Hamas willing to extend truce • 4-year-old American girl freed

JERUSALEM/DOHA: A total of 39 Palestinians held by Zionist entity were released from prison on Sunday on the third day of a prisoner-hostage exchange, according to Zionist entity's Prison Service. The announcement came after 13 Zionist hostages were freed in the Palestinian territory under the deal, along with three Thais and a Russian-Zionist dual citizen. Meanwhile, a source close to Hamas said Sunday the movement was willing to extend the current truce with Zionist entity in Gaza for two to four days beyond its initial expiry on Monday.

"Hamas informed the mediators that the resistance movements were willing to extend the current truce by two to four days. The resistance believes it is possible to ensure the release of 20 to 40 Zionist prisoners," the source told AFP, referring to hostages seized in the October 7 attacks.

As part of agreed commitments, "39 Palestinian civilians were being released today in exchange for the release of 13 Zionist entity detainees from Gaza, in addition to a detainee holding Russian citizenship and three Thais," Majed Al-Ansari said earlier in a

post on X, formerly Twitter. Zionist entity's army separately said 13 of the released hostages were back on Zionist entity territory, and another four were on their way to Egypt.

Over the course of the four-day truce a total 50 civilian hostages are expected to be freed by Hamas. In exchange, 150 Palestinian prisoners are to be released and hymenitarian aid has been entering Corre

leased, and humanitarian aid has been entering Gaza. Prior to Sunday evening the truce had seen 26 Zionist entity hostages freed by Hamas in exchange for 78 Palestinian prisoners held in Zionist entity jails. As a

result of parallel negotiations led by Qatar, 14 Thais and one Filipino were also freed by the Palestinian militants.

A four-year-old American girl is safely in Zionist entity after being released on Sunday from captivity in Gaza, US President Joe Biden said as he urged the pause in Zionist entity-Hamas fighting be extended to allow for more hostage releases. "She's free and she's in Zionist entity now," Biden said in a hastily arranged appearance before the media after the Zionist army announced that 17 hostages were being freed by Hamas.

Kuwait pledges unwavering support for Gaza

KUWAIT: Kuwait is keen on continuing its support to the Palestinians in the Gaza Strip and this commitment is evident in the Kuwaiti air bridge which features the participation of more than 30 entities, said Minister of Social Affairs, Minister of Family and Childhood Affairs Sheikh Feras Al-Malek Al-Sabah on Sunday. The minister issued this statement to KUNA prior to the takeoff of two relief planes heading towards

Al-Arish city, Egypt.

The departure of the aircraft brings the total of relief aid planes to 29. The minister revealed that the amount of relief aid sent to the people of Gaza since the start of the campaign reached a total of 850 tons. Kuwait Red Crescent Society's (KRCS) director of emergency management Yousef Al-Miraj affirmed that all Kuwaiti relief shipments had arrived inside the Gaza Strip. Al-Miraj explained that Sunday's KRCS relief flight consisted of 10 tons of materials, loaded with medical and relief supplies. The KRCS's volunteers will accompany the materials to Al-Arish airport and then to the Egyptian Red Crescent in preparation for handing it

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GCC joint military drill led by Kuwait Army kicks off

KUWAIT: Kuwait's military kicked off on Sunday joint ground exercises in conjunction with Gulf Arab forces, sponsored by Acting Chief of the General Staff, Major General Eng Dr Ghazi Al-Shammeri. In a press release, Al-Shammeri, expressed admiration for all the attendees and for hosting such drill that brings together army ground forces from all GCC countries.

Al-Shammeri said Takamul (1) reflects on the continued development of the Peninsula Shield Forces, which is one of the evidences of the success of the joint Gulf action in its military aspect, whether through its operational participation or its implementation of exercises and training at various levels with the armed forces of the GCC countries.

The exercises are taking place in the country's northwestern Median Al-Adera and Al-Abraq areas, added the statement, urging the public to steer clear of the designated locations on the day of the drills for their safety. – KUNA



Pressure mounts on Zionists for longer Gaza pause

JERUSALEM: Zionist entity faces mounting pressure to extend a four-day pause in its war against Hamas. After hours of delay and acrimony that underscored the fragility of the truce, a second tranche of 13 Zionist hostages was freed on Saturday by Hamas in exchange for 39 Palestinian prisoners—the same number as the previous


A total of 15 foreigners have also

been released during the ceasefire—mediated for weeks by Qatar, the United States and Egypt—that marks the first breakthrough after seven weeks of relentless war.

Under the deal, 50 of the roughly 240 hostages held by Hamas will be freed over four days in exchange for 150 Palestinian prisoners, with a builtin extension mechanism to prolong the process as long as at least 10 Zionist entity captives are released each day.

That increases the number of hostages returned—and there is strong domestic pressure within Zionist entity to do so—but gives Hamas a longer window in which to regroup, recover, re-arm and ultimately return to

Top court jails ex-defense minister

KUWAIT: The court of cassation, the highest in the country, on Sunday refrained from issuing a sentence against former prime minister Sheikh Jaber Al-Mubarak Al-Sabah in connection with a major graft case known as the army fund corruption case.

But the court, whose rulings are final, sentenced former defense and interior minister, Sheikh Khaled Al-Jarrah Al-Sabah to seven years in jail

along with six former senior defense ministry officials after convicting them of stealing around KD 105 million. The court also ordered the convicts to return the KD 105 million and fined them double

but stepped down in 2019 after news about the graft case became public. He was detained but later freed on bail and allowed to travel abroad for medical treatment. All the defendants denied the accusations and said they were innocent.

In the meantime, the National Assembly's legal and legislative committee began on Sunday reviewing proposed bills to change the country's election system which a number of MPs have described as the main reform legislation in the country. The meeting was attended by Speaker Ahmad bill, adding that it is expected to create as many as

the draft law to be debated by the house on Dec 19. Several MPs demanded a fair distribution of voters among the constituencies.

Also, MP Mohammad Havef said on Sunday he was informed that a new amnesty decree has been signed by the Amir involving the release of dozens of prisoners and the return of some revoked citizenship. There has been no official confirmation on the reported amnesty.

MP Abdulwahab Al-Issa on Sunday criticized the Assembly for not including the northern economic zone draft law for debate during Tuesday's session. The lawmaker said that based on the agreed legislation roadmap, the draft law should have been placed on the agenda for Tuesday's session, but the bill is absent. He said he will demand the inclusion of the

Winter solstice in Kuwait falls on Dec 22

KUWAIT: Al-Ojairi Scientific Center, Kuwait announced on Sunday that the winter solstice would fall on Dec 22. The winter solstice occurs when the sun becomes at its lowest daily maximum elevation in the sky, leading to short daytime hours and long evenings. The center said in a statement, obtained by KUNA that the same month would witness a group of astronomical events like the meteor showers called the Geminids

This event is considered one of the brightest celestial shows with up to 120 meteors passing by the hour. It is visible for the human eye in the middle of December if the conditions are appropriate which will intensify by Dec 14 and 15. The center reported that during the fourth day of the month, the planet Mercury would be at its farthest from the sun and could be seen from the sky at night. The Moon's crescent would appear on day 12th of the month and the full moon on Dec 27, it concluded. — KUNA

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Manpower bars amendments to expats' data

KUWAIT: The Public Authority of Manpower (PAM) emphasized the prohibition of amending the work permit data of expatriates such as name, date of birth and nationality. If the employer wishes to do so, they must apply for a visa cancellation service for the worker to be recruited before two weeks from the date of issuance, and then review the ministry of interior to modify the worker's database and apply for issuing a new permit.

The Authority indicated that this decision was taken following a joint coordination with the ministry of interior. "The aim is to prevent any manipulations that were previously carried out by some with the aim of circumventing the rules and recruiting some workers of nationalities whose recruitment permits have been suspended."

On the other hand, the Authority confirmed that it will continue to legalize the issuance of work permits for all professions and activities for a full year with the aim of liquidating marginal labor and supporting the national skilled labor.

A study prepared by the PAM said: "The ministry of interior should intensify its efforts with the concerned authorities to remove marginal, fictitious and violating workers, and address travel ban issues for those whose residency has expired."

The study issued a set of recommendations, including developing decisions regulating work with regard to work permits on small and medium enterprises. "Their employment is estimated at 79,000 workers registered on 4,000 small projects only," the study said. The Manpower stressed the need to stop issuing work permits for professions and specialties for which there is a Kuwaiti job seeker. They will assign all ministries and bodies concerned to follow up on workers affiliated with their government contracts with regard to valid and non-valid contracts.



Kuwaiti oil experts expect market volatility amid Mideast tensions

OPEC+ coalition seen extending production cut deal

KUWAIT: Oil prices went down for the fifth consecutive week due to an increase in selling of future contracts as well as a decrease in geopolitical tension over in the Middle East, which in turn eased fears over disruption of energy supplies, said experts on Sunday.

Speaking to KUNA in interviews, the experts said that a drop in strategic oil reserves in the US as well as reserves of gasoline in addition to the recovery of the US dollar index boosted economic data, which also showed a decrease in unemployment rates. The price of the Brent crude last week saw a decrease of 0.4 percent to settle at \$80.58 per barrel, while the West Texas Intermediate dropped by 0.5 percent at \$75.54 per barrel.

The oil market saw unhinged selling operations amid fears of a global recession and slow economic growth after the release of US retail data showed a fall in consumer spending, said member of the teaching staff at the College of Technological Studies of the Public Authority for Applied Education and Training (PAAET) Dr Mubarak Al-Hajri. He predicted that there would be an extension of the OPEC+'s production cut deal. However, he noted that Russia and Nigeria were not abiding by their share in the deal approved by the coalition.

On his part, energy sector expert Jamal Al-Ghar-

abally predicted that the war unleashed by the Zionist entity on the Gaza Strip would continue after the current humanitarian truce, leading to the hike in oil prices, which might reach \$120 pb. He went on to say that drawing from the US strategic oil reserves during winter would increase prices and also increase voluntary supplies from Saudi Arabia and Russia by around one million barrels per day.

Meanwhile, oil expert Fares Al-Salem said that oil prices saw a decrease due to global demand on oil derivatives, but such situation would change with the advent of winter in North America and Europe, leading to an expected increase in energy demands this time of the year. He indicated that the status of Chinese economy remained "vague" especially with the piling up of crude oil reserves with expectation of oil import decrease by the first half of next year. These factors would encourage the OPEC+ coalition to extend its production cut deal for another pe-

riod. He indicated that OPEC expected an increase in China's oil demand by 3.2 percent in the first half of 2024, while the International Energy Agency (IEA) expected an increase of 3.9 percent, less than the growth between 2016 and 2019 where it was before the pandemic at 4.5 percent annually, which would affect global demand.

Al-Salem said that China's global demand for oil was at 25 percent, which was not a factor that would lead to stability in prices without the OPEC+ production cut agreement. — KUNA



Entire families 'wiped out' in Gaza

'The living here are the ones who are dead'

RAFAH: Sahar Awwad is seated between her two 'Completely disappeared' nephews. Together, they are among the few survivors of an extended Gaza family of which at least 80 members have been killed in nearly seven weeks of Zionist bombardment. The entire family had fled first to a hospital in Khan Yunis, then to a school, which was initially transformed into a camp for the displaced then a clinic, in Rafah near the border with Egypt, the southernmost point of the besieged enclave.

Only 35 kilometers (20 miles) separated them from their former home in Gaza City, but the journey took them a week. Last Friday, a strike hit their home in Gaza City's Sheikh Radwan neighborhood. "More than 80 family members died. The Awwad family was wiped out," Awwad told AFP. "The survivors rushed to extract the dead and wounded from the debris and (the Zionist entity) struck a second time," she said.

"We could only bury those whose bodies had been sent flying all the way to the neighbors' homes" by the force of the explosion, she said. They were unable to reach those under the rubble. Her nephew Mossaab, 14, has had his leg amputated and his face is still covered in scars. His cousin Abboud, 12, has an IV drip protruding from his abdomen.

Abboud "doesn't know vet that his mother, two of his brothers, his sister and his grandmother are dead", Awwad said in tears. Only his father survived. When their home was struck, they were both already being treated in hospital. "That's the only reason why they weren't injured," Awwad said.

Lebanese return to find bombed-out houses near border

AITAROUN: Lebanese farmer and minibus driver Abdallah Abdallah went back to his village near the Zionist border on Saturday to find that weeks of bombing had badly damaged his house and destroyed his tractor. "What can I say? (The Zionist entity) has always been criminal, it has always targeted our houses," said Abdallah, 50, his face weary as he pointed to gaping holes in the walls of his two-storey home in Aitarun, just across from a Zionist military position.

Since Oct 7, the frontier between Lebanon and the Zionist entity has seen intensifying exchanges of fire, mainly between the Zionist entity and Hezbollah, but also Palestinian groups, raising fears of a broader conflagration. Abdallah fled after the cross-border skirmishes began, and like others, timidly returned on Saturday to inspect his home, under the incessant buzz of Zionist surveillance drones.

Few frontier residents told AFP they intended to stay, fearing renewed violence after the end of the four-day truce between the Zionist entity and Hamas that began on Friday. A source close to Hezbollah told AFP that the Iran-backed group would adhere to the truce if the Zionist entity did. "My tractor was destroyed and also the van I used to take the children in

Across south Lebanon, houses with smashed walls, shattered windows or doors ripped off their hinges bear witness to the violence of recent weeks. In some villages, Hezbollah has put up banners paying homage to its "martyrs" who have been killed. The cross-border exchanges have killed 109 people in Lebanon, at least 77 of them fighters from the Shiite Muslim movement and 14 civilians, according to an AFP count. The International Organization for Migration says more than 55,000 people have fled their homes, mainly in south Lebanon, since the hostilities began.

Fatima Taha, 55, breathed a sigh of relief when she discovered her house in the village of Mais al-Jabal was mostly intact, with just a few broken windows. "We came back when they announced the truce but everyone is afraid," she said, picking lemons from a

'Won't leave'

"Some people came just for the olive harvest but don't want to stay" because they fear renewed bombing, she added. In many villages near the border, authorities have put up signs asking residents not to use roads close to Zionist positions.

On Saturday, Zionist soldiers fired into the air to "frighten farmers" who were working on their land, according to Lebanon's official National son Udai. Today, he is 20, and they "grew up together", she said, along with her second son Oussai, 19, and her daughter Shahad, 17. Zayed was with Udai just a few days ago. "The last thing he said to me was that he was waiting for the truce on Friday, and he asked me to prepare him a feast of rice and chicken," she said.

"Dozens died in a heavy air strike. I walked over 50 bodies of dead and injured people, looking for Udai. Everything was covered in dust and smoke. I could only identify him by his belt," she said. "We were all standing together, but God chose him as a martyr." The family had to bury Udai themselves, she recalled.

We were displaced to a school in Rafah the next day. I didn't feel like I was injured in my back," she said. "The pain in my heart and chest made me forget about my body. My heart bleeds, not my back." When she arrived at the hospital in Rafah, doctors found her wound was infected. It was cleaned and she received 17 stitches.

Before he died, Udai had received a rare Zionist permit to travel to the occupied West Bank to attend the Palestinian Authority's military academy in Jericho. He had been due to start on Oct 12, but he "travelled to another place with no return", she said. "Gaza is dark as a grave. I hope me and my children die here so we don't have to mourn each other," the mother said. "The living here are the ones who are dead." – AFP

Thai relatives overjoyed for hostage returns

BANGKOK: Kittiya Thuengsaeng thought her 28-year-old boyfriend was among the almost 40 Thais killed on Oct 7, the day when Hamas fighters entered the Zionist entity in an attack targeting border communities and army bases. But on Friday night Thai officials shocked her with news so good it seemed impossible. "I couldn't believe my eyes," she told AFP, describing the moment she saw a photograph of Wichai Kalapat after he was released from weeks in captivity. "I had a chat with him in the morning. He was still smiling. He told me he was safe."

Thailand's foreign ministry said Saturday that 10 Thai hostages had been released by Hamas and would be returned to the kingdom "as soon as possible", after undergoing medical checks in the Zionist entity. Twenty Thais remain among the approximately 215 hostages still held by Hamas after Oct 7.

Roongarun Wichanguen, sister of 33-year-old Thai hostage Vetoon Phoome, said she got the news her brother was coming home early Saturday. "I was very happy because my hopes were very dim, but suddenly there was hope," she told AFP. She saw a photo of Vetoon, who moved from northeastern Nong Bua Lam Phu province to the Zionist entity five years ago to work on a potato farm and was in disbelief. "I zoomed in and I found my brother there in it," she said. "I had a video call with my brother and his face was happy," she added. "He said that he was not tortured, or assaulted, and had been fed good food. He was taken care of very well." A Thai official confirmed to AFP that Vetoon and Wichai were among those freed.

On Friday, a truce began following weeks of negotiations brokered by Qatar, Egypt and the United States. Under the agreement, a four-day pause in Zionist bombardment should see at least 50 hostages released from Gaza in exchange for 150 Palestinian prisoners held in Zionist jails. Hamas released 24 hostages in total on Friday, according to the Zionist entity and key mediator Qatar. — AFP

Thousands march across globe to denounce violence against women

'We don't want to count the dead any more'

WASHINGTON: Thousands of people took to the streets across the world on Saturday to condemn violence against women on the international day highlighting the crime. On the UN-designated International Day for the Elimination of Violence against Women, protesters marched in Europe and the Americas.

"The scourge of gender-based violence continues to inflict pain and injustice on too many," US President Joe Biden said in a statement. "An estimated one in three women globally will experience physical violence, rape, or stalking at some point in their lifetimes. It's an outrage. ... Particularly in areas of conflict, countless women and girls suffer at the hands of perpetrators who commit gender-based violence and use rape as a weapon of war."

In Guatemala, protesters kicked off commemorations on Friday evening, placing candles to write out 438 — the number of women killed so far this year. In the Chilean capital of Santiago, some 1,000 protesters marched through the streets Friday night, chanting "Not one step backward" and demanding action by the government to protect women.

A women's advocacy group estimates that 40 femicides have occurred in the country this year. Along Rio de Janeiro's famed Copacabana Beach, protesters lined up 722 pairs of women's shoes, from high-heels to sneakers, each pair before a woman's name to represent the femicides recorded in 2022 — the highest number since 2019, according to the non-governmental Brazilian Forum on Public Safety.

And in Argentina, demonstrators — including those concerned by the election of incoming president Javier Milei — in Buenos Aires combined a protest on violence against women with a show of support for the Palestinian people. Milei has suggesting eliminating the Ministry of Women, Genders and Diversity — in charge of preventing gender violence — and has taken hardline stances on issues including abortion and equal pay.

In Italy, which has been shaken by the murder of a 22-year-old university student allegedly by her former boyfriend, some 50,000 people, according to the au stees

AGI news agency, demonstrated in Rome, where the Colosseum was to be lit up in red later on Saturday.

The country has been horrified by the case of Giulia Cecchettin, who went missing for a week as she was due to receive her degree in biomedical engineering from the University of Padua. Her body was eventually found in a gully about 120 kilometers (75 miles) north of Venice, and her former boyfriend, 22-year-old Filippo Turetta, was arrested in Germany.

"This year ... takes on particularly important connotations for us... for those in this country who care about the rights, claims and emancipation of all women, following yet another femicide, the killing of Giulia Cecchettin," said Luisa Loduce, a 22-year-old librarian. In the year to Nov 12, there have been 102 murder cases with female victims in Italy, 82 of them by family members or current or former partners, according to the interior ministry.

In Turkey, some 500 women gathered in the Sisli district in Istanbul, as riot police stood by, unfurling banners reading "We will not remain silent" and "Women are united and fighting against male-state

violence." Protesters also took to the streets in Ankara.

'Educate your boys'

In France, several thousand people, many wearing purple, the color of women and gender equality, wove through the chilly streets of Paris and other cities, carrying signs reading: "One rape every six minutes in France" and "Protect your girls, educate your boys". "We don't want to count the dead any more," Maelle Lenoir, an official from the All of Us activist group, told reporters, urging the government to devote more money to eradicating violence against women.

France has recorded 121 women killed so far this year in femicides, the killing of a woman due to her gender, compared with 118 in 2022, according to government data. Leonore Maunoury, 22, said that the justice system needed to be changed to deal effectively with the phenomenon, as she marched in the eastern city of Strasbourg. "Sexual violence is difficult to prove. Many cases are dismissed. The justice system is ill-adapted" to deal with the issue, she said. — AFP

4 dead, dozens injured in south India stampede

NEW DELHI: At least four people were killed and dozens injured Saturday evening in a stampede at a university in southern India, local officials and media reported. The stampede occurred at an outdoor auditorium in the Cochin University of Science and Technology (CUSAT) in southwest Kerala state, where a concert had been planned.

In a statement on X, Kerala state governor Arif Mohammed Khan said he was "deeply shocked and grieved to know about the sad demise of four students" at CU-SAT. "Heartfelt condolences to their families. Prayers for speedy recovery of injured," he added. State Health Minister Veena George said in a statement that four people had been brought dead to the Kalamassery Medical College Hospital while four more were in critical condition, the PTI news agency reported, adding that over 60 people had been injured.

A local police official said that a crowd outside the auditorium had rushed to seek cover from a sudden downpour when a number of people slipped on some stairs and were subsequently trampled, according to PTI. One of the deadliest stampedes in recent history occurred a decade ago in India, when at least 115 people were killed on the sidelines of a religious festival in central Madhya Pradesh state. — AFP

Russia downs Ukrainian drones over five regions

MOSCOW: Russia said Sunday it had downed Ukrainian drones over five regions, including Moscow, as well as two Ukrainian missiles over the Azov Sea, a day after a large-scale Russian drone attack on Kyiv. Russia and Ukraine have hit each with drones for months, as Moscow's offensive drags on for in to a 22nd month, with little significant movement on the front, despite fierce fighting.

Russia said the drones hit the Moscow region, other regions near the capital as well as regions bordering Ukraine. "Air defense destroyed nine drones over the territory of the Moscow, Tula, Kaluga and Bryansk regions," Russia's defense ministry said early on Sunday.

It later said that another four Ukrainian drones were downed over the Bryansk region, which borders Ukraine, as well as the southwestern Smolensk region and the Tula region, which lies north of Moscow. The attacks came a day after Ukraine said Rus-

sia had launched 75 Iranian-made Shahed drones, mostly aimed at Kyiv, in what it said was a "record" since Moscow's offensive last year

Ukraine has upped attacks on Russia since launching its counter-offensive this summer and has hit regions close to fighting zones as well as further inland into Russia, including Moscow itself. The Russian army also said Sunday it had downed two Ukrainian missiles over the Azov Sea that it said were headed for Russia. Russia controls the Ukrainian Azov Sea coast, which fell to Moscow early in its offensive last year. Local authorities in the affected regions did not report casualties.

"I call on refraining to share photographs or videos of the drones on social media," the Smolensk governor Vasily Anokhin wrote on Telegram, adding that emergency services were working in areas that were hit. Smolensk region, which borders Belarus, has been mostly spared from drone attacks.

On the battlefield, fighting has now focused around the industrial hub of Avdiivka, which appears almost encircled by Russian forces. The fall of Avdiivka — a symbol of Ukrainian resistance since 2014 — would be a significant loss for Kyiy.

Ukraine, meanwhile, reported Russian attacks in the south and east of the country. The head of the southern city of Kherson,

Roman Mrochko, said two urban districts were shelled and that information of possible victims was being clarified. Regional authorities in the Kherson region said around a dozen villages were left without electricity due to bad weather and Russian attacks.

Kyiv has been preparing for weeks for a feared renewal of Moscow's campaign to hit its energy grid in a possible repeat of last year, when thousands were left without power in freezing temperatures. "Due to bad weather and Russian shelling, a number of settlements in our region were left without electricity," the head of the Kherson region Oleksandr Prokudin said on Telegram. "Power supply teams are already working to eliminate the malfunctions," he added. — AFP

"She is now safely in Zionist entity, and we continue to press and expect for additional Americans will be released as well. And we will not stop working until every hostage is returned to their loved ones."

The White House has said that 10 Americans—seven men, two women and Abigail—were missing and presumed held hostage by Hamas.

Meanwhile, hundreds of people greeted the International Committee of the Red Cross bus carrying the Palestinians as it arrived in Al-Bireh in the occupied West Bank. Crowds chanted "God is Great" as the bus arrived, and several young men stood on the roof of the vehicle. Many in the crowd held Hamas flags and chanted pro-Hamas slogans. Many Palestinians view prisoners held by Zionist entity, including those implicated in attacks, as heroes resisting occupation, and have celebrated their release. The

arrival of the Palestinian prisoners, six women and 33 men, has brought tears and joy as they were received by their families in the occupied East Jerusalem and the West Bank.

Meanwhile, the military wing of Hamas said Sunday that the commander of its northern brigade and four other senior leaders had been killed during Zionist entity's offensive against the Islamist movement.

In a statement, the Ezzedine Al-Qassam Brigades said Ahmed Al-Ghandour was a member of its military council, and named three of the others, among them Ayman Siyyam, head of its rocket division, while its West Bank branch confirmed another leader's death. "We pledge to Allah we will continue their path and that their blood will be a light for the mujahedeen and a fire for the occupiers," the statement said, without saying when they were killed.

Wael Rajab, described as Ghandour's deputy and the former police chief in northern Gaza, had also been killed, it said, as had Raafat Salman, a senior operative in Qassam's Gaza City Brigade involved in planning the motorized glider infiltration on October 7.—AFP

"Time works against Zionist entity as always and against the IDF," said Andreas Krieg, of King's College London, referring to the Zionist entity military. "On one hand you want all the hostages out knowing that you can't get them out militarily and on the other you don't want to lose completely the momentum of this war," he told AFP

And the longer a truce lasted, he said, the more the international community would lose patience with a continuation of the war, he added. But the Zionist entity's military is determined to pursue its objective of "crushing" Hamas. Visiting Zionist entity

Zionist entity has defied international criticism of its Gaza offensive, which its Hamas rulers say has killed more than 15,000 people, mostly civilians, and left an unprecedented trail of destruction in the Palestinian territory. "The real pressure to prolong the truce comes from inside Zionist entity—from the families of the hostages," said Arik Rudnitzky, from Tel Aviv University's Moshe Dayan Center.

Fake AI porn leads to real harassment in US schools

Law has been slow to catch up with technology, putting many young women at risk

WASHINGTON: When Ellis, a 14-year-old from they will not be able to protect themselves — be-Texas, woke up one October morning with several missed calls and texts, they were all about the same thing: nude images of her circulating on social media. That she had not actually taken the pictures didn't make a difference, as artificial intelligence makes socalled "deepfakes" more and more realistic.

The images of Ellis and a friend, also a victim, were lifted from Instagram, their faces then placed on naked bodies of other people. Other students all girls — were also targeted, with the composite photos shared with other classmates on Snapchat. "It looked real, like the bodies looked like real bodies," she told AFP. "And I remember being really, really scared ... I've never done anything of that sort."

As AI has boomed, so has deepfake pornography, with hyper-realistic images and videos created with minimal effort and money — leading to scandals and harassment at multiple high schools in the United States as administrators struggle to respond amid a lack of federal legislation banning the practice. "The girls just cried, and cried forever. They were very ashamed," said Anna Berry McAdams, Ellis' mother, who was shocked at how realistic the images looked. "They didn't want to go to school."

'A smartphone and a few dollars'

Though it's hard to quantify how widespread deepfakes are becoming, Ellis' school outside of Dallas isn't alone. At the end of the month, another fake nudes scandal erupted at a high school in the northeastern state of New Jersey. "It will happen more and more often," said Dorota Mani, the mother of one of the victims there, also 14.

She added that there is no way to know if pornographic deepfakes might be floating around on the Internet without one's knowledge, and that investigations often only arise when victims speak out. "So many victims don't even know there are pictures, and

cause they don't know from what."

At the same time, experts say, the law has been slow to catch up with technology, even as cruder versions of fake pornography, often focused on celebrities, have existed for years. Now, though, anyone who has posted something as innocent as a LinkedIn headshot can be a victim. "Anybody who was working in this space knew, or should have known, that it was going to be used in this way," Hany Farid, a professor of computer science at the University of California, Berkeley, told AFP.

Last month, President Joe Biden signed an executive order on AI, calling on the government to create guardrails "against producing child sexual abuse material and against producing non-consensual intimate imagery of real individuals." And if it has proved difficult in many cases to track down the individual creators of certain images, that shouldn't stop the AI companies behind them or social media platforms where the photos are shared from being held accountable, says Farid.

But no national legislation exists restricting deep fake porn, and only a handful of states have passed laws regulating it. "Although your face has been superimposed on a body, the body is not really yours," said Renee Cummings, an AI ethicist. That can create a "contradiction in the law," the University of Virginia professor told AFP, since it can be argued that existing laws prohibiting distributing sexual photos of someone without their consent don't apply to deepfakes.

And while "anyone with a smartphone and a few dollars" can make the images, using widely available software, many of the victims — who are primarily young women and girls — "are afraid to go public." Deepfake porn "can destroy someone's life," said Cummings, citing victims who have suffered anxiety, depression and Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder.

In Texas, Ellis was interviewed by the police and school officials. But the education and judicial systems appear to be caught flat-footed. "It just crushes me that we don't have things in place to say, 'Yes, that is child porn," said Berry McAdams, her mother. The classmate behind Ellis' photos was temporarily suspended, but Ellis — who previously described herself as social and outgoing — remains "constantly

filled with anxiety," and has asked to transfer schools.

"I don't know how many people could have saved the photos and sent them along. I don't know how many photos he made," she says. "So many people could have gotten them." Her mother, meanwhile, worries about if — or, given the longevity of the Internet, when — the photos might resurface. "This could affect them for the rest of their lives," she says. — AFP

'Child soldiers', blood feuds: Sweden's gang wars out of control

UPPSALA: One night in September, teacher Thomas Cervin was woken by gunshots in his apartment building in Uppsala, the fourth largest city in Sweden. His neighbor had just become the latest target in Sweden's terrifying gang wars. Execution-style shootings carried out by "child soldiers", apartment buildings rocked by bombings, innocent relatives targeted in vendettas, and the morning news summarizing the night's death toll — all have become disturbingly routine in the normally quiet country.

No other country in Europe is seeing anything like this," said Prime Minister Ulf Kristersson as he vowed to defeat the gangs. "Swedish legislation was not designed for gang wars and child soldiers. But we're changing that now," he said. Sweden's gang wars have smoldered for a decade over control of the drugs market.

But they took a drastic turn early this year when an internal feud led to gang members' families and loved ones also becoming targets. The Sept 13 shooting in Cervin's building in Uppsala, 70 kilometers (45 miles) north of Stockholm, was aimed at the mother-in-law of Rawa Majid, the "Kurdish Fox", and head of the notorious Foxtrot gang. She escaped unharmed. "I had no idea she was related to him," Cervin said. "That's what makes so many people scared — the people involved have friends and relatives all over the place."

'Ruthless'

"This new generation (of criminals) is ruthless," said Garip Gunes, who started a youth football team to keep kids in the disadvantaged Stockholm suburb of Rinkeby out of trouble. "Many parents are worried about their kids and don't let them go out except to go to school or football practice. They're worried

they'll end up in the line of fire," he told AFP. Criminology professor Felipe Estrada Dorner of

Stockholm University told AFP the situation "has gotten totally out of control: they've started attacking loved ones and those who have nothing to do with these conflicts." "This is a big change from the violence that has prevailed until now." Forty-seven people have been killed in 314 shootings so far this year, police said, compared to only seven deaths in 2016.

'Failed integration'

The victims and the perpetrators are increasingly young. Police last year investigated 336 15- to 17-year-olds for having illegal firearms, eight times more than a decade ago, the National Council for Crime Prevention said this month. Gangs now recruit kids to carry out contract killings — some younger than 15 — knowing they can't be jailed.

"Children are contacting criminal gangs" offering to commit murders, Sweden's police chief Anders Thornberg said. These children "just don't know how to handle these weapons", Estrada Dorner said, often leading to innocent bystanders being wounded or killed. In Gottsunda, a suburb near Uppsala, Ebtesam Abowarrad agreed, and said people were scared. "The difference nowadays is that they shoot all over the place." "I never see anyone out in the streets anymore," the 40-year-old mother told AFP.

Most young gang members have been on social services' radar for years, said Evin Cetin, a former lawyer who has written a book of interviews with young gang members, "Mitt ibland oss" (In Our Midst). "These kids have been trained by criminals they live, eat and breathe a culture of violence," she said. "Most of those I've met have an empty look in their eyes, they don't value their own lives." Prime Minister Kristersson has blamed the rise in organized crime on "naivety" over immigration. "An irresponsible immigration policy and failed integration led us here," the conservative leader said. — AFP

told AFP, noting "bread-and-butter issues" were common flashpoints in China.

since the 2017 crackdown. Police said they had "stopped and held 58 Rohingya" on Friday night as they reportedly left camps heading to board boats at Teknaf, a Bangladeshi river port just across the border from Myanmar.

"Among them nine are men, 16 are women and 33 are children. We detained two Bangladeshi human traffickers who were allegedly guiding them," Teknaf police station chief Osman Goni told AFP on Saturday. "They were ready to sail in a boat from Teknaf and were going to Indonesia and Malaysia." Goni said all 58 would be sent back to the camps.

Several Rohingya refugees who were held by police told AFP that they had paid human traffickers around \$1,000 each for a boat journey to Indonesia. "They (the traffickers) kept us in a house and said they would send us to Indonesia on a boat the next day," said Selim Ullah, a 22-year-old Rohingya refugee, who was detained with his wife and daughter.

Ullah said a sharply worsening security situation in the camps and opportunities have prompted them to pay the traffickers to sail to Indonesia. "We thought we can get a better life, education and healthcare there," he added. "We know we can die in the boat. But as we're suffering here, we've decided to go there on boats". Police say about 60 Rohingya people have been killed in violence in the camps this year. "There are bandits in the camps," Ullah said, saying they robbed and extorted people. "They abduct people at night and take them to the hills. We can't stop them." — AFP

'Still suffocated': Mourning China's zero-COVID rallies

SHANGHAI: A year after historic protests broke out on Shanghai's bustling Wulumuqi Road, only a subtly increased police presence on main junctions betrays anything out of the ordinary. But for many involved in what became China's most widespread demonstrations in decades, it's impossible to erase the memory of the events of last autumn.

In the early hours of Nov 27, 2022, vigils for victims of a fire in Xinjiang's capital Urumqi morphed into multi-city calls to end zero-COVID measures, and even in some cases topple the ruling Communist Party and leader Xi Jinping.

Authorities responded by cracking down. But in early December they abruptly lifted the strict health restrictions that had dominated people's lives for almost three years. "Shortly after zero-COVID lifted, everyone just got back to their normal daily life. Everyone just seems to have moved on, no one's talking about it," said Li, a protester in their twenties whose name has been changed for security reasons.

For people like Li, there is another reason for the silence: police visited her last month and warned her not to demonstrate. "When I think about (what happened last year) I still feel I'm suffocated by it," Li told AFP. Like many, she believed the country's harsh COVID rules had hampered rescue efforts when she joined the vigil on Wulumuqi Road to grieve the 10

The role of gold in times of crises

The precious metal that can maintain price stability amid economic volatility

KUWAIT: According to Salman Al-Naqi, Kuwaiti economist and the 2022 first-place research paper winner of the "Kuwaiti Economic Prize", gold has long been recognized as a safe-haven asset during times of economic uncertainty and global crises. That is due to its unique characteristics, such as

independence from government policies, besides its limited supply, which have made it a popular choice for investors and central banks. Because understanding the role of gold as a reliable refuge becomes increasingly important in times of crises, Kuwait Times spoke to Naqi for further information about the influence of this valuable metal's prices.

Naqi explained gold's uniqueness, saying: "In times of economic uncertainty and crisis, gold is considered a safe-haven asset for investors and central banks. Gold's reputation is rooted in its unique characteristics; unlike fiat currencies, gold prices are not subject to government or central bank policies. During economic turmoil, investors

often turn to gold as a refuge, driven by the perception that it can maintain value amid financial market volatility. The limited supply of gold adds to its appeal, enhancing its status as a store of wealth."

Naqi then elaborated on gold being a secure asset for investors, and the relationship between its prices and global crises. "The relationship between gold and crises is characterized by an inverse correlation with traditional assets. When financial markets face downturns, gold values tend to rise, with increased demand as investors seek a hedge against inflation, currency fluctuations and overall economic instability. For example, during the 2008 global financial crisis, the price of gold surged as investors sought the security it offered. Geopolitical tensions can also spur demand for gold as investors view it as a reliable asset transcending geopolitical boundaries," he said.

Thus, gold's precious value remains neither effected by political issues nor economic damage. "Central banks, responsible for managing and maintaining monetary policy and stability, traditionally hold gold within their reserves for several reasons. Historically, under the Bretton Woods Agreement in 1944, major currencies were pegged to the US dollar, which, in turn, was tied to gold, providing stability to the post-World War II global economy. Although the Bretton Woods system collapsed in 1971, central banks continued holding gold as part

of their reserves, influenced by the legacy of this agreement," Naqi said.

Naqi spoke about the current status of gold with regards to central banks. "Currently, central banks see gold as an insurance against unforeseen crises. Gold's liquidity and stability make it invaluable during economic dilemmas, enabling central banks to navigate turbulent periods with greater resilience. Central banks have the ability to influence

gold prices through their monetary policy decisions and patterns, impacting factors such as interest rates and currency values, as well as participating in quantitative easing (QE). Global economic conditions and central banks' responses can affect market sentiment, while direct buying or selling of gold reserves by central banks directly influences supply and demand dynamics, playing a role in shaping gold prices," he said.

Gold prices exceed \$2,000 per ounce

KUWAIT: Gold prices exceeded the \$2,000 per ounce threshold at the end of last week's trading, following expectations of the imminent end of monetary tightening measures by the US Federal Reserve (central bank), said economic source Sunday.

Gold futures for next December rose by 0.5 percent to reach \$2003 per ounce, in conjunction with the decline in the index that measures the US dollar with other currencies at a rate of 0.55 percent at 103.3 points, the Kuwaiti (Dar-AlSabaek) company in a specialized report.

Texas Republicans take aim at climate change - in textbooks

HOUSTON: The scorching summer in Texas this year was the second hottest on record — but students in the southwestern US state might have a hard time understanding why. That's because a slew of science textbooks submitted to the state Board of Education (BOE) were rejected last week, as the Republican-dominated body moves to curtail education materials deemed too "one-sided" on climate change. Many of the rejected books taught that "humans are negatively impacting the environment. And the scare tactics that come with that, that is my main issue," Evelyn Brooks, a Republican board member, told AFP. She claimed, counter to scientists and the federal government, that "the science is not settled on global warming."

America's decentralized education system leaves curriculum management mostly up to individual states, with local school districts also having a degree of autonomy. That has led to fraught battles across the country as each jurisdiction debates how to teach climate change and other politically charged issues, such as racism and sexuality. It also leaves room for officials like Brooks in Texas, which produces 42 percent of the nation's crude oil, to push back against the "political ideology" of climate change — a concept she considers "a blatant lie."

Increasingly polarized

Science textbooks from publisher Green Ninja were among those voted down by the Texas BOE. "It was because of our inclusion of climate change," director Eugene Cordero told AFP in an email, adding that one board member took particular issue with a prompt asking students to "create a story warning friends and family about possible future weather and climate extremes.'

Textbooks from eight of 22 publishers that submitted materials to the board were rejected last week, according to a count from Glenn Branch, deputy director of the National Center for Science Education (NCSE), a nonprofit which promotes the teaching of climate change.

Some were eventually accepted, after revisions to sections on climate change and evolution — another controversial subject in the largely Christian Texas. The rejected books are not necessarily banned from classrooms, but using approved books is typically tied to getting government funding.

As broiling summers are supercharged by climate change, some fear that students won't see the bigger picture. "If kids don't understand what all of that means, and they're just going to continue to perpetuate the problem," said Marisa Perez-Dias, one of five Democratic members of the board.

Staci Childs, another Democratic board member, charged that some of her colleagues "felt like some of the materials negatively reflected how oil and gas impacts our society." In a show of just how powerful the industry is in Texas — even as the state becomes a growing hub for renewables — two of the 10 Republican members work directly for the sector. — AFP

Federal Reserve reiterates that rates will remain high

UK economy found its feet again in November

KUWAIT: At their most recent meeting, US Federal Reserve officials showed that there is no desire to cut interest rates anytime soon, especially when inflation is still above their targeted 2 percent level. The committee members still worry that inflation could be sticky and might move higher. and that more may need to be done. In addition, the minutes revealed that members feel they should proceed cautiously and base their judgments on the entirety of incoming information and its implications for the economic outlook as well as the balance of risks. However, the minutes did not indicate that the members even discussed lowering rates, which was reflected in Chairman Jerome Powell post meeting news conference as he stated that, "the Committee is not thinking about rate cuts right now at all."

Revised UoM consumer sentiment

In the US, consumer sentiment fell for the fourth month in a row, reaching 61.3 in the month of November, down from 63.8 in October. The dip indicates that despite the recent downturn, consumers are still expecting inflation rates to increase in the upcoming months, with expectations of it reaching levels of around 4.5 percent within the next 12 months, and 3.2 percent in the next 5 years. The data published by the University of Michigan shows mixed signals regarding different age groups among consumers, with young and middle-aged consumers showing strong declines in economic attitudes. Joanne Hsu, the director of the survey, mentions that consumers have been more negative this year than their actual behavior with regards to the current economic situation.

US unemployment claims

The US labor market is proving to be more resilient than expected, after unemployment claims dropped to 209,000 from 233,000 previously. Expectations were for the print to come in at 226,000 claims. Furthermore, in another sign of a resilient labor market, continuing claims dropped to 1.84 million, down by 22,000 from the previous reading. Despite a historic tightening cycle by the Fed, job growth remains strong while unemployment remains historically at the low end. Meanwhile, inflation dropped from a peak of 9.1 percent to 3.2 percent last month. It is wildly expected by markets that the Federal Reserve will end the year holding rates steady. The US Dollar index closed the week at 103.403.

Europe ECB speakers

In a speech given by ECB's president Christine Lagarde, she stated that it is too early to "start declaring victory" in ECB's fight against inflation. Lagarde added that the current downward pressure on inflation was a result of unwinding in energy prices and a shock in supply, which accounted for two thirds of inflation surge. Lagard added that while the current interest rates are seen as sufficient to bring inflation back to 2 percent, it is expected for a small rise in inflation to occur in the upcoming months, after bringing it down from 10.6 percent in January to 2.9 percent in October.

Eurozone PMIs

The latest readings to come out showed slight hope for the Eurozone's largest economy, Germany. Both manufacturing and services showed an increase from their previous readings giving confidence to the idea that eco-

nomic growth is plausible in the near future. Despite the positive readings, German PMIs remain in contraction territory. Over in France, output declined for the 6th consecutive month, mainly a result of weak domestic and overseas demand. As manufacturers are laying off workers, along with a highly anticipated Q4 decline, a rise in unemployment is also upon us. Unlike Germany, there seems to be no glimmer of hope for the French economy as it appears to be at a dead-end. As for the Eurozone as a whole, both the manufacturing and services sectors continued to contract, signaling a second consecutive quarter of shrinking GDP. Wages have also been increasing rapidly along with output prices at an unusual high rate, proving that inflation is still lingering in the Eurozone and is unlikely to significantly decrease in the near future. The EUR/USD currency pair ended the week at 1.0939.

United Kingdom BoE speakers

Bank of England's governor Andrew

Bailey spoke on Monday, stating that the possibility of rate cuts is far too early, and that an increase in borrowing costs is still on the table if inflation persists. The speech comes following a second hold in interest rates, after 14 consecutive hikes which led inflation rates to drop from 11 percent in October of 2022, to 4.6 percent in October of 2023. However, policy makers remain cautious regarding their approach in fighting inflation. Additionally, Bailey added that the pressure on incomes due to higher food and energy prices may be the reason for wage demands.

PMIs

The latest PMI news to come out show that the UK has finally left contraction territory and entered expansion territory when it comes to services. The Bank of England's decision to pause interest rate hikes, along with a clear slowdown in headline inflation have helped support business activity. The services PMI was strengthened by corporate budgets for technology as well as general spending on essential

Every industry should be held 'responsible and accountable' on climate: COP28 president

Private sector engagement was essential to curb global heating

PARIS: The president of a pivotal UN climate ers for the poorer nations most vulnerable to summit defended on Saturday the large presence of industry representatives at the negotiations, saying private sector engagement was essential to curb global heating.

"Everyone needs to be part of this process and everyone needs to be held responsible and everyone needs to be held accountable," COP28 president Sultan Al-Jaber, of the oil-rich United Arab Emirates, told AFP in an interview.

"That includes all industries and in particular heavy emitting industries like aviation, transportation, aluminium, cement, steel, as well as the oil and gas industry," he added. World leaders, country negotiators, activists, lobbyists and figures including Pope Francis will be among the 70,000 attendees expected at COP28 in Dubai from November 30 to December 12, making it the largest United Nations climate change summit ever.

More than 1,000 businesses and philanthropic organization leaders have registered for a two-day forum on December 1-2 on the sidelines of the negotiations between political leaders on preventing the planet's climate tipping unstoppably out of control.

Businesses and industries are to announce a score of commitments at the forum, according to its organizer, Emirati businessman Badr Jafar. National negotiators at COP28 will grapple with a host of flashpoint issues, including the future of fossil fuels — oil, gas and coal — and financial aid from rich pollutaccelerating climate disruption.

But the central focus will be a damning stock-taking of the world's limited progress towards curbing the pollutant greenhouse gas emissions fuelling the climate crisis. Jaber, CEO of UAE state-owned oil giant ADNOC, has consistently stressed his wish to engage the private sector alongside national governments to finance the transition to clean energy and help vulnerable states adapt to their changing climate.

"We also need to encourage private sector funding," he told AFP. "We need to provide the necessary insurance and the hedging mechanisms to protect the private sector, and... incentivize them to come on board and to help fix the climate finance challenge."

US and European parliamentarians have urged the UN to bring in new rules on companies taking part in COP negotiations. Asked about the demand, Jaber said the challenge was so enormous that both nation states and the private sector needed to be involved.

"Everyone must be consulted. Everyone must be given the opportunity to contribute," he said. "I will hold everyone and every industry responsible and accountable for keeping 1.5 within reach." "1.5" refers to the target set by the 2015 Paris Agreement of limiting the rise in the Earth's average temperature to 1.5 degrees Celsius above pre-industrial levels. Scientists have warned that humanity is dangerously close to exceeding that key 1.5C threshold. — AFP

Some farmers in Iraq forced to reduce crops: NGO

BAGHDAD: Sixty percent of farmers surveyed in four provinces of drought-hit Iraq reported having to reduce cultivated areas or water used, an international rights group said Sunday. The Norwegian Refugee Council called on the Iraqi authorities to improve governance of water resources in the country that has been described as one of the most vulnerable to climate change and water scarcity.

"Climate change in Iraq is impeding the economic recovery of communities affected by conflict and precipitating risks of secondary displacement," the NRC said. The survey was conducted in July and August and relied on results from interviewing 1,079 people in Iraq's Anbar, Kirkuk, Nineveh and Salaheddin provinces, 40 percent of whom were women and 94 percent of whom were residents of rural areas.

It said 60 percent of respondents "said they cultivated less land or had to use less water due to extreme drought". "Iraq's climate is changing faster than people can adapt," said Anthony Zielicki, the NRC's interim Iraq director.

"For the 1.2 million still displaced by conflict, and the millions who have returned home, resettled or relocated, recovery from years of conflict is being crippled by extreme drought," he added. Farmers' incomes saw an increase in 2023 due to "higher than estimated rainfall", the NRC said. But that "did not necessarily trans-

Drought, dams force Iraqi farmers to abandon crops. late into greater economic and food security for all farmers across Iraq", with women reporting

higher income insecurity.

Some "15 percent of women reported not earning incomes in 2023, compared to six percent in 2022", the NRC said. Rainfall was moreover concentrated in the south, as opposed to the north in previous years, the report said.

The report comes days before the start of the COP28 climate summit set to be held in the United Arab Emirates this year. Successive years of drought have already displaced tens of thousands from rural areas in Iraq, particularly in the southern provinces that face extreme heat during the summer.

In addition to drought, the authorities blame upstream dams built by Iraq's powerful neighbours Iran and Turkey for dramatically lowering water levels in the Tigris and Euphrates rivers which have irrigated Iraq for millennia.

A study published earlier in November by the World Weather Attribution (WWA) group blamed the "extreme" drought in Iraq, as well as Syria and Iran, on human-caused climate change. — AFP

Oman sees potential for deepening trade ties

MUSCAT: While expressing dissatisfaction with limited trade with Pakistan, Oman Consul General in Karachi Engineer Sami Abdullah Salim Al Khanjari has said although there is potential to enhance ties, not much trade is taking place despite being very close to each other.

'Pakistan has been exporting only rice, mangoes and potatoes to Oman but what about onions, chillies, carrots, lemons and other agricultural products, which can quickly reach Oman in fresh state but, unfortunately, Pakistan is nowhere in exporting all such and many other products, which are being imported from far-flung countries

including China, Vietnam, Australia, New Zealand, Ethiopia and Somalia,' he said. He was exchanging views at a meeting during his visit to the Karachi Chamber of Commerce and Industry (KCCI), according to a statement issued on Saturday. The CG advised the business community of Karachi to explore the export of more fruits, vegetables and other agricultural products so that the existing bilateral trade volume could be improved.


'Pakistani rice being exported to Oman is one of the best in the world whose export needs to be enhanced further. We also not only require frozen meat but also fresh meat,' he said. He was of the opinion that Pakistan's textile and leather products including garments had good potential but those were not being exported to Oman, 'which requires special attention'.

Speaking about investment opportunities in

the Arab nation, the CG said Oman had five ports namely Salalah, Qalhat, Sohar, Duqm and Sultan Qaboos, which were among the best in the Gulf region, where investors from China, Saudi Arabia, the UAE, India and many other countries had made substantial investments.

'Saudi Arabia alone has invested more than \$1 billion while another \$1 billion is on its way. India, which is a little far from Oman as compared to Pakistan, is also making good investment in Oman but Pakistan is not there, despite being closer to us,' he pointed out. 'Why we are unable to improve trade? If it is a visa issue, we are dealing with it.'

KCCI President Iftikhar Ahmed Sheikh hoped to see the deepening of bilateral relationship and extended full support and cooperation in achieving the common objective of enhancing trade and investment ties. — Agencies

Dragon boat races return to Cambodian capital for water festival

Tens of thousands of spectators thronged the riverfront in the Cambodian capital Phnom Penh Sunday for an annual dragon boat race — the centrepiece of the kingdom's three-day water festival, cancelled during the COVID pandemic. Around 300 boats, their crews dressed in matching bright T-shirts, strained for the win as they dipped their colorful paddles into the Tonle Sap river with the royal palace behind them.

Cambodian King Norodom Sihamoni, Prime Minister Hun Manet, his father Hun Sen and senior government officials looked on as the yearly extravaganza began, with crowds urging the canoes over the final line. Concerts, parades of lantern floats bedecked with colorful neon lights—each representing a government ministry—and fireworks are all part of the three-day festival that will last until Tuesday.

"I am happy that we can meet to celebrate the water festival," 38-year-old rower Hom Phos told AFP. "I am so excited because it is our national festival." The festival was last held in 2019, after which it was halted during the pandemic. "During the COVID pandemic, everyone was worried about it, and we were not happy. But now we are happy again," fellow rower Yorn Vorn, 45, told AFP.

The festival marks the end of the rainy season when the Tonle Sap river, which joins the mighty Mekong River in front of the Royal Palace, reverses flow. Health authorities are also expected to distribute 80,000 condoms and 20,000 packages of lubricants for free to oarsmen and visitors during the festival to raise awareness about HIV and AIDS prevention.

The celebrations turned deadly on the last day of the festival in 2010, when more than 350 people were killed in a stampede on an overcrowded bridge after panic spread over rumors it was about to collapse. Then Prime Minister Hun Sen described the disaster as Cambodia's worst tragedy since the Khmer Rouge's 1975-1979 reign of terror, which killed up to a quarter of the population. — AFP

'Toxic masculinity': Russia targets women behind award-winning play

Pelena Efros has been sending letters to Russian prisons for years, as the head of a volunteer group writing regular dispatches to the country's swelling ranks of political prisoners. But six months ago, she found herself staring down at a note she never imagined writing — a letter to her daughter, jailed over an award-winning play she directed in 2020. Russian authorities arrested Efros' daughter, director and playwright Yevgenia Berkovich, in May on charges of "justifying terrorism".

The offence is punishable by up to seven years in prison. "If they were going to lock anyone up, I thought it would be me for those letters," Efros, 64, told AFP. The case against Berkovich, 38, and fellow playwright Svetlana Petriychuk, 43, stems from their play about Russian women who were recruited into the Islamic State (IS) group and travel to Syria to marry IS fighters before returning to Rus-

sia. Titled, "Finist, the Brave Falcon" after a Russian folk tale, it received two prestigious "Golden Mask" awards in Russia.

But critical acclaim has counted for little since Moscow accelerated its campaign against artists and cultural figures amid its military offensive on Ukraine. Actors, directors, writers and performers have seen their work censored, been fired, forced into exile, or arrested.

Rights groups say the case against Berkovich and Petriychuk is particularly controversial. The charges stem from a linguistic analysis of the play using a fringe research method into extremism and terrorism called "destructology". Dismissed as pseudoscience by its critics, an analysis based on its approach found the play promoted Islamic State and advanced "radical feminism". Lawyers have dismissed the idea as absurd. A justice ministry agency has also rejected that initial interpretation, and prosecutors are seeking to keep both Berkovich and Petriychuk in jail while a new study is completed.

Far from "justifying terrorism", the play is an obvious criticism of the Islamic State and a cautionary tale about young Russian Muslim women recruited to join its ranks, Berkovich and her supporters argue.

Nightmares

Last week, Efros travelled from her home in Saint Petersburg to Moscow for a court hearing on extending her daughter's pre-trial detention. Around 20 of Berkovich's supporters also came, some chanting "we love you" as she was taken into the court in handcuffs. Berkovich urged the judge to let her return home to her two adopted daughters while she awaits trial. "Two sick children were taken from their mother six months ago... It's torture," she said.

Berkovich adopted the two girls, now in their late

teens, four years ago after they had spent most of their lives cycling through Russian orphanages and foster homes. Her younger daughter has recently started having nightmares where she sees her mother dying in prison, a psychologist told the court.

The prosecutors, who appeared unmoved by the testimony, welcomed the court's ruling to extend pre-trial detention until January 10. "Happy New Year," Berkovich shouted from a glass cage in the court after the judge read the ruling. Before being whisked back to jail, Efros approached the glass cage where Berkovich was being held and placed her hand against her daughter's on the other side.

The pair exchanged a "Meow" — the family's codeword for affection, stemming from their shared love of cats. "The judge has no conscience, no power, they are just acting out a pre-planned program," Efros said outside the chamber. Berkovich's lawyer Ksenia Karpinskaya said she could not understand "such cruelty".

'Toxic masculinity'

Berkovich comes from a storied family of activists on both sides. Efros' mother, Nina Katerli was a writer who fought for human rights and against anti-Semitism in the Soviet Union and 1990s. After the hearing and before boarding an overnight train back to Saint Petersburg, Efros shared some of the letters the pair have been sending to each other with AFP. In them, Berkovich gently teases her mother over a sitcom she's started watching. They never say they love each other — "it's not our way," Efros noted — instead using pet nicknames, soft-sounding derivatives of "kot", the Russian word for cat.

The case against her daughter is a sign of Russia targeting "free women" — those who refuse to "know their place is in the kitchen," Efros said. "Toxic masculinity" has flourished in Russia since February 24, 2022, when Moscow sent its troops into Ukraine, she said. "Our country is heading towards a traditional archaic society — a Domostroy — where feminism is of course evil," Efros said, referring to a sixteenth-century domestic Russian code that encouraged men to hit their wives and children. — AFP

GERMAN BIG WAVE SURFER TURNS TO SCIENCE TO TAME THE BREAKERS

ebastian Steudtner already holds the world record for the largest wave ever surfed, but as the giant wave season begins, the German is looking to science and technology to chase a new high. Harnessing the technical prowess of racecar maker Porsche and autoparts specialist Schaeffler, Steudtner is seeking to dwarf his record 26.21-metre (86-foot) wave set at the Portuguese surfers' Mecca of Nazare three years ago.

"With the world record wave I realized I've reached a limit for how fast my board can go," Steudtner told AFP of his last run, involving the wave reaching the equivalent of around eight storeys. "Together with Porsche, we asked ourselves how we could make the board faster and more stable," said the 38-year-old Bavarian. Surfers who increase their speed can take on bigger swells—although it's not just a question of a "need for speed" but a question of safety as well.

"Speed is so important to us because the bigger the wave, the more speed I have to have to get away from it," said Steudtner. "The power of the wave is an absolute force," he said, "like having several buildings pushing you." Steudtner said the pressure of riding the biggest waves means surfers need to know their equipment will allow them to focus on the run itself.

Describing his record-breaking Nazare run in 2020, when he added almost two meters to the previous mark, he said: "I shoot across the wave at 80 kilometers (50 miles) an hour and concentrate 100 percent." "I don't think about the past, the present and the future. "I'm in the flow. I don't have time to think 'wow, this wave is beautiful'."

'A higher level' Steudtner first fell in love with surfing at

the age of nine when boogie boarding in France. With his parents' blessing, Steudtner traded landlocked Bavaria for Hawaii to pursue a career in surfing at the age of 16. He worked on construction sites to earn money, while learning to surf in his own time. "I've made a lot of decisions in my life that nobody understood at the time".

His burning curiosity may have taken him across the world but it has also propelled changes to the sport itself. Technological innovations could take the sport "to a higher level", he said. In order to truly let surfers harness and master the force of the ocean, surf-boards need not only to be faster, but also more stable and manoeuvrable at extreme speeds. Porsche engineers helped develop a new board with an adapted nose, tail and edges to improve the hydrodynamics. Schaeffler developed a friction-reducing coating which helps the board glide through the water.

Through tests in a wind-tunnel simulator, Steudtner was able to see how he should position himself on the board as it handles monster waves. "Through changes to the board and altering Sebastian's stance, we were able to reduce air resistance by 20 percent," said Markus Schmelz, a project manager at Porsche. The innovations "made the board faster and more stable at high speeds".

The new board, colored yellow and black, has since been delivered. Steudtner, who trains daily in the gym to build up his muscle strength, was set for an autumn and winter chasing big waves. Accompanied by a team of almost 30 people, including military doctors, Steudtner said he hopes to "understand the journey of the waves in the ocean". With the power of science and design in tow, the German may be only days away from testing the board on the biggest stage of all.—AFP

Thai authors poised for breakthrough, Hollywood boost

ith a spate of critically lauded novels — one of them picked up by Netflix — a new wave of young Thai authors looks poised to break through on the world stage. Thailand boasts a rich literary tradition, with the 1920s seen as a golden age when writers tackled entrenched social issues, but while modern Thai authors have kept up that legacy, they have struggled to make a splash abroad.

That could be about to change. Pim Wangtechawat's debut novel "The Moon Represents My Heart", released in June, has catapulted her into the small but growing group of Thai authors published internationally — catching the eye of Hollywood star Gemma Chan and Netflix in the process.

And earlier this year, "Welcome Me to the Kingdom" by Mai Nardone was recognized as a New York Times editor's choice, while Pitchaya Sudbanthad's swirling 2019 novel "Bangkok Wakes to Rain" has won rave reviews. Many authors dream of a big-name screen adaptation, and Pim was no different.

"When my agent said that someone read your book, and it was Gemma, I scrveamed," Pim told AFP in a cafe in Bangkok, recalling the moment she learned her novel had been optioned. The English-language sections of Bangkok bookshops sometimes feel dominated by sleazy crime thrillers playing on the Thai capital's reputation for seediness and vice.

Keen to escape those stereotypes, Pim centered her novel on a time-travelling Chinese family in London and Hong Kong. "Crazy Rich Asians" star Chan hailed it as a "beautiful explo-

ration of family, love and loss across the generations", but writing it was a nerve-wracking experience for Pim. "I was very scared at one point because I was like, 'Oh, am I Chinese enough to write this?"" she said.

"And then I think that white authors don't have to question, 'Am I white enough to write this book?" Growing up in Bangkok, Pim — who has the Elvish word for "hope" and Aslan from C.S. Lewis's Narnia books tattooed on her arms — started off reading European works translated into Thai, before later reading them in the original. Part of the reason for the lack of internationally respected Thai authors, she said, was the failure of Thai schools to promote a homegrown "literature culture, writing-reading culture, the way they do in the LIV for example"

in the UK for example".

While authors like Pim — who writes in English — have been published abroad with success, translated Thai novels remain vanishingly few and far between. But one author bucking that trend is Uthis Haemamool, whose latest book "The Fabulist" examines the idea of national identity. Released by Penguin in April, it was his first to be picked up by a foreign publisher, despite his having written multiple award-winning books. — AFP

UK Booker Prize set to name first-time winner

Britain's Booker Prize for fiction will anoint a first-time winner when the 2023 recipient of the prestigious prize is announced at a ceremony in London on Sunday. None of this year's six finalists—two Americans, a Canadian, two Irish and a Kenyan author—have been shortlisted before and only one has previously been longlisted. The prize is one of the world's top literary awards and has propelled to fame countless household names, including past winners Salman Rushdie, Margaret Atwood and Hilary Mantel.

This year's six books offer "terrors, pleasures, joys and consolations", according to organizers, on themes that, among others, touch on grief, immigration and political extremism. The literary prize is open to works of fiction by writers of any nationality, written in English and published in the UK or Ireland between October 1, 2022, and September 30, 2023.

The winner will receive £50,000 (around \$63,000) and a huge boost to their profile. The short-listed novels, announced in September, were chosen from a 13-strong longlist that had been whittled down from an initial 158 works. Among them is Irish author Paul Murray's "The Bee Sting", a tragicomic saga which looks at the role of fate in the travails of one family. Murray was previously longlisted in 2010.

Kenyan writer Chetna Maroo's moving debut novel "Western Lane" about grief and sisterhood follows the story of a teenage girl for whom squash is life. Paul



Lynch's dystopian work "Prophet Song" is set in Dublin as Ireland descends into tyranny. A five-person panel also selected "If I Survive You" by US writer Jonathan Escoffery, which follows a Jamaican family and their chaotic new life in Miami.

He is joined by fellow American author, Paul Harding, whose "This Other Eden"—inspired by historical events—tells the story of Apple Island, an enclave off the US coast where society's misfits flock and build a new home. Canada is represented on the shortlist in the shape of "Study for Obedience" by Sarah Bernstein. The unsettling novel explores the

themes of prejudice and guilt through a suspicious narrator.

Although none of the novelists have won the prize before, some are no stranger to accolades, most notably Harding, who won the 2010 Pulitzer Prize for Fiction for his first novel "Tinkers". Maroo and Escoffery have made the shortlist with their debut novels. Five debut novelists have won the Booker before, the last being Douglas Stuart with "Shuggie Bain" in 2020. The Booker was first awarded in 1969. Last year's winner was Sri Lankan writer Shehan Karunatilaka for "The Seven Moons of Maali Almeida". — AFP


TAIWAN'S GOLDEN HORSE FILM AWARDS SEES RETURN OF CHINESE STARS

ctress Hu Ling on Saturday became the first Chinese film star to walk the red carpet of Taiwan's Golden Horse Awards since 2019, when China boycotted the self-ruled island's biggest awards show over political tensions. Chinese director Huang Ji also attended the ceremony with her Japanese husband Rvuii Otsuka. and the couple won the coveted best feature film for the social drama "Stonewalling" they co-directed.

"After winning the Golden Horse awards, we can go to a wilder world and gallop. I am especially grateful to the Golden Horse," Huang told the crowd. Beijing banned its entertainers from joining Golden Horse, dubbed the Chinese-language Oscars, after a Taiwanese director voiced support for the island's independence in an acceptance speech in 2018.

China claims democratic Taiwan as its own territory and has long blacklisted its stars over any perceived backing for the island's independence. There were no mainland films in the 2019 nomination list and several Hong Kong movies dropped out that year, while big commercial productions were conspicuously absent at both the 2020 and 2021 awards. But on Saturday, the red carpet was graced by Hu, nominated for best actress in the education drama "Carp Leaping Over Dragon's Gate".

Dressed in a shimmering gown holding a pineapple in her hands, she was accompanied by Chinese film director Yan Xiaolin and some of the film's cast. "Our film's (Chinese) name is 'Pineapple' and Taiwan's audiences have told me that pineapple means good luck" in Taiwanese culture, Hu said in a brief televised interview. Hu lost to Taiwan's 12-year-old Au-

drey Lin ("Trouble Girl"), the night's biggest dark horse who became the youngest ever best actress winner in Golden Horse history.

Lin also saw off Hong Kong's Jennifer Yu ("In Broad Daylight") and Chung Suet-ying ("The Lyricist Wannabe"), who both attended Saturday's event. Taiwanese Hsiao Ya-chuan bagged best director for his family drama "Old Fox," while compatriot Wu Kang-ren claimed best actor for playing a mute man in the Malaysian film "Abang Adik."

The award for best documentary short film went to "The Memo," a video diary of the pandemic lockdown made by a filmmaker couple trapped in a small Shanghai apartment. Attendance by the mainland Chinese actors was a departure from previous years.

In 2022, Chinese star Cya Liuv nominated for best actress for Hong Kong crime thriller "Limbo" — gave the ceremony a miss, with no reasons given. Chinese director Huang Shuli collected the best documentary short film award in person last year—a rare appearance by a mainland filmmaker since the fallout. - AFP

Verstappen completes majestic season with record-breaking triumph

Max cruised to a record-increasing 19th win of the year for Red Bull

ABU DHABI: Max Verstappen completed a majestic and record-breaking season in familiar style on Sunday when he cruised to a record-increasing 19th win of the year for Red Bull at an action-packed Abu Dhabi Grand Prix.

The three-time world champion came home 17.993 seconds ahead of Ferrari's Charles Leclerc whose bold drive was not enough for the Italian team to claim the runners-up place in the constructors' championship.

That went, finally, to Mercedes by just three points as although Sergio Perez came home second behind Verstappen on the road he was relegated to fourth with a five-second penalty, for a mid-race clash with McLaren's Lando Norris, which promoted George Russell to third.

Norris was fifth ahead of his McLaren team-mate Oscar Piastri, Aston Martin's Fernando Alonso, Yuki Tsunoda of Alpha Tauri and seven-time champion Lewis Hamilton in the second Mercedes. Verstappen ended the season as the only driver to complete every lap of the season, more than 1000 laps led, and also broke Jim Clark's 1963 record for the highest percentage of laps led in a season.

"An incredible season," said Verstappen, who also paid tribute to retirement-bound Alpha Tauri boss Franz Tost who nurtured his early F1 career. "I felt quite emotional on the in-lap as it's the last time in this car that has given me such a lot.

Russell said: "It was really tense at the end as the tyres were dropping off, but it's a massive relief to bring the car home P3. It means a huge amount to so many people back at the factory." Leclerc, who slowed to allow Perez to pass him in the closing laps, said: "He had a penalty and we had to help him finish in front of George with the five seconds... but, unfortunately, it wasn't enough... It's a shame we finished third.

The race began in hot conditions, with an air temperature of 27 degrees Celsius and the track cooling rapidly as the sun went down and the floodlights blazed on the Yas Marina Circuit. The top 12 cars started on medium compound tyres.

The Dutchman led from pole and fended off three early challenges from Leclerc to open up a one second lead before Drag Reduction System (DRS) was enabled on lap three when Perez swept inside Hamilton for ninth and Norris passed Piastri for third, having already passed Russell.

As the leaders all pitted for hards, Yuki Tsunoda took over on lap 18, giving Alpha Tauri and Tost a memorable moment, only the second time a Japanese driver had led a Formula One race. He stayed there as Verstappen weaved his way back to the front, finally taking control again on lap 23 when Tsunoda pitted, returning in 12th behind Hamilton, who survived an early bump into the rear of Pierre Gasly's Alpine with front wing damage. By lap 30, it was a familiar story. Verstappen led Leclerc by 6.5 seconds with Russell 2.1 behind in third and Norris fourth. Hamilton was eighth and Sainz 14th.

As the second stops began, Norris pitted again on lap 34, taking fresh hards. He re-joined 10th. Mercedes responded, bringing Russell in – and he came out in P9 while Hamilton battled Alonso for ninth and Sainz, on an aggressive strategy, rose to eighth.

As it stood, it was advantage Ferrari again while, at the front, Verstappen came in again on lap 44,

retaining his lead to emerge with a 15-lap cruise to the flag before Hamilton passed Sainz for ninth with 10 laps to go.

It was advantage Mercedes again, but when Rus-

sell was passed by Perez, for third, the 'silver arrows' hopes hung on the five-second penalty the Mexican was given for an earlier clash with Norris as the flag came out for Verstappen. — AFP

Lee wins Australian **PGA Championship** for third DP title

BRISBANE: Min Woo Lee held his nerve after a shaky start to fire a three-under-par 68 and win the Australian PGA Championship by three strokes from Japan's Rikuya Hoshino Sunday, earning a third DP World Tour title. The 25-year-old Australian went into the final day at Royal Queensland Golf Club in Brisbane three clear of Hoshino and mixed five birdies and a spectacular chip-in eagle with four bogeys to seal the win. He carded 20-under for the tournament, building on a successful year in which he won the Macau Open on the Asian Tour last month and earned 2024 playing rights for the US PGA Tour.

But another victory on the DP World Tour had luded him until now having broken through for his first European win at the 2020 Vic Open then claiming the 2021 Scottish Open. "It's unbelievable, I've always thought I could win, it took a while to get over the hump," said Lee, whose sister Minjee Lee is the women's world number five. "But two wins in the last month or so and I'm really proud of my team and myself. I made it interesting for myself early on and through the middle, but I ended up hanging on. "I know Rikuya is a really good player and he kept knocking on the door, but it was exactly same as my last win, just the playing point. I just kept coming," added Lee after his triumph in DP World Tour's 2024 season opener. Six-time Japan Tour winner Hoshino put up a gutsy fight at his first tournament in Australia, hauling in Lee's overnight three-shot advantage by the second hole.

'A lot of fun'

But he couldn't maintain the momentum and ended with a 68 for outright second on a day that saw Chile's Joaquin Niemann, who plays on the Saudi-backed LIV Golf tour, sink a hole-in-one at the par-three fourth. It was the second ace of the tournament after Australian Curtis Luck did the same at the 17th on Friday. Niemann carded 67 to finish fifth, two shots behind Luck in fourth. Fellow LIV Golf player Marc Leishman was third after a best-of-the-day 64 left him four strokes behind Lee. Defending champion and one of LIV Golf's superstars, Cameron Smith, missed the cut. Lee suffered early nerves, over-hitting his approach at the first to open with a bogey then par, while confident playing partner Hoshino drilled consecutive birdies as the Australian's overnight three-shot lead evaporated.

But Lee kept his cool to restore his three-shot advantage by the sixth after two well-taken birdies following aggressive drives, coupled with a bogey from Hoshino. A long-range eagle at the par-five ninth gave Lee a four-stroke cushion as he pumped the air

in celebration to a huge ovation from large galleries. "I would like to congratulate Min Woo on his amazing play," said Hoshino. "This was my first time in Australia and I had a lot of fun playing in front of such big crowds. "I was very sharp and achieved a good result, so I'll do my best to win next week as well," he added, referring to the Australian Open in

N Zealand bank on WCup form ahead of Bangladesh Tests

SYLHET: New Zealand coach Luke Ronchi said Sunday that his side's Cricket World Cup experience in India would help end their barren run in Bangladesh, as they prepare to face the hosts for a two-Test series. New Zealand has largely played on Asian soil this year, with series in Pakistan, India, and Bangladesh in various formats, before they played the World Cup in India over October and November.

The Kiwis put up a credible show at the tournament, losing to hosts India in the semi-final. "It's definitely going to help us," Ronchi told reporters ahead of Tuesday's match at Sylhet. "I think if we'd come straight from green wickets in New Zealand to the Bangladesh wickets, it's a big change," he added. "But for the majority of our group here, they have been in India. They've been at the World Cup.

'They have been practising on different surfaces, slower and turning sort of surfaces. So that hopefully helps us for this Test series." Before travelling to India, New Zealand ended their 15year wait to win a series in Bangladesh, beating the home side 2-0 in the three-

match one-day international series. The Kiwis have not, however, won a Test in Bangladesh since their three-wicket win in Chittagong in 2008. Their next three Tests, including both matches in a 2013 series, ended in a draw. The visitors, who played with just one spinner back in 2013, named a spin-heavy squad for the upcoming series. This time, Mitchell Santner and Ajaz Patel join Ish Sodhi along with two spin all-rounders, Glenn Phillips and Rachin Ravindra.

Ronchi believed spinners from both camps would play a big role. "The quality of spin and pace in both sides is going to be really high," he said. Bangladesh will miss regular captain and experienced spinner Shakib Al Hasan for the series, while pacers Taskin Ahmed and Ebadot Hossain will be out due to injury.

Veteran batsman Tamim Iqbal and opener Liton Das are also not available

for the series due to injury and a family break respectively. "It's challenging to lose that much of experience from any team, especially for Bangladesh," said coach Chandika Hathurusingha.

He said the absences did, however,

offer a chance to test other players. "I think it's exciting, and it's an opportunity for some of the youngsters to make their name," he said. The second Test of the series will be held in Dhaka from December 6-10. — AFP

Root joins Stokes debut for Rajasthan Royals earlier this year, opted in skipping next auction on December 19. year's IPL

NEW DELHI: England batsman Joe Root has pulled out of next year's Indian Premier League, joining his red-ball skipper Ben Stokes in sitting out the glitzy Twenty20 tournament. Root, who had made his IPL out a day before the deadline for franchises to announce their releases and retentions ahead of the

"Joe Root has opted out of IPL 2024. The dressing room will miss you, Rooty," Royals said late Saturday in a post on X, formerly Twitter. Root became the second player from England to opt out of the IPL after Stokes announced his withdrawal last week in order to manage his workload and fitness.

Royals said in a statement on their website that they "respect" Root's decision. "Even in a short span of time, Joe was able to create such a positive impact on the franchise and the players around him," said Kumar Sangakkara, Royals' director of cricket.

"His energy around the group and the experience he brought to the Royals will be missed. We respect his decision totally and wish him success in everything he does." Root was signed up by Royals for his base price of \$121,000 in the IPL auction this year.

He played three games but batted in just one, scoring 10 against Royal Challengers Bangalore in Jaipur. The IPL remains the most popular and lucrative Twenty20 league in the world. — AFP

'Adorable' Kia Havertz ends goal drought to fire Arsenal into top spot

Arsenal's third successive win in all competitions

LONDON: Mikel Arteta saluted "adorable" Kai Havertz after the German sent Arsenal to the top of the Premier League with the last-gasp goal that clinched a 1-0 win at Brentford on Saturday. Havertz was a Champions League final hero for Chelsea in 2021, but he has endured a torrid time since crossing London to join Arsenal in the close-season.

The 24-year-old midfielder finally gave a glimpse of why Arteta splashed out £65 million (\$80 million) to sign him when he headed home in the closing minutes. Havertz's second goal for Arsenal was his first in his last 10 appearances, moving his team one point clear of second placed Manchester City, who were held to a 1-1 draw by third placed Liverpool earlier in the day.

"That is the beautiful thing about life. When you have challenges and you have to overcome them, it makes these moments much better," Arteta said. "That is the reason the people reacted to him like that today. It is because he is adorable and he is a joy to work with. He fully deserves more than anybody to get that win."

Arsenal's third successive win in all competitions proved they have erased the bitter taste of their controversial VAR-aided defeat at Newcastle earlier in November. Arteta's men had already won at the Gtech Community Stadium in the League Cup in September and they left it late before making it

another successful trip to west London. "I love winning and we are top of the table. This is where we have to want to be," Arteta said. "When you have an opportunity to take a bite out of everybody you have to do it. "I was really curious how the team was going to do. Winter has started, it was very cold and it is difficult coming to Brentford. I loved the way the team competed."

With on-loan Arsenal keeper David Raya not eligible to play against his parent club, Aaron Ramsdale made his first league start since September 3. Ramsdale's father recently criticised Arteta's handling of the Arsenal goalkeeping controversy, with the England international surprisingly losing his place to Raya despite recording the second most Premier League clean-sheets last season.

But Arteta's faith in Raya received a boost when Ramsdale, his confidence clearly affected by his spell on the bench, almost gifted Brentford the lead with a horrendous mistake early in the first half.

Trying to play out from the six-yard box after Gabriel's back-pass, Ramsdale panicked under pressure from Yoane Wissa.

Havertz has the last word

Ramsdale missed his kick and the ball rolled to Bryan Mbeumo, whose shot was cleared off the line by Declan Rice before Wissa stabbed the rebound wide. Arteta refused to be drawn on Ramsdale's shaky performance, saying only: "I am really happy with the team and the way the team played and we kept the clean sheet."

After a slow start from Arsenal, they finally showed signs of life when Trossard headed Oleksandr Zinchenko's cross over before Gabriel nodded into the side-netting. Mazzarri wins on return as Napoli go third

MILAN: Walter Mazzarri made a winning return as Napoli coach on Saturday with the champions' hardfought 2-1 victory at Atalanta, while AC Milan held on to third in Serie A after beating Fiorentina 1-0. Eljif Elmas netted the decisive goal 11 minutes from the end at the Gewiss Stadium in Bergamo after Khvicha Kvaratskhelia's headed opener for the away side on the stroke of half-time was levelled by a similar strike from Ademola Lookman.

North Macedonia midfielder Elmas rolled home the winner from substitute Victor Osimhen's pass following Atalanta goalkeeper Marco Carnesecchi's poor clearance, making sure that Napoli stayed fourth. Mazzarri's team are still seven points behind leaders Inter Milan who travel to Turin on Sunday for the weekend's big match at second-placed Juventus. "The team dominated all last season, playing some of the best football in Europe with players who were not used to being in that position," Mazzarri told DAZN.

"There was always going to be some drop-off after that." Mazzarri returned to Napoli last week after Rudi Garcia was sacked, reprising a role he left just over a decade ago after being the man to take southern Italy's biggest club back to the upper echelons of Italian football.

The 62-year-old guided Napoli to the 2012 Italian Cup, beating undefeated league champions Juventus in the final to win the club's first major trophy in over

two decades, and to second in Serie A one year later before leaving for Inter Milan.

Mazzarri will also be boosted by Osimhen recovering from his hamstring injury in time for Wednesday's Champions League trip to Real Madrid. Napoli are second in Group C, five points behind leaders Madrid and four ahead of third-placed Braga, who

"I didn't need to be in charge of Napoli to know that Osimhen is a great striker, I'd already seen him play," said Mazzarri. "I hope he gets back to his best form back as soon as he can."

Napoli were briefly third but Milan moved back above their rivals thanks to Theo Hernandez's penalty in a win in which 15-year-old Francesco Camarda became the youngest ever player to play in Serie A. France full-back Hernandez calmly slotted home from the spot in first-half stoppage time after being brought down by Fabiano Parisi. — AFP

"He was open-minded, forward-thinking, enjoyed life to the full and created a brilliant environment with England that allowed his players to flourish and have one of the most memorable tournaments in England history. — AFP

'Innovative' former **England manager** Venables dies at 80

LONDON: Terry Venables was saluted as an "innovative" and "charming" manager after the charismatic former England, Tottenham and Barcelona boss died aged 80 on Sunday. Venables guided England to the Euro 96 semi-finals, led Barcelona to the 1986 European Cup final and won the 1991 FA Cup with Tottenham during a managerial career that made him one of English football's most admired coaches.

We are totally devastated by the loss of a wonderful husband and father who passed away peacefully yesterday after a long illness," Venables' family said in a statement. "We would ask that privacy be given at this incredibly sad time to allow us to mourn the loss of this lovely man who we were so lucky to have had in our lives.'

Venables' vibrant personality and love of attacking football established him as a firm favourite with



players and fans alike. Gary Lineker, signed by Venables for Barcelona in 1986 and then Tottenham in 1989, encapsulated the feelings of the football world as he paid a heartfelt tribute to his trail-blazing former manager. "Devastated to hear that Terry Venables has died. The best, most innovative coach that I had the privilege and pleasure of playing for," he wrote on social media. "He was much more, though, than just a great manager, he was vibrant, he was

Watkins fires Villa into fourth as Spurs pay tribute to Venables

Tottenham squandered the lead in all three of their defeats

LONDON: Ollie Watkins fired Aston Villa into fourth place in the Premier League as they came from behind to win 2-1 at Tottenham on a day the hosts paid tribute to former boss Terry Venables. Unai Emery's side trailed to Giovani Lo Celso's first goal of the season in the first half in north London.

But Pau Torres equalized just before the break and Watkins' 12th goal this term wrapped up an impressive result for revitalized Villa. Villa moved above Tottenham into fourth, with Ange Postecoglou's team falling two points behind them in fifth after a third successive defeat stalled their early-season momentum. Tottenham have squandered the lead in all three of their defeats, but Postecoglou could point to the injuries that have robbed him of several key players including James Maddison. "The outcome is disappointing but I thought the players did a fantastic job, playing the football we want," Postecoglou said.

"On any other day we win that game. It's fine margins. If we keep playing like that when we get ev-

eryone back we will be a pretty good side." Villa's resilient third away win in their last 11 league games underlined the improvements made by Emery since he replaced the sacked Steven Gerrard last season.

Sitting just two points behind leaders Arsenal, Villa have won four of their last five league games to spark genuine hopes of a top four challenge. "It was an amazing match. Both teams created chances. We were efficient and clinical in our attacking. I enjoyed it but I lost my energy!" Emery said.

"Of course we can get confidence when we are winning matches like today. We are willing to fight. I tell the players 'enjoy our position but we are not content'." As a innovative former manager of England, Barcelona and Tottenham, where he won the FA Cup in 1991, Venables would have appreciated the attacking quality of both teams on the day he passed away aged 80.

With both teams wearing black armbands, a picture of Venables was displayed on each of the big

screens during a minute of applause in celebration of his life before kick-off. Tottenham were on top in the opening stages and Dejan Kulusevski blasted against the post after showing nimble footwork to

prise open the Villa defence.

Postecoglou's men were back on the offensive as Bryan Gil was denied by a fine save from Emiliano Martinez. Their enterprising play reaped a deserved reward in the 22nd minute when Villa could only clear a corner to the edge of the area, where Lo Celso hammered a powerful strike that deflected in off Carlos.

Clinical Watkins

Villa thought they had mustered an immediate response as Watkins glanced his header past Guglielmo Vicario from Lucas Digne's cross. But, after a VAR check of almost three minutes, the goal was disallowed for a tight offside against Watkins. Kulusevski was inches away from doubling Tottenham's lead with a curler before Son Heung-min's goal was chalked off

for another offside. For all their dashing play in attack, Tottenham were vulnerable at the back and Villa took advantage in first half stoppage-time.

Douglas Luiz's free-kick found Torres unmarked 10 yards out and the Spanish defender thumped his header past Vicario, with the goal surviving another extended VAR check. Villa were nearly gifted the lead early in the second half when Vicario allowed Leon Bailey's shot to squirm under him before gratefully grabbing the ball after it rebounded off the post.

Emery's men exposed the flaws in Tottenham's defence again to take the lead in the 61st minute. A neat move climaxed with Watkins playing a one-two with Youri Tielemans to open up the creaky Tottenham rearguard before the England striker guided a clinical finish into the far corner from 12 yards.

Martinez made excellent stops to repel efforts from Brennan Johnson and Pierre-Emile Hojbjerg before Son's strike was disallowed for offside to cap a frustrating afternoon for Tottenham. — AFP

Jaiswal, Kishan help India thrash Australia to go 2-0 up in T20

THIRUVANANTHAPURAM: Opener Yashasvi Jaiswal and Ishan Kishan led India's batting charge to set up a convincing 44-run win over Australia in the second Twenty20 international on Sunday. Jaiswal smashed a 25-ball 53 and fellow left-hander Kishan hit 52 off 32 deliveries to help India to 235-4 after being invited to bat first in Thiruvananthapuram.

Spinner Ravi Bishnoi and fast bowler Prasidh Krishna took three wickets each as the hosts kept Australia down to 191-9 and extend their lead to 2-0 in the five-match series. Batsmen ruled as Jaiswal lay the foundations for India's mammoth total with key contributions from fellow opener Ruturaj Gaikwad, who made 58, and Rinku Singh's unbeaten nine-ball 31.

Jaiswal, who smashed nine fours and two sixes, raced to his fifty in 24 balls but soon fell to fast bowler Nathan Ellis, who got three wickets. Kishan, a wicketkeeper-batsman, raised his fifty with a six off leg-spinner Tanveer Sangha before he got out to Marcus Stoinis.

But the left-handed Rinku finished off the innings with a flurry of boundaries and sixes. In reply, Australia fell to 58-4 including Steve Smith (19), previous-match centurion Josh Inglis (two) and Glenn Maxwell (12) back in the dug-out.

Tim David, who smashed 37, and Stoinis, who hit 45 off 25 balls, attempted to hit back in their partnership of 81 as the two hit six fours and

six sixes between them. Bishnoi broke the stand with his leg-spin to dismiss David who mistimed a hit to long-on.

Stoinis was the next to go as the wheels came off the chase and Krishna got two more to nearly end the batting team's hopes. Skipper Matthew Wade struck an unbeaten 42 off 23 balls to reduce the margin of loss for Australia, who last week lost the opener four days after being crowned champions of the ODI World Cup. The third T20 is on Tuesday in Guwahati. — AFP

Lakers edge Cavs on road, 76ers hold off Thunder

LOS ANGELES: Los Angeles big man Anthony Davis scored 23 of his season-high 32 points in the second half on Saturday as the Lakers earned a third straight NBA road win with a hard-fought 121-115 victory over the Cavaliers in Cleveland.

Davis added 13 rebounds and three blocked shots, helping the Lakers overcome a slow shooting night from superstar LeBron James against his former club, which honored the league's all-time leading scorer with a video tribute in the first quarter. James connected on just eight of 23 shots — one of nine from three-point range — on the way to 22 points in a nip-and-tuck game that featured 16 lead changes and never saw either team push its lead to double digits.

The Cavs' 40-point first quarter saw them up by just five, and they led 71-70 at halftime. Davis's layup—after he rebounded a James miss, put the Lakers up 111-103 with 3:48 to play. The Cavaliers cut the deficit to one with less than two minutes remaining, but James drove for a layup, came up with a steal and threw down a dunk and the Lakers held on.

"We just had to impose our will in the defensive end," Davis said, acknowledging the Lakers benefitted from the second-half absence of Cleveland's Darius Garland, who departed early with a neck injury. But he hailed a "total team win" after seven of the eight Lakers players who took the court scored in double figures. Donovan Mitchell, back after missing four games with a hamstring injury, finished with 22 points and Jarrett Allen added 21 points and 14 rebounds for the Cavs. In Oklahoma City, Philadelphia's NBA Most Valuable Player Joel Embiid scored 35

points and drained six free throws in the final 9.8 seconds to help the 76ers hold off the Thunder 127-123.

Embiid came up just shy of his first triple-double of the season, adding 11 rebounds and nine assists to go with four blocked shots and a steal to help the Sixers end the Thunder's six-game winning streak.

Up by nine with 49 seconds remaining, the Sixers saw their lead cut to 121-118 on rookie center Chet Holmgren's dunk with 11.1 seconds to go.

Embiid made two free throws, and he responded again at the line after Holmgren twice cut the deficit to two points. "Obviously he put the game away," Sixers coach Nick Nurse said of Embiid, but he added that in a league where late charges have become the norm, the Sixers have to finish better.

"Great performance, a lot of good stuff, et cetera," he said. "But as everybody's seeing around the league, there's a lot of wild finishes in the games. We've got to make sure we stay locked in."

Tyrese Maxey scored 28 points and eight rebounds, and Tobias Harris added 16 points for Philadelphia. Holmgren delivered another impressive performance, leading the Thunder with 33 points to go with six rebounds and three blocked shots.

Shai Gilgeous-Alexander scored 31 for the Thunder and guard Josh Giddey finished with 10 points seven rebounds and eight assists. Giddey started despite an investigation by the NBA into an accusation that surfaced on social media that he had an improper relationship with an underage girl.

er relationship with an underage girl.

The 21-year-old Australian player has declined to comment on the matter, while Thunder coach Mark Daigneault said Friday that it was now "a league matter." In other games, the Brooklyn Nets snapped a three-game losing streak with a 112-97 victory over the short-handed Miami Heat. Mikal Bridges scored 24 points and Cam Johnson added 19 points and 10 rebounds for the Nets, who had all five starters score in double figures. — AFP
