We want to open Kuwait, Deputy PM reveals

KUWAIT: Deputy Prime Minister and Defense Minister Sheikh Fahad Yousef Saud Al-Sabah revealed on Saturday that the government is considering an 'amnesty' plan to allow residency violators to leave Kuwait starting in March and ending in May, noting that violators could apply for a visa to return to Kuwait via legal and approved channels.

He called upon those who violated residency law to take advantage of the 'amnesty' period or face permanent deportation from Kuwait.

On the latest decisions to allow visit and family visas, the minister said that Kuwait was affected by the absence of a qualified workforce in several sectors, especially in the healthcare sector. The reintroduction of such visas would be done through several criteria, he said and sponsors requesting the visa would be notified of the number of days the visitor should stay within rules and regulations via text and other methods. Sponsors violating the new laws would

be blocked from completing other government transactions, warned the minister.

On the benefits of introducing visit visas to the population, the minister said that the country expects 100,000 to 200,000 visitors who would be staying for a period of 30 to 60 days, which would be beneficial for the econ-

omy. Activating the economy, added Sheikh Fahad, is also related to building a huge airport. "We want to open Kuwait and show them how beautiful the country and its culture are. The weather is pleasant in 4-5 months, and people are more than welcome to visit Kuwait", he stated.

Countering rumors and fake accounts spreading misinformation and false news in addition to finding solutions for those violating residency are among the top priorities for the state, said the Deputy Prime Minister said, separately in an interview with KUNA. He affirmed that the ministries of Defense and Interior were following a well-devised and strict vision aimed at justly enforcing the law on all without discrimination or favoritism.

He indicated that combating illicit drugs, developing traffic rules, national military service, and bolstering the country's economy by allowing several entry visas

Kuwait official gazette publishes poll decree

KUWAIT: Kuwait's official gazette published Decree No. 29/2024 inviting eligible voters to elect National Assembly (parliament) members on April 4, 2024. Head of the Local Affairs Sector and Government Spokesman Amer Al-Ajmi stated last Tuesday that the Kuwait Cabinet had approved a draft decree inviting voters to elect National Assembly (parliament) members on April 4, 2024, and referred it to His Highness the Amir Sheikh Mishal Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah. — KUNA

US destroys Houthi's surface-to-air missile

WASHINGTON: US forces struck and destroyed a Houthi surface-to-air missile in Yemen after deciding it posed an "imminent threat" to American aircraft, the US Central Command in the Middle East announced. The Iran-backed Houthis, who control much of war-torn Yemen, have been attacking shipping in the Red Sea since November in a campaign they say is in solidarity with Palestinians in Gaza amid the Zionist-Hamas war. The United States is spearheading a naval coalition to protect vessels in the vital waterway, and has also conducted air strikes in Houthi territory, both on its own and alongside Britain. On Friday afternoon, US "forces conducted a self-defense strike against one Iranian-backed Houthi surface-to-air missile that was prepared to launch," CENTCOM said in a statement, adding it had "determined (the missile) presented an imminent threat to U.S. aircraft in the region." — AFP



US drops aid into Gaza as kids die of malnutrition

GAZA: Zionist top ally the United States said it began air-dropping aid into war-ravaged Gaza on Saturday, as the Hamas-ruled territory's health ministry reported more than a dozen child malnutrition deaths. The start of the US relief operation came hours after President Joe Biden, who has pushed Zionists to allow more aid in, announced the move and spoke of the "need to do more" after nearly five months of devastating conflict.

Asia's wealthiest man takes global rich to the zoo

AHMEDABAD: Top global celebrities donned "jungle fever" outfits in India for a trip to the zoo on Saturday as part of a party thrown by Asia's richest man. Pop star Rihanna, Facebook founder Mark Zuckerberg and Donald Trump's daughter Ivanka are among the rich and famous guests who jetted in for a three-day gala celebration hosted by billionaire tycoon Mukesh Ambani. This weekend's party is an elaborate pre-wedding ceremony for younger son Anant and fiancee Radhika Merchant, the daughter of wealthy pharmaceutical moguls.

The three-day gala - which saw "Umbrella" singer Rihanna perform on Friday for the first time since last year's Super Bowl – continued on Saturday with a trip to an "animal rescue centre" housing exotic animals. The facility is a pet project of Anant's built in his family's hometown Jamnagar in western Gujarat state, where the weekend party is taking place.

Over one billion suffer obesity

PARIS: More than one billion people around the world are now suffering from obesity with the number having more than quadrupled since 1990, according to a study released by the Lancet medical journal. The "epidemic" is particularly hitting poorer countries and the rate is growing among children and adolescents faster than adults, according to the study carried out with the World Health Organization.

The study, released ahead of World Obesity Day on March 4, estimated that there were about 226 million obese adults, adolescents and children in the world in 1990. The figure had risen to 1,038 million in 2022. Francesco Branca, director of nutrition for health at the WHO, said the rise past one billion people has come "much earlier than we have anticipated".

PF believes that creatives are the foundation of a harmonious society,





'Advancing Diplomacy in Times of Turmoil'

ANTALYA: Representative of His Highness the Amir Sheikh Mishal Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah, Minister of Foreign Affairs Abdullah Al-Yahya, took part in the opening session of the 3rd Antalya Diplomacy Forum, inaugurated by Turkish President Recep Tayyip Erdogan. The two-day forum, titled "Elevating Diplomacy Amidst Crises," featured several heads of state, or their representatives, as well as a number of ministers, diplomats, and dignitaries, as well as representatives from 80 international organizations.

The Turkish city of Antalya hosted the third Antalya Diplomatic Forum, under the auspices of Turkish President Recep Tayyip Erdogan and welcomed numerous heads of state, ministers, diplomats, and prominent business figures. The delegation representing Kuwait at the forum, which ran until March 2nd, was headed by the representative of His Highness the Amir Sheikh Mishal Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah, Minister of Foreign Affairs.

Over 20 heads of state and government attended, along with 90 ministers, including 60 foreign ministers from over 100 countries. Representatives from around 80 international organizations also participated, along with approximately 4,000 guests, in the forum, which hosted over 50 sessions and drew in a media presence comprising 750 journalists, including 250 international journalists. — KUNA



Ministry of Interior said that it has not issued any permit to hold any gathering referred to on social networking sites and appeals to everyone to comply with the laws. — KUNA

Jordan Royal Air Force air-drops Kuwait's medical aid into Gaza

GCC chief deplores Gaza killings

AMMAN: The Jordanian Royal Air Force has carried out an airdrop of medical appliances and equipment provided by the Kuwait Red Crescent Society (KRCS) into the Gaza Strip. The move is mainly meant to mitigate the anguish and woes of the people of the Palestinian enclave amid unbearable humanitarian circumstances involving a serious shortage of medical supplies, Chairman of the Jordan Red Crescent Society (JRC) Mohammad Al-Hadeed told KUNA on Saturday.

Kuwait-dispatched medical packages have been air-dropped into a Jordanian field hospital in southern Gaza, he said, adding that Jordan seeks hard to ensure smooth and easy delivery of humanitarian aid to the Palestinian territory. In this context, the JRC chief voiced sincere thanks and gratitude to Kuwait for its role in alleviating the agony of Gazans. The Jordanian Royal Air Forces have already carried out a series of relief aid airdrops into the Gaza Strip amid the continued Zionist aggression on the territory.

Meanwhile, Secretary-General of the Gulf Cooperation Council (GCC) Jasem Al-Budaiwi has strongly condemned the Zionist occupation forces' targeting of innocent Palestinians while they were receiving aid in the Gaza Strip. In a statement, Al-Budaiwi said, "It is a new crime in a series of crimes committed by the Zionist occupation against Palestinians." He called on the international community to take action against these dangerous crimes and violations committed by the Zionist occupation against the Palestinian people.

The chief reiterated the necessity of reaching an immediate ceasefire and allowing urgently the entry of humanitarian and relief aid into the Strip, according to the statement. Earlier in the day, the Zionist occupation opened fire at crowds of civilians waiting for humanitarian aid in northern Gaza, killing more than 112 Palestinians and wounding hundreds others. — KUNA

CITRA, Huawei MoU 'will boost' Kuwait's digital economy

Kuwait Communication and Information Technology Regulatory (CITRA) has affirmed the significance of a memorandum of understanding (MoU) CITRA has recently inked with Huawei. Omar Al-Omar, in a statement to KUNA on Saturday, said the MoU is crucial for boosting CITRA's strategic initiatives, digital innovation, and skills, pushing forward the digital economy, and developing the infrastructure of future smart cities.

Al-Omar said the MoU he had signed with Steven Yi, President of Huawei Middle East and Central Asia, recently in Barcelona, Spain, aims at enhancing mutual cooperation and contributing to the development of information and communications in Kuwait. Kuwait is currently "considered the top in

KUWAIT: The Chairperson of the world with respect to phones' operations." Al-Omar said, noting the widespread usage of state-ofthe-art technologies and the reasonable prices in the country.

Huawei provides "adequate solutions" to the operators and meets all their needs, he said, alluding in particular to the G5.5 technology that had been tested in Kuwait. "Soon, we will work out agreements to operate this technology as we had previously with respect to G5 and G4 technologies," he revealed. On security concerns, he indicated that the National Cybersecurity Center was activated a few months ago, affirming CITRA's support for efforts to protect clients' data.

Moreover, he affirmed the necessity of laws and legislation to face such challenges. "Cybercriminals make use of loopholes in so-

strategies are needed to confront such crimes," he added. Meanwhile, Yi expressed satisfaction with expanding cooperation with CITRA and elevating competition in the sector of information technology and communications in Kuwait, as well as boosting the national digital economy.

Hundreds mourn Navalny at grave

Russian police arrests at least 128 people attending tributes to Navalny in 19 cities on Friday

MOSCOW: Hundreds of Russians visited the grave of dead Russian opposition leader Alexei Navalny on Saturday, risking arrest to pay tribute to the anti-corruption campaigner for a second day running. Navalny, President Vladimir Putin's fiercest critic for more than a decade, died in an Arctic prison colony last month, where he was serving a 19-year sentence on "extremism" charges largely seen as political retribution for his opposition to the Kremlin.

An AFP journalist saw mourners, some with tears in their eyes, queueing outside the Borisovo cemetery in southern Moscow on Saturday afternoon, as more walked from the nearby metro station carrying flowers and placards in honor of Navalny.

Despite warnings from the Kremlin that they faced arrest, thousands had come out for the official funeral service on Friday. Authorities have erected airport-style security scanners at the entrance to the cemetery, and police on Saturday were filmed frisking and searching those who had come to pay homage to the Kremlin critic. Officers ordered mourners to "keep moving" as they laid stacks of red and white roses and carnations on Navalny's grave. Navalny's mother, Lyudmila Navalnaya, was among those who visited on Saturday, accompanied by Alla Abrosimova, the mother of Navalny's widow, Yulia Navalnaya.

'Grief, despair and hope'

The circumstances of Navalny's death remain somewhat unclear. Authorities said he had died of "natural causes" after losing consciousness following a walk in his Arctic prison colony. But Navalny's aides have accused the Russian authorities of ordering him killed, and Western leaders have said Putin carries "respon-



sibility" for his death. AFP journalists saw a continued police presence on Saturday at the cemetery, close to the banks of the Moskva river in the south of the capital. Some supporters laid placards with Navalny slogans and others brought mementos — including a yellow rubber duck, a symbol of a major Navalny investigation into alleged corruption of former President and long-time Putin ally Dmitry Medvedev.

Natalia, a 50-year-old artist who declined to give her surname, told AFP she felt "grief, despair and hope", on Saturday "After all, Alexei asked us not to despair, and fight," she said at the cemetery. Another mourner, Vadim, 52, said he felt "sorrow and bitterness at the loss of a worthy man of our time".

He urged Navalny's supporters to follow the Kremlin critic's example "and continue to live the way Alexei would have wanted — to make people in our country and around the world live more happily". Others found it harder to be optimistic. "It's sad. And it's just clear that everything that was built with him over the years has also been buried here. That's it," said 29-year-old IT worker Roman.

Threat of arrest

Thousands of Navalny's followers had queued for hours to pay their respects to the 47-year-old on Friday. As they streamed from a nearby church to the cemetery, some chanted "No to war!" and other pro-Navalny slogans, including branding Putin a "murderer" and calling for the release of political prisoners.

Kremlin Spokesman Dmitry Peskov had on Friday said that anybody who appeared to be taking part in an "unsanctioned" rally would be detained. Rights monitoring group OVD-Info said Russian police had on Friday arrested at least 128 people attending tributes to Navalny in 19 cities.

Police had previously arrested hundreds who came to lay flowers at makeshift tributes that popped up in major cities across Russia after he died. His wife, Yulia Navalnaya, the couple's two children and Navalny's brother all live abroad and did not attend the funeral, where they could have been arrested for their own opposition to Putin.

Most of his closest aides — in jail or in exile — were also unable to attend the service in the Maryino district of Moscow, where Navalny used to live. Yulia Navalnaya has pledged to continue her husband's work and said Putin "murdered" him.

The scenes of thousands marching in support of Navalny, demanding an end to Russia's offensive in Ukraine and blasting the Kremlin, had not been seen in Russia since February 2022, in the first days after Moscow ordered hundreds of thousands of troops across the border into Ukraine. The Kremlin has cracked down hard on dissent and has used strict military censorship laws to prosecute hundreds who have spoken out publicly against the military campaign. — AFP

Nicaragua accuses Germany of helping 'genocide' in Gaza

THE HAGUE: Nicaragua on Friday accused Germany of facilitating "genocide" in Gaza in a case started in the International Court of Justice, by giving support to the Zionist entity and suspending funding of the UN Palestinian refugee agency. Through those measures, "Germany is facilitating the commission of genocide and, in any case has failed in its obligation to do everything possible to prevent the commission of genocide," Nicaragua argued in a filing published by the Hague-based court. Nicaragua was asking the court to take a swift interim stance against Germany before the case was given in-depth study by judges.

The lodging of the case follows the ICJ saying on January 26 that the Zionist entity must do everything to prevent genocidal acts in Gaza and take "immediate" measures for aid provisions. That interim order was given as the court moves to weigh in full a case lodged in December by South Africa alleging that the Zionist

entity was engaged in genocide in Gaza. The entity has dismissed South Africa's case as a "grossly distorted story". ICJ rulings are legally binding but the court has no enforcement mechanism. Rights groups Amnesty International and Human Rights Watch this week said the entity is disregarding the ICJ's interim order by limiting humanitarian aid to Gaza. Accusations from the Zionist entity that staff from UNRWA, the UN agency for Palestinian refugees, took part in the October 7 Hamas attacks against Zionist communities near the border with Gaza prompted several countries, including Germany, Britain, Japan and the United States, to suspend their funding. On Friday, the European Commission emphasized that it was maintaining its funding of UNRWA while reviewing arrangements in light of the Zionist allegation. The commission said it was releasing 50 million euros (\$54 million) to the UN agency next week with a further 32 million euros to follow later.

Hamas's attack resulted in the deaths of about 1,160 people, mostly civilians, according to an AFP tally based on official Zionist figures. Hamas also took about 250 hostages, 130 of whom remain in Gaza, including 31 that the entity says are presumed dead. The Gaza health ministry on Friday gave the death toll in the strip from the unrelenting Zionist retaliation as 30,228, mostly women and children. —AFP



Ship damaged by Houthi strike sinks: Yemen government

DUBAI: A cargo ship loaded with fertilizer has sunk in the Gulf of Aden less than two weeks after it was damaged by missiles from Yemen's Houthi rebels, Yemen's government said Saturday. The Houthis claimed the February 19 attack against the Rubymar, a cargo ship flying a Belizean flag and operated by a Lebanese firm, which transported combustible fertilizers.

The crew abandoned the ship and evacuated to safety after it was hit by two missiles. The vessel had departed the United Arab Emirates and was bound for the Bulgarian port of Varna. "The MV Rubymar sank last night, coinciding with weather factors and strong winds at sea," said a crisis cell of Yemen's internationally recognized government in charge of the case.

Roy Khoury, chief executive of the ship's operator Blue Fleet, said he was unaware of the sinking. "We have nobody on board to check if it's true or not," he told AFP. Fuel oil appeared to be leaking from the vessel in satellite images shared by Maxar Technologies and published by AFP.

The TankerTrackers website said the sinking would "cause an environmental catastrophe in the (Yemeni) territorial waters and in the Red Sea". "A spill of ammonium nitrate fertilizer in the sea could have several significant impacts on marine ecosystems," said Julien Jreissati, programme director for Greenpeace in the Middle East and North Africa.

The maritime security agency UKMTO, run by the British navy, said the Rubymar had been 35 nautical miles (65 kilometers) from the Yemeni port of Mokha when its crew was forced to abandon it. The Rubymar was identified as British-registered by the US military and security firm Ambrey, but Khoury has denied that information.

Since November, the Houthis have been carrying out attacks on ships linked to the Zionist entity in the Red Sea and the Gulf of Aden, saying they are acting in solidarity with Palestinians in the Gaza Strip.

The Zionist entity has waged a war on Gaza since Hamas attacked the Zionist entity on October 7. In response to the Houthi attacks, the entity's main ally the United States established a multinational force in December to protect maritime traffic in the strategic waterway. Since January the US and its allies have launched numerous strikes against Houthi targets in Yemen, where the Iran-backed rebels have fought forces loyal to the internationally recognized government since 2014. — AFP

Milei says to govern 'with or without' political support

Argentina's president asks for 'patience' as economic reforms batter country's poor

BUENOS AIRES: Argentina's libertarian President Javier Milei, in his first policy speech to parliament Friday, said he would push his package of sweeping economic reforms whether or not legislators back it.

"We are going to change the country for good ... with or without the support of political leaders, with all the legal resources of the executive," Milei told lawmakers, who have stalled his project of deregulation and budget cuts. "If you look for conflict, you will have conflict," he told them.

Milei offered a recap of his first 82 days in office, in which he devalued the peso more than 50 percent, slashed state subsidies for fuel and transport, cut tens of thousands of public service jobs, and scrapped hundreds of rules in his bid to deregulate the economy. "I ask for patience and trust," Milei said. "It will be some time before we can perceive the fruit of the economic reorganization and the reforms we are implementing."

Many of his planned reforms face chal-

lenges in court, with more than 60 lawsuits under way by labor unions, business chambers and NGOs, while Argentina has seen massive protests by citizens who fear Milei's plans will leave them poorer.

"We have not yet seen all the effects of the disaster we inherited, but we are convinced that we are on the right path, because for the first time in history we are attacking the problem by its cause: the fiscal deficit, and not by its symptoms," Milei said.

In recent weeks, Milei has reached out to influential provincial governors, party leaders and former presidents to forge a "new social contract" for the country, based on ten principles, including a "non-negotiable" balanced budget, "inviolable" private property, and public spending reduced to the "historic" level of 25 percent of GDP.

Decades of mismanagement

Faced with parliamentary reticence, Milei scrapped almost half of the initial 664 articles in the sweeping deregulatory

measure issued after he took office, then withdrew it altogether. But the president has vowed to return his bill to parliament. And he has threatened to pass his reforms by presidential decree if lawmakers do not

Argentina is grappling with severe economic struggles after decades of mismanagement that has driven poverty levels to nearly 60 percent and pushed inflation to an annual rate over 200 percent. Milei, a 53-year-old political outsider, won a resounding election victory last year on a wave of fury over a financial crisis marked by rampant money printing and fiscal deficit.

The government claims some of Milei's changes are already bearing fruit: In January, Argentina reported its first monthly budget surplus in 12 years while boosting foreign currency reserves from \$21 billion to \$27 billion. But as annual inflation continued to bite, the poor were hit hard as Milei also ripped away generous transport and energy subsidies and froze aid to 38,000

Mexico's election race heats up with 2 women vying for win

MEXICO CITY: Rival candidates launched their campaigns Friday for elections likely to produce Mexico's first woman president — a watershed for a nation with a long tradition of macho culture. Opposition hopeful Xochitl Galvez took to the streets after the stroke of midnight in one of Mexico's most dangerous states, seeking to tap into voter concerns about the country's rampant violence.

Public opinion polls suggest that she faces a tough battle against ruling party candidate Claudia Sheinbaum, a former Mexico City mayor and close ally of President Andres Manuel Lopez Obrador. Sheinbaum addressed large crowds of supporters in Mexico City's main square, vowing to continue the outgoing left-wing populist's "transformation" of the Latin American nation, including measures to fight corruption and help the poor.

On foreign policy, she said that Mexico would maintain its close cooperation with the United States but would also demand respect for its sovereignty and "never bow our heads." With three months to go before the June 2 vote, Sheinbaum, a 61-year-old scientist by training, enjoys a significant lead with 63 percent support, according to an average of polls compiled by the Oraculus research firm.

Galvez, also 61, has 31 percent support, while Jorge Alvarez, 38, of the Citizens' Movement party is a distant third with just five percent, polls show. At stake is the future of Latin America's second-largest economy, a country of 126 million people that is a key trading partner of the United States and a major tourist destination, but which



faces huge challenges from illegal migration and drug-related violence. Sheinbaum's "biggest challenge is security because we're experiencing a time of chaos," said David Jimenez, a 49-year-old office worker at the ruling party rally.

'People are afraid'

Galvez, an outspoken businesswoman with Indigenous roots, sought to put the focus on the country's insecurity with a night-time rally in the city of Fresnillo in the violence-wracked state of Zacatecas. She led a candle-lit march through the streets before sharing the stage with a relative of one of Mexico's more than 100,000 missing persons, holding a minute's silence for victims of violence.

"Here in Fresnillo, as in all of Mexico, people are afraid," Galvez said, hitting out at Lopez Obrador's "hugs not bullets" strategy to tackle violent crime at its roots by combating poverty and inequality, rather

than using military force. "Hugs for criminals are over," she said. "To have a Mexico without fear, we're going to restrain the most violent and aggressive criminal organizations in our country," she added.

It was the first of several planned stops in cities considered by their residents to be among the most unsafe in Mexico, to highlight what Galvez says is the government's failure to tackle spiraling violence. Nearly 450,000 people have been murdered across Mexico since 2006 when then-president Felipe Calderon launched a controversial anti-drug military campaign, according to official figures.

'Formidable party machinery'

Sheinbaum is a staunch supporter and confidant of Lopez Obrador, known by his initials AMLO, who enjoys an approval rating of nearly 70 percent but is required by the constitution to leave office after one six-year term.

It also comes as negotiations continue for a ceasefire between Zionists and Hamas in the Gaza Strip, which has been under siege. "We conducted a combined humanitarian assistance airdrop into Gaza" involving three US Air Force C-130 transport planes to provide "relief to civilians affected by the ongoing conflict," a US military official told AFP on condition of anonymity.

US Central Command, in a post on social media platform X, said the operation was conducted together with Jordan and saw planes drop "over 38,000 meals along the coastline of Gaza allowing for civilian access to the critical aid". The dire humanitarian situation in Gaza has led to the deaths of at least 13 children from "malnutrition and dehydration" in recent days, according to the health ministry in the Hamas-run territory.

In an incident that has thrown a spotlight on the crisis, dozens of Palestinians were killed before dawn on Thursday in a chaotic rush for aid from a convoy of trucks in Gaza City. The Gaza health ministry said Zionist forces shot them but the army insisted most died in a stampede or crush. A United Nations team that visited the city's Al-Shifa Hospital reported seeing "a large number" of gunshot wounds among Palestinians in the aftermath of the aid truck incident. The health ministry said 116 people were killed and more than 750 wounded in the incident, which drew widespread international condemnation.

'Famine almost inevitable'

The European Union's foreign policy chief Josep Borrell said the shooting "against civilians trying to access foodstuff is unjustifiable". He joined calls for an "impartial international investigation on this tragic event". British foreign minister David Cameron said Zionist entity had "an obligation to ensure that significantly more humanitarian aid reaches" Gazans. On Friday a UN team visited some of the wounded from the aid incident, in Gaza City's Al-Shifa Hospital, and saw a "large number of gunshot wounds", UN chief Antonio Guterres's spokesman said.

The hospital received 70 of the dead, and around 200 wounded were still there during the team's visit, spokesman Stephane Dujarric said. Hossam Abu Safiya, director of Gaza City's Kamal Adwan Hos-

pital, said all the casualties it admitted were hit by "bullets and shrapnel from occupation forces". Gaza has faced dwindling supplies of humanitarian relief across its land borders, which aid groups blame at least in part on Zionists - the recipient of billions of

dollars in US military aid. Jens Laerke, spokesman for the UN humanitarian office OCHA, said on Friday that "a famine is almost inevitable" in Gaza unless things change. Laerke cited the near-total closure of commercial food imports, the "trickle of trucks" coming in with food aid, and the "massive access constraints" to moving around inside Gaza. The United Nations has spoken of particular problems accessing northern Gaza, where residents have been reduced to eating animal fodder.

'Everyone is suffering'

Jordan first announced an aid airdrop in November and has carried out multiple missions since then, some with the cooperation of European countries, including Britain, France and the Netherlands. Egypt and the United Arab Emirates have also begun working together on airdrops. AFPTV images showed people running and pedalling fast on bicycles past bomb-damaged buildings on a rutted dirt road to reach aid floating down to Gaza City.

Hisham Abu Eid, 28, of Gaza City's Zeitun area, said he got two bags of flour from an aid distribution and gave one to his neighbors. "Everyone is suffering from famine. Aid that is getting into Gaza is rare and not enough for even a small number of people. Famine is killing people," Abu Eid said. The International Rescue Committee said the very fact airdrops were "being considered is testament to the serious access challenges". The group said parachuting aid mostly distracts "time and effort from proven solutions to help at scale".

Truce talks

The aid convoy deaths pushed the number of Palestinian war dead in Gaza to 30,320, mostly women and children, according to Gaza's health ministry. Biden's administration has been working with mediators from Qatar and Egypt to try to secure a truce in the fighting between Zionists and Hamas. A Hamas delegation was expected in Cairo Saturday for talks, a source close to the group told AFP, the latest move in a flurry of diplomacy aiming for a truce before Ramadan, the Muslim fasting month which begins on March 10 or 11. An AFP journalist reported air strikes and tank shelling during the night on the southern cities of Rafah and Khan Yunis. — AFP

While doctors knew obesity numbers were rising fast, the symbolic figure had previously been expected in 2030. Researchers analyzed the weight and height measurements of more than 220 million people in more than 190 countries to reach the estimates, Lancet said. They estimated that 504 million adult women and 374 million men were obese in 2022. The study said the obesity rate had nearly tripled for men (14 percent) since 1990 and more than doubled for women (18.5 percent). Some 159 million children and adolescents were living with obesity in 2022,

Scholz vows probe into leaked Ukraine war talks

Leaked 38-minute audio discussion on use of German missiles lands Berlin in hot waters

BERLIN: German Chancellor Olaf Scholz on Saturday promised a full investigation after what appeared to be a recording of confidential army talks on the Ukraine war was posted on Russian social media, in a potentially huge embarrassment for Berlin.

International

The head of Russia's state-backed RT channel, Margarita Simonyan, on Friday posted the 38-minute audio recording of what she claimed were German army officers on February 19 discussing striking Crimea. "What is being reported is a very serious matter and that is why it is now being investigated very carefully, very intensively and very quickly," Scholz said on a visit to Rome. In the recording, discussions can be heard on the possible use by Ukrainian forces of German-made Taurus missiles and their potential impact. Topics include aiming the missiles at targets such as a key bridge over the Kerch strait linking the Russian mainland to Crimea, which was annexed by Russia in 2014.

The discussions also cover the use of missiles provided to Kyiv by France and Britain. Experts consulted by Der Spiegel magazine said they believed the recording was authentic. A defense ministry spokeswoman told AFP it was investigating "whether communications in the air force sector were intercepted".

'Sworn enemies'

Kyiv has long been clamoring for Germany to provide it with Taurus missiles, which can reach targets up to 500 kilometers (about 300 miles) away. Scholz has so far refused to send the missiles, fearing that it would lead to an escalation of the conflict. "If this story turns out to be true, it would be a highly problematic event,"

Green party politician Konstantin von Notz told the RND broadcaster. "The question arises as to whether this is a one-off incident or a structural safety problem," he added.

Speaking at a diplomatic forum in Turkey on Saturday, Russian Foreign Minister Sergei Lavrov said the recording indicates that Ukraine and its backers "do not want to change their course at all and want to inflict a strategic defeat on Russia on the battlefield".

Foreign ministry spokeswoman Maria Zakharova demanded that Germany "promptly" provide explanations for the discussion. "Attempts to avoid answering the questions will be regarded as an admission of guilt," she said. "Our age-old rivals — the Germans — have again turned into our sworn enemies," former Russian president Dmitry Medvedey, now deputy head of the Security Council and the foreign ministry, wrote in a Telegram post.

Taurus missiles

The acquisition of German Taurus missiles would provide a massive boost for Ukraine as Kyiv struggles to fend off Russia's invasion. France and Britain have supplied Kyiv with SCALP or Storm Shadow missiles, both of which have a range of about 250 kilometers.

But Scholz said last week that Germany could not justify matching British and French moves in sending long-range missiles to Ukraine and supporting the weapon system's deployment. "This is a very long-range weapon, and what the British and French are doing in terms of targeting and supporting targeting cannot be done in Germany," Scholz said, without specifying exactly what he meant.

Britain denied that it had any direct involvement in operating the missiles. "Ukraine's use of Storm Shadow and its targeting processes are the business of the Armed Forces of Ukraine," a Ministry of Defence (MoD) spokesperson said in a statement to AFP.

Roderich Kiesewetter, from Germany's opposition conservatives, warned that further recordings may also be leaked. "A number of other conversations will cer-

tainly have been intercepted and may be leaked at a later date for Russia's benefit," he told broadcaster ZDF.

It can be assumed "that the conversation was deliberately leaked by Russia at this point in time with a specific intention", namely "to prevent Taurus delivery by Germany", he said. According to Der Spiegel, the videoconference was held not on a secret internal army network but on the WebEx platform. — AFP

Bangladesh fire toll rises to 46; safety lapses to blame

DHAKA: Bangladesh firefighters said Friday that glaring safety lapses were responsible for a Dhaka restaurant blaze that killed 46 people, with more deaths likely among those rushed to hospital in critical condition. Thursday night's fire began at a popular biryani restaurant at the bottom of a seven-floor commercial property in the capital's upscale Bailey Road neighborhood.

The entire building, home to several other eateries, was soon engulfed by flames that took fire crews two hours to bring under control. Fire service operations director Rezaul Karim told AFP the blaze had been made worse by numerous cooking gas cylinders stored haphazardly in stairwells and restaurant kitchens. "People heard the explosions of several gas cylinders during the fire," he said.

Main Uddin, the national fire services chief, said the building lacked safety measures. "It did not have at least two staircases or a fire exit," he told AFP. "Most of the people died from suffocation." Fire officials earlier told reporters they suspected the inferno began when one of the gas cylinders accidentally caught fire.

Police inspector Bacchu Mia told AFP that two more people had succumbed to their wounds on Friday while being treated in hospital. "The death toll is now 46. Two people have died from injuries — one at the Dhaka Medical College Hospital and another at the Police Hospital," he told AFP. Around 15 people remained in critical condition, be added

'Turned into charcoal'

At a hospital treating the wounded, 30-year-old Asif Pathan told AFP that his cousin Minhaj Khan had been dining at the restaurant when the fire broke out and was killed. "His friend escaped by jumping through the window, but Minhaj couldn't," Pathan said. "His body has turned into charcoal."

Iran counts votes as reports suggest low turnout

TEHRAN: Iran began counting ballots on Saturday after a vote for parliament and a key clerical body, with local media estimating a low turnout and conservatives expected to dominate. Friday's elections were the first since widespread protests triggered by the September 2022 death in police custody of Mahsa Amini, 22, an Iranian Kurd. She had been arrested for allegedly violating the Islamic republic's strict dress code for women.

Iran has also been badly affected by international sanctions that have led to an economic crisis since the last elections in 2020. State TV reported early Saturday the "start of vote counting" after polling stations closed at midnight. Voting hours had been extended



Pathan said he was waiting for the hospital to conduct DNA tests to confirm the identity of his cousin's body before it was released to his family. Members of the public helped fire crews carry hoses and rescue survivors who clambered down the outside walls to safety as firefighters fought to bring the blaze under control. "We were at the sixth floor when we first saw smoke racing through the staircase. A lot of people rushed upstairs," Sohel, a restaurant manager who gave only his first name, told AFP.

"We used a water pipe to climb down the building. Some of us were injured as they jumped." At one point at least 50 people were on the rooftop waiting to be rescued by fire cranes, Kamruzzaman Majumdar, an environmental science professor who was among the stranded, wrote in a Facebook post.

several times during the day, the official IRNA news agency reported. A record figure of 15,200 hopefuls were competing for seats in the 290-member parliament. Another 144 candidates sought a place in the 88-member Assembly of Experts, which is exclusively made up of male Islamic scholars.

The Assembly selects or, if necessary, dismisses Iran's supreme leader. Many potential candidates for the chamber were disqualified. Local Fars news agency estimated turnout at "more than 40 percent", among 61 million eligible voters.

President Ebrahim Raisi welcomed the voters' "enthusiastic" participation as "another historic failure to (Iran's) enemies," according to IRNA. Iran considers the United States, its Western allies and the Zionist entity enemies of the state and accuses them of seeking to intervene in its internal affairs.

Reformist daily Ham Mihan ran an opinion piece titled "The Silent Majority", which said turnout was "estimated to be lower than" in previous elections. Iran's 2020 parliament was elected during the COVID pandemic with a turnout of 42.57 percent — the lowest since the 1979 Islamic Revolution.

A state TV poll had found more than half of respondents were indifferent about this year's elections. Candidates for parliament are vetted by a body, the Guardian Council, whose members are determined by the supreme leader.

The present parliament is dominated by conservatives and ultra-conservatives, and analysts expected a similar makeup in the new assembly. Despite Supreme leader Ayatollah Ali Khamenei's appeal for people to cast ballots, many Iranians were split on whether or not to do so.

Former reformist president Mohammad Khatami was among people who avoided the poll, according to a coalition of parties called the Reform Front. In February the conservative Javan daily quoted Khatami as saying Iran is "very far from free and competitive elections." — AFP

Police investigators were seen walking inside the gutted building and documenting the wreckage on Friday morning, hours after the government ordered an investigation into the fire's origins. Hundreds of anxious family members rushed to the nearby Dhaka Medical College Hospital overnight as ambulances brought the dead and injured to the clinic.

Explosions and fires are frequent in buildings and factories across Bangladesh, where safety standards are lax and corruption often allows them to be ignored. Deadly blazes are typically sparked by gas cylinders, faulty air conditioners and bad electrical wiring. Bangladesh's worst fire took place in 2012, when a blaze ripped through a garment factory on Dhaka's outskirts, killing at least 111 people and injuring more than 200 others. — AFP

US lawmakers pass stopgap bill to avert govt shutdown

WASHINGTON: The US Congress on Thursday approved a stopgap measure to avert a damaging election-year government shutdown, extending funding for several key federal agencies past a weekend deadline. Five months into the fiscal year, Congress still has not approved the 12 annual spending bills that make up the federal budget, which were facing deadlines of midnight on Friday night and March 8 to keep the lights on.

The Republican-led House and Democratic Senate approved a short-term "continuing resolution" extending the deadline for the first six bills until March 8 and making March 22 the cut-off for the remaining six. Money for agriculture, science, veterans' programs, transport and housing had been due to run out first, potentially hitting food safety inspections, air traffic controllers' pay and numerous other important functions.

A full shutdown would have come a week later — a day after President Joe Biden's March 7 State of the Union address — leaving defense, border security, Congress and many other departments and agencies unable to operate. But the fourth stopgap funding bill approved under this Congress — and the third under House Speaker Mike Johnson's leadership — only gives lawmakers a few extra days to get back on track. Johnson has been struggling to corral a razor-thin majority, walking a tightrope between the demands of his own right flank and more moderate Republicans.

All but two Democrats in the House voted yes to the continuing resolution but 97 Republicans voted against. It passed the upper chamber in a 77-13 evening vote and will now make its way to Biden's desk in time to keep the wheels of government turning.—AFP

Europe battles powder shortage to supply Ukraine

PARIS: Hard-to-find gunpowder is hindering Europe's scramble to provide hundreds of thousands of shells for Ukraine's defensive effort against Russian invaders, with solutions only starting to emerge. "We have all become aware of the need to face up to the scarcity of some components, especially gunpowders," French President Emmanuel Macron said Monday after a gathering of Kyiv's allies in Paris. "Powder is really what's lacking today," he added.

Gunpowder goes into propellant charges that hurl artillery shells — such as the NATO-standard 155-millimetre projectiles used in many guns sent to Ukraine — over distances of tens of kilometers. "A simple explosive artillery shell has three parts. It has a steel casing, a high-explosive main charge and a detonator" usually set to trigger the blast on impact, said Johann Hoecherl, a munitions expert at the German armed forces university in Munich.

"Propellant charges are usually separate, because (gunners) will take one or two, up to six or even eight" depending on the desired range, he added. While the propellant is still referred to as gunpowder "it's not powder at all these days, it's made up of rods or pellets", Hoecherl said. In a video on its website, German arms manufacturer Rheinmetall illustrates stackable propellant cylinders filled with explosive pellets slotting in behind a shell in the breech of a cannon.

'Innovation at work'

Europe counts a very small number of powder producers, said Jean-Paul Maulny, deputy director of France's Institute for International and Strategic Relations (IRIS). They include firms like Eurenco, with operations in France, Belgium and Sweden, and Nitrochemie, majority-owned by Rheinmetall, with sites in Germany and Switzerland.

With many countries pushing to bring production home, France "is in the process of relocating part of Eurenco's production to Bourges" around 200 kilometers (125 miles) south of Paris, Maulny said. "This is one of the bottlenecks for munitions," he added. "The top question is the quantity of production."

EU internal market commissioner Thierry Breton told reporters in Paris Friday that the bloc also faced challenges finding the raw materials for gunpowder. "To make powder, you need a specific kind of cotton, which mostly comes from China," he said. Nitrocellulose, also known as guncotton, is a key ingredient in gunpowder manufacture. "Would you know it, deliveries of this cotton from China stopped as if by chance a few months ago," Breton added. China and Russia have in recent years ramped up economic cooperation and diplomatic contacts, and their strategic partnership has grown closer since the invasion of Ukraine. In Russia this week, China's Vice Foreign Minister Sun Weidong declared relations "are at their best period in history". Breton said that "Nordic countries have found a substitute for the Chinese cotton ... innovation is at work, precisely to meet the need for powder, because ... we have problems today with powder capacity".

Companies producing the substitute ingredients for powder would be among those selected for grants under the EU's Act In Support of Ammunition Production (ASAP) to be announced next week, Breton said.

'Much larger scale'

Breton predicted that EU efforts to boost artillery shell output would bring the bloc's annual production capacity to between 1.5 million and 1.7 million by the end of this year. He estimated that the equivalent figure for Russia was "a little below two million".

"Everyone is putting themselves in a position to manufacture on a much larger scale," said IRIS expert Maulny. "For now, the Ukrainians are short of shells... the Russians don't have a shortage since they got stocks from the North Koreans, but it could happen in the coming months," he added. "No-one was ready for a high-intensity conflict where there's enormous consumption of military equipment. We haven't seen a war like this since World War II," Maulny said. — AFP

Musk sues OpenAI over 'betrayal' of mission

SAN FRANCISCO: Elon Musk has launched a legal case against OpenAI, the AI firm he helped to set up in 2015, accusing its leaders of a "betrayal" of its founding mission. The tycoon, who left OpenAI in 2018, argued in documents filed in a San Francisco court late Thursday that the firm was always intended as a nonprofit entity. But he said recent boardroom changes meant OpenAI was now effectively a subsidiary of software giant Microsoft, arguing that this was breach of contract.

Musk has accused Microsoft of controlling OpenAI several times, with both firms denying the claims. Antitrust regulators in the United States and Europe are also investigating the ties between the companies. Microsoft, whose embrace of AI has made it the world's biggest company by market capitalization, declined to comment.

OpenAI captured the public imagination in late 2022 with the release of its chatbot ChatGPT, which can generate poems and essays and even succeed in exams. The firm has also developed image and video generating tools seen as the leaders in their field. The success of its products has helped attract huge investment into AI, which boosters say could transform every aspect of human life. Microsoft, a major investor in OpenAI since 2019, poured billions more into the firm last year.

And the software giant stepped in when OpenAI's board fired CEO Sam Altman in November last year, hiring him and offering to house any staff members who were unhappy with his ousting. The OpenAI board later climbed down, Altman was reinstated and Microsoft was given an observer seat on the board after the removal of members who were critical of Altman. — AFP

WTO talks fail, throwing trade body into 'crisis'

ABU DHABI: A high-level WTO conference ended Saturday with a temporary extension of an e-commerce moratorium but no deals on agriculture and fisheries, throwing into doubt the effectiveness of the multilateral trade body.

The outcomes of the World Trade Organization's 13th ministerial conference in Abu Dhabi highlighted the sharp divisions between the body's 164 members amid geopolitical tensions and economic headwinds that are threatening global commerce.

"The WTO needed a good crisis and perhaps this will lead to a realization that we cannot continue like this," said a senior European Union official participating in the talks. Speaking at the closing press conference, the Emirati chair of the so-called MC13 gathering, Thani Al-Zeyoudi, acknowledged the shortcomings.

"Despite our best efforts, we failed to agree on some texts which are of great importance to many of our members," said Al-Zeyoudi, who also serves as the UAE's foreign trade minister.

For her part, WTO Director-General Ngozi Okonjo-Iweala said the talks came up "against an international backdrop marked by greater uncertainty than at any time I can remember". "We have achieved some important things and we have not managed to complete others," she said, while insisting that the "glass was half full". The WTO, the only international body dealing with the rules of trade between nations, requires full

consensus from all members to chalk up deals.

US manufacturing activity shrinks quickly in February

WASHINGTON: US manufacturing activity contracted in February more quickly than markets expected, according to an industry survey published Friday, as demand slowed and output eased. The manufacturing sector has been a casualty of the US Federal Reserve's battle against inflation through interest rate increases. Higher rates act to slow demand by raising the cost of borrowing on

The Institute for Supply Management (ISM) said its manufacturing index stood at 47.8 percent last month, down from 49.1 percent a month earlier. This was significantly below market expectations, according to Briefing.com, and kept the index below the 50-point marking separating expansion from contraction for the 16th month in a row.

"The US manufacturing sector continued to contract (and at a faster rate compared to January), with demand slowing, output easing and inputs remaining accommodative," ISM survey chief Timothy Fiore said in a statement. This was reflected in the fact that the ISM's New Orders and Production indexes reversed course in February, reentering contraction territory.

"Factory activity remains under pressure but







UN: World resource extraction could surge 60% by 2060

PARIS: Extraction of Earth's natural resources could surge 60 percent by 2060, imperiling climate goals and economic prosperity, the UN said Friday, calling for dramatic changes in energy, food, transport and housing.

Enormous expansion of infrastructure, energy demand and consumer consumption over the last half century, particularly in wealthier countries, has driven a tripling of the world's use of materials, according to the 2024 Global Resource Outlook by the UN Environment Programme's International Resource Panel. And the hunger for natural resources — everything from food to fossil fuels — keeps growing by an average of more than 2.3 per cent per year, it said.

People in wealthy countries drive most of that demand, using six times more materials and responsible for ten times more climate impacts than those in low-income countries, according to the analysis.

Extraction and processing of the huge amount of resources accounts for over 60 percent of planet-warming emissions, the report said, as well as devastating ecosystems and harming human health. Lead author Hans Bruyninckx said the current trajectory would cause the world to far exceed the temperature limits set out in the 2015 Paris Agreement, in which countries agreed to cap global warming "well below" two degrees Celsius and preferably at 1.5C.

"You've got resource use that is increasing, too much impact on Earth systems that is not tenable," he told AFP, adding that unequal access to resources

across the world was also "untenable".

But he acknowledged that natural resources will be needed "to turn things around", both to boost development in poorer nations and to provide the minerals and metals needed for the energy transition. The report follows an agreement by countries at UN climate negotiations last year in Dubai, to triple global renewable energy capacity this decade and "transition away" from polluting foscil fuels.

"transition away" from polluting fossil fuels.

Without sweeping change, the report warned, the exploitation of Earth's resources will continue, with computer modeling suggesting an increase by almost 60 per cent by 2060 from 2020 levels, from 100 to 160 billion tons. "The only choice is to stabilize and balance the human relationship with the rest of nature," the report said. — AFP

Sounding warning, Kerry urges new ways on climate finance

WASHINGTON: Veteran envoy John Kerry called Friday for the United States to find major new climate finance methods, warning of "huge disappointment" if historic promises to transition from fossil fuels go unheeded. Kerry, who is stepping down as the US climate envoy, described an agreement in December in Dubai at the last UN summit as historic for its call on the planet to move away from fossil fuels in large part responsible for the planet's rising temperatures.

But he warned that the COP28 agreement must not be "reduced to mere words on a piece of paper."

"If we don't do what we've said we're going to do in these next months, that's exactly what could happen, encouraging cynicism and dropout-ism and huge disappointment around the world," Kerry said at the Council on Foreign Relations. Kerry, an 80-year-old former secretary of state, senator and presidential contender, has said he will focus outside of government on mobilizing private funding to complement government efforts on climate.

Kerry said that the United States should consider a system of financial guarantees for investors, which would cover risks if projects fail. "It's time for creativity. We've come up with new financial instruments when we needed them before, and my judgment is we need them now," he said.

He pointed to his work as envoy with Indonesia

and Vietnam on so-called Just Energy Transition Partnerships, or JETPs — financing deals between a small group of wealthy countries and an emerging economy to reduce reliance on fossil fuels or take other climate action.

Calling such deals "very bespoke," Kerry said, "We don't have time to do that." "We need to help deploy larger sums with greater confidence that the deal is bankable and we de-risked it sufficiently," he said. A recent study by the Climate Policy Initiative pointed to assessments that credit guarantees could mobilize between six and 25 times as much financing as traditional loans, with developing countries in particular looking to reduce uncertainties.

Kerry also repeated his call for the world to phase out subsidies for fossil fuels—often politically sensitive in countries reliant on oil and gas. "Why in God's name we (are) subsidizing the creators of the problem is beyond me," he said. He voiced admiration for the European Union's new "CBAM" carbon tariff, although he acknowledged it was not politically feasible in the United States.

President Joe Biden has overseen the investment of billions of dollars in green technology as part of his signature legislative achievement, the Inflation Reduction Act, in a sharp difference from his predecessor Donald Trump, his likely challenger in November elections.

Trump has cast doubt on the science behind climate change and walked out of the Paris climate accord, which Kerry helped negotiate as top diplomat under president Barack Obama.

Kerry credited the Dubai agreement in part to cooperation between the United States and China,

the world's two largest greenhouse gas emitters and frequent adversaries on the global stage. Kerry developed an unusually warm relationship with his Chinese counterpart Xie Zhenhua, who even brought his grandson to Dubai to meet the US negotiator. Kerry hinted that he had internal resistance even within the Biden team, saying, "I had to convince some people in the administration that we really needed to work with China at a time where, as you all know, the rhetoric of Washington and most of the currents are kind of moving against that idea."

But he said that Biden agreed that on climate, "This is not and should not be an ideological fight."

"We don't have time to argue about the climate thing," Kerry said. — AFP

Eurozone inflation dips further

BRUSSELS: Eurozone inflation continued to ease in February, data showed Friday, but economists warned it was unlikely to push the European Central Bank to cut interest rates next month. Consumer prices in the 20-nation single currency area rose 2.6 percent in February from a year earlier, down from a 2.8-percent rise in January, the EU's statistics agency said.

Analysts surveyed by Bloomberg and FactSet had predicted that the rate of inflation would fall to 2.5 percent. The eurozone's inflation rate has been slowing steadily since its peak in October 2022, approaching the ECB's two-percent target.

The ECB is under pressure to cut interest rates after keeping them unchanged since October at a two-de-

cade high, but experts warned not to expect a reduction in April. "February's eurozone inflation data look like the final nail in the coffin for an April interest rate cut," said Jack Allen-Reynolds of Capital Economics, an economic research firm.

The Frankfurt-based ECB's hike in rates following the Russian invasion of Ukraine in 2022 has affected the eurozone economy, with expectations of weaker growth in 2024.

The next rate-setting ECB meeting will be on March 7. "As long as the ECB is not willing to accept that inflation is roughly returning to target but instead pushing for an exact landing point of 2 percent, rate cuts should only be on the agenda at the June meeting," Carsten Brzeski of ING Bank said in a note before the inflation data was published.

Core inflation, which strips out volatile energy, food, alcohol and tobacco prices and a key indicator for the ECB, also slowed in February, to 3.1 percent

from 3.3 percent in January.

The February reading of core inflation is the lowest in two years. Yet analysts had forecast a deeper fall, to 2.9 percent, in February.

ECB chief Christine Lagarde told the European Parliament this week she expected "inflation to continue slowing down" but wanted to be sure that price rises fall "sustainably" to two percent. The EU last month cuts its eurozone inflation forecast for 2024 to 2.7 percent from 3.2 percent in earlier prediction. — AFP

Stocks end week at fresh records as Nvidia tops \$2tn

NEW YORK: Wall Street stocks finished the week with a flourish Friday behind continued momentum for equities tied to artificial intelligence, especially Nvidia, which finished with a valuation above \$2 trillion for the first time.

Both the S&P 500 and Nasdaq ended at fresh all-time highs following records in Tokyo and Frankfurt.

"This week saw risk on sentiment take several global stock indices to record highs, the first day of March being no exception," said Axel Rudolph, senior market analyst at online trading platform IG. David Morrison, senior market analyst at Trade Nation, said "market sentiment remains bullish, and there seems little appetite for profit-taking."

Stock markets have been on a march higher since late last year, initially on hopes that central banks will soon be able to begin lowering their high interest rates as inflation began to fall closer to normal levels.

While hotter-than-expected inflation data from recent months has pushed expectations for the first interest rate cut to mid-year, markets have instead been propelled by stellar results from AI firms in recent weeks.

Perhaps no company has benefited as much as Nvidia, which is led by Jensen Huang, who has developed technology perfectly suited for developing the large language models (LLMs) that underpin generative AI interfaces such as ChatGPT.

Nvidia jumped four percent Friday to end the day with a valuation above \$2 trillion, joining an elite club that includes just Apple, Microsoft and Saudi Aramco.

Also Friday, Dell Technologies became the latest big beneficiary of the AI fever, surging more than 31 percent following an earnings report that highlighted its growing AI business.

The tech-rich Nasdaq led the major US indices,

rising 1.1 percent.

CFRA Research's Sam Stovall said the gains in New York were also supported by weaker economic data, including the Institute for Supply Management survey of manufacturers and consumer confidence data as "indicating that there could be more reason" for the Fed to cut interest rates in May.

In Europe, Frankfurt's DAX set a new record while the CAC in Paris was also near its record high, with a less-than-expected drop in eurozone inflation failing to derail sentiment. Meanwhile in Asia, Tokyo's benchmark Nikkei index almost touched 40,000 points for the first time. Asian markets mostly rose, with better-than-expected Chinese data helping sentiment.

"China's factory growth rising above forecasts even though manufacturing shrank for a fifth straight month did not dent investors' mood with the country's stock indices pursuing their recovery," said IG's Rudolph. — AFP

US lawmakers approve bill to avert shutdown

WASHINGTON: The US Congress on Thursday approved a stopgap measure to avert a damaging election-year government shutdown, extending funding for several key federal agencies past a weekend deadline. Five months into the fiscal year, Congress still has not approved the 12 annual spending bills that make up the federal budget, which were facing deadlines of midnight on Friday night and March 8 to keep the lights on.

The Republican-led House and Democratic Senate approved a short-term "continuing resolution" extending the deadline for the first six bills until March 8 and making March 22 the cut-off for the remaining six. Money for agriculture, science, veterans' programs, transport and housing had been due to run out first, potentially hitting food safety inspections, air traffic controllers' pay and numerous other important functions.

A full shutdown would have come a week later — a day after President Joe Biden's March 7 State of the Union address — leaving defense, border secu-

rity, Congress and many other departments and agencies unable to operate. But the fourth stopgap funding bill approved under this Congress — and the third under House Speaker Mike Johnson's leadership — only gives law-makers a few extra days to get back on track. Johnson has been struggling to corral a razor-thin majority, walking a tightrope between the demands of his own right flank and more moderate Republicans.

All but two Democrats in the House voted yes to the continuing resolution but 97 Republicans voted against. It passed the upper chamber in a 77-13 evening vote and will now make its way to Biden's desk in time to keep the wheels of government turning. "This is a short-term fix — not a long-term solution," Biden said in a statement, calling on Republicans to pass full-year funding bills as well as

hardliners in the House.

While moderates consider shutdowns politically disastrous, and a threat to Republican chances of hanging onto the House and retaking the Senate in November, right-wingers in safe seats are more inclined to spoil for a fight. Conservatives have been pushing to eliminate Homeland Security Secretary Alejandro Mayorkas' salary, block travel costs for armed forces

new military aid for Ukraine, which

has been blocked by conservative



personnel seeking abortions and defund parts of Biden's climate agenda — all red lines for Democrats. Biden cut a deal with Republicans last year mandating tens of billions of dollars in automatic cuts if lawmakers fail to pass full-year spending bills by April.

The hard-right, 40-member House Freedom Caucus, angered by entreaties from the leadership to accept compromise on its priorities, has made no secret of the fact that it would be happy for that ax to fall. "We can't let the swamp dictate the terms," Texas congressman Chip Roy posted on X.

Biden called a rare Oval Office meeting for congressional leaders on Tuesday to jolt them into striking a deal on the budget, and to unblock vital aid for Ukraine that is also stalled by infighting among Republicans. "If our House Republican colleagues of goodwill want to do the right thing, they must accept a fundamental truth about divided government: Republicans cannot pass a bill without Democratic support," Senate Majority Leader Chuck Schumer said. "It takes both sides working together — and ignoring the extremes of the hard

China factory output shrinks for fifth month

BEIJING: Factory activity in China contracted for the fifth straight month in February, official figures showed Friday, as sluggish demand in the world's second-largest economy continues to drag on growth. The purchasing managers' index (PMI) - a key measure of factory output - came in at 49.1 percent in February, according to China's National Bureau of Statistics (NBS).A PMI figure above 50 percent indicates an expansion in activity, while below indicates a contraction.

China's monthly PMI has only registered in pos-

WTO conference: The main issues

GENEVA: Fisheries, agriculture and WTO reform were at the heart of intense negotiations among trade ministers from around the world who gathered in Abu Dhabi over the past five days.

Here are the main issues that were on the table during the ministerial conference known as MC13 that ended Saturday, which saw an extension of an e-commerce moratorium but no deals on agriculture and fisheries.

Fisheries: The next step

During the World Trade Organization's last ministerial meeting, held at its Geneva headquarters in June 2022, trade chiefs managed to nail down a historic agreement banning harmful fisheries subsidies after more than two decades of negotiations. The agreement banned subsidies that contribute to fishing that is illegal, unreported or unregulated, as well as for fishing of overstretched stocks and in unregulated high seas, with additional flexibility baked in for developing nations.

The agreement, which has yet to take effect,

itive territory twice throughout the last year, most recently in September. Factory activity has consistently contracted since then, with February marking the fifth consecutive month of decline.

Analysts polled by Bloomberg had expected a PMI figure of 48.8 percent in February. In December 2022, Beijing abruptly lifted draconian COVID-19 control measures that had weighed heavily on the economy for nearly three years, raising expectations for a sustained recovery.

But such hopes have been dampened by a lack of consumer and investor confidence, unprecedented turmoil in the property sector and soaring youth unemployment. A global slowdown, meanwhile, is weakening demand for Chinese products overseas. In recent months, authorities have announced a series of targeted measures as well as a major issuance of sovereign bonds to boost infrastructure spending and revive economic activity. But results have been mixed.

was seen as a major achievement, marking just the second accord concluded by the WTO's full membership since the global trade body was created in 1995, and the first focused on environmental protection. In Abu Dhabi, countries had aimed to finalize a "second wave" of negotiations towards broadening the net to also include a ban on subsidies that contribute to overfishing more broadly. While observers had said an agreement on the second portion of the deal was possible, in the end it proved elusive.

One bone of contention was the text's two-tier approach, entailing greater surveillance, constraints and penalties for the countries that dish out most fishery subsidies. Another sticking point was a demand from India, which single-handedly forced WTO members to water down the initial agreement, for a 25-year transition period — something many countries reject as too long.

COVID booster?

Despite the very vocal resistance from pharmaceutical companies and their host countries, WTO members in 2022 agreed to a temporary patent waiver for COVID-19 vaccines, aimed at providing more equitable access to jabs.

But they pushed off efforts to extend the waiver to patents for other products needed to fight the China's weeklong Lunar New Year period — the longest annual public holiday — occurred in February this year, also partially explaining the slowdown in activity. China's non-manufacturing PMI — which takes into account the services sector — remained in positive territory in February at 51.4 percent, up from 50.7 percent the previous month, the NBS said Friday. The latest figure came in higher than expected for analysts polled by Bloomberg, who had predicted it to stand at 50.2 percent.

China is gearing up to unveil official economic goals for the current year on Tuesday, including the highly anticipated GDP growth target — expected to be among the lowest in three decades. The country notched GDP growth of 5.2 percent last year, according to an official figure that many economists consider to be an overestimate, despite already representing the lowest expansion since the 1990s apart from the pandemic years. — AFP

Fallow harvest for agriculture?

Agriculture has always been a highly sensitive issue at the heart of discussions at the WTO, and ministers in Abu Dhabi were unable to agree on a new package of rules. At a ministerial meeting in 2015, WTO members took the historic decision to eliminate export subsidies for agricultural products.

Many now want action on domestic measures that distort trade, and discussions revolved around issues including market access and export competition and restrictions. Food security was also once again on the agenda, with deep disagreement over a demand from India and others for a temporary measure, allowing countries to hold public stockpiles of food, to be made permanent. They also wanted it extended to encompass all developing countries and to include other staples like cotton. Several countries fiercely opposed those moves, warning that such public stocks, if released beyond a country's borders, could disrupt global food markets. — AFP

Indigenous Colombians fret as sacred mountain glaciers melt

n the shade of a sacred tree, Indigenous wise men chew coca leaves as they mull the threats to their home among the melting, snow-capped peaks of Colombia's Sierra Nevada mountains. As a "consequence of man's actions, it is slowly warming, more every year," one of the men says in the Iku language, according to a translator, at a meeting of dozens of Indigenous people from different communities.

The inhabitants of the Sierra Nevada range in north Colombia believe it is the center of the universe, its rivers, stones and plants part of one living body. They see it as their job to protect its balance. In 2022, UNESCO recognized the ancient knowledge of the area's four Indigenous groups as part of the world's intangible cultural heritage, and essential to caring for "mother nature, humanity and the planet."

But here in Earth's highest coastal mountain system, 5,775 meters (19,000 feet) above sea level, the natural harmony they prize is being disrupted as record heat waves melt the glacial peaks and ruin their crops. In a form of active meditation, the Arhuaco spiritual leaders or "mamos" place a wooden stick in their mouths before removing it and rubbing it around a gourd — transferring their thoughts to the hollowed-out fruit.

"We are here to live in peace, in harmony. Believing otherwise leads to global warming," one Indigenous leader says. "Man is going to end himself because of his own inventions, believing himself to be very intelligent." Of the 14 tropical glaciers that existed in Colombia at the beginning of the 20th century, only six remain, according to official data. The Sierra Nevada's glacial area has shrunk from 82 square kilometers (32 square miles) in the mid-19th century to just 5.3 kilometers in 2022, according to the state meteorological institute.

Glaciers 'disappearing'

The Arhuaco live in the Sierra Nevada alongside the Kankuamo, Kogui and Wiwa peoples, who are distinct but related communities. They wear white tunics and hand-woven white straw hats. When greeting each other, they exchange handfuls of toasted

coca leaves which they chew with lime to release stimulating alkaloids. Their fears about the changing climate are shared by Leonor Zalabata, the first Indigenous person to represent Colombia at the United Nations.

"All the glaciers that existed in the Sierra Nevada are dis-

The Arhuaco hope the weather extremes will moderate by March in time to plant beans, cabbage and corn. "It is a response to what we as human beings have given to Mother Earth," said Rosado, as she handweaves a bag.

In January, environmental authorities recorded a record temperature of 40 degrees Celsius (100 degrees Fahrenheit) in the seaside city of Santa Marta, at the foot of the Sierra Nevada. A swing between morning frosts and mid-

"Here is our past, our present and our future. When I weave, I talk and think about my children. Everything is recorded here, in the bag," she said.

'Life is possible'

One of the tenets of the community's worldview — which they believe could help the world tackle climate change — is collective thinking. "There is only one man, only one woman. That's why if

the Arhuaco also highlight the importance of balance. While they maintain their traditional clothing and beliefs, they carry cellphones in their woven bags, and use solar panels to electrify their mud huts.

They learn Spanish from child-hood and some families send their children to study at public universities in neighboring cities. "We believe that life is possible, as long as there is a balance," said Zalabata's son, Arukin Torres. "Hence


Torres also warns of a surge in paramilitary activity in the region as peace talks between armed groups and President Gustavo Petro's government hit a logjam. "This crisis (of violence) is coming again. That is why we ask that the government resume its dialogue," he said. — AFP



ASIA'S RICHEST MAN TAKES GLOBAL RICH TO THE ZOO

op global celebrities donned "jungle fever" outfits in India for a trip to the zoo as part of a party thrown by Asia's richest man. Pop icon Rihanna, Facebook founder Mark Zuckerberg and Donald Trump's daughter Ivanka are among the rich and famous guests who jetted in for a three-day gala celebration hosted by billionaire tycoon Mukesh Ambani.

This weekend's party is an elaborate pre-wedding ceremony for younger son Anant and fiancee Radhika Merchant, the daughter of wealthy pharmaceutical moguls. The three-day gala - which saw "Umbrella" singer Rihanna perform on Friday for the first time since last year's Superbowl - continued with a trip to an "animal rescue centre" housing exotic animals.

The facility is a pet project of Anant's built in his family's hometown Jamnagar in western Gujarat state, where the weekend party is taking place. Indian media reports said the family hosted a "Walk on the Wildside", an event held outdoors in the Ambani's animal rescue centre.

"Jungle fever" is the suggested dress code, and guests were advised to wear comfortable shoes and clothing, reports said. In the evening, reports added, guests ditched their safari-themed outfits for more elegant

wear for an evening party celebrating Indian culture.

Mukesh Ambani, 66, is chairman of Reliance Industries - India's biggest company by market capitalization - and the world's 10th-richest person, according to the Forbes billionaires list, worth more than \$116 billion. He inherited a thriving industrial enterprise spanning oil, gas and petrochemicals from his father and grew it into a commercial

behemoth with lucrative interests in retail, telecommunications and an Indian Premier League cricket team.

Reliance's partnerships with storied fashion brands such as Burberry, Armani and Jimmy Choo have helped the conglomerate cater to the growing appetite for luxury goods among India's middle class.

Ambani's family home - a 27-floor skyscraper dubbed Antilia that re-

portedly cost more than \$1 billion to build and has a permanent staff of 600 servants - is one of Mumbai's most prominent landmarks. It was criticized after its 2010 completion by author Arundhati Roy and others for starkly illustrating the wide gulf between India's business elite and its poor multitudes. Ambani held the most expensive wedding in India to date for his daughter in 2018, which reportedly cost \$100 million and saw US pop megastar Beyonce perform.

Younger son Anant, 28 - who also serves as a director on the boards of several Reliance-owned firms - is expected to marry Merchant, 29, later this year. This time around, the guest list includes Disney chief Bob Iger, following a deal agreed Wednesday between Reliance Industries and Walt Disney to merge their Indian media businesses.

The merger will create an \$8.5 billion entertainment giant in the world's most populous nation and fifth-largest economy Bollywood stars Amitabh Bachchan and Shah Rukh Khan, cricket icons Sachin Tendulkar and M.S. Dhoni, and industry titan Gautam Adani are also invited in a who's-who of India's super-rich. — AFP







Peter Doherty: 'Shooting heroin became a military operation'

eter Doherty can look back on his junkie days with some objectivity now he's clean and happily married to the woman who spent almost a decade filming his most degraded moments. The British singer and guitarist — now 44 and preferring Peter to Pete — was almost as famous for his heroin addiction as his music with The Libertines in the early 2000s. Now the group is back, with "All Quiet on the Eastern Esplanade" out April 5 - only their third studio album in the 22 years since their debut "Up the Bracket".



Doherty, in typically droll and self-deprecating form, told AFP how the release date had to be shifted twice to make way for releases by Ariana Grande and Elbow. "They're more famous than us now," he said. But he was meeting AFP to discuss the documentary "Stranger In My Own Skin" — a brutally uncompromising look at his years of drug use — ahead of its release in France.

Its 90 minutes were whittled down from more than 200 hours of footage shot by Katia de Vidas, who began as a film student recruited to follow Doherty by French magazine Les Inrocks, and ended up as his wife. Doherty remains philosophical about his addiction: "If I look like I'm suffering and lost, well humanity is suffering and lost — but sometimes you try to distil that and get drunk on it."

He can also be darkly funny about those times, as when he recalled the moment in the film where he struggles to find a vein to shoot heroin. "After seven or eight years of shooting up, it can be very difficult. It wasn't narcotic relief anymore — it was a military operation to find a vein! It was really sad, it was tragic, but it was also celebratory for me when I found (a vein)." He wanted to use footage of a particular goal by his beloved Queens Park Rangers football club to illustrate the feeling. — AFP

Australia target New Zealand 'superstar' Ravindra in first Test

Mitchell fortunate to survive an early stumping chance off Lyon

WELLINGTON: Australian spinner Nathan Lyon know if we can put pressure on them and challenge described unbeaten New Zealand batsman Rachin Ravindra as a budding "superstar" on Saturday but says the tourists are still well placed to win the first Test in Wellington.

Ravindra struck an eye-catching 56 not out as the home side reached 111-3 at stumps on day three, having stumbled early in their pursuit of a lofty 369 to win the opening match of the two-Test series. Daryl Mitchell was on 12, with the pair having put on 52 in 20.3 overs together to give New Zealand a glimmer of hope in difficult batting conditions.

Lyon took 2-27 - aided by some brilliant catching from Steve Smith - to give him six wickets for the match. Lyon shapes as a key figure in preventing New Zealand from scoring the remaining 258 runs they need on a Basin Reserve pitch taking turn and bounce.

New Zealand part-time spinner Glenn Phillips earlier capitalized on the conditions, snaring career-best figures of 5-45 as Australia were bundled out for 164 in their second innings. Ravindra, who scored 240 in the first Test against South Africa last month, defied Australia late in the day with a series of aggressive strokes in his 94-ball knock.

Lyon said it will be crucial to quickly remove the 24-year-old, who scored three centuries at last year's 50-over World Cup. "Rachin seems like a really good player," Lyon said. "This is the first time I've bowled to him — I watched a lot of him during the World Cup and he's going to be a superstar. Credit where it's due, he's played very well here. "But I

their defence for long periods of time, hopefully we can crack them.'

'Dream come true'

Mitchell was fortunate to survive an early stumping chance off Lyon, when the ball evaded the gloves of wicketkeeper Alex Carey, with the charging batsman well out of his ground. Lyon was introduced in the sixth over of New Zealand's innings and quickly removed opener Tom Latham before claiming the key wicket of Kane Williamson, when Smith pouched a sharp catch at leg slip. Smith's second catch was even better, to remove Will Young for 15 off parttime spinner Travis Head, reacting quickly to a fine edge that went low and to his left.

Earlier, Australia lost their last six wickets in the space of 13 overs, with Phillips producing the best figures by any New Zealand spinner on home soil in 18 years, complementing his 71 with the bat in New Zealand's first innings of 179. Phillips, thanked captain Tim Southee for giving him the opportunity for a rare long spell. "It's absolutely a dream come true. Timmy's an incredible captain. He gave me the confidence to go out there and stick to my plan," Phillips said.

"I never thought it would be in home conditions I could take a five-for. I definitely thought it would be more in the sub-continent." Two wickets fell in the first session, nightwatchman Lyon departing for Australia's top score of 41 and opener Usman Khawaja for 28 after they resumed at 13-2.

First-innings centurion Cameron Green scored 34



and Travis Head 29 but the end of their 46-run partnership for the fifth wicket sparked a collapse. Head miscued Phillips to be caught at long-on, before the

spinner removed Mitchell Marsh and Alex Carey to close catchers and Henry bagged the last two wickets to finish with 3-36. — AFP

Tentoglou retains long jump title, Holloway cruises

GLASGOW: Greece's Miltiadis Tentoglou retained his world indoor long jump title in Glasgow on Saturday as American Grant Holloway moved smoothly into the semi-finals of the 60m hurdles. Tentoglou, the reigning Olympic, world and European champion, leaped a best of 8.22 metres on his first effort.

Italy's Mattia Furlani, 19, claimed silver with the same mark, Jamaican Carey McLeod taking bronze with 8.21m. There was no drama for Holloway, the three-time 110m hurdles world champion and Olympic silver medalist, in the opening round

The 26-year-old, fresh from eclipsing his own world record in the 60m hurdles last month, is unbeaten in indoor races since March 2014, a remarkable record that spans 73 races. "This race was uneventful for me," said Holloway, who clocked a leading 7.43 seconds in winning his heat. "I was doing really well, I've just been running 7.3s (this year), so that was my first 7.4 of the season. — AFP

Evenepoel, Roglic get Tour de France taste at Paris-Nice

PARIS: Cycling fans can enjoy a tantalizing peek at how the Tour de France may culminate in July when the Paris-Nice stage race sets off on Sunday towards a finale on the Promenade des Anglais on the Mediterranean seafront.

Due to the Olympic Games being hosted in Paris in July, the conclusion of the Tour de France has been switched away from its traditional Champs Elysees finish line in the French capital. Instead it will conclude with what should be a thrilling individual time-trial along the winding corniche from Monaco to the Riviera city Nice, where Paris-Nice also concludes on March 10.

Neither Jonas Vingegaard nor Tadej Pogacar, winners of the last four Tour de France races, will be present at Paris-Nice. But the other members of the so called 'Fab Four' fighting for the 2024 Tour title — Belgium's Remco Evenepoel and Slovenian veteran

Primoz Roglic — will be at the start line. Belgian maverick Evenepoel has not only never raced a Tour de France, he has never even taken part in a stage race in the country. "It's a big race for us," Evenepoel's sports director Klaas Lodewyck said

this week. "We're aiming high." At 34, Roglic is cursed to be forever remembered for surrendering a 90-second Tour de France lead in a gut-wrenching last-gasp melt-

down on the Planche des Belle Filles climb back

in 2020. Paris-Nice is the first significant stage race of the season and packs all the difficulties of a Grand Tour into eight stages.

Embarking from the Paris region, the race is affectionately known as the 'Race to the Sun'. The forecast predicts a windy stage in the plains south of Paris where the bigger, more powerful cyclists can prosper.

Downhill dash

There's a time trial for those who can maintain high performance over 30km, a medium mountain climb for the slender climbers, at least two finishes for the sprinters, and a chance for daredevils to shine in a thrilling finale out of the mountainous back country to the seafront at Nice.

Sunday's opening run is largely flat but two late climbs may close the door for the outright fast men such as Fabio Jakobsen and Dylan Groenewegen of the Netherlands and Ireland's Sam Bennett. The first two stages will depend on the winds but are likely to offer at least one mass bunch sprint as will stage five. Stage four takes the peloton over seven climbs through the picture-postcard Beaujolais vineyards.

Roglic and Evenepoel will likely come top two in the team time trial where teams set off together but will be timed individually. The idea is that teams will deliver Evenepoel and Roglic before splintering as they send their leading contenders

up the road near the finish. The final weekend is likely to be where the race is decided with Saturday featuring a 7km climb at 7.2 percent incline toward a summit finish that favors Roglic. Sunday's final short but tough 108km rush towards old Nice favors Evenepoel and finishes with a white knuckle 16km downhill dash to the Promenade des Anglais. — AFP

Swiss Gut-Behrami closes in on World Cup title with super-G win

Odermatt seals giant slalom crown with Aspen win

KVITFJELL: Swiss skier Lara Gut-Behrami on Saturday won the first of two women's super-G races of the weekend in Kvitfjell to extend her lead in the overall World Cup standings on injured US star Mikaela Shiffrin. The Olympic super-G champion's risk-taking in foggy conditions paid off as she finished ahead of two Austrians with Cornelia Huetter at 0.12sec and Mirjam Puchner 0.13 off the pace. With Shiffrin still recovering from a knee injury, Gut-Behrami now leads her rival by 305 points in the overall standings to close in on the World Cup title she previously won in 2016.

"I never expected to be still racing at 32 and to be so consistent," said Gut-Behrami, who picked up speed on the lower half of the Olympiabakken to finish in a time of one minute 33.52 seconds. "There's no strategy, it's just I am trying to enjoy more what I am doing," said Gut-Behrami after her 45th career World Cup win.

"I know I am not going to race another 1000 races more. So, I am trying to enjoy the way I am skiing, the good feeling I have and to have fun while I am skiing. "I'm looking forward to the next races and keep on skiing well." Shiffrin should return to competition next weekend in the Swedish resort of Are, where a giant and a slalom are planned, before the finals in Saalbach, Austria, from March 16 to 23. Gut-Behrami will not take part in the slaloms, which leaves hope for Shiffrin, who has the opportunity to take 200 points from her in this event before the end of the season. Gut-Behrami claimed her eighth success this season, the best record of her career, and a 45th victory in the World Cup.


Verstappen's Bahrain

SAKHIR: Max Verstappen delivered some much-needed relief for his Red Bull team on Friday when he resisted Ferrari's Charles Leclerc to claim pole position for Saturday's season-opening Bahrain Grand Prix. The defending three-time world champion picked up where he left off last year by topping the times in a closely-contested qualifying session at the Bahrain International Circuit at Sakhir. His success, which he admitted was "a little bit unexpected" arrived after another day of speculation and pressure for team boss Christian Horner, following the anonymous leaking of a cache of alleged private messages and photographs between him and a female member of the team.

This came 24 hours after an internal investigation led by an independent London lawyer had resulted in Horner being cleared of all claims of inappropriate behaviour. Verstappen clocked a fastest lap of one minute the final seconds of the session, securing his third Bahrain pole and the 33rd of his career.

Coleman outsprints Lyles for second world indoor 60m gold

GLASGOW: Christian Coleman outsprinted much-hyped American rival Noah Lyles to claim his second world indoor 60m title in Glasgow on Friday. Coleman, who previously won gold in Birmingham, England, in 2018, timed 6.41 seconds, with Lyles taking silver in 6.44sec.

Jamaica's Ackeem Blake claimed bronze in 6.46sec. "It's amazing, I never take these opportunities for granted," said Coleman, who was also a silver medallist in Belgrade two years ago behind Italy's Olympic chamnion Marcell Jacobs, absent from Glasgow.

pion Marcell Jacobs, absent from Glasgow. "I wanted to come out and put on a

show. It's going to give me tremendous momentum" going into the Paris Olympics, he added. Coleman, who won the world outdoor 100m title in Doha in 2019 but missed the Tokyo Olympics after being hit by a doping ban, was drawn in lane four, with Lyles in five and Blake in six.

The 27-year-old is well known for his quick start and made no mistake at a packed Emirates Arena. He screamed off to the front of the eight-strong field and never looked for one moment in danger of ceding that lead.

"I had a lot of confidence in myself com-

ing in," said Coleman. "You have to feel confident in yourself. I set my mind on letting my body do what I have been doing in practice and I came out with a win. "I can look forward to the rest of the summer. I've got so many things to work on and I am just looking forward to these opportunities. When you get these opportunities, you have got to take them."

'A great race'

Lyles is a six-time world outdoor champion, last year becoming the first sprinter to win the world 100-200m double since

Usain Bolt in 2015. He had announced that competing indoors in this Olympic year was the perfect chance to hone his start—which he considers the weak link in his skillset—in time for the Paris Games.

Lyles also said he had targeted four golds, starting with this race and culminating in a treble sprint haul in the French capital. "To be honest, it's a great race," said Lyles. "Every time I've come down the 60m this year, it's a blessing."

When asked whether he thought he had achieved what he'd set out to accomplish, Lyles replied: "Beside getting

gold, yes! "It feels like one of my best performances - 6.44, I'm never going to be dissatisfied with that. Last year I was running 6.51 and this year I've put down multiple 6.4s, and these are not small 6.4s either, I'm deep into 6.4 territory and talking about 6.3 at some point.

"The 60m is not my favourite race but now you can't say I'm not one of the greats in it." Lyles added: "This is all with training that hasn't really changed. It's so exciting because now I finally get to do an outdoor season. "I'm very excited for Paris because it has all my favourite events." — AFP

Liverpool beat Forest, Spurs fight back to close on top four

MANCHESTER: Darwin Nunez headed in a 99th-minute winner as injury-hit Liverpool moved four points clear at the top of the Premier League with a 1-0 win at Nottingham Forest, while Tottenham came from behind late on to beat Crystal Palace on Saturday.

Liverpool's resources have been stretched to the limit by a series of injuries in recent weeks as they attempt to win a quadruple in Jurgen Klopp's final season. The Reds were again without a host of star names including Mohamed Salah, Trent Alexander-Arnold,

Alisson Becker and Diogo Jota.

But there was some light at the end of the tunnel with Nunez and Dominik Szoboszlai making their return as second-half substitutes. The Uruguayan made the telling impact with virtually the last touch of the game as Nunez rose highest to flick home Alexis Mac

Victory pulls Klopp's men clear of Manchester City, who face Manchester United on Sunday, and five points clear of Arsenal before they travel to Sheffield United on Monday. Defeat leaves Forest still just four points above the relegation zone and with the threat of a points deduction for breaches of financial rules still hanging over the club.

Tottenham have made a habit of late fightbacks at home under Ange Postecoglou and needed another one to inflict Oliver Glasner's first defeat as Palace boss with a 3-1 win. Eberechi Eze's stunning free-kick gave the Eagles a shock lead on the hour mark.

Timo Werner's first Spurs goal set up the grandstand finish when he tapped home Brennan Johnson's low cross. Cristian Romero then headed Tottenham in front before Son Heung-min sprinted clear to seal the three points.

Saudi formally launches bid for 2034 WCup

RIYADH: Saudi Arabia formally launched its bid to host the 2034 World Cup on Friday, nearly four months after football's world governing body FIFA announced the kingdom was the only candidate. The bid comes two years after neighbouring Qatar hosted the first World Cup in the Middle East.

The campaign is under the slogan "Growing. Together", the Saudi Arabian Football Federation (SAFF) revealed its bid logo, website, as well as a short bid film that celebrates "the passion, spirit and diversity of football in Saudi Arabia".

"This campaign is powered by the hopes and dreams of 32 million people in Saudi Arabia," the head of the SAFF bid unit, Hammad Albalawi, said in a statement. "Our responsibility is to submit the best possible bid to FIFA, make our country proud and fulfil the trust placed upon us by more than 130 Member Associations across the world who supported our bid."

Under Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman's Vision 2030 reform agenda, which aims to position Saudi Arabia as a tourism, business and sports hub, the kingdom has invested heavily in sport. On Wednesday,

Bayern held in Freiburg to boost Leverkusen title hopes

FREIBURG IM BREISGAU: Bayern Munich were held to a 2-2 draw at Freiburg on Friday, an 87th-minute equaliser from Lucas Hoeler giving leaders Bayer Leverkusen a chance to go 10 points clear. Mathys Tel's 35th-minute stunner had cancelled out an impressive opener from Freiburg captain Christian Guenter, before Jamal Musiala's spectacular solo effort looked to have snared the three points for Bayern.

Hoeler however had other ideas, chipping a volley through a crowded Bayern penalty area and past a helpless Manuel Neuer. Bayern manager Thomas Tuchel criticised his players' "body language and lack of bite" in the first

Saudi Arabia's Public Investment Fund (PIF) announced a "multi-year strategic partnership" with the ATP, the governing body of men's tennis.

Since 2021, PIF has invested heavily in a number of major sports, including setting up the LIV golf tour, a rival to the PGA, and purchasing English Premier League club Newcastle United. It also owns four clubs in the Saudi Pro League and has lured global stars including Cristiano Ronaldo and Neymar with huge salaries.

The investment has led to accusations the kingdom is "sportswashing" international criticism of its human rights record. Saudi Arabia was initially interested in bidding for the 2030 World Cup alongside Egypt and Greece but that idea was abandoned in June, leaving the path open for a tri-continental bid of Spain, Portugal and Morocco, with three matches in South America.

Saudi Arabia announced its intention to bid for the 2034 event on October 4, as soon as the procedure had been launched. As a result of the continental rotation, FIFA had only "invited" member countries of the Asian and Oceanian confederations to apply—thus ruling out the traditional footballing heartlands.

At one stage, Indonesia had considered a joint bid with Australia, or even other countries such as New Zealand, Malaysia and Singapore, but on October 19 it agreed to support Saudi Arabia's bid. Australia was also a contender but withdrew its interest on Monday following the Asian Football Confederation's decision to back the Saudi bid. — AFP
