urity of the heart is one of the best deeds and tasks because the center of our deeds, rewards, punishment, acceptance and rejection – among other deeds - is the heart. Almighty Allah says what can be translated as: "The Day when wealth or children will not benefit anyone. Only those who will come to Allah with a sound (and clear) heart (Will be saved)." 
KRCS distributes

Electronic waste: A global crisis in need of sustainable solutions

Most hazardous e-waste contain toxic components

KUWAIT: With every passing year, the practice of storing or dumping vast amounts of electronic waste is growing, driven by people's constant urge to upgrade to the latest, lightest or slimmest versions of electronic products just entering the market. This trend has led to a doubling of the annually generated global e-waste volume in just five years, from approximately 20 million tons to 40 million tons, as reported by a survey conducted by the Kuwait Environment Protection Society.

Unfortunately, this e-waste ends up being sent to landfills, resulting in significant adverse effects on the environment and people, as noted by Jenan Behzad, Secretary General of KEPS. She highlighted mobile phones, personal computing devices and televisions as the most hazardous e-waste, containing toxic components such as lead and mercury, which are released into the environment, causing damage to the brain, heart, liver, kidneys and skeletal systems of humans. Additionally, these toxic substances accumulate in the soil, air, water and living organisms.

However, Behzad noted that e-waste encompasses more than just electronic devices; it also includes batteries, chargers, wires and any items whose lifespan has ended. Reacting to the misconception that these products are worthless, Behzad dispelled this

false belief by highlighting that e-waste includes valuable metals such as gold, silver and copper, which can be extracted and reused for manufacturing new products.

Therefore, proper disposal of e-waste will not only protect the health of people and the environment, but will also extend to providing economic benefits, as emphasized by Ghassan Mazloum, a business developer and

administration manager at an e-waste recycling company in Kuwait. He pointed out that efficient retrieval of valuable materials from e-waste contributes to fostering a circular economy.

By using recycled materials, manufacturers can lower the costs associated with extracting and processing new raw materials, boost production rates, create more job opportunities and ultimately offer products at lower prices, thereby benefiting the end consumer as well, he noted. Mazloum argued that the lack of awareness regarding the consequences of dumping electronic waste is one



of the primary factors contributing to this escalating phenomenon. Additionally, he noted the lack of trust in electronic waste companies, particularly concerning the handling of sensitive data stored on old electronic devices.

Therefore, the essential role of recycling companies comes into play, as Mazloum explained that legitimate electronic waste companies provide detailed reports as evidence of destruction, dismantling or data erasure. Moreover, he assured they are approved by legal authorities and adhere to regulations and international standards concerning safety, health and material disposal. Mazloum believes that another cause behind the prevalence of dumping



e-waste is the absence of penalties for this action. He suggested Kuwait Municipality should enact strict regulations on this matter, similar to those in other developed countries, and impose fees whenever people dispose of any material in a non-environmentally friendly manner.

Clinics to offer consultation in Ramadan

Al-Qaoud pointed out that children's meals should be monitored, especially sweets and the high sugar content they may contain during the Girgian season. — KUNA

Kuwait welcomes Sudan ceasefire

KUWAIT: Kuwait's Foreign Ministry welcomed the UN Security Council's adoption of Resolution 2724 on Saturday, calling for a ceasefire in Sudan during Ramadan. This step, according to the statement, would enable swift and safe delivery of aid to civilians. Reaffirming support for international efforts in this regard, especially the ones by UN Secretary General's Personal Envoy for Sudan, Ramtane Lamamra, the ministry said a solution to the crisis depends on all parties in Sudan adhering to the aforementioned resolution and committing to the Jeddah Declaration outcomes in a way that preserves Sudan's sovereignty and achieves its people's aspirations of a safe and decent life, concluded the statement.

Also, Secretary-General of the Gulf Cooperation Council (GCC) Jasem Al-Budaiwi welcomed the UN Security Council resolution 2724 calling for a ceasefire in Sudan during the Muslim holy month of Ramadan. In a statement, Al-Budaiwi expressed hope that all Sudan's parties would commit to the resolution in a manner that maintains security, stability, and the safety of Sudanese people. He reiterated the GCC's unwavering positions regarding maintaining Sudan's stability, security, and territorial integrity, as well as

The resolution called for removing all obstacles and allowing full, rapid, and safe humanitarian aid to get into Sudan, as well as other commitments. Sudan has been witnessing fierce fighting between the Sudanese army and the paramilitary Rapid Support Forces since mid-April 2023 that has killed and wounded tens of thousands of people. — KUNA

Ineffectiveness of punishing students

KUWAIT: Expelling irresponsible students as a form of punishment does not seem to be effective, according to Hoor Al-Mutairi, a high achieving high school student, who argued in an interview with Kuwait Times against this continuing form of punishment, saying it does not address the root causes of such students' behaviors.

Because educating the youth is fundamental for securing future progress, Kuwait Times listened to high school students to reinforce the importance of their opinions and the problems that hinder their progress. One of the primary challenges that students face during their in-class education experience is the negative learning environment created by their peers, which never seems to come to an end due to the ineffective forms of punishment that schools apply. "It is clear that these students may

already have a lack of interest in attending school and engaging in learning. For them, being expelled does nothing of the supposed disciplinary cause, but is rather considered a relief from adhering to school rules and focusing on their education. In fact, some of them take pride in it!" explained Mutairi.

This was also highlighted by Al Kawther Ghloum, also a high achieving high school student, who said expelling students may further push them towards disengagement and rebellion. "Rather than punishing students by ineffective forms of punishment such as expelling them for a few days, calling their parents, deducting their marks or trying to embarrass them by keeping them standing outside the classroom, our schools must provide mental and psychological support for all students and teachers," she said.

"Providing a serious and dedicated mental healthcare department in

school can fix many problems in our educational experience, because some students are actually not bad or irresponsible, but they just need help to realize their potential in life. Once they discover it, they will take school more seriously and respect their peers'

rights for proper education during school time," Al Kawther added, emphasizing on the importance of providing mental healthcare at schools to create a profound positive impact while addressing students' misbehavior at school.

Doctor's Brew initiative at Bayt Abdullah honors Dr Ridha Alkhayyat

That is the worst that can happen—I die? That is a very normal thing! These were the courageous words of my late father, Dr. Ridha Alkhayyat, amidst the most harrowing moments of my life. Diagnosed with late-stage lung cancer at the height of the pandemic, while I was in medical school, frequent hospital visits became our new normal. Yet, in those moments, my father would often remind me of the ordinariness of death.

His perspective on mortality profoundly influenced my understanding of death and underscores the critical role of palliative care." Palliative care is defined as holistic care of people with health-related suffering as a result of severe medical conditions, especially, but not only, those nearing the end of life (Radbruch et al., 2020). Its aim is to improve the quality of life of both patients and their families. Despite its importance, misconceptions and stigma often lead to its underutilization (Cherny, 2009).

To bridge this gap, my team at The Doctor's Brew partnered with the Kuwait Association for the Care of Children in Hospital (KACCH) and Bayt Abdullah Children's Hospice (BACCH), organizing the 'TDB Cares: Palliative Care' event in honor of my father Dr Ridha Alkhayyat. This initiative, through expert-led panels and lectures, highlighted palliative care practice in Kuwait, the vital work of KACCH & BACCH, and the role of junior doctors in palliative care.

Through this article, I aim to share the transformative insights from our event, hoping to challenge perceptions and encourage wider embrace of palliative care. In practice, palliative care is underutilized and misunderstood. For example, a study exploring

deceased patients who had solid cancer tumors found that only 9.6 percent of patients received palliative care (Osagiede et al, 2018). Common myths about palliative care, including that it is "giving up" or that it is solely end-of-life care, hinders its utilization clinically (Cheng et al, 2019; Cherny, 2009).

Contrary to these myths, studies have shown that palliative care actually prolongs life (Temel et al, 2010; Hui and Bruera, 2016; Sullivan et al, 2019; Zhi and Smith, 2015). These issues are particularly pronounced in Kuwait, where not only is palliative care underutilized, but there is also a shortage of providers. This is illustrated by the common question posed to our team at The Doctor's Brew regarding our event at Bayt Abdullah—'who is Abdullah and why are you hosting an event at his house (bayt)?' So, what exactly is Bayt Abdullah? It is the Middle East's sole children's hospice, offering holistic palliative care support to children with life threatening illnesses.

These include counseling, clinical services, music therapy and more. Bayt Abdullah can only be described as a colorful oasis tucked away in Shuwaikh boasting a playground, library, and a ferris wheel designed by the same team responsible for the London Eye! Despite providing medical services such as taking blood and administering medication, BACCH does not feel like a hospital. Unlike traditional hospitals, it is adorned with color, the sound of children playing replaces the beeps of machines, and natural sunlight fills every room.

An extension of the KACCH, a non-profit, charitable organization, BACCH and KACCH together provide therapeutic services across nine government hospitals in Kuwait. It is critical for every doctor and healthcare provider to be aware of what KACCH and BACCH offer, ensuring children facing life-limiting illnesses can be referred to this exceptional facility. As victims of imposter syndrome, it is easy for young doctors, such as myself, to feel that our work is futile. However, as part of our training, we naturally have to spend more time on the wards and with patients than senior physicians.

With this much facetime with patients, it is preposterous to believe that we have no impact on their care. Recognizing this, The Doctor's Brew emphasized the vital role of junior doctors in palliative care at our recent event. We highlighted two main strategies: effective communication and active advocacy. Open dialogue helps dismantle stigma. By employing communication models such as the SPIKES framework in delivering bad news and using active listening skills, patients and their families are more likely to be receptive to palliative services.

The goal is not to persuade, rather, it is to foster trust which plants seeds for future consideration of palliative interventions. Outside the hospital, however, there is still plenty to be done. By being an active advocate of palliative care in our personal lives, whether by volunteering at KACCH and BACCH or talking about palliative care values in social settings, we can cause a shift in misconceived societal viewpoints. Being a doctor, for better or for worse, extends beyond the hospital walls and we all have a choice with what to do with that title when we finish our workday.

My suggestion is to use it for the betterment of health, people, and society as a whole in whatever way that brings you joy and self-fulfillment. In closing, I would like to remind those of you reading who feel that palliative care does not apply to your life-think twice. Death is a universal right, fear, and paradox that humanity has confronted since the start of time. We all confront mortality whether it is our own or of those we love. Remember that palliative care is not only about the end of life, it is about the quality of life. Learn about palliative care today so our final chapters on earth can be ones of calm, peace, and love.

Experts promote physical exercise

KUWAIT: The director of the Health Promotion Department at the Ministry of Health, Dr. Abeer Al-Bahwa, said that the percentage of physical inactivity in Kuwait has increased to about 61 percent among adults (18 years of age and older) and 75 percent among females. Al-Bahwa said that the holy month of Ramadan is a good opportunity to exercise, reduce inactivity, and promote health, pointing to the rising and increasing rates of obesity and diabetes in the country.

She explained that the percentage of

physical inactivity from the age of 11 to 17 years for males was 79 percent, while for females, it was 90 percent, and the average inactivity rate for that age group was 84 percent. It was reported that the prevalence of physical inactivity among the elderly reached 76 percent among males and 85 percent among females, indicating that changing the level of physical inactivity among people in Kuwait requires a system based on a specific approach and involves a wide range of measures across multiple sectors.

She pointed to the cooperation of various sectors in the Ministry of Health in spreading health awareness and presenting plans and policies that would encourage Kuwaiti society of all age groups to move and avoid physical inactivity, which would cause many chronic diseases and others. The research indicated that diseases known as chronic or lifestyle-related are the leading cause of global mortality, with about 41,000,000 deaths resulting from them. Globally, it accounts for 74 percent of deaths, while up to 79 percent are in Kuwait.

She called for building a comprehensive, integrated, and multi-sectoral national plan to promote physical activity at the national level among leaders, decision-makers, and influencers, preparing a training program to prepare leaders and champions who promote physical activity in relevant sectors, and supporting initiatives that encourage the practice of sports. — KUNA

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No respite in Gaza on Ramadan eve

Diplomatic push expected for truce deal within first half of holy month: Source

GAZA: Deadly fighting raged in Gaza on Sunday between Zionist forces and Hamas militants, with no truce in sight as the Muslim holy month of Ramadan neared and a dire humanitarian crisis gripped the besieged Palestinian territory.

Gang violence torments Haiti

A Spanish charity ship with food aid prepared to sail from the Mediterranean island-nation of Cyprus to help alleviate the suffering in the coastal Gaza Strip, now in its sixth month of war. The non-governmental group Open Arms said its boat would pull a barge with 200 tons of food, which its partner the US charity World Central Kitchen

would then unload on the shores of Gaza.

Vessel tracking websites showed the Open Arms still in Larnaca on Sunday evening. It was expected to depart "in the coming hours", Cypriot government spokesman Konstantinos Letymbiotis told Cyprus News Agency.

With the UN repeatedly warning of famine, United States, Jordanian and other planes again airdropped food aid, but the United Nation's aid coordinator for the area has said more supply by land is the best way to get assistance to territory's 2.4 million people.

The war has killed 31,045 Palestinians, mostly women and children, according to the health ministry in Gaza where vast swathes have been reduced to a bombed-out wasteland. Weeks of talks involving United States, Qatari and Egyptian mediators have aimed for a six-week truce and the release of many of the roughly 100 hostages Hamas is still holding in return for Palestinian prisoners released from Zionist jails. There have been no results as of the time this story was published.

The widely shared target had been to halt the fighting by the start of Ramadan, which is expected to begin as early as Monday depending on the first sighting of the crescent moon. Both sides have blamed each other for failing to reach a deal, after the Zionist entity had demanded a full list of surviving hostages, and Hamas had called for the entity to pull out all its troops from Gaza.

Attention during the Muslim fasting month will focus on the Al-Aqsa mosque compound in annexed east Jerusalem, a frequent flashpoint in the past as it is both Islam's third holiest site and sacred to Jews who call it the Temple Mount. A source with knowledge of the truce talks told AFP that "there will be a diplomatic push especially in the next 10 days" with a view to

securing a deal within the first half of Ramadan as negotiations between all parties continued.

'Enough of this war!'

United States President Joe Biden reiterated on Saturday that the Zionist entity has "a right to continue to pursue Hamas", but also stressed his growing impatience with the entity's right-wing Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu. With the death toll ever-increasing, Biden told broadcaster MSNBC that Netanyahu "must pay more attention to the innocent lives being lost as a consequence of the actions taken"

At this stage, said Biden, Netanyahu's approach to the war was "hurting (the Zionist entity) more than helping (the Zionist entity)". The comments came after Zionist protesters again took to the streets of Tel Aviv for anti-government rallies, joined by some of the desperate families and friends of hostages still held by Hamas. Biden also signaled he would be will-

ing to speak directly to the Zionist people through an address to the Knesset legislature.

World Health Organization chief Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus said the United Nations agency had delivered some medical supplies and fuel to two hospitals in northern Gaza on Saturday. But he added that "we need sustained, safe access to health facilities in order to supply them with urgently needed lifesaving healthcare on a regular basis," and called for a ceasefire.

The UN has reported particular difficulty in accessing northern Gaza. The territory's health ministry said at least 23 children have died from malnutrition and dehydration. In the southern Gaza city of Rafah, resident Mumen Ahmed told AFP a strike hit a packed car on Sunday morning, causing "a martyr and casualties". "We expected with the arrival of Ramadan that the war would end," said Ahmed, displaced from Gaza City. "Enough of this war!" — AFP

High-ranking Indian election official resigns

NEW DELHI: India's second-highest ranked election commission official has resigned, the justice ministry said, days before the expected announcement of general elections in which Prime Minister Narendra Modi will seek a third term.

Arun Goel resigned Saturday, leaving the Election Commission of India with only one of its three top officials to conduct what will be the largest exercise of the democratic franchise in human history.

Nearly a billion people are eligible to cast ballots in the elections, likely to be held in April-May. The Ministry of Law and Justice said Indian President Droupadi Murmu had accepted Goel's resignation, but did not cite a reason for his departure.

The NDTV news network said Goel had resigned due to "personal reasons", citing sources. Another official had retired last year and the position has not yet been filled.

The dates for the election, conducted in several phases, are likely to be announced next week, according to local media reports. K C Venugopal, general secretary of the main opposition Congress party, said Goel's resignation was a concern.

"It is deeply concerning for the health of the world's largest democracy that Election Commissioner Mr Arun Goel has resigned on the cusp of the Lok Sabha (parliamentary) elections," he said in a social media post.

"There is absolutely no transparency in how a constitutional institution like the ECI has been functioning and the manner in which the government pressurizes them."

Several opinion polls have indicated an easy win by Modi and his Hindu nationalist Bharatiya Janata Party in the general election. A Pew survey last year found Modi was viewed favorably by nearly 80 percent of Indians. — AFP

Gang violence torments Haiti

US evacuates personnel, strengthens security at embassy; Haitians 'run away'

PORT-AU-PRINCE: With Haiti's capital spiraling deeper into gang violence, the United States said Sunday it has airlifted non-essential American staff from its embassy in Port-au-Prince and brought in additional personnel to boost security at the compound.

Residents of beleaguered neighborhoods were scrambling for safety on Saturday following the latest spasm of unrest, with a United Nations group warning of a "city under siege" after armed attackers targeted the presidential palace and police headquarters.

Criminal groups, which already control much of Port-au-Prince as well as roads leading to the rest of the country, have unleashed havoc in recent days as they try to oust Prime Minister Ariel Henry as leader of the Western hemisphere's poorest country. On Saturday, dozens of residents were seeking safety in public buildings, with some successfully breaking into one facility, according to an AFP correspondent.

The US military said early Sunday it had "conducted an operation to augment the security of the US Embassy at Port-au-Prince, allow our Embassy mission operations to continue, and enable non-essential personnel to depart." "This airlift of personnel into and out of the Embassy is consistent with our standard practice for Embassy security augmentation," the statement from the military's US Southern Command added.

The pre-dawn operation appeared to be conducted by helicopter, apparently in flights to and from the airport, according to an AFP correspondent and nearby residents who heard the distinct sounds of chopper blades overhead. The embassy said on X that it "remains open." "Heightened gang violence in the neighborhood near US embassy compounds and near the airport led to the State Department's decision to arrange for the departure of additional embassy personnel," it added, noting that all operation passengers "work for the US government."

Vigilantes try to uphold order as war batters Rafah

RAFAH: Whether directing traffic or controlling prices, a group of vigilantes is determined to uphold order as five months of war have shattered any semblance of normalcy in Gaza's southernmost city of Rafah. Their faces covered with black balaclavas, the so-called "Popular Committees of Protection" patrol Rafah where vast numbers of displaced people have sought refuge.

"We are hundreds of individuals and volunteers maintaining security and protecting citizens from high prices, organizing public markets and transport," said 28-year-old Abu Mahmud. About 1.5 million of the territory's 2.4 million residents have crammed into Rafah and, even when supplies are available, severe restrictions on deliveries from neighboring Egypt have led to skyrocketing prices.

The economy ministry in Gaza has sought to tackle the problem by setting a daily price list of staples, such as vegetables and crackers, which these committees are seeking to enforce. "We follow the traders who raise prices," said Abu Islam, 29, a member of a seven-strong squad patrolling a market in the central Rafah refugee camp.

One of the shoppers complained to the group about a stall owner selling a kilo of sugar for 80 shekels (\$22), prompting the vigilantes to tell the vendor to price it at 65 shekels in line with the official list. In late February, dozens of Gazans held a rare protest in Rafah to denounce soaring food prices. Protesters burned tires, while some expressed frustration at the territory's Hamas authorities.

'Living in fear'

The unrest has seen 362,000 Haitians internally displaced — more than half of them children, the International Organization for Migration said Saturday. "Haitians are unable to lead a decent life. They are living in fear, and every day, every hour this situation carries on, the trauma gets worse," Philippe Branchat, IOM's chief in Haiti, said in a statement.

"People living in the capital are locked in, they have nowhere to go," he said. "The capital is surrounded by armed groups and danger. It is a city under siege." Police late Friday repelled gang attacks, including on the presidential palace, and several "bandits" were killed, Lionel Lazarre of the Haitian police union said.

Gunshots rang out late Friday throughout Portau-Prince and witnesses recounted clashes "between police officers and bandits" as gangs apparently tried to commandeer police stations. Lazarre on Saturday pleaded for "means and equipment" to protect key facilities. The well-armed gangs have attacked critical infrastructure in recent days, including two prisons, allowing the majority of their 3,800 inmates to escape. Along with some ordinary Haitians, the gangs are seeking the resignation of Prime Minister Henry, who was due to leave office in February but instead agreed to a power-sharing deal with the opposition until new elections are held. Washington has asked Henry to enact urgent political reform. He was in Kenya when the violence erupted and is now reportedly stranded in the US territory of Puerto Rico. The UN Security Council gave its green light in October for a multinational policing mission led by Kenya, but that deployment has been stalled by Kenyan courts.

'Running away'

Port-au-Prince and western Haiti are under a month-long state of emergency, and a nighttime

curfew was in effect until Monday, though it was unlikely overstretched police could enforce it. In Portau-Prince, Filienne Setoute told AFP how she had worked for the Ministry of Social Affairs and Labor for more than 20 years.

That job meant she "was able to build my own house," she said. "But now here I am, homeless. I'm fleeing without knowing where to go, it's an abuse." "We haven't been able to sleep since last night," she added. "We're running away."

Haiti's airport remained closed while the main port
— a key point for food imports — reported looting

since suspending services Thursday. "If we cannot access those containers, Haiti will go hungry soon,"

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non-governmental organization Mercy Corps warned. CARICOM, an alliance of Caribbean nations, has summoned envoys from the United States, France, Canada and the United Nations to a meeting Monday in Jamaica to discuss the violence and ways to provide assistance to Haiti. Meanwhile Pope Francis offered his prayers Sunday, saying he is "following with concern and pain the serious crisis affecting Haiti" and the country's people, "who have suffered so much for years." — AFP

Kyiv slams Pope's call for negotiation with Russia

KYIV: Ukraine on Sunday slammed Pope Francis' call to negotiate with Russia two years into its invasion, vowing "never" to surrender after the pontiff said Kyiv should "have the courage to raise the white flag".

The Catholic leader had fueled anger in Kyiv after saying in an interview published Saturday that Ukraine should negotiate with Russia, which has seized large swathes of its territory during the war. "Our flag is a yellow and blue one. This is the flag by which we live, die, and prevail. We shall never raise any other flags," Ukraine's Foreign Minister Dmytro Kuleba said on social media.

The statement is in response to a comment from the Pope, said during an interview with Italian-language Swiss broadcaster RSI. The interview was recorded February 2, but segments were released March 9 ahead of its full release scheduled for March 20. "When you see that you are defeated, that things are not working out, to have the courage to negotiate."

Kuleba called on the elderly pontiff to stand "on the side of good" and not put the opposing sides "on the same footing and call it 'negotiations'." He also appeared to reference some of the Catholic church collaborating with Nazi forces during World War II:

"At the same time, when it comes to the white flag, we know this Vatican strategy from the first half of the 20th century," Kuleba said. "I urge to avoid repeating the mistakes of the past and to support Ukraine and its people in their just struggle for their lives." He also thanked Pope Francis for his "constant prayers for peace" and said Kyiv hoped the cleric would visit Ukraine. — AFP

'Work for the people'

A kilo of sugar cost just two shekels before October 7. Since then, the Zionist offensive on Gaza has killed at least 30,717 people, mostly women and children, according to Gaza's health ministry. Dozens more have died of malnutrition in recent days, the ministry said, as hunger grips the territory. The Zionist entity says the assault is in response to an attack staged by Hamas which resulted in about 1,160 deaths, most of them civilians, according to an AFP tally.

"We work for the people and hope to be as trustworthy as possible," said Abu Islam. "Whoever has a rifle uses it," he added, though all but one of his squad were armed with only sticks. The vigilante groups have sprung up in recent weeks, following a February 10 strike on a police car which killed multiple officers

Police patrols have become few and far between since the strike, an AFP correspondent in Rafah said. The volunteer group in the Rafah camp also directs traffic, including an ambulance, a truck loaded with supplies and a United Nations car. "We thank the Popular Committees for their efforts," said Abu Ahmed, a displaced Gazan. The 61-year-old commended in particular their attempts to "maintain reasonable prices". — AFP

About the purity of the heart, Prophet Muhammad (PBUH) said what can be translated as: "Verily, Allah neither looks at your faces nor your wealth, but (rather) He looks at your hearts and your deeds." (Saheeh Muslim). We understand from the above hadith (prophetic narration) that the reward for deeds depends on the sincerity and good intention determined within the heart. Thus, caring about reforming the heart and its attributes, should take precedence over actions of the body; for it is the action of the heart that makes deeds valid

In another hadith, Prophet Muhammad (PBUH) said what can be translated as: "Beware, there is a piece of flesh in the body; if it is healthy, the whole body is healthy, and if it is corrupt, then the whole body gets spoilt; and that is the heart." (Al-Bukhari)

The heart is the place of belief and piety, or alternatively, of disbelief, hypocrisy and polytheism — among others. It should be well understood that purity of the heart is not attained with water and clean clothes like the purity of the body, but rather by eliminating reprehensible characteristics and adopting good character; and this includes getting rid of polytheism and its encumbrances. All the deeds of a pure heart are performed for the sole purpose of seeking Almighty Allah's Pleasure. The person with a pure and clean heart doesn't ask for praise, appreciation, or reverence from anyone.

A sincere Muslim purifies his heart towards his Muslim brothers (and sisters). He doesn't envy them for the blessings that the All-Merciful Allah has bestowed on them, but rather he rejoices because he knows that wishing goodness for a Muslim is what the Majestic Allah has enjoined upon him, and that if he violates that, he violates one of the obligatory tenets of faith. This is in accordance to what Prophet Muhammad (PBUH) said, translated as: "None of you is a (true) believer until he likes for his brother what he likes for himself." (Al- Bukhari and Muslim)

Sins have an effect on your heart; they can cause your heart to be sealed to the extent that the light of knowledge doesn't reach it anymore. Good character confers a high degree on a true Muslim. Prophet Mu-

hammad (PBUH) said what can be translated as: "By (virtue of) his good character, a believer will attain the degree of one who fasts during the day, and prays during the night." (Sunan Abi Dawud)

A person of good heart should always hasten to reconcile with those who hurt or annoy him. Abu Huraira (may Allah be pleased with him) related that Allah's Messenger (PBUH) said, "The gates of Paradise are opened on Monday and Thursday, and every Muslim servant (of Allah) who does not associate any partners with Allah is Forgiven, except for the man between whom and his brother is enmity. It is said (three times) about them (to the angels): 'Leave these two until they reconcile (with each other).' (It was reported by Imam Muslim, Malik and Abu Dawud)

Finally, we should keep it in mind that the only heart worthy of being called a pure heart is the one adorned with the love of Almighty Allah. So, let every believer pay attention to the heart and carefully watch its movements. Let every one of us concentrate on the proper education and purification of his/her heart. — Courtesy of Kuwaiti Society for Cultural Dialogue

Madrid bombings survivors' pain, fear linger 20 years on

'The month of March is horrible, no matter how many years pass'

MADRID: Twenty years after Angeles Pedraza lost her daughter during the carnage of the Madrid train bombings that killed nearly 200 people, she still doesn't understand why. "Although it's painful and sad every day, when a date like this comes around, it's much worse. Because after 20 years, I still wonder why, what have these murderers achieved?" Pedraza, 65, told AFP at her home in Valdemoro.

International

Her memory isn't what it used to be, but she still remembers "every single minute" of March 11, 2004, when 10 bombs exploded on four commuter trains shortly after 7:30 am, killing 192 people and wounding nearly 2,000. Her 25-year-old daughter Miryam, she said, would normally take the train to work with her younger brother Javier and as far as the family was concerned, the day started just like any other.

Pedraza was driving to work when she heard initial reports on the radio, but didn't worry about her kids as the explosion seemed to be at Atocha station in the city center. But by the time she got to work, there had been more explosions and everyone was in a panic trying to track down their loved ones. She quickly reached her son who — by a miracle — had overslept, and was safe.

But she could not get hold of Miryam despite trying everything to find her. "We drove miles to all the hospitals and emergency rooms because every hour. they would release an updated list of those who'd been admitted," she said. "All we wanted was to hear her name, but we never did." Eventually, they went to an information center for families where they waited. At 3:00 am, they were told she was among the dead.

'I'll never forgive them'

"On that day, you die yourself. Because aside from the immense pain, you cannot understand why," she said, 20 years of grief etched on her face. She has since spent years very publicly campaigning for justice as head of the AVT terror victims association. But her son has never once spoken of that day when his sister was killed and he was spared. "I try not to be bitter and I don't live with a sense of hatred, but I'll never forgive those who did this to my daughter."

As Pedraza was frantically contacting the hospitals, Francisco Alameda Sanchez, who was on the same train but escaped largely unharmed, was down on the tracks trying to help the wounded. In the first carriage where one of the bombs

went off, Sanchez, who was 40 at the time, found himself lying on his back with the train's doors and windows blown out.

"I wasn't physically hurt except I had a lot of pain in my ears, so I stayed to help people who were worse off than me," he told AFP. He likely survived because he was sitting at the furthest point from the blast, he said. He staved for three more hours, during which time he witnessed horrors that never left his mind: the screaming, burnt bodies, people without legs.

With no way of carrying the injured, several of them used the train doors as stretchers, which were so heavy it took six people to carry them. "The smell of burning, of burnt flesh, has stayed with me. And the deathly silence," he told AFP at Atocha station.

'The fear has stayed'

His ears recovered and he went back to work, refusing therapy, thinking he "was strong and could deal with it on my own". But 10 years later, he was struggling so he joined the March 11 Terror Victims Association and found a therapist which transformed his life. Since 2016, he has served as secretary of the group, which has 1,900 members. Even so, he has not shaken off the fear. "The fear has stayed with me, every time I come here my head starts spinning," he said, glancing around the huge station which lies close to Madrid's Prado Museum and Retiro park.

Rut Jezabel Garcia was 24 when the train she was on exploded, sustaining a shoulder injury that needed surgery, and long-term hearing problems as well as years of psychological issues. "Although I was on the train that suffered the least damage, it was just horrible," said Garcia, who works in accounting and has a 10-year-old daughter.

'There are images of injured people you can't get out of your head, even though it's been 20 years ... It was just unreal, like something from a film." Since then, she's never taken the same train and avoids crowds "because I'm afraid the same thing could happen again." She still has shoulder pain, hearing problems and suffers from persistent insomnia.

Despite everything, she's grateful to be alive, although the anniversary will always be difficult. "For me, the month of March is horrible, no matter how many years pass," she said, fighting back the tears. "It's always bad. If I could, I'd erase it from the calendar." — AFP

lating fundamental rights. Tibet enjoys "social stability, economic growth, solidarity among all ethnic groups and harmony among various religious beliefs", she said.

'Former glory'

Tibet scholar Robert Barnett, from SOAS University of London, called Beijing a "foreign ruler deciding what's best for a people whose culture it barely knows". "There is a gradual whittling away of a culture and a history," Barnett said. "It is a process where you gradually eliminate all the elements of a history, a people, culture and of a society that are inconvenient to the new rulers." Tibetan authorities say there are 130,000 Tibetan exiles, many in India and Nepal but also in more than 25 countries worldwide — just a fraction of the seven million living under China's control. As the decades pass, that makes the preservation of cultural identity even more challenging.

Tenzin studied and now teaches at the Norbulingka Institute, a social enterprise center training more than 300 men and women in painting, embroidery, weaving and woodcarving. The complex of red and green Tibetan-style buildings, close to the Dalai Lama's base in India's Himalayan hill town of Dharamsala, was launched in 1995 to employ highly skilled artisans eking out a living with repair jobs.

"After the great masters came to India, they ended up doing odd jobs, trying to build their lives in a new country," said Tsultrim Dorjee, a senior manager at the institute. "The institute helped them use their skills ... the goal was to return Tibetan art to its former glory."

Others take a more modern approach, like 29-yearold artist Tashi Nyima, with his bright cartoon-style canvases that nonetheless still reflect his people's heritage and political battles. Born and brought up in Dharamsala, where red-robed monks and nuns crowd streets alongside Tibetans in baseball caps and jeans, Nyima said younger generations struggle with a "very mixed identity". — AFP

Exiled Tibetans guard heritage from 'cultural genocide'

DHARAMSALA, India: From teaching centuries-old crafts to cataloguing their language, exiled Tibetans guard the cultural identity of a homeland most have neither seen nor dare visit, and where they say Beijing is eradicating their heritage. Crouched over a minutely detailed devotional "thangka" painting depicting Buddha, artist Lobsang Tenzin teaches students in northern India. "It is important to keep the traditions of our history," said the 49-year-old, dipping a needle-thin brush into rich blue paint made from crushed lapis lazuli as six young Tibetan trainees watch. "These skills were nearly lost, but we pass on the skills by teaching young artists."

Tibetans marked on March 10 the 65th anniversary of the 1959 uprising against Chinese forces that led to their spiritual leader the Dalai Lama fleeing into exile, followed by tens of thousands of compatriots. Inside Tibet, the chaos of China's 1966-76 Cultural Revolution left temples razed and monasteries reduced to ruins, destruction that continued in the decades that followed.

Today, activists decry what they say are Beijing's determined efforts to erase what is left of Tibet's cultural and religious identity. Lhadon Tethong, head of the Tibet Action Institute, condemns what she calls "cultural genocide" — including Beijing's sharp restrictions on Tibetan language, with children "indoctrinated" at state-run boarding schools.

Beijing, which maintains "Tibet is part of China", fiercely rejects the accusations. Chinese foreign ministry spokeswoman Mao Ning this week said that people in Tibet are "living a happy life", in response to UN rights chief Volker Turk's assertion that China was vio-

Egypt's inflation **jumps 11%** in February

CAIRO: The Central Agency for Public Mobilization and Statistics in Egypt said on Sunday that the inflation rate in Egypt rose 11 percent last February on a monthly basis and 36 percent on an annual basis.

The monthly rise in inflation rate was caused by the hike in food and beverage prices by 15.9 percent, clothing and footwear by 4.9 percent, education by 12.3, health care by 11.3 percent, and culture and entertainment by 30.2 percent, the agency said. It added that restaurants and hotels went up by 11.8 percent as well as the multiple services sector by 4.5 percent. The agency noted that the rise in inflation on an annual basis, compared to February 2023, was due to the increase in food and beverage departments by 48.5 percent, clothing and footwear by 26.1 percent, education by 12.3 percent, restaurants and hotels by 41.5 percent, heath care by 25.7 percent, multiple services by 27.8 percent, and culture and entertainment by 46.6 percent. — KUNA

Saudi Aramco **reports 24.7%** drop in profits

RIYADH: Saudi Aramco on Sunday reported a 24.7 percent decline in profits in 2023 compared to the previous year, the result of lower oil prices and production cuts.

The oil giant said in a filing with the Saudi stock market that net income reached 454.7 billion Saudi riyals (\$121.25 billion) in 2023, compared to 604.01 billion Saudi riyals (\$161.07 billion) in 2022.

"The decrease mainly reflects the impact of lower crude oil prices and lower volumes sold, and weakening refining and chemicals margins," Aramco said. Russia's invasion of Ukraine in February 2022 prompted oil prices to skyrocket, peaking at more than \$130 per barrel that year.

Aramco reported what it described as record profits for 2022, giving the kingdom its first annual budget surplus in nearly a decade. "In 2023 we achieved our second-highest ever net income. Our resilience and agility contributed to healthy cash flows and high levels of profitability, despite a backdrop of economic headwinds," Aramco CEO Amin H Nasser said in a statement.

"We also delivered for our shareholders with a 30 percent year-on-year increase in total dividends paid in 2023," he added. Last year, oil prices dropped to \$85 per barrel, resulting in year-on-year profit drops of 23

percent in the third quarter, 38 percent in the second quarter and 19.25 percent in the first quarter of last year for Aramco. Prices are expected to rise to around \$88 per barrel this year, partially due to global uncertainty driven by the Zionist entity-Hamas war, Riyadh-based firm Jadwa Investment said in a report published in October. They could reach \$90 per barrel by the end of 2024, Jadwa Investment said.

The world's biggest crude oil exporter said last Sunday it was extending its oil supply cuts of one million barrels per day through June. Riyadh first announced its voluntary cut after an OPEC+ meeting in June 2023. It followed a decision in April 2023 by several OPEC+ members to slash production voluntarily by more than one million barrels per day (bpd) - a surprise move that briefly buttressed prices but failed to bring about lasting recovery. Energy sector expert Ibrahim Al-Ghitani told AFP that Saudi Arabia "bears the greatest burden of reducing production as it is the largest producer within the (OPEC+) coalition and OPEC'

"If it were not for the OPEC+ policy, oil prices would have been below the level we see today above \$80 per barrel, especially amid signs of turmoil in the global economic environment following the coronavirus pandemic, the Ukrainian war, and then the Gaza war," Ghitani said.

The kingdom's daily production is now approximately nine million bpd, far below its reported daily capacity of 12 million bpd. "Saudi Arabia is trying to hedge against the decline in oil prices in general by diversifying its business portfolio and focusing on gas production, in addition to petrochemicals and foreign expansion," the UAE-based expert added.

The Gulf monarchy's gross domestic product shrank



by 0.8 percent in 2023 as a result of the drop in oil revenues, according to its statistics authority. Under Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman, Saudi Arabia has sought both to open up and diversify its oil-reliant economy, spending heavily on much-hyped projects like a futuristic megacity known as NEOM. Aramco is the main source of revenue for Prince Mohammed's ambitious economic reform program known as Vision 2030. On Thursday, the kingdom said it transferred an additional eight percent Aramco stake to firms owned by the kingdom's Public Investment Fund.

The transfer brought to 16 percent the cumulative shares transferred to the PIF, one of the world's largest sovereign wealth funds, and its subsidiaries. The stake was worth roughly \$164 billion at the company's current market capitalization, an Aramco media officer said. — AFP

Led by Elon Musk, **Silicon Valley** inches to the right

WASHINGTON: Since his tumultuous takeover of Twitter, Elon Musk has made an unabashed turn to the right politically, defying the orthodoxy that Silicon Valley is a citadel of well-heeled liberals beholden to Democrats. Long considered non-identifiable ideologically, Musk's politics are now hardline right wing as he uses his platform (now called X) to stoke the themes cherished by Fox News, conservative talk radio and far right movements across the West.

In just the latest example, repeating a conspiracy theory of far right chat rooms, Musk last week posted that US President Joe Biden was importing migrants for votes, laying the groundwork for "something far worse



than 9/11." But beyond the posts, the question on everyone's mind is whether the world's second richest person will put his weight, and wealth, behind the bid of former US president Donald Trump to retake the White House.

The rumor mill went into overdrive when The New York Times reported that the two men met, along with

other Republican donors, in Florida last week. Trump is seriously trailing Biden in raising campaign funds, even if he sailed toward the Republican nomination to be US president, and Musk could single handedly make up the shortfall. Musk turned to X to insist that "to be super clear, I am not donating money to either candidate for US President."

But the funding of US elections is opaque and complicated, and Biden backers worry that Musk could change his mind or fund political committees that themselves finance Trump, or find other ways to help the Republican cause.

Musk is not alone: other Silicon Valley mavens are also defending conservative causes, making noise in what electorally remains a liberal stronghold; in 2020, Trump's vote share in Silicon Valley was less than 25 percent. Some tycoons are seeking to build a political movement that, even if not directly supporting Trump, embraces conservative causes, cryptocurrencies, and goes against the California grain. One of the loudest voices in this shift is Marc Andreessen, the early internet tycoon who founded Netscape and now co-runs Andreessen Horowitz, a venerable venture capital company.

Once a typically left-of-center tech magnate, who had close ties to former vice president Al Gore, Andreessen now fights vehemently against left-wing priorities, especially so-called "woke" considerations about equality or workplace inclusiveness.

Last year, in a 5,200-word "techno-optimist manifesto," Andreessen laid out a techno-utopian vision for the future that listed co-opted government, regulation and worries about discrimination or equality as enemies. Like many of his fellow right-wing investors, Andreessen's company is heavily invested in cryptocurrencies and last year launched a political war chest to make trouble for lawmakers, Democratic or Republican, who want the nascent industry more heavily controlled.

For tech analyst Carolina Milanesi, the newly emerging outspokenness could be less about aping Musk than worry from an old guard that the status quo is vanishing. — AFP

Kuwait's gold prices hit record \$2,179 per ounce

KUWAIT: Gold prices in the global market reached a record level of \$2,179 per ounce over the weekend, recording an increase of 4 percent. A specialized report issued by Dar Al-Sabaek said on Sunday that gold approached the level of \$2,200 per ounce in the middle of last week's trading, driven by strong expectations about the imminent reduction in US interest rates and the end of the financial tightening pursued by the US Federal Reserve for the last two years.

aimed at youth.

The report added that what boosted gold prices was the continuation of tensions in the Middle East region, especially military operations in the Red Sea and the Bab Al-Mandab Strait, which threatens global trade, and thus many investors and speculators resort to the yellow metal as a safe haven against risks.

He explained that the prices of gold futures contracts for April delivery rose by 0.95 percent to a new record level of \$2,185 per ounce, and is in conjunction with the stabilization of the US currency's exchange value against other major currencies and the decline in 10-year treasury bond yields to 4 percent. He stated that the Federal Reserve indicated last week that the period of financial tightening would soon end by next June which would increase the attractiveness of investment assets, especially gold.

He stated that analysts will closely monitor the reports that will be issued this week on inflation rates, the performance of the American retail market, the consumer confidence index, and industrial production numbers, all of which are factors that directly affect gold trading in the forthcoming period. Regarding the local market, the Dar Al-Sabaiq report stated that the price of a gram of 24 karat gold reached KD 21.350 (about \$65), while the price of a gram of 22 karat gold reached KD 19.590 (about \$60), while silver closed at KD 285 per kg.

It is noteworthy that the ounce is one of the units of mass measurement and is used in a number of different systems of measurement units. It is also called the ounce and is equal to 28.349 grams, while as a unit of measurement for precious metals it is equal to 31.103 grams. — KUNA

US report boosts bets for Fed's June cut as jobless rate climbs

ECB signal rate cut as inflation comes down

February following a combined 167K downward revision in the prior two months. Economists expected a reading of 198K. The unemployment rate rose and wage gains slowed. Average hourly earnings grew by 0.1 percent m/m, easing from 0.5 percent in January and slower than projections of 0.2 percent. The moderation in pay growth follows an outsize jump in the prior month likely due to extreme weather. The unemployment rate climbed to 3.9 percent versus expectation of a match to the previous 3.7 percent figure.

The data highlights a resilient jobs market that is beginning to soften. Fed policymakers will keep a close eve on this trend as they consider bringing down borrowing costs this year from a two-decade high. Recently, officials have been stressing that they are in no rush to roll out rate cuts. Fed chair Jerome Powell painted a patient and cautious outlook on the Fed's fight to bring inflation back down to the target. He noted that the Fed is "not far" from having the confidence it needs that price gains are sustainably moving towards that goal. "When we do get that confidence...it will be appropriate to begin to dial

KUWAIT: US nonfarm payrolls advanced 275K in back the level of restriction so that we don't drive the economy into recession," Powell told lawmakers.

Markets started off the year expecting a reduction by the Fed sometime in the spring, and have since made strong changes to their bets. As of now, the probability for a June rate cut sits at 58 percent. Meanwhile, treasury yields traded sharply lower.

ECB signals upcoming cuts

The European Central Bank kept borrowing costs at record highs last week, while carefully signaling it will lower rates later this year due to good progress in bringing down inflation. Policymakers indicated they were preparing for a first cut in interest rates, most likely in June, provided incoming data confirms the trend of lower prices. "We did not discuss cuts for this meeting, but we are just beginning to discuss the dialing back of our restrictive stance," ECB President Christine Lagarde told a press conference. She noted that inflation has been dropping towards the 2 percent target and is now expected to come in lower over the next two years than the central bank had anticipated just a few months ago. In its latest quarterly economic

projections, the ECB cut its forecast for price growth this year from 2.7 percent to 2.3 percent and said it now expects inflation to fall to 1.9 percent in summer 2025 and stay there until the end of 2026.

After declining for nearly 18 months, eurozone annual inflation dipped to 2.6 percent in February, mainly because of a steep fall in fuel costs which were previously boosted by Russia's war in Ukraine. The decline is also a major result of the ECB's steepest ever increase in borrowing costs. Nevertheless, underlying inflation excluding volatile food and fuel prices was at 3.1 percent, while an index for the price of services rose by nearly 4 percent. "There is a definite decline (in inflation) which is underway and we are making good progress towards our inflation target," Lagarde said. "We are more confident as a result, but we are not sufficiently confident." Markets are now pricing in three or four cuts this year, taking the ECB's deposit facility rate down to 3.25 percent or 3 percent from its current 4 percent level.

The Bank of Canada left its policy rate unchanged

at 5 percent as widely expected, noting more time is needed for higher interest rates to bring inflation back to target. Governor Tiff Macklem declined to lay out a timeline for rate cuts, adding that he realizes monetary policy works slowly and causes pain to the economy. We expect to see further progress but we think it's going to be slow, it's going to be uneven Fundamentally, we need to see more progress," he told Reuters in an interview after the rate announcement. Macklem reiterated that the central bank expected inflation to start dipping in the second half of the year but expressed concern on stubbornly high core inflation. "If core stays where it is, probably ... our forecast that total (CPI) comes down isn't going to materialize. So that's why we're putting a lot of focus on those core measures," he added. Overall inflation currently stands at 2.9 percent - still well above the bank's 2 percent target. The meeting suggests a low chance of a rate cut in April, with markets now pricing in just a 30 percent probability.

In climate push, German chem firm swaps oil for sugar

LEVERKUSEN, Germany: At one of Europe's largest chemical complexes, German group Covestro is trialing the manufacture of a key product using sugar as a base material instead of oil, as the industry seeks to reduce its carbon footprint. The pilot project involves producing "aniline", a chemical used in making foams — used widely in mattresses and armchairs, as well as building insulation.

While large-scale, commercial production is probably years away, the experiment marks a small step in the chemical industry's battle to slash carbon emissions as Earth faces a dire climate emergency.

Of the 100 million barrels of oil produced worldwide every day, "a quarter goes directly into the chemical industry," said Walter Leitner, from Aachen University, which has been involved in the aniline project for a decade. "The chemical industry needs to be completely rebuilt."

Plastics manufacturer Covestro — a former division of chemical giant Bayer — started trials at its complex in the western city of Leverkusen at the end of 2023, after laboratory tests.

In a 100-square-metre (1,080-square-foot) room, aniline, a transparent fluid, is extracted from a 600-metre network of intertwined pipes. Using a process developed by University of Stuttgart researchers, fermented sugar is treated with chemicals to make the product.

Aniline is used as the base ingredient for chemical MDI, which is an essential material in manufacturing foams. Traditionally, aniline has been obtained from crude oil derivatives like naphtha and benzene, but producing it emits large quantities of carbon di-

oxide, a key greenhouse gas. Around six million tons of aniline are produced globally a year, around one million tons of it by Covestro. So far, the pilot project in Leverkusen produces just a tiny part of this, extracting just half a ton of aniline a day.

Some experts are skeptical about such an approach. The use of plant matter in manufacturing may cut out fossil fuels but whether it can lead to carbon neutrality "is often questionable", Jens Guenther, from Germany's Federal Environment Agency, told AFP.

This is particularly the case when it comes to the use of "so-called cultivated biomass like maize, sugar cane and sugar beet," he said. Janine Korduan, from environmental NGO BUND, pointed out that industrial agriculture generates "CO2 and methane emissions through land conversion and the production of fertilizers and pesticides", and also leads to "major losses of biodiversity and high water consumption". Nevertheless, Guenther said the use of plant matter in production processes would likely produce significantly lower greenhouse gas emissions than using fossil fuels, although opting for waste materials rather than crops produced in large-scale farming would be preferable.

Other German companies are experimenting in the area. Chemical giant BASF is seeking to use organic waste, agricultural products or vegetable oils to produce basic chemicals like aniline. There are many

barriers to taking such projects further, however. These range from the availability of the necessary organic matter, which is in great demand as the green transition gathers pace, to higher costs when compared to producing such chemicals with oil. — AFP

US embrace of remote work empties offices and weighs on banks

WASHINGTON: The popularity of remote work in the United States has emptied office buildings, a cause for worry as their value falls and owners risk losses on property loans — in turn putting pressure on smaller banks. "There will be bank failures, but this is not the big banks," said US Federal Reserve Chair Jerome Powell on Thursday. In San Francisco, Washington and even New York, offices have been seeing half the number of people as before the pandemic, with white-collar workers reluctant to return to commuting.

Office vacancy rates across the country have risen to 13.5 percent in 2023 from 9.5 percent in 2019, and could hit 16.6 percent at the end of next year, said credit company Fitch Ratings in a December report. "In many cities, the downtown office district is very underpopuated," Powell told a Congressional hearing this week.

With empty buildings in cities of all sizes, retailers servicing employees who used to work there are also

under pressure, Powell added. The shift in work patterns has caused the commercial real estate sector to lose a third of its value, which could have a wider impact. Of \$737 billion in office property mortgages, \$206 billion — around a quarter — are set to mature this year, according to the Mortgage Bankers Association. But this comes as interest rates are at their highest in more than 20 years.

This means that when loans come due, they will need to be refinanced where vacancy rates are high in some cities and valuations are lower. In the United States, commercial loans must be renegotiated every three to five years. The risk is a "chain reaction" where banks "risk seeing their borrowers default and as a result, experience stress on their capital," said EY chief econo-

mist Gregory Daco.

National Economic Advisor Lael Brainard told reporters recently that she expects "stress" but not broader implications for the financial system." "We're talking about office properties where vacancies are high due to changes in patterns of work use," she added. "It's a narrow class within the broader commercial

real estate," Brainard said. While large establishments have the capacity to absorb some losses, these could prove a massive blow to smaller banks, Daco said. Retirement funds or insurance companies, among others, could also be impacted if

they have commercial buildings in their portfolios.

Powell noted that the Fed works with establishments that face risks, saying: "We have identified the banks that have high commercial real estate concentrations, particularly office and retail." "We are in dialogue with

subject to the same regulatory requirements as banks.

"If properties are sold for less than financial institutions anticipate, it could set off a domino effect, causing banks to reassess the potential losses they are exposed to in office and the needed credit loss provisions to cover them," said Ryan Sweet, chief US economist at Oxford Economics. This was one of the weaknesses the embattled New York Community Bancorp faced as its stock tumbled last week. — AFP

India, European EFTA bloc sign \$100bn trade deal

NEW DELHI: India and the four-member European trade bloc EFTA, including Norway and Switzerland, signed a \$100-billion free trade agreement on Sunday to promote investment and exports, officials said. The deal will see the European Free Trade Association (EFTA) - made up of non-European Union nations, including Iceland and Liechtenstein - invest \$100 billion over 15 years in India, the world's fifth largest economy, India's Trade Minister Piyush Goyal said.

"The India-EFTA Trade and Economic Partnership Agreement (TEPA) marks a historic milestone in our growing partnership," Goyal said after the signing in New Delhi. The agreement "will pave the path for mutual growth and prosperity" by boosting exports, promoting investment and creating employment, he added.

The deal was signed after several rounds of negotiations spanning 16 years. Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi said the trade agreement "symbolizes our shared commitment to open, fair and equitable trade", according to a statement read out at the signing ceremony. Swiss Economy Minister Guy Parmelin said the deal "will allow us to make better use of our economic potential and create additional opportunities for both Índia and the EFTA states".

"EFTA countries gain market access to a major growth market... India, in return, will attract more foreign investment from EFTA, which will ultimately translate into an increase in good jobs", he added, speaking in New Delhi. EFTA was established in 1960 to promote free trade and economic integration between its members. In 2021, it was the 10th largest trader in the world in terms of merchandise, and the eighth largest in services.

In recent years, India has signed trade agreements with Australia and the United Arab Emirates. A longtalked-about trade deal with Britain is also said to be in the final stages. — AFP

Economic crisis grips Tunisia, mutes build-up to Ramadan

Purchasing power sinks due to soaring prices and rising unemployment

TUNIS: Tunisians are bracing themselves for more subdued celebrations during the Muslim holy month of Ramadan as an economic crisis grips the North African country. In past years "you wouldn't have been able to set foot in the market because it was so crowded", vegetable merchant Mohamed Doryi told AFP.

"That's not the case today," said the 69-year-old, who no longer displays his prices to avoid scaring away potential customers. Tunisians usually prepare for Ramadan — when daytime fasting is followed by festive but often costly meals with family and friends — by stocking up on large amounts of food. But this vear things are different, with purchasing power greatly diminished because of soaring prices, a recession and rising unemployment. "I'm not poor, but I can't do it anymore. My pension doesn't cover my needs," said Fayka, a 65-year-old at Tunis's working-class Bab El Fellah market.

"This is the first time I've bought fruits and vegetables by the piece" instead of in bulk, the retiree added, asking that only her first name be used. Tunisia has also been beset by political tensions since President Kais Saied granted himself full powers in July 2021.

A third of its 12 million people currently live below the poverty line after two years of high inflation running at 10 percent on average per year — and the price of many foods has tripled.

In bitcoin's shadow, **Ether stages** its own rally

NEW YORK: Bitcoin has captured the limelight in recent weeks as it surged to a new record high, yet another major cryptocurrency, Ether, has been enjoying its own meteoric rise. Launched in 2015, Ether, also known as Ethereum, is by far the second-largest digital currency in terms of total value, now estimated at over \$460 billion. Along with other cryptocurrencies including Solana and Dogecoin, it benefited from the regulatory approval in the United States of a new bitcoin investment product, the exchange traded fund or ETF — in mid-January, said James Butterfill of the investment company CoinShares.

These ETFs allow investors to profit from any change to the price of cryptocurrencies without having to buy them directly, while also letting them sell at any time. The launch of crypto ETFs has led to an influx of new money, sending bitcoin to a fresh record on Friday of \$70,085. Bitcoin's rise has been well-documented, but Ether's has been even more impressive, surging almost 72 percent year to date in comparison to bitcoin's 61 percent rise. This strong performance is largely due to "expectations that an Ethereum ETF could be approved in the United States," according to Dessislava Aubert of research firm Kaiko. Several asset management companies have applied for authorization from the US financial markets regulator, the Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC), to market these Ether investment products.



The SEC must rule on the first such applications, from VanEck and Ark 21Shares, by May 23 at the latest. "Ethereum has started to wake up as investors are anticipating a potential approval," Michael van de Poppe of MN Trading told AFP, adding that "people are rotating from Bitcoin to Ethereum as a potential investment opportunity."

Beyond the ETF effect, the digital currency dreamed up by Russian programmer Vitaly Buterin has several other cards up its sleeve. For Simon Peters of cryptocurrency exchange eToro, Ethereum is also buoyed by the prospect of "Dencun," a major upgrade to the technology underlying this digital currency, scheduled for March 13. This major change will improve transaction processing capacity and cut transaction costs, but also has the potential to unleash the growth of an ecosystem with multiple applications. "Bitcoin's primary use is as store of value, while Ethereum has much more potential use cases," Peters told AFP. For example, it is the destination of choice for non-fungible tokens — or NFTs the certificates of digital authenticity that caused such a stir three years ago.

The two cryptocurrencies are not in direct competition, according to van de Poppe from MN Trading, because Bitcoin is "hard money," while Ether "is basically an investment for the entire blockchain and smart contract ecosystem." Ethereum has already successfully negotiated two major technical transformations in recent years, including the switch to a less energy-intensive system in September 2022

James Butterfill said there is "increasing optimism" that a "Dencun" upgrade will "go without a hitch," which would reinforce the currency's credibility. He added that Ether, by the very nature of its operation, offers the "added benefit" of interest generated by its holders. The mechanism for creating this currency involves owners putting up existing Ether coins as collateral in a process known as "Proof of Stake," which differs from bitcoin's energy-intensive method involving highly complex calculations, known as "Proof of Work." Ether investors who agree to put up some or all of their holdings receive a fee of a few percent a year, in addition to any potential capital gain if the currency appreciates in value. — AFP

GDP growth came in at 0.4 percent last year after severe drought damaged agriculture, and the country entered a recession at the end of 2023. Unemployment also rose to 16.4 percent at the end of last year, compared with 15.2 percent at the end of 2022. Economist Ridha Chkoundali says Tunisia is "experiencing a period of stagflation, which means a decline in growth and a rise in inflation". This has been caused by "the deliberate choice of public authorities to prefer to repay debt, espe-. cially external debt", ĥe argued.

This came at "the detriment of supplying the market with basic foodstuffs and agricultural inputs" such as fertilizers and fodder. A shortage of money in the public coffers — burdened by the salaries of more than 650,000 civil servants — has meant regular shortages of basic subsidized items including flour, rice, sugar and semolina as the state has difficulties paying for them.

Tunisian banks are being asked by the state to finance the country's debt amounting to 80 percent of GDP, undermining their ability to lend to the private sector and reducing growth even more.

Chkoundali argues that a lack of resources is a result of "the choice to break with the IMF". In October 2022, the International Monetary Fund agreed in principle to lend Tunisia around \$2 billion, but Saied later rejected it on the grounds that the reforms it required in return were not sustainable.



In a Tunis butcher's shop, a 50-year-old woman cautiously ordered 150 grams of veal ahead of Ramadan. Red meat, which now costs more than 40 dinars (around \$13) a kilo, is a luxury in a country where the average salary is 1,000 dinars per month (about \$325). "My husband recently

passed away and I can't afford to buy more," she whispered to the butcher. Mustapha Ben Salmane, 52, told AFP that more and more customers ask for just a handful of minced meat or spicy merguez sausage. "I can't say no to them. People are exhausted," he said. – AFP

Nigeria targets cryptocurrency to halt naira freefall

LAGOS: The world's biggest cryptocurrency exchange Binance is halting operations in Nigeria's naira currency as the government puts cryptobusinesses under increasing scrutiny. The decision came after authorities in Africa's biggest economy imposed restrictions on cryptocurrency exchanges as part of attempts to halt the sliding value of the local currency.

Nigeria's central bank governor, Olayemi Cardoso, said at the end of last month that cryptocurrency exchanges were conduits for money laundering. He singled out Binance as the biggest culprit. "Certain practices go on that indicate illicit flows going through a number of these entities," Cardoso said.

"In the case of Binance, in the last one year alone, \$26 billion has passed through Binance Nigeria from sources and users who we cannot adequately identify."

Changpeng Zhao, who was head of Binance, has pleaded guilty to violating anti-money laundering laws in the United States. With the naira weakening almost daily, crypto exchanges have been seen as one way Nigerians can protect their money against the currency's plummet. Since the government floated the naira in May, the currency has fallen from around 410 to the dollar to around 1,600 naira to the greenback on the official exchange. In late February, a dollar was exchanged for as much as 1,900 naira on the black market.

Officials have accused crypto exchanges of distorting foreign exchange rates, contributing to the naira's weakening. Binance did not immediately respond to AFP's request for comment on the allegations. But in an email sent to its Nigerian users, the crypto giant said it was shutting down all its naira-based services on March 8.

"This affects NGN services only, you can continue to make use of services and products for other available cryptocurrencies," the crypto giant said in the email seen by AFP, referring to the naira trading symbol NGN. Local media reported that two officials of the company who flew into Nigeria to negotiate with the government were detained and their passports seized.

Nigerian officials have not confirmed those arrests, but lawmakers are also considering issuing arrest warrants for the company's top executives for "ignoring invitations". — AFP

Storm clouds gather over **EU's Green Deal**

BRUSSELS: The EU's Green Deal — once a core Brussels mission — is looking increasingly under threat in the bloc's upcoming elections as resistance grows to its costs and consequences. Farmers' protests, consumer cost-of-living worries and some countries' hesitation are already undercutting the ambitious plan to make the European Union carbon-neutral by 2050.

"The European Green Deal is our new growth strategy," European Commission chief Ursula von der Leyen announced back at the start of her mandate in 2019, as she unveiled dozens of pieces of legislation to meet climate targets agreed by EU member countries.

Five years on, the tone has changed. Now, industry and farmers denounce the new "burdens" being piled upon them. Member states, including France, are calling for a "pause" in further measures. "This backlash is centered on the agricultural area. It's not been true for energy, industry, transports," argued Pascal Canfin, chair of the European Parliament's environment committee. He blames what he calls a "polarization strategy" by right-wing parties. Many of the Green Deal's laws have been adopted: an end to selling internal-combustion engine cars by 2035; a border carbon tax; rules against importing goods from deforested zones.



But momentum stalled last year with legislation to reduce chemical pesticides and to restore wilderness ecosystems — opposed on grounds they could undermine food production in the bloc.

The biggest group in the European Parliament, the conservative European People's Party (EPP), from which von der Leyen hails, has made the shift an electoral gambit. "It's easy to fix a figure. But it's more difficult to really make the transition happen in industry and also with the citizens," said a German EPP lawmaker, Peter Liese. Farmland and forestry "should be protected much more" and farmers should not be seen "as an enemy of climate policy", he said.

The climate crisis is becoming "a real identity politics issue" caught up in the farmers protests, said Susi Dennison, of the think tank the European Council on Foreign Relations. It is being cast as "an either-or choice — between either you do climate, or you are concerned about the economic picture," she said. "There isn't really a strong enough response to that false dichotomy from progressive groups," Dennison said. On the left in the parliament, Iratxe Garcia, of the Socialists & Democrats, laid the blame at the feet of "the extreme right and the EPP," accusing them of "trying to mix everything and to confuse the debate". "What the conservatives are doing is trying to send the message that we have to choose between the farmers and the Green Deal," Garcia said, calling that "really irresponsible". "The transition — we have to do it. And we are prepared to confront, to speak, to explain," she

'Imbued with flamenco':

Spain's Farruquito takes Hong Kong stage

s heir to one of Spain's most renowned flamenco dynasties, dancer Farruquito pairs furious footwork with strumming syncopated beats and verve — bringing the art form's "way of life" to global audiences. His real name is Juan Manuel Fernandez Montoya, and at 41, he has followed the steps of his grandfather, legendary dancer El Farruco.

"I was born imbued with flamenco because my family is one of the important houses of flamenco, the Farrucos," Farruquito tells AFP in an interview, beaming with pride. "My grandfather — the maestro — my mother, my aunt, my brothers, my cousins, my father who sang. I was born and the soundtrack of my days was flamenco."

Now he's bringing that soundtrack — and his impassioned stage presence — to Hong Kong, where his show has three performances this weekend as part of an arts festival. Visiting the city for the first time, Farruquito said his performance in the Hong Kong Cultural Centre would hold some traditional elements, "but with a modern update".

An art form that fuses song, dance and emotive showmanship, it was declared by UNESCO an intangible cultural heritage for Andalusia, a region on Spain's southern coast. But the dance waltzes across borders, attracting aspiring foot-tappers to popular classes from Bangkok to Tokyo — and now drawing curious audiences in Hong Kong. "There are a lot of people from Asia who do it very well because they are very disciplined. They have a lot of respect for it." But to truly experience it, one must be "up close to it", he said. "Flamenco is not just a music — it is a culture, it is a way of life."

'Stay on stage forever'

Born to a Romani family full of artists and musicians, Farruquito was declared a child prodigy when he shared the stage with his grandfather on Broadway in New York at the age of five. By 18, he was declared "one of the great flamenco dancers of this new century" by The New York Times — and anointed the presumptive heir to El Farruco's legacy after his grandfather passed away in 1997.

But his meteoric rise came to a sudden halt in 2004 when he fatally ran over a pedestrian in Spain and fled the scene. Sentenced to three years in prison, he was released in 2010 - and fearful for the end of his dancing days.

"For a long time, they erased me from the map. But it was understandable at that moment," he said. The dancer has since rediscovered his place on stage, though he still feels the responsibility of his grandfather's legacy — and pre-performance

nerves — three decades into his career. "There are times when right before going on stage, I want to go home and go to bed," Farruquito said. "But there are other times when I want to stay on stage forever — I want to die there." — AFP



From Dubai to Chile,

Turkish series expand their empire



n the skies above Istanbul's Tophane neighborhood, seagulls are sent scattering by a drone that's filming a policeman arresting a young woman on the streets below. But it's for a television series called "Dengeler", one of about 60 filmed annually in Turkey that have made Istanbul and other Turkish cities familiar to viewers in nearly 170 countries around the world. Over the past 15 years, Turkey has established itself as the foremost exporter of series after the United States and Britain.

"Latin Americans find Turkish series very close to their culture," said Erdi Isik, development manager at Ay Yapim—Turkey's leading exporter last year and whose production "Yarqi" ("Family Secrets") last November won an In-

set at Tophane district in Istanbul.

ternational Emmy for best telenovela. "When I show samples to a panel, even if they don't understand a word of Turkish, they catch what it is about because the family culture is very much the same," he said.

Censorship constraints in Turkey also provide more modest material, important for audiences in the Middle East and Spanish-speaking countries who are accustomed to watching soap operas as a family. However, "we think of the Turkish market first," he said, even though "we pick actors that can fit international expectations", citing a list of about 20 actors that appeal to the public outside Turkey.

Family history, thwarted loves

"Bitter Lands", another success story, won best telenovela of the year in South America in 2020 with its lead actress likewise crowned. Long popular in the Middle East, North Africa and the Balkans, all once ruled by the Ottoman Empire, Turkish series about history, family intrigues and thwarted love stories are now present on every continent, even in the United States where they have captured the Hispanic market.

"They are now broadcast in prime-time in Spain, Saudi Arabia and Egypt," said Xavier Rambert, head of research and marketing at Glance, an audience measurement company in London, who praises the "effectiveness" of Turkish productions. "Their ability to provide

masses of content at very controlled costs makes it possible to fill the programs at reasonable prices," he added. In total, nearly 700 million viewers enjoy "alla turca" telenovelas, according to the Turkish culture ministry.

The success is also due to the quality of the productions, said Ozlem Ozsumbul, sales director at Madd, the company which distributes series produced by Ay Yapim. "We always shoot on location", she said. Each episode is written and shot from one week to the next, based on a general plot which evolves to adjust to the audience. A two-hour episode can be entirely written, shot and produced in six days.

Characters can be ejected, or minimized. Only the biggest stars are guaranteed up to 15 episodes, Ozsumbul said. But while "TV series are produced for TVs in Turkey, they cannot recover their costs from airing in Turkey" alone, said Ozlem Ozdemir, founder of Episode magazine, which covers Turkish TV shows.

'New generation'

Productions are therefore adapted to the international market. "Our system is unique as we shoot about two-anda-half hours every week. And then, we re-edit for the foreign market to adjust the commercials," said Ahmet Ziyalar, co-founder of Inter Medya and CEO of

Inter Yapim. A weekly episode of 90 to 120 minutes in Turkey can be converted into three 45-minute episodes broadcast daily in Latin America.

Meanwhile, Ziyalar has launched a so-called "New Generation" series of eight to 12 episodes intended only for streaming platforms. "They are shorter, faster, bolder, and sexier—less concerned about the censorship. They are also more artistic," he summarized.

This is why the heroine of the series "Dengeler", whose arrest was filmed by drone in the Tophane neighborhood, does not hesitate to hurl pro-Kurdish slogans at the police officer who stopped her. "We can be more political when we produce for a platform," screenwriter Sarp Kalfaoglu said. "Dengeler" will be streamed in Turkey by Gain. "We think these new-generation series can find a place on the international market as well as the mainstream series we will keep producing," insisted Can Okan, CEO of Inter Medya, who will soon present them at international festival Series Mania in Lille, France.

Okan said he recently reached an agreement with Colombian broadcaster Caracol for a series of 120 episodes in Spanish. "We know (President Recep Tayyip) Erdogan is not always happy with our contents, but he doesn't say anything, as we bring in a lot of money," said Erdi Isik.—AFP

Thieves steal Italian sculptor's gold jewelry exhibit



hieves have stolen almost 50 pieces of gold jewelry by the Italian sculptor Umberto Mastroianni worth 1.2 million euros in a targeted hit on an exhibition in northern Italy, curators said Saturday. A "highly specialized gang" made off Wednesday night with almost the entire collection of rings, bracelets, pendants and sculptures by Mastroianni, considered one of Italy's greatest contemporary sculptors, on dis-

play at the Vittoriale degli Italiani estate on Lake Garda.
Only one of the 49 items in the collection, worth a total of 1,207,400 euros (around \$1.3 million), was recovered elsewhere on the estate, the Vittoriale said in a statement after holding a press conference on the theft. "These exceptional artefacts, true 'wearable sculptures', represent the most important testimony of the master's gold production," said Lorenzo Zichichi, president of the Centre for Studies of the Works of



Umberto Mastroianni. If the pieces are not recovered, the theft – almost the entire collection of Mastroianni's gold, which belonged to his relatives – would represent an "inestimable loss", Zichichi said.

The exhibition, entitled "Like a warm and fluid gold. The golds of Umberto Mastroianni", opened in December at the Museo d'Annunzio Segreto and was due to close on Friday. The works were designed and forged by Mastroianni -- known also for his huge monuments -- from the 1950s until his death in 1998.

"Of the 49 works subject to the theft... only one, entitled "Man/Woman", was later found inside the complex", the Vittoriale said, without providing further details. The head of the Vittoriale, Giordano Bruno Guerri, said he could not go into details of the robbery, which was under investigation by police and art specialists. — AFP

Winnie the Pooh slasher film 'wins' Razzies


n ultra-low-budget horror film in which Winnie the Pooh and Piglet go on a brutal killing spree has been named the year's worst movie by the Razzie Awards. Slasher movie "Winnie-the-Pooh: Blood and Honey," made for less than \$250,000, garnered global headlines and even provoked death threats from enraged fans in February 2023. The live-action British film took advantage of the expiration of copyrights on A.A. Milne's beloved books, meaning neither the author's estate nor movie rights owner Disney could sue.

Though it appears to have safely evaded legal action, "Blood and Honey" now suffers the ignominy of topping the Razzies. At the parody prizes, which recognize the year's most dire films and performances, it "won" worst picture, director and screenplay. Pooh and Piglet were named worst screen couple, and the movie also earned a Razzie for worst remake, rip-off or sequel.

Though embarrassing, the Razzie Awards are unlikely to bother director Rhys Frake-Waterfield. His movie grossed nearly \$5 million after being given a global theatrical release thanks to the controversy it generated. A seguel is scheduled for release later this month.

He told AFP last year he was also developing horror movies based on "Bambi" and "Peter Pan" books. The Razzies are announced the day before the Oscars, serving to mock the following night's self-congratulatory Tinseltown back-slapping.



Former Oscar winner Jon Voight was named worst actor for critically panned thriller "Mercy," and Megan Fox took worst actress for horror-heist movie "Johnny & Clyde." Fox, a frequent Razzies punching bag, also took worst supporting actress for action sequel "Expend-4bles," which earned worst supporting actor for Sylvester Stallone. The Razzies were first awarded in 1981 in a Los Angeles living room, the brainchild of UCLA film graduates and industry veterans, who chose the raspberry as a symbol of derision.—AFP

Mexico's Ancer clings on to win LIV Hong Kong in dramatic playoff

Superb Tardy sweeps to maiden victory at Blue Bay LPGA

HONG KONG: Abraham Ancer won the inaugural LIV Golf Hong Kong on Sunday, blowing a five-stroke lead before beating Cam Smith and Paul Casey with a brilliant birdie on the first playoff hole. "Man, I made that so hard on myself," a relieved Ancer said after holing a four-foot putt to win the \$4 million first prize in the Saudi-backed breakaway circuit event.

Ancer had started the day five clear of the pack on 15-under after bogey-free rounds of 63 on Friday and 62 on Saturday at the Hong Kong Golf Club. But the Mexican saw his ultra-smooth swing of the first two days desert him in chilly and wet conditions on Sunday, as he returned a two-over 72 in front of big crowds, who turned out in force despite the deteri-

"The ball-striking wasn't there, but mentally I was really strong, so I felt really good," he said straight after the playoff, where he set up only his second birdie of the day with a superb approach. "I just kept myself in it and hit the right shot at the right time there in the playoff." Englishman Casey holed a spectacular bunker shot for a birdie at his final hole, the 16th, to complete a six-under round of 64 and draw level with Ancer and Australia's Smith (66) on 13-under par. But he found a fairway bunker off the

tee in the playoff to end his hopes.
"I played some great golf," said Casey, whose 'Crushers' won the team competition and a \$3 million first prize to go with his \$1,875,000 for a share of second place. "I'm not going to measure it on the playoff hole, on one tee shot, something like that. It was a really good week."

For Smith, the 2022 British Open champion, it was the second agonising disappointment on Hong Kong's final green in four months. In November, he saw New Zealand's Ben Campbell hole a birdie on 18 to pip him to the Hong Kong Open title.

Earlier, Ancer stumbled to his first bogey of the week at the par-three fifth after finding sand off the tee. Another bogey at the short eighth reduced his lead to two strokes, though he repaired some of the damage with his first birdie of the round on the par-four 10th. A disastrous drive into a stream on the 15th dropped him back to 13-under and Smith swept home a 20-foot birdie putt to draw level.

Double hole-in-one

US Masters champion Jon Rahm was LIV's biggest coup when he defected from the PGA Tour in December. Rahm briefly got into contention at 12-under before two bogeys at the 14th and 16th ended his challenge as he finished 10-under par after a frustrating 71.

Chile's Joaquin Niemann won two of the previous LIV events this season, including last week in Saudi Arabia. He sunk the week's first hole-in-one, at the 188-vard eighth, in a brilliant round of 63 to finish tied for fourth with another Mexican, Carlos Ortiz (66).

Finland's Kalle Samooja then aced the 149-vard second hole for the sixth LIV hole-in-one since the breakaway tour began in 2022. Three-time PGA Tour winner Anthony Kim shot a final-round 65, his best round since making his first professional appearance since 2012 at last week's LIV Golf event in Jeddah.

Bailey Tardy shot a superb seven-under-par 65 to sweep to her maiden tour victory at the Blue Bay LPGA in China by four strokes on Sunday. Tardy was in a three-way tie for the lead after Saturday's third round at 12-under par with Lydia Ko of New Zealand and fellow American Sarah Schmelzel. An eagle-three at the eighth ignited her round and six further birdies against a lone bogev saw her stretch away from an elite field in the \$2.2 million event. Tardy was in tears after finishing at 19-under par for the week.

"Yeah, I mean, a lot of emotions right now," said the 27-year-old. "A lot of hard work and just a lot of doubt that was in my head that I could be at this level and win. Tardy, who was a rookie last year, became the third player to earn their first LPGA Tour victory at Blue Bay on Hainan Island, joining Lee-Anne Pace (2014) and Gaby Lopez (2018).

Ko had three bogeys on her front nine and finished with a 71 for a share of fourth place. Tardy admitted she had been nervous playing with one of women's golf's most famous figures. "You know I played with her yesterday and I was very intimidated playing with her," said Tardy of the former world number one and double major winner Ko. "I think I handled myself reallv well, and, veah, it was like playing with a friend today almost. "She made me feel really comfortable and confident out there." – AFP

Australia have 'backs to the wall' as NZ clean out top four

CHRISTCHURCH: New Zealand cleaned out the top four Australian batsmen on Sunday to leave the tourists on 77-4 and facing an uphill task in their chase of 279 to win the second Test in Christchurch. "Our backs are against the wall. New Zealand are on a roll," Australian spinner Nathan Lyon said. The hosts set a demanding target for an Australian side struggling for runs on a ground where the highest successful fourth innings is

285-8, set by New Zealand against Sri Lanka last year. The home camp was elated. "It's been a great day for us," declared opener Tom Latham, who contributed 73 in New Zealand's second innings of 372. "After the first two innings we were behind the game a little bit and to bring it back to parity and then to maybe get our noses in front has been pretty pleasing."

Australian batsmen Steve Smith, Marnus Labuschagne, Usman Khawaja and Cameron Green were all swiftly sent back to the Hagley Oval pavilion by New Zealand's seamers. Matt Henry, rated by Lyon as the bowler of the series, had figures of 2-37 with debutant Ben Sears on 2-22. Australia still need 202 runs.

At the close of play on day three, Mitchell Marsh was not-out 27 with Travis Head unbeaten on 17. With two days remaining and no rain forecast, a draw is out of the equation as New Zealand battle for their first win over Australia since 2011.

The tourists are looking to sweep the series after dominating the first Test. With the pitch flattening out and not providing as much movement as it did over the first two days, New Zealand were well placed when they went to tea at 345-6 and were eyeing an imposing 300-plus target.

But momentum swung back Australia's way as the New Zealand tail added just 27 and the last three wickets contributed only one run. Three overs later Ravindra on 82 feathered a Cummins delivery to give wicketkeeper Alex Carey his ninth catch in the Test. The ball was moving away and it was an out-of-character shot from Ravindra, who had displayed considerable patience until then in his 153-ball innings.

Glenn Phillips and Henry added 16 apiece before Nathan Lyon removed Scott Kuggeleijn for 44 to end the innings. Cummins was the most successful bowler

with 4-62 while Lyon took 3-49. Any momentum Australia gained quickly evaporated in the face of a torrid onslaught from the New Zealand attack in a spirited 24 overs before stumps. Smith again went cheaply, trapped in front by Henry for nine, with the quick bowler also getting Khawaja out, caught one-handed by Tim Southee at third slip for 11.—AFP

India become number one Test side overtaking Aussies

NEW DELHI: India have climbed to the number one spot in Test cricket rankings following an emphatic 4-1 series victory against England. The Indian team moved past Australia who are now second in the table, according to the rankings released by the International Cricket Council late Saturday. India lost the opening Test against England before bouncing back to win the remaining four matches, including the final game which ended in Dharamsala on Saturday. In January, India had slipped to second place in Test rankings after a drawn 1-1 series against South Africa.



Australia overtook India at the top after sweeping the three-Test series at home against Pakistan. Currently Australia lead the two-Test series against New Zealand 1-0 following their 172-run victory in Wellington. India will remain at the top regardless of the outcome of the second New Zealand-Australia Test in Christchurch. India are already the number one team in one-day and T20 internationals. They are also at the top of the ICC World Test Championship Standings table. – AFP

"For us to got out there and do that to a team like Ireland, who for me are the best team in the world at the minute, is a really special day." Before the match, George had insisted England could upset the odds, the 33-year-old saying: "This is England. This is Twickenham. This is home. And we're going to defend our home, like every Englishman would." The victory in front of a crowd of over 81,000 gave England a chance to win the title, should they beat France in Lyon and Ireland

lose at home to Scotland in next Saturday's final round of matches. "Jamie has said he wants the supporters to enjoy it and bring them on the journey with us and I thought Twickenham was magnificent and the supporters left with a smile on their face," said England coach Steve Borthwick. Borthwick appeared to exchange angry words with Ireland coach and former England team-mate Andy Farrell at half-time.

"I know people want to read things into that but Andy and I have a good relationship, we were co-captains together at Saracens as players...I have incredible respect for what he has done with that (Ireland) team," he said. Although England finished third at last year's World Cup, this was arguably their best performance since Borthwick took charge in December 2022. "What pleased me the most was that the players stayed true to the path that we're trying to follow and tried to take the next step," said Borthwick. Farrell, meanwhile, had no doubt Ireland could bounce back against Scotland in Dublin. "There's not a problem at all about getting the lads back on track for next week," he said. "Six Nations (titles) are unbelievably difficult to come by. To win them you tend to have a lot of ups and downs."—AFP

Kane equals 60-year-old record as eight-goal Bayern keep hopes alive

Kane draws nearer to the season record of 41 goals set by Lewandowski

MUNICH: Harry Kane scored a hat-trick as Bayern Munich thumped Mainz 8-1 on Saturday, equalling a 60-year-old record and keeping alive his team's hopes of catching leaders Bayer Leverkusen. Kane, who also laid on two assists, now has 30 goals in his first season in Munich colours, matched the record for a maiden campaign set by German legend Uwe Seeler for Hamburg in 1963-64.

With nine games remaining, the England captain has also drawn nearer to the season record of 41 goals set by Bayern's Robert Lewandowski in 2020–21. The win was Bayern's second biggest this season, just behind their 8-0 demolition of Darmstadt in October.

Midfielder Leon Goretzka, who scored a double, said: "It was a convincing win—the kind we've missed this season." Bayern are now seven points behind Xabi Alonso's unbeaten Leverkusen, who host lowly Wolfsburg on Sunday.

"It's our duty to keep giving it everything we've got," Goretzka said. "If Leverkusen get shaky, we've got to be there." Having sealed their progression to the Champions League quarter-finals on Tuesday with a 3-0 home win over Lazio, Bayern were direct and decisive against Mainz.

Outgoing manager Thomas Tuchel said midweek Bayern needed to "win, win, win"

to have any chance of catching Alonso's side and Kane obliged early, tapping in a Jamal Musiala pass after 13 minutes. Kane had a header saved seven minutes later, but Leon Goretzka was on hand to knock in the rebound.

Nadiem Amiri wove an incredible free kick through Bayern's defence shortly after but England striker Kane restored Bayern's two-goal lead in first-half stoppage time, collecting a lofted Goretzka pass on the turn and blasting home.

Thomas Mueller added a fourth early in the second-half to break Mainz's resistance, allowing Bayern to run riot, with further goals to Musiala, Serge Gnabry, Kane and Goretzka to bring the tally to eight. The loss leaves Mainz in second last, nine points from safety. Sporting director Martin Schmidt lamented his side's openness, saying "we wanted to be courageous, but we were too courageous".

Sancho on target

Ten-man Borussia Dortmund regained fourth spot with a 2-1 win at Werder Bremen, headlined by Jadon Sancho's first goal since returning to Germany, with his side having fallen to fifth earlier in the day when RB Leipzig beat Darmstadt 2-0 at home.

An acrobatic strike from Donyell Malen and a trademark solo effort from Sancho,

the Manchester United loanee's first in Dortmund colours since May 2021, had the visitors cruising. Dortmund were however reduced to 10 men just before half-time when Marcel Sabitzer saw red for sinking his studs into Mitchell Weiser's calf.

Dortmund manager Edin Terzic pulled Malen, who has five goals in his past four games, in favour of Mats Hummels at the break, but the veteran defender was at fault when Bremen's Justin Njinmah scored with 20 minutes remaining.

Despite some nervy final moments, Dortmund held on to stay one point clear of Leipzig in fourth, the final guaranteed Champions League spot for next season. "We played almost as well as you can at the start. The lads did an incredible job" said Dortmund striker Niclas Fuellkrug, who left Bremen in the summer having come through the club's junior system.

Earlier on Saturday, Leipzig beat Darmstadt to rebound from a frustrating Champions League last 16 exit to Real Madrid on Wednesday. Leipzig forced struggling Darmstadt into an own goal from Thomas Isherwood after three minutes.

Marco Rose's men added another through Christoph Baumgartner early in the second-half to seal the win as they continue their push for a top-four spot. "We're looking only at ourselves," said sporting di-

Arsenal go top in dramatic style

LONDON: Arsenal moved to the top of the Premier League in dramatic fashion as Kai Havertz spared Aaron Ramsdale's blushes with a crucial late strike in Saturday's 2-1 win against Brentford. Mikel Arteta's side were just minutes away from a damaging draw after Gunners keeper Ramsdale gifted an equaliser to Yoane Wissa.

Declan Rice put Arsenal ahead early in the first half, but Ramsdale waited too long to clear just before the interval and Wissa took advantage to block the ball into the net. Havertz ensured Arsenal would not miss their chance to climb into first place with a bullet header four minutes from the final whistle at a jubilant Emirates Stadium.

The north Londoners' eighth successive league victory lifted them one point clear of previous leaders Liverpool. Arsenal will stay top on goal difference if second-placed Liverpool and third-placed Manchester City draw in their blockbuster clash at Anfield on Sunday.

"Tomorrow will be a great day to watch a fantastic game of football. It is not in my hands," Arteta said. "It's a joy to be part of this league and a joy to be part

of something special that we are trying to achieve."

The much-maligned Havertz's ninth goal since his move from Chelsea underlined Arsenal's hunger to make amends for blowing an eight-point lead in the title race last season. Djokovic wasn't the only top player to be tested. Australian Open champion Aryna Sabalenka saved four match points on the way to her 6-7 (2/7), 6-2, 7-6 (8/6) second-round victory over 64th-ranked Peyton Stearns, and US Open champion Coco Gauff rallied in the final set to beat France's Clara Burel 2-6, 6-3, 7-6 (7/4). Djokovic admitted to some nerves in his first match since Melbourne. He claimed the opening set in 35 minutes with two service breaks but had to come from a break down in the third against his 69th-ranked Australian opponent.

Vukic held for 6-5 in the second set and landed a reflex service return winner on the line to square the match at a set each. In the third, top seed Djokovic broke for a 3-2 edge and closed out victory with a second break after just over two hours, notching his

51st win at the tournament where he first competed in 2006. "I was a bit nervous at the beginning, you know, whether I'm going to start off well," Djokovic said. "I had not played a match in more than five weeks. "He made me produce some really important points in games in order to prevail. "I'm glad that I was pushed, which is important."

"This is the match for crazy comebacks - and I did it," added Sabalenka, who next faces Emma Raducanu who advanced when Dayana Yastremska retired while trailing 4-0 because of illness. — AFP

Djokovic claws out win in return to Indian Wells

INDIAN WELLS: Novak Djokovic struggled to a winning comeback at the ATP-WTA Indian Wells Masters five years after his last appearance, defeating Aleksandar Vukic 6-2, 5-7, 6-3 on Saturday. World number one Djokovic, who had not played since losing an Australian Open semi-final to eventual champion Jannik Sinner in January, is chasing a sixth title at the desert venue in the season's first Masters event.

The 36-year-old Serb captured the 400th Masters-level victory of his career, joining Rafael Nadal as the only men to reach the 400 milestone at the elite
