'I CANNOT REMAIN SILENT'

Amir dissolves Assembly, suspends some articles of constitution pending revision



KUWAIT: HH the Amir Sheikh Mishal Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah ordered dissolving the National Assembly and suspending some articles of the constitution for no more than four years, pending "revision of the democratic process in its entirety". In an address to the nation on Friday evening, he said "The State of Kuwait has undergone challenging times that left repercussions on all aspects of life and created negative reality".

"We, as entrusted with looking after this state and its people, had to offer counseling and guidance once and again in order to get out of these conditions with the least possible losses. Unfortunately, we have faced some unimaginable, unbearable difficulties and impediments. Some people attempted resolutely to shut down every way out of the bitter reality. We were left with no option other than taking this hard decision to rescue the country and protect its higher national interests and resources of the nation," HH the Amir explained.

HH the Amir underscored that a democratic rule requires a great deal of organization of state authorities and distribution of roles according to a clear vision for realizing the national objectives. "This vision makes it inevitable for the legislative and executive authorities to work within specific controls and parameters," he said. Affirming that those controls can never be breached or transgressed, HH the Amir said the parameters of the constitution govern the behavior of all powers and authorities of the state.

'We have noticed, a few days ago, some behavior and actions that ran counter to the stable rules of the constitution," HH the Amir said, in reference to some MPs who threatened and vowed to grill a minister who may be reinstated to their portfolio. He also referred to some MPs who objected to the nomination of ministers to some portfolios, neglecting that the selection of a prime

minister or Cabinet members is a constitutional right of the head of state exclusively.

"Transgressing the constitution reached a point that could never be tolerated as it risked undermining constitutional values and democratic principles," HH the Amir said, noting that those principles had been accepted by everyone for a long time. "Some people went as far as interfering into the powers of the Amir, including his right to select his crown prince," he said, reminding that this is clearly his own right exclusively. HH the Amir added that once a crown prince is handpicked by the Amir, the other authorities of state can play their roles as specified by the constitution.

HH the Amir referred to the sources of national wealth which must not be neglected or used in a way that depletes them and disrupts the interests of the nation through proposals that waste public money and do not achieve the public interest.

Reciprocating, HH the Amir Sheikh Mishal expressed gratitude to the UAE President for the gracious gesture, his true brotherly sentiments that mirror depth of the good and brotherly relations between the two brotherly countries and peoples. HH the Amir expressed good wishes to the UAE so it may witness further progress, prosperity and development under the wise leadership of Sheikh Mohammad bin Zayed Al-Nahyan, the President of the sisterly UAE.

Separately, Minister of Foreign Affairs Abdullah Al-Yahya said Kuwait strongly appreciates its partnerships with neighboring and friendly countries, as part of the country's stable policies towards regional and international events. In a statement to KUNA on Saturday, Yahya noted that Kuwait is exerting great efforts to enhance its regional and leadership role on key issues.

UN votes in favor of Palestinian membership, Kuwait hails vote

UNITED NATIONS: The UN General Assembly voted overwhelmingly Friday to grant the Palestinians additional rights in the global body and backed their drive for full membership, which is blocked by the United States. The Zionist entity's UN ambassador Gilad Erdan reacted angrily to the largely symbolic vote, while Palestinian ambassador to the UN Riyad Mansour said it was historic.

With the war in Gaza raging, the Palestinians in April relaunched a request dating back to 2011 to become full members of the United Nations, where their current status is that of a "nonmember observer state". To succeed, the initiative needed a UN Security Council green light and then a

two-thirds majority vote in the General Assembly. But the United States — one of five veto-holding members on the Security Council and the Zionist entity's

closest ally — blocked it on April 18. Kuwait's ministry of foreign affairs welcomed the resolution and called on the UN Security Council to reconsider its stance on this issue. Kuwait has always called on the UNSC to grant the State of Palestine full membership in the United Nations, the ministry said in a press statement. Reminding the international community of their legal and historical responsibility for reaching a fair and durable settlement to Palestine cause, the ministry urged providing international protection to

Zionists bombard Gaza, order more Rafah evacuations

GAZA: Zionist strikes on Saturday hit parts of Gaza including Rafah where the Zionist entity expanded an evacuation order and the UN warned of "epic" disaster if an outright invasion of the crowded city occurs. AFP journalists, medics and witnesses reported strikes across the coastal territory, where the UN says humanitarian relief is blocked after Zionist troops defied international opposition and entered eastern Rafah this week, effectively shutting a key

aid crossing and suspending traffic through another.

At least 21 people were killed during strikes in central Gaza and taken to Al-Aqsa Martyrs Hospital in Deir al-Balah city, a hospital statement said. Bodies covered in white lay on the ground in a courtyard of the facility. A man in a baseball cap leaned over one body bag, clasping a dust-covered hand that protruded. The feet of another corpse poked from under a

blanket bearing the picture of a large teddy bear. In Rafah, witnesses reported intense air strikes near the crossing with Egypt, and AFP images showed smoke rising over the city. Other strikes occurred in north Gaza, witnesses said. Zionist troops on Tuesday seized and closed the Palestinian side of the Rafah crossing — through which all fuel passes into Gaza after ordering residents of eastern Rafah to evacuate.

More than 300 killed in Afghan flash floods

LAQAYI, Afghanistan: More than 300 people were killed in flash floods that ripped through multiple Afghan provinces, the World Food Program said on Saturday, as authorities declared a state of emergency and rushed to rescue the injured. Heavy rains on Friday sent roaring rivers of water and mud crashing through villages and across

agricultural land in several provinces.

Survivors on Saturday picked through muddy, debris-littered streets and damaged buildings, an AFP journalist saw, as authorities and non-governmental groups deployed rescue workers and aid, warning that some areas had been cut off by the flooding. Northern Baghlan province was one of the hardest hit, with more than 300 people killed there alone, and thousands of houses destroyed or damaged, according to WFP.

"On current information: in Baghlan province there are 311 fatalities, 2.011

Zain: 5G and AI innovations accelerated reliance on data

GCC welcomes UNGA vote for Palestine UN membership

RIYADH: Secretary-General of the Gulf Cooperation Council Jasem Al-Budaiwi welcomed the resolution passed by the UN General Assembly on Friday to support Palestine's bid for full UN membership and called on the UN Security Council to reconsider its previous stance on this issue. "The fact that the resolution was approved by 143 UN member states signals growing support for and strong belief in the right of the State of Palestine to full membership in the UN," he said in a press release.

Al-Budaiwi reaffirmed the GCC support for the Palestine question and the efforts aiming to end the occupation and establish the independent state of Palestine within the borders of 1967, with East Jerusalem as its capital city, under the relevant UN resolutions and the Arab peace initiative. Earlier today, the UN General Assembly passed, by 143 votes against nine, with 25 abstentions, a draft resolution backing Palestine's bid for full UN membership.

Also, Arab League Secretary-General Ahmad Abulghait on Saturday applauded the resolution adopted by the UN General Assembly recommending that the Security Council reconsider the issue of granting the State of Palestine membership in the UN. The Arab League Secretary-General said in a statement that granting Palestine full UN membership is "a significant step on this path because it places Palestine in the status it deserves and reflects its qualification to attain

UN constitutes a message of the Palestinians' right to attain an independent state at the time they are targeted with an integrated catastrophe and feel that the world is incapable of halting the massacre perpetrated against them," he said. The arrogant reaction by representatives of the Zionist entity regarding the landslide voice expressed by the UNGA member states reflected the real stand of the occupation state toward international norms and organizations, he added. Abulghait stressed the necessity of pursuing diplomatic pressure on all influential states to embarrass "the parties that provide cover for the Zionist entity inside the international organization, namely the Security Council."

It added that Kuwait urges the UN Security Council and the international community to act to bring to an end these

Arab summit for Palestine

Meanwhile, Assistant Secretary General and Head of the Social Affairs Sector at the Arab League, Dr. Haifa Abu Ghazaleh, stressed on Saturday the importance of holding the Arab summit in Bahrain in regards to the circumstances that Palestine is going through. This came in her speech during the opening of the preparatory meetings of the senior officials at the economic and social levels of the 33rd Arab Summit. Abu Ghazaleh pointed to the tireless efforts of Arab countries and the Arab Social Affairs and Health Ministerial Council to provide emergency social, humanitarian, and health assistance to the people of Gaza.

She added that the Arab League was keen to place this matter at the top of the preparatory council's agenda by developing an emergency response plan to deal with the economic and social repercussions of aggression against Palestine. She also added that, taking into account Arab and international economic and social developments, the Arab League was keen to include strategies, plans, and programs in various fields in a way that enhanced joint Arab economic and social action, which reflected positively on Arab citizens.

Abu Ghazaleh emphasized the importance of the youth role, and in support of efforts aimed at increasing their empowerment, the council has proposed various important strategies in a way that contributes to building promising Arab cadres. Abu Ghazaleh concluded by expressing her thanks to Bahrain, her colleagues in the social and economic sectors, and the Council's secretariat for their efforts to prepare the documents for the meeting. — KUNA

HH the Amir added that these proposals should serve the national economy within the framework of the development plan. The unhealthy atmosphere Kuwait faced in the past years encouraged the spread of corruption that affected most of the state's facilities, and rather unfortunately reached economic and security institutions, HH the Amir said.

HH the Amir elaborated that corruption even affected justice, which is the resort of people to get their rights and freedom, adding that "we are very sure that the judiciary will purify itself by its sincere men and the help of Allah". All people should know that no one is above law, and those who illegally got some public funds will be punished whatever their position is, he noted. "I will not allow by no means that democracy will be exploited to destroy the state as the interest of Kuwaitis, which are above all, is honesty that we should protect and preserve," HH the Amir stressed. HH the Amir also referred to the behavior of some governments that overlooked grave violations due to parliamentary pressure or unsuccessful efforts that have negative impacts on public interest, vowing that he would not allow such violations under any circumstances.

HH the Amir underlined the utmost importance of security, saying "we will pay much attention to achieve this goal by re-considering the laws of social security". He pointed to the nationality file and those who illegally obtained Kuwaiti citizenship. HH the Amir said that the state would work on two main pillars — security and judiciary — noting that such negative phenomena will not remain and will be re-considered by reliable people, in line with a well-studied plan. HH the Amir frankly said respecting security men is part of the respect of the re-

gime, affirming that "I will not allow by no means to touch their prestige and respect while performing their official duties.'

HH the Amir noted that the Kuwaiti people, the founders of democracy, were keen to find a constitution that would serve the interests of the nation and protect the rights and freedoms of the people, and we did not find in past discussions in the Constituent Assembly or in the councils that followed anything but the pinnacle of respect in their speech, in addition to the sophisticated practices of the constitutional means available to them in the right place or at the right time. But today, we witnessed the opposite of all that; there is a severe misuse of these neans and in the style of speech that does not match the customs and traditions of Kuwaiti people".

"Therefore, Abdullah Al-Salem Hall, instead of being a place for practicing true and sound democracy, has become a stage for all that is unaccustomed and undesirable or acceptable in terms of words. Such practices and expressions did not stop at this point, but rather went beyond the use of the constitutional right to interrogate at every opportunity small or big, which wasted the true value of this right as a sophisticated tool for accountability and legislation," HH the Amir said.

"The constitution did not approve such tool of interrogation, but rather it was stipulated to be a means of reform and correcting any distortions, if any. Otherwise, this fine tool lost its value and the reasons for its determination. It is our duty to declare our rejection of all these practices and develop a solution to them in a way that ends them so that Abdullah Al-Salem Hall goes back to its place as a symbol of democracy, which appreciates and respects elders and listens to other points of view, not being an arena for unacceptable verbal battles or unconstitutional practices that are outside the scope of logic and reason," HH the Amir added.

HH the Amir said the turmoil in the country's political scene has reached a stage that "I cannot remain silent towards it, as it is our duty to take

all necessary measures aimed to achieve the highest interest of the country". "I would like to refer to what happened over the past days. After naming the premier and tasking him to form a new government, communication was conducted with some MPs to ensure the participation of some of them in forming the government in abidance by article 56 of the constitution," he said.

"Despite this, and in order to make time available to form the government, we issued decree no. 67 of 2024 adjourning the meetings of the National Assembly of the 18th legislative term to Tuesday, May 14, in implementation of article 106 of the constitution to start a new phase of positive cooperation between the executive and legislative authorities and joint action to achieve desired reform, and to meet aspirations and hopes of citizens hoping for a better and brighter future," HH the Amir elaborated.

However, all these attempts failed due to repercussions that led to the incompletion of forming the government in light of some acts of MPs towards forming the government that includes conditions and dedications, HH the Amir said. The constitution, as a progressive document that responds to the requirements and changes of life, finds its outlet through harmony with the social, political, economic, legal and moral conditions in society, he said. The constitution must be compatible with the new conditions to absorb them to be its outlet in order to continue as a tool that governs the reality of society and its formations, he stated.

HH the Amir added if all outlets are closed, the constitution would not be able to carry out its desired role that people and its leadership want. "In this case, it becomes necessary for us to intervene to correct the path, address distortions and fill shortcomings revealed by the practical application of the provisions of the constitution over the past 62 years without amendment, especially the historic path from which the Kuwaiti constitution derived its articles and provisions were either totally canceled or had several amendments to respond to changes," he noted.

The Kuwaiti constitution allowed amendments and its provisions were reconsidered after five years of implementation, and this indicates the prudence of the members of the Constituent Assembly, he noted. "Therefore, we decided to dissolve the National Assembly and suspend some constitutional articles for no more than four years," HH the Amir explained. "During this period, all aspects of the democratic process will be studied and the outcomes of the study will be tabled to us for revision. We then will take whatever decisions we might deem appropriate," he added.

HH the Amir paid tribute to the founding fathers who laid the foundations of amity and fraternity among people from all walks of life, from civil servants to tradesmen, in the service of the homeland. He called on the new generation to follow the tradition of their forefathers in acting and behaving decently to restore harmony among all segments of the society. HH the Amir prayed to Allah, the Almighty, to help all sons of Kuwait to work for the prosperity and welfare of the dear homeland.

HH the Amir later issued an Amiri decree to dissolve the National Assembly and suspend some articles of the constitution for a period not exceeding four years. The Amiri order stated: Based on the country's best interests, we decree the following: Article One: Dissolving the National Assembly. Article Two: Suspending articles 51, 56 (paragraphs two and three), 71 (paragraph two), 79, 107, 174 and 181 of the constitution for a period not exceeding four years, during which the democratic practice in the country will be reviewed and the findings of a study will be referred to us to take what we deem appropriate.

Article Three: The Amir and the Council of Ministers shall assume the powers granted to the National Assembly. Article Four: Laws are issued by draft decree. Article Five: The Prime Minister and ministers, each within his jurisdiction, must implement this order, and it shall come into effect once published in the official gazette. — KUNA

KUWAIT: Investing in the education of children by instilling a strong foundation in music skills from a young age can cultivate their talents and pave the way towards successful careers in music. According to Richard Bushman, emphasizing the importance of music education can lead to a future where the orchestra predominantly comprises Kuwaiti musicians, showcasing the talent and diversity within the local music scene. Under Richard Bushman's guidance, Ahmadi Music Group held a charity youth orchestra located at the Theatre of the American University of Kuwait in aid of KACCH and Bavt Abdullah.

Bushman told the Kuwait Times that the Ahmadi

Richard extended his gratitude to AUK for providing the theater free of charge and acknowledged the support received from the English School in Salmiya and Bayan Bilingual School, from which many participating students in this charity orchestra came. Ahmadi Music Group's program focuses on both teaching and performance, which has resulted in successful concerts this year.

Bushman further elaborated to the Kuwait Times

about the long-term vision: "The hardest thing in a music program is finding enough really good beginners every year. So, the Ahmadi teaching group has two sides: teaching and performing. We have done two beautiful concerts on the stage this year. Our goal is that in twenty years, our orchestra will be 80 percent Kuwaiti because these children will grow up and push us out.

That's what we expect, and that's how we work. They will become the orchestra. That's what we want for the children—to come and play with the adults sometimes to gain experience from working with adult professionals. This is our goal in Kuwait: to start with hundreds of beginners in order to find the ones who will remain in the end. There is not only one path through music; everyone is welcome to join."



UN seeks probe into Gaza mass graves

US report criticizes Zionist entity but does not block arms

UNITED NATIONS: The UN Security Council on Friday called for an immediate and independent investigation into mass graves allegedly containing hundreds of bodies near hospitals in Gaza. In a statement, members of the council expressed their "deep concern over reports of the discovery of mass graves, in and around the Nasser and Al-Shifa medical facilities in Gaza, where several hundred bodies, including women, children and older persons, were buried."

The members stressed the need for "accountability" for any violations of international law and called on investigators to be given "unimpeded access to all locations of mass graves in Gaza to conduct immediate, independent, thorough, comprehensive, transparent and impartial investigations.

Hospitals in the Gaza Strip have been repeatedly targeted since the beginning of the Zionist entity military operation in the Palestinian territory. The World Health Organization (WHO) said in April that Al-Shifa, in Gaza City, had been reduced to an "empty shell," with many bodies found in the area. The Zionist entity army has said around 200 Palestinians were killed during its military operations there. Bodies have reportedly been found buried in two graves in the hospital's courtyard.

The UN rights office in late April had itself called for an independent investigation into reports of mass graves at Al-Shifa and at the Nasser Medical Complex in Khan Yunis. Gaza officials said at the time that health workers at the Nasser complex had uncovered hundreds of bodies of Palestinians they alleged had been killed and buried by Zionist entity forces. Zionist entity's army has dismissed the claims as "baseless and unfounded." The statement Friday from the Security Council did not say who would conduct the investigations.

But it "reaffirmed the importance of allowing families to know the fate and whereabouts of their missing relatives, consistent with international humanitarian law." Zionist entity's offensive has killed at least 34,943 people in the Gaza Strip, mostly women and children, the health ministry in the Hamas-run territory said Friday.

Meanwhile, a long-awaited State Department report on Friday said that Zionist entity likely violated norms on international law in its use of US weapons but it did not find enough evidence to block shipments. The report said it was "reasonable to assess" that Zionist entity, which receives some \$3 billion in US weapons a year, has used the arms in ways inconsistent with standards on humanitarian rights but that the United States could not reach "conclusive findings."

The report had been held up for several days amid debate within the State Department on whether to reprimand Zionist entity, a historic US ally which has faced growing criticism over the toll in the seven-month Gaza war. The State Department finally submitted its report two days after President Joe Biden publicly threatened to withhold certain bombs and artillery shells if Zionist entity goes ahead with an assault on the packed city of Rafah. The report does not affect that decision, with the White House reiterating Friday that it was concerned about Zionist entity's military action around the southern Gaza city, where some 1.4 million Palestinians have taken shelter.

Biden, facing a furor over the war from within his Democratic Party months before elections, had in February issued a memorandum known as NSM-20 that asked countries that receive US military aid to make "credible and reliable" assurances they are complying with human rights laws.

"The nature of the conflict in Gaza makes it difficult to assess or reach conclusive findings on individual incidents," it said. "Nevertheless, given Zionist entity's significant reliance on US-made defense articles, it is reasonable to assess that defense articles covered under NSM-20 have been used by Zionist entity security forces since Oct 7 in instances inconsistent with its IHL obligations or with established best practices for mitigating civilian harm," it said, referring to international humanitarian law. –AFP

Released leader Kejriwal urges Indians to battle 'dictatorship'

Modi accused of targeting opponents with criminal probes during election

NEW DELHI: A top opponent of Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi urged his compatriots to resist "dictatorship" on Saturday, after the country's top court provisionally released him from jail to campaign in national elections. Arvind Kejriwal, chief minister of the capital Delhi and a key leader in an opposition alliance formed to compete against Modi in the polls, was granted bail on Friday after weeks in custody.

He is among several leaders of the bloc under criminal investigation, with his party describing his arrest as a "political conspiracy" orchestrated by the ruling Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) to sideline its opponents ahead of the vote. In a defiant press conference the day after his release, Kejriwal said the outcome of the election would determine whether India remained a democracy.

"I have come to beg 1.4 billion people to save my country," he said. "Save my country from this dictatorship." Kejriwal also personally accused the prime minister of targeting his opponents with criminal probes. "Modi has started a very dangerous mission," he said. "Modi will send all opposition leaders to jail."

Kejriwal's government was accused of corruption when it liberalized the sale of liquor in 2021 and gave up a lucrative government stake in the sector. The policy was withdrawn the following year, but the resulting probe into the alleged corrupt allocation of licenses has since led to the jailing of two top Kejriwal allies.

Rallies in support of Kejriwal, who refused to relinquish his post after his arrest, were held in numerous other big cities around India after he was taken into custody. More than 1,000 cheering supporters

greeted him as he walked free from the capital's Tihar Jail on Friday night.

Kejriwal, 55, has been chief minister for nearly a decade and first came to office as a staunch anti-corruption crusader. He had resisted multiple summons from the Enforcement Directorate, India's financial crimes agency, to be interrogated as part of the probe.

Kejriwal has consistently denied any wrongdoing since allegations of corruption were first leveled against him, including again on Saturday. "They sent me to jail and the PM says he is fighting against corruption" he said

"If you want to fight corruption, learn from Arvind Kejriwal." The Supreme Court said Friday he could temporarily leave jail to campaign in India's six-week election, on the condition that he returns to custody after the last day of voting on June 1. "No doubt, serious accusations have been made, but he has not been convicted," the court's ruling said. "He is not a threat to the society."

His release was also made conditional on his agreement not to make public comment on the case against him, not to interact with witnesses in the case and not to visit the offices of the Delhi government.

Modi's political opponents and international rights groups have long sounded the alarm on India's shrinking democratic space. US think-tank Freedom House said this year that the BJP had "increasingly used government institutions to target political opponents".

Rahul Gandhi, the most prominent member of the opposition Congress party was convicted of criminal libel last year after a complaint by a member

of Modi's party. His two-year prison sentence saw him disqualified from parliament until the verdict was suspended by a higher court, and raised concerns over democratic norms. Kejriwal and Gandhi are both leading members of an opposition alliance composed of more than two dozen parties that is jointly contesting India's election. Voting is conducted in seven phases over six weeks to ease the immense logistical burden of staging the democratic exercise in the world's most populous country. Four more rounds will be staged over the coming weeks, with results expected on June 4. — AFP

Russia claims gains in ground offensive in Kharkiv region

KHARKIV, Ukraine: Russia on Saturday said it had captured six villages in Ukraine's east during a surprise ground offensive that prompted mass evacuations, as President Volodymyr Zelensky made an urgent call for military aid. The Russian defense ministry said its troops had "liberated" five villages in Ukraine's Kharkiv region near the border with Russia—Borysivka, Ogirtseve, Pletenivka, Pylna and Strilecha—as "a result of offensive actions".

The village of Keramik in the Donetsk region was also now under Russian control, it said.

Ukrainian officials said that the country's forces were resisting but there was heavy fighting in the Kharkiv region near the border. "Fighting for villages... continues in the border area", Ukrainian military spokesman Nazar Voloshyn said on national television, while "the enemy is currently localised".

There is "heavy fighting" in the border area and 1,775 people have been evacuated, Kharkiv regional

governor Oleg Synegubov wrote on social media. He insisted there was "no threat of a ground operation" for the city of Kharkiv, Ukraine's second largest. At an arrival point for evacuees near Kharkiv, groups of people were arriving in vans and cars loaded with bags. Evacuees—many of them elderly—received food and medical assistance in makeshift tents.

One 61-year-old woman, Lyubov Nikolaieva, told AFP she had fled the border village of Lyptsi along with her 81-year-old mother.

"It's impossible to live there," said Nikolaieva, adding that her family "stayed there until the last moment". "There is constant incoming fire: those guided aerial bombs and mortar shells whistling overhead. It became very scary," she said. The Kharkiv region has been mostly under Ukrainian control since September 2022. Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelensky said troops must "return the initiative to Ukraine" and urged Kyiv's allies to speed up arms deliveries. "Every air defense system, every anti-missile system is literally what saves lives," Zelensky said. "It is important that our partners support our soldiers and Ukrainian resilience with timely deliveries—really timely ones," he stressed.

"The package that really helps is the weapons brought to Ukraine, not just the announced ones." Ukrainian forces have multiplied attacks inside Russia and Russia-held areas of Ukraine, particularly on energy infrastructure. On Saturday a missile strike hit a restaurant called Paradise in the city of Donetsk, eastern Ukraine. The attack using US HIMARS precision rocket launchers killed three civilians—two diners and a restaurant member of staff—and wounded eight, the head of the region's Russian-backed administration, Denis Pushilin, said.

Moscow-installed authorities in the Russian-occupied Lugansk region in eastern Ukraine said four people were killed by a Ukrainian strike with USmade missiles on an oil depot in Rovenky.

Governor Leonid Pasechnik said the strike "enveloped the oil depot in fire and damaged surrounding homes". In Russia, two people were reported killed by Ukrainian strikes in the Belgorod and Kursk regions. Ukrainian officials also reported a total of six civilians killed in Russian shelling in the Donetsk, Kharkiv and Kherson regions over the past day.

Officials in Kyiv had warned for weeks that Moscow might try to attack its northeastern border regions, pressing its advantage as Ukraine struggles with delays in Western aid and manpower shortages.

Ukraine's military said it had deployed more troops. "Reserve units have been deployed to strengthen the defense in these areas of the front," it said. Military expert Olivier Kempf told

While mediation efforts towards a truce and hostage release appear to stall, Hamas armed wing released a video of a captive seen alive in Gaza — the third such footage released in less than a month. The new evacuation order for eastern Rafah was, posted on social media platform X by military spokesman Avichay Adraee. The Zionist offensive has killed at least 34,971 people in Gaza, mostly women and children, according to the territory's health ministry. Nations said 1.4 million had been sheltering. Hamas in a statement said the Zionist entity's "continued control" and closure of the Rafah crossing exacerbate the "humanitarian catastrophe" in the besieged territory.

Zionist Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu has pledged to "eliminate" Hamas battalions in Rafah, after the army in January said it had dismantled the Hamas command structure in northern Gaza. But on Saturday Adraee said Hamas "is trying to rebuild" there, and ordered evacuations from the north's Jabalia refugee camp and Beit Lahia areas.

After rising criticism from Washington over the civilian impact of the Zionist entity's war against Hamas, the threat to withhold weapons was the first time Biden raised the ultimate US leverage over the Zionist entity — its military aid which totals \$3 billion annually. UN Secretary-General Antonio Guterres said Friday that Gaza risked an "epic humanitarian disaster" if the Zionist entity launched a full-scale ground operation in Rafah.

On Friday the White House said it did not yet see a "major ground operation" in Rafah but was watching the situation "with concern". Biden's administration had already paused delivery of 3,500 bombs as the Zionist entity appeared ready to attack Rafah. More than 100,000 people fled the city after the initial evacuation order, the United Nations said on Friday. — AFP

Government spokesman Zabihullah Mujahid said, "Hundreds of our fellow citizens have succumbed to these calamitous floods", in a statement posted to X earlier on Saturday. "Moreover, the deluge has wrought extensive devastation upon residential properties, resulting in significant financial losses," he added. — AFP



Arrests as police clear MIT, UPenn Gaza protests

CAMBRIDGE, Massachusetts: Police carried out predawn swoops Friday on students protesting the war in Gaza at two prestigious US universities, in the latest unrest on campuses across the country. And late Thursday, police broke up a pro-Palestinian protest at the University of Calgary in western Canada using tear gas. The police action at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT) near Boston in the northeast resulted in around 10 arrests, according to university president Sally Kornbluth, who said she had "no choice" but to dismantle the "high-risk flashpoint"

At the University of Pennsylvania in Philadelphia, officers in tactical gear forcibly removed several dozen students who had linked arms around a statue of Benjamin Franklin, NBC reported. It said they had been given two minutes to leave. Students did not resist arrest at either US university and both of those actions appeared to have been relatively peaceful.

The demonstrations have spread to campuses abroad. The clash in Canada's Alberta province pitted police in tactical gear against about 150 students at the University of Calgary. It was not immediately clear how many arrests were made, if any. At MIT, Kornbluth

offered a timeline of the weeks of protest and negotiations on the campus, culminating in four warnings to students and finally her decision to ask police to clear the encampment, which she described as a "last resort".

For the demonstrators, she wrote, the encampment "symbolized a moral commitment that trumped all other considerations, because of the immense suffering in Gaza". But for those supporting the Zionist entity, it "delivered a constant assertion, through its signs and chants, that those who believe that (the Zionist entity) has a right to exist are unwelcome at MIT. As a result, the encampment became a flashpoint."

She said those students who refused to leave were escorted "calmly" off campus before being placed under arrest. But student organizers remained defiant and scheduled an "emergency rally" Friday at 3:00 pm (1900 GMT) to protest what they said was the university's "unjust discipline, eviction & arrest". "You cannot suspend the movement. We will be back," a protest coalition wrote on Instagram.

Police have arrested more than 2,000 people nationwide in the weeks of US campus unrest. Students have been protesting the Zionist entity's war against the Palestinian group Hamas in Gaza, and demanding that their schools divest financially from US weapons manufacturers and Zionist entities. Campus authorities have sought to support the right to protest while acting against complaints of "anti-Semitism" and "hate speech" at the demonstrations. In at least one incident, counter-protesters physically attacked demonstrators at the University of California, Los Angeles. — AFP

Another 20 people were reported dead in northern Takhar province and two in neighboring Badakhshan, he added.

Iran conservatives tighten grip in parliament election

Vote to finalize makeup of conservative-dominated chamber

TEHRAN: Iran's conservatives and ultra-conservatives clinched more seats in a partial rerun of the country's parliamentary elections, official results showed Saturday, tightening their hold on the chamber. Voters had been called to cast ballots again on Friday in regions where candidates failed to gain enough votes in the March 1 election, which saw the lowest turnout -41 percent—since the 1979 Islamic Revolution.

Candidates categorized as conservative or ultra-conservative on pre-election lists won the majority of the 45 remaining seats up for grabs in the vote held in 15 of Iran's 31 provinces, according to local media. For the first time in the country, voting on Friday was a completely electronic process at eight of the 22 constituencies in Tehran and the cities of Tabriz in the northwest and Shiraz in the south, state TV said. "Usually, the participation in the second round is less than the first round," Interior Minister Ahmad Vahidi told reporters in Tehran, without specifying what the turnout was in the latest round.

"Contrary to some predictions, all the candidates had a relatively acceptable and good number of votes," he added. Elected members are to choose a speaker for the 290-seat parliament when they begin their work on May 27. In March, 25 million Iranians took part in the election out of 61 million eligible voters. The main coalition of reform parties, the Reform Front, had said ahead of the first round that it would

not participate in "meaningless, non-competitive and ineffective elections". The vote was the first since nationwide protests broke out following the September 2022 death in

Supreme leader Ayatollah Ali Khamenei was among the first to cast a ballot as voting began. "If God wishes, dear people, everyone should participate in these elections and vote. Greater participation signifies a stronger parliament," he said. In March, 25 million Iranians took part, out of 61 million eligible voters. The main coalition of reform parties, the Reform Front, had said ahead of the first round that it would not take part in "meaningless, non-competitive and ineffective elections".

The vote was the first since nationwide protests broke out following the September 2022 death in custody of Mahsa Amini, 22. Amini, an Iranian Kurd, had been arrested for allegedly flouting the Islamic republic's strict dress code for women.

Interior Minister Ahmad Vahidi on Wednesday said participation in the second round was "as important" as the first. "Those with influence among the people should encourage the nation to participate in it," he said, according to Mehr news agency.

In the 2016 parliamentary elections, first-round turnout was above 61 percent, before falling to 42.57 percent in 2020 when elections took place during the COVID pandemic. – AFP

Pyongyang to deploy new multiple rocket launcher this year

SEOUL: North Korea will equip its military with a new 240mm multiple rocket launcher starting this year, state media said Saturday, adding a "significant change" for the army's artillery combat capabilities was under way. Leader Kim Jong Un on Friday oversaw a live-fire test of the "technically updated" rocket system, Pyongyang's official Korean Central News Agency said. The announcement comes as analysts say the nuclear-armed North could be testing and ramping up production of artillery and cruise missiles before sending them to Russia for use in Ukraine.

Pyongyang in February said it had developed a new control system for its 240mm multiple rocket launcher that would lead to a "qualitative change" in its defense capabilities, and last month executed a test-firing of new shells. The updated rocket launcher will be "deployed to units of the Korean People's Army as replacement equipment from 2024 to 2026", KCNA said Saturday.

South Korea's defense ministry told AFP it could not confirm the Friday test launches. But Pyongyang said eight shells had "hit point target to intensively prove the advantage and destructive power of the updated 240mm multiple rocket launcher system". Images released by state media showed leader Kim conversing with military officials during an inspection of the launcher, as well as what appeared to be the live-fire test of the system. The tests also proved the power of the "controllable shells for (the) multiple rocket launcher", it added. The largely isolated country has recently bolstered military ties with Russia, and Pyongyang thanked Moscow last month for using its UN Security Council veto to block the renewal of a panel of UN experts that monitored international weapons sanctions on Kim's regime.

South Korea and the United States have accused North Korea of supplying weapons to Russia, despite UN sanctions banning such a move. KCNA said Saturday that Kim discussed ways to raise production of the new rocket launcher system and shells to "the highest level".

It also said a "significant change will be soon made in increasing the artillery combat ability of our army", without providing details. Inter-Korean relations are at one of their lowest points in years, with Pyongyang declaring South Korea its "principal enemy". It has jettisoned agencies dedicated to reunification and threatened war over "even 0.001 mm" of territorial infringement.

While escalating its military threats towards South Korea, the North is "also signaling its intentions to participate in weapons exports and other defense-related economic activities via ongoing technical advancements," said Yang Moo-jin, president of the University of North Korean Studies in Seoul. In the context of the ongoing conflict in Ukraine, Pyongyang has "indirectly verified the performance of its existing weapons" by supplying them to Russia, he said. – AFP

Trump's son Barron, 18, pulls out of political debut

WASHINGTON: Donald Trump's youngest son Barron, 18, on Friday stepped back from his planned political debut, withdrawing as a delegate at the Republican Party convention in July. Barron, who has been largely shielded from the public eye, made global headlines this week when it appeared he would be the latest member of the Trump family to enter the political arena. But a statement from the office of his mother Melania Trump, the former president's third wife, soon put a stop to the convention plan. "While Barron is honored to have been chosen as a delegate by the Florida Republican Party, he regretfully declines to participate due to prior commitments," it said. —AFP

Ex-I Coast leader Gbagbo candidate for election he banned from

ABIDJAN: Former Ivory Coast president Laurent Gbagbo was named on Friday as his party's candidate for a 2025 presidential election even though he is banned from running because of a 20-year jail term. Gbagbo, the West African nation's president from 2000 to 2011, was the first former head of state to face a crimes against humanity trial at the International Criminal Court in The Hague where he was acquitted in 2019. The 78-year-old was however ordered jailed for 20 years in 2018 for his role in the looting of a bank. He was pardoned in 2022 but still cannot run for public office. His African Peoples' Party-Ivory Coast (PPA-CI) still named him their candidate on Friday. — AFP

Ex-Peru president Fujimori says he has tongue cancer


LIMA: Former Peruvian president Alberto Fujimori, released from prison in December after serving 16 years for crimes against humanity, said on Friday he had been diagnosed with a malignant tongue tumor. President from 1990 to 2000, Fujimori has been in poor health and was freed for humanitarian reasons after only serving part of his 25-year sentence. Fujimori, now 85, was sent to prison in 2009 over massacres committed by army death squads in 1991 and 1992 in which 25 people, including a child, were killed in supposed anti-terrorist operations. "Now that I've regained my freedom, I face a new battle," Fujimori said in a video posted on social media platform X. –AFP

Virginia school board restores Confederate names

WASHINGTON: A Virginia school board voted Friday to restore the names of Civil War Southern generals to two schools, four years after they were removed following a wave of protests for racial justice. The move by the Shenandoah County school board, in a five to one vote, bucks a nationwide trend of striking the names of prominent figures in the pro-slavery Confederacy from schools, US military bases and monuments. Honey Run Elementary School will once again be known as Ashby-Lee Elementary, while Mountain View High School will go back to being Stonewall Jackson High. – AFP

Madagascan leader's former aide jailed in UK for graft

LONDON: The former chief of staff of Madagascan President Andry Rajoelina was sentenced to three and a half years in jail for bribery on Friday at a British court. Romy Andrianarisoa, 47, was convicted in February of seeking a bribe from a British mining company to secure licenses to operate in the island republic off the southeastern coast of Africa. Andrianarisoa denied the accusations after being charged in August last year alongside her associate, 54-year-old French national Philippe Tabuteau. He pleaded guilty in September. Handing down the sentence, judge Christopher Butcher said Andrianarisoa played a "leading role in the enterprise" and "abused" a position of "significant trust and responsibility". – AFP

PORTO ALEGRE: The skies opened once again Friday in southern Brazil, offering little respite for those whose homes have been swallowed by floodwaters, while the number of people forced to evacuate doubled in 24 hours.

Residents of the state of Rio Grande do Sul were bracing for a weekend of heavy rainfall, hitting just as waters that turned city streets into rivers had begun to subside. The deluge—which experts link to climate change exacerbated by the El Nino weather phenomenon—has affected almost two million people, leaving 126 dead and 756 injured.

Another 141 people are still missing, according to authorities. The state capital Porto Alegre, home to 1.4 million inhabitants, tried to resume some normalcy on Friday, with some businesses opening and traffic blocking streets as waters receded. But then, the menacing grey clouds delivered a fresh downpour.

The region expects precipitation with "intense winds and hail," according to the National Institute of Meteorology. The MetSul Meteorologia site reported "a new period of intense atmospheric instability," with up to 200 mm (7.9 inches) of rain by Monday.

The state's Guaiba River, which runs through Porto Alegre, reached historic levels this week. In the past 24 hours, the number of people forced to flee their homes almost doubled to around 411,000 people, according to civil defense figures. More than 71,000 are being housed in shelters. With water supplies still cut, bottles of clean drinking water are a scarce commodity in Porto Alegre, while tanker trucks deliver to shelters and hospitals.

In the devastated town of Eldorado do Sul, boats pass through the flooded streets, carrying food to those who refuse to leave their homes, fearing looting.

Katiane Mello waited for a boat to take her to check on her home, which she fled a week ago when the Guaiba River overflowed and waters rose to the second floor of the house where she lived with her husband and five-year-old daughter.

"We lost our source of livelihood, our store. And the house..." she said, her eyes filling with tears as she surveyed the damage. The muddy floodwaters have destroyed more than 85,000 homes, and struck a blow to the economy of the important agricultural region.

In the rice-growing areas surrounding Porto Alegre, farmer Daniel Dalbosco said he had lost crops under "up to two meters of water." His neighbors "lost between 40 and 50 hectares (100 and 125 acres). It was very, very complicated," he said. The disaster in Rio Grande do Sul is the result of the "double whammy of El Nino plus climate change," said Clare Nullis, spokeswoman for the UN meteorology agency WMO, at a media briefing in Geneva.

"Even when El Nino fades, which it will do, the long-term effects of climate change are with us. Every fraction of a degree in temperature increase means that our weather will become more extreme.

"Our weather is on steroids. When we are at war with nature ... nature strikes back, and nature has unfortunately, you know, hit back in Brazil." —AFP

'Miracle' survivor found 5 days after S Africa collapse

JOHANNESBURG: Rescuers and onlookers cheered and applauded Saturday as a survivor was rescued after 116 hours from underneath the rubble of a collapsed building in South Africa, with the tragedy having killed at least 13.

"It is a miracle that we have all been hoping for" provincial premier Alan Winde said on X. An apartment block under construction in the southern city of George crumbled Monday afternoon while a crew of 81 were on site. "When we went down to the side of the slab we had uncovered, we heard somebody inside and we stopped all the heavy operations," Colin Deiner, head of rescue operations, told reporters. Rescuers then called out to the survivor and he spoke back, Deiner said.

"He indicated to us that he's got weight on his legs, and we're very concerned about that after such a long period of time." After several hours, the survivor was extricated and rushed to a hospital. Rescue teams have been working against time ever since the structure came crashing down.—AFP

N Korean hackers stole court data: S Korean police

SEOUL: North Korean hackers stole sensitive data, including individuals' financial records, from a South Korean court computer network over two years, Seoul police said Saturday. The nuclear-armed North is known to operate an army of thousands of hackers operating both inside the largely isolated country and apparently overseas, and has been blamed for several major cyberattacks in the past.

South Korean national police said the hackers pilfered 1,014 gigabytes of data from a court's computer system from January 2021 to February 2023, citing a joint investigation with the country's spy agency and prosecutors.

The hackers' malware transmitted stolen data, including South Koreans' marriage and personal debt records, to "four domestic and four overseas servers" before it was finally "detected by antivirus software", the national police said in a statement sent to AFP.

The data breach was found to be the work of a North Korean hacking outfit after authorities compared the detected malicious programs, server payment details and IP addresses with those identified in earlier hacking cases attributed to Pyongyang.—AFP

UK economy exits recession in pre-vote boost for PM Sunak

GDP expands 0.6% in Q4 with strong growth in services and car manufacturing

LONDON: Britain has emerged from a short-lived recession with better-than-expected growth in the first quarter, official data showed Friday, boosting embattled Prime Minister Rishi Sunak before this year's general election.

Gross domestic product expanded 0.6 percent in the first three months of this year, the Office for National Statistics (ONS) said, with strong growth in services and car manufacturing. That beat market expectations of 0.4-percent growth and sent London's stock market to a fresh record peak, with sentiment buoyed also by the Bank of England (BoE) on Thursday signaling an interest-rate cut in the summer. Sunak—whose governing Conservatives are trailing the main opposition Labour Party in polls before a general election—has made growth one of his top priorities.

The economy contracted slightly for two quarters in a row in the second half of 2023, meeting the technical definition of a recession that was caused by elevated inflation that has prolonged a cost-of-living crisis. "There is no doubt it has been a difficult few years, but today's growth figures are proof that the economy is returning to full health for the first time since the pandemic," said finance minister Jeremy Hunt. Labour finance spokesperson Rachel Reeves slammed the government's stewardship of the economy.


"From no growth to low growth—is that really the scale of the Conservatives' ambitions? Food prices are still high, families are paying more on their monthly mortgage bills and working people are worse off," she said. Richard Carter, head of fixed interest research at wealth manager Quilter Cheviot, said the UK was "clearly entering a more optimistic period".

"The government will be hoping to take advantage of this in the lead up to the general election," he added. Susannah Streeter, head of money and markets at Hargreaves Lansdown, said that the UK economy "has jogged out of recession" after output shrank 0.3 percent in the final quarter of last year and by 0.1 percent in the prior three months.



MUMBAI: Air India's budget subsidiary said its cabin crew had ended a strike that caused two days of severe disruptions to its flight schedule and stranded passengers at airports across the country. The airline was taken over by Indian conglomerate Tata Group in 2022 after a government effort to privatize the heavily indebted carrier. Media reports linked the sudden industrial action to simmering staff discontent over new policies on hiring and promotion imposed by its new ownership.

Dozens of Air India Express cabin crew staff called in sick at the last minute from Tuesday night, forcing the airline to delay or cancel at least 175 flights in the following days. In a statement issued Thursday night, an airline spokesperson said the airline was working to "swiftly restore" its schedule af-



COTONOU, Benin: In the heart of Cotonou's large Dantokpa market, Diane Makpenon's family corn shop is less busy than usual these days. The business run by her mother like others in Benin's economic capital has been slowing down as they struggle with rising prices. The price of a kilo (2.2 pounds) of corn, one of the country's most widely consumed foods, rose from 200 CFA francs (0.30 euro cents) to 450 CFA francs, before falling again to 400 CFA francs within a few days, according to traders.

A 120-kilo bag is now sold for between 33,000 (about 50 euros, nearly \$54) and 36,000 CFA francs compared to barely 30,000 CFA francs before. The increase in food costs in the small West African nation prompted Benin's labor unions to call for an unprecedented series of protests against the cost of living—the first was dispersed by police firing tear gas and a second banned by the authorities. A third planned for Cotonou on Saturday has been granted authorization by city officials.

Benin's consumer prices and economy have been hit by fallout from the Ukraine war and by the closure of the border with major trading partner Niger to the north following a coup there last July. Neighboring Nigeria's naira currency devaluation and abrupt end of a decades-long fuel subsidy have also impacted Benin's fuel prices and trade.

"Going to the market has become torture. Everything costs us so much that we are helpless," said Roberte Akododja, 42, owner of a bistro in Cotonou's popular Gbegamey district. "Even in restaurants, you have to pay more for usual meals or settle for small portions," said Delphin Agossohou, a private administration executive.

Camille Segbedji, one of the leaders of the National Union of Secondary Teachers and Administrative Personnel of Benin (SYNEPAS), criticized the ab-

New Delhi airport saw chaotic scenes Wednesday after the strike began as agitated passengers waited for updates on delayed and cancelled flights, according to local media.

Air India Express said in a statement earlier that it had made "every possible effort to minimize the inconvenience caused to our guests" but had been forced to cancel 85 flights on Thursday. "We urge our guests booked to fly with us to check if their flight is affected by the disruption before heading to the airport," it added.

More than 90 other flights had been "disrupted" since Tuesday by the resulting staff shortages, the airline said in a separate statement on Wednesday, without clarifying whether they had been delayed or cancelled. Chief executive Aloke Singh said Wednesday that the airline had been forced to curtail its flight schedules over the coming days. "Since last evening, over 100 of our cabin crew colleagues have reported sick prior to their rostered flight duty, at the last minute, severely disrupting our operations," Singh said. "This act is certainly not representative of the 2,000-odd cabin crew colleagues in the company who continue to respond to the call of duty." — AFP

Latest data showed UK annual inflation fell less than expected in March to 3.2 percent, keeping it well above the BoE's two-percent target. The rate, however, has come down sharply from a four-decade high above 11 percent in late 2022, when energy and food prices soared following Russia's invasion of Ukraine. — AFP

US to raise tariffs on Chinese electric vehicles: Report

WASHINGTON: The United States is planning to increase tariffs on Chinese clean energy goods, news reports said Friday, with levies on electric vehicles expected to roughly quadruple. The move, reported by the Wall Street Journal, comes at the end of a long-awaited review of tariffs that were imposed during a trade war between Washington and Beijing.

Then-president Donald Trump imposed tariffs on some \$300 billion in goods from China. Officials have since initiated a review of the actions, with the US Trade Representative required to look into the impact of the levies—first introduced in 2018 -- after four years. A decision, expected on the coming Tuesday according to news reports, would come as President Joe Biden gears up for a rematch with Trump in November's presidential election.

Last month, he urged for a tripling on tariffs for Chinese steel and aluminum as he courted blue-collar voters in the battleground state of Pennsylvania. In particular, higher tariffs are set to impact critical minerals and solar goods as well as batteries from China, said the Wall Street Journal. The tariff rate on EVs is also due to rise from 25 percent to around 100 percent, the report added.

This is unlikely to deal an immediate blow to Chinese EV companies, which do not have a large presence in the United States due to existing levies. But officials appear to be guarding against Chinese imports. Treasury Secretary Janet Yellen recently warned against overcapacity in China, which risks a flood of below-cost goods in the global market, potentially impacting burgeoning US industries. — AFP

Frankfurt, London and Paris stocks close at records

PARIS: Europe's leading stock exchanges closed at record levels on Friday as investors looked forward to cuts in interest rates. The Amsterdam, Frankfurt, London and Paris stock exchanges all closed at their highest ever levels.

The London and Frankfurt stock exchanges hit new records at the open Friday as data showed the UK emerged from recession in the first quarter. The British capital's FTSE 100 index advanced 0.5 percent to 8,426.95 points. Frankfurt's DAX also rose about 0.5 percent to 18,773.30 points in early deals before slightly paring down some gains.

Both exchanges had jumped to record peaks on Thursday after the Bank of England maintained its interest rate at a 16-year high but signaled that cuts were on their way. The Paris CAC 40 stock index climbed to a new all-time high Friday, joining London and Frankfurt which also hit fresh records earlier in the day. The French stock exchange gained 0.8 percent to 8,256.62 points in later morning deals, beating its previous record set on March 28, as hopes of interest-rate cuts sent European markets higher. — AFP

sence of a "fair agricultural policy" from the government in the face of declining purchasing power. The World Bank said Benin's economy in 2023 was still resilient despite the external economic shocks the country had to weather.

At a cabinet meeting this week, the government temporarily suspended shipments of cereals outside the country in a bid to ease pressure on prices.

Political protests have become less common in Benin since President Patrice Talon came to power in 2016, with some major opposition leaders either in exile or jailed. Critics regularly accuse the cotton magnate of taking an authoritarian turn in a country once praised as a beacon of pluralism in West Africa.

Protesting over high costs, the main unions organized a demonstration in Cotonou on April 27 which was banned by the police who used tear gas to break up the rally. Nearly 30 demonstrators and leaders of the trade union movement were arrested on that day,

before being released a little later. "The workers are struggling to make themselves heard. We have demands, but no way of expressing them," explained nurse Arsene Olory-Togbe, aged 48.

On May 1, the Confederation of Benin Workers' Unions (CSTB Benin), the country's main trade union, rallied in a new demonstration, which was immediately banned by the authorities. This time, 72 demonstrators were arrested, including 21 placed in pre-trial detention for cannabis consumption.

"Our motivations relate to the unhappiness among citizens today. The high cost of living and the decline in purchasing power," said Anselme Amoussou, general secretary of CSA Benin, the country's second largest trade union organization. Despite the ban and cancellation of demonstrations in recent days, trade unionists have once again called on the population to protest against the high cost of living on May 11 in the economic capital of Benin. —AFP

Chip giant TSMC's April revenue jumps 60% on-year

TAIPEI: Taiwanese chip giant TSMC said on Friday that April revenue jumped nearly 60 percent on-year, riding a huge wave of demand for the advanced semiconductors used in AI hardware. Taiwan Semiconductor Manufacturing Company controls more than half the world's output of chips, and supplies them for everything from Apple's iPhones to Nvidia's cutting-edge artificial intelligence hardware.

Consolidated revenue for April was "approximately NT\$236.02 billion (US\$7.2 billion)... an increase of 59.6 percent from April 2023", the firm said in a statement. This compares with a 34.3 percent on-year jump in March. The company said last month that first-quarter revenue increased 13 percent on-year to US\$18.87 billion, and expects a 27.6 percent rise in the second. The wild success of OpenAI's ChatGPT has sparked an AI gold rush, with demand surging around the world for the cutting-edge chips needed to train and run AI services.

TSMC dominates the global chip industry, and the bulk of its fabrication plants are based in Taiwan, a self-ruled island that is claimed by neighboring China. Beijing has said it would not rule out the use of force to bring Taiwan under its control, and has in recent years ramped up pressure by sending in record-breaking numbers of warplanes and naval vessels around the island.

The semiconductor supply chain is highly vulnerable to shocks, and concerned governments have lobbied TSMC to move more production away from Taiwan. The United States in particular has made a huge push, passing the Chips and Science Act in 2022 to overhaul the semiconductor industry on American soil. US Commerce Secretary Gina Raimondo said Wednesday during a US House hearing on the department's budget that an invasion of Taiwan by China and a seizure of TSMC would be "absolutely devastating" to the American economy.—AFP

BBVA's takeover bid for rival faces obstacle course

MADRID: The hostile takeover bid launched by Spanish banking giant BBVA for its smaller rival Banco Sabadell has sparked a political uproar in the country. The operation announced on Thursday would have to overcome a series of regulatory hurdles before it could be completed, making its success uncertain. Here are some of the key challenges the deal faces:

BBVA is offering an exchange of one if its shares for every 4.83 Sabadell shares, a 30-percent premium over the April 29 closing price of both banks. Sabadell has said this "significantly undervalues" its value. It accuses BBVA of breaching takeover rules since it provided "incomplete information that could affect the market". Spain's fourth-largest bank has reported its concerns to stock market regulator CNMV.

BBVA Chair Carlos Torres Vila played down this opposition on Thursday, saying he had been contacted by shareholders in favor of the deal. But Sabadell's capital is held by multiple of investors, none of them holding more than 5.0 percent of the lender, making the takeover unpredictable since many players must

Economy Minister Carlos Cuerpo has warned his leftist government "will have the last word when it comes to authorizing the operation" which he said would be "potentially damaging" for the economy.

Cuerpo did not detail what steps the government can take but Labour Minister Yolanda Diaz said Spanish banking supervision law allowed it "to authorize or not authorize this type of operation".

This hostile takeover bid, the first in the Spanish banking sector in nearly four decades, is "extremely risky" for the economy and against the country's "interests", she added. The takeover bid has also come up against hostility in Catalonia, the northeastern region where Sabadell originated and has a strong

presence, and the neighboring region of Valencia where it currently has its headquarters.

They both fear a reduction in the number of branches, which they say would be detrimental to businesses and individuals. Pere Aragones, a moderate separatist who heads the regional government of Catalonia, has said the takeover bid could "weaken the economic weight" of the region. The issue has been in focus in the final days of campaigning for Sunday's regional election in Catalonia, with parties across the political spectrum voicing concerns. "For some time, there's been a strategy to kill the Catalan banking industry," former Catalan president Carles Puigdemont, the head of hardline separatist party JxCat who led Catalonia's failed 2017 secession bid, wrote on X. The hostile offer "must be responded to with full force, with all the law and with all reason," he added.

Spain's two main trade union confederations, the UGT and Comisiones Obreras, have also sounded the alarm over possible job losses. Workers must not "pay the cost of this operation," the UGT warned. Asked about these concerns at a news conference on Thursday, BBVA Chair Carlos Torres Vila ruled out any "traumatic measures" for employees and highlighted the career opportunities the merger would create. But he did not rule out any staff cuts. BBVA employs around 121,000 people worldwide, while Sabadell has some 19,000 workers.

The main obstacle for BBVA lies with supervisors. The operation needs the green light from the European Central Bank, Spanish stock market regulator CNMV and the competition authorities in the countries where the two lenders operate. The Spanish banking sector is already highly concentrated, with 56 percent of the market in the hands of three groups—Santander, BBVA and Caixabank.

This "rate would rise to 64 percent" if BBVA's takeover bid is successful, which could lead to a "significant reduction in competition," according to broker XTB. The operation will take up to eight months to complete, according to BBVA. "There is going to be a war of attrition," economist Javier Santacruz told Spanish public radio, adding BBVA will have to do a great deal of "persuasion" to be successful. – AFP

Airports in spat over right to use name 'San Francisco'

LOS ANGELES: Lawsuits are flying in a dispute between two California airports over the right to use the name "San Francisco"—despite neither of them being in the city. San Francisco International Airport (SFO) is suing the recently renamed San Francisco Bay Oakland International Airport (OAK), insisting the similar sounding names might confuse potential passengers.

Their lawsuit has been met with a counterclaim from The Port of Oakland asking a judge to rule its airport's new moniker—which replaced "Metropolitan Oakland International Airport"—is not a copyright infringement. "Changing 'Metropolitan' to 'San Francisco Bay' in Oakland Airport's name accurately describes OAK's geographic location on the Bay and presents the airport as an additional choice for travel into the San Francisco Bay Area," said port attorney Mary Richardson on Thursday, announcing the lawsuit.—AFP

Beach Boys' **Brian Wilson** placed under conservatorship

each Boys founder Brian Wilson has been placed under a conservatorship by a Los Angeles judge, following his struggles with dementia and the recent loss of his wife. Wilson, 81, regarded by many as a singular musical genius, has required help with his daily life since his diagnosis, which was publicly revealed last year.

Shortly after the death of his wife Melinda in January, Wilson's family asked the court for his business manager LeeAnn Hard, as well as his publicist and manager Jean Sievers, to be appointed to manage his personal and medical affairs. Their legal guardianship was approved at Los Angeles County Superior Court on Thursday by Judge Gus May, who said Wilson suffers from a "major neurocognitive disorder" and is "unable to care" for himself, according to US media.

In a statement posted on his website earlier this year, Wilson's family said a conservatorship would ensure that "Brian and the children living at home will be taken care of and remain in the home where they are cared for."

Wilson has seven children, who must be consulted on all healthcare decisions. His finances are already held in a trust, Rolling Stone reported.

A towering figure in the world of music, Wilson was responsible almost single-handedly for the California sound pioneered by the Beach Boys in the 1960s. His signature blend of easy-sounding pop, underlaid by complex harmonies and often deeply poetic lyrics, elevated the band far beyond its disposable surfsong image.

The five-piece lineup melded innovative vocalizing with the driving rhythms of rock and roll, and used unconventional recording techniques to create an instantly recognizable sound.

Wilson's ferocious talent was, at times, overshadowed by mental health that throughout his adult life.

In 1964, he suffered a breakdown while on tour, forcing him to focus on recording, but heralding a period of extreme creativity that produced "Pet Sounds" -- since hailed as one of the best and most influential albums in pop music history -- among others.

Wilson's experiments with drugs were coupled with bouts of depression and auditory hallucinations, as well as a diagnosis of schizoaffective disorder and bipolar disorder, according to a biographer. - AFP

Oscars Academy, at pivotal point, launches \$500m fundraising drive

he Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences on Friday launched a \$500 million fundraising drive, pegged to the upcoming centenary of the Oscars. Named Academy100 -- ahead of the 100th Oscars ceremony, set for 2028 -- the drive is intended to diversify finances for the group, which plays a key role in fostering new filmmakers and preserving movies, as well as handing out the annual Academy Awards.

It comes at a time when viewership of the Oscars has drastically shrunk, and as the Academy's lucrative, long-standing broadcast deal with ABC for the ceremony telecast is nearing its end. "The Academy will soon enter its second century, and we want to ensure that we continue to be the preeminent leader of our international film community," said Academy CEO Bill Kramer, in a statement.

"Like all healthy organizations, the Academy needs a sustainable and diverse base of support," he added.

Sponsors have already committed more than \$100 million to the campaign, the Academy said. The Academy's members -- there are around 10,000 -- are invited to join based on their filmmaking achievements. They range from directors and producers to A-list actors and visual effects artists.

Membership has become increasingly international and diverse in recent years. Academy100 is intended to "deepen our worldwide reach and impact," said Kramer. The group also launched the popular Academy Museum of Motion Pictures in Los Angeles in 2021.-AFP





■rom film to fashion, former teen actor Zendaya has emerged as one of the few bona fide A-list superstars of her generation, thanks to a stunning recent run of hits on both the screen and the red carpet. The 27-yearold American leads two of Hollywood's highest profile movies of the year so far -- "Dune: Part Two" and "Challengers" -- while also finding time to co-host New York's Met gala earlier this week.

Her appearance in two separate dazzling outfits at the annual showbiz summit in Manhattan set social media ablaze, and wowed critics who increasingly refer to Zendaya as a "fashion That is just the latest accolade in a career that has seen Zendaya become the youngest lead actress in a drama winner at the Emmys, with "Euphoria," release a musical album, star in multiple Marvel superhero movies, and move into producing.

"To me, Zendaya is a thousand years old. She has already lived many lives before this one. And yet, she is as young as springtime," Zendaya's "Dune" director Denis Villeneuve told Time Magazine in 2022. "She is timeless, and she can do it all," said Villeneuve, calling Zendaya "a cultural icon in the making.

Born Zendaya Coleman in California in 1996, the future star initially struggled with extreme shyness, according to her parents, who are both teachers. After trying her hand at sports including basketball, Zendaya discovered a passion for the stage. Her mother Claire worked a second job at a theater in Oakland.

"She would beg me to bring her to technical rehearsals," recalled her mother, in a 2021 interview. Noting her transformation on stage, Zendaya's par-

ents decided to take her to Los Angeles for auditions. Aged 14, she landed a role in Disney Channel series "Shake It Up." More success quickly followed, as she released a self-titled pop album in 2013, before making her big-screen debut in superhero smash hit "Spider-Man: Homecoming."

She played the role of MJ, the girlfriend of Peter Parker/Spider-Man, played by English actor Tom Holland.

As the film spawned sequels, the pair became -- and remain -- a couple in real life

'Euphoria'

But it was Zendaya's role in dark HBO teen drama "Euphoria" that established her as a formidable, grown-up star. She played the show's main character Rue, a troubled youth plagued by addiction and self-destructive behavior.

The role earned her the prestigious lead actress in a drama Emmy at 24, and she repeated the award two years later. Between those wins, Zendaya appeared in Villeneuve's first "Dune" movie, in a small part that was nonetheless highlighted in the movie's marketing. Villeneuve praised Zendaya's "authenticity"

as "a new superpower," and she features heavily in the sequel, which came out in March and has earned \$700 million glob-

Her other major role this year, "Challengers," casts Zendaya as a tennis prodigy at the center of a love triangle in which rivalry, friendship and lust intertwine. Zendaya also produced the movie, having been sent the script while shooting "Euphoria" and "falling in love" with the character of Tashi. "It's a female character that doesn't have to be likable and doesn't care about you liking her and doesn't ask for forgiveness... that was refreshing to me," she told a press conference. Zendaya dazzled the red carpet at premieres for both films, in a cyborg outfit for sci-fi "Dune" and wearing courtside chic for "Challengers."

Outspoken For now, Zendaya has stepped away from her music career. Asked last month, she expressed distaste for the business side of the music industry, before adding that she would "maybe put out a little song" in the future. She remains focused and outspoken on issues of diversity and representation. During her later teen years at Disney, Zendaya pushed for the inclusion of a Black family in the series "K.C. Undercover." She has been openly criticized beauty standards and race in the entertainment industry. "I am Hollywood's... acceptable version of a Black girl, and that has to change," said Zendaya, whose mother is white and whose father is Black, in one interview. "As a light-skinned Black woman, it's important that I'm using my privilege, my platform, to show you how much beauty there is in the African-American community."—AFP

The Instagram posts come weeks after the couple were spotted in Hawaii, with Hailey wearing a flowing dress that covered up her usually svelte figure, sparking online speculation that she

might be expecting. Entertainment outlet TMZ quoting "sources with direct knowledge" said the pregnancy was over six months along. Bieber first shot to global stardom as a teen pop sensation in 2009, since then churning out hits that included the mega-selling "Baby", featuring rapper Ludacris, and "Somebody to Love."-AFP

FIRST 'EXTREME' SOLAR STORM IN 20 YEARS BRINGS SPECTACULAR AURORAS

he most powerful solar storm in more than two decades struck Earth on Friday, triggering spectacular celestial light shows from Tasmania to Britain -- and threatening possible disruptions to satellites and power grids as it persists into the weekend.

The first of several coronal mass ejections (CMEs) -- expulsions of plasma and magnetic fields from the Sun -- came just after 1600 GMT, according to the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA)'s Space Weather Prediction Center.

It was later upgraded to an "extreme" geomagnetic storm -- the first since the "Halloween Storms" of October 2003 caused blackouts in Sweden and damaged power infrastructure in South Africa. More CMEs are expected to pummel the planet in the coming days. Social media lit up with people posting pictures of auroras from northern Europe and Australasia.

"We've just woken the kids to go watch the Northern Lights in the back garden! Clearly visible with the naked eye," lain Mansfield in Hertford, England, told AFP.

That sense of wonder was shared in Australia's island state of Tasmania. "Absolutely biblical skies in Tasmania at 4am this morning. I'm leaving today and knew I could not pass up this opportunity," photographer Sean O' Riordan posted on social media platform X alongside a photo.

Authorities notified satellite operators, airlines and the power grid to take precautionary steps for potential disruptions caused by changes to Earth's magnetic field. Unlike solar flares, which travel at the speed of light and reach Earth in around eight minutes, CMEs travel at a more sedate pace, with officials putting the current average at 800 kilometers (500 miles) per

The CMEs emanated from a massive sunspot cluster that is 17 times

Officials said people should have the normal backup plans in place for power outages, such as having flashlights, batteries and radios at hand.



Nuggets, Pacers claw back in NBA conference semi-finals

In Indianapolis, Haliburton scores 35 points

LOS ANGELES: The NBA champion Denver Nuggets roared back into their Western Conference semi-final series with Minnesota with a 117-90 victory over the Timberwolves on Friday as the Indiana Pacers clawed back a game against the New York Knicks. NBA Most Valuable Player Nikola Jokic and Jamal Murray scored 24 points apiece, with Jokic adding 14 rebounds and nine assists for the Nuggets, who cut the deficit in their best-of-seven series to 2-1.

Denver dispelled any suggestion they would bow out quietly after they were humbled by the young Timberwolves in games one and two in Denver. The Pacers, who dropped the first two games of their Eastern Conference semi-final series in New York, also avoided an 0-3 hole with a 111-106 victory over the Knicks in Indianapolis.

"Everybody knows what it looks like when you go down 3-0," Pacers star Tyrese Haliburton said, a nod to the fact that no NBA team has rallied from that deficit to win a playoff series. "We had to come out play desperate, play hard," added Haliburton, whose Pacers will now try to level the series at home on Sunday. Denver will try to pull level on Sunday in Minneapolis, where Jokic said the Nuggets went into the contest determined to "play like a champion."

"I think we played much simpler," Jokic told broadcaster ESPN. "We were aggressive, more aggressive than them, and I think that's definitely the thing that changed the game." Murray, who scored just 25 points over the first two games and was fined \$100,000 for letting his frustration boil over and throwing a heating pad onto the court during game two, connected on 11 of 21 shots and came up with three steals. "Our guys answered the bell," Nuggets coach Michael Malone

said. "They showed me that they still believe."

Michael Porter Jr. added 21 points as all five Nuggets starters scored in double figures against a T'Woves team that coach Chris Finch called "sluggish" and "slow". Anthony Edwards led Minnesota with 19 points. Karl-Anthony Towns scored 14, but the Timberwolves didn't play with the pace that overwhelmed the Nuggets in Denver. They trailed by as many as 34 points, to the dismay of fans at the Target Center who were eager to see the kind of show the Timberwolves had put on in

Denver. "Not a lot of good things on either end of the floor, really," Finch said.

In Indianapolis, Haliburton scored 35 points and Andrew Nembhard emerged as an unlikely hero, draining a three-pointer from deep as the shot clock was running down to put the Pacers ahead 109-106 with 17.8 seconds left to play. It was just his second basket of the night, but it turned the tide for good in a physical, back-and-forth battle in which the Pacers surrendered an early 12-point lead and rallied from nine down in the fourth quarter.

"I put (Nembhard) in kind of a bad situation and he just made an unbelievable shot," said Haliburton, who passed to Nembhard with just four seconds on the shot clock after finding himself unable to get a shot off in the face of a swarming Knicks defense. "Big, big shot," Haliburton said. "He really stepped up to the moment when we needed him most." Haliburton had six of Indiana's 12 three-pointers. Pascal Siakam scored 26 points and Myles Turner added 21 and 10 rebounds for Indiana. The banged-up Knicks, already missing Julius Randle, Mitchell Robinson and Bojan Bogdanovic, were also without OG Anunoby after he suffered a hamstring strain in game two.

Knicks star Jalen Brunson, who wasn't confirmed to start until after pre-game warm-ups after hurting his right foot on Wednesday, got off to a slow start, but New York briefly pulled ahead in the second quarter - foreshadowing a third-quarter surge that saw them take a 90-85 lead into the final period. Donte DiVincenzo led the Knicks scoring with 35 points, connecting on seven of 11 from three-point range. Brunson finished with 26 points and six assists, hitting a game-tying

Lomachenko unruffled by brash Kambosos ahead of title fight

PERTH: Ukrainian boxing great Vasiliy Lomachenko brushed aside rival George Kambosos' taunts of sending him into "retirement" ahead of their lightweight world title fight on Sunday in Perth. The 36-year-old Lomachenko (17-3, 11 knockouts) is in the twilight of a glittering career that boasts three division professional world titles and two Olympic gold medals. He's also regarded as the greatest ever amateur having compiled an incredible 396-1 record.

Lomachenko is a heavy favourite to claim the vacant IBF lightweight world title, but will have to contend with the brash Australian who will have a soldout 15,000 crowd right behind him at an expected febrile RAC Arena. "When I beat Lomachenko, there'll be no more road for him to go," the heavily tattooed Kambosos told reporters during the week. "This is retirement for him, I truly believe it."

Lomachenko was unruffled by former champion Kambosos' barbs, but remained coy over his future. "I have heard this not for the first time. I am not surprised. We will see what happens," he said. "Nobody knows (about his future). I don't know what will happen after this fight and how my body will be." Both fighters have a point to prove after mixed results in recent years. Lomachenko failed in his bid to become the undisputed lightweight champion after a contentious unanimous decision loss to American Devin Haney in Las Vegas last year.

Kambosos shocked the world in 2021 after stunning Teofimo Lopez at Madison Square Garden in one of boxing's biggest upsets. But he crashed back to earth after consecutive losses to Haney prompted critics to dub Kambosos a one-hit wonder. An unconvincing and controversial win over England's Maxi Hughes last year did little to alter his reputation. A motivated Kambosos (21-2, 10 knockouts) believes victory over Lomachenko, once considered the world's best pound-for-pound boxer, will finally cement his legacy. At 5-foot-9 (1.75m), he is two inches taller than his opponent and also considerably younger at 30 years of age. Kambosos and Lomachenko were comfortably under the 135-pound limit at Saturday's weigh-in ahead of a 12-round showdown that has been a long

After plans in 2019 failed to materialize, a slated fight three years later was scuppered when Lomachenko returned home to his family due to Russia's invasion of Ukraine. The anticipation boiled over during the week when Lomachenko and Kambosos had to be separated after two stare downs lasted more than three minutes each. They were particularly intense square offs even in a sport known for its theatrics. "This is destiny. —AFP

Pogacar turns screw on Giro with stage 7 time trial win

ROME: Slovenian rider Tadej Pogacar won stage 7 of the Giro d'Italia, a 40-kilometre time trial, to extend his race lead in Perugia on Friday. Pogacar, who had already won stage 2, finished 17 seconds ahead of Italian time-trial specialist Filippo Ganna and two minutes in front of his great rival, Welsh rider Geraint Thomas. The UAE Team Emirates team leader is now 2min 36sec ahead of Colombian rider Daniel Martinez

"I prepared well for this time trial and worked a lot on the time trials, my position on the time-trial bike," said Pogacar. "I felt good after the world championships last year, today was my first race on the time-trial bike again. "It was a lot of preparation for this and a lot of ups and downs since last year in the time trial so I'm super happy that today I felt good." After Ganna set a testing time of 52:01 all eyes were on Martinez, who began the day 47sec off the lead, Thomas, who was one second ahead of him, and Pogacar. While Thomas, who turns 38 on May 25, and Martinez struggled to chew up the tarmac between Foligno and Perugia, Pogacar shifted into overdrive clocking 51.44 at an average speed of 47.1 km/h.

Only 11th at the halfway point, 44 seconds behind Ganna, Pogacar finished very strongly indeed, taking advantage of the last six kilometers of uphill sections to knock out the competition. "I remained cautious until the last climb when I gave it my all," he said, admitting he did not have a lot of information from the team car. "I heard only two times the time gap, and also I wasn't so sure what they said on the radio. I was just focusing on myself," said Pogacar. "I knew the climb suits me, suits me better than other people for sure. That was my advantage on the climb, especially because it was quite steep."—AFP

News in Brief

Como seal Serie A return

ROME: Como secured a return to Serie A on Friday for the first time since 2003 with a 1-1 draw at home to Cosenza that earned them the runners-up spot in Italy's second tier. They will be joined in the top flight next season by Serie B champions Parma, who made sure of their promotion at the start of the month. Como suffered multiple bankruptcies and tumbled down the pyramid after being relegated from Serie A little over two decades ago. The club from Lombardy have former Arsenal teammates Cesc Fabregas and Thierry Henry as minority shareholders, with ex-Chelsea midfielder Dennis Wise a board member. Como only returned to professional football with their promotion to Serie C in 2019. But, bankrolled by Indonesian tobacco giants Djarum, they have stormed through the divisions. The third promoted club will be decided by play-offs featuring the teams finishing between third and eighth, which include Venezia and Sampdoria. — AFP

Girona's hopes hit by draw

MADRID: Girona's hopes of taking the runners-up spot behind La Liga champions Real Madrid took a hit on Friday when a goal from Alaves's Jon Guridi in the ninth minute of added time restricted them to a 2-2 draw. Eric Garcia put Girona ahead after just four minutes at the Mendizorroza stadium in Vitoria before Guridi levelled for the home side eight minutes later. Artem Dovbyk, the league's leading goalscorer with 20, did not get on the scoresheet but a minute before halftime he teed up Yangel Herrera for what appeared to be the winner. But as the game stretched deep into added time Guridi popped up to share the spoils. Girona move to 75 points, 12 behind Madrid and more important only two points clear of their Catalonian rivals Barcelona. Barca do not play until Monday but they will go second if they beat a Real Sociedad team still looking to seal a Europa League place. — AFP

Brest open door for Lille

PARIS: Brest stumbled to a 1-1 home draw against managerless Reims in Ligue 1 on Friday, giving Lille the chance to leapfrog them this weekend in the race for Champions League qualification. Marshall Munetsi headed Reims ahead in Brittany midway through the first half before Brest equalised on the stroke of half-time through Lilian Brassier. Third-placed Brest, who had never finished higher than eighth before in the top flight, pressed for a winner but had to settle for a point, leaving them with only one win from their last five matches. They are three points ahead of Lille, who visit Nantes on Sunday and have a marginally better goal difference. Reims are winless in six outings and parted ways with coach Will Still at the start of month after the club slipped out of contention for European football. Nice also remain in the mix for a Champions League spot following a 1-0 victory over Le Havre. — AFP

Guirassy winner lifts Stuttgart

BERLIN: Serhou Guirassy scored his 26th Bundesliga goal of the season as Stuttgart won 1-0 away to Augsburg on Friday to climb above Bayern Munich and into second place. The Guinea international latched onto a long ball over the defense early in the second half before poking past Augsburg goalkeeper Tomas Koubek to end a three-match goal drought. Guirassy is second to Harry Kane (36) in the scoring charts in Germany's top flight despite missing six games because of injury and Africa Cup of Nations duty. Stuttgart sit a point clear of Bayern and are set for their best finish since coming third in the 2008-09 season, two years after they last won the Bundesliga title. Bayern host Wolfsburg on Sunday following their agonizing Champions League semi-final defeat by Real Madrid this week, which left the club facing a first trophyless season since the 2011-12 campaign.— AFP

Sagstrom shares LPGA lead

NEW YORK: Sweden's Madelene Sagstrom shot a six under-par round of 66 in cold and wet conditions to grab a share of the lead at the LPGA Founders Cup with American Rose Zhang. World number one Nelly Korda put herself in contention for a record-breaking weekend, however, matching Sagstrom's 66 with a bogey free round leaving her four shots behind the leaders. The 25-year-old Korda equalled Annika Sorenstam and Nancy Lopez for the all-time record win streak of five in five starts by taking last month's Chevron Championship. The rain made for tricky conditions at Upper Montclair Country Club in Clifton, New Jersey, particularly in the wet, deep rough. However, Sagstrom evaded much of the worst weather and was in exceptional form, reaching the turn five-under for her round. She came unstuck with a double bogey on the 10th, but after a birdie at the next hole she eagled the par-5 12th before her eventful stretch saw her bogey the par-4 13th.—AFP

Malaysian football kicks off under heightened security after attacks

Series of attacks against players shocked the country

KUALA LUMPUR: Malaysia's premier football league kicked off Saturday under the shadow of heightened security after a series of attacks against players shocked the country and forced the cancellation of the season opener. An acid attack last week left star winger Faisal Halim in critical condition, just days after his Malaysia teammate Akhyar Rashid was injured in a robbery outside his home.

In a third incident on Tuesday, former Malaysia skipper Safiq Rahim escaped unharmed after he was threatened with a hammer and his car windscreen was smashed by two assailants. But football authorities said Malaysia Super League games would go ahead, starting with Polis DiRaja Malaysia (PDRM) FC against Kedah on Saturday just north of capital Kuala Lumpur. The football association said players should hire bodyguards while reigning champions Johor Darul Ta'zim (JDT) ramped up security for its squad after its season-opener was cancelled.

Hundreds of fans turned out Saturday for the PDRM-Kedah match, some holding up banners in support of the attacked players. Police numbers were increased around the stadium and officers were armed with pistols. "We are not afraid and will not allow the series of attacks on football players to rattle our enthusiasm for this great sport," said 38-year-old utility worker and Kedah fan Syakirin Said. "Look around, the police presence is strong. If we unite, we can fight back against these ugly perpetrators."

Iga Swiatek battles into Rome last 16

ROME: Iga Swiatek fought past Yulia Putintseva 6-3, 6-4 to reach the last 16 of the Rome Open on Saturday, as Novak Djokovic said he was "fine" to continue his tournament after being hit in the head with a water bottle. World number one Swiatek will next face either Angelique Kerber or Aliaksandra Sasnovich as she bids to become the first person since Serena Williams to claim a third title at the Foro Italico.

Swiatek won the 2021 and 2022 editions before exiting a year ago in the quarter-finals to eventual champion Elena Rybakina, who withdrew with illness on Friday. The 22-year-old came into the event having won the Madrid Open last weekend and will also be gunning for a fourth French Open crown later this month. She made harder work than expected of Saturday's match after comfortably taking the first set, finding herself 4-1 down and having to save four break points to stop unseeded Puntintseva from serving for the second.

However Swiatek broke back before levelling the set and rattled off five games in a row to take her record against Puntintseva to four wins without dropping a set. Swiatek is one of a host of stars to grace a baking centre court on Saturday, as she will be followed by Rafael Nadal who continues his comeback in a second-round clash with seventh seed Hubert Hurkacz. Nadal has said that he will only play at the French Open, where he has won 14 times, if he feels competitive after a raft of injury problems over the last two years which have left him languishing 305th in the world rankings.

Djokovic 'fine' after bottle strike drama

ROME: Novak Djokovic insisted on Saturday that he was "fine" and ready to play after being hit on the head by a water bottle as he signed autographs following his second-round win at the Rome Open. World number one Djokovic was left crouched on the ground in agony on Friday as the bottle struck him on the back of the head as he greeted fans on centre court at the Foro Italico. "Thank you for the messages of concern," Djokovic wrote Saturday on X, formerly Twitter. "This was an accident and I am fine resting at the hotel with an ice pack. See you all on Sunday."

The 36-year-old had gotten off to a winning start in the Italian capital, beating France's Corentin Moutet 6-3, 6-1 to advance to the third round. He will face Chile's Alejandro Tabilo next as the Serb warms up for the French Open Grand Slam with a great chance to add to his six titles in Rome, where only Rafael Nadal has won more with 10.

There had been fears that Djokovic might join the list of players to withdraw from the tournament after the 24-time Grand Slam winner was covered by security staff as he was led from the arena on foot. However tournament organizers later released a short statement saying Djokovic's "condition is not a cause for concern", and shared a video showing that the bottle had accidentally slipped from a spectator's grasp.

Djokovic's absence would have been a blow for the last major tournament before the French Open which is already without Italian world number two Jannik Sinner and third-ranked Carlos Alcaraz. Home fans have also been deprived of cheering on former Wimbledon finalist Matteo Berrettini and Lorenzo Musetti who both pulled out, Musetti while losing to France's Terence Atmane on Friday morning. On Saturday Djokovic's great clay-court rival Nadal continues his comeback in a second-round clash with seventh seed Hubert Hurkacz.

Nadal has said that he will only play at the French Open, where he has won 14 times, if he feels competitive after a raft of injury problems over the last two years which have left him languishing 305th in the world rankings.—AFP LONDON: Manchester City swept to the top of the Premier League as Josko Gvardiol's double inspired a vital 4-0 victory against Fulham on Saturday. Pep Guardiola's side are two wins away from lifting an unprecedented fourth successive English title after a commanding display at Craven Cottage. Gvardiol put City ahead early on before Phil Foden's 25th goal in all competitions this season increased their lead. By the time Gvardiol netted his second, City were strolling to three priceless points on a sunlit afternoon on the banks of the River Thames

Julian Alvarez underlined City's superiority with a late penalty after Fulham's Issa Diop was sent off for fouling the Argentine. Now two points clear of second-placed Arsenal, City will look for a favour from their arch rivals Manchester United, who host the Gunners on Sunday. If Arsenal fail to win at Old Trafford, City will be crowned champions if they beat Tottenham on Tuesday or

West Ham in their final game on May 19.

"Gvardiol's goals were absolutely unexpected. He is unbelievable with both feet," Guardiola said. "We played really well and now we recover, then come back to London to play the big final (against Tottenham) to try to retain our title." Regardless of Arsenal's remaining results against United and Everton, City know two more victories will make it a remark-

Mbappe to leave PSG at end of the season; Real eyed

PARIS: Kylian Mbappe confirmed on Friday that he will leave French champions Paris Saint-Germain at the end of the season, with Real Madrid widely expected to be his next destination. The announcement brings an end to a prolific association with his hometown team, which began when he signed from Monaco in 2017 in a deal worth 180 million euros (\$194 million). "I wanted to announce to you all that it's my last year at Paris Saint-Germain. I will not extend and the adventure will come to an end in a few weeks," Mbappe, 25, said in a video posted on social media. "I will play my last game at the Parc des Princes on Sunday."

PSG have already secured the Ligue 1 title, their 10th in the last 12 seasons, and the Qatar-owned club will pick up the trophy after Sunday's game against Toulouse, which will be their last of the campaign on home turf. Luis Enrique's side were eliminated from the Champions League by Borussia Dortmund in the semi-finals on Tuesday when a 1-0 loss in the second leg at home sealed a surprise 2-0 aggregate defeat. It means Mbappe will be denied the send-off he had hoped for in the Champions League final at Wembley on June 1 and will end his seven-year spell at PSG without ever having won Europe's elite club competition.

Mbappe informed PSG privately in Febru-

able six titles in the last seven seasons.

"The great players enjoy playing with great pressure. These players in the last few years have been able to do it and we are again in the latter stages," Guardiola said. They rose to his challenge in style and will head to Tottenham next week boasting a 21-game unbeaten league run, having also trimmed Arsenal's goal difference advantage over them to just two.

Relentless City

A social media video of Fulham players flying a kite during training this week had raised questioned about just how focused the hosts would be in a match that had little riding on it for them. Arsenal's fears were confirmed as City carved Fulham apart in typically swaggering style to take the lead after 13 minutes.

Guardiola had revealed City practiced on a dry pitch with high grass this week in a bid to prepare for a similar surface to the one that caused them problems on their previous visit to Craven Cottage. City's preparation worked a treat as a flowing 19-pass move climaxed with Kevin De Bruyne clipping a pass to Gvardiol on the edge of the edge. The Croatian defender took two deft touches as he glided through the Fulham defense before planting a composed low finish past Bernd Leno.

Guardiola's men monopolized possession, with Manuel Akanji wasting a golden opportunity just before half-time with a wild swipe that sailed over from De Bruyne's corner. City took complete control in the 59th minute as Bernardo Silva accelerated into the area, his progress halted by Joao Palhinha's tackle, only for the alert Foden to pounce with a perfectly-placed strike into the far corner. Guardiola's team struck again in the 71st minute as Gvardiol stretched to turn in Silva's cross with an agile close-range finish for his fifth goal in his last seven appearances. Alvarez put the seal on a clinical performance from the relentless champions, converting a stoppage-time penalty after Diop chopped him down. — AFP



ary of his intention to depart when his contract expires at the end of the current campaign. The 2018 World Cup winner had never confirmed publicly he was leaving, though, far less said where he will be going next, but it appears certain that he is bound for Real Madrid. Spanish media have claimed for several months that Mbappe has signed an agreement which would see him join the Liga champions in July once his PSG deal runs out.

"It's a lot of emotions, many years where I had the chance and the great honor to be a member of the biggest French club, one of the best in the world," said Mbappe. "It allowed me to arrive here, to have my first experience

in a club with a lot of pressure, to grow as a player of course, by being alongside some of the best in history, some of the greatest champions," he added. "It's hard and I never thought it would be this difficult to announce that... but I think I needed this, a new challenge, after seven years."

Mbappe's arrival in the capital as a teenager in 2017 came after he had helped Monaco win the league title. After initially joining PSG on loan, his transfer fee became—and still is—the second largest in football history. It came just weeks after PSG paid a world-record 222 million euros to sign Neymar from Barcelona. — AFP
