Kuwait, Turkey reaffirm close ties

Amir returns home after state visit to Turkey, thanks President Erdogan



KUWAIT: HH the Amir Sheikh Mishal Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah arrived on Wednesday, with his accompanying delegation to Kuwait from Turkey after concluding his state visit. "On the basis of the historic bilateral relations bonding the leaderships of the State of Kuwait and the Republic of Turkiye, the two friendly peoples and mutual keenness on part of the political leaderships in the two countries on boosting the friendly relations and the partnership, as well as on the occasion of the 100th anniversary of official relations between the two friendly countries, His Highness the Amir Sheikh Mishal Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah paid a state visit to the Republic on May 7-8," said a statement issued by Kuwait marking the conclusion of the state visit.

"His Highness the Amir Sheikh Mishal was welcomed as a dear guest of His Excellency President Recep Tayyip Erdogan, who was the head of the hosts at Esenboga International Airport in Ankara," the statement added. Erdogan and HH the Amir held a session of bilateral discussions, followed by another one at the official level grouping delegations from the two sides. The talks were marked with consensus

on issues of common concern and the necessity of bolstering bilateral relations in all sectors.

The two sides affirmed their pride in the distinctive ties between the two countries and peoples, and praised the level of commercial and economic relations and cooperation, namely the volume of trade exchange, activities by the Kuwait Public Investments Authority in Turkey and investments by Turkish companies in Kuwait.

They signed, on sidelines of the discussions, a number of significant agreements, memoranda of understanding in the fields of coping with natural catastrophes, free trade zones, housing and infrastructural sectors, in addition to an MoU regarding the strategic ministerial-level dialogue. Moreover, Kuwaiti and Turkish officials signed an executive protocol for defense equipment contracts and an MoU between the Kuwaiti interior ministry and the Turkish catastrophes and emergency authority.

President Erdogan, the statement continued, affirmed support for sovereignty, territorial sanctity and regional security of Kuwait, stressing that

Zionists pound Gaza; 49 bodies found in hospital

RAFAH: The Zionist entity bombarded Rafah on Wednesday and the military said ground troops conducted "targeted raids" in the southern Gazan city, as negotiations to halt the seven-month war resumed in Cairo. The Zionist entity has defied international objections and sent tanks into Rafah, which is crowded with Palestinian civilians sheltering near the Egyptian border, seizing on Tuesday a crossing that is the main conduit for aid into the besieged territory.

The White House condemned the interruption to humanitarian deliveries, with a senior US official later revealing Washington had paused a shipment of bombs last week after the Zionist entity failed to address concerns over its long-threatened Rafah operation. The Zionist military on Wednesday said it was reopening another major aid crossing into Gaza, Kerem Shalom, as well as the Erez crossing, both on the territory's border with the Zionist entity.

But the UN agency for Palestinian refugees, UNRWA, said the Kerem Shalom crossing which the Zionist entity shut after a rocket attack killed four soldiers on Sunday — remained closed. It came after a night of heavy Zionist strikes and shelling across Gaza. AFPTV footage showed Palestinians scrambling in the dark to pull survivors, bloodied and caked in dust, out from under the rubble of a Rafah building. "We are living in Rafah in extreme fear and endless anxiety," said Muhanad Ahmad Qishta, 29. "Places the (Zionist) army claims to be safe are also being bombed," he told AFP.

In devastated northern Gaza, Al-Ahli hospital said a strike on an apartment in Gaza City killed seven family members and wounded several other people. The Zionist military said it had struck over 100 targets across the Gaza Strip throughout Tuesday. It added in a statement that its "troops are conducting targeted raids on the Gazan side of Rafah crossing in the eastern part of Rafah".


World sweltered **Temperature anomalies in April 2024** as April smashed

PARIS: April marked another "remarkable" month of record-breaking global air and sea surface temperature averages, according to a new report by the EU's climate monitor published on Wednesday. The abnormally warm conditions came despite the continued weakening of the El Nino weather phenomenon that contributes to increased heat, said the EU's Copernicus Climate Change Service, pointing to human-caused climate change for exacerbating the extremes.

global heat records

Since June last year, every month has been the warmest such period on record, according to Copernicus. April 2024 was no exception, clocking in at 1.58 degrees Celsius above the 1850-1900 pre-industrial average. "While unusual, a similar streak of monthly global temperature records happened previously in 2015/16," Copernicus said.

The average temperature over the last 12 months was also recorded at 1.6C above pre-industrial levels, surpassing the 1.5C target set by the 2015 Paris Agreement to limit global warming. The anomaly does not mean the Paris target has been missed, which is calculated over a period of decades. But it does signal "how remarkable the global temperature conditions we are currently experience are", Copernicus climatologist Julien Nicolas told AFP.



Last month was the second warmest April ever recorded in Europe, as was March and the entire winter period. Swathes of Asia from India to Vietnam have been struck by scorching heat waves in recent weeks, while southern Brazil has suffered deadly flooding. "Each additional degree of global warming is accompanied by extreme weather events, which are both more intense and more likely," Nicolas said.

Diverging extremes in the form of floods and droughts peppered the planet in April. Much of Europe saw a wetter April than usual, although southern Spain, Italy and the western Balkans were

Court refuses to free ex-candidate, sets May 15 hearing

KUWAIT: The criminal court on Wednesday rejected a request from defense lawyers to release ex-election candidate Musaed Al-Qraifa, on trial for allegedly insulting the political leadership, and set May 15 for the next hearing. Defense lawyers for Qraifa said the court heard the testimonies of a secret service officer and the legal representative of the interior ministry on the case.

The court then refused an appeal by the defense lawyers to free the defendant until the date of the trial. The lawyers said that Qraifa denied in court all accusations against him including insulting the political leadership and spreading false news. The presiding judge set the next hearing on May 15 to hear arguments of the defense team.

Several MPs and activists were present in large numbers as the judge allowed only the defense team and interior ministry representatives to attend the session. Qraifa was brought to the courtroom in his jail uniform. Qraifa made the offensive statements for which he is being tried at an election campaign just days before the April 4 parliamentary polls.

Turkish newspapers hail Amir's landmark visit

A new phase of Kuwaiti-Turkish relations

ISTANBUL: Turkish newspapers highlighted the visit of His Highness the Amir Sheikh Mishal Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah to Turkey, with the front pages dedicated to describing the visit and the discussions with Turkey's President Recep Tayyip Erdogan. The newspaper, Yeni Safak, reported that six strategic agreements have been signed between Kuwait and Turkey aimed at enhancing bilateral relations in the fields of defense and diplomacy.

Yeni Safak emphasized that the visit will lay the foundation for developing cooperation between the two countries in many fields, noting that the Turkish press has shown broad interest in His Highness' visit to Turkey to reaffirm bilateral relations. The Aksam newspaper reported that President Erdogan received His Highness the Amir, who visited Turkey on his first official visit to a non-Arab country since assuming

office in December last year, in an official ceremony.

The newspaper said that following the talks between the leaders and the Kuwaiti and Turkish delegations, His Highness the Amir and President Erdogan attended a ceremony to sign six cooperation agreements regarding multiple fields to enhance cooperation. Among the agreements, there was a protocol regarding defense procurement between the two governments and a memorandum of understanding to establish a strategic dialogue between the two countries.

The Turkgun newspaper noted Turkish interest in His Highness the Amir's visit, considering it a significant new phase of Kuwaiti-Turkish relations and adding that it would mark a new beginning in bilateral relations. The ULKA TV channel covered the visit, noting Kuwait and Turkey's

goals not only to enhance cooperation between the two countries but also to achieve further integration, harmony, and agreement regarding the regional situation in the area.

The Turkish press confirmed that His Highness's official visit to Turkey is historic and comes at a very crucial time, explaining that it gains utmost importance during the circumstances the region is going through, especially the war in Gaza. It is known that Kuwait and Turkey are linked by historic relations, and these relations have their impacts and implications on the political equations in the Middle East, whether directly or indirectly. Turkish-Kuwaiti relations witnessed a sophisticated pattern after the brutal Iraqi invasion of Kuwait in 1991, especially after the role played by the Turkish government in contributing to the liberation of Kuwait from the Iraqi invasion. — KUNA

Kuwaiti companies eyeing more investments in UAE

ABU DHABI: Kuwait's firms are seeking to increase their presence in the United Arab Emirates due to the developed system and legislation that have created a global market for international trade and securities, Chief Executive of the Kuwait Business Council in Dubai and the North Emirates, Feras Al-Salem, said Tuesday.

Among the recent deals signed between Kuwait and the UAE are preventing double taxation, financial evasion by companies in Kuwait and the

Kuwait deplores settlers' attacks

KUWAIT: The Ministry of Foreign Affairs expressed on Tuesday Kuwait's condemnation of settlers' assaults on Jordan's humanitarian aid convoys heading to the besieged Gaza Strip. In a statement, the Ministry affirmed Kuwait's position, calling on the international community to assume its responsibility by deploring these attacks and avoiding them. This aims to guarantee the sustainable delivery of these aid convoys to Palestinian people in order to curb the ongoing humanitarian catastrophe in the Strip caused by ongoing attacks, it stated.

Meanwhile, UN Secretary-General Antonio Guterres reiterated his appeal for Zionist occupation forces to avoid any escalation in Gaza and engage instead in constructive talks on a ceasefire. "The closure of both the Rafah and Karm Abu-Salem (Karem Shalom) crossings is especially damaging to an already dire humanitarian situation. They must be reopened immediately," he said at a press conference at the UN Headquarters in New York on Tuesday.

He underscored the need for an agreement between the Zionist government and the leadership of Hamas to stop the "unbearable suffering" of both Palestinians in Gaza and the hostages and their families. "It would be tragic if weeks of intense diplo-

Guterres also warned that the repercussions of an attack on Rafah will be felt far beyond the war-ravaged Gaza Strip, the occupied West Bank, and the wider Middle East region. "Even the best friends of Zionists are clear: An assault on Rafah would be a strategic mistake, a political calamity, and a humanitarian nightmare. "I appeal to all those with influence over Zionists to do everything in their power to help avert even more tragedy," he added.

In the far south of the Gaza Strip, the town of Rafah, bordering Egypt, has been hosting hundreds of thousands of Palestinians driven from elsewhere in the besieged enclave due to the ongoing military operation. There are also grave concerns that humanitarian aid stocks are fast running out across the war-torn Strip and that fuel reserves will run out by the end of the day.— KUNA

The initiative was announced during a ceremony held at Zain's headquarters in Shuwaikh, where Minister of Health Dr. Ahmad Abdulwahab Al-Awadhi; Zain Vice-Chairman and Group CEO, Bader Al-Kharafi; Zain Kuwait CEO, Nawaf Algharabally; and Child Protection Office Director, Dr. Mona Al Khawari were present, along with the Ministry's top officials and Zain's executive team.

MoH played a bigger role through a multisectoral national strategy that includes prevention, awareness, offering services to victims, and more."

Dr. Al Awadhi also shed light on the fruitful collaboration between the Ministry of Health and Zain, which resulted in the establishment of the 147 helpline since 2016. The hotline receives abuse reports and provides mental counseling to children and their parents. 

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Gaza women bear the brunt of war

'Awful': Gaza aid worker reveals dire conditions for women

JERUSALEM: Gazans are feeling the toll of seven months of war, with women bearing the brunt as hospitals face overcrowding and shortages, says a doctor who just left the southern city of Rafah. "In my 25 years of experience, I've never seen a conflict where people must run around in circles with nowhere to go," Hairhound Lahna said. A gynecologist, Lahna was head of mission for Rahma Worldwide, an American non-governmental organization, and Palmed, a France-based association for "health in Palestine".

The war was "awful for women", especially those forced to leave hospitals just hours after giving birth due to overcrowding, he told AFP on the phone. "They find themselves in tents or shelters where people crowd together," said the 57-year-old French doctor who worked in Khan Yunis' European Hospital, as well as a maternity ward in Rafah. Lahna, clearly affected, recounted witnessing a mother's death from blood poisoning four days after childbirth.

"We dish out antibiotics willy-nilly to cope with the situation" because the risk of infection is "enormous", with women lacking enough water to wash themselves and unable to change into clean clothes, he said in the interview on Tuesday. Gaza's healthcare system is in tatters, with many hospitals targeted or hit by Zionist entity forces. A UN Women report published this week said women and girls in Rafah and the rest of the Gaza Strip were in "a constant state of despair and fear".

It found 93 percent of those interviewed felt unsafe, 80 percent had feelings of depression, 66 percent were unable to sleep and 70 percent suffered from intense anxiety and nightmares. In addition, more than half of them "have a medical condition requiring urgent medical attention", the report said. The scenes in the north of the narrow coastal strip "seem straight from Berlin after World War II" or the Chechen capital Grozny, said Lahna, describing it as "no longer livable".

Lahna said Kamal Adwan Hospital in the northern city of Beit Lahia, which he visited last week, was "a five-star hotel" compared with the destruction in the rest of the city. But in Rafah, on the border with Egypt, people were panicking after Zionist entity ordered more than 100,000 to evacuate from the overcrowded city's eastern neighborhoods.

The United Nations says 1.4 million residents and displaced Gazans are crammed in the city. An emergency doctor doing volunteer work in Rafah and nearby Khan Yunis said the situation was "catastrophic". Rafah's Al-Najjar Hospital was a "red zone" with patients and staff fleeing "out of fear", said Doctor James Smith. The closure of the Kerem Shalom crossing with Zionist entity on Sunday, after a Hamas-claimed rocket attack killed four Zionist entity soldiers, had cut off the supply of medicine and staff to support field hospitals.

"The smell of sewage is rife every-where," Smith said. "It's been getting worse over the course of the last couple of days." Smith said he takes on jaundice cases, likely due to hepatitis that cannot be diagnosed for lack of available tests. Other cases involved children and adults suffering from "complex respiratory problems, diarrhoeas and vomiting", he said. — AFP

Xi welcomed with 'respect and love' in Serbia

BELGRADE: Serbia's President Aleksandar Vucic reaffirmed his strong support for China's sovereignty over Taiwan Wednesday as he gave a lavish welcome to President Xi Jinping, who is seeking to deepen political and economic ties with friendlier countries in Europe.

China has poured billions into Serbia and neighboring Balkan countries, particularly into mining and manufacturing, and last year Beijing and Belgrade signed a free trade agreement. Xi and his wife Peng Liyuan were greeted by Vucic on a red carpet outside the main government offices in Belgrade on Wednesday. The Chinese leader was met by a gun salute and the Chinese national anthem before shaking hands with officials including the prime minister and the National Bank of Serbia governor.

The two leaders waved from a balcony to several thousand people waiting outside, with some waving Chinese flags. Vucic called welcomed Xi a "friend

"Such respect and love as he will find here in our Serbia, he will not find anywhere else," Vucic added.

He told the crowd as Xi applauded: "We have a clear and simple position regarding Chinese territorial integrity. Yes, Taiwan is China". Beijing claims the self-ruled island as its own, and said it will not rule out using force to bring the island under Chinese control.

As the two leaders sat down for meetings, Xi told Vucic in opening comments that there was a "strong feeling of friendship between our two countries". Xi arrived in Belgrade on Tuesday evening following a state visit to France that saw sometimes robust exchanges with President Emmanuel Macron on trade and China's

close ties to Russia despite the Ukraine war.

The other two countries chosen for Xi's first trip to Europe since 2019 - with Hungary as the final stop after Serbia - are among the most sympathetic to Moscow

Streets in the Serbian capital were decked out with Chinese flags, along with posters and billboards that proclaimed a "warm welcome" to "Chinese friends".

Xi's visit also coincided with the 25th anniversary of the 1999 US bombing of the Chinese embassy in Belgrade, which killed three people. "Do not forget that our

Chinese friends were with us 25 years ago when this

country was being demolished and bombed," Vucic told the crowds. "They paid a high price, they lost people only a few hundred meters from here on this very day."

The embassy was hit during a months-long, USled NATO campaign targeting Serbian security forces who were at war with ethnic-Albanian insurgents in Kosovo. The US later apologized, saying outdated maps had led the pilot to strike the wrong target. On Tuesday, Xi wrote in the Serbian daily Politika that NATO had "flagrantly bombed the Chinese embassy", warning that China would "never allow such tragic history to repeat itself". — AFP

BERLIN: German police on Wednesday arrested a 74-year-old man suspected of hitting a former mayor of Berlin in the head, the latest in a rash of assaults against politicians in Germany. Chancellor Olaf Scholz blasted the attacks against politicians as "outrageous and cowardly", stressing that violence

did not belong in a democratic debate. Franziska Giffey was at a library on Tuesday afternoon when the suspect came up from behind her to hit her in the head and neck with a bag containing hard objects, police said. Giffey, who is now Berlin state's economy minister and a member of Scholz's Social Democratic Party (SPD), was treated in hospital for light injuries. The detained suspect was previously known to investigators over "state security and hate crimes", said police. adding that they were investigating the

Prosecutors were also considering if the man should be sent to psychiatric care because of indications that he might be mentally ill. According to provisional police figures, 2,790 crimes were committed against politicians in Germany in 2023, up from 1,806 the previous year.

Nevertheless, that was down from the 2,840 recorded in 2021, when the last general elections were held. Giffey said she was feeling well after the initial scare.

But she was "concerned and shaken about a growing 'free wild culture' in which people who are engaging politically in our country are increasingly exposed to attacks that are supposedly justified and acceptable. "We live in a free and democratic country, in which everyone can be free to express his or her opinions," she wrote on X, formerly Twitter. "But there is a clear line - and that is violence against people," she added. Berlin's current mayor Kai Wegner said anyone who attacked politicians was "attacking our democracy", as he vowed to examine "tougher sentences for attacks against politicians". — AFP

Washington police clear pro-Palestine encampment

WASHINGTON: Washington police cleared an encampment of pro-Palestinian protesters at George Washington University on Wednesday, authorities said, making several pre-dawn arrests. Just after 4:00 am (0800), hundreds of officers moved in on a university quad, making arrests and using pepper spray, the student-run GW Hatchet newspaper reported. CNN said around three dozen people were arrested.

Police remained on the scene around 10:00 am, an AFP reporter saw, as tents were being dragged toward a garbage truck and a student held a poster reading "Free Palestine" on the sidewalk. The arrests came as the mayor and police chief from the nation's capital were expected to testify in front of Congress later in the day about why the encampment - which had entered its second week - had taken so long to clear.

However, after the encampment was cleared, Republicans who control the House Oversight Committee said they were canceling the hearing. "It was unfortunate the situation at GW forced the Oversight Committee to act; however it was apparent that the DC police force was not going to do their job," Representative James Comer said in a statement. The police department said in a statement that it had tried to "deescalate tensions" without arrests, but that based on "incidents and information, there has been a gradual escalation in the volatility of the protest."

Campus protests have sprung up across the country in recent weeks, with students demonstrating against the war in Gaza and calling on universities to cut direct or indirect financial ties with US weapons manufacturers and Zionist institutions. The at-times raucous rallies have rocked colleges. Some Jewish students have reported threats and anti-Semitism, while pro-Zionist counter-protesters at the University of California, Los Angeles, physically attacked demonstrators at an encampment.

Both President Joe Biden and universities have tried to walk a fine line between free speech rights and concerns about intimidation. On Tuesday, Biden condemned a "ferocious surge" in anti-Semitism in a speech at the Capitol, saying "there's no place on any campus in America - any place in America - for anti-Semitism or hate speech or threats of violence of any kind." Demonstrators - including some Jewish student organizers - have said they denounced acts of anti-Semitism, and accuse their detractors of conflating criticism of Zionists with anti-Semitism. — AFP

Bushra Bibi, 49, and Khan, 71, were both convicted of corruption and breaking Islamic marriage laws in the lead up to February's general election, which saw military-backed parties come to power. Khan, who was also jailed for leaking state secrets, says the cases were designed to keep him from contesting. "She has already been shifted to a female ward of the jail on her own request," Intazar Hussain Panjutha, a lawyer for Khan's Pakistan Teh-

reek-e-Insaf (PTI) party, told AFP.

She had been held at the home she shared with Khan - declared a sub-jail - on the outskirts of the capital for the past three months. Khan is also serving a concurrent 10-year term for leaking state secrets. The divorced mother met Khan when he approached her for spiritual guidance and appear in public wearing a face-covering hijab. She had made repeated requests to be "treated as a commoner" and taken to the prison, a spokesman for the party said.

The couple married just months before Khan was elected prime minister. He was booted from power in April 2022 by a no-confidence vote after analysts said he fell out with the country's influential generals. He went on to wage a defiant campaign against the establishment which culminated in thousands of supporters pouring onto the streets on May 9 when he was first arrested. Army installations and government property were targeted in a public display of anger against the military that is rarely seen in Pakistan. Thousands of supporters were detained and dozens of party leaders rounded up, decimating Khan's once unstoppable street power. PTI said the first anniversary of the mass arrests on Thursday would be marked by rallies. — AFP

Modi's party deletes X post accused of targeting Muslims

Election body says BJP's 'objectionable' post violated Indian law

NEW DELHI: Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi's party on Wednesday deleted a cartoon video posted on social media platform X that was criticized for targeting minority Muslims during an ongoing national election.

India's election code bans campaigning based on "communal" incitement but the Hindu-nationalist Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) has frequently invoked the country's main religious divide on the campaign trail. The video, posted by an official BJP account, featured caricatures of opposition politicians scheming to abolish special affirmative action programs for marginalized Hindu groups and instead distribute them to Muslims.

The election commission wrote to the platform's Indian office on Tuesday saying the "objectionable" post violated Indian law. On Wednesday the original post had disappeared from the platform, with a notice saying it had been deleted. A police complaint filed by the opposition Congress party accused the video of promoting "enmity between different religions". Modi, who is widely expected to win a third term in office when the six-week general election concludes next month, has made similar claims to the

video in campaign appearances since last month.

He has used public speeches to refer to Muslims as "infiltrators" and "those who have more children", prompting condemnation from opposition politicians, who have complained to election authorities. On Tuesday he again said that his political opponents would "snatch" affirmative action policies meant for disadvantaged Hindus and redirect them to Muslims. Modi remains widely popular a decade after coming to power, in large part due to his government's positioning of the nation's majority faith at the centre of its politics, despite India's officially secular constitution.

That in turn has made India's 220-million-plus Muslim population increasingly anxious about their future in the country. The BJP last month published another contentious animated video on Instagram in which a voiceover warned that if the opposition came to power, "it will snatch all the money and wealth from non-Muslims and distribute them among Muslims, their favorite community".

The video was removed after several users reported it for "hate speech". — AFP



Malta ex-PM, top officials charged in corruption probe

VALLETTA, Malta: Former Maltese premier Joseph Muscat, the current deputy premier and the central bank chief are among dozens of people and companies charged in a hospital privatization scandal rocking the Mediterranean island nation. Muscat and one of his ex-ministers, Konrad Mizzi, have been charged with accepting bribes, corruption in public office and money laundering, according to documents obtained by AFP late Tuesday.

It is the first time a former premier will face criminal charges in court. Muscat strongly denies the allegations. Deputy Prime Minister Chris Fearne - previously tipped to be Malta's next European Commissioner - and former finance minister Edward Scicluna, governor of the Central Bank of Malta, were also charged with fraud, misappropriation and fraudulent gain. Muscat's former chief of staff Keith Schembri has been charged with money laundering, soliciting bribes and abuse of office to exact an unlawful advantage "through threats or abuse of authority".

The charges were filed on Monday after a long-running investigation that has shaken Malta's political establishment. It dates back to the decision by Muscat's Labour government in 2015 to pass management of three public hospitals to a private company, Vitals Global Healthcare. The company had no healthcare experience and after 21 months it sold the concession to another company, Steward Health Care, without having made any of the investments it had promised.

Following a challenge by the opposition Nationalist party, a court last year annulled the privatization deal, finding evidence of fraudulent behavior. An appeal court upheld the ruling and found there had been "collusion" between the companies and senior government officials. Following a request by civil society group Repubblika, a separate criminal investigation was launched in 2019 which recommended last month that charges be brought. Those charged are expected to be summoned to court in coming days, beginning what is likely to be a long legal case. Those accused of money laundering risk jail sentences of up to 18 years. Muscat - who resigned in 2019 in the political fallout over the murder of journalist Daphne Caruana Galizia - has strongly protested his innocence.

"If they weren't so serious, the accusations against me would be laughable," he wrote on his Facebook page on Tuesday. "Without even questioning me, the authorities decided to smear me and accuse me of corruption, money laundering, establishing a criminal organization, and even claiming I took 30 million euros." — AFP

Three policemen killed in Afghan bomb attack

FAIZABAD, Afghanistan: Three policemen were killed and five were wounded on Wednesday when a sticky bomb was detonated next to a security convoy tasked with clearing illegal poppy crops in northeastern Afghanistan, the interior ministry said. The improvised explosive device (IED) was attached to a motorcycle which targeted a convoy of police vehicles in Faizabad, the capital of mountainous Badakhshan province, around 11 am (0630 GMT).

"The bomb exploded while the convoy of police forces was on its way to destroy poppy cultivation," Taleban Interior Ministry spokesman Abdul Mateen Qani posted on X, formerly Twitter.

The explosion comes days after Taleban security officials and residents clashed over the violent clear-

ance of poppy crops in two Badakhshan districts, leaving two dead and sparking rare protests.

Afghanistan was the largest producer of opium before poppy cultivation was banned in a decree by the Taleban supreme leader in April 2022. Farmers have been encouraged to plant different crops, but none compete with the financial draw of the poppy, leading some to continue to discreetly cultivate small plots. There was no immediate claim of responsibility for the attack.

An AFP journalist saw Taleban authorities searching homes and detaining dozens of people near the scene. Images posted on social media but not immediately verified by AFP showed a charred motorcycle and a police truck riddled with holes. — AFP

Eyewitness Aminullah, who did not want to give his full name, said he heard a huge explosion and saw that a convoy of Taleban authorities had been hit.

"Immediately the security forces cleared the area of people," he told AFP. The number of bombings and suicide attacks in Afghanistan has fallen since the Taleban ended their insurgency after ousting the US-backed government and returning to power in August 2021. However, a number of armed groups, including the Islamic State group, remain a threat, with regular reports of explosions that go unconfirmed by authorities. — AFP


Hope dwindles 48 hours after S Africa building collapse

GEORGE: Rescuers raced against time to find more survivors amid the rubble of a deadly building collapse in South Africa on Wednesday, as search operations were about to enter their third day. Dozens of people are still unaccounted for almost 48 hours after rescue services started combing through the debris in the southern city of George.

At least seven people were killed as an under-construction five-storey building collapsed on Monday for reasons that are yet to be determined. Twenty-nine of the 75 workers who were at the site when the incident occurred have been pulled out of the rubble alive, authorities said.

Six have life-threatening injuries, and 16 are in critical condition. Moses Malala, a foreman who survived the collapse, told AFP he heard a loud sound before the building came crashing down. Malala, who was working on the roof, said he felt his feet slipping as the building started to fold on one side.

He watched his colleagues fall one by one. Many are still buried under the rubble. Malala was injured but escaped with his life and has been helping with rescue efforts. "I have pain too much... I can't sleep" he said. "Since Monday I was here on the site, we try to remove our relatives, our brothers and sisters". Thirty-nine people remain unaccounted for, authorities said. The next few hours are critical to save them, they added. The



chances of surviving drop dramatically after 72 hours. More than 200 rescue workers and emergency service personnel divided into three teams searched separate areas on Wednesday. The building, which collapsed at around 2 pm local time (1200 GMT) on Monday, was meant to be a 42-unit apartment block.

On Tuesday night, slight cheers were heard as a survivor was pulled out of the rubble and put onto a

stretcher, an AFP correspondent saw.

Another body was retrieved and wrapped in a blanket. Religious leaders and social workers were at the scene to assist and comfort distraught families. Men, women and children sang and prayed at the city hall as they awaited news of their loved ones. One pastor told AFP they were offering "spiritual support" to those affected by the tragedy. — AFP

An emergency doctor working in Rafah and nearby Khan Yunis said that with humanitarian access compromised, the health situation was "catastrophic". "The smell of sewage is rife everywhere," said the doctor, James Smith. "It's been getting worse over the course of the last couple of days." World Health Organization chief Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus said on Wednesday hospitals in the Gaza Strip's south had only "three days of fuel left" because of the border closures. "Without fuel all humanitarian operations will stop", he posted on X.

Meanwhile, the Hamas-run government media office said health workers had uncovered at least 49 bodies from the premises of Gaza City's Al-Shifa hospital, the territory's largest which was devastated by two weeks of fighting in March. The bodies were recovered from "a third mass grave" at Al-Shifa, following the discovery of some 30 bodies last month, said Motassem Salah, head of the hospital's emergency department.

AFP footage from Al-Shifa hospital showed at least a dozen bodies wrapped in black plastic body bags. Standing in front of the ruins of the hospital, which was devastated by two weeks of fighting in March, Salah said several of the bodies had decomposed. On Wednesday, the media office said health workers continued to uncover bodies from the complex. So far 520 bodies have been recovered from "seven mass graves" found at three different hospitals across Gaza in recent weeks, the media office said.

The Zionist military offensive has killed at least 34,844 people in Gaza, mostly women and children, according to the territory's health ministry. Talks aimed at agreeing a ceasefire resumed in Cairo on Wednesday "in the presence of all parties", Egyptian state-linked media reported. A senior Hamas official said the latest round of negotiations would be "decisive". — AFP

drier than average, Copernicus reported. Heavy rain resulted in flooding over parts of North America, Central Asia and the Arabian Gulf. While eastern Australia was hit with heavy rains, the bulk of the country experienced drier than normal conditions, as did northern Mexico and around the Caspian Sea.

The natural El Nino pattern, which warms the Pacific Ocean and leads to a rise in global temperatures, peaked earlier this year and was headed towards "neutral condition" in April, Copernicus said. Still, the average sea surface temperatures broke records in April for the 13th consecutive month. Warming oceans threaten marine life, contribute to more humidity in the atmosphere and puts at risk its crucial role in absorbing planet-heating greenhouse gas emissions.

Climate forecasts suggest the second half of the year could even see a transition to La Nina, which lowers global temperatures, Nicolas said, "but conditions are still rather uncertain". The end of El Nino does not mean an end to high temperatures. — AFP

UN: Nearly 3 million people displaced in Myanmar amid clashes with junta

Cambodia's Hun Sen urges junta-Suu Kyi talks

YANGON: The number of displaced people in Myanmar has reached three million, the United Nations said, the vast majority forced to flee their homes by conflict unleashed by the military's 2021 coup. Around 2.7 million have fled since the putsch that toppled Aung San Suu Kyi's government after a short-lived experiment with democracy.

The coup sparked renewed clashes with established ethnic armed groups and birthed dozens of new "People's Defense Forces" that the military has failed to crush. "Myanmar stands at the precipice in 2024 with a deepening humanitarian crisis," the UN's resident coordinator in the country said in a statement released on Monday.

An estimated one-third of those displaced are children, according to the statement. Around half of the three million have been displaced since late last year, when an alliance of ethnic armed groups launched an offensive across northern Shan state, the statement said. The offensive seized swathes of territory and lucrative trade crossings on the China border, posing the biggest threat to the junta since it seized power.

Myanmar's borderlands are home to a plethora of ethnic armed groups, many of whom have battled the military since independence from Britain in 1948 over autonomy and control of lucrative resources.

The UN said a severe funding shortfall was hampering its relief efforts, particularly ahead of the May-June cyclone season. Last year cyclone Mocha smashed into western Myanmar's Rakhine state, killing

More than 355,000 people are currently displaced in western Rakhine state, which has been rocked since November by clashes between the Arakan Army (AA) and the military, the UN said.

Meanwhile, Cambodia's former leader Hun Sen said Tuesday he has asked the head of Myanmar's junta for a video meeting with jailed civilian leader Aung San Suu Kyi. Hun Sen, who ruled Cambodia for nearly four decades before stepping down last year, held video talks Tuesday with Min Aung Hlaing as the

India arrests four accused of recruiting for Russian army

NEW DELHI: Indian authorities have arrested four people accused of "trafficking" citizens of the country to fight for the Russian army in Ukraine. Two years since Russia's invasion began, tens of thousands of its soldiers have been killed in Ukraine and Moscow has been on a global quest for more troops.

At least two Indian soldiers have been killed in the shipped to the frontlines under false pretences. A statement published by the Central Bureau of Investigation (CBI) late Tuesday said four men had been arrested, including one who had worked in Russia as a translator for a network facilitating the recruitment of Indian soldiers. Former Karnataka minister remanded in kidnapping case

BENGALURU, Former Karnataka minister HD Revanna, who was arrested for allegedly abducting a sex abuse victim of his son Prajwal Revanna, was remanded in seven days' judicial custody on May 8. His three-day police custody ended on May 8, according to reports. He was produced in the XVII Additional Chief Metropolitan Magistrate Court. Judge Ravindrakumar B Kattimani remanded him in seven days' judicial custody. Janata Dal (Secular) leade Revanna, who was detained by the Special Investigation Team (SIT) in the kidnapping case last week, has been sent to judicial custody till May 14. Revanna on Tuesday failed to get relief from the special court for elected representatives, which had adjourned his bail plea hearing for Wednesday.

Revanna, son of JD(S) patriarch and former Prime Minister HD Deve Gowda, and his confidant Sathish Babanna were booked on Thursday night for allegedly abducting a woman on April 29. The case was registered on a complaint filed by the woman's son, who alleged that his mother was sexually abused by Revanna's son and JD(S) MP Prajwal Revanna. The SIT has also secured the custody of Babanna.

The woman was allegedly abducted to prevent her from testifying against Prajwal, police sources said.

The explicit videos of the alleged sexual abuse of women by Prajwal had been making the rounds on social media based on which the state government formed the SIT on April 28 to probe the case after the Karnataka State Commission for Women wrote a letter to the Chief Minister Siddaramaiah.

The 33-year-old Prajwal, who was the NDA candidate in the Hassan Lok Sabha constituency, reportedly left the country on April 27, a day after the elections, and skipped the SIT summons to appear before it.

Interpol has issued a Blue Corner notice against the absconding MP, who is facing sexual abuse charges.

Meanwhile, Congress leader and Karnataka's deputy chief minister, DK Shivakumar on Wednesday accused HD Kumaraswamy of plotting to circulate thousands of USB flash drives containing the purported explicit videos of the latter's nephew, Prajwal Revanna.

Shivakumar has blamed Kumaraswamy for the scandal. A day after the JD(S) leader accused him of circulating 25,000 USB flash drives before the parliamentary elections, Shivakumar called the former Karnataka chief minister the "king of blackmailing".

Shivakumar said Kumaraswamy was the "lead, director and producer of the story". He claimed Kumaraswamy knew about the flash drives. - Agencies

Volcano in Indonesia erupts

JAKARTA: A volcano in eastern Indonesia erupted on Wednesday and spewed an ash tower almost a mile into the sky, prompting officials to raise an alert level to the second-highest and warn people to keep away. Mount Ibu, located on the island of Halmahera in North Maluku province, erupted at 11:11 am local time (O211 GMT) and sent a thick column of dark smoke and ash above the peak. The volcano spewed an ash tower 1.5 kilometers (0.93 miles) above the peak, Indonesia's volcanology agency (PVMBG) said. — AFP

Fighter jet crashes in Singapore

SINGAPORE: An F-16 fighter jet crashed at a military airbase in Singapore on Wednesday with no casualties, the defense ministry said. "The pilot successfully ejected and the plane crashed thereafter within Tengah Air Base," it said in a statement. "The pilot is conscious and able to walk. He is receiving medical attention and no other personnel are hurt.' The ministry said the Singapore jet "experienced an issue during take-off and the pilot responded in accordance with emergency procedures." It added that it had begun investigating the crash. — AFP

Poland detains Russian deserter

WARSAW: Polish border guards said Wednesday they had detained a Russian deserter who illegally crossed into Poland, a staunch Ukraine supporter, from the territory of Moscow ally Belarus. The Russian embassy in Warsaw said it had not been informed of the matter and questioned the truth of the announcement. "We have detained a Russian deserter. He had his military papers on him," border guard spokeswoman Katarzyna Zdanowicz told AFP. "The individual is a 41-year-old man who illegally crossed the Belarusian border into Poland, in the northeast," she said, without providing further details. — AFP

Police in Vietnam arrest 20

HANOI: Police in Vietnam have arrested 20 people for stealing and taking control of tens of thousands of Facebook accounts both domestically and internationally, state media said Wednesday, netting them nearly \$4 million in profit. The group is accused of producing and spreading malware to hijack more than 25,000 high-value business accounts, according to VNExpress. Cybersecurity police made the arrests during several raids across Hanoi, business hub Ho Chi Minh City and northern Nam Dinh province in April. — AFP

Court bans 'Glory to Hong Kong' protest song

HONG KONG: Hong Kong banned a protest song popular during massive pro-democracy demonstrations in 2019 on Wednesday after a court judged "Glory to Hong Kong" was used as a "weapon" to incite violent protests. The song grew popular during the protests, and was also secretly recorded by an anonymous orchestra. Its defiant lyrics incorporate the key protest slogan "Liberate Hong Kong, revolution of our times". "Glory to Hong Kong" is the first song to be banned in the former British colony since it was handed over to China in 1997. The Hong Kong government's first attempt to get an official injunction was refused by the High Court last year in a surprise ruling, which said a ban could have a "chilling effect" on innocent third parties.

Angering the city's government, the song has in recent years been played at several international sporting events, with event organizers mistaking it for the Chinese territory's anthem.

Hong Kong is a semi-autonomous territory with no anthem of its own, and uses China's "March of the Volunteers". Wednesday's ban comes after a campaign by the city's authorities against the song, which has seen them demand it be removed from Google's internet search results and other content-sharing platforms - a request that has been largely rebuffed.

Reversing a lower court's decision last year, appeal judge Jeremy Poon wrote in a judgement that the composer of the song had "intended it to be a 'weapon' and so it had become". "It had been used as an impetus to propel the violent protests plaguing Hong Kong since 2019. It is powerful in arousing emotions among certain fractions of the society," he said. The order would also stop a range of acts including broadcasting and performing the song "with criminal intent".

The song can also no longer be disseminated or reproduced on internet-based platforms, though the injunction contained exceptions for "academic activitv and news activity"—a tweak the government made after earlier questioning by judges. The judgement said an injunction order was "necessary" because internet platform operators "indicated that they are ready to accede to the Government's request if there is a court order". The Asia Internet Coalition—an industry group that includes tech giants like Google, Apple, Spotify, and X—said it was assessing the implications of the decision "to determine its impact on businesses".—AFP



US and Philippine troops sink enemy vessel in war games

MANILA: US and Philippine forces sank a decommissioned China-made Philippine Navy ship Wednesday during South China Sea war games simulating an attack on an enemy vessel, officials said. The exercises are being held near the city of Laoag, around 400 kilometers (250 miles) south of Taiwan, amid a backdrop of increased confrontations between Philippine and Chinese vessels around South China Sea features claimed by Manila and Beijing.

The BRP Lake Caliraya, a small tanker decommissioned by the Philippine Navy in 2020, slowly dipped below the water after being struck by waves of anti-ship missiles, rockets, cannon fire and land-based artillery off Laoag, they said. A navy fast attack craft and frigate, an air force fighter and helicopter and landbased artillery from the Philippine military as well as a US F-16 fighter and an AC-130 gunship took part in the attack on the simulated enemy vessel, they added.

The participants had "a mission of trying to prevent an aggressor from landing on the Philippine soil," Lieutenant-Colonel Omar Al-Assaf, lead Philippine planner for Wednesday's activity, told reporters.

"The ability of both the US and the Filipino army and air force to work together to achieve this is extremely lethal," said Lieutenant-Colonel Matt Cahill, commander of a US Army unit taking part in the war games. He compared it to team sports in which "you don't take the field with a new team, right before the big game" but must practice together beforehand.

The Philippine military earlier ruled out any symbolism in the choice of a China-made ship as target practice for the allies. "There is no issue with that. The vessel has been used in the Philippines for a long, long time. So any attachment, if ever there is, doesn't matter at all," said Philippine Navy chief Vice Admiral Toribio Adaci.

More than 16,700 Philippine and US troops are taking part in the annual military drills - dubbed Balikatan, or "shoulder to shoulder" in Tagalog - in multiple locations across the Asian archipelago. Journalists watched Wednesday's event on video screens beamed towards a strip of sand dunes where, two days earlier, the two allies had also conducted a live-fire exercise with missiles and artillery to stop an imaginary invasion force landing on the Philippines' north coast.

Beijing claims almost the entire South China Sea despite an international ruling that its assertion has no legal basis. It deploys hundreds of coast guard, navy and other vessels to patrol and militarize the waters. Asked about the drills, China's foreign ministry warned Monday that "any military exercise should not be targeted at or harm the interests of third parties". — AFP

AlTerkait explained that the transaction resulted in Al Safat Investment acquiring a group of assets valued at KD 16,283,245, carrying minimal liabilities estimated at only KD 396,191, making the net assets acquired by Al Safat Investment in the process KD 15,887,054. Considering the cost paid by the company for the merger with Cap Corp, which amounted to KD 10,200,000, AlTerkait hinted that the company realized profits of KD 5,687,054 from the merger.

Future outlook

AlTerkait revealed Al Safat's direction towards conducting quality operations within the frame-

work of agreements under implementation, including completing the exit procedures from the Middle East Chemical Industries Company, expected to be finalized during 2024. He indicated that the company is in final negotiations with potential investors to exit and complete the sale of the Carpet Manufacturing Company, with expected contractual measures to be taken during the current year, 2024.

The Al Safat team is currently continuing its efforts to develop the investment portfolio of Cap Corp and transform it from a local portfolio to a Gulf one. Additionally, the market maker service is subject to main arrangements, as the company has reached an advanced preparatory stage to acquire the service in coordination with regulatory authorities, with activation expected in the near future following full readiness according to the rules followed in Boursa Kuwait.

'A blessing': Rains refill drought-hit reservoirs in Iraq

DARBANDIKHAN, Iraq: The reservoir behind the massive Darbandikhan dam, tucked between the rolling mountains of northeastern Iraq, is almost full again after four successive years of drought and severe water shortages.

Iraqi officials say recent rainfall has refilled some of the water-scarce country's main reservoirs, taking levels to a record since 2019. "The dam's storage ca-

pacity is three million cubic meters (106 million cubic feet). Today, with the available reserves, the dam is only missing 25 centimeters (10 inches) of water to be considered full," Saman Ismail, director of the Darbandikhan facility, told AFP on Sunday.

Built on the River Sirwan, the dam is located south of the city of Sulaimaniyah in Iraq's autonomous Kurdistan region. "In the coming days, we will be able to say that it's full," said Ismail, with the water just a few meters below the road running along the edge of the basin. The last time Darbandikhan was full was in 2019, and since then "we've only had years of drought and shortages," said Ismail.

He cited "climate change in the region" as a reason, "but also dam construction beyond Kurdistan's borders". The central government in Baghdad says upstream dams built in neighboring Iran and Turkey

have heavily reduced water flow in Iraq's rivers, on top of rising temperatures and irregular rainfall.

This winter, however, bountiful rains have helped to ease shortages in Iraq, considered by the United Nations to be one of the five countries most vulnerable to some impacts of climate change.

In Iraq, rich in oil but where infrastructure is often run-down, torrential rains have also flooded the streets of Kurdistan's regional capital Arbil. Four hikers died last week in floods in Kurdistan, and in Diyala, a rural province in central Iraq, houses were destroyed.

Ali Radi Thamer, director of the dam authority at Iraq's water resources ministry, said that most of the country's six biggest dams have experienced a rise in water levels. At the Mosul dam, the largest reservoir with a capacity of about 11 billion cubic meters, "the storage level is very good, we have benefitted from the rains and the floods," said Thamer. Last summer, he added, Iraq's "water reserves... reached a historic low". "The reserves available today will have positive effects for all sectors", Thamer said, including agriculture and treatment plants that produce potable water, as well as watering southern Iraq's fabled marshes that have dried up in recent years. He cautioned that while 2019 saw "a sharp increase in water reserves", it was followed by "four successive dry seasons".

Water has been a major issue in Iraq, a country of 43 million people that faces a serious environmental crisis from worsening climate change, with temperatures frequently hitting 50 degrees Celsius (122 degrees Fahrenheit) in summer. "Sure, today we have rain and floods, water reserves that have relatively improved, but this does not mean the end of drought," Thamer said. — AFP

In Bulgaria, a losing battle against EU Green Deal

BELI BRYAG, Bulgaria: The European Union's plans to phase out coal are not going down well in Beli Bryag, a Bulgarian mining village that was sacrificed to expand an open-pit mine. Empty houses with gaping window openings and 50-odd people remain in the community, down from some 400 in 2009. That was when it was decided to tear down the village to make space for the mine.

Now it seems the facility may not have a long life either. Bulgaria has committed to exiting coal by 2040 as part of EU efforts to achieve net-zero carbon emissions by mid-century under its Green Deal. "The situation is tragic," said Beli Bryag mayor Ivelina Dimcheva, whose husband and brother are miners. "It's absurd to destroy our houses to expand a mine, which risks closing afterwards," she told AFP. Her clan is among five families who have refused to accept a compensation deal to relocate. Instead, they have taken their case to court to save their homes.

The Green Deal, unpopular in coal-dependent Bulgaria, is a major issue ahead

of the European parliamentary elections on June 9 and the country's own national election the same day. Coal workers have been offered "no prospects", said Stanimir Georgiev, 50, a 30-year veteran of the mines who is organizing strikes and protests to defend his livelihood in the run-up

to the European polls.

"The Green Deal is a charade which threatens our well-being and fuels anti-European feelings," he said outside the Maritsa East coal-fired power plant complex, which gets its supplies from the Beli Bryag mine. Russian flags fly outside houses in this central region of Bulgaria, which is traditionally close to Russia. — AFP

Market-based schemes not reducing poverty: Report

PARIS: Market-based approaches to forest conservation like carbon offsets and deforestation-free certification schemes have largely failed to protect trees or alleviate poverty, according to a major scientific review published on Monday. The global study—the most comprehensive of its kind to date—found that trade and finance-driven initiatives had made "limited" progress halting deforestation and in some cases worsened economic inequality.

Drawn from years of academic and field work, the report compiled by the International Union of Forest Research Organizations (IUFRO), a group of 15,000 scientists in 120 countries, will be presented at a high-level UN forum starting Monday. Its

authors urged a "radical rethink" of increasingly popular market-based approaches often promoted as effective at saving forests, curbing global warming and raising living standards in developing nations.

"The evidence does not support the claim of win-wins or triple wins for environment, economy and people often made for market mechanisms as a policy response to environmental problems," said contributing author Maria Brockhaus from the University of Helsinki. "Rather our cases show that poverty and forest loss both are persistent across different regions of the world... where market mechanisms have been the main policy option for decades," she told AFP by email.

Since the last IUFRO assessment in 2010,

the report noted a rise in complex and overlapping market-based schemes "with financial actors and shareholders more often interested in short-term profits than long-term just and sustainable forest governance". Its lead author, Constance Mc-Dermott from the University of Oxford, said this may not be true of all individual projects "but overall... it's hard to say they've been a rousing success". The report said a \$120 million project in the Democratic Republic of Congo had "reinforced entrenched interests" by restricting local people from forests without addressing logging by powerful extractive businesses.

In Malaysia, indigenous groups promised better livelihoods from a foreign-backed plantation venture on their customary land received no benefit, the report said. "As both cases show, 'wins' are often gained elsewhere, while the burdens of forest loss, enclosures and forestland conversion are carried locally," said Brockhaus.

In Ghana, deforestation rates had risen despite a slew of sustainable cocoa standards, corporate pledges, and carbon offset projects, while farmers were earning less today than decades ago, said McDermott.

Meanwhile green trade policies imposed by wealthy countries—like the EU's ban on imports linked to deforestation—might look good from Brussels but did not consider the knock-on effects, she added. "There's no accountability. If this doesn't work—or farmers are pushed off their farm as a result—it's not going to hurt the person eating chocolate in the UK or Germany," she said.

Despite recent turmoil, carbon markets are projected to grow into a multi-billion-dollar industry as corporations increasingly turn to credits to meet their net-zero climate targets. Credits are purchased from projects, often in developing nations, that reduce or avoid the release of planet-heating emissions, such as protecting CO2-absorbing rainforests or peat swamps. —AFP

Kuwait's business credit growth in Q1 recovers, but household weak

Private sector and resident deposit growths improve

KUWAIT: Kuwait's domestic credit growth was a relatively decent 0.9 percent in Q1, resulting in a 2 percent y/y increase through March. Business credit drove most of the growth in Q1, expanding by 1.7 percent q/q, more than double the increase recorded in all of 2023 (+0.8 percent). Business lending needs to record ongoing strength in Q2 for it to finish 2024 at a meaningful increase, given that the second half of the year is usually weak.

Household credit, after a modest recovery in the second half of 2023, was muted in O1. Higher for longer interest rates and the political backdrop are

headwinds for growth going forward.

The recovery in business credit (+1.7 percent YTD, +1.3 percent y/y)has been relatively broad-based across sectors with "construction" and "trade" still in the lead in line with 2022-2023, up 7 percent and 3.2 percent YTD, respectively, while the dominant "real estate" increased 1.9 percent, exceeding the 1.3 percent growth seen in full-2023. In contrast, "other services", which tends to be volatile fell by 3.1 percent YTD, and is the only main sector to be in the red so far this year. After a very strong 2023 in terms of project awards (KD 2.2 billion), the first four months of 2024 have been relatively weak with awards dropping by 34 percent y/y to stand at around KD 415 million. On the other hand, household credit was lackluster, inching up a limited 0.3 percent in Q1 (+1.9 percent y/y), and decelerating from 0.9 percent and 0.6 percent q/q growth

in the previous two quarters. Looking ahead, higher-for-longer interest rates is a headwind for credit growth, and particularly for household credit.

Meanwhile, it is important to mention that credit for non-residents jumped by 9 percent YTD, which results in an overall credit (domestic plus non-resident) growth of 1.8 percent YTD. Non-resident credit has been growing faster than domestic credit since 2022 and accounted for 11.8 percent of total credit as of March 2024, up from 9.8 percent in December 2021.

Resident deposits increased by a robust 1.8 percent in Q1, pushing up y/y growth to 4.3 percent. Private sector deposits showed some recovery following a weak 2023, growing by 2.2 percent q/q and accounting for 92 percent of the increase in deposits in Q1. Public-institution deposit trends have been weakening after soaring in the last quarter of 2023 (+18 percent q/q) while government deposits were marginally positive YTD after surgTable 2: Deposit growth

ing by 37 percent in 2023 when they accounted for 69 percent of the total increase in deposits. It is worthy to mention that, within private-sector KD deposits, CASA increased in Q1 (+1.6 percent q/q), its first quarterly increase in seven quarters. On the other hand, trends of time deposits continued to weaken with y/y growth falling to 10 percent, from a peak of 26 percent in mid-2023.

Given lack of progress on the inflation front in the US so far this year,

the market-implied pricing of cuts in US rates has been toned down from five to six 25 bps cuts at the start of the year to only two cuts currently. While this dynamic will continue to evolve, it is also uncertain whether the CBK will follow the Fed in any potential rate cuts this year. Credit growth in Kuwait will likely continue to feel the pinch if policy rates remain elevated while any rate cuts will be supportive for credit growth, especially

BMW: EU probe into China EV subsidies against free trade

FRANKFURT: The chief executive of German luxury carmaker BMW on Wednesday warned the European Union's investigacounter to free trade. The EU launched the inquiry last year, fearing that Chinese subsidies are a threat to Europe's own vast automotive industry.

The move enraged Beijing, sparking fears of a trade war between the bloc and the world's second-biggest economy. Oliver Zipse—CEO of BMW, which has major investments in China, the world's biggest car market-said that the Munich-based group "always strives for free trade".

"What we are experiencing today with the anti-subsidy investigation against China is exactly the opposite of what we expect," he said during a call after the group reported falling profits in the first quarter. It was unlikely BMW's warnings would stop the EU imposing additional tariffs on Chinese car manufacturers, he said, but added that he hoped any such step would be temporary.

"I would warn against doing something like that permanently—it would do much more damage to German industry," he said.

He pointed out many Chinese imports to Europe are made by non-Chinese manufacturers with operations in the country, including German companies. "You see how quickly you can shoot yourself in the foot," he said. According to NGO Transport & Environment, nearly 20 percent of all electric cars sold across the EU last year were built in China—but more than half of those were made by Western carmakers. BMW has a major production base in Shenyang, where it manufactures cars through a joint venture.

Zipse's comments came as the BMW group, which also makes Mini and Rolls-Royce cars, reported first-quarter net profit dropped 19 percent year-on-year to 2.95 billion euros (\$3.17 billion) due to higher costs. Sales slipped 0.6 percent to 36.6 billion euros.

In China the group sold almost 183,000 BMW brand vehicles, down 4.1 percent from

Germany's auto giants in particular have invested heavily in China in recent decades. They were already facing problems due to fierce local competition, and the fallout from the EU probe amounts to an extra headache. If the EU concludes there are unfair practices, it could impose tariffs on Chinese car manufacturers above the standard 10 percent EU rate, but Brussels could also decide to do nothing.

The probe is one of several state aid investigations directed at China by the bloc in recent times, with the EU accusing Beijing of flooding Europe with subsidized goods. — AFP





Global car giants seek tech allies in China's EV market

BEIJING: Struggling foreign automakers in China are looking for help from local tech giants to try to stay competitive in the world's biggest electric car market, where shiny smart screens, assisted driving and sophisticated map technology are in high demand. At the recent Beijing Auto Show, China's biggest car expo, a number of foreign firms announced tech partnerships-from Nissan joining forces with Baidu to Toyota signing a cooperation agreement with Tencent. The two Japanese companies are among a number of traditional auto juggernauts, once dominant in China, that are now struggling to keep pace with a new generation of local EV startups.

"They are notoriously conservative companies and their competencies aren't technology," Tu Le,

managing director of Sino Auto Insights, told AFP. 'They've tried to invest in frontier technology for the automotive space but it doesn't come naturally," he said. "But they are being forced to try to be more open-minded towards technology due to where the market is moving in China and the new entrants into the space—companies like Xiaomi and Huawei with high tech consumer products backgrounds."

Those firms are now in a brutal price war with more than 100 Chinese electric car brands, all fighting to offer the most attractive prices and the most advanced tech to wealthier consumers. As a result, foreign firms have suffered, Gregor Sebastian, a senior analyst and EV industry expert with the Rhodium Group, an independent research firm, told AFP.

Argentina rolls out 10,000 peso banknote

BUENOS AIRES: Inflation-battered Argentina on Tuesday introduced a 10,000-peso banknote, worth the equivalent of about \$11 -- five times the face value of the previous biggest 2,000-peso bill. The new note, which will allow people to carry around fewer bills, will be available at banks and

"Foreign car makers in China in general, but particularly Japanese car makers, have really been... hammered in the last 12 to 18 months in the Chinese market," he said. "They've lost market share rapidly... This is linked to intense Chinese competition from producers like BYD, but also the numerous EV startups." BYD, which has emerged in recent years as the country's undisputed champion of the sector, beat Tesla in the final quarter of 2023 in global EV sales.

Foreign automakers are now compelled to find ways to boost their standing in a market increasingly dominated by a low-cost and high-tech vehicle lineup. Smart technology features are among the new set of requirements for obtaining a lead-


ing edge in China's EV race. But as the US-China geopolitical competition has intensified in recent years, Beijing has tightened control over foreign firms' access to information it considers sensitive, such as advanced and the heaps of data produced by domestic cars. One major reason why foreign automakers are seeking partnerships with local tech firms is to benefit from their innovation, which Chinese automaking executives have attributed to the cutthroat competition in the industry.

But another is access to data. "There is a bit of a walled garden scenario going on here," Daniel Kollar, head of automotive and mobility at the consultancy Intralink, told AFP. "China wants to be seen as playing by the rules, letting foreign players access the market," he said. "But they really don't want to give up on the security

The solution is to work with a Chinese partner. "If you want to offer highly advanced mapping solutions in China, you need to work with a local company and either license their mapping data or

ATMs from Tuesday, the South American country's central bank said in a statement.

Argentina is in the grips of an economic crisis that has seen annual inflation nearing 290 percent as poverty affects about half the population. With no end in sight, the central bank said a 20,000-peso note will be issued later this year. enter into a joint venture," Sebastian told AFP.

Nissan has hailed its deal with Baidu as allowing it to bring "exciting intelligence system(s) and AI-based services to customers in China and beyond". And Toyota said its deal with gaming giant Tencent on AI would help it capitalize on Chinese consumers' growing appetite for advanced smart features in the cars it sells in China. Baidu has also recently started collaborating with South Korean automotive giant Hyundai and its affiliate Kia.

These Chinese firms are the "experts" in precisely the space where foreign firms are falling behind, Sino Auto Insights' Tu Le said. "That combined with most automakers being especially weak in digital creates the perfect opportunity for Tencent and Baidu to make that pivot towards the mobility space." During a surprise visit to Beijing last week, Tesla boss Elon Musk met top Chinese officials and received a key security clearance for its locally produced EVs.

The regulatory breakthrough coincided with reports that Tesla had entered into a deal with Chinese tech titan Baidu for maps and navigation. Sebastian told AFP that tech partnerships are driven by a more long-term strategy aimed at staying ahead in the Chinese market. "This is more talking about the next five to 10 years rather than the next two to three years," he said.

"If political relationships with China continue to be stable and not deteriorate further, maybe (foreign firms) can tap Baidu or Tencent for next-generation products in the 2030s." And Tu Le said the possibilities of AI in smart cars could be huge. "Imagine the autonomous system in a vehicle has access to all your historical data along with your ride and drive data, buying habits and preferences," he said. "It could create ways to try to monetize you every few minutes." — AFP

KATY PERRY FOOLS INTERNET WITH FAKE AI PHOTOS OF MET GALA

S singer Katy Perry said even her own mother was fooled by Al-generated fake images she posted Tuesday of herself pretending to attend the Met Gala in New York. "Couldn't make it to the MET, I had to work," the "Firework" singer wrote to her 207 million followers on Instagram. But two photos with it appear to show Perry on the famous steps of the Metropolitan Museum, which hosted the glitziest fashion night of the year on Monday. One had her wearing a huge floral dress, while a second had her in a warrior-style bronze bustier and grass petticoat.


She put her location as "Metaverse", but many online fans failed to pick up

The image even fooled Perry's mother. The singer shared an exchange in which her mum wrote: "Didn't know you went to the Met." Perry responded: "lol mom the Al got you too, BEWARE!"

Other fakes also emerged of the evening, including images of singer Rihanna and actor Selena Gomez. Although AI has often been used to create harmful and sexualized images of celebrities, some are now embracing the technology themselves. Earlier this year, British singer-songwriter FKA Twigs revealed she had built a deepfake version of herself. It "is not only trained in my personality, but also can use my exact tone of voice to speak many lan-

guages," she said in a statement.

"I will be engaging my 'AI twigs' later this year to extend my reach and handle my online social media interactions, whilst I continue to focus on my art from the comfort and solace of my studio," she added. In January, a fake pornographic image of superstar Taylor Swift was viewed 47 million times on X in half a day before being removed by the platform. The following month, 20 internet giants including Meta (Instagram, Facebook) and X committed to deploying technologies to more effectively identify and report content generated by AI. —AFP

Remastered Beatles movie 'Let It Be' gets long-awaited re-release

et it Be", the documentary film about The Beatles released just after the band's break up in 1970, hit screens again on Wednesday -- the first time it has been legally available in over 50 years. Shot in January 1969, director Michael Lindsay-Hogg's movie contained glimpses of the tensions and acrimony between John Lennon, Paul McCartney, George Harrison and Ringo Starr that eventually led to them disbanding. "George wasn't getting many songs recorded because John and Paul were so prolifically brilliant." Jonathan Clyde of the Beatles' Apple Corps told AFP.

"John had met Yoko (Ono) and was making his own journey, Paul was doing what he wanted to do and Ringo had started shooting films," he said. The film shows the "Fab Four" in rehearsals and recording sessions for the album "Let It Be". The last part features their unannounced 40-minute concert on the roof of their record company building on London's Savile Row. It was restored from the original 16mm negative with the sound remastered using the latest de-mixing technology, and has been re-released on Disney+.

More objective

Clyde said the film covered a period when they had tried to rekindle the same spirit they had when they started out performing at Liverpool's Cavern Club and in Hamburg. But it became tainted by the break-up in April 1970, a month before the film was released, unfairly making it a "sort of odd postscript to the end of their career", he added. "They never felt a great love for 'Let It Be' because I think it was associated with all the trouble," he told an audience after a screening of the remastered film in London on Tuesday.

More than half a century later it could now be seen in a more objective light as an invaluable record of the Beatles' creative process. "We all know they were genius, they created this incredible music year after year after year but actually they also worked incredibly hard at it," he said. "You can see those two steps forward one step back, days when really nothing happened and then suddenly a burst of energy that took it forward."

Some 60 hours of previously unseen footage shot for the film was used by "Lord of the Rings" director Peter Jackson for his 2021 series on the making of "Let It Be". Jackson's "The Beatles: Get Back", a documentary about a documentary, offered a more positive take on the Beatles' final months together using the outtakes to show the bandmates joking around together as they created classics for their 12th and last studio album.—AFP

French actress Huppert to head Venice Film Festival jury

rench actress Isabelle Huppert,
best known for her role as a sado-masochist in "The Piano Teacher", will lead the jury at this year's Venice Film Festival, organizers announced
Wednesday. The 81st edition of the
prestigious festival will take place from
August 28 through September 7 on the
beach-lined Lido island.

"There is a long and beautiful history between the Festival and I," said Huppert, who has won Venice's Coppa Volpi for best actress twice, for Claude Chabrol's "Story of Women" and "La Ceremonie", in 1988 and 1995 respectively. "Becoming a privileged spectator is an honor. More than ever, cinema is a promise. The promise to escape, to disrupt, to surprise, to take a good look at the world, united in the differences of our tastes and ideas," the 71-year-old said.

Last year, the festival's top Golden Lion prize went to Greek director Yorgos Lanthimos's "Poor Things", a feminist reworking of Frankenstein. The 2023 jury was led by US director Damien Chazelle, best known for the Oscar-winning "La La Land". —AFP

Europe's 'Swifties' await icon with open arms

hen a pair of "Swifties" in The Netherlands tried to get a local Taylor Swift fan night going two years ago, club owners turned up their noses—doubting the US megastar would be a hit with the hip crowd. "They were not on our side at all," Alexa Fischer, 25, told AFP. "We couldn't even put their names on our socials because they were embarrassed to host the Swift party," recalled her friend, Femke van Splunter. As it turned out, their first party was an instant success—with all 200 tickets snapped up in a day.

Eighteen months later, once-reticent clubs now seek out the duo to organize Swiftie nights—having taken the full measure of the phenomenon in Europe, where the singer-songwriter kicks off the latest leg of her record-smashing Eras tour in Paris on May 9.

Devotion belittled

The trigger for the first event was the 2022 release of Swift's hit album "Midnights", as well as the urge to come together with like-minded fans to celebrate. "We were like: 'A lot of people are hyped about it but we don't know where they are and we don't know who to hype with'," said van Splunter, 30. Like the Nether-

lands-based pair, Portugal's Joana Lopes said Swifties are used to having their devotion belittled: the icon herself has been dismissed for lyrics revolving heavily around her ex-lovers. "A few years ago, we couldn't talk about Taylor without being judged or mocked," said Lopes.

But Swifties across Europe—all of whom will flock to see her perform this year—told AFP in a series of interviews that the sense of community is very real. Take Fischer and van Splunter: the pair curate an eclectic mix of groups on WhatsApp, from one focused on videos of Swift's ongoing tour to another in which Swifties get together to talk politics.

That's just one example of the flourishing world of group chats bringing Swift fans together around much more than just music. On the other side of Europe, in Lisbon, Lopes and her friend Ana Carmo, 29, are in a WhatsApp group with dozens of Swifties living in different cities—and which helped Lopes get tickets to see her icon perform.

Feeling 'seen'

Beyond a sense of belonging, for many the singer has provided solace in tough times. After Fischer—who uses the non-binary pronouns they/them—lost their father at the age of 16, they remember drawing help from a song "about Swift's own journey with cancer and her mum". Her music similarly helped Lopes grieve the loss of her grandmother. "It's on the same day that Taylor became part of my life," said the 33-year-old, who says Swift's lyrics are "the thing that I value most".

Swift makes her fans "feel seen", summed up Clara Garcia, a Brussels-based consultant. "It's like this entire community, the Easter eggs, the concerts, the friendship bracelets." And there is little doubt this has been a key to her record-shattering success, experts say. "Taylor has deliberately curated a community and positioned herself as someone who could be a friend to her fans," said Georgia Carroll, a fan culture expert who said Swift is "definitely the most popular she has ever been". Streams of her music were up 50 percent on the Deezer music platform in Europe in the year since April 2023 -- the month after she kicked off a tour that has already grossed more than any in history, \$1 billion by the end of 2023. -AFP

Spain prosecutors seek to close Shakira tax fraud case

panish prosecutors on Wednesday moved to dismiss a tax fraud case against Shakira just months after opening proceedings against the "Hips Don't Lie" singer over unpaid taxes worth \$7 million. "The Barcelona provincial prosecutor's office for financial crimes has requested that the proceedings against Shakira be closed ... for the 2018 tax year," the prosecutors office said in a statement, pointing to "insufficient evidence".

Prosecutors opened the case in July, accusing the Columbian superstar of using a network of companies, some of them based in tax havens, to cheat the tax office out of 6.6 million euros (\$7.09 million) in 2018, including interest and adjustments. A month later, the so-called Queen of Latin Pop paid 6.6 million euros to settle the debt, her agent told AFP. On November 20, Shakira reached a last-minute settlement with prosecutors on the opening day of her trial over an earlier tax fraud case involving income she earned between 2012 and 2014.

Prosecutors had sought a jail sentence of over eight years for the singer whom they accused of defrauding the tax authorities of 14.5 million euros in a case that centered on how much time she was living in Spain. Shakira denied

the charges, saying she only moved to Spain full time in 2015.

Sing a song of tax woes

By the time the case came to trial, she had already paid 17.45 million euros to settle her outstanding tax debt, prosecutors said at the time. On the day it opened, the trial -- which had been due to run for three weeks and hear from some 120 witnesses -- was quickly concluded after she agreed to pay a fine of nearly 7.8 million euros to settle the case. At the time she explained she had settled "with the best interest of my kids at heart" because she needed "to move past the stress and emotional toll of the last several years" and focus on her career.

Now 47, Shakira lives in Miami with her two sons after splitting from Barcelona star defender Gerard Pique. He was himself convicted of tax fraud in 2016 and ordered to pay 2.1 million euros in fines and arrears. Spain's Supreme Court in 2021 annulled his conviction. Last year, Shakira's superstar Argentine producer Bizarrap won the Latin Grammy for song of the year with a track taking a swipe at Pique --who has since retired from football -- in which she accuses him of leaving her with a "debt to the tax office".—AFP





Inflation deepens losses at online fashion group Boohoo

ritish fast-fashion retailer Boohoo, whose brands include Karen Millen and PrettyLittleThing, reported Wednesday a near-doubling of annual net losses caused by high inflation and weak demand. The online retailer announced a loss after tax of £140.9 million (\$176 million) in its financial year to the end of February. That compared with a net loss of £75.6 million in 2022/23, Boohoo said in a statement. Chief executive John Lyttle said the group had experienced "difficult market conditions, caused by high levels of inflation and weakened consumer demand".

Boohoo sales slid 17 percent to around £1.5 billion year-on-year amid heavy competition from Chinese online retailer Shein and as consumers return to physical stores following the COVID pandemic. "Boohoo's full-year results were a painful read for investors," noted Guy Lawson-Johns, equity analyst at Hargreaves Lansdown.

"Revenue declined at high double-digit rates across all regions, including... in the US, which is seen as the group's pathway to major growth." Boohoo shares dropped 1.2 percent to 34.81 pence in London afternoon trading. AJ Bell investment director Russ Mould added that "the disposable nature of some of its products is at odds with a commitment to green issues, which appears to be particularly important to its core demographic of teenagers and young adults". —AFP

he icy peaks of Jargalant Mountain are supposed to belong to snow leopards, whose numbers have dwindled to fewer than 1,000 in Mongolia, but hard-pressed herders are increasingly pushing into the vulnerable animals' traditional habitat. "Now there are eight herders' families on this mountain," said Daribazar Nergui, who has lost 10 of his livestock to the elusive apex predators, known as "ghosts of the mountain". Wild animals and domesticated livestock have long coexisted in Mongolia's vast hinterlands.

But a push for more grazable land by herders seeking to expand their flocks and their earnings has brought them onto lands once reserved for wild animals, leaving them vulnerable to disease and starvation. Another species that's been threatened is the Mongolian gazelle. Long a symbol of the country's natural beauty, the slender animals travel thousands of kilometers from eastern and southern Mongolia across northern China on their annual migrations.

But their numbers have plummeted from tens of millions to under three million, according to the environment ministry. Climate change and desertification have forced them to change ancient habits, from following fresh vegetation throughout the seasons to going wherever there is enough grass to survive, experts say. "When you have an increase of livestock, you need to find a new pasture, but the new pastures are being used by wildlife," Batbold Dorjgurkhem of the conservation group WWF told AFP. "Once we had five livestock per square kilometer, now we have fifteen per square kilometer," he said.

Soaring numbers

Mongolia's livestock population has



tripled in recent decades, according to government figures, from 20 million in 1990 to 60 million today. The surge has been driven by soaring demand for cashmere abroad, mainly from China. Mongolia is one of the most sparsely populated countries in the world and about one-third of the population is nomadic.

Booming livestock numbers have helped lift many out of the extreme poverty that once defined nomadic life, experts say, but herders still face harsh economic realities. "If you have few animals, around 200 to 300, you can't improve your life, you can't buy a car or save money for your children's future," herder Darkhanbaatar Batsuhkh, from Erdenesant, which lies roughly 200 kilometers southwest of the capital Ulaanbaatar, told AFP. Deepening herders' woes has been the country's extreme weather, most notably the dzud, when harsh winters freeze the ground and make it impossible for livestock to graze.

Climate change is increasing the frequency and intensity of dzuds, according to the United Nations. "Herders are under enormous financial pressure," Gandulgu-

un Sanjaa, the leader of a group of 200 herder families in eastern Sukhbaatar province, told AFP. "They are always short of money," he said, citing the need to pay for livestock feed and school tuition for their children.

Spreading disease

The push for expanded pastures has meant that livestock now live in close proximity to wild animals -- leading to occasional conflict when predators feed on sheep and goats and sometimes fueling the spread of disease. The Saiga

has proved especially susceptible to livestock-borne illness.


The species' numbers fell from

Antelope, native to western Mongolia,

15,000 to 3,000 thanks to a devastating 2016-17 outbreak of Ovine rinderpest, sometimes called goat plague. Their population has rebounded but the animals remain "near-threatened". "We can't catch and inject vaccines into wild animals," Ochirkhuu Nyamsuren, vice dean of the Mongolian University of Life Science's veterinary school, told AFP. "Natural selection and group immunity are their only fate." Still considered vulnerable on a global level, the snow leopard population has stabilized in Mongolia. A 2021 survey found 953 of the big cats-the second-largest population anywhere in the world.

But the intrusion of herders onto their protected lands has alarmed local officials and threatened domesticated and wild animals alike. Munkhdavaa Khasag, the deputy governor of Mankhan, the district where Jargalant is located, said at least 220 livestock were eaten there by snow leopards last year. "Herders always complain about snow leopards and their lost animals," he told AFP. "But we tell them that they must leave Jargalant Mountain -- it is a national park reserved area for snow leopards and they are not allowed to pasture their livestock."

Experts say the government must work to make the country's livestock sector more sustainable. "Mongolia must create a healthy system, with raw materials and products from livestock valued higher," the WWF's Batbold told AFP. "Herders need ways to increase their income other than raising more livestock."—AFP

What a feet: Viral Dutch artist paints 10 pictures at once

wo paintbrushes between the toes, two in her hands, and fierce concentration etched on her face, Dutch artist Rajacenna van Dam is crafting 10 paintings at the same time. An astronaut, a self-portrait, a bespectacled panda and seven other pictures burst into life from her brush, painted on 10 canvasses laid out on a table, upside-down on the floor, and two easels. It started as a party trick for the curly-haired Rajacenna -- her artist name -- who wanted a challenge to relieve her boredom. But it has since become a profession that has shot her to viral fame, with every paint stroke worked out in advance in her head before setting to work with hands -- and feet.

"I work a bit on one canvas, then move to another one, so I'm always dividing my attention between them," said Rajacenna, who is technically left-handed. "Five years ago, I started painting with both hands, as a bit of a challenge and to go quicker. I discovered I was ambidextrous," the 31-year-old artist told AFP. Then a journalist asked her as a joke whether she could also use her feet as well. Challenge accepted.



Starting out "for fun" and after a few mishaps with sticky tape between her toes, she tried using plasticine to keep the brush between her toes. It was a success and she posted a video of her exploits online, quickly becoming a viral hit. Orders flooded in. She is so skilled

that only she can tell the difference between paintings crafted with her hands and those with her feet. "I can really see a big difference. It's a bit less precise," she said, performing her skills at a museum in Vlaardingen, her home town in the south of the Netherlands. 'Very special'

Rajacenna has loved drawing since she was a small child. After a short adolescent dip in interest, her passion was rekindled by an Italian street artist. Today her videos on social media attract millions of views, especially when she paints 10 canvasses at a time with her hands and feet. "I get bored quite quickly, so I like to challenge myself. Doing all this at the same time gives me a sort of feeling of meditation, which calms me a lot," she told AFP. To her knowledge, she is the only person capable of such a feat.

"But I hope that people will be inspired to do more things, to challenge themselves a bit more, to do things like paint with their feet," she said. Her paintings sell for between 6,000 and 12,000 euros (\$6,450 to \$12,900), according to her father Jaco van Dam. "It's also very special for us as parents. She surprises us too and I don't know either how she manages to do it," he told AFP. But a study on her brain by a Turkish-German neurologist Onur Gunturkun provides a clue, he added.

"A brain scan showed that the left and right sides of her brain are three times more connected than average," he said. Neurologist Gunturkun has said Rajacenna was "capable of things that neuroscience deems impossible". In a nod to Albert Einstein, whose brain was famously removed after his death, a painting of the scientist by Rajacenna hangs on the wall of the museum. Rajacenna has attracted some famous admirers, notably pop star Justin Bieber, who described her work as "amazing" when she presented him with a portrait of himself.

It certainly impressed a couple of pensioners watching her at the museum. "It's extraordinary that someone can do that," said Anton van Weelden, 75. "What's more, the paintings are very beautiful and realistic," said Van Weelden, who said he would never dare try something like that. "I couldn't even paint like that with my right hand," he joked. —AFP

US restorationist solves 60m-year-old dinosaur fossil 'puzzles'

efore a T. rex can tower over museum visitors or a Triceratops can show off its huge horns, dinosaur fossils must first be painstakingly reconstructed -- cleaned, fit together and even painted. For US restorationist Lauren McClain, the process is like putting together a giant 3D puzzle. McClain's job begins at her home workshop near Houston, Texas, where she carefully clears away dirt stuck to the more than 60-million-year-old remains using a tiny drill with an air compressor, similar to a dentist's tool.

Then, she must assemble this ancient puzzle -- even though pieces are almost always missing. She molds fillings for the lost parts, plugging the holes and repairing the nicks that have appeared in Edmontosaurus femurs or Megalodon teeth over millions of years. She has even worked on a fossil from a 200-million-year-old Eurypterida, or sea scorpion. McClain doesn't actually like puzzles very much, she says.

But when it "turns into a dinosaur... I can get down with those kinds of puzzles," the 33-year-old says. "When you've got something that's in a hundred pieces, you really have to study all of those edges and how they align, and really, really hone in on those details to rebuild it into what it was," McClain explains. Many of the giants McClain reconstructs once roamed the land which is now the United States, ranging from Florida in the southeast all the way to Montana and the Dakotas in the north and California in the west.

Prehistoric femur

McClain has been a dinosaur buff since she was a child fan of "Jurassic Park." She even held her wedding at the Houston Museum of Natural Science, home to several dino skeleton recreations. While working as a graphic designer, McClain began joining fossil excavations a few years ago, and with the help of a few professional paleontologist mentors, set up her own restoration venture, called Big Sky Fossils.

She quit her desk job to focus on her company full time seven months ago. Recently, McClain has been working on the cranial dome of a Pachycephalosaurus belonging to a Texas museum, and, while looking for more space to expand her workshop, has been working in her garage to restore a Hadrosaurid femur almost as big her.

First, she inserts a metal rod into the giant thigh bone, for stability. Next, she gives it a good clean and uses a powerful glue to bind all the pieces together. Then, an epoxy putty fills in all the gaps where pieces of the fossil have fallen away. Finally, McClain paints all the new parts the same color as the original. "Restoring missing pieces from fossils, it's oftentimes the hardest part," McClain says.

"Because not only do you need to have an understanding of the anatomy of that specific dinosaur, but you need a good reference." "I talk to a lot of paleontologists in order to get it right," she adds.

Patience and observation

Movies make audiences believe that dinosaur fossils are dug up from the ground intact, says David Temple, a paleontology curator at the Houston Museum of Natural Science. "But in reality, it's not like that at all," he explains. "Every fossil ever found needs some degree of curation, some degree of restoration, some degree of restoration, some degree of consolidation, because even the act of getting it out of the ground -- it's destructive," says Temple, speaking in the museum's Cretaceous period section.

Once restored, the original fossils are also used to make life-like replicas, so that several versions of the same model can be displayed in multiple places at once. "A lot of paleontologists will prep their own fossils, but they don't all do that," Temple says. "A lot of times they recognize that the people that do this, it's a very specialized skill." Sometimes, when pieces of bone that don't quite fit are glued together, the paleontologists and restorationists joke that they have invented "a new species," he says. "Patience is very important. Observation is very important," he adds. Most of all, restoration work requires care, Temple says. - AFP

London men-only Garrick club votes to admit women: UK media

embers of one of London's oldest gentlemen's clubs, the Garrick Club, voted on Tuesday to allow women to join for the first time following a row that has bitterly divided its male-only membership. The club's membership is a closely guarded secret but is known to include leading figures from the civil service, the law, journalism, publicly funded institutions and the arts. The Guardian and Telegraph newspapers reported that a motion to allow women to join passed with around 60 percent of votes in favor.

The Guardian said the vote occurred at the end of a private meeting where several hundred members spent two hours debating the issue. The Telegraph reported that 40 percent of the club's 1,500 members voted against. The Garrick did not immediately respond to a request from AFP for comment. Several high-profile members had reportedly threatened to quit the club if the proposal was rejected.

BBC world affairs editor John Simpson last week tweeted: "Various Garrick Club members including (musicians) Sting, Mark Knopfler and leading actors and producers have reportedly written to the club chairman saying they'll resign if the membership doesn't vote to accept women next Tuesday." He added: "Many others like me would also find it impossible to stay."

In March, the head of Britain's spy service Richard Moore resigned after a list of the club's membership was made public for the first time. It was revealed by The Guardian. Moore sent a message to MI6 employees acknowledging the reputational hit that news of his membership posed to the service -- in particular the risk of it undermining its work to attract more women to join MI6. Prime Minister Rishi Sunak's most senior policy adviser, the civil service leader Simon Case, also quit his membership.

Founded in 1831 for actors and "men of refinement and education", the

Garrick is one of the last such clubs not to allow women in, except as guests of men. A petition launched in 2021 backing the admission of women attracted the support of Cherie Blair, a leading barrister and wife of former prime min-

ister Tony Blair.

She recalled that in 1976 as a trainee lawyer she was left standing outside while her future husband Tony was allowed in for dinner. "It's outrageous that so little progress has been made since then," she wrote. Organizers of the petition said that the large number of judges and senior lawyers who were members deprived women of networking opportunities in a profession in which women were under-represented, particularly in the higher echelons.

A previous vote in 2015 on allowing female members saw the narrowest of majorities -- 50.5 percent -- back continuing the ban on female membership. The Garrick, located in Covent Garden in central London, offers members overnight accommodation, a restaurant, bars and a library. Other high-profile figures reported to be members include "Sherlock" star Benedict Cumberbatch and senior minister Michael Gove. An early member was Charles Dickens.

The Guardian reported that members who supported women's membership have drawn up a list of seven women they plan to nominate to join. It included a historian, a former interior minister and an actor. The club's admissions process is opaque and slow, meaning it is unclear when the first women will join. The process involves numerous seconders, an invitation to dine at the club and discussions by committee members who can block nominees. —AFP

Delhi Capitals down Rajasthan Royals to stay in IPL play-off race

Spinner Kuldeep Yadav returns with impressive figures of 2-25

NEW DELHI: Skipper Sanju Samson's 86 went 26 in Chennai. Spinner Kuldeep Yadav returned in vain as Delhi Capitals beat Rajasthan Royals by 20 runs on Tuesday to stay in the hunt for an IPL play-off berth. Delhi posted 221-8 courtesy of Jake Fraser-McGurk's 20-ball 50 and an attacking 65 by Abishek Porel at their home Feroz Shah Kotla ground. Rajasthan looked good in their chase after Samson's fifth half-century of this season but his dismissal, a catch in the deep which was ruled clean by the third umpire, turned the match in Delhi's favour.

Rajasthan, who are yet to confirm their playoff spot, lost three more wickets in the next two overs and Delhi restricted the opposition to 201-8 for their sixth win in 12 matches. "We had it in our hands, it was 10-11 runs per over which was achievable but these things happen in the IPL, Samson said after the loss.

Inaugural champions Rajasthan, placed second behind toppers Kolkata Knight Riders, have eight wins in 11 matches and still favorites to make the top two in the play-offs.

Top four teams will make the play-offs but number one and two will have the advantage of getting an extra match to enter the final on May

impressive figures of 2-25. Fast bowlers Khaleel Ahmed and Mukesh Kumar also took two wickets.

But the batters set up victory after Fraser-Mc-Gurk, who raised his 50 in 19 balls, and Porel attacked in an opening stand of 60. Rajasthan lost wickets after the openers departed but Tristan Stubbs hammered 41 off 20 balls in a late charge to take the total to 221-8.

Stubbs was helped by Gulbadin Naib, who hit 19, and Rasikh Salam, who hit two sixes in his nine runs, as Delhi got 53 runs from the last three overs. The in-form Samson, a wicketkeeper-batsman who has amassed 459 runs, attempted to set up the chase only to depart in the 16th over when Shai Hope caught the batsman off Kumar.

Hope's foot was parallel to the boundary rope but the third umpire ruled it out and a disappointed Samson walked back after a chat with the onfield officials. Veteran spinner Ravichandran Ashwin led the Rajasthan bowling with figures of 3-24.

Yuzvendra Chahal took his 350th T20 wicket – first Indian to achieve the feat — when he got skipper Rishabh Pant, a left-hand batsman, caught out at fine leg for 15. — AFP

Hurricanes beef up for Super Rugby showdown

WELLINGTON: The Wellington Hurricanes have beefed up their starting side for Saturday's top-ofthe-table Super Rugby showdown at the Auckland Blues, adding captain Brad Shields, plus All Blacks Jordie Barrett and TJ Perenara.

The Hurricanes head to Eden Park just one point ahead of the second-placed Blues with four rounds left of the regular season. Barrett takes his place in the midfield with the scrumhalf berth filled by Perenara, who scored his 63rd Super Rugby try off the bench last weekend to set a new competition record. Former England international Shields packs down at blindside flanker with junior New Zealand international Xavier Numia also coming into the side at prop. Head coach Clark Laidlaw said his team faced a tough task in Auckland, where the Hurricanes have not won for five years.

"This is an exciting opportunity for us to be able to take on a top side at their home and put our best foot forward," said Laidlaw. "We haven't won in Auckland since 2019 - so we know that there is a massive challenge ahead."

The Hurricanes are the leading try scorers this season with 53, just ahead of the Blues and the Waikato Chiefs who are tied on 52 each. Blues fullback Zarn Sullivan returns from a knee injury, while his sibling Bailyn is on the Hurricanes bench.

"It's awesome, it's a proud moment for our family," Zarn Sullivan said. The Blues have a point to prove after the Hurricanes carved out a 29-21 win when the teams met in Wellington in March. "It's a top-of-the-table clash, I know the boys will be up for the occasion and wanting to right a



Bangladesh recall Shakib for last two Zimbabwe T20s

DHAKA: Bangladesh on Wednesday recalled all-rounder Shakib Al Hasan and pace bowler Mustafizur Rahman for the final two Twenty20 internationals of the five-match series against Zimbabwe. Former captain Shakib has not played a T20 since July 2023, and was this year elected as a member of parliament for Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina's ruling party.

Shakib has refused to draw the curtains on his cricket career, and his participation in this series is the strongest indication yet he will compete in next month's Twenty20 World Cup. "We expect him to play in the World Cup. This is why he is back in the squad for this series," Jalal Yunus, the cricket operations chief of the Bangladesh Cricket Board (BCB), told AFP.

Left-arm pace bowler Mustafizur was rested for the first three matches after returning from the Indian Premier League, where he was the season's joint-highest wicket taker for the Chennai Super Kings. Top-order batsman Soumya Sarkar also returned to the side after missing the first three matches due to injury.

Parvez Hossain Emon and Afif Hossain, both named in the squad for the first three matches but neither making the XI, have been left out. Pace bowler Shoriful Islam also rested to accommodate the returning trio.

Bangladesh have already sealed the series 3-0, with the last two matches scheduled in Dhaka on Friday and Sunday. The Zimbabwe tour is the last home series for Bangladesh before the Twenty20 World Cup begins next month in the United States and West Indies. Yunus said the BCB expected to announce its World Cup squad at the end of the series. Carl Lewis sees little scope for progression

NASSAU: US long jump legend Carl Lewis does not see any immediate progression in what he dubbed the "toughest" of all field events, questioning the mental fortitude of easily distracted, up-and-coming athletes. Lewis won four consecutive Olympic long jump golds between 1984-96, as well as two world titles.

He went unbeaten in the event for a decade before famously being beaten by Mike Powell at the 1991 world championships in Tokyo in what has been dubbed one of the most thrilling field face-offs in history.

It took Powell to leap a world record of 8.95 metres to win that day, beating Bob Beamon's 8.90m set at altitude at the 1968 Mexico Games - and still an Olympic record. Powell's effort and Lewis' two final jumps in Tokyo remain the three longest distances ever recorded at low altitude. "Why is the long jump not popular? Because no one's jumping far," the outspoken Lewis said of the perceived decline in inter est in the discipline. Illustrating Lewis's point Greece's Miltiadis Tentoglou won the Olympic title in Tokyo with a best of 8.41m and took gold at last year's world outdoor championships with a mark of 8.52m.

"It's not rocket science. When you have a generation that got used to people that were jumping 8.60m and competition was there, people were excited." Currently, he told a select group of journalists at the World Athletics Relays in Nassau, "fans don't feel like they're going to see anything special".

"With the long jump at one point, you really felt like 'I want to be there because I'm going to see something special'." But times have changed, Lewis continued, with a severely reduced number of newcomers willing to submit to the rigorous training demands needed to become a top jumper.

"I just don't think our culture is raising kids to do that anymore" he said. "It's just not in the culture to work that hard, to not be distracted. It's just not there. "And in our culture, I'm not talking about just athletes but I'm talking about kids. What I had to go through, a kid now? 'Oh no, got to stop, mental health'. "Seriously, I'm just being honest."

Changes create new 'event'


Lewis credits Jesse Owens as a role model, the American who became an iconic figure in winning four golds at the 1936 Berlin Olympics, including the long jump. "Jesse Owens would have made the final every Olympic Games in history to this day," Lewis said.

'His personal best (of 8.13m) would have got the bronze medal in London. So why is that? Because it's hard." Lewis was a fervent critic of World Athletics' proposed change in rules in the long jump in a bid to eliminate foul jumps.

The change would see the take-off board replaced by a "zone", with distances measured from the moment of flight from within said zone. "You're supposed to wait until April 1st for April Fools' jokes," Lewis tweeted at the time.

The 62-year-old elaborated that fouling percentages had barely changed over the last 30 years. "The reason the rate of fouling is high is because the event's difficult," he said, describing the take-off board as one of the very foundations of long jumping.

The beauty of the long jump is the challenge. When you take away that challenge... all of a sudden, you've created a new event. "They're doing testing and I think testing is going to show that people are not going to jump farther." Lewis also warned about the discrepancy in availability to new technology. "You create the constant complication of you'll never be able to do that at every level, ever. So because of that, you're going to have 99% of the world doing one event and then 1% of the world doing another event." — AFP

Bayer Leverkusen edge closer to Dublin as another record looms

Call to hire Alonso was 'brave and adventurous', as well as a 'perfect decision'

BERLIN: Xabi Alonso's rampaging Bayer Leverkusen will have an additional incentive in Thursday's home second-leg Europa League semi-final against Roma: breaking a 59-year-old European football record.

Avoiding defeat against Roma on Thursday will not only mean a trip to Dublin for the Europa League final, it will also extend their unbeaten run to 49 games - the best mark in European football history. A Eusebio-inspired Benfica went on a 48-game unbeaten streak between 1963 and 1965. The record has stood since, but Leverkusen have a golden chance of blowing it out of the water.

Alonso's side has already overtaken Juventus' 43-match unbeaten run from 2011 to 2012, which was the best of a team in the top five European leagues. Leverkusen won 2-0 in Rome last week and could progress to the final even with a one-goal loss, but breaking the record would be yet another outstanding achievement in an already brilliant season.

'I can tell my grandchildren'

Speaking after Leverkusen equalled Benfica's record with a 5-1 win at Eintracht Frankfurt on Sunday, Leverkusen goalkeeper and captain Lukas Hradecky said pursuit of an unbeaten season gave his side "extra motivation".

"It's close," said Hradecky after the game, explaining "I can tell my granddaughter and grandson about this." The Finn was referring to the league season, where Leverkusen have two more games to become the first team to go a Bundesliga campaign without defeat, but Leverkusen are just five matches away from an unbeaten treble.

Even with Alonso forced to watch from the stands due to a yellow card suspension, Leverkusen were

not troubled against Frankfurt. Already crowned Bundesliga champions for the first time back in April, Leverkusen are through to the German Cup final, where they face second-division Kaiserslautern.

Avoiding defeat on Thursday will set up a meeting with either Atalanta or Marseille in the Europa League final in Dublin. Before the start of the season, Leverkusen had just two major trophies in their history. With the Bundesliga already under their belt, Alonso's side could more than double their historical trophy haul in the Spaniard's first full season in charge of a top side.

Former Leverkusen coach and sporting director Rudi Voeller said Thursday the call to hire Alonso was "brave and adventurous", as well as a "perfect decision". Speaking with the Koelner Stadt-Anzeiger, Voeller praised Leverkusen's "outstanding squad" depth. "It's rare in the football business that you not only strengthen in the top positions, but also in the areas behind them. That's the secret why Bayer is still unbeaten. "The treble is still possible. But no matter what happens, it's still an outstanding season."

Wirtz, Grimaldo to return

Leverkusen have managed to keep their stunning run going despite Alonso deciding to rest players. Attacking midfielder Florian Wirtz and wing-back Alex Grimaldo were left out of the squad entirely on Sunday.

"They had small complaints in the last few days. We didn't want to take any risks," Alonso said. "They'll train again from Tuesday." Leverkusen scored five despite missing Wirtz, their attacking midfield lynchpin, and assists machine Grimaldo.

Wirtz has four goals and four assists in nine Eu-

ropa League games this season, including a goal in the first leg in Rome. "He's still 21 and has a great future ahead of him," Alonso said after the Roma game. Wirtz celebrated his 21st birthday at midnight just an hour after the match was over, with the team celebrating with the midfielder in the dressing room. With close to a full-strength squad and playing at home for the second-last time this season, breaking Benfica's record on Thursday could be the next step in Wirtz and Leverkusen's great future. — AFP

Scamacca seeks Euro glory with Atalanta, Italy

MILAN: Gianluca Scamacca will lead the line in Atalanta's bid to reach their first ever European final as the striker's hot form puts him firmly in the frame for Euro 2024. A classic centre-forward, Scamacca has had an up-and-down first season back in Italy with Atalanta but is in the form of his life on the eve of Thursday's second leg of their Europa League semi-final with Marseille.

The 25-year-old has scored 10 times and set up another in his last 12 matches, and his fizzing low finish last week ensured Atalanta came away from the Stade Velodrome with a 1-1 draw after having their backs to the wall for large parts of the first leg in southern France.

He will be the focal point of Atalanta's exciting attack in front of passionate home fans in Bergamo who have once again seen their traditionally provincial club punch way above its weight. Scamacca has scored 18 goals in all competitions this term with the bulk of those strikes coming after he was left out of the Italy squad for March's friendlies with Venezuela and Ecuador.

He was dumped by Luciano Spalletti after the Azzurri coach, in a February interview with the Gazzetta Dello Sport, blasted footballers "playing on the PlayStation until four in the morning". Spalletti named no names in an unexpected tirade against modern players' apparently flagging commitment to football but eyes immediately turned towards Scamacca, who was left out de-

That time was also a new Italian record, comfortably beating the 24.72sec set by Silvia Di Pietro, 14 years Curtis' senior, in the 2022 European Championships in Rome. — AFP

Cappuccino-fuelled Kane must 'deliver' against Madrid

MADRID: Bayern Munich coach Thomas Tuchel called on Harry Kane to fire the German giants past Real Madrid and into the Champions League final, while revealing the striker's passion for coffee on Tuesday.

Former Tottenham striker Kane has scored a career-best 44 goals in 44 matches across all competitions in his first year at Bayern, ahead of Wednesday's clash at the Santiago Bernabeu. Kane, yet to win a trophy in his career, converted a penalty in the 2-2 first leg draw in Munich last week as six-time winners Bayern outplayed the record 14-time champions.

"I knew we'd get a big personality into the dressing room on top of everything you can analyze, goalscoring, movements, dealing with the pressure," Tuchel told a news conference. "He was captain of Tottenham and is still captain of the English national team. He brought everything to the table that we could possibly hope for and tomorrow he needs to prove the point and deliver."

Tuchel had been asked if anything surprised him about Kane, who leads the Champions League scoring charts on eight goals along with Paris Saint-Germain's Kylian Mbappe. "How much cappuccino he drinks a day, it's ridiculous," joked a relaxed Tuchel.

"It's very surprising. All the time I go to the kitchen he's on the coffee machine and having a cappuccino. It's obviously good - I started doing it, the guy looks healthy and he's in good shape." The coach admitted at the other end of the pitch it might not be possible to stop Real Madrid forward Vinicius Junior, who struck twice at the Allianz Arena. — AFP

Dortmund stun PSG to reach CL final

Dortmund will be underdogs in the June 1 showpiece

PARIS: Mats Hummels headed in the only goal as Borussia Dortmund stunned Kylian Mbappe and Paris Saint-Germain in their Champions League semi-final second leg on Tuesday, winning 1-0 on the night and advancing 2-0 on aggregate to next month's final at Wembley.

Hummels struck five minutes into the second half at the Parc des Princes and PSG were unable to muster a response, the home side all out of luck as they hit the woodwork four times in total. Dortmund, who sit fifth in the German Bundesliga, were never expected to go so far and will be underdogs in the June 1 showpiece regardless of whether they face their old rivals Bayern Munich or Real Madrid.

It will be their first final since 2013 when, remarkably, the match was also played at Wembley and Jurgen Klopp's Dortmund lost to Bayern. Hummels played in that final and here, 11 years later, he was the hero as Dortmund built on the advantage given to them by Niclas Fuellkrug's goal in the first leg.

"It'll take us a bit of time to realise that, but we're looking forward to it extremely," Dortmund coach Edin Terzic told broadcaster Amazon Prime of getting to the final. "We did it somehow, making it to London." The story of this semi-final, however, is as much about PSG's failure in another crunch knockout tie in the competition. They have still never won

the trophy despite all the money invested by their Qatari owners since the 2011 takeover, and there will be no dream send-off for Mbappe.

He will leave when his contract expires after this season and had been hoping to play his last game for the club in the June 1 final. Instead PSG will be left to reflect on how they failed to get their hands on the biggest trophy of all during Mbappe's seven years at his hometown team.

"We were not clinical enough. They scored two goals, one from a corner and one from a long ball. We created lots more chances, many more than them, but we didn't take them," PSG captain Marquinhos told Canal Plus.

"We got so close and we wanted to get to the final. But we had to win tonight and be more clinical, and we were not." PSG's last two semi-final appearances both came during the pandemic, meaning this was the first time they had hosted a match at this stage of a European competition with fans in 29 years, since losing to AC Milan in 1995.

Woodwork to rescue

Luis Enrique's team had won 2-0 at home against Dortmund in the group stage and were safe in the knowledge that a repeat of that performance would be enough. The PSG coach made one major selection decision, dropping Bradley Barcola and bringing in Portuguese striker Goncalo Ramos. That meant moving Mbappe from the middle onto the left wing.

Dortmund would have been bracing themselves for an onslaught from kick-off, but that did not transpire. Mbappe took only seven minutes to produce his first attempt, yet his volley was easily saved by Dortmund goalkeeper Gregor Kobel.

The hosts had most of the possession but struggled to get Mbappe into the game, the France captain often looking isolated on the wing. In fact it was Dortmund who had the best chance of the first half, when Karim Adeyemi led a counterattack before seeing his shot saved by Gianluigi Donnarumma.

It felt as though the hosts needed to change something or risk going out with a whimper. They should have been ahead two minutes after the restart, when Ramos touched on a ball driven into the box by Mbappe, but Warren Zaire-Emery contrived to hit the post from close range.

That was to prove crucial as Dortmund struck moments later. PSG cheaply conceded a corner, and Julian Brandt's delivery from the Dortmund right was headed in by Hummels. Ramos swept a shot over on the hour mark before Nuno Mendes became the second PSG player to strike the right-hand post, this time with a powerful shot from distance. — AFP

Milan nets Giro 4th stage, Pogacar retains lead

ANDORA: Italy's Jonathan Milan emerged a popular home winner of the Giro d'Italia fourth stage on Tuesday with race favourite Tadej Pogacar retaining the overall lead. The 190km ride from Acqui Terme to Andora on the Italian Riviera was marred by the race-ending crash of Eritrea's Biniam Girmay.

While the man who created history as the first black African to win a Grand Tour stage, in the 2022 Giro, was taken off in an ambulance, Pogacar was safely in the peloton hunting down a two-man breakaway. Pablo Munoz and Stefan de Bod had forged to the front early in the stage, but their time in the spotlight was numbered with the peloton relentlessly reeling them in. They were duly swallowed up with 5km to go.

Filippo Ganna of Ineos Grenadiers was the first to attack, and he led over the final hill and down into the day's final destination, the port of Andora. But it was to be Milan (Lid-Trek) who took the bunch sprint honours, ahead of Australian Kaden Groves (Alpecin-Deceuninck) and German Phil Bauhaus (Bahrain Victorious).

"I have so many emotions now. I said from the beginning we came here with one goal for everyone so today the guys did an amazing job and it was such an amazing sensation to win here again at the Giro d'Italia," said Milan, who was adding to his stage win last year.

All the top riders in the overall standings finished in the main pack and the general classification remained unchanged. Pogacar, who crossed in 30th, holds a 46-second cushion over his main title rival Geraint Thomas, with Daniel Martinez a further second back in third in the GC ahead of stage five, over 178km from the port of Genoa down the coast to Lucca in northwest Tuscany. One man who will be a frustrated onlooker is Girmay. The Eritrean, third in the stage 24 hours earlier, took a heavy fall on a descent ahead of the final intermediate sprint on a wet right-hand bend around 67km from the finish. — AFP

KUWAIT: As Kuwait Zain Football League draws to a close, matches are becoming critically important specially between the two top teams in the standings. Kuwait which has 57 points and Al-Arabi with 54 points after defeating the winless Al-Nasser 4-0 on Tuesday.

Celtics, Thunder win NBA playoff openers

LOS ANGELES: The top-seeded Boston Celtics and Oklahoma City Thunder rolled to convincing victories in their opening NBA playoff series on Tuesday. Eastern Conference top seeds Boston laid down a marker with a 120-95 rout of the fourth-seeded Cleveland Cavaliers at the TD Garden.

Oklahoma City meanwhile were made to work harder by Luka Doncic and the Dallas Mavericks before finally pulling clear to seal a 117-95 victory in their Western Conference semi-final series opener. In Boston, Jaylen Brown scored 32 points while Derrick White added 25, including seven three-pointers, in an emphatic win for the Celtics, who are chasing a record 18th NBA championship.

Boston were in complete control for most of the game, holding a double-digit lead through the second half to close out an emphatic win at the TD Garden. Boston star Jayson Tatum added 18 points but had an off-night shooting-wise, making just 7-of-19 from the field.

Donovan Mitchell led the scoring for Cleveland with 33 points, with Evan Mobley adding 17 and Darius Garland 14. Brown said the Celtics' defense had laid the foundation for the win. "It starts with defense, we wanted to set the tone on defense and we kept them under 100 (points)," Brown told TNT television.

"But we feel like we've got an answer for everything so we just play the game the right way, and see what they want to take away and then we play after that." Boston got off to a flying start, jumping out to an early 12-2 first quarter lead before a Cleveland rally saw them edge into a 23-21 lead after Mitchell's running three-pointer.

But Boston responded swiftly, reclaiming the lead immediately and never allowing Cleveland to get their noses in front thereafter. After taking a 10-point lead into half-time, Boston kept the pressure up in the second half, stretching out to a 26-point lead in the fourth quarter as they romped to a comfortable win. Game two in the series takes place in Boston on Thursday.

Thunder roll past Mays

In Oklahoma City, the Thunder and the Mavericks fought a nip-and-tuck duel before the No.1 seeds pulled away decisively in the fourth quarter. Trailing by nine points at half-time, Dallas rallied in the third quarter to get within one point at 66-65.

But the youthful Thunder line-up began to find their range, Shai Gilgeous-Alexander adding 10 points in the third quarter to help OKC build a 10-point cushion heading into the fourth quarter. Oklahoma City's barrage of scoring continued in the fourth with Jalen Williams adding 10 points as the Thunder outscored their visitors 28-16 to seal victory by a 22-point margin.

Gilgeous-Alexander led the OKC scoring, finishing with 29 points, nine rebounds and nine assists while Chet Holmgren added 19 points and Williams 18. Kyrie Irving led Dallas with 20 points while Luka Doncic, struggling with a sore knee, finished with 19 after shooting six-of-19 from the field.

Oklahoma City, who have an average age of just over 23, are the youngest team to win a second round playoff game and were the youngest team to win a postseason series after sweeping the New Orleans Pelicans in the first round. — AFP
