Zionist carnage in Gaza, Lebanon

87 killed in north Gaza strike • Zionists escalate Beirut bombing • Hezb targets Zionist bases, troops

GAZA/BEIRUT: The Zionist entity said it had struck Hezbollah's intelligence headquarters in the Lebanese capital Beirut on Sunday, while officials in Gaza said they were still trying to recover bodies from the rubble after a Zionist strike that killed dozens. At least 87 people were dead or missing following the airstrike on Beit Lahia in northern Gaza late on Saturday, the health ministry in the Palestinian territory said, one of the highest death tolls reported

for months from a single attack. It marked an intensification of the Zionist entity's offensives against Palestinian group Hamas in Gaza and Hezbollah in Lebanon, days after the killing of Hamas leader Yahya Sinwar had raised hopes of an opening for ceasefire negotiations to end more than a year of escalating conflict in the Middle East. With US elections approaching, officials, diplomats and other sources in the region say the Zionist entity is seeking through military operations to try to shield its borders and ensure its rivals cannot regroup. The Zionist entity is also preparing to retaliate for an Iranian missile barrage earlier this month, though Washington has pressed it not to strike Iranian energy facilities or nuclear sites.

Zionist Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu said he was the subject of an assassination attempt by "Iran's proxy Hezbollah" on Saturday when a drone was directed at his holiday home. In a call with former US President Donald Trump, the prime minister reiterated that the Zionist entity would make decisions based on its own interests, according to a statement from Netanyahu's office. The Zionist entity's government has rejected several attempts by the United States, its main ally and military backer, at brokering ceasefires in both Gaza and Lebanon.

In Gaza, the health ministry said rescue operations following the strike in Beit Lahia were being hindered by communications problems and by ongoing Zionist military operations. At Kamal Adwan Hospital, which was flooded with wounded from the strike, many patients had to be treated on the floor while nearby the dead were wrapped in white burial shrouds and placed in neat rows where relatives gathered to grieve. The Jeddah-based Organization of Islamic Cooperation "condemned the strike in the strongest terms" and called the Zionist entity's actions in Gaza a "stain on the conscience of humanity".

The strike came two weeks into a major Zionist assault around the town of Jabalia, just to the south of Beit Lahiya. As the fighting has continued, two of the three remaining hospitals in northern Gaza have been hit and patients, medical staff and displaced people injured, according to the United Nations. The UN has been urgently seeking access. Over 5,000 Palestinians left Jabalia via designated routes, Zionist

Short-term project visas revived

KUWAIT: The interior ministry and the Public Authority of Manpower announced on Sunday the re-introduction of short-term work permits for government projects which will be completed in under one year. The two bodies said in a statement that applications for work permits for government projects for durations of under one year will be accepted at the manpower authority from Tuesday. They said the decision will provide flexibility to the labor market, especially for projects that are finished in less than one year.

Govt evening shifts from Jan 5

KUWAIT: Kuwaiti state bodies that offer services to the public will start working during evening hours as of Jan 5, 2025, the Civil Service Commission (CSC) said on Sunday, citing the measure as per a Cabinet decision. Evening shifts for state body employees should be no more than four and a half hours long from Sunday to Thursday, while it should not exceed 30 percent of the body's total workforce, according to a CSC statement, giving employees the liberty to choose the hours that suit them. State bodies are allowed to take the measures they deem necessary to maintain a balance between day and night shifts, ensuring seamless and uninterrupted workflow, added the statement. — KUNA

Ex-MP acquitted of vote-buying

KUWAIT: The court of appeals on Sunday overturned a two-year jail sentence against former MP Saadoun Hammad and five of his workers for vote-buying and acquitted him and the rest. Hammad was handed the jail term by the criminal court. He later surrendered to the court of appeals and denied the charges. He and other defendants were sent to jail until the court verdict. However, the case now goes to the court of cassation, the country's top court whose rulings are final.



US and Iran in 'tug of war' over Lebanon

BEIRUT: With Hezbollah on the defensive after a series of heavy Zionist blows, the United States and Iran are locked in a showdown over Lebanon's future, analysts said. Hezbollah, the most powerful regional force backed by Iran, which arms and finances it, has long held sway in Lebanon. But the group's influence is now in question after the Zionist entity's assassination of its leader, Hassan Nasrallah, in a significant setback.

Hezbollah's losses have left Lebanon in a "tug of war between Iran and the United States", said Michael Young of the Carnegie Middle East Center think tank. "The (Zionists) with the Americans... are trying to use military force to try to transform the balance of power in Lebanon to their advantage," he told AFP. "There are no signs that the Iranians are going to accept this without a fight."

Hezbollah is considered better armed than Lebanon's national military and remains the only group that did not put down its weapons after the 1975-90 civil war. Last year, it opened a new front with the Zionist entity over the conflict in Gaza, in support of its ally Hamas. It carefully calibrated attacks to avoid a full-blown conflict, which eventually came on Sept 23 when the Zionist entity stepped up bombing of

War, settlers ruin Palestine olive harvest

AL-ZAWAYDA: After a year of relentless war, Gaza's olive harvest is set to suffer, while in the occupied West Bank, Palestinian farmers fear to tend their groves due to settler attacks. For generations, olive harvests have been central to Palestinian life and culture. At a farm in Deir el-Balah in central Gaza, workers picking the olives by hand stay alert, listening for drones or warplanes that could bomb without warning. The ongoing war has reduced vast

GENEVA: Egypt was certified as malaria-free on Sunday, with the World Health Organization calling the achievement "truly historic" and the culmination of nearly a century of work

areas of Gaza to rubble, with about 68 percent of the territory's agricultural areas damaged by the conflict and farmers unable to fertilize or irrigate their land, the UN says. In the West Bank, the harvest has been marred by perennial fears of attacks by Zionist settlers, who regularly prevent Palestinians from accessing their olive

groves or outright destroy their orchards. Olive groves have long been essential to the economy and culture of the West Bank, but have also been the site of bloody clashes between farmers and encroaching Zionist settlers for decades, with the disputes hinging on access to land. In the past, settlers have assaulted Palestinians, set fire to or damaged their crops, stolen sheep and blocked them from getting to their land, water and grazing areas, according to the UN. — AFP (See Page 5)

to stamp out the disease. "Malaria is as old as Egyptian civilization itself, but the disease that plagued pharaohs now belongs to its history and not its future," WHO chief Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus said in a statement. "This certification of Egypt as malaria-free is truly historic, and a testament to the commitment of the people and government of Egypt to rid themselves of

this ancient scourge.' Globally, 44 countries and one territory have now been certified as malaria-free. Certification is granted by the WHO when a country has proven that the chain of indigenous malaria transmission by Anopheles mosquitoes has been interrupted nationwide for at least the previous three consecutive years. A country must also demonstrate the ability to prevent the re-establishment of transmission.

Malaria kills more than 600,000 people every year, 95 percent of them in Africa, according to the WHO. There were 249 million recorded malaria cases worldwide in 2022. Spread by mosquitoes, malaria is mostly found in tropical countries. The infection is caused by a parasite. "Receiving the malaria elimination certificate today is not the end of the journey but the beginning of a new phase," said Egypt's Health Minister Khaled Abdel Ghaffar. "We must now work tirelessly and vigilantly to sustain our achievement through maintaining the highest standards for surveillance, diagnosis and treatment."- AFP

Voices of Change: Invaluable insights designed to inspire positive change

TEDx 'Mindset: Shaping Tomorrow'

KUWAIT: In continuation of the speeches sparked by the TEDx event titled "Mindset: Shaping Tomorrow," held at the Australian University on Saturday, Kuwait Times engaged with the second part of the speakers, who shared invaluable insights designed to inspire positive change and foster resilience in the face of challenges.

Sayer Al-Otaibi

Sayer Al-Otaibi's journey shared his transformative experience that evolved from passive observation to a meaningful engagement with the world around him. His exploration began with the purchase of a camera, made possible through a grant from HH the Amir. He highlighted that this initial step marked the start of his pursuit of deeper significance in his life. Al-Otaibi shared one of the most remarkable experiences he ever made - describing how his passion for photography motivated him to engage with sanitation workers by taking them to a studio and take their portraits wearing elegant clothes he provided.

This unique approach gave back very positive reactions from the worker that elevated his own sense of fulfillment. This connection and joy with the workers fueled his project with purpose. During his talk, Al-Otaibi also addressed the concept of emptiness, identifying it as a fundamental source of negative emotions and psychological distress. He urged his audience to seek out meaningful experiences that provide joy and inspiration, emphasizing the importance of introspection regarding the motivations behind their actions.

He explained that at the beginning, his work was driven by the pursuit of dopamine, the pleasure derived from external validation. However, he eventually realized that the essence of his work transcended mere reactions from others, and that dopamine should be regarded as a secondary element, one that enhances rather than defines the core purpose of one's endeavors, while the prior motivator must be the meaning behind each endeavor.

On his part, Nicholas Chahoub, a Civil and Environmental Engineer, delivered a compelling message that centered around the theme, "The enemy of success is mediocrity and settling for less." He underscored the detrimental effects of mediocrity on societal brilliance and encouraged for a proactive approach to overcoming it. He emphasizes that each individual possesses a unique capacity for brilliance and confidence, unhindered by the fear of failure.

However, the education system often stifles creativity, leading individuals to become disconnected from their true self and capabilities. Chahoub explained that this disconnection frequently becomes apparent upon entering the workforce, where there is a disparity between institutional expectations and personal aspirations. Hence, he argued that without the tools to confront real-life challenges, individuals may find themselves trapped by a limiting mentality perpetuated by the system.

He urged the audience to break free from this mediocrity. "One does not need to be an expert to escape this cycle; rather, cultivating simple - yet effective habits can pave the way. Ask yourself, "What are we afraid of? Every aspect of life carries inherent risks - be marriage, remaining single, having children, or adopting pets. Success hinges on effective risk management, which involves understanding one's values and identifying sources of happiness," he explained.

This understanding leads to what Chahoub describes as the "zone of genius." He highlighted the importance of transforming challenges into resources and obstacles into assets. "When setting goals, it is crucial to comprehend the underlying motivations," he emphasized. He concluded by saying that the meaning of life lies in discovering and sharing one's zone of genius with the society, all while embracing the idea of "failing forward."

Moreover, Ali Nasser shared his journey of breaking the pattern, which sparked when he traveled to

the United States at the age of 16. He expressed his journey of self-discovery, emphasizing the need to find what resonates with him and the person he aspires to become. Through his speech, Nasser praised the younger generation, countering stereotypes that paint them in a negative light. He asserted that young people are capable of remarkable achievements but often require belief, motivation and opportunities from others to reach their potential.

"Individuals should not fear relocation or change if they feel unfulfilled in their current circumstances. Embracing new environments can be a powerful way to break free from the constraints of societal expectations," Nasser explained. He encouraged listeners to challenge the status quo and actively seek their own paths, reinforcing the value of community and support in the journey of self-discovery.

Sharifa Baqer

Another powerful and heartfelt journey of triumph was shared by Sharifa Baqer, who spoke about her struggle with vitiligo, a skin condition that affected her face. She described the various treatments she underwent, many of which were ineffective, and recounted painful experiences of bullying that deeply impacted her self-esteem. Baqer spoke about the significant energy, time, and effort required for her to reach a place of acceptance, moving away from hiding her condition with makeup.

At the end of her speech, Sharifa displayed a powerful photo of her face in its true form, radiating the beauty and confidence she has finally embraced after a long journey marked by denial and concealment. This moment symbolized her triumph over the challenges that had troubled her, illustrating her commitment to self-acceptance and resilience. Sharifa's bravery was a testament to the transformative power of embracing one's true self.

Hussain Al-Moussawi

Last but not least was Hussain Al-Moussawi's story of struggle with diabetes that became not a source of suffering, but rather a catalyst for creativ-



ity and resilience that propelled him forward. During his speech Al-Moussawi described the challenges he faced during his youth due to the disease and the side effects he endured from insulin treatment.

However, his suffering pushed him to actively seek alternatives to insulin, until he discovered an effective herbal treatment. This breakthrough gradually allowed him to reduce his reliance on insulin, marking a significant turning point in his life. He described this experience as the beginning of his journey characterized by persistence and determination. "I now see my struggle with diabetes as a blessing from God. It shaped me into the person I am today, a person of resolve and fortitude. Without this challenge, I would not have developed the strength and determination that define me today," he expressed.



Symposium seeks to unify military terminology


CAIRO: The 65th symposium of the Committee for Unifying Military Terminology and Concepts kicked off on Sunday at the headquarters of the Arab League, with the participation of Kuwait Director of the Military Department at the Arab League. Minister Plenipotentiary Tariq Abdul Salam said in his opening speech that the symposium, chaired



Abdul Salam added that the holding of this symposium, which will continue until October 30, comes as a continuation of previous symposiums and is based on the recommendations of the 64th symposium. The participants underscored the importance of studying military abbreviations along with the concepts, terms, and symbols that were not included in the dictionary of military terms issued in 2007.

The symposium aims to unify military concepts and add them to the dictionary of military terms, which includes all the concepts, terms, symbols, and military abbreviations used in the Arab armed forces until 2024. Abdul Salam pointed out the importance of unified military symbols, abbreviations, and terms in facilitating joint operations and training, enhancing joint Arab military action, and unifying military visions and doctrines.

He stressed that the Arab Affairs and National Security Sector in the General Secretariat of the Arab League will remain a supporter and sponsor of these meetings and symposiums with the aim of enhancing opportunities for joint cooperation that greatly benefit the armed forces in the Arab countries. KUWAIT: The Cancer Aware Nation (CAN) called for the importance of conducting breast self-examination once a month and mammograms once a year for those who have reached the age of forty years. This will help to detect breast cancer early, which will in turn lead to speedy treatment and full recovery. This came in the speech by a member of the Board of Directors of CAN, Dr. Hessa Al-Shaheen, during the celebration held under the slogan 'Pink Steps' in cooperation with the International Women's Committee on Sunday.

She said that breast cancer is the most common among women around the world. The number of cases in 2019 is about 630 (359 Kuwaiti women and 272 cases non-Kuwaitis), pointing out that CAN is organizing its breast cancer awareness initiative for the 13th consecutive year. Al-Shaheen explained that the strategy of the CAN campaign is concerned with developing programs to train women on examination, indicating that it has trained 156,000 students on the method of self-examination in cooperation with the Ministry of Education, in addition to holding lectures and exhibitions, distributing brochures and booklets explaining prevention methods and their importance, highlighting the risk factors for infection, and raising awareness about the need to adopt a healthy life.

She pointed out that sports is one of the most important aspects of the campaign, focusing on the International Breast Cancer Awareness Month and encouraging women to practice physical activity, which reduces the likelihood of breast cancer and many diseases related to obesity, explaining that the partnership with the International Women's Group gave a distinctive character to the event.

For her part, a member of the International Women's Group, wife of the Ambassador of Jordan in Kuwait, Rana Abu Shakra, stressed in a similar speech





the importance of awareness to combat breast cancer, indicating that the International Women's Group participated in the event in order to spread the awareness among women. She explained that the fear of tumors was a psychological barrier before. Some women were afraid to talk about it, but awareness broke this barrier. — KUNA


Kuwait's participation in UN meet mirrors anti-crime advocacy

Zionist massacre in Beit Lahia adds to Palestinians' suffering

Trapped without food, medicine, Palestinians in northern Gaza terrified as Zionist assault continues

BEIT LAHIA: With their dead relatives wrapped in white burial shrouds, families in northern Gaza mourned their loved ones on Sunday killed in a Zionist air strike that was part of a withering, weeks-long military assault on the area. The strike, which happened late on Saturday, flattened entire blocks of residential buildings in the town of Beit Lahia, AFP photographs showed, while rescuers said at least 73 Palestinians were killed, with many more still trapped under the rubble.

Families gathered at the Kamal Adwan Hospital, one of the main medical facilities in northern Gaza, where the dead were placed in rows in a scene now familiar from a year of unrelenting Zionist air strikes on the Palestinian territory. Many of the injured, caked in dust, were treated by doctors on the hospital's floor. For those fortunate enough to escape the bombardment, displacement has brought only more hardship. Gazans fleeing the sweeping land and air assault have been left hungry and exhausted as they try to escape the military's dragnet, often forced to move repeatedly. "We left with nothing but our children, walking a long distance to Gaza City. We are exhausted, with no food or water for the babies," said Mariam Hamuda, 33.

'Dying slowly'

Hamuda was among thousands who walked south all night to Gaza City to flee the Zionist ground offensive targeting northern Gaza's Jabalia and surrounding areas. "We arrived in Gaza from Beit Lahia during the bombardment. We don't know where to go or stay. There's no place for us and our families. We can't live like this. It's like dying slowly," said Ibrahim Hamuda, 66.

The Zionist entity launched the assault on northern Gaza on October 6, tightening its siege on the war-battered area and sending tens of thousands of people fleeing. "The nightmare in Gaza is intensifying," Tor Wennesland, UN Special Coordinator for the Middle East peace process, said in a statement on Sunday. "Horrifying scenes are unfolding in the northern Strip amidst conflict, relentless (Zionist) strikes and

an ever-worsening humanitarian crisis." On Friday, the UN's top aid official

talked of people trapped in north Gaza. "In Jabalia, people are trapped under the rubble and first responders are blocked from reaching them," the UN's acting humanitarian chief Joyce Msuya said on X. "Tens of thousands of Palestinians are being forcibly displaced. Essential supplies are running out. Hospitals, overwhelmed with patients, have been hit." The Zionist army has defended the operation, while accusing Gaza health officials of giving exaggerated civilian

casualties, including in Beit Lahia.

Gaza's civil defence agency said on


Saturday that the operation has killed more than 400 people in just two weeks. The Zionist entity has faced mounting criticism over the civilian toll and lack of food and aid reaching Gaza, where the UN has warned of famine. The Zionist attack on Gaza has killed 42,603 people in Gaza, mostly civilians, according to data from the health ministry in the territory. For those stuck in northern Gaza, the continued fighting has only added to their misery. "We are now trapped with no food, water or medicine, facing starvation amid the rubble and destruction," said Ahmad Saleh, 36, from the Al-Tawbah area in northern Gaza. "The situation gets worse every day and we are terrified, wondering when our turn will come." — AFP

Settler attacks, Zionist assault in Gaza ruin Palestinian olive harvest

AL-ZAWAYDA, Palestine: After a year of relentless war, Gaza's olive harvest is set to suffer, while in the occupied West Bank, Palestinian farmers fear to tend their groves due to settler attacks. For generations, olive harvests have been central to Palestinian life and culture. "We are happy that the olive season has started but we are afraid because we are in a state of war," said Rami Abu Asad, who owns a farm in Deir El-Balah, central Gaza. Workers picking the olives by hand stay alert, listening for drones or warplanes that could bomb without warning. "But it is clearly evident (to Zionist forces) that we are workers and we do nothing else," he said, noting a sweeping Zionist military operation in Jabalia, less than 20 kilometers (12 miles) to the north.

More than a year of military assault on Gaza has damaged nearly 70 percent the territory's agricultural areas and left farmers unable to fertilize or irrigate their land, the UN says. "The number of remaining olive trees is very small and the costs are very high," Asad added.

Low production

Jamal Abou Shaouish, an agricultural engineer, expects this year's harvest in Gaza to net just 15,000 tons, sharply down from around 40,000 tons in the years before the war. Supply shortages and destruction caused by the war will also impact the quality of olives, while pressing prices have soared due to the lack of fuel needed to run the machinery required for sorting and pressing the oil. In the West Bank,

the harvest has been marred by perennial fears of attacks by Zionist settlers, who regularly prevent Palestinians from accessing their olive groves or outright destroy their orchards.

Khaled Abdallah has made the tough decision not to harvest the olives this season on his land near the Beit El settlement. "I didn't even consider going to these lands close to the colony, because the situation is very dangerous," he told AFP, saying he will instead

focus on harvesting olives from a separate property in the village of Jifna, north of Ramallah. Like other Palestinians who own olive groves near the settlements, Abdallah coordinated with advocacy organizations in the Zionist entity to obtain special permits for the crops. "But there are no longer any rights organizations capable of protecting us from settler attacks, and there is no longer any coordination," he lamented. Olive groves have long been essential to the econo-

Settler violence

In the past, settlers have assaulted Palestinians, set fire to or damaged their crops, stolen sheep and blocked them from getting to their land, water and grazing areas, according to the UN. And since October 7, 2023, the violence has only intensified. Attacks by settlers have increased "significantly" this year, said the human rights group Yesh Din. According to the group's spokesperson Fadia Qawasmi, farmers from the village of Madama, south of Nablus, were prevented from accessing their plots for three years. Settlers also damaged their vehicles. "The owners were expelled from their land by settlers from Itamar," said Abdallah Ziada, the head of the Madama village council. "Every day there are clashes." "We cannot distinguish those who arrests us — if they are settlers or soldiers, because they are sometimes in civilian clothes and armed, and other times in military

uniform," Ziada added. Earlier this week, the Palestinian health ministry in Ramallah said Zionist forces shot dead a woman in Faqoua village near Jenin while she harvested olives. The Zionist military said it had prepared for the harvest season. "This is done out of a commitment to maintaining the security of the area and its residents, while at the same time allowing the local residents to harvest their crops," the military said in a statement to AFP. "IDF (Zionist military) forces are securing the harvest in the coordinated areas." For many poor Palestinian families, the olive season provides a vital source of income. Earlier this week, UN experts said Palestinian farmers in the occupied West Bank are facing "the most dangerous olive season ever". — AFP

Musk says to award \$1m a day to a signer of his petition

HARRISBURG, Pennsylvania: Billionaire Elon Musk promised on Saturday to give away \$1 million each day until November's election to someone who signs his online petition supporting the US Constitution. And he wasted no time, awarding a \$1 million check to an attendee of his event in Pennsylvania aimed at rallying supporters behind Republican Donald Trump. The winner was a man named John Dreher, according to event staff. "By the way, John had no idea. So anyway, you're welcome," the Tesla founder said as he handed Dreher the check. The money is the latest example of Musk using his extraordinary wealth to influence the tightly-contested presidential race between Trump and his Democratic rival Kamala Harris

Musk started America PAC, a political action organization he founded in support of Trump's presidential campaign. The group is helping mobilize and register voters in battleground states, but there are signs it is having trouble meeting its goals. The Harrisburg event is the third in as many days in Pennsylvania, where Musk is painting November's election in stark terms and encouraging supporters to vote early and get others to do the same. He said on Saturday that if Harris wins, it will be "the last election," suggesting the US will no longer exist. He also said the two assassination attempts against Trump prove he is ruffling feathers and upending the status quo in ways Harris won't. He said that's why no one is trying to kill Harris. "Assassinating a puppet is worthless," Musk said, reiterating an argument he has made in a social media post.

The petition Musk is asking people to sign reads: "The First and Second Amendments guarantee freedom of speech and the right to bear arms. By signing below, I am pledging my support for the First and Second Amendments." Attendees of Saturday's event had to sign the petition, which allows America PAC to garner contact details for more potential voters that it can work to get to the polls for Trump. — Reuters

Harris, Trump duel intensifies as celebs join campaign trail

LATROBE: Kamala Harris and Donald Trump invited star power to the campaign trail Saturday, as they took shots at each other's endurance and urged early voting in battleground states key to the ever-tightening US presidential race. At rallies in Detroit and Atlanta Harris brought out pop stars Lizzo and Usher respectively to warm up her crowds, while painting her rival Trump as exhausted and unhinged. The Republican running for a second go in the White House countered those accusations with a marathon speech in Pennsylvania, as billionaire Elon Musk campaigned for him elsewhere in the state. Both candidates are fighting on every front to seal up voters' support in a race that polls suggest is effectively tied with fewer than three weeks to Election Day.

Harris told voters in Detroit that her opponent's platform is "self-consuming" while repeating vows to invest in the working and middle classes. "We stand for the idea that the true measure of the strength of a leader is not based on who you beat down, it's on who you lift up," said Harris. Later in Atlanta Harris, who turns 60 on Sunday, accused the 78-year-old Trump of "ducking debates and canceling interviews because of exhaustion." "When he does answer a question or speak at a rally — have you noticed he tends to go off script and ramble, and generally, for the life of him, cannot finish a thought?" she said. "He's called it the

HAVANA: Cuba braced Sunday for a hit from Hurricane Oscar as it grapples with a nearly nationwide power outage now in its third day. The arrival of Hurricane Oscar, after the collapse Friday of Cuba's largest power plant crippled the whole national grid, will pile more pressure on a country already battling sky-high inflation and shortages of food, medicine, fuel and water. The storm was expected to make landfall in northeastern Cuba some time Sunday afternoon or evening Cuba time, the US National Hurricane Center said in its latest bulletin.

As of Sunday morning, Oscar was a Category 1 storm packing maximum sustained winds of 80 mph (130 kph), the NHC said. President Miguel Diaz-Canel said Saturday in a post on social media that authorities in the east of the island were "working hard to protect the people and economic resources, given the imminent arrival of Hurricane Oscar." The Cuban president's office said in another post that progress had been made in restoring power, with 16 percent of consumers receiving electricity and approximately 500 megawatts being generated. But around midnight the energy ministry said a subsystem in western Cuba had collapsed. That wattage was a fraction of the country's 3,300-megawatt demand on Thursday, the day before the grid collapsed and the government declared an "energy emergency" following weeks of extended outages.

The power grid failed in a chain reaction Friday due to the unexpected shutdown of the biggest of the island's eight decrepit coal-fired power plants, according to the head of electricity supply at the energy ministry, Lazaro Guerra. National electric utility UNE said it had managed to generate a minimal amount of electricity to get power plants restarted on Friday night, but by Saturday morning it was experiencing what official news outlet Cubadebate called "a new, total disconnection of the electrical grid."

Most neighborhoods in Havana remain dark, except for hotels and hospitals with emergency generators and the very few private homes with that kind of backup in the economically challenged nation. "God knows when the power will come back on," said Rafael Carrillo, a 41-year-old mechanic, who had to walk almost five kilometers (three miles) due to the lack of public transportation amid the blackout. The blackout followed weeks of power outages, lasting up to 20

Cuba is in the throes of its worst economic crisis since the collapse of key ally the Soviet Union in the early 1990s — marked by soaring inflation and shortages of basic goods. With no relief in sight, many Cubans have emigrated. More than 700,000 entered the United States between January 2022 and August 2024, according to US officials.

While the authorities chiefly blame the US embargo, the island is also feeling the aftershocks of the COVID-19 pandemic battering its critical tourism sector, and of economic mismanagement. To bolster its grid, Cuba has leased seven floating power plants from Turkish companies and also added many small diesel-powered generators. In July 2021, blackouts sparked an unprecedented outpouring of public anger. Thousands of Cubans took to the streets shouting, "We are hungry" and "Freedom!" in a rare challenge to the government. One person was killed and dozens were injured in the protests. According to the Mexico-based human rights organization Justicia 11J, 600 people detained during the unrest remain in prison. In 2022, the island also suffered months of daily hours-long power outages, capped by a nationwide blackout caused by Hurricane Ian. — AFP

military spokesperson Avichay Adraee said on social media platform X. Evacuation orders directing people to the south have fueled fears among many Palestinians that the operation is intended to clear them out of the northern part of Gaza to help ensure Zionist control of the area after the war.

Palestinians were also shocked by footage appearing to show a group of people in a street in Jabalia being hit by a strike as they approached to rescue someone who had already been hit. The Zionist offensive has made most of Gaza's 2.3 million people homeless, caused widespread hunger and destroyed hospitals and schools. "Horrifying scenes unfolding in Gaza, amidst conflict, relentless (Zionist) strikes & an ever-worsening humanitarian crisis," UN Middle East peace envoy Tor Wennesland posted on X.

In Lebanon, the Zionist entity stepped up its bombardment of southern Beirut from Saturday afternoon. On Sunday, it said its air force attacked Hezbollah's intelligence headquarters in Beirut as well as an underground workshop for the production of weapons. Fighter jets killed three Hezbollah commanders, including Alhaj Abbas Salameh, a senior figure in the group's southern command, the Zionist military said in a statement. Reuters witnesses saw smoke rising from Beirut's southern suburbs, once a densely populated zone that also housed Hezbollah

from Lebanon crossed into the Zionist entity within a matter of minutes, and that it intercepted some of them. Hezbollah strongholds, including south Beirut. The United States has pushed for ceasefire, but has also expressed support for Zionist attempts to "degrade Hezbollah's infrastructure". US Secretary of State Antony Blinken said this month that "it's clear that the people of Lebanon have an interest — a strong interest — in the state asserting itself and taking responsibility for the country and its future.'

Kim Ghattas, the author of "Black Wave", a book on the Saudi-Iran rivalry, said: "Lebanon is caught between Iran and Hezbollah on the one hand, and (the Zionist entity) and the US on the other." But "Washington's vision doesn't necessarily align with (the Zionist entity's) in terms of war goals and tactics", she said. "The US would certainly like to see a weakening of Hezbollah, maybe even the disarming of the group, but it is wary of (the Zionist entity) going too far with the military campaign.

Zionist Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu warned Lebanon it could face destruction "like Gaza" as the Zionist entity vowed to keep fighting Hezbollah until it secures its northern border. "I say to you, the people of Lebanon: Free your country from Hezbollah so that this war can end," Netanyahu said on Oct 8. Iran, for its part, "wants to preserve what's left of its assets in Lebanon and ensure the survival of the regime", Ghattas said, referring to the Islamic republic. "It needs to walk a fine line between continuing to support Hezbollah... while

signaling it is ready for diplomacy.' Iran's meddling drew a rare rebuke from Lebanon last

week, as Prime Minister Najib Mikati accused it of "blatant interference" over remarks attributed to a Tehran official regarding ceasefire terms. Mikati charged that Iran had attempted "to establish an unacceptable guardianship over Lebanon", after Iran's parliament speaker Mohammad Bagher Ghalibaf reportedly told France's Le Figaro newspaper that his government was ready to negotiate on the implementation of a 2006 UN resolution that calls for only the Lebanese army and UN peacekeepers to be deployed in southern Lebanon.

As the Zionist-Hezbollah war nears its one-month mark, calls have mounted for Lebanon to elect a president after a two-year void due to political deadlock. The last president, Michel Aoun, was a Hezbollah ally, making the vote a test for the country's political trends. In an interview with AFP, Mikati said serious efforts were underway to elect a president, in line with calls from the United States and other Western allies.

Political leaders in Lebanon too have made careful appeals for a new president, trying to avoid impressions they were leveraging Hezbollah's setbacks for political gain. "The Lebanese parties hostile to Hezbollah understand that the situation is very delicate," said Young. "They don't want to provoke the Shiite community, which already feels humiliated and angry and isolated and let's remember, is armed," he added.

While suspicion between sects has grown since the Zionist-Hezbollah war forced displaced Shiite communities into Christian-majority areas, many are wary of a repeat of the country's 15-year war. The Zionist invasion of Lebanon in 1982 also recalls bitter memories for the Lebanese and ultimately led to the creation of Hezbollah, one of the Zionist entity's most formidable foes. "It seems that politicians in Lebanon have learned lessons of the past, but the longer this current limbo and war lasts, the harder it will be to keep tensions under control," said Ghattas. — AFP

Prabowo sworn in as Indonesia's president

Ex-general vows to fight corruption, calls on Indonesians to help him tackle problems

JAKARTA: Indonesia's Prabowo Subianto on Sunday took over as president of the world's third-largest democracy, vowing to combat internal issues such as corruption that plague the country and to make it more self-sufficient. The 73-year-old has undergone a remarkable transformation, from being a former military commander facing unproven allegations of rights abuses to sweeping the polls and now leading the country of 280 million people. Wearing a traditional black hat and navy suit with a woven maroon and golden sarong, Prabowo officially became Indonesia's eighth president on Sunday morning after he was sworn in during a ceremony at Indonesia's parliament.

International

Prabowo, who unsuccessfully ran for the presidency twice before, said in a fiery speech to lawmakers he would be president for all Indonesians and challenged the nation to help him face down the country's problems. "We must always realize that a free nation is where the people are free," Prabowo said, at times raising his voice. "They must be freed of fear, poverty, hunger, ignorance, oppression, suffering," he said.

In a wide-ranging speech lasting about an hour, Prabowo said self-sufficiency for food was possible within five years, while also pledging to become self-sufficient in energy. The new president vowed to eradicate corruption and said that while he wanted to live in a democracy, it must be "polite". "A difference of opinion must come without enmity

... fighting without hating," he said.
Prabowo won the February 14 contest with nearly 60 percent of the vote and has spent the past nine months building a formidable parliamentary coalition. He was joined in the swearing-in

ceremony by his running mate, Gibran Rakabuming Raka, 37, the eldest son of outgoing President Joko 'Jokowi" Widodo.

Later on Sunday, Prabowo announced his cabinet at the presidential palace. While it had of a mix of professional and political appointees, most of the economics-related ministers remained the same as those under Jokowi. One key announcement was for the foreign ministry, which will now be led by Sugiono, a former member of the army's special forces. The cabinet will be sworn in on Monday morning.

Greeting supporters

After his speech, Prabowo wore a baseball cap and waved through a car sunroof as he made his way to the presidential palace, passing thousands of flag-waving supporters thronging Jakarta's streets in a festival-like atmosphere. Jokowi supporters are also attending the celebrations to bid farewell to Indonesia's outgoing leader. Anneta Yuniar, a bystander who had excitedly waved at Jokowi's motorcade as it slowly made its way past supporters before the ceremony, said she would miss Jokowi but that Prabowo was a strong leader. "Prabowo will continue the development that Jokowi started. There's continuity. It's what I want," she said.

Jokowi has left an indelible mark on the nation of 280 million, presiding over a period of strong economic growth and massive infrastructure development. Critics also say, though, his rule has been marked by a rise in old-time patronage and dynastic politics, and they warn about diminished integrity in courts and other state institutions.

Prabowo also touched on foreign policy during his speech, saying Indonesia was non-aligned on

the global stage, but that he stood in support of the Palestinian people and said Jakarta was ready to send more aid to Gaza. During his campaign, Prabowo billed himself to voters and investors alike as the "continuity candidate". Past allegations against Prabowo, a former military general, of involvement in the kidnapping of student activists and human rights

abuses in Papua and East Timor, however, have also raised concern about Indonesia's trajectory of democracy, human rights advocates say. Prabowo has always denied the allegations that led to his dismissal from the military in 1998, the same year Indonesia broke free from the decades-long authoritarian rule of former President Suharto. — Reuters

Libyan arrested in Germany over alleged Zionist embassy plot

BERLIN: German prosecutors said Sunday they had arrested a Libyan man on suspicion of having links to the Islamic State group and planning to attack the Zionist embassy in Berlin with firearms. The suspect, identified only as Omar A, was arrested on Saturday evening at his home in Bernau, just outside the German capital, the federal prosecutor's office said. The 28-year-old was accused of "supporting a foreign terrorist organization" and was said by prosecutors to be an adherent to the ideology of the Islamic State group. Prosecutors said Omar A was planning a "high-profile attack with firearms" on the Zionist embassy in Berlin. As part of his preparations, Omar A was said to have had "exchanges with a member of IS in a messenger chat".

A judge ordered the suspect to be held in pre-trial detention, a spokesman for the federal prosecutor's office told AFP. Authorities said they searched the suspect's home in Bernau on Saturday. They also searched the property near Bonn of another person not suspected" of involvement in the alleged plan. German media said the flat in the town of Sankt Augustin near Bonn belonged to the suspect's uncle, who was being treated as a witness.

Asylum request

German authorities arrested Omar A after a tip-off from a foreign intelligence agency, according to local media, adding that he had not been on any militant watchlist in Germany. The suspect was said to have entered Germany in November 2022 and to have made a request for asylum the following January, a government source told AFP. This was rejected in September 2023, meaning Omar A would have been required to leave the country, the source said.

Responding to news of the arrest, the Zionist entity's ambassador to Berlin said: "Muslim anti-Semitism is no longer just hate rhetoric. It leads to and encourages terrorist activities worldwide." Zionist embassies were "on the front line of the diplomatic battlefield", ambassador Ron Prosor said in a message posted by the embassy on social media platform X. Interior Minister Nancy Faeser said protecting Jewish and Zionist institutions in Germany was "of the utmost importance to us". Law enforcement were acting with the "utmost vigilance" to prevent any suspected "Islamist, anti-Semitic and (anti-Zionist) violence", Faeser said. — AFP

Senegal repatriates citizens from Lebanon

DAKAR: Hussein Hachem hugged his injured daughter as she arrived in Senegal on a flight repatriating citizens escaping the escalating conflict in Lebanon. His 14-year-old son was not with her — killed, he said, when their home was bombed. As Zionist forces pounded Lebanon in a broadening offensive, Hachem's daughter Mariam, 11, who had suffered a broken foot, was among 117 Senegalese flown to Dakar on a government-organized flight. "I lost everything. I lost my son. I lost my house. All my dreams," he said, speaking amid emotional scenes outside the Leopold Sedar Senghor International Airport, where families were reunited with loved ones late on Saturday. "We have a 14-and-a-half-year-old son who just disappeared like that. Ten minutes before, I was talking to him. 'Hello?' He said, 'Dad, you're going to come get me?' I told him 'yes' ... Ten minutes later, they called me: 'there's no more house, no more son'."

Senegal has a significant Lebanese diaspora

'Everything is lost' as community, and has historical ties to both Lebanon and Palestine. "The Senegalese government, non and Palestine. "The Senegalese government, of course, is condemning the (Zionist) army's bombardment in Lebanon, the bombardment of civilians ... the destruction of infrastructure," the country's foreign minister, Yassine Fall, said in an interview with Reuters on Saturday evening. She said there had been about 1,000 Senegalese nationals in Lebanon but that some had left by their own means before the repatriation flight.

Fall also highlighted her country's longstanding relationship with the Palestinian people, dating back to 1975 when Senegal chaired the United Nations Committee for the Exercise of the Inalienable Rights of the Palestinian People. "We are very, very disappointed to see the world watching a genocide happen under our eyes, children being killed, children being shot in the head, hospitals being bombarded, sick people not being able to be evacuated, people in refugee camps that are not fighting, that are civilians, being maimed and killed," she said in reference to the Zionist entity's offensive in Gaza. "So Senegal. with other countries, we are really side by side condemning this and calling it what it is: it is a genocide.' Earlier on Saturday, demonstrators marched through Dakar to protest against the Zionist entity's actions in Gaza and Lebanon and call for a ceasefire. — Reuters

Iraqi Kurdistan votes, shadowed by economic struggles

ARBIL, Iraq: Iraq's autonomous Kurdistan region voted on Sunday to elect a new parliament for the oil-rich region, where voters express concern over economic struggles and disenchantment with the political elite. Iraqi Kurdistan presents itself as a relative oasis of stability in the turbulent Middle East, attracting foreign investors due to its close ties with the United States and Europe. However, activists and opposition figures contend that the region, autonomous since 1991, faces the same issues affecting Iraq as a whole: corruption, political repression and cronyism among those in power.

Originally scheduled for two years ago, the vote has been postponed four times due to disputes between the region's two historic parties, the Kurdistan Democratic Party (KDP) and the Patriotic Union of Kurdistan (PUK). Each party is controlled by a powerful Kurdish family — the KDP by the Barzanis and the PUK by the Talabanis. Despite holding election rallies and mobilizing their patronage networks, experts say there is widespread public disillusionment with the parties, exacerbated by the region's bleak economic conditions.

By early afternoon, turnout was 31 percent, the electoral commission said, with official results expected Monday evening. Huri Mohammed,

a 66-year-old housewife, said she voted for the KDP which dominates the regional capital Arbil, as it "serves the people". But she expressed hope the next government would "pay attention to the poor classes. The majority of our population has

Opposition parties such as New Generation and a movement led by Lahur Sheikh Jangi, a dissident from the Talabani clan, may gain from a protest vote, said Sarteep Jawhar, a PUK dissident and political commentator. Hiwa Hadi, a candidate for the newly formed opposition Halwest party, said after voting in Arbil: "People are dissatisfied and angry due to rising prices and taxes, electricity and water shortages".

Tensions with Baghdad

Political analyst Shivan Fazil, a PhD student at the US-based Boston University with a focus on Iraq, noted that there was "a growing fatigue with the region's two ruling parties". He said people's living conditions "have deteriorated over the last decade."

Fazil cited erratic payment of salaries for the region's 1.2 million civil servants as problematic because the money serves as "a vital source of income for households". This issue is tied to ongoing tensions between Kurdistan and the federal Iraqi government in Baghdad, amid disputes over control of the region's lucrative oil exports.

The creation of four new constituencies for this election — a change from only one previously — "could lead to redistribution in vote shares and seats in the next parliament", Fazil said. He still predicted, however, that the KDP could maintain its majority. The KDP is the largest party in the outgoing parliament, with 45 seats against 21 for the PUK. The KDP's majority was assured by an alliance with deputies elected via a quota reserved for Turkmen, Armenian and Christian minorities. — AFP

Zionist entity deliberately targets Beirut's vital infrastructure: Expert

BEIRUT: Just a month ago, south Beirut's bustling streets were packed with traffic, families strolling about and youths in cafes, but now silence dominates the abandoned Hezbollah bastion, interrupted only by the sound of Zionist bombs. Escalating Zionist attacks since late September, after nearly a year of low-intensity cross-border exchanges, have reduced much of the Lebanese capital's once densely-packed southern suburbs to rubble and sent many of its residents fleeing. Braving the smell of rotting flesh that reeks from razed buildings, a few young men stood guard, dressed in black civilian clothes and occasionally driving around the ruins on their motorbikes.

They observed the odd car and the handful of displaced residents who come on foot, hastily checking on their apartment or collecting some belongings before heading back to safety. "The young people told me not to stay too long because drones were constantly flying over and could strike at any time," said 32-year-old Mohammed, on a brief visit home to get more clothes. Giving his first name only for security concerns, he said he first left on September 27, days into the Zionist entity's intense air campaign on Lebanon.

That day, massive Zionist strikes killed Hezbollah's elusive leader Hassan Nasrallah in the heart of the group's south Beirut stronghold, toppling several apartment buildings and spreading fear of even greater violence. "We left in a hurry and thought we would never see our house again," said Mohammed, adding that his neighbors had also fled. The building

aged or destroyed.

Cracks snaked down nearby buildings as torn-off asphalt and burst pipes leaked sewage and tap water. Generators that long made up for daily power cuts after five years of economic crisis had also been blown to bits. "About 320 buildings were destroyed in Beirut and its suburbs" in less than a month of war, Mona Fawaz of the Beirut Urban Lab told AFP. The devastation has surpassed the damage caused by the Zionist entity's last war with Hezbollah in 2006, said Fawaz, who records cases of "urbicide", the destruction of cities in conflict, focusing now on Lebanon and the Gaza Strip. She accused the Zionist entity of "deliberate targeting of what allows life to continue," including vital infrastructure unrelated to Hezbollah. Hezbollah had completely rebuilt Beirut's south based on the existing urban plans from before the 2006 war, which had displaced about 100,000 people from the area. During that 33-day war, "surveys list 1,332 severely damaged multi-story apartment buildings, of which 281 were completely razed to the ground" in an area of about 20 square kilometers (eight square miles), said Fawaz. The Burj al-Barajneh neighborhood, unscathed in 2006, has been heavily damaged in the bombardment this time around. — AFP

Japan shifting back to nuclear to ditch coal and power AI

TOKYO: Glinting in the sun by the world's biggest nuclear plant, the Sea of Japan is calm now. But as the huge facility gears up to restart, Kashiwaza-ki-Kariwa has a new tsunami wall, just in case. Japan pulled the plug on nuclear power after the 2011 Fukushima disaster, but with the G7's dirtiest energy mix, it is seeking to cut emissions, and atomic energy is making a steady comeback, in part because of AI. At the 400-hectare (1,000-acre) KK plant, shown to AFP in an exclusive tour, the 15-metre (50-foot) wall is just one measure to prevent another catastrophe and reassure the public and Japan's jittery neighbors.

"We believe that (a similar accident to Fukushima) could be largely avoided," Masaki Daito, KK deputy superintendent, told AFP. Japan now has "the strictest (regulatory) standards in the world". The facility in central Japan — like the nation as a whole — is no stranger to earthquakes, having been shut down for two years for "upgrades" after a big jolt in 2007. At Fukushima, a 15-metre tsunami cut power lines and flooded backup generators, disabling water pumps needed to keep nuclear fuel cool.

In this century's worst nuclear accident, three reactors went into meltdown and hydrogen explosions blew off roofs and released radioactivity into the air. To keep the power running in the event of a quake, KK has new backup power supply vehicles on higher ground, plus "blow-out" panels and a new vent meant to filter out 99.9 percent of any radioactive particles.

In addition to the recently built sea wall, an embankment has been enlarged and reinforced. In corridors deep inside the reactor building, luminous stickers mark pipes and faucets. "The lights all went out at Fukushima and no one could see," Daito said.

Before the 2011 quake and tsunami, which killed around 18,000 people, nuclear power generated about a third of Japan's electricity, with fossil fuels contributing most of the rest. All of Japan's 54 reactors were shut down afterwards, including

Yet even under this scenario, the remainder would need to be covered by gas and nuclear energy. Under its current plan, Japan aims for nuclear power to account for 20-22 percent of its electricity by 2030, up from well under 10 percent now.

Japan in late 2022 decided to accelerate reactor restarts and to extend operating time for nuclear reactors to 60 years from 40. Nine of Japan's 33 still-operable reactors are currently online. At KK, unit seven is ready to join them once the local governor approves, with others set to follow. Because of tougher safety rules since Fukushima, getting approval is a slow process. One restart was recently blocked because of earthquake risk. — AFP

"The pause... is merely a procedural step," the spokesperson said.

DHAKA: Bangladesh's vital garment industry lost \$400 million due to unrest following the student-led revolution that ousted the country's autocratic premier, industry leaders said Sunday, insisting the situation was now "stable". The South Asian nation's 3,500 garment factories account for around 85 percent of its \$55 billion in annual exports, but the unrest caused significant disruptions to the linchpin industry. After months of deadly protests, ex-leader Sheikh Hasina fled by helicopter to neighboring India on August 5.

An interim government, led by Nobel Peace Prize winner Muhammad Yunus took over, but protests in a string of garment factories continued with workers demanding jobs and better pay. Such demonstrations sometimes spiralled into violence. On September 30, a garment worker was killed and 20 were injured in clashes between protesters and the police. Kalpana Akhtar, president of the Bangladesh Garments and Industrial Workers Federation, said Sunday that there had to be "a drastic change in the attitude" of factory owners and the government.

"The discussion about pay raises only takes place when the workers take to the streets", Akhtar told AFP. She said changes were needed "to ensure stability in this sector", warning that "otherwise, the calm situation might not last."

Bangladesh is the world's second-biggest exporter of clothing by value after China and supplies many of the world's top brands, including Levi's, Zara and H&M. Khandaker Rafiqul Islam, president of the Bangladesh Garment Manufacturers and Exporters Association, said that the "industry is currently stable after going through a challenging period". Islam, speaking to reporters on Saturday, estimated losses since August to total around \$400 million, and said security forces needed to continue protecting the industry. "The army formed a task force to protect the factories, and they are conducting regular patrols to ensure security at the garment hubs", Islam said. — AFP



ECB cuts rate as inflation drops below target

KUWAIT: US retail sales rose by 0.4 percent in September, exceeding economists' expectations of a 0.3 percent increase, according to data from the Commerce Department. This represents a 1.7 percent gain annually. The growth was driven by lower gasoline prices, which gave consumers more disposable income to spend on dining out and shopping at clothing stores, miscellaneous retailers, and health and personal care stores. Online purchases also saw an uptick. Gas prices fell by about 12 cents per gallon, further supporting consumer spending. Sales at restaurants and bars, a key indicator of household financial health, rose 1.0 percent. Despite strong consumer spending, economists expect the Federal Reserve to deliver a modest 25-basis-point interest rate cut

Yellen sounds tariff warning

US Treasury Secretary Janet Yellen cautioned that broad tariff proposals would increase inflation and harm American businesses. She criticized the idea of imposing high tariffs on both allies and competitors, warning that such measures would raise prices for American consumers and reduce business competitiveness. Yellen argued that while challenges like supply chain disruptions, climate change,

and China's industrial overcapacity need addressing, outdated approaches like blanket tariffs are not the solution. Instead, she emphasized the need for targeted and thoughtful economic strategies. The US dollar index closed the week at 103.46.

Canada inflation drops

The likelihood of a 50 bps interest rate cut by the Bank of Canada has increased after annual inflation fell to 1.6 percent in September, according to Statistics Canada. This inflation drop, along with a strong labor market report showing 47,000 new jobs and a lower unemployment rate of 6.5 percent, provides key data ahead of the central bank's interest rate decision on October 23. Falling gasoline prices contributed to the decline in inflation, but excluding gasoline, inflation stood at 2.2 percent. Rent and food prices remained elevated, with rent rising 8.2 percent year-over-year and food prices increasing faster than the headline inflation rate. The Bank of Canada, which has already cut interest rates three times this year, may continue with further reductions depending on its economic evaluation. Governor Tiff Macklem has hinted that additional cuts could be forthcoming, though the pace and timing remain uncertain. The USD/CAD currency pair closed the week at 1.3800.

ECB delivers quarter percentage cut

European Central Bank (ECB) reduced its key interest rate by 25 bps to 3.25 percent on Thursday, marking the third quarter-point cut this year. This move was widely expected, following earlier signals from policymakers about lower inflation risks and a slowing economic outlook. The

ECB noted that the disinflation process is "well on track," and inflation in the eurozone eased to 1.8 percent in September, falling below the ECB's 2 percent target for the first time in three years. However, the central bank warned that inflation could rise again in the coming months before stabilizing next year. Additionally, the ECB revised its 2024 growth forecast for the eurozone down to 0.8 percent, citing weaker domestic demand and challenges in major economies like Germany and France. This is the first time the ECB has cut rates in consecutive meetings since 2011. The EUR/USD currency pair closed the week at 1.0865.

UNITED KINGDOM

UK inflation falls The Office for National Statistics announced on Wednesday that inflation in the United Kingdom had decreased significantly to 1.7 percent in September, surpassing market expectations and raising the likelihood of an interest rate cut by the Bank of England in November. Economists had predicted a higher inflation rate of 1.9 percent for the month, but the actual figure marked the first time it had fallen below the BoE's target of 2 percent since April 2021. Inflation had been hovering near this target for the past four months, reaching 2.2 percent in August. Core inflation, which excludes energy, food, alcohol, and tobacco, also declined from 3.6 percent in August to 3.2 percent in September, falling below the forecast of 3.4 percent. Price increases in the services sector, the primary component of the UK economy, experienced a notable decrease to 4.9 percent in September from 5.6 percent in August,

reaching the lowest level since May 2022. Core and services inflation are closely monitored by Bank of England policymakers as they consider whether to implement another interest rate reduction at their upcoming meeting in November. Markets are now pricing in 86 percent probability of a rate cut by 25 basis points.

Retail sales rise unexpectedly

In September, British retail sales unexpectedly rose by 0.3 percent, surpassing economists' expectations of a 0.3 percent decline. This increase, combined with stronger sales in July and August, led to a 1.9 percent rise in sales for the third quarter, marking the joint largest growth since mid-2021. The telecom and computer sectors were key drivers of this non-food sales boost, with a nearly 35 percent surge in sales for September. This rise contrasts with concerns that consumers might cut spending due to potential tax increases ahead of the new government's budget later this month. The GBP/USD currency pair closed the week at 1.3048.

Chinese inflation falls

Consumer price index in China dropped, with the y/y figure showing a 0.4 percent increase, lower than the previous and forecasted figure of 0.6 percent. The producer price index deflation also further deepened, with the y/y figure at -2.8 percent, versus August's -1.8 percent figure. The figures highlight the need for stronger stimulus measures, where finance minister Lan Foan spoke on Saturday, stating that there will be more "counter-cyclical measures" in hopes of reducing deflationary pressures in China.

China's National Bureau of Statistics reported that the country's GDP grew by 4.6 percent year-on-year in the third quarter of 2024, slightly surpassing economists' expectations of 4.5 percent. This was a slight decrease from the 4.7 percent growth in the second quarter. On a quarterly basis, GDP expanded by 0.9 percent, up from 0.7 percent in the previous quarter. Officials noted positive economic signs in September, with growing confidence in meeting the full-year GDP growth target of around 5 percent. This follows government efforts to stimulate the economy, including reducing bank reserve requirements by 50 basis points. Following the data release, China's CSI 300 and Hong Kong's Hang Seng index both saw gains.

China reported stronger-than-expected retail sales and industrial production for September. Retail sales grew by 3.2 percent year-on-year, exceeding the 2.5 percent forecasted by analysts and accelerating from the 2.1 percent growth in August. Industrial production also outpaced expectations, expanding by 5.4 percent compared to the predicted 4.5 percent increase. Fixed asset investment grew 3.4 percent from January to September, while the urban unemployment rate fell to 5.1 percent, down from 5.3 percent the previous month. These positive figures come as Beijing introduces measures to stimulate consumption and support the real estate sector. The USD/CNY currency pair closed the week at 7.1015.

Modern pressures burden Pakistan's donkey business

Donkeys being put out to pasture due to high upkeep costs, surging sprawl of city

KARACHI: Droves of braying donkeys were once the backbone of Pakistan's commercial hub Karachi, but growing upkeep costs and the surging sprawl of the city are putting them out to pasture. Jittering donkey carts have long been essential for aftermarket transport from southern Karachi's wholesale bazaars, nested in narrow streets preventing regular vehicles from accessing their trove of wares.

For low-income workers, the beasts of burden provided a path to financial stability — their resilience, low overheads and integral role guaranteeing a modest and stable profit to live off. But punishing inflation has made feed costly whilst the city has exploded in size, accommodating around 50 times more people today than before Pakistan's independence, with vast distances testing the animal's limits. "We continued the work of our fathers, but I want my kids to study and do something else," said Mohammad Atif, the warden of a donkey called Raja — meaning "King".

The 27-year-old spends up to 750 rupees (\$2.70) on hay for Raja per day. It used to cost just 200 rupees, the same amount Atif pays for a plate of food he splits with a colleague on increasingly common slow days. "Now you can't make a living in this line of work," Atif told AFP in the colonial-era Bolton Market where everything from spices and water to cutlery and construction equipment is sold.

A good shift may earn him up to 4,000 rupees, far short of the expenses of his dependents and donkey.

There are just shy of six million donkeys in Pakistan, according to government estimates, one for every 40 people in the country. Local animal broker Aslam Shah told AFP the majority were in Karachi, which exploded into a megacity of more than 20 million people after mass migration in the partition of Pakistan and India.

But the 69-year-old said they're no longer a desired commodity at an animal market held each Sunday. "Sometimes weeks and months go by without us selling a single one," he said. Bolton Market springs to life at mid-morning as shopkeepers lift their shutters, and housewives in apartments above

lower baskets from their balconies to collect orders of foodstuffs. As customers prepare to leave, postsale negotiations begin on who will win the work of hauling shopping away. But most donkey carts are empty with their owners and animals idle. The carts were once so dominant on roads that the government issued them license plates. But the metropolis has sprawled with expressways and overpasses off-limits to animal carriages.

"I have been told there is lots to carry and that I would have to travel to the other side of the city to deliver goods," said 21-year-old Ali Usman, in envy of a three-wheeled motorized rickshaw being loaded with rice sacks. "It will take me three to four hours," he said. "In this time, the rickshaw will have made

two trips so the work has not been given to me." Noman Farhat, a wholesaler at Empress Market, built in 1884, said he tries to give some work to donkey owners every day — a small act of mercy despite their impracticality. "They are a part of our culture, and I would be loathe to see them go out of business," he said. One Karachi animal welfare

activist who asked to remain anonymous said increasingly long journeys and poor road conditions are knackering the animals.

"Due to a lack of resources, donkey owners use rope or a piece of cloth in place of proper harnesses leading to severe chaffing and skin wounds," she said. Mistreatment can also cause muzzle mutilation that restricts eating, she said. But some stubbornly believe donkeys will remain at the heart of Karachi.

"Despite the harsh conditions they often face, these animals are an essential part of the informal economy," said Sheema Khan, manager of Karachi's Benji Project animal shelter.

'It is still the cheapest form of transport," she said. At a wholesale market, pointing to his two sons and grandson loading rice and wheat onto their carts, Ghulam Rasool is inclined to agree. "This work will never end, it will endure till doomsday," said the 76-year-old.

'So what if there are two or three days of no work? There will always be someone who needs us." — AFP



JAPAN 'ZOMBIE' TRAIN SPOOKS PASSENGERS AHEAD OF HALLOWEEN

t's usually a serene two-and-a-halfhour ride on Japan's famously efficient bullet train. But the journey quickly descended into a zombie apocalypse, with passengers screaming in terror. Organizers of Saturday's adrenaline-filled trip, less than two weeks before Halloween, touted it as the "world's first haunted house experience on a running shinkansen". On board one chartered car of the shinkansen - the Japanese word for bullet train — were around 40 thrill-seekers, ready to brave an encounter with the living dead between Tokyo and the western metropolis of Osaka.

The eerie experience was inspired by the hit 2016 South Korean action-horror movie "Train to Busan", in which a father and daughter trapped on a moving train battle zombies hungry for human flesh. All seemed normal at first as the bullet train made a peaceful departure Saturday evening, but it wasn't long until the first gory attack.

The victims - actors planted in seats by the organizers — jerked in agony and then underwent a terrifying transformation before starting a rampage against their fellow passengers. Event organizer Kenta Iwana of the group Kowagarasetai, which translates to the "scare squad", said they wanted to "depict the normally safe, peaceful shinkansen - something we take for granted — collapsing in the blink of an eye".

'Like I was in the film'

Sitting next to one of the actors was Joshua Payne, one of many foreign tourists on board. "I literally felt like I was in the film, just sitting here watching it take place in front of me," the 31-year-old American told AFP. "The fact that we can physically go from Tokyo to Osaka right now and have this whole performance at the same time...



I think is really cool and maybe a little bit groundbreaking," he said. It was far from Central Japan Railway Company's first experiment with the usually dazzlingly clean, accident-free shinkansen, a Japanese institution that turned 60 this year.

After demand for long-distance travel plunged during the Covid-19 pandemic, the railway operator started renting out bullet train compartments for special events to diversify its business. A sushi restaurant, a bar and even a wrestling match have been hosted on the high-speed train, and carriages can also be reserved for private parties.

Marie Izumi of JR Central's tourism

subsidiary told AFP that she was surprised by the idea for a zombie-themed commute when Kowagarasetai approached her, thinking it would be "almost impossible to pull off". But the event has convinced her of "new possibilities" for the bullet train, Izumi said, adding that concerts and comedy shows might be a good fit in the future.

Thriller

On Saturday, toy chainsaws and guns were used as props, but depictions of extreme violence and gore that could tarnish the shinkansen's squeaky-clean reputation were avoided. To counterbalance the subdued horror, the two-

and-a-half-hour tour was peppered with light-hearted performances by zombie cheerleaders, magicians and comedians, including a choreographed dance to Michael Jackson's "Thriller". "Nobody wants to sit tight for such a long time being constantly exposed to horror," said Ayaka Imaide from Kowagarasetai.

Many aboard the zombie-infested train said the experience alone was worth the ticket price of up to 50,000 yen (\$335). "It was very immersive," Naohiko Nozawa, 30, told AFP. "And the appearance of so many different kinds of zombies kept me entertained all the way." — AFP

Lost ghost story by 'Dracula' author Bram Stoker unearthed in Dublin

short story by Bram Stoker, the legendary author of "Dracula", has been unearthed by a lifelong enthusiast in Dublin who stumbled upon the work while browsing in a library archive. Titled "Gibbet Hill", the story was uncovered by Brian Cleary in a Christmas supplement of the Dublin edition of the Daily Mail newspaper from 1890 and had remained undocumented for more than 130 years. The rare find, which has never been referenced in any Stoker bibliography or biography, is now



Marino neighborhood of Dublin where the author grew up. Thanks to "Dracula", Stoker "had a massive impact on popular culture, but is under-appreciated", Cleary told AFP in the Casino at Marino, an opulent 18th-century building near the writer's birthplace that is hosting the exhibition.

'Flabbergasted'

Cleary's journey of discovery began in 2021 when a sudden onset of deafness changed his life. While on leave to

being brought to the public for the first time at an exhibition in the Irish capital.

"Dracula", the Gothic, mysterious and supernatural vampire novel from 1897 may have been set in Transylvania and England but its author, Stoker, was a Dubliner. "I read 'Dracula' as a child and it stuck with me, I read everything from and about Stoker that I could get my hands on," said Cleary, 44, a writer and amateur historian who lives in the

retrain his hearing after having cochlear implant surgery, Cleary visited the National Library of Ireland to indulge his interest in historical literature and the works of Stoker. There, in October 2023, he chanced upon the hidden literary gem, the "Gibbet Hill" story which he had never heard of before.

"I sat in the library flabbergasted, that I was looking at potentially a lost ghost story from Stoker, especially one from around the time he was writing 'Dracula', with elements of 'Dracula' in it," said Cleary. "I sat looking at the screen wondering, am I the only living person who had read it? Followed by, what on earth do I do with it?" Cleary did extensive literary searches to verify the find and consulted Stoker expert and biographer Paul Murray who confirmed the story was unknown, lost and buried

in the archives for more than 130 years. 'Gibbet Hill' is very significant in terms of Stoker's development as a writer, 1890 was when he was a young writer and made his first notes for 'Dracula'," Murray told AFP. "It's a classic Stoker story, the struggle between good and evil, evil which crops up in exotic and unexplained ways, and is a way station on his route to publishing 'Dracula'."

Illustrations

The macabre tale tells of a sailor murdered by three criminals whose bodies were strung up on a gibbet or hanging gallows on a hill as a ghostly warning to passing travelers. To celebrate the discovery, "Gibbet Hill" has been captured in a book that features cover art and illustrations inspired by the story by respected Irish artist Paul McKinlev.

"It's quite surreal now to be standing next to a picture inspired by three of the characters in the story," said Cleary. "When Brian sent me the 'Gibbet Hill' there was so much I could work with," said McKinley. His eery, sometimes sinister illustrations include a "juicy, wet, oily painting" of worms inspired by a young character in the story who has a bunch of earthworms in his hands. "Making new images for an old story that has been buried for so long" was a "fascinating challenge" said the artist. — AFP

Meta unveils AI tie-up with horror movie producers

ech giant Meta has unveiled a partnership with horror film production company Blumhouse to road-test its latest Al video tool. The program, known as Movie Gen, was announced earlier this month though Meta said it was still being developed and would not be added to publicly available products until next year. Meta announced that it had been working with filmmakers from Blumhouse - known for producing franchises like "Paranormal Activity", "The Purge" and "Insidious" - to refine and improve the tool.

Oscar-winner Casey Affleck, who was also given early access to Movie Gen, praised it in a promotional video as "more like a collaborator than it is like a tool". The advance of AI was one of the flashpoints during last year's writers' strike in Hollywood, where creatives feared that studios would use AI tools to create scripts or even replace actors. But Blumhouse founder Jason Blum said he welcomed the chance to test the program while it was still being developed.

"These are going to be powerful tools for directors, and it's important to engage the creative industry in their development to make sure they're best suited for the job," he was quoted as saying in a Meta blog post. Meta also released a sleek three-minute video packaged like an advert made by filmmaker Aneesh Chaganty, framed around the idea that he should "hate" AI because it was going to wreck his industry.

Chaganty revisited a series of snippets he had filmed when he was a youngster, using Movie Gen to add aliens, or change the location from the countryside to Manhattan, or make it appear like he was in a bank vault rather than his family home. "I hate AI, but with a tool like this... I dunno... maybe I would've just dreamt a little bigger," the voiceover concludes. Meta has hailed Movie Gen's ability to create videos with sound from short prompts or photos as a major breakthrough, though the tool is still limited to 16-second clips. — AFP






'Unique sensation': Young climber scales French skyscrapers

t is dangerous. It is illegal. And his parents do not approve. But Titouan Leduc is not planning to give up his passion any time soon. Leduc, a 23-year-old urban climber from northeastern France, likes to scale skyscrapers without any ropes or specialist equipment, wearing only a pair of climbing boots. "It's a unique sensation. I'm face to face with myself." he

"I really respect him for his performances," he added. "He's someone who pushed the level of climbing in the '90s and he's the first person to have undertaken such extreme and random solo climbs." Robert, dubbed the "French Spiderman", became rich and famous by climbing the world's tallest buildings, and Leduc is trying to make a living out of his passion, too.

told AFP in an interview. "It's something that I find hard to find elsewhere and that's what keeps me going."

Alain Robert, a 62-year-old French climber who became a legend by pioneering high-risk city ascents, is of course a huge inspiration, Leduc said.

On a recent afternoon Leduc scaled the Franklin Tower, a 115-metre (377foot) -high office skyscraper located in Paris' La Defense business district. Like Robert, he performed a free solo climb, using only his feet and hands to move himself upwards. A small bag of

climbing chalk powder was fastened around his waist, and he sometimes paused to dry out his hands. When he reached the top of the tower he raised his arms aloft in triumph.

'Bloodied hands'

"It was such a good feeling. At the beginning it was long, it was a bit hard to get into it," he said afterwards. "After a while, halfway up, I didn't count the floors, but then it went really smoothly and frankly I went really fast to the top," he said with a smile. The climb however took a toll on his hands, with Leduc proudly showing off fingers injured during the feat. "I hadn't anticipated

that I was going to end up with bloodied hands." he added.

Several police officers waited for him on the ground but let him off with a warning. Urban climbing is illegal in France and can result in a fine or stiffer punishment. But Leduc brushes off such concerns. "When I set out on this kind of performance, I expect to be stopped at the end. But that's secondary, really," he said. "I know that there could potentially be problems later on." Leduc has been climbing since he was a child. "I've been climbing all over the place, climbing trees, climbing everywhere," he said.

He started climbing buildings in his hometown Nancy when he was 19. "Little by little, I diversified. I really got into the big urban projects, skyscrapers. " His parents have not accepted what he does, even though he has tried to make them understand the appeal.

"There's a lot of conflict with my parents. We're not on the same wavelength," he said. "There is still work to be done to get them to accept it. Which I obviously understand." But he said he did not take unnecessary risks and climbs only when he is fully ready, physically and mentally. "I'm looking for ways to push myself a bit," he said. "But I know my limits and I try not to exceed them. Otherwise, that's where it gets really dangerous." Urban climbing was also "pretty," he added. "It's great to see a human figure climbing up a smooth facade like that. I really like the artistic side of it." — AFP

Young, Ravindra guide New Zealand to first win in India for 36 years

Rohit proud of India's fight after being all out for 46

BENGALURU: Will Young and Rachin Ravindra before, conceding home losses, these things happen. put on an unbroken 75 to guide New Zealand to a first Test win in India for 36 years on day five of the rain-hit match in Bengaluru.

Chasing a tricky 107 on a rain-delayed day, New Zealand lost captain Tom Latham without scoring and Devon Conway for 17. But Young and Ravindra guided the visitors to 110-2 in the first session and a 1-0 lead in the three-match series.

First-innings centurion Ravindra, a wristy lefthander, looked comfortable as he hit six fours in his 46-ball stay and was named player of the match after the eight-wicket victory. Young struck the winning boundary, one of his seven fours, as his New Zealand teammates exchanged hugs in the pavilion. He also hit one six, while facing 76 balls. It was New Zealand's third Test victory in India after their wins in 1969 at Nagpur and at Mumbai in 1988. "It was extremely difficult. There have been a lot of teams that have come here over that long period of time, so obviously it's a special feeling," Latham told reporters.

"To be in this position, I think the work we did in that first and second innings with the ball and with the bat set up the game for us. A proud moment for this group." Latham, who took over from Tim Southee after New Zealand were swept 2-0 in Sri Lanka, marked his first Test as full-time captain with a resounding victory

Fast bowlers Matt Henry and Will O'Rourke set up the win with 15 wickets in the match as India, having chosen to bat after the first day was lost to the weather, were skittled for 46 in their first innings, their lowest home Test score.

'We didn't think we'll be 46 all out but due credit to New Zealand. It set us back and games like this will happen," said India captain Rohit Sharma. "Got to take the good things forward. We've been here

We know what it takes and will give it all in the next two Tests."

'Nice having dad here'

On Sunday, India fast bowler Jasprit Bumrah gave the home side a glimmer of hope when he removed Latham lbw with the second ball of the day and New Zealand yet to score. Bumrah and new ball partner Mohammed Siraj then subjected the New Zealand batsmen to a testing start, with deliveries consistently going past the bat on a lively wicket that had been under covers earlier because of rain.

Bumrah struck a second time when he trapped the left-handed Conway lbw after a successful review to leave New Zealand 35-2. But that was India's last breakthrough as Young and Ravindra took their team to a famous win.

New Zealand had replied to India's first innings 46 with 402 then dismissed India for 462 in their second innings. Sarfaraz Khan scored 150 and Rishabh Pant 99 as their 177 stand led India's second-innings fightback, but from 408-3 Henry and O'Rourke sparked a collapse as the hosts lost their last seven wickets for 54. Ravindra, a Wellington-born batting all-rounder with roots in Bengaluru and his father watching from the stands, hammered 134 in New Zealand's first innings. "Whenever I play in Bangalore it's quite nice to have the support," said Ravindra.

"My phone starts blowing up. The fans are great too. I love the support. It's nice having dad and close family here, it always makes it special." New Zealand came into the match without leading batsman Kane Williamson, who is recovering from a groin injury. The second Test begins on Thursday in Pune. The third is on November 1 in Mumbai.

India captain Rohit Sharma said he was proud of

his team for battling back from their lowest home total of 46 to make a match of the first Test against New Zealand, despite going down to an eight-wicket defeat on Sunday.

India were bowled out for their third lowest Test total in 31.2 overs on day two when Rohit chose to bat in overcast conditions. But in the second innings, Sarfaraz Khan scored 150 and Rishabh Pant 99 as India posted 462. "Second innings with the bat, to come out and play like that, it felt like we were ahead in the game at one stage," said Rohit. New Zealand made 402 in their first innings and took a huge 356run lead. "We didn't feel like we were 350 behind and that is something that I am really proud of," said Rohit. "All in all, except for that first three hours, I thought we played very good Test cricket. — AFP



Bangladesh to move on from Shakib for South Africa series

DHAKA: Bangladesh captain Najmul Hossain Shanto said his men were focused on the challenge of South Africa rather than their missing all-rounder Shakib al Hasan ahead of Monday's first Test in Mirpur. The two-Test series is the first international cricket fixture in Bangladesh since a student-led revolution toppled autocratic premier Sheikh Hasina in August.

The series carries points towards the World Test Championship (WTC), with the final in England next year. South Africa currently are sixth in the standings with Bangladesh seventh. Bangladesh called up uncapped left-arm spinner Hasan Murad to replace retiring Shakib after security fears led the former captain to cancel plans to return home.

Shakib announced his retirement from international cricket last month but said that he wanted to play one last red-ball series at home. But the 37-year-old was also a former lawmaker in the government ousted by the revolution, and his links to Hasina have made him a target of public anger. "It will only be a waste of time if we think too much about this, since we cannot control it," Najmul told reporters Sunday, on the eve of the match at Mirpur, near the capital Dhaka. "These two Tests are very important to us... Players are preparing and focusing on cricket only."

'Nice, hot and sweaty'

Stand-in skipper Aiden Markram said the South Africans were acclimatizing to the "nice, hot and sweaty" conditions in Dhaka, but said there was little relief at the news they would not be facing Shakib. "Ultimately, they've still got a really strong squad, and really strong in their home conditions as well," Markram told reporters. Bangladesh's super spin-friendly wickets will be an added "exciting challenge", he said.

"The spin is a big talking point, especially being from South Africa," he said. "We don't get conditions like that at home." Bangladesh will start the series with a stand in-coach, Phil Simmons, after Chandika Hathurusingha was suspended on Tuesday for alleged misconduct, charges he denies. Najmul said the former West Indies all-rounder was a "great coach" but accepted it would take time for the new system to settle in. "He is trying to understand the environment inside the dressing room," Najmul said. "But he is new and we also don't know him well. I hope in the next few matches we can adjust." The second Test will be played in the port city of Chittagong, also called Chattogram, beginning October 29.

ALLEN: Wakaba Higuchi won the women's title at Skate America on Saturday, leading Rinka Watanabe in a Japanese one-two in the first figure skating grand prix event of the season. American Isabeau Levito, leading after the short program, had some errors, including a fall on a triple Lutz, and slipped to third, Higuchi climbing from fourth after the short program.

Higuchi, a 2022 Olympic team silver medalist who missed the 2022-23 season recovering from a stress fracture, led the free skate to climb to the top with a total score of 196.93 points. She delivered an elegant, technically crisp routine to Kate Bush's "Running Up That Hill" to claim the first grand prix title of her career. Watanabe was third in both the short program and free skate but her total of 195.22 was enough for silver as world silver medalist Levito struggled with some of her jumps to finish third on 194.83. It was a big day for Japanese skaters as former world champions Riku Miura and Ryuichi Kihara claimed pairs gold.

The duo, who earned silver at the last worlds after winning gold in 2023, delivered a polished albeit not perfect free skate to post a total of 214.23 points. They had led by more than seven points after the short program and had the best score in the free skate despite Miura falling on their triple throw loop.

Americans Ellie Kam and Danny O'Shea finished second on 201.73 points and compatriots Alisa Efimova and Misha Mitrofanov were third on 191.51. Meanwhile, world champion Ilia Malinin shook off early season nerves to score 99.69 points in the short program, just 15-hundredths of a point ahead of Japan's Kao Miura, who was in second on 99.54.

Nika Egadze of Georgia was in third with 99.89 points. "I felt really nervous before the event today," Malinin told broadcaster NBC. "I don't know why that was, but I just felt really tense and kind of a little

stiff in the beginning." Malinin's opening quadruple flip was slightly wobbly, but he gained confidence in a routine that included a triple Axel and a quadruple Lutz in combination.

Pressure to defend

Malinin soared to his first world title with a gravity-defying quadruple-jumping free skate in Montreal last season that put him more than 20 points ahead of his rivals. The 19-year-old said his nerves might come from launching into a season as reigning world champion for the first time. "I think that might be the reason is just kind of all that pressure from the world championships, wanting to defend the title and kind of show who the world champion is, maybe made me a little more nervous," he said.

Miura had laid down a challenging marker with a strong performance and said he felt "very relaxed" during a routine that included a quadruple Salchow-triple toe combination. There was a surprise in the ice dancing rhythm dance as Britain's Lilah Fear and Lewis Gibson grabbed the lead over twotime reigning ice dance world champions Madison Chock and Evan Bates. — AFP

Marquez wins duel with Martin at **Australian MotoGP**

PHILLIP ISLAND: An unrelenting Marc Marquez edged championship leader Jorge Martin in a titanic battle at the Australian MotoGP Sunday, with Francesco Bagnaia relegated to third.

The Spanish Gresini rider had a horror start but recovered to hunt down Pramac's Martin and lunge past with four laps left for his fourth victory at Phillip Island. While Marquez won, Martin bolstered his lead over Ducati's Italian defending world champion Bagnaia to 20 points in the title race with three race weekends left.

Ducati-VR46 rider Fabio Di Giannantonio came fourth ahead of Bagnaia's teammate Enea Bastianini and Pramac's Franco Morbidelli. "I thought at one time it was impossible to catch Martin, but in lap five, six, I start to get the rhythm," said Marquez, who also won in Australia in 2015, 2017 and 2019. "It's true that Martin pushed all the race, but I was saving the tyre for the last attack." Martin was fast all weekend, blasting to pole position and leading from start to finish in Saturday's

sprint race where Bagnaia finished fourth. While the championship is effectively a two-horse race, six-time world champion Marquez's victory kept him in the picture. But at 79 points behind, he only has a slender chance to spoil the party. The circuit moves to Thailand next week before Malaysia and the season's finale in Valencia. On a sunny but windy afternoon, Martin held his lead into the first corner and put the hammer down.

Marquez though had a huge wheelspin when the lights went out and plunged from second to seventh as Bagnaia manoeuvred up to second from fourth.

He had removed a helmet visor tear-off seconds before the start, and the clear plastic layer was caught under his rear wheel. "I never pull the tear-off at the start because it's dangerous, but this time when I was engaging the front start device there was something big (on the visor) and I take it off," he said. — AFP

Juve squeeze past 10-man Lazio to move level with leaders Napoli

Ten-man AC Milan hold on to squeeze past Udinese

MILAN: Juventus moved level on points with Serie A leaders Napoli on Saturday after squeezing past 10-man Lazio 1-0, while AC Milan overcame having to play for over an hour with 10 men to beat Udinese by the same score.

Mario Gila's own goal with five minutes remaining gave Juve the win in Turin, a crushing blow for Lazio who acquitted themselves well after Alessio Romagnoli was sent off in the 24th minute. Thiago Motta's Juve looked set to dominate when Romagnoli was shown a straight red card for taking out Pierre Kalulu as he raced towards goal.

But Lazio had little trouble holding off Juve's uninspired attacking, who had to rely on Gila poking Juan Cabal's low cross into his own goal in order to take the three points. "It was a difficult match against a good team," said Motta. "It's our first win at home (in the league) since August and it was deserved."

Lazio, in fifth, were angered by Douglas Luiz not being sent off for punching Patric, an offence which was apparently not seen by the VAR officials. "It is violent conduct and should have been a red card. I do not understand why it was not sanctioned. We feel that we are being taken for a ride," said sporting director Angelo Mariano Fabiani.


Juve have a better goal difference than Napoli but stay behind their rivals, coached by Antonio Conte, as they have played a game more. Napoli can ensure they stay top with a win at Empoli in Sunday's lunchtime match, while champions Inter Milan, who sit two points off the pace alongside their local rivals Milan, are at Roma.

Battling Milan

Samuel Chukwueze's 13th-minute strike looked like being the first of a comfortable win for Milan but ended up being the winning goal as the seven-time European champions held on for the points. Their task was made difficult by Tijjani Reijnders being sent off in the 29th minute for a clumsy foul on Sandi Lovric, who would have been clean through on goal had the Netherlands midfielder not clipped his heels. "It was two matches in one. The first one finished after half an hour, 30 minutes of character, quality and the sort of play which is close to what I want," said Paulo Fonseca.

The Portuguese has had to field questions about ill discipline in the dressing room, especially among star players like suspended Theo Hernandez and Rafael Leao, who was left on the bench for the entire match. "After the sending off it was all about the team spirit," he added. "If anyone doubted that we're a united team today was the demonstration that we are." The hosts looked to have been sucker-punched when Christian Kabasele bundled home for Udinese in the fifth minute of stoppage time, but a huge roar rang around the ground when, after a long VAR check, the goal was ruled out for Jurgen Ekkelenkamp's toes straying offside.

Ultra protests
Milan's win came in front of a flat San

Siro following the decision of Milan's hardcore "ultras" supporters to stand in silence for most of the match in protest at what they claim is a law enforcement and Italian media campaign against them.

Leading ultras from both Milan and local rivals Inter were arrested last month and are accused of a variety of crimes ranging from criminal conspiracy and extortion to assault. Earlier this week, Milan's ultras groups refuted allegations by investigators of any involvement in ticket touting, control of parking and sales from concession stands near the San Siro.

In the meantime, police banned the

ultras' large "Curva Sud Milano" from being hung out in that section, leading to supporters around the whole stadium, not just ultras, leaving their own banners and flags at home. Instead fans in the Curva Sud held a banner in support of their arrested allies which read, loosely translated, "Stay strong boys". — AFP

PSG beat Strasbourg to reclaim top spot in Ligue 1

PARIS: Paris Saint-Germain went back on top of the Ligue 1 table on Saturday as a 4-2 victory at home to Strasbourg saw them climb above Monaco on goal difference. Youngster Senny Mayulu's first Ligue 1 goal set PSG on their way before Marco Asensio, Bradley Barcola and Lee Kang-in also found the net in the rain at the Parc des Princes.

Sekou Mara and Pape Diong were on target for Liam Rosenior's Strasbourg, but the defeat means the side from Alsace have still never won away to PSG in 34 attempts. Monaco's 0-0 draw at home to Lille on Friday had given PSG the opportunity to go back to the summit and they seized the chance despite coach Luis Enrique rotating his squad with an eye on Tuesday's Champions League clash with PSV Eindhoven.

"I think it is the same for all coaches who lose players during international breaks," said Luis Enrique, whose team also go to Marseille next weekend in French football's biggest fixture. "The first game back is always especially complicated but we fulfilled our objectives, which were to get three points against very difficult opponents, and to conserve players so they could recover from games with their

national teams and their journeys."

Ousmane Dembele, Achraf Hakimi, Fabian Ruiz and captain Marquinhos were among the players left on the bench with Mayulu one of five players aged 20 or under in PSG's starting XI. The 18-year-old hit the post before he opened the scoring on 18 minutes after a one-two with Barcola, and Mayulu then missed a great chance to add another before half-time, blazing over when clean through.

"Senny is a player who last year could have left but chose to stay. He is a player with lots of quality and has the ability to score goals," said Luis Enrique. "Today he scored one but could have scored three. He is one for the future of the club." Asensio bundled in PSG's second goal just after the restart, following in to score after Desire Doue's shot had been saved, but Mara pulled one back with his first goal since joining Strasbourg from Southampton.

'Lost in the right way'

PSG had a penalty awarded for a foul on Barcola overturned by the referee following a VAR review, but France winger Barcola then prodded in his team's third goal, and a seventh of the season for the division's top scorer. A Saidou Sow own goal that would have made it 4-1 was disallowed for offside but South Korean star Lee swept in a Joao Neves assist for PSG's fourth late on, before Diong made the final score 4-2 from close range.

It was just a second defeat so far this season for Strasbourg, who are owned by the same BlueCo consortium which controls Chelsea. "I feel we lost in the right way, if there is such a thing," said Englishman Rosenior, who said the defeat was entirely down to the quality of the opposition.

"It was 100 percent the quality of Paris, one of the best teams in Europe," insisted the Englishman. "I think Paris are building something very special here and I am very proud of my players for playing in a style that I don't think anyone has tried.

"You have to be prepared to lose big in order to win big." Earlier, Brest warmed up for their Champions League clash with Bayer Leverkusen by drawing 1-1 with Rennes in a Brittany derby, while Lens won 2-0 at Saint-Etienne to maintain their unbeaten record this season. Marseille go to Montpellier on Sunday, when other matches include Lyon at Le Havre and high-flying Reims at Auxerre. — AFP

Marchand ends Shanghai WCup with 3 titles

SHANGHAI: Leon Marchand on Sunday emphatically won a third title at swimming's short-course World Cup in Shanghai, in his first meet since taking the Paris Olympics by storm.

The 22-year-old Frenchman, the poster boy of the Olympics with four golds, blitzed the 400m individual medley final on the last day in China to go with victories in the 100m and 200m medley. He triumphed in 4:00.03, beating out Italy's Alberto Razzetti by 1.48sec. There was to be no fourth title however as he came fourth in the 200m breaststroke, 1.32sec behind winner Joshua Yong of Australia.

Marchand was thrust into the global spotlight at the Paris Olympics when he won all four of his individual races—the 200m butterfly, 200m breast-stroke and 200m-400m medley double. That put him in elite company alongside American legend Michael Phelps. "Right now I'm just trying to get back to old training," Marchand told AFP on Friday. "I don't really expect a lot of results, I'm just trying to have fun and go back to my standards," he said. Marchand is next set to compete in South Korea in the coming week on the next stop of the World Cup. ——AFP





Soto homer lifts Yankees over Guardians

WASHINGTON: Juan Soto smashed a three-run home run in the 10th inning on Saturday that lifted the New York Yankees over Cleveland 5-2 and into their first World Series since 2009. The 25-year-old Dominican outfielder crushed a fastball from Cleveland pitcher Hunter Gaddis over the centerfield wall to score the deciding runs in a thriller that sent the Yankees into their record 41st World Series overall.

"It sounds amazing," Soto said. "It's the best feeling in the game whenever you win and take your team to the World Series. It's the best feeling you can ever have. That's what we play for." The Yankees captured the best-of-seven American League Championship Series 4-1 and reached Major League Baseball's championship spectacle, which begins on Friday.

"We did a really good job since day one. We've been working hard. Now



we're the best team in the American League," Soto said. "We've been grinding since day one and now we've got it accomplished."

The 27-time champion Yankees will face the National League winner, either

the Los Angeles Dodgers or New York Mets. The Dodgers lead their series 3-2 and will host game six Sunday. "We have all the talent we need to go all the way," said Soto, who helped Washington win the 2019 World Series. "We're feeling re-

ally good. We're really sticking together."

Yankees slugger Giancarlo Stanton, a 34-year-old outfielder who has never played in a World Series in his 15 MLB seasons, smacked a game-tying two-run homer in the sixth, his fourth homer of the series and the 16th playoff homer of his career. "That's our guy," Soto said of Stanton. "He put us in the game again. He has been doing that since day one of the playoffs and we're really happy to have him. He kept us close and we just came back from there."

The game stayed deadlocked until the 10th, when Gaddis walked Austin Wells, allowed an Alex Verdugo's single and surrendered the decisive three-run blast to Soto. "I was just saying to myself, 'You're all over that guy,'" said Soto, who fouled off four pitches in a row just before belting the homer. "Just had to make good contact and I did." Yankees manager Aaron Boone said the secret to success was that the players "are so close and they're so together. These guys play for each other every single day.

"It's incredible. To know we're going to the dance for a chance to play for a world championship, I can't imagine doing it with a better group." Stanton was named the series Most Valuable Player. "It's incredible," he said. "We've been resilient this whole playoffs. This was a roller coaster and we were able to keep punching back. "We know there is much more work to do, it's all uphill and we've got to go get it done." Cleveland, which last won the World Series in 1948, was denied a trip back for the first time since 2016. New York's Gleyber Torres opened with a single and raced for home on Soto's double to the right-field wall, but was tagged out at the plate by Cleveland catcher Bo Naylor off a throw from second baseman Andres Gimenez.

Yankees slugger Aaron Judge and Jazz Chisholm both reached after being hit by a pitch from Tanner Bibee to load the bases, but the game-two loser escaped scoreless when Anthony Rizzo flew out. Canadian siblings combined to give Cleveland a 1-0 lead in the second inning when Josh Naylor singled and scored on his brother Bo Naylor's double down the right field line. Gimenez doubled and scored on Steven Kwan's single up the middle in the fifth inning for a 2-0 Guardians edge but the Yankees surrendered no more as reliever Mark Leiter Jr. escaped a bases-loaded jam. — AFP

Messi hits another hat-trick as Miami break MLS points record

Messi's three goals came within 11-minute spell

FORT LAUDERDALE: On-fire Lionel Messi scored his second hat-trick of the week and Luis Suarez scored twice as Inter Miami beat the New England Revolution 6-2 to smash MLS's regular season points record.

Miami's win, in their final game of the regular season, took them to 74 points one more than the previous record, set by New England in 2021. Messi, who came off the bench in the 58th minute and led the late flurry of goals, has now scored 20 goals in 19 appearances in MLS with his former Barcelona team-mate Suarez also notching 20, from 27 games.

The challenge of breaking the record added some spice to the final game of the regular season with Inter having already secured the Supporters' Shield for the best record in the regular season to stamp themselves clear favorites in the MLS Cup playoffs which start next week.

Miami had trailed 2-0 before Suarez scored twice before half-time to send Gerardo Martino's team in level at the interval. Goals from Argentine Luca Langoni and Colombian Dylan Borrero in the 34th minute had the home crowd chanting for Messi's introduction from the bench but it was Uruguayan Suarez who began the comeback.

A firm left-foot finish from the former Liverpool and Barcelona striker, pulled one back, after good work from David Martinez. Then Suarez levelled with a fine solo finish, making space for himself and switching to his right foot before drilling

Messi, who had scored a hat-trick for Argentina against Bolivia on Tuesday, came off the bench in the 58th minute and immediately helped put the team ahead finding Jordi Alba who set up Benjamin Cremaschi for a tap-in.

New England thought they had drawn level with a goal from striker Bobby Wood but the effort was disallowed for handball following a VAR review. Messi then made it 4-2, collecting a back-heeled pass from Suarez before brilliantly blasting into the far bottom corner.

The Argentine was on target again when he latched on to a superb pass from Jordi Alba and made no mistake and then he completed his hat-trick in the 89th minute when he met a volleyed cross from Suarez with a precise first time finish.

Messi's three goals came within an 11-minute spell and after his two month injury absence after the Copa America he now looks back to his best.

'ideal situation'

"I have the feeling that we have him in an ideal situation to face the most important part of the year," said

Martino. At the post-game celebration of the Supporters Shield success, club co-owners David Beckham and Jorge Mas were joined by FIFA president Gianni Infantino who announced that the Shield had earned the team a place in the 2025 Club World Cup.

Elsewhere in the last round of the regular season in MLS, Montreal clinched a place in the playoffs with a 2-0 win over New York City. The victory secured eighth place in the Eastern Conference and the Canadian side will play ninth-placed Atlanta United in the wildcard round on Tuesday for a chance to play Miami in the first round.

Atlanta took the final spot in the East with a 2-1 win at Orlando City. There was a thrilling finale to the regular season in the Western Conference with the two Los Angeles clubs locked in battle for top spot and home field

advantage throughout the playoffs. LAFC left the field thinking their

3-1 win over San Jose was enough to have secured the top seed with LA Galaxy losing 1-0 to Houston. But a stoppage time penalty, converted by Gabriel Pec, looked to have secured LA Galaxy the point they needed to secure first place and left LAFC fans, in California, watching on their phones desolate.

But then in the 11th minute of stoppage time, Houston grabbed a dramatic winner with a header from Daniel Steres against his former club, meaning that LAFC snatched top seed on goal difference - by a single goal.

LAFC will face the winner of the wildcard game between the Vancouver Whitecaps and the Portland Timbers while the Galaxy will host the Colorado Rapids in the first round. — AFP

Kerr leads N Zealand to maiden Women's T20 WCup triumph

DUBAI: An outstanding all-round performance by Amelia Kerr led New Zealand to their first ever Women's T20 World Cup title as they beat South Africa by a commanding 32 runs in Sunday's final in Dubai.

Player of the Match Kerr top-scored with 43 as New Zealand posted an imposing 158-5 in their 20 overs before taking 3-24, and crucially picking up the key wickets of Laura Wolvaardt and Anneke Bosch, to restrict South Africa to 126-9 in their 20 overs.

It marked a sweet finish to skipper Sophie Devine's career. The victory came 14 years after the White Ferns lost to Australia by just three runs in the 2010 final. They also lost to England in the 2009 championship match.

For South Africa it made for a double disappointment having lost last year's final to Australia in Cape Town. After being put in to bat by South Africa captain Wolvaardt, the New Zealand openers began aggressively with Georgia Plimmer smashing two fours in the first over from Marizanne Kapp.

Plimmer fell for nine but Suzie Bates, playing in

The last pair held out for the final over but could not prevent New Zealand from celebrating their first title. — AFP
