

KUWAIT: The interior ministry announced that physical driving licenses will stop being issued for expatriates from Dec 10, 2023, and that the digital license through the Kuwait Mobile ID app will solely be used. The license will be valid for one year and can be renewed through the Sahel app or on the ministry's website. The move comes on the instructions of Interior Minister Sheikh Talal Al-Khaled Al-Sabah, the ministry said in a statement. Domestic drivers on article 20 visas and international cargo truck drivers are exempt from the digital-only license condition, the ministry said. The license's validity can be checked on the Mobile ID app, the ministry said, explaining the green color indicates that the license is valid while red indicates that it is invalid, requiring renewal through the Sahel app or withdrawal according to traffic laws, with the license holder required to visit the General Traffic Department.

The ministry clarified that when traveling outside Kuwait, expats must use driving licenses issued by their respective countries. It added these steps are part of the

ongoing digital transformation process at the interior ministry, aiming to facilitate and simplify procedures, reduce paperwork and save public funds.

Meanwhile, the National Assembly's legal and legislative committee on Sunday voted to approve a draft law to reform the election system by introducing for the first time a party-like lists system and also abolishing the controversial single-vote system. Under the new system, candidates are allowed to contest the elections based on lists - groups - that must include between four and six candidates. In addition, candidates can still run on their own as individuals, head of the committee MP Mohannad Al-Sayer said.

Under the new system, every Kuwaiti voter can cast two votes — one must go to one of the lists and the other can be given to another list or to an individual candidate. This system will abolish the single-vote system, which allows voters to cast just one vote. This system was introduced unilaterally by the government about a decade ago and triggered political disputes. Kuwait will remain divided into five electoral districts and each will elect 10 MPs. MP Saud Al-Asfour, writing on his X account, said he supports the draft law but criticized the failure of the committee to discuss other proposals to redistribute voters in the constituencies to have a fair distribution of voters in the five constituencies.

Member of the panel, MP Abdulkarim Al-Kandari, said proposals calling for the redistribution of voters among electoral constituencies have been delayed to prevent disputes among lawmakers. Under the present distribution system, the fifth and fourth constituencies, with mainly tribal voters, have almost 60 percent of the voters but still elect only 20 of the 50 seats, whereas the remaining three constituencies have just over 40 percent of the voters but elect as many as 30 lawmakers. MP Asfour called the distribution of the voters as "unfair". Kandari said this matter will be left for the election commission to settle.

MP Osama Al-Shaheen described the new system as a "major leap" for democratic reform in the way to implement a full parliamentary system in Kuwait. The draft law is scheduled to be debated by the National Assembly on Dec 19.

Raise your hand if you support genocide

t's time to invoke article 377... The UN .Security Council resolution to demand a ceasefire in Gaza fails after a veto by the US. Thirteen other members voted in favor of the resolution put forward by the United Arab Emirates.

This was put forward after UN Secretary General Antonio Guterres formally warned the 15 members of the global threat from the two-month war.

Saudi, Iraq stand firm as COP28 targets fossil fuels

DUBAI: Oil producers Saudi Arabia and Iraq stood their ground at UN climate talks on Sunday as they faced pressure to drop their opposition to a phaseout of fossil fuels at COP28 in Dubai. With less than 48 hours left before the conference's official end, COP28 president Sultan Al-Jaber invited ministers to give their views in a "majlis" — a traditional Gulf Arab meeting held in a circle.

While Jaber called the gathering in an effort to produce a compromise, warning that "failure is not an option", countries held firm in their positions. The European Union and members of Pacific islands states threatened by rising seas reiterated their calls for Continued on Page 6



Hamas warns Zionists to free **Palestinians**

GAZA: Hamas warned Sunday that no captives would leave Gaza alive unless its demands for prisoner releases are met, while the World Health Organization said the territory's health system is collapsing after more than two months of war. Hamas launched the deadliest-ever attack on the Zionist entity on Oct 7 in which it killed some 1,200 people and took around 240 captives back to Gaza.

The Zionist entity has responded with a relentless military offensive that has reduced much of Gaza to rubble and killed at least 17,997 people, mostly women and children. As aid groups warn the territory is on the brink of being overwhelmed by disease and starvation, the head of the United Nations decried a divided and "paralyzed" Security Council for failing to agree on a ceasefire.

"Gaza's health system is on its knees and collapsing," said World Health Organization chief Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus, with only 14 of 36 hospitals functioning at any capacity. The United Nations estimates that 1.9 million of Gaza's 2.4 million people

Self-education



s time progresses, the landscape of education evolves. In the past, education heavily relied on teachers at all levels. Dr Hajeri highlighted an open awareness day for the public on Saturday from 5:00 to 9:00 pm at Grand Hyatt Hotel, offering various tests, including blood cholesterol and sugar levels and blood pressure checks.

Political movements set aside differences for Palestinian cause

Conference sheds light on the ongoing Zionist massacres

KUWAIT: Despite political differences, the Democratic Forum and the Constitutional Movement (Hadas) joined forces on Saturday during a conference focused on the Palestinian cause. The conference shed light on the ongoing Zionist massacres in occupied Palestine, specifically in Gaza, where over 17,000 civilians have been killed to date.



The discussion concluded with Sondos Hussein from the Eithar Volunteering Team highlighting the available legal awareness tools to assist victims of violence and harassment in their "Thoub" (Cloak) application, which was launched last year.

Dr Otaibi explained that the campaign aims to break down the fear barrier preventing youth from consulting doctors when experiencing unusual symptoms, as the fear of a cancer diagnosis delays treatment and hinders early detection, impacting the rate of recovery.

Dr Maha Burisli, a member of the "I Want to Learn" society, noted that 10-16 children out of every 100,000 are diagnosed with cancer. She highlighted the various treatment methods available in Kuwait for childhood cancer, including chemotherapy, radiation, surgery, immunodrugs, targeted treatment, bone marrow transplant and other modern approaches. The recovery rates for this disease range from 85 to 90 percent, with efforts aimed at achieving a 100 percent recovery rate.

Meanwhile, the National Council for Culture, Arts and Letters (NCCAL), in coordination with Sarah Khalaf, participated in an exhibition held alongside the campaign launch. The exhibition featured works by professional artists symbolizing the love of life, provid-



ing psychological support for cancer patients and empowering them in their fight against the disease.

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Milei sworn in as Argentina braces for economic reforms

Vows to 'dynamite' central bank and replace ailing peso with US dollar

BUENOS AIRES: Javier Milei was sworn in Sunday as Argentina's president, as the country steels itself for harsh spending cuts and economic reforms aimed at curbing rampant inflation. The 53-year-old libertarian economist has vowed there will be no "half-measures" as he tackles decades of overspending, debt and convoluted currency controls in Latin America's third-biggest economy.

"I swear to God and country... to carry out with loyalty and patriotism the position of president of the Argentine nation," he said as he took the oath of office. Thousands of supporters lined the streets outside Congress, waving the country's blue-and-white flag and chanting Milei's rallying cry of "freedom!"

"Perhaps it will take us many years to rebuild the country but maybe this is the beginning of a new era for us," said Javier Lobos, 41, a shopkeeper. "We will be able to work and strive to fulfill our dreams without the burden of suffocating taxes, inflation and the strain of a currency system that is crippling our nation."

The event brings together a diverse handful of world leaders, including Ukraine's President Volodymyr Zelensky and Hungary's nationalist Prime Minister Viktor Orban — the only EU leader who has maintained close ties to Russia. "The Right is rising not only in Europe but all around the world," Orban wrote on social media, sharing a picture of a meeting with his "good friend," Brazil's far-right ex-president Jair Bolsonaro, who is also in town for the ceremony.

Chile's leftist leader Gabriel Boric and the King of Spain Felipe VI are also attending. After taking the oath of office, Milei will give his first speech as president from the steps of Congress. He will later swear in a cabinet of nine ministers — a major slimdown from the current 18. He has said his first set of measures will be presented to Congress in a matter of days.

The chainsaw

Milei's inauguration caps a meteoric rise for the former television panelist who entered politics only two years ago. His rants against the "thieving" establishment fired up voters and drew comparisons to leaders like Bolsonaro and former US president Donald Trump.

With his deliberately disheveled mop of hair and rock star persona, he would wave a powered-up chainsaw at political rallies, vowing to slash public

spending and a bloated cabinet. He vowed to "dynamite" the central bank and replace the ailing peso with the US dollar.

'Lights all flashing red'

Inflation has hit almost 140 percent year-on-year and 40 percent of the population lives in poverty. "Like many of his predecessors, Milei will take office with the warning lights all flashing red," said Benjamin Gedan, director of the Argentina Project at the Washington-based Wilson Center.

But for Argentines, the future is mired in uncertainty over what exactly their new president plans to do. With few lawmakers from his party in Congress the hard reality of politics has set in, and Milei has softened many of his stances and allied with politicians he previously insulted, incorporating some into his cabinet.

Talk of shutting the Central Bank, dollarization and welfare cuts has dissipated. "Milei 2.0 will still face an uphill climb, but he appears to have adopted a more pragmatic agenda and sought the advice of

more experienced political figures," said Gedan. However, with central bank reserves in the red and no credit line Milei is facing "bare cupboards," added the analyst. "His rescue strategy, including a rapid downsizing of the government, will be tough to swallow for a long-suffering population. Either way, the next few months will almost certainly see social and political turmoil."

'Stagflation'

Among the questions hanging over Argentines' heads in the coming days will be whether Milei will devaluate the strictly controlled peso and loosen the currency controls which have birthed a multitude of dollar exchanges.

Economist Victor Beker of the University of Belgrano said the first "litmus test" for Milei will be if he actually halts the money printing by the Central Bank that he has so derided, which funds much of the government's spending.

Milei has warned that it could take between 18 and 24 months to bring the country's inflation under control, warning of months of "stagflation" — rising prices coupled with economic stagnation. For 2023, the International Monetary Fund (IMF) has projected a contraction of 2.5 percent in Argentine GDP. — AFP

Egyptians vote in election to give Sisi third term

CAIRO: Egyptians went to the polls on Sunday in a presidential election overshadowed by war in neighboring Gaza and with little doubt the incumbent Abdel Fattah al-Sisi would secure a third term. In a country gripped by the most severe financial crisis in its recent history — inflation has hovered near 40 percent after the currency lost half its value and drove up the cost of imports — the economy is at the centre of Egyptians' concerns.

Even before the current crisis, about two-thirds of the country's nearly 106 million people were living on or below the poverty line. Voting will take place until Tuesday, between 9:00 am and 9:00 pm (0700-1900 GMT) each day, with the official results announced on December 18.

In front of one Cairo polling station, posters bore messages to "get out and participate" while a DJ played nationalist songs. Some 67 million people are eligible to vote, five million of whom had cast their ballots by 4:30 pm (1430 GMT) on Sunday, accord-

ing to a statement from the National Election Authority. Turnout is expected to be a key indicator of public sentiment in an otherwise uncompetitive election. Last time, it fell six points to 41.5 percent. Casting her ballot in the western Cairo district of Dokki, Asmaa Refaat, a voter in her forties, said she "doesn't know the other candidates".

"Look brown Precident Sici," she said, calling on

"I only know President Sisi," she said, calling on the winner "to change our lives for the better and ease inflation". Annual inflation is at 38.5 percent, with food price rises alone hitting 45.2 percent, official figures showed on Sunday.

Voter Fathi Ali, 79, said he "only asks that the next president ensures full health insurance". Despite Egypt's afflictions, a decade-long crackdown on dissent has eliminated any serious opposition to Sisi. Under his rule, Egypt has jailed thousands of political prisoners.

Egyptians, meanwhile, have paid little attention to election campaigning that has taken place in the shadow of the war between Zionist entity and Palestinian militant group Hamas in Gaza. That conflict has monopolized media and public attention across the Arab world. Talk shows in Egypt — closely tied to the intelligence services and fervent supporters of Sisi — have sought to link the two issues in the incumbent's favor. — AFP

UN chief: Zionists trying to force Gazans into Egypt

WASHINGTON: The head of the United Nations agency for Palestinian refugees has accused Zionist entity of laying the groundwork for the mass expulsion of Gazans into Egypt, an accusation Zionist entity said was "simply not true".

More than two months of deadly war between Zionist entity and Hamas, sparked by the militant group's October 7 attacks, have displaced most of Gaza's population, but Palestinians are largely

barred from leaving the narrow besieged territory. In an opinion piece published on Saturday in the Los Angeles Times, UNRWA chief Philippe Lazzarini pointed to the worsening humanitarian crisis in Gaza and the increasing concentration near the border of displaced civilians who fled the fighting, first in the north and then further south.

"The United Nations and several member states, including the US, have firmly rejected forcibly dis-

placing Gazans out of the Gaza Strip," Lazzarini said. "But the developments we are witnessing point to attempts to move Palestinians into Egypt, regardless of whether they stay there or are resettled elsewhere."

The widespread destruction in the Palestinian territory's north and the resulting displacements were "the first stage of such a scenario", he added, while forcing civilians from the southern city of Khan Yunis closer to the Egyptian border was the next.

"If this path continues, leading to what many are already calling a second Nakba, Gaza will not be a land for Palestinians anymore," Lazzarini said, using the Arabic term for the exodus or forced displacement of 760,000 Palestinians during the war that coincided with Zionist entity's creation in 1948.

Responding to the accusation, a spokesperson for the Zionist defence ministry office responsible for Palestinian civilian affairs said: "There is not, never was and never will be a Zionist plan to move the residents of Gaza to Egypt. This is simply not true." Zionist Intelligence Minister Gila Gamliel said last month that one "option" after the war would be "to promote the voluntary resettlement of Palestinians in Gaza, for humanitarian reasons, outside of the Strip". — AFP

Syria strikes kill six civilians in rebel bastion: Monitor

UN peacekeeping position hit in south Lebanon, no casualties

BEIRUT: Six civilians were killed and 25 others wounded on Saturday in Syrian army bombardment of the country's last major rebel bastion, a war monitor said.

"Regime forces directly targeted residential areas of the city of Idlib," said the Syrian Observatory for Human Rights, adding that industrial areas were also hit, as well as "residential areas in the town of Sarmin" nearby.

Six civilians, "including two children and a woman", were killed in Idlib and Sarmin, while 25 others were wounded in the strikes in various areas of Idlib province, added the Britain-based Observatory. Government forces fired "more than 35 missiles" during the bombardment, it added.

Hayat Tahrir al-Sham (HTS), led by Al-Qaeda's former Syria branch, controls swathes of Idlib province and parts of the neighbouring Aleppo, Hama and Latakia provinces. HTS is considered a terrorist group by Damascus, as well as by the United States and the European Union.

Parts of the rebel bastion have seen fierce fighting in recent days, according to the Observatory. On Friday, it said 11 pro-government forces and five HTS fighters had been killed after the jihadists launched an attack in neighbouring Aleppo province a day earlier.

Late last month, Syrian government bombardment killed nine civilians including six children as they harvested olives in Idlib province, reported the Observatory, which relies on a network of sources inside Syria.

Civil war erupted in Syria after President

Bashar al-Assad crushed peaceful anti-government protests in 2011. The conflict has killed more than half a million people and displaced millions after spiralling into a devastating war involving foreign armies, militias and jihadists. A ceasefire brokered by Russia and Turkey was declared in Idlib after a government offensive in March 2020, but it has been repeatedly violated.

A United Nations peacekeeping position in southern Lebanon was hit on Saturday without causing casualties, the UN force said, adding it was seeking to verify the source of the fire. Lebanon's National News Agency (NNA) reported that a "Zionist Merkava tank" targeted the United Nations Interim Force in Lebanon (UNIFIL) position near the border across from Metula in northern Zionist entity.

A Zionist army spokeswoman said: "We did not aim at UNIFIL, we did not hit a UNIFIL position". UNIFIL spokesman Andrea Tenenti said the force was "verifying" the source of the fire, and said the incident caused "no casualties" but damaged a watchtower at the base.

Since the Zionist-Hamas war began on October 7, the frontier between Lebanon and the Zionist entity has seen intensifying exchanges of fire, mainly between the Zionist army and Shiite Muslim movement Hezbollah, raising fears of a broader conflagration.

More than 120 people have been killed on the Lebanese side since October, mostly Hezbollah fighters but also including more than a dozen civilians, according to an AFP tally. UNIFIL was set up in 1978 to monitor the withdrawal of Zionist forces after they invaded Lebanon in reprisal for a Palestinian attack.

It was bolstered after Hezbollah and the Zionist entity fought a devastating war in 2006, and its roughly 10,000 peacekeepers are tasked with monitoring the ceasefire between the two sides. Since the Hamas-Zionist war began, UNIFIL has said its

headquarters in southern Lebanon has been hit by shelling. Late last month, UNIFIL said the Zionist gunfire hit one of its patrols despite a temporary Hamas-Zionist truce largely quietening the Lebanon-Zionist border at that time. — AFP

Polish parliament speaker becomes viral sensation

WARSAW: As Polish pro-EU parties prepare to take power, a new star has shot to fame: A parliament speaker whose wit has drawn thousands of new followers to the chamber's social media channels. Szymon Holownia is no stranger to a wide audience as a former TV personality who notably hosted the Polish edition of the "Got Talent!" franchise.

The 47-year-old left showbusiness for politics four years ago and now enjoys the spotlight chairing plenary proceedings following his success in the October 15 parliamentary elections. "Ladies and gentlemen, stock up on popcorn... because I suspect there will be a lot of action," Holownia said of the upcoming sitting during one of his now almost daily press conferences.

His quips and comebacks in the plenary have been going viral—including an instance when he corrected a conservative lawmaker for mistakenly calling a colleague a "Jay-Z" instead of a member of Generation Z. On another occasion, as lawmakers heckled him, Holownia retorted saying they were becoming "a tad mono-

thematic". "I encourage you to be more original, to do more intellectual work. Insulting takes skill too," he said, drawing applause from the pro-EU lawmakers.

In the matter of weeks that Holownia has spent as speaker, the parliament's YouTube channel streaming the debates saw its followers surge almost tenfold, from 45,000 to 435,000 subscribed users.

'Like Zelensky'

The sudden rise in popularity of the parliamentary proceedings prompted an unorthodox move by a Warsaw cinema to organise a screening of Monday's confidence vote for the conservative minority government. "We've never done this before," Karolina Fornal, a spokeswoman for Kinoteka told AFP, adding the cinema had already run out of free tickets for the screenings. "We allotted two rooms for the viewings, that means over 500 seats... and we've received around 1,500 requests," Fornal said, adding that the cinema would add parliamentary-themed snacks to its offer that day.

Holownia has been quick to capitalise on his own fame too: he has launched a behindthe-scenes podcast on the ins and outs of parliamentary life—with the first episode hitting nearly a million downloads.

For experts, Holownia's fame as a celebrity-turned-politician follows a familiar pattern. "It's a bit like (Ukrainian President Volodymyr) Zelensky and how he made a

name for himself. Holownia also stood out because he had the experience, he knew how media work," said Adam Szynol, a media analyst from the University of Wroclaw. "He knows that he has to speak briefly, that he needs a punchline or a joke from time to time," Szynol said.

But Holownia's flashy style has also drawn criticism—notably from the current conservative prime minister. "Instead of real work we have the popcorn, a show and circuses. Is this what politics is about?" Mateusz Morawiecki said in a post on social media.

Szynol conceded there was a risk that young people are watching parliament sittings "just for fun, to see who landed a heavier blow or came up with a meme". But he said an increased interest among a generation that often switches off from politics should not be dismissed. — AFP

France detains 80 in largest child sex crime swoop

PARIS: Around 80 men, including a local councillor and two schoolteachers, were detained this week in France's most far-reaching swoop on suspected child sex abusers, police sources said. Police made arrests in 53 of France's 101 departments, Commissioner Quentin Bevan told AFP on Saturday.

The men arrested, whose ages range from around 30 to over 60, come from a wide range of backgrounds, from an elected official to a person on the dole. "There is no typical profile in child sex crime. It's found in all walks of life," Bevan said. He heads the operational unit of the Office for Minors within the judicial police, which coordinated the operation. The "unprecedented" swoop focused on professions where adults were in regular contact with children, the commissioner explained.

That enabled them to detain, among others, two teachers, several sports coaches and a monitor in a centre for disabled children. One of the teachers possessed "photos and videos stolen from his pupils" and is suspected of sexually assaulting at least one of them, Bevan said. Around a dozen others are

suspected of raping or sexually abusing minors. The monitor in the centre for the disabled had been convicted of rape "several decades ago" but had been permitted to change his identity, which enabled him to have contact with children again, Bevan said.

"Online child sex abuse is not just about lone individuals trawling the internet... (Some) have gone on to commit crimes in real life or are on the verge of doing so," he added. "We're not just talking about virtual images," Martine Brousse, head of the Voice of the Child organisation, told BFM television.

"Vulnerable children have been raped and many have suffered acts of torture and barbarity." Police searches uncovered "more than 100,000" videos and photos on computers or hard drives. Some were "extremely violent" and included "sexual acts on babies or children being sexually abused by animals", Bevan said. "It's the worst kind of vile," he said. All the suspects admitted the facts presented to them while in police custody, although some tried to downplay them or deny responsibility. — AFP

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a phaseout of fossil fuels. Saudi Arabia, the world's top oil exporter, has voiced its opposition to any phaseout or phasedown of fossil fuels and OPEC has urged its members to block any such language at COP28.

A Saudi official told the COP28 majlis that Riyadh's "perspectives and concerns" must be taken into account. "The politically backed points about targeting specific energy sectors, it's something that we have heard at many different discussions and many different settings, but in each and every time, science, common sense, principles prevailed," he added.

An Iraqi representative was more direct, saying his country was against any "mention (of) global sectorial targets" including a phase-out or phase-down of fossil fuels. Veteran climate campaigners and negotiators say the world has never been so close to a deal on winding down oil, gas and coal in nearly 30 years of COP summits. Jaber, the head of the national oil company of the United Arab Emirates, has said himself that action on fossil fuels must be part of any deal at COP28.

After the majlis, EU climate commissioner Wopke Hoekstra said there was "a majority, some would say a supermajority, of countries here present who want to push forward for more ambition". Hoekstra then headed to the Saudi pavilion as negotiations continued. Speaking about the Saudi and Iraqi statements, German cli-

mate negotiator Jennifer Morgan said: "They obviously felt they needed to engage, whether it was a bit of panic, whether it was a bit of realization of how far the discussions are." Chinese climate envoy Xie Zhenhua said Saturday his team was working with other countries to find a deal on fossil fuels that is "acceptable to all parties". Observers said Saudi Arabia was slowing down negotiations on other issues at COP28 in efforts to rally developing countries to join their opposition to a phaseout.

Scientists say the world must end its use of fossil fuels, which are responsible for the bulk of greenhouse gas emissions, if it is to limit warming to 1.5 degrees Celsius and avoid the most catastrophic climate scenarios. A third draft of a deal, released on Friday, offers various ways to phase out fossil fuels but also includes the option to avoid the issue entirely. A new text is expected on Monday.

Developing countries say they cannot be expected to move at the same pace as developed nations that owe their wealth to the burning of oil, gas and coal. At the majlis, China's representative said climate action was a "marathon, not a sprint". He said developed nations are ahead of the pack and should help developing countries by providing the funds needed for their energy transitions. Bolivia denounced the "hypocrisy" of countries that press the developing world on climate change while expanding their own production of fossil fuels. He named the United States, Canada, Norway and Australia. Standing in the middle of the circle, Jaber closed the meeting by urging countries to make the event be known as a "change-makers majlis". "We are now in the endgame," he said. "To deliver the very balanced, ambitious outcome we need, we need you to act as the change-makers." — AFP

Houthis warn ships headed to Zionist entity

SANAA: Yemen's Iran-backed Houthi rebels threatened on Saturday to attack any vessels heading to Zionist ports unless food and medicine were allowed into the besieged Gaza Strip. The latest warning comes amid heightened tensions in the Red Sea and surrounding waters following a series of maritime attacks by Houthi rebels since the start of the Zionist-Hamas war on Oct 7.

have been displaced — roughly half of them children — many forced south and running out of safe places to go. "We have been stuck here for 18 days. Whenever I want to go somewhere, we hear bombing and shelling and feel scared and go back," said Noura Al-Sayed Hassan, trapped in Rafah despite having an Egyptian passport. "I've been searching for bread for my daughter for over a week now." The UN humanitarian agency OCHA said only 100 aid trucks entered Gaza via the Rafah crossing with Egypt on Saturday, well below the pre-war average. "The restrictions and challenges being placed on the delivery of lifesaving aid... are another death sentence for children."

Hamas said Sunday that the Zionist entity had launched "very violent raids" targeting the biggest southern city of Khan Yunis and the road linking it to Rafah near the border with Egypt. "Neither the fascist enemy and its arrogant leadership... nor its supporters... can take their prisoners alive without an exchange and negotiation and meeting the demands of the resistance," Hamas spokesman Abu Obeida said in a televised broadcast.

There are still 137 captives held in Gaza, according to the Zionist entity. Activists say around 7,000 Palestinians are

Hamas welcomed the rebels' "courageous and bold" decision. "We call on Arab and Muslim countries to use all their capabilities, based on their historical responsibilities and in the spirit of chivalry, to lift the siege of Gaza," it added in a statement sent to AFP. The Zionist entity's national security adviser, Tzachi Hanegbi, said his country would not accept the "naval siege", noting Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu had asked US President Joe Biden and European leaders to take measures to address the situation. "If the world will not take care of it," Hanegbi warned on the Zionist entity's Channel 12 television, "we will take action to remove the naval siege."

The French military said Sunday that one of its frigates shot down two drones in the Red Sea that were heading towards it from Yemen's coast. "The interception and destruction of these two identified threats" were carried out late Saturday by the frigate Languedoc, which operates in the Red Sea, the general staff said in a press release. The interceptions occurred at 2030 GMT and 2230 GMT, it added, and were 110 km from the Yemeni coast. — AFP

detained in Zionist jails, and senior Hamas official Bassem Neim said in late November that the movement was "ready to release all soldiers in exchange for all our prisoners".

On Sunday a source close to Hamas and Islamic Jihad told AFP both groups were engaged in "fierce clashes" with Zionist forces near Khan Yunis, where an AFP journalist also reported heavy strikes, as well as Jabalia and Gaza City's Shejaiya district in the north. The Zionist army says 98 soldiers have died in the Gaza campaign and around 600 wounded have been evacuated.

UN Secretary-General Antonio Guterres said the Security Council's "authority and credibility were severely undermined", after the United States on Friday blocked a ceasefire resolution. "I can promise, I will not give up," Guterres told Qatar's Doha Forum. Qatar said it was still working on a fresh truce, but that the Zionist entity's relentless bombardment was "narrowing the window" for success.

The Gulf emirate, where Hamas' top leadership is based, was a key mediator for a seven-day truce last month that saw 80 Zionist captives exchanged for 240 Palestinian prisoners and humanitarian aid. The head of the UN agency for Palestinian refugees (UNRWA) voiced alarm over what he feared would be a mass expulsion of Palestinians into Egypt. In an opinion piece Saturday in the Los Angeles Times, UNRWA chief Philippe Lazzarini said "the developments we are witnessing point to attempts to move Palestinians into Egypt". The fighting in Gaza has sparked protests around the world, with pro-Palestinian protests in Morocco and Turkey on Sunday. — AFP

Hong Kong holds first 'patriots only' district council election

Five arrested on Sunday, including three activists and a couple

HONG KONG: Polls opened in Hong Kong's first "patriots only" district council election on Sunday, with officials dismissing concerns of potentially low turnout in a race that has shut out all opposition candidates after a national security crackdown. The previous election was held at the peak of the huge, sometimes violent, democracy protests in 2019, and recorded a historic-high 71 percent turnout—delivering a landslide victory for the pro-democracy camp.

As part of the widespread clampdown on political opposition—aided by a national security law imposed in 2020 by Beijing—the city authorities overhauled the councils' composition earlier this year. Authorities have attempted to drum up enthusiasm for the election, covering the city with posters urging Hong Kongers to participate, but on Sunday morning, polling booths appeared to have few voters in the wealthy Mid-Levels area.

"It must be the patriots ruling Hong Kong—this is our principle," said a civil engineer surnamed Lee, a lone early voter, adding "the election wouldn't be affected just because some (candidates) can't be part of it". According to new rules announced in May, seats for direct election were slashed from 462 to 88. with the other 382 seats controlled by the city leader, government loyalists and rural landlords. Candidates were required to seek nominations from three government-appointed committees, which effectively shut out all pro-democracy parties. Over 70 percent of the candidates nominated to run for directly elected seats were members of those committees.

City leader John Lee said this year's election was "the last piece of the puzzle to implement the principle of patriots ruling Hong Kong", referring to a doctrine Beijing imposed on the financial hub to weed out from public office anyone deemed politically disloyal after the 2019 protests. "From now on, the district councils would no longer be what they were in the past—which was a platform to destruct and reject the government's administration, to promote Hong Kong independence and to endanger national security, Lee said after he cast his ballot on Sunday.

West Africa leaders meet as region struggles with coups

ABUJA: West African leaders met on Sunday for talks with the region in deepening crisis, after four countries fell under military rule and with risks growing from Sahel jihadist conflicts. After coups in Mali, Burkina Faso, Guinea and Niger since 2020, the Economic Community of West African States bloc also saw member states Sierra Leone and Guinea-Bissau claim attempted coups in recent weeks.

A French military withdrawal from the Sahel the region along the Sahara desert across Africa—is increasing concerns over conflicts spreading south to Gulf of Guinea states Ghana, Togo, Benin and Ivory Coast.

"These military coups are not only based on fake narrative and false justifications; they are also a driver of insecurity in the region," ECOW-AS commission president Omar Touray said in a meeting before the summit. ECOWAS leaders will meet in Nigeria's capital Abuja for an ordinary summit where they will discuss delayed transitions back to civilian rule for Mali, Burkina Faso, Guinea and Niger.

Nigeria's President Bola Ahmed Tinubu is current chair of ECOWAS and US Assistant Secretary of State for African Affairs Molly Phee will also be at the meeting to discuss how to support Niger's return to democratic rule and Sahel security. Niger—a key Western partner in the fight against Sahel militants—has demanded French troops based there leave, while the US still has military personnel in the country. ECOWAS members have imposed tough economic sanctions on the military regime in Niger, whose troops ousted President Mohamed Bazoum in July.

Mediator

ECOWAS has demanded Bazoum's immediate return to the presidency, but the military junta has kept him in detention and says it may need up to three years for a return to civilian rule. Earlier this month, Nigeria said it was asking the Niger regime to free Bazoum and allow him to fly to a third country, as a step to opening talks on lifting sanctions.

But Niger's military leaders rejected that option and have asked Togo's President Faure Gnassingbe to act as a mediator. Before Sunday's ECOWAS meeting, Niger's military leader General Abdourahamane Tiani visited Togo on Friday with some of his ministers.

ECOWAS has also left on the table the last option of a military intervention in Niger though analysts say that appears increasingly unlikely. Transitions back to democracy and elections have also been stalled or left uncertain in Mali, Burkina Faso and Guinea.

After French troops began leaving the region, military regimes in Niger, Mali and Burkina, struggling with jihadist violence, hardened their positions and joined forces in an Alliance of Sahel States. Last month, armed attackers stormed military posts, prisons and police stations in another ECOWAS member Sierra Leone, in what the government called a coup attempt that killed 21 people. A week later Guinea-Bissau also denounced an attempted coup, with fighting between the national guard and special forces of the presidential guard. – AFP

'One-sided'

The councillors for Hong Kong's 18 districts handle mostly local-level issues—like sanitation, transport routes, or the adequacy of public facilities. But after Sunday's election, they will "behave as local consultative bodies in name, and as the government's echo chamber in practice", said Kenneth Chan, a political scientist at the Hong Kong Baptist University

"This is about achieving 100 percent political control above all," he told AFP. Senior officials have rejected concerns about potentially low voter participation, with Erick Tsang, the constitutional affairs minister overseeing the election, saying that "the turnout rate cannot be an indicator of the (new) system's success".

Some residents expressed apathy about the exercise on the eve of the election. "What's the point of voting? The political atmosphere is one-sided," said a resident surnamed Ng. More than 12,000 police officers were deployed across the city to prevent disturbances in the election, according to local media.

Five people were arrested on Sunday, including three activists and a couple, one of whom worked for the government. The League of Social Democrats one of the city's last remaining opposition groupssaid it planned to stage a protest and that three of its members were followed from home and arrested by the police in the city's Central District.

Police said the trio were "attempting to incite others to disrupt district council elections". The League called the arrest "extremely ironic and ridiculous" on an election day that was supposed to reflect various public opinions.

Hong Kong's Independent Commission Against Corruption said it had arrested a couple for allegedly "leaving a comment" on a social media post which incited people to cast invalid ballots. On Friday, the national security police arrested a 77-year-old man for an "attempt to carry out seditious acts". A 38-yearold man was charged on Tuesday for reposting a video of an overseas commentator that allegedly incited people to boycott the election. – AFP

Over 300 Rohingya refugees stranded on Indonesia beaches

BANDA ACEH: More than 300 Rohingya refugees, mostly women and children, were stranded on the coast of western Indonesia Sunday after being adrift at sea for weeks, the latest in the biggest wave of arrivals since 2015. A group of 180 refugees from the persecuted Myanmar minority arrived by boat at 3:00 am local time (2000 GMT Saturday) on a beach in the Pidie regency of Aceh province. Another boat carrying 135 refugees landed in neighbouring Aceh Besar regency hours later after being adrift at sea for more than a month. The mostly Muslim Rohingya were the target of a 2017 crackdown by Myanmar's military that is the subject of a UN genocide probe. Around a million have fled to Bangladesh, and from there thousands risk their lives each year on long and expensive sea journeys to reach Malaysia or Indonesia.

'We had been in the sea for almost one month and 15 days. [...] We left on November 1st," 24-year-old refugee Muhammad Shohibul Islam told AFP. The refugees gathered on a plantation next to the shore, where they drank water given to them by locals. Some lay on the ground, trying to rest after their journey.

Police found stacks of United Nations refugee cards in a cardboard box brought by the refugees, an AFP journalist saw. "We noticed that some of these refugees have refugee cards. So, let them be re-registered first by the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees and the International Organization for Migration [before we act further]," local police chief Rolly Yuiza Away said by telephone.

Mothers cradle children

The authorities kept the refugees on the shore where they landed, with mothers cradling their children, some of whom were naked, in their arms. The local government in Pidie said earlier it would not take responsibility for providing the refugees with tents, or other basic needs. They said they would not "bear any expenses" and that no shelters were available. Local authorities and residents have been rejecting the Rohingya, threatening to push them back to sea since more than 1,000 arrived last month.

On Wednesday, about 150 protesters in Sabang Island in Aceh clashed with police as they called for the Rohingya refugees to be relocated. "We continue to explain the situation to the people and ensure that they will not be burdened with the handling of refugees,' said United Nations refugee agency protection associate Faisal Rahman.—AFP

Five Bangladesh opposition figures die in prison: BNP

DHAKA: Five members of Bangladesh's main opposition party have died in prison in the past two weeks, officials and relatives said Sunday, as thousands took to the streets before next month's general election.

The Bangladesh Nationalist Party (BNP) is boycotting the January 7 vote, leaving the re-election of incumbent Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina a foregone conclusion. The BNP says its entire leadership and more than 20,000 politicians have been arrested over the past five weeks in "an unprecedented crackdown" that followed a massive opposition rally in the capital on October 28.

Police have rejected the BNP's arrest figures, while not disclosing how many opposition activists have been detained. A few thousand BNP supporters, including detainees' family members, gathered Sunday in central Dhaka to demand the activists' release.

Last month, New York-based Human Rights Watch estimated that at least 10,000 opposition supporters had been arrested since the October 28 rally. In the violence that has unfolded since that rally, one police officer and five civilians were killed and nearly 300 buses torched, according to police.

But the BNP and the Jamaat-e-Islami, the largest Islamist party, which was banned last month, said at least 20 people were dead. The BNP has also tallied five deaths in custody among its activists in the past two weeks, party legal chief Kayser Kamal told AFP

"We want a full judicial and impartial investigation into the deaths," he said. "This is serious. "We've learnt that many BNP activists were tortured in police custody after they were arrested as part of the nationwide crackdown," he added.—AFP

COP28 pledges meet only 30% of needed emission cuts: IEA

DUBAI: Pledges made so far at the COP28 climate summit will only reduce energy-related greenhouse gas emissions by 30 percent of what is needed by 2030, the International Energy Agency said Sunday. "While the pledges are positive steps forward in tackling the energy sector's greenhouse gas emissions, they would not be nearly enough to move the world onto a path to reaching international climate targets, in particular the goal of limiting global warming to 1.5 degrees Celsius," it said in a report.

The agency released an assessment of non-binding promises made in Dubai by governments and the oil and gas industry—tripling renewable energy and doubling energy efficiency by 2030, as well as

sharp cuts in methane emissions. According to the UN climate body, 130 countries have signed on to the pledge on renewables and energy efficiency. Not signing are China, the world's largest greenhouse gas emitter, as well as fellow developing giant India and major energy exporters Saudi Arabia and Russia. China, however, committed less formally to the goal of tripling renewables in a joint statement with the United

Desperation for the homeless on Los Angeles streets

LOS ANGELES: When Carlos Schmidt beds down on the hard streets of Los Angeles, he has nothing but a backpack and an old blanket, like thousands of other homeless people in one of the richest cities in the world's richest country.

"At nighttime, I just find somewhere quiet like a park or a bus bench, where there's not a lot of chaos," the 37-year-old told AFP. "And I'll try to rest up right there for as long as I can."

Schmidt is one of some 75,500 people living on the streets of Los Angeles and its sprawling suburbs, according to a January survey. The figure is up 70 percent since 2015, in a city where sometimes shocking levels of inequality are on daily display. Impossibly glamorous people swan through the streets

States—which did sign the pledge—after talks in California to prepare for COP28.

Beijing historically has been hesitant to make commitments in such statements that are not officially through the UN framework. The 2015 Paris agreement set an ambition of keeping global warming to no more than 1.5 degrees Celsius above pre-industrial levels to avoid the worst ravages of climate change including rising drought, storms

in top-of-the-range sports cars, hopping from a \$1,000-a-head restaurant to an exclusive nightclub with an eye-watering price list.

On those same streets, men and women huddle against hunger, more than a few of them grappling with untreated addiction or mental health problems. The City of Angels is not alone in California, a state that accounts for around a third of America's known homeless, with significant populations in places including San Francisco, Sacramento and San Diego.

The reasons for homelessness are manifold and compound, and include illness, addiction, famiy breakdown and debt. But a significant factor in the Golden State is its lopsided real estate market, where multi-million dollar homes are surprisingly common—and where median rent for a Los Angeles studio apartment is more than \$1,700 a month.

This is what tipped Schmidt onto the streets two years ago. Unable to make his rent, he slept on a friend's couch until that arrangement fell apart. The \$400 a week he earned in a cleaning job was not enough to keep a roof over his head. After a few weeks in hotels, his savings were gone.

Fed may pause again as inflation closer to target

WASHINGTON: The US Federal Reserve is widely expected to hold interest rates at a 22-year high for a third consecutive meeting on Wednesday as it continues to fight elevated inflation. With the financial markets all but certain that another pause is coming, traders and analysts are now debating how soon the US central bank will start cutting interest rates, and how rapidly it will then do so.

"The given is that there won't be a rate hike," EY Chief Economist Gregory Daco told AFP. "But there's a lot of unknowns as to how the Fed will frame the policy outlook going into next year."

The Fed, which has a dual mandate to lower inflation to its long-term target of two percent while also tackling unemployment, has continued to keep the threat of another rate hike alive.

"It would be premature to conclude with confidence that we have achieved a sufficiently restrictive stance, or to speculate on when policy might ease,' Fed Chair Jerome Powell said recently.

Daco from EY said the Fed is fighting a "battle for optionality" in which policymakers continue to insist that another interest rate hike could happen, "if deemed necessary." This battle is putting the Fed at odds with other central banks like the European Central Bank, whose policymakers have voiced growing support for an end to rate hikes amid a steep decline in inflation.

Recent US economic data point to low unemployment, resilient job creation, positive economic growth and falling inflation. The latest consumer price index (CPI) showed an annual inflation rate of 3.2 percent, down from a pandemic-era peak of 9.1 percent. The string of positive data has raised hopes the Fed will meet its dual mandate without plunging the world's biggest economy into a damaging recession—a rare feat in monetary policy known as a "soft landing." Much rides on the outcome for President Joe Biden who will seek reelection in 2024.

New numbers came out on Friday showing an increase of 199,000 new jobs last month, and Biden told a crowd in Las Vegas that such steady expansion is what "we call a 'sweet spot' that's needed for stable growth and lower inflation, not encouraging the Fed to raise interest rates." In the futures markets, traders have assigned a probability of more than 98 percent that the Fed will sit tight at its next rate decision this week, according to data from CME Group. — AFP

US employment remains resilient; services sector picked up in Nov

Bank of Canada opts to maintain its key interest rate at a 22-year high

KUWAIT: Labor data came in better than expected in the US, with signs of a strong labor market across the board. Nonfarm payrolls rose by 199K in the month, higher than the 185K average estimate of economists. The unemployment rate tightened to 3.7 percent, marking a fourth month low and below forecasts of 3.9 percent. Average hourly earnings rose 0.4 percent from the month prior, matching the high estimates from analysts and creating a troubling sign for the Federal Reserve as they seek to cool inflation and spending. Payrolls and labor demand were expected to start slowing, but this report solidifies the strength of the jobs market and portrays consumers are in a strong position to keep spending.

Treasury yields rose sharply after the figures with the 2-year rate-sensitive yield rising to 4.74 percent its highest level in December. In the futures market, the data deflated bets that the Federal Reserve would ease policy as soon as spring. Odds of a quarter-point cut in March fell, while a full cut is still priced in for May.

Federal Reserve officials are widely expected to keep borrowing costs on hold at the highest level in two decades when they meet this week. Chair Jerome Powell has previously pushed back against growing bets of rate cuts early next year, stressing that policymakers will move cautiously but retain the option to hike again. The solid figures will shift focus to inflation numbers as Fed officials contemplate how long to maintain interest rates at the current 5.25-5.5 percent range. A further cooling of prices would likely help push the central bank toward rate cuts if the job market avoids a more sustained re-acceleration.

Service sector activity rebounds

Amid an increase in business activity, the US services sector picked up last month, surpassing market expectations. The Institute for Supply Management said that its non-manufacturing PMI rose to 52.7 from the 5-month low of 51.8 in October. The rebound was supported by growth in fifteen industries, with transportation and warehous-

BoC cites progress

The Bank of Canada opted to maintain its key interest rate at the 22-year high of 5 percent last week as widely expected, marking the third consecutive meeting of no change. According to the BoC the latest data "suggest the economy is no longer in excess demand", which implies no rate hikes are expected moving forward. The central bank noted it

loosening of the labor market typically coincides with recessions. Inflation decelerated to an annual 3.1 percent in October, and many economists do believe a soft landing is still the base-case scenario for the economy. Nevertheless, key risks facing the country's financial system will be tested. Compared to the US, Canada's highly indebted households carry shorter-duration mortgages that roll over more quickly, representing a major downside risk to the economy.

RBA holds cash rate steady

The Reserve Bank of Australia also opted to keep rates unchanged at its final meeting of 2023, holdsaid. "Holding the cash rate steady at this meeting will allow time to assess the impact of the increases in interest rates on demand, inflation and the labor market."

Following the meeting, swap traders trimmed their bets on another RBA hike, and are currently pricing in less than a 30 percent chance for an increase in the first half of 2024. The RBA has proven to be more careful in its hiking campaign despite core inflation remaining elevated.

Canada expands probe of Asia multi-lateral bank

OTTAWA: Canada is broadening a probe of the Asian Infrastructure Investment Bank and freezing its participation in the multilateral organization indefinitely, the government said Friday. Ottawa had temporarily suspended its involvement in the AIIB in June after a whistleblower asserted that China's ruling party pulls the strings at the bank.

The AIIB, a project pushed by Chinese President Xi Jinping, was launched in 2016 to counter Western dominance of the World Bank and the International Monetary Fund. It has 106 global members, including Australia, Canada, France and Germany. "In consultation with some of our closest international partners, Canada is expanding its review of the AIIB," Deputy Prime Minister Chrystia Freeland said in a statement, adding that its participation in the bank would remain indefinitely suspended. The probe will include an analysis of AIIB investments, as well as its governance and management frameworks, and an assessment of management's response to concerns raised by a former executive.

Bob Pickard, a Canadian who was the bank's communications chief, resigned in June and alleged that the organization is dominated by members of the Chinese Communist Party and primarily funds projects of interest to Beijing. Ottawa said it has raised those concerns with Australia, Britain, Germany and Sweden on the sidelines of a recent IMF meeting.



Is Russia's economy out of the woods?

PARIS: As he prepares to run for re-election in 2024, is President Vladimir Putin right to claim the worst is over for the Russian economy? Nearly two years after Moscow's invasion of Ukraine, the Russian economy has demonstrated surprising resilience in the face of an unprecedented avalanche of Western sanctions.

But economists say Russia's wartime economy may be showing signs of overheating, while Western leaders are hoping the sanctions will finally bite. A French diplomatic source expressed hope that the economic penalties would start to be felt in late 2024 or early 2025.

Sanctions "are like a small puncture in a tire. It's not immediate, but it works," another European diplomatic source told AFP. "It's a marathon, not a sprint," said Agathe Demarais, an analyst at the European Council on Foreign Relations.

She said the goal of the penalties was not to trigger the collapse of the world's ninth-largest economy, which could have provoked a global crisis, nor to bring about regime change. "Their aim is to limit the capabilities of the Russian war machine," said Demarais. The EU has imposed 11 rounds of sanctions on Russia since its all-out invasion of Ukraine in February 2022, including hitting its key oil and gas exports. The 12th package of measures, including a ban on the import of Russian diamonds, is currently in the works.

According to official figures, 49 percent of European exports to Russia and 58 percent of Russian imports are under sanctions. Even if Russia has become the most sanctioned country in the world, its economy has been dented but not devastated. Observers say past economic crises and the first set of Western sanctions over the annexation of Crimea in 2014 have taught Putin's economic team how to better manage risks. The Kremlin now plans to increase spending on defense by nearly 70 percent in 2024, a sign Moscow might be hunkering down for a long war in Ukraine. "We have overcome all problems that arose after the sanctions were imposed on us and we have started the next stage of development," Putin announced in October. According to official Russian statistics, the country's gross domestic product grew 5.5 percent in the third quarter of this year, and economic growth is seen at 2 percent next year.

Alexandra Prokopenko, a nonresident scholar at the Carnegie Russia Eurasia Center, said the Russian economy performed well but its performance indicators are misleading. "They are all symptoms of overheating. One-third of growth is driven by military spending so the economy got addicted to the military needle," said Prokopenko, who worked at the Russian central bank between 2019 and early 2022. "Dependence on oil has also increased, and it is stronger now than it was before the war," she told AFP. To help bypass sanctions on oil sales, Russia has created a vast shadow fleet and parallel financial infrastructure. "Russia's main export income still comes from the sale of hydrocarbons," said Prokopenko, pointing to major buyers like China and India.

According to Global Witness, an environmental watchdog, EU imports of Russian liquefied natural gas (LNG) went up by 40 percent in the first seven months of the year, amounting to nearly 5.3 billion euros (\$5.7 billion). Companies in countries including Turkey, the UAE, China and post-Soviet countries like Kazakhstan are involved in schemes to help Moscow circumvent sanctions. — AFP

Markaz hosts seminar on investment

The panel featured Sami Shabshab, Managing Director, Mar-Gulf, the international real estate arm of Markaz, Rasha Othman, EVP – Investment Banking (Capital Markets and Fixed Income) at Markaz; Mohammad Al-Ghannam, SVP – MENA Equities at Markaz; Abdulrazzaq Razooqi, SVP – Advisory and M&A at Markaz; and last but not least, Muaz Al-Ateeqi, VP – MENA Real Estate at Markaz.

Abdulrazzaq Razouqi discussed the volume of mergers and acquisitions transactions in the GCC in general and in Kuwait in specific, indicating the expectations for growth on that front, and the role of sovereign wealth funds in Saudi Arabia and the UAE, explaining the current shift in investors' strategies, and the expectations across various sectors, especially the health sector. Razougi showcased the available opportunities available for companies, to enter new sectors or expand existing sectors through mergers and acquisitions, creating stronger and larger entities. Next, Moath Al-Ateeqi revealed the potential growth rates in the medium term supported by economic factors, and the growth of the residential rental sector in the Class-A Buildings category. He underpinned the increasing opportunities in the Saudi market driven by

the strong government support across all sectors. He highlighted that the Kuwaiti market presents important opportunities with the adoption of the Private Housing Law, and efforts to develop the real estate sector in terms of issuance of new laws, specifically with regard to electronic brokerage and the development of the residential sector.

He concluded with providing advice to the youth encouraging them to follow their aspirations to achieve career success.

'Small minority' blocking COP28: At-risk Vanuatu

DUBAI: A small minority of countries at UN climate talks are blocking a growing consensus to phase out fossil fuels, at-risk Vanuatu's climate change minister told AFP on Sunday. The COP28 meeting in Dubai is at a "critical stage", said Ralph Regenvanu, whose low-lying Pacific nation faces a severe threat from rising sea levels and tropical cyclones.

"The majority here wants fossil-fuel language, language that takes us away from fossil fuels, that indicates a desire for us to move according to the science, according to the 1.5 degree target," Regenvanu said in an interview. "So that is the will of the majority. We need the small minority of countries that is blocking progress to shift the position, and that's what we're working on for the next couple of days." Negotiators from around the world are trying to strike an agreement aimed at keeping global warming below 1.5 degrees Celsius above

pre-industrial levels.

The OPEC oil cartel has called on members to block an emerging declaration that would seek to wind down extraction of the oil, coal and gas that are fuelling the climate emergency.

"The majority of countries now agree to have language on fossil fuels. There's only a few countries that are holding out," said Regenvanu. "And we hope that there will be consideration of the fact that the majority of countries want to see fossil fuel language, phasing out of fossil fuels, and that that can be put into the text," he added. "Because if it isn't in the text, we will not consider this COP a success."

The United Arab Emirates' COP28 president Sultan Al Jaber warned on Saturday that progress was too slow at the talks, which are scheduled to finish on Tuesday. "Today and tomorrow will be critical days to get to the agreement," Regenvanu said. "If it's true that all countries are negotiating in good faith for a

good outcome, we will get a good outcome." Vanuatu has been battered by three tropical cyclones this year, including a category five storm in October that smashed infrastructure such as schools and left some families surviving on relief aid. "We are suffering extreme effects of climate change," Regenvanu said. "The cost of relief and recovery from all these events is more than our national budget already for one year. "So financially we can't cope," he said. "We need to urgently course-correct here because otherwise we have very little future we can offer our kids and our grandkids." — AFP



Tintin comic new edition addresses racism controversy

here has been a mixed response from anti-racism groups over a newly modified version of the Tintin comic books, after it was widely criticized over its colonialist depiction of Africans. "Tintin in the Congo" by Belgian comic strip artist Herge, the second volume of "The Adventures of Tintin", was first published in 1931. The Belgian Congo - comprising most of present-day Republic of Congo — was then a colony of the European country, becoming independent in 1960.



In the comic Tintin, an intrepid reporter, travels to Belgian Congo to report on events there leading to encounters with native people, wild animals and an American diamond-smuggling gangster. Over recent decades, the comic strip has become increasingly controversial, with critics pointing to its racist and colonialist treatment of the local population.

The new edition, launched in November together with two other books in the Tintin series, carries a preface explaining the colonial context of the time. It also contains tweaks to the story. At one point, Tintin teaches an African child mathematics, whereas in

the original he teaches the child that its home nation is Belgium. The cover was also changed from the original. showing Tintin facing off against a lion, whereas before he was sitting with a black child.

"This volume goes back to a time, that is thankfully over, where it was acceptable to consider blacks as inferior," said Patrick Lozes, founder of CRAN, a federation of anti-racism associations. He welcomed the addition of the preface, which he said went "in the right direction".

The preface, written by Philippe Goddin — head of the Friends of Herge association — is mostly concerned with defending the record of Tintin's creator in terms of racism. "He defended himself vigorously against that charge," he wrote. "He happily mocked everybody, whites and blacks." In an interview with AFP Goddin said "there is a thin line between caricature and racism, he did not cross that line".

Pascal Blanchard, a historian of colonialist propaganda, said he was "surprised" that the publishers did not make a special announcement of the changes, and that the new preface was not mentioned on the cover.

He called the preface "highly debatable". Claims that Herge's work had simply been a reflection of his time were "facile and false", he said. Herge himself admitted in 1975 that all he knew about the Belgian Congo was "what people talked about" at the time, saying: "I drew Africans in the pure spirit of paternalism that was prevalent back then."

Herge is considered as one of the leading cartoonists of the 20th century, with a unique style that influenced many artists, including pop artists Andy Warhol and Roy Lichtenstein. Tintin's adventures have been translated into 130 languages, sold 260 million copies and been made into TV shows and a Hollywood film. — AFP



Original Asterix cover for auction despite legal challenge

n original cover painting from the 1963 comic book Asterix and Cleopatre was to go under the hammer on Sunday despite a legal challenge from the artist's daughter. The famous gouache, showing a reclining ancient Egyptian ruler and the two Gaulish heroes Asterix and Obelix was to be sold by the Brussels auction house Millon. Measuring 32 by 17 centimetres, it is expected to fetch between 400,000 and 500,000 euros — but the sale was almost blocked by the daughter of the late French illustrator Albert Uderzo. Sylvie Uderzo argued that if her father had given the painting away he would have signed and dedicated it, and thus the painting must have been stolen.

Millon insists that it is selling the work on behalf of the son of a man who was given it more than 50 years ago by Uderzo, the co-creator of the Asterix series who died in 2020. The daughter lodged a complaint with Belgian prosecutors on November 27 but, according to a letter seen by AFP, they found no grounds to suspect a crime had been

committed. Sylvie Uderzo's lawyer Orly Rezlan had warned that any buyer of the cover painting could be prosecuted for receiving stolen goods, an idea rejected by the auctioneers.

"During his lifetime, Albert Uderzo publicly stated that he would oppose the sale of any drawing that did not include his dedication," the lawyer argued last week. Uderzo, she said, had always said of original plates without dedications that "If you bring one to me, I'll dedicate it to you".

But Arnaud de Partz, director general of Millon Belgium, argued that many other non-dedicated pieces by Uderzo have already been put up for public auction. And the house has produced a photograph in which a man presented as the owner of the drawing shares a meal with Uderzo and his wife at a hotel in Normandy in the late 1960s.

Growing market

"We showed this photo to Sylvie Uderzo to show her that the sellers' father knew her father well," de Partz said. The story Asterix and Cleopatre appeared as a serial in Pilote magazine in 1963 and was bound as the sixth book length adventure in the series in 1965. The cover art parodies the poster for the 1963 Hollywood epic "Cleopatre", then the most expensive ever made, with Uderzo's Cleopatre in the same pose as its star Elizabeth Taylor.

Asterix, the plucky Gaulish hero, stands in for Rex Harrison's Julius Caesar and his portly sidekick Obelix for Richard Burton's Marc Antony. In recent years art from the original editions of beloved French and Belgian comic book successes like Asterix or Tintin has attracted wealthy collectors and investors.

In February, the original 1942 cover art of "Tintin in America" by Belgium's Herge, was sold in Paris for 2.16 million euros. But the estates of the late comic book writers and illustrators fiercely guard the rights to what have become global brands, and several sales have attracted controversy. — AFP

Rent-a-tree firm helps Londoners have a sustainable Christmas

n a crisp, winter's day at a London scout centre, seasoned customers picked their way along muddy rows of Christmas trees in pots labeled with their names while newcomers mulled over which one to rent. "It's a big decision", said one. With a rise in popularity of artificial trees for environmental reasons, Londoners who prefer a real Christmas tree can now be equally sustainable. Instead of throwing away their tree in January they can instead return it - having watered it in its pot over the festive season — to a new rental firm that will look after it until the following year.

"We just say it's 'rent, water, return'. After Christmas, return it and we put it back into the irrigation," said Jonathan Mearns, who runs London

Christmas Tree Rental. Mearns, who in another life was a police officer working in counter-terrorism, started the business in 2017 and now has a loyal band of customers who come

back year after year. The business uses a farm located in the Cotswolds in central England, where the trees are irrigated and looked after before being returned for another Christmas. "It started off as I think what some people would have said was a crazy idea - but it has grown over the years and more and more people are interested in renting a Christmas tree," he told AFP at the centre in Dulwich in south London. "There's big growth, big growth in it. We're not saying we have perfect trees

added. Publishing worker Jess Sacco and doctor Rachel Gordon Boyd, both in their mid-thirties, said the green aspect of renting a tree was appealing.

Cutting waste

"We're trying to be more sustainable in general I guess in our lives... we thought it's just a nice alternative to buying a tree and throwing it away," Sacco said. Mearns says he finds it dispiriting every January to see so many lifeless brown trees abandoned and destined to decompose. "You will see on the streets of London in January or anywhere around the country, there will be lots of cut trees strewn on the roadside.

"Now those trees are dead, once they're cut they're dead, recovering

them is impossible," he said. The entrepreneur and motivational speaker, who says he is on a mission to reduce waste at Christmas, says that a threefoot (one-metre) tree from his company

could be a four-foot tree next year. The idea has tapped into Londoners' concerns about the amount they throw away and adopting a sustainable lifestyle. "Because there's so much waste that goes on with chucking them every year. I wanted to have a real Christmas tree but something more sustainable," said Joe Potter, a 36-year-old policy manager said. "It's something that's on our mind a lot as a family, he added. - AFP

mprisoned Nobel Peace Prize winner Narges Mohammadi denounced Sunday a "tyrannical and anti-women religious" government in Iran, in a speech delivered by her children who accepted the award in her absence. Mohammadi, who has campaigned against the compulsory wearing of the hijab and the death penalty in Iran, has been held since 2021 in Tehran's Evin prison.

Instead, her 17-year-old twins Ali and Kiana, both living in exile in France since 2015, received the award on her behalf, reading a speech she managed to smuggle out of her cell. "I am a Middle Eastern woman, and come from a region which, despite its rich civilization, is now trapped amid war, the fire of terrorism, and extremism," she said in a message that was written "behind the high, cold walls of a prison".

"The Iranian people will dismantle obstruction and despotism through their persistence," Mohammadi said in her speech. "Have no doubt — this is certain," she said. Mohammadi has been arrested and convicted several times in recent decades, and her twin

children have not seen their mother for almost nine years. "Personally I'm rather pessimistic," Kiana Mohammadi told reporters on Saturday, while his brother Ali said he remained "very, very optimistic". The "Woman, Life, Freedom" movement seeks the end of Iran's imposition of a headscarf on all women and an end to the cleric-led government in Tehran.

Empty chair

"I am an Iranian woman, a proud and honorable contributor to civilization, who is currently under the oppression of a despotic religious government," she said. A chair was left symbolically empty at the ceremony, where a portrait of Mohammadi was displayed. Mohammadi is one of the women spearheading the "Woman, Life, Freedom" uprising, which saw months-long protests

across Iran triggered by the death of 22-year-old Mahsa Amini.

Amini, an Iranian Kurdish woman, died on Sept 16, 2022, while being held by Iran's religious police for allegedly breaching the Islamic republic's dress code for women. "The mandatory hijab imposed by the government is neither a religious obligation nor a cultural tradition, but rather a means of maintaining authority and submission throughout society," Mohammadi said in the speech read before the Norwegian royal family and foreign dignitaries.

She said Iran "is fundamentally alienating itself from its people", denouncing government repression, the lack of an independent judicial system, propaganda and censorship, and corruption. Mohammadi is currently carrying out a hunger strike in solidarity with the Baha'i community, according to her family. Representatives of Baha'i, Iran's largest religious minority, say it is the target of targeted discrimination.

In Mandela's footsteps

Mohammadi is the fifth laureate in the more than 120-year history of the Nobel Peace Prize to receive the award while detained. She follows Germany's Carl von Ossietzky, Myanmar's Aung San Suu Kyi, China's Liu Xiaobo and Belarus' Ales Beliatski. "Narges Mohammadi's struggle is also comparable to that of Albert Lutuli, Desmond Tutu and Nelson Mandela, which took place over a period of more than 30 years before the apartheid system in South Africa came to an end," the chair of the Norwegian Nobel Committee, Berit Reiss-Andersen, said in a speech.

Protests in Iran triggered by Amini's death have been severely repressed. The Iran Human Rights group (IHR) says 551 demonstrators, including dozens of women and children, have been killed by security forces, and thousands have been arrested. On Saturday, the lawyer for Amini's family said her parents and brother, who were due to receive the European Parliament's Sakharov Prize for freedom of thought on Amini's behalf at a ceremony on Dec 13, was being prohibited from leaving Iran. The other Nobel prizes, in literature, chemistry, medicine, physics and economics, were awarded later Sunday at ceremonies in Stockholm. - AFP

Fresh start or 'unseemly' stunt? New-look Golden Globes to unveil noms

Ith new owners, a change of TV network and a radically overhauled membership, the Golden Globes will hope for a clean break from years of notoriety as they unveil nominations on Monday for this year's best in film and television. But even as the scandal-wracked show seeks to reclaim its position as the fun, rowdy and celebrity-packed kickstarter to Hollywood's movie awards season, critics warn that its reforms could bring a new batch of ethical problems.

For decades, the Globes were owned, run and voted for by the Hollywood Foreign Press Association (HFPA) - an eclectic group of around 100 entertainment journalists, writing for international outlets, who were often derided in the industry for their alleged amateurism and obscurity. Those criticisms erupted in 2021, when a Los Angeles Times expose revealed the HFPA had no Black members, prompting a Hollywood boycott. The Globes have been scrambling to survive ever since.

In June, the awards were purchased by a group of private investors including US billionaire Todd Boehly, the HFPA itself was disbanded, and a new plan was set out to restore the Globes' luster. Under the deal, the erstwhile HFPA's members were taken on as salaried employees of the new Golden Globes company, essentially now paid to watch movies, vote, and contribute articles for the awards' website.

That has prompted questions about potential conflicts of interest. Muddying the waters further, the awards' new owners include Penske Media — which runs the production company behind the Globes telecast, as well as trade outlets Variety and The Hollywood Reporter — and Eldridge, which has a stake in film studio and regular Globes contender A24.

"There's something unseemly about a Globes voter getting paid to write for the Globes website about an actor that they may end up nominating for a Golden Globe award to be given out on the stage of a show owned by the company they work for," noted a Los Angeles Times editorial this year.

"Will the company executives urge voters to nominate high-profile stars and directors in hopes that they will show up? The new model appears to be one giant public relations machine." But the Globes' new owners have defended the changes.

They argue that paying Holly-wood-based voters a \$75,000 salary ends a flawed ecosystem under which impoverished, often freelance journalists accepted lavish press trips they could not fund themselves, and collected expensive freebies from studios to help make ends meet.

Seeking to improve the awards' credibility and diversity, the group has added more than 200 non-member (and unpaid) voters based around the world, and appointed a new board including respected industry figures such as former Variety editor-in-chief Tim Gray. "Major changes are already underway at the Golden Globes and I think people in Hollywood, and around the world, will be pleased when they see integrity restored while the sense of fun remains," said Gray, now executive vice president of the Golden Globes, in August.

The new-look Golden Globes gala will take place on January 7. CBS will broadcast the event. The network takes over from NBC, and has handed the show a coveted time slot, immediately after the final round of regular-season NFL games. CBS bosses will be hoping for vastly improved ratings, after the 2023 Globes slumped to a new low of just 6.3 million viewers, even as other shows such as the Oscars recovered from pandemic viewership nadirs. — AFP

Funny? Da, da: Russian comic Dan The Stranger's new life in Germany

n a club in Munich, the laughs come easily from the crowd although the jokes from the Russian comic onstage come from the darkest of places. Running to escape the police, struggling with depression and spending a childhood with an alcoholic father are all fair game for Dan The Stranger. The Russian comic with piercing blue eyes left his homeland after death threats when he spoke out against the war in Ukraine. A funeral wreath was even delivered to one of his gigs before he left for Turkey with his wife and their three dogs.

Now the 35-year-old is building a new life in Germany and looking for a new following with a finely honed act of side-splitters delivered in English. "I mostly talk about my trauma," said Dan, who prefers not to give his real name. "And of course if you lived in Russia, you have trauma — you have enough for your whole career," he said with a grin. He is now selling out shows like the one in Munich and has 40,000 followers on Instagram thanks

to his short, deeply wry posts. "Every time my German friends tell stories from their childhood, everyone laughs. Every time I tell stories from my Russian childhood, everyone offers help." Or his morning routines staring at a blank wall for half an hour or checking social media. As soon as wakes he feels the need to "read the opinions of incompetent or simply crazy people on all important issues. Now I am ready to start my day." Meditation doesn't help, he complained in another post, because "it is impossible to relax listening to a meditation in a Russian accent." — AFP

The Pogues singer-songwriter Shane MacGowan given full Irish send-off

he hard-living lead singer of The Pogues, Shane MacGowan, received a rousing Irish send-off with music, song and dancing on Friday, after his death at the age of 65. Stars including Johnny Depp, Bono and Nick Cave joined Ireland's President Michael D. Higgins and former Sinn Fein leader Gerry Adams at a funeral mass in Nenagh, County Tipperary, west of Dublin. Cave performed a version of the Celtic folkpunk band's wistful "A Rainy Night in Soho" in a service that resonated to the sounds of the fiddle, flute and organ, as well as cheers, whistles and applause.

There was dancing in the aisles to a rousing acoustic rendition of his most famous tune, "Fairytale of New York" — a duet from 1987 with the late Kirsty MacColl, which is tipped to be this year's Christmas number one. "Shane would have enjoyed that," his sister Siobhan told St Mary of the Rosary Church, where their mother Therese used to attend Roman Catholic mass every Sunday.

man Catholic mass every Sunday.
Father Pat Gilbert, who led the ceremony on the day the late Irish singer Sinead O'Connor would have been 57, welcomed "the world" to the funeral of a man whom he said, "influenced, encouraged, entertained and touched" everyone he encountered. MacGowan, who died from pneumonia on November 30 after a period of ill health, was "a poet, lyricist, singer, trailblazer" who had a "revolutionary

edge to life", the priest said.

"Pirates of the Caribbean" star Depp, a close friend of the singer-songwriter, referred to MacGowan as "maestro" before reciting a prayer. Another was read by The Boomtown Rats singer and LiveAid founder Bob Geldof. Symbols of MacGowan's life, including a Tipperary flag, a statue of the Virgin Mary, a Led Zeppelin record, a novel by Irish author James Joyce and a hurling stick, were brought to the altar.

'Proud Irishman'

Earlier in the day, thousands lined the streets of Dublin to their pay respects, applauding as MacGowan's wicker coffin was carried the through the city in a horse-drawn carriage. Members of the public turned out in force in the Irish capital and threw flowers while musicians played his best-known songs.

The Pogues fused punk and Irish folk music, with MacGowan, a heavy drinker and drug taker, quickly becoming its figurehead as the band's lead singer and songwriter. His wife, Victoria Mary

Clarke, told the church he used to carry an encyclopedia of pharmacology and consulted it to decide whether to take a drug, and was once found eating a copy

of a Beach Boys album.

"He explored the boundaries of what you can do, while you are still in a physical body. His body lasted a long time considering what he did to it," she said. "He was creating music and lyrics all the time he was doing this." MacGowan, hailed as a genius in the Irish poetic tradition, was born in England but spent much of his childhood in Ireland with his mother's family.

The band became an international symbol of Irishness at home and for the country's sprawling diaspora, with MacGowan's contribution recognized in a slew of tributes from political leaders. Prime Minister Leo Varadkar called MacGowan "an amazing musician and artist" whose songs "beautifully captured the Irish experience, especially the experience of being Irish abroad".

Sinn Fein, the former political wing of the Irish Republican Army paramilitary group that fought for decades against British rule in Northern Ireland, praised his support. The Pogues' 1988 song "Streets of Sorrow/Birmingham Six", which recounted the plight of six Irishmen wrongly imprisoned for deadly pub bombings in Birmingham, was banned from British airwaves.

Sinn Fein president Mary Lou McDonald called MacGowan "a poet, dreamer and social justice champion". "He was a republican and a proud Irishman. Nobody told the Irish story like Shane. He sang to us of dreams and captured stories of emigration," she said. MacGowan, who was due to celebrate his birthday on Christmas Day, was taken for cremation in a private ceremony. — AFP

Haney grabs WBC title

SAN FRANCISCO: Devin Haney wrested the WBC super-lightweight world title from Regis Prograis on Saturday, knocking his opponent down once on the way to a unanimous decision victory in San Francisco. Haney, the former undisputed lightweight world champion stepping up to the 140-pound division for the first time, won by scores of 120-107 from all three judges and said the move up in weight had made a new fighter of him. "A tremendous difference," a victorious Haney told DAZN in the ring at the Chase Center, home of the NBA's Golden State Warriors. "You see it in my performance. I felt so much stronger... 140 got a new king." Haney sent Prograis to the canvas in the third round with one of many devastating combinations. He wobbled Prograis again in the sixth on the way to the dominant victory. Haney, a 24-year-old Bay Area native, improved to 31-0 with 15 knockouts. — AFP

Dramatic win boosts Wydad

JOHANNESBURG: Wydad Casablanca of Morocco clawed back into contention for a CAF Champions League last-eight place after snatching an added-time 1-0 victory over Simba of Tanzania on Saturday. Algerian Zakaria Draoui, a recent signing, scored his first goal in Africa for his new club after 95 minutes in Marrakesh to give the three-time champions a massive boost. Wydad reached four Champions League finals from 2017, winning two, and have been a dominant force in the elite African competition along with Al Ahly of Egypt. But a stunning home defeat against minnows Jwaneng Galaxy of Botswana and an away loss to ASEC Mimosas in the Ivory Coast left them bottom of Group B before tackling Simba. Yahya Jabrane, part of the Morocco squad that reached the 2022 World Cup semi-finals in Qatar and often the inspiration behind Wydad triumphs, missed a first-half penalty. But that wasted chance was forgotten when Draoui slammed a low shot between the legs of goalkeeper Ayoub Lakred after a free-kick. — AFP

Rangers close gap on Celtic

GLASGOW: Rangers manager Philippe Clement said his side showed their team spirit in coming from behind and playing the entire second half down with 10 men in a 3-1 win over Dundee. Clement's side closed the gap on Scottish Premiership leaders Celtic to five points as they remain unbeaten in 12 games under the Belgian. Amadou Bakayoko had fired Dundee into a shock fifth-minute lead. But the home side responded at Ibrox to lead through goals from Cyriel Dessers, James Tavernier and Abdallah Sima before the break. A comfortable afternoon for Rangers looked in store until Jose Cifuentes was sent-off in first half stoppage time after a VAR review upgraded his yellow card to a red. "I see this dressing room growing week-by-week in that way. That is crucial. I know you need a really strong dressing room where everybody fights for one another, where everybody is available for the team," said Clement. "Everyone sees in the last few weeks this team sticking together in every sense. Players coming in, playing out of position and doing a job for the team." — AFP

Toulouse trounce Cardiff

TOULON: Scotland full-back Blair Kinghorn scored two tries on his Toulouse debut as the record five-time winners hammered Cardiff 52-7 in the Champions Cup on Saturday. Kinghorn only arrived at the French club this week after moving from Edinburgh for a hefty transfer fee and took his new side, captained by France scrum-half Antoine Dupont, to the top of Pool 2. Wingers Matthis Lebel and Arthur Retiere, lock Richie Arnold as well as back-rowers Anthony Jelonch and Alban Placines crossed for the Top 14 champions, as they put their rusty league form behind them. Twenty-year-old No 8 Mackenzie Martin scored the Welsh side's only try, making only his third senior appearance, highlighting the lack of experience and spending power at the 1996 finalists. Bath also made a winning start in the group after an impressive 37-14comeback victory over Ulster. — AFP

Odermatt wins slalom opener

VAL-D'ISERE: Marco Odermatt made it a hat-trick of wins in the giant slalom at Val d'Isere on Saturday, while Joan Verdu, in third place, gave Andorra its first podium finish in the competition. Swiss ace Odermatt, who also won the event in 2021 and 2022, notched his 25th World Cup victory as he set the pace in the opening giant slalom of the season. "It's amazing to start the season with another victory here for the third time in a row," said Odermatt. "It's not easy to ski here, but I still love this hill. "It's always a tough race and a difficult hill. At the start, I didn't feel 100 percent, but for me it's always a good hill." The win underlined Odermatt's dominance of the discipline. He is the current Olympic and world champion and has won 13 of 19 giant slalom races over the past two seasons, making the podium in all but one of those. In snowy conditions, he clocked the quickest time on the first run and, despite making a few mistakes, did enough in the second run to finish 0.98 seconds ahead of the Austrian Marco Schwarz. — AFP

LONDON: Leicester consolidated their position on top of the Championship as Stephy Mavididi scored twice in a stylish 4-0 rout of Plymouth on Saturday. Mavididi opened the scoring with a 14th minute penalty before the Foxes netted three times in a blistering seven-minute spell after half-time. Patson Daka doubled Leicester's lead with a clinical strike after 49 minutes and Mavididi lashed in his second goal just three minutes later. Nigeria midfielder Wilfred Ndidi completed the scoring in the 55th minute, finishing in off a post from Daka's pass to ensure the Foxes remain one point

clear at the top of the table.

Ipswich remain second after a 2-0 win at Middlesbrough stepped up their unexpected promotion push. Kieran McKenna's side, who came up from League One last season, went ahead through Conor Chaplin's eighth of the season nine minutes before halftime. Omari Hutchinson's fine finish in the 67th minute sealed Ipswich's third successive victory. Third placed Leeds stayed in touch with the top two after a 2-0 win at Blackburn. Dan James scored for the third game in succession to fire Leeds ahead in the first half.

Crysencio Summerville's cool finish

15 minutes from full-time wrapped up the Yorkshire club's sixth win in their last seven games. An equalizer from Watford substitute Rhys Healey six minutes into stoppage-time salvaged a 1-1 draw against fourth placed Southampton at Vicarage Road. Mike Dodds enjoyed a winning start as interim Sunderland boss after two second-half goals gave the Black Cats to a 2-1 victory against fifth placed West Bromwich Albion. Dan Ballard broke the deadlock at the Stadium of Light in the 69th minute before Dan Neil doubled

Sunderland's lead in the 84th minute. West Brom hit back through Bran-

don Thomas-Asante in the 86th minute but Sunderland held out to end a three-game winless run that triggered Tony Mowbray's sacking on Monday. Anthony Musaba struck a 91st-minute winner as Sheffield Wednesday moved off the bottom of the table with a 1-0 victory at Stoke. Lowly QPR extended their resurgence under Marti Cifuentes with a 2-0 win against Hull as goals from Chris Willock and Ilias Chair made it three consecutive victories. Dimitrios Goutas's 78th minute header earned Cardiff a 1-0 win against struggling Millwall in south Wales. — AFP

World Cup ski races cancelled because of bad weather

VAL-D'ISERE: The men's World Cup slalom in the French resort of Val d'Isere and the women's super-G across the Swiss border in St Moritz were both cancelled on Sunday because of bad weather. It is the seventh men's event to be cancelled this season out of nine scheduled. Marco Odermatt won Saturday's giant slalom before bad weather closed in to wipe out the slalom. "The snow was really good yesterday during the GS and then late afternoon it starts raining," said men's chief race director Markus Waldner.

"And then it turns into wet snow, strong wind also. We went out at two o'clock in the morning. The base was actually gone, not good enough to race anymore. "We tried to set the course and clean a little bit, but it was not safe enough." Prior to Saturday's giant slalom, the only other race to go ahead was a slalom in Gurgl, Austria. The season giant slalom opener in neighbouring Soelden was cancelled, before two downhills in Zermatt-Cervinia (Switzerland/Italy) were also scratched. Last weekend's races at the American resort of Beaver Creek - two downhills and a super-G - were wiped out by heavy snowfall and high winds.

Snow in St Moritz

After two days of speed racing in St Moritz, heavy snowfall on Saturday night made the Corviglia course unsafe for the women's super-G. "It was quite a lot of snow last night," said Peter Gerdol, FIS race director for women. "The minimum was 20 centimeters,

there were some spots where it was over 40. "The snow covered the whole course and the race line that we kept quite clean until last night. This new snow destroyed the base. "It's impossible to get this base hard enough to make a safe race." This event was to be the first women's speed race this season, since the two downhills at Cervinia-Zermatt in mid-November also fell victim to the weather.

Sofia Goggia won the first super-G in St Moritz on Friday in light snow and poor visibility, while Mi-

kaela Shiffrin won the downhill on Saturday, her 91st World Cup victory, under sparkling skies. The American leads the overall women's standings, 195 points ahead of the Italian Federica Brignone while Marco Schwartz leads fellow-Austrian Manuel Feller by 36 points in the men's. The women will try again next weekend in Val d'Isère, also in speed, with a downhill and a super-G while the men resume on Friday with four consecutive days of racing in Val Gardena and Alta Badia in the Italian Dolomites. — AFP

Japanese star Ohtani confirms move to LA

LOS ANGELES: Japanese superstar Shohei Ohtani confirmed on Saturday he is joining the Los Angeles Dodgers in a record-breaking 10-year, \$700 million deal - the richest contract in baseball history. The future of the 29-year-old Los Angeles Angels ace had been the subject of intense speculation since the two-way star entered free agency at the end of the season. Ohtani eventually opted for the Dodgers after a frenzied battle for his signature which also included interest from the Chicago Cubs, Toronto Blue Jays, New York Yankees and San Francisco Giants. "To all the fans and everyone involved in the baseball world, I apologize for taking so long to come to a decision," Ohtani wrote

"I have decided to choose the Dodgers as my next team. "I pledge to always do what's best for the team and always continue to give it my all to be the best version of myself. "Until the last day of my playing career, I want to continue to strive forward not only for the Dodgers but for the baseball

world," Ohtani added. Ohtani's agent Nez Balelo said in a statement the deal would be worth \$700 million over 10 years, shattering the record for the biggest contract in baseball history. Balelo described Ohtani's mammoth payday as a "unique historic contract, for a unique historic player."

"Shohei is thrilled to be a part of the Dodgers organization," Balelo said. "He is excited to begin this partnership." Ohtani has taken Major League Baseball by storm since landing in the league in 2018, with his almost unheard of combination of elite pitching and hitting prowess earning him comparisons to Babe Ruth. Although his talents were not enough to help spark a revival in the Angels' fortunes — the team failed to make the playoffs following his arrival — Ohtani nevertheless dazzled in a flagging franchise.

He has twice been named American League Most Valuable Player, in 2021 and 2023, on both occasions winning by unanimous vote – the only player in history to achieve that distinction. Although elbow injuries have

cut short his pitching appearances – he missed the final month of the 2023 campaign with a torn ulnar collateral ligament in his elbow – this season was his most successful to date. As a designated hitter, Ohtani led the AL in home runs with 44, in on-base percentage (.412), slugging percentage (.654) and total bases (325).

He hit 26 doubles and eight triples with 20 stolen bases and 95 runs-batted-in. He hit over .300 for the first time

in his six-year major league career. In 23 pitching starts he went 10-5 with a 3.14 earned-run-average and 167 strikeouts in 132 innings. He had the lowest batting average against (.184) among all AL pitchers with at least 130 innings. It marked Ohtani's second straight season with at least 10 wins on the mound and 10 home runs at the plate. The only other player to accomplish that feat was New York Yankees legend Ruth back in

Ten Hag blasts 'inconsistent' Man United

MANCHESTER: Erik ten Hag blasted his "inconsistent" Manchester United charges after Bournemouth made history with their first ever victory at Old Trafford on Saturday. Ten Hag's side slumped to an embarrassing 3-0 defeat that underlined the array of problems threatening to ruin United's season. Just three days after beating Chelsea to revive their bid for a top four finish in the Premier League, United reverted to the sloppy form that has plagued them for much of the campaign.

Goals from Dominic Solanke, Philip Billing and Marcos Senesi handed Bournemouth a memorable win as Ten Hag and his players were booed off at full-time. With the pressure mounting on Ten Hag with each defeat in his troubled second season as United boss, the Dutchman slammed his team's lacklustre performance. "Of course, annoyed and disappointed, definitely. I expected something different," Ten Hag said.

"I hoped before the game you can build on the performance and result from Chelsea, so then it's very disappointing. "That (consistency) is of course the question, but I think we have to always be ready for the game, so I have to take the responsibility for that. "I have to prepare my team so that they are ready for the game, so from my point of view I'm very disappointed the way we started so I have to do the things better."

United have now lost 35 home league games since Alex Ferguson retired at the end of the 2012-13 title-winning season. During the iconic 26-year reign of the Scottish manager, United were only beaten in the league at Old Trafford 34 times. Ten Hag shouldered much of the responsibility for United's 11th defeat in all competitions this term. But alarmingly for United fans, the former Ajax boss conceded he did not believe his squad were consistent enough to thrive at the highest level.

'We are not good enough'

"We are really inconsistent. We have the abilities to do it, but you have to do it every game and every third day," he said. "I think as a squad we are not good enough to be consistent and we have to work as a squad to improve that." It was an eye-catching remark at the end of a week that began with reports that some United players had grown unhappy with the manager. Ten Hag denied those claims but, with his team mired in sixth place, he desperately needs some positive results quickly. United host Bayern Munich in the Champions League next week knowing they must win to have any chance of progressing to the last 16.

A trip to in-form Liverpool in the Premier League follows the Bayern clash. "As a group, we have to improve," Ten Hag said. "That's a fact. We have to get tougher, that we are ready for the game and from the start. "I said on Friday, it can't be in this league that you are not playing on the highest levels because you get killed. "That's what happened in the five minutes and then you are following facts and especially against them, such a good transition team, you make life easy for them. They have the perfect conditions to play in. "Then you see the team fighting, battling, put a lot of effort in for a long period to return in the game, but it can't happen that you so easily concede a goal." — AFP

Calhanoglu guides Inter Milan to Serie A top spot

Inter secure comfortable 4-0 home win over Udinese

MILAN: Turkey playmaker Hakan Calhanoglu set up a goal and scored another as Inter Milan moved back to the summit of Serie A with Saturday's comfortable 4-0 home win over Udinese. Inter had dropped to second in the table on Friday after Juventus' 1-0 victory over champions Napoli. At the San Siro, midfielder Calhanoglu converted a penalty before setting up Federico Dimarco and Marcus Thuram scored a third for the 16-time champions before the break.

Argentina's Lautaro Martinez secured all three points with six minutes remaining to keep his spot as the league's top scorer. "It's important to respond to Juve who are behind us, it's not easy to play after them," Martinez said. "I'm proud and I hope to score many, the important thing is to help my teammates. "I care little about who scores, the important thing is to continue like this," he added. Simone Inzaghi's Inter are two points above Juve and remain unbeaten in Serie A and the Champions League since September 27.

Calhanoglu opened the scoring from the spot after 38 minutes following a foul on Martinez. Inter led 3-0 at half-time after the 29-year-old delicately fed wing-back Dimarco to score and then Thuram netted his sixth league goal this season a minute before the break. Thuram's effort came at the end of 21 passes in a move which started in the Inter half. Udinese were denied a goal with 23 minutes remaining as on-loan Lorenzo Lucca was adjudged to be offside despite beating Yann Sommer.

Calhanoglu was replaced in the 71st minute by Albania defensive midfielder Kristjan Asllani before inform Martinez completed the rout with six minutes to go. Inter club captain Martinez tackled Udinese midfielder Martin Payero near the halfway line and charged forward to rifle his effort into the bottom corner for his 14th goal of the campaign. Next up for Inzaghi's side is Tuesday's Champions League game with Real Sociedad, having already clinched their place in the last 16 of the competition.

Muriel magic

Earlier, experienced Colombia striker Luis Muriel scored a 95th-minute winner with a backheel as Atalanta beat AC Milan. The three points send Atalanta a point off the fourth and final Champions League place and stopped Milan from keeping up pace with the top two in the table, leaders Juve and city rivals Inter. The defeat, just Milan's fourth in the league this season, comes at a bad time before Wednesday's crucial Champions League trip to Newcastle, where Stefano Pioli's side have to win to keep their hopes of reaching the knock-out stages alive. Muriel's first goal of the campaign came after two efforts from Nigeria forward Ademola Lookman in Bergamo. France attacker Olivier Giroud and Serbia forward Luka Jovic had equalized for the visitors. Muriel, 32, claimed the winner, as he connected with Aleksey Miranchuk's drilled pass to secure Atalanta's first league win since October 30. — AFP

"It was a good game, competitive and even, the result is a fair one," said Madrid coach Carlo Ancelotti. "I'm satisfied because you're not always going to be able to win every game.'

Madrid pulled one point clear of Girona but could lose top spot on Sunday if the surprise challengers beat neighbors Barcelona in a Catalan derby. PARIS: Paris Saint-Germain triumphed 2-1 on Saturday thanks to a late Randal Kolo Muani winner against Nantes, with Monaco winning to go second. Bradley Barcola's stylish finish just before the break gave PSG the lead, but a Mostafa Mohamed header in the second half made it look as if the points would be shared in the capital. However, Kolo Muani pounced in the six-yard box seven minutes from time to allow PSG to open up a six-point lead at the top of the table.

"I think that before an important match like Wednesday's (Borussia Dortmund), we were good right from the first minute," said PSG coach Luis Enrique. "Nantes defended well and it was a match that allowed us to strengthen our position in the league." In Paris, a first half dominated by the hosts, though with few clear-cut chances at either end, was illuminated by Barcola in the 41st minute when he stroked home his first goal for PSG.

Playing a one-two on the left wing with Vitinha, the 21-year-old glided into the box before opening his body and bending the ball beyond Alban Lafont. But Nantes were back on terms 10 minutes after the break when Florent Mollet's corner was nodded in by Mohamed at the near post, leaving last week's hero Arnau Tenas little chance. PSG were handed a welcome boost when teenager Warren Zaire-Emery entered the fray after 61 minutes, though returning captain Marquinhos left the field at the same time.

However, the key change came with 11 minutes remaining as goalscorer Barcola made way for Kolo Muani. And just four minutes later, the French international was on hand to turn in a rebound from close-range and his fourth goal of the season was enough to give the home team a narrow 2-1 win. Luis Enrique declared the result "a good preparation for a Champions League match" as his side now turn their attention to next week's do-or-die clash in Dortmund, the Parisians need a result to reach the knockout stages.

Monaco reign in Brittany

Second-half strikes from Vanderson and Youssouf Fofana gave Monaco a 2-1 win away to Rennes with the principality side moving above Nice into second place. Despite a late penalty from Benjamin Bourigeaud and Vanderson's red card, Monaco held out at Roazhon Park to take themselves within three points of Paris Saint-Germain at the top of Ligue 1.



Man City end winless run

Chelsea crash at Everton; Fulham run riot, thrash West Ham 5-0

LONDON: Manchester City survived a scare at Luton to end their four-match winless run in the Premier League with a 2-1 victory, while Chelsea's problems mounted with a 2-0 defeat at Everton on Sunday. With star striker Erling Haaland absent due to injury, Pep Guardiola's side trailed to Elijah Adebayo's goal late in the first half at Kenilworth Road. But, after squandering a host of chances, City finally clicked into gear with two goals in three minutes after the break.

Bernardo Silva equalized and Jack Grealish bagged the winner to give City a

much-needed first victory in five league matches. After their lethargic 1-0 defeat at Aston Villa on Wednesday, which followed draws with Chelsea, Liverpool and Tottenham, City were in danger of falling out of the title race. Liverpool's win at Crystal Palace on Saturday had moved the leaders seven points clear of City. But fourth-placed City responded with a gritty display to close the gap on Liverpool to four points.

City still have work to do to regain control of their bid for an unprecedented fourth successive top-flight title and

Haaland's fitness scare could not have come at a worse time. Haaland, who had started all of City's league matches this season, was sidelined with a foot injury that could impact his availability for the treble winners' hectic Christmas schedule. Everton continued to shrug off the impact of a 10-point Premier League deduction as victory over Chelsea took the Toffees four points clear of the relegation zone.

Abdoulaye Doucoure opened the scoring at Goodison Park before Lewis Dobbin's first Everton goal imposed an-

other damaging defeat on Chelsea boss Mauricio Pochettino. Without the penalty for breaching financial rules, which Everton are appealing, Sean Dyche's men would be four points above Chelsea in mid-table. Pochettino shuffled his pack after a dreadful display in losing 2-1 at Manchester United in midweek. But the Argentine is struggling to solve his side's lack of a clinical edge up front, despite the club having spent £1 billion (\$1.3 billion) on new players in the past three transfer windows.

ree transfer windows. Fulham ran riot for the second time in a week as they thrashed West Ham 5-0 at Craven Cottage. Just four days after Fulham beat Nottingham Forest by the same scoreline, Marco Silva's side turned on the style again. Raul Jimenez opened the scoring to take his personal tally to four in five games having previously not scored a Premier League goal since March 2022 for Wolves. Willian and Tosin Adarabioyo netted for Fulham before the interval, with a fine effort from Harry Wilson and a late tap-in from Carlos Vinicius completing the London derby demolition. — AFP

Columbus Crew win 3rd MLS title

COLUMBUS: The Columbus Crew won their third Major League Soccer title after beating Los Angeles FC 2-1 in the MLS Cup final on Saturday. A penalty from Cucho Hernandez and goal from Yaw Yeboah gave the Crew a 2-0 lead at the interval before Denis Bouanga pulled a goal back for LAFC in the 74th minute. In what may have been the final game before retirement for former Italy captain Giorgio Chiellini and possibly a last appearance for LAFC for Mexican star Carlos Vela, last year's champions were convincingly beaten.

Columbus, coached by little-known Frenchman Wilfried Nancy, dominated the game for long stretches while Steve Cherundolo's LAFC were unable to unleash their trademark counter-attacks. Nancy, who won his first major title as a coach in his first season with Columbus, said his team had improved throughout the season.

"They have grown a lot as players, and as people. When we started, I told them 'Guys, impossible is an opinion' - just enjoy it and we're gonna grow. And this is what happened. This is unbelievable," he said. "We played our way. I'm so proud". After a frantic start, in front of a loud, capacity 20,802 home crowd, Columbus quickly settled into their possession game thanks to the calming influence of veteran midfielder Dar-

lington Nagbe, who has now won the title with three different clubs.

French defender Steven Moreira had the first real opening, in the 16th minute, but his disappointing header from a promising position in the box was off target. The Crew's roaming Colombian striker Hernandez sent a reminder of his goal threat with a shot from 20 yards out which flashed wide of the post. Uruguayan attacking midfielder Diego Rossi was increasingly influential as he began to find spaces behind Hernandez and he went close in the 27th minute with a shot into the side-netting.

Fortunate penalty

The pressure on the Los Angeles defense was building but when the Crew broke through it was via a fortunate penalty award. Yeboah crossed from the left, Rossi flicked the ball up in the air and it struck the shoulder of Diego Palacios and then his arm. Referee Armando Villarreal had no hesitation pointing to the spot and Hernandez buried the penalty into the bottom corner to make it 1-0 in the 33rd minute.

Within four minutes the Crew doubled their lead with a goal of perfect simplicity. Danish defender Malte Amundsen played a pinpoint defense-splitting pass to Yeboah who sped around the back of Ryan Hollingshead before poking home with the outside of his left-foot. The Crew fans, many of whom had been chanting in the stadium over two hours before kick off, were ecstatic and LAFC, who had created next to nothing for the league's top scorer Bouanga, looked shell-shocked.

There was some encouragement though for the constantly singing black-clad visiting Los Angeles supporters on the stroke of half-time when a low cross from Cristian Olivera was almost sliced into his own goal by Crew defender Rudy Carmacho. Columbus continued to dominate after the break though with the livewire Yeboah, skipping past two defenders as he weaved into the box, chipping over the advancing Los Angeles keeper Max Crepeau only for Palacios to head off the line.

There were signs that Columbus were starting to tire a little heading into the final 20 minutes with mistakes creeping into their game and LAFC pushed forward with more urgency. A burst of pace from Bouanga got him behind the defence but his low ball across the face of the goal went untouched. Moments later the French-born Gabon international got his team back into the game - a right foot shot inside the box was parried by Patrick Schulte but Bouanga reacted swiftly and buried the loose ball.

But the Crew were not for crumbling, responding positively - Rossi scuffing a chance to make it 3-1 and substitute Christian Ramirez appealing in vain for a penalty after bursting into the box. The Crew held firm in seven minutes of added time to set off a party as the Ohio crowd celebrated a third title following their triumphs in 2008 and 2020. Chiellini said Columbus had deserved the victory. "It was a beautiful journey, that we have to be proud of it. Of course, I am sad for the game, I don't think they are better in general but they played much better tonight," he said. — AFP
