for Eintracht after a 6-1 drubbing at Bayer Leverkusen last weekend.

IHLAS BEBOU (Hanover)

Togolese striker Bebou found the net for Hanover against Freiburg, but even a 3-0 win was not enough to save his side from relegation. Bebou prodded the ball in from close range to score Hanover's second as they picked up only a fifth win of the season.

SALOMON KALOU (Hertha Berlin)

Ivorian veteran Kalou scored an injury-time penalty to snatch a late 4-3 victory for Hertha in an entertaining dead-rubber in Augsburg. Hertha went behind three times, but Kalou equalised after 75 minutes before completing his brace from 12 yards with the last kick of the game.

CHADRAC AKOLO (Stuttgart)

Democratic Republic of Congo international Akolo made his first appearance since February as Stuttgart secured the relegation play-off place with a 3-0 win over Wolfsburg. The midfielder fell out of favour under former coach Markus Weinzierl, but interim boss Nico Willig welcomed Akolo back into the fold on Saturday.

AMADOU HAIDARA (RB Leipzig)

The Mali international came off the bench as Leipzig spoiled Bayern Munich's title party with a 0-0 draw. Bayern missed the chance to wrap up a seventh consecutive title as Borussia Dortmund clawed back two points with a win over Fortuna Duesseldorf to send the title race to the wire. — AFP

Liverpool seek 'perfection' in bid to dethrone Pep's City

LONDON: "If you are second you are nothing," said former Liverpool manager Bill Shankly. But rarely can a runner-up have been more proud of falling just short than Liverpool in the Premier League this season. Shankly won three league titles on Merseyside in the pre-Premier League era and built the foundations for two decades of dominance that endured even after he departed. Yet even he could not conceive of amassing 97 points in a league season, let alone that mark only being good enough for second place.

Liverpool's points tally was not just a club record, but the third-highest in Premier League history, behind only Manchester City's 98 this season and City's haul of 100 points in romping to the title

Unfortunately for Jurgen Klopp's men, it will be Pep Guardiola's champions they have to beat again to end a 30-year wait for a league title next season. "As long as City are around, with the quality they have, the financial power and all that stuff, it's not that any other team will pass them easily," said Klopp, whose side lost only one league game all season, to City in January, and still missed out.

"You need to be very, very close to perfection to win the Premier League as long as this is the case." City's wealth in the decade since the club was bought by Sheikh Mansour, a member of Abu Dhabi's royal family, has transformed the blue half of Manchester into serial winners.

Sunday's title triumph was their fourth in the past eight seasons, but City have not always made the most of their new-found wealth, drifting under Roberto Mancini and Manuel Pellegrini after previous

Guardiola is the point of difference. The Catalan has now won the league in eight of his 10 seasons as a top-flight coach in three different countries with Barcelona, Bayern Munich and City.

Worryingly for the competition, Guardiola insisted City will only get stronger next season. But the notoriously intense Catalan also has a history of not overstaying his welcome. Next season will be his fourth in Manchester, matching his longest managerial stint so far at Barca, after which he required a year's sabbatical, citing exhaustion.

"I cannot deny I am so tired, but at the same time winning the title gives you a lot of energy," said Guardiola on Sunday. "Winning is so addictive." Liverpool's fate in the coming years may ultimately depend on how long the drug of winning sustains Guardiola at the Etihad.

There will also be a fear on Merseyside that Liverpool have come close before, most notably under Rafael Benitez a decade ago and Brendan Rodgers in 2013/14 and failed to take the next step a season later.

The stars may not align the same way next season. Huge goalkeeping errors from Everton's Jordan Pickford and Tottenham's Hugo Lloris kept Liverpool on City's coattails with late winners.

City may have sped away into the distance had Riyad Mahrez not blasted a late penalty over the bar when the sides met at Anfield in a 0-0 draw in October, while the champions suffered shock defeats in December to Crystal Palace and Leicester thanks to wonder strikes from Andros Townsend and

However, unlike previous near misses when Xabi Alonso and Luis Suarez soon departed for Spain, this Liverpool side look built for the long term. Mohamed Salah, Roberto Firmino, Sadio Mane, Virgil van Dijk and Alisson Becker have been tied down to long-term

Flying full-backs Andy Robertson, 25, and Trent Alexander-Arnold, 20, should only get better with age. Big summer signings Fabinho and Naby Keita grew as the campaign went on and should kick on in their second season in the Premier League. — AFP

Mahrez stars for champions City

PARIS: Algeria winger and 2016 African Footballer of the Year Riyad Mahrez created the second goal and scored the third for Manchester City as they won a second successive Premier League title.

He was the stand-out African in Europe at the weekend as star-stacked City triumphed 4-1 at lowly Brighton to pip Liverpool by one point after a thrilling race. A Mahrez corner allowed Aymeric Laporte to nod City into a 2-1 first-half lead and the north African struck the third goal on 63 minutes to put his side firmly on the path to glory.

ENGLAND RIYAD MAHREZ (Manchester City)

City dominated the second half at Brighton and with 63 minutes gone the 28-year-old Algerian cut in from the wing and unleashed a right-foot shot that gave his club a 3-1 advantage. France-born Mahrez has two Premier League winners medals having been part of the Leicester City side that sensationally became champions three years ago.

SADIO MANE (Liverpool)

Senegalese Mane scored twice in Liverpool's 2-0 win against Wolves to earn a share of the Premier League's Golden Boot award. The Senegal forward, 27, ended the season with 22 league goals, level with teammate and last year's winner Mohamed Salah of Egypt as Liverpool finished on 97 points, one behind Manchester City.

PIERRE-EMERICK AUBAMEYANG (Arsenal)

Arsenal forward Aubameyang grabbed a share of the Premier League Golden Boot award with two goals in a 3-



Hughton sacked as Brighton manager

LONDON: Chris Hughton was sacked as manager of Brighton and Hove Albion after four-and-a-half years at the helm, the Premier League club said in a statement yesterday.

Hughton led Brighton into the top flight in 2017, ending a 34-year absence, and they have just survived their second season despite failing to win any of their last nine games.

"Undoubtedly, this has been one of the most difficult decisions I have had to make as chairman of Brighton and Hove Albion, but ultimately one I have made due to how we struggled in the second half of the season," chairman Tony Bloom said.

"Chris has done an excellent job, first stabilising our club, reaching the play-offs in his first full season, securing our first ever promotion to the Premier League, and retaining our status in successive seasons."
