The 47-year-old African-American was in the garage of a house when he was shot several times by Adam Coy, a police officer who had been called to the scene for a minor incident. — AFP

Rajinikanth ends political bid

CHENNAI: Indian movie superstar Rajinikanth yesterday cancelled his plans to enter politics, saying a health scare had been "a warning from god". The announcement came a day after the 70-year-old Tamil action hero left hospital where he was treated for high blood pressure. The bus conductor-turned-actor said he could not go ahead in a long letter released on his Twitter account. — AFP

MoCI: Largest seizure of fake food products

KUWAIT: The ministry of commerce and industry announced yesterday that its commercial control and consumer protection unit seized 52,000 counterfeit packets of products imitating those of an international food brand. The ministry said in a press statement that on the instructions of Commerce Minister Faisal Al-Medlej, inspectors have intensified their inspection rounds, which has enabled them to control goods that are sold to gro-

Pakistan sends 196 medics to Kuwait

ISLAMABAD: Pakistan yesterday sent 196 medical professionals to Kuwait under an agreement signed between the two countries in July this year. The new batch of medical professionals, which included 41 doctors, 131 nurses and 24 technicians, came under the agreement between Pakistan and Kuwait to combat COVID-19.

Kuwait COVID cases pass 150K

KUWAIT: Kuwait reported 236 new coronavirus infections in the past 24 hours, taking total cases to 150,093, as the death toll remains at 932, the health ministry said yesterday. The number of people hospitalized with the virus currently stands at 3,105, with 43 patients in intensive care units, according to ministry spokesman Dr Abdullah Al-Sanad. The ministry earlier reported that some 248 people had recovered from the virus over the past day, raising the total number of recoveries to 146,056. — KUNA

Iran trials own vaccine; S Africa tightens curbs

TEHRAN/JOHANNESBURG: Iran launched yesterday the first phase of a clinical trial of a vaccine developed in the Islamic Republic, the region's country hardest hit by the pandemic, state television reported. "The first vaccine against the coronavirus, developed by Iranian researchers, has been unveiled by injecting three people," the public broadcaster said. The novel coronavirus has killed nearly 55,000 out of more than 1.2 million people infected in Iran, according to health ministry data.

Iran has accused archenemy the United States of hampering its access to vaccines through its tough sanctions regime. State television yesterday broadcast images at the trial launch showing two men and one woman receiving injections in the presence of the health minister and the Iranian vice-president in charge of science and technology. It said the vaccine project was funded by a state-run conglomerate whose president is appointed by the Iranian supreme leader, called the Execution of Imam Khomeini's Order or EIKO.

The state TV report said the three volunteers were the daughter of the president of EIKO and two high-ranking officials of the conglomerate. The vaccine will be administered to "56 volunteers" in two doses two weeks apart, **Continued on Page 2**

The figure shows an increase in the targeting of reporters investigating organized crime, corruption or environmental issues, the watchdog said. It highlighted murders in Mexico, India and Pakistan.

Eighty-four percent of those killed this year were "deliberately targeted" for their work, RSF said in its annual report, compared to 63 percent in 2019. "For several years now, Reporters Without Borders has noted that investigative journalists are really in the crosshairs of states, or cartels," said Pauline

killed. "Links between drug traffickers and politicians remain, and journalists who dare to cover these or related issues continue to be the targets of barbaric murders," said the report. None of the Mexico killings had yet been punished, added RSF, which has compiled annual data on violence against journalists around the globe since 1995.

Afghanistan, it said, noting an increase in targeted attacks on media workers in recent months even as peace talks between the government and Taleban are ongoing. RSF also highlighted the case of Iranian opposition figure Ruhollah Zam, who ran a popular social media channel that rallied regime opponents, and who was executed in December. His execution "confirms Iran's record as a country that has officially put the most journalists to death in the past half-century," it said. —AFP

according to Iribnews, the state television site, quoting a person in charge of developing the drug. The result would be announced 28 days after the second injection, it said.

Another Iranian vaccine, developed at the country's Razi Institute, "will receive authorization" for the start of human trials "in the very near future," said Health Minister Saeed Namaki. Namaki early this month said Iran had "pre-purchased" about 16.8 million vaccine doses via Covax, the mechanism for the equitable distribution of vaccines established by the UN World Health Organization.

Meanwhile, South Africa banned alcohol sales and made masks mandatory in public from yesterday, tightening restrictions after a surge in coronavirus cases as more countries joined in mass vaccination campaigns to beat the pandemic. Nations around the world are struggling with winter spikes in infections that have pushed the global caseload close to 81 million and killed more than 1.77 million, even as the rollout of vaccines gathers pace in North America and Europe.

South African President Cyril Ramaphosa announced a ban on selling alcohol and said face masks will be compulsory after his nation became the first in Africa to record one million cases. "We have let down our guard, and unfortunately we are now paying the price," said Ramaphosa, blaming "super-spreader" social events and an "extreme lack of vigilance over the holiday period" for the spike.

Ramaphosa said data showed "excessive alcohol consumption" leads to an increase in trauma cases reported at hospitals, causing an "unnecessary' strain on public health facilities. Highlighting the renewed virus spread, England's health officials warned the country was "back in the eye" of the coronavirus storm with as many patients in hospital as during the initial peak in April, and the new strain appearing to be causing the recent upsurge.

National Health Service England figures showed there were 20,426 COVID patients in the country's hospitals on Monday, compared to the 18,974 peak recorded during the first wave. "Many of us have lost family, friends, colleagues and - at a time of vear when we would normally be celebrating - a lot of people are understandably feeling anxious, frustrated and tired," said NHS England chief executive Simon Stevens

Across the globe governments are rushing to get vaccines out to try to avoid the kind of economically damaging lockdown restrictions put in place soon after the pandemic first emerged in the Chinese city of Wuhan a year ago. Argentina and Belarus yesterday launched their vaccination campaigns, both using the Sputnik V shots developed by Russia. The Gam-CovidVac vaccine, nicknamed Sputnik V after the Soviet-era satellite, has come under fire from critics in Russia and abroad because it was registered before the start of large-scale clinical trials.

Other nations are rolling out campaigns with jabs made by Pfizer-BioNTech and Moderna, most inoculating vulnerable older residents, care workers and others most at risk. Vaccinations in EU countries started over the weekend, but authorities fear vaccine hesitancy and rejection could hamper those efforts - especially because of misinformation campaigns on social media.

That was not a concern with 75-year-old Jacques Collineau, resident of an old people's home in Joue-les-Tours, France. "Fear? Fear of what? I've been vaccinated for the flu before, now it's the same thing," Collineau said as he got the shot on Monday. "We don't make vaccines to kill people, we make vaccines to try to save them."

The coronavirus has devastated lives and economies across the globe, but the WHO warned Monday that worse pandemics could be ahead, urging the world to get serious about preparedness. "This is a wakeup call," WHO emergencies chief Michael Ryan told reporters at a briefing marking a year since the UN agency first learned of the new virus spreading in China. "This pandemic... has spread around the world extremely quickly and it has affected every corner of this planet, but this is not necessarily the big one," Ryan added. "We need to get ready for something that may even be more severe in the future."

While huge scientific progress was made to study the virus and develop vaccines at record speed, WHO senior adviser Bruce Aylward cautioned that the world was far from ready for the next pandemic. "We are into the second and third waves of this virus and we are still not prepared to deal with and manage those," he said.

The warnings were backed up by the worrying figures and trends reported worldwide. South Korea, one of the nations hailed for its success during the first months of the pandemic, yesterday logged its highest daily death toll since the beginning of the pandemic as it battled a third wave of infections. India, with the second-biggest caseload in the world, reported the detection of the new coronavirus strain, but officials said the nation's pandemic guidelines have not changed because of it.

Highlighting the frustration and suffering caused by the crisis, submissions from around the world came in for a Good Riddance Day celebration in New York City. The submissions were printed and then shredded, while the host of the event pulverized a 2020 pinata. When Westbury, New York resident Raul was asked what he wanted to say good riddance to, he responded: "Like anybody else, I want to get rid of the coronavirus. That's it!" — AFP

Cabinet content with declining COVID-19 figures

KUWAIT: The Cabinet held its weekly meeting on Monday, chaired by His Highness the Prime Minister Sheikh Sabah Al-Khaled Al-Hamad Al-Sabah. After the meeting, Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of State for Cabinet Affairs Anas Al-Saleh said that Health Minister Sheikh Dr Basel Al-Sabah briefed the meeting on the latest developments concerning COVID-19 in Kuwait. The minister voiced content over the general status of the pandemic in the country, deeming it "stable" based on declining figures in new contamination and fatality rates. Sheikh Dr Basel also underlined that the decision to suspend commercial flights and land travelling is still valid until January 1, 2021; with traffic in all ports and border crossings resuming the day after the aforementioned date. He fortunately noted that no mutant COVID-19 strains were detected thus far, as well as

not detecting any side effects since the trial launch of vaccination campaign last Thursday.

The Cabinet was then briefed by the invitation received by His Highness the Amir Sheikh Nawaf Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah from King Salman Bin Abdulaziz of Saudi Arabia to attend the 41st GCC ordinary leaders' summit in Riyadh, as well as the letter sent by Amir of Qatar Sheikh Tamim Bin Hamad Al-Thani. In his letter, the Qatari Amir voiced appreciation to His Highness the Amir Sheikh Nawaf Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah and His Highness the late Amir Sheikh Sabah Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah for their sincere efforts to resolve

the Gulf crisis. The Cabinet, in this regard, expressed content over the potential breakthrough in mending the Gulf rift, hoping for the anticipated summit to complement previous efforts led by the late Amir Sheikh Sabah Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah. During the session, a visual display on the State Audit Bureau's 2019-2020 financial reports was presented by chair of the Government Performance Follow-Up Agency Sheikh Ahmad Mishal Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah for projects under the Agency's mandate. The Cabinet then discussed latest political issues and developments on regional and international levels. —KUNA

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Fashionista jailed for insulting prosecutors

KUWAIT: The misdemeanor court sentenced fashionista Jamal Al-Najadah to one year in jail and a KD 1,000 fine for insulting members of the public prosecution, Al-Rai Arabic daily reported yesterday. The public prosecution had earlier released Najadah on KD 2,000 bail after charging her with insulting the judiciary. Najadah denied the charge, saying she did not mean to insult the judiciary, adding that a follower contacted her on Snapchat and spoke to her about the money laundering case she is charged with. She said she didn't know the call was being recorded, and was surprised after it was posted on social media. She apologized to the prosecution.

Money laundering

The public prosecution has completed the charge report of a money laundering case estimated

at more than KD 4 million, Al-Rai reported yesterday. Sources said the case includes 19 suspects, with a man named "Salehi" the most notable among them. The charges include money laundering, liquor trade and possession of firearms. It said four suspects are in jail and one is outside Kuwait. Investigations revealed that the suspects laundered more than KD 4 million, knowing that the money was embezzled from the government. The sources said the suspects carried out many transfers through various accounts and issued checks, cashed them and circulated the money to cover the illegal sources. They said "Salehi" used money in his account to buy real estate and luxury cars.

Suicide

A 31-year-old Indian man committed suicide in Kuwait after his employment was terminated, Al-Anba Arabic daily reported yesterday. Police received a report that a person had committed suicide inside his apartment in Abu Halifa, so security men and forensic officers rushed to the scene and found the body hanging by a rope. According to his friends, the man took his life after the company where he worked terminated his services.

KRCS sends relief to burned camp victims in Lebanon



BEIRUT: Kuwait Red Crescent Society yesterday delivered relief supplies to scores of Syrian refugees whose camp in northern Lebanon was totally burned. Head of the KRCS mission in Lebanon Dr Musaed Al-Enezi said that the society team acted quickly to relieve the refugees after their camp was scorched in the town of Bahnin. The team, in coordination with the Lebanese Red Cross, distributed food, hygienic materials and blankets to the families who were deprived of dwellings after the blazes gutted the shanty town, which had



accommodated 100 families. Dr Enezi indicated that rapid response was necessary to aid the refugees, amid the biting winter cold. Meanwhile, the deputy municipality head in Bahnin, Amer Bekaai, expressed appreciation for the Kuwaiti aid for the impoverished Syrians. The camp was set afire against background of a personal quarrel that involved some locals with Syrian workers. Enezi also indicated that among the team's latest tasks was delivery of aid supplies to 300 Lebanese and Syrian families. —KUNA

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Weakened Trump faces first veto override

US House of Representatives deals a blow to US President

WASHINGTON: The US House of Representatives dealt a blow to President Donald Trump on Monday by rejecting his override in the final days of his presidency. The Democratic-controlled House voted 322 to 87 to override Trump's veto of the \$740.5 billion defense bill, with 109 members of the president's own Republican Party siding with Democrats. A similar motion will be introduced in the Republican-majority Senate, where it will also have to gain two-thirds support to override the president's veto.

In a statement released after the vote, Democratic House Speaker Nancy Pelosi slammed Trump's veto as "reckless" and called on the president to "end his eleventh-hour campaign of chaos." The House vote came a day after Trump caved to pressure from both Republicans and Democrats and reluctantly signed a \$900 billion coronavirus relief and stimulus package that he had threatened to veto. Trump's capitulation on the Covid-19 relief bill and the looming congressional veto override are the latest signs of his waning powers as he prepares to leave the White House on January 20.

The fiscal 2021 National Defense Authorization Act was passed this month by 335 votes to 78 in the House and by 84 veto of a defense bill, setting the stage for to 13 in the Senate. But the NDAA was the Senate to deliver a humiliating first veto vetoed by the president because it did not repeal Section 230, a federal law that provides liability protection to internet

> Trump also opposed a provision that would strip several US military bases of the names of generals who fought for the secessionist, pro-slavery South in the 1861-65 Civil War. Including the defense bill, Trump has vetoed nine bills during his four years in the White House. Congress has not previously mustered the votes needed to override any of his vetoes.

'Stop the Insanity'

For a real estate tycoon who prides himself as a master negotiator, the past few

days have been an exercise in humiliation. Trump threatened for days not to sign the Covid-19 relief and spending bill that had been hammered out by his own treasury secretary and had received broad bipartisan support in Congress. His surprise move risked shutting down the government from Tuesday and depriving millions of Americans of economic relief badly needed

Sophie Petronin.

He finally backed down under bipartisan pressure and signed the bill on Sunday night at his Mar-a-Lago club in Florida, out of sight of television cameras. But in an attempt to save face, Trump released a statement airing his grievances about the November 3 election and claiming that he had obtained a number of concessions on the relief bill. Among Trump's demands was increasing direct relief payments to Americans from \$600 to \$2,000. The House, in a 275 to 134 vote, approved a motion on Monday to increase the payments to \$2,000, but it is likely to meet with resistance from Republicans in the Senate.

Independent Senator Bernie Sanders threatened late Monday to filibuster the veto override bill in the Senate if the upper house did not allow a vote on the extra \$2,000 direct payments to Americans. That would potentially delay the measure and throw extra pressure on the Republicans ahead of two key Senate run-offs in Georgia next month that could determine control of the chamber. President-elect Joe Biden, asked by a reporter Monday if he favored raising the payouts to \$2,000,

Biden, speaking after a briefing by his transition team on national security, also said that political appointees at the Pentagon, which Trump has packed with loyalists since the election, have refused to provide a "clear picture" on troop posture or budgeting. "It is nothing short, in my view, of irresponsibility," Biden said in Wilmington, Delaware, warning that US adversaries could take advantage of the transition. The strange episode over the relief package highlighted the degree to which Trump has become isolated, spending much of his time playing golf or railing on Twitter about his election loss.

In a sign of his fading influence, the Rupert Murdoch-owned New York Post, one of Trump's most ardent supporters, published an editorial late Sunday telling him to "Stop the Insanity" and acknowledge he lost the election. "Mr President, it's time to end this dark charade," the newspaper said. "We understand, Mr President, that you're angry that you lost. "But to continue down this road is ruinous," the Post said. "If you insist on spending your final days in office threatening to burn it all down, that will be how you are remembered. "Not as a revolutionary, but as the anarchist holding the match."—AFP

Algeria seizes nearly \$100,000 militants' ransom cash

ALGIERS: Algeria's army has retrieved a "slice of the ransom" cash paid out to free hostages held by "terrorist groups" in the troubled Sahel region, the defence ministry has said. Soldiers "recovered the sum of 80,000 euros" (\$97,900) during an operation in Algeria's northeastern Jijel province, a statement issued late Monday said.

Algerian authorities use the term "terrorist" to describe armed Islamists who have been active in the country since the early 1990s,

Russia, Turkey to develop military ties despite US sanctions

MOSCOW: Russian Foreign Minister Sergei Lavrov said yesterday that Moscow and Ankara's military cooperation would not be deterred by US sanctions on Turkey for acquiring a Russian missile defence system. Washington earlier this month punished Turkey for buying Russia's S-400 air defense system, imposing rare sanctions against a NATO ally.

US Secretary of State Mike Pompeo at the time assured Turkish Foreign Minister Mevlut Cavusoglu that the American sanctions were intended to prevent Russia from receiving substantial revenues from the sale. Yesterday, Cavusoglu visited Moscow

Russia admits to world third-worst **COVID** death toll

MOSCOW: Russia on Monday said its coronavirus death toll was more than three times higher than it had previously reported, making it the country with the thirdlargest number of fatalities. For months President Vladimir Putin has boasted about Russia's low fatality rate from the virus, saying earlier this month that it had done a "better" job at managing the pandemic than west-

But since early in the pandemic, some Russian experts have said the government was playing down the country's outbreak. On Monday Russian officials admitted that was true. The Rosstat statistics agency said that the number of deaths from all causes recorded between January and November had risen by 229,700 compared to the previous year. "More than 81 percent of this increase in mortality over this period is due to Covid," said Deputy Prime Minister Tatiana Golikova, meaning that over 186,000 Russians have died from Covid-19.

Russian health officials have registered more than three million infections since the start of the pandemic, putting the country's caseload at fourth-highest in the world. But they have only reported 55,265 deaths - a much lower fatality rate than in other badly hit countries. Russia has been criticized for only listing COVID deaths where an autopsy confirms the virus was the main cause. Alexei Raksha, a demographer who left Rosstat in July, told AFP last week that the Russian health ministry and the consumer health ministry falsify coronavirus numbers.

Rosstat's new figures mean that Russia now has the world's third-highest Covid-19 death toll behind the United States with 333,140 and Brazil with 191,139, according to an AFP count. The figures came as authorities hold out against reimposing a nationwide lockdown in the hopes of buttressing a struggling economy even as the country is battered by a second wave of infections. Russia's government predicts the economy will shrink by 3.9 percent this year, while the Central Bank expects an even deeper decline.

During his annual end-of-year press conference earlier this month, Putin rejected the idea of imposing the kind of lockdown many European countries introduced going into the Christmas holidays. "If we follow the rules and demands of health regulators, then we do not need any lockdowns," he said. —AFP

Trump urges supporters to amass on January 6 for a last-ditch rally

Biden: Pentagon stalling transition as US faces risks

WASHINGTON: President Donald Trump is urging supporters to amass in Washington on January 6 for a last-ditch rally to pressure Congress to not certify Joe Biden's election victory. Thousands of supporters from around the country, from the Women for America First group, to StoptheSteal, to the violent Proud Boys, are expected to descend on the US capital pressing Trump's unsupported claim that massive voter fraud was behind his defeat in the November 3 election.

Trump tweeted twice this weekend urging supporters to attend, labeling the election "the biggest SCAM in our nation's history." "See you in Washington, DC, on January 6th. Don't miss it," he wrote Sunday. The rally raised fears of fresh violence after the previous pro-Trump protest that included the Proud Boys on December 12 saw several people stabbed and dozens arrested. Trump appears to hope that the protestors could pressure Congress to reject the final count of state-based electors and reverse his election loss.

"We the People must take to the US Capitol lawn and steps and tell Congress #DoNotCertify," StopTheSteal declared online. "Congress cannot certify this fraudulent Electoral College," they said. On January 6 Vice President Mike Pence is to lead Congress in certifying the Electoral College votes submitted by each state, which represent the results of the popular vote. In the joint session of the House of Representatives and the Senate, Pence is to open and read the certificates reporting elector tallies from each state, and then declare the victor.

That process should be, as it almost always is, a formality. Democrat Biden captured 306 electors while Republican Trump only won 232. Trump's campaign has lost dozens of court challenges in several contested states, with judge after judge saying they showed no evidence of any significant fraud. But the session can be stalled if lawmakers from both houses submit formal objections to any state's report. Alabama Representative Mo Brooks told Fox News on Monday that he has the

COVID-19 hollows out German city centers

LUEBECK: The charming German city of Luebeck was lovingly done up for the holidays with fairy lights and garlands but the usual festive bustle was eerily absent this pandemic-scarred winter. Across the country, all non-essential businesses have been forced to shut until at least mid-January to help stem a second coronavirus wave engulfing Europe's top economy.

But many of the "closed" signs in shop windows in the town centre, with its signature brick facades and sumptuous art nouveau villas that made it a UNESCO World Heritage Site, have given way to "out of business" notices. The Hanseatic city, population 220,000, has not escaped the urban blight which has plagued many German city centers for years but whose spread has been spurred on by the pandemic. In Luebeck, known around the globe for its traditional marzipan and visited by 18 million tourists in 2019, 20 percent of retail space remains empty — a figure that has been rising for several years.

In the middle of the main high street, Olivia Kempke points to a clothing store that went bust: "Some shops were already not doing well before the corona crisis and the current drop in sales is the final blow." Head of Luebeck Management, an association that encourages local urban development, Kempke blames a boom in suburban shopping centres for siphoning off shoppers and ever higher commercial rents which "have grabbed merchants by the throat".

Cash for town planning

Another big driver out of urban commercial districts is online shopping, a sector given a huge lift from the pandemic. Sales in Germany are expected to soar by a third for November-December compared to one year ago. That growth will come at the expense of shops that do not offer internet purchases, the German Retail Federation (HDE) said, fearing the closure of 50,000 stores due to COVID-19. The lockdown of high-street shops in the all-important Christmas season is expected to cost them 16.9 billion euros (\$20.6 billion) for November-December alone, the IW economic institute said.

In other words, fewer parking spots and more space for pedestrians, cyclists and scooters. Luebeck has just in the past year started on a similar path with a few novelties including a community garden in the heart of town, widened sidewalks with places to sit, open-air cultural exhibitions and streets closed to vehicles. Smuggling network dismantled

MOSCOW: Russia said yesterday it had dismantled an international drug smuggling network as part of a collaborative operation with the United States, in a rare show of cooperation between Washington and Moscow. The Federal Security Service (FSB) said it had carried out a multi-stage mission with the US Department of Justice that ended with the seizure of 330 kilograms of cocaine with an estimated street value of \$1 billion. Video released by the FSB to Russian media showed plainclothes agents dragging suspects from cars as well as boxes of confiscated cash and drugs. The security agency said in a statement that the joint-US operation had disrupted "a transnational criminal community that specialized in smuggling cocaine from South America to Russia and other European states." — AFP

China urged to free Zhang

BRUSSELS: The European Union on Tuesday demanded that China release citizen journalist Zhang Zhan and several other jailed reporters, lawyers and human rights champions. The EU statement was issued just ahead of Brussels signing a major investment pact with Beijing, despite concerns about China's labor and civil rights record. Zhang was jailed on Monday for four years over allegations of "picking quarrels and provoking trouble" during her coverage of the early stages of the Covid-19 outbreak in epicenter Wuhan, her lawyer said. "Prior to her detention, Ms Zhang Zhan had been reporting about the coronavirus pandemic in Wuhan," EU foreign policy spokesman Peter Stano said in a statement. — AFP

Explosive device kills 3 soldiers

PARIS: Three French soldiers were killed Monday in Mali when their armored vehicle struck an explosive device in the Hombori region in the centre of the poor Sahel state, the French presidency said. The deaths brought to 47 the number of French soldiers killed in Mali since France first intervened militarily in January 2013 to help drive back Islamist jihadists who had overrun parts of the west African country. President Emmanuel Macron "salutes the memory of these soldiers with the greatest respect," the president's office said in a statement. He underscored "France's determination to continue the fight against terrorism," it said. France's Barkhane force numbers 5,100 troo spread across the arid Sahel region and has been fighting jihadist groups alongside soldiers from Mauritania, Chad, Mali, Burkina Faso and Niger, who together make up the G5 Sahel group. — AFP

Vaccinations for US troops

SEOUL: The United States began a coronavirus vaccination campaign for its troops stationed in South Korea yesterday as a third virus wave saw the host country record its highest daily death toll since the pandemic began. US Forces Korea (USFK) administered initial doses of the Moderna vaccine for military and civilian healthcare workers, first responders and command staff across its medical treatment facilities in the country, it said in a statement. Washington has around 28,500 troops stationed in South Korea to help it defend against the nuclear-armed North and protect US interests in north-east Asia. Among the inoculated included USFK Commander Robert Abrams, who was pictured receiving the shot in a mask and a T-shirt emblazoned with "#KilltheVirus". — AFP

Moscow bars German officials

MOSCOW: Moscow yesterday expanded a list of German officials who are banned from entering Russia in response to EU sanctions that the bloc imposed over Russian cyber attacks on the German parliament. The Russian foreign ministry said that in response to "destructive" EU sanctions in October, "Moscow made a decision to expand the reciprocal list of German citizens who are prohibited from entering Russia." The European Union and Britain in October hit senior Russian intelligence officers with the penalties for their alleged role in hacking the German parliament's computer network in 2015. A cyber attack in April and May 2015 completely paralyzed the IT infrastructure of the Bundestag and the entire parliament had to be taken offline for days while it was fixed. — AFP

Barnier to return to politics

PARIS: Michel Barnier, the EU's chief negotiator in years of tortuous talks on the British exit from the European Union, said yesterday that he now planned a return to French politics. Barnier, who helped find deals on Brexit in 2019 and then last week an accord on Britain's future trading relationship with the bloc, told French radio he did not intend to join President Emmanuel Macron's centrist movement and rather return to the fold of the right. "I want to use the energy that I still have to work for my country," he told France Info radio. "I will see where I can be useful," he added. "I want to find the French again." Barnier indicated he planned to back, as before his departure to Brussels, the right-wing The Republicans (LR) rather than Macron's The Republic on the Move (LREM). — Agencies

Switzerland gets 24/7 airspace protection

GENEVA: Switzerland will get round-the-clock airspace protection starting this week, the military said yesterday, nearly seven years after the country was unable to scramble fighter jets to respond to an hijacking outside of business hours. Starting on December 31, two F-18 fighter jets will be operational 24/7 to protect the airspace over the small, landlocked country, the armed forces said in a statement.

"From now on, the air police service will be on call 24 hours a day to guarantee the security and the sovereignty over Swiss airspace," the statement said. The plan to increase Swiss airspace surveillance was proposed to parliament in 2009, but it was boosted by an incident five years later that cast a spotlight on the lack of round-the-clock protection. In February 2014, an Ethiopian Airlines co-pilot, Hailemedehin Abera Tagegn, hijacked his own plane, carrying 202 passengers and crew from Addis Ababa to Rome, and forced it to land in Geneva.

When Tagegn locked himself in the cockpit while the pilot went to the bathroom, Italian and French fighter jets were scrambled to escort the plane through their respective airspaces. But although the co-pilot-turned-hijacker quickly announced he wanted to land the plane in Switzerland, where he later said he aimed to seek asylum, Switzerland's fleet of F-18s and F-5 Tigers remained on the ground. The Swiss airforce explained at the time that this was because its planes were only available during office hours. —AFP

Bangladesh moves biggest group of Rohingya to an isolated island

Activists express new doubts about the transfers

BHASHAN CHAR: Four Bangladesh navy ships yesterday took the second and biggest group of Rohingva Muslims yet from crowded refugee camps to an uncertain future on a bleak island three hours from the mainland. The government insisted that the 1,800 refugees, who have been in camps since fleeing a Myanmar military clampdown, want to start new lives on Bhashan Char, where 1,600 others arrived earlier this month. But rights activists expressed new doubts about the transfers. They said some Rohingya had their shanty homes in the camps on the Myanmar border padlocked so they had no choice.

The Bangladesh government eventually wants to rehouse 100,000 of the camps' approximately one million Rohingya on the island, which takes the full force of cyclones that roar across the Bay of Bengal each year. The Rohingva carried bags of belongings, toys and chickens and took selfies with each other as they sat on wooden benches during the three hour trip from Chittagong to Bhashan Char. Housing blocks have been set up for the new arrivals on the island that foreign minister AK Abdul Momen has called a "beautiful resort".

More than 700,000 Rohingya joined 300,000 already in camps in Bangladesh in 2017 after a deadly purge on their villages in Myanmar that the United Nations has said could be genocide. With Bangladesh now struggling to find a long-term solution to the Rohingya exodus, government refugee

officials said there were better living facilities and better security for the Rohingya in Bhashan Char. They are very eager to go to Bhashan Char because they have heard from their relatives, those who have gone to Bhashan Char, that it is an excellent place," Momen told AFP.

'Peace of mind'

Some Rohingya in the latest group said they were going willingly. "The camp is a difficult and overcrowded place to live and move around," Shafi Alam told AFP on the navy ship. Grandmother Morium Khatun, 55, said she was making the change to escape drug-related crime in the camps that has seen dozens killed in recent years. "I am looking for peace of mind. The refugee camp is not a place for that," she said. But an international rights worker who interviewed some Rohingya said they had no choice about the move

The homes of some of the refugees were padlocked by volunteers working for the Bangladesh camp authorities to force them to agree to the relocation," the worker told AFP, speaking on condition of anonymity. "They are told that if they don't go, their homes will remain padlocked." "Allegations from within the community about cash incentives being offered to Rohingya families to relocate to Bhashan Char as well as use of intimidation tactics are making the relocation process questionable,"

A Rohingya journalist who took photos of refugees boarding buses for the relocation was detained on Monday, a local rights activist said.

Police told AFP they were not aware of an arrest. After the first transfer on December 4, several Rohingya told AFP that they were beaten and intimidated to agree to move. The UN said it has not been involved in the process. — AFP

Telecom towers targeted amid **Indian protests**

AMRITSAR: More than 1,600 telephone towers have been vandalized in an Indian state where farmers have taken the lead in an increasingly angry campaign against government agriculture reforms, officials said. The action came as tens of thousands of farmers marked more than a month of protests on major roads leading into the capital, New Delhi, against new market reform laws. Farmers leaders say the reforms will lead to a takeover of the agriculture business by Indian conglomerates and have called for a boycott of groups such as Reliance, which owns the telecom towers, and Adani.

Farm union leaders have however denied any role in the guerrila action against the telecom towers in Punjab state, India's agricultural heartland. The towers had power supplies and fibre cables cut while source close to Jio, Reliance's mobile phone enterprise, said more than 1,400 towers had been vandalized up to Sunday. A telecoms industry official said at least 150 more were damaged Monday. Videos showing Jio employees being chased from towers have been widely shared on social media.

Boycott calls heeded

Reliance, which is owned by Asia's richest person, Mukesh Ambani, has not commented on the vandalism. But mobile phone services have been affected

in Punjab which has 9,000 towers in all. Protesters have also blockaded one of Punjab's biggest cooking oil depots owned by Adani subsidiary Fortune in the Punjab city of Amritsar. Davinder Singh, a farmer who took part in a protest in Amritsar on Monday, told AFP the boycott calls were being increasingly followed. "We are with our farmer brothers who are protesting at the Delhi borders. We appealed to the people to boycott Jio and Adani. "People have heard us. Many people have cut their Jio connections," he said.

Farmers have taken over several kilometers of key

roads leading into Delhi, demanding that the government repeal the new laws. The government says the changes, that allow farmers to sell their produce on free markets, are need to modernize the rural sector, the foundation of the Indian economy, and boost farm incomes. Farmers, who received huge public subsidies, have demanded that the laws be repealed and minimum prices for key produce be guaranteed. A new round of talks between union leaders and the government is to be held today. But protesters have vowed to step up their action if there is no breakthrough. — AFP

Gaza forces fire rockets to mark war anniversary

GAZA: Palestinian armed groups staged military exercises in Gaza yesterday, including firing rockets into the sea, to mark the anniversary of the start of the 2008 conflict with Israel. The demonstrations were scheduled to last several hours and involve about 10 groups in the Israeli-blockaded Palestinian enclave, said a spokesman for the Al-Quds Brigade forces, the armed wing of Islamic Jihad.

The goal of the exercise, the first of its kind, is to "strengthen the skills of combatants" and demonstrate the "unity" of armed groups in Gaza, added the spokesman, whose face was almost entirely covered by a traditional headscarf. Hamas, the Islamist group that has controlled Gaza since 2007, was also taking part. Hamas's Al-Aqsa TV showed rockets being fired from the strip yesterday into the Mediterranean Sea.

Israel's army said a projectile device was launched from Gaza overnight, but that it did not cross into Israeli territory. Israel did not immediately retaliate to that launch with airstrikes, as it typically does when rockets fired from Gaza enter Israel. The drills also come days after Hamas accused Israel of launching strikes that damaged a children's hospital. Israel, which said it carried out the weekend airstrikes in response to rocket fire from Gaza, denied that its missiles hit the hospital.

In December 2008, Israel launched 'Operation Cast Lead" to stop Palestinian rocket fire into Israel. It ended with a ceasefire in January 2009, after 1,440 Palestinians and 13 Israelis were killed. Hamas and Israel fought two further conflicts, in 2012 and 2014. A fragile truce has broadly held in recent months, despite rocket fire from Gaza which is generally followed by retaliatory Israeli air strikes. Poverty rates in Gaza, which hovered around 50 percent before the coronavirus pandemic, are thought to have increased since Hamas imposed lockdown measures to limit transmission. — AFP

Officer accused of planting weapons on slain civilians

SRINAGAR: Indian police have accused an army officer and two associates of planting weapons on the bodies of three laborers killed in Kashmir to make it look as though they were militants in a staged gun battle. Their July deaths sparked a furor in the Indian administered side of the Himalayan region that is also claimed by Pakistan.

The army had claimed that the three men were killed in a gun battle in the village of Amshipora in south Kashmir and that three weapons were found on them. The bodies were hurriedly buried in a remote border area. The men's families in the remote mountainous area of Rajouri identified them one month later from photographs that circulated on social media. The families said the three had only been looking for work in Kashmir's apple orchards.

The controversy sparked rare separate investigations by the Indian army, which has more than 500,000 troops in Kashmir, and the police, who said they were only informed of the supposed firefight after the killings which violated the normal rules of engagement. A police statement issued late Sunday said the officer and two others "planted illegally acquired weapons and material on their dead bodies after stripping them of their identities and tagged them as hardcore terrorists in possession of war-like stores."

The army said last week only that the recording of evidence in the case had been completed and action would follow. Following the investigation, the bodies of the three slain men were exhumed in September and returned to their families after DNA tests. Captain Bhoopendra Singh has been charged with murder, conspiracy and other offences, the police statement said. He is now in military detention. The two civilian "sources", who were with him at the time, are in police custody.

A local court has asked the army whether the accused officer should be tried in a civilian court or subjected to a military court martial, according to the statement. Under the Armed Forces Special Powers Act, an emergency law applied in Kashmir since 1990 when an insurgency against Indian rule erupted, government forces deployed in the region cannot be tried in a civilian court unless the New Delhi government agrees. No such permission has ever been granted during the last three decades, despite dozens of requests by the police after investigations into actions by the security forces. Tens of thousands of people, mainly civilians, have died in the insurgency. — AFP

Hong Kong teen jailed for China flag insult

HONG KONG: A Hong Kong teenager was ordered to spend four months in prison yesterday for insulting China's national flag and unlawful assembly as Beijing increasingly targets prominent activists from the financial hub. Tony Chung, a 19-year-old who led a nowdisbanded pro-democracy group, was convicted earlier this month for throwing the Chinese flag to the ground during scuffles outside Hong Kong's legislature in May 2019.

while serving his sentence, Chung will be waiting for trial over a charge of "secession", which could land him life imprisonment according to the draconian national security law Beijing imposed on Hong Kong on 30 June. Chung is the first public political figure prosecuted under the new security law, which Beijing described as a "sword" to return "order and stability" to the financial hub after seven months of massive. often violent pro-democracy protests

He was sentenced to three months each for insulting the national flag and unlawful assembly, and told to serve four months behind bars. The teen is also facing separate charges of money laundering and conspiring to publish seditious content. Chung was arrested by plainclothes police opposite the US consulate in late October and had been remanded in custody since. Speculation has swirled that the authorities moved on Chung because he was hoping to ask for asylum at the US consulate in Hong Kong.

Crackdown

An increasing number of pro-democracy activists across the political spectrum have fled Hong Kong since Beijing stepped up its crackdown on the city's protests against China's authoritarian rule. Under the security law, dissenting speech instead of acts can be alleged of vague yet severe offences like "subversion" and "collusion with foreign forces".

The law has also toppled the legal firewall between Hong Kong's internationally recognized common law judiciary and the opaque, Party-controlled justice system in mainland China by allowing extradition of suspects across the border for trial. Last Sunday, China's state TV CGTN reported that Hong Kong police had put 30 people who are not currently in Hong Kong on its wanted list for suspicion of breaching the national security law, including self-exiled activists Ted Hui and Baggio Leung.

Prominent activists remain in Hong Kong have either been - jailed like Joshua Wong and Agnes Chow - or face frequent arrests and multiple charges. Jimmy Lai, a pro-democracy media mogul who is also charged with the national security law, has been placed under house arrest and stripped of public speech - his Twitter account included - as Hong Kong's High Court granted him bail last week. The decision, however, provoked serious criticism from China, which threatened to extradite Lai to the mainland for trial. — AFP

UK fishermen enter uncharted waters

Post-Brexit deal to force European boats to relinquish 25% of their current quotas

Ramsgate, a once thriving seaside town in southern England, had high hopes that Brexit would bring back the pre-EU glory days of teeming catches and lively fish auctions. Britain had insisted it wanted to take back control of its waters while EU coastal states sought guarantees that their fleets could keep fishing in UK waters.

"We've been sold out by Boris!" fumed John Nichols in his Ramsgate cottage overlooking the English Channel, referring to Prime Minister

Nichols, president of the Thanet Fishermen's Association representing around 40 boats, said they were looking forward to a return to the days before frozen rectangles of cod could be imported from far away. They fought for stricter quotas and stepped-up checks, especially against Dutch "electric pulse fleets", a method that Nichols said sterilizes fish stocks.

Instead, last week London and Brussels reached a compromise that will see European boats gradually relinquish 25 percent of their current quotas during a five-and-a-half-year transition period.

Nichols, 69, has been fighting for a "hard" Brexit since 2016, the year Britain voted to leave the EU in a referendum, with his group staging "Leave" flotillas on the Thames, sailing under the Houses of Parliament in London. Now, "foreign vessels will continue to come in and out and take more fish than they did before," Nichols said.

'Careful what you wish for' "The old saying says 'be careful what you wish

RAMSGATE, United Kingdom: The fishermen of for'," said the doyen of the group, 85-year-old Tom Brown, his cap pulled down to his eyebrows. Brown said that "when it all started to go wrong" after Britain joined the European Union-then the European Economic Community-in 1973, he and his brother joined every protest, from strikes to blockades, to fight for their rights against European competition.

Brown even created his own modest fuel company, with profits going to fellow fishermen to help offset the losses. And then, with global warming, the cod population began migrating northwards, and the British began importing their cod for fish and chips-a national staple-from Iceland.

Brown said that people in England no longer eat fresh fish, "only fish and chips".

"It's finished. People go to the supermarket. The young generation doesn't like the smell of fish," he said. Without a local market, the fishermen of Kent depend entirely on exports. The fishmongers and fish auctions that were once a fixture of the seaside resort have long since disappeared.

All that is left is a wholesaler who loads trucks each morning with about 70 percent of the meagre overnight haul, mainly sole and crustaceans, to cross the Channel to the French port of Boulognesur-Mer. On January 1, when Britain leaves the single market, the headache begins along with the

EU clears way for China investment pact

BRUSSELS: EU member states gave political backing to Brussels' planned westment pact with China on Monday clearing the way for a deal between the world's biggest economic blocs. At a meeting of ambassadors, the German EU presidency noted that no member had "raised a stop sign and the way for a political endorsement was thus cleared", a diplomat said.

The diplomats noted "recent positive developments" in negotiations, with China reportedly addressing concerns over the alleged use of forced labor on its farms. This came after the Chinese foreign ministry said last week that "negotiations have entered the final stretch"-and a second EU diplomat said an agreement could now be formally announced this week. "We have to be careful, but as long as China is in agreement, there could be an official announcement from Brussels and Beijing by the end of the week," the senior envoy said. No member state intervened at the meeting to block the accord, but afterwards Poland's ambassador Andrzej Sados said he had "expressed our doubts" after Germany added it to the agenda. The deal would be a major boost for both sides and strengthen economic ties between the giants before the arrival of US president-elect Joe Biden in the White House in January.

London stocks soar on post-Brexit trade agreement

LONDON: London stocks surged yesterday with investors relieved over Britain's long-awaited Brexit deal with the EU, while eurozone equities also rose on US stimulus news with Frankfurt extending its record-breaking run.

The British capital's benchmark FTSE 100 index jumped 2.2 percent in late morning deals, having last traded on Christmas Eve before the announcement of a long-awaited post-Brexit trade deal.

Britain and the European Union finally struck a trade deal Thursday to cushion the economic blow of Brexit, in a major boost to Conservative Prime Minister Boris Johnson. The pound climbed against the dollar but steadied versus the euro, as dealers continued to digest the 1,246-page agreement document.

"The Brexit deal is really a blessing... for the UK and for the FTSE 100 index. There is no doubt that the FTSE 100 has been a laggard index and now is its time to shine," AvaTrade analyst Naeem Aslam told AFP. He added: "European stocks are still very much in Santa rally mode and



Outgoing US leader Donald Trump has engaged in a trade war with China but his successor has also expressed concern about the EU outreach, with his team urging Brussels to consult with Washington.

"The new administration in the US is starting work in three weeks... and an agreement with China should take into account the EU's relations with the US," Sados told the Polish PAP news agency.

'We also said that we shouldn't act too hastily after seven years of tough negotiations. Meanwhile, such an item is suddenly added to the EU ambassadors' meeting agenda in Brussels. This is unheard of." "In the last days of the German presidency we are dealing with a sudden and unjustified acceleration regarding a very important issue, which concerns international relations."

The bloc's leading economic power Germany, which holds the rotating EU presidency until the end of the year, has made securing the deal a priority of its time at the helm. The European Commission, the EU executive, had said before Christmas that the draft of the "political agreement" was "95 percent ready" and just needed the capitals' green light. China's commitment to labor rights had remained a hurdle, but Europe has long sought greater access to the huge

Chinese market for its companies. The head of the EU chamber of commerce in Beijing Joerg Wuttke told AFP this month that negotiators had "apparently made great strides on market access". As part of the accord the EU has also been pushing Beijing to reinforce respect for intellectual property, end obligations to transfer technology, reduce subsidies for public enterprises and improve on climate commitments. —AFP

Investor sentiment was given another shot in the arm after US President Donald Trump signed a \$900-billion (735-billion-euro) Covid-19 economic stimulus bill late on Sunday.

"The hunt for records continues," said Comdirect analyst Andreas Lipkow. Frankfurt's DAX index also powered its way Tuesday to new heights, extending its record-breaking run as the market ends a turbulent year on a strong note. —AFP

In US, jobless may have to wait for needed help

WASHINGTON: The United States government has agreed to another massive stimulus package to keep its listing economy afloat as the coronavirus pandemic rages on, but help for the unemployed people most in need may not come right away.

Congress's decision to wait until the last minute to pass the \$900 billion measure, followed by President Donald Trump's days-long hesitation to sign the bill into law, means two programs supporting millions of unemployed Americans briefly expired, and experts warn states may take weeks to restart payments. "Everything about unemployment insurance and having 53 different systems is difficult, and it does means some states may drop the ball," said Michele Evermore, senior policy analyst at the National Employment Law

The new stimulus measure follows up on the CARES Act passed in March, a massive bill that expanded benefits to freelance workers and allowed unemployed people to receive aid for an extended period of time. But those programs expired on December 26, a victim of both the months Congress took to reach its agreement last week and the president's refusal to sign it before finally capitulating on Sunday.

The hold-up may have cost unemployed people a week of benefits, and could lead to a gap stretching as long as three weeks in which the jobless won't get paid, experts say-the last thing Americans who have been out of work for months need. "I've been running with zero income for the past couple of weeks. Anytime that you don't have income hurts," said Carson Noel, an Arizona resident who hasn't been able to work in the live events industry since the

pandemic struck and used up all of his benefits in October.

Economic damage

The world's largest economy ground to a sudden halt in March when states ordered businesses shut to stop the transmission of Covid-19 — efforts that did grievous economic damage and didn't prevent the country's outbreak from becoming the largest on the planet. Costing \$2.2 trillion, the CARES Act has been credited with keeping the US from an even worse downturn, in part by supporting consumption through the expanded unemployment programs.

The new package "providing coronavirus emergency response and relief" is part of a larger spending bill and gives jobless people an extra \$300 in weekly payments. Americans will also get stimulus checks totaling as much as \$600 per person, though Trump has called for them to be raised to \$2,000.

It also extends until March 14 programs created under the CARES Act for the long-term unemployed and gig workers like 51-year-old Noel, who was evicted from his apartment after using up all of his benefits in October. Now living with a family member, he relies on his dwindling savings to get by, and though the restoration of the unemployment payments is a relief, he'd rather be working. "I don't want to sit at home," he said.

Unemployment aid in the US is administered by individual states and territories, and many systems are overwhelmed and reliant on badly outdated technology that few believe can easily reactivate a benefit program that had just been deactivated. "The fact that they have to roll everybody off and they have to roll everybody back on, it's not going to go smoothly in any circumstances," said Andrew Stettner of progressive think tank The Century Foundation, which estimated 12 million people were depending on these programs that would have lapsed had the new stimulus bill not been passed. —AFP

Cambodia PM hails extraction of country's 'first drop of oil'

A long-awaited milestone for one of Southeast Asia's poorest nations

PHNOM PENH, Cambodia: Cambodian premier Hun block where the oil was taken from, while the govern-Sen announced yesterday that the kingdom had extracted its first drop of crude oil from its waters, a long-awaited milestone for one of Southeast Asia's poorest nations.

The crude was taken from an area off the southwestern coast of Sihanoukville.

Chevron's discovery of the reserves led the kingdom to be feted as the region's next potential petrostate, with the government estimating hundreds of millions of barrels of crude were beneath its waters. KrisEnergy currently holds a 95 percent stake of the

Kelvin Tang, the CEO of KrisEnergy's Cambodia operations, said there has been a "steep learning curve" to launch the field production during a global pandemic. "The cross-border logistics of mobilizing personnel and equipment to execute this development safely during this time of Covid-19 would not have been possible without [government support]," he said.

The company expects a peak production rate of 7,500 barrels a day once the drilling program is completed in February 2021 — a modest amount compared with Cambodia's oil-producing neighbors Vietnam and Thailand. But the revenues could be significant for the government, which estimated in 2017 that it would make at least \$500 million in royalties and taxes from the first phase of the project.

The discovery also raised concerns about how Cambodia-a country long ranked poorly in terms of transparency-would use its new-found wealth, but Hun Sen, Asia's longest-serving leader, dismissed them, calling the extraction "a blessing" for Cambodians. "It is not a curse like it has been cited by some ill-will people," he said. — AFP

French authorities estimate that 10-12 percent of trucks arriving in northern French ports will be subject to checks to prevent the spread of plant diseases. Trucks carrying animal products such as lamb from EU member Ireland over the so-called UK land bridge will be exempted from the inspections.

Multi-million infrastructure

France has spent some 40 million euros (\$54 million) and hired 700 extra customs, immigration and veterinary staff to prepare for the return of a border with Britain. Truck drivers whose shipments have incomplete paperwork or are subject to lengthier inspections will be ordered to park in one of the 6,000 new spots built to avoid logjams in and around France's Channel ports.—AFP

US appeals court ruling blocking US TikTok ban

WASHINGTON: The Trump administration on Monday appealed a federal court ruling which allows TikTok to keep operating in the United States despite a move to block the popular social media application on national security grounds.

The Justice Department filed the appeal seeking to enforce a ban on TikTok by President Donald Trump, who has argued that the app's Chinese parent company may use TikTok for espionage and to spread disinformation. The filing did not include arguments for enforcing the ban, which had been rejected earlier this

New York state passes tough new anti-eviction bill

WASHINGTON: New York's state assembly on Monday passed tough laws to protect renters from eviction during the coronavirus pandemic, as rising unemployment and a weakened US economy make it difficult for many tenants to make rent. The new laws, passed in a special session of the state legislature, came just days before existing bans on evictions were due to expire at the end of the year. The latest measures bar most landlords from evicting tenants who are unable to pay their rent for at least another 60 days, the New York Times reported. They will also protect many small landlords from the risk of foreclosure due to lost rental income.

"We want to make sure that homeowners are protected, that it doesn't affect their credit rating, there's no mortgage foreclosure," the state governor Chris Cuomo said before the vote. The bill also renews tax exemptions for elderly or disabled homeowners. The New York Times described the measures as "one of the most comprehensive anti-eviction laws in the nation." It halts proceedings on existing evictions already in the courts for the next 60 days and stops any new proceedings until at least May 1. "We want to get to May 1 and we'll see what happens by May but we want to protect tenants," said Cuomo, the Democratic governor. —AFP

Nichols said TikTok's lawyers had demonstrated that the Commerce Department likely overstepped its authority by seeking to ban the popular social media app and "acted in an arbitrary and capricious manner by failing to consider obvious alternatives." The White House claims TikTok is a national security risk because of potential links to the Beijing government through its Chinese owner ByteDance.

Trump's order said the action was necessary to 'protect our national security" and claimed the personal data of TikTok users could be used by Beijing. TikTok has repeatedly defended itself against allegations of data transfers to the Chinese government, saying it stores user information on servers in the United States and Singapore. TikTok has a further fight on its hands over an August 14 executive order from Trump to force ByteDance to sell its US operations to an American buyer. — AFP

How new \$900bn stimulus package breaks down

WASHINGTON: The \$900 billion stimulus package aimed at bolstering the US economy during the coronavirus pandemic was signed into law by President Donald Trump on Sunday, freeing up the funds after a week of doubts. Here are the main points:

The poorest households will receive a check of \$600 per adult and per child, subject to income (up to \$75,000 annually per person, or \$150,000 for a married couple), up to a total amount of \$166 billion. Unemployment benefits will be extended until March 14 (with four additional weeks for those who have not exhausted their allowance), and they will again be extended to workers who would not usually be eligible to claim them, including drivers and delivery workers in the "gig economy." These measures were first adopted at the end of March. Normally unemployment benefits are paid out by states, for up to six months among the most generous statesmeaning that those measures ended on December 26, and more than 12 million Americans were left without income overnight. Another measure which had expired at the end of July has also been restored: the payment of an additional \$300 per week for all unemployed people. This is, however, half of what was granted from April to July. Finally, rental evictions have been suspended until the end of January 2021, and a package of \$25 billion has been earmarked for bank loans to local communities so that they can help tenants to make rent.

Children and education

While learning is still virtual for at least part of the week for most US students, \$82 billion has been allocated to helping public and private schools equip themselves to eventually welcome back students while ensuring the safety of both students and teachers. A budget of just over \$10 billion dollars is also planned for nurseries and other establishments that cater to the youngest kids. It will also finance an aid program, including food, for children from families on the lowest incomes.

Combating COVID-19

The text provides just over \$55 billion for testing and tracing of the virus, accelerating the vaccination program and continuing research through several programs.

Businesses

A total of \$325 billion will be dedicated to small and medium-sized businesses. The flagship measure of the first recovery plan in the spring, the Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) has been renewed for companies with no more than 300 employees and whose turnover fell by at least 25 percent over a quarter in 2020 compared to the same period in 2019. —AFP



Commerzbank to sink 610m euros into job cuts

FRANKFURT: Germany's second-largest lender Commerzbank said Monday it will set aside 610 million euros the final quarter of 2020 to cover sweeping job cuts as it restructures its operations.

Like its crosstown rival Deutsche Bank, Frankfurt-

based Commerzbank is slashing thousands of roles as customers switch to online banking and cashless payment options, reducing the need for bricks-and-mortar branches. The troubled lender has reached an agreement with its works council to reduce 2,300 positions between 2021 and 2024, the managing board said in a statement.

As a result, Commerzbank will book 610 million euros (\$744 million) in additional provisions in the fourth quarter, the statement said. The restructuring will have a 'correspondingly negative impact on the net result" in the fourth quarter, it added.

Commerzbank had already set aside 200 million euros for restructuring in the third quarter, with the new plans bringing the total job cuts announced in 2020 to 2,900. The lender posted a 69 million euro net loss in the third quarter, during which it closed 200 branches. At the end of September, the bank had 39,600 employees. Commerzbank said it would likely end the year with a net loss for the first time since 2009. Shares in Commerzbank fell on Germany's MDAX index, down 0.9 percent at 1200 GMT, compared with a rise of 1.0 percent in the index as a whole.

The task of getting the bank back on track will fall to its new boss from the start of 2021, Manfred Knof, a defector from Deutsche Bank. He will replace Martin Zielke, who resigned in July after being criticized by its second-biggest shareholder, investment house Cerberus. — AFP

FRENCH FASHION DESIGNER PIERRE CARDIN DIES AGED 98

rench fashion designer Pierre Cardin, hailed for his visionary creations but also for bringing stylish clothes to the masses, died yesterday aged 98, his family told AFP. Cardin, who was born to a low-income family in northern Italy but became a France-based fashion superstar, died in a hospital in Neuilly in the west of Paris, his family said. "It is a day of great sadness for all our family. Pierre Cardin is no more," the statement said. It said after a lifetime spanning a century he had left France and the world a "great unique artistic heritage" and not only in fashion.

Born into poverty in 1922 near Venice in northern Italy, his family emigrated to France when he was a small child. "Italian by birth, Pierre Cardin never forgot his origins while bringing unconditional love to France," said his family.

From apprentice to global empire

He grew up in the French industrial town of Saint Etienne and was apprenticed to a tailor in Vichy at the age of 17, already specializing in women's suits. Moving to Paris, he designed the mesmerizing sets and costumes for the film

"Beauty and the Beast" with poet, artist and director Jean Cocteau in 1947. After a stint with Christian Dior, he had already set up his own fashion label in 1950. He quickly established a name as an innovator, creating the now legendary bubble dress in 1954. He also broke new ground commercially, ruffling feathers in the fashion establishment for producing a

ready-to-wear collection for the Paris department store Printemps.

His 1964 "Space Age" collection remains a landmark in fashion history with its cut-out dresses, knitted catsuits, tight leather pants, close-fitting helmets and batwing jumpers. His global empire had a strong presence in Japan and also signed production deals with Cold War-



era Soviet Union in 1978. He also became the first French designer in 1979 to cement links with China. He was also the first designer to hold a fashion show in Red Square in Moscow in 1991, drawing a crowd of 200,000. His family praised how he had plunged "early on into the flow of globalization"

But the much used and franchised

Cardin brand later showed signs of wear and, in 2011, he put his fashion label up for sale although it failed to sell. "We are all proud of his tenacious ambition and the daring he has shown throughout his life," his family said.— AFP

Struggling artists bring smiles in war-weary Yemen

emeni men, women and children filled a hall earlier this month in rebel-held Sanaa, laughing and clapping as actors took to the stage with comic relief for their war-wracked country. Yemen's conflict has sparked the world's worst humanitarian crisis, the UN says, and the Arab world's poorest country has also been hit hard by the novel coronavirus. Hoping to provide entertainment to the embattled population, a

troupe of struggling artists performed in the capital Sanaa a play called "Yemeni Film", which showcased the country's hardships. It revolved around young people who want to produce a film but face a mountain of challenges, including violence, air strikes, a lack of funding and a shortage of trained actors.

In an effort to avoid the minefields of political sensitivities and any backlash, the actors turned to comedy to paint a picture of their ordeal. For the dozens of men, women and children who packed a Sanaa cultural centre, it was a welcome respite from their daily struggles. They cheered, whistled and laughed openly, as they sat side by side with no face masks, despite coronavirus dangers. "We, as struggling artists, cannot provide food aid or stop the ongoing conflict," Mohammed Khaled, the director of the play, told AFP. "All we can do is offer the people entertainment to take them out of their current situation and an artistic message that they can enjoy." Tens of thousands of people, mostly civilians, have been killed and millions displaced in the Yemen war, which erupted after the Iranbacked Huthis took control of Sanaa in

The conflict has deepened since 2015, when a Saudi-led coalition intervened to support the government against the rebels. After five years of war, malnutrition has reached record levels and pushed the country further to the brink of famine, the United Nations World Food Program warned in early December. Despite a UN-brokered agreement reached two years ago between the warring parties, a peaceful settlement has yet to materialize.

No infrastructure

The conflict affected everyone and everything in Yemen, said Khaled, and the art scene is no exception. "This play talks about me, and all the artists and filmmakers in Yemen who are struggling," he said. Before the war, Yemen had a small but budding film and theatre industry but there were only a handful of makeshift cinemas that showed old films, while often cultural centers or schools provided the backdrop for plays that spoke of politics or significant moments in Yemeni history. Over the years, some films produced by Yemenis grabbed headlines.

"Karama Has No Walls", a documentary short by Sara Ishaq, was an Oscarnominated movie in 2014 that told the story of 2011 protests in Sanaa. The doc-

umentary "I am Nojoom, Age 10 and Divorced"-the real story of a child bridewas submitted for consideration at the 2017 Academy Awards but not selected. The 2018 drama "10 Days Before the Wedding" that told the story of a couple trying to tie the knot during the war was selected as Yemen's entry for Best Foreign Language Film the following year, but it was not nominated. "The biggest problem that we face is that there are no movie theatres," said Khaled. Today filmmakers produce their work but "upload it online only", he said. "There is no financial return and this undermines (our) ability to sustain the industry."

A 'Yemen that we miss'

But these are not the only challenges. Huthi authorities that control Sanaawhose Old City is one of Yemen's four UNESCO World Heritage sites-have imposed strict rules on dress, gender segregation and entertainment in the capital. Although Yemeni society has always been conservative, it has traditionally allowed space for personal freedom and for cultural events, including concerts. Actor Ahmad Hilmy hopes that such activities will return to Sanaa. "We actors and filmmakers suffer a lot because there is no infrastructure for the film and theatre industry," he said.

Sanaa resident Ayash Subai said cultural activities should be used to deflect from usual headlines that only depict Yemen as a war zone. "This is what we young people in the country miss. These activities convey the beautiful and positive image of Yemen that we miss," he said. To make up for it, Subai said, young people follow the work of Yemeni artists online. "But this is not enough," he added. — AFP

Second Taiwan-born panda cub makes media debut

second Taiwan-born giant panda made her media debut on Monday, clambering over a wooden climbing frame and playing with sawdust to the sound of clicking cameras. The cub was born on June 28 to Tuan Tuan and Yuan Yuan, who were gifted by China in 2008 to mark then warming relations between the two rivals. China usually only loans its pandas to foreign zoos, but gave the breeding pair-whose names combine to mean "reunion" or "unity". China views Taiwan as part of its territory and has vowed to one day bring the selfruled democratic island back into the fold, by force if necessary.

Yuan Bao, which means "round baby" in Chinese, was unveiled to some 150 reporters and invited guests alongside her mother at Taipei Zoo. Taipei mayor Ko Wen-je said the cub had "grown well". She now weighs over 13 kilograms (30 pounds), up from 186 grams (6.5) ounces) at birth. Taiwan's zoo has seen a flurry of births this year, including a gorilla, koala, Malayan tapir and pangolin. Yuan Yuan gave birth to a daugh-

ter Yuan Zai in 2013 — the first giant panda born in Taiwan. The family has been the top attraction at the zoo. According to the World Wildlife Fund, just over 1,800 are believed remaining in the wild. — AFP

US actress Loughlin released from prison

merican actress Lori Loughlin was released from prison on Monday after serving a two-month sentence for her part in a scam to secure spots for privileged children at prestigious universities, authorities said. The 56-year-old known from her role as Aunt Becky in the 1980s-90s hit sitcom "Full House" had entered a low-security federal prison in Dublin, some 30 miles east of San Francisco, on October 30. Actress Felicity Huffman of "Desperate Housewives" fame was released in October 2019 from the same prison after serving 11 days of a two-week sentence for her role in the scam.

Loughlin and her husband, designer Mossimo Giannulli, were among some 50 people indicted over the elaborate scam. She and her husband were sentenced by a federal judge in August after having pleaded guilty. The pair admitted to paying \$500,000 to gain admission for their two daughters to the University of Southern California as recruits to the rowing crew team-a sport neither had

ever trained in. Loughlin was also sentenced to two years of supervised release, a \$150,000 fine and 100 hours of community service. Giannulli, 57, described by prosecutors as the more active participant of the duo, was sentenced to five months, a \$250,000 fine and 250 hours of community service.

He began serving his sentence on November 19 at the Lompoc prison near Santa Barbara, California. The ringleader behind the college admissions scam, William "Rick" Singer, who authorities say was paid about \$25 million to bribe coaches and university administrators, has pleaded guilty and is awaiting sentencing, expected sometime next year.— AFP

In the Alps, white caviar offers an exclusive alternative

n his waders, Stefan Astner checks on the albino sturgeon: Almost two decades after they hatched, they're ready to be gutted for their caviar to be shipped out for New Year's celebrations. "The fish have already been through the ultrasound so we saw that they are full (of roe) and they will go into production soon," Astner says, dipping his net into a small pond teeming with the rare, white sturgeon. Deemed the most expensive food in the world, demand for caviaressentially, salted roe-has driven most sturgeon species to the brink of extinction in the wild. But fish farms like the one where Astner works in the village of Groedig, near the Austrian city of Salzburg, offer a more sustainable alter-

Owner Walter Gruell is one of about 2,500 sturgeon farmers worldwide that produce a combined 415 tons of caviar a year, according to the World Sturgeon Conservation Society's most recent figures dating from 2018. But patience is imperative for producers. The required investment is high and doesn't pay off for years until the sturgeon begin carrying roe-that's if they aren't stolen by gangs hoping to skip the arduous breeding process. The albino female that Gruell slices with surgical precision is 16 years

old. Slowly, he removes, rinses, and weighs the cream-coloured roe, which, like the fish, lacks pigmentation.

There are no more than 40 sturgeon breeders specializing in albinos worldwide, according to Thomas Friedrich, an expert on sturgeon at the University of Natural Resources and Life Sciences in Vienna. Though there's no research suggesting that lack of pigmentation affects caviar's taste, Gruell is convinced of its superiority, asserting that "it's even sweeter, even smoother than the tradi-

tionally black one." Consumers are willing to pay for the difference. The female that Gruell just cut yields 600 grams (21 ounces), worth 8,000 euros (\$9,750) more than three times the price that black caviar fetches.

Sturgeon rustlers

The coronavirus pandemic has curbed demand as upscale restaurants, like all eateries in Austria, have been closed, but retail is booming, partly because people still want to treat themselves, Gruell believes. "People want to savour the present moment," he says, between the many phone calls ahead of the end-of-year celebrations, when he makes close to 40 percent of his annual turnover. While AFP visited his farm, Gruell spoke to a luxury automaker, and shortly before had been in contact with an airline hoping to serve first-class travellers caviar "Made in Austria". Demand for caviar remains high, and not just from paying customers, but sturgeon rustlers,

A year ago, 400 kilos of sturgeon were stolen from a farm less than two hours away from Groedig. The eviscerated fish were later found in a reservoir. A year before that, 400 individual sturgeon worth 50,000 euros were stolen from

another farm. At Gruell's farm, the fish, which include sturgeon native to the Danube, are protected by surveillance cameras and high fences with heavy padlocks.

Outliving dinosaurs

Though sturgeon breeding in countries like China, Italy and France started as a purely financial venture, it is now also seen as a sustainable alternative to wild sturgeon. Having survived the

demise of the dinosaurs, some sturgeon species have recently gone extinct, while others are on the brink. In Russia and Iran, production of wild caviar collapsed in the 1980s due to overfishing as well as pollution in the Caspian Sea. Most countries along the Danube now protect the local sturgeon species, though experts worry that conservation might have come

Official government data in Romania, where the Danube empties into the Black Sea, show that catches of Russian sturgeon plummeted from 3,725 kilos (8,214 pounds) in 2002 to just 37 kilos (82 pounds) in 2005, indicating that overfishing had gravely diminished their numbers. Though the country issued a moratorium in 2006, impoverished fishermen continue to try and catch the fish, as the dozens of kilos of roe that one sturgeon can carry are worth as much as a fisherman's annual income. Some fans of the delicacy still believe that the taste of wild caviar eclipses that extracted from farmed sturgeon-though Gruell says his albinos are in a taste category of their own. — AFP

Swan Late: Mourning bird holds up German trains

swan mourning the death of its companion on a German railway track held up 23 trains for almost an hour and had to be removed by firefighters using special equipment, police said. The two birds had strayed onto the track area of the high-speed line between Kassel and Gottingen in central Germany "during an excursion", according to Kassel police. One of the birds died, likely after getting caught in the

overhead power cables, said the statement on the December 23 incident, which was made public Monday. Its companion then sat beside the body in mourning, resisting attempts by officials to lure it away and temporarily closing the line to traffic.

Firefighters with special equipment were later called in and managed to lift the dead swan and its surviving companion away from the area. Twentythree trains were delayed for about 50 minutes while the rescue operation took place, the police statement said. The surviving swan was unharmed and later released onto the river Fulda, it added. According to Britain's Royal Society for the Protection of Birds, swans try to find a mate for life. — AFP

MEXICO MOURNS MAESTRO ARMANDO MANZANERO, LOST **TO COVID AGED 86**

singer-songwriter Armando Manzanero died ■ Monday at the age of 86 after being hospitalized with the coronavirus, sparking an outpouring of tributes for one of the country's best-loved musicians. The composer and crooner of romantic Latin ballads, who became the first Mexican to receive a Grammy lifetime achievement award in 2014, suffered a cardiac arrest, his publicist told AFP. Manzanero's songs, which include "Adoro" (I Adore) and "Voy a apagar la luz" (I'm Going to Turn Off the Lights), are known across Latin America. His lyrics, some of them translated into English, have also been sung by international stars including Frank Sinatra, Christina Aguilera, Andrea Bocelli and Elvis Presley.

The artist was admitted to hospital on December 17 and later intubated, although news from his entourage over the weekend that his health was improving had sparked hope that he would beat the virus. A visibly moved

President Andres Manuel Lopez Obrador cut short his daily news conference on Monday after showing a video of Manzanero performing "Adoro." He hailed the musician as "a great composer, one of the best in the country." The Latin Recording Academy, which also presented Manzanero with a lifetime achievement award in 2010, described his death as an "irreparable loss for the world of Latin music." Spanish singer Alejandro Sanz said the Mexican maestro had "taught us to adore in the most beauti-

Due to the coronavirus pandemic that has hit Mexico particularly hard, no tributes were due to be held, so the Society of Authors and Composers, which Manzanero had presided over since 2010, asked that people sing from their balconies and windows at nightfall the song "This afternoon I saw it rain." In different parts of Mexico City, that song and other melodies made famous by the late composer rang out at dusk. "His songs reached to the bottom of our hearts, all of them, there is not one that does not reach the depths," Leticia Mart?nez, a 63-yearold housewife, told AFP.

'Noble soul'

Argentine singer-songwriter Fito Paez said Manzanero "was above all an example for future artists to follow. A noble soul and a beautiful person." Manzanero was born in Merida in the southeastern state of Yucatan on December 7, 1934, although his birth was only registered a year later. He recorded around 30 albums and some 400 songs over a career spanning six decades. Music was in his blood-his father was also a singer, although Manzanero credited his grandmother for his romanticism. The songwriter was honored in person by the Yucatan authorities this month with the opening of a museum dedicated to his life and

"Gratitude is the memory of the heart, and music is the best memory you can carry in your pocket," said Manzanero, who developed a cough after his return to the capital. The songwriter, who was proud of his indigenous Mayan roots and known for his elegant suits, married five times and had seven

Mexico has registered more than 122,000 coronavirus deaths-the world's fourth-highest toll after the United States, Brazil and India. "Of course, as Mexicans we will always remember him, and when we are somewhere and we have the opportunity to listen to his music, we will do so remembering the great Manzanero," said Mexico City resident Jose Luis Ramirez. — AFP

Rio de Janeiro to block beach access on New Year's Eve

de Janeiro authorities announced Monday they will block beach access the night of December 31 to prevent crowds in one of Brazil's worst-hit cities by the coronavirus pandemic. The measures will include a ban on vehicles along some 30 kilometers (19 miles) of Rio's coastline, where millions of people typically

gather every December 31 to ring in the new year with elaborate firework displays. Only inhabitants of the surrounding neighborhoods will be able to walk in the area. Violations may be punished with fines of up to 15,000 reais (\$2,800).

"We have to send a hard and direct message to the population," said Alexandre Cardeman, chief of the Rio Operations Center, which is in charge of security and traffic video surveillance. "What we want to make clear, beyond those restrictions, is that a lot depends on us," he said. "Spend a conscious New Year and stay at home." Last week, the mayor's office announced that entry would be forbidden to the Copacabana neighborhood, the center of traditional

New Year's festivities, from 8:00pm on December 31. Police barriers will be erected to block both public transport and private vehicles, and the subway will stop circulating in those areas.

The mayor's office had initially planned a virtual celebration with online music shows but canceled any official events two weeks ago. Brazil, with more

than 191,000 deaths, has the secondhighest death toll from the coronavirus pandemic, after the United States. In Rio alone, the death toll is more than 15,000, with a mortality rate of 216 per 100,000 inhabitants-more than double the national average.— AFP

China drops 76ers NBA broadcasts as HK row rumbles on

BEIJING: Chinese streaming giant Tencent has stopped live broadcasts of games by the NBA's Philadelphia 76ers in apparent protest at their new president Daryl Morey, who sparked a row by voicing support for Hong Kong (HK) protesters last year. Tencent has been offering text updates only for Sixers games as well as those involving the Houston Rockets, Morey's former employer. It also refused to screen Rockets games last season.

State broadcaster CCTV, which holds China's exclusive TV rights for the NBA, has not aired any games since the season opened on December 22. Tencent's refusal to stream Sixers and Rockets games, and CCTV's continued black-out, extends a year-long stand-off in the NBA's biggest international market that has cost it hundreds of millions of dollars. Morey, then the Rockets' general manager, tweeted "Fight for Freedom, stand with Hong Kong" in October 2019, referring to the prodemocracy protests that Beijing calls separatist and seditious.

When the NBA backed Morey's right to free speech, CCTV responded by pulling broadcasts, although it made a "goodwill" gesture by airing Game 5 from the NBA Finals series in October. Tencent has continued streaming games, but only text updates were available for the Sixers' season-opening win over the Washington Wizards on December 23. Two other Sixers games over the weekend - against the New York Knicks and Cleveland Cavaliers - also had text updates. — AFP

Morant limps out as Grizzlies record first win of the season

Portland Trail Blazers down Lakers

LOS ANGELES: The Memphis Grizzlies' first win of the NBA season was a costly one, as Rookie of the Year Ja Morant limped out with a sprained ankle in the first half of a 116-111 overtime triumph over the shorthanded Brooklyn Nets on Monday. Morant rose to block a shot by Brooklyn's French forward Timothe Luwawu-Cabarrot with less than three minutes remaining in the first half, rolling his ankle as he came down and hopping to the baseline where he fell to the court.

He was taken to the locker room in a wheelchair, with the Grizzlies tweeting that the initial diagnosis was a sprained left ankle. Morant watched from the sidelines as the Grizzlies rallied for the victory, standing through the final minutes - a protective boot on his injured ankle. Kyle Anderson led the Grizzlies with 28 points - with a career-best four three-pointers - and Dillon Brooks added 24. It was Anderson who drained three of four free-throws in the waning seconds of overtime, after he'd grabbed the rebound of when Brooklyn's Joe Harris couldn't get a potential gamewinning three-pointer to drop with 5.6 seconds remaining.

"You always want to get that first one in the books to start rolling, so this was a big one," Anderson said. "We had to get this one." But the loss of Morant was a potentially huge blow for the Grizzlies. The 21-year-old star had averaged 36

points in the first two games of the season. Caris LeVert led the Nets with 28 points and 11 assists. Brooklyn rested stars Kevin Durant and Kyrie Irving both coming off long injury layoffs after the abbreviated off-season.

The Nets were also without Spencer Dinwiddie, who will have surgery to repair a partially torn right knee ligament suffered on Sunday. The Los Angeles Lakers, heavy favorites to win a second straight title, suffered their second defeat in four games in the new season, falling 115-107 to the Portland Trail Blazers. LeBron James led the Lakers with 29 points, nine rebounds and six assists and Anthony Davis returned from a night off with 13 points and 10 rebounds. Damian Lillard led the Blazers with 31 points and Gary Trent Jr added 28 off the bench as Portland's reserves out-scored the Lakers bench 45-23.

"I thought we came out with great energy," said Los Angeles coach Frank Vogel, whose Lakers seized a 13-point lead in the first quarter. "When they made their runs we weren't able to sustain the energy we began the game with." In Salt Lake City, Utah's Donovan Mitchell scored the Jazz's final 12 points - including the game-winner with seven seconds remaining - and Rudy Gobert shut down Oklahoma City's Shai Gilgeous-Alexander at the rim as time expired to give the Jazz a 110-109 victory over the Thunder.

The game marked the Jazz's return to Oklahoma City for the first time since March 11 - when Gobert became the first NBA player to test positive for Covid-19 and league play shuddered to halt, resuming four months later in a quarantine bubble in Orlando, Florida. "Obviously you have all the memories coming back," said French big man Gobert, who finished with 12 points, 10 rebounds and four blocked shots. "It's a little bit of a weird atmosphere. "But I'm happy we were able to come back and get the win."

Jokic triple-double

Although the NBA managed to resume and crown a champion, the pandemic continues to affect the new season with games being played in largely empty arenas. The Houston Rockets, without John Wall, DeMarcus Cousins, Eric Gordon and Mason Jones because of COVID-19 health and safety protocols, fell 124-111 to the Nuggets in Denver, where Serbian center Nikola Jokic had a triple-double of 19 points, 12 rebounds and 18 assists to lead the hosts. Jamal Murray added 21 points before departing after a hard fall in the third quarter and Paul Millsap added 19 points as seven Nuggets players scored in double figures. Rockets star James Harden scored 34 points for Houston, who were still without John Wall, DeMarcus Cousins, Eric Gordon and Mason Jones because of Covid-19 health and safety protocols. — AFP

COVID outbreak at Man City

For just the second time since the 2019/20 Premier League match season resumed in June, a match was postponed due to coronavirus infections after a spike at City. "The Premier League Board received medical advice that the match should be postponed," the Premier League said in a statement. "The Premier League continues to have full confidence in its protocols and rules, and the way in which all clubs are implementing them."

Pochettino favorite to take over as PSG sack coach Tuchel

PARIS: Paris Saint-Germain yesterday confirmed the sacking of coach Thomas Tuchel, who had been at the club since July 2018, but did not name his successor. "After an in-depth analysis of its sporting situation, Paris Saint-Germain decided to terminate Thomas Tuchel's contract," the French giants announced in a statement. Argentinean Mauricio Pochettino, the ex-Tottenham coach and a former PSG player, is widely reported to be the favorite to take over.

Tuchel, whose axing was widely reported but unconfirmed last week, managed PSG 121 times in all competitions, with 95 wins, 12 draws and 20 defeats. His trophy haul featured two Ligue 1 titles (2019, 2020) as well as the French Cup and French League Cup in 2020. The 47-year-old German also led the Parisian club to their first ever Champions League final last August, which they lost 1-0 to Bayern Munich. Despite appearing to be adept at man-managing PSG's squad of superstar players such as Neymar and Kylian Mbappe, Tuchel reportedly upset the Qatari-backed club after complaining about an apparent lack of recognition at leading PSG to the Champions League final.

"I would like to thank Thomas Tuchel and his staff for all they have

contributed to the club," said PSG chairman Nasser Al-Khelaifi. "Thomas has put a lot of energy and passion into the job, and we will of course remember the good moments we shared together. I wish him all the best for the future." Less than three months on from the final defeat to Bayern Munich in Lisbon, Tuchel has become the first PSG coach to leave mid-season since Antoine Kombouare was replaced by Carlo Ancelotti in December 2011.

Barca date looms

Tuchel departs the Parc des Princes having secured a last 16 Champions League clash with Barcelona and PSG sitting third in Ligue 1 - a point shy of leaders Lyon-despite being plagued by injuries, suspensions and coronavirus

Should Pochettino take over, his opening match in charge will be January 6's trip to Saint-Etienne on Ligue 1's resumption after the winter break. Then, on February 16, the Argentinean could face his first massive test against his compatriot Lionel Messi's Barcelona, with the return leg on March 6.

NEW YORK: The Buffalo Bills, their first AFC East title in 25 years already in hand, completed a season sweep of division rivals New England Monday with a 38-9 triumph at the Patriots' Gillette Stadium. Bills quarterback Josh Allen threw four touchdowns, three of them to Stefon Diggs as Buffalo completed a season sweep of the Pats for the first time since 1999. Allen completed 27-of-36 passes for 320 yards and four touchdowns - setting Bills franchise records for TDs in a season with 34 and completions with 375. He surpassed the marks held by Jim Kelly and Drew Bledsoe.

Diggs caught nine of Allen's passes for 145 yards and three TDs. The Patriots, whose 11-year reign atop the division had already ended, seized a 3-0 lead on a 45-yard field goal by Nick Folk on the opening drive of the contest. But the Bills seized control from there, with a Tyler Bass field goal followed by touchdowns on their next four possessions. Zack Moss scored on a five-yard touchdown run to give the Bills a 10-3 lead, capping a drive that

MADRID: Real Madrid will attempt to sign off the year with a sixth win on the bounce as Zinedine Zidane's in-form side continue their pursuit of La Liga leaders and city rivals Atletico Madrid today. Defending champions Real are level on 32 points with Atletico but have played two games more than Diego Simeone's men ahead of their trip to Elche.

Karim Benzema has been the driving force behind Real's excellent December run, claiming key goals in wins over Athletic Bilbao, Eibar and Granada after securing the club a spot in the Champions League knockout phase. Eden Hazard is also in line to feature after recovering from his latest injury setback. The Belgian was an unused substitute in last week's victory over Granada and has made just three league starts this campaign. Real coach Zinedine Zidane hopes the short festive break afforded to his players over Christmas will not interrupt the momentum built over a domestic five-game

"We're going to keep working hard. We have an awful lot of games, we should be pleased with what we're doing," said Zidane. "We're going to lose games again, but we're going to try to win as many as possible. From time to time it's inevitable.' Atletico have responded well to the 2-0 defeat by Real earlier this month that snapped their 26-match unbeaten league run. However, the loss of Kieran Trippier is a substantial blow to a defence that has conceded just five goals in 13 matches, easily the fewest in the division.

The England defender, an ever-present for Atletico in La Liga and Europe this term, was recently hit with a 10-week ban for breaching betting rules and will be unavailable until March. The club is said to be considering an appeal. Diego Costa has reportedly asked to terminate his contract for family reasons, having just returned from a blood clot that sidelined the Brazil-born Spain international for a month. Joao Felix is expected to return after missing the 2-0 win at Real Sociedad, although the Portuguese star hasn't scored in the league since

Barcelona will bid to end a turbulent 2020 on a winning note at home to Eibar, but Ronald Koeman's side will be without Lionel Messi after the Argentine was granted an extended break as he recovers from an ankle knock. The six-time Ballon d'Or winner admitted his aborted departure in the summer had affected him at the start of the season, but stressed he felt "excited" to play under Koeman. "Barca is my life, I'm in love with the club. And the city, my children were born here," Messi said in an interview with Spanish TV channel La Sexta broadcast on Sunday.—AFP

Resilient India thump Australia

India silence critics, leveling series 1-1



MELBOURNE: Stand-in captain Ajinkya Rahane led India to a dominant eight-wicket win over Australia in the second Test yesterday, leveling the series 1-1 and capping an extraordinary turnaround after their record collapse in the opening game. Rahane, deputising during Virat Kohli's paternity leave, hit an unbeaten 27 in Melbourne - after a century in the first innings - as India reached the meagre target of 70 for the loss of two wickets.

It capped a remarkable comeback for an Indian side desperate to make amends after losing in Adelaide by eight wickets, when they posted their lowest ever score of 36 and were widely criticized at home. And they bounced back without superstar and batting maintstay Kohli, who has returned home for the birth of his first child. "Really proud of all the players," said Rahane. "I want to give credit to the debutants (Mohammed) Siraj and (Shubman) Gill, the character they showed after the Adelaide loss was great to see. Character was important for us." Kohli, watching at home in India, tweeted his congratulations. "What a win this is, absolutely amazing effort by the whole team," he

said. "Couldn't be happier for the boys and specially Jinks (Rahane) who led the team to victory amazingly."

'Sloppy cricket'

Under the mild-mannered Rahane, India battled hard to dismiss Australia for 195 in the first innings and then posted 326 in reply. Australia resumed their second innings on day four on 133 for six with a two-run lead, and their hopes resting on 21-year-old rookie all-rounder Cameron Green. He made 45 as they battled to 200 before tail-ender Josh Hazlewood was the last man to fall before lunch. Siraj took 3-37 with Jasprit Bumrah, Ravindra Jadeja and Ravi Ashwin grabbing two each.

Rahane and Gill (35) then saw India home, but not before some nervous moments. Mitchell Starc got a nick from the out-of-form Mayank Agarwal (5), which Tim Paine caught, then Pat Cummins snared Cheteshwar Pujara for three, edged to Green at gully.

It left India on 19 for two before they regained their composure to seal the win. "Very disappointed, played poor cricket, sloppy cricket," said Australia captain Paine. "Let's not take anything away from India, they forced us to make mistakes. They bowled beautifully, we haven't adapted as well as we would've liked. "Disappointed as a batting group, but two Tests to go." To make matters worse for Australia, they were fined 40 percent of their match fee and docked four World Test Championship points for a slow over-rate.

Match-winner Rahane

Australia had collapsed to 99 for six in the run chase on Monday before Green and Cummins knuckled down to weather 18 overs and steer them to stumps. Green showed glimpses of his magic, cutting Ashwin and driving Bumrah beautifully for fours, while also exhibiting patience. But in only his second Test, he was undone by Siraj, caught by Jadeja as he looked to find the boundary with a pull shot, ending a 146-ball stay. Cummins survived chances on 15 and 19, but when Bumrah took the new ball he finally fell, gloving a rising delivery to Agarwal. Starc was unbeaten on 14 with Nathan Lyon caught behind off Siraj for three, and Hazlewood making 10.

Australia's hopes rested with the tail-enders after their top order failed to fire, exposing the fragile nature of their batting in the absence of the injured David Warner. Opener Joe Burns again flopped, out for four, to put his place in the team for the third Test next week at risk, while Travis Head (17) also disappointed and Steve Smith's poor run continued, gone for eight. Their troubles came despite India being a bowler down following Umesh Yadav's calf strain on Monday, a further setback for a team already missing Mohammed Shami and Ishant Sharma.

But India's weakened attack rose to the occasion, with Bumrah at the top of his game and Siraj impressing, while experienced spinners Jadeja and Ashwin consistently posed problems. But it was Rahane's gritty 112 that ultimately proved match-winning.

He came to the crease with his team in trouble at 64 for three and, against one of the world's most potent bowling attacks, reached a 12th Test century, one that pundits rated as perhaps his most important ever. The third Test is due to start on January 7 in Sydney. — AFP

Southee celebrates his milestone 300th wicket

MOUNT MAUNGANUI: Swing king Tim Southee celebrated his milestone 300th wicket as New Zealand sensed victory over Pakistan at stumps on day four of the first Test in Mount Maunganui yesterday. New Zealand declared their second innings at 180 for five and Pakistan, set an unlikely target of 373, will go into the final day at 71 for three. Azhar Ali will resume on 34 with Fawad Alam on 21. The Black Caps need to sweep the two-Test series if they are to be in contention to make the World Test Championship final at Lords in June.

In New Zealand's second innings, the Pakistan quicks struggled to get any assistance from the fourth-day wicket, but Southee and Trent Boult immediately had the ball dancing to their tune. Abid Ali fended a rising Boult delivery and was caught behind, while Shan Masood was caught at first slip off Southee and Pakistan were two down for no runs after 14 deliveries.

Azhar Ali and Haris Sohail provided some resistance for 15 overs and 37 runs before Sohail chipped Southee to Mitchell Santner at short cover - making Southee only the third New Zealander, after Richard Hadlee and Daniel Vettori, to take 300 Test wickets. But Southee said the landmark delivery was not the one he was looking for. "I would have loved one to pitch off and nip away and get

caught behind," he said. "But the surface obviously dictates what you're trying to achieve and the wicket is obviously a bit slower so those catches in front of the wicket become important." Southee said the target now was to extend New Zealand's 15-match unbeaten streak on home pitches. "The boys will recover well tonight and turn up with that chance of achieving something special tomorrow." For Pakistan, much hinges on Azhar Ali staying at the crease on a deteriorating wicket if they are to avoid defeat.

"Obviously losing three wickets doesn't help," said the batsman. "You've seen some balls keep low and it (the pitch) is getting slower so it's hard to time the ball. —AFP

South Africa hammer injury-hit Sri Lanka

CENTURION: South Africa wrapped up victory by an innings and 45 runs shortly after lunch on the fourth day of the first Test against Sri Lanka at SuperSport Park in Centurion yesterday. Sri Lanka, needing 225 runs to avoid an innings defeat, were bowled out for 180. Kusal Perera hit a spirited 64 off 87 balls for the tourists and debutant Wanindu Hasaranga slammed 59 off 53 balls, taking advantage as South Africa seemingly tried to lift their over-rate by rushing through six overs of slow bowling after lunch.

Sri Lanka resumed at 65 for two yesterday but never recovered after all-rounder Wiaan Mulder dismissed overnight batsman Dinesh Chandimal and Niroshan Dickwella in quick succession. Batsman Dhananjaya de Silva, who retired hurt after making 79 in the first innings, did not bat for Sri Lanka. He was ruled out of the rest of the tour with a torn thigh muscle.

Sri Lanka suffered a spate of injuries during the match but bowlers Kasun Rajitha and Lahiru Kumara hobbled to the crease to delay the inevitable. Both suffered groin injuries while bowling. Sri Lanka started the match well, making 396 after winning the toss but an injury-depleted bowling attack conceded 621 runs when South Africa batted, with former captain Faf du Plessis hitting 199. Du Plessis was named man of the match.

It was South Africa's second win in eight matches in the world Test championship. They have suffered six defeats. Sri Lanka have won one, lost three and drawn one of their five matches. Chandimal, who appeared to suffer a groin injury towards the end of Monday's play, resumed his innings yesterday and survived for 40 minutes before being bowled for 25 by a ball from the medium-paced Mulder which cut back off the pitch.

Mulder, 22, followed up by having Niroshan Dickwella caught behind. He provided the control that was missing from much of South Africa's bowling in the first innings during a spell of two for 29 in nine overs.—AFP
