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

# Social life returns to Kuwait; experts give Ramadan tips

# 'Follow healthy lifestyle during Ramadan to reduce weight'

KUWAIT: Social and economic life returned to normal in Ramadan this year following two years of lockdowns and curfews because of the coronavirus pandemic, with people keen on resuming gatherings and normal shopping. "Psychologically, most people feel positive during this year's Ramadan following the lifting of the coronavirus restrictions, which encouraged them to return to their normal Ramadan practices," Dr Saud Al-Ghanem, Sociology professor at Kuwait University (KU), said.

Speaking to KUNA, Al-Ghanem said people would notice roads' congestions, more visits and an increase in shopping activities. Economy will flourish during Ramadan as well, he added, because people tend to increase purchases of accessories, food and clothes - usually associated with the holy month. Dr Khodhr Al-Baroun, a professor of psychology at KU, said family gatherings would

increase this year with extended families having Iftar (breakfast) meals, making "this blessed month quite different than rest of the months of the year.

"Anxiety over the pandemic during the last two years vanished and this will increase gatherings among family members and friends," he said. Dr Ahmad Al-Shatti, Director of Ahmadi medical area, urged people to follow healthy lifestyle during Ramadan so as to reduce weight and improve their physical and psychological well-being.

He urged families to keep their children out of the kitchen in order to prevent accidents. Al-Shatti also urged worshippers to wear masks while in mosques, and people in general to avoid crowds. He said 85 percent of people have been vaccinated in Kuwait but people still have to be careful by following health guidelines. — KUNA

# Ramadan: My greatest teacher

f Ramadan was a person, she would be the toughest teacher you ever had - the one who had strict rules, gave lots of homework, and drilled you until she was sure you understood the lessons she was trying to teach. Or Ramadan would be your coach who made you train hard, demanding more of you than you thought you could handle, challenging you every day until you mastered the moves or continually beat your pre-

These are the people who not only believed in the value of what they taught, but even more so, they believed in your capacity for achievement and growth. They worked you hard because they wanted you to succeed. They didn't just want you to pass their test or win the race, they wanted to change you forever - to transform you into a confident, disciplined and ambitious person. They wanted you to win.

These are the people we feared, obeyed, respected, and eventually loved. These are the people who impacted our lives in untold ways, making us our best selves. We vaguely remember the grueling work and pain of their ways, but we will never forget what we learned about ourselves and how they made us feel.

Similar in every way, Ramadan has been my greatest teacher and coach. Ramadan has returned every year to remind me what I need to do to succeed, and to prove to me that I can do it. In the early years, it was about submitting my will to my Creator's will. I fasted because the Quran said, "Those of you who see the month shall fast." (2:185). It was hard, very hard. But I did it. Year after year, I fulfilled the requirements. But Ramadan wasn't satisfied with mere compliance. There was much more to learn.

I could have cheated. Nobody could have known for sure if I was really fasting. But I didn't, and that's when fasting honed my sincerity and integrity. If I were fasting for the people, to fit in or meet social or cultural expectations, I would have cheated all those times when I missed suhoor and started my fast on an empty stomach. It was those days when my sincerity was tested.



# Russia accused of war crimes

**ODESSA:** Ukraine on Sunday accused Russian troops of war crimes after the discovery of mass graves and civilians apparently "executed" in the streets of Bucha, near the capital Kyiv. The claims came as explosions rocked the Black Sea port city of Odessa, which has largely been spared in the conflict, with air strikes apparently targeting key infrastructure.

In Bucha, AFP reporters saw at least 20 bodies, all in civilian clothing, strewn across a single street. One had his hands tied behind his back with a white cloth, and his Ukrainian pass-

rocketing poverty rates. Last year, he packed his

bags and boarded a plane from Beirut to Baghdad,

Lebanese flee crisis using social media to search for opportunities.

"I didn't have enough time to look for a job in the Gulf," the 42-year-old said, explaining why he eschewed the more traditional path for those seeking economic opportunities in the region. With its relative proximity and visas on arrival for Lebanese, the Iraqi capital seemed a good option. "I had to take quick action, and so I came to Baghdad and began searching for work on Instagram," Johari said, speaking in a restaurant he has run for about a month.

Lebanon is grappling with an unprecedented financial crisis that the World Bank says is of a scale

usually associated with war. Beirut's crisis, driven by years of endemic corruption, has seen Lebanon's currency lose more than 90 percent of its value against the dollar. Lebanon's 675,000-pound monthly minimum wage now fetches around \$30 on the black market, and about 80 percent of the population now lives in poverty, according to the UN. When he left Beirut, Johari was earning the equivalent of about \$100 per month. In Iraq, he earns enough to support his family back home, he said.

More than 20,000 Lebanese citizens arrived in Iraq between June 2021

# Doctor warns of bad eating habits in Ramadan

KUWAIT: Internist consultant, gastrointestinal and liver specialist Dr Wafaa Al-Hashash said some people in Ramadan, particularly those with digestive system and colon problems, have some bad habits which lead to many health problems, causing discomfort. She said digestive system complaints increase in Ramadan, "bearing in mind that the same advice we give each year goes unheeded and patients come back only to ask the same questions, and receive the same old answer".

She said the most common problems of the digestive system in Ramadan include heartburn, GERD and indigestion. She said these conditions occur due to suddenly overeating after long hours



of fasting, in addition to eating large amounts of fatty foods and hot spices.

Dr Hashash advised those fasting to avoid these problems by drinking more water, as it keeps the body hydrated and helps prevent other problems related to fasting long hours, such as constipation, headache or backache; avoid fizzy

drinks because they contain too much sugar, while the gases from sugar fermentation may cause bloating; avoid overeating because a big sudden meal causes stomach cramps and severe GERD.

"Avoid foods rich in fats because they take longer to digest and may cause nausea. Eat more fiber. Do not sleep on a full stomach. Adding to the above advice for those with colon problems: Avoid chili and hot spices, fried food, oil, ghee, rich foods, garlic and legumes," she added.

#### Ultra fuel price up

KUWAIT: Kuwait National Petroleum Company (KNPC) announced on Sunday raising the fuel of vehicles (Ultra Octane-98) to 235 fils instead of 200 as of April first for three months. The move was taken upon a decision of the Ministry of Finance's subsidies committee, the company wrote on its Twitter account, noting that the price of other kinds of fuel is unchanged.


#### **KAC** resumes flights to Salalah

# Al-Ojairi Scientific Center tracks Sun's movement

KUWAIT: In a documentary scientific study, led by Al-Ojairi Scientific Center, a site was located with the goal of following the movement of the Sun over a period of six months and photographing it in order to monitor and document the highest and lowest points the Sun reaches over the seasons of

The highest point of the Sun's path in the image Sun reaches its maximum altitude in Kuwait at an almost vertical angle of 84.17 degrees, while the lowest point of the Sun represents the winter season (the winter solstice) where the Sun reaches its lowest elevation in Kuwait with an oblique angle of 37.17 degrees.

The lines represented in the image indicate the movement of the Sun throughout the day. Sunny days leave a solid line, and the Sun gets lower in the sky with each passing day. Partly sunny days have a broken line, and no line appears on overcast days.

Dr Abrar Ahmed Al-Ali, a professional researcher in the field of solar physics and the project supervisor, noted that the Sun is the planet's primary source of heat and energy, as well as one of the most significant sources of clean and

Thus, one must have a better understanding of the Sun and its impact on the Earth. This led to the notion of monitoring and documenting the Sun's movement in the sky as an initial step towards gain-

ing a better knowledge of it.

The path of the Sun is a key concept when developing a solar power system and trying to comprehend its performance. The Sun's path refers to the seasonal and hourly changes of the Sun as the Earth spins and orbits the Sun. This is related to the solar energy system in various ways. For instance, the influence of the length of the shadow and the tilt angle of the Sun on the system's pe formance.

The image was produced using a pinhole camera built by photographer and Solargrafia project creator Diego Lopez Calvin, which used recycled cans designed for long exposures and photosensitive materials that leave an imprint as the Sun moves.

# Bodies litter Ukraine town's street of death

# Around 280 people have been buried in mass graves in Bucha

**BUCHA:** The bodies are strewn across the quiet tree-lined street in the town of Bucha as far as the eye can see. All 20 are in civilian clothing, and all have their different poses in death. Some lie with sightless eyes staring at Ukraine's overcast sky, some lie face down on the tarmac. Three of them are tangled up in bicycles after taking their final ride, while others, with waxy skin, have fallen next to bullet-ridden and crushed cars.

One has his hands tied behind his back with a white cloth, and his Ukrainian passport left open beside his corpse, said AFP journalists who accessed the town. Another lies next to a yellow hoarding spraypainted with happy and sad emojis and the words "Live Fast".

Russia's hasty retreat from its occupation of the region around Kyiv is revealing fresh devastation by the day. "All these people were shot, killed, in the back of the head," mayor Anatoly Fedoruk told AFP. Another 280 people have been buried in mass graves in Bucha while the bodies of whole families still lie in shot-up cars, he said.

Surrounded by the pine forests that stretch up to Belarus, Bucha was a picture of sleepy suburbia northwest of the Ukrainian capital until the Russian invasion. A month of fierce battles in towns like Bucha and nearby Irpin prevented Moscow's forces from encircling Kyiv some 25 kilometres (14 miles) away.

## 'Russian occupation'

The cost was utter devastation. Gaping holes from shell explosions can be seen in building after building, while crushed cars litter the streets, said the AFP team who reached Bucha after it had been closed off from the world for nearly a month.

as if he has fallen and cannot get back up. All were wearing civilian clothes-winter coats, jackets or tracksuit tops, jeans or jogging bottoms, and trainers or boots.

Violence is everywhere: A silver car is covered with bullet holes, another is partly crushed, while a burned out van lies near one group of bodies. "These are the consequences of Russian occupation," says the mayor. Yet the horrors of war have become so routine in Bucha that the remaining residents walk down the street past the bodies, barely casting a glance.

#### 'They are running'

Ukrainian forces have only just secured Bucha and started their first aid deliveries on Saturday, so the dead must lie unburied for a while longer. Soldiers hand out food and medicine to desperate survivors from the back of a green military truck. Another body lies under a sheet about 100 metres away.

It is the first such delivery in more than a month, after Ukraine said Saturday that Russian forces were making a "rapid retreat" from Kyiv. "They are running," says Yuriy Biriukov, a senior member of Ukraine's volunteer territorial defence squad overseeing the aid operation.

Bucha's residents were "still very afraid, still shocked", he added. "Regular civilians cannot even imagine the conditions in which they lived during this one month, with artillery, without supply of rood and waer, without any possibility to get out."

One resident showed AFP what he said was a grave, topped with a green wooden cross, in the back garden of a neighbouring house where four people including a child were buried. The people who have stayed in Bucha are

# Singaporeans protest the death penalty

SINGAPORE: Hundreds of protesters in tightly controlled Singapore staged a rare demonstration against the death penalty Sunday as fears grow the city-state is set to carry out a wave of hangings. Authorities last week conducted the country's first execution since 2019 when they hanged a drug trafficker. Several other death row convicts recently had appeals rejected.

Organisers said about 400 people joined the demonstration at "Speakers' Corner" in a downtown park, the only place in the city-state where protests are allowed without prior police approval. They held signs reading "Capital punishment does not make us safer", and "Don't kill in our names", and chanted slogans against the death penalty.

"Capital Punishment is a brutal system that makes brutes of us all," Kirsten Han, a prominent local activist, said in an address to the crowd. "Instead of pushing us to address inequalities and exploitative and oppressive systems that leave people marginalised and unsupported, it makes us the worst version of ourselves."

Protests are unusual in Singapore, which frequently faces criticism for curbing civil liberties. Aside from in "Speakers' Corner", it is illegal for even one person to stage a demonstration without a police permit. Abdul Kahar Othman, a 68-year-old Singaporean drug trafficker, was hanged Wednesday despite appeals for clemency from the United Nations and rights groups.

Next in line to be executed could be Nagaenthran K. Dharmalingam, a mentally disabled Malaysian convicted of heroin trafficking who lost his final appeal last week. His case has attracted a storm of criticism, including from the European Union and British billionaire Richard Branson.

Three other men sentenced to death for drugs offences had their appeals rejected earlier in March. Prosperous but socially conservative Singapore has some of the world's toughest drugs laws, and has faced mounting calls from rights groups to abandon the death penalty.

Authorities insist that capital punishment remains an effective deterrent against drug trafficking and has helped to keep the city-state one of the safest places in Asia. —AFP

The new incidents come six weeks after flash floods and landslides killed 233 people in the scenic city of Petropolis, the Brazilian empire's 19th-century summer capital, also in Rio state. This time, the areas hit hardest included the tourist town of Paraty, a seaside colonial city known for its picturesque cobblestone streets and colorful houses.

Officials there said a landslide in the Ponta Negra neighborhood had killed a mother and six of her children, ages two, five, eight, 10, 15 and 17. A seventh child was rescued alive and taken to the hospital, where he was in stable condition, they said. Another four people were injured

Six more victims, including at least two children, were killed in the city of Angra dos Reis, where officials declared a "maximum alert" and state of emergency after landslides devastated the Monsuaba neighborhood.

Several people were rescued alive, while another five remain missing, they said. Mayor Fernando Jordao said emergency workers were installing floodlights to continue the search-and-rescue operation through the night if necessary. "Residents have been working side-by-side with us on the search," he told a press conference. "We'll continue working hard." In Mesquita, 40 kilometers (25 miles) northwest of Rio de Janeiro city, a 38-year-old man was electrocuted trying to help another person escape the flooding, officials and media reports said.

## Record rains

The storms turned streets into rivers Friday night in several cities including Rio, the state capital, sweeping up cars and triggering landslides-a frequent tragedy in the rainy season, especially in poor hillside communities.

TV channel Globo News carried images of a family

evacuating two young children through the floodwaters in a styrofoam cooler in the Rio suburb of Belford Roxo, while residents posted videos on social media of small alligators swimming through flooded streets.

A hospital in the suburb of Nova Iguacu was badly flooded, turning the corridors of its intensive care unit into streams. Officials in Angra said the city had received up to 800 millimeters (31 inches) of rain in 48 hours in some areas, "levels never before registered in the municipality."

Experts say rainy season downpours in Brazil are being augmented by La Nina-the cyclical cooling of the Pacific Ocean-and by climate change. Because a hotter atmosphere holds more water, global warming increases the risk and intensity of flooding from extreme rainfall.—AFP

# War-torn Yemen holds breath as breakthrough truce begins

# Two commercial flights a week can resume in and out of Sanaa

SANAA: Yemen's warring parties laid down their weapons for the first nationwide truce since 2016 on Saturday, with all eyes on whether the UN-brokered ceasefire will hold. The Iran-backed Huthi rebels and Saudi-led coalition have both agreed to observe the two-month truce, which took effect at 1600 GMT on the first day of Ramadan, the Muslim holy fasting month.

"The two-month truce started at 7:00 pm (1600 GMT) tonight. As of tonight, all offensive ground, aerial and naval military operations should cease," UN special envoy Hans Grundberg said in a statement. Huthi military spokesman Yahya Saree confirmed "our commitment to a comprehensive cessation of military operations as long as the other party adheres to this", in a statement released by the rebels.

Yemen's intractable war has killed hundreds of thousands directly or indirectly and displaced millions, triggering the world's worst humanitarian crisis, according to the United Nations. Previous ceasefires have been ineffective. A national truce ahead of peace talks in April 2016 was violated almost immediately, as were other ceasefires that year.

A 2018 agreement to cease hostilities around rebel-held Hodeida port, a lifeline for the Arab world's poorest country, was also largely ignored.

Both the Huthis and Saudi Arabia have welcomed the latest initiative, which follows a surge in attacks but also increasing diplomacy including ongoing talks-snubbed by the rebels-in Riyadh.

#### 'Suffered immensely'

"This time I am optimistic. This truce is unlike all the previous ones," Asmaa Zayed, a college student who also works as a cashier in Hodeida, told AFP. "The fact it comes with Ramadan gives us a lot of hope. This war started when I was 15 years old and turned all my dreams into nightmares."

The two sides have also agreed to meet to open roads in Taez and other governorates, Grundberg said. The truce could be renewed with both parties' consent.

"The success of this initiative will depend on the warring parties' continued commitment to implementing the truce agreement with its accompanying humanitarian measures," said the Swedish diplomat.

"I also hope the goodwill that we saw from all sides in public will translate into long-term deescalation of inflammatory media rhetoric and hate speech".

The US special envoy for Yemen, Tim Lenderking, said in a tweet: "Seven years of war have inflicted a lot of pain. We urge the parties to adhere to the terms and pave the way towards a sustainable ceasefire and inclusive political peace process."

With fighting in Yemen at a stalemate, the Huthis launched a series of drone-and-missile attacks on Saudi Arabia and coalition partner the United Arab Emirates this year, often targeting oil facilities. The coalition has responded with air strikes.

Last week, on the seventh anniversary of the Saudi-led military coalition's intervention, and a day after an attack on an oil plant within sight of the Formula One Grand Prix in the Saudi city of Jeddah, the Huthis announced a three-day unilateral ceasefire.

#### 'Reeks of death'

The coalition then announced its own truce from Wednesday, ahead of discussions with international partners in Riyadh. The rebels declined to attend the talks in an "enemy" country.

# Inferno destroys market in breakaway Somali region

HARGEISA, Somalia: A massive blaze has destroyed the central market in the northern Somali city of Hargeisa, wiping out hundreds of small businesses, officials said on Saturday. Fierce flames tore through the Waheen open market late on Friday, sending huge clouds of smoke billowing into the night sky over Hargeisa, the capital of the breakaway region of Somaliland.

The cause of the inferno that engulfed the sprawling market-the economic heart of the city and home to an estimated 2,000 shops and stalls-is not yet known. Officials have issued urgent appeals for help to recover from the disaster that injured more than two dozen people and is certain to inflict further hardship on thousands more in the impoverished city.

"The town has never witnessed such a massive calamity," Hargeisa's mayor Abdikarim Ahmed Moge told reporters at the scene. Firefighters battled the flames for hours before the blaze was largely brought The war in Yemen started when the Huthis took control of Sanaa in 2014, prompting the Saudi-led intervention in March of the following year in support of the ousted government. It plunged what was already the Arab world's poorest country into years of crisis, with failing infrastructure and services and 80 percent of the 30 million population dependent on aid.

"Everything around us reeks of death and war," said Zayed, the student in Hodeida. "I think I will go into a depression if this truce ends or fails." —AFP

under control on Saturday, as the overwhelmingly Sunni Muslim country joined Muslims around the world in ushering in the holy month of Ramadan.

The mayor said fire could have been contained before causing such extensive damage but firefighters' efforts were hampered by problems of access in the crowded warren of shops and makeshift stalls.

#### 'I have lost everything'

Images of the aftermath in and around Waheen showed charred and blackened buildings with their windows blown out. Passers-by watched as firefighters turned their hoses on still smouldering structures from streets strewn with rubble.

The leaders of several countries including Britain, which once ruled Somaliland, and neighbouring Ethiopia, voiced their shock and sympathy over the disaster. Somalia's President Mohamed Abdullahi Mohamed, better known by his nickname Farmajo, also telephoned Somaliland president Muse Bihi Abdi, his office said on Twitter.

"I call on all Somalis wherever they are to extend their assistance to those affected by the disaster," Farmajo was quoted as saying. Abdi said about 28 people, nine of them women, were injured, but that there was no loss of life. — AFP

# S Lanka protesters defy curfew after social media shutdown

# Sri Lanka facing severe shortages of food, fuel and other essentials

COLOMBO: Armed troops in Sri Lanka blocked a Sunday opposition march that defied a weekend curfew to protest the island nation's worsening economic crisis, after authorities imposed a social media blackout to contain public dissent.

The South Asian nation is facing severe shortages of food, fuel and other essentials, along with record inflation and crippling power cuts, in its most painful downturn since independence from Britain in 1948. President Gotabaya Rajapaksa imposed a state of emergency on Friday, the day after a crowd attempted to storm his home in the capital Colombo, and a nationwide curfew is in effect until Monday morning.

Mass protests had been called on social media before the ban went into effect, and organisers have since postponed the rallies until after the curfew is lifted on Monday. Small crowds defied the curfew on Saturday night to hold peaceful demonstrations in various neighbourhoods around Colombo which broke up without incident.

#### 'Completely useless'

Cracks in the government have emerged, with the president's nephew Namal Rajapaksa announcing he had urged the government to reconsider the partial internet blackout. "I will never condone the blocking of social media," said Namal, also the country's sports minister. "The availability of VPN, just like I'm using now, makes such bans completely useless." The antigovernment hashtags "#ĠoHomeRajapaksas" and "#GotaGoHome" have been trending locally for days on Twitter and Facebook. A social media activist was arrested Friday for posting material that could alleged-

sent anti-government protesters arrested by the authorities. Sri Lanka's influential Bar Association has also urged the government to rescind the state of emergency. Western diplomats in Colombo expressed concern over the use of emergency laws to stifle democratic dissent and said they were closely moni-

Solidarity protests were staged elsewhere in the world over the weekend including in the Australian city of Melbourne, home to a large Sri Lankan diaspora.

A critical lack of foreign currency has left Sri Lanka struggling to service its ballooning \$51 billion foreign debt, with the pandemic torpedoing vital revenue from tourism and remittances. The crisis has also left the import-dependent country unable to pay even for essentials. Diesel shortages have sparked outrage across Sri Lanka in recent days, causing protests at empty pumps, and electricity utilities have imposed 13-hour blackouts to conserve fuel.

Many economists also say the crisis has been exacerbated by government mismanagement, years of accumulated borrowing, and ill-advised tax cuts. Sri Lanka is negotiating with the International Monetary Fund for a bailout. — AFP

# **Families of Cuban** protesters left devastated

HAVANA: Luis Frometa Compte, 59, had been back in the land of his birth for just 40 days when unprecedented anti-government protests broke out all over the country in July 2021. The forestry technician had been living for 37 years in Germany when he decided to visit his homeland, staying with his sister Virgen Frometa.

He had gone out to buy rum when he joined a protest and started filming it on his mobile phone. Less than a week later, plain clothed police officers arrested him at his sister's house, and he has since been sentenced to 25 years in prison for "sedition."

"I am asking for my brother's immediate release," said 56-year-old homemaker Virgen Frometa. "And for all the prisoners" arrested following the protests. "There is a revolutionary suffering inside of me," she told AFP, wiping back the tears in her eyes. The government response to the protests left one person dead, dozens injured and almost 1,400 detained. According to the Miami-based Cubalex NGO, more than 700 of them remain in detention. "No-one starts a revolution without weapons by talking, nor by protesting, nor by saying four things that no-one liked, nor by filming, said Frometa, raising her voice.

# 'They didn't kill anyone'

Five doors down in the poor neighborhood of Guinera, on the outskirts of Havana, laborer Emilio Roman, 51, is also suffering. His three children have been convicted of sedition. Yosney Emilio, 25 and his sister Mackyani Yosney, 23, have been sentenced to 12 years each while Emy Yoslan, 18, was given seven years. On July 12, 2021, the Roman family was celebrating a birthday. Mackyani went out to buy cigarettes

and on the corner came across the throngs of protesters. "She was enthralled," as were her brothers, said Roman. During the two weeks of their trials in January, Roman stayed at the door of the court. "I didn't have the strength to go in to watch the injustice being committed against all these youngsters," he said from his modest cement house where the bedroom, kitchen and bathroom share the same single space. The verdict was pronounced on March 16. Cuba's Supreme Court handed down sentences of six to 30 years to 128 protesters accused of sedition and theft.

Those sentenced had taken part in protests in Guinera and the Diez de Octubre municipality, where some of the most violent demonstrations happened. The heavy sentences shocked many on the island nation, including singer-songwriter Silvio Rodriguez, a fervent defender of the Cuban revolution.

"Sentencing people to 15, 20 and 30 years for pub lic disorder? That does not seem fair to me,' Rodriguez said on the Cubadebate website. "If they committed the acts of violence they have been accused of, then I agree they should be judged and the appropriate punishments applied. But as far as I know, they didn't kill anyone." Around 90 homes in Guinera have seen at least one family member arrested.

Disillusioned, Roman wants his children to leave Cuba, as thousands of others have done in recent months. "I don't want them to spend one more day in this disgraceful country," he said. During his daughter's sentencing she was accused of participating "in the grouping of people leading the disturbances using weapons capable of killing, injuring and damaging with force, such as rocks, poles and bottles, including in the form of explosive devices."

In videos, Mackyani can only be seen "with a bottle in her hand," insists her father. As for her brothers, they were accused of "throwing rocks and bottles at interior ministry agents." In response to criticisms, prosecutors claim to have acted transparently and with respect for the rule of law, something disputed by many Cubans.—AFP

# North Korea accuses South of 'reckless' remarks

SEOUL: North Korea blasted the South Korean defence minister on Sunday for "reckless" remarks about Seoul's ability to strike Pyongyang, warning of retaliation after conducting a record number of weapons tests this vear. South Korean defence minister Suh Wook had said Friday that his army had missiles with "the ability to accurately and quickly hit any target in North Korea".

The comments drew condemnation from Kim Yo Jong, the sister of North Korean leader Kim Jong Un and a key policy adviser. "His reckless and intemperate rhetoric about the 'preemptive strike' has further worsened the inter-Korean relations and the military tension on the Korean Peninsula," she said according to official North Korean news agency KCNA.

"South Korea may face a serious threat owing to the reckless remarks made by its Defence Minister... South Korea should discipline itself if it wants to stave off disaster," Kim added. In a separate statement on Sunday, Pak Jong Chon, secretary of North Korea's ruling party central committee, also warned the South off any military action against Pyongyang.

"Our army will mercilessly direct all its military force into destroying major targets in Seoul," he said. Pak did not specify which targets. North Korea has resumed its sanctionsbreaking weapons tests with an unprecedented blitz this year, last month firing its first intercontinental ballistic missile at full range

Long-range and nuclear tests were paused when Kim and then US president Donald Trump engaged in a high-profile bout of diplomacy that subsequently collapsed in 2019. Talks have since stalled. North Korea will this month mark the 110th anniversary of the birth of founder Kim Il Sung-the grandfather of current leader Kim, who likes to mark key domestic anniversaries with military parades or launches.

Tensions between both sides are also set to ramp up as South Korea's president-elect Yoon Suk-yeol takes office next month. During Yoon's campaign period, he had threatened a pre-emptive strike on the North "if necessary", and vowed to "teach some manners" to Kim. — AFP

#### "If anyone violates the decree the crop will be destroyed immediately and the violator will be treated according to the sharia law," it added. It is not the first time the fundamentalist group has vowed to outlaw the trade. Production was banned in 2000, just before the group was overthrown by US-led forces in the wake of the September 11 attacks. During their 20-year insurgency against foreign forces, the Taleban heavily taxed farmers cultivating

the crop in areas under their control. It became a key resource for the group to generate funds. The United States and NATO forces tried to curb poppy cultivation during their two decades in Afghanistan by paying farmers to grow alternative crops such as wheat But their attempts were thwarted by the Taleban

who controlled the main poppy-growing regions and derived hundreds of millions of dollars from the trade, experts say. Deputy Prime Minister Abdul Salam Hanafi rejected claims the Taliban helped fuel poppy cultivation during their insurgency. "How come it was exported all over the world when

they (US-led forces) had full control over Afghanistan," Hanafi said Sunday. Afghan media reports say production has increased in two southern provinces, Kandahar and Helmand, since the Taleban seized power in August, although data is not available.

Afghanistan has a near monopoly on opium and heroin, accounting for 80 to 90 percent of global output, according to the United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime. The amount of land planted with poppies hit a record high in 2017 and has averaged around 250,000 hectares in recent years, roughly four times the level of the mid-1990s, UN figures show. — AFP

# Afghans mark first Ramadan since Taleban seized power

KABUL: Afghans across the country broke their dawn-to-dusk Ramadan fast on Saturday as Afghanistan marked the Muslim holy month-the first since the Taleban seized power last year. About 300 men, dressed in traditional Afghan shalwar kameez, gathered before sunset at the Wazir Akbar Khan mosque in the capital to offer evening prayers on the first day of Ramadan.

"This Ramadan is different than under the previous regime," worshipper Khairullah, who goes by one name as many Afghans do, told AFP. "Now we are performing our Islamic duty together... in an Islamic land under an Islamic regime."

The Wazir Abkar Khan mosque is one of Kabul's famous places of worship, and was targeted by a bomb attack in June 2020 that killed its imam and some worshippers. The mosque is situated in central Kabul at the main entrance to the former diplomatic hub known as the Green Zone that housed several foreign embassies including Washington's mission.

After breaking their fast, the men sat in rows in the mosque's compound where volunteers served them food. In the southern province of Kandahar, the de facto power centre of the Taleban, several of the fundamentalist movement's fighters broke their fast at checkpoints and mosques.

Afghans are marking Ramadan at a time when the country is plunged into a deep humanitarian crisis. The United Nations says more than half of the country's 38 million people are facing hunger as the winter drags on. The crisis deepened after donors cut off aid when the Taleban seized power last August. The international community has so far not recognised the Taleban government. "The people expected good times under the Islamic emirate but unfortunately that did not happen," said Shahbuddin, a resident of Kabul, referring to the Taleban regime. "The world must recognise the Taleban government, otherwise we will see a humanitarian catastrophe." Other nations insist the hardline Islamists respect women's rights to education and work in order to

The Taleban have cracked down on women's freedoms, including banning them from many government jobs and shutting secondary girls schools. Meanwhile for Shahbuddin, the rising costs for food have become unbearable. "For the first time I'm seeing that food prices have risen so much in Ramadan," he said. "People were expecting that in an Islamic country prices would drop during Ramadan, but that has not happened." — AFP

# Assembly elects new board of directors

KUWAIT: Chairman of the Board of Safat Investment Company Abdullah Hamad Al-Terkait said the company is open for merger with other local companies. This, he said, will be an added value to shareholders of various groups. The process requires extensive technical studies according to the standards and legal rules. The concept will be presented to the concerned regulatory authorities when a final deal is reached.

Al-Terkait was speaking on the sidelines of the general assembly which elected its board of directors last week for a new term. The new board of directors include; Abdullah Hamad Al-Terkait (Chairman); Fahad Abdulrahman Al-Mukhaizeem (Deputy Chairman); Abdulrazaq Zaid Al-Dhubayan; Nasser Bader Al-Sharhan; Anwar Ali Al-Taqi; Mishal Ahmad Al-Jarki Abdulmohsen Suleiman Al-Mashaan.

# **US** defense contractors see longer term benefits from war in Ukraine

**NEW YORK:** US arms manufacturers are not cashing in directly from the thousands of missiles, drones and other weapons being sent to Ukraine, but they do stand to profit big-time over the long run by supplying countries eager to boost their defenses against Russia. Like other Western countries, the United States has turned to its own stocks to furnish Ukraine with shoulder-fired Stinger and Javelin missiles, for instance. These weapons from Lockheed-Martin and Raytheon Technologies were paid for some time ago.

So these companies' first quarter results, due to be released in coming weeks, should not be especially fatter because of the rush to arm Ukraine as it fights off the Russian invasion. But those US military weapons stockpiles being tapped for Kyiv will need to be replen-

The Pentagon plans to use \$3.5 billion earmarked for this purpose in a spending bill approved in mid-March, a Defense Department spokesman told AFP. The Javelin anti-tank missile is made by a joint venture between Lockheed and Raytheon. The latter's Stinger anti-aircraft missile had ceased to be produced until the Pentagon ordered \$340 million of them last summer.

"We are exploring options to more quickly replenish US inventories and backfill depleted stocks of allies and

partners," the spokesman said. "It will take time to revive the industrial base-at the prime and at sub-tier suppliers-to enable production to resume," he added. The profits that the companies make from these missiles, known for being simple to use, will not exactly be staggering, defense industry experts told AFP.

"If 1,000 Stingers and 1,000 Javelins get shipped to Eastern Europe each month for the next year, which is not unlikely given the current pace, in our view, we think it would equate to \$1 billion to \$2 billion in revenue for both program manufacturers, which is material," said Colin Scarola of CFRA, an investment research firm. Raytheon's and Lockheed's revenue figures last year dwarf that amount, however: \$64 billion and \$67 billion, respectively.

"Raytheon probably made more money off selling a Patriot missile system to Saudi Arabia than they will from making Stinger missiles," said Jordan Cohen, an arms sales specialist at the

Cato Institute.

"They're only going to put so much effort into producing those weapons that are not that valuable," Cohen told AFP. Lockheed, Raytheon and another arms manufacturer, Northrop Grumman, did not respond to AFP requests for

General Dynamics said it has not raised its financial outlook since January, while Boeing just said it is up to governments to decide how to spend money earmarked for defense.

Some weapons manufacturing executives hinted when they last released quarterly results in late January that the

Greg Hayes, Raytheon's CEO, said that rising tensions in Asia, the Middle East and Eastern Europe would lead to higher international sales-not right away but later in 2022 and beyond.

His counterpart at Lockheed-Martin, James Taiclet, said he observed 'renewed great power competition" that could trigger higher US military spending. "The war in Ukraine reshuffles the geopolitical order, in a way that hasn't really been seen in the past 30 years," said Burkett Huey of Morningstar, a financial services company. — AFP

# Ukraine ports blockaded

The presence of Russian battleships and mines in Ukrainian waters renders commercial shipping there nearly impossible. Since the start of the war, Russian forces have been blocking access to the southeastern Ukrainian ports of Berdiansk and Mariupol on the Sea of Azov, which opens into the Black Sea. In the southwest, the crucial Black Sea port of Odessa lies perilously close to the frontline

Odessa handles 90 million tons of shipments a year — 60 percent of the country's total port traffic-and is in the Krelmin's sights.

The Marine Traffic website, which tracks the position of all seagoing vessels, clearly shows the de facto blockade of these waters. Commercial ships have been absent from the zone since missile attacks on vessels sent their insurance premiums rocketing.

According to the agriculture ministry, Ukraine is currently losing \$1.5 billion (1.4 billion euros) a month because of the stranglehold on port exports. Meanwhile countries that depend on Ukrainian farm exports, particularly on the southern coasts of the Mediterranean, are seeing a food crisis start to develop. Kyiv says it has sufficient stocks to meet Ukraine's own food needs for the next two years. But it is equally keen to ensure exports continue as normal.

"Ukraine wants to show it is defending its export markets as well as its territory and is conscious of its importance as a supplier of both foodstuffs and industrial goods," said Paul Tourret, head of France's Isemar Institute, which specializes in the maritime economy. —AFP

# Tesla delivers over 1 million electric cars over past year

NEW YORK: US electric car manufacturer Tesla shipped a record number of more than one million cars over the past year, according to figures published Saturday. The company delivered 1.06 million cars from April 2021 to March 2022, including more than 310,000 cars in the first quarter of this year alone, which is 67 percent higher than over the same period last year.

Still, the figure fell short of analysts' expectations of 317,000 cars, according to data compiled by FactSet. Deliveries are considered similar to sales

figures published by other manufacturers. Growth, however, slowed sharply in recent

months for the Austin, Texas-based company, with deliveries rising a minuscule 0.4 percent since the fourth quarter of last year.

The number of vehicles produced is also slightly down against the previous quarter (-0.1 percent). "This was an exceptionally difficult quarter due to supply chain interruptions & China zero COVID policy," Tesla CEO Elon Musk said on Twitter, referring to China's strict health restrictions. "Outstanding work by Tesla team & key suppliers saved the day.'

However, Tesla is still faring better than its competitors, with the entire automobile industry affected by supply chains snarls. Toyota saw its sales in North America fall 23.5 percent in volume in the first quarter of 2022, compared to the same period last year, and 26.3 percent in value.

General Motors earned a profit of \$1.7 billion for the quarter ending December 31, down 38.7 percent from the final three months of 2020 as revenues dropped 10.5 percent to \$33.6 billion.—AFP

# GCC index sees biggest quarterly gains since global financial crisis

# Boursa Kuwait remains bullish for the third consecutive month

KUWAIT: A broad-based rally in GCC markets coupled with elevated oil prices pushed the MSCI GCC aggregate benchmark up 17.7 percent during Q1-2022, the biggest gains since Q2-2009. Gains were supported by four consecutive months of gains in the index. All markets were in the green during quarter with Abu Dhabi reported the biggest gain of 17.2 percent followed by Qatar and Saudi Arabia with gains of 16.4 percent and 16.0 percent, respectively. In terms of monthly performance, the MSCI GCC index was up 5.2 percent during the month backed by positive performance in all GCC markets during March-2022.

On the sectoral front, the GCC Capital Goods, Materials and Banks sectors topped during Q1-2022 with gains of almost 20 percent. Energy and Healthcare followed with growth of 18.2 percent and 15.1 percent, respectively. Consumer Durable & Apparels and Pharma were the only sectors that declined this quarter by 10.0 percent and 5.1 percent, respectively. Monthly performance also saw Materials at the top with a gain of 9.7 percent followed by Healthcare and Cap Goods indices. Moreover, despite recent weakness, the disruption caused on the supply front pushed crude oil prices to a 7-quarter high growth of almost 40 percent during Q1-2022. The volatility in oil prices saw prices reaching a 14-year intraday high of \$139.1/b during the first week of March 2022 but closed the month at \$107.9/b. Global equity markets also had a positive month with the MSCI World index gaining 2.5 percent backed by peace talks between Russia and Ukraine. However, a resurgence of COVID-19 cases in China that resulted in lockdowns in several large cities pushed the Chinese gauge down 6.1 percent during the month while also lowering the MSCI Emerging Market index by 2.5 percent. The US market was up 3.6 percent while the



European benchmark showed marginal growth of 0.6 percent during the month.

#### Boursa Kuwait

Kuwaiti equity market was up for the third consecutive month during March-2022 registering the second-best monthly performance. However, unlike the previous month when the positive performance was mainly led by mid-cap and small-cap stocks, the performance during March-2022 was solely driven by large-cap stocks partially offset by a decline in main market stocks. This was reflected in the 8.9 percent gain in the Premier market index while the Main 50 Index and the Main Market index dropped by 0.2 percent and 0.6 percent, respectively. The monthly gain in the Premier Market index was the best since January-2017. The net impact was a gain of 6.7 percent on the All-Share index. The performance in Q1-2022 also reflected relatively better performance of Premier market stocks with a gain of 18.6 percent while the Main Market and Main 50 index showed smaller gains of 6.3 percent and 7.8 percent, respectively. The broader All-Share index witnessed a gain of 15.7 percent during Q1-2022, one of the best in the GCC.

The monthly sector performance chart was topped by the Banking index that recorded a gain of 9.9 percent mainly reflecting solid full year results for FY-2021 as well as dividend announcements. Shares of 8 out of 10 listed Kuwaiti banks witnessed gains during the month with Boubyan Bank topping with a double digit gain of 13.7 percent followed by KFH and KIB with gains of 13.4 percent and 9.6 percent, respectively. The Financial Services index was next with a gain of 5.3 percent followed by Telecom and Real Estate benchmarks with gains of 3.7 percent and 3.6 percent, respectively. On the decliner's side, the Healthcare index topped with a steep decline of 39.1 percent followed by Oil & Gas and Technology indices with declines of 5.3 percent and 2.1 percent, respectively. The decline in the healthcare index mainly reflected the 50.4 percent decline in shares of Al-Midan Dental, although liquidity in the stock remained scanty. In terms of monthly stock performance, Kuwait Hotels topped with a gain of 52.2 percent followed by Al-Safat Investment and Al-Tamdeen Investment with gains of 34.6 percent and 26.7 percent, respectively. On the decliner's side, Al-Midan Dental Clinic topped with a decline of 50.4 percent followed by Jiyad Holding and Gulf Franchising Holding with declines of 41.8 percent and 31.2 percent,

Aggregate trading activity inched up during the month with volumes traded up 9.1 percent to reach 5.7 billion traded shares during March-2022 as compared to 5.2 billion shares traded during February-2022. Monthly volume traded showed a stronger growth of 20.0 percent to reach KD 1.6 billion in March-2022 vs KD 1.3 billion in February-2022. The monthly volume traded chart was topped by GFH Financial Group with 711.8 million traded shares followed by AUB-Bahrain and KIPCO with volumes of 681.7 million and 451.8 million traded shares, respectively.

On the monthly value traded chart, AUB-Bahrain topped with KD 210.8 million traded shares followed by KFH and NBK at KD 208.0 million and KD 163.4 million worth of traded shares, respectively. The Saudi Stock Exchange continued to see new multi-year highs during March-2022 with continued strong primary market activity since the start of the year. The benchmark TASI index closed the month at the highest level in almost 17 years at 13,090.4 points registering a monthly gain of 4.0 percent, the second-lowest in the GCC during the month.

# Baltic states stop Russian gas imports

RIGA, Latvia: The head of Latvia's natural gas storage operator said Saturday the Baltic states were no longer importing Russian natural gas. "If there were still any doubts about whether there may be any trust in deliveries from Russia, current events clearly show us that there is no more trust," said Uldis Bariss, CEO of Conexus Baltic Grid.

"Since April 1st Russian natural gas is no longer flowing to Latvia, Estonia and Lithuania," he told Latvian radio. He added that the Baltic market was currently being served by gas reserves stored underground in Latvia.

The move comes as Russian President Vladimir Putin has sought to leverage Russia's status as an energy power. With his economy crippled by unprecedented international sanctions, Putin warned EU members that they would need to set up ruble accounts to pay for Russian gas. He said Thursday that existing contracts would be halted if the payments were not made.

While the United States banned the import of Russian oil and gas, the European Union-which received around 40 percent of its gas supplies from Russia in 2021 — has retained deliveries from Moscow. Lithuanian President Gitanas Nauseda called on the rest of the EU to follow the Baltic example. "From this month on - no more Russian gas in Lithuania," he said on Twitter.

"Years ago my country made decisions that today allow us with no pain to break energy ties with the aggressor," he added. "If we can do it, the rest of Europe can do it too!" —AFP

# Banking sector remains most liquid among all sectors on Boursa Kuwait

# Foreign investments in banking sector increased to KD 3.049bn until March 2022

KUWAIT: The Kuwaiti banking sector (excluding Ahli United Bank -Bahrain) is considered the primary and most liquid amongst the sectors on Boursa Kuwait. It captured 27.8 percent of the total liquidity from the beginning of the year 2022 until the end of March. During this period, the banking sector index rose by 18.8 percent and so did the foreigners' holdings that are concentrated in this sector.

The latest information available up to March 30th 2022 indicates that foreign investments in the sector increased to KD 3.049 billion compared to KD 2.518 billion at the end of 2021, equivalent to 12.23 percent of the sector's capital compared to 11.80 percent at the end of 2021. Foreign investments were concentrated into four banks: the highest investment of KD 1.726 billion in National Bank of Kuwait, KD 962.9 million in Kuwait Finance House and KD 163.8 million in Boubyan Bank and KD 125.1 million in the Gulf Bank. About 97.7 percent of foreign investments are concentrated in the mentioned four banks, leaving 2.3 percent of the investments to the remaining banks.

The highest share of foreign ownership in the banking sector is that of the National Bank of Kuwait, corresponding to 21.89 percent of its capital as of March 30th 2022. This means that foreign ownership in the NBK is the highest in absolute and percentage terms. The second highest foreign ownership corresponds to The Gulf Bank with a 12.79 percent share yet the fourth in terms of absolute ownership. Kuwait Finance House comes third in relative ownership with a 10.67 percent share, and comes second in the value of that ownership. The highest relative increase in ownership during the period was that of Kuwait International Bank by 53.8 percent; from 4.48 percent at the end of last year to 6.89 percent of its capital. The largest relative decrease during the mentioned period was that of Warba Bank, whereby foreign ownership decreased by -12.9 percent, from 4.57 percent of its value to 3.98 percent of its value.

#### Performance of Boursa Kuwait

The performance during the month of March varied compared to that of February, with a decrease in the average daily traded value coupled with a relatively mixed performance for the indices. The Premier Market index increased by 8.9 percent while the Main Market and the BK Main 50 indices dropped slightly by -0.6 percent and -0.2 percent, respectively. As a result, the All-Share Market index (reflective of the previously mentioned indices) rose by 6.7 percent.

Boursa Kuwait's total liquidity increased during March, reaching KD 1.559 billion compared to KD 1.299 billion in February. The average daily traded value in March was KD 70.9 million, decreasing by -1.8 percent below February's average of KD 72.2 million. Traded value during Q1 of 2022 (61 working days) totaled KD 4.148 billion, an average daily trading value of KD 68 million. This represents a 57.6 percent increase from the daily average of KD 43.1 million for the same period in 2021, and a 22.4 percent increase from the KD 55.6 million average for the entire year of 2021.

Liquidity trends since the beginning of the year indicate that half of the listed companies represent only 2 percent of total liquidity, of which 50 companies contribute to 0.5 percent of that liquidity and 7 companies without any trading. As for the small liquid companies, 12 companies whose market value equals 5 percent of all listed companies' value, captured about 18.4 percent of total market liquidity.

This means that major liquidity activity is still deprived in almost half of the listed companies and on the contrary, liquidity favors small-cap companies even if the trend is decreasing. The liquidity distribution between the two markets during March 2022 was as follows:

#### Premier Market (26 companies)

The Premier market contributed to KD 1.171 billion or 75.1 percent of Boursa's liquidity, with half of its companies capturing 84.7 percent of its liquidity and 63.7 percent of total Boursa's liquidity while the other half representing only 15.3 percent of its liquidity. Liquidity concentration rate in the Premier Market reached a high level, as 6 companies made up 68.5 percent of the liquidity. During Q1 of the current year, the Premier Market captured 67.2 percent of total Boursa's liquidity, an indication of the recurrence of the liquidity shift and concentration in the market when compared to 2021, a phenomenon that we believe is unhealthy.

Main Market (139 companies)

The Main Market contributed to KD 387.5 million or 24.9 percent of Boursa's liquidity; of which 20 percent of its companies captured 81.5 percent of its liquidity while the remaining 80 percent captured 18.5 percent. The Main Market contributed to 32.8 percent of total Boursa's liquidity during Q1 of the current year, indicating that it lost its momentum of high liquidity. While the distribution of the liquidity among the participant companies is still unbalanced and focused on certain companies, it remains

sounder than its distribution in 2020.

When comparing the distribution of liquidity between the Premier and Main markets for Q1 2022, we note that the distribution is more comparable to that of 2021, where the Premier market contributed to 59.4 percent and the Main Market to 40.6 percent of total liquidity, in contrast to 83.6 percent and 16.4 percent for the two markets respectively in 2020.

#### Banking sectors' aggregated performance 2021

The banking sector (including 10 Kuwaiti banks) achieved a significant growth in its net profits during 2021, as net profits (after deduction of taxes and minority rights) amounted to KD 881.6 million, an increase of KD 424.3 million or by 92.8 percent compared to KD 457.3 million in 2020. Profits in Q4 2021 amounting to KD 257.1 million increased by 179.9 percent versus KD 91.8 million of profits in Q4 of 2020 and increased by 7.6 percent versus Q3 2021 profits, by 28.9 percent and by 38.2 percent versus Q2 2021 and Q1 2021 profits, respectively.

The banks continued to hold provisions against non-performing loans. Total provisions reached KD 617.6 million by the end of 2021 versus KD 1.058

billion in 2020, a decrease by KD 440.5 million or by 41.6 percent. Provisions in the Kuwaiti banking sector are mostly precautionary provisions to face the worst scenario, used as quality buffers as economic conditions worsen or reflected as profits as conditions improve.

The profits of the five conventional banks reached KD 531.6 million (60.3 percent of total banking sector profits) increased by 122.3 percent versus 2020. The profits of the Islamic banks increased by 60.4 percent from its 2020 level to reach KD 350 million (39.7 percent of total banks' profits). In contrary to the historical higher growth rates of profits of the Islamic sector, conventional banks displayed a faster recovery from the pandemic illustrated by a double growth of profits.

The (P/E) multiplier for the ten banks sector stood at 24.2 times compared to 36.0 times for 2020. The profitability ratios of the banking sector improved compared to 2020, whereby the return on assets (ROA) rose to 0.9 percent versus 0.5 percent and the return on equity (ROE) rose to 7.4 percent versus 4.2 percent. Total cash dividends of the ten banks reached KD 432.1 million, compared with KD 241.2 million, increasing by 79.2 percent.

# Costa Rica presidential candidates vow to tackle unemployment

**SAN JOSE:** Costa Ricans headed to the polls on Sunday to elect one of two scandal-tainted presidential candidates in a country grappling with sky-high poverty and unemployment.

Former president Jose Maria Figueres was once investigated for corruption while ex-finance minister Rodrigo Chaves was previously demoted for sexual harassment. But with 23 percent of the population living in poverty and unemployment soaring to 14 percent alongside a series of corruption scandals, Costa Ricans seem more focused on the economy as they elect a successor to Carlos Alvarado.

Costa Rica has been described as the "happiest" country in Latin America and praised for its environmental policies and eco-tourism, but the vital tourism industry was hard hit by the coronavirus pandemic. Alongside Peru, it suffered the largest fall in employment figures in the region between 2019 and 2020.

## 'We're very poor'

"The next president has to change everything because we're very poor. There is no work here, there is nothing," said Ana Briceno, 64, a travel agent in the capital San Jose. "In the last years with Carlos Alvarado the situation has been very difficult ... so I think the future president must focus on the economy," said Cristina Aguilar, 32. Given their previous troubles, the two candidates have sought to keep the debate swirling around the economy.

"The urgent themes to address are the ones causing discomfort and suffering to the people," said Chaves, 60, a surprise qualifier for Sunday's run-off, having polled fourth ahead of February's first round.

"The first is the lack of jobs. Secondly, the cost of living." Chaves, from the newly formed right-wing Social Democratic Progress Party, led the most recent opinion polls, with more than 41 percent support, compared to 38 percent for Figueres. Figueres, 67, who was president from 1994-98, is equally focused on the economy.

"In the economic agenda, unemployment is the

most important, the creation of employment opportunities is the priority," he said. Figueres, whose father Jose abolished the army in 1948 when he was president, topped the first round of voting among a crowded field of 25 contenders with 27.3 percent ahead of Chaves who had 16.8 percent. But they were a long way from the 40 percent needed to win outright.

## 'Misinterpreted jokes'

Both men have reached this final stage of the election despite the specter of past scandals. Chaves, who spent six months as finance minister in the outgoing government, was investigated over sexual harassment complaints brought by multiple women while he was a senior official at the World Bank, where he worked for 30 years. He was demoted, though not fired, and has dismissed his behavior as jokes that were "misinterpreted due to cultural differences." Figueres, who represents the centrist National Liberation Party (PLN), was investigated for allegedly taking some \$900,000 from French engineering firm Alcatel, which has admitted to bribing officials.

The ex-president, who worked abroad at the time as executive director of the World Economic Forum (WEF), refused to give evidence in the case in 2004 and returned to Costa Rica only in 2011 when the investigation expired. Polls opened at 6 am (1200 GMT) and close 12 hours later. "Right now, I don't know who I will vote for ... because Chaves contradicts himself in everything and given what Figueres did last time, it leaves us undecided," said Jairo Montero, 37. — AFP

# No longer a last resort: Pulling CO2 from the air

PARIS: To save the world from the worst ravages of climate change, slashing carbon pollution is no longer enough-CO2 will also need to be sucked out of the atmosphere and buried, a landmark UN report is expected to say on Monday.

If humanity had started to curb greenhouse gas emissions 20 years ago, an annual decrease of two percent out to 2030 would have put us on the right path. Challenging, but doable.

Instead, the emissions climbed another 20 percent to more than 40 billion tons of CO2 in 2021. This means an abrupt drop in emissions of six or seven percent a year is needed to avoid breaching the Paris climate treaty's goal of capping global warming at "well below" two degrees Celsius compared to pre-industrial levels.

Staying under the safer aspirational threshold of 1.5C would mean an even steeper decline. To put that in perspective, the painful 2020 shutdown of the global economy due to COVID saw "only" a 5.6 percent decrease in CO2 emissions.

Hence the need for carbon dioxide removal (CDR), or "negative emissions", likely to figure prominently in the UN Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) report. Even under the most aggressive carbon-cutting scenarios, several billion tons of CO2 will need to be extracted each year from the atmosphere by 2050, and an accumulated total of hundreds of billions of tons by 2100.

As of today, however, CO2 removal is nowhere near these levels. The largest direct air capture facility in the world removes in a year what humanity emits in three or four seconds. There are at least a dozen CDR techniques on the table, with different potentials and costs.

## Using bio-energy

Most of the hundreds of models laying out a game plan for a liveable future reserve an important role for a negative emissions solution called BECCS, or bio-energy with carbon capture and storage.

In a nutshell, this is the recipe: grow trees, burn them for energy, and bury the CO2 underground, in an abandoned mineshaft, for example. But what works on paper (or in so-called integrated assessment models), has not materialized in reality.

One of the few commercial-scale BECCS facilities in the world, in Britain, was dropped last year from the S&P Clean Energy Index because it failed to meet sustainability criteria. "I don't see a BECCS boom," said Oliver Geden, a senior fellow at the German Institute for International and Security Affairs and an expert on CDR.

## Planting trees

Restoring forests and planting trees that absorb and stock CO2 as they grow also figure prominently in development scenarios achieving net-zero emissions, whether in 2050 or later. Many businesses, including fossil fuel companies, rely heavily on carbon offset schemes based on afforestation to compensate for continuing carbon pollution.

But the amount of land needed to put a serious dent in CO2 levels through tree planting-up to twice the size of India-could clash with other priorities, such as growing food and biofuel crops.

Biodiversity could suffer as well, especially in savannahs converted to monoculture tree farms. Newly planted forests could also fall victim to wildfires made more frequent and intense by rising temperatures, resulting in the release of all their stored CO2

## 'DACCS'

One of the youngest CDR technologies is also one of the hottest: direct air carbon capture and storage. With variations, DACCS is a chemical process that extracts carbon dioxide directly from the atmosphere, converting it into solid form or locking it away underground.

Because CO2 in the air is so sparse-a few hun-



dred parts per million-it is a very energy-intensive and expensive process. DACCS has benefited from a wave of corporate backing.


Last year, Tesla CEO Elon Musk launched the \$100-million X-Prize for an innovative CO2 removal technology, and Breakthrough Energy founder Bill Gates unveiled a corporate partnership to turbocharge its development. How quickly it can scale up, and at what cost, remain open questions.

# Enhanced weathering

Enhanced weathering involves mining and crushing rocks rich in minerals that naturally absorb CO2, and then spreading them over land or sea. It aims to vastly accelerate a process that normally unfolds on geological timescales of tens of thousands of years.

Silicate rocks with minerals rich in calcium and magnesium but lacking metal ions such as nickel and chromium are the best raw material for the job. But, again, it's unclear if enhanced weathering can be scaled up enough, and at what cost. — AFP





# CANADIAN TRAPPERS WRESTLE WITH LOSS OF RUSSIA, UKRAINE FUR MARKETS

ying to maintain his balance on a dam, Canadian trapper Ray Gall advances cautiously as he tries to retrieve a large black beaver snared in one of his traps. Few people in the country still manage to make a living solely in the business, which dates back 400 years to the first Indigenous trades of pelts to European explorers. But thousands of Canadians, including Indigenous people, are still active in the now heavily-regulated industry. "It's the oldest profession" in Canada, says Gall, 47, a municipal water worker who traps, foxes, wolves and coyotes in his spare time in forests about a three-hour drive north o Toronto. "There's always gonna be a need for trappers whether the market is there or not," he comments before untangling the beaver carcass and stuffing it in a pack that

he throws over his shoulder.

With human encroachment reducing animal habitats, shorter winters caused by climate change, and plunging fur prices, "trapping is getting more and more difficult," says 70-year-old Indigenous trapper Tom Borg. "It's part of our heritage and it's part of us. So that's tough, it's like taking a piece of you away," he comments, misty-eyed. The market has been struggling under pressure from luxury brands' boycotts, the absence of Chinese buyers since the start of the pandemic, and now the loss of two key markets in Russia and Ukraine since Moscow's invasion. But Robin Horwath. head of the Fur Institute of Canada and general manager of the Ontario Fur Managers Federation, is optimistic for a turnaround. The situation now "is stable," he said, after it got "about as low in the cycle as it can go."

#### Pelts tied in bundles for auction

Canada is the largest producer of wild furs in the world, with some 415,000 pelts sold in the 2019-2020 season for a total of Can\$13.8 million (US\$11.0 million). Inside North America's last major fur auction in North Bay, about 350 kilometers north of Toronto, brokers are busy checking out the offerings ahead of the big event, which is being held online for a third year in a row due to the pandemic.

In a vast warehouse, tens of thousands of animal pelts-including lynxes, foxes, wolves and black bears-are tied in bundles hanging from racks, sorted by size, color and quality. Catalogue and pencil in hand, broker Michel Roberge acts as the eyes and hands of foreign buyers for whom he meticulously inspects each fur. "Since it's a luxury

market, naturally we are affected first" in the event of a crisis," says the Montreal merchant.

#### Coyote fur trim

Growing pressure from animal rights activists in Europe and North America led several major luxury brands, such as Dolce & Gabbana, Burberry and Chanel, to stop using fur. "The fur industry's been around, it's our oldest, and it's risen and crashed many, many times during the last 400 years," said Mark Downey of the Fur Harvesters Auction in North Bay. Canada Goose's exiting the fur trade... was definitely a black mark for the industry." But he is sure other manufacturers will fill the "void" left by the Canadian company, which announced last year it would soon stop using coyote fur trim on

its parka hoods-a feature that for five decades had helped keep Arctic explorers' faces warm.

The industry will also have to cope with the lack of access to markets in Ukraine and Russia-the latter being the world's second-largest for fur, but targeted by Canadian and allied economic sanctions. "The war between Ukraine and Russia is a huge handicap because our (other) big buyers from Greece, Italy and Turkey... their manufactured (fur) products are sold into Russia and Ukraine," Downey explained, and subject to the sanctions. "But (the industry) will come back again," he said. "The demand is huge," especially in Asia. — AFP

# In Senegal, a rare Pablo **Picasso** exhibition

n unprecedented Picasso exhibition opened this week in Senegal's capital Dakar, where about a dozen of the Spanish master's works are displayed alongside African art, from which he drew inspiration. A pioneering modern artist who died in France in 1973, Picasso left behind a vast and influential body of work including paintings, sculptures and ceramics. He was one of the founders of the Cubist movement, and was heavily inspired by African art, with the influence notable in seminal paintings such as "Les Demoiselles d'Avignon".

However, Picasso's interest in Africa remains relatively unknown in Senegal. El Hadji Malick Ndiaye, an art historian and one of the curators of the Dakar exhibition, said that every African should be proud of how the continent's art had inspired Picasso. Visitors should leave with "a sense of pride in what the continent's artists have given, and in the diversity of styles that have generated new forms and nourished modern art," he

The exhibition sees about 15 of Picasso's works hosted in Dakar's Museum of Black Civilizations, on loan from Paris. Alongside them are displayed works of African art, such as otherworldly traditional masks, which so fascinated the influential artist.

## Whistling mask

According to the exhibition curators, Picasso's interest in African art began with a 1907 visit to the Trocadero Ethnological Museum in Paris, which has since closed. The same year, he painted "Les Demoiselles d'Avignon"-which features five female nudes, two of whom are depicted with faces that bear striking similarities to traditional African masks. A study of the painting is on display in Dakar, paired with an African mask appearing to depict a whistling face.

Cecile Debray, the president of the Picasso Museum in Paris, described Picasso as having a "very relaxed relationship to his sources," mixing Romanesque, Iberian and African influences. The Spanish artist, drawn by the novelty of non-Western artistic traditions, is known to have collected masks and statues from both Africa and Oceania for


Recent historiography has also highlighted his interest in the spiritual or magical dimensions of such art. Despite Picasso's interest in Africa, he seldom travelled and never set foot on the continent, according to Debray. She added that his interest was not solely artistic, however, and that Picasso was a committed opponent of colonialism. The artist was a friend of Senegal's first president Leopold Sedar Senghor, who staged a Picasso exhibition in Dakar in 1972.

## Relative unknown

An artistic giant in the West, Picasso is a relative unknown in Senegal, a former French colony of 17 million people. The exhibition organizers are trying to drum up interest by reaching out to schools in Senegal, where about half of the population is younger than 20. Daouda Sarr, 24, a project management student, told AFP he had heard of Picasso, but thought of him as a French or European artist.

"I was surprised to see that Picasso had done all this around African culture without ever having set foot in Africa," he said during the exhibition's opening on Friday. Sarr said he preferred the whistling mask to the "Les Demoiselles d'Avignon" painting, "because it is an African mask". Awa Dia, a 27-year-old who was also at the opening, said that links between Picasso and Africa came as a surprise to her too. "These are our artists here, they are our ancestors," she said. — AFP

# STUNG BY DROUGHT. MOROCCO'S BEES FACE DISASTER

procco's village of Inzerki is proud to claim it has the world's oldest and largest collective beehive, but instead of buzzing with springtime activity, the colonies have collapsed amid crippling drought. Beekeeper Brahim Chatoui says he has lost almost a third of his hives in just two months-and he is not alone. "At this time of year, this area would normally be buzzing with bees," said Chatoui, sweating

say these collapses are caused by the worst drought to hit the country in 40 years, which has decimated the plants on which bees rely for food.

#### 'Unprecedented' spike

The crisis is so acute that the government released 130 million dirhams (\$13 million), to support beekeepers and investigate the cause of the bee deaths. region, some 415 kilometers (260 miles) southwest of the capital Rabat. The complex is striking: A five-storeyed structure of wooden struts and dry mud stretch along a hillside, each compartment home to a cylindrical wicker hive, covered with a mix of earth and cow dung. Experts say it is the oldest traditional, collective beehive in the world, dating back to 1850, but today it is under threat amid a changing climate.

ture ministry figures. Honey output has risen by 69 percent in a decade, from 4.7 tons in 2009 to almost eight tons in 2019, generating revenues of over 100 million euros. But it is not only Inzerki's apiary that is in trouble. Mohamed Choudani, of the UAM beekeepers union, said the crisis was hitting bee populations across the country. Last summer, Morocco's 36,000 bee-

keepers were managing some 910,000 hives, up by 60 percent since 2009, according to official figures. But Choudani said that since last August, 100,000 colonies had been lost in the central region of Beni Mellal-Khenifra alone. Bees and other pollinators are vital for the reproduction of more than three-quarters of food crops and flow-

The UN's Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) say bees play an "essential role... in keeping people and the planet healthy", with the UN saving they "serve as sentinels for emergent environmental risks, signaling the health of local ecosystems".



# **Clock ticking on** Swiss watches' raw materials from Russia

iamonds shine brightly at this year's Geneva watch fair but the sanctions slapped on Russia could soon force the Swiss watch industry to produce more subdued designs. Russia is a major supplier of diamonds, gold and other precious metals to the luxury watchmakers exhibiting at Watches and Wonders, one of the world's top salons for the prestige industry. The Russian group Alrosa-the world's largest diamond mining company-was hit by US sanctions within hours of the Kremlin-ordered invasion of Ukraine on February 24.

According to US Treasury figures, it accounts for 90 percent of Russia's diamond mining capacity, and 28 percent globally. And while trade between Switzerland and Russia is modest, gold is the chief import, ahead of precious metals such as platinum followed by diamonds not mounted or set, according to the Swiss customs office. Compared to other sectors

of the Swiss economy, "watchmaking was a branch that was less affected than others by supply problems in 2021", Jean-Daniel Pasche, president of the Federation of the Swiss Watch Industry, told AFP. But that may no longer be the case, he acknowledged, adding that it was hard to assess the repercussions for the watch industry at this stage. "There are obviously reserves. Afterwards, we will have to see, depending on how long the conflict lasts," Pasche said.

## Recycled gold and palladium

The Swiss luxury giant Richemont owns the Cartier and Van Cleef & Arpels jewelry firms, plus eight prestigious watch brands, including Piaget and IWC. The group took the lead on Wednesday, saying all its brands have stopped sourcing diamonds


from Russia. The move will create a lot of work on the supply chain to find responsibly-sourced, quality diamonds from elsewhere. Richemont chief executive Jerome Lambert told a press conference.

Gold supply is of less concern. For a decade or so, Richemont has been sourcing recycled gold for watchmaking, bought from industry and the electronics sector. For palladium, used for instance for wedding and engagement rings, the group decided "ahead of the sanctions" to switch to suppliers specializing in recycled palladium, Lambert said.

# **Draining the stocks**

At Patek Philippe, one of the most prestigious Swiss brands, the firm's president is counting on his stockpile to ride out the storm. "Luckily I produce in small quantities," said Thierry Stern, who represents the fourth generation of his family at the company helm. "So I don't feel any difference yet," he told AFP. For 2022, Patek Philippe plans to manufacture 66,000 timepieces. "And if I can't find certain stones, I can always do engraving," said the head of the brand, which relies on a wide range of disciplines including ceramics, marquetry and enamel.

H. Moser, a niche brand producing 2,000 watches a year for wealthy collectors, struck much the same tone. "Purchases are made in advance. For example, for the casings that I want to make in 2023, I have already bought all the

gold I need," said boss Edouard Meylan. "But maybe in six months' time some of our suppliers will call to push back the deadlines because they haven't received the materials," he admitted.

Concerns over raw materials "will drive up prices, of course", said Jon Cox, an industry analyst with the Kepler Cheuvreux financial services company. However, compared to other sectors, luxury firms have more leeway to pass on costs to customers, he added. At the Watches and

Wonders salon in Geneva, where 38 brands are exhibiting until Tuesday, the displays are brimming with diamonds, reflecting the "generally upbeat mood" of the industry this year after a prosperous 2021. However, given the war and its repercussions, "I imagine product development will move to more subdued luxury goods", Cox said. - AFP

**NEW YORK:** Trae Young scored 11 of his 36 points in the final two minutes Saturday as the Atlanta Hawks withstood a career-high 55 points from Brooklyn star Kevin Durant in a 122-115 NBA victory over the Nets. The Hawks grabbed their fifth straight win to move into eighth place in the Eastern Conference, a game ahead of the Nets and the Charlotte Hornets, who were routed 144-114 by the Philadelphia 76ers earlier in the day.

All three are jockeying for position in the playin tournament, in which the teams place seventh to 10th in each conference will battle for the final two berths in the playoffs proper. The Nets' second straight defeat ended the star-studded Brooklyn team's hopes of escaping the play-in and earning one of the top six seeds that will advance directly to the playoffs.

Kyrie Irving scored 31 points, but with Goran Dragic sidelined by Covid concerns, Bruce Brown out with flu and Seth Curry a late scratch with a left ankle injury, no other Nets player managed to score in double figures. "We didn't really play a good ball game," Nets coach Steve Nash said. "I can't sugarcoat it. "We didn't play a great game and not enough guys played well."

Durant did all he could, but even after his 19 third-quarter points the Nets went into the final period trailing by seven. His eight three-pointers, on 10 attempts, were also a career high and he surpassed his previous career high of 54 points, set when he was with Oklahoma City in 2014. Atlanta, meanwhile, had four players score in double figures. In addition to Young, who added 10 rebounds, De'Andre Hunter and Lou Williams scored 15 points apiece and Timothe Luwawu-Cabarrot added 11 as the Hawks won their fifth straight game. Elsewhere in the East, the Miami

Heat tightened their hold on first place with a 127-109 victory over the Chicago Bulls.

#### **Embiid fires Sixers**

Jimmy Butler scored 22 points and Kyle Lowry added 19 for the Heat, who have followed a fourgame skid with a three-game winning streak. In Philadelphia, Joel Embiid scored 29 points as the 76ers halted their three-game losing streak with an emphatic 144-114 rout of the Charlotte Hornets. The Sixers had slumped to defeats against the Phoenix Suns, Milwaukee Bucks and lowly Detroit Pistons heading into Saturday's early home game at the Wells Fargo Center.

But Embiid and a balanced Sixers offense were in no mood to concede a fourth straight loss against a Charlotte team in 10th place in the Eastern Conference. The Sixers held a narrow 58-53 lead at half-time but pulled away with a 45-point third-quarter performance before pouring in 41 points in the fourth quarter to seal a crushing win. Embiid finished with 29 points, 14 rebounds and six assists while Tobias Harris had 23 points, five rebounds and four assists. "That was a great game for us, coming back off a disappointing loss in Detroit," the Sixers' Harris said afterwards. "Just being able to push the pace today and get going was big for us."

The Sixers can clinch a playoff place on Sunday with a win over the Cleveland Cavaliers, who defeated the already-eliminated New York Knicks 119-101. In the West, the Golden State Warriors clinched their first NBA playoff berth since 2019 with a dramatic 111-107 come-from-behind victory over the Utah Jazz. Trailing by as many as 21 points in the first quarter and by 16 early in the fourth quarter, the Warriors outscored the Jazz 24-4 over



the final eight minutes.

Klay Thompson drained four three-pointers in an 18-0 run that put the Warriors ahead for good culminating in Jordan Poole's three-pointer with 3:33 remaining that gave them a 105-103 lead. Thompson finished with 36 points and Poole added 31 for the Warriors, who reached the NBA Finals in five straight seasons up to 2019, winning three titles, before missing out on the playoffs in the 2020 and 2021. —AFP

# Reds end Brumbies win streak, Crusaders keep up pressure

**SYDNEY:** James O'Connor kicked 11 points as the Queensland Reds ended ACT Brumbies' unbeaten start to the Super Rugby Pacific season, while the Canterbury Crusaders kept up the pressure at the top with a narrow victory over the Otago Highlanders. The Reds' convincing 21-7 win in Brisbane drew them level with the Canberra-based Brumbies at the top of the 12-team table on 26 points.

The 12-time champion Crusaders are three adrift, but with a game in hand, after inflicting a sixth straight defeat on Aaron Smith's Highlanders in a nail-biting 17-14 triumph. Wallabies skipper Michael Hooper, made a successful return for the NSW Waratahs, scoring a try after coming on as a substitute in his first match for the team since suffering a foot injury against England at Twickenham last November.

The Reds defied a red card to Tuaina Tualima for a high hit on O'Connor to beat the Brumbies with Fraser McReight scoring a try during the 20 minutes they were down to 14 men. Winger Filipo Daugunu also banked five points with O'Connor's three penalties and a conversion ensuring the win. But there were also plenty of missed chances. "We left a lot of points out there," said Reds coach Brad Thorn.

His opposite number Dan McKellar was more blunt, calling Brumbies' performance "dreadful". "I don't think it was a very good game of footy ... I get really frustrated with people who bag the game but I think both teams will review that and understand we need to be a whole lot better," he said. In Christchurch, the Crusaders sneaked past the battling Highlanders with all the points coming in the first half. Both teams scored two tries with a penalty from All Blacks fly-half Richie Mo'unga in the 26th minute proving decisive.

## Hooper 'invaluable'

"It was a heck of a battle," said Crusaders captain Scott Barrett, whose team endured heavy pressure in the second half. "The conditions forced both teams into playing that pressure game and it was a real see-saw right to the final whistle." The Auckland Blues are fourth, a point behind the Crusaders, after two wins over Moana Pasifika in the space of five days. The Blues also have a game in hand on the Reds and Brumbies

They toppled the Pacific island newcomers 32-19 in a rearranged midweek match after their original clash was postponed early in the season because of Covid, then turned the screws with a 46-16 hammering on Saturday. They ran in 12 tries over the two matches in Auckland, with hooker Kurt Eklund bagging a hat-trick on Saturday.

On Australia's Gold Coast, Hooper made a triumphant return for the NSW Waratahs, needing just 11 minutes after coming on as a second-half substitute to score one of their six tries in a bonus-point 38-14 thumping of Fijian Drua, who have won just one from seven. Stand-in captain Jed Holloway said having Hooper back was a huge boost for the team, who are fifth in the table. "His name speaks for itself and just having him around the crew is invaluable," Holloway said of the champion flanker.

The Waikato Chiefs hung on despite a late Wellington Hurricanes fightback to win a thriller 30-29 on Sunday. The teams shared seven tries - three of them coming in a frenetic opening eight minutes - but it was the three penalties kicked by the Chiefs' Josh Ioane that proved the difference. Western Force and Melbourne Rebels had a bye. —AFP

# Man City maintain Premier League lead as Brentford thrash Chelsea

LONDON: Manchester City kept their cool under pressure on Saturday, cruising past Burnley 2-0 after Liverpool briefly replaced the long-time Premier League leaders at the top of the table. Elsewhere, Christian Eriksen scored as Brentford came from behind to beat Chelsea 4-1 - their first victory against their London rivals since 1939. Third-placed Chelsea remain on course for next season's Champions League, but Manchester United's hopes of a top-four finish are fading fast after a 1-1 draw at home to Leicester.

Liverpool, who trailed City by 14 points in January, took pole position as Diogo Jota's header and a late Fabinho penalty saw off lowly Watford 2-0 in the early kick-off. But Kevin De Bruyne eased any City nerves in the early minutes of their match against relegation-threatened Burnley and Ilkay Gundogan put them in cruise control. City and Liverpool are locked in a thrilling shootout at the top of the English top flight, with just eight matches remaining of the season.

Next week the two heavyweights clash at the Etihad in a mouthwatering fixture that could potentially decide the destination of the title. The two teams also meet in the FA Cup semi-finals later this month and both are involved in the Champions League quarter-finals in the coming week. Quadruple-chasing Liverpool did not have the easy afternoon coach Jurgen Klopp would have hoped for against Roy Hodgson's Watford, who are fighting for their lives.

The home side needed Brazilian goalkeeper Alisson Becker to be at his best to keep out Juraj Kucka before Jota nipped in ahead of Ben Foster to head in his 20th goal of the season midway through the first half. But there was a nervousness around Anfield as the visitors refused to wilt and they even had a glorious chance to equalize in the second period.

Liverpool had to wait until a minute from time to get the two-goal cushion they desired when Kucka wrestled Jota to the ground from a corner. Fabinho took responsibility from the spot and smashed into the top corner. "The Premier League is the most important competition," said Klopp, whose side have already won the League Cup this season. "A big two months (ahead) hopefully. This week can decide a lot about how May will be. The boys created a top-class basis and now we have to use it."

#### City slickers

If City felt the pressure they did not show it. Pep Guardiola's men, chasing their fourth league title in five years, were ahead in the fifth minute at Turf Moor through De Bruyne. City doubled their lead in the 25th minute when Raheem Sterling exchanged passes with De Bruyne before cutting the ball back for Gundogan to stroke home.

In the most eye-catching result of the day, Chelsea lost against Brentford after six straight wins in all competitions since owner Roman Abramovich announced his intention to sell the club. The European champions had taken the lead when Toni Rudiger lashed home from long-range at the start of the second half. But two goals from Vitaly Janelt and a first Premier League goal for Eriksen since his return to the English top-flight in a 10-minute spell turned the match on its head. Yoane Wissa scored late to complete the rout.

United are still three points adrift of fourth-placed Arsenal having played two games more after another disappointing display at Old Trafford.

Cristiano Ronaldo was missing for the Red Devils through illness and only a combination of VAR and David de Gea prevented United falling to defeat. Kelechi Iheahnacho's headed opener for the visitors was quickly cancelled out by Fred. De Gea then produced a stunning save to deny Wesley Fofana before James Maddison did put Leicester back in front only for the goal to be ruled out by a VAR review. Wolves beat local rivals Aston Villa 2-1 and Leeds were held to a 1-1 draw by Southampton while Brighton and bottom side Norwich drew 0-0. — AFP

# Bayern rout Freiburg but 12 men on pitch could prove costly

BERLIN: Leon Goretzka scored on his first appearance for four months as Bayern Munich romped to a controversial 4-1 win at Freiburg in a Bundeliga match overshadowed by a substitute mix-up on Saturday. Four days before their Champions League quarterfinal, first leg at Villarreal, Bayern put in a strong performance on the road.

However, there could be consequences for Bayern who briefly had 12 players on the pitch after a mistake following a late double substitution. "We drew the referee's attention to the fact that Bayern had eleven outfield players on the pitch," Freiburg director Jochen Saier told Sky. "That was bizarre, I haven't seen that before." Freiburg need to lodge a formal complaint for there to be repercussions for Bayern.

## 'Confused situation'

Referee Christian Dingert noted the incident - which he described as a "totally confused situation" - in his match report and the official told Sky: "Now the DFB (German Football Association) must decide." Under league rules, such a breach of the substitutes regulations could see the result being reversed with Freiburg awarded the three points.

When Niklas Suele and Marcel Sabitzer, who later scored, both came on in the 86th minute, only one player came off, leaving Bayern with 12 men on the pitch for 17 seconds. "There was the bizarre situation," admitted Bayern coach Julian Nagelsmann. "The fourth official showed the wrong number and Kingsley Coman didn't know he had to go off. Mistakes happen. From the point of fair sport there was nothing that

speaks against it having been a fair game."

There were then eight minutes of stoppage time after intense discussions between both benches and the referee. Germany star Goretzka, who missed Bayern's previous 13 league games with a hip injury, gave his team a second-half lead by heading in a free-kick. Freiburg equalised when ex-Bayern striker Nils Petersen, who signed a contract extension Friday, hit the net just 17 seconds after coming on. However Bayern pulled clear when Serge Gnabry, Kingsley Coman and Sabitzer fired in late goals.

Bayern are on course to win a 10th straight league title with a nine-point lead after second-placed Borussia Dortmund were later thumped 4-1 at home by RB Leipzig. Even with their star striker Erling Haaland in the starting lineup, Dortmund had no answers and were whistled by their own fans at Signal Iduna Park. For the first time since the Covid pandemic started, Dortmund played in front of a capacity home crowd, but defender Mats Hummels admitted the team let their fans down. — AFP

# Fulham, Cherries tighten grip at top of Championship

LONDON: Aleksandar Mitrovic scored twice as Fulham beat London rivals QPR 2-0 on Saturday to maintain their eight-point lead at the top of the Championship table. Second-placed Bournemouth came from a goal down to beat Bristol City 3-2 and also move closer to a Premier League return. Mitrovic's first-half opener put Fulham in control and the Serbia striker's 78th-minute penalty sealed the victory, taking his tally to 37 league goals this season.

Fulham, who look certain to be promoted back to the top flight at the first time of asking, went ahead after the 14th minute at the Kiyan Prince Foundation Stadium. Tom Cairney played the ball in to Fabio Carvalho, who pulled it back from the right-hand touchline for Mitrovic to score from close range. Referee Gavin Ward pointed to the spot 12 minutes from time after Neco Williams' right-wing cross struck Lee Wallace's arm.

Mitrovic coolly converted, ending any real prospect of a QPR comeback. The defeat left QPR in ninth place in the table after a poor recent run. "We knew this would be a tough one - a derby against a tough side," said Fulham boss Marco Silva. "We wanted a reaction after the last defeat against West Brom and they were under the same pressure as they want to fight for a play-off position. We had a plan and from the first minute we controlled the match in every way."

Bournemouth super-sub Siriki Dembele slotted in from close range following a brilliant mazy run to claim what proved to be the winning goal to help the second-placed Cherries open up a six-point lead over their automatic promotion rivals. Dominic Solanke and Lewis Cook were also on target for the hosts, who had to come from behind and then see off a late City fightback. Luton benefited from a late own goal to draw 2-2 with Millwall while fellow play-off hopefuls Middlesbrough beat bottom side Peterborough 4-0 and Blackburn drew 2-2 at Coventry. — AFP

# Benzema, Felix shine before key matches

MADRID: Karim Benzema and Joao Felix ensured Real Madrid and Atletico Madrid claimed morale-boosting victories in La Liga on Saturday before facing the Premier League's heavyweights next week in the Champions League quarterfinals. Benzema missed one penalty but scored two as Real Madrid defeated Celta Vigo 2-1 to get back to winning ways ahead of Wednesday's crunch meeting with Chelsea.

And Atletico Madrid sailed past Alaves 4-1 before their trip to Pep Guardiola's Manchester City on Tuesday, the in-form Felix scoring twice, with Luis Suarez adding a brace of his own after coming on as a substitute. Felix now has seven goals in his last eight games for Atletico and the 22-year-old is likely to be key if Diego Simeone's men are to spring a surprise against City and reach the semifinals. "We go with confidence but with our feet on the ground as well because we know it will be very tough game," said Felix.

Madrid's victory at Balaidos will calm any nerves in La Liga's title race too, allowing the leaders to draw a line under their thrashing at the hands of a resurgent Barcelona before the international break. And, despite an imperfect performance, the win should restore confidence ahead of the first leg away at Chelsea, with Thomas Tuchel's side now recovering from a humiliation of their own, after they were earlier thumped 4-1 at home by Brentford.

Chelsea, who outplayed Real Madrid over two semi-final legs last year, will be a much sterner test than Celta and Carlo Ancelotti's side will almost certainly not have the benefit of being awarded three penalties at Stamford Bridge. "I don't know if we deserved to win, I had to make two big saves in the first half," said Real 'keeper Thibaut Courtois.

"But winning is important. Chelsea lost today at home so they will want to come back strong on Wednesday. We have to give more. We lacked a bit

of intensity today and we can't do that because that's one of Chelsea's strengths. We have to be aggressive."

Real Madrid's chances against Chelsea are improved immeasurably by the recovery of Benzema, and also Ferland Mendy, who offers so much more solidity at left back than either Nacho Fernandez or Marcelo. Benzema marked his return from injury with a brace that takes his goal tally for the season to 39. Any hopes Barcelona had of causing a collapse may already have been dashed, with Real Madrid now 12 points ahead of Sevilla and 15 in front of the Catalans, who have two games in hand, the first of them against Sevilla on Sunday.

Barca and Sevilla are most likely now fighting it out for second. Atletico climb to third. Ancelotti's positive test for COVID-19 last week meant he was unable to take his place on the sideline and it remains to be seen if the Italian is able to make the trip to London. Madrid found the breakthrough in the 19th minute when Eder Militao had his right foot taken away from him by Nolito. Benzema rolled it right. Matias Dituro dived left. — AFP

# Lazio beat Sassuolo to keep up hunt for Europe

MILAN: Lazio bounced back from Rome derby defeat with a 2-1 win over Sassuolo on Saturday which got their push for European football back on track. Goals in each half from Manuel Lazzari and Sergej Milinkovic-Savic were enough to take Maurizio Sarri's side up to fifth, a point ahead of Atalanta and Roma, who hammered their capital city rivals 3-0 before the international break.

However they are some way off the Champions League places as they trail Juventus, who sit fourth ahead of Sunday's big match with champions Inter Milan, by seven points. "We showed from the first minute that this was not the same team we saw in the derby," Milinkovic-Savic told DAZN. "We want to finish in the top four, I know it will be difficult but we're going to try."

That defeat, and possibly the large hail stones which thumped down in Rome, led to a small crowd of less than 20,000 showing up for the first match at the Stadio Olimpico since grounds were allowed to fully open to the public for the first time in two years. Those that did show up were rewarded with an entertaining match which had been billed as a battle between rivals for the Italy striker's berth the hosts' captain Ciro Immobile and the promising Gianluca Scamacca who started the Azzurri's 3-2 friendly win in Turkey on Tuesday.

On Friday Sarri said that Immobile had been made a "scapegoat" for Italy's failure to qualify for consecutive World Cups as he hasn't taken his phenomenal Lazio form, 21 goals in 26 league matches in all competitions, to the national team. However neither made a particular impression, with Scamacca fluffing a good early chance when Thomas Strakosha smothered an attempted chip finish. — AFP

# New York slump continues with loss to Toronto

**NEW YORK:** New York City FC's sluggish start to the MLS season continued on Saturday as the reigning Major League Soccer champions crashed to a 2-1 defeat in Toronto. A Jesus Jimenez strike and a headed own goal from Thiago Martins were enough to secure all three points for former USA coach Bob Bradley's Toronto FC side at BMO Field. The defending champions have only taken four points from a possible 15 since the start of the season and are languishing in 11th place in the Eastern Conference.

It was an inauspicious performance from New York, who take on the Seattle Sounders on Wednesday in the first leg of the CONCACAF Champions League semifinals. City started Saturday's game brightly but were rocked after Jimenez opened the scoring against the run of play on 31 minutes. Canadian international Jonathan Osorio's pass played in Spanish striker Jimenez, who stroked home his third goal of the season past City goalkeeper Sean Johnson.

Toronto doubled their lead just before halftime after Alejandro Pozuelo's free-kick was inadvertently glanced by Martins into his own net. Brazilian substitute Heber scored a consolation for New York deep into stoppage time to make it 2-1 but it was too little too late. The struggle continued for David Beckham's Inter Miami, who lost 3-1 at home to Houston Dynamo and dropped to last place in the East with just one point from a possible 15.

Colombian Darwin Quintero scored for Houston in the 49th minute and American Fafa Picault completed the win with a penalty in the 57th minute and a goal in injury time. Veteran Gonzalo Higuain converted a penalty for Inter in the 66th minute. Houston snapped a 26-game winless streak on the road that dated back to 2020.—AFP

# Australia beat England to win World Cup

CHRISTCHURCH: Australia, led by a sublime 170 from Alyssa Healy, rewrote the record books to beat a valiant England by 71 runs in the Women's World Cup final in Christchurch on Sunday. Australia amassed a daunting 356 for five but the defending champions England, faced with a record target, kept up the run rate but ran out of wickets to be dismissed for 285 in the 44th over, with Nat Sciver unbeaten on 148.

"Unbelievable," player-of-the-match and player-of-the-tournament Healy said of her innings - the highest in any women's or men's World Cup. "Never in my wildest dreams I ever thought to do anything like that. "Our team sets out to win events like this and you want to contribute to that, don't you? I just really enjoyed being out there." The victory continued Australia's dominance of the 50-over format with their seventh title from 12 World Cups and extended their one-day international record to 38 wins from 39 matches over the past four years. "To come out and

perform so well through the whole tournament, to be honest, is pretty amazing and I think we deserved the victory today," Australian captain Meg Lanning said, paying special tribute to Healy.

"It was incredible. To do it in a World Cup final. She's just able to come out and play so well and some of those shots she was playing were ridiculous." England captain Heather Knight called Healy's innings "one of the best" and said it was unfortunate her team could not build a big partnership around Sciver. "But I guess the runs on the board meant we had to take a few risks," she said.

## Healy on the rampage

Against England, Australia lost the toss but nothing else. Knight put Australia into bat, noting her side had bowled "outstandingly well" at Hagley Oval, but Australian openers Perry and Rachael Haynes were not listening. They showed patience, scoring a sedate 26 off the first eight overs before Healy went on the rampage, paying the bowlers no respect as she pounded all points of the boundary with 26 fours.

Her 170, off just 138 deliveries, was the highest score in a women's or men's World Cup final, the highest score in this tournament and contributed to her tournament record of 509 runs, eclipsing the 497, set by Haynes earlier in the same innings. The Healy and Haynes 160-run opening stand was a record partnership for any wicket in a World Cup final.

England could have claimed both wickets in the 21st over, with Australia still in the 90s, when Healy and Haynes were dropped off the bowling of Kate Cross. It took Australia 22.2 overs to bring up their first 100, 13 more overs for the second hundred but just nine overs for the third, helped by England returning to the poor fielding which had plagued their start to the World Cup when they lost their first three games.

When Haynes went for 68, Beth Mooney joined Healy in a 156-run partnership before Healy's extraordinary innings ended in the 46th over, when she missed an Anya Shrubsole delivery outside off stump and was stumped. Mooney quickly followed for 62 as Australia lost four wickets in a push for runs over the last four overs, with Elysse Perry finishing not out 17 after coming in at number seven on her return from injury.

Shrubsole was the one England bowler to perform with credit with three for 46 off her 10 oversthe figures inflated by the final over which cost 15 runs. England made a determined effort to stay within reach of the required run rate, but were hampered by wickets falling at regular intervals. Sciver's 148 was the second-highest score in a Women's World Cup final, but the next best for England was 27 by opener Tammy Beaumont. For Australia, Jess Jonassen took three for 57 and Alana King finished with three for 64. —AFP

# Babar leads Pak to first series win over Australia in 20 yrs

LAHORE: Skipper Babar Azam hit a second successive century and Imam-ul-Haq an impressive half century Saturday to anchor Pakistan's first series win over Australia since 2002 with a nine-wicket victory in the third and final one-day international in Lahore. It was a dominant performance by the home team at Gaddafi Stadium as they dismissed Australia for a below-par 210 through their fast bowlers, who shared eight wickets, and then chased down the target in 37.5 overs losing just one wicket.

Azam, dropped by Travis Head off Jason Behrendorff on one, took full advantage of the reprieve, driving Marnus Labuschagne for two to complete his 16th ODI hundred off 110 balls. Azam, who scored 114 in the second game, hit 12 boundaries in his 115-ball 105 not out. Unbeaten Haq followed his own back-to-back hundreds with a polished 89 for his 11th ODI half century. He cracked six boundaries and a six, and finished the series with 298 runs.

Haq and Azam shared an unbroken 190-run stand for the second wicket after opener Fakhar Zaman fell to Nathan Ellis for 17 - Australia's only success in the innings. The elusive 2-1 win came after Pakistan lost six consecutive ODI series to Australia - and the preceding three-match Test series 1-0 last month. Australia won the first ODI by 88 runs while Pakistan clinched the second by six wickets, both also at the same venue

"When you lose the first game then your players need confidence and once they were given that they came back strongly and did well," said Azam. "Credit to them for this series win." Australian skipper Aaron Finch rued the lack of runs. "We didn't get enough runs," said Finch. "When you go three down in the first few overs, it's always going to be hard to get a big total."

Earlier, fast bowlers Haris Rauf (3-39), Mohammad Wasim (3-40) and Shaheen Shah Afridi (2-40) kept the pressure from the start as Australia were bowled out in 41.5 overs. Alex Carey top-scored with a gritty 61-ball 56 and Sean Abbott hit a 40-ball 49 in an otherwise dismal batting show by the visitors. Sent in to bat for a third successive time by Azam, Australia lost in-form Head with the first ball of the match from Shaheen

Out-of-form Finch fell in the next over from Rauf,

trapped leg-before for a second time in a row, as Australia lost both openers without a run on the board. Rauf made it 3-6 when Marnus Labuschagne edged one to slip for Iftikhar Ahmed to take a simple catch. Ben McDermott (36) and Marcus Stoinis (19) took the score to 59 when the latter chipped spinner Zahid Mahmood to Haq, who took a good diving catch.

McDermott, who smashed a maiden ODI century in the second game, was trapped leg-before by Wasim for 36 as Australia lost half their side for just 67 by the 16th over. Carey and Cameron Green (34) added an invaluable 81 runs for the sixth wicket off 95 balls, but Wasim came for his second spell to bowl Green in the 32nd over. Carey's resistance finally ended when he holed out to spinner Iftikhar after hitting six boundaries and a six. Abbott, who also hit six boundaries and a six, made sure Australia got past 200 during a last-wicket stand of 44 before falling to Rauf. Australia will end the tour - their first to Pakistan in 24 years - with a single T20I on Tuesday, also in Lahore.—AFP

# Swiatek beats Osaka to win Miami Open

MIAMI: Iga Swiatek's dream season continued as the incoming world number one scooped her third successive WTA 1000 title to beat Naomi Osaka in the Miami Open final on Saturday. The Polish 20-year-old became only the fourth - and youngest - player to win the "Sunshine Double" of Indian Wells and Miami in the same year following Steffi Graf, Kim Cljisters and Victoria Azarenka with a 6-4, 6-0 win over Osaka.


Swiatek, who will be formally confirmed as world number one when the new WTA rankings are announced on Monday, has now won 17 straight games, a winning streak that includes titles in Doha, Indian Wells and now Miami. Osaka, 24, enjoyed a welcome return to form in Florida even if the four-time Grand Slam champion's first final since the Australian Open in 2021 ended in a comprehensive defeat.

"I feel privileged to be among those players who have done this double before, I knew it would be tough playing these tournaments in a row but I took it step by step," said Swiatek, who won her maiden Grand Slam at the French Open in 2020 as a 19-year-old and will be the favorite to win another Roland Garros crown next month on her favored surface. "I was in the zone in the second set - that's the easiest way for me to be dominant. I was surprised I could handle all these matches. I am still the same person though. My idols were like that and I don't want the success to change me in a negative way. It gives me confidence."

Swiatek headed into a seventh career final on the back of 16 straight wins - the last player to win 16 or more in a row was Osaka, between Cincinnati in 2020 and last year's Miami Open. Osaka has been serving well this tournament but was broken by Swiatek to make it 3-2 in the first and began to look vulnerable. The former French Open champion is one of the finest returners in the women's game and even though Osaka was attempting to aggressively jump upon Swiatek's second serve, her opponent was far more consistent and clinical overall.

## 'Sad outcome, fun day'

The Polish player didn't face a single break point in a match that lasted just 80 minutes. A break of

the Osaka serve right at the start of the second saw any lingering hopes for the Japanese melt in the Miami sunshine and Swiatek easily moved through the gears to land her sixth career title amid joyous scenes at Hard Rock Stadium.

For former world number one Osaka, who left Indian Wells last month in tears after being heckled by a fan during a second round defeat, this run to the final in Miami has at least given her renewed hope of returning to the top after a spell out of tennis in 2021 to deal with mental health issues. "Iga is quite different from the other players I have played against, she is very explosive but I'm not as disappointed as I've been before after losses," said Osaka, who will head to Europe a week early to prepare for the clay swing of the season.

"It was a sad outcome but a fun day. Normally I would be crying in the locker room but I guess life experiences help. Only a couple days ago I was celebrating getting back into the top 50 but I don't take things like that for granted. I'm a bit more humble now about the opportunities I get. I can take a lot of positives from this."

Osaka revealed when she had dinner with Swiatek in Australia a couple of years ago, she was asked her opinion about what the future held for the up and coming Polish star. "She said she might go to college but I said don't do that," smiled Osaka. "I remember thinking she was so young and this good that she should commit to playing more tournaments first. It's been cool to watch her grow." —AFP
