But if you turn away from obedience, (then know that) Our Messenger (PBUH) has no other duty than to clearly convey the Truth." (At-Tagha'bun 64: 12)

It is clear that dates have historically been a major part of Middle Eastern culture and cuisine. Apart from their spiritual significance and being juicy and delicious treats, dates are also an incredible source of nutrients, antioxidants, and many health benefits. While observing Ramadan and fasting from dawn to sunset, dates are a perfect food to consume to restore your energy and give your body the fuel it needs.

The Majestic Allah also tells what can be translated as: "There has certainly been for you in the Messenger of Allah an excellent pattern for anyone whose hope is in Allah and the Last Day and (who) remembers Allah often." (Al-Ahzab 33: 21) Prophet Muhammad (PBUH) - breaking his fast on dates and water: Anas bin Malik narrated that Allah's Messenger (PBUH) used to break his fast before performing (the Maghreb – sunset) - prayer on some fresh unripe dates, but if there were no fresh unripe dates, he would then eat a few dry dates, and if there were no dry dates, he would take some mouthfuls of water." (Al-Albani rated it as Hasan/Saheeh in Saheeh Abu Dawud # 2, 356)

Humanity lifeblood is under threat: UN

UNITED NATIONS: The future of humanity's "lifeblood"—water—is under threat worldwide, the UN secretary-general warned Wednesday at the opening of the global body's first major meeting on water resources in nearly half a century. "We've broken the water cycle, destroyed ecosystems and contaminated groundwater," Antonio Guterres said at the three-day summit in New York, which gathers some 6,500 participants including a dozen heads of state and government.

"We are draining humanity's lifeblood through vampiric overconsumption and unsustainable use, and evaporating it through global heating," Gu-

terres told the conference. A report by UN-Water and UNESCO released Tuesday warned of too little or too much water in some places and contaminated water in others—conditions it said highlight the imminent risk of a global water crisis.

"If nothing is done, it will be a business-as-usual scenario—it will keep on being between 40 percent and 50 percent of the population of the world that does not have access to sanitation and roughly 20-25 percent of the world will not have access to safe water supply," report lead author Richard Connor told AFP. With the global population increasing every day, "in absolute numbers, there'll be more and more people that don't have access to these services," he said. The report also warned that water "scarcity is becoming endemic" due to overconsumption and pollution, while global warming will increase seasonal water shortages in both areas with abundant Continued on Page 6

to more countries in other languages. "As more peo-

ple start to use Bard and test its capabilities, they'll

surprise us," Pichai said in a memo to staff seen by AFP. "Things will go wrong. But the user feedback is critical to improving the product and the underlying technology," added Pichai, who had faced some criticism within the company for rushing to catch up with Microsoft.

In the launch, people wishing to play with Bard can sign up on a waiting list at bard.google.com website, distinctly separate from the tech giant's search engine.

India Minister hails strong India-Kuwait bilateral ties

Embassy marks 62nd anniversary; India, Gulf deepen ties

NEW DELHI: Indian Minister of State for Foreign Affairs and Culture Meenakshi Lekhi affirmed the strong relations between India and Kuwait and expressed her keenness to seek ways to strengthen and develop these ties into broader areas to achieve common interests of both countries. Kuwaiti Ambassador to India Jassem Ibrahim Al-Najim said that this year marks the 62nd anniversary of the establishment of diplomatic relations between the two countries, expressing his hope that these close relations between the two countries will witness growth and development in the coming years.

He praised the 'Project Mausam' which aims to restore communication between the countries of the Indian Ocean, including the countries in the Arabian Gulf, which will also contribute to strengthening cultural relations between India and Kuwait. This came during a ceremony held by the Kuwait Embassy in New Delhi on the occasion marking the 62nd anniversary of the establishment of diplomatic relations between the two countries.

The event was attended by a number of officials in the Indian Ministry of Foreign Affairs and a number of heads of missions accredited in New Delhi. It is worth noting that Meenakshi Lekhi supervises the 'Project Mausam' which was launched in June 2014 in Qatar with an aim of creating a comprehensive database and electronic platform for UNESCO on sea routes, linking UNESCO cultural agreements with the World Heritage Convention. It also promotes research in sustainable tourism, heritage development, and highlights other cultural legacies across the Indian Ocean region.

In another development, India and the Gulf Cooperation Council (GCC) countries have agreed to deepen cooperation in several areas of mutual interest. The Indian Ministry of External Affairs said in a statement that Secretary from the External Affairs Ministry Ausaf Sayeed headed the Indian delegation in the first round of India-GCC Senior Officers Meeting held in Saudi city of Riyadh. Indian and GCC officials also hailed the progress in relations between India-GCC countries built on historical relationship, growing trade and investment, and presence of an 8.5 million Indians in the region.

"GCC as a trade bloc is the largest trade partner to India with a total trade of 154 billion dollars in 2021-22," it said adding people-to-people ties need to be further enhanced. The discussion

Doctors perform a rare surgery at **Jaber Hospital**

KUWAIT: Jaber Hospital held a five-day workshop during which five delicate pediatric neurosurgeries were carried out, including one that was done for the first time in Kuwait. The procedure, called a rhizotomy, is a minimally invasive surgical procedure to remove sensation from a painful nerve by killing nerve fibers responsible for sending pain signals to the brain. It was done on the back nerves of a child in order to alleviate the muscle cramps he is experiencing and help him move.

Jaber Hospital Neurologist Dr Aliaa Askar said such cases are rare but affect the general health of the patient, including their general functions and the nerves condition. She said the success rate in some cases may reach 80 percent. She added that the workshop was held under the supervision of the health ministry and aimed at learning from physicians with international experience in field of pediatric surgery.

Head of Jaber Hospital's surgery department Dr Suleiman Al-Mazidi lauded the ministry's role in bringing in the most competent doctors in addition to the best equipment to serve patients. He said the hospital seeks to attract Kuwaiti doctors along with inviting international experts to carry out delicate operations which contributes to reducing medical treatment abroad by presenting the best health services and most modern techniques to patients.


The visiting medical team carried out consultations for pediatric neurosurgery cases. The team also reviewed symptoms and diagnoses for cases to be operated on during the workshop. Askar hoped the ministry will continue to invite international experts in the future. Pediatric Neurologist and Head of the Neurosurgery Department at Arnold Palmer hospital in Florida Dr Samer Al-Baba said the visit was a consultative one where he carried out some surgeries. Dr Al-Baba said he prescribed the best medication for the cases he reviewed with assistance from the local team at Jaber Hospital.

He added that Jaber Hospital is a modern and advanced facility supplied with the best available equipment. Head of the neurosurgery unit Dr Ayoub Dixon lauded the efforts of brain and spine surgeons and their efforts in improving patient service. He added that the field of surgical technology will see more advancements in coming days in order to carry out complex, delicate surgeries.

UK, Kuwait hold strategic dialogue on boosting ties

LONDON: The first round of strategic dialogue between Kuwait and the United Kingdom has been held in the UK, with both sides examining prospects of cementing further the historic and broad relations and cooperation at diverse levels. The Kuwaiti side in the dialogue session was headed by Foreign Minister Sheikh Salem Abdullah Al-Jaber Al-Sabah, while the British side was chaired by Sir James Cleverly, the Foreign Secretary of Great Britain and North Ireland.

Also during Monday's session, Sheikh Salem praised solidity of the cooperation at various international quarters, expressing hope for boosting this cooperation and lauding the high level of the solid, historic, strategic and friendly relations bonding the State of Kuwait with the UK. Sir Cleverly expressed pride of the friendly and close relations and the strategic partnership between his nation and the State of Kuwait. Although the world has been witnessing major and various developments, the Kuwaiti-UK relations have grown stronger, he said, also applauding Kuwait's balanced foreign policy that is based on bolstering regional security and peace.

Oil sector informs

In a new report submitted to the Council of Ministers, the Oil Ministry announced there is no need to raise fuel prices currently in response to a request from the government whether fuel prices need to be increased within a series of government reviews of the prices of services provided, as well as the prices of state property, which were recently reviewed.

"The government seeks to increase the revenues of the state's non-oil general budget, which has made ministries re-price their services in

line with needs, as well as their compatibility with the real cost of services provided. The oil sector responded to the government that current gasoline prices are appropriate, under control of the Kuwait Petroleum Corporation, as well as its sales are very appropriate and gasoline production is suitable for consumption" sources revealed to Kuwait Times.

"Moreover, the report did not reject the increase in the future, but rather attributed it to the circumstances and developments. If the circumstances require the increase, the Kuwait Petroleum Corporation will request a decision from the Council of Ministers approving the price increase by a proportion commensurate with production and cost," they added.

"The government assigned the Ministerial Economic Committee to study the extent to which the increase in government service prices reflects on public prices in Kuwait as well as its effects on the local market," calling on concerned ministries to tighten their control over the markets in order to prevent any increase, and to hold each party that goes to this path accountable. —Agencies

NEW YORK: Kuwait pledged about \$90 million to support the UN's efforts to aid survivors of the earthquake that hit Turkey and Syria last month. The pledge is part of the UN's urgent appeals for the two countries, which include the donations of both the people and government, the UN office of the High Commissioner for Human Rights Martin Griffiths said in a press statement on Wednesday.

The UN Secretary General's undersecretary for humanitarian affairs and rescue coordinator noted that he is deeply concerned that the amount of financing is not any close to the target number, adding that Kuwait's pledge will be of great help for families who lost everything.

The pledge, the highest any country had offered since the disaster, will aid the UN organizations is providing food, education, shelter, health services and more for about 18 million people affected by the earthquakes. After the earthquakes, the UN had announced the need for \$398 million for an urgent response in Syria and one billion dollars for Turkey. Up until now, 79 percent of the target number for Syria was met, while finance rate for Turkey reached 19 percent.

Customs seize 84 pills and 79 hashish pieces

KUWAIT: Airport Customs have seized around 84 pills with an Asian expatriate who tried to hide them within his clothes in his personal items. Another Asian expatriate tried to hide 79 pieces of hashish in his clothes. They were both transferred to the concerned departments. Airport Management Director Osama Al-Shami said the increase in seizures is evident of the increased awareness of customs inspectors and their keenness to perform their duty.

Social Affairs team to investigate charities

KUWAIT: The social affairs ministry has announced the formation of a team to inspect violating and illegal charities for immediate removal. The team will be following a program to monitor violations which has been prepared by charity societies. This comes within the efforts to supervise activities during the holy month of Ramadan in cooperation with the Awqaf ministry.

Awqaf releases guidelines for Ramadan charity collection

KUWAIT: The Ministry of Awqaf and Islamic Affairs announced that it is permissible to collect donations in mosques throughout the holy month of Ramadan, according to conditions and controls in agreement with the Ministry of Social Affairs and Community Development. The Director of Information Department in the Ministry Ahmed Al-Otaibi said in a press statement that Awqaf allows the collection of donations through bank transactions and (Knet) devices only. The directions stipulate that the imam of the mosque must be notified of the visit of the charitable association's representative. Al-Otaibi added that representatives of charitable societies and entities authorized to collect donations are not allowed to speak inside mosques to deliver an introductory speech about the association or the projects it is carrying out, so as not to disturb the worshipers.

British Council honors local climate change innovators

Winning projects tackled food waste, greenhouse gases and marine sustainability

KUWIAT: The British council held earlier this week its climate change awards for local innovative projects where five different projects with a diverse approach to sustainable economy were awarded for their successful environmental efforts. The awards were presented by Country Director at the British Council Tony Skinner and Project Manager at British Council Tracey Carlin. "The mission is to establish friendship between (the UK and Kuwait). My mission is to establish relations with those wishing to build a relationship between the countries. One of the ways is engaging with (innovators), taking their initiatives and moving forward," Skinner said before introducing the winning groups

The first project receiving an award is called CLAP, which involves using leftover food to serve cats. The group is concerned about climate change and environmental issues. They were awarded the best food waste reduction campaign. "Food waste is energy waste. Kuwait wastes about 400,000 kilograms or six percent of total food in the world. The average person consumes two kilograms of food everyday enough to feed around 200,000 people," said the spokesperson for the group behind CLAP. "Our project aims to reduce greenhouse gases from nitrogen waste by reusing leftover foods and giving them to cats. By distributing containers for my students, they helped collect food."

A project called "Give and Take" won the award for the best greenhouse gas reduction project. "Our project aims to help the environment while also generating

revenue for companies," the team's spokesperson said.

"The growth of coffee shops in Kuwait has increased methane in the atmosphere, especially with consumption and production on the rise. This leads to the increase of coffee waste which has harmful effects on the environment whereby there's more methane than carbon dioxide in the atmosphere."

The group said they aim to serve as a link between cafes and farmers who have composting experience. "Our method leads to different outcomes for the soil. Chemical fertilizer will produce a good appearance without the purity. Composting produces purer and more organic soil. In Kuwait, chemical fertilizer leads to plants growing in the winter rather than throughout the year." The third project awarded at the event is called "Sustainable Future". The project, which won the award for best private sector initiative, aims to provide certificates to companies based on certain criteria. "Our main target is the private sector due to the high carbon emissions they produce. Every certificate provides each company with an identity and credibility. Our objective is to evaluate businesses according to how green they are," said the group's spokesperson.

"The certification involves using a checklist where we go to inspect companies and if they suffice the criteria, they get the certification. We have categorized the checklist with bronze, silver, and gold to see if companies fit those criteria," they explained. The fourth group, "Go Fish", were winners of the best climate change award. They worked to spread climate

change awareness for the younger generation. "Our main goal is to change bad habits and make young people more aware about climate issues. Our Instagram covers environmental issues from around the world. We have participated in many events across Kuwait. We faced a number of obstacles, including getting approvals," said the group's spokesperson.

"Fishing is the second largest industry in Kuwait around 50 percent demands met locally. Many organisms are under threat, due to unprecedented climate change, the presence of endangered fish and lack of awareness," they said. "The app is simple and easy containing expert verified information." Winners of the best social media and marketing awards are two projects by Cornerstone. The projects use a character called Raihan to raise awareness about climate change through social media. "We created Raihan, a loving character to creatively educate young children. We faced obstacles including getting sponsorships and providing new and creative content."

"Raihan was created through our imagination with the feedback of students. Raihan is a 'human plant'," said the group's spokesperson. "Our target audience is from five to 10-year-olds. We also want to indirectly reach parents through their children so they can have more awareness." Skinner thanked all groups for their efforts at the end of the ceremony. "We hope that you will develop further, and the council is going to follow up to see the progress of your projects," he said.



Four dead as Russia strikes Ukraine school

Xi departs Moscow, hails a 'new era' in their nations' ties

KYIV: A Russian drone attack on a school near Kyiv killed at least four people before Chinese leader Xi Jinping left Moscow on Wednesday at the close of a summit with President Vladimir Putin. Xi called each other "dear friend" and hailed a "new era" in their nations' ties following two days of talks marked by pomp and a display of unity against the West.

But there was no apparent breakthrough on the war in Ukraine, despite Beijing touting a "visit for peace", and few concrete economic proposals were signed. Both eager to curb Western dominance, Putin and Xi expressed concern about NATO expansion in Asia and agreed to deepen a partnership which has grown closer since Putin invaded Ukraine a year ago.

Xi's plane left Moscow's Vnukovo airport on Wednesday after being seen off by an honour guard, capping a visit that was seen as a boost for the internationally-isolated Russian leader. But in Ukraine, at least four people were killed and others wounded in a drone attack that hit a school in the Kyiv region late Tuesday, officials said Wednesday.

Ukraine's air force said Russia attacked Ukraine with 21 "Iranian-made" drones overnight, and 16 were shot down. During the Moscow summit Putin said he was open to talks on Ukraine and praised

Beijing's 12-point position paper on the conflict, which includes a call for dialogue and respect for all countries' territorial sovereignty.

After talks with Xi, Putin said that "many of the provisions" of China's initiative can form the basis of a peace settlement for Ukraine when Kyiv and the West are ready for it. "However, so far we have not seen such readiness on their part," he added. Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelensky said Kyiv had invited China to talks, and was waiting for an answer from Beijing. The United States, however, said it does not see China as capable of being an impartial mediator—Washington's most direct criticism yet of Beijing's aim to be a middleman in efforts to end the conflict. On Wednesday, the Kremlin said it was not surprised by the West's "hostile" reaction to the summit.

'Unlimited possibilities'

Moscow and Beijing have over the past years ramped up cooperation, both driven by a desire to counterbalance US-dominated international order. The Chinese leader's Moscow visit has been viewed as a coup for Putin, who is subject to an International Criminal Court warrant over accusations of unlawfully deporting Ukrainian children.

"I am sure that Russian-Chinese cooperation has truly unlimited possibilities and prospects," Putin said at a state dinner following the talks, where he toasted the "prosperity" of Russian and Chinese people. He also gushed over the "special nature" of the relationship between the two countries.

On the second day of his visit to Moscow, Xi said ties with Russia were "entering a new era". Putin called the talks "meaningful and frank" and said that Russia, which has been largely cut out of European markets because of sanctions, would be able to meet China's "growing demand" for energy.

Putin said the two countries had reached an agreement on the Power of Siberia 2 gas pipeline, which will send Russian natural gas to China via Mongolia. Despite Russia's keen interest, analysts have warned that there will be limits to the relationship.

US 'undermining' global security

In a joint statement, the two leaders took aim at the West, accusing the United States of "undermining" global security, and expressed "great concern" over NATO's growing presence in Asia. China and Russia have often worked in lockstep at the UN Security Council, using their veto power as permanent council members to counter the West.

Russia's assault on Ukraine has also deepened fears among Western powers that China could one day try to take control of the self-ruled island of Taiwan, which Beijing sees as part of its territory. China has sought to portray itself as a neutral party in the Ukraine conflict, but Washington has said Beijing's moves could be a "stalling tactic" to help Moscow. The United States has also accused Beijing of mulling arms exports to Moscow, claims China has denied.

Xi's trip coincided with a surprise visit to Kyiv by Japanese Prime Minister Fumio Kishida, who on Tuesday also visited Bucha, a town where Russian forces were accused of committing atrocities last year. "Our talks with Mr Kishida were quite productive," said Zelensky. "I also heard a very concrete willingness of Japan to work together with us to even more actively mobilise the world for international order, to protect against aggression, to protect against Russian terror."

Kishida, the last Group of Seven leader to visit the country, had come under increasing pressure to make the trip, as Japan hosts the group's summit this May. Zelensky confirmed on Tuesday he would participate in the G7 summit via video link. — AFP

Greek trains back on track after worst rail disaster

ATHENS: Intercity rail travel resumed in Greece on Wednesday for the first time since a head-on collision killed 57 people in the nation's worst rail disaster more than three weeks ago, operator Hellenic Train said. Trains from the Piraeus seaport to the capital's international airport, as well as links between Athens and Chalcis on the island of Evia and two other local services in the Peloponnese region have started running again, the company said.

But the line where the crash happened on February 28 -- the country's busiest, spanning 600 kilometres (370 miles) from Athens to the second-largest city of Thessaloniki in the north—will not reopen until April 1, acting Transport Minister Georgios Gerapetritis said.

The disaster sparked weeks of angry and occasionally violent protests, piling pressure on the conservative government of Prime Minister Kyriakos Mitsotakis ahead of elections due in May. Most of the victims were university students returning from a long holiday weekend. Greece's transport minister resigned after the disaster.

The stationmaster on duty during the accident and three other railway officials have been charged and face possible life sentences. Greece's rail watchdog found serious safety problems across the network, including inadequate basic training of critical staff.

Panagiotis Terezakis, the new director general of the state-owned Hellenic Railways Organisation (OSE) that owns the network, said Wednesday the company "would do everything humanly possible to win back our passengers' confidence".

"We have to move forward after the tragic event that has shaken us all," he told journalists. On Tuesday, train drivers called for safety assurances including better monitoring of rail crossings, improved tunnel lighting, bridge inspection data and the removal of debris and overgrown vegetation from tracks.

Railway unions had long warned the network was underfunded, understaffed and accident-prone after a decade of spending cuts. The drivers' union said Tuesday that repeated warnings were "downplayed or not taken seriously."

At the peak of the demonstrations, more than 65,000 people took to the streets nationwide demanding accountability and calling for Mitsotakis's resignation, with some accusing the government of being "murderers". Many Greeks have been alarmed at the decay of public services amid large-scale privatisation, including passenger and freight trains, to pay off debts stemming from the country's 2009-2018 debt crisis. – AFP

Defiant Johnson faces parliament grilling over 'Partygate'

LONDON: Britain's former prime minister Boris Johnson re-enters the bear pit of parliamentary inquisition on Wednesday for a grilling about "Partygate" that could decide his political future. In July, the end of Johnson's three years in 10 Downing Street played out in another parliamentary committee hearing, while outside the room his government was collapsing in a wave of ministerial resignations.

Voters' anger at the scandal about serial partying at Downing Street, in breach of COVID lockdown laws, was one backdrop to the resignations. But Johnson's supporters insist he was betrayed by Conservative colleagues, and are campaigning for his return ahead of a general election likely next year.

Opinion polls suggest that Johnson remains toxic for a large swathe of the electorate, and Wednesday's hearing by the cross-party privileges committee will reopen old wounds just as his successor, Prime Minister Rishi Sunak, mounts a turnaround bid.

If the committee decides that Johnson lied to parliament about the parties, it could recommend his suspension from the House of Commons. If the full House agrees to a suspension of more than 10 sitting days, that could trigger a special election for his northwest London seat, if enough voters demand one.

This month, the committee found in an interim report that Johnson should have known the rules were being flouted. It released previously unseen photographs and also published WhatsApp messages showing senior aides struggling to come up with a public justification for the parties.

Hours before Wednesday's televised hearing, it published a larger 110-page bundle of evidence. It includes a Downing Street official stating that Johnson "often saw and joined" gatherings in the complex during lockdowns and that "he had the opportunity to shut them down". "He could see what was happening and allowed the culture to continue," the official added. Johnson's former senior adviser Martin Reynolds also states that ahead of "Prime Minister's Questions" in early December 2021, he questioned him "whether it was realistic to argue that all guidance had been followed at all times".

Meanwhile, the evidence shows Cabinet Secretary Simon Case, Britain's most senior civil servant, denying he ever assured Johnson that Covid rules were followed at all times. On Tuesday, Johnson released his own 52-page dossier detailing his belief that he was truthful when he repeatedly told parliament that all regulations were respected. In hindsight, he recognised that he did "mislead" MPs, but only inadvertently and based on assurances given by top aides that the rules had been followed. "I did not intentionally or recklessly mislead the House" on any date, he wrote. "I would never have dreamed of doing so."

Johnson was fined by police for one gathering, along with Sunak, his finance minister at the time, while dozens of other staff received fines. The former Conservative leader apologised and corrected the parliamentary record last May after previously insisting to MPs that the gatherings were above board.

Johnson said that correction came at the earliest opportunity—after London police and senior civil servant Sue Gray had concluded their own investigations. Johnson, 58, nearly died himself of COVID, but relatives of patients who died said his claims were a brazen attempt to evade responsibility.

"Johnson's defence continues to highlight his lack of shame and humility," said Kathryn de Prudhoe, a psychotherapist whose father died early in the pandemic. "The victims in all of this are families like mine who lost loved ones... people who lost their jobs, livelihoods and homes or their mental health because they followed the rules that he made, but couldn't stick to," she said. — AFP

10 Yemeni troops killed as new fighting clouds peace efforts

Houthis lean more towards the option of military confrontation than current negotiations

DUBAI: At least 10 soldiers were killed in renewed fighting in Yemen, military sources told AFP, despite diplomatic efforts to halt the long-running war in the Arab world's poorest country. The clashes took place in oil-producing Marib province, one of the main battlegrounds and the scene of sporadic fighting even during a lull in hostilities over the past year.

Iran-backed Houthi rebels attacked a mountainous area and have been engaged in a build-up of forces in the region, two military sources told AFP. "The Houthis launched an attack on hills overlooking Harib district, south of Marib, and made progress on that front, causing the displacement of dozens of families," one of the sources said, speaking on condition of anonymity.

"At least 10 soldiers were killed, in addition to an unknown number of attackers," the source added. The details of the clash were confirmed by a second military official. The fighting comes a month after at least four soldiers were killed in the same district, and dents new optimism after Saudi Arabia and Iran, who back opposing sides in what amounts to a proxy war, agreed to restore diplomatic ties. Analyst Maged Al-Madhaji, commenting on the latest fighting, said "the Houthis are interested in sending a clear political message that ... the Tehran-Riyadh deal does not mean" the rebels will just surrender.

"The Houthis lean more towards the option of a military confrontation than current negotiations,"

said Al-Madhaji, the co-founder of the Sanaa Center for Strategic Studies think tank. An exchange of hundreds of prisoners was agreed this week and Hans Grundberg, the UN secretary general's special envoy for Yemen, has said "intense diplomatic efforts" are underway to strike a peace deal.

The Houthis seized control of Yemen's capital Sanaa in 2014, prompting a Saudi-led military intervention the following year and fighting that has left hundreds of thousands dead, through direct and indirect causes, and triggered one of the world's worst humanitarian crises.

But a UN-brokered ceasefire that took effect last April brought a sharp reduction in hostilities and, even though the truce expired in October, fighting has largely remained on hold. On Monday, after talks in Switzerland, the Houthis and Yemen's internationally recognised government agreed to exchange 887 prisoners -- 181 held in Houthi prisons and 706 rebels.

During a Security Council meeting last week, UN officials said the detente between Saudi Arabia and Iran—welcomed by both the Houthis and the Yemeni government—should offer momentum toward peace.

However, it is unlikely to solve all Yemen's problems. The influence of the two regional powers is only one dimension of a complex conflict in a country fractured along confessional, regional and political lines, analysts warn. — AFP

Zionist entity missiles hit arms depot in Aleppo

BEIRUT: A Zionist missile strike destroyed a suspected arms depot used by Iran-backed militias at Syria's Aleppo airport Wednesday, a war monitor said, with authorities saying the strike put the airport out of service. It was the second such attack in a month on the airport in Syria's second city, which has been a major conduit for relief flights since a February 6 earthquake devastated swathes of northern Syria and neighbouring Turkey.

The pre-dawn strike targeted "the airport compound and a weapons depot belonging to pro-Iranian forces on the airport's perimeter," the Syrian Observatory for Human Rights group said. The Britain-based war monitor said the arms depot was "completely destroyed".

The Syrian defence ministry reported "damage" but did not immediately mention any casualties. "Around 3:55 am (0055 GMT), the Zionist enemy carried out an air attack... targeting Aleppo international airport, leading to some material damage," a ministry statement said. "A number of missiles" were fired from the Mediterranean west of the coastal city of Latakia, it added. The transport ministry said the strikes caused damage to the runway and to airport equipment, forcing all flights to be redirected to Damascus or to Latakia on the Mediterranean coast.

The Zionist military rarely comments on individual strikes against Syria, but has vowed repeatedly to keep up its air campaign to stop arch foe Iran consolidating its presence. The Zionist military said Wednesday that "we do not comment on reports in the foreign media". its standard response when questioned about such strikes. Previous strikes blamed on Zionist entity have also stopped flights using the airport following damage to the runway. On March 7, three people were killed in an Zionist strike on the airport that brought air traffic, including relief flights, to a halt. — AFP

Gaza fisherman tests waters in legal fight over blockade

GAZA CITY: Gaza fisherman Jihad al-Hissi is used to rough waters but he now faces a new storm. A Zionist entity court may seize his boat after he breached the limits of the enclave's fishing zone. The issue is crucial for thousands in the blockaded Palestinian territory of 2.3 million people, where fishing in the Mediterranean Sea remains one of the few economic lifelines.

Hissi, 55, with square shoulders and a scruffy beard, told his story at Gaza's dock early one morning as fishermen sold their overnight catch of sea bream, prawns and sardines. For now he has his boat, but its fate is uncertain as Zionist authorities argue before a Haifa court that it should be permanently taken away.

The vessel, used to catch gamberi prawns off southern Gaza near Egypt, is named the "Hajj Rajab", but its owners have erased the name from its yellow hull. "I don't want the Zionists to spot us and seize my boat," said Hissi, who had a violent encounter with a Zionist naval patrol boat more than a year ago.

Zionist entity says its land, air and sea blockade of Gaza is needed to protect it from rocket and other attacks from Hamas and to prevent arms smuggling to the Islamist militant movement. Palestinians argue it is an effective siege that has crippled Gaza's economy and further impoverished its people, while the fishing limits deny it crucial protein.

Last year's incident came on February 14 when Hissi's vessel ventured beyond the maritime zone that Zionist entity declared in 2007, the year Hamas seized power in Gaza. Jihad's brother Nihad, who was at sea that day, said that "100 meters beyond the area, we were surprised by three Zionist boats

with commandos. "They attacked our boat... tied us up and arrested us." The boat's cabin is still damaged from the water cannon blasts and the rubber-encased bullets fired by the Zionist forces that day. Zionist entity, in documents presented to court, accuses Hissi of having "repeatedly violated the security restrictions imposed by the Zionist army in the maritime zone adjacent to Gaza". The Zionist non-government group Gisha has helped defend Hissi and in September secured the boat's return, but Zionist authorities now demand the court "permanently confiscate" the vessel. The fishing zone allowed by Zionist entity currently extends only to the heavily fished areas between six and 15 nautical miles (about 11 to 28 kilometres) off the Gaza coast. Hissi argues this is less than the maximum of 20 nautical miles agreed in the 1990s under the Zionist-Palestinian agreements in Oslo. But he also admits to going even beyond that from time to time, in search of shrimp which nets around \$21 per kilogram (2.2 pounds) and can make the difference between profit and loss.

The legal fight is closely watched by thousands fishermen in Gaza. If Hissi's boat is permanently confiscated, this would spell "a serious threat to the thousands of fishermen in Gaza, because it aims to put an end to fishing," charged Nizar Ayyash, president of the union representing the 4,000 fishermen in Gaza.

The court battle comes amid a rise in Zionist's temporary seizures of fishing boats suspected of smuggling or breaching the fishing zone. Last year saw 23 boat confiscations, the highest number since 2018, according to the Palestinian non-governmental group Al Mezan. — AFP

water as well as those already strained. Governments and actors in the public and private sectors are invited to present proposals at the conference to reverse that trend and help meet the development goal, set in 2015, of ensuring "access to water and sanitation for all by 2030."

The last conference at this high level on the issue, which lacks a global treaty or a dedicated United Nations agency, was held in 1977 in Mar del Plata, Argentina. "The water crisis is bad enough without climate change," said Stuart Orr of the World Wildlife Fund. "We can build resilient societies and economies if governments and businesses urgently pursue policies, practices and investments that recognize—and restore—the full value of healthy rivers, lakes and wetlands," he said. But some observers have already voiced concerns about the scope of commitments and the availability of funding to implement them.

"About 10 percent of the world's population lives in a country where water stress has reached a high or critical level," the report says. According to the most recent UN climate study, published Monday by the IPCC expert panel, "roughly half of the world's population currently experience severe water scarcity for at least part of the year." Those shortages have the most significant impact on the poor, Connor told AFP. "No matter where you are, if you are rich enough, you will manage to get water," he said. Women and girls are also "disproportionately affected," actor Matt Damon, co-founder of the nonprofit Water.org, said Wednesday, adding that "millions of girls aren't in school because of this, because they're collecting water." The report noted the impact of existing water supplies becoming contaminated due to

"At least 2 billion people (globally) use a drinking water source contaminated with feces, putting them at risk of contracting cholera, dysentery, typhoid and polio," it said. That high number does not take into account pollution from pharmaceuticals, chemicals, pesticides, microplastics and nanomaterials. To ensure access to safe drinking water for all by 2030, levels of investment would have to be tripled, the report said.

underperforming or nonexistent sanitation systems.

Freshwater ecosystems—which in addition to water, provide life-sustaining economic resources and help combat global warming—"are among the most threatened in the world," the report warned. "Everything we need to live a decent life is directly related to water: our health, food safety, habitats, economy, infrastructure and climate," said Dutch King Willem-Alexander, who is summit co-chair alongside the president of Tajikistan. — AFP

'We've learned a lot so far by testing Bard, and the next critical step in improving it is to get feedback from more people," Google vice presidents Sissie Hsiao and Eli Collins said in a blog post. As exciting as chatbots can be, they have their faults, Hsiao and Collins cautioned. Google has so far proceeded more carefully in its rollout of generative AI to consumers, in contrast to Microsoft's choice to swiftly make the products available despite reports of problems. ChatGPT's OpenAI is backed by Microsoft, which earlier this year said it would finance the research company to the tune of billions of dollars.

Asked by AFP how its product was different from ChatGPT. Bard said that unlike its Microsoft-backed ri-

val it was "able to access and process information from the real world through Google Search and keep my response consistent with search results." The bot also underlined that it was still "under development, while ChatGPT has been released to the public. This means that I am constantly learning and improving, while ChatGPT is likely to remain relatively unchanged." OpenAI recently released a long-awaited update of its Al technology that it said would be safer and more accurate than its predecessor.

Much of the new model's firepower, known as GPT-4, is now available to the general public via ChatGPT Plus, OpenAI's paid subscription plan and on an AI-powered version of Microsoft's Bing search engine. Microsoft has said that its quick adoption of generative AI has seen usage of its Bing search engine increase in recent weeks, but it is still a clear underdog to Google, which captures about 85 percent of the global search engine market. — AFP

At least 13 killed in Pakistan, Afghanistan strong earthquake

Some 50 houses collapse in the village located in the snow-capped mountains

JURM: At least 13 people were killed in Afghanistan and Pakistan by a strong earthquake felt across thousands of kilometres, but the region appeared Wednesday to have dodged the mass casualties usually associated with a tremor of such scale.

The United States Geological Survey said the magnitude 6.5 quake was centred near Jurm in northeastern Afghanistan, but the depth of 187 kilometres (116 miles) mitigated extensive damage. The quake, which struck around 09:30 pm (1700 GMT) Kabul time on Tuesday and lasted more than 30 seconds, was felt from central Asia to New Delhi in India-more than 2,000 kilometres away.

"It was a powerful earthquake and we feared maximum damage due to the intensity—that's why we issued an alert," Bilal Faizi, a spokesman for Pakistan's emergency Rescue 1122 service in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa, told AFP.

"But fortunately our fears proved wrong. Residents panicked due to the magnitude of the earthquake, but the damage was minimal." The region is frequently hit by quakes—especially in the Hindu Kush mountain range, which lies near the junction of the Eurasian and Indian tectonic plates.

'Stayed awake' all night

In Jurm district, near the epicentre, a resident of one village reported no casualties despite the proximity. "We are about 2,000 to 3,000 people in our village and we all spent the night outside under the

sky," said Inamullah, reached by telephone.
"We were all scared and stayed awake the entire night." Some 50 houses had collapsed in the village located in the snow-capped mountains, an AFP correspondent who arrived in the area reported. Panicked residents of cities and towns in Afghanistan and Pakistan also fled their homes to seek safety away from buildings—with many too scared to return. "We stayed the night in our courtyard... it was cold outside, but we preferred to stay out rather than go back," 24-year-old student Neda Raihan told AFP in Kabul. Khudadad Heights, a vast multi-storey residential block in the Pakistan capital, was evacuated after huge cracks appeared in the building.

More than 55,000 people were killed by an earthquake that struck southeastern Turkey and parts of Syria last month, heightening fears across the region. "The children started shouting that there is an earthquake. We all ran out. The horrors of the earthquake in Turkey and neighbouring countries had a strong effect on our nerves," said Ikhlaq Kazmi, a retired professor in the Pakistani city of Rawalpindi. Officials in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa province, north of Islamabad, said nine people had been killed in the quake, including two women and two children.

'People screaming'

In Afghanistan, officials reported four dead, including a child, and 74 injured—but phone and internet links to remote parts of the country had been severed and communication was patchy. "When we were rushing out a wall of our house collapsed on the children. One lost her life," said Abdul Baseer, a resident of Laghman province.

Officials said about 150 houses were damaged in Laghman. In the Afghan capital Kabul, shopkeeper Noor Mohammad Hanifi set up tents in the street for his family to spend the night in. "Nobody dares to

Despite the motion's rejection, Vox leader Santiago Abascal said he was "satisfied". "Once again, we have exposed one of the worst governments in our history," he told reporters. "We knew what the outcome (of the vote) would be but above all we were satisfied with the debate, we wanted this government to be exposed and it was." — AFP

Rohingya sceptical of Myanmar refugee return offer

COX BAZAR: Rohingya refugees said Wednesday they doubted Myanmar was offering a genuine return to their homeland, as a spokesman for the country's military junta said it would begin welcoming back members of the persecuted minority as soon as next month. A delegation of 17 officials from Myanmar's junta was in Bangladesh this week to interview potential candidates for return, more than five years after a brutal military crackdown drove immense numbers of Rohingya out of their homes.

The visit, brokered by China and partly facilitated by the United Nations, jumpstarted a repatriation agreement between the two countries that has languished for years, partly over fears that the refugees would not be safe on their return. But Rohingya interviewed by the delegation told AFP that none of their queries about security or recognition of their right to citizenship in Myanmar had been answered.

"They used to treat us badly there. I asked whether we would be able to live a normal life there, but then they stopped me," Shamsun Nahar, a 40-year-old Rohingya woman, told AFP. "They did not want any more questions," she added. "I don't think they will take us to Myanmar. If they do, they won't give us any rights." The Myanmar delegation left Wednesday after a week in the sprawling refugee camps home to around a million Rohingya. Junta spokesman Zaw Min Tun told AFP after their departure that Myanmar would likely begin

PHNOM PENH: Two Cambodian opposition activists were charged with insulting the king and incitement Wednesday following Facebook posts the authorities deemed disrespectful to the monarch,

Human rights activists had previously warned enactment of the 2018 lese majeste law, which carries a sentence of between one and five years in prison, could be wielded to target dissent. The two youth activists—Yim Sinorn and Hun Kosal—were arrested on Tuesday evening after posting allegedly insulting language against King Norodom Sihamoni on Facebook.

Yim Sinorn, a close aide to opposition leader Kem Sokha, posted "according to the voice of people from coffee shops, today we can clearly see who is the real King". Hun Kosal also posted that he would gather behind Kem Sokha to protect the monarch and the throne after "seeing they mistreat the feeling and dishonour the Khmer King.

The activists wrote the posts after King Sihamoni, Prime Minister Hun Sen and senior government officials attended a live-televised ceremony at Angkor Wat temple on Tuesday morning to light the torch for the upcoming SEA Games in Cambodia.

In two separate warrants, seen by AFP, a judge on Wednesday night ordered the detention of the two activists "on charges of insulting the king and incitement to commit a serious unrest to social security". Speaking at a graduation ceremony on Wednesday morning, Hun Sen said the pair had "bad intention" and vowed he won't forgive anyone who insulted the king and himself.

"This is not a right to freedom of expression. This is an intentional slander that aims to destroy, to insult the king and to destroy the name of the prime minister," Hun Sen said. The pair also face up to two years in jail for the incitement charge.

Phil Robertson, Human Rights Watch's deputy Asia director, said the pair were detained "on fabricated, politically motivated charges". Earlier this month opposition leader Kem Sokha was sentenced to 27 years in jail and placed under house arrest for treason. Cambodia will go to polls in July. — AFP

Algeria to return envoy to France after standoff

ALGIERS: Algeria will send its ambassador back to France soon, President Abdelmadjid Tebboune said weeks after he withdrew the envoy following a diplomatic spat over a French-Algerian activist. Algiers withdrew its envoy in early February after accusing its former colonial ruler of helping activist Amira Bouraoui's "clandestine and illegal exfiltration" from Algeria to France after she was sentenced to two years in jail for "offending Islam" and for insulting the president. But in an interview with pan-Arabic news channel Al-Jazeera quoted by state news agency APS, Tebboune said its ambassador, Said Moussi, would "soon be back in Paris". "Our relationship with France is fluctuating," he said.

Algerian-French ties fell into crisis in late 2021 after controversial comments on Algerian history by French President Emmanuel Macron. But Macron visited the vast North African country last August, signing a joint declaration with Tebboune to relaunch bilateral cooperation. The Bouraoui affair has reignited tensions. Al-

Bolster supply chain management to ensure food security: Economist

'Kuwait needs to reform agricultural lands, boost investments'

KUWAIT: Food security is in focus recently due to the political and economic situations around the world including the Russia-Ukraine war, financial crises and debates whether to raise the interest rate to control growing inflation. Meanwhile, food staples have been weaponized to pressure countries—for instance, the Russian invasion of Ukraine has forced the world to find alternative suppliers to secure sufficient supplies amid shortages of wheat and other raw materials.

The Kuwaiti government has announced food reserves in Kuwait are stable and can cover the country's population for six months with all basic consumables. But will the global instability force the country to rethink options to ensure its food security? And whether the presence of financial resources is enough to depend on during crises?

Economist Hajjaj Bou Khaddour stressed the importance of developing the country's food security, saying the most realistic solutions are through three steps — working on a solid supply chain management, reforming local agricultural lands and investing in agricultural lands outside Kuwait.

Bou Khaddour said proposals have been presented to the government since the early nineties based on the situation the country went through during the Iraqi invasion of Kuwait. "After the liberation, I proposed we should adopt the concept of food security, and highlighted the country must invest in it," he said. He added that as Kuwait is not an agricultural country, it has to invest in agricultural lands outside Kuwait and in the food industry as well. It is also important to work on creating a solid management of the country's supply chain, staring from the procurement of raw materials to the delivery of the product to its final destination in stores.

"Land reform for agriculture must include lands reserved for oil production, especially since Kuwait's exploitation of oil lands is only about 5 to 10 percent, while the rest of the land is also reserved for the ministry of oil," Bou Khaddour said. He pointed out technology and techniques can

make it possible to develop investment methods in a way that can be adopted in Kuwait, such as using vertical farming. "There are vertical farms in many countries such as Japan," he said.

"This investment will achieve internal and external food security. Kuwait established distinguished projects during the sixties like the Food Catering Company, Flour Mills Company

and the Livestock Company. The country was proactive in this field, then the wheel stopped in the seventies when food insurance came for certain items," Bou Khaddour recalled.

Financial resources

Bou Khaddour said financial resources are not a rescue factor during times of need. "For some cases it could help, but when we think about it, we are talking about food security, not food imports. It is a matter of state security in terms of food. Therefore, it is required to secure food through a strong strategic dimension," he said.

"Investing in the agricultural lands, whether outside or inside the country, will save plenty of money in the import budget, especially since consumer prices are constantly rising exponentially," he highlighted, pointing out that despite the importance of a local role in cooperating to help in this issue, unfortunately there are no institutions equivalent to Kuwait Flour Mills to lend a hand as well.

Expected results

Regarding the expected results from creating a supply chain management (CSM), he said the rate of food savings will be much higher, as it will exceed the period of five years instead of only six months. "The benefits of supply chain management are that

it is not limited by time; it is continuous and permanent. It will also achieve what is called sustainable development," Bou Khaddour said. "As a quick solution, there are too many lands in the hands of the government, which must be invested in setting up warehouses, even with the BOT system, especially if the government decides one day to implement the CSM system, so it won't be facing obstacles."

UAE experience

In 2017, the Department of Agriculture and Livestock in Sharjah announced a local initiative titled "Emirates wheat", to operate a wheat farm in Maliha area, representing national efforts in the field of enhancing food security, which extends over an area of 1,900 hectares, according to Emirates news agency WAM. The initiative today produces more than 80

tons of wheat at the state level during the harvest season, according to Emarat alyoum.

On Monday, Ruler of Sharjah and Member of the Supreme Council Sheikh Sultan bin Muhammad Al-Qasimi clarified that the wheat produced in Sharjah is considered one of the best in the world as it contains the highest percentage of protein and is free from chemicals, fertilizers and other substances harmful to human health.

Meanwhile, UAE benefited from its location as a geographic gateway between the East and West, and succeeded in developing a commercial system that made it a trade corridor and one of the most important transport corridors and re-exporter of many products, including wheat, while it exported about 100,000 tons of wheat in 2017/2018, according to Arabic RT.

Surprise jump in UK inflation deals new blow

LONDON: British inflation unexpectedly accelerated in February, official data showed Wednesday, deepening a cost-of-living crisis and pressuring the Bank of England to hike interest rates further despite global markets turmoil. After slowing for three straight months, the UK Consumer Prices Index shot up to 10.4 percent in February—not far from 40-year highs and more than five times the BoE's target. That followed CPI of 10.1 percent in January and dashed expectations for a slowdown to 9.9 percent.

'Tough' times

Wednesday's data comes after the UK government last week forecast inflation would slow sharply to 2.9 percent by year-end, adding that the country would avoid recession in 2023. The predictions were published alongside finance minister Jeremy Hunt's £94-billion (\$114-billion) cost-of-living measures for this year and next. "We recognize just how tough things are for families across the country, so as we work towards getting inflation under control we will help families with cost-of-living support," Hunt said Wednesday.

Soaring inflation continues to erode the value of wages for millions of UK workers, even follow-

ing pay rises won by some sectors thanks to mass strike action. The BoE—caught between hiking rates to dampen hot inflation or pausing owing to chaos in the commercial banking sector—unveils its latest monetary policy announcement Thursday.

The world's central banks are rushing to contain fallout from the recent collapse of two regional US banks and the enforced buyout of troubled Credit Suisse by its Swiss rival UBS. Rate decisions are due also from the Federal Reserve on Wednesday—and Thursday in Switzerland and Norway.

'Compelled' to hike

Nigel Green, head of financial consultancy de-Vere Group, said the BoE was "likely to feel compelled to continue increasing interest rates" following the UK inflation data. "This is despite growing fears over the unfolding confidence crisis in the global banking system." The BoE has gradually increased its key rate to 4.0 percent from a record-low 0.1 percent in December 2021.

Yet inflation remains in double digits, fuelled by rampant food and energy prices in the wake of Russia's war on Ukraine. "The re-acceleration in overall CPI inflation... may be enough to tilt the BoE towards raising interest rates from 4.0 percent to 4.25 percent tomorrow," said Paul Dales, chief UK economist at Capital Economics.

"The recent tightening in financial conditions caused by the banking turmoil will probably weaken UK economic activity and underlying price pressures. "But the Bank of England may well want to see hard evidence of that before it

stops raising interest rates," Dales added. Widespread salad and vegetable shortages sent UK food prices rocketing to their highest rate of increase in more than 45 years last month, the Office for National Statistics said Wednesday.

ONS chief economist Grant Fitzner said this was caused by high energy costs and bad weather across Europe. Inflation was driven also by rising alcohol prices in pubs and restaurants after recent discounting. Inflation around the world last year struck the highest levels in decades, while the UK rate peaked at 11.1 percent in October. –AFP

Sri Lanka leader warns hard times to follow IMF bailout

COLOMBO: Sri Lanka's president warned Wednesday of more economic pain to come for the crisis-hit nation, with strict austerity measures needed to restore its ruined finances after an IMF bailout deal. The International Monetary Fund approved its long-delayed rescue package on Monday after China, the South Asian island's biggest bilateral lender, offered debt relief assurances.

President Ranil Wickremesinghe lauded the deal in a speech to parliament as a milestone in Sri Lanka's recovery from last year's unprecedented economic crisis. But he also told lawmakers that the bailout was only the first step in more difficult structural reforms. "The IMF loan is not an end in itself, this is the beginning of a long and more difficult journey," Wickremesinghe said.

"We have to traverse it with care and courage. The only objective is to rebuild the economy."

the economy."

Sri Lanka defaulted on its \$46 billion foreign debt last April after nearly exhausting its foreign exchange reserves, making it almost impossible for importers to source vital goods. The island nation's 22 million people endured months of food and petrol shortages, along with runaway inflation and prolonged blackouts, as a result. Wickremesinghe has sought to restore government coffers by sharp tax hikes and ending generous consumer subsidies on fuel and electricity.

On Wednesday he said more taxes were on the cards to meet the IMF's demand that Sri Lanka halve its spend on foreign debt servicing from the 9 percent of GDP recorded last year.

The IMF also requires Sri Lanka to set up tough anti-corruption laws and sell off cash-bleeding state companies, including beleaguered carrier SriLankan Airlines. Wickremesinghe said the government would assume the external debts of key public companies to make them more attractive to investors.

Trade unions have opposed the austerity program with strikes crippling the health and transport sectors last week and warnings of further industrial action to come. — AFP

Swiss sweat over size of new superbank

ZURICH: The arranged marriage of UBS and Credit Suisse will create the biggest bank Switzerland has ever seen, with some wondering if the superbank might be too big for its own good. The deal struck late Sunday prevented the collapse of the country's second-biggest lender by folding it into the largest.

Even before last week's dramatic events, both firms were already among the 30 around the world deemed of strategic importance to the global banking system and therefore too big to fail. Some in business, industry and politics are not convinced that one even bigger bank will turn out for the better.

"Credit Suisse was really the bank of the economy and industry, said Philippe Cordonier of Swissmem, the national association representing the engineering industry. For exporting companies, Credit Suisse offered a range of services essential for international transactions, "payments abroad, credits, leasing or currency hedging, he told AFP.

Less competition

"This is where the question arises of what skills will be kept, said Cordonier, as the profiles of the two banks, although close, are not identical. So far, many questions remain unanswered.

Such a takeover would normally need months of negotiations, but UBS only had a couple of days, under some serious arm-twisting by Swiss authorities.

UBS chief executive Ralph Hamers admitted at an analysts' conference that he did not yet have all the details of the takeover. Switzerland is a confederation of 26 cantons and Cordonier said the alternative could be to turn from the national banks to the cantonal banks.

However, many do not currently have the skills to help companies export to far-off markets such as Asia, and would have to develop them. The other option is to turn to foreign banks, although they would not possess "in-depth knowledge of the Swiss market, Cordonier said.

"If there is only one major bank that has the capacity to work abroad, this will restrict the choice of solutions for companies, said the engineer, who is also concerned about the repercussions on costs "if there is less competition.

Founded in 1856 by Alfred Escher, the godfather of Swiss railways, Credit Suisse was closely linked

Manpower shortage dims solar power boom in Germany

Europe's biggest economy struggles to ramp up share of renewable energy

BERLIN: Balancing on a sloping tiled roof, apprentice Pascal Ode installs a solar panel under the watchful eve of his trainer. Hopes are high that Ode may soon be able to install the systems on both homes and businesses. When he is trained, he will be a much-needed new pair of hands in the industry that is crucial to Germany's energy transition—but is suffering from an

Demand for new photovoltaic panels soared as Europe's biggest economy was forced to ramp up the share of energy produced by renewables in the wake of Russia's invasion of Ukraine which hit energy supplies, lifting prices. The conflict has led Germany to end its reliance on Russian energy, at a time when the country was also accelerating its plan to become carbon neutral.

Compared with 2021, the installed photovoltaic capacity in the residential sector has leapt by 40 percent. "Since the Russian invasion of Ukraine, many people wanted to free themselves from fossil energy and the high costs of energy," said Wolfgang Gruendinger, spokesman for Enpal, one of many companies benefitting from soaring demand. The Berlin start-up offers long-term solar panel rentals, complete with installation and maintenance. The formula is proving attractive. Enpal, which began business in 2017, said it has rented 40,000 kits to individuals, including 18,000 last year alone.

It currently installs 2,000 kits a month. "Demand is very strong. We have to install many units in the shortest possible time, while at the same time, we are seeing huge shortages in qualified workers," said Alexander Friedrich, who was hired by the company to train new employees. To cope with the demand, Enpal set up its own training school last year in Blankenfelde, in the south of Berlin, to train workers to install panels, as well as train specialized electricians to work on photovoltaic panels.

"We are recruiting people from all backgrounds former pizza workers, cooks, delivery riders, taxi drivers," said Gruendinger. The company puts about 100 new hires through the school each month. Among them is Ode, 19, who responded to an advertisement on Instagram offering the four-week training.

'Something new'

Learning "something new" had attracted him to take on the challenge, he told AFP.

"I really enjoy the fact that it is a job that comes with fresh air and that you're always on the road," he added. Enpal does not have prohibitive education criteria for their new hires. But one key requirement is for new recruits to climb a high ladder reaching at least two storeys up to screen out those with a fear of heights. The sound of drills, screwdrivers and metal components being handled by groups of apprentices reverberated around the training hangar.

Wearing helmets and attached to ropes, the trainees were practicing on roof replicas mounted on the ground. Their task is urgent.

Germany is aiming for 80 percent of its energy needs to be covered by renewables by 2030, against 46 percent a year ago. To do so, lawmakers have set a target of installing 215 gigawatts (GW) of photovoltaic capacity by 2030 -- meaning that annual rate of installation has to be tripled from last year's effort of 7.2 GW.

The plan is for roofs of factories and commercial buildings, as well as fields, to be covered with them, according to draft legislation promoting their installation. But "the shortage of qualified workers threatens to slow down the energy transition", warned the Cologne-based think-tank German Economic Institute (IW) in a recent report. The worker gap is so wide that the Federation of Solar Industries BSW said it was looking to Chancellor Olaf Scholz's ambitious immigration reform to provide some relief.

The law, expected to be passed this year, is aimed at easing immigration issues. The BSW cites the example of a recent agreement that aims to attract Indian workers trained in solar energy installations

IW estimates that there is a shortfall of 216,000 electricians, heating and air-conditioning experts,

and IT specialists necessary to develop the solar and wind energy sector in Germany. The figure does not take into account plans to bring back production of solar panels to Germany.

Bring production back

Currently, 80 percent of the panels' components come from China, according to the International Energy Agency. The massive reliance on the Asian giant for the supply chain for materials such as polysilicon, wafers, cells and modules has come to the fore for Germany after it was recently stung by

its dependency on Russian energy.

Once a leader in producing photovoltaic cells, with market heavyweights in the 2000s like Solarworld, Q-Cells and Centrotherm, Germany has seen its market share plunge after state subsidies dried up and China ramped up its production. Over the past two decades, some 100,000 jobs in the sector have been lost. But the trend may be starting to reverse.

Swiss specialist in the sector, Meyer Burger, built a factory at Thalheim, east Germany, in 2021, spurred by lower production costs and growing homegrown demand. –AFP

Moody's assigns first time ratings for Elaf Islamic Bank

LIMASSOL, Cyprus: Moody's Investors Service (Moody's) has assigned first time local and foreign currency long-term and short-term bank deposit ratings of Caa2/NP for Elaf Islamic Bank (EIB). At the same time, the rating agency has assigned a Baseline Credit Assessment (BCA) and Adjusted BCA of caa2, long-term and short-term Counterparty Risk (CR) Assessments of Caa1(cr)/ NP(cr), long-term local and foreign currency Counterparty Risk Ratings (CRRs) of Caa1, and short-term local and foreign currency CRRs of NP. The outlook assigned to the long-term deposit ratings is stable.

Ratings rationale

Elaf Islamic Bank (EIB) is a privately owned bank registered and incorporated in Iraq since 2001. The bank changed its name from Al Baraka Bank for Investment and Finance to Elaf Islamic Bank in 2007. EIB provides sharia-compliant banking and financial services through 16 branches inside Iraq. Paid up capital is 250 billion Iraqi dinars (IQD), equivalent to around \$171 million.

EIB's Caa2 long-term deposit ratings take into consideration the bank's caa2 BCA and no uplift from the Government of Iraq (Caa1 stable), based on Moody's expectation of a low probability of government support, given the bank's relatively small size in the country's banking system and the government's track record of allowing private banks to fail.

Rationale for BCA

EIB's caa2 BCA reflects Moody's expectation that the bank will maintain adequate capital, low profitability and ample liquidity buffers. These are balanced by strained asset quality largely due to the bank's impaired letter of guarantees (LGs) portfolio, claims of funds misappropriation by a previous board member which resulted in change of the board of directors in 2019, and sizeable balances with the Central Bank of Iraq (CBI) which closely links EIB's credit profile to that of Iraqi government's Caa1 issuer rating. In addition, the bank's BCA is also constrained by the highly challenging operating environment in Iraq.

ECB chief warns financial tensions may hit eurozone

FRANKFURT: Recent financial turbulence could add to "downside risks" in the eurozone, European Central Bank chief Christine Lagarde warned Wednesday, while insisting policymakers remained focused on taming sky-high inflation. The collapse of three regional US lenders and the enforced UBS buyout of Swiss rival Credit Suisse plunged global markets into

US Fed mulls more rate hikes after banking turmoil

WASHINGTON: US banks will be paying especially close attention to the Federal Reserve's interest-rate decision on Wednesday after two weeks of market turmoil over the collapse of three regional lenders. The US central bank is walking a tightrope between continuing to raise rates to combat high inflation and stepping on the brake to prevent further upheaval in the commercial banking sector.

A stock market rally earlier this week solidified calls by most analysts that the Fed will hike interest rates again, despite wider concerns about the financial sector. The majority of futures traders predict the Fed will increase its benchmark lending rate by 25 basis points to a range of 4.75-5.00 percent, according to CME Group.

That would be in line with the size of the central bank's previous rate hike in February, and mark the ninth increase since it began tightening monetary conditions last year. Despite these efforts, price rises remained stuck well above the Fed's long-term inflation target of two percent.

Hot data and banking uncertainty

The implosions of Silicon Valley Bank (SVB) and two other regional lenders pummeled banking stocks around the world last week, with Credit Suisse swallowed up by Swiss rival UBS after its shares sank to a record low. Asian stock markets and most European indices rose ahead of the Fed's decision on Wednesday. But British inflation rose unexpectedly last month despite a concerted effort by the Bank of England to tackle rising prices. Wall Street stocks opened nearly flat on Wednesday as investors await the Fed's decision. US regional

turmoil and triggered fears of a snowballing banking sector crisis. Lagarde said the latest ECB forecasts—which lowered inflation projections and raised the growth outlook for this year—did not take into account the recent upheaval. "Those tensions have added new downside risks and have made the risk assessment blurrier," she said in a speech in Frankfurt. She added that there was "additional uncertainty" when it came to the ECB projections. The ECB president insisted, however, that if the most recent forecasts were confirmed, "we will still have ground to cover to make sure that inflation pressures are stamped out".

But faced with "high uncertainty," future decisions would depend on the data, she said, and refrained from making a commitment to raise rates further. The recent market turmoil has left central bankers walking a tightrope between pushing on with their efforts to bring down stubbornly high costs and seeking to ensure they do not worsen the upheaval.

After Russia's invasion of Ukraine sent eurozone inflation soaring last year, the ECB embarked on an unprecedented campaign of monetary tightening, raising rates by 350 basis points since last July. The Frankfurt-based institution hiked rates half a percentage point at its meeting last week, as it had previously pledged to do, shrugging off calls to pause its tightening or slow the pace in response to the turmoil. Declining energy prices in recent months have helped slow inflation to 8.5 percent in February. After days of turmoil, markets have been recovering this week as pledges of government support soothed worries over the banking sector. —AFP

banks opened lower before paring some losses. Embattled First Republic Bank was down around two percent 30 minutes into trading, while PacWest Bancorp was down nearly four percent.

The combination of hot US economic data at the start of the year and uncertainty in the banking sector has led most analysts to predict the Fed will continue with a more modest hiking cycle than was previously predicted. "After the recent news, the recent developments in the financial markets, we now see a kind of risk to both sides," Stephen Juneau, senior US economist at Bank of America Global Research, told AFP. "We're still looking for a 25 basis point hike in March, May, and June," he said.

More 'dovish' language

Treasury Secretary Janet Yellen said Tuesday that the US banking sector was "stabilizing" after authorities stepped in to protect deposits following the failures of SVB and Signature Bank. But she conceded that "similar actions could be warranted if smaller institutions suffer deposit runs that pose the risk of contagion."

Yellen's comments contributed to this week's relief rally in the stock markets, along with actions by the Fed and other major central banks to improve lenders' access to liquidity. The challenge on Wednesday for Fed Chair Jerome Powell will be to convey the message that the banking system has turned a corner while continuing to confront inflation. "The Fed will need to emphasize that it has a dual mandate of full employment and stable prices, with the latter nowhere close to being met," Oxford Economics' chief US economist Ryan Sweet wrote in a note to clients.

It is likely to be "a bit more dovish" in the language that accompanies the decision, Juneau from Bank of America said, adding he expects the US central bank to reinforce its confidence in the banking system in the statement. The Fed will also update its GDP growth and interest-rate projections on Wednesday. Its announcement will follow on the heels of the European Central Bank's decision last week to raise rates by 0.5 percentage points.

ECB chief Christine Lagarde warned on Wednesday that the eurozone's monetary policymakers "will still have ground to cover to make sure that inflation pressures are stamped out." She said the recent banking turmoil could add to "downside risks" in the single currency area. —AFP

Bad Bunny ex seeking \$40m in unauthorized use of voice note

former girlfriend of Bad Bunny has filed a \$40 million lawsuit against the Puerto Rican megastar, alleging he used a recording of her voice in several songs without permission. Carliz De La Cruz Hernandez, who dated Bad Bunny from 2011 to 2016, filed the lawsuit at a Puerto Rican court in San Juan earlier this month, though the outlet Notice first reported it just this week.

In 2015, before Bad Bunny had skyrocketed to global fame, she recorded a voice note for him saying the phrase "Bad Bunny, baby," court documents say. She alleges that the singer, born Benito Martinez Ocasio, used the recording shortly thereafter without authorization, in the introduction of the song "Pa Ti" and a few years later in "Dos Mil 2016," a track off his latest blockbuster album "In Verano Sin Ti"

blockbuster album "Un Verano Sin Ti." For that most recent release, the artist's team sent contracts seeking consent to use De La Cruz's voice, one day before the album release, according to the lawsuit. But the documents say representatives did not wait for a response before putting out the record. "Since then, thousands of people have commented directly on Carliz's social media networks, as well as every time she goes to a public place, about the 'Bad Bunny, baby," says the lawsuit. "This has caused, and is currently causing De La Cruz to feel worried, anguished, intimidated, overwhelmed and anxious."—AFP



Paltrow defends against 'meritless' skiing lawsuit in Utah court Note: No paltrow appeared in Tuesday. She is expected to later take a "dangerous" and "reckless" and "rec

wyneth Paltrow appeared in court in the western US state of Utah on Tuesday, where she is being sued for damages by a retired optometrist over a skiing accident seven years ago. In opening statements, Terry Sanderson's lawyer said the alleged collision on the slopes of Deer Valley had caused him damages worth \$3.3 million. The "Shakespeare in Love" actress has in turn countersued. Paltrow's lawyer Steven Owens told the Park City court on Tuesday that Sanderson is "obsessed" with the lawsuit, and that the case was a "meritless claim of false allegation."

"Really kind of an offensive one. That she somehow left him an unconscious man and bolted? I can tell you, we believe it to be utter BS," said Owens. The alleged collision occurred in February 2016 at Deer Valley, a glamorous ski resort above the swanky larger resort of Park City in the Rocky Mountains. Deer Valley hosted Winter Olympics skiing events in 2002, while Park City is home to the annual Sundance film festival. Paltrow, wearing a white turtleneck sweater, sat silently beside Owens as proceedings began

Tuesday. She is expected to later take the stand in her own defense.

Paltrow's husband Brad Falchuk and children Moses and Apple are due to address the court, Owens said. Sanderson says Paltrow skied into him from behind and then vanished, leaving him unconscious, lying in the snow. Lawrence D Buhler, representing Sanderson, said in his opening statement that Paltrow had been skiing in


a "dangerous" and "reckless" manner, and had caused his client "four broken ribs and permanent brain damage." Paltrow says Sanderson skied into her back, and is countersuing for a nominal \$1 plus legal expenses.

Her lawyer Owens said "Gwyneth is a conservative skier" who was "not going fast," and said she had initially feared she was "being assaulted" when Sanderson appeared directly behind her. "It rattled her and physically hurt her," he said. Owens also said Sanderson is "blind in one eye" and suffers from "decreasing vision" in the other—suggesting poor eyesight was a reason for the crash.



Joking **Biden** teases 2024 run at arts awards ceremony

oe Biden used an arts awards ceremony Tuesday—where one honoree was an actress who famously played a fictional president—to drop perhaps his heaviest hint yet that he's seeking a second White House term in 2024. Presenting a National Humanities Medal to "Underground Railroad" author Colson Whitehead, Biden noted that the writer also had the rare distinction of winning two Pulitzer prizes in a row.

The Democrat then sparked laughter in the packed White House hall by adding: "I'm kinda looking for backto-back myself." Biden has previously made clear, without formally announcing, that he intends to run for a second term in 2024 when he'll be just under 82 years old on election day.

He dropped another hint when awarding the National Medal of Arts to rock legend Bruce Springsteen, riffing on one of his most famous hit songs by saying: "Bruce, some people are just born to run." Some of the loudest cheers of the day came when Biden awarded the arts medal—the highest American honor for artists—to actress Julia Louis-Dreyfus, best known for portraying vice president and later president Selina Meyer in "Veep."

Her character bumbles through the TV series as a frustrated, ignored vice president who finally gets the main job, throwing the White House into ever more hilarious crises. Opening the ceremony, Biden welcomed her as "former president Selina Meyer." Among those also given the arts awards were fashion designer Vera Wang and veteran blues, gospel and pop singer Gladys Knight. Writers Walter Isaacson and Ann Patchett were among those who, like Whitehead, were awarded the National Humanities Medal.—AFP

Sixers into playoffs after Cavaliers defeat Nets

LOS ANGELES: Donovan Mitchell scored 31 points as the Cleveland Cavaliers defeated the Brooklyn Nets 115-109 on Tuesday to send the Philadelphia 76ers into the postseason. Mitchell made 10-of-22 from the field including five three-pointers while Caris LeVert added 18 from the bench against his former club as Cleveland improved to 46-28 to tighten their grip on fourth in the Eastern Conference.

Cleveland's victory ensured that third-placed Philadelphia became the latest team to punch their ticket to the playoffs despite not playing on Tuesday. While Cleveland are yet to clinch, it will take a monumental collapse in the final weeks of the season for them not to advance to the postseason. Tuesday's game could well turn out to be a sneak preview for the playoffs, with Brooklyn still occupying the sixth automatic qualifying spot in the Eastern Conference.

Against Cleveland they started brightly, taking a 30-23 lead into the second quarter before being outscored 71-48 in the next two periods to effectively cede the game, even if they managed to reduce the deficit to single digits in the final stages. Day'Ron Sharpe led Brooklyn's scoring with 20 points while Spencer Dinwiddie had 19 points with 11 assists and five rebounds.

Cavs coach J B Bickerstaff was unhappy that his team eased off late in the fourth quarter. "We need to play a complete game," Bickerstaff said. "We allowed the lead to dictate our emotions, we allowed a big play to dictate our emotions, instead of doing the job and finishing the game the way we need to finish the game," Bickerstaff added.

Nets coach Jacques Vaughn lamented his team's collapse in the second and third quarters. "That's a big question for us," Vaughn said. "I think we got a little stagnant with the basketball. Tough second quarter for us. "Along those lines of putting four quarters together, it all seems as if there's one quarter that punches us in the gut a little bit."

Elsewhere Tuesday, the Los Angeles Clippers' stumbled to a 101-100 defeat to the Oklahoma City Thunder in a game that saw Clippers ace Paul George exit with an apparent right leg injury in the fourth quarter. George needed to be carried back to the locker room after his right knee buckled in a collision with the Thunder's Lu Dort in the fourth

quarter. There was no immediate word on the extent of George's injury, with Clippers coach saying the eight-time All-Star was still being evaluated.

Boston topple soaring Kings

In Sacramento, the Boston Celtics' gave the high-flying Kings a postseason reality check with a blowout 132-109 win. Sacramento have been one of the surprise packages of the Western Confer-

ence this season, sitting third in the standings. But the Kings were overpowered by a Celtics line-up that showed flashes of their dominant early season form as they cut loose in the second half to outscore Sacramento 72-55.

Jayson Tatum led the Celtics scoring with 36 points while Jaylen Brown added 27 points and Derrick White 20. In other games on Tuesday, Trae Young finished with 30 points in Atlanta's 129-107

win over the lowly Detroit Pistons, who are propping up the East with a league-worst record of 16-57. Atlanta improved to 36-36 with the victory and are on track for at least a spot in the play-in tournament.

In Orlando, Gary Harris finished with 22 points and Franz Wagner 20 as the Magic dented Washington's playoff aspirations with a 122-112 victory. The Wizards are currently outside the play-in places in 12th spot in the East with a 32-40 record. — AFP

Navratilova reveals she is 'cancer-free'

LONDON: Martina Navratilova has revealed she is now "cancer-free" after the tennis great feared she "may not see next Christmas" following a devastating double diagnosis. The former world number one, who won 18 Grand Slam singles titles during her long career, revealed in January she had been diagnosed with throat and breast cancer. The 66-year-old is due to undergo further preventative radiation treatment but said in an interview with Piers Morgan on TalkTV she should then "be good to go". "As far as they know I'm cancer-free," she said in the interview aired on Tuesday.

Navratilova, winner of 59 Grand Slam titles in singles and doubles, revealed her diagnosis had left her fearing the worst. "I was in a total panic for three days thinking I may not see next Christmas," she said. "The bucket list came into my mind of all the things I wanted to do. And this may sound really shallow, but I was like, 'OK, which car do I really want to drive if I live like a year'?"

Navratilova, who previously underwent treatment for early-stage breast cancer in 2010, sought medical help after noticing an enlarged lymph node in her neck, with tests subsequently confirming she had cancer. She added: "This was the first week in December, (I'm thinking) I will see this Christmas but maybe not the next one."

But doctors were able to tell her the throat cancer was "extremely treatable" and she had a "95-percent" chance of a full recovery. Navratilova, a Czechoslovakia-born naturalized American, brought a new physical dimension to women's tennis, with her powerful serve and agility at the net making her the dominant player of her era.

She won her first Wimbledon singles title in 1978 and went on to lift the trophy a record nine times — more than any other player in the men's or women's game. And she believes her competitive nature on the court helped her mentally prepare for the battle against cancer. "— AFP

Kuwait, Oman sign Special Olympics MoU

KUWAIT: Kuwait Special Olympics signed a memorandum of understanding with its Omani counterpart to cooperate in supporting and developing services, activities and programs for those with mental and growth disabilities in both countries. The MoU was signed by Kuwait National Special Olympic Director Rihab Buresli and Oman's Special Olympics Director Mohammad Al-Rashidi.

Buresli was pleased with the MoU to support cooperation with the Oman experience and work together to enable special Olympics players through sports and health initiatives and care programs. This is in addition to coordination and preparations for upcoming regional and international events, particularly the world games in Berlin to be held in June.

'I have never felt that much hate,' says Sabalenka

MIAMI GARDENS: Belarus' world number two Aryna Sabalenka says she has faced "hate" in the women's tour locker-room but hopes tensions with Ukrainian players will eventually ease. Australian Open champion Sabalenka lost to Kazakhstan's Elena Rybakina in Sunday's Indian Wells final and at the media day for this week's ATP-WTA Miami Open was asked about her recent comments on "tensions" in the locker-room between Ukrainian and Russian and Belarus players.

"It was really, really tough for me because I've never faced that much hate in the locker room," said Sabalenka. "Of course, there are a lot of haters on Instagram when you're losing the matches, but like in the locker room, I've never faced that," she added. "It was really tough for me to understand that there's so many people who really hate me for no reason, like no reason. I mean, like I did nothing," she said.



Buresli said the memorandum dealt with the cooperation mechanism in training and competitions sanctioned by the Special Olympics. It also includes bilateral cooperation to form teams for unified games and work towards developing parallel programs to sports that will help mental and growth of disabled persons.

Sabalenka said sometimes the tension had gone beyond awkward silences and abrupt conversations. "I had some, not like fights, but I had some weird conversations with, not the girls, but with members of their team. It was really, it was tough. It was tough period. But, now it's getting better," she said.

In comments at Indian Wells Sabalenka had said she had been in a dispute with Ukrainian Lesia Tsurenko's coach Nikita Vlasov. Tsurenko was due to play Sabalenka at Indian Wells but withdrew before their match. The Ukrainian said she had a "panic attack" and had also been upset with a conversation about the war and the position of Russian and Belarusian players with WTA CEO Steve Simon.

Sabalenka said she had found it hard to deal with the locker-room atmosphere initially. "I was really struggling with that because I really felt bad, like I did something and it's still not so good in the locker room with some of the Ukrainian girls. But then I realized that it's not my fault and I did nothing bad to them. And I'm pretty sure that the rest of the Russian and Belarusian athletes did nothing to Ukrainians," she said.

"I just realized that this is all emotions and I just need to like ignore it and focus on myself with understanding that I did nothing bad. And I cannot

Alcaraz returns to Miami Open after rapid rise

MIAMI GARDENS: World number one Carlos Alcaraz heads into this week's Miami Open looking to defend both his title and top ranking and admitting even he has been surprised by his dizzying rise to the top of the sport. A year ago, the 19-year-old came to Miami on the back of wins on clay in Croatia and Brazil and hoping to make his mark on the hard courts. His victory in South Florida launched a remarkable year.

The highlight was his US Open triumph which made him the youngest player to become world number one and he returns to Miami after last week's win in Indian Wells, achieved without dropping a set in the tournament. "It's all been very fast, when I got to Miami last year I was around number 20 and a year later

I am coming in with the number one ranking. That is something very special. I fulfilled my dreams quicker than I expected," he told reporters on Tuesday.

Because of his victory in Miami last year, Alcaraz must win at the Florida event again if he is to hold on to his number one spot, but he says he feels no pressure in that regard or to meet newly raised expectations. "I don't feel the pressure too much. I know the things I have to do. I need to play relaxed and not mind if I lose or if I play well or not," he said.

"My goal is always the same. To feel comfortable on court. To enjoy playing tennis and try to have great thoughts when playing. That is why I am playing at a good level. I am enjoying every single second and playing relaxed. That is what I am thinking about on court," he added.

'You have to improve'

As at Indian Wells, world number two Novak Djokovic is missing after being refused entry to the United States due to his lack of a COVID vaccine and Alcaraz says he misses the Serb's presence, along with the injured Rafael Nadal. "I'm a profes-

sional tennis player, but also I'm a huge fan of tennis and I always want to watch the best players in the world, like Rafa, like Djokovic," he said.

"I played a couple of times against Rafa and I wish to play against him more and with Djokovic as well. I wish to play against him more times, you know, but obviously in every tournament I want them to be playing and I hope we get them back soon," he said.

Far from feeling the weight of following in the footsteps of the 'Big Three' of Djokovic, Nadal and the now retired Roger Federer, Alcaraz says he is trying to draw lessons from their successes. "You have to improve, you have to get better every day. That's why the big players, the Big Three, for example, did all through their careers - to improve every day a little bit," he said.

Alcaraz can expect plenty of support from the crowd in Miami, which includes many Spanish-speaking fans. "It's so special to come back here and feel the same energy that I felt, for example, last year," he said. "I have great supporters here, a lot of people supporting me. I remember last year it was unbelievable you know, with the crowd. I feel like I

am at home, you know," he added. The top seed will begin his title defense against Argentine Facundo Bagnis or a qualifier and could face two-time Miami champion and former world number one Andy Murray in the third round. — AFP

Battle for Manchester Utd heats up ahead of deadline for improved bids

LONDON: The race to buy Manchester United enters a crucial stage on Wednesday as bidders face a deadline to submit improved offers for the Premier League giants. Qatari banker Sheikh Jassim Bin Hamad Al-Thani and British billionaire Jim Ratcliffe have rival bids on the table. There are reported to be several other groups whose interest in United has remained private throughout a bidding war which has intensified this week.

Elliott Investment Management reportedly made it through to the second stage of the process, although the firm is believed to be offering funding to United owners, the Glazer family, rather than a takeover. Those who want to buy United have to declare their offer to Raine, the merchant bank brought in to assist the club, by 2100 GMT on Wednesday.

At least six bids, possibly rising to eight, are expected to be submitted, with those comprised of offers for full control as well as smaller stakes in United. The Glazers have reportedly set a £6 billion (\$7.3 billion) figure for their valuation of a club they bought for £750 million in a highly-leveraged deal in 2005. The initial offers for United last month were believed to have been worth around £4.5 billion.

That would surpass the Premier League record £4.25 billion paid for Chelsea by a consortium fronted by American Todd Boehly last year. Sheikh Jassim is reported to be ready to submit a second indicative bid before the cut-off. But INEOS chemical company founder Ratcliffe, a boyhood United fan, has been more circumspect in his assessment of the process, insisting he will not pay a "stupid" rice as the bidding war for one of football's most iconic clubs increases.

"How do you decide the price of a painting? How do you decide the price of a house? It's not related to how much it cost to build or how much it cost to paint," Ratcliffe told the Wall Street Journal this week. 'What you don't want to do is pay stupid prices for things because then you regret it subsequently.

'Community asset'

Ratcliffe, who already owns French club Nice and Swiss side Lausanne-Sport, said his interest in United would be "purely in winning things", calling the club a "community asset". Ratcliffe and INEOS representatives visited United last Friday after a delegation from Sheikh Jassim's group toured Old Trafford and the club's Carrington training ground to hold more talks as part of their due diligence. Sheikh Jassim has promised to clear the club's debt.

Ratcliffe wants the 69 percent stake owned by the Glazer family, although he could join forces with another bidder to take outright control of the 20-time English champions. It is still possible the Glazers could decide not to sell if they don't receive their asking price, which would in-furiate large sections of United's fanbase, who have protested against the unpopular American owners for much of their reign.

The consortiums that make improved offers are expected to hear from United next week, with another round of bidding still in play. If one group's bid is vastly ahead of the others, they could be chosen to enter into a period of exclusivity, which would see further negotiation ahead of a final sale. The Glazers reportedly want any potential sale to be concluded before the summer, giving new owners the chance to get settled in time for the vital close-season transfer window.

United, three-time European champions, haven't won the Premier League since legendary boss Alex Ferguson led them to the title in his final season before retiring in 2013. They are enjoying a renaissance under Erik ten Hag's management this season, winning the League Cup final against Newcastle in February to clinch the club's first major trophy for six years. Ten Hag's team also sit third in the Premier League and face Brighton in the FA Cup semifinals. – AFP

Barca, Bayern seize upper hand in Women's **Champions League**

PARIS: Barcelona edged Roma 1-0 in the first leg of their Women's Champions League quarterfinal tie on Tuesday after a Lea Schueller goal had given Bayern Munich a victory by the same score against Arsenal. Nineteen-year-old Salma Paralluelo curled in a strike from the edge of the area in the 34th minute for Barcelona at the Stadio Olimpico. That proved enough to take a lead back to Catalonia for next week's return leg.

Barcelona found themselves up against it in the closing stages, with captain Sandro Panos making fine late saves to deny Manuela Giugliano and Valentina Giacinti in front of a crowd of more than 39,000. Barcelona will be favourites to advance to the last four as they seek to reach a third consecutive final. They won the title in 2021 and were runners-up to Lyon last season.

In Munich, Germany forward Schueller scored the only goal for Bayern six minutes before halftime, rising at the back post to head in a hanging cross from the right by Maximiliane Rall. Arsenal could have come away with at least a draw to take back for the second leg in London. Caitlin Foord hit the woodwork early in the second half. Japan's Saki Kumagai made a superb goal-line clearance to deny Stina Blackstenius, and Schueller made a similar intervention to stop Leah Williamson. "It was an even game and could have ended 1-1," said Bayern coach Alexander Straus. "Arsenal were pushing us in the second half and we were defending deeper than we wanted to, so credit to them for that." —AFP

Southgate challenges England to take 'next step' towards glory

MANCHESTER: England's quest to win a first major tournament since 1966 starts afresh on Thursday as the Three Lions' Euro 2024 qualifying campaign begins with a testing trip to champions Italy. After taking time to consider his future following a World Cup quarterfinal exit to France in December, Gareth Southgate will remain in charge as England boss for a fourth attempt at glory. Southgate has overseen a transformation of his country's fortunes on the international stage.

But after reaching a quarter-final, semi-final and final in their last three major tournaments, anything less than ending a 58-year trophy drought in Germany next year will be seen as a disappointment. Southgate might have sounded a warning this week about the declining number of England-qualified players playing regularly in the Premier League, but he admitted that is a worry for the long term given the array of talent available to him currently.

Arsenal winger Bukayo Saka and Borussia Dortmund midfielder Jude Bellingham proved themselves to be two of the brightest young talents

in world football in Qatar. Harry Kane's next goal for his country will make him England's leading scorer in history, while Marcus Rashford's potential is finally being realised under Erik ten Hag at Manchester United.

An injury to Rashford means he will miss the opening two qualifiers against Italy and Ukraine this week, but Southgate is not short of options with Manchester City duo Phil Foden and Jack Grealish set to battle it out for a place in the side. For all the progress made under Southgate, though, victory over Germany in the last 16 of Euro 2020 remains his only knockout win against one of the major nations in international football.

The Three Lions outplayed France for much of their meeting in the quarter-finals in Doha three months ago, but still came up short when it mattered. "These are the sorts of games where we have to show we can go to these places and win," said Southgate on the prospect of facing Italy in front of an intimidating atmosphere at the Estadio Diego Armanda Maradona in Naples. "That is the next step for us as a team."

England fell short on penalties against Italy in the Euro 2020 final on home soil and failed to beat Roberto Mancini's men in two clashes in the Nations League prior to the World Cup. The Three Lions did not win a single game in their Nations League campaign but were still able to bounce back close to their best once the World Cup came around. And

during a qualifying process with little jeopardy for the major nations thanks to the expansion of the European Championship to 24 teams. The top two from a group also containing Ukraine, North Macedonia and Malta will auto-

matically qualify. "That is the big challenge we have got. To go to a World Cup, everyone wanted to be there and the fight for places was immense, the hunger was there and it was clear. Now you have to start again," added Southgate. "I know exactly where our most senior players are with that challenge: they are ready. The (Jordan) Hendersons, the Kanes, they set the tone for that sort of mentality that is going to be needed. - AFP

Mancini looking for answers before Euro qualifying opener

MILAN: Roberto Mancini is wondering where the next generation of Italian talent is going to come from as the Azzurri begin their Euro 2024 qualifying campaign on Thursday with the visit of England. Italy coach Mancini is in the process of another rebuild after the European champions missed out last year's World Cup following a second straight disastrous play-off defeat.

The euphoria of beating England at Wembley in the Euro 2020 final had well and truly dissipated by the time North Macedonia stunned Italy last year. And while the rest of the world's top teams prepared for Qatar, Italian football was again pondering its place in the world, with Mancini lamenting a lack of young players in a country which used to be a conveyor belt of world class talent.

Italy has three clubs in the Champions League quarterfinals for the first time since 2006, with three more in the last eight for Europe's other two competitions, but Mancini is not hailing a rare continental success story for Serie A. "They (Napoli, AC Milan and Inter Milan) have seven or eight Italians in the team between them... This is the reality and we need to do something different," Mancini told reporters on Monday. "Italian football hasn't been reborn... If there were 33 Italians on the pitch, maybe, even half of them being Italian would be enough.'

Mancini has lamented in particular a lack of forwards and used Leeds United winger Willy Gnonto as an example of how young talent is overlooked by Serie A clubs. However he has also been criticized for some of the selections in his 30-man squad for the Thursday's match in Naples, which includes a first call-up for Argentina-born Tigre striker Mateo Retegui. Údinese defender Destiny Udogie, who will move to Tottenham next season, Juventus midfielder Nicolo Fagioli and Lazio pair Mattia Zaccagni and Nicolo Casale are the omissions which have most befuddled fans.

Strength in depth

Zaccagni has scored nine times for Lazio this season, including the winner in Sunday's Rome derby, and him missing out while Federico Chiesa was selected — before succumbing to yet another injury — has raised eyebrows. Italy will face both England and North Macedonia in Group C, a reminder of both the highs and lows of Mancini's reign, which began in 2018 with uncharacteristically swashbuckling football before falling into the same pit of despair which led to him being hired in the first place.

Making the Nations League final four while also relegating England from the top tier was a welcome plus but failed to change a general feeling in Italy that the national team is on another downturn. Mancini and England boss Gareth Southgate will be rivals again on Thursday but both their sides will be favorites to take the two qualifying spots available in the five-team group which also includes Ukraine and Malta. Southgate too has said he is concerned about strength in depth despite a host of talented voung players coming through to England's senior squad in recent years, echoing a similar sentiment expressed by Rudi Voeller when he was made the new director of Germany's national side in January. —AFP

MIAMI: United States defender Tim Ream said Tuesday Gio Reyna has been welcomed back into the fold by team-mates despite the acrimonious feud that erupted following the World Cup. The US squad are training in Florida this week ahead of the team's CONCACAF Nations League game in Grenada on Friday, the squad's first competitive fixture since they exited in the last 16 in Qatar.

The months since the World Cup have been dogged by a welter of revelations detailing tensions between Reyna and his family and former coach Gregg Berhalter. Berhalter's contract expired after the World Cup, and US Soccer say a decision on whether he will be re-hired or replaced will not be made until later this year.

Speaking to journalists on Tuesday, Ream said Borussia Dortmund star Reyna had impressed US team-mates with his work ethic in training in Florida and that the squad was keeen to leave the controversy behind. "The main thing is making sure that everyone knows we're here for a reason and what's happened with Gio in the past is in the past, and what happened at the World Cup happened at the World Cup," Ream said. "We moved on from that as players," the Fulham center-half added.

Berhalter stoked controversy after the World Cup by indirectly revealing that Reyna had almost been sent home from the tournament due to his attitude in training. Reyna later hit back, saying the behind the scenes bust-up should have remained private while acknowledging he reacted poorly after being told by Berhalter he would only have a "limited role" in Qatar before the tournament.—AFP

Japan clinch World Baseball Classic

Ohtani shines as Samurais down USA in fairytale win

MIAMI: Shohei Ohtani delivered a fairytale 3-2 victory for Japan over the United States on Tuesday as the Asian powerhouses won the World Baseball Classic for a record third time. Home runs from Munetaka Murakami and Kazuma Okamoto helped put Japan ahead before Los Angeles Angels superstar Ohtani closed out the win from the mound in the ninth inning.

In a perfectly scripted finale at Miami's loanDepot Park, Ohtani struck out Angels teammate and US captain Mike Trout to clinch Japan's third WBC victory following triumphs in 2006 and 2009. Two-way threat Ohtani, the 2021 American League Most Valuable Player who has earned comparisons to Babe Ruth since arriving in Major League Baseball, said the win was the highlight of his career. "It's definitely number one," Ohtani told FOX television through a translator. "It's got to be up there. It was a storybook ending."

"More than anything, I appreciate this tournament, this whole situation, this whole atmosphere," added Ohtani, who was named tournament MVP. Ohtani had fired up Japan with a rousing pre-game speech in which he urged his teammates to "stop admiring" an American lineup regarded as the strongest US baseball team ever assembled. "Obviously, the US lineup, one through nine, they're all household names, superstars," Ohtani said afterward.

"All the Japanese guys know them. So I didn't want us to be passive. Show respect — but stay aggressive, stay confident. That's why I gave that speech." The star-studded US team, defending champions after winning the last edition of the

tournament in 2017, were left ruing their inability to get on top of Japan's pitchers. Philadelphia Phillies shortstop Trea Turner blasted the hosts to a 1-0 lead in the top of

the second inning with a solo shot to left field. But Japan hit back immediately with Murakami — the hero of Japan's walk-off win over Mexico in Monday's semifinal — launching a home run to right-center field in the bottom of the second off US starter Merrill Kelly. Kelly's problems were only just beginning, with the Arizona right-hander giving up singles to Okamoto and Sosuke Genda before walking Yuhei Nakamura to load the bases.

That prompted US skipper Mark DeRosa to pull Kelly, with Aaron Loup brought in to get out of the jam. Loup managed to emerge from the situation relatively unscathed, with Japan picking up just one more run for a 2-1 lead after Lars Nootbaar grounded out to score Okamoto. Japan extended their lead in the bottom of the fourth when Okamoto crushed a fly ball to left field off US reliever Kyle Freeland to make it 3-1. The Americans threatened to haul themselves back into contention in the fifth but left Mookie Betts and Nolan Arenado stranded on base. It was a similar story in the top

of the seventh when Jeff McNeil took a leadoff walk before Betts singled to leave US runners on first and second with no outs.

Once again though, the US were unable to cash in, with Trout lining out to right fielder Kensuke Kondoh before a double-play ended the inning. Japan manager Hideki Kuriyama turned to Yu Darvish to lock it down in the eighth. But after getting rid of Arenado, the San Diego Padres pitcher was jolted by a monster home run from Kyle Schwarber, who launched a fly ball into the upper tiers to make it a one-run game.

Devin Williams went scoreless through the eighth inning, setting up a dream final inning, with Ohtani pitching to close out the game. Ohtani started nervously by walking McNeil, but Betts grounded into a double play to leave Japan just one out from victory. That left Ohtani needing to dispose of Trout to clinch the victory, and the US captain struck out swinging to end the game. — AFP

World Cup winner Mesut Ozil retires

ISTANBUL: World Cup winner Mesut Ozil announced his retirement from football on Wednesday after an illustrious international career with Germany and club spells with Real Madrid and Arsenal. The 34-year-old helped Germany to glory in Brazil in 2014 but bitterly quit the international scene after the Germans crashed out of the 2018 tournament in Russia.

"After thoughtful consideration, I'm announcing my immediate retirement from professional football," the attacking midfielder said. "I've had the privilege to be an international footballer for almost 17 years now and I feel incredibly thankful for the opportunity. But in recent weeks and months, having also suffered some injuries, it's become more and more clear that it's time to leave the big stage of football."

Ozil, born in the German city of Gelsenkirchen but of Turkish descent, played on some of football's biggest stages but also became embroiled in international politics and accusations of racism. When Germany were knocked out of the 2018 World Cup at the group

stage, a wounded Ozil accused the German public of "racist" attacks.

His club career blossomed when his deft passing and vision helped secure his move from the Bundesliga to Jose Mourinho's Real Madrid

in 2013 helped the London club end their FA Cup drought the following year. In 2014, Ozil started the final as Germany beat Lionel Messi's Argentina 1-0 in the Maracana in Rio de Janeiro thanks to Mario Goetze's extra-time goal. Ozil was repeatedly shortlisted for the Ballon d'Or but the later stages of his career were troubled by disputes over playing time and his close personal friendship with Turkish President Recep Tayyip Erdogan. Erdogan was the best man at

side in 2010. He soon led La Liga in assists while

Messi 'madness' in Argentina as champs play first match

BUENOS AIRES: Lionel Messi and his Argentina teammates will make a triumphant return in their homeland on Thursday when they play their first match since winning the World Cup in Qatar. More than 1.5 million fans applied for 63,000 available tickets for the match against Central American minnows Panama at the Monumental

stadium in Buenos Aires.

Football-mad Argentines were out in even larger numbers following the Albiceleste's dramatic penalty shoot-out victory over France in December. An estimated five million people thronged the streets of Buenos Aires a few days later for the trophy parade. Such was the multitude that the parade had to be abandoned long before it reached central Buenos

Aires as it was already hours behind schedule.

Messi had been widely expected to retire from international football after the final in Doha, in which he scored two goals and a shoot-out spot-kick, but the Paris Saint-Germain forward said he wanted to carry on a bit longer so he could wear the blue and white Argentina jersey as a world champion. "He is in good shape, he wants to keep coming. When he tells me that he doesn't feel good, we'll see," coach Lionel Scaloni said on Tuesday. "At the moment he is happy with the national team."

The expectation was slightly soured earlier this month when two men fired shots at a closed supermarket belonging to the family of Messi's wife, before leaving a menacing message aimed at the seven-time Ballon d'Or winner. "Messi, we're waiting for you. Javkin is a narco, he won't take care of you," said the handwritten message left on the ground, in reference to Pablo Javkin, the mayor of Messi's hometown Rosario, around 320 km north of Buenos Aires.

Messi, though, has taken it all in his stride, as his father pointed out. "I spoke to the kid and he told me: 'relax'," Jorge Messi told reporters. For the mayor of Rosario, it was more of a publicity stunt than a genuine threat. "What story goes more quickly viral in the world than an attack on Messi?" said Javkin. While it may not directly affect Messi, the incident



did highlight a growing problem in the 35-year-old's hometown. Rosario is a port city on the Parana river that has gradually become a nerve center for drug trafficking and the most violent city in Argentina, with 287 murders in 2022.

'Everyone will want to beat us'

A party atmosphere is expected in Buenos Aires for the team's competitive homecoming. With 20,000 places in the 83,000-capacity stadium reserved for invitees, the remaining tickets were snapped up within two hours of going on sale. The cheapest cost 12,000 pesos (\$60) up to 49,000 pesos (\$245), which is more than half the average monthly salary in the South American country.

Argentine football federation president Claudio Tapia said the body had received more than 130,000 requests for media accreditation, in a stadium that has capacity for just 344 journalists. "We would love to be able to accommodate everyone, but we would need two … stadiums, just for journalists. The madness for Argentina is total," said Tapia.

Those not lucky enough to get inside the stadium will at least be able to watch the match for free on television after the government decided to broadcast it freely. Scaloni promised them is that the team would not rest on their laurels, regardless of the occasion or opponents. "The aim is to keep playing at the same level," he said. "Now, it will be harder than ever because everyone will want to beat us." After Thursday's match, Argentina will play the island of Curacao on Match 28 in Santiago del Estero. — AFP
