

2020 ASSEMBLY DISSOLVED

'Dissolution came upon the will of the people'; Fresh elections within months

KUWAIT: HH the Amir Sheikh Nawaf Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah on Monday dissolved the 2020 National Assembly which was reinstated last month in a landmark ruling by the Constitutional Court which also scrapped the parliamentary elections held in September 2022. In a speech read by HH the Crown Prince Sheikh Mishal Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah, HH the Amir said he invoked article 107 of the constitution in dissolving the Assembly.

He also said that fresh elections will be held "within months". Article 107 of the constitution gives the Amir the power to dissolve the Assembly after stating reasons for the action. The article also states that fresh polls must be held within two months of the dissolution date. The Amir also called on all parties to abandon disputes and stressed that the Kuwaiti leadership will not accept efforts that threaten to undermine national unity.

The reason for dissolving the parliament came upon the will of the people, and this requires a new

and political reforms to help turn the country to a new phase of discipline and legal reference, His Highness the Crown Prince read out the speech. His Highness the Crown Prince asked the government to bear its responsibility towards the tasks. Finally, His Highness the Crown Prince prayed to Allah the Almighty to accept the fasting of people and return these days with further blessings and goodness to Arab and Muslim nations.

In the meantime, the new government decided on Monday to approve a decree that calls to implement the Constitutional Court ruling issued on March 19. The ruling annulled the entire 2022 election process, scrapped the 2022 National Assembly and reinstated the previous assembly elected in 2020 headed by Marzoug Al-Ghanem. The previous Assembly was dissolved following non-stop political disputes between the government and MPs. During the 2022 elections, the opposition scored a landslide victory which brought veteran opposition politician Ahmad Al-Saadoun

Cup final on December 19. But he insisted that every World Cup host has the same lull after the tournament and that hotels were still 65-70 percent full.

Baker told a press conference there were 1.16 million visitors in the first quarter of 2023 and told AFP on the sidelines that he expected "at least" five million over the year. In 2019, before the coronavirus pandemic, there were about 2.1 million tourists. By comparison, rival Dubai had more than 14 million tourists in 2022. As part of a bid to end reliance on its natural gas riches, Qatar has spent billions of dollars on infrastructure for tourism and hosting major sports events.


The government has set a target of six million foreign tourists a year by 2030. "I think we will not be too far away from the target" in 2023, Baker said. "Because of FIFA we built so much infrastructure in the hospitality industry and of course now it is our job to make sure that in the coming months we are making sure that occupancy rates go up." Qatar, which says there were 1.4 million visitors during the World Cup, is predicting foreign travelers will make up about one third of the three million people expected to attend an international horticultural expo that runs from October 2 until March 28, 2024. — AFP

Sudan death toll surpasses 100; Kuwaitis safe

KUWAIT: Kuwait's Ministry of Foreign Affairs is following up, through Kuwait Embassy in Khartoum, the situation of Kuwaitis stranded in Sudan due to the current security developments seen in the country. The ministry reassured about the Kuwaiti nationals and urged them to keep at their residence, be cautious and vigilant, avoid conflict areas and abide by instructions issued by Sudan's official bodies.

The ministry said that it is currently in contact with the concerned bodies in Sudan to study all possible alternatives to ensure the Kuwaitis' safety and evacuate them if security conditions are suitable.

56 percent of Kuwaitis suffer from vitamin D deficiency

Severe vitamin D deficiency can cause rickets

KUWAIT: Vitamin D is an essential nutrient that plays a crucial role in maintaining the health of bones, teeth and muscles. According to an awareness campaign launched by Kuwait Medical Student Association, 56 percent of Kuwaiti people suffer from vitamin D deficiency, based on studies. The association revealed that vitamin D deficiency is important and is considered an essential factor for the absorption of calcium and phosphorus from food and a key factor in strengthening immunity, preventing osteoporosis and reducing the risk of cancer.

They revealed that there are several causes of vitamin D deficiency. The most common cause is a lack of exposure to sunlight, explaining that the body produces vitamin D when the skin is exposed to sunlight, but many people spend most of their time

indoors or use sunscreen, which can block the production of vitamin D. Those most at risk of vitamin D deficiency are those who are dark skinned, vegetarians, obese people, the elderly, pregnant women, nursing mothers and patients with liver and kidney diseases. The association revealed that one of the symptoms of vitamin D deficiency is classified into two parts: moderate deficiency, whose symptoms include headache, fatigue, loss of appetite and hair loss; and severe deficiency, whose symptoms include bone pain, muscle weakness, severe joint pain and depression. Kuwait Medical Student Association said that among the most important sources of vitamin D are egg yolks, fortified milk products, liver, salmon, cod liver oil, mushrooms and nutritional supplements under the supervision of a doctor.

The study confirmed that vitamin D levels affect the bones and immunity, causing rheumatism and weakening the muscle of the heart, as well as affecting mental health and cognitive functions of the brain. Vitamin D deficiency can also lead to more serious health problems. In children, severe vitamin D deficiency can cause rickets, a condition that results in soft, weak bones. It has also been linked to an increased risk of certain cancers, including breast, colon and prostate cancer. The recommended daily intake of vitamin D varies depending on age and other factors, but most people need between 600 and 800 IU per day. However, some people may need higher doses of vitamin D to correct a deficiency but too much vitamin D can also be harmful.

According to study estimates, 50 percent of the world's population suffers from vitamin D insufficiency, and there are an estimated 1 billion vitamin D deficiency cases globally. The incidence of vitamin D deficiency has been estimated to be between



20 to 90 percent across Europe, the United States and the Middle East. Countries including Australia, India, Africa, South America, Turkey, and Lebanon have reported experiencing comparable patterns. According to research, vitamin D deficiency affects both emerging and industrialized nations.

National guard deputy chief tours monitoring stations

KUWAIT: Deputy Chief of the National Guard Sheikh Faisal Nawaf Al-Ahmad Al-Sabah inspected the two fixed pollution and radiation monitoring stations in the northern industrial island and the southern industrial island of Sheikh Jaber Al-Ahmad Al-Sabah Causeway. The stations are under the jurisdiction of Sheikh Salem Al-Ali Center for chemical defense and radiation monitoring at the National Guard.

Sheikh Faisal toured the two stations, which are among 29 in the country, and reviewed the chemical, radiation and biological pollutant detectors,



ensuring they gave accurate readings. He said the centers include the latest equipment and devices that allow for chemical and radiation detection in selected areas of the country and are able to record pollution rates and perform their role in combating radiation leakage.

Applications open for manpower student program

KUWAIT: The Public Authority of Manpower announced Monday that it will begin receiving applications from students who would like to join the authority's summer training program. Applications will be open from April 23 until June 6, said the authority.

'The project aims to spread awareness about the importance of working in the private sector as it can have a great effect on helping with an individual's professional development," said Spokeswoman of the Public Authority of Manpower (PAM) and Director of Public Relations and Information Aseel Al-Mazyad.

The authority, in cooperation with many companies, will offer through the program about 800 different job opportunities specifically chosen to develop students' skills and prepare them to work in the private sector. More job opportunities are expected to become available within the next few weeks,

Mazyad said. The program, which is launching on July 9 and is expected to last for a month, will allow students to get training in various fields, including retail, banking, hotels, the legal sector and the insurance sector. It targets high

school students in grades eleven and twelve, students in their second year of certificate programs and university students their third and fourth years of education.

"Nineteen years in the running, the program has trained nearly 12,000 male and female students in various fields, preparing them for the needs of the labor market," said Mazyad. Anyone looking to register in the program can do so through the official website of the manpower authority. —KUNA

Awadhi also urged worshippers who suffer from chronic diseases to take their medication regularly as prescribed by doctors.

The final stretch of the holy month is known to be the most blessed, with Muslims increasing their good deeds to seek Allah's mercy. Many Muslims seek Laylatul Qadr, which means the night of decree or the night of power, during the last ten days as it is one of the most sacred nights in the Islamic calendar.

Although the exact date of Laylatul Qadr is unknown, it's thought to occur on an odd night, with many observing it on the 27th of Ramadan. It's believed to be the night in which Allah shows great mercy to all creatures, so Muslims spend

seclusion (i'tikaf), where one solely focuses on worshipping Allah and refrains from involvement in worldly affairs. I'tikaf, which usually takes place at the mosque, is a great opportunity to reconnect with Allah in solitude. It is also a time to implement good religious practices which can be carried on throughout the whole year.

Minors authority deposits Eid aid

KUWAIT: The General Authority for Minors Affairs announced that it has finished depositing Eid Al-Fitr aid for minors who are under the authority's care. The beneficiaries who meet the authority's criteria include 1,060 families, with 2,390 minors. As part of its plan for 2023-2024, the authority will implement comprehensive development programs for the services provided to minors and other categories under its care, said acting director of the authority for minors affairs Hamad Al-Barjas. The plan will focus on expanding the use of technology in administering services, including communication through smart phone applications.

Government cancels exceptional salaries

KUWAIT: The Cabinet decided on Monday to cancel the exceptional salaries given to ministers listed in decree 191/2022. This came during a meeting for the Cabinet chaired by His Highness the Prime Minister Sheikh Ahmad Nawaf Al-Ahmad Al-Sabah at Seif Palace. —KUNA

Municipal Council approves request for recycling project

KUWAIT: The Municipal Council has approved the request of the Direct Investment Promotion Authority to allocate land for the establishment of industrial projects to recycle oil waste north of the Al-Zour refinery in its main session on Monday. The Council rejected the request of the Ministry of Awqaf and Islamic Affairs to expand the residence of the imam and muezzin next to a mosque in the back area of Plot 4, while the proposal to create road entrances and exits to the Jabriya area to King Fahd Road towards Kuwait City directly remained on the table. The Council also answered questions about the types of contracts for the municipality's urban projects, development projects and initiatives. —KUNA

Donations for defaulting debtors exceed \$1.7m

Chamber of Commerce to donate KD 300,000 to national campaign

KUWAIT: The sum of donations for aiding defaulting debtors has exceeded KD 517,000 (\$ 1.7 million) since the launch of the national campaign to relieve this segment of the society. Spokesman of the unified government application for electronic services (Sahel) Yousef Kadhem said in remarks to KUNA that much more donations are expected. G7 offers common front on China

KARUIZAWA: For G7 diplomats meeting in the Japanese resort town of Karuizawa, unity was the name of the game on Monday, with ministers lining up to insist there is no daylight between them on China policy. The two days of talks are taking place under the long shadow cast by controversial remarks from French President Emmanuel Macron, who last week suggested Europe should avoid "crises that aren't ours".

From the opening remarks of Monday's first session, the desire to emphasize common ground was on clear display, with Japan's Foreign Minister Yoshimasa Hayashi telling his counterparts "the unity of the G7 is extremely important".

Monday's first session, and the ministers' working dinner the night before, focused on China and regional challenges, with Hayashi urging counterparts to "demonstrate to the world the G7's strong determination" to defend the "international order based on the rule of law".

Four dead, 28 hurt in Alabama birthday party shooting

WASHINGTON: At least four people were killed and more than 20 others injured, mostly teens, in a Saturday night shooting at a birthday party in Alabama, officials said, in the latest spasm of American gun mass violence. Local news reports said the shooting occurred at a Sweet 16 party at a dance studio in Dadeville, a small town northeast of the state capital Montgomery.

"There were four lives tragically lost in this incident, and there's been a multitude of injuries," Sergeant Jeremy Burkett, a spokesman for the Alabama Law Enforcement Agency (ALEA), told reporters Sunday. He



They also agreed stepped-up efforts to "prevent and respond to evasion of sanctions as well as third party weapon supply to Russia," likely to be seen as a further warning to China, among others, on cooperating with Moscow on its war in Ukraine. — AFP

The Alabama Law Enforcement Agency said its State Bureau of Investigations has launched a probe together with Dadeville police and federal agencies including the FBI.

US helicopter raid in Syria targets senior IS group leader: Centcom

Target of the strike was 'responsible for planning terror attacks in ME and Europe'

BEIRUT: A US helicopter raid on Monday targeted a senior Islamic State group leader in Syria suspected of plotting attacks in Europe and the Middle East, US Central Command said. "US Central Command forces conducted a unilateral helicopter raid in northern Syria in the early morning... targeting a senior ISIS Syria leader and operational planner," Centcom said in a statement, using another acronym for IS.

The target of the strike was "responsible for planning terror attacks in the Middle East and Europe", it alleged. "The raid resulted in the probable death of the targeted individual" while "two other armed individuals were killed", the statement said, without identifying any of them.

No civilians or US troops were hurt, the statement added. The Syrian Observatory for Human Rights said the strike "targeted the building where an IS member was present" in Al-Suwaydah, a village about 25 kilometres (15 miles) west of the town of Jarabulus on Syria's northern border with Turkey.

The Observatory, a Britain-based war monitor that relies on sources on the ground, said the strike killed the main target and two other fighters. The IS member had previously been imprisoned in Kurdish-held Manbij, south of Jarabulus, according to the Observatory.

He had taken refuge in the Al-Suwaydah area around six months earlier under the protection of a pro-Turkish group, it added. Local residents told AFP that the man was killed as he was trying to flee and that his body was handed over to one of his brothers.

A Turkish-backed rebel group deployed in the Al-Suwaydah area said in a statement that two of its fighters were killed after they went to the site of the raid. Many former IS militants joined pro-Turkish groups after the jihadists lost their last scraps of territory in Syria in March 2019, Observatory chief Rami Abdel Rahman said.

Earlier this month, the US military said it had launched a strike in Syria killing senior IS leader Khalid Aydd Ahmad al-Jabouri, who Centcom said was responsible for planning attacks in Turkey and Europe. In October 2019, Washington announced it had killed IS leader Abu Bakr al-Baghdadi in an operation in northwestern Syria.

His two successors have also been killed: The first in a US operation in northwestern Syria and the second in an operation by former Syrian rebels in the country's south. Some 900 US troops remain in Syria, most in the Kurdish-administered northeast, as part of a US-led coalition battling remnants of IS, which remains active in both Syria and neighbouring Iraq, operating out of hideouts in desert and mountain areas.

IS "remains able to conduct operations within the region with a desire to strike beyond the Middle East", Centcom chief General Michael Kurilla was quoted as saying in Monday's statement. In separate attacks on Sunday, suspected IS fighters killed at least 36 truffle hunters and five shepherds in Syria, the Observatory reported, with 17 pro-regime fighters among the dead. — AFP

Sudan's Daglo, feared Darfuri general fighting for power

KHARTOUM: Feared Sudanese paramilitary commander Mohamed Hamdan Daglo went from a militia chief in war-torn Darfur to the country's second-in-command -- to now battling the regular army for control of the country. Daglo, leader of the large and heavily-armed paramilitary Rapid Support Forces (RSF), collaborated with his now arch-rival, army chief Abdel Fattah al-Burhan, in a 2021 military coup that derailed a transition to civilian rule following the 2019 ouster of hardline president Omar al-Bashir.

Often dressed in desert fatigues, the tall and slightly stooped Daglo -- widely known by his nickname Hemeti, short for Mohamed -- has crafted a distinct image for himself and his troops, positioning the RSF as autonomous from the military. An experienced battlefield commander, he has in recent months also deployed a savvy use of social media with posts on Facebook, Instagram and TikTok to address the country's overwhelmingly young population, with two thirds of Sudanese aged under 30.

Darfur upstart to statesman

Born in around 1975, a camel and sheep trader with little formal education, he rose to prominence when Khartoum's hardline government under Bashir began arming nomadic Arab raiders to counter an ethnic minority rebellion that broke out in the western Darfur region in 2003.

The groups known as Janjaweed were sent to attack villages on camel and horseback as part of a campaign of terror that saw Bashir indicted for war

crimes, crimes against humanity and genocide by the International Criminal Court. The war in Darfur left hundreds of thousands dead and more than two million displaced. By 2013, Bashir had appointed him commander of a new force made up of former, mostly Arab, militiamen as Khartoum once again sought to crush the insurgency -- the RSF. But many in Khartoum looked down at the rise of the Darfuri, who hails from the Arab Rizeigat people.

"The old guard, dominated by the old Sudanese elite around Khartoum, very much view Hemeti as an illiterate, upstart thug whom they first armed to do their dirty work in the war in Darfur," said Alan Boswell, Horn of Africa director at the International Crisis Group.

Closer to power

For nearly a decade, Daglo used his reputation as a ruthless militiaman and street-smart leader to maneuver his way closer to power, all the while growing richer off lucrative RSF-controlled gold mines. The RSF were deployed in Yemen when Sudan joined the Saudi-led coalition fighting in the civil war there in 2015, in what proved a major boon for both Daglo and his future coup partner, army chief Abdel Fattah al-Burhan.

"It allowed him, alongside Burhan, to meet United Arab Emirates officials and Saudi officials and present themselves as possible successors of Bashir," researcher Jerome Tubiana said. According to experts, the force has also been involved in the conflict in neighbouring Libya.

When the military toppled Bashir in 2019, Daglo became the second most powerful man in the country, but accusations of RSF atrocities continued in the ensuing security crackdown. When security personnel attacked pro-democracy demonstrators camped out in the heart of the capital in June 2019, it was the RSF that witnesses said were at the forefront of the bloodshed, killing at least 128 people.

His sights were set still higher, and experts warned he was a man with massive forces at his disposal and lofty political ambitions, whose actions should be closely watched. Since the coup, Daglo's power has only grown, as he sought to craft a more palatable image -- working on his heavily-accented Arabic, for instance -- while building key alliances.

Though experts have long drawn links between the RSF and Russian mercenary group Wagner, Daglo gained new access as second-in-command, landing in Moscow the day after its invasion of Ukraine. As the rift with Burhan grew, Daglo came to call the coup he had helped lead a "mistake" that had failed to bring about change and invigorated remnants of Bashir's Islamist regime.

After battles erupted on Saturday -- with fighting still raging through densely-populated streets of Khartoum -- Daglo has portrayed himself and the RSF on social media and international TV as the saviours of Sudan.

In regular posts in both Arabic and English, the RSF claim to be safeguarding democracy against "the putschist forces" led by Burhan, who Daglo slammed as a "criminal" and "a radical Islamist". In turn, Burhan has called Daglo a "criminal" and the RSF a "rebel militia". — AFP

The ministry further pointed out that it is communicating with the embassy to make sure of the safety of nationals and provide them with public guidelines to guarantee their security and safety in such difficult and unstable conditions.

Explosions rocked the Sudanese capital Khartoum Monday as fighting between the army and paramilitary forces led by rival generals raged for a third day with the death toll surpassing 100. The violence erupted Saturday after weeks of power struggles between the two generals who seized power in a 2021 coup, Sudan's army chief Abdel Fattah Al-Burhan and his deputy, Mohamed Hamdan Daglo, who commands the powerful paramilitary Rapid Support Forces (RSF).

The intense conflict, which has seen air strikes, tanks on the streets, artillery fire and heavy gunfire in crowded neighborhoods both in Khartoum and other cities across Sudan, has triggered international demands for an immediate ceasefire. "The death toll among civilians... has reached 97," the doctors' union said, adding later that "dozens" of fighters had been killed. The figure does not include all casualties as many could not reach hospitals due to difficulties in movement amid the fighting.

The Central Committee of Sudan Doctors, a separate pro-democracy organization, had also reported dozens of deaths among security forces, and some 942 wounded. Amid wide appeals by medics for safe routes to move casualties, the two sides agreed to a UN proposal for a window on Sunday to evacuate the wounded, but the heavy gunfire did not stop. UN Special Representative Volker Perthes, who is in Khartoum, said he was "extremely disappointed" by the failure of both sides to abide by the humanitarian pause.

The World Health Organization warned that "several" of Khartoum's nine hospitals receiving injured civilians "have run out of blood, transfusion equipment, intravenous fluids and other vital supplies". The violence has forced terrified Sudanese civilians to shelter in their homes with fears of a prolonged conflict that could plunge the country into deeper chaos, dashing hopes for return to civilian rule.

hopes for return to civilian rule.

The RSF was created under former autocratic pres-

ident Omar Al-Bashir in 2013, emerging from the Janjaweed militia that his government unleashed against non-Arab ethnic minorities in Darfur a decade earlier, drawing accusations of war crimes. The fighting broke out after bitter disagreements between Burhan and Daglo over the planned integration of the RSF into the regular army - a key condition for a final deal aimed at ending a crisis since the 2021 military coup they or-

chestrated together.

The two sides accuse the other of starting the fighting, and both claim the upper hand by declaring control of key sites, including the airport and the presidential palace - none of which could be independently verified. Three UN staff from the World Food Program are among those killed in fighting in the western region of Darfur, forcing a "temporary halt" to all operations in a country where one-third of the population needs aid. On Monday morning, loud gunfire and deafening explosions again shook buildings and echoed across the streets of Khartoum as street fighting continued, AFP journalists said.

AFP journalists said.

Power has been off across swathes of Khartoum, and the few grocery stores remaining open warn they will only last a few days if no supplies can enter the city. Appeals to end the fighting have come from across the region and the globe, including the African Union, Arab League and East African bloc IGAD. UN Secretary-General Antonio Guterres has warned an escalation in the fighting would "further aggravate the already precarious humanitarian situation". US Secretary of State Antony Blinken urged the warring rivals to agree an "immediate cessation of violence" and start talks.

'Unprecedented' violence

Despite the wide calls for a ceasefire, the two generals have appeared in no mood for talks with each one calling the other "criminal". Medics have repeatedly pleaded for safe corridors for ambulances and a ceasefire to treat the victims, because the streets remain too dangerous for transporting casualties to hospital. While Sudan has endured since independence decades of multiple bitter civil wars, coups and rebellions, Sudanese analyst Kholood Khair said the level of fighting inside the capital was "unprecedented". "This is the first time in Sudan's history - certainly in its independence history - that there has been this level of violence in the centre, in Khartoum," she said. — Agencies

US warship sails through Taiwan Strait days after China war games

First such US operation through the waterway since January

TAIPEI: A US warship sailed through the waters ters. Taiwan's defense ministry said on Monday that separating Taiwan and mainland China, the US Navy said, days after Beijing staged war games around the self-ruled island. Led by the United States, multiple Western navies regularly conduct "freedom of navigation operations" to assert the international status of regional waterways such as the Taiwan Strait and the South China Sea.

The USS Milius guided-missile destroyer "conducted a routine Taiwan Strait transit April 16 (local time) through waters where high-seas freedoms of navigation and overflight apply in accordance with international law", the US Navy said in a statement. "The ship transited through a corridor in the Strait that is beyond the territorial sea of any coastal State."

This was the first such US operation through the waterway since January. The US 7th Fleet shared images Monday on Twitter of crew looking out into the strait, one of the most crucial waterways in the world for international shipping.

China said on Monday it had tracked a US warship through the Taiwan Strait, adding that the United States had "hyped up" the transit. Colonel Shi Yi, a Chinese military spokesman, said troops in the area "remain on a high level of alert at all times and will resolutely defend national sovereignty and security as well as regional peace and stability"

China claims Taiwan as its territory and has vowed to bring the island under its control one day. It also claims the entire Taiwan Strait as its territorial waduring the vessel's transit, its military had "closely monitored the dynamics in our surrounding sea and airspace, and the situation was normal."

China launched three days of military exercises around Taiwan on April 8, simulating targeted strikes and a blockade of the island. The drills were in response to Taiwanese President Tsai Ing-wen's recent visit to the United States, where she met with Speaker of the House Kevin McCarthy. Beijing bristles at any official contact between Taipei and foreign governments.

On the final day of last week's drills, Taiwan's defense ministry said 54 Chinese planes crossed into Taiwan's southwestern and southeastern air defense identification zone (ADIZ) -- the highest recorded in a single day since October 2021. That same day, the USS Milius sailed through waters claimed by Beijing in the South China Sea. That deployment triggered condemnation from China, which said the vessel had 'illegally intruded" into its territorial waters.

Since the war games ended, Chinese warships and aircraft have continued to circle Taiwan. On Monday, Taipei's defense ministry said it had detected four warships and 18 aircraft, four of which had crossed its southwestern ADIZ.

The guided-missile destroyer USS Chung-Hoon sailed through the Taiwan Strait on January 5, months after McCarthy's predecessor Nancy Pelosi visited the island. Pelosi's trip sparked China's largest-ever war games around Taiwan. — AFP

Killer cop pleads not guilty

NAIROBI: A Kenyan police officer accused of murdering two teenagers in 2017 pleaded not guilty to the charges on Monday, in a case that raised questions about extrajudicial killings after video footage of the shootings went viral. Dubbed the "killer cop" by media outlets, Ahmed Rashid was filmed shooting the two young men as they lay on the ground on a busy street in the capital Nairobi on March 31, 2017. The Independent Policing Oversight Authority (IPOA) watchdog recommended murder charges against him last November, saying that its investigation into the deaths "established that the fatalities were occasioned by police action." But Rashid contested the charges, telling the Nairobi high court that he was a law-abiding police officer who was carrying out his duty. He was arrested and immediately released on bail of 200,000 Kenyan shillings (\$1,500) on Monday, following an application by his lawyers. Kenyan police are often accused by rights groups of using excessive force and carrying out unlawful killings, especially in poor neighborhoods. Last October, President William Ruto disbanded a feared 20-year-old police unit accused of extrajudicial killings and vowed an overhaul of the security sector. — AFP

Putin praises Pacific drills

MOSCOW: Russian President Vladimir Putin on Monday praised the "very high level" of military drills in the Pacific as Moscow seeks closer ties with China amid a stand-off with the West. The surprise drills announced last week come as Chinese Defense Minister Li Shangfu is in Russia on a visit which will last until Wednesday. Putin received Chinese leader Xi Jinping last month in Moscow for a summit showing the nations' united front against the West. During a meeting with Putin and Russian Defense Minister Sergei Shoigu on Sunday, Li hailed ties with Moscow, saying they "surpass the military-political alliances of the Cold War era". The exercises in the Pacific involved over 25,000 Russian military personnel, 167 warships and support vessels, including 12 submarines as well as 89 aircraft and helicopters, Shoigu said. "The first stage of this surprise inspection did indeed take place at a very high level," Putin said during a televised meeting with Shoigu. "Today we have clear priorities for the use of the armed forces and, above all, this concerns the Ukrainian direction and everything related to protecting our people in the Donbas" in eastern Ukraine, Putin said. — AFP

Prague Castle scraps checks

PRAGUE: Czech President Petr Pavel said Monday that Prague Castle, the presidential seat, would scrap security checks introduced in 2016 following a wave of terror attacks in western Europe. "We will begin to remove most metal detector arches and cancel security checks at noon (1000 GMT) today," Pavel told reporters. The measure will eliminate long queues forming at entrances to Prague Castle, which is a part of the UNESCO-listed historic centre of the Czech capital and a popular tourist attraction. "People coming to visit Prague Castle or to work there are not happy if they have to spend an hour in a queue," Pavel added. Pavel, who won a five-year presidential term in a direct vote in January, said he also wanted to open the castle for different social and cultural events. Czech police head Martin Vondrasek said the checks had been introduced in the wake of terror attacks in Paris in 2015 and Brussels in 2016. "At that time, Prague Castle was identified as a major potential soft target" for terrorists, he added. — AFP

Myanmar junta free 3,000 prisoners in New Year amnesty

YANGON: Myanmar's junta on Monday began releasing more than 3,000 prisoners to mark the Buddhist New Year, without specifying whether those jailed in its bloody crackdown on dissent would be freed. The military has arrested thousands since its coup more than two years ago, which plunged the country into turmoil and sparked widespread clashes with anti-coup fighters.

Junta chief Min Aung Hlaing "pardoned 3,015 prisoners... to mark Myanmar New Year, for the peaceful mind of the people and on humanitarian grounds", the junta's information team said in a statement. Those who re-offend would have to serve the remainder of their sentence with an additional penalty, the statement said.

It did not say whether anti-junta protesters or journalists jailed covering the coup and its aftermath would be among those freed. A further 98 foreigners serving sentences in Myanmar would also be pardoned and freed, according to a separate junta statement that did not provide details.

Around 100 people gathered outside Insein prison in commercial hub Yangon after the announcement, hoping their friends and loved ones would be included in the amnesty. Win Win Htay said her younger brother had been jailed for four months after police stopped him at a checkpoint and found a small knife



on his keychain. "I hope he will be released today," she told AFP as she waited outside the prison. Two yellow buses later pulled out from the prison compound, with some in the waiting crowd waving and calling to those inside. Shortly after its coup, the junta released around 23,000 prisoners, with some rights groups at the time fearing the move was to free up space for opponents of the military as well as to cause chaos in communities.

The country typically grants an amnesty to thousands of prisoners to mark its traditional Buddhist New Year holiday — which in previous years was a joyous affair. But this year, streets in many major cities

were silent in boycott after a military air strike on a village in a resistance hotspot that media and locals said killed more than 170 people.

More than 21,000 people have been arrested since the military ousted Aung San Suu Kyi's government in February 2021, according to a local monitoring group. Suu Kyi has been detained since the early hours of the coup. In December, the junta wrapped up a series of closed-court trials of the 77-year-old Nobel Peace laureate, jailing her for a total of 33 years in a process rights groups have condemned as a sham. At least 170 journalists have been arrested since the putsch, according to the United Nations. — AFP

Heat kills 11 at India awards event

NEW DELHI: Eleven people died of heatstroke in India after an estimated one million spectators waited for hours in the sun at a government-sponsored awards ceremony, officials said on Monday. Around 20 people were hospitalized and 300 felt ill at the event near the western city of Mumbai on Sunday, when temperatures hit close to 38 degrees Celsius (100 Fahrenheit) with high levels of humidity, local media reported.

Senior government officials attended the ceremony, including Interior Minister Amit Shah, who praised the crowd for waiting so long in the sun. The office of Maharashtra state Chief Minister Eknath Shinde described it as a "sad and disturbing incident" and promised compensation for the victims' relatives.

India's ruling Bharatiya Janata Party said around a million people attended the event, the Indian Express newspaper reported. The opposition Congress party accused the government of negligence and said it should face criminal charges.

Heatwaves have killed more than 6,500 people in India since 2010, and last year saw record temperatures in several cities across the country. The hot spells are becoming harsher and more frequent across South Asia, spurred by climate change, according

Authorities in the eastern state of West Bengal announced a week-long shutdown of all schools, colleges and universities from Monday due to the heat, local media reported. Last year,

India suffered coal shortages, the main source of electricity in the nation of 1.4 billion people, as electricity demand peaked in the heat.

Many parts of India rely on trains

to supply water during the summer. Scientists also believe the annual monsoon rainy season is becoming more erratic and powerful, causing greater flooding. — AFP

Top honor for Merkel

BERLIN: Former chancellor Angela Merkel will receive Germany's highest honor on Monday despite facing continued criticism of her legacy since leaving office, especially over her policy towards Moscow. Merkel, who led Europe's biggest economy from 2005 to 2021, is due to receive the special class Grand Cross from President Frank-Walter Steinmeier on Monday evening.

The award has been handed out only twice before, to former chancellors Konrad Adenauer and Helmut Kohl. Though hugely popular through most of her time in power, Merkel, 68, has seen her star fade since she retired in December 2021.

The long-time leader has in particular faced criticism of her policy towards Russian President Vladimir Putin and for leaving Germany dependent on Russian energy -- a weakness laid bare by the war in Ukraine.

"At the end of her time in office, our country was not in good shape," Bijan Djir-Sarai of the pro-business FDP party told the RND broadcaster. Merkel has also been criticized for her decisions in 2011 to exit nuclear power and in 2015 to welcome hundreds of thousands of refugees from Syria and Iraq.

The former chancellor had "great merits, particularly at an international level", Carsten Linnemann, vice-president of Merkel's own conservative CDU party, told the NTV news channel. But she "also made mistakes, some of them glaring", he said.

The nuclear exit, agreed after the Fukushima disaster, was "a mistake" because it was decided "without establishing how we were going to supply ourselves with energy in a reasonably self-sufficient way", Linnemann said. Some "glaring mistakes" had also been made with regard to the decision to leave Germany's borders open in 2015, he said.

But Merkel, who has been writing her memoirs since she retired, has also continued to win praise, even from her Social Democrat (SPD) and Greens rivals. "I particularly appreciated her diplomatic skill and empathetic wisdom, thanks to which she always succeeded in forging viable coalitions and compromises on the national and international stage," SPD co-leader Saskia Esken told RND.

Greens leader Omid Nouripour said Merkel had "shaped our country with her chancellorship like few others". "You do not have to agree with everything she did to recognize her great merits," he said. Some commentators have questioned the logic of Merkel receiving the award from Steinmeier, who was foreign minister in her government. — AFP

Bangladeshis pray for rain as temperatures soar

DHAKA: Hundreds of Bangladeshi Muslims gathered on an open field in Dhaka on Monday to pray for rain after the metropolis of 20 million people recorded its hottest day in almost 60 years. Police said more than 500 worshippers congregated on the Aftabnagar playing ground, where popular TV cleric Shaikh Ahmadullah led the prayers.

"They held the prayers for rains. They also held orayers for easing the temperature and protection from the heatwave," local police chief Abul Kalam Azad told AFP. The poor, low-lying South Asian nation of 170 million people is at the forefront of climate change with fre-

quent deadly floods and ever-more-erratic rains. The rains that usually fall in April and May have failed to materialize this year and the country has been gripped by unusually hot weather since April 4, Afroza Sultana from the Meteorology Department told AFP. On Sunday temperatures in Dhaka soared to 40.6 degrees Celsius (105.1 Fahrenheit), the highest since April 30, 1965, when the temperature hit 42 degrees Celsius, she said. Sultana said temperatures would gradually decline in the coming days and rains were expected later in April, just before the country celebrates its largest festival, Eid Al-Fitr. — AFP








Saudi inflation trends lower

RIYADH: Saudi Arabia's annual inflation eased in March, marking the lowest rate of price growth since July 2022. The kingdom's consumer price index slowed to 2.7 per cent last month compared to 2 per cent for the same month last year, according to Saudi Arabia's General Authority for Statistics (Gastat).

Rents were the main driver of inflation, with housing costs increasing 8.7 per cent in March, driven by higher apartment rents, which soared 22 per cent. Rents account for 21 per cent of the Saudi consumer basket. Restaurant and hotels prices surged by 6.3 per cent as catering costs increased by an equal amount, while transport prices increased by 1.8 per cent.

Education prices also increased 3.1 per cent in March, mainly resulting from the increase in pre-primary and primary education fees by 4.6 per cent, the latest data shows. Personal goods and services prices, on the other hand, decreased by 0.4 per cent, due to the decrease in domestic workers' recruitment fees. Clothing and footwear prices also declined by 2.2 per cent as garment prices fell during the month. The Arab world's largest economy continues to recover from the coronavirus pandemic-induced slowdown on the back of higher oil prices and diversification efforts by the government.

New CO2 tech taps oceans to tackle global warming

SAN PEDRO, US: Floating in the port of Los Angeles, a strange-looking barge covered with pipes and tanks contains a concept that scientists hope to make waves: a new way to use the ocean as a vast carbon dioxide sponge to tackle global warming.

Scientists from University of California Los Angeles (UCLA) have been working for two years on SeaChange — an ambitious project that could one day boost the amount of CO2, a major greenhouse gas, that can be absorbed by our seas. Their goal is "to use the ocean as a big sponge," according to Gaurav Sant, director of the university's Institute for Carbon Management (ICM).

The oceans, covering most of the Earth, are already the planet's main carbon sinks, acting as a critical buffer in the climate crisis. They absorb a quarter of all CO2 emissions, as well as 90 percent of the warming that has occurred in recent decades due to increasing greenhouse gases.

But they are feeling the strain. The ocean is acid-

Last week, the kingdom launched four special economic zones that will offer companies financial and non-financial incentives as the country seems to attract more foreign investment and position itself as a global business centre. The new zones will focus on the key growth sectors of advanced manufacturing, cloud computing, medical technology and maritime.

Saudi Arabia was the fastest growing economy among the world's 20 biggest economies in 2022, according to the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development (OECD). Meanwhile, compared with February of this year, the consumer price index in March increased by 0.1 per cent.

Food and beverage prices during the month fell 0.4 per cent, while furnishings, household equipment and maintenance prices declined 0.5 per cent, the latest data shows. Housing, water, electricity, gas and other fuels prices, on the other hand, rose by 0.4 per cent compared to the previous month as a result of the increase in rents for housing by 0.4 per cent.

Transport prices increased by 0.2 per cent, mainly due to the increase in transport services prices by 3.6 per cent, while personal goods and services prices increased by 0.3 per cent, and restaurants and hotels prices rose by 0.1 per cent during the month, according to the data. Business activity in Saudi Arabia's non-oil private sector economy remained robust in March with the latest purchasing managers' index remaining in expansionary territory as output and new business accelerated, further supporting employment growth in the kingdom. — Agencies

ifying, and rising temperatures are reducing its absorption capacity. The UCLA team wants to increase that capacity by using an electrochemical process to remove vast quantities of CO2 already in seawater—rather like wringing out a sponge to help recover its absorptive power.

"If you can take out the carbon dioxide that is in the oceans, you're essentially renewing their capacity to take additional carbon dioxide from the atmosphere," Sant told AFP.

Trapped

Engineers built a floating mini-factory on a 100-foot (30-meter) long boat which pumps in seawater and subjects it to an electrical charge. Chemical reactions triggered by electrolysis convert CO2 dissolved in the seawater into a fine white powder containing calcium carbonate — the compound found in chalk, limestone and oyster or mussel shells.

This powder can be discarded back into the

This powder can be discarded back into the ocean, where it remains in solid form, thereby storing CO2 "very durably... over tens of thousands of years," explained Sant.


Meanwhile, the pumped water returns to the sea, ready to absorb more carbon dioxide from the atmosphere. Sant and his team are confident the process will not damage the marine environment, although this will require further testing to confirm. — AFP

Britain's Royal Mail boosted by union deal

LONDON: Shares in Royal Mail's parent group rallied Monday after the UK postal operator clinched a deal with union leaders to end a long-running dispute over pay, jobs and conditions. The share price of International Distributions Services (IDS) jumped about five percent to 243 pence in early afternoon London deals

as investors welcomed the news. Royal Mail and the Communication Workers' Union (CWU) said Saturday that they have reached a provisional agreement over strikes that had sparked huge losses at the postal firm.

Britain's private and public sectors have faced industrial action as workers protest at wages that have failed to keep pace with elevated inflation, which remains above 10 percent. The nation faced fresh walkouts Monday by staff at energy regulator Ofgem, the Passport Office and driving test centers. "After almost a year of talks, Royal Mail and the CWU are pleased to announce they have reached a negotiators' agreement in principle," the Royal Mail and CWU said in a joint statement on Saturday. — AFP



IMF, Egypt hold talks

WASHINGTON: The International Monetary Fund's discussions with Egypt will continue virtually towards starting its first review mission, according to an IMF statement. Discussion between the IMF and Egypt were "fruitful" in preparation for the review, the statement said Sunday. The IMF in December approved a \$3 billion Extended Fund Facility loan for Egypt. Disbursements under the 46-month program are subject to eight reviews, the first of which was dated March 15, 2023, in an IMF staff report published in December.

Iraq, Jordan plan economic city

AMMAN: The Iraqi-Jordanian Company for Industry announced an open international tender to build a joint economic city on the border between the two countries. The company added that the developer will finance, implement, manage, invest, promote and operate the planned economic city and maintain its facilities. You will never turn off your computer again. Renters despair over cut-throat London market as prices soar

LONDON: With soaring rent prices and cut-throat competition, Cyndi Cheng, 34, thought she would never find a place to rent in London after moving from Hong Kong earlier this year. Her disillusionment is shared by many who have had to act fast and bid high to secure a home in a competitive rental market fuelled by high tenant demand and a dwindling supply. Stories abound of prospective tenants being asked to pay 12 months' rent up front to secure a property, offering more than the asking price and detailed background checks.

Cheng says she was regularly "ghosted" during her search. One landlord refused to let her view a property because she did not have a full-time employment reference, having just moved from Hong Kong on a UK special visa granted to residents after the imposition of China's security law.

"It's just hard for all these boxes and criteria to be

out there in a rental market like this," she told AFP. "The competition is keen and real."

Record high

Housing body Propertymark found that for every 10 new prospective tenants registering in its member branches in February, there was only one property available for rent. Matt Hutchinson, director of SpareRoom, a popular flat-sharing platform, said the hardest part for renters is "getting the attention of the landlord".

"Most people aren't even getting a viewing," he added. Cheng eventually secured a "tiny" property, relieved that the stress of endlessly checking her messages to see if she had been successful is over.

London rents have historically been higher than the rest of the UK but in the first quarter of this year they have sky-rocketed, a SpareRoom study said. Now, the average room rent in London is at a record high of £952 (nearly \$1,200) per month. As mortgage rates and other cost-of-living pressures jumped last year, landlords passed on costs to tenants or simply chose to sell, pushing up rents and squeezing already hard-pressed supply. This is the "hardest time we've ever seen for renters, and we've been running the site for 20 years now," says Hutchinson.

Soaring demand

Joey Mazars, 28, has been on the other end of the letting ad. Last November, he and his flatmate put out a call on SpareRoom to find a third flatmate. Within 48 hours of posting, they received around 120 messages. Unable to sift through all, Mazars had to eventually use random criteria to filter out applicants, from how their SpareRoom profiles looked to discounting those with "weird hobbies". "We had to find any reason eventually to not choose them," he said. Even then, Mazars added, the process took them hours. "I hope I don't have to do it again soon," he said. Just two years ago, the situation was "dramatically" different, he explained. Only last year, he had received a mere handful of responses to an ad.

Will Barber-Taylor, digital campaigns officer at Generation Rent, which advocates for renters' rights, says many are hesitant to even enter the market, and have "been forced to stay in housing conditions that don't suit them". This includes people staying in relationships that they want to leave and living in disrepair because they fear being unable to find a new place. "There is a general worsening of people's lives," he said.

The government has promised to bring forward this year a long-awaited Renters' Reform bill that

aims to improve conditions for renters. However, Hutchinson fears that the regulations will reduce the number of rental properties. Even though rent prices are high, Hutchinson says, landowners are reluctant to put properties on rent due to regulations and high interest rates. "The market doesn't work for anybody at the moment."

Paris Williams, 24, has been on the rental market for over a year now, and has faced practices that she considers discriminatory, including being asked to share her LinkedIn profile. Williams says that discrimination is rife right now because more landlords and prospective flatmates are "picking and choosing".

According to Barber-Taylor, Generation Rent has seen an uptick in discrimination against LGBTQ and ethnic minority renters in recent months. He has also heard cases of renters being asked for detailed bios and pictures. "This opens (the process) to discrimination. Because why would they need pictures?" After several negative experiences, Williams began asking herself, "Is it because I'm black?" Cheng also considers this, although she says she has not been directly confronted about her ethnicity. "It's difficult for everyone, and for people of color... some of the treatment did make me question: what's wrong, is it my culture?" — AFP

National cadres: A main pillar

Kuwait's real estate activity picks up in March


KUWAIT: The latest released data by the Ministry of Justice, Real Estate Registration & Authentications Department, indicates an increased real estate market activity during March 2023 versus February 2023 (after excluding the crafts activity and the coastal strip system). Total value of traded contracts and power of attorneys (POAs) was at KD 257.2 million in March, a 32.7 percent rise versus KD 193.9 million in February 2023 while declined by 30.8 percent versus KD 371.9 million in March 2022. Trading during March 2023 was distributed between KD 255.7 million in contracts and KD 1.4 million in POAs.

Number of real estate deals during March reached 351, of which 348 are contracts and 3 are POAs. The highest share in real estate deals went to Ahmadi governorate with 112 deals representing about 31.9 percent of the total number of real estate deals. Hawally governorate came second with 86 deals and representing 24.5 percent of total deals. The lowest share went to Jahra governorate with

10 deals, representing 2.8 percent of the total. The value of private housing activity reached KD 103.3 million, dropping by -19.2 percent compared with KD 127.9 million in February 2023. Its share of total real estate activity dropped to 40.2 percent versus 66 percent in February. The 12-monthly average of private housing activity stood at KD 153.3 million.

This means that March's trading value is 32.6 percent lower than the average. The number of deals for this activity dropped to 226 deals versus 258 deals in February. Accordingly, the value of private residential deals averaged KD 457,000 versus KD 496,000 in February, indicating a 7.8 percent decrease. The value of total investment activities scored KD 105.3 million, increasing by 73.9 percent when compared to KD 60.6 million in February 2023. Its contribution to overall real estate trading activity increased to 41 percent versus 31.2 percent in February. The trailing 12-month trading average of investment activity scored KD 91.5 4 million.

This means that the average trading value during March was 15.2 percent higher compared with the 12 months' average. In addition, the number of its deals rose to 121 compared with 93 deals in February. Therefore, the average value per deal for the investment activity reached KD 871,000 versus KD 651,000 in February, an increase by 33.7 percent. Commercial activity trading value increased to KD 42.4 million or by 685.5 percent, compared with KD 5.4 million in February 2023. Its share out of total real estate trading value increased to 16.5 percent compared with 2.8 percent in February.



The average value of commercial activity trading in the past 12 months scored KD 50 million. This means that trading value in March was 15.2 percent lower than the 12 months' average. Its deals totaled three compared to eight deals for February. The average value per deal for March reached KD 14.1 million versus a KD 675,000 average for February. Moreover, the warehousing activity had a single deal in March with a total value of KD 6.1

million. When comparing total March 2023 trading with March 2022, we note that liquidity in the real estate market decreased from KD 371.9 million to KD 257.2 million, i.e. a 30.8 percent decrease as mentioned previously. The drop was driven by the decrease of the private residential activity by 56.2 percent and the investment residential activity by 9 percent, while the commercial activity increased by 130.2 percent.

'Phantom of the Opera' ends record run with final Broadway bow

fter 35 years and almost 14,000 performances, the curtain fell for the fianal time Sunday on the longest-running show in Broadway history -- "The Phantom of the Opera.

Since opening in January 1988, Andrew Lloyd Webber's megahit musical has wowed New Yorkers and tourists alike, becoming a symbol of the famous theater district. The melodrama about a masked musical genius who haunts the Paris Opera House and whose heart aches for the young soprano Christine has been seen by 20 million people and grossed over \$1.4 billion in ticket sales.

But producers decided it was time to end the record-breaking run after the show struggled to rebound from Broadway's 18-month closure during the Covid-19 pandemic. Spectator Daniel Wright said that while he'd seen the show multiple times, the final night was "extraordinary."

"There were so many moments when I teared up, goose bumps, it was just a well-crafted show," the 56-year-old told AFP. "There are reasons why it has been around for 35 years. It's a timeless classic, it has touched so many people's lives." The show, adapted from Gaston Leroux's French novel of the same name, won seven 1988 Tony Awards, including best musical, and became the longest-running show in Broadway history on January 9, 2006. The production estimates that it has employed 6,500 people, including 450 actors, over the years. Sunday's show in front of a sold-out crowd at the Maiestic Theatre off Times Square was performance number 13,981. The 1,600-strong audience stood and applauded wildly as Lloyd Webber joined original and current cast members on the stage for the final curtain call. The septuagenarian British composer, who has been commissioned for King Charles III's coronation, dedicated the show to his son who died of cancer in March. "Thank you all, thank you everybody and thank you New York for being

'Got to come back'

It takes about 125 actors, musicians and technicians to put on the musical, which sees a chandelier crash to the

such a wonderful home for us," he said. Despite its many mega-fans, a lack of turnout since Covid-19 spelled the show's Broadway end. British producer Cameron Mackintosh told the New York Times in September last year that the production began incurring losses due to the slow re-

stage during one of its most memorable acts. "There comes a point, with any show, where there is a tipping point, where the number of good weeks has declined sufficiently that actually it's outweighed by the number of losing weeks, and at that point there's only one sensible decision to make." Mackintosh said.

Still, amid the final bows, Mackintosh underscored the show's triumph. "In our wildest childhood dreams, we could never imagine the success of Phantom," he said. The announcement that "Phantom" was ending its run boosted ticket demand so much that the closing date was pushed back from February to April. In the run-up to the final performance this week, the last tickets were selling for more than \$500 on booking sites. Extensive renovations are now due to begin at the Majestic Theatre.

The accolade for longest-running musical on Broadway now belongs to "Chicago," which premiered in 1996, ahead of "The Lion King," which opened the following year. The 41 Broadway theaters near Times Square that make up New York's cultural and touristic heart average between 200,000 and 300,000 spectators every week, bringing in more than \$30 million in weekly revenue.

"The Phantom of the Opera" premiered in 1986 in London, where it continues to be performed. Dedicated fans Christina Lewis and her teenage daughter Sparrow are ready to travel to the Big Smoke to get another "Phantom" fix, having seen the show at least 11 times. "It's sad it's going out but we are very, very excited to be able to be here and see the final curtain call. We cried a few times throughout the night," said 36-year-old nurse Lewis.

The pair were among audience members already clambering for a return of the production, with fellow spectator Richard Rodriguez, 38, saying, "It's got to come back, bring back the Phantom!"—AFP

Phantom of the Opera actor Murray Melvin dies at 90

ctor Murray Melvin, who appeared in the 2004 film version of The Phantom of the Opera, has died, his friends said. He was 90. Melvin, who rose to prominence as Geoffrey, the gay art student, in Shelagh Delaney's A Taste of Honey, died at St Thomas' hospital in London on Friday. "It's with great sadness that I have to announce the death of Murray Melvin - actor, director and theatre archivist," theatre director Kerry Michael wrote on Twitter. "He had a fall in December, from which he never fully recovered.

"He was one of my closest friends and will be missed by so many of us who had the privilege to know him." Melville, who was born in London in 1932, made his stage debut in 1957 at the Theatre Royal in Stratford in Macbeth. During his career he worked with eminent directors Joan Littlewood, Ken Russell and Stanley Kubrick. He stared in films such as Alfie with Michael Caine in 1966 and in Kubrick's war drama, Barry Lyndon, in 1975.

He who won a BAFTA film award for Most Promising Newcomer and Cannes Film Festival Best Actor award for his role in A Taste of Honey in 1961. "Murray Melvin: actor, director, Theatre Workshop alumnus, archivist and beautiful man, died yesterday," broadcaster Samira Ahmed tweeted. "He was 90. I was so lucky to call him my friend. I saw him the day before he died and he was always full of amazing stories from his life. I will miss him so much."-AFP

Coachella globalizes in step with international music trends

he original 1999 Coachella lineup was decidedly oriented towards rock acts and full of white men, but today, the premier music festival's lineup is more diverse and international than ever. The 2023 edition of the massive desert festival is a showcase of global talent, with more than half of the performing artists hailing from outside the United States, including artists from Puerto Rico, South Korea, Belgium and Pakistan

The centering of genre-spanning music performed in a variety of languages highlights the US industry's evolving response to global tastes, as streaming and social media offer obvious metrics on what's popular, and profitable. Bad Bunny, the Puerto Rican reggaeton master and world's biggest star, headlined the weekend's opening night with an adrenaline-pumping performance that paid homage to Caribbean music's influential lineage and had his fans screaming with delight.

On Saturday night, the K-pop megastars BLACKPINK put on one of the weekend's buzziest shows — and made history as the first Asian act to headline the festival — with tens of thousands of revelers descending on the main stage for a bombastic set of pop bangers preceded by a mesmerizing, drone-powered light show and punctuated by pyrotechnics. For CedarBough Saeji, a professor of Korean and East Asian studies who specializes in K-pop, the festival lineup emphasizing the hottest acts from across the globe is long overdue.

And when it comes to K-pop, "we've reached a point where the ongoing public demand for K-pop... is clear, even to people who may be watching the financial bottom line much more than they're watching trends," she said.

"America's a very large music market, there's a lot of people there," Saeji continued. "It's a very, very important tastemaker — but world cultural flows have shifted." "You don't have to be American to be the top group in the world."

'A new trip'

Major artists, including Spain's Rosalia, Iceland's Bjork and Nigeria's Burna Boy received top billings on the festival's main stage, while India's Diljit Dosanjh and Pakistan's Ali Sethi drew large crowds to their high-energy sets.

"When I saw those brown faces in their best, sort of like, South Asian regalia with a twist, it gave me so much courage," Sethi told AFP following his set. For "those of us who are coming from other places, coming from other traditions, who are speaking languages - musical languages, visual languages, and literally languages that haven't been heard here before - that Coachella welcomes us and has us here, it's a new trip." Sethi was already wildly popular prior to his Coachella performance: his song "Pasoori" was Google's most searched song in 2022 and boasts more than half a billion views on YouTube. According to scholar Saeji, the internet has played a vital role in "leveling the playing field."

"The internet is the reason why worldwide audiences have so much more awareness now of artists coming out of countries that ar-

en't traditional hegemons," she said. "I predict that no matter how much the US music industry may try to continue to try to gatekeep, eventually, we're going to see a situation where we have charting music coming from multiple languages all the time." "And that's beautiful."

Catholics line up for free tattoos in Austria

at toos inked during a free-of-charge session over the weekend -- organised by none other than Austria's leading group representing Catholic nuns and monks. "It's important for the church to look at how people express their piety, including on their bodies," said Christopher Paul Campbell, director of Quo Vadis.

He added that the church -- parts of which have frowned upon tattoos -- had to "learn to be sexy" if it wanted to keep attracting followers. The number of people leaving the Catholic church in Austria has been rising, reaching a record of almost 91,000 people last year. About half of the Alpine EU member's nine million people are Catholic. Quo Vadis said hundreds of believers were keen to attend the first such tattoo session near Vienna's iconic St. Stephen's Cathedral on Saturday.

In the end, the dozens of slots available were allotted in a lottery. The night before the

session, the German tattoo artist, his needles and everyone wanting to get tattooed were blessed in a mass. Believers could select from a list of intricate Christian motifs, including crosses and fishes.

Austrian Ursula Noe-Nordberg asked to get a small cross tattooed on her wrist. "It will be a surprise" for my family, the grandmother-of-five told AFP, adding the cross would remind her of her tattooed grandchildren. But not everyone was happy about the initiative, with organisers saying they received hate mail. Some people believe body art is satanic, despite the practice of tattooing stigmata or tributes to a pilgrimage dating back centuries. Even famous Austrians such as the 19th-century Empress Sisi were tattooed. "I got the criticism that we've turned the church into a disco. I say: okay, then I'm the DJ," countered Father Sandesh Manuel. The Franciscan monk, who wears a baseball cap and likes to rap, also got inked with the words "Humanity is the greeting of religion".—AFP

'Super Mario' games out second straight box office win

he Super Mario Bros. Movie" retained the top spot in North America's box office one week after its epic debut, as Universal's popular game-themed animation again trounced all competitors, estimates showed Sunday. The joint effort of Universal, Nintendo and Illumination studios raked in \$87 million in ticket sales in the Friday-through-Sunday period, bringing the movie's total haul to more than \$347 million, according to Exhibitor Relations.

The industry watcher had already predicted "Super Mario" — with its foundation in one of the most popular video games ever — will be the top movie of the year. Debuting in a very distant second place was Sony's "The Pope's Exorcist," starring Russell Crowe, which earned \$9.1 million.

"This is a solid opening for a modestly-budgeted original horror film," said analyst David A. Gross. Third spot belonged to Lionsgate's neo-

The Super Mario Bros. Movie" retained the top spot in North America's box office one week after its epic debut, as Universal's noir "John Wick: Chapter 4," with \$7.9 million bringing the thriller's four-week North America total to \$160 million.

Keanu Reeves stars as the titular hitman who finds himself fighting an international crime group. Horror-comedy "Renfield," distributed by Universal, pulled in \$7.7 million in its opening weekend to place fourth.

And Amazon Studios' "Air," a sports drama about the business deal surrounding Nike and the Michael Jordan basketball shoe that gives the name its title, slipped one spot to fifth, bringing in \$7.7 million.

Sega to buy Angry Birds maker Rovio

apanese gaming group Sega has offered to buy the creator of the popular Angry Birds franchise, Finland's Rovio, in a deal worth more than 700 million euros (\$770 million), the companies said Monday. The deal would mark the end the independence of Finnish mobile game makers, which burst into the scene when Rovio launched its slingshot-bird game more than a decade ago.

The bid by Sega, famous for its own animal character, Sonic the Hedgehog, is also the latest high-profile acquisition in the gaming sector. The offer, which represents a 19 percent premium over Rovio's closing share price on Friday, is part of Sega's "long-term goal" of expanding into the mobile gaming market, Sega CEO Haruki Satomi said.

"Among the rapidly growing global gaming market, the mobile gaming market has especially high potential," he said in a statement. Angry Birds instantly became one of the most successful mobile games ever released when it made its debut in 2009, with a variety of birds flying through the air to crash into structures and take down armies of green pigs. In 2016, the "Angry Birds" movie, produced by Sony Entertainment, was a massive success that grossed \$350 million worldwide. But Rovio has remained heavily reliant on its flagship game, struggling to develop another similar hit. In 2015, it laid off a third of its staff. "Combining the strengths of Rovio and Sega presents an incredibly exciting future," said Rovio chief executive Alexandre Pelletier-Normand. Rovio recommended that shareholders accept the offer.

Gaming consolidation

The Finnish company, which employs over 500 people, reported a revenue of 317.7 million euros for 2022, with an adjusted net profit of 31.4 million euros. Sega is aiming to open the offer period in early May and complete the deal in the third quarter, the company said. A major player in video games in the 1980s and 1990s, the Japanese company went into decline after it failed to compete against Japanese competitors Nintendo and Sony's consoles. Gaming companies are fighting it out for a slice of an industry worth hundreds of billions of dollars.

In the biggest bid in the sector's history, Xbox-maker Microsoft is seeking to buy "Call of Duty" and "Candy Crush" owner Activision Blizzard in a \$69 billion deal facing scrutiny from regulators. While more modest, Sega's acquisition of

Rovio would bring down the curtain on Finland's independent mobile game industry. In 2013, Supercell, creator of the Clash of Clans game, was bought by Japanese firms for \$1.5 billion—and the company was later scooped up by Chinese conglomerate Tencent. The small Nordic country is still home to smaller independent video game studios for consoles, such as Remedy Entertainment known for hit franchises such as Alan Wake and Max Payne.

Three university students

Started in 2003 by three university students, it took Rovio—which means "bonfire" in Finnish—six years to hit it big in the nascent mobile game business, brought about by the widespread adoption of smartphones. Rovio had already launched 50 other games and was hovering near bankruptcy when it launched Angry Birds in 2009. To their great relief, mobile users quickly became addicted to demolishing fortresses built by egg-snatching green pigs and the game swiftly moved to the top downloads on Apple's App Store.

With hundreds of millions of players, Angry Birds became one of the most successful mobile games ever launched. By 2011, the small three-person company had turned into a multi-million euro gaming giant employing over 200 people. Rovio launched its initial public offering on the Helsinki stock exchange in 2017, valuing the company at almost 900 million euros.

Capitalizing on the popularity, Rovio turned the game into one of the most recognizable brands in the world. The company manages Angry Birds theme parks in several countries and oversees the publication of children's books about the famous birds in a dozen languages.—AFP

American jazz piano great Ahmad Jamal dies at 92

hmad Jamal, a towering and influential US jazz pianist, composer and band leader whose career spanned more than seven decades, died at age 92 on Sunday, according to news reports.

Jamal's widow Laura Hess-Hey confirmed his death, The Washington Post reported, while his daughter Sumayah Jamal told The New York Times the cause was prostate cancer. Music news outlets in France and Britain also reported his death.

and Britain also reported his death.

Jamal was friends with music greats such as Miles Davis, and influenced his work and that of other musicians, including the pianist McCoy Tyner. Born Frederick Russell Jones in Pittsburgh, Jamal converted to Islam in 1950. He won myriad awards over the course of his career, including France's prestigious Ordre des Arts and des Lettres in 2007 and

a Grammy Lifetime Achievement Award in 2017.

Jamal was credited with luring a larger pop audience to enjoy jazz. His playing style was described as lean, with The Post citing his "lessis-more dynamics." One technique he used to great effect was placing silence between notes.

The New Yorker, writing last year to mark the release of some unis-

sued recordings, said that in the 1950s "his musical concept was one of the great innovations of the time, even if its spare, audacious originality was lost on many listeners."

Jamal's commercial break-through was a 1958 album entitled "Ahmad Jamal at the Pershing: But Not for Me." It stayed on the Bill-board magazine charts for more than 100 weeks. The New York Times said it became one of the best-selling instrumental records of its time. Dozens more followed in what The Times called "a catalog sprinkled with gems."

In his autobiography, Davis the trumpeter wrote of Jamal: "He knocked me out with his concept of space, his lightness of touch, his understatement, and the way he phrased notes and chords and passages." —AFP

PARIS: Shakhtar Donetsk's objectives used to be His father-in-law Ivan Petrenko was killed in action confined to silverware but now the storied Ukrainian football club have loftier aims, financing hospital care abroad for wounded soldiers and finding new homes for orphans. The club — whose lifting of the 2009 UEFA Cup makes it one of only two Ukrainian teams to win a European club competition — has through its foundation Shakhtar Social spared no expense since Russia invaded Ukraine in February 2022

They have paid €100,000 (\$110,000) each for five severely wounded soldiers to be sent for medical treatment in hospitals in the United States and Spain. "You cannot imagine what injuries they have," Shakhtar CEO Sergey Palkin told AFP in a phone interview. "Two of them are paralyzed, others suffered catastrophic wounds in a rocket detonation. It is very difficult to control one's emotions when one sees them. We want to give them a chance of a normal life. These hospitals have very sophisticated procedures. The families cannot sustain those expenses and the government has no capability to provide this financial help so we are taking care of them."

Children have suffered too amid the death and destruction. Some have been killed, some have been left as orphans and others have been forcibly taken to Russia. "We have looked after 31 children, who lost their parents due to the war and we have found them 17 families," said Palkin. "We provide living expenses, medical treatments, iPads and try to normalize the situation from a psychological point of view. "These children have been left traumatized by the violent loss of their parents."

Shakhtar's Ukrainian international defender Ivan Petryak knows what it is like to lose a family member. in the Donbas in May last year. "The guys who were with him saw him die," Petryak told AFP. "For us as a family it is the worst situation as we cannot find the body and we cannot make the funeral to say goodbye. This is the worst for us as we do not know what to do as we have no information about him.'

'Bit of a circus'

Shakhtar have bitter experience of what it is like to be displaced. The club hosted matches in the 2012 European Championship but two years later they were on the move after the Russians seized Crimea. They played in Kyiv before the war and are now in Lviv. Little did they realize they would play host to more refugees from the Donbas region eight years later as the Russian army swept in once again. "We accepted more than 2,000 refugees from the east-ern part of Ukraine," said Palkin. "We provide food, medical treatment, including psychological treatment, helping people to concentrate on what they should do regarding their next steps. Many lost houses, apartments, their passports and personal documents.'

Petryak says he cannot envisage a scenario where he takes to a pitch in the future against a Russian team — "they are like zombies" he says of the Russian players and their support of President Vladimir Putin. Equally he is dumbfounded that IOC President Thomas Bach has left the door open for Russian and Belarusian athletes to compete in the Olympics in Paris next year. "The situation is not possible," he said.

"Bach is very wrong. Every day they kill our children, people, athletes. More than 200 athletes have been killed and he wants to say Russia and Belarus are al-

lowed at the Olympic Games. How is it possible? It is unbelievable. For me it is a bit of a circus." Petryak says he understands why the vast majority of foreign players went out on loan once the conflict took hold. He is extremely proud though that despite losing a huge amount of Brazilian talent, the club still finished third in their Champions League group and reached

the last 16 of the Europa League this season. "Some athletes have taken up the gun," he said. "My team, we support the country with money and we can give more from this side. I am not criticizing those who took up the gun but we feel the better we play, the more money we can send to the army and other athletes. We are like a big family." – AFP



Fitzpatrick wins playoff with Spieth to clinch Heritage

MIAMI: England's Matt Fitzpatrick beat defending champion Jordan Spieth in a thrilling sudden-death playoff on Sunday to win the PGA's RBC Heritage tournament. The pair, who played in the same group in the final round, both ended regulation play on 17-under 267 after Spieth shot 66 and Fitzpatrick 68 at Harbour Town on Hilton Head Island, South Carolina.

It took until the third hole of the playoff for a champion to be decided when Fitzpatrick produced a brilliant 9-iron approach shot on the par-4 18th and made a simple birdie putt to win. Spieth, who beat fellow American Patrick Cantlay in a playoff last year, had over-hit his approach going to the back of the green and needed two putts to make par.

Fitzpatrick, the US Open champion, becomes the first Englishman to win the tournament since Nick Faldo in 1984 and he did so in the town where he spent many of his family vacations after first visiting as a six-year-old. "It's hard to describe. I said to (caddie) Billy (Foster), it doesn't get better than this walking down here, just looking around. It's a course I dreamed of playing when I was young," he said, with his family congratulating him at the side of the green. "I managed to play a couple of times with my dad and yes, this one means more than anything.

Spieth had made four birdies in the opening six holes but he missed a short putt for bogey on the par-3 14th and left the door open for Fitzpatrick. The Englishman then made birdies on the 15th and 16th to grab a share of the lead and could have won it at the death if Spieth hadn't made a tricky six-footer to force the playoff.

"It was a really good round. I got off to a dream start and then just kind of hung in there for a little while and then made a nice putt to get into the playoff, and then played the playoff really well," said Spieth. "Someone was going to make a birdie. It wasn't going to be a bogey to lose that playoff the way that we were both playing today. He just did what he needed to do on 15 in, when it had been kind of me and Patrick for a little while there. He just snuck in and played some tremendous golf."

Cantlay, the other member of the leading group, finished in third after carding a 68 to leave him one shot behind Fitzpatrick and Spieth. Cantlay paid the price for bogeys on the par-4 13th and the par-3 14th, where his ball had stuck in the wood barrier by the waterside green. Xander Schauffele's final-round 66 earned him fourth place, two shots behind the leaders after he ended with a late surge by making birdies on 15, 16 and 17. World number two Scottie Scheffler's final round of 70 left him 12-under overall and tied for 11th while Masters champion and world number one Jon Rahm shot 68 but was tied for 15th, six shots off the pace. – AFP

O'Callaghan beats McKeon in clash of champions

GOLD COAST: World champion Mollie O'Callaghan won a showdown with Olympic gold medalist Emma McKeon on Monday to take the women's 100m freestyle title at the Australian championships in the fastest time this year. The 19-year-old touched in a sizzling 52.63 seconds to beat a top-notch field. Shayna Jack (52.64) hit the wall second ahead of seven-time Tokyo Olympic medallist McKeon (53.22) in a race that also featured returning veteran Cate Campbell.

Campbell, who has won eight medals over four Olympics, including four gold, was mulling retirement after Tokyo, where she took 100m bronze behind winner McKeon. But she returned for her first major event since then to finish fifth in 53.78, with her eye on the world championships in Japan this year and a fifth Olympics in Paris in 2024.

"It hurts, but great to touch the wall," said O'Callaghan, whose time was quicker than the 52.67 that won her gold at the world championships in Budapest last year, an event McKeon skipped. "I'm just so happy I get to have an awesome training mate in Shayna. It's been working out really great." Australia's world championship trials are in Melbourne in June.

Kaylee McKeown, who shattered the 200m backstroke world record last month, also raced the 100 free and came eighth. She earlier won the 200m medley in a personal best 2:08.16, second only to Canadian sensation Summer McIntosh this year and quicker than the pace that earned her silver in Budapest in 2022.

Swimming royalty Ariarne Titmus, whose 400m freestyle world record was broken by McIntosh last month, won the 800m freestyle in 8:20.19 ahead of world short-course champion Lani Pallister. Titmus dethroned Katie Ledecky in the Olympic 200m and 400m freestyle but could only finish second to the American great over 800m. — AFP

Kirkwood wins at **Long Beach for first** IndyCar crown

LOS ANGELES: American racer Kyle Kirkwood held off French teammate Romain Grosjean down the final laps to win Sunday's Long Beach Grand Prix and capture his first career IndyCar title. The Andretti Autosport duo led a showing of three cars in the top four but it was Kirkwood who came out on top by 0.9907 of a second after 85 laps over the 1.968-mile, 11-turn temporary course on the streets of Long Beach, California.

"I felt like I needed this win and we got it. A moment of relief, no doubt," the 24-yearold US driver said after taking his 20th career IndyCar start. "I just had a moment of relaxation. I was just like, 'Finally.' It's not really finally because we're only three races in (the season). But it felt like it for me." Grosjean, who went for his last refuelling one lap before Kirkwood, was second with Sweden's Marcus Ericsson, last year's Indianapolis 500 winner, taking the last podium spot ahead of another Andretti driver, American Colton Herta. "I'm very happy for him," Grosjean said of Kirkwood. "I wish I was in his position right now. He drove a hell of a race, like a champ. He deserved that. 'We tried everything we could on our end. It was not easy. With our fuel situation we couldn't really attack. I knew it wasn't going to work out." Team owner Michael Andretti was overjoyed after struggles in the two opening races of the campaign. "I'm so happy for everybody that worked so hard for us. It was definitely big," he said. "That was the medicine we needed.'

Kirkwood's best prior finish in 19 IndyCar races was 10th at Long Beach last year for A J Foyt Racing. Pole sitter Kirkwood stayed in the lead until compatriot Josef Newgarden, last year's Long Beach winner, zipped in front on a lap-27 restart when slower traffic held back Kirkwood. But Kirkwood used a superior time on the last pit lap exchange to return to the track ahead of Newgarden, who faded while conserving fuel over the final 31 laps. — AFP

Liga leaders Barca drop more points, Atletico beat Almeria

break down Getafe in a 0-0 draw on Sunday, dropping more points but still sitting 11 clear of Real Madrid at the top of La Liga. Third-place Atletico Madrid beat Almeria 2-1 at home with Antoine Griezmann netting a brace as he continued his sparkling form. Valencia sunk deeper into the relegation mire with a 2-0 home defeat by Sevilla, who host Manchester United in the Europa League on Thursday.

Champions Madrid beat Cadiz on Saturday to cut back Barcelona's lead, and with nine games remaining it seems highly unlikely they will catch Barcelona but Xavi Hernandez's side are limping over the line. Barcelona drew 0-0 at home against Girona on Monday and followed that up with a second consecutive stalemate, the team still wallowing after their Copa del Rey semifinal thrashing by Madrid earlier in April.

The one positive for Barca was a 22nd clean sheet of the season in the top flight, with Getafe, 15th, not creating much danger. "Here you suffer, because the grass is high, the usual tricks, so it's hard, the clear chances you have — you have to put them away," Barca goalkeeper Marc-Andre ter Stegen told DAZN. "It's a dry pitch, so it's difficult. We did things differently to normal." Xavi echoed Ter Stegen's complaint that the low quality of the pitch played a part in the result, but said Barca could not hide behind it. "It's not an excuse, we weren't accurate, we made chances but we could not finish them," said Xavi. "But yes, the grass did hurt us, the ball didn't run."

No way through

After a slow start, the Catalans created the first clear chance at the Coliseum Alfonso Perez, when Raphinha fired against the post, with Balde's follow-up also striking the woodwork. Sergi Roberto pulled up injured, seemingly with a hamstring issue, adding to Barcelona's long list of absentees.



Ten-man Union go third despite **Bochum stalemate**


BERLIN: Union Berlin remain on course for a first-ever Champions League qualification, reclaiming third in the Bundesliga with a 1-1 home draw against Bochum on Sunday. Union took the lead late in the first half thanks to a Josip Juranovic free kick, before Bochum's Kevin Stoeger equalized from the spot early in the second.

Union were reduced to 10 men shortly after the penalty but were the more dangerous side in the closing stages, forward Kevin Behrens going agonizingly close to a winner with five minutes remaining. Despite dropping points, Union leapfrogged RB Leipzig who won 3-2 at home against Augsburg on Saturday to move back to third. Union manager Urs Fischer blamed his side's "lethargic minutes" at the start of the second half, saying "in football, you get punished for mistakes".

Free-kick specialists Union opened the scoring in typical fashion in first-half injury time. Croatia international Juranovic hit a perfectly weighted free kick between a gap in the wall and past 'keeper Manu Riemann, his fourth goal since arriving from Celtic in January. Bochum grabbed control of the fixture in a ten-minute period early in the second half, starting with a seemingly harmless tactical yellow card for Union's Paul Jaeckel after 50 minutes.

Union's Aissa Laidouni swept Ivan Ordets' legs out from under him in the penalty box shortly after, with Stoeger blasting the equaliser straight down the middle from the spot. Five minutes later, Jaeckel picked up a second yellow for a foul on Patrick Osterhage, reducing the home side to ten men. Union's Behrens' had a 64th-minute goal chalked off for offside. The big forward had another golden chance with five minutes to go when Sheraldo Becker found him unmarked in front of goal, but he headed just wide. Bochum, who have claimed eight points from their past five matches, go three points clear of the relegation places with the draw.

In Sunday's late game, Wolfsburg dented Bayer Leverkusen's hopes of an unlikely return to Champions League football, holding Xabi Alonso's in-form side to a 0-0 draw at home. Leverkusen, who had been in the relegation zone when the former Bayern



Arsenal blow lead again in draw

Man Utd beat Forest to climb to third in Premier League

LONDON: Arsenal blew a two-goal lead for the second game in a row as Bukayo Saka's penalty miss proved crucial in the Premier League leaders' damaging 2-2 draw against West Ham on Sunday. Mikel Arteta's side struck twice in the first 10 minutes at the London Stadium thanks to goals from Gabriel Jesus and Martin Odegaard. But just seven days after squandering a 2-0 advantage in their 2-2 draw at Liverpool, the Gunners again cracked under the pressure of the title race.

Said Benrahma's penalty reduced the deficit for West Ham before the interval and after Saka fired his spot-kick wide early in the second half, Jarrod Bowen volleyed in an equalizer for the struggling hosts. It was a hammer blow for Arsenal, who sit four points clear of second-placed Manchester City but have ceded the title race momentum to Pep Guardiola's team.

City had closed within three points of the Gunners after beating Leicester 3-1 on Saturday and it is the champions who have the destiny of the title in their hands despite trailing Arsenal for much of the season. City, who have won their last 10 matches in all competitions, have a game in hand on Arsenal. With a home game against Arsenal looming on April 26, City know they will lift a fifth title in six seasons if they win their remaining eight matches. By the time Arsenal travel to the Emirates Stadium they will be seven points clear of City if they beat bottom-of-the-table Southampton on Friday.

Yet that gap would still look uncomfortably small to Arsenal fans fearing their team are in the process

of wasting a golden opportunity to win a first title since 2004. While City are battle-tested in handling the tension of the title race, Arsenal's young squad look to be suffering an ill-timed attack of nerves.

Arsenal anxiety

Arsenal needed just seven minutes to take the lead as Odegaard's deft pass found Ben White, who delivered a low cross that Jesus slotted home at the far post. Jesus's fourth goal in his last three games was followed by the Gunners' second three minutes later as they ruthlessly punished West Ham's woeful marking. Gabriel Martinelli's pinpoint cross found Odegaard in acres of space and the midfielder blasted a volley past Lukasz Fabianski from an acute angle six yards out.

The turning point came in the 33rd minute when Arsenal, looking a little overconfident after such a swaggering start, needlessly conceded a penalty. Thomas Partey surrendered possession to Declan Rice and when the West Ham midfielder picked out Lucas Paqueta's run, Gabriel Magalhaes' mistimed sliding tackle was correctly ruled a penalty despite Arsenal appeals for handball.

Mohamed Salah had missed a penalty against Arsenal last weekend, but they were out of luck this time as Benrahma sent Aaron Ramsdale the wrong way from the spot. Saka should have eased Arsenal's mounting anxiety when Antonio conceded a 50th minute penalty with an outstretched arm that blocked Martinelli's flick. But instead Saka spiked

the tension level even higher with a woeful spot-kick that completely missed hit the target, a costly blunder that recalled the England forward's Euro 2020 final penalty shoot-out failure against Italy.

Saka held his head in his hands and with Arsenal clearly rattled, David Moyes' side snatched an equalizer in the 54th minute. Thilo Kehrer guided the ball into the Arsenal area and Bowen was just onside as his volley ricocheted off the turf and skidded past Ramsdale's despairing dive. Michail Antonio nearly won it for West Ham in the closing stages, rising to head Benrahma's cross against the bar.

Manchester United win again

Meanwhile, Injury-hit Manchester United beat relegation-threatened Nottingham Forest 2-0 on Sunday to strengthen their push for a top-four Premier League finish. Erik ten Hag's men took full advantage of defeats for rivals Newcastle and Tottenham the previous day to climb to third in the table, courtesy of goals from Antony and Diogo Dalot.

The teams had already met three times this season, including in a two-legged League Cup semifinal — with United winning on each occasion. Injured United central-defensive pairing Raphael Varane and Lisandro Martinez were replaced by Harry Maguire and Victor Lindelof, while Dalot came in for Tyrell Malacia.

The visitors, also missing top-scorer Marcus Rashford, were forced into a late change when midfielder Marcel Sabitzer was injured in the

warm-up and replaced by Christian Eriksen, making his first start since January following an ankle injury. Forest, who had not won in their past nine games, made four changes. United were quickly out of the blocks and Jadon Sancho had a strike blocked in the opening moments.

The visitors dominated possession but Steve Cooper's Forest were a menace from set-pieces. Forest goalkeeper Keylor Navas saved from Bruno Fernandes before a VAR check for a potential penalty at the other end after the ball hit Maguire's arm from a corner. United took the lead in the 32nd minute when Antony poked home after Navas parried a powerful shot from Anthony Martial. Dalot almost gifted Forest an equaliser shortly before half-time after some sloppy play but Taiwo Awoniyi smashed the ball well over.

Fernandes put a header wide from the centre of the box just before the break. United continued to dominate in the second half, with Fernandes and Eriksen pulling the strings. Portugal international Fernandes produced a stunning curling effort from the left of the box that was pushed on to the bar by Navas and Antony fired just wide. Martial missed a glorious chance to extend United's lead when he headed wide with 20 minutes to go before Forest defender Felipe nodded over from close range. United finally got the reward their dominance deserved in the 76th minute when Dalot burst into the box to meet a pass by Antony to score his first Premier League goal. — AFP

NBA injury fears for Giannis, Morant as Lakers, Heat win

LOS ANGELES: Milwaukee superstar Giannis Antetokounmpo and Memphis star guard Ja Morant suffered serious injuries that threatened to disrupt two title contenders on Sunday in NBA playoff series-opening defeats. The Los Angeles Lakers took advantage of Morant's absence late in the fourth quarter for a late surge that produced a 128-112 victory at Memphis while the top-seeded host Bucks, who lost their Greek star in the first quarter, fell 130-117 to the eighth-seeded Miami Heat.

But injury fears for Antetokounmpo and Morant, two of the NBA's most electrifying stars, were amplified by upset home losses for their clubs in best-of-seven first round openers. Antetokounmpo averaged 31.1 points and 11.8 rebounds a game this season for an NBA-best 58-24 Bucks squad while Morant averaged 26.2 points for a Grizzlies team that was 51-31.

Morant hurt his already-sore right hand midway into the fourth quarter trying to brace a hard landing after contact while driving to the basket. Morant's taped right hand took the impact. Morant rose and ran off to the locker room, grabbing his sore hand and screaming as he exited after scoring 18 points. "I'm in a good bit of pain," Morant said after the game, declaring his status was "in jeopardy" for game two on Wednesday. "Feels like it's one thing after another."

Memphis coach Taylor Jenkins said after the game that x-rays on Morant's right hand were negative but he would likely be kept out of workouts, his status "one game at a time". At Milwaukee, Antetokounmpo went onto the floor in the first quarter after defensive

contact on a move to the hoop and suffered a lower back bruise that ended his night with game two in Milwaukee on Wednesday.

"We'll monitor him," said Bucks coach Mike Budenholzer, who added an x-ray came back "clear" on Antetokounmpo. "We have to wait and see what the doctors say... you've got to take it day by day and see how he's doing and how he feels."

The Heat, among the NBA's worst 3-point shooting teams this season, made 15-of-25 from beyond the arc at Milwaukee. While the Bucks had gone 11-8 in games without Antetokounmpo this season, the Heat led by as many as 15 points with the big man gone. Miami suffered its own injury setback when guard Tyler Herro broke his right hand diving for a loose ball in the second quarter. He's expected to be out four to six weeks after averaging 20.1 points this season.

Jimmy Butler led Miami with 35 points and 11 assists. Gabe Vincent was 4-of-5 from 3-point range and Kevin Love was 4-of-7 on 3-pointers. With Antetokounmpo scoring only eight points, Khris Middleton led the Bucks with 33 points. — AFP

Rublev relishes Monte Carlo 'fairytale'

MONTE CARLO: Andrey Rublev said winning his first Masters 1000 trophy in Monte Carlo on Sunday was like a "fairytale" after the Russian battled past Denmark's Holger Rune in three sets. The fifth seed came from 4-1 down in the deciding set to defeat sixth-seeded teenager Rune 5-7, 6-2, 7-5 after one hour 34 minutes on the red clay of Court Rainier III. The 25-year-old achieved the biggest win of his career after losing Masters finals in Monte Carlo and Cincinnati, both in 2021, to boost his confidence heading into next month's

"It's a great feeling. Today I handled my emotions really well," said Rublev. "After struggling so much, so many times, losing in the finals, semifinals, losing even earlier, to win first 1000 Masters and finally I did it. "To win a match like this, losing 4-1, Love-30, breakpoint for 5-1, and to be able to come back and to win is like a fairytale today," said the world number six, who blasted

down 33 winners on the way to his 13th career title.

"I remember the previous finals and when I was losing I thought I'd have no chance and mentally I was going down. But today I thought, 'Just believe until the end', and this is what I was trying to do in the third set, hoping I would have an extra chance to come back and what a way to do it." Deprived of his national flag after the Russian invasion of Ukraine, the player from Moscow thanked the crowd for their support. "Coming from the country where I come from, to receive such international support, it is enormous," he said.

Rune was aiming for his second Masters 1000 title after defeating five Top 10 players en route to the title in Paris last year. But the 19-year-old conceded he did not have enough time to recover from his thrilling three-set win over Italy's Jannik Sinner on Saturday. "I didn't have

any more in me," he said. "I was definitely in control in the third set and also I would say mostly in the first set as well but didn't manage to close it out. "Disappointing, but the most important tournament of the clay season is the French Open, so if I can prepare myself as best as possible for that one, that's what matters."

The two players had previously played each other twice — the Dane won last year at the Masters 1000 in Paris in the quarter-finals before defeating Novak Djokovic in the final. In January, it was Rublev who won their Australian Open clash after saving match points in the last 16. But on Sunday, the meeting of these two flory highlitters failed to live up to expectations.

fiery big hitters failed to live up to expectations.

The Dane saved seven of the eight break points he faced in the first set, before benefiting from a big unforced error by Rublev on the last game's break point. The Russian immediately took the lead in the second set to lead 2-0, but Rune came back to 2-2. In the process, Rublev chained four games to equalize at one set all. Rune seemed to be on a roll to victory in the third set racing to 3-0 and had a double break point to lead 5-1. — AFP
