No need for vaccination, PCR to enter Kuwait

KUWAIT: The Council of Ministers yesterday effectively lifted all measures that were imposed to contain the coronavirus disease - making wearing face masks anywhere optional and removing vaccination certificates and PCR tests as conditions to enter Kuwait, the government spokesman said. Tareq Al-Mazrem said in a statement that the Cabinet decided during an extraordinary meeting to allow all individuals to enter all closed public places without the need for vaccination or a PCR test.

The Cabinet decided to abolish all decisions and regulations that had been imposed since the outbreak of the COVID-19 disease. Wearing of masks is compulsory only for people who show symptoms of the disease, Mazrem said. People arriving from outside Kuwait are not required to show a PCR test or a vaccination certificate as unvaccinated people can freely enter the country, the Cabinet said.

Unvaccinated people are no longer required to rry out a PCR test as a condition to enter

Levels of fasting

amadan is not just about abstaining from food, drink, conjugal intimacy, and other acts that nullify the Fast from dawn to sunset. Real fasting should bring about a real inner change in the Muslim individual and in a Muslim community at large. The Islamic Fast is not about a mere starvation or self-denial; rather it is an act of worship and obedience to Almighty Allah, thanksgiving, forgiveness, spiritual training, self-examination, etc. If you perform an act of worship during the month of Ramadan, your reward is doubled or even tripled. Fasting in Ramadan is very special for the reason that God Almighty Himself determines the amount of rewards you will receive.

What are levels of fasting?

(A) The fast of the masses, which entails abandoning food, drink and sensual pleasure for some hours. Anyone who falls under this category will get abundant rewards from Allah (the Almighty and Majestic). Almighty Allah says in Al-Hadeeth Al-Qudsi, describing the condition of a fasting person, translated as: "... he abandons his food, drinks and conjugal rights because of Me. Therefore, fasting is for Me and I am the One to determine the nature and amount of rewards for him." (Al-Bukhari # 1904)

• The majority of the Muslims fall under this category. Therefore, I urge those who are fasting this year to try their level best to upgrade their fast and fall under the highest of all the three categories of fasting. Our long-sought goal should be to please Allah (the Exalted in Might) and to keep Him in our minds with the realization that He watches over us all the time.

(B) The fast of special people, which entails not only abstaining from food, drink and conjugal rights from dawn to dusk, but also keeping one's eyes, tongue, hands, ears, and indeed his whole body away from committing sins. Abu Huraira narrated that Prophet (PBUH) said, translated as: 'Whoever doesn't abandon false speech or acting upon it, there is no need for him to abstain from food and drinks" (Al-Bukhari # 1, 903)

We infer from this prophetic narration that real fasting is to abstain from sins as much as possible. On this issue, Jaber bin Abdullah (ra) said, translated as: "When fasting, your ears, eyes, and mouth should shun lying as well as committing other sins. EU to lift Schengen visa requirements for Kuwaitis

BRUSSELS: The European Commission Wednesday proposed to lift visa requirements for nationals of Kuwait and Qatar. Under this proposal, once agreed, Kuwait and Qatar nationals holding biometric passports would no longer need a visa when travelling to the EU for short stays of up to 90 days in any 180-day period for business, tourism or family pur-

pose, it said in a press release. This proposal comes after the commission assessed a number of criteria including irregular migration, public policy and security, economic benefits, and the union's relations with the two countries. It will contribute to strengthening relations with Gulf countries. EU High Representative Josep Borrell said: "Our proposal to lift visa requirements for Qatari and Kuwaiti nationals is a first step to make it easier for people from the entire region to travel to the European

UAE to roll out 'responsible' AI

DUBAI: The world's first minister for artificial intelligence (AI) says the United Arab Emirates isn't only looking for economic benefits as it seeks to become a leading nation in the sector. The UAE's minister of state for AI, Omar bin Sultan Al-Olama, said "quality of life" considerations were key, and also stressed the importance of a "responsible" rollout-with impacts potentially reverberating for decades.

"We are looking at AI as a tool," he told AFP in an interview in Dubai. "It's

a tool that we need to use to unleash the quality of life aspect." The UAE also calls AI "machine intelligence", defining it as a branch of technology enabling systems to "think, learn, and make decisions like humans", which can support everything from virology to transport. "Yes, economic gain is something that every country wants, and we want it too," Olama added. "But... we want to ensure the development and deployment and the use of AI is responsible."

Olama was just 27 when he was handed the cabinet-level position in 2017, tasked with launching the oilrich Arab nation's strategy in a field which touches everything from speech Continued on Page 6

Climate change, overuse kill off Iraq Sawa Lake

SAWA LAKE: A "No Fishing" sign on the edge of Iraq's western desert is one of the few clues that this was once Sawa Lake, a biodiverse wetland and recreational landmark. Human activity and climate change have combined to turn the site into a barren wasteland with piles of salt.

Abandoned hotels and tourist facilities here hark back to the 1990s when the salt lake, circled by sandy banks, was in its heyday and popular

with newly-weds and families who came to swim and picnic.

But today, the lake near the city of Samawa, south of the capital Baghdad, is completely dry. Bottles litter its former banks and plastic bags dangle from sun-scorched shrubs, while two pontoons have been reduced to rust. "This year, for the first time, the lake has disappeared," environmental activist Husam Subhi said. "In previous years, the water area had decreased during the dry seasons."

Today, on the sandy ground sprinkled with salt, only a pond remains where tiny fish swim, in a source that connects the lake to an underground water table. The five-square-kilometer lake has been drying up since

KUWAIT: Citizens and residents in Kuwait are preparing for Eid Al-Fitr after a two-year disruption caused by the coronavirus pandemic. People are eager to celebrate and embrace the true spirit of Eid, now that COVID-19 restrictions have been

Ali, a gold seller in Souk Al-Mubarakiya, said sales of gold in recent days have not been much compared to last vear. "There is weak demand for gold due to the high gold rate, which forced us to stop importing new designs and make do with local pieces," he told Kuwait Times. He added the lockdowns in the past years is one of the reasons for low demand, saying priority for people now is to travel, not to spend money on gold.

Hussain Al-Ali, another gold seller, told Kuwait Times the gold price has increased because of the Russian war on Ukraine. "Domestic demand for gold will spike hopefully after Eid," he said. "Children's jewelry from the Eid collection are most in demand. Every year we have a new collection for each occasion. We lower the markup on gold jewelry for Eid to encourage people to buy," he added.

Bedour Nasser, a shopper, said preparations for Eid will be huge this year with



friends," she said. "We bought new clothes, Eid decorations and toys in order to distribute them in a competition we are planning to organize during the festival. It is a relief to have such an important celebration return to normality after such a long time," she noted.

Ahmad Bahaa, a watch salesman, said the market is witnessing high demand for watches and accessories, especially from women. "As we are approaching Eid, the number of customers is increasing. People nowadays mostly buy from our store rather than online, especially in malls. Customers buy clothes first, then match them with watches and accessories from our store," he explained.

Eid cookies and Middle Eastern sweets are among the popular patisseries consumed during Eid Al-Fitr. Rose Blase, who works in a sweetshop, told Kuwait Times her shop has prepared hundreds of boxes of Eid cookies stuffed with nuts, dates and fruit jelly. "They're all sold out in all of our branches and we still haven't reached Eid. Usually, people can pre-order online then collect from the store," she told Kuwait

NEW YORK: The State of Kuwait late Tuesday welcomed the UN's "exceptional" resolution requiring veto justification. "It is natural to have opposing views on veto use, and this resolution would guarantee transparent and constructive discussions on the matter." said Minister Plenipotentiary Bader Al-Munayekh, Acting Charge d'Affaires of Kuwait's Permanent Mission to the United Nations, addressing its assembly. DGCA expects 352,140 passengers during Eid holiday

KUWAIT: Kuwait's Directorate General of Civil Aviation (DGCA) said Wednesday that the movement of passengers to and from Kuwait

Assembly adopted the Liechtenstein-spearheaded resolution by consensus. Veto abuse had previously contributed in the Security Council's inability to shoulder its responsibility, which eventually led to jeopardizing international peace and security, noted the Kuwaiti senior diplomat. "I anew, in this session, the State of Kuwait's full commitment to multilateralism, coinciding with the International Day of Multilateralism and Diplomacy for Peace," he noted. Tuesday's resolution does not eliminate or limit the veto power of the permanent members - the US, Russia, Britain, France and China. But for the first time it will require the General Assembly "to hold a debate on the situation" that sparks a veto in the Security Council within 10 working days. The US, Britain and France were among the majority of countries that joined Liechtenstein in cosponsoring the reform. Neither Russia nor China were among the sponsors. —KUNA

ABK announces Eid timings

KRCS distributes food in Yemen

ADEN: Kuwait Red Crescent Society (KRCS) on Tuesday started giving out 2,418 food parcels to internally displaced persons (IDPs) in four governorates in Yemen as part of "Kuwait by Your Side" campaign, which continues for eighth year running. "The relief effort targets needy families in the governorates of Aden, Taiz, and Marib and Hadhramaut," said KRCS Director-General Abdulrahman Al-Aoun. Kuwait oil at \$104.19 pb

KUWAIT: Kuwait crude oil dropped 22 cents during Tuesday's trading session to close at \$104.19 per barrel (pb) compared with \$104.41 pb the day before, Kuwait Petroleum Corporation (KPC) said Wednesday. Brent crude rose \$2.67 to reach \$104.99 pb and West Texas Intermediate jumped \$3.16 to \$101.70 pb.

Govt sets aside KD 2.1 billion to South Saad Al-Abdullah project

KD 6 million initial budget to restore Souq Al-Mubarakiya

KUWAIT: Minister of Finance and Minister of State for Economic and Investment Affairs Abdulwahab Al-Rushaid said Tuesday the government gave the green light to the funding of South Saad Al-Abdullah Town and the rehabilitation of Souq Al-Mubarakiya in FY 2022-2023. The South Saad Al-Abdullah housing project costs a total of KD 2.1 billion (nearly \$6.8 billion) which will be phased over the coming state budgets according to the construction stages of

It is listed in the draft bill linking the budgets of the state departments for FY 2022-2023, he told reporters, noting that bill still awaits endorsement from the National Assembly. "The housing question is a top priority for the government, which does its utmost to provide adequate funding for the Public Authority for Housing

Welfare (PAHW) to meet its obligations towards the people of Kuwait," the minister pointed out."

On January 25, the government injected liquidity to appropriation of 11,428 plots of land,' Rushaid said, appreciating cooperation from the legislative authority. "Only three months later, the executive authority approved today KD 2.1 billion funding for the South Saad Al-Abdullah project, which signals out keenness on enabling PAHW to find solutions to the housing question,

Dealing with Souq Al-Mubarakiya which was hit by a huge fire late last month, he said an investigation panel was set up to determine the causes of the fire and draw up safety measures that could prevent recurrence of similar incidents. "An initial budget amounting to KD 6 million (some \$19 million) was set aside for the



rehabilitation process of the landmark marketplace," the minister disclosed, refuting media speculations in this regard. —KUNA

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Singapore hangs mentally disabled man

Nagaenthran was 'the victim of a tragic miscarriage of justice'

Relief and alarm as El Salvador rounds up alleged 'gangsters'

SINGAPORE: A mentally disabled Malaysian man was hanged in Singapore on Wednesday, his family said, after losing a long legal battle and despite a storm of international criticism and appeals for clemency. Nagaenthran K. Dharmalingam was arrested in 2009 for trafficking a small amount of heroin into the city-state, which has some of the world's toughest drugs laws, and handed a death sentence the following year.

The plan to hang him sparked widespread criticism due to concerns about his intellectual disabilities, with the United Nations, European Union and British billionaire Richard Branson among those condemning it. "It is unbelievable that Singapore proceeded with the execution despite international appeals to spare his life," his sister Sarmila Dharmalingam told AFP.

The 34-year-old was executed in the early hours, she said from Malaysia, leaving her family "extremely saddened" and "in a state of shock". Nagaenthran spent more than a decade mounting legal challenges, but they were dismissed by Singapore's courts, and the city-state's president rejected appeals for clemency.

His body will be brought back to the Malaysian city of Ipoh for his funeral, his sister said. Singaporean authorities did not respond to requests for comment. The European Union (EU) on Wednesday described the death penalty as "cruel and inhumane" and urged Singapore to "adopt a moratorium on all executions" and abolish capital punishment.

The death penalty "fails to act as a deterrent to crime and represents an unacceptable denial of

human dignity and integrity," said Nabila Massrali, a foreign policy spokeswoman for the bloc. Reprieve, an NGO that campaigns against the death penalty, said Nagaenthran was "the victim of a tragic miscarriage of justice".

"Hanging an intellectually disabled, mentally unwell man... is unjustifiable and a flagrant violation of international laws that Singapore has chosen to sign up to," said the group's director, Maya Foa.

'Inhumane'

Nagaenthran was originally scheduled to be hanged in November but that was delayed as he sought to appeal on the grounds that executing someone with mental disabilities contravenes international law. He was arrested aged 21 as he tried to enter Singapore with a bundle of heroin weighing about 43 grams (one and a half ounces) — equivalent to about three tablespoons. Supporters say he has an IQ of 69, a level recognised as a disability, and was coerced into committing the crime.

But authorities have defended his conviction, saying legal rulings found he knew what he was doing at the time of the offence. His mother mounted a desperate 11th-hour legal challenge on Tuesday, but it was swiftly rejected by a judge, prompting his relatives to break down in tears in court. In an interview with AFP on Tuesday, Branson had urged Singaporean President Halimah Yacob to grant Nagaenthran clemency, calling the death penalty "inhumane".

After exhausting the usual appeals process, presidential clemency was the only avenue remaining to halt the execution. Nagaenthran's case has

sparked concerns in some quarters in Singapore, and hundreds of demonstrators attended two protests against the hanging in recent weeks. Protests are rare in tightly controlled Singapore. Without prior police approval, the only place they can be held is in one downtown park.

Vigils and small protests have also been held in Malaysia, and the country's king and prime minister had both appealed for Nagaenthran's life to be spared. A petition calling for Singapore's president to grant him clemency garnered more than 100,000 signatures. The city-state resumed execu-

tions last month after a hiatus of more than two years, when it executed another drug trafficker.

Activists now fear authorities are set to embark on a wave of hangings as several other death-row convicts have recently had appeals rejected. Another Malaysian drug trafficker is scheduled to be hanged on Friday. Despite mounting pressure to abolish the death penalty, Singapore insists capital punishment is an effective deterrent against crime. The city-state has a low crime rate, and believes the death penalty has helped keep it one of the safest places in Asia. —AFP

BEIRUT, Lebanon: Zionist air strikes near Damascus on Wednesday killed nine combatants, among them five Syrian soldiers, in the deadliest such raid since the start of 2022, a war monitor said.

Healing by helping: Mexico's acid attack victims

MEXICO CITY: After Mexican mother Carmen Sanchez left her abusive ex-partner he attacked her with acid, leaving her severely scarred. As part of her healing process, she now helps fellow victims rebuild their lives. In the eight years since her life was changed forever, the 37-year-old has undergone 61 operations, including skin reconstruction and grafts.

"Every day I endure it but I don't know if I will heal completely at some point," said Sanchez, who wears dark glasses to cover traces of the attack. "It wasn't an accident. I wasn't born that way. He planned it, went and bought the acid and threw it at me. When I look in the mirror, I see him," she said.

Her Carmen Sanchez Foundation-launched in 2021 to "put a stop to acid violence"-believes that companionship and friendship are crucial for victims. It faces challenges such as dealing with a public health system that guarantees only limited treatment for victims, and a judicial system beset by impunity and ineffectiveness, Sanchez said.

Gender-based violence is a major problem in Mexico, which registered around 3,750 murders of women in 2021, of which about 1,000 were classified as femicides. The foundation has documented 31 acid attacks against women since 2001, of whom six died.

The crime is on the rise, with seven cases in 2021, compared with two on average in previous years, according to the group, whose goal is for victims to regain some enjoyment of life. "The moments of leisure, the celebration of important dates, going out to eat or simply talking on the phone is a fundamental part of what can keep them on their feet," said its copresident Ximena Canseco.

'Remember forever'

Sanchez, who has two daughters, reported her abusive ex-partner three times but he escaped punishment and sprayed acid in her face in 2014 after she left him. "He told me that he was going to do something to me that I would remember forever," she said. Sanchez spent eight months in a public hospital, after which she relied on private doctors who treat victims free of charge.

At the public hospital, "they told me I could live with my scars" and to "be thankful I survived," she said. After the police failed to arrest her ex-partner, Sanchez tracked him down herself and he was finally captured in 2021.

"I was the one who did all the work," she said. Yazmin, 34, is one of eight women whom

the Carmen Sanchez Foundation helps to obtain free medical treatment, legal advice and psychological therapy. A year and a half ago, when she was leaving her work, a woman threw a liquid on her, leaving her in agony. Yazmin lost an ear and suffered burns to her eyelids, neck, legs and one arm.

She suspects her attacker was sent by her ex-partner. "Days before, we argued on the telephone and he told me to be careful because he had a little surprise for me," said the woman, who did not want to give her full name.

'A global problem'


Yazmin kept silent about her violent relationship for years before the attack, but now she feels liberated thanks to the foundation. "We're not judged. They don't say: 'They did it to you for a reason.' You feel protected. I thought I was the only one, but I discovered that it is a global problem," Yazmin said.

Among other affected countries, hundreds of acid attacks are reported in India each year, although-like in Mexico-experts fear they are only the tip of the iceberg. Colombia, where the crime is punishable by 50 years in prison, registered 50 cases in 2021, 28 of them against women, according to official figures.

Britain has one of the world's highest rates of recorded acid attacks per capita-most apparently gang-related and targeting men, according to the charity Acid Survivors Trust International (ASTI). Martha Avila, 63, calls herself a "collateral victim" of acid violence in Mexico.

In March 2017, she was assaulted by her daughter's Argentine ex-husband. "He came to attack her, but since he couldn't find her, he came for me. He said he was going to 'destroy what she loved the most," she said.

Despite suffering burns on nearly half her body, Avila is glad that she was the victim, not her daughter. "I couldn't imagine what it's like to have your life destroyed so young, and even more so if he's the father of your children," she said. —AFP

Relief and alarm as El Salvador rounds up alleged 'gangsters'

87 civilians killed in 72 hours of violence

SAN SALVADOR, El Salvador: An unprecedented round up of alleged gangsters in El Salvador has netted thousands of suspects and brought relief to citizens living in constant fear. But the clampdown has drawn complaints of rights abuses, and experts say mass arrests are but a stop-gap as long as so many Salvadorans have no feasible exit from a life of penury.

With a poverty rate of 30.7 percent and sky-high unemployment that pushes ever more people to emigrate, a career as a gangster is one of few options available to those who remain. The most prominent gangs, Mara Salvatrucha (MS-13) and Barrio 18, count some 70,000 members in the country of 6.5 million people. Almost half are thought to be behind bars.



I have had to bury my brother

They eke out a living by extorting protection money from anyone who wishes to avoid harm and from drug dealing that brings them into regular conflict with one another. In a particularly bloody weekend in March, 87 ordinary civilians died at the hands of gangs in 72 hours of violence around the country. That bloodbath prompted President Nayib Bukele to announce a state of emergency that has allowed the police and military to round up more than 18,000 alleged gang members in just a month.

'Trade is flowing'

In the short term, removing criminals from the streets has allowed residents and entrepreneurs to breathe a sigh of relief. At least temporarily. "On some of my routes, the criminals are no longer collecting protection money," bus company operator Juan Pablo Alvarez told AFP. The gangs have extracted a heavy toll from him over the years, he said. "I have had to bury my brother, more than 10 col-

Kharkiv youth brave the bombs to deliver food

KHARKIV, Ukraine: With their red Opel Astra blaring techno music and the boot full to the brim with supplies, three Ukrainian volunteers deliver aid to Kharkiv neighbourhoods targeted by Russian rockets. While the previous two days had been fairly quiet in Ukraine's second city, on Tuesday, the roar of Ukrainian cannon and Russian artillery rang out again.

The frontline is less than five kilometres (three miles) from Kharkiv's northern and eastern districts. The Russian border itself is only a few dozen kilometres away. None of that discourages the volunteers Nazar, Alexei and Oleg.

Outside a kindergarten now serving as a food storage centre, they load their car boot with plastic bags containing bread and canned food. "Our main goal is to feed children and the elderly, they need it most," said Nazar Tishchenko, 34. "Unfortunately, at the moment, people have no money or work. Many of them can't even get to a supermarket," he added.

leagues and 25 employees, mainly drivers," he added. In the city center of San Salvador, where even vegetable sellers fall victim to racketeers, vendor Felipe told AFP he, too, was enjoying a reprieve from being shaken down.

"We are not paying anything, the guys (gangsters) have not been seen, they have practically disappeared and the trade is flowing," said Felipe, who preferred to withhold his last name for fear of reprisal. Clients "have stopped being afraid of coming to the (city) center."

Eduardo Cader, president of the Salvadoran Industry Association, said delivery trucks were, for the first time in a long time, able to enter certain areas where they previously had to pay bribes. According to a recent CID Gallup poll, an overwhelming majority of Salvadorans support Bukele's anti-gang operation. And on Sunday, lawmakers extended the state of emergency for another month. But not everyone is on board.

'Criminal populism'

Emergency powers have done away with the need for arrest warrants, and sentences for gang membership have

been raised five-fold to up to 45 years. Rights observers say innocent people are getting caught in the dragnet and journalists have raised censorship fears over jail terms of up to 15 years for "sharing" gang-related messages in the media.

Rather than ordinary courts, suspected gangsters are brought before judges whose identities are hidden, ostensibly to protect them. But sitting judge Juan Antonio Duran told AFP these were measures of "criminal populism." He pointed out that trial by an anonymous judge, without witnesses or even the defendant present-as has happened-"is prohibited by the constitution." On Monday, Amnesty International said Bukele's state of emergency "has created a perfect storm of human rights violations."

And US Secretary of State Antony Blinken reminded Bukele last week that "we can tackle violence and crime while also protecting civil rights and fundamental freedoms." Veronica Aguirre, 26, claimed her husband was arrested groundlessly, telling AFP that under the state of emergency, "we cannot provide proof" of innocence. — AFP

Music against bombs

With the car filled up, it heads off to a former post office now serving as an aid centre distributing meat. There, they exchange bread for chicken legs. At the wheel is Alexei, 23, a wiry youngster with blue eyes and a single lock of hair on his shaved skull. Starting the delivery operation was his idea. For two years, he delivered bread to Kharkiv in the Donbas region in eastern Ukraine before getting work as a mechanic.

When the war broke out, he went back to delivering bread, then when his company shut down he started doing deliveries himself. "But I couldn't do it alone, so I asked Nazar to help me," Alexei said. Outside the former post office, more than 100 people wait in a queue. With the chicken on board, they set off to do their first delivery, the red Opel driving through the streets with techno playing at full blast.

"We cannot drive without music. If there is shelling, we simply put up the volume. We are tired of the bombing. (The music) helps us relax, we're not afraid," Nazar said. Russian rockets pound Kharkiv-home to nearly 1.5 million people before the war-almost every day, its northern and eastern districts particularly affected. The strikes, which come at random times at any hour of the day or night, can sometimes prove deadly. One day during a bombing, all the shelters were closed, said Nazar. "We couldn't hide so we lay on the ground and protected civilians to save them." — AFP

Disgraced surgeon on trial in Sweden

STOCKHOLM, Sweden: An Italian doctor who made headlines for pioneering windpipe surgery went on trial in Sweden on Wednesday, charged with assault for performing the experimental procedure.

Paolo Macchiarini won plaudits in 2011 after claiming to have performed the world's first synthetic trachea transplants while a surgeon at Stockholm's Karolinska Institute.

The procedure was hailed as a breakthrough in regenerative medicine. But allegations soon emerged that the risky procedure had been carried out on at least one individual who had not been critically ill at the time of the operation.

Dressed in a blue suit, the 63-year-old listened to translated audio as prosecutors listed the charges of "aggravated assault" against three patients. The Karolinska Institute has confirmed that the three individuals have since died, but did not directly link the deaths to the operations.

"Paolo Macchiarini has carried out the surgery with complete disregard for science and tried experience," prosecutor Karin Lundstrom-Kron told the court. Macchiarini has maintained they constituted treatments and not experiments, and denied being criminally responsible. "His only motivation has been to treat the patients," his lawyer Bjorn Hurtig told the court.

In 2013, the Karolinska hospital suspended all transplants and refused to extend Macchiarini's contract as a surgeon. A year later, several surgeons at the hospital filed a complaint alleging that Macchiarini had downplayed the risks of the procedure.

Macchiarini carried out three surgeries at Karolinska University Hospital — where he also worked as a surgeon — in 2011 and 2012, using an artificial windpipe made of plastic and coating it with the patient's own stem cells.

Together with his colleagues, he performed a total of eight such transplants between 2011 and 2014, the five others taking place in Russia.

An external review in 2015 found Macchiarini guilty of research misconduct, but despite sacking him, the Karolinska Institute repeatedly defended him until 2018, when it found him and several other researchers guilty.

The university's principal stepped down over the scandal, as well as a number of other people. Medical journal The Lancet in 2018 retracted two papers authored by Macchiarini. The trial, held in the Solna district court near the Karolinska Institute, is scheduled to take place over 13 days. — AFP

Myanmar junta court jails Suu Kyi for 5 years for corruption

'The days of Aung San Suu Kyi as a free woman are effectively over'

YANGON, Myanmar: A Myanmar junta court on Wednesday sentenced Aung San Suu Kyi to five years in jail for corruption, part of a barrage of criminal cases that could see the deposed civilian leader jailed for decades. Suu Kyi has been in military custody since a coup ousted her government in February last year and plunged Myanmar into turmoil.

In the latest case, the Nobel laureate was accused of accepting a bribe of \$600,000 in cash and gold bars. After two days of delays, the special court in the military-built capital Naypyidaw handed down its verdict and sentence at 9:30 am (0300 GMT) on Wednesday. "Regarding taking gold and dollars from U Phyo Min Thein, the court sentenced her to five years' imprisonment," junta spokesperson Zaw Min Tun told AFP.

"She will be under house arrest. I do not know whether she asked for appeal. They are working according to the legal way. As far as I know, she's in good health." Local media, citing unnamed sources close to the court, later reported she plans to appeal Wednesday's conviction for corruption. Suu

Kyi still faces a raft of other criminal charges, including violating the official secrets act, corruption and electoral fraud, and could be jailed for more than 100 years if convicted on all counts.

The 76-year-old had already been sentenced to six years in jail for incitement against the military, breaching Covid-19 rules and breaking a telecommunications law-although she will remain under house arrest while she fights other charges. She has not appealed any of those convictions.

Journalists have been barred from attending the court hearings and Suu Kyi's lawyers have been banned from speaking to the media. Under a previous junta regime, Suu Kyi spent long spells under house arrest in her family mansion in Yangon, Myanmar's largest city. Today, she is confined to an undisclosed location in the capital, with her link to the outside world limited to brief pre-trial meetings with her lawvers.

"The days of Aung San Suu Kyi as a free woman are effectively over," Phil Robertson Deputy Asia Director, Human Rights Watch told AFP. "Destroying popular democracy in Myanmar also means getting rid of Aung San Suu Kyi, and the junta is leaving nothing to chance."

unrest which the military sought to crush by force. According to a local monitoring group, the crackdown has left more than 1,700 civilians dead and seen some 13,000 arrested. Suu Kyi has been the face of Myanmar's democratic hopes for more than 30 years, but her earlier six-year sentence already meant she is likely

to miss elections the junta has said it plans to hold by next year.

Independent Myanmar analyst David Mathieson said the junta was using the criminal cases to make Suu Kyi "politically irrelevant". "This is just another squalid step in solidifying the coup," he told AFP. "This is politically motivated pure and simple."

Many of her political allies have also been arrested since the coup, with one chief minister sentenced to 75 years in jail, while many others have been forced into hiding. A tranche of ousted lawmakers from her National League for Democracy (NLD)



formed a parallel "National Unity Government" (NUG) in a bid to undermine the junta's legitimacy.

However, the NUG holds no territory and has not been recognised by any foreign government. Numerous "People's Defence Force" (PDF) civilian militias have sprung up around the country to take the fight to the junta.

Analysts say Myanmar's heavily armed, welltrained army has been surprised by the effectiveness of the PDFs and in some areas struggled to contain them. Last week junta supremo Min Aung

The turmoil that has engulfed Myanmar in the wake of the coup has spooked foreign investors who flocked to the country after the dawn of democracy around 2011. Energy giants TotalEnergies and Chevron, British American Tobacco and Japanese brewer Kirin have all announced plans to pull out. —AFP

Pakistan separatist group warns China of more deadly attacks

KARACHI: A Pakistan separatist group warned Wednesday of more deadly attacks on Chinese targets, a day after a woman suicide bomber killed four people-including three teachers posted from Beijing. The Baloch Liberation Army-one of several groups fighting for independence in Pakistan's biggest province-claimed responsibility for Tuesday's blast, saying it was the first time a woman had "self sacrificed" for the group.

Chinese nationals and interests have regularly been targeted by separatists in Balochistan, where Beijing is involved in lucrative mining and energy projects. "Hundreds of highly trained male and female members of the Baloch Liberation Army's Majeed Brigade are ready to carry out deadly attacks in any part of Balochistan and Pakistan,' spokesman Jeeyand Baloch said in a statement published in English.

He threatened Beijing with "even harsher" attacks unless the neighbouring country halted its "exploitation projects" and "occupying of the Pakistani state". Three Chinese teachers and a Pakistani driver were killed near the gate of the Confucius Institute at Karachi University, when the bomber detonated explosives next to their minibus.

A security official at the university told AFP he had previously raised concerns about the safety of 15 Chinese staff on the campus. "Reports emerged in February that an attack might be carried out on campus," the source, who asked not be named, told AFP.

The bomber was named as 30-year-old Shaari Baloch, a married mother of an eight-year-old girl and four-year-old boy, the BLA said, adding that she was a science teacher studying for a mast degree. Police confirmed the details.

Suicide attacks by women are very rare in Pakistan, reported only four times in recent years. China's Ministry of Foreign Affairs urged Pakistan to ensure the safety of all Chinese citizens and interests in the country and to launch a full investigation. It also advised citizens to "take strict precautions, and do not go out unless necessary"

China is upgrading energy links and infrastructure as part of a \$54 billion programme known as the China-Pakistan Economic Corridor, with both nations wary of security threats to the projects. In April 2021 a suicide bomb attack at a luxury hotel hosting the Chinese ambassador in Quetta, the provincial capital of Balochistan, killed four and wounded dozens.

Denmark signs deal for prisoners

COPENHAGEN: Denmark on Wednesday signed an agreement with Pristina to send 300 prisoners to Kosovo to reduce overcrowding in the kingdom's busy jails. The two countries initially agreed in December for the Scandinavian country to rent 300 jail cells for an annual fee of 15 million euros (\$16 million). "We have now signed a ground-breaking agreement that will ensure better capacity in our overcrowded prisons and will ease the pressure on our prison officers," Justice Minister Nick Haekkerup said in a statement. The inmates will be sent to a prison in Gjilan town-about 50 kilometres (30 miles) from the capital Pristina-starting from early 2023. The foreign prisoners will be deported after serving their sentence. "With this agreement, Denmark also sends a clear signal to foreigners from third-party countries who have been sentenced to deportation," Hackkerup said. —AFP

Sudan releases key civilian figure

KHARTOUM: Sudanese authorities released a former member of the ruling Sovereign Council on Wednesday, a lawyer said, the second key civilian figure to be freed in two days. "Mohamed al-Fekki has been released," defence lawyer Azhari al-Haj said, more than two months after the politician was detained on February 13. On Tuesday, authorities released Khaled Youssef, a former minister and prominent opponent of a military coup led by army chief Abdel Fattah al-Burhan on October 25 last year. The military's power grab derailed a fragile transition to civilian rule that had been established in the wake of longtime autocrat Omar al-Bashir's fall from power in 2019. Fekki's spell in detention was his second since last year's coup. —AFP

11 electrocuted in India

NEW DELHI: At least 11 people including three minors were killed Wednesday after a temple chariot procession came into contact with a high-voltage wire in India, police said. Initial indications suggested that the crowd used water to contain an initial fire after the top of the chariot touched the wire in the southern state of Tamil Nadu. At least 15 other people were hospitalised after the incident at around 3:00 am (2130 GMT) in the city of Thanjavur. "The top of the chariot was heavily decorated and that is the part that hit the wire," senior police officer V Balakrishnan told AFP. The victims were part of the team that was pulling the chariot. At least three people died on the spot. Hundreds of devotees took part in the procession which has taken place annually for around 90 years. A senior police official told broadcaster NDTV that the power line along the temple route is usually turned off but this time it was kept on. —AFP

Mandela ally reflects on crises as S Africa celebrates freedom

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa: As South Africa on Wednesday marks a key date in the fight against apartheid, one of the last surviving leaders of that struggle says the nation's liberators have fallen out of touch with the people. In an interview with AFP, 87-year-old Mac Maharaj warned that corruption risked undermining the gains of the democracy that he fought and suffered for.

"Everything shows it has lost contact with the ground," Maharaj said of the ruling African National Congress (ANC). He was one of the party's leading figures, spending more than a decade imprisoned alongside Nelson Mandela. Maharaj famously smuggled Mandela's autobiography "Long Walk to Freedom" out of prison and joined Mandela's cabinet after he won the first free elections on April 27, 1994.

But a judicial inquiry this year laid out an extensive web of graft and cronyism under former president Jacob Zuma that left even basic government services gutted. Maharaj also served as Zuma's

> matic bag of issues that started well before he was born — including relations with arch-rival India.

> Bhutto was sworn in two weeks after he helped lead an alliance that toppled Imran Khan and saw Shehbaz Sharif become prime minister.

His first foreign mission in the role will be accompanying Sharif Thursday to Saudi Arabia, a key trade partner and regular source of relief for Pakistan's struggling economy.

Bhutto is the son of assassinated former prime minister Benazir Bhutto and ex-president Asif Ali Zardari, as well as the grandson of another former premier, Zulfikar Ali Bhutto.

He became party leader aged just 19, while a student at Oxford University, following his mother's assassination in 2007.

She, in turn, had taken over the party's stewardship from her mother Nusrat, who became chairwoman following the execution of her husband Zulfikar in 1979 under military dictator Zia-ul-Haq. The new foreign minister is considered a progressive, in his mother's image, and has frequently

Political commentators have mixed opinions on Bhutto's abilities — or how long he can maintain good relations with premier Sharif, of the rival Pakistan Muslim League-N (PML-N) party.

"I believe he is an un-tested missile," analyst Hassan Askari Rizvi told AFP. "It is too early for a young MP like Bilawal Bhutto... and it will be difficult for him to handle issues Pakistan faces, with serious challenges on external fronts."

Fellow analyst Farzana Bari disagreed. "I think Bilawal is intelligent enough to hold the fort," she told AFP, adding he was "more progressive" than the leaders of other political parties. —AFP



KUWAIT: The Ordinary General Assembly (GA) of the Health Assurance Hospitals Company (DHAMAN) was held vesterday at the Company's headquarters, with an attendance percentage of (74%). Financial indicators

Although the company continues to bear the burden of establishment costs and construction of hospitals and primary healthcare centers, the operating income increased by 326% with the start of the Company's operational activities in three primary healthcare centers during the current year 2021, while the value of non-current assets increased from KD 78,995,601 for the year 2020 to KD 113,726,046 in 2021, at a rate of 44%. Total equity amounted to KD 181,337,241 for the year 2021.

Arab added that in preparation for the start of operations in the Company's hospitals anticipated in 2022, the relevant departments commenced developing the administrative and technical systems, as well as procedures necessary to manage and organize work at DHAMAN Hospitals in a smooth and orderly manner. The electronic Unified Health Record System was implemented, which increases improving the process of collecting, classifying and disseminating data in two phases, the first in primary healthcare centers and the second will be implemented in DHAMAN hospitals in Ahmadi

Shuaiba Industrial Co's net profits reach KD 1,341,388

Distinguished performance; best total sales of KD 12,290,351

KUWAIT: Deputy Chairman of the Board and Chief Executive Officer of Shuaiba Industrial Co Bader Al-Qattan said the company's annual financial results reflected the strength of its financial status, its quality investments and efficiency of its operation, adding the company is committed to going ahead with achieving its goals through studied and steady steps that aim at maximizing shareholder equity.

Al-Qattan, who spoke following the general assembly that was held on Wednesday, said 2021 was an extension of the correct approach the company is taking and efforts of the board of directors and the executive administration. He said shareholders approved the distribution of cash dividends of 12 fils per share.

He said the company registered a distinguished performance through the achieve-

ment of best total sales of KD 12,290,351 for the previous year, a growth percentage of 4.49 percent from the previous year. He said the total operational profit for the current period is KD 2,685,225, compared to KD 2,379,139, which is 12.87 percent from last year in the presence of fierce competition inside and outside Kuwait, and the gradual rise in paper prices on the international level.

Al-Qattan said net total profits for the fiscal year ending Dec 31, 2021 reached KD 1,341,388 compared to the same period in the previous year of KD 1,024,917, which is a 30.88 percent growth from 2020. He said despite the regression in the operational environment and the general economic weakness that prevailed last year regionally and internationally in the form of political and social turbulence in the region and the worsening international financial crisis, and

commenting on the financial results for 2021, Industrial Shuaiba exerted efforts to maintain its achievements despite the repercussions of the coronavirus pandemic, its effects and precautionary measures governments worldwide imposed.

The book value reached 187 fils per share in 2021 compared to 184 fils for the previous year, while total assets reached KD 23,309,101 compared to the previous year of KD 22,404,351, a 4.04 percent growth from the previous year. Shareholders' equity reached KD 18,527,523 compared to the same period of last year of KD 18,228,218, a growth of 1.64 percent from the previous year.

Al-Qattan said the company produced and manufactured 23,760 tons this year, as exports still represent around 63 percent of total company sales during 2021.

This is a matter the company is keen to strengthen through maintaining its share in various international markets despite fierce competition.

Russia stops gas supplies to 'unfriendly countries'

MOSCOW: The Kremlin said Wednesday the halt of natural gas supplies to Poland and Bulgaria over the refusal to pay in rubles was a result of unfriendly actions towards Russia. "The need for a new payment method was a result of unprecedented unfriendly steps in the economic sphere and the financial sector, which were taken against us by unfriendly countries," Kremlin spokesman Dmitry Peskov told reporters.

"This need was dictated by the fact that, as you know, they blocked from us-or, to put it plainly, stole-a fairly significant amount of our reserves," Peskov said, adding that this led to a "transition to a new payment system". "So there is no question of blackmail here," Peskov said in response to comments by European Commission chief Ursula von der Leyen, who said this was "another attempt by Russia to blackmail us with gas".

Russia's energy giant Gazprom on Wednesday said it was completely halting gas supplies to Poland and highly

dependent Bulgaria "due to their failure to pay in rubles". President Vladimir Putin last month said Russia will only accept payment for deliveries in its national currency, with buyers required to set up ruble accounts or have their taps turned off. In response to Russia's military campaign in Ukraine, Moscow was hit with unprecedented economic sanctions, which also froze \$300 billion of Russia's foreign currency reserves held abroad.

The war in Ukraine has "significantly" impacted the Middle East and North Africa, with the crisis dealing a heavy blow to low-income countries while benefiting oil-producing states, the IMF said Wednesday. The International Monetary Fund's 2022 growth forecast for the region, which includes Arab countries and Iran, was forecast at 5.0 percent, up from the 4.1 percent prediction for this year made in October.

But the predicted growth masks the disparities between the region's 22 countries, which range from major oil exporters to nations wracked by war and others that depend heavily on wheat imports as well as hydrocarbon imports.

Russia's invasion of Ukraine and economic sanctions on Moscow have affected the region "through a multitude of direct and indirect channels", according to the IMF report. "Prior to the war in Ukraine, the economy in the region was showing strong recovery... the only caveat to that is inflation

started to increase in 2021 and remained high," Jihad Azour, IMF director for the Middle East and Central Asia, told AFP.

The report said inflation in MENA surged to 14.8 percent in 2021 and is projected to remain elevated at 13.9 percent this year, largely due to higher food and energy prices. Azour said low-income countries face increased pressure due to lower levels of food security and heavy reliance on imports from Russia and Ukraine, both major wheat producers.

Sudan and war-torn Yemen are among those particularly hard hit. Emerging markets and middle-income countries, including Egypt, Jordan and Morocco, are forecast to register GDP growth of 4.4 percent, on average. The IMF warned that emerging markets and middle-income countries face worsening prospects, given their governments' limited capacity to cope with inflation as geopolitical uncertainties persist.

However, Azour said that the surge in crude prices has supported economic recovery in oil-exporting countries. "It has compounded the recovery that they have witnessed last year thanks to a high level of vaccination (against COVID-19) and the various measures they took in order to accelerate the recovery," he told AFP. This is particularly true of Saudi Arabia, the Arab world's largest economy and a leading oil exporter, whose GDP expected to grow by 7.6 percent in 2022.— AFP

CAR adopts bitcoin as currency

BANGUI: The Central African Republic (CAR) has adopted bitcoin as legal tender, the president's office said Wednesday, becoming the second country in the world to do so behind El Salvador. Lawmakers unanimously adopted a bill that made bitcoin legal tender alongside the CFA franc and legalized the use of cryptocurrencies, and President Faustin Archange Touadera signed the measure into law, his chief of staff Obed Namsio said in a statement. The CAR "is the first country in Africa to adopt bitcoin as legal tender," Namsio said. "This move places the Central African Republic on the map of the world's boldest and most visionary countries," he declared. The landlocked state is one of the planet's poorest and most troubled nations, with an economy that is heavily dependent on mining.— AFP

Boeing reports \$1.2 bn loss

NEW YORK: Boeing reported a \$1.2 billion first-quarter loss Wednesday, hit by a series of new one-time costs on its Russia business, the Air Force One presidential jet and the new 777X plane. The big US aerospace company now expects first deliveries of the 777X in 2025, resulting in a \$1.5 billion hit to earnings. Results were also dented by costs of \$1 billion connected to Air Force One and a second military aircraft, the T-7 Red Hawk, and \$212 million related to the conflict in Ukraine. The loss marks the latest round of disappointing results for the commercial jet maker, which has also suspended deliveries of its 787 jet due to a series of production issues. Revenues came in at \$14 billion, down eight percent, and-as with profits-missing analyst estimates. Work on the 777X began in 2013, but the timeframe has been repeatedly pushed back as Boeing works to address certification questions from US air safety regulators. — AFP

India slashes size of the biggest IPO

MUMBAI: India has slashed the size of an initial public offering by insurance giant LIC but the share issue will still be the country's largest to date, with a targeted windfall of \$2.7 billion, regulatory filings showed Wednesday. Prime Minister Narendra Modi's government is desperate for proceeds from the IPO by Life Insurance Corporation of India and the sale of other state assets to help fix tattered public finances.

The long-awaited IPO-originally slated for March-will open next week, the filing seen by AFP showed, after the government chose to wait out recent market volatility triggered by the Russian invasion of Ukraine. "While global sentiments are weak, Indian markets are resilient," finance ministry official Tuhin Kanta Pandey told reporters. "This is an opportunity for the Indian consumer to participate in the wealth creation of one of India's most valuable corporations," he said. But the adverse market conditions did force the government to substantially cut its stake sale to 3.5 percent, down from five percent. The government will sell 221 million shares within a price band of 902 to 949 rupees, the prospectus showed. This implies an IPO size of between 200 and 210 billion rupees (\$2.61 billion to \$2.74 billion), overtaking that of payments firm Paytm, which raised \$2.5 billion in November in India's largest public share sale to date.

The offer values LIC at \$78 billion, and follows a years-long effort by bankers and bureaucrats to appraise the mammoth insurer and ready it for listing. Founded in 1956 by nationalizing and combining 245 insurers, LIC was for decades synonymous with life insurance in post-independence India, until the entry of private companies in 2000. It continues to lead the pack with a 61 percent share of the life insurance market in a country of 1.4 billion people, with its army of 1.3 million "LIC agents" giving it huge reach, especially in rural India.

LIC's market share has, however, declined steadily in the face of competition from net-savvy private insurers offering specialized products. The firm warned in its regulatory filing that "there can be no assurance that our corporation will not lose further market share" to private companies. The insurer is also India's largest asset manager, with 39.55 trillion rupees under management as of September 30, including significant stakes in Indian blue chips like Reliance and Infosys.—AFP

Google-parent Alphabet sees quarterly profit slip

SAN FRANCISCO: Shares in Google's parent company Alphabet sank Tuesday after the internet giant reported that earnings in the recently ended quarter missed market expectations, with profit down from a year earlier. Alphabet reported net income of \$16.4 billion in the first quarter on revenue that climbed 23 percent to \$68 billion when compared to the same period last year. Alphabet profit was \$17.9 billion in the first quarter of 2021.

Shares sank nearly five percent to \$2,257 on the news. The quarter brought strong growth in Alphabet's search and cloud computing businesses while the company continued to invest heavily in products and services, chief executive Sundar Pichai said in an earnings release.

While Alphabet saw revenue from online ads climb to more than \$46 billion, the cost of acquiring online "traffic" that helps fuel that income was up some \$2 billion from the same period a year ago, the earnings report showed. Alphabet's ranks of employees grew to just shy of 164,000 people from 140,000 people in the same quarter last year.—AFP

Court rejects Airbnb challenge

LUXEMBOURG: The European Union's top court on Wednesday ruled that property rental platform Airbnb is obliged to share booking data with regional tax authorities in the Belgian capital Brussels. The firm's Irish-based European subsidiary had challenged the Brussels Capital Region's order that it provide information on transactions with tourists who visited the city in 2017. US giant Airbnb's online portal puts travelers in touch with private property owners offering short-term rentals. The firm has been a global success, and reported record profits last year, but is fighting various regulatory challenges in several jurisdictions. Brussels imposes a tourist tax on overnight accommodation, but the firm argued that, under EU market law, the city could not oblige Airbnb Ireland to provide data about bookings.—AFP

Russia withdraws from UNWTO

MADRID: Russia is withdrawing from the United Nation's tourism body, the UN World Tourism Organization said Wednesday ahead of a vote to suspend Moscow's membership over its invasion of Ukraine. "Russia has announced its intention to withdraw from UNWTO," the UNWTO said in a tweet, adding that Russia's suspension "is effective immediately". The UNWTO announced in March that it wanted to suspend Russia over its invasion of Ukraine. The decision must be approved by two-thirds of its 159 member states at a two-day extraordinary general assembly which got underway in Madrid on Wednesday. The UNWTO said the vote will go ahead even though Russia has said it is withdrawing from the body to give member states "their say". — AFP

In Egypt, the president is a Ramadan TV hero

s Egyptians mark the Muslim fasting month of Ramadan, they are being treated to a blockbuster TV series that celebrates their army marshall turned president, Abdel Fattah Al-Sisi. Fans hail "Al-Ikhtiyar 3" (The Choice 3) for enlightening the masses about Egypt's turbulent recent history. Critics see it as propaganda by a regime that rules with an iron fist.

While the first two seasons paid tribute to soldiers who battle Islamist extremists and to national security agents, the third has the 67-year-old Sisi as its central character. The 30 episodes-watched by millions after the traditional iftar sunset meals-trace the path of the then-defense minister who in 2013 deposed Islamist president Mohamed Morsi on his path to becoming head of state

Sisi himself told a reception this week that Al-Ikhtiyar "tells exactly what happened at the time". Sahar Salaheddine, a columnist for state-owned newspaper Al-Goumhuriya, praised the army-sponsored series for "showing the love the people have for their president", and the actors for being "soft power... soldiers". The lead actor Yasser Galal has by all accounts mastered Sisi's mannerisms, his slightly arched eyebrows, pursed lips and signature whisper.

But, whatever Galal's acting skills, criticizing his performance can be dangerous. The Egyptian Front for Human Rights said

that lawyer Nabil Abu Sheikha, after mocking the show on Facebook, was detained on April 11, accused of "disseminating false information" and belonging to a "terrorist" group. While state prosecutors did not comment on the case, local media reported, citing unnamed "security sources", that Abu Sheikha was being prosecuted for an old case, without mentioning details. Writer Shady Lewis Botros argued in an editorial that Galal's performance evoked "equal amounts of admiration and ridicule" and that, "like the regime's entire propaganda machine, it becomes a mechanical replication of itself".

'Educate new generation'

The film studios of Cairo, long regarded as the Hollywood of the Arab world, have made on-screen heroes of Egyptian presidents before. In 1996, "Nasser 56" told the story of Gamal Abdel Nasser nationalizing the Suez Canal in a two-and-a-half-hour black and white epic. In 2001, his successor Anwar al-Sadat got his own biopic, "Days of Sadat". But Al-Ikhtiyar isn't looking to the past, said one of its screenwriters, Baher Dowidar. He argued the series will serve as nothing less than "a history book" 50 years from now.

The goal, argues the local press, is to "educate the new generation" about Egypt, where over half of the 103-million-strong population is under 25. Those who do not

'Unforeseeable turmoil'

The show is a fictionalized look at the final 96 hours in power of Muslim Brotherhood candidate Morsi, who was elected in 2012 following the Arab Spring

protests and who died in prison in 2019. The army deposed Morsi then violently crushed protests by his supporters in what Human Rights Watch called "one of the world's largest killings of demonstrators in a single day in recent history". A highlight of the TV show, the trailers promised, was to be a series of leaked videos purportedly exposing Muslim Brotherhood leaders including Morsi. One clip of apparently

real-life footage shows Morsi warning the late field marshal Mohamed Tantawi, who was then the de facto president, of "unfore-seeable turmoil" if he did not win the presidential election.

Though the series never sources the footage, it appears to have been shot by the military without the Islamist leaders' knowledge. Lawyer Sherif Gadalla has said in an official complaint that he believes the video shows that Tantawi used to "secretly record his visitors", and argues that the footage should never have been leaked.

An ardent Sisi supporter, Gadalla targets the show's director and producer, not the government, reasoning that "the Egyptian state apparatus is far too intelligent to be the source of the leaks". A very different reaction to the show came from another lawyer, Khaled Ali, a prominent figure on the left. He argued that the show, if indeed historically accurate, proves the innocence of his client Abdelmoneim Aboul Fotouh. The lawyer argued that the series backs the claim of Aboul Fotouh, who ran unsuccessfully against Morsi in the election, that he had no financial ties to the now outlawed Muslim Brotherhoodand announced plans to submit four episodes of the show as evidence to the court. — AFP

'We can't do better'

required in restaurants, bars and shops from May 1, while mandatory masks indoors will be scrapped from June 1. Vertakis said the loosening of restrictions had raised hopes in the industry of a return to 2019 levels, when 33 million tourists had visited.

"But without staff to accommodate this many people, it will be a problem," she said. Nektarios Seremetis, who manages the restaurants and bars at the four-star Thalassa Beach Resort down the same coast, is three waiters short. "Those who worked for us in 2019 left and found jobs in Cyprus or Italy, where salaries are higher," he said.

Tourism Minister Vassilis Kikilias last month suggested some of these vacancies could be filled from among the over 22,000 refugees from Ukraine who have the Federation of Travel Agencies of Greece, told AFP earlier this month. At the Chryssi Akti hotel in Crete, Alexandros Pantelakakis has mostly resigned himself to minding the parasols and lounge chairs on his own this season.

Pantelakakis said many Greeks, including the man normally helping him out on the beach, did not receive enough state support to cope through two pandemic-shortened work seasons. "They hadn't made enough social insurance payments these past two years to earn unemployment benefits," Pantelakakis said. "So when the tourism season (in 2020 and 2021) was cut short by the pandemic, many had to find jobs elsewhere," he said.—AFP

Psychologist testifies that Amber Heard has personality disorders

psychologist hired by lawyers for "Pirates of the Caribbean" star Johnny Depp testified on Tuesday at his defamation case against his former wife Amber Heard that she suffers from twin personality disorders. Shannon Curry, a clinical and forensic psychologist, said she had examined Heard's mental health records and personally evaluated her for 12 hours over two days in December 2021.


Curry said it was her opinion that the 36-year-old actress, who had a starring role in the movie "Aquaman," has borderline personality disorder and histrionic personality disorder. "She obtained scores that were consistent with those diagnoses," Curry said. Lawyers for Heard sought to discredit Curry's testimony during cross-examination, noting she had been hired by Depp's attorneys to testify on his behalf. "If you did not find something that would be in favor of Mr Depp and negative to Miss Heard than you wouldn't be an expert in this case?" Elaine Bredehoft, an attorney for Heard, asked Curry. "I present science regardless of what that science may be," Curry responded.

Curry said some of the primary characteristics of borderline personality disorder include a "lot of inner anger and hostility," a tendency to be "self-righteous" and "fluctuating moods." "They can react violently, they can react physically," she said. "Oftentimes they will be abusive to their partners." "It's almost play-acting," she said.

Curry, who has experience with US combat veterans, said it was her opinion that Heard did not suffer from post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD) as the result of alleged domestic abuse. Heard had "grossly exaggerated" her symptoms of PTSD in a test she was given, she said. The 58-year-old Depp has denied ever being physically abusive towards Heard and has claimed repeatedly at the trial that she was the one who was frequently violent.

'Washed-up actor'

Depp filed a defamation suit against Heard over a column she wrote for The Washington Post in December 2018 in which she described herself as a "public figure representing domestic abuse." Heard never named Depp but he sued her for implying he was a domestic abuser and is seeking \$50 million in damages. The Texas-born Heard countersued, asking for \$100 million and claiming she suffered "rampant physical violence and abuse" at his hands.

Depp, a three-time Oscar nominee, and Heard met in 2009 on the set of the film "The Rum Diary" and were married in February 2015. Their divorce was finalized two years later. Heard's attorneys have alleged that Depp would become a physically and sexually abusive "monster" when he was drunk or on drugs, and pressed him extensively about his drug and alcohol use during his three days of cross-examination on the witness stand. Also testifying Tuesday was Tara Roberts, who for the past 15 years has managed a private island in the Bahamas owned by Depp.

Roberts was asked by Depp's lawyers to recount details of an argument the couple had on the island one evening. "Amber was telling him that he was a washed-up actor," Roberts said. "He was going to die a lonely old man." She said Heard was yelling at Depp, grabbing at him and trying to pull him back into their house.

Roberts said she was "worried" about what might happen and took Depp to a cafe on the island and applied ice to an injury he had received to the bridge of his nose. Depp filed the defamation complaint in the United States after losing a separate libel case in London in November 2020 that he brought against The Sun for calling him a "wife-beater.—AFP

he criminal investigation into the fatal shooting on a US movie starring Alec Baldwin is "nearing completion," the officer leading the probe said Tuesday. Santa Fe Sheriff Adan Mendoza's comments come as his department released a trove of materials around the incident that claimed Halyna Hutchins' life on the set of low-budget Western "Rust," including footage of Baldwin apparently practicing with the gun that killed her. "We've estimated a time frame...in weeks and not months," Mendoza told broadcaster ABC.

"There's a few things that we're waiting

for in the final FBI report in regards to the analysis of the firearm, the munitions, the latent prints and DNA. "We're also waiting on the office of the medical investigator to complete their report and analysis of a little bit more cell phone data." Cinematographer Hutchins, 42, died after being hit by a live round that came from the gun Baldwin was holding as he rehearsed on the New Mexico set in October.

Baldwin, who was a producer as well as the star of the movie, had been told the gun was safe and has previously said he did not pull the trigger. Footage released by the sheriff's department show first responders rushing to treat Hutchins, as well as a dazed Baldwin's first encounters with law enforcement. Other clips, apparently from the now-abandoned movie, show the Hollywood star in period dress sitting in the pew of the wooden church

and pulling out the Colt gun, which he points in the direction of the camera. The moment of the shooting, in which director Joel Souza was also hurt, is not seen.


Criminal charges

Strict measures are supposed to be in place on movie sets to prevent tragedies, including the exclusive use of dummy or

blank rounds in any production involving firearms. But a health and safety probe by New Mexico officials, which levied a fine of over \$136,000, said last week that producers had shown "plain indifference" to these protocols. Mendoza said Tuesday the provenance of the live round that killed Hutchins was "one of the key questions" of the criminal probe.

"Nobody's come forward and admitted to bringing ammunition to the set," he said. The raft of materials includes messages from Hannah Gutierrez-Reed, the young armorer who was responsible for weaponry on the set, that refer to the use of live rounds on another movie. "That's concerning, because it was just a few months before the production of 'Rust' went into effect," Mendoza said. "And these are some of the same employees and people that played a role in the 'Rust' production."—AFP

The Rock brings superheroes to CinemaCon as 'Elvis' returns to Vegas

wayne "The Rock" Johnson topped a superhero-packed bill as Warner Bros presented its upcoming slate of blockbusters at CinemaCon on Tuesday, while Baz Luhrmann's "Elvis" graced the Las Vegas casino stage at the movie industry summit. Johnson-Hollywood's top-grossing actor-appeared unannounced to promote his upcoming DC film "Black Adam" at the annual gathering, where Warner bosses also confirmed a sequel to Robert Pattinson's "The Batman" is on the way.

Further superhero sequels "Shazam! Fury of the Gods" and "Aquaman and the Lost Kingdom," as well as new standalone film "The Flash," were also presented to movie theater executives and managers, who gather each year at Caesars Palace casino to be courted by Hollywood's top studios and A-listers. Johnson described his character in "Black Adam" as "the Dirty Harry of the superhero world," with

Veteran Hong Kong actor found dead in quarantine hotel

enneth Tsang, a stalwart of the "Golden Age" of Cantonese cinema, was found dead in a Hong Kong hotel room on Wednesday while undergoing mandatory quarantine after returning from overseas, local media reported. Tsang, 87, was discovered by staff in a quarantine hotel two days after returning from Singapore, multiple outlets including Now News, the South China Morning Post and Oriental Daily said.

In an incident report, police said they were informed a "body" had been found by hotel staff around noon (0400 GMT). The deceased was an 87-year-old male surnamed Tsang, the incident report said. For Hong Kongers and fans of Cantonese cinema, Tsang was a household name thanks to a career that spanned six decades with

ambiguous morals.

"Heroes don't kill people," says one villain in never-before-seen footage, to which Black Adam replies: "Well I do." Warner and Johnson are banking on "Black Adam"-out in October-becoming a major draw for their DC superhero film universe, which has grossed billions without reaching the heights of the rival and record-breaking Marvel films such as "Avengers: Endgame." Johnson surprised attendees by pretending to speak from Hawaii via video, before suddenly appearing in the Caesars Palace ballroom.

'The original superhero'

Beyond the superhero fare, which dominates modern megaplexes, Baz Luhrmann took the stage to discuss "Elvis." Luhrmann called the film-out in June, starring Austin

While he began acting in earnest in the 1960s, many of his most memorable roles came during the golden period of Hong Kong cinema in the 1980s and 1990s with films like The Killer, Supercop, Peking Opera Blues and Once A Thief. He was also one of the few Hong Kong stars of that era to cross into Hollywood with supporting roles, mostly villains, in movies like The Replacement Killers, Die Another Daya James Bond film-Anna and The King

Butler as Elvis Presley and Tom Hanks as his domineering manager-as less a biopic and more the tale of "America in the 1950s, 60s and 70s."

"At the center of culture, for the good, the bad and the ugly, is the figure Elvis Presley," said Luhrmann, describing the music icon as "the original superhero." "What this movie is about is America in those three epochs: Elvis the rebel, Elvis the highest paid actor in Hollywood and Elvis the living legend, the icon, trapped in that hotel not 10 minutes from here," he told the Las Vegas crowd.

Early footage was shown from "Wonka"-starring Timothee Chalamet as Roald Dahl's chocolatier before he opened his factory-and Olivia Wilde's "Don't Worry Darling," a twisty thriller inspired by mindbending movies such as "The Truman"

and Memoirs of A Geisha.

In what may well prove to be his last interview, Tsang told the Sin Chew Daily he had completed a two-week trip to Malaysia and had flown back to Hong Kong via Singapore. He described relishing time spent solo travelling after being looked after by others for almost all previous trips in his life. "I will quarantine if I must," Tsang told the Chinese language Malaysian newspaper which ran a photo of the actor beaming as he held a piece of durian fruit.

Like China, Hong Kong has stuck to a strict zero-COVID strategy that has kept borders mostly closed throughout the pandemic with compulsory quarantine in designated hotels for returning residents. For much of last year, people had to complete 21-days in quarantine although it has more recently been reduced to seven days. Last week Hong Kong lifted a ban on non-residents flying to the city that had been in place for two years. However, the return of widespread tourism or frictionless business travel in the short term future is unlikely. Airlines are only flying a handful of routes to Hong Kong compared to before the pandemic and carriers that bring in more than five coronavirus cases face a five-day ban on that route under current rules. — AFP

Bowie and body horror

Earlier Tuesday, an experimental new David Bowie documentary featuring neverbefore-seen footage and the late music superstar's own narration was previewed by indie studio Neon. "Moonage Daydream" will premiere at next month's glitzy Cannes film festival before hitting theaters in September. It is the first film to be approved by Bowie's estate, which gave director Brett Morgen access to thousands of hours of archives. "Bowie cannot be defined. He can be experienced," said Morgen.

"We've crafted 'Moonage Daydream' to be a unique cinematic theatrical experience-to offer audiences that which they can't get from a book or an article." Neither biopic nor traditional documentary, the film blends Bowie's songs, concert clips, extensive fan footage and a series of surreal, trippy and abstract images.

Neon also previewed "Crimes of the Future" from David Cronenberg, the director of "Crash" and "The Fly," who pioneered the "body horror" genre. The film starring Kristen Stewart, Viggo Mortenson and Lea Seydoux imagines a world in which humans are forced to speed up their evolution with grisly organ transplants and body modifications to survive their changing environment. Cronenberg told AFP the film, which will also premiere at Cannes, was "a difficult film maybe, an extreme film, an unusual film." CinemaCon runs until Thursday. — AFP

British DJ Tim Westwood accused of sexual misconduct

everal women have accused veteran British hip-hop DJ Tim Westwood of predatory sexual behavior or groping, allegations which the radio and former TV presenter on Tuesday strenuously denied. Three women told the BBC and the Guardian newspaper that the former BBC Radio 1 DJ, 64, had abused his position in the music industry to exploit them sexually. Two of the women say they agreed to come to London to discuss their musical

aspirations but were driven to Westwood's flat where he initiated unwanted and unexpected sex.

One of the women was 19 at the time, when Westwood was 53. Another woman who was already in an R&B group said she was subjected to unwanted sex when she met the DJ when she was 17. Four other women accuse the DJ, who was an early champion of hip-hop in the UK, of touching them inappropriately while posing for photographs at events where Westwood was performing. A representative for Westwood said in a statement that the DJ "strongly denies all allegations of inappropriate behavior. "In a career that has spanned 40 years, there have never been any complaints made against him officially or unofficially. —AFP

Depleted Heat down Hawks, Morant sinks Wolves in thriller

MIAMI: Victor Oladipo led the depleted Miami Heat to a series-clinching 97-94 victory over the Atlanta Hawks on Tuesday as Ja Morant produced a dazzling late scoring spree to give Memphis a thrilling win over Minnesota in the NBA playoffs. Miami, missing injured stars Jimmy Butler and Kyle Lowry, produced a superb defensive performance to shut down Atlanta and advance to an Eastern Conference semi-final series against either Philadelphia or Toronto.

Oladipo, who only returned to action in March after an 11-month injury layoff, was handed his first start of the playoffs by Heat coach Erik Spoelstra. The 29-year-old two-time All-Star repaid that faith with a 23-point display alongside Bam Adebayo, who finished with 20 points and 11 rebounds. The win marked a fairytale return to center stage for Oladipo, whose career has been decimated by injuries and surgeries over the past three years.

Oladipo was sidelined for nearly a year after undergoing surgery to repair a ruptured quadriceps tendon in May last year. He had undergone surgery to treat the same problem in Jan 2019. "There's nothing I can't handle," Oladipo said after Tuesday's win. "There's nothing I haven't gone through. At the end of the day I feel like I can come back and get through anything. So when they told me I needed to start tonight, I just stepped up to the plate and did everything I could to help my team win... this is only the beginning."


Adebayo took pride with a Miami defensive performance that restricted Hawks star Trae Young to just 11 points. De'Andre Hunter led the Atlanta scoring with 35 points. "We knew it was going to be a fight to the end, we just had to finish it with our defense," Adebayo said. "Defense wins championships."

Morant magic sinks Wolves

In the Western Conference playoffs Morant scored a gravity-defying last-gasp layup as the Grizzlies conjured an epic late fightback to stun the Minnesota Timberwolves 111-109. Morant's wizardry with one second remaining sealed an enthralling battle which leaves Memphis 3-2 ahead in the best-of-seven series with game six in Minnesota on Friday.

Minnesota had led by 13 points early in the fourth quarter after big performances from Karl Anthony-Towns, who finished with 28 points and Anthony Edwards (22 points). But Morant, who bagged 30 points, suddenly found his scoring touch to haul Memphis back into contention. The 22-year-old rising star of the NBA erupted for 18 points in the fourth quarter as Memphis outscored Minnesota 37-24 in the final period.

The catalyst for Morant's masterpiece appeared to be a jaw-dropping dunk over Wolves guard Malik

Beasley at the end of the third quarter that brought the Memphis crowd to their feet. Morant later said he was "not that excited" by the dunk, but added: "It definitely ignited the crowd and that gave us some energy." Seattle chase elusive CONCACAF Champions League crown

MEXICO CITY: The Seattle Sounders are eyeing an end to more than two decades of futility on Wednesday when they take on Mexico's Pumas UNAM in the first leg of the CONCACAF Champions League final. The Sounders are bidding to become the first Major League Soccer side to be crowned continental champions since Los Angeles Galaxy lifted the title in 2000.

No MLS side has won the tournament since it was remodeled in 2008 as the CONCACAF Champions League, along the lines of the UEFA Champions League. Since the Galaxy's victory 22 years ago, the top competition for teams from North America, Central America and the Caribbean has been treated as the near-exclusive fiefdom for teams from Mexico. Pumas would become the 17th straight Mexican side to lift the title if they thwart Seattle's ambitions this year.

Despite that record of Mexican dominance, the Sounders start this year's final as favorites in the eyes of many. Seattle have already accounted for one Mexican club in their journey to the final, beating Leon 4-1 on aggregate in the quarter-finals before vanquishing New York City in the last four. The Sounders also have the advantage of playing the May 4 second leg at home, where they have a 100 percent record in this year's tournament.

"I think it's an incredible, historic opportunity," Seattle general manager Garth Lagerwey told the club's website. "I know I've been perhaps hyperbolic in some of my public speaking about it but everything I say is sincere. This is for immortality." Lagerwey says a Seattle victory would be the "biggest achievement in club history, period."

"It's certainly the hardest tournament to win, if you think about what you have to achieve just to qualify for the tournament and then the process you have to go through playing games both home and away, just a massive amount of travel, starting early in the season, just all the difficulties, there can be no greater degree of difficulty then winning this tournament," he said.

Lessons to learn Seattle's title ambitions received a reality check

The Sounders squandered leads of 2-0 and 3-1 as San Jose forward Cristian Espinoza scored a hat-trick to engineer victory. NEW DELHI: Royal Challengers Bangalore skipper Faf du Plessis is confident Virat Kohli will overcome his IPL batting slump. Kohli took his Indian Premier League tally this season to just 128 runs from nine matches after scoring a scratchy nine in the defeat to Rajasthan Royals on Tuesday following two golden ducks. Moved up to open the batting, Kohli was inches away from failing to score for a third match in a row with a shot that fell just short of a fielder.

The former India captain remained jittery and lasted only 10 balls before an attempted pull shot off Prasidh Krishna was edged on to his helmet to give a catch at cover point. "Great players go through things like this and great characters have to find a way to get through it," Du Plessis said after his team fell 29 runs short of a modest target of 145. "Our thinking was to get him into the game straight away so he does not sit on the side and think too much about the game. "He is a fantastic cricketer, so we still back him that he will turn it around and it's just the case of getting a good start."

Kohli, one of the best batsmen of the modern era, has failed to score a century for more than two years for club or country and departed first ball in his previous two IPL innings. He has been the flagbearer for Indian cricket and Royal Challengers Bangalore (RCB), for whom he amassed a record 973 runs in the 2016 edition of the Twenty20 tournament.

"He is a great player and seen many ups and downs in his career," Bangalore coach Sanjay Bangar told reporters. "I have seen him up close and he is a fighter. So he will come out of this run of low scores in the last three matches and will soon get us a win." Bangar, who worked as India batting coach with Kohli, said he "possesses the art of coming out of difficult situations". "His mental capability is such that he will do well in the upcoming games."

The match also saw England's Jos Buttler, the 2022 IPL's highest scorer with 499 runs and three sparkling centuries, make just eight, his lowest of the season. Former India coach Ravi Shastri called for Kohli to take a break and come back refreshed. "He has played non-stop cricket, captained the team across formats. It would be wise of him to take a break," Shastri said on an internet chat show.—AFP

Morikawa puts golf glory ahead of financial gain

LONDON: British Open champion Collin Morikawa on Tuesday insisted he will always put golf glory ahead of financial gain amid the controversy over a series of new Saudi-backed tournaments. Phil Mickelson's agent revealed on Monday that the six-time major winner has requested a release from the PGA Tour to play the first LIV Golf Invitational Series event in June.

The lucrative event has reportedly persuaded 15 of the world's top 100 players to ask for their releases from the PGA and DP World Tours in order to play at Centurion Club from June 9-11. On a conference call to promote his British Open title defence at St Andrews later this year, Morikawa made it clear he would not be joining the rush to chase a profit.

"No. I said at Riviera earlier this year (in February) that my alliance is to the PGA Tour," he said. "Will I still watch what's going on? I mean, yeah. You're curi-

ous to what's going on. But do I care who's going to be playing or do I care who's going to be making money?

"No, not at all. At the end of the day I'm here to win majors. I'm here to win PGA Tour tournaments. Hopefully return and defend my Race to Dubai title. There's a lot of other things that are on my mind and a lot of goals that I set at the beginning of the year that I look forward to."

World number three Morikawa believes he is not alone in prioritizing tournament victories over money. But the 25-year-old concedes that he has not looked too closely at whether players deserve a greater share of the revenue generated by major championships.

"Sure, I'm guessing that the majors do make a lot of money and there's never anything bad about making more money, but when you say something like that and you put us in the boat of the only other thing that could keep us here is the money, then that's just not true," he said.

"Because if that were the case, then you would have had 100 out of 100 sign up for this other tour that's happening, but you don't, right? You have the 15, the unknown 15. When it comes down to it, it's just the love for the game. I think what the PGA Tour and the DP World Tour have aligned themselves to do and what we're going to be growing into is great." — AFP

Dismissed at first, Europa Conference League captures the imagination

PARIS: The subject of some derision when it was introduced at the start of this season, the new Europa Conference League has turned out to be a hit and now has some of the continent's most famous names in the semifinals eyeing a rare piece of European silverware. Leicester City take on Jose Mourinho's Roma and Feyenoord play Marseille in the first legs of their semifinal ties this Thursday, with the winners advancing to the final in Tirana in late May.

Twenty-three years after the abolition of the Cup Winners' Cup, the idea behind UEFA's new third-tier European competition was supposedly to give clubs from smaller countries the chance to play more matches, earn more money and get more exposure. It has seen the unheralded Norwegians of Bodo/Glimt put six past Roma and later knock out Celtic on their way to the quarter-finals, while the Slovenians of Mura claimed a famous win over Tottenham Hotspur as the English giants were knocked out in the group stage.

Both Bodo/Glimt and Mura started the season in the Champions League but defeats in the qualifying rounds saw them effectively relegated. It was the same for Leicester and Marseille, who each ended up in the Conference League after being knocked out of the Europa League group stage. Leicester won last season's FA Cup and just missed out on Champions League qualification, so their manager Brendan Rodgers appeared to turn his nose up at the idea of going into the knockout phase of the new competition.

"I've got to be honest, I don't even know what the competition is," he said in an interview with broadcaster BT Sport. "With all due respect to the competition, I'm

not sure what it is. But I'm sure I will find out soon enough." Leicester have since knocked out Randers of Denmark, French club Rennes and former European Cup winners PSV Eindhoven on their way to the semi-finals.

Their story is hardly the most romantic - after all, the Foxes won the Premier League in 2016 and are the 15thrichest club in the world according to the latest Deloitte Football Money League. Yet, having lost a Champions League quarter-final to Atletico Madrid five years ago, Leicester are now in a European semifinal for the first time in their history.

'I would like to win it'

Roma's European pedigree is on another level, with the Italians having reached the European Cup final in 1984 before later losing a UEFA Cup final. They were Champions League semifinalists only four years ago but this run has certainly captured the imagination. Over 65,000 fans were at the Stadio Olimpico to see them beat Bodo/Glimt in the quarterfinals and there will be another huge crowd at next week's second leg.

Mourinho, meanwhile, could complete the sweep of the main European honors having previously won two Champions Leagues as well as the UEFA Cup at Porto and its successor, the Europa League, at Manchester United. "I don't want to lie to you guys and tell you this competition doesn't interest me. It does interest me. I would like to win it," Mourinho said at the start of the campaign. The other semi-final brings together two former European Cup winners, with Feyenoord having won that prize in 1970 and Marseille doing so in 1993.

Feyenoord also won the UEFA Cup twice while



Marseille have lost in four European finals, including the 1991 European Cup and in the Europa League in 2018. Both sides have fervent fanbases but, in the age of the super club, Champions League glory is beyond their reach and even success in the Europa League is a big ask. Far from dismissing the Conference League, both have embraced it, especially Feyenoord, whose adventure began in the second qualifying round last July against Drita of Kosovo and could end 10 months later in Tirana. —AFP

How Tedesco has transformed RB Leipzig's season

BERLIN: When RB Leipzig sacked Jesse Marsch last December, it was inconceivable that the struggling German club would approach the end of the season on the brink of reaching two finals. In the last four months, Marsch's replacement Domenico Tedesco has overhauled RB Leipzig, who are confident of beating Rangers in Thursday's Europa League semi-final, first leg at home.

Since he took charge, Leipzig have shot up the Bundesliga from 11th last December to fourth, punched their ticket for next month's German Cup final and reached the last four of the Europa League. Saturday's 2-1 home Bundesliga defeat to Union Berlin, when they conceded two late goals, was Leipzig's first loss since February and ended a forwards by Tedesco's approach. 15-game unbeaten run.

to the (German) cup final when I think back to last December," admitted club boss Oliver Mintzlaff. The turnaround has been nothing short of miraculous under Tedesco, who coached Schalke to sec-

ond place in Germany's top flight in 2017-18. Since the 36-year-old German-Italian took over, Leipzig have picked up 32 points in the second half of the season - exactly the same as Bayern Munich, who were confirmed Bundesliga champions on Saturday for the 10th straight year.

Tedesco abandoned a back four for a compact three or five-man defence supported by wing-backs Angelinho and Nordi Mukiele. French winger Christopher Nkunku has thrived on the space created inside for Leipzig's



Mourinho rebuilding reputation as Roma eye European glory

MILAN: Jose Mourinho returns to England on Thursday on a wave of enthusiasm as upbeat Roma prepare for their third European semifinal in five seasons with fans firmly behind their charismatic manager. Mourinho's spell at Tottenham, the first since 2002 where he left a club without winning a trophy, left the man formerly known as The Special One's stock at an all-time low.

A crop of attack-minded coaches had left Mourinho behind as he crept towards his 60s, but he is rebuilding his reputation in the country where his star has never waned thanks to the historic treble he won for Inter Milan nearly 12 years ago. Defeat on Saturday at Italian champions Inter ended a 12-match unbeaten run in Serie A and fifth-placed Roma's outside hopes of reaching the Champions League.

They were outclassed at the San Siro by a superior team

who are heavily fancied to retain their league title but the 3-1 loss failed to end the positive vibes in Rome ahead of Thursday's trip to Leicester for the first leg of their European Conference League semi. Fans have been packing the Stadio Olimpico for recent matches with more than 65,000 attending wins over Salernitana and Bodo/Glimt and 1,600 will be in fine voice at the King Power Stadium hoping that their team end an England hoodoo.

"He's instilled in everyone the idea of never giving up, staying on it and coming together to get results," starlet Nicolo Zaniolo said in an interview with UEFA. "We have a coach who knows what it takes to win, I think we've got a chance." Roma

City let Madrid off the hook in 7-goal classic

MANCHESTER: Pep Guardiola said he had to reiterate to his players they had beaten Real Madrid 4-3 in a Champions League classic on Tuesday despite the disappointment of not killing off their semifinal tie at the Etihad. Kevin De Bruyne, Gabriel Jesus, Phil Foden and Bernardo Silva were on target for Guardiola's men, who held a two-goal lead three times. But Karim Benzema's double and a brilliant individual effort from Vinicius Junior gave Madrid hope of another famous Champions League fightback at the Santiago Bernabeu on May 4.

Guardiola lamented letting Liverpool escape "alive" in the Premier League title race after a 2-2 draw at the Etihad nine days ago and will have similar regrets after a blistering opening that could have seen City go 4-0 up inside half an hour. "I want to try to convince to my players that we won the game and we have to go to Bernabeu to play like we did today," said Guardiola. "It doesn't matter if we would have won by one goal or four, in the Bernabeu you have to show who you are otherwise there is no chance. It is a good test for us."

Madrid, the record 13-time European champions, were playing in their 30th semifinal to City's third, but the English champions lived up to their tag as pre-tie favorites early on. Only 92 seconds had passed before the Madrid rearguard was breached by Riyad Mahrez's

quick feet and perfect cross for De Bruyne to stoop and head past Thibaut Courtois. Jesus pounced to make it 2-0 after just 10 minutes when David Alaba failed to deal with De Bruyne's cross. "We started the game very badly, we were too soft in conceding the goals," said Madrid boss Carlo Ancelotti. "After that the team showed what they have shown recently, a great reaction. "We have to defend better. If we defend better in the seocnd leg we'll win. If we don't, we will be out." The Spanish championselect were without Casemiro and his absence showed as City cut through midfield on the counter-attack at will.

Guardiola was furious with Mahrez after he selfishly smashed into the side-netting with Foden awaiting the cross for a tap-in. Moments later it was Foden who was guilty of wasting a glorious chance when he dragged wide another pinpoint De Bruyne through ball.

Benzema rouses Madrid

Benzema dragged Madrid back from the dead to see off Paris Saint-Germain and Chelsea in the previous two rounds and again rose to his side's rescue before half-time. The Frenchman cushioned in his 40th goal of the season off the post from Ferland Mendy's cross. "We never gave up," said Benzema. "Sometimes you have to grin and bear it and we did that. City are a great team

but kept working hard and got the three goals."

Yet, Madrid's good work in steadying the ship towards the end of the first half was undone in another slow start after the break. Mahrez hit the post when one-on-one with Courtois before Dani Carvajal blocked Foden's follow-up on the line. Fernandinho was forced to deputize at right-back after replacing the injured John Stones in the first half. And the City captain had a major role to play in two goals in two minutes at either end.

Firstly, he picked out Foden to restore City's two-goal lead. But the 36-year-old showed his age as Vinicius sprinted clear of his Brazilian compatriot from the halfway line before slotting past Ederson. City continued to create chances at an alarming rate for Ancelotti but it took something special when they did finally get a fourth.

Oleksandr Zinchenko was fouled on the edge of the area, but Romanian referee Istvan Kovacs played advantage and Silva thrashed into the top corner. Again City failed to put the tie to bed as Mahrez was inches away from finding the far corner from the narrowest of angles. But there was a final twist eight minutes from time when Aymeric Laporte handled inside the area. Benzema was the coolest man in the stadium as he chipped the spotkick down the middle to leave the tie on a knife-edge headed back to the Spanish capital.—AFP

Forest delay Fulham party as Bournemouth hit back

LONDON: Fulham missed a chance to clinch the Championship title as Nottingham Forest beat the promoted leaders 1-0 on Tuesday. Marco Silva's side, who clinched promotion on April 19, had to better the result of second-placed Bournemouth to make sure of earning the trophy. But Philip Zinckernagel's strike sealed a crucial win for Forest, who survived a Fulham barrage of 20 shots at Craven Cottage.

Fulham are eight points clear of Bournemouth and have two games left to guarantee they seal the title. Forest's win moved them up to third and within three points of Bournemouth who host them in a potentially decisive promotion showdown on May 3. Bournemouth had to stage an incredible late comeback from 3-0 down to draw 3-3 at Swansea.

Kieffer Moore's brace and Dominic Solanke's penalty all came in the final 18 minutes of a pulsating contest. Joel Piroe's double inside the opening 12 minutes had set Swansea on their way and Cyrus Christie added the third goal. With three games remaining for both teams, Bournemouth and Forest are locked in a dramatic battle to join Fulham in the Premier League. Relegated Barnsley started life after boss Poya Asbaghi with a 2-0 defeat at home to Blackpool. —AFP

Benzema keeps Real Madrid alive

MANCHESTER: "We have to do a magical thing," said Karim Benzema after Real Madrid performed another Houdini act in the Champions League to escape only 4-3 down from Tuesday's thrilling semi-final, first leg against Manchester City. Benzema set up what should be a special night at the Santiago Bernabeu on May 4 by scoring twice to take his tally for the season to 41 goals in as many games.

Without the Frenchman, Madrid's quest for a 14th European crown would have long since sunk. Benzema scored hat-tricks against both Paris Saint-Germain and Chelsea in the past two rounds as Real walked a tightrope to reach the last four for the 30th time. By contrast, this was just City's third trip to the semifinals, but the English champions justified their status as tournament favorites on the night the Etihad Stadium may finally have warmed to the Champions League.

The competition's anthem was again lustily booed before kick-off by City fans who have not forgotten the financial fair play charges laid against their club by UEFA. Had City not successfully appealed to the Court of Arbitration for Sport, they would have been banned from the Champions League for the past two seasons. Instead, they are 90 minutes away from reaching the final for a second consecutive season.

It was the first time the City fans had something to cheer in a semifinal. When the sides met at this stage in 2016, Madrid edged a cagey tie 1-0 on aggregate. Last season, City swept aside Paris Saint-Germain but in front of empty stadiums due to coronavirus restrictions. This time it took just 10 minutes for Madrid to be clinging on to stay in the tie. Kevin De Bruyne headed in after 90 seconds before Gabriel Jesus doubled the home side's lead.

Riyad Mahrez and Phil Foden should have put Real out of sight, but PSG and Chelsea had similar regrets only to be stung by the survival instincts of Carlo Ancelotti's men. "When you lose it isn't good," said Ancelotti, dismissing suggestions he



should be pleased to have escaped still alive in the tie. "It is easy to read this game, we were good on the ball and bad without it."

The holy grail

Once again it was left to Benzema to dig Los Blancos out of the mire by halving the deficit before half-time. A wild second half raged from end to end as Foden and Bernardo Silva extended City's advantage, only to be pegged back by Vinicius Junior's stunning solo run and finish before Benzema had the final word from the penalty spot. "No one can say they didn't enjoy it," said Guardiola. "It was a good advertisement for football."

Eleven years have passed since Guardiola last lifted the European Cup as Barcelona coach. That same year City began their Champions League journey, backed by the wealth of Abu Dhabi that

has made them the dominant force in English football over the past decade. Now in Guardiola's sixth season, conquering Europe remains their holy grail. There has been much frustration at the failures along the way, particularly when Guardiola has at times tried to be too clever by half.

But the sight of Madrid being put to the sword with the eyes of the world on the Etihad was why City have invested so much to bring the Spaniard to east Manchester and keep him around longer than he has stayed at any other club. "There is not one complaint about the result, the performance," added Guardiola. "I'm so proud and incredibly happy with the way we performed." The ultimate test of whether City are ready to win the Champions League awaits next week when the cauldron of the Bernabeu will expect another Real revival. —AFP

London police face action over sprinter stop and search

LONDON: Five police officers could face disciplinary action in relation to the stop and search of British sprinter Bianca Williams, their force said on Wednesday. Williams, a European and Commonwealth 100m gold medallist, accused London's Metropolitan Police of racial profiling after she was stopped in July 2020.

The force later apologized after she disclosed that she and her partner, the Portuguese 400m runner Ricardo dos Santos, had been repeatedly stopped. The organization that deals with police complaints in England and Wales has been reviewing whether forces discriminate against ethnic minorities.

The review includes police stop and search powers, with longstanding evidence that they are used disproportionately. The Metropolitan Police said on Wednesday that five officers would face a gross misconduct hearing as a result of the search in London's Maida Vale area. The athletes' young child was in the car at the time.

The officers will answer claims that they failed to adhere to professional standards, including on use of force, and equality and diversity, the force said. Williams, 28, and dos Santos, 27, were handcuffed and their car was searched but nothing was found. They were not arrested and were allowed on their way.

She told BBC radio after the incident: "They (the police) see a black male driving a nice car, an all-black car, and they assume that he was involved in some sort of gang, drug, violence problem." The Met said at the time that they were satisfied, after reviewing footage from social media and bodycam footage, that the officers acted appropriately.—AFP
