

Restaurants can deliver till 10 pm; curfew eased slightly

Walking allowed till 8 pm • Vaccinated arrivals exempt from hotel quarantine

KUWAIT: The Cabinet yesterday slightly eased the nightly curfew to 11 hours and exempted vaccinated travelers from institutional quarantine. In a statement following its weekly meeting, the Cabinet said the nightly curfew imposed two weeks ago to curb a spike in coronavirus cases will now extend from 6 pm to 5 am the next day, instead of 12 hours. The new decision is effective from today.

The Cabinet also allowed deliveries by restaurants and cafes to continue until 10 pm and allowed walking from 6 pm to 8 pm daily, provided people

remain in their areas and do not use vehicles. The Cabinet also replaced hotel quarantine with home guarantine for travelers who have been vaccinated.

Travelers who have taken two doses of the vaccine at least two weeks ago or those who took just one dose five weeks ago will be asked to spend only seven days in home quarantine. The same applies to people who have recovered from COVID-19 and have taken one vaccine dose two weeks ago. All the three categories must undergo a coronavirus test on the seventh day of the quarantine and produce a negative result.

Students studying abroad only need to produce a certificate from their universities to be exempted from hotel quarantine, the Cabinet said. Expats who have valid residencies in Kuwait continue to be barred from entering the country since a ban was placed on Feb 7. Only foreign diplomats and medical staff and their families are exempted from the ban. MP Khaled Al-Otaibi called on the government to abolish hotel quarantine altogether and accused authorities of introducing it to benefit merchants at the cost of people.

Meanwhile, the government yesterday sent a draft law proposing financial support for small and big businessmen affected by the coronavirus pandemic. The bill stipulates that local banks will provide loans at reduced interest to businessmen harmed by the pandemic, provided the loans are used to support the companies' operations like payment of salaries.

The loans must be repaid in easy installments over seven years for small businesses and four years for big merchants, while the government will bear part of the interest on the loans. The Assembly's legal and legislative committee meanwhile approved a draft law to delay the repayment of loans for six months, while the financial and economic affairs panel approved a series of bills calling to aid small and medium businesses harmed by the coronavirus.

Israel seizes travel pass

RAMALLAH: The Palestinian government yesterday said Israel had stripped its foreign minister Riyad Al-Maliki of a travel permit after he met with the International Criminal Court chief prosecutor Fatou Bensouda on Thursday. On his return to the occupied West Bank on Sunday, Maliki had his "VIP card" withdrawn, Palestinian officials said. The Hague-based ICC tribunal this month opened a formal investigation into alleged war crimes in the Palestinian territories. —AFP

Mauritania restores Qatar ties

NOUAKCHOTT: Mauritania re-established diplomatic relations with Qatar, its foreign ministry announced Sunday, almost four years after breaking them off in the midst of a Saudi-led freeze on ties with Doha. "After intensive contacts over the past week and with much appreciated support from the Sultanate of Oman, the Islamic Republic of Mauritania and Qatar decided to resume diplomatic ties," the ministry said in a statement. — AFP

Trump to launch own platform

WASHINGTON: Donald Trump plans to return to social media soon, using "his own platform" after being banned from Twitter and other outlets, a former advisor said Sunday. "I do think that we're going to see president Trump returning to social media in probably about two or three months," Jason Miller told Fox News. "This new platform is going to be big, and everyone wants him. He's going to bring millions and millions - tens of millions of people to this new platform," Miller said. — AFP

Houthi rebels

RIYADH: Saudi Arabia yesterday offered Yemen's Houthi rebels a "comprehensive" UN-supervised ceasefire, as part of a series of new initiatives aimed at ending a catastrophic sixyear conflict. But the Iran-backed Houthis, who have recently stepped up attacks on the kingdom, including its oil facilities, dismissed Riyadh's initiatives as "nothing new".

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Scores flock to Iceland volcano

That made Tunisia the sixth African

FAGRADALSFJALL, Iceland: Thousands of curious onlookers have flocked to an erupting volcano in Iceland to marvel at the hypnotic display of glowing red lava, the bravest of them grilling hot dogs and marshmallows over the smoldering embers. The eruption of a fissure near Mount Fagradalsfjall, which began late Friday, was the first in the same volcanic system in about 900 years.

The volcano is located only about 40 km from the capital Reykjavik and can be reached after a 90minute hike from the nearest road. The incandescent lava bubbles and spurts from a small cone in the Geldingadalur valley, piling up in the basin and slowly turning a thick black as it cools. Some 300,000 cu m of lava have poured out of the ground so far, according to experts, although the eruption is considered relatively small and controlled. Access to the site was blocked in the first hours after the eruption. Authorities then lifted the roadblocks but discouraged visits, but by Saturday afternoon visitors were allowed - under strict guidelines. — AFP (See Page 5)

Kuwait Amir, Chinese President exchange greetings on diplomatic ties' 50th anniversary

Ties with Beijing moving forward constantly: Ambassador

KUWAIT: His Highness the Amir Sheikh Nawaf Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah sent a congratulatory cable yesterday to Chinese President Xi Jinping, on the 50th anniversary of the establishment of diplomatic relations between Kuwait and China. His Highness the Deputy Amir and Crown Prince Sheikh Mishal Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah and His Highness the Prime Minister Sheikh Sabah Al-Khaled Al-Hamad Al-Mubarak Al-Sabah also sent similar cables.

Steady steps

Meanwhile, Kuwait's Ambassador to China Samih Jawhar Hayat confirmed that the Kuwaiti-Chinese relations are continuously taking steady steps forward and as a result strengthening strategic partnership in many fields and levels. In a statement to the press on the 50th anniversary of the establishment of diplomatic relations between both countries which falls today, Hayat said that these bilateral ties are characterized by

responsibility and historical, as well as rooted friendship at all levels. The 50th anniversary is a new stage in the development of bilateral ties, as it officially began on March 22, 1971, but the ties



between both nations are much older than this date, he added.

Over five decades have passed since the establishment of these relations, in which the traditional friendship between the leaderships of the two countries has been established, and senior officials have exchanged many official visits, which culminated in many vital results and achievements in the areas of bilateral cooperation, he pointed out. In the past four years, Kuwaiti-Chinese bilateral ties have developed in various fields, as Kuwait has in China the largest diplomatic presence in the world, represented by four diplomatic missions that include the embassy in the capital Beijing and three general consulates in the areas of Quanzhou, Shanghai and Hong Kong, he mentioned.

There is a vital Kuwaiti representation in China, including the Kuwaiti Military Office, the Kuwait Petroleum Corporation Representative Office in Beijing, the Kuwaiti Investment Office in Shanghai, and KUNA office in Beijing, he pointed out. The existing strategic ties between both countries witnessed great cooperation in various fields, especially during the COVID-19 pandemic, he said, underlining that there are other potentials for coordination between both sides to create opportunities in different fields. Hayat appreciated the efforts of the Chinese leaders and officials aimed at promoting those ties and making the bilateral dialogue between both sides smoother.

Strategic partnership

In the meantime, Kuwaiti Consul General in Shanghai Mishal Al-Shamali stressed his country's keenness in developing bilateral ties with China in various fields to ensure real strategic partnership. Shamali added that there is a desire between the two friendly countries and at all levels to move forward in promoting various areas of cooperation. Kuwait is one of the first countries to sign a memorandum of understanding (MoU) with China on the 'Belt and Road Initiative' launched by Chinese President Xi Jinping in 2013, as this "creative" initiative opens new fields of cooperation with Kuwait, he added. — KUNA

UN office in Kuwait marks World Water Day

KUWAIT: The United Nations office in Kuwait marked yesterday the World War Day to raise awareness of the global water crisis. The celebration also supports the achievement of Sustainable Development Goal (SDG) number six, which calls for water and sanitation for all by 2030, and also to enhance food security and nutrition in the world. The theme of World Water Day 2021 is valuing water. The commemoration is an occasion to value water and raise awareness of the water crisis that is affecting around 2.2 billion people living without access to safe water. Dr Tarek El-Sheikh, Representative of the UN Secretary-General and Resident Coordinator, said in a press release, "One of the seven pillars of Kuwait Vision 2035 revolves around achieving a Sustainable Living Environment."

"Kuwait is one of the world's most water-stressed countries, with the lowest per capita renewable internal freshwater availability of any country. The country is highly water-stressed with internal renewable less than 70 mm/y, and high dependency on trans-boundary aquifers. Due to the large and continuous increases in population size, urbanization rates, income levels and economic activities, consumption of potable water in Kuwait has witnessed record increases since the start of production of water desalination plant," he said.

"Rising per capita income together with government-fixed low prices have caused a steep rise in average per capita water consumption. Alternative measures should be seriously considered to reform the water saving system and the new smart metering system to ensure balanced water and rational use, and to develop innovative awareness plans that have a greater impact on reducing the current consumption pattern and saving water," said Sheikh. Meanwhile, Jassim Mohammed Al-Nouri, the undersecretary of the Kuwaiti Ministry of Electricity, Water and Renewable Energy, also mentioned that Kuwait "Joins the world in celebrating World Water Day, where water is the main pillar of life and all related aspects of movement, work and energy."

"Wherever there is water, the more it is available, cities have been established, land has been repaired, crafts, industries and trade are active," he indicated. He added, "This year's World Water Day theme is 'Valuing Water', which is part of the 2010 United Nations Recommendations and is the sixth United Nations Sustainable Development Goal, providing sustainable water management for all by 2030, which provides safe drinking water to disadvantaged communities."

"The way of valuing water determines how water is managed and shared, is much more than its financial worth. Water is of enormous and complex value to our families, culture, health, education, our economy and the safety of our environment, and if we ignore any of these values, we may mismanage this limited and irreplaceable resource. This theme reminds us of the continuous efforts of the State of Kuwait and belief on its noble mission in maintaining peace and security and spreading the principles of justice and equality by ensuring a decent living and the welfare of the peoples of the world. The ministry is developing its future plan to meet the needs of the state, with the ministry's water production reaching nearly 1 billion gallons per day by 2035," Nouri said. — KUNA

ment to cancel the accord, claiming it "violates the constitution and affects Jordan's sovereignty". But Safadi pushed back, saying the agreement "in no way affects Jordan's sovereignty, and everything it contains is subject to Jordanian law and is compatible with international law".

"The agreement does not authorize American forces to carry out combat actions within the kingdom," he told lawmakers. "The agreement aims to frame defense cooperation and reinforce US support for defense programs and the kingdom's security and stability through military training and equipment," Safadi said. The US State Department considers the Hashemite kingdom "a vital US partner on a wide range of regional security issues". Jordan is a key recipient of American financial aid – including \$425 million in military assistance annually, according to Safadi. — AFP



The terms of the agreement, published on Jordanian news site Ammon, stipulate that "US forces may possess weapons and circulate with them on Jordanian territory while exercising their duties". It also states that US forces may transport and stock equipment and that personnel, their aircraft and ships are authorized to "freely enter and exit Jordanian territory".

Tunisia had been struck by an economic crisis and skyrocketing unemployment even before the coronavirus pandemic, and recent months have seen growing anti-government protests. Several thousand engineers leave each year to seek work abroad. Many of the Challenge-1 engineers were educated in Tunisia and are aged between 25 and 30 years old. Officials hope the success will show young people there is a future for them in the North African nation.

The Challenge-1 is set to collect data including temperature, pollution and humidity readings over areas without internet coverage, as part of efforts to gather such information from areas beyond terrestrial phone networks. "We are very emotional, after three years of intense work," said engineer Haifa Triki, 28, who followed the flight live from Tunis.

and reiterated their demand that a Saudi-led air and sea blockade on Yemen be lifted first. "Saudi Arabia must declare an end to the aggression and lift the blockade completely," said Houthi spokesman Mohammed Abdulsalam, according to the rebel's Al-Masirah television.

In April last year, the Saudi-led military coalition battling the rebels began a temporary ceasefire in war-wracked Yemen to prevent the spread of coronavirus, but the Houthis dismissed the initiative as political maneuvering. The latest proposal follows a renewed push by the US administration of President Joe Biden to revive stalled peace talks.

The United States, which has pulled support for the kingdom's offensive operations in Yemen, has condemned a spike in Houthi drone and missile attacks on the kingdom. A drone strike sparked a fire at a Riyadh oil refinery on Friday, in the second major assault this "We made a lot of sacrifices, but it was worth it".

President Kais Saied, joined engineers and journalists to watch the launch live on screen at TelNet headquarters in Tunis. "Our real wealth is the youth who can face obstacles," Saied said, stressing that Tunisia lacks not resources but "national will" amid its dire social and political crises. "We are proud of our youth," he said.

The Challenge-1 team was supported by expatriate Tunisian engineers, one of whom took part in NASA's Mars Perseverance mission. "It really is a dream come true," TelNet project manager Anis Youssef told AFP, ahead of the launch. While the aerospace industry is in full development in the Arab world, and 11 countries have launched satellites across Africa, making a homemade satellite is a harder task.

"The club of those who manufacture them is quite closed," said Tunisian aerospace engineer Ahmed El-Fadhel, based in Belgium and president of Tunisian Space Association, a collective of scientists, experts and students interested in space technology. TelNet intends to launch within three years, in partnership with other African countries, a network of over 20 satellites.— AFP

month on Saudi energy installations claimed by the Iran-backed insurgents.

The Houthis are also battling towards Marib, the government's last northern stronghold, piling pressure on Saudi-backed forces. At the weekend, the Saudiled coalition said it had launched air strikes in support of pro-government forces battling a quickening Houthi rebel advance on Marib, the capital of an oilrich region.

The loss of the city would be a huge blow for the Yemeni government, but would also threaten catastrophe for civilians, including at least one million displaced people sheltering in the region, many in desolate camps in the surrounding desert. Riyadh led a military coalition into Yemen in 2015 to prop up the government, but it has struggled to oust the highly motivated rebels.

The coalition enforced a naval and air blockade to prevent the smuggling of weapons to the rebels from Iran - allegations Tehran denies. The UN, which says Yemen is facing the world's worst humanitarian crisis, warned last month of disastrous consequences for civilians if the fight for Marib continues. Tens of thousands of people, mostly civilians, have already been killed and millions displaced in Yemen's long war, which has crippled the economy and healthcare system. — AFP

Hariri lashes out as wrangling delays govt formation

BEIRUT: Lebanon's Prime Minister-designate Saad Hariri and President Michel Aoun failed again yesterday to agree on a new government line-up after seven months of deadlock, as the country sinks deeper into economic crisis. "I asked the president to listen to the woes of the people and to give this country its final chance of having a technocratic government capable of reform," Hariri said from the presidential palace after his proposed cabinet lineup was rejected.

Hariri's remarks crushed hopes for a government breakthrough, as political leaders continued to wrangle over cabinet shares despite widespread anger at an economic crisis that has reignited street protests against a decades-old ruling class. Hariri said Aoun and the party he founded are pushing for a third of all cabinet seats, which would give them veto power over government decisions.

Aoun "sent me last night a line-up that grants his team a third of cabinet seats", Hariri said. "This is not acceptable." The three-time premier, who was selected in October to form a new government, made public an alternative line-up he said he had submitted to the president more than three months ago.

Hariri's proposal was comprised mainly of experts and included fresh names, such as Firas Abiad, the head of Lebanon's main coronavirus hospital, Nasser Yasin of the American University of Beirut and prominent political scientist Fadia Kiwan, according to a list published by his office. He said the line-up was turned down because it didn't give the president's set privileged power.

'No hope'

The outgoing government of premier Hassan Diab resigned in the wake of an Aug 4 explosion at Beirut's port that killed more than 200 people and ravaged swaths of the capital. Lebanon's leaders have since traded blame for the government delay, with Aoun calling on Hariri to step down if he is incapable of forming a government suitable to all parties.

Hasan Nasrallah, the leader of the powerful Shiite

Hezbollah movement and a close ally of Aoun, has also criticized the hold up. In a speech on Thursday, Nasrallah called on Hariri to abandon his push for a 18-member cabinet comprised entirely of technocrats. "A government of technocrats that is not backed by political groups won't save the country," Nasrallah said, calling for established parties to also be represented. In a report published ahead of yesterday's meeting, the pro-Hezbollah Al Akhbar daily said there is "no hope for a breakthrough". "Nothing has changed."

Lebanon is in the grips of its worst economic crisis since the 1975-1990 civil war. More than half the population lives below the poverty line and the national currency has lost more than 85 percent of its value against the dollar on the black market. The Lebanese pound, pegged at 1,507 to the greenback since 1997, sold for 15,000 to the dollar on the black market last week at an all-time low. The rapid currency plunge reignited street protests that started in 2019 but were temporarily snuffed out last year due to the coronavirus pandemic.

'Going in circles'

Demonstrators criticized officials for wrangling over cabinet posts instead of coming together to form a government capable of spearheading reforms long demanded by donors and the international community. "There are no signs indicating we are heading towards a solution," Lebanon's Frenchlanguage daily L'Orient-Le Jour reported yesterday. "Talks are going in circles."

The international community has also denounced the performance of Lebanese officials. "Lebanese authorities should act urgently to halt the deepening crisis and ensure good governance," United Nations humanitarian coordinator Najat Rochdi told the Security Council last week. French President Emmanuel Macron, who is leading the international charge against Lebanon's under-fire politicians, said last week he would push for a new approach to "prevent the collapse of the country".

The European Union and the United States should also ramp up pressure on Lebanese politicians, said a French diplomatic source, who did not rule out the possibility of sanctions. French Foreign Minister Jean-Yves Le Drian yesterday pressed his European counterparts to take action to stave off Lebanon's collapse. "I want us to be able to discuss together the levers that would allow us to put pressure on the Lebanese authorities," he said in Brussels. — AFP

Kuwait curfew: What you need to know

KUWAIT: Kuwait imposed a one-month partial curfew from 5:00 pm to 5:00 am starting from March 7, 2021 to help curb the sharp increase in COVID-19 cases registered in recent weeks. The curfew hours have been changed to be from 6:00 pm to 5:00 am starting today. During the curfew hours, pharmacies, medical stores, co-operative societies and supermarkets are allowed to continue operation only through delivery services. The government has allowed co-ops and supermarkets to serve shoppers from the start of the curfew to 10:00 pm every day, and has also allowed restaurants and cafes to deliver food from 6:00 pm to 10:00 pm every day. Also during the curfew, people are allowed to go to Fajr, Maghreb and Isha prayers at mosques only by walking, and the government later allowed people to practice walking and jogging from 6:00 pm to 8:00 pm. The government meanwhile allowed salons and health clubs to reopen during the day after a one-month closure but kept restaurants and cafes closed except for drive-through and delivery services. Meanwhile, taxis are allowed to carry only two passengers.

The Ministry of Commerce and Industry launched a booking service, allowing people to shop from 5:00 pm to 10:00 pm during the curfew hours. The service is valid for all co-ops and supermarkets around Kuwait. To book an appointment, a shopper should visit www.moci.shop, enter the required information (civil ID number and serial number, contact number and email address), the reason for appointment (food supply center) and the time and date of the appointment. The shopper would then receive a barcode to show once they reach the shopping center.

Where to obtain a curfew pass?

Citizens and residents that need a pass during the curfew hours to leave their homes can apply for a pass at https://www.paci.gov.kw/. The pass is available for those in need of emergency medical treatment, doctor's visits, blood donation, COVID-19 swabs and COVID-19 vaccinations.

Co-op delivery during curfew hours

During curfew hours, co-ops, grocery stores and other markets will be allowed to offer delivery services. Most co-ops will accept orders via delivery. Here is an incomplete list of co-op WhatsApp numbers. Each co-op will be responsible for deciding if and when they provide delivery services and not all may be providing.

Kuwait reports 1,330 new COVID-19 cases, 7 deaths

KUWAIT: Kuwait registered 1,330 new cases of COVID-19 in the past 24 hours, bringing the total number to 220,455, while seven deaths were recorded, putting the total at 1,233, the Ministry of Health announced yesterday. Ministry spokesperson Dr Abdullah Al-Sanad said that the number of people receiving treatment in intensive care reached 246 cases as of yesterday, up from 232 the day before, while there were 14,244 cases receiving necessary treatment, down from 14,360 a day earlier. Dr Sanad added that the number of

swabs that were performed in the same period reached 9,079, raising the total to 1,976,289 tests.

He renewed the call to the public to continue adopting all preventive measures, to avoid contact with others, and to ensure the implementation of the social distancing, and to visit the official accounts of the Ministry of Health and official authorities. Meanwhile, the Ministry of Health announced earlier that 1,439 cases had recovered in the past 24 hours, bringing the total number of recoveries to 204,978. \pm —KUNA



Political crisis over Dahoum membership

KUWAIT: A serious political-constitutional crisis is looming over the National Assembly and is likely to drag in the government. The new problem was triggered by the removal of leading opposition MP Bader Al-Dahoum's name from the list of lawmakers on the assembly website. The constitutional court last week revoked the membership of Dahoum because he was convicted in a political case in 2014.

Opposition MP Thamer Al-Suwait said that he was informed by the assembly secretary that the removal was done on orders from the speaker Marzouq Al-Ghanem. Suwait and a large number of opposition lawmakers strongly criticized the move, saying the speaker has no right to do so because the assembly must vote on the issue.

The issue is very complicated since Dahoum was allowed to run in the election by the court of cassation and his membership revoked by the constitutional court, meaning two contradictory court rulings. Opposition MPs say the conflicting rulings must be resolved by the assembly in a floor voting and not by the speaker alone.

Dahoum said on Twitter that he is still a member of parliament and his issue must be decided in a vote in the assembly. Over 30 lawmakers have vowed to vote in favor of Dahoum remaining a member when the assembly resumes regular sessions, highly expected next week. Ghanem has not commented on the issue so far.

Teachers' vaccination to start next week: Report

KUWAIT: Amid expectations that the health ministry will start vaccinating employees in the education and university sectors, the education ministry renewed its call for teachers and school employees to register on the vaccination platform.

This coincided with a health ministry announcement that the percentage of those from the teaching and administrative departments who registered on the platform reached 50 percent of the total number of employees the education ministry had given, Al-Jarida Arabic daily reported yesterday.

Educational sources said the health ministry told the education ministry that employees at government and private schools have priority in receiving the vaccine, as they were included with frontline workers who are currently being inoculated. Meanwhile, health sources said the health ministry will start vaccinating those in the education sector next week, including teachers, administrators, technicians, laborers and others, in addition to employees of universities and the higher education ministry, estimating their number to be over 100,000.

8,000 expats left in 3 months

KUWAIT: The Public Authority of Manpower said 8,000 expats left the country during the past three months, while 17,000 residency permits were cancelled because their holders are out of the country. Meanwhile, 199 expats transferred their residency from the government to the private sector since the start of January till March 20, 2021, Al-Qabas Arabic daily reported yesterday quoting authority statistics. In the meantime, 1,048 expats on dependent visas joined the private sector, the figures showed. Statistics showed the authority approved 18,858 university degrees according to the new automated system and more than 181,000 work permits for employees residing in the country. The authority also issued 735 no-objection work permits, besides 459 work visas.

Antibody test baseline to identify vaccine response

KUWAIT: Virologist, associate professor at the College of Medicine and head of the virus lab unit at the health ministry's Yaqoub Behbehani Center Dr Haya Altawala said the antibody test is considered as a baseline for an individual to find out whether their body responded to the vaccine or not.

She said although antibodies are not the only factor that help in immunity, it is a measurable factor, because other factors are difficult to measure since they are at the research level. Altawala said if a person's result is negative before vaccination, then becomes positive after vaccination, it means that their body responded to the jab. "We then check if we have reached a certain number, which means the person has immunity, bearing in mind that this number varies from one person to another," she said.

Altawala said diagnostic tests instantly determine

Thousands flock to Iceland's erupting volcano

Hypnotic display of glowing red lava excites crowding onlookers

FAGRADALSFJALL, Iceland: Thousands of curious teams also had to help dozens of freezing and exhausted onlookers have flocked to an erupting volcano in Iceland to marvel at the hypnotic display of glowing red lava, the dark as weather conditions deteriorated. A small recurring bravest of them grilling hot dogs and marshmallows over the smoldering embers. The eruption of a fissure near Mount Fagradalsfjall, which began late Friday, was the first in the same volcanic system in about 900 years. The volcano is located only about 40 kilometers (25 miles) from the capital Reykjavik and can be reached after a 90-minute hike from the nearest road. "It's absolutely breathtaking," says Ulvar Kari Johannsson, a 21-year-old engineer who spent his Sunday visiting the scene. "It smells pretty bad. For me what was surprising was the colors of the orange: much, much deeper than what one would expect," he tells AFP. The incandescent lava bubbles and spurts from a small cone in the Geldingadalur valley, piling up in the basin and slowly turning a thick black as it cools. Some 300,000 cubic meters (10.5 million cubic feet) of lava have poured out of the ground so far, according to experts, although the eruption is considered relatively small and controlled. "For me it's the heat that really surprised me. When we approached the lava flowing on the ground, the temperature rose by 10-15 degrees and our faces flushed," says Emilie Saint-Mleux, a French exchange student in Iceland who came with two friends. "It reminds you a little of a barbecue in summer," jokes her friend Lucille Fernemont. Access to the site was blocked in the first hours after the eruption. Authorities then lifted the roadblocks but discouraged visits, but by Saturday afternoon visitors were allowed-under strict guidelines. "We are just here to look after the people and see that everything is okay. And just watch that the people are not going too close to the lava and asking them step back," explains Atli Gunnarsson, a 45-year-old police officer, donning a yellow hardhat with a gas mask in hand. Italy coastguard blocks German migrant rescue ship

ROME: A German rescue ship that took nearly 400 migrants to Sicily earlier this month has been impounded by the Italian authorities because of safety issues, the charity that operates it said yesterday.

The Sea-Watch 3 vessel, run by the Sea-Watch organization, is being held by the Italian coastguard in the Sicilian port of Augusta, where it docked on March 3 with 363 migrants on March 3 picked up in the Mediterranean. The action was ordered after the ship was found in breach of regulations on navigation safety, on board fire prevention, environmental protection and crew training, a coastguard statement said. "Since last night #SeaWatch3 is under administrative detention in Augusta. They are again accusing us of having rescued too many people," the Sea-Watch charity tweeted. "Should we have let 363 human beings die because of the indifference of the authorities, which continue to provide no alternative to our presence at sea?"

Meanwhile, the Ocean Viking, another charity vessel that picked up 116 migrants in the Mediterranean last week, was stuck in high seas south of Malta, waiting for permission to enter a port. It is not the first time that the Italian coastguard has blocked charity vessels, and groups targeted by the measures have routinely called them unjustified and politically motivated. The aid groups have also faced accusations of colluding with Libyan migrant traffickers to bring people to safety on European shores-charges they

beep can be heard around the emergency crews. They're carrying devices that measure gas pollution, especially sulfur dioxide, which can pose a danger to health and even be fatal. Early yesterday, authorities again blocked the site due to high levels of gas pollution.

Rare opportunity

This is the first volcanic eruption on the Reykjanes peninsula in more than 800 years, and it has been more than 900 years since the Krysuvik volcanic system, to which Fagradalsfiall belongs, has erupted.

While eruptions are common in Iceland, with one taking place about every five years on average, they usually occur far from populated zones, in inaccessible areas. Others are too dangerous to allow public access. This time, the curious can inspect the lava up close after a six-kilometre (four-mile) hike from a road near the fishing port of Grindavik, the closest populated town with 3,500 inhabitants, not far from the famed tourist destination, the Blue Lagoon geothermal spa. By Sunday, the throngs of hikers trodding across the volcanic moss had already left a visible trail to the Geldingadalur valley. Others chose to break their piggybanks for a spot in the many helicopters flying over the volcano at the weekend.

While the number of tourists in Iceland has plunged because of the pandemic-tourism usually accounts for more than eight percent of the economy-the island is trying to kickstart the industry. It recently opened its doors to any international travellers who can prove they have either been fully vaccinated against COVID-19 or recovered from the illness. It remains to be seen however if Iceland will be able to capitalize on the volcano. According to experts, the eruption could die out quickly, possibly within a few days. —AFP

strongly deny. Prosecutors in Sicily have investigated Doctors without Borders (MSF) and Save the Children over the allegations, and are expected to demand a trial.

Italy is a prime entry point for Europe-bound migrants, but the sea stretch between Sicily and North Africa is one of the world's deadliest migration routes. Almost 530,000 migrants have landed on Italian shores since the start of 2015, including some 6,000 in the year to date, according to the International Organization for Migration (IOM). Since January, there were also 232 migrants who died or went missing on the sea journey to Italy or Malta, compared to 983 over the course of 2020, the UN agency estimates.

Child migrant dies

Meanwhile, a two-year-old girl from Mali who had to be resuscitated after being rescued from a boat packed with migrants off Spain's Canary Islands last week died on Sunday in hospital, local authorities said. The girl was one of 52 sub-Saharan Africans found onboard a vessel near the island of Gran Canaria on Tuesday who were brought by Spain's maritime rescue service to the port of Arguineguin.

Rescuers handed the unconscious girl, whose name was Nabody, to a team of Red Cross nurses who worked frantically to revive her on the pavement of the port, images broadcast on Spanish TV last week showed. She was then rushed to a hospital in Las Palmas de Gran Canaria, the capital of Gran Canaria, where she died on Sunday, said a spokeswoman for the health department of the regional government of the Atlantic archipelago. The girl had been in a critical condition in the hospital's intensive care unit since her rescue, the spokeswoman added without giving further details. —AFP

Biden pushes back amid criticism over bungled immigration policy

15,000 migrant children or teenagers already in federal custody

WASHINGTON: "The border is closed": With those words, a top Biden administration official pushed back Sunday against fast-mounting criticism that it has bungled immigration policy, spurring an influx of migrants in the biggest crisis to emerge under the new president. Homeland Security Secretary Alejandro Mayorkas said the administration's message to would-be border-crossers was simple: "Now is not the time to come. Do not come. The journey is dangerous. "We are building safe, orderly and humane ways to address the needs of vulnerable children," he said on ABC's "This Week.

But with an estimated 15,000 migrant children or teenagers already in federal custody-roughly a third of them in facilities meant for adults-and with the United States on pace to see two million undocumented migrants arrive this year, the problem has become impossible to ignore. Biden himself vowed Sunday to visit the border and said he was stepping up the message to migrants to stay home. "We're in the process of doing it now, including making sure that we reestablish what existed before, which wasthey can stay in place and make their case from their home country," he told reporters.

Bipartisan criticism

Many Republicans, but also a growing number of Democrats, have criticized the administration's border policies. Mayorkas, appearing on three television networks, insisted that the administration was doing everything it could to address the influx, but said the task was complicated by policies inherited from Donald Trump's administration and by the COVID-19 pandemic. "We have a plan. We are executing on our plan and we will succeed," the Havana-born Mayorkas said on ABC. "But one thing is also clear, that it takes time."

Espionage trial starts for second Canadian detained in China

BEIJING: The trial for Michael Kovrig, the Canadian detained more than two years ago in China on espionage charges, started yesterday, with relations between Ottawa and Beijing in freefall. The hearing comes days after the closed-door trial of another Canadian man, with both detained in apparent retaliation for Canada's arrest on a US extradition warrant of Huawei executive Meng Wanzhou. Yesterday police cordoned off an area outside the Beijing court as Canadian diplomats were denied entry and turned away. Kovrig, a former diplomat, was detained in 2018 and formally charged last June with spying at the same time as his compatriot, businessman Michael Spavor. Jim Nickel, the charge d'affaires of the Canadian embassy in Beijing, told reporters that the hearing had started and that access for diplomats "has been denied." "We're very troubled by the lack of access and lack of transparency in the legal process," he said. A court official told reporters no entry was allowed because the trial is a national security case. Representatives of 26 countries had gathered outside the building yesterday, Nickel said, and were "lending their voice" for Kovrig's immediate release. The US is "deeply concerned at the lack of minimum procedural protections granted the two Canadian citizens", William Klein, Acting Deputy Chief of Mission of the US Embassy in Beijing, told media outside the court. Canadian diplomats were also barred from attending Spavor's trial in the northern city of Dandong on Friday, which lasted less than three hours and ended without any verdict being announced. Following that closed-door hearing, Canadian Prime Minister Justin Trudeau slammed the two men's detention as "completely unacceptable, as is the lack of transparency around these court proceedings." The cases have sent relations between Ottawa and Beijing to their lowest point in decades. The court dates for the two Canadians come as an extradition hearing for Meng enters its final months, and alongside fiery high-level talks between the US and China in Alaska. Meng, whose father is Huawei founder and CEO Ren Zhengfei, has been fighting extradition to the US on charges that she and the company violated US sanctions on Iran and other laws. -AFP

Mayorkas repeatedly placed blame on Biden's predecessor Trump, who imposed an array of antiimmigration policies. "The entire system... was dismantled in its entirety by the prior administration" and had to be rebuilt, Mayorkas said. He said three new facilities had been opened to handle border arrivals just last week.

'Irresponsible'

But Republicans flatly rejected that analysis, with Michael McCaul, a Texas lawmaker, calling Mayorkas's comments "very irresponsible." "They've created the crisis. He says he has a plan. I haven't seen a plan," he said, also on ABC. Trump issued a statement claiming his border policies had been a success, and attacking Biden. "All they had to do was keep this smooth-running system on autopilot," Trump said. "Instead, in the span of a just few weeks, the Biden Administration has turned a national triumph into a national disaster.'

A bipartisan group of US lawmakers visited immigration facilities in the El Paso, Texas area last week, and several emerged with sharp criticism. Senator Chris Murphy, a Democrat, said he saw hundreds of children packed into a "big, open room," and "fought back tears" as he listened to a 13-year-old girl who was distraught after being separated from her grandmother. Mayorkas, who traveled with the group to El Paso, said that under the previous administration, such a girl would have been "turned away and turned into the desert of Mexico or sent back to the very country from which she fled, by reason of fear or prosecution.'

Biden said early on that he wanted to roll back some of the harsher policies imposed by Trump, but that first he needed to impose "guardrails" to pre-

Philippines accuses China of 'incursion' in disputed sea

MANILA: The Philippines on Sunday accused China of "incursion" after more than 200 militia boats were spotted near a disputed reef in the South China Sea, in a rare rebuke of its superpower neighbor. The Philippine coast guard detected the boats "in line formation" at the boomerang-shaped Whitsun Reef around 320 kilometers (175 nautical miles) west of Palawan Island on March 7. "We call on the Chinese to stop this incursion and

Taiwan pilot killed, another missing after jets collide

TAIPEI: A Taiwanese air force pilot was killed and another was missing yesterday after their fighter jets disappeared in a suspected mid-air collision off the island's southern coast, officials said.

The two F-5E jets disappeared from radar around 3 pm (0700 GMT) some 2.6 kilometers (1.6 miles) off the coast of rural Pingtung county, the National Rescue Command Centre said. Bolsonaro takes birthday swipe at **COVID** restrictions

BRASILIA: Brazil's President Jair Bolsonaro used the occasion of his 66th birthday Sunday to renew his attacks on COVID-19 stay-at-home measures, telling supporters he would fight for their "freedom." The far-right leader has defied expert advice on social distancing and face masks to slow the spread of the new coronavirus-though he has recently adopted a more pragmatic tone, under pressure amid a deadly surge of COVID-19 in Brazil. That included appearing in a face mask-formerly a rarity-to greet supporters wishing him a happy birthday outside the presidential palace in Brasilia.

However, many in the crowd were maskless, and Bolsonaro used his impromptu speech to renew his attacks on stay-at-home measures ordered by mayors and governors worried their health systems are

on a local highway.

Slovak PM says willing to quit to solve govt crisis

BRATISLAVA, Slovakia: Slovakia's Prime Minister Igor Matovic on Sunday said he was willing to step down to save the coalition government led by his party as junior partners slammed his handling of the coronavirus pandemic. Junior members of the four-party coalition have threatened to quit the government if the centrist Matovic does not step down by next Wednesday. President Zuzana Caputova, a liberal, demanded he find a solution. "I am willing to resign as prime minister of this government and remain as one of s members," Matovic told journalists on Sunday.

However, he made his resignation conditional on other party leaders in the coalition also giving up their ministerial posts. "To calm the situation, we consider the departure of Minister Richard Sulik from the government to be absolutely necessary," said Matovic, pointing to the economy minister and liberal SaS party

Thousands evacuate as Sydney sees worst floods in decades

Torrential rains push communities to breaking point; rivers in spate

SYDNEY: Torrential downpours lashed Australia's east yesterday, forcing thousands to flee the worst flooding in decades and pushing communities already battling drought, bushfires, and the coronavirus pandemic to "breaking point".

Around 18,000 residents were told to evacuate their homes, as days of relentless rainfall caused rivers in Australia's most populous state, New South Wales, to their highest levels in 30 years. "The devastation is quite unbelievable," said Port Macquarie cafe owner Marten Clark, who waded through waist-deep water to find his furniture washed away, and freezers, fridges and cooking equipment destroyed.

Aerial images from hard-hit areas showed the flood consuming rows of houses, with only their roofs above the water. As some coastal communities received three months' worth of rain in a few hours, emergency services said they rescued hundreds from floodwaters and fielded more than 8,800 calls for help. In some areas, emergency workers travelled inland on "Surf Lifesaving" ocean rescue boats to reach stranded people. So far, no fatalities or serious injuries have been reported.

But with more rain expected, eight million residents in Sydney and across the state were yesterday told to work from home if possible and avoid unnecessary travel. "The water is still rising," said Jo Dunstan, who owns a florist shop in the outer Sydney suburb of Windsor, as she watched debris-littered stormwater race past neighboring homes.

"It's scary, very eerie to say the least." Just over 12 months ago the region was parched: suffering prolonged drought, water restrictions and unprecedented bushfires. "When you have been through three or four incidents that are life-changing on top of each other, it can make you feel like you are at breaking point," said New South Wales Premier Gladys Berejiklian.

"I don't know any time in a state history where we have had these extreme weather conditions in such quick succession in the middle of a pandemic."

Australia 'tested once again'

Scientists have warned Australia can expect more frequent and more extreme weather events as a result of climate change. Prime Minister Scott Morrison, whose conservative government has been accused of dragging its feet on climate action, said Australia was "being tested once again" by a "terrible event".

He told parliament that Australia's defense force was expected to be called in to assist with the cleanup and recovery. New South Wales's Mid North Coast has been particularly badly affected, with Berejiklian declaring the region had been struck by a "one in 100 year" disaster. In Sydney's vast Hawkesbury-Nepean Valley, swollen rivers were at levels not seen since 1990, after the Warragamba Dam, the city's main drinking water source, spilled over Saturday.

Around 500 gigalitres of water were drained from the dam-roughly equivalent to 200,000 Olympic size

BBC journalist freed in Myanmar as protests roll on

YANGON: A BBC journalist held in Myanmar has been freed, the broadcaster said yesterday, as demonstrators took to the streets for fresh anti-coup protests against the military. Myanmar's junta has unleashed deadly violence on protesters who have risen against the military's ousting of civilian leader Aung San Suu Kyi last month. More than 2,600 people have been arrested and 250 killed, according to the Assistance Association for Political Prisoners (AAPP), a local monitoring group that has warned fatalities could be even higher. Aung Thura, a journalist with the BBC's Burmese service, was detained by men in plain clothes while reporting outside a court in the capital Naypyidaw on Friday. The broadcaster confirmed on Monday in a news story on its website that he had been freed but gave no further details. Scores of people, including teachers, marched yesterday through the pre-dawn streets of Mandalay, the country's second-largest city, some carrying placards calling for UN intervention in the crisis. Mandalay has seen some of the worst violence of the crackdown and

swimming pools or the total volume of water in Sydney Harbor. Residents in some affected areas were allowed to return to their homes yesterday after waters receded, but others were placed on high alert as floods moved toward their regions. Education authorities said more than 200 schools were closed, including some that were damaged in the floods. The Bureau of Meteorology has forecast "treacherous" conditions yesterday before the wild weather eases later in the week. Flood operations manager Justin Robinson warned the rain was expected to cause flooding in previously unaffected areas as well as "renewed flooding in many of those communities that have already been impacted". —AFP

MOSCOW: The backer of Russia's Sputnik V coronavirus vaccine said yesterday it had signed an agreement with an India-based pharmaceuticals giant for the production of up to 200 million doses of the jab a year. The Russian Direct Investment Fund (RDIF), the country's sovereign wealth fund, said in a statement it has partnered with the Virchow Group to produce up to 200 million doses of the two-dose vaccine in India every year. Virchow Biotech, a subsidiary of the Virchow Group, is expected to start full-scale commercial production in the first half of 2021, it said. — AFP

Venezuela forces clash with gang

BOGOTA: Venezuela's military clashed Sunday with an armed group near the frontier with Colombia, the mayor of a Colombian border town said. The confrontation, which occurred in the southwestern Venezuelan state of Apure, resulted in several casualties, said the mayor of Arauquita, Etelivar Torres. "This Sunday we were awakened, we residents of Arauquita, by detonations from the Venezuelan air force" that continued through the afternoon, Torres told local media, adding that the confrontation had resulted in "a significant number of injured and dead." —AFP

Cops hurt at protest in England

LONDON: A demonstration in southwest England against increased police powers turned violent Sunday, leaving several officers hurt, authorities said. "Horrendous scenes in Bristol," said John Apter, head of the police federation of England and Wales. "Number of officers badly injured, police vehicles damaged and a police station under attack. This is not protest, it's just mindless violence," he tweeted. The clashes erupted after a rally against the new "Police and Crime Bill"-drawn up by the government to grant the police greater powers to crack down on disruptive protests-when hundreds of protesters converged on a local police station. —AFP

Republic of Congo oppn candidate dies of COVID-19

BRAZZAVILLE, Congo: Republic of Congo opposition candidate Guy-Brice Parfait Kolelas died of COVID-19 as he was being transferred to France for treatment, his campaign director said yesterday, the day after presidential elections in which he was the main challenger. Kolelas was seen as the main rival to veteran leader Denis Sassou Nguesso, who was expected to win Sunday's vote. The election was boycotted by the main opposition and under an internet blackout, with critics voicing concerns over the transparency of the polls seen as tilted towards Sassou Nguesso. Kolelas "died in the medical aircraft which came to get him from Brazzaville on Sunday afternoon," his campaign director Christian Cyr Rodrigue Mayanda told AFP.

The sixty-year-old tested positive for COVID-19 on Friday afternoon, and was unable to host his last campaign meeting in Brazzaville. On Saturday, he posted a video from his sickbed, declaring he was "battling against death". "Rise up as one person... I'm fighting on my deathbed, you too fight for your change," he urged his supporters, saying the election was "about the future of your children". Mayanda called on supporters of Kolelas to rally at 11 am local time (1000 GMT). "We'll continue to count the ballots. He was ahead in a number of areas," he said.

'Atmosphere of peace'

Kolelas came second in the presidential election of 2016, picking up 15 percent of the vote according to official results. He had pledged to release the two candidates from that vote sentenced in 2018 to 20 years in prison for "undermining state security", former army general Jean-Marie Michel Mokoko and ex-minister Andre Okombi Salissa. He was only serious contender left facing the president on Sunday after a string of boycotts, withdrawn candidacies and exclusions. Provisional election results are not expected for days.

There were no reports of major incidents before polling stations closed, but AFP correspondents said access to the internet and social media, as well as text messages, was cut. In some areas voters complained that their names weren't on the electoral list. "The only uncertainty is what score Mr. Sassou will tell the electoral commission to give him," said Congolese novelist Emmanuel Dongala, contacted by AFP at his US home. Sassou Nguesso, 77, a former paratrooper, first rose to power in 1979 and has since accumulated 36 years in office, making him one of the world's longestserving leaders.—AFP

Following the call, Singapore's Foreign Minister Vivian Balakrishnan embarked on a whistle-stop diplomatic tour including meetings in Brunei, Malaysia and Indonesia. On the commercial front, French energy giant EDF announced that a \$1.5-billion hydropower dam project in Myanmar had been suspended in response to the coup. Australia and Canada have confirmed they are providing consular assistance to two business consultants detained in Myanmar. It is understood that Matthew O'Kane and Christa Avery, a dual Canadian-Australian citizen, are under house arrest after trying to leave the country on a relief flight Friday. The couple run a consultancy business in Yangon. The Canadian and Australian foreign ministries have refused to comment further on the case. - AFP

Brazil clears use of full vaccine stock as first doses

BRASILIA: Brazil said Sunday it was lifting its requirement for local authorities to reserve half their coronavirus vaccine stockpiles for second doses, seeking to accelerate its lagging immunization campaign and curb a deadly COVID-19 surge. Outgoing health minister Eduardo Pazuello said the goal of the policy switch was to get at least one vaccine dose to the maximum number of people as fast as possible.

Brazil, which has the second-highest death toll in the pandemic, is so far using the Oxford-AstraZeneca vaccine and Chinese-developed CoronaVac, both of which require two doses. "By freeing the full stockpile of vaccines for immediate use, we will be able to double the number of doses applied this week, saving and protecting more lives," Pazuello said in a statement.

The ministry said it had received guarantees from suppliers that enough vaccines would arrive to ensure all recipients receive their second dose on schedule. There has been international debate over whether it is better to administer as many first doses as possible or reserve some supply for second doses. Countries such as Britain have shown promising results adopting the first strategy.

Brazil has issued at least one dose to around 5.5 percent of the population so far-way off pace to meet the health ministry's goal of vaccinating the entire adult population by the end of the year. In a boost to the immunization campaign, Brazil received its first shipment Sunday of vaccines secured through the United Nations Covax program for low- and middleincome countries. Just over one million doses of the AstraZeneca vaccine were shipped to Sao Paulo, officials said. The health ministry said another 1.9 million doses were expected by the end of the month under the program.

In a setback, however, public health institute Fiocruz, which is partnering with AstraZeneca to distribute and eventually produce the vaccine in Brazil, confirmed that eight million doses it was expecting from India had been delayed. It said the British-Swedish pharmaceutical firm's Indian partner, the Serum Institute, had not indicated when it would be able to supply them.

Taiwan starts vaccination drive with AZ

TAIPEI: Taiwan kicked off its coronavirus inoculation drive yesterday with two top officials getting AstraZeneca shots in a bid to boost public confidence in a vaccine that has had a troubled rollout. Premier Su Tseng-chang and health minister Chen Shih-chung sat for jabs at a Taipei hospital after local authorities cleared the Anglo-Swedish pharmaceutical giant's vaccine for use. "I am not feeling any pain at the spot or any soreness... I hope everyone can feel at ease after seeing my condition," said Su, 73, in footage televised live.

Earlier this month, countries ranging from France to Venezuela to Indonesia temporarily suspended use of AstraZeneca's vaccine over fears it may cause blood clots and brain hemorrhages. But many resumed their rollouts after Europe's medical regulator last week called the vaccine-which is among the cheapest available and easiest to store-"safe and effective".

Taiwan went ahead with its rollout after a committee of local experts ruled that "clinical benefits" of the vaccine outweigh risks of adverse reactions. But certain groups, including those in hormone therapy or taking contraceptive pills, are advised against the jab.

Taiwan-population 23 million-has been held up as a model in containing the coronavirus with just over 1,000 cases and 10 deaths. —AFP

Turkish CB tries to calm market turmoil after top banker sacked

Lira pares losses after central bank intervention

ANKARA: Turkish officials yesterday tried to calm the turmoil triggered by President Recep Tayyip Erdogan's abrupt decision to sack his reformist central bank chief, insisting they would stick with free market rules. The lira lost as much as 17 percent against the dollar on the first day of trading after Erdogan replaced market-friendly economist Naci Agbal with former ruling party member Sahap Kavcioglu at the key post.

The Turkish lira collapsed more than 17 percent yesterday after President Recep Tayyip Erdogan sacked the country's market-friendly central bank chief. The currency fell to as low as 8.47 per US dollar in early trade, having closed at 7.22 at the end of last week, after Naci Agbal was replaced by former ruling party lawmaker Sahap Kavcioglu at the weekend.

It later recovered slightly to sit at 8.09. While a presidential decree on Friday did not explain why Agbal had been removed, it came just a day after the bank hiked interest rates more than two percentage points to 19 percent as it looked to fight inflation. Kavcioglu has written columns for a pro-government newspaper heavily criticising Agbal's propensity to raise rates. Analysts say the new central banker subscribes to Erdogan's unorthodox belief that higher interest rates cause inflation. Most economists believe it slows inflation down by raising the cost of doing business.

The currency clawed back some of its losses and was down roughly eight percent at 7.85 to the dollar

He once even dubbed them the "mother and father of all evil". The new bank governor Kavcioglu is a former ruling party lawmaker and columnist for the pro-government Yeni Safak newspaper.

Already nominally independent, Kavcioglu's appointment throws further doubt about the central bank's powers to ensure price stability and raise interest rates if needed under Erdogan.

Kavcioglu is the bank's fourth governor in two years after similar dismissals. In a statement on Sunday, he sought to reassure the markets over the bank's commitment to fighting inflation. The details of his escape proved embarrassing to Japanese authorities-with the former tycoon allegedly having boarded a train to Osaka before evading security checks at Kansai airport by boarding a private jet packed into an oversized box that was not scanned. After his arrival in Lebanon, Ghosn claimed that he had been forced to escape because he feared he would not get a fair hearing. While Ghosn remains at large, the repercussions of both the original case against him and his escape from Japan continue. In Tokyo, his former close aide at Nissan, Greg Kelly, is currently on trial for his alleged role in underreporting Ghosn's income. Nissan itself faces charges in the case and has pleaded guilty.

'Das Auto' goes electric as VW takes on Tesla

FRANKFURT: When Volkswagen chief executive Herbert Diess joined Twitter in January, he used his first tweet to warn pioneering electric car maker Elon Musk that he was coming after him. The bold proclamation raised some eyebrows, coming from a carmaker better known for its 2015 "dieselgate" emissions cheating scandal than its green credentials.

But all that has changed since the German group announced an offensive to dominate the electric car market globally by 2025, vowing to set up six battery factories in Europe by the end of the decade.

"Volkswagen is the new Tesla," declared the Financial Times, referring to the now dominant Californian e-car group founded by billionaire maverick entrepreneur Musk in 2003. "Our transformation will be fast, unprecedented and on a scale not seen in the automobile industry in a century," Diess said at VW's inaugural "Power Day" last Monday, where he fired off a flurry of announcements.

Industry watchers say it's a credible bet. Bloomberg Intelligence auto analyst Tatsuo Yoshida said Volkswagen "has (the) potential to overtake Tesla's number one position... in a few years". Karl Brauer, an analyst with CarExpert.com, said VW's "combination of financial resources and manufacturing capacity make it a prime challenger for Tesla's dominance"-even if catching up with its US rival is "not going to be easy".

'Saving face'

Diess, who has headed the 12-brand VW group since 2018, has never hidden his admiration for Musk, whose brash and unconventional ways have a habit of disrupting markets. The two men have a friendly relationship and regularly exchange emails, according to an insider. If the aim of Diess's carefully choreographed "Power Day" was to capture some of the enthusiasm of a Battery Day Tesla held late last year, particularly in the United States, it appears to have worked.

Diess's announcements saw US investors flock into Volkswagen shares, including many small traders using online platforms. In just a week, the Wolfsburg-based car giant gained 15 percent on Frankfurt's blue-chip stock exchange, giving the group a market capitalization of more than 130 billion euros (\$155 billion). The rise puts Diess's 200-billion-euro target within reach but he has a way to go before matching Tesla's \$619 billion valuation. VW's "forced transition" towards more environmentally friendly cars has now been "recognized by the market", said Eric Kirstetter, an auto sector expert at the Roland Berger consulting firm.—AFP Japan were indicted yesterday and face up to three years in prison. Deliveroo eyes £8.8bn valuation at London float

LONDON: British meal delivery app Deliveroo is aiming for a higher-than-expected valuation of up to \$8.8 billion when it launches shortly on the London stock market, the company said yesterday following a pandemic-fuelled boom in demand.

The Amazon-backed company, in line with other home-delivery firms, says it has seen demand soar in the past year as locked-down households called in food. The big listing, expected in April, is seen as a major boost to London's financial sector which has been hit by Brexit turmoil.



London's financial sector, known as the City, recently lost its European share trading crown to Amsterdam following Britain's exit from the European Union. Eight-year-old Deliveroo's market capitalization on listing is set to be between \$7.6 billion and \$8.8 billion (\$10.5 billion-\$12.2 billion, \$.9 billion euros-10.3 billion euros), it said in a statement yester-

'Strong start to 2021'

The listing update was published alongside news that Deliveroo's app transactions ballooned by 121 percent in the first two months of 2021. "We have seen a strong start to 2021 and we are only at the start of an exciting journey in a large, fast-growing online food delivery market, with a huge opportunity ahead," Shu said.

Deliveroo earlier this month announced that it made an underlying loss of $\pounds 223.7$ million in 2020.

That was despite the value of transactions rocketing 64 percent to \$4.1 billion. Since its London launch in 2013, Deliveroo has expanded into mainland Europe, Asia, Australia and the Middle East.

Last year, more than six million people ordered food and drink every month via its app from 115,000 cafes, restaurants and stores. However, its business model has come under scrutiny, including in Britain, France and Spain, as its freelance delivery riders complain about working conditions, reflecting wider concerns over their rights in the gig economy.

Britain's antitrust regulator last year approved Amazon's 16-percent investment in Deliveroo after an in-depth probe concluded it would not harm competition. Deliveroo has said that some £50 million of its shares will be made available for customers, with delivery riders and restaurant partners also able to participate. — AFP And a Turkish court has sentenced two pilots and another employee of a small private airline to four years and two months in prison for their role in Ghosn's escape.

NZ drafts plans for Australia travel bubble

WELLINGTON: New Zealand is finalizing a longawaited travel bubble with neighboring Australia and will reveal next month when trans-Tasman trips can resume, Prime Minister Jacinda Ardern said yesterday. Speaking almost exactly a year after New Zealand closed its borders as COVID-19 swept across the globe, Ardern acknowledged many Kiwis were impatient for quarantine-free travel to and from Australia. But she said the government would exercise the cautious approach that has seen New Zealand largely contain the virus, with just 26 deaths in a population of five million. "Many New Zealanders are nervous, they don't want to put everything we've fought so hard for at risk," she said during a press conference.

Before the pandemic, Australia was New Zealand's largest source of overseas visitors and many Kiwis have relatives living across the Tasman. All overseas arrivals to New Zealand must currently undergo two weeks quarantine, but Ardern said she would make an announcement on April 6 about when the requirement will be waived for arrivals from Australia. She said aspects of the plan were still being finalized, including contact tracing arrangements and making sure airlines were ready. She said a key consideration was what would happen if there was a major virus outbreak in Australia, prompting thousands of visiting New Zealanders to try to rush home. Australia has allowed quarantine-free travel for New Zealand arrivals since October, although the arrangement has been briefly suspended a number of times due to virus outbreaks in Auckland. — AFP

Blackstone launches \$6.2bn takeover bid for scandal-tainted Crown Resorts

Bid comes after Crown was denied license to run a Sydney casino


SYDNEY: US private equity giant Blackstone has launched a takeover bid for scandal-tainted Crown Resorts, just weeks after the Australian group was denied a license to run a multi-billion-dollar Sydney casino, the gaming group said yesterday.

Crown shares soared more than 20 percent on the Australian Stock Exchange after the pre-trading announcement it had received the "unsolicited, nonbinding and indicative proposal" from Blackstone on Sunday. The casino operator, which is subject to multiple inquiries into allegations of money-laundering and ties to organized crime, said the bid was for Aus\$11.85 per share, valuing the company at Aus\$8.02 billion (\$6.2 billion). Crown shares closed up 21 percent at Aus\$11.97. The Blackstone bid came after regulators refused to grant Crown a license to run its flagship casino in a gleaming 75-storey tower that dominates Sydney's waterfront owing to suspected links to organized crime. Authorities acted on the recommendations of a public inquiry, which reported Crown had been "facilitating" money-laundering through socalled "high roller" gambling junkets linked to Chinese triads and other organized criminal groups.

The company and its largest shareholder, media scion James Packer, had been in the spotlight since

media reports last year alleged that Crown casinos in Melbourne and Perth were used to launder profits from human trafficking, drugs, child sexual exploitation and terrorism. State authorities have announced probes into the operations of Crown in the two cities. Crown has also been suffering from a sharp drop in business caused by the coronavirus pandemic. Crown's CEO and three long-time directors resigned in the wake of the Sydney inquiry, while executive chairman Helen Coonan accepted its findings as "warranted" and said steps were being taken to improve the company's governance, compliance and culture.

The company last week also announced it was ceasing all political donations in Australia. Blackstone already has a 9.99 percent stake in Crown, which it bought in April 2020. It also has made forays into the hotel and casino business and currently owns the Cosmopolitan resort and casino in Las Vegas. The takeover bid is subject to conditions including due diligence, debt financing and Crown board support. If its takeover bid is successful, Blackstone will have to convince Australian regulators that it is a suitable entity to run casinos in the country. Crown said the board was yet to form a view and "will now commence a process to assess the proposal". — AFP

Hydrogen: Rhetoric rapidly turning into reality

staggeringly fast rise in energy stakeholders' appetite for hydrogen - potentially the world's 'new oil' - means blueprints in the Arab Gulf are transforming into real progress. France's EDF halts Myanmar dam project over coup

PARIS: An international consortium has suspended a \$1.5-billion hydropower dam project in Myanmar in response to last month's military coup, consortium member Electricite de France, a French utility, said Sunday. Nearly 250 people are confirmed dead in protests since the February 1 military coup, according to tolls compiled by NGOs, and more than 2,300 others have been arrested.

International condemnation from Washington, Brussels and the United Nations has so far failed to halt the bloodshed. "The project is suspended," an EDF spokesman told AFP on Sunday of the dam project.

The Shweli-3 671-megawatt project, still at an early

Quick, quick...

Putting its stamp on this burgeoning market is a clever move for Arab Gulf leaders. Home to some of the world's largest oil and gas producing companies, the region wants to remain relevant and be a significant stakeholder in the 21st century's energy transition. Blessed with high levels of solar irradiation and significant wind resources, the region has all the ingredients to deliver renewable electricity, which can enable it to become a global exporter of green hydrogen and its carrier products. Still, much more must be achieved quickly in order for the Arab Gulf to emerge as one of the world's leading hydrogen markets by the 2030s. This is especially true when considering the lead time of research and development, pilots, project construction, and sourcing finance and talent resources.

So far, there are more than 30 countries with hydrogen roadmaps worldwide, with 228 largescale hydrogen projects announced across the value chain. Of those, 85 percent are located in Europe, Asia, and Australia, according to the Hydrogen Insights 2021 report. If all the projects come to fruition, total investments will exceed \$300bn in spending through 2030 - prosperity that the Arab Gulf can benefit from. Of the \$300bn, just

Economists see Fed hiking lending rate sooner than expected

WASHINGTON: The Federal Reserve has vowed it won't raise its benchmark lending rate anytime soon, but US economists in a survey released yesterday believe the central bank could be forced to enact a hike as soon as next year. The National Association for Business Economics (NABE) reported 46 percent of participants surveyed see the central bank's policy-setting Federal Open Market Committee (FOMC) raising its lending rate in 2022, while 28 percent think they'll up it in 2023. Only 12 percent think the rate will be changed after that year, despite most officials at the conclusion of the

see a natural marrying of this international supplydemand dynamic. For example, Europe's biggest economy expects up to 110TWh of hydrogen will be needed by 2030. A potential import-export pathway between the UAE and Germany, for example, stretches more than 6,000 kilometers. So, shipping to Europe, followed by a land-based route needs choreographing.

Still, many questions must be answered for all regions to have success, not just the Arab Gulf. How to cut the cost of green hydrogen and make it financially comparative to other renewable energy types? How to bolster the scale of blue and green hydrogen? How to build the necessary infrastructure affordably and quickly, for both national use and export plans? The sooner the Arab Gulf can answer these questions, the greater its competitive stake in hydrogen – potentially the 21st century's biggest energy market.

Kuwait GDP recovers slightly in Q3 2020 as restrictions eased


Economy contracted by 11.5% y/y in 3Q20

KUWAIT: Kuwait's economy remained in recessionary territory in the third quarter of 2020, according to data recently released by the Central Statistical Bureau (CSB). Headline real GDP declined by 11.5 percent y/y in 3Q20, a fourth consecutive contraction in the quarterly series since 4Q19. While the economy did grow 1.2 percent q/q from the previous quarter, the CSB release reveals for the first time the scale of the contraction brought about by the coronavirus pandemic in 2020. Output in 2Q20 was especially hard hit, declining by 13.4 percent y/y (-12.5 percent q/q), amid the most stringent lockdown measures introduced last year.

OPEC+ policy

With Kuwait's oil sector comprising more than 51 percent of the country's total economic output in real terms, headline economic activity is therefore highly sensitive to the performance of the oil sector and changes in crude oil production. Real oil GDP in 3Q20 fell for the second quarter in a row in 3Q20 (-14.8 percent y/y; -8.2 percent q/q) as crude production declined almost 15 percent y/y (from 2.64 mb/d in 3Q19 to 2.25 mb/d in 3Q20) due to Kuwait's participation in the OPEC+ production cuts.

Production is likely to remain well below potential capacity until at least April 2022, when the current OPEC+ deal, signed in April 2020, is due to expire. Non-oil activity fell for a third consecutive quarter in 3Q20 (-7.7 percent y/y) though it did improve on 2Q20, increasing by 13.3 percent q/q, lifted by pent-up consumer demand. The almost 20 percent annual decline in economic activity in the second quarter of 2020 was unprecedented, with severe coronavirus mobility restrictions imposed in May forcing business-es to shutter and consumers to remain housebound. Construction, trade (wholesale and retail) and hospi-



tality (hotels and restaurants) were the three sectors worst affected by the pandemic in annual growth terms, contracting, by 65.9 percent, 47.8 percent and 44.4 percent, respectively. Little surprise, therefore, that once restrictions were eased from July onwards, these sectors recorded the quickest quarter-on-quarter turnaround in activity.


The release of pent-up demand was especially visible in the quarterly increase in consumer spending, as measured by KNet data, which jumped almost 68 percent q/q (+26.2 percent y/y) to KD6.1 billion-a level that was also maintained in 4Q20.

While almost all sectors in Kuwait's non-oil economy posted quarter-on-quarter gains in 3Q20, only a few recorded positive year-on-year output increases. Chief among these was public administration and defense, historically the largest component and contributor to the non-oil economy, which expanded by 3.9 percent y/y. The 'household with employed persons' (domestic workers) and education sub-sectors also grew, by 10 percent y/y and 0.7 percent y/y, respectively.

Looking ahead to full year real GDP outturns, headline growth is likely to come in at around -8 percent y/y, helped by expected improvements in the per-



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

COOPERATIVE AND ACTIVE': PANDA COUPLE MATES IN FRANCE

couple of giant pandas in captivity engaged in a rare weekend of love-making with the hoped-for result, an even rarer panda offspring, still too early to call, a French zoo said on Sunday. Huan Huan, a female panda on loan from China at the Beauval zoo in central France, was "put in contact" eight times on Saturday with partner Yuan Zi, it said. Female pandas are fertile only 24 to 48 hours per year and, in the wild, usually give birth every two years.

But in captivity, the tiny window of opportunity thwarts most attempts to procreate, as male pandas often appear to lose interest in the act or, lacking practice, don't know how to perform. But, as it turned out, the Beauval couple were "cooperative and rather active" as they got close, the zoo reported. Yuan Zi was "more at ease with the approach and the mating than in previous years", while Huan Huan, in heat, was "very interested". The pandas' keepers and vets won't be holding their breath for success, as there are no guarantees of pregnancy even after several rounds of

amorous activity. But the team felt that the performance "was rather good", and gave kudos to the panda male who "has made progress" since last year, according the zoo's chief vet, Baptiste Mulot. "He has a better idea of what to do," he said.

The zoo said "high-pitched sounds" from the female and "more husky" ones from the male gave the encounters their rhythm, "which is normal and a good sign". But for good measure the team added an artificial insemination during the night with the help of German specialists flown in for the operation which involved anaesthetizing the pandas briefly. Any pregnancy should be detected within two weeks, but even that would not necessarily spell success, as pandas often experience pseu-

do-pregnancies that fail to produce an embryo. Huan Huan in 2017 gave birth to Yuan Meng, the first panda born in France, after an artificial insemination. Now grown to around his mother's size, the young panda is this year to be sent to China where 500 pandas live in captivity, and 2,000 in the wild.— AFP

for shunning the limelight and poking fun at himself.

First ever tweet turns 15 years old

■ifteen years ago Jack Dorsey typed out a banal message-"just setting up my twttr"-which became the first ever tweet, launching a global platform that has become a controversial and dominant force in civil society. The short tweet on March 21, 2006 by the Twitter CEO is now being sold at auction, with bidding reaching \$2.5 million. It has been a long, strange journey for the social network, which in January deleted former president Donald Trump's account after he was blamed for inciting the violent insurrection on the US Capitol in January by extremist supporters seeking to overturn his election loss.



The banning of a head of state from the platform was both welcomed and denounced in a sign of the thin line Twitter and other social media networks often try to walk between neutrality, freedom of expression, and moderation and prevention of abuse. Bidding on Dorsey's tweet ends later Sunday. He has said he will donate the funds to charity. Dorsey's tweet will be sold as an NFT, or a non-fungible token. NFTs use the same blockchain technology behind cryptocurrencies to turn anything from art to sports trading cards into virtual collector's items that cannot be duplicated. — AFP

Poland's Adam Zagajewski, 'poet of 9/11' dies aged 75

Polish poet Adam Zagajewski, known for his work focused on the September 11, 2001, terrorist attack on the US, died aged 75 on Sunday in Krakow, Polish media reported quoting his publisher. Born in 1945 in Lviv, Zagajewski was one of Poland's most celebrated contemporary authors, winning numerous awards and was short-listed for the Nobel Prize for literature. He had divided his time between Poland and the United States, where he taught literature at the University of Chicago and was known as "the poet of 9/11".

He earned the moniker after the New Yorker magazine selected one of his poems-"Try to Praise the Mutilated World"-for the final page of its special issue on the September 11 terrorist attacks on the US in 2001. "You've seen the refugees going nowhere,/ you've heard the executioners sing joyfully," reads the poem he wrote months before the Twin Towers fell. "You should praise the mutilated world." Zagajewski's poems and essays were laced with history but also humor, and he was known

'WISH YOU WERE HERE': POSTCARDS HELP GERMANS CONNECT IN PANDEMIC

Brightly coloured rectangles of cardboard fill almost every wall of Gesa Funke's apartment in southern Berlin, with piles more stashed in corners and drawers-some from places as far-flung as French Polynesia. The 29-year-old student has been sending and collecting postcards for years. But, like many Germans, she has found herself putting pen to paper more often as a result of travel and other restrictions during the coronavirus pandemic. "It's a little less effort than writing a letter, and it's still nice to receive something from another person, to have a bit of contact," she says.

tact," she says. While many Germans have embraced digital technology in the virus

era, others have turned to more traditional forms of communication to keep in touch with loved ones. In December, Deutsche Post said it had carried 11 percent more postcards than during the same month the previous year "probably due to corona and Christmas". Funke told AFP that she had started sending more cards to her friends in Germany during the pandemic, "friends whom I would otherwise meet in person but that's not possible at the moment". She continues to send lots to both her grandmothers too, she says.

Birthday wishes

Overall last year, 120 million postcards were sent, down from 2019's 147 million, the German postal service said. However, the drop was less than expected, given international post was severely disrupted in the first wave of the pandemic. Holidays-usually a key reason for writing-had also largely evaporated because of stringent travel restrictions. But at the same time, there was an increase in people sending postcards for other reasons, according to the German MyPostcard app, which lets users print their own customized postcards. In 2019, the traditional "wish you were here" holiday note was the most common type of card sent. Last year, birthdays took the lead as the most popular reason.

New hobby

In October, around 66 percent of respondents to a YouGov survey for MyPostcard said they sent postcards regularly-compared with 57 percent of respondents to the same survey in 2019. Funke is a member of Post crossing, an international postcard exchange project with around 800,000 members in 207 countries. At more than nine million, Germany has sent more postcards than any other country under the project since it was founded 15 years ago.

People may have turned to postcards in the pandemic because they "have more time and simply want to try out a new hobby that they didn't know before", Funke suggests. "Others might have discovered this hobby for the first time because they travelled a lot before and that's no longer possible, so they have started to write postcards simply to see something of the world," she adds.

According to Postcrossing founder Paulo Magalhaes, the number of postcards sent under the project declined during the first wave of the pandemic because of snags in the postal system but picked up again later in 2020. "We are seeing this both in terms of number of (new) users and of postcards exchanged which is accelerating,"

TIME STANDS STILL AT HISTORIC CAIRO WATCH SHOP

Time seems to have stood still at Papazian's, an Armenian Egyptian watchmaker whose almost 120year-old Cairo shop has withstood the decades, surviving political upheavals and urban transformations. Sheltered from the hustle and bustle of the capital's unforgiving traffic and surrounded by street vendors in Attaba Square, the unassuming shop housed under the arcades of an old Haussmannian building is a time capsule of Cairo's rich cosmopolitan history.

It is a rare museum-like site where old clocks, watches and timepieces are meticulously repaired. "I have spare parts from my grandfather's days," Ashod Papazian, the current 64-year-old owner who inherited the family business, told AFP. The shopfront with patinated wooden frames boasts an impressive array of pocket watches and wrist models with ageing bracelets, as well as yellowed advertisements of the vaunted watchmaker. At the turn of the 19th century, Egypt had become a popular destination for Armenians who specialised in delicate manual crafts such as jewellerymaking, along with a thriving European community that included Italians, Greeks, Jews and French citizens.

The Armenian community, estimated to have numbered between 40,000 and 60,000 before Egypt's 1952 antimonarchy revolution, mostly living in Cairo and Alexandria, has dwindled to only around a few thousand now. In his small office surrounded by a quaint mess of archives, books and clocks of all kinds, Ashod is the keeper of precious memories. Two black-and-white portraits hang behind his armchair: of his grandfather Nerses, known as Francis, the founder of the store, and of Ashod's own father Sarkis.

Under the more than century-old counters, dozens of wooden drawers contain spare parts of almost every imaginable brand of watch. Antique comtoise pendulum chimes or cuckoo clocks-some from the 19th century-occupy every inch of available wall space. They belong to customers who have entrusted him to repair them or owned by the watch enthusiast himself-who refuses to part with his rarest timepieces.

The Rich and Famous

In 1893, Nerses Papazian, drafted into the Ottoman army, escaped by jumping on a boat without knowing his final destination, his grandson told AFP. He ended up in Alexandria on Egypt's Mediterranean coast. Ten years later, he opened the watch shop in Cairo that carries his name on the storefront to this day. Building a reputation, he attracted several stars from the golden age of Egyptian cinema such as Youssef Wahbi, Fouad el-Mohandes and Abdelmoneim Ibrahim as customers.

Papazian also said the family of King Farouk, Egypt's last monarch, called his father Sarkis to the royal palace to have their pick from a wide array of watches.

Later when Egypt's Free Officers movement led by Gamal Abdel Nasser, the country's first president, overthrew the monarchy, the newly-established republic's elite also adopted Papazian. "After the revolution there were (army) officers who dropped by, they were friends with my dad. They loved watches," he said. Papazian's retains many loyal customers, but there are no succession plans on the cards for his two sons in their 20s.

"Most of the clients have become friends. We don't have anyone just passing through here," he explained. Talaat Farghaly, 71, said he has been frequenting the shop ever since 1965. The Armenian watchmaker is "very reliable", he said. "We respectfully call him 'Khawaga' (the foreigner)," said Farghaly, who works in import-export. Ahmed el-Melegy, 62, a printer, is also an aficionado with more than 35 in his watch collection. "My passion for clocks began in 1984," he told AFP. "I often passed Ashod's shop and was fascinated. One day I decided to buy myself a clock for my wedding. Since then I haven't been able to stop," he recalled. — AFP

Euro teams start World Cup qualifying campaign amid COVID-19 chaos

France host Ukraine behind closed doors tomorrow

PARIS: Holders France begin their defense of the World Cup this week as European qualifying for the 2022 finals in Qatar gets underway against a backdrop of confusion and chaos over the release of players in a worrying health context across the continent.

While this month's scheduled qualifiers in South America were called off and most matches in Asia were postponed, players in Europe are having to work their way around travel restrictions in order to join up with national teams.

FIFA's decision to relax rules forcing clubs to release players during an international window remains in place until the end of April, with world football's governing body unable to ignore the wider context of the COVID-19 crisis. The consequences of that have largely been confusion and plenty of backtracking by clubs and authorities in recent days. Winners in 2018, France host Ukraine behind closed doors tomorrow before flying 5,500 kilometers (3,418 miles) to Kazakhstan and stopping off on the way back in Sarajevo for another game against Bosnia and Herzegovina.

The trip has caused some controversy in France, with authorities allowing members of the French team to go to Central Asia and then the Balkans while the French league said it would not release players to travel out with the 27-nation European Union or European Economic Area (EAA), which also includes Iceland, Liechtenstein and Norway.

That was due to clubs being worried about players having to self-isolate for a week on their return, thereby missing their team's next league game. A row ensued, with the decision affecting several European nations with players based in Ligue 1, but also many African national teams looking to call up players for Africa Cup of Nations qualifiers.

U-turns

"I'm not a politician, I'm just an ordinary guy, but it's not fair. It is not wise at the moment either. We need to stick together and not show discrimination or racism. It doesn't give a good image,' said Lyon captain Memphis Depay, with the Dutch international at risk of missing his country's qualifier in Turkey as a result.

Realizing it was not a good look, the French sports ministry announced over the weekend that all players could be released after all, saying they would be "exempt from a seven-day isolation as long as they respect a strict health and medical protocol" on returning.

U-turns have happened elsewhere, with Bayern Munich announcing on Saturday that star Polish striker Robert Lewandowski and Austrian defender David Alaba would be released for international duty due to a change in Germany's COVID-19 travel restrictions.

Lewandowski can now play for Poland against England at Wembley on March 31, while Alaba can feature for Austria against Scotland in Glasgow on Thursday. Bayern had initially said neither player would be released to play in the UK as Germany had insisted on a two-week quarantine for anyone travelling from Britain. 'We gave the go-ahead for both players," confirmed Bayern coach Hansi Flick.

Punishing schedule

Some countries have been forced to take quite drastic action to get around possible restrictions. Portugal moved their qualifier against Azerbaijan to Turin in Italy. Had the game gone ahead in Lisbon, they feared having to leave out 10 Premier League-based players who faced having to self-isolate for 10 days on

The decision to make teams play three qualifiers in seven days just before the run-in to the club season, despite the travel difficulties, also raises eyebrows as it means no let-up for elite players in a punishing schedule. It is worth pondering what kind of physical condition they will be in by the time the delayed Euro 2020 starts on

June 11. For now it is all about the road to Qatar.

Despite qualifying automatically as hosts, Qatar have already taken part in the Asian qualifying tournament and will now be involved in the European competition too. They will be sparring partners for teams in Group A and will play games in Hungary against Luxembourg, Azerbaijan and the Republic of Ireland. —AFP

LONDON: Leicester sent Manchester United crashing out of the FA Cup as Kelechi Iheanacho's double sealed a 3-1 win, while Chelsea will face Manchester City in the semi-finals after beating Sheffield United on Sunday. Brendan Rodgers' side can look forward to meeting Southampton in their first FA Cup semi-final since 1982 thanks to



Juve's title hopes rocked, Milan keep pressure on Inter

MILAN: Juventus' hopes of winning a 10th consecutive Serie A title took another blow on Sunday with a 1-0 home loss to lowly Benevento as AC Milan closed the gap on leaders Inter Milan with a hard-fought 3-2 win at Fiorentina.

Adolfo Gaich scored the only goal in the 69th minute at Juve's Allianz Stadium following a bad pass across his own penalty area by midfielder Arthur. Andrea Pirlo's side stay third, 10 points behind Inter whose match against Sassuolo was postponed because of a COVID-19 outbreak at the league leaders.

Second-placed Milan are four points ahead of the reigning champions after they recovered from their Europa League exit to Manchester United by cutting the deficit to Inter to six points with a 3-2 win over Fiorentina.

For Juve, who have 11 games left to play this season, it was another blow after being dumped out of the Champions League at the last 16 stage by Porto earlier this month. "We performed poorly, in every aspect," said Pirlo. "We have to continue to believe in the title. The objective does not change, it's the mindset which must.'

Serie A top scorer Cristiano Ronaldo, who has netted 23 times in the league this season, drew a blank in Turin a week after reaching 770 goals to beat Pele's all-time mark of 767, with Benevento goalkeeper Lorenzo Montipo pulling off a string of fine saves.

Benevento broke the deadlock following Arthur's horrendous pass across the face of goal towards Danilo, which allowed Gaich to pounce and score his second goal in five games since arriving on loan from CSKA Moscow.

Montipo denied Ronaldo twice late on as Juve pushed for a leveler, first from close range with 10 minutes to go and again in the final minute, with Danilo sending the subsequent rebound over the bar. Benevento now sit seven points away from the drop zone in 16th. —AFP

tional break might offer Diego Simeone's side a chance to reset and refresh ahead of the run-in. "There are games where vou suffer but that's what makes football beautiful," said Oblak. Simeone said: "Like all great teams, there is always one that scores a lot of goals and one that makes a lot of saves. They are both decisive players who make the team stronger."

Barcelona have hit their stride, their six goals against Real Sociedad no less than they deserved for a scintillating attacking display, and perhaps their best since Ronald Koeman took charge. "The team has improved a lot recently," said Koeman. "We've gone a lot of games without losing in the league, which was the only way to get back in the fight for the title. "But we're still behind Atleti, Real Madrid are stronger. We have to keep going to the end."

Messi breaks record

Messi scored his 11th and 12 goals in his last 10 games, and made it 16 in 12 this year. The 33-year-old has also now passed Xavi Hernandez's record of 767 Barcelona appearances, which he had

PSG beat Lyon to go top in **France Ligue 1**

PARIS: Kylian Mbappe warned he is "only just getting started" after scoring his 100th goal in France's top flight as Paris Saint-Germain swept aside title rivals Lyon 4-2 on Sunday to move to the top of Ligue 1 following a shock defeat for previous leaders Lille earlier.

Mbappe netted twice at the Groupama Stadium with Danilo Pereira and Angel Di Maria also on target before Islam Slimani and Maxwel Cornet pulled goals back for the home side. The result allowed Mauricio Pochettino's team to move into first place on goal difference from Lille, who were beaten 2-1 at home by struggling Nimes in a huge blow to their own title hopes.

Spanish title race.

Lyon would have gone top themselves with a victory but instead they remain three points off the lead in third place, while Monaco are another point back in fourth after winning 4-0 at Saint-Etienne on Friday. Mbappe is Ligue 1's leading scorer with 20 goals this season and has reached a century of goals in France's top flight in 142 appearances at the age of just 22.

"I knew I was just two goals away. It's a new step in my career, another step towards history. These are things that stay with you," Mbappe told Canal Plus. "I am only just getting started. I still have a lot of years in front of me to perfect and improve my game so I think it can only get better.'

It was a perfect night for PSG, as the reigning champions bounced back from a surprise 2-1 home loss to relegationthreatened Nantes last week and claimed a win against a direct rival in the title race for the first time this season.

They also saw Neymar return after a month and a half, and nine games, out injured. The world's most expensive player came on as a substitute, replacing Mbappe midway through the second half. Mbappe was close to his electrifying best and the World Cup winner opened the scoring 15 minutes in, following up to find the net after Marco Verratti's shot was parried by Lyon goalkeeper Anthony Lopes.

Marquinhos then nodded down a Presnel Kimpembe cross for Pereira to slam in and make it 2-0 just after the halfhour mark, and any hopes Lyon had of a comeback were blown away at the start of the second half. First Di Maria whipped in a free-kick from wide on the right that evaded everyone on its way into the net, and then Verratti released Mbappe to break clear and finish for his second of the game on 52 minutes. —AFP

Hamilton faces serious challenge in pursuit of eighth Formula One title

Season begins Sunday with record 23-race global calendar

LONDON: Lewis Hamilton begins his bid for an unprecedented eighth drivers' world championship next week facing a cluster of challenges to his crown, as Formula One launches its cost-cutting era with a record 23-race global calendar.

The defending champion passed his 36th birthday in January and struggled this month in pre-season testing, which was dominated by Max Verstappen and a reinvigorated Red Bull, having after long delays committed to only a one-year contract, for 2021, during the sport's brief off-season.

After contracting COVID-19 and duly missing the Sakhir Grand Prix last year, Hamilton had returned to be beaten in the season-ending Abu Dhabi race by Verstappen — a 'blip' that may be seen by some as an early signal of a decline in his powers, which will have encouraged not only the young Dutchman, but others. After reeling off seven consecutive constructors' championships - and seven 'doubles' of team and driver titles -Hamilton's 'black arrows' are under serious threat and both he and teammate Valtteri Bottas know it.

"They're going to be a different animal this year," Hamilton said of Red Bull, after testing at Sakhir's Bahrain International Circuit, where the jumbosized 2021 season, a second in succession to run under pandemic protocol conditions, begins. "They've had some really good running with a strong line-up of the two drivers and a really good car. Having seen them win the last race, you can only assume they're going to be right there, at the front, in the first race. It's going to be a great long battle with them this year."

The prospect of a long-awaited wheel-to-wheel 'battle royal' between the sport's most outstanding drivers, notwithstanding Fernando Alonso's return, will be welcomed by F1 fans worldwide as an antidote to the predictability of last year when Hamilton won 11 and team-mate Bottas two of the 17 races.

As Verstappen and his new Red Bull teammate

Suns set down LeBron-less Lakers, 76ers edge Knicks

LOS ANGELES: The Los Angeles Lakers got a hard look at life without injured superstar LeBron James on Sunday in a 111-94 NBA loss to the Phoenix Suns. Devin Booker and Deandre Ayton scored 26 points apiece and Chris Paul had a triple-double of 11 points, 10 rebounds Suns who led a Lakers team that coach Frank Vogel acknowledged must find a "new identity" as James recovers from a high ankle sprain suffered in a loss to Atlanta on Saturday.

Sergio Perez ran smoothly through 369 trouble-free laps in testing, Mercedes struggled to complete 304, Hamilton spinning off twice and suffering gearbox problems. The team's chief strategist James Vowles admitted: "No-one up and down the paddock will be able to pin-point where they are exactly, but there are a few trends — and I would say Red Bull are ahead on performance.

"They are the class act from this test, but it is only a test. It is not a race." He conceded that a close season is in prospect, as Hamilton also forecast as he digs into his reserves for a 15th consecutive year and, this time, in direct competition with a ferocious competitor who is 13 years his junior.

Verstappen was delighted by his team's powerful signal of intent in recruiting Perez and then shining in testing, but he said nothing could indicate their competitiveness until after qualifying at the opening race, the first to run with 'financial regulations' embedded in the rule book.

An early result of the cost cuts was that testing was reduced to only three days while team spending in operational budgets this year is capped at \$145 million (122 million euros). A further reduction to 140 million is planned for 2022 when the sport's latest radical overhaul is set to be introduced.

That means this season will see only minor tweaks to the rules affecting the cars, but the combination of reduced budgets and other changes may provide a greater challenge to big factory teams like Mercedes or Ferrari, than their smaller opponents.

Speed in testing

Red Bull know how to win titles - they won four drivers' championships in succession with Sebastian Vettel - and in Adrian Newey possess arguably the finest car designer of the modern era. Verstappen's speed in testing suggested they have a car to match his talent and ambitions this year.

F1 welcomes return of the Schumacher name

PARIS: For the winner of the Formula Two world championship to make the step up to F1 is a natural progression that would not normally raise an eyebrow – but when that driver carries a famous name things

are bound to be a little different. Mick Schumacher, son of the seven-time world champion Michael, is the young driver in the spotlight as he makes his Formula One debut for Haas in Bahrain on Sunday, but he thoroughly merits his drive. After starting his career in karting, Mick went on to win the Formula 3 European championship in 2018 and the Formula Two title in 2020. Not a bad CV for a young man who turned 22 vesterday. But next week, the noise around him will echo with reminders of his father whose last race in a glittering career came in Brazil at the end of the 2012 season. The 52-year-old Michael Schumacher has not been seen in public for more than seven years after a skiing accident, witnessed by Mick, in the French Alps left him with severe brain injuries. But he remains the touchstone for his son. "I definitely look at what he achieved, and I try to learn from it." said Mick in February. For the younger generation who arrived on the scene too late to see Michael in action, or those who only remember him from his underwhelming comeback with Mercedes, it is easy to forget how Schumacher dominated the sport every bit as much as Lewis Hamilton does today. He won two titles with Benetton before taking the big move to Ferrari with whom he won another five titles. "He's been the benchmark for so long and for me he's still the benchmark, so I'll always refer to him,"

With 17-time All-Star James sidelined, the Lakers struggled to get their offense going. Montrezl Harrell led Los Angeles with 23 points off the bench and Dennis Schroder added 22, but the Lakers connected on just 41.2 percent of their shots from the field.

It was a milestone game for Paul, whose alley-oop pass to Ayton for a dunk in the third quarter made him just the sixth player in NBA history with 10,000 assists.

Randle riled

The Eastern Conference-leading Philadelphia 76ers escaped with a 101-100 overtime victory over the New York Knicks, with Tobias Harris draining two free throws with 5.3 seconds remaining to seal the victory. Harris went to the line after a foul by New York forward Julius

Shake Milton led the 76ers with 21 points off the bench. Harris added 20 points and guard Ben Simmons returned from a one-game injury absence to score 16 for a Philadelphia team still without star big man Joel Embiid and sharp-shooter Seth Curry. The victory kept the Sixers a game ahead of the Brooklyn Nets, who beat the Washington Wizards 113-106 thanks to 28 points from Kyrie Irving and 26 from James Harden.

Former All-Star Blake Griffin played his first game for Brooklyn since signing with them as a free agent, scoring his only basket of the night in the fourth quarter on a two-handed dunk that had his new Nets teammates cheering. Nicolas Claxton added 16 points for the Nets, who rallied from a 20-6 first-quarter deficit and withstood Russell Westbrook's triple-double of 29 points, 13 rebounds and 13 assists.

Lu Dort was the hero for Oklahoma City, scoring 23 points and coming up with a "heroic" late block on Houston's John Wall as the Thunder handed the Rockets a 20th straight defeat, 114-112. The Thunder led by one when Dort missed a three-point attempt and the Rockets snagged the rebound with 15.8 seconds remaining.

Wall drove past Dort to the rim, but Dort managed to swat the ball cleanly away from behind, denying Wall's layup with nine seconds remaining. "Honestly that was a heroic play," Thunder center Moses Brown said. "I've never seen anything like it and it was so clutch." Dort acknowledged that Wall "kind of beat me, so I just had to recover and not give up on that play." —AFP

Former world champion Nico Rosberg, whose father Keke had won the title in 1982, 24 years before he debuted in F1, highlighted the extra pressure that Mick would face having a famous father. "It's not easy to be the 'son of'," Rosberg told website Sport1. "And with Mick, it is 10 times more difficult, because Michael's era was not so long ago and he was much more successful. I hope Mick can put that aside and concentrate well on his job — because otherwise it takes a lot of the fun away."

Even without the pressure of the spotlight, it was never going to be an easy entrance for Mick. His Haas team are likely to feature in the middle and rear of the pack while his teammate, fellow rookie Nikita Mazepin perhaps faces even greater pressure. He is also a 'son of' although not Formula One aristocracy. Rather, his billionaire father Dmitry Mazepin is a non-executive director of Russian company Uralkali, who are the main title partner of the Haas team.

There is a good chance, however, that Mick will fare better than his dad did when he turned out for Jordan in his first Grand Prix in Belgium in 1991. Michael Schumacher did brilliantly to qualify in seventh but a failed clutch meant he did not make it beyond the opening lap of the race itself. Whether he will come anywhere close to 91 race wins and seven world titles, only time will tell. No pressure at all. —AFP

Olympics' overseas fan ban hits Japan tourism

Government hoped event might bring 600,000 visitors

TOKYO: Toshiko Ishii spent \$180,000 renovating her traditional Japanese inn in expectation of a flood of tourists for the Tokyo Olympics, but now she won't be hosting a single overseas fan. After Olympics organizers announced a ban on spectators from abroad, those working in Japan's tourism industry are counting their losses.

Experts say the impact will be limited compared to the much larger blow brought by the pandemic, adding there is hope that tourism will rebound as life moves towards normality. But it is a big setback for an industry that had high hopes for the Games after a dizzying upswing in business during the 2019 Rugby World Cup. "I am guessing foreign visitors won't be allowed until at least September. You have to look ahead and plan ahead to run a business," said Ishii.

"If you react emotionally at every turn of events, then you cannot sustain yourself," she added. In preparation for the influx, Ishii doubled the size of her hotel's restaurant and upgraded the antique decor and kitchen. "I was thinking, 'Next year with the Olympics, everything is going to be going up and up'," she told AFP. "Now all of a sudden everything has evaporated."

Bolstered by the Rugby World Cup, Japan welcomed a record 31.9 million foreign visitors in 2019, and was on track to achieve its goal of 40 million in 2020. But last March strict virus border rules were imposed, all but barring foreign tourists, and the Tokyo Olympics were postponed for a year.

'Major economic loss'

Yui Oikawa, a manager at Tokyo Rickshaw, which operates tours in the historic Asakusa district, had assumed the Olympics, now starting in July, would bring roaring sales and customers from around the world. "I was sad and disappointed... but you cannot stand still," he said, saying his company is implementing strict sanitation measures to keep domestic customers coming. "We are looking at this period as a time to build up our strength," added Oikawa, saying that staff were working on their customer pitches and knowledge of the area. Organizers hoped to sell around 630,000 tickets outside Japan for the Games. Japan's government hoped the event might bring 600,000 overseas visitors to the country.

But the boost from Olympic visitors is often overestimated, analysts say. Their spending would probably have totaled 95 billion yen (\$870 million), equivalent to 0.02 percent of Japan's GDP, research firm Capital Economics said in a November estimate.

A decision on whether to limit domestic fans has not yet been made, but crowd restrictions and the exclusion of foreign fans could mean losses of around 200 billion yen (\$1.8 billion), according to Takahide Kiuchi, an executive economist at Nomura Research Institute. "That is not big enough to sway the Japanese economy, but it still is certainly a major economic loss," he wrote in a report.

Rooms at the inn

The world's third largest economy is looking to other ways to grow this year, from exports to government stimulus measures, after a GDP contraction of 4.8 percent in coronavirus-hit 2020. The tourism drought looks set to continue, even after the end of a virus state of emergency which included early closing for bars and restaurants.

Domestic travel ticked up in the second half of 2020 thanks to a controversial government campaign that ended in late December as infections rose. Polls show most in Japan back the ban on foreign fans, and economists say the country should be looking to increased consumption for economic growth as the pandemic wanes.

Meanwhile, the tourism industry can do little more than hope for better days ahead. "You cannot blame this on anyone," said Hideyuki Sato, a

senior director at the Japan Ryokan and Hotel Association. "Once this ends and travel resumes, we believe that there will be strong international demand for tourism to Japan," he told AFP.

Inn owner Ishii is keeping busy learning recipes and sharing her new culinary creations online with regular clients abroad. She's dependent on public loans to stay afloat, and her hopes for the future are tempered by anxiety about her finances and whether tourism will recover. "I'll work hard to pay off what I borrowed, but worry about what may happen after that." — AFP





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
