

# Fists fly as guards called in during Assembly session

# Ghanem charges conspiracy; opposition blames speaker • Amnesty bills fail to pass

**KUWAIT:** MPs yesterday were involved in fistfights, traded jibes and insults and exchanged heated arguments during a highly-charged session that at one point turned into total chaos when guards quarreled with spectators in the jam-packed gallery. Assembly Speaker Marzouq Al-Ghanem accused leading opposition MP Mohammad Al-Mutair of plotting to disrupt and sabotage the session in order to make people hate democracy.

The opposition responded by blaming Ghanem of being totally responsible for what happened and accused him of committing a series of constitutional and legal blunders, saying they will not remain silent. Yesterday's developments raised political tension in the

country with unconfirmed reports that opposition lawmakers could resign en masse or the Assembly could be dissolved and snap election called. The opposition MPs however said they will be debating their options in the coming days.

The altercation took place while debating a controversial draft law calling to pardon a group of former opposition MPs and activists who were handed heavy jail terms for entering the Assembly building during an anti-corruption protest in Nov 2011. The legal and legislative committee was asked by the Assembly to prepare a report within one month on the draft law, but it added two other bills calling to also pardon Kuwaiti Shiite members of an Iran-linked cell who are in jail.

# Iraqis wanted to topple the system; taboos fell instead

**BAGHDAD:** Mocking clerics, falling in love at rallies and mending a broken society: Even if Iraq's young protesters have failed to overthrow entrenched politicians, they have scored by shattering decades-old taboos. Since October, the country of 40 million has been rocked by a historically large grassroots movement with big goals: Ending corruption, unaccountable sectarian parties and overreach from neighboring Iran.

Prime Minister Adel Abdel Mahdi resigned in December, only to be replaced by ex-minister Mohammad Allawi, slammed by protesters as too close to the ruling elite. But what they have so far been unable to win politically, demonstrators have made up for with social change. "We scored one goal by bringing down the government, but socially we achieved much more," said Ali Khraybit, 28.

## Palestinians channel protests through Fajr

**NABLUS:** Before sunrise, thousands of Palestinians streamed towards the mosque in Nablus's Victory Square, swelling the usual crowds of morning worshippers to launch a new front in their protests against Israel and the United States. The scene has been repeated elsewhere in the West Bank, where people have begun turning out for early prayers in unprecedented numbers, forsaking the usual protest sites where they risk arrest and channeling their anger into a mass expressions of faith.

"This is the most peaceful way to get the message out," said restaurant owner Saif Abu Baker, as the Nablus crowds spilled out of the mosque into surrounding alleyways and courtyards. Political slogans including "For the sake of God, we have risen up" echoed through Nablus's Old City after the calls from the muezzin and the murmured recitations of the faithful. "I would hope that it is a new form of channeling the way the message is being sent out there," said Abu Baker. "Because we have tried protesting and it did not work because we don't have enough power. It's the safer way for everyone."

Much of the crowd's message at Friday's Fajr (dawn) prayers - the day when most people turn out - was a rejection of the perceived pro-Israel bias of US President Donald Trump's Middle East peace plan. There have only been small regular street rallies since that plan was launched last week. Few have responded to calls by President Mahmoud Abbas' Palestinian Authority for 'Days of Rage'.

Instead many have begun heeding calls on Facebook and other social media sites to attend what is becoming known as the 'Great Fajr Campaign' described as a show of solidarity against Trump and what they see as Israeli threats to Islamic holy sites in Jerusalem and Hebron. Those two cities have also seen larger turnouts in the past few weeks. The first calls for a surge in attendance were from Fatah, Abbas's nationalist political faction that dominates

**KUWAIT:** Kuwait's Foreign Minister Sheikh Ahmad Nasser Al-Mohammad Al-Sabah and his Iranian counterpart Mohammad Javad Zarif touched upon the situations in the region and the ties between the two countries during a meeting they had recently on the sidelines of Munich Security Conference, a senior Kuwaiti official said. "There is continued communications with Iran and visits by Iranian officials to Kuwait," Deputy Foreign Minister Khaled Al-Jarallah told reporters on Monday. He noted that it is normal that the two ministers hold meetings, describing their talks as "positive and constructive." "We think that these meetings are useful and will be in the interest of the region's interest and the efforts seeking calm, in addition to the bilateral ties," he stressed.

### **Gulf crisis**

Meanwhile, Jarallah reiterated Kuwait's continued mediation to solve the Gulf crisis, saying "we will not lose hope in the continuation of this media-

tion." On Kuwait's communication with China on coronavirus, he said Kuwait has expressed its solidarity with China towards this big healthy catastrophe. He stated that the Kuwaiti Cabinet has previously announced medical assistance to China, saying "we will continue offering support and aid to friends in China to face this big healthy disaster."

Regarding the US peace plan on the Palestinian cause, he said Kuwait has voiced its stance towards this issue. "We highly support and appreciate the US efforts. The plan is related to a cause of a nation who have been suf-fering more than 70 years," he said. 



# 600 workers employed in Kuwait stranded in China due to virus

### Ambassador admits delays an trade shipments from China

**KUWAIT:** Around 600 Chinese workers are currently stranded in China as the result of a ban imposed by Kuwait on Chinese citizens as a precautionary measure to protect Kuwait against the deadly coronavirus epidemic. The workers, according to Chinese Ambassador to Kuwait Li Minggang, were all engaged in the most important government projects in Kuwait.

"We are saddened by the situation, but our workers are awaiting positive developments. Experts in China are all working hand-in-hand to find a real solution to the deadly virus. They have been testing, and there are some positive developments so far. We are cooperating to slow down the transmission of the virus," said Li. He also admitted the negative impact of the ban on trade, as some products have not been able to arrive on time and there are reported delays. "It is a race against time and a race against the spread of the virus," he added. According to the latest data, China has now 72,530 confirmed cases, 1,870 deaths and 12,682 recoveries.

# Embassies to delay national celebrations over virus fears

**KUWAIT:** Minister of Health Dr Sheikh Basel Al-Sabah submitted a report during a Cabinet meeting on the latest developments of coronavirus, amid the spread of the epidemic and the rising number of the deaths and the cases infected with the disease. He also offered statistics on the countries in which the disease is spreading, saying that the cases infected with the disease hit a four-fold rate during the last two weeks. The minister stressed that Kuwait is free of the coronavirus until now, thanks to Allah Almighty. During its weekly meeting on Monday chaired by His Highness the Prime Minister Sheikh Sabah Al-Khaled Al-Hamad Al-Sabah, the Cabinet lauded the efforts made by the ministry and all concerned bodies, affirming the followup on the implementation of the emergency plan to prevent the virus from entering the country. The ministry also is folyear, the Chinese government, under the leadership of President Xi Jinping, has rapidly established a national mechanism, mobilized human and material resources from all parts of China and took the most comprehensive, strict and effective measures to combat the virus.

"The Chinese government has given top priority to ensure the safety and health of our people. We have taken decisive measures to contain the spread of the virus, save the infected patients and reduce the fatality rate," Li said. He noted that Chinese scientists have successfully separated the strain of the virus and identified the diagnostic reagent in only seven days, and shared the genetic sequence of the virus in a timely manner with the World Health Organization.

The envoy said the Chinese government cares about the safety of foreign citizens residing in China. The Ministry of Foreign Affairs of China has established a mechanism to coordinate on matters related to foreigners, and has briefed foreign ambassadors to China about the epidemiological situation twice and provided them with information related to the epidemic in different languages. Foreign affairs offices of local governments across China have been in contact with diplomats, students and other foreign nationals who are in China as well, and their moderate concerns and needs have been addressed in a timely manner.

To date, a total of 27 confirmed cases of foreigners in China have been reported, including three recovered cases, two deaths and 22 cases under quarantine. "Meanwhile, we are touched and inspired by many foreigners in China since they have signed up and asked to work as volunteers to fight the epidemic," said Li.

Li said that a virus of this proportion requires joint action to confront it. "So far, more than 160 country leaders and representatives of international organizations have expressed their condolences and support to China," he said, adding that HH the Amir Sheikh Sabah Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah sent a cable of condolences to Xi stressing his full confidence that China is able to eradicate the epidemic soon.

Sabah sent similar cables to express their support for China. To date, more than 40 countries have provided material and financial assistance to the affected areas in China. "We are grateful for all the support from these countries," Li concluded.

# Company made millions from visa trafficking

**KUWAIT:** Authorities have busted another company that collected KD 20 million from 10,000 workers, who were abandoned after they arrived in Kuwait. A complaint against the major company was received by police, accusing the company of trading in residencies and bringing in Bangladeshis on government contracts in exchange of KD 2,000 per iqama and KD 500 for sponsorship. Preliminary investigations revealed that the executive director of the company has Bangladeshi mandoubs, in addition to brokers who are professionals in residency trade and take commissions, although the lion's share goes to company owners, who have collected huge amounts of money over the past two years. — Al-Qabas

### Undertaking for expat teachers

**KUWAIT:** An educational source said no contract will be signed with any expat teacher without an undertaking that proves the authenticity of their academic qualification and experience certificate, and legal action will be taken in case the documents are not correct. The sources said the certificates equivalency law is still inactive, so the ministry will appoint teachers on local and foreign contracts according to the previous mechanism and will take the undertaking from them. — Al-Rai

# lowing up implementing the World Health Organization (WHO) recommendations on keeping people away from gatherings and limiting the congregations.

As a result, the Cabinet instructed the Foreign Ministry to inform all of the country's diplomatic missions abroad to delay the celebrations of the National Days this year. Concerning the local preventive measures, the Cabinet directed the Ministry of Commerce and Industry to ban exporting the preventive and medical substances relating to combating the virus. The Cabinet directed the Civil Service Commission to set regulations to curb the travel of employees on official missions, except for necessity. It stressed the importance of avoiding any gatherings by both citizens and residents, mainly during the National Days' celebrations to avoid all risks arising from the spread of this disease and preserve the safety of citizens and residents.

#### Traffic law

The Cabinet discussed the recommendations by the legal affairs committee on a draft resolution on amending some provisions of the Law No 74/1983 on combating drugs and a bill on amending some provisions of the decree No 67/1976 on traffic, which aims to amend most penalties mentioned in Chapter 5. And within the framework of the

Cabinet's follow-up on the implementation of the government action program, the Cabinet was briefed on the reports by some government agencies and decided to refer all reports to the General Secretariat of the Supreme Council for Planning and Development for study and then send a report to the General Secretariat of the Cabinet on what has been accomplished within two weeks to refer it to the Cabinet.

In addition, the Cabinet was informed about the recommendations of the economic affairs committee on the semiannual report on the activities of the Supreme Council of Privatization (January 2020) which includes the most important activities and achievements over the last six months. ## Minister to push Kuwaitis' employment in private sector

**KUWAIT:** With the return to her office in the previous Cabinet formation, Minister of Social Affairs and Minister of State for Economic Affairs Mariam Al-Aqeel started reopening the files of the manpower authority, said informed sources, noting that in order to control Kuwait's demographics, the minister's urgent priorities will include domestic helpers and work permits. The sources added in her former capacity as acting minister of state for economic affairs, Aqeel had promised the parliamentary human resources committee to submit a detailed report about the government's measures to employ citizens in the private sector instead of expats.

"The minister will attend the committee's next meeting with executive measures to do so," the sources stressed, noting that the measures will include increasing the fines of companies that do not comply with employing the mandatory ratios of citizens. In addition, the sources highlighted that Aqeel will urge the Cabinet to activate a previous decision mandating expats' departure from the country to receive financial dues. "On being terminated, an expat will not be paid or have their residency visa renewed unless they submit departure forms," the sources underlined.

Moreover, the sources pointed out that a proposal already on the manpower authority's agenda will be to impose new fees and health insurance for each expat an employer recruits, but this needs further discussion in the ministerial economic committee to study its possible impacts on the local market and avoid expelling skilled labor.

### **Maids arrested**

The department of cybercrime at the cyber investigations directorate yesterday responded to a social media video showing two Asian maids mocking an elderly woman while serving her coffee in bed, and immediately ordered identifying the woman and her maids to hold them legally accountable. Security sources added that detectives managed to identify the maids and arrest and refer them to relevant authorities pending further measures.

### Weight-loss medicine

Health sources yesterday said the weight-loss medicine Belviq-XR (lorcaserin) on sale in Kuwait has not been registered with the Ministry of Health (MoH), adding that the US FDA had demanded removing it from shelves on grounds that clinical studies had detected a rise in cancer amongst its users.

**KUWAIT:** Two men held over a sand collapse incident in Mutlaa that left a number of fatalities recently were remanded in custody for 10 days yesterday pending investigations in the case. The two suspects, Chinese and Egyptian, face manslaughter charges in the case that forced the Public Authority for Housing Welfare to suspend operations at the Mutlaa city mega housing project until legal procedures are complete. The authority said in a statement that it will take all the necessary measures to reveal the causes of the incident and take the necessary action regarding it.

Kuwaiti Cabinet members were briefed on

Azmi expressed his condolences on the recent demise of a number of Nepalese construction workers at Mutlaa residential city project's site, and wished a speedy recovery for the injured.

# Expats to pay KD 2.5 per visit for medical services: Dhaman

**KUWAIT:** Dhaman Hospitals Company CEO Dr Mohammed Al-Qenae said two Dhaman centers have been completed in Hawally and Farwaniya and are ready to receive patients. Qenae also urged everyone to visit the centers and experience firsthand the quality services they provide, adding that the company is keen on offering its medical services at reasonable prices and that Dhaman will soon start receiving patients covered by various insurance companies.

Speaking in an interview with Kuwait local daily Al-Rai, Qenae stressed that meetings and coordination with the Ministry of Health (MoH) are in progress to finalize the health insurance system, move forward to the second phase of implementing it and start receiving expats insured by KD 130 annual fee approved by the government to be paid by employers. "The new health insurance system will save a lot for beneficiaries, as they will only have to pay a KD 2.5 fee per visit including all consultancy, medical test and radiology fees, referral to hospitals, surgeries and any additional tests," Qenae explained.

Qenae stressed that 35 percent of the construction of Ahmadi and Jahra centers has been completed and is scheduled to be completed by 2021. In addition, he explained that recent Public Authority for Civil Information (PACI) statistics show that Daman is expected to serve around two million people with an expected 3 percent annual increase. He added Jahra and Ahmadi hospitals will have a bed capacity of 600 beds and that the company will be ready to increase it if needed, especially in view of the recent medical advancements which mean that patients do not need to

be hospitalized for long after surgeries.

Responding to a question about medical staff working with Dhaman, Qenae stressed that all doctors, nurses and other medical staff are recruited after passing special tests and interviews and having their degrees accredited by the ministry of higher education. Speaking about the benefits Kuwaiti citizens will get from the new Dhaman system, Qenae said Dhaman is a strategic partner of MoH in providing public services to a segment of beneficiaries, which will ease the burden on MoH facilities and thus reflect on the level of healthcare services Kuwaitis get there in the form of cutting short waiting times. "The government has also offered 50 percent of the company's shares to citizens, which is another direct benefit for them to be added to the improved services they will get," Qenae concluded.

### Soldier dead in accident

**KUWAIT:** A soldier was killed in an accident that happened when his vehicle hit a camel while he was driving on his way to his workplace at a camp north of the country yesterday, according to preliminary investigations. The victim's body was transferred to the coroner after paramedics pronounced him dead on the scene. Further investigations are in progress. — By Hanan Al-Saadoun

# **'Diabetes causes sexual impotence'**

**KUWAIT:** Head of the urology unit at Jaber military hospital Dr Mohammed Al-Ghanem warned that the reasons of sexual disorders (impotence) from which many men worldwide suffer may be physical or psychological. Ghanem explained that physical reasons include chronic diabetes, which affects nerves and vessels supplying reproductive organs with blood, irregular blood pressure, smoking, high cholesterol, inactivity and severe spinal cord injuries.

Ghanem said psychological reasons include stress and family problems, and advised everybody not to overthink and avoid stress as much as possible. Ghanem added treatments depend on the cases, giving an example that patients with no health restrictions or clots may be prescribed sexual tonics, and if this does not work, they will be tested by ultrasound to check if they suffers from any blood vessel leaks or weak blood flow.

"Diabetic patients have to control the diabetes level first and regularly exercise before taking any tonics," Ghanem said, noting that the final option is to use prosthetic devices or pumps, which provide 98 percent success rate and only two percent failure due to inflammation, high levels of blood sugar or the body's rejection of alien objects.

# China virus death toll nears 1,900

**Coronavirus cases hits 542 on cruise ship off Japan** 

BEIJING: The death toll from the new coronavirus outbreak rose again yesterday but Chinese and international health officials sought to calm global nerves, citing a study showing most cases are mild and warning against excessive measures to contain the epidemic. Nearly 1,900 people have now died and more than 72,000 others infected by the virus in China, with hundreds more cases in some 25 countries.

The situation remains dire at the epicenter, with the director of a hospital in the central city of Wuhan becoming the seventh medical worker to succumb to the COVID-19 illness. But Chinese officials released a study showing most patients have mild cases of the illness, and World Health Organization officials said the mortality rate was relatively low.

The epidemic has triggered panic-buying in Singapore and Hong Kong, concerns about cruise-ship travel and the postponement of trade fairs, sports competitions and cultural events in China and abroad. The outbreak is threatening to put a dent in the global economy, with China paralyzed by vast quarantine measures and major firms such as iPhone maker Apple and mining giant BHP warning it could damage bottom lines.

Several countries have banned travelers from China

and major airlines have suspended flights. Authorities have placed about 56 million people in hard-hit central Hubei and its capital Wuhan under an unprecedented lockdown. Other cities far from the epicenter have restricted the movements of residents, with a 14-day self-quarantine for people returning to Beijing. President Xi Jinping, in a phone call with British Prime Minister Boris Johnson, said China's measures were achieving "visible progress", according to state media.

### 'Less deadly' than SARS

The official death toll in China hit 1,868 yesterday after another 98 people died - most in Hubei and Wuhan, where the virus emerged in December. Liu Zhiming, the director of Wuchang Hospital in Wuhan, became its latest victim, sparking an outpouring of grief online. Earlier this month, the death of Wuhan doctor Li Wenliang - who had been punished by authorities for sounding the alarm about the virus in late December triggered anger and calls for political reforms on social media. Official figures, meanwhile, showed there were nearly 1,900 new COVID-19 cases. New infections have been falling in the rest of the country for the past two weeks.

WHO chief Tedros Adhanom Ghebrevesus cautioned that it was too early to tell if the decline would continue. A study among 72,000 confirmed, suspected and clinically diagnosed cases showed that 81 percent of patients had only mild infections. Those most at risk were the elderly, and people with underlying medical conditions. The study released by China's Centre for Disease Control and Prevention also showed the death rate stood at 2.3 percent, falling below one percent for people in their 30s and 40s.

Zhong Nanshan, a prominent expert with China's National Health Commission, told reporters that 85 percent of patients can improve "if they have good life support, treatment conditions, and nutrients". The research was cited by WHO officials, who said the COVID-19 illness was "less deadly" than its cousins, such as Severe Acute Respiratory Syndrome (SARS) or Middle East Respiratory Syndrome (MERS).

But it is higher than the mortality rate for the seasonal flu, at around 0.1 percent in the United States. Michael Ryan, head of WHO's health emergencies program, said the outbreak was "very serious" and could grow, but stressed that outside Hubei the epidemic was "affecting a very, very tiny, tiny proportion of people". may not help," the WHO's Tedros said. —AFP

There have been some 900 cases around the world, with five deaths in France, Japan, the Philippines, Taiwan and Hong Kong.

#### **Cruise concerns**

Another 88 people tested positive for the virus on the quarantined Diamond Prince cruise ship off Yokohama in Japan, raising the number of infections to 542. The US repatriated more than 300 American passengers on Monday and Britain became the latest country to offer its citizens a way off the boat after similar plans by Canada, Australia, Hong Kong and South Korea. Attention was also turning to the Westerdam, a cruise ship in Cambodia, where many of the 2,200 people aboard passengers were allowed to disembark after all initially received a clean bill of health.

An 83-year-old American woman was later diagnosed with the virus in Malaysia, raising concerns that other passengers might have been infected before flying to other countries. The WHO rejected the suggestion that all cruises should be halted after hundreds of passengers were infected on one vessel off Japan. "Measures should be taken proportional to the situation. # **Chinatowns feel** the brunt of virus panic

MELBOURNE: Normally bustling century-old Chinatowns from Melbourne to San Francisco have fallen quiet and businesses are struggling to survive as fears over the deadly novel coronavirus outbreak ripple around the world. "Scaremongering is rampant" complains Max Huang, owner of the Juicy Bao restaurant in Melbourne's historic Chinese district. "Customers won't come in if they can avoid it." Huang's eatery sits among dozens of restaurants making up Australia's oldest Chinatown enclave, dating back to the influx of fortune-seekers during an 1850s gold rush.

Although the epicenter of the COVID-19 epidemic is more than a ten-hour-flight way, and Australia has seen just a handful of cases, the stigma of a disease that has claimed more than 1,800 lives is pervasive. Streets are notably quieter, facemasks are a commonplace and even a Lunar New Year dragon dance failed to bring in the usual crowds. Businesses report their earnings have dropped by more than half and they have been forced to cut staff hours dramatically, a situation echoed in Chinatowns across the world.

At the usually buzzing Empire Seafood Restaurant in Vancouver's Richmond suburb, getting a table is now a breeze. "Usually we'd have a large line-up time of approximately five-ten tables, but today there is no line up at all," assistant gen-

eral manager Ivan Yeung said. "Some people have already cancelled their parties and banquets. Many restaurants are seeing the same thing. Hopefully, this gets back to normal really soon."

### **Disappearing tourists**

A ban on travelers from China has hit many neighborhoods particularly hard. "Usually we have Chinese tourists coming at this time, but now it's like zero," said Tony Siu, manager of the popular Cantonese restaurant R&G Lounge in San Francisco. "They often get the sea bass or the salt and pepper crab, that are our famous dishes."

In Australia, the travel ban has been compounded by almost 100,000 Chinese students being unable to fly Down Under to start the academic year. "Our main customers are from China... (so) it's very difficult," said Su Yin, whose pancake store sits downstairs from a Melbourne college with a large Chinese student base.

Hoping to reassure would-be customers, some businesses have tacked up notices saying they disinfect their interiors regularly to prevent disease. Others have gone a step further installing hand sanitizer for guests and giving staff face masks and rubber gloves. But such measures appear to have had limited success. Rebecca Lyu, a Chinese student living in London, has a hard time convincing friends to join her to eat or shop.

"Some of my friends refused to go eat at restaurants in Chinatown because they are worried about the virus," she said. Many believe xenophobia has worsened the situation further. Fred Lo's souvenir store in San Francisco is usually frequented by tourists from Europe and South America. — AFP

# **Bare-faced robbery:** Thieves steal 6,000 hygiene masks

TOKYO: Thieves in Japan have made off with some 6,000 surgical masks from a hospital, with the country facing a mass shortage and a huge price hike online due to the coronavirus. Four boxes containing the face masks disappeared from a locked storage facility at the Japanese Red Cross hospital in the western port city of Kobe, a hospital official said yesterday. "We still have a large number of masks - enough to continue our daily operations at the hospital, but this is so deplorable," the official said. Police have launched an investigation as they suspect the thieves intend to resell the masks.

Masks have sold out at many drug and discount stores across the nation as the number of infections have increased in Japan one of the most affected countries after China where the death toll from the virus has hit 1,800. Public anxiety has been also fuelled by headlines of hundreds of people infected with the virus on board a ship quarantined off Japan. The theft came after knifewielding men jumped a delivery driver and stole hundreds of toilet rolls on Monday in Hong Kong, where the coronavirus outbreak has fuelled a run on face masks, hand sanitiser and toilet paper.

Japanese flea market app Mercari called on its users to trade masks "within socially accepted limits" after a box of 65 masks was priced at more than 50,000 yen (\$456) at its online marketplace. The Japanese government has "strongly requested" mask makers to boost output, Chief Cabinet Secretary Yoshihide Suga told reporters last week. There has been a shortage of masks at drug stores in the hygiene-conscious nation where face masks have been part of everyday streetwear for decades. - AFP

# **Boy Scouts files bankruptcy in** wake of sexual abuse lawsuits

# Boy Scouts of America accused of covering up generations of abuse

WASHINGTON: The Boy Scouts of America filed for listing scoutmasters or troop leaders accused of sexual bankruptcy yesterday in what it said was an effort to safeguard compensation payouts for sexual abuse victims. The organization has been accused of covering up generations of abuse inflicted on thousands of its young members and failing to do enough to root out pedophiles using the youth movement to prey on minors over its 110-year history.

Bankruptcy proceedings will help the Boy Scouts to "equitably compensate" victims through the establishment of a victims' compensation trust and allow the organization to continue at a local level, a statement from the group said. "The BSA cares deeply about all victims of abuse and sincerely apologizes to anyone who was harmed during their time in Scouting," chief executive Roger Mosby said in the statement.

The organization estimates liabilities of up to \$1 billion, according to court filings lodged yesterday. The national Boy Scouts council and its affiliated local councils together hold nearly \$5 billion in assets including landholdings, according to a Wall Street Journal report last month. Local councils hold around two-thirds of the organization's assets, which the Journal said could be shielded from creditors under the bankruptcy plan, limiting the group's overall exposure to sexual abuse lawsuits.

More than 12,000 members of the Boy Scouts had been sexually abused in the organization since 1944, victims' lawyer Jeff Anderson said last year. He also said files maintained by the Boy Scouts listed more than 7,800 alleged perpetrators of sexual abuse. The existence of that documentation-known as the "perversion files" and

### Gunman kills ex-wife

BANGKOK: A man killed his ex-wife and wounded another person at a shopping centre in Bangkok yesterday, police said, 10 days after a mass shooting at another mall in Thailand's northeast. The gunman then fled the Century The Movie Plaza, near the Thai capital's Victory Monument and is still on the run, Thai police said. "One person died and another was injured," police Colonel Kissana Pattanacharoen said. Police said in a statement they knew the suspect's identity and were working to apprehend him. The gunman entered a beauty clinic at the mall where his ex-wife worked and opened fire, killing her and wounding a bystander, Kissana said. The nine-storey mall, best known for its top-floor cinema, was continuing to operate and only the area where the shooting took place was cordoned off. The plaza is connected to the Victory Monument skytrain station, a transit hub that was crowded with commuters in the late abuse-was first revealed in a 2012 court case.

At the time the organization admitted its response to the scandal had been "plainly insufficient, inappropriate or wrong", and said it had overhauled its procedures to protect members. "The BSA today has some of the strongest, expert-informed youth protection policies found in any youth-serving organization, including mandatory youth protection training and background checks for all volunteers and staff," the organization said yesterday.

### Growing number of lawsuits

Founded in 1910, the Boy Scouts of America currently has around 2.2 million members between the ages of five and 21. Lawsuits against the group have multiplied in recent years, thanks in part to state legislative changes that have increased the statute of limitations for cases of sexual abuse against minors. The bankruptcy plan was first mooted in 2018, the Journal reported, as the organization struggled with declining members and rising costs.

Abused in Scouting, a network of law firms representing victims, said the bankruptcy proceedings could spell the end of the Boy Scouts. "It's going to be a mess. If it takes a long period of time, it's an open question whether the Boy Scouts will have any resources to keep operating while the bankruptcy is pending," attorney Tim Kosnoff said in a statement for the lawyers' network earlier in February. The Boy Scouts had attempted to stay solvent by raising membership fees and mortgaging properties, Abused in Scouting said. —AFP



### **Turkey arrests nearly 700**

ISTANBUL: Turkish prosecutors yesterday ordered the arrest of nearly 700 people, including military and justice ministry personnel, state media said, intensifying moves against a network accused of orchestrating a 2016 coup attempt. Authorities have carried out a sustained crackdown on alleged followers of US-based Muslim cleric Fethullah Gulen since the failed bid in July 2016, in which about 250 people were killed. Police still routinely carry out raids targeting suspects. The latest operations marked an escalation by police against alleged supporters of Gulen, a one-time ally of President Tayyip Erdogan who subsequently became his arch foe. Gulen, who has lived in self-imposed exile in Pennsylvania since 1999, has denied any involvement in the attempted coup. In the latest moves, prosecutors ordered the arrest of 157 people, including 101 serving officers, in an investigation of the Turkish Armed Forces, state-owned Anadolu news agency said. -Reuters

### **Refugees seek political voice**

SEOUL: A group of North Korean refugees launched a political party in South Korea yesterday, aiming to give a voice to the 33,500 defectors living in the South and oppose conciliation with Pyongyang. "We were always considered minorities and aliens," said Kim Joo-il, secretary-general of the new South-North Unification Party at its launch at a hall in South Korea's capital Seoul. "North Korean defectors are now the future of unification." The decision to set up a formal political party was a sign that defectors are seeking a more direct political role ahead of a parliamentary election in April. Many are strongly critical of President Moon Jae-in's administration, which they accuse of sidelining defectors and ignoring human rights in a bid to repair relations with North Korea. Attendees at the launch event discussed cases that have become rallying cries for defectors, who say the South Korean government provides them too little support. ---Reuters

### **Doctors rally around Assange**

LONDON: More than 100 doctors on Monday called on Britain to end Julian Assange's "torture" in prison pending his extradition on espionage charges to the United States. The 48-year-old Australian is facing 18 counts in the United States - 17 of them under the Espionage Act - that could see him jailed for 175 years. Washington's extradition request will start being heard next Monday at Woolwich Crown Court. Assange is being held at the neighboring high-security Belmarsh Prison. A group of 117 physicians and psychologists from 18 nations wrote in a letter to The Lancet medical journal that Assange was being subjected to "torture" in prison. "We condemn the torture of Assange. We condemn the denial of his fundamental right to appropriate healthcare," they wrote in the scientific magazine. —AFP

# How cat videos could cause a 'climate change nightmare'

**TBILISI:** A stone's throw from a power station on the barren outskirts of Tbilisi, Georgia's capital, a grey warehouse surrounded by metal containers hums to the sound of money. Inside, hundreds of computer servers work continuously to solve complicated mathematical equations generating the digital currency Bitcoin - burning enough electricity to power tens of thousands of homes in the process. "Any high-performance computing ... is energy intensive," explained Joe Capes of global blockchain company The Bitfury Group, which operates the facility in Tbilisi.

Cryptocurrencies are one of several new technologies, like artificial intelligence and 5G networks, that climate experts worry could derail efforts to tackle global warming by consuming ever-growing amounts of power. Data centers processing and storing data from online activities, such as sending emails and streaming videos, already account for about 1% of global electricity use, according to the International Energy Agency (IEA). That's about the same amount of electricity that Australia consumes in a year.

But as societies become more digitalized, computing is expected to account for up to 8% of the world's total power demand by 2030, according to some estimates, raising fears this could lead to the burning of more fossil fuels. "If we don't take into account the carbon footprint, we are going to have a climate change nightmare coming from information technology," said Babak Falsafi, a professor of computer and communication science at the Federal Polytechnic School of Lausanne.

### Efficient data

One solution is to improve the efficiency of data centers, which is something operators are naturally prone to do since electricity accounts for a large share of their running costs, according to data experts. "As a rule of thumb, a megawatt

# Smog, stoves choke Central Asian cities

BISHKEK, Kyrgyzstan: Snow-capped peaks used to be clearly visible from the streets of Almaty and Bishkek, two of the largest cities in Central Asia that both lie in plains surrounded by mountains. But now a heavy cloud of dark smog often blots out the view as air pollution regularly soars to levels comparable to those in New Delhi and Lahore, even though Almaty and Bishkek have fewer people and industries than their Indian and Pakistani counterparts.

In the Kyrgyz capital of Bishkek, a city of one million, and Kazakhstan's second city of Almaty, which is twice as large, the onset of winter prompts a surge in pollution as people burn coal and other dirty fuels in stoves to heat their homes. One of those monitoring the situation is Kyrgyz environmental activist Kunduz Adylbekova, who experiences the problem firsthand. In the area of small private houses where she lives on the outskirts of Bishkek, the air quality is particularly bad. "The air here has a kind of heavy feel," said Adylbekova, a program manager at Archa Initiative non-profit

Many locals use highly polluting stoves to heat their homes and boil water because they are not hooked up to mains gas. Large numbers of ageing cars and trucks exacerbate the situation. In this district, readings of PM 2.5 a measure of fine particles in the air - regularly reach levels that the United States Environmental Protection Agency defines as hazardous to human health. Sometimes readings are four times higher than the EPA minimum "hazardous" level, Adylbekova said, with locals suffering the ill-effects. "Residents are often ill, some suffer from lung problems."

### 'We feel and see it'

The bowl-shaped topography of both cities helps trap pollution. Even worse, both have coal-fired power stations that date back to the Soviet era. But other factors have led to a massive increase in the smog problem over the last two decades. In Almaty, where gleaming skyscrapers reflect the country's oil wealth, many cite the huge growth in the number of cars since the breakup of the USSR. Zhalgas Jakiyanov, a marketing specialist who works in the business district, said the growing pollution is "already having an effect on our health."

'We don't just feel it - we can see it," he added, pointing to the leaden smog cloud that hangs over the city. "We need to switch to gas heating instead of using solid fuels. There needs to be more emphasis on spaces for pedestrians," Jakiyanov said. Smog also afflicts the capitals of former Soviet republics to the south, Uzbekistan and Tajikistan.

### Declare an emergency!

While environmental groups have long sounded the alarm, now that people can easily access real-time air quality measurements online, pollution has become a talking point, costs a million dollars per year ... This obviously catches management's attention," said Dale Sartor, who oversees the US Department of Energy's Center of Expertise for Data Centers in Berkeley, California.

Energy demand from data centers in the United States has remained largely flat over the past decade as improvements in computing have allowed processors to do more with the same amount of power, he told said. But that is set to change, predict tech analysts. The 50-yearold trend known as Moore's Law, which has seen computer chips double in capacity every two years, is expected to slow down as it becomes harder to add any more transistors to a chip.

Some companies have been looking at other ways to make savings. In Georgia, where most electricity is generated by hydropower, Bitfury deployed a system to reduce the energy needed to cool down its heating servers. Cooling can account for up to half of a data centre's total energy use, the company says. While some of its processors are still cooled with outside air, others are immersed inside metal tanks filled with a special liquid with a low boiling point. -Reuters

particularly on social media. Governments have been slower to acknowledge the problem, however. This month, an online petition demanding that Almaty's authorities declare the poor air quality as an emergency gained 17,000 signatures on the first day.

The city administration responded by saying that it is looking into ways to modernize the main coal-burning power station to make it less polluting. However it said no decision on the upgrade will be made until the end of the year and ignored calls for an independent assessment of the plant. Power stations account for just over a quarter of total emissions, the city administration said, while exhaust fumes from vehicles make up some 50 percent.

In Kyrgyzstan, authorities rely on Russian energy giant Gazprom to expand its gas pipeline network into new areas of the capital in order to wean house-owners off domestic stoves. But activist Adylbekova said her family had to pay around \$500 to hook up to the network last November. That is too much for many residents, she said. So they continue to burn coal to heat their home and the sour smell of coal smoke lingers in the nostrils. —AFP

# 'From bad to worse' - dashed hopes may deter many Iranians from polls

# Tired of crises, Iranians reluctant to vote

and an airline tragedy have battered Iranians' confidence in their leaders, posing a potential problem for the authorities in a parliamentary election this week. As the Feb 21 vote nears, Iranians are in a gloomy mood, exhausted by a succession of crises that have helped to shred the hopes for a better life they harbored only four years ago.

That does not bode well for leaders seeking a big turnout at the ballot box: In their view, crowded polling stations would signal to arch-foe Washington that Iran is unbowed by sanctions and the killing of a prominent general in a US strike. Allies of Supreme Leader Ayatollah Ali Khamenei have ensured hardliners dominate the field meaning that, whatever the turnout, security hawks seeking a more confrontational approach with Washington may tighten their control of the legislature.

But a meagre showing would still rattle Iran's leaders and embolden critics both in the country and outside who argue the Islamic Republic needs to change domestic and foreign policy. "I'm a person who has voted before. My hope was that things would get a little better when I voted in the past. Now, all the red lines have been crossed," said a doctor in Tehran whose clinic is struggling to source specialized medicine.

"This time, I have no hope and I will definitely not vote," she said by phone, asking not to be identified discussing political matters. Four years ago, things looked very different. Rouhani and his allies won big gains in parliamentary elections, and many hoped a nuclear deal agreed with world powers in 2015 would pull Iran out of political isolation and boost the economy.

### 'We haven't seen any progress'

Those aspirations crumbled after President Donald Trump quit the pact in 2018 and reimposed sanctions in an effort to put stricter limits on Iran's nuclear work, curb its ballistic missile program and end its involvement in regional proxy wars. "The main root of everything is the economy," Ali, a mobile phone shop employee in the central city of Isfahan, said by telephone, asking not to reveal his surname. "If an individual doesn't have the money to take

### 'Tiger widows' shunned as bad luck in rural Bangladesh

**DUBAI:** Confrontation with America, economic hardship home bread to his wife and family then he'll stop praying and even lose his beliefs," said Ali, who works more hours since his boss kept the store open in traditional afternoon resting periods in the hope customers could wander in. Ali does not plan to vote next week. "I voted for several years and it didn't make any difference. We haven't seen any progress to say we want this or that candidate to come forward," he said. The authorities have been under pressure since last year when protests over a fuel price hike were met with the bloodiest crackdown since the 1979 Islamic revolution, killing hundreds.

A US drone strike that felled top commander Qassem Soleimani in January in Iraq rallied Iranians around a common cause. But the show of support was quickly replaced by angry protests over efforts to cover up the accidental shooting down of a Ukrainian airliner that killed all 176 aboard. The elite Revolutionary Guards apologized for the calamity, but that did not appease thousands protesting in several cities. "This year, things are going from bad to worse," said a Tehran resident and homemaker, who does not plan to vote and also asked not to be named.

"After the plane crash, the government has lost a lot of their supporters," said the resident, who added that the establishment needed the election to show the world "how many supporters they have" after the string of crises. Even before the latest troubles, sanctions that cut Iran's crude oil exports by more than 80 percent were placing a painful squeeze on living standards. The rial has slumped, trading on the free market at about 140,000 against the dollar against its official rate of 42,000, according to foreign exchange website Bonbast.com

### Voting for 'hard revenge'

The currency plunge has disrupted Iran's foreign trade and boosted inflation, which the IMF expects at 31% this year. In the eastern city of Birjand, Hamed said he has no time for elections as he frets about his business filming and photographing weddings, with only one in 10 customers asking for albums after the cost of photo paper rose sixfold since 2018.

"We're focused on prices and having to call customers

and asking them to pay," Hamed told Reuters by phone, also declining to give his surname due to sensitivities. "We have nothing to do with politicians and politics." Analysts expect a lower turnout than the 62% in the 2016 parliamentary elections, with smaller, more conservative cities where families pressure kin to vote seeing a larger showing.

But Khamenei, Iran's highest authority, has tried to drum up nationalistic sentiment to secure a strong turnout. "It's possible that someone doesn't like me but if they like Iran they must come to the ballot box," he said in a speech. Supporters echoed the call on social media. "A better election can also be another #hard\_revenge," a Twitter user named Teiaaraa posted two weeks ago, referring to a phrase used by state media for the Iranian strikes on Iraq bases that left over 100 U.S. soldiers with traumatic brain injuries. — Reuters

KABUL: Ashraf Ghani has secured a second term as president of Afghanistan, according to final results of the September 28, 2019 poll released yesterday by the country's election commission. "The election commission... declares Mr Ashraf Ghani, who has won 50.64 percent of the votes, as the president of Afghanistan,'



ey-hunters' village of Gabura at the edge of the Sundarbans-a 10,000-square-kilometre mangrove forest that straddles Bangladesh and India.

Her husband died while out collecting honey in the jungles there. "Honey-hunters prefer to collect honey mostly in the southwestern Sundarbans, where most of the maneaters (tigers) live," leading Bengal tiger expert at Jahangirnagar University, Monirul Khan, told AFP. Tigers are an endangered species but climate change and human development is reducing their wild habitat, often forcing them towards villages in search of food. Wildlife charities estimate there are some 100 tigers in the Bangladesh side of the Sundarbans.

At least 519 men died from tiger attacks in 50 villages in one district-home to half a million people-between 2001 and 2011, according to Ledars Bangladesh, a charity helping widows reintegrate back in the villages. Their deaths are a double blow for the women left behind. Already grieving the loss of their partner, overnight they become 'tiger widows'-pariahs in their homes and villages at a time when they most need support. They are often left with little means to support themselves or their families.

#### 'Bring bad luck'

Rashida is heartbroken but unsurprised that her adult sons, aged 24 and 27, abandoned her and their two young siblings. "They are part of this society after all," the 45year-old said, as she wiped tears from her eyes. Her tiny shack has no roof-it was blown off by a deadly cyclonebut there have been no offers of help from neighbors or officials, who she claims helped others in the village but shunned her.

Instead she uses an old tarpaulin to keep the elements out. Next door, Mohammad Hossain was fixing his broken tin roof, and confessed he had been instructed by his wife

not to talk to Rashida. "It would mar my family's wellbeing and could bring bad luck," the 31-year-old honeyhunter said. Officials denied omitting Rashida from the help they provided after the cyclone. But the head of Ledars Bangladesh, Mohon Kumar Mondal, said the mistreatment of "tiger widows" was widespread in highly conservative communities, which often held "centuries old" prejudices. "They (charities) are working to restore the widows' dignities. The main challenge is to change people's beliefs," he explained. "The change is very slow. Still, I'd say there has been progress," he added, noting that younger, more educated villagers were less fearful of the widows.

#### 'Staying alive'

Rijia Khatun, who said she has learnt to cope with being ostracized by her fellow villagers after her honeyhunter husband's death 15 years ago, has been secretly supported by her nephew and his family. "My sons were young. But nobody helped me. I felt bad at first as they

kept blaming me for my husband's death. I didn't know what was my fault," she recalled, adding: "But now I've learnt to live with this adversity." Her nephew Yaad Ali, who has witnessed several attacks including his uncle's, explained that while he wanted to help, he could not do so publicly. "We had to do it (help Khatun) with confidentiality or else the village society would have ostracized us as well," he confessed. Honey hunting has traditionally been seen as a more accessible vocation for villagers who can't afford the equipment or boats needed to undertake the region's other main profession-fishing.

But fears of being killed by the predators-and the consequences for the wives they leave behind-has meant more and more men are opting for a different trade. Harun ur Rashid, whose father was killed by a tiger, said he was now a fisherman, despite coming from generations of honeyhunters. The 21-year-old said: "My mother doesn't want me to end up like my father. And I want to stay alive and take care of her because she has suffered a lot and endured enough abuses after my father's death." — AFP

Abdullah lost to Ghani in 2014 in a divisive election that saw the US intervene to broker an awkward power-sharing deal between the two rivals. Nearly one million of the initial 2.7 million votes were purged owing to irregularities, meaning the election saw by far the lowest turnout of any Afghan poll. Ultimately, only 1.8 million votes were counted - a tiny number given Afghanistan's estimated population of 35 million and 9.6 million registered voters. — AFP

### India's Trump superfans gear up for his arrival

KONNEY: Bussa Krishna first began worshipping Donald Trump four years ago when the US president appeared to him in a dream. Since then, after a run of good fortune, the Indian real estate broker has transformed his modest home into a shrine to the US leader, who is due in India on Monday for a two-day visit. "My love for him has transformed into reverence. That has given me immense happiness. Hence instead of praying to other gods, I started praying to him," Krishna told Reuters.

Krishna, who lives alone in a village in the southern state of Telangana, has erected a life-size statue to Trump in his yard, while his walls are scrawled with the leader's name - to the annoyance of his extended family. "I am facing difficulties because of my relatives," Krishna said. "They tell me that I am disgracing them in society. I told them that just like you believe and worship Shiva, I believe and worship Trump. Neither of us can stop the other from doing so." Krishna is not the only Indian who reveres Trump. In New Delhi, members of the Hindu Sena, a right-wing fringe group, have begun rehearsing a welcome song in his honor.

Its members say Trump shares their hatred of Islamic extremism, and it has drawn attention for boisterous celebrations of his birthday, including pretending to feed cake to photos of his face. "We like Donald Trump because he openly spoke about India's feelings," Hindu Sena leader Vishnu Gupta told Reuters. "...He openly said that he would eliminate Islamic terrorism from its roots, that is why I am his fan."

Trump, who like Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi has a reputation as an unabashed populist who shows his enemies no mercy, is making his first visit to India. Trump's itinerary starts on Feb. 24 in the western city of Ahmedabad, where he will visit the former home of independence hero Mahatma and address an estimated 125,000 people at a rally. He is due in the capital the following day. — Reuters

### **Bushfire crisis hit 75%** of Australians: Survey

SYDNEY: Three in four Australians - almost 18 million people - were affected by the country's deadly bushfire crisis, according to a survey released yesterday that also pointed to plummeting support for the government and for coal projects. The Australian National University study showed the vast human scale of the five-month crisis, which killed more than 30 people and destroyed thousands of homes

"Nearly every Australian has been touched by these fires and many of us will be living with the effects for years and years to come," said lead social researcher Nicholas Biddle said. The poll of 3,000 people indicated that 14 percent of the adult population was directly affected with their homes lost or damaged, or families forced to evacuate. Those nearly three million people were eclipsed by a further 15 million Australians who had indirect exposure, including being affected by bushfire smoke or having holiday plans hit.

The scale of the impact shocked researchers and will be cause for concern in Canberra, where the government has struggled to shake public perception that it botched the crisis response and cares little for addressing climate change. — AFP

## **Machine lubricants** leave bad taste for producers, buyers

The palm oil industry, long-accused of large scale deforestation, is bracing for another hit to its business: Machinery lubricants seeping into the world's most consumed edible oil during processing. European food companies, including Nestle, have in recent months asked top palm oil producers in Indonesia and Malaysia to lower the amount of mineral oil hydrocarbons found in palm oil, industry officials told Reuters.

The solution is to use food-grade lubricants in machines that turn palm fruit into the oil used to make everything from infant formula to chocolate. But such lubricants can cost 8-10 times more than their petroleum-based or synthetic counterparts and could hurt profit margins, the officials say. Reuters is the first to spell out this latest concern, which follows discussions in Europe to regulate the levels of other contaminants found in edible oils such as palm.

"They (European food makers) say hydrocarbons are found in our oils because of the way we process the fruits," said Nageeb Abdul Wahab, chief executive of the growers' group Malaysian Palm Oil Association. "It is easily addressed, but costly. The lubricant we use sometimes comes into contact with our product. To address this issue, we have to use food grade lubricant, but the available options are very, very expensive."

Such contaminants are found across several food products, including vegetable oils, such as sov and sunflower, and can enter food through packaging materials, additives or during storage. Some are carcinogenic, and the European Food Safety Authority flagged them as a potential health concern in 2012. The European Union has already passed a law to phase out palm oil from renewable fuel by 2030,

# Algeria anti-system protests mark first anniversary

n Feb 22, 2019, sudden and unprecedented protests swept Algeria. A year on, despite bringing down a president, the "Hirak" protest movement faces mounting challenges. Massive anti-government protests held every Friday quickly gathered momentum: Six weeks in, president Abdelaziz Bouteflika resigned after 20 years in power. But Algeria's military was quick to reassert control and by the time presidential elections were held in December, a former Bouteflika ally succeeded him in a vote deeply opposed by protesters and shunned by most voters.

"With the presidential election, we passed into act two, with all the specter of improbability, uncertainty and instability" that entails, Karima Direche, an historian of contemporary North Africa, told AFP. "It matches what Algerians have been saying for a year: 'Everything is moving and nothing is changing." While a year of weekly protests has not yet brought down "the system" that they challenged, the Hirak movement has profoundly changed Algeria's political landscape.

### 'Increased awareness'

Bouteflika's resignation and the imprisonment of corrupt businessmen and politicians are "tangible results, even if the main demand of regime change and systemic reform is far from having been achieved", said Dalia Ghanem, a researcher with the Carnegie Middle East Center in Beirut. But Hirak's biggest success, she said, was "the increased awareness of Algerians and their desire to

reconnect with politics... without fear of another civil war".

A brutal war between the Algerian army and Islamist rebels killed some 200,000 people in the 1990s. The trauma of the conflict was exploited under Bouteflika to discourage dissent, and until Feb 22 had rendered large protests on the streets unimaginable. Ahead of the first protests, Algeria's political system had remained focused on presidential polls that were widely expected to return Bouteflika to power -despite the 82-year-old being largely incapacitated since a stroke in 2013.

Cut off from the public, the regime sensed growing anger but underestimated it. Young Algerians -disproportionately affected by massive unemployment in a country where the majority is under 30 - were fed up with being represented by a wheelchair-bound octogenarian whose rare public appearances elicited mockery online. Simmering anger peaked when, during a meeting of the president's party, a portrait of Bouteflika was addressed by party apparatchiks in the absence of the ailing leader.

Calls to protest on Feb 22 began multiplying across social media. Few expected the movement to take hold though, especially in Algiers, where since 2001 public rallies had been banned. But then on the first Friday, overwhelmed police stood aside as tens of thousands of

said Karima Direche, an historian at the French National Centre for Scientific Research. According to Jean-Pierre Filiu, professor of Middle East studies at Sciences Po University in Paris, the Hirak has for the past year taken centre stage in "both the nation's history and public space". And by keeping the protests peaceful, "the movement has changed the rules of the game in Algerian poli-tics, which was previously marked by violence and a lack of transparency'

The Hirak has also shown the profound transformation of Algerian society: led by an educated and hyperconnected youth, and in particular women, who are now determined to be heard. Algeria's new president, Abdelmadjid Tebboune, aged 74, "will have to deal with that. He won't be able to rule like those before him", said Direche. A year on, the protests are smaller than in spring 2019, but the movement remains strong.

The Hirak wants to influence the changes promised by the new president but is struggling to structure itself and agree on a future strategy. "As the movement celebrates its first anniversary, I want to ask 'What's next?'" said Ghanem. "What do you want? What are you demanding and how will you obtain concrete results?" Several civil society groups born of the Hirak movement are to hold a conference in Algiers on Sunday marking the anniversar in a bid to unify their ranks as a political force. Participants from across Algeria and abroad will examine a "February 22 Proclamation" summing up the demands and slogans of the protest movement, organizers said. - AFP

because of concerns about deforestation concerns.

But there are no European regulations on mineral oil hydrocarbons in food. Some palm oil buyers, however, have established their own limits, industry sources said. Nestle, a big buyer of palm oil, said it was actively monitoring its supply chain. "We are reinforcing our controls by working with suppliers on acceptable levels of Mineral Oil Saturated Hydrocarbons (MOSH) and Mineral Oil Aromatic Hydrocarbons (MOAH) in agricultural raw materials," Nestle told Reuters in an emailed statement, referring to the different types of hydrocarbons.

"Although there are currently no regulatory requirements in place, our objective is to ensure levels of MOSH and MOAH are as low as feasibly possible in the ingredients that we source." An exporter of palm oil to the food industry said only European buyers had asked for a reduction in traces of the contaminant in palm oil. "The industry has started to request suppliers change to food-grade lubricant at all the critical contact points for the FFB (fresh fruit bunch) processing," said an official from the exporting company, declining to be identified as he was not authorized to talk to media. Some Malaysian producers have already started to make the change, he said.

#### Checkmate?

Industry officials say food safety concerns would be a heavy blow for palm producers, as food is the main market for the commodity, accounting for nearly 70 percent of its global use. "Anything related to food can checkmate the industry," the palm association's Nageeb said. Already the industry is trying to adjust refining processes to cut the amount of glycidyl esters (GE) and 3-monochloropropane diol (3-MCPD) contaminants found in refined fats and oils, including palm oil.

The EU in 2017 introduced safety levels for GE and is set to introduce new limits on 3-MCPD soon. These and other recent EU regulations have led to accusations from Indonesia and Malaysia that the bloc is unfairly targeting palm oil to protect its own oilseed industries. Nevertheless, industry regulator the Malaysian Palm Oil Board (MPOB) is considering setting its own mineral oil hydrocarbon limit nationally, and is working with the health ministry and palm firms, sources said.

The health ministry directed questions to the MPOB, which did not immediately respond to a request for comment. Indonesian producer Musim Mas said it has already switched to food-grade lubricants and made other changes in the processing of palm oil to address buyer concerns about the contaminants. "Customers' concerns regarding hydrocarbon-based lubricants contaminating food sources are an increasing requirement for 2020," a spokeswoman said. --- Reuters

### On Greek mainland, locals stonewall migrant relocations

Te will not accept a single illegal colonizer," reads a banner in the small village of Makrygialos. The village is one of many areas in mainland Greece where the government is locked in a tug of war with local communities over the housing of migrants. Just months after the new conservative administration took over promising to get tough on migration, deadlock is rapidly emerging over where to accommodate tens of thousands of asylum-seekers currently languishing in overcrowded, unsanitary camps on five islands facing Turkey.

There are over 38,000 people in the camps on Lesbos, Samos, Chios, Leros and Kos despite an official capacity of 6,200. Island officials and residents have told the government that after five years on the front lines of the European migration crisis, they are no longer prepared to accept thousands of asylum-seekers in their midst. But while the administration of Prime Minister

Kyriakos Mitsotakis tries to alleviate the problem by relocating thousands of migrants to other parts of Greece, many communities on the mainland are also stonewalling the move. "We are determined to defend our homeland. We will do anything to keep them out," says Tasos Yiakoumis, a lawyer taking part in an antimigrant protest in Makrygialos, a coastal village 450 km north of Athens. Some 300 people have gathered to protest against plans to house 200 asylum-seekers in a disused former home for the mentally ill.

### 'This shall not pass'

"We know their plan, they want to Islamicize the entire western world. This shall not pass," Yiakoumis shouts at the crowd through a microphone. Another speaker claims that "refugees steal children" and that 'most people coming to Greece have criminal records and are hunted in their home countries." Other residents in the village of 1,000 say that the crime rate will increase in the village, which mainly lives on tourism. "This is a tourist area. Which tourist would want to vacation next to a (migrant shelter)?," asks local mayor Anastasios Manolas, a former career army officer.

Similar protests have taken place in other parts of northern Greece in recent months, with locals banding together to keep out buses bearing asylum-seekers from the islands. Last week, parents in a kindergarten in the village of Vrasna refused to share the building with a small number of refugee children, who were forced to seek schooling elsewhere.

Meanwhile, critics note that the conservatives only have themselves to blame by repeatedly describing asylum-seekers in negative terms. In November, Prime Minister Kyriakos Mitsotakis said refugees and economic migrants are "besieging" Europe. The new conservative government which came to power in July has announced that the island camps on Lesbos, Samos and Chios are to shut down this year. They are to be replaced with new, smaller facilities that are to be operational by mid-2020.

But the islanders say they will only accept small facilities where asylum-seekers are to be screened, and then either moved to the mainland, or sent back to Turkey outright. The ongoing deadlock, five years after the height of the migration crisis, has caused exasperation among both island residents and asylum-seekers in the camps, where violence is rife. After extended talks with officials on the islands led nowhere, the government last week caused further anger by announcing that land could be requisitioned for a three-year period to build the new facilities. The islanders responded by taking their protest to Athens on Friday. On Monday, Mitarachi said the government would give island officials a week to suggest alternative locations for the new camps. — AFP

### **Turkish mom fights** to free cadet son from life sentence

Tearing a colorful headscarf and long coat to guard against a bitter Ankara frost, Turkish mother Melek Cetinkaya would not usually catch the attention of the police. But when she dons a vest calling for justice for her imprisoned son Furkan Cetinkaya, it is only minutes before two female police officers silently grab her and bundle her into a white van. Since her protests began last September, the 43-year-old mother of three has been detained nearly 30 times.

Cetinkaya is undeterred because she is fighting for her son, an air force cadet who was just 19 years old when he was jailed for participating in the failed coup against President Recep Tayyip Erdogan in July 2016. In 2018, he was sentenced to life in prison. Hundreds of cadets have suffered the same fate, facing decades in prison for their role in something which their families say they had no way of comprehending.

"How can these children have carried out a coup?" Melek Cetinkaya asked at the protest last week, as she urged passersby "to learn about the injustices, illegalities and unfair legal process" her son and others experienced. "Please ensure the cadets' voices are heard," she shouted moments before she was detained. A child nearby asked, "What's going on?" but his father quickly hushed him and walked away. After the coup attempt, tens of thousands of people were arrested and nearly 150,000 public sector workers were sacked or suspended as part of a crackdown on groups linked to the coup and other government opponents. A total of 355 cadets have been given life sentences over alleged involvement in the coup, opposition MP Omer Faruk Gergerlioglu said, even without any "concrete evidence" - and most would have been simply obeying their superiors. "The sentences are completely unjust. They are treated without mercy and being scapegoated," said Gergerlioglu, of the leftist Peoples' Democratic Party.

### 'Seeking justice'

It was two days after the coup when Cetinkaya learned her son had been arrested. Her initial hope that the system would bring justice faded as the trial progressed. "When the appeals court approved (the verdict), I came to believe there was no justice in this country and I started seeking justice on the streets," she told AFP. She insists her son is innocent and that no one in the family had links to USbased Muslim preacher Fethullah Gulen, whom the government accuses of ordering the coup attempt.

Furkan was in a training camp in Yalova, northwestern Turkey, when he and dozens of others were told by their commanders they had to return to Istanbul because a terrorist attack had occurred. They returned in the night to find the city in chaos, with reports of tanks on the streets and soldiers storming public buildings. Unaware of the bigger picture, the cadets say they ended up on the streets

chanting the national anthem, with no idea that they would later be accused of supporting a coup.

Furkan's lawyer says he and his fellow cadets were not involved in any of the clashes between pro-coup soldiers and vigilante civilians that broke out later in the night. The judge nonetheless jailed the teenagers for life for attempting to abolish the constitutional order". Andrew Gardner, of Amnesty International, says the purged judiciary lacks the independence or capacity to assess who is innocent or guilty. Their final hope is the court of cassation, the top appeals court, which has overturned some coup-related convictions. — AFP

# **Commercial Bank of Kuwait announces operating** profit before provisions of KD 108.5m for 2019

**KUWAIT:** Commercial Bank of Kuwait announced an operating profit, before provisions, of KD 108.5 million for the year 2019 (2018: KD 106.0 million). In line with the bank's prudent policy of proactive recognition of problems, the operating profit was mainly allocated to specific provisions against certain loans where the management has some concerns. The specific provision was used to transfer those loans to the memorandum account.

The resultant net profit attributable to the shareholders of the bank is zero for the vear 2019 (2018: KD 63.8 million), as at the end of the year, total provisions held with the bank amounted to KD 127.3 million. The bank will continue to pursue its right to recover loans transferred to the memorandum account by taking appropriate measures required in this regard.

The operating profit before provision was higher by KD 2.4 million (2.3 percent) compared to last year. The bank witnessed healthy growth in the key areas of business and revenue. Total assets increased by 9.0 percent to reach KD 4.9 billion. Operating income grew by 5.1 percent, interest income by 3.6 percent and fee income by 4.2 percent.

Sheikh Ahmad Duaij Al-Sabah, the bank's Chairman, commented that the bank continues to focus on asset quality, digitalization, operational efficiency and customer service. The prudent policy of maintaining a portfolio of quality assets and early recognition of any expected delinquency will continue to protect the interests of all stakeholders. This policy is extremely important to meet the challenges of the volatile economic and geopolitical situation in the region.

Sheikh Ahmad added that the bank's capital adequacy ratio at the end of December 2019 stood at 18.1 percent, leverage ratio at 11.0 percent, net stable funding ratio 113.5 percent and liquidity coverage ratio 171.0 percent comfortably exceeds the regulatory requirement set by the Central Bank of Kuwait. # **Foreign companies** struggle to resume operations in China

BEIJING: Foreign firms are struggling to resume work in virus-hit China as they face disrupted supply chains, rising inventory and quarantine rules meant to contain the deadly epidemic, the EU chamber of commerce said yesterday.

With many pharmaceutical companies globally sourcing from China, pharmacies may also face a shortage of antibiotics and other drugs if the epidemic is not resolved soon, said Joerg Wuttke, president of the European Union Chamber of Commerce in China. Firms in China have seen a slow restart to work after the Spring Festival break in late January, with residents encouraged to stay home to reduce the spread of a virus that has killed nearly 1,900 people.

"The whole process is stuttering to get back as the magnitude of the challenges is just huge," Wuttke added. "How long this is going to last is anybody's guess."

Many cities have imposed travel restrictions too, with about 56 million people in the hard-hit Hubei province virtually sealed off from the rest of the country. Wuhan, a city in Hubei and the epicentre of the outbreak, is a hub for US, European and Japanese carmakers and electronics suppliers. In a more recent move, Beijing now requires people arriving in the capital to go into a 14-day self-quarantine.

This makes it tough for foreign experts to come in if production plants are down, delaying their recovery, said Wuttke. Other problems include the range of permits needed to transport goods, which vary by city, region and district.

This has become a "logistical nightmare" and problems moving goods lead to rising inventory, said Wuttke. Supply chains remain disrupted, with many firms relying on other enterprises for parts, said Paul Sives, who chairs the EU chamber's southwest China chapter.

Not all suppliers have permission to resume production. It does not help that companies require massive amounts of masks-that they cannot easily procure-for employees before they can restart operations, he said. Manpower problems add to this situation, with some workers unable to leave their residential compounds freely.

"Drivers for many companies are still on vacation and some of them, when they come back, have to be subject to 14 days of quarantine," said Wuttke. A survey of 109 manufacturing firms by the American Chamber of Commerce in Shanghai released on Monday found that almost 80 percent of respondents did not have enough staff to run a full production line. Over 40 percent of surveyed firms said a lack of staff was their biggest challenge in the next few weeks, and almost 60 percent expect demand for their goods to be lower in coming months. Over a third of surveyed firms said a clearer explanation of requirements was the most important thing government officials could do to speed up factory opening approvals. On Monday, Apple announced it would miss its March quarter revenue forecast, and that global iPhone supplies would drop due to the virus epidemic in China. — AFP

# **Investors track** ships, chase rumors to get edge on virus risks

NEW YORK: As investors crunch numbers to determine how the coronavirus will hit China's economy, hedge fund manager Nathaniel Polachek has tied much of his outlook to the fate of a ship anchored near Weihai, China. The vessel carries some 750 tons of lead concentrate that Polachek, head of New York-based Commodity Asset Management, purchased in Greece to sell on the Chinese mainland.

The coronavirus outbreak has kept the ship idling off China's coast for weeks, as movement restrictions and factory closures slow swathes of the world's second-largest economy to a crawl. Word that the ship has been allowed to dock in Weihai - an access point to one of China's main industrial hubs and home to several metal refineries and smelters - would be one signal that business activity is finally picking up, Polachek said. Another encouraging sign would be an increase in air pollution levels over key Chinese manufacturing areas, which Polachek monitors daily using the Air **Ouality Index website.** 'The best indicators are ... from the physical world," he said. "I want to see how long it takes for materials to get off the boat, how long it takes for me to get paid for them." Doubts over whether there are more cases in China than are being captured by official figures have fueled a do-it-yourself approach among investors looking to determine the outbreak's trajectory and gauge its economic impact. The tools they use range from artificial intelligence and computer modeling to simple word of mouth. Investors "don't believe the stuff they've been hearing from the Chinese government," said Leland Miller, head of China Beige Book International, which regularly surveys thousands of Chinese firms to gauge business conditions in the country. Chinese officials have defended Beijing's management of the epidemic and rejected the idea that China was not transparent enough in

its initial handling of the outbreak.

The latest data provided by China indicated a decline in new cases but "every scenario is still on the table" in terms of the epidemic's evolution, the World Health Organization said Monday.

The economic toll, meanwhile, has started to pile up, with Apple Inc the latest company to warn of the impact. Many of Miller's clients-which include hedge funds and pension funds with as much as \$100 billion under management-remain uneasy about the potentially disruptive effects of the virus on global growth, even as they continue betting on more upside in an equity rally that's taken markets to record highs.

"Everyone realizes that they are not pricing in much risk," he said. His firm's next survey will contain new questions about the effects of the lockdown, such as whether the respondent has returned to work or working from home. Others are relving on their contacts inside the country. Kevin Smith, founder of Denverbased Crescat Capital and a longtime skeptic on China's economy, increased his bets agains the country's stocks after receiving an email from one of the firm's Chinese clients describing "paralyzing and tragic scenes" in Hubei, the outbreak's epicenter.

"It's not really possible for us to be any more bearish on China," said Smith, who has been betting against China's currency since 2014. "But we are more convinced that this is a catalyst for a downturn."

Some methods verge on the macabre. John Lekas, CEO and senior portfolio manager at Leader Capital in Portland, Oregon, has been seeking any sort of on-the-ground information, including crematorium activity in hard hit areas, to assess the death toll. So far, any information he's received on the subject has been unverifiable. Lekas' more mundane methods include studying data from the Johns Hopkins Center for Health Security to determine when the rate of new cases will equal the rate of recoveries, a point he believes would indicate a peak in the outbreak. Using his own calculations based on the daily figures, he predicts such a point will come in early March.

His \$450 million fund has been buying Treasuries, a popular destination for nervous investors. "We are fixed income (investors) and nervous by nature," Lekas said. "The uncertainty makes us nervous." - Reuters

TOKYO: Shareholders livid about the performance of struggling Japanese car giant Nissan yesterday blasted bosses over dividends, executive pay, the stock price, and even the type of vehicle they use.

Shareholders voted to approve new chief executive Makoto Uchida in his post but he received a barrage of furious questions at an extraordinary shareholders' meeting after the most recent results showed a more than 87percent plunge in net profit for the nine months to December. "I've been a Nissan shareholder for close to 20 years. You need to review what you're doing. I have 3,000 Nissan shares. Uchidasan, you have 2,000 shares. I have more than you!" shouted one stockholder. "I bought it at 800 yen per share. I never thought it would fall below 700 yen. It's less than 500 yen per share now. What do you think about this? Is it better to sell them on the market? What shall I do with my Nissan shares?' The firm failed to issue a dividend to shareholders after posting a net loss of 26.1 billion yen for the three months to December, its first third-quarter loss in more than a decade. It is still battling to restore its reputation after the stunning arrest and later escape of former boss Carlos Ghosn on financial misconduct charges that he denies. Uchida sought to placate the shareholders, pointing to a strategic review expected in

## In change of tack, Eurozone, Germany back fiscal boost

**BRUSSELS:** The eurozone should be ready to spend more if a downturn hits its economy, Germany's finance minister and his counterparts in the bloc said yesterday, in a first cautious hint at stepping up public investment.

The 19-country eurozone has for years stuck to a "broadly neutral" fiscal policy in its annual recommendations, despite repeated calls from the European Central Bank and slow-growth states for it to invest more. But last year's slowdown and risks of a new downturn, heightened now by the coronavirus outbreak, pushed Germany to drop its traditional veto to fiscal boosts.

The change in the wording of a joint euro zone statement does not force Germany to actually spend more, but signals a change of attitude which could even lead to an overhaul of EU fiscal rules to make them less strict. The move was deemed as a breakthrough by France's Finance Minister Bruno Le Maire, who said the 19 countries of the currency area had given their nod to more fiscal stimulus.

"We made major progress. For the first time in years the 19 countries of the eurozone say that we should use the fiscal stimulus," Le Maire told reporters on the sidelines of a meeting of EU finance ministers. "The mone-

tary stimulus is not sufficient. The fiscal stimulus should take over if a slowdown is too pronounced," Le Maire said, summarizing the content of the joint eurozone statement.

### EU rules

The document signals a departure from past recommendations and gives more prominence to growth. EU Commission's vice-president Valdis Dombrovskis said the change of tack was due to last year's slowdown and a weak outlook for 2020 and beyond. But the statement remains very cautious and underlines that only countries with adequate savings should invest more, ruling out more spending in states with unbalanced budgets.

"If downside risks were to materialize, fiscal responses should be differentiated, aiming for a more supportive stance at the aggregate level, while ensuring full respect of the Stability and Growth Pact," the statement said, referring to the compact that underpins EU fiscal rules. Germany's Finance Minister Olaf Scholz agreed to the joint text in a move that could pave the way for Berlin to spend more next year. Scholz has already said in the past that he was ready to spend more public funds to counter downturns. But despite a sharp slowdown in the German economy last year he maintained large, but declining, budget surpluses in the first nine months of the year, Eurostat data released in January show. - Reuters

# China races to stop job losses as coronavirus hits economy

BEIJING: When cameraman Mark Xia returned to his job this month after holidays, the Shanghai video production house where he worked told him to take three months of leave with no pay, as a coronavirus epidemic takes a toll of China's businesses.

Now Xia is looking for a part-time job after the company, with a workforce of about 100, rejected his request to pay at least half his monthly salary during the suspension, and left him no choice but to resign. "I understand the company's cash-flow is tight," Xia, 25, told Reuters. "We postponed some shooting due to the coronavirus outbreak, and that's had a huge impact on our revenues, that's the reality."

Xia is one of many losing their jobs in the epidemic, which has killed nearly 1,870 and infected more than 72,000, sparking strict travel and movement curbs that have kept many businesses shut, disrupting demand and supply for goods and services.

Many small firms like Xia's former employer face cash crunches because of a lack of orders, forcing them to lay off workers or dock salaries to keep afloat. But the outbreak has yet to show signs of peaking. Any rapid rise in unemployment could pose a big challenge to China's stability-obsessed leaders, with growth in the world's second-largest economy already slumping to near three-decade lows.

Just 34 percent of nearly 1,000 small and medium-sized firms said they could survive for a month on current cashflow, a recent survey by Tsinghua University and Peking University showed. A third said they could last for two months, while 18 percent said they could stick it out for three months.

"There could be big layoffs," said Wang Jun, Beijing-based chief economist at Zhongyuan Bank.

"I think it's more appropriate to compare the current impact to the global crisis, instead of that of SARS," he added, referring to the outbreak of Severe Acute Respiratory Syndrome (SARS) in 2002 and 2003. — Reuters

### **Shades of Detroit?** Germany's auto heartlands in peril

BAMBERG, Germany: When Kristin and Thomas Schmitt took out a mortgage and bought a house last summer, the German couple's dream looked as if it was coming true. Two months later, they learned that the tire factory where both work would be shut down early next year.

A malaise in Germany's mighty automobile industry, caused by weaker demand from abroad, stricter emission rules and electrification, is starting to leave a wider mark on Europe's largest economy by pushing up unemployment, eroding job security and hitting pay. "It's a nightmare. This is pulling the rug out from under our feet," said Kristin Schmitt, 40, of the plant closure in the Bavarian region of Bamberg, one of Germany's auto supplier hubs.

The couple, who have three children, still hopes managers at their Michelin tire factory change their mind, but the risk of unemployment looms large - and not only for the Schmitts.

The German auto sector is expected to cut nearly a tenth of its 830,000 jobs in the next decade, according to the VDA industry association. Some think-tanks and government officials fear that the toll will be higher as electric cars provide less assembly work than combustion engine vehicles, simple work steps are replaced by automation and companies relocate production.

This is not yet 1970s Detroit, a US car centre that was plagued by urban decay as factory relocations, cheaper imports and higher fuel prices destroyed jobs. But the danger is growing, automotive companies, workers, as well as regional and labour leaders, told Reuters.

Different firms are taking different steps. At the Schmitts' plant in Hallstadt, workers are trying to avoid forced layoffs; at a Bosch factory in nearby Bamberg, pay cuts and reduced hours have been agreed, as has investment in new fuel cell technology.

With pockets of rising joblessness in the affluent, autoproducing heartlands of Bavaria and Baden-Wuerttemberg in southern Germany, there are serious implications for a country which relies on the car industry for roughly 5 percent of its economic output and, and an important part of its national identity. "Germany is entering uncharted waters. The transition could well mark the end of the golden age for cars as a mass employer," said Stefan Bratzel, head of the Center of Automotive

Management, a German research institute. "For politics, it's a ticking time bomb." The outbreak of the coronavirus is adding to the crisis by disrupting global supply chains and dampening passenger car sales in China, an important market for German manufacturers. Threats of mass lay-offs will be a defining feature of upcoming wage negotiations in the metalworking industry where unions are focusing more on job security than pay hikes.

"It could well be that we have passed the peak of automotive production," Volkmar Denner, CEO of Germany's largest car supplier Robert Bosch, said in January when he announced massive job cuts and a business review to cope with plunging profits.

### Post-war 'miracle'

The Schmitts live north of the city of Bamberg, whose medieval and baroque architecture has been lovingly restored since the 1950s. It is typical of the well-heeled cities that prospered during the "economic miracle" of Germany's post-war reconstruction. Yet this region, which heavily depends on combustion engine technology, is facing a challenge that will have repercussions for Germany as a whole.

"We're talking here about some 25,000 jobs in the region; that's roughly 15 percent of the overall workforce," Bamberg mayor Andreas Starke told Reuters. "This shows how dependent the region is on combustion engines." For the Schmitts - Thomas works on the assembly line and Kristin in the stockroom - and their more than 850 colleagues at the Michelin tire factory, the chances of keeping their jobs are looking grim. Works council head Josef Morgenroth is trying to convince the management that the company can't pull out of an earlier agreement which ruled out forced lay-offs until the end of 2022. The local Michelin management declined to comment, saying it was still in talks with the works council.

#### 'Automobile crisis'

To help workers affected by the car industry disruption, politicians, companies and labour unions have called on the government to support the shift to alternative technologies such as electric cars or hydrogen-powered fuel cells. In a rare joint statement, automakers and unions said in January that Berlin must expand state-backed employment schemes, known as Kurzarbeit, to cover a longer pay subsidy period of up to 24 months as well as retraining in new skills such as building electric vehicle parts.

The German cabinet is expected to approve the more flexible Kurzarbeit rules next month. Under the scheme, companies can apply for state aid to avoid lay-offs and keep skilled workers for a limited time of currently up to 12 months. Depending on agreements between company and works council, employees work reduced hours or even stay at home, with the government paying two-thirds of the lost net income.

For the economy as a whole, this means consumers have less money to spend, eroding Germany's most important pillar of economic support in recent years as exports falter. That in turn could become an issue for the European Central Bank as it seeks to stimulate the wider euro zone economy with a limited arsenal. Research institute GfK expects German household spending to grow by 1 percent in 2020, down from roughly 1.5 percent last year.

Even without the planned changes, the number of employees already forced to work in Kurzarbeit schemes jumped to 96,000 in November, up from about 20,000 two years before, and surpassing levels last seen during the euro zone debt crisis in 2012/13, according to the Federal Labour Office.

Projections suggest that the number will rise to 117,000 this month, with the increase mainly due to the problems in the car industry, said Detlef Scheele, head of the state agency. Some auto suppliers have cut pay without applying for state aid under the short-time schemes. At the Bosch factory, management and the works council sealed a deal to avoid forced lay-offs until 2026 under the condition that all 7,000 employees reduce working hours and accept a pay cut of nearly 10 percent from April 2020.

"Of course, this is causing mixed feelings," said Sven Bachmann, production manager at the plant, which is 100 percent focused on combustion engine parts. "For me personally, the relief prevails that my job is safe for the next six years." — Reuters

### Syria targets property, cars to curb cash buys

DAMASCUS: The government in war-devastated Syria decided Sunday that all property and car sales must be conducted through banks, in an apparent bid to revive the banking sector and fight tax evasion. Under the directive, which came into immediate effect, buyers and sellers must use bank accounts for vehicle and property purchases, in a country largely used to transactions in cash.

"The decision targets the two important sectors in terms of money supply," economic journalist Ali al-Agha said. Notaries and public services can no longer register property and vehicle sale contracts unless documents show "that the sum or a part of the sum has been settled" through banks, under the regulation.

The move aims to encourage electronic transactions and limit the use of banknotes, Agha said, adding it was also a way to curb tax evasion. Syria's almost nine-yearold war has killed more than 380,000 people and ravaged its cities and infrastructure. The United Nations estimated in 2018 that the conflict had caused nearly \$400 billion in war-related destruction. In other moves, the central bank last week tripled the upper limit on mortgages to 15 million Syrian pounds (\$12,500 at the black market rate) as well as the ceiling for renovation loans. - AFP

# LAPA organizes concert for ABBA tribute band



# Bezos launches \$10bn fund to combat climate change

WASHINGTON: Amazon CEO Jeff Bezos has pledged \$10 billion to a new fund to tackle climate change but activists have urged the world's richest man to first clean up the e-commerce giant's own lacklustre environmental record. The e-commerce tycoon said the Bezos Earth Fund would "fund scientists, activists, NGOs - any effort that offers a real possibility to help preserve and protect the natural world". "Climate change is the biggest threat to our planet," Bezos, whose net worth is estimated to be around \$130 billion, said in an Instagram post to his 1.4 million followers on Monday.

However, Greenpeace USA said Amazon still had "massive climate issues," asking: "Why won't Bezos lead by cleaning up his own house?" Hundreds of Amazon employees last month signed a blog criticizing the online retail giant's climate policies and demanding it do more to tackle climate change. Amazon has been accused of creating vast amounts of waste from the packaging it uses for doorstep deliveries, as well as for the greenhouse gas emissions from huge vehicle fleets.

The company, which in December said its workforce had hit 750,000, has also been denounced over its carbon footprint because of the high energy consumption of its server farms for its lucrative cloud computing activities. Amazon Employees for Climate Justice, the group behind last month's criticism, responded to Bezos' pledge by urging the company to stop working with oil and gas companies and swap its diesel trucks for electric vehicles. "We applaud Jeff Bezos' philanthropy, but one hand cannot give what the other is taking away," the group said in a statement.

Bezos, who maintained his status as the world's richest person despite an expensive divorce last year, said his new foundation would begin issuing grants later this year. "I want to work alongside others both to amplify known ways and to explore new ways of fighting the devastating impact of climate change on this planet we all share," Bezos said in his announcement on Monday.

### Amazon's carbon targets

Last September, he said Amazon would pledge to become carbon neutral by 2040 and vowed that the company would order 100,000 electric delivery trucks. Rather than make investments that the business guru might profit from, the fund would allocate grant money to projects, The New York Times said, quoting unnamed sources familiar with the initiative. Bezos divulged few details on his social media post. Bezos has often clashed with US President Donald Trump, who regularly attacks climate change activists and recently called them "perennial prophets of doom".

The fund was described as Bezos's biggest philanthropic commitment. However the New York Times said that even if Bezos spent the full \$10 billion approximately 7.7 percent of his fortune immediately, he would still be the world's richest person. Last week, he reportedly agreed to buy a Beverly Hills mansion built in the 1930s by Hollywood movie mogul Jack Warner for \$165 million, a record price for a California home.

Global corporations in all sectors have been churning out climate action plans to reduce carbon footprints and adapt to tomorrow's low-carbon economy but experts have cautioned that many of these seemingly ambitious pledges are more greenwashing than green. Microsoft announced a plan earlier this year that would not only allow the software giant to become "carbon neutral" within a decade, but also to erase its entire carbon footprint since its creation in 1975.

But the claim partly depends on technologies that do not yet exist on a meaningful scale, such as machines that suck carbon dioxide directly out of the air. The company also has highly lucrative deals supplying major oil and gas companies with state-of-the-art tools to boost extraction rates and supply forecasts. — AFP







# 'JETMAN' STUNS WITH IRON

# Britain's **Kate** talks of 'mummy guilt' in podcast

# MAN-STYLE FLIGHT OVER DUBAI

D skies above Dubai in the latest "Jetman" stunt, taking off from the ground and climbing to 1,800m (nearly 6,000 feet) in a feat reminiscent of Marvel's "Iron Man" and hailed as a world first. Reffet and his collaborators, known as "Jetmen", have literally scaled new heights with the help of jetpacks and carbon-fire wings, staging a series of aerial displays that send them tearing through the skies at breakneck speed.

In an awe-inspiring flight captured on viral video, the Frenchman on Friday hovered five meters above the crystal waters of Dubai's coast before shooting off into the air and skimming the city's skyline. "We accomplished another world first in 100 percent autonomous human flight with @jetmandubai, who took off from the

ground before soaring to a high-altitude flight of up to 1,800m!" tweeted Expo 2020 Dubai, the mammoth trade fair that will open in October. The Jetmen had previously launched themselves into the air by jumping down from high platforms.

"It's the result of extremely thorough teamwork, where each small step generated huge results. Everything was planned to the split second, and I was overjoyed by the progress that was achieved," Reffet said in a statement. "One of the next objectives is to land back on the ground after a flight at altitude, without needing to open a parachute. It's being worked on." Reffet's carbon fibre wings are powered by four mini jet engines. The equipment, which is controlled by the pilot's movements, is capable of reaching speeds of 400 kilometers (250 miles) per hour.

On Friday, Reffet hovered five meters above the crystal waters of Dubai's coast before shooting off into the air and skimming the city's skyline. The Jetmen have pulled off a series of eye-popping flights in Dubai, soaring in tandem above the world's tallest building Burj Khalifa, and alongside an Emirates Airbus A380, the world's largest commercial airplane. Last year, Reffet and fellow Frenchman Fred Fugen also flew through the famed "Heaven's Gate" archway in the mountains of China's Hunan province. — AFP Prince William's wife Kate laid bare her "mummy guilt" during a landmark podcast on Saturday, recorded as part of her efforts to bring about a "generational change" in early-years childcare. The duchess told the "Happy Mum, Happy Baby" podcast that she suffered anxiety about her performance as a mother "all the time", adding that "anyone who doesn't as a mother is actually lying". "Questioning your own decisions, and your own judgments, and things like that... I think that starts from the moment you have a baby," said the mother-of-three.

"I totally underestimated the impact and the change it had on our lives. Asked if she felt "mummy guilt", the duchess-mother to George, aged six, Charlotte, four and Louis, 20 months, responded-"yes, absolutely". She said she "definitely would have done things different... knowing what I know now" referring to her first pregnancy with Prince George. The morning sickness that she suffered with all three of her children had strained the family, she said.

"William didn't feel he could do much to help and it's hard for everyone to see you suffering without actually being able to do anything about it," she explained. Despite the challenges, she said that since having children she had "found a new enjoyment out of life". Her experience of bringing up three children have led her to launch an early years survey to help find answers about raising a "happy, healthy" generation. "I think there's a few things that really stand out for me," she said.

"One is quality of relationships-so those moments that you spend with people that are around you. I remember that from my own childhood. "I had an amazing granny who devoted a lot of time to us, playing with us, doing arts and crafts and going to the greenhouse to do gardening, cooking with us, and I try and incorporate a lot of the experiences that she gave us at the time into the experiences I give my children now," she added. When asked what she hopes her children will remember from childhood, Kate replied: "Going to the beach getting soaking wet, filling our boots full of water." Kate has previously spoken of worrying about how well she was adapting to motherhood, saying "it is lonely at times and you do feel quite isolated". — AFP

# **Coronavirus casts shadow on China's big screen ambitions**

n a Friday night in one of Beijing's central shopping districts, the popular Megabox cinema is shuttered and empty. Like entertainment venues across the capital, the eight-screen movie theatre has been closed for nearly a month in response to the coronavirus outbreak which has swept China, infecting more than 70,000 people. Glossy posters for this year's blockbusters hang inside the closed entrance, while a sign outside says it was closed to "avoid spreading infections". No reopening date was given.

The government told hundreds of millions of people to stay home through the Lunar New Year holiday-a crucial period in China's movie industry. Normally, blockbuster films are released and consumers pack cinemasbut this year, all was quiet. The closures could have a devastating impact on China's film industry-and its target to overtake the US this year as the biggest box office in the world. With sales decimated in the first two months of the year, this now looks unlikely. "Based on 2019, the contribution from Chinese New Year was about 20 to 30 percent of the total box office," said

Wilson Chow, head of PwC's global iMax China down over 16 percent. one-time fee of \$90 million to release it technology, media and entertainment and telecommunications practice. "It is really a big portion."

### 'Not optimistic'

The takings at the box office on the first day of the new year in 2019 was \$240 million, according to Chow. This year, the same day managed just \$300,000. "I'm not very optimistic (of overtaking US sales this year)," he said, describing the virus as "a big blow to the industry". Film groups in China are only beginning to count the cost. Stateowned China Film Co. said during the New Year holiday last year it earned 144.03 million yuan (\$20 million) at the box office-nearly 8 percent of annual earnings. This year, cinemas have closed and films the group has produced are postponed.

'The coronavirus outbreak has ground China's film industry to a halt," said Deloitte China's Polly Lee. She says only 117,000 people went to the cinema during the first few days of the holidaycompared with 130 million last year. Shares in Shenzhen-listed Wanda Film have tumbled by more 25 percent since mid-January, with Hong Kong-listed

Chow warned older or less successful cinemas might be forced to close permanently.

### 'Destroying the industry'

The outbreak could also hit the pipeline. Hengdian Studios-China's largest film and TV production sitesaid some production work began again last week, but only with crew members who have undergone a 14day quarantine. Beijing's Film Bureau promised to give financial support to production companies hit by the outbreak. The loss of lucrative Chinese audiences will have a global impact. According to state agency Xinhua, more than 40 non-domestic made films last year had box office sales over 100 million yuan (\$14 million).

The virus has also caused waves in China's film circles. One anticipated blockbuster, "Lost In Russia", was set to be released during the new year holiday-but the film studio, Huanxi Media, decided to release the film online instead of waiting for cinemas to reopen. The studio signed a partnership to screen it for free with internet firm Bytedance, which paid Huanxi a on its Douyin and Toutiao platforms. The move was popular with those trapped at home, but prompted a huge backlash from cinemas. A joint letter signed by the country's biggest theatre chains threatened to boycott future releases from Huanxi. It claimed the agreement was "intentionally destroying the movie industry".

#### **Global impact**

The streaming giants have had an unexpected hit from the locked-down holiday, with shares surging for the likes of Baidu's Nasdaq-listed iQiyi and Bilibili. iQiyi said it has brought forward the release of new programs and released VIP films for free viewing during the holiday. Meanwhile others remain in limbo. Disney was hoping its new film Mulan-based on the tale of a legendary Chinese warrior-would be a huge hit with Chinese audiences.

Now the US entertainment giant, which will also face losses from closing its Disnevland parks in China and Hong Kong, can't even be sure when the film will open. Even the Oscar awards felt the coronavirus impact. The first film from Barack and

### UK music producer Andy Weatherall dead at 56

ndy Weatherall, the DJ who produced Primal Scream's "Screamadelica" and a pioneer of the acid house movement, died Monday at age 56 after suffering a pulmonary embolism, his representatives said. "He was being treated in hospital but unfortunately the blood clot reached his heart. His death was swift and peaceful," a statement from his PR agency said. "His family and friends are profoundly saddened by his death and are taking time to gather their thoughts." Weatherall was acclaimed for his remixes of Primal Scream's 1990 hit "Loaded", Happy Mondays' "Halleluiah" and New Order's "World In Motion", produced for England's 1990 football World Cup campaign.

New Order said it was "very saddened" to hear the news, while bassist Peter Hook added: "He was a truly nice, kind man who shared many, many words of wisdom." Ministry of Sound, the super-club dance venue that opened in 1991, called Weatherall "a master of his craft". Weatherall helped to document rave culture with the Boys Own fanzine but shunned the path towards becoming a celebrity DJ, preferring to concentrate on creating music instead. "I don't start a project as such, I just make music every day and see what happens," he told The Independent newspaper in a 2016 interview. "I'm usually three-quarters of the way through an album when I officially start making it. This is like a hobby, but also a job. I've found a job I like and I've found a level that I like." On working with Primal Scream frontman Bobby Gillespie for "Screamadelica", he told the BBC: "I was very nervous. I didn't know what you could do and couldn't do. "But I was full of what Orson Welles called 'the confidence of ignorance'." The details surrounding his funeral "will be made in due course", his agency said. — AFP

# Weinstein jury to begin deliberations

urors began deliberating the fate of ex-Hollywood titan Harvey Weinstein yesterday in his high-profile sex crimes trial that marked a watershed moment in the #MeToo movement. The disgraced movie mogul, 67, faces life in prison if the jury of seven men and five women convict him of predatory sexual assault charges in New York. More than 80 women have accused Weinstein of sexual misconduct since allegations against him ignited the #MeToo global reckoning against men abusing positions of power in October 2017.

But the jury is considering charges related to just two: ex-actress Jessica Mann and former production assistant Mimi Haleyi, with many claims too old to prosecute. Mann, 34, says Weinstein raped her in March 2013, while Haleyi alleges he forcibly performed oral sex on her in July 2006. The proceedings, which began hearing testimony on January 22, threw up complicated issues surrounding consent and abuse of power for the jury. Under cross-examination, both Mann and Halevi acknowledged at least one consensual sexual encounter with Weinstein after the

after the alleged attacks. His team said the relationships were consensual and transactional, arguing that the accusers used sex with the defendant to advance their own careers. Prosecutors said he was a career sexual predator who took advantage of his powerful position in the American film industry to prey on aspiring young actresses.

Weinstein, the producer of "Pulp Fiction" and "Sin City," is the first man accused of abuse in the #MeToo movement to face a criminal trial. In closing arguments Thursday, lead attorney Donna Rotunno urged the 12 jurors to make themselves "unpopular" by acquitting Weinstein, insisting he had been innocent from the start. She stressed that prosecutors had failed to present any forensic evidence or evewitness accounts. The prosecution's case rests on whether the jury believes the six women, including actress Annabella Sciorra of "The Sopranos," who testified that Weinstein had sexually assaulted them.

# Oscar-winning director McQueen returns to art with Tate show

scar-winning British director Steve McQueen is returning to his art roots with a series of short films at London's Tate Modern art gallery, offering a sensory exploration of black identity. McQueen, who became the first black director to win the best picture Academy Award in 2014 for "12 Years a Slave", is now based between London and Amsterdam and is focused on championing diversity in the film industry.

Visitors to his new exhibition will be greeted by "Static", a film of New York's Statue of Liberty, scrutinising the iconic symbol from every possible angle at very close range against a deafening backdrop of the helicopter from where the footage was filmed. "What interests Steve is our view of the world, how humans are trying to represent Liberty," said Fiontan Moran, assistant curator of the exhibition. "7th Nov, 2001" features a still shot of a body while McQueen's cousin Marcus tells of how he accidentally killed his brother, a particularly traumatic experience for the artist.

"Western Deep" is another visceral work, giving a sense through sights and sounds in an interactive installation of the experiences of miners in South Africa, following them to the bottom of the mine. "Ashes", meanwhile, is a tribute to a young fisherman from Grenada, the island where McOueen's family originated. The images of beauty and sweetness filmed from his boat are tragically reversed on the other side of the projection screen, which shows a grave commissioned by McQueen for the eponymous young fisherman, who was killed by drug traffickers.

### Poetry

African-American singer, actor and civil rights activist Paul Robeson (1898-1976) is honored in "End Credits". The film shows censored FBI documents detailing the agency's surveillance of Robeson, read by a voice-over artist, for five hours. "He is... testing the limits of how people can be documented in an era of mass surveillance," said Moran. In a similarly militant vein, the exhibition features the sculpture "Weight", which was first shown in the prison cell where the writer and playwright Oscar Wilde was imprisoned.

It depicts a golden mosquito net draped over a metal prison bed frame, addressing the theme of confinement and the power of the imagination to break free. The show runs alongside an exhibition of McQueen's giant portraits of London school classes, many of which appeared on the streets of London last year. "I remember my first school trip to Tate when I was an impressionable eight-year-old, which was really the moment I gained an understanding that anything is possible," said McQueen, adding it was "where in some ways my journey as an artist first began".

He recently told the Financial Times newspaper the difference between his art films and his feature films was that the former were poetry, the latter like a novel. "Poetry is condensed, precise, fragmented," he said. "The novel is the yarn". The exhibition opens on February 13 and runs until May 11. — AFP

# Sinead Burke: Thinking big in changing fashion industry

espite her tiny stature, Sinead Burke has become a force to be reckoned with in the world of fashion, pushing for designs to become accessible for all. The 29-year-old Irishwoman, just 1.05 meters (three feet and five inches) tall, has not gone unnoticed at London Fashion Week. Burke was in the front row at the Victoria Beckham and Roksanda catwalk shows, sitting just a few places away from Anna Wintour, the high priestess of fashion. She cuts a surprising figure amidst the models, movie actors and pop stars-yet she too sports luxurious outfits.

Before the Beckham show, Burke was wearing some of the former Spice Girls singer's creations, donning a canary yellow blouse decorated with a black flower, and a straight brown skirt. But there is plenty more in her wardrobe that she could have chosen from. "There is some Gucci, some Prada, some Dior, some Balenciaga, some Victoria Beckham, some Christopher Kane, some Burberry," she told AFP. How did the school teacher from Dublin end up on the cover of Britain's Vogue magazine?

The journey started in March 2017 with a TED Talk-the online ideas conferences-and a speech entitled "Why design should include everyone". Her talk went over the obstacles she faced in daily life in the designed world, from the height of locks on toilet doors to the available range of shoe sizes. The video, which has been viewed 1.4 million times, seems to have triggered some changes. "That seemed to be a moment when people were listening to design and accessibility and thinking about this industry in a different way for the first time, so there has been progress," said Burke.

Burke did not leave it at that. At London Fashion Week in February 2018, she introduced herself to British Vogue editor-inchief Edward Enniful, tugging on his sleeve at a Burberry show. Then she ended up on the cover of the magazine's September 2019 issue, chosen by guest editor Meghan, the Duchess of Sussex as one of 15 female

"forces for change". Top designers have created custom-made outfits for her-something she considers a "huge privilege and an honor"-but that was never her goal. "What I want is just that people understand disability as customisation, which the fashion industry already is familiar with, and make that a tool that is available for everybody," she said.

More than just the symbolism of disabled

people on catwalks, she wants long-term systemic change so that "an 18-year-old who is at university, who studies marketing, who is a little person like me, can understand that he can work for Victoria Beckham or for Gucci". Burke hosts a podcast where she conducts interviews on the theme of identity and difference.

She has also collaborated with the Open Style Lab, an organization which works on creating wearable clothes for people with disabilities without compromising on style or comfort. "The idea of this is not necessarilv that that collection would be marketable and commercial," she said.

More so that the young designers would learn from working with "different types of bodies" and take that forward into the companies they go on to work for. "Change has to happen at the most senior level with the chief executive and creative directors but also with the new generation" of designers, said Burke. Little by little, representation and visibility of people with disabilities was improving, she said, citing the example of 18-year-old Aaron Philip-the first transsexual, black, disabled model to have joined the books of a large modeling agency, Elite. There is still a long way to go to transform "the most exclusive industry in the world", she said, though she remains optimistic. "I thought I would be a teacher forever and here we are, in London Fashion Week!"- AFP

# Chanel halts **Beijing** fashion show over virus fears

rench fashion house Chanel said Monday it was postponing a show set for May in Beijing following an outbreak of a new coronavirus that has infected some 70,000 people across China. "Considering the current situation and following the guidance of Chinese authorities, Chanel has decided to postpone its project of a replica of the Paris - 31 rue Cambon 2019/20 MÈtiers d'art collection in May in Beijing to a later and more appropriate moment," a statement said, without giving a new date.

"Chanel is monitoring the situation closely. At the foremost are the health and well-being of its teams and clients." it said. The "31 Rue Cambon" show was first held in Paris in December, inspired by the studio and workshop of founder Coco Chanel. The decor was created by the film director Sofia Coppola. Hundreds of trade shows and other major events in China have been cancelled in recent weeks over fears of the virus, which has killed nearly 1,800 people in mainland China since it was first reported in December. Last week, the Chinese designer Jarel Zhang cancelled the showing of his new collection during Paris Fashion Week in March "in order to ensure the health and safety of both countries and reduce the number of contacts" that could spread the flu-like disease. — AFP



















# **MOROCCO FORTRESS VILLAGE HOPES** TO DRAW 'GAME OF THRONES' FANS

illions worldwide may have seen the desert fortress in the hit fantasy series "Game of Thrones", but fewer know they can visit the Moroccan village of Ait-Ben-Haddou. The fortified old settlement at the foot of the majestic Atlas mountains enchanted audiences in the HBO series and also served as a dusty backdrop in Ridley Scott's epic swords-and-sandals film "Gladiator". But unlike other famous locations from movie and television historv. this UNESCO World Heritage Site has so far missed out on a mass influx of tourism-something some of its inhabitants are eager to change.

"Several people have told me that they came here to see the filming location of 'Game of Thrones'," said Ahmed Baabouz, a local tour guide. "There is tourism linked to cinema here but frankly we have not developed it to the extent it could be.' Ait-Ben-Haddou is southern Morocco's most famous fortress. Time seems to have stopped at the site overlooking a valley some 30 kilometers (18.6 miles) from the town of Ouarzazate. After passing through the imposing entrance way, visitors navigate a labyrinth of winding alleys that eventually lead onto a public square where the settlement's inhabitants once gathered.

There is a mosque and two cemeteries-one for Muslims and one for Jews. Most inhabitants have long since departed though, with a few homes converted into stalls selling handicrafts. The fortress is an ideal film setting, located a short distance from the studios of Ouarzazate, the "Mecca" of Moroccan cinema. Productions ranging from "Lawrence of Arabia" to "The Mummy" have been filmed here. More recently, scenes from the cult series "Game of Thrones" were shot at Ait-Ben-Haddou, with the site standing in for the fictional Yellow City of Yunkai which is conquered by Daenerys Targaryen, a key character in the "GOT" universe.

Hammadi, 61, is a privileged witness to the location's cinematic history. "All of these productions have contributed to the reputation of the region," he said, grinning widely. Hammadi himself has appeared as an extra in a number of films. And while like most people he lives in a more modern home in a village on the other side of the valley, he continues to return to Ait-Ben-Haddou to welcome tourists.



### 'House of the Dragon'

On a wall at the entrance to Hammadi's former home, photos bear witness to the projects he has worked on. One shows him dressed as an ancient Roman with director Ridley Scott on the set of "Gladiator". "We have a very rich cinematic heritage that we hope to use to attract tourists," said tour guide Baabouz, who is 29. But "nothing indicates that Game of Thrones' was shot here," he added.

On Morocco's Atlantic coast, the city of Essaouira also formed the backdrop to scenes from the series. But there too, Moroccan tourism promoters are yet to capitalize on the connection. In comparison, Northern Ireland, Malta and Dubrovnik in Croatia have attracted hordes of fans from around the world, drawn by their links to the franchise. To remedy this, Baabouz and other young people in the village are pooling their limited resources towards an ambitious project: a museum in the fortress, gathering photography from the productions that have been filmed here. US channel HBO has commissioned a prequel to "GOT", called "House of the Dragon". George R.R. Martin, the author of the books on which the series is based, wrote on his blog that shooting would also take place in Morocco. — AFP

# Body work: Russia's 'biohackers' push boundaries

It's just part of his exhaustive routine over the last five years, measuring hundreds of biochemical markers and taking handfuls of vitamins and supplements daily. Although he declines to talk in detail about what he takes, he says the supplements include iodine, Vitamin D, magnesium and prebiotics. As well as genetic tests to identify personal risk factors and compensate for them, he

Controversially, US biohacker Josiah Zavner, who is Two years ago he founded a startup called Biodata a scientist, in 2017 livestreamed an experimental attempt to alter his own DNA using new gene editing technology called Crispr. The tool, informally known as molecular "scissors", is being used to treat genetic conditions, such as sickle cell disease, and has made gene editing more widely accessible. But the US Food and Drug Administration has

his hand so he can open the door to his office without swiping a card. "It's something I decided a long time ago," he says. "Mainly because it's convenient but there's also a kind of exclusivity, because practically no one else has this." Rautkin and Zaitsev are among a growing number of Russians interested in biohacking, a global movement whose followers seek to "upgrade" their bodies with experimental technology and DIY health fixes that began in Silicon Valley at the start of the last decade. For some, the lifestyle trend involves implanting technology under their skin.

For others-mainly wealthy Russians-the quest is to live longer, which they hope to do through intensive monitoring of their bodies, taking vast quantities of supplements or extreme exercise. Although it's unclear how many biohackers there are in Russia, the movement is spreading, with social media forums, conferences and businesses springing up to cater to their needs. Zaitsev, a programmer with a ducktail haircut, taught himself to insert chips, helped by the fact he's a medical school dropout. The 28-year-old caught national attention in 2015 by taking the chip out of a Moscow metro pass, dissolving it in acetone and encasing it in silicone before inserting it into the back of his hand.

The disc, about the size of a British one penny coin, is still visible but currently defunct-Zaitsev reprogrammed it with bank card details, only for the bank to close. He also has magnets on his fingertips, mainly for party tricks. He says the biohacking movement is about using technology to facilitate concrete tasks. "In biohacking, I like things that give a real, confirmed effect, for example putting in chips," he says. Based on the contact between the close-knit community on social media, he estimates that about 1,000 Russians are chipped.

Most install work passes, he says, while some insert magnets or a compass implant that vibrates when they turn north. "I like the idea of expanding the capabilities of the human body." Around the world, implanted microchips are being used to start cars, turn on smartphones, computers and printers, monitor body temperature and store medical information or as business cards. Professional magicians even use them to enhance their tricks. Some chips have been approved for human use, but Zaitsev said he uses veterinary ones made in Taiwan and ordered by mail for about 500 rubles (\$8) each. While some have raised concerns over potential surveillance and hacking, the number of chipped people is still very small in Russia, and unlike smartphones, the chips do not transmit the users' location.

### Studio flat surgery


In his studio flat, Zaitsev charges Rautkin 2,000 rubles (\$32) for the operation to insert the chip that is slightly bigger than a grain of rice. He has chipped about 50 others, too, he says. The "typical client is a geek", he adds. "Most are men aged 35 or younger." Other biohackers have little time for chipping, however. Entrepreneur Stanislav Skakun says that biohacking is about extending life, potentially for thousands of years, an idea known as transhumanism. "I haven't yet found a chip that would be useful for that arranges tests for clients and stores information, charging 150,000 rubles (\$2,430) for a full checkup. Clients are "mainly top managers and business people", he said. Well-heeled patrons are also paying up to 250,000 rubles (\$4,050) annually for a Moscow gym that calls itself a "biohacking laboratory".

undergoes tests for inflammation, cholesterol, glucose, bone density, the stress hormone cortisol and the efficiency of his immune system.

Trim with piercing blue eyes, Skakun claims that "in the last five years, my biological age hasn't changed at all." He hopes to live long enough to see scientific advances extend life massively. "If we conquer cancer, Alzheimer's and cardiovascular disease, we'll prevent practically all the reasons we die," he said. Such ideas are espoused by international pro-





Maxim Skulachev, a Russian biologist at Moscow State University who studies longevity, said that biohackers were right to say that ageing may be programmed into our genes and theoretically could be blocked. "We think ageing was somehow introduced in our genome as a program," he said. "For us the only way to fight ageing is to somehow break this program-hack it." In doing so, this could end age-related conditions and cancer, he said, adding that living to the age of 100 would become the new norm.

Nevertheless, he also predicts that the superelderly will develop other health problems limiting their lifespan which have not yet even manifested themselves. The problem with biohackers is they are "running too fast," said Skulachev, 46, whose team is trying to come up with a drug to interfere with the genetic ageing process. "At the moment there is no technology to break this program and from this point of view... biohackers are engaged in wishful thinking."

The gym, which opened last year with the slogan "Upgrade Yourself", is on the 58th floor of a skyscraper in the business district. Similarly, members are "company owners or top managers", says founder Artyom Vasilyev. The slim 29-year-old got into sports science after competing seriously as a runner. On the treadmill, a gym member dons a face mask to analyze the gases in his breath. Minutes later he gets a breakdown that shows when his workout was most effective. Afterwards, he stands in a chamber chilled by liquid nitrogen to minus 120 degrees Celsius (minus 184 Fahrenheit), which Vasilyev says aids recovery. For all his enthusiasm, Vasilyev doubts that people will live for hundreds of years any time soon. "I'm more into the idea that you can live 100, 115 years or 120 years but live them in a good-quality way."

Zaitsev, the chipping enthusiast, is scathing about the quest for longevity, which he calls "a kind of religion" seeking a "magic pill". A month after the implantation, Rautkin is using his chipped hand to open doors at his e-commerce company. Unfortunately it doesn't work on the main door, but he is philosophical about this. "I am using it quite successfully," he says. "It's not a problem at all to remove it, or leave it for some other use, possibly to identify myself in some other place, maybe to unblock a phone or notebook."-AFP



# Syria presses assault amid fears over mass displacement



**BEIRUT:** Syrian troops pressed an offensive yesterday on the country's last major rebel enclave where the mass displacement of civilians is sparking fears of a humanitarian catastrophe. Around 900,000 people have been forced from their homes and shelters in less than three months, leaving huge numbers to sleep rough in the thick of winter. The United Nations said that half a million among them were children, some of whom have died of exposure in snow-covered camps.

The UN has warned that the crisis could worsen if no ceasefire is reached to facilitate the relief effort. "Over the past four days alone, some 43,000 newly displaced people have fled western Aleppo where fighting has been particularly fierce," UN spokesman David Swanson told AFP. Since the start of February, the displacement figure was a staggering 300,000, he said. The wave of displacement is the biggest since the start of the civil war nearly nine years ago. It is largest exodus of civilians since World War II.

The UN Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs said the temperature dipped to minus 7 Celsius in some areas last week. "Those families who could take some of their belongings as they fled from their homes are reportedly burning whatever they could find, including pieces of furniture and whatever can be spared to stay warm for a short while," it said. The UN High Commissioner for Human Rights Michelle Bachelet called for the establishment of humanitarian corridors for fleeing civilians to prevent further loss of life.

There was no sign of any let-up in the violence, however, with President Bashar Al-Assad promising on Monday that government forces would press on with their offensive. "The battle for the liberation of the provinces of Aleppo and Idlib continues, regardless of all the hot air coming out of the north," Assad said, in reference to warnings by Turkey. In recent weeks, Syrian troops and allied forces backed by Russia have stepped up their offensive against jihadists and their rebel allies in Idlib and the neighboring province of Aleppo. They have reconquered swathes of Idlib as well as key areas that have secured the strategic M5 highway connecting the country's four largest cities as well as the entire surroundings of Aleppo city for the first time since 2012. "We have won a victory over the fear they tried to instill in our hearts... but we are fully aware that this liberation is not the end of the war." Assad said in a televised speech. According to the Syrian Observatory for Human Rights, government forces made fresh gains in western Aleppo province yesterday. "Regime forces are trying to push towards the Sheikh Barakat mountain," said Rami Abdel Rahman, the head of the Britain-based monitoring organization. If they capture the area, government forces will control a vantage point over vast swathes of land in Idlib and Aleppo provinces, including areas where tens of thousands of displaced people live in sprawling camps. Deadly incidents between government forces and rebel-backer Turkey have raised tensions near Syria's northern border, prompting Turkish President Recep Tayvip Erdogan to threaten Damascus. Turkey, which already hosts more Syrian refugees than any other country with more than 3.5 million people, is unwilling to open its borders to a new wave. — AFP

Opposition MPs protested at what they called the "illegal" procedure adopted by the committee and demanded that voting on the three draft laws be carried out separately. The Assembly agreed and as the debate was about to begin, the troubles began. Some lawmakers traded jibes and insults and threatened physical action after MP Mutair described the cell members as "traitors", which Shiite MP Salah Khorshid did not like and he insulted Mutair.

The arguments soon developed into a quarrel that involved four lawmakers: Mutair, Khalil Abul, Faisal Al-Kandari and Khaled Al-Otaibi. MPs quickly separated them amid loud shouts by MPs and the public attending the session from the gallery. At this point, the speaker ordered the guards to expel the spectators from the gallery, during which a number of MPs claimed the guards beat up some people.

At this point, Ghanem also adjourned the session and vacated the whole Assembly chamber, including reporters. Ghanem said after the Assembly resumed the session that MPs voted on the three bills separately and rejected them. This means that the draft law for granting amnesty to the former opposition MPs who include vet-

the Palestine Liberation Organisation. Numbers grew after the campaign gained support from the Islamist group Hamas, which holds sway in mosques, especially in cities where it has a sizeable following.

Hamas spokesman Fawzi Barhoum, in Gaza, told Reuters the campaign was a bid to alert Palestinians to the Trump plan, and to Israel's plans to annex its West Bank settlements. In Nablus - where crowds surged to several thousand on Friday, from around 2,000 the week before - worshippers insisted there was no single group behind the drive, describing it as a grassroots movement still finding its feet. But the streets echoed with chants popular at Hamas rallies, including: "A nation with the leadership of Muhammad will not be defeated".

The lawmakers held the speaker fully responsible for the breaches of the constitution and violating national interests, saying they will discuss in the coming days among themselves and with their voters "appropriate political and constitutional options". Before the drama, MPs voted with an overwhelming majority to approve a law amending the pension law, providing easier terms on loans taken by retired people. But the government did not support the law, saying its cost is too high. The Assembly is due to meet today.

in abundance and the gathering was supervised by stewards wearing fluorescent jackets proclaiming them 'Knights of the Dawn,' and bearing the stenciled image of the nearby Al-Nasr (Victory) mosque. The crowds have been much smaller than the numbers that attended the Great March of Return protests at the Gaza border fence when that campaign started nearly two years ago. In those Gaza demonstrations, 215 Palestinians were killed and several thousand injured in confrontations with Israeli troops. One Israeli soldier was killed by a Palestinian sniper.

In Nablus the crowds at dawn prayers have been peaceful, with little sign of any heightened security. Hani Al-Masri, a Palestinian political analyst, said the campaign reflected Hamas' cautious approach to operating in the West Bank, where, unlike Gaza, it faces Israeli troops and Palestinian Authority forces intent on stopping Hamas from inflaming the streets and seizing control. "Hamas' organization in the West Bank is not in good shape because of crackdowns by the Palestinian Authority and by Israel," he said. "Fajr prayers is the most that Hamas can do." Asked whether Israel was aware of the enlarged dawn prayer meetings, an Israeli military spokesman and the Shin Bet domestic intelligence agency had no immediate comment. — Reuters "The violence in northwest Syria is indiscriminate. Health facilities, schools, residential areas, mosques and markets have been hit," the UN head of humanitarian affairs and emergency relief, Mark Lowcock, said on Monday.

#### 'Only option'

"The biggest humanitarian horror story of the 21st Century will only be avoided if Security Council members, and those with influence, overcome individual interests and put a collective stake in humanity first," Lowcock added. Russia, the main foreign broker in Syria, has vetoed countless resolutions on the conflict. "The only option is a ceasefire," Lowcock said.

The latest violence yesterday left at least two civilians dead. One was killed in a Russian air strike and the other in regime shelling. A member of regime-backer Iran's Revolutionary Guards was killed in Aleppo province in a rocket strike, Iranian state media reported.

According to Save The Children, seven children including a baby only seven months old - have died from freezing temperatures and bad living conditions in the camps. "We're worried that the death toll will increase given the absolutely inhumane living conditions that women and children are finding themselves in," the charity's Syria director Sonia Khush said.

# Iraqis wanted to topple the system...

Youth chant against a once-untouchable cluster of politicians and paramilitary commanders, and women spend nights in tents next to adult men.

Students defy orders to return to class and neighborhoods once seen as dangerous are buzzing with people en route to demonstrate. Slogans like "Forget outdated traditions," "End classism" and "No more differences" are trending on Twitter in Iraq. "Tahrir lets us dream," wrote one activist whose friend – who ekes out a living driving a rickshaw – had fallen in love with a medic from a prestigious family.

Since the 1970s, Iraq has endured Saddam Hussein's authoritarian regime, back-to-back wars and devastating sanctions that isolated it from the world. There were few cellular phones and barely any internet access until the 2003 US-led invasion that collapsed Saddam's nominally secular regime. Sectarian fighting gave rise to hardline Shiite and Sunni militias as society became more divided and religious.

When Iraq defeated the Islamic State group in 2017 after years of fighting and displacement, many anticipated longoverdue peace and prosperity. "The young generation was in a coma for many years, but stability opened their eyes to the truth: there is more to life than just surviving," said protester Ahmad Haddad, 32. "There's living in dignity in a civil society, breaking conservative norms and loosening the grip of religious parties," said Haddad.

But instead of easing into normality, it was a sudden uprising that transformed Iraq. Hiyyam Shayea, a 50-year-old teacher in protest-hit Diwaniyah province, can testify to that. "There were some huge, surprising changes to a lot of social affairs," said Shayea, wearing a traditional black robe at a recent rally in her hometown. Such a stance had long been unimaginable in the south, where tribal customs trump federal law and restrict women's public role. But it has come at a high price. Around 550 people have been killed and 30,000 wounded in protest-related violence. "That was all for a homeland - one that's civilized and civil, not backwards and outdated," said Shayea.

Some are resisting the changes, describing rallies as hotbeds of promiscuity, alcohol and drugs, fuelled by the West. Leading Iraqi cleric Moqtada Sadr has tried to discredit the movement with such claims, insisting men and women stay separate and protests be "cleaned". Women swiftly organized their own rally mocking Sadr, long untouchable because of his violent past as a militiaman and his diehard followers.

In the protests' early days, angry crowds slapped shoes against portraits of paramilitary leaders and Iranian general Qasem Soleimani, who held tremendous sway in Baghdad and was never publicly criticized. Soleimani was later killed in a US strike. Demonstrators also railed against "muhassassa", the sectarian power-sharing system governing Iraq after Saddam. Few current protesters are old enough to remember Saddam -60 percent of the population is under 25 - and blame their elders for Iraq's slide into broken politics.

The rallies exposed "a huge rift" between the two generations, Iraqi researcher Khaled Hamza told AFP. "We're in the middle of a spontaneous movement by a group of youth who weren't expected to be responsible for achieving what our generation couldn't," said Hamza, who is in his 60s. Protesters recognize it, too. In Baghdad, a woman in a pink headscarf carried a sign: "In the end, I made a revolution. What did you do?"

Further south in oil-rich Basra, Heba, a protester in her 20s, said the rallies have changed her. "They strengthened our personalities, made us distinguish between right and wrong and demand our rights," she said. The movement is now at a crossroads: Numbers have dwindled as activists face an intimidation campaign and parties seek to recapture momentum with a new cabinet. "Now, it's time to unite under a new vision, a plan that addresses Iraqis' needs," said protester Mohammad Al-Ajeel. "What's happening is huge, but it's new for us. We can't expect everything to happen overnight," said Ajeel, a businessman living between Iraq and the UAE. "It may need years." — AFP



# Sport will rebound in China but coronavirus exposes flaws

### **Preparations for 2022 Winter Games in Beijing remain on track**

HONG KONG: The coronavirus exposes an ignorance of China's lucrative sports market and poor contingency planning, experts say, after Formula One became the most high-profile casualty of a mass pullout from the country.

Formula One chiefs are scrambling to fit the Shanghai race into this season's schedule after the April 19 grand prix last week joined the World Athletics Indoor Championships and European Tour and LPGA golf tournaments in being shelved because of the deadly outbreak. The Formula E Grand Prix, badminton, skiing and Olympic qualifying events have all been cancelled, postponed or moved elsewhere in recent weeks. All activity in the country's two most popular sports football and basketball - has been suspended, but the obliteration of the sporting calendar is regarded as unavoidable given the circumstances.

The virus, which emerged in December in the central city of Wuhan, has killed more than 1,800 people, almost all in China, and sparked global alarm. The world's most populous country has become a major sporting destination in the last decade and top clubs and organisations, among them the Premier League, FIFA and NBA, have courted fans — and their money - in the world's second-largest economy.

Marcus Luer, founder and chief executive of sports marketing agency TSA (Total Sports Asia), said that it will be business as usual once the virus clears but a lesson has been learnt that extends beyond China.

"This could happen anywhere in the world and federations and organisers need good contingency plans, especially in an Olympic year, where athletes are still qualifying for the Games (Tokyo 2020)," said Luer.

"I think that's a global learning for major sports organisations to be ready and have a good Plan B in case something like this happens again in the future anywhere in the world.

"Honestly, I don't think any sport or event had a Plan B in place." Professor Simon Chadwick echoes that sentiment. Chadwick, director of the Centre for the Eurasian Sport Industry based in Shanghai, also said that European football clubs in particular had failed to grasp the opportunity to show support for China and its people. "The current health issues have exposed how distant many international sport stakeholders are from China, in terms of both geographic distance and cultural understanding," Chadwick said. "Furthermore, it appears that many are rather too dependent upon second-hand information, suggesting that most don't have people on the ground to provide accurate insight and first-hand experience."

He added: "If they are going to successfully engage in business in China, then they need to better understand the nuances and complexities of working there."

### **ANOTHER GALACTICOS MOMENT?**

China says that preparations for the 2022 Winter Games in Beijing remain on track, despite a test skiing event being cancelled over coronavirus fears. China has been here before, with the Severe Acute Respiratory Syndrome (SARS) epidemic in 2002-2003, but at that time the country hosted nothing like the number of international sporting events it now holds.

In the summer of 2003, a Real Madrid squad boasting "Galacticos" David Beckham, Ronaldo, Zinedine Zidane and Luis Figo visited China, the first time the Spanish giants had come to the country.

China is now a regular summer destination for top European football teams, but this year's tours will fall by the wayside if the coronavirus continues to spread

in the coming months. "When they appeared at Beijing Workers' Stadium, the panic effect caused by SARS disappeared instantly... the stadium was full and the city's confidence returned," said a recent column in the Oriental Sports Daily, reflecting on Real's moraleboosting landmark trip.

"This is the power of sports!" said the column, declaring that China's sporting life will similarly bounce back with renewed vigour after the coronavirus subsides. "The confidence of life, the confidence of the city, the confidence of the government and the good use of the spirit of sports culture will surely return quickly." — AFP

# **Rockets to sign Carroll, Green**

LOS ANGELES: The Houston Rockets are keeping busy during the All-Star break, with plans to sign veteran forwards DeMarre Carroll and Jeff Green, according to multiple media reports Monday.

Green, who has been a free agent since the Jazz waived him on Dec. 24, is expected to sign a 10-day contract as early as Tuesday, according to league sources at ESPN. Sources indicate he will be offered a deal for the rest of the season if he feels comfortable enough to commit to it.

Carroll, who took a buyout from the San Antonio Spurs on Monday after playing only 15 games (averaging 2.2 points, 2.1 rebounds a game), needs to clear waivers before signing with the Rockets.

"I don't know what went wrong, what happened," Carroll said via the San Antonio Express-News about his short stint with the Spurs after signing as a free agent last summer. "I felt like San Antonio was going to be a great place for me, for my talents, but it didn't work out."

The 6-foot-6 Carroll, 33, is in his 11th NBA season, having started his career with the Memphis Grizzlies in 2009 after they made him a first-round pick in that year's NBA draft. During the 2010-11 season, he played for the Rockets, and also had stints with the Denver Nuggets (2011-12), Utah Jazz (2011-13), Atlanta Hawks (2013-15), Toronto Raptors (2015-17) and Brooklyn Nets (2017-19). In 569 career games, he has averaged 9.0 points and 4.3 rebounds.

The 6-8 Green, also 33, has career averages of 13.0 points and 4.4 rebounds a game while playing for eight NBA franchises, beginning his 13-year career with the Seattle SuperSonics in 2007-08. — AFP

### MCILROY AIMS FOR WGC 'SLAM'

World number one Rory McIlroy carded a top-five finish at Riviera but will rue another tournament that slipped from his grasp with a final-round blowout as he heads to Mexico. Starting in a share of the lead, McIlroy's two-over 73 on Sunday was largely down to a shocking triple-bogey seven on the fifth.

"Apart from that, I played pretty well," the Northern Irishman reflected wryly before heading off to contest the \$10.5 million WGC Mexico Championship, which begins Thursday. McIlroy won the WGC-HSBC Championship in Shanghai for the first time in November and has the added incentive of being able complete a "grand slam" of the four WGC titles in the rarefied air of the high-altitude Chapultepec course.

He was runner-up last year to Dustin Johnson — the only player to have won all the WGCs — so if McIlroy can turn the tables he will equal the American big-hitter, having also won the WGC Match Play in 2015 and the WGC Invitational in 2014.

Wright, who accumulated 82 LPGA Tour titles during a professional career which stretched from 1954 to 1969, died in Florida after a heart attack, reports said.

"We're saddened to learn today of the passing of Mickey Wright, a 13-time Major Champion and 82-time winner on the @LPGA, just three days after celebrating her birthday," the World Golf Hall of Fame announced on Twitter. "One of the best to ever play the game, she will be greatly missed. #RIPMickey." Born Mary Kathryn Wright in San Diego, California in 1935, Wright enjoyed a stellar amateur career which included a US Girls Junior Championship in 1952.

She won the 1954 World Amateur Championship before turning professional the following season. Her haul of 13 major victories included four US Women's Open titles and four US Women's PGA Championships. Only Patty Berg, who had 15 major wins, has won more. Her retirement in 1969 shocked women's golf, coming at the relatively early age of 34.

Wright would later cite the pressure of the spotlight as influencing her decision to step away from the sport. "It was a lot of pressure to be in contention week after week for five or six years," Wright said in a 2000 interview. "I guess they call it burnout now, but it wore me out. Unless you're a golfer, you can't understand the tension and pressure of tournament play.

"And it was the expectations: It was always, 'What's wrong with your game? 'Are you coming apart?' Second or third isn't bad, but it feels bad when you've won 44 tournaments in four years. "I'm not real good as far as wanting to be in front of people, glorying in it and loving it. I think you have to love that to make that kind of pressure tolerable. It finally got to where it wasn't tolerable to me."

Kathy Whitworth, who holds the record for LPGA Tour wins with 88 titles, believes Wright would easily have beaten her career haul had she continued playing. "She was the best I've ever seen, man or woman," Whitworth said in 2015. "I've had the privilege of playing with Sam Snead and Jack Nicklaus and Arnold Palmer and all of them. And some of our ladies had wonderful swings. But nobody hit it like Mickey, just nobody. "She had 82 wins, but she would have won over 100 with no trouble if she had stayed on tour." - AFP





# NZ's Taylor bats away retirement talk ahead of 100th Test

# It will be a party atmosphere for Taylor at Basin Reserve on Friday

WELLINGTON: New Zealand's Ross Taylor will celebrate his 100th Test in the series-opener against India this week and the veteran batsman says he has no intention of winding down his international career as he nears his 36th birthday.

Taylor became New Zealand's leading run-scorer in Tests when he surpassed Stephen Fleming's career tally of 7,172 against Australia in Sydney last month. In front of home fans in Wellington on Friday, he will become the nation's fourth cricketer to play 100 tests after Fleming, Daniel Vettori and Brendon McCullum.

He will also become the first cricketer to reach the milestone in all three major formats. Far from seeing the finish line for his career, Taylor said he had been urged to reset his goals in a congratulatory call from former New Zealand test opener and coach John Wright.

"He said it was a nice time to relax, but at the same time nice to rejig those goals," Taylor said in comments published by New Zealand's Stuff media yesterday. "Give yourself something to chase ... Goals aren't everything but they're a nice reminder when your mind is going in different directions, to bring you back on track and give you a focus.'

Taylor said he was keen to be in the frame for New Zealand's bid for a maiden T20 World Cup title when the men's tournament kicks off in Australia in October. He would also not rule out the next one-day World Cup in India in 2023, having played in the heart-breaking defeat to hosts England in last year's title-decider.

"First and foremost I want to get to next year - the Twenty20 World Cup and then the home summer and then I'll have a good idea on how I'm placed at the end of next summer. "Whether there is still a drive, whether I'm good enough, whether I'm fit enough, and whether I deserve my spot in the side. If I can tick all those, then definitely 2023 is an option."

It will be a party atmosphere for Taylor at the Basin Reserve on Friday, with New Zealand Cricket offering dozens of free tickets for his extended family on the weekend of his sister's wedding. "You always want to do well, and first and foremost the game is more important," he said.

"At the same time you can put extra pressure on yourself. "You've just got to go out and enjoy it and take it as another game. Hopefully I can contribute in any way I can." - Reuters

# Trump set to open world's biggest cricket stadium

AHMEDABAD: US President Donald Trump will inaugurate the world's largest cricket stadium when he arrives in Ahmedabad, the home base of Prime Minister Narendra Modi, on Monday at the start of a two-day visit aimed at smoothing ties strained by trade disputes.

Making his first official trip to the world's largest democracy, Trump is also expected to visit the humble abode of India's independence hero Mahatma Gandhi in Ahmedabad. The leaders of China, Japan and Israel have all visited Ahmedabad since Modi became prime minister. It is the biggest city in Gujarat, the western state where Modi made his mark as chief minister before his Hindu nationalist party swept to power in 2014.

If his Indian hosts can help it, Trump probably won't see a slum as they've ordered for a 400-metre wall to be built along his route to block the view of where poor people live. Authorities in Ahmedabad expect to spend around 800 million to 850 million Indian rupees (\$11-12 million) on preparations for the visit by the American president that is likely to last around three hours, two government officials with direct knowledge of the plans told Reuters. The sum is equivalent to equivalent to about 1.5% of the annual budget for the home ministry in Gujarat. Security-related costs, with more than 12,000 police officers expected to be deployed, will account for almost half the expense, said the officials, who declined to be named as they are not authorised to speak publicly about the visit. Ahmedabad municipal commissioner Vijay Nehra, the city's top civic official, told Reuters that authorities had already spent around 300 million rupees (\$4.2 million) on widening roads and improving infrastructure around the new cricket stadium.

# **IPL** begins on March 29

**NEW DELHI:** Defending Indian Premier League (IPL) champions Mumbai Indians will host three-time winners Chennai Super Kings in the first match of this year's edition on March 29, the Indian cricket board (BCCI) said yesterday.

The IPL will run six days longer than last year, it added, with the extra days necessitated by the decision to do away with double-headers on Saturdays, limiting them to only Sundays.

While the BCCI revealed the league fixtures it did not disclose the venue of the May 24 final for the eightteam tournament, which begins 11 days after India's

# Hussey hails 'focused and driven' Australia ahead of SA series



JOHANNESBURG: Former Australia batsman Mike Hussey said yesterday he may not know exactly what his title is but he is delighted to be back with the team to help head coach Justin Langer build towards the Twenty20 World Cup on home soil in October.

Hussey is in South Africa with the touring Australian side as they prepare for the start of the three-match Twenty20 International series in Johannesburg on Friday. "I'm not really sure what my title is, whether it is mentor or batting coach," Hussey told reporters yesterday. "But I don't really mind, I just want to get out there and help as much as I can and throw a lot of balls."

Hussey previously worked as a batting consultant for Australia at the T20 World Cup in 2016, and Langer has asked him to return ahead of the next edition of the tournament. "I'm hoping to stay involved with the T20 team right through the World Cup," Hussey says. "It is a fantastic environment, I really like that the guys work so hard and there is some real excitement about the tournament that will be on our doorstep.

'They are focused and driven to do well and motivated to put in the performances that will get them into that squad." Hussey said he had mostly been working with the middle order batsman and welcomed the return of Matthew Wade, whose form in the domestic Big Bash T20 competition earned him the chance for a first international appearance in the format since 2016.

"I played with Matty Wade, and I really like the place he is in right now. I think he has a great understanding of his game. "I am rapped that he has got an opportunity and I really hope that he can take it and cement his place in the middle order."

He expects the side to hit the ground running with

the recent completion of the Big Bash, but said South Africa would also be in form after their tight 2-1 series loss to England.

"A lot of the guys are coming off Big Bash, so they have been playing really good cricket. I think it is going to be a tough challenge though; South Africa are a real-

ly good team and are coming off some tough cricket against England."

Following the series start in Johannesburg, the teams move to Port Elizabeth on Sunday and finally Cape Town on Feb. 26. They then clash in three One-Day International matches. — Reuters

Trump may also visit the famous Taj Mahal monument in the city of Agra, and all leave for police officers in that city has been canceled, according to a document seen by Reuters. — Reuters

### Australia win final WCup warm up but England smashed

ADELAIDE: Australia's women warmed up for their Twenty20 World Cup defence yesterday with a battling win over South Africa, but England suffered a setback in a shock 10-wicket hammering by Sri Lanka.

Playing their last game before the tournament starts on Friday, Australian skipper Meg Lanning and deputy Rachael Haynes steered them to a four-wicket victory with three balls to spare in Adelaide.

Lanning (47 from 36 balls) and Haynes (39 from 35) put on a 90-run stand after they slumped to 35 for four in reply to South Africa's 147 for six. "We're as ready as we can be. Now it's just about going out there and putting it on the park," Lanning said after a build up that saw the four-time World Cup winners beat India and England in a tri-series, but also lose to both sides.

England's final preparations couldn't have gone any worse. Heather Knight won the toss in Adelaide and batted first but her team never got going, struggling to 122 for 9, with Sri Lanka's spinners inflicting the damage.

In reply, Sri Lankan skipper Chamari Atapattu smashed 78 from 50 balls with fellow opener Hasini Perera unbeaten on 29 as they reached their target without loss inside 13 overs. "It was a disappointing performance, but I'd rather we got it out of the way ahead of the World Cup," said Knight. "We're still in a good place."

In Brisbane, India warmed up for a tilt at a first ever World Cup crown by beating 2016 champions the West Indies by two runs. They set the West Indies a very makable 108 to win after being restricted to 107 for eight.

But Stafanie Taylor's side couldn't reach the target, managing just 105 for seven in their 20 overs. The 10-team World Cup starts in Sydney on Friday when Australia face India. — AFP

# Hamilton, Messi share men's Laureus award

football superstar Lionel Messi shared the Laureus sportsman of the year award at Monday's ceremony in Berlin.

Hamilton, 35, a six-time world champion and Barcelona star Messi, 32, share the award for their achievements in 2019. This is the first time a footballer has won the award and also the first occasion in the event's 20-year history when the jury reached a tied decision.

"I am honoured to be the first to win this award being a sportsperson coming from a team sport," Messi said from Barcelona via a video message. US gymnastics superstar Simone Biles, who won five titles at the 2019 world championships in Stuttgart to leave her with a record 25 world gold medals, took the Laureus sportswoman of the year award for the third time.

"It means the world to me, this is my third Laureus award and I'm really grateful," said Biles in a video message. South Africa, who won the 2019 World Cup, were named team of the year, beating Jurgen Klopp's Liverpool and the US women's football team.

Springboks captain Siya Kolisi was joined on stage by six South African team-mates to collect the trophy. "With this group of players, we came together for the love of the game with one goal and fought so hard for each other," Kolisi told the audience in Berlin.

"We gave everything we had to win the trophy and hopefully inspire kids for generations to come."

BERLIN: Formula One champion Lewis Hamilton and Snowboarding sensation Chloe Kim, 19, won the action sportsperson award after taking gold medals at the world championship halfpipe and X Games super pipe.

Oksana Masters, who was born with limb impairments caused by radiation from Chernobyl and was later adopted in the US, won the sportsperson with a disability award. The 30-year-old won five gold medals and a silver at the world para nordic skiing championships and also took the cross-country overall world cup title.

She also won silver medals in the road race and time trial H5 at the para cycling road world championships. Colombia's Egan Bernal, 22, who became the youngest rider to win the Tour de France for 110 years, won the breakthrough award after winning the world's top cycling race in what was only his second three-week classic event.

"I'm really happy, this is a big result for me in my career," the Colombian said in a video. German F3 driver Sophia Floersch scooped the comeback of the year award for racing once again at the Macau Grand Prix last November, a year after a crash on the same circuit left her with a spinal fracture.

Indian cricketer Sachin Tendulkar won the public vote for the top sporting moment over the last 20 years for leading his country to victory at the 2011 World Cup at the sixth attempt. German basketball star Dirk Nowitzki was recognised with the lifetime achievement award. — AFP

# Leipzig 'keeper **Gulacsi relishes Tottenham test**

LEIPZIG: Having joined RB Leipzig when they were still in Germany's second division, Peter Gulacsi has seen the club grow from Bundesliga new boys and on to a first appearance in the Champions League knockout stage. The Hungarian goalkeeper is relishing Wednesday's last 16, first leg when the ambitious eastern German club, bankrolled by energy drinks giants Red Bull, face last season's beaten finalists Tottenham Hotspur in London.

"It's a new experience to play against an English side. It's a big opportunity and a big test," Gulacsi told AFP. "If we have a good day, maybe we could surprise them." While Jose Mourinho's Tottenham sit fifth in the Premier League, Leipzig head to London in the midst of a battle at the top of the Bundesliga with Bayern Munich, with whom they drew 0-0 earlier this month.

"It's going to be two difficult games, but this is what you look forward to," Gulacsi said of the Spurs tie. "These are the games we have been fighting to play in."

The last-16 showdown is the latest step in Leipzig's

rise over the last decade since starting in Germany's fifth tier in 2009. Gulacsi joined from Red Bull Salzburg in 2015, and the club won promotion to the top tier in his first season.

In their debut campaign in the elite, Leipzig shook up the established order, briefly going top before finishing second behind Bayern. Now they are enjoying their second Champions League campaign, with ambitious 32-year-old coach Julian Nagelsmann steering Leipzig to the last 16 for the first time in his debut season in charge.

Leipzig's success has been built around a core of key players. Along with Gulacsi, Sweden winger Emil Forsberg, Denmark's Yussuf Poulsen, Austrian winger Marcel Sabitzer and Germany full-backs Lukas Klostermann and Marcel Halstenberg played for the club in the second division and have gone on to establish themselves at international level.

"If you look at the team, there has been a lot of changes, but we had a group of six, seven players who provided the base we have built on," said Gulacsi. "The team has grown, the city is buzzing about football.

"It's a continuity, we are trying to go step by step and I am happy to be part of that." Today's game will be a return to England for Gulacsi, who left home-town club MTK Budapest to join Liverpool in 2007 as a raw 17-vear-old. He spent six years with Liverpool, yet never made a competitive appearance with Pepe Reina the incumbent goalkeeper. Instead, Gulacsi learnt his trade

on loan at lower-league sides Hereford United, Tranmere Rovers and Hull City.

"I managed to be on the bench 52 times at Liverpool and I never played a game in the first team but I learned a lot on my loans," said Gulacsi.

"When you are at a big club like Liverpool, you know it is not easy to get into the first team. "I still gave my best, but Pepe Reina was one of the top three 'keepers in the whole world at that time.

"It was still a great experience to train with the first team, to learn from those players." Gulacsi was 23 when he left in 2013 to join Salzburg, winning the Austrian league and cup double in each of his two seasons there.

Today, while Gulacsi tries to keep a Spurs attack deprived of Harry Kane at bay, he will also hope Germany striker Timo Werner can wreak havoc at the other end. Werner has 20 league goals this season and three in the Champions League.

"In terms of his first few steps, Timo is one of the quickest players in Europe," said Gulacsi. "He has also stepped up his game tactically this season and his scoring form is simply superb.'

Gulacsi turns 30 on May 6, when he hopes Leipzig will still be in the running for the German title. They are currently second, a point behind Bayern. "It would probably be the biggest moment in my career and a fantastic achievement," he said of the prospect of Leipzig becoming champions. "But we still have a lot of work to do." —AFP

# Lampard asks for **Chelsea fight after United defeat**

LONDON: Chelsea manager Frank Lampard told his side the "fight starts now" for a place in the Champions League next season after suffering a 2-0 smash and grab defeat at the hands of Manchester United on Monday.

The Blues had two goals disallowed by VAR reviews and were furious Harry Maguire was not sent-off for an off-the-ball kick out at Michy Batshuayi before he headed in United's second goal after Anthony Martial's opener.

Lampard cut a frustrated figure as the flaws in both boxes which have seen his side win just four of their last 14 league games were exposed once more against ordinary opposition.

"The fight starts now," said Lampard. "It's not worth me going on about it now but the reality was there for us to see. "If we're not going to take chances then we're not going to win games. When you dominate large periods you have to take your chances." Victory lifts United up to seventh and within three points of Chelsea in fourth, while fifth could now even be good enough to qualify for the Champions League next season pending Manchester City's appeal again a two-season ban from European competition. However, even United boss Ole Gunnar Solskjaer admitted he had not been impressed by the visitors' performance. "When you win 2-0 here you are delighted," said Solskjaer. "Then again I didn't think we played well, particularly with the ball in the first half. We were cumbersome, slow, passing wasn't great but we got the first goal then we hung in there." Lampard made a bold call before kick-off by again dropping the most expensive goalkeeper in football history, Kepa Arrizabalaga, to the bench in favour of the 38-year-old Willy Caballero. Batshuayi also started with Tammy Abraham ruled out by injury and Lampard's anger at missing out on a striker in the January window was borne out by a poor night for the misfiring Belgium forward. But the course of the game could have been very different had Maguire not escaped unpunished for kicking Batshuayi after the two collided in front of the dugouts. "I know I caught him and I felt he was going to fall on me and my natural reaction was to straighten my leg to stop him," said Maguire. "I apologised to him and it was nice that the referee saw sense."

# AC Milan eye Euro spots after **Torino win**

NILAN: AC Milan closed in on the European places in Serie A after Ante Rebic fired them to a 1-0 win over Torino on Monday. Rebic swept home Samu Castillejo's low pull back in he 25th minute to consign to draw Milan level on 35 points with Hellas Verona, who currently occupy the final Europa League spot on goal difference.

Rebic's winning goal was his sixth in seven games in all competitions, a run that comes after failing to score at all in the first half of the season. The Croatian's strike helped the hosts bounce back from last week's derby disappointment against Inter Milan to continue a positive run under coach Stefano Pioli that also saw them unlucky not to beat Juventus in the Coppa Italia semi-final first leg last week.

They have lost just once since the turn of the year — to title-chasing Inter — and are playing well enough to aim for European football next season. However the Champions League will likely be beyond them thanks to the 10-point gap between them and fourth-placed Atalanta.

Torino meanwhile are inching closer to the relegation zone after their fifth straight defeat, a slump that shows little sign of ending. They are just five points from the drop despite bringing in Moreno Longo to replace Walter Mazzarri earlier this month. — AFP

# Kurdish women win big with Syria title

AMUDA: Samar Sheikh's neighbours used to tell her football was not for girls but the criticism stopped when her team won the very first women's championship in Syria. The 20-year-old also finished top scorer at the end of a season that saw teams from all over Syria face off over weeks before the final that was held in late January in Damascus.

"I've been hooked on football since I was little," says Sheikh during a training session in Amuda, a town in northeastern Syria where part of the autonomous Kurdish administration is headquartered.

"I used to watch my brothers play and I've watched a lot of games," she says, as her teammates, all wearing fluorescent bibs, jog behind the coach on the artificial grass of the covered pitch. The young Kurdish woman, sweat pearling down her face and her ruffled hair in a ponytail, recounts how she started playing when she was 15 but had to stop "because of the criticism from her family and neighbours.'

She came back to it more determined than ever to

overcome social and gender prejudice and it all paid off when it was with cheers that a crowd greeted her and her team off the bus after winning the national trophy.

With their medals around their necks, Sheikh and her teammates even went on a celebratory tour of Amuda, joined in dance by residents congratulating them and asking for selfies. "I couldn't believe it," she says. "Seeing all these people in the street to celebrate our victory."

After a week-long break the team has resumed training for two hours a day. Dalaf Hussein faced the same challenges as a teenage girl trying to live her passion for football in northeastern Syria. Plastered on the walls of her room are posters of her favourite players, including one of Portuguese legend and Real Madrid star Cristiano Ronaldo.

"Passersby used to bother us when they saw us play in the street because it was considered a boys' sport, but we never paid attention," she says. Hussein says she also had to deal with her parents' opposition to her playing football.

"But after our victory in the championship, there was no pushback," she says, with a chuffed smile. Syrian society is still largely patriarchal and conservative but women enjoy greater gender equality in areas under Kurdish control.

Hussein says she hopes football will continue to grow in her region. "Many girls have come to sign up since our victory," she says. —AFP

The French striker thought he had given Chelsea a lifeline with a near post header, but was ruled offside after a VAR review. —AFP





# Late Leandro stunner breaks Perth hearts

**TOKYO:** Leandro's fine late strike gave FC Tokyo a 1-0 victory over debutants Perth Glory, as former Arsenal forward Park Chu-young scored FC Seoul's winner against Melbourne Victory in the AFC Champions League vesterday.

In yesterday's later kick-off, Beijing Guoan are the first Chinese side to take part in this year's competition after most clubs from China were barred until April over the coronavirus.

FC Tokyo dominated proceedings against Perth in the Japanese capital, but it was a turgid affair that

looked destined for a goalless draw until Leandro's brilliant winner with eight minutes to go.

The 26-year-old made space on the edge of the box and unleashed a dipping shot that curled inside goalkeeper Liam Reddy's far post.

It made for a disappointing maiden outing for last year's A-League runners-up, whose coach Tony Popovic guided Western Sydney Wanderers to the Asian title in 2014.

In Seoul, Park, 34, struck in the eighth minute to extend Victory's losing streak away to South Korean opposition to 16 games.

Beijing were cleared to play Thailand's Chiangrai United as they have been training outside of China, avoiding stringent travel restrictions imposed on Chinese passport-holders around Asia.

Nearly 1,900 people have now died and more than 72,000 people have been infected by the virus in China, with a swathe of sports events in the region cancelled or postponed. — AFP

# India bars Chinese wrestlers because of coronavirus

**NEW DELHI:** Chinese wrestlers will be unable to take part in the Asian Championships in New Delhi this week after being denied visas because of the coronavirus outbreak, an official said. India's government has suspended e-visas for Chinese nationals due to the deadly virus that has claimed more than 1,800 lives since spreading from its epicentre in the central city of Wuhan.

"They are not coming. Of course health concerns remain a big reason and the coronavirus outbreak is deadly," Wrestling Federation of India assistant secretary Vinod Tomar told AFP. A Chinese Federation spokesperson was quoted as saying on the governing body's United World Wrestling (UWW) website: "The wrestlers are disappointed for sure."

Japanese world champions Kenichiro Fumita and Risako Kawai are among top wrestlers taking part. India's sports minister Kiren Rijiju said the denial of visas would not normally be allowed but there were exceptions for an extraordinary health crisis.

"We can't deny visa to citizens of any country because it is a part of the Olympic charter. We try to keep sports away from politics," Rijiju told reporters. "But where there is health concern or any technical issue, there are separate provisions for that."

The Asian Championships, which provide UWW ranking points that count towards seedings at this year's Tokyo Olympics, began yesterday and run until February 23. — AFP
