Sheikha Al-Zain submits credentials to President Biden

WASHINGTON: Sheikha Al-Zain Al-Sabah submitted her credentials as the new Ambassador of Kuwait to Washington during a meeting with US President Joe Biden, the Kuwaiti Embassy in Washington said in a statement on Sunday. It indicated Ambassador Sheikha Al-Zain Al-Sabah conveyed greetings from HH the Amir Sheikh Nawaf Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah, HH the Crown Prince Sheikh Mishal Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah and HH the Prime Minister Sheikh Ahmad Al-Nawaf Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah to Biden.

The Kuwaiti ambassador affirmed she will work on measures to bolster historic relations linking the two countries, enhancing them in all possible domains.

KUWAIT: The traffic department said on Sunday that driving licenses of expats will now be renewed for only one year, down from three years at present. The decision went into effect on April 26, 2023. The department however said driving licenses of expats working as domestic drivers will be renewed for three years. Major Abdullah Bu Hasan, who announced the decision, did not say why they reverted to the one-year validity for the licenses.

But the interior ministry said several weeks ago that it is reviewing hundreds of thousands of driving licenses issued to expats to ensure they were issued in accordance with the law, amid reports alleging widespread corruption. Local media said thousands of licenses held by expats are likely to be canceled.

Kuwait applies strict requirements for expats who wish to obtain a driver's license. These include the expat should draw a monthly salary of at least KD 600, must have a university degree and must have stayed legally in the country for at least two years. Several professions like judges, engineers, doctors and others are exempted from these conditions.

Driving licenses for expats used to be valid for as long as 10 years in the past. Later, its validity was linked to the validity of their residency. The traffic department then reduced the validity to just one year for several years, before extending the validity to three years again in 2020.

Meanwhile, National Assembly Speaker Marzouq Al-Ghanem on Sunday sent out invitations to MPs and

Biden laughs off age gags at comedy roast

WASHINGTON: US President Joe Biden took it on the chin Saturday at the White House Correspondents' Association dinner as he laughed gamely through sharp jokes about his age, and hit back with a few of his own. Washington's political and media elites gathered for their annual big-night-out in the US capital for an event that ranged from the traditional comedy gags to somber calls to free reporters imprisoned abroad.

Headlining the after-dinner entertainment was "Daily Show" correspondent Roy Wood Jr, who gleefully mocked Biden, 80, for running for a second term in the White House that could mean he is still president at age 86. Wood noted recent angry protests in France against raising the retirement age. "They rioted because they didn't want to work until 64. Meanwhile, in America, we have an 80-yearold man begging us for four more years of work," he deadpanned, drawing a broad smile from Biden, sitting only yards away.

Qatar spends big to beat post **World Cup blues**

DOHA: Months after hundreds of thousands of football fans packed into its hotels and stadiums, Qatar is seeking to remedy a bout of the post-World Cup blues by hosting more international events. Along with the departed football crowds, thousands of foreign workers left the Gulf state after Lionel Messi lifted the coveted trophy on Dec 18. Many of those who stayed on are counting the cost.

Luxury hotels built for the tournament have laid off hundreds of staff as rooms costing thousands of dollars a night during the tournament can no longer be filled. In a country normally hungry for labor, a shopping mall on the edge of Doha recently advertised 100 jobs and saw more than 1,000 people jostling outside for interviews. Qatar estimates that the World Cup, which residents once dreaded, brought Continued on Page 6

India captures rice-loving tusker after six killed

IDUKKI, India: Indian forest officials have tranquilized and relocated a rice-loving wild tusker elephant that killed at least six people, media reports said. The male elephant — dubbed Arikomban, or "rice-tusker" — was infamous for raiding shops for rice and grains in the southern state of Kerala. On Saturday, a team of 150 forest officials caught the elephant, which resisted its captors even after being hit with five tranquilizer shots, the Indian Express

Construction worker dies

KUWAIT: An Egyptian construction worker fell from the roof of one of the houses under construction in Mutlaa while he was on duty. KUWAIT: A European man allegedly committed suicide in a swimming pool in one of the hotels where he worked. The body was found tied up. The Public Prosecution has been informed and investigation has been launched.

Schools to join TIMMS evaluation

KUWAIT: The National Center for Education Development announced that it will be conducting the TIMMS mathematics and science exams for grade 8 and grade 4 students. The test will be held in several schools across the country on May 2 as part of an international study that aims at evaluating the educational level of students in the country. The General Director of the center Amina Al-Jaber said students in 300 schools in Kuwait will be taking the test, which will be administered in cooperation with the Ministry of Education. The outcomes of the evaluation will be studied and used to develop education in Kuwait. Conducted every four years since 1995, TIMSS measures how effective countries are in teaching mathematics and science. It's administered by the International Association for the Evaluation of Educational Achievement (IEA), headquartered in the Netherlands. -KUNA

Municipality starts second phase of hygiene campaign

KUWAIT: Kuwait Municipality announced that it started the second phase of the hygiene campaign launched last March called "Our country deserves it" in order to raise the hygiene quality across the country. The municipality confirmed that field teams in cleaning centers of the cleaning and road occupancy departments in all governorates will intensify their inspection campaigns to reduce hygiene violations in commercial, investment, craft, industrial and agricultural areas.

The aim of these field trips is to monitor violations and have cleaning inspectors follow up on cleaning work on a 24-hour shift basis in centers spread across the six gov-

ernorates. Inspectors will monitor the performance of cleaning companies in order to crack down on violations. It's worth noting that private commercial cleaning companies that sign contracts with real estate owners in the investment, commercial and industrial sectors are subject to the supervision and control of the Kuwait Municipality, but the municipality is not obligated to remove waste from these companies because they don't have contracts with it.

The municipality also indicated that it would intensify the efforts of its supervisory teams and will provide the required mechanisms, equipment and cleaning workers to raise the level of cleanliness. Legal action will be taken against those who violate construction and waste dumping regulations. The municipality emphasized the importance of sealing waste bags, putting then inside containers and taking them outside during specified collection times in order to avoid fines.

Ministry of Health shuts 33 clinics over advert breach

Unrealistic beauty standards put people at risk

KUWAIT: Kuwait's ministry of health announced it has "temporarily" shut down 33 private cosmetic surgery clinics for breaking medical advertisement rules on social networking sites. In a press statement, the ministry said the move came after these clinics violated law 70/2020 on the profession of cosmetic surgeons and relevant ministerial decrees, mainly decree 87/2023 related to public morality, code of ethics and patient privacy.

Kuwait Times had reported on the psychological effects these advertisements could have on youth in January. Psychologist Hassan Al-Mousawi said consistent exposure to these images, whether on the streets or on social media, might result in a skewed perception of beauty among young women, often leading to more serious mental disorders, from anxiety to self-harm. The unrealistic beauty standards not only put women at risk, he said, but also men who have been recently going under the knife more frequently compared to previous years.

The ministry added that it had already taken legal action against the clinics by sending the violating doctors to concerned authorities and shutting down the clinics "temporarily" until rel-

evant investigations are over. Decree 87/2023, which was issued in May 2023, aims at regulating the huge volume of cosmetic surgery clinic ads both online and on the streets. The decree largely deals with two issues: The publicization of service costs in ads and the use and filming of photos or videos that depict customers at the clinic. This only applies to private clinics.

Superlatives, price tags off limits

Here are highlights from some of the 27 articles in the decree: On advertising prices: The decree prohibits advertising the prices of health services, including products and treatments, both online and on the streets. The article implies that it's not allowed to publicly respond to requests for pricing on social media, which usually happens in the comments section under posts. Health professionals, however, are allowed to advertise their experience.

It is not permissible to advertise medicines, medical preparations, mixtures, formulas, stimulants, special foods, devices, machines or equipment through any other advertising means without a license from the health ministry.

On filming patients: Physicians and healthcare practitioners are prohibited from filming patients

for purposes of education, documentation or research without written permission from the patient, practitioner and management of the clinic.

On the content of ads: Ads must not contain false or misleading medical information. Using exaggerated superlatives, such as "the best", "the only", "guaranteed", and "legendary" is also not allowed.

Brimming with issues

A quick look at the social media accounts of some cosmetic surgery clinics shows that many have stopped advertising their prices. A few had posted statements in early April, two weeks after the decree was issued, to urge customers to call the clinic for information on pricing because "it's not permitted to advertise pricing and offers on social media".

Following the health ministry's announcement on Saturday evening, people took to Twitter and Instagram mostly to voice their approval, despite misunderstanding the motivation behind the shutdowns. Comments on social media posts, which mostly contained vague information on the closures without explaining the nature of the violations, assumed the clinics had caused physical harm to patients and asked for those responsible to be prosecuted. Many brought to attention that some clinics are operating



without the necessary qualifications.



Kuwait to speed up renewable energy projects

KUWAIT: Kuwait must accelerate its plans of producing no less than 15 percent of the electrical grid consumption from renewable energy sources by 2023, Minister of Electricity, Water and Renewable Energy Mutlaq Burguba told KUNA. The ministry noted in a statement that Burguba met with several renewable energy specialists and discussed relevant topics, current and future governmental projects,

their implementation and how to follow up on them.

The meeting focused on conserving energy and the steps needed for relying on renewable energy to produce 10 percent of the ministry's building consumption of electrical energy. The officials discussed the establishment of an organizational unit in the ministry to handle the tasks and projects related to renewable energy.

The meeting was attended by Acting Undersecretary Maha Al-Asousi, Assistant Undersecretary for Technical Services and Main Concerns Sector Ahmed Al-Rashidi, Assistant Undersecretary for Electric Power Stations and Water Distillation Sector Haitham Al-Ali, and Assistant Undersecretary for Distribution Networks Engineer Saad Al-Rashidi. Electricity projects have made headlines last week,

with the Kuwait Fund for Arab Economic Development announcing that 15 percent of the Gulf electrical interconnection expansion project with Kuwait has been completed until March 2023.

Interconnection Authority (GCCIA) and Kuwait is essential to producing sustainable energy and reducing the cost of production. The project includes establishing the Wafra station, which would connect the GCCIA's network with Kuwait's network through four circuits of 400 kV transmission at a total cost of \$270 million. According to the fund, Kuwait will be among the largest beneficiaries of the project, as it will raise the capacity supporting the local electricity network to about 3,500 megawatts. —KUNA

Final school exam schedule ready

KUWAIT: The education ministry has completed the preparation of the end of the school year 2022-2023 exam schedule for secondary school students, the ministry announced Sunday. The schedule is pending approval by the ministry's Undersecretary and Chairman General of examinations Usama Al-Sultan. About 44,000 students in grade 12 will sit for exams from June 11 until June 22 in the general, private, religious, special and home education. The schedule was set as it was in previous years with rest days in between. There will be an extra 30 minutes for students with learning difficulties and another extra 15 minutes for each subject in order to give students time to read instructions and ensure they received the correct number of exam pages.

KUWAIT: The Social Reform Society has kicked off the 45th edition of the Islamic book fair Sunday. The official spokeswoman for the Ministry of Information Anwar Murad said in a statement to KUNA that the exhibition is closely followed by publishing and journalism sector. KUWAIT: Kuwaiti designer Hanadi Al-Marzouq is showcasing her artwork in "Traces of Nostalgia", a multidisciplinary exhibition where she expresses the changes that took place in Kuwait after the discovery of oil.

Marzouq's art pieces revolve around preserving Kuwait's heritage that is fading away after the country's rapid modernization. Five of her artworks that shift between Kuwait's past and present are displayed at the exhibition: The Trace, The Prophecy, The Awakening, Inception and Anthropocene. The exhibition opened at Sadu House on April 29, 2023 and will continue until May 6, 2023. During the exhibition, Marzouq told Kuwait Times about her artworks and highlighted the significance of each pieces.

The Trace, 2023: Mixed media installation

Marzouq said 'The Trace' is an installation that deconstructs the language of traditional symbols found in Sadu textiles, embracing them as functional motifs rather than mere ornaments that are devoid of any purpose. The central part of this installation is a tire, a symbol of the consumerist mindset, manufactured from recycled rubber whose tracks reveal ephemeral Sadu impressions on the sand. This installation invites the viewer to reflect on our lost heritage, capturing fleeting moments before they disappear from our landscape.

The Prophecy, 2023: Mixed media sculpture
Describing 'The Prophecy', Marzouq said it is a composition of thoughts on Kuwait's brutalist architecture of the oil era, which is mostly demolished now as oil continues to be a catalyst for cycles of demolition and construction that are devoid of any permanence. This multi-layered abstraction fuses various materials such as ceramic and brass. This leads to the realization that the purpose of this study is not to recover what has been lost, but to expand on the potential of contemporary identities of Kuwaitis influenced by this dichotomous transition.

The Awakening, 2023: Mixed media installation Extending her thoughts to a future that gives birth to other habitants, Marzouq said 'The Awakening' is an installation that

habitants, Marzouq said 'The Awakening' is an installation that transports the viewer into the future, with a glimpse of ruins at an imagined site where future habitants reflect on our legacy and pose questions to construct a collective memory of our past. The bleached burqas represent the diminished interest in locally crafted goods and the decline of the weaver's historic role in society, whereas the prototypes of an unfinished

project represent a constant state of cultural alienation. The installation also comments on the shift in gender roles that came about during this period of social and economic change, allowing the manifestation of petro-masculinity in many ways.

Inception, 2023: Textile, wool

Marzouq said the textile pattern mimics tire tracks found in the previous installation, a contrast of the past and present. While the weaver promotes cultural identity through their craft, the designer draws significance from culture using instruments that can channel this meaning into products. The result is a juxtaposition of the roles of the traditional weaver and the contemporary product designer as they collaborate to create products that generate social shifts.

Anthropocene, 2023: Film

Marzouq clarified the idea of the film, as she said that in a barren postapocalyptic landscape, an unnamed young bedouin woman — a relic of her bygone ancestry — attempts to summon a half remembered Sadu-weaving technique. She wanders through decayed cityscapes, desertscapes and abandoned scrap yards in search of the one tool that would activate her memory and regenerate her once expert weaving skills - a weaving hom. The work explores spatial and temporal insights into the inevitable consequences of the current state of imbalance. By breaking the barrier between the screen and the spectator with a pile of horns, the narrative is extended to become a perceptual activity of the spectator.



Clashes rock Sudan despite truce

Millions have endured crippling shortages of water, food, medicines and other basic supplies

KHARTOUM: Heavy fighting again rocked Sudan's capital Sunday as tens of thousands have fled the bloody turmoil and a former prime minister warned of the "nightmare" risk of a descent into full-scale civil war. Army forces clashed with paramilitaries in Khartoum as deadly hostilities have entered a third week despite the latest ceasefire, which was formally set to expire at the end of the day.

"There has been very heavy fighting and loud gunfire ... since the early morning on my street." a southern Khartoum resident told AFP. Clashes were reported around the army headquarters in central Khartoum, and the army also carried out airstrikes in the capital's twin city of Omdurman

Foreign nations have scrambled to evacuate thousands of their citizens by air, road and sea since the fighting plunged the poverty-stricken country into deadly turmoil on April 15. A first Red Cross plane brought eight tonnes of humanitarian aid to Port Sudan, from Jordan, on Sunday. It carried surgical material and medical kits to stabilise 1,500 patients, the International Committee of the Red Cross said.

Millions of Sudanese have endured crippling

shortages of water, food, medicines and other basic supplies, while tens of thousands have fled to neighbouring countries, with more on their way. Satellite images showed long bus convoys at the Egyptian border, while the UN said tens of thousands had escaped to Chad, South Sudan, Ethiopia and the Central African Republic.

The turmoil could deepen further in the power struggle between army chief Abdel Fattah al-Burhan and Mohamed Hamdan Daglo, head of the paramilitary Rapid Support Forces (RSF). Sudan's former premier Abdalla Hamdok warned Saturday that the conflict could deteriorate into one of the world's worst civil wars. "God forbid if Sudan is to reach a point of civil war proper... Syria, Yemen, Libya will be a small play," Hamdok told an event in Nairobi. "I think it would be a nightmare for the world."

Risk of famine

The violence has killed at least 528 people and wounded about 4,600, the health ministry said, although the real casualty toll may be higher from fighting in 12 out of Sudan's 18 states including the Darfur region.

The UN World Food Programme has warned the unrest could plunge millions more into hunger in a country where 15 million people already need aid to stave off famine. Some of those killed still lie on the roads of Khartoum, and the ICRC's Africa regional director Patrick Youssef told journalists the Sudanese Red Crescent was "trying to get to the bodies in the streets". Only 16 percent of hospitals are functioning in Khartoum, according to the World Health Organization, with many facilities shelled in the fighting.

The warring sides have agreed to multiple truces but none has taken hold, as chaos and lawlessness have gripped the capital city of five million and other regions. The latest three-day cease-fire—due to expire at midnight (2200 GMT) Sunday—was agreed Thursday after mediation led by the United States, Saudi Arabia, the African Union and the United Nations.

As the battles have raged regardless, the rival generals have taken aim at each other in the media. Burhan again branded the RSF a militia that aims "to destroy Sudan" while Daglo called the army chief "a traitor". Local authorities in Khartoum on Sunday put civil servants on open-ended leave "due to the security situation", though the majority of residents have already been hiding at home since the fighting broke out.

the 21-year-old added. On Saturday, Francis gave a speech to refugees—mostly from neighbouring Ukraine—and poor people at a Budapest church. Orban's government has welcomed those fleeing the

war in Ukraine, which borders Hungary. But activists say there is barely a support system in place and Orban's insistence on maintaining ties with Moscow has also alienated Ukrainians. Francis' 41st international trip since becoming pope in 2013 is taking place entirely in Budapest, the capital of the EU member where 39 percent of the 9.7-million population are Catholic. It comes a month after he was hospitalised for three months for bronchitis, so all eyes have been on the pontiff's health. But despite persistent knee pain forcing him to move around in a wheelchair, the pope has appeared to be in good shape.

On Saturday, Francis met Budapest mayor Gergely Karacsony, a staunch Orban opponent. He also met with bishop Hilarion, who was ousted as head of the Russian church's department for external relations by Russian Orthodox leader Patriarch Kirill, a staunch Kremlin backer. — AFP

Tens of thousands flee

Sudan was ruled for decades by Islamist-backed strongman Omar al-Bashir, who was ousted by the military in 2019 after mass pro-democracy protests. The coup brought Burhan and Daglo to power, and they seized full control in another military takeover, in 2021, before turning on each other.

UN Secretary-General Antonio Guterres has urged negotiations to end the bloodshed. "There is no right to go on fighting for power when the country is falling apart," he told Saudi-owned Al Arabiya television on Saturday. "My appeal is for everything to be done to support an African-led initiative for peace in Sudan."

About 75,000 have been displaced by the fighting, the UN said. At least 20,000 have escaped to Chad, 4,000 to South Sudan, 3,500 to Ethiopia and 3,000 to the Central African Republic, it said. The fighting has also triggered a mass exodus of foreigners and international staff. Saudi Arabia said it had taken about 5,000 people to safety on ships across the Red Sea. A US-organised road convoy arrived in Port Sudan Saturday to join the exodus. And the UK Foreign Office said just under 1,900 Britons had been taken out on 21 flights, following large airlifts by France, Germany and other nations. — AFP

Pope appeals to Hungarians to be open to migrants

BUDAPEST: Pope Francis on Sunday called on Hungarians to be "open" toward migrants, as he wrapped up a three-day visit to the central European country whose nationalist premier has taken a staunch anti-immigration stance.

Tens of thousands thronged a central Budapest square to hear the pope lead an open-air mass during which he urged all, including "those with political and social responsibilities", to be more open. "Let us encourage one another to be increasingly open doors," the 86-year-old Argentine pontiff said, adding it was "sad and painful... to see closed doors".

The closed doors of our selfishness with regard to others... the doors we close towards those who are foreign or unlike us, towards migrants or the poor,"

he said. Throughout his visit to Budapest—his second since a brief 2021 stopover—Francis has emphasised a welcoming stance towards those fleeing poverty or conflict zones.

The comments have stood in stark contrast to those of Hungarian Prime Minister Viktor Orban who has regularly espoused anti-migration rhetoric to defend a "Christian Europe" since coming to

On Sunday, some 50,000 people thronged to hear the pope say mass under tight security at Kossuth Lajos Square, behind the parliament on the banks of the Danube, according to local authorities. "I feel emotional. He is very important in my life," onlooker Ferenc Toth, 43, told AFP after the pope passed by in his popemobile.

'Christian mission'

A government report accused the plant's owner LG Polymers, a subsidiary of South Korea's LG Chem, of negligence and said the disaster was due to a lack of safety protocols and poor emergency response. Two senior South Korean executives and 10 other local employees were arrested and charged with offences, including the Indian legal equivalent of manslaughter.

That incident sparked memories of one of India's worst industrial disasters. In 1984, gas leaked from a pesticide plant in Bhopal, a city in central India. At least 3,500 people living around the plant operated by Union Carbide died in the days that followed the leak. People continue to suffer the effects to this day.

Children are still born disfigured, with webbed feet and hands, and experience stunted growth because of the gas that affected their mothers. — AFP

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Gas leak kills 11 in India

AMRITSAR: A gas leak killed 11 people in India on Sunday, an official said, in the latest deadly industrial accident in the vast developing economy of 1.4 billion people. The gas leak happened in Giaspura, an industrial area of Ludhiana in the northern state of Punjab. "Eleven deaths are confirmed," Mandeep

Singh Sidhu, police commissioner of Ludhiana, told reporters, adding that four people were hospitalised. The cause of the leak was yet to be ascertained, Sidhu added. "When the blood sample is matched with

the sample that the NDRF (National Disaster Response Force) team takes, only then will we be able to tell you the exact cause, which kind of gas," the police commissioner said. Five women were among those who died, broadcaster NDTV reported. The six other victims included two boys aged 10 and 13, the report added. Industrial gas leaks blamed on poor safety standards and insufficient checks are common in India. Last August, at least 112

women were hospitalised after a gas leak at an apparel manufacturing plant in the southern state of Andhra Pradesh.

That followed a similar accident in June when around 200 women fell unconscious after a gas leak in the same area, NDTV reported. In 2020, at least 15 people were killed and hundreds hospitalised after a gas leak at a chemical plant in Visakhapatnam, an industrial port city in the same state. Nearly 1,000 people were exposed to the gas and over 500 were hospitalised with symptoms

of severe respiratory distress and around the plant.

UN chief, envoys in key talks on Afghanistan crisis

Taleban govt will be absent from the talks with representatives from about 25 countries

DOHA: UN chief Antonio Guterres will gather international envoys at a secret location in Doha on Monday in an increasingly desperate bid to find ways to influence Afghanistan's Taleban rulers. Considered the world's biggest humanitarian crisis by the United Nations, Guterres's quandary has been deepened by the Taleban administration's move to stop girls going to school and most women from working, even for UN agencies.

The Taleban government, which took back power in August 2021, will be absent from the talks with representatives from about 25 countries and international organisations, according to diplomats. Ahead of the talks, a small group of women staged a protest in Kabul on Saturday to oppose any international recognition of the Taleban government. But the UN and Western powers are adamant this will not be discussed.

"Any kind of recognition of the Taleban is completely off the table," said US State Department spokesman Vedant Patel. Apart from confirming that the Taleban leadership is not on the list of participants, the UN has refused to provide any specifics including the location in Qatar's capital or who will join Guterres.

The Taleban's deputy minister for refugees Mohammad Arsala Kharoti said on Sunday that "such meetings will not have any results." "As long as they don't establish proper relations with the Emirate (Taleban-ruled Afghanistan) and no representation of the Emirate is

present, these meetings won't be successful to a great extent," he told AFP at Kabul airport.

In Doha, the UN secretary-general is also to give an update on a review of the world body's critical relief operation in Afghanistan, ordered in April after authorities had stopped Afghan women from working with UN agencies, diplomats said.

The UN has said it faces an "appalling choice" over whether to maintain its huge operation in the country of 38 million. Torn apart over the Ukraine war and other global tensions, the UN Security Council powers united on Thursday to condemn the curbs on Afghan women and girls and urge all countries to seek "an urgent reversal" of the policies. The Afghan foreign ministry rejected the call and said the ban "is an internal social matter of Afghanistan".

UN 'in a trap'

Richard Gowan, UN expert for the International Crisis Group, an independent NGO, said the UN is "in a trap over Afghanistan". "Guterres has to untangle a very complicated knot. He needs to find a way to keep aid flowing into Afghanistan, but the Taleban ban on women is a huge blow to the UN's ability to operate in the country." Gowan said the international community wants the UN to maintain its critical presence.

"There are lots of differences among Security

Council members over Afghanistan. But everyone, including Russia and China, agrees it is better to have the UN in Kabul than not." The United Nations has given few indications of what proposals could be made at the meeting.

UN spokesperson Stephane Dujarric said on Friday the aim "is to reinvigorate international engagement around common objectives for a durable way forward on Afghanistan". The global body also wants "unity or commonality of message" on women's and human rights, countering terrorism and drug trafficking.

"Recognition is not an issue," Dujarric insisted. Whether the Taleban government takes up Afghanistan's UN seat is for the UN General Assembly to decide. But the UN and other groups have been holding increasingly intense discussions on how to engage with the Taleban authorities and possibly offer incentives for change.

US Afghanistan envoy Thomas West has been travelling across West Asia in recent weeks meeting different governments and groups. Last year the United States moved \$3.5 billion of seized Afghan assets into a Swiss-based fund to pay for relief and imports that are not controlled by the Taleban authorities.

Suggestions have been made that the US administration should consider easing sanctions. "Much as we might prefer to see regime change in Afghanistan,

for the foreseeable future a reasonably stable and sufficiently capable Taleban government is needed to help facilitate humanitarian programs, neutralise ISKP (Islamic State), and avert state collapse and civil war," Washington think tank the Middle East Institute said in a report last week. —AFP

Iran's Raisi to visit Damascus since Syria war

TEHRAN: Iran's President Ebrahim Raisi will travel to Damascus on Wednesday, Iranian state media reported, touting a "very important" two-day visit against the backdrop of increased regional engagement with the Syrian regime.

"Dr Raisi's trip to Damascus next Wednesday is a very important trip due to the changes and developments that are taking place in the region," IRNA state news agency on Sunday quoted Iran's ambassador to Syria, Hossein Akbari, as saying.

According to IRNA, Raisi will lead a "high economic-political delegation" in his two-day trip at the official invitation of Syrian President Bashar al-Assad. Tehran, a major ally of Assad, has supported his government during Syria's 12-year-old conflict, but no Iranian president has visited there since the war started in 2011.

The visit comes weeks after a landmark rapprochement agreement between regional rivals lined greater Arab willingness to re-engage with the once isolated Syrian government.

"This trip will not only be beneficial for Tehran and Damascus, but it is also a very good event that other countries in the region can also take advantage of," Akbari was reported as saying. There was no immediate official comment from the Syrian presidency.

The last Iranian president to visit the Syrian capital was Mahmoud Ahmadinejad, in September 2010. Assad last visited Tehran in May, in his second reported trip to the Islamic republic since the war began. —AFP

Turkey nears referendum on Erdogan's rule

ISTANBUL: Turkish President Recep Tayyip Erdogan dives Sunday into the final two-week stretch before a momentous election that has turned into a referendum on his two decades of divisive but transformative rule. The 69-year-old leader looked fighting fit as he strutted back on stage after a three-day illness and tossed flowers to rapturous crowds at an Istanbul aviation fest on Saturday.

It was the perfect venue for reminding Turks of all they had gained since his Islamic-rooted party ended years of secular rule and launched an era of economic revival and military might. He was flanked by the president of Azerbaijan and the Ankara-backed premier of Libya—two countries where drones built by his son-inlaw's company helped swing the outcome of wars.

Istanbul itself has become a modern and chaotic megalopolis that has nearly doubled in size since Erdogan came to power in 2003. But hiding beneath the surface are a more recent economic crisis and fierce social divisions that have given the May 14 parliamentary and presidential polls a powder keg feel.

'Political coup attempt'

The nation of 85 million appears as splintered as ever about whether Erdogan has done more harm than good in the only Muslim-majority country of the NATO defence bloc. Polls show him running neck-and-neck against secular opposition leader Kemal Kilicdaroglu and his alliance of six disparate parties.

The entry of two minor candidates means that Erdogan and Kilicdaroglu will likely face each other again in a runoff on May 28. But some of Erdogan's more hawkish ministers are sounding warnings about Washington leading Western efforts to undermine Turkey's might

Interior Minister Suleyman Soylu referred Friday to US President Joe Biden's 2019 suggestion that Washington should embolden the opposition "to take on and

defeat Erdogan". "July 15 was their actual coup attempt," Soylu said of a failed 2016 military putsch that Erdogan blamed on a US-based Muslim preacher. "And May 14 is their political coup attempt."

Splintered society

Erdogan continues to be lionised across more conservative swathes of Turkey for unshackling religious restrictions and bringing modern homes and jobs to millions of people through construction and state investment. Turkey is now filled with hospitals and interconnected with airports and highways that stimulate trade and give the vast country a more inclusive feel. He empowered conservative women by enabling them to stay veiled in school and in civil service—a right that did not exist in the secular state created from the Ottoman Empire's ashes in 1923.

And he won early support from Turkey's long-repressed Kurdish minority by seeking a political solution to their armed struggle for an independent state that has claimed tens of thousands of lives. But his equally passionate detractors point to a more authoritarian streak that emerged with the violent clampdown on protests in

2013 -- and became even more apparent with sweeping purges he unleashed after the failed 2016 coup attempt. Erdogan turned against the Kurds and jailed or

stripped tens of thousands of people of their state jobs on oblique "terror" charges that sent chills through Turkish society. His penchant for campaigning and gift for public speaking enabled him to keep winning at the polls. But the current vote is turning into his toughest because of a huge economic crisis that erupted in late 2021

Democratic traditions

Erdogan's biggest problems started when he decided to defy the rules of economics by slashing interest rates to fight inflation. The lira lost more than half its value and inflation hit an eye-popping 85 percent since his experiment began.

Millions lost their savings and fell into deep debt. Polls show the economy worrying Turks more than any other issue—a point not lost on Kilicdaroglu. The 74-year-old former civil servant pledges to restore economic order and bring in vast sums from Western investors who fled the chaos of Erdogan's more

This week Moscow said it had denied a consular visit to Gershkovich in retaliation for Washington not issuing visas to several Russian journalists, as bilateral ties remain frozen more than a year after Russia's invasion of Ukraine. Also among the dinner's star guests was basketball player Brittney Griner, who was released by Russia as part of a prisoner swap last year and who has vowed to fight for other detainees. — AFP

1.4 million people to the state. Akhtar Patel, who runs a jewelry store in Doha's Souq Waqif market, said business in comparison is "quiet". "We really miss those fans now," he said. The Eid al-Fitr Muslim holiday brought back some shoppers, but the decline has been such that Sandeev Kumar, who runs a print workshop, sent two of his four staff back to India because he could no longer afford to pay them. "We miss the vibe, but we miss the business even more," he said.

On Doha's seafront promenade, host to a World Cup fanzone, some jobless workers have been reduced to asking for cash handouts, leading the interior ministry to issue a public warning against "uncivilized" begging. But Qatar's economy remains healthy. After recording a trade surplus of nearly \$100 billion in 2022, growth in 2023 – bolstered by its natural gas riches — is predicted by the World Bank to hit 3.4 percent, among the highest in the Middle East. And a wave of newcomers has added nearly 100,000 to the population since the World Cup final, taking it to over three million, according to official figures.

Kilicdaroglu, 74, and his multi-faceted alliance are posing Erdogan's toughest election challenge since the Turkish leader's Islamic-rooted party first swept to power in 2002. The upcoming vote is too close to call and likely heading to a runoff on May 28.

Kilicdaroglu and his allies have fanned out across the country, holding daily events that are starting to get coverage on pro-government media that dominate Turkey today. He staged an equally massive rally along the embankment of the oppo-

Akbar Al-Baker, head of Qatar's tourism agency and Oatar Airways, said hotel occupancy in the months after a World Cup is "always low". The tiny country has made investments in tourism and hosting more major events a focus, Baker added, predicting Qatar will welcome more than five million visitors this year — more than twice the number in pre-pandemic 2019. Mechanical diggers are laying the ground for a six-month horticultural expo from October, which Qatar hopes will draw one million foreign visitors.

Concrete is also being poured at a new racetrack to host the second Qatar Formula One grand prix on Oct 8. Culture Minister Sheikh Abdulrahman bin Hamad bin Jassim bin Hamad Al-Thani said that when Qatar first launched its Years of Culture series with other countries a decade ago it was a struggle to find candidates. "Countries are now queuing to be part of the Years of Culture," he told an event for this year's partner, Indonesia.

New prime minister Sheikh Mohammed bin Abdulrahman bin Jassim Al-Thani took office in March and is expected to soon announce new economic initiatives, in part a response to growing competition from neighboring Saudi Arabia, which has embarked on many reforms. — AFP

US demands Beijing stop 'provocative and unsafe' acts in South China Sea

Marcos insists he will not let China trample on the Philippines' rights in the sea

WASHINGTON: The United States called on China Saturday to stop "provocative and unsafe conduct" in the disputed South China Sea after a recent near-collision with a Philippines coast guard boat there, ramping up rhetoric ahead of a visit by the Filipino president to the White House.

State Department spokesman Matthew Miller, in a statement two days before President Joe Biden is to host his Philippine counterpart Ferdinand Marcos Jr., said the incident was a reminder of China's "harassment and intimidation" of Philippine vessels in the contested waterway.

"We call upon Beijing to desist from its provocative and unsafe conduct," he said, adding that any attack on Philippine armed forces would trigger a US response. Biden has been working to bolster relations with Asian allies as the US-Chinese relationship remains in a historically deep chill, and the Philippines' proximity to key sea lanes and Taiwan gives it particular strategic importance.

The near-miss Sunday off the Spratly Islands was the latest in a long string of maritime incidents between China and the Philippines. Beijing claims sovereignty over almost the entire South China Sea, ignoring an international ruling that the assertion has no legal basis.

A near-miss

AFP was one of several media outlets that witnessed the incident after journalists were invited to join two Philippine Coast Guard boats on a six-day patrol of the waters, visiting a dozen islands and reefs. The Philippine vessels approached Second Thomas Shoal, known in China as Ren'ai Jiao, in the Spratly archipelago.

As one boat, the BRP Malapascua, which was car-

rying Filipino journalists, neared the shoal, a Chinese Coast Guard vessel more than twice its size sailed into its path. AFP journalists watched the incident from the other Philippine Coast Guard boat, which was less than a kilometer (0.6 miles) away.

The Malapascua's commanding officer said the Chinese ship came within 45 meters (50 yards) of his boat and only his quick actions avoided the steelhulled vessels crashing into each other. The Chinese foreign ministry said Friday that the Philippine boats had "intruded" without China's permission and called it a "premeditated and provocative action."

Manila pushes back

But Manila hit back, saying that "routine patrols in our own waters can be neither premeditated or provocative" and insisting they will continue to conduct the patrols. The near-miss came just a day after Marcos hosted Chinese Foreign Minister Qin Gang for talks in Manila aimed at defusing tensions in the waterway.

Marcos has insisted he will not let China trample on the Philippines' rights in the sea, and has gravitated toward the United States as he seeks to strengthen defense ties. Early this month, the Philippines identified four additional military bases—in addition to five existing sites—to which US forces will have access, including one near the Spratly Islands.

The two countries also carried out their biggest ever military maneuvers in recent weeks. This shift has alarmed China, which has accused Washington of trying to drive a wedge between Beijing and Manila.

'Ironclad commitment'

US-Philippine ties were badly frayed under

Marcos's predecessor, the authoritarian Rodrigo Duterte. Marcos has sought to allay public fears that the reviving alliance with the US could bring the Philippines into the conflict if China were to invade Taiwan.

He has said that with Biden he will discuss the

"need to tone down the rhetoric" over the South China Sea, Taiwan and North Korea. White House spokeswoman Karine Jean-Pierre said earlier in the month that Biden intended, in the meeting with Marcos, to "reaffirm the United States' ironclad commitment to the defense of the Philippines." — AFP

Polls open in Paraguay election, with Taiwan ties in the balance

ASUNCION: Voting stations opened Sunday across Paraguay as its citizens pick a president they hope will tackle endemic corruption, rising crime and economic inequality, with the election potentially impacting the country's future ties with Taiwan.

A center-left coalition is aiming to end the almost unbroken, seven-decade hegemony of the ruling conservative Colorado Party in the closest race in many years. Some 4.8 million of the South American country's 7.5 million inhabitants are eligible to vote in the election for the president and legislature that will be determined in a single round.

Lawyer Efrain Alegre, 60, of the Concertacion center-left coalition is leading narrowly in opinion polls amid a recent anti-incumbency trend in Latin American elections. His main challenger is Santiago Pena, a 44-year-old economist and former finance minister hoping to continue the rule of the Colorado Party that has governed almost continually since 1947 -- through a dictatorship and since the return

of democracy in 1989. Though they differ on economic and international policy, the two frontrunners are both socially conservative, defending strong anti-abortion and anti-gay marriage stances in an overwhelmingly Catholic nation. As polls opened, Alegre and Pena urged Paraguayans to vote, a call echoed by outgoing President Mario Abdo Benitez, who is consti-

tutionally limited to a single term. "The higher the turnout, the greater the legitimacy of democracy," Abdo said after being one of the first to cast a ballot in the capital Asuncion.

'Back to Jerusalem'

The outcome could have important consequences for Paraguay's international relations. It is among only 13 countries to recognize Taipei over Beijing. But Alegre has vowed to reconsider this if he wins, telling AFP: "Relations with Taiwan mean the loss of one of the largest markets, which is China."

He added: "Paraguay makes a very big effort, a very big sacrifice to have relations with Taiwan, but

we are not seeing from Taiwan the same effort." Latin America has been a key diplomatic battleground.

China considers self-ruled, democratic Taiwan part of its territory to be retaken one day, and does not allow other countries to recognize both Beijing and Taipei. Nicaragua shifted its allegiance to Beijing in 2021, as did El Salvador in 2018, Panama in 2017 and Costa Rica in 2007.

Pena has said he would retain ties with Taiwan but move Paraguay's embassy in Israel from Tel Aviv to Jerusalem. Paraguay had previously moved its embassy in 2018, but reversed its decision within months. "Yes, I would go back to Jerusalem," Pena told AFP before the vote. — AFP

TASHKENT: Voters across Central Asian Uzbekistan went to the polls Sunday in a constitutional referendum that could allow President Shavkat Mirziyoyev to remain in power until 2040. Mirziyoyev, 65, became president in 2016 after the death of dictator

He insists the overhaul of the constitution will improve governance and quality of life in the landlocked country of 35 million people, whose rights have long been heavily restricted. But it is Mirziyoyev who is expected to benefit most in the majority-Muslim country, observers say.

The constitutional changes would extend presidential terms from five to seven years, allowing him to serve two more terms and extend his time in power until 2040. The authoritarian reformer voted in the capital Tashkent with his family.

Thousands protest French government's immigration plans

PARIS: Thousands of people, including many undocumented migrants, marched in Paris and other French cities Saturday, protesting planned changes to immigration laws and evictions from the Indian Ocean island of Mayotte. In the French capital, demonstrators marched behind a banner proclaiming "No to the Darmanin law. Against repression, imprisonment and deportations, for a welcoming migration policy", a reference to Interior Minister Gerald Darmanin.

Organisers said that 2,300 people turned out for the protest in Paris. The immigration bill, which the

"Our authorities are copying Putin's system," he

said. "They (leaders) are not eternal, you have to respect your people." Following Karimov's death, Mirziyoyev spearheaded a series of reforms in Uzbekistan, including a clampdown on forced labour in the cotton fields. — AFP

"The way undocumented Comorans are treated is unworthy of a country like France," said Marie-Christine Vergiat, vice-president of the French Human Rights League and a former member of the European parliament. The Darmanin bill and the op-

eration in Mayotte are linked, Said Mhamadi, a Comoran civil leader, said in the southern port city of Marseille, where up to 300 people demonstrated.

The controversial bill, entitled "Controlling immigration while improving integration", is aimed, among other things, at providing greater scope for deportation, especially for foreigners who commit crimes. It would require a minimum level of French before a multi-year residence permit could be granted, would introduce mandatory fingerprinting, and tighten requirements for the renewal of long-term permits.

On Wednesday, the French government once again failed to reach consensus on the immigration bill, which is considered too divisive in an already abrasive social climate. The government is promising a balance between the expulsion of foreigners who threaten public order and better integration of undocumented migrants, in particular by regularising workers in sectors where manpower is needed. — AFP

News in Brief

Boat sinks at reef

MANILA: Rescuers were searching for four people Sunday after a boat carrying more than a dozen scuba divers sank at a World Heritage-listed marine sanctuary in the Philippines, authorities said. The Philippine Coast Guard said 28 people were rescued after "Dream Keeper" went down on Sunday morning in the pristine waters at Tubbataha Reef off the western province of Palawan. Four Chinese nationals were among those on board the dive boat. The owner of the vessel, a dive master and two guests were still missing, coast guard spokesman Rear Admiral Armando Balilo said. A coast guard vessel and about 10 dive boats were searching the waters. "It's full of diving enthusiasts now and it's on their bucket list. It's a dream dive," said Balilo, referring to Tubbataha. The 97,000-hectare (240,000acre) Tubbataha Reef is one of the country's largest marine protected areas and was listed as a World Heritage Site by the United Nations in 1993. — AFP

Two killed in strike

MOSCOW: Two people were killed when a Ukrainian missile hit a Russian village near the countries' border, the regional governor said Sunday. Missiles hit the village of Suzemka, to the east of the frontier between the two countries, according to Alexander Bogomaz, the governor of Bryansk oblast. "As a result of the strike inflicted by Ukrainian nationalists, unfortunately, two civilians were killed," he said in a message posted on Telelgram. "According to preliminary data, one residential building was completely destroyed, two more houses were partially destroyed." It comes after a week in which Russia renewed heavy missile attacks on Ukrainian cities, killing 23 people including a baby boy, and a massive fire broke out in Moscow-annexed Crimea after a suspected drone attack. Moscow-installed officials in eastern Ukraine also reported that Ukrainian shelling had killed nine people including an eight-year-old girl in the city of Donetsk. — AFP

Colombia volcano

BOGOTA: Authorities in Colombia on Saturday recommended that towns closest to a rumbling, notorious volcano be evacuated, ahead of a possible eruption. The Disaster Risk Management Office said it was moving to evacuate communities that are located within 15 kilometers (nine miles) from the main crater of three that make up the Nevado del Ruiz volcano in the Colombian Andes. Seismic activity has increased at the volcano, which killed 25,000 people in an eruption in 1985. That blast was the worst natural disaster in Colombian history and one of the deadliest volcanic eruptions of the 20th century. There has recently been a "significant increase in seismic activity," the ministry of mines said in a statement while Colombia's SGC geological service warned of a "probable eruption within days or weeks." The 5,300-meter (17,400foot) colossus in western Colombia is one of the many volcanoes along the Ring of Fire, a path around the Pacific basin characterized by active volcanoes and frequent earthquakes. On November 13, 1985, it erupted and emitted so much heat that it melted the snow that caps the mountain. — AFP

KUWAIT: Chairman of Kuwait Finance House (KFH) Hamad Abdulmohsen Al-Marzouq said that KFH has, by the grace of Allah, reported historic net profit of KD 162.1 million for the first quarter of 2023 for KFH shareholders; an increase of 133.2 percent compared to the same period last year, taking into consideration the benefits of the acquisition. GAZA CITY: Hikes in import and export tariffs imposed by the Islamist rulers of the Gaza Strip since last year have fuelled discontent among merchants in the impoverished, blockaded territory. In March, Gaza's Hamas rulers imposed new duties on the import of fruit and the export of fish.

Although the fruit levy was later reversed after traders went on strike, the seafood duty remains. Traders refusing to pay risk having their perishable goods stalled at crossing points from the enclave. The increases are the latest in a series of new levies on goods entering and exiting the coastal territory where 2.3 million Palestinians struggle to survive.

In July 2022, Hamas imposed tax increases on 24 other items including bottled water and certain clothes, forcing traders to remove some brands from the market when shoppers could not afford the newly-inflated prices. Wassim Al-Hilu, a food importer-exporter and member of Gaza's chamber of commerce, said Gazans are already saddled with taxes paid to Zionist entity — which collects a range of fees on behalf of the Palestinian Authority (PA).

A split between Hamas and the PA, which administers the Zionist entity-occupied West Bank, often leads to disputes over taxation and Hilu said the new fees are harming Gaza's "already ailing economy". The territory has been under a crippling Zionist entity-led blockade since Hamas — designated a "terrorist" entity by the United States, the European Union and Zionist entity — took power in 2007. The poverty rate has reached 53 percent, according to the Palestinian Central Bureau of Statistics, and unemployment has hit 45 percent, the International Monetary Fund said.

Critical imports of bottled water, which the territory's residents depend on due to shortages of potable water, have halved as a result. Osama Nofal, director of planning at Gaza's economy ministry, said the levies aim to encourage consumers to "support the local producer," referring to a desalination plant that makes drinking water. Since the introduction of the tariffs on imported bottled water, bulk prices for consumers have jumped from 1.67 shekels (\$0.36) per bottle to 2.17 shekels.

Baby formula is another product whose price has escalated since last year's tax increases. A pharmacist in Gaza City told AFP that for some types of formula prices went from one shekel per box to nine shekels. Gaza-based economist Mazen Al-Ajlah said the new fees are "illegal".

With Gazans already suffering from a dire economy, the administration should reduce taxes on imported raw materials and offer free electricity to factories, he said. The latest increases prompted a two-week strike by traders, forcing a reversal to the tariffs on fruit imports.

But authorities refused to budge on the seafood tax affecting an industry that employs around 4,500 people. The levy on fish is six shekels per kilogram (2.2 pounds) if it comes from Egypt and is then shipped on to the West Bank. For fish locally caught off Gaza the export tax is three shek-

But perishable goods are not the only ones affected. Garment traders decry a new 10 shekel tariff on some clothing items. Nahed Al-Souda, secretary

Furthermore, while well above the minimum regulatory requirements across all GCC countries, the average capital adequacy ratio dipped marginally (0.3 percent) to reach 18.6 percent.

Cautious optimism

No doubt, the cut is a legitimate defense of the oil producing countries as oil is the primary source of their hard currency. For Kuwait, a decline in oil prices is hard, as the country is heavily dependent on oil and oil revenues fund around 90 percent of Kuwait's public expenditure. It may be recalled that oil prices dropped by about 20 percent between the beginning of the last fiscal year and the current one. According to a report released by Al-Shall, Kuwait's oil production fell by about 9.4 percent during the same period while public expenditure increased for the current fiscal year by 11.7 percent.

According to official estimates, Kuwait's oil production rose to a five-year high of 2.82 million barrels per day in the third quarter of 2022, but the output fell to 2.68 million bpd in February 2023. This will further drop to 2.55 million bpd once Kuwait begins to implement the OPEC+ decision to deepen pre-existing cuts for the whole of 2023. The Kuwait Petroleum Corporation (KPC) had announced its intention to increase oil production capacity to 4.75 million barrels per day by 2040.

Saudi Arabia will effect a voluntary reduction of 500,000 bpd, Iraq 211,000 bpd, United Arab Emirates 144,000 bpd, Kuwait 128,000 bpd, Algeria 48,000 bpd, Oman 40,000 bpd, Kazakhstan 78,000 bpd, and Gabon 8,000 bpd. Russia has agreed to a voluntary adjustment of 500,000 bpd to last until end-2023.

There is no issue of supplies at the moment and global crude oil production averaged at 100 million bpd in 2022 and is expected to hit 101.5-102 million bpd in 2023, while oil supply stood at 101.5 million bpd in February 2023. Platts Analytics expects global oil demand to expand by 2.5 million bpd in 2023. The estimates assume an annual average Dated Brent price of \$90pb for 2023 countering arguments that the OPEC+ decision will trigger consumer inflation in several consumer countries.

World Bank: Lebanon tops world's food price inflation rate


BEIRUT: In its latest reports on food security around the world, the World Bank said that Lebanon recorded the highest nominal food price inflation rate in the world during the February 2022 – February 2023 period. The country registered 261 percent annual change in the food Consumer Price Index (CPI), followed by Zimbabwe (128 percent).

With regard to the real inflation rate, the report monitored an increase in the annual change in food prices in Lebanon by 71 percent during the comparison period, followed by Zimbabwe by 40 percent, Rwanda by 32 percent, and Egypt by 30 percent.

In a separate report on poverty, the World Bank warned that the economic situation in Lebanon was rapidly deteriorating, noting that the exchange rate

means that the national currency has lost 98 percent of its value since the economic crisis started in the last quarter of 2019. The World Bank also said the failure to address the financial sector losses, estimated at about \$72 billion, more than three times the gross domestic product, deepens the impact of the crisis. Recent field surveys have shown that the poverty

rate continues to rise, as three out of five families classify themselves as poor or very poor, especially among those who do not receive remittances from abroad. While unemployment levels have decreased, the majority of people are now working in low-quality jobs. In the updated forecasts, the World Bank estimated that the economy in Lebanon would contract by 0.5 percent at the end of this year, contrary to previous expectations of a decline in growth by 5.4 percent, as a result of a better-than-expected performance for some economic indicators, such as the tourism sector. According to the World Food Program (WFP), and with the continued rise in food prices, food insecurity is expected to affect about 1.46 million Lebanese people and about 800,000 refugees by the end of this month. — Agencies

While modest, EU officials said the figure indicated "resilience" against the challenging backdrop of the energy crisis. However, several data releases due on Tuesday — including a first estimate of eurozone inflation for April — may change calculations.

"Both a 25-basis point and a 50-basis point rate hike seem to be on the table," said ING economist Carsten Brzeski, adding there was a growing debate between "hawks" and "doves" about the impacts of tightening. But he added that given the divide within the ECB, a quarter point increase would be a "typical European compromise".

Still, if eurozone inflation comes in higher than expected, the "hawks" may yet win the argument for a larger hike. But easing inflation in Germany for April may be the harbinger for lower consumer prices too elsewhere in the eurozone. On Friday, the IMF's European department director Alfred Kammer urged European central banks to push on with tightening and "kill the beast" of inflation. In March, consumer prices in the eurozone rose by 6.9 percent on an annual basis — the lowest rate in a year, and much below the peak of 10.6 percent in October.

But ECB officials are concerned that core inflation, excluding volatile energy and food costs, is stubbornly high. The bank's three main rates currently sit in range between 3.00 and 3.75 percent, the highest levels since October 2008. A day ahead of the ECB's announcement, the US Federal Reserve is set to unveil its latest rate decision, with traders expecting another quarter point hike. Ahead of their last meeting in March, European policymakers faced calls to abandon a previously announced rate hike due to turmoil on markets. The collapse of three regional US lenders and the enforced takeover of Credit Suisse by rival UBS triggered the upheaval, and sparked fears of a broader financial crisis. — AFP

Inflation data backs US Fed hike

US consumer confidence drops, BoJ maintains ultra-low interest rates

KUWAIT: The US dollar index closed last week unchanged for the most part, ending at the 101.659 level after peaking at 102.172 in response to worrying inflation data. Meanwhile, the latest news coming out of Japan sent the yen crashing against the dollar, with the pair reaching the 136.56 mark, representing a 1.74 percent decline on Friday alone. In Australia, the AUD/USD pair dropped from its opening price of 0.6686 this week, down to 0.6607.

Inflation pressures persist

The Federal Reserve's preferred measure of core inflation rose in March, gaining 0.3 percent m/m and 4.6 percent y/y according to the Commerce Department report released on Friday. The headline figure eased, rising 4.2 percent y/y, down from an upwardly revised 5.1 percent in February. However, it's the persistent strength in underlying inflation pressures that may drive the Federal Reserve to raise interest rates again at their next meeting.

Another closely watched measure by the Fed - the Labor Department's measure of employment costs - increased 1.2 percent q/q in the first quarter of the year, exceeding forecasts. The data reinforces forecasts of the Fed raising its benchmark interest rate another 25 bps, and brings into question how much further the central bank will have to go. Evidently, although annual inflation has peaked, the path back to the central bank's 2 percent goal is proving bumpy.

Consumer confidence

With the Conference Board's index falling to 101.3 from 104.0 in March, US consumer confidence dropped to its lowest level since July 2022, reaching a figure much lower than the forecasted 104.1. The leading factor in this decline is the board's expectations index dropping to a measure of 68.1, which is the lowest in 9 months. Consumer inflation expecta-

tions over the next 12 months slipped to 6.2 percent, which is far off the peak 7.9 percent reached last year. In terms of business conditions, 18.1 percent of consumers labeled business conditions as "bad", compared to 19.3 percent from last month. When it comes to the labor market, 47.9 percent of consumers said that jobs were "plentiful" last month, compared to 48.4 percent this month.

Additionally, 11.4 percent of consumers thought that jobs were hard to get last month, while this month that percentage has dropped to 11.1 percent. Only 12.5 percent of respondents expected there to be more jobs available in the coming months, a near seven year low. The US new home sales number came in at 683K, beating the forecasted 633K increase. The median prices for homes also increased from \$438,200 to \$449,800. An increase in mortgage applications was witnessed, as the banking sector crisis eased mortgage rates.

Economy grows at slower pace

US first quarter GDP rose at a rate of 1.1 percent, significantly lower than the forecasted 2.0 percent growth. The unaccounted for warm January weather boosted consumer spending in January, as spending rose by an annualized 3.7 percent, down from the 2.6 percent rate in the last quarter of 2022. For the first time in one and a half years, there has been a decline in private inventory investments, amounting to a \$1.6 billion decline. This may be seen as a blessing in disguise for the economy as it faces a possible recession by the end of the year. This decline in private inventory investment cut GDP growth by 2.26 percent, the most in two years. Moreover, government spending was strong, rising 4.7 percent. Meanwhile, residential investment dropped for the eighth consecutive quarterly measure by 4.2 percent, while the non-residential fixed investment grew by 0.7 percent.

A dovish BoJ

The Bank of Japan expectedly kept ultra-low interest rates on Friday, as new governor Kazuo Ueda took a cautious stance in his first ever monetary policy meeting as governor in his bid to fight his predecessor's massive stimulus program. It has been decided that the BoJ will maintain the negative interest rate of -0.1 percent to short-term interest rates, while purchasing a significant amount of Japanese government bonds, allowing 10-year yields to retmain at 0 percent. Despite deciding on maintaining the ultra-loose policy, Ueda kept the door open for future changes, stating that the BOJ will spend a good one to one and a half years reviewing the monetary steps taken over the past 25 years during Japan's battle with deflation and low inflation, signaling that the BoJ might eventually end its ultra-loose policy.

The question moving forward is how soon the BoJ will decide to end its ever so famous ultra-loose policy, especially as the increase in wage growth is accompanied by slowing global growth. Analysts believe that the Fed's expected pause in interest rate hikes could not have come at a better time as that has

massively helped with the BoJ's 10-year yield having fallen below its 0.5 percent cap.

Australia's Inflation eases

For the first quarter of 2023, inflation in Australia eased from its previous reading of 1.9 percent to 1.4 percent. Annually, CPI declined to 6.3 percent from 6.8 percent previously. After two years of gradual increases, the annual inflation of goods dropped from 9.5 percent to 7.6 percent, aided by the discounted prices of clothes, appliances and furniture. Meanwhile, the higher prices for medical services, rents, travel and restaurants, has caused the annual inflation in services to rise by 6.1 percent, a figure not seen since 2001. Following the release of the CPI data, markets are still pricing in no rate hikes, as increasing evidence shows that inflation in Australia could have reached its peak. All eyes are on the interest rate decisions by the Reserve Bank of Australia next Tuesday.

'Smart mines' show coal embedded in China's future

SHENMU, **China:** One hundred meters underground inside a pit in northern China, miners extract lumps of coal with the flick of a finger on a smartphone, as the country tries to drag the traditionally dangerous and dirty work into the digital era.

The Hongliulin "intelligent mine" in coal-belt Shaanxi province is a flagship facility in a drive to modernize China's thousands of coal mines, even as the nation pledges to peak greenhouse gas emissions by 2030.

China is the world's biggest emitter of the pollutants driving climate change, and its promises to curb them are essential to keeping global temperature rises below two degrees Colsius

But mine digitalization — which aims to improve safety and productivity — shows the continued importance of coal in a country that last year produced nearly 60 percent of its electricity from the fossil fuel. Smart mines are common in other coal-producing nations like Canada, but China has lagged and now the government is aiming to achieve basic digitalization of all mines by 2035.

On a tour organized by telecoms giant Huawei — whose technology underpins the changes at Hongliulin — AFP journalists saw sensors, smart cameras and 5G relay boxes crisscrossing the facility. Inside a control room crammed with screens displaying numbers, graphs and images, technical manager Wang Lei said he could monitor the air, temperature and other data in real time.

Digitalization "has reduced the intensity of our work", 33-year-old electrician Ruan Banlin, who has worked in the mine for 10 years, told AFP.

Climate change

Huawei said the new methods had increased output per shift by almost a third. That's good news for China's energy grid — but not the planet. Greenpeace this week reported Beijing has approved a surge in coal power this year, green-lighting as much in the first three months as for the whole of 2021.

"We're seeing a decrease in the number of coal mines while the clustering of production increases along with total output," the NGO's Xie Wenwen told AFP.

Asked about smart mining, Xie said it should be scrutinized closely. "Obviously the safest thing we can do is leave the coal in the ground. That goes for climate as well as other risks," she said.

According to official figures, China had 4,400 coal mines at the end of 2022.

If it delivers on emissions pledges, those mines would be operating at minimum capacity and at a loss over coming decades, according to Greenpeace. But Huawei's involvement suggests China is betting on coal retaining its importance in fuel supply for years.

The company — whose net profit melted 69 percent year-on-year in 2022 — is diversifying after US sanctions over cybersecurity and espionage concerns hammered its business.

Xu Jun, head of mining digitalization for Huawei, said many competitors were setting up teams in the field. "The investment in smart mining solutions is not contradictory to Huawei's investment in clean energy," the firm told AFP. — AFP

China factory activity cools in April: PMI

BEIJING: China's manufacturing activity contracted in April, official figures showed Sunday, due to tapering global demand and slow domestic recovery after COVID-related curbs were lifted.

The official manufacturing purchasing managers' index (PMI) — a key gauge of Chinese factory output — fell unexpectedly to 49.2 in April from 51.9 in March, and below the 50-point mark that separates expansion and contraction in activity, data from the National Bureau of Statistics (NBS) showed. Analysts polled by Bloomberg News had expected April factory activity of 51.4.

The drop comes after February recorded the highest reading in more than a decade as factories returned to normal following a surge in COVID cases. China's economy grew 4.5 percent in the first three months of the year as the country reopened after dropping strict health controls that helped keep the coronavirus in check but battered businesses and supply chains. But the world's second-largest economy is also beset by a series of other crises, from a debt-laden property sector to flagging consumer confidence, global inflation, the threat of recession elsewhere and geopoliti-

cal tensions with the United States.

The official non-manufacturing PMI, which measures growth in the services and construction sectors, fell to 56.4 from 58.2 in March. The March reading was the highest since May 2011, as the country saw a surge in demand for travel, entertainment and other leisure services unavailable for nearly three years during the pandemic. The government has set a comparatively modest growth target of around five percent this year, a goal Premier Li Qiang has warned could be hard to achieve.

The Communist Party's top policy-making body said in a statement Friday that the economy still faced headwinds from weak demand at home and the slow pace of reforms.

"China's economy is mainly in the process of recovering, with (internal) driving forces still weak and demand insufficient," the Politburo said, according to a report by state-run Xinhua News Agency.

"Economic transition and upgrading face new headwinds, and hardships... are still to be overcome to promote high-quality development."

Travel rush

Beijing has promised further state support for the private sector, which is still reeling from a regulatory crackdown on the property, technology and private education industries. Policymakers are also looking for ways to push up domestic demand, as China's export and manufacturing sectors struggle amid tepid global demand. One bright spot in recent months has been households

spending piled-up savings on travel.

Bookings for air and train tickets and hotel reservations for the five-day Labor Day holiday starting Saturday all surpassed the levels recorded in the same period in 2019, before the pandemic hit, according to online Chinese travel agency Fliggy.

"China's service sector continues to grow strongly while the manufacturing sector shows signs of weakening," Zhang Zhiwei, chief economist at Pinpoint Asset Management, said.

"These mixed signals will likely keep the pressure on the government to continue its supportive fiscal and monetary policies in the second quarter," he said. — AFP

US Fed likely to hike again despite signs of slowing economy

WASHINGTON: The US Federal Reserve is widely expected to raise its benchmark lending rate for a tenth — and possibly final — time on Wednesday, as it continues its fight against high inflation.

The US central bank is likely to take this decision despite growing signs that the American economy is slowing down, with many economists predicting the US will enter a mild recession later this year. Analysts and traders expect the Fed to hike interest rates by 25 basis points and then hold them high in a bid to bring inflation back towards its long-term target of two percent without spurring a deeper, more painful recession.

"We expect the Fed to hike by 25bp next week and

signal a pause in June, with a weak upward bias for rates going forward," Bank of America economists wrote in a note to clients on Friday. A further rate hike Wednesday would mark the Fed's tenth rate hike in a row, bringing the benchmark to between 5 and 5.25 percent — its highest level since 2007. More than 80 percent of futures traders also expect the Fed to raise interest rates by another 25 basis points, according to data from CME Group.

Banking turbulence

The meeting of the rate-setting Federal Open Markets Committee (FOMC) on May 2 and 3 will be held under very different circumstances than its previous one in March, which took place amid a short, sharp, banking crisis unleashed by the rapid collapse of Silicon Valley Bank (SVB) a few days earlier. SVB's swift demise after it took on excessive interest-rate risk raised concerns of banking contagion, which were amplified by the collapse of New York-based Signature Bank a few days later. Against the backdrop of ongoing turbulence in the banking sector, the Fed held off a larger rate hike on March 22, instead opt-

ing for a quarter-point rise. Concerted efforts by US and European regulators in the aftermath of SVB's collapse helped calm financial markets and appear to have prevented further high-profile casualties in the banking sector.

"With stress in credit markets easing, Fed officials look set to push ahead with a 25bp rate hike at the early-May meeting," Oxford Economics' lead US economist Michael Pearce wrote in a recent note to clients. But despite calmer financial markets, SVB's collapse has nevertheless had a lasting impact on the banking sector, with banks tightening lending conditions in the weeks since.

Fed officials have noted that the tighter lending conditions could act like an additional rate hike, possibly reducing the number of hikes necessary to bring inflation back down to two percent. Fed governor Christopher Waller said in mid-April that "a significant tightening of credit conditions could obviate the need for some additional monetary policy tightening." But he cautioned against "making such a judgment" before good data on the effect of the financial turmoil and bank lending was published. — AFP

Value of world's sovereign funds touches \$11.6 trillion, says SWFI

KUWAIT: The latest report of the Sovereign Wealth Fund Institute (SWFI), published on April 12, 2023, stated that the value of all sovereign funds in the world scored about \$11.6 trillion. The share of the 10 largest funds within it scored about \$8.2 trillion, with about 71 percent of the total for China, including two funds, with about \$1.35 trillion for the first and with about \$1 trillion for the second. They ranked the second and the third largest funds; however, they are owned by the Chinese state with a total amount of \$2.35 trillion. In addition, China also owns the Hong Kong fund of China, which ranks eighth, with a value of about \$514 billion.

The grand total of the three funds is about \$2.87 trillion. The largest Norwegian Government Pension Fund comes next in size. Its grand total alone makes it the second after the merger of Chinese funds with a value of about \$1.37 trillion. As we have repeatedly mentioned, it does not invest in Norway so as not to cause inflation in the prices of local assets, and neither does it finance the public budget except by a small percentage, and in cases of extreme necessity.

It is a fund for generations. Its information can be monitored every second, away protected from the mess of politicians. Singapore comes next with two funds: the first alone is in sixth place with a value of about \$690 billion, and the second is in seventh place with a value of about \$497 billion the two funds together provide Singapore, which has the third largest sovereign savings, with about \$1.187 trillion. Norway and Singapore have very developed and sustainable economies. They finance their public finances from taxes on economic activity.


The sovereign funds of the GCC countries come next in value. The Abu Dhabi Investment Authority is the largest among them with about \$853 billion, then Kuwait with a value of about \$750 billion. Saudi Arabia comes next with a value of \$650 billion which intends to increase its value to \$2 trillion by 2030, and finally Qatar with a value of about \$475 billion.

All the countries that own these sovereign funds have economies that have either reached a stage of maturity and achieved sustainability and achieved with it sustainability of their public finances by financing them either from taxes on economic activity or are actively seeking to achieve this approach. All of them seek to develop the size of their funds, except for Kuwait, which has proposals to distribute the revenues of its fund. In fact, Kuwait, with the critical situation of its economy and public finances, no longer has the option to ensure the sustainability

of its public finance but to preserve and develop the asset of its sovereign fund and change its function by allocating part of its revenues to be a source of financing to extinguish the inevitable fire of its public finance with the first related drop in oil prices, and to work later on the sustainability of its economy.

We know that the new Cabinet formation is a copy of previous formations, but we believe that the economic team within it is aware of the impossibility of sustaining the economy and public finances. Therefore, perhaps it will change the function and goals of the sovereign fund and protect it from tampering as one of its first priorities. We will provide an example of other priorities proposed for the economic team in a paragraph in our current report.

Singapore 'should avoid economic contraction': PM

SINGAPORE: Singapore is expected to post slower economic growth this year but it "should avoid an outright contraction", Prime Minister Lee Hsien Loong said Sunday. The Southeast Asian city-state's economic performance is often seen as a barometer of the global environment because of its reliance on trade with the rest of the world.

The financial centre also has one of the busiest ports in the world which serves as a key link between Asia and the rest of the world. In his annual May Day message, Lee said there is hope inflation will let up in the second half of the year and that retrenchment numbers "remain manageable".

"But our external environment remains volatile, fraught with serious geopolitical tensions," Lee warned, pointing to the risk of recession in the West, where interest rates continue to be hiked to tame inflation. "The multilateral trading system is being progressively undermined by growing nationalist and protectionist sentiments, affecting international trade and cooperation."

Singapore's economy expanded 3.6 percent in 2022, slowing from the 8.9 percent growth in 2021.


The Monetary Authority of Singapore has said the financial hub's GDP is expected to grow between 0.5 percent and 2.5 percent this year. The city-state will have to adapt to the economic disruption of emerging industries and technologies, Lee added. "Singapore's survival depends on us staying open and doing business with the world," he said. "This means continually transforming our industries, enhancing existing capabilities and building new ones as we move into growth markets." — AFP

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

n a rehearsal studio in central England, dancers are getting to grips with new, heavy metal-inspired ballet steps. Moving gracefully in unison, the team pirouettes with air guitar, leaps with head banging.

Welcome to "Black Sabbath — The Ballet", the

brainchild of Cuban dance superstar Carlos Acosta,

Black Sabbath guitarist Tony Iommi

artistic director of the Birmingham Royal Ballet.

Determined to celebrate the cultural treasures of the UK's second city since his arrival in 2020, Acosta took his idea to Black Sabbath co-founder and guitarist Tony lommi, who gave it his blessing along with the group's original vocalist Ozzy Osbourne.

"I was fascinated with the idea. I thought 'How are they going to do that'," Iommi, 75, told AFP Thursday in Birmingham.

"I just couldn't imagine how they'd do ballet to Black Sabbath and then I thought well maybe they're going to use the... softer tracks, but no they went for 'Black Sabbath', 'War Pigs', 'Iron Man'," he said.

"I think I was just really intrigued."
The full-length, three-act ballet opens in Bir-

mingham, the pioneering group's home city, in September before going on tour. Rehearsals have just begun.

Bat incident

According to writer Richard Thomas, the ballet

is the "rags-to-riches story" of four young men who went from the "factory floor to one of the most successful bands in rock history", although he stressed it would not be a documentary set to music and dance. The legendary group's original line-up was Osbourne, lommi, bassist Geezer Butler and drummer Bill Ward.

They were instrumental in creating heavy metal in the early 1970s with dark and high-volume guitars coupled with a keen interest in the occult.

"It's very simple. It's like Black Sabbath meets the Birmingham Royal Ballet," Thomas said.

There would, however, be use of archive interviews and also some famous Black Sabbath stories such as how lommi lost the tips of two fingers in an industrial accident on his last day working at a sheet metal factory.

Also making an appearance will be the tale of the "Stonehenge" set that had to be dumped after a measurements mix-up meant it was so big it wouldn't fit into auditoriums.

And he said there might "possibly be a brief mention of the bat incident", in which Osbourne thought a fan had thrown a rubber bat onstage only to discover — after he took a bite — that it was real. For Acosta, 39, there had been an immediate rapport with lommi after he first approached him with the project. "I didn't know the man (or) how we were going to hit it off, but

obviously we both come from the same background in terms of working-class and poor families... and the chemistry was instant," he said. The former star dancer said he came to the music of Black Sabbath late due to growing up in Cuba.

'Stratospheric'

"I grew up in the 1980s, I wanted to be Michael Jackson. I didn't know anything about Black Sabbath," he said, adding that he only discovered the group through a friend in the late 1990s.

"This was the music of those who are marginalized so I found it very interesting." Musically, composer Chris Austin said it had been difficult to know where to start as the Black Sabbath back catalogue was so huge.

But he said once they narrowed it down it had been easy to be inspired by the music's "glorious irregularity" and "enormous shifts of tempo", combined with Osbourne's early "stratospheric" vocals. The show will be a treat for fans after the group, including three of the original members, ended their last-ever tour with a final concert in Birmingham in 2017. Iommi said he was as interested as everyone else to discover how the ballet would turn out, but that he had been confident in Acosta and his team from the start.

"I know from our fans that there is a lot of excitement to come to the show," he said, adding that he expected people would be particularly keen to join in. "I think it will be great." — AFP

Bond actress Eva Green wins UK court case over film fee At one point, she blamed her "Frenchness" for calling a film director "weak and stupid". Green said in a statement on Friday that her "professional repu-

ames Bond star Eva Green on Friday won a court case in the UK over her \$1 million (£810,000) acting fee for the never-made science fiction film "A Patriot".

The French actress had sued UK-based production company White Lantern Film at the High Court in London for the fee but the firm countersued, saying she derailed the £4-million project by making "unreasonable demands". Judge Michael Green ruled the 42-year-old actress was entitled to the sum and dismissed the counter-claim.

"In particular, I find that Ms Green did not renounce her obligations under the artist agreement; nor did she commit any repudiatory breaches of it," the judge said.

Green, famous for her role as Vesper Lynd in 2006 Bond film "Casino Royale", was due to play a soldier. She signed up to the project in 2018, but became increasingly uneasy as funding issues meant that UK producer Jake Seal began to assume more control. The star attended a trial in January, where messages between her and production staff were

US teen saves the day as school bus driver faints

13-year-old American boy became a hero by managing to safely stop a school bus carrying dozens of kids when the driver lost consciousness.

The drama unfolded Wednesday in the northern state of Michigan, when a teenager named Dillon Reeves got up and grabbed the steering when he saw the driver had fainted, and brought the vehicle to a halt in the middle of the road using the hand brake, school district superintendent Robert Livernois said.

The bus was carrying nearly 70 students from Lois E. Carter Middle School in the town of Warren when the driver lost consciousness, as seen in a video released by the authorities.

Children are heard screaming as Reeves takes control of the bus and yells out for someone to call the 911 emergency rescue service



number. "The City of Warren is very proud of our 7th Grade Hero Dillon Reeves," Warren city councilor Jonathan Lafferty wrote on Facebook. "This young man jumped into action when his school bus driver experienced a medical emergency, bringing the bus to a stop and avoiding what could have been a very tragic accident," he wrote. — AFP

Cleopatra was light-skinned, Egypt tells Netflix



gypt's antiquities ministry insisted on Thursday that Cleopatra had "white skin and Hellenistic characteristics" in an ongoing row over a Netflix drama-documentary depicting the famed beauty of antiquity as black.

'Queen Cleopatra", produced by Jada Pinkett Smith and starring Adele James, is due for release on the streaming platform on May 10.

"As Egypt's last pharaoh, Cleopatra fights to protect her throne, family and legacy in this docudrama featuring reenactments and expert interviews," the Netflix site says in promoting its upcoming production. But even before its release, "Queen Cleopatra" has already caused a storm of controversy in the North African nation.

An online petition accusing the production of rewriting history has already garnered more than 40,000 signatures.

And in a country where calls for Netflix to be banned for content deemed offensive to Egypt or "its family values", MP Saboura al-Sayyed has again urged parliament to ban the platform.

On Thursday, the antiquities ministry weighed into the dispute, publishing a lengthy statement that included statements from experts it said all agree: Cleopatra had "white skin and Hellenistic characteristics".

"Bas reliefs and statues of Queen Cleopatra are the best proof," the statement said, embellishing its text with illustrations showing Cleopatra with European traits.

For Mostafa Waziri, head of the Supreme Antiquities Council, depicting the famous queen as black is nothing less than "a falsification of Egyptian history"

He insists there is nothing racist in this view, which is motivated by "defending the history of Queen Cleopatra, an important

part of the history of Egypt in antiquity". Commentators in Egypt often decry campaigns among mostly African-American groups claiming the origins of Egyptian civilization.

Cleopatra belonged to the Macedonian Lagides dynasty descended from Ptolemy, one of Alexander the Great's generals, who founded the Ptolemaic dynasty on the banks of the Nile.

While legend hails the queen born in around 69 BC as a great beauty, her appearance and the color of her skin are largely open to interpretation. A BBC documentary in 2009 claimed that Cleopatra had African blood, an assertion that passed without incident. - AFP

Obama to spotlight **US** workers in Netflix documentary

arack Obama will be back in the public view next month in a Netflix-produced documentary series in which the former US president explores the role of work in American lives.

"I'm excited to share the trailer for 'Working," Obama tweeted.

"In this series, I talk to American workers across various industries - from hospitality and technology to home care - to understand their jobs and hopes for the future," he added.

In the series entitled "Working: What We Do All Day," Obama takes on hot topics such as the appeal of certain jobs, repercussions of the development of artificial intelligence and even the

quest for finding meaning at work.

The trailer for the documentary was released

His approach was inspired by the book "Working" by Studs Terkel (1912-2008), an influential figure of the American left.

Obama, who left office in 2017, employs his famous speaking voice to narrate the series, which will "explore ways to find meaning at work, and to create a bond through the experiences and the difficulties," the US streaming giant said on its site.

The series was produced by Concordia Studio and Higher Ground, a production company founded by Obama and Michelle Obama, in 2018, which bought distribution rights to the Oscar-winning 2019 documentary "American Factory," which also looked at the culture of work within the United States.

The documentary series will be broadcast from May 17 on Netflix. — AFP

"I'm really thrilled to have a wide theatrical release before it becomes available at home," said Scorsese, joking that small-screen viewing is only "ok" by comparison.

Apple bought the film from Hollywood studio Paramount after the cost of the lavish, nearly three-and-a-halfhour production began to spiral to a reported \$200 million, and the two companies struck a deal to distribute the film to theaters.

DiCaprio said Scorsese's work "will be revered for centuries and generations to come," and that the 80-year-old director continues to "create vital cinematic experiences that are at the very pinnacle of artistic ambition and achievement.'

Scorsese used the occasion to call on owners of multiplexes to play "truly independent films" along-

side more mainstream fare. Earlier Thursday, Paramount presented footage

Sacred Scottish stone taken to **London for** coronation

he Stone of Destiny, a sacred slab of sandstone that became a symbol of Scottish nationhood, has left Edinburgh Castle for London, where it will play a key role in King Charles III's coronation.

It has not been taken out of Scotland since 1996 when it was officially returned following a 700-year absence.

The 152-kilogram (335-pound) stone, seized from the Scots by the king of England Edward I in 1296, is being taken to Westminster Abbey in London for the May 6 ceremony.

Officials at Edinburgh Castle, where it is kept with the Scottish crown jewels, held a special ceremony to bid temporary farewell to the legendary stone that left for London late Thursday.

The Stone of Scone, as it is also known, was transported south from Edinburgh under tight security and will be placed beneath the Coronation Chair at the abbey for Charles's enthronement.



Legend has it that the stone was brought from the Holy Land through Egypt, Sicily and Spain to Ireland before being placed in a monastery in Scone in Scotland in the 9th century.

It was then used for centuries in the inauguration of Scottish kings.

But David Breeze, a professor of history and archaeology from the University of Edinburgh, said it is highly likely that the stone originates from the ancient Pictish kingdom of Scotland.



"The origin of the stone has long been shrouded in myth," he told Times Radio.

"The connection with the Middle East is strong and in the Middle Ages the idea that the stone had been Jacob's pillow was used to justify territorial aggrandise-

Edward ordered the stone to be built into the Coronation Chair in London in 1296. "Edward was making a statement

about the status of Scotland," said Ewen Cameron, a professor of Scottish history at the University of Edinburgh.

"One chronicler stated that its removal to London was 'in recognition of a kingdom surrendered and conquered'.'

The stone remained in Westminster Abbey for most of the next 650 years, until Christmas Eve 1950 when a group of Scottish students took part in an auda-

cious raid to retrieve it. A manhunt was launched, with check-

points set up at the Scottish border, but the students succeeded in smuggling the stone into Scotland. The students later recounted that they had to secretly employ a stonemason to repair the 335-pound stone after they dropped it and broke it into two as they carried it to their car. The stone was later found on the site of the High Altar at Arbroath Abbey where, in 1320, Scottish nationhood was declared under the leadership Robert the Bruce. — AFP

Al Dawsari scores, sees red

DUBAI: Salem Al Dawsari went from hero to villain as he scored an opener for Al Hilal but then saw red in the final minutes for kicking Ken Iwao, as the reigning champions drew 1-1 with Urawa Red Diamonds in the AFC Champions League final first leg in Riyadh on Saturday. Al Dawsari's opening-half strike was cancelled by a 53rd-minute equalizer from Shinzo Koroki in what was an eventful affair at King Fahd International stadium. No stranger to delivering on big occasions, Al Dawsari had scored for Al Hilal in the semi-finals and final of the AFC Champions League last season, netted the winner for Saudi Arabia against Argentina at the 2022 World Cup last winter, and converted two penalties in the FIFA Club World Cup semi-finals against Flamengo in February to send his side into the final for the very first time. — AFP

Glasgow see off Scarlets

LONDON: Glasgow reached their first European final with a 35-17 Challenge Cup success away to Scarlets in Llanelli on Saturday. The Scottish club will now face either French side Toulon or Italy's Benetton in the final of the second-tier tournament at Dublin's Aviva Stadium on May 19. Glasgow centre Stafford McDowall scored two tries, with scrum-half George Horne, flanker Rory Darge and replacement hooker Johnny Matthews also crossing Scarlets' line. Horne also kicked five conversions for a 15-point haul as Glasgow came from behind to win after going down 17-14 early in the second half. Steff Evans scored Scarlets lone try, with fly-half Sam Costelow landing four penalties. — AFP

Wigan sink, relegated

LONDON: Wigan were relegated from the Championship after a 1-1 draw at Reading on Saturday, while the race to reach the second tier play-offs is set to go down to the wire. Wigan defender Charlie Hughes headed home from close-range nine minutes from full-time to give the bottom of the table Latics hope of staying up. But third bottom Reading equalized in stoppage-time through Yakou Meite to confirm Wigan's relegation. Wigan, FA Cup winners in 2013, had been making a late bid to avoid relegation after beating Stoke and Millwall in their previous games. But they slipped into League One after failing to secure another victory at the SCL Stadium. Reading, without a win in 12 games, are level on points with fourth bottom Huddersfield, who have three games to play compared to only one for the Royals. — AFP

Binder win MotoGP sprint

JEREZ DE LA FRONTERA: South African Brad Binder won the sprint at the Spanish Grand Prix on Saturday edging reigning world champion Francesco Bagnaia. KTM's Binder finished 0.48sec ahead of Bagnaia on a Ducati as the Italian cut compatriot Marco Bezzecchi's lead in this year's standings after the Mooney-Ducati rider collected just one point for eighth. After dominating practice and qualifying for two days Spaniard Aleix Espargaro crashed his Aprilia on the sixth lap. Binder and Bagnaia had finished outside the top 10 in practice and been forced to ride in the opening qualifying earlier in the day where they grabbed the last two spots in the shootout for the first four rows on the grid. — AFP

Knight seizes lead at LPGA

LOS ANGELES: Cheyenne Knight curled in a 15-foot eagle putt on the way to a four-under par 67, grabbing a two-stroke lead after Saturday's third round of the LPGA's LA Championship. The 26-year-old American fired one of only two bogey-free third rounds at Wilshire Country Club to stand on nine-under 204 after 54 holes. Australian Hannah Green birdied five of the last six holes to shoot 69 and grab a share of second on 206 with South Korea's Ryu Hae-ran, who carded a 67. Scotland's Gemma Dryburgh was fourth on 207 after a 66, one stroke ahead of China's Lin Xiyu and India's Aditi Ashok, the 36-hole leader. Knight opened with eight pars before closing the front nine with a birdie, then grabbed the lead with her sensational eagle at the par-5 13th and sank a 10-foot birdie putt at the 17th to stretch her lead. — AFP

Rahm charges into contention

MEXICO CITY: Top-ranked Masters champion Jon Rahm charged into contention with a spectacular 10-under par 61 on Saturday to lie two strokes behind leader Tony Finau at the US PGA Tour Mexico Open. Spain's Rahm, the defending champion, matched his career-best PGA round score, barely putting a foot wrong in a round that featured 10 birdies without a bogey for a course record at Vidanta Vallarta. "Today, everything just seemed perfect," Rahm said. "Made a lot of great swings and the ones that weren't great, still gave myself a good result." — AFP

RAWALPINDI: Fakhar Zaman smashed a third consecutive century to guide Pakistan to a seven-wicket victory over New Zealand in the second one-day international on Saturday. The 33-year-old left-handed opener hit an undefeated 180 off 144 balls for his tenth ODI hundred. It followed his 117 in the first match and 101 against the same opponents in January as Pakistan chased a stiff 337-run target in 48.2 overs.

The win gives Pakistan a 2-0 lead in the five-match series with the last three matches in Karachi on May 3, 5 and 7. Along with Zaman, skipper Babar Azam hit a brisk 66-ball 65 and Mohammad Rizwan a 41-ball 54 not out as Pakistan achieved their second highest successful ODI chase behind 349 against Australia in Lahore last year. New Zealand were guided to 336-5 by a second successive hundred for Daryl Mitchell, who made 129, Tom Latham's 98 and 51 by Chad Bowes.

Zaman is the 12th batsman to score three or more hundreds in consecutive ODIs with Sri Lankan Kumar Sangakkara the only man to hit four on the trot. Azam has achieved the feat twice. When on 98, Zaman joined West Indian Shai Hope as the second fastest to 3.000 ODİ runs in 67 innings. South African Hashim Amla is the fastest to the milestone in 57.

Once Imam-ul-Haq fell for 24 with

the team's total at 66, Zaman and Azam added 135 for the second wicket and even the fall of Azam and Abdullah Shafique (seven) did not derail Pakistan's chase. Azam hit five boundaries and a six in his 25th ODI fifty. "It was my lucky day to score again against New Zealand as I got chances," said Zaman. "I try to take my time at the start and then with five players in the circle it becomes easier to score." Visiting skipper Latham described Zaman as "outstanding". "We were very happy at the halfway mark," said Latham. "Fakhar played an outstanding knock. They were able to build partnerships and that was a big tick in the batting department."

Mitchell in the runs

Zaman, who smoked six sixes and 17 fours, completed the chase with Rizwan in an unbroken fourth wicket stand of 119. New Zealand rued dropping Zaman on 55 when Mark Chapman grassed a catch off James Neesham. Earlier, Mitchell improved on his 113 in the first ODI on Thursday with a 119-ball knock after New Zealand were sent in to bat.

Mitchell smashed three sixes and eight boundaries and consolidated the innings through a third-wicket stand of 183 with skipper Latham, as the pair took full advantage of a flat pitch. Mitchell was finally caught brilliantly by

South Africa's Heinrich Klaasen hit an unbeaten 53 to steer Hyderabad to 197-6, a total their bowlers defended by restricting Delhi to 188-6 at the Feroz Shah Kotla ground.

BARCELONA: Barcelona thrashed 10-man Real Betis 4-0 on Saturday to move a step closer to winning La Liga for the first time since 2019. Real Madrid beat Almeria 4-2 to cut the gap to eight points earlier on but Barcelona triumphed to restore their 11 point advantage. Andreas Christensen, Robert Lewandowski and Raphinha struck for Barca at Camp Nou with Guido Rodriguez netting a late own goal to round off the rout. Edgar Gonzalez's early dismissal made it an easy night for Xavi Hernandez's side to protect their lead with six games remaining.

With his side comfortably winning, Xavi brought on 15-year-old forward Lamine Yamal to become the club's youngest ever player to debut in La Liga. Betis also brought on veteran Joaquin Sanchez, 41, for his final appearance at Camp Nou before he retires at the end of the season, and he was afforded a standing ovation by Barcelona supporters. The Catalans bounced back from a 2-1 defeat by Rayo Vallecano in midweek. "We generated a reaction," said Xavi. "We improved a lot, it was a very good reaction from the whole team. "We went 1-0 up and after the red card, it was in our favor." Xavi brought Christensen into the starting line-up after injury and he made a quick impact on his return. The win took Freiburg to fourth, behind Union on goal difference, two clear of RB Leipzig who also won 1-0 on Saturday. Leipzig beat Hoffenheim thanks to Christopher Nkunku's first league goal since November.

But within three minutes, Portland regained the lead as substitute Yimmi Chara fired home a low, diagonal shot after good work from Santiago Moreno. The Seattle Sounders take over at the top of the West, despite only managing a goalless draw at Real Salt Lake, in a game which saw Pablo Ruiz sent off in stoppage time for the home side after a second yellow card. —AFP

Saelemaekers snatches draw for AC Milan

ROME: Alexis Saelemaekers snatched an incredible 1-1 draw for AC Milan at Roma on Sunday with a stoppage-time leveler moments after Tammy Abraham thought he had won the game for the hosts. Belgium midfielder Saelemaekers poked home in the seventh minute of added time to silence the Stadio Olimpico and make sure that Milan would stay in the Champions League positions. Milan are fourth, ahead of Roma on goal difference thanks to Saelemaekers' strike which cancelled out a fabulous low finish from Abraham in the 94th minute.

Both teams are three points ahead of Inter Milan, who will however take fourth spot if they beat Lazio in Sunday's early kick-off. Should Inter win at the San Siro it would also give Napoli the chance to seal their first Italian title in over three decades, as Lazio trail the champions-elect by 17 points with seven matches remaining. Napoli would need to beat Salernitana on Sunday afternoon to win their third Scudetto after those conquered by talisman Diego Maradona in 1987 and 1990. The two goals were each side's only shot on target in what was otherwise an uninspiring encounter in the Italian capital which came alive in the final seconds.

Roma thought they had won the match despite an injury crisis which meant defenders Chris Smalling, Diego Llorente, Rick Karsdorp were all out and midfielder Georginio Wijnaldum was also sidelined, while star man Paulo Dybala was only fit for the bench. Jose Mourinho's team then lost Albania defender Marash Kumbulla after just 15 minutes and just before the start of the second half had to bring on Stephan El Shaarawy for Andrea Belotti,

who hurt his ribs in a clash with Fikayo Tomori.

Mourinho said he was proud of the performance but sad to lose two precious points. "We are not a rich team, we don't have a big squad, every time we lose a player it is a big problem," said Mourinho. "I am sad, obviously, as we had three points in our hands, but I am more proud than I am sad." Roma will also have to do without Nemanja Matic at Monza midweek after the Serbian's late tackle on Ismael Bennacer earned him a booking midway through the first half.

None of that mattered however when Abraham, whose other major contribution was to stop his own teammate Lorenzo Pellegrini from shooting into an open goal in the first half, sent the home fans wild with a great spin and finish. However with the match looking all over poor defender from Gianluca Mancini allowed Rafael Leao to float a perfect cross over to Saelemaekers, who saved his team at the last. Atalanta can take advantage of the stalemate at Torino in Saturday's late match, as they sit seventh and five points behind both Roma and Milan.—AFP

Man City return to top

Before kick-off at Old Trafford a group of United fans demanded the Glazer family complete a full sale of the club amid continuing uncertainty over the future ownership of the Red Devils. Qatari banker Sheikh Jassim bin Hamad Al Thani and British billionaire Jim Ratcliffe both made their third and final offers to buy the English giants on Friday. The US-based Glazers have long been unpopular with large sections of United support since their leveraged takeover in 2005 and some fans are concerned that if Ratcliffe's bid for majority control succeeds they could remain involved in some capacity.

A protest march from central Manchester continued on to Old Trafford as fans displayed a giant banner reading 'Full \$ale Only'. Bruno Fernandes scored the only goal of the game in the 39th minute when he followed up at the far post after Emiliano Martinez had pushed away a low Marcus Rashford shot. Newcastle dominated the opening 40 minutes at St James' Park only to surprisingly fall behind when Stuart Armstrong scored on the counter-attack.

The Magpies though equalized in the 54th minute when substitute Callum Wilson capped a period of sustained pressure by turning in Alexander Isak's low cross. And they then hit Southampton with two quickfire goals in as many minutes, Saints' Theo Walcott diverting a cross into his own net before Wilson rounded the goalkeeper for his second of the match.

Defeat left the Saints anchored to the foot of the table and six points adrift of safety. Colombia midfielder Jefferson Lerma rocked struggling Leeds with two goals in four first-half minutes as Bournemouth moved 10 points clear of the relegation zone. Lerma fired the Cherries ahead with a well-struck shot in the 20th minute and doubled the south coast side's lead soon afterwards when he scored at the back post after Leeds goalkeeper Illan Meslier flapped at Ryan Christie's cross.

Leeds equalized in the 32nd minute when Patrick Bamford headed in Wilfried Gnonto's superb whipped cross. But Dominic Solanke restored the hosts two-goal advantage. Poor defending allowed the unmarked Dango Ouattara to charge into space before his low ball was turned in by Solanke in the 63rd minute. The goal stood after a VAR check for offside before Antoine Semenvo struck in stoppage time. Liverpool and Tottenham continue their quest to break into the top four when they meet in Sunday's 1530 GMT kick-off at Anfield. — AFP

'King of the streets' Napoli Serie A title Perez lifts Red Bull

BAKU: Sergio Perez won Sunday's Azerbaijan Grand Prix with teammate Max Verstappen in second to ram home Red Bull's supremacy over the rest of the Formula One grid. Ferrari's pole-sitter Charles Leclerc completed the podium, a respectable third. "Vamos!" exclaimed the Mexican on the team radio after making it a hugely profitable weekend in Baku where he also claimed Sat-

Red Bull boss Christian Horner acknowledged Perez's "sensational weekend". He added: "He's always been outstanding on this track, I don't know what it is about Azerbaijan, but he absolutely excels here." Red Bull's roll through 2023 after four races now reads four wins plus Saturday's sprint, three poles, and three 1-2s. Verstappen leads the drivers' championship by just six points ahead of the fifth round of the record 23-race season in Miami. Perez' engineer told him on the team radio he was the "king of the streets" and with justification as five of his six F1 wins - not counting Saturday's sprint - have come on street circuits, twice in Baku alongside victories in Saudi Arabia, Monaco and Singapore.

The popular Perez, who believes he can really challenge Verstappen for the title, said: "It really worked out today for us (me), we managed to keep the pressure on Max. I think it was very close between us, we pushed to the maximum, we both hit the wall a few times but we (I) managed to keep him under control." Leclerc conceded that for the time being at any rate Red Bull were in "another league once it comes to the race". "Over 51 laps it was not possible, they have so much more pace than we do. Everyone is working flat out to understand what we can do in the races to close the gap.'

The warmest day of a frenetic sprint weekend had the drivers arriving onto the grid, umbrellas perched on their cars. After a resounding rendition of the national anthem the covers came off the tyres and the lights went out with pole-sitter Leclerc holding off Verstappen to the 90 degree turn one. The Dutch ace had the Ferrari in his cross hairs though, waiting to pounce. The inevitable happened on lap four as the Red Bull star nipped past, leaving Leclerc sandwiching the Red Bulls. Perez inched closer to the slower red rival and duly coasted past on lap six. — AFP

NAPLES: Napoli will have to wait a bit longer to seal a first Serie A title in 33 years after being held to a 1-1 draw by Salernitana on Sunday. Runaway league leaders Napoli needed to win to secure their third league crown with six games remaining in the season after Inter Milan beat closest challengers Lazio 3-1 earlier in the day.

And Naples thought a generation of frustration was set to come to an end when Mathias Olivera headed the hosts into the lead just after the hour mark. But the long-awaited Scudetto party will have to be put on hold for at least a few more days after Boulaye Dia's stunning strike six minutes from time ensured Salernitana escaped with a point.

However the coming midweek round of matches could finally end Napoli's long wait for glory. Luciano Spalletti's team are 18 points ahead of Lazio but Juve can close that gap to 17 by winning at Bologna in Sunday's late match and moving into second place. Depending how that match and Juve and Lazio's games on Wednesday go Napoli could be crowned champions before they take the field at Udinese on Thursday night.

Regardless, a win in Udine will ensure Napoli's current stars emulate Diego Maradona, who led southern Italy's biggest club to their only previous league titles in 1987 and 1990. Pushed by a feverish crowd, decked out in blue and white, Napoli started on the front foot and almost went ahead seconds after kick-off when Victor Osimhen headed Hirving Lozano's cross just wide. However Serie A's leading scorer Osimhen was the hosts' only threat in a what turned out to be a frustrating first half in which Salernitana defended deep and largely kept Napoli at bay.

Napoli frustrated

The best chance of the opening period fell to Osimhen in the 23rd minute, the Nigeria forward meeting Piotr Zielinski's deep free-kick with a powerful header which was brilliantly pushed away by Guillermo Ochoa. Ochoa then batted aside Andre-Frank Zambo Anguissa's long-range drive three minutes before the break as

Gnabry and Coman sink Hertha; Bayern top Bundesliga table

BERLIN: Second-half goals from Serge Gnabry and Kingsley Coman have sent Bayern top of the Bundesliga table with four matches remaining with a 2-0 home win over rock-bottom Hertha Berlin. Lowly Hertha defended astutely against a Bayern side still struggling to find the fluency they displayed earlier in the season and with 25 minutes to go it appeared the match was heading for a 0-0 draw.

Gnabry had other ideas however, heading in a Kimmich chip in the 69th minute, his first league goal since early February. The goal broke Hertha's stubborn resistance, Coman scoring ten minutes later, again assisted by Kimmich. The win puts Bayern one point clear
