



MoI bans unlicensed rally

KUWAIT: The interior ministry on Tuesday rejected a request by opposition groups and activists to stage a rally outside the National Assembly on Wednesday to protest against the state of political paralysis in the country because a new Cabinet has not been formed and the Assembly has stopped holding sessions. The interior ministry said the groups cannot stage the rally without a license from the ministry and warned them against violating the law and the constitution. — B Izzak

UAE announces monkeypox case

DUBAI: The United Arab Emirates became the first Gulf country to announce a case of monkeypox on Tuesday, insisting it was "fully prepared" to handle any outbreak. The appearance of the virus in a number of countries has caused alarm after the coronavirus pandemic. The case was found in a 29-year-old woman arriving from West Africa, who is receiving medical treatment, the Ministry of Health and Prevention said. — AFP

Turkish FM visits West Bank

RAMALLAH: Turkey's top diplomat announced Tuesday a raft of new agreements to bolster the struggling Palestinian economy, during the first high-level Turkish visit to the Zionist-occupied West Bank in 15 years. During Foreign Minister Mevlut Cavusoglu's trip to Ramallah, Turkey signed nine new pacts with the embattled Palestinian Authority, ranging from agriculture to education and trade. — AFP

Two killed in Abu Dhabi blast

ABU DHABI: Two people were killed and 120 injured in a gas cylinder explosion in a restaurant in Abu Dhabi, police said. Initial reports "showed that 64 people sustained minor injuries, 56 others were moderately wounded, and two people died", police tweeted. The blast on Monday set off a fire that damaged the facades of six buildings and a number of stores before being brought under control. — AFP

Malaysia curbs chicken exports

KUALA LUMPUR: Malaysia's move to cut exports of chickens to control soaring prices and combat domestic shortages ruffled feathers Tuesday, with neighboring Singapore warning of supply disruptions. Prime Minister Ismail Sabri Yaakob announced late Monday that the export of up to 3.6 million chickens a month would be halted from June 1 "until prices and supply stabilize". — AFP

Two pilots killed in Iran jet crash

TEHRAN: Two Iranian air force pilots were killed Tuesday when their F-7 training aircraft crashed in Isfahan province south of Tehran, the state broadcaster reported. "The aircraft's two pilots were killed in the accident which took place this morning in Anarak district," the broadcaster's website said. The fighter jet was on a training mission when it crashed. — AFP

KUWAIT: The Foreign Terrorist Fighters (FTF) Working Group held a meeting on Tuesday in Kuwait to discuss and share insights on FTFs and the legal and administrative challenges, with a focus on issues around their prosecution and accountability. Hamad Al-Mashaan, Kuwaiti assistant foreign minister for international cooperation and development, stressed the country's support for international efforts in reaching peace and combating terrorist groups during the opening ceremony.

The meeting is important to achieve peace in conflict areas by blocking all sources of terrorist threats, he said, adding that it aims to follow up on the joint and strategic efforts in confronting the damage resulting from FTFs, in addition to finding a clear mecha-

sm for their return and integration into society Kuwait has made joint efforts with the international community in combating terrorism financing, in compliance with its effective role against the extremist Islamic State (IS) group, Mashaan noted, along with its pioneering role in facilitating the transfer of 186 members of fighters' families in conflict areas and ensuring their access to their countries. The one-day meeting will also discuss all main challenges for the

Quad nations warn against 'change by force'

TOKYO: Leaders of Japan, India, Australia and the United States warned Tuesday against attempts to "change the status quo by force" as concerns grow about whether China could invade self-ruled Taiwan. A joint statement by the so-called Quad bloc avoided any direct mention of China's growing military power in the region, but left little doubt about where its

concerns lie. The carefully worded document also made reference to the conflict in Ukraine, but without offering any joint position on the Russian invasion, which India has pointedly declined to condemn. The Quad's other members have been less coy about their view that a strong response to Russia's war is needed, one that would deter other

countries, including China. "As Russia's invasion of Ukraine is shaking the fundamental principles of the international order... (we) confirmed that unilateral attempts to change the status quo by force will never be tolerated anywhere, particularly in the Indo-Pacific region," Japan's Prime Minister Fumio Kishida said, using another term for the Asia-Pacific.

Xinjiang leak sheds new light on China's 'reeducation' camps

BEIJING: A leak of thousands of photos and official documents from China's Xinjiang has shed new light on the violent methods used to enforce mass internment in the region, researchers said Tuesday. The files, obtained by academic Adrian Zenz, were published as UN human rights chief Michelle Bachelet begins a long-awaited and controversial trip to

Activists say Chinese authorities have detained more than one million Uyghurs and other mostly Muslim minorities in a network of detention centers and prisons in the region, which Beijing has defended as training centers. But the trove of police photographs and internal documents - sent

to Zenz by an anonymous source who hacked into official databases in Xinjiang - add to evidence that the mass internments were far from voluntary, with leaked documents showing top leaders in Beijing calling for a forceful crackdown.

The files include a 2017 internal speech by Chen Quanguo, a former Communist Party secretary in Xinjiang, in which he allegedly orders guards to shoot to kill anyone who tries to escape, and calls for officials in the region to "exercise firm control over religious believers". — AFP (See Page 5)

Young voters shake grip of Lebanon parties

BEIRUT: Lebanese law student Charbel Chaaya spent the election campaign distributing flyers in Beirut and trying to convince his parents to vote for independents to shake the grip of established parties. The 21year-old activist is one of many young voters who went against their parents' political views, and helped propel at least 13 independents to parliament last week for the first time in decades.

"My parents think I'm too idealistic, that this country will never change," he said, adding that his father voted for a traditional Christian party, the Lebanese Forces. "There is a generational gap," Chaaya said. "Our generation knows that sectarian and traditional politics simply don't work anymore." Chaaya is part of a new generation seeking a progressive approach to politics, blaming established parties dating from Lebanon's 1975-1990 civil war for an economic meltdown that has pushed thousands to flee the country.

This has widened a generational gap between young people voting for change and an older generation often **Continued on Page 6**



Quota law only way to achieve women's goals in Kuwait: Aseeri

Fake accounts stereotyped negative image of women's participation



KUWAIT: Women's participation in political life in Kuwait in the last few years has been experiencing a severe weakness at all levels, starting from their poor participation in elections in the country, such as those of the National Assembly, Municipal Council or cooperative societies, to not holding any political gatherings and seminars that discuss

This month for example, only one woman ran and lost in the Municipal Council election, which is considered one of the most essential political platforms for all sectors in the country, such as monitoring the implementation of laws and regulations for general health and education, and for the approval and organizing of construction and urban projects.

Declining political performance, frustration among women and stereotyping are the reasons for women's absence from participating in political life in Kuwait, according to former minister of social affairs Ghadeer Aseeri. "Politicians who consider themselves opponents of women's rights are far from knowing anything about the Kuwaiti constitution," Aseeri told Kuwait Times.

She added that the education system in Kuwait, approval from their male guardians to carry out directly or indirectly, calls to isolate women politically, referring to electoral lists and events at local universities that are exclusively for men. "Fake accounts on social media have succeeded to type-



cast in society's mind a negative image about women who participate in elections and wear specific types of clothes," she said.

Meanwhile, "the parliament has neglected women's issues for a very long time, such as the personal status law, divorce law, housing rights," or scrapping the law that requires women to obtain

medical procedures, she added. As a result, Aseeri said women are not participating in political life in Kuwait, because of the "general feeling of frustration among them".

Quota law

Regarding solutions to empower women in political life, Aseeri emphasized "passing a women's quota law is the only way to achieve our goal, and we expect it to be approved soon". "A quota is an international system that was approved to give members of a society equal rights. It's a globally successful system and used in more than 100 countries around the world," she said.

On the other hand, Aseeri pointed out that the absence of women from political life affects the level of education and increases violence against women. Aseeri added the world notices women's absence in diplomatic representation or in leadership positions at embassies, which shows inequality in giving women their rights in Kuwait.

Women in Kuwait have been demanding in the past years several basic rights, especially for Kuwaiti women who have married men of a different



nationality, such as granting citizenship and permanent residence for their children, housing rights for divorced women, the right to obtain official documents and certificates for their children and scrapping a law that approves marrying or divorcing a woman without her knowledge.

Kuwait calls for greater role to boost competition

KUWAIT: Chairman of Kuwait's Competition Protection Agency (CPA) welcomed the third Arab Competition Forum as an important platform for promotion of cooperation among the relevant authorities in the Arab region. The Forum, organized by the Economic and Social Commission for Western Asia (ESCWAS) in Oman, is a step towards improvement of economic growth and good governance, Dr Rashid Al-Ajmi said in a speech to the opening session of the event on Tuesday. "Competition plays a great role in catalyzing economic growth amid the current challenging conditions and the negative impacts of the coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic," he pointed out.

Dr Ajmi stressed the need of regional economic integration to realize the goals of sustainable development, noting that the State of Kuwait gives high priority to "the national policy of protection." "This policy is a national development project which aims to upgrade the rules and procedures related to protection of competition, facilitate orderly investment and prevent fraudulent behavior," he explained. On behalf of Kuwait, Dr Ajmi expressed gratitude to Oman and ESCWAS for holding the Forum and providing an opportunity for competition project agencies in the region to exchange expertise in this regard.

Dr Abdullah Al-Arisi, CEO of CPA, said Kuwait believes in the need of realizing regional economic integration and is keen on collaboration in all areas, particularly commerce, industry and investment. "Kuwait's national plan aims to create the conditions conducive to free trade, sustainable development and activated competition which could lead to revived economic activities," he affirmed. Meanwhile, Oman's Minister of Commerce and Industry Qais Al-Yousef said the two-day event will build on the momentum of the first and second forums. Competition authorities, government officials, experts and academics, both from within and beyond the Arab region, are gathering to discuss the future of competition policy,

The Forum is being held in collaboration with the United Nations Conference on Trade and Development, the Organization for Economic Co-operation and Development, the International Trade Center, the League of Arab States and the Ministry of Commerce and Industry of Oman. The Forum, guided by international best practices, aims to collect concrete recommendations on future activities related to advancing and enforcing competition policy and thereby inform competition policymaking in the Arab region. —KUNA

Kuwait empowers youth, seeks their development: Official

CAIRO: President of the Arab Parliament Adel Al-Asoumi said on Tuesday the State of Kuwait took part in all regional events which helps activate joint Arab action. He welcomed Kuwait's participation in the Arab economic forum, themed bilateral trade and privatepublic role in economic integration. Kuwait remains food secure, keeps eye on monkeypox: Cabinet

Ministerial committee formed to bolster food security

KUWAIT: Kuwait is committed to its food security in light of global concerns over the price and supply of key staples, while it continues to monitor the global spread of monkeypox, the Cabinet said on Monday. In order to enhance food security and ensure the adequate availability of major staples, the government has formed an ad hoc ministerial committee to look into the matter after a surge in food prices triggered by the Russia-Ukraine conflict, it underlined.

The prices of commodities will be under the supervision and monitoring of the Ministry of Commerce and Industry to maintain food security



for households in Kuwait, Minister of Commerce and Industry Fahad Al-Shuraian said. Speaking to KUNA and Kuwait Television after the Cabinet meeting, Shuraian affirmed that the ministry was able to maintain prices of local commodities and products despite the hike in global prices due to war and other mishaps.

Kuwait imports 95 percent of food products and any increase in prices was reflective of the alarming global situation, indicated the minister, noting that the Cabinet meeting had focused on establishing a

ministerial committee tasked with bolstering food security. The committee will be headed by Deputy Prime Minister, Minister of Oil and Minister of State for Cabinet Affairs Dr Mohammad Al-Fares and includes the membership of several ministers, added Shuraian. He revealed that the Cabinet had instructed several state departments to secure essential commodities and make them readily available to the public.

On the global spread of monkeypox, Health Ministry Assistant Undersecretary for Public Health Dr Buthaina Al-Mudhaf told the Cabinet that health authorities are taking stringent precautions to keep the virus at bay. There have been no reported cases of monkeypox in Kuwait, the government's spokesman Tareq Al-Mezrem said after the Cabinet meeting, stressing that the health ministry continues to monitor the situation on a global level.

Two days after Kuwait held municipal elections, the Cabinet thanked all state bodies involved for their efforts to organize the vote, saying the process panned out in an orderly and seamless fashion. The Cabinet went on to congratulate the newly-elected municipal council, wishing the body every success as it seeks to bring the wishes and aspirations of Kuwaitis to fruition. — KUNA

Australian University signs MoU with KIPIC

KUWAIT: The Australian University (AU) has signed a memorandum of understanding (MoU) with the Kuwait Integrated Petroleum Industries Company (KIPIC). The agreement aims to enhance cooperation between both parties and provide opportunities for AU students and KIPIC employees to receive training and develop their abilities and skillsets in their careers.

On the other hand, the agreement will provide various benefits for both parties including the creation of internship opportunities for AU students at KIPIC, and in return AU faculty members to provide training programs for KIPIC employees in their Training Centers. In addition, AU students will have the opportunity to relate their graduation projects to KIPIC operations by having real case studies. Furthermore, in order to maintain mutual benefit between both parties; a steering committee with members from AU and KIPIC will be established to meet regularly and oversee the execution of the MoU, and to formulate further methods and processes of cooperation between both parties.

Biden gets presidential whiplash

Powerful abroad but punished at home

Joe Biden had a document flown to him on one continent from a second, so he could order \$40 billion to support an ally's war on a third. The latest giant US aid package for Ukraine was delivered from Washington to a Seoul hotel last week, allowing Biden to affix his signature while on his first trip to Asia since taking office.

It's in moments like this one that US presidents abroad experience near superhero strength. Racking up miles on Air Force One, Biden may even be forgiven for feeling he can change the world. Which is why returning to Washington, as Biden does Tuesday, can be a nasty shock. Globetrotting is one thing.

Pour more money and weaponry than any other country into Ukraine's fight against Russia? Biden did that at the stroke of a pen while in South Korea on Saturday. Poke China with a vow to defend Taiwan against invasion, even if that's not exactly US policy? A simple "yes" to a reporter's question Monday about whether this could happen set the diplomatic world abuzz.

How about bringing 13 countries-accounting for 40 percent of global GDP-into a new trade framework that only hours earlier skeptics said would struggle to attract applicants? He did that in Tokyo on Monday too. But back in the White House, Biden will come back to earth.

Air Force One will touch down at Joint Base Andrews outside Washington and, as if by magic,

TOKYO: Most people would send an email. But Biden the globe-striding giant will shrink into Biden, the deeply unpopular leader, blamed for everything and whose Democratic party looks likely to lose power in a few months. It's whiplash that many US presidents have suffered-and especially acute for Biden.

Unparalleled American clout

The 79-year-old took office in 2021 with big dreams. At home, he wanted to heal the "soul" of America, unite the country and bring back oldfashioned centrist politics after four wrecking ball years of Donald Trump. Abroad, he wanted to take on what he calls an existential threat from autocratic regimes in places like Russia and China.

Sixteen months later, the first job's not going too well. Domestic policy depends heavily on congressional approval, and Democrats have only the slimmest of possible majorities in Congress, with just two centrist Democratic senators repeatedly blocking Biden's goals.

Come the midterm elections in November, polls show even that fragile advantage will likely be annihilated by vengeful Republicans, ensuring a miserable next two years for the oldest person ever in the presidency. Job number two, though, is going better-and that's not necessarily a surprise.

Presidents get to call the shots on foreign policy, all while benefitting from extraordinary, almost imperial levels of logistical support. In Seoul and Tokyo, Biden roared through the streets in motor-

Xinjiang leak sheds new light on China's 're-education' camps

BEIJING: A leak of thousands of photos and official documents from China's Xinjiang has shed new light on the violent methods used to enforce mass internment in the region, researchers said Tuesday. The files, obtained by academic Adrian Zenz, were published as UN human rights chief Michelle Bachelet begins a long-awaited and controversial trip to Xinjiang.

Activists say Chinese authorities have detained more than one million Uyghurs and other mostly Muslim minorities in a network of detention centres and prisons in the region, which Beijing has defended as training centres. But the trove of police photographs and internal documents-sent to Zenz by an anonymous source who hacked into official databases in Xinjiangadd to evidence that the mass internments were far from voluntary, with leaked documents showing top leaders in Beijing including President Xi Jinping calling for a forceful crackdown.

The files include a 2017 internal speech by Chen Quanguo, a former Communist Party secretary in Xinjiang, in which he allegedly orders guards to shoot to kill anyone who tries to escape, and calls for officials in the region to "exercise firm control over religious believers". A 2018 internal speech by public security minister Zhao Kezhi mentions direct orders from Xi to increase the capacity of detention facilities.

After initially denying their existence, Beijing has claimed the facilities are vocational training schools, attended voluntarily and aimed at stamping out religious extremism. But the leaked documents give an insight into how leaders saw the minority population as a security threat, with Zhao warning that more than two million people in southern Xinjiang alone had been

UK PM Johnson under fire over 'Partygate' photos

LONDON: UK Prime Minister Boris Johnson on Tuesday faced renewed accusations of lying, after photos emerged of him drinking at a Downing Street party during lockdown in 2020. The revelations came as a senior civil servant was expected to publish her long-awaited full report into the "Partygate" scandal, despite claims that Johnson was trying to have it dropped.

A slew of revelations earlier this year about lockdown-breaking parties caused widespread political and public anger, and put Johnson's position in jeopardy. But the heat was taken out of a potential mutiny from his own MPs by the war in Ukraine, and his hawkish support for President Volodymyr

The photos published late Monday by ITV News were taken during a leaving party for Johnson's communications chief Lee Cain on November 13, 2020, days after the government ordered a second lockdown, and banned household mixing.

Johnson can be seen raising a glass and chatting

More than 2,800 police photos of Xinjiang detainees included minors such as 17-year-old Zeytunigul Ablehet, detained for listening to an illegal speech, and 16-year-old Bilal Qasim, apparently sentenced for being related to other detainees.

The details echo a separate police list leaked earlier to AFP which showed the government crackdown snaring hundreds of people at a time from villages, often many from the same household. "The sort of paranoid threat perception comes out in these files, and the internal justification for why one has to move against an entire population," said Zenz in video comments published alongside the leaked files.

Zenz works for the US-based non-profit organisation the Victims of Communism Memorial Foundation. The files, parts of which have been verified by multiple news organisations including the BBC and Le Monde, also provide a window into life in detention facilities. —AFP

with several people around a table with bottles of wine and food. Police have investigated the event as part of their probe into "Partygate" and fined one person, but not Johnson.

When he was asked in parliament last December about the gathering, he insisted there was no party on that date and that no rules were broken. Johnson has been fined over a surprise birthday party he attended at Downing Street in June 2020, but was not fined for any other event.

The deputy leader of the main opposition Labour party, Angela Rayner, said it was "astonishing" that Johnson was not fined for the November gathering. She told ITV News that it looked "pretty clear" there was a party that was not a work event, calling it "pretty shocking" he had not been fined for it.

"He knew that he broke the rules, and he's known it all along and yet he's tried to get away with it," she added. "He's tried to lie to the British public, and he's tried to lie to parliament," Rayner said.

But Transport Secretary Grant Shapps sought to defend Johnson on Tuesday, saying the new pictures showed he was "clearly not" partying. "It looks to me he was asked to go and thank a member of staff who was leaving, raises a glass to them and I imagine comes in and out pretty quick, which is presumably why the police have not issued a fixed-penalty notice to the Prime Minister," Shapps told BBC radio. —AFP

Millions of Syrian refugees in Turkey left in limbo

Politicians use us as an election campaign material

SANLIURFA, **Turkey:** Samira hears the same message from Turkish politicians on the television day and night: Syrian refugees like her must return home. But her home near Damascus is still not safe, she says.

The 44-year-old from Ghouta is one of the hundreds of thousands of refugees in Turkey's Sanliurfa province, which shares a long border with Syria.

Civil war in Samira's homeland is estimated to have killed nearly half a million people and displaced millions since it began with a brutal crackdown of anti-government protests in 2011. Turkey has fervently opposed Syrian President Bashar al-Assad, backing rebels calling for his removal and opening its doors to refugees.

But a new wave of economic turbulence, which has seen inflation spike and the value of the lira drop, has put Turkey's 3.7 million Syrian population under enormous strain.

Samira said she has never felt so much pressure since she fled to Turkey in 2019. "I don't think about going back, they destroyed our house. The situation is bad over there," she told AFP from her modest ground floor flat in the city of Sanliurfa, which is home to around half a million Syrian refugees — a quarter of the province's population.

Refugees fear they will be used as a scapegoat for Turkey's problems in the 2023 electoral campaign, as President Recep Tayyip Erdogan faces rising public anger over their presence.

'Very scared'

The main opposition, the Republican People's Party (CHP), has promised to send them back to Syria, while the leader of the far-right Victory Party has admitted funding a viral social media video aimed at scaring Turks about a "silent invasion" of migrants.

Earlier this month, Erdogan said Ankara was aiming to encourage a million Syrian refugees to return to "safe zones" on the Turkey-Syria border by building them housing and local infrastructure.

"Send Syrians back, send Syrians back!" This is what we hear on television from morning to evening," said Samira, sitting on a cushion on the floor and unwilling to give her full name. "Why don't they like us? We try to build a life here, we try to stand on our own feet. Politicians use us as an election campaign material," she said. Despite pressure from opposition parties, Erdogan has pledged that Turkey will not force Syrian refugees back and "will not throw them into the lap of murderers". But his assurances are not allaying their fears.

A few metres from Samira's house, 43-year-old Umm Mohamed, who runs a grocery store selling Syrian bread, fava and olives, cannot understand the turn of the tide in society. "We are very scared", she said, standing behind the counter, her eyes looking timid beneath a black veil. "We feel the pressure. As a foreigner, we have to be polite all the time."

Syria not an option

Mohamed's husband defected from Assad's army. "We can't go back," she said. "They would kill us." Fatima Ibrahim, in her early 30s, married a Syrian refugee after fleeing to Turkey nine years ago. The economic fallout is hitting them just as hard as the Turks, she said.

Her husband lost his job as a blacksmith during the COVID pandemic. Two weeks ago he found a job as a farmer in central Konya province — 700 kilometres (435 miles) from Sanliurfa. "Employers pay us less, so locals are annoyed, blaming us for accepting a wage less than theirs," she said, sitting next to her three young sons.

"Sometimes we hear from the locals that we should go back, that we have caused them to lose their jobs" she said.

"Some people tell us, 'Syria is better now, why don't you go back? Everything gets so expensive because of you.' That makes me feel so bad." But returning to Syria is not a possibility for Ibrahim. "I will never go back. I will either stay here or flee to Europe. There's no third option," she said.

'Don't mingle'

Ibrahim said she maintains a low profile in public to avoid trouble, keeping contact with locals to a minimum. "I don't visit my neighbours, and they don't visit my home. We don't mingle," she said.

Haifa, a 39-year-old English teacher from Aleppo, has fluent Turkish after nine years here, and avoids speaking Arabic in public so as not to attract attention.

"I want to keep myself safe," she told AFP, after she was exposed to verbal assaults on the street. "Political issues affect us more than the economy," she said.

Since 2016, the Turkish army has launched military operations in Syria, battling outlawed Kurdish militants and Islamic State jihadists. Haifa said: "Some people tell us 'go back to your country, you're having fun while our soldiers are dying there'". "You think it is easy to leave everything behind you? Your memories, your house, everything. You cannot even visit your mother or father's grave." —AFP

Death toll from Iran tower block collapse rises to 10

TEHRAN: The death toll from the collapse of a tower block in southwestern Iran rose to 10 on Tuesday, as the authorities announced the arrest of officials accused of being "responsible" for the tragedy. State television had said Monday that the 10-storey unfinished Metropol building in Abadan, the capital of Khuzestan province, had partially collapsed.

"According to the latest figures, 10 people are dead and 32 injured," rising from Monday's death toll of six, Interior Minister Ahmad Vahidi told state television from the accident site. In addition to those confirmed dead or injured, dozens more are feared still trapped under the rubble.

Search efforts continue in a bid to rescue any "survivors", Vahidi said. The building is located on Abadan's busiest street where "commercial, medical and office" buildings predominate, according to state television.

The judiciary's Mizan Online website said that the building's owner, who was reported arrested on Monday, was among the dead. The provincial judiciary said 10 people had been arrested, including the mayor and two former mayors, accused of being "responsible" for the collapse, the website said.

The group's statement made no mention of Russia, or China, but inveighed against a range of activities that Beijing has regularly been accused of in the region. Navalny loses appeal against 9-year sentence

MOSCOW: Jailed Kremlin critic Alexei Navalny on Tuesday lost his legal appeal against a nine-year prison sentence that he and his allies condemn as politically motivated. His sentencing came as Moscow pushes on with its military offensive in neighbouring Ukraine and Russian authorities seek to silence remaining government critics.

A Moscow court ruled to "leave the sentence without changes" and for it to enter into force immediately, meaning that the leader of Russia's embattled opposition will be transferred to a strict-regime penal colony with harsh conditions, including few family visits.

President Vladimir Putin's arch-critic appeared before the court via video-link from behind bars at his prison colony outside Moscow. Wearing a black prisoner uniform, the 45-year-old looked grim and listened attentively, leaning against his bars, as the judge read out his sentence.

During the hearing, he dismissed his trial as "meaning-less", saying: "I despise your court, your system." "It's you, your system and Putin who are traitors against the Russian people", said Navalny. "I am ready to sit in jail to prove that not everyone in Russia is like this."

'Burn in hell'

Navalny used his final words to condemn the Kremlin and its military campaign in Ukraine. "What Putin is doing is pointless," he said. "One crazy thief has seized hold of Ukraine, and no one understands what he wants to do with it". "Your time will pass and you will burn in hell," he concluded his speech.

In late March, Navalny had his jail time extended to nine years after he was found guilty of embezzling donations to his political organisations and contempt of court. He was already serving two-and-a-half years in a prison around 100 kilometres (60 miles) east of Moscow for violating parole on old fraud charges.

The new sentence will replace the one he was handed

in February 2021, meaning Navalny will remain behind bars for another eight years. Navalny told the court that the judge who sentenced him last year had later passed him a message expressing her regrets, before dying in September.

The hearings started last week but Navalny was granted a week's postponement so he could have a family visit. His lawyer Olga Mikhailova told the court the sentence should be annulled as it is "unjust" and "contradicts international law".

After the ruling, she said his legal team would appeal to the country's constitutional court, focusing on the risk to Navalny of moving to a strict-regime colony. "Alexei often said there was a threat to his life, so we will be going there," she said.

Navalny's press secretary, Kira Yarmysh, tweeted that "the place where he is to be transferred is notorious for its prisoners being tortured and killed". Navalny wrote on Telegram earlier this month that he heard Penal Colony No. 6 in the town of Melekhovo in the Vladimir region east of Moscow was being prepared for his arrival. attached to civil war-era parties. The Iranbacked Shiite Hezbollah group and its allies fell just short of the 65 seats needed to control the 128-seat parliament, losing their clear-cut majority. This time, the May 15 polls brought in a record number of independents to parliament, totaling a small but significant tenth of the assembly.

Chaaya headed his university's secular club, one of dozens of political groups bringing together young supporters of a mass protest movement that began in Oct 2019. In his Chouf-Aley district, southeast of Beirut, voters ousted Hezbollah ally Talal Arslan in favor of independent newcomer Mark Daou, a university lecturer and advertising professional. A massive number of those campaigning for his list were young people in their twenties, Daou said. "We speak a different language than the traditional parties, that's why people like us," said Daou. "We don't speak in sectarian terms."

Lebanon shares power among its 18 recognized religious communities, and politics are often treated as a family business. This was a clear break from voting patterns in Lebanon, where each community usually supports politicians from their own religious sect. Polling expert Rabih Haber of Statistics Lebanon said that while voter data could not be broken down by age, on social media young people seemed to express far greater support for independent candidates than established parties.

Newly-elected independent MP Elias Jarade, a 54-year-old Harvard-educated ophthalmologist, said most voters who came up to him were young people

from different political backgrounds. "All those who came to our tents and said they voted for us were young men and women, from different regions, religions and political backgrounds," Jarade said.

He was one of two independent MPs who snatched seats from allies of the powerful Hezbollah in its south Lebanon strongholds. The independent MPs are mostly university professors and respected professionals who entered politics after the 2019 mass protests.

Karl, a 30-year-old Beirut resident, went against his parents' wishes and voted for an independent in the country's south, after growing disillusioned with the Christian Free Patriotic Movement of President Michel Aoun, a Hezbollah ally. Karl, asking that only his first name be used, said that there is a trend of younger people voting for independents, despite their limited gains in the south. "At the same time the older generation is also transmitting its own war trauma to their children," he said.

On his way to vote in his hometown, Karl passed by the southern town of Ghazieh, where he saw children chanting slogans and bearing flags for Hezbollah and its ally the Shiite Amal movement. The scene was emblematic of the tight hold the two groups have in south Lebanon, where independents are often threatened and intimidated, according to observers and rights groups.

Sami, 21, who also asked for his first name to be used, said he had failed to dissuade his parents from voting for Hezbollah and Amal. "I thought I had convinced my mother, but in the end there is always something that pulls her back to her beliefs," he said, a common complaint among young voters AFP spoke to. But Sami said he was cautiously optimistic about the independents' modest victory in the south. "Our region was monochrome, there was no space for debate on alternatives to these parties," Sami said. "This opened up, at least, some space to have a conversation." — AFP

Elderly Hong Kong Catholic cardinal in court over protest defence fund

HONG KONG: Ninety-year-old retired Catholic cardinal Joseph Zen appeared in a Hong Kong court Tuesday charged with failing to properly register a protest defence fund, after he was initially arrested under the city's national security law. Zen, one of Asia's highest-ranking Catholic clerics, was among five prominent democracy advocates-including activist and singer Denise Ho and veteran human rights barrister Margaret Ng-who were detained earlier this month. The group acted as trustees of a now-defunct fund that helped pay legal and medical costs for those arrested during huge and sometimes violent democracy protests three years ago.

Tai is already in custody as he is among a group of 47 democrats arrested for subversion under the national security law.

China congratulates Australia's Albanese

BEIJING: Chinese premier Li Keqiang has sent a congratulatory note to newly elected Australian leader Anthony Albanese, easing a years-long freeze in highlevel contacts between the two countries. Relations between China and Australia have been shattered by a string of rows over human rights, espionage and the origins of COVID-19.

But Li's letter signalled a willingness to improve relations after Albanese's election, in what is the most significant high-level contact between Beijing and Canberra in at least two years. "The Chinese side is ready to work with the Australian side to review the past, look into the future... to promote the sound and steady growth of their comprehensive strategic partnership," Li said, according to the state-run Xinhua news agency late Monday.

Albanese said the letter was "welcome" and said he would "respond appropriately" when he returns from a summit of Quad leaders in Tokyo. But he has previously warned that the relationship will remain difficult.

"It is China that has changed, not Australia, and Australia should always stand up for our values," the 59-year-old centre-left Labor Party leader said. Tensions between the two sides soared in the past two years after Canberra called for an independent probe into the origins of the coronavirus pandemic and banned telecoms giant Huawei from building Australia's 5G network.

China-Australia's biggest trading partner-responded by imposing tariffs or disrupting more than a dozen key industries, including wine, barley and coal. Li's message came ahead of Albanese's meeting with leaders of Japan, India and the United States for a Quad summit-an infor-

'Challenging pathway'

Deputy party leader Richard Marles-who is acting as premier while Albanese is in Tokyo-said Australia would be clear-eyed in pursuing its interests. "From an Australian point of view, we understand the complexity of the relationship. It is our largest trading partner but China is seeking to shape the world around it in ways we have not seen before," he said.

"We are certainly going to be navigating that pathway from the point of view of making sure Australia's national interest is absolutely clear." Australia has expressed concerns about Beijing's growing influence in the Pacific region including a recent security pact between China and the Solomon Islands.

A leaked draft of the agreement that has not been made public includes a section that would allow Chinese naval deployments to the Solomons-less than 2,000 kilometres (1,200 miles) from Australia. China bristled when Canberra last year joined a hotly contested programme to equip its navy with nuclear-powered submarines in a new defence alliance with Britain and the United States.

The alliance, AUKUS, is aimed at confronting strategic tensions in the Pacific where the China-US rivalry is growing. Other issues, including Canberra's decision last year to scrap a major infrastructure project in the state of Victoria-under Chinese President Xi Jinping's flagship Belt and Road Initiative-has soured relations.

The two sides are also locked in a row over spying, with Beijing accusing Australia of raiding the homes of Chinese journalists. Meanwhile, China has charged Chinese-born Australian writer Yang Hengjun with espionage, and arrested Cheng Lei, an Australian TV presenter working for state broadcaster CGTN, for "supplying state secrets overseas". — AFP

Singapore civil servant jailed for leaking COVID-19 measures

SINGAPORE: A Singaporean court handed a civil servant a four-week jail sentence on Tuesday for leaking information about the relaxation of coronavirus restrictions. Such leaks rarely happen in the city-state, where the government keeps a tight hold on sensitive information, and the civil service is highly regarded.

But the case is among a few instances during the pandemic where civil servants leaked information related to COVID-19 to their family or acquaintances before it was made public. Chua Wee Lin, a 52-year-old who was a deputy director at the National Library Board at the time, leaked information about the planned relaxation of measures to 18 others in a WhatsApp group four days before the government announced the plans in June 2020.

After attending a meeting where the information was shared, he sent messages detailing the dates that country clubs, cinemas and restaurants would be allowed to reopen after Singapore's partial lockdown, according to court documents.

Some of the members forwarded the information to their friends and family, and one of the messages went viral, eventually reaching staff at a different government ministry, who made a police report. The leak forced the government agencies involved to redirect resources to find the source, court documents said.

"This was extremely time consuming given the viral nature of the information spread, and this had to be done concurrently with their attempts to fight the pandemic," prosecutors said. Chua was handed a fourweek jail sentence after pleading guilty to wrongful communication of information under the Official Secrets Act. The maximum punishment for the offence is a fine of \$2,000 Singapore dollars (\$1,455) and two years' imprisonment. Earlier this year, a woman was jailed for 18 weeks for leaking COVID-19 case numbers while she worked for the Ministry of Health, while another civil servant faces similar charges over leaking information on school closures to her husband, according to local media. — AFP

UK MPs blast 'failures' of Afghan withdrawal

LONDON: The UK's chaotic withdrawal from Afghanistan last year showed "systemic failures of leadership, planning and preparation", according to a scathing inquiry by MPs published on Tuesday.

The House of Commons Foreign Affairs Committee probe revealed a "fundamental lack of planning, grip or leadership at a time of national emergency" before and during the Taleban takeover of Kabul in August 2021.

"The manner of our withdrawal from Afghanistan was a disaster and a betrayal of our allies that will damage the UK's interests for years to come," the report said. Already in August, the government faced a torrent of criticism over its hurried withdrawal following the decision of its ally the United States to end its 20-year presence. Hundreds of Afghans eligible for relocation were left behind, many with their lives potentially at risk after details of staff and job applicants were left at the abandoned British embassy compound in Kabul. At the time, Prime Minister Boris Johnson hailed a mission "unlike anything we have seen in our lifetimes" with the UK air-lifting over 15,000 people in two weeks.

The foreign secretary at the time, Dominic Raab, was heavily criticised for not immediately leaving a beach holiday when the Taleban took control.

Foreign Office 'evasive'

Committee MPs spoke with UK officials as well as Afghans who were evacuated, and received evidence from a "wide range of stakeholders". During the run-up to the Taliban takeover, the government and civil servants suffered from an "optimism bias" that the US would change its mind about withdrawing, despite it having been announced by president Donald Trump in February 2020, said the report.

"The UK government failed adequately to shape or respond to Washington's decision to withdraw, to pre-

dict the speed of the Taliban's takeover, or to plan and prepare for the evacuation of our Afghan partners," it added. "Most damning for the Foreign Office is the total absence of a plan for evacuating Afghans who supported the UK mission, without being directly employed by the UK government, despite knowing 18 months before the collapse of Afghanistan that an evacuation might be necessary."

In responding to questions from the Committee, which started work on the report in September, the Foreign Office "provided answers that were intentionally evasive and often deliberately misleading". Instead, two whistleblowers provided crucial testimony to the committee. "Those who lead the Foreign Office should be ashamed that civil servants of great integrity felt compelled to risk their careers to bring the situation to light," the report said. The report highlighted the lack of a line of command within the government, and "untraceable and unaccountable political interventions". Particularly controversial was the evacuation by a British ex-serviceman of around 150 dogs and cats from his Nowzad animal charity on a privately chartered plane, reportedly following Johnson's intervention. "Senior officials believed that the prime minister played a greater role in some decisions than has been admitted," the report said.—AFP

Saudi plans weekly international flights to NEOM megacity

RIYADH: Saudi Arabia's main airline will next month start operating weekly international flights from the kingdom's planned futuristic megacity known as NEOM, with Dubai as the first destination, state media reported Monday. The weekly NEOM-Dubai flights operated by flag carrier Saudia will begin "by the end of June 2022, with plans to expand to London soon thereafter", the official Saudi Press Agency (SPA) said.

The \$500 billion Red Sea project is part of Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman's Vision 2030 plan to diversify Saudi Arabia's oil-dependent economy. It has been billed as a futuristic cityscape evocative of a sci-fi blockbuster-with everything from flying taxis to robot maids-and will operate under its own founding law that is still being formulated.

Officials say its population will eventually exceed one million people. The national airliner operated the first flight to NEOM's airport in 2019. The airport "is a key enabler of NEOM's development, facilitating efficient access to NEOM for residents and business partners," the project's CEO, Nadhmi Al-Nasr, said Monday, according to the SPA report.

A senior official told AFP last October that NEOM was on track to welcome its first businesses and residents by 2025. As they try to bring NEOM online, Saudi officials are also aiming for a dramatic expansion of the aviation sector that would turn the kingdom into a global travel hub.

Goals include more than tripling annual traffic to 330 million passengers by the end of the decade and drawing \$100 billion in investments to the sector by 2030. The Saudis also aim to establish a new national carrier, construct a new "mega airport" in Riyadh and move up to five million tons of cargo each year. NEOM's strategic location, situated on the Red Sea



Construction of the mega city runs parallel with MBS' National Transformation Programme (NTP, also known as Vision 2030), which he announced in 2016.

The site is raised above the surrounding land to create as light cooling effect. Buildings are clustered close together to create streets and walkways shielded from the sun. GCC economies to expand by 5.9% in 2022: World Bank

Kuwait's economic growth in 2022 expected to accelerate to 5.7%

RIYADH: The economies of the Gulf Cooperation Council (GCC) are projected to expand by 5.9 percent overall in 2022, with this recovery likely to continue in the medium-term, driven by the hydrocarbon and nonhydrocarbon sectors. The GCC comprises six countries-Bahrain, Kuwait, Oman, Qatar, Saudi Arabia, and the United Arab Emirates.

As major hydrocarbon exporters, GCC countries may also benefit from changes in the energy markets brought about by the war in Ukraine. These countries may see strong fiscal and external surpluses, which could help spur consumer confidence and investments. However, the war has also placed energy security at the top of the agenda of many major oil importers, thereby accelerating their plans for a transition to



Achieving climate change pledges could support diversification, economic growth, and job creation

Update (GEU), "Achieving Climate Change Pledges," describes them as rebounding robustly from the COVID-19 pandemic in the course of 2021 and at the beginning of 2022. London's delayed commuter rail link opens

LONDON: Long delayed and over budget, the Elizabeth line rail link finally opened in London on Tuesday, with hopes that the speeded up journey

times will provide a much-needed economic boost. Hundreds of people queued outside Paddington station in west London to be on the first train, which departed to cheers at 6:33 am (0533 GMT). By 10 am, there had been some 130,000 journeys, operator Transport for London (TfL) said.

London Mayor Sadiq Khan was one of those on board, and told AFP that the line was a "game-changer for our country and our city". Khan's predecessor as mayor, Prime Minister Boris Johnson, said the project is forecast to boost the UK economy by £42 billion (\$52 billion, 49 billion euros). Only one of the line's three branches has opened so far, from Paddington to Abbey Wood in southeast London. There, commuters wanted to reap the benefits of the new line from a sprawling hinterland ill-served with fast transport links.

"I'm excited just to see how quick it actually is," said Niyana Saratatt, 45, who works in central London. "At the moment I need to take a train, a bus and a Tube. This will cut my journey in half. Everyone's happy," she added, predicting a rise in local house prices.

'Great moment'

David, in his 60s, was on one of the first trains arriving at Abbey Wood having returned from his night shift as a security guard in Farringdon, central London. "It's a big change, it saves me 50 percent of my time. I was very eager to get it," he said. "It's going to increase activities, socializing, friends coming to visit you." The usual bleary-eyed rush hour was replacedfor one day at least-by wide-eyed excitement, as comGCC countries' outlook

Saudi Arabia: Growth is expected to accelerate to 7 percent in 2022, driven by stronger oil output following OPEC+ production cuts and continued growth in non-oil sectors, and supported by stronger consumption, increased tourism, and higher domestic capital spending.

United Arab Emirates: Economic recovery is projected to continue in 2022, with growth anticipated to reach 4.7 percent driven by oil and non-oil sectors.

T've been interested in the Tube for a long time," said software developer Kirk Northrop, 37. "Something like this, that's been 35 years in the planning and 15 years in the making, it's nice to finally see it come to realization. "It's not often you can celebrate a massive engineering feat."

Commuters snapped on their camera phones inside the vast new stations, marked by curving walls and spacious ticket halls. "It's a great moment for the city, very exciting," said Italian student Salvatore Ingenito, 20, who got up at 5:00 am to see the first train depart.

"Paddington is absolutely ravishing." Disability rights campaigner Brendan Taylor, 18, said the stations step-free access would also be a "game changer" for those, like himself, in wheelchairs. "Say I wanted to go from Paddington to Westminster, because the Tube is so inaccessible... it would take me about an hour and a half," he explained. "When Bond Street opens it will take me about 15 minutes."

Costs balloon

Sections from Shenfield, east of London to Liverpool Street and Heathrow Airport and Reading, west of the capital, to Paddington will open by May next year. Trains are currently scheduled to run from 6:30 am to 11:00 pm Monday to Saturday, with a Sunday service expected to start later this year.

The line, named after Queen Elizabeth II, is projected to carry up to 200 million passengers a year, adding 10 percent more capacity to London's transport network. "It's not just fit for Her Majesty the Queen, it's fit for Londoners, fit for Brits, fit for tourists," mayor Khan told reporters. Work started on the project back in 2009 and was initially called Crossrail. It was originally due to open in 2018. But it was hit by problems with construction and complex signaling systems. Costs ballooned to £18.9 billionsome £3 billion over budget. "Bringing the railway together, integrating all the complicated systems was always going to be a challenge. It was a challenge," said Elizabeth Line director Howard Smith. — AFP

BoE: UK banks face financial hit over climate inaction

LONDON: UK banks and insurers face big hits to profits unless they take immediate action over their exposure to climate change risks, the Bank of England warned Tuesday. The BoE conclusion came in an initial stress test on how major British financial companies' balance sheets are likely to hold up faced with obstacles on the path to a net zero economy.

"Across scenarios, participants' projections show



that if banks and insurers do not respond effectively, climate risks could cause a persistent and material drag on their profitability," the BoE concluded after a study of 19 financial institutions in the UK including HSBC, Barclays and Aviva. "Loss projections vary across participants and scenarios, but are equivalent to an annual drag on profits of around 10-15 percent on average," the central bank predicted. It added that such a level of fallout could make the financial system more vulnerable to other future economic shocks.

The BoE in June 2021 assessed "climate scenarios, testing different combinations of physical and transition risks over a 30-year period" for UK lenders. The UK government wants a net zero carbon emissions nation by 2050. "Achieving net zero will not be possible unless our societies make considerable investments in developing and disseminating new technologies, and will require major changes across the economy," Sam Wood, chief executive of the BoE's regulatory arm, said in comments accompanying the results of the stress test.

'A stable financial system can support households and businesses through these changes, and channel investment where it needs to go to support the transition," he added. The BoE said projected bank credit losses were greatest in the "late action scenario". The central bank said this would result in additional sector losses totalling about £110 billion (\$138 billion, 128 billion euros). Total losses for the financial sector could meanwhile reach almost £350 billion where no additional action is taken. "The (UK) government and Bank of England must act fast to align the financial system with net zero," David Barmes, senior economist at lobby group Positive Money, said in reaction to the

BEIJING: Tax breaks and a bond drive for Chinese aviation and railway firms are among a blizzard of fresh measures agreed by China's economic planners to gee up an economy stunted by a coronavirus surge. China is the last major economy bolted to a zero-COVID strategy of mass testing and tough lockdowns to stamp out infections.

Movement curbs have hit dozens of cities in recent months-from the manufacturing hubs of Shenzhen and Shanghai to the breadbasket of Jilin-seizing up supply chains and crushing retail sales and industrial output to their lowest levels in around two years.

The State Council on Monday announced measures to "stabilize the country's economy and bring it back onto a normal track", according to the official Xinhua news agency. Beijing will expand the quota of value-added tax refunds by 140 billion yuan (\$21 billion), the agency said.

This takes the overall target of tax refunds, cuts and fee reductions to 2.64 trillion yuan this year, according to a readout of the State

Kuwait's consumer prices rise in 1Q22 amid global pressures

Inflation expected to persist in 2022 despite policy tightening

KUWAIT: Kuwait's consumer price inflation continued to rise through 1Q22, finishing the quarter up 4.4 percent y/y, versus 4.3 percent in December 2021. Core inflation, which excludes food and housing, was higher at 4.7 percent (4.6 percent in December). Robust local consumer demand and global supply chain disruptions - recently worsened by the war in Ukraine and COVID-19 lockdowns in China - have driven price gains. Inflation is expected to persist in 2022, though monetary policy tightening by central banks could begin to dampen price rises by softening demand and economic growth more broadly.

Price pressures stemming from a mixture of buoyant consumer demand and supply chain disruptions have persisted. The latter, which materialized during the COVID-19 pandemic, have been exacerbated in recent

months by the Russia-Ukraine conflict and China's zero-COVID lockdown policies. Global food and commodity prices have been especially affected. Pass-through into domestic prices has been quite pronounced in economies heavily dependent on imports and where state price controls are absent or minimal, therefore.

In Kuwait, food and beverages have a 17 percent weight in the consumer price index (CPI), so this component has had a significant influence on the headline rate. During 2021, inflation in the food and beverages category was responsible for more than 46 percent of the 3.4 percent increase in the overall year-average CPI. As of March, however, while still elevated, food price inflation had slowed to 7.2 percent from a peak of 11.5 percent last summer. The price of seafood, fruit and meat continue to increase at double or near-dou-

ble-digit rates. For context, the FAO Food Price Index, which tracks international food prices, reached an all-time high in March (and up 34 percent y/y), following the onset of the war in Ukraine, though it did slow slightly in April (-0.8 percent m/m).

Meanwhile, prices in the housing services component were 2.3 percent y/y higher in March, following several hikes to rental prices in 2021. The indications are that after several years of stagnation, prices could start firming as landlords look to recoup higher construction costs and as demand in the mid-level expatriate rental market stabilizes after the pandemic.

Price rises in the CPI have been broad-based, however, reflected in the further upward tick in core inflation in 1Q22. Notable price rises were recorded in the education (+19 percent y/y), clothing (+5.7 percent) and transport (+4.8 percent) categories. The higher cost of education is largely a reflection of last September's increase in school fees when in-school attendance resumed after the pandemic.

The inflation outlook in 2022 is likely to be one of persistent price pressures, especially amid the ongoing Ukraine conflict, which is having an outsized impact on global food and energy prices. Nevertheless, with the US Fed leading other central banks, including the Central Bank of Kuwait, in tightening monetary policy, demand and overall economic growth is expected to soften this year. A stronger US dollar, to which the Kuwaiti dinar is partially pegged, is also probably helping to dampen price rises in Kuwait, by making imports less costly. Inflation could average around 4.3 percent this year.

Samsung unveils \$356bn investment blueprint for 5 years

SEOUL: South Korean conglomerate Samsung Group on Tuesday unveiled a massive 450 trillion won (\$356 billion) investment blueprint for the next five years aimed at making it a frontrunner in a wide range of sectors from semiconductors to biologics. The new figure is an increase of more than a third over its investments spent over the past five years. The tech giant is South Korea's largest chaebol-the family-run conglomerates that dominate the economy-and its overall turnover is equivalent to a fifth of the national gross domestic product.

Samsung Electronics, its flagship subsidiary, is the world's biggest smartphone maker. The investment plan would bring "long-term growth in strategic businesses and help strengthen the global industrial ecosystem of crucial technology", Samsung said in a statement. The 80,000 new jobs would be created "primarily in core businesses including semiconductors and biopharmaceuticals" through 2026.

It also noted the investment would "bring forward the mass production of chips based on the 3-nanometer process", the latest technology to further shrink the size of semiconductors and boost computing power. It will also invest heavily in biopharmaceuticals with its affiliates Samsung Biologics and Samsung Bioepis. The new plan represents a 36 percent increase in investment over its total investments over the past five years. Of the 450 trillion won Samsung plans to spend over the next five years, it will commit 360 trillion won to South Korea.

Biden visit

The announcement comes after US President Joe Biden toured Samsung Electronics' massive Pyeongtaek semiconductor factory on Friday, underscoring the South Korean giant's role in securing global supply chains of microchips. South Korea and the United States need to work to "keep our supply chains resilient, reliable and secure," Biden said, calling semiconductors manufactured there as "a wonder of innovation" and crucial to the global economy.

Lee Jae-yong, the firm's vice-chairman and the de facto leader of the wider Samsung conglomerate, escorted Biden and newly sworn-in South Korean President Yoon Suk-yeol inside the assembly line, and introduced the two to an audience in English. It was Lee's highest-profile public appearance since his release on parole in August. He had served more than half of a two-and-a-half-year sentence for bribery, embezzlement and other offences in connection with a corruption scandal that brought down ex-South Korean president Park Geun-hye.

Samsung employs about 20,000 people in the United States and work is under way to build a new semiconductor plant in Texas, scheduled to open in 2024. The vast majority of the world's most advanced microchips are made by just two companies-Samsung and Taiwan's TSMC-both of which are running at full capacity to alleviate a global shortage.—AFP

News in brief

US to tap diesel reserves

WASHINGTON: The Biden administration is ready to tap into the United States' national diesel reserves to tame soaring prices amid a supply crunch, a White House spokeswoman said Monday. The Russian war against Ukraine and ensuing economic sanctions against Moscow have caused fuel prices to soar around the world. The issue, along with rising inflation, is a major challenge for President Joe Biden and his Democratic administration ahead of midterm elections in November. "We're closely monitoring challenges to diesel supply and prices as a result of (President) Putin's invasion" of Ukraine, White House press secretary Emilie Simons wrote on Twitter. —AFP

Algeria president sacks CB chief

ALGIERS: Algerian President Abdelmadjid Tebboune on Monday sacked central bank chief Rostom Fadli, in office for less than two years, the presidency announced without giving any further explanation. Tebboune "on Monday ended the functions of the Governor of the Bank of Algeria, Mr Rostom Fadli, and appointed Mr Salah Eddine Taleb to replace him," it said in a statement. Fadli had taken office in June 2020 as interim head of the central bank of Africa's fourth-biggest economy, later being confirmed in the role. Algeria is a rentier economy dependent on oil exports for 90 percent of its foreign income, and therefore vulnerable to price movements. — AFP

Russia eases forex norms

MOSCOW: Russia on Monday said domestic exporting companies would have to sell 50 percent of their income in foreign currency, a reduction from 80 percent earlier, after Moscow said the ruble stabilized. After the West slapped sanctions on Russia over the start of Moscow's military offensive in Ukraine in February, financial authorities introduced harsh capital controls. They ordered exporting companies to sell 80 percent of their export earnings to buy rubles, among other measures. Since then, the ruble has staged a spectacular rebound and strengthened around 30 percent against the dollar. — AFP

Walmart says expanding its drone deliveries

NEW YORK: US retail giant Walmart said Tuesday it is dramatically ramping up its drone deliveries, expanding the airborne service to six states by yearend with the potential to deliver one million packages annually. The delivery network will broaden to 34 sites by the end of the year, "providing the potential to reach four million US households" in Arizona, Arkansas, Florida, Texas, Utah and Virginia, David Guggina, Walmart's senior vice president of innovation and automation, said in a statement.

"This provides us the ability to deliver over one million packages by drone in a year." Walmart customers who order goods between 8:00 am and 8:00 pm and pay a delivery fee of \$3.99 (3.75 euros) per order can have them delivered by air in

as quickly as half an hour, the company said. Each delivery can weigh a maximum of 10 pounds (4.5 kilograms). Tens of thousands of products are compatible with the service, including medicines, diapers and hot dog buns, according to Walmart. The retail behemoth is using devices and technology from DroneUp, a start-up in which Walmart has invested. Each participating store will house a drone delivery hub with a team of pilots cleared by the US Federal Aviation Administration to operate the unmanned aircraft.

By 2020, Walmart had announced a partnership with DroneUp as well as Flytrex and Zipline. Several projects have emerged, but their scale has remained limited until now. By significantly accelerating its efforts, Walmart is seeking to position itself as a leader in the drone delivery market, a sector coveted by several major American operations including Amazon, Google parent company Alphabet and even shipping giant UPS. Arkansas-based Walmart says it can strongly compete in the drone market due to a singular and major advantage: about 90 percent of Americans live within 10 miles (16 kilometers) of one of the nation's 4,700 Walmart stores.—AFP



Google marks 15 years of Street View

PARIS: Google celebrated on Tuesday 15 years since it kicked off its mammoth and hugely controversial effort to photograph streets in minute detail across the globe. The panoramic images of Google Street View have slipped into daily life for millions-but during its early years it attracted countless court cases and howls of anguish from privacy campaigners.

The US tech giant is marking the anniversary by releasing a slew of new features, including an improved version of the "time travel" tool that allows users to see previous photos taken by Google's cameras. The firm also published lists of the most popular destinations for users-with Burj Khalifa in Dubai taking the top spot for buildings, followed by the Eiffel Tower and the Taj Mahal.

Google said Indonesia was the most popular country for Street View, ahead of the United States, Japan, Mexico and Brazil. The Indonesian capital Jakarta was the most searched city, beating Tokyo, Mexico City, Sao Paolo and Buenos Aires.—AFP



Depp, a threetime Oscar nominee, and Heard were married in February 2015. Their divorce was finalized two years later. Judge Penney Azcarate has scheduled closing arguments in the case for Friday, after which it will go to the jury. - AFP

Iconic Iran river threatened by droughts, diversions

he famed river bridges of the Iranian city of Isfahan are a beloved tourist draw-but much of the time their stone arches span just sand and rocks, not water. Drought and upstream water diversions have seen the Zayandeh Rood, "fertile river" in Persian, run dry since 2000, with only rare exceptions. Sitting on a quay with two friends, 60-year-old Jalal Mirahmadi gazed with melancholy at the riverbed, which became the site of a farmers' protest late

"When I was a child, the water flowed under the arches of the bridge and sometimes overflowed to spill into the surrounding streets," he sighed. The river runs nearly 400 kilometers (250 miles) from the Zagros Mountains in the west to Lake Gavkhouni in the east, making it the longest waterway in central Iran.

On its way through Isfahan, it meanders under several beautifully crafted bridges from the 17th century, the city's golden age when it was the Persian capital. "When the water of Zavandeh Rood flows, the bridges have a special appearance and beauty," said Ali Mohammad Fassihi of the Ministry of Heritage and Tourism. "These historic bridges are meaningless without water."

Heat and drought

Largely arid Iran, like other nearby countries, has suffered chronic dry spells and heat waves for years, which are expected to worsen with climate change. Iran is sometimes hit by summertime blackouts when the blistering heat drives up air conditioner use while low rainfall reduces the

water reservoirs of hydro-electric dams. The reduced flow of the Zayandeh Rood, however, is also man-made because much of its water has been diverted to supply neighboring Yazd province. Last November, tens of thousands of people, including farmers, gathered in the dry riverbed to complain about the drought and blame officials for diverting water. Security forces fired tear gas when the protest turned violent and said they arrested 67 people. The municipality later launched an awareness campaign on the fate of the river, with several signs erected in Isfahan, the country's thirdlargest city with two million people. Young people in the city say they are used to only seeing the river's dry bed.

High school student Amir, 18, said he rarely goes there because it "is no longer pleasant without water". "Most of my memories and those of my generation are associated with the dryness of the river," he lamented.

Riverside selfies

From time to time, authorities briefly open the upstream dam's floodgates to irrigate wheat fields east of Isfahan-to the delight of thousands who quickly flock to the river. This happened in mid-May when locals and tourists rushed to the waterway to capture the ephemeral views with their eyes and with selfies. Under the shade of trees on the banks, families drank tea and smoked shisha. Some strolled and others

pedalled swan-shaped boats, which were

back in use after baking in the dust. At the majestic Si-o-Se Pol Bridge, portrait painter Mohammad-Reza Abdollahi, 50, drew the yellow-brick bridge while awaiting clients. "I hadn't been to Isfahan for 10 years because there were few tourists due to the drought in Zayandeh Rood," he said. He had only planned to stay for a week or two, but said that when the dams were opened, "I extended my stay". Mahnaz, a 27-year-old art student holding her camera, said she was delighted to capture the river's beauty. "I didn't have good photos of the bridge's reflection in the river because it's been dry since I learnt photography," he said.

'Like a mother'

Mirahmadi, the 60-year-old man, looked on at visitors to the river with mixed feelings. "Do you see this crowd today?" he said. "In a few days, when there is no more water in the river, you will only see old men like us. And we will come just to remember." The floodgates had been closed again and already the change was obvious: water flowed only under two arches of the Khajou Bridge, which is known for its decoration and its steps descending into the current. "Zayandeh Rood is the meeting place for all the people of Isfahan," said Borna Moussavi, who campaigns for the preservation of the river and the heritage of Isfahan.—AFP

Taiwan man invents stroller for fish to 'explore other worlds'

erry Huang's aquatic pets rarely feel like two lost souls swimming in a fishbowl because they get to go for regular strolls. In Taiwan's Taichung City, Huang can be seen pushing his latest invention: a goldfish bowl on wheels. "In the past, people walked their dogs and cats, now they take their parrots for walks, also snakes, lizards," Huang, 31, told AFP. "Is there a chance for underwater creatures to explore the land above water?" he asked himself.

Huang, an avid aerial drone photographer who makes a living mak-

ing content for his YouTube channel, soon came up with a solution. After spending weeks in his workshop tinkering with the design, the goldfish stroller actually came together in just a few days, cobbled together from spare parts he had lying around.

The space-age-looking contraption (estimated cost \$300-400) consists of a large, water-filled acrylic cylinder for the fish to reside in, combined with a battery-powered filtration and oxygen system plonked on a specially built trolley. "I have done a lot of research before I

started making this fish tank. It's not a spur of the moment thing. You need to understand fish," he said.

He decided goldfish, which are hardy and not especially frightened of humans, were the best test subjects. Huang is fairly confident his goldfish enjoy the adventures. "We all have this urge to explore other, uninhabitable exotic worlds, that's why we send spaceships to the universe," he beamed. "If I were a goldfish, I would definitely be super thrilled if someone invented a thing for me to go explore other worlds."— AFP

Bill Cosby sex assault case starts in California

Monday in California, with a civil suit alleging the disgraced comedian sexually assaulted a teenage girl almost five decades ago. Judy Huth says the man once known as "America's Dad" attacked her at the Playboy Mansion in the mid-1970s when she was around 15 years old. Huth says she suffered "psychological damage and mental anguish" as a result of the alleged assault.

The case is the latest in a raft of legal actions against 84-year-old Cosby, who was once one of the most popular performers on US television. Dozens of women have said they suffered sexual assault at his hands. Huth's case was originally filed in 2014, but had been on hold while Cosby faced aggravated indecent assault charges in Pennsylvania. Cosby was convicted of drugging and sexually assaulting a woman 17 years ago, but freed from his prison sentence after the state's supreme court ruled he had been denied a fair trial.

His release from prison-he had served more than two years of his three-to-10 year sentence-infuriated many advocates of the #MeToo movement. His conviction was the first sexual assault guilty verdict against a celebrity since the advent of the worldwide reckoning against sexual violence and abuse of power. But the court did not exonerate him, rather it overturned the conviction on a technicality.

Judges wrote that a non-prosecution agreement between a former district attorney and Cosby over evidence he gave in a different civil case meant the actor shouldn't have been criminally charged in the first place. In the case that local broadcasters reported had started Monday, Huth claims she met Cosby on a film set, and days later was invited to his tennis club. There, she says, he gave her alcohol and took her to the Playboy Mansion, where he forced her to perform a sex act. Cosby has denied her version of events. The defense has leapt on apparent discrepancies in Huth's claim. The assault was initially alleged to have happened in 1974, when she was 15 years old, but more recently has said it took place a year later. -AFP

South African paraglider makes first legal flight off Everest

South African paraglider has made the first legal flight off Mount Everest, an expedition organizer said Tuesday, opening doors for "climb and fly" adventurers on the world's highest mountain. Pierre Carter, 55, leapt off near the summit at an altitude of nearly 8,000 meters (26,247 feet) last week, cruising above the Himalayas as other mountaineers descended on foot. Carter flew down at a top speed of 80 kilometers (50 miles) per hour, taking only 20 minutes to land near the small settlement of Gorakshep at 5,164 meters.

"It was a beautiful flight down. Above the clouds and then through the clouds and down," Carter told AFP. Weather conditions dissuaded Carter from climbing all the way to the top of Everest's 8,849-metre (29,032-foot) summit before his flight from the South Col ridge around noon. "Once you're in the air it is all relative," Carter said. "But the take off's

always difficult the higher you are... your glider doesn't want to fly as easily." Carter began climbing as a teenager and soon became interested in paragliding.

Since 2005, he has flown off five of the seven mountains that make up the tallest summits on their respective continents, beginning with Russia's Mount Elbrus. Carter reached the summit of Alaska's Denali in 2016 but was not permitted to fly. He next aims to repeat the feat off Mount Vinson in Antarctica. There have been only three recorded flights off Everest, all without government permits.

French alpinist and pilot Jean-Marc Boivin was the first person to paraglide down from Everest in 1988. A French couple made a tandem flight from the summit in 2001 in a feat that was repeated a decade later by a pair of Nepali climbers. "This is the first time Nepal has issued a flight permit on its mountains," Dawa Steven Sherpa of Asian Trekking

told AFP. Sherpa said he expected more climbers to follow Carter next season, now that Nepali authorities have shown a willingness to permit flights off the Himalayas. "Many climbers are also paragliders and the idea of climbing and flying down is gaining popularity," Sherpa said. "Authorities now see this can boost Nepal's tourism industry, especially after Covid," Sherpa said.

The country only reopened its peaks to mountaineers last year after the coronavirus pandemic shut down the industry in 2020. A rare window of good weather has already allowed hundreds of climbers and guides to reach the Everest summit since a team of Nepali climbers opened the route on May 7. At least three climbers, including a Russian and two Nepalis, have died on Everest since the season began.—AFP

'Hulk' star Ruffalo joins call for global wealth tax

S actor Mark Ruffalo on Tuesday joined a call by over 150 wealthy people for governments to tax them more, as global elites and policymakers met at the World Economic Forum in Swiss resort Davos. The face of Hulk in a decade of Marvel movies was one of dozens of new millionaires to put their names to an open letter titled "In Tax We Trust", which was first delivered to attendees at a virtual WEF conference in January.

"While the world has gone through an immense amount of suffering in the last two years, we have actually seen our wealth rise during the pandemic-yet few if any of us can honestly say that we pay our fair share in taxes," the letter read. The Patriotic Millionaires group said it had boosted the number of signatories to over 150 by May, from 100 in January.

Its chairman Morris Pearl, a former managing director at mammoth asset manager BlackRock, vowed in a statement to "continue to pressure global leaders to heed our call: tax the rich before it's too late". But Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development (OECD) secretary-general Mathias Cormann said that wealth taxes could be less effective than other revenue-raising options.

"They don't necessarily raise that much revenue," he told a panel discussion at Davos. "In terms of the politics of it, it's attractive, but in terms of the substance of what it achieves it's not that attractive." Cormann did suggest that "property taxes are probably the most efficient, least distorting" form of wealth tax.

"There's huge scope in wealth taxation... it's been tried and in some countries it works," Oxfam executive director Gabriela Bucher responded. "These amounts that are being accumulated. You could not spend them in several lifetimes". Cormann and the OECD are betting on a deal struck by over 130 countries last year to tax multinational companies at a minimum of 15 percent to boost revenue for hard-up governments.

Asked if Washington might walk back its commitment should Republicans win control of Congress at November midterm elections, Cormann said that "it's in the rational self-interest of the United States to be part of this deal". For companies, it's "much better for them to be operating in a globally consistent framework" rather than navigate conflicting tax regimes, he added. "I can't imagine that any country or any side of politics in any country would make a judgment that would put themselves at that sort of disadvantage."— AFP

What is happening in the Wimbledon controversy?

Russian and Belarusian players banned

PARIS: The French Open is being overshadowed by the controversy sparked by the decision of Wimbledon to ban Russian and Belarusian players from next month's grass court Grand Slam. AFP Sport looks at the main points in a crisis which could prompt some players to skip the event after the ATP and WTA tours stripped Wimbledon of ranking points.

What happened?

Wimbledon, which starts on June 27, banned players from Russia and Belarus in response to the invasion of Ukraine even though they are allowed to continue competing at other tournaments, including the ongoing French Open. "In the circumstances of such unjustified and unprecedented military aggression, it would be unacceptable for the Russian regime to derive any benefits from the involvement of Russian or Belarusian players," the All England Club said.

The ATP and WTA, who run the professional tours, responded by stripping the event of ranking points. "Discrimination by individual tournaments is simply not viable," said the ATP. Wimbledon said the sanction was "disproportionate". It is not the

first time that the tournament has instituted a banplayers from Germany and Japan were prevented from competing in the immediate aftermath of World War II.

What have the stars said?

Former world number one Naomi Osaka said she is considering not playing Wimbledon if there are no ranking points. "I'm leaning more towards not playing given the current circumstances. I'm the type of player that gets motivated by seeing my ranking go up," said the four-time major winner. Defending champion Novak Djokovic "intends to go" although he insisted Monday that the decision to ban players was a "mistake" and that other options were available. He says the impasse is a lose-lose situation".

Djokovic will attempt to win a seventh title at Wimbledon even though he stands to lose the 2,000 points he claimed in 2021. Ironically, Daniil Medvedev, one of the banned Russians, could inherit his top ranking as a result. John Isner, who won the longest match in tennis history, an 11-hour five-minute marathon, at Wimbledon in 2010, said

"Right now, truthfully, I'm not that stoked about Wimbledon. I might just show up on Saturday and maybe I will play Monday and see what happens," said the American. For many players, ranking points are hard currency, opening doors to the bigger tournaments and, by extension, the bigger pay cheques. Many in the sport are multi-millionaires. For example, in 2021, Osaka became the world's highest-earning sportswoman with a fortune of \$57 million, according to Forbes. The likes of Djokovic and Rafael Nadal have long broken through the \$100 million barrier in on-court earn-

How do Ukraine players feel?

Lesia Tsurenko, a former top 25 player, has blasted her fellow WTA professionals for a lack of understanding, claiming that only "four or five" have asked her about the war in the three months since the invasion. Tsurenko, now outside the top 100, has been unable to return to her home city of Kyiv, instead having to base herself at an academy in Italy alongside fellow player and compatriot Marta Kostyuk. Former Ukraine player Sergiy Stakhovsky, who famously defeated Roger Federer on Centre Court at Wimbledon in 2013, described the ATP decision on stripping points as "a shameful day for tennis". "To say that I am disappointed in @atptour would be understatement. Never would expect that anyone can stand on the side of invaders and murderers," tweeted Stakhovsky, who has joined the Ukraine military to fight the Russian invasion.

Will there be a boycott?

Osaka said that without ranking points, Wimbledon would resemble an "exhibition" tournament, but the prospects of a large-scale snubbing of Wimbledon are unlikely. The allure of prize money for the lower-ranked players in particular will be too tempting-in 2021, first round losers pocketed ?48,000 (\$60,300) each. However, if there was a boycott of the All England Club, it would not be the first. In 1973, Yugoslavia's Niki Pilic had been suspended by his national federation for refusing to play a Davis Cup tie, a move supported by the international body. The ban ruled Pilic out of Wimbledon so the recently-created ATP ordered players not to compete at Wimbledon unless the suspension was lifted. Over 80 players opted not to appear. — AFP

Party time as **COVID-delayed SEA Games end**

HANOI: The SEA Games in Vietnam's capital Hanoi came to a noisy and colorful close on Monday after more than two weeks of competition in everything from athletics to football and eSports. The closing ceremony, held in an indoor sports complex and a joyful mix of dancing, music and pageantry, brought the curtain down on a Games which started six months late because of Covid.

Nearly 5,000 athletes from 11 countries fought for Southeast Asian pride, with hosts Vietnam easily topping the medals table with 205 golds, followed by Thailand and Indonesia in distant second and third. The closing gala, at a venue with a capacity of about 3,000, was markedly smaller than the opening ceremony when tens of thousands crammed into the My Dinh stadium.

But it did not disappoint as men in white military garb came out onto a stage holding the flags of the 11 nations. Heavy rain fell outside. Hailing the biennial competition a success, Vietnam Prime Minister Pham Minh Chinh declared the Games closed and the mantle was handed over to Cambodia, which will stage the 32nd edition about a year from now. "The torch of peace and development in Southeast Asia will continue to shine," he said. Athletes from the countries did not parade before the audience during the ceremony.

Record-breakers

When the Games finally got under way earlier this month, Singapore emerged again as SEA swim kings with 21 golds in the pool. Malaysia swept all eight golds in the diving, in what was a generally disappointing Games for the country, coming a lowly sixth in the medals table with 39 gold. East Timor won three silvers and two bronze to prop up the table. Stars of the future were made and some bolstered their already global reputation. Thailand's 16year-old Puripol Boonson shattered the 200m Games record and also clinched the 100m gold as he became the region's new sprint king on the track.

Reigning Olympic champions Panipak Wongpattanakit from Thailand defended her taekwondo crown, as did Filipino Hidilyn Diaz in women's weightlifting. A national hero in the Philippines, Diaz is already eyeing up the Paris 2024 Olympics. But Singapore's former Olympic swimming champion Joseph Schooling hinted in Hanoi that his career is almost at an end age 26, but not before adding two more SEA Games golds to make it 29 for him overall. Controversially, he was denied gold in freestyle relay when Singapore's sprint team was disqualified. There was disappointment too for the Philippines' bodybuilders, who were barred from competing over failing to fulfill anti-doping rules, forcing them to leave Hanoi without even taking to the stage. —AFP

Djokovic wins on Slam return as Nadal strolls

PARIS: Reigning champion Novak Djokovic won in straight sets on his return to Grand Slam action at the French Open on Monday and 13-time Roland Garros winner Rafael Nadal eased to victory, but Naomi Osaka crashed out in the first round. Djokovic defeated Japan's Yoshihito Nishioka 6-3, 6-1, 6-0 in the first night session at full capacity in Paris in his first match at a major since losing last year's US

His attempt to defend his Australian Open title in January ended in chaos and controversy when he was deported from Melbourne for refusing to get vaccinated. "I'm happy to be back. Roland Garros is one of the biggest tournaments in the world, and the memories from last year still are fresh in my head, in my mind," said Djokovic. The world number one, who turned 35 on Sunday, converted eight of 18 break points against Nishioka under the roof on Court Philippe Chatrier on a rain-interrupted day.

"I have to be pleased overall. I always expect highest from myself, so I can always do better, but very good start of the tournament," added Djokovic. He will next meet either Federico Coria of Argentina or Slovakia's Alex Molcan, who is working with Marian Vajda-Djokovic's former long-time coach. Nadal, on a quarter-final collision course with Djokovic, brushed Australia's Jordan Thompson aside 6-2, 6-2, 6-2 to improve his Roland Garros record to 106 wins and just three losses since his 2005 titlewinning debut.

"It's a good start, of course, straight sets," said Nadal, seeded fifth. "I played good for a while. Then things that I could do better and I need to do better. But it's a positive start." The Spaniard, who last week downplayed concerns over the recurrence of a foot injury that plagued him in Rome, meets Corentin Moutet in round two after the French wildcard defeated 2015 champion Stan Wawrinka.

Osaka, Krejcikova dumped out

Four-time Grand Slam winner Osaka was knocked out 7-5, 6-4 by Amanda Anisimova-the

same player who ended the Japanese star's title sidelined by an elbow problem. defence at the Australian Open this year. Osaka served eight double faults and committed 29 unforced errors on her return to Roland Garros, after withdrawing in 2021 when she refused to honor mandatory media commitments before revealing she had been suffering from depression. "I thought I tried really hard, and I just feel like it was a bit unfortunate because I wasn't able to play as many matches leading into this tournament," said Osaka, unseeded at a Grand Slam for the first time since the 2018 Australian Open.

Anisimova, the 27th seed, reached the semi-finals in Paris three years ago. "It's tough to see Naomi Osaka in the first round so I knew it wouldn't be easy," said the American. "I knew I had to play my best tennis and the conditions were not easy.' Women's defending champion Barbora Krejcikova also crashed out, losing 1-6, 6-2, 6-3 to 19-year-old Diane Parry of France in her first match since February following injury. The Czech world number two had yet to play on clay this season after being

"Liust think Liust collapsed physically, and L mean, it was tough because I didn't play the matches," said Krejcikova. Fifth seeded Anett Kontaveit became the fourth top-10 player to fall before the end of the second day, going down 7-6 (7/5), 7-5 to Australia's Ajla Tomljanovic. Iga Swiatek, the favourite for the women's title, stretched her winning streak to 29 matches by dispatching Ukrainian qualifier Lesia Tsurenko 6-2, 6-0 in 54 minutes.

The 20-year-old Swiatek, who took over as world number one following Ashleigh Barty's shock retirement, has won her last five tournaments and is bidding for a second French Open in three attempts. "Today was a pretty good match," said Swiatek. She is unbeaten since February and has the longest winning streak on the WTA tour since Serena Williams won 34 matches in a row in 2013. "I'm pretty sure that it can end, but I just want to keep going. I'm sure someday my streak will stop." Ten matches were interrupted due to rain and will resume on Tuesday. — AFP

Mbappe 'consulted president Macron over PSG deal'

PARIS: Kylian Mbappe made the startling revelation Monday that he had talked over his potential transfer to Real Madrid with Emmanuel Macron, saying he appreciated the "good advice" of the French president, who wanted the Paris Saint-Germain star to stay in France. World Cup winner Mbappe had for months seemed certain to sign for Real Madrid before being persuaded to sign a new three-year deal at PSG, the club he joined in 2017. "We talked quite a bit," Mbappe said of his exchanges with Macron. "You can say that it was good advice. "He wanted me to stay, that's part of

Mbappe said that Macron was one of a number of different people to whom he had talked. "It's then that you see that football has changed and has an important place in society. It's important to also know how to stay in one's place despite the importance that can be given to me in the country." With that in mind, Mbappe also revealed that PSG would not block him from playing in the 2024 Paris

The Paris-born Mbappe was raised in the northeastern Parisian surburb of Bondy, part of the Seine-Saint-Denis department that is home to not only the Stade de France, but also several other Olympic sites including the Olympic Village. There is no doubt that the potential participation of a star-quality, home-grown talent in the Summer Games would be a massive boost for organizers. First of all I have to be picked," Mbappe said of the possibility of taking part in Paris 2024. "We talked about it with the club. "The club are not against it, they are for it. There weren't any problems with regard to that in negotiations.'

No say on transfers

There has been speculation that as well as a gigantic, undisclosed financial package, PSG's Qatari owners had persuaded Mbappe to remain with his hometown club by agreeing to give the 23year-old forward some say in which players to sign for next season. Mbappe however denied any such agreement had been made.

"I remain a footballer, who is part of a team, and I will not go beyond this role. I won't go beyond my role as a player," he said at a press conference seated alongside PSG president Nasser Al-Khelaifi. "Everyone knows that last year, I wanted to leave and I was convinced that it was the best choice, but the years go by and things change. "I am French and there is this sentimental side to leaving my country which would have been difficult. "The project has changed, my club wants to build a new sporting ambition and I think there are other great stories to write here, that's what matters."

Hours after Mbappe announced on Saturday that he was staying at the club came the news that PSG's powerful sporting director Leonardoheavily criticised by supporters-had been sacked. Al-Khelaifi said Mbappe's decision to stay at the French champions sent "a very strong sign". "We are keeping the best player in the world," the president said. "This is a great day for Paris Saint-Germain, for our supporters in France and in the whole world-Kylian is staying at PSG for the next three seasons and that is important for us and for Ligue 1." — AFP

Roma, Feyenoord hope to turn the corner in Conference League final

Two of Europe's most passionate fan bases descend on Tirana

MILAN: Two of Europe's most passionate fan bases will descend on Tirana for Wednesday's Conference League final, a competition belittled by some but which has captured the imagination of Feyenoord and Roma supporters. Starved of success in recent years, both teams travel to the Arena Kombetare knowing they will be backed to the hilt for the climax to a successful inaugural season for UEFA's new tournament.

Such is the desire to be at the final that the 20,000 capacity stadium in the Albanian capital is nowhere near big enough, with Roma coach Jose Mourinho saying that the two teams' fans "would have filled the Santiago Bernabeau". Feyenoord said they were disappointed with the paltry allocation of just 4,000 tickets and asked fans not to buy from touts, but that is unlikely to deter supporters hungry for a rare chance for European glory.

Roma were last in a continental final 31 years agolosing the UEFA Cup to Inter Milan-and their fans haven't seen their team win a trophy since 2008. A huge number of supporters are trying to find ways to travel the relatively short distance to Albania from Rome, as fans desperately seek tickets for the match and ways of getting across the Adriatic.

The prospect of a European trophy after reaching the semi-finals of both the Europa League and the Champions League in recent seasons has created a wave of enthusiasm among Roma fans. They have offered unconditional backing to Mourinho, whose reputation in Italy was such that he has been given leeway that other managers have not had from notoriously volatile supporters.

Seen as yesterday's man elsewhere, particularly in England, Mourinho has created a strong team spirit and got the best out of his key summer signing Tammy Abraham. "You're finished when you no longer have passion for the game," Mourinho told reporters before Roma's win at Torino on Friday, which ensured them Europa League football next season. "It's up to us coaches to decide when enough is enough and you've got to wait a lot longer for that to happen to me."

Abraham at home in Rome

Abraham has been the star of the show for Roma this season, repaying his 40 million euro transfer fee from Chelsea by scoring 27 goals in all competitions, nine of which have come in the Conference League. The 24-year-old has settled in extremely well in Rome, not always the easiest of environments for players, and he has the knack of scoring goals which either decide matches or tips the balance in favor of his team. His early header in the emotional second leg of Roma's semi-final against Leicester City put them in Wednesday's showdown. "For me it's not a little cup," Abraham told AFP last week. "I believe every final is a final-no matter what competition it is. You get to the final, you want to win the final."

Feyenoord have a much fuller trophy cabinet but the vast majority of their successes came in the last millenium. The 1970 European champions also won two of the old UEFA Cups but it has been slim pickings in the two decades since their last European success. They have never made it past the group stages of the Champions League and have not gone further than the last 32 since groups were introduced to the UEFA Cup in 2004 ahead of the remodeled Europa League five years later.



Arne Slot has led Feyenoord to third, 11 points behind champions Ajax but an improvement on the previous season's fifth place, and have the fans on side with a continental cup on offer. Standing in their way is an expert of winning one-off games who is gunning to complete the set of UEFA club trophies.

"His CV makes you wary of his team. He is known for winning many finals," Slot said of Mourinho to UEFA. "But we mainly have to focus on his team, the tactics and the different ways they play. We shouldn't pay too much attention to the fact that he has such an impressive track record in finals."- AFP

Hertha Berlin keep Bundesliga status with play-off win

BERLIN: Hertha Berlin secured their place in the Bundesliga for next season with a 2-0 away win at Hamburg on Monday to take the promotion/relegation play-off 2-1 on aggregate. "That is a huge relief. What the boys did was outstanding," said Hertha sports director Fredi Bobic. An early headed goal by Hertha captain Dedryck Boyata and a speculative secondhalf free-kick from Marvin Plattenhardt saw Hertha turn their fortunes around in Monday's return leg.

Hertha had lost the first leg 1-0 in Berlin last Thursday, but the visitors flew out of the traps in Hamburg when Boyata smashed in a header after just four minutes. Falling behind subdued the hosts, who lacked the composure of the first leg. Only a superb save by Hamburg goalkeeper Daniel Fernandes blocked a fierce shot by Hertha striker Ishak Belfodil with half-time approaching. Hamburg rallied after the break with right-back Moritz Heyer testing Hertha goalkeeper Oliver Christensen with a long-range shot.

At the other end, Fernandes pulled off a brilliant save at the near post to block a shot by Plattenhardt, but the dead-ball specialist who was not to be denied. The Germany defender launched a stunning free-kick from the left flank to the far post which curled over Fernandes and into the net on 63 minutes. The goal put Hertha ahead on aggregate for the first time in the playoff tie as the visitors hung on despite increasing desperation from the Hamburg team. Hertha finished with ten men when Lucas Tousart was



shown a second yellow card just before the final whistle as tempers flared in stoppage time. After nine straight seasons in the Bundesliga, Hertha avoided their first relegation since 2011/12. The aggregate defeat denied Hamburg a return to Germany's top flight after four seasons since their 2018 relegation. Hertha's caretaker coach Felix Magath, 68, who won Bundesliga titles in charge of Bayern Munich and Wolfsburg, has kept the Berlin club up despite winning just

three of his nine games in charge. "We are massively grateful for what Felix has done, striking the right key to get the best out of the team," added Bobic. As a player, Magath scored Hamburg's winning goal in the 1983 European Cup final win over Juventus and won three Bundesliga titles with the north German club. Hamburg qualified for the play-off by finishing third in the second division while Hertha ended up third from bottom of the Bundesliga. —AFP

BERLIN: Robert Lewandowski's agent Pini Zahavi has made it clear the Polish striker wants to leave Bayern Munich, amid reports Barcelona have made an offer. "For Robert, things are very clear: he wants to leave FC Bayern this summer," Zahavi told German daily Bild. Lewandowski has already said he wants to leave Bayern, where he has a year left on his contract, with Barcelona reportedly offering 32 million euros (\$34 million) to sign the 33-year-old.

Żahavi warned Bayern: "Of course they can

keep Robert for another year, to be fair he has a contract until 2023, but I wouldn't recommend that to them. "For Robert Lewandowski, FC Bayern is history." A back-to-back winner of FIFA's best male player award, Lewandowski has won every title available since joining Bayern in 2014, including eight Bundesliga trophies for a total of 10 having won two with ex-club Dortmund.

He also won the Champions League with Bayern in 2020. Lewandowski was top-scorer in the Bundesliga last season for the fifth year running after netting 35 goals in Germany's top flight. Bayern CEO Oliver Khan and director of sports Hasan Salihamidzic have both publically stated the club will not let Lewandowski leave before 2023. On Sunday, Salihamidzic slammed Zahavi on a

Sport1 talk show. "He (Lewandowski) has an adviser who has been messing with his head all year," Salihamidzic fumed.

Zahavi played a role in David Alaba leaving Bayern for Real Madrid on a free transfer, leading to former club president Uli Hoeness once describing the player agent as a "piranha". Zahavi, 78, says the issue for Lewandowski is not about extra money. "He has felt disrespected by those in charge (at Bayern) for months, that's the truth. "FC Bayern has not lost Lewandowski the player, but Robert the person". Zahavi says he hopes Bayern's senior figures "will think about it again" and allow Lewandowski the opportunity "to fulfil a lifelong dream and move to the club (Barcelona) he has always dreamed of."—AFP

Man City title miracle all part of Pep's plan

MANCHESTER: Pep Guardiola joked it had been part of his plan for Manchester City to come from 2-0 down to beat Aston Villa 3-2 to claim the Premier League title as his side paraded the trophy through Manchester on Monday. Needing to win to hold off Liverpool by a point to win the title, City were trailing 2-0 with 15 minutes remaining before three goals in five-and-a-half manic minutes at the Etihad.

Guardiola kept his post-match promise by puffing on a cigar as he took to the stage at the end of the parade. City have now four titles in the last five years under Guardiola and six in the last 11 seasons. "It was the plan, O-2, calm, calm," Guardiola said with a laugh. "And after we scored it was a great night. "Everybody knows what has happened is an incredible achievement. This is the toughest league, in six years since we arrived we had four. "The happiness on all the faces is the greatest reward we can get."

Despite their domestic dominance, the Champions League has remained beyond City despite the billions spent amassing a stellar squad. Another heartbreaking exit to Real Madrid in the semi-finals earlier this month could have derailed their Premier League title charge, but they bounced back to take the necessary 10 points from the final four games. "There was a lot of tension in the last month after (the defeat to Madrid) and a lot of difficult games. "We never give up and we have to be so proud of the group."

Many of the City squad looked to have spent most of the past 24 hours celebrating their triumph. Ederson sprayed more than one of the fans clinging to lamp posts with champagne, while Jack Grealish offered to buy everyone on the roadside a shot if they wanted to meet him out in the city later on. Kevin De Bruyne was far from alone in sporting dark glasses, admitting to being a "little bit drunk". The Belgian was named the club's player of the year amid the celebrations.

Asked if he thought it was all over at 2-0, De Bruyne said: "For about 10 seconds. Then we just go and we did it. We did it the City way, I would say. Now it feels very sweet." The event also became a farewell party for club captain Fernandinho, who will return to his native Brazil this summer after nine years and 12 trophies with the club. "When I came here for the first time and met someone from City they said, 'Listen, we want you to be one of the leaders, we want you to be a champion'," the 37-year-old said. "When I look back all of the titles we won are really special." —AFP

Celtics rout Heat to square series

Tatum rediscovers his scoring touch with 31 points

BOSTON: Jayson Tatum rediscovered his scoring touch with 31 points as the Boston Celtics thrashed the Miami Heat 102-82 to level their NBA Eastern Conference finals series on Monday. Two days after dropping their opening home game of the best-of-seven finals, Boston came roaring back at the TD Garden with a one-sided game four blowout that squares the series at 2-2. Tatum also finished with eight rebounds and five assists, with support coming from Payton Pritchard (14 points) and Derrick White (13). Jaylen Brown and Robert Williams added 12 points apiece.

Al Horford led a hard-nosed Boston defensive effort with 13 rebounds and four blocks. Victor Oladipo led the scoring for Miami with 23 points from the bench. None of Miami's starting line-up made double figures, making a paltry 18 points in total. "We just came and redeemed ourselves," Tatum said. "We knew this was a game that we really needed, to protect home court. After the last game we were just ready to play, to get back out here and play better.

"It's been a back and forth series so far. It's best of three now, we'll just go away now for game five and get ready." Miami coach Erik Spoelstra said his team had never been able to recover from a poor start. "They came out and jumped on us," Spoelstra said. "I think more than anything our offense hurt us at the beginning. We just weren't purposeful. "But we're not making any excuses. They outplayed us tonight for sure. We never could get any kind of a grip on the game."

Highs and lows

Spoelstra insisted that his team would mount a response in game five. "This is part of the playoffs. There's a lot of extreme highs and extreme lows, and a lot of emotion," said Spoelstra. "You just have to stay the course and stay together. "And it's a great series. You have to embrace that." The game was effectively won in the first two quarters as Boston punished a strangely subdued start by Miami to race into a 29-11 lead in the first quarter.

Tatum, who had been restricted to just 10 points in Saturday's game three defeat, was back to his sharpshooting best with 12 points in the first quarter alone. With Miami's offense unable to penetrate a Boston defense bolstered by the return of Williams, the Celtics kept the pressure on in the second quarter, extending the lead to 27 points at one stage. There was no better illustration of Miami's offensive impotence than the first-half points haul of their starting line-up.

With Jimmy Butler contributing just six points, the Heat's starters totaled 10 points in the first half, with only Oladipo's 18 points off the bench preventing a total humiliation. Miami made just 11-of-40 attempts from the field in the first half, a shooting percentage of just 27.5 percent. Any hopes Miami had of mounting a second-half fightback were quickly snuffed out in the third quarter. Boston outscored the Heat 12-4 immediately after the interval to pull clear by a whopping 32 points with the lead at 69-37.

The departure of Williams with what appeared to be left knee soreness midway through the third quarter helped Miami reduce the deficit to 23 points at 73-50, but it was only a temporary reprieve. Boston continued to score steadily at the start of the fourth quarter and were sitting on a 31-point lead at 88-57 with just under nine minutes remaining before closing out a wire-to-wire win. The series now swings back to Florida, with top seeds Miami hosting game five on Wednesday. —AFP
