KUWAIT: The government on Sunday refuted rumors circulating on social media claiming that the government was planning to change the elections law with the aim of preventing thousands of Kuwaiti citizens from voting in the upcoming snap parliamentary polls. Government spokesman Amer Al-Ajmi denied the rumors in an official statement, saying that "circulating such reports destabilizes the nation's unity and creates divisions". Ajmi urged citizens to ignore such reports and adhere to national unity.

The government spokesman was reacting to a heated debate on social media about calls and countercalls for the government to amend the elections law to prevent naturalized citizens from voting or contesting the elections, which will be held within two months. KUWAIT: Al-Ujairi Scientific Center said Sunday that the gradual seasonal shift from winter to spring started on Sunday. The center explained this seasonal shift includes dusty winds accompanied by sudden sharp cold dips in temperature. The change from winter to spring will witness an increase in temperature until it settles in the spring season. — KUNA

Man kills 12 relatives in Iran

TEHRAN: A man killed 12 of his relatives in a rare mass shooting in southern Iran, state media reported Saturday. "A 30-year-old man, motivated by a family dispute, killed 12 members of his family including his father and brother with a Kalashnikov weapon near the town of Faryab," Kerman province chief justice Ebrahim Hamidi said. The man was killed during a shootout with security forces trying to capture him. — AFP

Jordan kills 5 drug smugglers

AMMAN: The Jordanian army said on Sunday that its border guards had killed five drug traffickers and wounded four others attempting to smuggle narcotics into Jordan from Syria. The operation took place a day after the interior ministers of Jordan, Iraq, Syria and Lebanon met in Amman and agreed to establish a "joint communication cell" to combat cross-border drug smuggling. — AFP



Expat numbers surge to 68.3% of Kuwait's population

KUWAIT: The total number of non-Kuwaiti residents in Kuwait has witnessed a significant increase, constituting 68.3 percent of the total population, as revealed by data from the Public Authority for Civil Information. The population growth rate for the year 2023 reached its highest level since 2005, surpassing the recorded rate in 2022.

Municipal efforts to eradicate this troubling phenomenon have proven insufficient despite acknowledging their dedica-

tion in this regard. The proposal aims to address the negative aspects associated with the informal and illegal transformation of public spaces and parking lots into unauthorized markets for buying, selling and leasing vehicles. This practice contradicts official laws and regulations governing commercial activities, as well as those related to public appearance, and it undermines the minimum standards for the safety and security of vehicles.

GAZA: The Zionist army pushed on Sunday with its campaign in southern Gaza to destroy Hamas as prospects dimmed for a ceasefire in the more than fourmonth-old war. A total of 127 people died in 24 hours, Gaza's health ministry said, as the main battlefront edged closer to far-southern Rafah, where 1.4 million Palestinians live in crowded shelters and tent camps.

UN ceasefire push

The Zionist entity's top ally the United States signaled it would veto the latest push for a UN Security Council resolution demanding an immediate ceasefire, as Washington instead favors a temporary truce and captive release deal. And mediator Qatar acknowledged that separate ceasefire talks had also hit an impasse after Zionist Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu rejected some Hamas demands as "ludicrous".

Lula accuses Zionist entity of genocide

ADDIS ABABA: Brazilian President Luiz Inacio Lula da Silva accused the Zionist entity Sunday of committing "genocide" against Palestinian civilians in the Gaza Strip and compared its actions to Adolf Hitler's campaign to exterminate Jews. In response, Zionist Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu called the 78-year-old president's comments "shameful and grave" and said his government had called in Brazil's ambassador in protest.

Lula told reporters in Addis Ababa, where he

was attending an African Union summit, that what was happening in the Gaza Strip "isn't a war, it's a genocide". "It's not a war of soldiers against soldiers. It's a war between a highly prepared army and women and children," added the veteran leftist. "What's happening in the Gaza Strip with the Palestinian people hasn't happened at any other moment in history. Actually, it has happened: When Hitler decided to kill the Jews."

Lula, a prominent voice for the global south whose country currently holds the rotating presidency of the G20, previously condemned Hamas' Oct 7 attack on the Zionist entity as a "terrorist" act. But he has since grown vocally critical of the Zionist entity's retaliatory military campaign.

Kuwait calls for end to Zionist violations

Arab human rights committee discusses racist practices

DOHA: Kuwaiti Assistant Foreign Minister for Huternity building for long hours as they were subjectman Rights Affairs, Ambassador Sheikha Jawaher Ibrahim Al-Sabah, stressed on Sunday the necessity of confronting the Zionist violations and racist practices against the Palestinian people. In a statement to KUNA during the 53rd session of the Arab Permanent Committee for Human Rights, hosted by Doha, Sheikha Jawaher called on the international community to take immediate action to stop the aggression of the occupying entity against the Gaza Strip and open corridors to send humanitarian aid. She stressed the importance of the items included on the session agenda, such as confronting the violations of the Zionist occupation and racist practices in the occupied Arab territories, in addition to the Arab prisoners and detainees in the occupation prisons.

Health authorities in the Gaza Strip reported Zionist massacres against Palestinian families, resulting in 127 deaths and 205 injuries. The health authorities said in a press statement that the Zionist aggression on the Gaza Strip since the Al-Aqsa flood operation on October 7 has resulted in 28,985 martyrs and 68,883 injuries. The authorities explained that the occupation took Nasser Medical Complex in Khan Yunis, out of service and put medical staff in the maed to physical assault, and stripped of their clothing.

The occupation forces arrested 70 people from the medical staff, leaving only 25 doctors who cannot deal with cases that need intensive clinical care. The authorities allege that occupation forces arrested an intensive care unit doctor, suspended oxygen, and transported dozens of patients to unknown locations, leading to the death of seven patients and concerns over dozens in serious conditions.

Arab human rights

Meanwhile, Kuwait's Assistant Foreign Minister for Human Rights underscored on Sunday the importance of participating at the permanent Arab human rights committee session in the Qatari capital, Doha. Ambassador Al-Sabah told KUNA that various significant items are slated to be discussed during the 53rd session, including Zionist occupation violations, racist practices in occupied Arab lands, and detainees in Zionist occupation prisons. Further on the agenda are the Arab human rights charter, the Arab human rights strategy review, and keeping pace with implementing the Arab plan for education and culture. The 53rd session launched on Sunday, and is set to last until Tuesday. — KUNA



Ministry of Health keen on enhancing emergency services

KUWAIT: The Assistant Undersecretary of the Ministry of Health for Allied Medical Services Affairs, Dr. Abdullah Al-Faras, affirmed on Sunday the Ministry's keenness to improve the emergency medical system by honing the skills of the practitioners and services provided to citizens. Al-Faras added in his speech during the emergency medical services, current reality and future aspirations conference that the ministry was keen, through the government's 100-day work program, to support and develop emergency medical services and launch a new fleet of ambulances equipped with the latest technologies.

The conference embodies the ministry's determination to keep up with technological and scientific developments related to medical emergencies, share experiences, and exchange future visions to enhance cooperation between specialists in this field, he added. Dr. Al-Faras said that the ministry would not skimp on supporting emergency medical practitioners and pointed to their role in the relief bridge for Gaza and their expected mission soon to accompany and receive the wounded in Gaza.

On his part, the President of the Conference and

Director of the Medical Emergency Department, Dr. Ahmed Al-Shatti, revealed the launch of 10 ambulance centers in 2024, bringing the total number of ambulance centers and clinics to 86 centers and 200 ambulances. Al-Shatti noted that in 2023, the total number of urgent reports reached 126,000, the total number of cases transported by ambulances reached 128,000, and the response rate reached 10 minutes, expressing optimism that the new ambulances would contribute to shortening this time.

He added that the number of cases of road accidents transported by ambulances amounted to 8,757 cases, and the number of cases transported by air ambulances amounted to 808 cases. He noted that medical evacuation to and from Kuwait amounted to 91 cases, and the number of coverage of various events reached 6,662 coverage, while mock exercises jumped from 9 in 2021 to 92

exercises. He explained that continuous medical training adds credibility and accreditation for international recognition and stressed that training must include mental health and accommodation of the pressure that falls on the working team and

The annual conference for medical emergencies included 40 scientific papers, 10 sessions, and three workshops on emergency medical services, whether in terms of air or sea ambulance services, and how to deal with disasters and crises. The conference coincides with the country's celebrations of national holidays, in addition to keeping pace with Kuwaiti Ambulance Day, which falls on February 20, stressing the importance of attracting qualified cadres in light of global competition to cover shortages of qualified labor and advanced emergency technicians, Al-Shatti stated. — KUNA

KUWAIT: The Kuwait Anti-Corruption Authority (Nazaha) organized a workshop on Sunday with the World Justice Project (WJP) to discuss the Rule of Law Index for 2023. Nazaha's Vice President, Nawaf Al-Mahamel, stated during his speech at the workshop that Nazaha was keen to cooperate with the General Secretariat of the Supreme Council for Planning and Development and the United Nations Development Program (UNDP) to include Kuwait in the Rule of Law Index.

Al-Mahamel added that the aim of including Kuwait in this index is to contribute to detecting and measuring new index factors in the country, in addition to raising awareness on the importance of international indicators and supporting regional and international policies. On her part, UNDP Kuwait's Resident Representative Emma Morley discussed the contribution and strengthening of the Rule of Law Index throughout surveys and studies, which evaluates people's experiences. The Rule of Law Index is a quantitative assessment tool that shows the extent to which countries adhere to the rule of law in practice, noting that Kuwait ranks 52nd out of 142 countries worldwide. — KUNA


Art project beautifies Kuwait

Famine latest threat in north Gaza

Children die of hunger, prices of essential goods soar amid continued Zionist siege

GAZA: Like many in northern Gaza, Shadi Jenina has resorted to desperate measures to stave off hunger for his five children — grinding up animal feed into flour. "We're looking for food for birds, animals and livestock ... such as barley, corn, wheat and fodder. We grind them and make flour," Jenina, 40, explained.

"The bread is dry and not suitable for humans but we're forced to eat it," he told AFP, adding they struggle to feed their children. The Gaza Strip was already one of the poorest places in the Middle East even before the Zionist entity declared a complete siege on the territory after Hamas's October 7 attack.

Though much of Gaza was reliant on food aid, enough of it was entering the territory to largely meet the needs of its 2.4 million inhabitants. But now, after more than four months of war that has flattened huge swathes of the Strip, Gazans are inching closer towards famine, according to the UN's World Food Program. And the situation in the north of the coastal

territory is particularly acute, with international aid agencies unable to get in.

'Pure misery'

Since the start of this year, the Zionist entity has only given permission to 12 out of 77 United Nations evaluation missions to assess the needs of people in northern Gaza. "There are about 300,000 people in the north and I have no idea how they've survived," said Andrea De Domenico, head of the UN humanitarian agency OCHA in the Palestinian territories.

"What we managed to bring up there is absolutely not enough. It is pure misery," he told AFP. "Repeatedly when we are allowed to cross the checkpoint at Wadi Gaza to deliver food assistance, thousands of people block and unload the trucks at the risk of being shot." In the last few days, the non-profit organization World Central Kitchen, which made thousands of meals a day, said it had been forced to

leave Gaza City for Rafah in the south. Rafah, on the border with Egypt, has been turned in recent weeks to a vast camp for some 1.4 million people — most of them displaced by the entity's relentless bombing. The Zionist entity, though, is preparing a ground invasion of Rafah, prompting fears of a bloodbath.

Back north

As Egypt refuses to house Palestinian civilians on its side of the border, the question now is how to move more than a million people back towards the north to prevent them getting caught up in fighting. "This is a question we are asking ourselves," said OCHA's De Domenico. "There is no short-term solution ... what's clear for the short term is that a ground invasion in Rafah would have dangerous consequences." Before the war, some 500 trucks carrying a range of goods entered Gaza every day. Since then, the numbers rarely go beyond 200, despite the enormous demand.

The Zionist entity has tightened checks on lorries coming into the territory to prevent arms being brought to Hamas — and the group's leaders leaving — all of which restricts the flow of aid. At the same time, far-right Zionist groups have blocked trucks at the entry point to Gaza, while the UN also has to have explosives experts on board because of unexploded ordnance in the north.

"We're going to die from hunger, not by bombs or missiles," said Mohammed Nassar, 50, from Jabalia in northern Gaza. "The biggest problem is that everything that is available is expensive and we don't have the money." The price of one kilogram of tomatoes, for example, has shot up past 50 shekels (nearly \$14) — more than 20 times its cost before the war. Flour has doubled in price from 35 to 70 shekels, he added. "We need food now," said Nassar. "Children are dying from hunger. How is this our fault or theirs?" — AFP

Zionist forces kill 2 Palestinians in West Bank raid

TULKARM, Palestine: Two Palestinian men, including one member of an armed group, were killed in a Zionist raid on Sunday, in the latest Zionist attack in the occupied West Bank. The Palestinian health ministry said the two, aged 19 and 36, were pronounced dead from gunshot wounds after the raid in the Tulkarm refugee camp, which the UN says houses over 27,000 Palestinian refugees.

The Al-Aqsa Martyrs Brigades, the armed wing of Palestinian president Mahmud Abbas's Fatah party, identified the elder of the pair as a local commander. His brother also called him "a member of the resistance", according to AFP.

Palestinian news agency WAFA reported the incursion of an undercover Zionist unit into the Tulkarm refugee camp, accompanied by a large number of

military vehicles and an armored bulldozer.

The forces imposed strict restrictions on the refugee camp, as intense confrontations ensued between Palestinian youth and occupation forces who used heavy gunfire, resulting in the murder of Nabil Ata Amer, 19, and the injury of three more Palestinians. Another Palestinian, Mohammad Ahmad al-Oufi, 36, was also shot dead by Zionist occupation forces during the raid, said the agency.

The Ministry of Health, quoting the General Authority of Civil Affairs, said Oufi was killed after being trapped by occupation forces inside his family house in the Tulkarm refugee camp. His body was taken away by the Zionist forces.

The injured individuals were promptly transported to Thabet Governmental Hospital in the city for medical treatment. WAFA said medical personnel

were reportedly struggling to attend to the wounded amid the ongoing confrontations, with reports indicating additional injuries inside the camp.

Zionist occupation forces also impeded the arrival of ambulances into the camp, hindering the swift evacuation of those in need, according to local sources and witnesses who spoke to WAFA.

The deaths came with international concern mounting about unrest in the West Bank since Hamas's October 7 attack on southern parts of the Zionist entity. EU foreign policy chief Josep Borrell on Sunday described the situation as being at boiling point and warned that "we could be on the eve of a

greater explosion," AFP reported.

The Zionist military said its forces were there to apprehend "a senior wanted suspect" believed to have been involved in attacks on its forces and the "killing of individuals in Tulkarm suspected of cooperating with (Zionist) security forces".

The suspect was killed by Zionist troops in an exchange of fire, then "armed terrorists opened fire and hurled explosive devices at (Zionist) security forces, who responded with live fire", the army said in a statement. "During the exchange of fire, a (Zionist) Border Police officer was severely injured" and hospitalized, it added. — Agencies

Lion legal battle over Hindu deity name in India

KOLKATA, India: An Indian Hindu nationalist organization has launched a court petition to stop two lions named after the Hindu deity Sita and a 16th-century Muslim emperor from sharing a zoo enclosure. Vishwa Hindu Parishad (VHP), a prominent right-wing Hindu organization, went to court in West Bengal state after reports a lioness named Sita had been put together with a lion called Akbar.

Akbar was a Mughal emperor who extended Muslim rule over much of the Indian subcontinent, a time Hindu nationalist groups say was a period of slavery. "Sita cannot stay with the Mughal emperor Akbar," VHP official Anup Mondal said Sunday, saying it hurt religious sentiments in the Hindu-majority nation. The VHP lodged a plea on Friday calling for a namechange. "Such act amounts to blasphemy and is a direct assault on the religious belief of all Hindus," the VHP said in its petition to the court.

Critics say religious intolerance has been growing in the world's most populous country since the Hindu nationalist government of Prime Minister Narendra Modi came to power in 2014. General elections, likely to be held in April, are expected to see Modi win a third term in power. Mondal said the lion called Akbar had previously been named after the Hindu deity Ram when he was in the neighboring state of Tripura, which is controlled by Modi's Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP). But the lion's name was changed when he was brought to West Bengal, which is controlled by the opposition Trinamool Congress party. The VHP petition calls for a ban on using religious names for animals in zoos. West Bengal forest department official Dipak Kumar Mandal said "the lion and the lioness are now kept separately". The case is scheduled for a hearing on February 20. — AFP

US threatens to block new UN vote on Gaza

UNITED NATIONS: The UN Security Council could hold a vote this week, sought by Algeria, on a resolution seeking an "immediate" ceasefire in Gaza, diplomatic sources told AFP Saturday, although Washington again appeared set to block it.

Algeria launched discussions on a new draft after the International Court of Justice ruled in late January that the Zionist entity must do all it can to prevent genocidal acts in its war in Gaza, which it says is targeting Hamas militants. The latest version of the text, seen by AFP Saturday, "demands an immediate humanitarian ceasefire that must be respected by all parties." It also "rejects forced displacement of the Pales-

tinian civilian population," and it "demands the immediate and unconditional release of all hostages."

The Zionist entity's assault on Gaza has killed at least 28,858 people, mostly women and children, according to the territory's health ministry. The Hamas October 7 attack, which the Zionist entity says triggered the war, has resulted in the deaths of about 1,160 people, mostly civilians, according to an AFP tally of Zionist official figures.

Algeria has requested a UN Security Council vote on Tuesday, but Washington signaled it is likely to veto the measure. US President Joe Biden is working with Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu and the leaders of Egypt and Qatar on a hostage deal that would bring about six weeks of a "prolonged pause in fighting," US Ambassador to the UN Linda Thomas-Greenfield said in a statement on Algeria's proposed draft.

"The resolution put forward in the Security Council, in contrast, would not achieve these outcomes, and indeed, may

run counter to them," Thomas-Greenfield said. "The United States does not support action on this draft resolution," she added. "Should it come up for a vote as drafted, it will not be adopted."

Like previous texts opposed by the entity and the United States, the new text does not condemn the attack by Hamas. Earlier this month, Thomas-Greenfield said that Algeria's latest initiative risked derailing the negotiations. "We believe that it is high time now for the Security Council to decide on a humanitarian ceasefire resolution," Palestinian UN envoy Riyad Mansour said recently, adding there is "massive support" for the text's elements among council members.

In October and December, despite international pressure over Gaza's growing humanitarian crisis, Washington vetoed texts calling for a ceasefire. The Security Council has adopted just two resolutions on Gaza since October 7, including one calling for large-scale delivery of humanitarian aid to the Palestinian territory. — AFP

UN court to weigh Zionist occupation of Palestine

ICJ advisory rulings non-binding but 'can carry great moral and legal authority': Rights group

THE HAGUE: The UN's top court will from Monday hold hearings on the legal consequences of the Zionist entity's occupation of Palestinian territories since 1967, with an unprecedented 52 countries expected to give evidence.

Nations including the United States, Russia, and China will address judges in a week-long session at the Peace Palace in The Hague, seat of the International Court of Justice (ICJ). In December 2022, the UN General Assembly asked the ICJ for a non-binding "advisory opinion" on the "legal consequences arising from the policies and practices of the (Zionist entity) in the Occupied Palestinian Territory, including East Jerusalem.'

While any ICJ opinion would be non-binding, it comes amid mounting international legal pressure on the Zionist entity over its assault on Gaza, which it claims was sparked by a deadly attack launched by Hamas on the entity in October.

The hearings are separate from a high-profile case brought by South Africa alleging that the Zionist entity is committing genocidal acts during the current Gaza offensive. The ICJ ruled in that case in January that the Zionist entity must do everything in its power to prevent genocide and allow humanitarian aid into Gaza, but stopped short of ordering a ceasefire. On Friday, it rejected South Africa's bid to impose additional measures on the Zionist entity but reiterated the need to carry out the ruling in full.

'Prolonged occupation'

The General Assembly has asked the

ICJ to consider two questions. Firstly, the court should examine the legal consequences of what the UN called "the ongoing violation by (the Zionist entity) of the right of the Palestinian people to self-determination".

This relates to the "prolonged occupation, settlement and annexation of the Palestinian territory occupied since 1967" and "measures aimed at altering the demographic composition, character and status of the Holy City of Jerusalem".

In June 1967, the Zionist entity crushed some of its Arab neighbors in a six-day war, seizing the West Bank including east Jerusalem from Jordan, the Golan Heights from Syria, and the Gaza Strip and Sinai Peninsula from Egypt.

The Zionist entity then began to settle the 70,000 square kilometers (27,000 square miles) of seized Arab territory. The UN later declared the occupation of Palestinian territory illegal. Cairo regained Sinai under its 1979 peace deal with the entity.

The ICJ has also been asked to look into the consequences of what it described as the Zionist entity's "adoption of related discriminatory legislation and measures." Secondly, the ICJ should advise on how the entity's actions "affect the legal status of the occupation" and what are the consequences for the UN and other countries. The court will rule "urgently" on the affair, probably by the end of the year.

'Despicable'

The ICJ rules in disputes between states and its judgements are binding although it has little means to enforce



them. However, in this case, the opinion it issues will be non-binding. In the court's own words: "The requesting organ, agency or organization remains free to give effect to the opinion by any means open to it, or not to do so." But most advisory opinions are in fact acted upon.

ground, in the occupied West Bank on February 18, 2024. — AFP

The ICJ has previously issued advisory opinions on the legality of Kosovo's 2008 declaration of independence from Serbia and apartheid South Africa's occupation of Namibia. It also handed down an opinion in 2004 declaring that parts of the wall erected by the Zionist entity in the occupied Palestinian territory were illegal and should be torn down.

The entity is not participating in the hearings and reacted angrily to the 2022 UN request, with Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu calling it "despicable" and "disgraceful". The week after the UN resolution, the entity announced a series of sanctions against the Palestinian Authority to make it "pay the price" for pushing for it.

Human Rights Watch (HRW) said that while advisory opinions are non-binding, "they can carry great moral and legal authority" and can eventually be inscribed in international law. The hearings should "highlight the grave abuses (Zionist) authorities are committing against Palestinians, including the crimes against humanity of apartheid and persecution," said Clive Baldwin, HRW senior legal adviser. — AFP

Myanmar villagers pick through rubble of devastated homes

NAM HPAT KAR, Myanmar: A towering golden Buddha statue watches over families sifting through the wreckage of their homes in a northern Myanmar village as they grieve for all they have lost in heavy artillery and air strikes. The statue's right palm is raised in a gesture of Nam Hpat Kar in northern Shan state were reduced to rubble in conflict between the military and the Kachin Independence Army (KIA), which says it captured the village in late January after more than a month of fighting.

With military aircraft closing in, Nann May and her family fled the house they had recently built. "From where I was hiding I heard the sounds of fighter jets flying overhead and I thought our village ... will be destroyed completely," Nann May, who earns a living selling daily goods, told AFP last week.

After KIA fighters seized the village and the fighting ended, Nann May returned to Nam Hpat Kar — which sits on Myanmar's main highway to China — to find her home and many others damaged or destroyed. Most people from her neighborhood now "have nowhere to live," she said, requesting a pseudonym for security reasons. "Residents can't do any work. There are no jobs and no homes here for us. We are grieving for our losses.'

The loss of Nam Hpat Kar is one of many suffered by Myanmar's ruling junta in recent months. An offensive launched in October by an alliance of ethnic minority armed groups has seized chunks of territory along the China border, as well as control of lucrative trade crossings. The successes have also inspired so-called "People's Defence Forces" — dedicated to reversing the 2021 coup that ousted Aung San Suu Kyi's democratically elected government — to launch attacks of their own

Analysts say the onslaught has put the embattled junta in its most vulnerable position since seizing power. Last

Remnants of the military's retreat from Nam Hpat Kar were scattered across the village, AFP footage showed. Combat boots and uniforms were strewn inside a concrete hut pockmarked with bullet holes.

Near a network of empty trenches, dozens of shell casings littered the ground around a destroyed communications aerial. Atop the local military unit's flagpole, the KIA's green and red banner hung in the still air.

Outside the village, locals took pictures of the wreckage of a jet the KIA says it shot down recently. The downing of the plane would be a rare victory against the junta's overwhelming air power, which it has used to shore up its embattled ground troops.

The junta's use of air strikes against civilian areas has

drawn heavy condemnation, including from the United Nations and the United States, which last year imposed further sanctions on jet fuel imports. The KIA has fought the military for decades for autonomy and control of the lucrative trade in jade and timber in the far north. It has clashed regularly with the military since the coup and has given training

and equipment to newer "People's Defence Forces". Its fighters in Nam Hpat Kar were unavailable for interview. For villagers returning home to houses obliterated by air and artillery strikes, talk of victory rings hollow.

One family sat cooking rice on a makeshift stove a stone's throw from the ruins of their house. A nearby building had been reduced to a pile of concrete chunks, its electric wiring and steel supports exposed.

A Chinese calligraphy print extolling the importance of maintaining peace within one's family hung on one interior wall that was still standing. Aye Aye Tin — also a pseudonym — has not heard from her nephew or niece since they fled the village for a city on the border with China

when the fighting broke out. "I heard from my friend that my nephew and niece were shot dead (by the military) while they tried to flee," she told AFP. "Another niece who was wounded in the arm has been sent to hospital." "I never thought I would face this fate." Maung Soe, another resident, said he knew a man who had been killed by a shell during the fighting. Thousands have been killed and around 2 million displaced by conflict since the 2021 coup, according to the United Nations. For many in Nam Hpat Kar who survived the fight over their village, the next struggle will be surviving day to day, said Maung Soe. "We have faced trouble getting meals, clothes and shelter," he said. — AFP

Lula criticized Western countries' recent decisions to halt aid to the UN agency for Palestinian country before 1920, hold first-degree citizenship. Naturalized Kuwaitis hold citizenship from two to eight, depending on the article in the law upon which they were given citizenship.

Under the election law before the amendment, only original Kuwaitis could vote and contest the polls. Naturalized Kuwaitis can only vote after 20 years of obtaining citizenship and are barred for life from running in elections. However, in 1994, the National Assembly introduced a major amendment to the law known as law 44/1994, stating that children of naturalized Kuwaiti men born after obtaining citizenship are considered Kuwaitis by birth or original citizens.

That gave thousands of Kuwaitis the right to vote and contest parliamentary polls, which dramatically changed the Kuwaiti election map. For several months, some activists have bluntly called for canceling law 44/1994, which effectively means depriving hundreds of thousands of citizens of the right to vote and contest polls. The debate over this critical issue intensified after the dissolution of the Assembly and before crucial snap polls in the next 60 days.

The military says it is working to move civilians from the area to minimize casualties, but has not revealed the exact details of its evacuation plan.

Netanyahu's government also rejected pressure from some Western governments that would aim for unilateral recognition of a Palestinian state. The government later unanimously approved a declaration that said "(the Zionist entity) utterly rejects international diktats regarding a permanent settlement with the Palestinians. A settlement. if it is to be reached, will come about solely through direct negotiations between the parties, without preconditions."

Latest strikes and fighting killed at least 10 people in Rafah and in central Gaza's Deir al-Balah overnight, said the official Palestinian news agency Wafa. At the morgue of a Rafah hospital, mourners bent down to give a final kiss to a loved one wrapped in a white body bag. "That's my cousin — he was martyred in Al-Mawasi, in the 'safe area'," said Ahmad Mohammed Aburizq. "And my mother was martyred the day before. "There's no safe place. Even the hospital is not safe."

The Zionist entity's bombardment and ground offensive in Gaza have killed at least 28,985 people, mostly women and children, according to the health ministry. In Tel Aviv, thousands took to the streets Saturday against Netanyahu's government, accusing it of abandoning the captives and calling for immediate elections. "Take politics out of decisions about our loved ones' lives," demanded Nissan Calderon, brother of hostage Ofer Calderon. "This is the moment of truth. There won't be many more like it if the Cairo initiative collapses.'

Next week's possible Security Council vote appears unlikely to advance the ceasefire effort, with Washington already voicing opposition. "The United States does not support action on this draft resolution," said US Ambassador to the UN Linda Thomas-Greenfield. "Should it come up for a vote as drafted, it will not be adopted." Algeria's draft resolution seeks an immediate humanitarian ceasefire, but Thomas-Greenfield said the United States instead supports a truce-for-captives deal that would pause fighting for six weeks.

US President Joe Biden had "multiple calls" with Netanyahu as well as Egyptian and Qatari leaders this week "to push this deal forward", she said. Speaking at the Munich Security Conference, Qatari Prime Minister Mohammed bin Abdulrahman Al-Thani called those talks "not very promising". He said the efforts had been complicated by the insistence of "a lot of countries" that any new truce involve further releases of hostages. Hamas has threatened to suspend its involvement in the talks unless relief supplies reach Gaza's north, where aid agencies have warned of looming famine. "Negotiations cannot be held while hunger is ravaging the Palestinian people," a senior source in the Palestinian militant group told AFP. The head of the UN humanitarian agency OCHA in the Palestinian territories, Andrea De Domenico, said he had "no idea" how an estimated 300,000 people still in Gaza's north had survived.



Long winter for Morocco quake survivors

Hundreds protest delayed government aid while others endure cold in tents, temporary barracks

DOUZROU, Morocco: Long, cold months have passed since an earthquake levelled Abdallah Oubelaid's impoverished village in Morocco's High Atlas mountains. Every day, he or other villagers come to inspect the debris. They hope to find pieces of wood for heating and cooking, or even to recover objects of value that have so far escaped them, and all the while a bitter Oubelaid wonders when he will get the government aid that he applied for. "Every time I ask, they tell me it's going to happen," Oubelaid, 35, said. "But I have children to feed and to clothe."

International

Moroccan authorities said around 3,000 people died during the 6.8 magnitude earthquake that struck on September 8, leaving more than 60,000 houses damaged. From Oubelaid's village of Douzrou, around 80 kilometers (50 miles) from Marrakesh city, residents give

a death toll of about 80.

A pink and white mosque minaret stands out among the rubble of the village that clung to a corner of the mountainside. The survivors, 150 families, found refuge a few kilometers away on rocky ground beside a road with a view of snow-capped mountains.

Around 120 of them have received help from the government. They either got a 2,500-dirham (\$249) monthly stipend or 20,000 dirhams for reconstruction. The rest, like Oubelaid, said they don't know why they received nothing.

Protests

By the end of January, the Moroccan government said around 57,600 families had received the monthly stipend and more than 44,000 households obtained the reconstruction aid. Prime Minister

Aziz Akhannouch said the government "sets itself the challenge of responding to the expectation of the local population with promptness and efficiency."

Yet some remain desperate for help. Local media said hundreds of people from areas south of Marrakesh in Taroudant province and the town of Talat Nyacoub have demonstrated since January to protest the delayed payments and reconstruction aid during the difficult winter conditions.

Last month, a left-wing government member of parliament, Fatima Tamni, said while questioning Interior Minister Abdelouafi Laftit that reconstruction efforts "remain immersed in obscurity and improvisation". She called on Laftit to take action, according to the Hespress news website.

The Moroccan government said some

applications were rejected because residents did not live in the affected areas at the time of the earthquake or because their homes were still inhabitable.

In larger towns like Amizmiz, workers and backhoes are busy. Things seem to have returned to normal, even as families still live in dozens of yellow tents donated by the authorities. Covered with tarpaulins for protection against the rain and mountain cold, the tents occupy every patch of empty land.

'It saved us'

In their misfortune, the Douzrou survivors feel lucky that Moroccan and Dutch NGOs built barracks for them, and they are insulated from the cold. "There would've been a lot more victims with the wind lately if we didn't have that," said Hamed Oumhend, 68, looking at the hut

built beside others. From above, they look like rolls of aluminum foil. "It saved us."

The elderly villager has been collecting signatures for a petition asking for the reconstruction of Douzrou — a little lower on the mountain than their camp, in hopes it would be safer there. They are determined to stay on their land but conscious of the fact that the name of the resilient village means "under the rock" in the local Berber language, also known as Amazigh.

They fear another disaster in the community whose isolation means few doctor visits and dwindling provisions, and where Oumhend said people are still in a state of shock. They all lost a relative or barely managed to save themselves when their village disappeared. "People had to crawl out of the rubble to get out of their homes," he recalled. "Some are still traumatized." — AFP

Seoul hopes egg freezing can help baby crisis

SEOUL: As South Korea's birth rate hits fresh lows, Seoul city officials have a plan to help — subsidized egg freezing. But experts warn the initiative is unlikely to reverse precipitous demographic decline. At just 0.7 births per woman late last year, South Korea has one of the lowest birthrates in the world, far below the replacement rate, meaning the population is ageing — and shrinking — rapidly.

The government has poured billions of dollars into trying to encourage more births, with one of the latest efforts involving Seoul city authorities offering to subsidize the cost of a round of egg freezing. Jeong, who is in her 40s, decided to take them up. "I felt the pressure to have a baby because of my age, which led me to consider getting married quickly," Jeong, who asked to be identified only by her surname, told AFP.

"When I reached my mid-30s, I suggested to the men I dated that we should get married as soon as possible. But it just didn't work out," Jeong added. So she turned to a backup plan. While single women can freeze their eggs, in reality the scheme will only assist women who go on to marry, as clinics offering intrauterine insemination (IUI) and in vitro fertilization (IVF) typically require marriage certificates, making the procedures virtually impossible for singles or same sex couples to access.

Egg freezing theoretically allows women to preserve their fertility, although it is seen as being more likely to succeed if women undergo the procedure before egg quality starts to sharply decline, typically from age 38 onwards.

Having frozen her eggs, Jeong said she no longer felt "as anxious" about being single and missing out on having a baby — and was ready to wait until she found the right person. "Now that I have my frozen eggs as insurance, I can take my time," she told AFP.

Helping Korean women to freeze their eggs was determined by Seoul city authorities to be "the most practical solution" for "investing in future childbirth possibilities", the municipal government said. "As the age of marriage and pregnancy continues to rise, and women's participation in society becomes more prominent, there is a growing

Beyond fertility

The technology to freeze eggs has been available in South Korea since the late 1990s, but there was little awareness and minimal demand for the procedure. Cha Kwang-yul, who runs the CHA Medical Group, developed one of the world's first vitrified egg-freeze preservation methods in 1998, and has run an egg bank since 1999. But only women with cancer, who might lose fertility through medical treatments, were interested in the procedure, he said. "It's only been a few years since the culture ... changed and people (started) saying: 'Hey, if you don't (plan on getting) married, store your eggs well." Cha's research has focused on the potential of eggs for stem cell technology, which he said could offer help for many medical concerns such as organ transplants — not just fertility issues. But in recent years, as more information on the procedure's potential to help extend female fertility has moved into the mainstream, he has seen growing demand for the procedure. The number of egg freezing procedures carried out at the CHA Medical Center has risen exponentially in just a few years, from 72 in 2015 to more than 1,000 in 2022.

'N-po' generation

But efforts to fix South Korea's demographic crisis that focus on encouraging people to get married and have babies are not recognizing major social shifts, experts say. Young South Koreans have embraced the term "N-po" generation to refer to the decision to abandon aspirations for marriage, parenthood and home ownership due to stagnant economic growth and intense competition for scarce jobs.

Just 3.7 per 1,000 people got married in 2022, according to official data, a record low. Single-person households now account for 41 percent of all households in South Korea, official figures show — with that figure set to grow in coming decades.

Despite this reality, single parenthood remains highly stigmatized, and rates are far lower than in other industrialized countries, said Hyeyoung Woo, a sociology professor who researches families in South Korea at Portland State University.

Just 2.5 percent of all South Korean babies in 2020 were born out of wedlock, compared to the OECD average of around 40 percent. Subsidizing egg freezing will not "effectively address the current low birth rate in Korea", Woo told AFP.

It would be more effective to focus on encouraging marriage and more second children within marriages through housing, tax, childcare and parental leave benefits, she said. — AFP

figures. It has displaced more than six million people inside the country, while more than a million have fled abroad, mostly to neighboring Chad and Egypt.

The United Nations says outbreaks of diseases pose a growing threat, particularly in overcrowded shelter sites, with the country already facing outbreaks of cholera and dengue fever. Inside the country, some 25 million people — more than half the population — need humanitarian aid.

Of those, 18 million face crisis or worse levels of hunger. Ten months on from the start of the conflict, many are struggling to find food to eat. William Carter, country director for Norwegian Refugee Council, visited Darfur in recent weeks. "Aside from the trauma and the physical loss, what struck me is the level of hunger," he said. "People have sold everything. Bakeries are not producing even the half of what they do usually because they have no flour nor wheat."

France-based non-governmental organization Solidarites International warned that Sudan — already one of the poorest countries on the planet — would be "going straight into a famine" if nothing was done. "It will be the largest humanitarian crisis Sudan has

Thai ex-PM back home after release on parole

BANGKOK: Former Thai prime minister Thaksin Shinawatra was released on parole Sunday, just six months after he was arrested following a dramatic return to the kingdom from 15 years of self-imposed evile

The controversial billionaire, twice elected premier and ousted in a 2006 military coup, was jailed for eight years on graft and abuse-of-power charges upon his return in August. But his sentence was cut to one year by King Maha Vajiralongkorn within days of his return and the government said last week the 74-year-old was eligible for early release because of his age and health. Thaksin — wearing a neck brace and sitting next to his daughters Paetongtarn and Pintongta — was driven away Sunday from the police hospital in central Bangkok where he had spent the past six months.

A handful of people protesting against his release had gathered in front of the hospital. The car then drove to Thaksin's home, where a welcome banner was tied across the gates. One woman wearing a T-shirt with a picture of Thaksin emblazoned across the front said she had stood outside his house for two days. "I want to tell him to fight," she told local media. "If he is (here), the country will develop."

The department of corrections confirmed his release on parole Sunday but the exact details of his freedom are unclear. Thaksin may be subject to monitoring — possibly with an ankle tag — and restrictions on his right to travel.

Thailand's Prime Minister Srettha Thavisin suggested Sunday that Thaksin would not involve himself in politics but said, if and when he is ready to give advice, "everyone in the government is ready to listen".

Thaksin's daughter Paetongtarn posted a picture on Instagram Sunday of him sitting in front of a swimming pool at his home, his arm in a sling. "After no fresh air and sunlight for 180 days and 17 years away from home, Dad sits outside for a long time," she wrote. — AFP

'Starving': Sudan aid workers sound alarm over crisis

PARIS: Sudanese aid worker Shakir Elhassan and his family were among millions forced to flee their homes and former lives after war broke out last year in Sudan. Some 10 months later, he is one of many voices in the sector warning of a devastating humanitarian crisis that could soon spiral into famine. "The needs are unprecedented," the communications manager at Care International said, deploring a lack of global attention. "There is a huge gap in medicines, food," he said, speaking to AFP from the east of the country after what he described as 10 days without internet

after what he described as 10 days without internet.
Conflict broke out in April last year between Sudan's army chief Abdel Fattah al-Burhan and Mohamed Hamdan Daglo, his former deputy and commander of the paramilitary Rapid Support Forces

(RSF). Elhassan fled the capital Khartoum in July, joining his wife and three children who had already sought refuge 180 kilometers (110 miles) further south in the town of Wad Madani.

But in December the PSE attacked the town in Jacobs.

But in December the RSF attacked the town in Jazirah state, which had become a "humanitarian hub" for the region. "It was horrific, I moved out from Jazirah just with the clothes" on my back, he said. "On the road, there was thousands of people moving on foot, in a state of panic. Most of them were women and children."

He and his family found shelter some 400 kilometers east of there, in the provincial capital of Kassala state near the Eritrean border, where they still live and he says he sees a constant trickle of new arrivals. "People arrive in Kassala exhausted, some of them sick, starving. Many of them told me they are bankrupt," he said. "I have seen thousands of people here sheltering in very poor conditions," he added.

The war in Sudan has killed thousands, including 10,000 to 15,000 people in the single town of El Geneina in the western region of Darfur, according to UN

OpenAI in deal valuing it at \$80bn: Media

SAN FRANCISCO: OpenAI has concluded a deal with investors that reportedly values the California start-up at \$80 billion or more, after a roller-coaster year for the inventor of ChatGPT. The agreement, reported by The New York Times but not yet confirmed by OpenAI, would mean the value of the company — a world leader in generative artificial intelligence — would have nearly tripled in under 10 months. The reported deal would have the San Francisco-based firm selling existing shares to investors led by Thrive Capital.

It would permit executives and employees to sell shares at a highly favorable price, just three months after the firm survived a major crisis when company co-founder and chief executive Sam Altman was fired

Wave of deals puts US shale oil back in focus

NEW YORK: American shale oil is back at the center of the global petroleum game, a driver of major deals involving petroleum giants more inclined to buy up rivals than to undertake wildcat exploration.

On Monday, Diamondback Energy announced the \$26 billion acquisition of Endeavor Energy, combining two of the top 10 producers in the Permian Basin, which has the largest unconventional petroleum reserves in the United States. The Permian, which is located in western Texas and eastern New Mexico, has emerged as an especially hot commodity.

In October, ExxonMobil announced the acquisition of Pioneer Natural Resources, the biggest Permian producer, for about \$60 billion. That was followed in December by Occidental Petro-

Could mini nuclear stations plug South Africa's power gaps?

PRETORIA: South African nuclear scientists want to build a new generation of mini nuclear reactors, both to plug holes in their own country's blackout-plagued grid and to build an export industry for the future. One company has designed a gas-cooled small modular reactor that it says can be installed within three years on a site smaller than a football field and safely produce enough power for a city.

Similar projects are underway in other countries, as the world confronts the challenge of powering a future economy of electrified transport, heating and data cen-

ters while slashing carbon emissions. Europe is divided on the way forward. Some countries, led by France, are betting on nuclear. Others, like Germany, are hoping that renewables like wind and solar will replace fossil fuels and make-up for the loss of access to Russia's natural gas exports. South Africa will rely on coal for some time to come but, with power already in short supply, it is betting on building up its nuclear program.

And some experts like Kelvin Kemm, a nuclear physicist and chief executive of Pretoria-based private outfit Stratek Global, think South Africa is uniquely placed to take the lead in developing fourth generation reactors.

"I believe the future is not only around the corner, I believe the future has arrived," Kemm told AFP in an interview in his garden in the Pretoria suburbs. "I see in the next half dozen years, there is going to be a massive worldwide proliferation of nuclear power of all sizes, that there will be a huge change of heart over the next 24 months. I believe South Africa is already a leader.'

South Africa's civilian nuclear journey began in 1976 when construction began on the Koeberg nuclear power plant, on the South Atlantic coast just north of Cape Town. It was commissioned 40 years ago and has a capacity of just under 2,000 megawatts, a small chunk of the 27,000 MW that South Africa's much-derided state electricity firm Eskom can deliver, thanks largely to carbon-intensive coal-fired plants.

But domestic demand for power often peaks at more than 32,000 MW per day, and South Africans face rolling blackouts or "load-shedding" of up to 12 hours a day, a serious burden on the economy of what should be the continent's powerhouse. In December, the government announced that it planned to bring the first of a new series of nuclear plants on stream by 2033, adding another 2,500 megawatts of capacity, while planning to renew Koeberg and extend its life for another 20 years.

But, even with solar panels springing up on homes and developments across the country, that still leaves the country short of power in the medium term. This is where, in the plans of nuclear evangelists like Kemm, small modular plants come in. Large plants like Koeberg, with its two French-designed pressurized water reactors (PWR), must be situated by the ocean to allow for 80 tonnes of cold water a second to be pumped in to cool its reactors.

Most of South Africa is dry, however, and its commercial hub Johannesburg and its energy intensive mines and industry are far from the sea. The capital Pretoria is as far from Cape Town's cool Atlantic shore as Rome is from London. This is where Stratek hopes to come in with its High Temperature Modular Reactor (HTMR-100). According to Kemm, who is already in talks with international operators from as far away as France as well as South Africa, these helium gas-cooled reactors can be installed in groups of up to 10 or typically six to power off the shelf steam turbines. — AFP



Burgan Bank records operating profit of KD 106 million in 2023

Bank reports KD 222 million in revenue and KD 43.5 million in net income

KUWAIT: Burgan Bank ("Burgan" or "the Bank") announced its financial results for the fiscal year ending December 31, 2023 (FY'23). The Bank capped off a pivotal transformational year with healthy revenue, stable asset levels and a solid capital base.

By year-end, Revenue reached KD 222 million, supported by 8 percent growth in non-interest income to reach KD 87 million, along with a solid net interest income of KD 135 million. The bank's operating profit for the year reached KD 106 million.

The bank generated shareholders' net income of KD 43.5 million in FY'23, with income falling marginally due to the impact of Turkey's hyperinflation-related monetary loss and no income from Bank of Baghdad (BoB), which was sold in Q1'23. On the other hand, Burgan's asset quality continues to be stable with a non-performing loan (NPL) ratio of 2 percent for 2023, with the cost of credit for the year falling to 10bps, an improvement of 40bps compared to last year.

Burgan also continued to implement one of the key facets and top priorities of its new transformational roadmap, with the strategic reallocation of its asset portfolio. After having sold its stake in BoB in Q1'23, the bank subsequently sold 52 percent of its stake in Burgan Bank Turkey (BBT) in Q4'23. As a result of these transactions, the bank's capital levels increased substantially in 2023, while also improving its risk profile. Burgan's CET1 ratio increased by 270bps to 13.5 percent and Tier 1 ratio increased by 290bps to 16.1 percent while the Bank's Capital Adequacy Ratio (CAR) increased by 320bps to 20.0 percent as of FY'23.

Commenting on Burgan's financial results, the Bank's Chairman Sheikh Abdullah Nasser Al-Sabah said: "This past year proved to be one of the most pivotal in Burgan Bank's almost fifty-year history, as we set about laying the groundwork for our expansive and progressive longterm strategy, with a new mission and vision in place. We have long-maintained a solid financial base and a responsive business model, but to ensure our sustainable growth in the years to come, it was essential that we adopt a much more aggressive and progressive approach to development." He added: "Our strategy necessitates major investments in our operations, our digital and technology infrastructure, and our human capital. Therefore, it was crucial that we balanced the ambitious growth potential with a prudent risk profile, safeguarding the Bank and its shareholder value."

The Chairman further stressed Burgan's renewed focus on its Kuwait operations, saying: "One of the central tenets of our transformational roadmap is strengthening our core Kuwait business. Our goal is to continue to reallocate assets across our portfolio, reassessing and optimizing certain aspects of our overall operations in line with our core business goals." According to the Bank's Chairman, this includes restructuring Burgan's portfolio, pursuing the sale of non-core assets, investing in new markets

and seeking growth opportunities in untapped segments.

The Chairman also noted that a clear indication of Burgan's solid financial core and its stable standing is its credit rating, as the Bank continues to be rated in investment grade by all the leading rating agencies with a stable outlook.

The bank continues to be rated well by all the major credit rating agencies. Burgan's Long- term Issuer Default Rating by Fitch is "A" with stable outlook, its Long-term Deposit Rating by Moody's is "Baa1" with stable outlook, and its Issuer Credit Rating by S&P is "BBB+" with stable outlook. Lastly, Capital Intelligence has affirmed the Bank's Long-term Foreign Currency ratings at "A+" with stable outlook.

Leading with innovation for a seamless, modern banking experience

In 2023, Burgan Bank continued to accelerate its efforts to enhance and develop its banking experience for all segments of customers. According to the Chairman, streamlining and enhancing the banking experience is at the heart of Burgan's new strategy. "When it comes to our banking journey and our solutions, we have adopted an integrated, innovation-driven approach. We seek to interweave our digital transformation with our ESG commitments to deliver the most modern, most inclusive and most personal experience possible to our customers. Digitization undoubtedly remains a central theme, but it goes beyond that. Burgan was also the first bank in the MENA region to implement a Visa solution allowing cardholders to easily enroll in multiple digital wallets and eCommerce merchants within their mobile banking app.

On another front, Burgan Bank continued to expand its segment offerings. In late 2023, and in an effort to elevate the banking experience it offers to its more affluent customer segment, the bank announced the launch of Elite Banking, a new banking segment for distinguished customers with an array of the finest services that unlock a world of luxury. The bank also revamped its existing premier banking to better serve

another segment of customers.

Additionally, in 2023, Burgan revamped its Kanz Draw Account, which is already considered one of the strongest in the market, in order to reward its customers and maximize their chances of winning valuable and life-transforming prizes. The remodeled draw account prizes grant customers an exclusive opportunity to win KD 2,000 in the monthly draw and KD 500,000 in the semi-annual draw, while the annual draw awards one lucky winner with the grand prize of KD 1,500,000.

A continued investment in Kuwaitization

Furthermore, the Chairman noted that one of the most important components of Burgan's new strategy is its investment in people and human capital. He said: "This year, we rolled out a comprehensive restructuring across the entire organization, including a number of strategic appointments and promotions at the leadership level, in order to truly position Burgan as the most progressive and dynamic Bank in Kuwait."

Burgan Bank continued to prioritize investing in its human capital and empowering its top Kuwaiti talents, especially in critical leadership positions. In fact, the Bank remained dedicated to nurturing employee potential and fostering a culture of dynamic development and



constant growth, enabling all employees to collectively lead the Bank's ambitious transformation plans.

In 2023, Burgan Bank became the first bank in Kuwait to be officially certified as a 'Great Place to Work', in addition to being named one of the 20 Best Workplaces in Kuwait and being ranked 27th on the 'Large Organizations' list of Best Workplaces in Asia 2023. This serves as the ultimate testament to the bank's people-first commitment and the soundness of its human capital investment and proves Burgan is well positioned as an employer of choice in the Kuwaiti market.

US inflation sticky as Japan, UK enter technical recession

KUWAIT: Higher than expected inflation data in the US drives significant movements in currencies, equities, and bonds across the board while the consumer price index report showed a higher-than-expected figure for January, at a 0.4 percent month-overmonth beating expectations of 0.3 percent. Meanwhile the year-over-year figure was up 3.1 percent, down from 3.4 percent in December, while remaining higher than the 2.9 percent expected figure. The report release was followed by a drop in major equities with the Dow Jones index dropping 1.35 percent and the S&P 500 dropping 1.37 percent. Meanwhile the 10-year bond yield reached 4.3104 percent up from 4.1514 percent. Expectations for rate cuts in 2024 were pushed down, with expectations for a rate cut in March dropping to 8.5 percent, as sticky inflation and a robust labor market is not going to add to Fed confidence that inflation is going to move sustainably towards 2 percent with looser monetary policy.

US core retail sales

US retail sales in January dropped the most in 10 months coming in at -0.8 percent and the so-called core retail sales which excludes automobiles, gasoline, building materials and food services decreased 0.4 percent in January. The plunge more likely reflects seasonal adjustments and freezing weather. In addition, the strong job market and wage growth suggests consumer spending will remain healthy, supporting the overall economy. January's 0.8 percent sales decline was surprising, exceeding forecasts and marking the biggest drop since March 2023. However, economists point out the drop was driven by

factors like a 4.1 percent drop in home improvement and a 1.7 percent plunge in auto sales, exceeded expectations due to larger-than-anticipated seasonal adjustments. The still-solid labor market and rising wages indicate ongoing consumer spending power, which should keep the economy expanding. Despite these weaknesses, signs point towards slowing goods price deflation and sustained economic growth.

Import prices climbed in January, suggesting inflation pressures might persist, but a strong labor market and wage growth indicate consumer spending should remain a pillar of the US economy.

Unemployment claims

The US labor market showed few signs of cooling last week. New claims for unemployment benefits fell to 212,000, below economists' expectations of 220,000. However, the 4-week average rose to 218,500, and claims for continued benefits reached 1.895 million. Overall, the US job market remains tight, with new claims for unemployment benefits falling below expectations of last week. However, the four-week moving average of claims rose, and claims for continued benefits remained elevated. This suggests that the labor market is not cooling as quickly as some economists had expected.

US producer price index

Wholesale prices jumped unexpectedly in January, dealing another blow to hopes of easing inflation. The producer price index rose 0.3 percent, exceeding predictions of a 0.1 percent increase and marking the biggest jump since August. Meanwhile, the core PPI which excludes volatile food and energy came in at 0.5 percent, surpassing expectations of 0.1 percent. This hotter-than-expected inflation at the wholesale level suggests potential continued inflation pressures for consumers down the line. The greenback traded sideways over the past week, closing at 104.296.

UK consumer price index

Inflation in the UK held steady at 4.0 percent in January, lower than expectations of 4.1 percent. Core inflation also remained unchanged at 5.1 percent, while services inflation rose to 6.5 percent, up from

6.4 percent the previous month. The data release came as a relief for the Bank of England, as markets anticipate a rate cut in the near future since inflation seems to be moving towards the 2 percent target. On the contrary, wage growth rose by 6.2 percent annually, double the pace that the BOE views as consistent with getting inflation back at 2 percent.

UK's economy dipped into a technical recession in late 2023, dealing a blow to PM Sunak's growth promises before key elections. GDP figures showed a 0.3 percent contraction in the last quarter compared to a 0.1 percent decline previously. This puts Britain alongside Japan in a technical recession, though it's likely mild. Investors expect interest rate cuts, businesses want government aid, and voters face falling living standards. On the contrary, the Bank of England is expecting signs of an upturn in the economy, with Governor Andrew Bailey stating that forecasts of a "somewhat stronger growth story" is expected ahead. The sterling underperformed over the past week, last seen at 1.2598.

Asia-Pacific

Japan's economy unexpectedly entered a recession in Q4 2023, shrinking 0.4 percent after a previous 3.3 percent decline, allowing Germany to now become the world's third biggest economy. This technical recession comes with doubts about the central bank's ability to exit its ultra-loose monetary policy. Weak domestic demand, including sluggish consumption and investment, are major concerns. Additionally, rising costs and labor shortages add pressure, while external demand offers some limited support. The Bank of Japan faces a tricky balancing act, considering global trends and potential risks. Opinions vary on the timing of potential policy shifts by the Bank of Japan as some see tight labor markets and corporate spending plans as reasons for optimism, while others warn of lingering risks and the need for caution despite signs of improvement in global growth forecasts. The yen over performed over the week, closing at 150.21.

China's consumer prices Consumer prices in China slid deeper into de-

flationary territory last month, suffering the biggest drop since the global recession in 2009. The country's Consumer Price Index dropped by 0.8 percent y/y in January, marking the steepest fall since September 2009 and marks fourth consecutive month of decline. The National Bureau of Statistics attributes the weak figure to the strong demand in January 2023 for the Lunar New Year when CPI rose 2.1 percent. This year the Lunar New Years falls in February, causing distortions to the base. Beijing is currently struggling to revive both consumer and investor confidence as it faces many challenges, including a real estate slump, stock market meltdown and weaker exports. Nevertheless, many analysts believe consumer prices are likely to rise from February onwards. The USD/CNY currency pair traded sideways over the week, last trading at 7.1929.

Australia

The Reserve Bank of Australia held its policy interest rate steady at 4.35 percent in a widely anticipated decision which followed 13 consecutive rate hikes since 2022. It noted that goods inflation was lower than forecast, but that services inflation remained high, with overall inflation at 4.1 percent. RBA Governor Michelle Bullock held a press conference after the meeting stating that the country was on track to get inflation within the bank's 2 percent to 3 percent target band by 2025, and to reach the midpoint of that range by 2026. Bullock added that while there were "encouraging signs," the RBA remains 'vigilant" to upside risks that would make it difficult to achieve its target. In its statement announcing its decision, the RBA said it didn't exclude further rises. 'We're not ruling in or out anything," Bullock said. 'We are focused on bringing inflation down. We still think the risks are balanced but, as you would know, the further out we go with our forecasts, the more uncertainty there is around them".

The AUD/USD currency pair traded sideways over the week, last trading at 0.6531.

howbiz A-listers Bad Bunny, Jennifer Lopez, Zendaya and Chris Hemsworth will be the cohosts of this year's Met Gala, one of the highlights of the New York social calendar, the Metropolitan Museum of Art announced. They will join Voque Editor-In-Chief Anna Wintour in hosting the May 6 gala, which sees the entertainment world's brightest stars parade through the museum in extravagant outfits, and marks the opening of the annual exhibit at the Met's Costume Institute.

The evening's dress code will be "The Garden of Time" — which draws inspiration from the 1962 short story of the same name written by English writer J.G. Ballard, and is in essence about the ephemeral nature of beauty. The theme parallels the show "Sleeping Beauties: Reawakening Fashion," an exhibit that will focus on the most fragile pieces of the Costume Institute's vast collection "visually united by iconography related to nature."

It will be on view to the public from May 10

through September 2. The Costume Institute relies on the Met Gala to fund its work, including exhibitions and acquisitions.

The gala was first held in 1948 and for decades was reserved for New York high society. Wintour, the high priestess of fashion, took over the show in the 1990s, transforming the party into a catwalk for the rich and famous. It's also become a social media extravaganza — both the gala and the exhibit are co-sponsored by TikTok. — AFP

HARRISON FORD'S 'STAR WARS' SCRIPT FETCHES £10,795 AT UK SALE

n original draft "Star Wars" script left in a London apartment by "Han Solo" actor Harrison Ford sold at a UK auction for £10,795 (\$13,600). The script was used when Ford was in London for the filming of the first installment of the epic saga, originally entitled "The Adventures Of Luke Starkiller", at Elstree Studios north of London.

The fourth draft of the screenplay, dating from March 15, 1976, was snapped up by an Austrian collector when it went under the hammer at Excalibur Auctions in Hertfordshire, north of London. Ford left the script at the London flat he rented at the time along with shooting schedules, which sold

for £4,826, and a letter from an agent or friend, which sold for £177.80.

The landlords renting the property found the items and kept them for decades. The incomplete and unbound script contains revisions, and introduces Han Solo on page 56.

The 1977 film catapulted Ford to international fame and he starred in seguels "The Empire Strikes Back" (1980) and "Return Of The Jedi" (1983), before taking on the role again in "The Force Awakens" (2015). Excalibur Auctions' auctioneer Jonathan Torode said this sale saw a new record set for a Star Wars script, "which shows how a personal link to the items is so enticing to Star Wars fans". — AFP

McCartney reunited with his missing 'Beatlemania' bass guitar

aul McCartney has expressed his gratitude after the Beatles legend was reunited with a missing bass guitar that he owned in the 1960s and used on several Fab Four tracks. McCartney played the original Höfner bass throughout the Beatlemania decade, including at Hamburg's Top Ten Club, at the Cavern Club in Liverpool and on early Beatles recordings at London's Abbey Road studios. It was used to record hits including "Love Me Do", "She Loves You", and "Twist and Shout".

The instrument was then thought to have been lost during the London "Get Back/Let It Be" recording sessions in January 1969, but an investigation last year discovered that it was actually stolen in 1972. The investigation was led by a guitar expert and two journalists, who launched a fresh drive to reunite the guitar with McCartney, vowing to solve what they branded "the greatest mystery in rock and roll".

After receiving hundreds of leads and suggestions, the "Lost Bass Project" pinpointed when and where it was stolen and other information before eventually discovering its most recent whereabouts. "Following the launch of last year's Lost Bass project, Paul's 1961 Hofner 500/1 bass guitar, which was stolen in 1972, has been returned," a post on McCartney's official website stated.

"The guitar has been authenticated by Hofner and Paul is incredibly grateful to all those involved." The "Lost Bass Project" said it was "thrilled". "Despite many telling us that it was lost forever or destroyed. we persisted until it was back where it belonged,"



the search team said on its dedicated website.

'Beatlemania history'


McCartney bought the left-handed Hofner 500/1 Violin Bass for around £30 - about £550 (\$585) today - in Hamburg in 1961, during The

Beatles' four-month residency at the Top Ten Club. Its appearance became unique after being overhauled in 1964, including with a complete respray in a three-part dark sunburst polyurethane finish,

with McCartney maintaining it as a back-up bass. The search team say it learned that the guitar had been stolen in 1972 from a van in London's Notting Hill neighborhood and was then given to a local pub landlord. Eventually, it ended up in the attic of a terraced house in the south coast of England, with the homeowner only realizing that the prized instrument was there following last

year's publicity. The original thief "didn't set out to steal the Beatles' bass and he didn't know he was taking such a piece of Beatlemania history," Scott Jones, one of the trio involved in the hunt, told BBC radio. "It was too hot to handle and that's when he decided to give the bass up to his local pub."

Jones' wife Naomi added: "the amazing thing is we thought when we started this search, that it could have been anywhere in the world." She noted there are big Beatles collectors in Japan and the team had tips that it could be in a millionaire's house in Jamaica. "Actually the geography of all of this is just a few miles in and around Notting Hill." — AFP



Family of Beach Boys' Brian Wilson seeks conservatorship

he family of Beach Boys founder Brian Wilson have asked a court to put him under a conservatorship as he struggles with a neurocognitive issue and requires help with daily life following his wife's recent death, they said. Wilson, regarded by many as a singular musical genius, has "a major neurocognitive disorder," according to court documents filed in Los Angeles this week, media reported. He "is unable to properly provide for his own personal needs

Following the death of Wilson's wife Melinda in late January, his family has asked the court for his business manager LeeAnn Hard, as well as his publicist and manager Jean Sievers, to be appointed to manage his affairs, a statement on the musician's website said. "This decision was made to ensure that there will be no extreme changes to the household and Brian and the children living at home will be taken care of and remain in

the home where they are cared for," the family's statement said.

"Brian will be able to enjoy all of his family and friends and continue to work on current projects as well as participate in any activities he chooses." Sievers told The New York Times that Wilson, 81, had been "diagnosed with dementia." Wilson's wife Melinda died at their Beverly Hills home on January 30 at the age of 77, he said on social media.

"Melinda was more than my wife. She was my savior. She gave me the emotional security I needed to have a career. She encouraged me to make the music that was closest to my heart. She was my anchor," he wrote at the time. A towering figure in the world of music, Wilson is responsible almost single-handedly for the California sound pioneered by the Beach Boys in the 1960s.

His signature blend of easy-sounding pop, underlaid by complex harmonies and often deeply poetic lyrics, elevated the band

far beyond its disposable surf-song image. The five-piece lineup melded innovative vocalizing with the driving rhythms of rock and roll, and used unconventional recording techniques to create an instantly recognizable sound.

Wilson's ferocious talent was, at times, overshadowed by mental health challenges that have dogged him throughout his adult

life. In 1964, he suffered a breakdown while on tour, forcing him to focus on recording, but heralding a period of extreme creativity that produced "Pet Sounds," amongst other albums. Experiments with drugs were coupled with bouts of depression and auditory hallucinations, as well as a diagnosis of schizoaffective disorder and bipolar disorder, according to a biographer. — AFP

Ancient viruses responsible for our big brains and bodies: Study

ncient viruses that infected vertebrates hundreds of millions of years ago played a pivotal role in the evolution of our advanced brains and large bodies, a study said. The research, published in the journal Cell, examined the origins of myelin, an insulating layer of fatty tissue that forms around nerves and allows electrical impulses to travel faster.

According to the authors, a gene sequence acquired from retroviruses — viruses that invade their host's DNA — is crucial for myelin production, and that code is now found in modern mammals, amphibians and fish. "The thing I find the most remarkable is that all of the diversity of modern vertebrates that we know of, and the size they've achieved: elephants, giraffes, anacondas, bullfrogs, condors wouldn't have happened," senior author and neuroscientist Robin Franklin of Altos Labs-Cambridge Institute of Science told AFP.

A team led by Tanay Ghosh, a computational biologist and geneticist in Franklin's lab, trawled through genome databases to try to discover the genetics that were likely associated with the cells that produce myelin.

Specifically, he was interested in exploring mysterious "noncoding regions" of the genome that have no obvious function and were once dismissed as junk, but are now recognized as having evolutionary importance. Ghosh's search landed upon a particular sequence derived from an endogenous retrovirus, long lurking in our genes, which the team dubbed "RetroMyelin." To test their finding, researchers carried out experiments in which they knocked down the RetroMyelin sequence in rat cells, and found they no longer produced a basic protein required for myelin formation.


Faster reactions, bigger bodies

Next, they searched for RetroMyelin-like sequences in the genomes of other species, finding similar code in jawed vertebrates — fellow mammals, birds, fish, reptiles and amphibians — but not in jawless vertebrates or invertebrates. This led them to believe the sequence appeared in the tree of life around the same time as jaws, which first evolved around 360 million years ago in the Devonian period, called the Age of Fishes.

"There's always been an evolutionary pressure to make nerve fibers conduct electrical impulses quicker," said Franklin. "If they do that quicker, then you can act quicker," he added, which is useful for both predators trying to catch things, and prey trying to flee.

Myelin enables rapid impulse conduction without widening the diameter of nerve cells, allowing them to be packed closer together. It also provides structural support, meaning nerves

can grow longer, allowing for longer limbs. In myelin's absence, invertebrates have found other ways to transmit signals faster — giant squids for example have evolved wider nerve cells. Finally, the team wanted to learn whether

the retroviral infection happened once, to a single ancestor species, or whether it happened more than once. They used computational methods to analyze the RetroMyelin sequences of 22 jawed vertebrate species, finding the sequences were more similar within than between species, which suggested multiple waves of infection.

More discoveries await?

"One tends to think of viruses as pathogens, or disease causing agents," said Franklin. But the reality is more complicated, he said: at various points in history retroviruses have entered genomes and integrated themselves into species' reproductive cells, allowing them to be passed

down to future generations. One of the most well known examples is the placenta — one of the defining characteristics of most mammals — which we acquired from a pathogen embedded in our genome in the deep past — and there probably many more discoveries waiting to be made, said Ghosh. Brad Zuchero, a neuroscientist at Stanford University not affiliated with the research, said it "fill(s) in a major piece of the puzzle about how myelin came to be during evolution," calling the paper "exciting and insightful." — AFP

UK MODELING AGENCY BREAKS CATWALK TABOOS

Smashing the fashion world's rigid conventions, UK modeling agency Zebedee has been filling catwalks with a diverse array of models for seven years. On the catwalks at London Fashion Week, it is now common to see models from all ethnic backgrounds, with minorities now making up around half of shows, compared to 14 percent just 10 years ago, according to a report published in January.

Zebedee also works to find greater exposure for models with visible disabilities or who are transgender. "It's still incredibly rare to see any-

body with a disability feature. London, Paris, Milan, New York, it's still very, very rare," Zebedee's co-founder Laura Winson told AFP. A former social worker who often worked with disabled people, Winson founded the agency in 2017 with her sister-in-law Zoe Proctor, a former model.

"We launched it because we felt that there was a lack of representation and fashion and media," she explained. Zebedee works like any other agency, except that all of its models have a "visible difference". Some are in wheelchairs, have atrophy of limbs or albinism, while others have Down syndrome. Around 15 percent of the world's population, or one billion people, live with some form of disability, according to UN figures. "Yet figures show that maybe around one percent of people featured in advertising

have a disability", with catwalk representation even worse, pointed out Winson.

Relentless campaign

Two Zebedee models will tread the catwalk at London Fashion Week: Vic, a young woman in a wheelchair who will show for Gasanova, and Oscar, a transgender model with autism, who will display for Helen Kirkum. It is reward for Winson's years of relentless campaigning to convince designers and brands of the advantages of employing a diverse roster of models.

"The first thing is, of course, it's morally the right thing to do, everybody should be awarded the same equality of opportunity," she explained. "Secondly, you can develop some amazing creative campaigns. We know that our models can do the job."

"And then the third reason, and which is what interests most customers, is the financial aspect," because people with disabilities represent an important market, she added. For Zebedee, success really began in 2020 when Gucci chose one of their models, Ellie Goldstein, who has Down syndrome.


Goldstein has since graced the cover of British Vogue, and Zebedee has also gone from strength to strength, representing more than a thousand models in Europe, the United States and Australia.

'Genuine change happening'

Junior B, a Briton who uses the non-binary pronouns they/them, started working with the agency in 2020. Suffering from Ehlers-Danlos syndrome, Junior B often uses a wheelchair. "Before modeling, I didn't think any job was possible for anyone in my position," Junior B told AFP. "I think there is definitely some genuine change happening," particularly among small businesses "or those where younger people are in charge," added the model.

"Some brands have really got the message". Despite the wins, Winson complained that progress is still too slow. "Everybody knows who we are, everybody knows we exist. They can book disabled models if they want to... but for some reason, it's not happening," she complained. "So I am getting to the point where somehow brands need to be held to account," she added. — AFP

India crush England with record win to lead Test series

We've got to win the next two to win the series: Stokes

RAJKOT: Yashasvi Jaiswal hit an unbeaten double century to help India to its biggest-ever win Sunday, crushing England by 434 runs in the third Test to take a 2-1 lead in the series. Chasing 557 for victory, England's batting fell like a pack of cards with the loss of eight wickets in the final session to be dismissed for 122 on day four in Rajkot.

"In Test cricket... when you're playing well you have to make it big," Jaiswal told broadcasters after the stunning win. "Test cricket is hard, but I thought that when I'm in there, I need to give my 100 percent," he said. Ravindra Jadeja got Mark Wood out for 33 as the final wicket — and his fifth — and he kissed the pitch as India registered their greatest win in terms of runs.

England lost their openers, including first-innings centurion Ben Duckett run out on four, before tea and Jadeja then rattled the middle-order with his left-arm spin. Jonny Bairstow and Joe Root extended their poor run in the five-match series, out for four and seven respectively. Skipper Ben Stokes attempted to resist the Indian bowling but fell lbw to left-arm wrist spinner Kuldeep Yadav for 15 in his 100th Test. "We're 2-1 down in the series but still have two games left," Stokes said. "We leave this game behind — know we've got to win the next two to win the series."

'Bat till the end'

The left-handed Jaiswal stood out with his 214 off 236 balls to flay the opposition attack before

India declared their second innings on 430-4. The opener returned to bat in the morning session after he retired hurt on 104 late on day three due to back pain. "Today when I came, I wanted to make sure that I take the game forward and bat till the end," Jaiswal said.

He raised his second double ton in consecutive matches with a single off Root and jumped for joy. Jaiswal hit a record-equalling 12 sixes in his knock, which included three straight hits over the fence off James Anderson — a first for the veteran quick who has 696 wickets in 185 Tests.

Jaiswal now stands level with former Pakistan great Wasim Akram, who also hit 12 sixes in an innings against Zimbabwe in 1996. He put on marathon stands that included an unbeaten 172-run partnership with debutant Sarfaraz Khan, who made 68 for his second half-century of the match.

The 22-year-old Jaiswal, who hit a match-winning 209 in the second Test, remains the leading batsman in the series with 545 runs. Indian bowlers set up victory after they bowled England out for 319 in the first innings, after the tourists' batting collapsed from 299-5 despite the absence of star spinner Ravichandran Ashwin on Saturday.

Ashwin, who left the Test midway on day two due to a family emergency hours after taking his 500th Test wicket, returned to the field and got his 501st wicket on the fourth day. Off-spinner Ashwin, 37, became only the ninth bowler in Test history and the second Indian after fellow spinner Anil



Kumble (619) to reach 500 wickets.

Mike Procter

S Africa cricket legend Procter dies at 77

JOHANNESBURG: South Africa cricket legend and former national coach Mike Procter died on Saturday at the age of 77, his wife told AFP. "He suffered a complication during surgery, became unconscious and never woke up," Maryna Procter said.

Procter was an outstanding all-rounder who became South Africa's first coach in the post-isolation era and had a controversial stint as an International Cricket Council (ICC) match referee. On Monday his family revealed that he had suffered a "cardiac incident" while recovering in a hospital intensive care unit following routine surgery.

Procter was being treated in a hospital near his hometown, the coastal city of Durban. Procter's international playing career with South Africa was cut short in 1970 when his country was banished from world cricket because of its apartheid government.

However, he refused to feel bitter over being deprived of a lengthy Test career. "Yes, I lost a Test career. But what is a Test career compared to the suffering of 40 million people?" he famously said.

'Unjust system'

"Lots of people lost a great deal more in those years, and if by missing out on a Test career we played a part in changing an unjust system, then that is fine by me." Before the ban, South Africa won six of the seven Tests in which he played, all against Australia.

Procter was renowned primarily as a fearsome fast bowler, taking 41 wickets at an average of 15.02 runs in his seven Tests. But he was also a flamboyant batsman, and equalled a world batting record when he hit six first-class centuries in successive innings.

Post-democracy, South Africa returned to international cricket, Procter became coach of the international side and led them to the semi-finals of the 1992 World Cup. Procter played first-class cricket for 16 years, including 14 seasons with English county Gloucestershire, five of them as captain, where he achieved legendary status.

David Graveney, a former Gloucestershire teammate of Procter, said the South African "was a fantastic player and quite rightly regarded as one of the best all-rounders that has ever represented Gloucestershire".

He added: "I don't think people realize that when Mike played he was playing through great pain in his knee, but that didn't stop him from performing at the level he did. He was just one of the best I ever played with.

"The phrase 'Proctershire' was very apt for Mike. He put in the biggest performances in the biggest games." In South Africa, Procter played most of his cricket for Natal, the province where he was born. His six successive centuries were made for the then Rhodesia between 1970 and 1971, culminating in a career-best 254 against Western Province.

He scored 21,082 runs in first-class cricket at an average of 36.92, hitting 47 centuries, and took 1,357 wickets at an average of 19.07 runs. Journalist Pat Murphy who worked alongside Procter hailed "the superb all-rounder". — AFP

Kriechmayr wins shortened super-G

Kriechmayr, a 32-year-old Austrian, finished 0.17sec ahead of Canadian Jeffrey Read, who claimed his first World cup podium place.

Odermatt and Italian Dominik Paris were another 0.02sec back in third. The competition was run from a significantly lower start due to poor visibility at the top of the course and the risk of ice forming

Rodri salvages point but Man City stumble in Premier League title race

City move four points behind leaders Liverpool and two adrift of Arsenal

Manchester City's year-long unbeaten record at home but a 1-1 draw against Chelsea on Saturday handed Liverpool and Arsenal a huge boost in the Premier League title race.

Raheem Sterling gave Chelsea a first-half lead on his return to the Etihad and City were headed to a first defeat on home soil for 34 games until Rodri's deflected effort seven minutes from time. City move four points behind leaders Liverpool and two adrift of Arsenal, but have a game in hand on both their title rivals.

A 3-1 Champions League win in Copenhagen in midweek was City's 11th consecutive victory in all competitions as they appeared well set to defend the treble of Premier League, Champions League and FA Cup they won last season. But Chelsea exposed chinks in the champions' armour. City have kept just seven clean sheets in 24 Premier League games this season.

"I think we weren't great in the first half. We conceded another easy goal. I think we have to defend better," said Rodri. "We knew about their counter-attacks and fast players, but we have to defend the counter-attack better. From there, it's always more difficult to come back." Mauricio Pochettino's men have often saved their best performances for the biggest challenges during a difficult season for the Blues.

Chelsea took points off all three title contenders at home earlier in the season and finally produced a counter-attacking display on the road that offers Pochettino hope ahead of next weekend's League Cup final against Liverpool.

"I feel like the lads are confident," said Chelsea

Haaland's night to forget

Chelsea should have led much earlier in the first half as Nicolas Jackson failed to beat Ederson when clean through after a slick counter-attack cut City wide open. Pep Guardiola's men did not learn their lesson as another ex-City man Cole Palmer sent Jackson in behind and he picked out Sterling, who coolly cut inside Kyle Walker and fired into the far corner on 42 minutes. Sterling's celebrations were muted, but the goal would have been greeted with glee in Merseyside and north London.

Erling Haaland had headed over City's only clear chance of the opening 45 minutes, but they flew out of the blocks after the break. Kevin De Bruyne's dipping free-kick landed on the roof of the net before Sterling was exceptionally lucky to avoid conceding a penalty for bringing down Walker inside the area.

However, as City chased an equalizer they became even easier to pick off on the counter. Ederson produced a stunning save to deny Sterling his second and Ruben Dias needed to head Ben Chilwell's follow-up effort off the line.

Haaland's pace and power finally took him clear of the Chelsea defence 25 minutes from time, but Djordje Petrovic was equal to his deflected effort at the near post. The Norwegian had nine shots on goal, but his night to forget was then rounded off when he left the 53,000 capacity crowd aghast as he headed well off target with the goal gaping from a perfect-

the winner in last season's Champions League final needed the aid of a deflection as his driven effort flew into the top corner off Trevoh Chalobah. An unexpected point lifts Chelsea back into the top half of the table and within six points of the top six. — AFP

Juve hand Inter nine-point lead as Napoli crisis grows

MILAN: Juventus trail Serie A leaders Inter Milan by nine points after a 2-2 at relegation-threatened Verona, while a 1-1 draw with Genoa left champions Napoli deep in crisis.

Massimiliano Allegri's side had their league title hopes further damaged following an entertaining encounter in which Adrien Rabiot saved Juve from losing a third consecutive match.

France midfielder Rabiot rifled home second-placed Juve's leveller nine minutes after the break, moments after Tijjani Noslin had put hosts Verona ahead for the second time in the match.

Michael Folorunsho, whose touch led to Noslin's goal, had smashed Marco Baroni's team into the lead early on with a stunning volley only for Dusan Vlahovic to equalize from the penalty spot in the 28th minute. "We should have done more, we've dropped points along the way recently. But we started playing too late and it's those details which make the difference," said Rabiot.

"We need to get back on track, regain trust in ourselves and starting winning again." The draw didn't do a huge amount for Verona as they stay just inside the relegation zone, level on points with 17thplaced Sassuolo who were beaten 3-0 by Atalanta but have a game in hand.

However it was a strong performance for a club that let a raft of players go in January, and it also extended Juve's winless run to four matches. That poor form means that Juve are not only watching Inter charge off into the distance, they are now also looking over their shoulders at AC Milan. A win at Monza on Sunday night would allow Milan, two points behind Juve in third, to snatch second spot from their rivals. "We need to be realistic," added Rabiot. "Inter are going their own way and we need to fight to keep hold of second place."

Napoli booed off Napoli's draw was another heavy blow for the

ailing Serie A champions ahead of the visit of Barcelona in the Champions League on Wednesday. Cyril Ngonge saved a home point for Napoli in the final minute after Morten Frendrup had given Genoa the lead with a powerful first-time finish just after half-time. Napoli ran away with the league title last season but are now 27 points behind Inter in ninth spot meaning their chances of a place in next season's revamped Champions League are increasingly slim. Nine points separate Napoli from fourth-placed Atalanta who ensured that they will stay in the top four for at least another

week with a fifth win in as many games. "The players do what they can but things just don't go our way," said Napoli coach Walter Mazzarri, whose position is under serious threat after collecting just 15 points from 12 matches since taking over in November. "The few errors we make we always have to correct because we end up conceding. We try everything but we struggle to score goals. It's hard to explain." Ngonge's low finish meant Napoli avoided a ninth defeat in all competitions since Mazzarri replaced Rudi Garcia, but being booed off the pitch was awful preparation for their last 16 tie with Barca.

Neither Napoli nor Barca are having stellar seasons but it would have been impossible to imagine how far Napoli would fall so soon after last season's historic third league title. Mazzarri said that he "hopes" to have star striker Victor Osimhen back for Wednesday's first leg in Naples after sitting out Saturday's defeat. But Napoli's goal problems run deeper than Osimhen having been at the Africa Cup of Nations with Nigeria and they created very little against 12th-placed Genoa, making a result against Barca look like a huge task. — AFP

Mbappe scores as sub to help PSG see off Nantes

PARIS: Kylian Mbappe came off the bench and scored a penalty as Paris Saint-Germain beat Nantes 2-0 on Saturday after the France captain informed the club this week he plans to leave at the end of the season. Lucas Hernandez's deflected strike broke the deadlock on the hour at the Stade de la Beaujoire before Mbappe made sure of the points after he was fouled inside the area. PSG stretched their lead at the top of Ligue 1 to 14 points with a record-extending 12th title surely now a formality after Nice suffered a fifth loss in nine games Friday.

The main talking point in Paris though will be the future of Mbappe, who is seemingly entering the final months of a seven-year stint with the French champions. The 25-year-old has told club officials he intends to depart on a free transfer when his contract expires and has been widely tipped to move to Real Madrid. It is understood that Mbappe's exit will be formally announced in a few months' time. "It's all going very well with Mbappe, there's no problem," PSG coach Luis Enrique told Canal Plus after the game. PSG toiled for an hour without the league's top scorer as Mbappe, who struck in the 2-0 win over Real Sociedad in the Champions League in midweek, started on the bench in Nantes.

'It's very easy yet difficult to explain," Luis Enrique said of the decision to leave Mbappe out of the lineup. "After our Champions League match two days ago I thought we needed energy to play well and that it was necessary to give minutes to those who didn't play (on Wednesday). "We have ambitious goals and we need all the players." Nantes had the clearer chances in the first half, Mostafa Mohamed denied by Gianluigi Donnarumma's foot and Nicolas Cozza thwarted by a desperate Marquinhos block. Nicolas Pallois' volley was ruled out for offside just before the break, with his dipping long-range drive tipped over by Donnarumma early in the second half. PSG benefited from a considerable degree of good fortune to go in front as Hernandez's shot hit Moussa Sissoko and left Nantes goalkeeper Remy Descamps stranded. — AFP

Lewandowski double snatches tame Barca win at Celta

VIGO: Robert Lewandowski's brace snatched champions Barcelona a 2-1 win over lowly Celta Vigo to leave them third in La Liga, trailing leaders Real Madrid by seven points. Xavi Hernandez's side needed a stoppage-time penalty converted by Lewandowski at the second attempt to find a way past a Celta Vigo side battling relegation, down in 17th place.

Lewandowski slammed the visitors ahead at Balaidos before half-time but Iago Aspas levelled for Rafa Benitez's Celta early in the second half. Barcelona tamely struggled to find a way through before being gifted a late spot-kick for a clumsy foul on Lamine Yamal, which Lewandowski dispatched for his 12th goal of the season.

Lewandowski's first penalty attempt was saved by Vicente Guaita but as the goalkeeper was off his line, the striker was given another chance and he converted. "On the second penalty I scored and that's the important thing," Lewandowski told DAZN.

"In attack we didn't put much together, we have to play (well) for more than 45 minutes, I think that's the main objective for the future, to play at the same level for 90 minutes." The Catalans are unbeaten in four matches since Xavi said he would depart at the end of the season and face Napoli on Wednesday in the Champions League last 16, with Europe the club's last realistic chance of silverware this season.

"I felt we played well until we got into the final third ... we lacked the final ball, we were well positioned, they created little againt us," Xavi told

DAZN. "I think the team had effort, attitude, commitment, the decision I made (to leave) was to get that, and it's going well - 10 points from 12."

Xavi handed Brazilian forward Vitor Roque his first start for the club on the left of the attack, alongside Lewandowski and 16-year-old sensation Yamal. The latter was Barcelona's brightest player once again, with the Catalans dependent on his skill and speed on the right flank to create danger.

Despite controlling the first half Barcelona failed to threaten much beyond a Yamal shot which Vicente Guaita did well to tip away. At the other end Ronald Araujo sprinted back well to stop Jorgen Strand Larsen running through on goal. Barca broke the deadlock in the 45th minute when Yamal fed Le-

wandowski, who lashed home superbly from just inside the area. The lead did not last long, with Aspas pouncing two minutes into the second half to level.

A slick move from Celta was finished by the veteran forward after former Barcelona defender Oscar Mingueza backheeled the ball into his path. Aspas' strike bounced in off Jules Kounde, with the deflection taking the ball over the outstretched arm of Marc-Andre ter Stegen. Guaita got his fingertips to a swirling Raphinha free-kick as Barcelona hunted for the winner without success, until Yamal won a penalty in stoppage time. Celta's Fran Beltran accidentally kicked the winger when trying to clear the ball and Lewandowski converted from the spot to steal Barcelona three points. — AFP

Lyles pips Coleman to win US indoor crown

LOS ANGELES: Noah Lyles produced a dramatic late burst to defeat rival Christian Coleman in the 60m at the US Indoor athletics championships in New Mexico on Saturday. Lyles, the reigning 100m and 200m world champion, took the tape in a world-leading time of 6.43sec to book his place on the US squad for next month's World Indoor Championships in Glasgow.

The 26-year-old from Florida had never beaten world record-holder Coleman over 60m before Saturday's race in Albuquerque. Out of the blocks, it looked as if that losing streak might continue as Coleman exploded clear of the field with a superb start. But Lyles accelerated through the gears smoothly to pip Coleman at the line. Coleman took second in 6.44sec, with Ronnie Baker third in 6.51.

"I've dreamed of the day that my 60m got faster; I come out every year trying to get faster and faster and faster," Lyles said after the win. Lyles said the blistering performance leaves him and Coleman as the men to beat at the world championships.

"World domination, we're the best in the world," Lyles said of the duo's prospects in Glasgow. "World domination — there ain't nothing else to say. We're going to make sure that everybody knows we're real world champions." The 60m duel was the highlight of the final day of competition on Saturday. In other races, Aleia Hobbs left it late before overhauling training partner Mikiah Brisco to win the women's 60m title in 7.02sec. Brisco made an electric start to edge clear early on but Hobbs surged home in the final 10 meters to take the tape. — AFP

Rayo hold Liga leaders Madrid

Real have suffered just one defeat and are unbeaten in 19 league matches



MADRID: La Liga leaders Real Madrid stumbled to a frustrating 1-1 draw at neighbours Rayo Vallecano on Sunday but stretched their lead at the top to six points. Joselu fired the visitors in front early on but former Madrid youth player Raul de Tomas levelled for Rayo from the penalty spot in coach Inigo Perez's first match at the helm.

Carlo Ancelotti's side extended their lead over surprise challengers Girona before the Catalan minnows face Athletic Bilbao on Monday. After Los Blancos thrashed Girona last weekend to take a five-point lead in the title race, the draw allows their closest pursuers a chance to cut the gap. Dani Carvajal was sent off at the death for Madrid after appearing to elbow Kike Perez. "We have to win all our games, but to win a league, the games you can't win, you can't lose them (either)," Madrid coach Ancelotti told reporters.

"Sometimes draws can hurt a bit but it could be a positive step to take us closer to winning the league." Real Madrid have suffered just one defeat in the top flight and are unbeaten in 19 league matches. Rayo, 14th, sacked Francisco Rodriguez earlier this week and appointed Perez, with Madrid's visit a baptism of fire.

id's visit a baptism of fire. It took only three minutes for Madrid to take the lead, with Fede Valverde racing down the right on a sharp counter-attack. The Uruguayan crossed for Joselu to bundle home and despite initially being called offside, VAR showed the goal should stand.

Joselu headed home a second but this time it was correctly disallowed after Lucas Vazquez had taken the ball out of play before crossing for his Spanish compatriot. Despite taking an early lead, Madrid failed to create many clear openings. Los Blancos were without top goalscorer Jude Bellingham, currently recovering from an ankle injury. They earned a 1-0 win over RB Leipzig in the Champions League in midweek and perhaps tiredness told against an energised, hard-working Rayo.

De Tomas delivers

The hosts pulled level through De Tomas' penalty after 27 minutes, slammed down the middle after Eduardo Camavinga handled Oscar Trejo's shot. Valverde, heavily involved, cracked a shot against the post from 20 yards as Madrid looked to restore their lead.

At the other end Andriy Lunin was alert to save at the near post from Alvaro Garcia after Rayo picked Luka Modric's pocket. Substitute Toni Kroos forced a good save from Rayo goalkeeper Stole Dimitrievski with a free-kick as the clock ticked down. The Macedonian stopper also fielded a long range Carvajal drive in stoppage time.

The defender was then dismissed for swinging an elbow at Kike Perez in frustration after his shirt was pulled to earn a second yellow card and end a disappointing afternoon for Madrid. "We started very well, good with the ball, we scored, they ruled out another one marginally, Federico hit the post ... until the penalty we did everything well," added Ancelotti.

Rayo have not won in seven matches across all competitions but will be proud of the draw. De Tomas, brought into the team by Perez as a starter, was happy to score his first goal of the season, with Rayo midfielder Isi Palazon giving him the ball to take the spot kick.

"With the run we've been on this draw will do us a lot of good," De Tomas told Movistar. "(Scoring) took a weight off me, I'm grateful Isi let me have the penalty knowing that I've gone a long time without scoring a goal."

Later Sunday, Granada face Almeria in a battle between the bottom two, while Real Sociedad visit Mallorca and Real Betis host Alaves. — AFP

Brighton push Sheffield Utd closer to drop as Holgate sees red

SHEFFIELD: Brighton pushed Sheffield United closer to relegation as the Premier League's bottom club capitulated after Mason Holgate's dismissal in Sunday's 5-0 rout at Bramall Lane. Holgate was sent off early in the first half for the United defender's ugly foul on Kaoru Mitoma.

Brighton made the most of Holgate's exit as Facundo Buonanotte and Danny Welbeck struck in quick succession. Jack Robinson's second half own goal was followed by Simon Adingra's late brace, condemning the shambolic Blades to a sixth defeat in their last nine league games.

Chris Wilder's team are languishing seven points from safety with 13 games left to avoid an immediate return to the Championship. United's 65 goals conceded in the Premier League this season are the most ever by a side in their first 25 matches in the competition.

A victory at fellow strugglers Luton last weekend had breathed new life into the Blades' hopes of avoiding relegation. Yet they reverted to type with a self-inflicted loss that edged them nearer to the drop.

Brighton were winless in their last six Premier League away matches, but they had won 5-2 at Bramall Lane in the FA Cup fourth round in January and ended their barren stretch on their return to Yorkshire. United threatened a goal inside two minutes when James McAtee picked out Jayden Bogle on the edge of the area and his drive was pushed away by Bart Verbruggen.

That proved a crucial moment as Brighton took control. Wilder's men were reduced to 10 men in the 13th minute when Holgate's studs-up high challenge left Mitoma writhing in pain. Holgate was initially booked but referee Stuart Attwell upgraded his decision to red card after using the pitchside monitor to review the on-loan Everton right-back's crude foul.

Brighton needed just seven minutes to make their numerical advantage count. United complained that Brighton should not have been given as a corner be-

cause the ball appeared to come off Welbeck last.

From the controversial set-piece, Buonanotte made the Blades pay as he scrambled his effort over the line just before it was hacked clear. Brighton struck again four minutes later, with former Manchester United forward Welbeck lashing high into the net from close-range after Wes Foderingham pushed Mitoma's shot into his path.

Wilder was left cursing his luck when Ben Osborn's close-range volley was ruled out by VAR for a tight offside call against the defender. Roberto De Zerbi's side wrapped up their second league win of 2024 in the 75th minute when Robinson turned Mitoma's cross into his own net. — AFP

Bukhov grabs world title, urges Olympics ban on Russians

DOHA: Ukraine's Vladyslav Bukhov sprung a surprise as he claimed his first world swimming title in Doha on Saturday and then said Russia should "absolutely not" be allowed at the Paris Olympics. After the 21-year-old edged the two previous world champions to the wall to win the men's 50m freestyle, he said his preparation had been tough.

"It's hard, really hard," he said. "We train while Russian rockets are flying round the swimming pool. You never know if you stay alive or not. It's difficult. For all Ukrainians." Asked if Russians should compete at the Paris Olympics in five months, he said: "Absolutely not." "I want to say Russia is dangarous and should not

"I want to say Russia is dangerous and should not be supported in competition." Bukhov had the slowest reaction time off the starting blocks, but claimed his first world championship medal as he beat Australian defending champion Cameron McEvoy to the touch by one hundredth of a second.

Britain's Ben Proud, the winner two years ago in Budapest, was 0.09sec back. "Really tough. Never know who wins," said Bukhov. "I just did my job." Pan Zhanle swam another blazing 100m freestyle relay leg as he set China on track for another gold with the leadoff in the mixed 100m relay,

Pan swam 47.29, faster than his winning time in the individual final but slower than his world record 46.80sec leading off the men's 100m relay final last Sunday. The Chinese quartet led throughout to finish in 3min 21.18sec, set an Asian record and beat Australia by 0.60sec. The United States were another half second back in third.

Pan and 18-year-old Wang Haoyu, who were also part of the Chinese team that took the men's 200m freestyle relay, both collected their third team golds of the competition. Li Bingjie, who was part of China's victorious women's 200m quartet, won her second relay gold of the championships. Sprint queen Sarah Sjostrom collected her 13th world title when she won the 50m butterfly.

The Swede, who claimed her first world title in 2009 in Rome, won in 24.63sec, finishing a decisive 0.81sec ahead of French swimmer Melanie Henique. Egyptian Farida Osman was third. The 30-year-old remains the only woman to break 25sec in the event. Sjostrom's

12 individual titles have all come over 50m or 100m in either freestyle or butterfly but she withdrew from the 100m free in Doha.

"I don't want to be greedy," she said. "Look at all my medals I won already and you will know why I don't have to do that many races any more." Saturday's victory was her sixth straight 50m butterfly world title.

Henique and Osman each won a third world championship medal, neither has yet won a gold. Henique took a silver behind Sjostrom two years ago. Osman has three bronzes, all in races Sjostrom won. American Claire Curzan completed a sweep of the women's individual backstroke events as she won the 200m. — AFP
