## Green thumbs set record for 'largest gardening lesson'

KUWAIT: A new world record for the world's 'largest gardening lesson' was set at Shaheed Park vesterday during an event hosted by HGTV and beIN. The event showed the great interest of the local community in gardening and planting. All participants had registered in advance, which was open to people of all nationalities and ages.

Led by influential gardening expert Alzainah Al-Babtain, 286 participants were taught the essentials on growing their own

Ahmed Gamal Gabr, official adjudicator from Guinness World Records, the global authority on record-breaking

KUWAIT: In a rare event, the defense and interior ministers clashed in public yesterday by issuing statements attacking each other. The clash came just two days after the government resigned over alleged infighting among its members and after lawmakers filed no-confidence motions against two ministers following grillings, one of them against the interior minister.

Interior Minister Sheikh Khaled Al-Jarrah Al-Sabah was the defense minister between 2013 and 2016 and became interior minister after the appointment of Sheikh Nasser Sabah Al-Ahmad Al-Sabah in late 2017 as defense

minister. In his statement posted on the army's Twitter account, Sheikh Nasser said he referred discovered embezzlements of KD 240 million from the Kuwaiti army fund when Sheikh Khaled was the minister.

Sheikh Nasser also said he has referred to the public prosecution Sheikh Khaled

himself and five top defense ministry officials over the alleged embezzlements. He said he had asked the prime minister to take action against the embezzlements and that he stopped attending meetings of the Cabinet until the action was taken.

He said Prime Minister Sheikh Jaber Al-Muabrak Al-Sabah eventually responded by setting an investigation committee to probe the allegations. Sheikh Nasser however said this was not satisfactory to him and accordingly sent the issue to the public prosecution. The defense minister also said the resignation of the Cabinet was not to give time to allow reshuffling the Cabinet but to avoid answering questions over the graft in the army fund.

The interior minister lashed back by saying that he had felt

great pain over the leaks on social media that contained unfounded and unsubstantiated accusations that undermined his reputation and the image of his family, adding "loyal Kuwaitis" do not do so. The

# One dead as petrol protests spread in Iran

TEHRAN: One person was killed and others injured in protests that spread vesterday across Iran after a surprise decision to impose petrol price hikes and rationing in the sanctions-hit country. The death Friday occurred in the central city of Sirjan, where protesters tried to set a fuel depot ablaze but were thwarted by security forces, the semi-official ISNA news agency reported. Demonstrations broke out hours after it was announced the price of petrol would be increased by 50 percent for the first 60 litres and 300 percent for anything above that each month.

"Unfortunately someone was killed," Sirjan's acting governor Mohammad Mahmoudabadi said, adding it was still unclear if the civilian had been "shot or not". "Security forces did not have permission to shoot and were only allowed to fire warning shots... which they did," ISNA quoted him as

saying. It was a "calm gathering" exploited by some who "destroyed public property, damaged fuel stations and also wanted to access the oil company's main fuel depots and set fire to them", he added.

Besides Sirjan, "scattered" protests were also held Friday in other cities including Abadan, Ahvaz, Bandar Abbas, Birjand, Gachsaran, Khoramshahr, Mahshahr, Mashhad and Shiraz, state news agency IRNA said. Some "rioters" in Ahvaz torched a bank and in Khoramshahr "suspicious and unknown armed individuals" opened fire and injured a number of people, state television's website said. In other cities, protests were mostly limited to blocking traffic and were over by midnight, it added.

Police fired tear gas at protesters in some cities, state television said, without specifying when. It accused "hostile media" of trying to use fake news and videos on social media to exaggerate protests as "large and extensive". Prosecutor general Mohammad Jafar Montazeri laid the blame for incidents on a "few disruptors" whose actions showed they opposed the system.

But fresh demonstrations were held yesterday in the cities of Doroud, Garmsar, Gorgan, Ilam, Karaj, Khoramabad, Mehdishahr, Qazvin, Qom, Sanandaj, Shahroud and Shiraz, IRNA said. "Some drivers have protested the new petrol price by turning off their cars and creating traffic jams," it added. Iran imposed petrol rationing and raised pump prices by at least 50 percent from Friday, saying the move

was aimed at helping needy citizens. The measure was expected to generate 300 trillion rials (\$2.55 billion) per annum, the authorities said. About 60 million Iranians would receive payments ranging from 550,000 rials (\$4.68) for couples to slightly more than two million rials (\$17.46) for families of five or more. Under the scheme, drivers with fuel cards would pay 15,000 rials (13 US cents) a litre for the first 60 litres of petrol bought each month, with each additional litre costing 30,000 rials.

Fuel cards were first introduced in 2007 with a view to reforming the subsidies system and curbing large-scale smuggling. Iran's economy has been battered since May last year when President Donald Trump unilaterally withdrew the US from a 2015 nuclear agreement and reimposed crippling sanctions.



Mild quake jolts Kuwait

KUWAIT: A 3.4magnitude quake jolted the northern Rawdatain area at 9:19 pm on Friday, the national seismological network, an affiliate of Kuwait Institute for Scientific Research (KISR), reported. The epi-



center of the quake was three kilometers underground, the network's supervisor Abdullah Al-Enzi said. "Some residents felt the quake in Abdaly; it was followed by aftershocks ranging in magnitude between 1.2 and 2.2 degrees," he added. — KUNA

TEHRAN: Heavy snowfall blanketed the streets of north Tehran yesterday, causing traffic chaos and forcing the closure of schools, authorities in the Iranian capital said. Crews of municipal workers were battling to clear roads and pavements in parts of the capital, where snow began falling at the start of the morning rush hour and continued through

# Venice braced for more floods, strong winds

VENICE: Venice was on alert for more floods and fierce winds yesterday after an exceptionally high tide swamped the city of canals, where authorities have declared a state of emergency. Mayor Luigi Brugnaro ordered the iconic St Mark's Square closed on Friday as the latest sea surge struck with strong storms and winds battering the region.

The square was open again yesterday, but the city forecast a high water of 160 cm for today, lower than Tuesday's high of 187 cm but still dangerous. Civil protection authorities downgraded a weather "red alert" for the Venice region to orange, with yesterday's midday high forecast to be a manageable 105 cm.

Churches, shops and homes in the city, a UNESCO World Heritage site, have been inundated by unusually intense "acqua alta", or high water, which on Tuesday hit its highest level in half a century. "We've destroyed Venice, we're talking about one billion (euros) in damage," Brugnaro said.

The Italian football team travelled to Venice yesterday to show solidarity with the stricken city. "On behalf of the whole team, we stand close to the city of Venice," said Italy goalkeeper Gianluigi Donnarumma. The Italian football federation delegation visited several businesses damaged by the flooding, and chatted with Venetians, volunteers and police. "Venice will overcome

this too. Like an athlete who suffers a serious injury and then gets up again," said delegation chief and former Azzurri international Gianluca Vialli.

The crisis has prompted the government to release €20 million (\$22 million) in funds to tackle the devastation. Surveying the damage, Culture Minister Dario Franceschini warned the task of repairing the city would be huge. More than 50 churches had suffered damage, he said.

Prime Minister Giuseppe Conte declared a state of emergency for the city on Thursday. Residents whose houses have been hit are eligible for up to €5,000 in

## Trump 'intimidating' to ex-envoy as new call details revealed

WASHINGTON: A US ambassador ousted by Donald Trump told a riveting impeachment hearing Friday she felt intimidated by the president, after he launched an extraordinary real-time attack midway through her testimony to Congress. Testifying under oath before a national television audience, Marie Yovanovitch cut a resolute figure as she was grilled for five hours on her fraught dealings with Trump allies she accuses of undermining US foreign policy in Ukraine.

The 33-year diplomatic veteran earned a standing ovation from the public at the conclusion of her marathon testimony, during which spoke in personal terms about how she was subjected to a "painful" smear campaign before being abruptly pulled from Kiev. Setting the scene less than an hour into the hearing, the president erupted spectacularly on Twitter with an attack on the highly-regarded former envoy.

"Everywhere Marie Yovanovitch went turned bad," he wrote. Asked what effect Trump's tweet might have on her and other witnesses, Yovanovitch appeared unnerved. "It's very intimidating," she told the panel. "I can't speak to what the president is trying to do but I think the effect is to be intimidating." On a momentous day on Capitol Hill, another official provided damning closed-door testimony to impeachment

An investigation was opened to reveal the circumstances behind the accident. Meanwhile, a collision of bicycles on Sheikh Jaber Causeway caused five light injuries yesterday. The injured were transferred to Sabah Hospital. An investigation was opened.

#### Heart attack

The interior ministry's relations and security information department explained that the death of an Arab man found in a Farwaniya park was of natural causes. Those who were there said the man was exercising and suffered a heart attack. The coroner confirmed the death was of natural causes.

#### Fight

The relations and security information department said a video clip that showed a fight between several


men in front of a chalet took place last week and police did not receive any call about the incident. It said police are taking the necessary action.

The estranged husband said the woman kept insulting and threatening him and filed a custody case at the family court. Furthermore, the man said he did not marry her, and the complaint was rejected. The man does not have a criminal record. Investigations continue.

#### Kuwaiti house

ast month, His Highness the Amir of Kuwait Sheikh Sabah Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah inaugurated the last session of the current National Assembly, which was elected in 2016. But the Kuwaiti political scene in recent weeks has witnessed several movements by different parliamentary and popular groups - silent public protests, parliamentary grillings and consultations between political groups. Islamists, former MPs and independents are all preparing for the next election scheduled in 2020.

Last week was a feverish week for political action between the government and the National Assembly, which opposes the government's administration and its handling of public issues. His Highness the Prime Minister Sheikh Jaber Al-Mubarak Al-Sabah presented the resignation of the government to His Highness the Amir in order to rearrange ministerial work. This is the seventh resignation of the government, the latest of which was formed in Dec 2017.

The government is now gone, but the National Assembly remains. Speaker of the National Assembly Marzouq Al-Ghanem said His Highness the Amir does not intend to dissolve the parliament at this time. Last Tuesday witnessed grillings of the ministers of public works and interior. The minister of public works, who is also the minister of state for housing affairs, announced her resignation after a stormy questioning session.

My wish now, as a citizen, voter and woman, is that the government will bring personalities who are willing and capable of cooperating and working with all political parties, including deputies and people. There are important issues for the people and the government needs to address them radically. The first is the loans of retirees from the social security body, and they are not a large category. There is also the problem of stateless residents (bedoons), which has been declared by Ghanem as an important political and humanitarian issue. Other topics such as unemployment and the high cost of living need to be addressed.

People need the legislative and executive authorities to rearrange the priorities of the people, and every voter must not fall behind their role and ignore their responsibility as a citizen. Therefore, it is not surprising that the general atmosphere is dominated by preparations for the upcoming election. It is the right of people to demand reform and achieve the best. The government, the parliament and the people are all under one roof of our Kuwaiti house.

While the weather in Kuwait is getting cold, it is not so on the political level, especially with the next elections scheduled for 2020.

## Morphine behind most drug overdose deaths in Kuwait

KUWAIT: Recent security statistics showed morphine was responsible for the majority of drug overdose-related deaths in Kuwait, killing around 30 citizens. The study also showed that abusing benzodiazepine sedatives was the next leading cause of death, amphetamines third, methamphetamines fourth and hashish fifth. Statistics also showed that overdoses had killed 75 citizens and expats of various nationalities since the beginning of 2019. According to statistics, the ages of most victims varied between 23 and 35, followed by the age category of 36-50, 18-22 and 51-60, with a majority of male victims.

#### Ethiopian maids

Kuwait union of domestic helper office owners urged the foreign ministry to accelerate the process of

signing a cooperation agreement with Ethiopia in order to open more sources for domestic helpers and revive the sector. The union also called for allowing various offices to rehire domestic helpers, which is now restricted to the government company providing the same services.

#### Bedoon students

The Public Authority for Applied Education and Training (PAAET) yesterday announced that the total number of illegal residents (bedoons) studying at its colleges and institutes is 1,894. PAAET's dean of admission and registration Dr Meshaal Al-Mansouri said 1,508 illegal residents are registered in PAAET colleges and 386 in various institutes. Mansouri added 592 bedoon students were accepted this year and 1,434 students had graduated over the past four years.

#### Rumors denied

Director of the public authority for the disabled Dr Shafiqa Al-Awadhi denied social media reports about suspending the shift allowances for the authority's employees. "It is impossible to stop the shift allowance for staff members taking very good care of the disabled in various care centers," she stressed, urging all involved staff to ignore such rumors and get the latest information from authentic sources.

# Fishermen invited for 46th Kuwait Fishing Competition

KUWAIT: Kuwait Sea Sports Club's (KSSC) Marine Heritage Committee recently invited fishing enthusiasts to take part in its 46th Kuwait Fishing Competition due to be held on Saturday, November 23, 2019. In this regard, the committee's chairman Ali Al-Qabandi announced that the competition is open for all citizens and expatriates, and participation is free of charge.

The deadline for applying is Friday, November 22, 2019, he noted. Further, Qabandi said that the competition includes a heaviest catch contest, with a KD 1,000 allocated for the first place winner, KD 750 for second place and KD 500 for third, while finalists from 4th to 10th would get KD 200 each.



# Kuwait continues role supporting peace, security in Middle East

**BRUSSELS:** The Ambassador of Kuwait to the European Union (EU), NATO and Belgium, Jassem Al-Budaiwi, has praised the level of relations between the State of Kuwait and the EU, noting that the two sides enjoy strong relations at various levels. This was expressed at a meeting hosted by the European Parliament's Delegation of Relations with the Arab Peninsula (DARP) with the heads of missions of the Gulf Cooperation Council (GCC) and Yemen at the EP on Thursday evening.

Budaiwi, in his intervention, stressed that Kuwait will continue to play its crucial role in supporting peace and security in the Middle East. He also praised the statement of the EU High Representative, Federica Mogherini, in her press conference on Monday, November 11, following the meeting of EU foreign ministers, that all 28 EU member states welcome any initiative by Kuwait to defuse tensions and support peace and security in the Arab Gulf region.


Budaiwi also underlined the importance of parliamentary diplomacy in building bridges between peoples and exchanging experiences and views among them. He explained that the relations between the State of Kuwait and the European Parliament through DARP is a clear success story, allowing the two sides to exchange views and experiences in various fields. He noted that with the start

of the new EP, the opportunity is conducive to more effective political dialogue and cooperation. Hannah Neumann, head of DARP, expressed her hope that a Kuwaiti parliamentary delegation would visit the European Parliament in Brussels next year. Addressing the first regular meeting of DARP, she said that the Gulf region is both a challenge and an opportunity for the EU and for this parliament. The EU should adopt a more active stance and continue and interpose its good offices in view for rapid and satisfactory solutions to the current conflicts in the region.

Gabriel Munuera Vinals, Head of the Arabian Peninsula and Regional Policies Section at the European External Action Service, said the EU has been on the side of the mediation initiative and the efforts of His Highness the Amir of Kuwait Sheikh Sabah Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah. He pointed out as evidence of deepening relations with Kuwait, the opening by EU High Representative Federica Mogherini of an EU Delegation in Kuwait last July. He also noted that Kuwait has agreed in principle to start a human rights dialogue with the EU. He said the EU's relationship with the Gulf region is deep rooted and multifaceted and he spoke of the positive momentum in EU-GCC relations in recent months, and stressed that the EU values the GCC as a stabilizing force and a close partner in the region. — KUNA

## Kuwait signs two deals with French university

PARIS: Kuwait inked two agreements with Lyon University in France and Jean Moulin Lyon 3 University to promote bilateral cultural and scientific cooperation. Head of Kuwait's cultural office in Paris Yacoub Al-Shammari said the deals would open horizons for sharing expertise, and benefiting from development programs and scientific research. Shammari, who signed the deals on behalf of the Kuwaiti side, added the University of Lyon has 12 colleges, including University Jean Moulin Lyon 3 (the College of Law). There are over 80 Kuwaiti students studying in France, in addition to 59 doctors registered in French board programs, he said. He expected the number of the Kuwaiti nationals studying in France to increase in the next period. — KUNA

Kuwait's Rahma International Society, an affiliate of Social Reform Society (Eslah), organized a mass wedding for Syrian refugees in Jordan. The event was part of the Kuwaiti charity's projects to support the refugees' humanitarian conditions in the region, said Waleed Al-Swailem, head of Rahma International's branches in Syrian and Jordan,. "This mass wedding is Rahma's fourth project organized in cooperation with Sana Al-Khair Charitable Society, a Kuwaiti-based women voluntary team," Swailem noted. The number of weddings in this project has amounted to 10 for male and female youngsters, most of whom were orphans, he added. The Kuwaiti charity was keen to officiate such matrimonial ceremonies, especially for people who live in desperate situations, to help them achieve emotional stability and facilitate their integration into society, affirmed Swailem. Rahma follows a particular strategy in its charitable work, with the aid of Kuwaiti philanthropists, consisting of backing relief, social, educational, health, and humanitarian activities, in general, to achieve better living condition for the affected and weak, he said. In the meantime, a number of newlywed young couples praised the Kuwaiti people's initiative to help them get married and support their family lives amid "harsh" and "difficult" living conditions that most premarital refugees face. The mass wedding was held at one of Amman's wedding halls under auspices and attendance of Kuwaiti Ambassador to Jordan Aziz Al-Daihani, officials of Rahma's branch in Jordan, and Sana Al-Khair team.

#### 'Winter Clothing'

Meanwhile, Kuwait Red Crescent Society (KRCS) kicked off its annual campaign, tagged 'Winter Clothing,' by distributing 236 winter clothing coupons, including blankets and heaters, to 236 needy families inside Kuwait The winter clothes are being handed to KRCS-registered families in order to alleviate their suffering and help them as well, Meriam Al-Adsani, director of local aid department at the society, stated to reporters on the sidelines of the distribution process. KRCS handed the vouchers for buying winter clothes in cooperation with one of the commercial markets, Adsani noted, affirming the importance of supporting needy families in facing the burdens of life responsibility. She affirmed KRCS' constant keenness to back activities and programs that contribute to serving the society and helping needy families, adding such humanitarian actions reinforce the principle of joint constructive benevolence and cooperation, and the value of social partnership and national strategy.

KRCS takes into consideration support and aid to needy families, Adsani noted, adding it targets them at all occasions with various assistances, particularly during religious and national festivals, winter seasons, and the holy month of Ramadan. She called on philanthropists to donate to the winter clothing campaign through the various available KRCS' donation channels, including the society's headquarters and website. #### **Human rights**

In the meantime, Chairman of Kuwait's National Diwan for Human Rights Ambassador Jassim Al-Mubarki underlined the Diwan's role in protecting freedoms and rights of people. The Diwan's work is part of Kuwait's continuous humanitarian efforts around the world, Mubarki said on the sidelines of his visit to Qatar. The Diwan also visits prisons and shelters to monitor human rights and organize seminars to promote the implementation of human rights agreements, as well as bring awareness to society on this matter, he noted. He also said his GCC tour aims at sharing experience and boost cooperation in the human rights field, affirming his country's eagerness to implement other Gulf States' experience in the field. Moreover, the ambassador said the Diwan consists of six committees concerned with topics including human trafficking, women, special needs people, complaints, civil and political rights and children.

#### Supporting UNRWA

Kuwait renewed its stance on continuing to support the United Nations Relief and Works Agency for Palestine Refugees in the Near East (UNRWA), embodied last year with a contribution of \$50 million. This was brought up during a speech by Kuwait at the UN General Assembly Fourth Committee (C4), delivered by Diplomatic Attache Ahmad Al-Duweesh. Kuwait provided UNRWA with an additional donation of \$five million during the current year, Duweesh pointed out. He deeply appreciated all UNRWA members for their strenuous efforts despite the circumstances they were going through.

Duweesh commended them for harnessing all available means to provide the necessary services to over 5.5 million Palestinian refugees across its five fields of operation.



They believe in the solid foundations of Kuwait's foreign policy in supporting humanitarian issues and the pivotal role played by UNRWA, renewing its mandate for another three years, he said. He stressed continuing to support UNRWA due to the positive indicators contained in the report of UNRWA's former Commissioner-General, including the support by Kuwait when UNRWA faced the most serious financial crisis in 2018 going from \$446 million to zero, and the financial discipline, which resulted in financial savings estimated at \$500 million in the past years. The information received regarding the financial constraints resulted in 50 students per semester and 100 daily patient visits to each doctor, making them more determined to continue the support, he said.

Duweesh said that the support would contribute to upgrading educational, health and relief services, along with providing basic needs for Palestinian refugees. He said that despite concerns over allegations made over the past few months about suspicions against some of the UN agency's officials, the assurances of the Secretary-General of the donor countries are appreciated. Duweesh wished that these suspicions would not hinder the benefit of the Palestinian refugees from the services provided by the UN agency.

On Wednesday, Kuwait announced voluntary contributions to a number of UN agencies, programs and funds worth \$6.4 million, reiterating continuing support for UN humanitarian and development activities. This was brought up during Kuwait's speech delivered by Diplomatic Attache Dhari Al-Faris at the UN Pledging Conference for Development Activities. This will contribute to creating the appropriate development ground for developing countries in the implementation of the 2019 UN High-level Political Forum on Sustainable Development (HLPF), showing determination in strengthening international cooperation to achieve sustainable development in all ways by 2030, he mentioned.

Faris pointed out that Kuwait's keenness to support developing countries is in accordance with their needs, cooperating with all development partners and strengthening international efforts to address existing and emerging development challenges. Since 2008, Kuwait has channeled 10 percent of its total aid to the affected countries through UN agencies and organizations, and has allocated \$15 billion for 2015-2030 to finance development projects in developing countries through Kuwait Fund for Arab Economic Development (KFAED).

Donations included UN Relief and Works Agency for Palestine Refugees in the Near East (UNRWA), the UN High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR) and the UN Emergency Response Fund, he said. The contribution includes the UN Development Program (UNDP) of \$570,000, in addition to \$500,000 each to the Global Fund to Fight AIDS, Tuberculosis and Malaria and the Office of the High Commissioner for Human Rights (OHCHR). He announced a voluntary grant of \$500,000 to the Development Fund for the revitalized Resident Coordinator system to ensure a successful transition. Kuwait's voluntary contribution to UNDP will be deducted and divided for the years 2020-2021 and will be allocated to the activities of the Resident Coordinator in Kuwait, added Faris.

#### Syrian crisis

On Thursday, the CEO of the Al-Sham Humanitarian Foundation Mohannad Othman praised the assistance from humanitarian aid organizations in Kuwait for the Syrian refugees and displaced people inside his country. "As an organization we receive assistance from Kuwait aid agencies to implement humanitarian aid projects inside Syria as well as inside Turkey for the refugees. We work through humanitarian aid agencies in Kuwait," Othman said on the sidelines of a major humanitarian aid exhibition in Brussels. "Kuwait has been very supportive of providing funds to this Syrian humanitarian crisis," he said, noting that Kuwait has hosted three international donor conferences on Syria."Kuwait has always been one of the countries and donor that provided support and assistance to humanitarian organizations and agencies in Syria," he said.

On Friday, a fourth humanitarian relief plane landed at Khartoum Airport via Kuwait airlift, carrying nearly 10 tons of baby milk and medical aid to those affected by heavy rain and torrents that recently wreaked havoc across the country. The plane has been ordered under directives of the Humanitarian Leader His Highness the Amir Sheikh Sabah Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah, to help the Sudanese people face the burden caused by floods and torrents disaster. Charge d'affaires of Kuwaiti Embassy in Khartoum Abdulkareem Al-Mejaym said. The plane is loaded with seven tons of medicines and other medical supplies, in addition to three tons of baby milk donated by Kuwait Red Crescent Society (KRCS), Mejaym added, affirming the Kuwait airlift will remain active until the crisis ends in all around Sudan. Head of the support committee at the Sovereignty Council of Sudan Brigadier Musa Omar expressed his gratitude and appreciation of the Kuwaiti leadership, government, and people for their supportive stand by his country through generous and continued support. Three humanitarian relief planes have previously landed in Sudan via the Kuwait airlift, carrying nearly 110 tons of Kuwaiti aid, Omar noted, adding KRCS has donated \$527,000 as a financial support to provide sheltering needs and health supplies for those affected by the torrents and floods.

Also on Friday, Kuwait's International Islamic Charity Organization (IICO) delivered more than 62 tons of food to Syrian refugees at two refugees' camps in the city of Duhok of Iraqi Kurdistan. The delivery process, began last week as part of 'Kuwait by your side' campaign, was conducted under the supervision of the Kuwaiti Consulate-General in Irbil, distributing 2,068 food parcels to families at Giwelan and Aagra camps, said Ismail Abdulaziz, member of the administrative commission at Barzani Charity Foundation (BCF). The two camps house Syrian refugees who have been residing the Kurdistan region for years, in addition to new refugees who fled the recent violence in northeastern Syria, said Abdulaziz. He reiterated his thanks to Kuwait and its humanitarian institutions for providing all sorts of aid to the refugees and internally displaces persons in the Kurdistan region and Iraq in general, noting the Kuwaiti food parcels are of quality-standard and filled with the best quality food. — KUNA

# Israel strikes Hamas targets in Gaza

# Tit-for-tat air strikes and rocket fire between Israel and Islamic Jihad continue

GAZA CITY: Israel targeted Hamas in air strikes on Gaza early yesterday after rockets were fired at it from the Palestinian enclave, the army said, two days after a fragile ceasefire began. Hamas, the Islamist movement that has de facto control over the Gaza Strip, had been spared the brunt of Israeli bombardment during this week's flareup which focused on its hardline ally Islamic libad.

A ceasefire has been in place since Thursday morning following the wave of tit-for-tat air strikes and rocket fire between Israel and Islamic Jihad — the territory's second most powerful militant group. The army said it launched yesterday's strikes after "two rockets were fired from the Gaza Strip towards Israeli territory" and were intercepted by air defenses. It was not immediately known who fired the rockets.

Palestinian security sources said the Israeli strikes were aimed at two Hamas

sites in the north of the territory. "Among the sites targeted was a military camp of the Hamas terror organization and a military compound used by the Hamas naval forces," a statement from the Israeli military said. "In addition an underground terror infrastructure was also targeted." There were no reports of casualties.

It was the first time Hamas had been hit since this week's escalation began with Israel's targeted killing of a top Islamic Jihad commander early on Tuesday. That strike triggered almost immediate retaliatory rocket fire from Islamic Jihad, which set off air-raid sirens and sent Israelis rushing to bomb shelters in the country's southern and central regions.

#### Fragile ceasefire

The Israeli military said around 450 rockets were fired at its territory during the fighting and air defenses intercepted dozens of them. The military responded

with air strikes it said targeted Islamic Jihad militant sites and rocket- and missile-launching squads. After two days of fighting which killed 34 Palestinians and no Israelis, a ceasefire was agreed. But it has so far been precarious, with fire coming from both sides after the agreement went into effect.

There have been three wars since 2008 between Israel and Palestinian militants in the blockaded territory which is home to some two million people.

Israeli analysts said that the focus on Islamic Jihad rather than Hamas earlier this week was a clear signal that the army sought to avoid a major new conflict. Hamas repeatedly said it would not abandon its ally, but keeping out of the fighting helped it maintain a fragile truce with Israel that has seen tens of millions of dollars in Qatari aid flow into Gaza since last year.

It was criticized in Gaza for not joining the fighting. Likewise, Israeli Prime

Minister Netanyahu came under fire from political rivals at home for not holding Hamas accountable for attacks from the territory it rules. The violence came at a politically sensitive time for Israel, with no new government in place since a September election ended in deadlock.

On Thursday, Israeli military spokesman Jonathan Conricus told reporters that the army had "wanted to keep Hamas out of the fighting". Throughout the operation, we of course distinguished between Hamas and Islamic Jihad, and all of our operations were measured, proportionate and focused only on military assets belonging to Islamic jihad," he said. But there was a marked shift in tone in yesterday's statement. The military said it "holds the Hamas terror organization responsible for events transpiring in the Gaza Strip and emanating from it". "Hamas will bear the consequences for actions against Israeli civilians." —AFP

# Sudan's Bashir supporters oppose handover to ICC

KHARTOUM: Supporters of ousted Sudanese leader Omar Al-Bashir held a protest yesterday vowing to oppose any move by the country's new authorities to hand him over to the International Criminal Court. Dozens of his supporters, carrying Bashir's portrait, gathered outside the Khartoum court where he is being tried on charges of illegally acquiring and using foreign funds.

"We are with you. We will never betray you. No, no to ICC," chanted the crowd as the former president was brought to the courthouse for a hearing. The demonstration comes amid growing calls from human rights groups, activists and victims of Sudan's Darfur war for the surrender of Bashir to The Hague-based court. "President Bashir represents the whole of Sudan. We have an independent judiciary and if any trials are to be held, they must be held here," said protester Mohamed Ali Daklai. "We reject any outside or foreign tribunal. ICC is anyway a political court used by Western countries to pressure the weak."

Bashir was ousted by the army on April 11 following nationwide protests against his ironfisted rule of three decades. The military generals who initially seized power after the president's fall refused to hand Bashir over to the ICC. He is wanted by the ICC for his alleged role in the Darfur war that erupted in 2003 as ethnic African rebels took up arms against Bashir's then Arab-dominated government, accusing it of marginalizing the region economically and politically.

Khartoum applied what rights groups say was a scorched earth policy against ethnic groups suspected of supporting the rebels — raping, killing, looting and burning villages. The ICC has accused Bashir of genocide, war crimes and crimes against humanity in the vast western region of Darfur. He denies the charges. About 300,000 people were killed and 2.5 million displaced in the conflict, according to the United Nations. Bashir, who ruled Sudan for three decades after seizing power in an Islamist-backed coup in 1989, is being held in a Khartoum prison and facing trial on corruption charges. —AFP

# Gunman in US school shooting dies as police hunt motive

LOS ANGELES: The teenager who gunned down classmates at a California high school before shooting himself died Friday, leaving detectives baffled over the motive of a Boy Scout with no obvious alarm bells in his background. Nathaniel Berhow died in a hospital one day after shooting himself in the head at the end of a 16th birthday rampage that left two fellow students dead.

Berhow had been in critical condition since police officers storming the campus found him lying among the wounded. The Los Angeles sheriff's department confirmed Berhow died shortly after 3:30 pm (2330 GMT) on Friday. The puzzle of what led him to open fire at Saugus High School, a short commute from Los Angeles, deepened as a picture emerged of a quiet yet sociable teen who was familiar with guns but had no history of troubled behavior. "We know it was a planned attack, it was deliberate... The motive? We don't have it yet," Los Angeles County Sheriff Alex Villanueva told a news conference.

The victims — a boy and a girl died while another three students were wounded — appeared to have been chosen at random, he said. "There's no relationships that we can tell (between) the suspect and the victims," Villanueva added, scotching rumors that an ex-girlfriend had been his target. There was also no history of the teen being bullied. The FBI earlier said there is no evidence that the suspect had any ideological motives or acted on behalf of any organization. No manifesto or suicide note has been found.

Deepening the riddle, Berhow's late father had owned

six registered guns — but none of them matched the .45 caliber semiautomatic the suspect used. His proficiency with the weapon during his short, deadly ambush suggested he had been firing guns for some time. "In 16 seconds he cleared a malfunction and was able to shoot five people and himself, so he seemed very familiar with firing the weapon," said Villanueva.

#### 'Bewildered'

Jared Axen, 33, a next door neighbor, described Berhow as an introvert who was usually quiet and reserved but who had friends and could readily be engaged in conversation. "I would see him go back and forth between scouting. I'd see him do a lot of sports-related activities," he told the Los Angeles Times. School records show Berhow was a keen middle-distance track runner.

Aidan Soto, a fellow scout and student at Saugus, described the suspect as a "good kid," and the last person he would expect to carry out a mass shooting. "The younger scouts really looked up to him. He was there when they needed him with anything. I'm bewildered and looking for answers." Although Berhow had no evident history of violence, his family life over the past few years had been difficult.

His father, divorced from his mother not long before, died of a heart attack in December 2017. The father had reportedly suffered from alcohol-related problems, and was at one point suspected of domestic violence but never prosecuted for lack of evidence. Nonetheless, the father and son were seemingly close. "He would tell me that he missed his father and that he loved him," Axen said.

#### 'Another innocent person'

The father was a keen hunter whom neighbors would see manufacturing ammunition in his garage. Investigators said they found additional arms at the

home, beyond the six registered weapons. Berhow would sometimes accompany his father on hunting trips, according to Axen — accounting for the deadly accuracy of his shooting.

He also "knew how many rounds he had," noted Villanueva, the sheriff. The teen gunman saved his final bullet for himself. The students slain by Berhow were identified as Gracie Anne Muehlberger, 15, and a 14-year-old boy. Messages on Muehlberger's Instagram page read "I miss you so much already love," and "It's so sad that another innocent person has to die."

Another wounded teenager was able to return home Friday morning, and two girls — both operated on for gunshot wounds — should be able to leave the hospital in a few days, say medics. Tearful prayer vigils were held Thursday night, and all schools in the district remained closed Friday in a mark of respect, Deputy Superintendent Mike Kuhlman said. —AFP

# 'Come back tomorrow': Refugees battle for asylum in South Africa

'We are tired, we don't like this South Africa anymore'

PRETORIA: Therese Walu's eyes welled up as she recalled the last time she shared dinner with her whole family, 19 years ago, in the Democratic Republic of Congo. The next morning, soldiers raided her village of Mukakira, in the country's northeast — where a civil war that killed millions raged between 1998-2003. She grabbed her youngest daughters and fled into the surrounding forest, not knowing whether the rest of the family survived.

With nothing but the clothes on her back, Walu started a perilous 10-year journey that would eventually take her more than 3,000 kilometers, to South Africa's capital Pretoria. But like millions of displaced Africans, she reached a country boasting one of the world's most progressive refugee policies but she only found herself knocking on closed doors. "The only thing they ever gave us is a (temporary) paper of asylum," said Walu, who has been battling for refugee status since 2010. Fed up, she joined hundreds of asylum-seekers on October 8 for a long-running sitin protest in front of the offices of the UN refugee agency UNHCR in Pretoria. On Thursday the protesters forced their way into the UNHCR office grounds after being served with a court order evicting them from the street in front of the offices. A similar protest was quashed in Cape Town after demonstrators were forcefully evicted from the building last month.

"We are tired, we don't like this South Africa anymore," said Walu, 41, who wants the UNHCR to help relocate her family. She told AFP the sit-in — sparked by a wave of xenophobic violence in September — was "the only chance" to protest against her situation. South Africa is one of the few countries in the world that allows asylumseekers to work, have access to healthcare and study while their applications are being processed.

That reputation helped attract more than a million asylum-seekers between 2007 and 2015, one of the world's highest, according to the government. With high hopes to begin with, most have faced a lengthy, confusing and increasingly backlogged process. "When I first arrived in South Africa I thought 'finally!'," said another

Congolese asylum-seeker Esther Kabinga, 46. After losing her husband in a plane crash and being gang-raped by soldiers, Kabinga left her home in the southeastern Katanga province in 2011, and walked into neighboring Zambia with her three small children. Kabinga then paid truck drivers to smuggle them to South Africa.

She recalled having to leave home at 3.30 am to queue up for the processing of her application at the Home Affairs department. "They give you a number and you wait. At the end of the day they tell you to come back tomorrow, come back next week." Like most asylum-seekers, both Kabinga and Walu's initial applications were rejected, marking the start of a lengthy appeal process. "Currently there is a 99 percent (initial) rejection rate," human rights lawyer Jessica Lawrence told AFP, adding that thousands were stuck in limbo.

The UNHCR has also voiced concern about the number of "pending cases". Despite the backlog, South Africa has reduced the capacity of some of its refugee application offices. Human rights lawyer Sharon Elkambaram lamented the lack of "political

will" to process applications. "The quality of the decision-making is shocking," she added. South Africa processed more than 630,000 applications over the past decade, less than 10 percent of which were granted refugee status. Home Affairs spokesman Siya Qoza told AFP the majority were "not genuine cases" that were "clogging the system" by lodging appeals. "Why would we need to increase the capacity when most of the world is stable?" he asked. "You would do that if the entire world was at war."

Walu and Kabinga have been living with temporary asylum permits for almost a decade. That paper needs to be renewed every three to six months — a process that can take up to three weeks. Asylum-seekers also say the document brands them as foreigners, making them vulnerable to police bribes and discrimination. Walu claims her daughters were given a different high school diploma from a normal refugee because of their asylum-seeking status, and have since been refused access to university. — AFP

# France's yellow vests seek show of strength for first anniversary

### 'We're here even if Macron doesn't like it'

PARIS: French "yellow vest" protesters began a the scale we saw in December and January at a series of nationwide demonstrations yesterday in a bid to show the government they can still muster support on the first anniversary of their movement. Numbers attending the protests and levels of violence have sharply diminished in recent months from the height of the movement, which began on November 17 last year with a giant Paris protest that drew almost 300,000 people.

But the yellow vests want the actions on Saturday their traditional day for protests — and also Sunday — the anniversary day — to show President Emmanuel Macron they remain a force to be reckoned with. "We're here even if Macron doesn't like it" demonstrators chanted as they arrived on the outskirts of Paris yesterday, with others singing "Happy Birthday". Paris police reported 24 arrests by 10.50 AM (0950 GMT) after incidents involving police using teargas and demonstrators setting fires.

Several metro stations were closed in the capital and police were deployed in numbers, especially along the Champs-Elvsees, which was again closed off to demonstrators following the ransacking of shops that followed a protest last March. Police were also stationed near government ministries. Around 200 demonstrations are planned, with authorities expecting several thousand to rally in the capital.

This estimate includes a few hundred radical protesters from the ultra-left and far-right, often behind the worst scenes of mayhem. France has a long tradition of violent protest, but the ferocity of last winter's demonstrations and allegations of police brutality shocked the country. Officials said the magnitude of the weekend protests is far from certain but deputy interior minister Laurent Nunez noted a "more pronounced interest" than in previous weeks,

and police would plan their deployment accordingly. "There will be a significant mobilization but not on

national level," said a French security source, asking not to be identified by name. "We are expecting a difficult Saturday," said the source, noting that protesters "mobilize at the last minute in a bid to take us

#### 'Still in the street'

A poll by the Elabe institute published Wednesday said 55 percent of French people support or have sympathy for the yellow vests, although 63 percent said they do not want the protests to begin in earnest again. The most prominent figures in the movement, which has explicitly shunned any formal leadership structure, acknowledge the declining numbers but say the authorities' response has not been sufficient.

"We shouldn't still need be on the street one year on," said Priscillia Ludosky, an entrepreneur whose online petition against high fuel prices helped kick off the movement. "It's unfortunate there has been no political response, but also to see that we are slightly lacking energy in terms of mobilization," she told the Regards news site. The yellow vests — named for the glow-in-the-dark waistcoats all French drivers must carry in their cars — posed the biggest challenge to Macron since he swept to power in 2017 on the back of promises of sweeping change. They accused Macron of being deaf to the troubles of ordinary French people as he embarked on a major program aimed at modernizing the country.

Initially taken aback by the size and intensity of the movement, Macron offered billions of euros in state aid and tax breaks — and scrapped a planned fuel tax hike — while embarking on a "Great National Debate" at town halls nationwide. # Australian survives croc attack by gouging its eye

CAIRNS: An Australian wildlife ranger has recounted his terrifying escape from the clutches of a "particularly cunning" crocodile, after wrestling with the reptile and sticking a finger in its eye. Craig Dickmann, who made a split-second decision to go fishing last Sunday in a remote part of Northern Australia known as "croc country" last Sunday, said a 2.8-metre (nine-foot) crocodile came up from behind him as he was leaving the beach.

"As I've turned to go, the first thing I see is its head just come at me," he told reporters on Friday from his hospital bed in the town of Cairns in Oueensland state. Dickmann said the animal latched on to his thigh. "That noise will haunt me forever I think, the sound of the snap of its jaws," he said. The 54-year-old said he wrestled with the croc on the remote beach as it tried to drag him into the water. Dickmann stuck his thumb into its eye, saying it was the only "soft spot" he found on the "bullet-proof" animal.

Their eyes retract a fair way and when you go down far enough you can feel bone so I pushed as far as I possibly could and then it let go at that point," Dickmann said. After a few minutes, he said he managed to get on top of the croc and pin its jaws shut. "And then, I think both the croc and I had a moment where we're going, 'well, what do we do now?" Dickmann said he then pushed the croc away from him and it slid back into the water. —AFP

# Lithuania, Norway swap spies with Russia at border

VILNIUS: Russia on Friday returned two Lithuanians and a Norwegian convicted of espionage to Vilnius while NATO and EU member Lithuania freed two Russians jailed for spying in an exchange reminiscent of the Cold War. Tensions between Lithuania and Soviet-era master Russia grew after the outbreak of the Ukraine crisis in 2014, triggering a string of espionage allegations on

Lithuanian President Gitanas Nauseda first pardoned the two Russians jailed by Vilnius for spying, prompting Moscow to announce it would respond in kind. "Today, at midday, the exchange operation was completed successfully," Lithuanian intelligence chief Darius Jauniskis told reporters in Vilnius on Friday. "Lithuanian citizens Yevgeny Mataitis and Arstidas Tamosaitis and Norwegian citizen Frode Berg successfully returned to Lithuania," he said, adding that Berg was then transferred to the Norwegian embassy in the

Jauniskis said Lithuania handed over the two pardoned Russians, Nikolai Filipchenko and Sergei Moisejenko, in the exchange at a Lithuanian border crossing with the Russian exclave of Kaliningrad. Russia's SVR foreign intelligence agency director Sergei Naryshkin had told news agencies that Moscow would take "reciprocal measures" following Lithuania's pardon.—AFP

The Biden campaign earlier released an ad condemning Trump's foreign policy, saying that "dictators and tyrants are praised, our allies pushed aside". KCNA appeared to cite one of Trump's favored insults for the candidate — "Sleepy Joe" — when it said Americans called him "Biden not awakened from a sleep".

Biden had shown "a sign of the final stage of dementia", KCNA added. "It seems time has come for him to depart his life." KCNA misspelled the candidate's name as "Baiden" throughout, seemingly reflecting the spelling used in the Korean alphabet. It is not the first time the North has condemned Biden. In May it called him an "imbecile" and a "fool of low IQ" days after he called Kim a "dictator" and "tyrant."

The North Korean rhetoric underscores its "impatience" with any criticism of Kim, said Cheong Seong-Chang, a senior researcher at the pri-

Trump himself has also been the target of Pyongyang's anger at times. In 2017 the two leaders traded personal insults and threats of war before the diplomatic rapprochement that has seen them meet three times and Trump repeatedly proclaim their personal friendship, although nuclear negotiations remain deadlocked. As tensions mounted, Kim called Trump a "mentally deranged US dotard" whom he would "tame with fire", while KCNA also branded him a "rabid dog". KCNA used the same Korean word previously translated as "dotard" in its article Thursday, although the epithet did not appear in the official English version. —AFP

WASHINGTON: US President Donald Trump on Friday pardoned a former soldier convicted of murder and a Green Beret charged with killing a suspected Taliban bomb-maker, defying warnings that the move would be an abuse of the powers afforded him under the US

Trump dismissed a second degree murder conviction against Army First Lieutenant Clint Lorance, who is six years into a 19-year term for ordering soldiers in 2012 to fire on three unarmed Afghan men on a motorcycle, two of whom died. "Many Americans have sought executive clemency for Lorance, including 124,000 people who have signed a petition to the White House, as well as several members of Congress," said a White House statement

He also granted clemency to West Point graduate Matt Golsteyn, an ex-member of the elite US Army Green

# Rebels in DR Congo kill 14 civilians in revenge

**GOMA:** Assailants in DR Congo have killed 14 civilians in revenge for army offensives against Ugandan rebel strongholds in the east of the country, a local official said yesterday. The latest killings, which occurred in the night from Friday to Saturday, take the total number of

Berets, charged with premeditated murder in the shooting death of an alleged Taliban bomb-maker in 2010. Retired Navy admiral James Stavridis was among those who came out strongly against Trump's reported plans when he first revealed he was thinking of the pardons in May. "I commanded several of the servicemen Trump may pardon," the former NATO Supreme Allied Commander wrote in Time magazine. "Letting them off will undermine the military." Such pardons would be "an

# The cycle of death continues

ne evening, almost two decades ago, I was on CNN's "Crossfire" sitting opposite a Democratic Congressman (who is no longer in office, having repeatedly disgraced himself in "sexting" scandals). We were there to debate Israel's botched assassination of a Hamas leader in Gaza. They did kill him, but in their "precision bombing" of a densely crowded area, Israel also killed a dozen others - whose only crime was to be both Palestinian and in the wrong place, at the wrong time.

When asked what he thought about the Israeli attack, the Congressman began by saying that it was regrettable, but then added that, "sometimes we have to do things like this". I know it was off-topic, but I couldn't resist asking him what he meant by "we?" I reminded him that he was a US Congressman, not a spokesperson for the Israeli government. Back on topic, I made two points, one related to "precision bombings" and the other to the stupidity and immorality of the entire cycle of violence.

Because we were on stage before a live audience, I pointed to an individual in the middle of the theater and observed that if I targeted that person with the kind of massive bomb Israel had used in the attack, everyone around that person would also die. Since Israel did this repeatedly, such acts of murder couldn't be dismissed as "accidental" or sloughed off as mere "collateral damage." When you know what will happen and you do it anyway - it's murder, plain and simple.

In that sense, what the Israeli air force did was no different than what the terrorist does. Both kill innocent bystanders who happen to be in the wrong place, at the wrong time. And both use lethal force with the mistaken belief that they're "teaching the enemy a lesson," which is the classical definition of terrorism - the use of force against innocents to create fear in order to

advance a political agenda.

I went on to say that I wished I could have been a fly on the wall when the Hamas leader sent his young charges out on their deadly mission or when the Israeli officer ordered his pilots to theirs'. Did Hamas really believe that the suicide bomber would hasten the end of the occupation? And did the Israeli commander believe that the killings he was ordering would hasten the end of the resistance to the occupation? After decades of an insane cycle of violence, could they have been that ignorant of reality?

I recall this debate, because two decades later, we are witnessing the same deadly stupidity still playing out in the Israeli-Palestinian conflict. Israel still apparently believes that because they possess overwhelming power, they can wield it with impunity and achieve their desired result - to squash the resistance to their occupation. Their murder of an Islamic Jihad leader, illegal by any standard of international law, only served to bring a hail of retaliatory rocket fire from Gaza. As could be expected, Israel then responded with massive bombardments of Gaza, killing dozens, including a Palestinian family with a number of little children blown to bits.

If history provides any lesson, this will not be the end of it. Islamic Jihad is, no doubt, plotting its revenge and the cycle will continue. But, and it's necessary to ask, "To what end?" Revenge or anger born of desperation isn't a political strategy and it won't end oppressive Israeli rule, any more than Israel's disproportionate use of violence will force the Palestinians to acquiesce to their brutal policies.

What's equally disheartening is the American and Arab reactions to this Israeli and Palestinian "dance until death". In response to the tragedy that played out this week, the US press and political leadership immediately responded with familiar expressions of support for "Israel's right to defend itself" - ignoring the reality that this round of violence, like so many others, began with an Israeli assassination and ultimately involved bombings that took the lives of Palestinian innocents. This is not self-defense. It's terrorism and murder.

Equally distressing were the comments from some in the Arab media who continue to refer to Islamic Jihad and Hamas as "the resistance". The suicide bombings of old weren't resistance - they were terrorism and murder. Today's rockets blindly fired across the border also can't be classified as resistance. The only purposes they serve is to cause fear among civilians and provide Israel with the opportunity for a lethal response - in that sense, these rockets are also suicidal and weapons of terror. Here I recall the lesson taught by the late Tawfiq Zayyed, the Palestinian mayor of Nazareth and Member of the Israeli Knesset. He was in the midst of a US speaking tour when he was challenged by a young man in the audience who criticized Tawfiq's condemnation of terror tactics used by some Palestinian groups. The man said, "You have denied our right to armed struggle, a right recognized by the United Nations.'

# Bolivia crisis: Coup or return to rule of law?

ven before Bolivia's Evo Morales quit the presidency in response to weeks of violent protest over his reelection, leftist allies were denouncing what they called a coup. From Britain's opposition leader Jeremy Corbyn and US congresswoman Alexandria Ocasio-Cortez to allies Cuba and Venezuela, the president's weekend departure has been characterized as an illegal power grab. Accused of election fraud, he fled for Mexico after his resignation as right wing opposition senator Jeanine Anez prepared to declare herself acting president.

Stretching back to 1970s Chile and Argentina, Latin America has a dark history of right-wing coups that have left millions acutely suspicious of foreign influence and anti-democratic domestic forces. The intervention of armed forces chief Williams Kaliman in suggesting Morales step down lends credence to the idea that Bolivia's power shift follows the pattern.

But Maria Teresa Zegada, a political scientist at San Simon University in the central Bolivian city of Cochabamba, says the events lack several elements that are typical of coups. "It implies the substitution of one group in government for another," Zegada, who specializes in social movements, told AFP by telephone. "In Bolivia's case, this hasn't happened."

While Anez has assumed the role of interim president, she has repeatedly stressed that she aims to hold new elections in short order. The 52-year-old didn't stand in the

Oct 20 general election and has given no indication she intends to put herself forward in any future poll.

#### Restoring constitutionality

Another feature of coups is that they "have to break the constitutional order," said Zegada. "In this case it's the opposite... this interim government is trying to restore constitutionality." Morales's standing in the election was itself a controversial issue as Bolivia's constitution limits presidents to two consecutive terms, while Morales was seeking a fourth. He had lost a 2016 referendum in which he tried to remove term limits but a year later Bolivia's highest legal authority - the constitutional court - ruled against the constitution.

A coup also involves a power grab, usually by the military or an individual backed by the armed forces. "What's the objective of this (interim) government? It's mission is basically to bring back peace to Bolivia and call elections as soon as possible," said Zegada. Even the military itself is not acting as if it is involved in a coup, she added. "The police and armed forces are there to bring peace to the streets," Zegada said.

Another controversy centers around the legitimacy of Anez's constitutional court-backed claim to be interim president. She found herself next in line after the resignations of the only government figures more senior than her - Morales, the vice-president, the Senate president and

the lower house speaker. Former Senate president and Morales loyalist Adriana Salvatierra has claimed she should take charge since she says her resignation was never formally accepted by the Senate. "Salvatierra's reaction is a bit too late because she had already resigned verbally and sought refuge in an embassy," said Zegada.

#### 'There was a coup'

Movement for Socialism, the populist, indigenist party led by Morales, is attempting to wrest back control after a raft of politicians and governors followed Morales out the door many seeking refuge in foreign embassies from angry mobs. Zegada, though, says it may be too little too late to claw back power. "It's going to be difficult for the Movement for Socialism to change this situation," she said. As for the accusations of a coup, for Zegada, that's nothing more than hot air. "It's a diversionary tactic that the Movement for Socialism is using to gain media attention," she said.

According to one of Morales's main regional detractors, it's something that has been seen before. "The word 'coup' is used a lot when the left loses," said Brazil's far-right President Jair Bolsonaro. For Luis Almagro, secretary general of the Organization of American States that audited the October 20 election, there was a coup – just not the one Morales backers are claiming. "Yes, there was a coup d'etat in Bolivia," he said. "It happened on October 20 when there was electoral fraud." — AFP

### Delhi suffocates as millions go without masks

thick grey smog choked New Delhi for the fifth day Saturday, adding to a mounting pollution health crisis, but retired naval commander Anil Charan is one of the vast majority of the city's 20 million inhabitants who do not wear a mask. Indian media is packed with warnings about the risk of premature death, lung cancer and particular danger to children from PM2.5 - tiny particles that get into the bloodstream and vital organs - carried in the smog.

But the smartly-dressed Charan was among shoppers in Delhi's upmarket Khan Market district browsing the luxury clothes and jewellery stores without a mask, seemingly oblivious to the risk. Many are too poor to afford protection but others simply do not like the way a pollution mask looks. Charan, wearing aviator sunglasses, said it did not fit his "rough and tough" image. "I have been brought up in this kind of atmosphere, the

smog and all, so I am kind of used to it. And being a naval officer I think if I wear a mask I will think I am a

Doctors say face masks must be worn and air purifiers used at home and in offices. There are a variety of masks to choose from. A basic cloth version can cost as little as 50 rupees (70 US cents) but the protection they offer is debatable. More reputable types start from 2,500 rupees (\$34) while some Khan Market stores charge more than 5,500 rupees (\$75) for top of the range imported models.

#### Bare-faced bravado

The mask-look worried a lot of the Khan Market shoppers and diners however. Some said the danger had been overblown. "I know I am risking my health but I am not very comfortable wearing them (masks)," said Ritancia Cardoz, who works for a private company. "I don't find it appealing," she told AFP. Lopa Diwan, on a visit to the capital from the provinces, said the Delhi air was "not as bad as it is being made out to be". "So many people advised me not to go to Delhi because of the pollution but I don't think it's that bad. I don't see people dying" she said

Pollution - blamed on industrial and car emissions mixed with stubble fires on thousands of farms sur-

rounding the city - has been building up each winter for the past decade. The past five years have been particularly bad. The toxic air cuts short the lives of one million people in India every year, according to government research published earlier this year. Concentrations of the most harmful airborne pollutants in Delhi are regularly about 20 times the World Health Organization safe limit. That rams home the city's reputation as the world's most polluted capital.

Some foreign companies and embassies now do not let families move to Delhi, or at least give strong warnings about the pollution. The Delhi government has given out hundreds of thousands of masks to children and closed schools for four of the past five days. Construction is banned and cars can only go on the roads on alternate days. But still only a tiny number of inhabitants follow medical advice when outside. Rickshaw drivers who earn about \$7 a day on an average say they cannot afford masks.

Chand Babu, a car park attendant at Khan Market, said he could buy one of the cheaper masks but it was too much of a hassle to wear. "I have to blow the whistle all the time so it's inconvenient." Babu does worry, however, about his three children who also do not have masks. "They go outside to play. The problem is real, but what do we do, tell me?" — AFP

# Two years after coup, Zimbabweans more despondent

wo years ago, Linos Mutepera was among hundreds of thousands of Zimbabweans who celebrated the toppling of long-time ruler Robert Mugabe with tears of joy. Today, he looks back at that time with bitterness, his hope of a better life dashed on the rocks of poverty and joblessness. "We were all there -the young, the old, the rich, the poor, blacks, whites and mixed race -waving the Zimbabwean flag, holding banners, hoisting placards, singing, dancing, praying together, holding each other's arms and hugging," he reminisced.

"We thought it was an end at last of an era that had been marked by poverty, joblessness, shortages, army and police brutality," the 33-year-old unemployed engineering graduate told AFP. "How wrong we were." Mutepera, sitting beside a friend hawking clothes at a Harare flea market, pointed bleakly to the promises made by Mugabe's successor, Emmerson Mnangagwa, to rebuild Zimbabwe's shattered economy. "We were used," he said. "I feel so let down, so betrayed. But at least I am wiser."

Mugabe came to power in 1980, surfing on his reputation as the guerrilla leader who had steered colonial-era

Rhodesia to independence, ending white-minority rule. By Nov 2018, the smell of corruption and cronyism that infected his regime prompted the military to take over - a coup code-named Operation Restore Legacy.

#### 'Square One'

He was replaced as president by Mnangagwa, his former deputy, whom he had fired weeks earlier. The military supremo and face of the coup, General Constantino Chiwenga, became one of his deputies. The following July, Mnangagwa won disputed elections on pledges to lure foreign investment, create jobs and turn the country into a middle-income economy by 2030. But Zimbabwe's nightmares returned within months, as shoppers battled daily shortages of basics such as fuel, cooking oil, sugar and bread.

Unemployment today is over 90 percent while the size of the economy has more than halved since 2000, when Mugabe's seizure of white-owned farms crippled Zimbabwean agriculture. Inflation runs into triple digits, electricity is available for just six hours a day and in many urban areas, the taps are dry. "Things have basically got worse," Professor Tony Hawkins of the University of Zimbabwe's School of Economics told AFP. "People are getting poorer and thousands are losing jobs," he said. "The economy has got worse and politically, nothing has changed except that the military are much more visible and much more powerful. Basically, it's back to square one, with a change of driver but the same bus or taxi."

#### 'Mirage'

Alex Magaisa, a lecturer at the University of Kent in England, said Mnangagwa's promise of a new dawn had become "nothing more than a mirage". A spokesman for the opposition Movement for Democratic Change (MDC), Daniel Molokele, said Zimbabweans had mistakenly believed Mugabe's removal would end the country's woes. "The euphoria that we saw in 2017 was not for the ascendancy of Mnangagwa but for the fall of Mugabe - and people also thought it meant the fall of the entire system created by Mugabe," he said.

"Two years later there is hopelessness, there is despondency, there is disappointment. People would rather go back to 2017 not because Mugabe was better but because people are much more poorer. There is more corruption with cartels running sections of the economy. It's a classic case of jumping from the frying pan into a fire." Molokele suggested a dialogue involving Zimbabweans "from all walks of life... so that the people can determine the Zimbabwe they want". Public fury at the state of the economy was an important factor in Mugabe's downfall. That anger flared anew in January, when Mnangagwa more than doubled fuel prices, sparking protests that left at least 17 people dead and scores of injured. Harare-based political analyst Alexander Rusero told AFP the November 2018 takeover had "never been for the good of the people. "It's all about the political elite in (the ruling) ZANÚ-PF (party) and the preservation of their wealth," he said. "The moment you have soldiers closing the barracks and joining politics, nothing good comes out of it." — AFP

# What's Alibaba, China's e-commerce giant?

## E-commerce remains the company's bread and butter

**SHANGHAI:** Formed in the Hangzhou flat of co-founder Jack Ma in 1999. Alibaba has ridden the seemingly insatiable Chinese appetite for online shopping to become one of the world's most valuable companies. On Friday, the US-listed company confirmed plans to add its value further, but listing additional shares in Hong Kong in an offering worth around \$13 billion. Here are the answers to key questions about the company:

#### How did Alibaba start?

Ma, a former English teacher who claims to have never written a line of computer code, had dabbled in various ventures with mixed success before friends introduced him to the internet while on a 1990s trip to the United States. With Amazon already making waves in online shopping, Ma convinced a group of Chinese and foreign friends to front \$60,000 in 1999 for a business-to-business e-commerce venture. Ma dubbed it "Alibaba" because the name is easily pronounced in virtually any language, including Chinese, and because the "open sesame" catchphrase signified that its platforms "open a doorway to fortune for small businesses", according to the company.

### Amazon alleges 'bias' in Pentagon awarding contract to Microsoft

SAN FRANCISCO: Amazon has challenged the awarding of a \$10 billion Pentagon cloud computing contract to Microsoft, alleging "unmistakable bias" in the process. The 10-year contract for the Joint Enterprise Defense Infrastructure program, better known as JEDI, ultimately will see all military branches sharing information in a system boosted by artificial intelligence. "It's critical for our country that the government and its elected leaders administer procurements objectively and in a manner that is free from political influence," a spokesperson for Amazon Web Services said.

"Numerous aspects of the JEDI evaluation process contained clear deficiencies, errors, and unmistakable bias." Amazon said it filed a notice in a US court last week signaling its intent to protest the handling of the bidding process, which the Department of Defense

#### Why has it been so successful?

Alibaba was founded at a time when Chinese incomes were soaring after decades of rapid economic growth and the country was becoming increasingly digitalized. That allowed Alibaba to easily facilitate commerce between consumers increasingly hooked on the ease of online shopping, and the country's countless manufacturers of cheap goods.

Today, China has the world's largest online population-in excess of 850 million-most of them smartphone users deeply immersed in the country's growing digital ecosystem and e-commerce. The business generated by Alibaba's own mobile monthly active users-which reached 785 million in the most recent financial latest quarter-propelled rapid growth, and in September 2014, the company listed on Wall Street, raising \$25 billion in what remains the largest IPO ever.

The tactic is a major switch from the way the Redmond-based company built its empire selling packaged software to computer users. Amazon, one of the world's most valuable companies, has expanded from its origins in e-commerce to cloud services, streaming media, artificial intelligence and other ventures. AWS accounted for nearly \$9 billion in revenue in the recently-ended quarter, with growth in the cloud computing unit up 35 percent from a year ago. —AFP

# Indian tax officials find Modi's targets too taxing, some quit

# Tax officers fearful of missing target, over-reach accusations

MUMBAI: India's tax officials are facing a taxing issue. Prime Minister Narendra Modi's government wants them to collect 17% more in direct taxes this year as New Delhi seeks to shore up revenues amid a sharp economic slowdown. The target has been maintained even though Modi recently approved a massive cut in corporate taxes, which are part of direct taxes, and warned officers not to harass businesses in their drive to collect revenue.

Over a dozen tax officials interviewed by Reuters said they are stuck between a push to meet unrealistic collection targets, which influence their appraisals and transfers, and the fear of being accused of over-zealousness if they crack down on evasion. Critics say Modi's demands of his tax officials are symptomatic of the confusion surrounding his government's economic policies, and that the bungling has contributed to a slowdown in growth.


Twenty-two top-level tax department officers have opted for voluntary retirement so far this year and around 34 did so in 2018, according to data provided by Bhaskar Bhattacharya, vice president of the Income Tax Gazetted Officers' Association. Bhattacharya was unable to provide comparative data but said bureaucrats ditching jobs usually considered prestigious and powerful was rare.

"Even seasoned officers after working for 25–30 years cannot take this pressure anymore," he said. "There are applications for voluntary retirement coming in one after the other despite the fact that there is no voluntary retirement or golden handshake scheme in the department." The Central Board of Direct Taxes (CBDT) did not respond to requests for data and comment on the resignations. The CBDT, the Finance Ministry and the Prime Minister's Office did not respond to questions about tax targets and alleged harassment by tax officials.

While only a small fraction of the tax department's few thousand senior officers have quit, several officials in the tax depart-

ment said the departures provided a snapshot of broader discontent that has also led to internal transfers as well as resignations among lower-level employees. "The level of impatience in the government has gone up ... Anyone who has any alternate option says: 'Why should we stay in the department?'" said one officer who has quit the job and plans to go tend the family farm. He said the stress had "become unbearable."

"The pressure is getting greater. To achieve our targets we are under pressure, so we do some things that we don't want to do," said another tax official in northern India. The two men asked to remain unnamed for fear of reprisals from the government. Unorthodox



tactics being used by the department included asking companies for advance tax payments, as well as delaying refunds, other tax officials said.

#### 'Black sheep'

India's economy grew 5% year-on-year between April and June, its weakest pace since 2013, and the slowdown could deepen, economists say. They blame the mess partly on the centralization of power in Modi's office and lack of debate, leading to ill-conceived policy. "Even well-meaning people find it very difficult to tell him, 'This is wrong, let's do it another way,'" said Sebastian Morris, a senior faculty member at the Indian Institute of Management, Ahmedabad, India's premier

business school. Conflicting signals on issues ranging from tax policy to the auto sector were confusing, Morris said. "It's a madhouse."

Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman has been touring tax offices saying that the revenue target is realistic and therefore collectors "need not overstretch." But there is no clear definition of over-reach, so confused officers are hesitant about how to handle truant tax-payers, said Bhattacharya of the tax officers' association. "In an effort to erase the fear psychosis in the public, tax officers are now going through a fear psychosis themselves," he said.

Indian businesses were complaining about sometimes high-handed tactics used by tax officers to crack down on evasion long before Modi came to power. But it became a hotbutton issue after a prominent coffee magnate committed suicide earlier this year, purportedly leaving behind a letter blaming persecution by tax officers. Tax authorities said at the time their probe was based on credible evidence of concealed transactions.

The government compulsorily retired 64 senior tax officers over alleged wrongdoing this year, a government source said. "Some black sheep in the tax administration may have misused their powers and harassed tax-payers," Modi told the Economic Times in August. "We will not tolerate this type of behavior." Modi's administration needs funds for flagship programs including free cooking gas connections and toilets for poor rural Indians, popular policies that helped win him a second term in May.

But in a bid to propel growth rates higher, India cut its corporate tax rate in September to 22% from 30%, forgoing almost 1.5 trillion rupees (\$21.4 billion) in revenue. Direct tax collections have grown only 3% in the first six months of the April-March fiscal year, an official in the finance ministry said. They would have to grow by 42% from October to March to meet the target for the year, estimated Aditi Nayar, principal economist at ICRA, the Indian unit of Moody's. — Reuters

# South African Airways hit by crippling strike

JOHANNESBURG: South African Airways workers on Friday embarked on an indefinite strike for higher wages and against the national carrier's overhaul plan, forcing the cash-strapped airline to ground hundreds of flights. The stoppage has forced South Africa's largest carrier to cancel more than 300 domestic and regional flights between Friday and Monday.

The company has asked travellers who had flights booked not to turn up at airports and offered them a chance to rebook for free or to fly on other flights operated by partner airlines. It however said it was making plans to resume international flights by today night. "The airline is pleased to announce that it is aiming to operate all international flights with effect from today and customers should report to the airport as normal," it said in a statement.

More than 3,000 workers, including cabin crew, check-in, ticket sales, technical and ground staff are taking part in the open-ended, according to unions. Hundreds of placard-waving workers picketed outside the SAA head office near OR Tambo International Airport in Johannesburg - one of the continent's busiest airport - singing and dancing. "We will continue with the strike (until demands are met)," Sifiso Mabena, an aircraft mechanic at the airport told AFP. Unions pressed on with the walkout after talks with management dead-

locked

Zazi Nsibanyoni-Mugambi, president of the South African Cabin Crew Association (SACCA), however said a new round of mediated talks with the airline was expected on Saturday. "We have always and will always be willing to negotiate and talk to management, we have told them this time and time again," Nsibanyoni-Mugambi said. "We are hoping these talks will bear fruit," said Phakamile Hlubi-Majola, spokeswoman of the National Union of Metalworkers of South Africa (NUM-SA) said to eNCA television network.

#### 'Company could fold'

The airline, which employs more than 5,000 workers, is one of the biggest in Africa, with a fleet of more than 50 aircrafts providing dozens of domestic, regional and international flights each day. But the company is deep in debt, despite several government bailouts, and has not recorded a profit since 2011. The unions are pressing for a three-year guarantee of job security and an eight percent across-the-board wage hike. The airline is offering a 5.9 percent increase. The airline has said it is embarking on a restructuring process that could lead to the loss of close to 1,000 jobs. The unions have said "inflated contracts" outsourcing work were "crippling SAA's finances (and) literally bleeding SAA dry every day". — AFP

# Report is bad news for Prime Minister Modi

**MUMBAI:** India said that it would not release a controversial report on shrinking consumer demand after a leading business daily leaked data showing that per capita spending had slumped for the first time in four decades. The report is bad news for Prime Minister Narendra Modi, who has struggled to revive India's stuttering economy.

Consumer demand in India's villages fell 8.8 percent between July 2017 and June 2018, compared with 2011-12, the Business Standard reported, using unpublished National Statistical Office (NSO) data. Two-thirds of India's 1.3 billion population lives in rural areas, making it a key economic driver. But spending on food, education and clothing declined, with demand for essential items such as cereals plunging 20 percent, the newspaper said.

Although urban consumption rose by two percent,

overall per capita monthly spending in the country slipped 3.7 percent - the first time it has fallen since 1972-73, the business daily said. The report was scheduled for release in June but was delayed because of its "adverse" findings, the Business Standard said, citing sources familiar with the matter. The ministry of statistics slammed the claims, saying that the government had decided not to release the report following the recommendations of an expert committee.

"Concerns were also raised about the ability/sensitivity of the survey instrument to capture consumption of social services by households especially on health and education," a ministry statement said. "In view of the data quality issues, the ministry has decided not to release" the report, it said. A ministry official had earlier told AFP the report was not finished. The data "can only be confirmed once the ministry publishes the report", AK Mishra said.

#### Prolonged slowdown

The decision to bury the report comes as Asia's thirdlargest economy battles a prolonged slowdown. In January, the Business Standard reported that unemployment had surged to a four-decade high during Modi's first term in power, citing unpublished government data. The delay in releasing the jobs report prompted a top Indian government statistician to quit in protest.

The report confirming the jobless data was finally released in May, after Modi was re-elected with a thumping majority, defeating challenger Rahul Gandhi. On Friday, Gandhi hit out at the government's alleged attempt to bury unflattering data. "Modinomics stinks so bad, the Govt has to hide its own reports," he tweeted. To counter the fall in demand for everything from cars to cookies, India's central bank has trimmed interest rates five times in a row, but to

Experts say India's economy has never recovered from Modi's surprise cash ban in 2016, which made 86 percent of the currency in circulation void. Many small businesses shut up shop and hundreds of thousands lost their jobs. The rollout of a nationwide Goods and Services Tax (GST) in July 2017 worsened the situation as businesses struggled to adjust to the new rules. In October, market researcher Nielsen said Indian rural consumption had slumped to a seven-year low, highlighting falling income for farmers who are struggling with mounting debt.— AFP

## Burgan Bank record one of the strongest third quarters

During 9M 2019, the Bank maintained its margins at similar levels as last year despite rise in cost of funds in Kuwait. During the earnings call, Raed Said, "At a group level, the margins are almost at the same level at 2.8% this year against 2.9% last year".

Group NIM of 2.8% is one of the highest in Kuwait and Burgan has been able to maintain these margin levels over the last few years. Burgan continues to deliver on operating efficiency. During the earnings call, Naveen Rajanala, Group Head of Strategy and Capital, said, "Burgan's operating expenses both at Group and Kuwait levels are lower than previous period". Burgan has reported Operating Profit of KD 103.6mn for 9M 2019.

Burgan Bank's Cost of Credit reduced significantly to 0.8% in 9M 2019 from 1.4% in the same period last year. Raed highlighted Burgan's strong risk management framework and said "In the first 9 months of 2019, Kuwait Cost of Credit is at KD 6mnwith a total Group Cost of Credit of KD 26mn. The improvement across all these metrics contributed to achieving strong Net Income for 9M 2019. During the call, Raed said, "In terms of Group Net income, we have reported KD 67mn this year against KD 71mn last year. The dip is primarily due to the one-month lag in our subsidiaries reporting whereas the Net Income from Kuwait business grew strongly from KD 51mn to KD 67mn." Burgan's Kuwait business Net income grew impressively by 32%. Burgan is placed quite comfortably in terms of its capital and liquidity levels. On this topic, Naveen said, "Burgan continues to be a capital efficient organization.

Our CET1 is currently at 11%. At year end, we expect our CET1 to be about around 11.5%". Regarding the liquidity levels, he said, "Burgan continues to be comfortable on both short term and long-term liquidity ratios." Going Forward, Burgan Bank remains generally optimistic about the prospects of growth of the Kuwait economy. Raed said, "Our target in Kuwait this year was a growth of 7% to 8% which we have achieved and this will continue to be our target even for next year".

### **S&P** downgrades protest-hit Lebanon

**BEIRUT:** S&P Global Ratings has downgraded Lebanon's sovereign debt, saying a twin political and economic crisis had hit investor onfidence and constrained the government's funding model, which relies on deposit inflows. The move to lower the protest-hit country's credit ratings to 'CCC/C' from 'B-/B' with a negative outlook came one day after S&P said it had downgraded three

It also came after Moody's rating agency downgraded Lebanon's sovereign debt earlier this month, saying sweeping anti-government protests had hit investor confidence and threatened macro-economic stability. The demonstrations have rocked Lebanon since October 17, forcing the government to resign last month and banks to close. They were fuelled in part by fears of a currency devaluation and a dollar shortage after banks restricted access to the greenback, causing the exchange rate to spike on the black market.

ATMs no longer dispense dollar bills and

banks have capped the amount that can be withdrawn from branches or transferred abroad. As a result, the exchange rate in the parallel market has surpassed 1,800 Lebanese pounds for every dollar-a spike from the pegged rate of 1,500. On Friday, S&P said, "diminishing confidence in Lebanon's governance and economy have led to a reversal in bank deposit inflows, which have historically financed Lebanon's elevated fiscal and external deficits.'

"Bank closures and unofficial foreign currency transfer restrictions raise questions about the sustainability of the exchange rate regime, further eroding confidence," it added in a statement on its website. Even before the protests began, growth in Lebanon had plummeted in the wake of repeated political deadlocks in recent years, compounded by the war in Syria. Public debt stood at more than \$86 billion, or higher than 150 percent of GDP, according to the finance ministry.

S&P on Friday said it expects the general government deficit will average 11.6% of GDP over 2019-2022 and gross general government debt will increase to 169% of GDP by 2022. It also called for the formation of a technocratic government-a key demand of the country's protest movement. "If a new, largely technocratic government is formed within the next month and is able to introduce immediate policy reforms... this could help defuse social tensions and support depositor confidence." — AFP

# The man who saved Lanzarote from overdevelopment

oadside billboards and high-rise hotels are banned on Spain's holiday island of Lanzarote-a legacy of visionary artist Cesar Manrique, whose birth a century ago is being celebrated this year. Part of the volcanic Canary Islands, a Spanish archipelago located in the Atlantic Ocean off the northwestern coast of Africa, the arid island welcomes some three mil-

dition. After working in New York as a painter and sculptor, Manrique returned in 1966 to his native Lanzarote, where he built a series of original buildings that merged with the island's unique landscape and have become part of its attraction.


He also worked closely with the local government on regulations that protected Lanzarote from the ravages of rampant

Volcanic bubbles To mark the centenary of his birth, Spain's King Felipe VI inaugurated last month a major retrospective of Manrique's works at the Caesar Manrique Foundation in the artist's former home in the town of Tahiche. The building, built on a lava outflow, uses the lower level of a natural formation of five volcanic bubbles to create a liveable space. Using dynamite, Manrique

rooms with whitewashed walls. The upper level has sweeping views of Lanzarote's petrified lava streams and volcanos. "The relationship between art and nature is Manrique's genetic axis," the foundation's director, Fernando Gomez Aguilera, told AFP, adding that for the late artist, "luxury comes from nature". Highly sociable and hedonistic, as a child Manrique liked to draw in the sand on the beach and had the "gift of noticing every-

thing", his brother Carlos, 94, told AFP.

After moving back to Lanzarote, Manrique quickly formed a bond with Pepin Ramirez, the head of the island's local government at the time and his childhood friend. Ramirez provided Manrique with technicians and workers for him to realise his unique building projects, and prioritized the artist's vision for the island over developing infrastructure. "It was a political bet; he reversed the order and they won the bet," said Gomez Aguilera.

Perhaps his greatest project is the Jameos del Agua cave-a lava tube where he created a natural auditorium, swimming pool and restaurant with views over a small lake that is home to a species of blind albino crab found only in Lanzarote. Another famous work is the cliffside El Rio Viewpoint and restaurant views of the neighboring island of La Graciosa which, like his other buildings, is harmoniously integrated with the natural environment. At the same time Manrique encouraged locals to respect traditional building methods. "He would go to villages, talk to farmers, and tell them: 'Your house is beautiful, take

care of it, don't let it crumble, it is good architecture," said Tonin Ramos, an electrician who worked with Manrique.



#### Would be a disaster

Marcial Martin, a former director of a network of cultural centers set up by Manrique, said "people are still aware that their home, their surroundings, must be cared for... that environmental awareness is still in force." Manrique started developing his projects just as Lanzarote began to develop its tourism sector, which now dominates its economy after centuries of relving on subsistence farming and fishing. "He sensed that if the island was not controlled, its growth and development would be a disaster," said musician and painter Ildefonso Aguilar, 74, who worked with

While no "original works" have been built on Lanzarote since Manrique's death, and there is a "standardization" of building styles in tourist centers, the late artist's vision for the island has been respected, Marcial Martin said. "It is a very fragile territory, if you break it even just a little, it is really hard, if not impossible, to restore it. We have to take care of it," he said. — AFP

ortuguese architect Tania Monteiro and her husband are almost alone as they tour Sudan's pyramids, a world-class attraction long neglected by the world. "People are really, really nice, always very welcoming," Monteiro said on a recent visit to Meroe, an ancient city on the east bank of the River Nile about 200 km northeast of the capital Khartoum. Sudan has more - though smaller pyramids than Egypt, but attracted only about 700,000 tourists in 2018 compared to some 10 million in its northern neighbor.

Conflicts and crises under veteran ruler Omar al-Bashir, a tough visa regime and a lack of roads and decent hotels outside Khartoum have made Sudan an unlikely tourist destination. But Bashir lost power in April, and the new civilian transition government is easing visa rules to attract more visitors with their hard currency to places such as the Royal Pyramids of Meroe. A

film crew was shooting a promotional video for a travel agency in Khartoum.


Like the Egyptians, the Nubian Kush dynasty that ruled in the area some 2,500 years ago buried members of the royal family in pyramid tombs. Near Meroe's pyramids lie an array of temples with ancient drawings of animals and the ancient city of Naga, and there are more pyramids further north at Jebel Barka.

#### Rise in tourist numbers

The new government has already started relaxing the visa system, including dropping a permit required for travel outside Khartoum, said Graham Abdel-Qadir, undersecretary of the ministry of information, culture and tourism. "There has been already a rise of tourists in October and November thanks to the new system," he told Reuters. Arrivals fell this year because of unrest but numbers are

expected to exceed 900,000 next year and might reach up to 1.2 million in 2021, he said. Sudan needs tourists after decades of isolation and hyperinflation.

This week the pound fell on the black market to 81 per dollar. The official rate is 45. At Meroe, thanks to money from Qatar and German expertise, a visitor's centre has been set up explaining the history of Sudan and the pyramids. There are walking tracks and a new reception centre. Visitors can for first time enter the pyramids' interior and will soon be able to go into tombs underneath, part of Qatar's \$135 million aid. Several pyramids will be restored after decades of neglect. Sudanese tourists are also coming. "We had three buses (of Sudanese alone) yesterday," said Mahmoud Suleiman, head of the site. — Reuters

# Scarier than fiction: Climate worry driving 'cli-fi' boom

PARIS: Imagine a world where storms inundate coastal megacities, entire species become extinct in the blink of an eye, and conflicts are fought over dwindling natural resources. Not so difficult in 2019, perhaps. After a year of devastating extreme weather and worldwide unrest over the emergency posed by climate change, topics that used to belong to the realm of science fiction are finding their way into mainstream storytelling. Back in 2004, Roland Emmerich's disaster flick "The Day After Tomorrow" depicted a global weather catastrophe, with coastal areas devoured by the sea amid general meteorological mayhem.

Just 15 years on, scenes from the movie resemble images taken from real-life weather events today. And as climate change makes superstorms, flooding, wildfires and droughts more likely, a new genre is gaining fatalistic fans the world over: "Cli-fi". "It's catching on like wildfire," said US writer and cli-fi aficionado Dan Bloom. He credited US President Donald Trump, who has said he will withdraw from the Paris climate deal, with helping promote the genre.

"There's a lot of people who say that climate change is not real," said Bloom. "These people are making the rest of us very angry and as a result cli-fi is getting more and more power." Andrew Milner, a professor of comparative literature at Melbourne's Monash University, said that cli-fi was yet to break out from sci-fi's yoke-most people get into the new genre practitioners-writers, readers, publishers, film directors, fans-relate primarily to the sciencefiction tradition," he said. "(But) it is very clear that the sub-genre has grown very rapidly in

#### Global appeal

Global protest movements such as the Youth Strike for Climate and Extinction Rebellion have heightened public awareness of the issue. For JR Burgmann, co-author of "Science Fiction and Climate Change: A Sociological Approach", cli-fi films and novels are a logical expression of an increasingly knowledgeable and concerned society.

"This rise is a response to real-world concerns," he said. "And though I would argue that literature has been rather slow to respond to manmade climate change, it certainly appears to be making up for lost time." And, because climate change is a truly global problem, cli-fi has become a worldwide, multi-lingual phenomenon.

In France, two major television series focusing on dystopian but conceivable futures have received popular and critical acclaim. because they like the old one. "Both its texts and around the world include "Blackout Island" by Icelandic author Sigridur Hagalin Bjornsdottir, a Canadian adaptation of Jean Hegland's "Into the Forest" and "Water Knife", by US author Paolo Bacigalupi. In "The History of Bees", Norwegian author Maja Lunde's 2017 bestseller, humanity is forced to pollinate their crops by hand after pesticides have wiped insects off the face of the Earth. "People are more and more worried about climate change and authors write about what scares them," Lunde told AFP last year.

#### 'Hard to ignore'

Novels and films about climate change are nothing new, of course. JG Ballard's "The Burning World" (1964) and John Brunner's "The Sheep Look Up" (1972) depicted a world ravaged by environmental damage decades before scientists fully understood manmade climate change. Even John Steinbeck's generational "The Grapes of Wrath" (1939) is essentially a tale of the harrowing ordeal undergone by climate migrants from the Oklahoma dust bowl.

But, as leading cli-fi author Jean-Marc Ligny explained, greater public awareness and a seemingly unending string of drought, wildfires and heatwaves have made climate a topic that's "hard to ignore". "Climate change needs stories, and readers need them to be told," he said. "There are figures, statistics, but these don't really say anything. Cli-fi makes people more aware of the situation."—AFP

## Apple bans vaping apps from Store

**SAN FRANCISCO:** Apple said it is banning vaping-related apps from its App Store due to concerns that e-cigarette use can damage lungs or even kill people. Apple vets what is allowed on the shelves of its virtual shop that serves as the sole outlet for apps available to its popular mobile devices, including some 900 million iPhones in use around the world.


"Recently, experts ranging from the CDC to the American Heart Association have attributed a variety of lung injuries and fatalities to e-cigarette and vaping products, going so far as to call the spread of these devices a public health crisis an a youth epidemic," Apple said in response to an AFP query prompted by an Axios report.

"We agree, and we've updated our App Store Review Guidelines to reflect that apps encouraging or facilitating the use of these products are not permitted." Apple has pulled 181 vaping-related apps from the App Store worldwide. Tobacco along with vaping cartridges were never allowed at the virtual shop, so the apps involved social networks, news, games, hardware or stores, according to the California-based company. "We are grateful that Apple is joining with us and others on this historic day to stand against big Vape and their lies by removing all vaping apps in the App Store," American Heart Association chief executive Nancy Brown said in a released statement. "Our hope is that others will follow our lead and follow with their own powerful message that nicotine and nicotine addiction caused by e-cigarette use are leaving thousands sick and dying across the globe." People who already have the now-banned apps on their Apple gadgets will be able to continue using them.

US President Donald Trump said this week that he plans to meet with vaping industry representatives as he considers whether to ban flavored e-cigarette products following a deadly epidemic of vaping-linked lung injuries. Vaping, already criticized as a "gateway" to tobacco or other addiction, is facing unprecedented scrutiny amid a mysterious epidemic linked to e-cigarette use that has killed 39 and sickened more than 2,000 mostly young people in the US. — AFP

# Taylor Swill-label feud underscores tensions over music ownership

nleash the Swifties: Taylor Swift has tapped her mil- Machine, which has not been made public. Susan Genco, a lions-strong social media fan base to pressure the heads of her former label, who she says are wielding "tyrannical control" over her music. The global superstar's latest chess move has reignited her months-long public feud with Big Machine Label Group, spotlighting the music industry's age-old issue of who keeps the keys to an artist's work. The 29-year-old pop singer known for her calculating social media strategy dropped a Tumblr post late Thursday accusing the Big Machine heads of blocking her from performing on television-she's set to do a career-spanning medley at this month's American Music Awards, where she'll receive an Artist of the Decade honor-and releasing a Netflix documentary.

She implied Big Machine-which has rebuffed the accusations-was reacting to her plans to re-record her early albums, by saying that performing on television "would be re-recording my music before I'm allowed to next year." This summer Swift began publicly sparring with industry mogul Scooter Braun over his company's purchase of her previous label of a decade, which gave him a majority stake in the master recordings of her first six albums.

Swift vowed to regain command of those albums by making her own new masters, which she says she's contractually allowed to start on in November 2020. In her post pleading for support from fans and fellow artists, Swift alluded to bullying from Braun and Big Machine CEO Scott Borchetta. Both parties have referenced a dispute over millions of dollars but voiced disagreement over who owes what.

"The message being sent to me is very clear," Swift said. "Basically, be a good little girl and shut up," she wrote in her post. "Or you'll be punished." Swift is now at Universal, with a contract under which she owns her work.

#### Counterintuitive

Performing for a television broadcast creates an "ephemeral recording," which could be subject to Big Machine's green light-though pinpointing legal specifics is impossible without reading Swift's contract with Big

music industry lawyer and lecturer at the University of California, Los Angeles, said if the contract contains a typical re-record provision, the label may have a "technical argument" that a taped television performance could violate her agreement.

"But it is certainly not the intent of the re-record provision and, to my knowledge, not a position that a label has taken before," she told AFP. "Keeping an artist from performing her songs on television seems counterintuitive and against the label's interest-as it promotes the catalog which

#### **Master Prince**

Swift's case highlights the schism between a new breed of artists adamant about holding the reins, and members of music's old guard who have long gripped them. The owner of lucrative masters-one-of-a-kind source material used to create vinyls, CDs and digital copies-is able to dictate how songs are reproduced and sold. Record companies have almost always kept those rights, justified by the financial risks labels take by supporting performers throughout their

The late legend Prince famously championed artists' rights to their work in the 1990s, rebelling against his label Warner over money and control of his music. He took the battle public by etching the word "slave" on his cheek and changing his name to an unpronounceable "love symbol" to take control of his image, with many media outlets began referring to him as "the artist formerly known as Prince." "If you don't own your masters, your master owns you," the superstar told Rolling Stone in 1996.

#### **Demanding autonomy**

Swift has revived debate over music ownership in an era where streaming rules, and young artists who are savvy with social media increasingly are demanding more autonomy. "Signing and retaining the biggest acts in the world-or even a brand new act that there's a bidding war for-has gotten a lot more expensive," said Larry Miller, director of New York University's music business program. "Some companies are occasionally willing to do things that have been contrary to the way their business model works."

Still, Miller said the major labels retain leverage when it comes to creating top stars: "In 2019 anyone can make a piece of music today on their laptop and smash it out." But "there's a big difference between being theoretically discoverable and having an army of people... to make you the biggest artist," he said. Swift, certainly a top global artist, says her stand is in part to give a voice to less powerful musicians. "I feel very strongly that sharing what is happening to me could change the awareness level for other artists and potentially help them avoid a similar fate," she said. — AFP

# Beyond Baby Shark: Creator of viral hit eyes China with dinosaurs

he creator of the children's song "Baby Shark," which has become a global phenomenon, says the firm is eyeing the Chinese market, where the tune did not quite catch on, with a brand new character featuring dinosaurs. The popular song about a family of sharks has been a rallying cry at Lebanese anti-government protests, played at the White House and praised by President Donald Trump and become the unofficial anthem of the baseball World Series champions Washington Nationals. It has also prompted parodies and a dance craze.

The co-founder and the chief financial officer of the South Korean publisher behind the viral song and video, the fifth-most viewed of all time, said it is targeting China next to make sure that it doesn't end a one-hit wonder. "Who would have thought sharks could become this popular?" Ryan Lee of SmartStudy told Reuters in an interview. "Children who like dinosaurs definitely exist around the world, but there's no brand name attached to them."

The Baby Shark song, which has had 3.9 billion views on Youtube, is a under copyright to SmartStudy, a South Korean company that is planning an IPO. Lee said the company sees the song to Baby Shark as "evergreen content". It is planning a Baby Shark-themed animated TV series with the Nickelodeon television network. For Asia's fourth largest but maturing economy, the so-called "kids industry" has been a bright spot with a fivefold growth to 40 trillion won (\$34.3 billion) in revenue in 2017 from 2002, according to eBEST Investment & Securities, even though its birth rate is one of the lowest in the world.

SmartStudy sees the limitation of the domestic market and is eyeing China, where the absence of YouTube, and the clunky local word for shark, did little for Baby Shark's appeal. Dinosaurs, on the other hand, will be a different story, Lee said, citing China's active research into the reptiles as a sign of great interest. "China is not an easy market, but there's no market more attractive other than China. More than a billion people speaking a single language and this is a country that evolved into a market from a factory."

SmartStudy eventually plans an initial public offering, the company said, hoping to capitalize on its 2019 sales projected at more than 60 billion won, eight times the figure five years ago. Backed by Baby Shark's popularity, shares of Samsung Publishing, SmartStudy's second-top shareholder, have jumped 60% this year, versus the wider market's 4 percent rise. — Reuters



Coetzee led more than 250 literary and journalist luminaries who called Thursday on India's Prime Minister Narendra Modi to revoke an order stripping writer Aatish Taseer of his "overseas citizenship". Salman Rushdie and leading Indian writer Amitav Ghosh also signed the letter which said Taseer "appears to have been targeted for an extremely personal form of retaliation" for his criticism of the Indian government.

Taseer, 38, born in Britain but raised in India, lost his Overseas Citizenship of India last week. The home ministry announced on Twitter that the journalist had "concealed" the fact that his father was Pakistani. Critics have, however, called the move a response to a Taseer cover story on Modi in Time magazine during the Indian election titled "India's

"Denying access to the country to writers of both foreign and Indian origin casts a chill on public discourse," said the letter, published by the free speech platform PEN America. "It flies in the face of India's traditions of free and open debate and respect for a diversity of views, and weakens its credentials as a strong and thriving democracy.'

Taseer was raised in India by his mother, Tayleen Singh, an Indian columnist and journalist. His father, Salman Taseer, was governor of Pakistan's Punjab province until he was assassinated in 2011. The letter said the decision by the Indian government was discrimination against single mothers. Taseer said he learned about the decision on Twitter. He later wrote: "It was not hard to feel, given the timing, that I was being punished for what I had written.'

Time has also condemned the move. "Journalists like Aatish Taseer should be allowed to do their work without harassment or retribution," a spokesperson told AFP. The Committee to Protect Journalists (CPJ) said Taseer's fate showed that Modi's conservative ruling party is "intolerant of criticism and freedom of the press". — AFP

Long live reggaeton



# Oscar Wilde's stolen ring found by Dutch 'art detective'

golden ring once given as a present by the famed Irish writer Oscar Wilde has been recovered by a Dutch "art detective" nearly 20 years after it was stolen from Britain's Oxford University. The friendship ring, a joint gift from Wilde to a fellow student in 1876, was taken during a burglary in 2002 at Magdalen College, where the legendary dandy studied. At the time it was valued at £35,000.

The trinket's whereabouts remained a mystery for years and there were fears that the ringshaped like a belt and buckle and made from 18carat gold-had even been melted down. But Arthur Brand, a Dutchman dubbed the "Indiana Jones of the Art World" for recovering a series of high-profile stolen artworks, used his underworld connections to finally find it.

Mark Blandford-Baker, home bursar of Magdalen College, said they were "very pleased to have back a stolen item that forms part of a collection relating to one of our more famous alumni." "We had given up hope of seeing it again," he told AFP. The ring will be handed back "at a small ceremony" on December 4, said Blandford-Baker, adding "we are extremely grateful to Arthur Brand for finding it and returning it to us."

#### Gift of love

The ring was an important part of Magdalen's large collection of memorabilia related to Wilde, who penned classics such as "The Picture of Dorian Gray" and "The Importance of Being Earnest". It was a present from Wilde and fellow student Reginald Harding to their friend William Ward in 1876 while the Irishman was a student at Magdalen, one of the three dozen colleges that make up Oxford University.

The ring bears the inscription in Greek that says "Gift of love, to one who wishes love." It also has the initials of: "OF OF WW + RRH to WWW"

on the inside. Disaster struck in 2002 when a former college cleaner named Eamonn Andrews broke into Magdalen, got drunk on whisky from the college bar, then stole the ring and two unrelated medals. The college at the time offered a £3,500 reward for the ring's safe return-but after he was caught, the burglar told a court that he had sold the golden band to a scrap dealer for £150.

"There are very strong indications that the appearance of the ring is linked to the 2015 burglary at Hatton Garden Safe Deposit. Rumors that the ring has reappeared first started a few weeks after the burglary," said Brand. "And I was given

# Banderas opens his Malaga theatre with 'A Chorus Line'

ollywood star Antonio Banderas throws open the doors of his own theatre in his hometown of Malaga in southern Spain on Friday, with an inaugural performance of "A Chorus Line". When the curtain goes up, the musical will be the first work shown at the Teatro del Soho, a former cinema which has been completely revamped by the 59-year-old actor, who like Picasso, was born and raised in Malaga.

The musical, which will be performed entirely in Spanish, was specially chosen by Banderas, who in May 1980s, will also take part in Friday's show, playing chorewon best actor at the Cannes film festival for his role in Pedro Almodovar's "Pain and Glory" in which he played the celebrated director's alter ego. A Broadway hit dating back to 1975, the story focuses on a group of aspiring dancers as they audition for a role in a new musical, putting the focus on the unsung heroes working in the

"There are no stars, the focus is on those people who really sustain the musical theatre industry but who don't have their name in lights and who are unknown," Banderas told reporters earlier this week. Describing the musical as "a classic", Banderas said it told a story about

"those involved in performing arts and all the suffering that goes on behind the scenes". On accepting his award at Cannes, Banderas admitted he himself had struggled over the years, saying: "There is a lot of sacrifice and... pain behind being an actor or being an actress, but also there are nights of glory."

#### Central role

The Andalusian actor, who began acting in the early ographer Zack who auditions the other artists in a performance involving 26 actors and accompanied by a 22piece orchestra. The musical will play to a full house when it opens on Friday with every ticket sold in the newly-revamped theatre, which has more than 800 seats.

After two months in Malaga, the show will then head to the northern port city of Bilbao, then Barcelona and finally Madrid. "Afterwards we'll consider the possibility of taking it to America," said Banderas who dreams of seeing his Spanish version on Broadway. "I would love that to happen," he admitted, saying "conversations were already under way" about taking it across the pond.

His involvement in the Malaga theatre really took off after he survived a heart attack in 2017 that saw him endure three operations. Theatre is "really my passion", Banderas said at Cannes, explaining he was spending a lot of time with his 600 students in Malaga and saving he ultimately wanted to stage something based on "my own writing". For him, the Soho Theatre is a venture in which he is both emotionally and financially invested, pledging more than 200,000 euros (\$220,000) a year to the project which is sponsored by Spanish lender Caixabank.

And as director, Banderas has brought in Lluis Pasqual, a giant of Spanish and European theatre, who formerly served as artistic director at Spain's National Drama Centre, Barcelona's Lliure Theatre and the Odeon Theatre in Paris. For Banderas this also has significance, recalling it was Pascual who "changed my life" when he took him on at Madrid's National Theatre in 1981. And while in Madrid, he met Almodovar who gave him a small role in his 1982 screwball comedy "Labyrinth of Passion", starting a relationship which has lasted until today. — AFP

# Victoria Beckham knew fashion industry would dismiss her as a wannabe

ormer pop-star Victoria Beckham knew she'd have to win over hard-to-impress fashion critics when she launched her first clothing line a decade ago, but the one-time Spice Girl said the industry was much harder to crack than she had ever imagined. Speaking in Paris on Friday at a conference organized by Vogue magazine, Beckham, whose collections have since gained critical acclaim and won fashion awards for their fluid, sharp tailoring, said she was expanding her empire with make-up and skincare ranges.

"I was very aware of the preconceptions, being married to David Beckham, being a Spice Girl, all of a sudden here's a collection, I knew that eyes would roll," she said, adding she'd focused on "making it all about the clothes and not listening to any of that." Beckham cited late Chanel creative chief Karl Lagerfeld and Italy's Valentino Garavani as two designers who had helped her, but said the notoriously cutthroat industry had surprised her. "If I'd known then what I know now, I don't know if I'd have the courage to do it," she joked.

According to the latest British company filings, Beckham's brand, which is privately owned by the designer, David Beckham and agent Simon Fuller, was still in the red in 2017. It raised 30 million pounds two years ago from NEO Investment Partners to revive the brand. Beckham said on Friday that as well as a recently launched make-up line, her brand would be turning out skincare products, as well as fragrances,

possibly next year. Cosmetics are an often highly profitable sideline

for luxury labels, and large rivals, from Kering and Gucci to Hermes, have expanded their ranges, which are accessible to a wider range of shoppers. Known as "Posh Spice" when she was in the 1990s girl band, Beckham, dressed on Friday in a green tweed suit, said she did not regret any of her previous fashion choices - including stage outfits such as the PVC catsuits she once sported. — Reuters



# Gunmen attack buses with Muslim Sri Lankan voters

**COLOMBO:** Gunmen fired at buses carrying minority an armed escort back home. In the Tamil-dominated Muslim voters yesterday as Sri Lankans elected a new president, with the powerful Rajapaksa clan eyeing a comeback seven months after Islamist extremists staged deadly bombings. Minority Tamils and Muslims are seen as crucial in the close election, and the attack in the northwest of the island - in which no one was injured - was likely aimed at deterring people from heading to the polls.

Election chief Mahinda Deshapriya said the shooting may not have prevented voting as just over 80 percent of the 15.99 million electorate was estimated to have turned out Saturday, compared to 81.5 percent at the previous presidential poll in 2015. "Comparatively this is the most peaceful presidential election we have had in this country," Deshapriya told reporters at the end of a 10-hour voting period.

Assailants set fire to tyres on the road and set up makeshift roadblocks before shooting at and pelting with stones two busses in a convoy of more than 100, police said. After casting ballots, the voters were given

northern peninsula of Jaffna, meanwhile, police said they arrested 10 men they suspected of "trying to create trouble", while also complaining that the army had illegally set up roadblocks that could stop people getting to polling stations.

Such tactics are nothing new in Sri Lanka, which emerged from a horrific civil war only a decade ago. At the 2015 election, there was a series of explosions in the north. Supporters from rival parties meanwhile clashed in a tea plantation area 90 km east of the capital Colombo, with two people taken to hospital with cut injuries, the election commission said.

#### Terminator vs Padman

Some 85,000 police were on duty for the election with a record 35 candidates running for president, an office with considerable power similar to the French political system. Results could come as early as midday (0630 GMT) today if there is a clear winner. One of the

colonel Gotabaya Rajapaksa, 70, younger brother to the charismatic but controversial Mahinda Rajapaksa, president from 2005-15.

Dubbed the "Terminator" by his own family, "Gota" is promising an infrastructure blitz and better security in the wake of the Islamist attacks in April that killed 269 people. "Gotabaya will protect our country," construction worker Wasantha Samarajjeew, 51, said as he cast his ballot in Colombo.

His main rival is Sajith Premadasa, 52, from the governing liberal United National Party (UNP), son of assassinated ex-president Ranasinghe Premadasa. He is also pushing development and security as well as free sanitary pads for poor women, earning him the nickname "Padman" after a famous Bollywood movie.

The Rajapaksas are adored by Śri Lanka's Sinhalese majority for defeating Tamil Tiger separatists and ending a 37-year civil war in 2009. They are detested and feared by many Tamils, who make up 15 percent of the

two frontrunners is grey-haired retired army lieutenant population. The conflict ended with some 40,000 Tamil civilians allegedly killed by the army.

During Mahinda Rajapaksa's presidency, Gotabaya was defense secretary and effectively ran the security forces, even allegedly overseeing "death squads" that bumped off political rivals, journalists and others. He denies the allegations. What also concerns Western countries, as well as India, is that strategically located Sri Lanka moved closer to China under Mahinda Rajapaksa, even allowing two Chinese submarines to dock in Colombo in 2014.

Under its Belt and Road Initiative spanning Asia and beyond, China loaned and granted Sri Lanka billions of dollars for infrastructure projects, many of which turned into white elephants and mired in corruption allegations. Mahinda says credit was unavailable elsewhere. Western capitals "should give a fair chance to us", Basil Rajapaksa, another brother, told reporters. "They can't be monitors of this country. They must be partners." — AFP

## Lebanon protesters angered by PM pick

BEIRUT: Lebanese protesters demanding radical reform have reacted with anger to the reported designation of a new prime minister they regard as emblematic of a failed political system. According to senior officials speaking on condition of anonymity and Lebanese press reports, key political players agreed that Mohammed Safadi should be tasked with forming the next government. Outgoing Prime Minister Saad Hariri resigned on Oct 29 - nearly two weeks into the unprecedented nationwide protests demanding the removal of a ruling elite seen as corrupt and incompetent.

President Michel Aoun has said he will support the formation of a government including technocrats but has not yet announced consultations over a new line-up, and there was no official confirmation that Safadi had been designated. Demonstrators in his hometown of Tripoli wasted no time in rejecting Safadi, however, and gathered on Friday in front of one of his properties to protest against a reported nomination they regard as a provocation.

"Choosing Mohammed Safadi for prime minister proves that the politicians who rule us are in a deep coma, as if they were on another planet," said Jamal Badawi, 60. Another protester said that as a business tycoon and former minister, Safadi epitomised the political class that the protest movement wants to remove. "He's an integral part of this leadership's fabric," said Samer Anous, a university professor. "Safadi does not meet the aspirations of the popular uprising in Lebanon."

Demonstrators also rallied Friday night outside Safadi's home in Beirut. "Mohammed Šafadi is corrupt and we are here to say that the revolutionaries are categorically opposed to see him at the head of the government," said protester Ali Noureddin.

#### Bank strikes

A protest was also planned at Zaytuna Bay, a luxury marina in central Beirut run by a company that Safadi chairs and that many say encroaches on public land. Several dozen private hospitals across the country closed their doors to patients - except for emergencies to protest shortages of essential goods following delays in payments by the state. Last week, the head of the syndicate of private hospitals, Suleiman Haroun, said that medical "stocks in the country will not last more than a month". A lack of access to the US currency meant the situation could deteriorate fast, he warned.

Banks, which have restricted access to dollars since the start of the protests, remained closed after employees went on strike over alleged mistreatment by customers, while many school and university classes were disrupted again. For two decades the Lebanese pound has been pegged to the greenback at around 1,500 to the dollar, with both currencies used interchangeably in

On Friday, S&P Global Ratings downgraded Lebanon's sovereign debt, lowering its credit ratings to "CCC/C" from "B-/B" with a negative outlook. It said the twin political and economic crisis had hit investor confidence and constrained the government's funding model, which relies on deposit inflows. The move came after Moody's rating agency also downgraded Lebanon's sovereign debt earlier this month.

The army, meanwhile, said it had arrested 20 demonstrators on Friday after soldiers were targeted as they attempted to reopen roads closed by protesters. Nine were later released, seven were held for questioning and four were transferred to the custody of military police, the army said without giving further details. — AFP

The Serenissima, as the floating city is called, is home to 50,000 residents but receives 36 million visitors each year. A massive infrastructure project called MOSE has been under way since 2003 to protect the city, but it has been plagued by cost overruns, corruption scandals and delays. — AFP

investigators, reportedly outlining how he overheard a phone call on which Trump asked about "investigations" he had requested from Ukraine into domestic political rivals. Trump's Twitter outburst highlighted the intensity of the public hearings that seek to establish whether the president abused the power of his office for personal political gain.

The impeachment hearings kicked off Wednesday with testimony by two senior diplomats including the current top envoy to Ukraine, William Taylor. Friday's testimony proved richer in drama, with the president leveling attacks from afar as Yovanovitch explained to lawmakers how "dangerous" it was for US diplomats not to have the backing of their own administration.

House Intelligence Committee chairman Adam Schiff, who presides over the impeachment inquiry, hit out at "witness intimidation in real-time by the president". Witness tampering including intimidation is a crime, but Schiff would not say whether it was an impeachable offense, or if Democrats would make it the subject of an article of impeachment. Trump defended his tweet, telling reporters: "I have the right to speak. I have freedom of speech just like other people do."

The ongoing inquiry in the Democratic-controlled House of Representatives centers on accusations that Trump froze US military aid in an effort to get Ukraine to launch political investigations against potential 2020 election rival Joe Biden and his son Hunter. The investigation threatens to make Trump the third US president to be impeached, although the Republican-controlled Senate would need to convict him to remove him from office.

Prior to her May ouster, Yovanovitch claims she was targeted by a smear campaign orchestrated in part by Trump's personal attorney Rudy Giuliani, who is accused of helping to coordinate the president's effort

to pressure Kiev. Yovanovitch told lawmakers her inexplicable removal plunged America's Ukraine policy into "disarray" and damaged Washington's global standing.

And when she read the memorandum of Trump's July 25 call with Ukraine's President Volodymyr Zelensky in which the US leader called her "bad news" and said she was "going to go through some things" - she said "it sounded like a threat". Yovanovitch was "shocked" and "devastated" to learn how Trump had personally disparaged her, she added.

But above all Yovanovitch expressed alarm that envoys could be so easily "kneecapped" by false accusations and corrupt foreign influences. "Our Ukraine policy has been thrown into disarray, and shady interests the world over have learned how little it takes to remove an American ambassador who does not give them what they want," she said. Yovanovitch leveled criticism at State Department leadership, and by extension Secretary of State Mike Pompeo, for failing to push back against forces that "apparently hijacked our Ukraine policy", or to support her in the face of "dangerously wrong" attacks against her.

Pushing back, Republicans grilled Yovanovitch on Hunter Biden's association with Ukrainian energy company Burisma while his father was vice president leading her to acknowledge it "could raise the appearance of a conflict of interest". No evidence of Biden wrongdoing related to Ukraine has emerged. Yovanovitch's testimony came amid more bad news for Trump. His longtime aide Roger Stone was convicted Friday for lying to Congress and witness tampering related to the probe into Russian interference in the 2016 election.

Taylor's aide David Holmes meanwhile testified in closed session that he overheard a previously unreported call between Trump and US Ambassador to the European Union Gordon Sondland, in which Trump asked about the status of the "investigations". That July 26 call was just one day after the Trump-Zelensky conversation in which Trump asked his counterpart to investigate the Bidens. Sondland told Trump that Zelensky "loves you're a\*\*" and "will do 'anything you ask him to," according to a copy of Holmes's opening statement obtained by CNN. — AFP

HH the Amir Sheikh Sabah Al-Ahmad Al-Sabah on Thursday had accepted the resignation of the Cabinet and asked the premier to continue as a caretaker PM until the new Cabinet is formed.

# Vettel tops times as Ferrari bounce back with one-two

## Verstappen third ahead of Valtteri Bottas

SAO PAULO: Sebastian Vettel topped the times despite a "scruffy" lap on Friday as Ferrari delivered a resounding one-two to prove they are back on form in second free practice for this weekend's Brazilian Grand Prix. The four-time champion clocked a best lap in one minute and 9.217 seconds to outpace Charles Leclerc by 0.021 seconds in a close finish to a session that, like the first, ended with a red flag and two cars off the track.

Red Bull's Max Verstappen was third ahead of Valtteri Bottas in the leading Mercedes, six-time champion Lewis Hamilton in the second Mercedes and Kevin Magnussen for Haas. "It was not a very tidy lap," said Vettel, who felt satisfied at his efforts, before turning his attention to the way in which Ferrari had been linked to unconfirmed allegations of "cheating" in the aftermath of the United States Grand Prix.

"I just said earlier that opinions swing so quickly nowadays," he explained. "In one race, in one and a half hours, it can be so different - and in one race can change again. I just think we can provide all our answers on the track." Verstappen said he also felt he had a "bit of a messy day because of the changing weather"

He added: "I think the lap times are not really representative as the track and ambient temperatures are pretty different to what it looks like for today. "It's positive that the car was straight away working well, there are of course always things you can improve, but it was a good start and we have a good basis for tomorrow."

His Red Bull team-mate Alex Albon, who was resigned by the team for 2020 this week, was fastest and then crashed in the rain in the opening session, before winding up ninth behind Renault's Daniel

Ricciardo and Kimi Raikkonen of Alfa Romeo. Both Mercedes men were satisfied with their limited running in the conditions.

"I am feeling cool about it," said Hamilton. "We did a lot of work and it was all nice and smooth. We have some more to do and we have to compact it, but I am not sure we can find three-tenths to catch Ferrari. They are just quicker on the straights."

After overnight rainstorms and a wet morning, the second session began in dry conditions with the teams keen to gain some track action as soon as the lights went green. Bottas was soon fastest in 1:10.812, a full six seconds quicker than Albon's best lap in the morning.

After six minutes, the session was red-flagged when Robert Kubica, in his penultimate race weekend for Williams, went off at Turn Three, smashing the front and left rear of his car in the barriers. The action was halted for six minutes and re-started.

Verstappen went top after 15 minutes before Hamilton took over followed by Leclerc and then Vettel, the Ferrari men making the most of his power on the straights a the Italian team responded to their disappointing weekend in Texas two weeks earlier.

After 45 minutes, a flowing and fast lap from Hamilton was upset when he came upon his teammate Bottas idling on the racing line. "Valtteri was just sitting there," said Hamilton on team radio, as the Finn did much the same to Vettel seconds later.

As the temperature threatened to fall at the Autodromo Jose Carlos Pace, there were more quick times as Ferrari and Mercedes set the pace, pursued closely by Verstappen's Red Bull in the top five.

With 20 minutes remaining, Pierre Gasly pulled up when his Toro Rosso's Honda engine failed and a brief



Virtual Safety Car period was deployed.

That stoppage completed, there were only five minutes remaining when the session ended, like the early opening period, with another red flag when Gasly's team-mate Daniil Kvyat smacked the barriers

at Turn 12, the rear of his Honda-powered car bursting into flames.

This brought the session to an end with no further action on track as rescue vehicles cleared away the two Toro Rosso machines.—AFP

# Jones admits error but wants to turn England into rugby 'powerhouse'

**LONDON:** England coach Eddie Jones wants his team to become the "powerhouse of world rugby" but has admitted he made a mistake in his selection for the World Cup final. The 59-year-old Australian, who has committed to seeing out his contract which runs until 2021, is not renowned for owning up to errors.

But he says part of the blame for the 32-12 defeat by South Africa in the final lay with his decision to start with George Ford and Mako Vunipola ahead of Henry Slade and Joe Marler. "I had been right against Australia and New Zealand but, as it turned out, in the biggest game of our four-year cycle, I got it badly wrong," writes Jones in his soon-to-be-published autobiography 'My Life and Rugby' which is being serialised in The Times.

"Hindsight is a wonderful teacher." Jones has turned England's fortunes round after taking over following their humiliating pool-stage exit in the 2015 World Cup. A crushing victory over two-time defending champions New Zealand in the semi-finals last month has given Jones plenty of enthusiasm to continue, but he has stopped short of committing to taking the team to the 2023 World Cup.

"I am definitely staying as England's coach for another two years," says Jones. "My contract runs until 2021. I'm excited by what our young team can achieve. "The potential is massive. Not only are they great rugby players but they are better people with outstanding character. "I believe I can keep making a difference with

"I believe I can keep making a difference with them over the next two years. We want to become the powerhouse of world rugby. "After that? We'll see. It's too early to know and, right now, I am happy to just hit the pause button."

Jones, who says the win over the All Blacks is one of four matches in his long career that stand out for him, including Japan's epic victory over the Springboks in the 2015 World Cup, accepts his days as a national coach are drawing in.

"I know the clock is ticking on my time at the top of international coaching," he said. "But I feel privileged to coach England and, for however long that lasts, I will give my best effort every day.

"We've taken a side that couldn't get out of the group stage in a home World Cup to being the second-best team in the world. "There was one team ahead of us, and 18 behind us." In spite of England's failure in the final, Jones — who concedes the Springboks were "outstanding" — remains fiercely proud of what they achieved.

"In the final minutes my mind starts to wander," he writes. "My first thoughts are for the players. They will be distraught. "They have been brilliant, coming together as a powerful, united England team which has done everything asked of it and more."

Jones believes the squad have given the country a welcome distraction from the divisions created over Brexit. "They have played with flair and tenacity and, during a difficult and uncertain time at home, they have given people something to smile about," he says.

"The subsequent news that the final was watched by the biggest television audience in the UK this year (over 12.5 million), and that supplies of replica jerseys had sold out, proved the boys had made a lasting impact." —AFP

#### INDORE: Mohammed Shami took four wickets as Bangladesh were bowled out for 213 in the final session in Indore after their gamble to bat first after winning the toss backfired badly against the Indian pace attack.

Shami's fellow fast bowlers Umesh Yadav and Ishant Sharma shared three wickets between them after India declared their first innings on 493 for six, with a lead of 343 runs. "The captain gave me the freedom to bowl the way I wanted and it went well," Shami said after the game. "Having Umesh and Ishant alongside me is a plus."

Bangladesh batsman Mushfiqur Rahim offered some resistance, hitting 64 after Rohit Sharma dropped him on four off Shami. Mushfigur, who scored 43 in Bangladesh's 150 in the first innings, finally became one of three wickets taken by offspinner Ravichandran Ashwin.

Ashwin, who reached 250 wickets in home Tests in the first innings, got last man Ebadat Hossain for one to spark India's victory celebrations. India were dominant with the bat and ball against Bangladesh.

Opening batsman Mayank Agarwal played a key part in the win with his 243 — his second double century in four Tests — as India amassed 407 runs on the second day. The bowlers kept up the pressure when Bangladesh started their second innings.

Yadav drew first blood, taking Imrul Kayes for six on a ball that curved into the left-hander and rattled the leg stump. Ishant Sharma got Shadman Islam for six in the next over. Shami then trapped skipper Mominul Haque lbw for seven.

Mominul was given not out by the on-field umpire but India skipper Virat Kohli successfully reviewed the decision with replays showing the ball would have hit leg stump. Shami, who also took three wickets in the first innings, took Mohammad Mithun for 18.



Bangladesh skipper Mominul said the batting of Mushfigur and bowling of Abu Jayed had been the only "positives" in the disappointing defeat. Abu Jayed stood out with his four wickets in the Indian

innings but got little support from his teammates. The second and final match is a day-night clash, with India hosting its first-ever pink-ball Test at Kolkata's Eden Gardens from November 22. —AFP

# Browns prepare for playoff push without suspended Garrett

**NEW YORK:** The NFL's suspension of Cleveland Browns defensive end Myles Garrett on Friday dealt a severe blow to the team's playoff hopes but they are determined not to let the incident define their season. Cleveland kept their hopes alive with a win over the Pittsburgh Steelers on Thursday but lost Garrett, one the game's top defenders, for at least the rest of the 2019 season after he used a helmet to attack another player.

Browns head coach Freddie Kitchens, who is trying to steer the team to their first playoff berth since 2002, said losing a player of Garrett's caliber makes things tougher but that he feels his players are ready for the challenge.

"There has been adversity hit it seems like all year so these guys have answered the call of adversity, and I expect them to do the same moving forward," Kitchens said on a conference call. "There will not be any excuses. We will have 11 out on the field, and those 11 will be expected to do their job."

With their victory over the visiting Steelers, the Browns improved to 4-6 on the season and remain very much alive in the playoff picture, but will have to keep their focus on the task at hand. "Sometimes in the biggest storm, that is when people come together the closest," Browns guard Joel Bitonio said on the conference call.

"We have a decision to make as a team. It is not one day everybody is saying, 'Yeah, we are in it together,' but it is your actions through the week of practice, through games that we have to make that collective choice.'

Garrett, a former first overall draft pick who on Friday apologized for his actions, is tied for fourth in the NFL with 10 sacks through 10 games this season and could have been Defensive Player of the Year candidate if not for the ban. —Reuters

## Kiwi Lee fires sizzling 62 to seize one-stroke **PGA Mexico lead**

MEXICO CITY: New Zealand's Danny Lee, seeking his first US PGA Tour title in more than four years, fired a nine-under-par 62 Friday to grab the first-round lead at the Mayakoba Classic. The 29-year-old South Koreanborn player made eight birdies and an eagle against a lone bogey in jumping to the top of the leaderboard at Playa del Carmen, Mexico, after play was entirely rained out on Thursday.

Americans Brendon Todd and Adam Long shared second on 63 with a US pack of Vaughn Taylor, Mark Hubbard, Zach Johnson and Chris Baker on 64 and Americans Billy Horschel and Harris English on 65.

Lee opened with a birdie, made another at the par-3 fourth and then eagled the par-5 fifth hole before running off a streak of three birdies in a row from the sixth through eighth holes. Lee ran off another three in a row from the 11th to par-5 13th holes before a three-putt bogey at 14 and four closing pars.

"For some reason, starting from three, my game felt really really good," Lee said, noting how he has changed his swing to add driving distance. "The new swing is working into my body now. I'm feeling better with all my clubs and wedges. It has been showing me a lot of good results." —AFP

### Chinese football at crossroads again after Lippi abruptly quits

SHANGHAI: China are searching for a third coach this year after the football association accepted Marcello Lippi's resignation following the damaging loss to Syria in World Cup qualifying. A clearly infuriated Lippi, the 71-year-old Italian World Cup winner, made a brief but angry appearance in front of the media after the 2-1 defeat on Thursday in Dubai.

"My pay is very high and I take all the blame. I am quitting as China coach," Xinhua news agency quoted him as saying. "We could beat weaker opponents like Maldives and Guam, but when we encountered stronger teams like the Philippines and Syria, we could not play our own football.'

Lippi then abruptly left the press conference, walking out before translators had even finished interpreting what he was saying. His second spell as China coach lasted only six matches. Hours later, the Chinese Football Association (CFA) said in a statement that it accepted Lippi's resignation. "We are really sorry that the unsatisfactory results disappoint all Chinese fans," the CFA said.

The CFA will seriously reflect, rebuild the team, and try our best in the following World Cup qualifiers." Syria's victory left them comfortably atop Group A in qualifying for the Qatar 2022 World Cup.

China are five points behind in second, only above the Philippines on goal difference, putting their World Cup hopes in peril. It has been a turbulent year for Chinese football and Lippi's resignation is another dent to the government's hopes

Gomez was booed when he came on as a substitute in the 7-0 mauling of Montenegro, while Henderson missed it due to a one-match ban. Victory assured England of a place at the finals.

"Jordan Henderson and Joe Gomez will miss England's final UEFA EURO 2020 qualifier in Kosovo on Sunday," read a statement from the Football Association (FA). "Henderson arrived in camp with a viral infection that has not fully cleared.

"Meanwhile, his Liverpool team-mate Gomez sustained a knock to the knee in training on Friday and has not recovered sufficiently enough to travel. "The pair have returned to their club meaning the Three Lions will head to Pristina on Saturday with a 23-man squad." —AFP

# Superb Spain destroy Malta 7-0 to clinch top spot in Group F

## Italy win record 10th match in a row with Bosnia rout

CADIZ: Spain clinched top spot in Group F in style by required medical assistance, although he remained on hammering Malta 7-0 at home on Friday for their biggest win of their Euro 2020 qualifying campaign as seven players got on the scoresheet. Spain had sealed their place at next year's tournament last month in unconvincing fashion by drawing 1-1 with both Norway and Sweden but they created a party atmosphere in Cadiz with a superb display of attacking football.

The Spaniards lead the standings with 23 points from nine matches, five more than second-placed Sweden who booked their place at Euro 2020 with a 2-0 win over Romania. Alvaro Morata put the Spaniards on their way to a resounding victory over Malta by netting midway through the first half, scoring for the seventh consecutive game for club and country.

Santi Cazorla doubled the lead shortly before halftime with his first goal for his country in over four years, a special moment for the much-loved 34-yearold who has staged a remarkable recovery from a career-threatening foot injury.

Robert Moreno's side turned on the style in the second half, with defender Pau Torres marking his debut with a goal in the 62nd minute and Pablo Sarabia also netting for the first time for Spain less than a minute later. Dinamo Zagreb striker Dani Olmo then came off the bench to make his Spain debut and moments later marked the occasion by scoring his side's fifth goal, while Gerard Moreno soon followed by netting his first goal for Spain.

Jesus Navas produced the most impressive strike of the evening for goal number seven, finding the top corner from outside the area, while substitute Paco Alcacer was not far away from hitting goal number eight when he rattled the post.

"I leave here feeling very satisfied because we never lost our desire. Every time Malta took a centre to restart the game we felt compelled to go looking for another goal," said Moreno. "It's great when new players come in and bring fresh air with them. I'm very happy for the lads that made their debuts and scored because it shows the team is ready to renew itself."

Malta coach Raymond Farrugia endured a painful night in more than one sense as he accidentally banged his head against the dugout in the second half and the sidelines until full-time.

"I barely remember anything about the last 20 minutes," said Farrugia, who was part of the Malta side who were infamously trounced 12-1 by Spain in a decisive qualifier for Euro 1984. "We were playing against the best team in the world. With these players Spain have the best team around and I think these players could easily go on to win the European Championship."

Meanwhile in Zenica, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Italy won 10 internationals in a row for the first time in their 109-year history when goals from Francesco Acerbi, Lorenzo Insigne and Andrea Belotti gave them a 3-0 victory at Bosnia & Herzegovina in a lop-sided Euro 2020 qualifier on Friday.

The Italians, who were already assured of advancing, top Group J with a maximum 27 points and were joined by second-placed Finland (18 points) who earlier reached their first major tournament with a 3-0 home win over Liechtenstein.

The result meant coach Roberto Mancini improved on Vittorio Pozzo's run of nine straight wins between 1938 and 1939. "Let's remember that he won five trophies with the national team so there is still a long road ahead," said Mancini, who took over after Italy missed out on last year's World Cup and has overseen a remarkable turnaround.

"Of course, I'm pleased to have bettered a legend such as him." Under Pozzo, Italy won the 1934 and 1938 World Cups, the 1936 Olympic Games as well as the now defunct Central European International Cup twice.

Italy's current streak includes a friendly win over the United States followed by nine matches in Euro 2020 qualifying so far. They finish by hosting Armenia on Monday. Bosnia dropped to fifth on 10 points and, while Finland's victory dashed any slim hopes they had of finishing in the top two, the Balkan country can still progress to next year's tournament via the Nations League playoffs in March.

With Finland's success reducing the Bosnia-Italy game to a dead rubber, it was played at walking pace for long spells but the gulf in class was apparent as defender Acerbi fired the visitors ahead with a fine

individual effort in the 21st minute. Insigne doubled Italy's lead with a bouncing shot on the turn in the 37th, while goalkeeper Gianluigi Donnarumma denied Bosnia's Ermin Bicakcic and Adnan Kovacevic with a pair of excellent saves at the other end.

Disgruntled home fans treated Belotti to a standing ovation after the striker made it 3-0 with a spectacular 53rd-minute goal, as he took a through ball in his stride and beat Ibrahim Sehic with a thunderbolt from 18 metres. — Agencies

# Sweden clinch Euro 2020 spot



**BUCHAREST:** Sweden sealed a place at Euro 2020 after goals from Marcus Berg and Robin Quaison secured a 2-0 win away to Romania on Friday. The result secured second spot in Group F for Sweden with 18 points. Spain, who sealed a place at the finals last month, top the standings with 23 points from nine games after thrashing Malta 7-0. Romania are third with 14 points.

Sweden coach Janne Andersson was moved to tears by his side's performance, saying: "This is so fantastic, it can't be true. What players I have. I am so incredibly happy and proud. "I had tears in my eyes

when there was two minutes to go. That we are going to the Euros is one thing, that the players did it together is fantastic, unbelievably fantastic."

Striker Berg, also speaking to Sweden's TV4, added: "There was a lot of pressure today, there weren't many that thought we could come here and beat them 2-0... I'm completely empty, it's going to take a while before it sinks in."

Berg put the Swedes ahead in the 18th minute with a trademark header past goalkeeper Ciprian Tatarusanu following a cross from Emil Forsberg. It was his 21st international goal. Midfielder Quaison wrapped up the points with a cool finish 16 minutes later, with Berg turning provider.

The visitors continued to dominate after the break with Albin Ekdal rattling the crossbar with a thundering shot midway through the second half. Romania, lacking ideas and urgency, failed to create any clear-cut chances at the National Arena.

The match was halted for a couple of minutes late in the second half by the match referee after alleged racist chanting from the stands and a public announcement was made. — Reuters

# Southgate to bring Sterling back from England exile

PRISTINA: Gareth Southgate is set to bring Raheem Sterling back from his brief England exile in today's Euro 2020 qualifier against Kosovo as he seeks to end the controversy over the Manchester City star's row with Joe Gomez.

Sterling was dropped for Thursday's 7-O rout of Montenegro after clashing with England team-mate Gomez in the Three Lions' training base canteen. It is believed Sterling was unhappy with Gomez following an altercation with the Liverpool defender during City's Premier League defeat at Anfield last weekend.

Although Sterling was left out of the Montenegro game as punishment for his attack on Gomez, Southgate has confirmed the winger will return for England's final Group A fixture. Sterling and Gomez, left with a scratch under his eye after the incident, are said to have patched up their relationship, but the centre-back was jeered by England fans at Wembley when he came on as a substitute against Montenegro.

Both Southgate and Sterling expressed their support for Gomez and criticised the booing supporters, with the England manager reportedly comforting the shocked 22-year-old and his family after the match. Now Southgate could include Gomez against Kosovo in a show of support for the Liverpool player. With England already guaranteed to qualify for Euro 2020 in first place in their group, Southgate already planned to make changes, although he is keen to ensure England finish with a win as they eye a top-six seeding in next year's tournament.

"We will make some changes, for sure, but the seeding in the group could be critical and we know it's a big night for the Kosovans," Southgate said. "It's a shame for them that they're now out of this part of the qualification, although they've still got the play-offs in which I think they'll be a huge threat in that format.

"So, it will be a good test for us because it will still be a lively environment. "The enthusiasm for the game is high and we want to finish the group with as many points as we can." Liverpool captain Jordan Henderson could return following a one-match ban, while Southgate has to decide whether to keep faith with Ben Chilwell ahead of Danny Rose at leftback. Harry Kane may have scored a hattrick against Montenegro but it was Leicester's Chilwell who was named England's man of the match following a fine display in which he provided three assists in the opening 24 minutes.

"Ben, I liked the hunger in his game, the enthusiasm to get forward," Southgate said. "The whole team pressed well but he also pressed well from that full-back position, got into overlaps, his quality of delivery was excellent."

Although England have cruised through their qualifying group, Southgate believes the 2018 World Cup semi-finalists still have room for improvement as they chase a first major title since 1966. "There were a couple of chances we conceded that just shouldn't happen, so that's still part of our game that we've got to improve upon," he said.

"If we are to be a team that are going to challenge seriously, although we're young, we've got to manage games well. "We've got to make sure that, although we're such a fantastic attacking threat, the rest of the team is right as well. There are things we've got to be better at." — AFP

# Messi scores on Argentina return to sink Brazil

RIYADH: Lionel Messi struck on his return to international duty Friday following a three-month ban as Argentina defeated fierce rivals Brazil 1-0 in a friendly in Riyadh. The Barcelona forward was suspended by CONMEBOL for accusing South American football's ruling body of "corruption" after he was sent off in July's third-place play-off with Chile

at the Copa America. Messi netted the only goal of the game at the King Saud University Stadium on 13 minutes, tapping home the rebound after his penalty was saved by Brazil goalkeeper Alisson.

His effort came shortly after Manchester City striker Gabriel Jesus rolled a spot-kick wide for Brazil, who were playing without the injured Neymar. Messi, who scored with a pair of free-kicks in his last game with Barcelona, twice threatened from set pieces in the second half before Liverpool 'keeper Alisson beat away a powerful drive from Leandro Paredes.

Rodrygo, the 18-year-old who scored a sensational Champions League hat-trick with Real Madrid this month, made his Brazil debut as he replaced Willian for the final 20 minutes. However, Brazil were unable to find an equaliser as their winless run since capturing the Copa America title extended to five matches.

"It's important to win and it is always nice to beat Brazil, for the rivalry, which feels a lot of late," said Messi. "It's good for everything that is to come, to continue growing while looking towards the qualifiers and the next Copa America (in 2020).'

The meeting between the two South American giants was the second in Saudi Arabia in little over a year. Brazil beat Argentina 1-0 in Jeddah in October 2018.

Brazil also defeated Argentina 2-0 at home in the semi-finals of this year's Copa America, a controversial match that left Messi complaining the hosts had benefited from favouritism.

Brazil will play a friendly against South Korea in Abu Dhabi on November 19, in their final game before South American qualifying starts for the 2022 World Cup in March. — AFP

# **Denmark's victory** sets up crunch qualifier in Dublin

**COPENHAGEN:** Denmark got off to a slow start before overwhelming Gibraltar 6-0 on Friday to take over the top of Group D and set up a decisive Euro 2020 qualifier in Dublin tomorrow.

Denmark will qualify for next year's European Championship if they avoid defeat against Ireland at the Aviva Stadium, after moving 3 points clear of the Irish. But they will need to sharpen up their play after making heavy weather of beating tiny Gibraltar, whose population is not much more than the 24,033 who watched the game at Copenhagen's Parken Stadium.

Denmark, unbeaten in the qualifiers, were ahead only 1-0 at halftime and had lapses of concentration by the part-timers to thank for their goals rather

than their own ingenuity.

Winger Robert Skov opened the scoring in the 11th minute after Gibraltar's diminutive goalkeeper, Kyle Goldwin, twice failed to hold on to the ball but for the rest of the half the hosts battled to break down a determined defence. Straight after the break, Goldwin mistimed coming out to cut off a long kick upfield from the Danes and the pace of striker Christian Gytkjaer allowed him to get to the pass first and slide it home.

Martin Braithwaite converted an easy tap in 4 minutes later after Goldwin parried Christian Eriksen's square pass into his path and Skov grabbed a second for himself in the 64th minute as Gibraltar's defence failed to clear a cross.

Eriksen scored the fifth with a shot from outside the penalty area 6 minutes from time and then added another with the last kick of the match as a clearance was kicked straight at him. Denmark have 15 points from seven matches, one more than second-place Switzerland, who finish their campaign away at Gibraltar on Monday. Ireland must beat Denmark to qualify. — Reuters

# Nadal bows out on top of the world

### Rafael is now on 19 majors, just one behind Federer

LONDON: Rafael Nadal was unable to crown his season with a first ATP Finals title but he ends it as world number one and with a chance to lead Spain to Davis Cup glory. The Spaniard, who came to London under an injury cloud, had a terrible start to his week at the O2 Arena, crushed in straight sets by defending champion Alexander Zverev in his first round-robin match.

But he produced a performance of astonishing grit to recover from 5-1 and match point down against Daniil Medvedev and saw off Stefanos Tsitsipas in three sets on Friday. It was not quite enough to reach the semi-finals but Nadal leaves London after securing the year-end number one ranking for a fifth time, pulling level with Roger Federer and Novak Djokovic.

Nadal was in the strange position after his win against 21-year-old Tsitsipas of not knowing whether he would be heading home or playing Federer in the knockouts. Later, Zverev's win against Medvedev confirmed his tournament was over.

med his tournament was over.

The 33-year-old, who was presented

with the trophy for securing the number spot on court, said it was difficult to compare the achievement with winning a Grand Slam. Nadal is now on 19 majors, just one behind Federer after winning his 12th French Open this year and his fourth US Open crown.

"I know it is something so important because to achieve this you have to play well for 11 months," he said. "To win a Grand Slam you have to play well two weeks. But it's difficult to compare. For me personally, when you win a Grand Slam, you win a Grand Slam winning the last point, and that feeling you, can't have it here. That's the big difference."

But he said finishing on top of the world was a great achievement after his struggles with injuries earlier in the season. And he was delighted to pull level on five year-end finishes with Djokovic and Federer — the other two members of the "Big Three".


Nadal can look back on another staggering year in which he has shown remarkable consistency, winning four trophies including two Masters titles. He reached the semifinals at all four Grand Slams in a season for just the second time in his illustrious career.

But it did not start too promisingly for the veteran, who was plagued by injuries early in the season, including a thigh strain and right knee injury.

The injury jinx struck again late on, forcing him to miss October's Shanghai Masters with a wrist injury and his participation at the ATP Finals was in doubt after he withdrew from the Paris Masters at the semifinal stage with an abdominal strain.

But now the dust has settled, Nadal can look back on another staggering season in which he overtook Djokovic in the final stretch to top the rankings. "My decision or our decision is to try to do the things to play as long as possible, so that's why I tried to do the conservative calendar in terms of saving the body and everything," said Nadal.

"But the thing is when I have been playing, I have been playing very well. I achieved almost every single time the last rounds of every tournament. "So that's why I'm put in a position that I am where I am

today, having this trophy with me." And it is not over yet for the Spaniard. Nadal has the chance to lead Spain to glory in the newlook Davis Cup in Madrid next week and he is raring to go. Changes to the tournament's format mean 18 teams will be vying for the title over the course of a week.

"Let's see how the thing works," he said.

"I am sure that they did great and it is going to be something really special. And playing at home even more. "So excited about it. I really hope that the team is working the right way during these previous days of the tournament, so I really expect to find a team very well-prepared when I arrive there." — AFP
