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Kuwait allows emergency use of Oxford-AstraZeneca vaccine

EU also authorizes jab amid row with pharmaceutical giant

Departure/arrival fees of KD 3/KD 2 from June 1

KUWAIT: State Minister for Housing Affairs and State Minister for Services Affairs Abdullah Marafi issued a ministerial decision to charge an airport service fee of KD 3 on departure and KD 2 on arrival, which will be added to the airline ticket price of each passenger. The decision will be effective June 1, 2021.

According to Directorate General for Civil Aviation (DGCA) Spokesman Saad Al-Otaibi, the charges are based on an earlier decision. "These fees were approved a long time ago and are basically a reduction of the old KD 8 charges (KD 4 on departure and KD 4 on arrival). In fact, KD 5 is one of the lowest airport fees in the world. The decision will be effective from June 1 and applies on all passengers," Otaibi told Kuwait Times yesterday.

KUWAIT: The Kuwaiti health ministry has authorized the emergency use of Oxford-AstraZeneca vaccine to protect people from the novel coronavirus. The authorization was issued after a detailed review of all relevant scientific data and reports and after conducting a comprehensive evaluation of the vaccine's safety, efficacy and quality, assistant undersecretary for drug and food control Dr Abdullah Al-Bader said in a press statement on Friday.

He added that a ministry technical committee also reviewed the results of the vaccine's clinical trials, particularly those related to the effectiveness and safety aspects of the vaccine. Bader emphasized that the ministry will closely monitor the vaccine's safety after using it and will take all necessary measures to ensure safety of people. The official also revealed that Kuwait will receive the first batch of the Oxford-AstraZeneca vaccine within days to help accelerate its vaccination campaign.

The Oxford-AstraZeneca vaccine, manufactured by the Serum Institute of India under a license from AstraZeneca, was approved for emergency use by the European Medicines Agency and Britain's Medicines and Healthcare products Regulatory Agency, Bader noted. He added the Serum Institute

of India is a vaccine manufacturer accredited by the World Health Organization (WHO) and the Gulf Cooperation Council (GCC).

European Commission chief Ursula von der Leyen announced Friday that the AstraZeneca-Oxford University coronavirus vaccine has been authorized for the EU market, hours after the bloc's drug regulator recommended its approval. It is the third vaccine approved for use in the 27-nation EU, after rival shots produced by Pfizer-BioNTech and Moderna.

"I expect the company to deliver the 400 million doses as agreed," von der Leyen tweeted, as a row intensified between Brussels and AstraZeneca. "We will keep on doing all we can to secure vaccines for Europeans, our neighbors & partners worldwide." The British-Swedish company has admitted it will only be able to deliver a fraction of the doses promised to the EU in the short-term due to production problems.

That has come as a huge blow to Europe's already struggling rollout effort, while setting the EU on a collision course with former member Britain as they jostle for AstraZeneca's limited supplies. The approval of AstraZeneca's vaccine also comes in the middle of a controversy over the jab

within the EU itself.

Germany's vaccine commission said Thursday that the vaccine should not be used on over-65s due to insufficient evidence that it works. Even after the European Medicines Agency (EMA) recommended the AstraZeneca's shot be approved for all ages on Friday, the German panel maintained its stance. — Agencies

Iran hangs ethnic Baluch

TEHRAN: Iran hanged a man for murder, abduction and "terrorist" links yesterday, the judiciary's website said, despite international calls for the execution of the ethnic Baluch to be halted. Javid Dehghan Khalad was put to death early in the morning in the restive southeastern province of Sistan-Baluchistan, Mizan Online reported. It comes a day after the United Nations had appealed to Iran not to go ahead with the execution of the 31-year-old. — AFP

Corpse hidden for 10 years

TOKYO: A Japanese woman who said she hid her mother's corpse in a freezer in her apartment for a decade told police she feared eviction if the death was discovered. Police said Yumi Yoshino, 48, was held "on suspicion of abandoning and hiding a female body" found Wednesday in a freezer in a Tokyo apartment. Yoshino said after finding her mother dead 10 years ago, she hid the body because she "didn't want to move out" of the home they shared. — AFP



Fake Stallone passport used as ad

SOFIA: A Bulgarian criminal gang used a fake passport in the name of the Hollywood actor Sylvester Stallone to advertise its counterfeiting services to potential clients, prosecutors said Friday. Four gang members were charged for counterfeiting-related crimes with two other men charged on other offences, prosecutors said in a statement. The passport in Stallone's name was found during a search of one of the gang-members' homes in the central city of Plovdiv. — AFP

UAE to offer citizenship to select expats

DUBAI: The UAE announced yesterday it is opening a path to citizenship for select foreigners, in a rare move for the Gulf where the status and its welfare benefits are jealously guarded. Dubai ruler and United Arab Emirates (UAE) Prime Minister Sheikh Mohammed bin Rashed Al-Maktoum said "investors, specialized talents and professionals including scientists, doctors, engineers, artists, authors and their families" would be eligible for naturalization under the new amendment.

"The UAE cabinet, local amiri courts and executive councils will nominate those eligible for the citizenship under clear criteria set for each category," Sheikh Mohammed said. "The law allows receivers of the UAE passport to keep their existing citizenship."

COVID infection may reduce fertility in men

PARIS: COVID-19 may damage sperm quality and reduce fertility in men, according to a new study based on experimental evidence. The viral disease - which has swept the globe, claiming nearly 2.2 million lives - can cause increased sperm cell death, inflammation and so-called oxidative stress, researchers reported Friday in the journal Reproduction. "These findings provide the first direct experimental evidence that the male reproductive system could be targeted and damaged by COVID-19," the authors concluded.

Experts commenting on the research, however, said the capacity of the virus to compromise fertility in men remains unproven. COVID-19 causes respiratory illness, especially in older people and those with underlying medical problems. The world has seen more than 100 million confirmed cases since the disease emerged in central China at the end of 2019. Transmitted through respiratory droplets, the disease attacks the lungs, kidneys, intestines and heart. It can also infect male reproductive organs,

impairing sperm cell development and disrupting reproductive hormones, earlier studies have shown. The same receptors the virus uses to access lung tissue are also found in the testicles. But the effects of the virus on the ability of men to reproduce remained unclear.

Morocco ex-con YouTubers in the spotlight

RABAT: Moroccan former prisoners have moved out of their jail cells into the social media spotlight by sharing their thug life experiences on YouTube, making them minor celebrities. "You had to be a real ace to sell drugs in prison like I did," boasts Mohamed Moustadraf, 48, one of a host of ex-cons turned online storytellers. A former drug trafficker with tattooed arms, a ponytail, a tracksuit and a big gold watch, he has served a total of 23 years behind bars.

He is one of around 20 ex-con YouTubers now active in the North African country, many of them notching up millions of views. They regale their audiences with tales of vicious rivalries between inmates and vendettas against wardens or let off steam about mistreatment and overcrowding, in chastening warnings against the perils of a life of crime

"In prison and outside, I was earning a lot of money," said Moustadraf, a father of three who also goes by the name of Slaoui. "But I lacked one thing: My freedom. Today, I try to take advantage of it and

OHCHR's cooperation reflects our int'l obligations: Kuwaiti diplomat

NEW YORK: Kuwait's Permanent Representative to the United Nations Ambassador Mansour Al-Otaibi on Friday presented a letter to UN Security Council president on identifying bodies of 13 Kuwaiti and third country nationals who were detained during the Iraqi occupation of Kuwait in 1990. The 13 bodies had been found in two burial sites in Iraq and were transferred to Kuwait for examination, according to the letter, registered as an official UNSC document.

Kuwait is still conducting examinations on several other bodies-which were received from Iraq-and will compare the results with the DNA database of its prisoners of war (POWs) and missing people, Ambassador Otaibi noted in the letter. He reaffirmed Kuwait's commitment to returning to Iraq all bodies whose DNA results do not match with any of the POWs. Otaibi also underlined that keenness on following up transparent and constructive steps in this regard.

He renewed Kuwait's invitation to Iraq to get first-hand experience about its efforts and measures to examine the bodies received from Iraq in August

The Kuwaiti envoy thanked the Iraqi, US, British and French governments, members of all relevant committees, the

International Committee of the Red Cross (ICRC) and the United Nations Assistance Mission for Iraq (UNAMI) for their efforts that contributed to identifying the fate of those missing persons and prisoners amid the COVID-19 pandemic. It also thanked UN Security Council members for support to this humanitarian file and keenness on following up the full implementation of the UNSC resolution 2107 to help identify the fate of the remaining 346 POWs and missing people.

Training workshop

Separately, Kuwaiti Assistant Foreign Minister for Human Rights Affairs and Minister Plenipotentiary Talal Al-Mutairi said cooperation between Kuwait and the UN Human Rights Council (OHCHR) reflects keenness to keep pace with international recommendations. Mutairi made this statement after the conclusion of the virtual training workshop entitled "Interaction with International Human Rights or members of the Permanent Committee for the Preparation of International Reports Recommendations Related to Human Rights," which was held recently. This program is intended for members of the permanent national committee to prepare reports and follow up on international recommendations related to human rights headed by the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, he added.

The training program comes as a result of an agreement with the OHCHR in Geneva to hold annual capacity building activities for the benefit of government agencies in Kuwait, he noted. He pointed out that the Permanent National Committee to prepare reports and follow up on international recommendations related to human rights and with full support of Minister of Foreign Affairs Sheikh Dr Ahmed Nasser Al-Mohammad Al-Sabah and Deputy Minister of Foreign Affairs Khaled Al-Jarallah. — KUNA

for biological markers that might indicate a negative impact on fertility. Analysis done at 10-day intervals for 60 days in 84 men with COVID-19 was compared to data for 105 healthy men. In the COVID-19 patients, sperm cells showed a significant increase in markers of inflammation and oxidative stress, a chemical imbalance that can damage DNA and proteins in the body.

These effects on sperm cells are associated with lower sperm quality and reduced fertility potential," said Maleki in a statement. "Although these effects tended to improve over time, they remained significantly and abnormally higher in the COVID-19 patients." The more severe the disease, the bigger the changes, he added. The male reproductive system "should be considered a vulnerable route of jects and tourist attractions of the larger emirates.

The wealthy oil states of the Gulf have long guaranteed their citizens a high standard of living through reserved jobs and a cradle to grave welfare system. To protect it, they have seldom allowed naturalizations. It was unclear if new passport holders would benefit from the public welfare system. Last year, the government extended its "golden" visa system - which grants 10-year residency in the Gulf state - to certain professionals, specialized degree-holders and others. — Agencies

COVID-19 infection and declared a high-risk organ by the World Health Organization," Maleki said.

Experts not involved in the study welcomed the research, but cautioned that more was needed before drawing hard and fast conclusions. "Men should not be unduly alarmed," noted Alison Campbell, director of embryology of the CARE Fertility Group in Britain. There is currently no definitive evidence of longlasting damage caused by COVID-19, to sperm or male reproductive potential," she told the Londonoased Science Media Centre.

The results could have been skewed, she added, by the fact that men recovering from COVID were treated with corticosteroids and antiviral therapies, while the control group was not. Allan Pacey, a specialist in male reproductive medicine at the University of Sheffield, raised a "strong note of caution" on how the data was interpreted.

Some of the indicators of decreased sperm quality could be due to factors besides COVID-19, he said, noting that more men in the COVID-19 group were overweight. The simple fact that only one group was very sick - no matter the cause - also needed to be taken into account, he added. — AFP

share my experience with others, especially young people." Like the other jailbird influencers, he insists his aim is not to glorify his criminal record. Slaoui says he was encouraged to go on YouTube by a group of rapper friends, including the musician Gnawi who was sentenced to a year in jail for insulting a policeman live on Instagram.

Another former prisoner, Ilyas Korrari, who is also a hit on YouTube, said opening up to his thousands of subscribers is "like therapy", and a form of catharsis for his past. "Before people would avoid me, look at me funny, or worse, they were afraid of me," he said. "I had so much hatred and vengeance in me because society is ruthless with people who make mistakes, but the camera has cured me," said Korrari, also a former drug dealer, sporting a tight T-shirt, slicked-back hair and a neatly trimmed beard.

Korrari, who has spent 17 of his 38 years in jail, said he decided to "radically change" his life on his last release in 2018. He has since posted videos of his time behind bars, and his YouTube channel today has more than 240,000 subscribers and has attracted over 21 million views. Last year, he set up a small audiovisual production company in Kenitra, north of the capital Rabat, although he insists the earnings from his success have been "modest".

The jail-themed channels have built a minor cult following. "I was first interested in these ex-convicts because they have created a buzz, their videos get millions of views, it's very compelling!" said one fan, a Casablanca man in his 30s. "They tell their stories and denounce injustices in the prison environment. The one thing that disturbs me is this heroic posture, or even the trivialisation of crime, that some of them adopt."

Moustadraf said he started up his channel in 2019 to "change the way people look" at ex-cons. "Just because we've been in prison doesn't mean we have

no faith or law." He said he "turned the page on illegality" in 2016, and that his appearances since have scored 13 million views.

Moustadraf often speaks of overcrowding in prisons and corrupt guards and raises the alarm on rights violations and "suspicious" deaths in custody. To survive, he said, waving his heavily inked arms, "you have to climb up the ranks, be patient, endure torture and injustice". A prison authority spokeswoman contacted by AFP warned against "those YouTube channels... (and) the lies they tell". She stressed that all complaints from prisoners' families are examined 'with great attention".

But former inmates' accounts tally with official reports of overcrowding and frequent ill-treatment in Moroccan jails. With a nationwide prison population of more than 86,000 in 2019, occupancy exceeds 250 percent of official capacity in some detention centers, says the non-governmental watchdog Observatory of Prisons.

Mohamed Bentazout, a murder convict released in 2020 after 20 years in jail, said "the accounts of former detainees fill the void left by official media". The 57-year-old former boxer still insists he is innocent and working to have his case reviewed, using YouTube clips to reach a "large audience in Morocco and around the world". To denounce the "glaring injustice" he says he suffered, he now lives in a tiny cell he has built on the terrace of his family

Kuwait lists 514 new COVID cases, one death

658 cases, no deaths on Friday; total recoveries 157,404

KUWAIT: Kuwait yesterday reported 514 COVID-19 positive cases from 8,336 swab tests, compared to 658 from 11,338 tests on Friday, whereas one coronavirus-related death was reported in the past two days, Ministry of Health figures have shown. As such, total cases have climbed to 164,622 while deaths reached 959 as of yesterday. Meanwhile, the total number of recoveries reached 157,404 as the ministry reported 501 new recoveries vesterday and 516 on Friday. The number of people hospitalized with the virus stood vesterday at 6,259, down from 6,247 a day before, with 52 of them in intensive care units compared to 49 on Friday, according to ministry spokesman Dr Abdullah Al-Sanad. The total number of swab tests conducted in Kuwait reached 1,520,587. Dr Sanad urged the public to abide by health precautions, mainly social distancing to help limit the spread of the virus.

GCC cooperation

In other news, Kuwait's Minister of Health Dr Sheikh Basel Al-Sabah took part in an extraordinary virtual meeting of the GCC Health Ministers' Committee to study health resolutions of the 41st summit of the GCC Supreme Council. The minister lauded the GCC Secretariat's efforts led by Secretary General Nayef Al-Hajraf to prove the meeting successful, the Ministry of Health said in a press statement. Sheikh Basel expressed his full



contentment about coordination and cooperation among health sectors of the GCC states, particularly in sharing the best-practiced policies and programs. He also extolled sincere and distinguished efforts by health workers, military, security and civil defense personnel and volunteers to combat the novel coronavirus.

The conferees mulled resolutions of the Supreme Council, the Al-Ula statement and the final communique of the recently-held Sheikh Sabah Al-Ahmad and Sultan Qaboos's GCC Summit, it noted. They also discussed the framework of the GCC public health emergency, preparedness and response plan. They considered boosting mutual coordination and emergency early warning systems, according to the statement.

Following the meeting, the ministers stressed the importance of unifying and coordinating stances regarding international and regional health cooperation. The meeting touched upon mechanism of implementing the Supreme Council's resolutions, a news conference said after the meeting. The resolutions issued on health field included approving the GCC public health plan to respond to emergencies, the emergency early warning system and the establishment of the Gulf center for disease prevention and control, it pointed out. — KUNA

KUWAIT: A Kuwaiti young man sustained a stab wound during a fight with two others in a Sharq cafe yesterday. The other two also sustained wounds on various parts of their bodies, Al-Anbaa Arabic daily reported. The three were taken to hospital for treatment, and a case was filed at the area's police station for investigations.

Environmental violations

KUWAIT: The Environment Public Authority detected a number of environmental violations during a crackdown at the Sabah Al-Ahmad Sea City on Friday. The violations include dumping sewage water into the gulf, setting up piers without licenses and throwing garbage in non-designated areas, EPA said.



Oil exports to Japan down

TOKYO: Kuwait's crude oil exports to Japan in December fell 16.5 percent from a year earlier to 5.92 million barrels, or 191,000 barrels per day (bpd), for the ninth consecutive monthly drop, government data showed Friday. As Japan's fourth-biggest oil provider, Kuwait supplied 7.3 percent of the Asian nation's total crude imports, the Japanese Natural Resources and Energy Agency said in a preliminary report. For the whole of 2020, Kuwait's crude oil exports to Japan stood at 227,000 bpd, down 10.0 percent from the previous year, and took up 9.2 percent of total Japanese crude imports.


Oil price up



EU backtracks on jab threat in UK row

WHO warns against 'vaccine nationalism'. Macron questions vaccine efficacy

BRUSSELS: The European Union backtracked on a threat to restrict exports of coronavirus shots to Northern Ireland in its growing row with Britain, as the WHO warned against "vaccine nationalism". Outbreaks are raging around the globe with COVID-19 deaths nearing 2.2 million, and while wealthy countries fight over limited vaccine supplies, there are fears the less privileged will not get access for a long time. British-Swedish firm AstraZeneca has said it can only deliver a fraction of its vaccine doses promised to the EU and Britain because of production problems, but both sides are demanding their pledges are met.

The EU threatened to restrict vaccine exports to Northern Ireland by overriding part of the Brexit deal with Britain that allowed the free flow of goods over the Irish border, but backed down after British Prime Minister Boris Johnson voiced "grave concerns". The European Commission will "ensure that the Ireland/Northern Ireland Protocol is unaffected", the EU commissioner said in a statement late Friday.

That came after the EU released a redacted version of its contract with comes as more troubling data emerges AstraZeneca, while announcing a mechanism that could allow it to deny the export of vaccines made on European soil.

The AstraZeneca vaccine on Friday became the third to get EU approval

after Pfizer/BioNTech and Moderna, but it came under the shadow of the bitter diplomatic row. "I expect the company (AstraZeneca) to deliver the 400 million doses as agreed," tweeted European Commission chief Ursula von der Leyen, as she announced the authorization. The supply issue is a huge blow to Europe's already stumbling vaccine rollout.

'Vaccine nationalism'

The EU-Britain tussle has highlighted the impact of shortages on ambitious mass vaccination programs, even on wealthy nations, and fears are growing that the developed world is hogging doses, leaving poorer nations behind. World Health Organization chief Tedros Adhanom Ghebrevesus warned Friday against "vaccine nationalism", saying there was a "real danger that the very tools that could help to end the pandemic-vaccines-may exacerbate" global inequality. Parts of Africa and Asia have only just started securing and rolling out

The global scramble for shots on new variants of the coronavirus, which is known to have infected more than 101 million people worldwide. Variants first detected in Britain, Brazil and South Africa are believed to be more contagious.

Scientists are concerned that the South African variant may elude some vaccines, a potential stumbling block in the global effort to defeat Covid-19 through mass inoculation. New data on Thursday and Friday showed average effectiveness of 89 and 66 percent for shots from Novavax and Johnson & Johnson. But while Novavax's jab was highly effective against the British variant, both were less effective against the South African strain.

Pfizer and Moderna have said their vaccines are effective against the variants

With vaccine rollouts still in their early stages, movement restrictions remain among the few options for governments to try to stop the spread of COVID-19. Surges have overwhelmed healthcare systems even in rich countries such as Britain and the United States, while Mozambique President Filipe Nyusi warned that hospitals across southern Africa were "rapidly reaching the limit of

their capacities". Citing concerns over the new strains, Germany on Friday said it would ban travel from countries where the variants are prevalent, starting this weekend, while Canada announced hotel quarantine for all new arrivals. France has announced the closure of its borders to all non-EU travellers except for essential travel.

Macron

French President Emmanuel Macron said on Friday that AstraZeneca's coronavirus vaccine appeared not to be effective for people over 65 years of age. Speaking to reporters only hours before the European Medicines Agency (EMA) recommended the vaccine for adults of all ages, Macron also questioned Britain's decision to delay the second dose of COVID vaccines to inoculate more people.

Macron said there was "very little information" available for the vaccine developed by the British-Swedish company and Oxford University. "Today we think that it is quasi-ineffective for people over 65," he told the reporters, his office confirmed to AFP.

'What I can tell you officially today is that the early results we have are not encouraging for 60 to 65-year-old people concerning AstraZeneca," he said. Macron said he was awaiting the EMA's verdict-which came later Friday-and also that of France's own health authority "because they have the numbers".

The French expert decision on the vaccine is expected at the start of next week, according to sources close to the health authority. "I don't have any data, and I don't have a scientific team of my own to look at the numbers," Macron acknowledged. —AFP

Biden taps veteran envoy to talk to Iran, defying hawks

WAASHINGTON: The new US administration has named Rob Malley, an architect of the 2015 nuclear deal with Iran, as its special envoy to resume talks with Tehran, defying pressure from hawks who accuse him of being too conciliatory toward the Islamic republic. Secretary of State Antony Blinken "is building a dedicated team, drawing from clear-eyed experts with a diversity of views," State Department spokesman Ned Price said. "Leading that team as our special envoy for Iran will be Rob Malley, who brings to the position a track record of success negotiating constraints on Iran's nuclear program," he said. Malley, a childhood friend of Blinken, has been serving as head of the International Crisis Group, an independent non-governmental organization focused on conflict resolution. Before that, he was one of the chief negotiators on the 2015 nuclear deal between Iran and world powers, under which Tehran was promised economic relief for major curbs in its contested nuclear program. The deal was reached under Barack Obama, when President Joe Biden was his number two.

But in 2018, Donald Trump unilaterally withdrew the United States from the accord, saying it should have also covered Iran's "destabilizing" activities in the Middle East, and slapped tough sanctions on Tehran. This week, Blinken confirmed the new US administration's intention to rejoin the accord-but only once Tehran returns to compliance.—AFP


Explosion outside Israeli embassy in New Delhi

NEW DELHI: A small bomb exploded outside the Israeli embassy in New Delhi on Friday as it marked the anniversary of setting up diplomatic relations with India. No injuries were reported but an Israeli official told AFP the incident was being treated as terrorism. The windows on three nearby cars were blown out by what police called "a very low intensity improvised device". "Initial impressions suggest a mischievous attempt to create a sensation," a police statement added. However an Israeli official in Jerusalem, speaking on condition of anonymity, told AFP: "We consider this as a terror attack."

With the Indian capital already on heightened alert because of farmers' protests, the district around the embassy was sealed off and flooded with police, paramilitaries, bomb disposal experts and anti-terrorism specialists. The embassy is on a tree-lined avenue opposite a French cultural institute with other embassies and international schools nearby. All stepped up security.

WASHINGTON: Donald Trump met with US House Minority Leader Kevin McCarthy in Florida Thursday amid a tug of war over the Republican Party's future, with congressional leadership appearing eager to present a united front with the

Winning back the House of Representatives from Democrats in 2022 was the primary topic of the meeting at Trump's Mar-a-Lago club in Palm Beach, according to a readout provided by Save America, a political action committee linked to Trump. "President Trump's popularity has never been stronger than it is today, and his endorsement means more than perhaps any endorsement at any

McCarthy, an ally who encouraged Trump's baseless election fraud claims, distanced himself from the outgoing president after Trump was accused of inspiring his supporters to storm the US Capitol earlier this month. He declared that Joe Biden was the winner of the November election and that Trump "bears responsibility for (the January 6) attack on Congress by mob rioters."

But on Thursday McCarthy appeared back in Trump's graces, as the men grinned broadly in a handout photograph taken in an ornate room reminiscent of a European palace.

'Today, President Trump committed to helping elect Republicans in the House and Senate in 2022, McCarthy said in a statement that also attacked Democrats for "impeaching a president who is now a private citizen." "A united conservative movement will strengthen the bonds of our citizens and uphold the freedoms our country was founded on," McCarthy added.

House Democrat Katherine Clark expressed shock that McCarthy was re-aligning with Trump after the "seditious" Capitol assault. Despite "active threats of violence," she said, "Kevin McCarthy's response is a photo op with the treasonous instigator.'

With Trump impeached for an unprecedented second time, and the Senate girding for his trial, it was unclear how much political clout Trump would retain beyond his presidency. But recently several Republicans, following polling showing strong party support for Trump, have signaled they will remain in the brash billionaire's orbit-or at least not publicly break with him.

Pro-Trump Republicans will hold huge sway in the coming years. They are a large enough contingent to influence the Republican primaries. But should Trump be cast out and they abandon ship, the party would be severely weakened in its attempts to challenge Democrats for congressional control.

"You have the Trump wing of the party, wanting to purge those who have stood up to the president's lies, (and) you have the establishment wing of the party wanting to purge the party of Trump,' Republican former congressman Carlos Curbelo

Nurse takes first vaccine jab in Bolivia

SANTA CRUZ: A nurse on Friday became the first person in Bolivia to be vaccinated against the coronavirus, receiving a shot of Russia's Sputnik V, which is still being tested. Sandra Rios Villarte, 40, sat for her first dose at a public hospital in Santa Cruz, followed by dozens of other health workers. "I feel good, excited... a bit nervous, but positive," said Rios, adding she "did not feel" the jab. Bolivia on Thursday received the first 20,000 of 5.2 million doses of Sputnik V it has ordered from Russia. —AFP

Rally in Poland over abortion ban

WARSAW: Thousands protested for a third consecutive night in Warsaw and other parts of Poland on Friday after the country's right-wing government implemented a court ruling imposing a near-total ban on abortion. Protesters have defied coronavirus restrictions and subzero temperatures to rally after the controversial judgment was given legal force on Wednesday. In Warsaw, they waved Polish and gay rainbow flags and brandished the red lightning symbol used by Women's Strike-the main organization behind the protests. — AFP

Chinese exec's bail terms not relaxed

VANCOUR: A Canadian judge on Friday rejected Huawei executive Meng Wanzhou's request to relax her bail conditions as she fights against extradition to the US on fraud and conspiracy charges. British Columbia Supreme Court Justice William Ehrcke ruled that the Chinese businesswoman must remain under constant supervision by court-ordered security guards-imposed after her arrest two years ago. "The conditions imposed in my original bail order are the minimum necessary to ensure Meng will attend court as and when required and will not flee the jurisdiction," Ehrcke said. — AFP

Lithuania blocks Chinese screening gear

VILNIUS: NATO member Lithuania has banned the use of airport security-screening equipment made by a Chinese company over national security concerns, officials said Friday. The move came amid increased concern in the West over Chinese investments in critical infrastructure, including 5G telecommunications networks. A government-appointed commission concluded that the equipment from China's Nuctech "does not meet national security interests," Rasa Jakilaitiene, a spokeswoman for Prime Minister Ingrida Simonyte, said. — AFP

Portugal votes to legalize euthanasia

LISBON: Portugal's parliament on Friday passed a law allowing medically assisted dving. putting the Catholic-majority country on course to become the fourth in Europe to legalize euthanasia. Before coming into force the bill must first be signed into law by President Marcelo Rebelo de Sousa, a staunch Catholic and conservative who was re-elected only last weekend. The president-who has yet to make public his position on the issue-could also either use his veto against the legislation, or refer it to the country's constitutional court for further study. —AFP

AstraZeneca hit by jab delays, disagreements

LONDON: Only a few weeks ago, Anglo-Swedish pharmaceutical giant AstraZeneca was being applauded for the speed with which it developed its COVID-19 vaccine. Experts heralded the launch of the jab as a turning point in the pandemic, not least because it can be transported and stored more easily than its Pfizer/BioNTech counterpart. The Anglo-Swedish firm also won plaudits for promising to provide the vaccine on a non-profit basis to lower- and middle-income countries.

Now the vaccine has become a headache, with questions about its effectiveness, and potential litigation because of delays in delivery to the European Union. On Friday, the European Commission published the contract it signed with the drugs group, showing AstraZeneca's commitment to produce 300 million doses of the vaccine. A day earlier, an inspection of a Belgian plant producing the vaccine was carried out at the request of the European Commission to examine production problems at the site. Italy raised the prospect of legal action-which would also target Pfizerto "get back the promised doses".

Germany's Robert Koch Institute also questioned the effectiveness of the jab among the over-65s, citing gaps in test data. All of these tensions came as the EU mulled approval of the AstraZeneca jab which was granted on Friday. It was the third COVID vaccine authorized by the European Medicines Agency. The Financial Times said on Friday the "souring" relationship with the EU "could hurt the pharma group".

"Neither side comes out of this particularly well," CMC Markets analyst Michael Hewson told AFP, adding that the disputes showed why "the prospect of vaccine nationalism is so worrying". He cautioned that "if the EU follows through on its threat to impose an export restriction," there could be a knock-on effect of "countermeasures" from other nations like the UK if supplies slow. The contract with the EU stipulates that AstraZeneca committed to its "best reasonable efforts" to manufacture and distribute the doses.

MOSCOW: The brother and aides of jailed Kremlin critic Alexei Navalny were placed under house arrest on Friday ahead of new rallies, as Russian authorities warned that protesters could face charges of taking part in "mass unrest". Moscow police also announced that on Sunday, when the fresh protests are planned, movement in the center of the Russian capital would be limited and seven central metro stations closed. Kremlin critics say authorities are dramatically ramping up pressure on the opposition in an effort to intimidate protesters and smother dissent.

Navalny's plight and the related crackdown has sparked an outcry in the West, and could be raised during a UN Security Council meeting next week. Diplomats said an informal meeting had been tentatively scheduled for Wednesday, officially framed as a discussion on the opposition leader's poisoning last year. Better behavior, immunity behind US case decline

WASHINGTON: The trend line is now unmistakable: the US COVID outbreak is easing, with new cases and hospitalizations down two weeks in a row, even though the overall numbers still remain far higher than prior to the fall-winter surge. What's behind the slide? Experts say there are many reasons, from a better adherence to masking and distancing measures, to the fact that the holiday period is now well behind us.

Another factor, at least in some areas of the country, is that the virus has already burned through much of the population and is running out of targets-but easing restrictions too fast could still upset the current equilibrium and trigger a new spike, scientists warn.


Here's what you need to know.


After a summer lull, the US infection rate began to pick up again last fall, when gatherings began to move indoors and people started letting their guards down. Then came the holiday season: Thanksgiving, Christmas, then New Year's: a coronavirus triple-threat that sent cases soaring as millions of Americans ignored official guidance and visited their families and friends.

The US was clocking a daily case average of more than 250,000 by the second week of January, and more than 130,000 hospitalizations, according to data from the COVID Tracking Project.

There are still more than 3,000 deaths on average per day, because of the lag time, but overall the metrics are heading in the right direction. "That holiday travel which the virus was exploiting has kind of dissipated," Amesh Adalja of the Johns Hopkins Center for Health Security told AFP.

Caution rises with cases

The spread of infectious diseases is innately linked to human behavior. Natalie Dean, a biostatistics and infectious disease expert at University of

Florida, told AFP she saw a "population-level feedback mechanism, such that people respond to rising numbers in their areas."

She cited how Florida, Texas and Arizona quickly turned things around after their summer surges. "Whether through policies or many small behavior changes, the numbers slow," she added.

Brandon Brown, a public health specialist at the University of California, added "there is also less misinformation compared to before, and it's hard to deny the over 400,000 deaths." But if people respond to rising cases by becoming more cautious, the opposite can also be true when infections decline, warned the experts.

The current number of confirmed cases in the US is around 25 million-but we know by now the true figure is likely to be much higher, and could be as high as 100 to 125 million people, Stanford professor Jay Bhattacharya told AFP. We know that natural infection confers a high degree of immunity, at least for a period of time, then you can add the people who have received at least one vaccine dose (which confers partial immunity) currently 21 million. —AFP

Eight Afghan security personnel killed in pre-dawn Taleban attack

Ghani urges Biden to mount pressure on Taleban

JALALABAD: A suicide bomber drove a vehicle loaded with explosives into a base for Afghan defense forces in the country's east yesterday, killing at least eight security personnel in an attack claimed by the Taleban. The pre-dawn assault took place in the restive province of Nangarhar where the Taleban have claimed several deadly assaults targeting government forces. It came two days after the Pentagon said the Taleban were not living up to promises made in a deal signed with Washington last year, including reducing violence and cutting ties with Al-Qaeda.

The eight were killed when the bomber hit the base with a Humvee, the office of Nangarhar's governor said in a statement. The deputy head of Nangarhar provincial council, Ajmal Omar, confirmed the attack but put the number of dead soldiers at 15 with five wounded.

Taleban spokesman Zabihullah Mujahid said his group had carried out the attack. The governor's office said security forces had seized another vehicle loaded with explosives near the city of Jalalabad, the capital of Nangarhar. Nangarhar province has seen several recent deadly attacks carried out by the Islamic State. Separately, two roadside bombs exploded in Kabul on Saturday but there were no casualties, police said. Violence has surged across Afghanistan even as the Taleban and government engage in peace talks that began in September. The discussions have so far failed to make any major breakthrough.

Meanwhile, Afghanistan's President Ashraf Ghani urged the new US administration to step up pressure on the Taleban and not rush to withdraw more troops. Ghani said the Taleban have failed to live up to conditions agreed in their February 2020 deal with the United States to reduce attacks in Afghanistan and sever longstanding ties to Al-Qaeda. YANGON: Myanmar's military yesterday vowed to abide by the country's constitution, in an apparent backtracking after its commander-inchief spurred fears of a coup when he suggested the charter could be repealed. The army has for weeks alleged widespread irregularities in November's election, won in a landslide by Aung San Suu Kyi's ruling National League for Democracy (NLD).

Tensions were ramped up Tuesday when a military spokesman refused to rule out the possibility of a coup. A day later, army chief General Min Aung Hlaing-arguably the most powerful person in Myanmar-said revoking the 2008 junta-scripted constitution could be "necessary" under certain circumstances. His comments-translated into English and published in the army-run Myawady newspaper-sent shockwaves through the nascent democracy, which is only a decade out of the grips of a 49-year military junta.

India police boost security as more farmers join protests

NEW DELHI: Indian police tightened security yesterday around camps where farmers have been protesting against new agricultural reform laws, as thousands more arrived to join the campaign.

Authorities cut internet links to most of the camps where tens of thousands of farmers have been based since November as they demand the repeal of the laws. Tensions have been rising since a mass tractor rally on Tuesday turned into a rampage across Delhi where



Great Lakes leaders call for truce

LUANDA: African leaders from the Great Lakes region called on rebels in the conflict-riven Central African Republic to agree to a ceasefire on Friday. Electionbased violence in the country has displaced more than 200,000 in the past two months, the United Nations said. Rebels controlling about two-thirds of the nation launched an offensive a week before contested presidential elections that returned Faustin Archange Touadera to power. "The Heads of State and Government urge all rebel forces to observe a unilateral and immediate cease-fire," Angolan Foreign Minister Tete Antonio said at the end of a meeting of the International Conference on the Great Lakes Region (ICGLR) in Luanda. —AFP

Jill to help migrant kids

WASHINGTON: US first lady Jill Biden will participate in efforts by her husband's administration to reunite families split apart by former president Donald Trump's hardline immigration policies, the White House said Friday. In line with his campaign promises, President Joe Biden plans to announce on Tuesday "his launch of a task force on reunifying families and children. Something that he is personally committed to, his wife Dr Biden is personally committed to and invested in," said White House spokeswoman Jen Psaki. —AFP

Five dead in Cuba copter crash

HAVANA: Five people died in Cuba on Friday when their helicopter crashed on its way from the province of Holguin to Guantanamo in the east of the island, the armed forces ministry announced. The helicopter "crashed against a hill" and "the five people on board died," the ministry said in a statement released by state media. The ministry has set up a commission to investigate what caused the accident, according to the statement. It gave no other details, including the identities of the victims. —AFP

Vanuatu detains China fishing boats

PORT VILA, Vanuatu: The Pacific island nation of Vanuatu has detained two Chinese fishing boats and a Russian yacht due to concerns the vessels were operating illegally in its waters, police said. It is believed to be the first time authorities in Vanuatu have detained Chinese fishing vessels. The Chinese boats, Dong Gang Xing 13 and 16, were apprehended by a police patrol boat on January 19 near Hiu island in Vanuatu's northern waters, according to police. The boats are currently moored in Port Vila, as 14 Chinese nationals undergo COVID-19 quarantine before being questioned on suspicion of illegal fishing. —AFP

GameStop surges in frenzied trading but equities tumble

Drama after Robinhood, other platforms lifted curbs on trading the equities

NEW DELHI: Global stocks finished an ugly week with another volatile session Friday as the buying frenzy over GameStop and some other equities resumed amid stepped-up scrutiny from regulators. Major US indices fell about two percent following similar drops in Europe and Asia, while investors shrugged off some positive developments on coronavirus vaccines.

Analysts said there were factors besides the drama around GameStop influencing the pullback on Friday and earlier in the week. These include concerns over lofty equity valuations given the economic weakness caused by COVID-19. Investors are also worried US fiscal stimulus may lag market expectations after President Joe Biden's \$1.9 trillion package garnered a skeptical reception in Congress.

But much of the focus landed on questions over GameStop, which soared nearly 70 percent after Robinhood and other trading platforms lifted restrictions on trading the equities.

Shares of GameStop, AMC Entertainment and others have been on a tear much of the week as investors organized over Reddit targeted the equities on Robinhood and other platforms to combat hedge fund short-sellers who were betting on low-

"This is all a de-risking event by hedge funds, because of the loss that they have taken from the stocks like GameStop," said Karl Haeling of LBBW. "These hedge funds are facing billions of dollars of losses and they had to go and sell stocks where they had profits and long positions. They have to sell them off to cover their losses." "Fear is running through the equity markets again as some trading apps have relaxed restrictions on certain stocks that have experienced colossal volatility recently, like Gamestop," said David Madden at CMC Markets UK.

COVID continues

Regulators have taken notice of the activity, with Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton announcing a probe into Robinhood and 12 other online brokerage services. Earlier, the US Securities and Exchange Commission said it was "closely monitoring and evaluating the extreme price volatility of certain stocks," while British market watchdog the Financial Conduct Authority issued a warning to investors about market volatility. Friday's bumpy session came as Johnson & Johnson said its Covid-19 vaccine has an overall efficacy of 66 percent, with 85 percent effectiveness in preventing severe Covid-19 across all geographical regions, but only 57 percent success rate in combatting a variant discovered in South Africa.

The J&J vaccine has been eagerly anticipated because it requires only one shot, in contrast to other options now on the market. The J&J vaccine also does not need to be maintained at exceptionally cold temperatures. "The fact we have a single-dose vaccine that's 66 percent effective, and highly effective against severe disease is still a success," said Amesh Adalja, a senior scholar at the Johns Hopkins Center for Health Security, adding it would increase US vaccination capacity. — AFP

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Taxes and food certificates: UK counts Brexit costs

LONDON: A tangle of post-Brexit paperwork, duties and taxes is disrupting commercial ties between Britain and the European Union that have often taken years to build, piling extra costs on small firms that can make cross-Channel trade unprofitable.

Changes since the UK's departure from the bloc's single market and customs union on January 1 have made it "commercially and practically impossible for us to continue actually shipping to the EU", laments cheesemaker Simon Spurrell. Owner of the Hartington Creamery, which produces crumbly, flavourful Stilton cheese, Spurrell must now include a food health certificate signed by a veterinarian with each order sent to the bloc. Regardless of the package size, one slab of the geographically-protected treat or a whole crate, the cost of the certificate is the same — £180 (204 euros, \$247).

A big price to pay for the creamery, which previously relied on EU customers for around one-fifth of online sales. "We may just have to abandon the EU market completely until both sides come to their senses," said Spurrell, who is now eyeing sales into North America to help fill the gap.

The food certificate, which applies also to meat and fish products, is not the only bittertasting financial consequence served up by Brexit-even though Britain struck a tariff-free trade deal with the EU.

British customers purchasing goods from the EU with a sale price of more than £135 (152 euros, \$185) are in some cases having to pay so-called import value-added tax (VAT) of around 20 percent.

They may have to also pay customs duties and higher courier charges. The result is that some EU-based companies, mainly small ones, have decided to stop selling products to buyers in Britain.

'Reality of Brexit'

"It certainly isn't a tariff but nevertheless it's going to have an implication for UK customers and make goods from the EU more expensive,' said Gary Rycroft, a partner at law firm Joseph A Jones & Co in Lancaster, northern England. "In that sense, it's a protectionist policy because it's creating a barrier to trade. "That's the reality of Brexit," the consumer affairs legal expert told AFP.

For businesses, there is also the headache of "rules of origin", bringing new charges levied on goods exported from the UK that have been made with imported materials. "We're hearing from increasing numbers of small exporters who are struggling with rising courier costs, customs declarations, rules of origin requirements, duties and VAT charges," according to Mike Cherry, national chair at British lobby group The Federation of Small Businesses. Around 20 percent of small and medium-sized enterprises have suspended exports to the EU owing to the new rules, revealed a recent study by UK accountants UHY Hacker Young. — AFP

IMF-CEF Kuwait, IMF-ATI Mauritius hold webinar

KUWAIT: The IMF-Middle East Center for Economics and Finance (IMF-CEF) in Kuwait, and the Africa Training Institute (IMF-ATI) in Mauritius, held a highlevel bi-regional webinar on "The Impact of the COVID-19 Pandemic and Commodity Price Shock: The Way Forward for Africa and the Middle East"

The webinar was moderated by Yousef Al-Ebraheem, Kuwait's HH the Amir Court's Economic Advisor. Rabah Arezki, Vice President and Chief Economist, African Development Bank, kicked off the panel with a presentation on the challenges faced by both regions and the way forward, followed by discussions with eminent panelists including (by alphabetical order) Athanasios Arvanitis, Deputy Director, IMF's Middle East and Central Asia Department; Ibrahim Elbadawi, Managing Director, Economic Research Forum; Nikolay Gueorguiev, Division Chief, IMF's Fiscal Affairs Department; Jose de Lima Massano, Governor, Banco Nacional de Angola; Khaled Mehdi, Secretary General, Kuwait Supreme Council for Planning and Development; Catriona Purfield, Deputy Director, IMF's African Department; and Professor James Robinson, University

Al-Ebraheem highlighted the novel bi-regional approach to bring to the fore common traits and differences of the two regions regarding the policy responses to the adverse twin shocks-the global COVID-19 pandemic and the fall in oil and commodity prices. Arezki discussed success stories, including the Republic of Korea, of containing the virus and providing targeted assistance to those in need. He indicated that the COVID-19 crisis brought to light the underlying vulnerabilities of the two regions, which warrant decisive reforms. Recognizing the importance of moving to more inclusive societies, Rabah made the case that countries must simplify social safety nets by promoting a universal social protection system to replace the current fragmented systems that benefit few and exclude many. He argued that countries would need to provide Universal Basic Income (UBI) schemes and universal

Arezki underscored the importance of reforms to bolster transparency, productivity, fair competition, and digitalization, which are especially important to the informal sector to gain access to services and markets. He concluded that having a more efficient and accountable public administration would put an end to the rent-seeking behavior and help spur growth in the Middle East and Africa.

Arvanitis then examined the key policy priorities for the MENA region to pave the way for more sustainable and inclusive growth. Purfield discussed the way forward for Sub-Saharan African countries, bringing to the fore ways to "build back better" once the pandemic is overcome.

Turning to concrete country cases from both regions, Mehdi and Massano shared lessons from Kuwait and Angola in addressing the COVID-19 pandemic and strategies going forward, highlighting lessons for other resource-rich countries. Gueorguiev discussed fiscal policy responses by oil exporters to the decline in oil revenue. He highlighted the consequences of the fact that although oil prices have recovered somewhat recently, the medium-term trend seems down, demand for oil remains subdued, and overall revenue still lower relative to 2019.

Elbadawi explained that countries in the Middle East and Africa are faced with a heavy fiscal burden, which will require a prudent expenditure policy going forward. He discussed the challenges and opportunities for the two regions to graduate from subsidizing commodities to directly empowering citizens through schemes like UBI or direct cash transfers.

Professor Robinson discussed the political economy consequences of the pandemic, explaining how political considerations can constrain economic policies in the two regions. The floor then opened for a discussion with a diverse audience from both regions, including participants from the public sector, academia, the business community, and representatives from civil society and international organizations. In closing, Al-Ebraheem thanked the CEF and ATI for the novel bi-regional approach. "This webinar was indeed very revealing in the richness of this approach, and I look forward to more such events," Al-Ebraheem told the audience.



The success of the Mr. Men and Little Miss series was not always assured, however, and could have come to an abrupt end when Roger Hargreaves died suddenly at the age of 53. Following his father's death, Adam, who had always loved to draw, decided to take on the books himself. "One of the most difficult things was actually taking on board the idea of creating something," the 57-yearold said. "There was a kind of reluctance on my part to actually create anything new. And I just saw it as my dad's idea," Hargreaves added.

But he did go on to create new characters and finds inspiration for them often in the world around him. Fans are currently being asked to vote on mrmen.com for two new characters to join the gang in Happyland. Hargreaves still finds himself returning to his father's books when he feels stuck for ideas. "I think a lot of people might have thought it was kind of quite difficult to do emotionally," he said of following in his father's footsteps.

"But actually, I found it quite comforting, because it sort of brought me closer to him." There are some things Adam refuses to change: the "unique style" of his father's drawing, the interior decoration-"definitely stuck in the 70s" and the "old-fashioned" rotary telephones. He believes the strength of the Mr. Men and Little Miss books lies in their timelessness. The characters are "based on a little bit of us, our emotions and our characteristics. And obviously, those don't date", he said. "Children are looking at the Mr. Men, Little Miss series in exactly the same way as they were 50 years ago," he said. "So, conceptually, the idea doesn't need to be updated or modernized

Next generation

The core ideas of the books may have remained the same but the series has also moved with the times. In recent years, Hargreaves has put characters from the BBC's popular science fiction series "Doctor Who" into the books and members of pop group the Spice Girls. During the Covid-19 crisis, the books have also played an important role.

"Through this pandemic, Mr. Men and Little Miss have helped children understand how they feel," he said. "Mr. Grumpy will show them what anger is and show them how to deal with it, in a very kind of funny and amusing way," Hargreaves added. A father now himself, Hargreaves said he had no plans at present to put down his brush. But he hopes that when retirement does beckon the series might stay in the family. "You never know, there might be another generation of Hargreaves drawing and writing Mr. Men in 50 years time," he said. — AFP

Happy birthday! Mr. Men books turn 50

t's an occasion that might make even Mr. Grumpy crack a smile. The colorful Mr. Men children's books are celebrating their 50th birthday. The popular series has now entered its sixth decade in 2021, surviving its British creator Roger Hargreaves thanks to the dedication of his son. "It is an amazing fact that we've reached half a century, it's a very long time for a series to be so successful," Adam Hargreaves told AFP.

The books' enduring popularity after the first story's publication in 1971 is an indication of "how strong my father's idea really is", he added. The younger Hargreaves played no small role in the genesis of the Mr. Men and the Little Miss. series that followed, whose characters are named after the emotion or behaviour they embody. It was his own childish question-"one of those impossible questions that children like to pose to their parents," he said-that prompted his father to draw the first Mr. Men character. "My question was: 'what does a tickle look like?" Hargreaves explained.

In response, his father drew a little orange man with a blue hat and arms of incredible length. Mr. Tickle was born. The character became a book, and that book, in turn, became a runaway success, even leading to a television series narrated by "Dad's Army" actor Arthur Lowe. Over the following years, Mr. Tickle was joined by a cohort of friends, including the perpetually smiling Mr. Happy and the accident-prone, heavily bandaged Mr. Bump. The Little Miss series followed 10 years later.

Global success

Since their inception, some 250 million copies of the small square books have been sold in 30 countries around the world, from Britain to China, and translated into 17 languages. Hargreaves said that his father had always been ambitious

Baby Jesus dolls help raise COVID awareness in Mexico

earing miniature face masks and clutching tiny bottles of hand sanitizer, dolls representing the baby Jesus are being given a COVID-19 theme in a pandemic-era twist to a Mexican tradition. Every

February 2, Mexican Catholics mark Candlemas, the day when according to their tradition Christ was presented in the temple in Jerusalem. It is usually an occasion for families to celebrate and to dig deep into the imagination to create new outfits for baby Jesus dolls. This year's trend is "COVID Child"-a sign of the times in the Latin American country, which has reported more than 150,000 coronavirus deaths, one of the world's highest tolls.

At a store in Mexico City's historic district, dolls roughly the size of a newborn baby peer out at shoppers from behind their small masks and face shields. Some are dressed in medical gowns while others wear white laboratory coats and even stethoscopes. The

idea is to "pay tribute to the doctors and nurses who are on the front line of this pandemic," said manager Felipe Garrido. "It's also to raise awareness so people understand that this is not a game and that we're going through a very difficult situation," he added. "As we're very religious people, when we leave home and do the sign of the cross and turn to see the baby Jesus it reminds us that we must leave with a face shield, mask and hand sanitizer."

Protecting loved ones

Despite a partial lockdown in the capital, customers still trickle into the store and others like it to buy the pandemic-themed clothes for their dolls. Aline Villegas, a 26-year-old physiotherapist, was buying "COVID Child" for her father, a doctor, who always puts a baby Jesus on an altar in his office. "He's helping many patients with COVID-19, and I'm protecting him," she said. Previous themes for the baby Jesus dolls include football players, to the consternation of the Catholic Church.

CANADIAN LUC LANGEVIN MAKES VIRTUAL MAGIC

■aced with the shutdown of his touring shows due to pandemic restrictions, Canadian illusionist Luc Langevin reached far up his sleeve and developed a new trick-interactive virtual performances. "The pandemic forced me to find a new way to do magic," said the 37-year-old Canadian. Langevin, who gives performances in French, used to regularly travel to Europe with a team and piles of equipment for shows, including in France where television appearances helped make him famous. The pandemic and resulting cancellations of live shows forced him to rethink things, he told AFP.


Like the martial arts he learned as a child, Langevin "used his adversary's strengths against him." "The pandemic forces us all to be in front of screens, so I thought to myself: how can I amaze people in this context? " he said. From a small studio in Montreal, he has found success with virtual shows. His large travel trunks are now stacked against a back wall of the studio in a former factory. On a magician's table sit various items for his tricks-a deck of cards, a lemon, a nut and a knife. A camera follows Langevin around the room for just over an hour for his show "Interconnected." "All of the acts are very interactive," he said.

About 20 spectators with "premium" tickets appeared on the edges of the screen. Langevin called out to them, asked them to name an object or a card that he then revealed. He used a magic scarf to turn Donald Trump into a cucumber. During the show, audience members received an email which he implored them "not to open right away." It contained information to be offered by audience members that he had already "guessed." Some may be disappointed: There were no amazing levitations, poetic storylines or soaring music like in Cirque du Soleil (with which he has collaborated), and sometimes a few glitches-"Eric, your microphone is not

plugged in," he told an audience member. "Great show, too bad some tricks fell flat," commented Mikael Turpin in one of the few bad reviews of the show on social networks.



The idea for the new show was to be "close to the people" with a virtual audience that participates and influences the show, giving it an air of originality, according to Langevin. "I was wondering, would people be prepared to pay \$25 or \$55 for a one-hour online magic show, with all of the cheap entertainment available on Netflix, YouTube and social networks," said the artist. The answer is yes, he added. The show launched at the end of 2020 and was initially to run for two months. But it has been a hit, selling out the first 40 shows, and demand for upcoming performances continues to be strong. "The show will go on as long as there's a demand," Langevin said.

With only two paid technicians and an average of 850 spectators per show,

"we became profitable much faster than we thought," he said. "All the shows are done here, there's no big tour buses, no hotel rooms, no per diems to pay my entourage..." And it's helped to expand the illusionist's reach. "I can do a presentation for Europe at 2:30 pm-but over there it's 8:30 pm.

After that I can go back to my house to eat a meal with my family and come back in the evening for a Canadian show," commented the married father of a young boy. So has the pandemic been a boon for him? "One can see it that way," he said. Next up: an Englishlanguage version of the show for the United States and Canada. And when pandemic restrictions are eventually lifted, Langevin said he may continue performing virtually, interspersed with live in-person shows. "It's magic that is very different. The two products can coexist," he said with a smile. — AFP

Star-studded Sparks documentary seeks audience at Sundance

hat do Mike Myers, Neil Gaiman, Duran Duran and the Red Hot Chili Peppers have in common? They are all mega-fans of the cult, oddball, if-you-know-you-know band Sparks, according to a new documentary from Edgar Wright which premiered at the Sundance festival yesterday. To Wright and his fellow initiated, the eccentric California brothers that form Sparks have forged one of the most unique and lasting influences on popular music today, with a distinctive blend of poetic lyrics, falsetto vocals and constant re-invention.

Fresh off the success of his Oscarnominated "Baby Driver," Wright called on his famous friends to contribute to passion project "The Sparks Brothers," which charts the many rises and falls of Ron and Russell Mael over five decades. "It was pretty easy. People who are Sparks fans are like evangelists-they want to tell other people how much they love Sparks," the "Shaun of the Dead" director told AFP. "Sparks are one of those bands that make people want to make art and make music," added Wright. The feature-length movie charts how a "glam rock anomaly" briefly

soared in mid-70s Britain, topped France's charts later that decade, and stormed Los Angeles radio waves with early synth pop in the 80s.

Sparks also left a sizable mark on Germany's club scene in the '90s, got impersonated by Paul McCartney, wrote an upcoming film starring Adam Driver and Marion Cotillard... to name just a few

of their varied adventures. "I felt that the only thing stopping Sparks from being as big as they could be was like an overview, like a documentary, about them, so everybody can understand the context of it," said Wright.

'Uncompromising'

As the film displays, the Mael brothers have never truly courted mainstream success, constantly reinventing Sparks' sound while remaining "insular... as people and as musicians." "Neil Gaiman-we would never (have guessed) in a million years!" said Russell, for whom the movie's eclectic gamut of famous fans came as a shock. "And Flea, we'd have had no idea that someone as strong of a character as he is-and stylistically, the Red Hot Chili Peppers-would be into the band..." he told AFP.

The movie recounts how the siblings flirted with Hollywood once before-in a 1990s manga film set to be directed by Tim Burton, before he eventually pulled the plug. They have spent the intervening decades on diverse projects including a collaboration with Franz Ferdinand, a 21-night London residency playing all

their albums back-to-back, and a radio musical about Ingmar Bergman. But the pair, who struck up a friendship with Wright on Twitter, are ready to give the silver screen another stab. Along with "The Sparks Brothers," they also penned a musical film "Annette"-"a pretty special and uncompromising film," according to Russell-for French director Leos Carax, and starring Driver and Cotillard.

For "The Sparks Brothers," Wright mixed interview footage with archive concert clips, quirky animations and recreations of key moments in the brothers' lives. The humorous tone will be familiar to fans of Sparks' music, as well as Wright's "Cornetto" film trilogy. The director's mission to broaden the band's fanbase will depend on the film finding a distributor at the influential Sundance-America's biggest indie movie fest, which is taking place online due to Covid and runs until Wednesday. Meanwhile Wright's next fiction movie, "Last Night in Soho" starring Anya Taylor-Joy ("The Queen's Gambit"), was recently delayed again until October, in the hope audiences will be able to return to theaters. For Sparks, simply creating a standalone film was an end in its own right. "Obviously, as a bonus, if a lot of people end up seeing it and having a positive reaction, that's just icing on the cake, too," said Russell.— AFP

The filmmakers raced to finish and release the film "while we are all still struggling with some of this emotional minefield," said Lister-Jones, describing the process as therapeutic during "a very bleak time." "Normally when someone comes over with two cameras and a sound guy and an actor, I'm like 'I'm excited to be in your home movie," joked Charlie Day, who appears with his wife Mary Elizabeth Ellis. "It was super quick-I got a call one day saying 'hey, we're going to show up at your house tomorrow'... I didn't really know what I was getting myself into," added Lamorne Morris.

Friday also saw the Sundance premiere of "The Pink Cloud," in which two strangers are forced to cohabit indefinitely when a toxic cloud spreads across the planet midway through their one-night-stand, making the outside air deadly. However, the eerily prescient Brazilian sci-fi was written and shot a year before COVID-19. Top US indie film festival Sundance, co-founded by Robert Redford, typically takes place each winter in the Utah mountains, where multi-million-dollar deals are struck for many of the year's most coveted arthouse hits. Due to the pandemic, all of this year's 72 feature films are making their premieres via online streaming, with the shortened festival running through to February 3. — AFP

Coachella festival scrapped again amid virus fears

rganizers of the world-famous Coachella music festival, due to be held in April, have been forced to cancel the event because of coronavirus concerns, the second year in a row it has been shut down. Cameron Kaiser, a public health officer for California's Riverside County, where the massive gathering is held, said Friday the order to cancel was based on concerns of "resurgence of COVID-19 both within the county of Riverside and worldwide." He said the Coachella and Stagecoach music and arts festivals, both scheduled to take place in April, attract "hundreds of thousands of attendees from many countries, including

several disproportionately afflicted by the worldwide COVID-19 pandemic."

"If COVID-19 were detected at these festivals, the scope and number of attendees and the nature of the venue would make it infeasible, if not impossible, to track those who may be placed at risk," Kaiser said. Festival organizers had not said if they would attempt to find a later date for the 2021 festival. Coachella and Stagecoach are usually held every year on two weekends in April in the California desert. Last year, the festival had been postponed until October because of the pandemic when authorities opted to scrap it altogether. The lineup was meant to include headliners Rage Against the Machine, Travis Scott and Frank Ocean. According to media reports, the economy of the Coachella Valley suffered a drop in revenue of up to \$700 million due to the cancellation of last year's festival. — AFP



APPLE TV+ PLANS MINISERIES ON WEWORK RISE AND FALL WITH JARED LETO

ideo-on-demand service Apple TV + has commissioned a miniseries based on the saga of WeWork, the shared office giant that almost went bankrupt after becoming a darling of Wall Street, with Jared Leto playing the role of its colorful former boss Adam Neumann. "WeCrashed: The Rise and Fall of WeWork," will follow "the greedfilled rise and inevitable fall of WeWork, one of the world's most valuable startups, and the narcissists whose chaotic love made it all possible," Apple TV+ said in a statement. Founded in 2010, WeWork was built on the model of shared office space, combining both flexibility and user-friendliness. A startup with a dynamic and innovative image, WeWork quickly won over investors, reaching a theoretical valuation of \$47 billion in January 2019.

The group was preparing its entry on the New York Stock Exchange with great fanfare, but within weeks it suffered a catastrophic downturn and had to cancel. On the front lines was Neumann, managing director and cofounder of the company, a marketing and sales genius but also a man also prone to excess and wild unpredictability. To save WeWork from bankruptcy, its main shareholder, Japan's Softbank,

had to inject several billion dollars and shunted Adam Neumann aside. Oscar winner Jared Leto, long accustomed to colorful roles, will play Neumann alongside Anne Hathaway, also an Oscar winner, who plays Neumann's wife and WeWork co-founder Rebekah, who has a personality as volatile as her husband's. She, too, had to leave the group in 2019. — AFP

Mexican fans roar in Qatar ahead of Club World Cup

Stadiums at 30 percent of capacity; no fans from abroad

DOHA: Despite only having a handful of fans, Mexico's Tigres will be able to count on the support of the diaspora in Qatar as rivalries are set aside for the Club World Cup underdogs. No supporters will be able to travel to the Gulf for the football showcase because of Qatar's ultra-strict coronavirus rules, meaning Tigres will be relying on the Monterrey club's backers already in the country.

"We are forgetting about national teams; we are all here today to celebrate the Tigres and we are very happy," said Enrique Flores, 58, a pilot from Monterrey who joined two dozen Mexican soccer fans at Doha's Education City Stadium for a Tigres fan event vesterday.

Around him, noisy compatriots sporting Tigres' signature canary jersey chanted a Mexican anthem, "Canta y no llores" (Sing and don't cry), while some played drums and tambourines and others modelled decorative sombreros.

"In Qatar there are around 600 Mexicans, but each has their own team," said Mexico's ambassador to Qatar Graciela Gomez as the group flicked double "L" with their fingers for "Libres y logos" (Free and crazy). "What unites us is that we all believe in Mexico, we all love our country and we are showing our solidarity for the success of any Mexican."

Footballing great Bora Milutinovic, one-time coach of the Mexican national side, even put in an appearance, firing up the gathering. "When they told me that the Tigres were coming, I was very happy because I have many memories of Monterrey," he said before adoring fans snapped selfies.

Spectator numbers will be capped at 30 percent of capacity at each of the two 40,000-seat grounds for the tournament, which also features favorites Bayern Munich and Egypt's Al-Ahly. Tigres will kick off the competition at Qatar's newly opened Ahmad Bin Ali Stadium on Thursday when they take on Ulsan Hyundai. "We all know fans can't travel and, for the Tigres and for the club, it's the first time they've qualified for an international tournament so we are very happy with this turnout," said Gustavo Velasco, 27, a chef.

Players are gradually emerging from their lockdown with the first of six ATP and WTA tournaments due to begin at Melbourne Park on Sunday ahead of the Australian Open starting on February 8. Tournament chief Craig Tiley said it had been a huge logistical exercise. "We hope to have set the stage and the example for the rest of the world about the possibility of being able to do this," he said. US Open finalist Alexander Zverev insisted Saturday he is on track to contend for a maiden Grand Slam title despite a mounting personal toll off the court. The world number seven will spearhead Germany in the ATP Cup starting in Melbourne Tuesday as he eyes a first Slam trophy at the subsequent Australian Open. But Zverev, who fell agonizingly short in New York to Dominic Thiem, has endured a tumultuous period including allegations of domestic abuse by a former girlfriend and a recent split with coach David Ferrer. The 23-year-old, however, said he remained buoyed by his strong showing in the majors last year, which included a semi-final finish at the Australian Open. "I worked extremely hard in the offseason." he said. —AFP

Olympic gold with Japan fans TOKYO: Japanese baseball star Masahiro Tanaka said

Tanaka wants

yesterday he hopes to win a gold medal at the upcoming Tokyo Olympics and celebrate with Japan fans, as the pitcher returns home after a seven-year stint with the New York Yankees. Speaking at a press conference in Tokyo, the 32-year-old — now set to play for the Rakuten Eagles — was asked about the possibility of him playing in the postponed Summer Games.

"If I ever have a chance to participate, there is no reason for me to reject," he said. "I had a bitter feeling when I played in the Beijing Olympics... This time I want to win a gold medal" as part of the host country's team, he added. "I'm very excited at the fact I will be able to pitch in front of fans in Japan."

The timing of this year's games is particularly meaningful, he said, as it comes 10 years after a 2011 tsunami that left thousands dead in Japan. Star pitcher Tanaka played for the Eagles from 2007 until 2013, when the team won their first-ever "Japan Series" title to the joy of fans in its home city of Sendai, which was devastated by the disaster. He began a seven-year \$155 million contract with the Yankees the following year.

Rakuten's chairman Hiroshi Mikitani said he hoped Tanaka's pitching would "invigorate" Japan this year. The Tokyo Olympics — initially set to take place last year but postponed due to the coronavirus — are set to begin on July 23. Despite growing concern over the event's feasibility, organizers and the International Olympic Committee insist it can go ahead safely. Japanese Prime Minister Yoshihide Suga vowed Friday that the Olympics would be held this summer "as a symbol of global unity" to "bring hope and courage to the world". — AFP

In Albania, first female boxer punches past the patriarchy

SHKODER: At age 15, Elsidita Selaj decided she wanted to box. Through sheer stubbornness she has succeeded, breaking down her family's resistance and sexist attitudes to become Albania's first — and only — competitive female boxer. "In the beginning, boxing was for me an impossible, unimaginable love," the now 20-year-old said after a recent training session in her hometown of Shkoder in Albania's north. "But thanks to my determination, it has become a possible love that belongs entirely to me," she added.

It was five years ago that she began hitting the boxing gym every day after school, begging to be trained in a sport considered the domain of men in a country with strict gender roles. Jetmir Kuci, a ninetime Albanian boxing champion and coach, initially refused to work with her. "I was a bit traditional," he recalled. "It was very difficult to accept to train Elsidita, thinking about the judgments of the people of the city where we live." But eventually, he agreed. "With her firmness, she was able to break a taboo for

Selaj, a licensed amateur boxer, has since proved her prowess, taking home a bronze medal at a regional Balkans tournament in 2017, followed by a second and third place finish in the 2018 and 2019 European Amateur Boxing Championships respectively. She now has her sights set on the Olympic Games in Tokyo, but will have to overcome a tough qualifying round in the spring, not to mention the financial hurdle of other expenses involved. "The goal of every athlete, not only mine, is the Olympics," she said. Her coach believes that a postponement of the Games due to the pandemic "may work in her favor because it gave her more time". And if it is not Japan, there will still be Paris in 2024, he added.

Training with men

Success has won Selaj support from both her family - now her biggest fans — as well as from the town hall, who pay her a monthly allowance of 490 euros in a poor country where the average salary is 420 euros a month. "I am ready to sacrifice, to work day and night so that my daughter will one day be world champion for me and all Albanians," said her father, Luan Selaj. Boxing is a relatively new sport in Albania, having been banned in the 1960s by the country's former communist dictator Enver Hoxha, who considered it "too violent". Today the country has some 1,100 boxing enthusiasts, about 300 of whom participate in national and international competitions. But as the only woman in the group, Selaj trains with men.

Still a student in university, she hits the gym for up to six hours a day, often sparring with 16-year-old Ertan Kraja, who also aspires to make it big in boxing. "At first I was afraid to hit her too hard, but given her strength, her abilities, I got used to it, it's like fighting a man," he said after a recent bout. After her initial resistance, Selaj's 64-year-old grandmother, Kimete Bashaj, has become an avid boxing fan, following the world's top bouts on TV.

"I didn't think that Elsidita should be an Albanian boxer because as such, she could face prejudice. But now that she has received medals. I want her to continue," she said, sitting next to her granddaughter's trophies. Selaj, for her part, finally feels whole.—AFP

Up to 30,000 a day allowed into Australian Open

MELBOURNE: Daily crowds of between 25,000 and 30,000 will be allowed to watch the Australian Open, organizers said yesterday in a big boost to the season's opening Grand Slam. Aggressive restrictions on incoming travel have helped keep the coronavirus largely at bay in Australia, making it one of the few places in the world where fans can still attend sports events in significant numbers.

Victoria state's Sports Minister Martin Pakula said it equated to some 390,000 spectators across the twoweek spectacle — around half the attendance of last year. The event's COVID-safe plan allows a daily crowd of 30,000 for the first eight days of the Slam, then 25,000 from the start of the quarter-finals.

"That means on Rod Laver Arena, as we get to the end of the tournament, we'll have an incredible atmosphere, not that different to the atmosphere we've seen in all the Opens in years past," he said. "It will not be the same as the last few years, but it will be the most significant international event with crowds that the

LOS ANGELES: Bojan Bogdanovic put his stamp on a season-high 32-point performance with seven three pointers as the under-manned Utah Jazz claimed their 11th straight win by cruising to a 120-101 victory over the Dallas Mavericks on Friday.

Starting guard Mike Conley finished with 22 points and nine assists, France's Rudy Gobert had 17 points and 12 rebounds and Jordan Clarkson came off the bench to score 18 points for the Jazz, who drained 20 baskets from beyond the arc for their ninth straight game with 15 or more three pointers.

'We want to be unselfish, help each other on both ends of the floor," Jazz coach Quin Snyder said. "I think we're covering for each other, our communication defensively. The game can be simple if you let it be."

Utah was playing without two of its best players Donovan Mitchell and Derrick Favors. It was their second straight contest without all-star Mitchell, who remains in the NBA's concussion protocol after being hurt Tuesday against New York. Luka Doncic tallied 25 points, seven assists and six rebounds, but Dallas lost for the fourth time in a row. The Mays return home for a Saturday game against Phoenix having lost seven of nine games.

50 points

Elsewhere, all-stars Paul George and Kawhi Leonard combined for 50 points in their return from the COVID-19 unavailable list as the Los Angeles Clippers routed the Orlando Magic 116-90. George finished with a team-high 26 points and nine rebounds while Leonard tallied 24 points for the Clippers, who continued their dominance over the Magic by winning their 14th straight contest in a stretch dating back seven years.

"Just having their presence was huge for us," said Clippers coach Tyronn Lue. "We needed those guys tonight. I thought our team was a little tired, but we fought through it." Leonard and George had been out of the lineup since Monday and did not join the team at the start of their current six-game road trip. They were both cleared to play earlier Friday at Amway Center arena in

"It was good," George said of the added rest. "I took care of my body and rested. I just chilled and relaxed in the house with my family." In their absence, the Clippers were 1-1, losing 108-99 to the Atlanta Hawks on Tuesday and defeating the Heat in Miami on Thursday

The Clippers, who were still missing Patrick Beverley with a sore knee, lead the Pacific Division with a 15-5 record. Nikola Vucevic was the only Magic player to reach double figures but the Clippers held him to just 10 points, well below his 23-point season average.

"Coming in we made it a focal point to stop him," George said of Vucevic. "We didn't want him to get started early. We did a great job on him."

Young casts spell over Wizards

Elsewhere, Atlanta's Trae Young scored 41 points to lead the Hawks to a 116-100 victory over the Wizards in Washington, where three players were ejected from a chippy contest. Washington, who never led after the first minute, were down by 18 when point guard Russell Westbrook was tossed after receiving his second technical foul for shoving Hawks guard Rajon Rondo.

Westbrook and Rondo had both received technicals after jawing late in the first half. Rondo, who waved goodbye to Westbrook as he departed the court, was ejected with 5:08 to play. Washington center Robin Lopez was also ejected, receiving two quick technicals while on the bench for comments to officials after a delay of game call on teammate Bradley Beal — the NBA scoring leader who was held to a season-low 26 points by the Hawks. "I have to figure out how to better lead these guys," said Westbrook.

In New Orleans, Lonzo Ball scored a season-best 27-points and the New Orleans Pelicans went wire-towire to beat the Milwaukee Bucks 131-126. Brandon Ingram scored 28 points, and Zion Williamson had 21 points, nine rebounds and a career-best seven assists for the Pelicans, who made 21 of 48 three pointers.

Giannis Antetokounmpo had 38 points and 11 rebounds, and former Pelican Jrue Holiday scored 22 for Milwaukee, which trailed nearly the entire game after trying but failing to erase a 28 point deficit in the final 17 minutes. Elsewhere, James Harden had 25 points, 10 rebounds and 11 assists to lead the Brooklyn Nets to a 147-125 win over the Oklahoma City Thunder. — AFP

Premier League urges clamp down on racist abuse

LONDON: England's Premier League has urged social media organizations to do more to combat racism following online abuse directed at the Manchester United duo of Axel Tuanzebe and Anthony Martial and West Brom's Romaine Sawyers this week. West Brom contacted police after Sawyers was sent a racist message during Tuesday's 5-0 loss to Manchester City, while the United pair came under attack following a shock defeat by Premier League basement club Sheffield United on Wednesday.

"I am appalled to see the racial abuse received by players this week," Premier League chief executive Richard Masters said Friday. "Racist behavior of any form is unacceptable and nobody should have to deal with it. Tackling online hate is a priority for football, and I believe social media companies need to do more."

Masters said while the Premier League had been talking to social media companies, more action was needed to ensure the "swifter removal" of abusive messages. "We are in regular dialogue with social media companies, challenging them to do more against discriminatory abuse on their platforms," he said. "We want to see swifter removal of offensive messages and improved identification and banning of offenders.'

The abuse aimed at Sawyers appeared to be in response to the error he made that led to City's third goal, with the "appalled" Baggies insisting Friday they would be seeking the "toughest available legal punishment", as well as issuing a lifetime ban from The Hawthorns, should those responsible for the offensive posts be identified. Meanwhile, Albion manager Sam Allardyce questioned how those responsible could best be held accountable. "Romaine — or any black person — should not have to put up with this," he said. "It does become a greater thing to put right but who does it lie with? Should a player take legal action? That is an avenue for the PFA (Professional Footballers' Association) and all the players to get together about and choose the right way to go. How do we hold people accountable? Social media sites need to act in a more responsible way." His comments came after Manchester United condemned the "mindless idiots" who had racially abused Tuanzebe and Martial. A 2-1 loss to the Blades, where Tuanzebe inadvertently turned in Oliver Burke's winner for the Blades, appeared to be the catalyst for online abuse that saw racist terms and money emojis put on Instagram comments of the Manchester United pair's most recent posts.—AFP

Solskjaer hails 'brilliant' Fernandes' impact on Man Utd

LONDON: Ole Gunnar Solskjaer has saluted "brilliant" Bruno Fernandes' impact in his first year at Manchester United. Yesterday marked the first anniversary of the Portugal midfielder's arrival from Sporting Lisbon. Nobody has scored more for a Premier League club than Fernandes since his debut in January 2020. He has bagged 28 goals in all competitions and provided 17 assists to transform United from underachievers into Premier League title contenders.

The 26-year-old saw off Liverpool with a superb free-kick in last weekend's FA Cup fourth round clash. "Brilliant," Solskjaer said of Fernandes' impact. "From day one he's come in and wanted to affect the environment, the playing environment, the staff. He's been a great addition. He's such a humble human being, working hard and I think everyone has seen what he's done on the pitch. Very pleased with his first year and long may it continue. The higher up in the league, the more pressure there will be on us and on him. Now the limelight is on him but I'm sure he'll handle that pressure fine.

"He's got his opinion, he's a winner," Solskjaer added. "He's not just going to let a game pass away and talk about it after. He wants to affect it there and then. He's so passionate about winning and he knows his football, he knows his stuff. He watches every single game there is on telly, especially the big games. And if you ask him 'did you watch that last night?' he's always seen the game, so he's going to make the most of his career, that's for sure.'

Solskjaer has been impressed by the singleminded focus of Fernandes, whose transformative impact on United has been likened to that of French forward Eric Cantona in the 1990s. "Bruno has come in and helped the team, no doubt about that," the United boss said. "He's come in at a time when we needed his type of player and Bruno came into a team that makes his attributes and skills come to fruition. —AFP

'Shot from pool table' lifts Lyon to top of Ligue 1

LYON: Leo Dubois struck deep into added time on Friday to give Lyon a 2-1 home victory over Bordeaux and first place in Ligue 1. Lyon jumped from third to first, one point ahead of Paris Saint-Germain and Lille who both play today.

The objective was to retake this first place and that puts pressure on our opponents, Lille and PSG," said Lyon coach Rudi Garcia. "When you score the winning goal in added time, it's always huge in terms of positive emotions.'

Yacine Adli won the ball on the edge of the Lyon penalty area and rolled a pass to Remi Oudin whose low deflected cross fell to Samuel Kalou. The Nigerian smashed a shot over Sinaly Diomande's challenge and into the net. That sparked the game into life. Both teams had chances in an increasingly frantic finish before right back Dubois won the game.

Collecting an over-hit cross in space near the right edge of the Bordeaux penalty area, Dubois slashed the ball back into the goalmouth. The ball swerved, struck the far post and flew into the net. "I'm very disappointed because the players didn't deserve this," said Gasset. "We lost on a goal from somewhere else...a shot from the pool table." — AFP

Cameroon host championship against backdrop of war and fear

CHAN is a long way from being the most important football tournament in the world — it is not even the biggest tournament in Africa. But the current competition has taken on a more significant role as the Cameroonian hosts run the dress rehearsal for next year's far more important African Cup of Nations (CAN) while handling COVID-19 and a deadly domestic war. This is, indeed, the first major international football tournament organized in the world since the start of the COVID-19 pandemic at the end of 2019.

According to Johns Hopkins University, Cameroon had recorded just over 29,000 cases on Friday with at least 462 deaths, relatively low figures which have prompted organizers to allow some fans into the stadiums — 25 percent capacity for the group games and 50 percent for the semi-finals. The greater fear, however, resides in the ongoing conflict in the west of the

Cameroon's Northwest and Southwest regions have for over three years been the theatre of a bloody conflict between government forces and armed separatists. The militants are demanding independence for the two regions, where English-speaking people predominate in the otherwise francophone-majority nation. Civilians are often caught up in the fighting, suffering at the hands of both sides, international aid groups and the UN say. So far more than 3,000 people have died and more than 700,000 have fled their homes during the conflict. Some armed groups have promised to disrupt CHAN.

Along the banks of the Mungo — symbol of the amalgamation in 1961 of Cameroon following the French and British rule after World War I — police and military personnel have been boosted strengthened.

'Ghost town'

With the group stage over and the quarter-finals starting on Saturday, fears are rising in Limbe, a town in the Southwest Region that will host one of the semi-finals, and in Buea, the region's capital, which is

last Wednesday's game between Zambia and Namibia in Limbe, the villages located along the road connectvehicles and trucks filled with soldiers. "The enemies of peace are there, still active despite everything.'


On the road, as in Buea, light armored patrols crisscross the city, sometimes at high speed and other times at walking pace but always with machine guns at the ready. In Molyko, the boulevard which cuts Buea in two, lies the burnt-out shell of a car. Four other charred wrecks are still scattered along the way to Limbe. Convoys of soldiers are sometimes targeted by IEDs, improvised explosives placed by the roadside.

Bomb

In November, suspected separatists attacked a school in Limbe, setting fire to two classrooms and forcing teachers and students to strip naked. Going down the mountain towards Limbe, however, as in some ultra-secure areas of Buea, life seems more normal. Clusters of children and high school students return home after a day in the classroom. Shops and bars are full. But in Limbe, each match brings a new and very palpable sense of fear. On Tuesday "everyone took shelter after a bomb explosion" near the stadium, says Harris, 19, who is still in shock. On this occasion, there were no casualties.

As a result, Harris opted "out of caution" not to go and see the Wednesday's Zambia-Namibia match as he had planned. At halftime in the match came a word of relief from the authorities.

"On the security front, everything is going well," Southwest governor Bernard Okalia Bilai told AFP. "We have not recorded any incident that would have disrupted our program," he said. But as the competition rolls on towards the final on February 7, so Cameroon holds its breath. — AFP

Man City move four points clear

Newcastle lift pressure on Bruce • West Brom, Fulham play out draw

LIVERPOOL: Manchester City opened up a four-point lead at the top of the Premier League with a 1-0 win over bottom-of-the-table Sheffield United, while Everton's bid for a top-four finish was dented by a shock home defeat by Newcastle. Gabriel Jesus scored the only goal inside the first 10 minutes at the Etihad as City extended their winning run to 12 games in all competitions.

Pep Guardiola's men thrashed West Brom 5-0 in midweek, but after beating Manchester United away on Wednesday, the Blades again belied their lowly position to put up a fight against the leaders. Ferran Torres and Jesus were two of five changes made by Guardiola and they combined to make the breakthrough as the Brazilian tapped home for his first Premier League goal since November.

City failed to build on the lead, but comfortably held out for a 15th clean sheet in their last 19 games to pull clear of second-placed Manchester United, who visited Arsenal later yesterday. Regardless of United's result, City have no reason to fear anyone at present. Their winning run is now up to 12 matches in all competitions and they are unbeaten in 19 games since losing to Tottenham in November.

At that stage, it was easy to believe City would struggle to feature in the title race. But, revitalized by Guardiola's tactical tweaks, they are in the hunt for a third English title in four seasons despite the continued absence of star striker Sergio Aguero. City's winning streak is the ideal preparation for next Sunday's trip to champions Liverpool, which comes after a visit to Burnley on Wednesday.

At the other end of the table, Newcastle were the big winners of the day as they pulled clear of the drop zone with a first win in 12 games, while two of the bottom three West Brom and Fulham played out a 2-2 draw. Magpies manager Steve Bruce's future was under the spotlight after a wretched run that plunged his side into the relegation dogfight. But Callum Wilson scored twice in the final 17 minutes to earn a deserved 2-0 victory at Goodison Park on a bad day for Carlo Ancelotti's men.

Everton could have moved to within a point of local rivals Liverpool in fourth with a win, but rarely looked like scoring and were finally punished for a poor performance when Wilson lost his marker at a Jonjo Shelvey corner and looped a header across Jordan Pickford and inside the far upright. Wilson was then denied by the post after rounding Pickford, but the former Bournemouth striker made no mistake when Newcastle countered quickly in stoppage time.

Bruce's men are now eight points clear of the relegation zone after a point each did little for West Brom or Fulham's battle to beat the drop. The visitors were dominant in the first half at the Hawthorns and were made to regret not building on Bobby Decordova-Reid's opener. Kyle Bartley levelled for the Baggies two minutes into the second half before new signing Mbaye Diagne teed up Matheus Pereira to turn the game around. Ivan Cavaleiro's equaliser ensured Fulham remain above West
