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# Kuwait reports 13 deaths, 1,127 new cases in 2 days

### 139 patients in ICU as govt mulls measures to curb COVID-19

KUWAIT: Kuwait reported 13 deaths from COVID-19 in the past two days, while the number of patients in intensive care units rose by 14 in the past 24 hours. The spike in deaths comes as speculation continues to grow whether the government will reintroduce lockdowns or other measures to curb the spread of the deadly disease.

The number of confirmed coronavirus infections in Kuwait rose by 492 yesterday to take the total to 110,568, while a sixfold increase in fatalities upped the death toll from the outbreak to 655,

health ministry data showed. In terms of health zones, Ahmadi governorate recorded 134 cases, followed by 110 in Farwaniya, 97 in Hawally, 87 in the Capital and 64 in Jahra, ministry spokesman Dr Abdullah Al-Sanad revealed.

The number of people hospitalized with the virus stands at 7,191, of whom 139 are in intensive care units, said Sanad. He added 2,805 swab tests were conducted in the past day, taking the total to 779,538 tests so far, while 698 people recovered from the virus in the last 24 hours to raise the total

to 102,722 recoveries. Kuwait reported seven COVID-19 deaths and 635 new infections on Friday, with a total of 125 patients in ICUs. Sanad urged the public to be mindful of health precautions, asserting that following social distancing was the only way to halt the spread of the virus.

The government had warned that recent indicators from the spread of the coronavirus in the country are alarming. "What we have witnessed in the past few days of not applying health guidelines strictly is alarming," HH the Prime Minister Sheikh

Sabah Al-Khaled Al-Hamad Al-Sabah said during Thursday's National Assembly session. "The death rate has increased and so has the number of admissions into intensive care units and occupancy of hospital beds," he noted.

The premier said these indicators are alarming and warned that the government will implement necessary health measures to contain the spread of the pandemic. He however did not elaborate on the type of measures the government might take. Kuwait had lifted a five-month-long curfew on Aug 30, 2020.

### Tehran to impose fines

TEHRAN: Iran is to start imposing fines for breaches of health regulations in the capital, President Hassan Rouhani announced yesterday, after daily coronavirus infections hit a record high. The police, the Basij paramilitary force and health inspectors will have powers to impose the fines, and offenders will have two weeks to make payment into a health ministry account, Rouhani said. Breaches punishable by a fine include refusal to quarantine while sick and failure to wear a mask in a public space or require a customer to do so. — AFP

### Toddler's murder sparks outrage


PESHAWAR: Police in northwest Pakistan have made a string of arrests as they search for the killer of a two-year-old girl whose rape and murder have drawn comparisons to an infamous 2018 killing that sparked riots. The girl, Zainab, disappeared Tuesday while playing outside her village home in Charsadda district in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa province. Her body was discovered a day later, prompting a large-scale manhunt that by yesterday had led to the arrests of at least 17 men. Additionally, police took DNA samples from about 400 people. — AFP

### WFP hails Peace Nobel

GENEVA: The UN World Food Program, which has coordinated medical logistics during the coronavirus pandemic, won the Nobel Peace Prize on Friday in what its boss said was a call to action that no one should go hungry with the wealth in the world today. The head of the awards committee called the WFP a driving force in efforts to prevent the use of hunger as a weapon of war and conflict, and said the COVID-19 pandemic, which the WFP says could double hunger worldwide, had made it even more relevant. — Reuters

### Pakistan bans TikTok

ISLAMABAD: Pakistan on Friday banned the wildly popular video sharing app TikTok, as authorities press their clampdown on "immoral" content. The Pakistan Telecommunication



Authority (PTA) said
TikTok had failed to adhere to two warnings, which had demanded it block "immoral, obscene and vulgar" content. Earlier last week, Pakistani TikToker Jannat Mirza became the first in the country to reach 10 million followers, with lipsyncing and slow motion clips among her content.— AFP (See Page 7)

### Shaky Karabakh truce marred by fresh violations

STEPANAKERT, Azerbaijan: Armenia and Azerbaijan traded accusations of new attacks yesterday in breach of a ceasefire deal to end nearly two weeks of heavy fighting over the disputed Nagorno-Karabakh region. The two sides agreed to implement the ceasefire from noon (0800 GMT) yesterday, after 11 hours of talks in Moscow, but it took only minutes after the deadline for their forces to claim new attacks.

An ethnic Armenian enclave of Azerbaijan, Karabakh broke from the country's control in a war in the 1990s that killed some 30,000 people. Its separatist government is strongly backed by Armenia, which like Azerbaijan gained independence with the 1991 collapse of the Soviet Union, and Baku accuses Yerevan of occupying the region.

The heaviest clashes since the war erupted on Sept 27, with more than 450 people reported dead,

# Nurses in COVID fight face mental health pressures

**GENEVA:** Many nurses caring for COVID-19 patients are suffering burnout or psychological distress, and many have faced abuse or discrimination outside of work, the International Council of Nurses (ICN) said. Supplies of personal pro-

tective equipment for nurses and other health workers in some care homes remain insufficient, it said, marking World Mental Health Day yesterday.

"We are extremely concerned about the mental health impact on nurses," Howard Catton, a British nurse who is the ICN's chief executive, told Reuters Television at the association's headquarters in Geneva. "Our most recent survey of national nurses' associations shows that more than 70 percent of them (the associations) were saying that nurses have been subject to violence or discrimination and as a result of that they are very concerned about extreme cases of psychological

distress and mental health pressure," he said.

The figure was based on responses from roughly a quarter of its national nurses' associations in more than 130 countries. Nurses face a broad spectrum of issues that affect their mental health, including physical and verbal abuse, Catton said. "There are nurses who have been subject to discrimination, where their landlord has not renewed their lease for their apartment, or they can't get child care for their children," he said, without giving specifics of physical or verbal

# Trump restarts campaigning, debate axed

WASHINGTON: US President Donald Trump was to give a public speech at the White House yesterday for the first time since testing positive for COVID-19, as he prepares a rapid return to the campaign trail just three weeks before the election. The 74-year-old commander-in-chief has also announced a Florida rally tomorrow in an attempt to relaunch his stumbling reelection campaign against surging Democratic rival Joe Biden, who called the president's behavior "reckless".

Seeking to project strength and improved health, Trump had refused to participate in this week's scheduled debate after organizers shifted it to an online format out of coronavirus concerns. On Friday the Commission on Presidential Debates made it official, saying Thursday's debate is scrapped, leaving an Oct 22 event the final Trump-Biden showdown before election day on Nov 3.

That prompted accusations of bias from Trump campaign communications director Tim Murtaugh, who said "there is no medical reason to stop" the Oct 15 debate from proceeding. Knocked off the campaign trail by his three-night hospitalization last week, the president is in the midst of a frenetic bid to catch Biden. On Friday, during an extended media blitz, Trump falsely claimed that COVID-19 now has a cure.

has a cure.

He also revealed that he'd been told he was near death at the worst of his bout with the virus, which has killed more than 213,000 Americans and severely dented his chances of winning a second term. Tomorrow, Trump will take another major step by holding a rally in a crucial battleground state. "Will be in Sanford, Florida on Monday for a very BIG RALLY!" Trump tweeted.

# Kuwait calls for international cooperation to fight coronavirus

### Kuwait urges greater international efforts to eliminate terror

**NEW YORK:** Kuwait affirmed the need for further cooperation to fight the novel coronavirus (COVID-19) and prepare for post-pandemic phase to protect and achieve the sustainable development goals. Kuwait's First Secretary Abdullah Al-Sharrah made these remarks during the UN General Assembly's 75th session on rebuilding the world after the COVID-19 pandemic late Thursday. "We were hoping that 2020 would be the year we tackle issues facing the achievement of the 2030 sustainable development goals," he said.

Sharrah expressed his deepest regret over the infection of millions and the death of hundreds of thousands of people due to the pandemic. He called on institutions, governments and companies to cooperate in finding a vaccine for the disease rather than compete, for the sake of saving humanity. He also underlined the importance of coordination to face the economic, social and environmental impact of the virus, especially on more affected countries. Meanwhile, Sharrah noted that Kuwait exerts great efforts to fight the coronavirus virus, not only

nationally but also globally. He added that the country had provided \$290 million to support international efforts to fight the pandemic.

#### Eliminate terror

Separately, Kuwait reiterated calls for the international community to double and unify efforts to eradicate the scourge of international terrorism. Speaking at UNGeneral the Assembly's Committee (Legal) meeting on measures to eliminate international terror-

ism, Bashar Al-Muwazri, Second Secretary at Kuwait's Permanent Mission at the UN, renewed Kuwait's firm condemnation of terrorism and all its manifestations. He underlined that terrorist acts should not be ever justified or linked to any religion,

Muwazri voiced Kuwait's full support to all the international measures to confront the terror men-

In addition, Kuwait has appointed eight female judges for the first time in its history in a longawaited step towards women's empowerment in the judicial domain, she said. The Kuwaiti diplomat added that sustainable development and prosperity could not be attained unless youth and women are empowered and all non-governmental organizations are backed. She underlined the need for concerted world efforts not only to fight the COVID-19 pandemic but also to defeat the existing numerous challenges and obstacles worldwide. — KUNA

thousands forced to flee their homes and fears the fighting could escalate into a devastating allout conflict. Armenian defense ministry spokeswoman Shushan Stepanyan said that "in disregard of the previously declared humanitarian ceasefire" Azerbaijani forces had launched an attack on the frontline at 12:05 pm.

Azerbaijan's defense ministry said Armenian forces had also carried out attacks on the frontline and were shelling two populated areas. "Armenia is blatantly violating the ceasefire regime," the ministry said in a statement. The two sides also accused each other of attacks just before the ceasefire deadline.

Karabakh's ombudsman Artak Beglaryan said missiles had been fired at the region's main city Stepanakert while Azerbaijan said at least five populated districts were under heavy shelling. An AFP journalist in Stepanakert reported hearing blasts in the city before the ceasefire took effect, but it was calmer after noon, with isolated explosions in the distance.

Some residents were venturing out of their homes after days of taking shelter from shelling, rocket fire and drone attacks, but there was little hope the ceasefire would take hold for long. "I lived for nearly 20 years in Azerbaijan, these people hate us," Vladimir Barseghyan, 64, told AFP in a workshop making uniforms for fighters at the front. "We don't believe in a ceasefire, they just want to gain some time.'

In Barda, an Azerbaijani town about 40 km from the conflict zone, many residents who spoke to AFP were against the ceasefire and in favor of Baku pressing on with its campaign to restore its control of Karabakh. "We don't want a ceasefire. They should leave our lands," said Zemfira Mammadova, a 71-year-old retiree. "They should

get out, and let our people live a normal life. We have nothing to do with them and they should stay away from us."

The ceasefire deal had been announced after talks between the two countries' top diplomats mediated by Russian Foreign Minister Sergei Lavrov. He said the truce had been agreed "on humanitarian grounds" and would allow for exchanges of prisoners and bodies. Lavrov also said that Armenia and Azerbaijan agreed to "substantive negotiations" on resolving the dispute over Karabakh, with France, Russia and the United States continuing as longtime mediators.

Azerbaijan has said it wants a change in the talks' format, has spoken of wanting to get Turkey involved too, and yesterday accused France of not being a neutral mediator. France yesterday called for the ceasefire to be strictly respected "in order to create the conditions for a permanent cessation of hostilities". Russian President Vladimir Putin also spoke with President Hassan Rouhani of Iran, which borders both Armenia and Azerbaijan, about Moscow's mediation efforts, the Kremlin said.

Karabakh's declaration of independence has not been recognized by any country - even Armenia - and the international community regards it as part of Azerbaijan. The return of fighting has stoked fears of a full-blown war embroiling Turkey, which strongly backs Azerbaijan, and Russia, which has a military treaty with Armenia. Turkey said yesterday that the ceasefire agreement was an important first step but that Armenia had a "last chance" to withdraw from Karabakh.

Since the conflict restarted both sides have accused the other of shelling areas populated by civilians and thousands of people have been displaced by the clashes. Stepanakert is dotted with damaged buildings and unexploded ordnance following days of shelling. AFP journalists have also witnessed destruction in villages in Azerbaijan near the front line. More than 50 civilians have been confirmed killed on both sides and the Armenians have acknowledged over 400 military deaths, while Azerbaijan has not admitted to any fatalities among its troops. — AFP

The events come despite continued questions over how sick Trump was and how complete his recovery is now, with White House officials refusing to answer basic queries including when the president first contracted the virus and whether he has tested negative since. After Trump spent months mocking Biden for staying at home during the pandemic, it is Biden who has barnstormed swing states this week.

He visited Arizona Thursday and campaigned Friday in Nevada. Trump won both states in 2016 but they are now narrowly tilting Democratic in polls. At a drive-in style event in Las Vegas, Biden slammed the president. "His reckless personal conduct since his diagnosis, the destabilizing effect it's having on our government, is unconscionable," Biden said. As he boarded his campaign plane he offered a message for those attending Trump's public events: "Good luck. I wouldn't show up unless you had a mask and were distanced."

On Friday, Trump gave a marathon interview to rightwing talk radio host Rush Limbaugh in which he said the experimental Regeneron antibody cocktail that he took as part of therapeutic treatment was "a cure". It's "a total game changer" and "better than a vaccine", he said. In fact, there is no cure and still no approved vaccine for the coronavirus.

Later Friday he appeared in his first televised interview since he was diagnosed with the virus, telling Fox's Tucker Carlson show he is now "medication-free". In what the White House called an onair "medical evaluation" the president told Fox contributor doctor Marc Siegel he has been tested again for COVID-19, saying he did not know the "numbers" but "I know I'm at either the bottom of the scale or free". It was not clear when the interview was filmed.

Trump has repeatedly asserted that he feels fine, and he has been backed up by statements from presidential physician Sean Conley. But in his Limbaugh interview, Trump suggested for the first time that he had been close to death, had it not been for his aggressive regimen of therapeutic drugs. "I'm talking to you today because of it. I could have been a bad victim," he said, adding that doctors told him: "You were going into a very bad phase."

Polls show Biden leads heavily in key demographics including women and the elderly, prompting analysts to talk increasingly of a possible landslide victory. Trump's biggest liability - overwhelming public dissatisfaction over his handling of the pandemic - has returned as the headline issue of the campaign thanks to his own infection. Adding to the pressure, Democrats who control the House of Representatives unveiled plans for a commission to investigate a president's fitness for the job - a move clearly meant to jab at Trump. — AFP



### New academic year begins without promos

**KUWAIT:** The new academic year for public schools in Kuwait kicked off last week without much fanfare no traffic or busy streets and no back-to-school sales. "The reason is obvious - during the pandemic, students are not required to go to school physically as they are taught by teachers at home through online classes. So we haven't displayed bags and notebooks visibly in our store. Students are not also required to wear their school uniforms," said Hassan, an Egyptian

manager of a popular budget store in Farwaniya. "Normally at this time, the back-to-school section at our store is the busiest. We normally put new schoolbag collections and new notebooks on display in a prominent area of the store," he said. "A few teachers visited our store to buy some stuff they needed, but the situation nowadays is completely different from previous years." Teachers are conducting classes from classrooms or the comfort of their homes.

A store attendant at Khaldiya Co-op said that most of their stocks for the school reopening are kept at their storage facilities in Shuwaikh. "I don't know what they are planning to do with the school supplies. I don't think they will display them. There is no demand at all for anything connected to schools. We have some bags and school supplies here, but they are old stocks," he said.

Conversely, sales of electronic devices are booming, as students and parents were told they could access online classes via laptops, smartphones or desktop computers. According to media reports, there have been shortages of laptops in various countries around the world, as learning went online.

Public schools and Arabic private schools in Kuwait reopened virtually October 4th, while foreign private schools reopened weeks ago. At public schools, classes for kindergarten students are held from 8 am to 9:30 am, with four classes daily of 15 minutes each. Elementary students have four 30-minute classes for each subject from 3:30 pm to 5:30 pm. Intermediate students have four 30-minute classes daily from 8 am to 10:30 am, while secondary students have four classes daily from 10:40 am to 1:30 pm.

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# N Korea shows off giant new ICBMs

### Pyongyang defies coronavirus with huge military parade

Lockdown rules test faith in coronavirus-hit Philippines



**SEOUL:** North Korea showed off giant new intercontinental ballistic missiles at a military parade yesterday, analysts said as state television broadcast the huge weapons being rolled through Pyongyang. Each weapon was carried on a transporter that was 11 axles long and Ankit Panda of the Federation of American Scientists tweeted that it was the "largest road-mobile liquidfueled missile anywhere".

North Korea leader Kim Jong Un presided over the giant military parade, with the nuclear-armed country showcasing its latest and most advanced weapons as thousands of maskless troops defied the coronavirus threat. State broadcaster KCTV showed company after company of armed soldiers marching through Kim II Sung square in a night-time display, with Kim smiling and joking with his generals as he watched them.

Armored vehicles were lined up in the streets of Pyongyang ready to follow them, and none of the participants or the audience lined up in the stands were wearing masks. Kim - whose summit counterpart Donald Trump was recently hospitalized with the illness - wished "good health to all the people around the world who are fighting the ills of the evil virus", although he did not name the US president or his country directly.

The pandemic has swept the world since first emerging in neighboring China, with more than 36 million cases, but Kim closed the North's borders in January to try to prevent contamination said it had not seen a single infection. Women in the crowd wiped tears from their eyes as he spoke, footage broadcast on state media showed.

North Korean military parades normally climax with whatever missiles Pyongyang wants to highlight and are keenly watched by observers for clues to its weapons development. According to Seoul's joint chiefs of staff, the display actually took place in the early hours of yesterday, when they said in a statement that "signs of a military parade - involving equipment and people on a large scale - were detected at Kim Il Sung Square". South Korean and US intelligence agencies were "closely tracking the event",

### 'Big step forward'

The North is widely believed to have pressed on with the development of its arsenal - which it says it needs to protect itself from a US invasion - throughout nuclear negotiations with Washington, deadlocked since the collapse of a summit in Hanoi early last year. And Kim - wearing a grey suit told the crowd Pyongyang "will continue to

strengthen our military for self-defense and deterrence". "If you don't have the strength, you'll have to wipe away the tears and blood that flow with your two clenched fists," he

The widely anticipated display was part of commemorations of the 75th anniversary of the North's ruling Workers' Party. The party anniversary meant North Korea "has a political and strategic need to do something bigger", said Sung-yoon Lee, a Korean studies professor at Tufts University in the United States. Showcasing its most advanced weapons "will signal a big step forward in Pyongyang's credible threat capabilities", he said. But unlike on many previous occasions, no international media were allowed in to watch the parade. And the few foreigners remaining in Pyongyang were not welcome at the commemorations, according to the Russian embassy, which posted a message from the authorities on its Facebook page urging diplomats and other international representatives not to

approach or take photos" of the venues. At the end of December, Kim threatened to demonstrate a "new strategic weapon", but analysts say Pyongyang will still tread carefully to avoid jeopardizing its chances with Washington ahead of next month's presidential election. Showing off its strategic weapons in a military parade "would be consistent with what Kim Jong Un promised", said former US government North Korea analyst Rachel Lee, while "not provoking the United States as much as a testlaunch of a strategic weapon".

### Masks and missiles?

Kim is the third member of his family to lead the country. But in a possible signal of changing emphasis, the large-scale portraits of his grandfather, the North's founder Kim Il Sung, and father Kim Jong Il have been removed from their positions on the rostrum in the square. Instead smaller ones were installed further back and higher up on another building, the Grand People's Study House.

The ruling party anniversary comes during a difficult year for North Korea as the coronavirus pandemic and recent storms add pressure to the heavily sanctioned country. And Harry Kazianis of the Center for the National Interest warned that with thousands of people involved, the parade could turn into a "deadly superspreaderlike event" without "extreme precautions". The impoverished nation's crumbling health system would struggle to cope with a major virus outbreak, and he added: "Clearly, masks and missiles don't mix." - AFP

## with child trafficking misinformation

OAnon sows panic

**PARIS:** A surge in child trafficking misinformation pushed by QAnon conspiracy theorists is stirring public panic, generating violence and interfering with official efforts to protect minors, experts warn. From the US to South Africa, AFP Fact Check has debunked claims about girls found locked in shipping containers or lured in the street with roses fitted with a location-

A Facebook post shared one million times last month claimed 39 missing children had been found in a trailer in the US state of Georgia. In reality, they were discovered in separate locations in August as part of a police operation and a majority were not trafficking victims. Another hoax falsely accused US furniture retailer Wayfair of trafficking children inside storage cabinets. These stories have stoked the flames of QAnon, a far-right movement claiming that US President Donald Trump is waging a secret war against a global liberal cult of Satan-worshipping pedophiles. QAnon crept up three years ago on the fringes of social media but has since spilt into the mainstream thanks to widely-shared posts on platforms like Facebook and Instagram. "A lot of conspiracy theories are about pure people being exploited by a corrupt and decadent elite", said Paris-based extremism and technology expert Julien Bellaiche. "This is a pro-Donald Trump conspiracy theory but we're also talking about a global cabal and an antiestablishment message that you can identify with practically anywhere in the world."

### Influencers boost QAnon

QAnon has broadened its appeal particularly among women by focusing on child trafficking, experts say. Many of the posts feature the hashtag #SaveTheChildren or #SaveOurChildren, which have become synonymous with QAnon. Influencers on Instagram have helped spread child trafficking misinformation by sharing QAnon narratives in innocent-looking posts, according to Marc-Andre Argentino, a technology and extremist expert at Concordia University in Canada. "These influencers provide an aesthetic and branding to their entire pages, and they in turn apply this to QAnon content, softening the messages, videos and traditional imagery that would be associated with QAnon narratives," he said in a recent Twitter thread. "However, behind the branding and soft colours lies the QAnon we all know, along with all it entails: racism, medical/COVID disinformation, violence, and now the negative impact the hijacking of 'save the children' is

having on NGOs... that actually save lives.' International charity Save The Children has also sounded the alarm, saying its name in hashtag form had experienced "unusually high volumes" of traffic and caused "confusion among our supporters and the general public". Influencers are not the only public figures to seemingly promote QAnon. Trump himself at times appears to fan conspiracy theories. In a September interview, he described his presidential race rival Joe Biden as a puppet controlled by "people that you've never heard of, people that are in the dark shadows". —AFP

### Trump ramps up sanctions but sees few results

WASHINGTON: As he seeks a second term, US President Donald Trump is accelerating his favorite foreign-policy tool of economic sanctions but his "maximum pressure" campaigns have produced few of the results he has been seeking. The Trump administration on Thursday imposed sweeping sanctions on Iran's banks, hoping for a knock-out blow to the adversary's economy, and in recent weeks has issued nearly daily actions against players in countries that include Belarus, Cuba, Nicaragua, Syria and

"Sanctions have clearly been the tool of choice for the Trump administration to respond to rogue regimes and illicit conduct," said Richard Goldberg of the Foundation for the Defense of Democracies, a hawkish group close to the Trump administration. "Past administrations commonly used sanctions but did so on a more narrow, targeted basis - designating specific entities and individuals rather than attempting to create macroeconomic changes and destabilize governments to force wholesale behavioral change."

No country has been hit harder by US sanctions than Iran, with Trump in 2018 walking out of a denuclearization deal negotiated by former president Barack Obama and moving to block all oil exports from the clerical-run nation. While denying the goal was regime change, Secretary of State Mike Pompeo set 12 conditions for the removal of sanctions that amounted to a full-fledged reversal of Iran's security strategy such as support of regional militants.

More than two years later, the Trump administration claims credit for devastation to Iran's economy, saying that its regional allies such as Hezbollah have been deprived of cash. "In Iran, the regime has considerably less resources to spend on malign activities, which is itself a national security victory for the United States, and it appears the regime will be forced to negotiate in 2021 with whoever wins the presidential election," Goldberg said.

### No 'real change'

But Iranian-backed militant groups have been stepping up their activities, Iran has taken steps away from the restrictions imposed by the nuclear accord - and none of Pompeo's 12 stated goals have been achieved. "They would say 'we have weakened Iran' - which is true - but there hasn't been a real change in Iranian behavior," said Thomas Wright, a foreign policy expert at the Brookings Institution. "We haven't seen Iran agree to a negotiation, let alone negotiate an alternative to the JCPOA," he said, referring to the Iran accord by its acronym.

Brian O'Toole, who helped implement sanctions under the Obama administration, said the latest sanctions on Iran were more about politics including making it more difficult for a future administration to re-enter the nuclear accord. 'The real impact of these sanctions is likely to be marginal, and certainly not to the level of regime collapse as has reportedly been touted by some proponents," said O'Toole, now at the Atlantic Council. "And it will do little to cut down on Iran's bad behavior," he said.

### Maduro stays but Kim negotiates

The Trump administration's goal has been explicit in Venezuela - the removal of leftist leader Nicolas Maduro, whose re-election in 2018 was widely seen as fraudulent. But after more than a year and a half of US efforts including sanctions on Venezuela's oil, Maduro remains in charge with support from Russia, China, Iran and Cuba. The results are more complex on North Korea, which was hit by major UN-blessed sanctions after a series of nuclear and missile tests. Experts see the economic pressure as one reason why North Korean leader Kim Jong Un embraced diplomacy with Trump, whom he met in a landmark 2018 summit and twice again last year. The refusal by Trump, under pressure from his aides, to ease sanctions on

North Korea without a final deal scuttled a 2019 summit with Kim in Hanoi. Trump has taken credit for easing warlike tensions with North Korea but the authoritarian state has still been pursuing its nuclear development.

Goldberg saw a sanctions success story with Turkey which freed a detained US pastor after Trump's brief imposition of tariffs rocked the NATO ally's economy. But Trump's enthusiasm for sanctions has tested relations with allies, with European nations struggling to preserve the Iranian nuclear accord. European and other allies have voiced annoyance but reluctantly complied as the United States laid out secondary sanctions, threatening to punish any nation that does business with Iran.

"The US has been very interested in sanctions for a long time, but I think there is some recognition now in both parties this has to be part of a larger strategy and it can't be a strategy in itself, which is less effective," Wright said. "I don't think Trump sees it that way, but I think there is a growing recognition of that." —AFP

### Training dogs to detect virus

As Russia is experiencing a surge in coronavirus cases, the country's flagship airline Aeroflot is training sniffer dogs to detect the coronavirus by scent. Aeroflot uses a special jackal-dog hybrid called Shalaika in Russian to detect explosives. Now dog handlers say the Shalaikas-who have a powerful sense of smell-can be taught to sniff out the coronavirus. "The dog is not looking for the virus, the dog is looking for a person with signs of the disease," Elena Batayeva, head of canine monitoring at Aeroflot, told reporters.

Russia imposed one of the most severe nationwide lockdowns at the beginning of the pandemic. Non-essential businesses were shuttered and Moscow residents only permitted to move freely with official digital passes. But most restrictions were lifted ahead of a large WWII military parade in June and a nationwide vote on amendments that paved the way for President Vladimir Putin to remain in power until 2036. Officials in Moscow, which is the epicentre of Russia's pandemic, have taken only minor steps to slow the spread of cases. Mayor Sergei Sobyanin has ordered the elderly and vulnerable to stay at home and told employers to keep at least a third of staff working remotely.



### New #MeToo wave challenges Denmark's image

**COPENHAGEN:** Thousands of women across Denmark have come forward in recent weeks with stories of sexism and harassment in the Nordic country which is often viewed as a bastion of gender equality.

On Wednesday Morten Ostergaard, leader of the Social Liberal party, resigned after it emerged he had placed his hand on the thigh of a female colleague ten years earlier. "Morten has apologised and I have forgiven him" MP Lotte Rod wrote on Facebook.

"The problem is no longer what happened but the way it was handled," she added, calling for "a change of culture". In 2017 a public discussion arose in Denmark as the #MeToo movement emboldened women across the world to speak out about their experiences of discrimination and sexual assault. However a widespread change in attitudes did not materialize in the Nordic nation, which regularly scores highly in international measures of equality.

#MeToo was often considered "a minority issue, something that was not really Danish," Camilla Mohring Reestorff, associate professor in culture and media studies at Aarhus University, told AFP.

Danes tend to see themselves as "progressive, free and equal," she said, adding, "It can make us a bit blind when it comes to sexism."

### 'Domino effect'

In recent months, however, the issue has risen to the fore as thousands of women, including celebrities, doctors, academics and musicians, have begun sharing their accounts of sexism or mistreatment. The testimonials are "triggering a domino effect and making people conscious of the need for collective change," said Christian Groes, anthropologist at the University of

### Tripoli mosques open after 7-mth virus closure

TRIPOLI: Mosques reopened in and around the Libyan capital Friday almost seven months after they were ordered to close as part of strict curbs to rein in the Covid-19 pandemic. Libya, ravaged by a complex web of conflicts since the ouster of longtime dictator Moamer Kadhafi in a 2011 uprising, has seen a surge in contaminations since its first coronavirus case in

According to the latest official figures, there have been more than 41,000 confirmed cases of the virus and 621 deaths in Libya, a country of less than seven million people. The UN-recognized Government of National Accord based in the capital Tripoli authorized the reopening of mosques, but with conditions. Mosques in Tripoli and nearby towns reopened for prayers, with the faithful wearing face masks and observing social distancing.

They also brought their own rugs. The imam of Jaafar bin Abi Talib mosque in the western suburb of Janzour told AFP an "awareness" campaign was launched ahead of the reopening.

"We distributed leaflets explaining the conditions under which prayers can resume in the mosques in line with the government's guidelines," Abdel Monem al-

The guidelines restrict numbers in mosques for prayers to half pre-coronavirus levels, he said.

Mosques which fail to comply with government restrictions would be shut. The closure of mosques was ordered nationwide when the first cases of coronavirus emerged in mid-March, although in some towns and districts the ban was ignored. The call to prayers still rang out but with the faithful urged to "pray at home". —AFP

### **Orthodox Jews** defiant in Brooklyn

**NEW YORK:** In an Orthodox Jewish area of Brooklyn on Friday, community members vowed to defy government attempts to restrict their worship over rising coronavirus concerns as they marked a religious holiday. Borough Park saw angry protests by Hasidic Jews this week after New York Governor Andrew Cuomo announced he was partially shutting down the neighborhood to stem a second wave of COVID-19.

The controversy turned political with right-wing figures stoking the demonstrations and Orthodox Jews claiming they are being targeted by the Democratic governor for their support of President Donald Trump. On the final day of Sukkot Friday, which coincided with Cuomo's deadline for religious sites to be capped at ten people and non-essential businesses to close, worshippers were defiant. "He doesn't understand that our whole life is praying and studying the bible. We have to do what we have to do," said grey-haired Moses, declining to give his surname outside the Anshei Sfard Hasidic synagogue. A few blocks away on 13th Avenue, where demonstrators lit fires and chanted "Jewish Lives Matter" on Tuesday night, 50-year-old Abraham said the community would keep open reli-

gious schools and places of worship. 'What's he (Cuomo) going to do? Is he going to bring his sheriffs down and close every synagogue? There are maybe 500 here," he said, also declining to give his full name. Borough Park is part of a large area of Brooklyn declared a "red zone" by Cuomo, and backed by Mayor Bill de Blasio, after the rate of positive cases soared above the three percent threshold. —ÅFP

# Lockdown rules test faith in coronavirus-hit Philippines

### Churches in Catholic-majority country beginning to reopen

MANILA: After months of live-streaming mass to millions of faithful from behind closed doors, churches in the Catholic-majority Philippines are beginning to reopen. But strict coronavirus rules mean worship is still far from normal, and the contagion spreading across the deeply religious country has forced churches to get creative to meet the spiritual needs of their



Worship is still far from normal

In the usually packed Baclaran Church in the capital Manila-which has the highest number of infections in the archipelago-temperature guns, hand sanitizer, contact-tracing forms and uniformed security guards greet the faithful wearing masks and plastic face shields. Social distancing rules limit three people to pews that normally sit 10 and every second bench is left empty in the cavernous church where thousands of worshippers once flocked for mass.

Face coverings must be worn at all times-even when believers take the piece of bread given to them during the Holy Communion by a priest or minister who is not exempt from the protocols. Holy water fonts-into which people used to dip their fingers to make the sign of the cross-are dry and covered with a white cloth.

Religious icons are in storage or behind fences to

prevent people from touching and kissing them-a common practice believed to help cure the sick but

that could now help spread Covid-19.
"It feels so strange," said Rachel Mendioro, who is eight-months pregnant with her first child and is praying for a safe delivery. "Seeing few people (inside the church) gives you a different vibe. It really tells you that the world is facing a problem right now.

With churches in Manila limited to filling only 10 percent of their seating capacity and many still fearful of infection, online mass remains popular. Services livestreamed on the Baclaran Church's Facebook page receive as many as 50,000 views-a five-fold increase from before the pandemic.

Elsewhere in the country, drive-by communion services have been introduced and some priests are visiting the homes of their congregants to hear confession. Forced to worship at home since March, when the country began a months-long lockdown, Rederacion Parina said she wept when she recently returned to Baclaran for the first time. The 77-year-old walked the six kilometers (nearly four miles) from her home instead of taking public transport to save money for food. She prayed for help to resolve her financial woes-increasingly aggravated by virus measures crippling the Philippine economy.

"My body is gaining strength when I go out (to visit the church)... I feel calm," said Parina, lifting her face shield to wipe away tears. "When I'm stuck at home... I feel like I'm nearing my end."

#### Rethinking faith

Other churches have opted to hold their services entirely online until the health crisis eases. Teejay Bagasbas, 51, and her family may have to wait until



next year before they can attend a service at the conservative International Churches of Christ.

For now, they sit in their courtyard and watch the livestreamed version, taking communion using prepackaged bread and grape juice made by local company Holy Cup, which has reported a three-fold increase in sales during the outbreak. "If there is something good that is brought about by the pandemic (it) is that the church was brought into each other's homes," Bagasbas said.

But virtual worshipping is not for everyone. "A lot of people... feel the connection is not as intense or not as real," said Victorino Cueto, rector at the Baclaran Church. The virus offers a new perspective on how people can practice their faith and the church should be quick to adapt to it, said Cueto.

### Pakistan bans TikTok over 'immoral content'

**ISLAMABAD:** Pakistan on Friday banned the wildly popular video sharing app TikTok, as authorities press their clampdown on "immoral" content.

Chinese-owned TikTok which has become a global sensation with its short video clips has a huge user base among young Pakistanis, with some attracting millions of followers. But it has come up against backlash in the ultra-conservative Islamic country, where in recent months several dating apps including Tinder and Grindr have also been banned and YouTube threatened with shutdown. The Pakistan Telecommunication Authority (PTA) on Friday said TikTok had failed to adhere to two warnings, which had demanded it block "immoral, obscene and vulgar" content.

"The application failed to fully comply with the instructions, therefore, directions were issued for blocking of TikTok application in the country", the PTA said in a statement.

Pakistanis were unable to access the app on Friday evening. Arslan Khalid, a digital media adviser to Prime Minister Imran Khan, has previously claimed the "exploitation, objectification & sexualization of young girls on TikTok" was causing pain to parents.

Earlier this week, Pakistani TikToker Jannat Mirza became the first in the country to reach 10 million followers, with lip-syncing and slow motion clips among her content. "TikTok is a major source of entertainment for lower and middle class Pakistanis, as well as illiterate citizens that includes half the population as it is video based and easy to use," said Úsama Khilji, a digital rights activist, who said the ban violates freedom of

### **Senator Graham** refuses COVID test ahead of debate

**WASHINGTON:** Prominent US lawmaker Lindsey Graham, who chairs the Senate Judiciary Committee set to consider President Donald Trump's Supreme Court nominee next week, refused on Friday to be tested for the coronavirus. The South Carolina ally of Trump said no to a testing request by his Democratic rival in their Senate race, ahead of their scheduled debate in the southern state.

Graham's move prompted the debate with Jaime Harrison to be scrapped, with separate interviews of

the candidates conducted instead. But the issue could prove to be a critical one in Washington.

Graham is expected to preside in person over next week's hearings on the confirmation of conservative Judge Amy Coney Barrett to fill the Supreme Court seat made vacant by the death last month of liberal justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg. Should Graham test positive and be forced into 10 days or more of quarantine, that could postpone the hearings, something Republicans have fiercely opposed.

Two other Republican senators on the committee, Mike Lee and Thom Tillis, tested positive after attending a September 26 ceremony where Trump announced Barrett as his nominee. Most attendees were not wearing masks and several have since tested positive. Of the Judiciary Committee's 22 members, 10 are age 68 or older. They include the Senate's two oldest senators, Democrat Dianne Feinstein and Republican Chuck Grassley, both 87.—AFP

### Twitter tightens rules to thwart election threats

SAN FRANCISCO: Twitter said Friday it will take down calls for violence starting after polls close on US election day and slap warnings on premature victory claims to fight efforts to undermine the election. When it comes to a winner in any race, Twitter will require an announcement by an election official or a public projection from at least two authoritative, national news outlets making independent election calls.

The California tech giant will also invite people to add their thoughts to retweets instead of just mindlessly sharing, according to legal lead Vijaya Gadde and product lead Kayvon Beykpour.

The platform, a favorite method of communicating for President Donald Trump, will also broaden its application of warning labels for misleading tweets by candidates leading up to election day on November 3. "Twitter plays a critical role around the globe by empowering democratic conversation, driving civic participation, facilitating meaningful political debate, and enabling people to hold those in power accountable," Gadde and Beykpour said in a blog post.

"But we know that this cannot be achieved unless the integrity of this critical dialogue on Twitter is protected from attempts-both foreign and domestic-to undermine it." Social media platforms including Facebook and Twitter have been in the spotlight since massive disinformation campaigns directed by Russian intelligence and other malign actors overshadowed the 2016 election.

Applying existing protocol, Twitter will label tweets that falsely claim a win and will remove "tweets that encourage violence or call for people to interfere with election results or the smooth operation of polling places." Twitter forbids posts that manipulate or interfere with elections, and the platform already adds labels to tweets that violate rules against doctored media or misleading information concerning voting or COVID-19.

Beginning next week, people who try to retweet posts deserving warning labels because of misleading information will be shown a prompt directing them to credible facts about the topic first, according to the blog post. "These new prompts will give individuals more context on labeled tweets so they can make more informed decisions on whether or not they want to amplify them to their followers," Gadde and Beykpour said. Twitter will also start adding warnings and restrictions on tweets labeled as containing misleading information when they are from US political figures including candidates and campaign accounts. The same will be done with misleading tweets from US-based accounts with more than 100,000 followers, or that spark significant engagement.

"We have already increased the size and capacity of our teams focused on the US election and will have the necessary staffing to respond rapidly to issues that may arise on Twitter on Election night and in the days that follow," Gadde and Beykpour said. — AFP

### Texas judge blocks order limiting ballot drop-off sites

**HOUSTON:** A US judge has blocked an order from Texas' governor cutting the number of sites voters can drop off mail-in ballots for November's presidential election, which Democrats had said amounted to voter suppression. The order, issued in early October by Republican Governor Greg Abbott, limited the number of drop-off centers to one per county, even as mail-in voting is expected to become much more popular due to the coronavirus pandemic. The move would help curb "illegal "Covid has shaken all of us and faith is not immune

from the whole process," he said. "Every crisis is an opportunity so I think the pandemic is asking us to reimagine what our faith is now." — AFP

### Swiss hostage was a missionary

GENEVA: A Swiss woman thought to have been killed in Mali was a missionary abducted in 2016, the Swiss foreign ministry said yesterday. Beatrice Stoeckli was a missionary from Basel who was working in Timbuktu when she was taken four years ago-having already been abducted by jihadidsts once before, in 2012, Swiss news agency Keystone-ATS reported. The Swiss authorities said in a statement released late Friday that for the past four years they had been working with the Malian authorities and other partners for her release. The foreign ministry said the French authorities had informed them of Stoeckli's fate based on what French hostage Sophie Petronin, who was released earlier this week, had told them. —AFP

### UK recalls envoy from Belarus

LONDON: Britain has joined several eastern European nations in withdrawing its ambassador from strife-torn Belarus in protest at President Alexander Lukashenko's expulsion of diplomats from Poland and Lithuania. In a tweet late Friday, Foreign Secretary Dominic Raab said the UK 'condemns Belarus' decision to expel Polish & Lithuanian diplomats". "Completely unjustified and will only isolate the Belarusian people. In solidarity, we are temporarily recalling our Ambassador for consultations on the situation in Belarus," he said. The ambassadors of Lithuania and Poland were recalled on Monday after Minsk accused them of backing mass protests that have erupted against Lukashenko since a disputed election on August 9. — AFP

### HK police arrest smuggling group

HONG KONG: Hong Kong police yesterday arrested a group accused of helping 12 pro-democracy activists detained in mainland China for nearly two months after attempting to flee to Taiwan in a speedboat. The group of nine, some of whom had been previously arrested for participating in the massive protests that threw the financial hub into turmoil last year, were taken into custody for "assisting offenders". "Their roles include ownership of the boat, financial backing, providing accommodation before the trip, transportation to the pier and arranging their lives after arriving in Taiwan," a police spokesperson told reporters. China's coast guard intercepted a boat transporting the 12 Hong Kongers to Taiwan in late August. The self-ruled island routinely offers sanctuary to people attempting to flee the authoritarian mainland China. —AFP

### Iran's rial hits new low against dollar as economy reels

**TEHRAN:** The Iranian rial fell to a new low against the US dollar vesterday as the economy reels under pressure from the COVID-19 pandemic and US sanctions. The dollar was selling for as much as 304,300 rials on the unofficial market, up from 295,940 on Friday, according to the foreign exchange site Bonbast.com. The economic daily Donya-e-Eqtesad's website gave the dollar rate as 303,300, up 6,000 rials from Friday.

The currency has lost about 56 percent of its value in 2020 as a drop in oil prices has deepened the economic crisis in the country, which also has the highest COVID-19 death toll in the Middle East.

The official exchange rate - used mostly for imports of state-subsidized food and medicine - is 42,000 rials per dollar. The United States on Thursday slapped fresh sanctions on Iran's financial sector, targeting 18 banks to further choke off Iranian revenues as Washington ramps up pressure on Tehran weeks ahead of the US election.

Iranian central bank governor Abdolnaser Hemmati dismissed the sanctions as political propaganda and played down their practical impact. "What needs to be decided in this regard was decided two years ago," Hemmati was quoted as saying by Iranian media. "Therefore, the banks that were party to the agreement with Iran have decided to continue trading with Iran." Analysts said the sanctions may further deter European and other foreign banks from working with Iran, even for permitted humanitarian transactions. — Reuters

### White House proposes \$1.8tn stimulus

WASHINGTON: With the presidential election fast approaching, the White House on Friday proposed a beefed-up \$1.8 trillion economic rescue plan to try to coax congressional Democrats into an agreement. President Donald Trump, who this week has veered wildly in his position on stimulus to help the world's largest economy recover from the damage done by the COVID-19 pandemic, now seems to be making a major push to roll out funding before he stands for re-election on November 3.

The new proposal, an improvement over the administration's previous \$1.6 trillion offer, brings them closer to the Democrats' latest package costing \$2.2 trillion. White House spokeswoman Alyssa Farah said the administration was "willing to come up on the level" but wanted to keep the price tag "below \$2 trillion."

But Trump, who is trailing in the polls against Democratic rival Joe Biden, said he wants an even more robust plan. "A lot of people are being hurt. I would like to see a bigger stimulus package, frankly, than either the Democrats or the Republicans are offering," Trump said in an interview with conservative talk radio host Rush Limbaugh.

"I would like to see money going to people. It

was not their fault." That marked the latest dramatic shift from the president who just days ago called off negotiations with Democrats and said there would be no new aid to struggling businesses and unemployed workers until after the election. But as Trump has turned cheerleader and trumpets his newfound optimism, Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell poured cold water on the chances for a deal, saying Congress is unlikely to agree on a new stimulus package before the election due to "vast" differences over how much to spend.

'We do need another rescue package, but the proximity to the election and the differences of opinion about what is needed at this particular juncture are pretty vast," McConnell said Friday at a press conference in his home state of Kentucky. While he would like to see legislators rise above their political differences "I think that's unlikely in the next three weeks," the Republican senator said.

House Speaker Nancy Pelosi and Treasury Secretary Steven Mnuchin have been negotiating for weeks, raising hopes for a huge, new relief package to follow up on the \$2.2 trillion CARES Act and other measures that brought the total aid passed by Congress to nearly \$3 trillion.

Pelosi said differences remain over policy as well as money. "I do hope that we will have an agreement soon," Pelosi said Friday on MSNBC. "But as you say, they keep changing their minds." — AFP

### Microsoft to let staff work from home permanently

WASHINGTON: Software giant Microsoft will let employees work from home permanently if they choose to, US media reported on Friday, becoming the latest employer to expand work-from-home provisions prompted by the COVID-19 pandemic.

US tech news website The Verge said most Microsoft employees are still at home as the health crisis drags on, and the company doesn't expect to reopen its US offices until January of next year at the earliest. But when it does, workers can chose to work from home permanently with their manager's approval, although they will have to give up their office space. "The Covid-19 pandemic has challenged all of us to think, live and work in new ways," human resources head Kathleen Hogan said in a note to employees obtained by The Verge.

"We will offer as much flexibility as possible to support individual work styles, while balancing business needs and ensuring we live our culture." In a public blog post later in the day, Hogan said the company views employees spending less than 50 percent of their time working from home as "standard," but wasn't abandoning office work entirely. —AFP

### Judge won't force App Store to let Fortnite return

SAN FRANCISCO: A federal judge on Friday denied the latest bid by Epic Games to force Fortnite back into the App Store while its lawsuit against Apple neads for trial next year. The two firms are fighting over whether Apple's tight control of the App Store, and its 30 percent cut of revenue, counts as monopolistic behavior. US District Court Judge Yvonne Gonzalez Rogers, who had previously rejected a similar request by Epic, rejected the battle royale game maker's motion for an injunction ordering Apple to return Fortnite to the App Store immediately.

"Epic Games has never adequately explained its rush, other than its disdain for the situation," Rogers said in a ruling denying an injunction ahead of trial.

"The current predicament is of its own making." Apple pulled Fortnite from its online mobile apps marketplace on August 13 after Epic released an update that dodges revenue sharing with the iPhone maker.

In her latest ruling, the judge again compared any loss of business suffered by Epic due to Fortnite's eviction by Apple to a "selfinflicted wound." Due to the legal row, Fortnite fans using iPhones or other Apple devices no longer have access to the latest game updates, including the new season released at the end of August.

Rogers expressed empathy for Fortnite lovers unable to get the game on Apple

"This is especially so during these continued difficult times that is the COVID-19 pandemic era, where gaming and virtual worlds are both social and safe," Rogers said in the ruling. "However, there is significant public interest in requiring parties to adhere to their contractual agreements or in resolving business disputes through the normal course.'

Rogers pointed out that Epic could get Fortnite back in the App Store by using Apple's payment system for transactions. Apple does not allow users of its popular devices to download apps from anywhere but its App Store, and developers have to use Apple's payment system which takes its cut.

Epic is accusing Apple of being "a monop-

olist" due to its tight grip on the App Store. The judge said at a recent hearing that she didn't expect a trial over the dispute to start until July of next year, at the earliest, given her calendar. The legal battle comes as Apple puts priority on selling digital content and subscription services to the one billion-plus people around the world using devices powered by its iOS mobile operating software. Major app developers including Epic and streaming music giant Spotify recently formed a coalition to press for new terms with the major online marketplaces operated by Apple and Google. Google runs a Play Store for apps tailored for devices powered by its Android software and also takes a commission, but people are free to get apps from other online venues. — AFP

# Fearing Biden tax hikes, wealthy Americans change estate plans

### Democrats want to raise estate taxes to the 'historical norm'

**NEW YORK:** Wealthy Americans are scrambling to change their estate plans before year-end, worried that Democrat Joe Biden will win the US presidential election and raise taxes, say financial advisers to the moneyed set. The biggest concern is that the White House and Congress could get swept up in a "Blue Wave" of Democratic wins that give Biden the power to propose and pass a sweeping set of tax reforms.

Wealthy people are especially nervous that an exemption allowing individuals to leave up to \$11.58 million to heirs, free of estate or gift taxes, could be cut before it expires in 2025. Democrats want to raise estate taxes to the "historical norm," according to the party's platform. That could mean slashing the exemption to \$5.49 million, the figure in place before Republican President Donald Trump signed a sweeping tax bill that included benefits for corporations and wealthy Americans in 2017, advisers said.

It is unclear how the election will go or what, if any, tax reform will pass. Tax code changes can also be complex and time consuming. But as Biden has climbed in the polls, rich people are rushing to set up trusts and revise existing ones before year-end to avoid 2021 tax consequences, advisers said.

"The \$11.58 million question is, 'What is going to happen to the gift and estate tax exclusion?" said Toni Ann Kruse, a New York estates lawyer who counsels ultra-high net worth people. "We don't know who will win the election or control the House or Senate - and all of those factors will play into what could happen." Biden would also "return the estate tax to 2009 levels" to fund paid family and medical leave, according to his website.

His plan also includes raising taxes on long-term capital gains, which is the profit earned by selling assets whose values have appreciated. Taxpayers with income above \$1 million would pay a 39.6 percent income tax on the profit, instead of the current tiered approach that maxes out at 20 percent for individuals with \$441,450 or more income. In a statement, Biden campaign spokesman Andrew Bates reiterated the candidate's intent to change tax law in ways that benefit less affluent people.

"Joe Biden is running to rebuild the backbone of this nation - the American middle class - by ensuring that our economy rewards work and not just

wealth," he said. The uptick in requests for estate changes intensified in June when Biden pulled ahead of Trump in polling, advisers said. Several firms said they have been overwhelmed by requests since then, and expect business to pick up more toward the end of the year. Tax-related workflow is triple the norm at Miller Samuel Inc, a New York-based real estate appraisal firm, said Chief Executive Jonathan Miller.

"We are flooded with requests for gift and estate tax appraisals right now," he said.

New York estate and tax planning lawyer Philip Michaels has added around 15 high net worth clients during the last several months who are revising estate plans.

Rockefeller Capital Management, a financial advisory firm in New York, is holding virtual events for customers while working with legal and tax advisers to sort through nuances of possible legislation, said Joe Roberts, Senior Wealth Strategist. Clients are worried about a "quick turn and drastic departure" from the status quo, Roberts said.

At the same time, some customers are worried about making decisions too early. That is because trusts created to use lifetime exemptions are not easily unwound. "It's a lot of money to give away," Indianapolis estate planning lawyer John Olivieri said of some of his clients. "People are struggling with, 'Do I really want to give this away?" — Reuters

### **HSBC** bank aims for zero carbon on investments by 2050

LONDON: Asia-focused bank HSBC announced Friday that it aims to achieve net-zero carbon emissions across its investments by 2050, but campaigners accused it of falling short on tackling climate change.

"HSBC has both the scale and global reach to play a leading role in guiding its customers through this transition and helping them to achieve this ambitious goal," the lender said in a statement. Its target is to "align its financed emissionsthe carbon emissions of its portfolio of customers-to the Paris Agreement goal to achieve net zero by 2050 or sooner".

"The bank also aims to be net zero in its operations and supply chain by 2030." Europe's biggest bank added that it has earmarked between \$750 billion and \$1.0 trillion of finance and investment to assist the transition. CEO Noel Quinn called the 2020s a "pivotal decade of change" towards "a healthier, more resilient and more sustainable future".

commit to limiting global warming to two degrees Celsius above pre-industrial levels. London-listed HSBC meanwhile follows in the footsteps of rival Barclays, which committed in March to zero-carbon by 2050 under pressure from its shareholders to help tackle climate change. Environmental campaign groups however gave a skeptical response to HSBC's announcement on Friday, arguing that the bank should cease support for coal, gas and oil activities.

"HSBC's net-zero commitment is a bit like saying you'll give up smoking by 2050, but continuing to buy a pack a week, or

even smoking more," said Becky Jarvis, coordinator of campaign group network Fund Our Future UK. "Any further financing of oil, gas, and coal expansion today is utterly at odds with a net-zero commitment by 2050. That's just science, not

And Adam McGibbon, campaigner at Market Forces, argued that the HSBC statement was nothing but "fluffy marketing". "A 550-word statement and not a single concrete commitment made by HSBC. This is zero ambition, not net zero ambition," McGibbon said. — AFP

**HAVANA:** The US dollar is making a comeback as the favored currency in communist-run Cuba as the country prepares to devalue the peso to relieve pressure on a battered economy. Cuba has a unique system whereby two official currencies have existed side-by-side for nearly three decades, the Cuban peso and convertible peso, the CUC. Long lines outside food stores are a common sight in Havana amid chronic shortages of basic goods, and with the government planning to call time on the CUC shopkeepers are already rejecting the currency, driving a rush to dollars for those who can get them.

"CUC not accepted" reads the sign at the entry to one Havana shop.

The island's economy, buffeted by evertightening US sanctions, has been hammered by the coronavirus pandemic, which has left Cuba without much-needed foreign revenue provided by its Caribbean beach tourism. The UN Economic Commission for Latin America forecasts GDP to plummet 8.0 percent this year.

In July, Havana opened dozens of staterun "dollar stores" in an effort to rake in foreign currency. The relatively wellstocked stores are a magnet for well-off Cubans and those with dollar remittances sent from US-based Cubans.

### Dollar debit cards

Customers first have to open a dollardenominated bank account, then use a debit card to pay for the goods in the stores. Economists warn of the creation of a two-tier economy-for the haves who can afford to buy in dollars, and the have-nots in the normal domestic economy.

'Of the 11 million inhabitants, if one million can buy in dollars, what about the other 10? If I don't have family abroad, to send dollars home, I don't have that opportunity," said Aleskis Rodriguez, 31, as he lined up to buy coffee at a Havana market still accepting CUC. Economy Minister Alejandro Gil denied the move would herald "economic apartheid" in Cuba. Instead, he said, it will satisfy the demands of people with the most purchasing power, and add to state coffers.

Economists like Pavel Vidal, a specialist on Cuba from Colombia's Javeriana University, have long argued that the dualcurrency system is unwieldy, particularly for exporters.

### Muddled reform

Vidal says Cuba's embrace of the dollar is an admission of failure by the authorities, a consequence of reforms that are "incomplete and well below expectations." The

long-mooted monetary reform is coming "at the worst possible moment," Vidal said. "Because this is monetary reform that implies a significant devaluation of the official currency against the dollar. Something that has never been done." The government in Havana has for years maintained the CUC artificially pegged to the dollar, as a shield for the vulnerable Cuban currency.

"I spent \$30.90 and look at what I bought! Some packages of juice, five packages of spaghetti and five packets of tomato puree, really nothing," said Niurka Romera, 50, outside a dollar store.

Whatever the currency, one thing is a constant in Cuban life: the long lines outside shops. "I've been here since 5.15 in the morning. It's 11.30 now, but they're already closing the shop and I have to come back tomorrow to buy my coffee," said Magalis, a 52-year-old teacher. She said the government was not doing enough to limit the size of the lines during the pandemic. "If Commander Fidel Castro was still alive, he would have done something beautiful for the people." — AFP

### Saudi PIF in talks to buy stake in UAE supermarket chain Lulu

ROYADH: Saudi Arabia's sovereign wealth fund, the Public Investment Fund (PIF), is in early discussions to buy a stake in supermarket chain Lulu Group International, two sources familiar with the matter told Reuters. It is in talks with Indian-born businessman Yusuff Ali, who founded Abu Dhabi-based Lulu, one of the largest chains in the Gulf region, the sources said.

Discussions between PIF and Lulu began four to six weeks ago, one of the sources said. It was not immediately clear how big a stake PIF is seeking to buy as discussions are at an early stage, or whether the talks would lead to a final transaction. Lulu operates shopping centers, hypermarkets and other businesses with an annual turnover of \$7.4 billion, according to its website.

It has operations in Saudi Arabia and other Gulf states as well as in Egypt, India, Indonesia and Malaysia. PIF, which manages \$360 billion in assets, declined to comment. Lulu's director of marketing & communications, V Nandakumar, said in an emailed response that "as a policy we never comment on market speculations and media rumors." Abu Dhabi state-owned holding company ADQ invested \$1 billion in Lulu earlier this year, two sources familiar with the talks said. ADQ did not respond to a Reuters request for comment. PIF is seen as a driver of the kingdom's Vision 2030 plan to diversify the economy, with the authorities aiming to turn it into the world's largest sovereign wealth fund.

The Saudi government wants

to expand the kingdom's retail

sector as part of a drive to create one million jobs by 2020. PIF invested \$500 million in e-commerce venture Noon, which shortly afterwards began operations in Saudi Arabia. It also invested indirectly in the IPO of Saudi mall operator Arabian Centres 4321.SE PIF was also approached by Reliance to buy a stake in the

retail arm of Indian billionaire Mukesh Ambani's Reliance Industries Ltd.

The fund, whose board is chaired by Saudi Arabia's Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman, has become a more active investor since 2015, taking a \$3.5 billion stake in Uber Technologies UBER. Nand invested \$45 billion in Softbank's inaugural technolo-

### 'Polish Amazon' eyes expansion ahead of IPO

WARSAW: Gazing out over the skyscrapers on the skyline, the head of Poland's top e-commerce company is unfazed by Amazon's imminent arrival as his business prepares for a record IPO. Instead, Frenchman Francois Nuyts, CEO of Allegro and himself a former Amazon executive, told AFP in an interview that his fast-growing company is ready to expand beyond

"There are many things we believe we do quite well if not better than any competitors," Nuyts said when asked about reports that Amazon could launch a Polish service within weeks. Set up in 1999 as a homegrown version of eBay, Allegro will list on the Warsaw Stock Exchange on Monday in an IPO valuing the company at around \$11 billion (9.4 billion euros) which is being closely watched by other still sluggish, pandemic-struck European markets. The company, which is owned by London-based private equity funds Cinven, Permira and Mid Europa, has said it is planning to raise around \$256 million and use the proceeds to repay debt.

It is expected to displace Polish video games developer CD Projekt, the company behind the runaway global hit "The Witcher", as the biggest firm on the Warsaw Stock Exchange.

'Quite a lot of disruption'

Buoyed by the e-commerce boom triggered by the coronavirus pandemic, net profit jumped to 289.7 million Polish zloty (64.2 million euros, \$75.5 million) in the first half of the year from 195.7 million zloty in the same period in 2019. Nuyts pointed to Allegro's "nimble" and "unique" business model connecting more than 100,000 sellers — many of them small "mom and pop stores" — with some 12 million active buyers.

The company has one mid-sized warehouse and is planning to open a larger one along with four smaller

Nuyts said more than 90 percent of products sold never go through a warehouse — moving directly from seller to buyer. "That's really the innovation of Allegro," he said, pointing to other companies that have "global giants" selling through their platforms and move products through several

The business model has helped Allegro during the pandemic, which Nuyts said had caused "quite a lot of disruption" at its one warehouse. The company has also relied on an extensive network of lockers across Poland, which allow customers to pick up their purchases without any direct contact with delivery drivers. — AFP

### Virus-hit British firms get extra financial support

LONDON: The British government on Friday said it would pay up to two-thirds of staff monthly wages to firms forced to close over the winter months, as infection rates skyrocket. Finance minister Rishi Sunak extended a scheme launched just two weeks ago for workers taking reduced hours to help businesses required to shut as part of efforts to cut transmission rates.

More than 42,000 people have died in the outbreak in Britain-the worst toll in Europe-and concern is mounting about a potentially deadlier second wave, and its social and economic impact. The UK economy grew by a weaker-than-expected 2.1 percent in August and remained far down on pre-pandemic levels, official data showed Friday.

It shrank by a fifth in the second quarter, entering recession on the back of a full lockdown that was only eased in June. Under the extended scheme, businesses will receive grants to pay the wages of staff who cannot work, with the government paying two-thirds of each employee's monthly salary up to a maximum of £2,100 (\$2,715, 2,309 euros) per month each.

Their employers will pay national insurance and pension contributions but will not be asked to contribute towards wages, unlike other firms using the scheme. "Throughout this crisis my priority has always been to protect jobs, so today I'm announcing an expansion of our jobs support scheme, specifically to protect those jobs of people who work in businesses who may be asked to close," Sunak told reporters.

"If that happens those workers will receive two thirds of their wages for the time that they're unable to

### 'Safety net'

"I hope this provides reassurance and a safety net for people and businesses in advance of what may be a difficult winter." Sunak added. A Treasury source estimated that the expanded scheme would cost "hundreds of millions" of pounds a month. From November, the government will nevertheless water down its nationwide jobs support that has helped keep millions of people in employment during the pandemic. Many analysts fear this will lead to a surge in unemployment, with the hospitality sector particularly affected.

Sunak denied Friday that his latest enlarged scheme would replicate the so-called furlough plan, which ends in late October. "This is a very different scheme to what we've had before. This is not a universal



approach," he told reporters.

This is an expansion of the jobs support scheme specifically for those people who are in businesses that will be formally or legally asked to close so in that sense it's very different.

"I've always said that we will adapt and evolve our response as the situation on the health side adapts and evolves. That's what's happening."

#### Infections skyrocket

Friday's announcement follows grim new official statistics that laid bare the virus' rapid new trajectory, and as pubs across central Scotland closed for just over two weeks to try to cut close-contact transmission. An estimated 224,400 people-or 1 in 240 — in England had the coronavirus during the week from September 25 to October 1, the Office of National

Although young adults are the main drivers of the surge, there has also been an eight-fold increase in infections of those aged over 65 since last month, according to Britain's largest study, by Imperial College London and Ipsos MORI. The study of 175,000 people estimated that there were 45,000 new infections every day between September 18 and October 5, with the rate doubling every 29 days.

The report warned spiralling levels of infection in northern England will replicate across the rest of the country "in a few weeks' time." "While certain areas are worse affected, if left unabated then infection trends will follow nationwide and could lead to high levels of unnecessary death and illness from the disease," said Imperial's Paul Elliott. Prime Minister Boris Johnson is expected to outline a new three-tier lockdown system, under which hospitality venues such as pubs and restaurants may face temporary


### Stocks gain on hopes for virus medication

**NEW YORK:** Global stocks mostly rose Friday amid increased hopes for a US stimulus package following the latest statements from President Donald Trump and rising confidence about coronavirus therapeutics. Major US indices finished higher for a third straight session, with the tech-rich Nasdaq jumping 1.4 percent as the White House again shifted its stance on the talks.

Earlier, European bourses also climbed despite rising coronavirus cases in the continent.

After markets tanked on Tuesday following President Donald Trump's abrupt move to end stimulus talks, investors have cheered his about face in subsequent days that's seen him calling for a deal. The White House on Friday beefed up its offer, proposing a \$1.8 trillion package as Trump himself said on a radio show that he favored an even larger

But Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell said there was not enough time to complete the talks before the election. Still, analysts said the gains reflected confidence there would be a pack-

Markets also cheered a write-up in the New England Journal of Medicine reporting that Gilead Sciences's remdesivir drug resulted in "consistent, clinically meaningful improvements" in coronavirus patients, the latest positive indicator about a leading treatment. That news follows announcements by Regeneron Pharmaceuticals and Eli Lilly earlier in the week on Covid-19 therapies that have boosted confidence in effectiveness of the treatments for the

The market is "being stimulated more this week by the realization that there just might be a widespread, effective COVID treatment regimen that gets approved soon," said Briefing.com analyst Patrick J. O'Hare. "The gist is that, the more confidence there is in potential treatment plans, the more confidence there will be in a potential return to normal activity," he added.

Analysts have also cited increased expectations that the US presidential election won't be contested, given challenger Joe Biden's widening lead over Trump in the polls. A drawn-out and litigious fight over the outcome has been a drag on sentiment in recent weeks.

### Madrid in semi-lockdown

While US stimulus and the election are major drivers of markets, a surge in new virus infections in Europe is causing angst, with several countries reimposing fresh containment measures and considering localized lockdowns. Spain's government declared a state of emergency and new partial lockdown for virus-hit Madrid, while in France, another four cities were placed on maximum coronavirus alert on Thursday, meaning they will have to shut bars and limit public gatherings.

Britain's economy expanded a weaker-thanexpected 2.1 percent in August and remained far down from pre-pandemic levels, official data showed Friday, with the government expanding help for workers whose businesses are forced to close. Despite a fourth consecutive monthly increase, gross domestic product was 9.2 percent below February's level, the Office for National Statistics said in a statement. — AFP

#### LatAm to bear worst impact: WB

WASHINGTON: Latin America and the Caribbean will suffer the worst economic and health impact from the coronavirus, the World Bank said Friday, forecasting a nearly 8.0 percent drop in regional GDP. "Our region is suffering the worst economic and health impacts of Covid-19 of anywhere in the world," according to Carlos Felipe Jaramillo, the Bank's regional vice president. He said the findings in the report "calls for clarity on how to combat the pandemic and put the economies back on track for a swift recovery." In its report, "The Cost of Staying Healthy" the Bank addresses the impact of the pandemic in a region with with high COVID-19 mortality and infection rates such as Brazil, Mexico and Peru. "The number of deaths per million people is as high as in advanced economies, if not more, but the resources available to counter the shock are much more constrained," it said. — AFP

#### S Sudan to change currency

JUBA: South Sudan's cabinet agreed on Friday to change the country's currency in order to improve the economy, the government spokesman said, without giving further details. "The cabinet has decided that the current currency should be changed....This is to improve our economic situation," information minister Michael Makuei Lueth told a news conference in the capital Juba following a cabinet meeting. The country's currency is the South Sudanese pound, adopted when the country gained independence from Sudan in 2011 after a long civil war. Another war, along with graft and mismanagement, led to an economic crisis in the oil-producing nation. In July, a central bank official announced that South Sudan had run out of foreign exchange reserves and could not stop the pound's depreciation. — Reuters

### Canada's job gains in Sept

OTTAWA: Canada added 378,200 jobs in September and the unemployment rate fell to 9.0 percent, handily beating analyst expectations, as children returned to school and the economy continued to reopen from coronavirus shutdowns, Statistics Canada said on Friday. Analysts in a Reuters poll had predicted a gain of 156,600 jobs and for the unemployment rate to fall to 9.7 percent from 10.2 percent in August. The gain brought employment to within 720,000 of its prepandemic level, Statscan said. "It's a good number. It's very encouraging that we didn't decelerate in September," said Andrew Kelvin, chief Canada strategist at TD Securities. The Canadian dollar strengthened to a three-week high at 1.3132 to the greenback, or 76.15 US cents. Full-time employment rose by 334,000 and compared with 44,200 new part-time positions. Employment in the goods-producing sector grew by 75,100 jobs, while the services sector grew by 303,100 positions. — Reuters

### Alitalia nationalization plans

MILAN: Italy has approved the creation of a new company to house the assets of troubled airline Alitalia as the government presses ahead with a plan to nationalize the company. The nationalization plan, which was delayed by political infighting, will now need to be approved by the European Commission. The economy, industry, transport and labor ministers signed late on Friday the decree setting up the new company. "Italy's new flagship carrier was born today," Transport Minister Paola De Micheli said. Alitalia has endured 11 years of difficult private management and three failed restructuring attempts, problems exacerbated by the coronavirus crisis that has devastated the global airline industry. — Reuters



### Africa needs \$1.2tn of financing to beat **COVID** impact: IMF

WASHINGTON: African countries will need \$1.2 trillion through 2023 to repair the economic damage inflicted by the coronavirus pandemic, IMF Managing Director Kristalina Georgieva said Friday.

About \$345 billion in financing has not yet been pledged, Georgieva said in a speech, while commitments from official lenders and international institutions cover less than a quarter of the projected need. "All of us-countries and institutions-must do more to support Africa to cope with the next phase, which is building a recovery from this crisis," Georgieva said.

The Washington-based crisis lender estimates Africa will see its GDP contract 2.5 percent in 2020, one of the worst downturns the continent has ever seen. And while recovery will begin next year, pre-crisis levels of growth won't be reached until 2022. With private sector financing limited, the IMF projects a funding gap of \$44 billion for this year alone, and 43 million people could be pushed into extreme poverty on the continent, wiping out five years of progress in poverty reduction.—AFP

### IBM reorganizes to focus on cloud computing

WASHINGTON: IBM unveiled a corporate reorganization to allow it to focus on cloud computing, spinning off its division for managed infrastructure. The move will create two separate, publicly traded firms by the end of 2021, according to the US computing giant. "IBM is laser-focused on the \$1 trillion hybrid cloud opportunity," said IBM chief executive Arvind Krishna.

"Now is the right time to create two market-leading companies focused on what they do best. IBM will focus on its open hybrid cloud platform and AI capabilities." The infrastructure firm, he said, "will have greater agility to design, run and modernize the infrastructure of the world's most important organizations." The move positions IBM to ramp up competition in cloud computing against rivals such as Amazon, Microsoft and Google. "We have positioned IBM for the new era of hybrid cloud," said IBM executive chairman Ginni Rometty.

"This focus will result in greater value, increased innovation, and faster execution for our clients." IBM shares surged seven percent in early trade on the news. — AFP





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
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

## Mobile games thrive, even as pandemic keeps players home

obile games are thriving as players turn to them for fun and friendship during the pandemic, with increasing numbers of women joining the trend. "Being stuck at home has not stopped people from playing games on their phones," said SensorTower mobile insights strategist Craig Chapple. "To the contrary, mobile gaming is more popular than ever.'

Smartphone game play involves taps on touchscreens with just a few moments of play at a time, often while sipping coffee or waiting for transit, in contrast to the console games with immersive worlds that can span hours. Mobile games appeal to a broader demographic than do shooters and other genres popular on console or PC gamers. More than 40 percent of mobile gamers are women, according to research firms Newzoo and Statista. That differs from gamers using consoles or personal computers, who are more likely to be males age 12 to 35 years old, according to analysts.

"We've had loads of people forced inside during lock-downs in need of entertainment," said Futuresource mobile tech and gaming research analyst Morris Garrard. "Gaming being one of the most interactive and engaging forms of entertainment has seen a significant boost." According to the mobile consultancy App Annie, spending on mobile gaming is expected to see strong growth this year and top \$100 billion. Popular titles include Candy Crush Saga, Honor of Kings, Pokemon Go and Gardenscapes.

### Minnows and whales

Many mobile games are free to download and rely on massive numbers of people spending a little on things like extra lives, virtual outfits, or items that boost in-game abilities. And, paying a dollar or so to upgrade to an ad-free

version of a mobile game is seen by some as a bargain. Mobile players who spend little to nothing are referred to in the industry as "minnows," while those more willing to pay are "dolphins" of "whales" depending on how deep they reach into their wallets. Casual games which rely on short play times such as puzzle and arcade-style games are among the most downloaded mobile titles. A major innovation in recent years has been a "battle pass" system popularized by Fortnite from Epic Games, with players pay for tickets to each "season," according to Chapple.

#### Addictive fun?

Mobile game makers, like their console-focused peers, manipulate psychological levers that emotionally reward players and keep them engaged in ways that some say can be addictive. The World Health Organization has classified "gaming disorder" a disease characterized by "impaired control over gaming, increasing priority given to gaming over other activities" even if it is detrimental to one's life. But, in a stressful world, mobile games can be a relaxing escape while standing in queues, waiting for a food orders, or just whiling away time, according to players.

Playing mobile games can improve moods; boost brain power, and provide a sense of community, according to proponents. "Allocating a bit of time to playing games can improve your mental health in a lot of amazing ways," Lifehack digital marketer Zuhair Sharif said in a blog. "This has led many to incorporate video games into their regular lives." Mobile game lovers are quick to point out that playing console or computer games in planes, buses, or cars is not an option, while smartphones can be whipped out anywhere to make a few

#### Mobile millennials

Worldwide, an estimated 72 percent of active mobile game players are "millennials" ranging in age from 23 to 38 years old. The broader audience for mobile games includes those in parts of the world where smartphones are the primary, if not only, way people connect to the internet. "In emerging regions, particularly China and India, it is absolutely huge," Garrard said.

Mobile game revenue is powered by the fact that they are easily available to the more than four billion people in the world with smartphones, according to Garrard. "Maybe they're not spending a lot, but there are many who spend a little bit on mobile games and it really adds up," Garrard said. A trend toward cloud streaming services will likely boost mobile gaming, as titles once limited to consoles will be able to offer more play on smartphones or tablets since action is power by datacenters.

Hight-capacity, super-fast 5G telecom networks could enable game makers to bring console quality graphics and action to mobile devices, appealing to more hardcore players. "The concept of gaming on the go will be ever more present, supported by improvements in mobile infrastructure," Garrard said. "It's not just the gaming platform will be benefiting, but the likes of kind of Google and Apple." Apple and Google are behind the mobile operating systems, iOS and Android respectively, that power nearly all of the world's smartphones. The US technology titans also run online shops for mobile apps, taking 30 percent commission on transactions in what has become a controversial toll given their dominance in the market. — AFP

### Australian wellness celeb fuels 'infodemic'

ne minute Australian "wellness" personality Pete Evans is posting a barbecued prawn recipe to 1.5 million Facebook followers, the next he's claiming the coronavirus pandemic is an elaborate global hoax. During this year of crisis, the ever-smiling, one-time television chef known as "Paleo Pete" has become a leading purveyor of conspiracy and pseudoscience Down Under.

The pandemic has seen a worldwide explosion of misinformation with anti-vaccination groups, the far right, libertarians, state-backed trolls and anarchists forging a loose coalition of the disgruntled. An unlikely mix of celebrities, wellness experts and social media influencers like Evans have become a powerful vector in that "infodemic". While government scientists give earnest daily briefings, Evans turns to social media to question lockdowns and rubbish the use of facemasks.

The content is often up-beat-appearing in a wetsuit with blue eyes beaming, riffing about the joys of being back surfing after injury. He signs off emails with the signature: "Cook with Love and Laughter!" But his most popular content is often recycled from US conspiracy theories. These posts prompt long threads that echo QAnon movement talking points, claiming a "plandemic" manufactured crisis by global elites to enforce lucrative mass vaccinations and control humanity.

A post of Anthony Fauci, who has led the US government's response to every epidemic since the 1980s, being questioned over a potential Covid-19 vaccine was a particular hit for Evans. The post attracted over half a million views and a blizzard of conspiratorial comments against vaccinations and traditional government rule. According to data from social media tracker CrowdTangle, Evans' reach has increased since the pandemic began, growing by up to 15,000 users a week, rather than the net loss he often used to see.

"People are searching for answers," said Mathew Marques, a lecturer in Social Psychology at La Trobe University. "You've got, I guess, charlatans and snake oil salesmen offering a cure." Evans denies trafficking in lies, and denounces what he calls "fear-based propaganda." "The pan-

demic is a hoax. It is as simple as that" he told AFP, claiming that wearing masks and social distancing "are in fact damaging our immune system." "The reason we have become the number one selling health and lifestyle author in this country is because what we share actually keeps people

#### 'Laid back' Aussie bloke

Academics have labelled the mash-up of New Age thinking with conspiracy theories as "conspirituality." "They all see themselves in some way as rebels, as a resistance," Professor Axel Bruns from the Digital Media Research Centre at the Queensland University of Technology told AFP. Those interested in healthy lifestyles and spirituality may have been primed for Covid-19 conspiracies-given existing distrust of western medicine and corporate interests

The charismatic "laid back, stereotypical Aussie bloke" appeal of Evans helped him weave a narrative which pits him against powerful establishment interests, said Marques. "These kind of big pharma conspiracy theories... these seem to be kind of interlinked with this rise of a wellness alternative." The spread of his beliefs can be seen online, and on the streets of virus-hit Australia's cities

"He's bringing to light, to the people in Australia and the people around the world, how corrupt the governments are," said Evans fan and naturopath Sheridan Lee at a recent anti-lockdown rally in Melbourne. "If it has to be a celebrity and influencer to bring this out, then so be it." Fellow Melbourne protester Dellacoma Rio said he regularly listened to Evans' livestreams and agreed with his promotion of anti-vaccination views. "I feel like if you follow the money you see who's getting paid to do things and where money is coming from," he said. For some of Evan's critics, the question of money is pertinent. He sells pricey "Thoughtful Food" products like "Dehydrated Beef Bone Broth with Wattleseed, Lemon Myrtle & Kakadu Plum" and has promoted an Aus\$15,000 "light machine"-which looks like a psychedelic countertop blender-to help against Covid-19. —AFP

### Iranian maestro Shajarian laid to rest beside epic poet

signer Mohammad-Reza Shajarian was buried on Saturday alongside the tomb of the ancient poet Abul Qasem Ferdowsi in the northeast of the country, state news agency IRNA reported. A national treasure in his homeland, the "Ostad" - master in Persian - died at the age of 80 on Thursday in Tehran after a long battle with cancer. His body was taken the day after to the holy city of Mashhad in the northeastern Khorasan Razavi province, where he was born.

He was laid to rest in Tus city, as willed, next to the tomb of the 10th-century poet Ferdowsi, who wrote the epic "Shahnameh," or the Book of Kings. According to IRNA, a crowd of "almost 150 people" consisting of his family, Iranian music icons and some of his fans were present at the burial, due to Covid-19 pandemic and the necessity of social

distancing. But hundreds of others gathered outside the tomb complex and mausoleum, singing the maestro's songs and watching the burial on large television screens, the agency said.

His son, Homayoun, thanked the participants for attending his father's ceremony "despite the difficulties." IRNA said the police and municipal security forces were there to "ensure the safety" of the burial. Shajarian maintained difficult relations with the authorities in Tehran throughout his career, first under the reign of the shah and then with the Islamic republic. Shajarian's death made the front pages of most Saturday newspapers, both conservative and reformist, and even the sports press, with some devoting exclusive front page reports to the maestro. — AFP

### Copenhagen to ban electric scooters from city centre

he city of Copenhagen wants to ban electric scooter rentals from the city centre, officials said, in what would be one most strict regulations against a symbol of the new, "sharing economy". "It will no longer be possible to rent or park an electric scooter in the majority of Copenhagen's most built up areas from January 1," the city's environmental and technical services

department said in an email to AFP. In practice, the measure will ban scooters from the historic city centre and adjacent neighborhoods, where it is already prohibited to park them. "Unfortunately, we have encountered major problems with these electric scooters... It is extremely difficult for seniors to get around when they are left laying about," municipal councilor Rune Dybvad said on TV2.

The measure needs to be approved by the municipal council but enjoys widespread support. Despite being a symbol of the "sharing economy", riders are not always generous or caring of others, zipping between pedestrians and leaving scooters poorly parked, thus prompting a number of cities to adopt strict regulations on their use. — AFP

### **EXHIBITION SHOWING** HONG KONG PROTEST **PHOTOS SHUTS**

n annual World Press Photo exhibition featuring images from Hong Kong's huge pro-democracy protests last year has been shut down in Macau without explanation, sparking speculation of political pressure from Beijing. The exhibition has been hosted by the Association Casa de Portugal Macao every year since 2008 and was scheduled to run from late September until October 18.

The exhibition showcased "the best visual journalism" of the past year and included prize-winning images of the Hong Kong protests captured by AFP photographer Nicolas Asfouri. The World Press Photo Foundation said in a statement that they "regret" the premature closure and "haven't been able to confirm the reasons" for it. "While the reasons for the closing remain unclear, we are following local media reports suggesting that it might be the result of external pressure on the content of the exhibition," said Laurens Korteweg, director of Exhibitions at the World Press Photo Foundation.

"Supporting the conditions for freedom of expression, freedom of enquiry, freedom of the press is a fundamental part of our work," he added. The exhibition featured photographs from the massive pro-democracy protests that brought Hong Kong to a standstill for months last year. Macau's English and Portuguese Speaking Press Association told local media that the city is "facing something serious and a worrying episode that signals an erosion of the space for freedom and expression", if the closure was due to political pressure.—AFP

## 'GHOST ISLAND' PHUKET HUNKERS DOWN IN TOURIST-FREE THAILAND

huket's go-go dancers sit playing on their phones in empty bars lining deserted streets as the Thai tourist island reels from the ravages of the pandemic with little sign of any recovery soon. Swimming pools are empty, chairs are stacked high in deserted restaurants and normally packed beaches are so quiet they are even seeing rare species of sea turtle arriving to nest. Last year, more than nine million tourists visited Phuket, the kingdom's second most popular destination after Bangkok. Today, nearly all the island's 3,000 hotels are closed and the main town of Patong has become a "ghost town", says local tycoon Preechawut Keesin, who owns five nightclubs and around 600 hotel rooms.

Thailand has so far remained relatively unscathed from the global outbreak with around 3,600 confirmed cases and just a few dozen deaths. But the kingdom's decision to concentrate on beating the virus has dealt a brutal blow to the economy, which is expected to contract 7-9 percent this year and leave millions unemployed. "My boss wants to help the staff keep their jobs, but I don't think we can survive after the end of the year," sighs Jantima Tongsrijern, manager of Pum Pui bar.

#### 'Worse than tsunami'

In normal times, 80 percent of the island's profits come from tourism, a sector that employs more than 300,000 people. Tens of thousands of those who have lost their jobs have returned to their home provinces. Life is hard for those sticking it out. Some have accepted huge pay cuts, while others have little choice but to join the long lines at the food distribution centers or scrape together an income where they can.

Bar owner Orathai Sidel says she used to make 100,000 baht (\$3,200) a month in high season. With her business a victim of the pandemic, she now sells desserts from a streetside cart, making just \$3 a day to try to cover her children's school fees. "We're just fighting to survive," says fellow street vendor Poi, fired in June from the restaurant where she used to work.

Phuket has been due to welcome

Thailand's first foreign tourists since April in a cautious experiment by the kingdom, but their arrival keeps being pushed back. ### No longer just crime: Nordic TV's new wave

or over a decade, Nordic crime series such as "The Bridge" and "Wallander" have captivated international TV audiences with stories of brooding detectives, elaborate murders and bleak Scandinavian landscapes. But now the success of so-called Nordic noir has spawned overseas interest in a new wave of TV productions from

Europe's far north, this time in genres

generated a demand for content that stands out and is still fairly cheap, and this is true for Nordic content," Aarhus University associate professor Pia Jensen told AFP. "Nordic series have for the most part quite high production values, which is key if you want to sell on the international market." ### Comic noir

Branded "Nordic comic noir" by the show's makers, the different feel partly stems from Cryptid's originator, the acclaimed French graphic novelist

One hotly anticipated release is Swedish supernatural series "Cryptid" about unexplained goings-on among a group of college kids in the fictional small town of Morkstad. Premiering in the Nordics this month, the series has generated "strong interest" abroad, according to its international distributor Beta Film, with sales so far to Germany's Joyn and France's Salto streaming services. The 10-part show has also made the official selection for the Cannes TV series festival in the south of France, which opens on Friday, where a record six of the 20 shortlisted series are Scandi productions.

"The rise of streaming platforms has

moving plot lines which often characterize Nordic shows. The format - and the colors - also set the series apart from other Swedish horror hits, like the 2008

vampire film "Let the Right One In". When AFP visited the "Cryptid" film set in October last year, a small, treelined lake close to the southwestern Finnish town of Turku had been turned into the setting of sinister happenings that begin to terrorize the town's youngsters. "There's something lurking underneath the surface but we never know what," director David Berron told AFP. The series will have "a lot more color and flavor" than the gritty, grey realism of Scandi crime successes like "The Bridge" and "The Killing", he added. "In

Sylvain Runberg, known for adapting Stieg Larsson's Millennium Trilogy into the graphic novel format. Runberg, who has divided his time between France and Sweden for the past decade, believes the success of Nordic drama is down to the contrast between the comfortable veneer of Scandinavian society and its dark undercurrents of crime, prejudice and pent-up aggression. "It's a society which everyone can recognize themselves in, not that different to what you experience in France, the US or Britain," Runberg told AFP. But the stories are "often very brutal and violent, which is not at all what you experience day-to-day in Scandinavia," he said. "It gives them a certain feel, a resonance.

### New things coming

International interest in non-crime Nordic series has stepped up in recent years. Norway's "Skam" (Shame), a 2015 web series that took an unflinching look at the lives of a group of high school students, broke viewership records in Scandinavia, before sparking remakes across Europe and the United States. "Ride Upon the Storm", from the creator of Danish political drama "Borgen", saw lead actor Lars Mikkelsen win an Emmy in 2018 for his portrayal of a priest at the centre of a family drama.

"Borgen", one of Nordic's first noncrime international successes, has itself now been recommissioned for a fourth series to air in 2022. And in the coming weeks, viewers in Norway will be the first to see the lavish World War II-era drama "Atlantic Crossing". The eight-hour show has been sold throughout Europe and a US deal is in final negotiations, distributor Beta Film said. The action is based on a true story and takes place largely in the US, where Norway's crown princess Martha, played by Sofia Helin of "The Bridge", flees after the Nazis invade her country

There, she strikes up an intimate friendship with president Franklin Roosevelt, played by "Twin Peaks" star Kyle MacLachlan. While new Nordic genres are growing in popularity though, it is not at the expense of Scandi crime. Netflix this year released "Young Wallander", a new take on novelist Henning Mankell's troubled detective. And last year, the BBC acquired Denmark's "The Investigation", based on the 2017 murder of journalist Kim Wall. "There will be new things coming out of the Nordics," Justus Riesenkampff from Beta Film told AFP. "But there will always be a lot of crime." — AFP

### Bereft of jet set, **New York luxury** hotels welcome last-minute locals

ohn Farrell and his wife booked a \$1,000 room in the morning and were in New York hours later for their one-night stay. The couple is part of a new local and last-minute clientele keeping the lights on at the city's most luxurious hotels now that the coronavirus has chased off the international jet set.

The yellow taxis and limousines that used to pile in front of swanky hotel The Pierre are gone. So are the crowds of foreigners mingling in the lobby. The Central Park hotel once hosted galas and welcomed celebrities-everyone from Audrey Hepburn and Elizabeth Taylor to, more recently, Lady Gaga. But with the coronavirus pandemic in full swing it is a shadow of its former self: Following six months of closure and the travel industry's near collapse due to Covid-19, it reopened in mid-September to smaller crowds and fewer members of the glitterati.

"The hotel, it's kind of like the streets; it's lacking the hustle and bustle and the presence of people," said Farrell, a 38year-old construction entrepreneur who drove two hours from the suburbs to get there. Usually this time of year the city's hotels are packed, with an average price of \$300 per night. The busy season starts with the US Open and UN General Assembly, said The Pierre's general manager Francois-Olivier Luiggi. Then comes "every convention you can possibly have, fundraising galas, the fall season for the weddings, and then its Thanksgiving all the way to Christmas and New Year's Eve," he said.—AFP

## STIFLED BY PANDEMIC, US MOVIE THEATERS SEND SOS

Tith theaters closed in New York and Los Angeles and would-be movie goers across the country choosing to stay in, US cinemas are sending out a desperate SOS-so far unanswered by Congress, local officials and studios. Regal Cinemas, the second largest chain in America, officially shut its doors on Thursday for lack of profitability, following an August reopening. It mentioned closures in New York as a major factor in its decision.

"The studios really need New York City in order to get decent growth out of a movie. And without New York they can't do that," said Joseph Masher, chief operating officer of Bow Tie Cinemas, a medium-sized chain. Governor Andrew Cuomo

will not budge on the matter, even though he has allowed partial indoor restaurant dining. He said in mid-September that the state was "not yet at a point where we can get back to normal life.


Andrew Elgart, who owns several theaters in the New York City area, disagrees. "I honestly think that people sitting in a movie theater for two hours with a mask on is safer than sitting in a restaurant for an hour with no mask," he said. Across the country nearly 400 exhibitors, which account for more than 33,000 out of 40,000 overall screens, have adopted a strict health protocol called CinemaSafe, wich includes rules on distancing, ventilation and masks. But Cuomo hasn't budged.

To date, no transmission has been linked to a movie theater in the United States or elsewhere. "Right now the infection rates are rising so the idea of opening up now with so many questions up in the air to me feels irresponsible," said Christian Grass, CEO of Metrograph, an independent movie theater in Manhattan. Julia, a 23-year-old who lives in New York, says she'll hold out for a vaccine: "There's so many things to watch streaming that I'd be able to wait," she said. For Michelle, a 42-year-old mother from Brooklyn, waiting was not on the agenda.—AFP

It was the first competitive match in the land of the world champion Springboks since mid March when the Sharks beat the Stormers in the five-nation version of Super Rugby. The multinational competition folded after the coronavirus wreaked havoc with world sport and New Zealand went it alone with a domestic Super Rugby, followed by Australia.

### South Korean Kim grabs Women's PGA lead on birdie binge

NEW YORK: South Korea's Kim Sei-young, seeking her first major title, birdied five of her last six holes to seize a one-stroke lead after Friday's second round of the Women's PGA Championship. The 27-year-old from Seoul fired a five-under par 65, including an event record-tying 29 for the front nine, to stand on four-under 136 after 36 holes at Aronimink in Newtown Square, Pennsylvania.

"Just strategizing to attack the greens. I'd try to land it a little short so I can have some release, but it really helped me out," Kim said. "I tried to focus on my game. Honestly I didn't look at the leaderboard. I was in a good momentum so I just wanted to ride on that." Seventh-ranked Kim has had six top-five major finishes without a victory, her closest calls being a runner-up finish at the 2015 Women's PGA and a share of second at the 2018 Evian Championship.

Asked if she felt ready for a major win, Kim said, "It's always my goal." Lurking one stroke off the pace were Spain's Carlota Ciganda, Sweden's Anna Nordqvist and Americans Danielle Kang and Jennifer Kupcho. Kim began on the back nine and made bogevs at 11 and 12 to stumble back, but she answered with a birdie at the par-5 16th, then opened and closed the front nine with birdies around a run of four consecutive birdies starting with a 30-foot putt at the par-4 fourth.

### Finishing strong

"That really helped me with momentum and finishing strong," Kim said. "The wind fluctuated on the back nine, so I struggled with my iron game, but when we entered the front nine, the wind slowed down and it was easier to attack with my irons. "I made a few three-putts, which I regret, but overall I had a good round."

Kupcho, who also fired a 65, was second to England's Mel Reid last week in Atlantic City. She returned to the irons that made her a college star but admits she didn't feel ready to push for her first LPGA title. "Going into last week, I was not prepared. I felt completely unprepared, and honestly, I felt the same way coming into this week," Kupcho said. "Not being prepared brings another challenge for me, and I think that's what helps me play well, just not feeling comfortable with the

Third-ranked Kang answered a bogey at the fourth with a birdie at the par-3 fifth, then followed a bogey at the par-3 eighth with a birdie at the par-4 12th and birdied the par-5 16th to match the leaders. "There are a lot of opportunities that I gave myself but I didn't capitalize on them," Kang said. "But I made some good up-and-downs and some good birdies. It's always good to shoot in the 60s." Ciganda, another back-nine starter, birdied the par-4 12th from 20 feet and tapped in to birdie the par-5 16th but stumbled back to the pack with a bogey at the par-4 fourth.

"The game felt good. I played very solid," she said. "I had a good three, four chances at the end that I didn't make, but I think I am where I want to be for the weekend and very happy with the result." Nordqvist followed birdies at the second and ninth holes with bogeys at the fifth and 10th, then surged late with birdies at the par-3 14th and 16 to join the lead group. World number two Nelly Korda of the United States withdrew after an opening 71 due to a back injury. South Korean Lee Mi-rim withdrew with an injury after nine holes Friday. —AFP

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# Algeria beat Nigeria, extend unbeaten run to 19 matches

### Morocco triumph 3-1 over a depleted Senegal

JOHANNESBURG: Algeria extended an unbeaten run to 19 matches with a 1-0 victory over Nigeria Friday in an international friendly between two of the top five ranked African countries. In another high-profile warm-up match behind closed doors ahead of 2021 Africa Cup of Nations qualifying next month, Morocco triumphed 3-1 over a depleted Senegal. Burkina Faso, Gambia, Kenya, Mali, Mauritania and Tunisia also won while 2021 Cup of Nations hosts Cameroon drew 0-0 against Japan.

Cup of Nations title-holders Algeria needed less than six minutes to score the goal in the Austrian town of Sankt Veit an der Glan that sank Nigeria in a rematch of the 2019 semi-final at the flagship African competition. Centre-back Ramy Bensebaini ventured forward for a corner and after heading the

ball downward, poked it into the net. Nigeria gave a debut to Frankfurt-born Kevin Akpoguma who, like Bensebaini, plays in the Bundesliga, and represented Germany at under-age level before switching his allegiance.

The defender is the latest of many Europe-born footballers to represent the African country where parents or grandparents come from. Algeria last lost in October 2018 away to Benin and now move to the Netherlands for a friendly against Mexico on Tuesday. Senegal, the top ranked African national team ahead of Tunisia, Nigeria, Algeria and Morocco, suffered a series of major withdrawals from the squad. Liverpool forward and 2019 African Footballer of the Year Sadio Mane tested positive for Covid-19 and injuries ruled out goalkeeper Edouard Mendy and defender Kalidou Koulibaly.

#### Challenging task

So a challenging task in Rabat for the Senegalese became that much harder and they trailed by three goals before Ismaila Sarr converted an 88th-minute penalty. Selim Amallah put the Moroccans ahead after 10 minutes and Youssef en Nesyri and Youssef el Arabi added to the scoresheet in the second half. On Tuesday, Morocco host a Democratic Republic of Congo team that will be smarting from a 3-0 drubbing by Burkina Faso in Moroccan city El Jadida while Senegal entertain Mauritania.

The Mauritanians will travel south to neighboring Senegal boosted by a 2-1 win over Sierra Leone in Nouakchott, where Hemeya Tanjy fired in the 79th-minute winner. Mali shrugged off losing a number of players to injuries and positive coronavirus tests to wallop Ghana 3-0 in the Turkish resort city of Antalya. Hamari Traore put the Malians ahead inside three minutes and El Bilal Toure and Amadou Haidara netted early and late in the second half.

Tunisia were another nation to triumph 3-0 with all the goals against Sudan in Rades near Tunis coming during the first half. France-based captain Wahbi Khazri was involved in all the goals, scored by Seifedine Khaoui, Ali Maaloul and Anis Ben Slimane. In other friendlies, the Gambia edged Congo 1-0 in Portugal through an Assan Ceesay goal and a brilliant run and fierce shot from Cliff Nyakeya helped Kenya beat Zambia 2-1 in Nairobi. The coronavirus sidelined African national teams from last November until late September when Sudan won two friendlies against Chad. —AFP

### Drug, sex scandals mar Australian rugby league

SYDNEY: Australia's National Rugby League was rocked by twin scandals yesterday, with experienced centre Michael Jennings failing a drugs test and the son of legend Wendell Sailor charged with aggravated sexual assault. Jennings, who has played for both Australia and Tonga, was provisionally suspended after returning a positive A-sample for Ligandrol and Ibutamoren, both prohibited by the World Anti-Doping Agency.

The NRL said the Parramatta Eels player was tested on September 21 with the results coming through on Friday. Reports said he was doorknocked by Sport Integrity Australia agents at his home early yesterday, and his mobile phone and computer were seized. "Mr Jennings is prohibited from participating in any WADA compliant sport, including rugby league, while the provisional suspension is in place," the NRL added in a

It ruled him out of yesterday's elimination final between the Eels and South Sydney. Under the sport's anti-doping policy, the 32-year-old, who is yet to comment publicly, has the option to have a B-sample analyzed. His club Parramatta said it was in contact with Jennings and "will continue to offer him and his family our full wellbeing support". Ibutamoren is a growth hormone while Ligandrol, an anabolic agent, helps build muscle. Australian relay world-record holder Shayna Jack also tested positive for Ligandrol ahead of last year's world swimming championships.

Meanwhile, police arrested St George Illawarra's Tristan Sailor, 22, at his home south of Sydney yesterday and charged him with aggravated sexual assault. LOS ANGELES: The NFL headed into week five of the 2020 season under a cloud of uncertainty as COVID-19 threatens to further disrupt a schedule already impacted by the first major outbreak of the disease. #### Qatar to host East Zone games

**KUALA LUMPUR:** Qatar will host East Zone matches for Asia's Champions League after the West Zone games were successfully staged in the Gulf state following a long coronavirus hiatus, officials said Friday. The East Zone teams, which come from countries including Japan, China and Australia, will play their remaining matches in Doha from November 18 to December 13, the Asian Football Confederation (AFC) said. The venue for the single-leg final on December 19 is yet to be confirmed, however. The AFC has had to repeatedly change its calendar due to the virus. East-zone groups G and H had been scheduled to be played in Malaysia, which is currently battling a surge in virus cases. Asia's premier club tournament resumed last month in a bio-secure bubble in Qatar, which is also the host of the next World Cup in 2022. —AFP

#### DC United dumps Olsen

WASHINGTON: Major League Soccer doormat DC United relieved Ben Olsen of head coaching duties after 10 years in the post, naming assistant coach Chad Ashton as an interim manager. The club needs a new face and this is the right time for the club and also for me personally to move in a different direction." Olsen and the club he has spent two decades with are in talks to find him another role within the organization. "Ben has been a fabric of the DC United organization for more than two decades, including his role as head coach for the last 10 years, and we are forever grateful for his contributions and leadership," said United chief executive officer Jason Levien. —AFP

### Rapids 4th match delayed

NEW YORK: A fourth Major League Soccer match involving the Colorado Rapids was postponed on Friday due to a Covid-19 outbreak that has closed the club's training facility for more than two weeks. The Rapids had their scheduled Saturday home game against the Los Angeles Galaxy postponed after one new coronavirus case in the Rapids player pool. The league, in consultation with state health officials and infectious disease experts, postponed the match to an undetermined date. Also postponed have been a planned Wednesday match against Los Angeles FC, a match last Sunday at Portland and a September 23 home match against Kansas City that was postponed to October 21. The Rapids, who are next set to visit Seattle on Wednesday, closed their training facility on September 24 and multiple players and staffers have tested positive since then, sending much of the organization into self-isolation. —AFP

### Brazil score 5 against Bolivia

SAO PAULO: Roberto Firmino scored twice and Marquinhos and Philippe Coutinho also got on the scoresheet as Brazil hammered Bolivia 5-0 in their opening World Cup qualifier in Sao Paulo on Friday. Marquinhos put the home side 1-0 up with a header after 16 minutes before Firmino scored after 18 and 49 minutes, both times by getting on the end of low crosses into the penalty box. The fourth came after 66 minutes, when a glancing touch from Rodrygo deflected off defender Jose Maria Carrasco's shoulder and Philippe Coutinho completed the rout with a header seven minutes later. The top four teams in the 10-team South American group qualify directly for Qatar 2022 and the fifth-placed side go into an inter-regional playoff. Brazil now travel to Lima to face Peru on Tuesday, while Bolivia are at home the same day to Argentina, who opened their campaign with a 1-0 win over Ecuador on Thursday. —Reuters

### Colombia overrun Venezuela

BARRANQUILLA: Colombia scored three goals in a superb first half to beat Venezuela 3-0 and get their 2022 World Cup qualifying campaign off to an impressive start at home in Barranquilla. Venezuela are the only side in South America never to have reached the World Cup finals and they showed why in a disastrous opening 45 minutes at a fan-free stadium on Colombia's coast. Duvan Zapata put the home side 1-0 up after 16 minutes when he slid in and finished off a delicious low cross from Juan Cuadrado. His Atalanta teammate Luis Muriel made it two nine minutes later when he scored with a first-time shot from 10 meters out. Muriel then got Colombia's third just seconds before the half time whistle, when he completed a rapid counterattack. Colombia took their foot off the pedal in the second-half minutes but Venezuela could make no impact and neither side could add to the scoreline in a calmer second 45 minutes.—Reuters

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## Heat stave off elimination

### Butler's Herculean NBA effort lifts Heat over Lakers

ORLANDO: Jimmy Butler's triple-double propelled Miami to a 111-108 victory over the Los Angeles Lakers on Friday that kept the Heat alive in the NBA Finals. Butler scored 35 points with 12 rebounds and 11 assists and the Heat withstood a 40-point performance from Lakers superstar LeBron James to deny Los Angeles a title-clinching win in the NBA's quarantine bubble at Orlando. The Lakers still lead the best-of-seven series three games to two and can secure the title with a game-six victory on Sunday.

Game seven, if needed, will be on Tuesday. "We've got two more to get," said Butler, who played more than 47 minutes and delivered a stunning display of will and skill. "We just played hard, and just stayed with it," said Butler, who has insisted the Heat can become just the second NBA team to rally from a 3-1 deficit to win the championship series. The only other team to do it was the James-led Cleveland Cavaliers against Golden State in 2016.

"We got where we wanted to on offense, shared the ball like we always do," Butler said. "This is a game of runs-I think we withstood theirs." Butler drained two free throws with 16.8 seconds left to put Miami up by one. James, stymied under the basket, found Danny Green for a wide-open three-pointer with 7.1 seconds remaining but Green missed and Tyler Herro added two more free throws to seal it. 'We got a hell of a look to win the game, to win the series," James said. "Didn't go down."

On a night that saw the Heat lead much of the way, Kentavious Caldwell-Pope's three-pointer with 6:18 remaining put the Lakers up 97-96 - their first lead since the first quarter. But the Heat dug in, Duncan Robinson's three-pointer putting Miami back up, 101-99 with 3:16 remaining, and it was a heavyweight slugfest the rest of the way, the lead changing hands seven more times.

"It was all about getting stops, getting what we wanted on offense," Butler said. "I still don't think we rebounded the ball the way we were supposed to close out the game. "This one, it was a little bit of luck that Danny Green missed that one at the top of the key." Duncan Robinson added 26 points for Miami. Kendrick Nunn had 14, Bam Adebayo 13, Herro 12 and Jae Crowder 11.

### Lakers 'got to be better'

James added 13 rebounds and seven assists for the Lakers. Anthony Davis added 28 points and Caldwell-Pope scored 16. The frantic finish was foreshadowed by a first quarter that saw eight lead changes. The tension was palpable when Los Angeles center Dwight Howard tangled with Butler and the two had to be separated less than five minutes into the contest, each receiving a technical foul. The Lakers got an early injury scare when Davis, battling Andre Iguodala for a rebound late in the first quarter, took an awkward hop and limped off

The Lakers, trailing 25-24 through one quarter, said Davis had aggravated a right heel contusion. He stayed on the sideline, testing the injury as the game continued and returning in the second quarter. The Heat twice pushed their lead to 11 points in the second period, Nunn's putback layup making it 50-39 with 3:41 left in the first half.

Butler poured in 22 points in the first half on seven-of-10 shooting on the way to his second triple-double of the series. He's just the sixth player in NBA Finals history to have multiple triple-doubles in the title series, and just the second, along with James, to have multiple 30-point triple-doubles in the same Finals. James made sure the Lakers kept it close with 21 first-half points while Davis had 13 before the break. But the Lakers' bid for a record-equaling 17th NBA title-their first since 2010 - was at least temporarily denied. "We've just got to be better in game six and close the series," James said. — AFP

### Sordo wins four stages to lead the Rally of Sardinia

ALGHERO: Spaniard Dani Sordo won the last three stages and four overall to build a lead of more than 17 seconds in the Rally of Sardinia on Friday. The Hyundai driver has not scored a point in the World Rally Championship this season but won in Sardinia last year. He took the second stage and then grabbed the lead when he was fastest by 9.4sec on the fourth stage, the last one on the morning loop. He then won the two afternoon stages. "I am really happy to come back like this," Sordo said. "We pushed hard and made time with good tyre choices." "We need to stay like this tomorrow, it will not be easy." Finland's Teemu Suninen, who won the opening stage in his M-Sport Ford, lies second.

Sordo's Belgian team-mate Thierry Neuville, who stalled twice during the day, was second on the sixth and final stage of the day to take third from Frenchman Sebastien Ogier. In the driver championship, Ogier is second to Toyota team-mate Elfyn Evans. As leader, the Welshman had to open the road on Friday. --- AFP

### Chapter 56 as Djokovic and Nadal eye history

PARIS: Novak Djokovic and Rafael Nadal meet for the 56th time today in a Roland Garros final blockbuster with history on the line for both men. World number one Djokovic is chasing an 18th Grand Slam title and a second French Open which would make him the first man in half a century to win all four Slams twice. Defending champion Nadal, the world number two, can win a 13th Roland Garros and 20th major which would tie the all-time men's record held by Roger Federer. Victory today would also give the 34year-old Spaniard a 100th match win in Paris against just two defeats in 15 years.

One of those losses came against Djokovic in the 2015 quarter-finals, the last time the pair clashed on the crushed red brick surface of Court Philippe Chatrier. The Serb has won 37 matches in 2020 with his one defeat self-inflicted via his infamous default at the US Open. Stefanos Tsitsipas, who pushed Djokovic to five sets in a breathless semi-final, sees few flaws in the top seed's game. "He has reached almost perfection," said the Greek. The 22-year-old matched Djokovic when it came to all-out assault on Friday

night but at the crunch moments, the Serbian wall stood firm as the world number one saved 11 of 15 break points he faced.

Djokovic, 33, has a 29-26 edge over Nadal in their long-running rivalry. He has won 14 of their last 18 meetings and the last three at the Slams. However, the pair's most recent three matches on clay have all gone Nadal's way with Djokovic's last victory on the dirt coming in the Rome quarter-finals four years ago. At the French Open, Nadal has a 6-1 advantage, including wins in the 2012 and 2014 finals.

### 'Not my biggest match'

"This is the house of Rafa," said Djokovic, describing facing the Spaniard on clay as the sport's "biggest challenge". However, he insists that he has played far more significant finals and pointed to his first win over Nadal at a Slam at Wimbledon in 2011. "I don't think this is the biggest match that I have ever played in my life," he said. "In terms of importance, probably the first Wimbledon final that I actually played against him.

Wimbledon was always the one that I wanted to win as a kid and dreamed of winning. That's probably the one that stands out." Djokovic also put his 2016 Paris final win over Andy Murray, which allowed him to celebrate a career Grand Slam, above the latest installment of his Nadal rivalry. "Every French Open final that I played was the match of my life before I actually won it." Despite his high praise for his opponent, Djokovic sees an advantage for him with the tournament being played in the autumn than its traditional spring and early summer slot. — AFP
