# Lawmakers urge premier to embrace reforms package

#### New Cabinet to call for fresh elections

**KUWAIT:** A group of MPs yesterday called on the new Prime Minister Sheikh Ahmad Al-Nawaf Al-Sabah to embrace a package of reforms that includes a list of legislation proposed by experts and youth activists. Sheikh Ahmad was on Sunday named by the Amir to form the new Cabinet following the resignation of the outgoing prime minister

Sheikh Sabah Al-Khaled Al-Sabah over lingering disputes with opposition MPs.

The new Cabinet will supervise a plan to dissolve the National Assembly and call for fresh polls as promised by the Amir a few weeks ago. In a joint statement, MPs also called on all sections of the society to cooperate and coordinate to create a common platform to jointly build the future Kuwait.

The lawmakers also stressed their commitment to

a package of reforms proposed by a parliamentary bloc several months ago which calls for extensive legal, legislative, economic, election and political reforms and urged the new premier to adopt it. A large number of MPs have welcomed the appointment of Sheikh Ahmad, the son of HH the Amir, as the new prime minister and urged him to fight corruption and adopt reforms.

Meanwhile, lawmakers expressed optimism that

the new PM will be able to take Kuwait out of ongoing political disputes that stalled reforms and development and vowed to lend him all cooperation needed. Opposition lawmakers, who were at loggerheads with the outgoing prime minister, were overjoyed by the appointment of Sheikh Ahmad. MP Saud Al-Mutairi expressed the hope that the new head of government will succeed to "build a new

#### Iran, GCC states discuss boosting relations

DUBAI: The Emirati and Iranian foreign ministers have held a telephone conversation and discussed boosting ties, UAE state media reported Wednesday, as the Gulf Arab country considers sending an ambassador back to Tehran. Emirati Foreign Minister Sheikh Abdullah bin Zayed Al-Nahyan and his Iranian counterpart Hossein Amir-Abdollahian discussed ways of "boosting bilateral relations and areas of cooperation for the benefit of both countries", the UAE's state news agency WAM reported.

Sheikh Abdullah "highlighted the UAE's keenness... to enhance the security and stability of the region", WAM added. Iran's foreign ministry said Amir-Abdollahian "welcomed the enhancement of the level of ties between the two countries" as "an important step in the process of developing bilateral relations", in a statement late Tuesday.

It said the Iranian minister also spoke separately with his Omani and Kuwaiti counterparts on Tuesday night. The United Arab Emirates scaled back its ties with the Islamic republic in 2016 after Iranian protesters attacked Saudi diplomatic missions in Iran following Riyadh's execution of Shiite Muslim cleric Nimr Al-

Earlier this month, UAE presidential adviser Anwar Gargash said his country was considering sending an ambassador back to Iran and called for regional economic cooperation to help ease political tensions. "The next decade cannot be like the last decade. It's a decade where 'de-escalation' should be the key word," he had said. His comments came after Zionist entity and the United States signed a new security pact reinforcing their common front against Iran, during a visit to the Jewish state by US President Joe Biden.

The UAE's talk of strengthening Iran ties comes alongside Iraqi efforts to mediate between Emirati ally Riyadh, and Tehran. Saudi Arabia and Iran have had no diplomatic ties since the 2016 attacks on the kingdom's diplomatic missions in the Islamic republic, while Kuwait also downgraded relations with Tehran. An Iranian diplomat told a Kuwaiti newspaper earlier this week that a Kuwaiti ambassador would arrive in Tehran "in the next few days", but authorities in the Gulf emirate have yet to announce such a move.

The oil-rich UAE has previously said that Arab Gulf states should take part in "collective diplomacy" to reach an agreement with Iran, whose talks with Western powers over a faltering 2015 nuclear agreement have been stalled since March. In 2020, the UAE established diplomatic relations with Zionist entity, a move which Tehran condemned. Amir-Abdollahian on Tuesday described Zionist entity's presence in the region as a cause of "instability and insecurity", İran's foreign ministry said.— AFP

#### Powerful quake hits northern **Philippines**

MANILA: A 7.0-magnitude earthquake killed at least five people in the northern Philippines Wednesday, toppling buildings and shaking high-rise towers more than 300 kilometers away in the capital Manila. The shallow and powerful quake struck the mountainous and lightly populated province of Abra on the main island of Luzon at 8:43 am, the US Geological Survey said.

Shallow earthquakes tend to cause more damage than deeper ones. This one left more than a hundred people injured across the hilly region, triggered



dozens of landslides, damaged buildings, and knocked out power. "We felt really strong shaking. We started shouting and rushed outside," said university student Mira Zapata in the San Juan municipality of Abra, which took the full force of the quake. "Our house is OK but houses down the hill were damaged."

As buildings shook and walls cracked in the municipality of Dolores, people ran outside, Police Major Edwin Sergio told AFP. "The quake was very strong," Sergio said, adding that windows of the local market were broken. In Bangued, the provincial capital of Abra, a 23year-old woman was killed after a wall fell on her, police said. At least 78 were injured in the province.

A video posted on Facebook and verified by AFP showed cracks in the asphalt road and ground in Bangued. "Some of the buildings here show

## French embassy responds to visa-related rumors

KUWAIT: The French Embassy to Kuwait held a press conference on Wednesday to respond to several rumors related to some aspects of the delivery of French visas in Kuwait. Ambassador of France to Kuwait Claire Le Flecher said that the rumors may conflate several separate though connected elements, part of which are factual information, while others are unchecked and malevolent suppositions.

The ambassador mentioned that the rumors include fraudulent backdoor channels that issue faster visa appointments, despite there being existing indeed limited channels for specific categories of people who have justifications for getting a visa according to a faster procedure. But these channels are absolutely transparent and devoid of any element of hidden price. "Their existence might create some confusion between legitimate fast-track procedures and illegal ones," she said.

She added, "Illegal practices or excessive invoicing of visa-linked services do exist. They can only be attributed to private intermediaries (travel agencies) hired by travelers without any intervention from the embassy, which does not exercise control over their activity. In addition to that, the electronic system of booking appointment is reliable and rigorously designed to prevent fraud. Notably, visa appointments are to be made mentioning a passport number, which cannot be modified afterwards."

The ambassador mentioned, "One factual element we have been fully aware of is the unusually high levels of visa applications, which have exceeded the capacities and entailed longer than usual delay of appointments in the visa center." She added, "We took all available measures to limit the impact of these delays. However, because of capacity limits, we were not in a position to eliminate them altogether and it might be so until the end of the summer period." Clarifying, "The travelers were reminded that visa applications can be applied several months ahead of the time of travel. However, many applications have still been applied quite lately, within less than a month before the travelling date."

The ambassador mentioned that in order to confront delays in visa issues, "the consular section at the embassy has mobilized its capacities to the full, so as

to increase the number of applications handled by authorized agents of the embassy, while the daily rate of applications has gone up from 200 to 300 a day, and from April to June the number of handled applications has increased from 3,000 to 6,000 a month. As a whole in three months from April to June, 13,000 applications were processed as compared with 2,400 in the corresponding period of 2021."

The ambassador reminded that there are some categories of visa applicants who are fully exempted of booking an appointment and can go directly to the visa center, like holders of diplomatic passports; military personnel in official mission; people travelling for medical reasons with a certificate; students; as well as spouses and children of French citizens. They should therefore especially not pay any fee-based private services to get an appointment.

Regarding the visa appointments issue, the ambassador said, "The embassy has decided to take measures in order to prevent fake appointments made by unauthorized agencies. Henceforth, prepayment of a visa appointment will have to be made at the time of booking it electronically, in order to validate it. A delay of 48 hours was until now available to make the prepayment, while cancelled appointments will, as from now, not result in immediate and automatic opening of new appointment slots using the freed capacity."

"It seems conceivable that intermediaries have abused this by creating some time in advance fictitious appointments, and then cancelling them so as to reuse them right away for a traveler with a late visa application. Freed slots will be reopened only later, at a not predictable time so as to thwart this abusive practice," she explained.

"New slots will henceforth be opened over a period of six months, so as to incentivize a maximum number of travelers to introduce their visa applications as early as possible. As of now, appointment taking has been opened until the end of 2022," she pointed out.

#### Kuwaiti aid convoy for tribal violence victims arrives in Sudan

KHARTOUM: Rahma International Society, a Kuwaiti charity, delivered famine relief and other aid items to the people affected by the recent tribal strife in the Blue Nile State, southeast Sudan, on Wednesday. Charge d'Affaires of Kuwait Embassy in Khartoum Mohammad Ghazi said, while attending the delivery ceremony, the aid convoy is a token of solidarity and fraternity between the peo-

ple of Kuwait and those of Sudan. In statements to the press, he expressed the benevolent Kuwaitis who donated to the aid campaign and the efforts of the Kuwaiti aid agency. Ambassador Ghazi affirmed firm support from the Kuwaiti government and people to sisterly Sudan in all conditions. Meanwhile, Abdul-Salam Younis, director of the care and reform society - the local partner of Rahma, thanked the Kuwaiti donors who contributed to the aid convoy. He said the assistances include nearly eight tons of foodstuffs and household items for the persons displaced by violence. According to UN estimates, more than 31,000 were displaced by the tribal violence, in addition to 105 deaths and 300 injuries. —KUNA

Speaking to the press, he said the project reflects the company's general strategic vision to become one of the most competitive and advanced refining companies around the world, and manifests the optimal usage of the country's oil resources as one of the top strategic goals of the Kuwait Petroleum Corporation (KPC).

The project is globally unique since the company

managed to carry out its huge works at the existing refineries while, at the same time, carrying on production and fulfilling relevant obligations towards its customers both at home and abroad, he said. He estimated that the capex of the Clean Fuels Project hit KD 4.68 billion (around \$15.2 billion), considering the financing process as the largest in the history of

Kuwait's global position in the oil refining industry. In ed that the KPC funded 30 percent of the project's capex, while the remaining 70 percent was bankrolled out of foreign financing sources. Owing to the mammoth size of this project, it was divided into three main parts, with each part having been executed by a consortium of international companies, Khurayif pointed out. The number of new manufacturing units carried out as part of the project at the two refineries hit 76; divided into 39 production units, 37 service units, in addition to the revamping of 30 units involving seven production units and 23 service units, he said.

Following the successful completion of the project, the refining capacity of Mina Abdullah and Mina Al-



Ahmadi refineries has surged to 454,000 and 346,000 barrels per day (bpd) respectively, the official remarked. Thus, this 800,000-bpd quantity, together with the expected 600,000-bpd production capacity of Al-Zour oil refinery, will take the refined oil total up to 1.4 million bpd, thus achieving the best value added and highest possible revenue of hydrocarbon resources, he boasted. One of the main aims of the project is to boost the conversion capacity of the company's refineries by means of converting heavy lowquality products into high-quality ones. The products meet Euro-4/Euro-5 specifications. Therefore, the environmental impact is greatly reduced with much less content of SOx, NOx and other pollutants. For example, sulfur content in gasoline will be cut down from 500 ppm into 10 ppm, and in gasoil from 5,000 ppm into 10 ppm, he added.

Ship fuel oil
Furthermore, the KNPC is now prepared to produce ship fuel oil (Bunker fuel), which contains 0.5 percent of sulfur, in line with the requirements of the International Maritime Organization (IMO) put in place in 2020, he elaborated. On job opportunities created by the project, Khuravif said the Clean Fuels Project is one of the strategic projects that serve Kuwait's 2035 vision by



providing Kuwaiti nationals with job opportunities. Since it was launched, the project has now created around 800 jobs for Kuwaiti nationals, and developed their capabilities and skills, he added. The project is also expected to create more jobs and promote local economic development, based on relevant mechanisms for maintenance and service contracts, he said, noting that nationals must make up at least 30 percent of workforce per contract.

Internal and external training courses were held for some 650 newly recruited employees, added the KNPC's Deputy CEO for Administrative and Commercial Affairs and Official Spokesman. On the importance of the project to the national economy, he expounded that local spending was one of the key aspects of the project, with its contractors having spent a total KD 1.1 billion (around \$3.57 billion) at the local market during all execution phases. As for environmental significance, he said the company's products meet the strictest global environment specifications, and the project meets the local power plants' needs of clean low-sulfur fuel, thus reducing environmental hazards. On major difficulties and challenges the project faced, he said the COVID-19 pandemic was a key challenge, given that it had hit the entire world at a time when the project was almost done. —KUNA







#### **Crackdown targets** labor law breakers in Salmiya

**KUWAIT:** The joint tripartite commission, led by the General Administration of Residence Affairs' Investigations, organized a sudden inspection security campaign in several Salmiya malls on Tuesday. The inspection resulted in the arrest of 19 violators of labor law, who were referred to the proper authorities to take necessary measures

The campaign was launched with the aim of inspecting workers in Salmiya and detect those who violate the labor law, Dr Fahd Al-Murad, Director of the Labor Inspection Department at Public Authority for Manpower (PAM), said on the sidelines of the campaign. "Today's campaign aimed at regulating the labor market, where we spotted several violations in several malls in Salmiya," he said. "Several booth salesmen were working illegally, and there were many unli-

Murad revealed that most of the workers that



were arrested have family visas (article 22) and there were children aged under 18 among the workers. He stressed that PAM does not issue work permits for juveniles, unless under certain conditions. "A special work permit must be issued for juveniles, most of whom are employed in the summer for a short period," he explained. "Article 19 of the labor law prohibits the employment of children under the age of 15, and Article 20 regulates the work of those who are 15-18 vears old according to specific conditions. So far,

no company has come to issue a work permit for

As for the violators, he indicated that there are two penalties; a criminal penalty for violating Article 10 of the labor law, punished by a fine ranging from KD 2,000 to 10,000, and/or imprisonment for up to three years. The other penalty is taken against the company; the employer's file will be suspended and followed up to verify that he is not practicing his business. Murad affirmed that any employment of a worker in the labor market





under the name 'training period' or 'part-time job' is considered illegal.

In the meantime, Ibrahim Al-Sabaan, the head of the emergency team at Kuwait Municipality -Hawalli Governorate branch, said, "We have cooperated with the joint committee to control several workers carrying out an activity not mentioned in the company's license. An administrative closure will be requested by the municipality."

"We usually inspect public places, but recently it was monitored that booth workers escaped when we enter the mall, so we formed the team today to monitor those violations. A violation has now been issued and there will be a serious penalty on the worker or the license holder of a fine ranging from KD 500 to 1,000 and a travel

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#### Suad Al-Sabah commends Bahraini official

KUWAIT: Kuwaiti poet Sheikha Dr Suad Al-Sabah sent a supporting letter to Sheikha Mai bint Mohammad Al-Khalifa, Head of Bahrain's culture and antiquities authority, after media reports that she lost her job after she refused to shake hands with the Zionist entity's Ambassador in Manama last month during the funeral of American Ambassador to Bahrain, as she left when she learned the Ambassador was present, and asked the American Embassy not to publish any picture of her in the funeral. Biden busts out of COVID isolation with gym session

LAC STE. ANNE, Canada: Pope Francis called for "healing" Tuesday as he joined a pilgrimage to a sacred lake in Canada, one day after making a landmark apology for the abuse of Indigenous children at Catholic-run

The 85-year-old pontiff prayed for the Church to choose "truth" over "defending the institution" as he visited Lac Ste Anne, some 80 kilometers (50 miles) west of Edmonton, where some of Canada's Indigenous people began their relationship with Catholicism generations ago. The lake is one of the most important pilgrimage sites in North America. Every year since the end of the 19th century, thousands of pilgrims mainly from Canada and the United States have come to bathe and pray in the healing waters, according to Indigenous rites.

Hundreds of faithful, many of them Indigenous, fell silent as the pope, who has been suffering with knee pain, was wheeled carefully to the water's edge and prayed in silence there for several minutes. He was then wheeled to a shrine, sprinkling some of those assembled with water he had blessed from the lake on the way, as Indigenous people drummed and chanted.

Lamenting the "terrible effects of colonization, the indelible pain of so many families, grandparents and children," Francis told those gathered for a liturgical cel-

#### Sri Lanka arrests protest leaders, extends emergency

COLOMBO: Two activists who helped lead mass demonstrations that toppled Sri Lanka's president were arrested Wednesday, police said, as parliament extended tough emergency laws imposed to restore order. Gotabaya Rajapaksa was forced to flee when tens of thousands of protesters, incensed by the island nation's unprecedented economic crisis, stormed his residence in the capital Colombo. He later flew to Singapore and tendered his resignation while his successor Ranil Wickremesinghe declared a state of emergency and vowed a tough line against "trouble-

Police said in separate Wednesday statements that they had arrested activists Kusal Sandaruwan and Weranga Pushpika on unlawful assembly charges. After Rajapaksa fled, Sandaruwan was seen in social media footage counting a large cache of banknotes found in the president's home.

Police have also released photographs of 14 suspects wanted in connection with an arson attack on Wickremesinghe's home on the same day the presically and sexually abused, and thousands are believed to have died of disease, malnutrition or neglect.

#### 'Part of a process'

For some, the healing had already begun. Cindy Dearhead, a First Nations woman who was a student in one of the infamous schools, said she felt the pope's apology was "important." "It was a long time coming, but finally a pope himself is finally acknowledging yes, I'm sorry," she told AFP at Lac Ste Anne.

"For those of us that suffered into generations of trauma, maybe we can have healing and can understand what our parents came through and maybe feel better." But for many others that healing may well depend on what comes next.

"I think the apology has always been one thing, part of a process of reconciliation. To me, the actions that need to come behind it are very important," said Chief Peter Powder of the Mikisew Cree First Nations.

At Lac Ste Anne, the leader of the world's 1.3 billion Catholics appeared tired and weakened by knee pain that has seen him use a wheelchair often in recent months. His pilgrimage came hours after he delivered a mass to tens of thousands of people thronging a stadium in Edmonton, the capital of Alberta, one of the largest open-air events of his visit.

#### Trump hints at 2024 White House run

WASHINGTON: Donald Trump returned to Washington on Tuesday for the first time since leaving the White House 18 months ago, delivering a fiery speech sprinkled with strong hints he may run for president again in 2024. The 76-year-old Trump stopped short of declaring his candidacy, but laid out what he believed should be the priorities for the "next Republican president." "I always say I ran the first time and I won, then I ran a second time and I did much better," Trump said. "We may just have to do it again. We have to straighten out our country.

"I look forward to laying out many more details in the weeks and months to come." Several hours before Trump took the stage at the right-wing America First Policy Institute, his former vice president, Mike Pence, who is also considering a White House run in 2024, addressed a different conservative audience in Washington. Speaking at the Young America's Foundation conference, Pence said Americans must look to the future not the past and played down differences with Trump. "Elections are about the future," Pence said. "I came today not to look backwards but to look forward.

"I don't know that the president and I differ on issues," he said. "But we may differ on focus." Trump's 90-minute address to the conservative America First Policy Institute echoed many of the themes of his victorious 2016 campaign, including illegal immigration and crime. Trump repeated his false claims that he won the 2020 election and denounced the House committee investigation into the January 6 attack on the US Capitol by his supporters as the work of "political

#### 'Cesspool of crime'

Trump lashed out repeatedly at Democratic President Joe Biden, blaming him for the country's ills. "We are a nation in decline," he said. "We are a failing nation." "Inflation is the highest in 49 years," Trump said "Gas prices have reached the highest in the history of our country."

He accused Biden of allowing an "invasion" by millions of migrants crossing the southern border. "The next Republican president must immediately implement every aspect of the Trump agenda that achieved the most secure border in history," he said.

Trump said the United States "is now a cesspool of crime." "We have blood, death and suffering on a scale once unthinkable," he said. "Democrat-run cities are setting all-time murder records." He accused Biden of having "surrendered in Afghanistan," and allowing Russia to invade Ukraine. "It would never ever, ever have happened if I was your commander-in-chief," he said. Since taking his last Air Force One flight from Washington to Florida on January 20 last year, Trump has remained the country's most polarizing figure, continuing his unprecedented campaign to sow doubts about his 2020 election loss to Biden.

For weeks, Washington has been riveted by hearings in Congress about the January 6 storming of the Capitol by a Trump mob and his attempts to overturn the election. With Biden's approval rating currently below 40 percent and Democrats forecasted to lose control of Congress in November midterm elections, Trump is apparently bullish that he could ride the Republican wave all the way to the White House in 2024. On the Democratic side, fury at Trump is also providing energy in the run-up to the midterms. The House committee hearings have laid out evidence that Trump oversaw nothing less than an attempt to break US democracy, first through trying to rig electoral procedures behind the scenes and finally in encouraging a mob to attack legislators certifying his loss.—AFP

## Biden busts out of COVID isolation with gym session

#### 'I can walk out to the balcony and holler at you'

**WASHINGTON:** Audio-bombed by a barking pet dog, wondering if he looks OK on video conference, and finally being allowed to hit the gym — Joe Biden may be the most powerful man in the world but the ups and downs of COVID isolation are the same as for anyone else. Tuesday was Biden's fifth day confined to quarters and his doctor, Kevin O'Connor, said the president has now completed a five-day course of the therapeutic Paxlovid, with nearly all symptoms of the coronavirus

"His symptoms have now almost completely resolved," O'Connor said in a memorandum. Biden is expected to be released from isolation once he's had a negative test. But little question that the 79-year-old is already beyond ready, at least mentally.

While the doctor focused mostly on items like healthy oxygen saturation, pulse and temperature, the line really speaking to Biden's state was that he "feels well enough to resume his physical exercise regime."

Unlike his predecessor Donald Trump, who mused

#### Hong Kong must repeal national security law: UN

GENEVA: A UN watchdog voiced alarm Wednesday at deteriorating rights in Hong Kong, especially calling on the Chinese territory to repeal the sweeping National Security Law imposed by Beijing two years ago.

The UN Human Rights Committee, made up of 18 independent experts, said it was "deeply concerned about the overly broad interpretation of and arbitrary application of the law." It said that the law had reportedly led to "the arrests of over 200 persons since its enactment in 2020, including 12 children, on grounds of endangering national security." The committee, which oversees respect for global rules on civil and political rights, said Hong Kong should "take concrete steps to repeal the current national security law and, in the meantime, refrain from applying the law."

The 2020 security law, imposed amid a sweeping crackdown after pro-democracy protests engulfed the city, criminalised subversion, secession, terrorism and collusion with foreign forces. Since the law took effect, opposition has been quashed and most leading democracy figures have fled the country, been disqualified from office or jailed. In its fourth regular review of Hong Kong, long a semi-autonomous territory that earlier this month marked the 25th anniversary of its handover from Britain, the committee lamented that the security law had been enacted "without consultation with public and civil society" in the city.

It warned that the security law's "lack of clarity" made it difficult to determine what behaviours and conduct constituted a criminal offence. It also decried that the law resuscitated sedition as an offence for the first time in decades, pointing to how it was used to charge academics, journalists and others "for having exercised their legitimate right to freedom of speech."

"The Committee is concerned about the adverse effect of the overly broad interpretation and arbitrary application of the national security law and sedition legislation, and its impact on the exercise of freedom of expression," it said.—AFP

Another person was killed when boulders smashed into the building site where he was working in Kalinga province, police said. Six other workers were injured. Police said an elderly woman in Suyo municipality in Ilocos Sur province suffered fatal injuries after she was buried by a landslide while out walking. In Vigan City, a UNESCO World Heritage site in Ilocos Sur, centuries-old structures built during the Spanish colonial period were damaged, police said.

#### Ring of Fire

The Philippines is regularly rocked by quakes due to its location on the Pacific "Ring of Fire", an arc of intense seismic activity that stretches from Japan through Southeast Asia and across the Pacific basin. Wednesday's quake was one of the strongest recorded in the Philippines in years and was felt across swathes of Luzon island, the most populous in the archipelago.

It was followed by nearly 300 aftershocks, the local seismological agency said. Several of the subsequent quakes measured from magnitude 4.7 to 5.2, according

Residents and office workers in Manila were evacuated from high-rise buildings. "I grabbed money and our belongings and then I went out with my parents," said Christina Gonzales, 19, after fleeing a city hotel. Verified video footage posted on Facebook showed the Bantay Bell Tower in the popular tourist destination of Vigan partially crumbling.

Two visitors suffered minor injuries from falling debris, an official said. Other buildings in the city were also damaged. "We can't rule out the possibility of another strong earthquake," said Renato Solidum, director of the Philippine Institute of Volcanology and Seismology. President Ferdinand Marcos Jr, whose family stronghold is in the north, said he would delay visiting the region to avoid causing disruption. He urged people to remain in emergency shelters until their homes have been checked for damage.

Military personnel have been deployed to Abra to help with rescue operations. At least 58 landslides have been reported , Interior Secretary Benjamin Abalos said. National disaster agency spokesman Mark Timbal said road-clearing operations were under way. There had been no reports of damage to local dams. In October 2013, a magnitude 7.1 earthquake struck Bohol Island in the central Philippines, killing more than 200 people and triggering landslides.—AFP



### New studies point to natural COVID origin

GENEVA: The World Health Organization on Wednesday welcomed new studies concluding that COVID-19 first emerged at an animal market in China's Wuhan, but insisted it was too early to rule out other theories. "All hypotheses remain on the table," WHO emergencies director Michael Ryan told reporters from the UN health agency's Geneva headquarters. Solving the mystery of where the SARS CoV-2 virus came from and how it began spreading among humans is viewed as vital to averting future pandemics.

The two main theories that have been hotly debated since COVID first surfaced in China in late 2019 have centered on the virus naturally spilling over from bats to an intermediary animal and into humans or escaping due to a lab accident. Two peer-reviewed studies published in Science Tuesday claimed to have tipped the balance in the debate about the virus's origins, concluding it must have been introduced naturally through the wildlife trade at the Wuhan market.

The first paper analyzed the geographic pattern of COVID cases in the outbreak's first month, December 2019, showing the first cases were tightly clustered around Wuhan's Huanan Seafood Wholesale Market. The second examined genomic data from the earliest cases to study the virus' early evolution, concluding it was unlikely the coronavirus circulated widely in humans prior to November 2019.

Ryan welcomed the studies. "This is a scientific detective story that goes on. Each new piece of information adds to the overall assessment," he said, stressing though that "all hypotheses remain on the table until you can prove that one hypothesis is the explanatory hypothesis." Maria Van Kerkhove, WHO's technical lead for COVID-19, welcomed the studies, as well as another one published this week looking at environmental samples. WHO experts, she said, had already evaluated the studies, which were previously posted as "preprints" before being vetted by scientific peer review. "These are good analyses," she told reporters, but stressed that more studies on the ground in China and beyond were needed before any final conclusions could be drawn. "What is really critical ... is looking further within China, further within Wuhan, and in the markets within Wuhan" with further studies to "look at where the animals who were sold at those markets came from... and looking at the people who worked at those source farms", she said.—AFP



## US will 'bear all consequences' if Pelosi visits Taiwan: China

#### Ties between the two global superpowers have continued to deteriorate

BEIJING: China warned Wednesday that Washington would "bear the consequences" if US House Speaker Nancy Pelosi visits Taiwan, with tensions soaring ahead of an expected phone call between the two countries' leaders. Beijing has hit back hard against the United States after reports emerged last week that Pelosi, a Democrat who is second in line to the presidency, could visit the selfruled island of Taiwan in August.

The potential visit is likely to dominate a phone call between Chinese President Xi Jinping and US counterpart Joe Biden, which the US leader has said he expects will take place this week. Ties between the two global superpowers have continued to deteriorate under Biden's presidency, over issues including Taiwan, human rights and technology sector competition.

Beijing this week warned that it was "getting ready" for a possible visit by Pelosi, which would be the first to Taiwan by a sitting US House speaker since 1997. "We are firmly opposed to Speaker Pelosi's visit to Taiwan," Chinese foreign ministry spokesman Zhao Lijian said at a regular press conference Wednesday.

"If the US pushes ahead and challenges China's bottom line... the US side will bear all the consequences," he added. A possible visit by Pelosi-yet to be confirmed by the senior Democrat-has stirred alarm in Biden's administration, which fears the trip may cross red lines for China.

It also comes at an especially fraught time as Chinese President Xi Jinping prepares to cement his rule later this year at a major party meeting amid economic headwinds. Last week Biden said the US military thought a visit was "not a good idea right now".

#### 'Show support'

Democratic Taiwan lives under constant threat of being invaded by China, which views it as part of its territory to be seized by force if necessary. China's air incursions near Taiwan have risen sharply this year as Beijing works to isolate the island on the international stage.

Pelosi told reporters last week it was "important for us to show support for

Taiwan", while denying Congress was pushing for independence for the island. In 1979 Washington switched relations from Taipei to Beijing, and successive administrations have been careful to recognise only "one China" by not sending top-ranking officials to Taiwan.

Washington has had a long-standing policy of strategic ambiguity on whether it would intervene militarily in the event of a Chinese attack on the island. Biden recently said the United States was ready to defend Taiwan militarily in an invasiongoing beyond just providing weapons-although the White House has walked back his remarks.

The US State Department in April approved the

potential sale of equipment, training and other items to support Taiwan's Air Defense System in a deal valued at up to \$95 million. But Taiwan enjoys bipartisan backing in divided Washington and China's warnings have only fuelled calls for Pelosi to go ahead.

She has long been an outspoken critic of Beijing's human rights record, in 1991 outraging

her hosts by unfurling a banner in Tiananmen Square in memory of pro-democracy demonstrators killed there two years earlier.

Taipei has said it welcomes visits from any "friendly foreign guests" and Premier Su Tseng-

chang on Wednesday said Taiwan was "very grateful to Speaker Pelosi for her support and friendliness... over the years".

A previous House speaker, Newt Gingrich, visited in 1997 but the Republican was from the rival party of the White House and Beijing's reaction was relatively muted. CIA chief Bill Burns said last week that Xi appears committed to the option of using force against Taiwan, despite lessons from Russia's struggles in Ukraine. "I wouldn't underestimate President Xi's determination to assert China's control" over Taiwan, he said. —AFP

#### Singapore extends visa for Sri Lanka's ex-leader

**SINGAPORE:** Singapore has extended a short-stay visa for Sri Lanka's deposed president Gotabaya Rajapaksa, local media in the city-state reported on Wednesday. Rajapaksa fled his country on July 13, after his official residence was stormed by thousands of protesters who had demonstrated for months against the island nation's painful economic crisis.

He first escaped to the Maldives in a military plane and travelled on to Singapore, where he has been staying on a short-term visit pass since July 14. Rajapaksa's 14-day visit pass has been extended, allowing him to stay until August 11, the Straits Times newspaper reported Wednesday, without citing a

#### Japan's baby hatch hospital offers mothers 'last resort'

KUMAMOTO: When the alarm sounds at Jikei hospital in southern Japan, nurses race down a spiral staircase. Their mission: to rescue an infant left in the country's only baby hatch. For 15 years, the clinic has been the only place in Japan a child can be anonymously and

The pioneering hospital in the Kumamoto region also offers a 24/7 pregnancy support hotline and the country's only "confidential birth" programme. These have made it the target of criticism, but head doctor Takeshi Hasuda sees the facility as a vital safety net.

"There are women out there who are ashamed that they did something horrible (by getting pregnant) and are so scared," he told AFP. "For these women, a place like ours that bars no one and makes them think 'even I will be welcome' counts a lot, I think.'

Nurses try to arrive at the hatch, with its stork illustrations and meticulously tended baby bed, within a minute of the alarm sounding. "If we find mothers lingering nearby, we ask if they're comfortable sharing their stories with us,' said hospital staffer Saori Taminaga.

They offer to check the health of mothers, providing support and encouraging them to leave information that could help a child learn their origins later. "If they try to go, we persist and keep pushing until just before they leave the grounds. Once that happens, it's time for us to give up."

The Catholic-run hospital opened its baby hatch in 2007, modelled on a German scheme. Baby hatches have existed globally for centuries and are used today in places including South Korea, Pakistan and the United States.

But they have been banned in some countries, such as Britain, and criticized by the UN for violating a child's right to know their parents and identity.

#### 'Alienated by society'

Jikei hospital sees the hatch as a way to prevent child abuse and deaths in Japan, where police recorded 27 child abandonments in 2020 and at least 57 children died from abuse the year before. Hasuda says children abandoned at the hospital include those who were "the result of prostitution, rape and incest", with mothers finding nowhere else to turn.

"I think the most important role our baby hatch system has played so far is to provide a sort of last resort for women left alienated by society," he said.

In all, 161 babies and toddlers have been dropped at the hospital-with some coming from the Tokyo region, about 1,000 kilometres (621 miles) away, and beyond. But the hatch has also faced scepticism in Japan, partly because of traditional ideas about what constitutes a family, according to Chiaki Shirai, an expert on reproduction and adoption studies at Shizuoka University.

The country uses a registration system that lists births, deaths and marriages in a family going back generations. The crucial piece of administrative data also shapes views on family structure. It has "entrenched the idea in Japanese society that whoever gave birth to a child must raise the child," to the point where children are almost considered "the property" of parents, Shirai told AFP.

"Children who are abandoned and shown as having no family in the registry are heavily stigmatised." Despite the anonymity offered by the hatch, child welfare officials typically try to trace the family of infants abandoned at the hospital. As a result, around 80 percent later learned their family's identity, and 20 percent have returned to parents

Abortion has been legal in Japan since 1948 and is available up until 22 weeks, but consent is required from a male partner. Exceptions are granted only in cases of rape or domestic abuse, or if the partner is dead or



#### Bitter harvest: Malaysian palm oil farmers face labor crunch

IJOK, Malaysia: Overripe palm oil fruits hang untouched in trees while others lie rotting scattered around a plantation, as Malaysian farmers reap the bitter harvest of a severe labor shortage. The tropical country is the world's second-biggest producer of the edible vegetable oil, which is found in many everyday goods from chocolate to cosmetics. The sector has long been reliant on migrants from neighboring Indonesia for back-breaking plantation work, which is shunned by most in more affluent Malaysia. Lengthy COVID border closures had already reduced the foreign labor force, but now bureaucratic hurdles and a ban by Indonesia on sending new workers have dramatically worsened the problems.

"A lot of bunches of fruit are rotting on the trees," Suzaidee Rajan, 47, who owns a 300-acre (120-hectare) plantation in Ijok, central Selangor state, told AFP. "We usually harvest twice a month. But now due to the labor shortage, we can (do so) just once a month. Our income has plunged and locals

With just four foreign workers-two fewer

than the number he needs-Suzaidee now has to drive into his plantation and load the fruit onto a lorry himself. Palm oil is a controversial commodity, blamed by environmentalists for fuelling the destruction of rainforest in Malaysia and Indonesia, which together produce 85 percent of global output.

Green groups say rapid expansion of plantations has destroyed rare animals' habitats, while there have been allegations of foreign workers being abused and mistreated on some estates. The sector nevertheless remains a major contributor to Malaysia's economy, and has continued to attract foreign workers who can earn higher wages than back home. Agricultural firms run large estates, while there are also numerous smallscale farmers like Suzaidee.

#### 'Darkness on horizon'

Other Malaysian industries, including construction and manufacturing, also rely on migrant workers from across Asia, and suffered as a result of lengthy pandemic border closures. While authorities ended a freeze on hiring foreigners in February, laborers have been slow to return because of red tape and difficult negotiations with countries of origin. Problems in the plantation sector have been particularly acute, however, and look set to get worse after Indonesia banned sending new workers to Malaysia earlier this month.

Hermono-Indonesia's ambassador in Kuala Lumpur, who goes by one name-said Jakarta took the decision as Malaysia was not abiding by an agreement aimed at protecting his compatriots.

The Malaysian estate owners' association says there is currently a shortage of about 120,000 workers. And this month Minister Zuraida Kamaruddin, who oversees the plantation sector, said the industry lost 10.46 billion ringgit (\$2.35 billion) in the first five months of 2022 as palm oil fruit was left unharvested. "I can see only darkness on the horizon unless migrant workers are brought into the country immediately," farmer Sahman Duriat, who has a plantation in Ijok, told AFP. "My earnings are falling while inflation and production costs are rising." After the Indonesian ban was announced, Malaysia's human resources ministry vowed to address Jakarta's concerns quickly to ensure it is reversed.—AFP

BERLIN: Russian energy giant Gazprom drastically cut gas deliveries to Europe via the Nord Stream pipeline on Wednesday to about 20 percent of its capacity, German authorities said. The Russian state-run company had announced Monday that it would choke supply to 33 million cubic metres a day-half the amount it has been delivering since service resumed last week after 10 days of maintenance work. EU states have accused Russia of squeezing supplies in retaliation for Western sanctions over Moscow's war in Ukraine. Gazprom cited the halted operation of one of the last two operating turbines for the pipeline due

to the "technical condition of the engine". The German economy ministry dismissed the explanation, saying there was "no technical reason for a reduction of deliveries". Klaus Mueller, head of Germany's energy regulator, said gas flows had dropped to 20 percent of the pipeline's capacity on Wednesday from 40 percent. "We'll see today if it stays that way," he said in a statement. Mueller praised consumers and industry for voluntarily reducing energy use, saying that even correcting for warmer summer temperatures, recent consumption had been cut between five and

He said this would allow Germany to add

to its gas reserves, currently at about 65 percent. Economy Minister Robert Habeck outlined targets last week to reach 95 percent by November 1 ahead of the cold German winter.

#### 'War strategy'

"In the autumn the situation will change and gas use will rise," Mueller said, noting the country's strong reliance for its heating on gas, traditionally imported from Russia. "Germany has got to use less gas," he said, calling energy part of Russian "foreign policy and war strategy". In parallel, Italian energy major Eni said Gazprom had informed the group it would only deliver "approximately 27 million cubic meters" on Wednesday, down from around 34 million cubic meters in recent days.

The European Union on Tuesday agreed a plan to reduce gas consumption in solidarity with Germany. German daily Sueddeutsche Zeitung called the bloc's plan a "lesson in humility for the EU's would-be schoolmaster," Germany. "Suddenly we are not the strong ones and are dependent on others' help," it said. The Rheinische Post newspaper said the EU agreement was welcome, but its bid to reduce natural gas demand by 15 percent was "modest at best". —AFP

## Don't let inflation 'genie' out of the bottle: IMF economist

#### CBs must stay the course and continue to raise rates until inflation retreats

WASHINGTON: The global economy is facing a to get out of control is "like (letting) the genie out mean more rapid price declines, Gourinchas said. worrisome slowdown, but the critical priority for policymakers is to bring raging inflation under control, the IMF's chief economist said Tuesday. With price surges in major economies approaching 10 percent, central banks must stay the course and continue to raise interest rates until inflation retreats, Pierre-Olivier Gourinchas told AFP in an interview.

The International Monetary Fund's updated World Economic Outlook offered a gloomy picture of the global economy, which is slowing sharply and faced with a series of risks that could push it into recession.

Soaring prices for food and fuel, exacerbated by the war in Ukraine, have been squeezing family budgets worldwide, and even leading to unrest in some countries. Aggressive moves by central bankers, including the US Federal Reserve and European Central Bank, are aimed at taming those price pressures, but will also slow the economy. However, Gourinchas warned that allowing inflation

#### Risk of doing too much

If people come to expect inflation will remain high, "this will be a world in which central banks have lost the plot. And it will be very, very difficult to walk that back." But fortunately, "we're not there" yet, he said.

So far, "inflation expectations have remained quite stable. And this is one of the great benefits of having had decades of low inflation environment and credibility by central banks." He acknowledged that there is a risk policymakers will do too much and slam the brakes on growth, but so far they are on the right track. "The point is not to inflict a recession on the global economy," he said. "The point is to bring back price stability.

The goal is to bring inflation back down close to two percent for advanced economies, maybe a bit more for emerging market economies, and even if rate hikes go too far and slow growth, that would

#### Signs of hope

Some of the primary risks facing the global economy are beyond the control of policymakers, including the potential for Russia to shut off gas supplies to Europe. But despite the very real possibility that the worst-case scenario comes to pass, Gourinchas nevertheless sees some signs of hope.

Oil prices, which skyrocketed to nearly \$129 a barrel in March, have been easing in recent weeks due to the expectations of a global economic slowdown, and were back to below \$105 on Tuesday for Brent, the European benchmark. There have been "synchronized" moves by central banks around the world, including emerging markets, so "we could see a much faster disinflation path if the energy prices are to continue on that trend," he said. And policymakers in emerging market economies have so far reacted well, allowing their currencies to adjust.

"Their policy frameworks have improved over the years," he said. —AFP

#### Boeing profit falls as **CEO** eyes resumption of 787 deliveries

NEW YORK: Boeing reported a drop in second-quarter profits on Wednesday due to the continued travails of the 787, but the company said it was close to receiving regulatory approval to resume deliveries of the

"We're on the verge," Chief Executive Dave Calhoun said on CNBC, although he declined to set a date when asked about when he expects Federal Aviation Administration approval to resume deliveries on the Dreamliner aircraft.

Deliveries on the top-selling widebody jet have been suspended for more than a year, a factor that again dragged down revenues.

The aviation giant reported a 67 percent plunge in quarterly profits to \$193 million, as revenues declined 1.9 percent to

The company missed analyst estimates for revenues and earnings-per-share but stock prices rose after the report, as Boeing confirmed it still expects to have positive cash flow in 2022. Calhoun told CNBC the company was at a "bit of a turning point" in terms of getting past key obstacles. On the 787, the company has been working with the Federal Aviation Administration to address a series of manufacturing issues uncovered in 2020 and since. The company took a \$3.5 billion charge for additional rework costs on the 787 in the fourth quarter of 2021. It said in April it expects another \$2 billion in "abnormal costs" for the 787. At the end of March, Boeing had 115 Dreamliner planes in inventory and was producing the jet "at very low rates.'

On Wednesday, the company said it was working with US air safety officials on "final actions" to resume 787 deliveries.

The enhanced regulatory scrutiny of the 787 and other Boeing planes comes on the heels of a pair of crashes in 2018 and 2019 on the 737 MAX, which led to a lengthy global grounding of the plane. But the MAX has since returned to service, enabling Boeing to ramp up production of the planes, collect meaningful revenues and announce significant new orders at the Farnborough Airshow earlier this month. Even so, Boeing's backlog of orders in the pipeline lags that of archrival Airbus, but Calhoun told CNBC he is not worried about the difference.

"We don't need to close that gap," Calhoun said, adding that aviation industry is "supply constrained for as far as I

Boeing's job is "to deliver against our backlog," he said. "My job is to make sure I've got a big enough backlog to continue to increase my rate, stay stable in production and satisfy our customers every step of the way." Shares climbed 2.0 percent to \$159.11 in morning trading. —AFP

Turkish Defence Minister Hulusi Akar unveiled the centre at a ceremony held five days after Moscow and Kyiv put their names on a deal designed to deliver wheat and other grain across the Black Sea

# Al-Bahar: NBK will continue to grow its international operations

#### NBK Deputy Group CEO on the sidelines of the analyst conference for 2Q 2022

KUWAIT: Shaikha Al-Bahar, Deputy Group CEO of National Bank of Kuwait (NBK), emphasized that the Bank remains on course with its strategic priorities. "In Kuwait, we expect the improved economic outlook to generate more opportunities and specifically strengthen the demand for business credit, while we gradually see a revival of project tendering and award activity," she said.

On the sidelines of the analyst conference for the results of 2Q 2022, Al-Bahar mentioned: "We will continue to grow our international operations with more focus on key growth markets, most importantly GCC and Egypt as we target further diversification of our balance sheet and income streams and grow the contribution of international operations to the Group's bottom line." "Our business diversification continues to serve us as we benefit from the region's economic recovery and NBK's wide spectrum of product and service offerings," she added.

#### Digital excellence

Al-Bahar stated: "We continued to invest in positioning NBK for the future of banking, and building a next generation digital banking experience. We have made great efforts in uplifting various channels with regular enhancements to the digital journey for our customers, the number of services we provide digitally, most importantly through mobile banking application." "While utilizing data analytics, robotics and machine learning to improve our operational efficiency and offer personalized experience to meet the evolving banking needs of our clients. Our digital transformation efforts are group wide as we have been upgrading the digital experience of our customers across various business segments and in all our key strategic markets," she elaborated.

#### Sustainable growth

Al-Bahar pointed out that the efforts in the ESG space are topping the agenda of the Group. We will continue improving our ESG-related operational prac-



tices, integrating ESG into our business decision-making processes and growing our pledge to global sustainability reporting. During the period, we continued to deliver on our six pillars of sustainability and working our way towards achieving our predetermined sustainability targets, she added.

#### Market leader

Al-Bahar stated: "As we started seeing the recovery of post pandemic growth, the competitive landscape in retail lending became more aggressive. As banks started competing on acquiring market share we witnessed an increased focus on price competition. As the market leader and one of the largest players in the retail sector, we opted to defend our market share through offering zero interest loans in the market earlier this year." "With our diversified and low cost funding base we can afford to aggressively defend our market share through lower pricing and we have been extremely successful in doing so in recent months."

"This is not an ideal operating landscape as it puts some pressure on margins in the short term especially considering the current environment of increasing rates but we will continue to defend our market leadership with focus on customer acquisition."

#### Weyay

Al-Bahar said: "Our core markets have young popu-

lation (Kuwait, GCC and the Arab world in general) so this required special attention to the youth. So we are well established across our markets and there is a lot of upside potential for us to drive from our presence in the region, so we successfully launched Weyay as we were and still are targeting the youth."

"The achievement so far is way beyond the targets, it is very successful and we are offering products and soon it will be a comprehensive platform for our clients." "Digital banking is the future and we are investing heavily in technology and IT investments and so on," she noted.

#### Dividend distribution

Commenting on NBK's distribution of interim dividends, Al-Bahar said: "The Bank's dividend policy is determined, in view of capital requirements amongst other factors. The bank has always had a very stable dividend policy as we have always targeted a payout ratio in the range of 50 to 60 percent.

"Our capital ratios remain very strong in line with our internally set targets and buffers and this allows us to continue to maintain a healthy payout ratio." "Our interim dividend distribution is not an indication of any changes to our divined policy and the year-end distribution will follow the same guidelines in the context of our specified dividend policy," she added.

#### Infrastructure gap

On a question about her expectations for the pace of project awarding, Al-Bahar explained: "The improved health situation and the ease of restrictions post pandemic have lifted project activity in 2021 where project awards reached KD 1.5 billion. With the recent hike in oil prices and the expected surpluses, we expect the government to continue with its commitment to spend on infrastructure and accelerate project tendering and awards to compensate for the slower execution during the past 2 years and the impact of the pandemic."

Al-Bahar expected a bigger role for the private sector in Kuwait's infrastructure development plan going

forward. Recent discussion and engagements with various government agencies along with the discussed tenders affirms the government's intensions to give a bigger role to the private sector in future development projects. "This of course creates opportunities for banks to lend across different models of financing; being a PPP or a BOT project. For that, we are optimistic about the projects pipeline and its outcomes," she added.

#### Diversified income

On his part, Sujit Ronghe, Acting Group CFO said that NBK's results for the first half reflected focus on core banking activities, diversified income, and the ability to generate profits from these activities. Ronghe mentioned:"Net interest income of KD 348.3 million for 1H22, a growth of 4.4 percent over 1H21 was largely driven by higher volumes of loans and other interest earning assets across segments and geographies."

"Fees and commissions income was also 10.8 percent higher than 1H21 reflecting strong contributions from a well-diversified pool of geographies and lines of business."

#### Cost of risk

On the expectations for the cost of risk, Ronghe said: "second quarter or first half-year cost of risk is in no way an indicator of what could happen in the future, because it was a fallout of recoveries made during the period. We expect this year to benefit from the recoveries we saw in the first six months and I would say the cost of risk would be materially lower than what we saw last year." Ronghe explained: "A healthy buffer helps the Bank to not only comply with the provisions required by the Central Bank of Kuwait, but also for any ECL challenges going forward." "As regards the tightened credit provisioning, judgmental or precautionary general provisions has been a feature of our provisioning regime since the global financial crisis. Our provision coverage ratio even in earlier years was higher than 300, which is in line with the Bank's conservative credit provisioning policy," he noted.

The Stuttgart-based group said in a statement that its net profit inched forward to 3.2 billion euros (\$3.3 billion) in the second quarter from 3.1 billion euros a year earlier on a seven-percent increase in revenues to 36.4 billion euros. Unit sales, however, declined by seven percent in the period from April to June, as a shortage of semiconductors-a key component in cars' electrical systems-put the brakes on production.

## Alphabet's profit slips as growth slows

**SAN FRANCISCO:** Google parent Alphabet reported Tuesday its profit and revenue slipped as the internet giant's long sizzling ad revenue growth cooled, but the market seemed relieved the news wasn't worse. Big tech firms are grappling with multiple problems, from inflation to the war in Ukraine, and results in general for the quarter have not been great so far.

Alphabet's revenue in the latest quarter grew 13 percent to \$69.7 billion, with its global search and cloud computing services bringing in most of the money-but this was under analysts' expectations. "I think it's a good time to sharpen our focus," Alphabet chief executive Sundar Pichai told an earnings call. "It's a

Mercedes its resilient revenue figures resulted from its decision to focus on higher-end models with larger margins. The carmaker said it was raising its revenue outlook for the full year to "significantly above" the 167.9 billion euros it booked last year.

Mercedes also raised its forecast for underlying or operating profit. Chief executive Ola Kallenius said the group had managed the bottlenecks in supply as well as "increasingly complex macroeconomic and geopolitical challenges."

Russia's invasion of Ukraine has clouded the outlook for the economy in Europe and raised fears of a recession, as Moscow threatens to cut off gas supplies to the continent. Mercedes, whose home market would be acutely affected by a shutdown in gas supplies, said it was looking at ways of "substituting the use of natural gas in vehicle production.

And the carmaker said it could reduce its usage by "around 50 percent". Mercedes was also steeling itself against a general economic downturn, but had "good reasons to remain confident, with ongoing strong demand", Kallenius said.—AFP

## Fed poised to attack inflation with rate hike

WASHINGTON: The Federal Reserve was poised to announce another big interest rate increase, the fourth this year, in its ongoing battle to tamp down price pressures that have been squeezing American families. US central bankers are hoping that their aggressive stance will start to cool red-hot inflation that topped nine percent in June, the highest in more than 40 years, without derailing the world's largest economy. President Joe Biden is paying the political cost for surging prices, which he blames mostly on Russia's war in Ukraine, which has sent global food and energy prices soaring.

Biden insists the American economy will avoid a recession, but even as his approval ratings have cratered, he has supported the Fed in its battle to quell inflation. Fed Chair Jerome Powell and others have made it clear they are willing to risk a downturn and will keep raising interest rates until they see clear evidence inflation is moving back towards the two percent goal. The policy-setting Federal Open Market Committee is widely expected to announce another three-quarter-point increase in the benchmark borrowing rate at the conclusion of its two-day policy meeting at 1800 GMT. From zero at the start of the year, the Fed has raised the policy lending rate to a range of 1.5 to 1.75 percent, which has pushed mortgage rates higher and slowed housing sales for five straight months. Economists say this has been the most aggressive Fed tightening cycle since the 1980s, when stagflation-a wageprice spiral and stagnant growth-crippled the US economy.

The challenge for policymakers is to quell inflation before it becomes dangerously entrenched, but without sending the world's largest economy into a recession that would reverberate around the globe. While prices have continued to rise, with home prices hitting a new record, there are signs the pace of the increases has begun to slow, which may allow the central bank to ease up on its rate increases.

Global oil prices are trending down, with the US benchmark WTI falling to below \$95 a barrel from its peak of more than \$123 in March, and gasoline prices at the pump have fallen 69 cents from the record of just over \$5 a gallon in mid-June.

Earnings season has gotten off to a rough start with less than stellar news from both Netflix and Snapchat's parent firm, a decidedly different world than seen during the pandemic surge.

The loss of 970,000 paying customers in the most recent quarter was not as big as expected, and left Netflix with just shy of 221 million subscribers. The company said in its earnings report that it had expected to gain a million paid subscribers in the current quarter.

At the same time, Snapchat's owner announced plans last week to "substantially" slow recruitment after bleak results wiped some 30 percent off the stock price of the tech firm, which is facing difficulties on several fronts.

Meanwhile, the job market has remained strong, consumer demand has not fallen dramatically, and surveys show inflation expectations in the months ahead have started to trend lower. Policymakers want to engineer a "soft landing," taming inflation without causing a downturn, but economists warn they face an increasingly narrow path to success and it would be easy to overshoot by being too aggressive.

"The Fed is now stuck between a rock and a hard place, with no easy way out without the economy feeling pain," KPMG chief economist Diane Swonk said in an analysis, noting that "Powell has started to underscore that reality by admitting a recession could occur." In fact, it is rare that the central bank moves so decidedly without causing a downturn, and there are signs of concern among Fed policymakers. Kansas City Fed President Esther George dissented at the June meeting, saying she preferred a smaller half-point rate hike and warning that going too fast could be "unsettling" and raise recession fears.—AFP

#### Gaming time has little effect on short-term mental health

he short-term mental-health impact of playing video games "is probably too small" to be noticeable, according to a major study by the University of Oxford published Wednesday. "Our study finds little to no evidence of connections between gameplay and well-being," said Andrew K. Przybylski, a researcher at the university's Oxford Internet Institute. The study surveyed 38,935 players from the Englishspeaking world, asking them to rate their mental well-being and comparing it with the amount of time they spent gaming in the previous two weeks.

"Many have warned about video games' possible addictive qualities and their potential harm to players' well-being, leading to far-reaching and widely contested health policy decisions," said the study, published by the Royal Society. In China, children are only allowed to game for one hour each day on Fridays, Saturdays and Sundays.

"Our results show that the impact of time spent playing video games on wellbeing is probably too small to be subjectively noticeable and not credibly different from zero," the study said. Game publishers including Sony, Microsoft and Nintendo provided researchers with the time each respondent spent playing, with their consent.

#### 'Don't go near': Japan beachgoers warned over biting dolphin

eachgoers in the Japanese region of Fukui have been warned to stay away from a displeased dolphin accused of biting swimmers, with officials urging visitors to "watch from afar". Beach attendants at the seafront in the central region on Wednesday set up a device that emits ultrasonic frequencies in a bid to repel the cantankerous creature, the city said. A sign has been put up warning dolphin fans not to touch the animal.

Local media said at least 10 incidents involving dolphin bites have been recorded by attendants at the beach since it officially opened for the summer on July 9. A local official told AFP that Fukui's fire department has been called over two incidents. both involving men in their 40s who were swimming near the local beach.

Injuries have been minor so far, but local authorities have warned of "potentially severe wounds". "Dolphins tend to be considered cute, but if you approach wild dolphins carelessly, you might get bitten and injured," Fukui prefectural police cautioned in a Twitter post Monday.

"If you spot any, don't go near them," the police said, citing the case of a man who was bitten on the hand on Sunday. The city believes the series of attacks are the work of single dolphin, which was first spotted near shore at a different beach in April, Masaki Yasui, an official from the tourism promotion department, told AFP.

"We understand that there are certain body parts where dolphins don't like to be touched, like the tip of its nose and its back fin," Yasui said. He said videos posted on Twitter showed beachgoers had been trying to touch the dolphin in those areas. "We encourage visitors to watch the dolphin from afar if they come across it," the official said. - AFP

### EYE-POPPING: SAUDI PRINCE UNVEILS MIRRORED SKYSCRAPER ECO-CITY

futuristic Saudi megacity is to feature two skyscrapers extending across a swathe of desert and mountain terrain, according to the latest disclosures on the project by the kingdom's de facto ruler. The parallel structures of mirror-encased skyscrapers extending over 170 kilometers (more than 100 miles), known collectively as The Line, form the heart of the Red Sea megacity NEOM, a plank of Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman's bid to diversify the Gulf state's oil-dependent economy.

First announced in 2017, NEOM has consistently raised eyebrows for proposed flourishes like flying taxis and robot maids, even as architects and economists have questioned its feasibility. In a presentation Monday night, Prince Mohammed sketched out an even more ambitious vision, describing a car-free utopia that would become the planet's most liveable city "by far".

Analysts noted, though, that plans for NEOM have changed course over the years, fuelling doubts about whether The Line will ever become reality. NEOM was once touted as a regional "Silicon Valley", a biotech and digital hub spread over 26,500 square kilometers (10,000 square miles). Now it's a vehicle for reimagining urban life on a footprint of just 34 square kilometers, and addressing what Prince Mohammed describes as "liveability and environmental crises". "The concept has morphed so much from its early conception that it's sometimes hard to determine its direction: scaling down, scaling up, or making an aggressive turn sideways," said Robert Mogielnicki of the Arab Gulf States Institute in Washington.

#### **Population boom**

Officials had earlier said NEOM's population would top one million, but Prince Mohammed said the number would actually hit 1.2 million by 2030 before climbing to nine million by 2045. The eye-popping total is part of a hoped-for nationwide



tal pledges by the kingdom, such as a vow to achieve net zero carbon emissions by 2060, have sparked scepticism from environmentalists.

NEOM is well-positioned to harness solar and wind energy, and plans are also afoot for the city to host the world's largest green hydrogen plant, said Torbjorn Soltvedt of risk intelligence company Verisk Maplecroft. "But the feasibility of NEOM as a whole is still unclear given the unprecedented scale and cost of the project," he said.

#### **Finding funds**

At just 200 meters (yards) wide, The Line is intended to be Saudi Arabia's answer to unchecked and wasteful urban sprawl, layering homes, schools and parks on top of each other in what planners term "Zero Gravity Urbanism". Residents will have "all daily needs" reachable within a five-minute walk, while also having access to other perks like outdoor skiing facilities and "a high-speed rail with an end-to-end transit of 20 minutes", according to a statement.

Though NEOM will operate under its own founding law, which is still being prepared, Saudi officials say they have no plans to waive the kingdom's alcohol ban. An airport is already operational at NEOM, and authorities announced in May it would begin receiving regular flights from Dubai, but it is unclear whether major construction of the megacity itself has commenced.

NEOM said Tuesday it would create 380,000 jobs by the end of the decade "whilst providing the ultimate work-life

balance". The "first phase" of the project, lasting until 2030, will cost 1.2 trillion Saudi riyals (roughly \$319 billion), Prince Mohammed said.

Besides government subsidies, potential sources of funding include the private sector and an initial public offering for NEOM expected in 2024, he said. Securing the necessary financing remains a potential challenge, though the current climate is more favorable than during the coronavirus pandemic that lowered oil prices. "But funding is only part of the equation... demand is harder to buy, especially when you're asking people to be part of an experiment on living and working in the future," Mogielnicki said.-AFP

#### Miners unearth pink diamond believed to be largest seen in 300 years

iners in Angola have unearthed a rare pure pink diamond that is believed to be the largest found in 300 years, the Australian site operator announced Wednesday. A 170 carat pink diamond - dubbed The Lulo Rose - was discovered at Lulo mine in the country's diamond-rich northeast and is among the largest pink diamonds ever found, the Lucapa Diamond Company said in a statement to investors.

The "historic" find of the Type IIa diamond, one of the rarest and purest forms of natural stones, was welcomed by the Angolan government, which is also a partner in the mine. "This record and spectacular pink diamond recovered from Lulo continues to showcase Angola as an important player on the world stage," Angola's Mineral Resources Minister Diamantino Azevedo said.

The diamond will be sold at international tender, likely at a dazzling price. Although The Lulo Rose would have to be cut and polished to realize its true value, in a process that can see a stone lose 50 percent of its weight, similar pink diamonds have sold for record-breaking prices. The 59.6 carat Pink Star was sold at a Hong Kong auction in 2017 for 71.2 million US dollars. It remains the most expensive diamond ever sold. — AFP

#### West Ham, Scamacca seal deal

LONDON: West Ham announced the signing of Italy striker Gianluca Scamacca on Tuesday from Sassuolo on a five-year deal. The 23-year-old will reportedly cost the Hammers an initial £30.5 million (\$37 million) with a further £5 million in add-ons. Scamacca had been linked with Juventus and Paris Saint-Germain after scoring 16 goals in 36 matches in Serie A last season. "I am really excited to join West Ham," said Scamacca. "I've waited a long time for this moment - it's been a dream to play in the Premier League. "I feel like West Ham is the perfect team for me. They showed they really wanted me and when I spoke to the manager there was an instant understanding." West Ham had been in the market for attacking reinforcements to lighten the load on Michail Antonio up front. "We've been looking to add more strength to our attacking options for a while, so we're delighted to have got Gianluca in," said West Ham boss David Moves.

#### Ramsey to end Juve contract

MILAN: Wales midfielder Aaron Ramsey has left Juventus a year before the end of his deal. the Italian club said on Tuesday. Ramsey, 31, joined Juve in 2019 as a free agent after spending almost eight years at Arsenal and won the Serie A title in his first campaign in Turin. Last season, he spent five months on loan at Rangers before helping his country to qualification for this year's World Cup with a play-off win over Ukraine. "Aaron Ramsey's contract with Juventus has been mutually terminated," the club posted on Twitter. Last week he was left out of Juve's squad for their pre-season tour in the United States. "I want to focus on the positives and overall I have enjoyed my time in Torino," Ramsey said in English on Instagram. "I will never forget this experience together," he added in Italian. Wales start their World Cup campaign against the United States on November 21 and will also face Iran and England in the group stage.

#### Fulham sign Swiss defender

LONDON: Fulham have signed Switzerland defender Kevin Mbabu from German club Wolfsburg for a fee reported to be 7.5 million euros (\$7.6 million) including add-ons. The 27year-old right-back has agreed a three-year contract at the Premier League club, who hold an option for a further 12 months. Mbabu, who has 22 caps for his country and previously had stints with Newcastle and Rangers, is initially targeting Premier League survival following Fulham's promotion as Championship winners. "I'm happy to be here as a Fulham Football Club player," he told FFCtv. "It's a relief and now I can focus on my goals and the club's goals, and help the team to be successful. "The first step is to stay in the Premier League, stay stable in the league, and then why not aim for the top 10?" Mbabu is the fourth summer signing for Fulham boss Marco Silva following the arrivals of Joao Palhinha, Andreas Pereira and Manor Solomon.

#### British sprinter out of Games

LONDON: Sprint star Dina Asher-Smith announced on Wednesday she had withdrawn from the England team for the Commonwealth Games in Birmingham due to a hamstring injury. Asher-Smith pulled up midway through the women's 4x100m relay at the world championships in Eugene, Oregon over the weekend. "Thankfully I've only got a light hamstring strain after pulling up in the 4x1 a few days ago," she said on Instagram. "No major issue and nothing to worry about. "But due to the short turnaround between the end of the worlds and the start of the Commonwealth Games in a few days' time I'm going to have to withdraw." Asher-Smith, 26, finished fourth in the 100m final in Eugene and won a bronze medal in the 200m before suffering her relay setback. She pulled up sharply midway through the third leg but still managed to hand the baton to team-mate Daryll Neita, with the team finishing sixth.

#### Bayern: Ronaldo doesn't fit

BERLIN: Bayern Munich chief executive Oliver Kahn said on Wednesday that making a move for Cristiano Ronaldo in the transfer market would not fit the club's "philosophy". "We discussed this topic-otherwise we wouldn't be doing our job properly," Kahn told German daily Bild. "Personally, I think Cristiano Ronaldo is one of the greatest-ever footballers. "But we came to the conclusion that, despite the esteem that we hold him in, he wouldn't have fitted our philosophy at the moment." BIRMINGHAM: The Commonwealth Games are sometimes seen as a quirky relic in the modern sporting calendar but former International Olympic Committee (IOC) marketing chief Michael Payne says they have consistently defied the doomsayers. The 22nd edition of the Games opens in Birmingham on Thursday, bringing together around 5,000 athletes from 72 nations and territoriesmostly former British colonies-to compete in 19 sports

Some track and field stars will be absent when the competition gets under way-just days after the end of the world championships in Eugene, Oregon. But there will still be plenty of big names on show at the event, which features sports as diverse as lawn bowls and marathon running. The Commonwealth Games are not on the scale of the Olympics that Birmingham once aspired to host-the city was beaten by Barcelona for the right to put on the 1992 Games-but officials hope they can provide a big economic boost for the area.

According to the Financial Times, the West Midlands Combined Authority estimates the event will be worth £1 billion (\$1.2 billion) to the regional economy. Payne, credited with transforming the IOC brand and finances through sponsorship, said the Commonwealth Games had shown remarkable resilience over the decades. "People have been talking of the demise of the Commonwealth Games for nearly half a century but they are still going, so I would not write them off just yet," he told AFP.

Another former IOC marketing executive, Terrence Burns, who since leaving the organization has played a role in five successful Olympic bid campaigns, said it was important for the event to find its own niche and evolve accordingly. "These other Games are not the Olympic Games but tend to try to mirror them in look, feel, and impact," he said. "That's just not possible or credible. "So I think they need to redefine 'success' and build their product accordingly.'

#### Japan eSports players with disabilities shoot down stereotypes

TOKYO: Street Fighter player Shunya Hatakeyama has muscular dystrophy, so he uses his chin to launch devastating combos. He is not the only Japanese gamer proving that disability is no barrier in eSports. Naoya Kitamura, who is blind and relies on sound to play beat 'em up game Tekken 7, also hopes that his skills in a billion-dollar industry will help make society more open-minded. "I'll block a move and the sound it makes will tell me what kind of move it was," Kitamura said. "Then I'll react and make my move," he told AFP, demonstrating a dizzying attack with Tekken character Lucky Chloe.

Competitive gaming is booming worldwide, with global eSports revenues estimated at more than \$1 billion, and many think it could one day be at the Olympics. The sector is not as big in Japan as in eSports-crazy China and South Korea, but it is gradually starting to take root. Keen to offer Japanese gamers with disabilities a chance to be part of the action, social welfare worker Daiki Kato founded a company called ePara in 2016.

Kato's firm employs players such as Hatakeyama

#### Titmus and McKeon lead power-packed **Australia at Games**

SYDNEY: Olympic champions Ariarne Titmus and Emma McKeon return to the pool at the Commonwealth Games with a gold rush and world records on their minds, heading an Australia swimming squad boasting "insane depth". After a breakout Tokyo Olympics where she dethroned American great Katie Ledecky in the 200m and 400m freestyle, the dominant Titmus carried her form into the Australian championships in May. After narrowly missing the long-standing 200m world record set in 2009, she broke Ledecky's world mark over 400m by 0.06 seconds, touching in 3min 56.40sec. Titmus, 21, then opted out of the world championships in Budapest, saving herself for the Commonwealth Games, where she will be a red-hot favorite.

"I am so excited and I think we've got a great team going in. It's insane the depth we have," said Titmus, the

and Kitamura, who are both 28, and gives them time to practice around their other duties, which include working on the company's website and helping organize gaming events. Hatakevama mostly enters Street Fighter V tournaments that are open to anyone-disabled or non-disabled-and says the beauty of fighting games is that "you can overcome handicaps and compete against different people". "When I play in a tournament I don't want my disability to be an issue," he said. "I want to move people with the way I play."

#### **Custom controller**

Hatakeyama was born with degenerative muscular dystrophy and has used a wheelchair since he was about six years old. He has always loved fighting games, but over the years his muscles weakened so much that he could not hold a controller.

Depressed, he quit playing for six years until he and a friend decided last year to design and make a custom controller that he could operate with his chin. Using his fingers to press buttons on his computer keyboard, Hatakeyama says he quickly got back into the groove. Now he also coaches other players with disabilities, talking them through complicated combos and offering tips on different characters. "If I had never played fighting games, I don't think I would try to find solutions whenever I encountered something difficult," he said.

Many of ePara's gamers are new to eSports and do not have much experience of competing in tournaments. Company chief Kato believes there is a grow-

McKeon has her sights set on beating the all-time record of 10 gold medals for an Australian, currently held jointly by fellow swimmers Ian Thorpe, Susie O'Neill and Leisel Jones. She is again set to contest the 50m and 100m freestyle, but has serious competition from teen sensation Mollie O'Callaghan, who stunned Swedish world record holder Sarah Sjostrom in Budapest to win the 100m free among her six medals.

McKeon said she would need to be at her best given the rapidly improving next generation. "You never want to get too comfortable or complacent otherwise you're not going to keep working hard and keep striving to be better," she said. The Commonwealth Games hold a special place in McKeon's heart, with her father Ron winning swimming golds in 1978 and 1982. Her mother, Susie Woodhouse, also competed in 1982

## Juventus and Barcelona draw 2-2 in US friendly

#### Real Madrid held by America in US friendly

LOS ANGELES: Ousmane Dembele and Moise Kean scored two goals apiece as Barcelona and Juventus fought to an entertaining 2-2 draw in their US pre-season friendly in Dallas on Tuesday. French winger Dembele fired Barcelona ahead after 34 minutes at the Cotton Bowl, wriggling past Juventus players Juan Cuadrado and Sandro before beating Juve goalkeeper Wojciech Szczesny to make it 1-0.

But Juventus hit back five minutes later with Colombian wing-back Cuadrado making amends with a pinpoint low cross that found Kean who tapped in past Barcelona goalkeeper Marc-Andre ter Stegen. Barcelona were soon back in front again, however, and once again the goal came as Dembele punished poor defending. Cuadrado was again at fault, with Dembele skipping past the South American's covering tackle and then cutting past Manuel Locatelli to shoot past Szczesny for a 2-1 lead.

Barcelona coach Xavi Hernandez made a flurry of changes at half-time, with Dembele making way for new Brazilian signing Raphina. The former Leeds striker made an instant impact, blasting a long-range shot that Szczesny parried over the bar. Despite Barcelona's bright start to the half, it was Juventus who scored next with Kean tucking away a rebound after deft approach play by Denis Zakaria and Locatelli on 52 minutes.

Barcelona came closest to the breakthrough goal, and hit the woodwork twice in a matter of seconds on 68 minutes. Raphina rattled the crossbar with a curling free kick and from the rebound Ansu Fati's curling shot from the edge of the area cannoned back off the post. That was as close as either side came to breaking the deadlock, while Barcelona's new signing Robert Lewandowski struggled to make much of an impression before being substituted midway through the second half.

#### Real held in US

In another development, Karim Benzema and Eden Hazard were on target as Spanish giants Real Madrid were held to a 2-2 draw by Mexican side Club America in their pre-season friendly on Tuesday. Former Real Madrid player Alvaro Fidalgo's 82ndminute penalty denied Real victory in a game played on a makeshift surface at Oracle Park, the home of the San Francisco Giants baseball team. America took the lead with a shock early goal after just five minutes, as Henry Martin latched onto a shot by Miguel Layun and helped it into the net.

But Real responded with an equalizer from Benzema after 22 minutes. The French international surged towards the penalty area and played a neat one-two with Marco Asensio before curling a low finish into the bottom right-hand corner past Guillermo Ochoa. Real coach Carlo Ancelotti made wholesale changes at half-time, with seven substitutions, which included Benzema making way for Rodrygo and Asensio coming off for Hazard.

Hazard did not take long to make an impact, converting a 55th-minute spot kick after America defender Salvador Reyes was adjudged to have fouled Lucas Vazquez in the box. Hazard's penalty looked like settling a drab encounter but America got back on level terms eight minutes from time when Vinicius made the slightest of contact with Fidalgo

#### New Japan police raids over Tokyo Olympics claims

TOKYO: Japanese police carried out new raids on Wednesday over allegations a 2020 Tokyo Olympics board member received money from a sponsor he signed a consulting contract with, local media reported. Haruyuki Takahashi, 78, is suspected of receiving more than \$300,000 from high street business suit retailer Aoki Holdings Inc, an "official partner" of last year's pandemic-delayed mega-event. That could reportedly constitute bribery because Takahashi was considered a quasicivil servant who was not permitted to accept money or gifts related to his position. Takahashi's Tokyo home was raided by investigators on Tuesday morning according to reports.

And local media said searches were conducted Wednesday at the home of former Aoki chairman Hironori Aoki, 83, and the disbanded Tokyo 2020 organizing committee office at the Tokyo Metropolitan Government. The Tokyo Olympics organizing committee wound down operations last month but it maintains a presence to deal with assets and liabilities. The Tokyo prosecutors' office told AFP it could not comment on individual cases.

Tokyo Governor Yuriko Koike told reporters the situation was "extremely regrettable" and she would "keep a close eye on developments." "I have told the organizing committee that they should co-operate fully with this investigation," she said. A sports consulting firm run by Takahashi is suspected of receiv-

Takahashi told the Yomiuri Shimbun newspaper last week that the money his company received was for consultancy work. "There was no conflict of interest whatsoever with my position as an organizing committee board member," he was quoted as saying. Aoki issued a statement last week saying it had no comment on reports of the payments. Takahashi, a former executive at Japan's biggest advertising agency, Dentsu, served on the Tokyo

#### Neymar to be tried over irregularities in Barcelona transfer

MADRID: Neymar is due to face trial in October over alleged irregularities in his transfer to Barcelona, judicial sources said on Wednesday. The Brazilian international, his parents and former Barcelona presidents Sandro Rosell and Josep Maria Bartomeu will be tried for alleged corruption related to the forward's move from Santos to Barcelona in 2013.

Rosell and Bartomeu will also face fraud charges in the trial which is scheduled to take place from October 17 to 31. Neymar left Barcelona for Paris Saint-Germain in 2017 for a world-record 222 million euros, but it is his move from boyhood club Santos to Barca which has caused controversy. The case stems from a complaint by Brazilian group DIS, the former owner of a percentage of the player's rights.

Barcelona officially said the transfer cost 57.1 million euros (\$63.6 million), with 40 million euros going to Neymar's family and 17.1 million to Santos, but Spanish prosecutors later said it actually cost at least 83.3 million euros. DIS, which received 6.8 million of the 17.1 million euros paid to Santos, have alleged that Barca and Neymar joined forces to hide the real amount of the transfer.

On Wednesday, DIS said it was "satisfied" that there is now a date for the trial of the case, which has been in the Spanish courts since 2016. The prosecution has requested a two-year prison sentence for Neymar, but he has insisted he was only focused on football and that he blindly trusted his father, who is also his agent. Bartomeu took over the Barcelona presidency from his good friend Rosell, after the latter resigned in January 2014 as he faced charges of corruption over the transfer.

In 2020, Barcelona said they had been cleared by the Court of Arbitration for Sport over claims of fraud. A document in 2020 showed Neymar owed more unpaid tax than any other individual on a Spanish authorities' blacklist. The tax office refused to say whether Neymar's presence on that list was linked to his transfer from Santos. Barcelona agreed to pay a fine of 5.5 million euros to avoid a trial in 2016 over alleged tax fraud in the signing of Neymar. Then-president Bartomeu said at the time there had been a "tax planning error".

Neymar has also been in trouble with Brazilian tax authorities, being fined for tax evasion in Brazil. The 30-year-old has recently been playing on PSG's pre-season tour of Japan as they build up for the season-opening French Champions' Trophy against Nantes on Sunday in Tel-Aviv. Neymar, Brazil's second highest goalscorer of all time behind Pele, will be hoping to lead his country to a record-extending sixth World Cup title in Oatar later this year. —AFP

#### Ludwig wins stage 3 of women's Tour, Vos stays in yellow

EPERNAY: Dane Cecilie Uttrup Ludwig outmuscled Marianne Vos to win stage three of the women's Tour de France on Tuesday but the veteran Dutch rider held on to the yellow jersey. The day after a nightmare stage two for her FDJ-Suez team, marked by the abandonment of title contender Marta Cavalli, Ludwig, who also battled back from a fall on Monday, produced a vintage performance in the Champagne region.

After two relatively flat rides, the peloton had to face its first climbs as they took on the 133.6km course from Reims to Epernay. Eleven riders slugged it out over the final stages, with Vos working hard to rejoin the leaders after being dropped. The 35-year-old, who took over the yellow jersey with victory in stage two on Monday, kicked hard but it was the younger legs of 26-year-old Ludwig who powered through the line first.

"I have to say that it feels like such a good comeback after yesterday," said a tearful Ludwig who was wearing the jersey of Danish champion. "I just love how the team kept the fighting spirit. We knew that today was a super good day and if I had the legs, I could try and go for the win. "To actually do it and become a Tour de France stage winner, and in this jersey, it doesn't get better."

Team Jumbo-Visma's Vos finished two seconds behind, closely shadowed by South African Ashleigh Moolman, Italians Silvia Persico and Elisa Lono Borghini and Pole Katarzyna Niewiadoma. "I didn't come into the last corner in the best position but I just kept fighting," added Ludwig, whose stage win came just two days after her compatriot Jonas Vingegaard won the men's Tour de France title. "What a year for Denmark." —AFP

SHEFFIELD: England's women will be talked about "all over the world" said coach Sarina Wiegman after thrashing Sweden 4-0 in Sheffield on Tuesday to reach the Euro 2022 final. After semi-final heartache in the last three major tournaments, it was fourth time lucky for the Lionesess to the delight of the home crowd of 29,000 at Bramall Lane to set up a clash against Germany or France. England have never won a major tournament in the women's game, but on this form will take some stopping in front of a sold out Wembley on Sunday.

Goals either side of half-time from Beth Mead and Lucy Bronze put the hosts well on course to inflict Sweden's first defeat from open play since 2019. A record crowd for a women's Euro of 87,000 is expected at Wembley for the final, hoping England will end a 56-year wait for a major title in either the men's or women's game. "I am going in my own bunker," added Wiegman on the hype that will follow in the upcoming days. "We noticed that a little bit. We want to inspire the nation, I think that's what we are doing and we hope we make a difference. That the whole country is proud of us and even more girls and boys start playing football."

Sweden's unbeaten run smashed Sweden's only defeat in the last 34

matches came in a penalty shootout in the gold medal match at last year's Olympics. The number two ranked side in the world showed why early on as England struggled to contain the Swedish threat on the counter-attack. Mary Earps was forced into a fine save by Sofia Jakobsson inside 20 seconds before Arsenal striker Stina Blackstenius crashed a header off the bar. "The first 25 mins I felt we had enough chances," said Sweden boss Peter Gerhardsson.

"When you play this type of opponent you need to be effective with the chances that you get." In keeping with their tournament, England were far more clinical when their chances

game. Blackstenius' club teammate Mead extended her lead in the race for the Golden Boot to two with a perfect control and volleyed finish from Bronze's cross on 34 minutes.

Mead has also now matched the record of six goals in a single women's European Championship held by Germany's Inka Grings at Euro 2009. That was also the last time England reached the final of a major women's tournament and Bronze's header from Mead's corner three minutes after half-time put England well on the way to Wembley. Any Swedish hopes of a fightback were truly extinguished on 68 minutes with a goal that will be replayed the world over.

A brilliant England move involving Keira Walsh and Kirby teed up Russo, whose initial finish was straight at Lindahl. Yet, despite the presence of two Swedish defenders, with her back to goal and the angle narrowing, Russo produced a moment of magic to backheel the ball with enough power to catch Lindahl napping. The veteran Swedish goalkeeper is closing in on 200 caps, but will want to forget this one as she then failed to keep out her former Chelsea teammate Kirby's effort that trickled over the line.—AFP

#### Stenson ready for LIV debut as Trump course hosts event

NEW YORK: Sacked European Ryder Cup captain Henrik Stenson makes his LIV Golf debut on Friday as Donald Trump's Bedminster course hosts the second US event of the rebel Saudi-backed circuit against a backdrop of protests. Stenson was stripped of his Ryder Cup captaincy last week after confirmation he had opted to sign with LIV in a deal reportedly worth close to \$50 million. It was just the latest bombshell to detonate across the golfing world, which has been plunged into a virtual civil war this year with the emergence of the LIV circuit.

The upstart series, fronted by Greg Norman, is bankrolled by Saudi Arabia's Public Investment Fund, and has sought to lure top golfers with contracts which in some cases run into the hundreds of millions of dollars. Human Rights groups have criticised the venture, saying it is a "sportswashing" exercise being used to boost Saudi Arabia's international reputation. Stenson's decision to join LIV follows defections by several stars from the United States and Europe, including major winners such as Dustin Johnson, Brooks Koepka, Patrick Reed and Bryson DeChambeau.

Those players have all been hit with indefinite bans from the PGA Tour. Several of Stenson's former European Ryder Cup team-mates, including Ian Poulter, Sergio Garcia and Lee Westwood have also signed with LIV Golf. This week's tournament has an extra dimension given that it is taking place at former US President Trump's Trump National course at Bedminster, New Jersey. Bedminster was due to have hosted this year's PGA Championship major, but was stripped of that right last year in the wake of the January 6 riot by the former president's supporters at the US Capitol.



Trump: 'Take the money'

Trump has subsequently emerged as a vocal advocate for LIV, last week urging golfers to "take the money" and sign with the circuit. In an interview with the Wall Street Journal published on Tuesday, avid golfer Trump again spoke admiringly of LIV, describing it as "one of the hottest things to have happened in sports." "I think LIV has been a great thing for Saudi Arabia, for the image of Saudi Arabia," Trump told the paper. "I think it's going to be an incredible investment from that standpoint, and that's more valuable than lots of other things because you can't buy that-even with billions of dollars."

Trump has faced protests for hosting the tournament by relatives of people killed and injured in the September 11, 2001 attacks on New York and Washington. Fifteen of the 19 hijackers involved in the atrocity were Saudi nationals. In an open letter to Trump released last week, the 9/11 Justice group urged him to cut ties to LIV Golf. Another Trump golf property, Trump National at Doral in Florida, will stage the October 27-30 finale to the series. "It is difficult for us to fully express the extreme pain, frustration and anger this upcoming tournament at Bedminster causes our community," the group wrote. —AFP
