Joint statement praises strength of bilateral relations

US congratulates **Crown Prince on** assuming post

WASHINGTON: The United States congratulated HH Sheikh Sabah Al-Khaled Al-Hamad Al-Mubarak Al-Sabah on being appointed as Crown Prince, wishing Kuwait and its people further progress and development. In a press statement, State Department spokesman Mathew Miller said: "The United States congratulates His Highness Sheikh Sabah Al-Khaled Al-Sabah for his appointment as the new Crown Prince of Kuwait. His Highness Sheikh Sabah has a distinguished background of public service for his country, which includes previously serving as the Prime Minister and Foreign Minister.'

"The United States values our strategic partnership with the State of Kuwait. We look forward to deepening our friendship with Kuwait and His Highness Sheikh Sabah as we work toward a peaceful and prosperous Middle East region." HH the Amir Sheikh Mishal Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah issued an order on Sunday appointing HH Sheikh Sabah Al-Khaled as Crown Prince. — KUNA

KUWAIT: A joint coordination committee linking Kuwait and Saudi Arabia held a new round of talks on Monday, which produced three fresh agreements to keep bilateral relations on an upward trajectory. The talks, presided by Kuwaiti Foreign Minister Abdullah Al-Yahya and his Saudi counterpart Prince Faisal bin Farhan Al-Saud, delved into bilateral relations and the progress ties have seen across a myriad of fields, said a foreign ministry statement.


Kuwait and Riyadh clinched a memorandum of understanding dealing with mutual recognition of seafarers' certificates, in addition to another pair of similar agreements on environment conservation and diplomatic cooperation, added the statement.

A joint statement released after the talks heaped praise on the "strength" of bilateral ties, citing more room for progress across numerous fields. The political leaders of the Gulf Arab neighbors share a common desire to propel these ties to even greater levels, the statement underlined, saying the two nations routinely draw up fresh plans and strategies to help usher in growth in relations, as "per the instructions" of HH the Amir Sheikh Mishal Al-Ahmad Al-Jaber Al-Sabah and Saudi King Salman bin Abdulaziz.

The committee, which is comprised of smaller groups focusing on matters that run the gamut from politics and security to the economy, was created with the express purpose of bringing that goal to fruition, added the statement after the talks. These goals include more cooperation on counter-terrorism efforts and measures aiming to clamp down on extremism, while recent round of talks yielded substantial progress on plans to establish a rail link between the Gulf Arab states, a marquee endeavor that is expected to see the light of day in the near future, it said.

Kuwait and Riyadh also have other similar plans in the works, including forging a "shared vision" on issues ranging from culture and the media to tourism and social development, in addition to greater healthcare and educational cooperation, according to the statement. The statement gave due credit to the Kuwaiti-Saudi joint coordination committee for its contributions towards keeping relations on an upward trajectory, revealing that the next round of talks is slated for next year in the Saudi capital.

Earlier, HH the Amir Sheikh Mishal received at Bayan Palace Prince Faisal





KFAED, Pakistan ink KD 7.5 million loan funding dam deal

KUWAIT: The Kuwait Fund for Arab Economic Development (KFAED) and Pakistan on Monday signed a KD 7.5 million (\$24.4 million) loan agreement to fund the Mohmand Hydropower Dam project. According to a KFAED statement, the loan agreement was signed by Malik Muhammed Farooq - Ambassador of the Islamic Republic of Pakistan to Kuwait - whereas Waleed Al-Bahar, Acting Director-General of the Kuwait Fund for Arab Economic Development, signed the loan agreement on behalf of the Fund.

"The project aims to support economic and social development by enhancing national energy generation from the available hydroelectric resources to meet the increasing electricity demand, improve the region's resilience to flooding, provide sustainable water resources for agriculture and drinking water for the region of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Province (KPP), and create new job opportunities." The KFAED went on to say that the project consisted of the construction of a hydropower scheme on the Swat River, located in the northeast of Pakistan, about 200 km west of Islamabad.

"It comprises a concrete-faced rockfill dam with a height of about 213 meters and a length of about 718 meters, creating a reservoir with a total length of about 56 km, an area of about 24 km2, and a volume of about 1.6 billion m3. The scheme will include a powerhouse with four electricity-generating units with a total installed capacity of about 800 MW capable of producing about 2,862 GWh a year." The project would include flood protection, irrigation infrastructure, and

an intake for future drinking water facilities. The project also includes consulting and project man-

agement services. The project is expected to be completed by December 31, 2025. The total cost of the project is estimated at about 322.8 billion Pakistani rupees, equivalent to approximately KD 900.6 million. The first Kuwait fund's loan covers about 0.83 percent of the project costs, in addition to the contribution of the Islamic Development Bank in an amount equivalent to about KD 56.3 million, the OPEC Fund for Development in an amount equivalent to about KD 22.5 million, and the Saudi Fund for Development in an amount equivalent to about KD 75 million, while the Pakistani government will cover the remaining costs or any other increase that may occur in the project costs.

The loan is made for a term of 25 years, including a period of grace of about 5 years, and will be amortized by 40 semi-annual installments, the first of which will be due on the first date on which interest or other charges on the loan shall fall due after the elapse of the grace period. The loan will bear interest at two percent per annum in addition to a charge of 0.5 percent for meeting administrative costs and the expenses of the implementation of the loan agreement. The fund loan is the nineteenth loan provided by the KFAED to Pakistan, as the Fund had previously provided eighteen loans to Pakistan in various sectors, totaling approximately KD 129.788 million. — KUNA

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Kuwait's First Deputy PM lauds security cooperation with Egypt

Cybersecurity 'cornerstone of national security'

CAIRO: The First Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of Defense and Interior, Sheikh Fahad Al-Yousef Saud Al-Sabah, commended on Sunday the security collaboration between Egypt and Kuwait's Ministries of Interior. During his first visit to Egypt, Sheikh Fahad discussed with his Egyptian counterpart Mahmoud Tawfiq the most important security issues and means of enhancing ties between the two sides, according to a statement received by Kuwait News Agency (KUNA) following a meeting between the two ministers.

Egypt has recently extradited a defendant to Kuwait, in line with security cooperation between the two sides. The two ministers discussed the latest security issues and common concerns, in addition to cooperation mechanisms and sharing expertise to benefit from training capacities in all security fields, the statement added. They further dealt with obstacles facing citizens and Kuwaiti students studying in Egypt, facilitating all measures as well as disclosing currencies at airports, it stated.

Furthermore, they covered the causes of delaying registering Kuwaiti citizens' property in Egypt, in addition to reaching a deal to set a mechanism with the concerned bodies to regulate and accelerate ending the measures of security agreements, it noted. Meanwhile, the Egyptian minister extolled the meeting and what had been discussed, referring to security sharing and deep-rooted and historic relations between the two sister countries. The meeting featured Kuwait's Ambassador to Egypt, Ghanim Al-Ghanim, and a high-level delegation accompanying Sheikh Fahad.

Cyber and Information Security


Meanwhile, Secretary-General Ahmad Abul-Gheit of the League of Arab States (LAS) stated on Monday that cybersecurity has become a fundamental pillar of national security for all states and economic entities. Abul-Gheit made the remark in a speech during the opening session of the 3rd International Conference on Information Security and Cybersecurity, titled "Cyber & Information Security Exhibition & Conference," held under the patronage of Egyptian Prime Minister Mostafa Madbouly and organized by the league's Arab Information and Communication Technologies Organization.

Abul-Gheit said that cyber wars have become a reality and a weapon used by states and non-state actors, including groups with destructive criminal activities, adding that this was highly effective due to the reliance of modern systems on technology and networks, making them vulnerable to ransomware attacks. He pointed out that cybersecurity has become a concept that goes far beyond the issues of protecting messages, financial transactions, and administrative operations but also includes data security and storage. A lot can be extracted from the available data by analyzing an individual's behavior and the content consumed through social media platforms.

Abul-Gheit noted that social media platforms can have dangerous consequences and impacts when misused, such as spreading false information, calls for violence and hatred, and speeches questioning the integrity of individuals and national institutions, which would give criminal and terrorist organizations exceptional capabilities and skills to carry out cyberattacks and misinformation campaigns.

Abul-Gheit emphasized the need to build new capabilities to strengthen the technological defense line with innovative approaches that are continuously updated to match the nature of emerging threats and called for launching awareness campaigns to alert Arab citizens and various Arab institutions about the importance of data protection from cybercrime risks.

He noted that the conference would witness the launch of the Arab Strategy for Cybersecurity prepared by the organization and approved by the Council of Arab Ministers for Communication and Information at its recent



meeting in Abu Dhabi. He added that the last Arab summit approved the Saudi initiative to establish an Arab ministerial council for cybersecurity, supported by a permanent technical secretariat based in Riyadh, expressing his hope that it would be launched as soon as possible to undertake its assigned tasks.

On his part, the Secretary-General of the Arab Organization for Communication and Information Technologies, Mohammad bin Omar, stated that the Arab region was witnessing several challenges in the field of cybersecurity, including rapid technological development, a lack of awareness about cyber issues, the development and complexity of

threats, and legal and regulatory challenges. He noted that with the continued evolution

of cyber threats in terms of complexity and frequency, implementing strong security measures was extremely important to protect individuals, companies, and government entities from harmful activities, and he pointed out the importance of proactive and comprehensive cybersecurity strategies to mitigate risks and maintain trust in digital ecosystems. The Arab Cybersecurity Strategy, prepared by the Arab Information Technology Organization, would be launched as a roadmap for countries to develop and improve their national cybersecurity strategies. — KUNA

Ministry postpones Islamic studies exam over leak

KUWAIT: The official spokesman for the Ministry of Education, Ahmed Al-Wahida, expressed the dissatisfaction and denunciation of all workers in the

educational field for the unfortunate facts that followed the Islamic studies test on Monday, stressing that the postponement of the exam to next Monday aims to ensure equal opportunities and achieve justice among all students in the 12th grade.

Al-Wahida pointed out in a press statement that the Minister of Education and Minister of Higher Education and Scientific Research, Dr Adel Al-Adwani, was present along with a number of officials at the headquarters of the printing press and inspected the mechanism of work to find out what

caused the unfortunate incident.

Al-Wahida stated that the minister immediately directed officials to implement a number of firm decisions, namely postponing the Islamic education exam on Monday, sacked the employees of the printing press, in addition to assigning new members of the printing press to complete their tasks while changing the workflow plan, and taking all necessary precautions for the remaining exams with a new tight mechanism.

The minister also directed officials to quickly

take all necessary legal measures against anyone who seeks to breach the integrity of the educational process and secondary exams, stressing that the ministry will not hesitate to apply penalties to everyone who caused the leak. Al-Wahida pointed out that there is an ongoing investigation in the Ministry of Education under the supervision and direct follow-up of the minister. Al-Wahida called on students to study hard and stay away from everything that distracts them from achieving their goals and ambitions while adhering to the instructions.

'Together Project' launched to protect workers' rights

KUWAIT: Khaled Al-Ajmi, Chairman of the Board of Directors of the Kuwaiti Society for Human Rights, announced the launch of the fourth edition of the 'Together Project'. The project is aimed at strengthening the protection of workers' rights in Kuwait. The fourth version of the project will be implemented in direct cooperation with the Public Authority for Manpower (PAM) as a national project that contributes to raising the classification of Kuwait in international indicators.

Al-Ajmi commended the fruitful cooperation with the Public Authority for Manpower to implement the project, which resulted in the signing of a memorandum of understanding to promote human rights concepts in general and employment rights in particular. The four-year project will provide guidance and legal support to workers and address some workers' issues.

It will also offer psychological support, monitor local movements of workers' files, prepare research and studies to evaluate the development of the mechanism for the movement of labor from one employer to another, survey the views of inmates of the Migrant Workers' Shelter Center on the procedures and services provided, and contribute to proposing public policies to improve the quality of services offered to employment through the preparation of research papers.

Awareness-raising campaigns on workers' rights, training programs for law enforcement officials, and skills development for relevant officials and community chiefs on workers' issues will also be launched. A project has already been implemented in various partnerships, under which the Kuwaiti Society for Human Rights has been awarded the European Union's Chaillot Award for the Promotion of Human Rights in the Arab Gulf Region.

Kuwait welcomes OPEC+ output cut extension

KUWAIT: Kuwait welcomed a decision taken by OPEC and its allies, including Russia, to prolong oil production cuts of up to 1.65 million barrels per day (bpd) into the end of next year, saying the measure aims to support market stability and balance. As per the measure, taken amid OPEC+ ministerial-level talks in Saudi Arabia's capital Riyadh, voluntary cuts of 2.2 million bpd, agreed upon in November of 2003, will be extended into the end of September 2024, according to an OPEC+ statement.

These 2.2 million bpd output slashes will be gradually "reinserted" into total production on a monthly basis until the end of September 2025, added the statement, underscoring that any output increases will depend on "market developments." The statement acknowledged the "total commitment" to output cuts on the part of OPEC+ member states Iraq, Russia, and Kazakhstan, saying it would be instrumental in boosting cooperation within the group. The meeting was attended by representatives of Saudi Arabia, Kuwait, Iraq, the UAE, Kazakhstan, Al-

Kuwait participates in Japan Energy Summit

TOKYO: The Kuwaiti delegation, headed by Kuwait Business Council Chairman Feras Al-Salem and representatives from the Ministry of Oil, participated in the Japan Energy Summit and Exhibition in Tokyo on Monday. At the conferences, the delegation demonstrated Kuwait oil sector's achievements in reducing greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions by transforming to a more efficient energy system and implementing the Zero Flaring initiative and soil remediation projects valued at two billion dollars, Al-Salem said in a statement to Kuwait News Agency (KUNA).

"As part of Kuwait's commitments towards the global community, it intends to further reduce its GHG emissions by increasing the contribution of renewable energy sources through greater involvement in its energy mix, as well as implementing more environmentally friendly practices in its oil and gas sector as part of its 2035 vision," Al-Salem said. "The achievements of the oil sector are a cornerstone to achieving such

end of 2025. The 12-member oil group and its allies decided to extend the level of overall crude oil production, starting from January 1, 2025, to December 31, 2025, according to a statement adopted by the alliance. This came during the 37th meeting of the group, held in the Saudi capital, with Kuwaiti Minister of Oil Dr Emad Al-Atiqi attending.

The move came in light of OPEC and non-OPEC member states' unwavering commitment to maintaining oil market stability, providing transparency, and guiding markets, according to the statement. They also decided to extend the assessment period by the three independent sources to the end of November 2025, to be used as guidance for 2026 reference production levels, and to reaffirm the mandate of the Joint Ministerial Monitoring Committee (JMMC) to closely review the global oil market conditions, oil production levels, and the level of conformity with the DoC, assisted by the Joint Technical Committee (JTC) and the OPEC Secretariat.

Furthermore, they said that they would hold the OPEC and non-OPEC Ministerial Meeting (ON-OMM) every six months in accordance with the ordinary OPEC scheduled conference. Finally, they decided to hold the 38th OPEC and non-OPEC Ministerial Meeting on December 1, 2024. — KUNA

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Mexico's Sheinbaum makes history

Former Mexico City mayor becomes country's first female president

MEXICO CITY: Claudia Sheinbaum was elected Mexico's first woman president by a landslide, making history in a country plagued by rampant criminal and gender-based violence. Flag-waving supporters sang and danced to mariachi music on Sunday in celebration of the ruling party candidate's victory, in a nation where around 10 women or girls are murdered every day. "I want to thank millions of Mexican women and men who decided to vote for us on this historic day," Sheinbaum told the cheering crowd.

The 61-year-old former Mexico City mayor thanked her main opposition rival Xochitl Galvez, who conceded defeat. Mexico's outgoing leader Andres Manuel Lopez Obrador hailed Sheinbaum's victory as a "historic event," while US President Joe Biden said he looked forward to working with her "in the spirit of partnership and friendship." Sheinbaum, a scientist by training, won around 58-60 percent of votes, according to preliminary official results from the National Electoral Institute, which estimated turnout at 60 percent. That was more than 30 percentage points ahead of Galvez, and some 50 percentage points ahead of the only man running, centrist Jorge Alvarez Maynez.

nning, centrist Jorge Aivarez Maynez. Maria de los Angeles Gordillo, a 37-year-old member of the Tojolabal Indigenous community, said she was moved to tears as she listened to Sheinbaum speak. "I'm here to celebrate this historic moment for our country and especially for women who carry these inequalities on their skin," she said.

Gaza mothers search for milk as malnutrition hits

Voters had flocked to polling stations across the Latin American nation, despite sporadic violence in areas terrorized by ultra-violent drug cartels. Thousands of troops were deployed to protect voters, following a particularly bloody electoral season that saw more than two dozen aspiring local politicians murdered. "Our society is violent, sexist, misogynistic and Dr Sheinbaum as president will really be able to help change not only the laws but society," said Lol-Kin Castaneda, 48, who waited late into the night to hear the winner speak.

"Mexico can't stand any more violence," she added. Women going to the polls had cheered the prospect of their favored candidate breaking the highest political glass ceiling. "A female president will be a transformation for this country, and we hope that she does more for women," said Clemencia Hernandez, a 55-year-old cleaner in Mexico City. "Many women are subjugated by their partners. They're not allowed to leave home to work," she said. Daniela Perez, 30, said that having a

woman president would be "something historic," even though neither of the two main candidates was "totally feminist" in her view.

Nearly 100 million people were registered to vote in the world's most populous Spanish-speaking country, home to 129 million people. Sheinbaum owes much of her popularity to outgoing president Lopez Obrador, a fellow leftist and mentor who has an approval rating of more than 60 percent but is only allowed to serve one term. In another win for the ruling party, its candidate Clara Brugada was elected mayor of Mexico City, one of the country's most important political jobs, preliminary results showed.

In a nation where politics, crime and corruption are closely entangled, drug cartels went to extreme lengths to ensure that their preferred candidates win. Hours before polls opened, a local candidate was murdered in a violent western state, authorities said, joining at least 25 other political hopefuls killed this election season, In the central Mexican state of Puebla, two people died after unknown persons attacked polling stations to steal papers, a local government security source told AFP. Voting was suspended in two municipalities in the southern state of Chiapas because of violence. —AFP

Staggering 642m voted in India's 6-week-long polls

NEW DELHI: India's election commission said Monday a staggering 642 million people voted in just-concluded six-week-long polls, a day ahead of the results which Prime Minister Narendra Modi is widely expected to win. Nearly all observers believe Modi's appeals to Hindu nationalist sentiment will give him a third term in power, a decade after he first took office. Exit polls show 73-year-old Modi is well on track to triumph, with the premier saying he was confident that "the people of India have voted in record numbers" to re-elect his government.

Modi's opponents have been hamstrung by infight-

ing and what they say are politically motivated criminal cases aimed at hobbling challengers to the ruling Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP). But chief election commissioner Rajiv Kumar on Monday praised the complex logistical operation of the election, saying that the "voter is the real winner". While total numbers of voters were up, turnout appeared to be slightly reduced from the last general elections.

Based on the commission's figure of an electorate of 968 million, 66.3 percent of eligible voters turned out so far, down roughly one percentage point on the 2019 vote, when turnout hit 67.4 percent.

Final voter turnout data will only be released after re-polling in two stations in West Bengal state on Monday. "We have created a world record of 642 million Indian voters, it is a historic moment for all of us," Kumar told reporters, adding that nearly half of those - 312 million - were women. Kumar said that "voters chose action over apathy, belief over cynicism and in some cases, the ballot over the bullet", the commission said.

'Incredible power of voters'

"It shows the incredible power of voters of India," Kumar added, saying that there had been "no major incidents of violence". Voting in the seventh and final staggered round ended on Saturday, and counting and results are due on Tuesday. "People should know about the strength of Indian democracy", he added. On Sunday, Arvind Kejriwal, chief minister of the capital Delhi and a key leader in an alliance formed to compete against Modi, returned to prison.

Kejriwal, 55, was detained in March over a long-running corruption probe, but was later released and allowed to campaign as long as he returned to jail once voting ended. "When power becomes dictatorship, then jail becomes a responsibility," Kejriwal said before surrendering himself, vowing to continue "fighting" from behind bars. Modi's political opponents and international rights groups have long sounded the alarm about threats to India's democracy. US think tank Freedom House said this year the

BJP had "increasingly used government institutions to target political opponents".

Analysts have partly blamed the drop in voter turnout on hotter-than-average temperatures heading into the Indian summer. Tens of millions of people queued outside ballot stations during successive heatwaves across northern India that brought temperatures in excess of 45 degrees Celsius (113 degrees Fahrenheit). At least 33 polling staff died from heatstroke on Saturday in Uttar Pradesh state alone, where temperatures hit 46.9C (116.4F), according to state election officials. "We learnt from this election that polling should end earlier," Kumar said. "We should not have done it in so much heat". India uses electronic voting machines that allow for faster counting of ballots. "We have a robust counting process in place," Kumar said.

Counting will begin at 8:00 am in voting centers in each state, with the data fed into computers. Results are expected to be ready within hours. The polls were also a gigantic logistical exercise.—AFP

Pakistan's Imran Khan acquitted of charges of leaking state secrets

Khan to remain jailed due to another conviction

ISLAMABAD: A high court in Pakistan and US government to topple his government overturned jailed former Prime Minister Imran Khan's conviction on charges of leaking state secrets, his lawyer and his party said on Monday, but Khan will remain in prison for now due to a conviction in another case.

Khan, 71, had been sentenced to 10 years in prison by a lower court on charges of making public a classified cable sent to Islamabad by Pakistan's ambassador in Washington in 2022. He has been in jail since August last year. He had challenged the conviction in Islamabad High Court, which said in an order on Monday that, an "instant appeal is allowed", adding Imran Khan was acquitted of the charges.

Shah Mehmood Qureshi, Khan's foreign minister during his tenure from 2018-2022, was also acquitted of the charges, in what is a major victory for the jailed leader. "Thank God, the sentence is overturned," a spokesman for legal affairs from Khan's Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf party, Naeem Panjutha, said in a post on the X social media platform shortly after the Islamabad High Court announced its decision.

Khan has said the classified cable was proof of a conspiracy by the Pakistan military

in 2022 after he visited Moscow just before Russia's invasion of Ukraine. Washington and Pakistan's military deny that accusation.

The state secrets case was one of four in which Khan was convicted just ahead of Pakistan's national election in February. In two other of those cases the sentences have since been suspended while he appeals. But despite Monday's acquittal, Khan, a former cricket star, will remain in prison serving a seven-year sentence over another case relating to his marriage to his third wife, Bushra Khan, also known as Bushra Bibi, which contravened Islamic traditions.

A ruling on the couple's appeal against the sentence was postponed last week and the proceedings transferred to another court after a judge recused himself following an accusation of bias made by Bibi's former husband, according to Khan's lawyers. "We will celebrate this victory," another one of his lawyers, Ali Zafar, said in a TV interview, adding that the other cases faced by Khan would result in acquittals too.

'Huge victory'

"It's a huge political and legal victo-

ry," journalist and political analyst Mazhar Abbas told Reuters, but cautioned that it would be premature to say that Khan would be released anytime soon. Khan is also named as an accused in several other cases, including charges of inciting violence against the state.

He has been at odds with the country's powerful military, accusing it of targeting him and his party. The military denies this and has called for Khan and his supporters to be tried for attacking state installations during violent protests against Khan's initial arrest last year.

Khan and his party, the Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf, was banned from contesting the February election, but candidates backed by the jailed leader still won the most seats. They did not have the numbers to form a government, which was instead led by an alliance of his rivals led by Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif.

The government, which says Khan broke clauses of the state secrets law by revealing contents of a secret diplomatic cable, said prosecutors were awaiting the detailed decision before deciding if they would appeal against the acquittal in the Supreme Court.

UK gives date for first Rwanda deportation flights

LONDON: Britain intends to begin deporting asylum seekers to Rwanda on July 24, a government lawyer said on Monday, although the hotly contested scheme is dependent on Prime Minister Rishi Sunak's Conservative Party winning the upcoming election. Sending asylum seekers who have arrived in Britain without permission to Rwanda is one of Sunak's flagship policies, but legal and parliamentary obstacles have meant it has never got off the ground.

Sunak has said the deportation flights will not leave before the July 4 election but has promised if he wins they would begin soon after. The opposition Labour Party, leading by about 20 points in opinion polls, has pledged to scrap the plan if elected. In documents submitted to the London High Court as part of a challenge to the policy by charity Asylum Aid, government lawyers said the intention was "to effect removals with a flight to Rwanda on 23 July 2024 (and not before).

However, government lawyer Edward Brown later told the court that an "operational update" from the Home Office (interior ministry) said the first flight would in fact leave on July 24. The scheme - first drawn up by one of Sunak's predecessors, Boris Johnson, in 2022 - aims to deter asylum seekers making the dangerous journey across the Channel in small boats from France.

Last November, the UK Supreme Court declared the policy unlawful, prompting Sunak to sign a new treaty with the East African country and to pass new legislation to override this. Asylum Aid's lawyer Charlotte Kilroy said the date earmarked for the flight was "news to us". The judge, Martin Chamberlain, remarked: "This is all going to be subject to the outcome of the general election, but we obviously cannot make any predictions about that." The numbers of asylum seekers crossing the Channel has risen to record numbers this year, with more than 10,000 people arriving so far, after numbers fell by a third in 2023. — Reuters

Germany counts flooding losses amid heated climate debate

FRANKFURT: The German government said on Monday that deadly flooding in the nation's south served as a warning to keep up the fight against climate change, hours after an official advisory council said the state had fallen behind its greenhouse gas targets. Over the weekend, a firefighter died while trying to rescue trapped residents, and several thousand people were forced to leave their homes due to heavy rains. Two more people were found dead on Monday, local authorities said.

Chancellor Olaf Scholz said during a visit to affected areas on Monday that federal emergency services and the military were being deployed. "We must not neglect the task of halting man-made climate change. This is another reminder that must be taken away from this disaster," he said.

Economy and climate minister Robert Habeck, during a visit of affected regions on Sunday, also noted that climate change was causing severe weather events. However, a panel of government climate advisors said on Monday that Germany is likely to miss its own 2030 greenhouse gas targets, contradicting Habeck's projections in March and calling for new measures.

Germany's Climate Protection Act will require the government to take corrective measures for the 2030 target if the expert panel confirms its findings next year.

Amid first signs of the flooding's economic impact, German utility EnBW said its hydroelectric plants along the Neckar river and its tributaries were either running at reduced capacity or were out of operation, particularly small stations. — Reuters

In blow to PM, Brexit champion Farage to stand in UK election

LONDON: Nigel Farage, who helped champion Britain's departure from the European Union, said on Monday he would stand as a candidate in next month's election and will lead the right-wing Reform Party in a major blow to Prime Minister Rishi Sunak. The surprise U-turn by Farage, now a TV host, will boost his movement's profile and challenge Sunak's Conservatives for the support of right-leaning voters at a time when the governing party is already badly trailing the Labour Party in the polls.

Farage, 60, had previously said he would not stand in the July 4 vote in order to help Donald Trump fight the US election later this year. But Farage said he changed his mind because he felt guilty not standing up for people who had become disillusioned with politics and had always backed him. "We are going to be the voice of opposition, and I tell you what, I have done it before, I'll do it again, I'll surprise everybody," Farage told a news conference, saying it was a fait accompli that Labour would win but that he wanted to position Reform as its main opponent.

He said he would lead a "political revolt" in Britain because "nothing in this country works anymore", citing problems with public services such as healthcare and roads Although Farage has stood unsuccessfully for parliament seven times he is still one of the most influential British politicians of his generation, putting pressure on a succession of prime ministers to take tougher positions on the EU and on tackling immigration.

Selling Brexit

Shunned by the British political establishment and backed by Eurosceptic financiers, Farage helped sell Brexit to millions of voters in England and Wales who felt ignored by the main Conservative and Labour parties. Although he was educated at an expensive school and worked as a commodities trader, he has cultivated an image of an anti-establishment figure. He is routinely pictured with a cigarette in one hand and a pint of beer in the other.

Farage, who has survived testicular cancer and a plane crash, will also take over as leader of Reform, replacing Richard Tice, who said before Farage took the stage the party wanted a way to "turn on the rocket boosters" to the election campaign.

Divisive and charismatic, Farage has previously made comments that his political opponents have called racist. Farage appeared in front of a poster during the Brexit campaign showing lines of migrants under the slogan "Breaking Point" and last month said Muslims did not share British values.

At the last general election in 2019, Farage's party decided not to contest seats held by the Conservatives, then led by Boris Johnson, to avoid splitting the pro-Brexit vote.

Polls suggest the opposition Labour Party is on course for victory this time, with the Con servatives staring at one of the worst results in their history. Support for Reform runs at about 10 percent nationally, giving the party the third highest vote share, polls show. But under Britain's winner-takes-all system, the party had not been expected to win any seats.

A poll earlier this year forecast the Conservatives would win Clacton with Reform coming third.

One betting company said Farage had a 40 chance of winning the seat after his announcement.

Under pressure, Sunak has already tried to win over voters tempted by Reform with policies such as tax cuts for pensioners, the reintroduction of national service and his plan to send illegal asylum seekers to Rwanda. Asked on Monday if he was worried about Farage entering the contest, Sunak said a vote for Reform would help Labour. — Reuters

Alert level raised after volcano erupts in Philippines

MANILA: The alert level for a Philippine volcano was raised Monday after an "explosive eruption" sent a plume of ash, gas and rocks five kilometers (three miles) into the sky, the volcanology agency said.

Mount Kanlaon on the central island of Negros erupted for six minutes shortly before 7:00 pm (1100 GMT), prompting warnings for nearby residents to wear facemasks due the threat of volcanic gases and falling ash.

"When it erupted we heard a thunder-like sound," Ethan Asentista-Khoo, 35, told AFP from his home in Pula village, about six kilometers from the volcano. "There was like a fire on the mouth of the volcano, which lasted around one to two minutes. I didn't see any lava or rocks coming out."

The Philippines is located in the seismically active Pacific "Ring of Fire" that hosts more than half of the world's volcanoes. Kanlaon is one of 24 active volcanoes in the archipelago nation.

"An explosive eruption ... produced a voluminous and incandescent plume that rapidly rose to 5,000 meters above the vent," the Philippine Institute of Volcanology and Seismology said, raising the alert level from one to two on a scale of zero to five. It also observed "probable short" avalanches of volcanic ash, rock and gases, known as pyroclastic density currents, on Kanlaon's slopes.

Joe Alingasa, a rescue official in San Carlos municipality, said they planned to evacuate about 500 families from homes nearest the volcano "as soon as possible". "We have deployed a team for the initial evacuation of our residents," Alingasa told AFP. "We also took face masks because the residents reported a strong smell of sulfur in the area."

The most powerful volcanic explosion in the Philippines in recent years was the 1991 eruption of Pinatubo, about 100 kilometers from Manila, which killed more than 800 people. — AFP

Doubts grow over Gaza truce plan as battles rage

Military hits over 50 targets; Death toll mounts

GAZA: Doubts were growing on Monday about a plan for a Gaza ceasefire and hostage release deal outlined by US President Joe Biden, as heavy fighting raged for a third day since his White House address. Biden on Friday presented what he labeled a Zionist three-phase plan that would end the bloody conflict, free all hostages and lead to the reconstruction of the devastated Palestinian territory without Hamas in power.

However, Netanyahu's office quickly stressed that Zionist entity would push on with the war sparked by the October 7 attack until all of its "goals are achieved" including the destruction of Hamas's military and governing capabilities. Zionist media have questioned to what extent Biden's speech and some crucial details were coordinated with Netanyahu's team, including how long any truce would hold and how many captives would be freed when.

Hamas on Friday said it viewed Biden's outline "positively", but since has made no official comment on the stalled negotiations, while mediators Qatar, Egypt and the United States have not announced any new round of talks. Government spokesman David Mencer on Monday quoted Netanyahu as saying that the outline Biden presented was only "partial" and that under the plan fighting would only stop temporarily "for the purpose of returning the hostages"

White House National Security Council spokesman John Kirby had said Sunday that "we have every expectation that if Hamas agrees to the proposal... (Zionist entity) would say yes". And US Secretary of State Antony Blinken "commended" Zionists on the plan in a phone call with war cabinet member Benny Gantz and Defense Minister Yoav Gallant, the State Department said. But for now, the bombardment and ground combat showed no sign of easing in the Gaza war soon to enter its ninth month that has devastated the coastal territory of 2.4 million people.

Gaza mothers struggle to find milk as aid halted

DEIR EL-BALAH: Amira Al-Taweel scoured pharmacies in northern Gaza for milk to feed her child, but could not find a single bottle to satisfy his hunger. "Youssef needs treatment and milk, but there's none available in Gaza," the 33-year-old mother told AFP at Al-Aqsa Martyrs hospital in central Gaza where her son was admitted suffering from malnutrition.

Gaza tailors take in clothes as people go hungry

RAFAH: Palestinian tailor Anwar Abu Keresh used to take out the clothes of his Gaza customers but after eight months of the Zionist military campaign in the territory and the hunger crisis it has caused, he now has to tighten them to fit people's thinning bodies.

The UN says over a million people face "catastrophic" levels of hunger in Gaza and has said there is famine in parts of the enclave. Aid supplies into the territory have plummeted since the entity began military operations in Rafah this month. "We are now tightening clothes to small sizes due to the lack of food, the lack of water, and there is nothing for people to eat. People are living on canned food," said Abu Keresh in a video obtained by Reuters.

"No one should tighten their clothes. People's clothes would have remained the same," he added.

Abu Keresh was sewing as a mother and her children stood nearby waiting for him to finish taking in their clothes. "I was above 90 kg. I used to loosen my clothes but now I have to tighten my clothes,' said the woman, who identified herself as Um Alaa Abu Sameha. "It is not just us that lost weight, even my granddaughter got affected by the war, she lost weight. I brought her clothes, I'm getting her shorts tightened for her to be able to wear them," she said.

In Deir al-Balah in central Gaza people showed photographs from before the war to compare how they looked after months of war - with nearly all people displaced from their homes — to their healthier selves before October. Um Arshad al-Sursok showed a picture of her five-year-old son Mohammed. "Now as you can see he has lost a lot of weight. He only has two sets of clothes left," she said. "I exchange this for that and when I see that they are becoming loose I have to take them to the tailor to tighten them," she said.

Iranian adviser killed in Zionist Syria strike: Media

BEIRUT: Iranian media said an adviser was killed in an early Monday Zionist strike on Syria's northern city of Aleppo, which a war monitor said killed 16 members of pro-Iran groups. "During last night's attack by the Zionist regime on Aleppo, Saeed Abyar, one of the IRGC advisers in Syria, was martyred," said Iran's Tasnim news agency, referring to the Islamic Revolutionary Guard Corps.

Earlier the Syrian Observatory for Human Rights said: "The death toll of the (Zionist) strike on a factory in Hayyan in western Aleppo province has risen to 16 pro-Iran group members, including Syrian and foreign fighters."

The Britain-based Observatory, which relies on a network of sources inside Syria, initially reported 12 dead. It said pro-Iran groups comprising local and

On Monday the military said that over the past day its forces had struck "over 50 targets in the Gaza Strip". Gaza hospitals reported at least 19 people killed in overnight strikes. And Netanyahu stressed in a video message that "we have gone to great lengths to bring them (hostages) back, but during this effort we have kept the war's objectives in mind, mainly the elimination of Hamas. "We insist on completing both tasks. This is part of the plan," he said.

Heavy fighting

The Gaza war was sparked by October 7 attack. Retaliatory bombardment and ground offensive have killed at least 36,479 people in Gaza, mostly civilians, the Hamas-run territory's health ministry said on Sunday. Some 55 percent of all structures in the Gaza Strip have been destroyed, damaged or possibly damaged since the war erupted, according to the United Nations satellite analysis agency.

Heavy fighting has raged especially in Gaza's far-southern Rafah area near the Egyptian border, where most civilians have now been displaced once more, according to UN agencies. Air strikes and artillery shelling were reported in Rafah, mainly in the Tal Al-Sultan neighborhood, as well as in Gaza City in the territory's north, witnesses told AFP. The military said troops were carrying out "targeted operations in the Rafah area", where they had "located terror infrastructure and large quantities of weapons".

Gaza's European hospital said 10 people were killed and several wounded in a Zionist airstrike on a house near the main southern city of Khan Yunis. And six people were reported killed in a strike on a family home in the central Bureij refugee camp, according to the Al-Aqsa Martyrs hospital. Gaza civil defense spokesman Mahmud Bassal said in Jabalia that his teams had "retrieved more than 360 martyrs" in recent weeks and that "there are still families under the rubble".

"I feed him, but no milk as it's not available. I feed him wheat (flour) which makes him bloated," she said, as Youssef lay on a narrow bed, his frail body receiving desperately needed medication through intravenous tubes in his feet. The Hamas government media office said that at least 32 people, many of them children, have died of malnutrition in Gaza since the Zionist war on Gaza. But aid agencies warn that the situation is even worse when it comes to children.

On Saturday, the World Health Organization said that more than four in five children had gone a whole day without eating at least once in 72 hours. "Children are starving," WHO spokeswoman Margaret Harris said in a statement. The rise in malnutrition among Gaza's children is largely a result of humanitarian aid that enters the Palestinian territory not reaching its intended destination, aid agencies said.

Post-war scenarios

Netanyahu - a hawkish veteran leading a fragile hard-right coalition government - is under intense domestic pressure from multiple sides. Relatives and supporters of hostages have staged mass protests demanding that he strike a truce deal - but the premier's far-right coalition allies are threatening to bring down the government if he does. According to Biden, Zionist three-stage offer would begin with a six-week phase that would see Zionist forces withdraw from all populated areas of Gaza and an initial hostage-prisoner exchange. Both sides would then negotiate for a lasting ceasefire, with the truce to continue as long as talks are ongoing, Biden said,

Doctors demand aid

Since mid-January the UN humanitarian agency OCHA has screened more than 93,400 children under five in Gaza for malnutrition, including 7,280 who were found to be acutely malnourished. Malnutrition is particularly prevalent in northern Gaza, which received little aid in the early months of the war.

Only in recent weeks has much of the food aid been diverted through new crossings after aid agencies warned of imminent famine. The Zionist military said on Sunday that a total of 1,858 trucks of aid were inspected and sent into Gaza this week through its Karam Abu Salem crossing, and the Beit Hanoun (Erez West) crossings, including 764 from Egypt.

At Al-Aqsa Martyrs hospital, mothers were concerned about their malnourished children. After adding it was "time for this war to end".

Finance Minister Bezalel Smotrich and National Security Minister Itamar Ben Gvir, leaders of extreme-right parties, have warned they would leave the government if it endorsed the truce proposal. Gallant, who has criticized Netanyahu over the lack of a postwar plan for Gaza, said Sunday that Zionist entity was "assessing a governing alternative" to Hamas to rule the territory after the war ends. UN and other aid agencies have warned for months of the looming risk of famine in the besieged territory. At a hospital in Deir Al-Balah, 33-year-old Amira Al-Taweel told AFP that her frail son, suffering from malnutrition, "needs treatment and milk, but there's none available in Gaza". — AFP

Youssef and another baby boy, Saif, were admitted, their mothers sat next to them, worrying about how long they could survive on the food the hospital provides. "We depend on the aid that comes here and is given to the children," said Noha Al-Khaldi, mother of Saif, whose skin was stretched over protruding bones. "All night long he suffers ... He was supposed to have an operation, but it was postponed."

Hazem Mostafa, a pediatrician at the hospital, blamed the closure of the Rafah crossing in the south for the worsening situation. The crossing is the main conduit for aid into Gaza from neighboring Egypt, but Zionist forces seized control of it on May 7. Since then, no aid has entered the territory through the crossing, and no sick or wounded patients have been able to leave for treatment in Egypt. — AFP

Rafah, on the border with Egypt, had been the last place in Gaza not entered in force by Zionist troops and more than a million people had taken shelter there after being forced from their homes by the war. Most of them have now fled, many to the beach area of Al-Mawasi outside Rafah where they live in tents or shacks, others to the ruins of their former homes.

No one happy In Khan Younis, not far from Rafah, Ikram al-Ham was sheltering in a tent in the rubble with her family. Clothes hung from the smashed remains of a roof. 'This house has many memories. I gave birth to five children in it. I brought them up with my heart and my blood," she said, describing its destroyed remains as having become "a cave of fear".

"I look at other people's homes and the rubble and I think 'when will Palestine return, or even Gaza'," she said. She picked through the rubble, inspecting the family's broken old fridge that once contained food for children who now go hungry. At night, with no electric light, the ruins are frightening "I always used to find the children playing here and they used to be happy. Now I don't see anyone happy," she said. — Reuters

foreign fighters have considerable influence in government-controlled Hayyan.

The Zionist entity has carried out hundreds of strikes on its northern neighbor since the outbreak of Syria's civil war, mainly targeting army positions and Iran-backed fighters including from Lebanon's Hezbollah group. The strikes increased after the Zionist entity's war on Gaza began last October.

But the Observatory said they slowed after a deadly April 1 strike on the Iranian consulate in Damascus, blamed on the Zionist entity, that sent regional tensions skyrocketing and triggered Iran's first-ever direct attack on the entity.


A Syrian defense ministry statement said that "after midnight ... the (Zionist) enemy launched an air attack from the southeast of Aleppo, targeting some positions" near the city. It reported "martyrs" and "some material damage". While the entity rarely comments on individual strikes in Syria, it has repeatedly said it will not allow arch-enemy Iran to expand its presence there.

According to the Observatory, Zionist strikes on Wednesday in western and central Syria killed a girl and six fighters working with Hezbollah, including three Syrians. — AFP

Billions of dollars being poured into aviation around wealthy region

Emirates boss says Boeing needs strong CEO to end crisis

DUBAI: The head of Dubai airline Emirates urged Boeing to pick an engineering and business heavyweight to lead a deep overhaul of the US aerospace giant and said the task of ending the planemaker's recent confidence crisis "must get done".

'Is it fixable and salvageable? Yes, it is. Will it get things back to where it needs to? It must. And you'll only do that with very strong leadership, who are fixated on doing the right thing," Emirates Airline President Tim Clark told reporters on the sidelines of a major airlines summit.

Turning round the manufacturer after a series of safety and industrial problems, to the point where it can meet existing and new demand smoothly, may take five years, he said. Emirates is the world's largest buyer of long-haul jets to feed its Gulf hub.

Boeing is looking for a new CEO after announcing that Dave Calhoun would step down by the end of the year following back-to-back crises exacerbated by the blowout of a loose door plug on an Alaska Airlines 737 MAX 9 jet in January. Clark, who has been one of Boeing's severest critics during the crisis, told Reuters he had never met Calhoun, who was appointed CEO in January 2020 following a pair of 737 MAX crashes in 2018 and 2019 that killed nearly 350 people.

Boeing had no immediate comment on his remarks. In December, Boeing named Stephanie Pope to the newly created position of group-wide chief operating officer in a move seen at the time as positioning her as a leading contender to take over from Calhoun at some point in the next few years.

Asked what he would like to see in a new Boeing CEO, Clark said: "I think that people who have got a really broad aerospace engineering capability, who are good business managers as well, are the people that you need to bring back and sort this one out. Whether Stephanie Pope is going to be able to step up and do that (as well as) anybody, time will tell".

He added: "But we need airplanes, we cannot face constant delays. We've got a business to run and if we're having to foot the bill for refurbishing all these (existing) airplanes it should be put at Boeing's door." Emirates, the largest operator of the 777 family, is carrying out what it calls the largest cabin refurbishment on existing planes as it awaits the first delivery of the Boeing 777X, delayed by at least five years from 2020.

Clark said Boeing could not yet give a precise date for the plane's first delivery. It has said it will be in 2025. Clark said he planned to meet Pope in her capacity as Boeing's recently appointed planemaking chief on the sidelines of the annual meeting of the International Air Transport Association being held in Dubai over the next two days.

The unit Pope previously led, Global Services, was Boeing's only profitable division in the first nine months of 2023. In March, in the wake of the blowout incident, it announced Calhoun's earlier-than-expected planned departure and named Pope as head of its Commercial Airplanes division, replacing Stan Deal who was fired as part of the same shake-up.

Analysts say Pope continues to be cited in some quarters as a contender for the CEO role alongside several outside contenders including Spirit AeroSystems CEO Pat Shanahan. — Reuters

DUBAI: With major new airports emerging from the desert and aircraft orders rolling in, the resource-rich Gulf is raising its stake in an industry forecast to boom in the decades ahead. As the International Air Transport Association's AGM takes place this week in Dubai - two years after it was held in Qatar - billions of dollars are being poured into aviation around the wealthy region.

And with good reason: according to the global industry body, Middle East passenger traffic will double in the next 20 years, climbing to 530 million passengers by 2043. Global figures will see a similar rise.

Dubai, which is already home to the world's busiest airport by international traffic, has started work on an even larger airport which authorities say will handle up to 260 million passengers annually, which would be the biggest in the world. A short drive away, the United Arab Emirates' capital Abu Dhabi opened a new terminal in November, while gas-rich Qatar has also been expanding Doha's Hamad International Airport.

Neighboring Saudi Arabia, which is pouring its oil wealth into projects that will help it weather the clean energy transition, is also making a major play. Along with announcing a new air hub in Riyadh with capacity for 120 million passengers a year, Saudi Arabia has also unveiled Riyadh Air, a new airline with 39 Boeing jets on order.

Meanwhile, Jeddah-based Saudia Group, which runs the Saudia and flyadeal carriers, announced a bumper deal for 105 Airbus aircraft last month. Emirates, Dubai's state-owned carrier, with its large fleet of long-range, wide-body aircraft, epitomizes the Gulf's "hub and spoke" model in which a globe-spanning range of long-haul destinations are linked by connecting flights through Dubai.

The Gulf "is a unique region due to its geography. In an eight-hour flight, we can reach 80 percent of the world's population", explained Stan Deal, then head of Boeing's commercial aircraft division, late last year.

'A ton of growth'

While Asia is expected to drive the rise in global passenger traffic, the Gulf expects to benefit, lying just a short hop from the growing markets of South Asia. "They're very well positioned to capture the Indian traffic and connect the subcontinent," said Nina Lind, an aviation specialist at management consultancy McKinsey. "There's also a lot of incoming travel growth from Indonesia," she said, refer-

ring to pilgrims heading to Saudi Arabia's holy sites from the world's biggest majority-Muslim country. "There's a ton of growth."

According to Airbus, traffic between the Middle East and Asia is expected to increase three-fold by 2042, and more than double between the Middle East and Europe.

IATA vice-president Kamil Alawadhi said Middle East airports are currently on "par with the demand, maybe lagging a bit... So you'll see a very calculated business plan for either the expansion or building of new airports". "I don't think we're going to ever have an overcapacity for the next, I don't know, 40 years or so in this particular region," he added.

Geoffrey Weston, head of consultancy Bain and Company's airlines, logistics and transportation sector, said the Gulf airlines, which also include Qatar Airways and Etihad, had the advantage of strong brands and close links to Asia. "They do have the hedge of having spent, now, two decades building their brands and getting closer to their Asian and Indian subcontinent clients," he said.

The airlines have "also been dipping into" markets in East Africa, West Africa and Southern Africa, he said. — AFP

Resurgent airlines soar towards passenger and revenue records

DUBAI: Airlines will fly almost five billion passengers in 2024 and revenues will near \$1 trillion, both record highs, trade body IATA said on Monday as the industry roars back after the pandemic. The International Air Transport Association also said it expected the world's airlines to post \$30 billion in net earnings this year, up from its previous estimate of \$25.7 billion.

However, total expenses are expected to hit a record high this year, climbing 9.4 percent to \$936 billion, IATA announced at its annual general meeting in Dubai. Fossil fuel-burning airlines are also under pressure to contribute to the fight against climate change and make progress towards a pledge to reach "net zero" carbon emissions by 2050. This year's expected \$30 billion profit "is a great achievement considering the recent deep pandemic losses", IATA director general Willie Walsh told the body's annual general meeting in Dubai.

"Without a doubt, aviation is vital to the ambitions and prosperity of individuals and economies. Strengthening airline profitability and growing financial resilience is important," he added. The COVID-19 pandem-

ic plunged the aviation industry into crisis, grounding fleets and costing thousands of jobs. IATA put the losses at \$183 billion between 2020 and 2022. But despite the expected bounce-back to record passengers and revenues of \$996 billion this year, some clouds remain. As well as the record expenses, the return on invested capital is estimated at 5.7 percent in 2024, about 3.4 percentage points below the average cost of capital.

The net profit margin is just 3.1 percent, amounting to about \$6 per passenger - a slight improvement on 2023, which is estimated at \$27.4 billion net profit with a 3.0 percent margin. "Earning just \$6.14 per passenger

is an indication of just how thin our profits are - barely enough for a coffee in many parts of the world," Walsh said. Airlines are facing a sharp rise in costs due to shortages of parts and labor as well as challenges related to climate change, including flooded runways and forest fires. In April Dubai's airport, the world's busiest for international passengers, was closed by severe flooding that left standing water on the runway and forced the cancellation of more than 2,000 flights.

The extreme rainfall in the desert United Arab Emirates was likely exacerbated by manmade global warming, according to an international grouping of scientists that examines extreme weather events.

Air transport currently accounts for less than three percent of global CO2 emissions, but is often in the firing line because it serves a minority of the world's population. Production of sustainable aviation fuel (SAF), taken from renewable sources, will triple this year to 1.9 billion liters, or 1.5 million tons, IATA said on Sunday. But SAF will account for just 0.53 percent of the industry's fuel needs in 2024, the body added.

It is expected to provide 65 percent of aviation's "net zero" mitigation by 2050, with the balance expected to come from greater efficiencies, new technologies

After Doha in 2022, Istanbul in 2023 and Dubai this year, IATA's 2025 AGM will be held in New Delhi - the centre of an aviation boom, including record-breaking aircraft orders by Indian carriers. — AFP

Turkey's national statistics office said Monday that annual inflation reached 75.45 percent in May after accelerating to 69.8 percent in April. It added that consumer prices had risen by 3.7 percent on a monthly basis between April and May, in line with

central bank forecasts. A group of independent economists, ENAG, said consumer prices actually increased by 120.7 percent in May year-on-year and by 5.7 percent on a monthly basis. Liam Peach, senior emerging markets economist at London-based research group Capital Economics, said the May rise was stronger than expected and "slightly disappointing". "It had looked like price pressures were easing in recent months, but the 3.4 percent month-onmonth increase in May was higher than in both March and April," Peach said in a note, predicting that "bumpy disinflation lies ahead". — AFP

Turkish inflation exceeds 75% but peak in sight

ISTANBUL: Turkish inflation jumped above 75 percent in May, official data showed Monday, but officials expect consumer prices to have finally peaked in a cost-of-living crisis that has dogged President Recep Tayyip Erdogan.

Turkey has been battling soaring consumer prices that prompted Erdogan to drop his opposition to interest-rate hikes to combat inflation. The central bank began to raise its key rate in June 2023, gradually tak-

ing it from 8.5 percent to 50 percent. Last month, central bank governor Fatih Karahan raised the year-end inflation forecast to 38 percent, up from a previous estimate of 36 percent. But Karahan also said inflation would begin to slow in June after reaching a peak in May. "The hardest part is over," Finance Minister Mehmet Simsek wrote Monday on X. "The permanent drop in inflation will begin in June," he added. "The transition period in the fight against inflation has been completed and we are entering the

process of disinflation. Inflation will "very likely" fall under 50 percent by the end of the third quarter, Simsek predicted.

The staggering rise of consumer prices and the collapse of the Turkish lira are deemed responsible for the severe electoral setback inflicted on Erdogan's AKP party in March municipal elections.

Microsoft to invest \$3.2bn in Sweden

Tech giant to use chips from Nvidia, AMD and its own

STOCKHOLM: Microsoft will invest 33.7 billion Swedish crowns (\$3.2 billion) to expand its cloud and artificial intelligence infrastructure in Sweden over a two-year period, it said on Monday. The rising popularity of generative AI has fueled demand for cloud services, prompting companies including Microsoft and Amazon Web Services to invest billions of dollars to build data centers in Europe. "Microsoft's largest investment in our history in Sweden" would enable the Scandinavian country "to build world-leading AI data centre infrastructure," the company's president and vice chair Brad Smith said at a press conference with Swedish Prime Minister Ulf Kristersson.

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"A big part of the reason we're able to do this is because of Sweden's forward-looking energy policy, the plentiful access to green energy, whether it's carbon-free energy or renewable energy," Smith said.

The US group has in recent months announced similar AI investments in other countries, including in France where it vowed to invest four billion euros (\$4.3 billion), Japan where it announced a \$2.9 billion AI push, and in Indonesia and Malaysia.

In Sweden, Microsoft will provide more than 20,000 graphic processing units (GPUs), needed for training AI models, and will boost capacity at its data centres in Sandviken, Gavle and Staffanstorp.

Microsoft invested in data centers in the UK in November and Germany and Spain in February. "You will see some other announcements, probably more in the fall," Microsoft President Brad Smith said in an interview. Microsoft plans to deploy 20,000 of the most advanced graphics processing units, which speed up computer calculations, at its Swedish data centre sites in Sandviken, Gavle and Staffanstorp. The company

will use Nvidia's faster processors and may turn to semiconductors from AMD and ultimately some of its own chips, Smith said.

The race to develop generative AI programs has led to a surge in demand for advanced chips able to support these complex applications. Microsoft said it was committed to boosting AI adoption across the Nordic region which in addition to Sweden includes Denmark, Finland, Iceland and Norway.

The company plans to train 250,000 Swedes with AI skills within organizations, schools, universities, public sector and society at large over three years. It is also investing in renewable energy and has procured nearly 1,000 MW of renewable energy in Sweden.

Goldman Sachs sees the AI boom as a near-\$1 trillion opportunity for the sector as tech companies invest in data centers to train their power-hungry large language models. "AI is a tech transformation that should be seen as a multiplier or catalyst ... It is part of the strategy going forward when, after successfully fighting inflation, we enter a new phase, an investment phase," said Ulf Kristersson, Prime Minister of Sweden. "AI is a catalyst for many things," Kristersson said. "It will also help accelerate development in other areas. This huge investment in Sweden has the potential to pave the way for other investments."

Data centres, which crunch and stock vast amounts of data, require large amounts of electricity and water, accounting for about two percent of global electricity consumption, according to a study by the HEC Montreal business school.

In 2020, Microsoft said it aimed to become "carbon negative" by 2030, but in 2023 its emissions rose by 30 percent, its data showed.



'Rise in Russian deepfakes'

Asked about the risks and abuses associated with artificial intelligence, Smith said Microsoft was monitoring AI-generated deepfakes "very closely". "Our biggest concern, to be honest, is about the Russian government," he said. "We've seen an increase in Russian activity using deepfakes." "This is the kind of danger for the future that we need to address and protect against, and that's going to require more work."

in the next five years, it could be better than 50 percent," CEO Rene Haas told Reuters in an interview.

Microsoft has made a significant commitment to ensure its alternative technology to Advanced Micro Devices and Intel's x86 technology is embraced by consumers, building a suite of software developer tools to make it possible to produce programs that function on Arm-based chips. "They've (Microsoft) gone way beyond anything they had (in developer tools) and they really picked it up in the last couple of years," Haas said. "They are very, very much committed from a software standpoint."

Microsoft and hardware vendors are following in Apple's footsteps. The company has seen success from its introduction of Arm designs. It has sold machines with its "M Series" processors for roughly four years and those chips offer long battery life and speedy performance. Qualcomm has designed the first Arm-based chip to introduce consumers and businesses to the new Windows-based Arm machines, but other vendors will follow, Haas said. Microsoft also has a battery of device makers signed on to sell machines with the Arms-based system such as Asus and Dell Technologies. — Reuters

AMD unveils new AI chips to challenge Nvidia

TAIPEI: AMD on Monday announced its new artificial intelligence chips for everything from cutting-edge data centers to advanced laptops, ramping up its challenge to the runaway market leader Nvidia. Demand has exploded in the past two years for the specialized processors that help develop, train and run AI applications such as ChatGPT. AMD has emerged as one of Nvidia's most serious contenders and CEO Lisa Su said the firm's next-generation processors will rival the top offerings from competitors.

"AI is our number one priority, and we're at the beginning of an incredibly exciting time for the industry as AI transforms virtually every business, improves our quality of life and reshapes every part of the computing market," Su said during a keynote speech at Computex, Taiwan's premier tech expo. She also announced that AMD will follow an annual update cycle for its advanced accelerators, and the latest—the Instinct MI325X—is planned for release later this year. That is in line with a similar annual release outline announced Sunday by Nvidia CEO Jensen Huang. Hailing partnerships with some of the world's biggest laptop companies, Su brought out leaders from Microsoft, HP, Lenovo and Asus—who touted the incorporation of AMD's Ry-

Microsoft has been one of the leaders among Big Tech firms on AI, investing billions in ChatGPT maker OpenAI and also rapidly integrating AI features into its products. Earlier this month, it unveiled its Copilot+computers—so-called "AI PCs" that will run the Windows operating system with AI built in. Microsoft CEO Satya Nadella said Monday that AMD's Ryzen processors would feature in these machines. "We are in the midst of a massive AI platform shift, with the promise to transform how we live and work," Nadella said in a video message during Su's speech. "That's why our deep partnership with AMD, which has spanned multiple computing platforms, from the PC to custom silicon for Xbox, and now to AI, is so important to us."

Computex has attracted the CEOs of some of the world's biggest chip heavyweights to Taiwan this year. Taiwanese manufacturers are central to the AI plans of tech giants—the island produces the bulk of the world's most advanced semiconductors, including those needed for the most powerful AI applications and research.

In addition to AMD's Su and Nvidia CEO Huang, Intel boss Pat Gelsinger and Rene Haas of British semiconductor design giant Arm are also attending. The AMD event on Monday was followed by a keynote speech by Cristiano Amon, CEO of Qualcomm, another firm whose advanced processors are being used in Microsoft's Copilot+ computers. Amon hailed the use of his company's Snapdragon X Elite processors to run AI-powered computers as "one of the most significant transitions" for PCs that run Microsoft's Windows operating system. "The PC is truly reborn. It's a new era for the PC, and that is happening with a combination of Snapdragon X Elite and Copilot+," Amon said, pointing to major improvements in AI performance and battery life. He ended his presentation with an apparent dig at Apple—whose high-end Mac computers have long competed with premium PCs—showing the audience a short video of the actor Justin Long trying to order a PC. Long was featured in the popular Apple ads from the 2000s in which he played a hip character representing Macs opposite John Hodgman as a stuffy and boring PC.—AFP

Arm aims to capture 50% of PC market in five years, says CEO

TAIPEI: Arm Holdings aims to gain more than 50 percent of the Windows PC market in five years, the chip designer's CEO said, as Microsoft and its hardware partners prepare to launch a new batch of computers based on the British firm's technology. Demand for use of Arm's technology in personal computers got a boost after Microsoft unveiled ambitious plans last month to launch a new breed of PCs with artificial intelligence features to compete with Alphabet and Apple.

Its flagship Windows operating system will now run on chips designed by Arm, whose technology powered the rise of smartphones. Chips made by Intel have dominated the PC industry for decades and if the Arm push succeeds, it would reorder the market. "Arm's market share in Windows - I think, truly,


The ECB's benchmark rate currently sits at an all-time high of four percent, after policymakers dialled up borrowing costs to counter soaring inflation. But the first cut might not be enough to completely ease the pain for homeowners like Siobhan Mortimer from Ireland. The 51-year-old lost her job as a tour guide during the pandemic and is struggling to cover the repayments for her home in Dublin, with the interest on the mortgage currently fixed at three percent.

"My mortgage is up for renewal in June 2024, I don't think I would qualify for a new mortgage after the ECB's interest rate hikes," said Mortimer, adding she hoped borrowing costs would fall faster.

The situation is just as difficult for those on variable-interest mortgages, where repayments have climbed as the ECB has hiked rates. Terry, from County Meath in Ireland, has seen his repayments go from 850 euros to 1,000 euros a month in a year. "I tried switching to a fixed deal when interest rates started going up fast but the bank said no," said the 42-year-old father of three.

"I'm still in arrears and the mortgage is almost fifty percent of my take-home pay now," he told AFP. "A rate cut by the ECB would be good news but only if the banks pass it on to their customers quickly."

In Germany, analysts like Jochen Moebert from Deutsche bank believe the housing sector's darkest days could be over "towards the end of 2024". Moebert points towards the stabilization in the number of approvals and the "positive impact" of recent changes to amortisation rules for the construction sector passed by the government in Berlin. "However, a boom like the one between 2009 and 2022 will not happen again any time soon," Moebert said. -- AFP

The busy work at the site in Germany is a rare sign of activity in an industry holding out for a fall in interest rates to get back on its feet.

Frankfurt's municipal housing group ABG Holding and its financial partner LBBW Immobilien signed off on the project before things turned bad for the construction sector. The coronavirus pandemic followed by the Russian invasion of Ukraine sent the costs of materials spiraling upwards and the subsequent surge in inflation forced the European Central Bank to start hiking fast. But a glimmer of hope may be in sight as the ECB is poised to start lowering rates when its governors meet on Thursday.

"The crisis was ultimately triggered by the interest rate increase," said Frank Berlepp, director of LBBW Immobilien. The costs of construction rose and to cover the increase, investors are demanding "rents in excess of 20 euros (\$22) per square-metre, which almost no one can pay", according to Frank Junker, the head of ABG Holding.

"Demand for condominiums has completely col-

"Demand for condominiums has completely collapsed," Berlepp told AFP. Buying a family home depends on making a bet that things will get better for buyers, but "without a cut in interest rates, the situation will not change", said Berlepp. Last year, some 294,000 new homes were built in Germany, just under the level of 2022, according to the federal statistics agency Destatis.

That figure is still well below the target of 400,000 new homes a year set by Chancellor Olaf




an earlier peak of 38.56 euros, its highest level since early December. Gassco is working with Equinor to resolve the situation, a Gassco spokesperson said separately. "We are working... with a plan for repairs and with a plan for compensatory measures to deliver the highest possible volume to Europe," the spokesperson said. While Nyhamna plant operator Shell confirmed the issue was related to Sleipner, an Equinor spokesperson referred any questions on the issue to Gassco. Nyhamna is able to process up to 79.8 mcm per day, with the current shutdown resulting in a real loss of 56.7 mcm on Monday, according to Hansen. 
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
Global economic growth expected to be steady at 3.2% in 2024, 2025

US economic momentum drifts but Fed to maintain rates for longer









KUWAIT: The IMF projects global economic growth to be steady yet relatively slow at 3.2 percent in each of 2024 and 2025, matching the 2023 expansion. But the outlook has diverged across countries, with US growth expectations in 2024-2025 still far ahead of other major developed markets. This, combined with slower disinflation in the US, could result in the Fed keeping interest rates higher for longer - a stark contrast to market hopes a few months back of aggressive rate cuts this year.

In the eurozone, soft growth and a sharp pullback in inflation has brought the ECB closer to its first interest rate cut, very likely at the bank's meeting this week. The falling yen and elevated inflation make a case for more Bank of Japan hikes this year, though this must be balanced against ongoing weakness in household spending. China's industry-oriented policy push has boosted the near-term outlook, but growth still faces several medium-term headwinds. Finally, India continues to enjoy solid economic growth, the highest among major economies.

US momentum

After posting two consecutive quarters of consensus-beating growth, the expansion in GDP slowed to 1.3 percent (annualized) in O1 2024 down from 3.4 percent in Q4 2023, on a widened trade deficit and slower growth in government and household spending. The consensus expectation for O2 is for an improved growth figure of 2 percent or more - albeit still representing a loss of momentum from H2 2023. But recent high-frequency indicators paint a mixed outlook, with retail sales and industrial production stagnating in April while the S&P composite PMI in May (at 54.3, a two-year high) improved on a broadbased expansion in activity. One key area to watch is the labor market, which is showing signs of fracture, with job growth in April easing to 175K m/m from +315K in March, the unemployment rate ticking

up (3.9 percent) and wage growth decelerating (3.9 percent y/y – the slowest rise since June 2021).

Meanwhile, after hotter inflation prints in O1, the April CPI report soothed some nervousness as inflation moderated to 3.4 percent y/y from 3.5 percent in March with the core rate also easing to a threevear low of 3.6 percent. The Fed in May, while keeping the policy rate steady at the 5.25-5.5 percent range, trimmed the pace of its balance sheet reduction (quantitative tightening) from \$95 billion to \$60 billion a month, effective June, to balance liquidity conditions. Still, the heavy-weight shelter component in the inflation basket has shown a modest easing in price rises - partly due to calculation methodology - and along with still-elevated inflation in other services, will push the Fed to adopt a cautious approach at its June 11-12 meeting. Currently, markets are pricing in one to two 25 bps rate cuts by year-end.

Europe exits recession

The eurozone exited recession in Q1, with GDP growing by 0.3 percent q/q after a drop of 0.1 percent in each of the previous two quarters, as investment and exports rebounded, likely indicating that the worst of the export slump seen in 2023 may be behind us. The IMF recently downgraded the bloc's GDP growth from 0.9 percent to 0.8 percent for 2024 and from 1.7 percent to 1.5 percent for 2025 due to higher interest rates and fiscal consolidation in some countries. On a positive note, inflation has broadly moderated despite some setback in May (headline and core at 2.6 percent y/y and percent, chart 2), coming closer to the ECB's 2 percent target, allowing the ECB to cut interest rates sooner rather than later, with a high likelihood for a first cut at the bank's meeting this week. Lower rates should improve economic confidence and expectations, especially for the weak manufacturing sector.

The UK economy is also seeing signs

of a recovery, growing 0.6 percent q/q in Q1 2024 versus -0.3 percent in Q4 2023 as private consumption rebounded. The IMF's latest forecasts see GDP growth of 0.5 percent in 2024 strengthening to 1.5 percent in 2025, a sharp acceleration from almost no-growth in 2023. Meanwhile, inflation dropped sharply but still came above market expectations at 2.3 percent y/y in April versus 3.2 percent in March as a lower cap on energy tariffs helped ease price rises, but service prices remained stickier. A slower drop in inflation could delay interest rate cuts by the Bank of En-

gland, possibly until August or even later. Prime Minister Rishi Sunak has set July 4 as the date for the general election, earlier than many political analysts had expected. Although his governing Conservative Party is well behind in the opinion polls, an improving economy could offer some hope of an unlikely political revival.

BoJ's policy tightening

Japan's economy in Q1 contracted by a more-than-forecast 0.5 percent q/q, from no change in the previous quarter. The fall was accentuated by a large drop of -0.7 percent (-0.4 percent in O4 2023) in private consumption, extending its decline for a fourth straight quarter (chart 3). Higher prices of imported goods after the yen's massive drop against the USD (11 percent y/y in Q1 2024 – and further since) has adversely impacted consumption, offsetting the beneficial effect on the country's export competitiveness. Retail sales volumes fell by an average 0.3 percent y/y in Q1 as consumer spending couldn't match the pace of rising prices. However, May's PMI readings indicated an ongoing expansion in the service sector (53.6) along with growth in manufacturing activity for the first time in a year (50.4), which alleviated some concerns about the deteriorating economic conditions.

Core consumer price inflation continued to soften in April, down to 2.2 percent y/y from 2.6 percent in March, as demand

remains muted especially with falling real wages biting consumer wallets. However, the falling yen fueling inflationary pressures has pushed the Bank of Japan closer to another rate hike. The BoJ, after a historic rate hike in March, held its policy rate steady in April (0.0 percent-0.1 percent) but reduced government bond purchases. The bank now faces a complex policy decision to avoid overtightening given a faltering economic landscape amid weakening household demand.

Chinese economic activity picks up

GDP growth picked up slightly in Q1, rising 5.3 percent y/y from 5.2 percent in the previous quarter and exceeding market expectations. In April, growth in the export-oriented manufacturing sector quickened as industrial production rose 6.7 percent y/y. Exports and imports in April also rebounded from the previous month's sharp drops. The latest improvement prompted the IMF to upgrade its GDP growth forecast for 2024 to 5 percent from 4.6 percent earlier, slowing to an also-improved 4.5 percent in 2025. Meanwhile, exports of new technology and green energy-based goods have been seeing a substantial rise lately. Growing concern about China using excess capacity to dump these goods in global markets triggered the introduction of higher import tariffs on such products by the US, although direct export of such goods to the US is relatively limited. Industrial sector expansion highlights local imbalances as domestic consumption remains tepid: retail sales growth further decelerated (2.3 percent y/y) in April while CPI inflation was subdued at 0.3 percent y/y

The near-term economic outlook was helped recently by the government's unveiling of a \$41 billion financing package to support the moribund property sector, for local public authorities to buy unsold residential units and use them as affordable housing projects. The central government is also aiming to issue around \$140

billion in ultra-long, special bonds this year to finance investments that could help achieve the GDP growth target of 5 percent for 2024. But on a more medium-term basis, given the scale of unsold as well as unfinished inventory, such efforts may still be insufficient. Moreover, other long-term structural issues including ageing demographics continue to weigh on growth.

India's growth seen elevated

The economic growth continued to surprise positively, coming in at a very solid 7.8 percent in Q4 FY2023-24, with the full year growth at 8.2 percent on a substantial increase in government capital outlays. Recent indicators point towards momentum largely being sustained, with the composite PMI staying elevated at 61.7 in May, slightly better than April's 61.5. The ongoing general election, which current PM Modi is widely expected to win, has helped maintain the buoyancy given the usual increase in spending during election time. However, private consumption has shown signs of emerging fatigue amid some weaknesses in the agriculture-based rural segment, as highlighted in the latest GDP data. The external sector also disappointed in April, with a higher merchandise trade deficit on rising commodity imports.

Given higher prices of key import commodities such as crude oil and gold, the current account deficit could expand over the coming months from around 1 percent of GDP in FY2023-24. Still, the outlook for FY2024-25 is relatively strong, with the IMF recently upgrading its GDP growth forecast to 6.8 percent from 6.5 percent earlier.

Meanwhile, consumer price inflation remained broadly stable at 4.8 percent y/y in April, but food prices continued to accelerate (+8.7 percent), with extreme weather events in recent weeks indicating more uncertainty going forward. Accordingly, the Reserve Bank of India could keep the repo rate steady at 6.5 percent at its June MPC meeting.

Pakistan inflation drops sharply

KARACHI: Inflation in Pakistan fell in May to its lowest level in 29 months, the sharpest drop since an economic crisis sent food prices soaring, according to government data published Monday. The Pakistan Bureau of Statistics said that consumer prices rose 11.8 percent year-on-year, compared to a peak of 38 percent in May 2023. In April, inflation fell to under 20 percent year-on-year for the first time since the country's economy began to spiral in early 2022 as a political crisis gripped the country.

"This is the lowest reading in the last 29 months. On the ground we have seen prices of wheat, vegetables, oil coming down," said Mohammed Sohail, the CEO of Karachi-based investment house Topline Securities. He called the reading "better than our expectations".

Nigerian unions shut down power grid, disrupt airlines

LAGOS/ABUJA: Nigeria's main labor unions on Monday shut down the national grid and disrupted airline operations across the country as they began an indefinite strike over the government's failure to agree a new minimum wage. This strike is the fourth embarked upon by the Nigerian Labour Congress (NLC) and the Trade Union Congress (TUC), two of the country's biggest unions, since President Bola Tinubu took office last year.

The Transmission Company of Nigeria (TCN) said union members drove away operators at the country's power control rooms and shut down at least six substations, which eventually shut the national grid at 02.19 am (0119 GMT).

Nigerian airline Ibom Air said it was suspending flights until further notice due to the strike, while another, United Nigeria, said airports across the country have been shut down and that striking workers had permitted none of its flights to operate. Electricity and aviation unions said in a statement on Monday they had directed their workers to withdraw their services in compliance with the indefinite

fault last year, as the value of the rupee plummeted against the dollar and the country's foreign exchange reserves dwindled so low that imports were heavily restricted. An agreement with the International Monetary Fund and delayed elections in February have helped bring some stability to the country wracked by decades of economic mismanagement. The military-backed coalition government will present its annual budget this month, as it looks to implement difficult reform measures demanded by the IMF before the lender considers another bailout request.

While most observers were expecting a dip in prices, the magnitude of the fall was a surprise, according to Amreen Soorani, head of research at JS Global Capital in Karachi, who said the lower rate of inflation was expected to continue in the

'Come back': Champs-Elysees wants to win over Parisians

Bernard Arnault, one of the wealthiest people in the world. This is a triple,

strategic plan, with the expectation that the amount will double, if not under Arnault's business acumen. LVMH investing 150 million

euros in the 2024 Olympics is practically unheard of for the conglomerate. Historically, LVMH has entered sponsorship activities at the brand level with Hublot for the 2022 World Cup, for example. However, this is its first corporate-wide agreement at this scale. Such sponsorship is bound to further strengthen and enhance the visibility and prestige of the LVMH brand globally, in perfect accord with strategic objectives.

Since the Olympics would have an estimated global viewership of over 4 billion, LVMH could capitalize on such visibility. More exposure would be critical for strengthening its luxury brand image further and on a platform where practically all people of high social standing would be watching.

The sponsorship deal brings about tax benefits since expenses for such a purpose are deducted from the tax base. This financial aspect adds another layer to its strategic advantage as an investment. So, whereas LVMH in the past has been a great investor in several sectors and brands, this 150 million-euro networking deal for the 2024 Olympics becomes the first of its kind in terms of this scale and scope inside the group. This not only shows the crossing roads of luxury and sports but displays the strategic foresight characteristic of LVMH to be at the top amidst the global groups of luxury.

■he Champs-Elysees, the iconic avenue sweeping through central Paris dotted with cafes and shops, connects the Place de la Concorde in the east with the Arc de Triomphe in the west in a single, breathtakingly straight line.

But one thing seems to be missing amid the throngs of tourists - Parisians themselves. A true Parisian is rare on the Champs-Elysees, and as one local said, that is not really surprising. "There's no place for us - no garden, nowhere to sit," Xavier LeBrun, 35, told AFP as he watched tourists stream past on the almost two-kilometer (1.2-mile) avenue during his cigarette break.

The Champs-Elysees is "where Parisians cross to get from one place to another, and that's it", he said. A top tourist attraction, locals have gradually abandoned the Champs-Elysees over concerns that it is too noisy, dirty and expensive, with luxury brands replacing smaller, independent shops. But that could change if a committee, eager to make the Champs-Elysees attractive to Parisians again, can make its voice heard.

'Everyone was fleeing'

After five years of work the "Champs-Elysees Committee", endowed with a budget of five million euros (\$5.4 million), last week listed 150 proposals including adding green spaces, reducing pollution, and organizing cultural events to "revive" the famed avenue.

The starting point for the Champs-Elysees Committee, an association of business and culture representatives, was the "alarming" realization that the world-famous street was "no longer loved, no longer likeable, deserted by Parisians, and feared by foreigners", reads the committee's report. "Everyone was fleeing," they wrote.


A giant open-air picnic held on the avenue at the weekend was an example of how the committee plans to address the issue. "It's a way of telling Parisians: Come back to the Champs-Elysees," committee chairman Marc-Antoine Jamet said. With stores and historic cinemas closing along the avenue due to rising rents and falling sales, "innovation is an absolute necessity", he said.

The 1,800-page plan seeks to reverse the decline while balancing the needs of locals and tourists. The committee estimates the cost will be 250 million euros, but Jamet said the additional

tax revenue generated by the changes would be enough to finance all or some of the project. "These are not costs but

investments." A self-proclaimed Paris "superfan" who has visited from Pakistan 22 times, 33-year-old Jawwad Channa said he always visits the Champs-Elysees, this time bringing along four friends looking forward to hitting the stores. "It's very crowded, but the shopping is amazing," said his friend Ali Syed, 32.

Shopping will remain a mainstay, but central to the committee's plan is adapting the avenue to global warming and reducing its carbon footprint by a third over 50 years, with plans to reduce traffic by increasing pedestrian space and doubling bike lanes.



The committee also aims to lower the avenue's average temperature by one to seven degrees Celsius, creating a "climate sanctuary" during the city's increasingly common heatwaves. Proposals include planting 160 trees, installing seating and fountains, and transforming 20 hectares (49 acres) of unkempt gardens into a "true Parisian park". Symphony concerts, a "quality" Christmas market and flower stalls are also part of a push for "year-round" cultural offerings to "revamp the neighborhood".

Sunday's picnic, at which thousands turned out on the "world's largest tablecloth", came after an event last year when France's brainiest bookworms battled it out in a mass spelling test at 1,779 desks set out along the avenue.

With France's presidential palace and National Assembly nearby, security remains a concern, though the proposal includes plans to increase the police presence and establish a 24hour "health and safety" watch. "We are going to discuss this with all partners," said Paris's deputy mayor Emmanuel Gregoire, adding that discussions would first take place with the police.

"The idea is Paris's mayor could announce a broad outline in the second half of 2024," Gregoire said. Gabin Contentin, 21, said big changes were needed for him and other locals to be lured back. But if all goes well, he predicted, the Champs-Elysees can "once again be the most beautiful avenue in the world". - AFP

Egypt's Sudamese refugees using rich cuisine to build new lives

udanese entrepreneur Julie Samir's dream of opening a restaurant has finally come true, but it's a bittersweet achievement after she fled to Egypt from her war-torn homeland of Sudan. Now, Samir has one aim for her menu: winning over the palate of Egyptians with a taste of Sudan's complex culinary traditions, born from a rich history at the crossroads of the Middle East and Africa.

"I'm targeting the Egyptian consumer, I want them to get to know Sudanese culture," the 42-year-old told AFP from her sun-lit eatery in eastern Cairo, the scent of simmering aromatics wafting

out of the kitchen. Across the sprawling megalopolis of Cairo — home to over 20 million people — many Sudanese refugees have opened businesses, bringing a taste of home and hoping to make a name for themselves.

Samir and her two children have been in the Egyptian capital for over a year, since making the 2,000-kilometer (around 1,200-mile) journey from their home in Khartoum. Along with half a million other Sudanese, they fled the war between Sudan's regular army and the paramilitary Rapid Support Forces to neighboring Egypt — and got to work rebuilding a life.

Today, on the lawns of one of Cairo's upscale sporting clubs, Samir's restaurant 'Kush Children's Village' serves up a fusion menu. "The name was my father's idea, inspired by the Bible," she said, explaining the reference to Kush, the ancient kingdom that straddled modern-day Egypt, Sudan and Ethiopia.

Tough competition

"We serve all three cuisines," she said proudly, but insisted the restaurant is still distinctly Sudanese. "Everyone who works here is from Sudan, all of us came here fleeing the war," she said, explaining how the team found each other through solidarity networks on social media.

In the kitchen, 46-year-old chef Fadi Moufid fussed over pots and pans stewing a number of the restaurant's wide array of dishes. The former caterer's signature is agashe — skewered meat, chicken or fish seasoned with a spicy peanut dry rub then barbequed low and slow on glowing embers.

"Egyptians don't like their food as spicy as we do, so we try to tone it down so they can really appreciate it," Moufid told AFP over a bowl of zigni, a beef stew marinated in Ethiopian spices and served with injera, a spongy flatbread. But cracking the Egyptian culinary scene is no easy feat.

"Competition wasn't as big in Sudan between food businesses, but here it's huge," Moufid says, pointing particularly to "large Syrian restaurants" founded by diaspora entrepreneurs who also fled their war-torn homeland in recent years.

Standing out can be difficult, but Moufid and Samir are slowly drawing in Egyptian palates. "I liked the taste of the spices and how tender the meat is," one of their Egyptian guests, Khaled Abdelrahman, told AFP. "It has a different feel to it." he said.

In the suburb of Sheikh Zayed, west of Cairo, Sudanese confectioner Qussay Biram's dessert shop, "Jeeb Maak"

— Arabic for "Bring Along" — sells deep-

fried dough balls called 'luqaimat'. They are similar to Egyptian 'zalabia', but still shock the Egyptians who step into the sweet-smelling store.

'Longing for Sudan'

"They're taken by surprise because we put more salt in the dough than they're used to," one of his employees, In a little over a year, already impoverished Sudan has been torn apart. The war has killed tens of thousands of people, pushed close to nine million from their homes and brought the country to the brink of famine. "Even if things calm down, there won't be many business opportunities," he said, resolute in his plan to "see this experience in Egypt through".



Ziad Abdelhalim, told AFP. "It brings out a different taste to the sweetness," he said while serving customers a steaming cup of traditional cardamom-spiced milk tea — also novel to most Egyptians.

The business model is clearly working, with 'Jeeb Maak' now boasting three branches across Cairo. But Biram says it hardly makes up for what he left behind. At 29, the entrepreneur believes he will likely never return to Sudan and that the businesses he "closed because of the war" back home are gone forever.

Samir, who said her family was stalked by paramilitary fighters when fleeing Sudan, had planned to spend only a month in Egypt. "But the war's not ending," she said, resigned to finding ways to remind herself of the homeland she longs for. "I want to hire a henna artist in the restaurant, I know Egyptians love that," she said with a laugh. — AFP

WADI AL-RAYAN RESERVE:

ECO-TOURISM IN THE SERENE DESERT





adi Al-Rayan Reserve — in Faiyum Governorate, Egypt — is one of the most attractive natural reserves with integrated eco-tourism, rich in waterfalls and a calm desert climate. The reserve, which is 150 kilometers from Cairo, is an attractive outlet for visitors who love hiking in the desert and a destination for those looking for an atmosphere of relaxation away from the city hustle.

Horse and camel riding, skiing, safaris, in addition to camping, stargazing, bird watching, and many water sports are some of the activities to enjoy at the reserve. The reserve has several areas: the charming waterfalls area, which boasts a large fish population and is considered one of the areas for practicing various marine sports, as well as (Oyun Al-Rayyan) area, which consists of moving sand dunes and three natural sulfur springs, in addition to several types of desert plants.

Wadi Al-Rayan also consist of Jabal Al-Rayyan area, which has various types of migratory and resident birds, in addition to important marine monuments and fossils, as well as lakes. In a statement to KUNA, the official spokesman of Faiyum Governorate, Dr Mohammad Al-Tuni, said that Wadi Al-Rayan was an area of national, regional and international importance. He added that it was an attractive area for eco-tourism. It includes the whale valley (Wadi Al-Hitan), which is more than 40,000,000 years old.

In 2005, the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO) chose it as a natural heritage area. It is also a reserve for rare animals, there are about five spe-

cies of wild animals, 16 species of reptiles and more than 100 species of resident and migratory birds, in addition to marine fossils, he said. In 1989, Wadi Al-Rayan was declared as a natural reserve to protect biological, natural, and geological resources, he added, explaining that it includes tourism and investment projects aimed at sustainable tourism development such as a

Meet Neo Px: The **Super**plant that attacks air pollution

It may look like an innocent green plant, but its name evokes something far closer to a robot or interstellar rocket. Neo Px is a bioengineered plant capable of purifying indoor air at an unprecedented scale, the first in a potentially long line of such super-powered organisms. "It's the equivalent of up to 30 regular houseplants in terms of air purification," said Lionel Mora, co-founder of startup Neoplants. "It will not only capture, but also remove and recycle, some of the most harmful pol-

first products in the United States in April. The United States was a particularly promising first market, since many Americans already widely use air purifiers. "We do our best to send as many plants as possible every week, but it's not enough to meet demand for now," said Mora.

Wildfires

Americans have a keen appreciation for cleaner air given all the recent "problems associated with wildfires,"

lutants you can find indoors."

Five years ago, the entrepreneur met Patrick Torbey, a genome editing researcher, who dreamed of creating living organisms "with functions." "There were plants around us, and we thought that the most powerful function we could add to them was to purify the air," said Mora, during a tour of a rented greenhouse in Lodi, California, two hours from San Francesco.

Protected from the elements, several thousand modified pothos plants, green speckled with white, awaited their turn to be potted, packed and shipped. The French startup began selling its

which have become a "bigger and bigger" problem in the country, Mora said. "One of the pollutants that comes from combustion is benzene, which we're targeting," he added. Indoor air can be two to five times more polluted than outdoor air, according to the US Environmental Protection Agency, mainly due to volatile organic compounds, or VOCs. VOCs are gaseous pollutants that can accumulate indoors and negatively impact air quality and health.

Opening windows won't help much because the VOC pollution can come from solvents, glues and paints, and therefore could lurk in cleaning products, furniture and walls. "These chemicals are associated with a range of adverse health effects, including cancer," especially for the young, the elderly and people who are already vulnerable, said Tracey Woodruff, a professor of reproductive sciences at the University of California, San Francisco.

"They can bring respiratory related effects or reproductive health effects ... like adverse pregnancy outcomes, preterm birth, miscarriages, as well as neurological disorders like Parkinson's," she said. Neo Px does not itself absorb the chemicals. The plant is sold at a starting price of \$120 with packets of powder that contain a microbiome, essentially a bacterial strain. "This bacteria colonizes the plant's roots, soil and leaves," said Torbey, the company's chief technology officer, at its research lab in Saint-Ouen, France, just outside Paris.

Bacteria powder


The bacteria "absorbs the VOCs to grow and reproduce. The plant is there to create this ecosystem for the bacteria. So we have a symbiotic system between plants and bacteria," he said. In the future, Neoplants plans to produce genetically modified plants whose metabolism will directly do the work of air purification. And in the longer term, it hopes to tackle problems linked to global warming. "We could increase the capacity of trees to capture CO2," Torbey said. Or "develop seeds that are more resistant to drought," added Mora.

Their vision, coupled with the team's scientific expertise, led Google product manager Vincent Nallatamby to invest in the startup from the outset. He now owns his own bacteria-boosted pothos plant, which sits unnoticed in his San Francisco living room, already well-stocked with houseplants of all sizes. "It's more my wife who takes care of them, except this one. This one's me!" he joked, pointing to his Neo Px. "I'm often seduced by technological objects and I want to bring them home," he said. "This was one of the first times I had no trouble convincing my wife." — AFP

Namibia defeat Oman in T20 WCup

Low-scoring thriller was decided by a super over

BRIDGETOWN: Namibia scored a nerve-shredding victory over Oman in their T20 World Cup Group B clash in Barbados on Sunday after a low-scoring thriller was decided by a super over. David Wiese was the hero for Namibia, contributing 13 runs in the Africans' super over total of 21 before then restricting Oman to 10 runs with the ball in hand to seal a crucial win at Kensington Oval.

The match had gone to a decisive extra over after a tense duel saw both teams finish with 109 runs from their allotted 20 overs. Oman had looked to be heading for defeat after a superb four-wicket bowling display from Ruben Trumpelmann saw them all out for 109 off 19.4 overs.

But Oman's bowlers responded with a disciplined performance to contain Namibia's bats, with Mehran Khan conjuring a superb spell to leave the match on a knife edge. Khan finished with figures of three wickets for seven runs off three overs.

The veteran Oman bowler took two wickets in the final over to frustrate Namibia, who had needed just five runs from the over to clinch victory. But Khan was bizarrely overlooked for the super over bowling duties by Oman, with Bilal Khan handed the ball instead.

That move backfired spectacularly, though, with Wiese blasting a four off the first ball and then crushing a full toss for six off Khan's second delivery. Wiese took three more runs off the next two balls before Namibia skipper Gerhard

Erasmus hit back-to-back fours to set Oman a daunting victory target of 22 off their super over.

Wiese took over the bowling duties for Namibia and after conceding just two runs from his first two deliveries, took the wicket of Naseem Khushi. Two more singles left Oman needing 18 from the last delivery to win, meaning Wiese could allow Zeeshan Maqsood to blast a six knowing victory was assured.

"I definitely aged a couple of years tonight," the 39-year-old Wiese said. "And I don't have a lot of years left in me. It was an emotionally draining evening." Wiese said he had been confident of steering Namibia to victory with bat and ball in the super over.

"It helped that I had a feel of the game and knew if I get a few hits out in the Super Over then with the ball, felt like taking the ball and executing. "The pitch was difficult and didn't play the way we thought. But we adapted well."

Oman captain Aqib Ilyas was left lamenting an agonizing near-miss - but defended the decision to opt for Bilal as the super over bowler over the in-form Khan. "I think Bilal is one of the best bowlers you can have at this level," Aqib said. "But there are days where you plan and it doesn't execute.

"He was clear, we were clear, but maybe the ball was wet and he couldn't execute." Earlier, Trumpelmann had given Namibia a dream start with two wickets from the first two deliveries of the match, part of a four-wicket performance.

Biles wins record ninth national championship

TEXAS: Simone Biles won a record-extending ninth all-around title at the US championships in Fort Worth, Texas on Sunday as the four-time Olympic gold medalist continues to impress in the run-up to the Paris Games.

After soaring into the lead on Friday, Biles picked up right where she left off on the final night of the competition, shaking off a misstep at the beginning of her balance beam routine to finish with a solid performance.

Her high-flying floor routine earned a 15.10 from the judges and an emotional response from her mother in the stands as the 27-year-old added to her lead. Biles fell backwards while attempting to land a difficult vault in the third rotation but closed the night with a solid outing on the uneven bars to seize the title with a wire-to-wire victory. She also swept the titles for the individual events.

"Today it was just about getting out here, getting comfortable and confident in my gymnastics and hopefully going to Olympic trials and taking that next step towards Paris," Biles said. "I couldn't be more proud of how I'm doing at this time of the year and gaining confidence in front of a crowd.'

Biles finished with 119.750 points ahead of Skye Blakely, who was 5.900 behind. Kayla Di-Cello was third, 8.950 back of the winner. Tokyo all-around champion Sunisa Lee finished fourth with 110.650 points.

Biles missed much of the Tokyo Games due to the "twisties" - a mental block where gymnasts are disoriented in midair - and then stepped away from competition for two years but looked sharper and more resilient than ever this weekend.

"I'm a little bit older so I know exactly how to reboot, collect myself and move on to the next event even if I feel like something wasn't how it was supposed to go," she said. "I know exactly how to switch my mindset and keep going. "It's years of therapy ... as well as having good team mates."

Not in action at the championships was Shilese Jones, who is considered the most likely gymnast after Biles to make the five-member Paris team. She withdrew ahead of the competition to rest a sore shoulder to ensure she is at full strength for the Olympic trials later this month in Minneapolis, where the squad will be named. "It's feeling a little bit better today than it has this whole week," Jones told NBC Sports. — Reuters

Dupont guides France to Sevens glory

MADRID: French rugby star Antoine Dupont, one of the home pin-ups for the Paris Olympics, helped France to a 19-5 victory over Argentina in the grand final of the Rugby Sevens Series in Madrid on Sunday.

Dupont, who captains the France 15-a-side team and starred as his club Toulouse won last week's Champions Cup, played the second-half of the final and was instrumental as the French won their first ever Series.

"It's a good group, a good team. I'm very proud of them," said France skipper Paulin Riva. "We have a good, big defence. "Antoine is the best player in the world, we think! When he's on the pitch we have a lot of confidence."

France coach Jerome Daret said the result was "very important for us before the Olympics". "The next tournament in Paris will be another story! "Our aim for Paris is to make a lot of things on the pitch... and give pleasure to the fans." Daret added: "It's not finished, we have a

"We know in Paris it's a home advantage to be in front of our fans and families." France, who lost 26-12 to top-ranked Los Pumas in pool play, looked the better composed team throughout the 20-minute final at Atletico Madrid's Civitas Metropolitano Stadium.

The French, ranked fifth, thought they'd opened the scoring through Jean-Pascal Barraque, but his knee was grazed the touchline just before he crossed the tryline. Instead it was Argentina's Luciano Gonzalez who was first on the scoresheet, the forward producing two powerful hand-offs on Stephen Parez-Edo-Martin and Jefferson-Lee Joseph for a fine individual try.

A Riva conversion handed France a 7-5 half-time lead over Los Pumas, who beat defending two-time Olympic champions Fiji in the semi-final, leaving the South Sea Islanders now 22 Sevens tourna-

From the resulting attacking line-out, for which Dupont acted as hooker, the ball was worked wide and Joseph crossed for France's second try, converted by Barraque.

Dupont then won a turnover penalty. The ball was went wide, was recycled and who other than Dupont was on hand to draw Elizalde and Isgro and produce a perfectly-timed one-handed pass back inside to Riva, who touched down to make it 19-5.

Isgro received a late red card for an ille-

gal tackle and Riva booted the ball high into the stands as Les Bleus celebrated the victory in what is a perfect tonic going into the Paris Olympics, with the men's competition starting on July 24.

Dupont was crowned men's Rookie of the Year after the final, despite having played just three tournaments. "I was honestly a bit worried before my first tournament so I worked very hard," Dupont said. "There was a good team spirit so it was easy to join in. The Olympics on home soil at the Stade de France, Dupont added, "will be a huge tournament".

"But we'll try to get that trophy in July." Australia, Olympic champions when rugby sevens made its Games debut in Rio in 2016, won the women's competition, beating France 26-7 in the final. Maddison Levi, who scored an impressive hat-trick of tries, said: "We started getting a roll-on when we had more possession. "Our defence is what is winning us games." — AFP

Astros attempt to tame Cardinals in series opener

HOUSTON: In a fitting twist given their recent lack of production with runners in scoring position, the Houston Astros' lone hit in that situation during a three-game set with the visiting Minnesota Twins failed to yield a run.

After finishing a combined 0-for-7 with runners in scoring position on Friday and Saturday, the Astros went 1-for-6 in the series finale, a 4-3 loss on Sunday in a rubber match. Houston, which will open a three-game interleague series with the visiting St. Louis Cardinals on Monday, received a two-out single from Alex Bregman with Jose Abreu on second in the seventh inning on Sunday, a ball hit to left field that prevented Abreu from scoring the go-ahead run.

Yordan Alvarez followed with a flyout to left, leaving the bases loaded before the Astros dropped to 5-13 in one-run games this season. Houston scored all nine of its runs in the series on homers. "You like to see homers," Astros manager Joe Espada said. "This is a team that is known for slugging and driving the ball out of the ballpark and hitting balls hard. We also are good at getting those insurance runs in, and right now, the last couple games it has been tough for us to do that."

Right-hander Justin Verlander (3-2, 3.26 ERA) will start the series opener for the Astros on Monday. He has allowed one earned run in each of his past two starts, most recently scattering three hits across seven innings while settling for a no-decision against the host Seattle Mariners on Wednesday.

Verlander is 3-1 with a 4.32 ERA in four career starts against the Cardinals, but he hasn't faced them since June 19, 2012, when he was a member of the Detroit Tigers. Right-hander Kyle Gibson (4-2, 3.60) has the starting assignment for St. Louis.

In his latest outing, Gibson gave up just one run and two hits in six innings to record a win against the Cincinnati Reds on Tuesday. He hasn't taken a loss over his past eight starts, going 3-0 with a 2.54 ERA during that span.

Gibson is 4-3 with a 2.64 ERA - his lowest ERA against any team that he has faced at least 10 times - in 14 career starts against the Astros, including a 2-3 record and a 2.53 ERA in eight starts in Houston.

The Cardinals improved to 13-5 since ending a season-long seven-game losing streak thanks to a

5-4 win in 10 innings over the Philadelphia Phillies on Sunday. St. Louis slugged two home runs and has hit 24 homers since May 12, the most in the National League during that span.

"We're starting to swing it," said Cardinals second baseman Nolan Gorman, who clubbed his 11th home

run of the year in the first inning on Sunday. "Early on, we weren't hitting, and that's it. Now everyone is clicking, and I think there's a lot more that we have to prove. We're definitely a really good ball club. It's a good clubhouse, and we're ready to keep competing." — Reuters

Champions League kings Madrid deliver on celebration promise

Triumphant players hit the city's usual celebration hotspots

with thousands of supporters in May, pledging to return in June with the Champions League trophy. Los Blancos delivered on their promise, defeating Borussia Dortmund 2-0 at Wembley to claim a record 15th European Cup on Saturday.

The triumphant players hit the city's usual celebration hotspots on Sunday and are set to end up at the club's Santiago Bernabeu stadium where the party will finish, for now at least. Paris Saint-Germain striker Kylian Mbappe's expected signing in the coming days should see the festivities continue.

'Vinicius, Ballon d'Or" chants were heard at intervals from fans throughout the afternoon, after the Brazilian netted Madrid's second goal in the final to clinch victory. Dani Carvajal had opened the scoring with his first Champions League goal for eight seasons, against the run of play after Dortmund had dominated.

However, as they so often tend to do, Madrid found a way to survive and ultimately thrive. The team's stars, led by president Florentino Perez, made their first stop at the city's Almudena cathedral.

The team then returned to the Madrid regional government's headquarters to present another replica to president Isabel Diaz Ayuso, whom they also met after winning La Liga. "If we are here, it's because there's good news," said Real Madrid captain Nacho. "Once again we are champions of Europe. It seems easy to say - 15 time champions... I hope it's many more times.'

Nacho, along with Carvajal, the retiring Toni Kroos and Luka Modric, reached a career sixth Champions League victory, equalling the all-time

Germany international Kroos was singled out for special praise by chief Perez, having set up Carvajal's winner in his final match for Madrid after a decade at the club. "We are the kings of Europe," sang Carvajal to thousands of white-shirted fans massed in a central square, Puerta del Sol, before calling on Kroos to take the spotlight. "Three weeks ago I promised you we'd be back," said Kroos, while fans chanted for him to stay. "Many thanks for ten unforgettable years, I have no more words," added Kroos.

'A new dream'

While the midfielder is departing, Madrid's success is likely to continue. "I have already told you that this club is currently working towards the realization of a new dream - namely the sixteenth European Cup," said Perez.


Madrid will have another 'trophy' to celebrate soon, in the marquee signing of Mbappe, who could help them achieve that dream. The French forward is finally set for the Santiago Bernabeu after seven years at PSG, many of which Madrid have spent trying to lure him to Spain.

Madrid are expected to announce Mbappe's signing on Monday or Tuesday next week and fans are ready for him to finally fulfil what has long appeared his destiny. "The relationship between Madrid and the Champions League is legendary, mystical, and so it's very special," said Claudia, 23, while waiting for the team to arrive at Plaza Cibeles, where Madrid celebrate their trophy conquests with supporters. "He's a player born to play at Real

Yuka Saso wins second US Women's Open golf crown

LANCASTER: Japan's Yuka Saso powered away on the back nine to win her second US Women's Open title Sunday, carding a two-under-par 68 for a threeshot victory at Lancaster Country Club in Pennsylvania. Saso finished with a four-under-par total of 276 to claim her second LPGA tour title three years after winning the US Open at the Olympic Club in San Francisco - when she represented the Philippines. "It feels great," said Saso, whose mother is from the Philippines and father from Japan. "Winning in 2021 I represented the Philippines, I feel like I was able to give back to my mom. This year I was able to represent Japan, and I think I was able to give back to my dad. "It's just a wonderful feeling that I was able to give back to my parents

Saso became just the third player, after South

Koreans Pak Se-ri and Chun In-gee, to make her first two LPGA wins major titles, and at 22 she's the youngest player to win the US Women's Open twice. To do it, Saso shook off a four-putt double-bogey at the par-three sixth, grabbing birdies at four holes in a five-hole stretch from the 12th through the 16th to pull away as a trio of overnight co-leaders headlined by Australia's Minjee Lee faded.

"I just tried to be patient out there," Saso said. "I think that's what you need to win a major like this - just have fun playing with the playing partners and enjoy the challenge." Japan's Hinako Shibuno, who won the 2019 Women's British Open in her major championship debut, carded a two-over-par 72 to finish second on one-under 279. Shibuno was a stroke clear of overnight co-leader Andrea Lee of the United States and American Ally Ewing. Ewing climbed the leaderboard with a four-under 66 while Lee carded a five-over 75. Third-round co-leader Wichanee Meechai of Thailand shot a 77 to finish in a group on 282 while two-time major winner Minjee Lee endured a nightmare round of 78 to fall into a group on 283. Australia's Lee still had a two-shot lead at the turn, despite failing to find a fairway on

World Cup run in Oatar, including goalkeeper Yassine Bounou, defender Achraf Hakimi and forward Youssef en-Nesvri remain.

Coach Walid Regragui also called up Brahim Diaza an attacking midfielder at European titans Real Madrid for the clash with Zambia, who are on the back foot after a surprise away loss to Niger.

Senegal v DR Congo

Defending champions and among the favorites to win the 2024 AFCON, Senegal only reached the round of 16 before falling to hosts Ivory Coast after a penalty shootout. Stalwarts like goalkeeper Edouard Mendy, centre-back Kalidou Koulibaly and forward Sadio Mane - all based in Saudi Arabia - remain as the Teranga Lions seek redemption in World Cup qualifying. The Congolese exceeded expectations by finishing fourth at the AFCON this year and hope Yoane Wissa can replicate his form with Premier League outfit Brentford.

Ivory Coast v Gabon

Coach Emerse Fae has given maiden call-ups to a France-based trio - defender Christopher Operi and forwards Mohamed Bamba and Evann Guessand - for a Korhogo clash with Gabon. But there are no places in the Cup of Nations title-holders squad for defenders Serge Aurier and Eric Bailly due to a lack of club game time, and winger Wilfried Zaha remains out of favor. Star Marseille forward Pierre-Emerick Aubameyang voted the outstanding African after the 2023-2024 Ligue 1 season - has been recalled having missed the first two match days. – AFP

European club finals heroes adjust sights to WCup in Africa

JOHANNESBURG: European club finals match-winners Ademola Lookman and Ayoub el Kaabi turn their attention to 2026 World Cup qualifying in Africa from Wednesday with 52 fixtures scheduled over seven days.

Lookman scored a hat-trick as Atalanta won the Europa League last month, and ended a 51-match unbeaten run by Bayer Leverkusen in domestic and international competitions. The London-born 26-year-old could lead the Nigeria attack at home to South Africa in Uyo in a repeat of the 2024 Africa Cup of Nations semi-finals won by the Super Eagles on penalties.

A week after Lookman stole the show in Dublin, Moroccan El Kaabi nodded the extra-time winner for Olympiakos against Fiorentina in the Europa Conference League final in Athens. He will be a contender for a place in the Atlas Lions attack against Zambia in Agadir in another Cup of Nations repeat with Morocco winning 1-0 in the Ivory Coast last January.

Meanwhile, Kenya are among 17 nations who must stage home matches at neutral venues due to sub-standard venues, stadium renovations or security issues. Here, AFP Sport highlights five matchday three showdowns that include shock 2022 World Cup semi-finalists Morocco and reigning African champions the Ivory Coast.

Nigeria v South Africa

A powerful Nigerian attack will lack its biggest star - 2023 African Footballer of the Year Victor Osimhen - through injury and Nathan Tella is absent for undisclosed personal reasons. But with Lookman, Victor Boniface, Kelechi Iheanacho and Samuel Chukwueze to choose from, coach and former star Finidi George is not short of talent as he prepares for his competitive debut.

South Africa welcome back forward Lyle Foster from demoted Premier League club Burnley, who missed the Cup of Nations due to mental health challenges.

Egypt v Burkina Faso

Prolific Liverpool scorer Mohamed Salah is set to represent Egypt for the first time since an injury against Ghana in a group match cut short his AFCON campaign. "Mohamed is one of the best footballers in the world and there is no rift between us," said coach Hossam Hassan, who replaced Portuguese Rui Vitoria after a last-16 exit in the Ivory Coast.

When Salah was injured, Hassan said the star should remain with the national squad in west Africa, but the forward returned to his club for treatment.

Morocco v Zambia

A Hakim Ziyech goal separated the teams at the latest AFCON, where Morocco suffered a shock last-16 loss to South Africa and Zambia failed to make the knockout stage. Key Moroccan figures in the 2022



Alcaraz books Tsitsipas rematch

Swiatek races into French Open quarters



PARIS: Carlos Alcaraz produced his best display of the tournament to line up a quarter-final rematch with Stefanos Tsitsipas at the French Open, while Iga Swiatek ramped up her bid for a third successive Roland Garros title with a 40-minute blitz on Sunday.

Alcaraz says he feels much more like himself in Paris after an injury-hit build-up saw him sidelined by a sore forearm for almost a month. His 6-3, 6-3, 6-1 win over Canadian 21st seed Felix Auger-Aliassime suggested he is rounding into top form, sending an ominous signal to his rivals as he made the last eight for the third year in succession.

The Spaniard pumped 34 winners past Auger-Aliassime as the persistent rain which heavily disrupted the first week of the tournament finally relented, allowing matches on the two main courts to go ahead without the need for their retractable roofs.

"I'm really happy with my performance. I think I played a really high level of tennis," said Alcaraz, beaten by eventual champion Novak Djokovic in the semi-finals last year. "The most important thing is to believe in myself. It doesn't matter that I don't have too many matches on my back and that I didn't come with a lot of rhythm."

'My game is getting better and better," he added. "My confidence is getting higher. Every practice that I'm doing or every day that I'm here in Roland Garros, I'm feeling better and better." Alcaraz moves

on to play Tsitsipas after the 2021 Roland Garros runner-up fended off Italy's Matteo Arnaldi 3-6, 7-6 (7/4), 6-2, 6-2, the turning point coming in the second set when he saved four set points.

"It was one of the craziest comebacks I've had," said ninth seed Tsitsipas. "That game when I broke (down 5-3 in the second set) was the biggest pleasure I've experienced in tennis for a long time." Alcaraz boasts a 5-0 career head-to-head record over Tsitsipas with three wins on clay, including a straight-sets victory in the French Open quarter-finals a year ago. "He has said in the past he likes playing against me, so I hope he gets to like it a little bit less this time," said Tsitsipas. Second seed Jannik Sinner dropped his first set of the tournament but recovered to end French interest in the men's draw, putting out Corentin Moutet 2-6, 6-3, 6-2, 6-1 in the night match.

Australian Open champion Sinner stumbled out of the gate and lost the first five games against an inspired Moutet, who was trying to reach a first Grand Slam quarter-final at the age of 25. But Sinner, who has lost only two matches this year and will replace Djokovic as world number one if he reaches the final,

steadied himself to nullify the threat of the 79th-ranked Moutet. "It was very tough for me. I think he played very, very well in the first set, so I had to adjust a little bit," said Sinner. He is through to a seventh Grand Slam quarter-final, the most by an Italian man in the Open era.

Sinner next faces Grigor Dimitrov, who defeated Hubert Hurkacz in straight sets to complete a set of Grand Slam quarter-finals. The Bulgarian has reached the last four of the other three majors but never made it to a final.

Swiatek in a hurry

Earlier in the day, women's world number one Swiatek demolished Russia's Anastasia Potapova 6-0, 6-0, conceding only 10 points in the shortest completed match of her career. "I was really focused and in the zone. I wasn't looking at the score so I continued working on my game," said Swiatek.

"It went pretty quickly... pretty weird." The Pole's brisk victory came on the same Court Philippe Chatrier where Djokovic had completed his third round win at 3:07 a.m., the latest finish to a French Open match after more than four hours and five sets. Swiatek, who saved a match point against Naomi Osaka in the second round, is a red-hot favourite to lift the Coupe Suzanne

Lenglen plays a forehand return. come only the fourth woman to win four Roland Garros titles in the Open era. She next plays Wimbledon champion Marketa Vondrousova, the fifth seed who ended the run of Serbian qualifier Olga Danilovic in straight sets. US Open champion Coco Gauff made light work of Elisabetta Cocciaretto, sweeping past the world number 51 from Italy 6-1, 6-2.

Cocciaretto had taken down two seeds to reach the last 16 of a major for the first time but was no match for third seed Gauff, the 2022 French Open runner-up. The American advances to a quarter-final with threetime Grand Slam finalist Ons Jabeur, who beat Denmark's Clara Tauson 6-4, 6-4. — AFP
