MoH updates protocols as COVID cases jump to 4,397

7-day home quarantine for vaccinated cases, 10 days if unvaccinated

KUWAIT: The number of new coronavirus cases surged to 4,397 yesterday, with the infection rate climbing to a dangerous 11.7 percent, as government departments are due to cut staff and working hours from today. The ministry also reported one death, as the number of cases in intensive care units rose to 15 and patients in hospitals increased to 162. Based on official statistics, there are more than 24,600 active COVID-19 cases in the country.

The ministry of health also said it has changed protocols in dealing with COVID-19, stressing that unvaccinated

people who come in contact with infected cases must undergo home quarantine for 14 days. Kuwait has reported close to 25,000 coronavirus cases since the start of January, according to official figures released by the health ministry, the fastest rate of infection since the outbreak of the pandemic almost two years ago.

The ministry yesterday advised people who experience symptoms like runny nose, sneezing, coughing, sore throat or fever to avoid mixing with others, rest and take more liquids. According to the new health protocols, people who come in contact with a positive COVID-19 case for at least 15 minutes without covering their mouth and nose at a distance of less than two meters must undergo home quarantine for 14 days. Vaccinated people can end the quarantine after seven days after a negative PCR test result.

The ministry also said people who are infected must remain under home quarantine for seven days if vaccinated and 10 days if unvaccinated. According to the new protocols, people are considered immune if they have taken the third booster dose, along with those who took the second dose less than nine months ago.

Kuwait recorded under 2,500 cases in the three months between mid-September to mid-December, when cases began to rise at an unprecedented rate. The ministry does not say if the new cases are of the new Omicron variant, which is sweeping the world. Based on decisions taken by the Cabinet which met remotely on Monday, various ministries and government departments announced they will start cutting staff and working hours from today.

A majority of ministries said they will cut the working staff by more than half, while working hours will be from 9.00 am to 1.00 pm. Ministries have resorted to offering their services to the public remotely, and in case physical presence is needed, prior appointments must be booked online. Local banks have said they plan to reduce their working staff to the minimum level needed to perform services. The Cabinet on Monday also decided to cut passengers on public transport to 50 percent, while it barred unvaccinated people from attending games and going to barbershops, salons and health clubs.

Meanwhile, 10 MPs yesterday submitted a new motion calling to convene a special session tomorrow to debate civil rights for stateless people and compensating civil servants for unused annual leave. Another motion was submitted a few days ago to hold a session tomorrow to debate other issues. The government said it will attend the session.

Half of Europe on track to catch Omicron

COPENHAGEN: More than half of people in Europe are projected to catch Omicron by March, the WHO said yesterday, as millions in China locked down again exactly two years after Beijing reported the first COVID-19 death. The highlytransmissible variant has ripped through countries at breakneck pace, forcing governments to impose fresh measures and scramble to roll out vaccine booster shots.

Europe is at the epicenter of alarming new outbreaks alongside mounting hospital admissions and deaths while the World Health Organization said yesterday Omicron could infect half of all people in the region at current rates. "The Institute for Health Metrics and Evaluation (IHME) forecasts that more than 50 percent of the population in the region will be infected with Omicron in the next six to eight weeks," said Hans Kluge, regional director for WHO's European office.

The WHO's European region covers 53 countries and territories including several in Central Asia, and Kluge said 50 of them had Omicron cases. Kluge confirmed that Omicron is more transmissible than previous variants, but stressed "approved vaccines do continue to provide good protection against severe disease and death including for Omicron".

The warning came exactly two years after the announcement of the first person dying of a virus only later identified as

COVID - a 61-year-old man in Wuhan, China, where the illness was first detected. Since January 11, 2020, known fatalities in the pandemic have soared to nearly 5.5 million. China largely tamed its initial outbreak with a mix of lockdowns, border closures and mass testing, but flare-ups in some major cities are testing that zero COVID strategy just weeks before the Beijing Winter Olympics.

The city of Anyang in Henan province on Monday night told its five million residents not to leave their homes or drive cars on the roads, China's official Xinhua news agency said. Last week, the one million people in Yuzhou - also a city in Henan - were told to stay at home. Xi'an, home to 13 million people, is in its third week of lockdown. China reported 110 new local virus cases yesterday, a tiny

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UAE threatens jail for making fun of **COVID** measures

DUBAI: The United Arab Emirates has threatened to jail people who make fun of its anti-COVID measures after mocking photos and videos appeared online. Federal prosecutors said social media users could be punished under new laws which allow at least two years' jail and AED 200,000 (\$54,000) fines for sharing misleading information during a pandemic.

The UAE has introduced a number of measures to tackle a wave of Omicron variant cases that have pushed daily COVID numbers to the highest levels since last March. The warning followed "the recent circulation of photos and videos on social media... accompanied by comments and songs mocking the precautionary measures and calling on others to flout them", the Federal Emergency Crisis and Disasters Prosecution said in a statement.

"We, therefore, call upon members of the community to refrain from this behavior, which is punishable by the law," said the statement, which was released on Monday. Testing requirements have increased in recent weeks with many employers demanding regular negative PCR results, putting pressure on test centers.

Residents of the capital, Abu Dhabi, need a negative PCR result every fortnight and tests are also needed to enter government buildings. The UAE has also barred foreign travel for citizens who haven't had a vaccination booster shot. — AFP

US surgeons implant pig heart in human

WASHINGTON: US surgeons have successfully implanted a heart from a genetically modified pig in a 57-yearold man, a medical first that could one day help solve the chronic shortage of organ donations. The "historic" procedure took place Friday, the University of Maryland Medical School said in a statement on Monday. While the patient's prognosis is far from certain, it represents a major milestone for animal to human transplantation.

The patient, David Bennett, had been deemed ineligible for human transplant - a decision that is often taken when the recipient has very poor underlying health. He is now recovering and being carefully monitored to determine how the new organ performs. "It was either die or do this transplant. I want to live. I know it's a shot in the dark, but it's my last choice," the Maryland resident said a day before the surgery.

Bennett, who has spent the last several months bedridden on a heart-lung bypass machine, added: "I look forward to getting out of bed after I

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Lebanese join migrant flow to Europe

TRIPOLI, Lebanon: If he wasn't making good money smuggling irregular migrants to the European Union by sea, Ibrahim himself might have joined the growing exodus from crisis-hit Lebanon. "If I didn't work in this profession, I would have left, just like so many other people," said the 42-year-old trafficker, who asked to use a pseudonym when he spoke to AFP in the northern city of Tripoli.

"Maybe I would have turned to someone to smuggle me out," he said, his face hidden by an anti-COVID surgical mask and a hoodie.

Lebanon, in the throes of a brutal economic crisis, is no longer just a launchpad for Syrian refugees and other foreign migrants. Its own desperate citizens now also risk drowning in the Mediterranean in their quest for a better life. Ibrahim argues that, while having smuggled around 100 Lebanese nationals to Europe since 2019 makes him no angel, there is virtue in helping his compatriots. "I get them out of here, out of this beggar's life," he said. "At least if they are put in a camp, they can eat and drink with dignity.'

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KUWAIT: Tajikistan introduced entry visa exemption for citizens of 52 countries, including Kuwait, through a resolution issued on Oct 26, 2021, which became effective on Jan 1, 2022. Tajik Ambassador to Kuwait Dr Zubaydullo Zubaydzoda confirmed the initiative as the first of its kind since Tajikistan gained independence. "The government of the Republic of Tajikistan included Kuwait in the list of the countries whose nationals can enter Tajikistan without the need for a prior visa, given the positive relations between Tajikistan and Kuwait as well the Tajik government's eagerness to strengthen and develop relations with Kuwait in all areas of common interest," he said during a press conference on Monday.

"This decision enables all Kuwaiti citizens to travel to Tajikistan without a prior visa as of January 1, 2022 to reside in the country for a maximum period of 30 days," the ambassador mentioned. In case visitors decide to stay longer than the indicated period, he said they can extend their visas by applying to relevant authorities. "Tajikistan's initiative on visa waiver for Kuwaiti brothers will contribute to the influx of tourists, visitors and investors from Kuwait to Tajikistan," Zubaydzoda said.

"Having announced this wise and important step, we look forward to the pivotal role of the authorities and departments in charge of business, trade, investment and tourism to take Tajikistan as a promising destination for them. We also look forward to positive steps and initia-

He stressed that investing in human capital is one of the pillars of development and advancement and facing challenges, while failing in this field leads to extremism, sowing hatred and

moral decay.

Malik pointed out that Kuwait attaches a special importance to the preservation and valorization of tangible and intangible heritage in the Islamic world, as a founding Member and supporter of the Organization. "ICESCO has made significant efforts to inscribe the largest number possible of historical sites and cultural elements on the Islamic World

Heritage List," he underscored. He indicated that during the past two years, the organization had developed its structures and procedural and legal regulations and made use of modern technologies in financial and administrative performance as well as attracting distinguished and young competencies to look at a better future. He noted that Kuwait empowers women at all levels in the public and private sectors, especially that "Kuwaiti women are strongly present in the cultural, artistic, literary and other fields," pointing out that women in Arab countries have begun to take a leading position.

The meeting brought together several advisors and assistants of the Center's President, Dr Waleed Al-Seif, head of the Islamic World Heritage Committee, Dr Ahmed Said Bah, Advisor to ICESCO DG for Partnerships and International Cooperation, and Yousef Al-Najjar, Assistant Undersecretary of the Kuwaiti Ministry of Education for Financial Affairs. At the end of the meeting, the two parties agreed to cooperate in holding intellectual seminars and specialized meetings between researchers and experts in fields of common interest. 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COVID health restrictions take effect today as new cases continue to soar

Situation in schools reassuring; no current plans for lockdown

KUWAIT: The Kuwaiti Ministry of Health announced yesterday recording a new daily record of 4,397 new infections with the novel coronavirus (COVID-19). With the new contamination cases, Kuwait's caseload climbed to 441,999. Dr Abdullah Al-Sanad, the MoH Spokesperson, said in a statement to the press that medical authorities recorded 626 new recovery cases, increasing the overall count of the cured to 414,867, noting that the proportion of the healed as compared to the total number of the cases reached 93.9 percent.

Dr Sanad also revealed that there was a single death due to the virus during the same period, thus the whole figure of deaths reached 2,473. As to the number of people receiving medical treatment at intensive care units, he said that there were 15 patients in these wards as of yesterday; up from 14 the previous day. The whole count of the cases with confirmed infection that continue to receive treatment has reached 24,659 and the number of people that are treated at the COVID-19 wards has stood at 162. Also in the same duration, medical staff conducted 37,540 PCR tests with the whole number of these examinations soaring to 6,273,509, Dr Sanad said, also noting that the proportion of the infection cases to the tests reached 11.7 percent.

New restrictions

Several new heath restrictions will be reimposed as of today as per a government decision to curb the surge of coronavirus (COVID-19) after the infection rate in the country hit all-time highs in recent days. The decision was made during the weekly Cabinet meeting, held via videoconference under the chairmanship of His Highness the Prime Minister Sheikh Sabah Al-Khaled Al-Hamad Al-Sabah.

Government Spokesman Tareq Al-Mezrem said after the Cabinet's meeting that health authorities keep a close watch on the cases of infection with COVID-19 at schools countrywide. "The health situation is generally satisfactory," he affirmed during a press conference. There is a constant coordination among the ministries of Health, Education and Higher Education, as well as the Secretariat of the University Council, Kuwait University, and the Public Authority of Applied Education and Training, regarding the next steps needed in the coming stage, he pointed out.

Mezrem recalled that the COVID-19 Ministerial Emergency Committee met last Thursday in the presence of Minister of Education and Minister of Higher Education Dr Ali Al-Modhaf to explore ways for keeping the stability of the health situation at educational institutions.

Minister of Health Dr Khaled Al-Saeed had briefed the meeting on the latest developments of the health situation on the local, regional and international scales, said Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of Interior Sheikh Ahmad Mansour Al-Sabah who doubles as acting foreign minister and minister of state for Cabinet affairs. The fast-spreading Omicron variant of coronavirus pushed the daily rates of infections and hospitalizations to record highs, putting strains on the country's health system, Saeed told the Cabinet members.

After mulling the latest recommendations of the COVID-19 Ministerial Emergency Committee, the Cabinet decided to bring down the attendance rate at government institutions to no more than 50 percent according to the requirements of each institution and in coordination with the Civil Service Commission. The Civil Service



Commission has to set out the necessary rules of work and the working hours in a flexible way. The decision will be reviewed regularly in the light of the pandemic situation. The private sector is required to bring down the attendance rate to the least possible percentage. The Cabinet also assigned the Ministry of Social Affairs and the Ministry of Commerce and Industry to make sure that staffers of kindergartens and children clubs are fully vaccinated against COVID-19 and committed to the health precautions. Furthermore, meetings, conferences and internal courses can be only held via video link as of today. Also, state departments providing service to applicants have to do so online; otherwise, an appointment



beforehand is required via Meta Portal, Sahel App, and similar mediums provided abidance by health precautions.

50 percent

Furthermore, all means of mass transportation must limit the number passengers to 50 percent of their total respective occupancies while applying the health precautions, notably putting on facemasks. In the meantime, the Public Authority for Sport must make sure that spectators at sports events are fully vaccinated in keeping with the Cabinet Decree No 1058/2021. Finally, the government committee on following up the health precautions has to ensure that all staffers and clients of barbershops, salons and health spas are fully vaccinated against COVID-19. The Cabinet also went on urging all citizens and residents to fully adhere to the instructions and requirements issued by the health authorities, the most important of which is getting the booster dose of the anti-coronavirus vaccine, wearing a mask, and avoiding gatherings.

In response to the Cabinet decisions, Mezrem noted that public transportation, like buses, must abide by the 50 occupants' rule, noting at the same time that such decision does not apply to small vehicles or taxis. In the meantime, Mezrem called on the public not to pay attention to rumors and inaccurate news reports, noting that "so far, the option of a lockdown has not been discussed." — KUNA

Health club, salon workers breathe sigh of relief

KUWAIT: Several workers of health clubs, salons and barbershops expressed gratitude over the Cabinet's decision to allow their operations to continue amidst the growing number of coronavirus cases in the country. Normally, those sectors are the first to be closed, as workers deal with customers directly. This time, however, they were spared. The Cabinet only advised that people visiting salons, barbershops and health clubs must be fully vaccinated.

"From January 1, I was really thinking about my next move if authorities closed our business again," said Bong, a manager of a health spa in Salmiya. "Our operations returned to normal after a long time. If they are disrupted again, I don't know what to do, because our company doesn't pay our salaries if we are not working. So now I can sleep well, thank God," he said.

Coronavirus cases have soared to record highs of over 4,000 cases a day, so the Cabinet imposed a series of restrictions including cutting public sector employees' attendance to a maximum of 50 percent and calling on the private sector to reduce staff in offices. Conferences, meetings and training courses can only be held online from today, according to the Cabinet. The Cabinet also decided that passengers on public transport must not exceed 50 percent, with strict implementation of health conditions, especially wearing facemasks.

Koring, who works at a salon in Salmiya, said relief is how she describes her feeling right now. "I am very happy. Honestly, I was not expecting a favorable decision from the Cabinet, because we are in a business where we work directly with customers. But to let us work is awesome. We need this job so we can sustain our loved ones," she said.

Meanwhile, several public transport commuters also expressed gratitude to the Cabinet. "We were all expecting that the government will stop public transport to curb the coronavirus. Thank God they did not. We still have public transport and I can still ride a bus to my work and back," said Melorey, a commuter who works at The Avenues mall and lives in Farwaniya. "Every day I go by bus; it's cheaper and I can save money. My company gives KD 30 for transport, but I don't use a taxi. I use the bus so I can save half of the amount given to me in transport allowance," she said.

Minister gives priority to completing Khaitan roads' maintenance

KUWAIT: Minister of Public Works Ali Al-Mousa affirmed keenness to complete construction and maintenance of roads, as well as rain drainage sewers in Khaitan, pointing out that the project has a top priority to achieve security for the people. In a press statement yesterday, Mousa, also Minister of State for Youth Affairs, said that the roads' project is in its final stages of completion and coordination is underway with government agencies in preparation to hand over the project to them. This is one of the vital projects included in the plan of



Roads and Transportation (PART) in developing the road network and infrastructure system in various areas of Kuwait, linking new residential areas to the public network of roads and bridges, in addition to raising traffic safety in accor-



Kuwait oil price down 29 cents to \$83.16 pb

KUWAIT: Kuwait oil price down 29 cents to \$83.16 per barrel Monday against \$83.45 pb last Friday, Kuwait Petroleum Corporation (KPC) said yesterday. In the international markets, the price of the Brent crude oil went down by 88 cents to reach \$80.87 pb, the same occurred to the West Texas Intermediate crude, which fell by 67 cents, settling at \$78.23 pb. OPEC daily basket price went down 41 cents to reach \$81.75 a barrel on Monday, compared with \$82.16 pb on Friday, the cartel said vesterday. The annual average of the OPEC's basket price for 2021 was at \$69.89 pb. This signaled that the crudes' basket rate since the start of the year until last week had settled at 79.99 pb.

The Organization of the Petroleum Exporting Countries and its allies, known as OPEC+, decided on January 4 to proceed with a production hike of 400,000 barrels per day (bpd) in February. They also agreed to continue regular follow-up on the global pandemic situation and change the output if warranted. OPEC+countries are expected to continue changing the production until amending the current level of 5.8 million bpd. They will reevaluate market conditions at the 25th ministerial meeting, to be held virtually on February 2. — KUNA

KUWAIT: The Cabinet was briefed during its weekly meeting on Monday chaired by His Highness the Prime Minister Sheikh Sabah Al-Khaled Al-Hamad Al-Sabah with the recommendation of the Public Services Committee on the results of the coordination meeting between the Public Corporation for Housing Welfare and government agencies regarding the development and modernization of the infrastructure of blocks 1 and 2 in Khaitan. Moreover, Kuwait Municipality, in coordination with the Ministry of Higher

Education, the Public Authority for Agriculture Affairs and Fish Resources, the Public Authority for the Environment, the Public Corporation for Housing Welfare, and the authorities it deems appropriate, has also been assigned to take all necessary measures towards the following: Allocating South

Qairouan for the benefit of the Public Institution for Housing Welfare, in accordance with the procedures in force in this regard.

The Cabinet further discussed the general service committee's recommendations on Kuwait International Airport's Terminal 2 (T2), and relevant projects and facilities. In the same context, the Cabinet was briefed on the report of the General Secretariat of the Supreme Council for Planning and Development on the challenges facing the T2 project and relevant schemes and facilities. It was also apprised off the Ministry of Public Works' report on works of the T2 implemented until the end of September 2021. Moreover, the Cabinet tasked the Ministry of Public Works with continuing efforts, in collaboration and coordination with the Directorate General of Civil Aviation, the General Secretariat of the Supreme Council for Planning

and Development, and the relevant government agencies, to complete required executive measures in order to facilitate the implementation of the T2 and relevant projects and facilities.

Cabinet supports minister

Moscow says Russia-NATO talks are 'moment of truth'

BRUSSELS: The top US negotiator on the crisis between the West and Russia over Moscow's military build-up on Ukraine's border briefed NATO allies yesterday, after inconclusive talks with her Kremlin opposite number. US Deputy Secretary of State Wendy Sherman flew to the alliance's Brussels headquarters from Geneva, where on Monday she had held a meeting with Russia's Deputy Foreign Minister Sergei Ryabkov. Some European officials have complained that Washington is taking the lead in talks with Moscow.

They fear being excluded from moves to resolve tensions on the Ukraine border and to head off confrontation. But Sherman insisted that European allies are being kept in the loop, after meeting NATO Secretary General Jens Stoltenberg and ambassadors from the NATO member states.

"The United States is committed to working in lockstep with our allies and partners to urge de-escalation and respond to the security crisis caused by Russia," she tweeted. With Stoltenberg, Sherman "affirmed a unified NATO approach toward Russia, balancing deterrence and dialogue, and stressed our unwavering support for

And, addressed to Ukraine's deputy minister of foreign affairs Emine Dzhaparova, she assured Kiev that the allies "will not make decisions about Ukraine without Ukraine". After more than seven hours of negotiations in Geneva on Monday, the Russian and US officials both offered to keep talking, though there was no sign of a breakthrough.

The high-stakes meeting came as fears simmered of

a Russian invasion of Ukraine. Moscow has demanded

wide-ranging security concessions from Washington and its NATO allies, which in turn have threatened severe economic sanctions if there is any Russian

> Moscow said that ties between Russia and NATO had reached a "moment of truth" over Ukraine and security demands from the Kremlin. Deputy Foreign Minister Alexander Grushko was speaking following Monday's US-Russia negotiations in Geneva that launched a week of diplomacy between Russia and the

West amid fears of a Russian invasion of its pro-Western neighbour Ukraine. A meeting of the NATO-Russia Council will take place in Brussels today. "It's no exaggeration to say that a moment of truth is coming in our relations with the alliance," Grushko was quoted as saying by Russian news agencies.

Moscow has demanded wide-ranging security guarantees from Washington and its NATO allies and insists it has been promised that NATO would not expand eastward. "Our expectations are entirely realistic and we hope that this will be a serious, deep conversation on key, fundamental problems of European security," Grushko said, referring to the talks in Brussels.

He said Russia would demand a comprehensive response from the alliance to its demands. "We will push for a concrete, substantive, article-by-article reaction to the Russian draft agreement on guarantees," he added.

In December, Russia unveiled proposals to contain the United States and NATO in the former Soviet Union and Eastern Europe, saying that the US-led alliance should not admit Ukraine or Georgia as new members or establish bases in ex-Soviet countries. —AFP

Kazakh president fires rare criticism at predecessor

ALMATY: Kazakhstan's President Kassym-Jomart Tokayev issued rare criticism of his long-ruling predecessor yesterday, and said he expected Russian-led forces to leave the troubled Central Asian country in the next 10 days. The oil-rich country's descent into chaos has laid bare infighting at the very top of a government once utterly dominated by Tokayev's mentor, 81-year-old Nursultan Nazarbayev, who retains the constitutional status of "Leader of the Nation" despite stepping down from the presidency in 2019.

Addressing the government and parliament in a videoconference call broadcast live, the 68-year-old Tokayev fired an eyebrow-raising broadside at Nazarbayev as the post-Soviet country reels from unprecedented violence that began with peaceful protests over an energy price hike.

Tokayev said Nazarbayev's rule had created "a layer of wealthy people, even by international standards". "I believe that the time has come to pay tribute to the people of Kazakhstan and help them on a systematic and regular basis," Tokayev added, noting that "very profitable companies" would be asked to pay money into a state fund.

Main CSTO mission 'completed'

Both Kazakhstan and Russia have framed last week's unrest that left dozens dead and has seen almost 10,000 people arrested as a coup attempt assisted by foreign "terrorists", but have provided little evidence to support the claim.

Following a request from Tokayev, the Moscow-led Collective Security Treaty Organisation (CSTO) deployed troops to bring about order and buttress the authorities. Yesterday, Tokayev announced that "a phased withdrawal" would begin in two days and take "no more than 10 days."

"The main mission of the CSTO peacekeeping forces has been successfully completed," he said. The CSTO mission of more than 2,000 troops was despatched at the peak of the crisis last week, after armed clashes between government opponents and security forces and a looting spree rendered parts of the largest city Almaty almost unrecognisable.

The decision was a first for the CSTO, often touted by Moscow as a NATO equivalent but previously reluctant to interfere in unrest in Central Asia, a region with long historical ties to Russia. Concern has mounted that Moscow could leverage the mission to shore up its influence in Kazakhstan.

US Secretary of State Antony Blinken warned last week that "once Russians are in your house, it's sometimes very difficult to get them to leave". Tokayev appeared to further bolster his position by backing acting prime minister Alikhan Smailov to take on the job permanently yesterday-a nomination that won the unanimous support of lawmakers.

Former national security committee chief Karim Masimova key Nazarbayev ally viewed by many as perpetuating the retired president's influence over the government-was arrested on treason charges Saturday in connection with the unrest.

In another significant move, Tokayev announced yesterday plans to bring an end to a widely criticised private recycling monopoly linked to the former president's youngest daughter, Aliya Nazarbayeva, 41. "This should be done by a state organisation, as is the case in foreign countries," he said.

'A bad peace'

Many residents of Almaty credited the CSTO as a stabilis-

Pentagon Spokesman John Kirby said Monday that President Joe Biden wants to close the Guantanamo prison, though it remains a deeply contentious political issue. "I will tell you the administration remains dedicated to closing the detention facility at Guantanamo Bay," Kirby told reporters.

"We are in a review right now about the way forward," he said, a process that involves the White House, the US military, the Justice Department, the State Department and other agencies.

The UN experts however slammed the US judicial system for failing to protect human rights and uphold the rule of law, and thereby "enabling a legal black hole to thrive in Guantanamo." "Guantanamo Bay is a site of unparallelled notoriety, defined by the systematic use of torture, and other cruel, inhuman or degrading treatment against hundreds of men brought to the site and deprived of their most fundamental rights," they said. —AFP

Biden to defy Republicans on voting reforms

WASHINGTON: President Joe Biden was set yesterday to defy Republicans and back a controversial Senate rule change to force through voting rights reforms that he says are crucial to saving US democracy. Coming off a powerful speech last week to mark the January 6 anniversary of an attempt by Donald Trump's supporters to overturn the 2020 presidential election, Biden will argue in the Georgia state capital Atlanta that Congress needs to pass laws protecting vot-

"The next few days, when these bills come to a vote, will mark a turning point in this nation," Biden will say, according to an excerpt of the speech distributed by the White House. "Will we choose democracy over autocracy, light over shadow, justice over injustice? I know where I stand."

Democrats accuse Republican state legislatures of enacting a spate of local laws restricting the voting rights of minorities and curtailing early voting and mail-in voting in an effort to suppress Democratic support. However, Republicans describe the Democratic push as an attempt to manipulate the election landscape by switching power to the federal authorities. They are unanimous in opposing the two bills up for debate in the Senate.

Ordinarily, that opposition would ensure the bills' death. Democrats have only 50 votes in the evenly split Senate and under

the filibuster rule, which requires a supermajority of 60 for many votes, they would need support from 10 Republicans. Biden has been reluctant to mess with

the filibuster, given warnings from Republicans that removing the supermajority requirement will push the Senate into allout conflict, with no bipartisanship at all. Suspending the filibuster for a particular issue is possible, but happens so rarely it is dubbed the "nuclear option."

Biden, citing the extreme urgency of fixing the US electoral system, now appears ready to bow to powerful internal party demands and give his blessing. Lifting the filibuster would require unanimous Democratic support. If achieved, that would then allow the party to pass the two voting rights bills with simple majorities. Saying that "abuse" of the filibuster power has "injured" the Senate, Biden "supports... changing the Senate rules," a White House official told reporters on condition of

'Belly of the beast'

The president is going to Georgia at a time when his approval ratings are stuck in the low 40s and Republicans are predicted to take over Congress in November midterm elections. The White House says Biden feels

it's time to go big on a key Democratic

"He believes the stakes should be raised. He wouldn't be going to Georgia... if he wasn't ready," White House Press Secretary Jen Psaki said. Democrats say there's an existential need for reforms, following the unprecedented chaos of 2020.

According to Democrats, bills under consideration would prevent cheating, ranging from partisan drawing of election districts to the use of security measures as a way to dampen voter turnout in pro-Democrat districts.

The laws would also end the potential ability of state authorities to rig results under arcane existing rules. "We are going right to the belly of the beast, or ground zero, for voter suppression, voter subversion and obstruction," Cedric Richmond, White House senior adviser, told Politico.

The push is high risk for Biden, who is already struggling to get his party to pass a major social spending package. It's far from sure he can get all 50 of his senators to back overriding the filibuster and failure would not only doom the voting reforms but humiliate him personally.

'Renaissance' or 'power grab?'

Biden will be accompanied to Georgia-a crucible of US civil rights history-by Kamala Harris, the first Black vice president. Harris, also the first woman and first person of South Asian origin to hold the office, spoke before Biden at his forceful January 6 speech.

Biden's goal, Psaki said, is to "ensure that January 6 doesn't mark the end of democracy but the beginning of a renaissance." For Republicans, the picture is inverted. "They want to silence millions of Americans and take over the Senate so they can take over elections," Republican Senate leader Mitch McConnell said.

"A power grab," another senior Republican, Senator Lindsey Graham, said. As for breaking the filibuster, Graham warns that what goes around comes around, with Republicans then freed to suspend the super-majority rule as soon as they regain control of the Senate.

'Fewer and fewer mayors are agreeing to endorse candidates'

PARIS: Having entered France's presidential race full of sound and fury, far-right TV pundit Eric Zemmour risks seeing his campaign amount to nothing because of a widely contested clause of electoral law.

Like all candidates in the race, Zemmour needs to muster 500 endorsements from elected figures around the country by the middle of March in order to have his name on the ballot paper for the polls in April. His dramatic entrance into front-line politics after a career spent in the media sent waves through the French ruling class in September, making him briefly the most talked-about challenger to President Emmanuel Macron.

But the anti-Islam populist has admitted he risks being excluded unless more mayors and other elected her father Jean-Marie in the past.

figures agree to back him under a system he has denounced as discriminating against political outsiders. "The endorsement system is there to prevent far-fetched candidates from running," Zemmour said on Monday. "It's not there to enable established parties to monopolise the election and block rivals."

He said that he had secured only 300-350 pledges so far, but stressed that these are "at the moment only promises", suggesting some of them will not materialise. Securing 500 signatures from a pool of 42,000 elected French figures that includes mayors, MPs and local councillors sounds an easy task, but other veteran candidates are also reporting difficulties.

These include longstanding far-right leader Marine Le Pen, who has an established grassroots party unlike Zemmour, and hard-left leader and MP Jean-Luc Melenchon, who heads the France Unbowed movement.

'Real problem'

A large part of the explanation is that, since a reform under former President Francois Hollande in 2016, endorsements are now made public.

This means many mayors are reluctant to back controversial and divisive figures such as Zemmour, who has two hate crime convictions, because they fear pushback from their local communities.

Others fret about backing someone from outside their party, which might cause them problems with their own political family-something they could avoid under the previously anonymised system.

Stephane Zumsteeg, a political analyst at the Ipsos polling firm, said that "creating suspense" about the endorsement system was an "old classic" in French politics, used repeatedly by Le Pen and her father Jean-Marie in the past.

"It keeps them in the public eye and enables them to present themselves as victims of the system," he told AFP. "That said, in the particular case of Eric Zemmour, there's a real problem, unless he is given help," he added. "Fewer and fewer mayors are agreeing to endorse

Rescue operation for F-16V fighter

TAIPEI: Taiwan's air force said it had launched a rescue operation to locate one of its most advanced F-16s after the fighter jet vanished from radar screens yesterday. The jet disappeared around half an hour after taking off for a routine training flight from a base in the southern city of Chiayi, the air force said in a statement. Taiwan's national rescue centre reported that people saw the F-16V "crashing into the sea," adding that two choppers and one coastguard vessel had been dispatched to find the jet. President Tsai Ing-wen has ordered an all-out rescue effort and asked for clarity around the cause of the incident, her office said.—AFP

S Korean Air Force pilot killed

SEOUL: A South Korean Air Force pilot was killed in a F-5 fighter jet crash yesterday, officials said, a week after the country grounded its fleet of F-35s. The jet crashed into a mountain in Hwaseong, about 50 kilometres south of the capital Seoul, according to military authorities. The single pilot on board failed to eject and was killed in the crash, the defence ministry said in a statement. The airforce said it was investigating the cause of the accident. The F-5E is an older generation fighter jet with a design that dates back to the 1960s. Last week, South Korea grounded its entire fleet of advanced F-35 fighter jets, after one of them was forced to make a dramatic emergency landing after a major systems malfunction.—AFP

6.6-magnitude quake jolts Cyprus

PAPHOS: A 6.6-magnitude quake hit off the west coast of Cyprus early yesterday, the US Geological Survey said, but there were no reports of casualties or structural damage. The strong and relatively shallow quake at 0107 GMT was centred 48 kilometres (30 miles) west-northwest of the town of Polis on the Mediterranean island, the USGS said. The tremor was felt across Cyprus and around the region with reports from as far away as Turkey, Zionist entity and Lebanon, according to the USGS. It shook buildings in the capital Nicosia, 130 kilometres away, where some residents went out into the streets. "It was frightening. The whole building was shaking endlessly," one Nicosia resident told AFP. "I thought it would never end." Cyprus police told AFP there were no reports of injuries or serious structural damage from the quake, but it woke people across

UK's Johnson faces fresh scandal over lockdown breach

LONDON: British Prime Minister Boris Johnson was embroiled yesterday in another scandal over his government's alleged lockdown breaches, as police said they were investigating a Downing Street gathering to which over 100 people were invited.

In the latest in a string of such accusations, Johnson and others allegedly held a drinks party in the garden of his official residence in May 2020 when all in-person socialising was outlawed. An email leaked late Monday indicated that Martin Reynolds, a senior civil servant, invited more than 100 Downing Street colleagues to "bring your own booze" to the event, which Johnson and his wife Carrie allegedly attended.

The potentially highly damaging revelations follow a series of similar claims which emerged last month about Downing Street parties held during later lockdowns in the run-up to Christmas in 2020. They prompted Johnson to appoint another senior civil servant, Sue Gray, to investigate and she is now expected to expand her probe to cover the new allegations.

Meanwhile in a statement late Monday, London police said they were also making enquiries over potential breaches of the lockdown laws in relation to the May gathering. "The Metropolitan Police Service is aware of widespread reporting relating to alleged breaches of the Health Protection Regulations at Downing Street on May 20, 2020 and is in contact with the Cabinet Office," the force said.

'Socially distanced drinks'

Johnson has previously denied knowledge that any rules were broken in Downing Street during the pandemic, as he faced weeks of excoriating headlines over the previous allegations before Christmas. But the latest accusations appear to directly contradict those claims.

In the May 2020 email sent by Reynolds, he wrote: "After what has been an incredibly busy period it would be nice to make the most of the lovely weather and have some socially distanced drinks in the No10 garden this evening."

Britain at the time was in the throes of its first lockdown, and outdoor social gatherings of any kind were banned. ITV News, which obtained the email, said around 40 staff ended up gathering in the garden that evening, eating picnic food and drinking.

BBC News said it had contemporaneous emails from some Downing Staff that questioned the wisdom of the invitation. "It's right that Sue Gray is looking into this matter independently," Health minister Ed Argar told Sky News yesterday during a round of broadcast interviews. "I'm not going to make comments that would prejudge or get in the way of that."

'Come clean'

However, the new claims drew a chorus of condem-

nation from political opponents and others, heaping fresh pressure on the embattled leader after a series of separate sleaze scandals. "Boris Johnson, your deflections and distractions are absurd," tweeted Keir Starmer, leader of the main opposition Labour party.

"Stop lying to the British public. It's time to finally come clean." Meanwhile Jonathan Evans, the head of the independent Committee on Standards in Public Life, which advises prime ministers on ethics, said the latest allegations showed "carelessness" over maintaining standards. —AFP

Multi-millionaire killer Durst dead

CALIFORNIA: Real estate heir and convicted murderer Robert Durst, who was jailed for life for the killing of his best friend, died Monday in a California prison, his lawyer said. Multi-millionaire Durst was the subject of an explosive HBO documentary entitled "The Jinx," which ultimately led to his conviction over one of the three gruesome deaths for which he was believed to be responsible.

Attorney Chip Lewis said the 78-yearold succumbed to "natural causes associated with the litany of medical issues we had repeatedly reported to the court over the last couple of years." Durst was convicted last year of the December 2000 shooting of Susan Berman in her Beyerly Hills home.

Crime writer Berman, the daughter of a Las Vegas mobster, had taken on the role of Durst's spokeswoman after he became a suspect in the disappearance of his wife, Kathleen, 18 years earlier. Prosecutors said he had murdered Berman to prevent her from incriminating him in a renewed police investigation into the disappearance of Kathleen Durst.

Durst's wife, a medical student, was just 29 when she vanished as the couple's marriage was disintegrating. He told investigators in New York state she had boarded a train to Manhattan bound for the couple's apartment there — one of a number of homes they shared — but had never

A woman claiming to be Kathleen Durst called the medical school the next morning to say she was sick and would not be in class. Prosecutors said they believed that woman had been Berman. The investigation into Kathleen Durst's disappearance sputtered out, but was reignited in 2000, when, Durst said in "The Jinx," police got in touch with Berman.

On Christmas Eve of that year, Berman's bloodied body was found face-down in her home. Durst told his Los Angeles trial he had found Berman dead when he showed up for a visit. He later admitted that an anonymous note sent to police telling them about the body was his work, but maintained he had not killed his friend.

Axe

In the following weeks, he fled California for Galveston, Texas. There he befriended Morris Black, whose severed body parts were later found floating in a bay. Bloodstains in Durst's rented apartment led the police to arrest and charge him for the death.

At the trial in Texas, he said he had come home to find Black in his apartment with a gun. He claimed Black died in the ensuing scuffle. He admitted using an axe and a saw to hack the body into pieces, but said he had done so because he did not feel anyone would believe his story of self-defense, because he was already a suspect in at least one other murder. "I did not kill my best friend," Durst testified. "I did dismember him." The jury acquitted him.

Despite public outrage at the time, the case eventually faded, but Durst came back to public attention in 2015 with "The Jinx." In its stunning finale, Durst is heard muttering to himself, "Killed them all, of course" — apparently unaware that a microphone he was wearing during the recording of that episode remained switched on while he was using the restroom.

UN wants \$5bn aid for Afghanistan to avert humanitarian catastrophe

Inflow of funds would help in functioning of the dilapidated banking system

GENEVA: The United Nations said yesterday it needed \$5 billion in aid for Afghanistan in 2022 to avert a humanitarian catastrophe and offer the ravaged country a future after 40 years of suffering. In its biggest-ever single-country appeal, the UN said \$4.4 billion (3.9 billion euros) was needed within Afghanistan, while a further \$623 million was required to support the millions of Afghans sheltering beyond its borders.

The UN said 22 million people inside Afghanistan and a further 5.7 million displaced Afghans in five neighbouring countries needed vital relief this year. "A full-blown humanitarian catastrophe looms. My message is urgent: Don't shut the door on the people of Afghanistan," said UN aid chief Martin Griffiths.

"Help us scale up and stave off wide-spread hunger, disease, malnutrition and ultimately death." Since the Taleban hardline Islamist movement seized control of Afghanistan in mid-August, the country has plunged into financial chaos, with inflation and unemployment surging. Washington has frozen billions of dollars of the country's assets, while aid supplies have been heavily disrupted. Afghanistan also suffered its worst drought in decades in 2021. Without the aid package, "there won't be a future", Griffiths told reporters in Geneva.

'40 years of insecurity'

The Taleban authorities said the aid appeal for suffering Afghans was "very needed". "But at the same time I would like to say the need is for all this assistance approved in the past to be delivered during this harsh winter," senior Taleban leader and the group's designated UN representative, Suhail Shaheen, told AFP. He said the inflow of funds would also help in the functioning of the now dilapidated banking system, adding that any cash coming into the country will

help rein in the inflation.

"The banks are not working properly so there is also a need to control the inflation and that can be controlled when dollars ... hard currency come to Afghanistan," Shaheen said. Griffiths said the appeal, if funded, would help aid agencies ramp up the delivery of food and agriculture support, health services, malnutrition treatment, emergency shelters, access to water and sanitation, protection and education.

An estimated 4.7 million people will suffer from acute malnutrition in 2022, including 1.1 million children with severe acute malnutrition. Griffiths said that

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without humanitarian aid, distress, deaths, hunger and further mass displacement would follow, "robbing the people of Afghanistan of the hope that their country will be their home and support, now and in the near term". However, if international donors come forward, "we will see the opportunity for an Afghanistan which may finally see the fruits of some kind of security."

ministries in Kabul largely remained the same as before the Taleban takeover.

He said the UN Security Council's move in December to help humanitarian aid reach desperate Afghans, without violating international sanctions aimed at isolating the Taleban, had made the operating environment for donors and humanitarians on the ground much more comfortable.

The money will go to 160 NGOs plus UN agencies delivering aid. Some will be used to pay front-

line workers such as healthcare staff-but not via the Taleban administration. Around eight million children could miss out on their education because teachers largely have not been paid since August, Griffiths said.

UN refugees chief Filippo Grandi said the aid package's goal was to stabilise the situation within Afghanistan, including for internally displaced people, thereby preventing a further flood of migrants fleeing across the country's borders. — AFP

Taiwan passes extra \$8.6bn defence budget

TAIPEI: Taiwan's parliament yesterday passed an extra spending bill of nearly \$8.6 billion in its latest bid to boost defence capabilities against an increasingly bellicose China. The government proposed a five-year special defence budget of around TW\$237.3 billion from 2022 as Chinese warplanes breached its air defence zone at unprecedented levels last year.

Democratic Taiwan lives under constant threat of an invasion by authoritarian China, which claims the self-ruled island as part of its territory to be seized one day-by force if necessary. Beijing's sabre-rattling towards the island has increased considerably since President Tsai Ing-wen came to power in 2016, as she regards the island as a sovereign nation and not part of "one China"

and not part of "one China."

Last year, Taiwan recorded incursions by around 970 Chinese warplanes into its air defence zone, according to a database compiled by AFP, more than double the roughly 380 carried out in 2020. Yesterday, Taiwanese lawmakers agreed unanimously to pass the special budget, although cut it by TW\$310 million. The package comes on top of a record annual defence budget of TW\$471.7 billion set for 2022.

It aims to acquire various precision missiles and mass-manufacture high-efficiency naval ships "in the shortest period of time" to boost the island's sea and air capabilities, the government said. J Michael Cole, a Taipei-based political and military analyst, called the special budg-

et "an encouraging and much-needed development" as Taiwan prioritises "asymmetrical" capabilities, such as unmanned vehicles, antiship missiles and air-to-ground cruise missiles.

"Many of those are counterforce' capabilities, with ranges that are long enough to hit targets along China's coastline" in line with the direction Taiwan's defence ministry has taken in recent years, said Cole, a senior fellow for Canadian think tank Macdonald-Laurier Institute.

"This move will also be welcomed by the United States, which often complains that Taiwan focuses too much on large conventional platforms at the detriment of smaller, more dispersible and less costly 'asymmetrical' capabilities."

Washington has remained a leading ally and arms supplier to Taipei despite switching

diplomatic recognition to Beijing in 1979. The budget includes a coastal anti-ship missiles system, a locally-developed Wan Chien (Ten Thousand Swords) cruise missile as well as an attack drone system and installation of combat systems on coastguard ships.

Cole also points out the benefit of ensuring quicker delivery as many of the armaments are produced domestically. "The latter is a crucial part, as Taiwan needs to make sure it has the capabilities to deter, and if needed to counter, a Chinese attack now, not five, ten years from now."

China has publicised multiple recent military drills simulating an invasion of the island. For decades, analysts largely concurred that invading Taiwan is a challenge China could not pull it off but Beijing has dramatically closed the gap in recent years. — AFP

Wife of activist barred from leaving China dies after 15 years apart

BEIJING: The wife of a repeatedly detained Chinese human rights lawyer died of cancer on Monday in the United States after her husband's pleas to be allowed to leave China and reunite with her went ignored, rights activists said.

Zhang Qing fled to the United States with the couple's children in 2009 after her husband Yang Maodong highlighted local corruption in a Chinese village and was imprisoned. Zhang was diagnosed with late-stage colon cancer in January 2021 and died in hospital at the age of 55, the New York-based Human Rights Watch said in a statement Monday.

Yang had published an open letter to the Chinese government in January 2021 after learning of Zhang's diagnosis, begging authorities to "have empathy for ordinary people" and allow him to leave the country to visit his wife. In an interview with the South China Morning Post last month, Zhang said her life was coming to an end, and that multiple attempts by her husband to leave China and join her had been blocked.

Yang-who also goes by his pen-name Guo Feixiong-is a writer and lawyer known for helping residents of a southern Chinese village organise themselves in 2006 against a local Communist Party boss whom they accused of illegally selling their land to enrich himself. Yang has been imprisoned repeatedly and faced police harassment and numerous beatings as a result of his advocacy.

His whereabouts are currently unknown. Zhang said in the interview that she had not been able to contact him for several months. Zhang and Yang had been unable to see each other since Yang's detention in 2006, with Yang being blocked by authorities from leaving the country even during his intermittent periods outside of detention, Human Rights Watch said.—AFP

UN chief 'saddened' by reports of deadly strike in Tigray

NEW YORK: UN chief Antonio Guterres is "deeply concerned" over reports of a deadly airstrike in Ethiopia's Tigray region, his spokesman said Monday, in the international body's first comment on an attack which rebels said left 56 people dead. The Tigray People's Liberation Front (TPLF) last week claimed that dozens had been killed in a drone strike on a camp for civilians displaced by the war in northern Ethiopia, in an attack that prompted aid agencies to suspend operations in the region.

Saturday's raid came only hours after the Ethiopian government had issued a call for "national reconciliation", and sparked renewed appeals from an alarmed international community for an end to the conflict. "The Secretary-General is deeply saddened by reports that more than 50 civilians have been killed and injured in an airstrike in northern Ethiopia at midnight on 7 January," Stephane Dujarric, spokesman for the UN Secretary-General, said in a statement.

"The United Nations and its humanitarian partners are working with authorities to urgently mobilize emergency assistance in the area, despite continuing challenges due to severe shortages of fuel, cash and supplies across Tigray," he added. "The Secretary-General is deeply concerned about the impact the conflict continues to have on civilians in Ethiopia. He expresses his deepest condolences to the victims and their families." — AFP

Six killed in Philippine jail brawl

MANILA: Six inmates were killed and 33 wounded during a fight in an overcrowded jail in the Philippines, authorities said yesterday, in the second such incident in as many weeks. The deadly brawl happened Monday between rival gangs at Caloocan City Jail in the National Capital Region, Bureau of Jail Management and Penology spokesman Xavier Solda said.

An investigation was under way into the cause of the violence that Solda said started as a fight between two inmates before others joined the fray. It is not clear what weapons were used.

A ban on family visits since the start of the pandemic may have been a factor, Solda said. "It's been

almost two years that we don't have physical visitation in our facilities because of the COVID-19, so we can't set aside the angle that this could be one of the reasons why others joined in the fight between the two PDLs (persons deprived of liberty)," Solda told AFP.

Security has been beefed up to maintain order in the facility, he added. Violence is common in Philippine jails where inadequate infrastructure and a slow-moving and overburdened judicial system means cells are sometimes filled to five times their capacity.

About 1,900 inmates were squeezed into Caloocan City Jail that is designed for fewer than 200, Solda said. The latest incident comes after a fight at New Bilibid Prison in the capital on January 2 left three inmates dead and 14 wounded. Improvised guns and bladed weapons were used in the clash at the nation's biggest prison. — AFP

UK police review Murdoch-linked kidnap murder

LONDON: London police said yesterday they were reviewing new information in the 1969 kidnap-murder of Muriel McKay, who was mistaken for media tycoon Rupert Murdoch's wife, and whose body had never been found.

The Metropolitan Police said McKay's family had contacted them with fresh details, which the Murdoch-owned The Times newspaper said included the location of the body. "The Met were contacted in December 2021 by the family of Muriel McKay regarding information they had obtained in relation to her murder," a spokeswoman told AFP.

The Times said the move came after the man convicted of the kidnapping, Nizamodeen Hosein, revealed where McKay's body was buried on a farm in Hertfordshire, north of London. "Officers from the Met's Specialist Crime Command have met with the family and are in the process of reviewing all the material," the police spokeswoman said, asking not to be named.

Hosein and his brother Arthur kidnapped McKay, then 55, in 1969 thinking that she was Murdoch's second wife Anna. The brothers had followed Murdoch's Rolls-Royce unaware he had lent it to his deputy Alick McKay, Muriel's husband.

Hosein recently revealed to the family that McKay had collapsed and died while watching a television news report about her kidnapping, The Times said. McKay's daughter Dianne, 81, told the newspaper she was relieved to hear that her mother had not been physically harmed. — AFP

Global growth could slow sharply due to Omicron: World Bank

'Labor shortages and supply chain snarls could become exacerbated'

WASHINGTON: Global growth will "decelerate markedly" this year, but the Omicron variant of COVID-19 that is spreading rapidly worldwide could make the situation worse and exacerbate labor shortages and supply chain snarls, the World Bank warned yesterday.

In its latest Global Economic Prospects report, the Washington-based development lender cut its forecast for world economic growth this year to 4.1 percent after the 5.5 percent rebound last year. The forecasts for growth last year and this year were both 0.2 percent lower than estimates released in June.

However, the bank warned, "Various downside risks cloud the outlook, including simultaneous Omicron-driven economic disruptions, further supply bottlenecks (and) a de-anchoring of inflation expectations," the report said. That could further reduce global growth this year to as low as 3.4 percent, a drop of 0.7 percentage points.

World Bank President David Malpass worries about the "huge toll" the pandemic is inflicting on people in poor countries, which could have ramifications for the future. "We're seeing troubling reversals in poverty, nutrition and health. The reversal and education or scope from schools closures will have a permanent impact," he told reporters. "I'm very worried about the permanent scar on development."

Ayhan Kose, head of bank's forecast unit, told AFP the Omicron strain is causing fewer restrictions than the initial outbreak, which means the overall impact could be more benign. However, he cautioned, "If it stays around much longer, and cases remain elevated and continue pressuring health systems, under that scenario, the global growth will be lower."

That would exacerbate ongoing struggles with

labor shortages and global production and transportation snarls that have fueled a wave of price increases. "The Omicron variant shows us once again, the pandemic is still with us and we need to learn how to live with the pandemic," he said.

Faced with inflation at a 40-year high, the US Federal Reserve is expected to begin raising interest rates soon, and perhaps take more aggressive steps, which will raise borrowing costs for developing countries already burdened with record debt.

That, in turn, could erode business and household confidence, lowering consumption and trade flows, a key engine of global growth.

US, China slowing

Kose stresses that vaccination remains crucial, since the threat of new, more transmissible or more virulent variants will persist until a substantial part of the world's population is vaccinated. "The share of vaccinated population in many economies is expected to surpass 70 percent by mid-2022, but the prospects for vaccination progress remain uncertain in some countries," especially in the poorest nations, the report said.

"At recent vaccination rates, only about a third of the LIC (low income countries) population will have received even one vaccine dose by the end of 2023." The world's biggest economic powers, the United States and China, have not been spared from the economic impact of Omicron.

In its report, the bank sharply lowered its forecast for US growth this year to 3.7 percent, 0.5 points lower than its previous estimate, following the country's 5.6 percent expansion in 2021.

The World Bank notes that Washington's 10-

year, \$1.2 trillion infrastructure spending plan signed in November should provide a "small boost" to the US economy in the near term, with more effects felt in later years. However, the American economy faces "tenacious inflation, and an even faster tightening of monetary policy could lead to weaker-than-expected growth."

For China, growth is now expected to slow to 5.1

percent in 2022, a 0.3 point downgrade, from eight percent last year, but the country's troubles extend beyond the pandemic. "The possibility of a marked and prolonged downturn in the highly leveraged property sector-and its potential effects on house prices, consumer spending and local government financing-is a notable downside risk to the outlook," the report said. —AFP

In Cuba, queuing for hours 'just to be able to eat'

HAVANA: Cubans are no strangers to queuing for everything from bread to toothpaste, often standing for hours under a blazing sun with no access to a toilet or drinking water, and always with the fear of leaving empty-handed. It is a daily ordeal Cubans have endured for about 60 years of communist rule, now worsened by the coronavirus pandemic, a steep economic downturn and tightened US sanctions.

"I spent almost all night here just to buy something. It is not easy, it is a big sacrifice just to be able to eat," shopper Edelvis Miranda, 47, told AFP at a market in Havana last week. The homemaker had taken her place in the queue at about 1:00 am, and finally left around 11 hours later, just before noon.

"It was worth it, because I found everything. Now some rest, and then back to the queue again," she said on her way home with two liters of oil, two packets of chicken, some minced meat and detergent.

Cuba recorded an official inflation rate of 70 percent in 2021, when the economy recovered a modest two percent after an 11-percent drop in 2020, signaling the nation's worst economic crisis in almost three decades. With government reserves dwindling, food imports-some \$2 billion worth per year before the pandemic struck-had to be drastically cut back in the country of 11.2 million. Last May, the government said imports, which normally cover 80 percent of the island's needs, were at their lowest level since 2009.

'Undignified'

The shortages affect everyone; even the well-heeled have to contend with long lines, though they often pay other people to hold their place. Those who can come armed with snacks, water, coffee or a

Indonesia claims graft in Garuda deal for French-Italian planes

JAKARTA: Indonesia provided prosecutors with proof of graft yesterday in flag-carrier Garuda's deals to lease aircraft made by ATR, a joint venture between Airbus and Italy's Leonardo, the country's state-owned enterprises minister said. The irregularities in the procurement contract were unearthed during an audit of Garuda's operations as the state-owned carrier struggles to keep flying after being battered by the pandemic.

"It's not just accusations, but facts," Erick Thohir said in a broadcast statement. Garuda has already returned other aircraft before their leases expired as revenue evaporated.

Early last year, it said it was returning 12 CRJ1000 aircraft manufactured by Canada's Bombardier, leased to Garuda by Nordic Aviation Capital (NAC)

NAC, founded in Denmark, also owns 25 ATR 72-600s in Garuda's fleet, which are the subject of

wooden bench to sit on. Often, police are at hand to keep order in queues that stretch down several street blocks. At a market in the capital, an announcement comes an hour before opening time that there are five products available for the day-an unusual bounty that sends a ripple of excitement through a line of about 400 hopeful shoppers.

But then, the let-down. Only 250 of them can get in. "This is undignified," grumbled Rolando Lopez, a 66-year-old pensioner who was not among the lucky ones. A few dozen among the luckless quickly form a queue for the next day's shopping, designating night "guards" to ensure no one loses their place. "It is the daily struggle of the Cuban. What else can you do?" asked housewife Maria Rosabal, 55.

Some stores in Cuba nowadays accept only foreign currency. But US dollars are no longer legal tender and can only be obtained on the black market. These stores are better stocked than peso-based ones, but few Cubans can afford to frequent them. It is common for shops to have only two or three products at a given time, or none. Sometimes, people queue not knowing what, if any, product they will be able to buy that day. Specific products often disappear from the shelves completely for periods of time, as is the case now with milk. —AFP

Thohir said the investigation into Garuda's procurement had mapped out which deals showed indications of corruption, "or merely have expensive leases — this is our own stupidity". Garuda's aircraft-leasing costs gobbled up 28 percent of revenues, Thohir told Kompas TV. The ATR deals were made in 2013, he said, during the reign of Garuda's former chief Emirsyah Satar. —AFP

Indian govt takes stake in stricken Vodafone unit

NEW DELHI: The Indian government has agreed to forego \$2.1 billion in interest payments and instead become the largest shareholder in British telecoms giant Vodafone's local unit Vi, the company said yesterday. Vodafone has been losing money in India since Asia's richest man Mukesh Ambani kicked off a price war in the vast market when his conglomerate Reliance launched telecoms arm Jio in 2016.

With the British parent company refusing to inject more money, Vi-which September data shows is squashed under 1.94 trillion rupees (\$26 billion) of debt-found itself unable to pay some interest owed on spectrum fees and other dues. New Delhi agreed after protracted negotiations to allow Vi and other telecom companies to convert what they owed into equity, in addition to a four-year moratorium on payments.

Both Vi and telecom giant Bharti Airtel opted to delay payments by four years. Vi is the only opera-

Asian casinos giant Genting's sub files for bankruptcy

WARNEMUNDE, Germany: Asian tourism and casinos giant Genting's shipbuilding subsidiaries in Germany filed for bankruptcy Monday, which one union leader described as a "dark day" for the country's dockyards. With travel still severely restricted during the coronavirus pandemic, particularly in Asia, the company has seen demand for huge cruise ships or luxury mega-yachts dwindle.

MV Werften on the Baltic Sea coast and Lloyd Werft in Bremerhaven on the North Sea coast declared themselves insolvent, local courts told AFP. The larger subsidiary MV Werften took the step after failing to secure funding for the completion of the "Global One" mega-liner, already 80 percent of the way through construction, according to the company.

Designed to carry close to 10,000 passengers, the huge ship had been due to leave the shipyard in 2021 — but the pandemic has knocked the company's timetable off course and crimped its budget.

Around 600 million euros (\$680 million) is necessary to finance the completion of the vessel, for which the shipbuilder has been seeking support from the government. The decision to declare bankruptcy came after lengthy discussions with officials in which the two sides "clearly have not found common ground", a spokesman for MV Werften said shortly before the filing was made.

The state asked MV Werften's owners Genting to put forward 10 percent of the capital, government coordinator for the maritime economy Claudia Mueller said in a press conference. "On this issue

tor converting its interest into government equity. Market leader Jio opted out of both options. Germany vows to speed up green energy projects in 'gigantic' effort

Habeck unveils ambitious package to make Germany carbon neutral by 2045

FRANKFURT: Germany's Climate and Energy minister Robert Habeck yesterday pledged to drastically ramp up renewable energy projects in the coming years, saying the country faced a "gigantic" task to meet climate protection goals

Germany needs to become "more efficient and faster" in the fight against climate change, Green party minister Habeck said, as he unveiled an ambitious package of measures to help make Europe's top economy carbon neutral by 2045. Among the most eye-catching proposals was the pledge to set aside two percent of Germany's land surface for wind energy projects, up from around

Habeck — who heads a "super ministry" of energy, climate protection and the economy in the new German government — promised to cut red tape to make it easier to get wind projects approved. He also called on citizens and regional authorities to show greater acceptance for wind turbines, after local objections often blocked such projects in the past.

"Everyone needs to cooperate," Habeck told reporters. As part of a "solar acceleration" plan, solar panels will be mandatory on new commercial buildings and become the norm on new-build homes, Habeck added. Germany's coalition government — which took over from Angela Merkel's cabinet last month and is made up of the Social Democrats, the Greens and the pro-business FDP — aims to cut greenhouse gas emissions by 65 percent by 2030 compared with 1990 levels.

Also by 2030, the country wants to exit coal and have renewables account for 80 percent of Germany's electricity mix. Habeck said the country was "significantly behind" in reaching those targets and faced a "task that is huge, gigantic" to get back on track.

The share of renewable energies currently hovers at just over 40 percent in Germany, in part because the country still relies heavily on coal as a result of Merkel's decision to phase out nuclear power by the end of 2022.

'Creating jobs'

Following a drop in carbon dioxide emissions in 2020 when the pandemic slowed economic activity, Germany's CO2 emissions actually jumped four percent in 2021, said Habeck, as demand rebounded and a lack of wind increased the use of fossil fuels. Turning to other sectors, Habeck said Germany would help fund investment in hydrogen and offer financial support for industrial companies making the switch to greener production

To boost the use of electric cars, Habeck said Germany would need to install 100,000 charging points annually by 2030. Seeking to allay fears that a greener economy would upend Germany's traditional industries, Habeck said climate protection would spur innovation "in a way we haven't seen in this country in a long time". "We will renew our industries, and that means creating value and jobs." Habeck said he aimed for the necessary legislation for his proposals to be passed this year. —AFP

New German CB chief warns ECB to watch inflation

FRANKFURT: Monetary policy in the eurozone needs to "be on its guard" in the face of record inflation, new Bundesbank President Joachim Nagel said yesterday, placing himself in the institution's hawkish

QNB Group's strong asset liability management capabilities enabled QNB Group to improve its loans to deposits ratio from 98.0 percent to 97.2 percent as at 31 December 2021 reflecting the improvement in the Group's overall liquidity. "The risk right now is that inflation rates stay elevated for longer than currently expected," Nagel said at an event to mark the handover from his inflationwary predecessor Jens Weidmann. "In any case, monetary policy must be on its guard," said Nagel, who has spent 17 years at the Bundesbank, widely trusted in Germany for its commitment to economic stability.

As a member of the European Central Bank's governing council, Nagel will be tasked with formulating the bank's response to soaring inflation in the eurozone, which stood at five percent in December, its highest-ever level and well above the ECB's two-percent target. At its last meeting in December, the 25member policy-setting committee decided on a "stepby-step" reduction in the ECB's massive bond-buying programme, its main crisis-fighting tool.

But concern has grown that the fast pace of price rises could persist as supply bottlenecks that have driven inflation show no sign of easing and geopolitical conflicts threaten to push energy costs higher. "We have a playbook for how to react when inflation deviates from our target in both directions," ECB president Christine Lagarde said at the Bundesbank event.

Both based in Frankfurt, the ECB and the Bundesbank have often been at odds over the right course of action, with the German institution advocating a less accommodative response to recent crises. In the context of uncertainty, the ECB should "follow its primary target of price stability without compromise, and in particular without consideration for the financing costs of states," outgoing Bundesbank chief

High levels of government indebtedness, which have only gone up during the pandemic, were a "big risk for monetary policy", Weidmann said. Nagel would follow the "Bundesbank's line up to this point" he said, stressing the need for the ECB's expansive monetary policy not to continue "for too long".—AFP

Cathay Pacific faces 'legal action' over HK virus outbreak

HONG KONG: Cathay Pacific is being investigated and faces possible legal action over an Omicron variant coronavirus outbreak in Hong Kong that began with the airline's employees, the city's leader said yesterday. The revelation came as chief executive Carrie Lam announced the suspension of all kindergarten and primary schools until after the Lunar New Year in early February.

Like China, Hong Kong maintains a strict zero-COVID strategy that has kept cases low but largely cut the international finance hub off from both the mainland and the rest of the world for the last two years. A recent outbreak traced to Cathay air crew who breached home quarantine has sparked a dramatic tightening of already strict social distancing controls and travel restrictions, causing renewed anger among residents and businesses.

Yesterday, Hong Kong leader Carrie Lam said authorities were investigating "whether this airline has complied with the regulations". "We will take the legal action once we have the full evidence of what wrong it has gone into," Lam said in English.

The revelation piles new pressure on Cathay Pacific, which has been decimated by the pandemic and has no domestic market to fall back on in a city that used to be a major Asian transport and logistics hub. Cargo flights, the one area where the airline made some cash, have been slashed recently because new quarantine rules imposed on crew has left managers struggling to find enough pilots.

Last month AFP reported that Cathay pilots were leaving in droves. Lam's government is facing growing anger over there being no end in sight to zero-COVID controls at a time when rival business hubs are learning to live with the virus. Her administration, which is also carrying out a crackdown on democracy activists and Beijing critics, has hewed to China's approach and says restarting travel with the mainland must come before the rest of the world. But the mainland is battling its own outbreak and appears to be in no rush to open to Hong Kong. leaving the city facing a double isolation. Lam's government has also failed to persuade enough people to get vaccinated during the zero-COVID controls, especially the elderly, with just 62 percent of the population inoculated despite ample supplies. That makes Hong Kong the third least vaccinated place in a list of the International Monetary Fund's 39 advanced economies, above only Latvia and Slovakia.

Among the over 80s-the demographic most at risk from severe COVID-19 illness-only 23 percent have taken a first vaccine dose. — AFP

Facing questions on trading, Fed Vice Chair to leave early

Powell to target inflation at confirmation, face trading scrutiny

WASHINGTON: Federal Reserve Vice Chair Richard Clarida announced Monday he will exit the US central bank early following questions over his equity trading activity early in the COVID-19 pandemic.

Clarida, whose term on the Board of Governors was set to expire on January 31, will instead resign on January 14. He gave no explanation for the accelerated departure, but said in a resignation letter he was "proud" to have helped steer "the economy away from depression." Clarida faced heightened scrutiny following reports last week that he undertook additional stock fund trades in February 2020 that appeared to contradict earlier explanations about his trading activities.

The latest questions came after amended financial disclosure forms were reported by The New York Times. Earlier Monday, Senator Elizabeth Warren, a Massachusetts Democrat, had called on Fed Chair Jerome Powell to "immediately release" all information relating to the trades.

"The revelations raise concerns that Clarida may have been trading on inside information related to planned policy moves, and that the Fed has failed to disclose the full scope of officials' trading practices to the public," Warren said.

A former economics professor at Columbia University, Clarida won senate confirmation for the vice chair position in September 2018. On Monday, Powell praised Clarida, saying "Rich's contributions to our monetary policy deliberations, and his leadership of the Fed's first-ever public review of our monetary policy framework, will leave a lasting

impact in the field of central banking."

Meanwhile, Federal Reserve Chair Jerome Powell will highlight the central bank's efforts to fight inflation and stabilize the US economy at his confirmation hearing, according to testimony

However, the Republican will likely also face questions about his ethics from a Democratic senator, after a media report raised further questions over whether a Fed official had traded securities to benefit from the upheaval caused by the COVID-19 pandemic in 2020.

Powell's testimony before the Senate Banking Committee comes after President Joe Biden nominated him for a second term leading the central bank as the US economy deals with a wave of record-high inflation that's prompted critics to accuse the Fed of complacency. "We know that high inflation exacts a toll, particularly for those less able to meet the higher costs of essentials like food, housing, and transportation," Powell will tell senators, according to the testimony. "We are strongly committed to achieving our statutory goals of maximum employment and price stability. We will use our tools to support the economy and a strong labor market and to prevent higher inflation from becoming entrenched.'

The central bank intervened aggressively to stop a wider liquidity crisis and indices eclipsed their pre-pandemic level in the months that followed. In a letter sent Monday, Democratic Senator Elizabeth Warren, citing the Times' reporting, asked "that the Federal Reserve...

Moliere: 400 years as master of the French stage

hen the French refer to their native tongue, it is the "language of Moliere", and as he turns 400 this week he remains as central to their culture as Shakespeare in the Englishspeaking world. Here are a few pointers on the life and legacy of France's most illustrious playwright.


A little-known star

Moliere, real name Jean-Baptiste Poquelin, left zero trace of his personal life: no journal, correspondence or even notes on his work. The only of his four children to survive to adulthood, lost his manuscripts. We don't know the source of his stage-name - which refers to a quarry - nor his date of birth (we have only a baptism certificate, dated January 15, 1622, that was discovered two centuries later in 1820). As eldest son, he stood to inherit a comfortable living from his father as chief upholsterer and valet to the king, but gave it up to be an actor.

It caused his father much strife: he was forced to buy his son out of prison after his first company, The Illustrious Theatre. fell into debt. Moliere fled Paris at 23, spending the next 13 years with a travelling troupe. Success on the road won him a return to Paris and a successful audience for the young king, Louis XIV, that earned him a powerful patron even though he faced constant battles with censors. Despite the myth, he did not quite die on stage, but shortly after a performance - as the hypochondriac Argan no less - at home on the Rue de Richelieu on February 17, 1673.



La Comedie-Francaise was created by King Louis XIV in 1680, seven years after Moliere's death, as a merger between his troupe and another. The longest-running theatre company in the world, it is known as "La Maison de Moliere" and has performed his work every single year since its formation. Based since 1799 on the Rue de Richelieu, close to the Louvre, it now employs 400 people, including 60 actors, and has a costume department comprising 50,000 items.



Moliere created characters who often take their foibles to extremes, but allow us to laugh at our universal human failings in the process. Perhaps best-known is Tartuffe, from the play of the same name -

a fraud who disguises himself as a priest to convince a naive, wealthy aristocrat into handing him his fortune and daughter's hand in marriage, even as he chases after his wife. The play is seen as practically inventing the "comedy of manners" that satirises the moral hypocrisies of high

Though Moliere is not thought to have been particularly anti-religious himself, 'Tartuffe" scandalized the Catholic Church and became a key text in the anti-clerical movement of the following centuries.

Among other key characters is the money-obsessed Harpagnon, from "The Miser", who exhorts his servants "not to rub the furniture too hard for fear of wearing it out". The hypochondriac Argan from "The Imaginary Invalid" is another eternal character that Moliere used to satirise quacks in the medical profession who exploited people's fear of death. — AFP


S actor Denis O'Hare could sense the ghost of Moliere smiling as he rode his co-star Olivia Williams like a horse on stage at London's National Theatre. Usually a rather cerebral place, the National's audience was in stitches as O'Hare's character Tartuffe, from the classic 17th-century French play, tried to disguise his adulterous antics as a bit of

horseplay. "The comedy translates across the centuries if you know what you're doing," O'Hare told AFP. "Some of the funny was based on language, and some of it on sheer idiocy... But there are also great moments of pathos and human emotion that make it all the richer." That hit production of "Tartuffe" in 2019 was a reminder that Moliere. France's most celebrated playwright who turns 400 this week, can

resonate in the land of Shakespeare. It was not always the case. "It used to be a box office manager's nightmare to have a Moliere production. You often had more people on stage than in the theatre," said Noel Peacock of the University of Glasgow, an expert on Moliere translations. In the 1980s, one Sunday Times critic even feared that Moliere was an obstacle to a united Europe: "How can you trade freely with a nation whose best comedy does not travel?"

But since those times, there has been a "complete turnaround," said Peacock. There have been dozens of British produc-

of Tartuffe in London alone between 2016 2009 and David Tennant (of Doctor Who fame) in "Don Juan" in 2017.

tions in recent years - three major versions and 2019. He is attracting celebrities: Keira Knightly played in "The Misanthrope" in

Falseness and liars

Peacock credits fresh translations that worried less about linguistic accuracy than capturing Moliere's spirit with helping to bring out the universal truths in his work. "Great plays last for a reason," agreed O'Hare. "Tartuffe is a rogue, a rascal, a hustler. But he's also a truth-teller in the great tradition of the French clown. He upends society's norms and conventions." That has made him highly adaptable to modern scenarios.

The Royal Shakespeare Company recently relocated "Tartuffe" to a British-Pakistani family in Birmingham, where the commentary on religious hypocrisy found fresh relevance. The Exchange Theatre, a French-English company based in London, has just released a documentary about its version of "The Misanthrope", which it set in a modern-day newsroom to highlight Moliere's focus on truth and lies. "The fact that he so vehemently criticised the falseness and liars in the world is one part of what makes his work survive so well," said David Furlong, the company's French-Mauritian director.

He highlighted the famous, sarcastic monologue about hypocrisy in "Don Juan" ("To act the part of a good man is the best part one can act") as the sort of speech

that will be eternal. "I've wondered in the past if it's just my French education that tells me Moliere is a genius," Furlong said. "But I don't think so. There are so many faces to Moliere, he's so rich and diverse,

does comedy as well as he does tragedy, silly farces as well as highly philosophical plays. He speaks to everybody."

Beyond Britain

It's not just the English-speaking world that has embraced Moliere of late: translations have proved popular in Germany, Russia, Japan and beyond. A recent French book about Moliere in the Arabic world found he had been performed in the region since at least 1847 and had become the "godfather of theatre" in many countries. "Moliere's plays have been extremely important internationally. He even provided the foundation for some national theatres who adapted his plays to their local languages and cultures," said Agathe Sanjuan, conservator of the Comedie-Francaise in Paris.


It was always a tougher sell in England, of course, where he had to compete with the Bard, though adaptations of Moliere were appearing there as early as the 1660s, according to Peacock. However, he found more success in Scotland, Peacock added, which had a "Shakespeare-sized hole to fill" and where Moliere's "biggest advantage was that he wasn't English." - AFP

poet and activist Maya Angelou has become the first Black woman to appear on the US quarter, in a new version of the coin unveiled by the US Mint on Monday. Angelou, author of "I Know Why the Caged Bird Sings," will also be the first figure commemorated through the American Women Quarters Program, which was signed into law in January 2021. The US Mint "has begun shipping the first coins" with Angelou's likeness on the American quarter, a 25-cent piece, according to a press release from the agency.

"It is my honor to present our nation's first circulating coins dedicated to celebrating American women and their contributions to American history," said Mint Deputy Director Ventris Gibson. "Each 2022 quarter is designed to reflect the

breadth and depth of accomplishments being celebrated throughout this historic coin program. Maya Angelou, featured on the reverse of this first coin in the series, used words to inspire and uplift." The program directs the US Mint to issue quarters each year between 2022 and 2025 featuring five different female trailblazers who have contributed to the country.

Treasury Secretary Janet Yellen said she was "proud that these coins celebrate the contributions of some of America's most remarkable women." "Each time we redesign our currency, we have the chance to say something about our country - what we value, and how we've progressed as a society," she said in a statement. The quarter has for the last 90

years shown the nation's first president, George Washington, on one side and an eagle on the other. The new quarters which have been minted in Philadelphia and Denver - show Washington on one side and Angelou on the other.

The other figures set to appear on the coin in 2022 are: Sally Ride, the first American woman in space, Wilma Mankiller, the first female principal chief of the Cherokee Nation, Nina Otero-Warren, a New Mexico suffrage leader and Anna May Wong, a Chinese American film star. Angelou, who was born in Missouri in 1928, was an essayist and poet who worked with Martin Luther King Jr. and Malcolm X during the Civil Rights Movement. Angelou, who delivered the

poem at former President Bill Clinton's first inauguration, died in 2014.

Treasury Secretary Yellen has also signaled support for recognizing former slave and abolitionist Harriet Tubman on US currency. Former president Barack Obama launched a project to put Tubman's face on the \$20 bill but it stalled under the administration of Donald Trump. Putting Tubman, a Black woman who escaped slavery and became a leader of the pre-Civil War abolitionist movement, on the bill would be an "honor" but designing banknotes takes time, Yellen said in September.—AFP

'Avoid Chinese meat,' say Germans ahead of Beijing Games

ne German Anti-Doping Agency (NADA) sent a strong message on Monday to athletes heading to Beijing for next month's Winter Olympics not to eat Chinese meat for fear of falling foul of doping regulations. NADA fears that athletes may risk ingesting clenbuterol, a steroid that is used to fatten pigs and calves before they are sent to slaughter. "The consumption of meat should therefore, if possible, be avoided, and the alternatives should be discussed with the nutritionist," said NADA in its newsletter on Monday.

The risk of clenbuterol contamination in meat produced in China has long been mentioned by anti-doping agencies, although no recent cases have been reported. Clenbuterol made headlines in the past when cycling champion Alberto Contador tested positive on the 2010 Tour de France. The Spaniard has always maintained that he was contaminated by eating a steak bought in Spain. Contador, however, was suspended and stripped of several titles including the 2010 Tour de France and the 2011 Giro d'Italia.— AFP

Djokovic trains as Australian Open dream hangs in balance

Tennis superstar targets a record 21st Grand Slam

Govt ponders

cancelling his

visa, again

MELBOURNE: Tennis superstar Novak Djokovic trained at the Australian Open venue yesterday for his attempt to win a record 21st Grand Slam but his dream hung in the balance as the government pondered cancelling his visa, again. The world number one had scored a surprise courtroom victory the day before, overturning the Australian government's decision to cancel his visa on COVID-19 vaccination grounds.

But the immigration minister said he may annul Djokovic's visa once more. The unvaccinated 34year-old Serbian ace says he is now determined to

stay in Melbourne and compete in the Australian Open, which starts in six days. "I flew here to play at one of the most important events we have in front of the amazing fans," Djokovic said on Instagram Monday. Wearing a t-shirt and shorts, he limbered up in a gym yesterday accompanied by coach Goran

Ivanisevic before heading to centre court, AFP journalists saw. Television cameras filmed him from helicopters as he played.

Djokovic, a nine-time Australian Open champion, jetted into the country six days ago carrying a medical exemption from vaccination due to a positive coronavirus test on December 16 last year. After overnight questioning at Melbourne airport, border officials decided the exemption was not valid, cancelled his visa and transferred him to a detention centre pending deportation. "I am not vaccinated," Djokovic had told the border official, according to a transcript released by the court.

'Biggest victory'

He expressed bewilderment that his exemption, approved by two medical panels in Australia, was not accepted. The limited number of foreigners

allowed into Australia must be fully vaccinated or have a medical exemption. The government insists that a recent infection does not count as an exemption. Federal circuit court judge Anthony Kelly dramatically reversed the visa decision Monday, ordering the cancellation be "quashed", that the player be released immediately and that the government pay his legal costs.

The government had surrendered after conceding that Djokovic's airport interview was "unreasonable" because the player had not been given the promised time to respond. It was "the biggest vic-

tory in his career, bigger than all his Grand Slams", his mother Dijana said at a press conference in Belgrade. "Truth and justice came to the light. I would like to thank the justice system of Australia," said his brother Djordje.

Much of Australia's media said yesterday doubts had emerged over the accuracy of Djokovic's

travel declaration, reportedly filled out before he flew in from Spain. A copy of his declaration showed a tick in the box to confirm he had not and would not travel in the 14 days before landing in Australia on January 5. But the player had reportedly been in Serbia before Spain. A spokesman for Immigration Minister Alex Hawke said he was "considering whether to cancel Mr. Djokovic's visa" by using his ministerial powers. But he would not comment further for legal reasons.

'Free Novak'

As Djokovic practiced in Melbourne Park, some fans said he should be allowed to play. "I can imagine some people will be pretty angry about it," said 22-year-old fan Harrison Denicolo. "All I know is he came here, and then we turned him back when he got here. So, it's kind of unfair." Ofek Dvir Ovadia,

22, said he was excited to see Djokovic play in the Australian Open. "He will cop a fair bit of abuse, I reckon, when he plays just from the fans in general, but I hope a few people get behind him," he said. Until Monday, Djokovic had been held at the former Park Hotel, a five-storey detention facility, which holds about 32 migrants trapped in Australia's hard-line immigration system - some for many years.

Hundreds of Djokovic fans, anti-vaccination protesters and migration rights activists had rallied outside the centre during his stay. Yesterday morning, there were just two television reporters outside and no protesters. A lone cardboard sign read: "Free Novak and all the refugees". The ATP, which runs the men's tennis tour, said the affair leading up to the court case had been "damaging on all fronts, including for Novak's well-being and preparation for the Australian Open".

Rafael Nadal, one of Djokovic's main rivals for the title, said "it is the fairest thing" for the Serbian to play in the Australian Open. Tennis great Martina Navratilova said on social media: "Though I disagree with not getting vaccinated; at the end of the day it seems Novak did play by the rules as they were for the exemption and was burned. Let him play." — AFP

Djokovic's saga throws light on migrants' ordeal

MELBOURNE: It was the most unlikely Australian residence for the world's number one tennis player, Novak Djokovic: a grim, fivestorey former hotel with no check-out allowed. For four nights, Melbourne's infamous "alternative place of detention" for migrants became his abode: no tennis courts, no swimming pool and no leaving. Dozens of journalists and scores of fans, anti-vaccination mandate protesters and migrant rights activists rallied outside daily.

But the 34-year-old ace reportedly was not seen by his fellow residents: about 32 people held under Australia's stringent immigration policy, some of them for years. And a day after the Serbian superstar left the detention centre as celebrating fans sang and danced, his cancelled visa restored by a court, the media glare left with him.

Yesterday morning, there were only two television reporters outside and no protesters. A lonely cardboard sign read: "Free Novak and all the refugees". Chalk scrawled on the front of the hotel said: "#gameover free the refugees". Days earlier, people had been scrawling graffiti on the walls, hanging prorefugee banners from the building, singing and dancing. Among the mix of demonstrators were at least 20 activists trying to highlight the situation of people caught up in Australia's strict migration system.

'They won't eat it'

On Djokovic's first day in detention, activist Kim Matousek pointedly remarked on the interest being shown in the tennis ace's brief stay. "Well I find it kind of interesting that they're protesting for Djokovic, he's only been in detention for less than a day," she said. "As for our friends, they've been in detention for what was it 3,099 days now?"

Above Matousek, men at the facility had put up signs at the windows reading: "Nine years too long" and "Aren't we human beings like you?" The food served inside is of poor quality, she said. "The coleslaw smells like alcohol because it's rotten, they won't eat it." The facility, formerly the Park Hotel, gained notoriety last December when a fire broke out in the building. One person was hospitalized for smoke inhalation. There were no fatalities.

A week later, asylum seekers posted images to social media of food they said they were served, which contained maggots and mouldy bread. Deviani Segal, a 54-year-old piano teacher, was also demonstrating to remind people about those inside. "I would rather the message be that no one should be locked in this hellhole," he said. Refugee Action Collective spokesman David Glanz said Djokovic's detention shone a light on the centre. But for the refugees, he said, "it is not a game". "We fear that long after Djokovic is back on the lucrative global tennis circuit, those men will still be in detention - many of them in their ninth year of being held by the Australian government," he said on the weekend. — AFP

Tearful Sabalenka melts down; Open warm-up in tatters


ADELAIDE: World number two Aryna Sabalenka's Australian Open preparations were in tatters yesterday when she self-destructed for the second week in a row and was almost unable to serve at an Adelaide warm-up event. A week after her delivery deserted her at the first of two Adelaide lead-in tournaments, Sabalenka suffered the same fate as she was stunned in three sets by world number 93 Rebecca Peterson 5-7.6.1.7.5

Sabalenka dished up 21 double faults and was reduced to serving underarm in the second and third sets in a desperate effort to get the ball into play. She took so much pace off her first serves that at one stage they were barely clearing the net. The 23-year-old Belarusian became distressed in the third set and, after being asked by the umpire whether she was all right, broke down in tears during her next service game. Her only consolation was that

she was still hitting her groundstrokes with power and placement, but it was no surprise when she bowed out at the first hurdle.

'That was definitely the weirdest match I've ever played," Swedish qualifier Peterson said. "It was tough staying focused. I know she was struggling a lot. "I just had to stay in my own world it was really difficult." American teenage sensation Coco Gauff blasted her way to the second round with an impressive 6-1, 6-2 win over Czech player Katerina Siniakova. The 17-year-old Gauff took just over an hour to dispose of Siniakova and set up a second round clash with fellow teenager Marta Kostyuk of Ukraine. Fourth-seeded Slovenian Tamara Zidansek progressed when she saw off British qualifier Heather Watson 2-6, 6-2, 7-6 (7/4).

Seventh seed Jill Teichmann fell to US qualifier Lauren Davis 1-6, 7-6 (7/3), 6-4. Australian wildcard Maddison Inglis

beat Montenegro's Danka Kovinic 6-4, 1-6, 6-2, while other winners were American Madison Brengle, who downed Russia's Anastasia Potapova 7-5, 4-6, 6-1 and Czech player Tereza Martincova, a 6-4, 3-6, 6-3 winner over Ukraine's Dayana Yastremska. In the

men's draw, fifth-seeded South African Lloyd Harris was ousted by South Korean Kwon Soon-woo 5-7, 7-5, 6-4, while Australian wildcard Thanasi Kokkinakis continued his recent good form with a 6-4, 6-0 win over Frenchman Benoit Paire.—AFP

Dolphins, Bears, Vikings fire their head coaches

LOS ANGELES: The Miami Dolphins, Chicago Bears and Minnesota Vikings all fired their head coaches on Monday just one day after the close of the 2021-22 NFL regular season. The Dolphins sacked Brian Flores, the Vikings let Mike Zimmer go, and the Bears fired Matt Nagy with both teams looking for new direction after missing the playoffs.

"I made a decision today to part ways with Brian Flores," Dolphins owner Stephen Ross said Monday. "After evaluating where we are as an organization and what we need going forward to improve, I determined that key dynamics of our football organization weren't functioning at a level I want it to be and felt that this decision was in the best interest of the Miami Dolphins.

"I believe we have a talented young roster in place and have the opportunity to be much better in 2022. I want to thank Brian for his hard work and wish him nothing but the best in his future." In three seasons, Flores had 24 wins and posted a 9-8 record in 2021 but the former New England Patriots defensive coordinator never made the playoffs. He

had no prior experience as a head coach before joining the Dolphins. Nagy's fate was sealed as the Bears struggled through a 6-11 season that ended with a loss at Minnesota on Sunday. Bears general manager Ryan Pace is also stepping down.

The Bears have not won in the postseason since the 2010 team advanced to the NFC championship game. The Vikings fired coach Mike Zimmer and general manager Rick Spielman after eight seasons, making the moves after a season-ending 31-17 win over the Bears. The Vikings finished with an 8-9 record and missed the playoffs for a second straight season. The Detroit Lions also fired offensive coordinator Anthony Lynn. Detroit was one of the worst teams in the NFL with a 3-13-1 record. — AFP

US Open champion suffers humiliating loss in Sydney

Raducanu thrashed 6-0, 6-1 by Rybakina

SYDNEY: US Open champion Emma Raducanu's Australian Open warm-up tournament lasted just 55 minutes after she was thrashed 6-0, 6-1 by Elena Rybakina at the Sydney International yesterday. The 19-year-old Raducanu took the tennis world by storm in September when she won the US Open as a qualifier. She opted not to play last week's Melbourne Summer Set tournament after recovering from COVID-19, meaning her last chance for some match practice ahead of the Open was at this week's Sydney Tennis Classic.

But she was blown off court by the powerful

Rybakina, who finished runner-up to Ashleigh Barty at last week's Adelaide International. The 1.80-metre tall Rybakina was superior in every department and had far too much firepower for Raducanu. Rybakina raced through the first set in 24 minutes without dropping a game and won the first three

games of the second set before her opponent at last held serve. But that was simply a temporary reprieve, with Rybakina winning the next three games to underline her total dominance.

Earlier, Tokyo Olympics gold medalist Belinda Bencic said she felt "a little bit wobbly" in her first match after COVID as she began her warmup for the Australian Open with a low-key win. The 24-year-old Swiss cruised into the second round with a 6-3, 6-2 victory over Brazilian qualifier Beatriz Haddad Maia. But Bencic, who contracted COVID in mid-December after competing at an Abu Dhabi exhibition, admitted she had not been at her best, with the first Grand Slam of the year starting on Monday.

"I was struggling a little bit, getting to practice after COVID because the pulse was getting up and the fatigue was still there," said Bencic, a former world number four but now ranked 23rd. "I think I still have room to feel better and my fitness has to get better. "I still feel a little bit wobbly and so I think there is still potential, but I'm happy that I can play this tournament." She will now take on Oceane Dodin of France in the next round. Dodin, a lucky loser from qualifying, beat Mexican doubles specialist Giuliana Olmos 6-4, 6-1. World number 20 Elise Mertens also moved through the



Nigeria overpower Egypt 1-0

Boufal strikes late as Morocco edge Ghana in clash of titans

GAROUA: Leicester City forward Kelechi Iheanacho scored as Nigeria put a troubled build-up to the Africa Cup of Nations in Cameroon behind them yesterday to beat disappointing Egypt 1-0 in Garoua. Iheanacho struck after 30 minutes to take the Super Eagles to the top of the table after the opening match in Group D, which includes Guinea-Bissau and Sudan.

Nigeria fired German coach Gernot Rohr in December after an unimpressive World Cup qualifying campaign and put former national star Augustine Eguavoen in temporary charge. Eguavoen's squad was without forwards Victor Osimhen, Emmanuel Dennis and Odion Ighalo for a variety of reasons, but his team did him proud against Mohamed Salah-captained Egypt. Prolific Liverpool scorer Salah hardly touched the ball and had only one chance, late in the second half, to equalize.

A cagey opening half controlled by Nigeria sprang to life on 26 minutes when winger Moses Simon got behind the Egypt defence and fired into the side netting from a difficult angle. Simon played a major role when the Super Eagles took the lead four minutes later at the 30,000-capacity Stade Roumde Adjia in the northwestern city of Garoua. His cross was only

partially cleared by Ahmed Hegazy and Nigerian Joseph Aribo nodded the ball into the path of Iheanacho who hammered a half-volley past goalkeeper Mohamed

More energetic

A far more energetic Nigerian side deserved to be in front against lethargic opponents with Salah starved of possession in 30 degrees celsius heat. Iheanacho almost set up a second goal for Nigeria before half-time, but his pass to Taiwo Awoniyi was just too strong and Elshenawy dashed off his line to gather the ball.

Egypt nearly fell further behind a couple of minutes into the second half when Elshenawy got his hands to an Awoniyi header and the ball came back into play off the underside of the crossbar. Simon's speed was a constant threat on the left, while Nigeria goalkeeper Maduka Okoye was a mere spectator with Egypt unable to mount pressure. Salah, sporting a shorter hair style, finally got a scoring chance as the match entered the final quarter, but his close-range prod was blocked by Okoye's foot and cleared.

Meanwhile, in the first of three matches yesterday, defending champions Algeria

were surprisingly held to a O-O Group E draw by minnows Sierra Leone in the Atlantic port city of Douala. Yacine Brahimi missed the holders' best chance early in the second half when he found himself with just the goalkeeper to beat, only for Mohamed Kamara to hold his shot at the second attempt. The third day of group fixtures will be completed when Guinea-Bissau face Sudan in a clash of Group D outsiders in Garoua at 2000 local time.

Morocco edge Ghana

Meanwhile, Sofiane Boufal scored on 83 minutes to earn Morocco a 1-0 win over Ghana in Yaounde on Monday after the first clash of titans in the Africa Cup of Nations. The 28-year-old former Southampton midfielder, now with French top-flight club Angers, turned in the goalmouth and fired a loose ball past goalkeeper Joseph Wollacott. It was the first meeting of two top 10 nations in a championship that began on Sunday after twice being postponed last year due to the coronavirus pandemic. Morocco are ranked second and Ghana eighth in Africa and both former champions are considered potential winners of the 24-team tournament

It is 46 years since Morocco won the Cup of Nations for the only time and the latest campaign began without their best known player, Chelsea midfielder Hakim Ziyech. He was dumped from the national squad last year after coach Vahid Halilhodzic labelled the Netherlands-born star a "disruptive influence". Morocco started against Ghana with three Premier League players-captain Romain Saiss from Wolves and Watford duo Adam Masina and Imran Louza.

Ghana have won the symbol of African national team supremacy four times, but the last success came 40 years ago in Libya, where teenager Abedi 'Pele' Ayew sprang to international prominence. Coach Milovan Rajevac chose six England-based starters, including Daniel Amartey, Jordan Ayew and Thomas Partey from Premier League clubs. This was the fourth clash between the Atlas Lions and the Black Stars in the Cup of Nations with each country winning one and the other drawn.

Foul-riddled

After a cagey, foul-riddled start at a 42,500-seat stadium named after former Cameroon president Ahmadou Ahidjo, Partey came close on 32 minutes with his

angled free-kick going just over the crossbar. This close shave was a signal for both teams to show more urgency in front of a small crowd and Saiss got his head to a free-kick in a crowded goalmouth only to see it fly over the target.

Ghanaian hearts pumped faster just before half-time when a solo run by Joseph Paintsil offered hope of an opening goal, but his finish was embarrassing, sending his shot well wide. Paintsil threatened again early in the second half with a lengthy dribble only to pass poorly on the edge of the box and Morocco breathed a sigh of relief. Andre Ayew, elder brother of Jordan and son of Abedi, attempted a volley off a free-kick but instead of a spectacular goal the ball flew wide.

Having let the Black Stars down twice, Paintsil thought he had made amends by firing goalwards with 18 minutes remaining only to be denied by a brilliant one-hand save from Yassine Bounou. In Group B, Guinea edged Malawi 1-0 through a 35th-minute goal from Issiaga Sylla in the western city of Bafoussam and share first place with Senegal. Left-back Sylla scored from close range after a long cross-field pass found Jose Kante, who pushed the ball into the six-yard box. — AFP

Fairytale end; Taylor seals N Zealand win over Bangladesh

CHRISTCHURCH: New Zealand wrapped up the second Test against Bangladesh by an innings and 117 runs in Christchurch yesterday to draw the series, with veteran batsman Ross Taylor taking the final wicket in a fairytale finish to his Test career. Bangladesh, forced to follow on 385 runs behind, were dismissed in their second innings for 278 after Liton Das had cracked a gallant 102 off 111 deliveries. But the day belonged to 37-year-old Taylor, New Zealand's elder statesman playing his 112th and final Test, who had a rare bowl with his part-time offspin at the end and needed just three balls to take the last wicket of Ebadot Hossain, caught by Tom Latham for four.

It was a fitting farewell for Taylor, who bowed out of red-ball cricket with a New Zealand record 7,683 runs, putting him 37th in the all-time list of the sport's most prolific run-getters. "I wanted to finish with a win and the guys definitely gave that to me," Taylor said. "The way we came out and bowled and put them under pressure after putting up a very good total put us in good stead. It was an emotional game for me, my family and friends and it was good to get the win."

Captain Tom Latham summed up New Zealand's victory as "close to the perfect performance. "After losing the toss and getting put in, to get a significant score on the board and then for the bowlers to do their thing on a wicket that was flattening out was outstanding." The Bangladesh top order put up gritty resistance in reaching 123 for three, while Liton shared a century partnership for the sixth wicket with Nurul Hasan. But there was no fight in the tail as New

Zealand, the reigning world Test champions, completed a much-needed win after being comprehensively beaten by eight wickets in the first Test.

Rather than be disappointed in the result, Bangladesh captain Mominul Haque said winning one Test and sharing the two-match series was "a very big achievement for us". "So we have to take this challenge and continue our momentum," he added. Bangladesh were sunk in their second innings by the bounce of Neil Wagner, who took three for 77, while Kyle Jamieson finished with four for 82. But the foundations for New Zealand's victory were laid by captain Latham with his epic 252 setting up a mammoth first innings 521 for six declared. The Bangladesh bowlers failed to capitalize on the green wicket after winning the toss and asking New Zealand to bat. — AFP

Embiid helps Sixers win 7th straight as Hornets sting Bucks

LOS ANGELES: Joel Embiid had 31 points and eight rebounds as the Philadelphia 76ers won their seventh straight game with a 111-91 victory over the Houston Rockets on Monday night. Embiid recorded his seventh straight 30-point game. He also had six assists and made all 13 of his free throws in front of a crowd of 13,600 at Toyota Center arena in Houston.

Embiid is the second NBA player in history to score exactly 31 points in four straight games. Bob McAdoo did it for the Buffalo Braves in 1973. Embiid entered Monday's contest as the sixth highest scorer in the league, averaging 26.8 points per game. Philadelphia has the longest winning streak in the Eastern Conference and the second-longest one in the league behind the Memphis Grizzlies who have won nine straight.

straight.

Elsewhere, LaMelo Ball scored 23 points as the Charlotte Hornets swept back-to-back games against the defending NBA champion Milwaukee Bucks with a 103-99 win. Ball capped his performance with the eventual winning basket on a floater with 15 seconds left in the fourth for the Hornets, who also beat the Bucks 114-106 on Saturday. Giannis Antetokounmpo finished with 26 points and 13 rebounds for the strug-

gling Bucks, who have lost four of their last five games.

Milwaukee committed their 20th turnover after
Ball's go-ahead basket. On the next possession Miles
Bridges sank a pair of game-clinching free throws. Ball
scooted to his left, shooting across his body as he was
falling away to break the tie. "That is a highly difficult
shot, but he makes it look effortless," Hornets coach
James Borrego said. "Melo has that uncanny ability to
be going 100 mph, get off-balance and still be poised

when he raises up. "That's tough to do for a player who has been in the league 15 years, let alone a guy who has been in the league two years."

Terry Rozier delivered 27 points, Bridges finished with 17 points and 11 rebounds and Gordon Hayward tallied 14 points as the Hornets won despite shooting just 13-of-44 shooting from three-point range. Khris Middleton helped pace the Bucks offense with 27 points and a game-high 11 assists. Jordan Nwora added 18 points and Wesley Matthews had 13 points. "You are definitely concerned anytime you lose four out of five," Middleton said. "And you never want to lose two in a row.

"You understand what the circumstances are (with players being out) and you never want to use that as an excuse. We understand what we're going through and everybody is going through. But we still have to go out there and compete." — AFP
