TEHRAN: Iran launched a large-scale search and rescue effort to scour a fog-shrouded mountain area after President Ebrahim Raisi's helicopter went missing Sunday in what state media described as an "accident". Fears grew for the 63-year-old ultraconservative after contact was lost with the helicopter carrying him as well as Foreign Minister Hossein Amir-Abdollahian and others in East Azerbaijan province, reports said. State television reported that "an accident happened to the helicopter carrying the president" in the Jolfa region of the western province, while some officials described it as a "hard landing".

An Iranian official told Reuters the lives of Raisi and Amir-Abdollahian were "at risk following the helicopter crash". "We are still hopeful but information coming from the crash site is very concerning," the official told Reuters, speaking on condition of anonymity. State TV quoted an official as saying that at least one passenger and one crewmember had been in contact with rescuers. It also said the helicopter had been found, though Iran's Red Crescent denied this report.

Kuwait's ministry of foreign affairs said Sunday it is closely monitoring with concern reports regarding the helicopter incident of Raisi and his accompanying delegation. In a



statement, the ministry expressed on behalf of Kuwait best wishes and safety of the Iranian president and his accompanying delegation. The ministry affirmed its support for Iran in these delicate circumstances.

Supreme Leader Ayatollah Ali Khamenei urged Iranians to "not worry" about the leadership of the Islamic republic, saying "there will be no disruption in the country's work". 'We hope that Almighty God will bring our dear president and his companions back in

full health into the arms of the nation," he said

Expressions of concern and offers to help came from abroad, including Saudi Arabia, Iraq, Qatar and Turkey, as well as from the European Union, which said it activated its rapid response mapping service to aid in the search effort. Turkey is sending 32 mountain rescue specialists to help Iran in the search for the he-

Dagher, Ajmi win municipal seats



Deadly Zionist strikes hit Gaza

GAZA: A Zionist strike killed 31 people in central Gaza Sunday, the Palestinian territory's civil defense agency said, as US National Security Advisor Jake Sullivan visited for talks on the conflict. Zionist troops have moved in on the Gaza Strip's far-southern city of Rafah, which the army describes as the last Hamas stronghold and where the United States says 800,000 civilians have been newly displaced by the fighting.

Hamas' armed wing, the Ezzedine Al-Qassam Brigades, said it was targeting Zionist forces stationed at Rafah crossing — a vital conduit for humanitarian aid that is now closed with mortar shells. The Zionist entity has also fought and bombed resurgent Hamas forces in northern and central areas of the coastal territory previously considered to be under army control, sparking US warnings that it could become mired in a lengthy

counterinsurgency campaign.

In the latest aerial bombardment overnight, Gaza's civil defense agency said a Zionist strike killed 31 people and wounded 20 in a home in the central Nuseirat refugee camp. Witness Yasser Abu Oula told AFP an entire residential complex "was destroyed" and "there are still bodies under the rubble".

Zionist Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu has vowed to keep fighting Hamas in Gaza until the Iran-backed Islamist group is defeated and all remaining captives are released. But he has faced intense opposition and calls to announce a plan for Gaza's post-war governance — from top ally Washington and from mass street protests, and now also from members of his war cabinet.

Centrist politician Benny Gantz threatened Saturday to quit the governing hard-right coalition unless Netanyahu approves a post-war "action plan" by June 8. Amid the political turmoil, Sullivan was to meet his Zionist counterpart Tzachi Hanegbi and Netanyahu for talks on the brutal Gaza

What we learn from history

e learn from history that we learn nothing from history," is a saying often repeated nowadays. Some attribute it to the playwright and political critic George Bernard Shaw, others attribute it to the German philosopher of the eighteenth century, Georg Hegel. But is it true? Do we learn nothing from history and our past? Is that why history keeps repeating itself?

The brutal extermination of Palestinians today in Gaza since October 7 looks very much similar to the extermination of Muslims in the south of Spain during the 15th century. The genocide, the burning of schools and mosques, the forced deportation, the ethnic cleansing are horrifyingly the same. Comparing Isabella and Ferdinand to Biden and Netanyahu is not far-fetched.

History keeps repeating itself. Didn't Muslims and Arabs learn something from what happened then, and many other times and places, to prevent it from happening again? There's an abundance of historical research and documents about the Spanish Inquisition. They provide so much information as to why and how the Spaniards were able to get rid of a tremendous civilization that flourished for eight hundred years in Andalusia.

How were they able to do it? Among others, two factors are the most obvious: One, the web of treachery and traitors that Ferdinand and Isabella implanted inside the Muslim empire was a powerful weapon. Traitors, playing friends on both sides, were capable of showing Muslim rulers, hungry for wealth and power, false facts as truth. Two, the disunity and disagreements amongst the rulers of the different regions of Andalusia proved most deadly. Disunity and friction ultimately pulled the Muslim empire down.

Reading historical documents can be cumbersome to many, even to avid readers. That's why historical fiction novels come in handy. They provide accurate historical narratives while entertaining readers. I'd like to recommend two historical novels by prominent authors that explain what happened to the Muslims of Spain during those dark days of history. The Trilogy of Granada, by the Egyptian author Radwa Ashoor, and Badr Bin Mughira: The Shaheen of Andalus by the Pakistani novelist Naseem Hijazi.

Professor Ashoor's knowledge of history and her literary style in Arabic is a treasure to be indulged in at all times. Her main characters, especially Mariama, and her grandson, inspire readers with hope. Her novel clearly displays that no matter the means of annihilation the occupiers use, the original plant nurtured in the soil for hundreds of years can never be extracted. Its roots will continue spreading and flourishing in different ways, and different places.

Badr Bin Mughira: The Shaheen of Andalus by the novelist Naseem Hijazi is another treasure. It is a sweeping heroic narrative, heart-wrenching yet romantic that leaves the reader with pride and hope. Readers will re-live those dark days in Al-Andalus and the agony of its characters. If you're like me, you'll see Abu Obaida in Badr bin Mughira and relish his bravery and honesty. Naseem Hijazi's knowledge of historical events and his extensive research of the provided is external incomplete.

of that period is astounding.

Badr Bin Mughira, sheds light on the intricacies of the situation during the fall of Muslim Spain. The bravery, the treachery, the resistance and the fall of the Muslims at the hand of Ferdinand and his troops could have been changed if only the rulers were better informed and stood united. At one point of the novel, Hijazi had Ferdinand declare that, "The primary guarantee for our successes is the disunity among the Muslims... Had they been united like us, we could not have gained victory over them."

How true is that today? It is possible to learn from history if we set our minds on that purpose. There must be people in power out there who can learn from history and use their knowledge to prevent genocide from happening again. One can only hope. Look at the refreshing waves of thousands of students all over the world shaking the foundations of colonizing empires with their demands and power of knowledge. When people hunger for justice, they need only to unite and persist to reach that goal. So far, the people of Gaza and their supporters, are showing the world that solidarity is power, and their sacrifices will one day bring Palestine back to the map with all its glory.

The ministry explained that the national campaign will assist in updating its vision regarding the country's electricity and water needs and rationalizing their consumption, which will directly alleviate the burden on public finances and contribute to the development of the environmental system in Kuwait. The campaign aimed to change the consumption behavior of electricity and water among individuals in Kuwait.

Ministry signs contracts

Meanwhile, the Ministry of Electricity, Water, and Renewable Energy has signed contracts on Sunday for the purchase of approximately 500 megawatts of energy through the Gulf electricity interconnection network

extending from Oman to Kuwait. The undersecretary of the ministry, Haitham Al-Ali, said in a press statement that this brings technical and economic benefits to Kuwait, especially with the proximity of the offers submitted for energy purchase prices to the cost of production.

For his part, the CEO of the Gulf Electric Interconnection Authority, Engineer Ahmed Al-Ibrahim, said in a similar statement that the energy market is one of the most efficient markets in the region. He pointed out that the Ministry and the Gulf Interconnection Authority have agreed on the offers submitted for the supply of electric energy to Kuwait during the coming June so that they can be renewed during the coming July and

August according to the conditions and needs of interconnected networks from member states.

He pointed out that the trade of electric energy between the Gulf countries aims to sustain development, raise the level of reliability of supply electricity, and save electricity production costs by providing sustainable electricity at competitive prices, as well as reduce the costs of electricity production and station construction. Al-Ibrahim said that this trade enables system operators to reduce costs and operate systems more efficiently by exploiting opportunities to import or export energy at a short-term level, which benefits the electricity companies and authorities in the Gulf countries and increases the safety and efficiency of operational operations. — KUNA

Listen to me, before you diagnose me!

KUWAIT: Some psychologists can get caught up in trying to diagnose their patient's problem with a certain illness without thorough listening sessions, which can worsen the case for both sides. Psychologist Abdullah Waleed AlManea spoke to Kuwait Times about the issue of psychologists jumping into conclusions during therapy sessions, through trying to figure out what is wrong with a patient by following basic diagnosing methods that cannot reach profound and complicated feelings of hurt and trouble.

AlManea said: "Diagnosing patients can sometimes be unhelpful because it can ignore their feelings of pain and distress. Certain psychologists can focus too much on trying to label mental illness in

their patients, which can be overwhelming. This focus on diagnosis can take away from the therapy process, turning the complex human mind into a simple checklist of behav iors based on diagnostic rules. This problem often starts with using quick and basic tools to assess patients, like questionnaires, which oversimplify years of struggles into a

few easy answers. Giving a diagnosis without truly understanding the patient also adds to this over-

simplified approach.' AlManea sheds light on the potential drawbacks of overly relying on diagnosing patients, emphasizing how diagnoses can sometimes overlook the emotional experience of pain. The risk of reducing the complexity of the human mind to mere labels and checklists may detract from the essence of the therapeutic process. According to AlManea the solution lies in building a strong and caring bond with the pa-



tient, where listening is a deep and active process.

"Not just hearing about the symptoms in diagnostic books, but also picking up on subtle signs like how the patients talk, move, and feel. By paying attention to these details, psychologists can better understand the patient's pain, avoid misdiagnoses, and effectively address the real issues. This approach doesn't just help the patient's future but also protects against other factors that might seem like distress,' he said. Attentive listening is the foundation for ensuring authentic addressing of a patient's issue.

According to Saeedy, dreams mirror our daily reality, yet twist it into forms of images, sending iconic messages from the unconscious to the conscious mind. Delving into dreams unveils the deepest hidden causes behind our personal struggles, unlocking childhood traumas or buried memories. Hence, she explained, this made psychologists like Freud Sigmund and Carl Jung consider dreams as a potent tool for mental state analysis. "Dreams can tell you who you truly are as they have the power to guide you from darkness into light," added Saeedy.

In her contemplation of dreams, Saeedy noted, "Even the most complex concepts like 'immortality' or 'death' which our analytical minds might not fully grasp, can be easily interpreted or experienced through dreams." Viewing dreams as "a world unbounded by the physical rules of our reality," she highlighted their function as a direct window to our souls, unspoken desires, and the unknown future. "Unlike our solid reality, dreams transport us far from where our minds usually rest," she said. "It's like another dimension to perceive life.'

Sometimes, the same dreams might also be experienced by different people, as Saeedy stated the existence of universal themes in dreams. The repetition of these dream patterns is a signifier for something deeper, indicating an ongoing internal struggle for the dreamer. Referring to one popular theme - "falling from a high place," she highlight-

ed its indication of the dreamer's relentless pursuit of control. Such dreams serve as a counterbalance, offering an opposing experience to the desired feeling, thus establishing equilibrium in emotions.

"Once this dream stops showing up, means the person is finally unshackled from one of his greatest fears," she added. Dreams are also "a blend between intuitional and analytical thinking of your subconscious," she said. As you casually spend your time during the day, your subconscious automatically stores data from your surroundings, working in harmony with your intuition to offer insights into future events, termed as "Visionary dreams."

She described these types of dreams as direct conduits to divine messages. Recognized by their association with peaceful and positive emotions, she remarked, "if you happen to have these kinds of dreams, you'll instantly identify them without question." Supported by Saeedy's experience and previous research, she confidently stated that "It's impossible to find someone who doesn't dream. Unless they are suffering from a bad memory or lack of connection to inner self."

The same goes for the person who mostly encounters too complicated or too random dreams that are hardly deciphered. She observed that individuals of this sort often endure "emotional sup-



pression," constantly escaping the confrontation of negative memories or feelings. In contrast to those who enjoy healthier relationships with themselves, they tend to experience more "vivid dreams," signaling a more engaged response to their reality.

The best way to deal with dreams, according to Saeedy, is to always look beyond their images. Instead of just seeing the scenes and symbols, try to link each theme with the emotions that might have triggered it. By doing this, you can decipher the subconscious messages and unlock a gate to deeper self-awareness.

'Energy security vital for growth'

CAIRO: Assistant Secretary General and Head of the Economic Affairs Sector at the Arab League, Dr. Ali Al-Maliki, underlined Sunday that energy security is vital for impacting economic growth, national security, and citizens' well-being. In a speech delivered on Al-Maliki's behalf by Director of the Energy Department at the Arab League Eng Jamila Matar, during the 12th Arab Energy Efficiency Day, Al-Maliki underscored the strategic importance of energy security in a world driven by interests and conflicting with strife.

He pointed out the challenges in ensuring energy security and transitioning to sustainable sources, encouraging a comprehensive approach that includes improving energy efficiency, developing renewable energy, protecting critical energy infrastructure, and reducing carbon emissions. Al-Maliki identified energy efficiency as crucial for energy security, aiming to provide energy services at the lowest cost without compromising quality, which involves managing energy demand through various efficiency strategies to reduce consumption in line with national development plans.

The Arab Ministerial Council for Electricity (AMCE) has been tracking energy efficiency progress in the region, developing and tracking national energy efficiency plans. They also prepared a guide on renewable energy and energy efficiency in Arab countries, providing statistical information on policies and programs aimed at improving energy production and consumption efficiency, he mentioned. Al-Maliki announced the theme for the 12th Arab Energy Efficiency Day competition: "Best Patent in Energy Efficiency," following the decision of the 38th session of AMCE to implement resolution 294, underscoring the role of intellectual property in promoting innovation and achieving sustainable development goals (SDGs).

On his side, Executive Director of the Regional Center for Renewable Energy and Energy Efficiency (RCREEE), Jauad Al-Kharraz, described the day as a celebration of energy, focusing on patents due to the Arab world's lag in this area and calling for greater efforts in patent registration, research, and innovation in sustainable energy. Al-Kharraz emphasized the significant role patents play in economic development, supporting decision-making in research, innovation, and investment, stressing the need for a focus on social responsibility to improve economic, social, and cultural conditions by ensuring reliable and equitable energy supplies for all citizens in the Arab region.

Meanwhile, First Undersecretary for Research, Planning, and Authorities Follow-Up at the Egyptian Ministry of Electricity, Dr. Ahmad Mohina, discussed Egypt's achievements in energy efficiency, including high-efficiency power plants and substantial investments in electricity transmission, clarifying the urgent need for enhanced efforts in energy efficiency across the Arab world.

Approximately \$10 billion was spent on electricity transmission networks in the past 10 years, he said, noting that Egypt reduced the rate of fuel needed to produce each unit of electricity measurement by 20 percent, which saved about a billion dollars and led to a reduction in emissions harmful to the environment. The Arab League Energy Department, in collaboration with RCREEE, organized the 12th Arab Energy Efficiency Day celebration at its headquarters in Cairo, featuring a session on the best energy efficiency patent competition, won by Qatari engineer Dr. Yousef Mohammad Yousef Al-Horr for his air conditioning system project. — KUNA

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Arabs seeking unified military terminology

CAIRO: The Arab League has stressed the importance of unified military terminology and symbols in easing joint operations and training, as well as strengthening Arab military work and unifying military visions and doctrines among Arab countries. This came in a speech by the Assistant Secretary-General and Head of the Arab Affairs and National Security Sector at the Arab League, Ambassador Khalil Al-Thawadi, during the 64th symposium of the Committee for the Unification of Military Terminology and Concepts.


The committee began its work on Sunday and will be held over a period of 12 days, chaired by Iraq, with participation from delegations representing the armed forces of Arab countries. Al-Thawadi noted that this symposium comes as a continuation of the previous symposiums and is based on the recommendations of the 63rd symposium, where the current topic was agreed upon.

The symposium topic is to study military symbols of the air force, air defense, weapons of mass destruction, signals, information systems, and joint supply (supply, transportation, and medical services). He explained that the symposium aims to unify these terms and add them to the dictionary of military terminology, which includes all symbols, abbreviations, and military terms used in Arab armed forces up to the year 2024. — KUNA

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1,000 Syrian orphans graduate; KRCS honors Quran memorizers

ANKARA: The Kuwait Red Crescent Society (KRCS) announced on Sunday the graduation of 1,000 students and honored the memorizers of the Holy Quran in the city of Gaziantep in southern Turkey. The chairman of the board of directors of the Kuwait Red Crescent Society, Dr. Hilal Al-Sayer, said in a telephone call with the Kuwait News Agency (KUNA) that Syrian orphan students have graduated from the kindergarten and primary stages.

This humanitarian project comes within the programs sponsored by the association, with the aim of supporting orphan families and educating their children. He stressed the keenness of the association to help children and the most vulnerable groups. Dr. Al-Sayer said that the donors

are the main supporters in the implementation of these outstanding projects, pointing out that "the support we see today embodies the Kuwaiti role and its slogan (Kuwait is by Your Side) based on the directives of the political leadership.".

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Kais Saied 'above' everyone

Hundreds rally for Tunisia's president amid 'unlawful' arrests of dissenting public figures

TUNIS: Hundreds of people rallied Sunday in downtown Tunis in support of President Kais Saied amid the recent arrests of journalists, lawyers, and other dissenting public figures in Tunisia. The rally came days after an international backlash over the flurry of arrests, which the UN and the EU said were unlawful.

President Saied on Thursday blasted the international criticism as foreign "interference" and ordered the Tunisian foreign ministry to summon the ambassadors of several countries. "No to foreign interference, because we are a sovereign state," said Saber Rzigue, a protester on Sunday. "We support the Tunisian leadership, particularly President Kais Saied."

Civil society in Tunisia condemned the recent crackdown on dissent, with the country that saw the onset of the Arab Spring readying for presidential elections this autumn. Several prominent pundits, journalists, lawyers and civil society figures in the North African country have been arrested in recent days. "We are against foreign interference and against traitors, even if they are Tunisian," said Mohamed Hentati, another protester. "Today, we want to contribute to history and stand against anyone who wants to occupy our country and try to change its social fabric," he added.

Additionally, around 40 public figures including eight of Saied's political opponents, former ministers, and businessmen, are currently detained as part of an investigation into a "plot against the state security". Sunday's rally also came after a significant protest and strike by lawyers earlier in the week over police raids and arrests in the national bar association.

The head of the bar, Hatem Meziou, called for an end to "the abuse of power" and for President Saied to intervene. But Saied, who seized sweeping powers in 2021, replied on Thursday by saying the arresting of two lawyers was "in full respect for Tunisian law, which guarantees equality and the right to a fair trial".

In January, Human Rights Watch said Tunisia suffered "further regression in terms of human rights and the rule of law during 2023 in the absence of genuine checks and balances".

"The government has taken new steps to muzzle free speech, prosecute dissent and crack down on migrants and asylum seekers," it added. But demonstrators on Sunday defended the presi-

dent. "Kais Saied is above all of us," said Mahmoud, a protester who chose not to give his full name. "It is in him that we trust. He brought us security and peace." — AFP



Consequences of Gaza shortages 'apocalyptic': UN

DOHA: The stranglehold on aid reaching Gaza threatens an "apocalyptic" outcome, the UN's humanitarian chief Martin Griffiths said on Sunday as he warned of famine in the besieged territory. "If fuel runs out, aid doesn't get to the people where they need it, that famine, which we have talked about for so long, and which is looming, will not be looming anymore. It will be present," Griffiths said.

"And I think our worry, as citizens of the international community, is that the consequence is going to be really, really hard. Hard, difficult, and apocalyptic," he told AFP on the sidelines of meetings with Qatari officials in Doha.

A Zionist incursion into the southern Gaza city of Rafah, launched in the face of international outcry, has deepened an already perilous humanitarian crisis in the Gaza Strip. Griffith, the UN's Under-Secretary-General for Humanitarian Affairs and Emergency Relief Coordinator, said some 50 trucks of aid per day could reach the hardest-hit north of Gaza through the reopened Erez crossing.

But battles near the Rafah and Kerem Shalom crossings in Gaza's south meant the vital routes were "effectively blocked", he explained. "So aid getting in through land routes to the south and for Rafah, and the people dislodged by Rafah is almost nil," Griffiths added.

'Disaster'

The UN said on Saturday that 800,000 people had been "forced to flee" the Zionist entity's assault on Rafah. With fuel, food and medicine running out, Griffiths said the military action in the southern Gazan city was "exactly what we feared it would be". "And we all said that very clearly, that a Rafah opera-

tion is a disaster in humanitarian terms, a disaster for the people already displaced to Rafah. This is now their fourth or fifth displacement," he said.

With key land crossings closed, some relief supplies began flowing in this week via a temporary, floating pier constructed by the United States. Griffiths said the maritime operation was "beginning to bring in some truckloads of aid" but he cautioned "it's not a replacement for the land routes".

On Thursday, the Arab League called for a UN peacekeeping force to be deployed in the Palestinian territories and for an international conference to resolve the Palestinian issue based on the two-state solution. Griffiths said the statement from the 22-member bloc in Manama was "very important because it focused on the future".

'Angry world'

He explained there were a "number of different conferences being mooted and potentially planned" to discuss humanitarian arrangements in Gaza, including in Jordan. "I feel very strongly and I know that the Secretary-General feels very strongly that the United Nations needs to be present at the table when all these things are being discussed," the UN aid chief said.

But he cautioned on the likelihood of a UN peacekeeping force for the Palestinian territories. A proposed deployment could be blocked by a veto from permanent Security Council members, while it would also require the acceptance from the warring parties of the UN's presence.

The UN announced in March that Griffiths, a British barrister, would step down in June over health concerns. He said that in recent years he had observed that "the norms that were built up very painfully, indeed since the founding of the United Nations ... but particularly in the last couple of decades, seem to have been set aside". "There is no consensus on methods of dialogue and negotiation, or mediation, which need to be, in my view, prioritized. And so we have an angry world," Griffiths said. — AFP

Thousands forgotten in Syria desert camp

'Any place on earth is better than Rukban'

and Jordan, thousands are stranded in an isolated camp, unable to return home after fleeing the government and jihadists years ago. When police defector Khaled arrived at Rukban, he had hoped to be back home within weeks – but eight years on, he is still stuck in the remote desert camp, sealed off from the rest of the country.

Damascus rarely lets aid in and neighboring countries have closed their borders to the area, which is protected from Syrian forces by a nearby US-led coalition base's de-confliction zone. "We are trapped between three countries," said Khaled, 50, who only gave his first name due to security concerns.

"We can't leave for (other areas of) Syria because we are wanted by the regime, and we can't flee to Jordan or Iraq" because the borders are sealed, he added.

The camp was established in 2014, at the height of Syria's ongoing war, as desperate people fled Islamic State group jihadists and government bombardment in hopes of crossing into Jordan. At its peak, it housed more than 100,000 people, but numbers have dwindled, especially after Jordan largely sealed its side of the border in 2016. Many people have since returned to government-held areas to escape hunger, poverty and a lack of medical care. The United Nations has also facilitated voluntary returns with the help of the Syrian Arab Red Crescent.

The last UN humanitarian convoy reached the camp in 2019, and the body described conditions there as "desperate" at the time. Today, only about 8,000 residents remain, living in mud-brick houses, with food and basic supplies smuggled in at high prices.

'Disease and hunger'

Residents say even those meagre supplies risk running dry as government checkpoints blocked smuggling routes to the camp about a month ago. "My daughters are living off bread and tea. The camp is running out of food," Khaled told AFP by telephone.

Mohammad Derbas al-Khalidi, who heads the camp's council, said most families survived on scarce

BEIRUT: In a no-man's land on Syria's border with Iraq remittances that are funneled in and largely smuggled aid, while about 500 men working with the nearby US base receive salaries of around \$400 a month.

The father of 14 said he was wanted by the government for helping army defectors flee early in the war. Only a safe passageway to Syria's rebel-held northwest or its Kurdish-administered northeast could "save the people who remain in Rukban", Khalidi said. "If I didn't fear for myself, my children ... I wouldn't put up with this life of disease and hunger," he told AFP. Despite dire conditions, a handful of people keep arriving — but not by choice.

The council and the Syrian Observatory for Human Rights war monitor said several dozen Syrians released from Jordanian prisons have been deported to Rukban in recent years. Most have been convicted of crimes from drug trafficking to illegally entering Jordan or other security infractions, according to council data, with 24 people sent to the camp so far this year.

Mohammed al-Khalidi, 38, a mechanic not related to the camp chief, said he was deported from Jordan after serving time on drug-related charges. He expressed anger at being dumped at the camp, and said he feared arrest if he returned to his home in Homs province, now in an area under government control. "My relatives are all in Jordan. Everyone who was in Syria has either been killed or left. And our homes in Homs have been razed," he said. "Where can I go?" he said.

Asked about the deportations, a Jordanian government official denied authorities had forcefuly returned refugees. "Jordan has not and will not force any Syrian refugee to return to Syria," the official said, requesting anonymity because they were not authorized to speak to the press. Rukban camp residents "are Syrians and the camp is located on Syrian territory. It is therefore necessary to help them return to their regions inside Syria," he added.

Medical care in Rukban is almost non-existent. Camp chief Khalidi said the site had nurses but no doctors, and people seeking medical treatment must be smuggled into government-held areas, with a roundtrip costing about \$1,600.

Many camp residents making the journey have disappeared into jails, he added. Mouaz Moustafa, who heads the Washington-based Syrian Emergency Task Force association, said "the number one thing that they need (in Rukban) even more than food is doctors".

He noted a total lack of staff trained even for caesarean section births. Rukban "has the worst living conditions ... I have ever seen in any refugee camp", said Moustafa, whose association has airlifted aid into the camp with help from the nearby US-led coalition base.

Mohammed, 22, who had a liver problem, said that thanks to donations, he was able to be smuggled to government-held territory for surgery, after living in Rukban for years with his family. — AFP

He later fled to neighboring Lebanon to avoid military service and still lives there despite a grinding economic crisis and growing anti-Syrian sentiment. "Any place on earth is better than Rukban," he said.

Using a pseudonym because he is in Lebanon illegally, Mohammed said he has not seen his mother and older brothers in two years because they are stuck in the camp. "My family knows they're never getting out ... They're not even thinking of fleeing," he said. "The camp is like a prison." — AFP

Biden reaches out to Gaza protesters in college speech

ATLANTA: President Joe Biden told students on Sunday at the former university of civil rights icon Martin Luther King Jr that he heard their voices over the protests against the war in Gaza that have roiled US campuses.

As one student stood with his back to Biden during the graduation ceremony at Morehouse College in Atlanta, Georgia, the president added that he was working around the clock for an immediate ceasefire and lasting regional peace.

"This is one of the hardest, most complicated problems in the world. There's nothing easy about it," said Biden, who wore a maroon and black gown in the colors of the historically black university. "I know it angers and frustrates many of you, including my family, but most of all, I know it breaks your heart. It breaks mine as well."

Student protests, which have

engulfed a string of US campuses, have caused political troubles for Biden in an election year in which he is set for a rematch with Republican former president Donald Trump. "I support peaceful, non-violent protest. Your voices should be heard, and I promise you I hear them," Biden told the ceremony.

Biden said he wanted an "immediate ceasefire to stop the fighting, bring the hostages home" as the Zionist entity continues its offensive on the Palestinian territory.

The 81-year-old Democrat added that he was pushing for a "lasting, durable peace" in the wider Middle East that would lead to an independent Palestinian state, which he called the "only solution." The president's National Security Advisor Jake Sullivan is in Saudi Arabia and the Zionist entity this weekend trying to push for

But there had also been concerns that Gaza protests would disrupt the ceremony, his most direct engagement with students since the demonstrations erupted. Some students at Morehouse had called for Biden's speech to be canceled and a senior White House official reportedly recently met students and faculty members beforehand. Biden initially stayed silent on the Gaza protests but later said that "order must prevail" after police broke up several university encampments around the US.

Biden's problems with voters over Gaza mirror wider issues he has with black and younger voters, two groups that helped him beat Republican Donald Trump in the 2020 election. He will need to keep those strands in his coalition to have a hope of preventing Trump from making a sensational comeback to the White House despite a chaotic first term and multiple criminal indictments.

A New York Times/Siena poll last week showed that, in addition to trailing Trump in several key battleground states, Biden is also losing ground with African Americans. Trump is winning more than 20 percent of black voters in the poll — which would be the highest level of black support for a Republican presidential candidate since the Civil Rights Act was enacted in 1964, The New York Times said. Several other polls have also shown Biden's support lagging among black voters. — AFP

aid agency AFAD said on Sunday. The team and 32 vehicles have been deployed from centers in eastern Turkey said AFAD, in a post on X, formerly Twitter.

"The harsh weather conditions and heavy fog have made it difficult for the rescue teams to reach the accident site," said one broadcaster. More than 40 rescue teams using search dogs and drones were sent to the site, reported the IRNA news agency as TV stations showed pictures of rows of waiting emergency response vehicles. Raisi was visiting the province where he inaugurated a dam project together with Azerbaijan's President Ilham Aliyev, on the border between the two countries. Raisi's convoy included three helicopters, and the other two had "reached their destination safely", according to Tasnim news agency.

Foreign countries were closely following the search effort at a time of high regional tensions over the Gaza war between the Zionist entity and Hamas since Oct 7 that has drawn in other armed groups in the Middle East. A US State Department spokesman said: "We are closely following reports of a possible hard landing of a helicopter in Iran carrying the Iranian president and foreign minister. We have no further comment at this time.'

An Iranian Red Crescent team was seen walking up a slope in thick fog and drizzling rain, while other live footage showed worshippers reciting prayers in the holy city of Mashhad, Raisi's hometown. In neighboring Iraq, Prime Minister Mohamed Shia Al-Sudani "instructed the interior ministry and the Iraqi Red Crescent and other relevant authorities to offer available resources... to aid in the search".

Azeri President Aliyev said in a post on X that "we were profoundly troubled by the news of a helicopter carrying the top delegation crash-landing in Iran". "Our prayers to Allah Almighty are with President Ebrahim Raisi and the accompanying delegation," he said, noting that his country "stands ready to offer any assistance needed". Armenia's foreign ministry said Yerevan was "shocked by the news coming from Iran". "As rescue operations continue, Armenia, as a close and friendly neighbor of Iran, is ready to provide all necessary support," the ministry said on X.

The accident happened in the mountainous protected forest area of Dizmar near the town of Varzaghan, said the official IRNA news agency.

Military personnel along with the Revolutionary Guards and police had also deployed teams to the area, said army chief-of-staff Mohammad Bagheri. Interior Minister Ahmad Vahidi said one of the helicopters "made a hard landing due to bad weather conditions" and that it was "difficult to establish communication" with the aircraft.

Raisi has been president since 2021 when he succeeded the moderate Hassan Rouhani, for a term during which Iran has faced crisis and conflict. He took the reins of a country in the grip of a deep social crisis and an economy strained by US sanctions against Tehran over its contested nuclear program. Iran saw a wave of mass protests triggered by the death in custody of Iranian-Kurdish woman Mahsa Amini in Sept 2022 after her arrest for allegedly flouting dress rules for women.

In March 2023, regional rivals Iran and Saudi Arabia signed a surprise deal that restored diplomatic relations. The war in Gaza that broke out on Oct 7 sent regional tensions soaring again and a series of tit-for-tat escalations led to Tehran launching hundreds of missiles and rockets directly at the Zionist entity in April 2024.

In a speech following Sunday's dam inauguration, Raisi emphasized Iran's support for Palestinians, a centerpiece of its foreign policy since the 1979 Islamic revolution. "We believe that Palestine is the first issue of the Muslim world, and we are convinced that the people of Iran and Azerbaijan always support the people of Palestine and Gaza and hate the Zionist regime," said Raisi. Raisi, born in 1960 in northeast Iran's holy city of Mashhad, served as Tehran's prosecutor-general from 1989 to 1994, deputy chief of the Judicial Authority for a decade from 2004, and then national prosecutor-general in 2014. — Agencies

a Palestinian state", which he fiercely opposes. Washington has pushed for a post-war plan for Gaza involving Palestinians and supported by regional powers, as well as for a broader diplomatic deal under which the Zionist entity and regional powerhouse Saudi Arabia would normalize relations. US President Joe Biden called Sunday for an immediate Gaza ceasefire and said he was pushing for a regional peace deal "to get a two-state solution, the only solution".

The Zionist entity's offensive has killed at least 35,456 people in Gaza, mostly women and children. The Zionist entity has imposed a siege on the long-blockaded Gaza Strip, depriving its 2.4 million people of normal access to clean water, food, medicines and fuel, the suffering eased only by sporadic aid shipments by land, air and sea.

"We are living through a humanitarian catastrophe in every sense of the word," said Rafah resident Rinad Joudeh, 41, decrying "destruction, fear and terror" nearly two weeks into the Zionist incursion into the city. The head of the UN agency helping Palestinians said that "despite all the calls by the international community not to launch an offensive in Rafah, in reality an offensive started on May 6".

Since then, "we have again about half of the population of Gaza being on the road forced to flee" for safety once more, though "we keep saying there is absolutely nowhere to go," UNRWA chief Philippe Lazzarini told reporters in Amman. "There is absolutely no safe place in the Gaza Strip," he added. Joudeh said people heading for a declared "humanitarian sponsibility, honesty and the national role on their shoulders towards the nation and its citizens.

Sheikh Fahad also stressed the importance of working hard to establish justice, fight corruption, preserve national identity, preserve unity and defend and protect the nation's security. He also stressed the importance of preserving the nation's wealth and developing it, accelerating the pace of implementation of projects, developing e-government services, and consolidating the principles of justice and transparency.

Lazzarini said that because of the fighting, "almost nothing in terms of aid is crossing" into Gaza, raising fears that recent gains made "to prevent a looming famine ... might quickly be reversed". Truck arrivals have slowed with the Rafah crossing with Egypt closed since the Zionist entity launched its operation in the city.

Aid has begun entering via a temporary US-built floating pier, where shipments sent from Cyprus are offloaded for distribution. The United Arab Emirates said Sunday a shipment of "252 tons of humanitarian relief supplies for the people of Gaza was successfully unloaded" after sailing from the Cypriot port of Larnaca.

The UN's humanitarian chief Martin Griffiths warned that if dire fuel shortages are not alleviated, the "famine which we have talked about for so long, and which is looming, will not be looming anymore. It will be present". "Our worry ... is that the consequence is going to be really, really hard," he told AFP in Qatar. "Hard, difficult, and apocalyptic". — AFP

Sri Lankan Tamils still haunted by civil war

Emotional ceremony marks 15 years since end of war which killed thousands

MULLIVAIKKAL, Sri Lanka: Sri Lanka's minority Tamil community marked 15 years since the end of the island nation's civil war on Saturday in an emotional ceremony that proceeded despite fears authorities would attempt to prevent its staging.

Public events celebrating the Tamil Tigers separatist group — which fought a no-holds-barred battle to establish an ethnic minority homeland — are illegal and authorities have blocked past memorials.

Tamils say the events are held to remember all victims of the decades-long war, which concluded in 2009 after a military offensive in the last Tigers stronghold. The operation was condemned internationally for the indiscriminate bombardment of civilians.

"Thousands died here the day before the war ended," a 41-year-old Tamil village official, who asked not to be identified for fear of reprisal, told AFP at the memorial site in Mullivaikkal. "There were lots of wounded people crying for help," he added. "This will haunt me for the rest of my life." Several thousand Tamils had travelled to the village for the remembrance, where they lit oil lamps to commemorate the dead.

'Impunity is prevailing'

Sri Lankan authorities have repeatedly disrupted similar memorials in the island's former war zones over the years and arrested participants, but Saturday's ceremony went ahead without incident.

This year it was attended by Amnesty International's global chief Agnes Callamard, the most senior foreign dignitary so far to attend a remembrance event in Sri Lanka's battle-scarred north. The rights watchdog has for years pressed Sri Lankan authorities, who have repeatedly refused to permit an international probe into wartime atrocities, to properly investigate and prosecute those responsible for abuses. "We are here to remind the international community that there are people in Sri Lanka waiting for justice," Callamard told reporters after the event.

Prime Minister Justin Trudeau of Canada, which in 2022 voted to recognize May 18 as Tamil Genocide Remembrance Day, said on Saturday his country would "always advocate for justice and accountability for the crimes committed during the conflict". "Today, we honor the victims, survivors, and their loved ones, who live with the lasting pain caused by this senseless violence," Trudeau said in a statement.

Intimidation continues

Tamil residents near the ceremony site told AFP that security forces had been noticeably more ac-



tive in their communities as the anniversary neared. "There is heavy surveillance of the people, and it is intimidation," one Tamil resident said Thursday, asking not to be named for fear of harassment. Saturday marked 15 years since the killing of the Tamil Tigers'

charismatic but reclusive leader Velupillai Prabhakaran, who had led the separatist group in open rebellion against Sri Lankan forces since 1972.

His death in the village of Mullivaikkal was the culmination of the lightning military offensive that

killed at least 40,000 civilians in the final months of the fighting, according to UN estimates. Sri Lankan forces were accused of indiscriminately shelling civilians after telling them to move to "no fire zones" to clear the path of their assault. — AFP

DRC thwarts Kinshasa 'coup attempt': Army

KINSHASA, DR Congo: The DR Congo military on Sunday thwarted an attempted coup near the offices of President Felix Tshisekedi in Kinshasa involving "foreigners and Congolese", the army spokesperson said.

The coup bid took place in the early hours of the morning outside the residence of economy minister Vital Kamerhe, in the Gombe area in the north of the capital, near the Palais de la Nation which houses the president's offices. "An attempted coup d'etat has been stopped by the defence and security forces," said General Sylvain Ekenge in a message broadcast on national television.

He added that the "foreigners and Congolese ... including their leader" would "all no longer cause any harm". Shots were also heard near the Palais de la Nation at the time of the coup attempt, according to a number of sources. Ekenge did not give any more details on the coup attempt. AFP also contacted official sources but has so far received no reply.

'Shocked by the events'

"I am shocked by the events this morning and very worried by the reports of American citizens allegedly involved," Lucy Tamlyn, the US ambassador to the DRC, posted on X, formerly Twitter. "Rest assured that we are cooperating with authorities in DRC to the fullest extent possible, as they investigate these criminal acts and hold accountable any American citizen involved."

A number of people were also injured in Brazzaville, when a shell from Kinshasa fell into a neighborhood in the capital of the Republic of Congo, which sits just across the Congo river from the DRC.

"A few people have been lightly injured, one of whom has been transported to the army hospital of Brazzaville for treatment by the health service," government spokesperson and Minister of Communication and Media Thierry Moungalla said in a statement.

During the day certain streets near the Palais de la Nation remained closed to traffic, but the situation appeared calm, AFP journalists reported. Reports began to circulate on social media in the early morning of an attack on Kamerhe's home by armed men, some of whom then went to the Palais de la Nation.

There was "an armed attack" this morning at the residence of the economy minister, Japan's ambassador to Kinshasa Hidetoshi Ogawa wrote on X. Kamerhe "was not harmed ... (but) two policemen and an assailant were killed according to sources", he added. France's ambassador reported automatic weapons fire in the quarter, urging nationals to avoid the area.

Zaire flags

Videos on social media showed men in fatigues at the Palais de la Nation, brandishing flags of Zaire, the name of the Democratic Republic of Congo under the dictator Mobutu Sese Seko who was overthrown in 1997. AFP was unable to verify the videos.

Several heavily armed military vehicles drove from the Palais de la Nation towards a large intersection, also in Gombe, AFP witnessed. Construction blocks obstructed the road leading to the Palais de la Nation, while soldiers on foot blocked access to a boulevard near Tshisekedi's offices. — AFP

'Blood everywhere': Survivor recounts Afghanistan attack

KABUL: When she first heard the gunshots, French tourist Anne-France Brill thought for a split second there was a celebration in the Afghan market where she and her fellow travelers stopped to buy fruit.

But then she heard one of her companions screaming: "I realized she had blood all over her stomach." The 55-year-old had been sitting in a van during a group tour in the mountainous city of Bamiyan on Friday evening when a gunman approached their vehicles and opened fire. Brill was unhurt, but the Lithuanian woman next to her was hit. "She had gone completely white," Brill said. "She was saying, 'I'm cold, I'm cold ... I'm going to die'."

The spray of gunfire only lasted seconds, Brill recalled, followed by long minutes of uncertainty crouching on the floor of the van, wondering what had happened, if it was over, what to do. "There was blood everywhere," Brill told AFP on the phone.

A Norwegian man in the van had also been wounded, and their driver had been killed. He was one of six gunned down: three Spanish tourists, two Afghan men working with the group and a Taleban security official who returned fire on the gunman.

Suddenly, Taleban authorities swarmed the street,

cordoning off and clearing the road. As they approached the car where Brill and the others were, they still weren't sure if they were safe. "But we didn't have a choice (but to get out) as we had wounded" in the van.

Evacuation to Kabul

The wounded were bundled into the back of Taleban authorities' trucks and rushed to the hospital in Bamiyan, and later to Kabul, around 180 kilometers (110 miles) away. Brill said her and other tourists who escaped unhurt were given a security escort overnight to Kabul, where they were taken in by a European Union delegation.

Before leaving Bamiyan, she helped gather the belongings of those killed and wounded, including from the site of the attack. "They were covered in blood, but it's so important for the families, so we tried to recover what we could," she said.

One item stuck out, the backpack of a young woman. The bodies of three Spanish victims were due to be returned to Spain on Sunday and the wounded to be transferred out of Kabul, diplomats said.

Brill and two Americans took early flights out of Kabul to Dubai, the shock taking its different tolls on the group. "I cried my eyes out in front of the conveyor belt in Dubai, my suitcase was spinning, and all of a sudden, boom," she said. "I had to let go and say to myself, "That's it, now I'm safe'," she said, speaking from Dubai.

Fledgling tourism industry

An avid traveler drawn to places off the beaten path Brill had long thought of visiting Afghanistan, one of the scores of foreign tourists drawn to experience the country's rich landscapes, history and culture long rendered virtually unreachable by decades of war.

More than two years after the Taleban ended their insurgency, ousting the Western-backed government, "it seemed possible", said Brill, who lives just outside Paris but whose career in marketing took her all over the world.

Used to travelling independently, she still opted for a tour group — conscious of the remaining challenges of travelling in Afghanistan, a country with poor infrastructure, dilapidated health services, tight Taleban government controls, little diplomatic presence and lingering security threats.

The attack on Brill's group was the first reported deadly assault on foreign tourists in Afghanistan since the return of the Taleban to power in 2021, the authorities encouraging travelers and a fledgling tourism sector. The group had arrived in Kabul on Wednesday, Bamiyan their first stop outside the Afghan capital to see the famed remnants of the 1,500-year-old giant Buddhas destroyed in 2001 by the Taleban during their first rule.

She and her companions had been just getting to know each other, trading tips over WhatsApp before arriving, then sharing their first Afghan meals as they looked forward to stops in the cities of Herat and Kandahar. But instead of bonding through their travels, the group is now tied together over haunting memories, their WhatsApp messages sharing word of their wounded companions. "An experience like that, when something like that happens to you, it creates bonds," she said. — AFP

Fresh floods kill 66 in northern Afghanistan

KABUL: Fresh floods killed 66 people in Faryab province in northern Afghanistan, a provincial official said Sunday, in the latest deadly flooding to hit the country. Hundreds of people have died in separate flash floods this month that have also swamped farmland in a country where 80 percent of the population depends on agriculture to survive.

The latest heavy floods hit multiple districts of Faryab province on Saturday night and "resulted in human and financial losses," said Asmatullah Muradi, spokesman for the Faryab governor, in a statement. "Due to the floods 66 people were killed," he said, adding that at least five people were injured and others were still missing.

The flooding damaged more than 1,500 houses, swamped more than 1,000 acres of agricultural land and killed livestock in their hundreds, he said. The floods came a day after provincial police said more than 50 people were killed in flash flooding in the western province of Ghor.

Just over a week ago, more than 300 people were killed in flash flooding in northern Baghlan province, according to the UN World Food Program (WFP) and Taleban officials.

Taleban officials have warned the tolls would go up in regions impacted by flooding, as destroyed infrastructure hampered aid delivery and efforts to find the missing. The death toll from the Ghor flooding rose from 50 to 55 on Sunday, according to Abdul Wahid Hamas, a spokesman for the provincial governor. "More than 3,000 homes were totally destroyed

due to the floods" in Ghor, he added.

Videos shared on social media platform X by the WFP showed torrents of brown water crashing through walls of homes and churning through streets in Ghor.

Residents in Baghlan, Ghor, Faryab and other affected regions found themselves without shelter, stripped of their homes and livelihoods. "We were inside our home when rain started and all of a sudden, a flash flood came, we were trying to get things out but it washed away our home, our life, everything," Chor resident lawan Gul told AFP on Saturday

The WFP warned that the recent floods have

compounded an already dire humanitarian situation in the impoverished country. Spring floods are not uncommon in Afghanistan, a country of more than 40 million people, but above-average rainfall this year has sparked devastating flash flooding.

Even before the most recent spate of floods, about 100 people had been killed from mid-April to early May as a result of flooding in 10 of Afghanistan's provinces, authorities said. The rains come after a prolonged drought in Afghanistan, which is one of the least prepared nations to tackle climate change impacts, according to experts. — AFP

Tycoon Musk launches Starlink in Indonesia

DENPASAR, Indonesia: Tech billionaire Elon Musk launched Sunday his Starlink service on Indonesia's resort island of Bali as the country aims to extend internet to its remote areas. Millions of people in Indonesia, a vast archipelago of more than 17,000 islands, are not currently hooked up to reliable internet services.

Musk, making his first visit to the Southeast Asian nation, inaugurated the satellite unit services at a clinic in Bali's capital Denpasar on Sunday afternoon. He also signed an agreement on the health sector along with Indonesia's Health Minister Budi Gunadi Sadikin. Musk and the officials also attended a presentation by staff members from Indonesia's community clinics in Bali and Maluku provinces on the acceleration of internet speeds after using Starlink.

The internet services have been pilot-tested in three health facilities in the regions to input various data sets into the national system, such as those on immunizations, child nutrition and diabetes.

"We are very excited to bring

connectivity to places that either have no connectivity or, as you saw in the demonstration, very low bandwidth connectivity," Musk said at a news conference. "So, this can make a really lifesaver for remote medical clinics. And I think it can be transformative for education as well," added Musk, sporting a green shirt made of traditional Balinese woven fabric called "endek".

The Indonesian government is moving the capital from traffic-clogged Jakarta, where researchers say large areas could be underwater by 2050 due to rising sea levels and land subsidence to Nusantara.

After the trial, Starlink, which acquired a permit to operate in Indonesia earlier this month, could be rolled out commercially across the archipelago. Starlink is already available in Southeast Asia in Malaysia and the Philippines. Using a network of low Earth orbit satellites, Starlink can provide internet to remote locations or areas that have had normal communications infrastructure disabled.

as source material. AI's underlying intelligence, therefore, is only as good as the world it came from, as likely to be filled with wit, wisdom, and usefulness, as well as hatred,

prejudice and rants. "It's dangerous because people are embracing and adopting AI software and really depending on it," said Joshua Weaver, Director of Texas Opportunity & Justice Incubator, a legal consultancy.

"We can get into this feedback loop where the bias in our own selves and culture informs bias in the AI and becomes a sort of reinforcing loop," he said. Making sure technology more accurately reflects human diversity is not just a political choice.

Other uses of AI, like facial recognition, have seen companies thrown into hot water with authorities for discrimination. This was the case against Rite-Aid, a US pharmacy chain, where in-store cameras

falsely tagged consumers, particularly women and people of color, as shoplifters, according to the Federal Trade Commission.

ChatGPT-style generative AI, which can create a semblance of human-level reasoning in just seconds, opens up new opportunities to get things wrong, experts worry. The AI giants are well aware of the problem, afraid that their models can descend into bad behavior, or overly reflect a western society when their user base is global. "We have people asking queries from Indonesia or the US," said Google CEO Sundar Pichai, explaining why requests for images of doctors or lawyers will strive to reflect racial diversity.

But these considerations can reach absurd levels and lead to angry accusations of excessive political correctness. This is what happened when Google's Gemini image generator spat out an image of German soldiers from World War Two that absurdly in-

cluded a black man and Asian woman. "Obviously, the mistake was that we over-applied... where it should have never applied. That was a bug and we got it wrong," Pichai said. But Sasha Luccioni, a research scientist at Hugging Face, a leading platform for AI models cautioned that "thinking that there's a technological solution to bias is kind of already going down the wrong path." Generative AI is essentially about whether the output "corresponds to what the user expects it to" and

Military spending pushes Russian economic growth up

MOSCOW: Russia's economy grew 5.4 percent in the first quarter of 2024, official statistics published Friday showed, as President Vladimir Putin denied military spending on his Ukraine offensive was reaching unsustainable levels.

The Kremlin has heavily militarized Russia's economy since sending troops into Ukraine in February 2022, with the vast outlays helping to power growth and cushion the blow of Western sanctions.

But it has also set off inflation and comparisons with runaway defense spending that hobbled the Soviet Union in the 1980s. The Rosstat statistics agency said the first quarter growth was up from 4.9 percent in the fourth quarter of last year. The inflation rate also picked up over the month, however, to 7.8 percent. On a state visit to China, Putin denied that Russia's vast military spending - which he said had passed eight percent of GDP - had hit unsustainable levels.

"It is not critical yet. In the Soviet Union in 1985-1986, defense spending was 13 percent" of GDP, he said. "Taking into account the state of the economy, macroeconomic indicators and budget revenue forecasts, combined defense and security spending of eight-and-a-bit percent is not critical," he added.

Earlier in the week, Putin had said Russia's military spending was a "great resource" that should be used "carefully and effectively." He said Friday that experts believe Russia's state finances still have room to accommodate even higher expenditure. Russian troops last week launched a major new offensive on Ukraine's northeastern Kharkiv region. Putin has signalled he sees Moscow's path to victory on the battlefield by outspending Ukraine and its Western backers.

The reorientation of Russia's crucial energy exports to the likes of China and India has helped it weather Western sanctions that many analysts predicted would push Russia into a deep recession. China has become Russia's most important economic ally over the last two years. Putin on Friday blasted US attempts to put pressure on Beijing over its ties with Moscow. He called US threats of sanctions on Chinese banks and companies that deal with Russia "illegitimate" and said lenders in both countries were working to overcome problems

with cross-border payments. The United States has targeted companies in third countries, including China, that it says are helping Russia purchase sanctioned goods for its military. While helping to secure strong headline growth, Russia's increased military spending has caused some economic difficulties at home.

Inflation climbed from 7.7 percent to 7.8 percent in April, Rosstat said on Friday - ahead of analysts' expectations and further from the government's official 4.0-percent target.

The central bank has hiked its key interest rate to 16 percent in a bid to combat rising prices. And parts of the economy not supported by the offensive - such as the services and IT sectors - are seeing record labor shortages. Many young men have been drafted, left the country or recruited by the booming weapons industry. – AFP



Dollar weakens amid better than expected inflation readings

KUWAIT: Producer prices in the US rose more than expected in April, increasing by 0.5 percent compared to a forecasted 0.3 percent rise. The increase was largely due to service prices, which jumped 0.6 percent, with increases in service costs such as portfolio management and hotel stays. This indicates that inflation remains high. The rise comes after surveys showed people expect inflation to increase, leading to less expectation of the Federal Reserve cutting interest rates in September.

While inflation rose in the first quarter due to factors like businesses raising prices and service providers catching up on increased costs, economists are hopeful it will go down again this quarter as the job market cools down. However, Federal Reserve Chair Jerome Powell is not as confident in this prediction. Financial markets reacted to the news with stocks rising, the dollar weakening, and bond prices increasing. The chance of a rate cut in September is now seen as 60 percent, down from 64 percent before the PPI data release. Some economists believe the Fed might even cut rates in July.

Fed Chair Powell speaks

With inflation running faster than anticipated through the first three months of the year, the US Chair of the Federal Reserve Jerome Powell acknowledged that "my confidence in that is not as high as it was," but he still believes it is unlikely that the Fed would have to raise rates further, even if the likelihood of rate cuts has become less certain. "We did not expect this to be a smooth road, but these

were higher than I think anybody expected" Powell added referring to recent inflation readings. Despite this, he gave a bullish outlook stating, "I expect that inflation will move back down ... on a monthly basis to levels that were more like the lower readings that we were having last year." Markets are pricing in two rate cuts by year-end.

Consumer price index

US consumer price index increased less than expected in April, where the month-over-month figure showed a 0.3 percent increase, lower than the previous figure of 0.4 percent. The year-over-year figure showed a slight decrease from the previous 3.5 percent figure at 3.4 percent for the month. Core CPI was also slightly lower for the month at 0.3 percent, in line with expectations. The majority of the increase for the figure was attributed to shelter and gasoline costs, where shelter rose 0.4 percent for the third straight month, and gasoline rose 2.8 percent following a 1.7 percent increase in March.

Retail sales

US retail sales was flat in April, with the monthover-month figure showing no change, well below expectations of a 0.4 percent increase, and below a downward revised 0.6 percent increase seen in March. The figure supports the narrative that consumer spending is losing momentum, with gasoline prices ticking higher, and consumers pulling back from spending on goods. Speculation for rate cuts continues to vary greatly among economists, while market expectations for rate cuts to begin in September increased slightly following the data release.

Unemployment claims

There's a recent rise in unemployment claims in the US, reaching the highest level since late August 2023. This could signal a shift in the previously hot job market. The Labor department data showed an increase in both new claims (231,000) and continuing claims (1.78 million) compared to the prior week. This comes after a period of strong hiring, but April's numbers fell short of expectations. Additionally, job

The Bank of England Governor emphasized that they are still focused on bringing down inflation and won't be considering lowering rates anytime soon.

Japan's producer price index

Japan's producer price index
Japan's producer prices continued to climb
in April 2024, rising 0.9 percent year-over-year
for the second month in a row. This marks the
39th consecutive month of producer prices increases and the highest inflation rate for manufacturers since October 2023. The increase was
broad-based, with most categories experiencing
rising costs. Notably, transportation equipment,
food and beverages, and various machinery sectors saw significant price hikes. However, there
were some exceptions: chemicals and iron and
steel prices continued to decline. Overall, this

data suggests ongoing inflationary pressures for Japanese manufacturers, potentially leading to higher consumer prices in the near future.

The Japanese yen continues its weakening trend, with the USD/JPY pair closing at 153.52.

China's consumer price index

CPI in China grew for the third straight month rising 0.3 percent y/y versus expectations and previous figure of a 0.1 percent growth. The reading comes amid stronger than expected Chinese imports data, indicating that local demand in the world's second largest economy is starting to pick up. Despite this, PPI continues to lag, declining 2.5 percent in April, more than forecasts of a 2.3 percent fall. Chinese business activity remains under pressure amid weak overseas demand. Additionally, volatile local consumer spending and the continuation of the property slump adds to the problems faced by Chinese policymakers despite introducing a series of easing measures to support the econo-

Queen Camilla pledges not to buy new fur, say activists

ritain's Queen Camilla has promised not to buy any more fur for her wardrobe, according to a letter from Buckingham Palace that animal rights group PETA released Wednesday. Camilla - a keen fox hunter before it was made illegal in the UK - follows in the footsteps of late Queen Elizabeth II, who announced she would stop buying fur in 2019. The letter, on Buckingham Palace headed notepaper, said: "I can confirm that Her Majesty will not procure any new fur garments." AFP contacted the palace for comment.

PETA founder Ingrid Newkirk welcomed the move as being "right and proper for the monarchy", and said it was in line with the overwhelming majority of British people who also refuse to wear animal fur. The activist group has been calling for years for the Ministry of Defense to end the use of bearskin for the hats worn by ceremonial guards.

The tall, black hats are worn by the elite regiments, including for the Changing of the Guard outside Buckingham Palace, and are one of the best-known symbols of the UK. The MoD has argued that faux fur alternatives do not meet their standards. Camilla's decision is the latest royal move to address animal welfare concerns, with her husband King Charles III a lifelong environmentalist. Charles and Camilla were presented this month with the "Coronation Roll", a written record of their coronation last year.

It was the first time it was written on paper rather than vellum from animal skin in its 700-year history. However, the king and queen wore ermine-trimmed capes and crowns made from stoats at the ceremony. Camilla's pledge does not require her to stop wearing fur items she already owns. - AFP

'No secret': Modest Mexican taco restaurant wins Michelin star

hole-in-the-wall taqueria among the first restaurants in Mexico to be awarded a star by the prestigious Michelin Guide - an accomplishment its owner credits to "love and effort." El Califa de Leon is one of 18 restaurants given either one or two stars in the inaugural Michelin Guide Mexico unveiled Tuesday. The longstanding family business specializes in just four types of tacos and has room for only a few customers at a time in the San Rafael district of Mexico City. "This taqueria may be bare bones with just enough room for a handful of diners to stand at the counter but its creation, the Gaonera taco, is exceptional," the Michelin Guide said on its website.

"Thinly sliced beef filet is expertly cooked to order, seasoned with only salt and a squeeze of lime. At the same time, a second cook prepares the excellent corn tortillas alongside. The resulting combination is elemental and pure," it added. The Gaonera - which costs a little over four dollars - was created in honor of the celebrated Mexican bullfighter Rodolfo Gaona, whose nickname in the ring was "El Califa de Leon." The restaurant was founded more than 50 years ago by the parents of current owner Mario Hernandez.

"My father said, 'Do you want me to tell you the secret of the meat? There is no secret," only "love and effort," the 66-year-old said outside, his voice full of emotion. Hernandez said his father taught him to always take care of quality, customer service and prices, because "life is a wheel of fortune with high times and low times."

'Well deserved'

On Wednesday, the usual office workers and other regulars were outnumbered by dozens of journalists and gastronomy experts attracted by the Michelin star. The tacos "are really delicious," said 19-year-old gastronomy student Hector Lancastre, adding that the international recognition was "well deserved." Two decidedly more upmar-

ket Mexico City restaurants were each awarded two stars. Michelin praised Quintonil for "an enticing melding of excellent local product, impressive execution, and great creativity to produce refined compositions.

"The tasting menu is constantly evolving but may reveal delights such as crab and shards of blue corn tostada arranged with a vivid pipian verde enhanced with untraditional elements like galangal, lemongrass, and makrut lime," it said. At Pujol, meanwhile, "tradition and invention go hand-in-hand in the likes of scallop ceviche with egg salad or grilled Baja coast rockfish with butternut squash puree and sherry foam," it said.

"The savory progression culminates with mole madre, an effort like no other that celebrates Mexican history and cuisine in the most profound way," it added. Tire-manufacturing brothers Andre and Edouard Michelin launched their first guide in 1900 to encourage motorists to discover restaurants around France. It has since expanded to dozens of destinations around the world. — AFP

'MALDIVES WHAT?': SAUDI FASHIONISTAS ATTEMPT BEACH REBRAND

audi designer Tima Abid got her start at a time when fashion shows were taboo and tourism, apart from religious pilgrimages, was almost nonexistent in the Gulf kingdom. So she was as surprised as anyone to see models draped in her latest couture collection gliding down an overwater boardwalk connecting beachfront villas that go for nearly \$2,000 per night. The sunset show on Thursday kicked off Saudi Arabia's first Red Sea Fashion Week, pitched by organizers as a milestone both for Saudi fashion and for a nascent tourism sector whose growth is key to diversifying the economy of the world's biggest crude oil exporter.

Abid's collection of two dozen "resort wear" dresses featured flowing white and beige fabrics and only the occasional visible midriff. A second show on Friday was billed as the first to focus on women's swimwear, an envelope-pushing development in a conservative Muslim country that less than a decade ago required women to wear body-covering abaya robes.

"You may say it is boldness, but I look at it in another way: keeping pace with globalism," Abid told AFP while sur-

rounded by models and harried, headset-wearing show producers. "The borders and restrictions that used to exist have been abolished, and this has given us an opportunity to show our creativity in a more beautiful way."

The crowd on Thursday included designers, fashion journalists and Saudi celebrities like Lojain Omran, best known abroad for her turn on the money-drenched Netflix show "Dubai Bling".

The range of designs on display demonstrated Saudi Arabia's seriousness about competing not just with Dubai but other fashion capitals, Omran said. "If you want to reach a global audience in fashion, you have to reach all types of people—the conservatives, and those who are the opposite," she said.

'Something very new'
The setting for Red Sea Fashion

Week, the St Regis Red Sea Resort on Ummahat Alshaikh island off Saudi Arabia's west coast, is accessible only by chartered boat or seaplane. It is part of Red Sea Global, one of the so-called giga-projects at the heart of Saudi Arabia's Vision 2030 social and economic reform program overseen by Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman.

As doubts grow about the feasibility of the most prominent giga-project—a planned futuristic mega-city known as NEOM—officials involved in Red Sea Global stress they are making progress, opening two resorts last year and preparing to launch 14 more hotels by the end of next year. Since debuting a general tourism visa in 2019, formerly closed-off Saudi Arabia has tried to dispel the notion that it is one giant desert, showcasing mountains in the south and securing hosting rights for the Asian Winter Games in 2029 in a region of NEOM known as Trojena.

Beach developments are seen as major potential attractions, and Red Sea Fashion Week was partly intended to highlight what is already in place, said Burak Cakmak, chief executive of the Saudi Fashion Commission. "Obvious-

ly logistically we are trying something very new. We are on a remote island that takes half an hour by boat to get to... There are many limitations on being able to do shows here," he said. "I would love everybody not (only) to explore Saudi designs, but also explore Saudi as a destination." Taking in preparations for Abid's show, Saudi designer Alanoud Badr of Lady Fozaza compared the kingdom favorably to a more established island locale. "It's just something you would never expect, and honestly all I can say is, Maldives what?"

Differences among countries

Model Beatris Resende said that growing up in Brazil, she often thought of the Middle East as a single place that was not depicted very flatteringly. Only through travelling and modelling in the region has she come to appreciate differences among countries. "I'm going to be honest. I really want people to stop looking at countries as the stereotype and actually get to know the places," she said. —AFP

'Historic': Saudi stages first swimwear fashion show

audi Arabia held its first fashion show featuring swimsuit models on Friday, an envelope-pushing step in a country where less than a decade ago women were required to wear body-covering abaya robes. The poolside show featuring the work of Moroccan designer Yasmina Qanzal included mostly one-piece suits in shades of red, beige and blue. Most models had exposed shoulders and some had their midriffs partially visible. "It's true that this country is very conservative but we tried to show elegant swimsuits which represent the Arab world," Qanzal told AFP.

"When we came here, we understood that a swimsuit fashion show in Saudi Arabia is a historic moment, because it is the first time to have such event," she said, adding it was "an honor" to be involved. The show took place on the second day of the inaugural Red Sea Fashion Week at the St Regis Red Sea Resort, situated off Saudi Arabia's western coast.

The resort is part of Red Sea Global,

one of the so-called giga-projects at the heart of Saudi Arabia's Vision 2030 social and economic reform program overseen by Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman. Shouq Mohammed, a Syrian fashion influencer who attended Friday's show, said it was not surprising given Saudi Arabia's attempt to open up to the world and grow its fashion and tourism sectors. The fashion industry in 2022 accounted for \$12.5 billion, or 1.4 percent of national GDP, and employed 230,000 people, according to a report published last year by the official Saudi Fashion Commission.

"It's the first time to have a swimsuit fashion show in Saudi Arabia, but why not? Seriously why not?" Mohammed said. "It's possible and we have it here." Raphael Simacourbe, a French influencer who also attended on Friday, said there was nothing risque to his eyes but in the Saudi context it was a major achievement. —AFP

'CAN I KILL SOMEONE?': RICHARD GERE'S DILEMMA IN 'OH, CANADA'

s one of the West's most fa-mous Buddhists, and a close friend of the Dalai Lama, Richard Gere has thought long and hard about the moral quandary at the heart of his new film "Oh, Canada". Gere plays Leonard Fife, a revered documentary filmmaker with a murky past, who is hailed as a hero for his refusal to fight in the Vietnam War. "Whether it is a just or unjust war, can I kill someone? What do I do to defend our family?... We all ask ourselves that question," Gere said at Cannes Film Festival on Saturday. According to his Buddhist studies, "from an absolute point of view, if you either are to be killed, or kill someone else, better that you be killed," he told AFP.

But "it's very hard to exist that way", Gere admitted. As the film opens, Leonard is frail and at death's door. Determined to unburden himself of his past deceits, he agrees to be interviewed about his mysterious past. It soon emerges that his entire, successful life has been built on a series of lies. His true reasons for fleeing from the United States to Canada as the Vietnam War raged are just the tip of the iceberg. Based on the novel "Foregone" by Russell Banks, "Oh, Canada" is Gere's second film with Paul Schrader, the screenwriter of "Raging Bull" and "Taxi Driver".

'Freaky'

It comes more than four decades after Schrader launched Gere into Hollywood's A-list by casting him in "American Gigolo". If that role was responsible for positioning Gere as a



world-famous sex symbol, his appearance in "Oh, Canada" could not be further removed from that glamour. The film finds Gere sporting blotched skin, restricted to a wheelchair, and carrying a urine drainage bag. "It was kind of freaky when we going through the process of ageing," said Gere. "I saw myself some years from now, what

I'm going to look like. It's a very odd

The actor drew on his own father, who passed away recently. In the film, it is never clear whether the memories Leonard is recounting are accurate, or the warped result of his guilt, powerful cancer medication, and the lengthy passage of time. "I saw that with my

father when he was dying. He had memories that were completely false, that he was absolutely certain they happened," he recalled.

The film jumps between the present and past. Modern-day heartthrob Jacob Elordi, of television's "Euphoria," portrays a younger Leonard. But even in the flashbacks, Gere

sometimes appears on screen as his younger self, adding to the sense that our narrator may not be reliable. "Things are all over the place. I think you'd take a couple of screenings of this to make more sense of it," said Gere. "It's a complicated piece."—AFP

Film director **Mohammad** Rasoulof fled Iran on foot: Guardian

■ilm director Mohammad Rasoulof made an "exhausting and extremely dangerous" walk across a mountainous borderland in order to avoid being jailed in Iran on national security charges, he told the Guardian newspaper. Rasoulof said Monday he had fled Iran after a court sentenced him to eight years in jail, of which five were due to be served, over his new film "The Seed of the Sacred Fig". The leading Iranian film-maker, often a target of the country's authorities, told the Guardian in an interview published Friday that he had found shelter in Germany and was hopeful he could attend the film's Cannes premiere

next week. The film tells the story of a judge's struggles amid political unrest in Tehran. Rasoulof told the UK newspaper that he had "no choice" but to leave, although he expects to return home "auite soon". "My mission is to be able to convey the narratives of what is going on in Iran and the situation in which we are stuck as Iranians," said Rasoulof. "This is something that I cannot do in prison. "I have in mind the idea that I'll be back quite soon, but I think that's the case of all the Iranians who have left the country," he added. Rasoulof has already served two terms in Iranian jails over previous films and had his passport withdrawn in 2017.

Having decided to leave, Rasoulof told the newspaper he cut all communications via mobile phones and computers and made his way by foot on a secret route to a border crossing. "It was a several-hour long, exhausting and extremely dangerous walk that I had to do with a guide," he said. After staying in a safe house, he contacted German authorities who provided him with papers that enabled him to travel to Europe. —AFP

Rare sequel to 'My Neighbor Totoro' to play at Cannes

our rare short films from Japanese animation's Studio Ghibli, including a sequel to "My Neighbor Totoro", will be screened at the Cannes Film Festival, organizers said Saturday. The screenings will be part of an "unprecedented event" this Monday, as the legendary animation group becomes the first collective to receive an honorary Palme d'Or. The accolade is typically bestowed on individuals.

Three of the four short films have never been screened outside of Japan, and come "straight from the Ghibli Museum in Mitaka," said an official Cannes press release. Among the films is 2002's "Mei and the Baby Cat Bus," billed as a "mini-sequel" to Ghibli co-founder Hayao Miyazaki's 1989 classic "My Neigh-

bor Totoro". Hayao Miyazaki, 83, will not personally attend the French festival, but his son Goro Miyazaki will take the stage for the ceremony on Monday afternoon, organizers said.

Hayao Miyazaki makes few public appearances. Despite announced his retirement more than once, he continues to work, and was back in cinemas last year with "The Boy and the Heron". The Oscar-winning Studio Ghibli, founded 40 years ago, is beloved worldwide for its masterpieces like "My Neighbor Totoro", "Spirited Away" and "Howl's Moving Castle". "My Neighbor Totoro" follows two sisters who move with their

father to the countryside where they come across Totoro and other forest

With its whimsical pastels and postwar Japanese countryside setting, the movie made its debut in 1988 and became an instant classic. The film's characters have become cultural icons with the eponymous wood spirit Totoro serving as the mascot for Studio Ghibli. The other three short films set to be screened Monday are "House Hunting"," Boro the Caterpillar" and "Mr. Dough and the Egg Princess". -AFP

Brit drama 'Bird' brings grit, fantasy and tunes to Cannes

ird", featuring Barry Keoghan as a young dad, is an early frontrunner at the Cannes Film Festival with its tough but sweetly fantastical tale of working-class England. Irish actor Keoghan is one of Hollywood's most sought-after stars following hit film "Saltburn" and his Oscar nomination for "The Banshees of Inisherin". But it's 14-year-old newcomer Nykiya Adams who carries the movie, dealing with a world of gang violence, poverty, teen pregnancy and abusive parents -- and who finds support from an otherworldly character called Bird (played by German actor Franz Rogowski).

Keoghan said there were "a lot of similarities" to his tough upbringing in the Summerhill neighbourhood of Dublin and he could easily relate to his character, Bug: "A pure chancer, a pure charmer." "I've been saying in interviews since 2015 that I wanted to work with Andrea Arnold and then the opportunity came. I wasn't even given a script... I'd do anything she makes," said Keoghan, who will soon star as the Joker in "The Batman Part II". "Bird" director Arnold is one of Britain's most acclaimed directors, with an Oscar for short film "Wasp" and three

Jury Prizes at Cannes for "Red Road", "Fish Tank" and "American Honey".

She said she wanted to capture the rich life of Gravesend, a working-class town an hour from London, close to where she grew up. "There's a load of life, probably because it is so working-class. I grew up in a working-class family and they were definitely not afraid to express themselves," she told AFP, laughing. She said they found their young star by asking schools in the area for "their naughtiest kids". "Interestingly Nykiya wasn't quite the kid I had in mind, but she really struck me as having this presence," Arnold said.

'Always been a dancer'

As always with Arnold's films, there is an ultra-cool soundtrack featuring bands such as Fontaines DC, Sleaford Mods and Burial. "I've always been a dancer," Arnold revealed. "At age 13 I was out four or five nights at clubs. I'd get in for free because I always started the dancing. I'd go wearing flat shoes and really comfortable clothes. I was straight on the dance floor and I was there all night." In typically understated fashion, she first met Keoghan in a cafe and they immediately hit it off.


"I just loved him. I love the way he looks and he feels very real to my world. It was Halloween and I think he was very amused because I gave him a toffee apple and some pumpkin," Arnold said. The Hollywood Reporter called "Bird" a "warmhearted fable", while Deadline said it's "a jolt of culture shock that makes way for universal human truths". It is one of 22 entries for the Palme d'Or at the Cannes Film Festival, which concludes with its awards ceremony on May 25.-AFP

Disturbing video shows Sean 'Diddy' Combs assaulting partner

isturbing surveillance video published Friday shows Sean "Diddy" Combs physically assaulting his then-girlfriend Casandra Ventura, corroborating allegations she made in a now-settled lawsuit late last year. Combs is the target of several civil lawsuits that characterize him as a violent sexual predator who used alcohol and drugs to subdue his victims, and his homes were raided this year by federal agents. The 2016 footage, which was obtained and published by CNN, shows the rap mogul hitting, dragging and kicking the singer known as Cassie, who in her recent lawsuit said Combs subjected her to more than a decade of coercion by physical force and drugs, plus a 2018 rape.

In the video, Ventura leaves a hotel room after which Combs, appearing to wear only a towel, chases her before throwing her to the ground and assaulting her. "The gut-wrenching video has only further confirmed the disturbing and predatory behavior of Mr. Combs. Words cannot express the courage and fortitude that Ms. Ventura has shown in coming forward to bring this to light," read a statement from her lawyer Douglas Wigdor.

Ventura sued Combs in federal court last fall, a bombshell suit that was settled out of court but succeeded by a string of similarly lurid sexual assault claims against the hip-hop star. Ventura met Combs when she was 19 and he was 37, after which he signed her to his label and they began a romantic relationship. Combs has vehemently denied all accusations against him. His lawyer did not immediately respond to a request for comment from AFP. In March armed agents entered Combs' sprawling luxury properties in Miami and Los Angeles, a heavily publicized bicoastal operation that suggested an investigation into the rapper is underway. - AFP

Usyk beats Fury to become undisputed world heavyweight boxing champion

An unprecedented feat in boxing's four-belt era

RIYADH: Oleksandr Usyk beat Tyson Fury by split decision to win the world's first undisputed heavyweight championship in 25 years on Sunday, an unprecedented feat in boxing's four-belt era.

Britain's Fury, who was undecided after the fight about triggering the rematch clause, was the early aggressor but Usyk gradually took charge and the "Gypsy King" was saved by the bell in the ninth round before slumping to his first career defeat.

Ukraine's Usyk, who remains undefeated, joins the likes of Muhammad Ali, Joe Louis and Mike Tyson as undisputed heavyweight champion, the first since boxing recognized four major belts in the 2000s. With the win, the former undisputed cruiserweight champion can legitimately claim to be the best of this heavyweight era, although a rematch expected in October could provide another twist.

"It is a big opportunity for me, for my family, for my country," said Usyk, 37, who briefly served as a soldier after the Russian invasion. "It's a great time, a great day," he said, adding that he was "ready for a rematch". Fury called it a "fantastic fight with Oleksandr" but claimed that sympathy for Ukraine's ongoing war with Russia swung the judges.

"I believe I won that fight, I believe he won a few of the rounds, but I won the majority of them," he said. "You know his country is at war, so people are siding with the country at war but make no mistake, I won that fight in my opinion and I will be back."

Fury, however, said he would discuss the potential rematch, loosely scheduled for October, with his wife and children. "I'll have a holiday, go home, put it to the wife and kids, I'll see what I want to do," he told reporters. "I'm 36 in a few months. I've been boxing since I've been a child so it is what it is." Britain's Lennox Lewis was the last man to unify the heavyweight belts - three at the time - after beating Evander Holyfield in 1999. It is unlikely that any October rematch would be for all four belts as the IBF plan to strip Usyk if he does not face its mandatory challenger Filip Hrgovic next.

Fired-up Fury

Two judges scored it for Usyk by scores of 115-112 and 114-113 while the third gave it to Fury 114-113. The victory extended Usyk's professional record to 22-0. After his first loss, Fury stands at 34-1-1.

Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelensky, leading the war effort against Russia for more than two years, posted on social media: "Ukrainians hit hard! And in the end, all our opponents will be defeated." Usyk, who adds Fury's WBC belt to his IBF, WBA and WBO titles, looks set to go down as one of the greats after dominating at amateur, cruiserweight and now the top division.

A fired-up Fury came running out of his corner to start the fight and the 6ft 9ins (2.06m) man was quickly into his rhythm, keeping the shorter Usyk back with his jab and playing to the crowd. Usyk got inside with some quick combinations while Fury landed some heavy body shots. By round four, the Mancunian was taunting his ever-advancing opponent and showboating, guard down.

Usyk called two low shots in round five and got caught with a left hook as Fury continued to look comfortable, landing a telling uppercut in the following round and bobbing and weaving to stay out

But the Ukrainian tagged Fury with two clean lefts in the seventh and landed a punishing hook that dazed the "Gypsy King" in the eighth. After turning pro, he unified the cruiserweight belts in 15 fights before moving up to heavyweight, where he took three belts from Anthony Joshua in 2021 and won their rematch the following year. — AFP

Bengaluru win 6 in row to make **IPL** play-offs

BENGALURU: Skipper Faf du Plessis and Virat Kohli hit key knocks to help Royal Challengers Bengaluru seal the last play-off spot in the Indian Premier League with a 27-run win over defending champions Chennai Super Kings on Saturday.

Bengaluru posted 218-5 after Du Plessis, who hit 54, and Kohli, who smashed 47, laid the foundations for the total in a rain-hit innings at their home M. Chinnaswamy Stadium. Chennai were held to 191-7 in reply and with both sides level on 14 points, Bengaluru went through to the play-offs on run-rate after a sixth win in a row.

"What a night! Such a great atmosphere," player of the match Du Plessis, who did a lap of honor with his team for the home fans, said. "Just a pleasure to finish the season in front of the home crowd with a win." Bengaluru will now play in the eliminator on Wednesday in Ahmedabad. Table-toppers Kolkata Knight Riders, Rajasthan Royals and Sunrisers Hyderabad had already made the play-offs, which will begin with the first qualifier on Tuesday in Ahmedabad. The final is on May 26 in Chennai.

Rachin Ravindra hit 61 before Ravindra Jadeja, who made an unbeaten 42, and old warhorse M.S. Dhoni (25) gave Bengaluru a scare in a stand of 61 as Chennai fell short of the qualification mark. The match could be Dhoni's last IPL outing as a player and also the final face-off between him and Kohli two legends of Indian cricket.

It was Biles' best all-around total since she returned to competition last year for the first time since her abbreviated Tokyo Olympics campaign.

With Doncic and Irving leading the way the Mavs clawed back in the third, out-scoring the Thunder 35-26 in the period. "The whole team is amazing," Doncic said. "Amazing comeback, amazing effort. This team is special.'

Thunder coach Mark Daigneault was full of praise for his young team. Oklahoma City's starting five have an average age of 23, but matched the Nuggets for best record in the West and swept the New Orleans Pelicans in the first round of the playoffs. Lowry equals lowest round as Schauffele, Morikawa lead PGA

LOUISVILLE: Shane Lowry matched the lowest round in major golf history on Saturday, shooting a nine-under par 62 in the third round of the PGA Championship, while Xander Schauffele and Collin Morikawa shared the 54-hole lead at Valhalla.

The 37-year-old Irishman tied the mark achieved four prior times, most recently in Thursday's first round by Schauffele, who closed with back-to-back birdies to shoot 68 match fellow American Collin Morikawa on 15-under 198 with Sahith Theegala third on 199. World number three Schauffele, seeking his first major title, made double bogey at 15 but recovered with tap-in birdies at 17 and 18.

"Bouncing back was big. It's nice to have a share of the lead at least," Schauffele said. "Need to stay in my lane, keep doing what I'm doing and hope it's enough." Lowry's bogey-free round left the 2019 British Open champion, who began the day eight shots adrift, sharing fourth on 200 with American Bryson DeChambeau and Norway's Viktor Hovland.

"I'm going to have to keep going," Lowry said. "A lot of guys are playing great golf. The course is gettable. And like you see today somebody can come from way behind. "I'm going to go out tomorrow and see if can get that trophy."

Other 62s have been made by Schauffele and American Rickie Fowler in the first round at last year's US Open and the 2017 British Open by South African Branden Grace. Lowry birdied eight of the first 14 holes, sank birdie putts of 37 feet at 13 and 32 feet at the par-3 14th and one from just outside six feet at 17 to build the drama.

"I felt like I was just going to keep making birdies," Lowry said. "I just kept rolling them in. I got off

Schauffele birdied from just inside four feet at the par-5 seventh - his first birdie in 15 holes - and added others from just outside 21 feet at the par-5 10th and just inside 30 feet on the par-3 14th. Tokyo Olympic champion Schauffele has not won any event since the 2022 Scottish Open, having had 19 top-10 PGA Tour finishes in the nearly two years since.

Two-time major winner Morikawa started with a bogey but a 30-foot chip-in birdie at the third and a closing 10-foot birdie putt kept him level with Schauffele. "This week has been about taking one shot at a time, figuring out what you have and playing golf," said Morikawa. "I've been doing a good job of that and I have 18 more holes to do that. Theegala birdied six of the last 10 holes, a tap-in at 18 keeping him one adrift. "I know my game is good enough to compete," Theegala said. "I'm going to have to play my butt off." — AFP

Arsenal's title dreams dashed despite last-day win over Everton

Gunners almost flawless in 2024 but forced to settle for second place

LONDON: Arsenal's dreams of a first Premier League crown in 20 years were dashed as their 2-1 win against Everton was rendered irrelevant by Manchester City's title-clinching victory over West Ham. Mikel Arteta's side had gone into the last day of the season needing to beat Everton at the Emirates Stadium and hope City drew or lost in Manchester if they were to steal the title in miraculous fashion.

But the Gunners were forced to settle for second place after relentless champions City beat West Ham 3-1. Idrissa Gueye put Everton in front late in the first half before Takehiro Tomiyasu quickly equalised. By the time Kai Havertz scored Arsenal's winner in the 89th minute, City were already well on course to retain the title.

Arsenal had been almost flawless in 2024, with 16 wins and one draw, away to City, in their 18 league matches. However, one costly slip-up in a 2-0 home defeat to Aston Villa last month proved decisive in denying them a first title since Arsene Wenger's 'In-

They finished two points behind City, who have won an unprecedented four successive titles and six in the last seven years. Arsenal staff were seen rehearsing a mock title presentation at the Emirates on Saturday, complete with replicas of the trophy and medals, as well as signs emblazoned with the slogan 'Premier League champions'.

But there would be no genuine title party in north London as Arteta's heart-broken players were forced to accept their fate. Arsenal fans had strolled down the sun-baked Holloway Road towards the Emirates more in hope than expectation of seeing a title-winning team.

Some even wore West Ham shirts rather their own club's in a nod to the favour required from their London rivals 200 miles to the north. A raucous rendition of the club's 'North London forever' anthem before kick-off took the atmosphere to fever pitch.

Silence in the stands

Despite the absence of injured star Bukayo Saka, Arsenal should have been ahead in the opening moments when Tomiyasu nodded wide from closerange. However at that exact second, the atmosphere went completely flat as news filtered through of Phil Foden's second minute opener for City.

A resigned hush settled over the sell-out 60,000 crowd, but Arsenal did their best to refocus. Foden's second goal in the 18th minute rendered the Arsenal faithful mute as Everton fans taunted them with chants of "you nearly won the league".

Everton took the lead in the 40th minute when Gueve's free-kick took a wicked deflection off Declan Rice's head as he jumped to block the ball, looping past wrong-footed Arsenal keeper David Raya into the far corner.

To their credit, the Gunners refused to surrender, equalising just three minutes later when Tomiyasu met Martin Odegaard's pass with a fine finish that whistled past Jordan Pickford from just inside

Arsenal fans let out a defiant roar when they heard Mohammed Kudus had reduced the deficit for West Ham late in the first half. They were briefly celebrating again after a false rumour spread that West Ham had equalised. Dragged from despair to hope and back again within seconds, Arsenal were

four points behind City in the 'as it stands' table at half-time.

Arsenal's players gathered in a huddle as they prepared to make one final push in the second half, but Havertz wasted two chances to give them life, nodding wide and then heading against the bar. Rodri's 59th minute goal for City was met with silence in the Emirates stands. And when Havertz stabbed home in the closing stages, Arsenal had already come to terms with the end of their title hopes. — AFP

Verstappen resists Norris attack to claim victory at Imola

IMOLA: Three-time world champion and series leader Max Verstappen returned to winning ways on Sunday when he resisted a late charge by Lando Norris to take a dramatic victory for Red Bull at the Emilia Romagna Grand Prix. After being beaten in Miami, where friend and rival Norris claimed his maiden victory for McLaren, the Dutchman resisted him to come home 0.725 seconds ahead of the Briton who mounted a rousing final attack in vain.

Charles Leclerc finished third for Ferrari ahead of Oscar Piastri in the second McLaren, Carlos Sainz in the second Ferrari and seven-time champion Lewis Hamilton and his Mercedes team-mate George Russell. Sergio Perez was eighth in the second Red Bull ahead of Aston Martin's Lance Stroll and RB's Yuki Tsunoda, in his Faenza-based team's home event.

Verstappen's hard-earned win, after a difficult two days of practice, was his third at Imola, his fifth of the season and the 59th of his career, lifting him 48 points clear of Leclerc in the drivers' title race. "We did a great race considering how it started and I had to work hard for that," admitted Verstappen. "The whole race I pushed flat out to make a gap.

"I felt quite strong on mediums, but on the hards, it was more difficult to manage and the last 15 laps I had no grip and I was sliding a lot. "I could see him behind me and I am super-happy to win here today." Norris said: "It's frustrating! This feels more pain-

ful. It hurts me to say so, but with one or two more laps I think I'd have had him." Leclerc, whose podium finish for Ferrari in their heartland was acclaimed by masses of tifosi, said: "At least a podium! Of course, I wanted to win and I didn't make it.

"They were incredibly quick at the end, but it's looking good for us for the rest of the season. Monaco is going to be special."

'I'm pushing'

On a very warm Spring day all but Perez began on medium tyres, the Mexican choosing 'hards' to go long after a desultory qualifying left him 11th on the grid. Aston Martin's Fernando Alonso started from the pitlane after late suspension changes while Piastri was fifth, penalised from second for obstructing Kevin Magnussen on Saturday.

As the lights went out, Verstappen surged clear while behind him Hamilton and Perez made up places during an incident-free opening as the world champion built an early advantage. Verstappen's relentless pace took him five seconds clear by lap 16 ahead of Norris who led Leclerc by 1.3 with Sainz fourth, resisting Piastri. The Mercedes' pair were sixth and seventh ahead of Perez.

Russell was the first of the leading group to pit after 21 laps, having complained his tyres were shot. Norris was next in on lap 23, coming out behind Perez, followed by Piastri and then Verstappen, on lap 25, shortly after the Dutchman was shown a blackand-white flag for exceeding track limits. One more offence would bring a five second penalty.

Verstappen re-joined fourth behind Leclerc, Sainz and Hamilton with Norris behind him, having passed Perez, before Leclerc pitted and Sainz inherited the lead briefly before pitting with Hamilton, who had run off at Acque Minerali.

This left Verstappen back on top at half-distance with a lead of 6.2 seconds on Norris, Leclerc and Piastri. Having eased off to preserve his tyres, Norris mounted a late charge and trimmed Verstappen's lead on successive laps to put him under intense pressure. With seven laps to go, he was only two seconds adrift and closing in. "I'm pushing as hard as I can mate," said Norris on team radio when encouraged to hunt a second victory. Hard as he tried to turn the screw Verstappen scraped home on the day Formula One remembered the late great Ayrton Senna, who died in a crash at the circuit three decades ago. —AFP

Klopp receives emotional farewell tribute from fans

LIVERPOOL: Jurgen Klopp was given a heartfelt reception by home fans at Anfield as he walked out for his final match as Liverpool manager on Sunday. The German is bringing down the curtain on his nine-year reign in charge of the Merseysiders following their last Premier League game of the season

He established himself as a club great by winning the team's first Premier League title for 30 years in 2020, a year after leading the team to Champions League glory. Klopp also lifted the FA Cup and the League Cup during his time at the club. The charismatic 56-year-old has a strong bond with Liverpudlians, who embraced his passionate personality and this was reflected in the embraces he exchanged with staff while waiting in the tunnel on Sunday.

As he took the pitch, Klopp received a standing ovation from Liverpool fans, who used cards to create a "Jurgen" mosaic, with many holding scarves bearing his image. Fans held aloft cards making a heart shape in the colours of the German flag and Klopp stood in silence as supporters sang "You'll Never Walk Alone".

When Klopp made the bombshell announcement of his decision to leave in January, his side were chasing a quadruple. Liverpool won the League Cup final against Chelsea in February, but crashed out of the FA Cup against Manchester United and the Europa League at Atalanta. Their Premier League title bid also faded quickly but they are guaranteed to finish third which brings a place in the Champions League

Haaland wins

MANCHESTER: Erling Haaland won his second Premier League Golden Boot in as many seasons in England on Sunday as Manchester City beat West Ham 3-1 to win a fourth consecutive title.

The Norwegian striker was absent for two months of the season through injury and struggled to match the heights of his debut campaign at City when he struck 52 times in all competitions, including a Premier League record 36.

Campana's late goal gives Miami victory over DC

MIAMI: Leonardo Campana came off the bench and scored a stoppage time winner as Inter Miami beat D.C. United 1-0 in Major League Soccer on Saturday. Despite the return of Lionel Messi to the starting line-up, after he missed the 0-0 draw at Orlando on Wednesday, Miami struggled to create chances against a very well organized D.C. defense.

Ecuador international striker Campana, who has lost his starting place to Luis Suarez this season, was brought on in the third minute of stoppage time and scored with his first touch. Campana made a darting, diagonal run across the D.C. back line and was picked out by Sergio Busquets, bringing down the lofted pass and then blasting an unstoppable shot past Alex Bono.

It was a cruel end to the game for Troy Lesesne's team, who look vastly improved on the performances they produced under Wayne Rooney last term. With the win, league leaders Miami clinched their ninth victory of the season - matching their total for last season after just 15 games.

The start of the game was delayed by 25 minutes due to lightning and 15 minutes after the game began there was a torrential downpour. Miami enjoyed the vast majority of possession in the opening 45 minutes, with the visitors appearing happy to concede the ball while keeping their shape and aiming to counter. That approach almost paid off, after the break, but Jared Stroud missed a glorious opportunity, poking hesitantly wide from close range. Messi had been restricted to two free-kick efforts, which both struck the wall, and the Argentine—who missed the midweek game with a knee injury—was well be-

No side in the history of the English top flight had ever won four successive titles, but City have become accustomed to rewriting the record books under Pep Guardiola. The Catalan coach has masterminded six Premier League wins in the past seven seasons.

In four of those years, City have also surpassed 90 points. They were pushed this season to deny Arsenal a first title since 2003/04. The Gunners celebrated a 0-0 draw at the Etihad last month that kept them one point in front of City with nine games to play.

But the champions were relentless in the run-in, winning their final nine league games, scoring 33 goals. Guardiola conceded City had felt the pressure in a nervy 2-0 win at Tottenham in midweek that kept the destiny of the title in their own hands.

In the same scenario two years ago, they needed a remarkable late fight-back from 2-O down to beat Aston Villa 3-2 on the final day. There was far less drama as West Ham melted under the baking Manchester sun in David Moyes' final game in charge of the Hammers.

Foden was recently crowned the football writers' player of the year for his best-ever goalscoring season and ended any suspense after just 79 seconds. The England international arrowed a blistering drive into the top corner to ensure there was no nervous wait for the title party to get started.

Foden doubled City's lead inside 20 minutes with another cool left-footed finish from Jeremy Doku's cross for his 27th goal of the season. City should have been out of sight before half-time as Alphonse Areola denied Kevin De Bruyne and Erling Haaland failed to turn in from

point-blank range. Out of nowhere, there was a twist in the tale of the first half when, from a West Ham corner, Mohammed Kudus' outrageous overhead kick flew high past Stefan Ortega.

Haaland claimed his second Golden Boot in as many seasons in the Premier League despite a day to forget in front of goal. The Norwegian missed a huge chance to restore the home side's twogoal cushion when he spooned over another inviting Doku cross.

City swiftly restored order at the start of the second period and fittingly it was Rodri, himself a player of the year contender, who delivered the knockout blow to Arsenal's title hopes. The Spaniard has not been on the losing side for club or country since March 2023.

City's only three Premier League defeats came in the three games the 27-year-old was suspended. This time Areola should have done better as the Frenchman failed to turn Rodri's tame effort round the post. City could cruise to the finish line and extend a remarkable 35-game unbeaten streak in all competitions from open play.

The only blip on that run was a penalty shootout defeat to Real Madrid in the Champions League quarter-finals that denied Guardiola's men the chance of back-to-back trebles. They can make it double next weekend when Manchester United have the unenviable task of stopping their local rivals in the FA Cup final.

By achieving a degree of league dominance never seen before, City have made their case to be considered the greatest side English football has produced. There was an anti-climactic end as City players had to tell fans to get off the pitch before the full-time whistle. Thousands of supporters poured onto the field at the end despite pleas from the club to stay off the playing surface. — AFP

Zverev beats Jarry to claim second Rome Open title

ROME: Alexander Zverev won his second Rome Open title after beating Nicolas Jarry in straight sets 6-4, 7-5 in Sunday's final. World number five Zverev, also Foro Italico champion in 2017, comfortably won his sixth Masters 1000 title in the last major tournament before the French Open, which gets underway next weekend

The 27-year-old succeeded in his 11th Masters final which equalled Boris Becker's record for the most by a German since the series began in 1990. He comfortably beat Chile's Jarry, who could not repeat his quarter- and semi-final heroics against Stefanos Tsitsipas and Tommy Paul, in one hour and 41 minutes.

Zverev claimed his first title of the year and first since winning at Chengdu in September at the end of an unusual men's tournament in which a host of top names were either eliminated early of dropped out before the start of the event.

fore the start of the event.

Six-time Rome champion Novak Djokovic was dumped out in the third round by Zverev's semi-final opponent, journeyman Alejandro Tabilo. Last year's winner Daniil Medvedev was stopped at the last-16 stage while Italian world number two Jannik Sinner and third-ranked Carlos Alcaraz both missed the tour-

Earlier, Sara Errani and Jasmine Paolini gave Italian fans something to cheer after beating Coco Gauff and Erin Routliffe to the women's doubles title. Unseeded Errani and Paolini made the Foro Italico crown roar by beating reigning US Open singles champion Gauff and Routliffe 6-3, 4-6, 10-8. Home supporters had been denied the chance to see Sinner and Matteo Berrettini play, with the former Wimbledon finalist also not fit enough to take part in his home city. — AFP



Kuwait's Al-Rajhi qualifies for 400m T54 final

TOKYO: Kuwait's national team player Faisal Al-Rajhi finished third in the men's 400 meters T54 heat 1 at the Para Athletics World Championships on Sunday, qualifying for the final due on Monday.

Al-Rajhi finished in 49.17 in his preliminary round, behind the winner Australia's Samuel Carter and Britain's Nathan Maguire, with the top three runners automatically advancing to the final in the event in the western Japanese city of Kobe.

On Saturday, Al-Rajhi won the gold medal in a 5,000-meter race. Held in East Asia for the first time and serves as a qualifier for the upcoming Paris 2024 Paralympic Games, the Kobe World Para Athletics Championships has attracted some 1,000 athletes from 100 countries and regions, according to the organizer. — KUNA

Hyderabad finish second after IPL match washed out

HYDERABAD: Sunrisers Hyderabad ended the IPL league stage in second behind table-toppers Kolkata Knight Riders after they beat Punjab Kings by four wickets on Sunday. Former champions Hyderabad, led by Pat Cummins, edged out Rajasthan Royals for second spot on net run-rate after the final league match between Rajasthan and Kolkata was abandoned due to rain without a ball being bowled in Guwahati.

Chasing 215 for victory, Hyderabad, who are already among the top four teams to have made the play-offs, depended on Abhsihek Sharma's 66 to reach the target with five balls to spare at their home. "We've had a lot of fun and played some really great cricket," said Cummins. "It's satisfying and exciting (to be in the play-offs)."

Kolkata and Hyderabad will face each other in the first qualifier on Tuesday with the winner moving to the final on May 26 in Chennai. The loser will have another shot at making the final when they play the winner of the eliminator in the second qualifier.

Third-placed Rajasthan, who have been winless in their last five matches, will play Royal Challengers Bengaluru in the eliminator on Wednesday in Ahmedabad. Left-handed Abhishek, who has been a breakout young Indian star in this edition with 467 runs including three half-centuries, took charge after Travis Head departed for a first-ball duck. — AFP
