Kuwait FM presents Lebanon proposal to ease Gulf dispute

Sheikh Ahmad meets Aoun, Mikati, Berri • Lebanese FM to visit Kuwait



BEIRUT: Kuwait's foreign minister said yesterday that he has given Lebanese authorities a list of suggested measures to be taken to ease a diplomatic rift with Gulf Arab countries. The proposal were delivered to Lebanon's Prime Minister Najib Mikati and President Michel Aoun during a visit by Kuwaiti Foreign Minister Sheikh Ahmad Nasser Al-Mohammed Al-Sabah, the first to Lebanon by a senior Gulf official since a spat erupted last year.

The visit, coordinated with Gulf Arab states, is part of wider efforts to restore trust between Lebanon and its Gulf Arab neighbors as the country grapples with an unprecedented financial crisis. A list "of ideas and suggestions was presented yesterday and mentioned again today to the president", Sheikh Ahmad told reporters yesterday after meeting with Aoun. "We are now waiting for a response from them on these suggestions," he added, refusing to elaborate on the proposed steps.

Lebanon's Foreign Minister Abdallah Bou Habib will visit Kuwait at the end of the month, Sheikh Ahmad said. Mikati was also invited to visit Kuwait, he added, without specifying a date.

UAE bans drones for a month; US navy stops ship from Iran

ABU DHABI/MANAMA/CAIRO: The United Arab Emirates has banned the use of drones for one month, days after Yemen's Houthi rebels launched a deadly drone and missile attack on Abu Dhabi. "The Ministry of Interior is currently stopping all flying operations for owners, practitioners and enthusiasts of drones, including drones and light sports aircraft," the official WAM news agency reported late Saturday. "Anyone performing these activities during that period and disregarding guidelines will be sub-ject to legal liabilities," it added, reporting the ban would last for one month.

Without mentioning the recent deadly attack, the ministry said the order was made after "misuse spotted recently" where users were "trespassing into areas where these types of activities are prohibited". Those who need to fly drones for work must ask the authorities for the "necessary exceptions and permits", it added.

Last Monday, Houthi rebels claimed a drone and missile attack that struck oil facilities and the airport in the UAE capital Abu Dhabi, killing three people and wounding six. The UAE is part of a Saudi-led military coalition that supports Yemen's government against the Iran-backed Houthis. The Houthis have carried out repeated cross-border attacks against Saudi Arabia, but the Jan 17 attack was the first acknowledged by the UAE inside its borders and claimed by the Yemeni insurgents.

Crude prices soared to seven-year highs partly because of the Abu Dhabi attacks, which exploded fuel tanks near storage facilities of oil giant ADNOC. The Houthis later warned UAE residents to avoid "vital installations" and told foreign companies to leave the "unsafe" Gulf country.

The Arab League yesterday said the Houthi rebels should be labelled as a "terrorist" group after they attacked the UAE. The pan-Arab bloc, based in the Egyptian capital, said the Houthis should be designated "as a terrorist organization" after the attack. In a statement following an extraordinary meeting, it called the strikes "a flagrant violation of international law... and a real threat to vital civilian installations, energy supplies, and global economic stability," as well as a threat to regional peace and security.

Meanwhile, the US navy said yesterday it had stopped a ship carrying 40 tons of a fertilizer that can be used to make explosives as it travelled from Iran along a route previously used to smuggle weapons to the Houthi rebels.

#MeToo wave in Morocco over 'sex for grades' scandal

RABAT: Female Moroccan university students have broken their silence about professors demanding sexual favors in return for good grades, a scandal that has shaken the higher education system. Testimonies have flooded social media in the style of the #MeToo movement, encouraged by activists in the conservative North African nation where victims of sexual violence often keep quiet.

"I was expelled from university a year ago under the pretext that I had cheated on an exam,' said 24-year-old student Nadia, who declined to give her full name. "The truth is that I had just refused to submit to sexual blackmail from one of my professors." The Hassan I University in Settat, near Casablanca, where she was eventually readmitted, is now embroiled in a scandal involving five professors.

One was sentenced to a two-year prison term this month for demanding sexual favors for good grades, in the first such verdict, while four others are due to face court today.

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LONDON: British minister Nadhim Zahawi vesterday urged a probe into claims by a fellow Conservative MP that she lost her ministerial role because of her 'Muslimness', piling further pressure on the government. Nusrat Ghani, 49, was sacked as a transport minister



in 2020, and told the Sunday Times that a whip said her "Muslimness was raised as an issue" at a meeting in Downing Street. She was also told her "Muslim woman minister status was making colleagues feel uncomfortable", she claimed.

Chief whip Mark Spencer, whose role it is to keep MPs on board with the government's agenda, took the unusual step of identifying himself as the person at the center of the claims, and denied the allegations. "These accusations are completely false and I consider them to be defamatory," he wrote on Twitter. "I have never used those words attributed to me. It is disappointing that when this issue was raised before Ms Ghani declined to refer the matter to the Conservative Party for a formal investigation," he added.

Lebanese president welcomes any move to re-normalize ties with Arab states

Kuwait FM: My visit to Lebanon aims to rebuild confidence

BEIRUT: Lebanese President Michel Aoun yesterday applauded any Arab move aimed at re-establishing the normal relations between Lebanon and the Arab Gulf states. The Lebanese Presidency said in a statement that president Aoun affirmed, during his reception of the visiting Kuwaiti Foreign Minister and Minister of State for Cabinet Affairs Sheikh Dr Ahmad Nasser Al-Mohammad Al-Sabah, Lebanon's unwavering keenness on preserving the highest level of relations with the Arab states. President Aoun expressed gratitude to minister Sheikh Dr Ahmad Nasser for the message he conveyed saying its contents reflected the distinctive relationship between Lebanon and Kuwait, "particularly that the initiative is backed at the Gulf, Arab and international levels." He further indicated that the message relayed by the visiting Kuwaiti foreign minister was designed to rebuild confidence between Lebanon and the Gulf states.

Elaborating, president Aoun affirmed Lebanon's commitment to the implementation of the Taif accord and the ideas forwarded by Sheikh Dr Ahmad to him, indicating that its contents would be examined by the Lebanese leaders to take "an adequate stance." The Taif accord, worked out in the Saudi resort of Taif in the late 90s, was designed to reform the Lebanese Constitution and end 16 years of civil war fares that threatened the country's very existence, inflicted huge destruction particularly in the capital and claimed more than 150,000 lives. Moreover, the Lebanese president affirmed during the meeting with Sheikh Dr Ahmad that the bilateral relations remained solid. asked the minister to relay his greetings to Their Highnesses the Amir and the Crown Prince and Lebanon's gratitude for Kuwait's ongoing stand on Lebanon's side at various difficult times as well as its care for the Lebanese residents in Kuwait. The Lebanese Presidency statement quoted Sheikh Dr Ahmad as saying that he relayed salutes from His Highness the Amir and His Highness the

Crown Prince, noting that his visit to the country coincided with the 60th anniversary of establishing the diplomatic relations and the 30th anniversary of liberating Kuwait, noting Lebanon's support for Kuwait during the aggression.

Rebuilding confidence

Sheikh Dr Ahmad said meanwhile that his visit to Lebanon comes to rebuild measures of trust between Lebanon with regional and foreign states. After a meeting with Speaker of the Lebanese Parliament Nabih Berri, the Kuwaiti



Collective efforts

During a joint press conference with Lebanese counterpart Abdullah Abu Habib on Saturday, Sheikh Dr Ahmad said that his visit is part of collective regional and international efforts contributing the trust-building process. The "threepronged" process, according to the Kuwaiti top diplomat; whose country is currently chairing the Arab ministerial council, includes a message of solidarity with the Lebanese people, in addition to shared desire for the Arab country to bounce back to prominence and regain its "iconic" status."

In order for the aforementioned matters to be attained, inner affairs of Arab countries; especially Gulf ones, should not be interfered with. "Lebanon should not be a platform for verbal or actual aggression against any country," stressed Sheikh Dr Ahmad. In October, Saudi Arabia and its allies suspended diplomatic ties with Lebanon after the airing of comments by then information minister Georges Kordahi criticizing a Saudi-led military intervention in Yemen.

Kuwait recalled its ambassador from Beirut and also asked Beirut's charge d'affaires to leave the country. Last month, Kordahi resigned in a bid to ease the standoff and French President Emmanuel Macron said Paris and Riyadh had agreed to fully engage to restore diplomatic ties. But tensions have persisted, mainly over the powerful Lebanese Shiite movement Hezbollah, which is backed by Saudi's archrival Iran. Earlier this month, Saudi Arabia's ambassador to Beirut called on Lebanese political parties to "end Hezbollah's terrorist hegemony over every aspect of the state".

Sheikh Ahmad affirmed Gulf states' aspirations not to see Lebanon turning into a "platform for any kind of offensive". Emerging from the meeting with Aoun at Baabda Palace, Sheikh Ahmad said he conveyed greetings from Their Highnesses the Amir and the Crown Prince to the Lebanese leadership. The minister also conveyed messages from Arab and foreign states for rebuilding confidence in the country.

Interior Minister sets new 'stricter' controls for home search, arrests

Night search banned; policewomen for homes with families

KUWAIT: Interior Minister Sheikh Ahmad Al-Mansour Al-Sabah released a new order yesterday setting new controls that police must abide by when raiding homes based on arrest or search warrants. The new decision sets "stricter controls to protect the dignity of those against whom the arrest or search warrants are issued" and ensure that operations are carried out within the framework of the law, the ministry said in a statement. Among the new controls is banning police from searching homes at night and making sure that police "adhere to professionalism and decency while implementing the law strictly", according to the ministry statement.

"Deputy Premier and Interior Minister Sheikh Ahmad Mansour Al-Ahmad Al-Sabah issued a circular to all members of the police force in which he introduced more disciplined mechanisms in implementing orders to enter residential places, ensuring the execution of police duties within limits that safeguard the rights and dignity of those ordered arrested or inspected," the Interior Ministry's Department of Relations and Security Information said in a press statement. The rules that police must follow are:

1- Adhering to rules of law and orders issued to them by the concerned authorities based on legal rules and procedures.

2- Introduce themselves and state the purpose of their operation to the individuals concerned, and explain their duty and its legal justification.

3- Be professional, disciplined, ethical and behave with tactfulness, coupled with decisiveness without

abuse of authority, and adhere to law and order while preserving public and private property.

4- Maintaining the reputation and dignity of the job and customs and traditions of the society, while respecting human dignity and preserving public and private liberties and human rights.

5- Avoid committing any inhumane and insulting acts and other means of harsh treatment or speaking in an indecent language.

6- Pay attention to the elderly, women, children, disabled and victimized persons, and respond to SOS and help calls.

7- Refrain from using force unless when absolutely necessary and avoid resorting to using firearms except according to the law and after taking all precautions and exhausting all other means.

8- Escort policewomen if the place of the operation has families with women and children.

9- Execute duties as required without overstepping personal, time or place limits in a way that does not affect the interest of inspection, arrest or duties they are asked to carry out.

10- Adhere to legally-set procedural rules, especially the following:

• Women must be searched by a woman asked to do that with knowledge of the investigator, while witnesses of the search must be women too.

• Inspection of homes must be during the day and after permission from the occupants. Homes should not be entered at night or without permission unless the investigator finds it urgent.

• If there are women in the residence and the purpose of entry is not to arrest or search them, tra-

ditions must be observed in dealing with them and the person carrying out the search must allow them to cover up or leave the residence, and offer them the necessary facilities to do that in a way that does not affect the purpose of the search, their duty and its results

KUWAIT: As part of its social responsibility, the Kuwaiti Ministry of Defense launched yesterday a blood donation campaign under the slogan 'My Blood for Kuwait'. In a statement to the press, Kuwait Army Director of Morale Guidance and Public Relations Colonel Mohammad Al-Awadhi said that this weeklong campaign comes from its belief in the importance of blood donation, and the army's social responsibility. "This campaign comes as part of several previous campaigns organized by the Ministry of Defense, that aim to provide support for Kuwait Central Blood Bank," said Awadhi. Awadhi expressed his appreciation to the Ministry of Health for its efforts, as there are more than 150-200 persons daily donating blood depending on the bank's needs. — KUNA

KUFPEC makes gas condensate find in offshore Indonesia

KUWAIT: Kuwait Foreign Petroleum Exploration Company (KUFPEC) unveiled yesterday a significant gas condensate find in offshore Indonesia, hailing the discovery as a step towards the fulfillment of the company's 2040 strategy. The discovery was made through "the successful drilling of the Anambas-2X well in 288 feet (88 meters) of water," read a company statement, saving the find was the "first of its kind" at an offshore block. On what lies ahead in the wake of the discovery, the company said it would carry out tests to determine the well's production capacity, which may result in "greater condensate output," added the statement. The discovery is a testament to KUFPEC's "exceptional capabilities" in the field of gas condensate discovery, the statement quoted the company's CEO Sheikh Nawaf Al-Sabah as saying, praising the "competence of KUFPEC teams towards bringing the find to fruition". — KUNA

Panel to investigate container smuggling

National Assembly won't have isolation room for infected MPs

Parliament adjourns session over lack of quorum

KUWAIT: The Secretariat of Kuwait National Assembly decided vesterday that the parliament will have no isolation room for MPs infected with coronavirus (COVID-19) in the coming parliamentary sessions. The decision is based on the recommendations of the Ministry of Health, according to a post on the Secretariat's Twitter account. It displayed messages exchanged in their regard between National Assembly Speaker Marzouq Al-Ghanem and Minister of Health Dr Khaled Al-Saeed. On Wednesday, Ghanem, responding to a request from some MPs, sought medical advice from the minister who is entitled to take exceptional measures to protect the country from the outbreak of pandemic pursuant to Article 15 of Act 8 (1969) on health precautions.

Speaker Ghanem had yesterday adjourned a scheduled session due to lack of quorum after the Cabinet members failed to attend. The session was scheduled to take place upon parliamentary request in order to look into amendments to nationalitybearing articles in the judicial law. Also yesterday, a meeting between National Assembly Speaker Marzouq Al-Ghanem, His Highness the Prime Minister Sheikh Sabah Al-Khaled Al-Hamad Al-Sabah and Chairman of the Supreme Judicial Council and the Court of Cassation Justice Ahmad Al-Ajeel was held at Bayan Palace. The meeting took place at the behest of His Highness the Amir Sheikh . Nawaf Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah. — KUNA

Indian Embassy holds symposium on **'Combating COVID-19 Variants'**

KUWAIT: Vaccination is a critical tool to tame COVID-19 strains, a panel of eminent doctors said on Saturday during a symposium on 'Combating COVID-19 Variants' organized by the Indian Embassy in association with the Indian Doctors Forum (IDF).

Panelists comprising Dr Arijit Chattopadhyay, Dr Saroj Bala Grover, Dr Varkey Alexander and Dr Shanthi Alexander presented diverse aspects of the pandemic and answered questions from the public. Dr P Shankar Narayanan Menon moderated the symposium while IDF president Amir Ahmed intro-

Up-to-date

During the presentation, Dr Grover sounded an optimistic note. "Fortunately, Kuwait is in an advantageous position today to face the challenges posed by Omicron or other new variants, as its population is largely 'up-to-date' with the vaccines and more than 75 percent of the people have taken at least two doses of vaccines. There is light at the end of the tunnel, so hang on," she concluded.

While discussing the critical issues involved in the management of COVID-19 in the light of the Omicron variant, Dr Chattopadhyay said: "In the evaluation of multiple variants, Omicron has emerged as the most dominant strain today. All over the world, it is a variant of both concern and interest. Although it spreads fast, the variant has a short mutation period and a short contagion period." He added "among vaccinated people, the impact of the virus will be less severe," quoting data from Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) in the US.

Dr Varkey Alexander said vaccination is an effective means to combat the virus, adding that Omicron will be mild on vaccinated people. While talking about COVID patients in isolation, Dr Alexander said: "They need good care and treatment. Their oxygen saturation level needs to be constantly monitored to make sure that they do not need hospitalization, particularly people with significant comorbidities. Dr Shanthi Alexander voiced concern over the recent spike in COVID-19 cases among children in Kuwait. She pointed out that school-going children are undergoing tremendous mental stress in this time of the pandemic. "It is imperative on the part of the parent community, teachers and school managements to ease the psychological stress and tension

on our children," she added.

Earlier, Indian Ambassador Sibi George inaugurated the symposium. In his address, he spoke about the India-Kuwait partnership in the fight against COVID-19 pandemic, and highlighted the importance of adherence to COVID-19 guidelines by each and every Indian national in Kuwait. "I urge all members of the Indian community in Kuwait to strictly follow the COVID-19 guidelines set by the Kuwait government. We in the embassy will organize all our events only virtually until the situation improves," he said. The ambassador thanked IDF for being at the forefront of the fight against the pandemic in Kuwait. The panel discussion by experts generated a tremendous response, with hundreds of people from different walks of life in Kuwait participating virtually.

KUWAIT: Minister of Finance and Minister of Economic Affairs and Investment Abdulwahab Al-Rasheed issued a decision yesterday to form a committee for investigating the smuggling of a container from the General Administration of Customs without inspection, in addition to financial and administrative violations in customs affairs. The finance ministry said in a press statement that the committee was formed, headed by an advisor in Fatwa and Legislation, professor with a membership of law and a member of Lawyers Association.

20 kg narcotics found

KUWAIT: Air cargo customs officers foiled an attempt to smuggle 20 kilograms of narcotics hidden in a courier parcel, the General Administration of Customs announced yesterday. The customs officers found the Lyrica powder in the parcel that arrived from China via express mail, the administration said in a statement, noting that further legal action will be taken.

4,347 new cases

KUWAIT: Kuwait yesterday said 4,347 more people tested positive for COVID-19 over the past 24 hours, taking the country's caseload to 497,454. Some 4,334 more people recovered from the virus to up the number of those to have overcome the disease to 450,462, according to ministry spokesman Dr Abdullah Al-Sanad, adding that the recovery to positive case ratio stands at 90.6 percent. One fatality linked to the virus upped the country's death toll from the pandemic to 2,486, while 377 people are hospitalized with the virus, 61 of whom need intensive care, he told the press. Some 26,294 swab tests were conducted over the last day, out of a total of 6,660,408 so far, added the spokesman.

Medical prescriptions

KUWAIT: Minister of Health Dr Khaled Al-Saeed approved new regulations for organizing medical prescriptions adhering to the highest safety international standards, in addition to the usage and registration of medical devices and products in the country, said Assistant Undersecretary for Drug and Food Control at the Ministry of Health Dr Abdullah Al-Bader. He added that the new regulations would ensure that patients seeking medicine, prescribed by doctors, could now attain products using the commercial brand or scientific term and they also have the right to know the content of the medicine and whether there were alternatives to said medication.

Kuwait rejects terrorism, supports measures against it

CAIRO: Kuwait reiterated yesterday its rejection of terrorism in all its forms and its support for the UAE as well as all the measures it takes to confront terrorism and maintain its security. This was in a speech by the Permanent Representative of Kuwait to the League of Arab States (LAS) Ambassador Ahmad Al-Bakr, President of the 156th Ordinary Session of the Arab League Council, before the Extraordinary Session of the Council at the level of permanent delegates, to discuss the terrorist incidents that UAE was exposed to as a result of the Houthi terrorist militia targeting civilian facilities in Abu Dhabi. In this context, Bakr confirmed that Kuwait welcomed the statement issued unanimously by the UN Security Council last Friday, in which it condemned the attacks of this terrorist militia on facilities in UAE.

Kuwait urged the international community, also the Security Council to continue to assume its responsibility to maintain international peace and security, to put an end to the aggressive practices of the Houthi militia, as well as to stop its missile and drone attacks against Saudi Arabia along with the UAE, he explained. Kuwait renews its call to the Security Council to redouble its efforts to pressure the Houthi militia to respond to calls for a ceasefire and positive interaction with the efforts of the UN along with its envoy to Yemen, he noted. This paves the way for the resumption of political consultations between the Yemeni parties to reach the desired political solution in accordance with the three agreed references - the GCC Initiative, the outcomes of the national dialogue and Security Council Resolution No 2216, he said.

In his speech, Bakr underlined that Kuwait reiterates its strong condemnation as well as its denunciation of targeting civilian areas in the UAE with drones and guided missiles launched by the Houthi militia. The continued targeting of civilians by this militia, their insistence on violating the rules of international humanitarian law, plus their deliberate harm to the security and stability of the countries of the region confirms the seriousness of this militia's behavior and its lack of respect for all humanitarian laws as well as values, he underscored. - KUNA

"At least 84 IS members and 45 Kurdish fighters, including internal security forces, prison guards and counter-terrorism forces, have been killed" inside and outside the prison since the start of the attack, the Observatory said.

Seven civilians have also died in the fighting in the northeastern city, it added. The battles continued yesterday as the Kurdish-led Syrian Democratic Forces (SDF), backed by coalition strikes, closed in on jihadist targets inside and outside the facility. The SDF said in a statement its forces sealed off the area around the jail and that "IS fighters located within the gates of the prison

Burkina soldiers mutiny over anti jihadist strategy

OUAGADOUGOU: Soldiers in Burkina Faso staged mutinies at several barracks to demand the sacking of the country's military top brass and allocation of more resources to a seven-year battle against Islamist insurgents.

Gunfire was reported yesterday morning at several army bases, prompting fears of yet another coup in a volatile west African country prone to military takeovers. Meanwhile, demonstrators protesting over the government's handling of the jihadist threat set fire to the headquarters of the ruling party.

But the government quickly denied rumours of a putsch and a list of demands presented by the rebellious troops made no mention of trying to oust President Roch Christian Kabore, while emphasizing the need for a better anti-jihadist strategy.

"We want adequate resources for the battle" against Islamist extremists, a soldier from the Sangoule Lamizana base in Ouagadougou, one of those involved in the revolt, said in a voice recording received by AFP. The disaffected soldiers also wanted top generals to be "replaced", better care for injured troops and more support for the families of soldiers killed in battle, the spokesman for the mutinous troops added in the anonymous recording.

The unrest comes a little over a week after 12 people, including a senior army officer, were arrested on suspicion of planning to "destabilise" Burkina's institutions. It also comes a day after police used tear gas to disperse banned rallies, arresting dozens.

'Information on social media would have people believe there was an army takeover," government spokesman Alkassoum Maiga said in a statement.

"The government, while acknowledging that there was gunfire in some barracks, denies this information and calls on the public to remain calm." Defence Minister General Barthelemy Simpore said on nationwide TV that "none of the Republic's institutions has been troubled" by the revolt. —AFP

Cameroon govt says 16 killed in nightclub fire

YAOUNDE: Cameroon's government said yesterday that 16 people were killed in a fire caused by fireworks in a nightclub in the capital Yaounde, the tragedy occurring as the nation hosts the Africa Cup of Nations football tournament.

"The initial report shows 16 dead and eight seriously injured" after the "accidental fire" broke out Saturday night, the communications ministry said in a statement. The fire engulfed the main room of Liv's Night Club in the capital's upmarket Bastos district, home to embassies and diplomat residences.

"The tragedy, which was caused by explosions from the fireworks often used in these places, first consumed the building's ceiling, resulting in two very loud explosions, causing panic and a stampede," the ministry said. "When we arrived it was a panic, there was a strong fire with lots of smoke," an official with the firefighters told AFP on condition of anonymity. "We counted 16 dead and five injured," the official added. A security guard present for the fire said that "it happened very quickly". "It was a little after 2:00 am and most customers arrive around 3:00 am... there are many victims," the security guard said.

There were some burnt objects out the front of the club that suggested a fire, but the building's facade was not destroyed or charred, an AFP journalist said. Cameroon is hosting the AFCON tournament despite regular violence in the country's west, where English-speaking militants declared independence from the majority French-speaking country in 2017.

A video it released on Amaq purported to show IS fighters carrying the group's black flag as they launched the attack on the facility and surrounded

what appears to be a group of prison guards. A second video released Saturday showed nearly 25 men whom IS said it had abducted as part of the attack, including some dressed in military fatigues.

AFP could not independently verify the authenticity of the footage. Commenting on the video, the SDF said the captives were "kitchen staff" from the jail. "Our forces lost contact with them during the first attack," it said in a statement, without elaborating. The Kurdish authorities have long warned they do not have the capacity to hold, let alone put on trial, the thousands of IS fighters captured in years of operations.

According to Kurdish authorities, more than 50 nationalities are represented in a number of Kurdish-run prisons, where over 12,000 IS suspects are now being held. Many of the IS prisoners' countries of origins have been reluctant to repatriate them, fearing a public backlash at home. — AFP

Both the separatists and government forces have been accused of atrocities in the fighting, which has claimed more than 3,000 lives and forced over 700,000 to flee their homes. Around 100 people gathered outside the morgue of the military hospital in Yaounde's Ekounou neighbourhood, hoping to find out news of relatives.

"I don't have any information. I woke up this morning and they told me that my 38-year-old son is dead," said one woman, who gave her name as Fidele. "I was waiting for my brother and his friends yesterday evening, but they didn't arrive. And at around 7:00 am, I received a lot of phone calls asking whether my brother was dead or alive. So I came to the morgue and I identified his body," said her daughter, Claude. "I've lost my little brother," said Stephane Hamza, 38.

"He was a good, kind boy who has been working in this club for about two months. When I heard about the explosion, I came to the morgue where I was told he was dead." In Douala, the economic capital in the south of the country, at least five discos have been partially or completely burned down in accidental fires over the past six years. —AFP

PARIS: Veteran French far-right politician Marine Pen by 57-43 percent and against Pecresse by a Le Pen shrugged off another defection from her party to rival Eric Zemmour yesterday amid an increasingly bitter battle ahead of presidential elections in April.

Riviere and senior party official Damien Rieu. "I don't pay much

attention to all these little manoeuvres between politicians because all of my energies are directed towards the issues of French people," Le Pen told France 3 television vesterday. A new poll published on Saturday

showed President Emmanuel Macron winning the first round of the election on April 10 with 25 percent, followed by Le Pen and right-winger Valerie Pecresse from the Republicans party on 15.5 percent each. The poll by the Ipsos-Sopra Steria group, with a large sample size of 12,500 people, showed Zemmour trailing in fourth place on 13 percent. The top two candidates in the first round go through to a run-off, where Macron was seen winning against Le



Both had been expelled from the United States along with more than 71,000 other asylum seekers after thenpresident Donald Trump in January 2019 issued an order-known as the Migrant Protection Protocols, or MPP-forcing them to wait in Mexico while their US applications are processed.

Most of those deported returned to their home countries, but thousands remained at the border. Alvarado had left Nicaragua, where he was a military nurse, after being persecuted for political reasons, he said, while Espana said that she fled Guatemala after receiving death threats from a criminal group.

The cheerful young Nicaraguan said he had to persuade Espana that he was not "playing with her." She took some convincing. "I came with much fear, with much fear of people, with distrust," admitted 26-yearold Espana. It took time, added Alvarado, but "we bonded and got to know each other better.'

Eventually they moved in together, turning a space in a warehouse into their home. And there it was that Espana gave birth to their daughter, Danna, now one year old.

An anxious wait

Once in the White House, Joe Biden ended the MPP, allowing more than 13,000 migrants to enter the United States legally between February and August 2021. The move was supported by the UN High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR).

But when the case reached the US Supreme Court, Biden was ordered to restore the MPP. The program, widely denounced abroad, resumed in December, indefinitely halting the legal entry of asylum applicants

Espana and Alvarado are now among nearly 3,000 applicants who have registered for asylum but remain blocked in Mexico by the high court ruling. Alvarado had been on the point of entering the country but held back, urged by a UNHCR advisor to wait three weeks in order for Espana and Danna to accompany him.

But that never happened. With their applications bogged down in a huge backlog of paperwork, the young couple grew increasingly concerned. "Unfortunately," said Alvarado, "the United States does not open its doors to let us even see what our status is."

In the shelter, other migrants deported since 2019 are also still waiting. One of them is Santos Felipe Salmeron, 44, who after fleeing gang violence in El Salvador and being deported to Mexico was kidnapped-and missed his asylum hearing. The traumatic memory still brings him to tears.

'A blessing'

None of the three migrants has been able to find their file on the relevant US government website since the MPP was reinstated. More than 190,000 undocumented migrants were counted in Mexico through the first nine months of 2021, triple the 2020 level.

But amid all the uncertainty, love can provide a balm. This week, Espana and Alvarado shared their happiness with other migrants at a festive barbecue marking the arrival of their official marriage certificate, following a civil ceremony on January 6.

Alvarado's wife and daughter now give him reason to hold on to his American dream. "I always said, 'I'm coming alone.' But now I have two women," he said proudly. For an emotional Espana, her husband and especially Danna are "a blessing." --- AFP

Shootings early test for NY cop turned mayor

NEW YORK: Gun violence has rocked the first three weeks of Eric Adams' tenure as New York mayor, piling pressure on the former cop to deliver on his promise to improve public safety in America's largest city. A shooting in the neighborhood of Harlem Friday left one police officer dead and another in critical condition.

It was the latest flashpoint of the Democratic mayor's nascent rule, in which he has yet to present a comprehensive plan to rein in the crime he has decried. "It is our city against the killers," said Adams, a retired police captain, on Friday night at Harlem Hospital, where the officers-who had been responding to a domestic disturbance-were taken following the incident.

The recent shootings also include a shocking incident in which an 11-monthold girl was hit in the cheek by a stray bullet in the Bronx as she was in a parked car with her mother. They are seen as part

Thai PM to visit Saudi Arabia since gem theft soured ties

BANGKOK: Prime Minister Prayut Chan-O-cha will this week make the first visit by a Thai leader to Saudi Arabia in more than 30 years following decades of diplomatic tension sparked by a jewel theft from a Saudi palace. Thai-born janitor Kriangkrai Techamong stole \$20 million worth of supplies to jab 45 percent of the population in the poorest 91 economies. But the WHO wants 70 percent fully jabbed in every country by July to end the acute phase of the pandemic — a much bigger stretch, given how far behind many countries are, especially in Africa, where more than 85 percent of people are yet to receive a single dose.

At the current pace of vaccine roll-out, 109 countries will miss the mid-2022 target, the WHO has said.

'Back on track'

Covax was launched in June 2020, when few would have imagined that several highly effective vaccines would emerge within nine months. Historically, the vast majority of potential vaccines fail.

"The last mile is going to be the major challenge for 2022," he told a World Economic Forum session.

Former premier Berlusconi pulls out of Italian presidential race

Withdrawing in the spirit of 'national responsibility', to avoid further controversy

ROME: Billionaire former premier Silvio Berlusconi withdrew from the race for Italy's presidency on Saturday, two days before voting starts, but repeated his opposition to Prime Minister Mario Draghi taking the job. The 85-year-old media mogul, who is still embroiled in legal proceedings over his infamous "Bunga Bunga" sex parties, insisted he had the support in parliament to win-something analysts doubted.

But in a statement issued to the media, he said he

was withdrawing in the spirit of "national responsibility", to avoid further controversy. Draghi, a former European Central Bank chief who has led Italy's coalition government for the past year, remains the favourite to be elected head of state next week.

The governing parties, which range from left to

right, including Berlusconi's Forza Italia, have however yet to reach a deal-and with voting secret, the result is notoriously hard to predict. More than 1,000 MPs, senators and regional representatives will begin voting today, with several rounds-each taking a day-expected before a result. Indicating he hopes to play the kingmaker, Berlusconi said he would work with his right-wing allies to agree a candidate that can summon a "broad consensus"but made clear it should not be Draghi.

He said the premier should stay to help implement structural reforms promised in return for almost 200 billion euros in European Union funds, on which Italy is relying for its post-virus recovery. "I consider it necessary for the Draghi government to complete its work until the end of the legislature," in 2023, when the next general election is due, Berlusconi said.

Many analysts also worry Draghi's departure would spark a crisis in the government and that debt-laden Italy would slip

behind on a tight schedule to implement reforms to the tax and justice systems and public administration.

However, others say Draghi would be better placed as president to ensure political stability and good relations with Brussels-particularly should the far-right win the next general election.

While a largely ceremonial role, the president wields considerable power in times of political crises, from dissolving parliament to picking new prime ministers and denying mandates to fragile coalitions.

Berlusconi announced his decision at a virtual meeting with Matteo Salvini of the anti-immigration League party and Giorgia Meloni of the far-right Brothers of Italy. He noted the ongoing coronavirus pandemic, saying: "Today, Italy needs unity.... I will continue to serve my country in other ways."

Salvini praised his "generous" decision which he

said enabled them to propose candidates "without any more vetoes from the left". Enrico Letta, leader of the centre-left Democratic Party, said the withdrawal had exposed a split in the right over Berlusconi's candidacy, adding: "Now we need a

high-level agreement over a shared name and a legislative pact."

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In the first three rounds, the winning candidate must secure two-thirds of the vote. From the fourth round, they only need an absolute majority. —AFP

Portugal begins early voting in snap election

LISBON: Early voting began in Portugal yesterday for a snap general election, with polls showing the incumbent Socialists still ahead though with their lead over the nearest centre-right rivals narrowing. Over 300,000 voters have signed up to vote a week early, with polls opening at 8:00 am (0800 GMT).

The early voting option was provided this year to reduce crowding on election day, next Sunday, due to the pandemic. "I preferred to vote today as today I'm fine-next Sunday, I don't know," proffered one early voter, Elisa Fialho, a woman in her 70s who turned out to cast her ballot with her husband in the capital Lisbon. Prime Minister Antonio Costa, who has led two consecutive minority Socialist governments since 2015, was expected to cast his ballot in the northern city of Porto at around 0930 GMT. "All the conditions are there for everybody to go out and vote in security," said Costa after voting. The snap polls were called after Costa failed to secure support for his 2022 budget from the two smaller far-left parties that had been propping up his government. It was the first time a budget was voted down since the EU member returned to democracy in 1974. The Socialists have around 38 percent support, compared with just over 30 percent for the main opposition centre-right PSD, which would leave Costa once again without a working majority in parliament, according to a poll of polls compiled by private Radio Renascenca. But surveys carried out in recent days have shown the gap narrowing, with at least one putting the two parties in a statistical tie when the margin of error is taken into account. The election could see gains for the upstart far-right party Chega, which entered parliament for the first time with a single seat during the last election in 2019. Polls give it nearly seven percent support, which would make it the thirdbiggest force in parliament.

French soldier killed in Mali, mulls pull-out

PARIS: A French soldier has died in Mali, the French defence ministry announced yesterday, with the latest loss coming as Paris wonders whether to stop providing military backup to the junta-run West African country.

The new death brings to 53 the total number of combat deaths suffered by French forces since they first deployed troops to Mali nine years ago to fight an insurgency by Islamic extremists.

The soldier was killed in a salvo of around a dozen artillery rounds that were fired on Saturday at a military base in Gao in the volatile and poverty-wracked Sahel region, a statement from the defence ministry said.

Nine others were injured by the rounds, which were launched five to six kilometres (3-4 miles) to the northest in an area known to be used by the Qaeda-linked GSIM Islamist insurLISBON: A woman casts her ballot at a polling station in Porto yesterday, on an early polling day ahead of the January 30 election day. —AFP

Lab monkeys found, killed after fleeing US road crash

DANVILLE, Pennsylvania: Three monkeys have been found and killed after a truck carrying 100 primates to a laboratory crashed, allowing them to escape and triggering a police hunt. The vehicle turned in front of an oncoming dump truck near Danville, Pennsylvania, on Friday en route to a lab in Florida.

Police said on Twitter Friday that "a small number of monkeys may have fled the crash scene into the surrounding area." By Saturday night, police said all 100 monkeys had been accounted for. Local news site WNEP reported that the escaped monkeys were euthanized, citing the US Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

The CDC told WNEP the monkeys landed Friday in New York and were originally from Mauritius. It was previously believed that four monkeys were missing after the crash. WNEP said a police helicopter with thermal cameras was used to track down the cynomolgus monkeys, while officers on the ground used powerful flashlights.

Pennsylvania State Police released an image of one primate perched in a tree off Route 54. Cynomolgus monkeys-also known as long-tailed macaques-have recently been in demand for research into vaccines against viruses. —AFP International

Turkish Cypriots vote under shadow of economic crisis

Lack of interest in the poll among the roughly 204,000 voters

NICOSIA: Turkish Cypriots cast their ballots yesterday in a snap legislative election in the breakaway northern third of the Mediterranean island after a campaign dominated by an economic crisis.

The self-proclaimed Turkish Republic of Northern Cyprus (TRNC) — recognised only by Ankara-has been hit hard by the COVID pandemic and the plummeting value of the Turkish lira. Analysts said there has been a lack of interest in the poll among the roughly 204,000 voters mainly concerned with health, safety and economic welfare.

"Compared to the previous elections in northern Cyprus, there is much less energy and enthusiasm in the air," political scientists Ahmet Sozen and Devrim Sahin wrote on the website of Italian think tank ISPI.

Cyprus has been split since 1974 when Turkish forces occupied the northern part of the island in response to a military coup sponsored by the junta in power in Greece at the time. Unlike in previous TRNC elections, campaigning this time has focused on the territory's economic woes rather than any talk of a solution to the problem.

Setback

Hopes of resolving the intractable dispute suffered a setback when right-wing nationalist Ersin Tatar pulled off a surprise, narrow win over prounification candidate Mustafa Akinci in the TRNC's 2020 presidential election.

Tatar, a close ally of Turkish President Recep Tayyip Erdogan, has pressed for recognition and

insisted on a two-state solution at UN-brokered talks on ending the division. His stance was flatly rejected by the majority Greek-speaking Republic of Cyprus, a European Union member with effective control over the southern twothirds of the island.

The Erdogan administration was accused of interference in the TRNC's 2020 presidential election, sparking resentment among many Turkish Cypriots. This time, however, "there is no need for Turkey's government to play an active role to change the course of the election", Sozen and Sahin wrote. Instead, it is Erdogan's handling of the Turkish economy, on which the TRNC heavily relies, that has emerged as the primary issue in the poll.

A sickle used to harvest rice was found at the crime scene along with a pair of shoes, local media reported. A 50-year-old British man — who had lived in Thailand for five years with his Thai wife — was found dead lying in a pool of blood.

His 54-year-old friend was seriously injured in the attack, police commander of western provinces Thanayut Wuthijarasthamrong said.

"The other Briton is now safe and under care of doctors," Thanayut told AFP, adding the police investigation was ongoing.

The alleged attacker, a man aged 22, had a history of mental illness, local media reported. He is facing murder and attempted murder charges and had made an early guilty plea, police said.

The United Kingdom foreign office said it is in contact with the Royal Thai police and the British embassy in Bangkok was ready to provide consular support. —AFP

S Korea pays Iran's UN dues with frozen assets

SEOUL: South Korea has used \$18 million of frozen Iranian assets to pay Tehran's dues to the UN, Seoul said yesterday, in a move to immediately restore the country's voting rights.

The payment was made Friday in cooperation with the United States and the UN after Iran made an "emergency request" asking South Korea to pay the dues, Seoul's finance ministry said in a statement.

Iran has more than \$7 billion in funds for oil shipments frozen at two South Korean banks due to US sanctions. "Iran's voting right at the UN General Assembly is expected to be immediately restored with the payment," the ministry said.

Tehran's mission to the UN told AFP the payment had been "completed". The Islamic republic was South Korea's third-largest Middle Eastern trade partner before the United States unilaterally withdrew from a 2015 nuclear deal between Tehran and world powers and reimposed crippling sanctions

The UN cited unpaid dues when it suspended Iran's voting rights at the General Assembly earlier this month. Under the UN charter, a member country's right to vote is suspended when its arrears equal or exceed the dues it should have paid over the preceding two years.

Iran also lost its vote over unpaid dues last year. It said it could not pay even the minimum amount because of US economic sanctions. -AFP

East Timor Nobel laureate Ramos-Horta to run for president

DILI, East Timor: Former East Timor President Jose Ramos-Horta yesterday announced he would run for the top job again in the upcoming election, a decade after the end of his first term.

The 72-year-old was a critical figure in East Timor's independence struggle, winning the Nobel Peace Prize in 1996 along with Carlos Filipe Ximines Belo.

The presidential election will be held on March 19, with the winner taking office on May 20, the day East Timor celebrates its 20th anniversary of independence from Indonesia.

Ramos-Horta's candidacy was announced at a meeting held by the National Congress of the Reconstruction of Timor-Leste (CNRT), a political party led by the charismatic former president Xanana Gusmao. "I am carrying out what has been entrusted to me by CNRT party and the people of East Timor to run in the 2022-2027 presidential election," Horta said after the congress

Gusmao added: "Let's together support Horta to the presidential palace." Ramos-Horta served as the president of Southeast Asia's youngest country from 2007 to 2012 and as prime minister from 2006 to 2007.

He will go against several other candidates including the outgoing president Francisco "Lu-Olo" Guterres and former Catholic priest Martinho Germano da Silva Gusmao.

Dozens of Indian turtles die in suspected poisoning

NEW DELHI: Deliberate poisoning is likely to blame for the death of dozens of turtles at a lake near Mumbai, Indian wildlife experts told AFP

'Heating or eating': Britons struggle with rising costs

British annual inflation hit a 30-year high of 5.4% in December

COLCHESTER, UK: Nestled amid superstores at a retail park, the Colchester Foodbank in eastern England last year gave out a total of 165 tons of food-enough to feed 17,000 people.

But that could be surpassed this year, as British annual inflation hits a 30-year high of 5.4 percent in December, as real wages fall, and food and energy costs rise. "We think we're likely to feed 20,000 people in 2022," said foodbank manager Mike Beckett. "If there is a slowdown, and things get worse, it might be as many as 25,000 people.

"That is certainly a bit of a nightmare. Our worst case scenario is maybe 30,000 people." About 95 percent of the produce at the foodbank, run by the Trussell Trust charity, comes from members of the public donating at collection points at local supermarkets. But the current economic climate has forced many who wouldn't normally need food parcels to seek assistance.

"I normally put something in the foodbank trolley but now it's my turn to have some help," said Heidi, 45, who said she was struggling with price rises on "just everything". "I'm struggling big time, basically. Bills have got really high, that's why I'm here," she said. Like many in Britain, this winter she will have to make the tough choice between "heating or eating".

"My electricity is going up. I'm putting in probably about &80 (95 euros/110 dollars) a month now, as opposed to 40 or 50 last year," she said.

'Fundamentally flawed'

The Trust says the number of people receiving three days' worth of emergency food from its centers across Britain has risen from some 26,000 in 2009 to over 2.5 million in 2021. British food writer and antipoverty campaigner Jack Monroe noted after the latest inflation rise this week that the actual cost of many food staples has gone up by much more. The

cheapest pasta at her local supermarket a year ago cost $\pounds 0.29$ for 500 grams (around one pound) while today it is $\pounds 0.70$ — a hike of 141 percent. The cheapest rice was $\pounds 0.45$ for one kilogram but now costs $\pounds 1.00$ for 500g.

"That's a 344 percent price increase as it hits the poorest and most vulnerable households," she wrote in a viral Twitter thread read by millions. "The system by which we measure the impact of inflation is fundamentally flawed-it completely ignores the reality and the REAL price rises for people on minimum wages, zero hour contracts, food bank clients, and millions more."

Manager Beckett agrees that "however you measure inflation doesn't really account for the cheap food going up, and it's going up by hundreds of percent." Low-income families are under extra pressure after the government returned welfare benefit payments to pre-pandemic levels, having increased them temporarily during lockdowns. Beckett says that in 2020 — "a bumper year" — 42 percent of the food bank's clients were children. "People come and report that it's taken them 20 minutes or an hour in their car to get up the courage to come in," he said. "They didn't think they'd ever need to, they don't want to use the food bank, but they don't have a choice because they love their kids. "The question is, when things are cold, people have to choose between eating or heating."

Chronic health problems

In a report published this month, the Joseph Rowntree Foundation noted that "for children, severe food insecurity has been linked to chronic health conditions like asthma and depression". A poor diet "will impede a child's physical, cognitive and emotional development. Adults in food-insecure households have higher rate of developing chronic diseases such as arthritis, asthma, diabetes and mental health issues," said the report on UK poverty in 2022.

The anti-poverty charity noted "key design features of the social security system that directly lead to higher food insecurity and have contributed to the rise in food bank use". They include having to wait a minimum of five weeks before getting initial benefit payments such as Universal Credit. Others point to the fact that child benefits are capped at two children. The cost of living in Britain is forecast to soar even higher in April owing to a tax hike and further planned increases of around 50 percent to domestic energy bills. More painful tax increases are expected to foot the vast bill for COVID.

As a result, even more households across Britain will face fuel poverty, spending more than 10 percent of their total income on fuel. "There's a lot of people in this situation who have never been in it before," says foodbank client Heidi. "Everyone should put something in (at collection points). Because you never know when you're going to be in this situation. And I certainly didn't think I'd be in it." — AFP



Forget working from home: Why not live in an old office?

Vacant office space becomes 'adaptive reuse' projects in US

WASHINGTON: Blocks from the White House, an unassuming edifice in downtown Washington that once held offices used by the US Department of Justice is set to be converted into homes for hundreds of people. The transformation of the vacant office space is among a surge of "adaptive reuse" projects that swept the US property market in 2021, where developers bought hotels and offices that were struggling to get business and announced plans to turn them into apartments.

"The market spoke, and it said the value was greater for a conversion than for it continuing as office space," said Michael Abrams, managing director of Foulger-Pratt, the property development firm that is turning the 14-storey building on New York Avenue into 255 apartments.

A survey by apartment listing service RentCafe found about 20,100 apartments were built out of converted properties in the United States last year, almost double the number converted in the year prior. Such conversions could offer a way forward for US downtowns, which haven't been the same since office workers fled as COVID-19 broke out nearly two years ago, leaving landlords and local businesses struggling.

"The slow office market recovery is just going to make it that much more expensive to carry vacant office buildings," Abrams said. Conversions may also play a role in easing a shortage of affordable housing, particularly in cities like Washington, where notoriously high rents are a feature of life.

"From the overall perspective, we just need increased supply. By having more supply, both the home price growth will come down and the rents will come down," said Lawrence Yun, chief economist of the National Association of Realtors.

Even more expensive

Despite the downturn caused by COVID-19, the median price of existing homes climbed 15.8 percent over the course of 2021, and by last month supply had hit an all-time low, according to NAR data, likely exacerbating a crisis of affordable housing that predated the pandemic. As of 2017, 48 percent of tenants were considered "rent burdened" by the US Government Accountability Office-meaning they paid more than 30 percent of their income on rent-a figure that had risen six percentage points over the preceding 16 years.

The United States meanwhile has a glut of offices. With many of them dating to the 1980s, they are now too old to be attractive to companies, said Tracy Hadden Loh, a fellow at Brookings Metro. With their designs centered around outdated needs like space for file cabinets, "Really just the entire building is obsolete," she said in an interview.

Corporate pullout

Marc Ehrlich, chief investment officer at Rose Associates, which has converted New York City offices into housing, said such projects tend to be "well-located properties that need a higher and better use." One of his firm's latest undertakings is the transformation of an office once used by telecommunications firm AT&T into a place people want to live. Lacking amenities like covered parking, the building is unlikely to attract commercial tenants, Ehrlich said. However, the new apartments will feature co-working spaces, since many tenants will likely want to continue working from home, he said. In Washington, developers are pouncing on properties formerly rented by the region's top employer, the federal government. —AFP

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Some in Congress seek to ban US lawmakers from trading stocks

Outlook for a ban looks uncertain, the odds could improve suddenly

WASHINGTON: Capitol Hill has begun to debate whether to ban US lawmakers from trading stocks, but despite some rare bi-partisan unity on the question it is far from settled. Legislation introduced earlier this month by Democratic senators Jon Ossoff of Georgia and Mark Kelly of Arizona would require members of Congress, their spouses and dependent children to place their investments in a blind trust. "Members of Congress should not be playing the stock market while we make federal policy and have extraordinary access to confidential information," Ossoff said.

Republicans are also active on the issue, with Senator Josh Hawley of Missouri introducing similar legislation to Ossoff and Kelly's and House Minority Leader Kevin



Paris outdoor booksellers eager to turn page on COVID

fixture along the banks of the Seine for centuries, are seeing their numbers dwindle after two years of COVID, with stalls going empty thanks to a dearth of local and foreign customers. Tending dark green boxes packed with secondhand works that are often rare or special editions, the dealers enjoy rent-free access but must follow rules set by the city, including a minimum number of days open each week. Vendors like Jean-Pierre Mathias, 74, have become as much a part of the Paris landscape as the nearby Notre-Dame cathedral.

"A lot of times we're just there standing around, you have to be really dedicated to open" when clients are scarce, especially tourists, said Jerome Callais, president of the Bouquinistes association. "Only a fourth of our clients come from the Paris region," he said.

'Part of Paris'

City officials recently launched a call for

candidates to take over 18 empty spots along the Seine, but so far only 25 offers have been submitted, compared with around 60 for a similar number of openings in recent years. "We're looking for literary specialists who can perpetuate the biggest open-air bookstore in the world," deputy mayor Olivia Polski, in charge of local commerce, told AFP.

"But we still have a month to go" before the deadline for offers on February 18, she said. For Callais, who has ferreted out rare gems for clients at his stand across from the Louvre museum for three decades, it's a chance to work "in an extraordinary setting". "Being a bouquiniste is often your last job - you've done other things before. But once you start, you can't stop," he said.

"We're a key symbol of Paris, unique in the world - we've been here for 450 years," he added.

For Mathias, who specializes in psychology works, he and his colleagues fill a niche that has become all the more important after the closure of historic Latin Quarter bookshops like Gibert Jeune in recent years, and the rise of Amazon. Many of his clients are students from the Sorbonne and other universities nearby, because "there aren't any psychology bookstores in Paris anymore". "But there are fewer of them these days - between having to work from home and crimped budgets, it's harder for them as well," he said. - AFP

ella the dog can barely stand after being abused, but she is now receiving care from a Baghdad refuge that hopes to become Iraq's first veterinary clinic for stray animals. The Baghdad Animal Rescue opened around a week ago, and Bella, a nervous fox-like dog who raises her muzzle for strokes while still shaking in fear, seems in caring hands.

We bring them here and treat them," said Sally Faysal, 27, another volunteer. If the animals need more specialized care, they are taken to a veterinarian. "The team members share the cost of the treatment,"

Curtoni wins first ever super-G

CORTINA D'AMPEZZO: Elena Curtoni won her first ever World Cup Super-G event yesterday after topping the times at Cortina D'Ampezzo, as worries grew over Sofia Goggia's Winter Olympics prospects following a second hard crash in as many weeks. Italian Curtoni claimed her second World Cup win after the Bansko downhill in 2020 with a time of one minute, 20.98 seconds, 0.09sec ahead of Austria's Tamara Tipper, to move second in the super-G rankings. Michelle Gisin of Switzerland completed the podium in the Dolomites, 0.24sec off the pace. However Olympic downhill champion Goggia's thumping fall - which comes a week after she crashed out in Zauchensee - has caused concern that she might not make the Winter Games in China, which start on February 4. The Italian Winter Sports Federation (FISI) said that the 29-year-old had suffered a "suspected sprain of her left knee" and will be taken to Milan for more checks yesterday afternoon. -AFP

Thank you for the support from Filipino fans. Now I became a world champion." Magsayo, who is promoted by fellow Filipino Manny Pacquiao and trained by Freddie Roach, improved to 24-0 with 16 knockouts with his upset win. Russell fought with an injured shoulder Saturday which reduced him to a onehanded fighter for the majority of the contest at the Borgata Hotel and Casino in Atlantic City, New Jersey. "I hit him with some good shots in the third round and that is why he got hurt," said Magsayo. --AFP

West Indies thrash England

BRIDGETOWN: Jason Holder did the bulk of the damage as England's latest batting collapse paved the way for West Indies' nine-wicket win in the first Twenty20 international in Bridgetown on Saturday. Towering paceman Holder twice struck with successive deliveries on his Kensington Oval home ground during a format-best return of four for seven as England were dismissed for just 103 following their Ashes woes. West Indies then cruised to a target of 104 with 17 balls to spare, opener Brandon King finishing on 52 not out as the hosts went 1-0 up in this five-match series. It was a heartening result for the West Indies, fresh from a 2-1 one-day international series loss at home to Ireland, and now without veteran opener Chris Gayle after a T20 World Cup where they just one of their five matches. SOUTHAMPTON: Pep Guardiola backed Manchester City to hold their nerve after the Premier League leaders' 12-game winning run came to an end as Aymeric Laporte rescued a 1-1 draw against Southampton on Saturday. City were rocked by Kyle Walker-Peters' first ever top-flight goal in the opening minutes at St Mary's.

After a poor first half by their high standards, Guardiola's side kicked into gear after the break. Spain defender Laporte headed the equalizer, but City could not extend their winning streak in a one-sided finale that saw the visitors lay seige to the Southampton goal. The champions had to settle for a result that left them 12 points clear of second-placed Liverpool, who have two games in hand and face Crystal Palace on Sunday. 'Today we showed the same consistency we have been showing. If people saw in the game that we were lazy or arrogant or trying not to win the game-it was completely the opposite," Guardiola said. For the first time since they were beaten 2-0 by Palace on October 30, City finished a league game without all three points. They remain firmly in pole position for a fourth title in five seasons, but their draw on the south coast will give a glimmer of hope to Liverpool and third-placed Chelsea. Guardiola is unconcerned by the possibility of Liverpool closing the gap. "I feel as a manager confident for the future with the way we are behaving. Without the ball, everybody helps each other. I know how difficult this stadium is, with the way they play and how good we have played," Guardiola said. "I don't understand the way people say that now, after this result, the race is open, when before it is over. But this is your job to talk about that.

"I would love to be 40 points ahead of Liverpool and Chelsea, but that's impossible. I would never expect to be in this position, with this margin." City were rocked in the seventh minute when Walker-Peters linked up with Nathan Redmond on the right flank. Walker-Peters cut inside and, with City backing off, the right-back had space to shoot into the far corner with the outside of his foot. Frustrated by Southampton's high-energy display, City were struggling to find their usual rhythm.



Liverpool keep title hope alive

Arsenal draw blank; Leicester suffer a huge blow

By the time Liverpool take the field again on Premier League duty, they should be bolstered by the return of Mohamed Salah and Sadio Mane from their international duties at the Africa Cup of Nations. The visitors showed no sign of missing their talismen as they blew Palace away in the opening half hour. Virgil van Dijk's towering header from Andy Robertson's corner opened the scoring just eight minutes in. Robertson was the creator again when Alex Oxlade-Chamberlain doubled Liverpool's lead with a calm finish.

However, Palace served warning of what was to come in the second half before the break as Alisson Becker had to make fine saves from Michael Olise and Jean-Philippe Mateta to keep the Eagles at bay. Palace finally got their reward with a brilliant move as Jeffrey Schlupp and Mateta teed up Edouard for a tap-in. Alisson was needed once again to keep his side in the lead and turn Olise's inventive lob behind. But Liverpool's two-goal cushion was restored in controversial circumstances a minute from time when a penalty was given after a lengthy VAR intervention for Vicente Guaita's block on Diogo Jota. Fabinho sent Guaita the wrong way from the spot to seal the points to Klopp's relief.

Gunners misfire

Arsenal failed to bounce back from their League Cup semi-final defeat to Liverpool in midweek as Mikel Arteta's men were frustrated by a Burnley side that had not played a league game since January 2. The Clarets have up to four games in hand on some of their relegation rivals and gave their hopes of survival a huge boost despite remaining bottom of the table. Nick Pope kept the Gunners at bay despite enjoying over 75 percent possession and having 20 shots on goal. Arsenal edge up to sixth but are two points behind fourth-placed Manchester United. Tottenham also have the chance to move into the top four as they traveled to Chelsea yesterday.

Leicester's hopes of European football next season were dealt a huge blow by conceding twice deep into stoppage time to lose to Spurs in midweek. Brendan Rodgers' men were again guilty of giving up a lead as Brighton secured a third consecutive 1-1 draw. Patson Daka fired home on the rebound after Robert Sanchez had saved from Harvey Barnes in the first minute of the second half. But Brighton leveled eight minutes from time when Danny Welbeck headed home Neal Maupay's cross. — AFP

Pumped-up Nadal, home hero Barty book quarters

MELBOURNE: Rafael Nadal survived an epic 28-minute tiebreak to seal his spot in the quarter-finals of the Australian Open and top seed Ashleigh Barty joined him with victory over giant-killer Amanda Anisimova yesterday. Nadal will now face Canada's 14th seed Denis Shapovalov after he stunned third seed and Olympic champion Alexander Zverev - who said "everything" went wrong.

Nadal, who is chasing a men's record 21st Grand Slam title, was pushed all the way by Adrian Mannarino in an 81-minute first set before breaking the Frenchman's resolve in a 7-6 (16/14), 6-2, 6-2 victory. "First set was very emotional," said the 35-year-old Nadal, the 2009 Australian Open champion, who pumped his fists after emerging victorious from a marathon first-set tiebreak on a steamy day in Melbourne. "That crazy first set was so important."

The Spaniard, who dropped a set for the first time in the tournament before powering past Russia's Karen Khachanov in the previous round, will now face Shapovalov in the last eight. The 22-yearold Shapovalov - who caught COVID before the Slam and was not even sure he would play in Melbourne - left Zverev still searching for a first major title after convincingly beating him 6-3, 7-6 (7-5), 6-3. The German smashed his racquet and afterwards failed to find any positives. "Today, in my opinion, was just awful from

my side," he said.

Asked what went wrong by reporters, he replied: "Everything." Flashy French 17th seed Gael Monfils warned that "I'm not quite finished yet" after he surged past Miomir Kecmanovic of Serbia to set up an encounter with Italian seventh seed Matteo Berrettini. The 35-year-old Monfils is yet to drop a set in Melbourne. Bigserving Berrettini sent down 28 aces to blow away Spain's Pablo Carreno Busta in three sets. "He's feeling good, I'm feeling good," he said of his clash with Monfils. "It's going to be a fight."

In the women's draw, home hope and world number one Barty thrilled the crowd by defeating 60th-ranked Anisimova 6-4, 6-3. The Australian faces another American, Jessica Pegula, in the last eight. The 20-year-old Anisimova beat Olympic champion Belinda Bencic and was fresh from knocking out defending champion Naomi Osaka.

But she came up against a Barty who looks in irresistible form as she chases her first Australian Open crown. Reminded that last year's Australian Open went behind closed doors mid-tournament because of COVID, Barty told an adoring Rod Laver Arena crowd that playing in front of them was "a lot more fun". "Last two years have been extraordinarily tough for many people around the world," said the down-to-earth 25-year-old, the reigning Wimbledon champion and a former Roland Garros winner. — AFP

Pieters seals 'fun' Abu Dhabi success

ABU DHABI: Belgium's Thomas Pieters enjoyed a "fun" final round at the Abu Dhabi Championship yesterday to seal his second title in three starts. As India's Shubhankar Sharma rued a missed putt and Rory McIlroy's challenge petered out tamely, Pieters made one birdie and one bogey in an even-par round of 72 to finish on 10-under-par 278. "When you're in control of your ball flight and the golf ball, it's fun. You know, you can be creative and that's how I felt out there today," said Pieters, who turns 30 in four days' time.

Sharma (71) and Spain's Rafael Cabrera Bello (70) tied for second, one shot behind. Overnight leader, Scotland's Scott Jamieson, faded away to share 10th following a 77. Further back in a tie for 12th after creeping into the top five at one point came McIlroy. He signed for a round of 69 after three bogeys in his last five holes. Collin Morikawa, the highest ranked player in the field, trailed in outside the top 50 after a closing 75.

On a day when the Yas Links Golf course was playing tricky because of drying greens and various tucked-up pins, other players kept falling by the wayside as Pieters hit every green in regulation on the front nine, and missed just one fairway on the opening hole. When he made the turn at one-under par courtesy of a birdie on the par-3 eighth hole, he had already lost his nearest challengers. Jamieson made four bogies in his first five holes and Shane Lowry made a triple bogey on the first hole itself. A bogey on the second easiest hole on the golf course - the par-5 11th brought the field close once again, and the lead was down to one shot going down the tough closing stretch.

However, Cabrera Bello made a bogey on the 15th and 16th hole and Sharma on the 17th. That gave Pieters a two-shot advantage on the 18th tee, and he took full advantage of that by laying up with his second and making an easy par. "It's fantastic. I was well in control of my ball all day. The putting maybe wasn't there, but I felt really confident early on," said Pieters. On his second win in such a short time, he added: "I feel like I've turned the corner and playing really good golf. My putting has improved massively and I felt like that's the thing that really kept me going on the weekend.

"I worked with the guys from Titleist last year. They just kind of analysed that my putting was not so good. "They gave me a new putter and now everything has been flowing and I've been making a lot of putts." Sharma, 25, came close to becoming the first Indian winner of a Rolex Series event, but was undone by a missed par putt on the 17th hole. "I am very happy with the way I played today and I am delighted with my finish," said Sharma. — AFP
