

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First Arab space mission to Mars launches from Japan


Amir sends congratulations • Astrophysicists unveil biggest 3D map of Universe



TOKYO: The first Arab space mission to Mars, an unmanned probe dubbed "Hope", blasted off from Japan yesterday, in a bid to reveal more about the atmosphere of the Red Planet. The Japanese rocket carrying the probe developed by the United Arab Emirates lifted off from the Tanegashima Space Centre in southern Japan right on schedule at 6:58 am local time. The launch of the probe, known as "Al-Amal" in Arabic, had twice been delayed because of bad weather, but the liftoff yesterday appeared smooth and successful.

Almost exactly one hour later, a live feed showed people applauding in the Japanese control room as the probe successfully detached. "The launch vehicle trajectory was executed as planned and separation of the Hope spacecraft was confirmed," rocket manufacturer Mitsubishi Heavy Industries said. In Dubai, the launch was met with rapturous excitement, with the Burj Khalifa - the world's tallest skyscraper - lit up hours before liftoff with a symbolic 10-second countdown in anticipation.

HH the Amir of Kuwait Sheikh Sabah Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah sent cables of congratulations to UAE President Sheikh Khalifa bin Zayed Al-Nahyan and to Vice President, Premier and Dubai Ruler Sheikh Mohammad bin Rashid Al-Maktoum. In the cables, the Amir expressed sincere pride, and wished utmost prosperity for the UAE after the historic and successful launch of "Hope", the first Arab interplanetary space mission to Mars. "This mission is an important milestone for the UAE and the region," said Yousuf Hamad Al-Shaibani, director of the UAE's Mohammed bin Rashid Space Centre, at a post-launch press

Commercial flights hampered by PCR test requirements

KUWAIT: The Directorate General of Civil Aviation (DGCA) is ready to restart commercial flights at Kuwait International Airport and Saad Al-Abdullah Airport from August 1 with a total capacity of 10,000 passengers daily in the beginning. But travelers -

both those departing Kuwait for holidays or other travel and those arriving - have many outstanding questions that are yet to be answered.

All passengers arriving to Kuwait will need a negative polymerase chain reaction (PCR) test result no older than 96 hours. "Furthermore, we will choose 10 percent of arriving passengers for random PCR tests upon arrival to make sure their tests were proper," Director General of the DGCA Yousef Al-Fouzan told Kuwait Times in an exclusive interview.

Those traveling should undergo the PCR test in Kuwait, but it's not yet clear where it can be done. Currently, only the health ministry can administer the PCR test and provide a negative certificate. The call center of the health ministry told Kuwait Times that Kuwaitis can have their PCR test done at Sabah Hospital, while expats should arrange one through their embassy. When contacting European embassies, they said they have no clue about where the test can be done.

"We are now finalizing the procedure of performing 1,000 PCR tests daily by National Aviation Services (NAS), which should be clear before August 1. We also proposed to let private clinics conduct PCR tests so more people can travel. When the plan of conducting the PCR tests at the airport is finalized, we will announce Continued on Page 2

Under the king's rule, Saudi Arabia launched ambitious economic reforms for a post-oil era and gave more rights to women, but also adopted a more assertive foreign policy. King Salman took the throne in 2015 after the death of his half-brother Abdullah. King Salman, the custodian of Islam's holiest sites, spent more than 2-1/2 years as the Saudi crown prince and deputy premier from June 2012 before becoming king. — Agencies

as well as migrants from sub-Saharan Africa who come to work, study or try to reach Europe, say they suffer endemic day-to-day racism. "Floyd's death awakened the anger and rage dormant within us," said Fabrice, an undocumented Cameroonian in his 40s who lives in Algiers, adding that it twisted "the knife in the wound".

But the Black Lives Matter (BLM) movement, most observers agree, has not triggered a major debate on racism or police violence against black Africans within the Maghreb region itself. Only Tunis saw a small demonstration in early June of around 200 locals and foreigners, at the call of the association Mnemty. The

protest was "a message for African Americans from Mother Africa to say 'We are with you'," said its leader, Saadia Mosbah, a dark-skinned Tunisian.

In both Morocco and Algeria, however, the BLM movement has generated only a few messages of solidarity online - not enough to challenge a long-standing culture of silence about race. Most often the racism is verbal, but "sometimes words hurt more than being hit", said Aisha, a woman from Niger who also lives in Algiers. She said black people often endure slurs such as "kahlouche", black in Arabic, or "Mamadou", a common name in West Africa.

Erdogan visits Hagia Sofia after reconversion to mosque

ISTANBUL: Turkish President Recep Tayyip Erdogan paid a surprise visit to Hagia Sofia on Sunday just days before the first Muslim prayers are due to be held at the Istanbul landmark since it was reconverted to a mosque last week. In a lightning visit billed as an inspection, Erdogan took stock of the conversion work, the president's office said, providing pictures showing scaffolding inside the building.

Diyanet, the country's religious authority, said Christian icons would be curtained off and unlit "through appropriate means during prayer times". "Our goal is to avoid harming the frescoes,

icons and the historic architecture of the edifice," Erdogan's spokesman Ibrahim Kalin said in a television interview on Sunday. It was unclear whether Erdogan planned to be among some 500 worshippers set to attend Friday prayers.

Turkey's top court paved the way for the conversion in a decision to revoke the edifice's museum status conferred nearly a century ago. The sixth-century building had been open to all visitors, regardless of their faith, since its inauguration as a museum in 1935. Earlier this week, Diyanet said the building would continue to be open to all visitors outside the hours given over to prayer. — AFP



the dates, procedure and fees," explained Fouzan. For those travelling for one or two days, they can use the same PCR test done before departure, as it's valid for three days," he added.

The problem of the PCR tests is one of the key issues limiting traveler numbers. As Fouzan explained, the number of daily passengers was set by the ministry of health. "This number was set as there is no capacity to conduct more PCR tests in a day, which is an essential condition for travel to most countries. The rules are changing almost daily, and some countries have stopped requiring the PCR test," he

"The three-phase plan for the airport's operating was prepared about a month

ago, and since then, many rules and requirements have changed in various countries. So the 30 percent operating capacity from August 1 till February 2021 may change in the coming weeks. The DGCA will evaluate the situation after the first week of operations. I expect an increase in the number of flights and passengers, especially departures," Fouzan

Passengers should check with the country of destination on the latest updates of their requirements. "The rules are changing every day, so passengers should keep an eye on the news before leaving. For instance, the UAE does not require a PCR test, as they do it for all arrivals at their airports. The same applies for Lebanon and Turkey. The UK, for instance, announced obligatory quarantine for all arrivals for 14 days with strict penalties for violators," he said.

The DGCA is in the phase of preparing the flight schedule. "We are now receiving the schedules from the airlines so we can set the total flights. There won't be any privilege or priority given to any category of passengers. In the past, we were operating about 400 flights daily on average, but now the number won't exceed 100 flights," Fouzan pointed out.

Passengers should be present at the airport four hours prior to departure. "This period was set due to safety measures and to avoid crowds. The stores and restaurants at the airport are open, including the duty-free shops. We have started applying social distancing measures at the airport through stickers on the ground and other instructions at the airport advising people to wear gloves, wash hands and maintain social distancing. Barricades will be placed at the counters to distance passengers from the staff. Also, onboard meals will be given in pre-packed boxes. Also, nobody will be allowed to enter the airport without a facemask," said Fouzan.

Thermal cameras will check the temperature of all passengers. If any passenger has a high temperature, a PCR test will be done. If the result is positive, they will be sent to hospital.

In the worst cases, they are called "Ebola and now COVID", she said. Her seven-year-old son refused to go back to school, Aisha said, after classmates told him "you don't belong here".

"We have to wage a permanent struggle against these verbal abuses," said Algerian sociologist Mohamed Saib Musette. "Some Algerians forget that they themselves are Africans." Interracial marriages are rare in North Africa, he said, and "very few TV stars, civil servants or political leaders are dark-skinned". Over the years there have been occasional campaigns that echo the goals of the BLM movement.

In Morocco, a coalition of associations in 2014 launched an anti-racism campaign in support of sub-Saharan migrants with the message "Massmiytich Azzi!", literally, "Don't call me a black man". After a string of attacks in Tunisia, including a violent assault against an Ivorian woman, Mnemty successfully lobbied parliament into adopting a law against hate speech in Oct 2018. And the Algerian parliament followed suit in April 2020, reflecting, according to Musette, the fact that the reality of racism "is there and must be fought".

Musette said the priority must be to "decondition" children and teach them to avoid derogatory terms for black North Africans, such as "abid" or "oussif", which literally means "slave". Slavery was first formally abolished in the region by Tunisia in 1846. French-colonized Algeria partially followed suit two years later, while Morocco under French mandate only did so in 1922. Though not representative of the wider region, modern-day slave markets have been reported in wartorn Libya, where desperate migrants suffer horrific abuse at the hands of human traffickers. — AFP

conference in Japan. "It has already inspired millions of youth regionally to dream big and work hard to achieve what seems to be impossible," he

The Emirati project is one of three racing to Mars, including Tianwen-1 from China and Mars 2020 from the United States, taking advantage of a period when the Earth and Mars are nearest. In October, Mars will be a comparatively close 62.07 million km from Earth, according to NASA. "Hope" is expected to enter Mars orbit by Feb 2021, marking the 50th anniversary of the unification of the UAE, an alliance of seven emirates.

Unlike the two other Mars ventures scheduled for this year, it will not land on the Red Planet, but instead orbit it for a whole Martian year, or 687 days. While the objective of the UAE's mission is to provide a comprehensive image of the weather dynamics, the probe is a foundation for a much bigger goal - building a human settlement on Mars within the next 100 years.

Dubai has hired architects to imagine what a Martian city might look like and build it in its desert as "Science City", at a cost of around \$135

million. The UAE also wants the project to serve as a source of inspiration for Arab youth, in a region too often wracked by sectarian conflicts and eco-

On Twitter, the UAE's government declared the probe launch a "message of pride, hope and peace to the Arab region, in which we renew the golden age of Arab and Islamic discoveries". Several dozen probes - most of them American - have set off for the Red Planet since the 1960s. Many never made it that far, or failed to land. The drive to explore Mars flagged until the confirmation less than 10 years ago that water once flowed on its surface.

Omran Sharaf, the mission's project manager, has said the Hope probe will offer a special perspective on the planet. "What is unique about this mission is that for the first time the scientific community around the world will have an holistic view of the Martian atmosphere at different times of the day at different seasons," Sharaf told a pre-launch briefing.

Hope is expected to begin transmitting information back to Earth in Sept 2021, with its data available for scientists around the world to study. The UAE already has nine functioning satellites in Earth orbit, with plans to launch another eight in coming years. And in September, it sent the first Emirati into space on a mission to the International Space Station.

Meanwhile, astrophysicists yesterday published the largest-ever 3D map of the Universe, the result of an analysis of more than four million galaxies and ultra-bright, energy-packed quasars. The efforts of hundreds of scientists from around 30

institutions worldwide have yielded a "complete story of the expansion of the universe", said Will Percival of the University of Waterloo in Ontario, Canada. In the project launched more than two decades ago, the researchers made "the most accurate expansion history measurements over the widest-ever range of cosmic time", he said in a

The map relies on the latest observations of the Sloan Digital Sky Survey (SDSS), titled the "extended Baryon Oscillation Spectroscopic Survey" (eBOSS), with data collected from an optical telescope in New Mexico over six years. The infant Universe following the Big Bang is relatively well known through extensive theoretical models and observation of cosmic microwave background - the electromagnetic radiation of the nascent cosmos. Studies of galaxies and distance measurements also contributed to a better understanding of the Universe's expansion over billions of years.

But Kyle Dawson of the University of Utah, who unveiled the map yesterday, said the researchers tackled a "troublesome gap in the middle 11 billion years". Through "five years of continuous observations, we have worked to fill in that gap, and we are using that information to provide some of the most substantial advances in cosmology in the last decade," he said.

Astrophysicist Jean-Paul Kneib of the Swiss Federal Institute of Technology (EPFL) in Lausanne, who initiated eBOSS in 2012, said the goal was to produce "the most complete 3D map of the Universe throughout the lifetime of the Universe". For the first time, the researchers drew on "celestial objects that indicate the distribution of matter in the distant Universe, galaxies that actively form stars and quasars".

The map shows filaments of matter and voids that more precisely define the structure of the Universe since its beginnings, when it was only 380,000 years old. For the part of the map relating to the Universe six billion years ago, researchers observed the oldest and reddest galaxies. For more distant eras, they concentrated on the youngest galaxies - the blue ones. To go back even further, they used quasars, galaxies whose supermassive black hole is extremely luminous.

The map reveals that the expansion of the Universe began to accelerate at some point and has since continued to do so. The researchers said this seems to be due to the presence of dark energy, an invisible element that fits into Albert Einstein's general theory of relativity but whose origin is not yet

Astrophysicists have known for years that the Universe is expanding, but have been unable to measure the rate of expansion with precision. Comparisons of the eBOSS observations with previous studies of the early universe have revealed discrepancies in estimates of the rate of expansion. The currently accepted rate, called the "Hubble constant", is 10 percent slower than the value calculated from the distances between the galaxies closest to us. -— Agencies

Americans in Kuwait: US Ambassador discusses how embassy serves US citizens in Gulf state

Welfare of 30,000+ Americans in Kuwait is embassy's top priority

KUWAIT: There are around 30,000 American citizens living and working in Kuwait, yet many are unaware of the services their embassy provides. In an interview with US Ambassador to Kuwait Alina L Romanowski, Kuwait Times asks about the services Americans can avail and what they can do for more information in times of crisis.

Kuwait Times: What is the US Embassy's duty of care toward US citizens in Kuwait?

Ambassador Alina L Romanowski: My first priority is the health and safety of American citizens in Kuwait, which we estimate number over 30,000. During normal times, our consular officers provide a wide range

of services for American citizens, which includes passport services, notarials and the issuance of consular reports of birth abroad to name a few.

Though our in-person operations are more limited during COVID-19, our officers are still very busy helping Americans. They are assisting those who need to travel back to the United

States, for example. They are fielding questions and working to get important updates out to our American citizens through the Smart Traveler Enrollment Program, or STEP. They are also providing some in-person services such as urgent passport renewals.

Our consular officers are also assisting Americans in emergency situations. For example, if an American citizen is arrested, or if we receive word that an American citizen is in danger, we will work with the Kuwaiti authorities to check on that individual and to make sure they are safe. Consular officers are also keeping in close contact with American prisoners in Kuwait to ensure their welfare is being safeguarded. Our consular officers are extremely dedicated and I could not

be more proud of the services they provide.

KT: How does the US Embassy connect with and engage with US citizens in Kuwait?

Ambassador Romanowski: The embassy has traditionally connected with American citizens through our alerts in STEP and through our Citizen Liaison Volunteers. For those American citizens who register in STEP, we send the latest updates on COVID-19, voting and other issues. If you are an American citizen and haven't already, please enroll in STEP at

www.step.state.gov. We also work with a group of Citizen Liaison Volunteers, who support us in spreading important messages to the American community and who help us understand what issues US citizens face in Kuwait.

With more than 30,000 US citizens throughout Kuwait, this is no small effort during COVID-19. The Consular Section has been able to connect with Americans via social media, WhatsApp, Zoom meetings and phone.

We also update our embassy website and social media sites frequently to make sure that US citizens have the latest informa-

tion. If any US citizen would like to engage with us directly, we are also available via email. Consular officers read and respond to all emails sent to Kuwait-ACS@state.gov. For emergencies we can be reached by phone at +965 2259-1001.

Services during emergency

KT: What are the kinds of services offered for American citizens during COVID-19 and in emer-

Ambassador Romanowski: During COVID-19, the way we do work has changed, but our top priority - the welfare of American citizens - has not. For emergency situations, our officers are on call at all hours and ready to assist.

Just to illustrate a few examples, consular officers are keeping in close contact with American prisoners to ensure their welfare is being safeguarded. Consular officers have used all forms of communication to make sure a missing American is safe, or to relay messages from hospitalized Americans or notify their family members in tragic situations. Consular officers have helped Americans travel back home urgently to be with their loved ones. These are just a few of the emergencies with which our consular officers can help. I am proud of what our consular officers have done on behalf of their fellow Americans.

KT: Why doesn't the US Embassy do more in terms of helping American citizens who have legal prob-

Ambassador Romanowski: The US Embassy in Kuwait as well as all US embassies and consulates overseas are prohibited by regulation from acting as agents or attorneys on behalf of US citizens involved in legal disputes. Embassy personnel, including consular officers, do not provide legal advice to the public.

While the embassy may not recommend a specific foreign attorney, we can provide the names of several attorneys who have identified themselves as willing to assist US citizen clients.

Disputes with sponsors

KT: What can the embassy do to help American citizens who have disputes with their sponsors in

Ambassador Romanowski: While I am sympathetic to the difficulties faced by Americans navigating the legal system of a foreign country, we are prohibited by US law from acting as agents or attorneys on behalf of US citizens involved in legal disputes. We can provide a list of attorneys who are able to work on these issues in Kuwait.

KT: Do you have any advice for American citizens

Ambassador Romanowski: Actually, I have been

"in-country" for a much shorter time than many of the Americans I have met in Kuwait, so I have valued the advice they've given me. I have been inspired by the American community here and their perseverance and concern for each other.

A key piece of advice I have mentioned before but it is worth mentioning again is that I urge American citizens in Kuwait to be there for one another and lend a helping hand. I encourage you to regularly check in on the welfare of your coworkers, friends and family members. Maintain your mental and physical health, be prepared for emergencies to the extent you can, and seek medical assistance as needed. You are not alone. We, together with the Kuwaiti people, will emerge from this COVID-19 crisis together.

Hit hard by COVID-19, Kuwait's real estate calls for incentives

However, the story was the opposite for commercial and investment real estate, which saw a drop in demand due to fears connected to COVID-19, he pointed out.

Sales down

Maitham Al-Shakhs, head of Athra real estate, provided a bleaker picture, saying that sales were down as a result of coronavirus restrictions. Some deals were struck via online services launched by the real estate registration department during the easing of restrictions; however, this affected previous deals

prior to the whole COVID-19 debacle, he added. Major real estate owners are now faced with fewer options to sell and buy properties especially within areas still under full lockdown as well as commercial and investment real estate, indicated Al-Shakhs who added that financing in housing complexes and buildings was weak due to the freezing of rents.

Meanwhile, Head of Al-Muhaini real estate center Ibrahim Al-Muhaini said that price of real estate went up in some areas such as Sabah Al-Salem, Khaldiya, Adailiya, and Faiha to name a few. On the other hand, there was an increasing clientele interest in distant areas such as Sabah Al-Ahmad and Abdaly, Muhaiuni said, adding that renting real estate was impacted heavily by the departure of expatriates to their countries of origin. While brokers will continue to provide their own outlook on real estate in Kuwait, they seem to share a common belief that despite the hardships, real estate will "fall ill but never die." —KUNA

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MP Adasani says govt should correct statement on rating

KUWAIT: MP Riyadh Al-Adasani, who has filed to grill Finance Minister Barrak Al-Sheetan for the second time, said yesterday that the minister's statement on Standard and Poor's rating is not entirely correct.

The lawmaker said S&P agency has confirmed Kuwait's ratings but changed its outlook from stable to negative which was ignored in the minister's statement, and called on the government to rectify the error. In his statement, the minister said the report shows that Kuwait's financial position is strong but reforms in the public finances must continue to ensure welfare for citizens continues.

In a new report released over the weekend, S&P Global Ratings said that, as a result of lower oil prices, implementation of the April 2020 OPEC+ oil production cuts, and the COVID-19 pandemic, "Kuwait's central government deficit will widen to almost 40 percent of gross domestic product (GDP) in 2020 from an estimated 10 percent in 2019."

This means Kuwait's budget deficit this fiscal year will widen to KD 17 billion, well over government forecasts. S&P also estimated that the government's main source of budget deficit funding, the General Reserve Fund, will be insufficient to cover this deficit on its own. A timely and sufficient policy response to address a potential hard budget constraint in the coming months has yet to emerge. The government has sent a draft law to the national assembly to authorize the government to borrow KD 20 billion over the next 10 years to finance the budget deficit.

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Kuwait's trade surplus with Japan 'halved'

TOKYO: Kuwait's trade surplus with Japan dived 46.3 percent from a year earlier to JPY 18.1 billion (\$169 million) in June, down for the third consecutive month on slumping exports, government data showed yesterday. But Kuwait remained in black ink with Japan for 12 years and five months, as exports still offset imports in value, the Finance Ministry said in a preliminary report. Kuwaiti overall exports to Japan plunged 47.0 percent year-on-year to JPY 24.2 billion (\$226 million) for the third monthly decline. Imports from Japan also tumbled 48.9 percent to JPY 6.1 billion (\$57 million), down for the second month. Middle East's trade surplus with Japan plummeted 65.8 percent to JPY 163.4 billion (\$1.5 billion) last

month, with Japan-bound exports from the region sliding 61.0 percent from a year earlier. Crude oil, refined products, liquefied natural gas (LNG) and other natural resources, which accounted for 90.1 percent of the region's total exports to Japan, fell 63.3 percent. The region's overall imports from Japan slipped 48.1 percent, reflecting weak demand for automobiles, steel, machinery, manufactured goods and electric equipment. Japan posted a global trade deficit of JPY 268.8 billion (\$2.5 billion) in June for the third straight month of red ink, as exports remained weak amid the coronavirus pandemic. Exports from the world's third-biggest economy shrank 26.2 percent from a year earlier, chiefly due to weak sales of motor vehicles and parts. Imports also went down 14.4 percent with lower crude oil bills. China remained Japan's biggest trade partner, followed by the US. The trade data are measured on a customs-cleared basis before adjustment for seasonal factors. —KUNA

No kissing, disinfect microphone: Japan nightlife sets its virus rules

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COVID wreaks havoc, kills over 600,000

EU leaders try to save \$860-billion coronavirus aid plan

BRUSSELS: EU leaders resume their fractious summit yesterday to save an \$860-billion coronavirus aid plan, hoping to offset some of the economic destruction unleashed worldwide by the pandemic. The disease has killed more than 600,000 people globally out of nearly 14.5 million known infections, and with new clusters across the planet, alarm is growing about the virus spreading out of control. Europe remains the worst-hit continent, with more than 200,000 deaths, but there is bitter dispute among European Union leaders on how to help its worst-hit - and most indebted - members such as Italy and Spain.

"Are the 27 leaders, responsible for the people of Europe, capable of building European unity and trust?" EU Council President Charles Michel asked the attending leaders, reminding them of the human cost of the crisis. A handful of EU countries led by the Netherlands are reluctant to hand over such vast sums - 750 billion euros - to nations they regard as profligate, particularly Spain and Italy. The summit will resume at 1400 GMT. Many countries in the continent had largely brought their outbreaks under control and were considering further easing of restrictions before fresh clusters were detected.

France has made face masks compulsory in public indoor spaces, Spain asks millions to stay at home again, while the German state of Bavaria said it would soon offer free virus tests at airports. But an anti-mask demonstration in London on Sunday

highlighted the challenge still facing authorities and health experts despite the mounting COVID-19 toll. Dozens gathered to protest the face mask requirement in England's shops and supermarkets, many of them holding banners with widely discredited con-

spiracy theories — such as coronavirus prevention measures being used for "mind control".

Deadly US surge

The United States - the worst-hit country in the world - has reported more than 60,000 new daily cases for six days. With close to 3.8 million cases and more than 140,000 deaths, American authorities are struggling to contain the surge and US President Donald Trump has been criticized for his response to the crisis. The devastation has left tens of millions jobless, and the poorest have been hit hardest by the economic downturn.

To help the less privileged and the homeless, one charity in Los Angeles has started a "community fridges" program. It involves seven colorful, clean and well-stocked refrigerators for anyone to access. "If you need to empty the fridge, no one will judge you. If you need to take one tomato, or you only put one tomato in there, do it," said Marina Vergara, an organizer for LA Community Fridges.

Mask measures

Despite the vocal and stubborn opposition to

lockdowns and face masks in some parts of the world, they remain among the few options for authorities to control new outbreaks in the absence of a vaccine. There was grim evidence of how quickly the virus can spread over the weekend, with Iran's president saying an estimated 25 million people in the country have already been infected. While Hong Kong's daily case count of 108 on Sunday was far below other parts of the world, city authorities tightened distancing measures further, pointing to the fear of uncontrolled infections.

That followed the Australian state of Victoria making face masks mandatory for millions in and around Melbourne last week. But the tightened restrictions have also come with increased frustration over the economy and the inability to interact with others. In the latest illustration of such a situation boiling over, police in Germany - where bars and clubs remain closed - said they were hit by a "hail of bottles" when they tried to break up an open-air party in the city centre. "What I find especially abhorrent is that bystanders cheered and clapped when bottles hit my colleagues," said Frankfurt police chief Gerhard Bereswill. — AFP

Biden 'not competent' to lead the **US: Trump**

WASHINGTON: President Donald Trump assailed likely opponent Joe Biden as "not competent" to lead the United States, speaking as polls over the weekend showed deepening voter disenchantment with his own handling of the coronavirus pandemic. "He's shot, he's mentally shot," Trump said about Biden in a wide-ranging interview with "Fox News Sunday."

He said that if Biden is elected on November 3, he will "destroy this country." Facing the multiple challenges of a spreading pandemic, racial unrest and a struggling economy, Trump made several unfounded or highly speculative accusations against the former vice president, saying Biden would "triple your taxes" and "defund the police."

He added broadly that "religion will be gone," referring to Democratic officials banning large church services to stem the virus spread. Asked whether he would accept the election result in November, even if he loses, Trump echoed his position of 2016, saying, "I have to see ... I'm not going to just say yes." The interview, which was taped in advance, came as new polling results showed support for Biden increasing as doubts about Trump's handling of the pandemic grow amid a resurgence of infections in many states.

Interviewer Chris Wallace told the president that a new Fox opinion poll showed Biden with a substantial lead over Trump not only on his ability to manage the pandemic (with a 17-point edge) and to deal with racial unrest (by 21 points), but even-by a single pointon handling the economy, long a Trump strong point. And a new Washington Post-ABC News poll has Biden leading Trump among registered voters nationwide by a resounding 15-point margin, 55to-40 percent. Trump dismissed such polling as "fake," saying White House surveys show him winning both nationally and in key swing states.

'Mommy, Mommy...'

He repeatedly pummeled Biden, who has kept a relatively low profile amid the restraints imposed by the pandemic. Trump claimed that the Democrat wanted to "defund the police"-a battle cry of some anti-racist protesters-and insisted that such language was in a Biden policy document, though he was unable to produce it when challenged by Wallace. As Trump, who is 74, repeatedly questioned his rival's mental acuity, Wallace asked him directly if thought Biden, 77, was senile. "I don't want to say that," Trump replied. "I say he's not

competent to be president." He questioned whether the Democrat could pass a cognitive ability test that Trump said he had "aced," and said the former vice president would fall apart under tough questioning. "Let Biden sit through an interview like this, he'll be on the ground crying for Mommy. He'll say, 'Mommy, Mommy, please take me home." Trump again defended his handling

of the pandemic, claiming that "we are the envy of the world" on testing; and, of his early prediction that the virus would someday disappear, said, "I'll be right eventually."

He again opposed any national mandate for mask-wearing, saying, 'I want people to have a certain freedom." Biden responded on Sunday, saying in a statement focused on the pandemic that "it's long past due for President Trump to listen to somebody other than himself in how to fight this virus, because after six straight months of deadly mismanagement it is spiraling even more out of control. "Mr President, your ignorance isn't a virtue or a sign of your strength it's undercutting our response to this unprecedented crisis at every turn," he added.

'Don't care what military says' Asked by Wallace about statistics showing American blacks are twice as likely to be shot and killed by police as whites, Trump replied, "Many whites are killed also. You have to say that." And he equated those who fly the Confederate flag with those saying that "Black Lives Matter," adding, "It's freedom of speech." Trump again stated his opposition to renaming US milibases named after Confederate generals-even after the military supported the idea. "I don't care what the military says," the president said. "We're going to name it after the Reverend Al Sharpton?" he asked rhetorically, referring to a prominent African-American civil rights leader. On other subjects, Trump said the economy was "doing very well," even as millions remain jobless, with some states reimposing lockdowns. The stock market, he said, was near record highs. — AFP

Gunman kills son of US judge in attack at her home

NEW YORK: A gunman disguised as a FedEx delivery driver shot and killed the son of a US federal judge and wounded her husband in an attack Sunday at their New Jersey home, reports said. Judge Esther Salas was not hurt, ABC News said. Salas's son Daniel Anderl, 20, was shot dead when he answered the door, ABC and CNN said, citing sources. "He was shot through the heart," North Brunswick mayor Francis Womack, a friend of the judge, told ABC. The judge's husband Mark Anderl, a criminal defense attorney and former prosecutor, was in critical but stable condition after undergoing surgery, the New Jersey Globe reported.

The FBI's Newark office tweeted that they were "investigating a shooting that occurred at the home of Judge Ester Salas" and were looking for one suspect. The gunman appeared to be dressed as a FedEx driver, according to reports citing law enforcement sources. The motive was not immediately clear. "As a judge, she had threats from time to time, but everyone is saying that recently there had not been any," Womack told ABC.

Judge Salas, 51, was the first Hispanic woman to serve as a federal district judge in New Jersey and was nominated to her current position by President Barack Obama in 2010. "I know Judge Salas and her husband well, and was proud to recommend her to President Obama for nomination to New Jersey's federal bench," New Jersey Senator Bob Menendez said in a statement quoted by media. "My prayers are with Judge Salas and her family, and that those responsible for this horrendous act are swiftly apprehended and brought to justice."

The judge is currently assigned to a class-action lawsuit filed by a group of Deutsche Bank investors who say the bank failed to properly monitor customers it had deemed to be high-risk-including convicted sex offender Jeffrey Epstein, who killed himself last year while in prison awaiting trial. Salas has handled several high-profile cases and presided over the 2014 fraud trial of "Real Housewives of New Jersey" star Teresa Giudice and her husband Joe. — AFP

French President, Rutte, Kurz clash at EU summit

EU leaders struggle to save deadlocked virus recovery summit

BRUSSELS: Tempers flared as the deadlocked EU coronavirus summit rolled over into yesterday, with French President Emmanuel Macron upbraiding his Dutch and Austrian colleagues and threatening a walk-out. Frustration had been building for three days as the 27 leaders wrangled over the size and form of an up to 750-billion-euro (\$860-billion) package of loans and grants to lift virus-ravaged countries out of recession. An alliance of so-called "frugals", led by Prime Minister Mark Rutte of the Netherlands and Chancellor Sebastian Kurz of Austria, has been resisting calls for the bulk of the funds to be doled out as non-repayable grants.

Macron, according to witnesses, bashed the table, attacked Kurz for leaving the room to make a call and accused Rutte of behaving like former British premier David Cameron-whose strategy "ended badly". Cameron often took a hard line at EU summits seeking con-

cessions for Britain, but ended up losing a Brexit referendum-and his job. According to a European source Kurz was offended by Macron's behavior.

A member of the French delegation told AFP that some of the accounts of what had happened has been "a little caricatured" but confirmed that Macron had "taken a hard line on their inconsistencies". According to officials, Macron had denounced the two leaders for their insistence that the recovery funds take the form of loans with strict

conditions attached, rather than as grants-and had said he would rather walk away than make a bad deal. France wants at least 400 billion euros to be available as grants, but the Frugals want to cut that back substantially.

Virus recovery summit

Squabbling EU leaders held a make-or-break dinner to try to break three days of deadlock in talks over a huge coronavirus rescue package. EU Council President Charles Michel, the summit host, gathered the 27 leaders for dinner after a day of

small group meetings that failed to vield a major breakthrough in the search for a deal. He made a lastditch proposal for the 750-billion-euro (\$860billion) rescue deal aimed at bridging a gaping rift with a coalition of "Frugals"-the Netherlands, Sweden, Austria, Denmark and Finland.

The Frugals, led by Dutch Prime Minister Mark Rutte, have sought to slash the scale of the package of loans and grants that Brussels wants to help the countries hit hard by the epidemic. As fears rose that the summit would collapse without agreement, Michel suggested cutting the grant portion of the deal to 400 billion euros-down from his initial proposal of 500 billion-and raising the loan part to 350 billion, up from 250 billion.

In a heartfelt speech over dinner, Michel remind-

"The question is this: are the 27 leaders, responsible for the people of Europe, capable of building European unity and trust?" Michel said, according to a copy of his remarks seen by AFP. "Or will we present the face of a weak Europe, undermined by mistrust?"

But a senior aide to Swedish Prime Minister

Stefan Lofven said they were only prepared to accept a maximum of 350 billion euros as grants in the package, and even this was subject to conditions. "It's about the rebates, higher climate ambitions, and that we include a mechanism that makes so that countries will not be able to get money from the EU budget or this recovery package if they do not follow the principles of rule of law," Paula Carvalho Olovsson told the TT news agency. — Agencies

Racism in Cuba: Banned, but alive on the streets

HAVANA: Six decades on from Cuba's proclamation of equality and despite three top government officials being black, the Caribbean island nation has made little headway on racism. "Racism in Cuba is very hypocritical ... No-one says they're racist, even if they are," researcher Tomas Fernandez, 79, an author of several books on the subject, told AFP. Cuba used to have an open problem with racism until the communist revolution of 1959. Some buildings had signs saying "no dogs or blacks" while there was also racial segregation that saw black people barred from some clubs and schools

The government has enacted policies to address centuries of inequality due to slavery, which was abolished in 1886, and to promote access to higher education and public office. But racism persists. In local jargon, a white woman with a black boyfriend is "burning oil" or "holding back the race" while he is "advancing" his. Ethnologist Jesus Guanche has identified around 20 definitions to describe skin color, including "blue-black" for someone with very dark skin, while Cubans often describe frizzy hair as "bad."

Bridging a gaping

"There's something that is a burden, it's very subtle, but it's a prejudice that keeps going," said painter Salvador Gonzalez, 71, who exhibits his work in El Callejon de Hamel, a bastion of African heritage in the capital Havana. Black activist Alexander Holl, 22, says skin color has a "huge influence" on relationships in Cuba. "It's common for white families to tell (their daughters) not to get involved with that (black) lad," said the history student. "When you want to be with a white girl, sometimes you realize this is an impediment."

'Hidden' racism

Recognizing the magnitude of the problem, President Miguel Diaz-Canel announced in November a program to "definitively eliminate the vestiges of racism." In Cuba, 9.3 percent of the 11.2 million population identify as black, 26.6 percent say they're mixed race, while 64.1 percent claim to be white, according to a 2012 census.

Manuel Cuesta, 57, an Afro-Cuban government opponent, says "there are the vestiges and remnants of symbolically cordial racism, structurally hidden, installed in the economic, institutional and political

dynamics" of the country. The racial debate gained a new impulse following the murder of George Floyd in the United States, and the recent death of Afro-Cuban Hansel Hernandez. The 27-year-old was accused of theft and died during an

alleged confrontation with police. "Both events have once again pushed the racial theme into the discussion, although the true debate is on social media," said Cuesta. Those critical of the government find a link between the cases of Hernandez and Floyd. Fernandez however believes that's a mistake and that the Cuban's death "cannot be associated or analyzed as if it was a racial crime." He says "racial hatred doesn't exist" in Cuba, but underlying racism does. Roberto Zurbano, a black researcher into issues regarding race, says an "itinerary of deficiencies" as well as "his social environment and low level of expectations" contributed to Hernandez's death. — AFP

In Ecuador, families lost in virus chaos

GUAYAQUIL: For Colon Ramirez, the agonizing search for the body of his grandmother is finally over. After almost four months, he has finally found and buried the missing 83-year-old Emilia Villon, who died in Ecuador's virus hotspot Guayaquil. The remains of his grandmother, together with more than 200 other unidentified bodies, were lost in refrigerated containers piled high with cadavers when the city's hospitals were overwhelmed with the

Ramirez says the last time he saw Villon was on March 29, when he took her to a local clinic. "She had a fever, her bones were aching. She had trouble catching her breath," he told AFP, adding that he had lost seven other relatives to the coronavirus, which was first detected in Ecuador in late February. While the hospital never directly informed the family of Villon's death or its cause, her death certificate declared she was a victim of COVID-19.

Once the family recognized her picture among a clutch 30 of the bodies were returned to the families.

Ramirez said that three days after his grandmother was admitted to the hospital, the family stopped receiving any updates about her condition from the doctors. So they started looking for her, even scouring morgues and refrigerated containers. "One of my cousins went in (a container) to look for her. It was horrible," he said. "He was almost crazy when he came out because there were so many dead people in there." In Ecuador, which has a population of 17.5 million, the pandemic has already infected more than 72,000 people and left more than 5,200 of them dead. — AFP

Mask: France introduces fine

PARIS: People in France will risk a fine of 135 euros (\$154) starting yesterday for failure to comply with a new decree to wear a mask in public places indoors, the government announced. As officials noted signs of an uptick in virus circulation, Prime Minister Jean Castex on Thursday said masks will become compulsory in enclosed public spaces from next week in a bid to prevent a second wave of coronavirus infections. Masks are already required on public transport, punishable with a fine of the same amount, in a country that has lost over 30,150 people to the epidemic. — AFP

'Bandits' kill 23 Nigeria troops

KANO: At least 23 Nigerian troops were killed when they were ambushed by a gang of socalled "bandits" in a remote village in the northwest of the country, security sources said Sunday. The gang opened fire Saturday on the soldiers who were on foot in a forested part of the Jibia district in Katsina state, the sources said, speaking on condition of anonymity. "The bodies of 23 soldiers have been accounted for while some are still missing," a military source said. In the past, the armed gangs, known locally as "bandits", have been involved in cattle rustling and kidnappings, but a number of experts have recently warned that they could be forging ties with jihadist groups in the region. One militia member said the toll could be "higher than 23", as the search for missing soldiers was underway. — AFP

Dr Seade presents his work plan to lead the WTO

KUWAIT: With a commitment to bringing the institution back to the center of international governance and to promote global economic recovery through it, Dr Jesus Seade Kuri presented today in Geneva his candidacy to Director-General of the World Trade Organization (WTO) before its General Council. "Extraordinary efforts with all members are urgently needed to repair and maintain the relevance of the WTO as the core of a robust and inclusive system that meets the demands of our people, businesses, consumers and their development needs," Seade told the

Dr Seade Kuri -who has a decades-long career as a chief trade negotiator at the multilateral and bilateral levels- outlined for more than an hour and a half his vision of how the WTO can and should return to its vital role in promoting trade and economic development. In his presentation, Seade recalled his participation as the Mexican negotiator in the Uruguay Round that led to the creation of the WTO, of which he served as Deputy Director-General. He emphasized his experience in senior positions of two international economic agencies critical to global governance: The International Monetary Fund and the World Bank.

Seade Kuri recognized the WTO's contributions to the liberalization of fairer and inclusive trade by establishing common rules. However, he pointed out that the organization's performance has fallen short of the expectations generated when created. Among other reasons, this has been because of its limited negotiating outcomes and the impasse in the appellate body preventing the resolution of disputes between member states.

This paralysis is compounded by the negative effects that the COVID-19 pandemic has had on global value chains and international trade -which, according to WTO, may fall to a third during 2020. Given this outlook, Seade Kuri noted that today the WTO requires profound change. This involves unlocking negotiations, both on the current issues and in an agenda for the twentieth century; one that includes digital trade and the sustainability of global exchange of goods and services.

"It has been said that the WTO is like a bicycle that has fallen on its side due to lack of momentum, and by falling, it has broken. It needs to be thoroughly repaired. This requires a director who -as a chief negotiator- was present in the design of the device" he said. Seade spoke out about recovering the strength and certainty of the dispute settlement mechanism to make the WTO more effective, transparent and inclusive. He also noted that it is imperative that negotiations contribute to inclusion, diversity and plurality within the WTO.

Dr Seade Kuri presented his credentials for the post, including being Mexico's Ambassador to the GATT and Chief Negotiator for the Uruguay Round; GATT Deputy Director-General and Founding Deputy Director-General of the WTO. Also, Senior Advisor to the IMF and the World Bank, as well as Chief Negotiator of the Mexico-United States-Canada Agreement (USCMA).

Currently, as Deputy Minister for North America at the Mexican Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Seade oversees political and economic relations with the United States and Canada. He has been an academic in the United Kingdom, Mexico and China for about a decade. His career has allowed him to establish close relationships with heads of state, ministers, legislators and

"My solemn commitment to you is to be an effective interlocutor, close to all members to the north and south, east and west, and to be fully equidistant from all", he said to the WTO General Council. Dr Seade's candidacy for the WTO is promoted and supported by the Government of Mexico, a country with a broad multilateralist tradition, a trade-oriented economy and a well-known vocation in favor of free and fair international trade.

Iran executes man convicted of spying for CIA and Mossad

Iran arrests 'perpetrators' of last week's protests

TEHRAN: Iran yesterday executed a former translator convicted of spying for the US and Israel, including helping to locate a top Iranian general killed later by the Americans, the judiciary said. The killing of Major General Qasem Soleimani in a US drone strike near Baghdad airport in January brought decadesold arch enemies Iran and the United States to the brink of conflict. The judiciary's Mizan Online website said Mahmoud Mousavi Majd's death "sentence was carried out yesterday morning over the charge of espionage so that the case of his betrayal to his country will be closed forever".

Its spokesman said earlier this month that Majd had been sentenced to death for spying on "various security fields, especially the armed forces and the Quds Force and the whereabouts and movements of martyr General Qasem Soleimani". Majd had been found guilty of receiving large sums of money from both the US Central Intelligence Agency and Israel's Mossad, said the spokesman Gholamhossein Esmaili. Soleimani headed the Quds Force, the foreign operations arm of Iran's Islamic Revolutionary Guard Corps.

Iran retaliated for his death by firing a volley of ballistic missiles at US troops stationed in Iraq, but US President Donald Trump opted against responding militarily. While the attack on the western Iraqi base of Ain Al-Asad left no US soldiers dead, dozens of them suffered brain trauma. Majd was arrested some two years ago and was not directly involved in

the killing of Soleimani in Baghdad, according to a statement the judiciary issued in June.

Majd had migrated to Syria in the 1970s with his family and worked as an English and Arabic lan-



guage translator at a company, Mizan said. When war broke out, he chose to stay in the country while his family left. "His knowledge of Arabic and familiarity with Syria's geography made him close to Iranian military advisers and he took responsibilities in groups stationed from Idlib to Latakia," the site added.

'American dollars'

Majd was not a member of the Revolutionary Guards "but infiltrated many sensitive areas under the cover of being a translator". He was found to have been paid "American dollars to reveal information on adviser convoys, military equipment and

communication systems, commanders and their movements, important geographical areas, codes and passwords" until he came under scrutiny and his access was downgraded.

He was arrested in October 2018, Mizan said. Iran said last week it had executed another man convicted of spying for the CIA by selling information about Iran's missile program. Reza Asgari had worked at the defense ministry's aerospace division for years but retired four years ago, after which he sold "information he had regarding our missiles" to the CIA in exchange for large sums of money.

Iran in February handed down a similar sentence for Amir Rahimpour, another man convicted of spying for the US and conspiring to sell information on Iran's nuclear program. Tehran announced in December it had arrested eight people "linked to the CIA" and involved in nationwide street protests that erupted the previous month over a surprise petrol price hike. It also said in July 2019 that it had dismantled a CIA spy ring, arrested 17 suspects between March 2018 and March 2019 and sentenced some of them to death. Trump at the time dismissed the claim as "totally false".

Iran arrests 'perpetrators'

In another development, Iranian police said yesterday they had arrested people behind protests that broke out last week in the southwest of the country, state news agency IRNA reported. "All the

perpetrators of an illegal and norm-breaking gathering in Behbahan (city) were identified and arrested," Khuzestan province's police chief Heydar Abbas Zadeh was quoted as saying.

He did not say how many people were detained or identify them. The protests occurred on Thursday "with a limited number of Behbahan residents gathering and shouting norm-breaking chants," he said, a term usually used by Iranian authorities to refer to anti-system slogans. At the time, Behbahan's police said the crowd did not respond to calls to disperse and security forces broke up the protest "with firmness" and restored "calm" without there being any casualties or damage to property.

The gathering was "to protest the economic situation", it added. Iran's Revolutionary Guards announced on Thursday that they had arrested a number of "agitators" who had called for street protests in northeastern Mashhad city, and that they had also broken up a "terrorist group" linked to the People Mujahedeen of Iran (MEK) in southwestern Shiraz. NetBlocks, a website that monitors international internet outages, said online access was restricted and disrupted for about three hours in Khuzestan around the time of the protest.

Khuzestan is a key oil-producing region that has often complained of official neglect. Bordering Iraq, it is one of the few areas in mainly Shiite Iran to have a large Sunni Arab community. — Agencies

Fears of HIV spike in Jamaica as pandemic hits prevention efforts

KINGSTON: For about a month, John was woken by bad dreams, a side effect of missing his antiretroviral medication from late May, when he was unable to collect his prescription drugs due to COVID-19. John, 32, works in the liquor industry and has lived with HIV for 14 years. This has compromised his immune system, so he went into self-isolation after the coronavirus emerged in Jamaica in March.

"During the nights, it makes you jump out of your sleep with nightmares ... (but) you have to isolate yourself," said John - not his real name - who ran out of medicine because he could not afford private transport to take him to the pharmacy. Clarence did not miss any treatment, but sometimes struggled to get the medication that he has used for many years after contracting HIV 25 years ago.

"It did concern me," said the 49-year-old, who like John asked not to be identified, fearing prejudice. "I worried about the fact that ... I'm going to a pharmacy that may have a crowd." Clarence and John are among about 32,000 Jamaicans living with HIV, many of whom have missed treatment during the pandemic. Campaigners fear the impact of COVID-19 on treatment and on education and prevention efforts could mean a spike in new HIV infections or in deaths in Jamaica.

Even before the pandemic, about 14,000 HIV positive Jamaicans were not accessing care, said Ivan Cruickshank, executive director of the Caribbean Vulnerable Communities Coalition (CVCC). "COVID has affected the response significantly in that the clients are not able, because of lockdown ... to access services as they normally should," said Cruickshank, whose organization advocates for people susceptible to HIV infection. "We have had to improvise new ways of getting the service to the clients."

No time to slide back

Gay sex is a crime in Jamaica and discrimination against the LGBT+ community remains rife, including in access to healthcare. On HIV, the country was struggling even before the pandemic and was one of the few Caribbean nations not to register a decline in new infections between 2010 and 2018, according to UNAIDS data. Lockdowns globally are preventing some LGBT+ people with HIV from getting the lifesaving treatment they need - and potentially putting their compromised immune systems at risk if they contract COVID-19, according to HIV/AIDS organizations. UNAIDS said this month that the global response to HIV/AIDS could be set back by 10 years or more if the COVID-19 pandemic results in severe disruptions to HIV services.

Peter Sands, executive director of the Global Fund to Fight AIDS, Tuberculosis and Malaria, said the global campaign to end HIV globally must not be allowed to suffer. "This is not a time to slide back," he told the Thomson Reuters Foundation in emailed quotes. "We must continue to mobilize resources to safeguard the progress we have achieved or we could find ourselves losing a decade's worth of gains. We cannot let that happen." Jumoke Patrick, executive director of the Jamaican Network of Seropositives, which advocates for the rights of people with HIV, fears a rise in infections or deaths due to the economic or social challenges of accessing medication. "What we are finding is some persons are not committed to taking their HIV medication because they have other problems that in their head are more important than medication," he said. — Reuters



Bangladeshis shun virus testing after fake screening

DHAKA: The number of people being tested for coronavirus in Bangladesh has fallen by almost half, officials said Sunday, in the wake of a huge screening scandal. The number of tests carried out daily has fallen from about 18,000 in late June to just over 10,000 in the past two weeks, the health department said. The huge drop followed the arrest of more than a dozen people, including a Dhaka hospital owner, on charges they issued fake certificates to thousands of patients saying they were virus-free without testing them. "The panic among the people (over the virus) has gone," health department spokeswoman Nasima Sultana told AFP about the lower testing figures.

She added that monsoon floods, the cost of tests at 200 Taka (\$2.40) and fears of being quarantined were making people reluctant to get properly diagnosed. The low death rate-officially at 1.28 percent-

rather than concerns over the veracity of test results also meant people with virus-symptoms preferred to stay at home, she added. But leading public health expert Muzaherul Huq said there was increasing public distrust of testing following the alleged fake screenings.

Two hospitals and a testing centre in Dhaka were also shut by authorities over the scandal. "It naturally raises questions about the credibility of the (test) centers. It has strongly discouraged them to go for a check," Huq, the former head of the state-run Institute of Epidemiology, Disease Control and Research, told AFP. Dhaka banker Muminur Rahman said he did not trust the testing regime as his 42-year-old brother received a negative result in mid-June even though he was suffering from virus symptoms.

His brother died a week later, and his sister-in-law, aged 34, followed him in early July. Neither was formally diagnosed as having the virus. Huq, a former World Health Organization adviser, said authorities urgently needed to ramp up testing to determine the real spread of the virus in the impoverished nation. The country of 168 million people has recorded more than 200,000 infections, but experts say the real figures are likely to be much higher. — AFP

Floods kill scores in India's tea-growing Assam; rhinos drown

GUWAHATI: Intense rain and floods in the Indian state of Assam have killed at least 84 people and displaced more than 2.75 million since May, authorities said yesterday, as they tried to collect the bodies of nine rare rhinos drowned in the past 10 days.

Rescue teams were facing a double challenge of rising flood waters amid the novel coronavirus as villagers driven from their homes huddle in shelters. "It's hard to enforce social distancing when people are being ordered to move away from the rising waters," said Sanghamitra Sanyal, a member of the northeastern state's flood management force. "We're urging people to at least cover their mouth and nose with a piece of clean cloth."

Officials warned that the water level in the Brahmaputra river was expected to rise by 11 cm (4.3 inches), two weeks after it burst its banks swamping more than 2,500 villages. Assam, famous for its tea plantations, is hit by flooding every rainy season despite flood-control efforts. Rights groups accuse corrupt officials of siphoning off funds meant for flood projects, resulting in shoddy construction of embankments which are often breached.

Floods have also inundated the Kaziranga National Park, home to the world's largest concentration of one-horned rhinoceros, with an estimated 2,500 out of a total population of some 3,000 of the animals. "Nine rhinos have drowned and over 100 other animals have been killed," Atul Bora, Assam's agriculture minister who is Kaziranga's member of the state parliament, told Reuters. With the park waist-deep in water, rhinos, elephants and deer have been forced to seek refuge on roads and in human settlements. — Reuters

No kissing, disinfect microphone: Japan nightlife sets rules

TOKYO: Campaigners for Japan's nightlife workers say they need realistic guidelines for how to stay safe and remain in business amid the novel coronavirus, which has seen the government zero in on host and hostess bars as centers of contagion. Bar staff need practical rules on how to interact with customers, said Shinya Iwamuro, a urologist and public health advocate who has been teaching infection control measures in Tokyo's Shinjuku district and other nightspots.

That means no kissing, no sharing plates and conversation should be at right angles to avoid droplet contamination. "As much as possible, kiss only with your partner, and avoid deep kissing," Iwamuro told a news conference, outlining what he described as "kiss etiquette". Strategic testing in the nightlife districts of Tokyo has revealed rising daily cases of coronavirus, predominantly among people in their 20s and 30s. The clusters prompted the Tokyo governor to raise the city's alert to the highest "red" level on July 15.

With cases in Tokyo nearing 300 a day late last week, officials excluded people travelling to and from the capital from a multibillion dollar government campaign aimed at reviving domestic tourism. The government is also considering toughening its special measures act that allows it to declare a state of emergency. Media reported Chief Cabinet



Secretary Yoshihide Suga as saying there may be more spot checks of nightlife businesses. But concern has grown that nightlife has become a scapegoat for the failure of authorities to track and contain the disease. Masayuki Saijo, director of virology at the National Institute of Infectious Diseases, said it was not appropriate to discriminate against people based on where or when they work. "There's no difference, working at night or working in the day," Saijo said. "The strategy to reduce human-to-human infection is the same." The host and hostess scene provides a kind of safety net for many Japanese seeking work, particularly single mothers,


said Kaori Kohga, representative director of the Nightlife Business Association.

More than a million people are estimated to work in the industry, she said. Her group has drafted its own safety rules for its members, including disinfecting karaoke microphones, as it found government recommendations, such as wearing masks and two-meter social distancing, were impractical, she told reporters. "Nothing will change if you're only criticizing us as the bad guys," Kohga said, adding the government hadn't acknowledged their rules nor offered enough financial help to businesses or workers.—Reuters

New York hopes to reinvent itself again

Pandemic plunges the dynamic city into crisis, but many see opportunities amid crises

NEW YORK: People fleeing town, widespread joblessness, a rising crime rate: the coronavirus pandemic has plunged New York into crisis, deeply concerning for many, but for others a chance for this famously dynamic city to reinvent itself. "We may be going through one of the most painful and exceptional moments in our history," Mayor Bill de Blasio said Friday. "We may be going through profound social dislocation." The epidemic has claimed more than 23,000 lives in America's economic capital, making it the hardest-hit Western metropolis.

Despite a sharp drop in the number of cases since May, the city has limited its reopening amid fears that a surge of infections felling southern and western states could strike New York.

With tourism evaporating, office towers nearly deserted, many stores shuttered, unemployment at 20 percent, and city services trimmed: this metropolis of 8.5 million people, synonymous with crowds and consumerism, has become a muted version of its former self. For the reopening of schools in September, city officials are planning on a maximum of three days of in-class time a week, frustrating parents desperate to return to normal work schedules.

The United Arab Emirates' second-largest lender saw its net profit in the second quarter this year dive by 58 percent to \$545 million from \$1.3 billion a year ago. Its net profit in the six months ending June 2020 also slumped by 45.3 percent to \$1.1 billion from \$2.0 billion the same period last year, it said in a statement. The bank said it has set aside \$1.14 billion in impairments for potential risks from the coronavirus

"The Group increased impairment allowances... in anticipation of a potential deterioration in credit quality in subsequent quarters related to the coronavirus pandemic," it said. CEO Shayne Nelson said the bank provided support to one-tenth of customers primarily through the deferral of over \$2.2 billion of interest and principal for periods of up to six months. The UAE's central bank said on April 5 that it had doubled to \$70 billion a stimulus package aimed at supporting the economy and domestic banks in the face of the novel coronavirus pandemic.

The bank's total assets by the end of June rose 29 percent to \$189.2 billion from \$146.5 billion a year ago, mainly due to the purchase of Turkish lender DenizBank. — AFP

'A perfect storm'

"This is a perfect storm, in some ways, of bad events," said Kenneth Jackson, a Columbia University professor who specializes in the city's history. For Jackson, who left Manhattan for the countryside as the pandemic struck, today's situation is reminiscent of the dark period in the 1970s and 1980s when New York, facing financial bankruptcy, was ravaged by crime and

an exodus to the suburbs. But like many New Yorkers, Jackson tries to keep matters in perspective. New York, after all, survived the cholera epidemics of the 19th century and the terror attacks of September 11, 2001, after which some predicted that people would no longer want "to work in a tall building."

And people are not fleeing urban hubs as they were in the 1970s. "There's been a rebirth of central cities," Jackson said, as US crime rates have fallen sharply and the quality of urban life has improved, with more personal, professional and entertainment opportunities.

Stocks drop as virus spikes around world

HONG KONG: Most equities fell yesterday as a spike in new coronavirus infections across the planet forced governments to impose fresh containment measures, fuelling fears about the stuttering economic recovery.

Traders are also keeping tabs on Europe, where leaders are struggling to unite over an \$860 billion rescue package for the battered European Union. The rally that has characterized equity markets since hitting a March low is showing signs of stalling as the pandemic rages, with new infections from Australia to the United

States. The spikes — Hong Kong saw a record rise Sunday, while Florida's has been described as "out of control" — have led leaders to unveil new measures to curb the disease's spread, including closing bars and restaurants and making masks compulsory. That has raised questions about the pace of the global economy's recovery from an expected recession this year. An index of US consumer sentiment last week showed it hit a threemonth low in July.

"When coupled with the recent stickiness of jobless claims, the Michigan survey suggests some risk that the positive data surprises that dominated through June might have hit a brick wall," said AxiCorp's Stephen Innes. Shane Oliver, of AMP Capital Investors, added: "Our base case remains for the economic recovery to continue, but for the deep V rebound evident in much recent data to give way to a slower, bumpier recovery going forward.

"Shares are still vulnerable to a further correction or consolidation, with renewed lockdowns and the US presidential election being the main risks." Investors are keeping an eye on Washington, hoping lawmakers will press ahead with fresh stimulus measures for the world's top economy, with unemployment benefit bonus payments due to expire on July 31. However, there are disagreements over how much to pay and Donald Trump is trying to include tax cuts. Failure to extend the scheme would have a catastrophic impact on poor families.

"Depending on how ugly or not the bipartisanship becomes, this story has the potential to move markets later in the week," said Jeffrey Halley at OANDA. "Discussions are taking on more urgency as COVID-19 early losses, while there were also gains in Mumbai and But Hong Kong dropped 0.1 percent, and Sydney, Singapore and Jakarta slipped 0.5 percent. Pact to aid poor cocoa farmers in peril as COVID-19 hits demand

Ivory Coast, Ghana to miss farmer income target

LONDON/ABIDJAN: The steepest dive in cocoa demand in a decade has thrown into jeopardy a plan by top producers Ivory Coast and Ghana to guarantee some two million farmers a living wage, sources within the countries' regulators said. Leading chocolate-makers agreed to a proposal from the African nations last year to charge the industry a premium for cocoa beans and guarantee a minimum income to farmers who earn just \$1 a day.

But the scheme, set to come into effect this

October, was based on expectations that international cocoa prices would stay within average ranges. Instead, the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on demand has driven them to their lowest in nearly two years and they are expected to stay weak for at least a year, the industry says. "It is not certain we will be able to

guarantee farmers the amount originally expected," a source at Ivory Coast's cocoa regulator the Coffee and Cocoa Council (CCC), which sets the official farmer price each season, told Reuters.

The source, who declined to be named because he is not authorized to speak to the press, said the country's cocoa sales for next season were some 30 percent below average levels for the time of year.

The CCC did not respond to Reuters' requests for comment. A spokesman for the Ghana Cocoa Board (Cocobod) said in a statement sent via WhatsApp the process of determining the price cocoa farmers will get was ongoing. He added, however, farmers would still get a better price than without any premium.

Minimum wage eroded

Market weakness could appear a good thing for chocolate consumers offered discounts on the high street, but for farmers it could mean hunger. Already the closure of retail outlets during lockdowns to try

to contain the novel coronavirus stifled impulsebuying of chocolate, significantly denting demand.

Now widespread economic hardship is expected to limit sales just as the industry anticipates production will rebound when the new cocoa season starts, generating a large global surplus. A series of meetings between representatives of the cocoa industry, Ivory Coast and Ghana last year agreed a premium of \$400 a ton for all sales for the upcoming 2020-21 season, including any production sold ahead of the season's start in October. Because the market has

suffered a sustained fall with prices now below \$2,000 a ton, even with the premium added, the earnings of Ivory Coast and Ghanaian farmers will fall below the guaranteed minimum wage.

Four sources in total at Ivory Coast and Ghana's cocoa regulators, all asking not to be named, predicted the income guaran-

tee would be missed by around \$120 a ton. That would mean farmers get some increase in revenue, but far short of expectations. Calculations made by Ivory Coast and Ghana when the new pricing plan was agreed a year ago showed a \$400 premium would allow them to guarantee farmers 70 percent of a minimum \$2,600 a ton target price from 2020/21 onwards, or about 20 percent more than they currently receive. Farmers in Ivory Coast and Ghana said they had yet to be told they would receive any less and were counting on an increase for the upcoming season.

"Life is hard for us cocoa farmers and if the price is not good, we cannot live well. Everything is expensive and you don't earn enough to live like men. Here in the village we survive," Alidou Konate, a farmer with 7 hectares in Duekoue, in western Ivory Coast told Reuters. Francis Yeboah, who has 3 acres in the Ashanti region of Ghana said all farmers had "put a lot of hope in this new pricing system" and it was up to industry and the government to

make up the difference in the event of any shortfall.

"Even if the coronavirus has an impact on the market and it lowers the price, it is up to the government to find a way to maintain a high price for the poor cocoa farmers that we are. It's not up to us to make a sacrifice but to the chocolate-makers and the government," he said.

Trade also anxious

Figures from the industry offer little comfort. An internal report from Barry Callebaut, seen by Reuters, shows the world's biggest chocolate maker expects a global surplus of 317,000 tons in 2020/21, the biggest since 2016/17, when excess supplies kept world prices below \$2,000 a ton for more than a year. Barry Callebaut also adjusted a previously expected 85,000 ton deficit for 2019/20 to a 6,000 ton surplus. The company's sales dropped 14.3 percent in the April to June quarter. It expects a gradual rebound over the next three years, but it will not be enough to balance the market in 2020/21. It is not just farmers who will suffer. Some traders fear for their livelihoods. "I'm concentrating my efforts on saving my job. Our business is getting impacted. Small trade houses will probably go bankrupt this year," the head of cocoa trading at a global commodities house said, also asking not to

EU impasse caps gains for euro, but leaves hopes intact

SINGAPORE: European leaders stood at an impasse and markets on edge yesterday after three days of haggling over a coronavirus rescue plan had vet to produce an agreement. Diplomats are in a final push yesterday to reach what the chairman of the EU summit described as "mission

On Sunday a compromise failed when a deal envisaging 400 billion euros in grants was rejected by thrifty northern states, which said it saw 350 billion euros as the maximum. In early Asian trade the euro slipped almost 0.3 percent, but has recovered by mid-morning to sit at \$1.1414, not far below where it left off on Friday. Here are analysts' views on the possible outcomes from here and on how investors may respond:

Christopher Wong, FX analyst, Maybank,

There isn't an explicit statement to say if there is a deal or no deal. "Given that they can narrow down their differences to just 50 billion (euros), markets are somewhat still hopeful of a compromise agreement, though the risk of the deal being called off totally remains...which may suggest that euro upside can be limited in the

"Another push-back will dampen sentiment and the euro could reverse its earlier gains towards \$1.11-\$1.12 levels."

Chris Weston, head of research, Pepperstone, Melbourne:

'The failure of euro to really sell off is one indicator of where expectations where. I think expectations were that we weren't going to get a deal at this meeting anyway, but we needed enough in it to give us a belief that there was one coming in August or September.

"This is what we're so used to from Europe...it was always going to be a very controversial program where they needed to be seen defending the interests of the individual sovereigns. Ultimately there will be a deal and the market knows that. "I think market expectations have been met. If I held a long euro position, which I know most asset managers do, then I wouldn't be selling on the back of this."

Michael McCarthy, chief strategist, CMC

"It's clearly not a positive, but at the same time because of the history of Europe and some very active expectations management from the participants, I don't think markets are taking it too hard. "The euro has come under only modest pressure and I don't think it was a surprise to the market that no agreement was reached over the weekend. The message has been that this will be a potentially difficult and long conversation." — Reuters

UK retailer M&S to announce huge job cuts

LONDON: British retailer Marks and Spencer Group Plc plans to announce hundreds of job cuts in the coming week, Sky News reported yesterday, citing sources. The cuts would be part of redundancy plans the company will be announcing in the coming days, the Sky report added, part of a restructuring that could affect several thousand employees in coming months. The report did not specify the number of jobs at risk.

"We don't comment on speculation and, if and when we have an announcement to make, our colleagues will be the first to know," an M&S spokes-

In May, when the pandemic hit, M&S was already in the middle of a new plan to improve its fortunes, including reviewing headcount, cost cuts and store closures. The company furloughed around 7,000 employees and announced plans to close about 100-120 stores. London-headquartered M&S will be the latest retailer to join firms like health and beauty chain Boots and department store John Lewis in warning that thousands of jobs would be at risk.

British retail faces more than 5,000 job cuts as retailers warned customers were unlikely to return to their old shopping habits after the coronavirus crisis, in the latest blow to the country's ailing economy. COVID-19, a respiratory disease caused by coronavirus, has put an intolerable strain on retailers, already battling high rents, business rate taxes, tight margins and a rapid shift online. — Reuters

Philips eyes return to growth despite virus hit

THE HAGUE: Dutch electronics giant Philips said yesterday that net profits fell in the second quarter due to the coronavirus outbreak, but foresaw a return to growth this year on the back of burgeoning health equipment sales. Soaring demand for equipment, including ventilators used to treat the pandemic, had boosted the order book for the firm, which recently abandoned its home appliance arm to focus on the health sector.

Amsterdam-based Philips said net profit in the second quarter sank 14.63 percent year on year to 210 million euros, compared to 246 million for the same period in 2019. Sales dropped 6 percent for the same period to 4.4 billion.

"As anticipated, COVID-19 caused a steep decrease in consumer demand," Philips chief executive Frans van Houten said in a statement. The

decrease in normal, non-virus hospital procedures involving Philips equipment had a particular impact, van Houten said.

However demand for equipment used to treat COVID-19 had caused orders to grow by 27 percent, he added. "We have tripled our production of ventilators, doubled our production of patient monitors, and there is big demand for CT imaging systems and X-ray equipment," van Houten added in a phone call with AFP. Philips was now targeting an improvement for the rest of the year despite the impact of the pandemic. "We feel we can get back to growth in the second half of the year, and then even for the whole year have positive growth," van Houten said.

Amsterdam-based Philips started off as a lighting company more than 100 years ago but has undergone major changes in recent years. It first divested its lighting division before announcing in January it was selling off its home appliance arm to fully concentrate on health sector products. Van Houten said the firm was still confident in this plan, due to health being a "higher margin" business, and increased need resulting from the pandemic for services such as tele-health care which Philips had focused on. —AFP

Fund managers navigate 'Night of the Living Dead' in small caps

NEW YORK: Investors are searching for bargains in the world of US small-caps, as the beaten-down asset class prepares for what may be the worst earnings season in its history amid a resurgent coronavirus pandemic. Small-cap companies are expected to post a year-over-year earnings declines of approximately 90 percent as companies report their second-quarter results over the next several weeks, compared to a 67 percent hit for mid-caps and 44 percent for large-caps, according to Jefferies. That would be the largest drop since the fourth quarter of 2008, data from S&P Dow Jones Indices showed.

While some investors had counted on a thirdquarter rebound, many are now concerned that potential coronavirus-fueled economic shutdowns in California, Florida and Texas will deal a disproportionate hit to smaller firms, which are more directly tied to domestic spending and have been among the biggest beneficiaries of stimulus measures delivered by the Federal Reserve and Congress. People fear a "'Night of the Living Dead' of small-cap companies that would otherwise go bankrupt without the benefit of the stimulus and record-low interest rates," said Brian Jacobsen, senior investment strategist at Wells Fargo Asset Management.

Small-cap stocks are often considered a barometer of investor sentiment and tend to be among the first to recover in an economic revival. Their lackluster performance this year has led to concerns over the sustainability of a nascent recovery in unemployment and other key metrics after devastating declines. The Russell 2000 index of smallcap companies is down approximately 12 percent for the year to date, compared with a less than 1 percent decline in the S&P 500 index, according to Refinitiv data. The Russell 2000 is up just 16.5 percent over the last 5 years, compared with an approximately 52 percent gain in the S&P 500. There are signs that recent economic gains may already be faltering. — Reuters

Some small firms could get 2nd US relief loan: Mnuchin

NEW YORK: Businesses suffering the most from the coronavirus crisis could receive a second round of financing under a federal emergency relief program, US Treasury Secretary

He said sectors that have been especially battered such as travel and restaurants are prime candidates for another round of support under the Paycheck Protection Program, which was launched in April to provide support to smaller enterprises devastated by coronavirus shutdowns. "There should be a second check available to the businesses that are the hardest hit," Mnuchin said in testimony before a House committee, noting the government has \$130 billion in unspent

However, he said he favored a revenue test to determine which companies should be supported, and pledged to work with Congress to determine the size of businesses eligible for a second round of financing. Mnuchin is leading the effort to negotiate a new support package with the Democratic-led House of Representatives as the coronavirus outbreak worsens in much of the country.

Hanging in the balance is \$600 per-week in additional unemployment benefits that is set to expire at the end of July. Economists have credited massive federal support programs with limiting the hit to households from the COVID-19 crisis thus far, even as more than 17 million workers remain jobless.

In an interview with Fox Business Network, White House economic advisor Larry Kudlow said President Donald Trump's administration would like to see a new rescue measure passed by the end of July. "The president does want a payroll tax holiday, and that, along with restricting COVID liabilities for small business, restaurants and so forth, (is) one of the key aspects of our asks for the next round of the CARES Act," he said.

The House of Representatives in May approved a new \$3 trillion aid package, but Senate Republicans and the White House refused to support that plan, instead backing a payroll tax cut which would help only those currently receiving a paycheck.—AFP

Ancient Golan rock art sheds light on mysterious culture

e chance discovery of lines carved into the boulders of an ancient tomb in what is now the Israelioccupied Golan Heights could offer new insight into an enigmatic culture that thrived thousands of years ago. In a small clearing in the Yehudiya nature reserve, between yellow weeds and shaded by eucalyptus trees, huge dark basalt boulders and slabs form small roofed chamber that opens to the east. The megalithic structure is one of the thousands of socalled dolmens scattered around northern Israel and the wider region, burial tombs erected some 4,000-4,500 years ago in the Intermediate Bronze Era.

Today, on the plateau captured in 1967 from Syria. with Israeli soldiers securing the frontier just 23 kilometres (14 miles) away, scientists seek to shed light on the region's distant past. The identity and beliefs of those who built the monuments remain largely unknown. But a recent serendipitous finding of rock art might change that. About two years ago, "when one of the rangers here in the park walked her daily walk, she looked inside and saw something carved in the walls," recalled Uri Berger, an archaeologist with the Israel Antiquities Authority. The ranger contacted the IAA, and "when we looked inside we saw this is not just lines carved or some stains on the wall, this is rock art," Berger said.

The lines form the shapes of six horned animals of varying sizes, three facing east and three facing west, with two of them—likely a male and female—directly facing each other. Another horned animal is carved into the interior of one panel, facing the other six. The zoomorphic depictions, hidden in plain sight since study of the dolmens began 200 years ago, were the first to be discovered in the region and a major development for Berger and his research partner, Gonen Sharon.

'Weird shapes'

Sharon, an archaeology professor at the Tel-Hai college in northern Israel, is responsible for a previous landmark discovery. Just north of the nature reserve, outside the northern Galilee kibbutz Shamir, Sharon was hiking with his children in 2012 on a field with some 400 dolmens spread across it. Crawling into the shade of the largest monument, Sharon sat down, looked up at the huge slab roof of the dome and said he noticed "weird shapes" that didn't look like natural formations. "It looked like someone made them," he recalled. The markings were found to be a series of man-made carvings resembling tridents. "It turned out this was the first artwork done in the context of dolmens in the Middle East," Sharon said.

The Shamir carvings, unnoticed by generations of researchers, reinvigorated archaeological study in the area. One of the sites revisited was inside an industrial zone near Kiryat Shmona, a town northwest of Shamir where three small megalithic structures that survived the zone's development a few decades ago are surrounded by circles of stones. On the relatively rounded capstone of the largest dolmen there, two sets of short parallel lines are carved into each side of the rock, with a longer line carved below creating the image of closed eyes and a grimacing mouth facing the sky. 'The grooves don't seem to be functional," said Sharon. "To us they look like a face."

'Letter from the past'

The stone monuments have "altered the landscape" of northern Israel, said Berger. But their prominence has also made them targets for antiquities theft, which largely stripped remains that could provide clues to their creators. Small pieces of ceramics, metal spearheads and daggers, bits of jewellery and beads and some bones are found at the sites from time to time, Sharon said. "But it's very rare to find" anything, and such finds are very scattered. "We know very little of the actual culture of the people who built them." With the discovery of the art carved into the stones, "we can say something that is much more than what we knew for 200 years," said Berger.

The rock art findings—published in a recent article by Sharon and Berger in the journal Asian Archaeology—display the animal drawings in this ancient culture for the first time, and present the larger pattern of visual presentation in the region. Berger said the drawings raise new questions about the people who created them. "Why those animals? Why in these dolmens and not others? What made this one special?" The slow but steady accumulation of artistic finds brings scholars "closer and closer" to the subjects of their research, "to the civilisation you're looking to know about," Berger said. To Sharon, "this is like a letter from the past starting to suggest what was the world of culture and symbolism beyond just building and erecting very large stones."—AFP



Thai metal workshop dazzles tourists with movie-inspired creations

owering Transformers, life-sized Marvel superheroes and extraterrestrial lifeforms—a "House of Steel Robots" in Thailand has made a name for itself by transforming scrap metal into dazzling sculptures inspired by Hollywood blockbusters. Ban Hun Lek, an hour's drive north of Bangkok, has become a popular weekend spot for families eager for Instagram selfies against a backdrop that looks plucked from the the silver screen. Visitors to Phairote Thanomwong's welding workshop gaze up at eight-metre-high (26 feet) sculptures modelled after the robots of the Transformers franchise and a jet-black King Kong hewn together from old car parts.

Phairote opened his welding workshop 20 years ago and eventually converted its front section into a gallery for curious tourists. "It was just a hobby at first," he tells AFP. "When I was a child, I liked mechanics a lot... so I made what I liked into my work." Every sculpture is built using scrap metal and recyclables, which makes each creation unique, he said. A one-metre-high piece sells for up to 30,000 baht (\$950), and the majority of his customers are overseas buyers.

Since the coronavirus pandemic spread around the world and sent the global economy into a tailspin, Phairote says his art exports have been put on pause. Still, the towering metal brontosaurus at Ban Hun Lek, which can be seen from the main freeway, draws dozens of Thai visitors each weekend. "If they want to see something amazing, they should come here," Phairote says with a laugh.—AFP





Coach Rennie not committing beyond 2023 World Cup

SYDNEY: New Wallabies coach Dave Rennie has hinted he may not stay after the 2023 World Cup, with the New Zealander suggesting it would be better to have an Australian in charge in the future.

The 56-year-old took charge this month after seeing out his commitments with the Glasgow Warriors. He replaced Michael Cheika who departed following the country's disappointing 2019 World Cup quarter-

No other Australian coach was available or considered up to the task, with Rennie appointed to lift the Wallabies from their lowly seventh world ranking and help groom a successor. "I'm not certain," he told The Australian newspaper yesterday when asked if he planned to be around for the 2027 World Cup, which Australia are keen to host.

"The ideal scenario is that the next coach is Australian and there needs to be some thought around that. If there is someone ready to go after the (2023) World Cup, that may be in the best interests of Australian rugby.

"You can't think too far ahead in this game," added Rennie, who is on deal that takes him to the next World Cup. "I'm fully committed to the (2023) World Cup but what happens beyond that ... there has to be an emphasis around identifying and developing other coaches to coach Australia.

The Wallabies have almost exclusively had Australians in charge, with New Zealander Robbie Deans the last foreigner at the helm, for five years from 2008. With the coronavirus pandemic causing chaos with the international calendar, Rennie is still not sure when his first game will be.

In the meantime, he has been closely following Super Rugby AU, the domestic Australian competition that replaced the southern hemisphere tournament after it was shutdown because of COVID-19 in March.—AFP

Broad boosts England's victory bid in second West Indies Test

MANCHESTER: Stuart Broad revived England's hopes of a series-levelling victory in the second Test with a trio of new-ball wickets even as the West Indies avoided the follow-on at Old Trafford on Sunday.

The veteran paceman marked his England 287 on the fourth day in reply to England's first avoid the follow-on. innings 469-9 declared.

England, looking to draw level in a threematch contest despite Saturday's total washout, were 37-2 at stumps an overall lead of 219. "It's going to be a good day tomorrow (Monday)," Broad, controversially rested from the West

Indies' four-wicket win in the first Test at Southampton last week, told Sky

"We need to set it up in the first 45 minutes, an hour," added Broad, who reckoned England would want a lead of at least 270. "In a dream world we get two new balls tomorrow. "We've given ourselves a chance of winning this game, which is a great position."

England opened their second innings with Ben Stokes, 16 not out after top-scoring with 176 on Friday, and Jos Buttler in the hope of quick runs rather than regular first-wicket duo Dom Sibley and Rory Burns.

Sibley made 120 in the first innings but took nearly eight hours to reach three figures. Buttler, however, fell for a three-ball nought when he played on to Kemar Roach. Zak Crawley, in on a king pair, was then bowled by Roach for 11, with England captain Joe Root

Pakistan's Abid Ali cleared of concussion

MANCHESTER: Pakistan opener Abid Ali has been cleared of concussion after being hit on the helmet Sunday while playing in an intrasquad match on the tour of England, a team statement said.

Abid was fielding at forward short leg on the third day of four at Derby when he was struck by a Haider Ali flick off Mohammad Abbas.

He will now miss Sunday's fourth and final day as a precaution although the team doctor said he had shown no sign of concussion even after a scan.

"Abid is absolutely fine and will be available to resume training on Wednesday following Tuesday's rest day," Dr Sohail Saleem said in a Pakistan Cricket Board statement.

"He underwent a precautionary

CT scan which has also returned normal (findings)."

But left-handed batsman Khushdil Shah, a Twenty20 specialist, has been ruled out for up to three weeks after suffering a fracture in his left thumb while batting during a training session on Saturday.

Khushdil, not playing in the ongoing intra-squad game, won't be available for the second four-day practice match, which also takes place in the Midlands town of Derby from July 24-27.

Pakistan are set to face England in a three-Test series that begins at Old Trafford on August 5 before concluding with two matches at south coast county Hampshire's Ageas Bowl headquarters.

They return to Old Trafford for three Twenty20 internationals with England at the Manchester ground from August 28 to September 1.

England are currently playing the West Indies in the ongoing second Test at Old Trafford as part of a three-match series that marks the return of international cricket from the coronavirus lockdown. —AFP

Hamilton to push F1 bosses for better anti-racism effort

BUDAPEST: Lewis Hamilton intends to write to Formula One's bosses in a bid to create a more co-ordinated anti-racism stance and improve the sport's pre-race 'taking a knee' ceremony. Speaking at the Hungaroring after his classic drive to a hat-trick of victories at Sunday's Hungarian Grand Prix, the six-time champion said he will write an email to urge them to improve communications and do a

"I think they can give us more time," he said, referring to Sunday's shambolic and rushed pre-race gesture by a group of drivers. "So, I'll probably send an email over the next couple of days — and try and co-ordinate with them to create a better way.

"They do want to do it.... I guess there's not good enough communication." Hamilton revealed that there were clear rifts among the drivers and a lack of planning for the ceremony that is now a part of many other major sports events. He said that the shambolic and rushed ceremony that took place ahead of Sunday's race was not mentioned in the official drivers' briefing meeting and said the chairman of the Grand Prix Drivers Association (GPDA) Romain Grosjean did not believe it was necessary.

He is expected to make contact with Formula One's chief executive Chase Carey, who has donated one million dollars of his own money to the sport's battle for diversity and against racism, and the president of the ruling body, the International Motoring Federation (FIA). Hamilton made clear his disappointment and frustration at F1's failings in presenting a united front by the drivers in the anti-racism drive. On Sunday, a cluster of drivers took the knee in parc fermee in the pit-lane, but several arrived late, some stood and some did not turn up at all. Hamilton said: "He (Grosjean) doesn't think it's important to do it - he's one of them that thinks it was done once and that's all we need to do....

LEADERSHIP LACKING

"So I tried to speak to him about what the problem is, that it's not going away and we have to continue to fight for it. I think this time he didn't mention anything in the drivers' briefing and neither did Sebastian (Vettel, also a director of the GPDA).

"Sebastian and I messaged each other and he stressed, as did I, the importance that we continue to do it." He added that the sport lacked leadership on the issues. "From the top, they need to come out with 'hey, this is what we're going to do guys and we want you all to be a part of it'. Currently there is none of that.

"I try not to lean so much on the drivers because I don't want them to feel it's me that's doing it - and because, in some places, that might be why some are not doing it ... because it's why I'm doing it. "But I don't think it's being taken seriously. I think there are perhaps people who have not grown up around it so they don't understand it.

"And there are those that say 'because of that it doesn't affect me'. I have heard those comments - 'It doesn't do anything for me, so why should I do it?" "It's not about me, it's not about you. There are people out there who are experiencing discrimination, that's what we're fighting for — we're trying to change in organisations.

'I'll get in touch with Formula 1 this week. I will speak to Jean (Todt) because no-one else is going to do it." Hamilton hopes that all 19 drivers will agree to kneel with him by the end of the season. "I gave a lot of energy in Austria to try and convince a couple of the drivers, and it's a battle, but I think what's important is the ones that are doing it, the understanding, it's fantastic. —AFP

Real Madrid draw relegates Leganes and Messi claims golden boot

Real Sociedad, Granada take last two Europa League spots

MADRID: Newly-crowned La Liga champions Real Madrid dropped points for the first time since the season's restart on Sunday in a dramatic 2-2 draw that was not enough to save Leganes from rel-

Leganes, who needed to beat Madrid and hope Celta Vigo failed to win against bottom club Espanyol, almost pulled off a miraculous escape but could not find a winner at the Butarque. The draw means a rotated Madrid side surrendered the perfect record of 11 victories out of 11 since Spanish football came back from its coronavirus-enforced suspension while Karim Benzema fell short of Lionel Messi in the battle for the

golden boot. Gareth Bale was left out of Madrid's squad completely for what might have been his last La Liga fixture for the club. Zinedine Zidane said afterwards it was a "techinical decision". Messi had earlier scored twice in a 5-0 win over Alaves, enough for him to

claim a record seventh 'Pichichi Trophy' and to give Barcelona a boost ahead of the return leg of their last 16 Champions League tie against Napoli next

The double took Messi's league tally to 25 goals for the season and put him four clear of Benzema, who endured a quiet night against Leganes, with Sergio Ramos and Marco Asensio on target.

The odds were always against Leganes but a miracle looked possible when Roger Assale equalised

with 12 minutes left to find a winner. But chances were missed and a penalty appeal was turned down, meaning they join Real Mallorca and Espanyol in Segunda next season.

'The lads are broken," said Leganes coach Javier Aguirre. "We had it within our grasp." Real Sociedad and Granada, meanwhile, took the last two Europa League spots, with Getafe and Valencia missing out. Villarreal had already secured fifth place.

Granada thrashed Athletic Bilbao 4-0 and qualification caps an incredible season for the club, who

were only promoted from Segunda last term. "Our aim was to stay up so to finish in the Europa

League is a dream for us," said Granada striker Roberto Soldado.

Real Sociedad snuck into sixth place after Adnan Januzaj's 87th-minute goal clinched a 1-1 draw away at Atletico Madrid.

"Watford FC confirms that Nigel Pearson has left the club with immediate effect," a statement read. "Hayden Mullins, with Graham Stack as his assistant, will take up the position of interim head coach for the Hornets' final two Premier League fixtures of the 2019/20 season."

Former Crystal Palace midfielder Mullins had been working as Watford's Under-23s coach. Pearson is the third manager to be sacked by

the Hornets this season, following the departures of Javi Gracia and Quique Sanchez Flores.

Watford are in 17th place, three points above the relegation zone ahead of Tuesday's visit from City, with third-from-bottom Aston Villa having two games left and secondfrom-bottom Bournemouth just one.

Inter held at Roma to leave Juventus closer to Serie A title

MILAN: Inter Milan missed a chance to keep the pressure on Juventus after being held 2-2 at Roma on Sunday, leaving the way clear for the Turin giants to close in on a ninth consecutive Serie A title.

Romelu Lukaku's penalty two minutes from time rescued a point for Antonio Conte's Inter, who are second, five points behind Juventus. Juve can open up an eight-point lead on the top of the table when they host fourth-placed

Stefan De Vrij had got Inter off the mark at the Stadio Olimpico when he headed home an Alexis Sanchez corner after 14 minutes. But Roma captain Edin Dzeko set up Leonardo Spinazzola for the equaliser in first half stoppage time and was again involved when Henrikh Mkhitaryan got the second in the 57th minute. Lukaku came off the bench and scored from the spot late after Spinazzola fouled Victor Moses. It was a stalemate which does little to help either team, and boosts Juventus' chances of extending their record Serie A run.

We have to get used to playing these big games with so much pressure, which is something Inter have lost in recent years," said Conte, whose side have not won Serie A since 2010, when they won the treble under Jose Mourinho.

"I can't blame my players for anything, today we faced a team in good shape," he continued. "Our team is doing excellent things. Beyond the second place, we are into the Champions League." Inter cannot be caught by Roma, who are fifth and nine points adrift of the Champions League places, 14 behind Inter with four matches to play.

They are one point ahead of third-placed Atalanta, who have also qualified for Europe's top competition after Inter's draw in the Italian capital. Napoli coach Gennaro Gattuso was unhappy with the league's tight schedule as his side beat Udinese 2-1.

Napoli are two points behind Roma in sixth after Matteo Politano blasted in the winner five minutes into injury time to snatch all three points. "It was an important victory even if now we're playing another sport which worries me,"

"This is not football. Playing every three days and without fans is something different, the players are not robots." Gattuso's side are out of the running for the Champions League next season but are preparing to meet Barcelona in the second leg of their last 16 tie in this year's edition, with both sides locked at 1-1.

- Red Bull driver Max Verstappen after finishing a remarkable second in the Hungarian Grand Prix after his team repaired severe damage to his car's suspension on the grid after the Dutchman hit a barrier on the warmup lap.

"It's the most beautiful day of my life."

- An ecstatic Fabio Quartararo after the 21-year-old became the first Frenchman to win a MotoGP since 1999. His victory in the season-opening Spanish Grand Prix marks him out as the main challenger to current world champion Marc Marquez.

"We have a final to play this season and we will try and win a title for this club because this club deserves to win a trophy," Luiz told BT

10 best moments of the Spanish football season

MADRID: La Liga's longest season ended on Sunday after 12 months and an 11-game sprint finish, with Real Madrid being crowned champions for only the third time in 12 years.

Here, AFP Sport takes a look at 10 of the best moments from the domestic campaign in Spain:

ADURIZ' PERFECT START

La Liga's goal of the season was arguably its first as the 38-year-old Aritz Aduriz delivered a dramatic 89thminute winner against Barcelona with an incredible bicycle kick. Aduriz had announced this would be his final season before retiring and it was the perfect start to a long farewell.

FATI EXPLODES INTO LIFE

Ansu Fati was 16 years and 304 days old in August when he became the youngest ever player to score a goal for Barcelona. The forward's header, six minutes after coming on against Osasuna, sent Spanish football into a frenzy and two weeks later he scored again while becoming Barca's youngest ever starting player.

CLASICO OVERSHADOWED BY PROTESTS

For the first time in 17 years, a Clasico ended goalless but the match was overshadowed by what Catalan independence protests outside. Fans saw smoke drift over the stands while outside fires burned, objects were thrown and riot police tried to restore order. This was the Clasico that was postponed in October due to unrest in Catalonia but two months later, tension remained.

MESSI'S EIBAR QUADRUPLE

There was talk of a drought as Messi went without a goal in four games but he made up for lost time by scoring four goals against Eibar in March. Messi hit a hattrick within 40 minutes, which was his 36th La Liga treble, and his 'poker' took the Argentinian to 20 goals against Eibar in just 11 league matches.

BALE PUNISHED FOR WALES JIBE

Gareth Bale's relationship with Real Madrid has long been complicated but matters came to a head in

November, when Bale celebrated behind a banner that read "Wales. Golf. Madrid. In that Order", indicating his list of priorities. Bale insisted it was a joke, not initiated by him, but Madrid's fans expressed their disgust with screeching whistles when Bale came on their next game.

UNIONISTAS BREACH MADRID

Their fans stayed long after the final whistle to sing and applaud, even though Unionistas de Salamanca had just lost in the Copa del Rey. The feeling was of a success after watching their team, launched in 2013 by its supporters, go toe-to-toe with Real Madrid. Unionistas sat 56 places below their opponents and while an incredible night ended in 3-1 defeat, Alvaro Romero's goal will never be forgotten.

SILENT DERBY IN SEVILLE

The one match most synoymous with fans in Spain was the first to kick off without any as La Liga returned from its three-month suspension with Sevilla against Real Betis. The usually hot, fiery, frenetic Seville derby became the test case for Spanish football in front of empty stands as the game began to adjust to the new normal after the coronavirus pandemic.

BENZEMA'S VALENCIA VOLLEY

Benzema's volley in Real Madrid's 3-0 win over Valencia last month was another contender for goal of the season, a brilliant piece of skill followed almost instantly by a stunning finish. He feathered the ball midair with one foot while simultaneously lifting it over defender Hugo Guillamon, before smashing it with the other into the top corner.

ASPAS SINKS BARCELONA

Barcelona's title challenge included many stumbling blocks but the moment that turned the tide was Iago Aspas' curling free-kick that earned Celta Vigo a lastgasp point in June. Aspas exploited Barca's poorly positioned wall by bending the ball inside the near post and celebrated with his shirt off while yelling at empty stands.

OCAMPOS HEROICS IN GOAL

Sevilla's Lucas Ocampos scored one goal as a winger and saved another as a goalkeeper while preventing Eibar's goalkeeper from scoring an equaliser. After putting Sevilla in front against Eibar this month, Ocampos took the gloves for the final few minutes due to an injury to Tomas Vaclik. Eibar keeper Marko Dmitrovic ventured up for a late corner and almost scored, only for Ocampos to make a crucial save during an incredible end to the match. — AFP

De Gea blunders put Chelsea in FA Cup final

Everyone has

to perform

Chelsea will face London rivals Arsenal in the final

LONDON: Ole Gunnar Solskjaer admitted David De Gea's place is not guaranteed after the goal-keeper endured another error-strewn display in Manchester United's FA Cup semi-final defeat to Chelsea.

Chelsea will face London rivals Arsenal in the final on August 1 thanks to a pair of embarrassing blunders from De Gea in United's 3-1 loss at Wembley on Sunday. The Spaniard's nightmare season hit a new low as he was at fault when Olivier Giroud's shot trickled over the line late in the first half. And De Gea made an even worse mistake moments after the interval when he allowed Mason Mount's shot to evade his weak attempted save. Harry Maguire's own goal was also partly down to De Gea's slow reactions as United lost for the first time in 20 games in all competitions despite Bruno Fernandes' late penalty.

"He knows he should save that 100 times out of 100 but that's football for you," Solskjaer said. "I can't speak for David De Gea's confidence but he is mentally very strong. I made the decision to play him and mentally he was ready for it."

Asked if De Gea would be replaced by Sergio Romero when United return to action against West Ham in Wednesday's crucial Premier League clash, Solskjaer would not rule out dropping his star.

"Obviously, everyone has to perform. Everyone has a chance every time we perform to stake a claim in the team," he said. "David knows he should have saved the second goal, but that's done now and we have to look forward to Wednesday.

"It's hard for a keeper to make amends. David showed

his character in the rest of the game with a few good saves." De Gea's future at United is sure to be scrutinised given the fine form of the club's on-loan keeper Dean Henderson during his spell at Sheffield United this season.

Solskjaer has already labelled Henderson a future England number one and it would be no surprise if he is back at Old Trafford to challenge De Gea for the keeper's jersey next season. While the spotlight was on De Gea, Chelsea were by far the better team as they reached the FA Cup final for the first time since they last lifted the trophy in 2018.

United had beaten Chelsea three times this season, but Lampard had the last laugh. "To win a semi is a great thing, but to win a final is the thing," Lampard said. "We don't want to get too far ahead of ourselves but we can certainly enjoy the performance and the result. "It is obviously right up there because

of the size of the game and quality of the opponent."

COMEDY OF ERRORS

United, who started with Paul Pogba and Anthony Martial on the bench, looked out of sync after switching to a back three formation and Solskjaer said: "You always question your decisions.

"Chelsea had an extra 48 hours rest, that's just a fact but it's no excuse. "We lost concentration and that was disappointing. We were a little too late in some situations and the second goal was very avoidable."

Chelsea took the lead deep into first half stoppage-time with Giroud's fourth goal in his last five games. Anticipating Azpilicueta's low cross perfectly, Giroud made an astute run in front of Victor Lindelof and flicked his close-range shot past the slow to react De Gea with the outside of his foot.

If that was bad from De Gea, there was even worse to come one minute after half-time. It was a comedy of errors from United as Brandon Williams gifted possession to Mount in midfield. Advancing unchecked by United's back-pedalling defence, Mount hit a long-range drive that lacked power and should have been saved by De Gea, but instead it squirmed through his grasp into the net.

Chelsea put the result beyond doubt in the 74th minute when Mount found Marcos Alonso and Maguire turned the Spaniard's cross into his own net under pressure from Antonio Rudiger. — AFP

Jon Rahm wins PGA Memorial

LOS ANGELES: Jon Rahm became the first Spaniard since Seve Ballesteros in 1989 to hold golf's world number one ranking, fending off a late challenge Sunday to win the US PGA Memorial tournament.

Rahm holed out an amazing 31-foot chip shot at the par-3 16th and, despite a two-stroke penalty that turned it from a birdie to a bogey, took a three-stroke victory over American Ryan Palmer that boosted him over Rory McIlroy atop the rankings.

"I don't know how to describe it," Rahm said. "It has been a goal since I was 13-, 14- years-old."

Rahm was among the Spanish youth inspired by the feats of Ballesteros, a five-time major champion who died in 2011 at age 54 of brain cancer.

"Seve is a very special player to all of us, and to be second to him, it's a true honor," Rahm said. "Anytime I can join Seve at anything, it's incredible."

Rahm said the moment was difficult to comprehend in part because his thoughts were with his family, two members of which have died from COVID-19. "It's hard to process right now," he said.

"There are so many things going through my mind right now that have nothing to do with golf."

Rahm fired a three-over par 75 in the final round to finish on nine-under 279 with Palmer second. England's Matthew Fitzpatrick was third on 283 after a closing 68 while Australia's Jason Day and England's Matt Wallace shared fourth on 284.

Rahm began with a four-shot edge and made the turn ahead by eight before dropping four strokes in a five-hole span with a bogey at the 10th, double-bogey at 11 and a bogey at 14 as Palmer pulled within three. That's when the 25-year-old made his amazing chip shot at 16. "That'll probably go down as my greatest chip shot. I don't know if I'll ever do better than that," Rahm said.

"Luckily, I pulled out probably the best short game shot I will ever have. That was unbelievable. For that to go in, that was exactly what I needed." Jack Nicklaus, the 18-time major winner who hosts the event at Muirfield Village in Dublin, Ohio, called the shot "spectacular" as he congratulated Rahm with a fist bump at the 18th green.

Rahm, who won a US PGA event for the fourth year in a row, was given a two-stroke penalty after television slow-motion cameras showed his ball moved when he pushed down on the grass behind it shortly before his incredible chip, although it didn't change the lie and was unperceptible to Rahm himself. "I did not see or feel anything," said Rahm, who

agreed with the decision after watching a video replay. "It did move. It is a penalty. I'll accept it," Rahm said. "Unfortunate as it is to have something like this happen, it was a great shot.


"Had I seen it, I would have said something, but the camera had to zoom in to see it." The tournament was the sixth of the season for the US PGA, all without spectators, since the tour returned in June from a three-month coronavirus pandemic shutdown.

Rahm, who won his first US PGA event when leading after 54 holes, was upset after a bogey at 10 and finding a water hazard off the tee at the par-5 11th, slamming his club into the ground on his way to double bogey.

"Conditions were so tough. I knew I wasn't going to play 18 perfect holes. I knew something was going to go south," Rahm said. "It was so firm, so windy, and then we started to get drizzle. Any little mistake was going to get punished."

Palmer sank a 13-foot birdie putt at the par-3 12th and Rahm stumbled again with a bogey at 14, finding a greenside bunker and missing a five-foot par putt, to leave the lead at three shots with four to play.

"When I missed the putt on 14, I said, 'That's enough,'" Rahm said. Palmer had a 12-foot birdie putt at 16 when Rahm blasted out of the deep grass, landed the ball just onto the green and watched it roll into the cup. Palmer settled for par, his charge blunted for good.—AFP
