Xi warns of 'grave' situation as China rushes to build hospitals

Virus toll hits 41 • Kuwait issues travel warning for Hong Kong, Macau

WUHAN, China: Chinese President Xi Jinping warned yesterday that China was facing a "grave" situation as authorities took more drastic steps to halt the spread of a virus that has killed 41 people and is overwhelming hospitals at the epicenter of the health emergency. The world's most populous country scrambled to contain the disease that has already infected nearly 1,300 people, building a second field hospital to relieve overwhelmed medical facilities and closing more travel routes as the country marked the Lunar New Year holiday.

After more countries reported cases, Xi said at a Communist Party leadership meeting on the disease that China was "faced with the grave situation of an accelerating spread of the new coronavirus" but that the country will "definitely be able to win the battle",

according to state media. The country's most important celebration has been all but cancelled for at least 56 million people as authorities expanded travel bans across central Hubei province to try and contain the spread of the virus.

Kuwait yesterday advised its nationals against nonessential travel to Hong Kong and Macau. Hong Kong's government has put in place the highest state of emergency in response to the outbreak of the coronavirus, closing all primary and secondary schools after five cases of the pneumonia-causing virus were reported, said Salah Al-Seif, Kuwait's consul general in Hong Kong and Macau. Kuwait's General Consulate in Hong Kong has set up an emergency hotline at 0085298211669 in case urgent assistance is needed, he said.

Kuwait summons Iran envoy over Soleimani claim

KUWAIT: Kuwait's foreign ministry summoned Iran's ambassador Friday after a high-level Iranian official implicated the state in the US drone attack that killed top general Qasem Soleimani, official news agency KUNA reported. Rescuers scramble to find survivors after Turkey quake kills 22

ELAZIG, Turkey: Rescue workers raced against time yesterday to find survivors under the rubble after a powerful earthquake claimed 22 lives and left more than 1,200 injured in eastern Turkey. The magnitude 6.8

quake struck on Friday evening, with its epicenter in the small lakeside town of Sivrice in Elazig province, and was felt across neighboring countries.

President Recep Tayyip Erdogan cancelled a speech in Istanbul and headed to Elazig where he attended the funeral of a woman and her son, which he described as a "test" for Turkey. "We are doing everything we can as the state and nation, and we will continue to do so. Our efforts at all rescue sites will continue," he said at the funeral, adding state house developer TOKI would make sure no one was left "hungry or in the open".

First robotic radical nephrectomy conducted at Kuwait's Jaber Hospital

Health minister forms panel on vaping

KUWAIT: Jaber Al-Ahmad Hospital successfully conducted a radical nephrectomy using a robot; the first operation of its kind in Kuwait, the hospital announced yesterday. The da Vinci robotic surgery was done successfully with the participation of the urology surgery unit team at the hospital, said Dr Saad Al-Abdelhadi Al-Dousary, Senior Urologist and Head of Urology Surgery Department at Jaber Hospital. This is the seventh robotic surgery to be performed at Jaber Hospital, Dr Dousary said, adding that six other surgeries were previously performed to treat medical cases including obesity, urinary tracts diseases, colon, general surgery and others under the supervision of the head of surgery department Dr Salman Al-Sabah. Among robotic surgeries that can be done "with high precision" are radical prostatectomy, radical nephrectomy, cystectomy, transforming urinary tract pathways, and excision of the adrenal gland tumor, Dr Dousary said.

Meanwhile, Urologist Dr Mohammad Abdelmohsen Al-Ghanem said the robotic surgery allows patients to leave hospital within 48 hours and resume regular activity. "The robot technology allows doctors to have more control because they can reach areas where

doctors find difficulties reaching normally," he said, pointing out that the robot itself is controlled by the surgeon. "They do not operate on their own, but rather provide more accuracy," he said, adding that they only create a less than 1 cm opening in patients for the operation.

Separately, Minister of Health Sheikh Dr Bassel Al-Sabah has ordered the formation of a panel to examine reports issued by the US Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) on illnesses and deaths resulting from vaping. The Ministry of Health said in a statement yesterday that the committee, headed by the assistant undersecretary for public health Dr Buthaina Al-Mudhaf, will look into these reports, patients' cases and prospected upgrade of diagnosis and treatment policies and protocols at the national level. It indicated that the commission would also consider placing regulations on marketing and transactions. Moreover, its jurisdictions cover regular examination of technical reports, documents and recommendations, issued from meetings of signatory States of the WHO Framework Convention on Tobacco Control, international agencies and centers specialized in regulating e-smoking. It will also seek to upgrade national policies on tobacco. in line with Kuwait's adherence to the WHO convention.

Shame on women's rights



have become convinced that we in Kuwait are witnessing a sharp decline in the rights of women. Unfortunately, as the world moves forward, we are regrettably and shamefully moving backwards.

The health guardianship of minor or incompetent patients has caused social and human problems, as questions arise in light of preventing the mother from gning consent forms to approve surgical intervention for her children. This right is limited exclusively to the father, then the grandfather, sons and brothers.

As a citizen, wife, and mother, I raise a warning flag about the danger of continuing this situation that may threaten the lives of young children and cause great suffering to the mother, who finds herself unable to do anything when her children need even the most basic surgical procedures. We are in 2020, people, and this issue is serious as any of us can fall victim to such a situation.

While most opinions concur on the importance of "informed consent" for surgical intervention or any medical procedure that is required, however no country prevents the mother from signing the form, as is the case in Kuwait, which makes it practical to give permission to the doctor for any necessary surgical intervention for her children, in the event of her husband's absence for any reason. However, the problem is more complicated in the case of a foster mother or divorcee who could be at odds with her ex-husband. The right to custody also does not entitle her to sign a consent form to agree to the surgical operation on her child - rather, she must obtain the consent of the guardian or a court ruling, and here the question arises:

Can the child be able to endure extreme pain, for example, until the mother goes to the department of legal affairs and investigations at the ministry of health and brings proof that the father is not present (death certificate, health custody, letter from the prison or authorization if the father is outside the country) to get a "no objection" for surgical intervention?! How much time would this take? Days or more in case of public holidays, and these are not few here.

Ultimately, the crisis is not limited to the mother and children, but extends also to the medical staff that want to legally protect themselves, and thus turns into a legal problem. I believe that this issue requires all concerned parties to sit together to put in place a comprehensive framework that is free of gaps.

Recently, I read an article by a woman about her friend's husband. She said she saw her friend crying one day after she rushed her ill husband to the hospital. He was in urgent need for an operation, but it was not possible for her to sign his papers, because at that time her son and uncles were outside the country. She wondered who was behind this unjust decision to prevent her or other women to sign such papers for their beloved ones.

Therefore, others and I were happy that MP Youssef Al-Fadalah presented a proposal to grant women this mandate in order to eliminate discrimination in such humanitarian situations. But our joy was short-lived, as the health committee rejected the proposal on the justification that it has no basis in law or humanity. Sadly, unjust decisions against women here are usually covered with religion or legal and procedural excuses to create fear and hesitation against the rights of women.

With this article, I hope National Assembly Speaker Marzouq Al-Ghanem - who is known for being supportive of women - stands by his Kuwaiti sisters on this humanitarian issue. I also wish the women ministers and the female deputy in the National Assembly have a clear and speedy stance on this issue. I also hope that women will not elect those who stand against their rights, so that people realize the impact of women and their strength in defending their rights.

Kuwaiti mountaineer climbs world's highest volcanic summit


KUWAIT: Kuwaiti mountaineer Yousef Al-Rifai recorded a new achievement for Kuwait by reaching the highest volcanic summit in the world in Chile, which is 6,893 meters above sea level. In a statement to the press vesterday, Rifai said the summit of the volcano of Ojos Del Salado in Chile is the highest volcanic summit in the world, noting that he is the first Kuwaiti to climb the sixth summit of the seven volcanic peaks in the world. The trip started from the Chilean capital Santiago to take a flight that took an hour and a half to reach the city of Copiapo, north of Chile, which is famous for gold and iron mines, starting point for the world's driest Atacama Desert, where this volcano is located, he added. He pointed out that after arriving in Copiapo; he drove to reach the heart of the desert to adapt to the harsh heights before the actual climbing of the volcano, noting that he climbed other peaks lower than this volcano as a kind of training. Rifai stated that he felt proud after raising the Flag of Kuwait at the highest volcanic summit in the world, expressing his thanks and appreciation to the sponsors of this trip, Kuwait Finance House, Ooredoo and Spark Sports Club. —KUNA

Brown Shrike raises recorded birds in Kuwait to 414

KUWAIT: The Head of the Kuwait Environmental Lens' team Rashed Al-Haji said Friday that the Brown Shrike bird was monitored at the Jahra Nature Reserve, bringing the amount of bird species logged in Kuwait to 414. Haji added that at the start of 2020, the Brown Shrike, one of the small birds from the reserve, was spotted since the last recorded bird detected in Kuwait was in 2019. The Brown Shrike was distinguished by its colors and relatively long tail, which has two feathers on the outskirts, while the male and female are similar in color, he mentioned. He showed that after hunting its prey, it

tortured and skinned it, often leaving its prey hanging while writhing in pain and flying far away, then later pouncing on it to devour it. This bird prefers prominent and high places of tree branches, usually flying down it at a height less than a meter from the earth's surface and when it approached the intended place it rose to it gradually, he pointed out. The Brown Shrike was not present in Arab countries but in East Asia, especially during the summer, migrating in the winter to the south, since going to the Arabian Peninsula at this time was very unnatural and rare, therefore bird enthusiasts are eager to photograph this event, Haji said. They are able to migrate and move over very long distances, about 20,000 kilometers, Haji noted. Environment Public Authority (EPA) was keen to protect creatures of all kinds until the reserves become a safe place to embrace birds, especially with the law prohibiting hunting and setting new laws that deter people from fooling around in the wildlife, he underlined. —KUNA

Kuwait Airways receives A320

KUWAIT: Kuwait Airways has taken delivery of the third plane (A320) after being flown from the Airbus plant in the German city of Hamburg. The KAC Chief Executive Officer, Kamel Al-Awadhi, said in a press release yesterday that the plane, named Wara, was delivered as part of a contract to provide the KAC with up to 15 aircraft of this type. The other planes will be delivered in phases, as part of the Kuwaiti airlines' approach to upgrade the fleet and passengers' services. Awadhi explained that the KAC would be received in addition to the one that has already arrived five other aircraft, including three of the model A-320-New, two A-800-330. All planes that should be provided according to the contract will be in Kuwait by 2026. —KUNA

Efforts to make nursing job more attractive to Kuwaiti staff

Panel meets minister to discuss health services in southern areas

KUWAIT: Ministry of Health's (MoH) nursing services manager Sana Taqaddom said the new nursing staff cadre will be soon approved thanks to efforts exerted by Health Minister Sheikh Dr Bassel Al-Sabah and his keenness on taking care of and encouraging Kuwaiti nurses, adding that future plans have been set to make nursing more attractive to national staff through increments, training courses

Taqaddom said that a two-day conference on 'Innovation and Development in Nursing' will be held under the auspices of Sheikh Bassel on Wednesday, Jan 29 at Jumeirah Hotel. Taqaddom added that a new headquarters for the department will be soon completed, including lecture, seminar and workshop auditoriums for larger numbers of nurses. In another health issue, MoH recently received auditing bodies' approval to import osteoporosis and platelet deficiency drugs at a total cost of KD 1.6 million to supply hospitals and polyclinics soon.

Southern areas

Member of the parliamentary health affairs committee MP Dr Mohammed Al-Huwailah said he had recently met Health Minister Sheikh Dr Bassel Al-Sabah to discuss healthcare services in southern areas and accelerating the execution of Sabah Al-Ahmad City Hospital. Huwailah said the minister said the Sabah Al-Ahmad Hospital project is still being reviewed by the Central Tenders Committee (CTC), adding that the hospital's total services coverage area will be increased from 80,000 sq m to 300,000 sq m due to urban expansion in southern areas, which are currently served by only Adan Hospital.

Huwailah also demanded completing construction at Funaitees polyclinic and providing it with necessary staff and equipment, opening Fintas polyclinic and opening a polyclinic in sector D in Sabah Al-Ahmad

City. Huwailah also demanded increasing Jaber Hospital to full capacity as it is currently working at only 25 percent of its total capacity in order to relieve other overcrowded hospitals, namely Adan.

Health insurance

Official sources at the ministry of social affairs said in a bid to activate the ministry's social responsibility and provide healthcare and welfare, a study is being considered to grant senior citizens and those with special needs the privilege of health insurance. The sources added Minister Ghadeer Aseeri is currently studying giving more privileges to these categories including health insurance, similar to that given to

MPW budget

The Ministry of Public Works (MPW) recently urged the finance ministry to allocate a budget of KD 600 million for its projects in the budget of the new

fiscal year due to commence in April, said informed sources, adding that the finance ministry will only approve KD 450 million. The sources said MPW had sent a long list of the projects to be executed in 2020-2021 and the cost of each project, but it seems that the finance ministry will implement strict austerity measures due to the KD 9 billion deficit declared by Finance Minister Mariam Al-Aqeel, who had urged various ministries to cut expenses on conferences, overseas assignments, training and excellent performance bonuses, which will be limited to less than 20 percent of employees through applying strict conditions.

Fake cops caught

Two Egyptians were arrested for impersonating as police detectives by using police flashers and stopping a citizen to check his ID, said security sources, noting that the two fake police detectives had an argument with the citizen, which blew their cover. A case was filed and further investigations are in progress.

Kuwait extends aid to those in need

KUWAIT: Kuwait continued extending its humanitarian arm throughout the globe, helping those who are in dire need. Early last week, Kuwait Red Crescent Society (KRCS) sent a plane carrying humanitarian aid, to Djibouti to help those affected by the rains and floods. KRCS Director of Disasters Management Department, Youssef Al-Maraj, said that the plane included tents, clothes, water pumps, blankets and first aid bags to help the friendly country to face the effects of the floods that swept the nation recently. The plane departed from Abdullah Al-Mubarak air base carrying 18 tons of humanitarian aid as well as several volunteers, he added. Maraj stressed the full cooperation with Kuwait's Embassy in Djibouti and the Red Crescent Society there in helping to deliver the aid to the affected people. He expressed thanks and gratitude to the Ministry of Defense and the Ministry of Foreign Affairs for helping in sending this plane, stressing KRCS keenness on participating in humanitarian projects.

KRCS sent another relief aid on Wednesday to Djibouti, in collaboration with the Djibouti Red Crescent Society. Maraj said the society's field

team distributed materials and clothes to a village inhabited by 400 families, located in the borders of Djibouti, Somalia and Ethiopia. Maraj explained that the deprived families were chosen based on a field survey conducted by Djibouti's Society, which supervised the distribution of humanitarian aid and reaching beneficiaries. Kuwaiti Ambassador to Djibouti Yousef Al-Qabandi, the embassy staff and numerous volunteers contributed to the distribution of aid to alleviate the suffering as a result of heavy rain and floods that caused damage to property and infrastructure, he mentioned.

The Kuwaiti Al-Najat Charitable Society distributed humanitarian aid to more than 10,000 Syrian refugees in the Turkish city of Sanliurfa. The society's women delegation head, Wadha Al-Blayes stated that their campaign included urgent food distribution for Syrian refugees and organizing a festival for 420 orphans in Turkey. Blayes stressed the society's keenness in organizing several entertaining activities, providing education and allocating awareness programs. In Iraq, Kuwait distributed 60 tons of foodstuffs to poor families in the city of Mosul, provided by the Islamic Charitable Organization. Director of the Barzani Charitable Foundation Mosul office, Razkar Obaid, said that 2,000 food baskets were distributed to the needy families in the city of Mosul. Kuwait also provided aid to a number of schools in order to continue the educational process, as fullyequipped five schools were opened, he added. —KUNA





Virus stills Lunar New Year celebrations

Fears over a deadly new virus mount in China

BEIJING: A woman praying alone in front of shut temple gates was one of the only signs of Lunar New Year observances at Beijing's Lama Temple yesterday, as fears over a deadly new virus mount in China.

The popular Tibetan Buddhist temple, which had more than 80,000 visitors during the holiday last year, is usually packed with crowds queuing to burn incense for good luck. The epicentre of the SARS-like virus is in central China, but it has spread to other regions, prompting authorities as far as the nation's northern capital to close tourist attractions and cancel public events to prevent further contagion from a disease that has killed dozens and infected more than 1,000. Authorities even decided to stop long-distance bus services to and from the capital of 20 million from today as part of efforts to control the spread of the virus, state media reported.

Security guards loitered in front of Beijing's Lama Temple on Lunar New Year, shooing away anyone who lingered for too long. A red sign on the closed front gate said the temple was closed until further notice "in order to

guarantee the physical health of the religious masses and the Buddhist monks."

"It doesn't feel like the New Year," said a 21-year-old woman in a long beige jacket, who only gave her surname Li. Wearing a white surgical mask, Li told AFP she had planned to burn incense at Lama Temple, before realizing it was closed.

In the capital of 20 million, where health authorities have reported at least 39 infected patients, famous landmarks were closed to prevent the virus from spreading, including the historic Forbidden City and a section of the Great Wall.

The Ming Tombs and Yinshan Pagoda are also not open to visitors. Beijing Ditan and Longtan Temple Fairs-held for roughly three decades according to state media-were also cancelled.

In central Hubei province, where the majority of cases have emerged, more drastic measures were taken: travel restrictions have been imposed in cities housing 56 million people. "When we left home, it (the virus) wasn't that serious yet," said a 40-year-old woman, who arrived in Beijing from southern Guangdong province before the closures began. "I am worried, but I also feel like worrying too much is useless," she added. "It's better to face it head-on."

'No point in worrying'

At a shopping district near Beijing's Houhai lake, where tourists buy street food and souvenirs, many restaurants were open on the first day of Spring Festival. The narrow streets were festooned with red lanterns and Chinese flags, while food stalls sold snacks like stinky tofu and sugar-

But there were fewer people than normal, pointed out Huo, a 63-year-old Beijing native who only offered his surname. "There's definitely an impact (from the virus)," he said. "Look at how few people there are."

But when asked whether he was worried about the virus, Huo remained nonchalant.

"In 2003, SARS was much worse," he told AFP, referring to an outbreak that killed nearly 650 people across

mainland China and Hong Kong. "I don't have to wear a mask because everyone else is," joked another man, who had travelled from eastern Shandong province.

"There's no point in worrying," he added. Some tourists also felt they had no choice but to go through with travel plans to Beijing despite the closures and risk of infection.

At the upscale Taikoo Li shopping district, a 26-year-old woman said her hotel refused to refund her booking. "Some people are over-panicking," she told AFP, explaining that some friends were worried about getting infected, even while staying at home.

"The atmosphere is a bit tense this year," agreed another woman, a 47-year-old who gave her surname as Zhang. The situation in Beijing is not as serious as Wuhan, the epicentre of the epidemic, she said, which was put under effective quarantine on Thursday.

Still, "people aren't really going out for gatherings or socializing-a lot has been cancelled," she told AFP, her voice muffled through a blue surgical mask. — AFP

'See the doctor': Fever-hit patients fret in China outbreak city

WUHAN: Trapped in a Chinese city at the center of a deadly viral outbreak, residents who should have been celebrating Lunar New Year lined up to have their temperatures taken by medical staff wearing full-body protective suits. At hospitals across Wuhan in central Hubei province, tense patients with high temperatures turned out in large numbers to get checked as the death toll rose to 26 and the number of cases topped 800, most of them in the city.

The streets were otherwise empty and quiet on Friday, with people ordered not to leave the city and public events cancelled. "I have a fever and cough, so I'm worried that I'm infected," a 35-year-man surnamed Li said at the Wuhan Fifth Hospital.

"I don't know the results (of tests) yet. I'm a bit worried." Most of the people at the hospital were middle-aged or older, and were being given mercury thermometers on arrival. After taking their temperatures themselves from their mouth or armpit, jittery patients handed the instruments back to medical staff decked in full white protective suits with a hood, gloves, face mask and goggles. The thermometers were briefly checked, then dropped in a large metal box.

One nurse took a thermometer from a middle-aged woman, pausing to examine the reading, before quickly turning back to the patient and instructing her to "go and see the doctor".

Contagion fears

At another hospital, 42-year-old Huang Wei said he was worried the situation would worsen if sick people stood next to each other, and that the city of 11 million people would not have the medical capacity to cope with a bigger outbreak. "The medical treatment is not sufficient, the time is too long, and cross-infection may be caused by queueing in the hospital," he said. "This is what we are worried about." Patients waited for several hours for temperature checks at the Red Cross hospital, with many sitting on stools because the queue was so long.

Hubei governor Jiang Chaoliang said in a meeting Friday that hospitals must make sure patients are "admitted in time," according to a statement on the government's website. Wuhan must also "make every effort" to increase isolation places and beds, Jiang said. All staff at both hospitals were in full-body protection, but some of the patients waiting to be checked were not even wearing masks-in defiance of an order by city authorities. At a nearby pharmacy, nervous staff wouldn't allow people inside. Instead, they half-opened the door and passed out what customers were ordering-mostly face masks.

But not all their customers were as cautious. One older lady told AFP she had bought a mask, but didn't wear it because she only shopped at the local market and didn't believe there was a threat there.

'Get out'

A notice outside the Wuhan Fifth Hospital said the facility was to be "entirely used for handling fever patients". "Our hospital will no longer take in patients with other diseases," it read. But despite the high number of infected people, security was low and the hospital was disorderly. A nurse at a temperature station was the only member of staff at the entrance, meaning people could enter and leave from the street freely. The police were noticeably absent across the city, though a few well-covered officers waited in a van near the hospital, wearing plastic suits and face masks.

The Wuhan Health Commission told the

People's Daily that the city was seeing long queues at fever treatment centers, with seven hospitals "fully utilized".

hospitals "fully utilized".

The city is also building a new hospital within a staggering 10 days to deal with the outbreak. Dozens of excavators and trucks were working on the site of the future hospital. The facility will have a capacity of 1,000 beds, and the construction area is 25,000 square meters (270,000 square feet), state media said. For now, the doctors and staff at the Fifth Hospital know their priorities. "Those who are not ill, get out!" a guard called at the entrance to its outpatient department. —AFP

India says nurse in Saudi not infected with China virus

NEW DELHI: An Indian nurse working in Saudi Arabia has tested positive for coronavirus, but with a different strain from the one wreaking havoc in China, Delhi's consulate in Jeddah said Thursday. Quoting Tarik Al-Azraqi, chairman of the Scientific Regional Infection Control Committee in Aseer Region, the consulate tweeted that the woman "is suffering from MERS-CoV & not 2019-NCoV (Wuhan)."

Earlier, India's minister of state for foreign affairs V Muraleedharan had said that the woman had tested positive for the same respiratory virus that has killed 18 people in China.

The woman was one of 100 Indian nurses working in Saudi Arabia who were tested. Media reports said she may have contracted the virus from a colleague from the Philippines. The SARS-like virus that emerged in Wuhan has infected more than 570 people and has been detected in Japan, Hong Kong, Macau, South Korea, Taiwan, Thailand, Vietnam, Singapore and the United States, but not in India or Saudi Arabia. — AFP

3 Iraq protesters killed in clashes as security forces clear streets

Sadr supporters pull out amid crackdown

BAGHDAD: Three protesters were shot dead in Iraq yesterday in clashes with security forces clearing out streets and squares occupied for months by anti-government demonstrators, stoking fears of a wider crackdown. The fresh violence came a day after populist cleric Moqtada Sadr announced he would no longer back the youth-dominated movement, instead holding his own rally in Baghdad to demand US troops

Protesters feared the withdrawal of his support could pave the way for authorities to suppress their movement and by yesterday evening, clashes had broken out between riot police and demonstrators across Iraq. In the southern flashpoint of Nasiriyah, two protesters were shot dead and some 20 wounded.

Another demonstrator was shot dead and more than 40 were wounded in skirmishes in Baghdad, a medical source said. Since early yesterday morning, security forces had been using tear gas and live rounds to clear protest camps in the capital, with an AFP reporter seeing some wielding batons chase a group of young protesters.

A medic told AFP she saw riot police set fire to large tents used as field clinics to treat wounded demonstrators. The city's military command announced it had retaken control of Baghdad's Ahrar Bridge, a flashpoint for clashes between security forces and demonstrators for months.

It also pushed protesters out of Tayaran Square and Mohammad Qasim highway, where new sit-ins this week were intended to pressure authorities into enacting long-awaited reforms. Security forces had not yet entered the main protests camp in Tahrir Square, where young men had deployed carrying black shields made out of metal drums, on which they had painted the words "Tahrir Shield Squad".

Indian govt to end five-month internet blackout in Kashmir

SRINAGAR: Internet services will be partly restored in Indian Kashmir from yesterday, ending a five-and-a half-month government-imposed blackout in the troubled region, but social media will stay offline, local authorities said.

Prime Minister Narendra Modi's government imposed a communications blackout in early August Sadr supporters pull out

Sadr, a militiaman-turned-politician, is notorious for switching political positions with dizzying speed. He backed the protests when they erupted in October and called on the government to resign-even though he controls parliament's largest bloc and other top posts. But last week, he called for a separate rally to demand 5,200 US troops leave Iraq, after a US strike on Baghdad killed top Iraqi and Iranian commanders earlier this month.

Thousands streamed into Baghdad for Friday's rally and while Sadr did not attend, he hailed the turnout and said he would no longer be involved in the antigovernment campaign. The about-face prompted Sadr supporters, who had earned the reputation as the most well-organized demonstrators, to dismantle their camps across the country.

In Hilla, Diwaniyah, Kut, Amarah and the Shiite shrine city of Najaf, tents were stripped down to their metal frames yesterday. In the southern port city of Basra, security forces stormed a protest camp and forcibly dispersed activists overnight, an AFP correspondent reported.

The tents were burned down and municipal staff were seen clearing the charred remains on Saturday to reopen the square. But a crowd of protesters returned in the afternoon to try to resume their rally, clashing with security forces. One young activist in Baghdad accused Sadr of greenlighting a wider crackdown by pulling political cover.

"When your people started leaving, the riot police came at 3:00 am and took the whole (Ahrar) Bridge. Why?" he asked angrily.



34 US troops hurt in recent Iranian strike: Pentagon

WASHINGTON: Nearly three dozen US troops suffered traumatic brain injuries or concussion in this month's Iranian air strike on a military base in Iraq, the Pentagon said on Friday. "Thirty-four total members have been diagnosed with concussions and TBI (traumatic brain injury)," Pentagon spokesman Jonathan Hoffman told reporters.

President Donald Trump had initially said that no Americans were injured in the strike on the Ain al-Asad base in western Iraq on the night of January 7-8 although authorities later reported that 11 troops were injured. Hoffman said that 17 of the victims had been initially transferred to Germany to receive treatment, eight of whom arrived back in the US on Friday.

"They will continue to receive treatment in the United States, either at Walter Reed (military hospital near Washington) or at their home bases," he told a press conference at the Pentagon.

The nine other victims who were flown to Germany "are still undergoing evaluation and treatment there," he added. Seventeen other

troops who were treated in the region have returned to duty in Iraq. The airbase-one of the largest in Iraq, with 1,500 US troops making up the bulk of a coalition presence directly adjacent to thousands of Iraqi forces-was targeted in retaliation for the US killing of top Iranian general Qasem Soleimani in a January 3 drone strike in Baghdad. Democratic lawmakers seized on the announcement to accuse Trump of lying about the strike.

"Though he downplays these injuries as 'headaches,' roughly half of all TBIs require surgery and can lead to lifelong disabilities," said congresswoman Debbie Wasserman Schultz of Florida.

Rhode Island Senator Jack Reed, the Ranking Member of the Armed Services Committee, called TBI "a serious matter." "It is not a 'headache,' and it's plain wrong for President Trump to diminish their wounds. ... He owes them an apology," Reed said.

At a rally in New Hampshire, Joe Biden, a frontrunner to challenge Trump in this year's election, said the president "brushed off" the troops' injuries. "I find it, quite frankly, disgusting," Biden, a former vice president, said. —AFP

Germany, Turkey call for lasting Libya ceasefire

ISTANBU: Germany's Chancellor Angela Merkel and Turkish President Recep Tayyip Erdogan called Friday for the fragile truce in Libya to be turned into a lasting ceasefire, during a visit by the German leader to Istanbul. Erdogan warned the conflict in Libya risked "chaos (that) will affect all the Mediterranean basin".

"Efforts need to be made to turn the fragile truce into a solid and permanent ceasefire," Merkel said at a joint press conference. Eastern Libyan forces under strongman Khalifa Haftar have been battling since April to seize Tripoli from the UN-recognized Government of National Accord, which is supported by Turkey. "I hope the Haftar side will take positive steps," Merkel said.

World powers have stepped up efforts in recent weeks to find a political solution, but rocket attacks on Tripoli's airport this week threatened resumed fighting.

Erdogan accused Haftar of showing "no intention for reconciliation" and criticised his failure to sign the ceasefire document during an international conference in Berlin on Sunday.

"Haftar has not signed it but only verbally accepted it," said Erdogan. "We do not see this as full acceptance." Erdogan and Merkel also inaugurated a new campus for the Turkish-German University in Istanbul, which opens at a time of warming relations between the two countries.

Democrats wrap up case against Trump in historic impeachment trial

Polls show Americans appear evenly split on impeachment move

WASHINGTON: Donald Trump's lawyers prepared to his 2020 reelection effort, Democratic impeachment deliver his first full-throated defense in the Senate's historic impeachment trial, after Democratic prosecutors spent three days making their case for the US president's removal from office.

Capping 24 total hours of arguments, Democrats told the 100 senators that Trump abused the power of the presidency in pressuring Ukraine to launch investigations that would help him politically, and then sought to block efforts by Congress to investigate. Democrats said they had met that burden of proof, as lead House impeachment manager Adam Schiff warned that Trump would remain an "imminent threat" to American democracy if he stays in power.

"This is Trump first, not America first," congressman Schiff told the chamber. "I ask you, I implore you," he added, addressing Republicans who hold the power to allow witnesses to testify, against Trump's wishes. "Give America a fair trial," Schiff said. "She's worth it." Trump has signalled he remains in tight control of his party, with many Senate Republicans expressing public support for the president despite a vigorous, comprehensive case outlining his misconduct.

"I don't believe anything they've said so far is impeachable," Senator Rick Scott told reporters.

"I'm looking forward to the White House tomorrow starting to set the record straight, because this has just been partisan." Trump's team begin their defense at 10:00 am (1500 GMT) Saturday, a timeslot which Trump, a former reality television star, referred to in a tweet as "Death Valley in T.V." His side's arguments will continue Monday and Tuesday, before the chamber turns to questioning and then votes on whether to hear from witnesses, something Democrats have sought from the start.

Trump's defense will be "much more concise" and "easier to understand" than the prosecution arguments, Republican Senator Mike Braun told Fox News. Democrats argued that Trump's refusal to allow top officials to testify and to supply subpoenaed documents to the Ukraine investigation supported the second charge against him, obstruction of Congress.

Trump blocked the executive branch from responding to 71 specific requests for documents, including five subpoenas, related to his pressure on Kiev to help

manager Val Demings told senators. Trump also prevented 12 current and former administration officials, most of them subpoenaed, from testifying to the investigation, she said. "President Trump's obstruction of the impeachment inquiry was categorical, indiscriminate and historically unprecedented," Demings said.

'Absolute power corrupts'

She said Congress could not afford to allow Trump to reject its powers in such a wholesale manner.

"Executive power without any sort of restraint, without oversight, and without any checks and balances, is absolute power," she told the Senate hearing. "And we know what has been said about absolute power. Absolute power corrupts, absolutely." On Twitter, Trump dismissed the entire process. "The Radical Left, Do Nothing Democrats have gone crazy," he tweeted. "They know it's a con, but just can't sell it! Public strongly against Impeachment." Americans appear about evenly split on whether Trump should be impeached and removed. Several polls show a healthy majority want the Senate to subpoena key witnesses for Trump's trial.

Fight over subpoenas

Closure of the Democrats' opening arguments paves the way for Trump's team to urge acquittal in only the third ever impeachment trial of a US president. Trump's clearance is virtually assured: Senate Republicans hold a 53-47 majority, and a vote by 67 senators is required for conviction and removal.

Democrats were hoping however to woo some Republicans to embrace their arguments that the Senate should subpoena four current and former White House officials with direct knowledge of Trump's Ukraine machinations. There were hints that at least two or three Republicans were considering supporting the subpoenas, though none had committed. But without four crossovers, analysts were predicting that Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell, a key Trump defender, would be able to bring the trial to a vote on the charges by late next week, and see Trump soon exculpated on a party-line vote.



'Rebut and refute'

If Democrats gain support for subpoenas, Republican leaders threatened to demand their own witnesses and call Democratic presidential hopeful Joe Biden and his son Hunter to testify, because their connections to Ukraine had been at the heart of Trump's scheme to tarnish his election rivals. Trump and McConnell also suggested the president would claim executive privilege to reject the subpoenas, which would lead to court challenges and ensure that the trial could go on for weeks more.

Neither party relishes that thought as the battle ahead of November elections intensifies. The prosecution showed senators scores of videos, internal documents and extensive witness testimony to lay out their case that Trump abused his powers.

Before a national television audience, Democrats detailed how Trump flagrantly undertook last year to force Kiev to help him tarnish Biden. Trump defense lawyer Jay Sekulow said they would open their reply by putting on an "affirmative case" that would "rebut and refute" those arguments. —AFP

Brexit will not affect intel cooperation: EU official

ZAGREB: Brexit will not negatively affect cooperation between the intelligence services in Europe, the EU's anti-terrorism coordinator said. "The exchange of information is not impacted," Gilles de Kerchove said on the sidelines of a meeting of EU interior ministers in Zagreb on Friday. Cooperation between the intelligence services is already "outside the institutional framework of the" EU, and non-members Norway and Switzerland are already part of it, he told AFP. Britain will also be represented within this framework after it leaves the European Union on January 31. He said that the issue is more whether if, and in what form, London will continue to have access to EU police data.

Britain shares intelligence through the Schengen Information System (SIS) for law enforcement purposes, although it is not part of the passport-free Schengen zone. In recent years, the SIS information base has become an important tool for tracking jihadists entering Europe from Syria and Iraq. De Kerchove was not able to say how the EU could continue to cooperate with Britain in regard to the SIS.

But "it is impossible for a non-EU member to have the (same) degree of intimacy as that of an EU member." The question should be resolved in talks between London and Brussels on their future relationship, expected to begin in February. De Kerchove said the EU has worked in close cooperation with the US on law enforcement matters and "it would be absurd that our geographically close neighbor finds itself in an inferior situation to that of the Americans, particularly in the fight against terrorism." The Belgian EU official also expressed concern over the situation in Iraq and Syria.

He said recent developments on the ground could lead the Islamic State group to "rebuild" after the defeat of its caliphate. A pullout of US troops "would certainly weaken the capacity of the Iraqi army to fight what remains of" the IS. He also said the fate of some 5,500 IS fighters has not been sufficiently clarified.

"A good number" of them have already returned home, around 600 are in prisons in the region and at least one quarter are dead. But the number of dead is probably higher as many jihadists have been killed in battles for the caliphate but authorities have not received confirmation. —AFP

Mass evictions prompt protests as housing crisis mounts in Nigeria

LAGOS: The men in naval uniforms charged into the Nigerian waterfront village of Okun Glass in the morning, chased out the residents, then called in the bulldozers.

De facto village leader, 75-year-old Dauda Musa, said he fled as the men fired guns into the air. "They demolished our homes," he said, standing in the rubble of what was once home to 3,000 people down the coast from the megacity Lagos. Nigeria's navy said it had moved in to clear an illegal settlement and accused some of the residents of vandalizing nearby pipelines to steal crude. "This operation was not conducted in secrecy," naval commander Thomas

Musa said his fellow villagers were

farmers and fishermen, not thieves. And rights groups say the raid on Jan. 3 was part of a much wider trend where the government, backed by the military, clears informal settlements to make way for luxury housing and other developments. The accusations and counteraccusations highlight an increasingly fraught confrontation between officials, activists and small communities, exacerbated by the dramatic expansion of Nigeria's cities, most of all Lagos - a coastal giant that dwarfs the capital Abuja inland. "There has been persistent evictions across Lagos. Dozens of communities on the island have been evicted," Akinrolabu Samuel, a campaigner with the Nigeria Slum/Informal Settlement Federation, said at a rally against the evictions this week. "It's because of real estate," he added. "It's for real estate development."

Housing crisis

Around 600,000 new people arrive in Lagos every year, according to the stats group BudgIT, many of them pouring into ramshackle settlements, joining thousands of others impoverished fami-

Royal runaways' media war follows them to Canada

LONDON: Prince Harry and his wife Meghan may have quit Britain for a quieter life in Canada but their battle with the media has followed them to the new

Harry believes "powerful forces" in Britain's tabloids are waging a ruthless propaganda war to vilify his US former actress wife-and he is hitting back through the lawyers.

Having struggled with media scrutiny since their May 2018 wedding, the Duke and Duchess of Sussex abandoned their royal roles this month in a bid for a calmer and more independent life.

But their bombshell departure has made them even more of a story-and media, including paparazzi photographers, have now flocked to their Vancouver Island getaway.

Their lawyers have already issued warnings to the press over pictures of Meghan out walking the dogs near their luxury seafront home. After a slew of negative stories in the British press, the couple are try-

ing to seize greater control of the narrative. But they are not shunning all publicity-far from it. The Sussexes will keep working with their non-royal patronages, but now intend to work with hand-picked media only.

Meghan has already made a couple of visits to women's charities in nearby Vancouver, while they continue posting content on Instagram, where they have 11 million followers. Their success in becoming financially independent from the monarchy through creating their own commercial income will largely depend on them remaining hot property.

More evictions feared in India as citizenship law is enforced

200 homes demolished in Bengaluru informal settlement

MUMBAI: Days after nearly 200 homes were demolished in an informal settlement in the southern Indian city of Bengaluru, human rights groups and slum dwellers said they expected more such evictions as a new citizenship law is enforced in the country. Police and municipal officials said the homes were built illegally on state land, and that residents were undocumented migrants from Bangladesh. The residents said they were migrants from other Indian states, and that they were evicted without

The Karnataka state high court has prohibited further evictions, and asked the municipal corporation and the police to respond to its queries on the eviction by Jan. 29. Human rights groups said it was an outcome of tensions around India's new citizenship law, which came into effect on Jan. 10 and lays out a path for citizenship for six religious minorities in neighboring mostly-Muslim countries - Pakistan, Afghanistan and Bangladesh.

Critics say that the omission of Muslims is discriminatory, and that the Citizenship Amendment Act (CAA), as well as a planned National Register of Citizens (NRC), target poor Muslims and others who do not have sufficient documentation. Migrant workers are particularly vulnerable, as they often live in informal settlements, said Isaac Selva, founder of Slum Jagatthu, a non-profit magazine on slum dwellers in Bangalore.

"Bangalore is full of migrant workers, and a large number of daily wage workers tend to live in slums. Not everyone has ID papers," he told the Thomson Reuters

Foundation. "We think more such evictions will take place because of the CAA and NRC, because authorities are being told these people do not have a right to be here." Nearly 2 million people - including Hindus - were left off a list of citizens released in Assam last year for failing to have adequate documentation, after a years-long exercise to check illegal immigration from Bangladesh.

On Wednesday, India's top court gave Prime Minister Narendra Modi's government four weeks to respond to 144 petitions challenging the constitutional validity of the Citizenship Amendment Act, which has ignited protests across the country. "A large majority of people living homeless and in informal settlements do not have government-issued documents," said Shivani Chaudhry, executive director of non-profit Housing and Land Rights Network in Delhi.

"The current climate in the country has fuelled fears that the lack of adequate documents among large sections of India's urban and rural poor could lead to evictions and destruction of their homes and property," she said. The rapid growth of Indian cities, combined with unclear land ownership, has triggered the forced eviction of poorer communities over the last two decades, human rights groups say

At least 11 million people in India risk being uprooted from their homes and land as authorities build highways and airports and upgrade cities, according to HLRN, which said more than 200,000 people were forcefully evicted in 2018. There are no official figures on evictions. — Reuters

No qualms for India's hangman before first job of executing rapists

MEERUT: Pawan Kumar feels zero sympathy for the four men he is due to hang next month for a 2012 gang rape and murder that appalled India. "The people who are going to die are like beasts, not humans," the third-generation hangman and father-of-seven told AFP in his tiny flat in the northern town of Meerut.

"They are cruel people and that's why they are going to lose their lives," the 54-year-old said.

The group set to meet their demise before dawn on February 1 — although it may be delayed-were convicted for a brutal crime against Jyoti Singh, a 23-year-old student. They took turns to sexually assault the woman with an iron rod on a bus as it meandered through the streets of Delhi at night. They then dumped her on a road.

She died two weeks later in a Singapore hospital from extensive internal injuries. Angry demonstrations by tens of thousands of people broke out across the vast South Asian nation, sparking soul-searching about the plight of Indian women and leading to heavier sentences for sex crimes.

Grisly details

Five people were convicted. One, a minor, was found guilty and spent three years in a juvenile detention center. A sixth, the ringleader of the group, died in jail before the case concluded-officially by suicide. For the remaining men, very few in India have expressed misgivings about their fate. Indeed, celebrations are expected to mark their executions and Indian media have been gleefully reporting grisly details about the preparations at Delhi's Tihar Jail.

Banana will be smeared on the execution ropes to soften them and ensure a smooth and quick hanging, and the men reportedly broke down when their necks were measured for the noose. Almost 400 people are on death row in India, but no-one has been executed since 2015. Kumar has been in high demand for media interviews, and AFP's allotted 20 minutes ended abruptly when an alarm on his mobile phone signaled time was up. "I have people from India and abroad who want to talk to me. You're not the only ones," he said as his armed bodyguard looked on.

'Guru' grandfather

Kumar comes from generations of hangmen but this will be his first execution. His grandfather, who he fondly describes as his "guru", hanged former prime minister Indira Gandhi's assassins and two men over a notorious 1982 kidnap and murder.

Kumar complains that his stipend of 5,000 rupees (\$70) a month is hardly enough to support his family, forcing him to look to others, including the media, for "help". But he says the adoration he expects to bask in from India's 1.3 billion people after the coming executions will go some way to compensate. "People around me, including my family, have always treated me well, but after this execution, I'm certain respect for me will increase," he said.

And he has no qualms about the job he does, which he expects his sons to continue, nor about the effectiveness of capital punishment. "Crimes will decrease only when there are executions. You give them life imprisonment, they appeal and they come out only to commit more crimes," he said. — AFP

Duterte threatens to end US military pact over visa row

MANILA: Philippine President Rodrigo Duterte has threatened to end a pact key to annual war games with American troops if the US does not restore the travel visa of an official who oversaw his drug war. It is the latest in a long line of Duterte's threats to shrink or sever ties with historical ally Washington, which have periodically followed criticism of his deadly narcotics crackdown.

Duterte spoke after Ronald Dela Rosa, the former national police chief who is now a senator, said the US had cancelled his visa but did not tell him why. Dela Rosa was the first enforcer of Duterte's internationally condemned campaign, in which police say they have killed just over 5,500 alleged dealers and users.


Human rights advocates say the true toll is four times higher, and could amount to crimes against humanity. The US State Department and the embassy in Manila have not responded to requests for comment about Dela Rosa's visa. Duterte went on the attack in a speech late Thursday. "Now, they won't let Bato go to America", he

said, using Dela Rosa's nickname. "If you do not make a correction there, one, I will terminate the bases-Visiting Forces Agreement," Duterte added. "I'm giving... the American government one month from now."

The Visiting Forces Agreement (VFA) outlines the rules governing conduct of US troops participating in joint military exercises in the Philippines. The pact gave legal cover for the resumption of large-scale war games between the two allies after the US military closed its Philippine bases in the 1990s amid rising anti-US sentiment. Duterte also threatened in 2016 to cancel the agreement, but has generally attacked ties with the US, including an announced "separation" from its former colonial master.

Until now the president has not made good on those threats, some of which came after then US president Barack Obama was critical of Duterte's crackdown in 2016. Relations between Washington and Manila under President Donald Trump, who has voiced support for Duterte, are on a stronger footing. However, recent criticism from US lawmakers has introduced new tensions. The Philippines in December barred US senators Richard Durbin and Patrick Leahy, who were behind a measure to prevent officials involved in the incarceration of Senator Leila de Lima from entering the US.

De Lima, one of the highest-profile critics of Duterte's narcotics crackdown, has been held since February 2017 over a drug charge that she claims was fabricated to silence her. — AFP



Indonesia to increase imports from India amid Malaysia spat

KUALA LUMPUR/NEW DELHI: Indonesia has agreed to immediately increase imports of Indian buffalo meat, sugar and auto parts after India boosted purchases of Indonesian palm oil amid a spat with rival supplier Malaysia, two Indian government sources with direct knowledge of the matter told Reuters on Friday. Indonesia and Malaysia account for 85% of the world's palm oil output while India is the biggest buyer of edible oil. India has effectively halted imports of refined palm oil from Malaysia since early January in retaliation for Malaysia's accusation that recent Indian policies discriminate against Muslims.

India is a Hindu-majority country while Malaysia is mainly Muslim. Indonesia, the world's biggest palm oil producer and exporter, is expected to be the biggest beneficiary of India's row with Malaysia. Indonesian crude palm oil has sold at a premium to Malaysian oil since India this month placed curbs on imports of refined palm oil. The trade ministers of India and Indonesia, which want to more than double their bilateral trade to \$50 billion by 2025, met in Davos on Thursday and agreed to fast-forward trade between them, one of the informed sources said.

"This is a goal we agreed upon earlier, now the process accelerates," said the Indian source. Both

declined to be named as they were not authorised to talk to the media.

"Starting now, they have promised that they will buy a lot more meat, a lot more sugar and autos/autoparts. Palm oil imports from Indonesia will increase and there are many areas where we will export more." The sources declined to give figures.

An Indian government document, reviewed by Reuters, said that Indonesia had "informally agreed" to double the annual quota for Indian bovine meat exports to 200,000 tons.

Indian-Indonesian trade was worth \$21.2 billion in the last fiscal year that ended in March, \$15.84 billion of which comprised Indian purchases. Indonesian Trade Minister Agus Suparmanto will visit India next month to hold further talks on enhancing trade, according to one of the Indian government sources.

A spokeswoman for Indonesia's trade ministry had no immediate comment. An Indian trade ministry spokeswoman did not immediately reply to a request for comment.

Indonesia imported 94,500 tons of Indian buffalo meat worth \$323 million in the 2018/19 fiscal year. It is the third biggest buyer of Indian buffalo meat after Vietnam and Malaysia.

Indonesia, however, bought only 555 tons of sugar from India last fiscal year. "They have now changed some of their norms to let more Indian sugar come in," said one of the sources. "In other areas, there's an ongoing process of discussion on easing regulations or standards, or increasing quotas in these areas."

Malaysia's top sugar refiner told Reuters on Thursday that it would increase purchases of sugar from India, a move that two sources in Malaysia said was part of efforts to placate New Delhi amid the palm spat. — Reuters

Brazil president Bolsonaro in maiden India visit

NEW DELHI: Brazilian President Jair Bolsonaro arrived for his first official visit to India on Friday aiming to boost ties between the two stuttering BRICS economies and with fellow right-wing leader Narendra Modi. Critics call both men authoritarian and populist in the mould of leaders like US President Donald Trump, Vladimir Putin of Russia, Turkey's Recep Tayyip Erdogan and Viktor Orban in Hungary.

Modi, facing more than a month of protests over a new citizenship law, has never given a proper press conference as prime minister and Bolsonaro said this week he would no longer give interviews.

Bolsonaro, accompanied by ministers and business leaders for the four-day visit, is this year's guest of honour at Republic Day celebrations today when India showcases its military might and culture.

"It will be an opportunity to re-energize our strategic partnership and take it forward in a focused manner," an official at the Indian foreign ministry said. Trade between India and Brazil-part of the BRICS group with Russia, China and South Africa-has risen in recent years, but reaching only a relatively modest \$8.2 billion in 2018-19.

Neither economy is doing well, with Brazil narrowly averting a fresh recession last year and Indian growth hitting a six-year low and unemployment its highest in four decades. The two sides are expected to sign nearly two dozen agreements on agriculture, defence and energy cooperation, including investments in the hydrocarbon sector amid political crises in oil-producing nations like Venezuela and Iran.

Differences over sugar may sour the mood, however, with Brazil unhappy about India's sugar subsidies. Some small protests by Indian sugar farmers were expected during the visit. — AFP

Ex-army officer appointed North Korea's new top diplomat

SEOUL: North Korea has appointed a former army officer with little diplomatic experience as its new foreign minister, state media confirmed Friday, reflecting Pyongyang's already declared hard-line policy toward the US. Speculation had mounted that the country's foreign minister Ri Yong Ho had been replaced by former defense commander Ri Son Gwon as part of a major reshuffle during stalled nuclear talks with Washington.

Unlike his predecessor-who served as a diplomat for more than three decades-the newly appointed Ri is known to have little diplomatic experience. He went to a reception for foreign envoys as the nation's top diplomat, confirming his appointment, state media said Friday. Attending was "DPRK Foreign Minister Ri Son Gwon and other officials of the ministry," state media reported-using North Korea's official name.

Analysts say his appointment could indicate the country will take a harder line with the US, in line with Pyongyang abandoning its nuclear and missile test moratoriums earlier this year-and after Washington missed the North's 2019 deadline for nuclear talks.

"Having a former army officer as its top diplomat symbolises the North's uncompromising stance against Washington," Ahn Chan-il, a North Korean defector and researcher in Seoul, told AFP. "It's very rare for someone with military background to be tapped as Pyongyang's foreign minister." Negotiations between North Korea and the US have been deadlocked since a second summit collapsed in Hanoi last year over sanctions relief and what Pyongyang would be willing to give up in return.

North Korea has since ended its moratorium on nuclear and intercontinental ballistic missile tests and said it will not return to talks unless Washington first meets all its demands in full. — AFP

Ukraine's Zelensky weathers crises from Trump to downed jet

In his first nine months as Ukrainian president, former comedian Volodymyr Zelensky has found himself at the centre of major international crises, including the US impeachment investigation and Iran's downing of a passenger jet. Yet so far Zelensky has sailed through relatively unscathed, avoiding any major gaffes, political analysts said. The 41-year-old played a president in a popular TV sitcom before sweeping to power in elections last April on promises to "smash the old corrupt system" and end the separatist war in the east.

But many had voiced concerns about how someone without political experience could lead a country fighting a war with Russia-backed separatists while also dealing with widespread poverty and corruption. "Fears of his inexperience turned out to be exaggerated," said Oleksiy Melnyk, a foreign policy analyst at the Razumkov Center in Kiev. Polls show most Ukrainians are satisfied with Zelensky's performance. His approval rating reached 62 percent in December after his first face-to-face meeting with Russian leader Vladimir Putin.

When it comes to international relations, the political novice has been constantly in the spotlight. Just a few months into his first term, Zelensky found himself plunged into the impeachment scandal that threatens to take down US President

Donald Trump. Trump is accused of pressuring Zelensky to investigate political rival Joe Biden and his son Hunter's dealings in Ukraine, making this a quid pro quo for military aid and a White House meeting. An impeachment trial is currently under way in the US Senate.

The Ukrainian leader has sought to distance himself from the scandal, stressing it is an internal affair for the United States. For Kiev it is

vital to maintain support from both major US political parties, the Republicans and the Democrats, since Washington has been Kiev's key ally in its long-running fight with Moscow. December's summit with Putin in Paris was the next major test for Zelensky.

Many Ukrainians feared Russia's strongman would overwhelm the former showman, but he managed to restart peace talks that had been frozen for three years and agree on a prisoner exchange. "Zelensky is a fast learner," said David Stulik, senior analyst in the European Values Centre for Security Policy and former European Union diplomat in Kiev. "With each international meeting he has acted more and more confidently," Stulik said, while adding Zelensky should have been "more insistent and even assertive" at the negotiations with Russia and the West.

Slow to blame Iran

Other analysts have also pointed to some flaws in Zelensky's tenure as president so far. When a Ukrainian airliner crashed in Iran in early January, killing all 176 people on board, Kiev's reaction was rather muted. As Ottawa and London openly stated that Iranian forces had accidentally shot the plane down with a missile, Ukraine was slow to pin the blame on Tehran, which ultimately admitted guilt.

Zelensky has faced criticism for what some see as a passive stance compared to other leaders. "During the crisis, the political leader of Ukraine was (Canadian Prime Minister) Justin Trudeau," analyst Mykola Davydiuk said ironically. Yet Kiev argued that its circumspect approach meant Iran granted it access to the wreckage and the crash site to shed light on the tragedy.

Serious rifts emerged in Zelensky's team last week with Prime Minister Oleksiy Goncharuk offering to resign after a leaked recording emerged where he questioned the president's grasp of economics. Zelensky seemingly smoothed over the situation, giving his PM a "second chance" and demanding an investigation into the leak.

Such successful management of ad hoc crises does not, however, give much indication of whether Zelensky will be able to transform the country in the way he has promised. Ukrainians want him to enact crucial reforms to root out corruption, reform the justice system and revive the economy of one of the poorest countries in Europe. "It's too bad he doesn't use his great popularity to do something really big," said Davydiuk. — AFP

Locusts latest curse of weather extremes

illions of locusts swarming through East Africa are the result of extreme weather swings and could prove catastrophic for a region still reeling from drought and deadly floods, experts said Friday. Dense clouds of the ravenous insects have spread from Ethiopia and Somalia into Kenya, in the region's worse infestation in decades. The UN's Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) estimated one swarm in Kenya at around 2,400 sq km - an area almost the size of Moscow - meaning it could contain up to 200 billion locusts, each of which consume their own weight in food every day.

The locust invasion is the biggest in Ethiopia and Somalia in 25 years, and the biggest in Kenya in 70 years, according to the FAO. If unchecked, locust numbers could grow 500 times by June, spreading to Uganda and South Sudan, becoming a plague that will devastate crops and pasture in a region which is already one of the poorest and most vulnerable in the world. This could lead to "a major food security problem", Guleid Artan from regional expert group the Climate Prediction and Applications Centre (ICPAC), told a press conference in Nairobi.

The locusts, he said, were the latest symptom of extreme conditions that saw 2019 start with a drought and end in one of the wettest rainy seasons in four decades in some parts - with floods killing hundreds across East Africa. The FAO says the current invasion is known as an "upsurge" - when an entire region is affected - however if it gets worse and cannot be contained,

over a year or more, it would become what is known as a "plague" of locusts. There have been six major desert locust plagues in the 1900s, the last of which was in 1987-89. The last major upsurge was in 2003-05.

Not 'the end of times'

Artan said the invasion had come after a year of extremes which included eight cyclones off East Africa, the most in a single year since 1976. This was due to a warmer western Indian Ocean, a climate condition known as the Indian Ocean Dipole which has conversely led to severe drought in Australia that is experiencing its own extremes: Bushfires, hail and dust storms. "We know East Africa is one of the most vulnerable to climate change. We know this region will see more extremes," he warned.

One expert at the press conference in Nairobi had to reassure attendees that the locust invasion following the drought and floods was not a portent of the biblical "end of times". The massive swarms entered Kenya in December and have torn through pastureland in the north and centre of the country. While farmers were relatively lucky as their crops had already matured or been harvested by the time they arrived, herders face another heavy blow as vegetation for their animals is consumed by the voracious locusts.

Artan said the pastoralists were just emerging from three years of drought, and that recovery from a dry spell usually takes them up to five years. And if the locusts are not brought under control by the start of the next planting and rainy season - typically around March - farmers could see their crops decimated. As thick clouds of the insects descend on plants and blacken the sky, Kenyans have been seen shooting in the air, banging cans and racing around, waving sticks in desperation to shoo them away.

In eastern Meru, residents accused the government of not doing enough, complaining there were still swarms present despite aerial spraying being carried out. "They told us that we will not see them again but there are still many of them spotted yesterday and today on trees and vegetation in the farm," said Emmanuel Kubai, a resident of Igembe North where villagers were hurling stones to vegetation to scare them away.

'Bodes ill for the region'

Stephen Njoka, director of the Desert Locust Control Organisation for Eastern Africa, which is based in Nairobi, said Kenya had five aircraft spraying pesticides on swarms, and four others conducting surveillance. He said the chemicals did not pose a threat to humans and that authorities were doing their best to limit damage to other small insects, pollinators and pastureland. Similar control operations are under way in Ethiopia and Somalia. However insecurity in Somalia was hampering some spraying operations, the FAO has said. The species desert locusts - are notoriously difficult to control as they often occur in remote areas and can move up to 150 km in one day. — AFP

s winter grips the Balkans, the poor are caught in a cruel bind, being forced to light fires at home for heating while fuelling a pollution crisis smothering the region. In recent weeks, Balkan capitals from Belgrade and Sarajevo to Skopje and Pristina have been ranked among the world's top 10 most polluted major cities, according to the monitoring application AirVisual. While these are small cities compared to leading Asian polluters like New Delhi and Dhaka, a combination of coal-fired power plants, old cars and fires to heat homes are pumping the air with toxins.

"I know it is polluting. I am not an idiot but my only other choice would be to heat this home with electricity and that is damn expensive," said Trajan Nestorovski, who like many in his working-class Skopje neighbourhood burns wood to stay warm in winter. His wife Vera added: "There are a couple of factories near our neighbourhood that are burning God knows what in the evenings".

Thanks to the rise of mobile phone apps that measure air quality, like the local Moj Vozduh (My Air) created by a Macedonian developer, citizens are finally grasping the full extent of the crisis. "Serbia is suffocating, has anyone

seen the minister of the environment?", said a recent headline in Belgrade's local Blic newspaper, speaking of the fog and dirty air enveloping the city.

Protests have been erupting around the region in recent days. In Skopje, the capital of North Macedonia, young people have taken inspiration from Swedish activist Greta Thunberg by holding a spate of protests on Fridays. "Greta inspired all of us," said 17-year-old Iskra Ilieska. "In winter, half of my school class is absent because of lung problems. That is not normal," she said.

In neighboring Bosnia, several hundred people wearing face masks gathered in the city of Tuzla to demand a plan from authorities to tackle pollution and phase out coal-fired plants in the next five years. "The only recommended measures are that we stay shut up at home... when you go out on the streets, in the playgrounds, you won't see children anywhere," said Alisa Kasumovic, a mother in her forties.

Silent killer

According to a recent UN environment report, air pollution causes nearly 20 percent of premature deaths in 19 Western Balkan cities. The main sources of the dust, soot and smoke are low-grade coal plants and household heating, the report said. More than 60 percent of people in the region rely on coal and firewood to heat their homes, the report said. Only 12 percent of buildings are connected to district heating systems.

Governments need to make "clean energy more accessible", ban old polluting vehicles and tighten regulations on industry emissions and power plants, the UN urged. Many people cannot afford cleaner heating options at home in countries where average wages are around Ä500 or less. Sali Ademi, a 78-year-old in Kosovo's capital Pristina, uses coal. "There's no worse thing, but what can you do?" he said in a city whose air is already poisoned by two nearby coal-fired power plants running on outdated technology. — AFP

Mexican children take up arms in fight against drug gangs

Tith baseball caps and scarves covering their faces, only their serious eyes are visible as a dozen children stand to attention, rifles by their side. In the heart of the violenceplagued Mexican state of Guerrero, learning to use weapons starts at an early age. In the village of Ayahualtempa, at the foot of a wooded hill, the basketball court serves as a training ground for these youths, aged between five and 15. The children practice with rifles and handguns or makeshift weapons in various drill positions for a few hours every week.

"Position three!" yells instructor Bernardino Sanchez, a member of the militia responsible for the security of 16 villages in the Guerrero area, which goes by the name of Regional Coordinator of Community Authorities (CRAC-PF). Guerrero is one of the poorest and most violent parts of Mexico, with one of the country's highest murder rates because of drug gang wars over the trade in opium and marijuana.

Battle against cartels

In the face of indifference from the authorities, 600 people voluntarily joined the militia force to fight organized crime. They included children. At Sanchez's order,

the young people perform a drill and throw themselves face down on the ground in a cloud of dust, rifles aimed towards an imaginary enemy. Their opponent may be imaginary for the exercise but the drug cartel violence which plagues the region is all too real.

A week ago, nine men and a child musicians and their assistants - were kidnapped and tortured, and their charred bodies were found inside their two vans at the bottom of a ravine. Mexican authorities immediately recognized the handiwork of the local Los Ardillos cartel but did not take any action against it. Exasperated by official indifference, leaders of communities across the region, including Ayahualtempa, decided to take matters into their own hands and teach their children to shoot.

Thirty children are in training. Those under the age of 13 are not yet taking part in patrols but are ready to fight in the event of an attack by Los Ardillos, as happened in May 2015 when the cartel entered the town hall of Chilapa and kidnapped more than 30 people. Since then, clashes between the militia and the drug traffickers have not abated. Near the training ground are some abandoned ramshackle huts. Inside are clothes, chil-

dren's shoes and bags of rotten corn cobs - everything left as it was when the occupants fled.

'They must defend themselves'

The situation has become so untenable for the inhabitants of the region that parents have agreed to let their children join the militia. "I wanted to study, but since the school is close to the area where Los Ardillos operates, I preferred the community police ... They were about to capture me," said 13-year-old Gustavo. The boy said he "feels good" holding his .22 caliber shotgun and already knows how to use and clean it.

Gustavo's father Luis has been a member of the militia for three years. His other son, Gerardo, 15, is also learning to "defend himself and his family", he said during training. "The children decided to support us," said Luis, who recalls the day when his two children told him they wanted to arm themselves and leave school. Luis, who said he went to "great lengths" to buy hunting rifles for his children and his own weapon, believes the danger is the same for the patrols as for municipal police who go to school "unarmed, defenseless" at the mercy of drug traffickers. — AFP








OPEC acknowledges 2020 challenge, deepens production cuts







KUWAIT: 2020 started with geopolitical risk back on the oil market's agenda. Oil prices jumped more than 3 percent after the US targeted Iranian general Qassem Soleimani, leader of Iran's Quds brigade, in a drone strike in early January. Despite regional tensions spiking as countries braced themselves for an Iranian response, when the retaliation came-a salvo of missiles against two US bases in Iraq without reported casualties, it was restrained. With both the US and Iran looking to pull back from the brink and cap the incident, oil's direction has been downward. International benchmark Brent crude closed on Friday 17 January at \$64.9/bbldown 1.7 percent in 2020-having been as high as \$69/bbl just ten days earlier. West Texas Intermediate (WTI), the US marker,

While the recent signing of the US-China phase one trade deal was met enthusiastically, rising US refined product inventories amid the broader reassertion of supply-demand dynamics has had a moderating influence.

Oil finishes 2019 on an upbeat note

Oil's performance in 2019 was its best since 2016, with Brent and WTI posting annual gains of 23 percent and 35 percent, respectively. Local crude grade, Kuwait Export Crude (KEC), ended the year up 31 percent at \$68.4/bbl. Since the beginning of the third quarter of 2019 oil prices benefitted tremendously from an apparent thaw in US-China trade tensions. This culminated in the announcement in November of the first phase of a trade deal between the world's two largest economies and oil consumers. The deal was signed on the 15 January 2020, much to the relief of the financial and economic community. The risk that degenerating US-China relations would trigger a global descent into trade-tariff protectionism has been the most dominant negative factor hanging over global markets and the global economy.

Oil price gains were also driven by the OPEC+ group's decision in early December to deepen production cuts by an additional 500 kb/d effective January 2020. The oil production cuts orchestrated by the Saudi and Russian-led 21-member group that amount to 1.2 mb/d-or roughly 1.2 percent of estimated global oil demand in 2019-have been broadly effective in reducing the oil market's supply overhang, minimizing crude stock increases and, importantly, supporting the oil price over the last 12 months of the existing agreement.

Evidence of the increased bullish sentiment has been evident in the futures markets, where money managers have been piling back into oil funds since mid-October. Net length-the difference between the number of future contracts that take a 'long' position by betting on prices rising and the number of contracts that take a 'short' position by wagering on prices falling-has increased in all but one of the last twelve weeks. As of 7 January, the net long position in Brent futures and options stood at 425,763 contracts (426 million barrels of oil), more than double the number on the 8 October and the highest level since October 2018.

Moreover, the Brent forward curve remains in backwardation (downward sloping), a structure where near term oil prices are higher than future prices. This is a reflection of robust seasonal demand and a tighter physical market, especially in sour crudes. A decline in seaborne tanker freight rates has also helped boost loadings, though prices remain elevated due to a shortage of vesselssome are out of service awaiting the installation of scrubbers to meet International Maritime Organization (IMO) 2020 regulations-and since the US imposed sanctions on Chinese shippng firm COSCO last September.

New IMO 2020 regulations

The current tightness in the medium and heavy sour crude market, which is evident in the premiums commanded by regional crude grades such as Kuwait Export Crude (KEC), Saudi Arab Medium, Dubai and Omani crudes over lighter, lower sulfur variants such as Brent and WTI, has caught the market somewhat by surprise. With the new IMO regulations coming into effect on 1 January to limit sulfur emissions in fuels used by seagoing vessels (bunker fuels) to 0.5 percent from 3.5 percent, it was expected that the price of medium/heavy sour crudes, which yield refined products containing a greater percentage of sulpfr (eg High Sulfur Fuel Oil, HSFO) compared to light sweet crudes and therefore trade at a discount, would fall in relation to the price of sweeter crudes (sweet-sour crude spreads would widen and become more positive). Instead, prices have risen and spreads have turned negative.

This phenomenon can best be understood by considering that Asian refineries, where the bulk of crude flows to these days, have historically been configured to more readily process medium and heavier sour crude





Chart 4: Light sweet - medium/heavy sour differential



grades, and by noting that at this time, with the market suffering from a shortage of medium and heavy sour crudes due to both involuntary supply cuts (e.g. US sanctions on traditional suppliers such as Iran and Venezuela) and voluntary cuts (OPEC+ production cut agreement), the demand for these grades is exceeding the supply. Medium/heavy sour crude demand was especially high in the latter half of 2019 as refineries rushed to secure supplies before the IMO January 2020 deadline.

Conversely, there is a surplus of light sweet crudes in the Atlantic basin, due to the tremendous growth of US shale, so the pressure on prices is downwards. The current situation is not likely to persist, however, as refineries and the shipping industry move more firmly towards sweeter, low sulfur crude varieties. [Ships that choose to continue burning higher sulphur fuel could also comply with the new regulations by installing 'scrubbers' to remove the sulfur, but this may be costly.]

World oil demand rising

The IEA pegs global oil demand growth this year at 1.2 mb/d, a modest improvement on 2019s multi-year low of 1.0 mb/d. OPEC also sees global oil demand rising to around 1.2 mb/d this year. Both agencies cite an improved economic outlook spurred by better US-China trade relations; the signing of the phase one agreement between the two powers-which also has among its terms a

Chinese commitment to buy \$52.4 billion worth of US energy products over two yearshas been met with a mixture of enthusiasm and relief. And while US trade tariffs remain on two-thirds of Chinese imports at least until a second phase deal has been agreed, the overall direction appears to be towards trade

On the supply side, expectations of continued robust US shale growth should propel non-OPEC supply to increase by 2.1 mb/d, almost twice the rate of demand growth, according to the IEA. Notable supply gains are projected in Brazil, Canada, Australia and Norway. With supply growth outpacing demand growth, global stocks will likely continue to accumulate in 2020 (+0.55 mb/d on avg.), with the bulk of gains occurring during the first half of the year. Consequently, the demand for OPEC crude (the "call') is expected to fall in 2020, to 29.5 mb/d, according to the OPEC Secretariat. This is 1.2 mb/d lower than last year's average and similar to December 2019's OPEC-14 output of 29.4 mb/d.

Recognizing the demand-supply imbalance, OPEC+ deepened production cuts by a further 500 kb/d to 1.7 mb/d, with OPEC reducing output by a further 372 kb/d from its Oct/Nov 2018 baseline and the Russianled non-OPEC group by an additional 132

kb/d. Furthermore, Saudi Arabia announced that it would maintain crude output during 1Q20 at around 9.7 mb/d, in effect an additional voluntary cut of 444 kb/d, so long as producers that had yet to comply, such as Iraq and Nigeria, brought their own output down to the new target levels. The total OPEC+ output adjustment would therefore amount to more than 2.1 mb/d. OPEC+ is expected to meet again in March to assess compliance and the state of the oil market. It is likely, but by no means certain, that the current deal will be extended to at least June, when the Secretariate holds its official biannual meeting.

Softer oil price outlook

Downward pressure on oil prices is expected to be greatest during the first half of 2020, with supply in excess of demand and stocks rising. Geopolitcal risk, though deemphasized, remains a constant factor. Recent troubles in Libya, where armed forces shut down an oil pipeline and the Iran-US standoff, which is likely to be played out in the Iraqi arena, are significant hotspots. Supply outages in the latter, OPEC's second largest producer, at 4.6 mb/d, might be expected to have a sizeable impact on the oil market. Markets, feasting on robust US shale growth, have tended towards complacency about geopolitical supply risks, but should remember that the bulk of global spare oil production capacity resides in the region.

Mnuchin expects next China trade talks in 'near future'

EU, China and others agree on temporary trade dispute appeal system

DAVOS: US Treasury Secretary Steven Mnuchin said on Friday that he expects to begin negotiations with China on a so-called Phase 2 trade deal soon, with Washington and Beijing on the same page.

"My guess is they (China) will consider waiving other tariffs as part of their purchasing program," Mnuchin said of the \$200 billion in additional US goods and services that China has pledged to buy.

"I don't see any difference in our views. My expectation is that we'll start conversations on phase two in the near future," he said in an interview at the end of the annual meeting of the World Economic Forum (WEF) in the Swiss ski resort of Davos.

China had a low-key presence at the Davos meeting, with most of the focus on trade concentrated on a dispute between the United States and the European Union over a "digital tax", with Washington threatening retaliation if the bloc's members tax US based companies before an apparent compromise was reached. "Once there is a consensus, those tax changes need to be implemented and in many places, require legislation. We object to a tax that targets just American companies," Mnuchin said.

With chief executives representing many of the biggest companies from around the world at Davos, it is often used as a barometer of business confidence and the economic outlook.

"It seems like Europe and Asia have bottomed and the US still looks in very good shape. So there's a lot of positive attitudes," Mnuchin said, with US tax cuts in prospect. "My expectation is that the focus of tax cuts will be for the middle class and some pro-growth incentives," he added.

'Other issues'

The biggest battleground during the four-day event has been the debate over how politicians and business leaders should tackle climate change, with much of the

focus on exchanges between U.S. President Donald Trump and activist Greta Thunberg. This year's WEF included a contingent of young activists like Thunberg, with the organizers keen to add to the voices engaging in debate at the exclusive event. "I was at dinner last night and people were very focused on the climate issue. My comment was, look we're in the middle of a serious health issue in China. It was not a topic of discussion until I brought it up," Mnuchin said.

"The environment is important. I just think it should be put in context. This goes back to a little bit of communication. The youth have focused on this one issue. But there are many other important issues that will impact the next generation." One possibility, Mnuchin said, was to change the lexicon. "Perhaps the historical language that we use, we need to reconsider. When young people hear capitalism, perhaps it has a different meaning to them," Mnuchin said.

"Perhaps the language we should be using is free markets versus managed markets. Open society versus closed society." Addressing the use of sanctions by the United States, Mnuchin said it was a strategy that needed scrutiny because of the potential impact it could have on the U.S. dollar.

Appeal system

"Sanctions are up dramatically. Over a very long period of time, we have to be careful in how we use these, where it could impact the use of the dollar. So we take that responsibility very seriously," he said. Mnuchin is also looking at increasing the amount of US borrowing at longer maturities, with a focus on 20 years. "We can issue a lot more 20-year bonds than we could issue 50- and 100-year bonds. So in terms of our objective in both raising proceeds and extending duration, the 20-year bond is a priority at the moment," he said.

Meanwhile, the European Union, China and 15 other

countries agreed Friday to develop a temporary system for appealing trade dispute rulings after the recent USprovoked collapse of the WTO appeals body. Ministers rom the group published a joint statement announcing a "multi-party interim appeal arrangement".

This arrangement, reached during a meeting at the World Economic Forum in Davos, will allow all the participating parties to "preserve a functioning and two-step dispute settlement system at the WTO in disputes among them," the EU explained in a statement.

The move came after the WTO appeals panel, sometimes dubbed the supreme court of world trade, halted its operations last month after years of relentless US opposition. Washington, which accuses the court of serious overreach, has blocked the appointment of new judges, leaving it without the quorum of three needed to hear cases due to mandatory retirements.

Ahead of the December 11 shutdown, Canada and the EU struck a bilateral deal last July to set up an interim panel to hear appeals in disputes that might arise between Brussels and Ottawa.

In Davos, they were joined by more than a dozen other countries: Australia, Brazil, China, Colombia, Costa Rica, Guatemala, South Korea, Mexico, New Zealand, Norway, Panama, Singapore, Switzerland and Uruguay. —Agencies

Lebanon's new finance minister meets with **IMF** official

BEIRUT: The new finance minister of debt-saddled Lebanon met vesterday with an official from the International Monetary Fund for what he said was a "courtesy visit" and not bailout talks. Ghazi Wazni's meeting with IMF alternative executive director Sami Geadah came as Lebanon grapples with its worst economic crisis since the 1975-1990 civil war.

The meeting served to "congratulate Lebanon on the formation of a new government," Wazni said on Twitter afterwards. He had told AFP earlier that it was "a courtesy visit... to get to know the IMF team". "The discussions will not focus on an economic rescue plan, which is being prepared (separately) inside government," he added. It follows a meeting on Friday between Wazni and a delegation from the World Bank led by its regional director Saroj Kumar Jha. Wazni assumed the post of finance minister on Tuesday with the formation of a long-awaited cabinet that faces huge economic and political challenges.

The previous government resigned on October 29, two weeks into a nationwide protest movement demanding the removal of politicians deemed incompetent and corrupt. Wazni comes into the post at a time when the plummeting Lebanon pound has lost over a third of its value against the dollar in the parallel market.

Lebanese banks are tightening restrictions on dollar transactions amid a liquidity crunch.

The economic downturn has raised questions over whether Lebanon will turn to the IMF for a bailout — an option the government has vet to comment on but which some officials regard as inevitable. Last month, former prime minister Saad Hariri discussed a possible economic rescue plan with the heads of the IMF and the World Bank, further

ACK focus on human capital for the New Kuwait Vision 2035

Interview with Australian College of Kuwait President Professor Isam Zabalawi

Question: How is higher education linked to the New Kuwait Vision 2035?

Prof Zabalawi: The New Kuwait Vision 2035 provides clarity to all sectors of the local economy regarding key government strategies for continued and shared growth. The national vision has a total of seven pillars that collectively afford a roadmap toward more enriched economic, environmental and social landscapes. In relation to the education sector, the sixth national pillar, human capital, 'seeks to reform the education system to prepare the youth population to become competitive and productive members of the workforce'.

With rapid developments in technology, it is certain even if unclear that the nature of the workplace will continue to experience disruptive change. Accordingly, the next generation of graduates must be prepared for a flexible working environment where all staff are responsive to emerging opportunities and view these as means of improving marketplace competitiveness. For this reason, at the time of graduation, advanced levels of academic knowledge will on their own be insufficient. Employers will increasingly seek graduates who demonstrate sound communication skills, critical thinking, creativity and flexible attitude. For this reason, the Australian College of Kuwait (ACK) has always adopted an experiential or immersive learning model of study whereby students learn by applying classroom theory to workplace related practical scenarios that are meaningful to the student and their future life/career.

Q: Why does ACK use Experiential Learning in preparing students for their future careers?

Prof Zabalawi: Students learn best when they are drawn rather than dragged into new knowledge and skills acquisition. At ACK, experiential learning is presented to students through an umbrella approach referred to as CDIO, an acronym for Conceive, Design, Implement and Operate. During the Conceive stage, students are provided with access to, or guided to search for theory that will assist them with understanding and interpreting the nature of an assigned task. Having gathered core information, students then consider how to structure (Design) their solution to the task. Then follows the Implementation phase during which students assemble all the resources needed to complete their task and finally, action (Operate) is taken to introduce, test and review the product, service or process. Within this overarching CDIO approach, a selection of experiential learning methodologies is used depending on the nature of particular courses. Key methodologies used across ACK include:

· Project Based Learning (PBL). The college has dopted the PBL framework developed by Aalborg University, Denmark and each year ACK faculty members visit Aalborg to gain further insights and share experiences with their staff. Project Based Learning essentially involves learning in the process of developing a solution for a situation that can be expected upon graduation in a professional career. Students are given a general description of the task to be completed and are then required to drill down and consider the detailed aspects. The project can be undertaken either individually or preferably in teams so that students also gain experience in working together collaboratively to complete the task. Students are required to demonstrate a considered strategy in fully exploring and researching background relating to the designated task, then a structured approach to planning, undertaking, documenting, presenting and reviewing the solution, whether it be in the form of a product, design, process or service.

· Internships. Since most students at ACK have no prior workplace experience, industry placements or internships provide a valued opportunity to gain a first-hand insight into the dynamics associated with being part of a professional team and how to communicate and collaborate effectively in the timely achievement of organizational goals. In preparation for their internship, the PBL experiences of students at the college provide a background for using this same professional approach within the workplace. In addition to local placements, through its membership of the International Association for the Exchange of Students for Technical Experience (IAESTE), ACK students have the opportunity to undertake their internship at a number of leading workplaces around the world. In return, the college assists with coordinating engagements inside Kuwait for international students wishing

to gain industrial/business experience within the Middle East region.

· Graduation Projects. In their final two semesters at ACK, students prepare for and complete a major graduation project to demonstrate their synthesis of knowledge and skills acquired throughout their program of study. Students are given the flexibility to creatively interpret the broad requirements of this summative assessment and the culmination of their work is presented to a panel of industry judges for face to face review. Although this prospect adds some pressure, it is further preparation for what graduands can expect in the workplace when their performance is constantly under professional scrutiny. A major positive associated with the exhibition of graduation projects is that it provides a unique opportunity for students to showcase the depth and originality of their product/design ideas.

The combination of Project Based Learning. Internships and Graduation Projects enable students to

As a result of the above initiatives, the college ensures that through the Industry Advisory Boards, the learning materials and assessments at ACK are relevant to emergent labor market needs, and through the weekly guest speaker program and field visits to workplaces, the students themselves are in direct communication with local employers. the individual to remain current with new knowledge, technology and workplace practices. In this light, to empower students with active personal management of their futures, an important part of the experiential learning process is for students to take direct responsibility for the planning and completion of their project work, either as an individual exercise or as part of a team. Accordingly, faculty step back from being the primary source of learning to being facilitators, mentors and even co-learners. As part of this, increasingly a flipped classroom approach is used whereby stu-

dents are required to manage their own pre-class

reading and preparation, thereby enabling class time

to be available for discussions, workshops and other active learning

To simulate the workplace environment as far as possible, there is a continuous cycle of upgrading in ACK workshops and laboratories for both equipment and related software. This investment is considerable but essential so that students have access to materials and systems relevant to their future professional needs. At the same time, ongoing expansion is scheduled for enhanced digital libraries and laboratories as well as smart classrooms.

Associated professional development programs are ailable for faculty and other staff so they are skilled in usage of new technologies. Further, an incentive bonus scheme has been established to encourage excellence in research and publication in high ranked journals. Indeed, ACK is proud of the recognition received by teaching staff with their research as individuals and as part of collaborative teams. The college has a Research Center to coordinate research efforts and to assist with securing financial contributions from public and private funding sources. ACK also has a oint research committee arrangement with international strategic partner, Central Queensland University,

In addition to research papers by faculty members that have been published in journals and conference proceedings, ACK is tremendously proud of the contribution by many fourth year students toward research projects with faculty members particularly in association with their graduation projects. This has resulted in joint faculty/student research publications and therefore including the names of contributing students. These achievements are recorded in a register of published student authors.

Q: What is meant by rounded education and why is this needed?

Prof Zabalawi: For this new millennium, UNESCO established an International Commission on Education for the 21st Century which identified that for students to be fully prepared for life and work in a continuously evolving and globally connected environment, a rounded education is necessary with a focus on four key pillars of Learning to Know, Do, Be and Live Together. Other pillars have since been added including Learning to Transform Oneself and Society, Learning to Unlearn and Re-learn, and Learning to Gain Employment.

Q: How does ACK ensure that programs of learning are relevant to future labour market

Prof Zabalawi: To ensure that ACK students are benefiting from learning that is relevant to their future careers, the college has established three ACK Industry Advisory Boards that include representatives from local industries and businesses. These advisory groups provide direct input to ACK academic heads with regard to course content and methods of assessment so that student learning is focused on emerging workplace graduate needs.

In addition, both the Schools of Engineering and Business hold a weekly guest speaker program on campus for students and faculty to have regular direct communication with local industry and business lead-

Internship and work placement opportunities for students in the Schools of Engineering, Business and Aviation to gain first-hand understanding of what to expect in desired career fields upon graduation; and

Entrepreneurship courses available as electives for all students regardless of their program of study. These courses provide students with a structured framework for use in exploring their future enterprise ideas and then developing a comprehensive business plan as they proceed toward establishment. Ongoing mentor support is available both to students and alumni as they continue even beyond graduation toward the startup and growth of their business.

Q: What strategies does the college use to facilitate continuous improvement in teaching practices? **Prof Zabalawi:** The New Kuwait Vision 2035 places emphasis on nurturing youth toward a creative and competitive mindset so they have the knowledge,

skills and confidence to embrace new opportunities

Communities are now living within "Society 5.0" (Digital Society) or the Innovation Society, recognizing that individual people are increasingly part of globally focused and proactive communities where members of all ages are highly connected through smart phones. At the same time, within the workplace, enterprises are entering the age of "Industry 5.0" (The interaction of human intelligence and cognitive computing), where there is a synergy between humans, artificial intelligence and autonomous machines. Therefore, humans will need to be increasingly fluid in their thinking, learning, living and professional lives. As a result, within the education system, the emphasis must shift from What to Learn toward How to Learn so that graduates are flexible, creative, multi-dimensional and resilient.

Resilience is a term regularly used now to highlight the need especially for the next generation of graduates to maintain a positive and focused attitude when faced with disruptive change. In this regard, for concountries whereby students have a degree of choice as to when and where they participate in learning activities. Provided the standard of learning and assessment is not diminished and is independently validated, such blended learning is a seamless extension of lifestyle activity in association with the already ubiquitous nature of smart technology.

Q: What is the future direction of Higher Education?

Prof Zabalawi: All sectors of every economy must adapt to and preferably anticipate expected changes. Higher Education providers, by their very nature, should be at the vanguard of change through institutional research and collaborative projects with research organisations and industry. However, in recent years, higher education has been struggling to keep pace with industry based research and therefore, more emphasis is now required to re-establish such partnerships. Perhaps this might be facilitated by the recognition and appointment of industry expert facul-



enrichment of the next generation of commercial, industry and community leaders. Personal exposure to higher education within a shared environment is vital for balanced, responsible and engaged citizenship in a multicultural and globalized world.

Q: What have been the major achievements at ACK to date?

Prof Zabalawi: The Australian College of Kuwait was established in 2004, as one of the first private higher education institutions in Kuwait. Students are able to undertake follow-on diploma and bachelor degree studies through the 2 + 2 model with the first two years providing an optional exit point with a diploma, followed by immediate or delayed continuation for a further two years for a bachelor's degree. This provides flexibility for those students wishing to gain an initial qualification and then benefit from some work experience prior to rejoining their studies.

At present, the college offers bachelor degree programs in Engineering (Civil, Mechanical, Electrical

Civil Aviation in Kuwait (DGCA), the UAE General Civil Aviation Authority (GCAA), and the European Aviation Safety Agency (EASA). The English Language programs are accredited by the Evaluation and Accreditation of Quality Language Services (EAQUALS). ACK itself is accredited for provision of private higher education programs by the Kuwait Private Universities Council (PUC).

In line with the experiential learning approach that has been adopted across all programs at the college, faculty members use various strategies to bring the workplace environment into the classroom and equally to extend the classroom out into the workplace. Firstly, bringing the workplace into the classroom is achieved by such learning activities as Project Based Learning and Graduation Projects, each requiring students to undertake a workplace standard and approach in planning, organizing, establishing and presenting their work. Secondly, extending the classroom out into the workplace is

tinued success in their future careers, students must be ready to continuously unlearn redundant knowledge and re-learn, based on replacement information and technology. Accordingly, part of the education process must lead to empowering students with selfauthorship; the capability to look inward and outward to determine what makes sense to them for their future as an individual and as an engaged contributor to their family, workplace and community in an ongoing environment of change. In this regard, the ACK Award was established as a voluntary personal development program through which students use a template to set lifewide goals at the start of each semester and then document their progress at regular intervals with the support of a staff mentor.

Q: What are the future plans at ACK?

Prof Zabalawi: Recognizing the emphasis in the New Kuwait Vision 2035 to encourage a more diversified economy with a vibrant entrepreneurial mindset, ACK has for some time offered an Innovation and Entrepreneurship course as an elective for all students. During this particular study program, students are guided through the various licenses and other requirements needed to commence a business and the major considerations that are essential in developing a comprehensive feasibility study and subsequent business plan ready for submission to prospective

ty members within higher education. This will simplify the interchange of academic and professional experiences and ideally lead to increased and enhanced industry/academic exchange programs.

For the students themselves, self-selected or tailored degrees will enable individuals to decide the courses that are most relevant to their desired career path. Already within industry there is increasing adoption of multi-disciplinary teams in recognition of the need for specialists to work in closer communication. Tailored degrees will provide a pathway at an individual level for students to determine their own multi-disciplinary knowledge and skill set that they consider will best address their particular learning needs.

Further, as learning will be a lifelong process, there should be a more seamless flow between formal (Qualifications), non-formal (Short Term Courses) and informal learning (Unstructured and Casual Learning). Especially with online access to learning from anywhere, people are acquiring knowledge and skills through various means in their own time as well as on campus or at their place of work. Therefore, the establishment of a National Qualifications Framework will facilitate the formal recognition of non-formal and informal learning, not only within but also across borders. This is especially desirable for people wishing to

investors or funding bodies. The next phase is for the college to establish an ACK Incubator as a physical location as well as an associated electronic resource for students and alumni who are ready to take the active step toward self-employment. Ongoing guidance and mentorship will be available through the center as students/alumni address each of the stages in converting their idea to a reality.

A short course on digital entrepreneurship is being developed for those students/alumni wishing to establish a totally or predominantly online business. In this regard, there are obvious indications that customers are increasingly preferring to do their shopping online from the comfort of their own home in preference to personal buying.

With regard to the general learning approach across the college, the growing emphasis will be on promoting a faculty and student attitude of 'classrooms without walls', where the strongest possible connections are established physically and online between students, industry and the environment. Virtual reality will increasingly enable students even in their classroom to be instantly and actively communicating and collaborating with industry professionals, research experts, community leaders and even student peers anywhere. This will also facilitate incremental learning so that instead of each class having to commence a project from the beginning, they can join and add to tasks already started elsewhere. There are not only academic but also cultural benefits from such networking across, as well as within communities.

Such online virtual reality shared learning does not have to be confined to the classroom. Education should not be seen as a process restricted to a physical campus and period of time at college. With smart technology, students have non-stop digital access anywhere to knowledge and communication. Blended learning has already proved most successful in many

continue their studies at higher levels, locally or elsewhere, and avoid the need to undertake formal study in subject areas where they are already proficient.

The above should ideally be part of an officially endorsed, National Strategic Plan for Higher Education that would also include such considerations as:

- More flexible external governance to allow individual higher education institutions to be more responsive to market shifts and preferably anticipate these.
- National MIS (Management Information System) framework for the higher education sector to facilitate collection and sharing of key information and statistics.
- National Communications Network, including a shared national electronic library for faculty and student research.
- Facilitation of joint and advanced research programs within Kuwait, the Gulf and beyond, and with universities, scientific research organizations and industry.
- Greater emphasis on promoting lifelong learning so that initial graduation is seen by professionals and their workplaces as the first step in a continuing process of upgrading knowledge and skills to escalate career opportunities associated with emerging products, services and technologies.
- Potential International Educational collaborations with ministries from other countries in and beyond the GCC for the purposes of joint cooperation in such educational fields as shared development of IT resources and virtual reality learning materials.

Higher education should be the focal point of research and advanced learning for the betterment of communities. Within increasingly disruptive living and working environments, higher education institutions must be vibrant centers of learning for the holistic

As China virus spreads, fear spreads faster

PARIS: Inflamed by past scares and Hollywood disaster blockbusters, few things feed collective panic like a virus, experts said Thursday, as China locked down the epicenter of a deadly flu-like outbreak. AFP spoke to health specialists to find out why this is the case, and what can be done to limit the spread of worry.

Why so scary?

"There is an innate sense of fear around disease outbreaks, principally because it is an invisible enemy to the human eye," said Adam Kamradt-Scott, an expert in the spread and control of infectious diseases at the University of Sydney. "This generates a level of fear, as no-one can really know if they have been infected until symptoms develop, by which time it may be too late."

Unlike bacterial infections, which can be treated by antibiotics, viruses respond to very few treatments, according to Sanjaya Senanayake, associate professor of medicine at The Australian National University. "Also, respiratory viruses, such as influenza, seem to spread more easily from person to person than bacterial infections, and therefore have a higher outbreak potential," he said.

The outbreak has so far claimed 26 lives across China. Authorities say there have been more than 800 confirmed cases, with infections reported in several Asian countries and the United States. Science historian Laurent-Henri Vignaud said popular culture plays an underappreciated role in conditioning populations to fear pandemics. "It's like in horror films where those infected become zombies," he said. "It's extremely unsettling because it calls into question the social bond. We come to fear the sick."

What can authorities do?

The main driver of anxiety over the new strain of virus is likely to be its similarity to SARS, a viral lung infections which killed nearly 650 people across mainland China and Hong Kong in 2002-2003. The Chinese government took months to report SARS and initially denied World Health Organization experts any access.

This time Beijing has locked down some 41 million people in several cities, closing roads and suspending rail and flight routes to contain the virus. But Tom Solomon, a professor at the University of Liverpool, warned that quarantine could be "counter-productive".

"It can increase the level of panic, and just cause people to flee by other means," he said. It is necessary to limit not only the spread of the virus, but also the fear it provokes, according to Rania MacIntyre, head of the Biosecurity Research Program at the Kirby Institute at the University of New South Wales.

"Health authorities need to find the balance between providing transparent information to the community without causing panic," she said. Kamradt-Scott said it was incumbent on authorities to effectively "counter conspiracy theories and rumors". Communication by authorities was poor during the last global pandemic scare, of avian flu in 2009, said Vignaud. "The World Health Organization went straight away to the maximum alert level," thus causing panic, he said.

What does history tell us?

For Vignaud, the fear of epidemics spans much of our history. "What comes to mind most is the plague" that spread periodically through Europe in the Middle Ages, he said. Franco-Croat historian Mirko Grmek last century came up with the theory of pathocenosis — that each epoch of human history will have diseases that fit their particular context.

Vignaud said this includes economic, political and social conditions, as well as those diseases perceived to be the most dangerous. He gave the examples of cholera and tuberculosis in the 19th Century, which were helped to spread by the water pollution, overcrowding and lack of cleanliness that came with rapid urbanization.

The modern-day fear of a pandemic — a truly global killer — stems from globalization, according to Vignaud. "The good side of it is you can take a plane and in a few hours' time be anywhere on the planet," he said. "The flip



side is that the virus can now travel with you."

What role does media play?


"The media has a crucial responsibility to ensure that only accurate, factual information is reported, and needs to refrain as much as possible from speculation and hyperbole in these types of events," said Kamradt-Scott.

But the nature of 24-hour news cycles could neverthe-

less stoke fears with blanket coverage of what ultimately has only affected a few hundred people worldwide thus far, according to Senanayake. "They need to keep reporting it till they feel that the outbreak is under control and no longer newsworthy," he said. "With this outbreak, because it is in its infancy, I think it is reasonable for the media to keep updating the public as new information comes to light." — AFP

greet the Year of the Rat yesterday but Lunar New Year celebrations globally were marred by anxieties about the virus outbreak that has disrupted festivities in China. Sydney, home to a large and growing Chinese population, started its Lunar New Year festivities in subdued fashion after China cancelled many large-scale celebrations of the holiday on concerns about the coronavirus, which has also reached Australia.

Australia's largest city welcomed the year with golden rats statues set up at the entrance to its downtown Chinatown precinct. "We don't know if quite as many people will come this year because of the coronavirus and I'd like to especially acknowledge Wuhan city government," Sydney Lord Mayor Clover Moore said, referring to the central Chinese city considered the epicentre of the virus.

One hundred community Lunar New Year events are billed across Sydney until Feb 11, including dragon boat races and the annual lunar lantern display. The festivities last year attracted 1.5 million people Australia confirmed its first four cases of the virus on Saturday, joining France, Malaysia, Japan, Singapore and other countries outside of China that have reported infections.

The death toll from the outbreak in New Zealand were among the first to China has reached 41 while more than 1,300 people have been infected globally. For China's 1.4 billion people, the holiday is the most important and millions travel thousands of miles back to their hometowns to gather with family and friends. To control the spread of the virus, authorities closed part of the Great Wall and suspended public

transport in many cities, stranding millions. Chinese state television's traditional Lunar New Year extravaganza on Friday paid tribute to the people of Wuhan and to medical staff fighting the coronavirus crisis, urging them on to victory in the battle to defeat the outbreak, Many events, such as making offerings at temples, wandering around at outdoor festival fairs, and even family reunion dinners at restaurants have been cancelled as public gatherings were discouraged.

Young people posted on social media appeals to reduce family gatherings or to at least wear masks when greeting one another with New Year's wishes, which is typically seen as disrespectful in the Chinese culture. In Wuhan, the most affected city, the mood was nervous. "There's so much news, so much data, every 10 minutes there's an update, it's frightening, especially for people like us in a severely hit area," Lily Jin, 30, a resident of the city, told Reuters.



The concerns surrounding the Lunar New Year festivities are not confined to China. Zhao Xiaoli, a tour guide from Eastern China's Anhui province said while visiting Thailand for the celebrations that precautions have been taken. "(We have advised tourists to) avoid crowded places, take care of personal hygiene, and go to see a doctor immediately if they show symptoms of flu, fever and coughs,"

he said. — Reuters

bluish glow spreads across the snow as far as the eye can see, a few bare trees dotting the windy plateau. In this remote corner of Norway's far north, two French adventurers are training for their next big exploit. Next month, Matthieu Bellanger and Loury Lag, both in their 30s, will leave eastern Canada for Alaska in a 130-day expedition passing through the famed Northwest Passage in the Canadian Arctic Archipelago.

They also plan to climb Denali, the highest peak in North America known formerly as Mount McKinley. They have come to Alta, located at a latitude of 69.5 North, to seek out conditions similar to the extreme latitudes where they're headed, where temperatures

easily plummet to minus 25 or minus 30 Celsius. Unfortunately, the Norwegian winter is a little mild this year, with the mercury dropping to just minus $\boldsymbol{5}$ C during the day and minus 10 C at night. But at least a snowstorm has brought a good dumping of the white stuff.

There are only four hours of daylight at this time of year, in the morning. The sky is whitish-blue, the sun barely managing to creep above the horizon. The tattooed adventurers practice their routines over and over again, so they can do them quickly in case of extreme cold and strong winds. They set up and take down their tent in a few minutes, and pack their sleds meticulously, the same way every time.

The sleds, which they will pull with a harness around their waists, will each weigh around 60 kilos at the start of their journey, carrying everything they need to survive. Their sleeping bags are designed to withstand temperatures as low as minus 60 C, and they will mostly eat freeze-dried food during the expedition. A friend, top chef Armand Arnal, has also prepared a few sous vide (vacuum sealed) dishes for when they need a special pickme-up. And to drink, they have as much snow to melt as they could ever need. — AFP





French sewing fans to the rescue of Aussie kangaroos

he plight of baby kangaroos and koalas orphaned by Australia's bushfires has prompted a sewing frenzy in France, where an appeal for cloth pouches for the animals has reaped thousands of contributions. The call for international help was first issued by Australia's Animal Rescue Collective Craft Guild and promptly shared by the Australian Park, a wildlife reserve in the southwestern French town of Carcassonne.

Within a few days, schools, retirement homes and sewing enthusiasts had begun churning out small bags in which to swaddle the stranded creatures. "We were completely surprised and overwhelmed by the outpouring of generosity that came from all parts of France," Carole Masson, the park's director, told AFP. The apocalyptic wildfires that ravaged vast tracts of southern and eastern Australia over the past five months have killed an estimated one billion animals, an ecological disaster unprecedented in the country's

Rescue workers have been searching forests strewn with charred animal corpses for creatures that survived. Baby marsupials that lost their mothers to the fires or fell out of the pouches in which they were carried while fleeing the flames are seen as particularvulnerable. To continue developing they need to be bottle-fed and placed in a surrogate pouch, which needs to be regularly changed because it collects the baby's urine and feces.

"You need thirty per baby kangaroo," said Masson, a biologist who is herself rearing a six-month-old kangaroo joey that fell out of its mother's pouch in the park in Carcassonne. On the day AFP visited the reserve, her assistant Annia Aubry was giving sewing instructions over the phone to a volunteer. "No, you can't use synthetic fabric," she says, adding that a socalled French seam that folds in all extraneous fabric is required to avoid the young marsupials snagging their claws on the stitching. Size also matters, with koalas, possums, wallabies and other marsupials all requiring pouches of different proportions.

Outpouring of donations

Such has been the reaction to the appeal, which was widely covered by local media, that the park has stopped accepting pouches and is now recruiting volunteers to sort all the donations. Masson attributed the massive public response to a desire by people to act in the face of disaster and "be part of the solution, at their own level." In the northern coastal town of Boulogne-sur-Mer last week, a group of women armed with sewing machines gathered in the social centre to do their bit for Australia's biodiversity. Over the course of five days, they stitched a hundred pouches, using fabric donated by local residents.

Francine, a volunteer in her sixties, told AFP that the initiative had "restored my faith in human nature". We're living in an individualistic world where everyone is focused on their phone. This was a nice project that brought people together," she said. In Carcassonne, ten women aged 30 to 60 took part in a pouch-making workshop. The French have also dug deep to help ship the wraps to Australia in February, with a crowd-funding campaign raising nearly Ä13,000 (\$14,400) towards the cost. — AFP

Since the bank began operating late last year in Salt Lake City, more than 550 local women have volunteered.

Annette Thompson began donating in March after giving birth to her third child, spending 10-15 minutes every three hours pumping. "This is my little piece of helping someone else. My body can do it, so I will do it," she said. Thompson had realized she was a prolific milk producer when she had her first two children - she used to pump excess milk and save it in her freezer, before ultimately throwing it out as she ran out of space to store

A few years later, when her niece was in the hospital and needed milk, she learned that donating was possible. So when she had her daughter in March, she posted on Facebook to inquire if anyone needed extra. She was connected to the milk bank and after undergoing a health screening, including a blood test, Thompson became a

Nearly 10 percent of babies born in the United States are premature, and the bulk of the milk collected by the bank goes to nourish infants in neonatal intensive care. Often when a baby is born early the mother's body is unable to produce milk, or not able to produce enough, so donor milk is sought. Breast milk is valued above formula for newborns because it contains a range of vitamins, minerals, fatty acids, immune factors, antibodies and stem cells. "It primes the gastro-intestinal tract, so those babies get protections from infections from the get-go," said Mariana Baserga, who runs the University of Utah's neo-natal intensive care unit.

Saving lives

Once the Utah bank receives milk from donors, it is pooled, pasteurized and packaged in doll-sized three ounce containers to be shipped out to hospitals across Utah and neighboring Idaho. Ken Richardson, its medical director, compares donating mothers to first responders



ple were worried," says Naomi Bar-Yam, formerly on the board of directors of the Human Milk Banking Association of North America (HMBANA).

At the time there were between 50 and 60 milk banks in the United States and Canada, but within a very short time there were only a half dozen left. Those figures have since partially recovered - with 26 accredited milk banks now operating nationwide. That episode was the catalyst for the founding of HMBANA, the professional organization that sets guidelines for the safe collection and dispensing of human milk - and whose standards are now used across the globe. — AFP

Grammys set to honor music's best, but scandal overshadows gala

os Angeles is gearing up for the Grammys, music's marquee night, with Lizzo, Billie Eilish and Lil Nas X leading a pack of young, talented contenders hoping to strike gold today. But revelations of infighting at the Recording Academy, which organizes the awards show, and an explosive allegation of rape has cast a dark shadow over the glitzy gala and rattled the institution's efforts to shed its out-of-touch image.

On Tuesday, Deborah Dugan - the first woman to head the Academy, a move meant to usher in a new era for a body long accused of favoritism and a lack of diversity - filed an explosive discrimination complaint with the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission. She says she was suspended after raising concerns over sexual harassment, voting irregularities and other misconduct within the Academy, one of music's most influential organizations.

In the complaint, the former CEO - who was put on leave last week days before her filing, accused of bullying behavior - also alleged that her predecessor, Neil Portnow, had raped a foreign female musician, an allegation he has rejected as "ludicrous and untrue". The ongoing tempest is swirling in stark contrast with the Recording Academy's efforts to reinvent itself, and thereby appease critics who long have lambasted the Grammys

as too white, too male - and too generous to music world mainstays.

Diverse nominee field

This year's diverse slate of nominees - which celebrates a mix of established and budding stars - did appear to be a move in a new direction. Leading the pack is the effervescent 31-year-old Lizzo - beloved by fans for her sassy, body-positive persona and unflinching messages of feminist empowerment, sexual freedom and black pride. She nabbed eight nominations, including in all the top four categories.

The 18-year-old goth-leaning pop iconoclast Billie Eilish and the genre-bending overnight sensation Lil Nas X, 20, both have six chances at Grammy gold, while the enigmatic 22-year-old R&B prodigy H.E.R. has five. The newbie frontrunners will square off against veteran powerhouses including Ariana Grande and Beyonce, as well as alt-leaning acts Lana Del Rey, Bon Iver and Vampire Weekend. The shift follows years of sharp critique from top-tier artists including Frank Ocean, Drake and Jay-Z, who have all slammed the Grammys as irrelevant, especially citing its failure to recognize black artists.

Diverse wins 'more possible'For John Vilanova, a professor at Lehigh

University who has extensively researched the intersection of race and gender at the Grammys, this year's field of nominees is evidence of "an environment that feels more possible" for different kinds of artists to have a chance. "It's quite interesting, to see what will happen when you have artists who are really having their first chance at this," he told AFP. "Their work is being appraised by the academy for the first time."

In her first public interview since unveiling her scathing allegations that the Academy is a "boys' club" where powerful men line their pockets and promote a misogynistic culture with impunity, Dugan told ABC's "Good Morning America" on Thursday: "I actually wanted to make change from within." In her complaint, she said that some nominated artists have sat on the voting boards for their prospective categories. But when asked if the Grammys are "rigged", Dugan sidestepped. "I was trying at each step to take a deep breath and say, 'OK, I can make a difference, I can fix this, I can work with this team.'," she told the ABC morning news program.

'Old Town Road' all-star show

Though one-time Grammy darling Taylor Swift is up for several awards including Song of the Year, many mainstay artists are not "looming significantly" over the ceremony as they have in years past, Vilanova said. "They aren't leading the discourse, they're after-thoughts - and when has Taylor Swift been an afterthought?"

Often remembered as much for its performances as its winners, the Grammys will feature Lizzo, Eilish and Grande, along with a genre-blending rendition of Lil Nas X's mega-hit "Old Town Road" that will feature K-pop sensation BTS, country star Billy Ray Cyrus and the eclectic DJ Diplo, among others. Artists including John Legend, Meek Mill and DJ Khaled - all up for Grammys this year - will perform a tribute to the late rapper Nipsey Hussle, who was shot dead last year and is up for three posthumous awards.

Though the Recording Academy drama has threatened to cloud the gala, Vilanova said that in terms of expanding possibilities for artists, the Grammys appear to be taking baby steps toward structural change. "I hesitate to call it a sea change - progress in these areas rarely happens in a straight line," he said. "It's not that one artist should win - what we want to ask is, 'Do the Grammys actually represent what the music industry sounds like and looks like?" — AFP

FIVE THINGS TO WATCH FOR AT THE GRAMMYS

usic's glitterati will sparkle on the red carpet at this today's Grammy awards, which honors the top hits and artists of the year. Scandal at the Recording Academy, which puts on the show, has overwhelmed the lead-up to the glam event, but there are still plenty of musical moments to watch for. Here is our quick guide to the event, which will take place at the Staples Center in Los Angeles:

Women poised to lead

Women dominated at last year's gala and are leading the pack this year as well, with the twerking flautist Lizzo and the teenage goth-pop phenomenon Billie Eilish expected to battle for the top awards. The Academy has long come under fire for failing to recognize women and people of color. So in recent years, it expanded the nominee field from five to eight in the major four categories: Album of the Year, Song of the Year, Record of the Year and Best New Artist.

Both Lizzo and Eilish are nominated for all of the "big four" prizes. Other female frontrunners vying for Grammys gold include Lana Del Rey - whose 2019 album was considered by many critics as the best of the year - and R&B prodigy H.E.R., who is up for five awards and last year won two. Pop sensation Ariana Grande is also among the top nominees, while flamenco revivalist Rosalia, up for Best New Artist, could become a rare Spanish-language winner in the general categories.

Generational shift

Lizzo, Eilish and Lil Nas X are the top three contenders of the night with a combined age of 69 - a figure once closer to the average age of just one veteran star that would dominate the night. The generational shift could mark a new era for the Recording Academy, which has long favored older pop and rock mainstays. Eilish, who first gained fame online, was just 17 when the nominations were announced, making her the youngest artist ever to be up for all four top Grammy

Her songwriting partner and brother Finneas, 22, meanwhile has five chances at Grammys glory. Fans are expecting a rager of a performance from Lizzo, who routinely slings back tequila from the bottle onstage. Fashion watchers will also be on red alert

'Old Town Road' all-stars

Lil Nas X, the brain behind the year's ubiquitous earworm "Old Town Road," will take the stage to perform a pumped-up rendition of his country-trap smash. His Grammy co-nominee for Record of the Year, Billy Ray Cyrus - who lent the song country-world street cred when Nashville snubbed it - will join him on stage, as will the eclectic DJ Diplo and K-pop mega

The video-sharing app TikTok propelled the young rapper to fame - his song went viral and ultimately broke the record for the longest stretch atop the Billboard hot songs chart at 19 weeks. The genrebending mega-hit was removed from Billboard's country music charts early last year - which critics alleged was industry white-washing as the artist is black. Lil Nas X is bound to impress on the red carpet; the rapper is known for his campy Western outfits complete with fringe, vests or hats in garish colors.

Barring none

Two artists who faced major legal troubles in 2019 - Meek Mill and 21 Savage - are up for Best Rap Album. Mill ended his controversial legal saga in August after pleading guilty to a misdemeanor gun charge dating back more than a decade - a move that lifted the probation he dealt with





for most of his adult life. The plea deal, which saw additional charges against Mill dropped, resolved a case that had become a flashpoint in the national debate over the US criminal justice system's treatment of black people.

21 Savage was meanwhile arrested just before last year's Grammys gala in his hometown Atlanta, with US immigration agents saying he had been living stateside illegally since overstaying a visa that expired in 2006, when he was a minor. The shock arrest surprised fans, who discovered the rapper - strongly associated with the southern capital of hip-hop - was in

Nipsey Hussle tribute

fact born in Britain.

Mill - along with artists including DJ Khaled, John Legend and Roddy Ricch - will perform a tribute to the late rapper Nipsey Hussle, who is posthumously up for three awards after losing out on Best Rap Album to Cardi B in 2019. The Eritrean-American born Ermias Asghedom was shot dead last March at age 33 in broad daylight, triggering an outpouring of grief in Los Angeles and among Hussle's superstar peers, who hailed both his musical talents and tireless community organizing.

Both Legend and Khaled are up for a Grammy with Hussle for "Higher", a collaboration released after the rapper's death. Long part of the underground rap circuit, Hussle struggled to find fame but began selling his own mixtapes. Hip-hop royalty Jay-Z once bought 100 of them for \$100 each. — AFP

HOW FASHION USES GREENWASHING TO HIDE DIRTY SECRETS

aris fashion fortnight began last week with an apocalyptic warning. "Our Mother Earth will not be able to support life, we will not be able to breathe... If we don't open our hearts and our minds, it's the End," a disembodied voice intoned as hot Hollywood label Rhude made its Paris debut. The very next show, Phipps' "Treehugger, Tales of the Forest", was teased on Instagram with pictures of rescued koalas from the Australian wildfires. It was another sign that fashion now sees itself on the climate change frontline.

But when AFP questioned Rhude designer Rhuigi Villasenor backstage, he admitted there was nothing sustainable about his collection. He had found the stirring speech on the internet the day before, and didn't know who had made it. But he insisted his clothes were "timeless" and would "live through ages and trends".

Campaigners say such "greenwashing" is typical of an industry "that is talking the talk but not walking the walk" on sustainability. While Rhude is a young brand, it has a starry roster of clients from Justin Bieber to rapper ASAP Rocky and Ellen DeGeneres. Yet some of the most fabled luxury houses in fashion - even luxury brands it is lip service, mostly hollow some whose designers are activists for change have found themselves caught short.

Luxury labels in dock

Dior's last women's show played hard on its eco-credentials. Set amid trees that were later used to create urban parks, it went heavy on eco-friendly hemp and raffia with models in Greta Thunberg plaits. Designer Maria Grazia Chiuri told AFP that nature and "humans need to live together if humanity is to survive." "It is not just about image but action," she added.

Weeks later a damning report by the Changing Markets Foundation on toxic pollution caused by viscose production put Dior and a swathe of other luxury labels including Prada, Versace, Fendi, Armani, Miu Miu and Marc

Jacobs in the dock. Dolce & Gabbana came in for particular criticism. The much-vaunted biodegradable fabric - which often is used like silk, has been seen as a silver bullet for fashion's eco woes, a way to wean it off synthetic fibres that come from the petrochemical industry.

While some fast fashion groups like H&M, C&A and ASOS - which luxury labels blame for fashion's pollution and runaway overproduction - were praised for making progress in the indepth "Dirty Fashion Disrupted" study, designer labels were excoriated. "Three quarters of the luxury brands we looked at were failing to take any meaningful action to clean up their viscose supply chain," its author Urska Trunk told AFP.

Viscose, which comes from wood pulp, is now the third most used fibre in the world and "genuinely has the potential to be a sustainable", Trunk added. "Unfortunately most of it is still produced in a very dirty process," causing water pollution and an alarming array of mental illnesses, strokes and cancer close to factories in India, China and Indonesia. While she lauded British designer Stella McCartney for her transparency and ambition, "with most of the other words... And that is a major concern."

Spin but little change

The report is the foundation's second tracking whether brands were cleaning up their act. With only a handful of firms producing almost all of the world's viscose, Trunk said pressure from brand could make "a massive difference". For Christie Miedema, of the Dutch-based Clean Clothes Campaign, brands have become expert as "eco messaging" with "one-off collections or clever initiatives to make it looking like they are doing something" without actually changing the way they operate.

Versace, which came bottom only to Walmart in the Changing Markets table, made the front pages by sending Brazilian supermodel Gisele Bundchen to New York's Met Gala in a "100 percent green eco-dress" while Prada - which is also deep in its "red zone" got admiring media coverage for their Re-Nylon "eco handbag". Dior is part of LVMH, the world's biggest luxury group. Unlike its main rival Kering and 24 other major clothing companies, LVMH pointedly refused to sign up to "The Fashion Pact" on fighting climate change at the G7 summit last year.

'They will be found out'

Owner Bernard Arnault - the world's richest man - later criticized teenage activist Greta Thunberg for "surrendering to total catastrophism" even as he appointed McCartney his personal advisor on sustainability in September. Kering - which controls Gucci and Saint Laurent - has since said it has gone carbon neutral and has vowed to halve greenhouse gas emissions in its supply chain within five years.

Joel Hazan, luxury goods analyst at the Boston Consulting Group, said the industry "had passed a tipping point", and warned those who pretend to embrace sustainability would be found out. "The demographics will make the difference," he told AFP. "Eight out of 10 millennials expect labels to play a strong part socially and environmentally."

Since almost all growth in luxury goods in the next five years "is predicted to come from millennials, brands have no choice" but to change, Hazan argued. Indeed Vetements, the hot youthful rebel brand which has shaken Paris fashion in recent years, used its men's show to pour scorn on its elders with slogans such as "Cutting down the bulls**t", "Fully sustainable show" and "It costs \$0 to be a nice person". — AFP

Weinstein drew up 'red flag list' of women

arvey Weinstein told a private investigator to approach women he suspected were detailing sexual misconduct allegations against him to journalists, his rape trial was told Friday, as the court heard from Oscar-nominated actress Rosie Perez. Two months before the #MeToo movement ignited in late 2017, the then Hollywood titan emailed a "red flag list" of people he wanted investigated, prosecutors and a witness said in the high-profile proceedings which began hearing testimony this week.

The list included dozens of names, some of which were highlighted in red to indicate individuals that the now-disgraced movie producer was most concerned about. They included the actress Rose McGowan, who Weinstein claimed was trying to extort him, and "The Sopranos" actress Annabella Sciorra, who accused him of rape in graphic testimony on Thursday. Weinstein, 67, faces life imprisonment if convicted of predatory sexual assault charges related to two

He is accused of raping actress Jessica Mann in 2013 and of forcibly performing oral sex on former production assistant Mimi Haleyi. Investigator Sam Anson told the New York court that he received the email from Weinstein on Aug 17, 2017 but did not carry out his instructions. Anson, who now works for LA-based Guidepost Solutions but then ran his own firm, testified that he also had a telephone conversation with Weinstein around the same time. "He said that there was concern that articles were being written about him that would discuss his sexual conduct in a negative way," Anson recalled.

'He'll destroy me'

The New York Times and New Yorker magazine detailed sexual assault allegations against Weinstein in Oct 2017, sparking the #MeToo movement against sexual harassment. More than 80 women, including Hollywood stars Angelina Jolie and Salma Hayek, have since accused him of sexual misconduct. Actress Rosie Perez, nominated for an Academy Award for best supporting actress for 1993 film "Fearless," testified Friday that she spoke to Sciorra on the phone the night of the alleged attack almost 30 years ago.

Weinstein waved at her as Perez was

asked to pick him out in the courtroom. "Annabella said, 'I think something bad happened. I think it was rape," Perez, 55, said. Several months later, in 1994, she learned from Sciorra that the perpetrator had been Weinstein, Perez added. "I said, 'Please go the police.' But she said, 'I can't, he'll destroy me." Defense attorney Damon Cheronis accused Perez of contradicting the account she gave journalist Ronan Farrow in his New Yorker article when she said she learned of the attack well after it occurred. He said now her story "mirrored" Sciorra's.

The prosecution also called former playboy model Kara Young who told the court that while watching the 1994 Oscars at a friend's house she noticed that Sciorra had cuts on her upper thighs. "She said she was cutting herself," Young, 45, said, bolstering Sciorra's testimony that she started self-harming after the alleged attack.

Rape 'myths'

Weinstein says all his sexual relationships were consensual. Defense attorneys have presented correspondence between Mann and Weinstein which they say show the pair were "in a loving relationship". Early Friday, the prosecution called forensic psychiatrist Barbara Ziv to dispel several "myths" surrounding rape. Ziv, who testified when comedian Bill Cosby was convicted of sexual assault, said victims of sexual assault commonly remain in contact with their attacker for years after the incident. "That contact can range from text messages to emails to continuing a relationship with them," she said.

The psychiatrist said victims often keep quiet because they possess some sort of affection for the abuser or because the perpetrator may also have the power to wreck their job and other relationships. "I can handle this trauma but God forbid they could ruin the rest of my life and make it impossible for me to go on," victims sometimes think, Ziv said. Cheronis challenged Ziv on whether women ever report a consensual sexual encounter as a rape years later "out of shame". "Anything is possible, (but) it's not usual," she replied. The trial continues. — AFP



Pompeo loses temper, curses at journalist over Ukraine questions

WASHINGTON: Shouts, glares and unprintable words: US Secretary of State Mike Pompeo lost his temper and cursed at a journalist, repeatedly "used the F-word" in a shouted diatribe after she questioned him on the administration's stance on Ukraine, a country at the heart of President Donald Trump's impeachment trial. It began when Pompeo gave an early morning interview to NPR radio. Much of the discussion dealt with Iran, but journalist Mary Louise Kelly closed by asking Pompeo

Democrats accuse Trump of abusing his office by pressuring Kiev to investigate his potential election challenger Joe Biden, a charge for which Trump has been impeached and is currently facing trial in the US Senate. Pompeo, a close associate of Trump, has been accused of personally failing to defend Marie Yovanovitch, Washington's former ambassador to Ukraine who was abruptly called home last spring after being subjected to a smear campaign led by Rudy Giuliani, the president's personal lawyer. "Do you owe to Ukraine. He put the map away," Kelly said. "People Ambassador Marie Yovanovitch an apology?" Kelly asked Pompeo.

A tense exchange followed, wherein Pompeo said he had "defended every State Department official", while Kelly asked, in vain, when he had publicly defended Yovanovitch. "I've said all I'm going to say today. Thank you," Pompeo said finally, ending the interview. But the story didn't end there, and Kelly related the rest in an NPR broadcast on Friday evening. She said she thanked the secretary, who did not reply but leaned in and glared at her before leaving the room.

A staffer then invited Kelly to Pompeo's private living room, without her recorder. There, Pompeo "was waiting and... he shouted at me for about same amount of time as the interview itself lasted," Kelly said. "He was not happy to have been questioned about Ukraine." Kelly said, adding that the secretary asked her "do you think Americans care about Ukraine?" while saying swear words. Pompeo then asked his advisers to bring out a map of the world without the countries labeled, to prove that Kelly knew where Ukraine was located. "I pointed will hear about this," said Pompeo, who has publicly attacked journalists in the past. — Agencies

US Space Force logo draws comparisons to 'Star Trek'

WASHINGTON: US President Donald Trump unveiled the logo of Space Force on Friday, attracting critics who said America's newest military branch had boldly gone where Star Trek went before. With a central symbol resembling an arrowhead, ringed by an orbiting object and set to a starry backdrop, many users argued the design was pilfered from the famous science fiction franchise. But a spokesman for the branch hit back, arguing the "Delta" emblem had been used by Air Force space organizations as early as 1961, before the first Star Trek

"After consultation with our Great Military Leaders, designers, and others, I am pleased to present the new logo for the United States Space Force, the Sixth Branch of our Magnificent Military!" wrote Trump of the branch that he championed and which came into being in Dec 2019. It drew immediate mockery among social media Should've been consulting with Gene Roddenberry's lawyers," said the popular "Pourmecoffee" account, referring to the late screenwriter and producer of Star Trek's original series and its



first spin-off, "The Next Generation."

The logo bears an uncanny resemblance to the insignia of Starfleet - the peacekeeping and exploration force of the United Federation of Planets alliance, which is headquartered on Earth whose adversaries include Klingons and Romulans. It has appeared as a pin on the uniforms of iconic Star Trek characters such as Captain Kirk and Spock ever since the original series debuted in 1966, and continues to feature in the franchise's current shows and movies. — AFP

Xi warns of 'grave' situation as China...

Late Thursday, a Kuwait ministry of health spokesman said the ministry is following up the outbreak of the coronavirus and has taken all required measures to confront the deadly virus. In a press statement, Dr Abdullah Al-Sanad assured that all sectors of the ministry are ready to deal with any relevant emergency. He clarified that the entire health sector has been equipped with all necessary equipment and devices to confront and stop the spread of the deadly virus.

The ministry has also issued instructions to doctors and health practitioners about how to deal with suspected infected cases, he said. Sanad stressed that the ministry has, in coordination with other state bodies, taken all preventive and precautionary measures to confront the virus. The ministry is also coordinating with relevant international and regional organizations in this regard, he said. "Airport clinics and isolation rooms are well equipped and thermal cameras are added to border crossings," the statement added.

In Wuhan, the epicenter of the emergency, 450 military medics were deployed to help treat patients in Hubei's capital city, where a seafood and live animal market has been identified as the center of the outbreak. Yesterday, when they should have been celebrating the New Year, people waiting at one hospital in the city were angry and frustrated. "It takes at least five hours to see a doctor," one woman, who didn't want to be named, told AFP. One man in his 30s said some people had to queue for two days. Many people had brought their own chairs for the wait.

Wuhan authorities will race to build the second makeshift hospital within a fortnight, state media reported, adding 1,300 new beds. They already started work Friday on a new field hospital, which state media said could be ready in just over a week. The two hospitals would be similar in size to the temporary facility that was built to tackle SARS in Beijing in 2003, when 650 people died from the disease in the mainland and Hong Kong.

The army medics, who arrived on military aircraft late Friday, include doctors with experience combating SARS or Ebola and will be dispatched to hospitals that are reportedly short on beds due to a crush of infected patients and worried locals. The virus has caused global concern because of its similarity to SARS (Severe Acute Respiratory Syndrome). The new virus has now infected people nationwide and in nearly a dozen other countries, with France saying three cases were confirmed there -the first known European infections.

On the eastern outskirts of Wuhan, Hubei's capital, police manning a roadblock turned away a handful of vehicles trying to exit the city. "Nobody can leave," an

officer told AFP. But the police allowed some medical workers who had gone home for the holidays to reenter the city to help at crowded hospitals. "They need us to go there, otherwise they will be too exhausted," said one of the women, pulling a suitcase.

Trapped residents were stocking up on masks, gloves and disinfectant while car traffic will be severely restricted from today. The city has a shortage of medical supplies including goggles and masks, according to the official Xinhua news agency, which added that the government has shipped 14,000 protective suits and 110,000 pairs of gloves to Wuhan. "Everyone is just trying to protect themselves," said a man in a surgical mask at a busy pharmacy whose staff wore protective suits.

Foreign citizens were set to be evacuated from Wuhan within the next few days. US Coffee chain Starbucks said it would shut all its stores in Hubei during the Lunar New Year festival for the "health safety" of staff and customers. The government says most of the cases have been in Hubei and most of the deaths involved people who already suffered pre-existing health conditions.

Underscoring fears that the virus could spread further, overseas Chinese tour groups will be suspended from tomorrow while domestic trips have already been halted. Beijing will suspend long-distance bus service entering and leaving the capital of 20 million people from today due to "requirements of epidemic prevention and control," the official People's Daily newspaper reported. The National Health Commission also ordered nationwide measures to detect and isolate people carrying the virus on planes, trains and buses across the country. Xinhua said yesterday that temperature screening checkpoints have been set up in 387 railway stations across the country.

Meanwhile, tourists from Hubei in Haikou, capital of the island province of Hainan, were told by the city government they had to spend 14 days in a hotel for centralized medical observation, and were forbidden to leave. Beijing's Forbidden City, Shanghai Disneyland and a section of the Great Wall are among many attractions that have closed as a precaution. China's film box-office earnings for Lunar New Year's Eve on Friday were just one-tenth of last year as people shunned crowds.

Xi chaired the Communist Party leadership meeting which urged regional governments to make "the safety of the masses' lives and their physical health a top priority", state media said. Xinhua said the Standing Committee agreed to set up a working group that would visit Hubei. In Hong Kong, where five people have tested positive for the virus so far, city leader Carrie Lam declared the situation an "emergency" and schools, currently on holiday, will remain closed until Feb 17. The World Health Organization on Thursday stopped short of declaring a global emergency, which would have prompted greater international cooperation, including possible trade and travel restrictions. — Agencies

HH the Crown Prince Sheikh Nawaf Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah also condoled with Erdogan on the victims of the earthquake, which also destroyed public and private properties. HH the Prime Minister Sheikh Sabah Al-Khaled Al-Hamad Al-Sabah sent a similar cable.

The Turkish government's disaster and emergency management agency (AFAD) said 42 people had been rescued alive from collapsed buildings in Elazig. Interior Minister Suleyman Soylu said earlier yesterday 22 people were estimated to be trapped under the rubble. Turkish news channels showed live images of people rescued. Among those found alive was a woman called Azize who had contacted emergency authorities and spoken to a rescue worker by telephone, state news agency Anadolu reported.

Nearly 2,000 search and rescue personnel were sent to the region while thousands of beds, blankets and tents have been provided, the presidency said. The rescue efforts have been taking place in freezing temperatures as

wood and plastic were burned to keep crowds warm. Hundreds of people were anxiously waiting on the other side of police barriers including a man who gave his name as Mustafa. "I have three relatives in that building: One man, his wife and her mother. They are still under the rubble," the 40-year-old told AFP. "I was home during the earthquake. It lasted for so long, it was like a nightmare. I froze in the living room when it happened, my wife and our two children were screaming and running around," he said.

He added that some neighbors jumped out of the windows in panic as families including his were forced to spend Friday night on the streets. Some 20 rescuers were on top of the remains of one collapsed building, slowly clearing the rubble one bucket at a time surrounded by

Among the 1,243 people injured were residents in other southeast provinces including Diyarbakir and Sanliurfa. Health minister Fahrettin Koca said no one was in a criti-

Tensions were high as one resident accused the government of lying. "They (the government) claim that only four people are trapped under the rubble. It is not true. I have five relatives in that building," Suat, a 45-year-old butcher, said. "There are four floors and three flats per floor. If there were five people per flat, do the math. Why are they lying?" Suat described the moment when the quake struck as he was at home in another neighborhood and his children "were screaming in terror".

The Ankara public prosecutor's office said it had begun an investigation into "provocative" social media posts but did not give further details. Erdogan also told citizens to "ignore gossip and negative propaganda". The tremor was felt in several parts of eastern Turkey near the Iraqi and Syrian borders as well as in Iran, Lebanon and Syria.

Environment and Urbanisation Minister Murat Kurum told reporters in Elazig that five buildings collapsed while others were badly or lightly damaged. The US Geological Survey assessed the magnitude as 6.7, slightly lower than AFAD, adding that it struck near the East Anatolian Fault in an area that has suffered no documented large ruptures since an earthquake in 1875. There have been 401 aftershocks including 14 that were above four in magnitude, AFAD said.

In 1999, a devastating 7.4 magnitude earthquake hit Izmit in western Turkey, leaving more than 17,000 people dead including about 1,000 in Istanbul. Experts have long warned a large quake could devastate the city of 15 million people, which has allowed widespread building without safety precautions. Such fears were acutely awakened in September last year when a 5.7-magnitude earthquake shook Istanbul, causing residents to flee buildings in the economic capital. — Agencies

Highway to Hell: Mayer wins famed Kitzbuehel downhill

There were four crashes, but seemingly without any serious injury

KITZBUHEL: Austrian Matthias Mayer delighted parts propelling them 60 metres in the air, only for home fans and achieved "every skier's dream" by streaking to a classy victory in yesterday's fabled downhill in Kitzbuehel, the most prestigious and testing on the World Cup circuit.

Mayer, gold medallist in downhill at the 2014 Sochi Olympics and in the super-G in 2018, clocked 1min 56.59sec down the thigh-trembling 3.3km-long Streif course on the Hahnenkamm mountain, making the most of the absence through injury of three-time downhill champion Dominik Paris of Italy.

Mayer's teammate Vincent Kriechmayr and Switzerland's Beat Feuz, winner of the Wengen downhill last weekend and already three times second-placed in the Austrian resort, tied for second, at 0.22sec.

Norway's reigning world downhill champion Kjetil Jansrud, winner of Friday's super-G (in which Mayer was third) and a downhill champion here in 2015, was sixth behind the French duo of Johan Clarey and Maxence Muzaton.

"It's not even a dream of every Austrian but of every skier in the world to win the race here," said Mayer. "It was amazing, especially here in front of the home crowd. There were so many people in the finish area, cheering

Mayer, 29, insisted he had not been thinking about his time. "I was just focused on my skiing: trying to ski well every turn and ski fast. I wasn't sure at the end because I wasn't thinking whether I could win or not.

"Then I saw the green light! I was so happy and very satisfied with the feeling." It was perhaps telling that the deafening music played over the tannoy for Mayer's run was AC/DC's 'Highway to Hell', given the exigencies of a course with a gradient of 85% in parts and where racers hit an eye-watering 100km/h (60mph) within five seconds of leaving the startgate.

The Austrian laid down a near-perfect line to master a course that falls, snakes and rolls, sending competitors barrelling through a wide variety of terrain, in

them to quickly re-align for icy traverses that severely test technical ability and mastery of well-honed equipment.

GOOD RISK MANAGEMENT

In a race often dubbed alpine skiing's equivalent to the Monaco Grand Prix, Mayer demonstrated a perfectly weighted "risk management" reminiscent of a successful Formula One driver's: go full tilt into a chicane and you're asking for trouble.

Streaking through the line, having battled creeping exhaustion and a 3.5G centrifugal force to change direction into the final descent, Mayer looked upwards, hands raised, confident of victory to add to his super-G triumph on the same slope back in 2017.

Australian heavy rock was replaced by an Austrian marching song, the 50,000-strong crowd clapping in unison amid flares, flags and fiery alcohol, baying 'Mayer" in response to the emcee's "Matthias?".

There have, needless to say, been several gruesome crashes in the white-knuckled downhill over the years.

SLIDING BODIES

Sliding bodies, flailing skis and helicopter evacuations have become a regular feature and quickly silence the crowd. There were four crashes on Saturday, American Ryan Cochran-Siegle, Austrian Otmar Striedinger, Italian Peter Fill and German Manuel Schmid all bombing out, but seemingly without

At each fall, the packed tribune quickly hushes, the music and big screen images cut for an odd silence to fall over the well-lubricated spectators.

Striedinger's slide into the safety netting left onlooking Mayer clutching his head and puffing out his cheeks in sympathy. A raised pole in recognition from a felled skier untangling himself from the nets and gingerly refinding his feet is then greeted by applause followed

by roars for the next competitor's breath-taking descent in what becomes a gladiatorial insight into the draw of the ultimate alpine skiing test: its inherent danger.

Arnold Schwarzenegger, the Austrian bodybuilder/actor-cum-California governor was one of those cheering, as was American actor Patrick

Dempsey, who has moved into competing in pro-am auto racing events such as the Le Mans and Daytona endurance races.

"I always wanted to be a ski racer," the former 'Grey's Anatomy' heart-throb said. "I'm really excited to be here." — AFP

New Zealand, Fiji, England command sevens attention

HAMILTON: New Zealand, Fiji and England emerged as the unbeaten sides in the new cutthroat version of the World Rugby Sevens series in Hamilton yesterday. Under the format, introduced for the New Zealand round and for Australia next weekend, quarter-finals have been scrapped, pool winners progress direct to the semi-finals and there is no longer a second chance for teams who slip up in pool play.

South Africa, who went into the tournament as co-leaders in the series with New Zealand, did slip up when they missed a conversion with seconds remaining against England and lost 21-19. It meant England kept their unblemished record after they also beat Kenya 24-19 and have only Japan to play in their final Pool B match on Sunday while South Africa, who beat Japan 31-5, will play Kenya. New Zealand, who opened their campaign

with a 47-0 romp against Wales, finished the day with a 26-5 victory over the highly rated USA side in Pool A.

Co-captain Tim Mikkelson said that with no quarter-final safety net they knew they could not afford to take the USA lightly. "We circled this one. We said if we lose the game we won't be playing tomorrow, so a massive effort from the boys," he said.

New Zealand's final pool game is against Scotland whose sole win was a narrow 24-19 victory over Wales. Reigning series champions Fiji, whose best placing this season is a fourth in Cape Town, secured pole position in Pool D with a hard-earned 19-12 victory over Australia which put them on track for a likely semi-final showdown with New Zealand.

Pool C will boil down to who performs best when Canada play Spain and France face Ireland in their final matches before the

Canada produced a surprise 26-21 win over Ireland and then battled to a 12-12 draw with France who had finished third in the Cape Town tournament six weeks ago.

In the women's competition, New Zealand emerged as the only unbeaten side in Pool A after China upset a six-woman Fiji 17-12 with Yang Feifei scoring the match decider right on

New Zealand, who face Fiji on Sunday, were untroubled on day one as they thrashed China 40-7 before producing an equally comprehensive 40-7 victory over England.

There are two unbeaten teams in the two other women's pools who are destined to meet early Sunday to determine who go through to

In Pool B the showdown is between Australia and the USA who are second and third in the standings after three rounds of the women's world series, while the match between France and Canada will decide who goes through from Pool C. — AFP

Pakistan thump sloppy Bangladesh for Twenty20 international series win

Pakistan skipper Babar puts victory down to 'team work'

LAHORE: Skipper Babar Azam and senior batsman Mohammad Hafeez stroked masterful half-centuries to steer Pakistan to a convincing nine-wicket win over a hapless Bangladesh in the second Twenty20 international in Lahore yesterday.

Babar scored a 44-ball 66 not out for his 13th half-century and Hafeez made an undefeated 49-ball 67 to guide Pakistan to a modest 137-run target in 16.4 overs at Gaddafi stadium, taking an unbeatable 2-0 lead in the three-match series.

Bangladesh again failed to put up a challenging total despite opener Tamim Iqbal's 53-ball 65, managing 136-6 in their 20 overs after winning the toss and batting for a second consecutive match.

Pakistan skipper Babar put the victory down to "team work". "Credit for my captaincy goes to the players," said Babar, who now has two wins in five matches as captain. "The seniors and bowlers make it easy for me. The series win was much-needed, we played a lot of youngsters, the idea was to increase our talent pool to give us more options going into the World Cup."

Bangladesh captain Mahmudullah said defeats were disappointing. "Definitely, disappointed to lose," said the Bangladesh skipper. "We didn't apply ourselves with the bat, except for Tamim. Should've scored 150-160. Intent was there, credit to Pakistan's bowlers.

"We didn't finish off well. Not sure yet how we'll go for the last game, maybe we'll try to play some reserves, but we need to come hard at them and win the game." Pakistan won the first match, also in Lahore on Friday, by five wickets. The final match is at the same venue tomorrow.

Pakistan were never in trouble despite losing opener Ahsan Ali in the second over, caught by Mahmudullah Riyad off pace-



man Shafiul Islam in the second over. World number one Twenty20 batsman Babar, who was out without scoring on Friday, was in a punishing mood right from the outset, hitting seven boundaries and a six in his knock.

Hafeez, recalled after 14 months in the Twenty20 side, stroked nine boundaries and a six in his 11th T20 fifty as the two added 131 for the unbroken second wickets stand. Earlier, Bangladesh failed to better

their unimpressive total of 141-5 on Friday as they found Pakistan bowling led by paceman Mohammad Hasnain's 2-20 hard to get off.

Opener Mohammad Naim fell off the very first ball he faced, caught behind by wicketkeeper Mohammad Rizwan off lanky left-arm paceman Shaheen Shah Afridi who finished with 1-22.

It could have been worse had Rizwan hang on to an inside edge off Iqbal's bat

off a luckless Hasnan when the batsman was 16. Iqbal took full advantage of the lapse, hitting seven boundaries and a six during his laborious knock.

Bangladesh's highest partnership was 31 for the fourth wicket as Afif Hossain knocked a six and a boundary in his 20-ball 21 before he holed out off Hasnain. Skipper Mahmudullah scored run-a-ball 12 as Bangladesh managed 48 in the last five overs. — AFP

Stokes fined by ICC after foul language rant at spectator

JOHANNESBURG: England all-rounder Ben Stokes was fined and given a demerit point by the International Cricket Council (ICC) yesterday after a foul-mouthed row with a spectator on Friday in the test against South Africa.

Stokes was shown on television exchanging insults with a spectator as he walked off the field after being caught cheaply for two runs in England's first innings on the opening day of the fourth test at The Wanderers, known as 'the bullring' for its often hostile atmosphere.

He was fined 15 percent of his match fee and given a demerit point after being charged by the ICC with a level one offence of "use of an audible obscenity". Stokes admitted the offence and accepted the sanction, the ICC said.



He apologised several hours after the incident, while Ashley Giles, Managing Director for England Men's Cricket said other England personnel had been abused and issued a strong condemnation.

"I wish to apologise for my language that was heard on the live broadcast today after my dismissal. I should not have reacted in that way," said Stokes. "As I was leaving the playing area, I was subjected to repeated abuse from the crowd.

"I admit that my reaction was unprofessional and I sincerely apologise for the language I used, especially to the many young fans watching the live telecast around the world. "Throughout the Tests so far, the support from both sets of fans (England and South Africa) has been brilliant. One incident will not ruin such a competitive series, which we are determined to win," he added.

Giles said Stokes was not the only one to suffer abuse and made a request for the stadium to beef up security around the England team. "In addition to this incident, members of our support staff were subjected to personal abuse during and after the day's play," he said.

"We have requested to the venue to ensure that security and stewarding are enhanced for the remainder of the match so that players and staff members can go about their duties without provocation," Giles added. Stokes is the latest in a long list of players to have spats with spectators at The Wanderers, where there is a long walk from the dressing rooms to the pitch, alongside a grassy bank often filled with boozy spectators.

Television pictures did not show Stokes being

England on top with bat as SA struggle

JOHANNESBURG: England proved devastating with both bat and ball yesterday as they scored 400 runs in their first innings and then reduced sorry South Africa to 88 for six wickets at the close of play on the second day of the fourth test at The Wanderers.

A record 10th-wicket partnership saw England amass a formidable first-innings total before rampaging through the home's team batting order to take a stranglehold on the game and move closer to a series victory.

Quinton de Kock was 32 not out at the close after Anrich Nortje was caught in the slips on the last ball of the day, heightening the possibility of South Africa following on for a second successive test.

The home side's confidence had already taken a hefty knock when their bowlers were subjected to a bashing from tailenders Stuart Broad and Mark Wood, whose 82-run partnership was a record for the last wicket at the Johannesburg

South Africa, 2-1 down in the series, would still have held out hopes of a fightback when they had England 318-9 but after leaking runs and then being tumbled out by the touring bowlers, they again have their backs to the wall.

Wood led the way in the evening session with 3-21 as England removed Pieter Malan (15), Rassie van der Dussen (0), Dean Elgar (26), Faf du Plessis (3) and Temba Bavuma (6) with their fiveman seam attack generating real pace off the quick wicket.

Ben Stokes took two catches after a series of dropped efforts in the third test last weekend.

In contrast, South Africa's bowlers were punished as Broad, who made 43 off 28 balls, and Wood, not out on 35, thrashed the ball to all parts, forcing South Africa into the seldom-seen scenario of eight boundary fielders trying to defend against No. 10 and No. 11 batsmen.

There were also half centuries for captain Joe Root and Ollie Pope and a valuable 32 from Chris Woakes in his first appearance on the tour. Nortje (5-110) took a maiden test five-wicket haul.

England were 192-4 overnight when play began 45 minutes late because of a rain delay and steadily moved the scoreboard along as Pope, first, and then Root got to 50.

Pope (56) continued to build on his growing reputation and looked the senior batsman at times as he and Root (59) put on 101 runs for the fifth wicket. — Reuters

Jackson, Ravens making best of AFC's Pro Bowl clash with NFC

BALTIMORE: Admittedly, Baltimore Ravens quarterback Lamar Jackson would rather be preparing for the Super Bowl. But the talented 23-year-old has embraced this weekend despite his team's disappointing playoff exit. He will be one of a league-high 12 Ravens who are expected to play in the Pro Bowl today afternoon in Orlando, Fla.

It will mark Jackson's first Pro Bowl appearance as he represents the AFC in its annual contest against the NFC. "He's just a special player, a special dude," said Ravens running back Mark Ingram II, who also will play in the game.

"An elite athlete on the field, a great person off the field. Humble. Hard worker. Leadership. Everything you need in a franchise quarterback, he has it. I'm glad to be with him." The Ravens had a 13th player named to the Pro Bowl, but cornerback Marcus Peters declined to take part in the game because of an unspecified injury. The 13 selections overall matched the 2007 Dallas Cowboys for the all-time record.

Others joining Jackson and Ingram include offensive linemen Marshal Yanda, Ronnie Stanley and Orlando Brown, as well as tight end Mark Andrews and fullback Patrick Ricard. The Ravens' defensive contingent in the Pro Bowl includes safety Earl Thomas III, cornerback Marlon Humphrey and linebacker Matthew Judon.

Kicker Justin Tucker and long snapper Morgan Cox round out the Ravens who spent the week in Orlando. "It'll be fun, and it'll be a chance for us to kind of maybe heal up a little bit in a great environment," Ravens coach John Harbaugh told reporters. "I don't know how many of these guys really like roller coasters, but I know for me and my family, we will be at the roller coasters at Universal (Studios) a lot."

As the Ravens' offense leads the AFC, the Minnesota Vikings' defense will lead the NFC. The Vikings have eight players in the Pro Bowl, including five on defense. That group includes defensive linemen Danielle Hunter and Everson Griffen up front, linebacker Eric Kendricks patrolling the middle, and safety Harrison Smith and cornerback Xavier Rhodes assisting the secondary.

Kendricks led the Vikings with 110 tackles during a career-best season. He added two forced fumbles and two fumble recoveries in the regular season and intercepted San Francisco 49ers quarterback Jimmy Garoppolo in the playoffs, and he was rewarded with his first Pro Bowl selection.

"I've always known I can do it," Kendricks told reporters after being named a first-team All-Pro. "There's just more that I want and more that I'm after. It's definitely nice to get the validation. At the same time, that's not what I'm focused on."

The game will not include any players from the 49ers or the Kansas City Chiefs as they get ready for the Super Bowl one week later. But plenty of star playmakers fill both the AFC and NFC rosters.

Besides Jackson, the AFC's quarterback contingent includes Deshaun Watson of the Houston Texans and Ryan Tannehill of the Tennessee Titans. Tannehill replaced the Chiefs' Patrick Mahomes. The NFC's signal-callers include Russell Wilson of the Seattle Seahawks, Drew Brees of the New Orleans Saints and Kirk Cousins of the Vikings. Cousins replaced injured rival Aaron Rodgers of the Green Bay Packers.

The AFC has won the last three Pro Bowls since the format returned to a traditional conference matchup. — Reuters

NZ's double shot-put champ Adams qualifies for fifth Olympic Games

WELLINGTON: Double shot-put champion Valerie Adams qualified for her fifth Olympic Games yesterday after the New Zealander spent almost two years out of competition. The 35-year-old gave birth to a son last March and had not competed since July 2018. She only returned to competition in early 2018 after having her first child, a daughter named Kimoana, in 2017.

"These are Games I'm really excited about attending, especially going as a mum of two now," Adams told TVNZ after qualifying for the July 24-Aug. 9 Tokyo Games with throws of 18.55 and 18.65 metres at a meeting in New Zealand.

The qualifying mark was 18.50m. "The last time I competed was 20 months ago so it has been a long road but quite an exciting journey." Adams finished seventh as a teenager at Athens in 2004 and won gold at Beijing and London before being pipped in Rio by American Michelle Carter's massive final throw.

She took time off after Rio to have her first child and made her international return at the 2018 Gold Coast Commonwealth Games, where she clinched silver. Adams announced her second pregnancy in October 2018, just weeks after she had opened up about problems with infertility. She had been told if she wanted more children she would probably need to do so before the Tokyo Games.

Adams has kept a low profile since her son Kepaleli was born last year and said her biggest battle in her return to training and competition had been mental.

"I am in pretty good shape and Livet wanted to come

"I am in pretty good shape and I just wanted to come out and have a stable competition, get my nerves under control and have a good technical competition, which I did," she added. "There is always a lot of pressure put on myself, by myself ... and I want to go to the Olympics and be competitive." — Reuters



Barca beaten by Valencia in early blow for Setien

Real Madrid move three points clear of champions at the top of the table

VALENCIA: Quique Setien's honeymoon period lasted less than a fortnight as he tasted his first Barcelona defeat yesterday in his second La Liga game in charge after a 2-0 loss to Valencia.

Maxi Gomez's strike and a Jordi Alba own goal at Mestalla handed Barca their fourth league defeat of the campaign, giving Real Madrid the chance to move three points clear of the champions at the top of the table when they visit Real Valladolid today.

Barcelona had most of the ball but their opponents had the best chances as Gomez missed a penalty and also hit the crossbar in the first half. Gabriel Paulista saw a third goal ruled out late on.

While performances under previous coach Ernesto Valverde were stodgy, he left a team that sat top of the table. Setien promised a new style but despite dominating possession, Barcelona went nowhere with it and as Valencia grew in confidence, they ceded control.

"It should not take us long," Setien had said on Friday, when asked how quickly his players could adapt to his methods. Valencia climb to fifth and continue to improve under Albert Celades. This success came without their captain Dani Parejo and, largely, without star striker Rodrigo Moreno, who has been linked with a January move to Barcelona.

The hosts hardly touched the ball for the first six minutes, their fans whistling as they urged a more aggressive approach. But the plan was to sit and absorb and it worked, with Barcelona unable to cut through or create a single clear chance.

VALENCIA DANGEROUS

And when Valencia did intervene, they were more dan-

gerous too. With their first attack they won a penalty as Jose Gaya slipped past Gerard Pique and would surely have scored from eight yards before being brought down.

Pique was booked and, with Parejo absent, Gomez stepped up, only for his driven shot to be well saved by Marc-Andre ter Stegen, albeit with the help of half a yard's headstart off his line. Barca were riding their luck. Sergi Roberto's header cannoned off Pique but fell just close enough for Ter Stegen, who parried a Gomez shot onto the crossbar and almost spilled another to Kevin Gameiro.

Referee Gil Manzano puts his hands together as if to apologise after failing to play advantage when Ferran Torres was clear but the frustration of Valencia's fans turned to ecstasy shortly after half-time.

Pique's flicked header landed at the feet of Gomez, whose driven effort took a cruel deflection off Alba and flew in. Setien traded the patience of Arthur Melo for the physicality of Arturo Vidal and Rodrigo came on to a rousing reception.

Barcelona exerted some pressure and Lionel Messi led the way, hauled to the ground by Francis Coquelin and then denied by a brilliant Gabriel tackle. He fired past the post, headed wide and saw a curling free-kick saved.

Yet just as a Barcelona equaliser began to feel inevitable, Valencia struck again. A quick throw caught Alba out of position and Torres did well to cut inside and switch to Gomez. He took a touch and curled into

Gabriel thought he had a third after volleying in from a corner but VAR persuaded Manzano there had been a push. When Messi ballooned a late free-kick into the stands, Valencia knew their win was secure. — AFP

PARIS: Giannis Antetokounmpo put on a show with 30 points, 16 rebounds and six assists, lifting the Milwaukee Bucks to a 116-103 win over the Charlotte Hornets on Friday in the NBA's first regular-season game in Paris. After the teams battled to a tie at 78 through three quarters, the Bucks pulled away with an 11-2 burst that featured an Antetokounmpo three-point play, three free throws from Kyle Korver after he was fouled on a 3-point shot attempt, and a 3-point jumper from Khris Middleton. Eric Bledsoe backed Antetokounmpo with 20 points for the Bucks, and George Hill chipped in with 16 points. Superior bench play kept Charlotte in the game, with reserve Malik Monk leading all scorers with 31 points while Marvin Williams added 18. Devonte' Graham finished with 19 points to go with a team-high seven rebounds.

LOS ANGELES CLIPPERS 122 -MIAMI HEAT III

Kawhi Leonard scored 17 of his game-high 33 points in the crucial third quarter and had his first career triple-double as Los Angeles beat host Miami, which lost for only the second time in 22 home games. The Heat were led by Jimmy Butler, who had 20 points, eight rebounds and seven assists before going out with a right-ankle injury in the fourth quarter. Iheanacho fires Leicester into FA Cup fifth round

LONDON: Leicester edged into the FA Cup fifth round as Kelechi Iheanacho's early goal sealed a 1-0 win at second tier Brentford yesterday. Brendan Rodgers' side are chasing a trip to Wembley on two fronts and they took the next step in the FA Cup after surviving a hard-fought fourth round clash in west London. Flying high in the Premier League, third placed Leicester could be set for a memorable end to

Leicester, who have never won the FA Cup, are hoping to reach the final for the first time since 1969. In the League Cup, they are through to the semifinals and head to Aston Villa in the second leg on Tuesday after being held to a 1-1 draw in the first match at the King Power Stadium. Rodgers made nine changes from Wednesday's Premier League win over West Ham, with only Caglar Sovuncu and Avoze Perez remaining in the starting line-up for Leicester's first meeting with Brentford since 1993. Kasper Schmeichel, Youri Tielemans and James Maddison were on the bench, while Jamie Vardy was sidelined by a glute injury suffered against West Ham.

Despite Vardy's absence, it took Leicester just four minutes to go ahead when Nigerian striker Iheanacho met James Justin's cross with a clinical close-range finish.

It was Iheanacho's seventh goal in 12 appearances this season — and his ninth in nine FA Cup starts proving he can be an able deputy for Vardy while the 17-goal star is sidelined. — AFP

West Ham suffer FA Cup misery

LONDON: West Ham crashed out of the FA Cup as their former manager Slaven Bilic led West Bromwich Albion to a surprise 1-0 win, while Tottenham were held to a 1-1 draw by Southampton in yesterday's fourth round action. Albion boss Bilic, sacked by the Hammers in 2017, made eight changes as he prioritised the Championship leaders' push to return to the Premier League.

But Albion took a shock lead at the London Stadium when Conor Townsend drilled in his first goal for the club after nine minutes. West Ham, struggling in the top-flight under new boss David Moyes and now without a win in four games, were given a lifeline when West Brom's Semi Ajayi was sent off in the 72nd minute after his push earned a second yellow card.

Sebastien Haller should have equalised with

a headed chance and Manuel Lanzini then dragged his shot wide, but Albion held on. West Ham were jeered off by their furious fans, while Croatian Bilic, who also played for the east Londoners, celebrated a sweet success with his Albion players. "We put a strong team out. I was well aware it was a home tie so I wanted to try to make it work, but on the day we did not play well enough," Moyes said. "We gave up opportunities in the early part of the game and they got their goal. Too many poor passes and not enough good play."

At St Mary's, Christian Eriksen was left out amid reports in Italy suggesting the Tottenham midfielder has agreed a move to Inter Milan, while Gedson Fernandes made his full debut for Jose Mourinho's men.

Tottenham's last visit to Southampton was a

painful one, with Harry Kane suffering a torn hamstring in a Premier League defeat on New Year's Day, a clash that saw Mourinho embroiled in a touchline row with a member of the Saints' coaching staff. Mourinho's side struck in the 58th minute on their return to the south-coast.

South Korea forward Son Heung-min fired home from Erik Lamela's pass for his 12th goal of the season. But Southampton hit back to equalise through Sofiane Boufal's powerful strike from Danny Ings' cross in the 87th

"They are a good team. They put some pressure on us in the last minutes and scored. But we are alive," Mourinho said. "We don't need one more match but we have it so we are going to fix it. It's better to draw than to be out."

NEWCASTLE FRUSTRATED

Newcastle had to settle for an embarrassing 0-0 draw with third tier Oxford at St James' Park as their wretched FA Cup form haunted them again. Steve Bruce's side are looking to make the fifth round for the first time since 2006, but they needed a replay to beat minnows Rochdale in the previous round and they will have to go the distance again after this limp display.

Burnley and Norwich made a combined total of 12 changes at Turf Moor, with the Canaries running out 2-1 winners. Grant Hanley's 53rd minute goal and a 57th minute strike from Josip Drmic put Norwich in control before Erik Pieters reduced the deficit in the 74th minute. Cardiff fans were warned not to sing "racist or homophobic songs" after two

incidents were reported during their 1-1 draw at fellow Championship side Reading. Sheffield United won 2-0 at second tier Millwall through Muhamed Besic's 62nd minute goal and Oliver Norwood's 84th minute strike. Kelechi Iheanacho's early goal sealed a 1-0 win for Leicester at Championship side Brentford. Brendan Rodgers' team are chasing a trip to Wembley on two fronts and the League Cup semi-finalists took the next step in the FA Cup.

Leicester, who have never won the FA Cup, are hoping to reach the final for the first time since 1969. Kyrgios into Nadal grudge match as shocks rattle Australian Open

MELBOURNE: Home favourite Nick Kyrgios went five sets to ensure an Australian Open showdown with Rafael Nadal yesterday as a series of shocks caused carnage in the women's draw. Kyrgios survived the longest match of his career to beat Russia's Karen Khachanov 6-2, 7-6 (7/5), 6-7 (6/8), 6-7 (7/9), 7-6 (10/8), collapsing on his back after the fifth-set tie-breaker.

"That was insane — I've got no words to how I'm feeling right now," he said, after the 4hr 26min marathon marked by his trademark tweeners and exchanges with the umpire. "This is just epic man, I don't even know what's going on. My legs feel about 40 kilos each."

The outspoken Aussie now heads into a last-16 clash with Nadal, with whom he has history after calling him

"super salty" following criticism from the Spaniard last year. "Whatever happens between us, he's an amazing player, he's arguably the greatest of all time," said Kyrgios. Top seed Nadal had a comparatively easy ride against his Davis Cup team-mate Pablo Carreno Busta, racing through 6-1, 6-2, 6-4 in what he called his "best match of the tournament so far"

While the men's Big Three of Nadal, Roger Federer and Novak Djokovic are all still alive, it's a different story in the women's competition where six of the top 10 seeds crashed out in the third round. After Serena Williams and title-holder Naomi Osaka fell by the wayside on Friday, second seed Karolina Pliskova bombed on Saturday with a 7-6 (7/4), 7-6 (7/3) defeat to Anastasia Pavlyuchenkova. "I was about 40 percent today of my game," lamented the Czech.

RESURGENT MUGURUZA

Switzerland's Belinda Bencic, the sixth seed, won only one game against Estonia's Anett Kontaveit, the world number 31, as she went down 6-0, 6-1. And a resurgent Garbine Muguruza, a two-time Major-winner, thrashed fifth seed Elina Svitolina 6-1, 6-2. Tenth seed Madison Keys lost to Maria Sakkari on Friday.

"I was very concentrated and focused on what I wanted to do, it all went fast my way," said Muguruza, who raced

through the first set in just 23 minutes. Croatian 19th seed Donna Vekic also crumbled to lower-ranked opposition when she lost 7-5, 6-3 to Poland's Iga Swiatek, who is returning from a stress fracture in her foot.

However, Wimbledon champion Simona Halep stayed on course with a 6-1, 6-4 victory over Kazakhstan's Yulia Putintseva. "I'm sure that for you guys (media) it's a little bit of shock when the top-10 players are losing," said Halep, shrugging off the exodus of top seeds. "But it's life and we cannot be 100 percent every day." The Romanian fourth seed will now play Belgium's Elise Mertens, who won in three sets against CiCi Bellis — ending the American's Grand Slam return from long-term injury.

Angelique Kerber, the 2016 champion, beat Camila Giorgi 6-2, 6-7 (4/7), 6-3 to set up a meeting with Pavlyuchenkova, the Russian 30th seed. Elsewhere, Germany's Alexander Zverev dismissed Fernando Verdasco 6-2, 6-2, 6-4 to set up a last-16 clash with Russia's Andrey Rublev, who remained unbeaten this year with his 2-6, 7-6 (7/3), 6-4, 7-6 (7/4) win over David Goffin.

Austrian fifth seed Dominic Thiem came through 6-2, 6-4, 6-7 (5/7), 6-4 against Taylor Fritz, Gael Monfils beat Ernests Gulbis 7-6 (7/2), 6-4, 6-3 and Stanislas Wawrinka, the 2014 champion, progressed when John Isner retired in the second set.—AFP
