### 'Friendly fire' downs 2 US pilots

WASHINGTON: Two US Navy pilots were shot down over the Red Sea early Sunday in "an apparent case of friendly fire", the US military said. Yemen's Iran-backed Houthi rebels said later on Sunday they had "targeted" the aircraft carrier USS Harry S Truman a day earlier in an operation that led to "shooting down an F-18 aircraft" and thwarting "American-British aggression" against Yemen. United States Central Command said late on Saturday that both US pilots were recovered alive but "initial assessments indicate that one of the crewmembers sustained minor injuries". —AFP

#### Women-only flight to Mashhad

TEHRAN: An Iranian airline conducted a rare women-only flight on Sunday, landing for the first time in the holy city of Mashhad in the northeast. The Aseman Airlines flight by Shahrzad Shams — one of Iran's pioneering women pilots — carried 110 passengers on board. Dubbed the "Iran Banoo" (Iran Lady) flight, the plane touched down at Hasheminejad International Airport in Mashhad, Iran's second-largest city and home to the revered shrine of Imam Reza. "This is the first time a women-only flight, with both female passengers and crew, lands in Mashhad," the official IRNA news agency said. – AFP

## Syria to control all weapons, will not meddle in Lebanon

DAMASCUS: Syria's new leader Ahmed Al-Sharaa said Sunday all weapons would come under state control during a press conference with Turkish Foreign Minister Hakan Fidan, who urged the lifting of sanctions on Syria. Sharaa said that after upcoming consultations with defense and military officials on a new structure for the military, armed "factions will begin to announce their dissolution and enter" the army.

"We will absolutely not allow there to be weapons in the country outside state control, whether from the revolutionary factions or the factions present in the SDF area," he added, referring to the Kurdish-led Syrian Democratic Forces. Turkey views the main

component of the US-backed force, which controls swathes of north and northeast Syria, as being linked to the Kurdistan Workers' Party (PKK), its outlawed domestic foe. "We are working on protecting sects and minorities from any attacks that occur between them" and from "external" actors trying to exploit the situation "to cause sectarian discord", Sharaa added. "Syria is a country for all and we can coexist together," he added. Fidan told the press conference that US president-elect Donald Trump knew better than to continue Washington's backing for the Kurdish-led fighters over supporting the security needs of its NATO ally Turkey.

"When we look at it from America's interests, as a mathematical calculation — whether Turkey or a terrorist organization like the PKK is more important — Mr Trump sees the mathematics immediately," Fidan said. The Turkish diplomat said that "the sanctions imposed on the previous (Syrian) regime need to be lifted as soon as possible". "The international community

## Zionist carnage in Gaza as hospital forced to close

GAZA: Gaza's civil defense agency said on Sunday Zionist strikes killed at least 28 Palestinians, as the director of one of two hospitals still operating in the territory's north reported bombardment nearby as the Zionist entity ordered the closure and evacuation of the facility. More than 14 months into the Zionist war, there was no let-up in the violence in the Gaza Strip even as Palestinian groups involved in the fighting said a ceasefire deal was "closer than ever".

The Zionist entity has faced growing criticism of its actions during the war, including from rights groups accusing it of acts of genocide. Pope Francis denounced on Sunday the "cruelty" of the Zionist entity's bombardment, highlighting the deaths of children and attacks on schools and hospitals in Gaza for the second time in as many days, while the Zionist entity accused the pontiff of "double standards".

On the ground in Gaza, civil agency spokesman Mahmud Bassal said that at least 13 people were killed in an air strike on a house in central Gaza's Deir el-Balah belonging to the Abu Samra family. An AFP photographer saw residents searching through the debris for survivors, while others looked for belongings they could salvage. In a nearby compound, bodies covered in blankets were laid on the ground.

'We are... losing loved ones every day," said Deir el-Balah resident Naim Al-Ramlawi. "I pray to God that a truce will be reached soon" and would allow Gazans to finally "live a decent life, instead of this miserable life", he said. The Zionist military confirmed a separate strike further north, on a school in Gaza City.

# Kuwaiti, Saudi Interior Ministers discuss security cooperation

RIYADH: Kuwait's Minister of Interior Sheikh Fahad Al-Yousef Saud Al-Sabah held an official meeting with Saudi Arabia's Minister of Interior Prince Abdulaziz bin Saud bin Nayef bin Abdulaziz, in the Saudi capital, Riyadh.

According to the Kuwaiti Ministry of Interior, the two sides discussed several security matters of mutual interest and reviewed the bilateral cooperation between the two countries in the security sector. They also explored ways to strengthen and enhance this cooperation and the mechanisms for coordinating efforts to address regional and



international challenges, aiming to ensure security and stability in both nations.

The two ministers reiterated the deep ties between Kuwait and Saudi Arabia, emphasizing their commitment to reinforcing security integration and continuing joint coordination on various issues of shared concern.

During the visit, Sheikh Fahad, who is also First Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of Defense, toured the Riyadh Metro Station and the city's modern transport network. He received a detailed briefing on the technologies used in the metro project, which is considered one of the key achievements in Saudi Arabia's public transportation sector. The tour highlighted the metro's essential role in facilitating movement for citizens and residents, supporting urban development, and enhancing overall quality of life. ### Kuwait to review all disability certificates to prevent fraud

**KUWAIT:** The Public Authority for Disability Affairs in Kuwait will begin a comprehensive review of all disability certificates to ensure that beneficiaries meet the eligibility criteria outlined in the law. A disability certificate is an official document issued by the authority that certifies an individual as having a recognized disability. This certificate serves as proof of the person's disability status and qualifies them for various rights, benefits, and services designed to support individuals with disabilities.

Acting Director General Wafa Al-Muhanna confirmed that this initiative follows the discovery of numerous cases where individuals received disability certificates and the associated benefits without justifiable grounds. These benefits include financial assistance, healthcare services, and exemptions from certain government fees. Anyone found to have obtained a disability certificate through false information or fraudulent documents will face legal consequences, including the recovery of wrongfully obtained benefits.

The review will be carried out in collaboration with relevant authorities using an accurate, modern electronic database to ensure transparency and precision in identifying eligible cases. Al-Muhanna emphasized the Authority's commitment to upholding the law with transparency and rigor, aiming to create

a just and equal society while ensuring full support for those truly entitled to assistance.

People with disabilities in Kuwait are entitled to a range of free or subsidized services that enhance their quality of life. These include free or reduced-cost healthcare, assistive devices such as wheelchairs, hearing aids, and prosthetics, as well as exemptions from certain government fees. People with disabilities may receive assistance with transportation costs. Additionally, subsidized housing options are available to help ensure that individuals with disabilities have suitable living arrangements. These services are part of Kuwait's efforts to provide equitable opportunities and reduce financial burdens for people with disabilities.—Agencies


number of performances, there was still much to explore and appreciate throughout the day.

# Indian PM's visit to Kuwait marks new era of cooperation

KUWAIT: At a press conference, Arun Kumar Chatterjee, Secretary of Consular, Passport and Visa Division & Overseas Indian Affairs at the Indian Ministry of External Affairs, said this historic visit by Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi will open a new chapter in the relationship between India and Kuwait, where both sides have identified several significant areas of cooperation, and the respective governments will work towards fulfilling the plans discussed during this visit.

He said that the two sides discussed cooperation between India and the Gulf Cooperation Council (GCC), with Kuwait now serving as the chair. "In September, India and the GCC held a strategic dialogue led by the minister of external affairs. The prime minister congratulated Kuwait on assuming the GCC chairmanship and expressed optimism for strengthened collaboration between India and the

GCC under Kuwait's leadership." Chatterjee said four bilateral agreements were signed, saying that the defense agreement will institutionalize bilateral collaboration in defense. Key areas of cooperation include training, exchange of personnel and experts, joint exercises, cooperation in the defense industry, supply of defense equipment and collaboration in research and development.

"Additionally, one of the MOUs was on a cultural exchange program from 2025- 2029 that aims to foster greater collaboration in art, music, dance, literature and theater; preserve cultural heritage; promote research and development in cultural areas; and organize festivals. The executive program for sports cooperation will strengthen bilateral ties by encouraging the exchange of sports leaders for experience sharing, and collaboration in sports medicine, management, media and science," he added.

Chatterjee stressed Kuwait's membership in the International Solar Alliance will address the deployment and scaling of solar energy while tackling shared challenges, pointing out that this

collaboration will help member states transition to low-carbon growth trajectories. He said that during his visit, Modi also visited a labor camp in Mina Abdullah of a company that employs approximately 1,500 Indian workers, interacting with the workers and highlighting his government's commitment to the welfare of Indian citizens abroad.

Regarding the health and education sectors, Chatterjee said the prime minister expressed gratitude to Kuwait's leadership for supporting the Indian diaspora, which is approximately one million strong today, and the Kuwaiti side also recognized the critical role the Indian community plays in Kuwait's development.

"Pharmaceuticals is a crucial area of focus. Both sides have identified health and pharmaceuticals as key sectors for cooperation. This could involve investments from Kuwait in India or an expansion of the trade basket to boost pharmaceutical exports from India," he added. He revealed that to address sector-specific issues, separate working groups have been established, where leaders of both countries agreed that these groups would meet frequent-

ly to explore new areas of cooperation. "On manpower issues, a joint working group fo-

cuses on resolving key challenges faced by Indian workers in Kuwait. These efforts reflect the shared commitment to improving the welfare of the Indian community," Chatterjee concluded.

# Lebanon extends heartfelt thanks to Kuwait for ongoing relief efforts

# Medical aid collected by Lebanese Embassy's donation drive arrives in Beirut

BEIRUT: Lebanese Minister of Environment Dr Nasser Yassin expressed gratitude to Kuwait on Sunday for its continued humanitarian assistance to Lebanon amid the ongoing crisis caused by the Zionist entity's assault on the country. He acknowledged that Kuwait—its leadership, government, and people—has consistently supported Lebanon in these difficult circumstances. Yassin made this statement during the reception of a Kuwait Air Force plane at Beirut's Rafic Hariri International Airport, which was carrying medical aid collected by the Lebanese Embassy in Kuwait as part of a donation campaign to provide medicines to

In his remarks to the Kuwait News Agency (KUNA), Yassin praised Kuwait's humanitarian efforts, particularly its support during the recent Zionist aggression, which has led to the displacement of thousands of Lebanese citizens. He highlighted the importance of the aid, which includes medical supplies and humanitarian relief, with a focus on children, women, and pregnant women.

On behalf of the Lebanese government, Prime Minister Najib Mikati, and Health Minister Firass Abiad, Yassin extended his thanks to the Lebanese Embassy in Kuwait and the Lebanese community there for facilitating the donation. He emphasized that the support provided by Kuwait comes with the full

backing and solidarity of the Kuwaiti government. He also noted that, while there are still 25 refugee centers in operation, over 110,000 homes have been destroyed or damaged as a result of the Zionist occupation's attacks. Approximately 600,000 displaced people are in need of continued assistance.

Acting Charge d'Affaires of the Kuwaiti Embassy in Lebanon, Yassin

Al-Majed, informed KUNA that the plane carrying this shipment marks the seventh mission of the Kuwaiti Air Force, which has been transporting medical supplies from the Lebanese Embassy in Kuwait. Al-Majed explained that this shipment is part of the "Kuwait Seeks Your Well-being" campaign, a donation initiative organized by the Lebanese Embassy in Kuwait from December 6

to 8. The supplies will be handed over to Lebanon's Higher Relief Commission for distribution.

Kuwait has been providing ongoing support to Lebanon through an airlift program, facilitating the delivery of aid to address the needs resulting from the escalating conflict. Lebanon began implementing a ceasefire agreement with the Zionist entity on November

27, following military operations that began since October 2023 in the south and along the border with the occupied Palestinian territories. The conflict further expanded in September, when the Zionist entity launched extensive airstrikes on several Lebanese areas, resulting in significant loss of life and the displacement of hundreds of thousands of people. — KUNA

### Polio lab achieves 100% efficiency rating in 2024 WHO test

**KUWAIT:** The Ministry of Health announced that the Polio Reference Laboratory, part of the Public Health Department, has achieved a 100 percent efficiency rating in molecular PCR tests for 2024, as part of the World Health Organization's (WHO) proficiency testing program.

Dr Sarah Al-Qabandi, Head of the Public Health Laboratories Department, stated that this achievement underscores Kuwait's ongoing participation in global efforts to combat polio and reflects the country's commitment to maintaining high standards in public health. She noted that the rating is an indication of the laboratory's adherence to international diagnostic standards, ensuring the accuracy and reliability of test results in the fight against polio. Dr Al-Qabandi added that this result highlights the laboratory's ability to stay current with scientific developments and apply them effectively, supporting global efforts to eradicate polio.

She also acknowledged the support from Health Minister Dr Ahmad Al-Awadhi and Undersecretary Dr Abdulrahman Al-Mutairi in facilitating the necessary resources to maintain high standards in the laboratory. This support, she noted, is part of Kuwait's broader commitment to achieving global health goals. The Polio Reference Laboratory plays a key role in confirming polio cases and monitoring the spread of the virus through environmental and human samples. It also provides valuable data on virus strains, which inform vaccination and eradication strategies at the global level. Dr Al-Qabandi concluded by thanking all those

# Kuwait inflation up by 2.36%: KCSB

KUWAIT: Kuwait's consumer price index (inflation), on an annual basis, grew by 2.36 percent in November 2023, according to the Kuwait Central Statistical Bureau (KCSB). In a statement to KUNA on Sunday, KCSB said that the inflation rate rose by 0.15 percent in November compared to October 2023. The annual inflation increase was attributed to higher prices in key sectors, including clothing, food, education, and furnishings, while transportation costs saw a decline. The report also shows a 4.66 percent increase in the "food and beverages" group in November compared to the same month in 2023, the "Cig-

arette and Tobacco" group saw marginal annual increase of 0.15 percent. Prices of the "clothing" group rose by 5.54 percent, while the "Housing Services" group saw 0.57 percent increase, as well as "Household Furnishings" group recorded a 4.05 percent rise. The "Health" group saw a 4.20 percent increase, while the "Transportation" showed 1.89 percent decrease. Meanwhile, the "Communication" group recorded a 0.88 percent annual increase, and "Recreation and Culture" group rose by 2.42 percent. The "Education" group saw a 0.79 percent rise, with the "Restaurants and Hotels" group recording a 2.05 percent increase. The "Miscellaneous Goods and Services" group recorded a 5.54 percent annual rise. Excluding the "Food and Beverages" group, Kuwait's inflation rate rose by 1.87 percent in November 2023 on a yearly basis. — KUNA

# Pope again condemns 'cruelty' of Zionist entity's strikes on Gaza

# Pontiff laments children being machine-gunned, bombings of hospitals and schools

VATICAN CITY: Pope Francis doubled down Sunday on his condemnation of Zionist entity's strikes on the Gaza Strip, denouncing their "cruelty" for the second time in as many days despite Zionist entity accusing him of "double standards".

"And with pain I think of Gaza, of so much cruelty, of the children being machine-gunned, of the bombings of schools and hospitals. What cruelty," the pope said after his weekly Angelus prayer.

It comes a day after the 88-year-old Argentine lamented a Zionist entity airstrike that killed seven children from one family on Friday, according to Gaza's rescue agency. "Yesterday children were bombed. This is cruelty, this is not war," the pope told members of the government of the Holy See.

His remarks on Saturday prompted a sharp response from Zionist entity. A Zionist entity foreign

ministry spokesman described Francis's intervention as "particularly disappointing as they are disconnected from the true and factual context of Zionist entity's fight against jihadist terrorism—a multi-front war that was forced upon it starting on October 7." "Enough with the double standards and the singling out of the Jewish state and its people," he added.

"Cruelty is terrorists hiding behind children while trying to murder Zionist entity children; cruelty is holding 100 hostages for 442 days, including a baby and children, by terrorists and abusing them," the Zionist entity statement said. This was a reference to the Hamas Palestinian militants who attacked Zionist entity, killed many civilians and took hostages on October 7, 2023, triggering the Gaza war.

a Zionist entity air strike had killed 10 members of a family on Friday in the northern part of the territory, including seven children. It added that "the reported number of casualties resulting from the strike does not align with the information" the army held.

The mounting criticisms of Zionist entity appear to mark a change in the pope's tone in recent weeks. He has consistently called for peace since the beginning of the Zionist entity-Hamas war more than 14 months ago. But at the end of November, Francis denounced "the invader's arrogance" in Ukraine as the health ministry in Gaza. Those figures are taken

### Khamenei: Iran does not have or need regional proxy forces

TEHRAN: Iran's supreme leader denied Sunday that militant groups around the region functioned as Tehran's proxies, warning that if his country chose to "take action", it would not need them anyway. The remarks came after a year in which Iran-backed Hezbollah in Lebanon and Hamas in Gaza suffered heavy losses in wars with Zionist entity, and two weeks after the fall of Syrian president Bashar Al-Assad, who had been a key link in Tehran's so-called axis of resistance.

Another spoke of that axis, Yemen's Houthi rebels, have been repeatedly targeted by the United States and Britain over their attacks on Red Sea shipping lanes, launched in solidarity with Palestinians. "The Islamic Republic does not have a proxy force. Yemen fights because it has faith. Hezbollah fights because the power of faith draws it into the field. Hamas and (the Islamic) Jihad fight because their beliefs compel them to do so. They do not act as our proxy," supreme leader Ayatollah Ali Khamenei told a group of visitors in Tehran. "They (the Americans) keep saying that the Islamic Republic has lost its proxy forces in the region! This is another mistake," he said, adding: "If one day we want to take action, we do not need a proxy force.'

Earlier this month, Syrian rebels' lightning push to Damascus from their strongholds in the northwest ended the decades-long rule of Assad's family, which had been an ally of Tehran. Khamenei predicted "the emergence of a strong, honorable group" in Syria, saying the country's young men had "nothing to lose." — AFP

## **US** strikes Houthi targets in Yemen

SANAA: The United States on Saturday said it struck targets in Yemen's rebel-held capital, hours after a Houthi rebel missile wounded people in Zionist commercial hub Tel Aviv. The missile, which wounded 16 people, was the second such attack in

Among the targets of US forces was a rebel missile storage center and a "command-and-control facility," the US Central Command (CENTCOM) said in a statement. American forces also shot down multiple Houthi drones and an anti-ship cruise missile over the Red Sea, it said, shortly after the rebels' Al-Masirah TV channel reported that an "aggression" had targeted the Attan district of Sanaa, blaming Western forces. American and British forces have repeatedly struck rebel targets in Yemen this year in response to Houthi attacks on shipping in Red Sea-area waters vital to global trade.

Zionist entity has also previously struck back, including against ports and energy facilities, after rebel attacks against its territory. The Iran-backed Houthi rebels had claimed responsibility for the Saturday strike on Zionist entity, saying they directed a ballistic missile at "a military target of the Zionist entity enemy". The Zionist military said it failed to intercept the missile, forcing many residents to leave

## **Syrian Kurdish groups** on the back foot as power balance shifts

QAMISHLI, Syria/BEIRUT/ANKARA: With hostile Turkish-backed groups mobilizing against them in Syria's north, and Damascus ruled by a group friendly to Ankara, Syria's main Kurdish factions are on the back foot as they seek to preserve political gains carved out during 13 years of war. Part of a stateless ethnic group straddling Iraq, Iran, Turkey, Armenia and Syria, Kurds have so far been among the few winners of the Syrian conflict, controlling nearly a quarter of the country and leading a powerful armed group that is a key US ally in countering Islamic State. But the power balance has tilted against them since the Islamist group Hayat Tahrir Al-Sham (HTS) swept into Damascus this month, toppling President Bashar al-Assad, two analysts and a senior Western diplomat told Reuters.

The seismic change in Syria is expected to yield deeper Turkish sway just as a change of US administration is raising questions over how long Wash-

ington will keep backing the country's Kurdish-led forces. For Turkey, the Kurdish factions represent a national security threat. Ankara views them as an extension of the Kurdistan Workers Party (PKK), which has been waging an insurgency against the Turkish state since 1984 and is deemed a terrorist group by Turkey, the United States and other powers. The Syrian Kurdish groups "are in deep, deep trouble", said Aron Lund, a fellow at Century International, a US-based think tank.

"The balance has shifted fundamentally in Syria to the advantage of Turkey-backed or Turkey-aligned factions, and Turkey seems determined to exploit this to the fullest." The shift has been reflected in renewed fighting for control of the north, where Turkey-backed armed groups known as the Syrian National Army (SNA) have made military advances against the Kurdish-led Syrian Democratic Forces (SDF). Fanar Al-Kait, a senior official in the Kurdish-led regional administration, told Reuters that the ouster of Assad, whose Arab nationalist Baath Party oppressed Kurds for decades, presented a chance to stitch the fragmented country back together. He said the administration is ready for dialogue with Turkey, but the conflict in the north showed Ankara had "very bad intentions". "This will certainly push the region towards ... a new conflict," he added. — Reuters

# In ruined homes, Palestinians recall Assad regime's torture

## Only 8,160 people still clinging to life in the ruins of Damascus suburb

YARMUK, Syria: School lessons ended in Syria's biggest Palestinian refugee camp on October 18, 2012, judging by the date still chalked up on the board more than a decade later. "I am playing football"; "She is eating an apple"; "The boys are flying a kite" are written in English. Outside, the remaining children in the Damascus suburb of Yarmuk now play among the shattered ruins left by Syria's years of civil war. And as the kids chase through clouds of concrete dust, a torture victim—freed from jail this month when rebels toppled Bashar Al-Assad's government—hobbles through the rubble. "Since I left the prison until now, I sleep one or two hours max," 30-year-old Mahmud Khaled Ajaj told AFP.

Since 1957, Yarmuk has been a 2.1-square-kilometre (519-acre) "refugee camp" for Palestinians displaced by the founding of the modern Zionist entity. Like similar camps across the Middle East, over the decades it has become a dense urban community of multi-storey concrete housing blocks and businesses. According to the United Nations agency for Palestinian refugees, UNRWA, at the start of Syria's conflict in 2011 it was home to 160,000 registered refugees.

Rebellion, air strikes and a siege by government forces had devastated the area and left by September this year only 8,160 people still clinging to life in the ruins. With Assad's fall, more may return to reopen the damaged schools and mosques, but many like Ajaj will have terrible tales to tell of Assad's persecution. The former Free Syrian Army rebel fighter spent seven years in government custody, most of it at the notorious Saydnaya prison, and was only released when Assad's rule ended on December 8.

Ajaj's face is still paler than those of his neighbors, who are tanned from sitting outside ruined homes, and he walks awkwardly with a back brace after years of beatings. At one point, a prison doctor injected him in the spine and partly paralyzed him—he thinks on purpose—but what really haunts him was the hunger in his packed cell. "My neighbors and relatives know that I had little food, so they bring me food and fruit. I don't sleep if the food is not next to me. The bread, especially the bread," he said. "Yesterday, we had bread leftovers," he said, relishing being outside after his windowless group cell, and ignoring calls from his family to come to see a concerned aunt.

"My parents usually keep them for the birds to feed them. I told them: 'Give part of them to the birds and keep the rest for me. Even if they are dry or old I want them for me'." As Ajaj spoke to AFP, two passing Palestinian women paused to see if he had any news of missing relatives since Syria's ousted leader fled to Russia. The International Committee of the Red Cross has documented more than 35,000 cases of disappearances under Assad's rule.

Ajaj's ordeal was extreme, but the entire Yarmuk community has suffered on the frontline of Assad's war for survival, with Palestinians roped into fighting on both sides. The graveyard is cratered by air strikes. Families struggle to find the tombs of their dead amid the devastation. The scars left by mortar strikes dot empty basketball courts. Here and there, bulldozers are trying to shift rubble and the homeless try to scavenge re-usable debris. Some find work, but others struggle with trauma. Haitham Hassan al-Nada, a lively and wildeyed 28-year-old, invited an AFP reporter to run his



hand over lumps he says are bullets still lodged in his

His father, a local trader, supports him and his wife and two children after Assad's forces shot him and left him for dead as a deserter from the government side.

Nada told AFP he fled service because, as a Palestinian, he did not think he should have to serve in Syrian forces. He was caught and shot multiple times, he said.

"They called my mother after they 'killed' me, so she went to the airport road, towards Najha. They told her 'This is the dog's body, the deserter'," he said. "They didn't wash my body, and when she was kissing me to say goodbye before they buried me, suddenly and by God's power, it's unbelievable, I took a deep breath." After Nada was released from hospital, he returned to Yarmuk and found a scene of devastation. — AFP

# Angry questions in Germany after market attack

BERLIN: The German government faced growing questions Sunday about whether more could have been done to prevent the Christmas market car-ramming attack that killed five people and injured over 200. The Saudi suspect, 50-year-old psychiatrist and anti-Islam activist Taleb Al-Abdulmohsen, had made online death threats against German citizens and had a history of quarrelling with state authorities.

News magazine Der Spiegel, citing security sources, said the Saudi secret service had warned Germany's spy agency BND a year ago about a tweet in which Abdulmohsen threatened Germany would pay a "price" for its treatment of Saudi refugees. And in August Abdulmohsen wrote on social media: "Is there a path to justice in Germany without blowing up a German embassy or randomly slaughtering German citizens?... If anyone knows it, please let me know."

Die Welt daily reported, also citing security sources, that German state and federal police had carried out a "risk assessment" on Abdulmohsen last year but con-

cluded that he posed "no specific danger".

Chancellor Olaf Scholz has condemned the "terrible, insane" attack Friday in the city of Magdeburg and made a call for national unity amid high political tensions as Germany heads towards elections on February 23. But as German media dug into Abdulmohsen's past, and investigators gave away little, criticism rained down from the far-right and far-left parties already bitterly opposed to the Scholz government.

The far-right AfD's parliamentary head Bernd Baumann demanded Scholz call a special session of the Bundestag on the "desolate" security situation, arguing that "this is the least that we owe the victims".

And the head of the far-left BSW party, Sahra Wagenknecht, demanded that Interior Minister Nancy Faeser explain "why so many tips and warnings were ignored beforehand". Mass-circulation daily Bild asked: "Why did our police and intelligence services do nothing, even though they had the Saudi on their

# France awaits appointment of new government

**PARIS:** France awaited the appointment of a new government to lead the country out of its political crisis, with President Emmanuel Macron expected to hold talks with his new prime minister on Sunday.

France's Prime Minister Francois Bayrou, appointed on December 13, is racing to name a new government by Christmas. Macron, who earlier Sunday returned to Paris after a visit to cyclone-devastated Mayotte and East Africa, "definitely" planned to meet with Bayrou

Surgeons have worked around the clock, and one health worker told local media of "blood on the floor everywhere, people screaming, lots of painkillers being administered".

Police and prosecutors cautioned they were at the beginning of their investigation into what motivated the attack. Abdulmohsen, who was arrested at the scene next to the heavily damaged car, referred to himself as "a Saudi atheist" in an unpublished interview with AFP

News of Bayrou's cabinet picks could come as early as Sunday. The appointment of a new government was less likely to occur on Monday, when France will observe a national day of mourning for the victims of the disaster in the Indian Ocean archipelago of Mayotte, where at least 35 people were killed.

Bayrou, the 73-year-old head of the centrist Mo-Dem group, which is allied to Macron's party, pressed ahead with consultations over the weekend. "We are making progress," Marc Fesneau of the MoDem group said in an interview with La Tribune Dimanche, confirming that the full makeup of the government should be presented "in one go" and "before Christmas".

Bayrou's most immediate priority is to make sure his government survives a no-confidence vote and passes a budget for next year. He is hoping to bring in from 2022. As an activist, he helped women flee Gulf countries, and has in the past complained that German authorities were not doing enough to help them. At the same time, he has criticized the entry of other Muslim migrants and war refugees to Germany and backed conspiracy theories about the planned "Islamization" of Europe. A harsh critic of Germany's past welcome to many Muslim migrants, he wrote on the platform X that he wished ex-chancellor Angela Merkel could be jailed for life or executed.

In previous brushes with the law, he was first fined by a court in the city of Rostock in 2013 for "disturbing the public peace by threatening to commit crimes", according to Der Spiegel. This year he was investigated in Berlin for the "misuse of emergency calls" after arguing with police at a station in Berlin. He had been on sick leave since late October from his workplace, a clinic near Magdeburg that treats offenders with substance addiction problems.—AFP

# In Zionist-occupied south Syria, villagers feel abandoned

**QUNEITRA, Syria:** In the towns and villages of southern Syria that Zionist entity has occupied since the overthrow of longtime strongman Bashar Al-Assad, soldiers and residents size each other up from a distance.

The main street of the village of Jabata al-Khashab is largely deserted as a foot patrol of Zionist entity troops passes through it. Most villagers have cloistered themselves inside their homes since the troops arrived. A few look on through windows and from rooftops. It is the same story in nearby Baath City, named for the now suspended political party that ran Syria for more than 60 years until Assad's ouster by Islamist-led rebels earlier this month.

The town's main street has been heavily damaged by the passage of a column of Zionist tanks. The street furniture has been reduced to mangled metal, and broken off branches from roadside trees litter the highway.

"Look at all the destruction the Zionist entity tanks have caused to our streets and road signs," said 51-year-old doctor Arsan Arsan. "People around here are very angry about the Zionist entity incursion. We are for peace, but on condition that Zionist entity pulls back to the armistice line."

Zionist entity announced on December 8 that its troops were crossing the armistice line and were occupying the UN-patrolled buffer zone that has separated Zionist entity and Syrian forces on the strategic Golan Heights since 1974. The announcement, which was swiftly condemned by the United Nations, came the same day that the rebels entered Damascus.

Zionist entity said it was a defensive measure prompted by the security vacuum created by the Assad government's abrupt collapse. Zionist entity troops swiftly occupied much of the buffer zone, including the summit of Syria's highest peak, Mount Hermon. The Zionist entity military has since confirmed that its troops have also been operating beyond the buffer zone in other parts of southwest Syria.—AFP

France has been mired in deadlock since Macron gambled on snap elections this summer in the hopes of bolstering his authority. Bayrou has endured a tumultuous first week as premier, not least after facing a barrage of criticism for attending a town hall meeting in the Pyrenees city of Pau, of which he remains mayor, while Mayotte was grappling with the catastrophic aftermath of Cyclone Chido. —AFP

Bassal said that eight people including four children were killed in the attack on the school, which had been repurposed as a shelter for Palestinians displaced by the war. AFP images showed the damaged school building where mangled concrete slabs and iron beams lay strewn amid patches of blood. Bassal said in a statement that an overnight strike killed three people in Rafah, in the south. And a drone strike early on Sunday hit a car in Gaza City, killing four people, the spokesman added. The armed wings of Hamas and the allied Islamic Jihad group said they killed many Zionist soldiers. Meanwhile, the Zionist entity ordered the closure and evacuation on Sunday

of one of the last hospitals still partly functioning in a besieged area on the northern edge of the Gaza Strip, forcing medics to search for a way to bring hundreds of patients and staff to safety. The head of the Kamal Adwan hospital in Beit Lahia, Husam Abu Safiya, told Reuters that obeying the order to shut down was "next to impossible" because there were not enough ambulances to get patients out.

"We currently have nearly 400 civilians inside the hospital, including babies in the neonatal unit, whose lives depend on oxygen and incubators. We cannot evacuate these patients safely without assistance, equipment, and time," said Abu Safiya. "We are sending this message under heavy bombardment and direct targeting of the fuel tanks, which if hit will cause a large explosion and mass casualties of the civilians inside," he said. Abu Safiya said the military had ordered patients and staff to be evacuated to another hospital where conditions are even worse. — Agencies

needs to mobilize to help Syria get back on its feet and for the displaced people to return," he added.

Regional powerhouse Saudi Arabia is also in direct contact with Syria's new authorities, having supported the opposition to Assad for years during Syria's civil war, and will send a delegation to the country soon, Syria's ambassador in Riyadh said. During his meeting with visiting Lebanese Druze chiefs Walid and Taymur Jumblatt, Sharaa said Syria will no longer exert "negative interference in Lebanon at all".

He added that Damascus "respects Lebanon's sovereignty, the unity of its territories, the independence of its decisions and its security stability". Syria "will

stay at equal distance from all" in Lebanon, Sharaa added, acknowledging that Syria has been a "source of fear and anxiety" for the country.

Walid Jumblatt, long a fierce critic of Assad and his father Hafez who ruled Syria before him, arrived in Damascus Sunday at the head of a delegation of lawmakers from his parliamentary bloc and Druze religious figures. The Druze religious minority is spread across Lebanon, Syria and the Zionist entity. He met with Sharaa at the presidential palace, where the new Syrian leader wore a suit and tie instead of the olive-green military shirt he sported just days ago.

Walid Jumblatt accuses the former Syrian authorities of having assassinated his father in 1977 during Lebanon's civil war. The Syrian army entered Lebanon in 1976, only leaving in 2005 after enormous pressure following the assassination of former prime minister Rafic Hariri, a killing attributed to Damascus and its ally, Lebanon's Iran-backed Hezbollah group. — AFP

# Minorities fear targeted attacks in post-revolution Bangladesh

## Attacks on minorities on the rise after ouster of Hasina regime

DHAKA: For generations, the small Hindu temple outside the capital in Muslim-majority Bangladesh was a quiet place to pray—before arsonists ripped open its roof this month in the latest post-revolution unrest. It is only one of a string of attacks targeting religious minorities since a student-led uprising toppled long-time autocratic leader Sheikh Hasina in August.

"We don't feel safe," said Hindu devotee Swapna Ghosh in the village of Dhour, where attackers broke into the 50-year-old family temple to the goddess Lakshmi and set fire to its treasured idols on December 7. "My son saw the flames and doused them quickly," said temple custodian Ratan Kumar Ghosh, 55, describing how assailants knew to avoid security cameras, so they tore its tin roof open to enter.

"Otherwise, the temple—and us—would have been reduced to ashes." Hindus make up about eight percent of the mainly Muslim nation of 170 million people. In the chaotic days following Hasina's August 5 ouster there was a string of attacks on Hindus—seen by some as having backed her rule—as well as attacks on Muslim Sufi shrines by Islamist hardliners.

"Neither I, my forefathers or the villagers, regardless of their faith, have ever witnessed such communal attacks," temple guardian Ghosh told AFP. "These incidents break harmony and trust."

Hasina, 77, fled by helicopter to India, where she is hosted by old allies in New Delhi's Hindu-nationalist government, infuriating Bangladeshis determined that she face trial for alleged "mass murder". Attacks against Hindu temples are not new in Bangladesh,

and rights activist Abu Ahmed Faijul Kabir said the violence cannot be regarded out of context.

Under Hasina, Hindus had sought protection from the authorities. That meant her opponents viewed them as partisan loyalists. "If you analyze the past decade, there has not been a single year without attacks on minorities," Kabir said, from the Dhaka-based rights group Ain o Salish Kendra. This year, from January to November, the organization recorded 118 incidents of communal violence targeting Hindus. August saw a peak of 63 incidents, including two deaths. In November, there were seven incidents.

While that is significantly more than last year—when the group recorded 22 attacks on minorities and 43 incidents of vandalism—previous years were more violent. In 2014, one per-

son was killed, two women were raped, 255 injured, and 247 temples attacked. In 2016, seven people were killed.

"The situation has not worsened, but there's been no progress either," said businessman and Hindu devotee Chandan Saha, 59. Political rulers had repeatedly "used minorities as pawns", Saha added.

The caretaker government has urged calm and promised increased security, and accused Indian media of spreading disinformation about the status of Hindus in Bangladesh. Dhaka's interim government this month expressed shock at a call by a leading Indian politician—chief minister of India's West Bengal state Mamata Banerjee—to deploy UN peacekeepers. Hefazat-e-Islam, an association of Islamic seminaries, has led public protests against India, accusing New Delhi of a campaign aimed at "propa-

gating hate" against Bangladesh. India rejects the charges.

Religious relations have been turbulent, including widespread unrest in November in clashes between Hindu protesters and security forces. That was triggered by the killing of a lawyer during protests because bail was denied for an outspoken Hindu monk accused of allegedly disrespecting the Bangladeshi flag during a rally. Bangladeshi Islamist groups have been emboldened to take to the streets after years of suppression.

Muslim Sufi worshippers as well as members of the Baul mystic sect—branded heretics by some Islamists—have also been threatened. "There's been a wave of vandalism," said Syed Tarik, a devotee documenting such incidents. Muhammad Yunus, the 84-year-old Nobel Peace Prize winner appointed the country's "chief adviser", has called for dialogue between groups.

Critics say it is not enough. "To establish a peaceful country where all faiths coexist in harmony, the head of state must engage regularly with faith leaders to foster understanding," said Sukomal Barua, professor of religion at Dhaka University. Sumon Roy, founder of Bangladesh's association of Hindu lawyers, said members of the minority were treated as a bloc by political parties. "They have all used us as tools," Roy said, explaining that Hindus had been previously threatened both by Hasina's Awami League and its rival Bangladesh National Party.

"If we didn't support AL we faced threats, and the BNP blamed us for siding with the AL," he said. "This cycle needs to end." — AFP

# Four killed in helicopter crash at Turkish hospital

ANKARA: Four people were killed in southwest Turkey on Sunday when an ambulance helicopter collided with a hospital building and crashed into the ground. The helicopter was taking off from the Mugla Training and Research Hospital, carrying two pilots, a doctor and another medical worker, the health ministry said in a statement. Mugla's regional governor, Idris Akbiyik, told reporters the helicopter first hit the fourth floor of the hospital building before crashing into the ground. No one inside the building or on the ground was hurt. The cause of the accident, which took place during heavy fog, was being investigated. — AFP

# Detained employees of Afghan TV station freed

KABUL: Seven employees of the Afghan TV Arezo station detained earlier this month by the Taleban authorities have been released, a company source said Sunday. They were released in recent days on a written guarantee that they will not escape and will attend court, the source told AFP. "Our seven colleagues have been released on guarantee," said the employee on condition of anonymity, adding their case will be heard before a court next week after which a "final decision" is expected. — AFP

## Child marriage crackdown in India reaches 5,000 arrests

GUWAHATI: A crackdown on illegal child marriages in India's northeast has resulted in nearly 5,000 arrests, after 416 people were detained in the latest police sweep, a minister said Sunday. "We will continue to take bold steps to end this social evil," Himanta Biswa Sarma, chief minister of Assam state, said in a statement. "Assam continues its fight against child marriage," he added, saying raids have been carried out overnight and that those arrested would be produced in court on Sunday. — AFP

# Trump taps TV apprentice as special envoy to UK

WASHINGTON: US President-elect Donald Trump announced Saturday he has appointed television executive Mark Burnett, who produced the tycoon's reality show "The Apprentice," as special envoy to the United Kingdom, one of Washington's closest allies. "With a distinguished career in television production and business, Mark brings a unique blend of diplomatic acumen and international recognition to this important role," the Republican leader posted on his social media platform Truth Social. — AFP

# Calls for more safety measures after Croatia school stabbings

ZAGREB: Teachers and parents on Saturday condemned the lack of security at schools in Croatia, a day after a stabbing spree in the Croatian capital Zagreb in which a seven-year-old was killed and four others wounded. They have called for more to be done to ensure the safety of students and staff, including stationing guards in schools. On Friday morning, a 19-year-old man entered Precko primary school and stabbed five people, injuring himself before being arrested. — AFP

# Venezuela frees journalist detained during protests

CARACAS: Venezuelan authorities released a journalist accused of terrorism and arrested in the aftermath of President Nicolas Maduro's disputed July reelection, the country's press union announced Saturday. Ana Carolina Guaita, arrested on August 2, is a reporter for La Patilla, an outlet that is often critical of the government. "Ana was imprisoned for more than four months" in La Guaira, a coastal city north of the capital Caracas, the National Union of Press Workers said in a post on social media. — AFP

# Chad's leader Deby elevated to marshal

N'DJAMENA, Chad: Chad's leader General Mahamat Idriss Deby Itno was in an official ceremony Saturday promoted to marshal, the same title held by his late father and former president. The National Transition Council, dominated by the ruling Patriotic Salvation Movement (MPS), had already overwhelmingly voted in favor of elevating Deby to marshal and held a ceremony at the presidential palace to mark the occasion. Deby was "elevated to the designation of marshal for his services rendered to the nation and numerous military victories won inside and outside the country", according to a resolution adopted three weeks ahead of next weekend's legislative and local elections. — AFP

## Malaysia agrees to resume hunt for flight MH370

KUALA LUMPUR: Malaysia has agreed to resume the search for the wreckage of missing Malaysia Airlines Flight MH370, its transport minister said on Friday, more than 10 years after it disappeared in one of the world's greatest aviation mysteries. Flight MH370, a Boeing 777 carrying 227 passengers and 12 crew, vanished en route from Kuala Lumpur to Beijing on March 8, 2014.

"Our responsibility and obligation and commitment is to the next of kin," Transport Minister Anthony Loke told a press conference. "We hope this time will be positive, that the wreckage will be found and give closure to the families." Jiang Hui, whose mother was a MH370 passenger, welcomed the decision to resume the search, but said the process to get there had taken too long and would be better if more players could take part.

"We hope the Malaysian government can adopt a more open approach, such as offering a public reward system where anyone can participate in the search," he said. MH370's last transmission was about 40 minutes after it took off from Kuala Lumpur for Beijing. The pilots signed off as the plane entered Vietnamese air space over the Gulf of Thailand and soon after its transponder was turned off.

Military radar showed the plane left its flight path to fly back over northern Malaysia then out into the Andaman Sea before turning south, then all contact was lost. Debris, some confirmed and some believed to be from the aircraft, has since washed up along the coast of Africa and on islands in the Indian Ocean.


## China takes steps against Canada bodies over rights

BEIJING: China said on Sunday it was taking countermeasures against two Canadian institutions and 20 people involved in human rights issues concerning the Uyghurs and Tibet. The measures, which took effect on Saturday, include asset freezes and bans on entry and the targets include Canada's Uyghur Rights Advocacy Project and the Canada-Tibet Committee, China's foreign ministry announces on its website. Rights groups accuse Beijing of widespread abuses of Uyghurs, a mainly Muslim ethnic minority that numbers around 10 million in the western region of Xinjiang, including the mass use of forced labor in camps. Beijing denies any abuses

China seized control of Tibet in 1950 in what it describes as a "peaceful liberation" from feudalistic serfdom. International human rights groups and exiles, however, have routinely condemned what they call China's oppressive rule in Tibetan areas. For the two institutions, China said it is freezing their "movable property, immovable property and other types of property within the territory of China". It is freezing the property in China of 15 people in the Uyghur institution and five on the Tibet committee, banning them from entering China, including Hong Kong and Macau.

Calls to the Canadian embassy in Beijing went unanswered. Reuters did not receive an immediate response from the rights groups or Global Affairs Canada. — Reuters

# Toll in Nigeria food queue stampedes rises to 32

**LAGOS:** Nigerian police on Sunday raised the total death toll from two stampedes at food distribution centers to 32, as the country grappled with a spate of deadly crowd crushes at charity events.

Twenty-two people were killed on Saturday as people queued outside a center distributing rice in the southern town of Okija, police said, after previously warning "many" were dead as a result of the incident. And on the same day a separate stampede outside a church giving food to the "vulnerable and elderly" in the capital Abuja killed at least 10 people, prompting Nigeria's President Bola Tinubu to clear his schedule in the wake of the twin tragedies.

# 'Finally, we made it!': Ho Chi Minh City celebrates first metro

HO CHI MINH CITY: Thousands of selfie-taking Ho Chi Minh City residents crammed into train carriages Sunday as the traffic-clogged business hub celebrated the opening of its first-ever metro line after years of delays. Huge queues spilled out of every station along the \$1.7 billion line that runs almost 20 kilometers (12 miles) from the city centre—with women in traditional "ao dai" dress, soldiers in uniform and couples clutching young children waiting excitedly to board.

"I know it (the project) is late, but I still feel so very honored and proud to be among the first on this metro," said office worker Nguyen Nhu Huyen after snatching a selfie in her jam-packed train car.

"Our city is now on par with the other big cities of the world," she said. It took 17 years for Vietnam's commercial capital to reach this point. The project, funded largely by Japanese government loans, was first approved in 2007 and slated to cost just \$668 million.

When construction began in 2012, authorities promised the line would be up and running in just five years. But as delays mounted, cars and motor-bikes multiplied in the city of nine million people, making the metropolis hugely congested, increasingly polluted and time-consuming to navigate.

The metro "meets the growing travel needs of residents and contributes to reducing traffic congestion and environmental pollution", the city's deputy mayor Bui Xuan Cuong said. Cuong admitted authorities had to overcome "countless hurdles" to get

the project over the line.

According to state media reports, the metro was late because of "slow capital disbursement, unexpected technical problems, personnel difficulties and the COVID-19 pandemic". "The delays and cost overruns have been frustrating," said professor Vu Minh Hoang at Fulbright University Vietnam, who warned that with just 14 station stops, the line's "impact in alleviating traffic will be limited in the short run".

However, it is still a "historic achievement for the city's urban development", he added. With lessons learnt, "the construction of future lines will be increasingly easier, faster, and more cost-efficient",

Hoang told AFP. Back on the train, 84-year-old war veteran Vu Thanh told AFP he was happy to experience below ground in a more positive way after spending three years fighting American troops in the city's famous Cu Chi tunnels, an enormous underground network.

"It feels so different from the underground experience I had years ago during the war. It's so bright and nice here," he said. Reflecting on the delays, he added: "We built the tunnels to hide from our enemies in the past, so building a tunnel for a train should not be that hard," he added.

# India court rejects petition against contract to Adani

MUMBAI: An Indian court on Friday dismissed a petition challenging the award of a contract to Adani Group to revamp one of Asia's largest slums in Mumbai, clearing one of the main legal challenges to the ambitious project. The group led by billionaire Gautam Adani won a \$619 million bid in 2023 to convert the Dharavi slum into a modern city hub, but Dubai-based SecLink Technologies Corporation, winner of a previous tender for the slum revamp, challenged the award of the contract to Adani in a petition in the Bombay High Court in July 2023.

The 240 hectare (594 acre) slum, known as Asia's densest and featured in Danny Boyle's Oscar-winning 2008 movie "Slumdog Millionaire", stands in contrast to India's development boom with its open sewers and shared toilets, close to Mumbai's international airport and business district. "The grounds urged in support of the petition lack force and accordingly, the challenge ... fails," the Bombay High Court concluded in the order.

SecLink will appeal against the ruling in the Supreme Court, Suraj Iyer, a lawyer from Ganesh and Co representing SecLink, told Reuters. SecLink had alleged in its petition that Maharashtra state improperly cancelled an original 2018 tender for the Dharavi redevelopment, for which SecLink had bid highest, and restarted the process with new terms in 2022 so that Adani could win. SecLink had also received a Mumbai court's permission to add Adani Group to its lawsuit last year in an ongoing petition against the Maharashtra government. — Reuters

## EU deal and Trump tariff threats boost Mercosur trade talks

**BRASILIA:** Brazil expects the South American trade bloc Mercosur to speed up more free trade negotiations after clinching a deal with the European Union, as the threat of US tariffs when Donald Trump takes office as president forces countries to diversify their options for exports, diplomats say.

Topping the list of Mercosur's most likely new trade pacts next year are deals with the European Free Trade Association of four non-EU nations and with the United Arab Emirates, the diplomats said on condition of anonymity. Singapore also reached an agreement with Mercosur this year that is being translated so it can be sent to the country's president and lawmakers for ratification, a diplomat said.

'This is undoubtedly a good time for the Mercosur bloc to move forward with other negotiations. Some countries have already approached us interested in expanding negotiations," a Brazilian official said. If the pacts materialize, they would mark a revival for the trade bloc. Mercosur includes South America's two largest economies, Brazil and Argentina, but has long suffered from internal divisions and skepticism about its effectiveness. Uruguay and Paraguay are also founding members of Mercosur, which Bolivia joined this year. Norway, one of the non-EU members that is part of the EFTA group, confirmed it is keen to sign an EFTA-Mercosur deal in the first half of 2025. "A Free Trade Agreement between Mercosur and the EFTA states is a high priority for Norway. I hope to see the negotiations concluded as soon as

possible," Norwegian Minister of Trade and Industry, Cecilie Myrseth, said in a message to Reuters.

"With the trade talks between EU and Mercosur now concluded, it should be possible for EFTA and Mercosur to shortly come to an agreement on the very few outstanding issues," she added. For its part, UAE hopes to deepen commerce with the Mercosur bloc "within the next year" with an agreement that would open opportunities for businesses across the Middle East and Latin America, its Trade Minister Thani Al Zeyoudi said in a statement to Reuters.

Threats of fresh tariffs from Trump, who takes office in a month's time, have also forced the biggest US trade partners to consider their alternatives, even as their priority is defending the US-Mexico-Canada Agreement on trade. Although Mexico expects a successful review of the USMCA in 2026, it has also begun to explore other options, which include deepening its trade agreement with Mercosur, according to two Mexican government sources. — Reuters

## Natural gas demand from US LNG export plants set to decline

NEW YORK/HOUSTON: Demand for US natural gas to produce liquefied natural gas (LNG) for export this year is headed for its first decline since the country started exporting the super-chilled fuel from the lower 48 states eight years ago. The US is the world's largest exporter of the superchilled gas and a key provider of gas to Europe in the wake of Russia's invasion of Ukraine. Natural gas prices have remained relatively high in Europe as the expected US growth in output in 2024 has not materialized and the continent is bracing for a new gas price shock as colder winter weather depletes stocks.

Natural gas drillers have profited from robust demand from LNG export plants especially since sanctions on Russian gas boosted European demand for US LNG. Producers have indexed some output to global LNG prices, so slowing flows of gas to LNG export plants means they have less incentive to grow output. Since 2016, when Cheniere Energy's Sabine Pass export plant in Louisiana shipped its first cargo, feedgas to the plants increased every year, even in 2020 when lockdowns during the COVID-19 pandemic slashed demand for energy. LNG plant outages and delays in construction of new plants have reduced demand so far this year, LSEG data showed.

With just 11 days left in 2024, the amount of gas flowing to the eight big US LNG export plants eased to an average of 13.0 billion cubic feet per day (bcfd) from an average of 13.1 bcfd in 2023, LSEG data showed. One billion cubic feet of gas can supply about 5 million US homes for a day.

The annual decline in demand is projected even though the first new LNG export facility since 2022, Venture Global LNG's 2.6-bcfd Plaquemines export plant in Louisiana, started producing LNG over the past week or so. But the industry expects this year's decline to be just a blip, with US LNG capacity seen more than doubling over the next four years. New plants coming online should lift capacity from around 13.8 bcfd now to 17.8 bcfd next year, 20.3 bcfd in 2026, 22.0 bcfd in 2027 and 24.2 bcfd in 2028.

#### Plant outages

Among the biggest factors in this year's fall in LNG feedgas demand were numerous outages at Freeport LNG's 2.1-bcfd plant in Texas. At least one of the plant's three liquefaction trains shut every month in 2024, except October, with some of those outages lasting several weeks, according to LSEG data. Freeport LNG is the second largest US LNG producer, but Venture Global's Plaquemines will probably move into second place once it is fully operating.

Several large LNG projects under construction on the US Gulf Coast have faced cost overruns due to labor shortages and supply chain challenges. Venture Global's Plaquemines is over budget by \$2.3 billion even though it has remained on schedule. The 2.4-bcfd Golden Pass plant in Texas, owned by Exxon Mobil and QatarEnergy, is more than \$2 billion over budget and behind schedule. Golden Pass was expected to begin producing its first LNG in 2024 but that was pushed back to late 2025 after its main contractor, Żachry Holdings, filed for bankruptcy. Forecasts call for feedgas supplies to US export facilities to rise by an average of around 2 bcfd next year, a significant step up, said Alex Munton, director of global gas and LNG research at consulting firm Rapidan Energy Group. "We see only limited downside given tight global market conditions, with performance issues at Freeport the main risk," Munton said. — Reuters

# Global markets digest mixed signals on growth and policy

# US economy records 3.1% growth in Q3 • UK manufacturing falters

**KUWAIT:** In the week ending on the 22nd of December, global markets witnessed major developments, as economic data continues to shape the economic outlook. In the US, inflation, as measured by core PCE, increased by 0.1 percent month-overmonth and 2.8 percent year-over-year in November, maintaining stable inflation expectations. Personal spending rose 0.4 percent, while disposable income grew 0.3 percent. The US dollar showed resilience, reaching near 108.54 on the DXY, supported by a hawkish cut by the Federal Reserve and strong economic growth as GDP rose 3.1 percent. Treasury yields rose, with the 10Y yield climbing past 4.5 percent. Equities sold off, as the S&P 500 fell 3.0 percent, the Nasdaq dropped 3.6 percent. In Europe, the ECB confirmed a 0.25 percent rate cut as inflation fears abated, with the euro reaching

While in the UK, the Bank of England has decided to keep policy rates unchanged at 4.75 percent as inflation is proving to be persistent at 2.6 percent y/y. Meanwhile, Japan's yen depreciated to 157.9 against the US dollar after dovish central bank commentary. Commodities saw contrasting moves, with gold reaching around \$2,600 per ounce, while Brent crude slipped to \$72 per barrel, weighed by demand concerns. Global markets continue to react to central bank recalibrations, reflecting cautious optimism tempered by persistent economic challenges.

#### US private sector expands

The S&P Global Flash US Composite PMI rose to 56.6 in December 2024, up from 54.9 in November, marking the strongest private sector growth since March 2022. The services sector surged to 58.5 (highest since October 2021), while manufacturing fell further to 48.3 (a three-month low). The increase was driven by strengthening demand, with new orders rising at their fastest pace since April 2022 and employment growing for the first time in five months. Inflationary pressures eased overall, despite rising input costs in manufacturing. Business optimism reached a two-and-a-half year high, supported by positive expectations under the incoming Trump administration.

US retail sales rose by 0.7 percent month-on-month, surpassing the forecasted 0.6 percent. Octo-

ber's figure was also revised upward to 0.5 percent. However, core sales, excluding automotive and gas, grew only 0.2 percent, consistent with October but below predictions. Industrial production fell by 0.1 percent, marking a third consecutive decline but improving on the previous month's 0.4 percent drop. Manufacturing showed a modest recovery, rising 0.2 percent after a 0.7 percent contraction in October.

The Federal Reserve reduced its benchmark interest rate by 25 bps to a range of 4.25-4.5 percent, marking the third consecutive cut in its current cycle. However, the FOMC signaled a slower pace of easing next year, with policymakers projecting only two quarter-point rate cuts for 2025 instead of the three previously expected by some economists. Inflation estimates were revised higher, reflecting increased concerns about price stability, whilst Fed officials' neutral rate estimate rose to 3 percent. Chair Jerome Powell highlighted that the policy stance is now "significantly less restrictive", allowing for cautious adjustments as inflation trends remain "sideways" and labor market risks had "diminished".

#### US economy grows 3.1% in Q3

The US economy grew at an annualized rate of 3.1 percent in Q3 2024, up from the second estimate of 2.8 percent and exceeding Q2's 3 percent growth, marking the strongest expansion this year. Personal spending rose 3.7 percent, the fastest since Q1 2023, driven by a 5.6 percent increase in goods consumption and strong service spending (2.8 percent). Fixed investment grew 2.1 percent, with equipment investment surging 10.8 percent, while structures (-5 percent) and residential investment (-4.3 percent) declined. Government spending increased 5.1 percent, and net trade contributed less negatively, with exports and imports revised higher at 9.6 percent and 10.7 percent respectively.

### Consumer spending Personal consumption expenditures (PCE) rose

WTD %

by 0.4 percent in November 2024, supported by a 0.7 percent increase in goods spending, driven by robust demand for motor vehicles and recreational products. Services spending grew modestly by 0.1 percent, with healthcare and recreation services leading the gains. The PCE price index increased by 0.1 percent month-over-month, maintaining a steady

annual rate of 2.4 percent. Core PCE, excluding food and energy, also rose by 0.1 percent month-overmonth and 2.8 percent year-over-year. Personal income and disposable income both increased by 0.3 percent, signaling resilience in consumer activity amid stable inflationary pressures. The US dollar index closed the week at 107.82.

#### Canada CPI eases

Canada's inflation eased to 1.9 percent year-on-year in November, less than the expected 2 percent. Core inflation remained flat at 0.0 percent month-on-month, down from 0.4 percent previously. This marks further progress toward the central bank's target rate, supporting its current stance on monetary easing. Where markets are currently pricing 52 percent probability of a cut in their upcoming meeting in January. The USD/CAD pair closed the week at 1.4368

#### Eurozone mixed

The HCOB Flash Eurozone PMI for December 2024 reported a composite output index of 49.5, below the neutral 50 mark but slightly higher than November's 48.3. Manufacturing PMI fell to 44.5, marking a 32-month low, driven by sharp declines in Germany and France. In contrast, the services PMI rose to 51.4, a two-month high, indicating modest growth in services activity, particularly in parts of Southern Europe. Persistent drops in new orders and export demand remain key challenges, with Germany and France's weakness overshadowing stronger performances from other eurozone countries.

In a speech delivered in Vilnius, ECB President Christine Lagarde reaffirmed the bank's commitment to further rate cuts, provided economic data continues to align with projections. Lagarde emphasized that inflation, which stood at around 2.3 percent in November, is steadily converging toward the ECB's 2 percent target. Recent monetary policy adjustments have already included four rate cuts this year, with the ECB's deposit rate currently at 3 percent. The ECB's deliberate shift in language, removing the term "sufficiently restrictive," has signaled a pivot to a more accommodative stance. As the ECB aims to lower rates gradually to a neutral level of 1.75 percent-2.5 percent to support the eurozone economy while addressing structural challenges and ensuring

#### UK manufacturing falters

The S&P Global Flash UK Manufacturing PMI fell to 47.3 in December 2024, down from 48 in November, marking the sharpest contraction in 11 months. Production declined for the second consecutive month, and new orders saw a steep drop due to customer destocking and weaker demand from European clients, leading to the fastest fall in export sales since October 2023. Backlogs decreased, while purchasing prices rose at the fastest pace since January 2023.

#### UK employment sees mixed trends

The UK's payroll data for November 2024 showed a decline of 35,000 employees, a 0.1 percent drop from the previous month, while rising 76,000 (0.3 percent) compared to the same period last year. Total payrolled employees stood at 30.4 million. Employment rates for those aged 16 to 64 remained steady at 74.9 percent for August to October, while unemployment climbed slightly to 4.3 percent. Job vacancies continued their downward trend, decreasing by 31,000 to 818,000, marking the 29th consecutive quarterly drop. Earnings growth held strong, with total pay rising 5.2 percent annually, translating to a 2.2 percent increase in real terms after inflation adjustments.

#### China holds rates steady

China's one-year loan prime rate (LPR) remained unchanged at 3.1 percent in December 2024, while the five-year LPR, used for mortgage pricing, held at 3.6 percent. Despite the unchanged rates this month, the LPR has seen cuts totaling 35 and 60 basis points for the one-year and five-year rates, respectively, over the year. Analysts believe the current reduced rates will ease financial burdens on businesses and households, stimulating investment, boosting purchasing power, and supporting economic recovery. The USD/CNY currency pair closed the week at 7.2961.

# Argentina's dollar craze cools under greenback-loving Milei

**BUENOS AIRES:** "Dollars, selling dollars!" a money changer shouts to people streaming past in Buenos Aires' financial district. But there are no takers as Argentina's decades-long dollar craze finally shows signs of cooling.

Over years of high inflation and currency controls, Argentines lined up to trade their increasingly worthless pesos for dollars, propelling the US currency to a record 1,500 pesos on the black market on July 12. But as the inflation rate slows under cost-cutting President Javier Milei — from 25.5 percent in December 2023 to 2.4 percent in November 2024 -- the clamor for dollars has quieted, even after Milei pledged on the campaign trail last year to swap the peso for the greenback.

Experts cite several reasons for the fall in demand for dollars. Milei's biting austerity measures have cratered Argentines' purchasing power, shattering their ability to save in hard American cash—the preferred way to create a nest egg. The experts also point to a tax amnesty launched by the government in July to encourage Argentines to deposit dollars that have been stashed under mattresses and floorboards, or tucked in safety-deposit boxes and offshore accounts.

The scheme has brought in \$20 billion in deposits so far, helping ease a dollar shortage.

Meanwhile, the central bank has taken advantage of a stronger peso to build up its dollar reserves from \$21 billion when Milei took power a year ago to \$32 billion. In a sign of how times have changed, the black market dollar rate, which at one point was double the official rate, is now nearly aligned with the official rate, at a little over 1,000 pesos to the greenback.

Oscar, one of Buenos Aires' many black-market money changers—they are dubbed "arbolitos," or little trees, because they plant themselves in the street offering green notes—told AFP that business has slowed dramatically. "Up to a year ago I was conducting around 40 transactions in a sixhour period; now I have four, at most, in 10 hours," said Oscar, who works openly near the presidential palace but declined to give his full name due to the illegal nature of his work.

These days, his only customers for dollars are Bolivian and Peruvian migrant workers, who change small amounts to send home. In scenes unthinkable just months ago, most of his Argentine customers are now offloading dollars—because they need more pesos to pay bills that have soared since Milei took office and slashed energy and transport subsidies. Retirees "walk the whole city center looking for the best deal" for pesos, Oscar said.

In the back room of her estate agency in the middle-class Caballito neighborhood, where she trades dollars on the black market, Fabiana is also struggling. To compete, she offers home delivery service for well-off Argentines buying dollars to go on holiday abroad or for people cashing in savings in dollars, some of them "stained from having been kept under the mattress."

Money-changing is merely a source of "petty cash" these days, Fabiana said. Most of her business comes from property sales, which are booming thanks to the amnesty, which also covers investments in real estate projects and certain property purchases.— AFP

WASHINGTON: US consumer spending increased in November amid strong demand for a range of goods and services, underscoring the economy's resilience, which saw the Federal Reserve this week projecting fewer interest rate cuts in 2025 than it had in September. There was also good news on inflation last month after a series of warmer readings. The report from the Commerce Department on Friday showed moderate monthly rises in prices, with a measure of underlying inflation posting its smallest gain in six months. Nonetheless, the annual increase in core inflation, excluding food and energy, remained stubbornly well above the US central bank's 2 percent target.

There are also worries that plans by President-elect Donald Trump's incoming administration to cut taxes, impose or raise tariffs on imports and deport millions of undocumented immigrants would stoke inflation. "The

# Investors hope for 'Santa Claus' rally as stocks lose steam

**Wall St Week Ahead** 

**NEW YORK:** With December so far delivering Scrooge-like returns in an otherwise stellar year for US stocks, investors hope the tail end of 2024 offers some holiday cheer, but warn of potential headwinds.

The benchmark S&P 500 is up more than 23 percent for 2024, even after a major stumble this week, and Wall Street has historically often enjoyed a strong annual close. Since 1969, the last five trading days of the year combined with the first two of the following year have yielded an average S&P 500 gain of 1.3 percent, a period known as the "Santa Claus Rally," according to the Stock Trader's Almanac. But this year, there are signs Santa Claus may disappoint.

The S&P 500 on Wednesday suffered its biggest one-day drop since August after the Federal Reserve caught investors off guard by signaling fewer-than-expected interest rate cuts in 2025.

The market also looks less healthy beneath the surface: Eight of the 11 S&P 500 sectors are in negative territory for December, while the equal-weight S&P 500, a proxy for the average index stock, is down 7 percent. Congress also dealt the markets a year-end curveball on Thursday evening, rejecting a package that would have averted a partial government shutdown that could affect a range of services. "I think investors are somewhat concerned about the potential for a government shutdown, particularly if one were to linger through the weekend," said Anthony Saglimbene, Chief Market Strategist at Ameriprise Financial.

Another worry for stocks as the year winds down is rising Treasury yields, said Matt Maley, chief market strategist at asset manager Miller Tabak. Benchmark 10-year yields hit 4.55 percent on Thursday following the Fed meeting, their highest level in over six months. With the S&P 500 trading at 21.6 times forward earnings estimates, well above its 15.8 historical average, according to LSEG Datastream, that jump in yields will put more pressure on equity valuations. "We're ending the year with people finally facing the reality that the stock market is extremely expensive and the Fed is not going to be as accom-

### Russia central bank holds off rate hike after criticism

MOSCOW: Russia's central bank kept interest rates at 21 percent on Friday despite surging inflation, a surprise decision that follows criticism from the country's political and business elite over the effects of higher borrowing costs on the economy. Moscow has struggled to rein in inflation, which has soared during the Kremlin's almost three-year offensive in Ukraine.

Prices are rising fast across the Russian economy, pushed up by massive government spending on the military campaign and deep labor shortages. Most economists had expected a rate hike to be announced Friday, but the bank appeared to have heeded harsh criticism by Russia's business and political establishment, most of which does not want to see them rise further.

The "unexpected" decision could show the

economy continues to grow from strong consumer demand as income growth and the wealth effect from higher portfolio values give consumers capacity to spend," said Jeffrey Roach, chief economist at LPL Financial. "Inflation was more benign than expected but the stickiness of some categories supports the Fed's hesitancy to materially lower rates next year."

Consumer spending, which accounts for more than two-thirds of US economic activity, rose 0.4 percent last month after a downwardly revised 0.3 percent gain in October, the Commerce Department's Bureau of Economic Analysis said. Economists polled by Reuters had forecast consumer spending advancing 0.5 percent after a previously reported 0.4 percent rise in October.

The nearly broad-based increase in spending was led by new motor vehicles, likely in part as households replaced vehicles damaged during Hurricanes Helene and Milton. That accounted for the bulk of the 0.8 percent rebound in goods outlays. Spending on recreational goods and vehicles also rose as did outlays on financial services and insurance, mostly charges, fees and commissions. There was also increased spending on recreation services, healthcare, clothing and footwear, furniture as well as housing and utilities. Spending at restaurants and bars as well



modative as they had been thinking," Maley said. Still, this week's pullback could be positive because it eliminated some of the frothy sentiment in equities, "setting up the market for a rebound," said Chuck Carlson, chief executive officer at Horizon Investment Services. "If there is further follow through on the downside, that could be a little bit more dangerous to the bullish trend."

The Santa Claus period, when combined with the following first five trading days of January and the performance of January overall, is a harbinger for the year: when those three indicators are positive, the year has ended higher more than 90 percent of the time in the past 50 years, according to the Almanac. But that seasonal strength may have come early this year, given the S&P 500 posted a blockbuster 5.7 percent return in November driven by Donald Trump's Nov 5 presidential election victory, Carlson said.

"It's been a strong year for the market, and you can make an argument that we kind of got the year-end rally in November instead of December," Carlson said. Signs that the market rally is increasingly

central bank is "putting on a brave face amid unsustainable political pressure ", said Alexander Kolyandr, a researcher at the US-based Center for European Policy Analysis. "The test for the regulator's independence—so far preserved by the Kremlin—will come at the next rate meeting," he told AFP.

This is set to be held on February 14, days before the third anniversary of Moscow's Ukraine offensive. At his year-end press conference on Thursday, President Vladimir Putin had said he hoped the central bank would make a "balanced" decision that would "meet the demands of today". Lending growth rates fell sharply in November and the central bank needs time to see if this trend becomes long-lasting, Nabiullina said.

When adjusted for inflation, consumer spending rose 0.3 percent after edging up 0.1 percent in October. The so-called real consumer spending is running at an annualized rate of 3.1 percent in the first two months of the fourth quarter. "That will lay the foundation for another very solid GDP number for the fourth quarter," said Lou Crandall, chief economist at Wrightson ICAP.

Consumer spending surged at a 3.7 percent pace in the third quarter, the fastest in 1-1/2 years, helping to propel the economy to a 3.1 percent growth rate following a 3.0 percent pace of expansion in the April-June quarter. The Atlanta Fed is forecasting gross domestic product increasing at a 3.1 percent rate in the fourth quarter. Fed Chair Jerome Powell on Wednesday described the economy as having "just been remarkable," adding "I feel very good about ... the performance of the economy and we want to keep that going." The central bank on Wednesday cut its benchmark overnight interest rate by 25 basis points to the 4.25 percent-4.50 percent range. It forecast only two rate reductions in 2025, in a nod to the economy's continued resilience and still-high inflation.

narrow could also spoil any holiday cheer.

A number of megacap stocks have performed well in December, including Tesla and Alphabet, which are up 26 percent and more than 12 percent respectively so far this month. Broadcom shares are up 35 percent for December after the company this month predicted booming demand for its custom artificial intelligence chips, pushing its market value over \$1 trillion.

But such gains are increasingly sparse. The number of S&P 500 components that declined outpaced those that advanced for 13 straight sessions as of Wednesday, the longest such losing streak in LSEG data that stretches back to 2012. In another worrisome sign, the percentage of S&P 500 stocks trading above their 200-day moving averages declined to 56 percent as of Wednesday, a low for the year, according to Adam Turnquist, chief technical strategist for LPL Financial.

"We recommend waiting for support to be established and for momentum to improve before stepping up to buy the dip," Turnquist said in a note following Wednesday's selloff. — Reuters

"Therefore we paused raising the interest rate" and at the next meeting "will assess the expediency of raising it further", she said. Annual inflation is estimated to have increased to 9.5 percent as of December 16, more than twice the government's four-percent target.

The Russian economy is facing a cocktail of headwinds as its offensive on Ukraine nears the three-year mark. The central bank has predicted a sharp slowdown in growth next year—to below 1.5 percent, from over 3.5 percent this year. Alongside high inflation and labor shortages, Western sanctions have sent the value of the ruble plunging and growth is set to slow next year. That has raised concerns about the possibility Russia could see a period of stagflation—low growth and high interest rates—something economists see as tricky for policy makers to deal with.

High interest rates have so far had only limited impact in bringing down prices, but have triggered a backlash among borrowers and businesses. "The economy can't survive like this for long," German Gref, CEO of Russia's largest lender, state-run Sberbank, said this month. Even Putin's closest allies have complained. — AFP

# 'Don't mess with our mince pies,' some Brits plead

very Christmas, Brits devour about 800 million mince pies, but moves to jazz up the festive sweet treats made of dried fruit and pastry are stirring anger among purists. It is the source of some puzzlement to the outside world that British mince pies have not in fact been filled with minced meat for centuries. Instead, the mincemeat encased in an individual shortcrust pastry pie is a mixture of different dried fruits, chopped apples and spices soaked in beverages.

In recent years, however, home cooks and big supermarket chains have begun to experiment, putting their own twist on the pies by adding less traditional ingredients to try to tempt more adventurous palates. Variations include topping the individual oven-baked pies with glace icing or frangipane, adding chocolate, salted caramel or even custard to the filling—to the dismay of food writer Felicity Cloake.

"Monstrosities" is how Cloake describes such adaptations, telling AFP mince pies "are not broke and do not need fixing". It seems palates have become "so jaded these days that we need to ring the changes and have whatever

fashionable flavor is currently dominating TikTok in the pies," she said. She said she wasn't against tweaking recipes, but that the fruit and traditional flavors should always be the star attraction.

#### 'Contemporary twist'

Cloake said her main objections to new recipes were they added overpowering flavors and too much sweetness. Some of her least favorite inventions included adding chocolate or Speculoos biscuits, or worst of all—bacon. Cloake concedes, however, that some innovations can be tasty such as the mince pies produced by London bakery Pophams. Although she said the Pophams' version "tests" her traditionalist stance it was still "really rather good".

The bakery uses its signature croissant dough for a mince pie filled with classic mincemeat and citrus and ginger-flavored cream. It describes it as a blend of "nostalgic flavor with a fresh, contemporary twist". "We have great respect for the classic shortcrust mince pie, but we believe in the power of innovation—especially when it creates something so delicious," said creative director Lucy McWhirter. But some mince pie traditionalists said even careful adaptations were probably "too much".

North London florist Marti Warren, 56, said additions such as chocolate or salted caramel were "my nightmare". "Mince pies should be traditional. I don't like messing with them because they are great as they are", she said, adding that there was also a "nostalgic" element that

brought back memories of "Christmases of the past". According to Britain's National Archive, a newly discovered 17th century recipe for "minst pyes" included minced meat—often lamb, but sometimes even beef.

Deep fat fried

Retired American lawyer Andrea Lass agreed that introducing new in-

gredients turned "something simple and pure into something overdone and contrived". Having developed a love of mince pies over 40 years living in Britain, she said her key criteria was that there should be a thin crust and a traditional and plentiful filling. "Don't try to sell me on all crust and no filling because that is like all hat and no cattle as they say in Texas," she said.

With the range of "adapted" mince pies on supermarket shelves seemingly growing every year, Cloake said she was happy to be the person who puts "herself out there" to try to change people's minds. But she had a word of warning for anyone tempted to try deep fat frying them. Having experimented with this in the past, she said the result was "quite delicious" but not something she'd repeat. The filling of shop-bought mince pies becomes so hot when immersed in boiling oil that it is practically "incendiary", she warned. "Don't attempt this after a glass of sherry!" she joked. —AFP

# India's architecture fans guard **Mumbai's Art Deco past**

towering cinema with a roofline like an ocean liner stands out in India's financial capital Mumbai, part of a remarkable Art Deco architectural heritage that campaigners say needs protection. A short walk away is a state-run insurance office with giant Egyptian-style carvings, and a palm-lined seafront promenade with pastel-colored apartments with porthole windows, curved balconies and exotic motifs. Architecture aficionados may go crazy over Miami's South Beach, but the coastal Indian megacity is home to what experts believe is one of the world's largest collections of Art Deco buildings.

Decades of neglect, however, have led to buildings being demolished or compromised through slapdash modern renovation. Lovers of the dramatic architecture fear that will only increase as Mumbai undergoes a rapid \$30 billion infrastructure makeover including major road, rail and bridge projects. A sweep of some Art Deco buildings—including offices, colleges and residential complexes—was listed on UNESCO's World Heritage list in 2018, alongside the city's Victorian Gothic architecture for its "unique style" described as "Indo-Deco".

Today, the city's breakneck pace of development has left a small but dedicated group of building owners, architects and heritage lovers trying to conserve the city's Art Deco character. The job requires "constant vigilance", said Nayana Kathpalia, who lives in an Art Deco building that was recently restored—but crucially in a manner that maintained its

original character.

#### 'Modern, open, friendly'

Many apartment building owners are eager to cash in and redevelop their old dwellings, making them part of a cookie-cutter modern skyline. "If too many buildings get done in a totally different style, the World Heritage Site committee will say 'what the hell is happening?'," Kathpalia said. "We are very, very clear that we have to protect that." Losing it could strip the city of its history and character, campaigners say. Art Deco took the West by storm after emerging as a new wave of design in France before the First World War.

Architects used geometric patterns

and streamlined structures to evoke the popular technologies of the time, including airplanes and ocean liners. As a style, Art Deco can appear as an odd hodgepodge, borrowing everything from ancient Mayan to Japanese culture. But the first generation of homegrown Indian architects who visited Europe in the 1920s and 1930s were inspired.


After returning home, they started designing Art Deco style buildings for rich Indian business families that had profited off the economic boom in the port city, said Atul Kumar, founder of a non-profit that seeks to conserve the heritage. Art Deco "enabled a certain cosmopolitanism" and contributed to making Mumbai a "modern, open, friendly" city, Kumar

added.

#### 'Bombay style'

While Kumar's Art Deco Mumbai organization has spent years painstakingly documenting buildings, it has also more recently started offering "repair and restoration" help. "We go out, pro bono, and reach out to people," he said, having supported the sensitive restoration of around nine buildings, including a couple in the core World Heritage area. However, there are challenges, including stringent rent control laws which impose financial constraints on landlords. Kumar also admits that residents in newer and northern parts of the city have less of a "desire" to conserve their buildings in their original Art Deco style.

A large part of this is due to a lack of awareness. Many of the city's inhabitants walk past the vivid tropical imagery, elongated turrets and jazzy typography without giving them a second glance. Pranati Mehta, a 46-year-old school teacher, says most Indians only look at "temples as architecture", as they "feel that is special". Some Mumbai residents don't realize they "live amongst art", she said. But Mehta, who was on a weekend walking tour to learn more about the architectural style, quickly adds that Art Deco isn't foreign to Indian sensibilities. "We recognize it as a Bombay style," she said. "We think Art Deco is also an Indian brand". — AFP

# Thousands greet the sun at Stonehenge solstice celebration

housands flocked to Stonehenge on Saturday to greet sunrise at the ancient British monument on the northern hemisphere's shortest day of the year. Spectators cheered and applauded as the sun rose over the neolithic site in southwest England at the winter solstice, a

pagan celebration that is believed to have been observed there for thousands of years. Druids and those wearing folk dress were among the 4,500-strong crowd marking the beginning of the day.

It is one of the few days of the year when visitors are allowed to touch the stones,

which are situated on the alignment of the midsummer sunrise and the midwinter sunset "This is all about renewal, rebirth, we're entering into the new year, and it's also a good time to acknowledge what's taking place in the year that's been," civil servant Chris Smith, 31, told the Press Association.

The Neolithic circle of giant stones has been a source of wonder and mystery for almost 5,000 years -- in the Middle Ages, the wizard Merlin of Arthurian legend was said to have stolen the monument from Ireland.—AFP

# Secretive game developer codes hit 'Balatro' in Canadian prairie province

here are no photos or videos of LocalThunk, an anonymous computer programmer who lives in the vast and desolate prairies of Canada's Saskatchewan province, far from Silicon Valley. His poker-inspired video game "Balatro," however, has proved wildly popular, winning three prizes at the prestigious 2024 Game Awards, taking both the industry and the creator himself by surprise. "When I started making the game I wasn't even thinking of publishing it," he said in an email to AFP.

The game went on to sell more than 3.5 million copies, and was named in several rankings as one of the best games of the year. "Balatro" is a deck-building game that allows players to improve their hand of cards using various strategies, including "cheating." Similar to poker, players can use a variety of "jokers" to rack up points. A community of enthusiasts has quickly turned "Balatro" into a cult hit. It has rave reviews on gaming platforms, and the chat group r/balatro on social media platform Reddit has more than 158,000 members.

"The polish in this game is just incredible. I cannot emphasize enough

how tactile the game is and how good it 'feels' while playing. I can almost smell the chips and feel the cards in my hands," user juhiscid enthused. On social media platform X, user @thechowderhead raved: "Balatro is quite possibly one of the greatest roguelikes ever made," referring to a type of video game. Despite all the success, the identity of the game's creator, however, remains a closely guarded secret.

#### 'Extra stress'

The Canadian developer, who only responds to media requests by email or on the phone, said he wants to stay in the shadows because "things are simpler that way." While the game's success has led to "extra stress," he said he does not regret making it, as it has allowed him to pursue video game development as a career. In a world dominated by large studios made up of hundreds of staff, "Balatro" was part of a growing wave of hits developed by independent game developers. Other examples of such small-budget big-hitters include "Papers, Please" (2013) and "Stardew Valley"

It is, however, the exception, more than a trend, according to Emilien Roscanu, spokesperson for the Quebec video game guild. "For every game that's a huge success like this, there are several that are just as good and won't necessarily get the public eye," he said. The industry is difficult to break into as an independent developer, due in part to the volume of games released every day, and the difficulty of competing with the marketing budgets of larger game studios. Solo developers have to wear "multiple hats at once," and therefore "the time dedicated to marketing is especially low," he said.

#### 'For fun'

LocalThunk spent three years working solo to develop "Balatro," his first public game. He said he was inspired by a card game from his youth that he wanted to put online so he could continue to play it during the pandemic. Solo development allows him, he said, to "pursue my creative vision without compromise." "I love making games for fun, and working alone is just part of that for me," he added. Despite being nominated for a BAFTA for Best Game 2025, LocalThunk still struggled to explain the success of what he calls his "weird game." "There are so many incredible games launched all the time, I don't know how this happened to me."—AFP

# ARAHMAIANI: THE INDONESIAN ARTIST WITH A THOUSAND LIVES

ndonesian artist Arahmaiani has had many lives -- from an imprisoned then exiled anti-dictatorship activist to a hippie, art teacher and environmentalist -- which have inspired her works that test the limits of freedom. The Southeast Asian artist was a nomad for years because of a crackdown on her paintings, installations and performances, which were viewed as provocative in the conservative Muslim-majority nation. Her works are now on show at Britain's Tate Modern in London for the first time and in November she gave a performance there focusing on violence suffered by Chinese-Indonesians in unrest during the

fall of dictator Suharto in the late 1990s. Her voice and percussion-based performance named "Burning Country" presents a healing process for the community after the trauma from riots still fresh in the memory. Her radical view of that era, questioning of religious tolerance and environmental damage were major themes of her mini-exhibition "The Wrath of Earth" held in the Indonesian capital Jakarta in August and September. "Art should challenge the status quo and provoke thought. It is a means to question our reality and inspire change," she wrote in the exhibition catalogue.

#### 'Our Frida Kahlo'

Prominently featured in Jakarta were Linnga and Yoni, masculine and feminine symbols that are Hindu representations of the balance of opposites. Indonesians "wanted to forget these symbols" that were once omnipresent in the archipelago, which was Buddhist, Hindu and animist before becoming the world's most populous Muslim-majority country, she said. "I want to remind myself and others about this forgotten cultural heritage," Arahmaiani, 63, told AFP.

Recognized abroad as one of the region's best artists, she is "less so in Indonesia", said Deborah Iskandar, owner of ASI Gallery in Jakarta that hosted Arahmaiani's exhibition this year. She wanted to host an exhibition for Arahmaiani to "introduce her work to a younger generation of art lovers", she said. Exhibition curator Nasir Tamara calls Arahmaiani "our Frida Kahlo", comparing her to the Mexican feminist and taboo-breaker.

"For young people, Yani (Arahmaiani) is a heroine, she's free. She's been a fighter since university," she said. The

black-haired woman with a serene smile from Indonesia's main island of Java now laughs at past controversies. Born in the Javan city of Bandung to a cleric father and a mother of Hindu-Buddhist descent, she studied art at the Bandung Institute of Technology. She was briefly imprisoned there in 1983 following complaints about her works from Islamist parties.

#### 'Freedom for everyone'

A 1993 painting "Lingga-Yoni" and 1994 installation "Etalase" caused controversy for combining symbols linked to Islam, Western culture and sexuality. Conservative Muslims called for these works to be censored and Arahmaiani

received death threats. She then left for Australia, where she carried on her studies while living with a hippy community. "There should be freedom for everyone, including women, on the religious basis of love and compassion," she said. But being a Muslim woman abroad can also carry its own stigma.

She criticized those prejudices in her installation "11 Juni 2002" after a trip to the United States. In that work, she recreates a room where she was detained by American immigration officers. Her status as a young Muslim woman travelling alone had made authorities suspicious about possible terrorism links, she said. In 2006, following a major earthquake in the central Javan city of Yogyakarta, she launched the "Flag Project": spectacular performances in which flags are waved with messages that encourage community dialogue.

Those performances were replicated elsewhere, including Tibet. Arahmaiani is involved in environmental protection work there and visits regularly, marveling at the historical links between Tibetan Buddhism and Indonesia's Buddhist heritage. The artist says she is now working on the theme of political dynasties, a hot topic in Indonesia since the election of President Prabowo Subianto. Prabowo is a former son-in-law of Suharto and his vice-president is the son of the outgoing head of state Joko Widodo, in a country long known for its political nepotism. —AFP

# Brits kindle Christmas spirit with second-hand gifts

ursting with customers one afternoon the week before Christmas, a second-hand charity shop in London's Marylebone High Street looked even busier than the upscale retailers surrounding it. One man grabbed two puzzle sets and a giant plush toy as a present for friends, another picked out a notebook for his wife. "Since the end of September, we've seen a huge uplift in people coming to our shops and shopping preloved," said Ollie Mead, who oversees the shop displays -- currently glittering with Christmas decorations -- for Oxfam charity stores around London.

At the chain of second-hand stores run by the British charity, shoppers can find used, or "pre-loved", toys, books, bric-a-brac and clothes for a fraction of the price of new items. Popular in Britain for personal shopping, charity stores and online second-hand retailers are seeing an unlikely surge in interest for Christmas gifts, a time of year often criticized for promoting consumerism and generating waste.

A report last month by second-hand retail platform Vinted and consultants RetailEconomics found UK customers were set to spend £2 billion (\$2.5 billion) on second-hand Christmas gifts this year, around 10 percent of the £20 billion Christmas gift market. In an Oxfam survey last year, 33 percent were going to buy second-hand gifts for Christmas, up from 25 percent in 2021. "This shift is evident on Vinted", Adam Jay, Vinted's marketplace CEO, told AFP.

"We've observed an increase in UK members searching for 'gift' between October and December compared to the same period last year." According to Mead, who has gifted second-hand items for the last three Christmas seasons, sustainability concerns and cost-of-living pressures are "huge factors". Skimming the racks at the central London store, Doctor Ed Burdett found a keychain and notebook for his wife. "We're saving up at the moment, and she likes to give things another life. So it'll be the perfect thing for her," Burdett, 50, told AFP. "It's nice to spend less, and to know that it goes to a good place rather than to a high street shop.'

#### 'Quirky, weird

Wayne Hemingway, designer and co-founder of Charity Super.Mkt, a brand which aims to put charity shops in empty shopping centers and high street spaces, has himself given second-hand Christmas gifts for "many, many years". "When I first started doing it, it was classed as quirky and weird," he said, adding it was now going more "mainstream". Similarly, when he first

bo was unconvinced. Buying herself a striking orange jacket, she said she "loves vintage"

But for most people, she confessed she would not get a used gift. "Christmas is special, it needs to be something they would cherish, something new,' said Odibo. "For Christmas, I'll go and



started selling second-hand clothes over 40 years ago, "at Christmas your sales always nosedive(d) because everybody wanted new".

Now, however, "we are seeing an increase at Christmas sales just like a new shop would", Hemingway told AFP. "Last weekend sales were crazy, the shop was mobbed," he said, adding all his stores had seen a 20-percent higher than expected rise in sales in the weeks before Christmas. "Things are changing for the better... It's gone from second-hand not being what you do at Christmas, to part of what you do."

Young people are driving the trend by making more conscious fashion choices, and with a commitment to a "circular economy" and to "the idea of giving back (in) a society that is being more generous and fair," he said. At the store till, 56-year-old Jennifer Odibuy something nice, either at Selfridges or Fenwick", she added, listing two iconic British department stores. Hemingway conceded some shoppers "feel that people expect something new" at Christmas.

"We're on a journey. The world is on a journey, but it's got a long way to go," he added. According to Tetyana Solovey, a sociology researcher at the University of Manchester, "for some people, it could be a bit weird to celebrate it (Christmas) with reusing." "But it could be a shift in consciousness if we might be able to celebrate the new year by giving a second life to something," Solovey told AFP. "That could be a very sustainable approach to Christmas, which I think is quite wonderful."—AFP

### Scientists observe 'negative time' in quantum experiments

cientists have long known that light can sometimes appear to exit a material before entering it -- an effect dismissed as an illusion caused by how waves are distorted by matter. Now, researchers at the University of Toronto, through innovative quantum experiments, say they have demonstrated that "negative time" isn't just a theoretical idea -- it exists in a tangible, physical sense, deserving closer scrutiny.

The findings, yet to be published in a peer-reviewed journal, have attracted both global attention and skepticism. The researchers emphasize that these perplexing results highlight a peculiar quirk of quantum mechanics rather than a radical shift in our understanding of time. "This is tough stuff, even for us to talk about with other physicists. We get misun-derstood all the time," said Aephraim Steinberg, a University of Toronto professor specializing in experimental quantum physics. While the term "negative time" might sound like a concept lifted from science fiction, Steinberg defends its use, hoping it will spark deeper discussions about the mysteries of quantum physics.

#### Laser experiments

Years ago, the team began exploring interactions between light and matter. When light particles, or photons, pass through atoms, some are absorbed by the atoms and later re-emitted. This interaction changes the atoms, temporarily putting them in a higher-energy or "excited" state before they return to normal. In research led by Daniela Angulo, the team set out to measure how long these atoms stayed in their excited state. "That time turned out to be negative," Steinberg explained -- meaning a duration less than zero.

To visualize this concept, imagine cars entering a tunnel: before the experiment, physicists recognized that while the average entry time for a thousand cars might be, for example, noon, the first cars could exit a little sooner, say 11:59 am. This result was previously dismissed as meaningless. What Angulo and colleagues demonstrated was akin to measuring carbon monoxide levels in the tunnel after the first few cars emerged and finding that the readings had a minus sign in front of them.

#### **Relativity intact**

The experiments, conducted in a cluttered basement laboratory bristling with wires and aluminum-wrapped devices, took over two years to optimize. The lasers used had to be carefully calibrated to avoid distorting the results. Still, Steinberg and Angulo are quick to clarify: no one is claiming time travel is a possibility. "We don't want to say anything traveled backward in time," Steinberg said. "That's a misinterpretation." The explanation lies in quantum mechanics, where particles like photons behave in fuzzy, probabilistic ways rather than following strict rules.

Instead of adhering to a fixed timeline for absorption and re-emission, these interactions occur across a spectrum of possible durations -- some of which defy everyday intuition. Critically, the researchers say, this doesn't violate Einstein's theory of special relativity, which dictates that nothing can travel faster than light. These photons carried no information, sidestepping any cosmic speed limits.

#### A divisive discovery

The concept of "negative time" has drawn both fascination and skepticism, particularly from prominent voices in the scientific community. German theoretical physicist Sabine Hossenfelder, for one, criticized the work in a YouTube video viewed by over 250,000 people, noting, "The negative time in this experiment has nothing to do with the passage of time -- it's just a way to describe how photons travel through a medium and how their phases shift." Angulo and Steinberg pushed back, arguing that their research addresses crucial gaps in understanding why light doesn't always travel at a constant speed.

Steinberg acknowledged the controversy surrounding their paper's provocative headline but pointed out that no serious scientist has challenged the experimental results. "We've made our choice about what we think is a fruitful way to describe the results," he said, adding that while practical applications remain elusive, the findings open new avenues for exploring quantum phenomena. "I'll be honest, I don't currently have a path from what we've been looking at toward applications," he admitted. "We're going to keep thinking about it, but I don't want to get people's hopes up."—AFP

# Tatum's 43-point triple-double propels Celtics over Bulls

## Stephen Curry nets 31 as Warriors end skid with win over Wolves

LOS ANGELES: Jayson Tatum exploded for 43 -- their second victory in three days at the Kings' points in his first triple-double of the season Saturday as the NBA champion Boston Celtics beat the Chicago Bulls 123-98 to avenge a defeat just

Tatum added 16 rebounds and 10 assists in a dominant performance in Chicago, connecting on 16 of his 24 shot attempts and nine of 15 from three-point range. Tatum joined Larry Bird as the only Celtics player to record a 40-point triple-double.

He joined current Clippers star James Harden as the only players to record at least 40 points, 15 rebounds, 10 assists and nine made three-pointers in a game. "It's all about finding your moments to accommodate the game," Tatum said, adding that coach Joe Mazzulla "tries to get me to dominate and amplify my teammates and make guys better".

Kristaps Porzingis added 22 points and Jaylen Brown chipped in 19 for the Celtics, who were stunned 117-108 on their home floor by the Bulls on Thursday. Nikola Vucevic scored 19 points and grabbed 10 rebounds to lead the Bulls while Zach LaVine, who scored 36 on Thursday, was held to

The Celtics improved to 22-6 to stay within sight of the Eastern Conference-leading Cleveland Cavaliers, who pushed their league-best record to 25-4 with a 126-99 victory over the Philadelphia 76ers.

Darius Garland scored 26 points to lead six Cavs players in double figures. Tyrese Maxey scored 27 points to lead the Sixers, whose star center Joel Embiid sat out. The Los Angeles Lakers, fueled by 32 points from LeBron James, beat Sacramento 103-99 Golden 1 Center.

Trailing by 10 with less than three minutes to play, the Kings cut the deficit to two points with just over a minute remaining but the Lakers held on. "These two wins have been about us doing the little things, because we have not been able to shoot the ball into the ocean," James said after the Lakers connected on 48.2 percent of their shots overall—and just nine of 35 from three-point range.

"But we've been able to win these two games in this hostile environment because we've done a lot of the little things, and defensively we've been on point." James added seven rebounds and six assists in an aggressive offensive display and came up with four steals on the defensive end.

#### **Short-handed Bucks win**

In Milwaukee, Giannis Antetokounmpo sat out with back spasms and Damian Lillard was sidelined by a calf strain. But Bobby Portis stepped up to score 34 points and lead the Bucks to a 112-101 victory over the Washington Wizards.

The Golden State Warriors bounced back from a stunning 51-point loss to Memphis on Thursday with a 113-103 victory over the Minnesota Timberwolves in Minneapolis. Warriors star Stephen Curry, who had missed all seven of his shot attempts on Thursday, made seven three-pointers on the way to 31 points and handed out 10 assists.

San Antonio Spurs star Victor Wembanyama scored 30 points and equaled his career high with 10 blocked shots as the Spurs cruised past the

Portland Trail Blazers 114-94. Jalen Brunson delivered an eye-catching 39 points to lead the New York Knicks in a 104-93 victory over the New Or-

But Kevin Durant's 43 points weren't enough for the Phoenix Suns, who fell 133-125 to the visiting Detroit Pistons. Cade Cunningham scored 28 points and pulled down 13 rebounds for the Pistons, who had seven players score in double figures.

The Orlando Magic matched the largest comeback in franchise history, erasing a 25-point deficit to beat the Miami Heat 121-114. Cole Anthony scored 35 points off the bench—including 13 in the final period for the Magic. — AFP

## Stokes out of **England's Champions** Trophy squad

LONDON: England Test captain Ben Stokes has been ruled out of next year's Champions Trophy one-day international tournament in Pakistan and the preceding white-ball tour of India, team management announced Sunday.

The 33-year-old star all-rounder was not considered after damaging a hamstring during England's defeat by New Zealand in the third Test at Hamilton earlier this month. "Durham all-rounder Ben Stokes was not considered for selection as he continues to be assessed following a left hamstring injury sustained," said an England and Wales Cricket Board statement.

Stokes did not bat in the second innings of that match as England slumped to a 423-run defeat—a result that meant his side still won a three-match series 2-1. He previously missed this year's home series against Sri Lanka and the first Test in Pakistan due to hamstring issues.

With England facing a five-match Test series at home to India starting in June before their pinnacle 2025/26 Ashes tour of Australia, team management have decided against risking inspirational red-ball skipper Stokes.

Key batsman Joe Root, who preceded Stokes as Test captain, returns to the ODI side for the first time since the 2023 World Cup in India. Fast bowler Mark Wood, who missed the recent Test tours of both Pakistan and New Zealand, with a bone-stress injury to his right elbow, is

The India series and Champions Trophy will mark England's first limited-overs tour and tournament under coach Brendon McCullum, previously just in charge of the Test side.

#### Buttler stays as captain

Jos Buttler, who missed the recent ODI series against the West Indies with a calf injury, remains captain of the two white-ball teams despite England surrendering both their 50-over and T20 world titles since November 2023.

But it is possible the dashing batsman, replaced as skipper in the Caribbean by all-rounder Liam Livingstone, may not keep wicket, as he has for much of his limited-overs career. Both the ODI squad for the India tour and the Champions Trophy, as well as the squad for five T20s in India in January, feature two other wicketkeepers in Test gloveman Jamie Smith, who missed the New Zealand series to attend the birth of his first child, and Phil Salt.

Meanwhile, 21-year-old rising star Jacob Bethell, who marked his debut Test series with three fifties in New Zealand, is included in both squads. Leg-spinner Rehan Ahmed joins the T20 squad, while Root is selected only for the ODIs. The tour party leaves for India on January 17, with the first match of a five-game series against T20 world champions India in Kolkata on January 22.

India and England will then play a threematch ODI series, in preparation for the Champions Trophy, starting in Nagpur on February 6.

Match dates for the Champions Trophy, which also features Pakistan as well as Australia, New Zealand, South Africa, Afghanistan and Bangladesh, have yet to be announced, with the tournament due to run from February 19 to March 9.

# **Chiefs beat Texans** while Ravens clinch playoff spot

WASHINGTON: Patrick Mahomes threw for one touchdown and ran for another as the Kansas City Chiefs improved to an NFL-best 14-1 on Saturday while the Baltimore Ravens beat Pittsburgh to secure

The two-time reigning Super Bowl champion Chiefs defeated Houston 27-19 and need only another win or loss by the Buffalo Bills (11-3) to clinch a top seed and home-field edge throughout the AFC playoffs. Mahomes completed 28-of-41 passes for 260 yards and a touchdown and ran five times for 33 yards and a touchdown, quickly serving notice he had recovered from a high left ankle sprain suffered in a victory over Cleveland last weekend.

"To go out there and find a way to win with everybody was a good moment for us," Mahomes said. "Our offensive line did a great job accepting the challenge." Baltimore's Lamar Jackson threw for 207 yards and three touchdowns and Derrick Henry ran

# Oleksandr Usyk beats Tyson Fury in heavyweight championship rematch

## Unbeaten across two divisions and cement his place among the greats

RIYADH: Oleksandr Usyk won his heavyweight championship rematch against Tyson Fury by unanimous decision overnight on Saturday to stay unbeaten across two divisions and cement his place among the greats.

The Ukrainian, who forced the pace and repeatedly tagged Fury with his accurate left hook, was awarded the fight 116-112 by all three judges, handing Fury his second straight loss. Usyk's win takes him to 23-0 with 14 knockouts and extends one of the all-time best careers that includes Olympic gold and undisputed champion at cruiserweight.

"He's a great fighter, it's a great performance," Usyk, 37, said of Fury, who was unbeaten over 35 fights until he lost their four-belt unification bout in May. "Unbelievable 24 rounds for my career." Only the WBA, WBO and WBC belts were on the line this time after Usyk, focused on the lucrative rematch, relinquished his IBF title rather than face challenger Daniel Dubois.

By beating Fury in May, "The Cat" had already joined the likes of Muhammad Ali, Joe Louis and Mike Tyson as undisputed heavyweight, and the first of the four-belt era. "He's my best friend," he said of Fury. "I respect this guy because I think he's a really tough opponent. Tyson Fury makes me strong."

#### 'Crazy man'

But the defeat opens up an uncertain future for the 36-year-old Fury, now 34-2-1, who announced his retirement in 2022 only to return to the ring. "I thought I've won both fights, but then again I've got two losses on my record now, so there's not much I can do about it," said the Briton, who refused to discuss his next steps.

Promoter Frank Warren also called the judges'

decision "nuts". But Usyk dismissed his complaints. "Uncle Frank, I think is blind... crazy man," joked the Ukrainian. Fury, wearing a Santa-style red-and-white robe and bushy beard, appeared to Mariah Carey's "All I Want For Christmas Is You", before a determined-looking Usyk strode out in Cossack gear.

The 6ft 9ins (206cm) Briton's jab held Usyk at bay early on and he landed a jarring right in round two. Usyk caught Fury flush with a left as he raised the pace in round three. They went toe-to-toe in a punishing fifth round, with Fury pummelling body shots while Usyk launched a flurry to the head. In the sixth, he stung Fury with a clean hit to the nose. The supremely fit Usyk, renowned for taking charge in the closing rounds, was the aggressor in the seventh, tagging Fury with a hook as the "Gypsy King" backed away.

Fury regained the initiative in the ninth, wielding his jab and one-two combinations and leaning on the Ukrainian, employing his career-heaviest 281lb (127.4kg) of weight. It was see-saw stuff as they traded blows but Usyk rocked Fury in the 11th with a lightning combination that ended with yet another left hook to the face. An Usyk uppercut to Fury's chin highlighted a furious final round and there seemed little doubt about the winner as the Ukrainian sank to his knees, arms aloft.

#### **Ancient sabre**

Usyk, who briefly served as a soldier after the Russian invasion, then celebrated by holding up a sabre that belonged to Ivan Mazepa, a hero of Ukrainian nationalism who fought against Russian control in the early 1700s.

Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelensky was quick to hail the victory, calling it proof that

Ukraine "will not give up what's ours" after nearly three years of war with Russia. "Victory!" Zelensky said in a post on Telegram. "So important and so necessary for all of us now."

Reports put the prize purse at an increased \$190 million with Usyk, as defending champion, expected to receive the bigger share—a reversal of fortunes from May. The fight sits high in the portfolio

of Saudi Arabia's oil-funded push into sports, which has drawn accusations of "sportswashing" its dubious human rights record.

After Formula One, the LIV Golf tour, Newcastle United and a swathe of ageing football stars, the conservative kingdom's strategy confirmed its crowning moment this month when it was awarded football's 2034 World Cup. — AFP

## Atletico snatch late win at Barca to top La Liga

BARCELONA: Atletico Madrid came from behind to snatch a last-gasp 2-1 victory over Barcelona and claim leadership of La Liga on Saturday. Pedri sent the Catalans ahead but second-half goals from Rodrigo De Paul and Alexander Sorloth helped Diego Simeone's side move three points clear at the top of the table, having played one match fewer than Barca.

Hansi Flick's side dominated at the Olympic stadium but Atletico clung on before claiming a 12th consecutive victory across all competitions with Sorloth's stoppage-time strike. Barcelona started the season in superb form but have stumbled in recent weeks and have now won just one of their last seven league games.

This was their third consecutive home league defeat, their worst such run since 1987, while it was also Simeone's first ever away triumph against Barcelona in La Liga. "It's inexplicable... we had the game in our hands and we didn't take advantage," said Barcelona defender Pau Cubarsi. Champions Real Madrid face Sevilla on Sunday and can also move ahead of Barcelona with a victory. "It's truly a tough defeat to take, when you don't finish a game, this is what can happen," Pedri told Movistar.

"We have the break now to reset mentally and physically." Barcelona, missing injured teenage star Lamine Yamal, controlled the first half and suffocated Atletico with their press. "We will fight for everything, we will fight for every point to win this (league)," insisted Flick, who said he was pleased with the performance despite the result.

"This is how we want to play in the future, so we will take this and bring it with us to next year." Barcelona took the lead after 30 minutes with Pedri both the architect and scorer of the goal. The Spain midfielder burst forward with the ball and fed Gavi, who tried to turn and inadvertently nudged the ball back to the surging Pedri, who entered the box and slotted past Oblak.

Barcelona should have doubled their lead early in the second half, with Fermin Lopez denied by Oblak's legs before Raphinha hit the crossbar. Pedri played in the Brazilian winger with a fine pass over the top and Raphinha lofted the ball over the goalkeeper but it struck the woodwork on its way down. Moments later Atletico were level, with Marc Casado's misguided backheel clearance falling to De Paul on the edge of the area. The inform Argentine midfielder finished with a firm low effort into the bottom corner for his third goal in his last four league games. — AFP



# Iraq go top as Ayman Hussein's goal earns dramatic 1-0 win over Yemen

Qatar tie with UAE 1-1 in Khaleeji Zain 26 Cup

KUWAIT: The Iraqi football team achieved a difficult victory over its Yemeni counterpart with a score of (1-0) in the beginning of their journey in the Arabian Gulf Cup (Khaleeji Zain 26), which is hosted by the State of Kuwait until January 3. The match, which was held at the Jaber Al-Mubarak Al-Sabah Stadium in the first round of Group II, came amid an ideal and enthusiastic atmosphere from the fans of the two teams.

The defending champions Iraq imposed its control from the first minute of the meeting, as the first corner kick was recorded in its favor in the second minute, after which the first 10 minutes passed without much danger to the goals of both teams.

The Iraqi team continued to dominate the game until the 20th minute, which witnessed a shot that went past the left post of Yemeni goalkeeper Muhammad Aman, followed by another dangerous attack that ended with a shot by striker Ayman Hussein that went past the right side of the Yemeni goalkeeper.

In contrast to the course of the game, the Yemenis threatened the Iraqi goal in the 26th minute with an or-

ganized counterattack after the Iraqi defense left its area unattended, but Yemen's Nasser Al-Ghawashi's shot went into the outer net of the goal. Two minutes later, Yemen launched the most dangerous attack of the match with a clear breakaway for its striker Omar Al-Dahi, who shot over the Iraqi goal amid the heartbreak of the Yemeni fans in the 33rd minute. The Yemeni goalkeeper saved a second consecutive shot from afar, preventing Iraq from scoring its first goal in the tournament, and then the Iragis continued their absolute control until the end of the first half without shaking the nets of either team until the end of the first half.

With the start of the second half, the Iraqi team returned to control the course of the game with a tight and organized defense from the Yemeni side until the 64th minute from Iraqi striker Ayman Hussein to score the lead goal from a strong header that the Yemeni goalkeeper was unable to save, while Yemen's Nasser Al-Ghawashi did not take advantage of his solitude to shoot a strong kick into the outer net of Iraq's goal. After that the tempo of the game calmed down and the Iraqi team was able to manage it in its favor calmly until the end to achieve a valuable victory to temporarily lead the group pending the outcome of Saudi and Bahrain meeting scheduled for later.

The Oatar's national football team drew with the Emirati team 1-1 on Saturday in the first match in Group stage of the Arabian Gulf Cup (Khaleeji Zain 26). Qatari player Akram Afif started scoring with a penalty kick in the 17th minute. The UAE team's did not surrender and pressed till player Yahya Al-Ghassani scored the equalizer in the 46th minute.

The UAE team dominated the second half of the match and reached the Qatari goal several times but failed to score thanks to the tight Oatari defense. Both teams earned their first point in the tournament, equaling the Kuwaiti and Omani teams who tied with the same score earlier today. The second round of the group will be played on Tuesday when the Qatari team faces its Omani counterpart at Jaber Al-Mubarak Al-Sabah Stadium, while the Kuwaiti team meets its Emirati counterpart at Jaber Al-Ahmad International Stadium. — KUNA
